Four architectural firms will present feasability study proposals for the high school at a special meeting at 7 p.m. tonight. The board will select a firm at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow. Among the four firms making presentations tonight is Harley, Ellington, Pierce and Yee Associates.

In outlining the energy audit for the board, Ronald Morketter, engineer and executive partner for Harley, Ellington, Pierce and Yee, cited several key problem areas at the high school.

While he noted the school's mechanical system is sound, he mentioned the two boilers are "about at the end of their lives.'

The boilers were purchased in 1958 and life expectancy for each is approximately 25 years.

"In weather like this, the boilers are running full capacity," Morketter said. "If one when out, you would have to close the school.

He also noted the boiler's were running at about 70 percent efficiency.

He told the board that about 57 percent of the school's energy consumption is for natural gas with 44 percent going to electricity.



# Holiday season poses highest fire risk

With the arrival of cold weather and the approach of the holidays comes the busiest time of year for one group firefighters.

"Winter is when all fire departments do business," said township fire chief

And the holiday season poses the highest fire risks of the winter, he add-

"Everybody feels they're not going to have a fire," Toms said. "They always think it happens to other people. A lot of times we go out, and people are amazed we've had any other (fires) I tell them theirs is the 11th this month, and they're surprised to find we have fires in Northville Township.'

For the record, Toms related, there have been 661 minor and major fires in the township over the past five years.

'And the vast majority of those were due to carelessness of some kind," he said. "Of those 661, maybe 60 of them happened because of things people had no control over. The rest of them,

somebody did something wrong."
He cites as an example a fire in a beautiful Sheldon Road house not too long ago where the man put four logs on his fire. Now, he had a screen in front of the fireplace, but the way he stacked the wood in there, one of the logs rolled out and onto his rug. Now, he knew he'd done something a little careless, but he

did it anyway."
The result? A nearly destroyed room. Fireplaces are a major source of fires, Toms said, and safe use requires caution. In addition to making sure the fire is always screened so that sparks do not ignite things inside the house, Toms recommended the use of seasoned wood and regular chimney cleaning to insure against chimney fires.

He also recommended inspections of wood stove installations, noting that many are purchased and installed by the homeowner and installed too close to walls, curtains or other flammables

in the home.

"As for tree lights, make sure they're in good condition, and don't leave them on with no one around," he said. "I think, I hope, everyone's smart enough by now to know not to put candles on a tree or under something like that'll

Toms is a big believer in smoke alarms, and cites a holiday story to back up his recommendation.

'Not too long ago, last year or the one before, we had a woman who got a smoke alarm at Christmas. Her son put the battery in it to check it out, put it in the box under the tree and said he'd be back the next day to put it up.

"Well, she woke up that night and heard the thing going off. She went everything. That thing saved her and it wasn't even installed yet," Toms said.

Most fire fatalities happen between midnight and 6 a.m., he added; noting that when people are sleeping they are not aware of the early warning signs of

fire.
"I've been in plenty of burning houses, and fire doesn't chase you down the hallway and burn you up. It's the night. smoke and fumes that get you. Smoke detectors give you that little bit of extra time so you can get out, where otherwise you'd be unconcious because of

smoke or fumes."

As proof of his belief in them, Toms notes there are six fire detectors in his own home. He recommends them as a Christmas gift and notes that people who do not use them "are passing up one of the greatest advances in technology - 20 years ago the ionization chamber that makes these things possible was impossible to make. Now we have this ability, they don't cost a lot, and still people don't have them. If you love your spouse and kids, this is the best gift you could get them."

If you've already got detectors (the department sold them at a low price four years ago and put more than 2,000 into the community's homes) Toms recommends maintenance to make downstairs, and sure enough, she had a sure they're in working order for this fire in her living room by the tree and high risk season. "Take them down, vacuum them off so there's no dust blocking the vents and put fresh batteries in them."

Installation of detectors might have saved the one person who died in a fire during the existence of the present township department, Toms noted. A woman was burning many candles in her home and a fire was started at

'Any time you have any kind of open flame, or anything burning, you have the potential for trouble," he explains. "Eighty percent of fires happen one of

two places — the kitchen or the bedroom. Not just the bedroom, I mean 50 percent probably happen in the kitchen and another 30 percent are caused

by cigarettes on furniture." Next to open flame, volatile liquids are the prime dangers, and Toms had some out-of-the-ordinary warnings for

this time of year: 'Christmas time is party time," he noted, "and a lot of woman are using a lot of hair spray. Generally, it's pretty safe but you don't want to be spraying heavily in a small enclosed room and then light a cigarette. You'll have no eyebrows or hair left in a split second. Don't laugh, it happens a lot more than you'd think.

He also attributes some recent fires to large bottles of nail polish remover which, for some reason, people chose to store in the kitchen.

"That stuff is really volatile," Toms said. "It's basically laquer thinner, and having it around is like having a small bottle of gas around."

Gasoline is another substance people should keep out of their homes - in all

"See, winter is the time a lot of people decide to mess with their lawnmower indoors, or bring their snowblower inside to work on it, and they've got gasoline in there. Gasoline has no place inside a house. You got gas in your house, you're begging for a fire."

Above all, Toms warned, use common sense through the holidays and don't take unnecessary risks. Unplug decorative lighting while the family sleeps or is away from home, be careful with that Christmas Eve fire, and be aware of the risks.

"No one wants to see a tragedy," he concluded. "It's not always the other guy. As far as that goes, if people see we have a lot of fires, then they want to invest in new fire trucks and all that We can live without the new fire trucks

# Appeal made to drivers

Although Michigan's new drunk driving law does not go into effect until April, 1983, Secretary of State Richard Austin is appealing to all motorists to drive over the year-end holidays as if the new law was in effect now.

Among other provisions, the new law permits roadside breath tests on suspects and makes it illegal to operate a vehicle with a .10 percent blood alcohol level or more. Refusal to take a breath test can result in the suspension of a driver's license for six months and six points on the offender's driving

Of the 53,000 drivers involved in accidents in Michigan in December, 1981, 4,900 had been drinking. In addition, 4,777 arrests for drunk driving were made that month. Under the new law, arrests are expected to increase substantially.

