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School board shuts down ISEP's Livonia facility

Anticipating a further decline in the school district's special education enrollment, the Northville Board of Education Monday approved a resolution to close its ISEP operation at Taft School in Livonia and relocate its students to Old Village School on Main Street.

Though the board unanimously approved the Taft closing, it will maintain an "open door" posture on the decision should the enrollment projections change before June.

Citing a projected decline of some 100 special education students by the Fourth Friday next September, Special Education Director Leonard Rezmierski told the board it no longer will be necessary to spend approximately \$120,000 leasing Taft School from Livonia.

The special education enrollment projected for next year is between 211 and 223 students. Last September's special education enrollment was 325.

Rezmierski pointed out that the drop in enrollment is a direct effect of a 1979 decree issued by U.S. District Court Judge Charles Joiner. The decree mandated that the population at Plymouth Center be reduced to no more than 100 by March, 1983. The Center is expected to close down by this summer.

The deinstitutionalized plans for Plymouth Center have led to the reduction in Northville's special education enrollment as more and more students have been placed in group homes.

In 1975, when the Northville School District agreed to assume the responsibility for conducting the educational program for all eligible institutionalized persons residing in the Plymouth Center for Human Development and Northville Residential Training Center,

some 950 institutionalized persons were enrolled as students in Northville Public Schools.

At that time, the district was forced to lease buildings outside the district to house its Institution Special Education Program.

For the past seven years, the Northville school district has leased Taft School in addition to three other facilities in areas outside the Northville district. However, since Joiner's decree was issued in 1979, the school board has shut down its out-of-district ISEP operations due to declining enrollment. The last facility to close was Burger School in Garden City, which shut down in June, 1981.

The closing of Taft leaves only one remaining out-of-district facility open for operation. Bryant School in Livonia will continue to house part of the ISEP program as well as Old Village School, a small program at Plymouth Center and a program at Moraine.

Special Education Director Leonard Rezmierski told the board that the projected enrollment for next year is the "worst possible figure we could come up with." Included in the projection are 43 students who will turn 26 by this August. In accordance with the Michigan Mandatory Special Education Act — Public Act 198 — mentally

City council to discuss school tax collection

Collection of a summer tax levy for Wayne County Intermediate School District and Schoolcraft College again will be on the city council agenda next Monday night.

At the council's February 7 meeting the request was made that the city collect both levies, but any decision was delayed until the city could learn whether it will be reimbursed for the cost of doing so.

The resolution adopted by the Wayne County Intermediate School District to impose the summer property tax levy this year was a surprise to the council as it had had no prior warning that the district was considering taking the action made possible by Act 333 of passed by the Legislature last year.

The hearing notice had appeared in the Detroit Free Press January 19, but

no notification was given communities involved.

When the Wayne Intermediate District decided to collect the summer tax this year, Schoolcraft College notified City Clerk Joan McAllister that the college trustees had passed a resolution to begin to collect a summer tax whenever another school district in the Schoolcraft service area did so.

At the council session it was reported that the Wayne County Intermediate District would not pay for the extra collection.

However, Mayor Paul Vernon cited a statement in the letter of notification that the district had determined to impose the summer collection. It asked that William Simmons, superintendent

Civic Concern Committee plans to give local emergency assistance

A new emergency assistance group has been formed to help the increasing number of families who need immediate help in getting through difficult economic times.

The Civic Concern Committee was formed by volunteers who recognized that there are people in the Northville area who have exhausted state or federal aid and need immediate assistance with food, clothing, utility bills and medical emergencies.

C.A. Smith, one of the organizers of the committee, said the idea for the organization began when members of the community realized there were people in the area who needed a quick response to their sometimes dire emergency needs.

"It started when the Goodfellows were given a list at Christmas of 39 families, with 84 children, who were all helped with food, clothes and shoes. Then we got more names of needy families after the program was over, and we knew we had to start some type of assistance group to help them, one that went all year long."

Smith, who has been a Goodfellows' organizer since its inception here, says he became aware of continuing after-Christmas needs as a mother called

him in desperation as her electricity was about to be turned off because of a large unpaid bill. After working with Edison to arrange payment and receiving donations to pay the bill, Smith became aware of the lack of a "help" organization.

He said he explored the possibility of continuing the Goodfellows' help but felt it would defeat the purpose for which the group was organized — "no child without a Christmas."

As another example of local need, he cited the case of a mother of three on Aid to Dependent Children receiving "just enough to scrimp through" until one of the children became ill and needed medical attention. "Where does the mother get needed assistance," Smith asked.

"Where does the mother of four children, whereabouts of father unknown, on welfare and just barely getting by, go for assistance?" he continued.

"A family with three children and both the father and mother out of work and already have received their last unemployment compensation check — where do they go for help?" he wondered.

Last week, Smith reported, a mother

called to say she has a 13 year old son without shoes to wear to school. The same day a mother of three called Smith to say she did not have bread, butter or milk in her bare cupboard. This mother, Smith added, was taken to the store and supplied with food to carry her over until her next check is received.

Smith said the Civic Concern Committee was only recently formally organized, and its purpose is to collect and distribute food and money to families in dire need.

Members of the steering group of the committee are Pastor Austin Denney of Meadowbrook Christian Church, Russell Amerman, Elroy Ellison, Smith, all members of Northville Rotary, local realtor Ann Roy and Norma Vernon, wife of Mayor Paul Vernon. They met for the first time February 8 at Mrs. Roy's office. Next meeting is scheduled for February 22.

Civic Concern Committee plans to work closely with other emergency need organizations to coordinate activities and act as a referral service.

"We work with FISH, and we will

Downtown renovation continues

Harbinger of additional downtown improvements to come at the corner of Main and Center was the removal of the Noder's Jewelry sign last week. Orin Jewelers of Garden City has purchased the business from Gary Jeter and is reported planning extensive renovations.

City Clerk Joan McAllister says the new owner stated he intends to remove the present panels covering the first story of the building to expose the original brick. She said he is preparing to bring a formal request before the city's historic district commission this month. In the renovation, a new entrance also is planned.

Jeter, she said, had closed the business last year but did not go into bankruptcy. He contacted the clerk in January, she explained, adding that most customers have had their jewelry items returned. She is hoping to have

customer problems resolved before the February 22 circuit court date. The hearing, she said, was scheduled in an attempt to have Jeter respond to complaints after the store was closed.

Jeter had purchased the business and the firm name from H.R. Noder when he retired.

The sign of Chirri Insulation located next door on Main also has come down as the firm received approval in January from the city's historic district commission for a new, carved wood sign. City Manager Steven Walters reported that Orin Jewelers informally had architectural plans approved at the January meeting of the commission. They are scheduled to be presented formally this month. The new owner has targeted June as the opening date for the business.

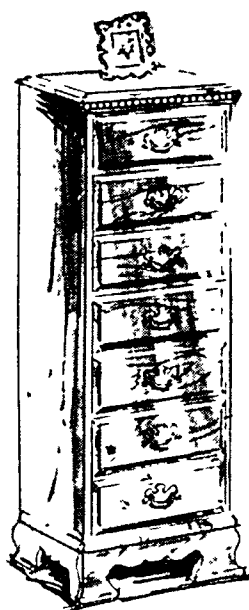

Belanger expansion gets approval

Following a public hearing at its February 7 meeting, Northville City Council unanimously adopted a resolution establishing an industrial development district for Belanger, Incorporated, at 455 East Cady, and granting the firm a partial tax exemption on the expansion for 12 years.

Belanger, which manufactures coated abrasive polishing and buffing wheels and car wash equipment had made application to manufacture coated abrasives here.

The abrasives previously had been purchased from an out-of-state source, the application for an industrial facilities exemption certificate stated.

The application listed the project cost at an estimated \$248,790 with machinery and equipment being \$151,790 of the total.

In establishing the industrial development district for this expansion the city under Michigan Act 198 of Public Act 1974 granted a tax exemption from ad-

valorem real property taxes for a period of 12 years.

In response to a question from Superintendent of Schools George Bell regarding granting the exemption, City Manager Steve Walters explained that such exemptions are granted only on a specific piece of property.

It will give the firm a 50 percent exemption on taxes for the expansion for the 12-year period.

Noting that this is the first such exemption to come before council, Walters said the city was happy to have Belanger expand in its present location and had been aware that it has facilities in other states and was being invited to build elsewhere.

"If Michigan's climate were competitive," he observed, "there would be no need for such exemptions. Part of the reason the city made the decision to grant the exemption was the financial aspect."

Bell told the council the school district was not in opposition to gran-

ting the tax exemption but was questioning the arrangement itself.

Walters replied that the school district and city would not be losing anything as the exemption was for the expansion portion of the business only. He suggested that if it were not granted, and the firm left the community, as was a possibility, both the city and school district could have lost some present income.

