
Resurrection worship services with special choral and instrumental music will be held at 9:30 and 11 a.m.

# School board studies cuts

"Let's be realistic, we're broke," exclaimed board of education vice-president Charles Peltz at the board's meeting Monday night.

In the wake of the proposed 9.5 millage renewal defeat, the statement made by Peltz was not exactly news to Northville schools administrators and staff members who now are grappling over budget revisions to compensate for an approximate \$3 million loss in revenue to the

The board, which unanimously concurred Monday not to go back to the voters in June with another millage request, is considering possibly holding a millage election sometime in July.

Board members agreed that because of a lack of community feedback concerning the types of school programs Northville residents want, the pending state election on Proposal A and the uncertainty over the 1981 SEV another election — which would be held on the mandated June 8 election day — would probably result in another

"I truly don't believe we'll have an opportunity to go back (to the veters) more than one time," board president Chris Johnson stated "I don't believe a June 8th election will give us enough time to present a package to the com-

At what time the board will be able to present a comprehensive millage package — if it should decide to hold another millage election — has not been determined. The board will most likely make that decision within the

next few weeks.

In the meantime, board members and administrators have begun weeding through data and gathering information for slashing next year's school budget.

# Citizen group formed

Recent defeat of the Northville Public Schools 9.5 mill renewal request has brought to light an apparent communication problems between the school system and the

Acknowledging this problem, the Northville Board of Education has supported the formation of a communitywide citizens' committee to help open the lines of communication between the schools and the community.

In forming this committee, the board is attempting to bring together all persons in the community who wish to have some input in school programming and education.

The committee is open to all persons in the community
not just parents of school children or those involved in

There is no limit to the number of persons who can join the committee and the only requirement is a willingness to devote some time and energy to help answer the many questions confronting the schools such as: What kind of programming does the community want? and What programs is it willing to support?

Persons interested in joining the committee should attend the organizational meeting at 7:30 p.m. April 22 in the board conference room at Old Village School.

# County gives approval • to paving South Main

Northville City Council took time out after a special budget study session Monday to consider the proposition to pave South Main from the well to Seven

Having received official approval from Wayne County Road Commission for the city to fund the project now with a bond issue, it will be on the May 19 ballot along with the state 5.5 percent sales tax-property tax reduction pro-

The road commission officially approved the request at its April 8

Council member Dewey Gardner expressed the council's concern that, "If voters vote down the governor's proposal, they may also cast a negative vote on the paving if they do not understand the financing."
Mayor Paul Vernon stressed that it is

a "good deal" for the city and speculated that the project would cost much more down the road. Council member J. Burton DeRusha agreed that, even if the funding did not materialize from the public improvement funds, it would not be a burden to the taxpayer.

As planned, the city will finance resurfacing of the pot-holed street with the special election to approve the bon-

Voters will be asked to approve borrowing an amount not to exceed \$455,000 for paving and related costs. Council members were aware that actual costs will run close to threequarters of a million dollars with interest charges. However, it was realized when approved in March that delay

only could increase the cost. In the resolution calling for the

special election council also voted to submit the proposition to Wayne County Road Commission seeking a splitting of costs with the city paying 60 percent and the county 40 with the understanding that the city will fund the project now and pay all interest charges

The county will begin to pay its portion the fifth year following the awarding of the construction contract.

The action with the county was initiated as council members realized the low priority given the project might place resurfacing 10 years in the future. Mayor Vernon observed that it could

# Township retains date for police millage vote

Despite a state senate resolution that would deny them some \$4,500 in election reimbursements, Northville Township is going ahead with its plans to request two police millage approvals May 19.

The legislative move would deny state coverage of election costs to communities placing local tax issues on the same ballot as the state's tax reform proposal.

The township, however, passed a resolution during the regular board of trustees session last week arguing that their election is a special case and that the community deserves reimbursement.

The township proposals of a 1.5 mill renewal and 1.0 mill increase, both to be earmarked for police, were to be included on a May 5 ballot. The township applied for the election date before there were any indications that the state might choose to offer a special election.

It is virtually impossible to conduct two elections within two weeks, and county election scheduling rules prohibit timing within one month, so the township was stuck with the May 19 alternative.

The school system already has June 8 nailed down for its annual board of education election and the township cannot "piggyback" on the election because precinct boundaries differ.

The combination of circumstances would make the earliest available date, outside of May 19, sometime in July or August — when many people are taking

A fall date would leave little time for the township to make a second request should the first attempt fail, so

township officials are reluctant to delay

that long. Their reluctance is heightened because failure in a fall election could leave the police department without any of its own income in 1982. Should the state refuse to reimburse

expenses, Clerk Susan Heintz estimated, it would cost the community some \$4,500. That is roughly the same amount due from the state for last May's presidential primary election — for which

the township for out-of-pocket election

Michigan has never reimbursed local communities, despite the requirements Both the city and township have passed resolutions sent to the state

legislature demanding reimbursement, while other communities are taking the issue to court. "If we get our money for the presidential primary, that should cover this year's election for us," Heintz said.

