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Super sewer loses battle for funds

Citing unresolved questions about the legality of the Huron Valley sewer system's relationship to the city of Detroit, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) last week denied an application for 1983 federal funding of the project.

Grant allocated for local project

The loss of some \$35 million expected for first-phase construction this year calls into question the future viability of the so-called super sewer project, since the availability of federal grants in the future is likely to fall short of necessary funding.

"Several key questions remain unresolved regarding the authority of (Wayne) County to construct and operate a new sewer disposal stem in governmental units now under contract to the city of Detroit," an MDNR letter dated July 1 states as the reason for its action. The official notification had not yet been received by county officials Tuesday morning.

Suburban officials called the decision a political victory for Detroit Mayor Coleman Young, even as they vowed to fight the MDNR action, calling super sewer a key element to the future growth of western Wayne and southwestern Oakland counties.

County public works officials had already conceded to a compromise position that guaranteed Detroit would continue to receive the present sewage flow, with only new sewage flows being routed to the proposed new sewage treatment plant in Brownstown Township.

The DNR allocates the funds according to a priority list. This year's list places the Huron Valley system second (to Detroit) among more than 100 proposals. Friday's decision was to "bypass" the project and allocate the funds to projects with a lower priority ranking. Super sewer would retain its priority ranking for next year's federal allocation.

Duane Egeland, Wayne County Department of Public Works acting managing director, said the communities have authorized his department to file suit seeking a restraining order against the disbursement of federal funding until the issue is resolved.

"Our attorneys advise us the questions raised by the DNR don't seem to have any legal substance," Egeland

said. Noting abandonment of the Huron Valley system would mean reliance on the Rouge system and the city of Detroit treatment plant, he said "the entire Rouge Valley system has been determined to be deficient."

"The City of Detroit's plan was to overflow more (sewage) into the Rouge River — that's how they proposed to create the additional capacity," he said. "That would require the approval of the 16 communities in the Rouge system, and they haven't even been approached yet."

Supporters of the plan said the political opposition from Detroit resulted in the DNR employing a strict interpretation of federal regulations that ultimately led to last week's action.

In a letter to the DNR's Richard Hinson, circulated to participating communities, Egeland said he believes MDNR "is interpreting requirements of the (federal) regulations far more strictly than they were meant to be. In this concept, I do believe that your actions, knowingly or unknowingly, have acted to impede implementation of this project."

Later in the letter, he wrote that supporters of the project have been "unable to communicate to you... that this project, which is acknowledged by all to be perhaps the most complex project ever to be processed by MDNR, and also a most beneficial project for the State from many standpoints, should be given the benefit of any leeway which the federal requirements permit."

The DNR's stated reasons for bypassing the project do not hinge on federal regulations, however, but on the relationship between the county DPW and the city of Detroit.

Township supervisor John MacDonald called the DNR action, "pathetic." Saying it was his understanding from talking to county officials that Detroit interests opposed the project, he said "as far as I'm concerned that's really short-sightedness. The project is a key to future development in the suburbs, which ultimately benefits Detroit."

Wayne County Commissioner Mary Dumas charged in a speech to the Northville Rotary last week that "Detroit has repeatedly attempted to sabotage the project both in SEMCOG and in Lansing."

She said Detroit opposition twice resulted in defeats for the project in SEMCOG, and that it was only narrowly approved on a third attempt. At the county commission level, a June 24 vote

July 4th celebration a hot one from parade to firework finale

From start to finish Northville Jaycees labeled the Fourth of July a "tremendous success" yesterday as they assessed Monday's day-long events that began with a parade and ended with spectacular fireworks set off from the high school athletic field at 10 p.m.

The mid-afternoon cloudburst did not dampen sales of the Jaycees' chicken barbecue under a tent in Mill Race Historical Village, but it did send those operating arts and crafts booths in the Northville Historical Society-sponsored events hurrying for cover.

The parade itself got off to a late start due to an accident on the steps of a building on East Main. City police said a woman fell on the steps and the parade was delayed until she could receive emergency aid.

Northville High School Marching Band marched from the high school to the parade starting point in Northville Downs parking lot, arriving just in time to join the march which began along Main Street at approximately 10:30 a.m.

In keeping with the "Good Old Days" theme of the parade two longtime

families, each representing four generations, were parade grand marshals.

The Ely family of Charles Sr., his wife Margaret, Charles Jr. (Clancy) and Margaret and Corby, with son Jim and daughter Rachel, was joined by May Babbitt, her daughter Mary Ellen Dayton, Babbitt's granddaughter and Dayton's niece Cheryl Gazlay and her daughters Cristen and Courtney.

The parade progressed along Main to city hall where judges viewed the floats and bands, as well as waved at dignitaries and admired antique cars.

Judges were former mayor A.M. Allen, city council member Paul Folino, Record publisher Jack Hoffman, businessman Glenn Long and Neil Mitchell.

Parade winners were: Bands, first, Spirit of Windsor Youth Band; second, Plymouth Fire and Drum Corps; third, Plymouth Community Band.

Marchers, first, Plymouth Salem High School Rockettes; second, Isshinryu Karate Club; third, Ladywood High School Cheerleaders. Show Animals, first, Maybury Riding

Stable; second, Betty Broberic and her goat-drawn wagon; third, Maybury Park and Farm Unit.

Floats, first, Plymouth-Canton YMCA; second, Northville/Novi Colts; third, First Baptist Church.

Automobiles in the parade were divided into pre-war and post-war categories and were judged by antique car experts.

In the pre-war category Maw Raguse was first in a 1933 Plymouth with John Long runner-up in a 1932 Ford.

In the post-war category John Becker was first in a 1962 Corvette with C.J. Duncan Jr. runner-up in a 1973 Mustang.

Special interest winner was John Giordano in a 1975 Bricklin with Gary Loman runner-up in a 1975 Bricklin.

In the custom/hot rod category was Mike Burns in a 1972 Malibu with Keith Steinhel runner-up in a 1957 Chevy.

Kids lining both sides of the parade route made short work of candy pitched from fire department tankers — it was a very good crowd turnout in spite of the heat wave and delays.

Officer hurt apprehending escapee

A township police officer was injured in a fall from the C & O railroad bridge over Six Mile at Northville Road while attempting to apprehend a state hospital walkaway patient last week.

Patrol officer Michael Panagiotides suffered a broken right collarbone in the fall as he struggled with the patient on the banks of the viaduct June 28. Both fell over the side an estimated 12 feet onto the shoulder of the road — the patient was uninjured and fled eastward.

Panagiotides used his personal radio to summon other officers to the scene who apprehended the patient a few hundred yards east of the bridge and brought medical assistance to their fallen cohort.

"He's lucky he wasn't more seriously injured," chief Kenneth Hardesty said. "He fell head-first and just got his shoulder under him before he hit — that's why his collarbone broke. If he'd landed on his head, it'd have probably killed or paralyzed him."

Hardesty expressed anger that the injury occurred while in a struggle with an escapee, noting that the hospital "claims its patients aren't violent — they're simply confused."

"Needless to say, I'm none too happy that my officer was injured struggling with an escapee."

Panagiotides was responding to an 11 a.m. call for assistance from Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital security forces in pursuit of Lee Roger Taylor, who had escaped from Ward E-1. While hospital security guards scoured a nearby park in pursuit of the patient, Panagiotides spotted and pursued him along the railroad tracks on a southerly course. As they approached the bridge at Six Mile, Hardesty said, the patient started down the embank-

ment at the northern end of the viaduct. "They were at the side, the weeds are pretty high there, and Mike was trying to subdue the guy, they were struggling and went over the edge," Hardesty said. "Mike doesn't remember whether or not he was pushed — we don't know if the guy pushed him, threw him off the edge or if they just fell over it because they couldn't see it for the weeds while they were fighting."

After the fall, Panagiotides was taken by Community EMS to Botsford Hospital, where he was released last afternoon.

Police obtained a warrant for Taylor last Friday, and he was arraigned in 35th District Court on charges of assault and obstructing an officer in the course of his duty.

A not guilty plea was entered for Taylor; he was released on \$1,000 personal bond and remanded to the

custody of the hospital. A preliminary hearing date of July 11 was established. "As far as we're concerned," said Captain Philip Presnell, "if an escapee is involved in crimes while they're out, we're going to prosecute 'em."

The incident generated considerable resentment within the township force about the number of escaped patients from the hospital, with scornful comments directed toward the planting of small hedge plants around the hospital perimeter.

Hardesty noted that the hedge is not expected to provide a useful barrier for several years yet, but in the meantime plants are being trampled by walkaway patients.

The chief related that the level of escapes has not been significantly reduced even with increased security

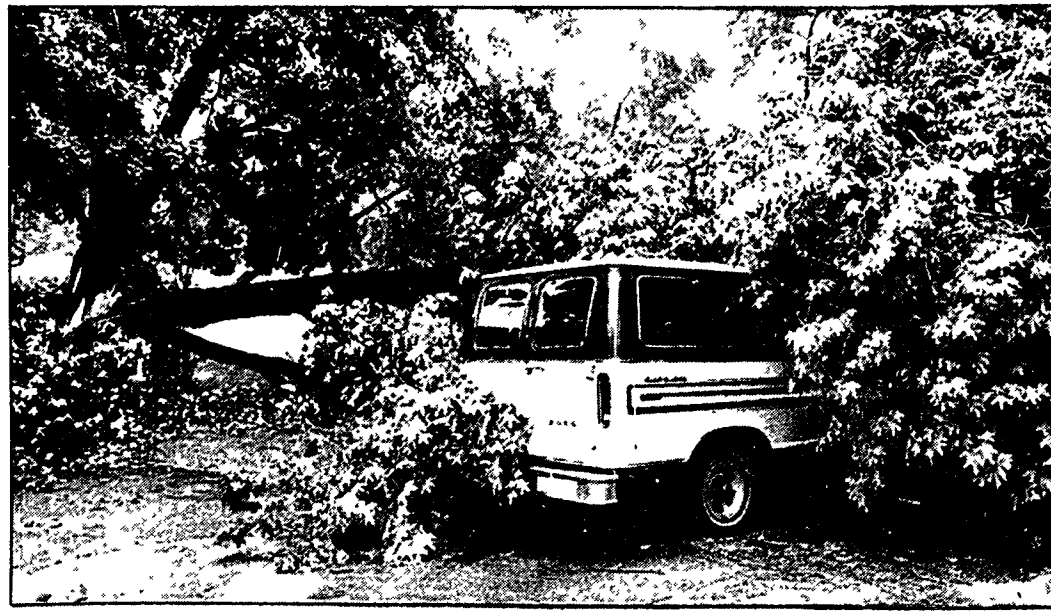

Tree expert Doug Boor says many accidents like this can be avoided

Proper care of trees is key to fewer damages, hazards

Those who are still clearing away the splintered wood, broken glass and debris of last week's storm can at least take heart they are not alone.