Mayor Paul Vernon related that Belanger had been offered some attractive concessions from the Sunbelt states, but had been trying to find ways to stay in Northville in a suitable location. He emphasized that "no promises of any kind had been made" to the firm before the hearing.

Vernon also assured the superintendent that "every request (for establishment of such a district) will be judged on its own merits."

Bell said he had come to the hearing "because I get nervous in a situation with potential loss of revenue," noting

that, "this is the first time in history assessments have been going down."

After the council's explanation that the partial tax exemption could be considered "giving a little rather than losing a lot," he told the members, "I appreciate the initiative taken."

During the discussion, Vernon cited the Ford plant as an example of dropped values when the valve operation was moved out. The valuation, he said, dropped by two million dollars.

In its application for the industrial facilities exemption certificate, Belanger stated the implementation of the facility would supply the existing facility with coated abrasive materials necessary to manufacture the abrasive polishing and buffing wheels, eliminating out-of-state source.

The manufacturing would be at the 455 East Cady address. The firm in conjunction operates a car wash at 470 East Main. Equipment also is manufactured in rented facilities at 807 Silver Springs.

City council approves plans for block grants

Replacement of the boiler in the community building headed the list of uses for the Oakland County 1983 Community Development Block Grant funds approved by city council at its February 7 session.

Retirement of the library addition bond issue and Downtown Development Phase II as well as an area senior citizens' greenhouse project were given priority for Wayne County grants.

Improving sidewalks to meet barrier-free standards in the downtown area and improvements to Ford field also were given second and third priority for the Oakland grant money.

The city expects to receive \$80,000 from Wayne County and \$10,000 from Oakland County in DCBG funds.

The city also has a balance of \$10,000 from 1982 funds and \$4,000 from 1981 funds from Oakland County to be applied to the projects.

Earlier, at the first grant hearing to determine priorities, Recreation Director Ed Kriczys had told the council that

the boiler replacement would be a major help in cutting operating costs of the community building. City Manager Steven Walters reported it would fulfill energy conservation requirements of grant money. The present boiler, which will have to be removed, is a conversion unit and not energy-efficient, Kriczys stated. He estimated several thousand dollars could be saved with a new unit.

The projects were approved unanimously for submission to Oakland and Wayne counties.

Council member Paul Folino asked the city manager what the possibility was of obtaining an auxiliary generator for the city through such funds and was told such a purchase would not meet grant money requirements.

It also was pointed out that the situation which previously existed causing request for an auxiliary generator has changed. At one time, it was explained, the fire hall doors could not be opened automatically as the auxiliary power was not available. There now is auxiliary power for the fire hall.

As earmarking of projects for grant funds was discussed at the first grant hearing, City Manager Walters urged

that the council consider beginning the second phase of the Downtown Development which would extend planning to Cady and Griwold areas.

Under the Oakland grant funding retirement of the library addition bond issue had been agreed upon and has been a continuing use for the funds.

Final decision reached on block grant funds

Northville Township Board of Trustees gave final approval on the allocation of 1983 Community Development Block Grants at its February 10 meeting.

Block grant funds to be dispersed by the board total \$99,000.

The Park Gardens area will receive the bulk of the funds with a \$35,000 allocation.

The fire department is slated to receive \$27,060 for equipment, and \$16,500 will go to engineering plans for the Cavanaugh Senior Citizen Village on the former Wayne County Development Center property on Sheldon. \$13,090 has been allocated to planning and \$7,350 to direct benefit special assessment payments for low/moderate income person not within the Park Gardens area.

Funds are scheduled to be deducted from the planning allocation for a \$2,000 zoning atlas, up to \$3,500 for develop-

ment of bike routes and \$6,400 will go to final development plan and cost estimates for the Northville Township Community Park in section 17.

The fire department funds will go towards the purchase of air masks, fire hoses and walkie-talkies.

In its original request, the department asked that fire coats be included for grant approval. Clerk Susan Heintz said the coats would be denied under guidelines which prohibit expenditure of community development funds for anything that could be considered a normal operating expense.

Guidelines also prohibit expenditure of block grant funds on police departments. The board was committed to spending \$35,000 on Park Gardens because that amount had been promised to match an equivalent direct aid grant for low to moderate income residents of special assessment districts.

Trapping issue turned over to attorney for legal review

A petition requesting a ban on animal trapping east of Sheldon Road was introduced at the Northville Township Board of Trustees meeting Thursday.

The petition, signed by 38 residents of Whisper Wood subdivision asked for a township ban on trapping on public land east of Sheldon, but would allow owners to trap on private property and permit the township to authorize trapping where it would eliminate a nuisance.

The residents were concerned with the possibility of children or pets being injured in traps set in the township.

The township cannot have an ordinance on trapping because it is not a home rule or charter township, or a ci-

ty. The township is subject to trapping guidelines set by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

Representatives from the National Trappers Association and the Southeast Michigan Trappers Association were present at the meeting to oppose the intent of the petition.

The board decided to refer the matter to the township attorney before taking action.

The board indicated it wants to define the right of the township to enact an ordinance regarding trapping and to investigate the authority of the township in writing an ordinance to restrict trapping to certain areas.

Pinewood Derby finals

Northville Cub Scout Pack No. 721 held its annual Pinewood Derby race January 27, and it was a night Jeff Cass won't soon forget.

Cass won the Bear Scout division championship race over runnerup Keith Jacobson and then captured the overall title in a three-way run-off over Wolf Scout champion Greg Hodgins and Webelos Scout winner Billy Tolstead.

Cass will now advance to the district race for cub scouts with an opportunity to represent Pack 721 in the Michigan Cub Scout Pinewood Derby.

Jason Miller placed second behind Hodgins in the Wolf Scout division, while Jason Stringer took second in the Webelos Scout race following Tolstead.

More than 70 cub scouts participated in the event at Cooke Junior High School.

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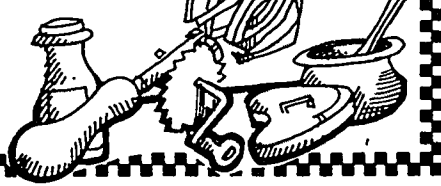

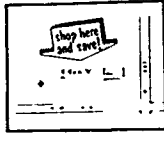
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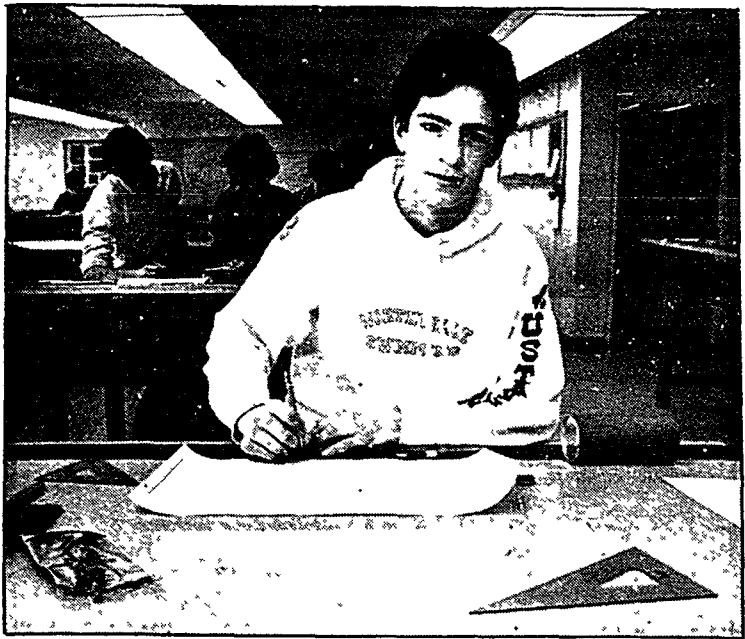
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Voc-ed at Northville High

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A study released by Northville High School indicates that the vocational-education program at the school is helping students cope with life after graduation.

The Northville study was conducted by the High School Parents Advisory Council in telephone interviews with all voc-ed students during their first year out of high school.

The study found that 62 percent of the follow-up population is attending a school or college or enrolled in a training program working as an apprentice. Thirty six percent was using school training in a major area of study while 36 percent of the follow-up population was attending a business or trade school and 31 percent a two year liberal arts college.

Thirty seven percent was working for pay 35 hours or more and 54 percent was very satisfied with their jobs.

Seventy percent of the students completed the survey, which is a higher percentage than either Wayne County or state totals. As a result of the higher numbers, administrators point out, the results are more significant in tracking the progress of the 100 students surveyed.

The follow-up study is designed by the Michigan Department of Education to determine the effectiveness of voc-ed programs. It is given to all districts who receive voc-ed funding by the state.

Dr. Barbara Campbell, assistant principal at the high school, is responsible for the voc-ed program.