Eventual payment for the 1980 costs seems more likely lately, as pressure is applied through the courts and through local governments lobbying the legislature. The township board last week was

relieved to hear that Wayne County had removed three millage issues of its own from the ballot.

"We hadn't expected a bed sheet ballot," Supervisor John MacDonald had said earlier, when there was much concern that a confusing ballot could cause electors to simply vote against

Without the county clutter, trustees said, township residents will be able to consider the police issues more careful-



# Council studies no frills budget

As Northville City Council members took their first "overview" inspection of the proposed 1981-82 budget at a special study session Monday, members found it looked much like last

"It's a no-frills budget," City Manager Steven Walters told members as he presented the \$2,413,626 budget, which includes \$66,866 of prior year deficit.

The current budget expenditures are itemized at \$2,218,220.

As board members inspected the figures, they were well aware that the May 19 state election could change the financial picture for the city drastically. If the governor's proposal of a 50 percent property tax reduction tied to a 5.5 percent sales tax is passed, city revenues will be reduced.

Walters told the council, however, that if this happens, it will not be a 50 percent reduction in property taxes, but more like a 40-44 percent one with levies like the Randolph drain unaffected.

Since the election follows by one day the date the city is required to have passed the next year's budget, council members wondered aloud what alternatives they should be planning.

The city charter requires a budget be passed at the second meeting in May, which falls on May 18. The council decided it will have the budget ready under existing millage — and then will plan to adjourn the meeting until after the election.

Should the state proposal pass, it then will deal with the changes

As council took its first look at the proposed budget, Walters explained it contains only a couple of additions and no salary increases beyond the stepincreases and Cost of Living (COLA).

Questioned by council member Carolann Ayers on this, Walters said it was necessary to make the budget balance. She asked what would have happened if increases had been budgeted.

Council member Stan Johnston replied that, after going over nonflexible items (electricity, gas, etc.) line-by-line, the city would have to

come back to salaries.
"We have not estimated revenues conservatively this year," Walters told the council, explaining that he and controller Betty Lennox had investigated all revenues. "The budget wouldn't balance if we did."

Additions primarily are in the fire department's budget, Walters pointed out. They include payment on the new aerial truck recently delivered and a \$12,000 item for inspection of all city commercial buildings.

Walters said the council would receive an explanation of the inspection request at the council's next meeting

Department heads, he said, will be at the next budget session April 27 to explain their budgets.

"I thought I would be here a year," remembers Dr. Robert G. Wetterstroem as he prepares to take off his white professional coat and pack up mementos gathered over more than 33 years in general practice at the Doctors Clinic at 501 West Dunlap.

An ad placed in a medical journal by Dr. Atchison brought Dr. Wetterstroem to Northville and a private practice. "It was by far the most attractive situation I could find," he says, mentioning that he expected to stay about a year as he had lived in seven states in the seven previous years.
Dr. Wetterstroem had grown up in

Cincinnati, attended Xavier University for his undergraduate schooling and University of Cincinnati Medical School.

In 1940 he interned with the U.S. Public Health Service. This was in World War II when people were frozen in their jobs, he points out. He was sent to Kansas, Idaho and then Iron River in the Upper Peninsula near Duluth. In 1946 he found himself there with the Michigan Department of Health and felt the time was right to enter private

He hasn't regretted his choice of Northville, he says. "Working with Doctor Atchison has been a very rewarding experience," he adds thoughtfully. Dr. Atchison agrees that it has been mutually so. He notes that Dr. William Conley has been practicing at the clinic and working in the emergency room at St. Mary Hospital since December and expects he will continue to do so. He previously had been affiliated with St. Joseph Mercy Hospital's emergency room in Ann Arbor.

'It's been a wonderful place to raise a family," Dr. Wetterstroem says of Northville. All six of his children grew up at the Wetterstroem home on Seven Mile where his daughters used to enjoy horseback riding.

His oldest son is Lieutenant Commander Robert S. Wetterstroem who

served in Vietnam after being commissioned a second lieutenant through ROTC on graduation from Xavier University. Among many honors, he holds the Vietnamese Cross of Gallan-

He now is an insurance agent representing Bankers Life. He and his wife Rita and their two children live in Reading, Ohio. Rita Wetterstroem is director of personnel at Cincinnati air-

Daughter Mary is married to Roger Myers and is director of nursing at Chesapeake General Hospital in Virginia Beach.

Karen, third Wetterstroem child, is married to Richard Minton, a cartographer for the U.S. government in Seattle. They have two children.

Daughter Anita is married to Dr. Eric Schoomaker, a physician who is teaching at Walter Reid Hospital military medical school. She received her BS degree from University of Michigan, attending Duke University and then George Washington University law school. She now is an attorney with the firm of Morgan, Lewis and Bockius in Washington, D.C.