"Christmas and New Years this year are a good time to get used to Michigan's tougher drinking law," Austin said.

In 1981, alcohol was involved in more than half of the 1.589 highway deaths and 51,205 accidents.



# Township loans recreation more: \$4,500

An additional \$4,500 loan to the recreation department was extended from township general funds up to \$13,000 since the end of October.

The board approved the added loan effective December 15 to cover recreation department expenses this month. Still expected are requests for an added \$7,000-\$8,000 more before February, when repayment is to begin.

Outside of board member C. James Armstrong, there were no members of by the township board of trustees last the recreation commission or adweek, bringing the total borrowing ministrative staff at the meeting. Armstrong made the motion to extend the loan without comment.

> Treasurer Richard Henningsen said he will take the money from general funds, noting that he has so far avoided borrowing from water and sewer funds. When the department made its original

request for a \$20,000 line of credit, Henningsen said he thought water and sewer borrowing might be needed.

But, he reported. Wayne County made a long-delayed payment of \$57,000 December 4, representing the township share of delinquent 1981 property taxes paid directly to the county.

"And our state shared revenues came in on time and at the expected amount," added business manager David Lelko. Officials were reluctant to

depend on either payment because past performance by county and state had shown frequent delays and reductions in revenues due the township.

Supervisor John MacDonald pointed out for the board that it has never extended the full line of credit requested by the recreation department and instead is approving individual monthly loans as the department demonstrates a need for them.



"You want the body proportionately even," Griffiths said.

The ears should be set low on Persians and there also is the nose break.

"It looks like the cat took a 50 milean-hour run into a wall. That's what we call nose break," she offered. "The better the break, the better the chances of winning in the ring.'

Siamese cats, she continued, should have slender bodies with no bulk in the belly, and their tails should be a certain



# Three injured in two-car collision at Eight Mile

### In the township...

Three people were injured in a two-car collision at Eight Mile and Haggerty Road December 7, township police

Sherry Briolat, 20, of Northville suffered bruises and cuts to her forehead that required stitches. Of the three iniured, she was the only one wearing a seatbelt at the time of the accident. She was cited for disobeying a red traffic

Richard Lorence, 36, of Novi and Raymond Styrna of Union Lake were also injured in the accident. Lorence suffered a broken rib and early indications of possible internal injury. Styrna's condition was considered worst of the three and he was transferred from Providence in Novi to St. Joseph's in

According to police reports, Lorence was stopped in the westbound left turn lane on Eight Mile, waiting to make a left turn onto southbound Haggerty. When the signal turned red and traffic stopped, he told police, Lorence attempted to complete his left turn.

His car was struck broadside by Briolat's, who told police the light was yellow as she approached the intersection and that Lorence had turned directly in front of her as she travelled at 35 to 40 miles per hour.

Police ticketed Briolat on the basis of witnesses' statements that the signal was red in all directions when the accident occurred and all other traffic had stopped. One witness said Briolat was traveling at speed and that he heard no squeal of brakes before the accident. Briolat was taken to Botsford Hospital by Service Community Am-

Still recovering from the 50 percent increase in water rates that became effective in July? Well, hold on to your garden hose.

For 1983 the Detroit Water Board has proposed an 18.8 percent increase in water rates - from \$8.25 per 1,000 cubic feet of water to \$9.80 per 1,000

The rate increases which would become effective July 1 are tentative and Novi officials have begun their annual fight to lower the increase in water rates for residential, commercial and industrial water customers.

City engineering consultants met last week with representatives of the Detroit Water and Sewer Department to discuss the proposed rate hike.

"We dealt with the facts," was the way engineering consultant Edward Jacobs described the meeting with Detroit officials.

After reviewing the proposed rate increase and engineering consultants have suggested to Detroit that water rates actually should be decreased in the coming year.

Novi Engineering Consultant Patrick Keast said that according to his calculations water rates in Novi should drop from \$8.25 to \$8.21 per 1,000 cubic eet during 1983.

"That's the way the numbers worked out," Keast said.

Keast explained a study conducted for Detroit by engineering consultants Black and Veatch showed Novi's peak water use actually was lower in 1982 than it was in 1978 and 1981 — two years used to determine the amount of water used in the city.

Novi's engineering consultants have explained their position regarding the water rates to the Detroit Water Board in a letter mailed Monday. Keast said the letter provides "additional data"

Detroit might use when it sets water rates. Novi engineers are somewhat baffled by the pro-

posed water rate increase for 1983, since it appears Detroit did not take into consideration information Novi provided during 1982 water rate negotiations. That information apparently resulted in the city receiving a 50 percent water rate increase, rather than the 82 percent increase which had been pro-

"It looks like they went back to their original data that would have resulted in (proposed) rates of \$10.13 per 1,000 cubic feet of water (for 1982)," Keast said.

Before 1982 water rates were set, Novi's engineering consultants provided information regarding peak water use to Detroit. They also asked the water board to change some basic policies in the formulation of water rates on the grounds that the formula used is not equitable to Novi. The water board did not acknowledge the information from Novi's consultants, but did reduce the proposed increase.

That same information has been sent to Detroit

again this year. "We've given them the information telling them what we've calculated the rate should be," Keast said. "They've said they're willing to discuss peak factors and all our data. We'll wait and see what A public hearing on the proposed water rates is slated for January 6. If the proposed rates are not decreased, Novi officials are expected to formally protest the rate being charged. Novi has been connected to the Detroit Water System since the mid-60s. City officials explain the decision to use Detroit water was made because underground water in the area is of poor quality and requires treatment. The city faced major water rate increases for the first time in 1982 as a result of the repeal of a state law prohibiting Detroit from charging suburban customers more than twice the rate charged Detroit residents. 





# Oakland Parks and Rec adopts 1982-83 budget

The Oakland County Parks and vehicle for Oakland County residents Recreation Commission has adopted a and \$4 for non-residents. 1983 operating budget of \$4.7 million.

Revenue from park fees and charges is projected to reach \$2.4 million, while income from voted park millage will generate \$3.5 million.

Millage income is up slightly due to a rise in the assessed valuation of Oakland County property. Some additional revenue will be generated from small increases in fees for golf and mobile recreation visits.