"The program does exceedingly well in Northville. We are supplied with matching funds by the state for the auto shop, the secretarial program and marketing. We receive federal funds for home economics.

"As a result, we have the monies to provide equipment to the students to train on, so that when they leave high school, they have experience on equipment that is out in the working world," Campbell said.

According to Campbell, voc-ed programs in the past attracted different students than college prep programs, but economic reality has forced more

students to work while they are in college.

"Now voc-ed is college prep because students realize they need training to get them through their college years. In auto shop, we have students who are headed to GMI or who want to become engineers working alongside students who are going to work as mechanics. They work together and I like to see that happening."

Students involved in the voc-ed program can earn credits at the same time at Schoolcraft Community College in the Articulation Program. When students complete the skills in voc-ed, they are given proof they are able to do a task. Schoolcraft then gives the student credit for the task at no charge, and the individual can eliminate one or two courses and enroll in an advanced class.

The voc-ed program is advised by business people in the community who make recommendations on programs and equipment. Campbell said the active role of the business community makes the program more marketable in terms of useful skills in the working world.

The business advisors for the auto shop are Hank Colwell of McDonald Ford in Northville, Tom Grange of Ann Arbor, Bruce Godfrey of Redford and Cal Cross of Northville.

The home economics advisor is Robert W. Cook from Detroit Edison.

Marketing advisors are Diane Maddox of Payless Shoe Source in West Oaks Plaza, Diane Ruby of Lord & Taylor at 12 Oaks Mall, K. Murphy of Alberts at 12 Oaks Mall, Brenda Kopal of Fashion Conspiracy at 12 Oaks Mall and Annalee L. Mathes of Northville.

The secretarial advisor is Bill Luce of IBM in Southfield.

"We are in the process of review of the program. We would like to see every student leave with a voc-ed background. We are currently reviewing our graduation requirements to see if everyone can be involved in the program in some way.

"Our goal is to have every student with a marketable skill when they leave us.

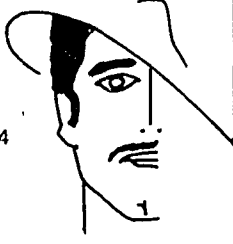

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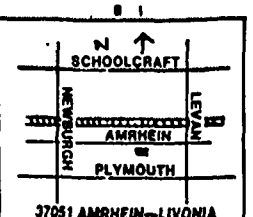

handicapped students are not eligible for special education programs and services once they reach the age of 26.

However, while Rezmierski said he was hopeful that the district may pick up more students between now and June, only a substantial increase would constitute leaving Taft open.

He also said that not included in the enrollment projections are some 32 students currently living at the Plymouth Center for Human Development and attending Old Village School who are being considered for Community Group Home placement. While there is a possibility that these students could be placed in a group home within the Northville School District area, Rezmierski noted he has "had enough experience with this" to assume that most, if not all, will be placed in areas outside the district, such as Farmington and Macomb.

Superintendent George Bell told the board that the Taft decision was part of the long-range plan he outlined for the district last October.

At that time, Bell directed the administration to study the enrollment projections for the special education program and decide whether to continue leasing both Taft and Bryant for ISEP or shut down one of the facilities.

Bell also told the board that if the special education population "does not decrease as expected, we'll deal with that in June."

The decision to relocate the ISEP operation to Old Village School was based in part on a "straw vote" taken by parents of special education students enrolled in Northville's program, Rezmierski said.

He told board members that the parent group preferred the recommendation of moving the Taft program "in-tact" to Old Village School, rather than splitting the program in half between Old Village and Bryant — the remaining out-of-district facility leased for ISEP.

Another consideration had been to split the program up into various K-12 buildings throughout the Northville School District. However, in light of past opposition to a similar recommendation proposed in 1981, that proposal was defeated.

Rezmierski said the parent group was pleased with the surroundings in Northville and "felt that a move to Old Village would be in their children's best interest."

He also said that while most of the students will be relocated to Old Village, the district will add one ISEP classroom to the program at Moraine Elementary.

Rezmierski said the administration, parents and teachers currently are working on developing new transportation routes to bus students, moving Taft's Sensory Motor Room into Northville and deciding what students are educationally compatible with other students at Old Village School.

gladly accept clothing donations for them," Smith said.

"We have recently gotten calls from the five families reported, all who needed food or clothes or medical help. We helped them get what they need, but we must start getting donations so we can help everyone who needs assistance. We have people who need food and shoes for their children. We are in dire need of any type of food that is non-perishable, and we need cash donations.

"I don't remember anything happening like this type of need before. I hope we are only going to be around a short time."

The committee will contact all churches and civic organizations in the area asking for a representative to join the new group. Anyone interested in volunteering time will be welcomed by the committee. Organizers of the group said they intend to set up the Civic Concern Committee as a non-profit, tax deductible organization.

Smith said anyone is eligible for assistance who has a definite need. The group asks that some proof of need be supplied when asking for assistance. A letter from a social service caseworker, proof of eligibility for food stamps or anything to indicate they are in need of assistance will be accepted.

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Special landfill meeting scheduled Monday in Salem

Jack Durbin, director of public works for Washtenaw County, and representatives of the county's health department, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and the Michigan Aeronautical Commission are expected to be present at a special meeting Monday, February 21 on Washtenaw's waste plan and the Holloway landfill.

Called by the Salem Township Planning Commission, the public meeting

begins at 8 p.m. in the township hall at 7912 Dickerson.

The special meeting is being held to obtain more information on the Washtenaw County short- and long-term solid waste plan, most specifically as it pertains to the Holloway Landfill at Six Mile and Napier.

Holloway has applied for a conditional use permit to expand its mining and filling operations to the 168 acres

adjacent on the west to the current landfill. In addition, Holloway is seeking a permit to build an asphalt plant on the southern portion of the acreage.

Both proposals have met with a storm of protest from Salem and Northville Township residents who reside in the area of the current landfill.

On February 2, the Washtenaw Board of Commissioners voted 7-2 to approve the county's solid waste disposal plan

which includes Holloway's current operation on the short-term plan and the proposed expansion on the long-term plan. The county plan must be approved by two-thirds (19) of the county's 28 municipalities by July 8 in order to meet the requirements of Public Act 641 of the State of Michigan, according to Fred Barkley, deputy director of the Washtenaw Metro Planning staff.

In considering the Holloway use per-

mit requests, the Salem Township Planning Commission decided to hold the February 21 informational meeting in an effort to determine the impact the expansion of the landfill will have on the township and its residents.

Residents have complained that the expansion could mean a possible increase in the air, noise and water pollution they say they now experience from the landfill operation.

According to zoning rules, the commission must make a recommendation to the township board regarding the conditional use permit request prior to a final decision by the board.

If the expansion takes place, it would bring the landfill closer to Salem Airport, whose owner has also complained that blowing papers from the landfill and birds that congregate in the area could create a hazard to aviation.

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Concessions' settlement sought by commission

Approval of a complex settlement in a 10-year legal battle removing four major sports concessions' subsidiaries from control of the Delaware North Corporation was sought from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission February 2.

Michigan Sportservice, Incorporated, concessionaire at Northville Downs Racetrack, is one of the four concessionaires involved.

Attorney General Frank J. Kelley asked for the approval. Under it, the company formerly called the Emprise Corporation will sell to Bismarck Food Service, Incorporated, 100 percent of the issued and outstanding capital stock of four concessionaires.

Others are H.P. Sportservice, Incorporated, at Hazel Park Racetrack; D.R.T. Sportservice, Incorporated, at Detroit Race Course; and Detroit Sportservice, at Tiger Stadium.

Bismarck Food Service, headquartered at 221 North LaSalle, Chicago, is a Michigan corporation wholly-owned by Peter Wirtz.

He is the son of the chairman of the board of the National Hockey League, William Wirtz. The Wirtz family owns the Chicago Blackhawks hockey team.

If approved by the Liquor Control Commission, the settlement would end a dispute begun in 1972 when the Buffalo, New York-based Emprise Corporation was convicted in a federal court of conspiring to use interstate transportation to aid racketeering.

Conviction of Emprise, according to the attorney general's office, came after testimony confirmed that the corporation and its co-defendants schemed to obtain hidden ownership of a Las Vegas casino. The co-defendants included persons previously identified by the Federal Bureau of Investigation before a Congressional committee as organized crime figures, including Anthony Zerilli and Michael Polizzi.

Kelly contended that since the parent Emprise Corporation had been con-

victed of a felony, the Liquor Control Commission had the authority and responsibility to revoke the licenses of the subsidiary companies which the attorney general charged were sham corporations.

