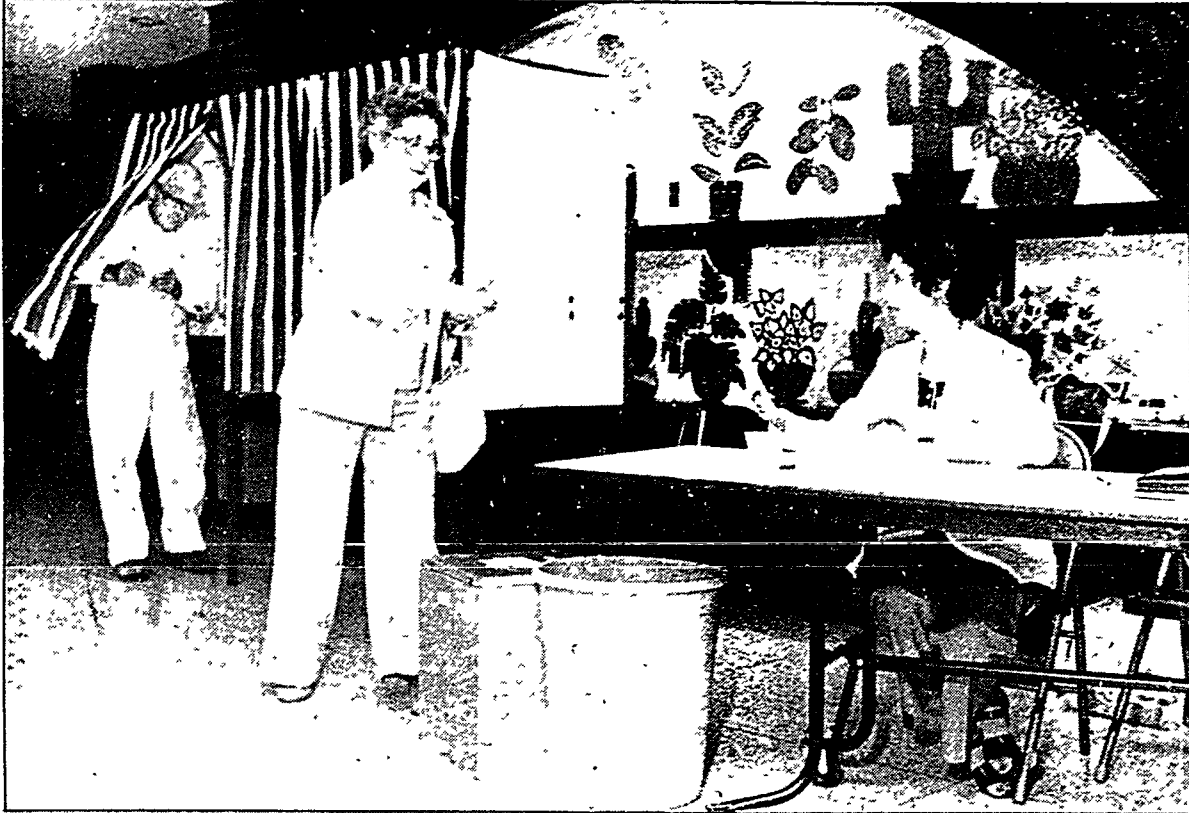

Light voter turnout elects two incumbents



Davis, Wilkinson reelected to board of education posts

With only one year of experience to her credit, school board incumbent Glenna Davis captured the highest number of votes in Monday's school board election, securing a four-year seat on the board along with incumbent Karen Wilkinson who was elected to her third term.

Davis, who was elected to the board last June to complete the term of Richard Barron, won her first full term with 522 votes. Wilkinson won reelection with 481 votes.

First time candidate Russell L. Dore received 235 votes with challengers Patrick Coyne and Andrew Sambrone garnering 153 and 138 votes, respectively.

As predicted, voter turnout was low with little more than five percent of Northville's registered voters casting ballots. Of Northville's 14,602 registered voters, only 819 turned out at the polls for Monday's election.

Despite the low voter turnout, 61 more ballots were cast in this year's school board election compared to last year's dismal 758 votes.

Highest voter turnout was in Precinct 4, where 201 voters cast ballots. Lowest voter turnout was in Precinct 5 where only 72 ballots were cast.

Voter turnout in other precincts is as follows:

Precinct 1 (City offices) — 178;
Precinct 2 (Silver Springs) — 91;
Precinct 3 (Winchester) — 113;
Precinct 6 (Moraine) — 164.

Write-in votes were cast for Todd Andrews, Larry VanderMolen and Linda Handyside. Each received one write-in vote.

Davis, 36, lives at 19405 Fry with her husband John and children Christie, 14, Rachel, 9 and Adam, 6.

A homemaker, she currently serves on four school board subcommittees including facilities, policy, legislation and Title IX. She also serves as liaison to the citizens' facilities committees.

A senior at Eastern Michigan University, she is a member of the Schoolcraft College Women's Advisory, Silver Springs PTA, Michigan Media Project, Northville State Hospital Advisory Council, Northwest Wayne County National Organization for Women and NOW's Homemaker Rights Task Force.

She chairs Silver Springs PTA Health Committee and is Michigan President of the Homemakers Equal Rights Association.

Wilkinson's election marks the beginning of her third four-year term on the Northville Board of Education. She was first elected to the board in 1974 and won election to her second term in 1978. She served as board president during the 1979-80 school year and was elected to the post a second time last July.

She received a bachelor of arts degree from Albion College and attended graduate school at University of

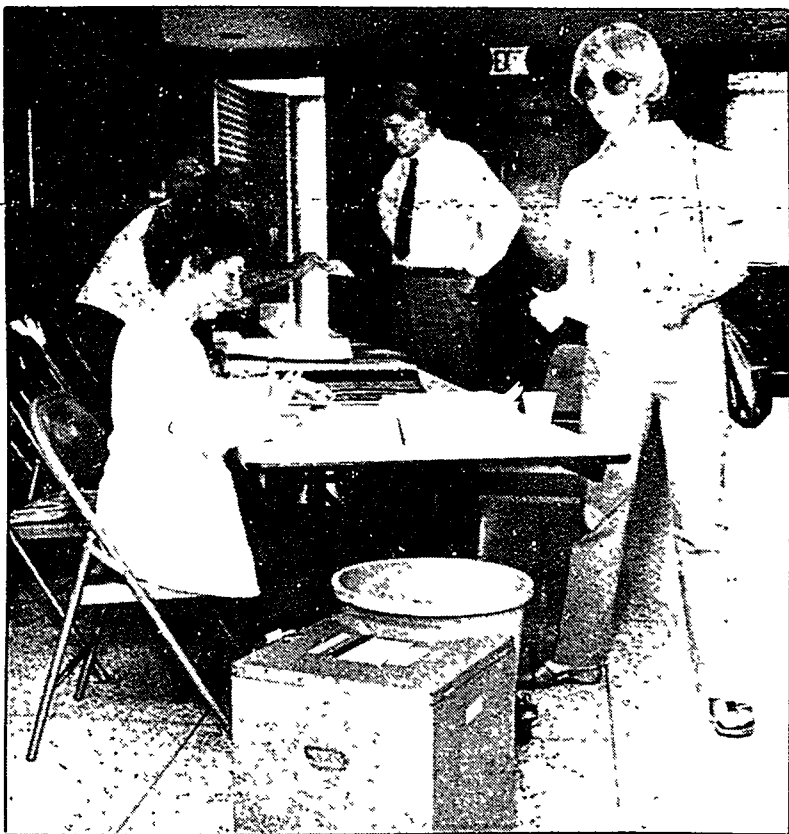
Michigan. A homemaker, she lives at 45871 Fernman with her husband William and children Sheryl, a sophomore at Albion College, and Donald, a junior at Northville High School.

She serves on the board of directors of the Michigan Association of School Boards and the Michigan High School Athletic Association. She also is a member of the League of Women Voters.

The two board members officially begin their new terms at the board's first meeting in July.

Two by two

Many voters turned out two at a time for Monday's board of education election which secured four-year terms for Glenna Davis and Karen Wilkinson. The incumbents defeated first-time challengers Russell Dore, Patrick Coyne and Andrew Sambrone. Voter turnout was light in all six of the district's precincts with only 819 of the district's 14,602 registered voters heading to the polls. Only a little more than five percent of Northville's registered voters cast ballots in the election. Racetrack cutbacks reduced, Kirksey says

While Jack E. Kirksey will not be representing Northville in the Legislature in the future, he has served the community well as state representative, especially in recent weeks. Tuesday he was able to get confirmation that the city will have the latest, and promised as final this year, racetrack decrease in returns reduced to \$89,536 instead of the previously announced \$240,000.

