City fiscal crunch eased by state spending changes

"The hostages are now being freed because the ransom has been paid," city manager Steven Walters told city council Monday night.

The "hostages" were state-shared revenue payments to the city that had been deferred during Lansing consideration of the state budget crisis. The ransom, Walters explained, was legislative approval of the 38-percent state income tax increase.

"With these new revenue projections, we are much closer to breaking even (on the 1982-83 fiscal year) while retaining the horrible deficit we ended with last year," Walters said. At previous council sessions, Walters had presented "worst case" analyses that showed the city deficit increasing.

With approval of the income tax increase, Walters said, the dollar amounts expected from Lansing will not be cut as drastically as his earlier forecasts had suggested.

"The revenue sharing cut in the budget now will be around \$3,000 for us," Walters said. "That's as opposed to the \$60,000 cut that could have happened if the state had decided not to pay

the remaining shares."

Reduction in parimutuel tax shares "will be around 11 percent rather than the 26 percent we had projected. That means it will be in the neighborhood of \$60,000 rather than the \$150,000 loss included in our worst-case planning."

Retention of some racetrack revenue was largely due to legislative action, Walters explained. When money was restored to the Department of Agriculture budget, the legislature ap-

propriated the entire amount toward obligations to the racetrack cities.

Even with the restoration, Walters noted that the city will receive far less than the \$876,000 it would have derived from the recently-completed season had the statutory formula been applied.

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Township board okays \$1.3 million budget

As Northville Township Board of Trustees approved a proposed budget of \$1,302,694 for 1983-84 at a special session last Thursday, treasurer Richard M. Henningsen observed with satisfaction that the township is "one of a few communities to come out even" in the fiscal year now ending.

"We're not in the red this year," he noted, giving credit to the township staff. He added, "I hope we'll continue to get excellent cooperation of township employees — they should get a round of applause."

In earlier budget study sessions, the board noted that the township office operated on a 35-hour week with fewer employees than other communities of similar size.

The meeting followed public hearings on the general budget, water and sewer, budget and earmarking of Federal Revenue Sharing funds.

The 1983-84 Federal Revenue Sharing funds of approximately \$46,000 are to be used to help pay employee fringe benefits.

With other revenues from taxes, licensing, building department and state shared funds they make up the \$1,302,694 total.

Police department budget is \$585,465; fire department, \$93,500. Contractual services with the city for recreation, library and senior citizens account for \$146,283.

The general administration budget is \$109,471. Salaries and building and grounds costs make up the remainder. The township hall and grounds budget of \$61,100 is planned to include redoing the front entrance steps. Board members have called the brickwork "dangerous" as mortar has loosened. The design also has been criticized.

The new budget includes \$12,600 for employee raises, which, Henningsen said, are about five percent. At an

earlier budget study session, clerk Susan Heintz had indicated the township hopes to begin a merit program with employee evaluations to be held later this year. If conducted at the beginning of the second half of the fiscal year, it was pointed out, the township would know by that time if expected revenues were forthcoming.

Trustees accept bid on ambulance

Northville Township Board of Trustees unanimously approved recommendation to contract with Community Emergency Medical Service to be the township's emergency ambulance-medical service at a special meeting last Thursday.

The action followed approval of Community by the cities of Novi and Farmington and was contingent upon Northville City Council also approving Community. The council was to consider the recommendation Monday night. The selection also is conditional upon details of the agreement being worked out satisfactorily.

The four communities had agreed to consider a shared regional emergency service and each had named representatives to an ad hoc study committee that compared bids of Community, Novi Ambulance (presently serving the city and township) and Fleet Ambulance.

Township business manager David Leiko, who served as township representative on the committee with Clerk Susan Heintz, reported that Fleet's proposal was to service only Novi and, therefore, was not considered

in the evaluation.

Leiko told the trustees that the committee used eight areas of comparison in considering the two service bids, determining that level of service was the most important area to be evaluated and judging Community as

superior as it has three advanced life support units while Novi has two and two basic units.

The Community advanced support units would be stationed in Novi, Farmington and Northville Township. It also includes two basic units.

At Thursday's township board meeting trustee Richard E. Allen questioned where the township station would be located and whether the present building, a former Wayne County

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Final say on EMS is with council

The proposal for a regional ambulance service for Farmington, Novi and Northville now hinges on the decision of Northville City Council, which Monday night decided it would make its determination at its next meeting, April 18.

City Manager Steven Walters presented council members with reports on the proposal, including competing bids from present-provider Novi Ambulance and Community Emergency Medical Service (CEMS), an ad hoc committee recommendation that CEMS be chosen and city administrative comments.

Attorney Allen Ingle, representing Novi Ambulance owner John Early, told council he had recently gained ac-

cess to the committee report and criticized its conclusions, which are not favorable to his client.

"You've told us in the past that high fees (for service) were a problem, so we've reduced the fees, and then this committee recommends that you give it to the more expensive bidder," Ingle said.

Told council members had only that night received the information and had not had a chance to review it, Ingle offered to produce a counter-report demonstrating what he believed were the committee failures. He was invited to do so.

"We will most certainly consider whatever information you may have," Mayor Paul Vernon told him.

Ocean storm offers challenge to team of Northville sailors

Twelve very apprehensive men, rocked silly by an all-night gale, sailed out of Green Turtle into the teeth of what certainly must have been the Bahamian "Rage."

It was the sixth of a seven-day bare-boating adventure in the Bahamas Islands by these mostly Northville residents — six aboard the Vaya Con Dios, the lead boat, and an equal number aboard our identical 44-foot sloop, the Allegreese.

John Genitti, owner of Northville's Hole in the Wall restaurant, skipped the Vaya Con Dios, and Dusty MacDonald, my brother-in-law from Traverse City, captained the other.

Except for John Bueter and Jerry Delaney of Northville, the rest of us had little or no sailing experience. Some, like Northville postmaster Wally Cates, had never been aboard a sailboat.

Despite this inexperience, we crewed the large, handsome boats on which we sailed. That's what bare-boating is all about.

Sparkling, warm weather decorated the fifth day out of Hope

Town, the picturesque harbor town on Elbow Cay (pronounced k-e-y) where we leased the boats from Abaco Charters through Northville Travel Plans. We had sailed the leeward side of the Abacos, visiting and enjoying several small islands before pressing on to the uninhabited Powell Cay for some ocean snorkeling.

Powell is beyond the normal range of the Abaco boats so we had to radio for special permission to visit it.

The two-mile long island, ringed by a massive beach and dotted with jungle-like trees and an occasional wild cotton plant left behind by extinct Bahamian natives, proved interesting for the explorers among us. But its reefs were unimpressive, the snorkeling only fair.

As we returned to Green Turtle, the sky darkened ominously. The extra-long sail to Powell had put us in harm's way; we did not have the daylight or the weather to make a dash for Great Guana or Treasure Cay, either of which would have put us within an easy, last-day sail of Hope Town.

We put out double anchors in Green Turtle's White Sand harbor and waited down for the night. The weather

blew up a wet, howling storm. None of us was prepared for the storm's intensity; not even the weather forecasters had anticipated it.

Genitti and MacDonald were up much of the night, fearing we might break anchor and crash on a rocky shore or, worse, into the docks where expensive yachts huddled for safety. The rest of us slept fitfully, the boats creaking and groaning in the traces of the 60 MPH winds.

The radio burst into emergency chatter at dawn as one boat after another called for help, advice or weather forecasts. Several boats had sunk or gone aground. Some were missing. And one run-away splintered the docks at Green Turtle, damaging other boats in its way.

Nevertheless, Abaco Charters urged us to return immediately. Both of our boats were promised to other parties and due to go out the next day (Saturday).

The wind continued to blow hard. Shortly before noon, another tropical storm was forecast for the next day.

Sailing adventure costs little

About bare-boating: Essentially, bare-boating means you do your own sailing. Captain, crew and food are not furnished.

About the food: We carried our own to the Bahamas and Genitti and Don Fee prepared it aboard the boats. Thanks to Genitti's expertise, we ate like kings for a week at \$25 apiece.

About the fishing: We caught nothing while under sail. At anchor, at night, we caught sharks and large snappers, using 25-pound test line or heavier.

About the swimming: Beaches and water are outstanding. Snorkeling in crystal-clear water, over coral reefs inhabited by fish of all sizes and color is breathtaking.

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Ambulance bids compared in report

Bids for a shared regional emergency medical service for Northville city and township with the cities of Farmington and Novi have been evaluated in eight areas by an ad hoc study committee. It now is recommending Community Emergency Medical Service be chosen to supply the area service.

