Kevin Kless wins First Baby title

Kevin Alexander Kless, born at 5:59 a.m. January 4, has captured Northville's 1982 First Baby title becoming the 26th winner in the annual competition.

The new arrival is the second child of Fred and Carolyn Kless of 16643 Old Bedford and is a new baby brother to older sister Denise, 2.

Weighing six pounds, 15 ounces, Kevin's arrival marked the second birth at St. Mary Hospital in the new year.

The birth was called into The Record Monday morning by the baby's proud father, Mrs. Judith Kazia, afternoon supervisor at St. Mary, confirmed the birth Monday afternoon.

As the 1982 First Baby, Kevin will take the crown from last year's winner Lisa Ann Katz-

beck, daughter of Michael and Sun Katzbeck.

The Katzbecks currently are living in Panama, where Lisa's father is stationed with the U.S. Army. According to Lisa's grandmother Mary Katzbeck of 906 Novi Street, Michael Katzbeck left for Panama shortly after Lisa's birth on January 4.

The family joined him in March.

Council votes 3-2 to let fence stand

After a lengthy public hearing to consider an appeal of the Northville Planning Commission's decision to allow a fence to remain in North Lexington Condos subdivision, Northville City Council upheld the commission decision Monday night by a three-two vote.

As they had done at five previous sessions of the planning commission, representatives of the Lexington Commons Homeowners Association, the condos association and the Northville Lexington Condos board argued their points.

After more than two hours of testimony and questioning, councilmembers Carolann Ayers, J. Burton DeRusha and G. Dewey Gardner voted to permit the five-foot high privacy fence to remain along the Lexington road into the subdivision off Taft.

Mayor Paul Vernon and councilman Paul Folino voted against allowing it to remain. It had been erected in violation of subdivision restrictions when Republic Corporation took over the uncompleted project.

"Errors have been made on everyone's part—including the city's," declared Ayers as she noted that the commission's decision to permit the fence to remain with stipulated landscaping (already installed by Republic) has effected a compromise.

"It is impossible to get it all sorted out; I don't see any other equitable solution," she stated after the council heard testimony from condo owners who bought thinking the fence was permanent. They wished it to remain, it was stated, for privacy.

Owners of both homes and condos in the first portion of the development stated they had purchased in Lexington because of the open space plan. Pam Joels, association by-laws chairman, said she was told by the then-building inspector that the fence was to be temporary.

Republic representatives denied that there had been any conversation about its being temporary and claimed they had been told no permit was needed as it was on private property.

Tammy (Tamera) Church of 1004 Saratoga Court, stated she sat on both the commons association and condos boards, and stressed that the development had a restriction that only or-

namental fencing three feet high or less or swimming pool fencing (required by law) could be erected.

She displayed photographs of the fence which she said had just been taken, showing "it obviously is not straight." She accused Republic of erecting it in 1980 without a permit. When another fence was requested last year, permission was denied and the company was directed to remove the existing one. It did not.

Church said her concerns were that she fears a precedent will be set in allowing the fence to remain and that "it's going to create an alleyway appearance."

She added that "many purchased because of the open area concept and would like to see it continued." She showed original drawings of the plans with the open areas.

Robert James, a resident of the North Lexington Condos and a representative of that board, told the council he was one of seven who bought with the fence in place and feel "it does give privacy." He said that "otherwise our living and dining rooms would be like a fishbowl. Headlights will shine right into the rooms."

He said the planning commissioners had an "expert" (consultant Ronald Nino) look into the situation and that he had felt the solution was to landscape the fence with plantings, which Republic immediately did.

James added that he had "counted some 68 privacy fences along patios, etc., of other subdivision residences."

He said he felt the plantings were a "reasonable compromise."

"When we purchased 10 years ago," Joels objected, "we saw an open park concept. I feel strongly that a hedge fence is what we want."

It was pointed out at the hearing that it would be impossible to erect a berm because of the configuration and heights of the buildings along the fence.

Barry Stolberg, Republic vice president, said the firm had paid \$2,100 for the fence and had "showed it to the building inspector who asked that it be reduced a foot to five feet."

He said Republic would not have spent that amount on a temporary

Postal delivery slowed to await road plowing

Ninety percent of the residents served by Northville post office received their mail during the final days of December in spite of heavy snowfall early in this 1981-82 winter, according to postal officials.

"Most residents are getting their mail," the post office reported last Thursday as the community was digging out from the first two weeks of real snow this season.

The city DPW crews were working steadily to remove mounds of snow from parking lots to the city DPW yard on Gerald. There it accumulates into a mountain during the winter.

Two trucks and a snow loader had been operating to catch up with the inches of snow.

Monday an Edison transformer was knocked out by the severe winds, leaving the city hall area without heat and lights for a time during the afternoon.

Township board must consider charter

Under legal statute, the township's board of trustees will consider charter township status at the first meeting of 1982, but few believe anything will come of it.

Under Michigan law a charter township board is authorized to levy up to five mills in property tax, can sell and acquire land without a vote of the people and is given supposed protection from annexation, although the latter has been called into question recently.

State law requires the board to consider the charter issue each time a census shows population of more than 5,000. With the 1980 census figure of

roughly 13,000 as a trigger, the matter has been placed on the agenda for the January 14 meeting.

Similar consideration was required in 1977, after a special 1976 census.

There are basically four alternatives available to the board. It can:

- ★ choose to become a charter township by board vote, in which case residents may file a petition to place the issue on an upcoming ballot instead;
- ★ place the issue on the ballot directly and have voters decide;
- ★ reject charter township status outright;
- ★ or simply receive and file the state's

notice, taking no action.

The latter course is most likely according to Clerk Susan Heintz, who pointed out she was nonetheless required to publish notice that residents have a right to referendum against any move by the township to adopt charter status.

Should the board choose to become a charter township on its own authority (the single most unlikely alternative) residents could petition to have the issue placed on a ballot instead.

Assuming the board rejects the charter idea, however, residents do not have the right to referendum in favor of the proposal. Petitions gathered favoring a charter would only be advisory to the board, which would have final authority to place the issue on a ballot or not.

Charter township status was pursued by several members of the previous board, but proponents never gathered sufficient trustee support to place the issue on the ballot, let alone adopt a charter without a vote of the residents. A 1979 vote of 3-3 with one member absent was the closest approach to adopting a charter.

The latter effort evolved into the formation of the present professional manager organization as an alternative response to increased expectations from government as the township grows. The basic organization, however, still revolves around Michigan's general law township form.

Although the five mill taxing authority automatically given a charter township is attractive in some ways for a government struggling to pay the bills, there is some doubt whether state law would any longer allow such a levy with no resident vote.

The 1978 Headlee amendment to the

state constitution restricts property tax increases when there is no vote of the people.

At the very least, most contend, residents would have to vote on the charter (a state-mandated one for all such townships) before the government could get such taxing power.

Effective in December, 1982, Northville Township will be authorized to levy 3.7 mills of property tax (before Headlee Amendment rollbacks).

