Council grants raises for administrative posts

Salary increases ranging from 6.7 to ficers have received two five percent 10.2 percent for administrative pay increases, July 1981 and 1982, employees of the city were voted unanimously Monday night by city

The raises were granted after the council held a closed session at 10:30 p.m. to discuss the first adjustments for the non-union administrative employees since July 1, 1980.

The city manager, city clerk and executive secretary received increases of 7.9 percent while the DPW superintendent and foreman were increased by 6.7 percent and the police chief by 10.2 per-.

The raises and fringe benefit adjüstments to conform to union contracts were to be effective retroactively to Ju-

With the new schedule, the city manager's salary will go from \$36,899 to \$39,815; city clerk, from \$22,506 to \$24,294; police chief, from \$31,450 to \$34,652; DPW superintendent, from \$32,074 to \$34,236; DPW foreman, from \$18,512 to \$19,760; executive secretary to city manager, from \$17,597 to \$19,011.

In moving the increases, the council also instructed that the library and housing commissions be notified of the action in order to set salaries for the head librarian and the housing director of Allen Terrace and her staff, consistent with their budget and "in the light of the council action.'

In his memo to council on the administrative salary recommendations, City Manager Steven Walters not that the affected employees also had given up a portion of their cost of living payments of June, 1981, resulting in a lower gross income in 1981 than in 1980.

He recommended the higher percent increase for the police chief as union of-

Again this year, The Northville Record has won its share of awards in the annual Michigan Press Association contest. Among the six certificates awarded The Record in the 1982 competition was second place for General Excellence for

weeklies in its circulation class. Last year The Record captured first place in General Excellence. The 1982 winner is the East Lansing Towne Courier, an affiliated newspaper in the Suburban Communications Corporation.

Tied for third place were two other papers in the organization, the Brighton Argus and the Mason Ingham County News.

The Record was awarded first place for local news reporting for 1982 for continuous coverage by Kevin Wilson of events at the Northville Ford Valve Plant. The entry contained stories beginning November 18, 1981 with Ford's closing announcement and ran through the March reopening stories and an analysis published in the Green

Wilson's three-part series last.

Both city and township officials have appointed three-member committees to study summer school tax collections upon the request of School Superintendent George Bell and the Northville Board of Education.

studied by a three-member township committee appointed September 23 by Supervisor John MacDonald.

Named to the committee, which is to meet with city and school officials, were Treasurer Richard Henningsen, Business Manager David Lelko and Trustee C. James Armstrong.

MacDonald said Henningsen and Lelko were chosen because the addition of a summer tax collection would most

Armstrong, the supervisor related, was selected because of his understanding of school system operations. Prior to moving to the township, Armstrong was for 12 years a member of the Allen Park Board of Education. He served

two of those years as president of the

Mayor pro tem G. Dewey Gardner, presiding in the absence of Mayor Paul Vernon at the city council meeting Monday, asked council members J. Burton DeRusha and Carolann Ayers to serve on the committee with City Manager Steve Walters.

The school system request that city and township collect property taxes in summer rather than winter is intended to save the interest costs resulting from

school system borrowing. The school budget year coincides roughly with the school year and expenditures must be made months before tax revenue is received under the current system. By billing taxpayers in July rather than December, school superintendent George Bell told the township board last month, the system could have saved more than \$1 million in interest payments made in the past

Township board members discussing the issue were most concerned about two potential problems — added collection costs for the township and the impact on taxpayers of the switch, particularly in the first year.

Bell told them those were the kinds of issues he wished to have considered by the joint committee.

Bell said he would approach other local governments that collect Northville school taxes (notably Novi, Salem and Lyon Township) with the same request that they join in a study of the summer collection proposal.

Detroit House of Corrections (DeHoCo) land in Northville and Plymouth townships is among possible dumping sites for sludge from a Detroit sewage treatment plant, the judge who will make the determination said last

DeHoCo property is now at least partially state-owned and lies in both Northville and Plymouth townships.

Federal District Court Judge John Feikens said the property along Five Mile between Beck and Napier is among locations being considered as

alternative sludge disposal sites. Felkens is considering a court case stemming from apparent treatment plant violation of Environmental Pro-

standards.

Unable to use its incinerators to dispose of the sludge (remnants from the sewer filtering system) Detroit must find alternative means of disposal. Currently, sludge is dumped at a site just east of Willow Run Airport on property Ford Motor Company leases to Wayne Disposal Company.

