NEWS BRIEFS

CITY COUNCIL agenda for its meeting at 8 p.m. Monday will be a full one, according to Clerk Joan McAllister, and will include discussion of the 35th District Court costs as well as the summer school tax collection.

CITY PLANNERS were to meet last night to continue discussion of permitting residential use of second floors in com-

mercial and business-office zoning. Next meeting of the planning commission is set for 8 p.m. February 15.

A **BLUE RIBBON** committee will report on the renovation of Northville High School at 7:30 p.m. tonight in the high school cafeteria.

Intermediate schools to collect tax

Northville residents apparently will be paying a portion of their school taxes this summer as the Wayne County Intermediate School District Board of Education voted last week to collect the intermediate district tax levy, as provided by state law.

Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees passed a resolution in January to collect a summer tax when other school taxes were collected in the local districts that are part of the Schoolcraft district. It now intends to "piggy back" its summer tax levy on the Intermediate District tax here, a spokesperson said Monday.

News of the intermediate district's decision, made last Wednesday at a summer tax hearing, caught both township clerk Susan Heintz and city clerk Joan McAllister by surprise. Neither was aware the hearing was being held.

McAllister said a call to the Wayne County Intermediate School District office Monday revealed the district had published a notice of the hearing in the Detroit Free Press January 19.

Announcement of the intent to levy the summer tax stated, "Public sentiment expressed at the board's summer tax hearing Wednesday (January 26) approved the earlier collection as good business practice since it did not involve any tax increase."

Dr. William Simmons, intermediate district superintendent, said short term investment of the tax would produce additional funds, particularly for the support of special education programs in the county.

The intermediate district levies an operating tax of .03 (three-hundredths) of a mill, .07 mills for debt service and 1.0 mill for special education for a total of 1.1 mills. Most of the 1.0 mill tax for special education is distributed to local school districts.

With a Schoolcraft levy of 1.94 mills, the total of the summer school collection is expected to be about 3.0 mills, which, City Manager Steven Walters said, would be about \$100 for the average city resident.

Calling the Wayne County Intermediate School District's decision to levy the summer school tax "a real surprise," township clerk Heintz admitted, "I don't know what we're going to do." She said the decision on whether the township will collect the summer levy is required by law to be made in 30 days. It will be on the agenda of the next board of trustees meeting at 8 p.m. February 10 in township hall.

Heintz cited the last census report that the average house in the township is valued at around \$100,000. Based on that figure, the summer collection for the intermediate district and Schoolcraft would be about \$150, she estimated.

Northville Board of Education, after a public hearing in January, made the decision to levy a summer tax, but not until 1984.

Schoolcraft comptroller Adelard Raby, who previously had not been aware of the Wayne County Intermediate School District decision, said Monday the college would levy the college district tax in Northville city and township in conjunction with the intermediate district levy.

Previously, the college had planned, he said, to levy the summer tax this

year only in the portion of Northville township served by Plymouth schools, which are collecting the summer tax this year.

Public Act 333, passed late last year by the state legislature, permits school districts to collect the summer tax, saving interest charges in borrowing until the winter collection. If local governing bodies do not wish to make the collection, it may be done by the county or the district itself.

The city, which already collects its taxes in summer, will not have a separate collection to make, McAllister said Monday. The township, however, has not had a summer levy, and collects all taxes in the winter levy.

Heintz noted the township has been charging the one percent collection fee but noted that is a small amount on the 3.0 mill levy. She anticipated the township will pass a resolution at the February 10 meeting on whether it will be the collecting agency.

City Manager Walters also pointed out Monday that the city traditionally has not charged the one percent collection fee with the reasoning that it "is

taxing taxpayers for the cost of paying their taxes."

In conversations with the Northville School District representatives, he related, it had been agreed that the school district would pay collection costs.

The Wayne County Intermediate School District levy will be on the city council agenda for discussion at the 8

p.m. meeting of council in city hall Monday.

McAllister noted that the Oakland Schools Board of Education hearing on a summer tax collection was to have been held January 25 and that the city had been notified January 12, although the hearing does not affect city collections as all city residents are in the Northville School District, even if they live in Oakland County.

Plymouth district residents to pay school summer taxes

Northville Township residents who are located in the Plymouth Canton Community School District will be paying one-half of their school district property taxes this summer.

A total of 387 property owners in the southeastern corner of the township, including the Park Gardens area, will be involved in the summer tax levy.

The Board of Education of the

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools voted to collect the taxes because of recently enacted legislation that gives each school district the option to impose a summer property tax levy of all or one-half of the annual school property taxes.

The Board contacted Northville

Planners deny township rezoning

Denial is the recommendation made by the Northville Township planning commission to the township board of trustees on a request for rezoning a piece of property at the corner of Seven Mile and Pierson roads.

The request to rezone the farmhouse on approximately two acres from residential (R-1) to local business district (B-1) was made by a Westland real estate firm on behalf of the current owners of the property.

The request was tabled by the commission in December, 1982. Bev Stanton, real estate firm representative, told the commission that the prospective buyers would like to use the 110-

year-old farmhouse as a specialty boutique, and argued that such a use would not disrupt the residential character of the neighborhood.

Stanton claimed that the property is "useless" as a residential parcel due to its proximity to Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital. She said that her clients have had the property on the market for two years but have not been able to sell it with residential zoning.

"The only offers they have received have been commercial offers," she said. She contended that the "non-residential" nature of the neighborhood, which is across Seven Mile Road from the Northville state

hospital, made the property worthless as residential property.

A similar rezoning request was made concerning a parcel at the corner of Seven Mile and Fry roads; that rezoning is currently awaiting a decision by the township board. A similar rezoning was approved by the board early last year.

Stanton told the commission that the volume of traffic on Seven Mile Road already was higher than acceptable for residential areas but suitable for a commercial area. She also cited the number of escapees from the hospital as making the neighborhood undesirable residentially.

Commission member and township trustee Richard Allen disputed Stanton's figures, calling them "grossly distorted," and noting that statistics can be twisted to mean almost anything.

Township police chief Kenneth Hardesty submitted a letter to the commission in which he stated that the corner was unsuitable for commercial development due to a short sight distance that would make difficult ingress and egress of commercial traffic from the site.

"Further, slowed traffic searching for a business in a basically residential area could cause additional traffic problems," Hardesty's letter stated.

Planner Claude Coates advised the commission that the rezoning was contrary to the township's master plan, and also that there is commercial land available elsewhere in the township.

Although Stanton said her clients promised to keep the site as a boutique only that would generate low volumes of traffic, a letter from township attorney said that there is no way the township could hold the new owners to their promise after a rezoning was granted.

Final decision on the rezoning must be made by the township board.

Bushnell continues building plans for local church

If Bushnell minister Robin Meyers has his way, the liberal Protestant Congregational church will have its roots in both Detroit and Northville.

For the past year, the 30-year-old minister has been caught in the middle of one of Bushnell's most difficult and agonizing controversies — whether to sell its northwest Detroit church to build a new church in the Northville/Novi area.

The debate, which has caused considerable strife between Bushnell's Detroit and newly-formed suburban congregations, came to an end January 23 when the Detroit congregation voted 225-144 to retain its present church on Southfield Road.

The congregation's action reversed a 1979 decision to sell the more than 50-year-old structure and move its membership to the suburbs.

While the Detroit congregation's recent decision seems to have dashed the hopes of constructing a church in Northville, Bushnell's minister said plans for building a new structure on Meadowbrook Road are well underway.

"I will do everything I can to make sure a dream of a new Bushnell is realized in Northville," Meyers said.

"Lots of things are in the works now to assure people that this does not mean the end of our plans to build a new church," he added.

While construction of a new church was largely dependent upon the sale of the \$1 million Detroit church, Meyers noted that several fund-raising efforts already are underway to help finance the new building.

He said a building committee is being organized and that a building fund already has been established.

"There is talk of having the new church completed or near completion by next fall," he said.

Meyers pointed out that funding for the new church most likely will come from the congregation's contributions and through a concerted capital funds drive.

He also noted that one important milestone was passed last fall when the land contract was retired on the 14-acre parcel on Meadowbrook Road between Eight and Nine Mile. The property was purchased by the church in 1980.

"Bushnell now owns the land free and clear," Meyers said.

While original plans were to build a church similar in style to Bushnell's imposing New England-style structure in Detroit, Meyers said architectural

plans for the new church "have gotten more simplistic and much more realistic." However, he said the church will retain its New England design.