The budget also projects that revenues will exceed expenditures by an estimated \$1.2 million, which will be available for capital development pro-

Park entrance fees at the day-use parks will remain the same at \$2.50 per

Oakland County Parks Manager R. Eric Reickel said the commission has adopted a "no growth" budget with no new personnel or programs for 1983.

While increased operating costs and inflation continue to erode millage revenue, the 1983 budget was "developed with the idea of maintaining the quality the Oakland County Parks and Recreation Commission is known for nationally," said Reickel.

Matching federal funds for capital development projects in the parks has been eliminated, but Reickel said the demand on the parks system continues

self assessment "Focus on who you are, regardless of where cir-

cumstances have placed you.

'Look at what you're doing and what skills are involved. It's more than a title," she said. "A teacher, for example, is a highly-skilled communicator who can relate to all ages.

"The things we do and do well, we have a tendency to believe everyone can do," she continued. "It's not true. What you do well makes you unique."

Greenfield encouraged the group to look into as many alternatives as possible.

"The idea is to have many baskets with eggs in all of them. If one basket smashes. You have others," she said.

Rich Lefkie, another speaker at the Schoolcraft meeting, reinforced Greenfield's comments with advice on developing "winning attitudes."

Lefkie emphasized the importance of setting specific goals.

"Make things happen rather than allow them to happen to you," he said.

"Anxiety can be a motivator or a depressor. But the times when you feel uncomfortable are the times when you grow the most. When you're scared — do it anyway.

"Confidence is what it's all about."

He also encouraged people to be themselves. 'The more you can be yourself...when you have an idea or a dream, act on it. That takes confidence and a positive mental attitude," he said.

"By looking over your life you can see if you are more positive or negative. Your attitudes are formed by the people around you and your conditioning," Lefkie continued.

"I can tell you nine positive things about yourself and one negative thing. Which one will you remember? The one negative. It gets blown out of proportion," he said.

It starts with smiling, according to Lefkie, who said he wants to die with his wrinkles going up. "Do you smile? Watch what happens to your at-

So how does a person develop a positive attitude?

titude when you start smiling," he said. Watch who you associate with, Lefkie cautioned. "They are very influential. When you hang around

with a negative person it rubs off, just like positivism rubs off." "When you select the people you want to be around for their positive outlook, then you can be

more positive in the way you look at things," he continued. "You may need to change the people you hang around with. Make sure the people in your life will contribute." Lefkie said he knew some people were thinking

he is unrealistic. But he had seen positive attitudes

"Everyone is two people; the person you are because of all your past experiences and the person you want to be more like," he continued. "To get from where you are to where you want to be, learn from your experiences or successes. You can set yourself up for success or failure. Attitude is all important.

Another important factor in developing a positive attitude is conditioning, Lefkie said.

"Consider the ways you are conditioned in life," he said, "Be careful what you put in your life. Become uniformed with life. Don't put in the negative — you don't need the 5 p.m., 6 p.m. and 11 p.m. news. Life goes on without it.

"Don't go out and attempt to prove you're the best, just go do it. Create dreams. Find ways to market yourself more effectively. You will have a



# Hospital's birthing center pleases parents

Michael Superfisky was born in a queen-size bed. His parents planned it

The nine-pound, 12-ounce baby was born October 21. And Fil and Pam Superfisky of Novi can't say enough positive things about the birthing center at Providence Hospital in Southfield where the latest addition to their family was born.

The first night the baby was born it slept in bed between both parents. The next morning his sisters came to meet him and they all went home together.

'It's the neatest experience you could ever go through in your whole life,"

Pam was pleased with the fact the baby is not taken away from the parents after birth, and parents can hold and touch their baby rather than having it taken to a sterile nursery.

You get to hold the baby, skin to skin, and he bonds with the mom and the dad," Pam said.

Michael was the second child the Superfiskys have had delivered at the birthing center in Southfield. This time around they "felt like old

pros." They took grapes, oranges and This time we got there two hours before the baby was born. There is a stereo and some people bring their

favorite records and tapes to relax. You do whatever you can to relax and make it easier." Fil explained. The birthing centers recommends the family arrive in time to relax and get

comfortable. To complement the center's relaxed attitude, nurses wear street clothes ex-cept when in delivery.

The birthing center is an alternative to home birth for those who want the relaxation that comes with childbirth at home with the safety of a hospital and medical support staff close at hand.

It is designed for parents who are willing to use natural child birth and mothers who are having low-risk pregnancies, according to Pam.

d'As long as you're having a normal, régular pregnancy you can go there,'

The center also allows the husband to participate in the birth as much as he

After delivery, birthing center nurses are available but "they leave you alone," according to the Superfiskys. During the first eight hours there is

an hourly check of the baby's blood pressure. Otherwise the family and its nèwest member are left in private. "The nurses are gentle, kind people.

They try to please you," Pam said.
Fil agreed: "They try to anticipate your needs. They offer suggestions to

"Even our doctor says she has a different attitude when she delivers a baby at the birthing center," Pam continued. "When she has a delivery at the hospital she's not as relaxed.'

At the birthing center the doctor climbs up on the bed, a nurse is there to coach and get whatever is needed, Pam explained. They will be able to tell if there are complications and decide if the mother should be admitted to the

Some people are concerned about the safety of birthing centers, Fil said. But the birthing center is just four-five minutes from the hospital operating "If you were in the delivery room and

five minutes to set up the operating room anyway," he added. "Since you can be transferred so quickly we never felt any concerns.' In fact, Michael was born with a



# Seven Mile rezoning opposed at hearing

will prosper with a high traffic volume that compounds the problem that already exists."

Joseph Fiorilli argued that the request was "another example of the old foot-in-the-door technique" and recited a brief history of the expansion of commercial and multiple-family zoning decisions in the area bound by Seven and Eight Mile, Haggerty and Northville roads.

"And it's all because each time someone comes in with the story 'I can't sell this property' we bail them out with a rezoning," Fiorilli continued. "Eventually, we will all be squeezed out.

"These people purchased an asset. I assume they knew the hospital was there, they knew Seven Mile was there. If the asset does not work out, you can't go; to the community and ask them to help you out.

