

Goodfellows hawk papers to give children Christmas



Hard times increase need for help

Determined to see to it that there is "no child without a Christmas" in this economically austere year, dozens of people will hit the streets Saturday morning to hawk newspapers for the Northville Goodfellows.

Money collected from newspaper sales and other donations will be used to provide food and clothing for needy persons, C.A. Smith, director of the project said.

"We don't give toys," Smith said. "We take the needy children to a store and have them fitted with shoes or whatever clothing they may need."

In addition, when "here is a whole family in dire economic straits, the Goodfellows buy food for the holidays."

Because of the recession, the Goodfellows are going to need more help than any other year in the local group's five-year history.

Recipients are chosen in cooperation with social service workers at local schools and churches, Smith said. The number of children and families in need has grown over the past year due to increased unemployment and rampant inflation, he said.

"We're going to need all the help we can get," Smith said. "We're selecting recipients right now. We've quite a number already. There are already three families who have no food."

Smith said all will receive aid of some form. The extent to which the Goodfellows can help is limited only by the donations the organization receives.

Sale of the newspaper begins at 10 a.m. Saturday. Goodfellows will be at Main and Center and other downtown streets, in front of the Chatham and A&P grocery stores and many other locations. City and township police par-

ticipating in the sale have chosen a number of intersections in both communities.

Smith said anyone wishing to help sell papers would be warmly received.

"City hall will be the headquarters and we would appreciate all the help we can gather," he said. "We'll give them (volunteers) the aprons and the papers and they can choose whatever location they would like."

The Goodfellows also raise funds through direct donation. Checks made out to the Northville Goodfellows can be mailed in care of police or to Smith at 43643 Nine Mile, Northville.

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Ambulance service moves into new home

Novi Ambulance service has a new home for its units serving the Northville area after nearly a year of searching.

John Early, director of the ambulance service, accepted the keys to a former firehouse at Wayne County Child Development Center (CDC) Monday and his crews are moving into the building this week.

Early said he plans to station two ambulance units in the structure just east of Sheldon Road between Five and Six Mile. Five paramedics and ambulance attendants will be housed there while on duty, he said — two for each ambulance and one for a rescue unit to be stationed at the new Northville post.

The brick building, originally built as a fire station for the CDC, has lately

been used for storage of Northville Township fire equipment.

Novi Ambulance services are provided through a joint agreement between the city and the township. Part of the agreement is that a base for the service is to be provided locally.

The site finally provided was one proposed in June but later rejected. When Robert Toms, township fire chief, said he could not remove his department's equipment from one of the storage rooms in the building, Early refused to occupy it.

The ambulance service will have to store drugs and much expensive equipment at its Northville base, Early said, and he did not want anyone not connected with the service to have access to the building.

Early began charging the city and township each \$200 per month for storage of local ambulances at its Novi base. Discussions between Early, Toms, city and township officials ultimately resolved the issue and the fire equipment was moved to another CDC location across Sheldon.

The building had to be renovated to be a suitable site for the new ambulance base. More than \$13,500 was expended by city and township for masonry, installation of furnaces and new doors and painting of the facility.

While not in "like new" condition, Early said the facility is now adequate to move the Northville units into their new home while further work continues.

Early noted that his service was recently licensed as a paramedic and life support service in Plymouth and Plymouth Township. Outside of a single unit or two in Detroit's Emergency Medical Service (EMS), he said, Novi Ambulance has the only life support license in the area.

Persons needing ambulance service in Northville can call 348-2050, he said. A new switching device gives direct, nearly immediate connection to the Northville station.

Lease contract sought for county CDC lands

An elderly housing project in Northville Township is one step closer to reality this week following a decision by a Wayne County committee to negotiate a 99-year lease on land for the complex.

The county ways and means committee voted Monday to have the county's corporate counsel and board of auditors negotiate the lease to the Wayne County Economic Development Corporation (EDC), a quasi-governmental body which would oversee the project.

As proposed, a developer would be found to build a complex of mid-rise buildings, townhouses and cluster housing to serve an elderly population on what currently is unused Wayne County Child Development Center property.

Preliminary studies suggest that the complex include a nursing home and medical clinic as well as a food service for its clientele.

The committee's vote to go forward with a lease agreement to present to the full county board of commissioners for approval followed comments by Larry Sheehan, chairman of Northville Township's EDC, which is cooperating with the county EDC on the proposal.

"I told them I feel there has been too much bickering going on and that it was time we went forward with this," Sheehan said Tuesday. "It's been going on for a year and one-half now and in the interim costs for both interest and construction have doubled."

Sheehan referred to a series of obstacles confronted within county government. In October, the board of auditors suggested that the land be sold outright, rather than leased, and established a sales price far in excess of the EDC estimates.

Auditors cited the RME (multiple-family residential, elderly) zoning of the property as a reason for high property valuation. The zoning was established by the township, which created a special classification, specifically for the elderly village project.

Commissioners stated concern that the county receive maximum benefit from the agreement and instructed their counsel and auditors to also prepare an outright sale price for the land in case the full board should choose that route as an alternative to a lease agreement.

According to Sheehan, the committee also made sure the township was not going to waive taxes as an incentive to contractors.

"I told them that, while I could not speak officially for the township, I had heard no discussion of waiving taxes," he said. "I also said the township has acres and acres of land that it gets no taxes from and that my impression was the township wanted maximum tax benefits for itself and the school system, as well as the county, out of this project."

Robert Fitzpatrick, chairman of the EDC, said the township could get \$57,000 in property taxes annually on its current 2.5 mill rate if the project is built. Northville schools stand to gain nearly \$1 million yearly from the village, which would produce no additional children to educate.

Over the terms of a mortgage or land lease, he said, the county could expect to draw between \$2.3 million and \$5.8 million in tax receipts on land which currently costs the government over \$100,000 annually to maintain.

Sheehan said the county's counsel indicated a proposed lease agreement could be presented to the board of commissioners in the early part of next year.

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Mainstreet update

Hurry to end street work

No one who has visited the community during the past few weeks can doubt that "things are happening" downtown.

Still, the Mainstreet 78 Downtown Development Project of the city is now only well begun. Work of the past few weeks has been the most visible as motorists detoured on Main and Center streets while work crews hurried to finish slicing through concrete before the winter freeze.

Despite the city's statement last month that the project was "winding down" for winter, it appeared for a while that it was going full blast as crews worked throughout the downtown, but it was just the last phase of the underground preparation.

Last of the season installations of water and storm sewers were being made last week, City Manager Steven Walters said, completing this phase of Mainstreet 78 that will send wiring underground in conduits. The sewers were replaced as part of the improvement program although they are not part of the project itself.

The water and sewer improvements were made where needed, Walters explained, to avoid disrupting the finished Mainstreet project in future years.

The underground conduits have been run throughout the downtown for Detroit Edison, Michigan Bell and Omnicom Cablevision service lines. Walters said Edison may come in during the winter to continue work if weather permits.

This fall also, the northeast parking

lot has been resurfaced.

As soon as spring weather allows, the balance of the Mainstreet project will be completed, the city manager promises. This will see the elimination of overhead lines and utility poles, parking lot resurfacing, street and sidewalk reconstruction and landscaping.

The "frosting" of decorative lighting and park areas at Main and Hutton and on Main to Mary Alexander Court (where a parking lot presently is located) will be completed.

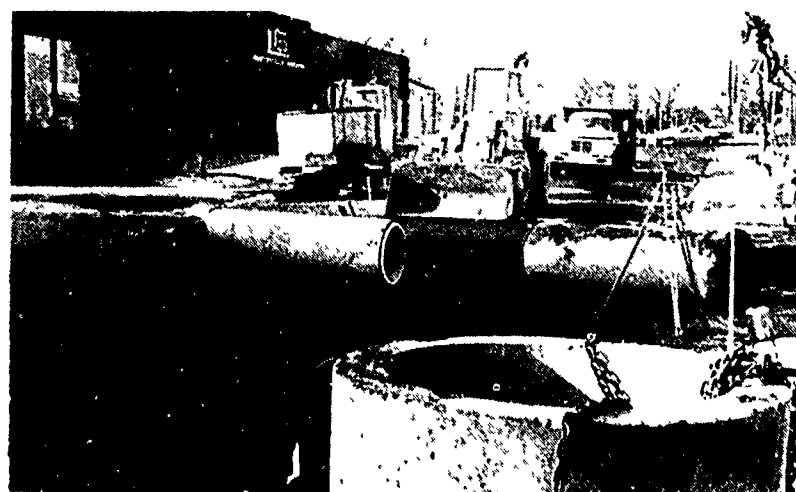
There will be brick paving, wrought iron benches, fences and tree skirts carrying out a Victorian theme in the park

areas. The city already has a sample of what's in store, Walters points out, at the corner of Main and Hutton.

While the city's project involves only improvements to public property, the Downtown Development Authority (DDA) has developed store front concepts for all downtown stores as a guide to enhancing the historical flavor of the downtown. Walters notes that many stores recently have made improvements along these lines. Others are planning to do so.

Present plaque to college in his memory

Shriners honor fellow Mason — Henry R. Schoolcraft

When Schoolcraft College opened in 1964, Livonia Shriner and Novi resident John Moore believed he had found the perfect place to promote the principles of Masonry and get young people involved in Mason organizations.

While gathering data about the college, Moore came across some information which assured him that Schoolcraft was definitely the right place for the organization.

In a book entitled "Schoolcraft, Longfellow, Hiawatha," written by former Michigan Governor Chase Osborn and his daughter, Moore discovered that Henry Rowe Schoolcraft (for whom the college is named) was raised a Mason on July 17, 1814 at Union Masonic Lodge in Salisbury, Vermont.

In view of this information, the Livonia Shrine Club held a dinner meeting November 1 at Schoolcraft College to honor Henry Rowe Schoolcraft.

The meeting, held at the Waterman Campus Center, included representatives from all the area Masonic Bodies including Leo E. Harrawood of Novi, Illustrious Pontentate of the Moslem Shrine Temple.

In addition to the dinner meeting, the Masons also presented a bronze plaque

honoring Schoolcraft. The plaque was installed in the college's Administration Building.

Also attending the dinner meeting was Dr. C. Nelson Grote, president of Schoolcraft College.

The Masons honored Schoolcraft for "his accomplishments on behalf of higher education in the State of Michigan and the benefits that have accrued therefrom for today's youth."

Throughout his lifetime, Henry Rowe Schoolcraft was a scholar, author, regent of the University of Michigan, Indian agent, and explorer.

Born March 28, 1793, Schoolcraft was

a native of Albany, New York. At the age of 15, he applied for admission and was accepted at Union College. Lack of money, however, kept him from enrolling and he instead took over his father's small glass factory.

Employed later as the manager of a glass factory in Vermont, he studied natural science privately with faculty members of nearby Middlebury College.

His interest in science carried him to the unexplored regions of the Middle West. He became a mineralogist and geologist, exploring Missouri and Arkansas in 1817 and 1818. Documenting all of his work carefully, he was considered a competent geologist and was sent by Lewis Cass in 1820 to explore the upper Mississippi.

He was appointed Indian agent in 1822 for the tribes of Lake Superior. Promoting the study of the ethnology of the Indian, he wrote many authentic volumes of Indian history, customs and lore. Henry Wadsworth Longfellow gained his material for his poem "Hiawatha" from Schoolcraft.

He also was instrumental in organizing the University of Michigan and was a member of the first board of regents from 1837 to 1841. He was chairman of the board and was in charge of putting U-M into operation.

Schoolcraft was an honorary member of almost every scientific and historical society in the United States and Europe. The American Philosophical Society and the American Antiquarian Association also honored him with membership.

The Masons' tribute to Henry Rowe Schoolcraft coincides with the celebration of the 100th Anniversary Year of the Moslem Shrine Temple.

