## School board postpones ISEP relocation

Faced with considerable public opposition and a need for more comprehensive long-range planning, the Northville Board of Education unanimously approved the superintendent's recommendation Monday night to delay the relocation of some 80-100 ISEP students into the district's four

elementary schools this coming school year.

Addressing a capacity crowd at Cooke Junior High, School Superintendent Lawrence Nichols recommended the board use the 1982-83 school year to develop a long-range plan encompassing both grade level realignment and facility usage, therefore delaying the decision to move approximately 100

severely physically and mentally impaired ISEP students from Taft Elementary School in Livonia to the four Northville public elementary schools.

The board has been deliberating on the ISEP relocation decision since its proposal April 5 as an alternative to shutting down one of the four elementary schools in the next school year.

After an hour-and-a-half discussion, the board unanimously approved a recommendation to "charge the administration to formulate a long range facility use plan by October (1982) which would include... a recommendation grade level realignment, identification of a building or buildings for closure and a definition of the impact of increased use of district facilities by the

ISEP program."

Faced with declining enrollment, increasing costs and fewer funds, the board was directed by the Citizens' Advisory Committee in March to identify an elementary school for closing preferably by June and to study a K-5, 6-8 and 9-12 grade level structure for implementation in the 1983-84 school year.

The administration, which was directed by the board to examine the citizens' committee's recommendation, concluded that the closing of one elementary school would pose several disadvantages to both students and staff.

In addition to the problem of inadequate planning time for closing a school by next September, the administration told the board it most likely would be

necessary for the district to vacate its lease at Taft Elementary in Livonia. It was the opinion of most administrators that the State of Michigan and the Wayne County Intermediate School District would not continue to pay Northville's lease on Taft for its ISEP program if space was available within the district.

Therefore, at the board's April 5 meeting, the administration recommended the realignment of Taft's ISEP students and staff to the unused areas in Amerman, Moraine, Silver Springs and Winchester.

The administration cited several advantages to the relocation including the continued operation of the four neighborhood elementary schools, an

## Gala festivity marks Downtown dedication

With just three weeks away from the big downtown dedication party, planned family activities continue to grow.

Dedication: Our Town Downtown is slated for three days during Michigan Week on May 20-22.

"We still must iron out some details, especially those concerning the dedication luncheon on May 20, but much of the planning has been completed and we're anxious to get started," a spokesman for the dedication steering committee reported this week.

Meanwhile, completion of amenities for the downtown project is moving ahead. These include benches, tree skirts, replacement of shrubbery and trees that did not survive the hard winter, and the town clock.

City Manager Steven Walters has scheduled the erection of the four-sided clock, purchased with the aid of donations by individuals and groups, for Friday, May 7 at 10 a.m.

Basically, the three-day dedication event will center around these activities:

Thursday, May 20 — A luncheon at the First Presbyterian Church honoring those who have made special contributions to Mainstreet 78. Guest speaker is to be Oscar Frenette, WJR Radio's "Sketches" host. Cooke and Meads Mill vocal groups will provide entertainment.

Friday, May 21 — A dedication luncheon at First Presbyterian Church, followed by a 2 p.m. dedication ceremony in the new municipal park opposite the theater.

Saturday, May 22 — An all-day fun-time downtown, with a wide variety of entertainment and concessions for the whole family.

Dedication officials still are hoping Governor William Milliken will lead a list of special guests for the dedication luncheon and dedication ceremony on Friday. Additionally, there's still an outside chance that WJR's Focus Program will originate Friday in the midst

of the dedication celebration.

Providing music for the dedication ceremony will be the Northville High School Concert Band. Later, following the ceremony, the Northville High School Jazz Band, the Blue Grass Generation band, and Neil Woodward's folk music group will perform in the downtown area — from a portable band shell in the town park.

The Blue Grass Generation, a four piece contingent, plays at the Pretzel Bell and upcoming in the World's Fair. It features Dave Russell on banjo.

## Layoffs pending for 47 teachers

Pink slips will go out to 47 Northville Public Schools' K-12 and ISEP teachers following the board of education's unanimous approval Monday to lay-off district employees due to continued declining enrollment.

The board also unanimously approved that the contract of ISEP Building Supervisor Beth Flack not be renewed for the 1982-83 school year due to declining enrollment and economic uncertainties in the Institution Special Education Program.

In light of next year's projected drop in student enrollment, Assistant Superintendent Burton Knighton recommended the board lay-off 25 K-12 and 22 Institution Special Education teachers to compensate for further reductions in classroom size.

Knighton told the board that projections for next year's enrollment indicate a decline of 125 students in the regular K-12 program and 45 students in the ISEP program.

Next year, Northville Public School system will face its lowest student

## Developer selected for proposed senior village site

The proposed senior village complex for the former Wayne County Child Development Center property in Northville Township came much closer to reality Monday as the Wayne County Economic Development Corporation selected a primary developer for the 101-acre site on Sheldon.

The proposal submitted by Sapersstein Associates and Amurcon Corporation, both of Southfield, was chosen from among three submitted to a WCEDC committee April 5 by metropolitan area real estate development firms.

"It is really still subject to a lot of change and there are things to iron out," said Northville Township Supervisor John MacDonald, a board member of the WCEDC, after the meeting Monday.

"We have not literally signed the contract," he explained, saying the commissioners felt, however, that a primary developer should be designated.

"It looks like a 'go' situation," MacDonald reported enthusiastically.

The first phase of the project is anticipated as developing 525 dwelling units at a cost of \$25 million. Noting that it is well-funded, MacDonald said it is expected the project "will be in the ground by fall although we have even talked about as early as June, but fall is

more likely."

MacDonald emphasized that changes will be made to the proposal and said he intends to seek citizen input.

Already named to a citizen committee he is forming are Francis Gazlay, president of Northville Historical Society, and Marcella Douglas, a retired former principal at the Wayne County Training School (later named the Wayne County Development Center.)

MacDonald revealed that an architectural class at Lawrence Tech also has been developing ideas for the senior citizen village as a class project. He said the class will soon make a presentation to the township board.

All three formal proposals included renovation of some of the abandoned buildings on the site.

The bid document specified that the old school structure in the center of the property would be utilized for recreational and community services and that provision be made for establishment of a convalescent center and a congregational care facility on the site.

MacDonald said the WCEDC anticipates that nine-to-15 buildings will be renovated.

The Sapersstein and Amurcon proposal, a joint venture, stated it would renovate at least 15. The plan was uni-

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# Marzak receives planners' approval

Electric Light Room owner Richard Marzak received conditional approval for his site and landscape plans from the city planning commission at its meeting last week Tuesday.

Commissioners voted 5-2 to approve the modified site and landscape plan with five conditions — have parking bumpers conform to handicapped width; provide some way to close off the two driveways until permission is received from the Wayne County Road Commission on the curbing; post a performance bond until approval is received from the WCRRC; receive a waiver for the 10-foot green belt from the Zoning Board of Appeals; and have lighting and drainage conform to current standards.

Chairperson Lesa Buckland and commissioners Bruce Turnbull, Jay Wendt, James Cutler and Charles Freydl voted yes, while commissioners Fred Joels and Stewart Kissinger voted no. Commissioner Thomas Wheaton was absent.

This was the third time before the commission for Marzak, who is converting the former Shell gasoline station, 575 South Main, into a family entertainment center. He has been seeking ap-

proval for the site and landscape plans.

In each of the last two meetings, commissioners rejected Marzak's plans and asked to see better safety measures for pedestrians and bikers, better traffic flow and the closing of two driveways which would be landscaped.

After the April 6 meeting, Marzak met with planning consultant Ronald Nino, who was not present at the April 20 meeting, to go over his site and landscape plans in order to meet the recommendations of the commission.

Nino sent a memorandum to the commission stating he and Marzak had met. The memo said Marzak had responded to the issues raised by the commission, but Nino said the memo was merely reporting the situation and was not to be construed as a recommendation for approval.

The memo continued that Nino thought the best parking lot layout was not achieved, that (Marzak) could have an on-site greenbelt without adverse affect on parking spaces and that lighting and parking lot drainage have not been satisfactorily addressed.

Marzak, who had not yet received a carbon copy of the memo from Nino, read it before beginning his discussion. "There were three issues left after

the meeting with the commissioners who wanted to see them in the plan," Marzak said. "I think I have met those criteria."

The bike racks, located in front of the building, would be enclosed by concrete parking bumpers permanently fixed in the ground, Marzak said.

As for the driveways, Marzak explained he would break up the concrete and replace it with dirt and grass with the possibility of creating a berm to plant shrubs.

However, he noted in discussions with the Wayne County Road Commission, it could take up to six months to get approval for him to curb the driveways. Therefore, he would post a performance bond with an itemized list on the cost of putting in the curbing and an itemized list on the cost of landscaping.

"What will you do in the interim on the curbs?" Wendt asked.

One possibility, Marzak noted, would be to use railroad ties to mark off the curb line on the driveways, or something similar until the approval from WCRRC is received.

Cutler wanted Marzak to initialize the plan saying he would break the concrete in the driveways, which Marzak said he would do.

One concern of Kissinger was the pedestrian area through the middle of the parking lot. Marzak said he was installing an area which would not allow parking and divide the lot in half.

Some commissioners wondered why bumper blocks could not be used along this route, or even installing a raised walk area to ensure better safety for the patrons.

Marzak insisted there would be enough safety for the patrons if the lines were properly maintained.

Kissinger also was not pleased with the design of the interior of the site. "You have done nothing with the interior of the site," he said.

An architect himself, Kissinger felt the 10-foot greenbelt could have been kept without diminishing the number of parking spaces. "I think you have stopped short," he noted, commenting that the plans doesn't show "a lot of imagination."