"They can't find a buyer," he coninued, "but I know there are any number of people who would buy at a lower price. There is no law or guarantee that someone who invests in a property is going to be able to sell for a profit. We've been R-1, we're one of the last R-1 areas in the township, and we want to stay R-1."

His statement drew a round of applause from his neighbors in atten-

Others took issue with the claim that the state hospital and the frequency with which patients escape and pass through the area makes the region un-

suited to residential uses.
"It sounds," said Ella Briggs, who
lives one block west of the property in question, "as if those of us who live there are either stupid, and don't know it's dangerous; or foolhardy, and don't

While acknowledging the difficulty with the occasional escaped patient, neighbors told planners they had become accustomed to the situation but that a business with open doors invites more problems, as demonstrated by the frequency with which patients are picked up at Northville Charley's.

'We're aware of the situation and how to handle it," said one resident, "but is it fair to ask visitors to our town to understand the problem when a patient shows up while they're shopping

Kitty Rhoades, representing the Northville Township Homeowners Association's 2,000 voting members, said the association opposes the rezoning unless it was possible to restrict the use to the boutique, with it reverting to residential zoning if attempt is made to expand to other business uses.

Informed it is impossible to restrict the zoning in such a way, she said the

association was then opposed.

Planners will likely take up the issue at the January meeting, Chairman Ken McLarty told the hearing audience. It will then make a recommendation to the township board, which will probably receive enough information to make a final decision by spring.

# Board reviews audit for NHS energy savings

cited at the high school were heating, skin loss and infiltration — all high above the normal ratio for energy consumption.

Morketter said much of the infiltration was caused by cracks around doors and windows in the school and noted the caulking around windows, doors and other exterior walls is dried, cracked or missing in many areas.

He said infiltration was particularly evident in the curtain wall, where during severe weather conditions snow is entering through the cracks. He noted that by caulking and fastening the loose curtain wall, some \$7,000 in heating

costs could be saved each year. He estimated the cost of the work at approximately \$6,000 and noted that some of the repairs could be done by the district's maintenance department.

Another energy savings measure would be to weatherstrip the 50 exterior doors at the high school. Morketter noted most of the doors are not weatherstripped or are in need of repair. He said the district could save about \$2,000 a year by just weatherstripping outside doors.

He listed window replacement as one of the more expensive energy saving options, but noted that it would save the board approximately \$7,700 a year in

He told the board that the current single pane glass used throughout the building has a "very poor thermal per-

formance and contributes substantially to the total heat loss from the building.

He estimated about 100 windows would need to be replaced with insulated wall panels. However, cost per panel is estimated at about \$330, bringing the total cost to \$33,000.

Other recommended energy saving measures cited by Morketter include the installation of timing devises for large exhaust and supply fans; control modifications for the heating and ventilating units for the library and auto shop and control modifications for the swimming pool ventilation system.

Morketter told the board that should the district undertake a renovation of the high school, it would be better to hold off on any major energy saving measures until that time.

However, he suggested the board may want to consider undertaking minor repairs such as caulking and weatherstripping to hold down some of the high energy costs.

Cost for the energy audit was paid in part by a grant from the National Energy Conservation Act Policy. The district received a Technical Assistance Grant this fall upon the recommendation of the Michigan Department of Commerce.

Should the district decide to-implement the cost savings measures recommended in the energy audit, it may be eligible for federal grant monies to assist in the project.

To apply for any grant monies, the district was required to undergo an energy audit.







# Our Opinions Resolve zoning

It is about time township planners made some long-range decisions regarding land use along the north side of Seven Mile between Haggerty and Northville roads. The number of rezoning petitions being filed is getting out of hand while a definitive township statement of goals remains in limbo.

Guidance to potential sellers and buyers of land and some assurances about the future for area residents are clearly needed. The planning commission knows this well, having commissioned a study of the issue earlier this year. After discussion with he board of trustees, however, the alteration of the master plan to reflect the study results has been delayed.

We tend to side with area residents who contend traffic volume on Seven Mile is already too high and that there is already enough commercial and multiplefamily housing zoning in the two-mile stretch. We do not find compelling the argument put forward by petitioners that the state hospital has made their properties useless under single family residential zoning.

While the walkaway problem at the hospital is not one to be ignored, in the long-range view it is not necessarily a permanent situation, nor is the hospital itself necessarily a permanent fixture. Certainly residents of the area are familiar with the number of patients who end up in their neighborhood, yet there does not seem to be a great migration away from those homes immediately behind the Seven Mile properties.

Moreover, it is not the planning commission's responsibility to throw a life ring to property owners who presumably investigated the location of their holdings before investing. That homes have not sold for long periods of time on Seven Mile is not surprising — there are many houses throughout the township and the state that have been on the market for similar lengths of time. Permanent residents of the

area should not be asked to sacrifice good planning simply to help out a few who are trapped by the current economic situation. If the "two years on the market" criteria were to apply elsewhere in the township, there would hardly be a purely residential neighborhood left.

That some property owners may lose money on their investments (by having to lower their price to obtain a buyer) is an unfortunate circumstance and a fairly recent one. It would be nice to return to the days when any real estate investment was practically guaranteed to return a profit, but rezoning is not an appropriate tool to reach that end.

This is not to say that we wholly oppose any alteration of present conditions on Seven Mile. There may be an argument for non-residential uses directly opposite the hospital driveway, where the view is dominated by the structures rather than by the relatively attractive open property that surrounds the facility. Nor do we hold that operation of a boutique in a restored historic house would destroy the residential character of the neighborhood. Unfortunately, as most Seven Mile-area residents have discovered, it is impossible to insure what uses will be made of property after rezoning, despite the best intentions of the original petitioner.

We suspect the delay in changing the master plan to reflect the study results has been from a desire to await the outcome of certain planning decisions in progress. While such a delay makes a certain amount of sense, it adds to the uncertainty surrounding this issue and, as has been seen, invites additional rezoning petitions. If adoption of definite policy is put off much longer, other reasons to delay are likely to present themselves and merely complicate matters further. As we head into 1983, we believe Seven Mile zoning should be the lead item on the township planning commission's and board of trustees agendas for the new

# Why shoot for something new?

Why do people skilled in one field so often delude themselves that they can carry the talent to another, perhaps related field, and do as well? It is said every comedian believes he could do Shakespeare, that every actor wants to sing, that every reporter has a novel-in-progress in his desk drawer.