On April 28, 1981, the Liquor Control Commission ordered the revocation of the four liquor licenses held by the concession businesses. The revocations came after findings of violations of a commission rule which states, "No licensee, his agent, or employee shall engage in any legal occupation or illegal act on or beyond his licensed premise."

The action followed a series of legal proceedings before the Michigan Liquor Control Commission Hearing Commissioner Thomas VanTiem, the Michigan Liquor Control Commission Appeal Board, the Ingham County Circuit Court, the Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court.

If approved by the commission, the settlement will end an appeal of the revocations by Delaware North which was pending before Ingham Circuit Court Judge Jack Warren.

The settlement bars the company, its subsidiaries, officers, directors and major shareholders from obtaining a liquor license in Michigan for two years.

After that, they may purchase a minority share of Bismarck Food Service upon the approval of the commission. They also are barred, according to the attorney general's office, from purchasing a majority interest in Bismarck for seven years. Delaware North will reimburse \$200,000 to the state for its legal expenses under the agreement.

"I have agreed to this settlement and have urged the commission to do so because it accomplishes everything we originally sought," Kelley said.

"The stain of organized crime connections will be gone from the four licenses and the state will be repaid for its efforts in removing that stain," he stated.

Summer tax studied

of the Wayne County Intermediate School District, be contacted "for the purpose of negotiating an agreement for expenses for the collection of the district's summer tax levy."

The letter continued, "If the City of Northville will not agree to collect the district's summer tax levy, please notify the Board of Education so that other arrangements may be made."

The council tabled any action on the requests until next Monday's meeting at 8 p.m. to determine what the intermediate district is willing to do regarding collection costs.

City Manager Steven Walters pointed out that the city has not imposed the permitted one percent collection fee on residents as it feels "it is a tax to pay taxes."

It was doubted that the one percent fee, in any case, would cover the cost of collection.

Walters told the council that, if the city decides to collect the summer school levy, he feels "it is essential to send a duplicate bill," and not to include the summer school tax on the same bill as the city taxes, which always are collected in summer.

The resolution passed by the Wayne County Intermediate District January 26 to collect a summer tax stated the

board had determined "it would be in the best interest of this intermediate district to impose a summer property tax levy to collect the total levy of school property taxes."

Vernon told council that he felt the city had to be willing to collect the summer school tax for a fee, saying that any agreement had to be contingent on payment of a suitable collection fee.

Council member J. Burton DeRusha questioned whether the city should not determine as reasonably as it can what the costs are and so inform the intermediate district. He agreed that the tax should not be included on the city's tax collection bill and suggested that the cost of collection be deducted from money collected in the school levies before it is forwarded.

The total amount collected in both the intermediate school district for Wayne County and for Schoolcraft is about three percent of a resident's assessed valuation.

Noting that collection will be a larger cost to the township, Walters estimated the cost of collection in the city in the neighborhood of \$600 to \$800.

Northville Township Board of Trustees also tabled the matter at last Thursday's meeting until more information could be obtained.

Advance prices are \$3 for adults and \$2 for children, 18-years and under. At the door, prices in each category will jump 50 cents.

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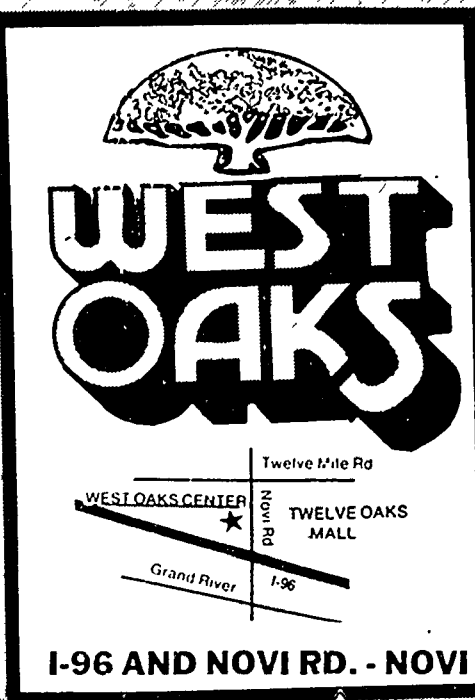

Civic Concern needs you

For many people it is difficult to realize there is real need in our community. It's only necessary to talk with someone like C.A. Smith, however, to learn the need, indeed, is real. As a prime mover in the annual Goodfellows' paper drive to insure there is "No Child Without a Christmas," Smith receives the appeals of the desperate.

Right now, he is the backbone of a new organization, the Civic Concern Committee, being formed to meet emergency financial and food needs in our community. Its success is going to depend on having volunteers — those who will contribute food and money immediately.

The steering committee of the new agency is composed of willing workers like Norma Vernon, Russell Amerman, Elroy Ellison, Pastor Austin Denney, Ann Roy and Smith. Ann Roy is secretary-treasurer and has offered her real estate office as a drop-off location for food and money donations. Smith also is glad to accept and distribute donations. He emphasizes the need is immediate. If the Civic Concern Committee is to succeed, help from the community is essential now.

This year, he reports, the calls did not stop at Christmas. The mother whose electricity was about to be turned off, the mother whose son had no shoes, the mother whose cupboard was bare all knew they could call Smith. Smith is a retiree only in name; an active Rotarian, he willingly heads good causes and encourages his friends in Rotary and the area police departments to assist.

Action's right

Given Michigan's reputation as an expensive state in which to do business, the action of city officials in encouraging a city industry to remain and expand here is to be commended.

Belanger, Incorporated, manufactures coated abrasive polishing and buffing wheels as well as car wash equipment. It had made the decision to manufacture the abrasive coating itself, rather than to continue buying from an out-of-state source. It was no secret, City Manager Steven Walters reported some time ago to council, that Sunbelt states were making it attractive for Belanger to manufacture elsewhere.

The city's willingness to consider establishment of an industrial development district under Michigan Act 198 of Public Act 1974 undoubtedly was a consideration in the firm's decision to remain. Im-

plementation of the manufacturing facility is to be done at an estimated cost of \$248,790.

Under the provisions of the act, the city may grant a partial tax exemption from ad valorem real property taxes for a period of 12 years. The council so resolved after a public hearing February 7, noting that the exemption in effect reduces the taxes actually paid on the expansion by one-half for the 12-year period.

The council was being realistic in taking action to keep a valued industry here. As Mayor Paul Vernon observed, "The firm was trying to find reasons to stay in Northville in a suitable location but already had some attractive concessions from the Sunbelt — we might be gaining a little rather than losing a lot." Given the \$2 million drop in valuation at the Ford plant when the valve manufacturing ceased, we're glad to see the city take this action.

Too many 'perks'

We add our voice to the growing number of those who assert that there are just too many holidays being observed by governmental agencies.

Closing the 35th District Court offices in observance of Martin Luther King day in January and then closing February 11 in observance of Lincoln's birthday, which fell on Saturday, February 12, and closing again next Monday for George Washington's birthday has to delay the work of the court.

When harsh times have made it necessary to operate with reduced staffs, it does not make sense to us to realize that government business is further delayed by holiday observances that usually are not shared by those who work in private business. All Wayne County offices were closed for Lincoln's birthday last Friday and will be again next Monday to mark George Washington's birthday. Both city and township offices also will be closed.

When economic times were

good and government offices were given additional staffing by CETA employees, holidays were an item often negotiated as an extra benefit. Some contracts included giving an employee his or her birthday off. It might seem more fair to those in the private sector whose taxes support government if they, too, enjoyed such benefits. Realistically, as City Manager Steven Walters commented in a discussion of the 35th District Court operation at city council February 7, this is the time to review contract provisions that seem excessive.

To the complaint of "too many holidays" we could add other "perks" that add to the cost of government — from accumulation of sick days to long vacations. Most businesses regard sick days as just that — days to be used if an employee is ill. In government, such days often are compensated with pay if unused or are allowed to accumulate to retirement.

It's time to look critically at all "perks" as part of the intent to make our state a better place in which to do business.

Off the record

Papers still prime source for news

Are you a news nut? I am. But I'm not certain my fascination with news is something inherently a part of me or whether it stems from necessity. In this age of information explosion, one has to have his antenna out for any interpretations that might bring meaning to a very complex world with complex problems.

I watch television news, listen to radio news and read several newspapers every day. The front page, editorial page and sports pages are most popular with me.

Sometimes I become frustrated with and weary of the news, especially when it's bad. Then I more frequently pick up books (fiction) and magazines, anything to soften the news blow to my senses.

Recent exposure to some studies has surprised me about how people get their news. I had assumed television was the prime source. Previous studies that indicate people watch television for endless hours had swayed me to think TV had a captive audience, even on the news front.

Apparently, that's not so. Newspapers, as they have for years, are still the prime source of news, at least according to an extensive study conducted by New York's Simmons Market Research Bureau. The 40-volume report (that's right, 40 volumes) involved 15,000 interviews. The objective was to determine how much exposure advertising received in different media.

