Law sweeps 36th State House race

Organization and a high voterturnout carried Republican Gerald Law to a sweeping 60-40 victory over Democrat William Joyner in the 36th District State House election, putting the lie to predictions of a close contest.

Unofficial district totals showed Law with 15,144 votes to Joyner's 10,913 while Libertarian Keith Bilby gathered the support of 309 electors.

"I was simply blown out," Joyner acknowledged in a post-election interview. "It wasn't even close."

He eked out small margins in the city of Plymouth and Canton Township, where county commissioner Joyner was expected to do well.

"I'm really happy I did well in all the communities," Law said election night. He claimed victory on the basis of a grass-roots campaign, relying heavily Law carried majorities in all five on telephone canvasses and door-to-

door campaigning.

Repeated Joyner references to a nearly unbeatable Republican "machine" in the district led to a Law rejoinder that his campaign staff was made up of "friends, neighbors and relatives.'

Among the relatives is brother Robert Law, former state representative from Livonia, now an executive assistant to Governor William Milliken. Friends included many officials in local governments. Law also relied heavily on the support of subdivision homeowners associations in the townships, and said he expects to main-

tain those contacts after he goes to Lan-

Law carried the expected heavy margins in staunchly Republican Plymouth Township, Northville and Northville Township, and virtually split the vote with Joyner in the city of Plymouth and Canton Township.

He spent much of the last month campaigning in Canton, expected to be Joyner's strong spot. The strategy worked, as Law took majorities in eight of the 14 Canton precincts in the district, plus the absentee count there,

Township vote favors Republican ticket

Township electors held true to their traditional Republican voting patterns in last week's general elections - a tactic that proved successful on the local level but put them on the losing side statewide.

Interest in the election was demonstrated by the turnout of 5,152 electors, almost exactly 60 percent of the 8,532 registered in the township.

Voters gave local majorities to Democratics in only two races — for secretary of state and Wayne County executive, agreeing with the total count that showed Richard Austin and William Lucas with substantial margins of victory. Republican Richard Headlee was the local favorite for governor, and the GOP's Phil Ruppe was favored in the U.S. Senate race both lost statewide.

Headlee was favored by 2,706 township voters, winning over Democrat James Blanchard by 1,648, and 83 chose independent Robert Tisch in the governor's race. Ruppe took 2,824 votes to victorious incumbent Donald

Congressman Carl Pursell and State Senator R. Robert Geake were leading vote-getters in the township, a pattern that carried throughout their districts and carried both to landslide victories over Democratic opponents.

Pursell garnered 3,704 votes to only 718 for Ann Arbor Democrat George Wahr Sallade, whom he beat districtwide 2-1 (106,379 to 52,427). Locally, Pursell had the highest vote total of all candidates on the township ballot, followed closely by Geake's 3,676 over Democrat Noel Culbert's 953.

Geake had a smaller margin in the

Canton's Culbert 54,616 to 30,236.

The township was also a stronghold for victorious Republican Gerald H. Law in the 36th State House race. Law took majorities in all five communities in the district and a 3-2 margin overall. Township voters chose Law 2-1 (see

In most races electors favored one candidate over the other by substantial margins with one exception being the race for Wayne County executive. William Lucas edged nominal- area, however, most observers ex-Republican Robert FitzPatrick 2,475 votes to 2,000 on his way to a sweeping

There were some unusual voting patterns seen locally in the gubernatorial race won by Democrat James Blanchard. While township vote totals favored Republican Richard Headlee 3-2. there were several precincts in which only 75 percent or fewer of the total

City election turnout 69 percent

City residents in both Wayne and Oakland counties kept election workers busy at their respective polling places last Tuesday as sixty-nine percent of the city's 3630 registered voters pulled

As is usual in the traditionally Republican community, the votes here were strongly for Richard Headlee-R for governor over James Blanchard-D, the statewide winner, 1488 to 877.

It was apparent that many voters split their ticket, however, choosing Richard Austin-D for secretary of state over Elizabeth Andrus-R, as did voters statewide, by 1312 to 988.