As one example, consider Joni Mitchell, folk music star who wandered into jazz and now returns to something closer to her earlier sound. What she really wants, a recent issue of Rolling Stone reminds us, is to retire from music and paint.

Closer to home, this is a personal concern, and if readers will tolerate a digression I promise we'll get back to the point.

Steve Fecht's front-page photo last week of a Ford worker using a cutting torch was such an eye-popper, and ran with a story so identifiably mine, that my wife nearly congratulated me for the picture before she saw the credit line.

The mistake was both understandable and absurd. Anyone who sees me in my normal ramblings around town knows I usually have my camera bag at hand and sometimes take a picture. My wife's mistake was reasonable because several recent Ford stories used my photos as illustration.

However, I am not now and, despite my best efforts, never will be half the photographer Steve Fecht is. Had I pulled off a shot like that, it would have been the best I'd ever done while for Fecht it was all in a day's work.

So why do I bother dragging my camera everywhere when Fecht is around? Because sometimes we don't have a photographer on duty, sometimes the photographer is doing something else when I need a photo, and there is an outside chance a news photo will appear in front of me and be gone before the photographer can get there.

Those are the answers I give when asked. In reality, though, by some sort of perverted self-perception, I get as much personal satisfaction from making a workman-like photo as I do from writing something that draws accolades all around.

Admittedly, neither event happens all that often. But in my heart I know most of my photos are just acceptable. I manage (with ample assistance from modern electronics) to make a tolerable exposure and, if things don't happen too fast, put together a composition that avoids having poles grow out of peo-

ple's heads. With a little luck on my side I've pulled off one or two shots (by actual count) in two and one-half years here that got me a pat-on-the-back from the photo department.

Yet when I take an ordinary photo I like to see a credit line under it and point it out to family and friends in a way I rarely 💥 do with an above-average story. Why is that, I ask? Particularly when I consider how much money I've invested, and plan to invest, dabbling in photography.

Certainly most of us are capable of doing more than one thing well. And I don't like over-specialization - I think trying something different helps you grow. Mastering it is tougher, but possible. Dozens of performers cross the lines between acting and singing without embarrassing themselves. Painters sculpt, sometimes photographers even write. One is not doomed to. mediocrity in a second field.

Yet, there is that nagging doubt. "Am I just a dilletante?" runs through my mind as I fire the shutter. Perhaps it's because photography looks so easy, especially with modern equipment, yet I've learned how hard it is to do well — much harder for me

I fear looking like one of the dozens who tell me they think they could shoot pictures or write for a paper when it's clear, they shouldn't even try. The advent of electronic 35mm SLR cameras has spawned an entire society whose members think. they can take photos like those that go out on the news wires. around the globe or hang in a New York gallery. Most of us'


That it isn't easy to take genuinely good pictures (regardless of what the TV ads say) is, I think, why I keep trying. It is more challenging than writing, for me, so even minor, accomplishment gives me a bigger charge.

And that is the essence of all the jumping about between, fields done by anyone with any kind of skill whatever. In many, cases, our major skills come easily to us and, eventually, become routine. So we try some new direction.

If you're among the new owners of good cameras, don't let these comments diminish your enjoyment. But if you promise not to ask me how to sell pictures to us, I'll promise to leave the novel in the drawer for now.

# Geake's school tax collection stance challenged

Senator Geake's "News from Lansing" as appearing in the December 8 issue of The Northville Record leaves me no choice but to respond. I am hocked at Senator Geake's total lack of understanding and logic regarding this issue. Unfortunately, if this is an examhle of his ability to make sound legislative decisions, then he should undoubtedly be replaced.

At issue is the recent legislative action allowing school districts to collect one half of their taxes in July and the other half in December. Currently, districts are collecting their taxes beginning in December, six months ufter their fiscal year begins (i.e. July 1 through June 30).

Beginning on July 1, a new fiscal year, expenses start to occur. Since districts receive most of their revenue through taxes and they are not available until December, districts are forced to borrow monies until the taxes are received. In 1981-82, districts in Michigan borrowed \$672 million and it cost in interest \$62.4 million! This huge

# Forgiving seaway debt important

Pursell said the decision would prevent major toll increases, preserve the competitive position of Midwest companies and states, and promote improvements in and greater use of the

"The St. Lawrence Seaway is the only waterway in North America required to repay past construction costs," Pursell pointed out. "Elimination of the debt erases a fundamental unfairness. For the first time in its 23-year history, the Seaway can operate on a more equal basis with other waterways.

The decision was approved during the conference committee meeting on Transportation Appropriations for 1983. Pursell is a member of the House Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee and participated in the con-

'This action is not an additional burden on the taxpayers," Pursell said, 'since this basically involves the government paying itself back for something it already owns."

The move to wipe out the Seaway 'debt" was fueled by the scheduled 1986 jump in repayment levels from \$2 million annually to \$9.5 million.

Toll revenues are in the \$10-12 million annual range. Since the Seaway receives no general fund money, tolls have had to finance both maintenance and debt payment. The congressional decision clears the way for tolls to be used for repairs, especially to the Eisenhower Lock and replacement of 23-year-old equipment.

Canada adopted a similar financing system for its part of the Seaway five years ago.

'The St. Lawrence Seaway opened in 1959. It was built under the leadership of Michigan Congressman George Dondero," Pursell noted.

'Tis the season. . . for property tax bills, income tax returns, W-2s and 1040s. . . which could make it harder to be jolly.

So this may be a good time to bring a message of good cheer to my constituents: You may be one of the 1.4 million Michigan property taxpayers eligible for a refund on your property taxes this year. Over half of our homeowners will qualify for some degree of relief under Michigan's 'homestead credit' or 'circuit breaker" program — the largest of its kind in the nation.

As legislators, we're very proud of this rebate program, but we're also worried that, this year, a lot of taxpayers may not realize that they're eligible for the benefit.