As Doug Boor of Mountaintop Tree Company, one of Northville's two major tree maintenance and repair firms (the other is the nearly half-century old Green Ridge company), said, "We're going to be cleaning up this stuff all season."

If there is a silver lining to the damages the city sustained from the June 27 storm — aside from a good story for those who think Northville's a little on the sleepy side news-wise — it's the bottom line for Boor's eight-year-old service.

But as much as he gained financially from the many repairs and cleanups, Boor would prefer to have seen less damage with more thoughtful use of the preventative measures experts, such as he, might have taken.

"A lot of the damage could have been avoided just by maintenance," Boor observed. "Sure a storm like that's going to do some unavoidable damage, but there's no question that trees that were maintained held up a lot better than those that were just left alone. It's just that every homeowner has to weigh the short-term costs versus the possibility of damage somewhere far along the line."

Boor should know — trees have been a pretty big part of his life. A lifelong Northville resident, he graduated from the University of Michigan's School of Natural Resources in 1979 with a degree in forestry. He got the idea for his tree-service company, at first a fledgling operation, now doing very well, from a friend in Colorado — hence the name "Mountaintop."



Cabling can often save a tree

Boor did not come through last week's harsh storms unscathed — winds tore most of the roof off a log cabin he had built up from the ground and he still is pondering what to do about it, since officials have declined approval of the building for use as a domicile or office building in town.

"My foreman Rick Cassidy called me up," Boor said. "He told me, 'I have some good news and some bad news. The good news is your house wasn't damaged at all. The bad news is your cabin roof blew off.'"

Cassidy will take over operations of Mountaintop beginning tomorrow, when Boor will take a trip to Alaska to build a log cabin in Fairbanks. "I had planned to go last week, but needless to say, it was a good idea to stay," Boor said.

It's only now that Boor and fellow Mountaintop workers have gotten around to lower-priority items, and, he said, the storm still poses some dangers — particularly the danger of broken tree limbs, now resting precariously and possibly invisibly in treetops, which could fall on someone.

"We've spent every day since the storm — 12-hour days, usually — just getting broken tree limbs off of houses. We've got all the high-priority jobs done now," he reported last Friday.

Among the measures that could have prevented at least some damage, Boor pointed out, were simply cabling the limbs of trees that are susceptible to splitting, or lightening trees' upper boughs.

An important distinction, he said, is the weight of tree limbs that jut out in a "V" shape from the main trunk. A "U" shape, he said, indicates continuity of underlying wood tissue — the source of a tree's strength. But a V-shaped intersection with a limb — particularly if the limb is thick and heavy — could snap off in high winds if unattended.

Generally, Boor treats such potential problems by running a cable around the large limbs, where it rests almost invisibly — a relatively sound investment, considering the potential damage a large falling tree limb can inflict, to say nothing of preserving the tree's appearance. The cables generally require periodic attention (once every three or four years or so), but had a good performance record in the storm.

"There's no question the cable we put in this tree saved it," he said, pointing to a tall Sugar Maple on Randolph Street. A large part of a similarly shaped tree that had not been cabled, further down the street, had been ripped off the body by high-speed winds.

"It's more often those split limbs cause damage rather than trees that are uprooted," he added. "Sure, there were some trees that were completely knocked down, but most of the damage was caused by limbs from trees with that V-shape. And I've never had a cable break on me."

Boor also said rotted, dead wood accounted for the trees' susceptibility to damage.

"Everybody who has a tree has to make up his mind how much time and money he or she wants to devote to its care," he said. "But dead wood on a tree obviously does no good, and you lessen danger if you cut it down carefully. Also there are lots of things you can do to keep tree rot from spreading."

Many of the trees that were completely ripped from the ground or lost limbs suffered from rotted portions. "A lot of them (the trees) were going to die anyway," he said. "There are people who like to try to preserve a tree with some rot in it if it still provides shade and looks good or has a lot of sentimental or historic value."

He cited one case of a woman whose tree was severely damaged by the winds and could possibly suffer more damage in another storm because of her large trees' rotted wood.

"But she said she wanted to keep that tree and just take whatever measures she could afford to keep it safe and in good condition," Boor added. "That's the kind of customer I like to have."

Tips for tree safety, care

- Doug Boor of Mountaintop Tree Company advises those who have had tree damage in the last week or two to take some precautions regarding their care:
- If in doubt, don't try to climb a damaged tree to perform your own repair — leave that to experts. "There was one place where after the storm, one person hired a couple of inexperienced guys to cut down a broken limb. The limb fell on his garage and fence and caused a lot more damage than it would have cost to for professionals to do it," Boor says.
 - A lot of work we did was "economical jobs," where we'd take care of the potentially dangerous tree limbs and leave it to the homeowner to clear away the branches afterwards.
 - Don't assume the potential hazards of wind-damaged trees are over. Broken limbs stuck high up in trees can still fall on people or property and should be removed.
 - Have a tree care company cable heavy limbs or lighten a tree's upper boughs to reduce the possibility of damage caused by top-heavy trees.
 - If you've needed to cut off a broken limb, there are special treatments for the exposed wood area that can resist some rotting elements. Varnish and wood preservatives work reasonably well for small surfaces, but for large exposed areas — more than a foot wide, for example — an expert should be consulted. "You have to be careful, because some of those treatments can slow the growth of cambium tissue, which you want to develop," Boor adds.
 - When trimming a wounded limb, cut back to the sound (living) wood, and cut close to vertically while minimizing the exposed wood with the cut.
 - Dead wood should be trimmed from a tree every three or four years, and lightening of heavy upper limbs about as regularly.

There are customers, and there are customers: "Just brought these extra vegetables in from my garden to spread around among the employees."
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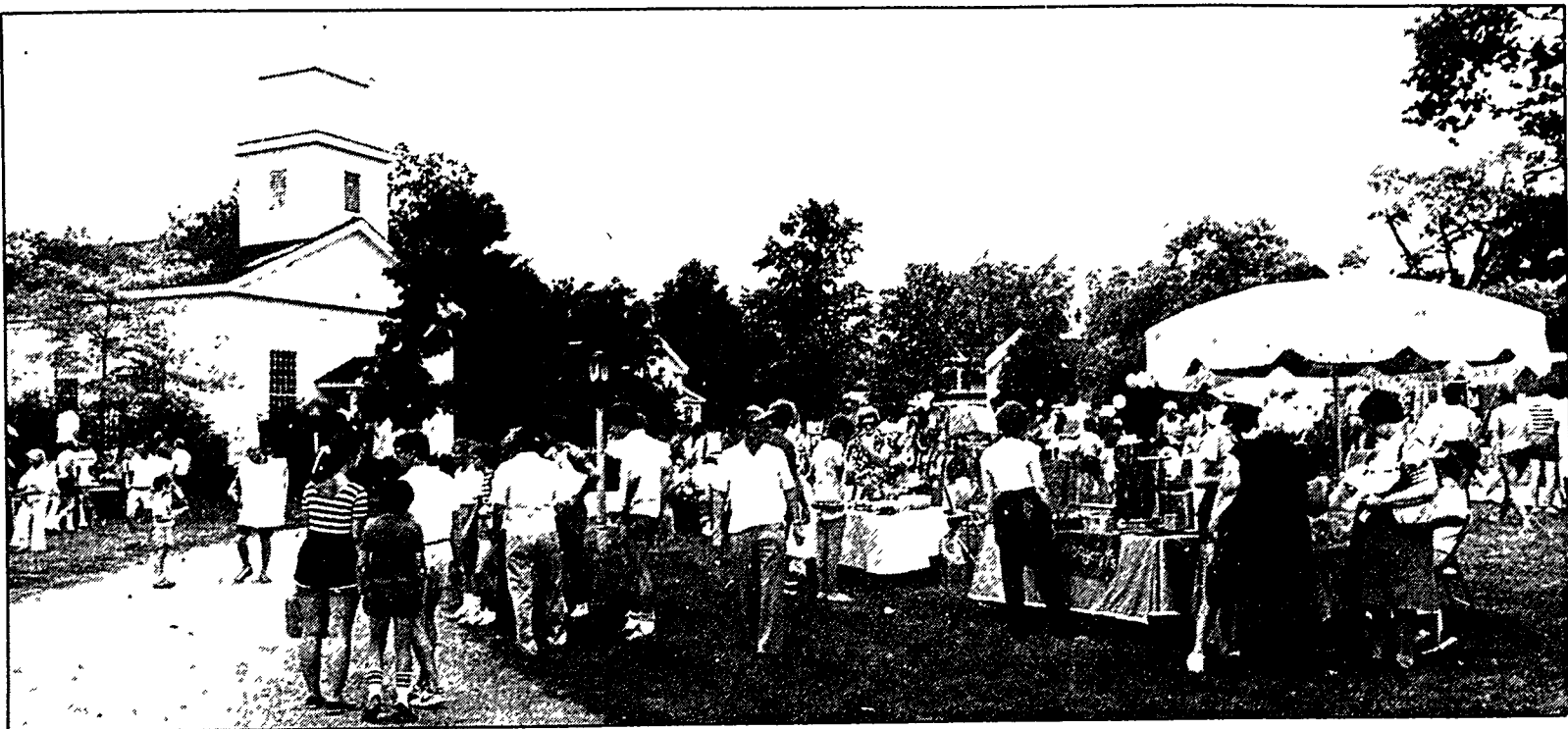