Community is being recommended over the present supplier, Novi Ambulance.

Township business manager David Leiko, who served as township representative on the committee with Clerk Susan Heintz, reported that a third bid was received from Fleet Ambulance, but Fleet's proposal was to service only Novi and, therefore, was not considered in the evaluation.

City Manager Steven Walters and council member Carolann Ayers represented the city on the ad hoc committee.

- Level of service was determined to be the most important area to be evaluated among the eight areas of comparison of services. Community was judged superior as it has three advanced life support units while Novi has two and two basic units.

The Community advanced support units would be stationed in Novi, Farmington and Northville Township. It also includes two basic units.

- Regarding the rate schedule, the committee reported that it is "a difficult item to analyze due to the fact that every company charges on a different basis, grouping different services in different categories."

It concluded that examples illustrated that Novi Ambulance has proposed lower charges. On the Advance Life Support sample run the difference was shown as \$35 and on a basic sample run the difference was \$25.50.

While the base rate for a run was \$80 with Community and \$95 with Novi Ambulance, other charges (emergency service, mileage, splint for broken arm of sample run) brought the total to \$119.50 for Novi Ambulance and \$145 for Community.

However, Community reserved the right to raise the \$80 to \$95 in 1984 if necessary.

It was noted that Novi Ambulance "historically charges ALS rates on emergency runs whether or not ALS services are required."

The report stated that the rate schedule as proposed by Novi Ambulance does raise some question concerning the stability of its rates. It pointed out that the rates quoted are "substantially lower than the rates they (Novi Ambulance) are currently charging." The current rates went into effect June 1, 1982, and represent a ma-

for reduction from the company's previous rates. "Two rate reductions in less than nine months raise some questions concerning the basis of the rate structure," the report observed.

- Training of company personnel was addressed in the report as it was noted that "professional training is critical to providing adequate service." Community had 15 licensed personnel who are Advanced Emergency Medical Technicians of its 22 total; Novi has 12 of its 25 with nine licensed as basic EMTs.

the brief meeting in absence of Supervisor John MacDonald.

The projected 1983-84 budget of the water and sewer department for \$1,369,244 was approved separately.

Reviewed at a prior study session with water and sewer superintendent Walt Holinoty, the budget reflects a June 1 water rate decrease in purchasing from the City of Detroit.

As required by law, the board also passed a settlement day resolution amending the 1982-83 budget to reflect a revenue total of \$1,368,091 and showing matching expenditures.

The board also approved leasing of a CPT Business Products Incorporated word processor to replace a current unit, which, Henningsen explained, is more expensive than the new unit as well as bulky in the crowded office.

He said he and business manager David Leiko had inspected six other makes in trying "to determine which would be best suited for our operation."

Leiko said the CPT leases for \$221 a month for four years and that the current IBM costs \$267 a month. He recommended the CPT as having better quality reproduction, and noted that Canton and Dearborn Heights are using this equipment.

It is possible, he told the board, to end the IBM arrangement at any time.

He and Henningsen explained that a definite feature of the CPT unit is its

ability to tie in with the Nixdorf computer for an extra charge. Henningsen also noted there is free training for the office staff on the CPT.

Saying he liked the future ability of tying in the word processor with the township computer, trustee C. James Armstrong moved to lease the CPT,

awaiting a report from the city attorney, which Walters said would be ready next week.

"Basically, so far we've discovered the payments are not really as straightforward as a contract," Walters told council. He said there is case law derived from a city of Detroit suit regarding sales tax revenue sharing that led to a legal determination that the relationship between city and state is not contractual.


"But the state is subject to suit on the basis of adhering to law — requiring that they follow their own law," he added. "That's subject to some question as to whether the law is subordinate to constitutional provisions requiring a legislative appropriation for all disbursements, as the state attorney general has held."

In a related matter, council learned Mayor Paul Vernon has been invited to testify before the state senate subcommittee on agriculture during budget reviews for next year. The subcommittee makes initial determinations of state appropriations to race track cities.

The invitation resulted from an exchange of letters between Vernon and State Senator Mitch Irwin, chairman of the subcommittee.

Irwin originally requested a detailed breakdown of the city's use of racetrack revenue, which Vernon declined to provide in a detailed response suggesting a personal appearance before the subcommittee. Irwin responded "almost immediately" and wrote that Vernon should expect notice "in the next few weeks" of when he will be expected to testify.

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New telephone directories being distributed

Distribution of Michigan Bell's 1983-84 West-Northwest telephone directory is under way. The cover of the new directory features a photo of the annual Labor Day walk across the Mackinac Bridge with the message "Say Yes to Michigan."

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Walnut action voided by March court order

Walnut Street between East Street and an unimproved northward extension of High Street (from Elm) still exists, despite city council's vote to vacate the short stretch of road more than three years ago.

A court order issued March 30, resulting from legal action taken by Leon Bonner opposing the vacation of Walnut, declared the earlier act abandoning all plans for the road "null and void" due to a technical error, city council learned Monday night.

The order from Wayne County Circuit Judge Michael Stacy does not prohibit the city from vacating Walnut again, so long as it follows correct procedures, city manager Steve Walters explained.

"Essentially, the order changes nothing," he said. "It requires that we remove the dirt piled up at the north end of High Street (at Baseline) so that Mr. Bonner can drive his four-wheel drive vehicle through there to gain access to his land. And, it says that a procedural defect in the original vacating of Walnut street means it is, in effect, voided and has to be redone."

Council is free to begin procedures to vacate Walnut again at any time, Walters continued. After discussion, council elected to notify the owners of four parcels of land adjoining the sec-

tion of Walnut of the judgement and request their comments before proceeding with a public hearing to begin vacation proceedings again.

Most affected landowners, excepting Bonner, supported the earlier vacation of Walnut, Mayor Paul Vernon said, and might be expected to do so again. When the road easement is vacated, the adjoining property owners are allowed to use the right-of-way, subject only to utility easements. Prior notification and discussion was termed "a courtesy."

The earlier decision to vacate Walnut was accomplished properly, Walters told council members Burton DeRusha and Paul Folino when asked. But the proper documents were not filed by the city attorney with the county register of deeds within the time limits demanded by law, leading to the judgment that the action was void, he said.

Walters said Bonner had also sued the city for damages resulting from the loss of access to his land and other legal commitments from the city — none of which was granted by the court.

The dirt piled at the top of High, he said, was originally placed there to stop high school students from using the dirt track as a shortcut from Baseline to High and thence to Randolph.

Council against Sunday field day

Full city council participation in a proposed July Fourth weekend community field day hinges on a change in the intended date of the event.

Council members Monday night instructed Carolann Ayers, who will represent the city at an April 11 planning session for the event, to ask that the target date be changed from Sunday, July 3 to Saturday, July 2.

Ayers told council that, as recreation commission representative, "I told them we'd be happy to" participate in a tug-of-war with the township board of trustees and other competitions.

But council member Burton DeRusha objected to the Sunday scheduling, citing a church commitment.

"If they hold that on July 2, I'd be willing to do whatever frivolous, silly, fun thing you'd like, but if it's Sunday I'm afraid I will be unable to attend," he said. "I don't see why they haven't considered Saturday to begin with."

He asked Ayers to relay his objection, and council member Dewey Gardner added that he, too, would prefer a date change.

Mayor Paul Vernon told Ayers that "if they insist on Sunday, the time will be an important consideration." Told that most activity would begin at around noon, Vernon said many people "don't get home from church before 1 o'clock, and by the time they get something to eat, it's mid-afternoon."

Prize winner

Northville resident and Country Day School senior Abdhish Bhavsar, 18, was a grand prize winner in the Detroit Metro Science and Engineering Fair held March 24 at Cobo Hall. More than 2,000 projects were entered in the annual science fair. Abdhish won a \$1,000 scholarship to the college of his choice from Detroit Edison for his energy-related project. The object of his research was to "devise a functional photochemical unit which would mimic the primary photosynthetic reaction in the green plant." Though already accepted in University of Michigan's Honors College, Abdhish says he still is waiting word from other schools before making a decision on college. 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Ocean storm challenges local sailors

and Genitti radoes that the Vaya Con Dios was prepared "to make a run for it." It may be calmer in the ocean than here, he suggested.

On our boat the crew was far less optimistic. Someone had read aloud a warning in the log book: "Beware of the Rage." The warning called attention to sudden, unexplained winds on the open side of Whale Cay that churned the ocean into a boil. Our only return passage was by way of this ocean side of Whale.