The lighting and drainage questions were discussed at the March 16 meeting. There are two catch basins to handle all water, except on the right-of-way on the property, it was noted after the checking the minutes from that meeting.

## Public hearing set tonight to consider zoning laws proposed in new ordinance

New zoning laws for Northville Township hammered together over the past 18 months will be considered in a public hearing tonight before the board of trustees.

The revised ordinance, put together by the township planning commission using federal block grant money, is basically complete. The public hearing tonight is one of the last chances for outside input that might result in alterations to the ordinance.

Major features of the ordinance, which is a book more than an inch thick with text and maps, include:

- requirements for larger residential lots;
- realignment of zoning classes for business use, including an added category for convenience shopping centers limiting them to 10 acres in size;
- new specifications regarding mobile home parks;
- some rezoning of land toward the configurations called for in the master plan;
- updating of the zoning map to reflect changes made in the past several years;
- tighter regulations regarding storm drainage and the use of retention basins;
- specific rules governing unplatted lot splits (absent from the current ordinance);
- reflection in the main text of the already-adopted zoning category

specifically designed for multiple-family housing complexes for elderly persons. Created for the senior citizens village proposed on county land, the zoning class allows buildings taller than the limit that prevails elsewhere and calls for provision of medical and recreational facilities.

Most of the changes address questions that have arisen in the past several years in enforcement of the zoning code. The document also incorporates all of the amendments and additions adopted since the present ordinance was published in 1974.

Planning consultant Claude Coates, of Vilcan-Leman, Associates, drafted the ordinance under the direction of the planning commission. The revisions were made during the regular meetings of the commission and in a series of special sessions addressing the larger topics.

Commission chairman Kenneth McLarty said he intends to attend the public hearing, and suggested that other commissioners do so also in order to best respond to suggestions or questions raised during the meeting.

The ordinance has already received approval from the state mobile home authority and the county planners. Board of trustees action is not expected until the May 13 meeting of the township's governing body at the earliest.

The public hearing begins at 7:30 p.m. today in township hall, 41600 Six Mile.

The bloodmobile will be at Novi High School from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Monday, May 10. Call 349-5155 to make an appointment. The Red Cross states that blood can be donated by anyone in good general health between the ages of 17 through 65. A donation of blood takes less than an hour

from registration to post donation snack. Actual drawing procedure usually takes less than 10 minutes.

The Red Cross emphasizes that its philosophy about blood is simple: it should be available to those who need it without replacement penalty or membership in a so-called blood bank.

In order to maintain a safe supply of blood, however, it is the responsibility of all members of the community to contribute. Since implementing this philosophy in the 1970s, the Red Cross reports a remarkable drop in post-transfusion hepatitis. It calls the volunteer blood supply "a safer blood supply."

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## Decreased track, court revenues create deficit

Decreased racetrack returns due to state budget-balancing cuts along with decreased attendance and less than anticipated revenue from 35th District Court combine with general revenue sharing cuts to create a projected 1981-82 general fund deficit for the city, City Manager Steven Walters detailed at a special budget session of the council Monday night.

The \$343,000 deficit includes a projected deficit of \$8,248 in reduced property taxes on mostly business property, including the Ford plant.

However, Walters reported that at a meeting in Lansing last Thursday arranged by State Representative Jack Kirksey the agriculture department agreed to make a final distribution adjustment on September 30 of this year based on actual revenues received by municipalities with racetracks.

The agriculture department is the agency which distributes the racetrack monies and was charged with reducing each community's returns after the governor's latest slash of \$104,000. Some tracks are still holding their meetings so that final figures are in doubt.

Walters and Kirksey argued that it was an unfair distribution as Northville's returns at the last meet were not the budgeted maximum of \$800,000 but \$685,000 while Hazel Park and Livonia both did make their projected \$800,000.

Under the original formula Northville would have been charged with a cut of \$157,600 using the \$800,000 figure. Using \$685,000 it will be \$142,475 for a saving of \$15,125.

Mayor Paul Vernon expressed the council's appreciation for Kirksey's "going to bat" to have the formula changed to be equitable for the state's smaller tracks. Kirksey had first discussed the distribution with Governor William Milliken and then arranged the meeting with Walters, Tom Tomaszewski of the agriculture department and Representative Michael Griffin of Jackson.

As council members received the overview of the budget compiled by Walters and controller Betty Lennox, Walters told them the "key question" is what further reductions to decide upon for next year.

The council will have the choices of making further cuts in services, a tax increase, or both.

In the budget projections through June 30, he indicated state shared revenues will be down \$10,500; licenses and fees, \$25,700; fines and forfeits, \$25,500; interfund reimbursements, \$270,724.

On the plus side, sales and services show a projected surplus of \$2,200 and interest on investments, \$19,135.

Loss of revenue to the general fund budget from the district court amounts to \$36,792. Three-quarters of the sum resulted from a distortion in the formula for October through December. Under-utilization of the court by Canton, Walters reported, is the reason for the percentage shift of court expenses

to the city. During that period, he said, Canton police apparently did not write tickets during a dispute.

As the city applied for a tax anticipation note two weeks ago, the application noted that inflationary utility costs and high expenditures for maintenance during the severe winter had increased costs even though the city had made attempts to cut the budget from the beginning of the fiscal year.

The city is in process of laying off five employees from a total staff of 47 and is negotiating for employee wage and benefit concessions as a foundation for extending reductions into the 1982-83 year, Walters noted.

If the city does not face severe reductions in state-shared revenues, including racing revenues, in 1982-83, he summed up, the deficit will probably be able to be absorbed into the 1982-83 budget without a significant property tax increase to accomplish this.

He added, however, that a larger than normal allocation of racing funds will have to go into the general fund budget to make this possible.

Last Thursday Walters received a letter from the Police Officers Association of Michigan in response to his announcement of projected department layoffs if concessions were not granted.

Business agent Gerald Radovic stated the POAM understands there is a petition for decertification filed with the Michigan Employment Relations Commission. "Once the issue is decided with MERC, or the petition withdrawn, and we have a signed contract, the POAM will be willing to discuss layoffs," he wrote.

The council adjourned Monday's meeting to go into closed session for a discussion of union negotiations and property purchase.

Walters said the city now is at the point of making a decision on disposition of the Kerr House moved to First Street from Cady to permit expansion of the post office.

At Monday's meeting Max Robertson, one of two DPW workers slated to be laid off the end of this week, requested the council to consider recall rights for him. He had been the bargaining representative of the DPW union until the decertification vote was taken.

At the time decertification was being discussed, the council had issued a resolution stating all rights in the labor contract would be adhered to while new associations were being formed.

Clerical workers have formed a separate, local organization and are in process of talking about contracts with the city.

"It is conceivable that another bargaining unit could be formed and not require recall of those laid off," he explained to council. Mayor Vernon told Robertson, "Your plea then should be to those who would represent the DPW."

The resolution, it was pointed out, is in effect currently and will be until a new group is formed.

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# Garage Sale to stay in downtown; changes made

Northville's fourth annual John Q. Public City Garage Sale will be a little different from preceding sales when it opens on Main Street the Saturday morning of May 15.

By the conclusion of a special meeting of the sponsoring Northville Community Chamber of Commerce board with retail merchants last Friday morning at city hall, it had been decided to hold the sale downtown again this year. However, only street space will be sold with sidewalk space to be available for merchants to use in front of their stores if they wish.

An added feature will be an auction to be held in the city park across from the Marquis Theater from 1-6 p.m.

The meeting attended by all nine chamber board members and 17 retail merchants had been called by chamber president Betty Allen after three merchants had objected to city council last week about holding the sale on Main Street instead of the M.A.G.S. parking lot.

After problems of previous sales were aired and an explanation given by Charles Lapham, co-chairman with his son Scott, of changes planned this year, it was agreed that the sale would go on.

Allen explained that it was too late to consider canceling the event this year but agreed to follow up on the suggestion of Glenn Long to call another meeting very shortly after the sale to

assess it and plan for next year.

"We have problems with everything we have to do, but let's go ahead and everybody cooperate and then sit down afterward to see what is best for Main Street," suggested Long.

Del Black made the point that merchants were not objecting to the garage sale but "to the timing."

He suggested consideration be given to holding the sale on a Sunday another year.

"The Christmas Walk is a big success on a Sunday," he pointed out, adding that stores that wished to be open that day could be.

The evident frustration on the part of the merchants, he said, resulted from their feeling "they do not know what is going on."

He agreed that his store's sales suffered on the garage sale day as did those of some other merchants but urged, "Right now let's all get behind it—we're all interested in making this a better community."

One of the objections to the sale timing was that it immediately precedes the closing of Main Street for Dedication: Mainstreet Downtown festivities the next Saturday. Memorial Day weekend when many residents are away results in merchants having yet another Saturday of poorer sales.

Explaining that the garage sale day was designed to give residents their day

on the street, Lapham encouraged merchants to utilize the new, wider sidewalks in front of their stores to get rid of their own old merchandise on the bargain day.

"Any time you have five to six thousand people passing before your store, capitalize on it," he encouraged.

Lapham admitted that he had not been aware of the problem that lack of toilet facilities had caused restaurants and the theater last year and said that there would be Porta-John temporary facilities set up in three locations, probably behind Northville Drugs, Black's Hardware and on West Main.

Lapham said that he would have the auction end by 6 p.m. in order to open the streets for theater and restaurant patrons. The Marquis will be having a performance of "Monterey," an original musical that evening, Inga Zayti had told the group. She noted that the author had invested heavily in the production and that many of those planning to attend had made dinner reservations beforehand at MacKinnon's.