The vote for U.S. Senator was similar to the governor's race with Philip Ruppe-R winning locally, but not statewide, over Donald Riegle-D by 1397 to 994.

For attorney general, the vote was 1466 for L. Brooks Patterson-R to 913 for Frank J. Kelley-D who won statewide.

City voters in Wayne County voted in Carl Pursell-R almost four-to-one over George Wahr Sallade-D, 792 to 244, in the Second Congressional District, as did voters district-wide. They also gave 20 votes to Barbara McKenna, Libertarian candidate.

City voters in Oakland County voted for William S. Broomfield-R. winner in the 18th Congressional District race, over Allen J. Sipher-D, 918 to 252, and gave 10 votes to Joseph Cote, Liber-

Northville resident R. Robert Geake-R won locally as well as district-wide for state senator in the Sixth District (Wayne county voters) over Noel Cuibert-D, 843 to 232, with Libertarian John Cruz taking 14 votes.

Oakland County city voters chose John Anderson-R over Jack Faxon for state senator in the 15th District, 802 to 357 with Libertarian Gordon Beerbower receiving 10 votes. Faxon was the district-wide winner, however.

In the strongly contested race for state representative in the 36th District (Wayne County) Gerald Law-R won locally as well as district-wide over William Joyner-D, 621 to 378, with Libertarian Keith Bilby taking 26 votes.

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Schools report drop in average class size

Public Schools' regular K-12 program have dropped slightly for the 1982-83 school year, according to figures released by assistant superintendent

Burton Knighton. In a report presented to the board of education Monday night, Knighton noted that this year's class sizes at the kindergarten, elementary and senior high levels have declined in comparison to the 1981-82 school year. The only increase in class sizes was noted at the junior high level.

According to the report presented by Knighton, average class size at the kindergarten level is 21.2 students in comparison to last year's 22.8. At the elementary level, a slight drop to 27.1 students was reported this year in comparison to last year's 27.4.

A slight decline from 28.4 to 28.2 students was cited at the high school. At

Average class sizes in Northville increased from 26.7 students last year to 27.1 students this year.

Decline in student enrollment coupled with some reduction in teaching staff has contributed in part to the change in class sizes for the 1982-83 school year.

Knighton told board members that this year's student enrollment has declined by 117 students over last year, according to the unaudited Fourth Friday student count. Knighton also noted there has been a decline of 4.3 classroom teachers this year.

The largest decline in student enrollment occurred at the elementary and junior high level. Kindergarten and senior high enrollment is up slightly over last year.

Reductions in this year's teaching staff were made at the elementary and junior high level. However, this year the addition of an elementary instrumental music teacher and a secon-

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Canton voting influences house and senate outcomes

The Unofficial election returns already ... are being analyzed by local politicians : and observers seeking the answer to the n most frequently-asked question of the 1982 campaign here — what role will Canton Township play in the selection of state representatives and senators over the next decade?

Reapportionment placed most of Canton in the 36th state representative district with Northville and Plymouth. Previously, Northville shared a representative with Livonia while Plymouth and Canton were in a southern district.

Similarly, the new 6th Senate District parallels the old 14th except that Canton is included while some of the eastern portions of the district are dropped. Livonia is still in the 6th Senate

Given Canton's large population and its "independent" voting pattern, campaigners in both districts cited it as a potentially heavy influence on election outcomes. Prior to 1980, Canton leaned toward Democrats but never demonstrated the partisan loyalty of Republican Northville, for instance.

In what some believed was a fluke result attributable to a strong Reagan vote, Canton in 1980 heavily favored the

At first glance, it appears "The Canton Factor," as it came to be known in the months before last week's election, worked to the benefit of Republican candidates this year, despite an overall inclination toward Democrats there.

Given the strong GOP backing of Plymouth, Northville and, to a lesser extent, Livonia, Republican House and Senate candidates needed only to split Canton's independent voters to win in

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

When Andy Walter left his Northville farm four years ago to study acting at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts, his hometown most likely seemed the last place to debut as producer for a New York-based play.