To make matters worse we learned that we were smack dab in the middle of the Bermuda Triangle. (Fortunately, we did not learn until later that one of the charter planes that carried us to the islands had gone down in the storm.)

Three of our members strongly suggested we leave the boat in the harbor and take a water/land taxi back to Hope Town the next day. It would be a costly move (\$500, perhaps), but a whole lot safer than challenging the angry ocean.

Vaya Con Dios broke the deadlock on the Allegreese by suggesting it would venture out first, radioing back the ocean's condition. "At least only one of us goes down if it's bad out there," reasoned one wag.

Later, as his boat motored into the ocean, Genitti radioed, "It's not as bad out here as you might think. Be careful, though, coming through the channel. The wind's stiff and the tide's out. Watch out for sand bars."

His "not as bad as you might think" wasn't exactly encouraging but, reluctantly, we weighed anchor.

Despite precautions we went aground in the channel. Neither the churning propeller nor our rocking motion could free us. Not until the tide came in, an hour later, did we float free. Then as we entered the ocean, rounding the tip of Green Turtle, we were greeted by a sailboat on its side in the rocks, its hull cracked open and its mast broken in half. If we could have retreated we would have done so instantly. But we were committed for Whale Cay.

Understandably, we would see no other boats under sail or motor that day.

When the Vaya Con Dios reached

Whale Cay, it radioed advice: "Waves treacherous. Watch out for rocks!"

Had the Allegreese been in the middle of the Atlantic its crew would have been on the look-out for rocks. Nothing could keep our eyes from the hissing sea. We white-knuckled it around Whale as the raging water pounded the surf and sent mountainous sprays cascading over the barren rock isle.

Although we were not yet under sail, our boat keeled over to the gunwale under the force of the winds. The waves ran 15 feet. Once, while aft checking on the rope to our dingy, I was frightened speechless when the Allegreese settled into a trough, leaving the dingy hanging on the crest of a wave well above the level of my head.

Finally, as we re-entered the sound and the safety of the leeward side of Great Guana, the water quieted somewhat and we unfurled some sail. Off Man of War, the no-turn-back point, we decided to add more sail and make a bee-line for Marsh Harbour. We barely had enough daylight to reach this port but not nearly enough to reach Hope Town.

By now Vaya Con Dios already was closing in on Hope Town.

The remainder of our sail was less dangerous. Nevertheless, it was still blowing hard when we finally anchored at Marsh Harbour. Exhausted and hungry but in no mood for dining aboard the boat, we went ashore for some barbecue ribs and relaxing Gom-bay Smashes.

We toasted everyone and everything,

thankful for surviving the storm. The storm's intensity was underscored when six young sailors at an adjacent table observed that they had arrived hours earlier from Australia and that the worst sea they had encountered on their long voyage was upon reaching the Bahamas.

About the weather: Normally, February and March are nice months to visit the Bahamas. But this year, as in much of the South (in Michigan, too), Nature has dealt some surprises.

About the Abacos: The small "out" islands in the Bahama chain are dazzling jewels, largely uninhabited. Where they are inhabited, villagers are carefree and friendly. Their quaint boat-building and fishing villages are steeped in history. Tourism is growing so don't expect these hideaways to last much longer.

About the boats: Our two 44-foot long sloops (44-CSY Walkovers) were approximately two years old and in good to excellent condition. Each slept six very comfortably, had two toilets, two showers, hot water, oven and range, deck barbecue and cocktail table, short-wave radios, bedding, towels, dishes, silverware, etc.

oatmeal breakfast and an especially pleasant sail at dawn, we entered Port Hope to the welcoming, six-man "salute" of the Vaya Con Dios. Both crews had stories aplenty to share, enough stories to bore family, friends and Northville neighbors for months—or until we next go down to sea, "bare-boating" in th Abacos.

About the price: Thanks to arrangements and economies suggested by Ed Jamieson of Northville Travel Plans, the commercial airline fare to and from Florida, the charter flight to and from the Bahamas, the boats and the food cost each of us less than \$500! Economy samples: we bought inexpensive cameras to obtain half-fare prices, and we boarded our plane at Toledo rather than Metro to save another \$77 each.

About the crews: Aboard the Vaya Con Dios — Genitti, Bueter, Cates, Frank Skinner, Roger Schultz and Gerry Sixt. Aboard the Allegreese — MacDonald, Delaney, Fee, Jim Harris, Bill Zimmer and myself. All but MacDonald and Zimmer are Northville residents. Genitti, Skinner, Zimmer and I sailed together in the Bahamas three years ago. Genitti crews for prize-winning sailboats in the Great Lakes races, and MacDonald owns and sails a 24-footer in the bay at Traverse City.

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
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
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Bare boating

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

Plans for new Beck Road park by prison presented

Preliminary site plans for a community park on Beck Road are "interesting" but should be based on more extensive study of recreation department needs, township planners said last week.

A tentative site plan showing three ball diamonds, a soccer field, an exercise track and community building/fire hall was developed by the township planning consultant in accordance with earlier recreation department documents and presented to the planning commission last week Tuesday.

But, Commissioner Marvin Gans said, it was impossible to evaluate the site plan without a study of goals intended for the park.

"We don't know how the recreation department plans to use the park," he said. "Maybe this is what we need, but you have to make some basic decisions. Are you anticipating a lot of senior citizens using the facility? Maybe we'd need some park benches or picnic tables in addition to playing and exercising areas."

"How many people do you expect to use this park? And for what purposes? Until you know all that, you can't really decide what to include. And we can't really tell you if it's a good plan."

Villican-Leman representatives said the plan for the park was based on preliminary drawings included in the recreation department master plan.

Claude Coates said the site plan would next be shown to the recreation commission for its reactions.

The park would be on a parcel of land bound on the south by Phoenix Correctional Institution and the new, as-yet-

unamed prison soon be constructed, and on the north by Our Lady of Providence School.

The land is owned by the state department of corrections, which has no further use for it. Sale of the land to the

township was approved by the Legislature last year, but the exchange has not been completed.

Trustee Richard Allen, who is also a planning commissioner, said talks are under way in an effort to remove restrictions in the enabling legislation that would prohibit use of the land for any other than recreation uses. Preliminary plans call for water and sewer and/or fire department uses in addition to recreation.

Allen also noted that the township cannot buy land without a vote of the people and, although the price is expected to be nominal, the property cannot properly be considered the

township's prior to that vote.

The Villican-Leman site plan was financed by federal grant money appropriated to planning projects.

It was developed in cooperation with correctional officials in order to develop landscaping that separates the park from the prison yet does not impair prison security.

Commissioner Bernard Baldwin expressed concern that the exercise track portion of the land is within 100 yards of the Phoenix perimeter. He was told there is a significant elevation difference between the park and prison lands, and that trees in the area provide additional screening.

Negotiations opening for city police, DPW

Contract negotiations between the city police and DPW unions will begin soon with establishment of a city negotiating team Monday.

City council was in receipt of notices from both the Police Officers Association of Michigan (POAM), bargaining agent for police officers below the grade of sergeant, and AFSCME (American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees) representing DPW workers, asking that talks begin.

The AFSCME letter, dated March 24, asked that meetings begin April 5 or 6, which Mayor Paul Vernon called "a couple of impractical dates."

It also stated a list of opening demands for AFSCME Local 2720 employees including:

- A seven percent wage increase;
- An additional vacation day annually;
- A paid lunch period during an eight-hour work day;
- Weekly paychecks;
- And replacement work coats and pants "as needed";

Other demands would increase payable "accumulated" days and payment rates on retirement or quitting with 10 years seniority and increase layoff and recall accumulation.

St. Louis seeks board post

James St. Louis, 32, of Livonia, is making sure there will be a contest for the six-year trustee posts at Schoolcraft College.

The eight-year resident announced he would seek one of the three posts, becoming the fourth probable candidate.

The election is June 13. A two-year post also will be filled.

St. Louis is a juvenile investigations officer for the Farmington Hills police department. A candidate for a master of arts in public administration from Central Michigan University, he has a bachelor of science and associate of arts degrees from Madonna College.

He describes himself as founder and president of the Michigan Institute of Law Enforcement, which gives

seminars for public safety department members. He is a credit union officer and on the Salvation Army board in Farmington Hills.

His professional memberships include the Police Officers Association of Michigan, Crime Prevention Association of Michigan, Michigan-Ontario Juvenile Officers Association and the National Association of State Directors of Law Enforcement Training.