The study shows two-thirds of adults read at least part of a newspaper every day. But less than a third watch TV news on a given day.

Television news is spotty at best. A news item might run for as long as a minute or two. There is no way that the nightly news format can provide comprehensive coverage of a news item.

After watching television news at night, I pick up a newspaper the following day to get the in-depth coverage. Too often the whys aren't treated on television but they are addressed in your daily or local newspaper.

I can hear the readers of this column questioning me as a source of this news comparison. After all, I am a newspaperman and a certain bias goes with the turf.

But how do you refute the authenticity of the Simmons reports?

Lawrence Lichty, a broadcast analyst and professor of communications at the University of Maryland, after studying the Simmons results, said, "What seems obvious is that most American adults get the news from many sources. And judging from the exposure data, most of what they get every day still comes from newspapers."

Don't get me wrong. I like television news. The 11 o'clock news is part of my daily news diet. But apparently, if the Simmons figures are true, only one out of three readers of this column don't share that view.

Lichty went a step farther, too, in his observations. He described TV news as a bastion of sensationalist journalism in the 1980's. Television treats "news as entertainment, as spectacle, as distraction," he says.

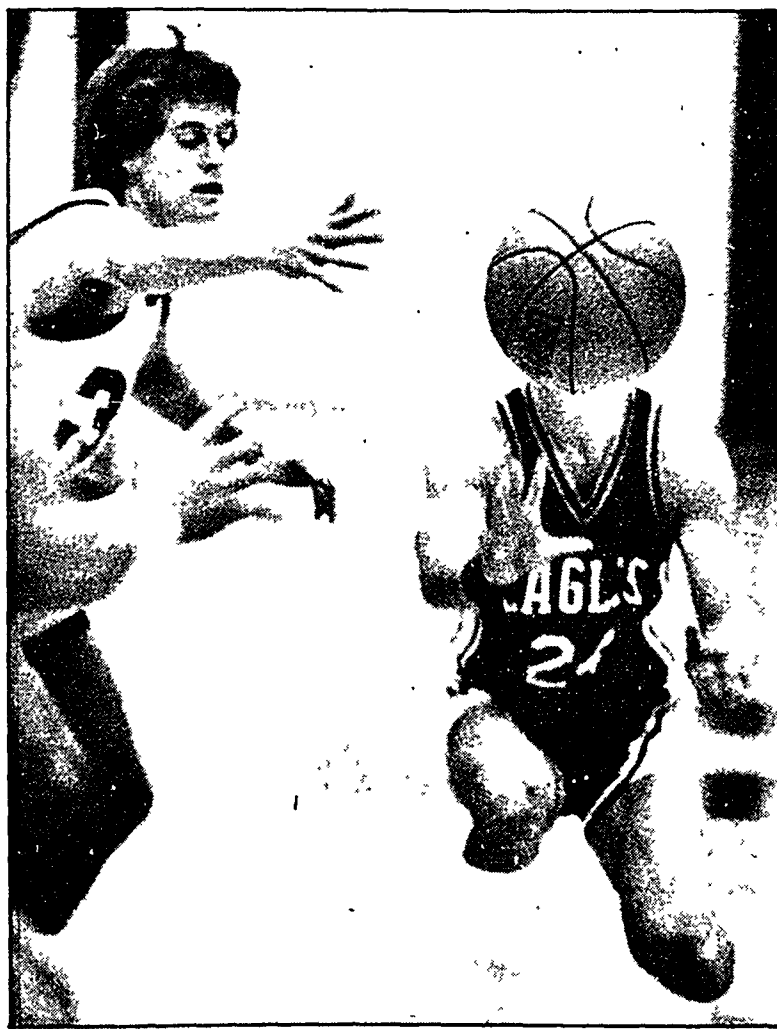
Those are fighting words. I'm sure, to telepeople. No journalist likes the accusation of sensationalism.

In fairness, let's recognize television for what it is. It is visual and explosive. It is show biz. The personality and appearance of the newscaster are as important as the news itself if you wish to succeed in the rating wars. Combine these qualities with time constraints that force a headline approach and you have the makings of more sensational coverage.

Why do people, on the other hand, prefer newspapers? They have been around much longer than TV or radio and are, really, a part of American life. You can read a newspaper at your convenience rather than being strapped to a time slot. The newspaper gives you more stories and more in-depth coverage. But you aren't forced to read all of the stories, nor all of one story. You may read the headline, a few graphs, the entire story or any story you wish. The choice is yours.

"The Winds of War" roared through my humble household last week, reaching their crescendo of destruction Thursday at 10 p.m.

So much for the calm before the storm. Somehow the "Winds of War" was taking on a different meaning.

Geake supports resolution to oppose state tax hike

Senator Robert Geake (R-Northville) calls the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education's public opposition to a proposed increase in the state income tax "a wise decision."
In a letter to Superintendent John M. Hoben of the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, Geake applauded the board's action and expressed his opposition to Governor James Blanchard's proposed 38 percent permanent increase in the state income tax.
"A state income tax increase at this time is, in my opinion, ill-timed and I believe unwarranted," Geake said. "I plan to do all I can as a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee to encourage positive and realistic fiscal policies, policies to revitalize Michigan without further penalties to its people."
"The State of Michigan still must face up to the hard, cold facts that it has mismanaged and budget gyrated for too many years. It is time to make additional budget cuts where necessary, and there are cuts which can be made. It is time to eliminate the waste which has permeated so many of our departments and it is time to begin wise and prudent spending practices," Geake added.
Senator Geake was responding to a resolution passed by the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education at the January 24 regular board meeting.
The resolution implores state legislators and the Governor to "resist the quick-fix temptation to raise taxes and continue out-of-control state spending." The resolution also calls upon state legislators "to face up to the state's financial difficulties and become problem solvers, and to build for the future by maintaining present tax levels, while reducing state services and programs."

Bullard proposes surrogate parenting regulation

State Representative Willis Bullard Jr., R-60th District which includes the Oakland County portion of the city, has co-sponsored a bill introduced in the Michigan Legislature to provide for the regulation of surrogate parenting arrangements.
The recent Stivers/Malahoff "Baby Doe" case in Lansing focused public attention on the problem of a lack of legal guidelines to handle surrogate parenting arrangements. At the present time, surrogate parenting is neither legal nor illegal in Michigan, Bullard stated.
"Surrogate motherhood falls through the cracks of our legal system at the present time," Bullard commented. "These cracks must be filled in order to protect the babies involved."

The bill which was reintroduced this session by Representative Richard Fitzpatrick, D-Battle Creek, has four co-sponsors, including Bullard, all Republicans.
The new bill outlines who is legally responsible for a child born to a surrogate mother. It gives the biological father and his wife the full rights and responsibilities for the child immediately upon birth. It also requires a sophisticated series of blood and tissue tests to determine who the father of the child is, just hours after birth.
The bill establishes the penalty of up to 90 days in jail and a \$10,000 fine for anyone violating the Act.
Representative Fitzpatrick first introduced the bill in 1981 and at that time

it was the nation's first proposed legislation to deal with the surrogate parent issue. The bill was the subject of a public hearing and number of subcommittee meetings but never was reported out of committee to the House floor for a vote.
"The recent Stivers/Malahoff 'Baby Doe' case in Lansing illustrates the problems which arise when Michigan has no clear rules or regulations on the subject," Bullard said. "For weeks the baby was tossed back and forth like a football with no one having legal responsibility."
"If the recently introduced bill had been law, these legal problems of responsibility would not have existed." At the present time there are more

than 20 surrogate pregnancies in the State of Michigan. There were at least 18 surrogate births in Michigan last year, Bullard reported.
"It will not do any good to stick our heads in the sand and pretend this situation does not exist," Bullard stated.
House Bill 4114 provides also that the names of the natural father and his wife shall appear on the birth certificate.
It regulates insemination procedures and stipulates the child born is the responsibility of the natural father.
If blood tests prove the man entering the contract is excluded by tests from being the father of the child, he may institute action to establish parenthood.

RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING PRIORITIES AND CRITERIA GOVERNING THE ISSUANCE OF LIQUOR LICENSES

WHEREAS: The City Council of the City of Novi has the right to approve the issuance of liquor licenses for consumption on the premises to proposed holders on the recognition or determination that an applicant is preferred above all other applicants, and
WHEREAS: the determination of a preferred applicant should be reflective of a community need that exists at the time consideration is given for issuance of liquor licenses for consumption on the premises,
NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the following priorities are hereby established as facilities that represent the community needs in terms of providing service, development and social-economic benefits:
1. Hotel or Motor Hotels with a minimum of 250 rooms. Facility shall have a full service restaurant capable of seating a minimum of 150 diners of a walk-in nature. Facilities shall also have banquet and meeting room facilities capable of handling 4 multiple conferences or gatherings of 300 per gathering or 500 persons as part of a common gathering. The facility shall have recreation facilities consisting of an indoor pool and game rooms.
2. Assembly or convention centers that provide a demonstrated public purpose. The facility shall have availability to public functions of a recreational, convention, conference or celebration nature. The facility shall be equipped with food service and seating capability to accommodate 800 people at a single serving (banquet).
3. Supper Clubs of unique conceptual design or modification. The physical structure of the Supper Club will have to be of a nature uncommon to existing establishments within the City of Novi. The Supper Club shall be no closer than 1/2 mile to any existing Supper Club within the City limits. Seating capacity shall be a minimum of 250.
4. Facilities which conform to the purpose and intent of this resolution but which are deficient in meeting the criteria herein established in determining the priorities enumerated above. Such facilities will be given considerations upon a showing of substantial compliance with the priorities established herein where evidence presented by such applicant tends to establish the overriding benefit to the citizens of the City in allowing the facility. Such determination shall be based upon due consideration of the following elements:
(a) Whether there is a need for the facility at the location proposed.
(b) Whether the facility tends to provide a service, product, or function not presently available to the general public residing in the community.
(c) The uniqueness of the proposed facility when contrasted against existing facilities.
AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the following considerations will also be weighed against applicants for liquor licenses for consumption on the premises:
1. Compatibility to surrounding architecture, and land use.
2. Attention to roadways, traffic circulation and general traffic impact.
3. Proximity to complimentary uses such as office and commercial development.
4. Impact on residential areas, church and school districts.
5. Utility availability.
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all liquor licenses to be issued only after the following conditions are met and/or subject to the applicant meeting certain conditions within a stated period of time:
1. That floor plans, seating arrangements, site plans, building elevations, future building alterations, and other pertinent physical features for proposed buildings be submitted to the Novi City Council.
2. That the applicant's experience, financial capability, history of experience as a liquor licensee for consumption on the premises, proposed food service menus and other facts or proposals pertinent to the operation of the proposed facility be submitted to the Novi City Council.
3. That the issuance of licenses be contingent upon the application for and receipt of site plan approval, building permits, zoning changes and other necessary approvals by Novi within six (6) months after the issuance.
4. That construction be pursued within eight (8) months after the issuance of a license, at which time the progress of the applicant in meeting all of the above stated conditions will be reported by the City Manager to the Novi City Council.
5. That no floor plan, building elevation, site plan, seating arrangement, kitchen layout or other pertinent facts, drawings or documents submitted to the Novi City Council at the time of their approvals may be changed unless it is a reasonable improvement in design or service function of the facility.
6. That the failure of any applicant to meet any of the above conditions shall be reason for the Novi City Council to deny the annual renewal of any of the licenses issued and,
further that a review of any license which has not been activated by the licensee will be conducted by the Novi City Council, and, if satisfactory performance pursuant to the above conditions is not found, then the Novi City Council reserves the right to withdraw its approval and deny the license at the time of review, or at the time of annual renewal.
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Novi City Clerk be and is hereby directed to transmit this resolution to all present and future liquor license applicants so that the policy of the Novi City Council may be made known.

Mill Race Village wins praise as fine Victorian preservation

Congratulating Northville residents for their interest in preserving Victorian architecture and artifacts, Michael Farrell detailed the origins of Victorian art and architecture as he paid a winter visit to the Mill Race Historical Village.

"We should pat each other on the back for the preservation of the fine Victorian architecture represented in Northville and preserved here (at Mill Race Village)," said Farrell, whose many hats include professor at the University of Windsor, curator at the Detroit Institute of Arts, and director of Art House, a center for art history study.

Farrell told the 70 Northville Woman's Club members and guests at the January 17 club meeting in the New School Church that he himself is so enthralled with Victorian architecture that he "braves" living in downtown Detroit because he can live there in an 1872 Victorian house.

Farrell told the club that the beginnings of the Victorian movement, which "cleaned up and streamlined" the heavy ornamentation of gothic furniture and architecture, came in the mid-19th century with the beginnings of the women's movement, the industrial revolution, and an ensuing search by society for its own identity.

"The establishment of the Ladies' Home Journal came at about that time, which really opened things up for women," he said. "The society was looking for a style of its own, not something from the past."

Although early Victorian arts and

crafts remained inspired by their gothic forerunners, Farrell explained that the style of architecture, furniture and painting and sculpture were significantly altered, illustrating the point with a slide of a gothic chair so covered with ornamentation that it was hardly identifiable as a chair.

"A parlor of (the pre-Victorian era) was difficult to escape without being wounded," commented Farrell on the ornamentation of the furniture. "They always had one good parlor that children weren't allowed into. We think they didn't let the children in because the children would destroy the furniture, when probably it was the (sharp ornamentation of the) furniture that would destroy the children."

Later designs, he explained, although still ornamented, allowed chairs and other pieces of furniture to be recognized for what they were. Changes in social habits also made furniture more comfortable, he said.

"Before this era, people lived in a very vertical society," he explained. "They rarely sat down. They kept their chairs at the side of the room and had their servants bring them to them when they wanted to sit down, and then they just perched."

As society became more sedentary, he explained, furniture became more comfortable, with less ornamentation and the introduction of new comforts like tufted padding on seats and backs.

Farrell also discussed similar movements in painting, begun by the "pre-Raphaelite brotherhood," a school of London painters who protested the "overidealization" of the

era's paintings and wished to return to an earlier, cleaner style.

"These men could be called the hippies of the 19th century," he said. "They really transformed British taste."

Architecturally, Farrell pointed to London's "Crystal Palace" built by Prince Albert in 1851 for an exhibition he called "the first World's Fair" as the beginning of modern design.

Designed by greenhouse designer Joseph Paxton, the Crystal Palace was a pipe frame covered with glass panels.

"The architectural implications were totally missed," he said. "The built this incredible building and stuffed it with bric-a-brac, made it a chamber of horrors as far as having too much, too-ornamented in one place."

The final result of the Victorian movement, Farrell concluded, was a "decided change" — for the better — in arts, crafts, and even society. "One couldn't have happened without the other," he said.

Realtors report home sales show 78 percent increase

Home buyers and home sellers should be heartened by the turnaround in the housing market that continues to build after a four-year slump.

First month statistics from the Western Wayne Oakland County Board of Realtors (WOCBR), the state's largest, show a 78 percent jump in January sales over 1982. It was the sixth straight month of improvement over the previous year.

Sales of 734 units recorded by WOCBR last month compares to only 412 a year ago, and the surge of buying apparently is drawing sellers back into the market. New listings by WOCBR members totaled 3,800, a 25 percent increase over last year.

The good news for buyers, according to the WOCBR, comes with average prices paid. This year's average price of \$56,616 is still \$120 less than the average reported last January.

The improved sales picture appears to have spread through WOCBR's 1,600 square mile territory, which covers Northwest Detroit and major portions of Wayne, Oakland and Livingston counties.

In Detroit, January sales jumped to 129 from 69 with similar increases recorded in several

suburban areas. Garden City sales went from 32 to 62; sales in Livonia rose from 42 to 75, Plymouth/Plymouth Township increased from 15 to 38.

Sales in Novi advanced from 10 to 30, the increase in West Bloomfield Township/Orchard Lake sales was from 20 to 41 and the Southfield increase was from 17 to 42.

WOCBR President Thomas Duke said the organization knew buyers were ready to make a move despite stagnation in the overall economy. "They were waiting for a break away from record-high interest rates," he said.

"When that started occurring late last summer, they apparently concluded that any further cuts in mortgage interest rates would be minor and be 1982.

more than offset by rising prices," he continued.

"These buyers are finding a good supply of homes from which to choose. We now have about 10,000 active listings with a good spread in all our areas and through the full range of prices."

Also revealed in the WOCBR January report was the continuing return to traditional financing methods. Conventional mortgages, including FHA and VA, were used in 47.7 percent of January sales as compared to just 16.4 percent a year ago.