Lapham, who originally had planned to continue the auction until 7 p.m., promised to have it begin an hour earlier at 1 p.m. and end at 6 p.m. He announced that Ron Barrow, a bonded auctioneer from Hartland, will conduct the auction.

He said he had wanted to incorporate the auction feature last year as a way for residents wishing to sell one or two big items to dispose of them. He sug-

gested that residents call Barrow at 632-5218 to make arrangements to sell any large items.

He set a limit of five items per household. Residents would bring merchandise to the auction and receive tickets for them. They will be sold "without reserve," that is, with no minimum price set. The auctioneer will receive 20 percent of the sale price.

Lapham explained that there will be a reduced 15 percent charge for those who buy spaces and wish to sell merchandise that did not move during the morning at the auction.

At the meeting Lapham exhibited a blueprint drawing of the new Mainstreet Downtown area with 143 spaces marked. He said that requests for space have filled it more than half already.

Paul Folino, a member of the chamber board and past president, recalled that the garage sale had been conceived during his presidency "as another way to bring people into town."

Long told his fellow merchants, "I think we all should give Chuck and his son great credit for managing the sale." It was pointed out that Lapham also handles arrangements for the merchants' annual sidewalk sale which Black called "second to none."

Marilyn Lorenz, owner of Williamsburg Inspirations, who also had attended the council meeting, agreed that in the spirit of cooperation that she "is perfectly willing to go along

with it (the sale) now." She and others, however, indicated they would be interested in the assessment meeting afterward.

Breakdown in communication between the chamber and Northville Retail Merchants Association, which Allen said, had been designed to be an arm of the chamber was blamed for much of the misunderstanding.

Claire Kelly explained that the merchants have had a feeling "our votes don't count." She recalled that almost every merchant at the last merchants' meeting in March had voted against having the sale on Main Street.

A petition had been circulated asking that the street not be closed and suggesting moving the sale to a parking lot.

Thirty three had signed it, but it had not been presented to the chamber, Andrea Piccolo was told when he asked about it.

Black pointed out that the merchants "do have representatives on the chamber."

Part of the problem in communication, Allen agreed, is that the merchants are small businessmen who do not have a lot of time to take for meetings. She said she was encouraged with the response to the meeting Friday and would hold another after the garage sale.

"That's the best thing that has come out this morning," concurred Lorenz. "I think it's going to be good."

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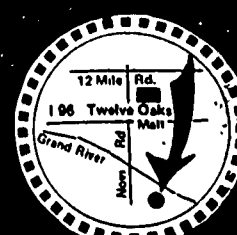
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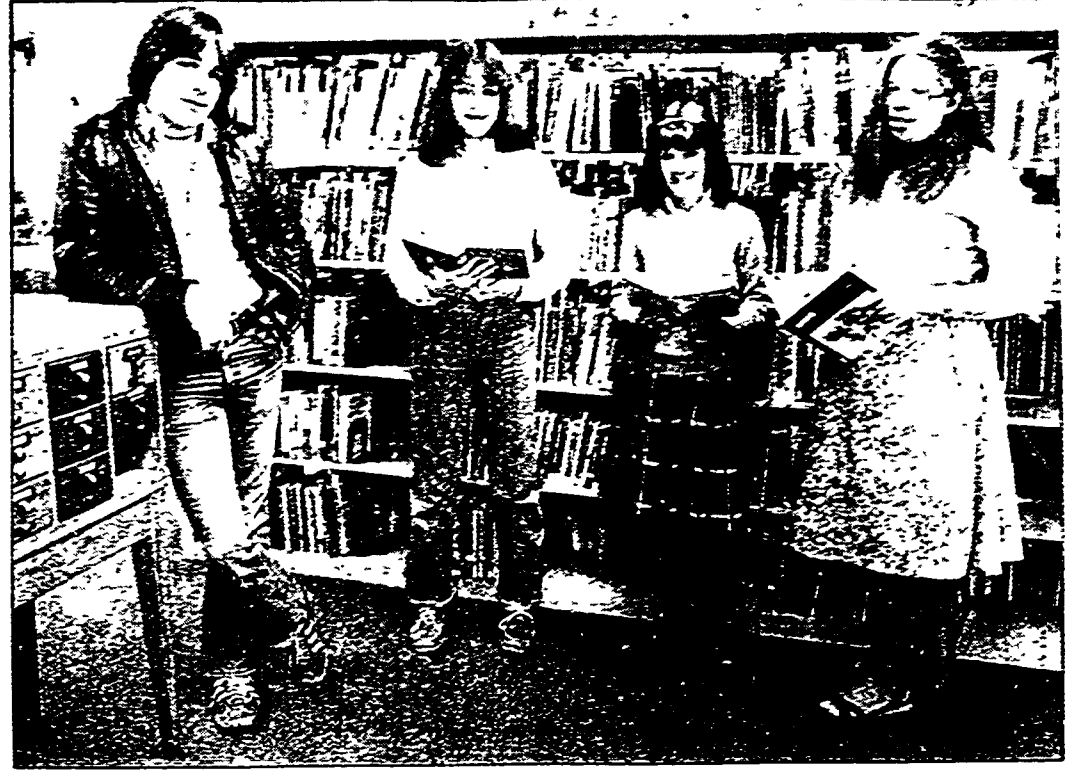

Plymouth Symphony Conductor Johan van der Mewre will direct the symphony in "Rhapsody in Blue" and variations of "I've Got Rhythm."

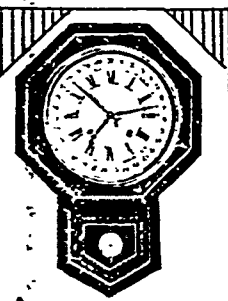

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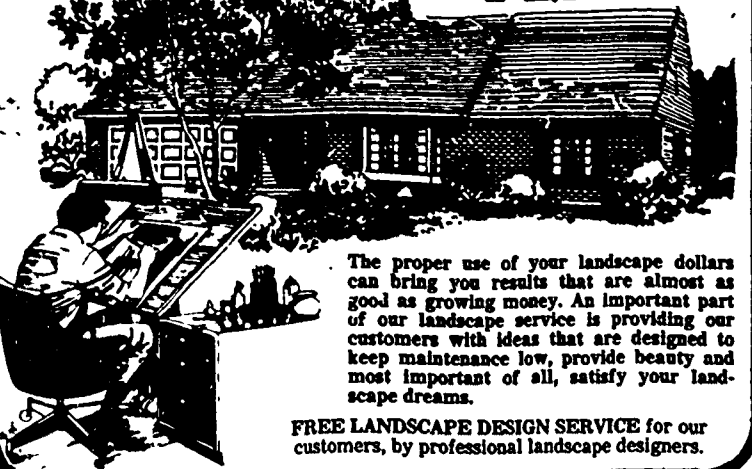

que among the three in proposing that the lowest density housing be sold as condominiums, rather than rented as apartments.

The Saperstein Associates in the proposal suggested the community center be renovated in the first phase while condominium models are built along the northwest area of the property. They would be sold while the firm's planned five-story apartment complex and care facility were built. This phase was estimated at costing \$25 million and represents about one-third of the \$75 million total estimated for full development of the property.

Financial arrangements to start the program as well as management of the project were part of all three proposals. Saperstein was most reliant on obtaining some state or federal support but stated it was able to land such funding due to past close relationships with agencies. Saperstein Associates also noted in the

presentation that Detroit-based St. Luke's convalescent center is looking for a new site soon and reported it is interested in the program.

Saperstein and Amurcon together manage more than 12,000 apartment units and have extensive experience in rehabilitation of buildings, primarily in downtown Detroit.

Other proposals studied by the WCEDC committee were from Biltmore Properties Company of Troy, which had presented a plan to renovate most of the buildings on the site, and Practical Development Company of Oak Park, whose plan would use only 11 buildings now on the site but would build four high-rise buildings of 10 stories.

Saperstein lists Lee C. Saperstein as president and Berry Gordy of Motown Industries as stockholder. Amurcon Corporation is headed by Fred Erb, chairman of the board, and Barton M. Berman, president. In making their proposal as a joint venture they note that this is not their first joint venture.

## School board postpones Taft closing

equivalent amount of savings to the general fund budget through an offsetting of building operational maintenance and utility costs, cost savings to the State of Michigan and the Wayne County Intermediate School District by avoiding lease and rent costs and the opportunity for handicapped and non-handicapped students to come in daily contact.

However, at two public hearings held last Wednesday concerns were raised by both parents and staff members regarding the disruption of education to the ISEP students at Taft.

Taft teacher Gayle Moore told board members at the public hearing that the "teachers at Taft School are unanimous in their wish to remain or be moved as a unit and not be dispersed into various schools throughout the district."

Both teachers and parents voiced concerns about possible transportation problems for Taft students, inadequate facilities at the elementary schools, such as lack of washing machines and toilet and shower facilities and a reduction in ancillary services, such as occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech and language.

Moore also pointed out that despite the administration's attempt to "mainstream" ISEP students with non-handicapped students, it was the contention of the Taft staff that students would, in fact, be placed in a more restrictive environment due to the reduced freedom in halls, bathrooms and playground equipment.

Moore said Monday that one of major concerns of Taft staff members was that the relocation of the ISEP students was being proposed simply to help curb costs.

"I don't think you should move them out just because you're concerned about closing a school," she observed. "I'm all for mainstreaming as long as some thought goes into it."

A representative from the Association for

Retarded Citizens also expressed concerns to the board about "the building of appropriate attitudes" which must take place in the community before regular K-12 and handicapped students can be placed in the same educational environment. "This cannot be a hurried decision," she noted.

While the board has agreed to delay the relocation of the district's ISEP students, it nevertheless will study the possibility of mainstreaming students in the public schools in 1983-84.