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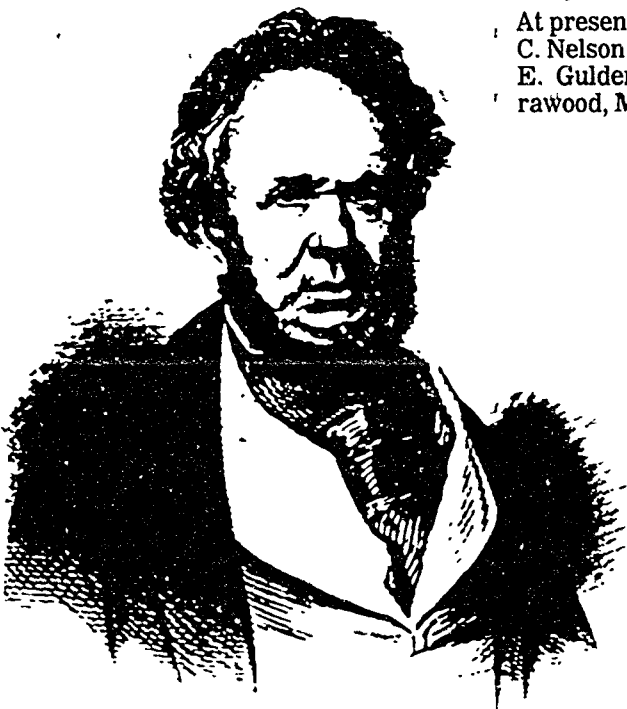

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State plans demand cars pass inspection for plates

Michigan may require inspection and maintenance of private automobiles in the Southeast section of the state within a year, officials said last week.

The last of four public meetings explaining the program was December 4 in Southfield. Auto industry representatives, private citizens, fleet operators, mechanics and the press gathered for a slide presentation and question and answer session on rules proposed by the Department of State.

Later this month, the department will present its proposed rules to the legislature.

With legislative approval, and the appropriation of approximately \$1 million to get the plan off the ground, inspections would begin in the late summer or early fall of 1981.

Drivers in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and Washtenaw counties would have to present a certificate showing their cars had passed emissions inspection to obtain their 1982 license plates.

Inspections, at state-licensed private repair facilities, would cost no more than \$10 by law. Repair costs are limited to \$50 in the first year and would be adjusted annually for inflation.

At the Southfield hearing, state officials said the legislature was "not pleased" with the concept but passed the legislation under pressure from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

EPA standards for air quality are applied on a regional basis. Last March, the agency warned that southeastern Michigan would not meet a December 1982 deadline (set by the Clean Air Act of 1977) for reduction of ozone (smog) and carbon monoxide in the air.

The EPA threatened an end to industrial development approval, federal road-building and sewage treatment monies for the region if the state did not implement a program to make "reasonable progress" toward meeting the standards.

The inspection and maintenance program, called I/M, was devised as the least expensive and easiest to administer of the solutions approved by the EPA, according to Rodger James of the Department of State's Bureau of Automotive Regulation (BAR).

The program was passed into law in April as Public Act 83 of 1980. James said the law is not specific and leaves details to the Department of State.

Smog is caused by a combination of hydrocarbons (HC) and nitrous oxides (NOx) under sunlight. Automobiles are blamed for more than 90 percent of NOx

emissions and approximately 49 percent of HC emissions.

Some three million drivers in the four counties slated for the program would have their cars inspected annually for \$10 or less.

Livingston and Monroe counties might be added to the program later. Other areas which might be regulated include Lansing, Saginaw, Grand Rapids, and Niles.

Tests, which involve inserting a probe into the tailpipe to measure emissions at idle, would be done by mechanics certified by the Department of State as "emissions inspectors" after going through a training and testing program.

Repairs would be done by certified "emissions control mechanics." The mechanics would estimate the cost to make a car comply with the differing standards set for cars made in 1972-74, 74-80 and 81 or newer. A separate set of standards, similarly divided by model year, apply to light trucks.

If the estimate exceeds \$50, the owner would be required only to get an "emissions tune-up" involving setting the dwell and timing and adjusting carburetor mixture and idle settings.

According to the EPA, the required repairs also could save energy by increasing gas mileage to the tune of 10 percent on cars built prior to 1979.

James said the Department of State had examined similar programs in other states before forming its proposed rules. Some states, such as New Jersey, have state-owned-and-operated inspection stations. Rhode Island and Nevada license independent operators, as Michigan would.

I/M programs already in place in Tucson and Phoenix, Arizona, and Seattle, Washington show that 20 to 25 percent of cars tested fail. Average repair costs are under \$30 and include items such as replacing air cleaners, spark plugs or points and timing adjustments, James said.

Automobiles built prior to 1972 are excluded from the act. Other exemptions are granted for vehicles with a gross vehicle weight rating over 8,500 pounds (these trucks are only mildly regulated when new), vehicles new in the 12 months preceding application for license, and motorcycles.

Vehicles powered by diesel engines or electric motors are excluded. Alcohol and propane fuels are not mentioned in

the act and, James said, presumably are regulated.

Persons on general assistance and medicare would be exempt from program requirements (see related story).

Regulation of inspection and repair facilities would be added to the duties of the present Bureau of Automotive Regulation. The BAR already licenses car dealerships, repair facilities and mechanics.

Unannounced inspections of the stations would be made every 30 days and the workers and machines examined for accuracy, James said. Hiring 25 inspectors is part of the estimated \$1 million cost for the first year, he added.

Currently, BAR employs 30 inspectors but regular inspection is made only at new car dealerships once per year.

More than 2,000 facilities currently licensed by BAR were notified that the program was approaching and sent questionnaires. More than 800 have expressed an interest in participating, with representation from throughout the affected area.

In addition to the licensing provisions, inspection stations would need an emissions analyzer approved by the state. James said most such analyzers

already in use built since 1974 would comply. New equipment adequate to meet state standards costs around \$4,000, he added.

Some details of the program have not been set yet, James said. Ford Motor Company has requested a revision in the testing procedure, involving more complicated preparation of the car before inserting the probe, for instance.

Under current federal law, manufacturers must warranty vehicles to pass the inspections for 24,000 miles. In addition, emissions control equipment must be guaranteed against failure for 50,000 miles.

If the cause of test failure falls within warranty the manufacturer must pick up the repair, but not the inspection cost. The usual warranty provision that the car be maintained to the maker's specification applies.

Should the legislature reject some portion of the rules, implementation would be delayed, James said.

No appropriation is made for the current fiscal year for the program. Should monies be allotted in the next fiscal year, the Department of State would require certification for 1982 plates, James said.

Audubon Society okays tax proposal

A tax refund proposal currently before the Michigan Legislature could mean a windfall of funds for support of non-game fish and wildlife, according to Environmental Action Chairman Richard Parker.

Parker, addressing the Michigan Audubon Society's board of directors at its November 15 meeting at Schoolcraft College, said if House Bill 5973 were passed into law, it would allow taxpayers to designate a portion of their income tax refund to be used for research and management of those plant, fish and wildlife species which are not usually taken for sport or commercial purposes.

It is expected the federal funds will be made available matching the amounts the state raises.

Funding for wildlife management programs traditionally has come from hunting and fishing license fees and from taxes on hunting and fishing equipment. Management programs

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At Southfield hearing

Inspection law loopholes questioned by citizenry

How the proposed vehicle emissions inspection law would be enforced was of primary concern among most citizens attending last week's public hearing in the Southfield Civic Center.

The number of exemptions allowed, the localized nature of the program and protection of consumers were among concerns expressed. The exemption of low income persons also was closely inquired after.

Regardless of the type of automobile they own, persons on general assistance or medicare are not required to have the tests.

"If the intent is to get clean air, why don't you just require low income persons to participate and waive the fee, or pay the fee for them?" a citizen asked.

Rodger James, of the Department of State's Bureau of Automotive Regulation, said the legislature's Public Act 83 of 1980, which formed the plan, grants complete exemption to "low income persons" without defining low income. He said the department had discussed alternatives to the exemption but a change in the law would be required.

Welfare rolls were chosen as definition for easy administration, they said.

Others in the audience asked if it would be possible for a car-owner to put the vehicle in the name of an elderly relative on medicare and thus circumvent the law.

"Our intent is not to put a complete brick wall around southeastern Michigan and make everyone inside comply," said James. "People can and probably would circumvent the law in the manner you suggest. They could also register their cars outside the controlled region.

"If someone is willing to have his registration and driver's license not match with his other identification, and

put up with the hassles, they could avoid the program.

"I don't think a great many people will go to the extra bother and expense," he continued. "In many cases, the expense of doing such a thing would exceed what it would cost to have the car inspected and tuned. We do know how many people are on welfare and medicare, and how many live in each county.

"If there are, say, three times as many cars registered to medicare recipients as there are people in the program, then I'm sure something would be done at that time. But I don't think it's going to happen.

Come January, the state's licensing program for mechanics and repair facilities will require all mechanics to be licensed in a repair before being allowed to work, he added.

The addition of a staff of inspectors to observe the independent licensed inspection stations should provide adequate consumer protection, according to the official.

Car owners could have their cars inspected up to six months prior to the effective date of new license plates or tabs, he said.

When a car passes inspection, a certificate would be issued to be presented to the secretary of state when registering the auto. A system of window stickers indicating compliance was considered, James said, but was rejected as a less efficient and more costly means of enforcing the law.

Citizens also asked why Michigan did not sue the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for its threats to cut off industrial development and federal funds to the region which forced the legislature to pass the inspection program into law.

James said P.A. 83 contains a section ordering the state attorney general to file suit in federal court against the EPA.

"He says he isn't going to do it," James added, shrugging his shoulders.

Energy program seeks qualified homes to repair

With winter closing in and a perceived threat to future funding in the Washington wind, a western Wayne County energy saving program is hunting for elderly and low income persons eligible for its aid.

The program, sponsored by the federal Department of Energy and Department of Labor through the Michigan Department of Labor's bureau of community services, weatherizes homes to make them more energy efficient.

The western Wayne County portion of the program is searching for people who qualify for its free services. Caulking and glazing windows, installing missing storm windows, weatherstripping, insulation of attics, crawlspaces and electric water heaters are among the services offered.

Thirty-one persons are employed by the program and, in addition.

According to James O. Brown, project coordinator, the \$1 million received for the last half of 1980 and funds guaranteed for the first half of 1981 may be the end of the program.

Future funding may be threatened by budget cutting moves in Washington, and the question remains as to whether a new legislature and administration will continue any funding for the program.

The program is also threatened by the city of Detroit's portion, which is lagging behind in serving homes. The state's share of the federal monies available is based on its prior performance, and Detroit, where the most eligible homes are likely to be, is dragging down the state performance.

To qualify for the free services one must own a home and meet low income standards. A single person household, for instance, can earn no more than \$4,738. As family size increases, the eligible income increases by \$1,525. Examples are:

- \$6,263 for a two-person household
- \$7,788three persons
- \$9,313four persons

Those interested in having homes weatherized can call 326-9402. The program is based in Westland. Plymouth, Livonia, Redford, Garden City and other nearby communities are also included in the search for applicants.

Santas needed to fill patients' wish lists

Christmas is for everyone, but everyone is not always remembered — especially in tight economic times.

Patients at the Northville Regional Psychiatric Center on Seven Mile have "want lists" and look forward to being remembered by Santa, but Northville City Attorney Philip Ogilvie is worried some may not be.

For several years he has been given lists of patient requests and has distributed them to friends and church members.

This year, however, Ogilvie still has patients' wants that may not be filled unless he can find more volunteers.

"You don't have to get everything on a list," he says, mentioning that most contain four or five items. He suggests spending between \$5 and \$10. Sex and age of the patient are noted on the list.

A carton of cigarettes or a tiny radio are top requests. Others also need very basic gifts like slippers, pajamas or t-shirts.

"They're not big requests," the Santa-attorney points out, but caring friends who will fulfill requests, bringing the presents (wrapped) back to his office at 104 West Main by next Wednesday, are needed now.

There's just time enough to be Santa's helper.

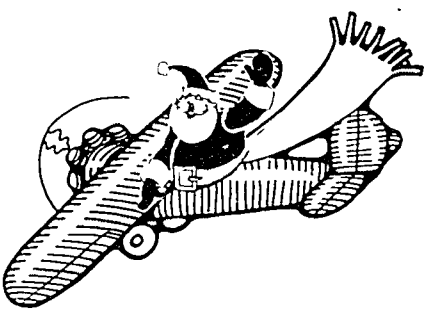

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

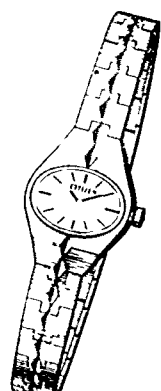

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Community directory's in the mail

This week, along with Christmas mail, Northville city and township residents are receiving a 32-page Northville Area Directory as a gift from the Northville Chamber of Commerce.

The directory with seven familiar scenes in color on the cover is impressive. It's also a community reference, listing officers and boards for both city and township as well as schools and their personnel.