However, the 1971 Northville High School graduate and former softball coach arrived in town Sunday to begin preparations for the opening of "Key Exchange," an off-Broadway play written by

The play, which received considerable acclaim during its successful New York run, will open this Thursday at the Northville Community Building. Subsequent performances are scheduled Friday through Sunday and November 18-21.

Walter describes "Key Exchange" as a story about "relationships and commitments." Set in New York's Central Park, the story focuses on the relationship between three bicycle enthusiasts two men and a woman - who meet in the park over eight consecutive weekends. During that time the problems of their personal relationships are revealed and ultimately resolved.

"It's contemporary," Walter says of the play. 'It's very 80sish. I didn't want to do anything too stylish my first time out.

In addition to producing the play, Walter also portrays one of the three central characters. The other two actors playing major roles also happen to be former Michigan residents. Actress Candelora Versace is a Michigan State University graduate from Bloomfield Hills and Keith Kallen of Hamtramck spent two years in theatre training at Wayne State University.

"I produced the play solely to bring it to Northville," Walter explains.

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
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

Adding the 3,400 margin to the actual totals still leaves Law a slim victory. If Democrats are to have a shot at the 36th House and 6th Senate seats they will have to make better showings in Northville and Plymouth than did Joyner or Culbert, regardless of the Canton count.

Or, and this is a real possibility due to the outcome of last week's elections, they will have to redraw the district boundaries a little. The apportionment plan adopted in the courts just in time for this year's election will likely be altered by the (Democratic) legislature and governor before the next election. 

Veterans can seek review of discharge at Red Cross

Veterans with less than honorable discharges may have their cases reviewed in Detroit through November 19 by the Army Discharge Review Board. The board, stationed permanently at the Pentagon, is visiting the American Red Cross Southeastern Michigan Region chapter at 100 Mack Avenue, Detroit.

The six member traveling panel will review 71 less than honorable discharge cases within a 300 mile radius of Detroit. Years ago, many veterans received less than honorable discharges on grounds that have since been re-evaluated.

If a veteran's discharge is upgraded to honorable status he or she could become eligible for V.A. benefits previously denied. With assistance from the chapter, 1,209 veterans and their beneficiaries received a total of \$4.5 million in benefits in 1981.

The Red Cross and other veterans service organizations will assist the veteran in preparing his case for review. They will also act as counsel for the veteran during the hearing process.

Anyone who has received less than honorable discharge from any branch of the service is entitled to a review. Application can be made by contacting the Red Cross or other veterans service organization.







remembering

As they have for more years than anyone seems to remember, members of the Lloyd H. Green American Legion Post 147 will be serving a community breakfast this Thursday at the post home at 100 West Dunlap. Beginning at 6:30 a.m., they'll offer pancakes, sausage and beverage for as long as there's demand.

Years ago the tradition of businessmen and local residents getting together at the breakfast began as a way to spend a few moments in tribute to servicemen who weren't fortunate enough to return from Campiegne, France
— and later from World War II, Korea and Vietnam.

Originally celebrated as Armistice Day to remember veterans of World War I on the 11th day of the 11th month when the war ended, the day now is known as Veterans' Day to honor Americans who died in defense of their country in all wars since 1776. Veterans' Day 1982 marks the fifth anniversary of the return of the observance to November 11. The 1968 Holiday Law that changed most national holidays to Mondays had moved the day to the fourth Monday in October — but it simply didn't work. The November 11 date holds such significance that Congress in 1975 returned the holiday to November 11, making the change effective in 1978 — the 60th anniversary of the World War I ar-

Veterans' Day 1982 in Northville marks 30 years since the American Legion here held the breakfast as a fundraiser for a permanent memorial to the community's war dead. Through special efforts of village commissioners A.M. Allen and the late Claude Ely, the village had given a veterans' memorial plot in Rural Hill Cemetery a few months before, culmininating an idea

held by Ely and Legionnaire Charles Schoultz. The legion with assistance from the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post was raising funds to develop the memorial

This Thursday also will find a special Veterans' Day observance taking place on the front lawn of the Capitol Building in Lansing. Hundreds are expected to attend the dedication of one of the first Multi-Conflict Memorials erected to honor Michigan citizens who served in World War I, World War II, the Korean and Vietnam conflicts.