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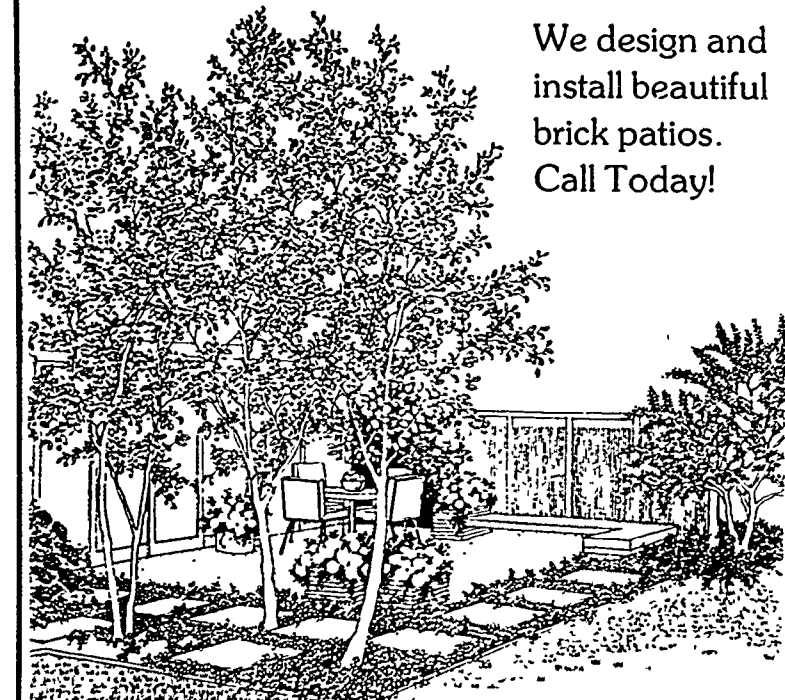

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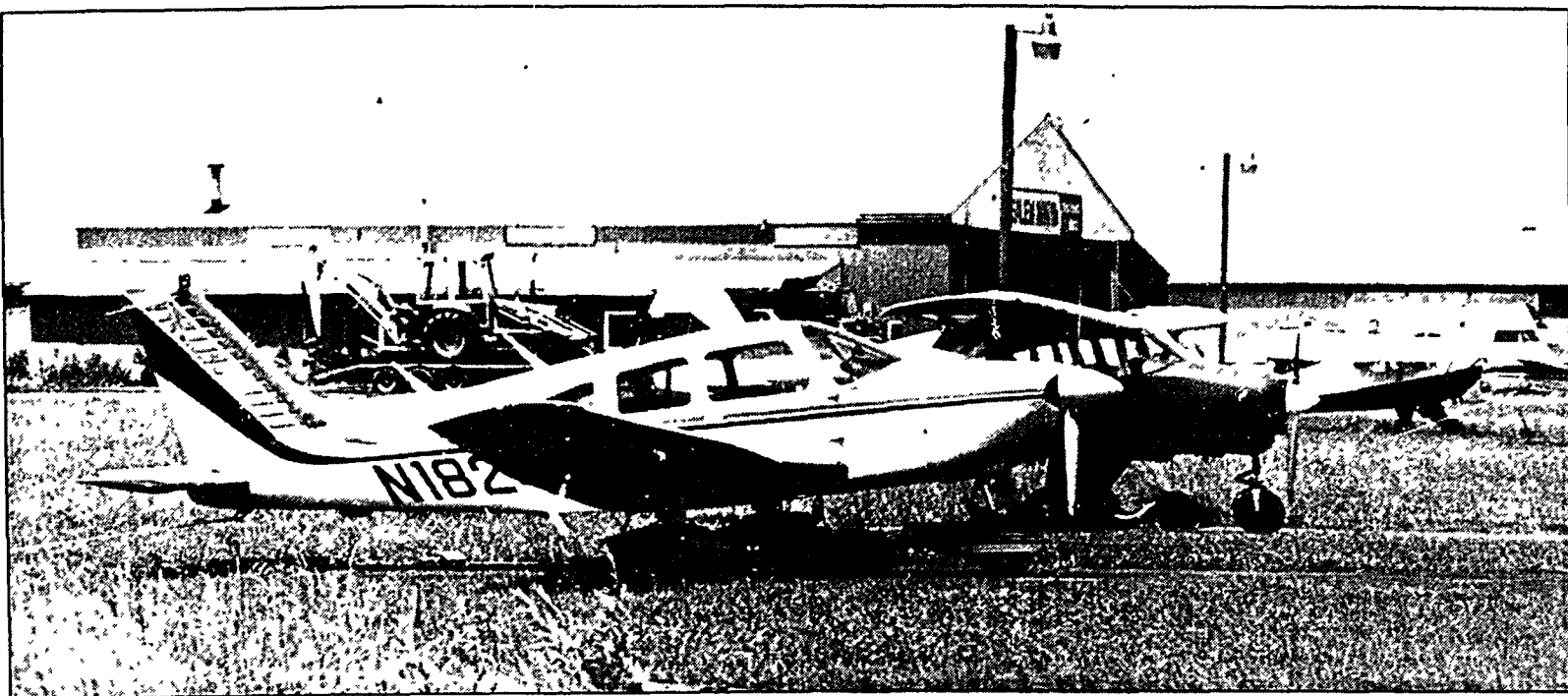

Holloway buys Salem Airport property

Salem Airport used to be a real problem for Holloway Sand and Gravel. It was a major stumbling block to Holloway's request to expand its landfill operation in Salem Township. But Salem Airport is no longer troublesome. Holloway bought it.

A binding purchase agreement has been entered into by Salem Airport, Incorporated and Holloway Sand and Gravel, precipitating the withdrawal of the airport's opposition to the expansion of the neighboring Holloway Landfill at Six Mile and Napier.

Holloway's attorney, John Brennan, said the purchase agreement was struck on June 23, the day prior to a key meeting of the Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) Resource Recovery Commission. The commission meeting was called to address potential safety hazards arising from the proximity of the proposed landfill expansion to the airport. Holloway has agreed to cease airport operations when and if phase

two of the landfill becomes operative, Brennan said.

The purchase agreement divested the Resource Recovery Commission of any jurisdiction relative to the landfill, Brennan explained.

Elmore Eltzroth, geologist for the groundwater quality division of the DNR, said the only purpose of the June 24 meeting was to resolve the airport issue. Eltzroth explained that the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and the Michigan Aeronautics Commission have taken a "very strong stance" that airports and landfills cannot co-exist within 10,000 feet of one another.

As a result of the hearing, Eltzroth said, the commission expected to submit to the director of the DNR its recommendation for approval of the Holloway landfill application. Eltzroth said on June 28 that the commission was awaiting information from the DNR's air quality division, but expressed certainty that its recommendation would be positive.

The June 24 Resource Recovery Commission meeting was recessed with the agreement that it could be reconvened if the representations made at the meeting relative to the purchase of Salem Airport were erroneous or incorrect, Eltzroth said.

According to Holloway's attorney, the sales transaction will be concluded by August 1.

Brennan explained that Holloway decided to purchase the airport for an undisclosed sum because the proximity of the airport to the proposed landfill site was an issue with the state as well as local government.

Brennan added that the airport was "already for sale and was listed through Century 21. Holloway purchas-

ed the assets and land of Salem Airport, Incorporated to eliminate the impediment of the airport to the proposed site of the landfill expansion."

Ron Shoebridge, former owner of Salem Airport, Incorporated, refused to confirm or deny that the sales agreement had been reached.

Brennan has filed suit in Washtenaw County Circuit Court on behalf of Holloway resulting from Salem Township's denial of Holloway's application to expand the current landfill located at Six Mile and Napier. Holloway and Salem Township are also squaring off in court over the township's refusal to approve the establishment of an asphalt plant and grant mining permits (see related story).

Landfill issue in court

Holloway Sand and Gravel Company may be allowed to mine sand and

gravel to supply its temporary asphalt plant, located on 168 acres in Salem Township, depending on the outcome of a motion for summary judgement slated for hearing July 6.

Holloway's attorney, John Brennan, and township attorney Margaret Austin have a court date before Washtenaw County Circuit Court Judge Henry Conlin at 10 a.m. today regarding a pair of motions filed on behalf of Holloway.

In addition to the motion for summary judgement, Brennan is seeking the establishment of an escrow account to hold all future inspection and rental fees Salem Township assesses against Holloway's existing landfill operation pending the outcome of litigation.

In late March, the Salem Township Planning Commission recommended denial of

Holloway's requests for permission to mine sand and gravel, install and operate an asphalt plant and to expand the existing landfill on Six Mile near Napier Road. The township board upheld the planners' recommendations, denying all three requests.

Holloway filed suit against Salem Township and has so far succeeded in gaining the court's permission to temporarily operate the asphalt manufacturing facility. However, Holloway must haul sand and gravel to the site due to the lack of a mining permit for land adjacent to the plant.

Brennan indicated that he feels Holloway is in a favorable position to obtain a summary judgement permitting the mining on its property.

"I think the evidence is so strong in this case in favor of Holloway that it

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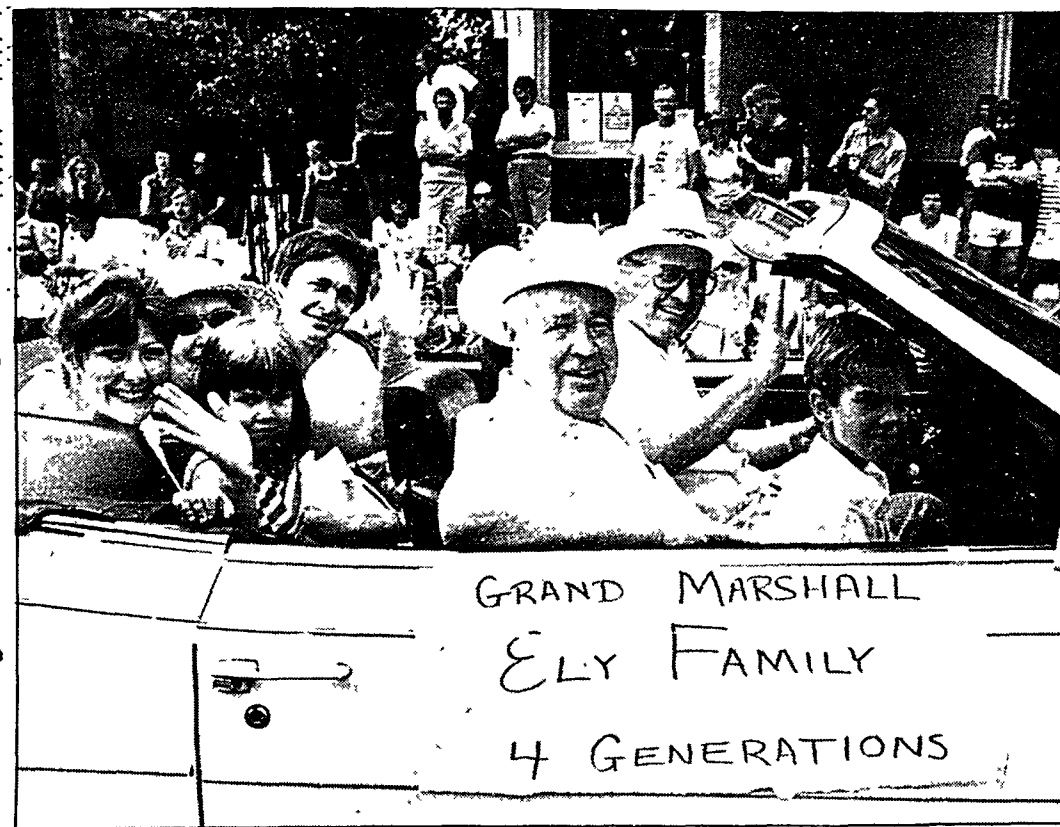