The board agreed Monday that a more comprehensive long range plan for the Northville Public School district could only be implemented after careful administrative study. Board members concurred that an October deadline would give the administration ample time to study all the proposals and alternatives and to familiarize the community with the changes which will take place in the district within the next few years.

By postponing both the closing of one school building and the relocation of special education students, the board will not be able to accrue an estimated \$70,000 to \$90,000 cost savings for this coming school year.

However, administrators pointed out that the preliminary budget presented for review earlier this year represents projected operating expenses for all of the district's current facilities.

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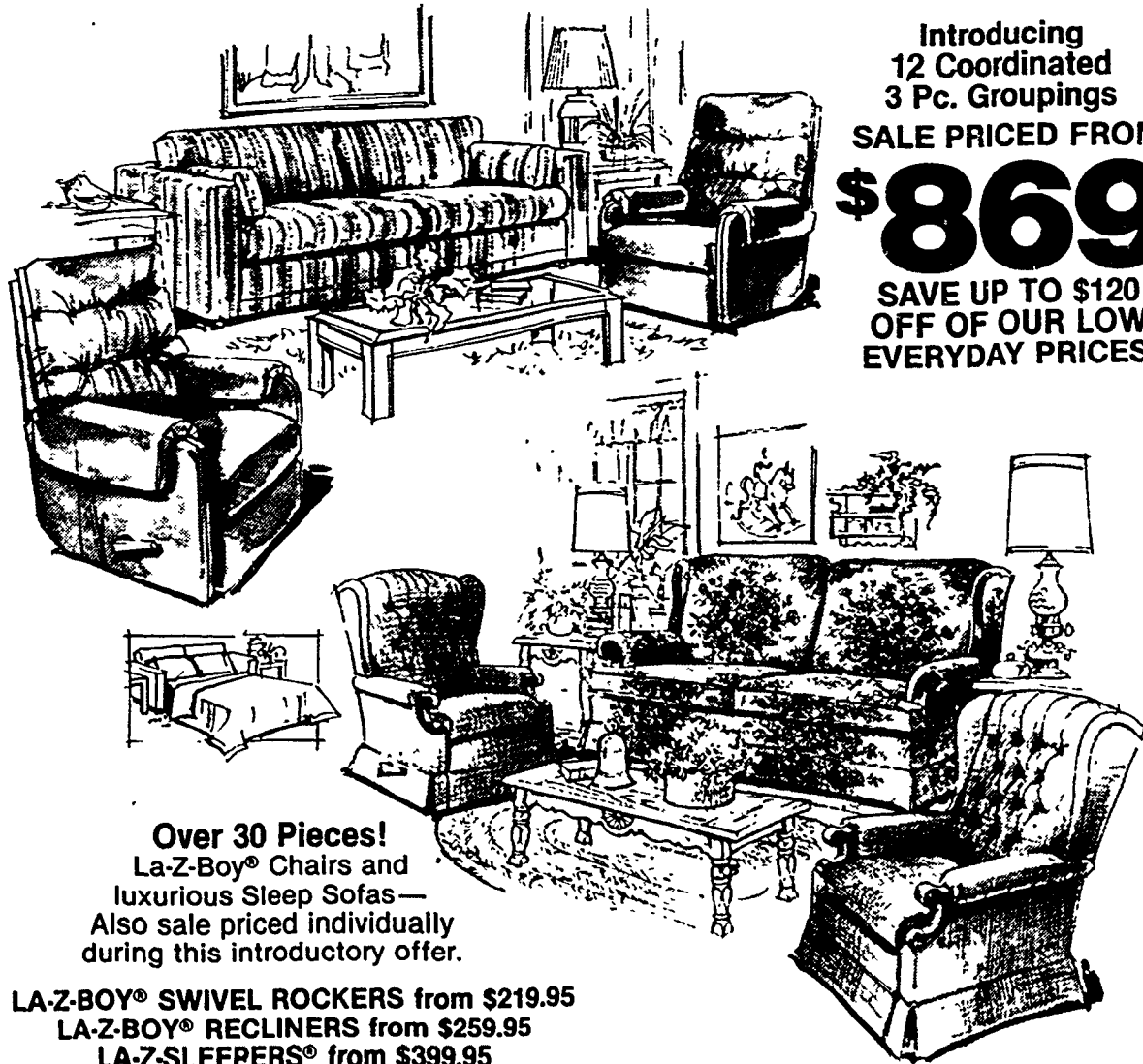
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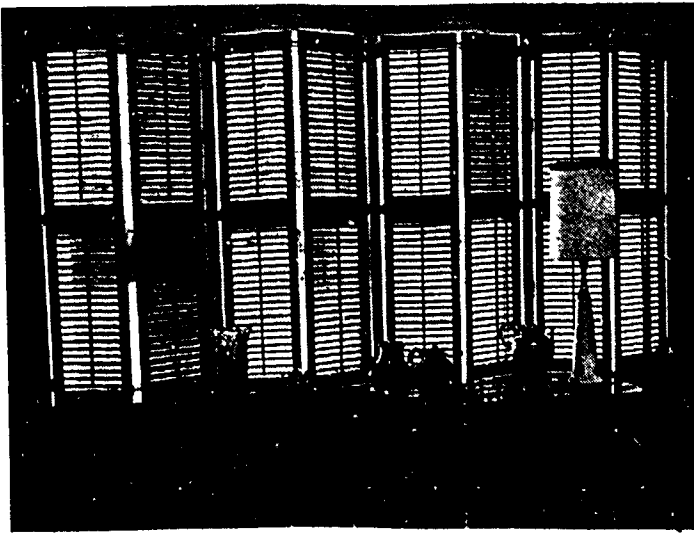

## Good sale coming

The meeting of the Northville Community Chamber of Commerce Board with local merchants last Friday was long overdue. We commend the 17 retail merchants who were willing to take time to attend and discuss their concerns about the upcoming city garage sale May 15. Community caring also was evidenced by the 100 percent attendance by the chamber board.

Everyone attending can take credit that what began on a questioning, at-times hostile note concluded with pledges of cooperation and the stated intention on the part of most to make the upcoming event on Main Street a fun community attraction.

Begun as a chamber promotion four years ago to give residents a chance to sell their unwanted belongings on the street, the sale has changed direction somewhat as established flea market dealers also have bought space at the last two sales. Merchants emphasized they did not object to turning the street over to the citizens of the community for a day but expressed valid concerns about some of the problems experienced.

Glenn Long, Del Black and John Genitti rightfully praised the volunteer efforts of Charles Lapham and his son Scott who manage the sale for the chamber. Some of the problems that surfaced recently were solely because of lack of communication between the groups. Lapham was quick to reserve Porta-Johns after learning of the congestion caused in local restaurants and the theater last year by those at-

tending the sale. Better communication would have made the garage sale planners aware that the theater had a live musical booked in conjunction with dinner reservations at MacKinnon's. Lapham adjusted the auction feature of the garage sale so that it will at least conclude before the evening events.

Chamber president Betty Allen wisely set discussion ground rules giving everyone opportunity to be heard but keeping the meeting orderly. Appointment of Ed Jamieson and Paul Folino, both chamber board members, to serve as liaisons with the retail merchants association is a step in the right direction of better communication.

Her promise to call another meeting of the chamber with the merchants, as suggested by Long, to assess this year's sale is important. That meeting will be the right time to air problems, consider the advantages of bringing citizens into town and decide on future changes — well before plans are laid for 1983. We trust the meeting will come soon after the garage sale when recollections are fresh.

We hope that the lines of communication now open will continue to stay that way. Regular joint meetings can be productive. If the plowman and the cowboy can be friends with different interests, surely the chamber and the merchants with the same community goals should be. As Long asked, "Let's see what's best for Main Street."

### Confessions of a Civil War junkie

This past weekend marked the beginnings of euphoria for my mother and me. Unlike most people who celebrated the rites of spring by poking around in the garden, soaking up the sunshine, playing a game of softball on a Sunday afternoon or doing a host of other normal springtime activities, my mother and I grabbed an armful of tattered books, two checkbooks, a pair of comfortable shoes and began the first of many journeys back to the age of Lincoln, Grant and Lee.

For anyone with even the most remote interest in the American Civil War, the place to be this weekend was Ashland, Ohio, for the Civil War collectors' show. Assembled in a large, stuffy room were collectors of some of the finest Civil War artifacts in the country — from uniforms and armaments to letters and diaries.

As collectors of Civil War photographs and all-around CW fanatics, it is, of course, essential that my mother and I attend these shows whenever possible — regardless of the hundreds of other things we should be doing.

For those with an appreciation for this tumultuous period, attending one of these shows undoubtedly is the most valuable history lesson one can receive on the subject. Many of the collectors are educators and researchers who can provide a wealth of information on just about any topic. In fact, while examining one collection of photos of the Michigan 5th Cavalry, we learned of the brief military career of Chauncy J. Rathburn of Plymouth. Rathburn, who had enlisted in Northville August 22, 1862, at the age of 28, served under George Custer and was killed in a skirmish at Gettysburg June 30, 1863.

What draws most people to these shows, however, is the simple fact that everyone attending is afflicted with Blue and Gray fever. To find an entire assemblage of people with a devout interest in the Civil War certainly is worth a weekend jaunt to just about anywhere. I have few friends or relatives who fully understand or appreciate my enthusiasm for collecting photographs of soldiers with strange sideburns and eight-inch beards. In fact, when displaying my col-

lection most people usually give a courteous nod and mumble something like "how interesting."