Paid for by advertisers, the 8 1/2 by 11 booklet was compiled with the cooperation of the chamber board, businesses, clubs and organizations, says Paul F. Folino, chamber president.

It's a first such edition, and Kay Keegan, executive secretary for the chamber, says the chamber hopes to update it annually. She adds that additional copies are available for \$1 (not the \$2 price on the cover) at the chamber office in the Community Building on West Main.

The directory includes a history of Northville written by Jack W. Hoffman, publisher of The Northville Record. It chronicles the community's beginnings early in the 1820s and includes the notation that the township is half the area of most Michigan townships and that the city is located in two counties.

Histories of the Northville well and the Ford Valve Plant water wheel, both pictured on the cover, are in the booklet.

The city's impressive senior citizens' center, Allen Terrace, also is pictured on the cover as well as the water tower, entrance bridge to Mill Race Historical Village, city hall and Northville Downs.


Inside there is a picture of the new township hall at 41600 Six Mile with a township history that notes the township includes a state park, Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital and the presently unused Wayne County Training School property.

In addition to the usual police and fire department numbers the directory includes water and sewer, building and treasurer's numbers in the township.

The 1980-81 public school year calendar is included along with information about public, parochial and nursery schools in the community.

Area recreation sites are listed. They include Maybury State Park, Kensington Metropark, Kensington Farm Center and Nature Study Area, Edward Hines Park and the Northville Community Recreation.

To Civil Service vacancy

Joyner to fight county appointment

Wayne County Commissioner Martha Scott resigned from the board of commissioners and was named to the three-member County Civil Service Commission by her colleagues at a meeting of the board December 4.

Scott fills a vacancy on the commission created by the resignation of Joan M. Pettipren, who moved to the Wayne County Road Commission against protests that include a pending lawsuit in circuit court. Another suit is threatened over the Scott appointment. The unexpired term to which Scott

was appointed extends through 1984. Regular terms on the commission are six years.

Scott was a member of the board of commissioners since 1978. She was chairman of the human resources committee. She made an unsuccessful bid for election to the state house of representatives this year.

As a county commissioner, Scott was paid \$16,190 per year plus business expenses up to \$100. In her new position she will earn \$14,250. Commissioner William Joyner, of

Plymouth, was among those who voiced opposition to the appointment. The vote, 18 yes with four abstentions, prompted Joyner to write a letter to members of the Wayne County Charter Commission asking them to include in the new charter they are drafting a provision banning commissioners from holding other paying jobs in county government for at least one year after leaving the board.

James J. Rashid of Dearborn already had introduced a resolution asking the board to endorse and the state legislature to approve provisions pro-

hibiting commissioners from holding jobs for two years after leaving the board.

The lawsuit involving Pettipren was prompted, in part, by her move from the civil service post (which she was named to while still a commissioner) to the road commission job which pays \$41,000 per year.

County Commissioner George F. Killeen, one of the parties to the suit, has long opposed increased salaries for commissioners in other county offices after they leave the board.

Joyner said he might file suit to overturn the Scott appointment. "It is clearly inappropriate for a member of this board of commissioners to take a paying position within county government," he said.

"I feel it does the employees of Wayne County a great injustice to once again see a county commissioner placed in a position of authority with the county because of political ties."

Joyner emphasized that his position should not be construed as a personal affront to Scott, but added:

"No commissioner should ever feel entitled to another job upon completion of term of office."

"At some point in time, the board of commissioners should and must have the backbone to say, 'enough is enough.'"

Geake praises governor's tax cuts

Governor William Milliken's call for further cuts in the state budget rather than increased taxes was praised by Senator Robert Geake (R-Northville). "The governor's decision to abandon a tax increase recommendation is consistent with the mood of the public," Geake said. "I have publicly opposed suggestions that a tax increase is necessary. Our Senate Republican Caucus unanimously refused to support any tax hikes House Republicans have adamantly opposed any such move since early this year," Geake added.

Senator Geake, a member of the

Senate Appropriations Committee, said Michigan citizens are fed up with the Legislature's "tax and spend" habits. "Even though voters turned down all three property tax relief proposals on the November ballot, they made it very clear that they will not accept business as usual on the part of their elected representatives in Lansing," Geake continued.

Senator Geake acknowledged that legislators face a difficult and painful task of making the necessary cuts in the state budget. He noted that the governor's recent proposed cuts made on state-wide television bring the level of

overall cuts this year to nearly \$1 billion. Among the newest recommended cuts announced by the governor are:

- Higher Education...\$60 million
- School Aid...\$47 million
- Community Colleges...\$15 million
- Social Services...\$22 million
- Mental Health...\$28.7 million
- Public Health...\$11.2 million
- Natural Resources...\$12.4 million
- State Police...\$4.3 million

"Our budget is overdue and must be balanced when passed," Geake said. He further noted that the current economic crisis is "a continuing

reminder that Michigan must diversify its economy as a means of expanding Michigan's tax base and broadening the job market for Michigan workers."

The Northville Republican said that while the state must immediately resolve its existing budget problems, it must move quickly toward fixing the economy on a long-range basis.

"That can be done by correcting the outdated and out-of-balance workers' and unemployment compensation systems, the abolishment of several over-burdening state rules and regulations and changes in the Single Business Tax," Geake said.

Her troop, 406, is part of the Huron Valley Council of Girl Scouts of America.

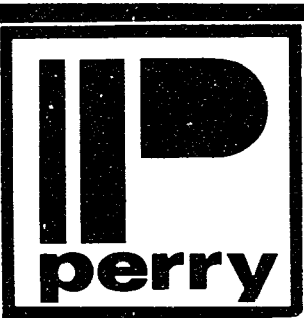
Commons taps Jerry Mittman

The wheel covers were valued at over \$150 each. There are currently no suspects.

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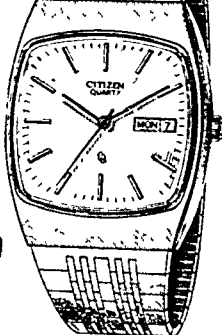
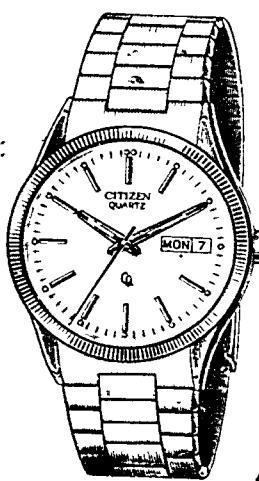
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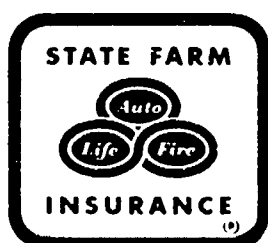
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Township police are seeking help through the Silent Observer Program in solving two recent incidences of breaking and entering and a single case of criminal sexual assault.

He was wearing dark-rimmed glasses.

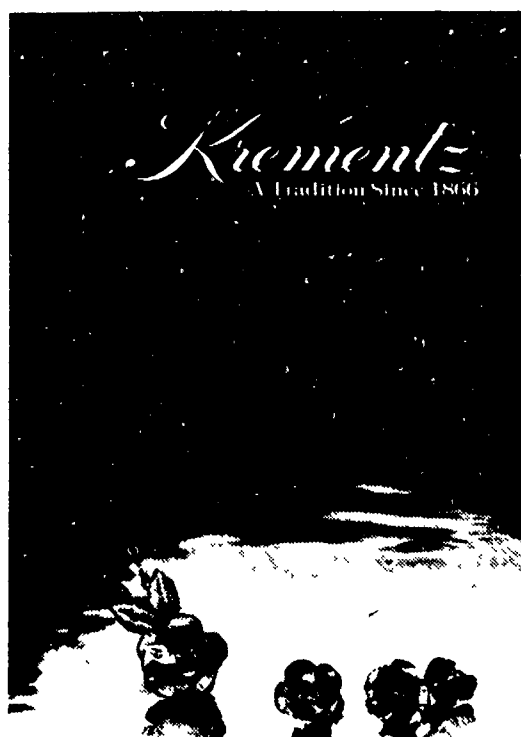

and unified its store front along Center. Little Joe's Bar building on Main has been razed and a new building is under construction.

So that visitors and residents may be aware of the Mainstreet concept and its progress four project signs have been erected throughout the downtown. Updates also are at city hall.

Concerned that shoppers who do not live here may know what is being done in the Mainstreet project, the city has developed a pamphlet explaining the creation of the DDA by the city council in 1978.

It details how the plans were developed with federal aid through block grant funds in 1979 and how, in July 1979, city voters approved a \$1,600,000 bond issue to finance the construction. Following state finance commission approval and public bidding,

the bonds were sold in December 1979.

Under provisions of the Michigan Downtown Development Act, tax millage is not being levied to pay off the bonds. Instead, normal taxes paid by new property valuation in the DDA district are reserved for the DDA use in paying off the bonds.

"Thus, in the short run, some of the new commercial taxes are being invested in our downtown. In the long run, this will result in a healthier commercial tax base in the city," states Walters in the brochure.

The attractive brown-on-cream brochure includes sketches of the way it

is expected the downtown will look in the future.

Downtown merchants are dropping the pamphlets in shoppers' bags.

They also contain a city Christmas wish. Mayor Paul Vernon thanks shoppers for their cooperation during the construction inconvenience and writes "the city council and DDA are confident that the results of Mainstreet 78 will be beneficial to customers and businesses alike and will be well worth the temporary inconvenience."

He states that questions or suggestions are welcome at city hall, and adds best wishes for the holidays.

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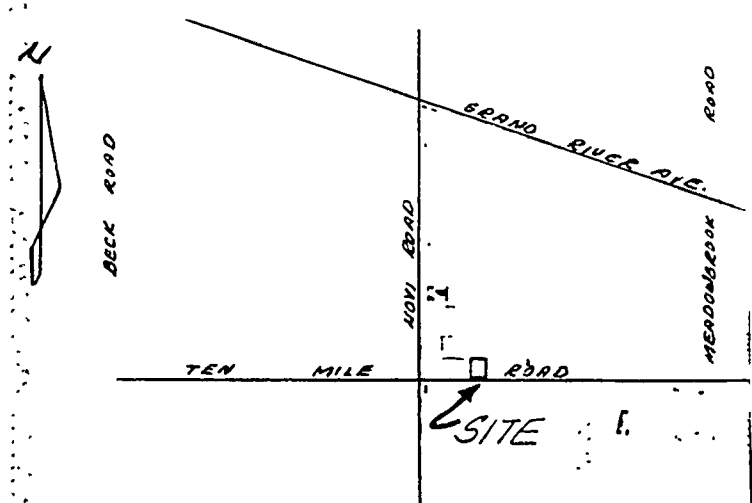

Our opinions

That's incredible

Writers of the television show "That's Incredible" may have a story brewing right under their eyes in Lansing.

Joseph L. Hardig, chairman of the State Officers Compensation Commission, has suggested that state legislators deserve a pay raise. An increase of eight percent over current levels has been recommended for the legislators who presently make \$27,000 per year.

The State Officers Compensation Commission is the agency that sets the salary levels for legislators, governor, lieutenant governor and members of the State Supreme Court. Its decisions stand unless two-thirds of the legislators vote against it.

Hardig's proposal has been supported by House Clerk T. Thomas Thatcher and Senate Secretary William Kandler. In essence, Kandler's position is that lawmakers deserve the same 6.4 percent cost of living raise given state civil servants in October.

Michigan is one of just four states which have fulltime legislatures.

Fortunately, several commissioners and legislators — including State Senator Doug Ross (D-Oak Park) — have been quick to express their opposition to the proposal.

Specifically, they have

pointed out that the state is in dire financial straits, that state employees are being laid off, that aid to cities and schools is being cut and that the governor trimmed some \$228.5 million from the state budget in his most recent round of cuts.

Opponents of the proposal also have pointed out to Hardig that taxpayers throughout the state are somewhat upset with the way government spends money. To propose pay raises for legislators at this time, opponents have noted, is not likely to go over well with the voters who were generous enough to give the state some time to deal with state spending problems by turning down the Tisch II Amendment in the November general election.

It shouldn't be necessary to point these matters out to members of the commission charged with setting the salaries of legislators.

To propose an eight percent pay increase at a time when the state is faced with dire economic considerations not only strains credulity, but supports the opinions of voters who believe that bureaucrats have little regard for the average citizen and taxpayer.

