## School board urges summer tax collection

Aiming at a reduction in interest expenses that totaled nearly \$1.8 million over the past decade, Northville Public Schools is again proposing that local governments collect school taxes in July.

Superintendent George Bell and school board members Doug Whitaker, Karen Wilkinson, Jean Hansen and Chris Johnson appeared before the township board of trustees last Thurs-

day night to ask that the township join in formation of a committee composed of city, school and township officers to examine summer tax collection.

Legislation being considered in Lansing would allow the district to collect taxes itself if the local governments refuse to do so, but Bell said he is more intent on opening discussions than on having the district collect its own taxes.

Whitaker said the board intends to approach all the local governments in the district with the same request. All

property taxes are collected by the cities and townships, which then disburse them to the school districts.

Since both city and township collect school taxes in December billings due in February, Bell explained, the school system must borrow money to operate during the fiscal year beginning July 1 and pay it back when tax revenue is received.

Interest payments on those tax-anticipation notes are a large part of the school budget (more than \$423,000

last year and over \$200,000 this year), Bell told the township board. In order to avoid that cost, he said, the school system would like the township to collect school taxes in July.


Bell noted that summer tax collection is not a new issue in this area, with the school district having advocated the procedure since 1972. Past discussions of the issue have been fruitless and in the ensuing decade the school system has paid nearly \$1.8 million in interest on loans, he said. Bell estimated that

the district has earned perhaps \$600,000 interest on invested funds in the same period.

The expense has increased since the district went "out of formula" and no longer receives state aid payments that helped span the gap in the cash flow, he said. Rising interest rates have also increased cost. Between 1972 and 1975, Bell said, the district paid \$264,000 in interest. Records show 1974 borrowing was done at 3.4 percent interest.

The district recently negotiated its 1982-83 loan financing at 7.8 percent and projects interest expense at \$201,000 this year alone. Bell said the district had been "lucky to get that rate, we got it at the bottom of the interest rate drop." By contrast, 1981-82 borrowing cost the district \$400,000 before the interest earned by investing the funds short-term are subtracted.

## House called city 'eyesore'

Northville city council Monday night promised more than a dozen residents of the South Center-Wing Street area that the vacant, boarded up house at 254 South Center will be a "top priority item" for the new city attorney.

As he moved to table the discussion, council member J. Burton DeRusha said the selection of an attorney could be expected in October. He said four of the eight firms expressing an interest had been interviewed and that he expected the other four would be as soon as Mayor Paul Vernon returned from a business trip next week.

G. Dewey Gardner, serving as mayor pro tem, told the audience he appreciated their concern, but said the council needs a legal interpretation of the situation.

Audience concern focused on expansion of racetrack parking on the west side of Center as residents of the area said they understood two other pieces of property had been purchased by the same owner, Northville Driving Club.

Most of the residents attending the council session Monday had appeared at the Northville Planning Commission meeting last week Tuesday. They were objecting to the fact that shrubbery and a garage and chicken coop had been removed on the property.

The commission referred the matter

to council "for legal consideration and answer to the petition."

The petition signed by residents sought an answer to the unsightly situation.

City Manager Steven Walters reviewed the problem at the request of Main Street resident Lynn Paquette. She has been attending council sessions seeking a way to have colonial lighting installed in the downtown area.

Walters said the property, on which cars always have been parked during

the racing season, was purchased as the new owner thought it would be possible to demolish the house for added parking.

The previous legal opinion was that parking was a secondary use in the area zoned residential, permitted under the "grandfather clause" (the situation existed prior to the zoning) — but could not be expanded.

## Oasis Golf Dome wins bid for exception

Everything is "go" for the erection of an air-inflated dome over one acre of the Oasis Golf Center grounds, following two decisions reached Monday.

Township attorney Donald Morgan reversed his earlier (September 2) advice that planning commission review would be required and that the dome proprietors' documentation was insufficient. That evening, the zoning board of appeals (ZBA) acted within the guidelines of Morgan's second opinion and voted 3-1 to grant an exception to the zoning ordinance allowing the one-acre 75-foot tall dome.

Proprietors of the facility on Five Mile between Haggerty Road and I-275 were pleased with the decision, as were representatives of Northville

Associates (investors in the \$500,000 project), but there were more than a few disappointed residents in the audience.

Representatives of three homeowners' associations addressed the ZBA advocating rejection of the dome proposal, as did several residents individually. There were also speakers on behalf of the dome, however, most prominent among them being Larry Sheehan and township building inspector Troy Milligan.

Among the official letters read into the record was one from an individual supporting the proposal, two from homeowners' groups opposing it and one from the Northville Township Homeowners' Association (an umbrella

organization of associations) that did not come down on either side but cited "serious reservations" and urged the board to protect residents' interests.

The five-member ZBA was absent one of the primary opponents of the proposal in its approved form — planning commission member Bernard Baldwin, called away on business at the last moment. He made clear in a letter to the board that he would have voted against the proposal, or "at least" to table it while it went through further review.

That left ZBA member Ralph Foreman the only vocal critic of the proposal present. Also present was ZBA member Thomas L.P. Cook, the board of trustees member who two weeks ago advocated approval of the dome plan in

a letter to the board when he was absent.

Baldwin's letter was clearly based upon the information contained in a Morgan letter dated September 2. In the letter, the township attorney related his opinion that the dome did not qualify as a "temporary structure" and therefore would require planning commission review if the ZBA granted a variance to allow the 75-foot peak height.

But in a letter dated Monday, Morgan cited information acquired in the ensuing 10 days and said he would like to "refine" his earlier letter. In essence, he determined the application was for an "exception" and not a "variance" and therefore simply an extension of the existing use of the land. In consequence, Morgan wrote, the determination of whether to allow the dome was under the jurisdiction of the ZBA with concurrence of the building official.

He further related that the structure's status as "temporary" or "permanent" is irrelevant to the granting of an "exception."

Saying key portions of his earlier letter were "inapplicable," Morgan wrote

## Former teacher will get sick leave pay

In compliance with a Michigan Court of Appeals ruling, Northville Public Schools agreed last week to pay for a former Institution Special Education teacher's 14 days of sick leave due to childbirth and recuperation.

The school district's decision ends a more than five-year legal battle with the Michigan Civil Rights Commission over a complaint filed by teacher Mary Ellen Shaughnessy alleging sex discrimination.

Shaughnessy, a former teacher in Northville's Institution Special Education Program, filed a complaint against Northville Public Schools in February, 1977. In the complaint, Shaughnessy alleged sex discrimination because she was not allowed to use her accumulated sick leave to cover her 14-day absence from work due to pregnancy.

The Shaughnessy case has been a legal seesaw for both the school district and the Civil Rights Commission since the complaint was filed more than five years ago. At the core of the issue is the debate over whether school districts must pay teachers for accumulated sick leave days due to pregnancy prior to the passage of the Michigan Civil Rights Act in May, 1978. The Michigan Civil Rights Act stated that pregnancy must be treated as

a disability.

Northville Public Schools contended that at the time Shaughnessy filed her complaint, it was not the district's policy to allow the use of sickdays for time off during pregnancy.

However, that is not how the Michigan Civil Rights Commission viewed it. Though anti-discrimination statutes affecting pregnant teachers did not go into effect until May, 1978, the Michigan Civil Rights Commission ruled in Shaughnessy's favor in December, 1979, and ordered Northville Public Schools to pay her for 14 days of accumulated sick leave due to pregnancy.

The school district maintained it was not legally obligated to pay pregnancy leave until the Michigan Civil Rights Act went into effect and appealed the decision to the Wayne County Circuit Court of Appeals in January.

In September, 1980, Circuit Court Judge Benjamin Burdick ruled in favor of the district and ordered that the case be dismissed in its entirety.

Last January, the Michigan Civil Rights Commission and the Michigan Department of Civil Rights appealed the circuit court decision to the Michigan Court of Appeals.

The Michigan Court of Appeals ruled August 27 that

## Gravel pit dive here leaves Scott paralyzed

As he approaches his 21st birthday on October 23, Scott Heinzman has been recovering "an inch at a time" from the diving accident in a Northville gravel pit that has left him helpless.

Lying in the 13-bed rehabilitation unit at University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor, the young Livonia Franklin graduate is more aware than his family or friends that hospital officials are saying his progress now is "stable" — that the muscle use returning since the accident July 6 may be all there will be.

"What I have now is all they think I'll get back," he says uncertainly.

He can move his head and has muscle use to the elbow. The legs encased in black jogging pants have no feeling or movement.

They sometimes have muscle spasms, but Scott does not feel

them. A physical therapist stretches them out "when they get tight." Scott says the only pain he gets is from sore muscles in his shoulders.

"The physical therapist also pulls my arms up and out. I try to pull my arms up. Surprisingly, the right one is developing faster than the left — and I'm left handed."

Before he recovered enough to enter the rehabilitation unit, Scott was in intensive care, his head in a halo brace, his body in traction on a rotating bed.

"I couldn't move at all then — they had to keep me from getting my lungs all clogged up."

He had broken the fifth vertebrae in the cervical region of his neck, which was mended.