My grandfather, who had about as much appreciation for my Civil War fanaticism as he did for eating turnips, referred to the collection as my "dead assets." I admit that perhaps this hobby is a bit unusual and that maybe I am a little daffy. However, I can't be totally responsible for these eccentricities. I inherited them from my mother.

I'm convinced my obsession with the Civil War began before I arrived at New Grace Hospital in August, 1958. During my mother's last few months of pregnancy, she was dragging my father around Civil War battlefields trying to locate buried mini balls and hidden shells — totally disregarding her swollen ankles.

If I wasn't afflicted at that time, it undoubtedly caught up with me during my childhood. Most of our family vacations were strategically planned in areas not too far from either a battlefield or some other Civil War landmark. Despising anything of even the most remote historical significance, my younger brother and sister were left at the hotel to swim, eat candy from the vending machine and order steak sandwiches via room service.

Of course, I was the chosen one. I'd get up at the crack of dawn, don my tennis shoes and go traipsing around Bull Run, Antietam, Chancellorsville and other noteworthy areas while my mother would explain the significance of the events which take place. "Can't you just see the cavalry coming over that hill?" she'd shout as I'd watch my hair frizzing in the 90-degree weather and my arms turn a bright red in the afternoon sun.

However, despite the fact that I'm perched on a cannon in all our family pictures, I've never regretted that early exposure. It's given me more than just a sense of history — rather a true appreciation of it and a desire to preserve what has lasted for more than a century. In fact, on our last battlefield excursion, I not only saw the cavalry coming over the hill — I heard it approaching.

# Hospital hedge plans possible again, Kirksey reports

"I feel we have a 99 percent commitment for the hedge," State Representative Jack Kirksey (R-Livonia, Northville) reported last week after meeting with Governor William Milliken Tuesday.

In a 45-minute session, Kirksey said he and the governor discussed need for the fencing at Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital as well as other local problems, including the distribution of racetrack revenue cuts.

During the past months the possibility

of fencing the hospital grounds with a fast-growing hedge had proved the most feasible solution to the problem of walkaways.

While encircling the hospital grounds with a wire fence had been unpopular with those who treat the patients, as well as prohibitively expensive, the concept of a hedge has been more acceptable as a way to delineate ground boundaries for patients. Hospital officials have said the problem of walkaways often is that they are so con-

fused they do not know the boundaries.

"The only thing that might shoot down the hedge now is if state employees do not accept concessions. If 100 people are laid off at the hospital, Pat Babcock is saying that spending \$15,000 for the hedge will be poor timing," Kirksey told The Record. Babcock is the state mental health director.

Since hospital director John Reynolds had stated he felt the money could be made available with internal budget adjustments, any "hedging" on this

type of fencing would not be for financing, Kirksey explained.

He said he was trying to get the state to get competitive bids and feels it still is possible to have the hedge planted this spring.

Kirksey added that he had discussed the slash in racetrack revenues and the method of distributing the adjustment, urging that all three area tracks (Northville, Livonia and Hazel Park) be treated equally.

He also stressed that his "no" vote on

the proposed state income tax hike was not a denial of the need for additional revenues.

"But the income tax is the most unwanted tax. I prefer the taxes of choice — on non-essentials," Kirksey explained. He pointed out that he already is on record as favoring new taxes on beer

and alcohol.

"There are alternate ways of raising money, but Gerry Miller (state budget director) is attempting to legislate by crisis," Kirksey continued, questioning the validity of the threatened loss of the state's credit rating at that moment.

## Geake speaks to adjusters

### Criticizes legislature as 'shortsighted'

State Senator Robert Geake (R-Northville) expressed his dismay with the Michigan Legislature for its shortsightedness in dealing with the state's economic conditions, in remarks delivered to the Detroit Adjusters' Association at the Sussex House Restaurant in Southfield last Thursday.

"Let there be no doubt that state government is facing a financial crisis," Geake stated.

"But what disturbs me the most is that the Legislature seems more intent on keeping our bloated bureaucracy afloat, rather than attacking the root causes of our problems."

"State government is suffering from the same disease that afflicts our ailing industries," he continued, "and the proposed cure, raising taxes, will only prolong the illness."

"We should have learned from history that raising taxes only serves to further rob potential purchasers of their buying power. And, when our peo-

ple cannot buy items like homes and automobiles, then they are obviously not buying insurance," he continued. "Lansing's 'lust for money' is costing us all in the long-run."

Senator Geake also provided an update on the status of legislation impacting the insurance industry, noting that a comprehensive report will be issued the first of May by the State Insurance Bureau contradicting claims that the Essential Insurance Act is not working as intended.

He further explained that the report will include such topics as underwriting, rating, compliance, a general explanation of the law, and results of a survey of the top 20 insurance companies to determine how they constitute "substantially at fault."

Senator Geake concluded his remarks by urging those attending the meeting and dinner to voice their concerns to their elected officials in Lansing regarding the impact of governmental activities on their industry.

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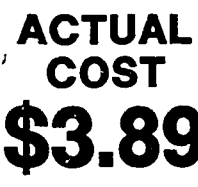


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# Home Business

*Low overhead and convenience  
make operating a home business  
an attractive alternative*

Low overhead and convenience provide the incentive for many people to go into small home businesses these days. As the economy lags, the lure of working at home to provide additional income has become more and more appealing.

For one South Lyon area woman, working at home began long before the "recession" of the '80s, however. Clara Boylan opened a beauty shop in her home at 28451 Pontiac Trail 20 years ago to support herself and finds it such a satisfying arrangement that she only recently began taking Wednesdays off rather than working six days a week.

Carmen Collick, who lives only two houses south of Clara's Beauty Shop at 28425 Pontiac Trail, began her home seamstress business two years ago when her son Donald started school so she could earn some spending money and still be home when he is home. "I'm

very happy with what I'm doing," Mrs. Collick says. "I can do my work almost entirely while Donald (age 8) is in school. I do make some appointments in the evenings to accommodate customers who work and can't come until later."

Boylan recalls vividly her student days at the Mariello Beauty College in New York some 47 years ago. "There were only 14 of those schools in the United States and we had all European instructors. We learned to do French curls, marcelles (waves made with a heated curling iron) and spiral waves, as well as machine permanents."

"Our egg shampoos were made right in the school with real eggs. They didn't come in bottles as they do now and we made henna (red hair dye) at school in a double boiler. You had to be very careful with machine permanents or you would end up with green or purple hair when it had been colored."

Sayville, Long Island, was the loca-

tion for Boylan's first hairdressing position. "I earned \$1 a day and 10 cents of every dollar of business I did and I worked from 9 a.m. to 9-10 p.m. The Reynolds and DuPonts used to send their chauffeurs to pick up the girls and take us to the family homes to dress the ladies' hair. We used to give pedicures too. It makes me laugh today at what they think are the "new" things coming out."

When Boylan attended beauty school it was just like any other college with teachers and principals and "we weren't allowed to chew gum period." The students weren't allowed to come to school looking anything but their best either.

"They checked us every day to be sure our uniforms were clean and we were neat and everything before we could enter class. And, if we weren't, we were expelled for the day and it cost

\$12.50 if that happened. There was a registered nurse to teach scalp work, facials and body massage. There's really nothing new today. It's just more scientific."

Why did she attend such a strict school? Simply because "I wanted the best," Boylan explains, adding that Mariello was very prestigious.

Her training apparently paid off because Boylan has some very satisfied customers whose hair she has been doing for more than 30 years. She arrived in Michigan in 1945 and opened her beauty shop in what is now the ER Western building in South Lyon. She and Lou Hyde, a barber, shared the quarters in those days.

Opening a shop in her own home was probably more exacting than opening that first one in the city. Not only did Boylan need to have her basement beauty shop completely separate from

her living area, she had to have state inspection and approval from Lyon Township. Had any of her neighbors objected, she might not have received township approval.

No one did and Boylan customers, many of them quite elderly (one is 95 years old), continue to come weekly for their hair appointments and sometimes to talk about the "good old days."

Collick came to the United States from Spain 22 years ago to visit relatives and stayed on because "I fell in love with the country."

"It's such a wonderful country, I knew I wanted to make my home here," she says with a pleased smile and a delightful Spanish accent.

Having learned the sewing art as a little girl from her mother, Collick says it is natural for girls of her homeland to learn to sew since there are many large families and making clothing is more

economical.

After attending a special school in Spain where she learned to cut and restyle garments as well as make articles of clothing from the beginning, Collick went to work for her cousin who had her own seamstress business in Spain.

When she settled in the U.S., her first job was doing alterations at J.L. Hudson's at Northland. Later, she worked for Hughes and Hatcher and then at Winkelman's.

After meeting Donald Collick and getting married, she stopped work to have a family. She reports that she has never been sorry she chose to stay home with her son and that she enjoys her home business. "I like to spend as much time as I can with my son and this is a good

way to do it."

The seamstress who makes garments from the beginning as well as doing hemming and restyling has the small third bedroom in the family's ranch-style home for her workshop.

Although her overhead is small, Collick has two sewing machines in case one should break down and also has invested in a \$2,500 blind-stitch machine for hems. She buys needles 50 at a time

and large quantities of thread even though many customers bring their own materials and patterns.

"This is ideal," she says looking around her home with satisfaction. "I like to sew and I can do it mostly when I'm home by myself when my son is in school. I'd be bored without something to do when he and my husband are away."

Collick says if she ever decides to expand her operation, she will rent a building and hire extra help, but it is something she would not consider now as she finds her present set-up satisfying both financially and personally.

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# Convenience is major appeal in container gardening

Even vegetable growers with a back 40 are taking to growing them in containers as well as in the ground. The reason? Convenience, for one, where salad fixings next to the kitchen makes putting together a meal a breeze.