"My big disappointment is not being able to stay with Northville," commented Kirksey as he prepared to file as Republican candidate for state representative of the realigned 35th District yesterday morning.

In redistricting, Northville no longer is part of the 35th District. The new 35th is completely in Livonia.

Kirksey promised that "Northville will have an extra representative," as he declared his intention of continuing to follow the racetrack and state hospital situations in the Legislature.

City officials have praised Kirksey for his continuing efforts on behalf of the city to decrease the amount of cuts in returns to the city from racetrack revenues, as provided by the State Racing Act.

City Manager Steven Walters said, "It's still devastating, but less

devastating than the \$240,000 would have been."

Kirksey was to meet again later in the day Tuesday in Lansing with members of the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture who had agreed by telephone to reduce the latest slash of \$240,000 to \$89,536, which has been approved by the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture. Approval of the house subcommittee also is required to make the reduction.

"It is all confirmed and this is the last amount to be deducted this year," Kirksey declared yesterday morning, reporting on success in informing subcommittee members of the impact the reductions have on the city. Kirksey said earlier that many of these legislators "erroneously think that the racetracks are some type of bonanza for Livonia and Northville...and I am informing them of the fact that tracks are financial liabilities and in no way can they be considered an asset to the cities."

He had reported to city council that some legislators believed that racetrack patrons spend considerable money while they are in the community and that he was asserting that this "just isn't so."

Understaffing blamed in hospital audit

Reduced staffing due to budget cuts and a high patient population are the reasons cited by Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital representatives for an unfavorable report issued by the state auditor general's office last week.

The June 9 report of hospital operations between September 1978 and May 1981 was critical of sanitation and housekeeping at the hospital, patient and personnel record-keeping and the hospital's contacts with community placement homes.

"Most of the problems have been addressed since the time the audit was concluded last year, administrative assistant Theodore Gaston said Monday.

While Department of Mental Health Director C. Patrick Babcock cited the patient population of 1,000 in a building meant for 600 as one reason for the problems, Gaston said populations remain at that level.

Roughly 250 to 300 staff members were added at the beginning of the fiscal year, Gaston related, improving staff:patient ratios somewhat as total staff rose to between 1,200 and 1,300. However, 30 employees will likely be laid off June 20 if the Michigan State Employees Association (MSEA) and the DMH do not agree to contract concessions.

"Due to the inability of MSEA to reach a determination on concessions granted by every other state employees union," Gaston said, "we have what was proposed as a layoff of 55 persons which was adjusted downward, with other budget cuts, to 30 effective June 20."

In a meeting with local officials concerned about escapees from the hospital last fall, Babcock had noted the plans for added hiring and said he expected improvement in the walkaway rate as a result. He was recently quoted as saying the hospital staffing is at 80 percent of requirements.

As of May 22, the latest data

available, Gaston said the hospital employed 1,125 persons.

Gaston said the audit report reveals problems the hospital knew about and tried to address in new hiring. "We added seven or eight people in housekeeping," he said, because hospital administrators knew there was a problem there.

That the auditors found five treatment personnel were unlicensed, Gaston attributed to missing documentation in personnel records. "As I recall, the auditors found about five people with licenses that had not been renewed. The problem there was that

They're head of the class at NHS

Jacqueline (Jacque) Nixon and Erin McGowan both studied public speaking at Northville High School — and it's a good thing, because as Northville's 1982 valedictorian and salutatorian, respectively, they'll be delivering speeches at commencement ceremonies this Friday.

Nixon, who will graduate with a grade point average of 3.96 on a 4.0 point scale, is the daughter of Patricia and Travis Nixon of 21824 Rathlone, while McGowan is the daughter of Marie and William McGowan of 41966 Banbury.

Nixon doesn't excel just in the classroom — she's also a three-year veteran of the soccer field and basketball court. In basketball, she was named to the All-League team three times and to the All-Area team twice. In soccer, she was named this year to the All-League second team.

A member of the National Honor

Society, Nixon also served this year as sports editor of the Mustang, Northville's high school newspaper, and has served as an official at youth soccer games.

Nixon is also active outside of school. She'll be working this summer in Redford, and is currently involved with planning youth activities at Sword of the Spirit church in Livonia.

Nixon says her favorite classes at Northville High School were in English, literature, and humanities, and though she's not sure what her major will be, she plans to study communication at Hillsdale College this fall.

She'll also be playing basketball there, and has received a basketball scholarship that will help her pay tuition. However, she adds, she hopes to become involved in more school activities in college — perhaps student government or the student newspaper.

McGowan says she was "very surprised" to discover that she had been

named salutatorian of her class. "I didn't expect it at all," she said, admitting she really isn't certain of her exact grade point average.

McGowan was also close to sports at Northville. However, her performance was not on the field but on the sidelines as a cheerleader. A cheerleader for three years, McGowan was co-captain of the cheerleading squad this year.

As a junior, McGowan served the class of 1982 as treasurer, and she also works part-time at the Magic Pan at Twelve Oaks Mall.

McGowan studied French throughout high school, and concentrated her studies at Northville in writing classes and journalism. Though she says she likes math and finds it easy, she will focus her attention at the University of Michigan on courses that will get her into law school.

"I think I want to be a criminal lawyer," she said. "It's something I've always wanted to do."

Final selection made on computers

After a couple months hemming and hawing over the issue, township trustees last week approved expenditure of more than \$50,000 for new computer equipment.

The Nixdorf system selected is virtually identical to the one treasurer Richard Henningsen and business manager David Leiko said they were "leaning toward" in April.

Equipment was ordered after the water and sewer commission agreed to share costs with the township general fund, but Henningsen asked that the item be tabled at the board's May session. He said he wished to further explore other options open to the township.

New data processing equipment is needed, township officials said, because the present hodge-podge of machines accumulated in the past is overloaded and cannot perform functions determined helpful in operating the offices. Without the equipment, rising overtime costs and the hiring of additional clerical help in the water and sewer department were anticipated.

Leiko said Tuesday delivery of the new system could be expected within the month, if not sooner.

Among the major advantages cited for the Nixdorf equipment over the Cado, IBM and Burroughs offerings examined is nearly cost-free software, lifted from the similar system used in Canton Township. In exchange for use

of that community's software (programming), the township will offer use of its equipment in the event Canton's breaks down at an inopportune time.

Henningsen noted that he and Leiko were "amply advised" by data processing consultants, notably Lawrence Systems (owned by township resident Larry Socie) and volunteer assistance by Victor Gallia, a resident with data processing expertise.

"I am not an expert in these matters," Henningsen told the board Thursday night. "So I searched out the opinions of experts, and they seem to be decidedly in favor of the Nixdorf system."

Housing the new equipment, which requires a monitored climate, will require that Leiko move out of his present office space in township hall. The business manager will move into the

quarters presently shared by Supervisor John MacDonald and Henningsen. MacDonald has often stated he has little use for his own office in township hall, and Henningsen noted he does more work in the clerk's office than in his own space.

Henningsen said the township would purchase a maintenance contract from Nixdorf to serve while the system is set into place. In a longer range view, he noted a reciprocal arrangement with Canton is a possible alternative to maintenance contracts once the system is operating in the township.

The system being purchased, he said, is slightly altered in the choice of specific machines from the proposal first discussed several months ago, but cost has not changed. The shift in machine purchases, Henningsen related, was on the advice of the consultants.

Board sets tax hearing for township July 8

Bewildered though they are about how Michigan's new truth in taxation law applies to their specific situation, township board members last week set a public hearing for July 8 in accordance with the law.

"Seriously, I don't think we need to have a public hearing," Supervisor John MacDonald told the board. "But, when in doubt, it seems best that we go ahead."

His statement reflects the ambivalence of township leaders as they try to meet the letter of a law passed by the state Legislature last year to focus the property tax argument at the local level. Unfortunately, the officials noted, the law does not address the township's situation specifically.

Essentially, the law allows a governmental body's year-to-year property tax income to increase automatically only to reflect new construction and improvements. If the governing body chooses to take advantage of increased

property valuations, it must hold a public hearing and vote to collect the added tax revenue.