Hopefully, the commission will get the message that the proposal to raise the wages of legislators is ill-conceived, and apologize for suggesting it in the first place.

Santas needed

Christmas comes but once a year — and, unfortunately, some people think that's once too often.

It's the most wonderful time of the year for those with loving families who cook turkeys, trim trees and fill Christmas stockings with wished-for presents.

But for all too many residents of convalescent homes or institutions Christmas is visits from carolers and packages from humanitarian strangers. At least, these are remembrances and are anticipated by those in the Northville Regional Psychiatric Center, which most of us in the community still refer to as Northville State Hospital.

Through the years the community has been aware of these patients and residents have filled their modest gift wishes. This year, however, there is concern that some lists may go unfilled. Elsewhere in the paper is an appeal from City Attorney Philip Ogilvie who has the "want lists" of patients that still need to be taken for filling. We know this is an economically tight time for many, but part of Christmas is sharing.

Christmas comes but once a year — and it can be of good cheer for all with a little help from local santas. That's the blessing of the season.

I believe the nine-digit zip code (NDZC) is the way of the future. The NDZC is just one of the many innovations coming to the Postal Service in the years ahead.

The NDZC, as well as other new programs, are aimed at providing a more efficient and faster service while holding the line on postage rates. It has been 2½ years since the last increase in First Class postage.

The phrase "nine-digit zip code" may be a little misleading. The basic five-digit number will remain the same, while the other four digits will be added to

them. For example, Walled Lake has a zip code of 48088; under the new system it will be 48088-0000. As you can see, the first five digits are the same.

The use of the new nine-digit zip code will be voluntary, as has been the use of the five-digit zip code. We will still be asking the public to at least use the regular five-digit zip code in the hope of providing the best possible service available.

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Winchester window painters decorate for Christmas

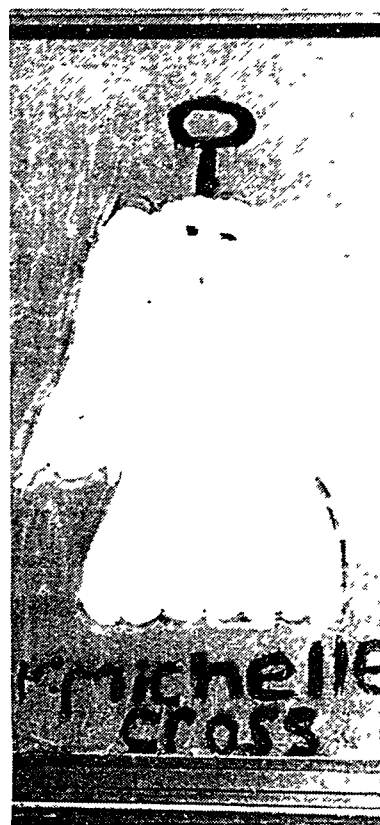


Shelly Huizing decorates a window with her Santa design

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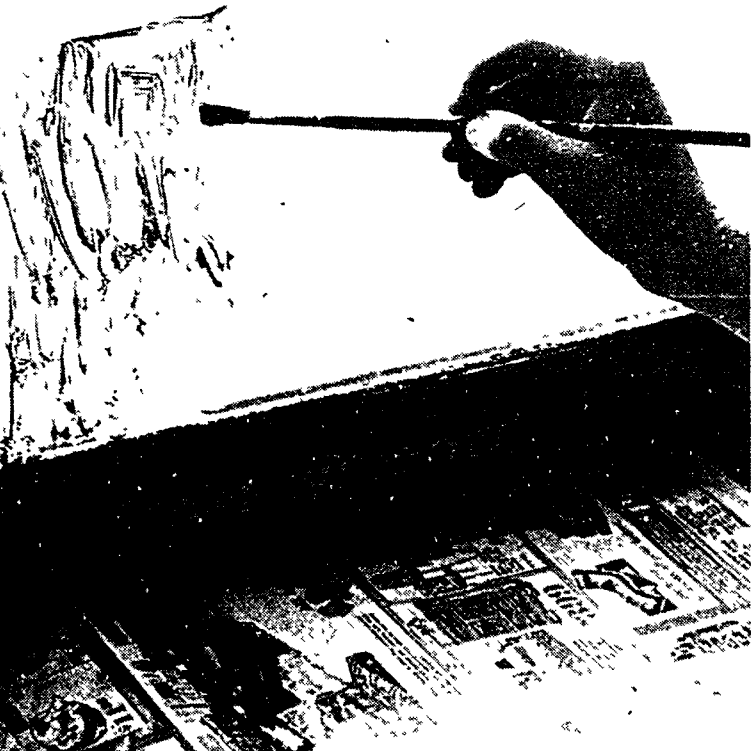
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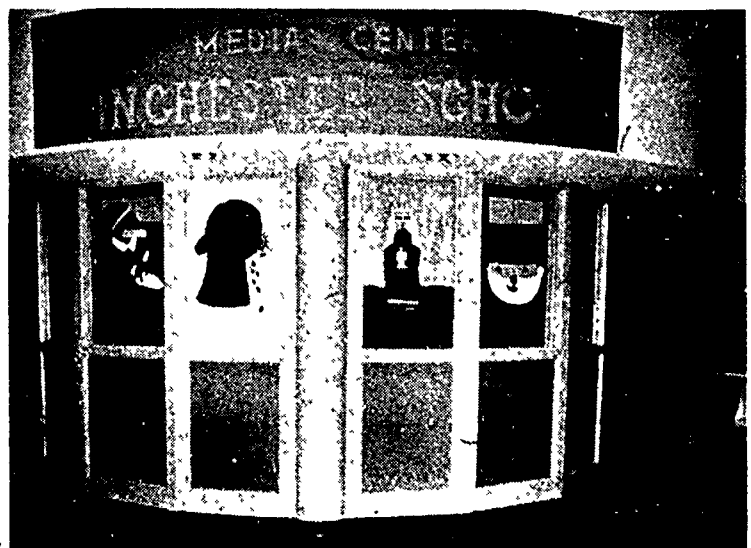
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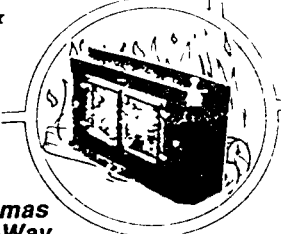
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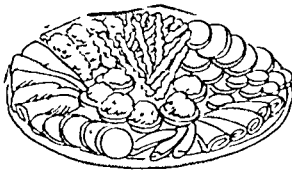
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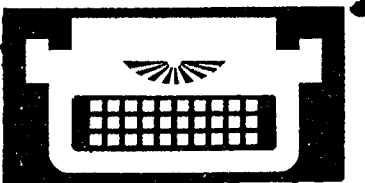
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Area Newsbeat

FWLERVILLE — Contract ratification by the three Fowlerville school employee units has been overwhelmingly approved, announced David Jones, president of the teachers union.

BRIGHTON — What a difference a week makes. The Municipal Facilities committee of Brighton citizens has a much better feeling about an alternative city complex proposal submitted by the architecture firm which earlier submitted a proposal that citizens disliked.

PINCKNEY — The state Court of Appeals has upheld a Livingston County jury's 1979 finding of medical malpractice by a Pinckney doctor who failed to diagnose a pregnancy in a 14-year-old girl.

BRIGHTON — Jerry Cassell, administrative assistant for continuing education and recreation for Brighton Area Schools, has taken a leave of absence while the superintendent investigates possible improprieties on applications Cassell compiled for state funding.

SOUTH LYON — Citing no specific reasons and refusing to specify how much money will be involved, the South Lyon board voted 4-3 to terminate Superintendent Jack Meeder's contract with the school district effective as of last week's board meeting.

MILFORD — There appears to be

agreement between elected officials on the Milford Village Council and the Milford Township Board that Huron Street should be extended eastward to Burns Road.

HIGHLAND — The state's Michigan Department of Natural Resources has asked for a meeting with the Highland Township board to discuss an investigation of septic tank failures near lakes in the township.

MILFORD — Removal of an estimated 150,000 yards of earth at the corner of North Milford and General Motors roads has been given the go-ahead, pending minor revisions of engineering guidelines for the excavation project.

NOVI — Novi's municipal buildings will be looking a little "classier," thanks to a donation of artwork from the Twelve Oaks Mall. Specifically, Twelve Oaks has donated to the city four abstract bronze sculptures to be used on the grounds of the municipal complex at Ten Mile near Taft.

WALLED LAKE — This city's census count has been lowered following a U.S. Census review. Thus, while the preliminary figures put Walled Lake's population at 4,761, the more recent count puts it at 4,750.

WIXOM — Possibility that a \$100-million ethanol refinery will be constructed in Wixom is just about nonexistent, according to John Ambrose of the U.S. Ethanol Industries, Inc.

WIXOM — The city council here has named a three-member committee to begin the search for a new city attorney to replace Harold Bulgarelli, who was elected a district judge.

Tax freeze passes

Legislation freezing property taxes in 1981 passed the state senate last week.

The three-bill package was sent on to the house after a lop-sided, bipartisan majority voted in favor in the senate December 5.

The package sponsored by Senator Doug Ross (D-Southfield) was intended by him as a method of stopping the inflationary effect on property taxes while complete revision of the system is designed.

Ross noted that, factored for inflation, freezing taxes at their present amount, unless voters pass local millage increases, would actually cut taxes by the amount of inflation in the next year.

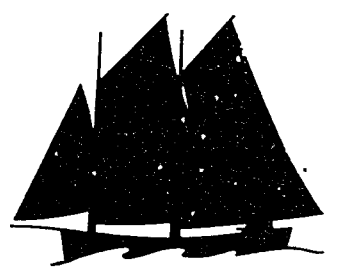
"Under my proposal, property tax assessments on existing property could not be increased in 1981," he said. "Your property tax bills in 1981 will be the same as your 1980 tax bill."

Overall, residential and agricultural property owners would save \$280 million over projected increases. Total business property tax collections would be \$120 million lower than projected.

Supporters of the bill

expect it to pass in the house before the current session adjourns.

Lawmakers indicated they have taken notice of public dissatisfaction with the state's property tax system in the November election, in which over 70 percent voted in favor of one of three property tax proposals.

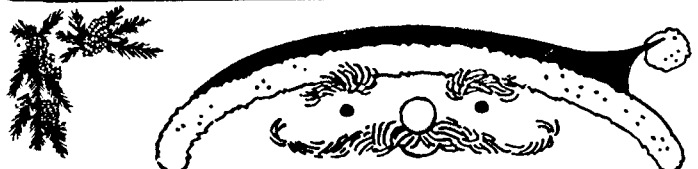


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Northville Arts Commission picks a logo

A speaker's bureau also is being formed. A film contest and a jazz contest are in the offing.

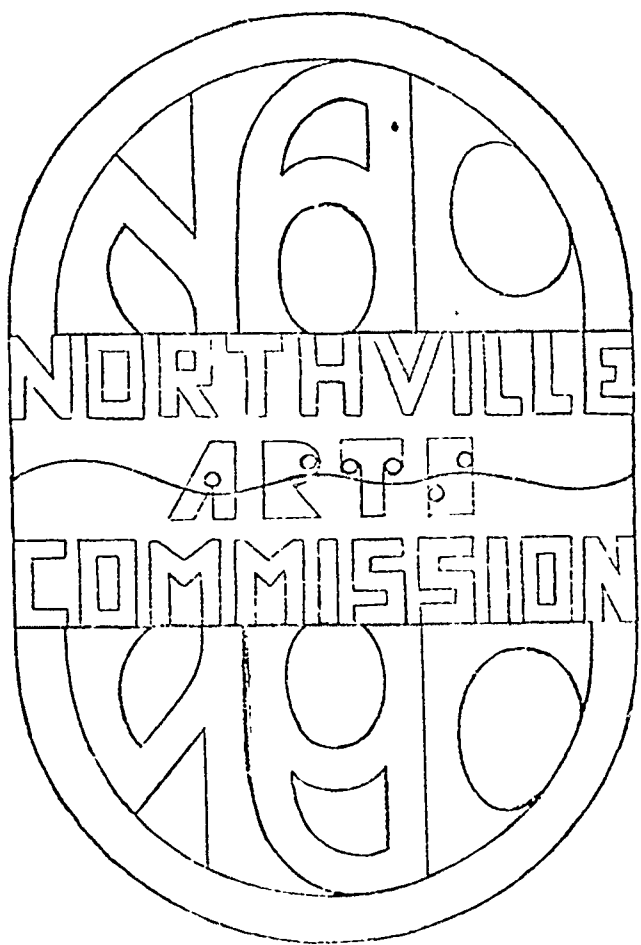

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Second Earthwatch expedition

Virginia Hayward digs her way on Majorca Island

"We picked bones out of gravel with dampened camel-hair brushes using magnifying glasses and separated the femurs from the mandibles from the vertebrae.