Use of such creative financing tools as assumable mortgages and land contracts slipped to 48.3 percent from more than 80 percent in January

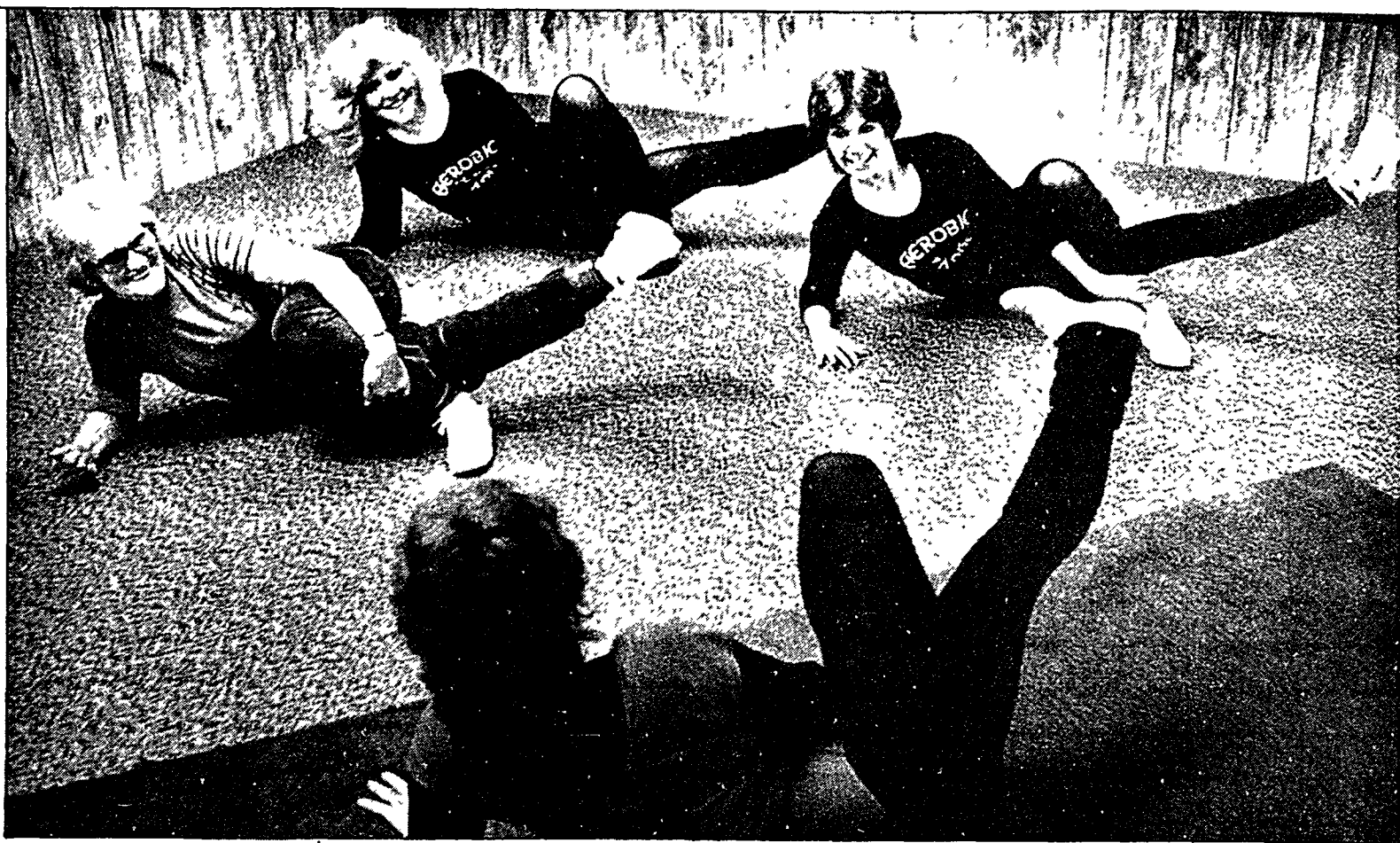

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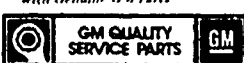
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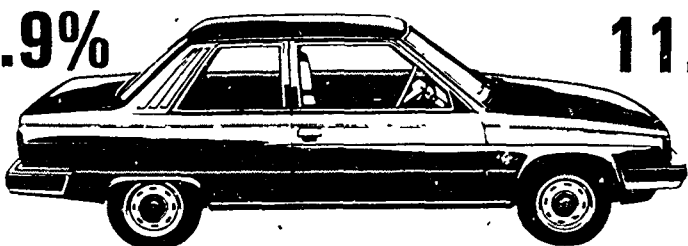
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Car designer turned sculptor earns artists' acclaim

By MICHELE McELMURRY

When Charles Mitchell retired as chief designer for Chrysler Corporation three years ago, his future seemed uncertain and foreboding.

"When I retired I felt frustrated and rejected — like I'd been thrown out," he reflects.

After 30 years with the giant automaker, Mitchell says he wasn't prepared for the easy chair. "If it hadn't been for my boat, I would have lost it," he notes.

However, for Charles Mitchell retire-

The traditional design of Mitchell's works is indicative of some of the more classic sculptors. He says he has been influenced by the sculptures of Rodin and artists such as Charles Parks, who works on the East Coast.

"Actually my favorite artist is Toulouse-Lautrec," he relates, "I like his interpretation — the feeling of it."

Mitchell says most of his work is done in bronze. "I used to work in stone," he mentions, "but it takes too much time."

Though Mitchell claims he "agonized over going back to school" after retirement, he wasn't exactly a stranger to

try's most intense artistic competitions.

He explains each participant, with 50 pounds of clay and equal lengths of aluminum armature wire, worked for 24 hours over five days to make sculptures of the same model.

Though he did not walk away with the \$500 first prize, Mitchell says the competition gave him the chance to work on a deadline, creating a work of art on the spot.

He said the most challenging aspect of the competition was sculpting a figure within 24 hours with "no critique." Mitchell explains it usually takes 40-45 hours for a normal class pose.

Though Mitchell does not often compare his sculpting with his design work for Chrysler, he notes that his 30 years with the company were extremely rewarding.

"I enjoyed the work," he relates. "It was really a labor of love."

"People in the business really have to love cars."

As chief designer for some of Chrysler's early sports cars and later the full-sized models, Mitchell was responsible for the development of new products.

"It was satisfying to see your work on the market three years after you developed it," he explains.

With graduation only three months off, Mitchell once again is taking a look at future prospects.

Noting that his "genre is living things," Mitchell currently is working on direct plaster animals.

The direct plaster method, which means the artist creates his work with wet plaster, offers Mitchell a far different approach to sculpting in comparison to his bronze and clay figures.

Having practically "lived" at his downtown studio for the past three years, Mitchell says he also has dabbled with idea of creating reliefs for the outside of the rather stark Center for Creative Studies.

"Outdoor sculpture work seems to get a hold of me," he says, while flipping through several drawings of designs which possibly could be incorporated

into reliefs on the columns and overpasses of the Center.

In the meantime, however, Mitchell says he eagerly is awaiting word from the American Academy in Rome — where he has applied for a full-year fellowship. If accepted, the artist would

spent a year living, working and studying in Italy.

If not accepted, Mitchell says he may continue at the Center for Creative Studies or take his master's "somewhere in Michigan."

Having recently become a member of

the Northville Arts Commission, Mitchell has been working with the commission on formulating a new direction.

"We need expertise from the community," Mitchell says of the commission. "We need help structuring it so we can give the community what it needs."

ment proved to be short lived. After considerable soul-searching and a little prodding from his son, the 57-year-old retiree put away his blueprints and began charting a new career course.

Today, Mitchell spends most of his time in an airy studio in downtown Detroit surrounded by plaster molds, blocks of clay and a variety of sculpting tools.

As a full-time student at the Center for Creative Studies, the 60-year-old artist has found his niche in the bronze and terra cotta sculptures which grace his Country Place condominium and downtown studio.

"I work pretty traditionally and pretty classically," he says while running his hand over one of his many pieces.

Describing himself as a "figurative sculptor," Mitchell explains that his "work is representative — they look like what they are."

The many busts and figures scattered throughout his home reflect Mitchell's main thrust as a portrait artist.

"Portrait work is really what I like to do," he says, noting that he has done some commissions. "Basically I do anybody who wants to be immortalized," he adds half jokingly.

Detroit's Center for Creative Studies. From the mid-60s until his retirement, Mitchell took several night courses at the Center.

A graduate of the Cleveland Institute of Art, Mitchell explains "sculpting is really my chance for re-entering the fine arts world."

Though predominantly a sculptor, Mitchell says he makes a point of taking one drawing class each semester.

"Drawing is a foundation for any artist," he explains. However, Mitchell says he does not "do too many drawings as preparation for my work."

While he is not expected to receive his bachelor of fine arts degree until May, Mitchell already has had earned acclaim for his work.

Last June, Mitchell was one of only 23 artists throughout the country accepted to participate in the prestigious James Wilbur Johnston sculpture competition at the Corcoran School of Art in Washington, D.C.