But for gardeners new to the game or tight on space, container vegetable growing is the way to ease into gardening.

Virtually any vegetable can be grown in containers, but special favorites include all the salad vegetables. Herbs and ornamental secure plants like eggplant work well, and root crops such as carrots and beets are practical as long as they have enough soil depth to develop the root.

Making garden space where it doesn't exist is a primary reason for container vegetables — and they're turning up on balconies, patios, decks, even in matched containers at the front door where guests can pick their own tomatoes while waiting for you to answer the door.

The ultimate container garden fits on a kitchen windowsill but is perhaps more for effect than for practical, productive value.

Containers can be anything from handsome wood or cedar planting tubs to specially designed containers, such as Vegi-Tubs from Carefree Garden Products. Big enough to grow up to three tomato plants or 300 carrots, it's a handy, yet handsome planter.

Buckets will work, so will garbage bags filled with soil. One of the best methods — widely used in Europe and catching on here — is pre-packaged bags of soil mix like Jiffy-Mix. By cutting slits in the top, then planting directly into the soil, the Jiffy-Mix is growing pot and soil all in one. With compact plants such as peppers, the bag of soil becomes completely covered with lush ornamental vegetables.

If there's any recipe for successful container growing, it includes a good soil mix, plenty of moisture and adequate fertilizer.

A packaged soil mix of peat and vermiculite provides a good combination of moisture-holding capacity and air space for good root growth.

Adequate water is vital, especially on the hot windy days of summer. Daily watering is often a must; avoid container gardeners often set up an automatic watering system from kits available at garden centers. Provide good drainage too so excess water can drain away.

Slow-release fertilizers, such as MagAmp, used at the manufacturer's recommended levels, can be added to the soil mix before planting for several



months of feeding. Supplementing with a soluble fertilizer in the water once a month gives plants a boost. Other growers use a liquid fertilizer entirely, applying it as they water, according to manufacturer's directions.

The last requirement is sun. Leafy vegetables like lettuce, onions, radishes and other non-fruiting types will produce adequately in partial shade. Fruiting vegetables like tomatoes, peppers, eggplants and squash need full sun to be productive. When growing in full sun with a wall or solid surface behind, watch for sunburn until plants get acclimated to the location.

Because the soil warms faster in containers, growth will be rapid compared with planting in soil. For even earlier production, move containers into sheltered locations where day temperatures climb into the 80s even though general temperatures are too low for outdoor growth.

Early varieties of plants grown in containers will normally mature faster than if they were grown in the ground, assuming there's no shortage of water and fertilizer. Peppers and eggplant need at least 60 degree nights to flower and set fruit.

For an extra early boost to production, you can even move containers inside at night, until outdoor night temperatures reach the optimum.

Some other advantages of container gardening appeal to the vegetable producer. Close at-hand container gardens make it easy for succession planting of radishes, lettuce, onions and other short season crops, compared to planting in the ground where gardeners often don't get around to replanting.

Packaged soil mixes are clean, free

of weed seed and plant disease organisms and they're lightweight for easy moving of planted containers.

Some tomato varieties do well in hanging baskets with vines hanging down from overhead. Small-fruit, determinate types of tomatoes that bloom and set fruit at one time will need no staking. Indeterminate varieties such as Ball Seed Company's tomato "Champion" continue to grow, blossom and set fruit and will need staking or caging.

Eggplant and peppers should grow without support. Short vining types of cucumbers, such as "Pot Luck," can trail over the edge of the container or can be staked or trellised.

Plant only bush-type squash like the summer variety "Golbar" or rampant vining varieties may threaten to take over your deck or patio.

Several herbs can be combined in the same container. Fresh herbs are the ultimate in flavoring, compared with using them dried.

One good and attractive herb container is a strawberry barrel, the planting pockets filled with sage, thyme, summer savory and marjoram. Plant vigorous basil and dill on top of the barrel.

There's no rule that says you can't plant more than one variety in a container, so long as they're fed and watered well. A tall-growing tomato footed with a pepper and an eggplant makes a productive planting that's sure to be a conversation piece, too.

All the salad basics — onions, radishes and lettuce — can be planted in the same container. Just remember that once planted the roots of many vegetables grow together. Plant to harvest without disturbing the roots of nearby plants.

And don't forget to provide for drainage. Drill holes along the side at the bottom so the soil mix doesn't flow out the bottom.

## Home gardening offers tax advantages

Do you feel manipulated and milked dry by the "system?" Are you looking for a legitimate tax loophole or a sure-fire weapon to fight inflation? Or perhaps for home-based recreation to save on expensive gasoline?

Home gardeners already have the answers and are using them to fight back. Gardening provides a tax loophole for the average American, one of the few not subject to IRS audit. Vegetables from your home food garden are not taxable. You can even barter garden produce for other useful goods.

The cost of growing your own is still reasonable as compared to the cost of purchasing fresh or processed produce. A skillful gardener can harvest vegetables worth 10 times his or her yearly investment in seeds and supplies.

Budget-conscious and conservation-minded citizens are planning to spend more weekends at home this summer. The National Garden Bureau, a garden seed trade educational organization, reports that sales of vegetable seed packets are keeping pace because more people are planning to "fix up the place" with beds of flowers.

The demand for community garden plots is increasing rapidly, unfortunately at a time when county and city park budgets are being squeezed. Consequently,

some churches and other institutions with spare land are moving in to fill the gap.

But, for the foreseeable future, the major growth in gardening will be among families who have land around their homes. Community garden plots still make up only a small part of the land devoted to food gardens.

The National Garden Bureau doesn't expect an immediate shift in the motivation for food gardening. First and foremost, Americans garden for the joy of it. They like the good feeling of working in the soil and the fulfillment of producing healthful foods with one's own hands.

"But, oh, the allure of a tax-free, inflation-proof food factory right in your own backyard. A beginning gardener can harvest 50 cents in retail value of produce from every square foot of garden space."

Experienced gardeners regularly top \$1 per square foot per gardening season. No wonder home gardeners are such a cheerful lot.

## ASK THE LAWYER



Questions Write to Attorney Larry Korn, care of Sliger-Livingston Publications, Post Office Box 160, Northville, Michigan 48167. Questions will be answered on a space-available basis. Answers in this column are directed at specific facts and may not apply in all situations.

**Q.** Could you tell me if the tax assessors can tax our homes any way they want? I have a home on a canal in a small town. In 1979 I paid \$188.35 in taxes. In 1980 I paid \$100.08 and in 1981 paid \$315.21. They always send me an assessment notice increasing my taxes too late for me to appeal. Is there something I can do about it?

**A.** You should contact your assessor in the township or county in which your property is located in December of 1982. It is too late for you to contact him for 1981. Ask him what he has assessed the property for in 1982. The property should be assessed at its market value, that is, the highest price a buyer would pay and the lowest price at which a seller would sell.

They do go back anywhere from six months to a year to determine comparable value of properties that have been sold in your area. Check your assessment with your neighbor's assessment and if you find that you were assessed too high in relationship to your neighbors, you should point that

out to the assessor. If you still feel that you are being assessed too high, you should hire an attorney who is knowledgeable in lowering property assessments.

**Q.** My husband and I moved from California to Detroit. In moving our household goods, the moving company damaged my Steinway piano and broke a valuable antique lamp. The moving company and I cannot agree on the amount of damages. I feel that my damages are more than \$1,000. What is the best way to recover what I am entitled to from the moving company?

**A.** Had your damages been less than \$500, I might suggest that you start a suit on your own in small claims court and let the judge evaluate the damages that you would have been entitled to recover.

Since your damages are upwards of \$1,000, I would suggest that you write the American Movers Conference, Attention: Dispute Settlement Program, 400 Army-Navy Drive, Arlington Virginia, 22202. Your letter should request an arbitration of the dispute through the American Arbitration Association.

A shipper who has a loss-damage claim against the participating moving company may request that the American Arbitration Association appoint an impartial arbitrator from its national panel to decide the case.

While the decision to arbitrate is voluntary and must be agreed to by both parties, the arbitrator's decision is legally binding and enforceable.

**Q.** I heard that the Federal Gift Tax Exclusion was raised from \$3,000 to \$10,000. Would you please explain how this works?

**A.** Under present law, if a donor gives to a recipient no more than \$10,000 worth of property in a calendar year, the Gift Tax Annual Exclusion applies and no taxable gift is involved.

Also, under the present law, when a married person makes a gift of his or her separate property and the donor's spouse consents to the gift, the annual exclusion of each spouse is available and the amount of the non-taxable gift can be doubled to \$20,000. This is accomplished by the spouse's consenting to "splitting" the gift (having one-half of gift attributed to him/her) by signing the donor spouse's gift tax return on the line provided for this purpose. Thus, by using the split-gift privilege, a husband or wife can give \$20,000 worth of his or her separate property each year to each of as many recipient's as he or she chooses.

**Q.** What are Municipal Bonds and what are the advantages of owning Municipal Bonds?

**A.** Municipal Bonds are the debt instruments that local governments sell to raise the needed capital to build roads, water systems, sewage disposal services, schools, airports and the like.

By investing in Municipal Bonds you earn income that you can keep without incurring liability for federal income taxes. Also, if you buy a Municipal Bond issued by state, county or other form of local government, in Michigan your interest earned on these Municipal Bonds would be state tax exempt as well as federal tax exempt.

**Q.** I am a landlord. When a certain tenant moved into my four-family flat, he signed a lease and also signed a statement of the condition of the flat that he was renting. When the tenant moved out, he left over \$250 damage in the flat he had occupied. I gave him an itemized list of the damages and the cost of repairing same.