Noting that some of Bushnell's suburban members felt betrayed after the January 23 decision, Meyers said he believes the decision to retain the Detroit church ultimately will unify the congregation.

"It's no longer an either/or situation," he explained.

"The Detroit congregation now can enter into a partnership with the Northville/Novi people to help build a new church," he observed. "There no longer is that animosity."

Meyers said he believes Bushnell can follow in the footsteps of other churches such as Ward Presbyterian which have built sister churches outside of the city.

"I think there is a new resolve among the suburban congregation to show everyone they can build their own church," he said.

The debate over Bushnell's relocation began four years ago with the decline of the church's membership. As one of Detroit's largest and most prominent churches, Bushnell once boasted a membership of more than 2,600.

However, over the past decade the church's membership has dwindled to

about 1,000 as more and more of its congregation moved from the city to the suburbs.

In 1980, the Detroit church was put up for sale and a 14-acre parcel on Meadowbrook Road was purchased for the construction of a new Bushnell Congregational.

In June, 1981, only a week after receiving his doctor of divinity degree from Drew University in New York, Robin Meyers was named senior minister of Bushnell — ending the church's year-long search for a new minister.

At 29, Meyers was the youngest senior minister in the history of Bushnell Congregational Church and his appointment seemed to fit in with the development of a new church.

In addition to serving as senior minister, Meyers was also responsible for heading the development of the new church.

Bushnell's suburban congregation started meeting in Novi's Village Oaks Elementary School in June, 1981. Last year it moved its approximately 100 members to New School Church in Mill Race Village.

With the help of Ray Ferguson, Bushnell's minister of music, Meyers has been able to divide his time bet-

ween Northville and Detroit. After he delivers a 9 a.m. sermon in Mill Race Village, he then heads to Detroit for the 11 a.m. service.

Meyers said he will be able to continue the two services "for as long as I need to," but mentioned he will have to hire an assistant "fairly soon."

A Northville resident, Meyers, his wife Shawn and two children moved into Bealton more than a year ago.

Though Bushnell's Detroit church has been on the market for almost three years, there have been no offers to buy the \$1 million structure. While the inability to sell the church stalled plans for the construction of the Northville church, it left the doors open for the Detroit congregation.

Meyers said that during the past few years, the membership has changed its mind about leaving the 50-year-old stronghold.

"For now, we're going to try to make a go of it here," Meyers said from his Detroit church office. "However, that doesn't mean we aren't going to build a church in Northville."

"I personally think we can maintain two churches."

The Detroit church technically will remain on the real estate market until the listing lapses in April.

He is a member of the board of governors of the Greater Michigan Foundation and EMU's College of Business Development board. He also is on the

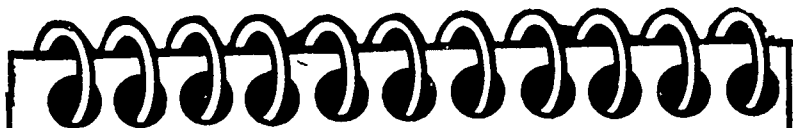
board of directors of Junior Achievement of Southeastern Michigan and is a member of the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce and the Economic Club of Detroit.

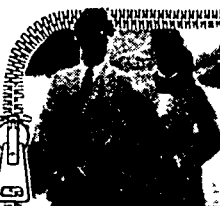

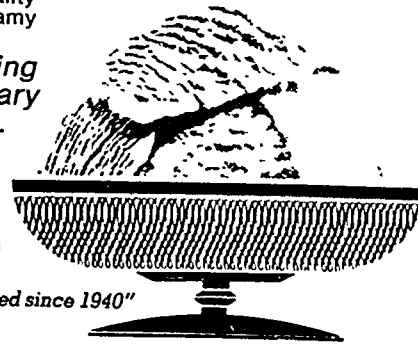

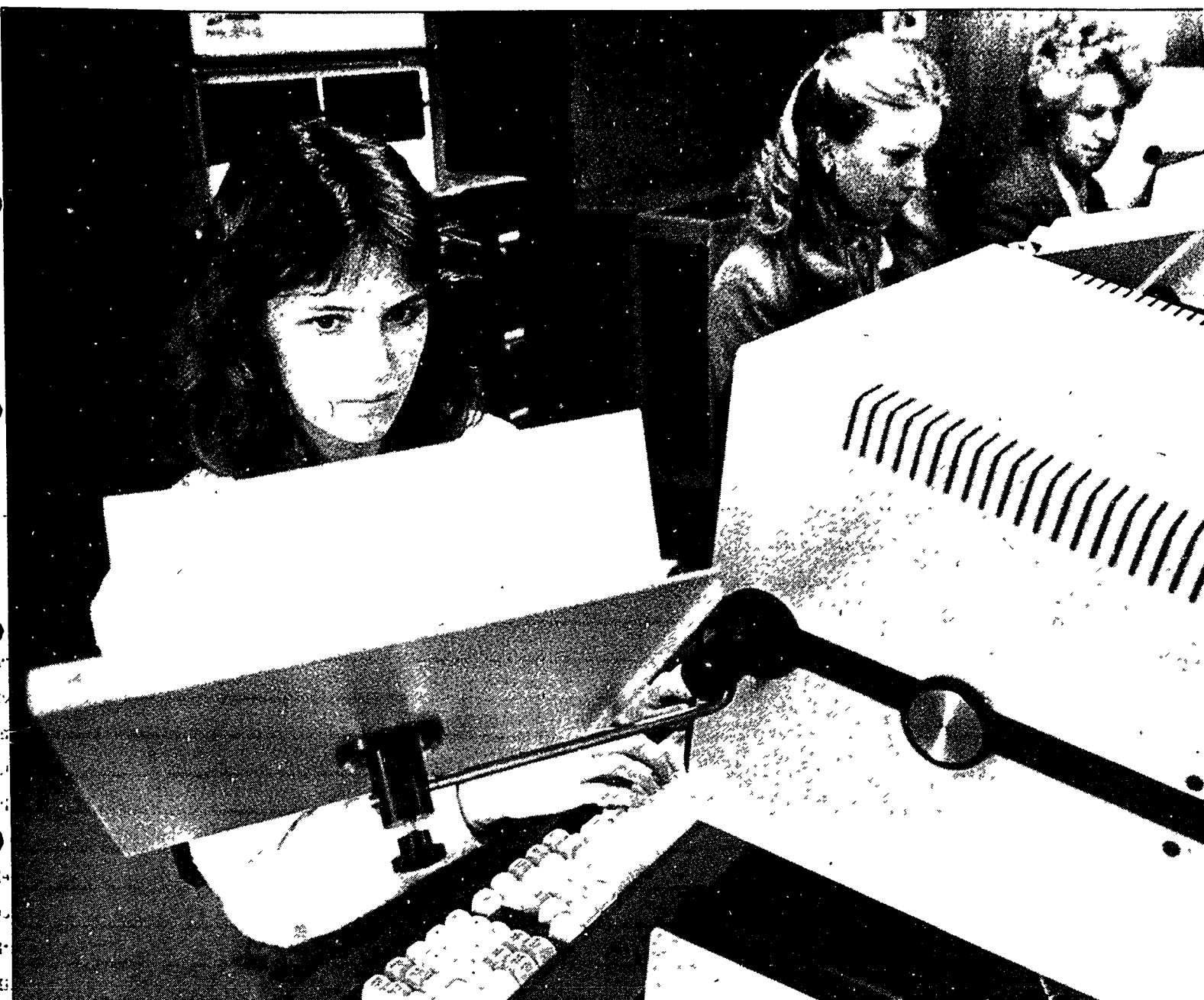

here for the convenience of the residents. If we didn't take them here, then the tax bills would have to be paid in Detroit, and that's a long way to go to pay a bill," she said.

Heintz said the summer tax levy will be a first in Northville. "The only problem is that it is coming very quickly, and we have never done it before. The one good thing is that it will help us get in practice for the 1984 Northville School District summer tax."

New Mexican restaurant plans downtown expansion

Plans for the expansion of a take-out Mexican food business in Mary Alexander Court in downtown Northville into the Juan Carlos Restaurant were reported at the second January meeting of Northville City Council. It was explained that the restaurant business was expanding into 146 Mary Alexander Court, taking over space formerly occupied by a dance studio moving to its former Cady street location. Because of the expanded use, John G. Ljadic, a partner in the restaurant, had submitted a request for change of use with the understanding that additional parking space credits would have to be purchased. At the current cost of spaces, \$1800, the additional needs were determined on the basis of a 920-foot restaurant

area. The carry-out business already had 4.6 paid credits, and it was determined that an additional 4.6 would be needed.