In 1982, Michigan property taxes went up an average of 8 percent, and the unemployment rate averaged around 15 percent. That means that over 20,000 of the 1.4 million taxpayers eligible for the homestead credit program, will qualify for the first time this

At first glance, the program appears somewhat complicated. But with \$600 million in state rebates available, it's worth a second look. I will try to explain how the system works as simply as I

First of all, anyone who has a household income of \$3,000 or less is eligible for a refund of all their property taxes. Let's look at an example of how the benefit program operates. If you are an able-bodied taxpayer under 65 who brought in \$10,000 in 1982, 3.5 percent of your annual household income is \$350. But let's say your property tax bill is \$500 this year. That's \$150 more than the 3.5 percent limit. So you'd be eligible for 60 percent of that \$150 excess, or \$90. If your household brought in \$20,000, you'd be eligible for refund on any property tax bill over \$700, and so

Be sure and study your income tax form - there's a special page on homestead credits in MI 1040A - and apply for the benefits when you file your return. Many people don't realize they're getting a property tax break even though they file for it with their income taxes.

But Michigan's homestead credit program is indeed the most generous system of refunding in the country, and that's something to be jolly about. Happy holidays!

# Boundary Commission orders Novi Township annexation

By KATHY JENNINGS

Within 60 days there should be indication of whether the annexation of Novi Township will be allowed to stand or be contested yet again.

Last week the Michigan Boundary Commission ordered the annexation of seven parcels of Novi Township and made the action retroactive to December 1978.

Brookland Farms subdivision will be allowed to remain as the sole portion of Novi Township as a result of the Boundary Commission's action last week.

The City of Novi has treated the annexation of seven of eight township parcels as fact for nearly four years, despite continuing appeals by Novi Township. Those appeals were dropped at the request of township residents earlier this year.

Now the possibility of an appeal of the boundary commission's latest action is

being investigated, according to John Bauckham, who formerlly represented proposed for annexation probably should be included in the annexation so port detaching the Chase Manor Farm Novi Township in appeals protesting the annexation and now represents William B. Chase - the man financing a large part of ongoing legal battles.

"We feel the decision is in error, but whether we will want to take on another appeal has not been decided," Baukham said.

He indicated he believes the annexation could be contested due to the decision to make it retroactive to 1978, as well as the commissions' non-compliance with criteria for annexation provide in state statute.

'We dislike retroactive feature of it and we think their reasons for approving the annexation leave a lot to be desired in regard to compliance with the criteria under the statute,' Bauckham said.

In reaching its decision to approve the annexation, the boundary commisin

would not exceed the benefits taxpayers would receive.

The commission also found the annexation: "Will have a beneficial impact on the environment of the surrounding area, because comprehensive and efficient planning by one governmental unit will be a significant factor in preserving and enhancing the enviroment for residents."

The boundary commission also noted Brookland Farms "has been able to sustain itself as Novi Township since

"The Commission finds that neither the city nor the township wants Brookland Farms included within the annexation. Likewise, no individuals have come forward to argue it should be included in the annexation, except Mr. Chase.

But earlier this year a petition signed by 85 of the 100 registered voters in Brookland Farms requesting the township board to withdraw from litigation delaying the annextion was presented.

The township subsequently dropped any further legal pursuit of the matter.

Boundary commissioners also refused to joing Chase Manor Farms to the sole remaining part of the township. They noted "the attorney for Chase Manor Farms requested that the 275 acre ... farm be adjusted out of the city and be joined with Brookland Farms" so the subdivision would not be the only remaining township territory. The two parcels are seperated by nearly one mile, the commission noted.

But the Commission ruled: "there is

port detaching the Chase Manor Farm and thereby making Novi Township two non-contiguous parcels." The commission found that Chase Manor Farm is a "natural part of the city of Novi and can be given a full range of urban services if and when they are desired by the owner of the farm.

Commissioners also supported the annexation of seven township parcels on the grounds the seven parcels were effectively annexed to the city when the records, such as voter registration and tax rolls, were turned over to the city December 31, 1978.

In their findings the commission also noted Novi has been providing services to the seven township parcels since ecember 1978 and that Chateau Estates Mobile Park testified it does not want to return to the township form

They noted Chateau Estates

residents have been active in the city council meetings and have sought elective offices there. They further found that the city has spent money improving Thirteen Mile for the use of residents of the mobile home park.

Last week's action by the boundar commission is the third time they have approved annexation of the seven township parcels.

Twice before the boundary commission decided not to include Brookland Farms with seven other parcels proposed for annexation.

Brookland Farms is the final piecie of what was once eight scattered parcels — approximately 1.9 square miles — comprising Novi Township. The parcele were taken out of Novi's incorporation petitions in the late 1950s under provisions of a law which allows agricultural parcels to remove their lands from incorporation actions.

Jobless rate of 16.4 percent is all-time high for Michigan

Michigan's unadjusted unemployment rate rose during November to 16.4 percent, an increase of 1.5 percent from the October jobless rate of 14.9 percent, according to figures released by S. Martin Taylor, director of the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

November's jobless rate means that 699,000 workers were without jobs compared to October when 637,000 individuals were out of work.

Taylor noted that it was the highest unadjusted rate for November since the MESC began compiling the figures in 1956. November's jobless rate also is the highest since March of this year when unemployment stood at 17.0 percent.

Taylor attributed the sharp increase in unemployment in November to continuing weakness in the economy evidenced by layoffs in the construction and manufacturing industries, particularly a number of temporary auto-related

In addition, retail hiring usually expected to offset unemployment in other sectors is less than normal this time of year, he said.

The number of people in the labor force declined by 17,000 during November to 4.262 million. In October, there were 4.279 million people in the labor force.

There were 3.563 million workers employed during November compared to 3.642 million who had jobs in October. A year ago in November the jobless rate was 12.0 percent with 517,000 people out of work Michigan's seasonally adjusted November jobless rate was 17.2 percent with

732,000 out of work. In October the rate was 16.1 percent with 686,000 out of

Nationally, the November adjusted jobless rate was 10.8 percent. The October national rate was 10.4 percent and September's rate was 10.1 percent.