The tenant had a \$200 security deposit and he sued in small claims court for the return of the security deposit. He is asking double damages saying that I did not

return his security deposit in the 45 days after his demand. He, however, has signed the statement of the condition of his apartment which I delivered to him the day he moved.

Since he is suing me in small claims court for \$450, what should I do?

**A.** File a motion with small claims court to move your case to district court. This will give you the opportunity to have a transcript of the trial on record.

Under the Security Deposits Act of 1973, the landlord at the termination of the tenancy must complete a termination inventory checklist of all damages claimed. Further the landlord must mail to the tenant within 30 days after termination a list and amount of claimed damages along with a notice in 12 point type that the tenant must raise any objections within seven days after the list of claimed damages.

If you have complied with the Security Deposit Act, then it is quite likely the judge will decide you do not have to return the security deposit. **Q.** We purchased a home three years ago. Last week we had a disastrous fire and our home is a total loss. We also lost all our household goods, furniture and appliances and personal affects.

The insurance company under our homeowner's policy was supposed to pay for our hotel bills. Not only will they not pay for our cost of living outside our home, as the policy requires, they say that they're suspicious of arson and doubt very much if they will pay us anything under our homeowner's policy. What should we do?

**A.** I suggest you retain a public adjuster to represent you in negotiating the settlement of the loss with your insurance carrier. This is important as the public adjuster will have to recreate the replacement cost and/or the market value of the building that was destroyed.

I also suggest that you retain an attorney who is knowledgeable in negligence and insurance. It appears you will have to sue the insurance company to collect your damages.

Many insurance companies feel that in all questionable cases, it is to their advantage to take as long as possible in settling the claim. This saves them a tremendous sum of money because the longer they keep their funds on hand, the longer those monies will earn interest.

This is against public policy and you might also consider filing a claim with the Michigan Commissioner of Insurance.

**Q.** Would you explain the new IRS tax cut for individuals?

**A.** The tax cut for individuals works through marginal brackets. The marginal rate is what you pay on the top dollar of income. If you are in the 50 percent bracket, this does not mean that all income is taxed at 50 percent. Only the last few income dollars are actually taxed at the 50 percent rate.

Your total income is taxed at several brackets. The first \$2,300 of taxable income (after exemptions) for a single tax payer is in the zero bracket — not taxed at all. Even if you make millions of dollars, your first \$2,300 is untaxed.

Taxable income over \$2,300 is taxed at 14 percent until it reaches \$3,400, when the rate climbs to 16 percent. At \$4,400, it rises to 18 percent and keeps on at that rate until taxable income passes \$6,500. One begins paying 39 percent when taxable income reaches \$28,800.

**Q.** I was stopped for a traffic violation while driving a car owned by a friend of

mine. The police officer asked me for proof of insurance. I handed the officer the proof of insurance for the car I was driving. However, this insurance policy had expired the day before.

The officer gave me a ticket for having no insurance. I tried to explain that I had insurance on my own car and under No-Fault I was covered. The officer would not listen to me and gave me a ticket anyway. What should I do?

**A.** The officer was wrong. If you have insurance on your own automobile and you are driving a friend's car which has no insurance, your own No-Fault policy covers you while you are driving your friend's car, providing you are not a member of the same household.

Go to court on the date set for hearing of your traffic violation and show the judge your proof of insurance. I am certain the judge will find you not guilty and dismiss the ticket.

**Q.** I was driving my car in a recent snowstorm on a main artery. The snow got so heavy that traffic was blocked ahead of me and behind me. I made a left turn onto a one-way street. However, I was going the wrong way on the one-way street.

A car came from the other direction. Just my luck it was a police car. The officer gave me a ticket. Since this was an emergency and I had no other way to get out of the snow storm blocked artery, do I have defense?

**A.** I would go to the district court and explain the circumstances to the city attorney. The city attorney might dismiss the ticket because of the emergency situation or the city might ask the district judge to permit you to plead guilty to a no-point offense such as blocking traffic.

Another alternative you might work out with the city attorney is to plead guilty to going the wrong way on a one-way street with the recommendation that you be placed on deferred probation so that if you drive without further violations for six months, the ticket would be dismissed.

You final option would be to appear before the district judge, explain the circumstances surrounding the violation, and the judge might dismiss the ticket because of the hazardous driving conditions and your response to the emergency.

**Q.** What are the benefits of an IRA or Keogh plan?

**A.** To begin with, contributions are sheltered from taxation. If you contribute \$2,000 to an IRA or Keogh plan in 1982 and are in the 25 percent bracket, this reduces your income tax from 1982 by 25 percent of \$2,000 which is \$500.

Equally important, the money your IRA or Keogh plan continues to earn over the years is also sheltered from taxation until you begin drawing on it.

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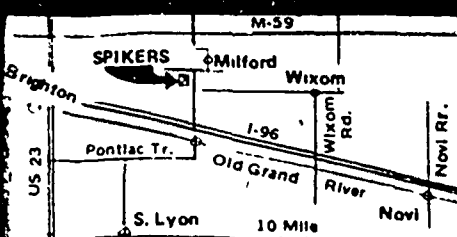
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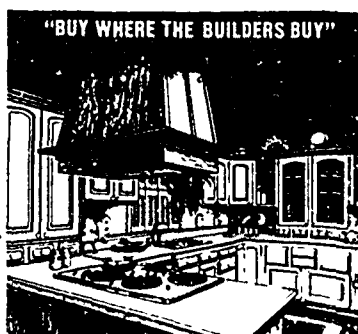

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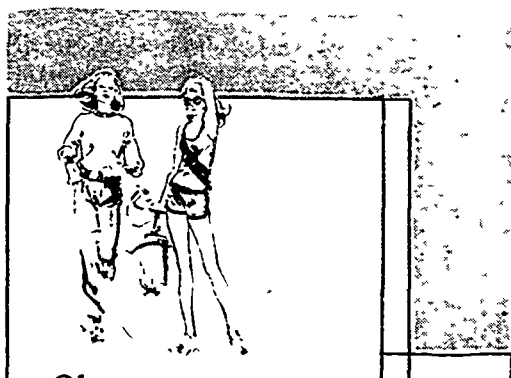
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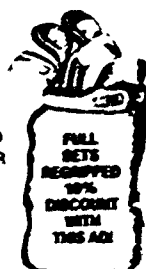
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## Rummaging

both helpful and harmful and to resolve to use words to bring understanding and unity.

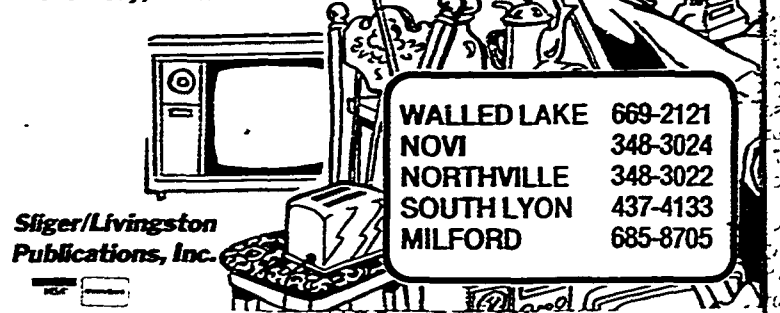

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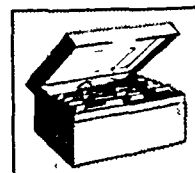

# Northville nine 'walks' to victory over South Lyon

It would be understandable to think Northville and South Lyon were involved in a spring practice football game instead of a baseball contest after reading the above score.

But the game is baseball and that was the actual score posted by the two clubs in a walk-off contest last Thursday at the Mustangs' field.

Aside from the 19 total runs, the two teams combined for 21 hits and 26 walks to make it a wild game for the players, coaches and fans who sat in the cool,

early evening temperatures to witness the contest.

"I wish our pitching would come around. The batters are carrying the club right now," Northville coach Fred Holdsworth said.

The triumph was the second in three days for the Mustangs, who had lost to

None of those games may compare with the South Lyon contest, though.

The Lions jumped all over Mustang starting pitcher Joe Peters in the first inning. Peters gave up four runs on just one hit and two walks without getting a batter out.

Holdsworth then brought in Jim Thomson to close out the inning, but not before he allowed three more runs.

However, things were not much better for the Lions as the Mustangs retaliated with 10 runs of their own in the bottom of the first on six hits and four walks.

South Lyon forged ahead in the second with five more runs off Thomson, who was replaced by Brian Bidwell after two outs. Bidwell faced two batters before Holdsworth called John Dranginis to the mound to finish the contest.

The Lions tallied three runs in the third off Dranginis, who was pitching on one day's rest after hurling a complete game victory over Novi.

"He (Dranginis) said his arm was fine," explained Holdsworth, adding he was hesitant to bring in Dranginis but was left with no other choice. "John did a good job in the last four innings."

The senior lefthander's arm must have been okay as he held the Lions in check the rest of the afternoon on four hits, six strikeouts and five walks.

Northville added two runs of its own in the second and three in the third to make it a 15-all contest after three innings. However, senior third baseman Willie Newman smashed a two-run homerun in the fourth inning which proved to be the game winner.

The Mustangs added two more insurance runs in the sixth inning.

Willie Newman connected for another hit aside from the homer to rank as one of the top hitters for the day. His

younger brother Mickey, a sophomore, and senior Dave Malinowski each banged out three hits. Senior centerfielder Chris Beben also had two hits.

Dranginis was tough against Novi as he allowed four runs on seven hits, struckout 11 and walked but two batters.

Todd Bartling got the Mustangs rolling in the first inning with a two-run round tripper. The Mustangs added another run in the third and four in the sixth to win the opening game of the year.

Bartling, along with junior catcher Andy Dimitroff, lashed two hits to pace the 19-hit Mustang attack.