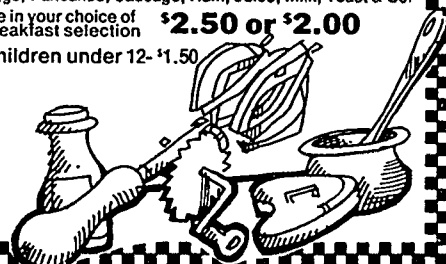
An agreement was approved by council to pay the charge over a 10-year period with a six percent annual interest charge added.

City Manager Steven Walters told council this is the same type of arrangement as that worked out by the John Genittis in the Masonic Temple building. The agreement included a right of termination should the business not remain a tenant the full period.

The city, which financed additional downtown parking with the construction of a deck on the north side of Cady, recoups the cost by charging businesses for parking spaces on a use formula.

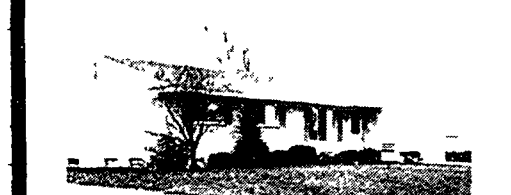

City council questions district court billings

The City of Northville's initial billing for 1983 from the 35th District Court in the amount of \$17,310 brought questions from city council in January. As a result, both Judge James Garber and court administrator George R. Willand have promised to attend the next meeting of city council at 8 p.m. Monday to answer council's questions.

The billing, detailed in a letter from Willand, was the most recent to bring the comment from the council that the consolidated court was supposed to save money, rather than increase costs to the city.

Mayor Paul Vernon reported he had written a letter to presiding Judge Dunbar Davis January 11 asking that Judge Garber or another court spokesperson attend one of the near-future council meetings to answer the city's questions.

He explained in the letter that during the last several years Judge Garber had attended council meetings when the council was considering the district court budget and that "his input and answers to questions have been very helpful to us in our deliberations."

The communication from Willand explained the city's initial billing — for the difference between its anticipated

portion of the 35th District Court's 1983 budget and 1983 projected revenues based on the 1982 court usage factor of 11.29 percent — is now due in the amount of \$17,310.

He reminded that this is the method agreed upon by the court's advisory board at a meeting November 9, 1982.

In an itemization of court charges, Willand showed that the December 1982 revenue disbursement for the city was \$5,900.90 but noted it was being retained by the court.

He listed a total of \$25,699 as the sum the city owes the district court up to 1983.

The 1981 amount of \$65,558 which included higher than expected start-up costs had been adjusted by \$4,350 (civil case adjustment) and \$1,077 (expense reimbursement) to \$60,130.

The sum of \$10,000 paid by Northville September 29, 1982, plus revenue credits for September (\$6,538), October (\$4,775), November (\$7,216) as well as December's reduced the calculated debt to \$25,699.

Indicating that its budget does not contain money for the new billing, the council expressed the hope that Judge Davis would respond to Vernon's letter.

Five communities unite on arson investigations

Northville is bucking a state-wide increase in arson-related fires, and the reason for the reversal is Force 5.

Force 5 is an arson investigation unit involving five communities, and, according to Northville City Fire Department Chief Jim Allen, the unit is the major reason for the local decrease in arson fires.

Allen also credits the combined efforts of Force 5, the State Police Crime Lab, and the Fire Marshal's Division for the downturn in arson-related fires in Northville at a time when arson fires state-wide are increasing faster than any other major crime.

The five communities involved in the operation, Northville, Northville Township, Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton, coordinated their arson investigative efforts two years ago to combat the growing arson threat.

Force 5 is patterned after a Livingston County program that was successful in stopping the accelerating arson rate in that area. The 25 members of the unit went through 10 weeks of intensive field and classroom. The final exam for the program is the deliberate

torching of a building using dozens of arson techniques. Unit members put out the fire and try to determine the different arson methods that were used.

Allen said one of the most important features of Force 5 is the gathering of arson-related information within one agency. "Arsonists have a pattern. The method of operation is the same in a lot of cases and, if you can find something similar about the fires, then you've made progress."

The coordination of resources among the communities in a time of severe economic cut-backs gives each area the ability to combat arson on an intensive basis. Northville Township Fire Chief Robert Toms said that because of the program, the chances of going to jail in the township for arson are 90 percent.

"This is a small fire department, but we have a pool of highly trained people. Before, arsonists were getting around and they were not being apprehended. Now when we get an arson case, we know what it is. It's bad enough being a fireman without some nitty trying to do you in deliberately," Toms said.

More than \$900 worth of property was stolen from a Beck Road residence January 25, according to Northville Township police. Police said jewelry and two chain saws were missing from the home.

Reports said the thieves gained entry between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. through a basement window that accommodated a dryer vent.

All doors were locked from the inside and required keys to open them, and all windows were locked from the inside with the exception of the vented window, the report stated.

According to police, all the property was removed from the home through the basement window.

Police indicated that footprints were found circling the home and there was evidence a car had been parked in the driveway.

Fingerprints were taken at the scene and the incident is under investigation, according to the reports.

Police reports said a vehicle parked in a Northville lot sustained \$115 in damages and stolen property on January 24.

An umbrella, suit coat and a carry-all containing \$5 in change was taken from the car, the report said.

Extensive damage to the passenger door, side mirror, dash and ashtray occurred during the larceny, police reports stated.

Police have no suspects or witnesses.

A Mount Clemens man was the victim of a pickpocket at Northville Downs, according to city police reports. The pickpocket took \$806 in winnings from the victim January 27, police were told.

Police reports state that the victim had just put the money in his front pant pocket when the suspect took the cash. The victim reportedly yelled at the suspect to stop, but the suspect ran out the west-end doors. Police reports said that the victim of the theft could supply the name of the pickpocket to the authorities.

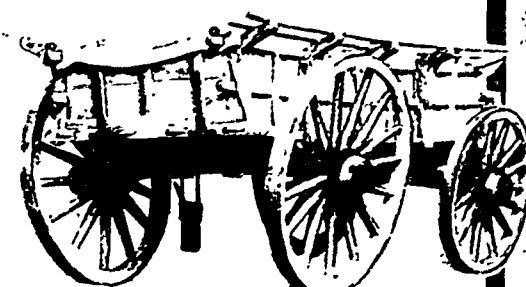

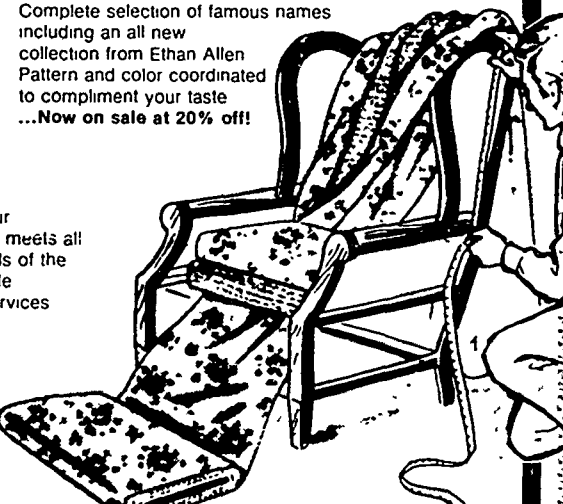

Realtor's celebrating two milestones

Ann Roy has been into real estate — and just about everything else, including the Northville Chamber of Commerce, realty organizations, and other clubs — for a long time.

The owner of Bruce Roy Realty in Northville says she plans to stay there for as long as she can.

"It keeps me young," laughed Roy, who last week celebrated both her 66th birthday and the 10th anniversary of the Northville office of the real estate business begun by her late husband Bruce in Detroit in 1945.

"When we came, this place (the office at 150 North Center Street) was an old burned out bookstore ... we fixed it up and I almost lived here right in the office for a year while Bruce ran the office in Detroit. I brought in two salesmen with me and I couldn't afford a secretary ... within a year I had a dozen salesmen."

The Roy family lived in Northville for nearly five years before opening their Northville realty office. Not surprisingly, Roy reports it was trying to find a house for a client that brought her to the area.

"I had a customer who wanted to come up here ... he wound up not buying a house, but I just fell in love with the area."

Roy said it took some work to get her husband interested in Northville, but she eventually got him to come by making a house deal so appealing that the amateur photographer couldn't refuse.