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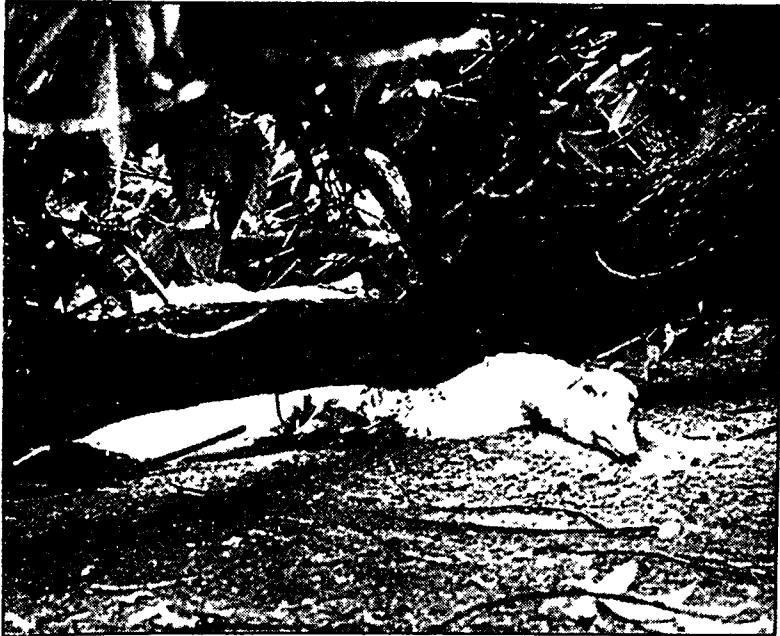

Residents tally damage to property from storm

It was bad, but whether the storm of a week ago Monday can be called a tornado seems to be in question.

There's no doubt it created damage through most of the community.

Last Friday DPW crews and residents still were cleaning up debris from the late-afternoon windstorm. A major loss has been the community's many trees although the winds also inflicted other damage where they swept through. In Lexington Commons North a garage roof dropped in a neighbor's yard.

As trees were blown down, they fell on cars and buildings, causing additional losses.

The older areas of the city were among the most severely hit with the Jack Burkmans reporting the loss of seven prime trees at their home on Old Baseline. Down the street, Doug Boor of Mountaintop Tree Company said the cabin he is building had lost its roof.

City DPW superintendent Theodore Mapes estimated that it could be two weeks before storm debris is removed. He said city crews have been working to remove trees and limbs in the city-owned areas between sidewalks and curbs, but that brush residents have been bringing to the curb from their yards could take longer to remove.

The city has been assisted in removal of damaged trees by Green Ridge Tree Service, he said.

While city DPW workers were on an overtime schedule the first night, Mapes said they now are back on regular work weeks. He added that while the storm was "one of those things," it wasn't in the department's budget.

Asked where he and his crews saw the most damage, Mapes said it appeared to be city-wide with the west section, including Northville Estates, least affected.

He cited the Mill Race Historical Village as one of the areas hit hard by the storm. Northville Historical Society

members were working last week to repair fence damage before the July 4 festivities.

Older sections of the city, including Cabbagetown north to Old Baseline and Bealtown near the racetrack were in the path of the windstorm with many older trees being lost.

"It was the most frightening thing I've ever seen in my life," commented Barbara Hubbard, in the DPW office last week as the damage from the quick storm was discussed.

City council member and insurance agency owner Paul Folino called the results of the storm "devastating."

He said last week he was investigating as many as 25 claims a day.

Folino said he agreed with some who felt the severe windstorm was a tornado because of his experience in the past with tornado damage. He explained that a windstorm damages trees in a different way from a tornado, or "twister," which literally twists trees in its path.

"In a windstorm," he said, "the wind will take everything in one direction — the damage would have been going all one way."

In some instances, he added, trees were hit by lightning. It is possible immediately to determine those hit, he said, by the way the tree splinters.

Insurance, he said, usually replaces only those trees hit by lightning.

If a tree falls on a house, insurance covers having it removed from the house, but it does not pay to have the tree cut up and hauled away, Folino added.

Homeowners' insurance usually pays for house damage if a tree hits it, and an automobile hit by a tree is covered by the owner's comprehensive policy, Folino said.

Some homeowners with costly tree damage last week were photographing results in preparation for internal revenue service claims at income tax time.

Van, diving gear, motor bikes stolen

In the township...

Township police are investigating two June 28 burglaries they believe are related, with specific interest in two persons arrested in River Rouge in possession of a van stolen from one residence.

Police reports indicate the suspects stole a 1974 Ford Van valued at \$3,000, parked in a Steepleview driveway, first gaining entrance to the garage with a garage door opener left in the van.

Stolen from the garage were a \$1,200 Evinrude 15 h.p. outboard motor and a \$250 Toro snowblower. More valuable were the contents of the van, which included several scuba-diving air tanks valued between \$150 and \$250, a \$180 air regulator, diving equipment bags valued at \$1,000, two underwater Nikonos cameras worth \$1,000 apiece, a \$500 light, an \$800 dry suit, a \$150 wet suit, \$200 worth of tool and first aid boxes. Other items bring the total

stolen to over \$10,000 value.

The van may have been used in a second burglary later that night, police said, which netted thieves another \$2,150 worth of items — primarily motorcycles — from a Ladywood residence.

According to the police report, a Ladywood resident heard voices outside at approximately 4:35 a.m. and looked out to see a dark-colored van in front of his home and several young white males going door-to-door on Ladywood. First thinking they were delivering newspapers, he was unconcerned he told police, until hearing another vehicle come onto the street and a shouted warning that police were in the area.

When the youths fled, the man called police. Inspecting his house, police found a Honda 125 dirt bike left lying on its side in the yard, its ignition damaged. It was traced to an owner three doors away.

When awakened, the resident there discovered his garage door opener had been damaged and two other motorcycles and a moped were missing from inside. Stolen were a \$600 Honda 80 dirt bike and a \$550 Honda 70 bike. Also stolen was a 1978 Honda moped.

The culprits also damaged three cars — prying the trunk open on a 1978 Oldsmobile inflicting \$100 damage, and scratching a Chevrolet Caprice (\$400) and a 1982 Buick (\$200).

Other Ladywood residents reported their garage doors appeared to have been disturbed.

Notice of the stolen van reached River Rouge police, who the next day arrested two men seen with the purple van. Captain Phillip Presnell said the two have been "uncooperative" but that some of the stolen property has been recovered.

A bicycle stolen from a Old Bridge Court patio deck early June 28 was

valued at \$175. The owner told police he parked the 10-speed blue Facet Bio-Tour on the patio at 11:30 p.m. and noted it missing at 7 a.m.

Two tool boxes containing tools including socket wrench sets and other materials were stolen from the garage of a home located on Carrington Street in late June, it was reported this week.

The tool boxes, together valued at \$400, were taken sometime between June 19 and June 26, the owner told city police. No suspects have been found in connection with the theft.

A woman's bicycle, left unlocked and unattended at Cooke Junior High School on Tall Road for half an hour last Thursday morning, was reported stolen.

4 city police officers cited for good work

Four Northville city police officers recently were cited for meritorious performance of duty, it was announced this week.

Officer James Petres was awarded a letter of commendation for his role in improving communications between public safety officials and the National Transportation Board in relation to the May 22, 1982, plane crash in the city.

Departmental commendations were given to officers Donald Lancaster and Anthony Tilger for their participation in the incident.

Officer Gary Callendar was given a five-year safe driving award for having no auto accidents on patrol during that time.

County picks up part of road treatment cost

An agreement between the Wayne County Road Commission and township supervisors made for minor relief of the burden of paying for chloride treatments on gravel roads in Northville Township.

The county agreed to split the cost for treatment of 2.7 miles of the nearly 17 miles of so-called local county roads for which the township must pay. There are about 31.7 miles of gravel roads treated with the dust preventative last week — 14 miles of what the county considers "major" roads on which it pays for the treatments, 14 miles of local roads it charges the township for treating and the remaining 2.7 where the cost is split.

Supervisor John MacDonald said the agreement to split the cost on the 2.7 miles saves the township less than \$900 from the nearly \$10,000 it cost to treat roads this year.

The agreement, reached in a meeting between supervisors of the townships in the county and the county road commission, means much greater savings for communities such as Canton and Van Buren townships, he said.

In essence, the county agreed to pay half the cost of treating those miles of roadway which it previously had covered but was charging to the townships this year. In Northville Township, water and sewer superintendent Walter Holinoty said the prime example was West Main.

In the past, West Main was considered a major county road and was treated by the road commission. This year, the road commission determined West Main was a "local" county road and the responsibility of the township. The agreement splits the cost of treatment.

The agreement will not lead to a second treatment of roads, as the amount saved was insufficient to cover a second application.

Chloride applications previously were done twice a year to control dust, but in recent years the road commission has shifted the costs to local government. The township has paid for only a single application each summer the past two years, citing the cost and the loss of county funding.

will not go through a full hearing," Brennan said. He explained that summary judgments are granted when one party's case is so strong that the court decides against allowing it to go to trial. If Holloway's motion

for summary judgement is denied, a pre-trial date has been established for 11:15 a.m. October 6, according to Conlin's clerk. The Holloway case will go to trial March 19, she said.

According to an affidavit sworn to by Holloway Secretary Charles McGee, Holloway will pay \$812,000 during the 1983 construction year to haul sand and gravel to its temporary asphalt plant site. McGee's statement indicated that Washtenaw County has availed itself of \$3 million of funding for reconstruction and improvements of the county's roads since the litigation began. He states that by mining the aggregate, Holloway would be able to offer asphalt and aggregate for public improvements at a "substantially reduced price."