Northville and Brighton were engaged in a close 3-3 dual throughout four innings before the Bulldogs exploded for six runs in the fifth inning to seal the 9-4 win.

The losing pitcher was Dave Malinowski, who allowed nine runs on nine hits in just under five innings work. He struckout five, but walked 41 batters. Thomson finished the contest by hurling 1 1/2 innings of two-hit relief.

Even though Malinowski had a tough time on the mound, he was explosive with the bat as he clouted a three-run first inning homer, but it proved not to be enough. Dimitroff added a single and a double in the seven-hit Northville attack.

As Holdsworth predicted before the season started, the hitting as been a strong point for the squad as evident by its .403 team average.

However, the jury is still out on the pitching staff which is currently giving up 9.3 runs per game.

Holdsworth, though, was a little sympathetic toward Peters and Malinowski.

"Peters was a starter for the team last year, and he just didn't get off on the right foot. Malinowski I'm still depending on, and with a little more practice, he might develop into a good pitcher," he explained.

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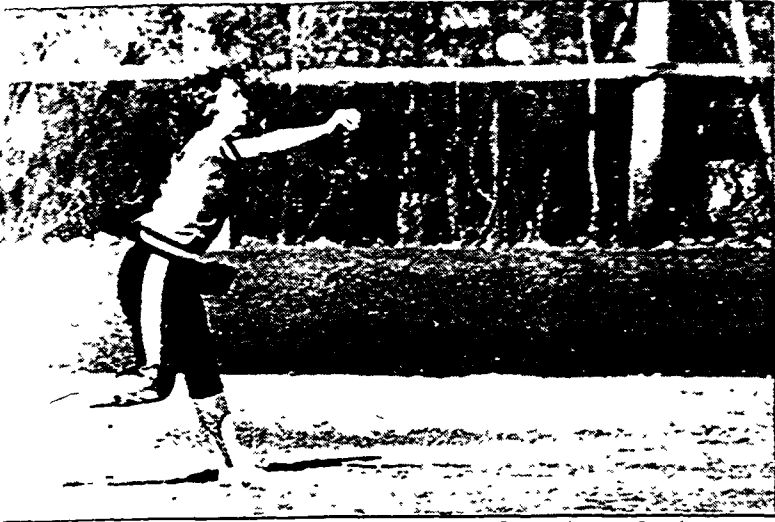
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# Softball team nips Novi for initial win

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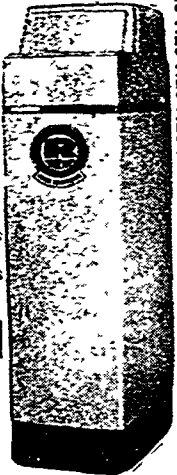
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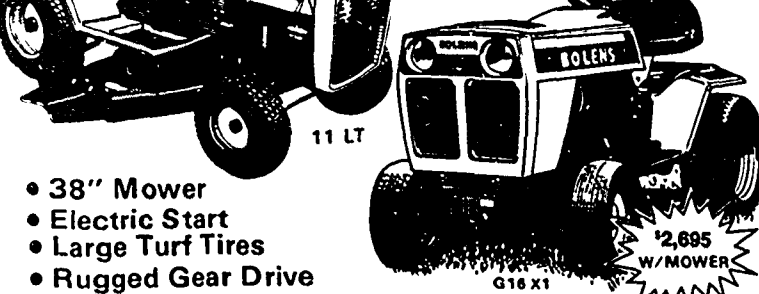


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# Mustangs fall to Country Day, Churchill

One thing Northville boys' track coach Ed Gabrys found out about his squad last week — it needs more work.

The Mustangs were handled easily by defending Western Six Conference champion Livonia Churchill, 110-22, last Thursday and suffered a disappointing 65-65½ loss to non-league opponent Detroit Country Day April 20.

However, Gabrys does see some light at the end of the tunnel after a couple of good performances by two sprinters.

Bruce Barry was a double winner in the Churchill meet by taking the 100-yard dash in a time of 10.7 and the 200-yard dash in a time of 24.7. In the Country Day meet, Barry won the 100-yard dash in a wind-aided time of 10.5.

"Barry is for real," Gabrys said.

Another good performance was turned in by hurdler Mark Knoth. He was third in the 120-yard high hurdles in a 15.9 clocking and was second in the 330-yard low hurdles with a 43.4 clocking against Churchill. At the Country Day meet, Knoth was first in the high hurdles with a wind-aided time of 15.9 and was victorious in the low hurdles with a 43.3 clocking.

Gabrys noted Knoth has good strength to be a hurdler, but still has to make some refinements on his technique.

Clark Couryoumjan was the only other runner to take a first in the Churchill meet. He took top honors in the

mile run with a 4:44 clocking and was third in the 880-yard run with a time of 2:11.

Norm Estisoy took a third in the 100-yard dash with a time of 11.1 for the only other points to come out of the running events.

The biggest problem for the Mustangs against Churchill was being outscored in the field events, 44-1, with high jumper Tim Wagner taking third with a height of 5-8. He tied with two Churchill jumpers but was third based on more misses.

Aside from the winning performances of Barry and Knoth at Country Day, Wagner took top honors in the high jump (5-10), Mike Beltz won the

pole vault (8-6) and the 440-yard relay team of John Letarte, Barry, Estisoy and Dan Vogt took first (48.7).

Letarte was runner-up in the long jump with a leap of 18-5, while Couryoumjan was second in the mile with a time of 4:50. Jim Williams took the second slot in the pole vault, and Scott Dayton was second in the two mile with a time of 10:41.

Taking thirds at the meet were Vogt in the long jump (18-3), Williams in the discus (92-feet), Dave Bach in the shot put (41-2), John Raczowski in the pole vault, Dayton in the mile (4:56) and Couryoumjan in the 880 run (2:14).

"It was not our day," Meteyer noted.

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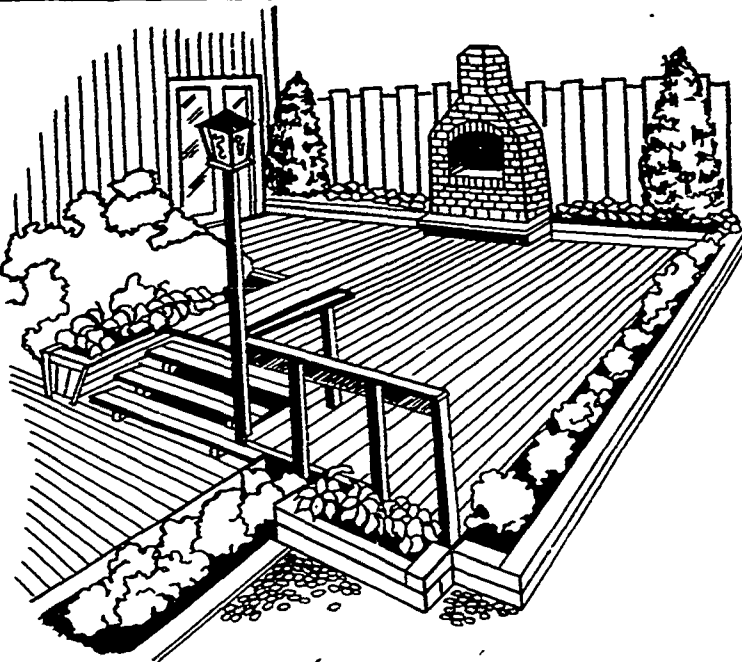
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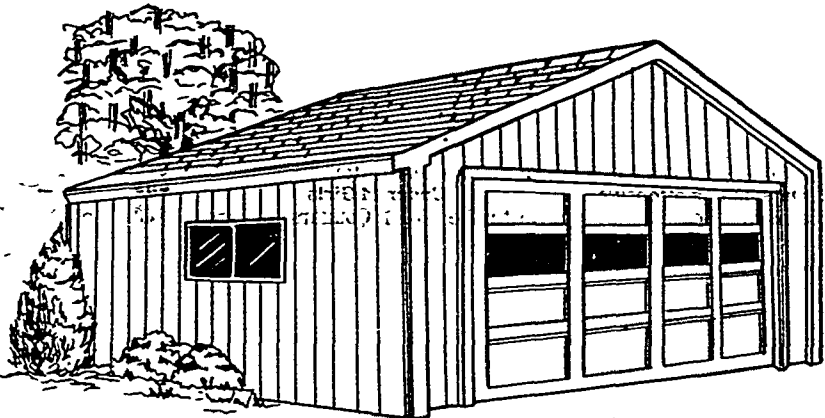
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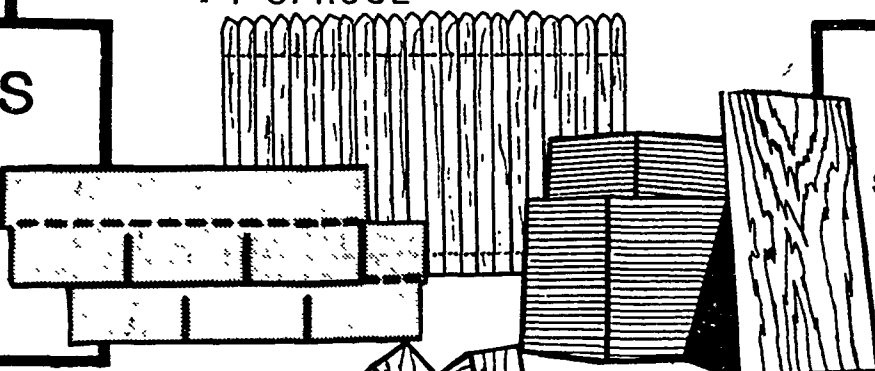