Daughter Nan received degree from University of Michigan and is in post graduate school in public health working in cancer hematology.

Son Tom has one more year at Western Michigan University in aviation engineering.

Dr. Wetterstroem says that patients won't be lacking for medical care as the practice of medicine has changed greatly recently with the advent of prepaid medical plans and health maintenance organizations.

"It's a good time to retire. I'm 66 and am planning to go to school in Florida.'

Bob Wetterstroem explains that he hopes to get more involved in solar energy as a hobby. He has taken a course here and expects to continue his studies in extension courses of University of Florida.



# Federal cuts imperil Senior Village fund plans

Elation gave way to concern last reek as those involved in trying to ocate an elderly housing project in Northville Township examined the pro-

Approval of a lease agreement between Wayne County and the County Economic Development Corporation (EDC) for 101 acres of Child Development Center property seemingly cleared the way for the project in late

But coordinators of the plan soon realized that recent federal budget measures will make it very difficult to fund the project.

Zuchelli, Hunter & Associates (ZHA), ontracted to the EDC as consultants for the project, issued a memorandum March 27 that was reviewed by the township board of trustees Thursday.

"Basically, the Reagan administration proposals make it very difficult to

see where funding can come from to build the village," Supervisor John MacDonald explained, noting that he is often in contact with EDC, ZHA and other officials right now.

In a nutshell, the four-page memorandum said the 11-month negotiation process with the county has harmed many of the opportunities for federal funding of the village planned in the past three years.

The latest budget proposals out of Washington would cut or eliminate -many of the programs counted on for

help in backing the project. There is no certainty of what funds may be available in the near future, which poses a problem for the EDC as it hunts for private developers who may

be interested in the village proposal. Moreover, the buildings on the property have depreciated substantially during that time due to vandalism and

pilfering, making the project a less desirable one to the private sector which was to be enticed by the salvage

value, according to original plans. Further still, the memorandum states, the township's own efforts to dictate some aspects of the plan through zoning and other restrictions further hampers the chances for the project to entice a full private funding.

In short, a red-tape-worm has consumed the guts of the proposal.

What can be done?

Hope still exists for the federal funding measures counted on in the proposal. Among these was to be some section 8 subsidized housing for lowerincome senior citizens (the village is aimed at middle and upper-income brackets primarily)

Federal representatives and senators are hearing from the involved parties, as are state and county officials as planners pursue funding.



Michigan, a Plymouth-based company holding the cable television franchise for the township.

Omnicom, Newell explained, is a subsidiary of Capital Cities Communications, a Philadelphia corporation whose Michigan ties include WJR radio and the daily newspaper Oakland Press.

He was present at the board meeting to explain the company's current operations and report its plans to the board. Under an agreement signed by the previous board of trustees, Newell's firm has exclusive franchise rights to the township.

The cable system will have the Peter Newell, president of Omnicom of capacity to carry 52 channels of programming — only 40 were promised in the 1978 franchise agreement. Newell said technology to offer more than 40 channels was not available when the contract was drawn up.

Programming to fill 52 channels is not yet available, he noted, but the firm is negotiating for more services and may be able to fill the capacity in about one year.

He said installation of cables from the company's Plymouth headquarters is running approximately two months behind the firm's target because it switched contractors.

"I changed the contractor, quite frankly, because I was not satisfied

# Landings site okayed

A preliminary site plan for what could be a unique township residential development was approved by the planning commission March 31.

Northville Landings, a "private" subdivision planned for an area spanning the Johnson Drain north of Six Mile and east of Beck Road, took the majority of the commission's time as the swampy topography of the region complicated

The plan to lay out the subdivision with private roads, owned by the homeowners, instead of dedicating the streets to the county, would create the first such single family development in the township and also complicated the

for the subdivision will allow the developer to begin the complicated studies of topography and run a gamut of governmental regulations before committing itself to the construction

Normally, preliminary site plan approval will lead to submission of final plans within a month or two. However, commission vice chairman William Bohan predicted the Northville Landings plans are probably "at least a year away, considering all the reviews he needs.

The approval last week was conditional on addressing concerns of the commission's consultants - which includes several legal issues surrounding so-called private streets.

The development would also take advantage of the township's open space subdivision plan, which allows developers to use smaller lots if the subdivision includes open space areas accessible to ali residents.

Much of the open space in Northville Landings might turn out to be swampy land unsuitable for any recreation purpose, commissioner Marvin Gans noted, so later reviews should give careful consideration to allowing the developer to use the plan.

The private roads of the development would have to be constructed to county standards and whether the commission would approve such a configuration, similar to what happens in multiple family developments, may depend on legal considerations such as police and fire department access to the area.

Ownership of the open space area and streets would be through a homeowners association created under a contract that also would be part of the site plan

The township attorney had several concerns about the contract submitted for preliminary site plan approval, and it is likely to see several changes if it is eventually to clear the commission.