"I found this house that had a nice room under the stairs and I took (him) through it ... I said 'here's this room, it would be perfect for a darkroom.' Here's a guy who's a salesman and he falls for this line ... we bought the house."

The decision to move the office to Northville came several years later due to increasing crime and violence in Detroit and to the Roy's increasing attachment to Northville. "Your office should be where your home is," Roy said.

The Roy's nearly 40-year marriage and 30-year business partnership meant that they were often together, but Ann reports that the two rarely "locked horns" in the office or at home.

"He was a very low-key guy, terrific with paper work and dealing like that," Roy explained. "I'm just the opposite. We complemented each other."

Although they were supposedly an equal partnership, Ann admits that she considered her husband "the boss" until his death. "I still felt like a salesman ... if we had a difference of opinion over something, he would say I was taking the salesman's side ... I was."

Although Bruce was the boss, it was Ann who got him into the real estate business in the first place through a realtor she met in 1941. She was running a restaurant in Detroit and her husband, a trumpet player, was working the night club circuit.

She explained that the realtor who

had an office next to her restaurant and was often so broke that he had to run a tab told her many times that she would be good at real estate. Since she was making money in the restaurant business and he wasn't at real estate, she ignored his urging.

Four years later, when she was working at another night club, she had another encounter with that realtor.

"That was when the real estate market was first going upward," she said. "He pulled up in this big Cadillac with a diamond on his finger and he said 'you should really get into real estate.'" She again declined, but Bruce went into the business.

"I started helping Bruce in the office and two years later got my license," she said. "Here I am."

Even though times currently are hard in real estate sales, Roy has still managed to retain her entire staff of 12 sales associates, which includes her daughter, Sherry Klisz, and 27-year employee Clare Long and 18-year employee Helen Watt, who came with her from the Detroit office.

"They come to work for me and they stay," Roy laughed. "We're just like a happy family ... When I met Clare she was selling pots and pans ... I said she should sell bigger things ... she said 'like what, pianos?' I said 'no, houses.' She came to work for me the next day."

One thing that has helped keep the realty office afloat is that the sales associates concentrate their efforts not

only in Northville, but carry listings throughout the area, including Walled Lake, Novi, Plymouth and Livonia.

Another survival tactic is diversification — Roy and Klisz also operate Bruce Roy Insurance from the same office.

Yet another has to be Roy's years of hard work building her position in the real estate community. She presently serves on the Western Wayne Board of Realtors finance committee, and has held numerous positions within that organization.

She was chosen "Woman of the Year" three separate times by the Western Wayne Board of Realtors, the Detroit Real Estate Board, and by the Michigan State Realtors in 1976. She has also been elected "Realtor Associate of the Year" by both the Western Wayne Board and the Detroit Board of Realtors.

Roy served two years in the national office of "Realtor Governor" for Michigan, and served as Michigan Parliamentarian for the Women Realtors group.

To top it off, the longtime member of the Northville Chamber of Commerce served for a time as its president. She's a member of the Northville Eagles, a member of the Base Line Questers, and a grandmother of four, but says she still doesn't feel like she is overdoing it.

"It just keeps me going," she says with a smile, "and I hope it does for another 10 years. I have no plans to quit."

Council voices opposition to Congressional pay raises

Northville City Council echoed the thinking of Novi City Council at its January 17 session by passing a resolution, as Novi did January 10, placing it on record as "objecting strongly to the inordinate raises our federal elected representatives have approved in the light of current economic conditions."

The resolutions were being sent to Michigan Legislators. The resolution against the Congressional pay raises stated that, "whereas, the national and state economy is in dire need of rejuvenation ... and the Detroit metropolitan area is and has been affected adversely by the plight of a downturn in our economy unequaled in several years" the council (both Novi

and Northville) goes on record objecting strongly to the raises.

Raises for U.S. Representatives and Senators were accorded recently at levels of 15 percent, the resolution pointed out, and are "contrary to responsible actions expected of elected federal representatives."

As the Novi resolution was read by the council, Mayor Paul Vernon said he would "certainly agree" and "would like to see the Northville council take the same action."

The resolution was moved by council member Paul Folino and seconded by J. Burton DeRusha. It passed unanimously.

In township

Rehabilitation committee to examine fund dispersal

Northville Township has \$20,000 to give away.

The task won't be easy, though. Clerk and housing coordinator Susan Heintz reports that it takes up to 10 hours of paper work per household to distribute the money, which is earmarked for home improvements for low-to-moderate income people to help them bring their homes up to building code.

To help dispense the money, the township has established a rehabilita-

tion committee, whose five members are responsible for reviewing application procedures. Committee members were chosen to include a knowledge of finance and development, as liaisons with the planning commission and the township. One member lives in the target area.

A complicated set of guidelines determines the procedure for distribution of the funds, and the township has set priorities for problems to be corrected with the money.

"Since we don't have a lot of money to give out, we have had to set priority

lists," explains Heintz. "The first person on the priority list is the person who applies with the lowest income and the highest priority violation."

The township gives top priority to heating violations. Second in line are those homes with electrical violations, while those with plumbing violations are third. Any combination of those three violations can also be corrected, she says.

Heintz says that, under the guidelines, up to \$5,000 can be spent per home for improvement — an amount that would allow the township to work

on only about three homes with the money currently available. However, she says if the program is successful that more money may be made available.

"If we get enough interest, the indications are that we can get more money," she says. "We had a rehabilitation program before but it wasn't very successful. We decided this time to try it on a small level and see how it works."

Heintz states that, although all township residents with low to moderate income and housing problems are welcome to apply for the

repair work, the program is mainly targeted towards residents of the Park Gardens subdivision area.

Also designed to help those people is a \$35,000 grant awarded to the township to assist low and moderate Park Gardens residents pay the special assessment tax for the sewer project.

Money for both projects will be awarded through a complicated review process, Heintz adds, which begins with the resident's application for the money.

After the application is reviewed by the committee, the applicant's income

is verified, and the housing coordinator looks over the application, the candidate home is to be inspected by township personnel.

To receive the repair work, a home must be clearly in violation of the township codes and must need a "substantial" amount of work. Under federal guidelines, the amount of money that can be spent on a single home cannot exceed half of the assessed value of the home; under township guidelines, the amount of the work to be done cannot exceed \$5,000.

Medical staff officers for 1983 were installed at a dinner for doctors in the St. Mary Hospital cafeteria January 19.

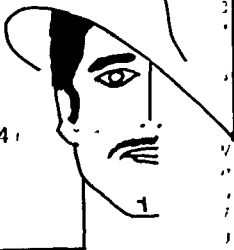

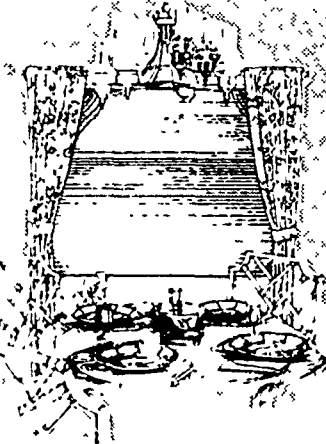

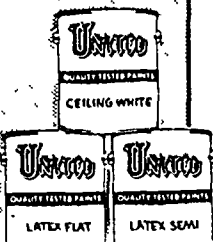

Landfill opponents organize

The proposed expansion of the Holloway Sand and Gravel landfill on Six Mile and Napier in Salem Township has brought out opposition to the project in the form of a citizens' group.

Concerned Citizens for the Quality of Life was established at an informal Monday night meeting in Northville Township. Northville and Salem Township residents formed the group to coordinate efforts to oppose the 168-acre expansion of the landfill. Expansion plans call for the construction of an asphalt paving plant, acceleration of sand and gravel mining and an increase in refuse dumping.

Larry Bemish, an organizer of the group, views its priorities as political and environmental.

"We're concerned with air, noise and water pollution. Michigan is the second worst offender in toxic waste disposal in the nation, and we are concerned with the project. We're working with our state representatives closely; they have been very supportive, but it's become a political boondoggle, it's complicated. We are considering hiring an attorney to sort things out," Bemish said.

Bemish said Concerned Citizens for the Quality of Life is composed of five committees that include an executive level, a petition drive group, a research committee, an environmental group and a political action committee.

"We have about 150 people committed to the effort. There has been a good deal of interest from people four and five miles away from the dump," he said.