The memorial consists of four vertical slabs representing the four conflicts. A center slab with a Michigan seal topped by an eagle will rise 15 feet above the ground. The monument project was started in October of 1979 when the Michigan Legislature adopted a concurrent resolution to provide for such a permanent memorial. Fundraising to erect the memorial was from private

In recent years attendance at memorial tributes has declined as most of us would rather forget about the war years. For those of us whose memories go back to World War II, the remembrances are not easy. Blue stars, signifying there was a serviceman on active duty, were changed to gold in windows as the war went on — announcing that serviceman would not be returning to become an engineer, or lawyer, or merchant. Some of those who did return were to live the rest of their lives strongly affected by the experience.

It is in the belief that such service deserves at least a moment's memory that the American Legion Post continues to serve the annual breakfast and hopes you'll come.

Decision's good

When the Northville Arts Commission was formed in 1980, by resolution of city council, it was felt that it was a long overdue action. Most neighboring com-munities already had such organizations to promote the arts locally. At the request of the council, Cheryl Gazlay had agreed to organize the commission whose bylaws were adopted in September of 1980. She then served as first head of the commission which has had as many as 11 members and currently lists

It has been a hard-working commission, dedicated to "involve the community in all phases of the arts." Enthusiastically, art shows in the Mill Race were planned as well as individual artists' shows at city hall. With an allocation from the city, the commission last summer sponsored weekly concerts in the park behind city hall, hoping to bring out families for an informal afternoon of music. Picnickers were encouraged.

But at its September 27 meeting the council was forced to look at the problem: hard work had gone into the activities and they had received publicity. However, attendance has not been good at these events. At one concert only families of per-formers and two commission members were present.

The decision was made to cease all public activity for the entire year of 1983. Beginning next January, the commission will work on short and long range goals. It will try to determine what the community wants and to formulate a long-range plan.

"We need to create an awareness of art in the community," explains commission spokesperson Susie Dimitroff

While the commission does not plan to sponsor public events next year, it does intend to be active in planning and in compiling a directory of local artists, who currently are being asked to register with the commission at city hall. Also in the plan will be the formation of a Friends of the Arts group to help sponsor events and determine community desires.

We believe the arts commission is on the right track. The concept of an arts commission is good, but it is self-defeating to have a fine group become discouraged from lack of acceptance for its projects. We feel it is necessary to have a long-range plan in place. Community support and awareness could come from a Friends group. In the up-coming 12 months, hopefully, those residents who see the value of promotion of arts in the community will come forward to help. The city clerk will be glad to pass on names to the council.

How does a college develop a soccer field with electronic scoreboard, sound system, concession building and storage shed during a depression when budgets are being cut?

"Use of existing resources," smiles Dr. Marvin Gans, Schoolcraft College athletic director, adding, "People had

The project might have cost \$50,000 if the community college had to pick up the tab itself. But between student efforts, a benefit banquet, cash donations, gifts of materials and talents, the soccer project was completed without college funds

College trustees recently formally accepted the gifts, with warm praise for the several dozen donors.

"This is a strong soccer community," said Gans of northwestern Wayne County's high schools and the college itself.

"We had 3,100 players from all over Southeastern Michigan on Memorial Day weekend. Any Sunday there will be six or seven games going on here," he

Down the road, he said, is a collective dream of having a soccer facility that is unexcelled in the state. And if that dream takes shape, well, the water lines and electrical equipment are in

No fewer than 37 firms made gifts of flagpole materials, cement blocks, concrete, lumber, shingles, electrical equipment, dry walls, audio equipment, paint and windows. Some firms donated services, such as installation of equip-

"Some of them would rather not be listed," Gans said. "Many didn't even want to bother giving an estimated value of the services." Such an estimate is necessary for income tax 1 deduction purposes. It means those firms aren't planning to take such deductions.