The swelling, which was watched by the hospital staff, now is gone.

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# Resident's pollution charge checked

A letter addressed to Northville City Planning Commission, as well as city council, was discussed at last Tuesday's commission meeting raising the question of who has responsibility for pollution enforcement, if it exists.

Commissioner James Cutler, declaring the matter was an enforcement one, said he thought it was the building department's responsibility. All commissioners agreed that the situation was not one they should address.

City council member and commission liaison J. Burton DeRusha informed the

commission that the council also had received the letter and that the city manager was checking with the county on any such report. He told the commission Mayor Paul Vernon would respond.

Northville city council at its last meeting in August asked the city manager to seek a copy of a report on air pollution in the area of Northville Laboratories from Wayne County Pollution Control department that reportedly had been made.

City Manager Steven Walters in-

dicated last week, however, that no such report is on file.

Ruth H. Pritchard, a resident of Fairbrook Apartments, stated in a letter to the council dated August 16 that a representative of the county pollution control had come out personally after she had contacted the department and had made a report.

The council read the resident's statement protesting the steam pollution from large semi-trailers delivering at the plant which she said burned her eyes and throat and left her lungs and throat damaged.

She explained that she had moved into an apartment with a bedroom window facing the laboratory in November, 1981. When this spring came, she wrote, she discovered the

fumes.

After protesting to the firm's management without results, she said she had called Wayne County.

Walters said last week, however, that a check with the county indicated no citation had been filed by the county pollution control department.

He also noted that no other objections have been filed with the city on the matter.

At last week's planning commission meeting, planning consultant Ronald Nino suggested that in the future "a row of mature evergreen trees can go a long way toward resolving the problem."

It was pointed out that the vanilla factory existed on the site before the apartments were built.

## Commissioners okay county waste plan

The Oakland County Board of Commissioners gave its stamp of approval August 26 to the county's solid waste master plan, according to George Schutte, supervisor of the county's solid waste unit.

Schutte said the board okayed the plan with two changes. As presented by the solid waste planning committee (SWPC), the waste plan called for a 190-acre landfill in Orion Township. The county board reduced that site to the area covered under the present construction permit, 28 acres, said Schutte.

The other change in the waste plan made by the county board is a provision allowing the chief elected official of a

township to accompany the county's landfill inspection teams, added Schutte.

Now that the master waste plan has the approval of the county board, it must be approved by two thirds of the 61 municipalities in the county before it is submitted to the state Department of Natural Resources (DNR), explained Schutte. The municipalities will either okay or reject the waste plan through their local governing bodies.

The county waste plan is mandated by the Michigan Solid Waste Management Act of 1978 and is designed to handle Oakland's non-hazardous solid waste for the next 20 years.

## Commissioners hike rates

Recreation commissioners unanimously approved a 12 percent increase in rental rates for the community building effective September 1 as proposed by recreation director Ed Kritzts at their meeting last week Wednesday.

Even though the community building rent has been raised, Kritzts noted it was still competitive with other facilities in surrounding areas.

It will cost \$17 per hour to rent the gymnasium as opposed to the previous \$15 per hour, he said. The stage will cost \$9 per hour, up a dollar from a year ago. The meeting room will cost \$11 per hour, which is up \$1.25 from its previous cost.

There is also one change for groups renting either the gymnasium or the meeting room for a party. For the meeting room, it will cost the base rate plus \$50 for a group under 100 persons. Over 100 people, it will cost the base rate plus \$100. The same holds true for the gymnasium. There is also a kitchen

in the meeting room area which Kritzts can be rented at a negotiated price.

The figures were compared to those with surrounding facilities, and Kritzts cited a few examples for the commissioners.

The Plymouth Cultural Center for its large meeting room cost \$300 for Friday or Saturday night and \$140 weekdays for four hours, with a cost of \$30 for each additional hour. The center also has two small rooms which cost \$10 per hour.

The center's large meeting room is similar in size to that of the community building's, Kritzts said.

He noted the Northville American Legion Hall costs a flat \$200 a night, while the VFW hall costs \$165 a night for 150 people.

The Novi Community Center, he said, has a small room for 125 people which costs \$115 a night for non-residents and \$25 a night for residents. Kritzts pointed out the Novi center is subsidized by a small millage Novi residents pay for the recreation program.

## Two in uniform

Northville's William C. Bailey has completed training in fundamental military skills at the United States Army ROTC basic camp at Fort Knox, Kentucky.

The basic camp is designed to give junior college graduates and college sophomores who have not taken ROTC courses the chance to enter the program. The camp also qualifies high school graduates for the ROTC program at any of the nation's military junior colleges.

During the encampment, cadets received training in basic rifle marksmanship, military drill and ceremonies, communications and individual and small unit tactics.

Bailey plans to enter the ROTC program at Western Michigan University at Kalamazoo. He is the son of Everett E. and Joanne E. Bailey, 43699 Westridge Lane.

Major William N. Wakerly, of Royal Oak, has arrived for duty at Clear Air Force Station in Alaska.

Wakerly, a space systems staff officer with the 13th Missile Warning Squadron, was previously assigned in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

His wife, Kathleen, is the daughter of Vivan Jagdmann, 18416 Jamestown Circle, Northville.

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
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
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## Schools set public meeting

The Northville Board of Education will hold a public meeting to discuss the future plans and programs of Northville Public Schools at 7:30 p.m. October 5 in the Northville High School cafeteria.

The meeting, proposed by Superintendent George Bell, will primarily focus on the reports of two citizens' advisory committees which had proposed a realignment of the present grade structure and the designation of a school for closing in the 1983-84 school year.

The two citizens' committees — facilities and program standards and their effectiveness — are an offshoot of an earlier citizens committee formulated after the defeat of the April, 1981 school millage renewal.

The committees had charged the school administration with designating a school for closing and formulating a new realignment of the grade structure by the end of October.

Bell said he is inviting all members of both citizens committees as well as residents to the October 5 meeting to discuss the charges put forth to the board under a previous administration. He said he is hoping to discuss other options for dealing with declining K-12 enrollment, as well as those proposed by the committees.

Board members emphasized the meeting will be an informal discussion and that no board action will be taken.

# Track revenue wins another round

Some fleet footwork on the state house floor last Thursday saved budgeted racetrack revenues for Northville, Livonia and Hazel Park.

Outstate representative Don VanSingen introduced a surprise late amendment to the appropriations bill for the next fiscal year that would have reduced the appropriation to racetrack cities by \$1 million — an approximate 50 percent cut, according to State Representative Jack Kirksey (Livonia, Northville).

Kirksey said VanSingen's arguments were based upon the reports from the cities of what the appropriations had been used for but that VanSingen had not cited Northville's report.

"Northville had a really complete and thorough report," Kirksey said. Nonetheless, the Livonia Republican said he feared it would be difficult to defeat the amendment. Doing so would require 56 votes, he said, and past

levels of support from legislators who do not represent the affected cities did not raise hopes.

"Fortunately, we broke for lunch right after that and I had about three hours," Kirksey related. He said he contacted city manager Steve Walters and asked him for information for use in preparing arguments favoring the appropriation.

On his return to the house floor, Kirksey circulated and read a statement to his colleagues that urged maintenance of the full appropriation. Noting that the purpose of the appropriation is to reimburse cities for direct and indirect expenses from servicing the track, Kirksey said costs include police surveillance, traffic control, road repairs, emergency medical service and court costs.

He also noted the money does not come from taxes but from "private funds created by the horseracing in-

dustry." A percentage of the money bet at the track and sent to the state is earmarked for local use.

He said reduction in this appropriation could "compromise the safety and security" of track audiences and consequently discourage tourism because of race-fixing, pickpockets, and parking lot thefts.

Kirksey concluded his statement saying a popular conception that racetracks are economic advantages to a city are untrue. He noted that DRC acreage converted to residential use would generate more tax dollars, that few visitors to the tracks remain in the towns after the races, and that "most residents would just as soon not have the racetrack in their city and would prefer some other activity in that location that would not bring with it horrendous traffic jams, an increase in crime and other negative actions."

Kirksey said there was great ad-

vantage in being able to air the reasons for the appropriation, as few legislators deal with the issue on a regular basis.

"The real surprise was the vote," he related. "As I say, we needed 56 votes and I was really doubtful whether we'd get it. But it came up 74-29 to defeat the amendment."

So the appropriation remains, and Kirksey said private conversation with other house members convinces him it will be contained in the final version of the appropriations bill. Still, he noted the appropriation may have to be defended several times during the year.

Kirksey said the battle to save the appropriation was "interesting, and sort of exciting from the standpoint of it all happening so fast. We weren't expecting it. The vote, I think, was interesting from the standpoint that the house did allow for an airing of the reasons, and I spoke to the reasons for the appropriation."

## Township shares cost of new sewer system

Whether or not the long-awaited "super sewer" ever comes to pass, it appears virtually certain that Northville Township and points north will benefit from the current proposal to construct a large sewer system running from Commerce Township to a treatment plant in Brownstown Township (in the extreme southeast corner of Wayne County).