In practice, this means millages must be rolled back to compensate for increased valuations. If no new construction or property improvements were involved, a government would either collect exactly the same dollar amount as the year before, or hold a public hearing to state its intention to reap the benefits of increased valuations.

But the township intends to collect more dollars while abstaining from what some taxpayers have called the "windfall" of increased valuations. How?

The board has stated its intention to roll back the three mills levied last year in direct proportion to the increased assessments. But it has also made clear its intention to levy the new 0.7 mill voters approved for police use in the November election.

The law, Clerk Susan Heintz said, does not clearly define hearing requirements in this situation.

"The voters have already approved it," she said, "so it seems a little silly to be holding a public hearing to consider having the board approve it."

Additionally, the law calls for printed announcements of the meeting to relate the new collections to the 1982-83 fiscal year budget.

"The new millage does not apply to our 1982-83 budget at all," Heintz said. "We collect taxes in December for use the following April, which would be the 1983-84 fiscal year."

The board passed a resolution attempting to explain its dilemma to township property owners and clarifying its position regarding last year's three mills and the 0.7 mill addition this year.

The result will not be 3.7 mills of township tax, but something less than that after Headlee and other rollback calculations are performed on the previously existing 3.0 mills.

School tax topic June 28

Northville Board of Education will hold a public hearing June 28 to discuss the proposed millage rate for the 1982-83 school year.

In accordance with Michigan's "truth in taxation" legislation, the board is required to post notice of the hearing prior to the end of June and state its authority to levy the maximum millage rate — regardless of whether that millage rate will be established for the coming school year.

Superintendent Lawrence Nichols explained that the notice, which is published in this week's Record, may be misleading to Northville taxpayers.

While the notice states that the public hearing is to discuss the "levying in 1982 of an additional pro-

posed millage rate of 2.5021 mills for operating purposes," Nichols said the board does not intend to levy the maximum millage rate at this time.

Nichols said he expects the school board to establish the millage rate sometime in late July or early August. The school district still does not have its final SEV figures and will be waiting for the completion of its 1981-82 audit before setting the rate.

The board of education currently levies 31.4 of its 32.9 authorized operational mills.

Administrators are hoping for a large turnout at the June 28 hearing which begins at 7:30 p.m. in the board conference room at Old Village School.

Camp Wanna-Read, the 1982 Summer Reading Program at Northville Public Library, begins tomorrow for all Northville elementary through junior high students.

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Dog temperament test here this weekend on Downs grounds

Food and drinks will be available during the tests.

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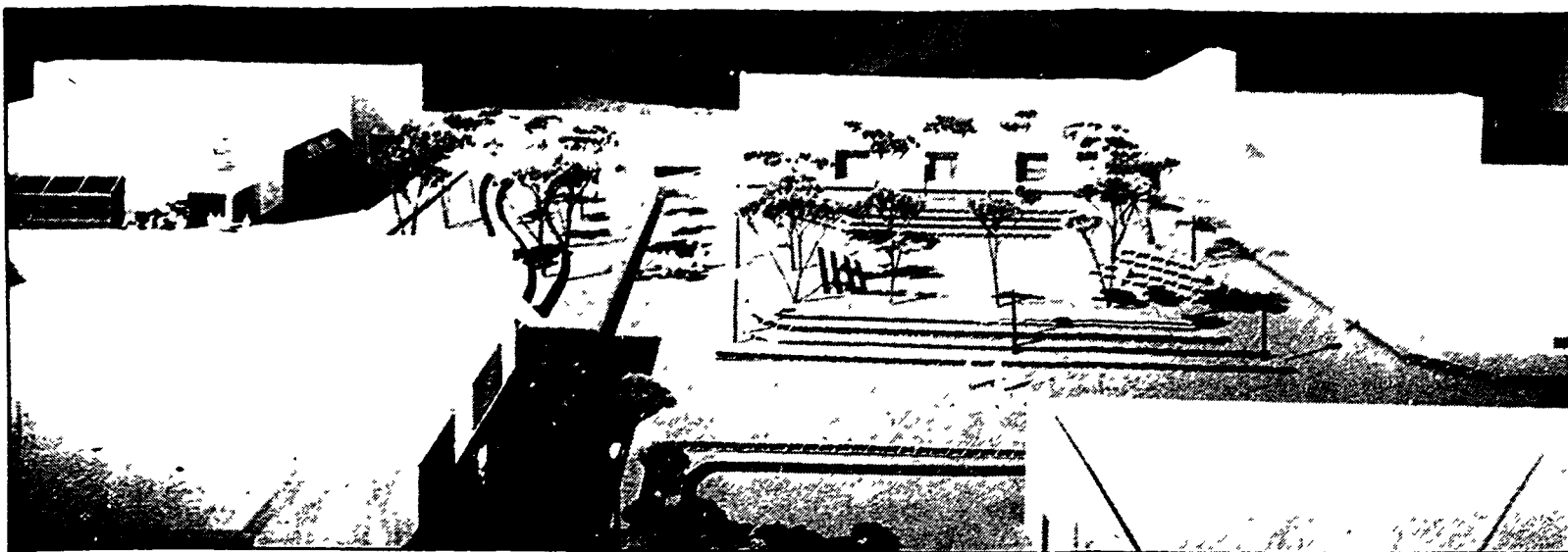
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'Village concept' won professional award for state prison architects, but activity is stalled

Prison design praised, but project is delayed

Plans for a new state prison in Northville Township have been cited for excellence by the American Institute of Architects (AIA).

Construction of the prison, a prototype design for a proposed system of "regional" corrections facilities, has been delayed one year. Ground-clearing efforts were begun this spring, but stalled in early May as the state's fiscal crisis put the project on hold. Last week it was announced the most recent budget cuts will delay construction until next year.

Architects for the 550-bed multi-security prison are TMP Associates, Inc. of Bloomfield Hills.

The design is a "village concept," approximating a small community in scale and ambience, according to project designer Maurice Allen, a principal of TMP.

Buildings of moderate size for administration, visiting, food service, health care, education and recreation enclose a "town square," said the designer. A street leads through this active, secure center through resident housing and to outdoor recreation areas.

The security perimeter is to be double-fenced, electronically-monitored and landscaped where it faces nearby residential properties.

The design was in response to goals set by the Michigan Department of Corrections. The public is protected from

criminal escape. A humane, safe environment is provided for staff and residents encouraging positive attitudes and interaction. Construction is economical and secure.

Housing is to be provided for close custody, medium and minimum security levels. While residents in one security level will not have access to another, they are encouraged to move to a less restrictive level based on demonstrated responsible behavior.

The regional centers for which the local prison is the prototype are designed to replace the state's older, difficult to manage and expensive to operate prisons.

The recent competition, sponsored by AIA and the American Correctional Association, will result in an exhibition of 46 entrants of which six, including the TMP design, have been cited for excellence by the jury. The exhibition will be unveiled at the 1982 congress of the ACA in Toronto, August 16-19.

TMP Associates is a 50-member multi-disciplinary architectural firm. Other TMP projects in progress include the Central Regional Training Center for the Burroughs Corporation located outside Chicago, renovation of the University of Michigan Union, a fine arts center and allied health science building for Macomb Community College Center Campus and multi-disciplinary ambulatory care center of the U-M Hospital system.

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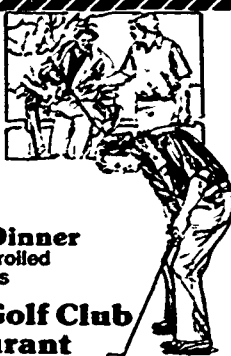
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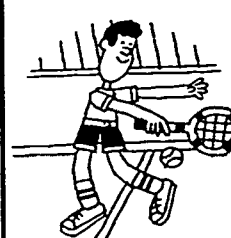
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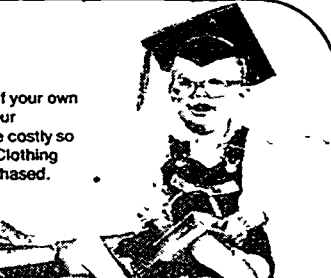
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In new 36th District

State house race, absent Kirksey, draws a crowd

With yesterday's filing deadline fast approaching, the race for the 36th State house district seat was shaping up recently as a three-way match among Republicans with a lone Democrat waiting to meet the winner in November.

Plymouth Township Trustee Gerry

Law, Canton resident Gary Wolfram and Northville Township resident Ron Fisher all have announced their intentions to seek the Republican nomination in the district, which has no incumbent.

It appeared early yesterday that Wayne County Commissioner R.