Nienaltowski, a Novi resident and owner of the Pit Stop on Grand River, purchased the car in 1960. He restored it in 1967 with parts from a car that belonged to Admiral Richard E. # Engineering's lone bright spot in 1983 graduate job survey

Engineering remains the one bright tions, responded to the nationwide spot for college graduates in June, accuracy. cording to a national recruiting trends survey just completed by Michigan State University.

In most other disciplines, the supply of graduates will exceed the demand, according to Jack Shingleton, co-author of the annual survey and director of Placement Services at MSU.

More than 600 employers, including a cross-section of business, industry, government and educational institu-

The results show that employers' hiring quotas are down 16.8 percent from last year, which also was a trying year for some graduates.

While demand for engineering graduates has dropped dramatically, there still will be more jobs available in these fields than there are graduates to fill them, said Shingleton.

This is the 12th year that Shingleton and L. Patrick Scheetz, an assistant director of placement services, have conducted the nationwide survey of employers to assess the demand for college graduates.

"This is the toughest recruiting year since we've been doing the survey," said Shingleton, "and it may be the toughest year since World War II.'

Employers have cut their recruitment schedules almost 18 percent this school year, said Shingleton. But in spite of that, those who do get offers probably will be offered more money than 1982 graduates.

Starting salaries overall are expected to increase an average of 2.8 percent, much lower than the increases over the past decade. But this will result in fewer real dollars for the 1983 graduate because of the effects of inflation.

The Mustangs were a dismal nine of 26 shooting, while the Falcons nailed 10 of 23 from around the free throw lane. Lutes scrapped the Mustangs man-to-

man defense during the half. "We didn't do a good job with it," he said. Improved free throw shooting and a

reduction in turnovers keyed the Mustangs' intitial triumph.

# Harpsichord maker brings masterwork into 20th century

By MICHELE McELMURRY

In his basement workshop at 131 Walnut, Christopher Brodersen gives new life to an Old World craft.

An unassuming 34 year-old music worker. There history graduate, Brodersen has spent an instrument.' the past five years building harp-

His instruments, based on harpsichords built by 18th century French builder Pascal Taskin, are entirely handmade. From the poplar case to the ebony keys, all parts of the instruments

speak of instruments "in the style" of

old originals. Last month, Brodersen completed his third double manual harpsichord. Since 1978, he has built three double manuals in the Paskin design. The construction time for one harpsichord is approximately a year.

Brodersen's occupation as a harp-

sichord builder requires a combination of skills. He is as much a carpenter and painter as he is a musician. However, he points out that "my approach is not so much from the stand point of a woodworker. There is a lot more to building

Brodersen learned his craft in Germany. He first worked as an apprentice for an organ builder in a farm community called Kupfer Muhle near Hamburg. After a year as an organ builder apprentice, he took a job in a piano



Short-ly after, he began working for harp-sichord builder Martin Sassmann outside of Cologne.

Of German heritage and fluent in the language, Brodersen's two-and-a-half years in Germany offered him the skills he needed to set up his own shop.

In keeping with Taskin's design,

Brodersen acquired a copy of the French builder's blueprints from the University of Edinburgh in Scotland. l'askin's 1769 harpsichord is part of the University of Edinburgh collection.

Conforming the designs to more modern specifications, Brodersen began his construction of the double manual harpsichord in the Taskin style

Brodersen's instruments are made mostly with hand tools — many of which were purchased in Germany. A wood case resting on the wall behind his worktable holds a variety of hand tools all solid with gleaming wooden handles.


Hand tools are essential for constructing many of the instrument's parts and materials, he explains.

Most materials used in Brodersen's instruments are the same as those used by harpsichord builders during the 18th

The case of the instrument is made of poplar - a wood closely resembling the limewood used by the old harpsichord makers. Brodersen emphasizes that no plywood is used in his instruments.

The soundboard is made of European spruce which Brodersen describes as very expensive and very hard to get.







# Hadassah brings Jewish tradition to area

Slowly but surely, 22 women are working to establish a Jewish tradition in the Northville-Novi area.

It is young as far as traditions go, dating back only to 1912. But it is a tradition that has spread quickly. It is the tradition of Hadassah, a

women's Zionist organization dedicated to providing for the health, education and welfare of the needy in Israel. The Northville-Novi Hadassah group was established last spring, mainly by

women who belonged to the organization in other cities and found themselves cut off when they moved to this area, explained co-president Evelyn Goodman. Goodman, a Novi resident for the past 12 years and a lifetime Hadassah

member, shares presidency of the fledgling Northville-Novi group with Donna Mandell of Walled Lake. The group's monthly meetings in-

clude presentations, educational segments, planning for fund-raising drives and planning strategy to increase membership. 'We've got a lot of work ahead of us

to build up this particular group," Goodman said. "It's small and most of the members are women who were in moved here," she explained.

Each Hadassah group, Goodman explained, is assigned a quota of money it must earn during the year to fund Hadassah projects like the 800-bed Hadassah University Hospital at Ein Karem, west of Jerusalem, and a medical center on Mount Scopus in

"These places are just wonderful," said Goodman, who traveled to Israel in 1967 and again in 1971. "It takes a lot of money to sponsor them, but we're working hard to raise the money.

The hard work of the world's 370,000 Hadassah members has paid off — the group worldwide now raises \$30 million per year. Eighty-five percent of that goes to the Hadassah medical organization, while the rest is earmarked for various social service projects.

"It's important for people to know that none of the money goes to (Israel's) defense, and Hadassah has no political say," said Goodman. "Our interest is in health, welfare and educa-

The Hadassah focus on education has produced the Brandeis School for Boys and the Alice Seligsburg Vocational School for Girls in Jerusalem. But the educational focus extends to Hadassah members themselves, who spend part of each meeting studying pertinent curpresentations, usually having to do with


Because the Northville-Novi group is so new and so small, it was not assigned a fund-raising quota this year, Goodman explained, but that doesn't mean members aren't doing their best to raise all the money they can.



# 18th century instrument gets new life

Continued from 1-D

"This is the real McCoy," he explains. "It's the same wood used in the 18th Century by European builders.

The first part of building the harpsichord begins with constructing the case. Brodersen makes the bent side of the case by steaming the poplar in a box for 10-12 hours. The steaming softens the wood to make it more pliable.