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
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
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Police blotter

Stolen car may have transported hospital escapees

...In the Township

Police investigating the theft of a car from the parking lot of the Six and Park party store believe it may have been taken by a pair of escapees from Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital.

The car was left idling, unlocked with the keys in the ignition while the Beal Street resident-owner went into the store about 8:50 p.m. March 29. When he returned, the 1974 Plymouth Duster was being driven out of the lot by two white males who had been overheard to say they were waiting for a taxi to take them to Detroit.

Meanwhile, police had taken a report from NRPH that two young white male patients had left the hospital grounds at 7:30 p.m. and could not be found.

A cab company employee confirmed having received a call requesting a taxi to Detroit, but said the caller neglected to leave his name or location.

The car, valued at \$1,600, was found two days later in Detroit with a flat tire, damaged ignition and missing its battery.

A \$600 radio was stolen and \$300 damage done to a 1981 BMW 320i the morning of April 2, police reports indicate.

The car was parked at a Timberlane residence between midnight and 10:30 a.m. When the owner returned to the car he found the left rear window, valued at \$300, had been broken out of the car. The original equipment AM-FM cassette stereo unit had been carefully removed from the car without damaging the dashboard, the reporting officer noted.

Four wire wheel covers valued at \$420 were reported stolen from a 1981 Ford Mustang parked in an Innsbrook lot between 9:20 p.m. March 28 and 9 a.m. March 29.

A BB-gun pellet is believed responsible for \$250 damage to a window at a Pickford residence, police said.

The thermal pane window, measuring 20-inches by five-feet, was cracked and had a hole in it similar to those caused by BBs, the police report stated.

The owner of the home told police youths had been seen in the neighborhood using BB guns, and that the damage may have been accidental. The incident occurred sometime between March 15 and April 2.

...In the City

Police are awaiting the results of tests to determine if a raccoon that bit a man last week was rabid.

The man was in the backyard of a Fairbrook residence when the raccoon, apparently unprovoked, bit him on the right leg above the knee, police said.

The victim was treated at Providence Hospital and released. The animal was shot and its head turned over to county health authorities for a determination of whether it had rabies.

Vandals broke decorative lights and other items at a Battleford residence, totaling more than \$400 damage, police said.

The incident occurred while the owner was away from home between March 26 and 30. Broken were three smoked-glass light globes valued at \$90 and the glass in six decorative two-foot tall lamps lining the driveway valued at \$20 each. In addition, \$25 damage was done in breaking glass out of a storm door and a \$50 intercom head was torn from its mount.

Two high-back buckets seats and other items totaling \$700 value were reported stolen from a new 1983 Ford Escort parked in a Novi Road apartment complex lot April 2.

A neighbor's car was also broken into, police found.

One wheel and tire was reported stolen from a new 1983 Renault Alliance parked in the Downs' main lot March 31, police said.

Missing were a \$20 Renault wheel rim and its attached \$50 Michelin radial tire.

Post office investigating thefts of mail in township

Federal authorities are investigating a string of mail thefts in Northville Township, township police and postmaster Wallace Cates said.

At least four separate mailboxes have been robbed once or more often in the last two weeks, police reports show.

Two mailboxes on Woodbend and one each on Greenridge and Seven Mile Road were reportedly robbed of mail.

A Chigwidden resident found Easter cards and other envelopes torn in half on the ground near Eight Mile Road

east of North Beacon Woods March 31. Police speculated that the thief or thieves were hoping to find money in the cards.

A Seven Mile resident reported he had not received several bills recently and believed them to be stolen. Some 400 shares of K-Mart corporation stock may also have been taken, he told police.

Township police have turned the case over to federal authorities.

Handicapped parking spots reduced

There will be three fewer parking spaces designated for handicapped persons in city lot 4 behind the M.A.G.S. building, and relocation of such spaces in other lots under a traffic control order approved by city council Monday.

The present six handicapped slots in city lot 4, most of which are unused much of the time, will be reduced to just the first three spaces on the west side of aisle three east of Wing.

Other handicapped-designated spots will be:

— In the lot at Main and Hutton, two spaces south

of the wheelchair ramp next to a building;

— City lot 1 (east of Northville Drugs), the first two spaces on the west side of the lot, just south of Main;

— In city lot 2, the first three spaces west of the Main Street entrance to the lot in the front row, facing Main. These three are close to the wheelchair ramp in the southeast corner of the lot.

When weather permits, signs will be erected and symbols painted on the spaces designated.

Liberal arts faculty granted leaves

Four faculty members, all from liberal arts, have received sabbatical leaves from the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees.

"It will serve the areas of the spirit," said Conway Jeffress, academic vice president. "While much emphasis has been put on the improvement and renewal of our technical faculty, we do not wish to forget the needs and interests of our liberal arts faculty."

Leaves were granted to:

• John G. Nathan, an English department faculty member and journalism instructor since 1975 and advisor to the Campus Globe student newspaper. He will use the winter semester of 1984 to enroll in the journalism graduate program at Wayne State University and spend spring in England working as an unpaid copy reader for the Oxford University Press.

• Joanne Stein, English department instructor since 1969. She will use the winter and spring of 1984 to write poetry and enroll in graduate literature courses at the University of Michigan. Besides improving her instruction in poetry courses, she plans to incorporate poetry into English 102 as subjects for research papers. Her poems have been published in *Empyrean*, a U-M literary publication; *The Alternative Review of Literature and Politics*, *Ann Arbor*; and *Foundry*, a forthcoming journal.

• Albert Agosti, sociology instructor since 1965. He will use the 1983-84 school year to write a

sociology text "dealing with the changing conditions of contemporary society" to be used in one or more of his classes. "Knowledge acquired will be instrumental in modifying existing approaches to all sociology classes," according to his proposal.

• Sumitae M. Chaudhery, an English faculty member since 1968. She will use the fall 1983 semester to study several British Commonwealth writers — Ruth Jhabvala, V.S. Naipaul and Kamala Taylor Markandaya, "all of whom write in one language but from different cultural backgrounds." The result of her research will be a bibliography of primary and secondary sources of works of criticism. She will incorporate her new material in courses on short fiction and the novel.

Jeffress said the college will have no difficulty replacing them with part-time and supplemental instructors with no impact on the budget.

He told trustees Schoolcraft is working on faculty development in other ways:

"We are offering a small amount of release time for faculty members to engage in professional level work other than the teaching of regular classes."

"We are seeking to develop internships with corporations such as General Motors and Ford, and we have given large amounts of release time in conjunction with grants received."

"We offered seminars for faculty and staff on microcomputers, and we are utilizing leaves to encourage professional and personal renewal."

Students in medical fields find jobs

There is little talk of economic recession in the health care fields.

"The future bodes well for nursing. Sick people will have less care from physicians and more from nurses," according to Clay Fechter, assistant dean for business at Schoolcraft College.

Fechter has given an up-beat summary to the board of trustees of how Schoolcraft graduates are faring on state examinations and in the job market.

Registered Nurses — Of 85 who will graduate as registered nurses, 59 already have jobs lined up at salaries of \$19,000 and up.

"Many of the other 26 are being courted," he added. Last year, 94 percent of Schoolcraft's graduates passed the state exam. An average of 15-20 percent of each incoming class of 90 students are men.

Licensed Practical Nurses — "There is much talk of declining opportunities, but we've not found it," Fechter said. Last year, 95 percent passed the state exam. Salaries start at \$14,000. Thirty were admitted to the program last fall, and 26 are still in. One-fourth are males.

Medical Lab Technician — Starting salaries are around \$14,500. Last year, 94 percent passed the

state exam compared to 90 percent the year before. About 24 start the program each fall.

Occupational Therapy — "We've never had a failure on the state exam," Fechter said. Starting salary is about \$11,000. Graduates are well received in the job market and Garden City Osteopathic Hospital is "frankly courting them," he added. About 25 are admitted to the program each fall and all are female.

Medical Record Technologists — Job opportunities are rated just "good" by Dean Ted Diebel of the Garden City Center, where this program is located. Starting salaries are in the \$13,500 to \$14,000 range. Last year, 83 percent of Schoolcraft's graduates passed the state exam the first time. All but one of the 24 graduates in the Class of 1982 are employed in the field. There are no males in the program.

Board chairperson Harry Greenleaf said he wondered about the future of the field, with hospital closings and more at-home care.

"With all the lawsuits," Fechter said, "hospitals are not about to cut the number of tests. Occupational therapy is growing as well."