Feikens, government officials report, has been on a walking tour of the DeHoCo land and was reportedly impressed with the space available.

Northville Township clerk Susan Heintz related that the township attorney has been alerted to the potential decision and is "keeping an eye on it for

No defermination of which alternative means of sludge disposal might be used has yet been made, and no date for the selection is set.

Preliminary indications, she said, did zoning codes, he said, and state laws not reveal whether sludge would be regulating waste disposal. The Plymouth portion of DeHoCo is zoned agricultural and Breen said waste disposal is not permitted in such a zon-

The Northville Township portion is zoned for residential use, and the local ordinance does not permit waste disposal in that classification either.

Recent state legislation, however, could allow an overriding of local zoning codes, and there is some question whether Feikens might not, in his role as a federal judge ruling on an environmental violation, have widereaching authority to make a determination regardless of state and local-

Park Gardens public hearing set

Costs of adding two more parcels to the proposed Park Gardens special assessment district sewer project would be roughly \$28,400, according to a revised estimate and plans filed by township engineer Edward McNeely.

A public hearing on the proposed addition is scheduled at 7 p.m. October 14 in township hall. The township board last month elected to postpone final establishment of the district boundaries until after the hearing.

Most of the added cost is for the extra sewer pipe needed to connect two parcels fronting on Five Mile east of the area originally proposed for service. The figure does not include some \$3,200 in additional sewer tap fees and house lead connections the owners of the added property would have to assume

Excepting tap and house lead fees, which are charged individually to each property, the project is estimated to cost \$1.1 million as opposed to the earlier figure of \$1.072 million.

That total is the amount that must be paid through a combination of federal grant funding (committed to over \$400,000), township water and sewer department (about \$96,500) and the owners of the 170-odd parcels in the service area (who will be assessed the cost

Objections were lodged to the addition of 20 acres of land some Park Gardens residents believe could be divided and developed, thus putting a greater load on the system than the Plymouth and has an agreement to conowners would pay for with a simple nect to Northville sewers when assessment on the narrow Five Mile frontage. McNeely's plan indicates the only additional area to be included in the district is that presently occupied

Another concern of homeowners association representatives at the earlier session were potential connections to Tanger Elementary School and Michigan National Bank.

The addition of the parcels under consideration would bring the township sewer system within reach of Tanger east of Park Gardens. An agreement with Plymouth allowed the school to connect to that township's sewer system with the proviso that Northville Township sewers would be connected when available.

As a consequence, McNeely's revised estimate includes an added \$8,600 cost to the township sewer department to pay for connecting lines to Tanger. Thereafter, sewer fees would be paid to of the remaining costs — estimated at the township's system rather than

agenda in a swift 50-minute session last week Tuesday evening, taking only one vote on action, and that appeared un-

The planning commission voted unanimously to conclude its review of site plans for Little Red Schoolhouse, acknowledging that approval of a parking variance by the Zoning Board of Appeals fulfilled the only outstanding requirement.

While the school issue was on the agenda under old business, the commission already had given the plans final approval, conditional only on the granting of the variance. The ZBA action, most commissioners contended, concluded the review and no further planning commission action was needed.

But vice chairman William Bohan said there was some uncertainty regarding the process and asked for a vote 'just in case.'

Consideration of a lot split request filed by former supervisor Donald Thomson was tabled for the fourth or fifth time due to the absence of a final plan. Review of previously-rejected Montessori School site plans was also tabled to a later meeting, with commissioners noting the death of directress Lynn Gall's husband recently.

An ongoing page-by-page review of subdivision regulations was concluded with planners choosing not to require sidewalks or bike paths anywhere in the township. It had been suggested such a

Township planners cleared their requirement be made where a development borders a major or secondary thoroughfare (examples of the former are the Mile roads, Sheldon, Haggerty and Northville Roads; secondary roads include Bradner and Winchester, among others).

Complete copies of the revised subdivision regulations will be supplied commissioners before their regular-November session where final review is expected.

The commission also took under advisement, and referred to planning consultant Claude Coates, a proposal made by the Lakes of Northville homeowners. group that setback requirements be increased on multi-family or commercial property bordering on single-family

As explained in a letter from the homeowners, the proposal would require more space (75 feet was suggested) between single family lots and other types of structures. It would also require a landscaped greenbelt 20-feet wide to screen the other use from view of the single family homeowners.