Many townships adopted charter status in the 1970s under the impression that adjoining cities would no longer be able to annex township land easily, but recent events in Oakland County, where Walled Lake has annexed industrial lands formerly a part of the Charter Township of Commerce indicate the degree of protection was overstated.

The legal tangle there is not yet unwound, but to date the township side of the dispute has been losing and Commerce officials are even looking toward incorporation as a separate city as a final alternative.

Charter townships, in addition to taxing and land acquisition authority, also are relieved of some publishing restrictions. The charter form has been thought most appropriate for townships in urban areas where demand for services is strongest.

Northville Township last year dropped its membership in the Michigan Townships Association and joined a new group representing urban and charter townships because board members perceived greater benefits from alignment with other large townships.

The present board, however, has made no attempt to join neighboring Plymouth and Canton townships in adopting the charter form.

City precincts consolidated in Oakland County section

City Precincts Two and Three, both located in the Oakland County portion of Northville, are to be merged to make the election operation smoother and more economical, at the suggestion of City Clerk Joan McAllister.

A public hearing was held during Monday night's council meeting to consider establishing the city as one ward with two precincts. Following the hearing the council voted unanimously to have only two city precincts.

Precincts Two and Three both have been voting at Amerman Elementary, McAllister pointed out. They now become Precinct Two and will continue to vote at Amerman.

Previously, Precinct Three was the portion of the city west of Taft and north of Eight Mile while Precinct Two was the portion east of Taft.

About two years ago, the clerk obtained the merger of two precincts in the Wayne County portion of the city into Precinct One. Because development of two subdivisions on the north side of Eight Mile west of Taft was expected at that time, the clerk explained that she left two Oakland County city precincts.

Since development does not appear to be in the immediate future, the merger into Precinct Two was sought for reasons of economy and smoothness of operation.

She added that she can handle up to 2999 voters in the new operation, which also frees machines for absentee ballot count. She estimated also that up to two election workers may be saved in the merger.

The hearing technically was to adopt an amendment to the city code of ordinances.

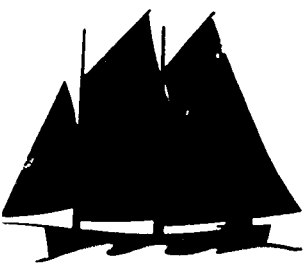

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She's appointed volunteer director

Would you like to be the liaison aide between a patient in a hospital emergency room and the worried family?

Have you always thought it would be rewarding to volunteer at the informa-

tion desk of a hospital? This volunteer work is available at Providence Hospital and, in her new position as director of volunteer services for Providence, Northville resident Jeanne Federspill is looking for both men and women with time and

talent to contribute to the hospital in Southfield and its Novi ambulatory care facility.

"Our volunteers are valued members of the hospital's health care team," she explains.

Federspill's appointment to the directorship is announced by Sister Xavier Ballance, hospital administrator.

In her new position, Federspill has the responsibility for managing the hospital's volunteer programs, including Our Lady of Providence League, the American Red Cross hospital volunteers and Junior Red Cross volunteers.

A member of the Providence staff since 1971, she first served as assistant director of community relations and most recently as assistant director of development.

"When the vacancy occurred (for director of volunteers)," Jeanne Federspill says, "I applied and was pleased to receive the appointment — it's a new direction and a challenge."

As head of the hospital's volunteer corps that totals almost 500, she presently is seeking to fill needs for evening and weekend volunteers.

When a would-be volunteer comes in, Federspill explains, "We tell what's available and offer a choice."

Volunteers, she says, serve in many areas including the Outpatient Surgery Center, the delivery room, emergency department, information desks, gift shop, flower and gift cart and other places.

"They do not replace paid staff but supplement the hospital's health care in ways that cannot be purchased. They bring the concern of a friend, a neighbor, a person who has time to listen," she illustrates.

Men, she suggests, are especially good in the emergency room, helping keep the family informed of what is happening.

Volunteers are required to work a minimum of four hours a week at either the main hospital or the Novi facility.

One man, Federspill mentions, has found that volunteering at Providence is the answer for his retirement. A retired school principal, he found staying home very difficult, Federspill recalls, and now comes in five days a week to volunteer.

Women volunteers are not usually doctors' wives, she adds, but are most likely to be women whose children are grown.

People interested in volunteering at either the main hospital or at the Novi facility may call Federspill at 424-3300.

In her new position she expects to use both her community relations and fundraising background. She is head of the gift shop operation with its manager reporting to her.

She notes that the shop is "a very good operation," bringing in more than \$78,000 annually that is used for hospital projects.

The new volunteer services director herself has a strong background in volunteering. She was president of the Livonia League of Women Voters before she and her husband Jack moved to Northville Estates 13 years ago. They have three children.

She later served as vice president of the Northville, Plymouth, Canton and Novi League in which she still is a member.

She also served on the Schoolcraft College women's resource committee and worked in the Northville PTA.

Two hurt in Seven Mile collision

A citation for failure to yield to oncoming traffic was issued to a Livonia man in a two-car collision at Seven Mile and Silver Springs Drive December 18. Both drivers suffered severe injuries.

Theodore Stowell, 74, of Livonia told state police from the Northville Post he was westbound on Seven Mile and waiting to make a left turn into the National Bank of Detroit branch driveway just before the 5:10 p.m. accident.

Police said a car in the eastbound left turn lane may have blocked Stowell's view of eastbound traffic, and he completed the left turn, striking an eastbound car driven by Richard Estes, 28, of Davisburg, Michigan.

Both drivers were taken to Botsford Hospital by Novi Ambulance with incapacitating injuries, police said. Neither was wearing seatbelts when

Stowell's 1964 sedan struck head-on into the left front quarter of Estes' 1975 Chevrolet Monza. There were no other occupants in either car.

Estes said he was driving eastbound approaching the traffic signal and the next thing he remembered was medical personnel working on him in his car.

Witnesses in the vehicle waiting to turn left onto Silver Springs told state police they saw Stowell make the left

turn into the car driven by Estes.

Police adjudged the impact a severe one. Estes' car ended up on the lawn in front of the NBD branch and Stowell's car spun around and was facing eastbound when police arrived.

Stowell was issued a traffic citation for failure to yield to oncoming traffic. State police Troopers Dennis Betts and Greg Matfey were assisted at the accident scene by township police.

Four local teens suspected in thefts

In the township...

Township police are seeking warrants this week charging four local youths with larceny from vehicles in the Grandview Acres subdivision area late December 27 and early December 28.

The four males, two 17 and two 16, were apprehended and confessed to taking items from inside vehicles parked on Marilyn, Maxwell and Fry roads north of Seven Mile.

According to police reports, items were found missing from five vehicles in the neighborhood and Christmas tree lights were damaged at one Oppollo residence. The four Northville High School students are listed as suspects in all six incident reports.

Apprehended on suspicion of one incident, the youths told police of several thefts that the owners of the items had

ence. The fence, it was stated, was erected to hide construction rubble and assist in selling the north section units.

He assured the audience and council that Republic would not erect any other fencing. Members of the audience, however, said they felt the precedent had been set and that "second owners or groups" could seek to do so later.