Though the administration made no formal recommendations to the board concerning budget cuts at Monday's meeting, a cost reduction analysis was presented to the board by School Superintendent Larry Nichols.

The analysis, which the board requested administrators look into at their last meeting, contained figures on programming costs and other areas where reductions will most likely occur if the budget has to be pared down from a projected \$10 million to approximately \$6.8 million.

The board of education decided at its last meeting to begin planning a budget at a 25.9 mill level — the result of the 9.5 millage defeat.

The district currently levies 33 18 of 35.4 authorized

At a 25.9 mill level, the board will cut the budget about 30 percent or by approximately \$3 million.





The areas for revision outlined in the Superintendent's cost analysis included: transportation, class size, K-12 special education, closing of schools and extra-curricular programs

In the transportation area, the administration is examining the total elimination of the bus program for K-12 students.

Yet, a total elimination of the school's transportation program would only result in an approximate \$200,000 reduction in the school's budget.

In the area of extra-curricular programming, the analysis showed that an elimination of all non-credited extra-curricular programs would result in a budget reduction of \$162,343.

Programs that would be cut would include extracurricular athletics at all levels — elementary, junior and senior high school and all non-athletic extra-curricular activities such as music, drama, forensics, etc.

Another area outlined in the analysis was the closing of one elementary and one secondary school. Though the schools were not specified, the administration estimated a cost reduction of approximately \$156,000 for the closing of an elementary school building and about \$163,000 for shutting down a secondary school.

The reductions are mostly the result of a decrease in support staff - administrators, secretaries, custodians, aides and teachers.

The largest area cited for revision in the analysis was potential staff reductions through increased class size and the reduction to five classes at the junior and senior high level. Students currently are offered six classes at the junior and senior high level. Dr. Burton Knighton, assistant superintendent for ad-

ministration, provided the board with a chart outlining an increase in class size at the elementary and secondary level and the reductions in teaching staff which would result from that increase. The maximum student class size increase used in

Knighton's chart represented an additional seven students per classroom at all levels. This would mean an average class size of 32 at the kindergarten level, 35 in grades 1-6 and 36 in grades 7-12.

It would result in the layoffs of approximately 47 teachers and a savings of about \$750,000 to the school

However, the administration cited some problems with the increased class size. For one, most classrooms cannot accommodate 40 or more students, some classes would

have between 45-55 students and the unemployment compensation costs for laying off approximately 47 teachers would be "extremely high."

Despite these problems, board members asked the administration to come back at the next board meeting with even higher class size increases.

"I think we'll have to carry it out further to \$1-1.5" million in reductions," Johnson said. "Staff is the only."

thing we have left to cut." The administration also was asked to compile data on the possiblity of going to half-day rather than full-day.

class schedules The budget reductions compiled in the cost analysis, totaled approximately \$1.5 million - which means that; the board would have to reduce programming and staff by,

another \$1.5 million to stay within budget. Nichols emphasized that the cost analysis was not a recommendation for board approval but an outline of programming costs and reduction possibilities

The administration will be coming back with further: data at the next board meeting April 27.

The primary factor in the board's decision on how deep cuts will be depends on whether or not it decides to put the millage renewal back on the ballot.

# County withdraws mill requests

Under pressure from virtually all sides, the Wayne County Board of Commissioners last week voted to withdraw the three one-mill tax proposals it had placed on

the May 19 special election ballet. Voting 17-3 Wednesday in a reconsideration of their earlier vote to place the issues on the ballot, the board removed its proposals for one mill to fund the sheriff's road patrol and prosecutor's office, one mill for the

County General Hospital,

and one mill for mental nealth services.

Board members said they were in agreement with state officials that the local tax proposals would clutter the May 19 ballot and confuse voters.

In addition to the state proposal to cut property taxes by 50 percent while raising the sales tax to 5.5 percent, the county ballot would have included the proposals to add property taxes amounting to \$3 per \$1,000 of assessed property values.

The three mill proposal

grew out of county commissioners' discussions seeking financing to reestablish the sheriff's road patrol deleted from the current budget.

The other two millage issues were tacked onto the sheriff's proposal as the board moved hastily to meet filing deadlines for the election. Another reason for the

# Record surveys vote motivation

What constructive advice can voters (and non-voters) give the Northville Board of Education as it ponders its next step concerning financing of our schools?

We believe it is vitally important that the board of education carefully weigh the meaning of the recently defeated millage proposal, paying particular attention to motivations of the 1800 persons, a large majority, who opposed the millage proposal and of the far greater number of people who failed to vote. More importantly, it seems to us, are the suggestions voters and nonvoters can give the board to avoid the financial calamity it envisions.