The township board of trustees last week agreed to pay a local share estimated at \$140,000, but likely to increase dramatically, to participate in the first phase sewer construction. Novi has agreed to put up the local share of all participating Oakland County communities (Wixom, Commerce Township and Walled Lake) in the \$1.5 million program because the upstream communities are not yet prepared. City Manager Ed Kriewall said Novi will recoup the money later in the project.

A "relief sewer" parallel to the present interceptor line in Hines Park is to be the first phase of the project, solving present capacity problems for Novi and Northville Township. The new line would begin in the park at the south border of Northville (which at this point is not participating in the program), running through the park to Wilcox Road in Plymouth.

The 1.5 million cost is only the local share, and represents a little more than 20 percent of the phase one cost, the remainder of which is federally-funded through a grant to the state. Appropriation of the grant dollars is "virtually assured" county officials told the Northville Township board last week.

The relief sewer is viewed as the salvation for Novi and the township since it would increase local sewer capacity sufficiently to allow further development. The present system is near or at full capacity and large building projects of the future could be jeopardized if improvements are not made soon, consulting engineer Edward McNeely explained to the township board.

McNeely noted the relief sewer has been in county plans since 1937 "but the money has never been there to do it." It would handle flows that, at present, during a heavy rainstorm overflow at a restriction on the border between the ci-

ty and township. "If you want to see what happens," the engineer said, "the next time there's a really heavy rain go out behind McDonald Ford. It (water and sewage) just explodes out of the ground, it blows the manhole cover off and geysers."

The lack of the relief sewer means that, at the junction, there is a pipe more than 40 inches in diameter meeting one that is only 30 inches in diameter. The restriction, McNeely said, is deliberate and prevents stormwater that infiltrates the system upstream from using up the capacity needed by downstream communities.

The relief arm that would be super sewer's first phase (simultaneous with the beginnings of the treatment plant downriver) "is really the key to the whole thing up here," McNeely explained. It would 30-36 inches in diameter, depending on slope, and sized to accommodate anticipated sewage flows through the year 2025.

McNeely warned the board that costs of participating in the system will likely escalate sharply after the township determines how much capacity it is going to buy in the project. The first phase could allow the township to add four cubic feet per second (CFS) to its sewage flows, roughly doubling it. But over the period for which the sewer is designed, the township will likely need 16 CFS and McNeely said county officials have indicated one CFS will probably cost \$500,000 over time.

But the first step is construction of "the missing link" in the present system, he said, and the township needs that link almost immediately, regardless of the ultimate outcome of the sewer planning issue.


Also needed will be a Haggerty Road arm that would accommodate flows tributary to a pump station at Northville Forest Apartments, totaling 3.1 CFS, McNeely said.

Finally, while the two arms would relieve flow problems in this area, downstream improvements are needed because there is a second bottleneck where the new relief arm meets another Rouge Valley interceptor line at Wilcox Road.

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

the house were torn down, the secondary use would be eliminated, prohibiting any parking.

The new owner then boarded up the house.

Residents of the area, who have objected at previous council sessions, repeated their concern, voiced at last week's planning meeting also, that the street might be rezoned.

Planning commission chairman Lesa Buckland last week denied that the commission has any such intention, pointing out, "we have been completely consistent in affirming the residential zoning."

Fred Joels, a member of the planning commission, attended Monday's council session, telling the council he agreed with the residents that "they have a perfectly legitimate request — it is an eyesore."

His wife, Pam Joels, stated, "I don't live there, but I come down Sheldon every day, and the place is an absolute wreck. It doesn't add much to the community."

When the council was accused of inaction with implication it might be protecting the new owner, De Rusha responded, "I resent the implication that council is in collusion with someone. Frankly, we disagree with the former attorney's opinion and want the matter researched by the new attorney."

De Rusha, in moving to table the discussion after several residents had spoken, promised the situation would be a priority item and that the attorney's report would be the subject for a public hearing.

Donna Bongiovanni told the council that of the 13 homes on South Center only five are lived in by their owners.

"The rest," she said, "are lived in by someone else. I think it might be a better thing (to have commercial) when there already is a business there."

Bill Thelen expressed the opposite point of view, saying he regarded his home as "a great investment."

Capote, saying he wanted to be fair to all, also was concerned about the value of his residential investment and asked that the council make the matter "a priority consideration."

It was pointed out that the Northville Downs has stated it is not interested in acquiring or using the property on the west side of Center for added parking. It presently has enough parking, it was asserted earlier. Long-range plans of the downs, announced a few years ago, call for a parking deck along Cady north of the present parking.

Bob Cole, recalling that he and council member Paul Folino "grew up right next door to each other on South Center," asked Folino, "That's the house you were brought up in, how do you feel?"

"Nobody feels worse than I do when I go by and see it boarded up," Folino responded, adding, "I would much rather see it torn down."

DeRusha admitted the situation is "in limbo" and that residents of the neighborhood "have a legitimate concern" but said the council "really needs the advice of a city attorney."

Council member Carolann Ayers told the audience the council "has been looking at ordinances from other communities with tracks or sports events needing parking" but has not come up with a parallel situation.

"There really is nothing we can do at this point," Gardner agreed as he called for the vote to table with priority status for the new attorney. It passed unanimously.

Bell said the roughly "\$1 million spent to use somebody else's dollars" in the past 10 years could have been put to better use improving the high school building, which he called "an energy nightmare."

He emphasized that the district is not seeking immediate approval of plan but wishes to begin discussions to iron out the difficulties the idea has met in the past.

Supervisor John MacDonald asked how Bell perceived the cost to the township of adding a tax collection date to its annual calendar. Bell said he recognized there would be added costs — "You can automatically count on doubling your postage cost" — to the township, but suggested the township's receipt of the one percent collection fee charge could aid the government cash flow as well as the schools'. He also suggested that, in the city, there would be little or no added costs involved since Northville already collects city taxes in July.

Noting that in earlier incarnations of the proposal the district had offered to pay the costs, Bell said he considers that an issue for negotiation. "When we offered to pay," he said, "you'll recall that postage was three cents."

MacDonald said he is concerned that the 30 percent of homeowners who pay their own tax bills (most are paid out of escrow by mortgage companies) would suffer a hardship, since one year's tax would be due in February and the next year's school taxes (roughly 75 percent of the total levy in the township) would be due that July.

Bell acknowledged the difficulty but noted it was only a problem the first year, and measures to relieve the burden could be an item for discussion. "In short," he said, "if the school district had mismanaged and lost \$1 million over this period of time, people would be outraged, yet we continue to carry this unnecessary expense."

Bell said Monday he "would be remiss" in reporting to the board if he did not tell them the district was "wasting all this money on interest when we could get our tax revenues earlier."

If the city and township reject the plan, there is a "strong chance" the school district would have an alternative in the form of a bill now pending in the state senate, according to state Representative Jack Kirksey.

Kirksey said Monday the house had already approved legislation (House Bill 4150) that would allow school districts to collect taxes themselves if their local governments refuse to do so. He said the bill is "90 percent through the process."

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
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
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

# July dive in local gravel pit leaves youth paralyzed

"They say 10 years ago I wouldn't have made it through. There wasn't the medicine that keeps the swelling down, and they brought me here — they say this is about the best hospital in the Midwest. Its rehab unit's well known in the country," Scott says as he recalls the day that changed his life.

"That was a lot of fun the day I dove off. The rope that hangs on the tree had broken and caught in the tree; so I was living from the cliff.

"Everybody and his brother did (dove into the pits) before I did. Three other people dove just before I did. They've (the water-filled pits off Griswold) been around for years. My Uncle Bill used to go swimming there when he was a kid. He's in his thirties now.

"I try not to dwell on it — I can't give up," says Scott seriously. A slight young man who is five foot-ten, he has lost 25 pounds since the accident.

"And there wasn't any fat in the first place," says his uncle, David Heinzman, director of college relations at Schoolcraft and a Northville resident who visits his godson frequently.

In the hope that it might discourage other swimmers, who, police report, still dive into the pits despite postings and fencing, Scott had agreed to reconstruct the events of his accident.

"A couple of years ago I had been there a couple of times, but it really hadn't been warm enough until last month — I was with a group of friends. There were quite a few there, maybe 20 or 25."

Scott dove from the cliff and remembers thinking as he hit and then came up the first time, "I've got to get a good deep breath.

"At first my friends thought I was joking, but I had cut my head and drawn blood. Mark (Gangron of Westland) got my head above water and eight people carried me up the hill."

Scott had come with three others to swim. Mark and his brother Shawn, who knew Scott, just happened to arrive later.

Neighbors called for help and the township police and an ambulance rescue unit responded promptly.

"It had a heck of a time coming down the hill — I passed out on the way," Scott, who was conscious much of the time, remembers.

David Heinzman relates that Scott first was taken to the Providence emergency in Novi, but the staff sent him on to Ann Arbor.

"The area is an enticing one — I think

you can call it an attractive nuisance — I'm upset people can go there.

"Why do they leave the tree and platforms?"

Swimmers have constructed a "homemade" ladder of boards up the tree at the edge of the pit. It is a popular diving off spot.