William Joyner will run unopposed for the Democratic nomination. State-wide primary elections are August 10.

Reapportionment took Northville out of the 35th District presently represented by Livonia Republican Jack Kirksey and aligned it with Plymouth, Plymouth Township and the majority of Canton Township in the new 36th District.

Law, brother to Milliken administration aide Robert Law (a former representative), is a Plymouth Township trustee and has been given the nod by most Republican leaders in the district, including U.S. Congressman Carl Pursell and State Senator R. Robert Geake (R-Northville). Governor Milliken is slated to appear at a Law fundraiser and most observers consider him the leading contender.

Law has Kirksey's endorsement, as well as that of Representative Roy Smith, who formerly represented the southern end of the new district. His campaign committee includes the entire Northville Township board of trustees and city mayor Paul Vernon. Township Clerk Susan Heintz is serving as local campaign coordinator. Law has similar support in the Canton and Plymouth areas.

Wolfram, an economics professor at the University of Michigan-Dearborn campus, said he is aiming for a "grassroots" effort to overturn Law's

strength among the local party leadership. To that end, he has been canvassing the area door-to-door and appeared at last week's meeting of the township board of trustees to make himself available to those attending.

Noting his doctorate in economics, Wolfram said he has the knowledge to address Michigan's fiscal crisis and is counting on people to understand economists must play a role in politics. A runner who finished 199th at the Boston Marathon (in a field of 1,600), Wolfram has slated a five mile run in Plymouth July 11 as a part of his campaign.

Fisher, a resident of Maxwell in the township, is calling for a massive turnover of leadership in the Michigan house. Father to three teenagers, Fisher is employed as a gauge maker. He is also active as a lay minister with the Open Door church and is director of the recently formed National Parents' Coalition — both organizations are centered in Northville.

A 1962 graduate of Livonia's Bentley High School, Fisher has attended Henry Ford Community College, Central Bible College (Detroit) and Madonna Col-

lege. Fisher's activity has been focused on family law, church vs. state conflicts, the defense of "traditional family values and parental authority." In 1980 he campaigned for the Democratic nomination in the 35th District and lost to Barbara Sowers, who subsequently fell to Kirksey in November.

In the 1980 campaign, he used the Bible as a "touchstone" for his platform opposing legalized abortion, calling for cuts in welfare spending and revision of divorce and child custody laws in the state.

FitzPatrick shakes up county executive race

While other leading contenders were concentrating on completing filing requirements before yesterday's deadline, Robert FitzPatrick dropped a bombshell on the race for Wayne County Executive June 8.

FitzPatrick, executive director of the Wayne County Economic Development Corporation and former county commission chairman, was expected to be a candidate for the newly created post. But when he threw his hats into the rings, he did more than many expected. "Yes, hats and rings — FitzPatrick has filed as both a Democrat and a Republican, which means his name will appear on both ballots in the August 10 primary.

behind sheriff William Lucas and Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara. It would likely take an ad campaign that would consume more than the EDC director can raise to improve that grade.

On the Republican side of the contest, however, the former county commissioner stands out as one of widest-known (if only marginally). Snatching the Republican nomination in such a field is a far less difficult task. The EDC director is likely to have the most money in the smallest GOP field, as well. (County public information officer Harry Stearnes, a Plymouth resident, is in this field — his name recognition and money-raising ability is typical in lagging behind FitzPatrick's).

But strong Republican identification is not likely to be an asset in a Wayne County race come November. Democrats have traditionally dominated county-wide politics here, and perhaps only some shred of Democratic identity can carry a GOP candidate over the party's own nominee.

But for now, the EDC director is looking toward August. The Republican side of the ledger looks even better for FitzPatrick when considering that the primary is a partisan election — meaning split tickets are not allowed.

For western Wayne (read Republican) voters who may also be faced with other contested GOP races, FitzPatrick may be the most palatable candidate around when a choice of McNamara (whose name recognition is strongest in this area) means ignoring the contests likely to choose the next representative or senator.

That same factor might help Lucas slip through ahead of McNamara in the Democratic primary and could set up a Lucas-FitzPatrick match-up for November. And that is probably FitzPatrick's best shot at election, now that the pack of Democratic contenders has outdistanced one of the earliest starters.

FitzPatrick was not hesitant last week to spell out his qualifications for the job. As a former commission chairman, he said, "I am the only candidate in this race with any real experience in running county government."

He noted that the last balanced Wayne County budget was nine years ago, when he was chairman.

FitzPatrick, who is not only EDC director but also of the Metropolitan Growth & Development Corporation, also said the major issue of the campaign is jobs. Citing the Northville Township proposed elderly housing project as one example, FitzPatrick said he is the only candidate working to create jobs.

He concluded his speech with a signal he might be looking for votes from the non-traditional voter. "Whether you've voted 20 times in the past or this will be your first vote, I urge you to not be so cynical as to think your vote cannot make a difference in your life."

In a strongly-worded, energetic speech after handing nominating petitions in to the county clerk's office, FitzPatrick said he wanted to "signal that now there is one man in this race who believes that serving all the citizens of Wayne County should be a non-partisan job."

He said also that he believes "Wayne County citizens deserve far more than partisan politics as usual."

FitzPatrick said he had filed in both parties because he believes county citizens to be "fed up" with partisan politics, "fat cat bureaucrats," and "pinheaded phonies who do what well-oiled political machines tell them to do."

He also said he wants to be the candidate of choice among Republicans, Democrats, independents, "and those who may have given up on voting, because no matter how they've voted in the past, they feel they're always getting the short end of the stick."

In short, the speech was a vitriolic attack on politics as usual and partisan politics in particular, playing to the public's perceptions of the process.

Most observers, however, noted that FitzPatrick was making what looked like some shrewd political maneuvers himself.

In a crowded Democratic race likely to be dominated by the name recognition factor, FitzPatrick ranks decidedly

State police praise Schrot's activity at accident scene

Prompt, professional action while off duty at the scene of an automobile accident February 29 has led to nominations for state police and constables' association awards for township constable James F. Schrot.

State Police Lieutenant William Pertner, commanding officer of the Brighton post, credited Schrot with saving the life of a motorist trapped in a vehicle after the crash.

Pertner's account of the incident, described in a letter included in township board information, notes the off-duty Schrot came upon the scene of a head-on collision on M-59 near US-23 in Hartland Township only seconds after it occurred.

Finding one driver to be trapped in the vehicle, Pertner wrote, "Officer Schrot took immediate charge of the accident scene by turning off the racing engine of the... vehicle by pulling wires under the dash." The car was so severely damaged, the ignition did not work.

Shortly thereafter, the engine compartment burst into flames and Officer Schrot readily extinguished the blaze with the use of a fire extinguisher which he had equipped in his own pickup truck," Pertner wrote.

Two state troopers, who had a long distance to travel, arrived at the scene 20 minutes later, the state police lieutenant noted. "Upon speaking with witnesses who had observed the actions... it was apparent that the (troopers) would not have arrived in time to aid the trapped driver."

The driver was extracted from the vehicle half an hour later, taken to the hospital, treated and later released.

"It is the opinion of the undersigned officer," Pertner wrote, "that the eager dedication to duty and willingness to come to the aid of an injured person displayed by Officer Schrot's timely and effective actions prevented the death of the trapped motorist as the entire vehicle surely would have been engulfed in flames by the time other qualified and equipped personnel could have assisted."

Pertner concluded the letter with the notation that he had requested a citation of recognition from the State Police Board of Awards, which is pending that body's quarterly meeting. He also recommended the constable's association consider recognition of Schrot's action.

The township board of trustees voted unanimously Thursday night to include Pertner's letter in Schrot's personnel file in township hall.

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Police Blotter Arson suspected

In the township...

Arson is suspected in a fire that consumed a large portion of a house at 1785 Ridge Road Friday.

Township police have labeled the fire an arson after fire chief Robert Toms determined the blaze had started simultaneously in two separate locations.

Police reports of the fire indicate the southern end of the house was engulfed in flames reaching 20 feet in height as dark smoke rolled eastward.

The structure was unoccupied at the time of the fire near midnight Friday. Neighbors reported seeing cars and trucks parked in the driveway only hours before the fire erupted. The house has been unoccupied lately.

After the fire was extinguished, Toms' preliminary examination of the debris indicated it was a set fire and started both near some beds in the southeast corner and at a point near the southwest corner. The area in between was relatively uncharred, according to the report.

Police do have a suspect in the case, but are suppressing other details pending issuance of a warrant and arrest.