Therefore, we are inviting specific, constructive suggestions from all eligible voters, whether or not they voted in the April 4 election. Upon receipt of those suggestions by Saturday, April 25 we will assemble representative replies and publish them (without mentioning writers' names) in the Wednesday, April 29 edition of The Record. # Let's pave Main

If you want South Main Street resurfaced, vote "yes" on the city bond issue proposition May 19. For those who regularly drive the section of Main from the well to Seven Mile resurfacing will be a boon.

The city, anticipating that it could be 10 years before Wayne County Road Commission gave the paving priority, approached the commission about funding the improvement itself until the county could budget the expenditure. It received approval at the commission's April 8 meeting.

If all goes well, the bonding could be painless for the taxpayer who by fall could be rolling smoothly along the street — not having to avoid potholes for the first time in years.

City council intends to pay the approximately \$40,000 a year cost from its public improvement fund — the fund into which race track monies are channeled. Since the city for the first time is receiving maximum amounts (this year \$800,000 and next season anticipates \$900,000) back from the state, this funding seems solid.

Even supposing the funds could not be utilized in this manner, the cost would average about \$25-\$30 on a tax bill (City Manager Steven Walters says the two-thirds of a mill amounts to between \$20-\$40 for all property owners). That's the worst that could happen, and the council doesn't envision it.

In the agreement, the city will fund the improvement project with the bond issue. In five years the county will begin paying the city with the debt payments to be completed in 10 years. In advocating the road project now, council members also considered inflation. "It will never cost less to do than now" was the consensus. This is the same manner in which the city bonded for Mainstreet 78 improvements.

In taking the initiative with the county road commission and seeking the bonding, the city has acted in response to public outcry about the condition of the street. It long has been criticized for an unsightly approach to the community — as well as for the hazard the street presents to drivers. It's time to vote "yes."

Northville's Mill Race Historical Village is a good example. Publisher Jack Hoffman has served as historical society president, wrote a community history with all proceeds going to the historical society, and with his wife Joan writes and edits its quarterly publication.

When a subscription campaign was launched in our newspaper chain, circulation manager Jack Kaake sought a community beneficiary. It wasn't difficult for us to suggest the Mill Race Historical Village. Apparently many new readers (and those whose subscriptions had lapsed) agreed, for we had the satisfaction of presenting a check for \$276 to the society this month.

As a docent guide I have had the satisfaction of seeing the Hunter-Yerkes houses become prime attractions as they were decorated and furnished. The New School Church is a needed meeting place as well as non-denominal wedding location. Now attention is being focused on Wash-Oak School. It's not hard to envision a local class being shown "what it used to be like in a one-room school" as soon as interior work is completed.

Thank you, new readers, who gave us this satisfaction of helping this project.



# Opinions mixed on millage issue

To the Editor:

For the past two Monday nights, the Northville School Board has faced the painful reality of the defeat of the 9.5 mill renewal election. As you are no doubt aware this issue has become loaded with emotion. Unfortunately, emotional reactions to this problem will result in disaster for the school district. This especially applies to the school board itself.

There are many questions that must be asked and answered before the board can or will go back to the voters with some kind of renewal issue. Some of these issues are:

1. Why did the community overwhelmingly defeat a millage renewal for the first time in history?

2. What programs provided by the school district are considered wasteful and unneeded?

3. What is the impact of operating the school district with our current available millage rate of 25.9 mills?

4. What level of programming is acceptable and will be funded by the com-

5. What is the impact of the statewide tax proposal going to have on the school

For this reason, the school board has taken two steps in the last two meetings. The first is that the question of some sort of millage renewal will not be placed on the June 8, 1981 ballot for school board candidates. Because of the very short time involved in having to put together ballot language, the board decided a second and more confusing ballot, put together before all of the facts are in, would result in a second disaster.

The second step is that the school board is forming a citizens committee to look at the following areas:

2. What programs does the community wish to have?

3. What is the support in funding those programs?

The purpose of this committee will be to advise the board on these critical questions. This will not be a "help pass the millage committee" but will act independently of the board.

The board will require that this committee act quickly so that the board can be advised on what its next steps should be. For that reason the organizational meeting will be held on Wednesday, April 22, 1981 at 7:30 p.m. in the conference room of the Old Village School. This committee will be asked to do a great deal of work in a short span of time. It will require a real commit-

-We need that help. We especially need to hear from those people who voted no. The future of the school district is at state.

Was anyone surprised at the voter denial of the millage renewal on April 4, 1981? Certainly many residents were pleased, some were disappointed, but only the short sighted could have been

The millage request was predicated on a business-as-usual approach to taxation and not reflective of the state of the economy and the associated under employment.

The timing of school administration pay increases, coupled with the magnitude of the renewal request, suggested that a certain independence has been achieved between the schools and the voters. A proposal that requires multiple attempts for passage may be ill conceived and, although repeated requests tend to eventually gain passage, over the longer term too many requests alienate

The millage voting season has only begun, thus far the voter appears to have taken the most intelligent ap-

I found the April 8 Northille Record editorial regarding the recent millage renewal defeat as mis-directed as the editorial preceding the ballot.