Forensics team takes honors

Three Northville High School students took top honors in the March 25 district-wide forensics competition held at North Farmington High School.

NHS student Tom Ducker took second place in Impromptu Speaking with teammate Rick Housel taking third place in Extemporaneous Speaking and Evelyn Smith placing alternate in Storytelling.

The three members of the Northville High School Forensics Team will compete at the regional level on April 26.

Garden show on cable TV

Cable television viewers in Northville, Plymouth and Canton are invited to watch a 30-program home gardening series on Channel 16 beginning this week.

Scheduled as a public service of Schoolcraft College Community Services, programs will cover the fundamentals of indoor and outdoor gardening. Topics will include planting for patios and balconies, gardening in containers and basic landscaping.

The program will be shown from 6-6:30 p.m. Monday-Wednesday-Friday and repeated from 8-8:30 p.m. Tuesday-Thursday-Saturday. The program will run for 10 weeks.

The series features British-born instructor/host John Lenanton, who has been labeled the "galloping gourmet" of horticulture.



Tuition steady

Schoolcraft levies full legal millage

State aid is expected to pick up at Schoolcraft College in the next fiscal year, to the relief of property taxpayers and students. The board of trustees projects total revenue at \$15.7 million, up three percent.

The board recently voted to levy the full 1.77 mills of property tax authorized by voters after setting this budget scenario from comptroller A.H. (Butch) Raby:

- State equalized valuations will decline three percent as the effect of the recession on property values is felt. Property taxes are expected to produce \$5.9 million next fiscal year, down slightly from this year's \$6 million. The unchanged rate and reduced SEV will ease the overall burden on property owners.

- Tuition rates will remain the same, starting at \$25.50 per credit hour for residents of the college district. An increased enrollment will push revenue from this source to \$4.7 million, up six percent.

- State aid is expected to rise 7.5 percent to \$4.67 million. "Governor Blanchard is expected to look favorably on community colleges," Raby said of the forthcoming state budget.

Blanchard has held up his budget message until after passage of the 1.75 percent state income tax increase by the legislature.

Asked by board chairperson Harry Greenleaf whether economic recovery might not mean a reduction in students, Raby called the projection realistic. "Michigan still has significant unemployment. People will need to retrain," Raby said.

In other business, the board accepted these gifts:

Eighteen volumes of the Journal of Applied Physics from Dr. W. Dale Compton of Dearborn, to be used in the metallurgy and materials science program.

Two desks, cabinets, a chair, a work table and other supplies with a stated value of \$1,275 from Klein & Bloom, PC,

Livonia, for use by the health, business and vocational departments.


A collection of food-related reference books with a stated value of \$850 from Edward A. Goodwin of Sylvania, Ohio, for the culinary arts library.

A cash gift of \$150 from the America Welding Society, Troy, in appreciation for the college's assistance in hosting the semiannual welding inspectors' certification examination, to be used for program promotion in the welding department.

Gift of \$100 from Mr. and Mrs. Robert Woltz, Plymouth, for a special award for business students, to be matched by Marathon Oil Company. Mrs. Woltz is instructor emerita at Schoolcraft.

Cash gift of \$75 from faculty members to establish a scholarship in memory of Claren Jones, a retired chemistry instructor who died February 25.

A 19-inch television set from Mrs. Lee Reban of Northville, for use as a CRT monitor in the learning assistance center.



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
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Parking lot tabled

Drainage dispute stalls Charleys' plans

Citing confusion about the effectiveness and legality of storm drainage patterns, township planners last week tabled consideration of plans for an expanded parking lot at Northville Charley's restaurant on Seven Mile.

A report from consulting engineer Edward McNeely approved of the drainage arrangements, but, some planning commissioners said, seemed to contradict an earlier McNeely review that called for easement documents.

Complaints about drainage patterns as they exist around the parking lot, particularly since the area the restaurant now intends to pave was graded and covered with gravel, were lodged by the owners of two neighboring parcels.

There was also communication to the planning commission describing Wayne County Road Commission rules that may proscribe the drainage patterns.

McNeely was not present, being represented by Wayne Griffins, of his firm. His review letter of September 25, 1981, when the corporation first submitted paving plans, said the firm would have to obtain an easement agreement from the owners of the Nichols Realty parcel. A letter from the Nichols' described their refusal to grant an easement and their reasons (primarily fear that added stormwater would accumulate on their property).

But McNeely's latest review said "the items of concern" in the earlier letter "have been addressed." The easement and potential problems regarding the flow of water into road commission storm drains were "discussed and reviewed by the various parties concerned, Supervisor John MacDonald and myself."

"It appears that future problems which may arise will have to be handled at that time and in a forum other than at the township level. The plan as submitted meets the township requirements for engineering approval."

C.A. Muer attorney Gary Taybach told the commission the present drainage arrangement, with water from the restaurant parcel flowing through a culvert under Marilyn and onto the Nichols' property, has been in existence since the early 1960s according to his own research. The letter from the Nichols' places the arrangement in the late 1940s, when the two parcels were under a single ownership.

Taybach argued that no easement was needed, since no change in drainage is planned. Ar-

rangments to retain storm water on the restaurant site, required as part of the parking lot expansion, will restrict the flow of water onto the Nichols land so that it does not increase. In fact, he argued, the retention areas are sized to serve the entire property, not just the expanded portion of the lot, so "may very well make things better than they are now."

"There will be no increase in the amount or velocity of water flowing through the Nichols property as it has since 1947," Taybach said.

Planning commissioner Richard Allen, the board of trustees' representative, noted that the natural drainage course leads to a road commission storm drain.

Ultimate decisions regarding the legality of the drainage flow, if the dispute continues, he said,

would have to come from some other level, since the township has no authority over either the road commission drain or the existing drainage course.

Commissioner Kenneth Sewell asked that the matter be tabled until McNeely could be present to explain the change in his recommendations regarding the drainage.

Concern that three large lamps to be used in the lot would not be screened from adjoining residential parcels was also mentioned, and the commission decided to table the matter until its April session.

Taybach asked that all parties concerned be present in search of a final decision at the next meeting, since the company wishes to begin the paving project as soon as weather permits.

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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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

It's time for new input

With the filing deadline for June's Northville board of education election only six days away, it is discouraging to find that only two residents have shown any interest in seeking a position on the seven-member board.

Aside from board president Doug Whitaker, who announced his intention to seek reelection last week, only one resident has filed a petition for one of the two board seats to be filled in June.

The community's lack of interest in serving on the board is disappointing. Unfortunately, such disinterest is not surprising. In the last three years, there only have been 10 candidates seeking posts on the Northville Board of Education.

We were encouraged last June when five residents petitioned for two school board seats. With five candidates in the running, the community was offered a choice in its selection of residents for the district's school board posts. In previous elections, at least one can-

didate has run unopposed — leaving questions about the credibility of such elections.

The school district has benefited considerably from the input and talents of many of its residents — particularly this past year with the formation of the Citizens Advisory Committee. The time and effort put into school-related business by these citizens is to be commended. It was our hope, however, that perhaps some of these residents might consider seeking election to the board.

With the vast changes taking place in the district, it is essential that the community secure an informed and dedicated board of education. However, this only can be accomplished through the efforts of Northville residents.

There still is time to file petitions with the Northville Public Schools business office. We urge all interested residents to consider the commitment.

Because four Schoolcraft College trustees are to be elected June 13, at the same time as the Northville Public School election, voters once again have an opportunity for representation on the college board — if local residents come forward to take out and return petitions for the posts by the April 26 filing deadline.

Given the disproportionate size of Livonia compared with other public school districts that comprise the college district, it admittedly is going to be difficult to elect representatives from Northville, from the small portion of Novi in the district, or from the other communities of Plymouth-Canton, Garden City or Clarenceville in the college district. It's worth trying.

At present, six of the seven trustees come from Livonia, a school district with about half the college district's population. One comes from Plymouth-Canton. None comes from Northville, Garden City or Clarenceville.

Schoolcraft trustees are aware of the imbalance and have been sensitive to the feelings of the other districts, much more so than previous boards. Nevertheless, geographical diversity is likely to be of overriding importance in the upcoming election.

Trustees whose terms are expiring — all of whom are from Livonia — are Harry Greenleaf, board chairman, in personnel at Ford Motor Company, in his second term, has taken out petitions for a new six-year term; Rosina Raymond, board treasurer, member since reappointment in 1971, part-time college instructor, has taken out petitions for a new six-year term; Len Wozniak, industrial salesman completing first term, unlikely to seek reelection to a new six-year term; and Sharon Sarris, former teacher now in cable television sales, appointed to fill a vacancy last year, has announced she will run for the two remaining years of the term.