In his brief in support of Holloway's motion for summary judgment, Brennan argued that the planning commission acted in an arbitrary and capricious manner by recommending denial of the mining permit. He noted that the land in question is designated for heavy industry in the township land use plan, and that the proposed uses are consistent with and permitted by the township zoning or-

dinance. "The depositions taken of three of the seven members of the (Salem Township) planning commission disclosed that the planning commission had no basis for the conclusions stated by them in their resolution of March 28," Brennan stated. "In fact, the testimony of three deponents disclosed that the resolution and determination which had been made outside of public meetings was nothing more than a potpourri of all of the reasons given by those persons who were opposed to the sand and gravel mining operation..."

"Finally the testimony taken at the depositions of these three members of the planning commission revealed that there was really no opposition to the proposed sand and gravel operation but only to the expansion of the landfill operation."

In addition, court documents state, the planning commission did not consult with the township engineer, zoning administrator or fire inspector, as required by the zoning ordinance.

Depositions of Planning Commission Chairperson Donald Riddering, Commission Secretary Norma Schmemman and Commission Member Susan Bejin were taken in April and May.

The depositions reveal that members of the planning commission met and discussed the Holloway issues on various occasions outside regular planning commission meetings. Although the depositions do not indicate that a quorum of commission members was present at such meetings, they do show that commission members discussed and deliberated on Holloway's requests.

Brennan said the Open Meetings Act (OMA) clearly prohibits public bodies from deliberating or deciding issues outside of meetings open to the public. Brennan added that an individual may study questions independently, but suggested that the conduct of the planning commission was in violation of the OMA.

In her deposition, Schmemman stated that Riddering asked her to type up a draft of a resolution to deny the Holloway request for landfill expansion on a Sunday the week prior to the March 28 meeting. She stated that Bejin coincidentally was at her home that day. Schmemman also testified that the three worked on the resolution that Sunday, although they did not confer with other planning commission members.

Remember the ferry to Canada?

When I was growing up, the announcement that we were going on vacation was synonymous with a trip to Canada. It meant that we were taking my grandparents to see his brother and family in the small Ontario town of Galt. My mother and aunt packed my brother and me and two cousins along with our grandparents into the car and started off for Port Huron and Sarnia once every summer.

We always departed before dawn to be in line for the first car ferry across the St. Clair River. In retrospect, I wonder if it was much fun for the adults as four restless youngsters could hardly wait to get out of the car to watch for the ferry. Of course, cars were much bigger then, but we still were squeezed into the back seat, constantly bickering about whose turn it was to have a window seat.

While the view from the Bluewater Bridge today is panoramic, the drive across does not compare to the excitement I remember of watching the car edge onto the ferry and then standing by the rail to watch the boat's progress toward Sarnia. It was a highlight of the trip.

There was no highway 401 in those days; so we drove all day through such appealing small towns as Paris, located at the foot of a series of hills. When we arrived in Galt, we all stayed with grandpa's bother and his family in a small stone house that seemed very old to us. In addition to great-uncle Davey and great-aunt Mary, there were four boys in their late teens and early twenties. As I think back about them, they were very kind to four youngsters.

They took us with them into the little town and to the park with a cobblestoned stream where we peeled off socks and shoes to wade. But most exciting were the band concerts in the park in the evening. As in many Scottish families, playing an instrument was important. At some sacrifice the best possible musical instruments were obtained for each son. And they practiced regularly after getting home from the shoe factories

where they worked.

These shoe factories were — and still are — vital to the economy of the area. Today signs mark factory outlet stores in this region just south of Guelph and Kitchener between London and Toronto. The factories were a living for this family as all four sons were employed in them. Uncle Davey had a wooden leg and often was off work. Sometimes, he and Aunt Mary would come back with us to have adjustments made on the artificial limb. Flint had such facilities, but they were not available in the small town of Galt.

Galt was one of three cities only a very few miles apart. We always also visited Preston as Mom and my aunt searched for bargains in English china. Always, a cup and saucer or plates were added to their sets.

On a trip a week ago to Canada, I found Galt no longer on the map. The towns of Galt, Preston and Hespeler have been merged into the municipality of Cambridge as a practical matter for administration and services. The towns have grown together, although some businesses keep the old town names.

In the former Galt area a mill has been converted into a restaurant where diners are seated overlooking the dam. The Cambridge Mill restaurant is worth seeking out for its excellent food. For me, it was pure nostalgia to drive past the old stone houses on the way. I couldn't locate the one where Uncle Davey and Aunt Mary lived, though.

For travelers interested in staying or dining in former mills, inns and schoolhouses that have been converted into hotels and restaurants, the Ontario Ministry of Tourism (Queen's Park, Toronto M7A2E1) has a free book, Country Inns and Dining. It also is available (as are the Cambridge area factory outlet lists) at regional travel centers. There is one just south of the 401 in Cambridge.

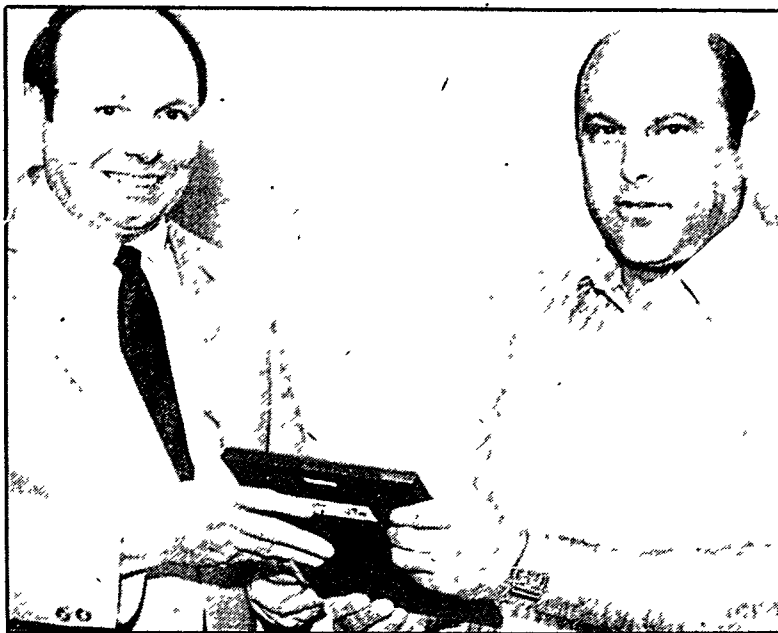

Dumas tells Rotary

Charter set up county power struggles

"Don't look for absolute peace" in Wayne County government this year, commissioner Mary Dumas told the Northville Rotary Club last week Tuesday.

There is a lot to be decided yet in the power struggle between the executive and legislative branches of the government reorganized under a new charter last year, she explained.

"The major question to be answered is, will we have two strong co-equal branches as exist at the federal and state level and in many cities, or will we have a strong executive form with a commission that is largely a rubber stamp?" she said.

The commission, she said, is still deeply split between its Detroit and out-county members with Detroit commissioners holding an 8-7 edge in votes. With Detroit members often supporting county executive William Lucas, she implied, the drift is toward a strong executive form.

Additionally, she cited power struggles between the executive and other constitutional officers, such as the well-publicized case with the sheriff.

"It must be determined whether the county executive officer or the commission have appointive powers to certain board and commissions, including some which set rates and levy taxes on county residents," Dumas said.

She said many people do not realize that, in the transition period, the resource staff available to the old county commission was reassigned to the executive office, leaving the commis-

sion short of staff for necessary research.

"We have just within the past two weeks appointed an auditor general and our legislative research bureau is starting to function so we soon hope to have the capability of obtaining the information necessary" to deal with the budget, she said.

"The power and turf struggles are probably very normal and inevitable," she said, pointing out Wayne is the first charter county in the state and therefore must set the precedents that will form not only its own future, but that of any other charter counties to follow.

Deeply involved in corrections issues, Dumas reported the new Wayne County Jail is set to open in October but that legislation now being considered in Lansing, combined with the expectation that Detroit will abandon the housing of prisoners at DeHoCo, may worsen the prison crowding situation despite the new facility.

She advocated "creative" measures to relieve prison crowding by using innovative sentences for non-dangerous prisoners to insure that there is room to house dangerous suspects and convicted criminals.

Dumas also said out-county residents are benefiting from the resumption of the sheriff's Hines Park Patrol and reopening of the mini-station in Livonia. The sheriff's marine patrol has also been resumed and will conduct water safety programs and classes for new boaters.

DNR bypasses funding of super sewer project

resulted in 8-7 approval of local funding, with seven out-county commissioners joined by a single Detroit commissioner in support. All seven opposition votes were cast by Detroit commissioners.

"Even the county executive office has not given unqualified support to super sewer because Detroit commissioners are afraid it will take business away from the city of Detroit," Dumas said. Although county executive William Lucas is himself on record supporting the project, Dumas said there is evidence of "a difference of opinion over in the exec's office."

Dumas told Rotary it is "rumored that the governor's office will create a compromise which would cut off the northern tier of communities, throwing them into the Detroit system. This would leave the southern and downriver portion too small to be cost effective. In effect, this could kill super sewer by the back door and put the money into improving Detroit's sewer system."

Dumas said Tuesday the DNR imposed last-minute changes and strictly interpreted regulations because of the "political attempt on the part of Coleman Young to kill the project, as he has done for the past 10 years."

If the project fails for lack of funding, Dumas said it is likely the local communities will sue DNR in hopes of recouping the funds they have invested in planning over the past decade or more.

City manager Steven Walters said the most immediate concern for Northville — which had been deleted from participation in the Huron Valley system under the compromise that guaranteed current flows to Detroit — is some \$30,000 it is owed for planning.

"As far as I know, we would get our \$30,000 back only when (construction) bonds are sold — if no bonds are sold, I don't know what happens," he said. MDNR did allocate \$5 million toward a relief sewer (see related story) but Walters said he did not know if the city could recoup its investment from that project.

staffing. The hospital is overpopulated and has been that way for several years.

During June there were 52 reported escapes, with 31 patients returned to the hospital, leaving 21 at large, by the township's count. Those figures bring the year-to-date numbers up to 296 reported escapes, 238 returned with 59 at large. In May, there were 48 escapes, 27 returned, 21 at large.

The figures do not coincide with those kept by the hospital. Patients who admit themselves voluntarily are not

listed as escapees by the hospital, while those away beyond a specified time period are considered released.

Hardesty noted Taylor is not the first patient to actively resist apprehension, citing a felonious assault charge filed last month when an escapee hurled a large chunk of concrete at security officers and another earlier in the year when a patient walking down the railroad tracks began hurling rocks at his pursuers.