Blaming the plight of the auto in-dustry, whose slumping sales have forced wide-spread layoffs throughout lower Michigan, on the need for a cutback in school expenses is clearly an apples to oranges comparison.

Auto production schedules are at the lowest point of the decade - such a significant "student production" cost decline has not yet occurred. Those individuals not directly linked to the auto industry, however few there are, should not be force-fed the effects of one sector's economic setback.

Raises for Northville's administrators, rather or not justified should be based on individual performance - not the 10-day sales figures for the big three auto manufacturers.

Editorial comments regarding housekeeping, teacher evaluation, and program imprevements may well be justified. However, achieving progress in these areas when faced with a reduction in funds appears difficult to impossible. As to requiring our professional educators to patrol the rest rooms like in the old days, why don't we also require that they remain unmarried and chop the classroom's wood supply? These items were also part of the job over a century ago.

A community non-supportive to its educational system creates two distinct effects with both short and long-range implications. We know that financial cutbacks, if believed unjustified, result n an unhappy and apathetic workforce. 

# Countess de Romanones •brings warnings home

BY MICHELE McELMURRY

The year is 1943. America is in the middle of the greatest international conflict since 1918. For the past three years the United States and her allies have been at war with Germany, Italy and Japan and peacetime remains in the distant horizon.

In Pearl River, a small town in upstate New York, a young woman named Aline Griffith is about to become involved in a dangerous mission for her country. A recent college graduate who majored in international relations, she has been sent to Washington D.C., where she is indoctrinated in the country's first intelligence agency — the Of-

fice of the Secret Service.

She is one of only two women trained by the OSS for overseas espionage.

After a grueling training session with 60 other agents, she is sent to Europe where she begins her mission.

In Europe, Aline is placed in charge of organizing groups of female secret agents to cross German lines and investigate Gestapo and SS activities.

As the war continues, she eventually yinds herself in Spain, where she is expected to cross the border with a suitcase full of microfilm and radio equipment.

Her attempt is almost foiled when she encounters enemy agents and spends two days in jail until the chief of police returns from an extended bullfight.

As the war comes to end, Aline continues her association with the OSS and returns to Spain in 1947 While attending a bullfight she is literally "swept off her feet" by a young Spaniard who rescues her from a stampeding bull.

The young man, who turns out to be Conde de Romanones, heir of one of Spain's most noble and famous families, proposes marriage to Aline.

And the fairy-tale existence begins.

The above scenario could be an exerpt from the latest Sidney Sheldon or John Lecarre novel. In fact, the combination of mystery, danger, espionage and international intrigue would make a great TV-Movie-of-the-Week.

However, this is not a passage from the latest best-selling fiction.

As the Countess de Romanones, the former Aline Griffith may lead the kind of life which most of us can only catch a glimpse of in the latest copy of Town and Country, but as she told her audience at Town Hall last Thursday—"When I speak to American audiences, I like to think I'm as American as

anyone in the room."

The Countess, who ended Town Hall's 1980-81 series, has lived in Spain for the past 33 years but has been touring the United States on a lecture circuit for the past year.

As the wife of one of Spain's leading nobleman, the Countess is one of the most influential women in Europe. She is the only woman serving on the boards of several international corporations, is one of Spain's leading patrons of the Arts and other cultural and charitable projects, is the Spanish representative of Vogue and is an expert in paleography (the ancient script of the 12th-17th centuries).

She also is an ardent political activist having organized the first women's political group in Spain and has been vocal in her support for a conservative, strong democratic Spanish government

Politics seemed to be the central focus of the Countess' lecture last Thurdsay as she told her audience that "my purpose is to inform the American people about what is going on in Europe."

And the message she brought carried with it a note of caution for Americans who may be taking freedom too much for granted.

"I have been seeing a lot of anti-American propaganda in Spain and Europe," she told the capacity crowd. "When you see people criticizing your country when you're not in your country, you become very angry and indignant."

The Countess explained that much of the anti-American propaganda in the Spanish media has been generated towards the renewal of three American bases situated in Spain and the proposed inclusion of Spain in NATO.








# Kate Edgerton's weaving the Shroud in Connecticut

When Kate Edgerton moved her spinning wheel and looms from her workshop-home at 571 Randolph to Norwich, Connecticut, just about 10 years ago, she could not have dreamed that there she would be asked to weave the Shroud - a replica of perhaps the world's most treasured and controversial piece of linen cloth, the alleged burial wrap of

"The scientists decided they needed samples of the Shroud," Mrs. Edgerton explained in an article in the winter issue of "Shuttle Spindle and Dyepot," published by the Handweavers Guild of America. The project leaders had been searching for someone versed in ancient weaving techniques and found the weaver-teacher right in their own backyard.

Kate Edgerton, now in her 70s, called the work "the crowning achievement of my career, the culmination of all my experiences as a lifelong weaver." She added that she had always liked to work with linen and pointed out that the

original Shroud was a very fine fabric for the period.