Adoption of such a proposal would require amendment of the zoning ordinance, only completed earlier this year. The Lakes of Northville subdivision, borders on a proposed condominium development at Waterford Lake and several homeowners have expressed anger at how closely the law allows the buildings to approach their

Collision kills Northville woman

A single-car accident on Napier south f'Twelve Mile claimed the life of 22year-old Janet Matthews of 605 Grace

Street, Northville, a week ago.

'According to the Oakland County
Sheriff's department, Matthews' vehicle drove off the west edge of the roadway and hit head-on into a tree at an unknown rate of speed at approximate-

ly noon last Wednesday.

Novi police, first on the scene, reported no vital signs evident when they arrived and found the woman behind the wheel. Both police and Novi Ambulance personnel attempted resuscitation at the scene to no avail. and Matthews was pronounced dead on arrival at Botsford Hospital at 12:53

There were no witnesses to the accident proper, a spokesman for the sheriff's Lyon Township substation said. Another driver passing the scene noticed the driver still inside and called

A second witness told investigators he saw Matthews' car when it passed him southbound on Napier near 12 mile (just north of the accident scene) and noted her car seemed very close to the right side of the road.

Police reports of the incident said no skid marks were observed at the scene.







Martha Griffiths to address BPW

Democratic Nominee for Lieutenant Governor Martha Griffiths will speak in

South Lyon October 21. The former Congresswoman will be the special guest speaker for the Tri-County Business and Professional Women's Club in celebration of National Business Women's Week, October 17-23.

Griffiths' topic will be "The Economic and Political Status of Women." She will speak at 8 p.m. in the banquet room of Jimmy Two, on the corner of Ten Mile and Pontiac Trail.

Tri-County BPW President Susan G. Bailo contacted Griffiths shortly after Democratic gubernatorial candidate James Blanchard selected her as his running mate in the November 2 general election.

"I called Mrs. Griffiths at home and asked her if she could find time to speak to our club in honor of National Business Women's Week," Bailo said. 'At that time, she had not yet received her campaign schedule, but she said she would be delighted to speak to us."

Bailo, a South Lyon attorney, said Griffiths was firm in her commitment to address the BPW at Jimmy Two on October 21, despite possible campaign scheduling conflicts.

Anyone interested is welcome to attend the meeting, Bailo said.

A buffet dinner is planned before Griffiths' speech. Seating is limited to 100. Reservations for the 6:30 p.m. dinner may be made by contacting Donna Smith at 437-6214. The cost is \$12, including tax and tip, Bailo said. Those interested in hearing Griffiths' address, but not wishing to dine, should contact Smith to learn if space is available.

Bailo said the BPW has both male and female members and invites people from South Lyon and surrounding communities to attend the meeting and consider joining the BPW.

"The public, male or female, are invited to attend to listen to Mrs. Griffiths' speech," Bailo said. "This is not intended to be a campaign speech. The National Federation of Business and Professional Women sets goals for the clubs to address throughout the year and one of those objectives is the political and economic status of

"I asked Mrs. Griffiths to speak because she is the woman who introduced the Equal Rights Amendment to Congress. She has always promoted women's rights."

Griffiths served in the Michigan legislature from 1949 to 1952 and was Recorder's Court in 1953. She was the first woman to hold that post.

From 1955 to 1975, Griffiths represented Michigan's 17th Congressional District. She conducted a series of hearings on the economic position of women during the late 1960's, when she tee. Griffiths conducted a three-year formation about the BPW.

Griffiths is the recipient of 26 honorary degrees, including degrees from the University of Michigan, Wayne State University and Michigan State University.

Apart from her considerable political achievements, Griffiths' voice also is heard in the business world. She is a member of the boards of directors of the American Automobile Association of Michigan, Burroughs Corporation, Consumers' Power, K-Mart, National Bank of Detroit, Greyhound and Verex.

Bailo said she heard Griffiths speak in 1977 at the National Women's Conference in Houston, Texas. Her strong vocal stylings impressed Bailo at that

Bailo enthusiastically anticipates Griffiths speech and said she hopes a full audience will attend the preelection event. The schedueled appearance of Griffiths coincides with the club's annual membership drive, she noted.

Women interested in joining the BPW must be employed, Bailo said. They need not be working in a professional capacity, as long as they hold a job outside the home.

Men are welcomed as associate members, Bailo explained. Membership dues are \$25 per year. The Tri-County BPW membership area covers 13 communities, including South Lyon, Brighton and Howell. It encompasses portions of Oakland, Livingston and Washtenaw counties.