Hardesty said his officers have often had to subdue patients who are less than cooperative, struggling against the arrest and occasionally physically fighting.

NOTICE OF PROVISIONS OF THE NOXIOUS WEED AND REFUSE ORDINANCE

TO: All owners, occupants or possessors of subdivided lands or lots

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that in accordance with Ordinance No. 82-104 of the City of Novi, all noxious weeds, or other weeds, grass, brush, or deleterious, unhealthy growths exceeding a height of twelve (12) inches, or any refuse or debris growing, standing or lying upon any property in the City of Novi, shall be cut down, destroyed or removed as the case may be, at least twice in each year, once during the last half of the month of May and again during the last half of July each year and more often as may be necessary.

In the event the owner or occupant, or any person or persons, agent, firm or corporation having control or management of any subdivided land in any subdivision in which any buildings have been erected and where such subdivision has a zoning classification that is "residential", shall fail, refuse, or neglect to comply with the above mentioned Ordinance, the City shall cause said weeds, grass, brush, deleterious, unhealthy growths, rubbish, or debris to be cut down, destroyed or removed. Provided, further, that any lands which are situated within the flood plains or any natural streams or water courses, or any area between the lower or upper banks of such streams or water courses shall be exempted from the provisions of this Ordinance. The expense incurred by the City in the cutting, destruction or removal of same together with a ten (10%) percent administrative charge will be levied and collected against such property in the manner provided by law.

Failure to comply with the requirements set forth in Ordinance No. 82-104 may also result in the prosecution for same, and liability to the extent of the penalty therein provided.

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Site plans for medical clinic, lawnmower shop refused

Plans for a one-story lawnmower repair shop and a four-suite medical clinic facility were put on hold by township planning commissioners at their monthly meeting last week.

The developers — John Janigan for the repair shop and Dr. Paul Clancy, D.D.S., for the dental/medical offices — objected to the township officials' requirements to bring their plans into compliance with zoning use guidelines.

In particular, Dr. Clancy objected to the township's recent action on minimum parking spaces for medical building patient waiting rooms.

Site plans for the building contained plans for 44 parking places, including those for clinic staff. Dr. Clancy said that demand for the spaces could be reduced by limiting office use to physicians without much patient traffic — specialists, for example. Commissioners, however, remained unconvinced.

"When I bought the property (located on Six Mile Road near Winchester)," Dr. Clancy told planning commissioners Tuesday last week, "I checked into the parking requirements. The requirements were one parking spot for every treatment room and every 100 square feet of waiting room

space. . . Now I discover a change has been made to make the parking ratio one parking spot for every 15 square feet.

"Basically, I'm looking for some relief on this seven-fold reduction," he concluded.

It wasn't coming — township engineer Edward McNeely pointed out that in addition to the parking space shortcomings, no grade plan had been included in Dr. Clancy's proposal to determine how stormwater runoff would be handled.

Planning consultant Claude Coates raised additional objections in his report to the commission, citing insufficient driveway width in one entrance and insufficient tree plantings in the site plan.

Dr. Clancy asked commissioners about possible ways he could seek a reversal, and was advised he could consult members of the Zoning Board of Appeals or revise his site plans.

Rainwater drainage was a problem in Janigan's site plan also, although at first the main question was whether a lawnmower repair building would be in the best interests of residential neighborhoods nearby.

Coates maintained it was not the intent of the B-1 district to be used for a lawn mower repair service. "Its character is such that it doesn't allow

outside testing," he explained. "The intent of B-1 zoning is to provide for local convenience (stores), day-to-

day needs. . . I see that (repair shop) as a general business use." Janigan stayed most of those objec-

tions by claiming all repair work would be done indoors so as not to disturb neighbors, adding he would store "no products outside the building and that the business would focus upon local clients, not become a regional repair center.

"A hardware store is permitted (in B-1 zoning) and there isn't one that doesn't do lawn mower repairs," Janigan protested, adding that his preliminary efforts had positive reactions from township inspector Troy Milligan and neighbors of the proposed repair shop, to be located at Five Mile and Haggerty roads.

McNeely, however, again pointed out Janigan had included no drainage plan, and that approval by the Wayne County Road Commission would likely be necessary to okay the drainage route. Also, McNeely noted, the Road Commission would likely require driveways to the building be increased from 16 feet wide to 35 feet wide.

It appears likely Janigan's office will eventually be approved, as Planning Commission Chairman Richard Duvel commented there is "no strong basis for denying (the project)," assuming, as commissioner William Bohan observed, "a lot of serious deficiencies" in the site plan are addressed.

Downtown merchants seek student for 'pushcart' idea

The Northville Retail Merchants' Association is seeking a local student with an awareness of the community to fill a part-time job this summer.

The young person hired will be working in town picking up litter from streets and sidewalks with a push cart and also will be a walking information center. Identified by a uniform, the student must be "very familiar with the town," according to Scott Lapham, Northville Community Chamber of Commerce president and member of the retail merchants.

"We're looking for someone

who knows names and locations of local businesses and buildings and can direct visitors to them," he explains.

The new cart is being painted red at the DPW yard and will be ready for use shortly.

The job will pay minimum wage, Lapham says, and will be for several hours a day, probably on Mondays, Fridays and Saturdays.

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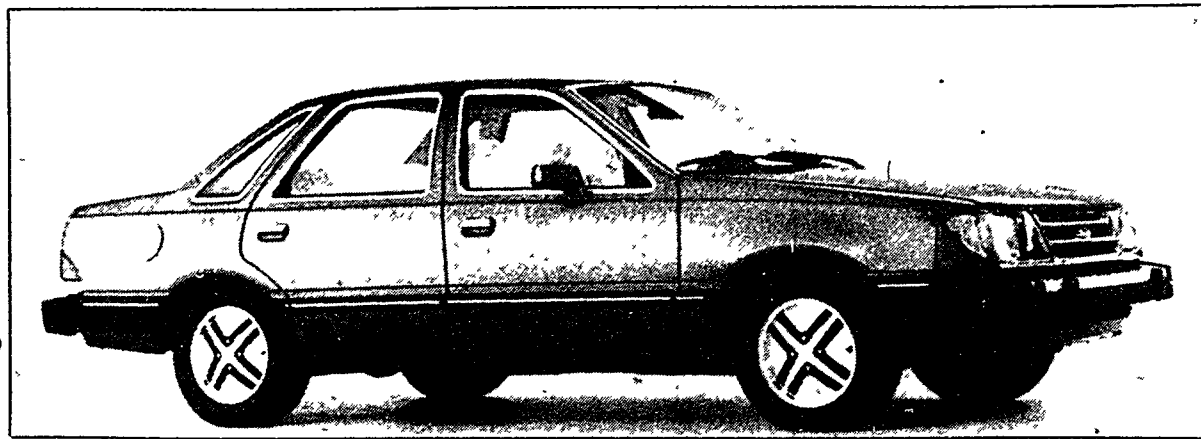

Aero-look Fords breathe fresh air into sales

As it celebrates its 80th anniversary with a look back to its roots in Henry Ford's homebuilt "quadricycle" Ford Motor Company has launched a risky step into the future that local dealers say is paying off.

Two totally new models sent into the marketplace this year put Ford in the forefront among American automakers by emphasizing aerodynamic styling.

The Ford Thunderbird took off with a stunning leap in sales by more than 100 percent over its predecessor model, and was followed in late May by the 1984 Tempo, a compact front-drive car with an identifiable styling-relationship to the Thunderbird.

Both cars feature rounded lines that depart from the sharply-creased styling of the models they replace — the original "downsized" 1980-82 T-Bird and the boxy Ford Fairmont.

Analysts warned of a marketing risk of encountering "buyer resistance" to the radical styling departure, but public acceptance is not the problem at the dealerships.

The Thunderbird is "going like gangbusters" at McDonald Ford in Northville, according to sales manager Kevin Mallon. In fact, he said, his major concern is obtaining enough cars to meet demand. The dealership had not stocked many of the previous model, he noted, after 1981 when sales of the Thunderbird dropped.

"Before they downsized it, we sold quite a few but we didn't stock heavily on the '80-'82 T-Bird," Mallon said.

"The '83, we're stocking quite a few." As a result, McDonald Ford has seen a sales increase on T-Bird far beyond the 100-120 percent figure registered company-wide in recent sales periods.

Ford recently introduced a performance "Turbo Coupe" version of the Thunderbird with turbocharged 2.3 liter four-cylinder engine that Mallon said is also selling well.

"We're selling the regular 'Bird by far more than the Turbo, but the Turbo really does appeal to the performance-oriented buyer. It'll really get up and go."

As for the new Tempo, Mallon said a single incident expresses the sales picture.

Three of the new cars arrived on a truck last week and "we sold two of them before they were ever unloaded." The four-door is outselling the two-door version, he added, indicating a strong contingent buying the Tempo as a family car.

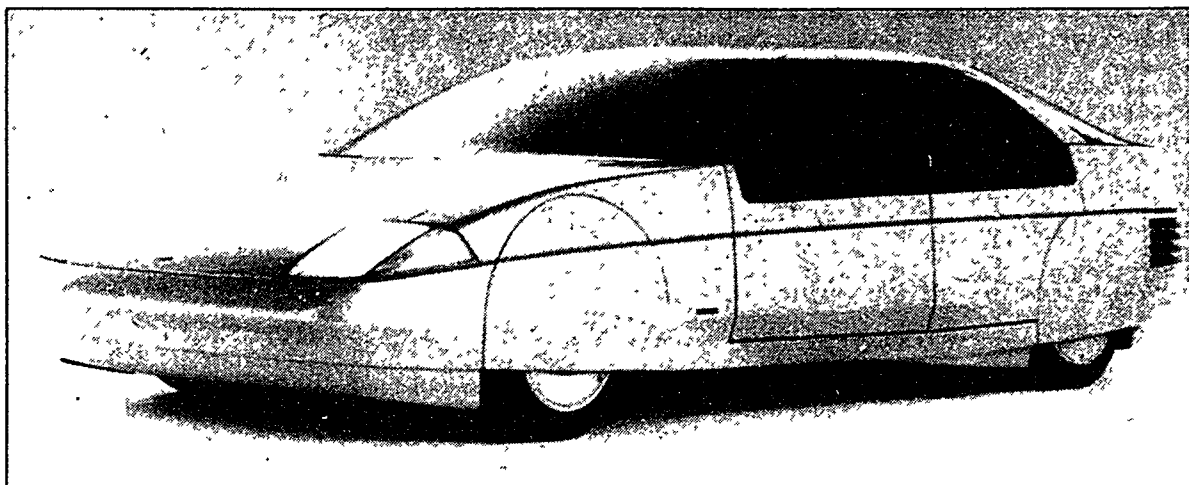
He's seen "not a bit" of buyer resistance to the rounded wedge styling and, as is the case with the Thunderbird, worries only about obtaining enough cars before the plants shut down for the annual summer build-down.