Anthony Hynes, 18, of Ridge Road is serving a 90-day sentence for probation violation after township police arrested the man inside another Ridge Road residence.

Hynes has been arraigned on breaking and entering charges (similar to those that led to the probation) and will face trial in Wayne County Circuit Court.

According to police chief Kenneth Hardesty, Hynes of 1765 Ridge, was apprehended after police received a silent alarm indicating a break-in at 1803 Ridge. Upon arrival, police observed a subject inside the residence. The alarm company called the house and the subject answered, telling the alarm firm his identity was none of their business.

When police surrounded the house and knocked at the door, there was no answer. After entering, Hardesty said, township officers found Hynes hiding inside the residence.

Camera equipment valued at \$400 and several bottles of liquor were reported stolen from Eddy's Tin Fu on Seven Mile Road Friday night.

Owner Eddy Tse told police three white males around 20 years old had entered the restaurant office and fled with his Minolta camera and flash and several bottles of liquor.

The young men, two described as shirtless and a third as wearing a yellow and blue T-shirt, all wearing jeans, fled the restaurant when discovered.

Police arrived shortly after the thefts but were unable to locate the subjects.

The bottles of liquor were discovered in the brush behind the restaurant and returned to the owners, except one bottle held in evidence.

A \$200 brass driveway lamp, with an eagle decoration on top, was reported stolen from a Whipple residence between May 29 and 31.

The owner told police the lamp was intact at 10 p.m. May 29 and missing at 8 a.m. May 31. There were no leads on the case.

Cash and a television set were reported stolen from the concession stand at Thomson Field June 12 or 13.

Workers at the stand told police \$25 cash and a seven-inch Admiral black-and-white television valued at \$100 went missing from the stand between 10:15 p.m. Saturday and 7:30 a.m. Sunday.

Police could find no fresh signs of forced entry to the structure. A gap in a boarded window was the only possible point of entry noted, and it did not show signs of recent activity.

A two-car collision on Northville Road June 7 resulted in visible but minor injuries to a six-year-old passenger and citations to both drivers involved.

As described in police reports, both vehicles were northbound on Northville Road, south of Cass Benton Drive. When Lowell Hitt, 35, of 334 Pennell stopped behind two cars ahead of him, his car was rear-ended by a vehicle driven by Betty Sutton, 53, of 16745 Old Bedford.

Neither the 6-year-old Hitt boy nor his mother required hospitalization from minor injuries. Police noted the woman made a complaint of pain but had no visible injuries, and the boy had minor cuts or bruises.

Sutton reported no injuries. She was ticketed for failure to stop within assured clear distance ahead. Hitt was cited for driving with a suspended license.

A \$300 scaffolding was stolen from a home being built on Baseline between May 25 and June 5, police report.

The complainant reported the scaffolding was taken from a log home being built on Baseline. He said he found it missing June 3 and the last time he saw it was May 25, city police said.

Unknown suspects stole a \$100 Schwinn varsity 26-inch 10-speed bicycle from in front of Arbor Drugs June 9, police report.

Unknown suspects stole a \$100 Briggs and Stratton lawn mower engine from an unlocked Debra Street garage between June 3 and 6, police said.

This was the fifth report of a stolen lawn mower in the past month and police caution people to be more careful when leaving their mower unattended. One of the biggest problems, Sergeant Al Cox noted, was persons leaving their garage door open. He advised to keep the door closed and locked at all times.

Four juveniles were arrested and referred to the youth bureau in connection with breaking windows at Warren Products on Baseline June 5, city police reports indicate.

All three youths were released to their parents, while the fourth suspect was brought to the police station by one of his parents. Warren Products estimated the cost of repair to be \$58, including installation, the report said.

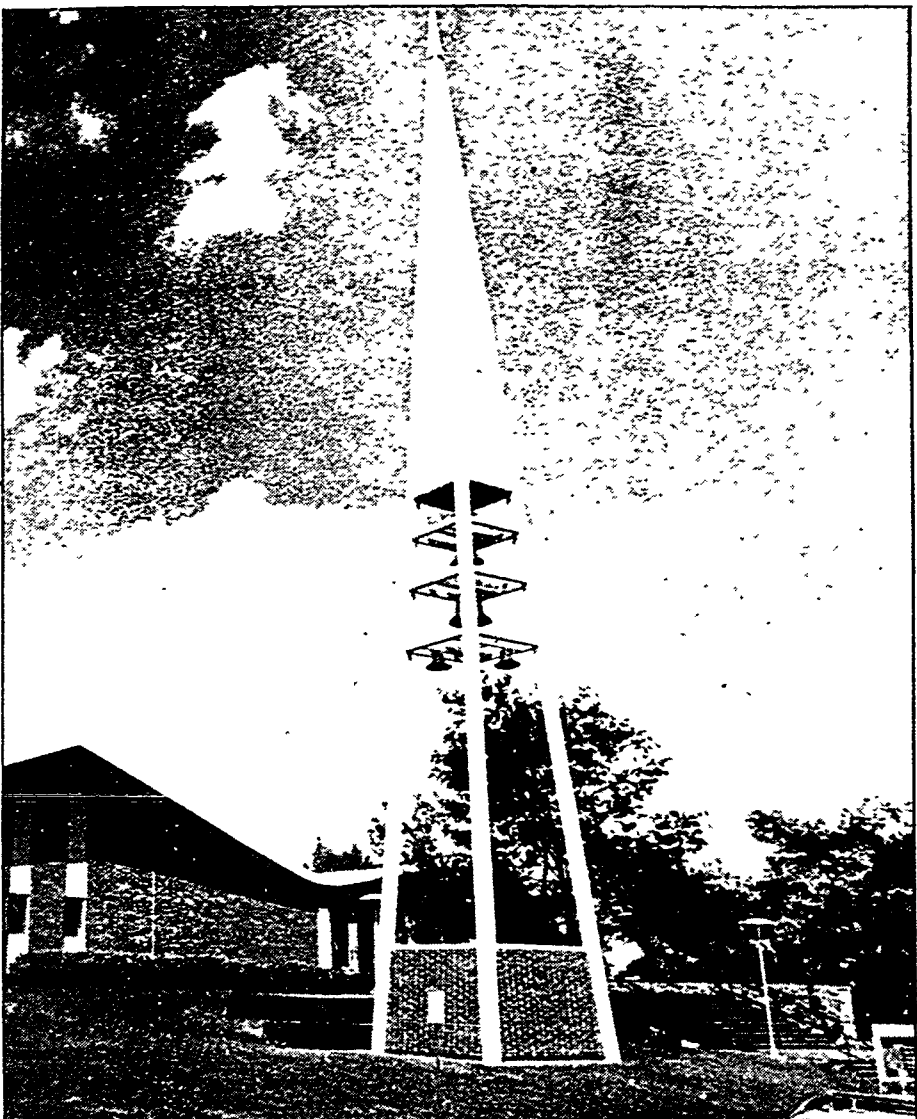

Our representation needed at college

The resignation of Schoolcraft College trustee Nancie Blatt creates a vacancy on the community college board of trustees that will be filled by a board appointment the end of next month. As interested candidates are sought, it seems the right time for Northville to gain direct representation on the board.

Northville has not had a trustee from the community serving on the board since 1973. Almost nine years is a long time to be without direct representation on the board of the college whose district Northville voted to become part of — and whose residents support it as their community college with tax dollars. While Michael Burley, a Northville teacher, is a board member, he lives in Canton.

After Northville voted to join the college district in 1963, two years after it was established, several residents represented the community well on the board. Dr. Gordon R. Forrer served 1963-67; B. William Secord followed from 1967-71; Dr. R. Robert Geake served from 1969 until he became a state representative. The late Floyd Kehrl was appointed in 1973 for one year.

In 1971 a change was made in the election process so that trustees were elected at large from the communities within the college district — these include the public school districts of Clarenceville, Northville, Livonia, Plymouth-Canton, Garden City and part of Novi. Since then, no Northville resident has served on the board. In last year's election, there was not even a Northville candidate.

Several residents have serv-

ed in other capacities, especially on the college foundation. They include Russell Amerman, Philip Ogilvie, Jan Reef and the late Mr. Kehrl.

With 70 students in the 304-member Class of 1982 indicating plans to attend Schoolcraft (35 of whom officially have applied), there should be someone in the community with an interest in serving on the board. Having a trustee — an "ear" right in the community — is an asset to those attending.