"Its thread was handspun and the weave lacked an even tension causing it to be rather thick and thin in spots." It suggested to her, she added, that more than one weaver had taken part in its making, possibly up to six.

Her task of duplicating the Shroud for scientific study was complicated by the fact that she has never seen the original firsthand. She has worked from detail photographs, and, the magazine reports, "has created near perfect renditions which have met the strict criteria of a most serious scientific undertaking.

The Shroud seems to be woven in a one-three herringbone twill with 50 repeats needed to complete the pattern," she said, explaining she used yarn supplied by an Irish producer who scoured his product in soda ash and caustic soda, and then soured it in formic acid and sodium chlorate as whitening agents. The Palestinians used struthion or soapwort to cleanse and soften the original material, her research showed.

In the opinion of some of the scientists involved in the project, this may well provide a key element in helping to solve the mystery of the image which appears on the Shroud. Tests already have shown that swatches of linen washed in soapwort scorch more rapidly than untreated samples. Mrs. Edgerton's reproductions are undergoing a series of tests to identify their chemical agents and duplicate a scorch.

Kate Edgerton is contributing to one of this century's "most fascinating studies into history-laden fabric. Most of all, it is an experience she can surely cherish and will certainly not soon forget," the magazine stated as it related how the scientists came to her eighteenth century colonial home where spinning wheel and looms are set on the wide plank oaken floor.

Gloria Teeter, a former pupil of Kate Edgerton's, and her husband John bought the red frame home of Mrs. Edgerton and her daughter Linda when she moved east. He had taken pottery classes from Mrs. Edgerton. It was a very friendly real estate transaction and the Teeters since have

tried to visit the Edgertons once a year.
Mrs. Teeter reports now that Mrs. Edgerton had just decided to slow down her full-time schedule of teaching weaving when she received the Shroud commission. Linda, who had been a college librarian, has taken a leave to run full-time Books, Etc., a book store. She had sold children's books in a corner of their home here.

'She's a neat lady," says Gloria Teeter of Mrs. Edgerton, mentioning how she has become very interested in the Norwich historical society and has served as a guide, escorting visitors through the city's historical district.

Coincidentially, Gloria Teeter is displaying handwoven garments all this month in the window of her Traditional Handcrafts Shop at 154 Mary Alexander Court. They were made by local pupils at a workshop conducted in the Teeters' home studio by Barbara Wittenberg of Southfield, a Cranbrook graduate in clothing and design, who has written a book on the subject.



# Countess returns to warn of anti-American dangers

"It is very important that we, as Americans, have strength and friends," she said.

The Countess told the audience that the United States has to keep a tight hold on other countries.

"Since 1945 we have lost half of Europe (to socialist countries)," she said. "We cannot lose Spain."

The Countess focused on the Soviet Union as the center of the anti-American propoganda movement.

'We are in a silent World War III." she explained. "It's a different kind of war with new weapons and it's important that people realize inat the real target of this war is the United States."

Through "disinformation, hypocrisy and surprise, the Soviets are trying to

destablize America," she said. She explained that one of the greatest

concerns of Europeans today is the security of the Persian Gulf region.

'We in Europe get approximately 60 to 70 percent of our oil from the Persian Gulf," she said. "If the Soviet Union were to take con-

trol of that area, it would drive a wedge between the United States and its strongest allies. We (Europeans) realize that if the

Soviets control that area we will have to bow to their demands," she explained. She said the biggest threat to world peace at the present time is the growing

international terrorism - which is mostly predominant in Europe. "I have seen unbelievable acts of terrorism," she commented.

"Though America has not escaped

from terrorism," she said, "it is not as prevalent here as in other parts of the world.'

Last year, 511 persons were killed by the ETA, the Spanish terrorist organization.

The Countess explained that the international terrorist ring is a "very wealthy, very organized network working to destabalize democracies."

She explained that most of the terrorist movements including the Irish Republican Army, the Palestine Liberation Organization and the Red Brigades, are part of a worldwide terrorist organization.

All these groups are trained in the same schools and learn the same techniques, she explained. And many of these groups are directed by the KGB - the Soviet secret police, she added.

"The aim of the socialist ideology is to destroy capitalistic democracy — of which the United States is the central focus," she said.

"The KGB knows how to fan up a smouldering fire in a particular country," she said. "They have an excellent intelligence network - far better than that in the United States."

The Countess explained that the Soviet Union has infiltrated into many organizations in the United States and is using many charity and church groups as fronts for the cover-up of socialist and marxist idealogies.

Though she admitted that her accusations were harsh and somewhat foreboding, the Countess said she felt it was her "purpose to inform the

American people of what I know.' She said much of the information she

has received comes from her former colleagues in the OSS, who now work for the CIA and other intelligence agen-

"It would be very dangerous for me to talk like this in Spain," she admitted. "I would fear for the safety of my children and grandchildren.'