"The response has been terrific. It rides better, handles much better, it's a real improvement over the Fairmont (a rear-drive car replaced by the front-drive Tempo).

"It fills a segment of the market where we've needed something — the moderate front-drive family car," he said. "We've really had nothing competing there, and now we do."

Taxpayers have right to appeal IRS audits

If your federal income taxes have been audited or examined, and you disagree with the examiner's determination, you have the right to an appeal. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) supplied the following questions and answers about appeal rights to assist those in this situation.

Q. Why are some people's returns chosen for examination while others are not?

A. Generally, the reason is to verify the correctness of income, exemptions or deductions claimed. Sometimes, returns are selected as part of a random sample under the Taxpayer Compliance Measurement Program (TCMP).

Q. What is TCMP?

A. IRS's enforcement and research program designed to measure and evaluate taxpayer compliance with the law.

Q. If my return is selected for examination, how will it be done?

A. The examination may be done by correspondence, or may take place in your home or business, an IRS office or the office of your attorney or accountant. While IRS makes the decision on method and place, it tries to select what is appropriate for the circumstances.

Q. My return has been selected. At the time I filed the return, I lived in a different state. Must I return to that state for the examination?

A. No. Request that your case be transferred to your present district.

Q. Suppose the examiner says I owe more money and I don't agree? What recourse do I have?

A. Immediately ask to speak to the examiner's supervisor. Often, differences can be settled there and then. If not, take the necessary steps to have your case reviewed by an Appeals Officer.

Q. I'm scheduled to meet with an Appeals Officer, but there's no way I can make it? What should I do?

A. For a valid reason you may ask that the meeting be postponed and rescheduled. Alternatively, you may be represented by an attorney, a certified public accountant or by a person enrolled to practice before the IRS.

Q. If you send a representative, you must file a power of attorney. IRS forms for this purpose are available at most IRS offices, or any other properly written authorization may be used.

Q. Suppose I am still not satisfied after the conference with the Appeals Officer? What recourse have I then?

A. If you still disagree with the IRS, you can take your case to the United States Tax Court, U.S. Claims Court, or District Court. These courts are independent and have no ties with IRS.

Q. I would like to know more about the appeals system. Where can I get more information?

A. Free publication 556, "Examination of Returns, Appeal Rights and Claims for Refunds" is available from IRS on request. Check the publications order form included in the tax form booklet or contact your local IRS office.

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Investing in older homes rises

If you admire old architecture and would accept a special investment challenge, you may want to join the growing number of Americans buying and rehabilitating old houses.

These "urban homesteaders" purchase run-down houses, usually at a low price, and transform them into cozy, good-as-new living quarters.

Of course, rehabilitation is neither easy nor cheap, the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants notes, but you may be able to take advantage of money saving tax breaks and special programs offered by the federal and local governments.

Even with government cutbacks of financial grants, many cities still receive sizeable Community Development Block Grants which are often used to improve private housing. Depending on your income and the location of the house you are rehabilitating, you may be eligible for low-interest rehabilitation loans, the CPA group advises. Check with local government offices.

You may also qualify for tax breaks for rehabilitating an old house. If the house lies within an historic district, you could get charitable contribution tax deductions by donating the facade of the house to local non-profit preservation societies.

This tax break, known as a facade easement, is granted for the appraised value of brownstone stoops, decorative cornices and trim or masonry reliefs on doors and windows.

Depending upon the improvements you make, you can also get an energy conservation tax credit. You're allowed a maximum credit of \$300, or 15 percent of costs up to \$2,000 for such energy-saving improvements as new storm windows or insulation for the house you're rehabilitating.

Because cities recognize the value of rehabilitating houses and neighborhoods many offer breaks on property taxes to encourage rehabilitation. In St. Louis, for instance, the law

grants a 10-year moratorium on extra property tax for the value of improvements made to a rehabilitated house. Then for the next 15 years, you pay only half the the going property tax rate.

No matter how much you spend buying and rehabilitating an old house, CPAs suggest keeping accurate records of all your expenses for capital improvements. Thus, when you sell the house, you reduce the amount of capital gain made from the sale.

For instance, if the house costs \$20,000 and you spend another \$30,000 in rehabilitation, your total investment is \$50,000. Later, selling the house for \$65,000, your actual (taxable) gain is only \$15,000 rather than the \$45,000 that would be recorded in the absence of capital improvement records.

Once you find a house you like, getting a mortgage is a major hurdle. It may be easier if you apply at the bank holding the current mortgage on the house, CPAs say. Or look for banks specializing in rehabilitation mortgages or that have liberal lending policies if you buy in targeted neighborhoods. Check the local housing office or preservation society for suggestions.

Another possibility is the secondary mortgage market. The Federal National Mortgage Association, popularly known as "Fannie Mae" has a special mortgage financing program designed specifically for rehabilitation projects.

Under the program, Fannie Mae recognizes both the "as is" value of a property and the "as completed" value. So, you may get, say, a \$60,000 mortgage for a house with a current market value of only \$30,000.

A buyer can get a mortgage for 95 percent of a house's completed value. Fannie Mae backs the mortgage from a conventional lender. In our example, \$90,000 goes to the seller and the rest is placed in an escrow account administered by the lender.

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Bank offers credit line against equity in home

Manufacturers Bank has introduced a new personal revolving line of credit in amounts from \$7,500 to a maximum of \$100,000. This line of credit, called Equity Access, is secured by a first or second mortgage on a homeowners' primary residence located in the state of Michigan.

Equity access is available to individuals who have more than 30 percent equity in their homes. The amount of the credit line varies with the amount of homeowner equity and individual creditworthiness.

Equity Access is a pre-approved line of credit activated by check at the individuals discretion. Interest is charged only on the balance outstanding and is set at two percent over the prime rate, adjusted quarterly, with a minimum rate of 9.75 percent.

An introductory interest rate from now through December 31, 1983 fixes the rate at 12 percent or two percent over prime, whichever is lower.

Monthly payments are two percent of any outstanding balance or a minimum of \$100. There is a one-time \$100 application fee and an annual account fee of \$36. Applications are available at Manufacturers Bank offices and at its affiliated banks.

"Equity Access has the advantage of providing a substantial, immediate line of credit to the homeowner individual. When funds are needed, savings need not be withdrawn or other investments liquidated," explained Patrick M. McQueen, first vice president and officer in charge of the bank's consumer loan department.

"This type of credit opens for use — as an emergency resource or a personal financial tool — the equity normally locked into a fixed asset such as a home."

Remember our telephone operators?

Only 25 years ago Northville residents and businesses had three or four-digit telephone numbers. First Baptist Church of Northville's number in 1958 was 410. The Northville Record number was 200. Dr. Hugh Godfrey's number was listed as 784, and Dr. Stuart Campbell's was 1102.

Until the late 1950s, Michigan Bell Telephone operators handled calls from an office on the second floor of the brick building on the northeast corner of Main and Center. (The building currently is being renovated as Orin Jewelers plan to occupy the main floor on the corner.)

Virginia McGee, who retired from Michigan Bell three years ago with 28 years of service, recalls that the offices were moved to Plymouth in the late 1950s.

She and Cherri Gaydos, who still is a Michigan Bell employee, conceived the idea of having a reunion of these early Northville telephone operators and are in process of trying to contact more than 100 of them.

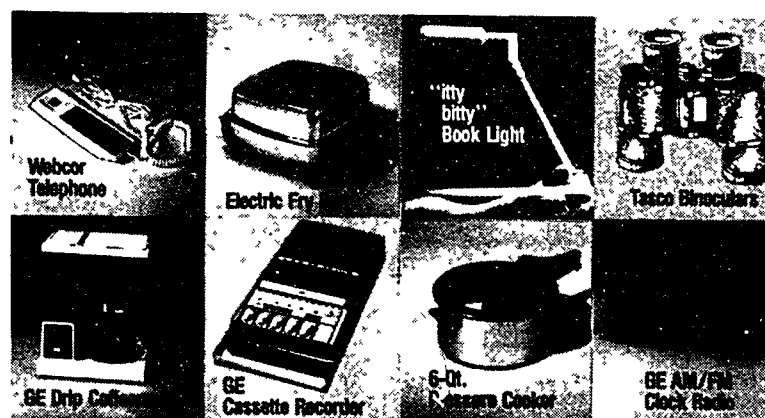

Archbishop Edmund G. Szoka appointed Father A. Frank Pollie as pastor of Our Lady of Victory, where he began June 29.

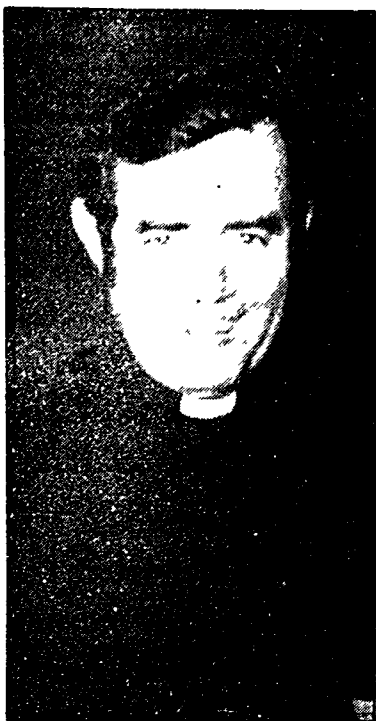

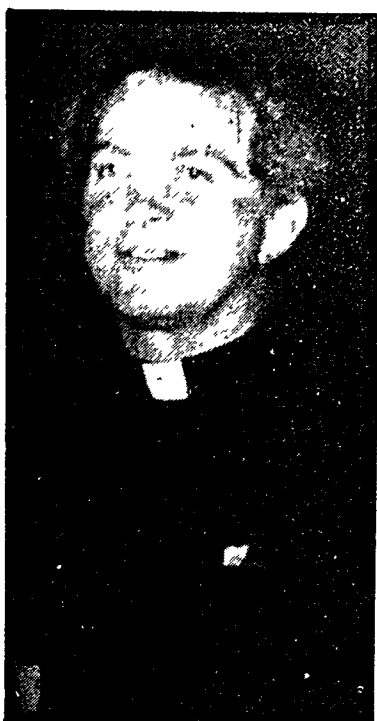

Northville's Pete Talbot inherits recreation post — but for how long?