"We scrubbed pieces of pots and put (them) to dry for future attempted assembly into vessels."

If the above sounds more like the report of an archaeologist or anthropologist than the diary of a vacationer, it's not surprising for Virginia

Hayward of Northville has been adventuring on off-beat trips.

Mrs. Hayward's diary reports on her second Earthwatch expedition last September which actually was a scientific project with the disciplines of archaeology and anthropology.

It also was a vacation in Deya, a mountain village 17 miles from the largest island city of Palma, on Majorca, a part of the fabled Balearic Islands in the Mediterranean situated between

the coast of Spain and North Africa.

Through the Earthwatch program, based in Belmont, Massachusetts, some 400 scholars and researchers in 25 states and 48 countries are getting assistance from 4,500 volunteers who pay to dig bones and often live under primitive conditions for two or three week periods.

Part of the inducement is the IRS ruling that expenditures incidental to the expeditions are tax-deductible. Participants usually are responsible for

getting to the site of the project with the fees paid then covering living expenses, which can range from under \$1,000 for expeditions in this country upward to some \$2,000 abroad, depending on location.

For Mrs. Hayward, who last year participated in field research in Newfoundland, the vacation trips are "a positive experience."

"In June wehn I was accepted for

Team III, I started reading from the suggested bibliography in preparation for excavating work at Son Ferrandell-Oleza," she recalls in the complete day-by-day diary she kept of her experience.

"We were told that helping Bill Waldren and his staff was the main reason for being there, and that we might be required to do many menial jobs which might seem unimportant (cutting all that brush around another

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After ten years as 'host mom' she gets tour of Orient

"I used to think that going to Windsor (Canada) was a real treat," said Sally Potter sitting amidst a variety of Oriental wood carvings and statues in her home on Seven Mile.

However, after spending four months in the Orient with her eight-year-old son Garnet, Mrs. Potter can be considered somewhat of a seasoned traveler — or at least an enlightened one.

"The whole thing really overwhelmed me," she said.

And it's no wonder. From June to September Mrs. Potter and Garnet traveled throughout the Orient, stopping in 17 different places including Thailand, Singapore, Hong Kong, Malaysia, Taipei and the Philippines.

One may wonder why a veterinary assistant with little travel experience would decide to take a four-month jaunt halfway around the world with an eight year old in tow.

Yet, for Sally Potter the opportunity seemed too good to pass up.

Though she never traveled to the Philippines before this summer, Mrs. Potter has been familiar with its lifestyle and customs for quite some time.

In 1969, the Potters served as host family for a young Filipino student named Mani Chua.

Mani came to the United States through the Youth for Understanding International Student Exchange program and attended Northville High School his junior and senior year.

In 1970, Mani was graduated from NHS and went on to attend Michigan State University.

He has since received his bachelor's degree in hotel and restaurant management from MSU and is working at the Sheraton Hotel in Toronto.

The Potters' long association with Mani, whom they have always considered part of the family, has brought them close to his relatives in the Philippines.

Throughout the years, three of the Potter children have visited the Chua family in Manila and Mani's sister Jackie lived with the Potters for two years while participating in an exchange program.

Jackie graduated from Northville High School four years ago and went on to attend Alma College. Though she now is living with her family in the Philippines, Mrs. Potter said she plans to return to the United States.

Mrs. Potter and Garnet were lured to the Orient with an invitation from the Chua family — with whom they stayed for five weeks.

Mrs. Potter explained that the Chua family, owners of five haberdasheries,

Hickok Manufacturing factories, and Wrangler and Levi distribution outlets, have a "huge" home in Manila.

However, she said the home is surrounded by a cement wall and guards are posted in both the front and back of the house.

Mrs. Potter explained that the harsh differences between the rich and poor are most evident in Manila.

"The rich have huge houses with cement walls and the poor live in the streets," she said.

Strict government regulations keep the wealthy within their "compound" and no one goes into the streets, she commented.

Mrs. Potter explained that children, especially sons, are of the utmost importance to Filipino families.

"It's really a man's world over there," she commented.

Among the wealthy families, she said, a maid is assigned to each child. Maids are required to care for the children 24 hours a day. This even includes sleeping on a mat by the child's bed at night.

The pay for these duties is three meals a day and one day off a month, Mrs. Potter said.

The same rewards are extended to the other help which in the Chua household included three chauffeurs, a masseuse, laundress, cook, and others.

Mrs. Potter explained that most of the poor either live in the city streets or in the provinces.

She said one of the Chua chauffeurs lived in the province and was permitted to visit his family once a month.

Mrs. Potter also explained that education is considered to be the most important part of a child's life.

Children attend school from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. and are tutored at home from 6-8 p.m., she said.

"One of the Chua's granddaughters, who was Garnet's age, was already learning three languages," she said.

Mrs. Potter said there are many characteristics which distinguish rich Filipinos from the poor.

For instance, the wealthy stay out of the sun because dark, suntanned skin indicates that you work in the sun and therefore are poor. However, long fingernails are a sign of wealth.

In terms of food, Mrs. Potter explained that the Philippines is "a country of no waste."

"The only part of a chicken that they don't eat is the beak and the feathers," she said.

A common sight at most Manila restaurants, no matter how elegant, is chickens and ducks in the front and a pig tied to the side of the building, she said.

"The restaurants serve what they raise," she explained.

Mrs. Potter said many of the cities in the Orient are extremely overcrowded and very expensive.

However, she said that most of the people "like the action in the city."

"Hong Kong," she said, "is like Detroit at Christmastime only about 100 times more crowded."

Eating in Hong Kong was "a real treat," she explained. It has been said that Hong Kong has the best food in the world and both Mrs. Potter and Garnet agreed.

One of the most appealing aspects of eating in the city was the cost, she said.

"We ate in Hong Kong for \$3 a day."

While touring Hong Kong they also were given an opportunity to taste an all-American favorite — a quarter pounder.

After a trip to McDonald's, Mrs. Potter and Garnet went to see the movie "Urban Cowboy." American movies are very popular in the Orient.

Traffic jams and accidents are the norm in most cities, Mrs. Potter explained.

Though she had an international drivers license, Mrs. Potter said she "wouldn't drive there if you paid me."

"All you need in a car over there is a horn and brakes," she said.

With gas at \$4.5 a gallon driving in the Orient isn't exactly cheap, she noted.

The weather for most of the Potters' trip was hot, humid and rainy, she said. However, they ran into difficulty only once in Bangkok when their plane took off during a typhoon.

Reflecting on her trip to the Orient, Mrs. Potter said she would like to go back again. Yet, she confided that she was glad to be home.

"Nothing is safe over there," she said. With martial law and threats of government upheaval many Filipino citizens are also realizing the dangers they will have to face.

Within the Chua family, both Mani's parents and sister have migrant status in Canada and spend about six months of the year there.

As for Mani, "after living with us and our fast pace of life," Mrs. Potter said, "he knew he just couldn't go back."

Mani, who often visits the Potters, spent Thanksgiving with them and also will be staying with the family during the Christmas holiday.

As for Mrs. Potter, this Christmas will have an extra special meaning.

"I've never felt so thankful for what I have," she said.

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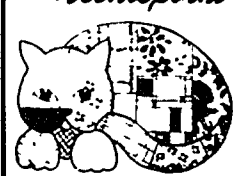
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LWV sets Christmas tea with urban study program

It also is hoped that by showing the presentation in other areas people will see similar problems and seek solutions for their own communities.

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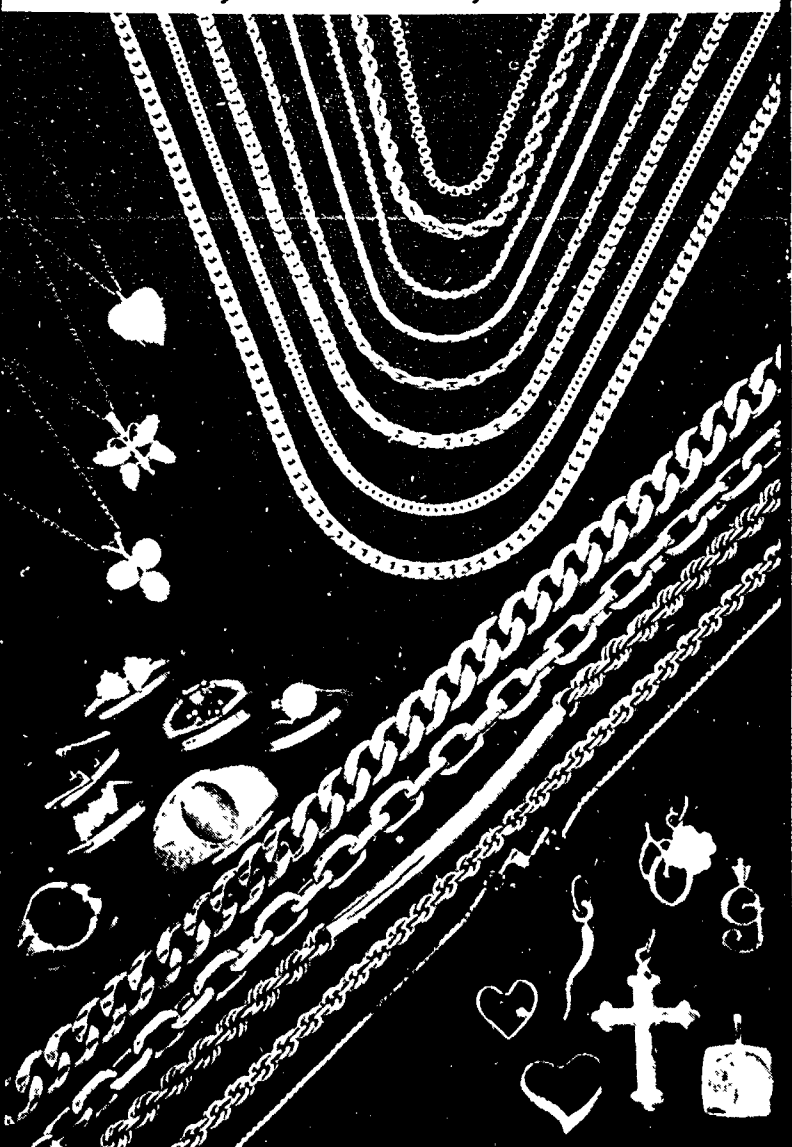

Waldren which had been a long-established involvement, and it was easy for us to get caught up in his consuming interest in the prehistory of Majorca, and his onrushing drive to clear up the backlog of unexamined material in his lab, and get exhibits for scientists to study into the museum."

Earthwatch had briefed Virginia Hayward that Waldren had a four-level home built into the hillside at Deya where he lives and conducts his research, commuting from Oxford, England, where he also writes and teaches.

Her first view of the home and adjacent museum, however, she recalls, "was considerably beyond my expectations which were based on literature describing the field accommodations."

Waldren's wife Jackie drove her and other volunteers down one-way streets on several levels bordered by huge shrubs of bougainvillea, hot-pink morning glories, stone walls and rock store fronts.

The Waldrens, their five daughters and expected workers (averaged 15 on four different teams) "and assorted people who show up to work for indefinite periods" were fed by those who drew KP, Mrs. Hayward explains.

"We really are being trained in excavation," she wrote in her diary, describing classical techniques of each person being assigned a designated section under metal bars stretched over the Talayot at the site so that "all finds of bone, potsherds, metal charcoal, seeds can be bagged after sifting — (and marked) with the level and exact location found."

It wasn't all work and no play, however, for the Northville resident.

She described "getting spruced up a bit after dinner of an excellent veal and rice concoction and heading up the road ... to hear a Corelli Sonata with violins and cymbals, Bach Sonata for flute and cymbals, a mezzo-soprano singing a Mozart aria, Bartok Rumanian dances for violin and piano and a trumpet and organ world premier for a Canto by Carl Mansker."