County borrowing okayed

million in a sale of tax anticipation never defaulted or come close to notes authorized by the State Municipal Finance Commission (MFC) to provide for payroll and other expenditures unti December 1 when new revenue will be

The notes were sold two weeks ago to the National Bank of Detroit in a transaction which County Auditor Richard T. Kelley caled "an expression of NBD's value to the community." With the lowest bid from among six offers, NBD bought the notes at 9.7 percent interest rate for a cost to the county of about \$352,000 for the four-month loan period specified by the MFC.

"The willingness of NBD to buy our notes at this low cost shows that the business community has a lot of faith in the assets of the county and its ability to repay. They realize that, although we

Wayne County has borrowed \$10 are short of cash, Wayne County has bankruptcy," said Auditor Ted Mrozowski.

The county needed to borrow because of a projected \$17.6 million deficit and a \$2 million payroll each week, along with other financial obligations. Originally the county asked for permission to borrow \$20 million but the MFC authorized only \$10 million with the possibility of another \$10 million contingent upon a revision of plans for eliminating the

Part of the current plan calls for 258 layoffs over a 20-month period, but the MFC wants the deficit eliminated in just 14 months, not later than the end of the next fiscal year, November 30, 1983.

The county board authorized the board of auditors to devise a new plan for submission to the MFC and to "comply with the stipulations."



Police issued a citation for failure to obey a traffic signal to Isaac Kelly, 51, of South Branch, who told police his brakes had failed. Police noted skid marks 32 feet prior to the point of impact and another six feet after the colli-

A five-year old girl suffered facial cuts, scrapes and bruises when she was hit by a car on Lake Success west of Silver Springs September 21.

According to police reports, the girl ran out into the street between parked cars, despite the warnings of an older child that a car was coming. She was hit by a car westbound on Lake Success moving at a speed witnesses estimated at 10-15 miles per hour.

Before the 17-year-old driver got out of the car, the girl had gotten up and ran into her home. She was treated for the injuries at Botsford Hospital, and the girl's mother and the driver reported the incident to police the following day.

Four witnesses all reported the driver had no opportunity to stop as the five-year-old ran between parked cars into the street immediately in front of his car. Landfill locations raise furor

produced by Wayne County's public information of-fice to give residents background information concerning the search for new landfill sites. Under state law the county must soon produce a long-range solid waste disposal plan. As recent Oakland County experience has proven, the decisions to be made could affect every resident of the county.

With two of five landfill sites in Wayne County nearly filled and residential rubbish piling up at the rate of 35,000 cubic yards per day, enough to fill Tiger Stadium every two weeks, collection may grind to a halt in the near future unless new locations are found

Public confusion over Michigan Public Acts 641 and 64 is interfering with attempts by local officials to find appropriate landfill acreage to dispose of rubbish normally picked up from residential areas.

Add to that confusion licenses that have already been issued the Michigan Department of Natrual Resources (M-DNR) under previous Act 87 and a county waste management plan that won't be completed until July, 1983, and the result is a number of communities, landfill developers and public watchdogs heading for the solace of circuit court.

"It's important to educate the public on the variances of these three public acts," Wayne County Commissioner Clarence R. Young, chairman of the Solid Waste Management Committee, said. "Or we'll have rubbish and garbage up to our armpits. The problems affect every resident of Wayne County.

Misunderstandings became obvious during a regular meeting of the 13-member solid waste management committee in Wayne September 22, when Canton Township spokesman James Kosteva insisted that Canton Recycling Center's proposed 47acre landfill site at Lilley and Michigan Avenue conform to a local ordinance restricting height to 10 feet.

Then Lyon Development Company's application for a Huron Township landfill was recessed because of its failure to submit proper papers to the township's zoning board.

Adding to the consternation was Dr. Charles Hunt's comments concerning a lawsuit in Sumpter Township to bar construction another landfill by MJW, Inc. under the provisions of act 641.

The audience began cheering him on thinking he was referring to a hazardous waste site in the same community.

'In a nutshell," Young explained, "PA 87 was the original state ordinance enacted to control the licensing and disposal of solid waste and included a proviso that community ordinances would determine whether a landfill developer qualified for a license.

"Public Act 641, enacted in 1979 to replace PA 87, sitpulates that a county solid waste management plan and its attendant ordinance supercedes any city or township ordinance. PA 64 deals solely with hazardous waste material. In every case, it is up to the M-DNR to issue licenses."