Richard Wilhelm, 501 Morgan Circle, vice president of the Lexington Homeowners Association, said his concern was that no precedent be set.

James presented a petition signed by 54 home owners who said they had no objection to the fencing. Members of the audience questioned whether some signatures were those of husband and wife, pointing out that the associations have set a rule of one signature per household.

DeRusha who had attended the sessions of the planning commission dealing with the fence noted that the new developers had made configuration changes to provide two car garages, requiring that certain elevations be straightened.

"I think you have to remember the discussion that led up to the decision. What happens if the fence is removed and if planting is not done?" He explained that the planting was part of the compromise with Republic.

Planning commission member Luke Durst told the council it had been "a very difficult decision to make."

A letter was read from Stewart Kissinger, site plan committee chairman of the commission, who came late to the

hearing. It stated that the fence had been constructed of treated wood as recommended but that "anchorage" of certain posts as well as alignment is questionable. Additional vertical supports were suggested to rectify this.

"The coniferous plantings that have been installed by the developer...clearly indicate the developer's intent to comply with the recommendations of the planning commission. Although these plantings very adequately obscure the fence, it would be advisable for the developer to initiate a maintenance program to assure that their growth is not obstructive to traffic in the future."

Jay Wendt of the planning commission also was in the audience of about 28 who braved the windy night to attend.

Wendt said the builder was "looking to us for help" and the plantings were a solution.

Folino noted he personally had inspected the fencing that night and said the landscaping did not hide the fence from the east and west ends from Yorktown Court.

Vernon stated he felt from his observation that the fence was of questionable quality material and said that "while there has to be an appreciation of cost, the council has to overlook the investment in making a decision."

He then asked the city attorney if the council did have the right to hear an appeal of a site plan modification. Attorney Philip Ogilvie said it was within the council's province.

The hearing was closed at 10:22 p.m. and the vote taken.

complaints of snowy and icy road conditions were made to township hall, where officials routed all to the road commission.

Last year, local records indicate, two delivery vehicles were damaged while postal employees tried to deliver mail under such conditions.

Therefore, the decision was made not to attempt delivery in Lakes of Northville until the streets were plowed.

Residential streets are at the bottom of the road commission's priority list after major and secondary thoroughfares and the township's location in the extreme northwest corner of the county has long been blamed for infrequent plowing of local subdivisions.

Mail must go through

Whatever happened to the post office motto that the mail must go through? queried a long-time resident recently. He recalled days when a local undertaker bragged about receiving mail addressed simply "Freddy the undertaker. Northville, Michigan."

Such stories about local pride in delivering letters addressed only to an individual in "Northville, Michigan" once were part of the tradition that went along with the determination that neither sleet nor hail will stay the postman on his appointed rounds."

It's almost a certainty that such tales are soon to be part of our folklore, not to be repeated.

The reason, as new Northville Postmaster Wallace Cates is quick to explain, lies in one word — automation. In the future automated sorters will process as many as 30,000 letters an hour. Right now the Detroit post office is trying for 1,000 an hour.

The rule is to be deliver "as addressed," the postmaster affirms. Therefore, if your business happens to be located at 637 Baseline and mail is directed to 673 (probably a transposition of typing fingers) the mail won't be delivered but will have a yellow sticker marked "return to sender — not deliverable as addressed" affixed.

We understand the program and the need for automation, but at the local level, when a piece of mail comes into the Northville post office and has to be read, doesn't anybody try to deliver it? Don't local postal workers know names and streets and businesses?

Apparently not. It is difficult not to wonder about the writers of those federal regulations who do not want to believe there can be any local effort to deliver mail to firms that today need help with their business, not a "return to sender" attitude.

One Ford's still here

Countering the bleak economic news late there have been occasional glimmers of hope, including efforts in Lansing to better the state's business climate. Locally, the good year-end news was that there still will be one Ford in Northville's future. Ford Motor Company's decision December 1 that keeps John Mach Ford Sales in business here is a proper one.

John Mach, Sr., is to be commended for standing firm in his intention of retaining the business as a family dealership here. The automotive giant's desire to locate an area agency at Twelve Oaks in Novi, based on a 1979 marketing survey, is understandable — but doesn't take into account the assets accumulated during 60 years of being in business in the community.

Rumors had been circulating for some time that Ford would not continue the Northville franchise. Mach explains that Ford wished him to move to Twelve

Oaks, and, when he refused, at first stated the dealership could not be handed on to sons John and Bruce. Fortunately, Ford reconsidered.

Mach now is looking ahead to staying in Northville. The dealership opened in Northville in 1921 as one of 7,000 in the country. It has had several owners with Mach starting as manager under Marr Taylor, who owned the business from 1954-59. It was expanded from its West Main location to the present one on Seven Mile in 1965, with another expansion in the new location in 1969.

Also hopeful is the statement that Ford does intend to open a Ford dealership at Twelve Oaks as soon as the economy improves. A spokesman was hopeful it could be mid-1982.

While the valve plant's closing a week from Friday is a blow we all will feel, it could have been worse. At least one Ford sign remains.

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Speaking of ... holiday travels

In addition to the changes of scene or the holiday reunion that travel brings, there always has been a side benefit for me. I'm continually surprised at how universal our problems, especially urban ones, have become — and how many interests and trends are not at all unique to our home area.

For example, while touring in England in November I noticed the police headquarters in the little town of Dartmouth was closed one evening. A large sign on the office door gave a dispatch number to call in an emergency after office hours.

For the past several months the city and township have been discussing the possibility of a shared police dispatch service. Concern was voiced that, if the township provided the service for the city, the city hall police department would be unattended at night. Apparently, Dartmouth residents were accustomed to "calling in" after hours.

To the north, the City of Harrowgate seems to have licked the problem of long-time parking on the city center streets if parking meters are eliminated, as Northville has just done.

Merchants whose stores front the main streets have "parking discs" available. The five by five-inch card with clock disc is to be set at the time of arrival in the parking spot and is to be displayed in the car window "nearest kerb." Signs on the street indicate how long parking is permitted.

"You have committed an offence if (the card warns) a. you park and fail to display the disc. b. you indicate a false time of arrival or subsequently alter it. c. you fail to remove the vehicle on expiry of the permitted parking time," the disc reads.

Such a card leaves no doubt about the parking arrangement — and also manages a plug for the town, calling it "Finest holiday centre for exploring and discovering Yorkshire's Moors, Dales, historic ruins and hospitality."

A "fun" bonus of this trip was an early stop at Lyme Regis, considered one of the prettiest towns on the South Channel. The townspeople were flocking to the town's only theatre which was playing "The French Lieutenant's Woman." It had been filmed in

A staffer there observed, "A sort of Parkinson's law seemed to be at work: inmates increase to meet cell capacity."