Present trustees Laura Toy, a small gift shop operator, Paul Kadish, an insurance underwriter firm owner, and Leonard Wozniak, with a computer firm, now represent small business on the board while Burley and Rosina Raymond have teaching backgrounds. Harry Greenleaf in personnel with Ford Motor Company adds a professional business background.

Ideally, a new person on the board would be able to contribute with accounting or budget experience, perhaps having served previously on a public school board.

A Northville representative would give Schoolcraft improved visibility locally. The ideal local appointee from our viewpoint would benefit both our community and the college. He or she could be a liaison between the college and local civic groups if there were need.

Let's hope there is an interest on the part of a qualified local resident in offering this type of service. The Schoolcraft Board of Trustees now is accepting applications and will review them the last week in July.

'Directed' — that's the Class of '82

Last Thursday Northville High School students whose names may never before have appeared in The Northville Record received recognition at the annual honors night program that is part of graduation activities at Northville High School.

The night to honor scholarship began at 7 p.m., recognizing those students who have taken advantage of the programs that the high school offers — and their goals and test scores prove that there are many positives here.

The adults who are members of local groups that annually provide scholarship aid and recognition to graduating seniors have commented this year on the high caliber of the seniors they interviewed. Gwen Marburger, committee chairman for the two \$500 grants awarded by the Life Member group of Mothers' Club, stated it had never been harder to choose from among the applicants. "All are so qualified and so directed," she observed.

Jay Ward, president of the Northville Branch of the American Association of University Women, reports the scholarship committee had a "really difficult" choice to make as all three finalists were so well qualified. The 56-member branch awards a local \$300 scholarship as well as contributes a like amount to the national AAUW.

As a member of scholarship award committees in years' past as well as this year, I concur with these chairmen. The graduates in the Class of 1982 are impressive. They also are remarkably directed. Take Gary Laundroche who is aiming for a culinary arts career and has worked during the past two years at area restaurants. Currently an assistant at Tiffany's in Twelve Oaks Mall, he applied for admission to the Schoolcraft culinary arts program when he was in 10th grade and has been notified of acceptance.

Maureen Sullivan and Pamela Mastuntuono are interested in careers in computer engineering and nursing respectively. Maureen has been accepted by

Oakland University, and Pamela will be a freshman at Wayne State University. Charles Hibbelin whose portfolio of original drawings shows a talent already well developed has chosen the Kendall School of Design in Grand Rapids — and been accepted. Rory Savageau, whose long-range goal is to build his own computer, has been accepted at Lawrence Institute of Technology.

Some of the credit for scholarship committees meeting outstanding members of the graduating class must go to the counseling department. Gladys Cohen, this year's senior counselor, agrees that counselors are more familiar with their students than in years' past because they now take a class and counsel its students through high school.

She is encouraged with the serious direction of the students in the Class of 1982, noting that the graduating seniors have been applying early to colleges and universities of their choice. While the largest number of the 304 graduates — about 70 — have indicated they are interested in continuing their education at Schoolcraft Community College with 35 already signed up, there is an unusually large group of 29, Cohen points out proudly, already signed to attend University of Michigan. Central Michigan University has 19 signed to attend.

Counselor Cohen also notes that baccalaureate service Sunday morning at the high school was well attended. She estimates that about half the graduating class came to hear the message of Dr. Lawrence Chamberlain, minister of First Presbyterian Church. This Friday night the 304 graduates of Northville High School will march across the athletic field in caps and gowns to receive recognition from parents, administrators and community. They are fortunate to have attended a school small enough for their achievements to be recognized individually. This is a time to honor achievement.

Cross-country was a new sport at our high school in those days. In fact, it was the only fall sport other than football, and, quite frankly, runners just didn't receive the same adulation reserved for football players.

The "crowd" at our meets on those beautiful fall days at Cass Benton Park in Northville invariably consisted of just one person — my father. He was always there, rain or shine, watching his son, the second baseman, running up and down those hills.

Father's Day is Sunday. And it's about time, I said "thanks, Dad, and Happy Father's Day."

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Schoolcraft taxes, rising slightly, are topic today

If you look at your property tax bills under a microscope, you may notice your Schoolcraft College rise about \$5 this year, assuming your \$60,000 market-value house is assessed for \$30,000.

The increase will be hard to notice because it will amount to 17 cents per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation minus a decrease in the debt retirement millage of three cents per \$1,000.

How to explain these minute amounts occupied college trustees for nearly an hour last week as they prepared for a state-required "truth in taxation" public hearing.

The public hearing is scheduled for 7 p.m. today in the board room of the Administration Building at 18600 Haggerty in Livonia.

It will be followed at 8 p.m. by a public hearing on the college's 1982-83 operating budget of \$15.3 million, up a scant 4.7 percent over the current year.

"We're not going anywhere. We're treading water," trustee Michael W. Burley said of the new budget.

The new budget eliminates one administrative position (the jobs of director of financial aids and registrar have been consolidated under one person), contains no salary increases, and replaces four full-time faculty positions with their part-time equivalents.

It adds one full-time faculty post in the new culinary arts addition and a full-time custodian.

The reason for the hearing on the tax rate goes back to the fine print of the 1978 Headlee tax limitation amendment.

Under the amendment, local governments are supposed to roll back their tax rates (millage) when assessments rise faster than the rate of consumer price inflation. A state law provides that a governing board may, however, levy its full authorized millage if it first puts the matter to public hearing.

Schoolcraft's operating rate currently is 1.697 mills, or \$1.697 per \$1,000 of property valuation. The administration wants the board to levy the full voted \$1.77.

"An additional millage rate of 0.17 mills represents an additional tax of 17 cents per \$1,000 of SEV, hence a homeowner with a home having an SEV of \$30,000 would pay an estimated \$5.10 more in taxes," according to a legal notice signed by Burley.

That \$5.10 includes both the millage rate and the average anticipated increase in state equalized valuation across the district, according to controller A.H. Rabe.

Meanwhile, a 1964 bond issue has been retired, and the college's debt retirement rate can be cut from \$0.197 to \$0.17, a decrease of 2.7 cents per \$1,000.

Subtract that from the operating rate increase and you wind up with an overall tax increase of something less than \$5 for the year, depending on what happens to your assessed valuation.

"The purpose of the hearing is to receive testimony and discuss the levy of an additional millage rate as required under Public Act 5 (1982) and is not for the purpose of placing a millage proposal on the ballot," the legal notice adds.

Despite the extensive preparations for a public hearing over a small property tax increase, no law requires a hearing on an even sharper increase in another portion of Schoolcraft's revenue picture — tuition.

A month ago, the board approved hiking resident tuition \$3.50 a credit hour — from \$22 to \$25.50 or about 16 percent.

The average student taking 7.6 credit hours a semester would pay, over the course of a year, \$53.20 more.

Reason for the slight upward pressure on taxes and the heavy upward pressure on tuition is falling state aid. "The level of state spending has declined significantly over the years," President Richard McDowell said.

The picture in a nutshell:

— Property taxes will bring in \$6.1 million next year, up 10.6 percent with the combination of new construction, assessment increases and the millage rate increase.

— Tuition and fees will produce \$4.4 million, up 19 percent due mostly to rate increases rather than more student credit hours.

— State aid will be \$4.3 million, down 12.3 percent because of recession-caused declines in state income, business and sales tax.

The \$15.3 million budget contains a 4.4 percent increase. That \$644,000 increase is eaten up largely by: increased health insurance premiums, \$247,000; utilities increases, \$112,000; and interest expense, \$110,000.

Some Park Gardens area homeowners may soon be eligible for federal assistance in renovation of their houses.

Nield announced that Ron Van Horn is continuing as manager and Bill Dicks as swim team coach for the 1982 season.