Committee members agreed to include the Canton landfill project in the proposed county plan, opening the door to DNR approval. They also agreed to allow the township and Canton Recycling time to compromise on the landfill's eventual height.

Another Canton developer, however, Waste Management of Michigan, refuses to abide by Canton Township ordinance and has taken the community to court challenging its right to limit the Woodland Meadows landfill site to 10 feet. Canton Recycling, with one eye on the court action, has prepared two alternate plans just in case.... 👶

Landfill developers, without exception, must-include plans for future reuse of the property. "A classic case," Young said, "is the Riverview landfill which is now a recreation complex complete with ski slope and golf course. That community has even prepared plans to extract methane gas to heat nearby city buildings.

Canton Recycling has included a 100-foot isolation belt around its 47-acre site with 300 feet across the frontage for future use as industrial or commercial



Lyon Development has offered to turn its land over to Huron Township for a park after it's filled.

"Horror stories of poisoned water due to hazardous waste leakage has made the public gun-shy," Young said. "Now, at the mere mention of a landfill, residents come out shooting before they know the facts. This is hampering efforts to find places to deposit rubbish and garbage these same residents help to generate.

"It's important for them to understand that materials deposited in landfill sites under PA 641 contain no hazardous wastes and the property can be reused for recreational or industrial purposes.

Young continued: "PA 641 also provides for greater control over operations of sanitary landfills and should, in time, give Michigan residents the protection they are demanding not to mention the fact that it allows local officials to adequately dispose of the community's waste materials.'

The solid waste management committee is composed of four members from industry, two from environmental concerns, one from Region 1, SEMCOG; one from cities, one from townships, one from the county board and three citizens at large.





It is not surprising that the 75-residents who toured the building, ate lunch in the cafeteria and observed classes came away with good things to say about Northville High School.

In our opinion, last Wednesday's open house symbolized a renewed pride in Northville High School. It's a pride which deserves to be shared by the entire community — not just high school students and staff members.

The favorable reception of those attending last Wednesday's open house has prompted high school administrators to consider hosting another in the near future — possibly later in this school year. 

The facts stated in the balance of the report are substantially correct. It should be obvious to anyone reading the report that the final decisions are made by the Advisory Council of 19 member communities of the 31 participating communities, which includes the Grosse Pointes as well as all of the Western Wayne County communities.

The decisions made by the Advisory Council are made after considering all available information from staff as well as personal information from various representatives sitting on the council and previous history of the community making the application.

There obviously are differences of opinion as evidenced by the split votes on Park Gardens application, rejection of the county revolving fund, rejection of Melvindale Library System and approval of Grosse Pointe Woods proposal as well as eight other programs submitted, all of the proposals submitted being

determined for eligibility within the framework of the criteria established.

In my humble opinion, the Wayne County Community Development Block Grant Program is the best ad ministered plan in the United States. Wayne County staff does an excellent job and the Advisory Council, in spite of many differences, are able to reach the necessary decisions.

This is done under very difficult circumstances and will be more difficult as funding decreases. Obviously, some communities are disappointed and that is regrettable.

I hope the above will be of some value to you in the future.

allows beginners to accumulate quality pieces at affordable prices. At the same time, the original owner gets two-thirds of the price the resale shop receives for

Not only will Finders Keepers offer collectible and gift items, but it will be a haven for those seeking old, odd pieces of furniture. In their pre-opening stock, Jones pointed out two wooden "fireside pouting chairs," bearing a sticker price of \$30 each. The child-size chairs, Jones speculated, were once used for reading or contemplating by hearthside. Perhaps the chairs were where mothers placed their ill-tempered youths when they got to be too much to

Both Sparks and Jones belong to the South Lyon Fine Arts Society and their original artworks will be offered for sale at Finders Keepers. Additionally, handmade wooden decorative and utilitarian items will be included in the store's stock.

Perhaps the most unsual aspect of Finders Keepers is the "Finders" part.
Jones explained that the proprietors

will keep a catalog of people who have specific skills, such as calligraphy, stenciling or caning, so that the they can match individuals who need such services with skilled craftspeople who are able to fulfill that need.

Additionally, there is a separate listing of people who have need of specific items. While Finders Keepers will not carry the standard resale shop damaged collectible items for resale goods, the storekeepers will take down names and needs and notify people if they know of someone who has the merchandise or service desired.

Jones said they need a bit of professional help where the Finders part is concerned. People who are willing to provide such skills are asked to call Finders Keepers for an appointment to discuss the business arrangement. Jones said the craftspeople will be charged a small commission by the store owners for their match-up ser-

We have also made arrangements to have an interior decorator available for our customers on an appointment basis," Jones said. The decorator will help solve problems with unsual rooms or decorating needs, Jones explained.