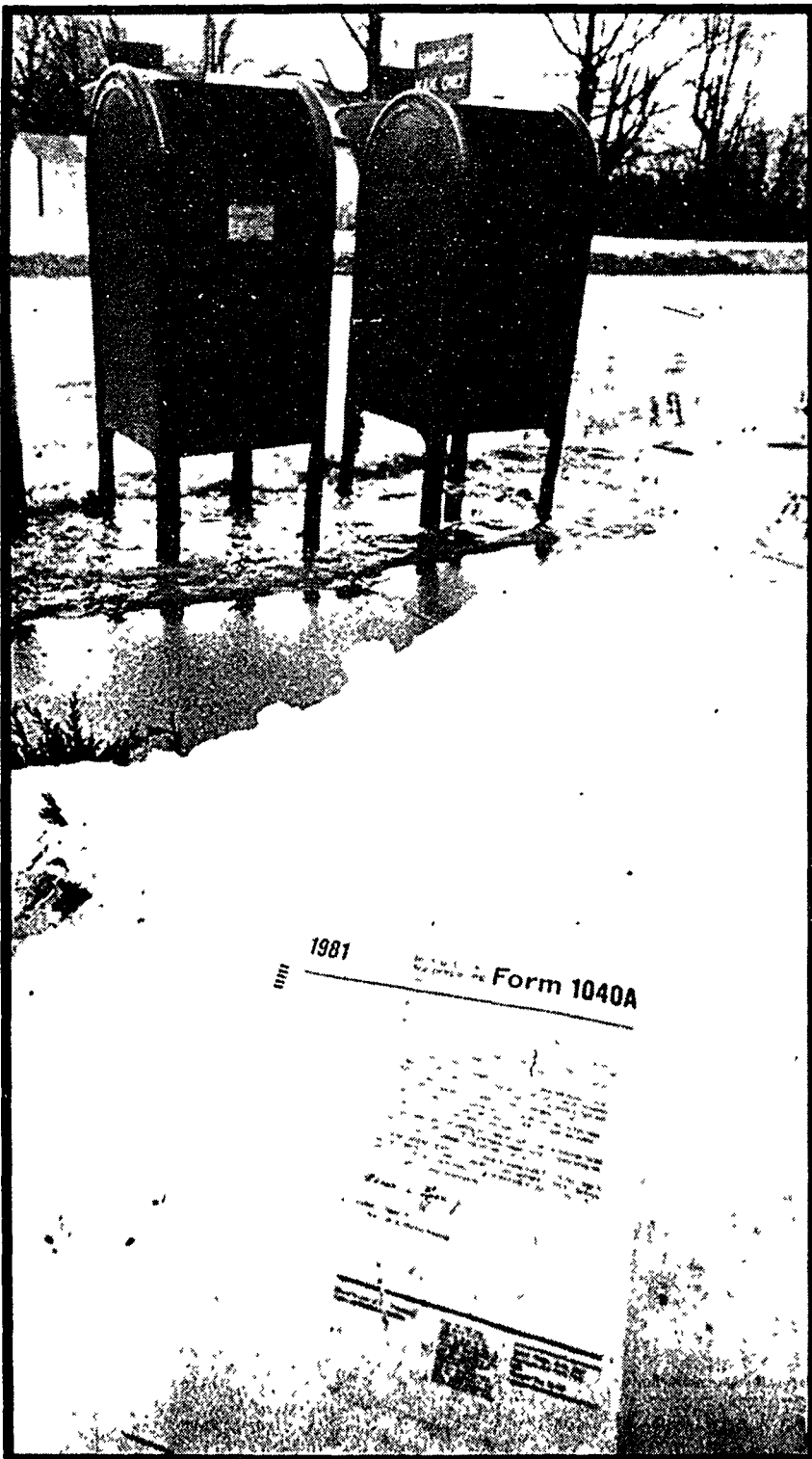

On Oakland County commission

Mayor endorses Calandro for board post

Northville resident John P. Calandro, who has announced he is seeking the seat on the Oakland County Board of Commissioners being vacated by Dennis L. Murphy, received the endorsement of Mayor Paul Vernon at Monday night's council meeting.

Murphy, a Republican from Novi, has stated he intends to resign the post at the commission's January 21 meeting with the resignation to be effective January 31.

Murphy is said to be resigning for

professional and personal reasons, and has cited pressure of his new duties as senior vice president of Bank of the Commonwealth.

To date Calandro and G. Sue Knapp of Lyon Township are the only two announced candidates for the post.

Calandro, who lives with his wife Peggy and daughter Kristin at 1020 Allen Drive, has been a Northville resident since 1975.

"My intent is to seek to serve the people of the 24th District which takes in

the Oakland County portion of Northville as well as Novi, Wixom, South Lyon and part of Farmington Hills," Calandro told the council. He said he plans to attend council sessions of the communities within the district regularly.

Vernon, in introducing his neighbor, said he is hopeful that Calandro will receive the appointment (to be made by the other Oakland commissioners) and said he "would welcome having a representative from our city on the Oakland County Board of Commissioners."

During the 1980 primary Calandro served as co-chairman of the 19th District, George Bush for President Campaign. He was elected an alternate delegate to the Republican National Convention in 1980.

"After the selection of Ronald Reagan as the Republican presidential candidate, I served on the Oakland County Reagan-Bush Committee," he recalls.

A graduate of Michigan State University where he received his BS degree in Labor and Industrial Relations, Calandro says his first Republican Party activity began as a member of the Young Republicans on campus in the mid-1960s.

He is employed by the No-Sag Spring Division of Lear Siegler, Incorporated, as division manager of industries at 11

plants in the U.S. and Canada.

Born March 18, 1946, Calandro served for 15 months in Vietnam with the U.S. Military Intelligence.

Since moving to Oakland County in 1975, he points out, he has been involved in several election campaigns for Republican candidates. Has been a campaign worker, fund raiser and campaign co-chairman.

Calandro has been a member of the Oakland County Executive Committee since 1978 and has served as a precinct delegate and area director from Northville for the past four years. He is an active member of the Northville and Novi Republican clubs.

"My non-partisan government activities include four years on the Employers Association Detroit Government Affairs Committee and Government Affairs Advisor for the Ferndale Chamber of Commerce. I have also been active through the Michigan Manufacturers Association in several legislative hearings and have presented testimony before various legislative committees," Calandro states.

Prior to joining Lear Siegler in 1977 Calandro was with Illinois Tool Works and Ford Motor Company.

He is a runner, and says he runs regularly about 6 a.m. in the morning through the west part of the city. He also lists camping and skiing as hobbies.

News from Lansing

There are between 15,000 and 30,000 "head shops" legally selling drug paraphernalia in this country today.

While education and public awareness of the harmful effects of drugs is the long-range answer to society's addiction problems, our laws are sending a mixed signal defeating attempts to de-glamorize the drug culture.

The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration in

the Department of Justice has asked the states to take action. A model act was written for the states to emulate in legislation, if they so desire.

Approximately 22 states have already passed versions of this Drug Enforcement Administration Model Law, and the courts have been active in testing the constitutionality of each version. Michigan should join them.

In November the Senate agreed, passing Senate Bill 175, which prohibits the sale of paraphernalia intended to be used in conjunction with illegal drugs. Possession of such items is not prohibited, only the sale. The law aims specifically at this parasitic industry that thumbs its nose at the law and depends for existence on a successful, local illegal drug distribution operation.