Scott admitted he and his friends knew they weren't supposed to swim in the pits "but everybody and his brother

did before I did."

Told that both city and township police have been issuing stiff trespass tickets as swimmers park in the Mill Race Historical Village parking lot and cross over Griswold, Scott said his buddy had gotten a ticket the day before, "but I didn't know then."

He adds that the pits are popular with young persons "anywhere from 12 to 24 but mostly high schoolers."

Scott remembers he used to know "where there was another little lake near Kensington in the Silver Lake recreation area," wistfully agreeing he now wished he had gone there instead of the Northville location.

"Now I do," he says as he tells of visits from nurses, a physical therapist, occupational therapist, psychologist and social worker. They had told him he would be receiving a visit from a young man "who lives on his own and with a similar injury to mine."

"It's kind of monotonous," he notes as he describes his day.

"When you're on your back all the time, they have to turn you on your side, too. I've been up in a chair since about 8:30 and at 9:15 ate (breakfast) down at the end of the hall. Then I had therapy, and they came back and put the brace on for lunch."

Meals are fed to patients in a sunny room at the end of the hospital corridor. Last Thursday when Scott was visited,

he was having dinner with two other patients, one had been in a truck accident causing injury similar to Scott's. They cheerfully compared notes and commented on the menu with the staff.

Scott mentions that he is disappointed that he must wear the neck brace while in the wheel chair but knows the staff has to be careful. Lightheadedness is one of the typical problems, and he has passed out once in bed.

One of his most faithful visitors is his father John, who came every day until recently.

Scott is the oldest of three, and has a brother John II, 18, and sister Elizabeth, 16, at home.

Because his mother Kathy is Irish, coming from County Mayo, the family has taken an active part in the metropolitan area's Irish community.

"The Irish claim him as one of theirs," his uncle relates, adding that there is a large, close family. His mother is one of nine children and has six brothers and sisters living in the area. There were five children in his father's family.

Scott was a champion Irish dancer as well as a member of an Irish football team.

"It really is sort of football and soccer," Scott explains as he tells how his first visit home from the hospital Labor Day weekend was to see the team play in the national finals.

Through the game and his dancing he has traveled to Toronto, Cleveland and twice to Ireland — making a total of three trips there as his first was as a young child.

Irish friends already have had a "barrel of cheer" benefit for Scott and are planning a major fund-raiser to help with expenses which his uncle reports are "astronomical."

Because he had been working as a night baker at Farmer Jack's in Livonia, Scott does have insurance that covers most of the present situation, but no one knows what will be ahead.

Scott, who had been in the accelerated program at Livonia Franklin and then gone on to attend Schoolcraft for a semester, says he would like to be able next fall to go to school, perhaps for computer science.

"I want to do as much as I can for myself, but I don't know exactly what to do," he says softly.

There's a bulletin board of cards and pictures from family and friends over his hospital bed. Prominent are pictures of his seven-month old puppy Salvatore Sanchez (named after a favorite boxer) that Scott has given to his young cousin Eric.

Scott knows he will be in the rehabilitation unit into October, at least.

Right now he's doing all he can by "just taking one day at a time."

## Costs of court still rising

Township expenses for participation in the 35th District Court operation continue to increase unexpectedly, but revenues are also running above projected levels, Treasurer Richard Henningsen told the township board last week.

He said he does not have enough information to determine if the higher revenues will cover rising costs, but what information he does have "appears to indicate that it will."

The board authorized final payment of \$11,000 to pay off last year's operation and subsequently learned it will likely have to pay \$18,000 more than anticipated come October 1.

Business manager David Lelko told the board court administrator George Wiland was projected a billing to the township of \$43,000 instead of the earlier expectation of a \$25,000 quarterly share.

The jump in the support expected from the township comes as a result of "midyear adjustments," Supervisor John MacDonald, a member of the court advisory board, related.

Instead of issuing an additional, fifth billing as was done last year (resulting in the \$11,000 payment authorized Thursday), court administrators folded the adjustments into the third quarter payment, he said.

Lelko said township budget projections were for quarterly payments of \$25,000; \$40,000; \$25,000 and \$40,000. Revenue was projected at \$8,000 per month (the township's share of fines and penalties resulting from police and court action). But revenues have been running between \$10,000 and \$14,000 per month, he said.

## Township cash flow suffering

"We're hurting, but we're not down and out yet," township treasurer Richard Henningsen said last week, explaining his anticipation of a cashflow restriction resulting from state budget cuts and Wayne County's fiscal difficulties.

The latest executive order cutting state spending slashes roughly \$7,000 out of the anticipated revenue sharing (from income taxes) to the township. And dollar-strapped Wayne County owes the township more than \$47,000 in delinquent taxes property owners paid downtown after the local collection deadline.

Money from the county's delinquent tax fund was recently transferred to its operational accounts to meet the most recent payroll. The money is to be repaid to the tax fund, but until it is, prospects for the township to collect the money it is due are slim.

Between those two shortfalls on the revenue side and unanticipated increases in expenses for the 35th District Court and the coming draw on funds to

conduct elections, Henningsen said, his cashflow projections show that "come next March we look flatter than you-know-what."

The prospects are serious enough that Henningsen has issued a memo to township department heads requiring them to restrict spending as much as possible.

He noted that the situation at this point is not leading toward an actual fiscal year deficit so much as there is a problem in cashflow — expenditures increasingly are made early in the fiscal year while revenues are delayed until the later months. Thus expenses often come due when the township is short of cash.

In proposing summer tax collections for the school district earlier in the evening (see related story), school superintendent George Bell noted a possible advantage to the township is that it could receive a portion of its one percent tax collection fee earlier in the year.

# Acceptance begins at home

He appears much younger than his 26 years. With tousled blond hair, hazel eyes and slight build, he easily could pass as just another teenager on the block. An amiable young man with a ready smile and gentle gaze, he enjoys music and delights in listening to his favorite recording, "Hajji Baba" — an old 78 belonging to his mother. Though he lives away from home now, he often visits his parents and seven brothers and sisters. To his friends and family, he's known as "Andy."

Though he turned 26 on his last birthday, Andrew Burke has the mental capacity of a three year old. Of limited skills, his life has been molded in the hands of others. Friends and family have been the essence of his existence. Though "labeled" severely mentally impaired, Andrew has lived a life very similar to that of the other kids on the block. He has been raised in an environment of love and support — provided by a family determined not to shut him away from society. Born in an era when institutionalization was regarded as the accepted treatment for the mentally retarded, Andrew is a living example of the exception not the rule.



## Time enough for LOVE

The love and support provided by Andrew's family not only has helped him through a seemingly uncertain life, but has given him hope for the future. Offered little chance of leading a normal existence at birth, Andrew today resides at the Marlboro Group Home in Westland and is participating in a sheltered workshop for the mentally impaired.

Last June, Andrew was one of eight students to graduate from Northville's Institution Special Education Program. Throughout his seven year association with Northville's highly acclaimed program for the severely mentally and physically impaired, Andrew had been

a model pupil. His mild manner, thoughtfulness and caring prompted staff members and aides to refer to him as the "gentleman of Old Village School."

For Andrew, the road to acceptance often has been marred with setbacks and a multitude of frustrations. However, the continuous support of family and friends, coupled with the care and giving of countless teachers and aides has given his life special meaning.

This is the first in a series on Andrew — and the people in his life who had time enough for love.

Among the rows and rows of houses in a predominantly middle class suburb, there stands a white brick house with red trim. Typical in design to other post-World War II homes in the area, it has been the residence of James and Sylvia Burke for 26 years. The Burkes moved to their home in July, 1956 — slightly less than a month before the birth of their fourth child Andrew.

For the Burkes, bringing home their newborn son seemed a miracle. Sylvia Burke had difficulty carrying Andrew during her pregnancy and had almost miscarried after four months. Though doctors had managed to stop her hemorrhaging and saved the baby, she was fearful that something would go wrong during the remainder of her term. However, on August 2 she gave birth to her second son.

Sitting in the living room of the same white brick house in Garden City 26 years later, Sylvia Burke appears calm despite the activity going on around her. It's a Wednesday afternoon and Andrew is home for a visit. Laughter and singing can be heard from the cor-

ner of the room where Andy, his brother Joe and sister Teresa are listening to records.

Raising her voice over the sounds of The Pointer Sisters, Mrs. Burke explains her willingness to discuss her son and the family's struggles to help him be accepted. "I've always been open about this," she explains. "I figure that by talking about Andy, I might help someone else."

"It may prevent other parents from giving up on their child — it might help them understand."

Recounting Andrew's first few months of life, Mrs. Burke explains that her son's suffering proved almost unbearable for the family.

"It still chokes me up to think of what he went through as a baby," she says. "Some people say they've had it hard," she adds, "but he's had it a lot harder than most."

Though doctors had told her nothing was wrong with her little son, Sylvia Burke was not convinced. At three months, he made no attempt to move, appearing almost comatose. He also was running a constant temperature of 104.

"I knew something was wrong," she reflects, "I just kept questioning and

questioning the doctors." Finally, at three-and-a-half months, doctors began testing the infant.