Holdover trustees are Michael Burley, Canton resident and teacher in the Northville School District; Laura Toy, Livonia resident and gift shop owner; and Paul Y. Kadish, insurance agent from Livonia.

The present board is composed

of four men and three women. The women all are from the 2nd District Women's Political Caucus and are described as feminists. Despite similarities, they have different personalities and approaches. Politically, three trustees have Republican backgrounds and four have Democratic leanings, but partisanship has virtually disappeared from the board.

There's an occupational variety on the board, now representing education and industry. Schoolcraft President Richard McDowell is not an issue; he is popular with the board and with the faculty.

What will be important to the board in the future will be the need for fund-raising from private sources to replace state aid cuts and the refusal of property owners to increase taxes. The college is going to be competing with big universities, the United Fund, public television, churches and charities for such funds. They are needed for student aid, equipment and special programs.

Annual evaluations of the president and top administrators, a process adopted from industry, wisely is required to be public by state law. Observers feel these should not be whitewashes or vendettas. Almost all public bodies are seen as needing to learn how to conduct upbeat ones.

Because Greenleaf, Raymond and Sarris are tough campaigners and are viewed as unlikely to be beaten, it has been suggested that the smaller districts may want to agree on a fourth candidate rather than splitting up. This is a possibility if a qualified candidate is found. Candidates with abilities in fund-raising and in the evaluation process would be making a positive contribution to the board.

Lack of board members from the other communities the college serves is a two-way loss. The college loses input and interest from the community and the community lacks the personal feed-back a local trustee can give, especially when added revenue is needed. Petition forms are available at the president's office on campus. They must be returned with at least 50 but no more than 200 signatures. Filing deadline is 4 p.m. April 26 in the president's office.

News addiction getting expensive

I think I need professional help. I just spent \$1.10 for newspapers. On a weekday. When nothing special happened. And I narrowly averted another 40-cents worth on my second pass by the newstand on my way out of the store.

This isn't unusual for me, either. The nice suede jacket-sweater Toni got me for Valentine's Day needs professional cleaning to get rid of the accumulated newsprint on the left side, where I tuck the papers under my arm. When we put the garbage out, it seems there are two bags of papers for every one of genuine garbage. (Where are the kids collecting for newspaper drives when you need them?)

There are genuine reasons (rationalizations?) for buying four or five newspapers a day. When I think of one that's persuasive, maybe Toni will forgive me. Let's try a few on for size:

- Both Detroit dailies are absolute professional necessities. They sometimes pick up some news from Northville and I like to know they've done so — if they beat us to it, I can start thinking up excuses for my superiors. If we beat them, it's good for a wry chuckle and sort of sets the day going right, especially if they've missed something or made a mistake (which is more often than they'll ever admit). Besides, I read them for the same reasons anyone else does — for information. Both of them because they often tell you opposite sides of the same story. There's 35 cents.

- Then there's *The New York Times* — the newspaper of record, not to mention a rich source of story ideas, not to mention daydreaming about one's future in this business. It's the only place to read about elections in Australia, flooding in Asia or the happenings in so many New York-centered businesses and arts. The one I bought today has the fifth and concluding article in a series about how the Japanese build cars — having read parts one through four, it seemed a shame not to read the last. Fifty cents, but not every day.

- While this catches me some slack around the office, I sometimes drop a quarter for frozen television — *USA Today*. "You've got to stop encouraging them like this," one co-worker told me last week. But the frozen television label is as descriptive of how I use the new Gannett product as it is of the flashy graphics and sparse news coverage featured therein. It's my *Readers' Digest*-like condensation of what's current.

According to the pollsters, people often watch television to catch the highlights, then turn to the papers to pick up the details. Just so with the little blurbs that constitute news in *USA Today* — they alert me to watch for the in-depth stuff in the real newspapers. I'm usually too busy reading newspapers (trying to assuage my guilt over not being a fast enough reader to justify the expense) while the television news is on. Besides, this one has an interesting crossword puzzle.

- That's another reason I buy papers — I usually finish the *Free Press* puzzle all too quickly, find the *News* puzzle uses too many strange clues (though I finish it more often than not) and, after feasting on the *Times*' puzzle I'm often ready for one more during the 11 p.m. newscasts. That takes us to \$1.10 total.

- Regular readers of the *Wall Street Journal* will recognize the 40-cent tag that nearly snagged me on the way out the door. More professional guilt. I've just been assigned the job of editing the Green Sheet business news, and somehow it seems to me I ought to take a look at a *Journal* once in awhile now — to steal ideas and localize them, if for no other reason. This probably means I'll talk myself into buying it more often than the once or twice-a-month that was my previous pattern. I don't remember, but don't think the *Journal* bothers with such time-wasters as crossword puzzles. Its subscribers are too busy.

That ought to set the pattern. Then there's Sunday. Within five-minutes of my house there's a newsstand with papers from all over the nation and few key spots around the globe. Is it any wonder Toni wants to move?

Thank God we did. What a show. What fun. What an experience.

If you get the impression I liked it, you're right. Basically, "Your Arms Too Short" is a black version of the crucifixion. And, appropriately I believe, it features lots of good old-fashion gospel singing. Patti LaBelle is the star and she sings up a storm.

I decided early on in the performance that part of the fun was going to be audience participation. So, despite my WASP upbringing, I decided to join in. It wasn't easy at first; quiet, subdued worship has been the general rule at any church I've ever been to and it's hard to break old habits. But before it was over I was clapping, singing and waving even though I never did summon up the courage to sing, Hallelujah.

The highlight of the afternoon occurred when Patti LaBelle came out into the audience and was confronted by a tall, dignified-looking black woman who decided she wanted to testify. So she did.

There they were — Patti LaBelle and the tall woman — just a few rows away from me, arms wrapped around each other's shoulders, tears in their eyes, singing about Jesus.

It was nice, real nice. I realize "Arms" is theater, a musical production. But it's also much more. As we were walking out of the theater after the show, I remarked to an acquaintance who just happened to have been sitting next to us that I couldn't believe we went to a church where people didn't sing "Hallelujah" and "Amen" when the spirit moved them.

People should worship as they wish, of course. But if I were starting all over, I think I'd find out where Patti LaBelle goes to church.

Report from Lansing

Presidential primary not necessary

In 1980, Michigan held its presidential primary in May, costing the state nearly \$3 million in the process. However, if you remember, the Michigan Democratic Party decided to forego participation in that primary, and only the Republicans went to the polls to select George Bush as their favorite candidate.

It is highly likely that the same scenario will be played out in 1984, but the primary election for President will cost Michigan nearly \$5 million. That is why legislation was introduced earlier this month that would eliminate the

Presidential Primary from Michigan's election laws.

Under this proposal, state political party conventions would determine who their favorite candidate would be, as was the practice in the past prior to the creation of the Michigan Presidential Primary.

This is not just a cost-saving measure. Michigan's primary has long had serious flaws in it that have made the election process almost meaningless to political parties because it is an "open primary." In other words, no one has to declare himself or herself a member of a certain party in order to vote in the Presidential Primary. This means that cross-over votes occur which can ac-

tually distort the election returns.

By eliminating the presidential primary, Michigan voters would have the opportunity to select their choice for President through the convention system. Delegate would be elected on the county level to attend the state convention where the candidate for president would be selected. Then, delegates would be elected at that convention to attend the National Convention of the political party to cast their votes for the candidate who was selected at the state level.

We must not have a repeat of the 1980 presidential primary. It was expensive and participation was poor. I think the

people of Michigan realize that the presidential primary is rather meaningless in its concept and has outlived its usefulness. It is time to return the selection process to the political party system, and hopefully that will encourage more and more people to get involved in the political party of their choice.

At a time when Michigan faces a budget deficit pegged somewhere between \$650 and \$900 million, cost-saving measures and the removal of waste from the state budget are mandatory steps that should be taken. Eliminating the presidential primary can accomplish both.

Salem residents request board action

Although Salem Township residents loudly supported several of their own motions at the March 26 annual meeting, Township Supervisor Floyd Taylor informed them that motions other than those concerning official agenda items (see related story) would have to be considered "advisory."

When some township residents questioned the legality of this, Taylor promised that the board would get legal advice on the question. The supervisor reported April 1 that Township Clerk Nancy Geiger has written a letter to the legal department of the Michigan Townships Association asking for a clarification on what items come under citizens' control.