The five-day competition, "which emphasizes the importance and value of academic figure study," offered Mitchell an opportunity to work with other talented sculptors in one of the coun-

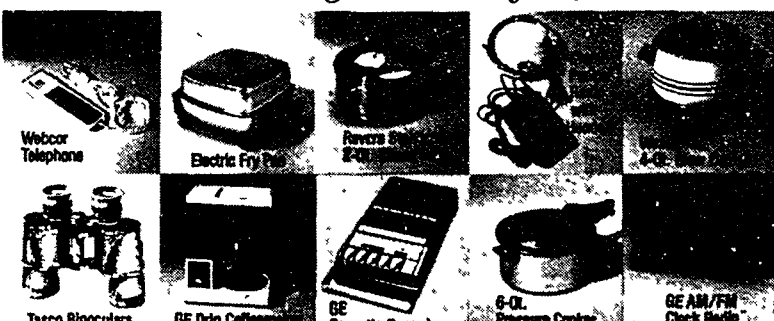

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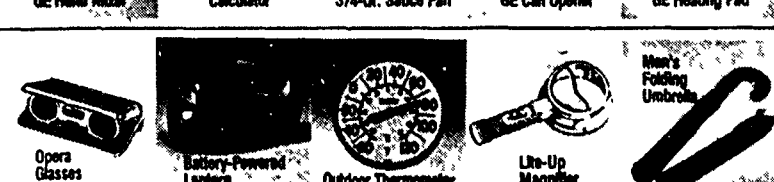

Gymnasts claim battle of unbeatens

Northville spikers fall prey to Canton

What a difference a month made for Northville's volleyball team.

Northville handily defeated Plymouth Canton January 10 for its first victory of the 1982-83 season but came full circle February 10 and lost a 15-8, 15-6 decision to the Chiefs.

Steve McDonald, whose quest for a solution to the snowballing slide of his Mustang spikers has yet to produce anything more than frustration, watched painfully as Northville dropped to an overall mark of 4-7.

"It was one of those games," McDonald said. "We haven't been playing well the last week and a half. We have to regroup and dedicate ourselves to volleyball and work harder as a unit on the floor."

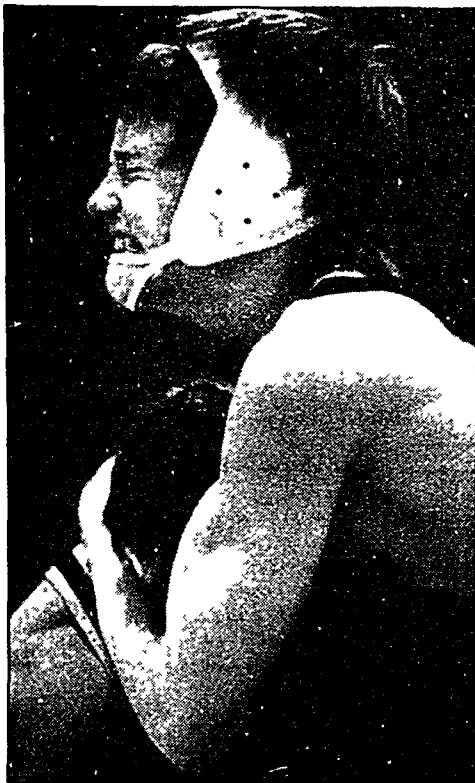

"We wrestled as good as we can wrestle," Emerson said enthusiastically. "We wrestled better than we have all season long. We always finished as high as we were supposed to or better, and we were the only team that really pulled any upsets at the meet. I am very pleased with our performance."

Irwin Morley, seeded fifth at 105-pounds, pulled off one of major "upsets" when he beat Livonia Churchill's Steve Campeau for the Western Division title. Morley also beat Walled Lake Western's Joe Ilacqua 14-7, but lost to eventual 105-winner Paul Boulette on a fall at 2:50.

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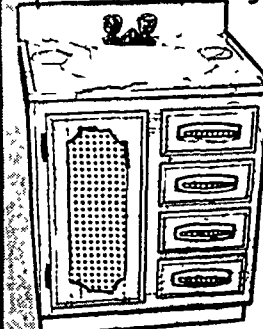

Doug Buell enjoyed a tremendous day, nonetheless, and collected a pair of individual second place finishes to go with his third leg of Northville's second place 200-yard medley relay team (1:51.1).

Buell touched the wall second in the 200-yard individual medley (2:16.7) and 100-yard butterfly (59.7).

Mikalonis added three Mustang points with his second place finish in the 200-yard freestyle (2:02.80), as did Johnston in the 50-yard freestyle (24.40), Metz in diving (176.15) and Adam Swallow in the 500-yard freestyle (5:16.7).

Johnston also anchored Northville's

runnerup 400-yard freestyle relay team that included Jeff Bainbridge, Swallow and Mikalonis. Their combined time was 3:46.0.

Redemption for the tired Mustang swimmers should've come last night against Novi's yearling program, hopefully building momentum for tomorrow's "titanic" WLAA clash against Plymouth Canton at Northville High School.

Northville would have done better to stay home February 8 when it traveled to Livonia Franklin for a non-league collision.

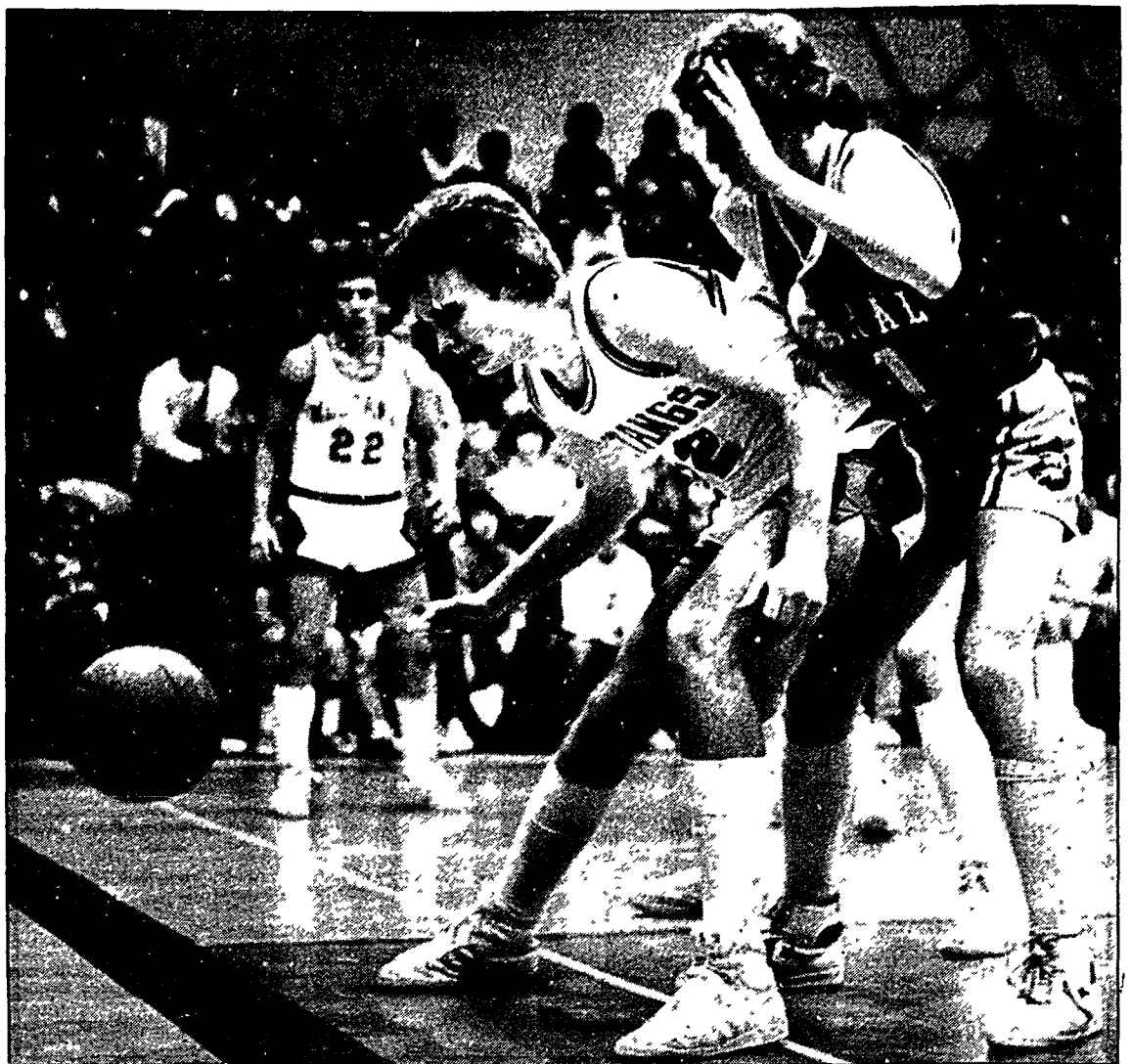
Pegrum led a sluggish Mustang attack with nine points as Northville rejected Franklin's early efforts of free charity and lost decisively, 69-39.