Our laws should not send such mixed signals to the public. Condoning the drug paraphernalia industry while state and federal policy is to make illegal the sale and possession of controlled substances breeds disrespect for the law and glamorizes the abuse of drugs.

We have allowed an insidious little industry on the fringes of legal acceptance to mushroom into a multi-billion dollar business, because these shops don't perform the actual distribution of illegal substances, only the paraphernalia to be used with them.

They openly cater to a young market, promoting their wares (and, by inference, drugs) among rock records, blue jeans, T-shirts and posters. Often a small counter at the back of a youth clothing store displays and sells these items, conveniently marketing en- tree into the drug culture along with the latest, harmless teenage clothing fad. They operate in many of the shopping malls in my district, right next to department stores, shoe stores, clothing shops and toy stores.

I supported Senate Bill 175. It has been sent to the House of Representatives for concurrence or further debate.

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City tables request for dance permit

Action on a request from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission to approve or disapprove the request of James D. Rea for a dance permit in conjunction with a 1981 Class C license at the Winner's Circle Bar at 111-113 West Main was tabled by city council Monday until more information is available.

Councilmember G. Dewey Gardner asked for a report from the police department of activity at the bar since Rea had assumed ownership.

The council indicated it would study the report to see if the bar now is a police "trouble spot" before forwarding approval or disapproval to the liquor control commission.

City Manager Steven Walters told the council, "You can approve or disapprove the request without having to justify."

The council indicated it would like to have a valid reason to take action at all.

Tom Lenaghan, city fire inspector, sent a report to the council that he had inspected the bar on December 21 with Fire Chief James Allen and Lieutenant Louis Westfall of the Northville Police Department.

The inspection was to fulfill requirements of the liquor control commission and the city in reference to the application to have dancing at the Winner's Circle.

Rea was given a list of their recommendations. They include removing or replacing existing curtains with fire resistant types; installing an exit sign at the top of the middle hall with lighting; removal or reversal of thumb latch door lock on door at hall in rear.

The inspector also stated that table and chairs in front of the dance area would have to be removed.

The inspection also revealed that electrical wiring in the rear storage area would have to be okayed and emergency lighting in the rear stairway would have to be installed. No smoking sign for the dance area as well as a dance area sign, Rea was told, would be required.

He also was notified that the dance floor would have to be illuminated.

The council was told that the above corrections have not yet been made at the bar.

The council asked the city manager to notify Rea that it had not made a recommendation to the control commission and to tell him that it was requesting the police activity report before doing so. It suggested Rea be warned before he makes any improvements solely to obtain the dance permit.

"It's a fitting tribute to the Northville Jaycees," commented Mayor Paul Vernon Monday night as city council unanimously approved signs to be erected by the local Jaycees calling attention to the fact that January 17-23 is Jaycee Week.

After tuning up with a scrimmage at Novi last week Tuesday, the Northville girls' volleyball team is ready to begin regular season action at 6 p.m. tonight against Western Six Conference tri-champion Livonia Churchill at home.

The Mustangs held their own against Novi and Western in their first confrontations, McDonald said, and played better against them in the rematch.

The Bishop Borgess match was the one McDonald thought the team played best, and he thought his squad played better than Redford Union.

There are two players McDonald may have back on the roster in a couple of weeks when House returns. Kris Petit and Tracy Wilkinson still are out with finger injuries, but could return soon.

Gymnasts face WLC

It has been a long wait, but the start of the regular season finally arrived for the Northville girls' gymnastics team Tuesday.

Tough road games ahead for cagers

"It certainly does not get any easier."

Northville boys' basketball coach Tim Lutes hammered the nail on the head with that statement assessing the Mustangs' next three ball games.

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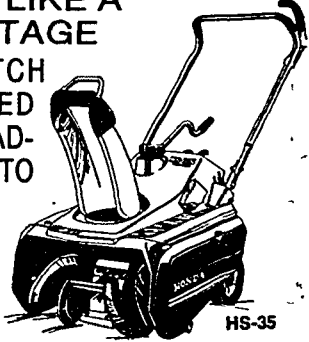

Ordinance No. 81-81.04

Notice is hereby given that on December 21, 1981, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 81-81.04, an Ordinance to Amend Sections 1.031a, 2.5, 2.5a, 2.6, 2.7 and 9.3 of Ordinance No. 81-81.03 being the Uniform Traffic Code for Cities, Townships and Villages as Amended and Adopted by the City of Novi and to Add Sections 2.7a, 2.7b, 2.7c and 5.102 Thereto.

This Ordinance is declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and the following sections of Ordinance No. 81-81.04 being Section 1.031a School Bus; Section 2.5 Impounding of Vehicles; Authority, Procedure, Public Sale; Section 2.5a "Abandoned Vehicle" defined, Taking Abandoned Vehicles Into Custody, Authority, Procedure, Public Sale; Section 2.6 Notifying Local Police Agency Upon Removal of Vehicle from Private Property, Police Agency Duties Upon Notification, Unclaimed Vehicle; Section 2.7 "Registered Abandoned Scrap Vehicle" defined, Taking Registered Abandoned Scrap Vehicles Into Custody, Authority, Procedure, Scrapping Vehicles; Section 2.7a District Court Jurisdiction Regarding Impounded, Abandoned, or Registered Abandoned Scrap Vehicles; Section 2.7b Procedure Upon Receipt of Petition by Owner of Impounded or Abandoned Vehicle; Section 2.7c Procedure of Sale for Impounded or Abandoned Vehicle; Sale for Impounded and Abandoned Vehicles; and Section 9.3 Penalties; Civil Infraction and Misdemeanor, shall become effective immediately, the effective date is December 21, 1981, and Section 5.102 Child Restraint Systems, Inapplicability to Certain Persons, Inapplicability to Certain Vehicles, Penalty for Violation, Nonassessment of Points for Violation, Exemption from Requirement of Statute, shall become effective on January 1, 1982.

Blevins was the key figure in helping Schoolcraft past Mott and Alpena to gain a share of first place with Henry Ford. He averaged 27.5 points and 14 rebounds for the two games. It was his third Player of the Week honor and, along with being the conference's second-leading scorer and Schoolcraft being in first, he was named the Player of the Month.

His 25.8 scoring average after nine games is just one point shy of Alpena's Lou Rodgers' 26.8, who leads the league. Rodgers also was co-Player of the Week with Blevins.

The league's top two scorers met two weeks ago with Rodgers winning the personal scoring battle and Blevins' team winning the game.

Rodgers scored 39 points, but Alpena fell to Schoolcraft, 93-83, as Blevins burned the nets for 33 points and ripped down 15 rebounds. Phil Cooper added 21 points, four assists and six steals for the Ocelots.

Once again, Blevins was the main figure in Schoolcraft's triumph over the visiting Mott Bears, 83-74. Blevins pumped in 22 points, hauled down 13 rebounds and dished off four assists.

American auto industry ready to battle the imports

Is America's love affair with the automobile a thing of the past?

Not by a long shot, according to Marty Feldman, owner of the new Marty Feldman Chevrolet dealership on Grand River in Novi.

But, says Feldman, the relationship definitely needs reviving.