She encouraged Americans to become more involved in international affairs and to write to their legislators for more information.

Having seen the recent conversion of the Spanish government from a dictatorship to a democracy, the Countess remarked that "though America may be a new country in many ways, they are veterans in democracy.

Europeans need the United States, she explained. "Americans are those that others put their hopes in.'

Though she warned of the immense military build-up in the Soviet Union, the Countess said "the greatest weapon

a country can have is spirit and unity. "I think the recent assassination attempt on President Reagan has brought out that spirit in the United States," she

said.

The Countess de Romanones said she will continue to speak out against anti-American forces and will be lecturing as much as possible in the States.

One of her sons (she has three children) and her grandchildren are living in New York, which she admits is giving her cause to stay in her former homeland a little longer.

However, she explained that since she's been back — "I've fallen in love with my country all over again

Ready or not, spring is here and not far behind are the sweltering months of July and August.

SERVICE STATIONS selling gasohol in Michigan have doubled in number in the past two years, while those offering diesel fuel have increased by 29 percent, according to Automobile Club of Michigan

AAA's 1981 statewide guide, "Where to Buy Diesel Fuel and Gasohol in Michigan," lists 337 service stations in 184 cities selling either gasohol, diesel fuel, or both. There are 101 in Southeast Michigan, 108 in East Michigan, 107 in West Michigan and 21 in the Upper Penninsula.

Gasohol is sold at 94 of the stations listed and diesel fuel at 283. The auto club's monitoring of fuel prices shows diesel fuel registered the greater increase in the two year period, rising from 66

cents to \$1.397 per gallon — nearly a 112 percent increase. By comparison, gasohol, sold at an average price of 81.9 cents when introduced to Michigan in 1979, now averages \$1.459 per gallon a 78 percent increase.

The guide to stations, available to club members through the 55 offices statewide, lists the stations by name, location and telephone number. A series of code figures identifies stations which operate

seven-days-per-week, or 24 hours and tells which are open holidays. Other information in the handbook includes the grade of fuel sold. whether a diesel mechanic and road service are available and the whether the station offers full service, self-serve or mini-service.

With a pair of "pre-season" victories under their belts, the Northville High School baseball squad is scheduled to open its Western Six Conference season today at 4 p.m. against Walled Lake

Neither of the defending league champion Mustangs' wins — a 9-8 trimming of Southfield April 9 and a 7-5 come-from-behind victory over Novi

Monday — came easy, however.

It was shades of the Detroit Tigers' opening game as Northville had to overcome a barrage of walks and several fielding errors, including two balls that were lost in the sun.

But, like the Bengals, the Mustangs held on for the win.

Thomson got the first two Southfield hitters out in the sixth, but he then gave up a pair of walks and consecutive singles drove in three runs for the visitors, to put them up 7-5.

Northville went scoreless in its half of the sixth inning and Southfield added another run in the top of the seveth on a hit, a throwing error and an infield

But the Mustangs had one last chance and they made the most of it.

Despite the fact that they had to settle for a tie, the Mustangs controlled almost every aspect of the game against North Farmington.







Other challenging holes include the par five, 590yard fourth hole and number seven, a 460-yard par four. Number 13, a par four,

430-yard challenge, is one of the most picturesque, as well as difficult holes at Salem Hills. A pond borders the left

Golf Architect W. **Bruce Matthews of Grand** Haven designed both Salem Hills and Godwin

golf courses included in Golf Digest's top 50. The latter is located in South Lyon, just six miles from the Salem course.

Both courses were built by Horace Godwin and Szilzgyi serves as golf director at both.

"I was very proud to be part of the team that developed the golf courses," Szilagyi said. "(Horace) Godwin built a super course and his demand for excellence in maintenance has really paid off.

"We began reseeding the fairways in 1974-75 and are just now seeing the fruits of our efforts."

Godwin, currently on vacation (golfing) in North Carolina, was not available to comment on the recent top 50 selection. But his son Frank, who this year took over management of the Salem Hills course, shared his reaction.

"I was astounded and thrilled when I heard the news," he said. "I was in charge of greens maintenance since 1975 and was really pleased to hear that our course was selected.

According to a letter from the selection committee - addressed to Szilagyi - the courses were judged primarily on excellence of design and conditioning.

The executive directors of 40 regional sections of the Professional Golf Association of America, the executive directors of 51 state and regional amateur golf associations and the 101 men and women who make up the USGA's two pubic links committees determined the top 50 courses.

Salem Hills and Godwin Glenn also share the distinction of being the

Glenn, the only Michigan only two public courses selected to host qualifying rounds for the U.S. Open Golf Tournament. (Qualifying rounds normally are played only at private courses).

The Michigan Open qualifying has been held at Salem Hills every year since 1973. Salem Hills also hosted The Michigan Publinx Pre-Qualifying in