IESIVE STICKY SITUATION

Q. My dentures slip and make my mouth sore, should I use a denture adhesive?

A. Denture adhesives such as powders and creams when combined with water swell, become sticky and help keep dentures in place. They are some-times helpful during the initial adjustment period for new denture wearers. However, unless you have a special situation such as a completely flat ridge of bone, adhesives should not be used on a permanent basis. They can actually mask a denture's ill fit and cause sore spots to develop. If your dentures slip and make your mouth sore, before the situation gets





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When Richard McDowell was hired as president of Schoolcraft College in Livonia last year, he talked about "outreadh" — helping business train employees and aiding southeastern Michigan's reindustrialization.

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
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Wool garners eighth at state meet



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MHSAA petition denied

The First District Court of Appeals denied a motion presented by the Michigan High School Athletic Association requesting a rehearing regarding the restraining order allowing Northville's Shawn Bales to swim with the high school team.

The motion was filed approximately one week ago by the MHSAA, the Bales' attorney Gerald Surowiec said, with the Court of Appeals denying a rehearing on the basis the MHSAA did not have enough merit for it.

The court actually granted a motion by the MHSAA requesting an immediate consideration of the motion for a rehearing. But, the court denied the request for another rehearing.

Also, the Court of Appeals has asked the Wayne County Circuit Court to turn in the transcripts of the original hearing by January, said Surowiec, who has law offices in northwest Detroit and Farm-

Once the transcripts are filed, he said he will have 60 days to present his brief of the case. The MHSAA will then have 40 days in which to file its brief after his, Surowiec added.

The case was brought to the Court of Appeals when the Circuit Court in September dissolved a temporary restraining order allowing Bales to swim with the Northville girls' swim team.

The temporary restraining order was sought when the MHSAA denied a waiver request filed by the Northville Public Schools after Bales, a junior, transferred to NHS from Farmington Our Lady of Merey this summer.

According to the MHSAA rules, a student

transferring from one high school to another must sit out one semester before being declared eligible unless the student falls under one of the 12 excep-

Also, the MHSAA Constitution states its Executive Committee can grant waivers to students if the transfer rule fails to serve the purpose for which it is intended or causes an undue hardship.

Surowiec has been presenting to the courts that a waiver should have been granted because the MHSAA caused an undue hardship with its denial since the junior season is what college recruiters base scholarships on to prospective swimmers. Also, he claimes the transfer rule fails to accomplish the purpose for which it is intended.

In another development, the Michigan Association of School Boards approved a resolution calling for the MHSAA to re-examine the transfer rule before the 1983-84 season.

The Northville Board of Education casts its approval for the resolution presented by the Ann Arbor Board of Education. Northville's board has already supported a resolution by the Ann Arbor board calling for support of other school boards to have the MHSAA to re-examine and possibly `change the transfer rule."

The latest resolution was adopted at the Michigan Association of School Boards meeting in Grand Rapids last week. Northville Superintendent George Bell said the resolution is more of an advisory statement to the MHSAA that it should reexamine the transfer rule.

The ball now is in the MHSAA's court in terms of responding to the resolution, Bell continued, noting that the MHSAA will probably listen since the MASB is a powerful group.

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

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
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Finding solutions to cope with stress

By MICHELE McELMURRY

It is sometimes referred to as a "dull edge" or "unseen killer." It can be brought about through excessive boredom or constant activity. While it often is associated with adults, its symptoms strike persons of all ages.

This afflication is known as stress and, according to psychologist Dr. Ruth Needham, it is a condition which often leaves its victim feeling helpless, overwhelmed and sometimes desperate.

Addressing Northville Woman's Club last Friday, Needham defined stress as "a non-specific response of the body to any demand put upon it.'