As if to prove you never know who you will meet on a "dig," Ginny

"She is now an enormous lady, weighing in at probably 300 pounds, and lives here most of the time but, through Time magazine and the international Herald Tribune and visits from American friends and relatives, knows what goes on in politics, sports, art and finance.

"We saw her several times again and her body was always covered from chin to toes to wrists and her bleached blond hair tied back in a severe pony tail. She effervesces — but does waddle and gasp."

On her last day of digging before extending her holiday with a trip to Switzerland, Ginny Hayward wrote of Waldren breaking out a new wall "which changed the concept of what this particular Talayot was used for — there were a good many finds including a pre-Talayotic half cup with a handle!"

Considering that the Talayotic culture dates from 1500-700 B.C. on the islands that appealed to the Phoenicians, Cathaginians, Romans, Vandals, Byzantines, Moors and the Spanish, that was an exciting bit of history to add to Waldren's collection.

As she sums up, "My own perspective changed after actually digging up pre-Talayotic pieces of pots, charcoal, animal bones, iron nails, which would fit into the total picture. It was exciting for me to be with people whose perspective of the world encompasses thousands of years."

Now back in her condominium in Lexington Condos, Mrs. Hayward has among other souvenirs of her trip gold ankle-strap Mallorecan sandals with soles "of old tires" as well as a watercolor of gnarled olive trees — and her diary.

She's also waiting for the new catalogue of 1981 trips.

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Erwin Farms' apples, family recipes rated top treats

What's more American than apple pie?

If your answer is "absolutely nothing," then you're in total agreement with Linda Erwin, wife of Bill Erwin of the Erwin Farms family. Linda probably does more cooking with apples than the average housewife since they grow almost literally "in her own back yard."

And Linda is a purist when it comes to the ingredients for apple pie—probably because that happens to be the way Bill likes it best. "Just cinnamon, sugar, butter and a little salt is all I add and I make my crust with lard. 'I remember when we were first married, I served apple pie to my father-in-law (J.W. Erwin). He critiqued it and told me the apples weren't quite done enough and that I should use only cinnamon for flavoring."

"Well, that's the way I've done it every since and he paid me what I think was the supreme compliment. He said that my pie now is as good as his wife's (Shirley's)."

Linda says her favorite pie apples are Northern Spys, although she notes that Jonathans and McIntosh are also very good cooking apples.

"Lots of people don't realize it but Golden Delicious are good for cooking, too. You don't need quite as much sugar for them."

Linda has plenty of apples to choose from as Erwin Farms, which involves six Erwin families as well as employed help, stored 61,000 bushels this year. That's a bumper crop, according to Linda who ought to know as she does the book work for the large organization.

She also runs the Erwin U-Pick orchard near New Hudson. In coming years, that operation will be all dwarf apple trees which can be picked without the use of ladders.

"Everybody in the family does their own thing for the business and I really enjoy mine. I'd be down at the U-pick orchard all the time it's open except that Rachel (4 years old) keeps me busy, along with my other work."

This year, Linda says, the Red Delicious trees were so loaded with apples that they were bent way down and the family was a little worried that they would be broken. Once the crop was harvested, however, the limbs snapped back.

The dozen or so different varieties the family harvested this year are all for sale at the Erwin Farms Store at Ten Mile and Novi roads.

"Bill says we'll have apples for sale for 365 days this year for sure with such a big crop," Linda notes.

She recommends that people store

their apples either in hydrators or plastic bags in their refrigerators. "They keep best that way and they don't take on odors from other food either."

Spys are really Linda's favorites for all types of cooking and baking and she found out recently that Pepperidge Farms feels the same way.

The nationally known bakery, wrote to Erwin Orchards earlier this year saying that they would like to have their Northern Spys appear in their November and December advertisements in the women's magazines. When you see the big red apple ad with the delicious-looking apple turnover by Pepperidge Farms in the current magazines, you'll know they are a locally grown product.

"Bill took care of shipping the apples to them personally," Linda says.

With Michigan ranking third in national apple production, the Erwins are one of the top producers. Jonathan, McIntosh, Northern Spy and Delicious account for 75 percent of Michigan apples.

They should be stored at temperatures below 40 degrees and Erwins, which installed special controlled storage environment some years ago, keep their's at the ideal temperature.

Linda has agreed to share with Herald readers some of hers and her neighbor's favorite recipes.

We know from sampling these that this muffin recipe is really special. Linda likes to serve them warm with butter, but they are also super good just plain.

Apple Muffins

1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup salad oil
1 1/2 cups all purpose flour
1/2 cup sugar
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup finely grated apple
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Grease bottoms of 12 medium muffin cups. Beat egg and stir in milk. Combine grated apple and oil in add to milk and egg. Mix in remaining ingredients just until flour is moistened. Batter should be lumpy.

Fill muffin cups 2/3 full. Bake 20-25 minutes or until golden brown. Immediately remove from pan.

Here's a recipe from Betty Erwin for delicious:

Apple Squares

Mix 2 1/2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon salt and 1 tablespoon sugar; cut in 1 cup shortening. Add enough milk to 1 egg yolk to measure 2/3 cup, then add to above mixture.

Make into 2 balls. Roll one ball of pastry to fit an 18 by 2 by 1-inch pan.

Cover pastry with 2/3 cup crushed corn flakes.

Mix 5 cups sliced apples, 1 1/2 cups

sugar and 1 teaspoon cinnamon and spread over corn flakes.

Roll other ball of pastry and cover the apple mixture.

Beat egg white stiff and spread over top crust.

Bake at 400 degrees for 40 minutes. Cool and frost with 1 cup confectioners sugar mixed with 2 tablespoons lemon juice.

Linda's neighbor, Helen Neuroth, whom Linda describes as an excellent

cook, shares her recipe for apple pie

Gourmet Apple Pie

Crust:
2 cup flour
1 scant cup shortening
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon cold orange juice

Mix and refrigerate for about 10 minutes, then roll out, one half at a time.

Filling:
About 8 apples pared

4 tablespoons flour
1 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon crushed coriander seeds (available at the super market)
1 tablespoon butter
3 tablespoons brandy

Mix together and put in crust in pie plate. Top with second crust.

Bake at 450 degrees for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake additional 40-50 minutes.

If you've never thought of mixing apples and blueberries in a baked dessert, Linda suggests that you try the following recipe from the "Apple Cook Book" which is sold at the Erwin Farms Store.

Blueberry Apple Crisp

4 tart apples, peeled, cored, and sliced
2 cups blueberries
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1 cup flour
3/4 cup granulated sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1 egg
1/2 cup butter, melted

Arrange apples in a buttered 1 1/2 quart baking dish. Pour blueberries over apples. Mix together brown sugar and two tablespoons flour and sprinkle over berries.

Sift together flour, granulated sugar, baking powder, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg. Drop in egg and stir until egg is absorbed.

Scatter over apple-berry mixture. Pour melted butter over all.

Bake in 350 degrees oven for 1 hour. Remove from oven and cool. Serve while warm with whipped cream.



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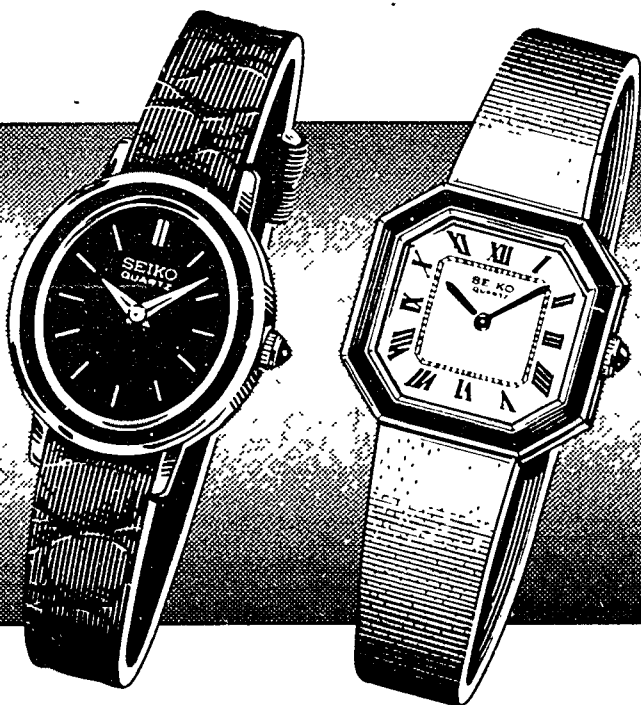
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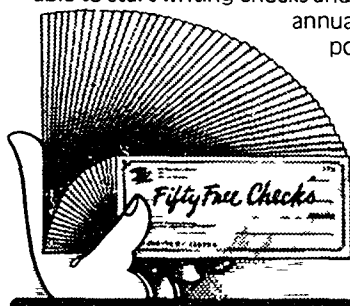
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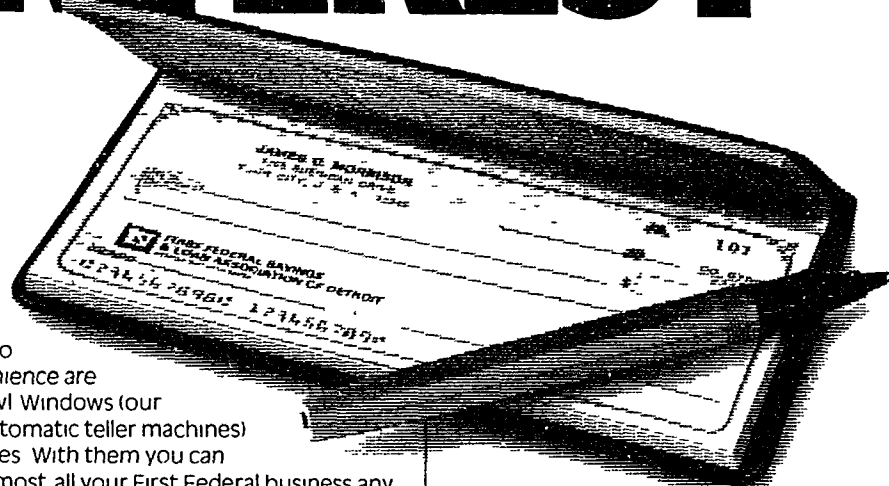

Unemployment

Being unemployed creates stresses that take their toll on inter-family relationships

Unemployment, appropriately enough, like an automobile accident carries some harsh after-effects beyond the immediate surface. Whiplash-like repercussions may take months to even hauntingly confront the unemployed.

At the moment of its confirmation, unemployment becomes a stranglehold of financial income, a denial of place in society, and in male-oriented circles, failure to produce as the breadwinner.

The Family and Children Services of Oakland County have taken a stand to assist those Michigan workers, who have sunk lower into the quicksand than any other laborers across the nation.

And John Mosteller of Family and Children Services reports there is more than meets the eye when employment becomes involved.

Families break up, drinking and drug problems develop, excellent students become runaways, suicide and general mental health are difficult to cling to easily.

While other human service agencies throughout the area are reporting increasing numbers of pleas for assistance directly related to unemployment, Family and Children's response has been low.

"It's surprising calls haven't increased," Mosteller admits. "In checking with the waiting list, it's about the way it is this time of year."

Cost might be the deterring factor toward a larger involvement of people.

"People are aware there's a cost involved. But they may not be aware that we have a sliding fee scale from nothing to \$40 per session," Mosteller explains.

Sessions at the Family and Children Services run for 50 minutes and vary in approach.

"For us, a meeting could be with an individual or with family members — and we try to find out what's going on and deal with stressful situations.

"Generally, what's happening with people we counsel on unemployment is we've been working with the family on another issue and then they become unemployed," Mosteller said.

Mosteller emphasized that dealings with individuals and families are only on a counseling level, with Family and Children acting as a referral agency.

"We refer them to places where they can get training. We don't do that here, but we are in a position to refer them," he added.

What the agency will do for families is help them cope with the abrupt change in their lifestyles.

"We work with families in terms of what it feels like to be unemployed and what it does to financial stresses. Some of the things we deal with might be suddenly a child who's receiving \$10 a week allowance is getting only \$1 and has to work around the house for it. We try to improve communication so everyone is dealing with stresses openly."

The majority of agencies that people are referred to from the center are tied into the Lakes Agency Council, a conglomeration of human service agencies in the Walled Lake School District. Among those getting referrals are Job Club, Michigan Employment Security Commission and United Community Services.