"In an ideal way, we're all affected by the landfill, through air particles and ground water. Right now Northville Township and Salem Township are most immediately affected. It's a Department of Natural Resources regulated dump, but the credibility of the DNR is pretty low. We want to know how it's affecting our water. Wayne and Washtenaw counties will test for bacteria in the water but nothing else, and it costs around \$740 to test for carcinogens," Bemish said.

According to Bemish, the landfill will be operating another 20 years because

of Public Act 641 which calls on each county to adopt a 20-year waste disposal plan. "We are interested in House Bill 5956 which would return to the local body some measure of control over how landfills are operated."

Water quality is measured by Holloway at the landfill by taking samples from monitoring wells on a quarterly basis. Holloway sends the samples to a private contractor for analysis. The state monitors the wells once a year as check on the private contractor.

Hakim Shakir, supervisor of the DNR of southeastern Michigan, said that "nothing right now is showing up. We usually compare the samples with background water quality. That's water that was tested before the landfill went in. Then we compare that with the monitoring wells, but it is not a requirement to test for carcinogens."

Larry Bemish acknowledges that "it is a good operation as far as landfills go. But not for another 20 years with an asphalt paving plant and increased dumping. When it's time for me to retire, what will the property values be then? This could wipe me out and a lot of my neighbors as well. There's a whole range of emotions involved."

The Salem Township Planning Commission voted on January 17 to table any decision on the landfill until further studies could be made.

Township examines block grant funding

roads" needed to be identified as such.

Of the \$26,000 recommended by Heintz for fire department equipment, she allotted \$1,400 for purchase of fire coats, \$13,500 for purchase of air masks, \$5,600 for hose, and \$5,500 for walkie talkies.

Heintz said that the money for the fire coats would be refused because federal guidelines prohibit expenditure of community development funds for anything that could be considered "normal operating expenses." Guidelines also prohibit the expenditure of block grant funds on police departments.

That \$1,400 will either have to be spent on other fire department equipment or used for another purpose. Trustee Richard Allen suggested adding it to the \$9,000 already recommended for SAD assistance.

Fire chief Robert Toms said the air masks were a "number one priority" item, as the township's current air masks are so old and inadequate that their use is soon to be outlawed.

"They're extremely expensive, but we have to have them in a large

building or high rise." Toms said that toxic fumes from burning synthetics make them necessary. "We have to have them or die from toxic fumes."

Heintz told the board that they were committed to spending the \$35,000 on Park Gardens because the funds had been promised to match a \$35,000 grant for direct aid for low to moderate income residents of the special assessment district. However, she said the other amounts were "flexible."

Calling it her "pet project," Heintz explained to the board that she was uncertain as to the amount that should be allotted for special assessment aid to non-Park Gardens residents.

"I have no idea whether \$9,000 is enough or too much," said Heintz. "If anything it may be too low, but we never know how many people are going to apply."

Heintz said that setting a ballpark amount was important because unspent funds could not be carried over and added to next year's total.

A second public hearing will be held before the township's February 10 meeting. The hearing will be at 7:30 p.m. preceding the 8 p.m. meeting.

Our Opinions

Right for 1984

Northville Board of Education's decision last week to collect school taxes in July comes as little surprise. At a time when school districts are scrounging for every available dollar, the school board's action was, in our opinion, not only fiscally responsible — but necessary.

This newspaper has long supported the concept of a summer tax collection and is pleased the board of education has approved its implementation as a split collection. We also believe the board acted in the community's interest by withholding the collection of a summer tax until July, 1984. The 18-month advance notice should provide residents enough time to prepare for the split tax collection.

While many argue the summer collection will cause an undue hardship to Northville taxpayers, we believe the consequence of continuing to pay interest costs ultimately could prove more damaging to the district. Summer collections are becoming the usual procedure for area school districts as the way to save interest expenses, allowing the funds to be better spent on the school district's programs.

Northville school administrators and board members have advocated the collection of summer taxes since 1972. While past discussions of the issue have proved fruitless, the recent passage of Public Act 333 paved the way for school districts throughout the state to collect taxes themselves.

During the past month, there has been mention of the school district holding a referendum vote

on the issue of summer taxes. While we agree in theory that "a vote of the people" should decide the outcome of the issue, we have grave reservations about a referendum vote on a school issue.

In the past two June school elections, less than five percent of the registered voters have turned out to cast ballots. This can hardly be considered representative of the community-at-large.

Some speculate the Michigan Legislature approved the passage of the summer tax bill to help curb the impact of further state reductions to education. While we are not in the position to argue the validity of this observation, we believe the argument bears some truth — particularly in light of recent budget cuts.

For some school districts, state budget cutting could prove disastrous. For Northville, however, there are too few state funds to make much of a difference. More than 90 percent of Northville Public Schools' current budget is funded by local tax dollars. Less than five percent of the budget is funded by state monies.

With local residents footing most of the school district's bill, we believe it is essential that their tax dollars be used to educate the children of the district — not placed in the hands of financial institutions even though recent high interest rates created the unusual situation of allowing the district to borrow at a lower rate and then temporarily investing at a higher one, reducing the actual amount paid. We do not expect this situation to continue.

Communication gap

If communication should be present in any field, it certainly would seem that it would be in education. The independent manner in which local and intermediate schools districts operate, however, indicate this is not the case.

The decision made by Wayne County Intermediate School District to collect the intermediate district tax levy in the summer, as provided by Public Act 333, caught both city and township officials by surprise this week. While the hearing of the intermediate district apparently had been publicized in a metropolitan Detroit newspaper, notice had not been sent the communities involved. To its credit, the Oakland Schools Board of Education did so.

The Wayne County Intermediate School District decision has a direct effect on the Schoolcraft College levy as Schoolcraft Board of Trustees had passed a resolution to levy a summer tax when another summer

school tax was levied in communities that comprise the Schoolcraft district. The county intermediate district levy, therefore, makes it possible for Schoolcraft to collect throughout its district this summer.

Until this week, however, Schoolcraft officials were unaware that this was happening. The decision affects budgets and raises questions of who will be paying collection costs.

Both city and township officials will have the subject on their next meeting agendas as a decision must be made within 30 days whether the city and township are willing to make the collection. If they do not, the county can. It appears to us less than considerate that the Wayne County Intermediate School District gave no advance notification that the hearing and decision were upcoming — ignoring any possibility for advance planning by the city or township.

Go Blue!

First meeting of a blue ribbon committee to report on the renovation of Northville High School is being held at 7:30 p.m. tonight. Superintendent George Bell has lost no time in forming a study committee to explore both the physical facilities and such detailed needs as a library media center and science-computer areas as well as athletic facilities.

He expects the committee of

about 30 members to pinpoint and work in sub-groups on specific areas. We like the fact that the superintendent is tapping expertise of those who live in the community and have an interest in quality education.

It is imperative, however, that the input of this committee be utilized in future planning and that the findings be made known. We believe they will.

State tax increase garners opposition

To the Editor:

Property tax rebates available from state

A record number of Michigan taxpayers will be eligible for more than \$600 million in property tax rebates from the state in 1983, new state Representative Gerald Law (R-36th District which includes Northville) reports from Lansing.

Since the program began in 1973, approximately \$3.5 billion has been rebated to Michigan taxpayers. Property taxes escalated by almost eight percent this year, but in many cases the increase in the local tax bill is being rebated entirely or in part by the state program with 20,000 additional taxpayers becoming eligible for rebates from the state this year.

The Michigan property tax rebate program, which remains the largest offered in the nation, will return an estimated \$606 million, almost 19 percent of all 1982 property taxes on owner-

occupied homes and farms. Those eligible can begin receiving rebates as soon as they file their state income tax returns.

The present program provides that when property taxes exceed 3.5 percent of household income, the state will rebate 60 percent of the amount that exceeds 3.5 percent. In the case of senior citizens, the state rebates 100 percent. In low-income brackets, the state property tax rebates increase as income declines. Those with a household income of less than \$3,000 pay no property tax.

The maximum allowable rebate is \$1,200. The rebate is computed in conjunction with the state income tax return. For those who file no income tax return, a special form is provided. Both the income and rebate forms are available at state offices and financial institutions.

Michigan has many problems. I can't agree, however, with your solution. Our financial problems are due to the failure of several past governors and legislatures to come to realistic terms with the underlying problems causing our present dilemma.

A permanent increase in Michigan's tax base is not the answer — it is the easiest but not the best. Michigan citizens are already paying more taxes than citizens in our neighboring midwestern industrial states — income, sales, property and gasoline.