"We are counting on our customrs to tell us what they want to receive in terms of service," she said. "They will also be providing our stock. The people will show us what they are interested in and where there is a need.'

wish to visit Hatzi-Craft, South Lyon's

Located at 138 East Liberty, less than one block east of Pontiac Trail and south of Ten Mile, Hatzi-Craft opened its doors September 9. Julia "Hatzi" Smith runs the business, with some help from her husband Al, whom she affectionatly calls "The Fat Artesian."

Mrs. Smith's interest in ceramics began about only three months ago, but it took her by storm. Her first project was a replica of her pet Lhasa apso, Charlie. Upon the completion of her first piece, Hatzi knew she wanted to invest in the craft. "I call this my \$10,000 dog," she remarked.

Hatzi-Craft carries the full line of Duncan products, including brushes and every color of glaze. "That's part of the reason my investment in the store is so high," Mrs. Smith said.

In the basement of Hatzi-Craft, the Smiths pour and mold the greenware. A large selection of molds, including seasonal items like pumpkins, are on hand for orders. If, despite their large collection of molds, a desired item is not in stock, Mrs. Smith said she can obtain the object within a week.

Two kilns are also housed in the basement, along with the slip machine, which agitates the soupy clay for molding.

By having the two kilns, Mrs. Smith

said her customers can usually have their pieces fired to the bisque and final

stages within two days.
"People may take two weeks or more to glaze their pieces, but when they're ready to fire them for the final time, they want to see the finished product as soon as possible," Mrs. Smith said.

Hatzi-Craft has rooms full of greenware just waiting to be decorated. To assist beginners in their effort to master ceramics, Hatzi-Craft also offers classes. Currently classes are being conducted Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights, as well as one afternoon each week. While some of the classes are full, Mrs. Smith said registration is still be taken for Wednesday and the afternoon session.

Instructional fee is \$1.50 per session. she said, plus materials. For the first class, Hatzi-Craft supplies a piece of greenware for beginners.

"Greenware is very delicate and must be handled with a light touch," Mrs. Smith explained. "We provide the first piece so that if it is broken, the beginner is not out any money."

Cost of greenware is inexpensive, she said. The lowest priced item can be purchased for a dime, while the most expensive pieces cost only about \$6. Mrs. Smith said Hatzi-Craft charges half the purchase price for each firing. If a customer bought a \$2 piece of greenware, the first firing to the bisque stage would cost \$1 and the final firing runs another \$1, bringing the cost to \$4, plus

Mrs. Smith's enthusiasm for ceramics is obvious, and her joy is something she wishes to share with others. She is interested in sponsoring ceramics classes though South Lyon Community Education, although nothing is definite vet.

Both young and old can take up ceramics, Mrs. Smith said. Hatzi-Craft offers a 10 percent discount to anyone over 60 years of age. Another goal of Hatzi-Craft is to bring the world of

ceramics to nursery school students. "I feel that I will be successful in my business if I am able to make expenses and make new friends," Hatzi said. She and Al have lived in South Lyon for just over three years. "I love it here," she said. "I wish we had lived here for the

past 20 years." Hatzi-Craft is open from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. Monday though Thursday. The shop is closed Friday during the daytime, but opens from 6-9 p.m. Presently, Hatzi-Craft keeps weekend hours, being open from noon until 3 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

A family success story has been brought to South Lyon by Pete and Audrey Garofalo, who recently opened their eighth dry cleaning store.

Garofalo Cleaners, located in Brookdale Square at Nine Mile and Pontiac Trail, got its start in a small store in Detroit eight years ago. Garofalo said they got into the cleaning business by mistake. Originally, he purchased a building to expand another business in which he was involved. However, after the sale was complete, he found the space would be inadequate for his needs. Since the store had been a dry cleaning facility previously, Garofalo learned the business and continued the operation.

Garofalo Cleaners can now be found in Farmington Hills, Commerce Township, Livonia, South Lyon, Royal Oak, Detroit and two locations in War-

Watch for the grand opening of the newest Garofalo Cleaners in Walled Lake at South Commerce and Pontiac Trail sometime in October.

"Eventually, we hope to expand further toward Ann Arbor, including the Brighton-South Lyon area," Garofalo said. "We came to South Lyon because we have always liked the country.