"I think in terms of our focus, we're doing pretty well. But again, my concern is there are a lot of families out

there that aren't aware of problems when they become unemployed," Mosteller pointed out.

For example, a breadwinner out of work is concerned with getting back on the right track and often does not realize that problems their son or daughter is having in school are the result of family unemployment problems "and a lot of times, they don't make the connection," Mosteller continued.

"Basically, we are trying to correlate these events for people. When there is some kind of significant loss, some significant stress occurs. We have thought about setting up some kinds of groups for interaction for people coming in. Because there hasn't been an in-

crease, we haven't done that," Mosteller noted.

"We think people aren't aware of the service and they think counseling can't be helpful," Mosteller concluded.

While Family and Children located at 1350 E. West Maple Road (phone 624-3811), may take one approach on coping with the repercussions of unemployment, others exist.

Universities and colleges in the area are taking an active step toward informing out-of-work laborers how to get ahead.

Last weekend, Detroit's Wayne State University conducted a weekend workshop called "Jobs in Your Future."

The program, targeting in on people

either looking for work or wishing to change jobs, offered seminars on such topics as writing effective resumes, techniques of job research, job and unemployment stress, credit counseling, legal assistance, and a look at job markets for the '80s.

According to Gloria House, assistant professor of humanities at Wayne State, the program was an attempt on the part of several major institutions (MESC, the International UAW, Wayne County Community College and the educational division of Channel 56) "to be responsive to crises that are occurring and be as practical as possible."

People were offered the opportunity to match skills to careers available in the upcoming decade through the

Michigan Occupational Information System.

The impact is recognized throughout the Metropolitan Detroit area and has been examined, analyzed and dissected by countless agencies — still, it continues.

While on the surface there is little consolation for those out-of-work laborers, damaged both financially and psychologically, there are both people and agencies sensitive to the problems.

Unemployed doesn't necessarily mean someone doesn't want to work anymore.

The first step toward solutions to predicaments, stresses and lifestyle adjustments are there.

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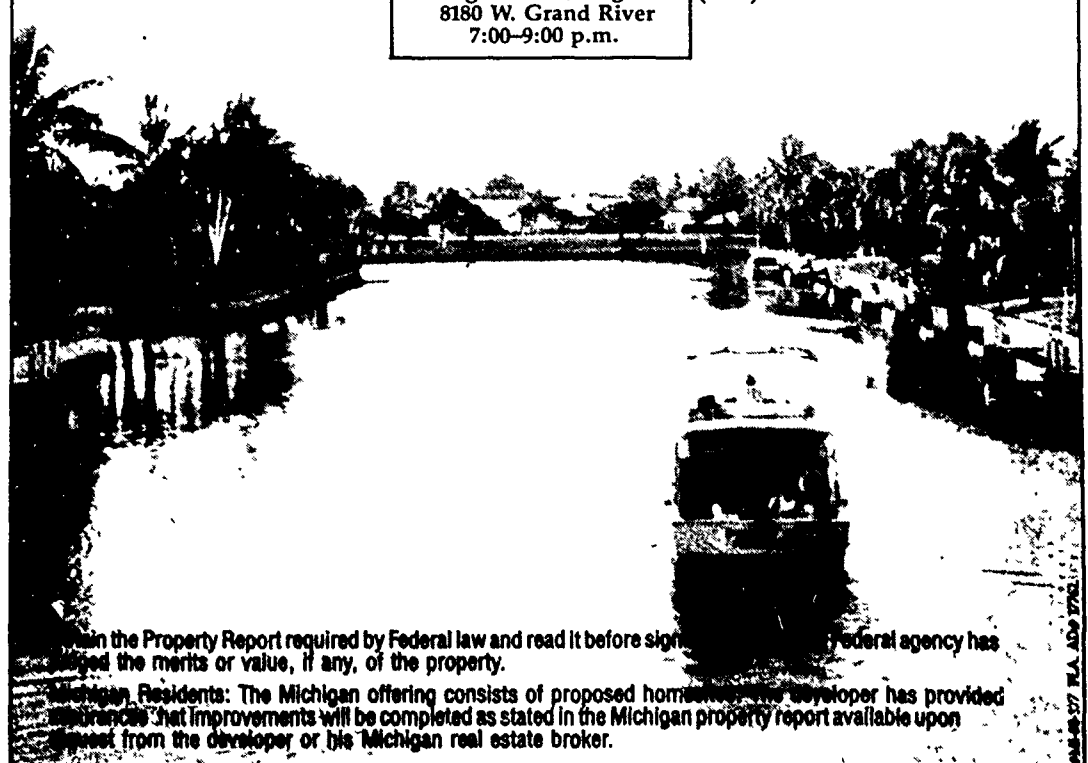
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

State lawmakers beef up racing laws

The legislature has completed action on legislation to reform the state's horse racing laws designed to clear the air of any questionable activities surrounding the sport in Michigan.

By revising and recodifying the horse racing laws, the legislature made substantive changes in the powers and duties of the racing commissioner, the issuance and revocation of racing licenses, track security, the use of drugs in connection with racing, the allocation of racing revenues, taxes on racing meets and penalties.

The measure requires licensing of nearly all persons involved in racing. This would include jockeys and their agents, riders, walkers, blacksmiths, starting gate employees and vendors operating within the barn area of a licensed racetrack.

Licenses would be prohibited for any person convicted of a felony within six years or a misdemeanor within two years of the application if the conviction was related to the person's ability and likelihood to serve the public in a fair, honest and open manner.

Track security could be beefed-up by

order of the racing commission if it is determined security is necessary.

Allocations to local units of governments from racing revenues must be used to cover security in track areas and not just around the track and during non-racing meets.

To promote breeding and raising of thoroughbreds in Michigan, allocations to thoroughbred racing associations would be increased from 10 to 16 percent during the first year and would eventually reach 20 percent.

Harness racing purses would be raised to a maximum of \$40,000 to attract big events to the state. Harness revenues would pay no more than 75 percent of the purses at fairs and special races licensed tracks.

The ceiling on the proportion of quarter horse racing revenue to be allotted for Michigan-bred quarter horse races and breeders' awards would be raised from 50 to 75 percent.

An identical allowance would be made for appaloosa racing.

Ownership of more than one track would be prohibited under divestiture language of the legislation.

If a corporation owns more than one track, as in the present case of Detroit

Race Course and Hazel Park, it would be ordered to place one on the market for sale at the market value.

If it is not sold within two years, the racing commissioner can then determine whether he believes a monopoly exists and take the question to the courts for a possible forced divestiture.

Attorney General Frank Kelley has ruled the state can, but cannot ban, solicitation, canvassing or proselytizing by religious groups in state parks.

He said the Department of Natural Resources may establish rules to require those groups to identify themselves and their members to park officials in advance and fix reasonable hours for the activities.

Mr. Kelley said regardless of the activity taking place on state property, the fundamental questions are ones of free exercise of religion and free expression, both protected by the U.S. and Michigan constitutions.

Milan clips Mustang cagers in tournament championship

A super-quick Milan High School cage team proved to be too much for the Mustangs, who bowed, 62-61 Saturday in the championship game of the Milan Invitational Tournament.

The loss came despite a strong one-two punch by center Dave Ward and point guard Dave Greer.

The 6-foot-7 Ward poured in 19 points and grabbed 14 rebounds, while Greer collected 17 points and pulled down nine caroms.

The pair also led the Mustangs to a 60-45 win over Monroe Catholic Central the night before to gain a berth in the finals.

Ward was unstoppable that night, scoring 26 points and grabbing 19 rebounds. Greer added nine points and as many rebounds, while leading team in assists with five.

The Mustangs had their chance to walk away tournament champions but did not cash in.

Northville, down by only two points, missed a pair of free throws with a minute to play, blowing a chance to tie the score.

"It seemed like we couldn't get the shots when we needed them," said Coach Tim Lutes. "We could have won if we would have made the critical baskets."

The Mustangs managed to stay with Milan the first quarter as the Reds posting a 13-12 lead.

But by halftime Milan had a nine-point advantage and never relinquished the lead.

Ward and starting forward Greg May got into foul trouble early in the contest. May was called for four hacks in the first period and Ward had three just minutes into the second quarter.

"It really hurt us when Ward and May went out in the second period," Lutes said. "They (Milan) took advantage of the situation." Milan pressed the Mustangs constantly and the result was a few costly turnovers by Northville.

"There were three or four spurts where we were hurt by the press," Lutes said. "Their quickness gave them an advantage." Lutes said he felt the real key was the lack of scoring by the forwards.

May did not score a point the entire tournament, while the other starting forward, Todd Jennings had only seven in two games.

"We didn't get as much scoring out of the forwards as I would like to see," Lutes said. "But it will come. May and Jennings are capable of scoring in double figures."

"I don't think we played badly at all," he continued. "I am disappointed in the loss, but not discouraged. We showed super depth at

the guard spots and Ward played very strong. I am encouraged more than anything."

The Mustang bench contributed 23 points — reserve guard Dave Malinowski and back-up center Dough Eaker pumped in seven and four points, respectively, while guard Gary Kucher added six.

Tim McLaughlin collected four points while playing guard and forward Tim Wagner had two.

Wagner, who had seven caroms, also was the Mustangs' fourth highest rebounder.

Though Milan took the tournament championship award and had two players named to the All-Tournament team, Northville copped four honors.

Ward was named most valuable player in the tourney and both Ward and Greer were named to the All-Tournament team.

Including these awards and the runner-up trophy, the Mustangs walked away with a total of four trophies.

The Mustang cagers are scheduled to play four straight home games, the first last night against Farmington High School.

Northville will take on Farmington Harrison in its first league game Friday.

Take fifth in state meet

NHS girls swimmers shine

State competition seems to bring out the best in Northville High School girls swimmers.

Last year two members of the Mustang girls team, Allyson Farquhar and Kim Storm, were named All-Americans as a result of the times they posted at the final season meet.

The 1980 state meet at Michigan State University Saturday again proved to be a successful event for the five tankers from the Western Six championship Northville squad.

The Mustangs finished fifth in a field of 66 teams, two places ahead of Livonia Stevenson, which beat Northville in a dual meet during the regular

season.

Leading the Mustang five again were Farquhar and Storm.

Farquhar claimed the state championship in the 100-yard breast stroke, posting a time of 1:08.4.

Storm broke the state record in the 50-yard free style, finishing second to Heather Strang, an East Lansing freshman who set new marks in both the 50- and 100-yard free style events.

Strang set the state, collegiate pool and national record in both events, posting a time of 23.44 in the 50 free and 50.50 in the 100 free.

Storm swam the 50 free in 23.9 and was third in the 100 free with a time of 53.6.

For her accomplishments, Storm

likely will be named All-American for the second consecutive year.

Farquhar earned All-State honors and is the new state champion in the 100-yard breast.

The two senior standouts also joined senior Tammy Selfridge and sophomore Kathy Bainbridge to claim second place in the 200-yard medley relay.

The crew beat the Mustangs' old team record by 2.7 seconds, with a time of 1:52.5, finishing second to Ann Arbor Huron by only .3 seconds.

"Storm really came on strong in the final leg (free style)," said retiring Northville Coach Ben Lauber. "One more stroke and she would have won it."

Huron finished second overall behind Bloomfield Hills Andover, 1980 state champ.

In other individual events, Farquhar finished fourth in the individual medley with a time of 2:13.9.

The fifth member of the Mustang team, Trish Settles, failed to make the top 12 in her event — the 500-yard free style — in the preliminaries Friday.

Lauber was quite pleased with the outcome of his last state meet.

"I was hoping we would finish in the top 10," he said. "Not knowing some of the competing teams and what their swimmers were like, I think the girls did a great job."

Nadeau to play for WSU in 1981

It will be another year before Todd Nadeau can play basketball for Wayne State.

But many would consider the fact that he can play at all a miracle.

When his right hand was severed by the blade of a power saw in August, 1979, it seemed doubtful that Nadeau, a senior at Detroit Catholic Central, would ever play college basketball.

But the 18-year-old high school cager, who had scholarship offers from such basketball powers as the University of Michigan, Michigan State and Purdue, was confident.

"I'll be back," predicted the left-

handed sharp-shooter. "I'll play again."

And after 14 operations and seemingly endless therapy sessions the determined Nadeau felt he was ready to try out for the Wayne State University basketball team.

He began practicing with the other players this summer and made the final cut. But coach Verne Payne still was reluctant to let Nadeau play.