After countless exams including two brain taps, a spinal tap and a series of x-rays doctors told the Burkes were told the truth about Andrew.

"They told me I was lucky he wasn't born without arms and legs," she explains. The prognosis for their tiny son was bleak. A collapsed trachea, chronic bronchial problems, a dislocated vertebrae and partial paralysis of the muscles and spine had left him barely alive.

Andrew's first diagnosis was classified as an unknown congenital defect. Doctors thought he had cerebral palsy and told the Burkes he would never walk.

It would be a year before he moved his legs.

What caused Andrew's mental impairment is undetermined. Having miscarried months before her pregnancy with Andrew, Mrs. Burke says it's possible the scar tissue build up from the miscarriage put pressure on Andrew's head. However, that explanation has not been substantiated.

For the Burkes, the severity of their son's illness drastically changed their lifestyle. Completely unprepared to deal with the tragedy, the family was forced to cope with his condition as best it could — taking on each new problem one day at a time. Offered little hope for a normal existence, Andrew's fate seemed uncertain.

Yet, the suffering and pain their tiny son endured made him all the more endearing to the Burkes. There was no question that he would be raised at home and cared for by his family.

Mrs. Burke explains that the word "institutionalization" kept cropping up in conversations about Andrew. Considered the "socially acceptable" means of dealing with mental retardation in the 1950s, it often was suggested to the family as their only recourse. "It's easier for parents with normal children to say that," she explains. "I just couldn't do it."

She explains that the more the family was pressured to "put him away," the more determined everyone was to help him lead a normal life.

"It actually broke my heart to have my own mother and sister tell me to put him away," Mrs. Burke relates.

"I've always felt Andrew was put on this earth for a specific reason," she says. "I'm not ashamed of him. I wanted him with me."

Determined to bring up Andy in a normal family atmosphere, the Burkes made themselves more aware of their son's condition. They visited scores of doctors, therapists and clinics as well as investigated schools, care centers and other facilities for the mentally and physically impaired.

Mrs. Burke explains their most alarming discovery turned out to be the unaccepting social attitude towards the mentally retarded. "The hardest part of his growing up was that people didn't understand him," she relates.

Through persistence and determination, the Burkes defied the doctors' earlier prognosis that Andrew would never walk. By the age of five he was

sitting up and by seven he was on his feet.

However, while Andrew seemed to be making marked improvement, the Burkes were pulling themselves together to try to cope with another tragic blow. In December, 1960, the Burkes' third son Joe also was born mentally impaired.

By 1967, there were seven children in the Burke family. In addition to the seven children, Sylvia Burke had four miscarriages.

Today, the Burke children range in age from 15 to 31. Teresa, the youngest, and Joe are the only two still living at home.

Despite a strong constitution, raising seven children — two mentally retarded — took its toll on Sylvia Burke. Her husband James, a Conrail engineer,

She explains that part of their special rapport comes from being close in age. "Being just a little bit younger than I am," she says, "we used to play together all the time."

"His favorite game was finger puppets, and I'd sit with him for hours giving puppet shows. Sometimes I'd read books to him or just be with him. He liked to be close to me."

"I also liked to make Andy laugh," she says, "it was so easy to make him laugh. Sometimes I would think that if I made him laugh, it would make the pain go away."

As a kid, Denise explains she was very protective of Andy. "I grew up fighting for my brother," she says. "Kids can be very cruel when they want to be."

"My brother and I used to beat up

together.

At about this same time, Sylvia Burke's health began to deteriorate. Raising a toddler, and sending six kids off to six different schools was becoming too much to handle.

"I just couldn't take it anymore," she relates. "I had to take drastic steps."

That drastic step initiated with a phone call from the Plymouth Center for Human Development — an opening was available if the Burkes decided to admit Andrew as a resident.

"It broke my heart to do it," she recalls. "They had called once before when Teresa was born, offering to take him. At that time I told them he wasn't a bother and to offer it to someone else."

In March, 1974, Andrew James Burke was admitted to Plymouth Center — much to the heartbreak of his family.

"When I put him in Plymouth Center," his mother relates, "all the girls were so mad that they wouldn't even talk to me."

"It was two days before my oldest son's wedding — it was a very sad time."

According to Denise, the Burke's decision to place Andrew in Plymouth Center was "something we'd always talked about, but never imagined would happen."

"We didn't hate our parents for doing it," she says. "It was hard on my parents — it was as much and emotional strain as a physical strain."

Mrs. Burke explains that the family's concern for Andrew grew worse during his stay in Plymouth Center. "When we first put him in Plymouth, there was no real help for him," she recalls, "not even a school."

Denise echoes her mother's remarks and notes that she constantly worried about Andy's well being. "I was worried about how he was cared for and if he was lonely."

"I kept asking myself, 'Are people loving him as much as I do?'"

often was on call — which left her alone with "her hands full of children." She admits, however, that she received considerable help from the older children. "If it wasn't for the older kids, I think I would have gone nuts," she says.

Mrs. Burke explains that her other children proved to be Andy's guardian angels. "They protected him every minute," she notes. "They used to get in fights when kids teased him, they watched over him on the school bus — they'd even get mad at me when I scolded him," she exclaims.

"All in all, I think the kids learned a lot by having a brother like this."

Of the Burke's seven children, Denise, 28, always has been the closest to her younger brother Andy.

Now living in Canton with her husband, Denise describes her brother as "very compassionate, gentle and loving" with a real talent for "making people laugh."

kids on the block for making fun of Andy. There were many times when I'd come home with a bloody nose."

Reflecting on her years growing up with Andy, Denise explains that as a kid she needed him as much as he needed her. "We all love him," she comments. "We aren't ashamed of him."

Denise acknowledges that though there were some tough times for Andy, the Burkes always were there to lend their support. "Our family had a lot of love," she observes.

Up until the age of 17, Andrew continued to live at home. An integral part of the family network, he accompanied his parents, brothers and sisters just about everywhere — from running errands to taking trips to Sea World.

However, as Joe grew older, things began to change. Joe's hyperkinetic personality clashed with his older brother's passiveness to the point where they could not be left alone

# Former teacher to get back pay

Northville Public Schools unlawfully practiced sex discrimination when school administrators denied Shaughnessy the use of sick leave days to recuperate from childbirth.

Assistant Superintendent Burton Knighton said Monday that the school district opted not to appeal the Court of Appeal's decision to the Michigan Supreme Court because the case "no longer has the sweeping ramifications it once did."

The district had pursued the case for fear that it could open doors for other cases dealing with alleged discrimination prior to the passage of the Michigan Civil Rights Act.

Though Knighton acknowledged that the ruling still could have ramifications for other school districts with similar cases, he pointed out that such complaints are less likely to occur because of the time which has elapsed since the passage of the Michigan Civil Rights Act.

As a result of the Court of Appeals ruling, the district now is obligated to pay Shaughnessy her 14 days of sick leave plus interest.

He said he "guessed" the district would end up paying her something "in the neighborhood of \$1,000" but could not be definite.

# Schools, planners settling disputes

Concerns that private schools were being built in the township without proper reviews by local authorities may soon be alleviated, although at least one case remains unresolved.

Little Red Schoolhouse/William Allan Academy was expected to receive zoning board approvals Monday that would conclude the site plan review process for the school's one-acre Eight Mile Road parcel, including the addition of a third modular classroom unit.

Township planners have been concerned for nearly a year that improvements to the Little Red Schoolhouse property and new construction of the Montessori School on Haggerty Road north of Five Mile were proceeding without any local review.

Schoolhouse representatives initially told the planning commission it was their understanding there was no local jurisdiction over school construction — that the state had all control over school properties. Neither school, therefore, ever submitted plans for local review prior to expanding.

Planners disagreed, granting that the state was the sole authority regarding building approvals but contending the local commission holds sway over site plans (designating the arrangement of structures and other facilities on a parcel of land).

After the township began requesting that the schools submit plans, Little Red Schoolhouse did so, though saying it was doing so "only out a spirit of cooperation." Several reviews and alterations to the plan followed, leading to commission approval of the plan contingent on the granting of a variance regarding parking areas. It was that variance the zoning board was to rule on Monday, September 13.

The township board has been carrying both schools as agenda topics for the past few months, since what was initially thought to be a lack of cooperation led to consideration of legal action against the operators.

With the Red Schoolhouse approvals seemingly in place and building inspector Troy Milligan reporting that Montessori directress Lynn Gall's attorney has requested a list of requirements in order to prepare for application approval, it appears both situations may soon be resolved.

Both the planning commission and township board have been tabling consideration of the Montessori School situation in deference to personal problems that prevent Gall from attending government meetings to represent the school.

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
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


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
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
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
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
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
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
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# Truck rolls down into pond

# Believe vandalism reports related

5:30 a.m. the next day.

A 55-year-old Northville man told police he was injured in a hit-and-run accident on Northville Road shortly after midnight September 8.

The Dartmouth Road resident told police he was driving northbound on Northville Road, just south of Six Mile, at about 12:20 a.m. when a southbound vehicle crossed the center line and struck the left side of his car.