Six areas were included in the citizens concerns:

- Keeping of all township records only in the township hall.
- Purchase of a public address system for the township hall.
- Use of the hall for meetings by local civic groups.
- A request for the township vote on Washtenaw County's short- and long-term solid waste plan to be taken at the annual meeting.
- A request that no real property of the township be leased without the vote of the electors.
- A move for more stringent enforcement of the township zoning ordinance in order to protect its citizens.

Although various persons tried also to bring up the question of the request by Holloway Sand and Gravel to expand its landfill and mining operations at Napier and Six Mile, Taylor was resolute in following his statement at the outset of the meeting that no landfill discussion would be heard at the meeting.

Citizens asked for a count of hands on Mrs. Ronald Shoebright's motion that "all township records be kept at the township hall." Taylor announced that there were 24 hands raised in favor of the motion and 17 were opposed.

Russell Knight, who is the elected treasurer of the township, told the people that he is elected as a "part-time"

treasurer and that it would "not be efficient" to keep all of the tax records at the hall since much of his work is done at home.

Knight added that the law requires him to be at the hall one day a week only and that the clerk, who is present full-time, has a copy of the tax roll so that people may look at it if they have questions. He added that he is available to answer questions from his home. All records except the current ones are stored at the hall, he explained.

Knight also noted that he has arranged that taxes can be paid at the State Savings Bank in Salem as a convenience for the residents.

Barbara Fulkerson introduced a motion to have a public address system installed in the hall with a reel-to-reel recorder so that everyone can hear proceedings, and so that there would be a taped record of what is said at governmental meetings. She suggested a ceiling of not more than 10 percent over an estimated cost of \$3,610 be enforced.

Another resident said it need not be that expensive and gave an estimate of \$900.

Meroy Kaericher in her motion concerning use of the hall for local civic groups recommended that a citizens committee, which would include a board representative, be set up to study the question and report back.

Since the township hall was remodeling and carpeted, the board has ruled that it can be used only for governmental meetings in order to avoid wear and tear.

Kaericher said she felt the Salem Historical Society and Salem Senior Citizens in particular should be allowed use of the hall as the only township public meeting facility.

Geiger responded that the Michigan Townships Association attorney's opinion of March 1981 stated that the township board is in control of all facilities, but that all groups must be treated the same. The board can vote not to rent the hall out for any purpose but if it is rented then it must be

Landscape design wins top nurserymen award

A warm slate flagstone walk completes the rich entry to the Rosneau home.

The house is located on a rolling, wooded lot. Hunt has eliminated the need for lawn maintenance by transplanting myrtle from surrounding slopes to form a carpet of lavender-flowering ground cover in summer months. The balance of the yard is covered in shredded bark mulch, and several specimens of evergreens and ornamental trees as accents.

Eroded limestone boulders are

strategically placed in the front yard to produce a naturalized setting. A hemlock tree is planted in front of the bedroom window, among more limestone boulders, to provide privacy and allow those inside to view wildlife in the neighboring woods.



State sixth in home sales

Despite being among the states hardest hit by the recession, Michigan ranked sixth in the number of existing homes and condominiums sold last year.

California remained the most active state in the resale market with 181,100 units changing hands. Texas was next with 155,900, followed by New York (121,200), Pennsylvania (108,700), Florida (92,600), Michigan (90,000), Ohio (79,800), Illinois (78,600), New Jersey (74,800) and Virginia (66,300).

Figures supplied by the Western Wayne Oakland County Board of Realtors (WWOCBR) from a national survey showed resale of units declined 19.1 percent. Last year's sale of 2,038,900 units compared to 2,521,400 in 1981.

Five states reported improved sales in 1982. Louisiana led the way with a 12.5 percent gain. Others with smaller increases included Alabama, Kentucky, Maine, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Michigan showed a 23.1 percent drop in sales from a year earlier, but was not among the major decliners. WWOCBR, the state's largest Realtor board, reported a drop of 10.7 percent in its 1,600 square mile metropolitan territory.

Seven states showed decreased sales of 30 percent or more headed by Missouri with a 37.8 percent decline.

Other high percentage losers included Georgia (35.3), Florida (34.6), Washington (32.7), Wisconsin (32.6) and California (32.3).

The four lowest states in terms of sales volume were Vermont, Wyoming, Alaska and Hawaii, all with 6,000 units or less.

Some added interesting facts disclosed in the study:

- more homes were sold in Alaska (4,400) than Hawaii (4,100);
- the District of Columbia ranked higher than both Alaska and Hawaii with sales of 5,000 existing units.

On the fast track to harnessing his dreams

Last June, at the age of 16, Don Harmon became the youngest driver at Northville Downs.

One of the youngest harness racing drivers in the country, the Whitmore Lake resident has attained a respectable first season record at the Downs — competing up until the track's closing last week.

Though only 17-years-old, Harmon is well on his way to realizing a dream he has held and nurtured since the ripe age of five.

"My father (Reid) has raised horses all his life and that got me going," explained the young driver. "I jogged my first horse when I was five years old. There was this one horse I always jogged after I got home from school. I asked my father to save him for me so I could jog him."

"Then when I was nine years old, I started to train horses. At 10, I schooled them behind the gate (worked them behind the gate as it circles the track). I've wanted to drive ever since then."

Anxious not to glorify his abilities and talent, Harmon explained that obtaining a license to drive horses is no simple task. Prospective drivers must pass a 100-question multiple choice test which is meant to determine whether the individual is familiar with harness racing, knows how to drive in a race and has a basic knowledge of handling track situations.

"They want to see if you have a basic knowledge of racing horses before they allow you on that track," explained Don's mother, Nancy. "You are running against professionals and other people's horses are entrusted to you."

Harmon scored 87 points on the examination. The next step was to receive a qualifying license. To do so, Harmon had to drive in qualifying races which are judged by track judges. The judges

must rule that the driver has raced 12 times in an acceptable fashion. Harmon said he drove 22 qualifiers before he got 12 approvals.

"In qualifiers, he (Don) had to demonstrate that he was capable of being on the track," Mrs. Harmon said, "that he's not a hazard to himself or others."

The judges then submitted their report on the driver to the United States Trotting Association (USTA), which issues a Provisional License, P-license in racing jargon.

Harmon received his one-year P-license in June. With that license, a new driver may work on only certain tracks, Harmon explained. After one year, the judges submit their recommendations to the USTA, which may issue an A-License, permitting the driver to race on any track in the country. Harmon hopes to receive that license this summer.

Unlike thoroughbred racing, drivers have no physical limitations, such as weight restrictions, with which to contend.

For the moment, Harmon is not in the driver's seat for big money. He primarily drives nine or 10 horses under his father's care on the Northville Downs track. The Harmon family has been in the harness business 17 years. With a few more years under his belt and better class horses to drive, Don acknowledged that he could earn an excellent living.

"I drive, probably, two or three other people's horses a week, which is pretty good," Harmon said. During the first meet at Northville Downs, Harmon had 29 drives, winning six times, placing once and showing seven times.

Between the beginning of the second meet, which began the new year, and January 12, Harmon drove six times,

earning one win, one place and one show.

Earnings for the driver can be as little as \$10 per race, or as much as 10 percent of what the horse makes, Harmon explained. "The driver gets 10 percent of what the horse makes if you finish first, second, third, fourth or fifth," Harmon said. "If you don't finish in the money, you get \$10. The horse makes half the purse, so if the purse is \$800, the horse gets \$400 and the driver gets \$40."

Although he is the youngest driver at Northville Downs, Harmon said he has no problem with other drivers on the track.

"A driver can be your best friend before the race," Harmon said, "but once you're on the track, he doesn't know you."

Eager to improve his abilities, Harmon, like other drivers, heads directly for the driver's room after each race he runs. A television replays the race immediately afterward and Harmon analyzes his moves and the quality of his split-second decisions. He said he learns something each time he views his driving.

"Experience is the name of the game," Mrs. Harmon said. "Every race is a different chapter."

Harmon is a busy young man. He begins each day early, arriving at the Downs at about 7 a.m. with his father. They feed the horses in Harmon Stable, let them stand for a while and Don starts jogging them. The workout takes about an hour and a half, after which the animals are soaked, massaged, have their legs wrapped in bandages and receive other essential care. By 1:30 or 2 p.m., their morning work is done.

If Harmon is driving in the first race, he has to be back at the track by 6:30

p.m. to don his royal blue and white silks with light blue piping. All drivers are required to take a breathalyzer test prior to race time.