In other words, she explained, "we crowd in so many things around us, that we don't have the time or energy to be the people we want to be.'

She noted that most everyone suffers from stress in one form or another. However, she said the effect of stress on an individual's life primarily is related

"Stress is not always nervous tension or influence of a threatening event or entirely bad," she said. "We need some stress in our lives to react to things."

However, she noted most people suffer from negative stress - or "distress" as it is commonly known. She cited "the change in the family" as

one of the major forces of stress today. She noted in particular that women trying to balance family and career

tend to suffer considerable stress because of the demands they put upon themselves.

The mother of five children and three great-grandchildren, Needham said she is familiar with the stress which can be placed upon women who try to "do it all."

"We take on a burden we have no right to take on," she explained. "We're

She is a frequent speaker on stress and has conducted several workshops on the subject.

She noted in her discussion last Friday that many people aggravate a stressful condition by "overstimulating their bodies with coffee or nicotine or despressing themselves with alcohol or

earned her doctorate at the age of 52. A Pennsylvania licensed psychologist, she has worked as a guidance counselor, school and clinical psychologist, administrator, teacher and consultant to schools, colleges and hospitals.

However, Needham stressed the need "to do nice things for yourself" and to "avoid dangers and extremes."

Making reference to Dr. Keith Sehnert's book, entitled "Stress and Unstress," Needham mentioned several ways of alleviating stress.

Factors cited in Sehnert's book include: understanding your own emotions, understanding the impact these emotions have on your health, knowing your spiritual needs, regular exercise, good diet, moderate or no alcohol, relaxation, change in daily routine and

"It is important to have control in our lives," she said. "We have to know how to prioritize.' Friendships also play an important

role in alleviating stress, Needham noted.
"Friendships have a high priority," she said. "Closeness with two or three

people is more important than having casual friendships with many people. "People need to be close and talk

about their feelings," she added. She cautioned those people who suffer from considerable stress to "put more control in their lives and organize themselves better.

"It's how we look at problems and solve them that counts," she said.

While some stress is normal for most people, she noted that "when a life is continually in upheaval, it will wear out



Washington journalist to talk at Town Hall

Journalist Stan Cloud will be the featured speaker Thursday in the second presentation of this season's Northville Town Hall series at 11 a.m. at the Plymouth Hilton Inn.

Cloud, a noted expert on the U.S. presidency, was the last managing editor of the Washington Star before its closing in August, 1981. He was a correspondent and editor with Time magazine prior to his involvement in Time Incorporated's 1978-81 effort to save the capital's second newspaper.

Now working on a book dealing with the presidency and presidential campaigns, Cloud has been a journalist 25 years (with six years out for U.S. Navy service aboard destroyers in the Pacific and at the National Security

Cloud began his career with the Los Angeles Times, working full time while in college from 1954-58. Following his naval service, he worked two years covering politics in the courts at the Monterey Penninsula Herald.

In 1966 Cloud became editor of a local political magazine, "The Advocate" folded in 1968 and Cloud moved to San Francisco and Time's bureau there as a correspondent.

His work in San Francisco concentrated on the social upheavals of the late 1960s, including the rise of the Black Panthers, student demonstrations at Berkeley and the University of San Francisco, and the famous mutiny trial of the San Francisco Presidio.

Cloud was posted to Time's Moscow bureau in late 1969 (in part because he is fluent in Russian) but was expelled by the Soviet Union for journalistic 'sins" in June, 1970. Time sent Cloud to Bangkok as bureau chief, covering the wars in Cambodia and Laos and assisting in Vietnam coverage.

In September, 1971, Cloud was named Saigon bureau chief and remained with the war until December, 1972, when he was moved to Washington, D.C., initially as a Senate correspondent.

While Cloud did some of the routine work of the assignment, much of his time was spent on coverage of Watergate, especially the Ervin Committee hearings which Cloud covered from start to finish. During that time, he developed several major scoops for Time and became intimately familiar with both the Watergate scandal and the behind-the-scene workings of the Ervin committee.