The man suffered cuts and bruises in the inci-

dent. He told police he did not remember anything after the collision and that he could identify the vehicle that hit him. He sought medical attention and drove the car in for repairs himself.

Police noted they could find no trace of paint from another car on the victim's damaged vehicle when searching for evidence.

A Phoenix Correctional Institution inmate was injured while employed in a work-release program at township hall September 10.

The inmate, who told police he was cleaning out a loft in the fire department, fell and caught a foot between two rungs of a ladder. When discovered, he was hanging upside down from the ladder.

He told police and ambulance attendants he had pain in the hip and neck and could not feel the medics touching his feet. He was taken by Novi Ambulance to St. Mary Hospital and was subsequently transferred to St. Joseph in Ann Arbor.

A farmer working the land at Consumer Powers' storage field east of Beck between Five and Six Mile Road told police someone broke into the fenced facility and stole some of his equipment September 11.

Missing were a \$55 battery from a flatbed truck and an assortment of tools valued at \$200. The culprits broke a locked gate at the fenced field to gain entry.

Cash totaling \$150 was stolen from an Innsbrook Apartment September 6, the resident told police.

The thief apparently gained entrance through a bedroom window, removing the screen and opening it. The money had been left atop a stereo, the owner said.

A man carrying a shotgun attempted to enter her car at Five Mile and Beck roads September 10, a Plymouth woman told police.

The woman said she was driving westbound on Five Mile and waiting in the left turn lane at Beck when she noticed the suspect standing behind an electrical pole at about 11:15 p.m.

She told police the suspect — about six-feet tall with short blond hair, wearing blue jeans and white T-shirt with blue sleeves and red lettering on the front — approached her stopped car and attempted

to enter through the passenger-side door, which was locked.

When it appeared he was going to try entry on the driver's side, she said, she drove away swiftly. The woman said the man carried a shotgun in his hand, pointed toward the ground. At no time did he raise or level the weapon, she told police.

A Jamestown Circle resident reported her husband as a missing person September 9, according to police reports.

The woman told police her husband is employed by a construction firm in Kansas and was recently away working for two-to-three months. He had been home two weeks, during which time he hadn't been at home more than "a couple of hours" at a time.

Police are investigating a string of malicious destruction cases — in which vandals punctured tires, scratched the paint on cars and stole or destroyed several mailboxes — which they believe to be connected.

Novi police have accumulated similar tire-puncturing reports totaling 30 in the past two weekends, local police reports show.

Among the recently reported incidents, two of which occurred at times residents had seen a blue pickup truck driving at high speeds in their neighborhoods, were these:

— A 1973 Ford Mustang parked in an Innsbrook lot September 4 and 5 suffered scratch damage to the paint estimated at \$150.

— Paint was scratched, the trunk lid dented and a medallion torn off a 1980 Ford Mustang parked on Anchor Court September 5 and 6, with damages estimated at \$175.

— Four tires on a Chrysler Cordoba parked on Rippling Lane September 5 and 6 were punctured. They were valued at \$200.

— All four tires on another car parked on Silver Spring were also punctured, at a total damage estimate of \$176.

— Mailboxes were knocked down or stolen at Rippling Lane and Silver Spring addresses.

Most of the incidents reportedly occurred between 10 p.m. September 5 and 5:30 a.m. September 6.

## Board backs DMH funds

Frustrated with repeated failures of the Department of Mental Health to curtail significantly walkway problems at Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital, the township board of trustees last week passed a resolution opposing further reductions in the state mental health budget.

The resolution cited "numerous promises regarding increased security and additional staffing," the years-old appropriation to build a fence at NRPH that was cut from the budget, and subsequent pledges "regarding the planting of a living fence...and additional staffing to better administrate care for patients."

It concluded that the board is opposed to any reductions that could lead to increased walkways from the hospital.



that no review by the planning commission would be required, and that "in making (the) determination the Zoning Board of Appeals in effect determines the height and yard setback requirements for the structure."

Representatives of the Northville Colony, Silver Springs and Quakertown (in Livonia) homeowners' associations addressed the board in opposition to the proposal. Most often cited were concerns with esthetics and with the concept of precedent.

"Once you grant one, you're going to play hell stoppin' 'em anyplace else," said Silver Springs homeowner representative Bob Conklin, summing up the precedent concern.

But board members and Milligan pointed out Oasis is the only golf course in the township in a commercial zoning district. All three others are zoned residential and would not qualify for erection of a dome under the ordinances and codes applicable to Oasis.

Golf Dome designer Michael Thompson noted there are few uses for such domes outside of recreation purposes. "You can't park cars in them because of carbon monoxide," he related. "Leisure? Fine. But I think you'll find the law protects you from having air-supported structures on inappropriate sites."

Brian Higgins, president of the township homeowners' association, related the concerns of his membership for legal protection from a proliferation of domes.

"When you get right down to the bottom line," he said, "it's a legal issue. We're really worried that we have really good people (in government) but people who are really amateurs. I think the

people would like to hear from an attorney that we are protected."

Foreman heard all the arguments and sided with the homeowners opposing the dome.

"I agree with the gentleman," he said after Higgins spoke. "This letter tells me nothing either. Our attorney is not telling us how we say 'no' to the next guy."

Foreman also questioned the economic viability of the dome, particularly its timing during the current recession. Thompson responded that recreational golf has set new records in the past season and that recreation in general is growing, partially because of the greater leisure time of the workforce.

"The best time to do this is during a recession," he said.

Higgins and resident Jerry Chisnell both said a primary concern of those opposing the dome was that it did not require planning commission review and public hearings. The letter from Higgins' group cited "a lack of sufficient guidelines" covering air-supported structures.

Foreman noted a contrast in the degree of township restriction on building.

"We have a very strict fence ordinance," he said. "By comparison, this is nothing. We don't allow six-foot fences; our ordinance limits them to five feet. It's our obligation to look at these people talking because they're the ones who are going to have to look at this thing."

Cook made the motion to grant the exception which was seconded by Bernard Bach. Bach voted in support of the proposal two weeks ago. Cook, Bach and chairperson Sandra Walts voted in favor of the motion, with Foreman opposed.

## Commission hears proposal

A representative of a group of investors from Northville Associates came before the recreation commission at its meeting last week Wednesday to offer information on plans to cover part of the Oasis Golf Center with an air-supported structure for wintertime use.

The representative, among other persons, also was there to seek the commission's active support in helping gain a variance from the township zoning board of appeals to build the structure. However, it was not needed as the investors received the variance Monday night without the commission's support.

Bruce Schmitt, one of the investors, and a township resident, explained to the commission the structure is to be used in the winter for golf practice and for softball, football and soccer use.

"We want to offer some sort of cooperative venture to make sure the rec department knows it's there," Schmitt said. "We want to set up some kind of two-way street between the rec commission and ourselves to work with us on a schedule of the structure."

In a letter he gave the commission, Schmitt outlined some of the proposals the investors are offering the recreation department.

Those include a 60 percent discount off normal fees for school youth groups when scheduled as a group with their coach or club pro. A senior citizen discount of 60 percent off normal fees and 40 percent during morning hours of 8-11 a.m.

For softball time in a five-game league the sponsor cost would be \$120 per series with the individual player cost of \$3 per game to cover umpire fees and two game balls. Soccer and football could be arranged similar to softball depending upon interest.

Schmitt was asked what the normal fees would be by the commission. He noted the normal fee would be between \$5-6 per half hour of time for school groups, while golf would be \$1-1.50 per half hour.

He also explained the investors would like to give a donation of one-half percent of the net profit, up to a maximum of \$2,000, to be used to help erase part of the township's portion of the debt.

"This is all we're offering you. Also, to give you something down the road to arrange and schedule outings," Schmitt said.

He noted a group of private investors operate an air-inflated dome in Madison Heights, and lease the land at the golf site from the city since it owns it. He also gave the commission information on other domes which cover tennis courts.

Bob Osborne, one of the owners of Oasis, noted 32 tees would be covered by the structure, which would have a height of 35 feet at the tee line rising to a height of 67 feet at its peak. The dome has a maximum height of 74 feet, he said, and averages about 40 feet.

Commissioner Jane Watts asked what the role of the recreation department would be in the venture, and Schmitt explained it would be to notify the residents the facility is available.

Watts, however, became hesitant that the offer of \$2,000 was some kind of an enticement to get the commission's support.

"I see that debt and I see this as a cooperative venture," Schmitt said.

Larry Sheehan, owner of Sheehan's on the Green next to Oasis, also voiced his support of the dome to the commission. "I don't think there is a better place for this in the township," he began. "It's in a most inconspicuous place, yet it has good road access. I think it's a step in the right direction."

Osborne added, "We pay taxes 12 months, and we would like to stay open 12 months. It would be an attractive addition to a recreational facility."

Commissioner David Llewellyn said, "They are offering us a flexible donation, and I think we should accept it as such and not formally support or not support the structure, but remain neutral."