"I was hesitant because I didn't want anything to happen to him," Payne explained. "I was afraid he might damage the hand further."

After conferring with Doctor Robert

Larsen, the hand surgeon who supervised the reattachment and numerous skin graft operations (he also is a clinical assistant professor at WSU, Payne was assured that it was okay for Nadeau to play.

"He told me there was no reason for Todd not to play. That everything had healed — the muscles, tendons and nerves."

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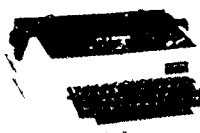
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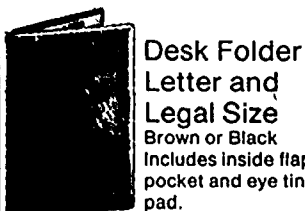


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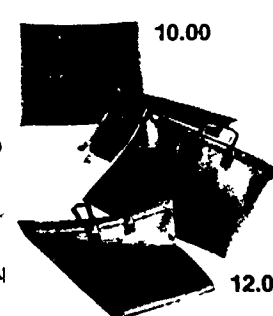
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Canton could cause clog**Youthful tankers' task not easy one**

High school graduation day, 1979 naturally was a day of celebration for many.

But Northville High School boys swim coach Pete Talbot was not one of those jumping for joy.

Talbot, in his second year as head coach, lost seven of his 12 swimmers on that June day.

Though there are 16 swimmers out for the team this year, only four are returning lettermen. And nine of the 16 are either sophomores or juniors.

Returning lettermen include seniors Tony Nader—the lone Mustang to qualify for state competition in 1979-80—Doug Iverson, Steve Pantier and Char Ramsey and junior Gary Lauber.

"The graduating seniors certainly left a huge gap to fill," Talbot admitted. "We will particularly miss them in the diving events."

Paul Cooper, Gary Beason and Dale Fisher are just a few of the tankers that Talbot will have to replace.

Dave MacDonald, a standout in the 50- and 100-yard free style events, also will be missed, Talbot said.

A pair of sophomores, Jeff Evens and Chris Behen, have been assigned to the diving duties this year—a tough assignment considering the talented people they are replacing.

Likely to see action in the 200-yard free style event are Ramsey, Iverson and possibly sophomore Dave Copp.

Returners Lauber and Nader will compete in the 200 individual medley.

Several swimmers may be used in the 50-yard free style this season, Talbot said.

They include Copp, seniors Tom Moore, Mike Klein and Tim Frader, sophomores Chris Koenig and Jon Burchard and junior Greg Capote.

Lauber will join the 50-yard free stylists in the 100-yard free also, according to Talbot.

"I am sure I will juggle the line-up a lot this year," Talbot said. "It really is too early to tell who is going to swim where."

Sharing time in the 100-yard butterfly will be Moore, Pantier, Lauber and Nader.

Ramsey and Iverson will compete in the 500-yard freestyle again this season and Iverson also will join Lauber and sophomore Tim Walker in the 100-yard back stroke.

Mike Nader will join brother Tony along with Klein and Pantier in the 100-yard breast stroke.

The two relays — the 200-yard medley and 400-yard free style — are still up for grabs, Talbot said.

But likely candidates for the 200 are Tony Nader, Lauber, Moore and Copp,

while Copp, Iverson, Ramsey, Moore and Burchard likely will be seen on the 400-yard relay team.

Though Talbot said he still is unsure if any Western Six teams will be able to dominate the league this year, he is looking for defending champ Plymouth Canton to be strong again.

"I have heard some rumblings about Livonia Churchill, but until I see what they have I really don't know what to expect."

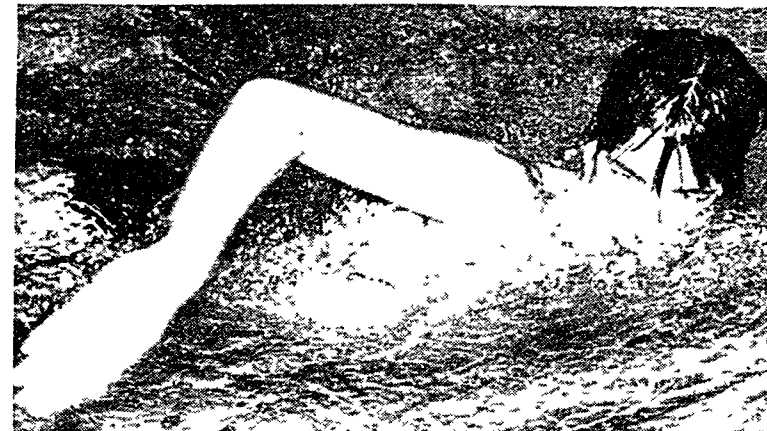
The Mustangs finished behind Canton

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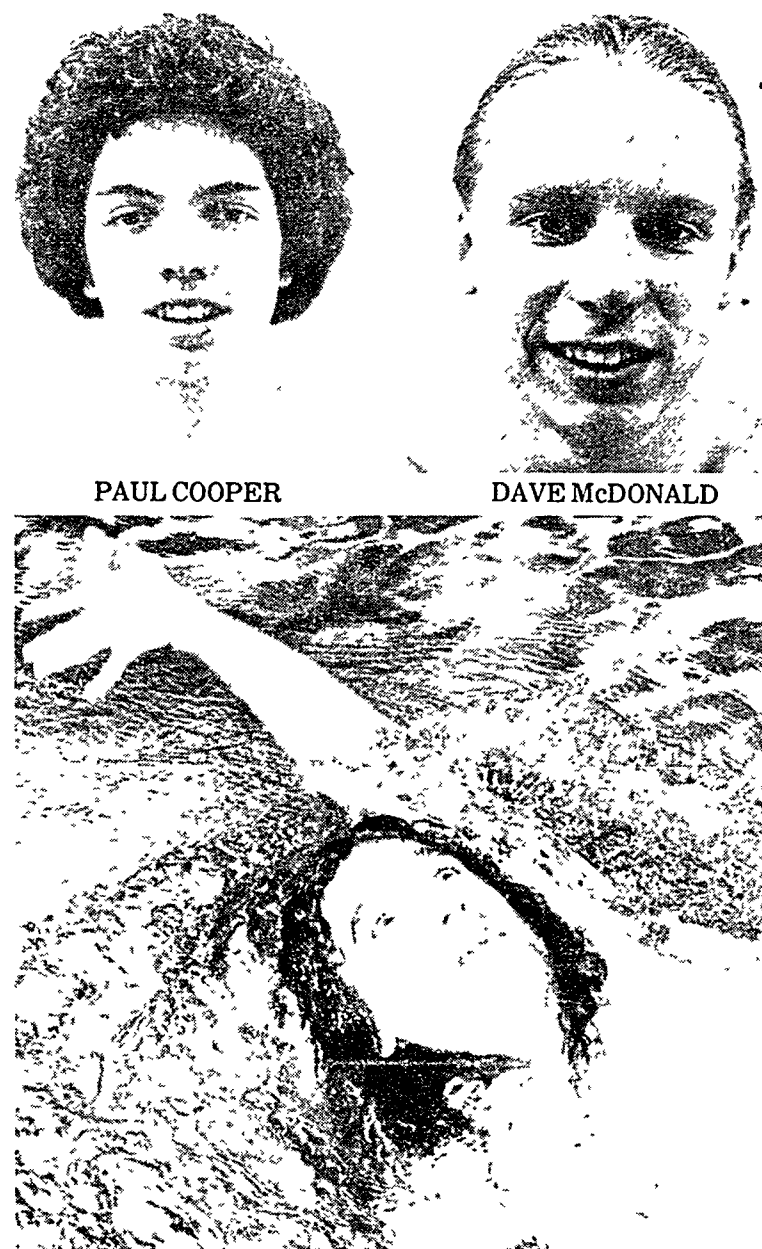

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NHS grapplers drop first three

The Northville High School varsity wrestling team has no where to go but up.

The Mustang grapplers last week dropped a dual meet to Ypsilanti, 38-28; finished fourth in a quad meet with Plymouth Salem, Milford and Garden City and had only one wrestler place at the Belleville Invitational.

But according to Coach Gary Emerson, his wrestlers did gain some valuable experience.

"It's going to be a long season, at least until after Christmas," he said. "When we had freshmen here at the high school they had a year to learn before being involved in the varsity program."

"Now, a lot of the kids who come out for the team have never wrestled before," he continued. "And some who could help the team don't even come out because they don't want to look foolish. But you have to lose some matches to learn how to wrestle."

The first defeat for Northville came against Ypsilanti on Tuesday.

The Mustangs posted five wins in 13 events, three by pins.

Sophomore Steve Ross won by forfeit in the 98-pound division; Neil Hartshorne at 105 was pinned in the third period in a close match; Mike Ross and Frank Nieto competing at 112 and 119 pounds, respectively, also were pinned by their opponents.

Greg Marshall, who competed in his first match ever, lost 6-0 at 126 pounds.

Senior Steve Platte pinned his 132-pound opponent in 25 seconds for one of

Northville's five wins, while Jack Wallace, wrestling at 138, won by points, 14-3.

Sophomore John Collins lost a heart-breaker 6-5 at 145 pounds. Collins was ahead 5-2 going into the final period, when his opponent scored an escape to claim the win.

Brian Hamilton lost 15-5 in the 155-pound division, while Neil FitzPatrick, a newcomer was pinned by his 167-pound opponent.

In the 185-pound division Neil Young dropped a decision 11-3, while Dan Sackklach collected six points by pinning his opponent in the 198-pound division.

Returning Mustang heavyweight junior Vince Candela took only 20 to pin his opponent to claim the final match win for Northville.

In the quad meet Thursday the Mustangs started in the red as they were forced to void all three 98-pound division matches.

One Northville wrestler missed the weigh-in by a pound and another could not attend.

"One of the problems with first-year wrestlers is that they have a difficult time making weight," Emerson said. "They have to learn what they can and can't eat when they are preparing for a match."

First-year wrestler Greg Marshall, a sophomore, pinned his Plymouth Salem opponent to claim his first win and Northville's only points, as the Mustangs were trounced, 60-6.

The results against Garden City were slightly better, Northville bowing 48-19.

Again the Mustang grapplers had

trouble making weight, this time at 198, 132 and 198.

Hartshorne pinned his man at 105 pounds, and Marshall won a tight match 8-7 by scoring an escape in the last five seconds of the match.

Mike Ross wrestled his opponent to a 5-5 tie, but by the rules of the game there can be no ties. Ross' opponent scored the first takedown and therefore was declared the winner.

Platte at 126 pounds won by points, 13-4, while Wallace, wrestling at 138 pounds, was pinned.

Brian Shake competing in the 145-pound division was pinned as was Sackklach at 167.

FitzPatrick avoided a pin by his 155-pound opponent but lost a 7-0 decision.

All Mustang wrestlers got a chance to wrestle in the tournament and Emerson said he feels that they learned a great deal.

"We are coming along," he stated. "Our biggest problem is to get everyone to win at the same time. We have had single victories here and there but have to put them all together in one meet."

The Mustang grapplers, who were scheduled to take on Farmington, Bloomfield and Andover last night, will face Dearborn Heights Crestwood and Melvindale Thursday and compete in the Novi Invitational Saturday.

Starting times for the Novi meet will be 1 p.m. for junior varsity wrestlers and 4 p.m. for varsity competitors.

The Cougars are scheduled to host St. Hilary of Redford at the Northville Community Building at 3 p.m. Sunday.

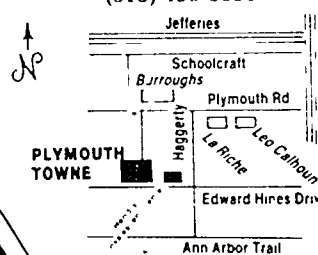
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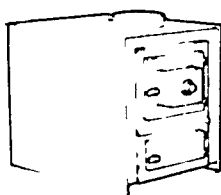
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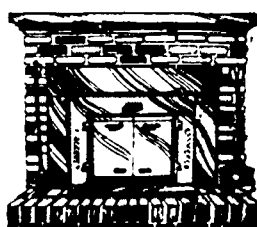
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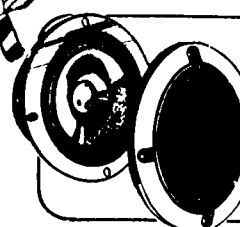
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Grand Valley griddler