"It's our own fault," says Feldman of the extended slump in new car sales. "We allowed the excitement to get away."

"I remember when we used to make a big deal out of the new model lines. You remember, tarps over the cars while they were being delivered on the trucks to the dealerships...blinds over

the windows so nobody could see the new cars until they were officially unveiled.

"I can remember people following the trucks to the dealership or peering through cracks in the blinds on the windows — trying to get a glimpse of the new automobiles."

"But we stopped doing that. We unveiled our new lines without making a big deal about it."

"What we did is rained on our own parade; we took the excitement out of it."

"The only thing new and exciting was being offered by the imports. The domestic auto industry allowed the excitement to slip away from its own automobiles."

"America is still in love with the automobile. The love affair isn't over. We've just got to put the excitement back in the relationship."

Feldman and his new car sales manager, Joe Hood of New Hudson, are convinced the domestic industry has learned its lesson and the excitement will return in 1982.

The key, according to Hood, is getting the message about the new cars out to the public.

There has been so much emphasis on the imports, the state of the economy and high interest rates that people have developed pre-conceived notions about automobiles — preconceived notions that can be easily dispelled by taking

the time to visit a dealership and see what's available, says Hood.

"The industry has changed so much in the last three years that people just don't know what's available."

"People are walking around with the feeling that imports are a superior product to domestic automobiles, but it just isn't true any more," he continued.

"The whole domestic industry has been re-tooled over the past three years. All we have to do now is get people in here to see the mileage and quality available on domestic automobiles. We have mid-sized family cars that will get 40 miles to the gallon."

"For people who like muscle cars, we have cars that look like muscle cars, perform like muscle cars and still get 25 miles to the gallon."

"People have been told the domestic auto industry is depressed for so long that they've stopped coming by the showrooms to see just exactly what's available."

"We have cars right now that don't cost any more than a garden tractor. Our new Chevette Diesel gets 55 miles to the gallon."

"The American auto industry has met the challenge. We've re-tooled and our new cars are every bit as good if not better than the imports. All we've got to do now is get the American public out in the showrooms to look at what's here."

Feldman's new Chevrolet dealership has been open approximately two months. The decision to open a new dealer point at a time when other dealerships across the country were being closed

raised more than a few eyebrows, but Feldman still believes it was a wise move.

"We delivered 125 units — new and used — in November, but December has not been a good month for us or any other automobile dealership," reported Feldman.

"But I'm definitely optimistic about the future. We've met a lot of people from as far away as Brighton and Howell who are interested in new cars and I think they're going to move from being shoppers to buyers now that Christmas is over."

"There are a lot of old cars on the road — more cars are being scrapped right now than are being built — and people are finding that it makes a lot more sense to purchase a new car than try to repair the old one."

"There's a real shortage of quality used cars right now, and people also are finding that dealers are willing to put a lot more money into trade-ins than they were previously. The fact of the matter is that we need good used cars."

"I think the first quarter of '82 will be better than the first quarter last year, and I look for things to start breaking

loose in the spring."

Feldman also believes that interest rates will not be a major problem to new car sales. "The difference between 12 and 16 percent interest is approximately \$15 per month," he notes. "Now that we've re-tooled and are getting greater mileage, the person who buys a new car will save at least \$15 per month in gasoline alone."

"The American public has got to realize it's creating a lot of its own problems," Feldman continues. "They're a little uneasy right now because they don't know what the future holds."

"The longer they stay away, the worse it's going to get. They're creating their own unemployment and economic uncertainty."

"But I feel good about the future," he adds. "I think we're going to start seeing things break loose during the second quarter — not so much out of want, but out of need."

"But once things start returning to normal, it's going to happen fast."

"I'm definitely optimistic about the domestic auto industry and our new dealership."

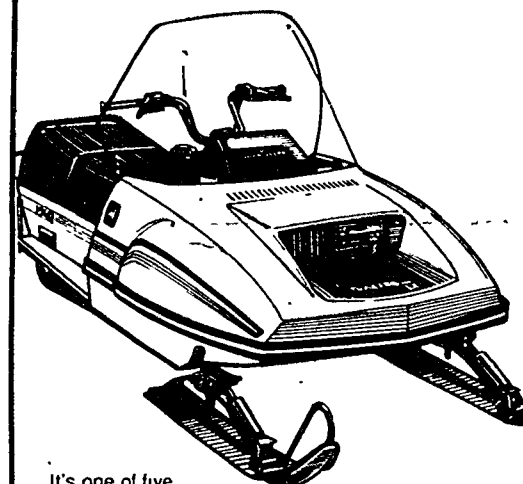

'Construction industry will be last to recover'

The construction industry will most likely be the last to pull out from under the recession's dark clouds, and it probably won't be until 1983.

"Our industry is in real trouble," said O.L. Pfaffmann, president of the Detroit Chapter of the Associated General Contractors of America.

"We've had unemployment levels of nearly 30 percent for all trades; dollar volumes are down some 35 percent across-the-board, and construction's share of the gross national product has declined from 10 percent to less than seven percent," he told the Detroit Economic Club recently.

While most industries are projecting better times for the second half of 1982, construction leaders are more pessimistic. "It is very questionable

that any improvement will be realized during the first half of 1982, and not much significant change is anticipated in the second half," Pfaffmann said.

Challenges which builders face in 1982 are high financing costs, needed legislative reforms and government spending for public roads.

"Next year's biggest loser will continue to be public works," Pfaffmann said. Michigan's Department of Transportation confirms our highways and bridges are in need of repairs and maintenance.

Michigan Road Builders Association has recommended some legislative action. By changing our road tax rates assessments systems, it would bolster sagging revenues caused by decreased auto usage and better gas mileage," he said.

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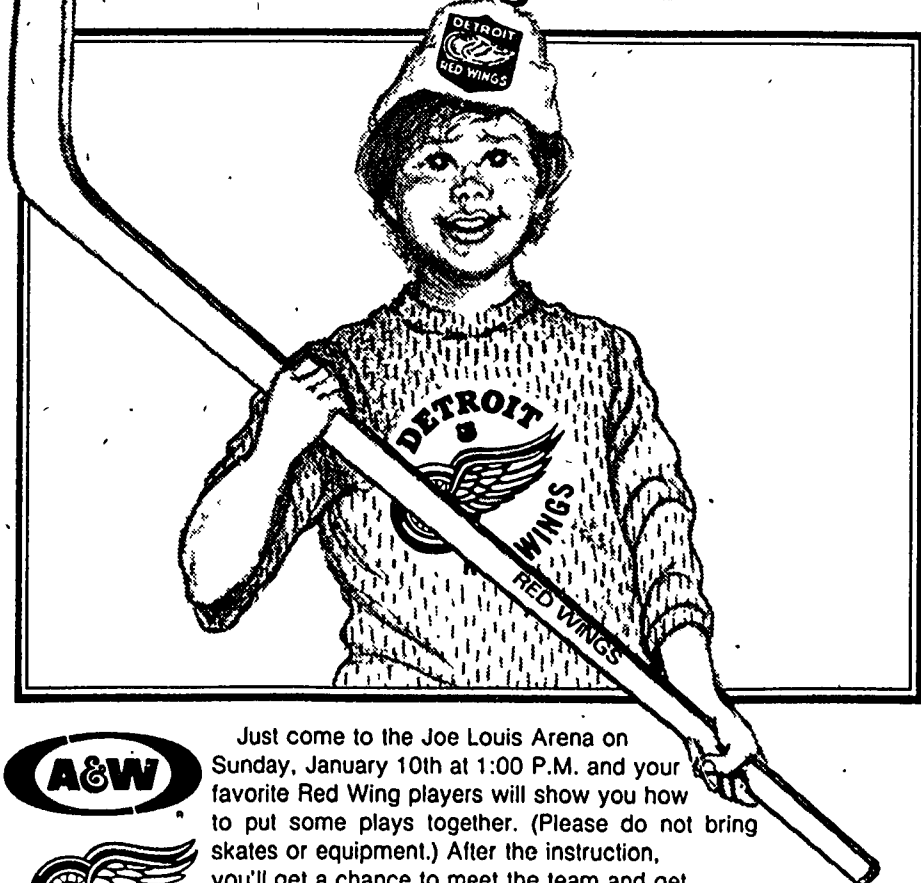