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
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


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

### It's still a good idea

As Northville Public Schools Superintendent George Bell noted in his address to the township board of trustees last week, this newspaper has long supported the concept of summer tax collections for the school district. We are pleased to see the subject brought forward again and believe Bell may be more successful than his predecessors in seeing it implemented.

Bell is leaving the details open for discussion and debate, but he is correctly emphasizing the absolute waste of school tax monies spent on interest that could be avoided by collecting all or part of taxes six months earlier. We urge city and township officials to consider what the estimated \$1 million lost to interest costs since 1973 could have done for the school district attended by their children and those of their constituents.

Were the tax-collecting responsibilities in the hands of the school district, citizens would be justifiably critical of the loss of funds tax-anticipation notes represent. But schools are not, at present, allowed to collect their own taxes. They must rely on local governments to do so. And in the past decade city councils and township boards have been seemingly intransigent in their refusal to collect taxes for the schools each July.

In the early stages of the proposal, we could not understand why the governments refused summer or split collections for schools. Today, when costs have risen dramatically, the idea that an extra collection could be expensive has more credence. But if costs are high, interest rates have been even higher. And the reluctance of some communities to undertake summer tax collections has spurred the Michigan Legislature to action on a bill that would allow schools to by-pass uncooperative governments and collect taxes themselves. The bill could well become law before the year is out.

This latter proposal is distasteful in several ways. It would require the schools to spend some of the saved money on establishment of a collection department, add a layer of bureaucracy for the taxpayer to deal with, and local governments are understandably concerned they could be stuck with administrative costs of collections in which they have no part. Awkward and inefficient as it appears, having schools collect their own taxes is preferable to forcing them to continue to waste money on interest charges.

We hope it doesn't come to that. And we believe the appointment of a committee to negotiate the details is the best chance to avoid having that situation in Northville, regardless of what happens elsewhere in the state. We even have a suggestion for the committee to keep in mind when considering the impact of that first year of summer collections (cribbed from a Michigan Townships Association counter-proposal opposing House Bill 4051):

In order to lessen the impact of having tax bills due only six months apart the first year, we'd recommend an extended "grace period" during which taxes could be paid without penalty. In other words, instead of billing in July with a September deadline for payment, make the deadline late October or November. In this way, those who pay their own taxes (instead of having a mortgage company do it) have more time to put together the money needed. In the following year, move the deadline forward one month, and so on, until it is in its normal position on the calendar.

We think the idea is worth consideration, even though it would slow down the benefit to the school district. What is important right now is to get the proper officials together to begin consideration of some plan to reduce or eliminate the necessity for the sale of tax anticipation notes. The cost of continuing as we have is just too high.

### Silly season strikes again

Here's the silly season part: the EDC release has FitzPatrick saying cute stuff like "waste not, want not," and drawing other morals from the tale of the EDC-that-donated-playground-equipment. And somehow St. Mel's principal Sister Mary Laurene was moved to call FitzPatrick a "role model" of "responsible adulthood." It all gets a bit thick for me. Had it not been an election year, and had FitzPatrick not been a candidate, what do you want to bet we might never have heard of the donation? Anyway, good job township. Tacky, Fitz.

- As long as we're speaking of politicians in the public eye, is there anyone in Northville who doesn't know Bill Joyner is

running for the 36th District representative seat? Thought not. The man's been everywhere. Monday he tried for a hat trick, turning up at the school board meeting, then dashing over to township hall for the zoning board meeting, just missing the vote on the dome issue that drew him there. He was cornered in the parking lot by someone, and ended up not going to the city council meeting he said he also intended to make.

Gerry Law? I haven't heard from him since we endorsed his opponent in the primary, though I imagine just saying so will bring a detailed update of his activities. Despite surface appearances, it's really Democrat Joyner who's playing catch-up in Republican Northville.

He's trying so hard, it makes me wonder if he remembers what he said in August: "A Democrat can campaign in Northville 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and get 36 percent of the vote, or he can stay home and get 35 percent." Guess he likes bucking the odds.

- Part of what makes the silly season is that summertime is so often devoid of compelling issues. As things cool down, people start looking for something, anything, to generate heat. That's the only explanation I can put together for the furor, on both sides, over the Oasis's Golf Dome proposal.

Supervisor John MacDonald goofed, as did some other big names around town, by lobbying so strenuously on the dome's behalf. Made folks suspicious. Basically, it boils down to this: there is no better place for such a structure in the township, it's zoned for business, hard by the freeway ramps, on low terrain at an existing operation. Whether the proprietors help the recreation program is irrelevant. So, too, I'm afraid is the esthetic hyper-sensitivity of someone living two miles away. Just once, I'd like to hear such a debate confined to its merits with both sides pledging to dispense with the superfluous. That wish shows the silly season affects me, too.

# Boutique owner gambled in April on fall fashions

It's a long way from April to September, but doing business in the fashion world requires a special ability to look ahead four or five months — to predict what women will wear in the fall when spring outfits have just been donned.

For Inge Zayti, owner of the Marquis Boutique at 133 East Main in Northville, and buyer Joan Smith speculating on whether burgundy and pink will be a winning combination this fall and winter was part of the "buying game" last April.

Early on a Sunday morning, the two women left Northville bound for the Detroit Fashion Buyers fall show at the Sheraton Southfield Inn. Obviously excited, they were anticipating reunions with favorite representatives.

Veterans of many such buying sprees, they checked the list of fashion firm representatives in the lobby, deciding on the five or six whose lines they wanted to see. Inge Zayti explained they view lines that will sell in her shop — although she admitted she was tempted when she inspected some of the fine designer dresses, suits and sweaters.

She indicated she is aware that \$500 sweaters are not what her customers are seeking — although they do appreciate the quality ones she does stock.

For the next nine hours the two went on a buying spree for the blouses, skirts, pants and dresses that now are featured in the two shops that form the Marquis Boutique and flank the Marquis Theatre on Northville's Main Street.

The market was well attended by store owners and managers who tried to check with favorite manufacturers' representatives early to make appointments for later in the day.

The hotel rooms had become salesrooms with representatives of fashion lines filling portable racks with samples.

Usually, the "rep" displayed an entire line for an individual buyer, showing coordination of colors and styles in skirts, jackets and blouses. Then he would go back to the beginning, asking if the buyer wished to order item by item.

"A mistake can wipe out a small business," blonde Inge Zayti observed as the two paused before ordering the velvet blazers and skirts in the John Meyer line. "I do not like all prints," she told Hal Berman, the firm's representative.

"You're entitled," he responded easily, continuing to show his coordinated line of jackets, skirts and pants.

"Is lined?" questioned European-born Zayti as the pants were shown. Being assured they were, she ordered.

Last week she confided that her pant choices at the market, including new heather tweeds and flannels, already proved "right."

"I ordered another 140 pair," she said, "because I sold 18 pair the first two weeks in August in hot weather."

"With our climate the woolen, lined winter slacks are right, and women buy them to wear walking and for when they go north. Northville's (market) is different from Detroit's. Women in the city go from heated cars to heated jobs."

As she commented, Zayti indicated she was ordering for a clientele she knows well.

Half-German and half-Swiss, Inge Zayti remembers chaffering the fashion genius Coco Chanel in

Switzerland 20 years ago when her family owned a hotel in the Harz Mountains in Germany and she was a student.

She opened her boutique shops in Northville nine-and-a-half years ago, and Joan Smith came to assist shortly after.

"I grew up in the (fashion) business," Smith recalled, "my mother was a buyer-manager until she was 80." That was in Lafayette, Indiana, where Smith attended design school at Purdue University.

"When we both go 'Ohhhh,' then we know it (that fashion) will fly out the front door," Smith related as the two conferred on skirts, pants and jackets.

"We sold a lot of blazers last winter — we'll get skirts to match with them for this year," Zayti said at the market, going on to choose soft plaids while rejecting most stripes.

The new look in jackets — slightly shorter with soft puff sleeves — now is in the Marquis. Inge Zayti remarked

that she is glad she stayed away from the extremes. "Not everybody can wear the big puffs — they look like a German tank."

Noting that today's economy has made people "value conscious," the buying team focused on collections of separates.

Inge Zayti was ordering cumulatively. After selecting a fawn flannel skirt, she ordered a teal blouse from another representative "that will look good with it."

One of their favorite representatives was Sandy Zoft from Cottage Tailor.

"You look good in all their skirts. They are beautifully tailored; the fit and details are what makes them count. Hidden zippers are really hidden," the women pointed out.

"Once a woman buys one of these skirts, she will always come back," Zayti emphasized, pointing out, "They don't sell on the rack but when they're tried on."

"Don't underestimate beige," the salesman told them as they looked also at the olive and burgundy colors recommended for fall and winter.

Inge Zayti since has supplemented her April purchases with a new line of blouses — and has gone to market again.



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
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

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# Mustangs run past Thurston for first win

Behind running backs Andy Dimitroff and Ray McDonough, the Northville football team ran wild to a 28-0 season-opening home victory over non-league Redford Thurston Friday night.

"We had the running game in high gear," fourth-year head coach Dennis Col-

ligan said.

It was more like overdrive than high gear, as the Mustangs shredded the Thurston defense for 378 yards rushing in racking up their third straight season-opening triumph over the Falcons.