I could go along with a temporary increase in both the sales and income tax to eliminate the current deficit, providing everyone in state government works honestly and effectively to eliminate the causes that have put us in this mess.

Your proposal will give the state more than it needs and encourage the continuation of our wasteful practices. I

believe that the national economy is finally turning around. Let's not kill it for Michigan with a tax increase. Let's encourage businesses and our skilled workers to stay in Michigan by starting to run the State of Michigan like a business and eliminate the abuses that have given us the name of the "Wonder Welfare State."

I thank you for your time and trust that as a responsible elected official you will attempt to do what is best for the state and all its citizens.

My Pictures Didn't Come Out!

Sooner or later everyone has a roll of film that doesn't "turn out." Usually when that happens, the film never went through. Camera and film makers solved that problem with cartridge loads like 126, 110 and now the new disc film. However, we who like the much richer variety of films that come in 35mm have to put up with the pesky problem of getting the film in and out of the camera.

Make sure the leader tip goes into the slot on the takeup spool. Turn the film advance lever until both sets of sprocket holes are engaged. Close the camera back properly and advance the film to No. 1. Make certain the film rewind knob is advancing forward as you wind your film.

Don't try to sneak a few extra shots on a roll. Always roll the film back into the canister as soon as you feel resistance to advancing it. Don't finish that stroke or you may tear the film off the spool. Be sure to press the rewind release button. If you forget, you may rip the film. If the film breaks off, don't open the camera. Bring it in so we can unload it for you and save it in a special light tight canister (the x gray canister included with Kodak film is not light tight).

As soon as you finish that roll, get it developed. Films left sitting around rapidly lose quality. Bring that roll of film in for development to F-Stop, 4320 Grand River, Novi, 48065.

Raymond Kehoe

Consultant hired for NHS project

A former University of Michigan professor has been hired by the Northville school district to work as a consultant for the high school feasibility study project.

Dr. Raymond Kehoe, a professor in the School of Education at University of Michigan for 32 years and founder of the Kehoe School Consulting Services, will be working as a resource person for the board of education and Citizens Advisory Committee in its plans for renovating the high school.

The board of education approved Kehoe's services at its January 24 meeting at a maximum authorized expenditure of \$4,000. Kehoe's fee will be \$150 per day.

In recommending the consultant, Superintendent George Bell noted that "\$4,000 spent now could save millions in 1990."

Bell told board members that Kehoe "has done this kind of job for other school districts and comes highly recommended."

According to Bell, Kehoe is considered one of the foremost authorities on school plant planning in this area and has been involved with a number of projects, including Novi High School.

In outlining Kehoe's responsibilities, Bell said the consultant will begin by reviewing the high school curriculum with staff and administrators and compare it with quality schools comparable in size to Northville's. He then would meet with staff and become familiar with the facilities and the program; as well as review course descriptions.

Kehoe also will be reviewing the facilities of the high school and identifying inadequacies.

The consultant will meet with the Citizens Advisory Committee, staff, board and administrative representatives at an orientation session tonight at the high school.

Bell said he has sent out some 40 letters to members of the community, asking them to serve on the Citizens Advisory Committee. He noted the response, thus far, has been positive.

In addition to working with administrators and the citizens committee, Kehoe also will be working with architect John Argenta. Noting that Kehoe and Argenta have worked together on previous projects, Bell indicated that a sound working relationship already has been established.

Kehoe's final report on his findings of the high school structure is expected to be presented to the Northville Board of Education April 25.

No snow lightens load for city DPW workers

The relatively snow-free winter weather has provided a plus in scheduling work by city department of public works employees, DPW superintendent Ted Mapes reported to council at its January 17 meeting.

Because personnel was not needed for snow clearing and salting, it had been possible for the department's nine employees to accomplish maintenance work at the DPW building and grounds as well as to spend 240 hours in making equipment repairs between December 15, 1982, and January 11, 1983.

Mapes' report showed only 26.5 hours were required for winter maintenance on both major and local streets during the period.

Routine local street maintenance for the period was for 79.5 hours while drain system maintenance required only three hours.

Major street maintenance was clocked at 88 hours with two hours of drain maintenance.

Overtime, Mapes noted, had been kept to 37.5 hours for the period, again because of fair weather.

It also had been possible to spend 109.5 hours on cemetery maintenance and 22 hours at city hall.

Attitude is key factor in finding employment

Attitude is the single most important aspect in finding a job.

Joan Greenfield, a psychologist and professional job counselor, said the most important thing anyone can do is believe in himself or herself during an unemployment seminar at Schoolcraft College.

"We are all valuable people," she said. "We all have pluses and minuses. It is within your power to look at the pluses."

"One drop of black ink can turn the whole pitcher black," she said in an analogy on the difficulty of fighting negative attitudes.

"One of my favorite success stories is the lady who wrote me that she and her husband were down and out," Greenfield related.

"They were on general assistance. She asked what could they do; they wanted to help themselves. She called herself a "Gopher." She does errands for anyone. During the ice storm this winter she couldn't keep up with the demand from people who called asking her to bring salt.

"Now she's franchising it across the country. She took nothing and made it something. Now she's going to be rich," Greenfield said.

Greenfield urged the job seekers to start with a self assessment.

"Focus on who you are, regardless of where circumstances have placed you."

"Look at what you're doing and what skills are involved. It's more than a title," she said. "A teacher, for example, is a highly-skilled communicator who can relate to all ages."

"The things we do and do well, we have a tendency to believe everyone can do," she continued. "It's not true. What you do well makes you unique."

Greenfield encouraged the group to look into as many alternatives as possible.

"The idea is to have many baskets with eggs in all of them. If one basket smashes. You have others," she said.

Rich Lefkie, another speaker at the Schoolcraft meeting, reinforced Greenfield's comments with advice on developing "winning attitudes."

Lefkie emphasized the importance of setting specific goals.

"Make things happen rather than allow them to happen to you," he said.

"Anxiety can be a motivator or a depressor. But the times when you feel uncomfortable are the times when you grow the most. When you're scared — do it anyway."

"Confidence is what it's all about."

He also encouraged people to be themselves. "The more you can be yourself...when you have an idea or a dream, act on it. That takes confidence and a positive mental attitude," he said.

"By looking over your life you can see if you are more positive or negative. Your attitudes are formed by the people around you and your conditioning," Lefkie continued.

"I can tell you nine positive things about yourself and one negative thing. Which one will you remember? The one negative. It gets blown out of proportion," he said.

So how does a person develop a positive attitude? It starts with smiling, according to Lefkie, who said he wants to die with his wrinkles going up.

"Do you smile? Watch what happens to your attitude when you start smiling," he said.

Watch who you associate with, Lefkie cautioned. "They are very influential. When you hang around with a negative person it rubs off, just like positivism rubs off."

"When you select the people you want to be around for their positive outlook, then you can be more positive in the way you look at things," he continued.

"You may need to change the people you hang around with. Make sure the people in your life will contribute."

Lefkie said he knew some people were thinking he is unrealistic. But he had seen positive attitudes at work.

"Everyone is two people; the person you are because of all your past experiences and the person you want to be more like," he continued. "To get from where you are to where you want to be, learn from your experiences or successes. You can set yourself up for success or failure. Attitude is all important."

Another important factor in developing a positive attitude is conditioning, Lefkie said.

"Consider the ways you are conditioned in life," he said. "Be careful what you put in your life. Become uniformed with life. Don't put in the negative — you don't need the 5 p.m., 6 p.m. and 11 p.m. news. Life goes on without it."

"Don't go out and attempt to prove you're the best, just go do it. Create dreams. Find ways to market yourself more effectively. You will have a job!"

Local women enjoy selling at M.A.G.S.

Several Northville residents have a "steady" part-time job that requires them to work about two-to-five days a month in an excitement-charged atmosphere. Some are young mothers like Roxanne Casterline who recalls that she "just went down and applied" when M.A.G.S. — the Michigan Association of Gift Salesmen — moved to Northville Square three years ago.

"We do work," she says, "but, actually, I love it." She had just taken orders at the first show of this year which opened Sunday, January 9, to run for four days. Visitors to town found it hard to find a parking space as the show opened on an optimistic note. Sales in the 97 showrooms were definitely up, from all reports.

Northville residents like Mrs. Casterline usually work for a specific gift salesroom in the square. Other workers listed include Karen Woodruff, Gail Norback, Barbara Tromans and Barbara Albanese who, however, works as a hostess for M.A.G.S. offering coffee and information.