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At Greenfield Village

Interesting facets of history abound

Bellefontaine, Ohio is the proud owner of the first stretch of concrete road in America.

Built in 1892, the patch of smooth cement ran down the west side of Main Street, with a width of 10 feet and a full length of 200 feet.

Visitors to Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn can see other transportation firsts, including the first three-color, four-direction traffic lights and an 1896 Duryea, the only surviving example of America's first production gasoline-powered automobile.

Emma M. Nutt was America's first female telephone operator. She began work for the New England Bell Telephone Company September 1, 1878.

Telephone equipment from that pioneering era, including an 1878 Williams telephone substation, is part of the Communications Collection of Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn.

William Holmes McGuffey, well-known educator and author of the famous "McGuffey Readers," was born near Claysville, Pennsylvania on September 23, 1800.

Eventual sales of his "Readers," popular as a standard text for almost a century, topped 122 million. McGuffey's birthplace is now one of

the historic structures at Greenfield Village, Dearborn.

The first known American parade of automobiles took place September 7, 1899, at the fashionable spa of Newport, Rhode Island. Nineteen cars took part, driven by society leaders from New York, Boston and Philadelphia.

Mrs. Herman Oelrichs won a prize for her vehicle, which was draped in wisteria and featured a flock of white doves on the radiator "pulling" the car.

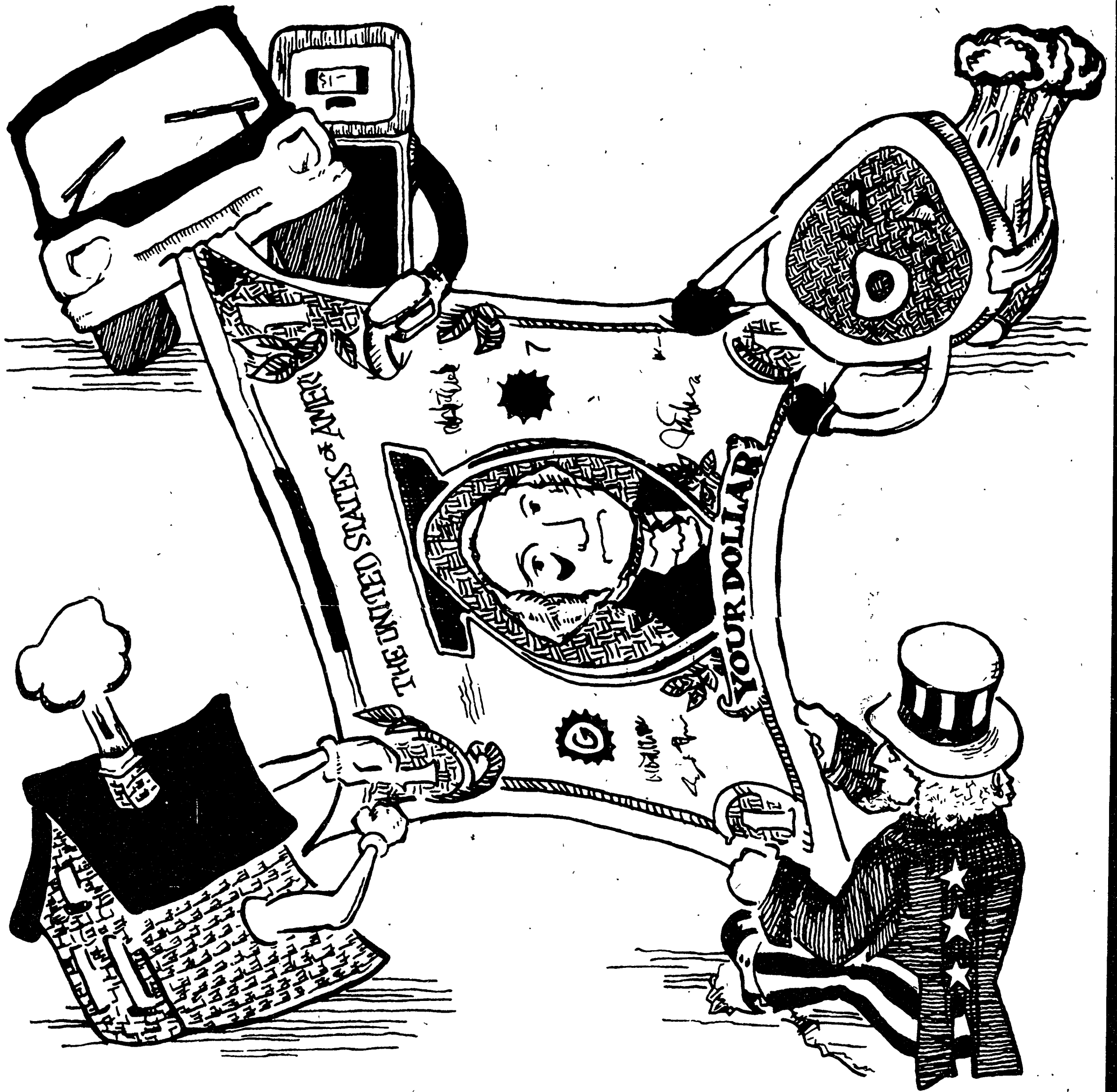
Greenfield Village of Dearborn offers its own old-time parade each year at the annual Old Car Festival, featuring more than 250 automobiles dating from 1896-1925.

September 12, 1873 was the date of the successful completion of the first practical typewriter by Christopher Sholes.

The first patent on the timesaving device was as early as 1829, but it wasn't until Sholes' machine — invented in 1867, patented the next year and finally produced five years later — that the ingenious device with four rows of keys became popular with the public.

Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn exhibits an 1874 model of Sholes' typewriter among thousands of fascinating artifacts from the nation's past.