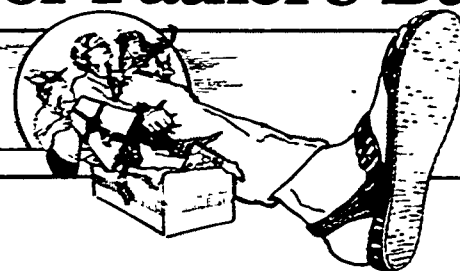

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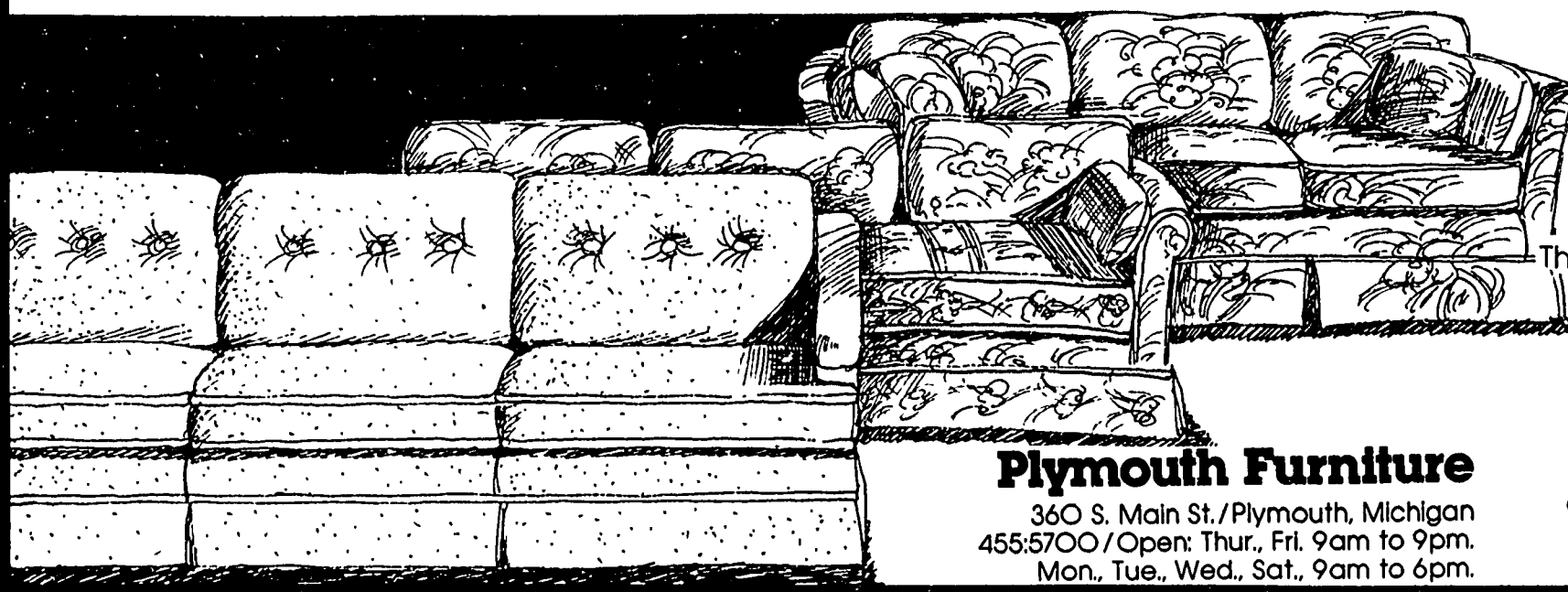

McGuires keep dairy all in the family

John McGuire must be able to make the dairy business look like fun — why else would 11 of his 14 children, several daughters-in-law and three grandchildren (so far) follow him into the family enterprise?

John, the McGuire family patriarch, has been running the Guernsey Farm Dairy in Novi with the help of various family members since 1945, when he and then-partner Fred Russell bought the dairy from J.A. Applehof, after whose herd of Guernsey cows the dairy is named.

McGuire bought out Russell's share of the dairy in 1952, and was left to run it on his own — with a little help from his family.

All seven of McGuire's sons work at the dairy. Jim, Joe and Mike handle retail and delivery of the dairy's products, which include milk, buttermilk and ice cream. Hugh, Marty and Paul are responsible for dairy operations, producing the products that the others sell. And Tom, the oldest, runs the restaurant and ice cream store.

Youngest daughter Karen and her sisters Mary and Lucy handle office work, while sister Rita and sisters-in-law Donna and Mary also do tasks around the office and restaurant.

Not to be left out, three grandchildren, Kris, 15, and Carrie and Rose, both 14, have begun helping out in the dairy — and McGuire expects more to follow as they become old enough.

Family members who don't work at Guernsey must have pretty good excuses — like they live in Florida or Washington D.C. Mother McGuire, who according to her husband has "never worked a day in the dairy," has a special excuse.

"She was too busy raising kids," says daughter Karen.

It seems it would take a lot to keep the family and their employees (about 40 in all) occupied — and if three to four thousand gallons of milk per week, not including cream for ice cream, seems like a lot, then it does.

But the dairy retains the atmosphere of a small, family operation, dealing with small-business customers, and that's what the McGuires want.

The dairy's customers, John McGuire says, still include about 300 home-delivery customers, "lots of small stores and health food stores," restaurants and many area schools, including Northville, Novi, South Lyon and several area parochial schools. The Guernsey Farm Dairy also has a retail outlet in Livonia.

"Stop and buy fresh milk," commands the sign on the front of the dairy on Novi Road, but, McGuire says, fresh milk is not the only specialty available from Guernsey Farm Dairy. Customers can buy the dairy's buttermilk, a "secret" formula purchased two years ago from Frank and Erma Jansen when they retired and sold their popular buttermilk stand on Grand River Avenue in Novi. Those who like ice cream can find variety at the Guernsey

Farm Dairy — the McGuires make more than 50 flavors at different times of the year.

And selling dairy products isn't the McGuire's only occupation — the dairy's restaurant features such specialties as chili and broasted chicken.

McGuire has "always" been in the dairy business — he got started when he went to work for Borden's in 1931. As a dairyman and father of 14, he swears by the nutritional value of milk, and daughter Karen agrees.

"We (the 14 children) drank a lot of it and we're pretty healthy," she said.

McGuire says it just seemed natural that the children would follow him into the dairy business. In fact, he said, younger members of the McGuire family are often anxious to get started. But having so many members of the family employed in the family business surprises him as much as it does anybody.

"I had no idea they would all come here," he said. "But I wouldn't be here if they didn't stay with it... it's kind of nice to have them around."

The Guernsey Farm Dairy is located at 21300 Novi Road, just outside Northville. Hours are 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

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Red hot peppers spread into home gardening scene

There's such a dramatic contrast between sweet bell peppers and their fiery counterparts, it's hard to believe they're related. But with the spread of ethnic cooking, the red hot peppers are edging into the home garden scene all

over the country.

Bell peppers are substantially ahead, though, because they're used in such quantity in so many different ways from munchies to stuffed peppers. Such

a little goes a long way with the little hot ones, it doesn't take many pepper plants to provide the fire for a full year's eating. If you're planting the hot ones for the first time this year, but you're already a sweet pepper fan,

plant one hot pepper for every 10 sweet ones you grow.

Probably the favorite use for sweet peppers is stuffing, and that dictates a blocky pepper with a large cavity. Perhaps the ideal stuffing pepper is

"Better Belle," an early-producing F1 hybrid introduced by Ball Seed Company. A large 4-lobed variety, it cuts in to two meal-sized halves. Its square, blocky shape leaves a large cavity. Thick-walled compared with other peppers of its type, it gives more meat per pepper. And in yield tests compared with other 4-lobed varieties, "Better Belle" has consistently headed the list.

Pepper fanciers know there are many other types: tapered forms, long, skinny shapes, small round ones. Colors, too, are varied. Green varieties which turn red when ripe. Yellow varieties which turn to orange or red. With the sweet types, the flavor becomes milder as each pepper closes in on maturity. Ripe ones are the sweetest of all.

Peppers have a narrower range of temperature needs than many other vegetables. Their blossoms fall and they fail to set fruit when nighttime temperatures fall much below 60

degrees ... and when night temperatures rise above 75 degrees. Day temperatures above 90 degrees also inhibit fruit set but when temperatures fall, fruits again begin forming.

Peppers also have a self-regulation mechanism which keeps them from overloading the plant. When each plant has its quota, they stop setting fruit, but if you pick them when they reach usable size, they'll again start developing fruit.

Peppers are highly ornamental plants in their own right. The combination of compact growth habit, glossy leaves, pretty white flowers and glistening fruit make them ideal container or border plants in addition to their place in the garden row. Peppers are available at nurseries and garden centers. Most people start with purchased transplants. If the season is short plant extra early varieties.

New hybrid tomatoes better old varieties

Old flavors don't die, they just fade away. Many gardeners remember "Rutgers" and "Bonny Best" (John Baer) tomatoes fondly, but have discovered recent hybrids surpassing these old standbys in all important characteristics.

Flavor, nostalgically remembered, is an elusive memory but the fresh, warm flavor of a vine-ripe tomato is concrete and real. Today's hybrids outperform old varieties in production, easily as important to a serious gardener as flavor.