"It's fun to work there," adds Mrs. Casterline, "because they (gift sales representatives) really enjoy being here in Northville. We also see people from local shops like IV Seasons and Sandie's Hallmark who come in to buy."

She emphasizes that "it's not a job to make a living at — but a nice extra."

The shops, which never are open to the public, are filled with new merchandise ranging from gold Imari to pottery, clocks, dolls, Hummel figurines and varied gift items. "We do a huge business in coffee cups at Otagiri (the shop in which she is employed)," Roxanne Casterline illustrates. She reports that the gift distributors had not expected so great a response in January but had hoped for it at the large March show. "Apparently, many shops sold out at Christmas and already are restocking," she says.

The persons credited with interesting the M.A.G.S. group in moving to Northville Square are the Steve Gossards, Northville residents on Galway. They have a shop in the building facing

the Northville library.

Gail Norback agrees with Roxanne Casterline that working the shows is fun. "It's like a catalog showroom," she explains, adding that "you almost have to know someone now to get a job although you see half of Northville there on show days." She works for Crystal Clear, a New Jersey-based importing house that imports from Europe. "The minimum order," she confides, "is \$250." Shoppers, it is explained, are store owners or buyers who must have a state tax number to purchase. Like Mrs. Casterline, Gail Norback thinks the early activity this year is a good economic indicator. The women report they will be working next at a two-day show that opens Sunday.

Country Girls plan for a fourth sellout show

While the annual fashion show sponsored by Country Girls Garden Branch has been a sellout success all three years it has been given, members are taking no chances for this year's event. "We're keeping the same price — \$5," report Judy Montgomery and Flo Morris, who are heading arrangements. All branch members have tickets. None will be sold at the door. A potpourri salad table will be featured.

Pat Eden explains that the show is the only fund raiser of the branch as she ticks off the many projects it finances: scholarship for a high school student; funding for three homemakers to attend Michigan State University College Week, a Michigan Division, Woman's National Farm and Garden Association, project; two ECHO (Every Child Outdoors) camping scholarships at Proud Lake Center, run by the Department of Natural Resources; and funding to send two teachers to Higgins Lake Conservation Camp.

Amy Aaron continued her fine work in the vault, taking first with an 8.2 score to Hietert's 7.85.

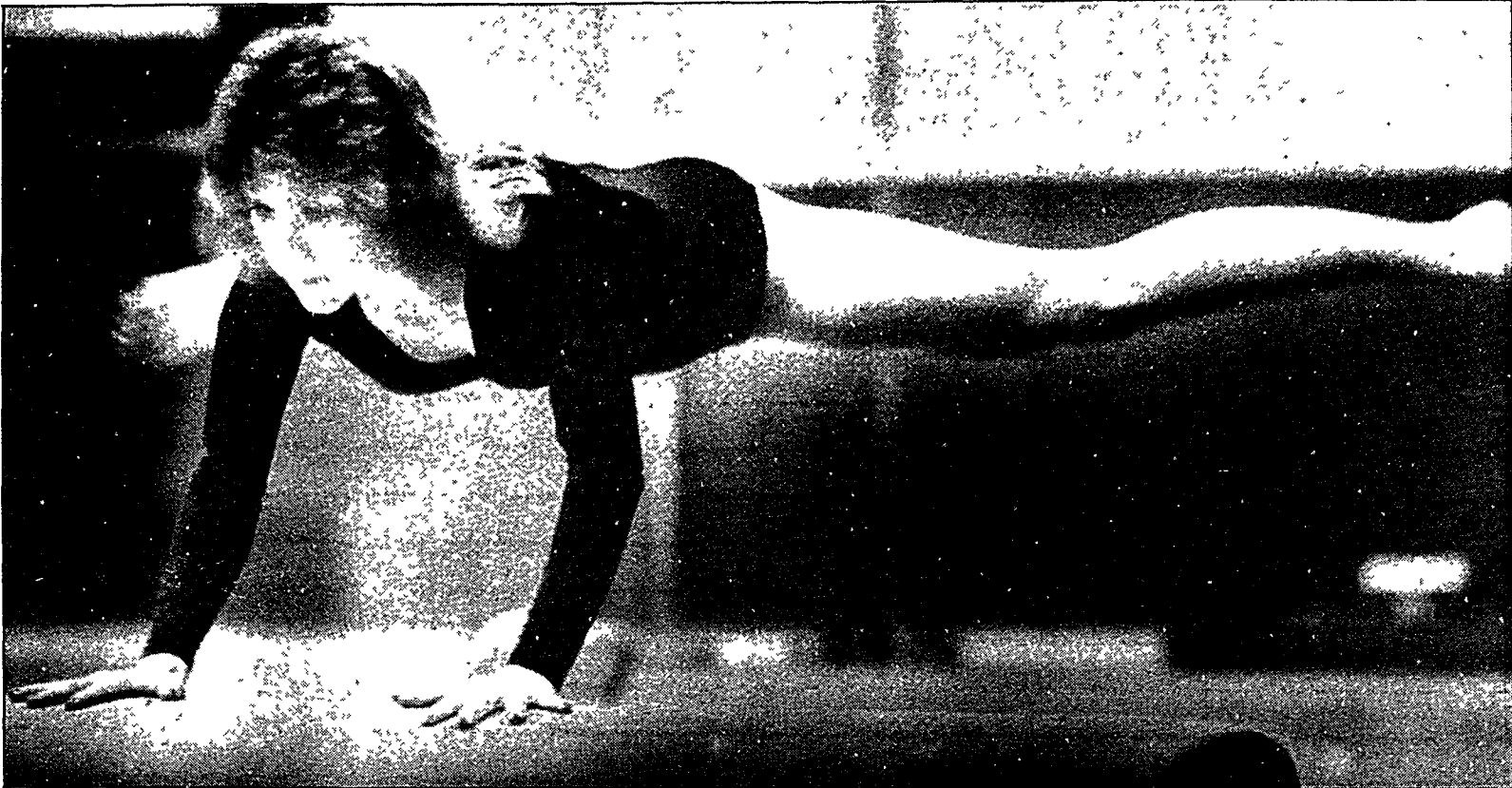
Hietert won the beam competition with an 8.15 tally, the floor exercise with 8.2 and the all-around championship with a 31.2 score.