After Nixon's resignation in 1974, Cloud was assigned to national political coverage. At one time or another, he covered all the candidates. During this period he first met, traveled with and covered Jimmy Carter, becoming one of the first national reporters to pay attention to him and become convinced he would be a serious contender.

When Carter was elected, Cloud was assigned to the White House to cover the president. With the inauguration of Ronald Reagan, Cloud began to report on the new administration.

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
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Nobel Peace Prize nominee's father of local resident

When Dr. Kenneth L. Pike spoke to Mary Rochon's class at Silver Springs Elementary a couple of years ago, most of the students identified him as Julie Ibach's grandfather.

They were listening, however, to one of the world's foremost linguists who has been called "the alphabet maker to the world."

This year Dr. Pike was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize.

It was the first time in the 82-year history of the prize to name "the world's greatest living peacemaker" that a linguist had been nominated for the internationally prestigious prize. Dr. Pike's specialty is working with languages that never have been written.

"Papa's a very unique person," says his daughter Barbara. She and her husband David Ibach have lived in Northville with daughter Julie, 11, and son Benjamin, 9, for seven years. They are Highland Lakes residents on Dartmouth.

The Nobel Peace Prize was awarded in the area of nuclear science in mid-October. His daughter agrees that the nomination alone is a signal honor but observes, "The kinds of things Papa does are not a popular appeal. While he has taught so many people, it's a very quiet sort of thing."

has taught so many people, it's a very quiet sort of thing."

She reveals that her father was nominated last February by U.S. Senator Alan Dixon-D. of Illinois. The nomination was seconded by United States and European educators. Barbara Ibach notes that the nomination itself is a document a couple of inches thick.

Although Dr. Pike, 70, has never negotiated a peace conference between warring nations and never halted a militay advance, those who recommended him insist he'd done more

than any other single person living today to foster worldpeace, reports the Summer Institute of Linguistics, Incorporated, an international organization in Dallas, which Dr. Pike helped found in 1942.

Through scientific studies in language, the institute explains, Dr. Pike has contributed to world peace "by giving nations and individuals the tools to communicate accurately, sensitively and comprehensively with each other." Dr. Pike's nomination was a joint one with the institute.

The Summer Institute specializes in writing alphabets for languages that have never been written and in teaching people to read. It also works to begin a literature for the people by developing primers, dictionaries and translating portions of the Bible.

Dr. Pike has been a trailblazer in field linguistics for nearly 50 years. Time after time, the institute explains, Dr. Pike and his colleagues have cracked language codes. Dr. Pike in the nomination was called "one of the scholarly giants of our age ..." and cited as having "personal knowledge of more languages than any other person, living or dead."

Another nomination stated, "He has introduced literacy to millions in distant areas of Latin America, Africa and Asia. I can't think of anyone who has contributed on much for the non-literates of the world."

Dr. Pike, born in Woodstock, Connecticut, started his language venture in 1935 when he went to Mexico to translate the Bible for Mixtec Indians.

He detected the language was tonal, but very little was known in the 1930s about analyzing tone. That was the beginning of the theoretical work that has made him one of the world's leading linguists. For him, the institute outlines, the clue to all languages is that there is structure and pattern in

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Dr. Pike earned his Ph.D. from the University of Michigan in 1942 for his work in phonetics. He attempted to describe all the sounds of all the languages in the world. He taught at the university until retirement there in 1977. He was chairman of the Department of Linguistics his last two years.

Dr. Pike himself considers his greatest work to be in the field of grammar — "tagmemics" — a word he coined to dscribe what he believes are the universals of language and behavior

The man whose work helps linguists begin to unravel the mysteries of previously unwritten languages still has time to spend with young people, his daughter remarks. Her children went to visit this summer at the University of Oklahoma where he was teaching.

Sixty friends and relatives gathered for the celebration. Among the many cards was an unexpected greeting from President Ronald Reagan.