The soundboard bridges also are steam-bent and carved.

In keeping with Taskin's original design, Brodersen uses naturally seasoned pearwood for the jacks. He notes that kiln-dried pearwood used by many modern builders often is brittle.

Perhaps the most intricate work involved in building the instrument is construction of the jacks. Brodersen makes all 183 jacks by hand. The softwood registers, which receive the jacks, are covered on one surface with leather and he must punch exact holes in the leather for the jacks.

The tongues of the harpsichord are made of holly and sprung with real boar's bristle, which he buys from the Fuller Brush salesman.

The keys and keyframe of the harpsichord also are of poplar. The natural keys are covered in ebony; the sharps are made of bone.

Each key has to be tapered in the front and back and on the sides - all by

Brodersen said he uses bone rather than ivory for the sharp keys because of its easy availability. He also notes that bone stays whiter than ivory.

The keyboard alone takes a few months to complete.

Decorations on Broderson's harpsichords are extremely lavish designed in much the same way as Taskin's. The casework is painted in a high-quality lacquer according to the preference of his customer. He has completed combinations of red and black, green and beige and grey and

However, the most ornate design is found on the soundboard, where Brodersen uses tempera to create a colorful array of flowers. He explains that flowers were a

popular pattern on the early French The molding and casing of each in-

strument is gilded with bands of 23 karat gold leaf.

Among the final touches made to Brodersen's harpsichords are the

casting of the rose medallion which is set into the soundboard and gilded in gold leaf and gilding the inscription of his name and hometown on the nameboard.

"It's sort of like building a house," Brodersen says of his craft. He adds, however, that the beauty of the harpsichord goes far beyond its appearance.

'The main part of the harpsichord is the musical aspect of it," he explains. "The sound is what makes one harp-sichord different form another.

"Most people think of it as a dainty instrument that's very tinkly," he adds. 'Yet, the appeal of a historical harpsichord is its gutsy tone.'

Brodersen explains the demand for harpsichords is "small but steady."

He says his customers are private individuals - people who want harpsichords - not church organizations or music groups.

Brodersen explains there is some competition in his field. There currently are five harpsichord builders in Michigan alone, he notes. However, the center really is in Boston.

While the cost of a harpsichord depends in part on the wishes of the customer, he said the price range is 'about the same as buying a sports

Surprisingly, Brodersen does not own a harpsichord. "I can't afford one," he

Brodersen and his wife Regina moved to Northville three months ago and are members of the Bushnell Congregational Church choir, where he is tenor

When not building harpsichords, Brodersen spends part of his time tuning and repairing harpsichords. He also plays the oboe.









# Artist's baskets mesh with contemporary lifestyles

Light from two large windows fills e studio on the ground level of Scott nith's Novi home, and the air has a fresh wood scent.

Reeds soak in pails of water and different-colored spools of cording line shelves beneath the window, waiting for him to transform them into the traditional - and the unusual baskets that are his primary art form.

Long bundles of rattan fibers stretch out on the floor, others rest within easy reach on the rafters overhead. A dozen of Smith's baskets, stained in muted bnes of blue, red and brown, dance in front of an electric fan as recently applied stain dries.

The studio is where Smith spends 15 to 18 hours a day, six or seven days a week, nimbly weaving strips of rattan into new creations.

Those creations can range from small "key baskets," a traditional, wall-hanging basket that sells for \$15 to \$20, to a bed for Smith's schnauzer othello, to a gigantic melon basket made to advertise a New York antique shop that Smith sold for \$1,200.

Traditional baskets are Smith's bread and butter, but his favorite

pieces are his "gallery pieces," unusual wicker creations on which he lets his imagination run wild.

Goals are important to Smith, and his big one for 1983 is to concentrate more on gallery pieces and being "artistic" than the traditional baskets that have helped provide him with commercial

"You have to set goals," Smith said, plopping a roll of fiber into a bucket of water to soften. "I have achieved commercial success this year ... in five more years I'd like to be recognized in the midwest, in 10 years nationally."

Smith seems to be well on his way. A "fiber artist" for 10 years, he made his first basket in high school when he was '14 or 15 years old" and has since graduated from Carnegie Mellon Intitute in Pittsburgh.

Working as a "professional" for the past five years, he produces 30 to 50 baskets per week, a combination of traditional "production pieces" and gallery pieces.

While weaving one of his nontraditional baskets, Smith works burlap, cord and unusual texture items like hammered copper into the weaves

of the baskets. "It's a surprise to find metal in a

basket, but it goes very well," he says. thinks it is so good that he has "no in"To be successful as an artist you have tention of ever leaving" the state. to incorporate the unexpected.

By doing just that, Smith manages to keep the necessary "one step ahead" in basketry. "To keep people interested, to keep people looking at and buying my baskets, I have to keep doing things to surprise them," like working metal into the weave. "Opposites attract, and the metal works really well," he explains.

Smith finishes off the baskets with stains he makes himself from natural pigments, using various shades on the same basket to achieve an antiqued

When the baskets are finished, Smith goes to work on "establishing" himself, displaying and selling his work at galleries and "better shows" throughout Michigan and the midwest. On a recent weekend, his baskets appeared at four different Michigan

In fact, Smith's baskets have appeared in about 15 shows this year. Another of his goals is to double the number of shows he attends in 1983 because, believe it or not, Smith says Michigan is one of the top areas in the country for artists. It is surpassed only by New York and Florida, and Smith a fiber piece it looks different.'

To really become established an artist should stay in one place," he said. "I feel fortunate to be an artist making a living and living in Michigan.'

Also important in becoming established is creating works of art that endure - and Smith maintains his baskets will last longer than the people who buy them.

"I guarantee my baskets will outlive their owners," he said. Though he admits his baskets might be considered expensive, "because of my guarantee, they're a tremendous bargain ... you'll have something to use for a lifetime."

To give people a skill they can use for a lifetime. Smith also teaches basketry

"Educating people to basketry is exciting," he said. "Basketry is an art form of its own ... (a basket) can be artistic and still be functional, and people like that.

"Fibers are the art of the '80s. People are looking for alternatives to framed paintings. They're tired of flat landscapes and water colors. They always look the same ... every time you look at