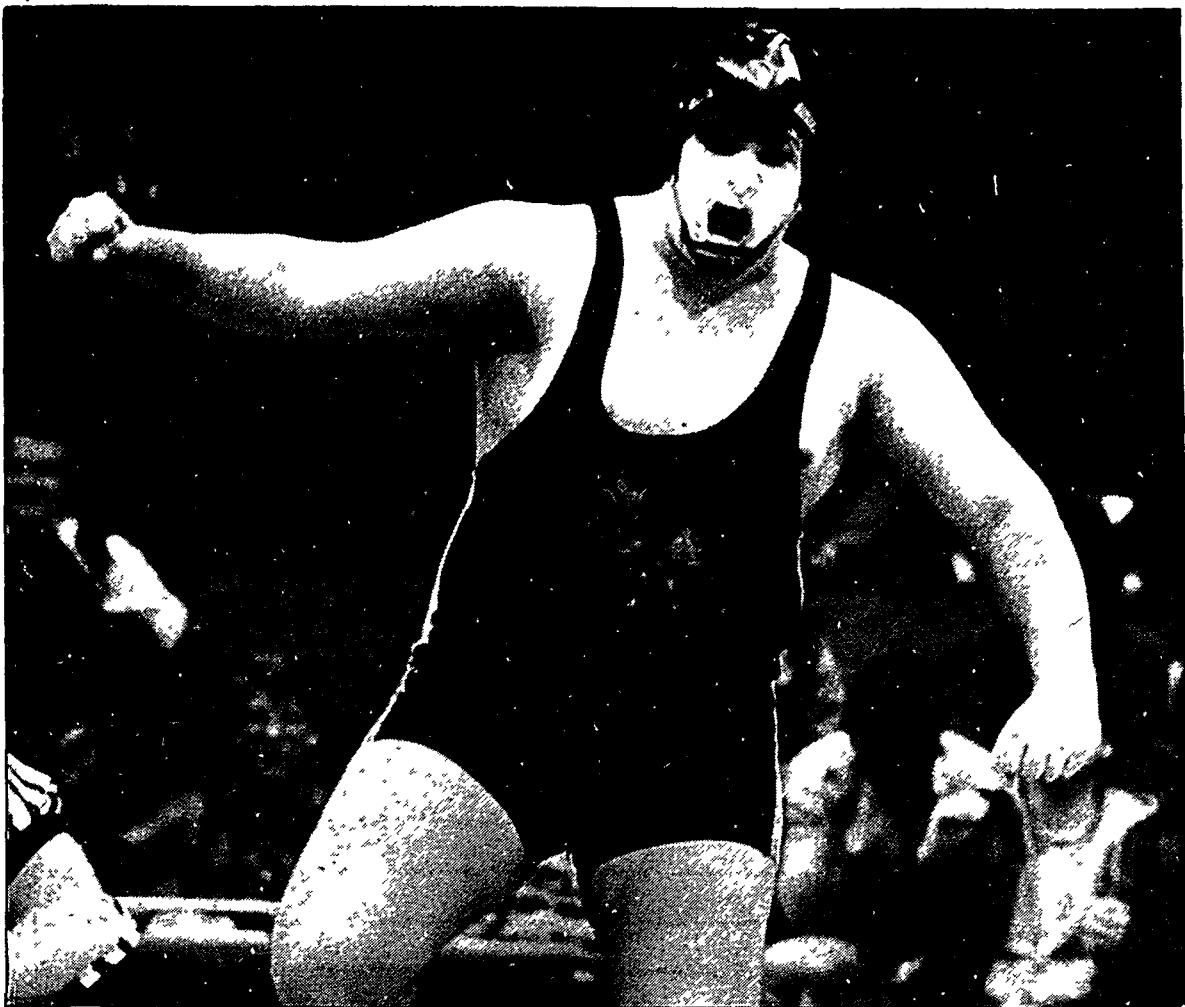

Just call it the long season. Northville's wrestling team lost for the 10th time in 11 dual meets this season after suffering a 58-10 grounding at the hands of powerful Plymouth Salem. Salem, ranked eighth in state Class A rankings, proved its mettle by disposing easily of the hard-luck and youthful Mustangs.

Rob Wolfgram broke Salem's four-match winning streak at 126-pounds with an inspired 9-3 victory over Steve Grytza.

Greg Barker, wrestling at 198-pounds for Northville, accounted for the rest of the Mustang points by pinning Scott Corruiter at 5:48.

Standing a svelt 6-foot-3, Barker is the tallest wrestler on coach Gary Emerson's roster, but is still having problems adjusting his height to the standing position.

"That was probably Greg's best match all year," said Emerson. "He is only a first-year, sophomore wrestler and, despite being so tall, is not real strong yet. He has some problems because of his height. He must work harder on the bottom and move well on his feet to be successful."

Emerson will now take his warriors to Plymouth Canton where he hopes the Mustangs can play a new role prior to the league meet February 12.

"The next few weeks we are going to try and be spoilers," said Emerson hopefully. "We can probably determine who will win the Western Lakes' championship by who we beat at the lower levels and have a couple kids who could place ourselves."

Upsets and pleasant surprises like that could make 1983 memorable for the Northville grapplers.

Farmington dunks Northville

Northville's best wasn't good enough to untrack Western Lakes Activities Association swimming power Farmington, and the Mustangs were dunked, 76-51 January 27.

Doug Buell recorded a personal high-water mark in the 200-yard individual medley of 2:16.10, but once again finished second. However, Buell's 100-yard butterfly time of 1:00.90 made him one of only two Mustang winners for the evening.

Diver Jeff Metz continued his outstanding performances on the highboard with a triumphant score of 176.70.

Darius Mikalonis was clocked in 1:03.10 for the 100-yard backstroke.

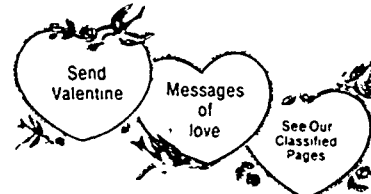

Livonia Bentley slips by Northville

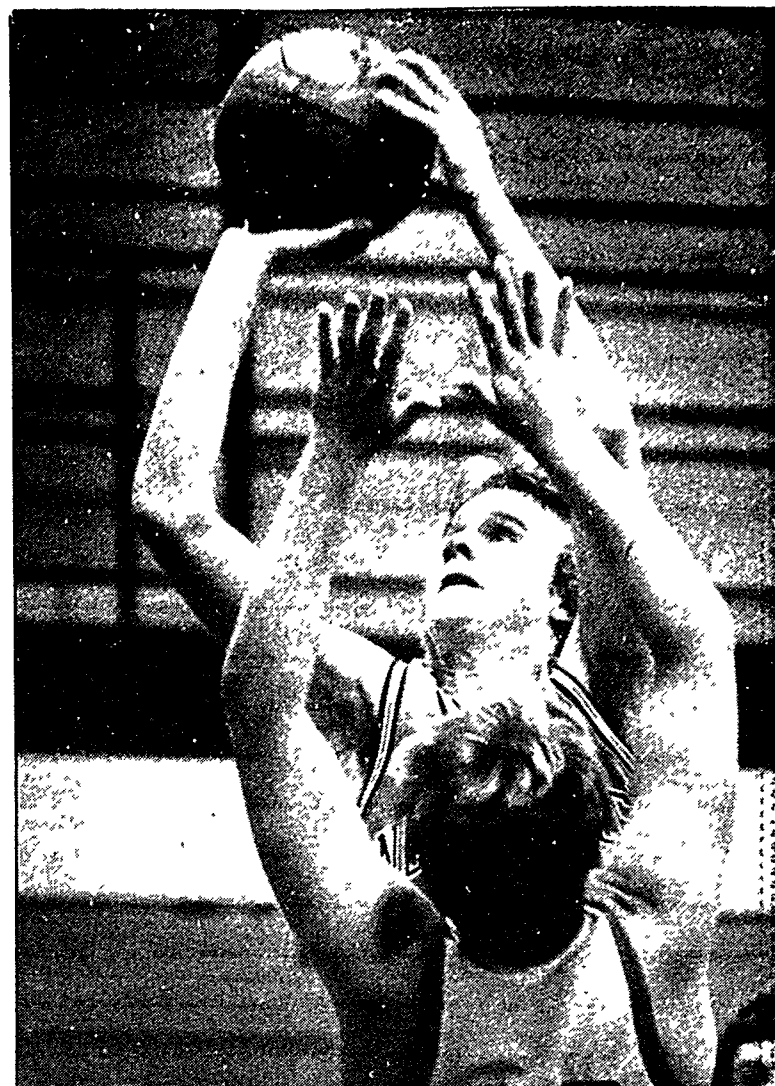

Northville may have lost more than a basketball game Friday night. Livonia Bentley's stinging 41-37 'upset' of Northville, may have ended the Mustangs' chances for a first place finish in the Western Lakes Activities Association Western Division. Bentley, whose Lakes Division won all five intra-divisional games Friday, improved its record to 3-5 in the Lakes and 5-6 overall, while Northville lost its second straight game, dipping to 4-4 and 5-6 overall. Western Division leader Livonia Churchill remained two games ahead of

the Mustangs at 6-2, despite losing to undefeated Livonia Stevenson. Plymouth Canton, a loser to Plymouth Salem, trails the Mustangs by one game, and Northville coach Tim Lutes is starting to feel the heat. "I guess you could say that every game from here on is a must-win situation for us," Lutes said. "If we lose Tuesday (yesterday) to Canton or Friday to Walled Lake Western, we can forget about winning the division and maybe about finishing second." Lutes' Mustangs could all but insure a two-win week by beating Canton, since Western is 0-12 this season and

would be playing at Northville where the Mustangs enjoy great success. Northville was never really in the game against Bentley, trailing 14-4 after one quarter. The Mustangs failed to score a field goal in the period and did not get on the scoreboard until a pair of Mike Weber free throws with 2:10 left. Sticky full court pressure brought Northville within four points in the second quarter, but costly turnovers in crucial situations prevented a successful comeback attempt. Mickey Newman, who was the only Mustang to reach double figures in scoring with 10, sank a pair of free

throws to open the fourth quarter and close the gap to 31-28. Two minutes later, Newman stole the ball for an uncontested layup to make it 36-32, but the Mustangs never got closer than the final margin. Weber added six points for the Mustangs, who shot a dismal 13 of 43 from the floor for the game, and 11 of 24 from the foul line. Jim Thorderson and Dan Rayes led Bentley with nine points each. Northville will travel to Livonia Franklin Tuesday for a welcomed break in WLAA action.