Dimitroff, showing no ill effects from last season's knee injury, scampered through Thurston's defense for 171 yards on 14 carries and one touchdown. McDonough was just as impressive as he gained 106 yards on 11 carries and scored twice.

With such success on the ground, Colligan shelved the passing game for most of the night. Quarterback Dave Longridge connected on only one of five passes for seven yards.

"I really expected to throw 15 to 20 passes," Colligan explained. "But, I was caught in the position of 'what do you do?'"

And while it looks like Northville displayed an awesome offensive attack, it really was not the case. The Mustangs committed 15 penalties for 170 yards, all of them against the offense. Also, Northville fumbled five times, but only lost two.

The penalties negated some long runs by Dimitroff, a 65-yard touchdown run by McDonough and a seven-yard scoring strike from Longridge to Jim Thomson.

The start of the contest was just a preview of what was to happen to the Mustangs all night. The Mustangs bobbled the opening kickoff and Thurston recovered the loose ball at the Mustangs' 30-yard line.

However, the defense stiffened and Thurston was forced to punt. The Mustangs, though, gave the ball right back on another fumble, but Thurston was unable to score. The Falcons, though, did fire a touchdown pass, but it was nullified by a motion penalty.

Northville got rolling on its second possession and finally reached paydirt early in the second quarter. Lineman Randy Kratt recovered a Dimitroff fumble in the end zone for a 6-0 Mustang lead. Dimitroff coughed up the ball when he was nailed at the goal line.

Bill Kinard's extra-point attempt sailed wide, so Thurston declined an illegal procedure penalty called against Northville.

Later in the same quarter, Dimitroff held onto the ball after a five-yard run to give Northville a 12-0 advantage. Quinn ran in the two-point conversion for a 14-0 halftime lead.

The Mustangs sealed the contest in the third quarter when McDonough scored both of his six-pointers. His first came on a two-yard run after the Mustangs had tackled the Thurston punter at the 13-yard line when the snap sailed over his head.

Northville completed the scoring with a five-play, 51-yard drive capped by an eight-yard touchdown run by McDonough. Dimitroff was the workhorse in the drive carrying the ball three times for 49 yards. McDonough's score came after a motion penalty moved the ball back to the eight-yard line. Kinard made both extra points.

Northville went into Friday's game without two of its better offensive linemen in tackle Steve Schrader and guard Ron Winters. Schrader sustained a knee injury in a four-way scrimmage September 3, while Winters had an appendectomy operation the same week.

Colligan said Schrader will probably be out for the season, while Winters may return to action by October.

While Colligan was satisfied with gaining a victory, he knows the mistakes will have to be at a minimum when the Mustangs travel to Westland John Glenn for a 7:30 p.m. contest Friday.

The Northville junior varsity won its opening game against Thurston with a come-from-behind 22-19 triumph. Doug Hartman scored the winning touchdown from five yards out with 48 seconds remaining.

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
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
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# NHS tennis team nets three triumphs

The show will feature a variety of quilts dating from 1820 to the present, many which have never been on display. Quilting will be demonstrated throughout the show.






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## "Artists of Tomorrow"

In 1979 the Music Committee of the Oakway Symphony decided to sponsor a competition for young musicians, under 25 years of age, who aspire to careers in solo performance. At first a scholarship was considered, but after careful deliberation it was decided to give prize money with no strings attached. At such a high level of performance there are many expenses: lessons, summer music camps, travel so they can study with great teachers, and often, a better instrument.

Requests for funding were sent to many Foundations. Two affirmative replies were received: first, from the Michigan Foundation for the Arts, and another from the Matilda Wilson Foundation. However, both indicated that they would give \$3,000 for prize money, but nothing for the many other expenses involved in sponsoring such a competition (judges' fees, rental charges, mailing, and finally an appearance of the winners with the orchestra). At first the Board of Directors felt the whole project should be dropped, but finally decided to hold the competition. The grant from the Michigan Foundation was accepted, but it was necessary to refuse the \$3,000 from the Wilson Foundation! Four prizes were given: \$1,000, two for \$750, and \$500.

The Michigan Foundation for the Arts told Oakway that the grant was to be given only once, and that they had never given money for anything like this before. However, they were so pleased with the entire competition and the way it was handled that, two years ago, they opened it to the entire state of Michigan, with a limit of \$2,500, although they have continued to give Oakway the \$3,000 as it was granted the first year.

Each year the quality of performance of the young people is amazing! Residents and students of our area are eligible. The finest music schools in the United States are represented — Juilliard, Curtis, Eastman, Indiana University, University of Michigan and many more. The contestants are truly the "Artists of Tomorrow."

Auditions for the 1983 competition will be held at Madonna College on January 2, 8 and 9, 1983 from 9:30 to 5:00. There is no charge, and we would be happy to have you hear these fine musicians. It will be a thrilling experience for you.

The four winners will appear as soloists with the Oakway Symphony on February 20, Sunday 3:00 at Harrison High School in Farmington.

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## Oakway Symphony History

On June 4, 1973 twenty-four people met to form a symphony orchestra. Some were music lovers, some were parents who wanted their children exposed to fine music, all felt that a symphony orchestra would make their community a better place to live and to do business.

While they appreciated the contributions of the existing orchestras in Detroit's suburbs, there was a large area northwest of Detroit where residents could not avail themselves of the pleasures of symphonic music. With the Pontiac Symphony to the north, the Dearborn south, Plymouth on the west and Oak Park east, the large area of Birmingham, Southfield, Farmington, and Livonia would benefit if they had an orchestra.

The summer of '73 was a busy time for the young orchestra. Francesco Di Blasi was hired as Music Director and Conductor. A Women's Association was formed. Several well-publicized and well-attended meetings were held at University Hills Christian Center in Farmington Hills. At one of these meetings a name for the orchestra was discussed. We knew that the name of a city would result in valuable support, but that was impossible because it was felt that the broader base of the four cities was essential to the success of the orchestra. There were many suggestions, including Margaret Halava's recommendation of "Observerland Symphony". After a vote, Alice Haidostian's name, "Oakway" was selected, indicated the counties where the orchestra would perform.

In August auditions were held at Oakland Community College; there were so many applicants that some

qualified musicians had to be turned away. A series of four subscription concerts was announced, to be performed in the four cities which have remained the home ground of the Oakway Symphony. Artists featured on these concerts were Mischa Mischakoff (violin), William Doppman (piano), Paul Olefsky (cello) and the Kenneth Jewell Chorus.

During these ten years the quality and variety of music has been exceptional. Soloists who have appeared with Oakway include world renowned artists such as Ilse von Alpenheim (Mrs. Antal Dorati), Ani Kavafian, Ida Kavafian, Ruth Burczyk, Glenda Kirkland, Samuel Mayes, Alfio Pignotti, Flavio Varani, Maria Meirelles, Mischa Kottler, Dady Mehta, Isidor Saslav and many others. Mischa Mischakoff knew Oakway very well as a soloist with the orchestra, and he also frequently attended concerts. Shortly before his death he told a friend, "There is only one orchestra better than Oakway in this area, and that is the Detroit Symphony."

Complete operas have been performed on the subscription series of the Oakway Symphony such as *The Barber of Seville* and *Lucia di Lammermoor* with the Michigan Opera Theatre, and *Suor Angelica*, staged by Alice Engram. Ballet has been featured many times, such as last season's performance of *Coppelia* with the Contemporary Civic Ballet, Rose Marie Floyd, Director. The exciting *Spectaculars* (Viennese, Italian, French, Spanish and this season, Polish) featured singers and dancers.

An extremely popular Cabaret Concert has been performed each year,

with such popular Masters of Ceremonies as Sonny Eliot, Fat Bob Taylor, Senator Jack Faxon and Roland Sharette. Ernest A. Jones and Sister M. Francilene Van de Vyver have been frequent guest conductors at these concerts, and at the regular subscription concerts.

The Oakway Symphony appears at various Malls in our area: Tel-Twelve (often as many as six times in a season), Twelve Oaks, Wonderland and the Livonia Mall. A reduced orchestra (from 20 to 40 musicians) is used in innumerable performances (20 to 25) each season with Musicals, Ballet and Opera.

Summer months are also busy times for Oakway. The orchestra has performed many times in out-door concerts in Livonia, Farmington and Southfield. A performance at Meadow Brook with Victor Borge drew a capacity audience. In July, Oakway closed the Farmington Festival with Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture, including fireworks and cannons, to an audience of more than 11,000. The most recent concert was performed in the garden at Botsford Inn, a delightful evening of "Broadway Under the Stars" with the Company Four singers, Marilyn Hedquist, Barbara Scanlon, David Pulice and Mark Vondrak.

The 1982-83 season, in celebration of Oakway's Tenth Anniversary, promises to be the best yet with a renowned bassoonist from the Metropolitan Opera Company, Ballet, a winner of the First Van Cliburn Competition, Artists of Tomorrow, music of two famous living Composers, two of Detroit's finest pianists, one of the world's greatest cellists, and folk dancers. See you at the concerts!