There are two reasons for this. The first reason is selectively crossing varieties for disease and pest resistance which improves performance considerably. And the inherent productive capacity of

tomatoes has been enhanced so the combination of disease resistance and productive capacity far outstrips the performance of older varieties.

Most of the new hybrids are resistant to nematodes, the small eel-like worm present in so many soils, which sap a plant's vigor by destroying plant roots. They're often also resistant to two diseases, fusarium and verticillium wilts. A few of the most recent hybrids, such as new "Champion" tomato from Ball Seed Company, are also resistant to tobacco mosaic, which can be highly destructive to home garden tomatoes.

You'll see this disease resistance identified on seed packets and on the tags attached to plants when you buy them. The label for "Champion" tomato has VFNT listed along with the name and growing instructions. The V stands for resistance to Verticillium, the F for Fusarium, the N for Nematodes and the T for resistance to Tobacco Mosaic.

Other characteristics which show up in new hybrids include earliness, productiveness and flavor.

There are some trade-offs. Tomatoes from early varieties generally will not be as large as later ones. One controversial subject is flavor, with a wide range of flavor preferences ranging from acid to sweet. Differences also show up when the tomato is served cold, which tends to diminish flavor, compared with warm, which enhances the flavor characteristics.

Tomatoes fall into two different types of growth...and harvest. Determinate varieties, or bush types, bloom and set fruit nearly all at once, so that a ripening of all fruit can occur within days...and the harvest from one plant will be over in a short time. Self-topping plants, they seldom need staking.

Indeterminate varieties continue blooming and setting fruit so that harvest is over a long period. Because they keep growing, they need staking or caging.

If you plant the new hybrids side by side with sug-

gested similar non-hybrid varieties, it's easy to see the difference in performance and yield, a more important incentive now than ever, where garden space becomes increasingly valuable.

Many of the determinate types are well adapted to containers, and because of their compact growth habit look good, too. Indeterminate types grow well in containers, too, but will grow much taller and need staking or caging. Container-grown tomatoes will use copious quantities of moisture. Fertilize as recommended by the manufacturer. Check the formula for the soil mix you use, and if it doesn't contain lime (calcium carbonate) add at planting time at the rate of four-tenths pound per cubic foot of soil. This prevents blossom end rot.

At the same time hybridizers have been working to develop superior performance and disease resistance, they haven't forgotten eye appeal. Tomatoes come in pink and yellow as well as red, and range in shape from currant-sized fruit to plum shapes, to the giant beefsteak types such as "Beefmaster."

"Beefmaster" VFN, suggested as a hybrid replacement for the beefsteak tomato, averages more than 12 ounces. Hybrid vigor is particularly important with the larger-fruited tomatoes because without disease resistance, they may never have a chance to reach their full size.

"Champion" VFNT or "Super Fantastic" VFN are recommended as superior varieties to "Bonny Best" (also called John Baer). Both tomatoes produce fruit over 1/2 pound in weight. "Champion" is earlier than "Super Fantastic."

"Floramerica" VF, so good it won an All-America Selections award in 1978, is recommended as a replacement for "Rutgers," an old variety. And there is a new plum-shaped hybrid, "La Roma," which is a good replacement for Roma.

For those who prefer the milder flavor of a yellow-fruited variety, "Golden Boy" is recommended as a hybrid replacement for "Jubilee." "Pink Panther" is a good pink-fruited variety for gardeners who prefer that color.

All Area team members are 'jewels of the diamond'

If ever a team could be labeled a "Dream Team," this is it.

In fact, the 1982 *Sliger/Livingston County Newspapers* All Area girls' softball first team players are real "jewels of the diamond". The squad has it all — solid pitching, strong defense and excellent hitting. This is the kind of team most coaches dream of.

Remarkably, only four of the 11 players selected to the first team by the sports editors of The Northville Record, Novi/Walled Lake News, Milford Times and South Lyon Herald are seniors. The rest of the squad is comprised of three juniors and four sophomores.

One of those seniors, and "jewel of the diamond," is Northville's Sheri Robins, who repeats as a first team selection. The Mustangs also placed three members on the second team and had one honorable mention pick.

In all, 22 players were selected to either the first or second team from the schools covered by the respective papers: Northville, Novi, Walled Lake Central, Walled Lake Western, Milford, Lakeland, South Lyon and Whitmore Lake.

Here now are the *Sliger/Livingston County Newspapers* first and second team honorees:

FIRST TEAM

Part of the "400 Club" around the infield was Central's ROBIN WHEELER. The sophomore firstsacker hit a hefty .446 with four homers, five triples and two doubles.

One of two Lakeland players named to the infield, junior LISA CRUMP was equally tough at the plate as she was on the pitching mound. Crump belted four round-trippers, six triples, four doubles and had 30 rbis on her way to a .412 average. As a pitcher, she recorded a mark of 9-2.

Sophomore ANN MARIE NOREN joins Crump on the infield with a .417 average. She scored 26

runs and slammed one homer, one triple and three doubles.

Whitmore Lake's LYN WATSON checked in with an even .400 average and showed a unique ability to drive in and score lots of runs. The junior infielder touched home plate 28 times and helped drive in 26 runs.

The statistics speak for themselves on the hitting prowess of Northville's senior outfielder SHERI ROBINS: a .652 average...30 hits in 46 at bats...10 homers...one triple...three doubles...10 stolen bases.

Another senior who joins Robins in the outfield is Western's PEGGY HATHAWAY. The Warrior outfielder checked in with a .478 average with 16 runs scored and six rbis. Lakeland's CHERYL HASLOCK rounds out the outfield. A sophomore, she was no slouch at the plate with a .397 average and scored 23 runs.

Lakeland's STACEY REDA carried one of the "weaker" batting averages on the squad. The senior catcher finished at .333 overall, but .394 in the Kensington Valley Conference. She scored 16 runs, drove in 13 and stole 12 bases in addition to being one of the best defensive receivers with a .917 fielding average.

The designated hitter was Lakeland's DONNA GEMIGNANI. Another sophomore, she had a .373 average with seven doubles, 14 rbis and 17 runs scored.

With hitting and fielding like this, pitchers CHERYL SHANKEL of Novi and KAREN WONGSTROM of South Lyon might have checked in with better records.

Her overall record aside, Shankel is one of the area's best pitchers. The hard-throwing righthander posted an 11-11 record, but she struckout 185 enemy batters in 158 innings. In addition, she walked 82 batters and finished with an earned run average of 2.17.

Another hard-throwing pitcher was Wongstrom. Only a junior, she pitched in all 21 games to record a mark of 12-9 with an amazing 198 strikeouts in 184 innings.

SECOND TEAM

Two Northville members made the infield with senior shortstop JILL MATTEUCCI leading the pack. She batted .417 with one double and led the Mustangs with 20 stolen bases.

Sophomore CHERYL BERRYMAN was the other Mustang named to the infield. She connected for a .333 average after a slow start with one homer, two doubles and 12 stolen bases.

Northville's NANCY LaPLANTE anchors the catcher's spot with a .326 average.

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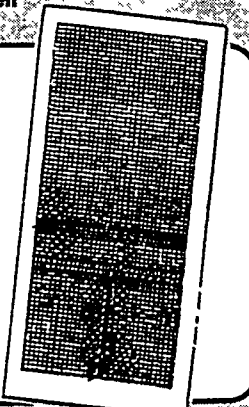

Jimmy the Greek or his local counterpart would likely have given heavy odds against Lakeland's softball team having an overwhelmingly successful season this spring.

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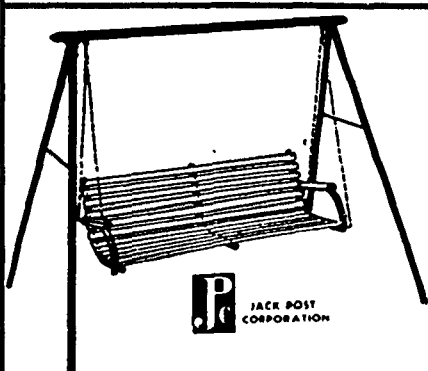
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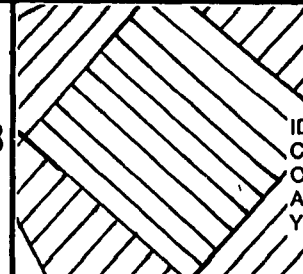
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Ouellette wins title at Northville Open