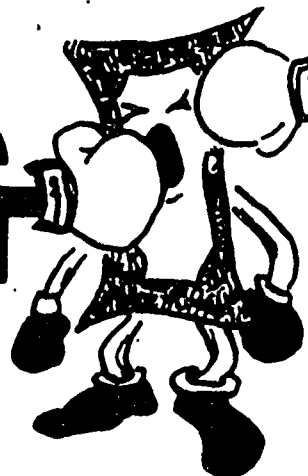

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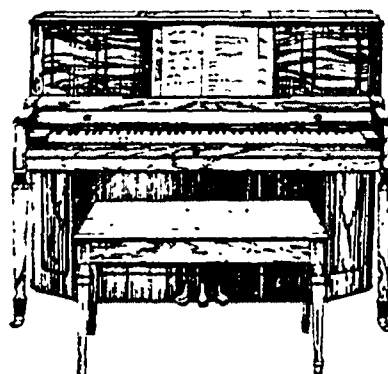

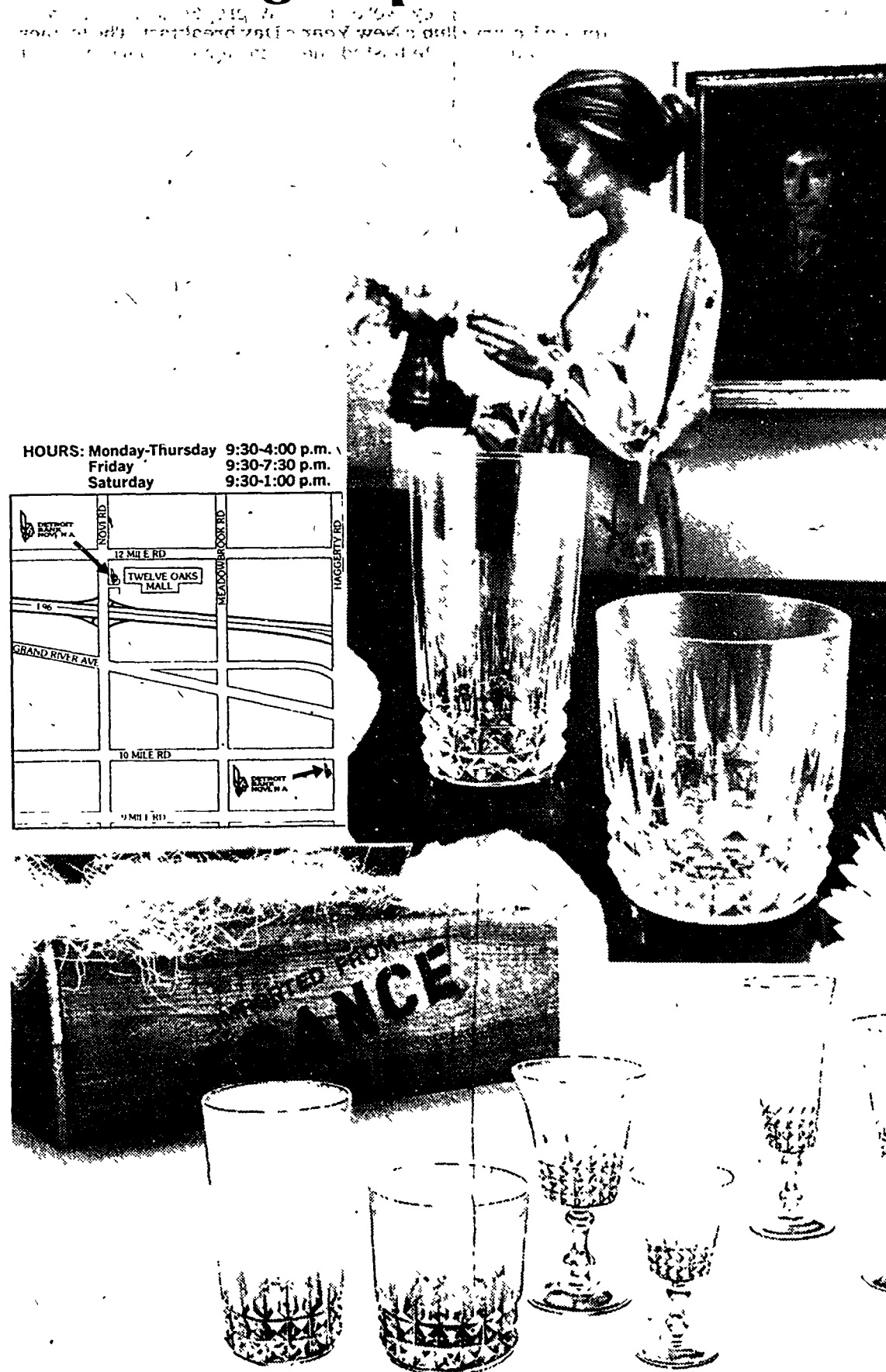
Local gymnastics team performs this weekend

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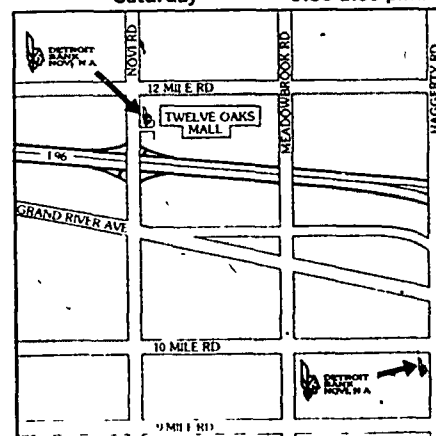

Bushnell to hold services in Mill Race

Northville Historical Society has agreed to open the New School Church in Mill Race Village for regular Sunday worship services.

Beginning this Sunday, Bushnell Congregational Church will hold its regular services in the New School Church in the hopes of "tightening the knot between the church and the Northville community," according to Bushnell pastor Dr. Robin Meyers.

While special services have been conducted in the New School Church including a bicentennial program, this is the first time that arrangements have been made to hold regular services in the building that has been restored to its original use. The building was used only briefly as a church in a Presbyterian split, 1845-49.

For most of its history, it served as the library, being moved to the Mill Race Historical Village for preservation when the MAGS building was constructed.

Bushnell Congregational, which has been meeting since last June at Village Oaks Elementary School in Novi, will hold its first service in New School Church at 9 a.m. this Sunday. Sunday School will be held concurrently in the Wash Oak Schoolhouse.

Detroit Symphony Orchestra organist Ray Ferguson and Bushnell's 25-member Chancel Choir will be featured at this Sunday's service which is open to all residents of the community.

Last year Bushnell Congregational, one of Detroit's largest and most prominent churches, purchased a 14-acre parcel on Meadowbrook Road between Eight and Nine Mile with plans to construct a new church in the Northville community.

The dwindling membership in the Detroit church prompted the move to

the suburbs, according to the Reverend Meyers.

Construction of the new church has been stalled, however, due to the inability to sell the Detroit church located at Southfield Road and Grand River.

Until construction of the new church gets underway, Bushnell will hold its services in the New School Church.

Meyers, a resident of Northville's historic Bealton, said he hopes the move to Mill Race Village will help strengthen the ties between Bushnell and the community and extended an invitation to all residents to attend this Sunday's service.