Harmon's job is tough and demanding. It requires work seven days a week and availability 24 hours a day, Mrs. Harmon said. "It's a rough

business," she added.

"Don started at the bottom, cleaning stalls," she recalled. "Now that's my job again. It took a lot of work and devotion to get where he is, but it helps when

you're jogging every day since you were five or six years old."

"I like it myself," Don exclaimed with a broad smile and a glint in his eye. "I like racing."

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

Although he now is in independent living in Ann Arbor, he requires extensive personal care and has been re-hospitalized a number of times since his release.

His uncle reports that a benefit fundraiser for Scott will be held at the St. Robert Ballarmine activity building, West Chicago at Inkster in Redford, on Sunday, April 17. Funds from the benefit will be used for living and educational expenses. Heinzman hopes to study computers and would like someday to make a contribution to medical research as it pertains to spinal cord injury, his uncle adds.

Organized by Scott's family and friends, the benefit will run from 2 to 10 p.m. and is planned to be much like a St. Patrick's Day party. Music and dance groups will perform continuously with "plenty of good food and refreshments" promised.

Scott's mother Kathy is Irish, Dave Heinzman explains, and the family has taken part in activities of the Metropolitan

Autograph seekers find local havens

Autograph hunters long have been a part of a celebrity's existence, and the ambitious hobby of collecting autographs of famous athletes currently is one of America's hottest pastimes.

Stemming directly from Americans' recent love affair with baseball cards, the number of autograph collectors seeking the famous signatures of Baseball's Hall of Famers has grown to epidemic proportions.

In the Detroit area, even the common player has become an instant celebrity when he appears at a local shopping mall or baseball card show to lend his signature for promotional or recreational purposes.

Professional baseball autographs have become such big business that the prospective collector must pay upwards of \$5 to secure the signature of his hardball heroes.

Appearing in Flint March 27, local promoter George Wallace secured former St. Louis Cardinal Hall of Famer Stan Musial for a three-hour autograph stint. The price of obtaining Musial's signature on a photo or baseball was \$4 per item. Toss in a cost of \$3 per photograph or \$6 for an American League baseball, plus another \$1 admission charge, and the cost of ONE Stan Musial autograph ranged between \$8 and \$11.

Even more astounding than the present cost of acquiring a famous autograph is that the demand for these signatures is as endless as the lines are tiresome.

Americans love baseball, whether it is attending the sold-out opener of the Detroit Tigers this Friday or collecting baseball cards and autographs. The recession hasn't slowed down the memorabilia business one penny, and prosperity seems to be the name of the game.


Northville residents live in a prime area for the purpose of collecting autographs. Why, we even have a former major league pitcher Fred Holdsworth, coaching the high school baseball team.

Foremost among the "autograph alleys" locally, is the Old Ballpark, Inc., in Livonia. Situated at the corner of Merriman and Five Mile Road, the Old Ballpark has been a haven for collectors of Detroit Tiger autographs since opening several years back.

George Kell, Harvey Kuenn, Glenn Wilson and Lance Parrish, just to name a few, have all made appearances at the Livonia sports memorabilia and

Nadeau completes soph season at Auburn

Even though the season ended on a sour note in the semi-finals of the NCAA Midwest Regional in Ruston, Louisiana, the Auburn Lady Tiger basketball team with Northville's own Leslie Nadeau realized all of its set season goals in finishing as one of the final 16 teams in the nation.

Prior to the season, Auburn head coach Joe Ciampi set goals of winning 20 games, gaining a berth in the NCAA Tournament, and winning at least one game in the tournament. The Lady Tigers finished the season 24-8 and were invited to host a first round NCAA game which they won by defeating Big Eight champion

Missouri, 89-76.

All goals had been accomplished, and Ciampi was a satisfied man, despite a crushing 81-54 loss to eventual NCAA runnerup Louisiana Tech in the semi-finals.

"It really has been a satisfying year for us, but ending the season the way we did at the regional was kind of disappointing," said Ciampi. "We made some progress throughout the season, but there are still some areas that will need attention before we can challenge for the national championship."

Auburn finished the season at 24-8, 8-5 in the Southeastern Conference

and a perfect 15-0 on home hardwood. Included among those 15 home wins was a 58-54 victory over final four participant Georgia.

Junior center Becky Jackson finished the season as the leading scorer (16.9) and rebounder (9.4) for the Lady Tigers. Senior forward Lori Monroe took over the all-time rebounding record with her total of 1,115 in 124 games. Guard Terry Mohr was named to the Midwest Regional All-Tournament team and Jackson was named to the Women's Basketball Coaches Association District IX all-star team.

"Now we can go back to the

recruiting trail and find some players to fill in the gaps for next season," Ciampi said. "If we have the kind of recruiting year that I think we can, we should be a much stronger team next season and make some more strides with our program. We're headed in the right direction."

One reason Auburn is headed in the right direction is Northville's Leslie Nadeau.

In 22 games this season as a reserve, Nadeau averaged 1.4 points per game in 5.7 minutes of playing time.



baseball card store recently.

Former Detroit Free Press baseball writer Jim Hawkins displays his vast sports collection daily at his Fan Attic store on Orchard Lake Road in Farmington. Since retired from the ranks of sportswriters, Hawkins opened his memorabilia outlet last year and has used his extensive contacts in the sporting world to lure athletes to sign autographs at his establishment.

As an example, Kelly Tripuka appeared at the Fan Attic two weeks ago.

What places the Old Ballpark and the Fan Attic above the appearance of famous athletes at baseball card shows held in hotels or convention centers is the price: free. There is no charge for autographs at these establishments, but photographs and baseballs will, of course, cost the same.

On the other side of the coin, Hall of Fame baseball players usually don't sign for free in today's autograph market, and most prefer the three-hour stints in large card shows. For these appearances, the "average" Hall of Famer will receive as little as \$1,000 or, in the case of Hank Aaron or Willie Mays last summer, as much as \$5,000 per visit.

Al Kaline and George Kell, the Tigers' two Hall of Fame television broadcasters, will make a rare appearance in Southfield this weekend for a three-hour autograph session.

Kaline, once so insensed at a show promoter when he discovered a show promoter was charging \$5 for his autograph, vowed he would never again sign for that individual. The only thing that kept Kaline from walking out of that show was his love for his fans from Detroit, who had lined up by the hundreds to catch a glimpse of their hero and get his autograph for eternity.

That was three years ago and apparently Kaline has mellowed because he will appear Sunday with newly-elected Hall of Famer Kell from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Northland Sheraton, I-696 at West Nine Mile Road.

Candela writes home about football season

EDITOR'S NOTE: from time to time parents receive letters from their offspring far away at college. Beginning today, letters from college athletes will be printed in The Record, extolling certain athletic exploits of Northville's sons and daughters in sport. Vince Candela, former Mustang wrestler and football player currently enrolled at Grand Valley State College, recently sent this correspondence to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Candela, 21885 Bedford, Novi. The following is his story, told in his words, of his first season of football at Grand Valley.

My first year as a Grand Valley State Laker...

At the beginning of the season, I was placed on the junior varsity squad. I was first string at defensive tackle. The JV only had four games reserved and the games were spread apart to be played every two weeks.

Since we didn't have a game every weekend, we assisted the varsity in practice everyday. We helped by running the other teams defense against our first string offense. We were the prep team.

Every week the coaches would pick the person who gave the best effort on JV and name him the Prep Champion of the Week. I was the first of the season.

After that, I was made captain of the JV team. In our first game against Hope College, I recorded eight first hits, six assists and two sacks. The next week, I was moved to varsity.

On varsity, I was second string along with a sophomore as the other tackle. I thought I would play a lot, but I soon found out that starters play just about the whole game in college. I thought I

would never play.

The first play I was ever involved in was against Ferris State. I was really nervous. During that game one of the linemen on the goalline team was injured. From then on, I was on the first goalline team.

After that, I began to play more as a defensive tackle. I soon beat out the other sophomore tackle and whenever one of the starters came out, they put me in to fill in for him.

During the next to last game, one of our starters was hurt and I played the second, third and fourth quarters. I was very nervous but the coaches were very happy with my performance.

I started our last game against Saginaw Valley. I only had four first hits and three assists, but I had one sack that sent the ball flying out of the quarterback's hands and we recovered it.


That was the most excitement I had all year. When I came running off the field, the other players started hitting my helmet and telling me "good job". The coach hugged me and said that he was very proud of me!

In the lockerroom after the game, the head coach (Jim Harkema) came over to me and said that I did a great job and that they will be counting on me to start next season.