Last Friday was officially the last day on the job for Northville Recreation Department Director Ed Kricitz — and the first day as interim director for 25-year-old Northville native Pete Talbot.

Talbot, employed by the department for five years, had been Program Supervisor, and as such was directly responsible for many of the department's activities: field maintenance, and scheduling in particular.

The cramped administrative office in the Recreation Building where Talbot, Secretary Tonni Burns and Supervisor Matt Sullivan carry on much of the day-to-day operations of the department, still contains many artifacts from the Kricitz reign — sports memorabilia, trophies, ribbons, photos and plaques. In a way, it's a reflection of Kricitz' still-palpable influence on the department's administration.

"It's been hectic — very busy," Talbot says of drawing up new projects under the auspices of his new responsibilities. "I haven't had time to think about what to do. That will likely fall to the (Recreation) Commission. I don't think I'll change everything around until they make a decision."

The decision Talbot refers to concerns the replacement of Kricitz. Recreation Commission Chairperson L.T. Sylvestre remarked last month, following Kricitz' resignation, it may take as much time as 90 days and possibly longer to name a successor as full-time Recreation Department Director.

The process is expected to be exhaustive. First, a job description must be decided on and written, information released to prospective candidates, responses evaluated, interviews scheduled and conducted and politicking for the selection undertaken.

Talbot would like to save the commission the trouble — he simply wants the job. "I've been directly responsible for most of the operations," he explains. "I obviously enjoy working with kids. I think I can take (commissioners') ideas and put them to work."

Talbot would definitely have a jump on the field in his knowledge of local sports interests. A graduate of Northville High School in 1976, he has a degree from Michigan State University in turf management (athletic field maintenance) and has plenty of experience drawing up schedules and handling the processing of public information items concerning the department.

Pete Talbot has thrown his hat in the ring to take over the Recreation Department's top spot — whether outgoing director Ed Kricitz' former protege is the commission's choice for the job is another matter.

Northville sports buffs may remember Talbot was one of the top swimmers on Northville High Schools' excellent swim teams in the mid-seventies, conference champs in 1975 and 1976. He returned to NHS as varsity swimming coach five years ago, and has spent the last four years as head coach with varying levels of success — at least according to the teams' records.

"We've got some young swimmers right now who are already outstanding," he says. "Some of our best swimmers this year were freshmen. It kind of comes and goes."

"We've got a little bit of a country-club kind of community here, so we do well in sports like tennis, golf, and so on. But I think we do surprisingly well in other sports, too," he adds, pointing at the high school's baseball and

basketball teams' success.

Talbot also has been one of the main forces in several of the Recreation Department's expansions and policy decisions.

"We've brought more under our wing," he says. "For the most part, we used the schools for at least our winter sports. But many of those we've brought into our own building and kind of set (the department) free on its own. "We had the building here, but everything needed to be set up and developed."

One of the accolades Talbot has already received from the department is for the work done on the Recreation Department brochure, which brings together in a neat package the numerous activities of the department.

"We got the idea from Livonia," Talbot says. "We made it bigger and cut costs at the same time. We were able to add more things to it. We arranged most of the outline and the final setup was done by the printers."

He adds he is uncertain what being passed over for the Director's job would mean for his future plans, but concedes he may seek another position elsewhere. Talbot is engaged, and expects to be married by this time next year.

Soccer tourney draws thousands

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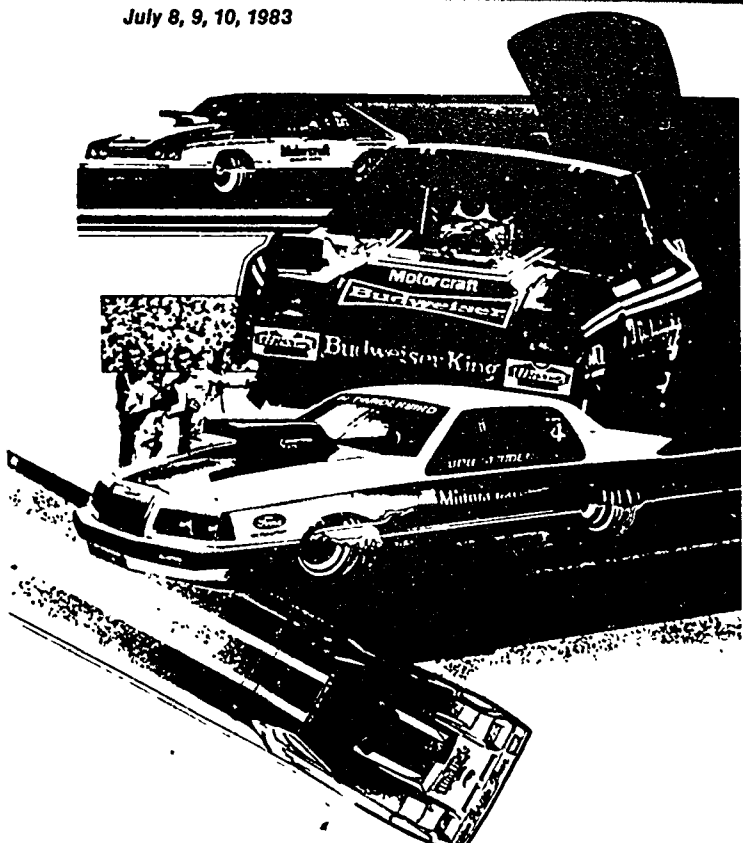
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Northville's Scott places in 10-k race

Children's devices are designed for persons weighing less than 90 pounds. Adults should never use a PFD designed for children or vice versa—a child can slip out of an adult's.

Ring life buoys and buoyant cushions are handy in an emergency—they can be thrown to a person who has fallen into the water. Buoyant cushions should never be worn on the back—it can turn the wearer face down in the water.

Care and storage of PFD's is important. Make sure they are thoroughly dry and stored in a well ventilated area—not the bottom of lockers or deck storage boxes where moisture may accumulate, and away from excessive heat and sun.

Avoid abusing the equipment. Never use it as a boat bumper, for example. Torn, rotted or defective devices should be destroyed—cut into pieces or burned so no one will use them.

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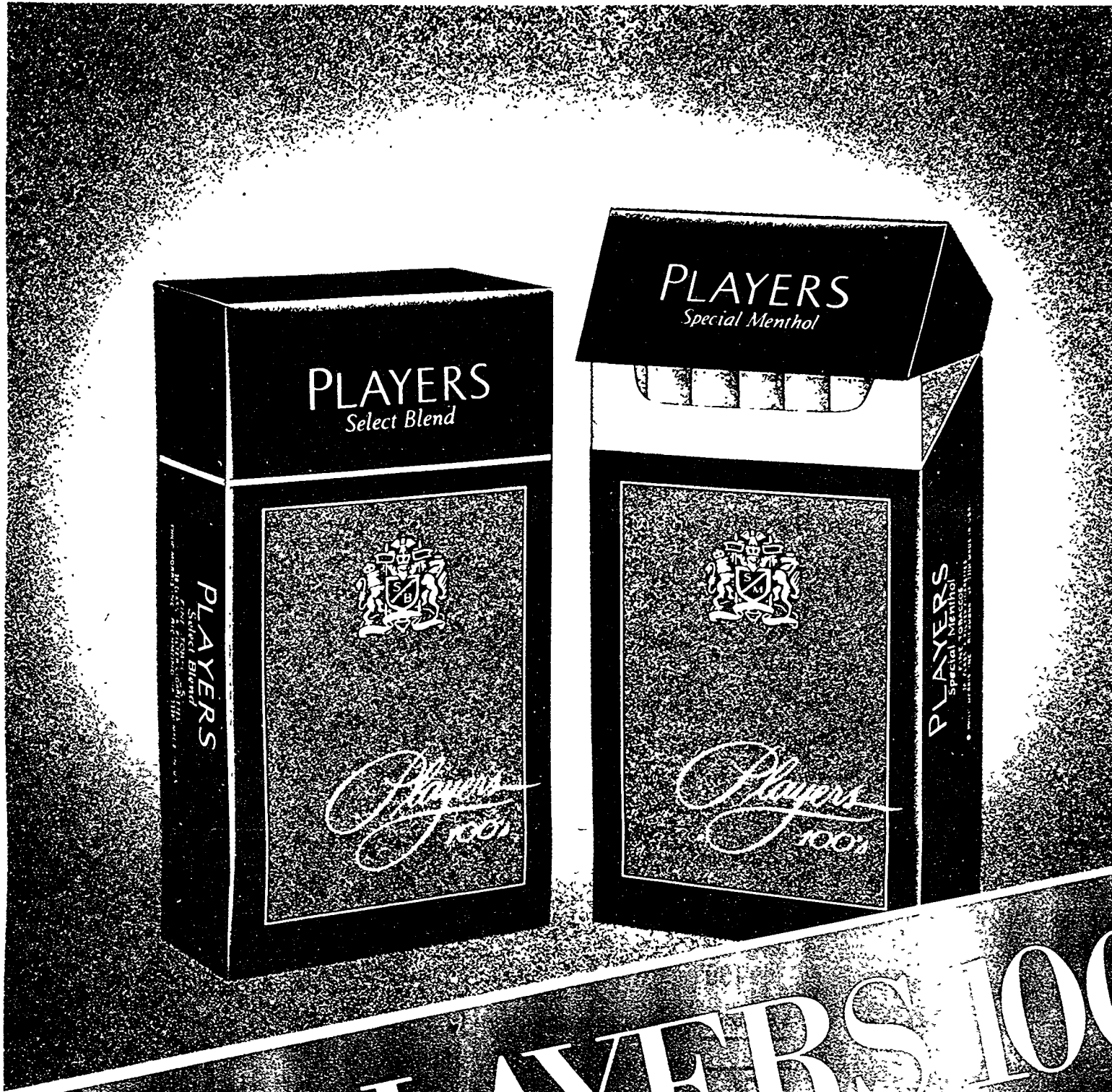

Practice "panning" your camera. Swing with the action and follow through. Don't stop panning until after you squeeze the shutter.

Take sideline or dugout pictures, too. They'll be a lot of fun when you're warming the bench at home!
