City Council rejected on a 4-1 vote Monday night the request of Winner's Circle proprietor James D. Rea to transfer his Class C liquor license with dance permit to a North Center Street location, effectively bringing to a halt his plans to open a new establishment.

Commission to select new director

It is expected that at its meeting tonight the Northville Recreation Commission will name Farmington Hills Parks and Recreation Program Superintendent John E. (Jef) Farland to be Northville's new Recreation Department director.

After specially-scheduled interview sessions with Farland and three other finalists under consideration for the position Wednesday of last week, commissioners in attendance decided to offer the job to the 32-year-old, pending a thorough investigation of his background and a suitable salary agreement.

No serious hitches are expected on either of those counts, however — in fact, it is expected Farland's hiring will be approved unanimously, with little if

Farland has served as superintendent of the Farmington Hills Recreation Department since 1977 — essentially, the program's "number two" ranking official. Prior to that, he was a program supervisor for the department, and before that, from June, 1974, to April, 1975, he was a supervisor for the Southfield Recreation Department.

He received a B.S. degree in Parks and Recreation Administration at Michigan State University in 1974, then was awarded a Master's degree in the same major at Central Michigan University in 1976. He now lives in Plymouth.

Farland, Commission Chairperson L.T. Sylvestre noted, impressed the Commission and its specially appointed screening committee with his experience in areas critical to the job - in particular, program administration, evaluation, development and implementation; administration of budget; and public relations and

At the special meeting last week Commissioners unanimously approved a motion by City Council liaison Carolann Ayers to offer Farland \$25,000 and an appropriate benefit package linked to that given to other city employees. The benefits will include 14 days vacation in the first year and a \$15,000 life insurance policy.

The finalists interviewed by the Commission and chosen by the screening committee, which reviewed the applications of 64 candidates for the job, included Farland; David Justus, a Farmington Recreation Department supervisor; Thomas King, supervisor with the Midland Department of Recreation; and Keith Sova, coordinator of the Waterford Township Recreation Department.

If Farland is approved by the Commission as expected tonight, he will be introduced to the Northville Township Board tomorrow night.

The hunt for a new director began with the resignation of former director Ed Krictzs last summer. Krictzs reported he was resigning for personal reasons, including pursuit of a new career direction, but the expansion of the responsibilities of his position may have also been a factor.

Political scene differs '70s prison fight

By KEVIN WILSON

Those who hope to defeat the state proposal to house prisoners in a renovated Plymouth Center for Human Development are finding the problem somewhat different than it was in the late '70s when a similar effort succeed-

When the earlier plans were announced to build a prison on the Wayne County Child Development Center, the influence of Republican legislators could be exerted on an administration of their own party in a capital where bipartisanship was the watchword.

This time, with the Democratic Blanchard administration in office and an atmosphere of partisan divisiveness in Lansing (stemming in no small part from the recall efforts launched against Democratic legislators), township residents opposing the prison have to aim for bipartisan support. Lobbying efforts are focused on key Democratic legislators, according to Liz McCarville, an active Democrat herself (one of few so-declared in this predominant-

ly Republican area) and a member of the Concerned Citizens group opposing the prison change.

Since the departments of corrections and management and budget developed the renovation plan after approval of the current budget, the proposal must first gain approval of the legislature, beginning with a joint capital outlay committee composed of the members of both the House and Senate appropriations subcommittees

If the eight Democratic and four GOP members report the proposal out, Representative Gerald Law (R-Plymouth) explained, it will be put before the appropriations committees of each house and finally must gain approval of the entire legislature.

Opponents hope to kill the plan early, before it gets that far. If the capital outlay committee can be convinced to reject the proposal, that will be the end of it, at least in the current budget year. The department of corrections budget for this year calls for construction of

quently termed "an eyesore." Also taking note of suggestions Rea was unable to improve the facilities at his present location because he did not own the building, she said, "I can only think that matters could not be improved if the facility itself were not improved along with it."

Gardner related a personal belief against the consumption of alcohol, but made a distinction between his beliefs and his role as a councilmember. "As an elected official it is my duty to uphold federal, state and local laws. And those laws allow the sale and con-

sumption of alcohol by the glass."
In that light, he said, his decision was to be based on consideration of what he felt was best for the community. He added that his own business is next door to Getzie's Pub and that he had seen a great improvement after the property was upgraded.

"We must keep in mind that we are considering the transfer of a liquor license, not the relocation of the present

business," he said.
It was Folino who picked up on Schrader's suggestion that the transfer be approved without the dance permit, suggesting that "if Mr. Rea does everything he says he plans to do, perhaps we can consider adding it again later."

DeRusha stated that his views had changed since council's earlier approval of the transfer, primarily because of the subsequent church objection and that raised by Schrader. He also noted that "some years ago a Mr. Ramsey wished to locate a bar in what is now the photo studio on North Center, using the liquor license he had then, and

Vernon concluded council's roundtable comments, saying he had been on council five years ago when Rea purchased the Winner's Circle. remember the promises he made then," Vernon said. "Police records show he has kept his word - the frequency of disturbances at that location has declined drastically since Mr. Rea took over.'

During the hearing, Carlin had reported Rea has owned five restaurants/taverns and has never had a liquor law violation and has a good record. That statement was challenged by Luther, who suggested that "if the Winner's Circle is the culimination" Rea did not have a good record.

But Vernon said the investigation conducted on Rea when he purchased the bar "showed he does have a good record in places he's operated before. In fact, far from being the 'culmination' the Winner's Circle is probably the worst place he's ever had — and he doesn't own the building."

"We'll stay here if that's what they want," Rea said, surrounded by friends and supporters. "I thought I was going

to give the city something."

Both Reas suggested that they were given no more guarantees than was council. "If we resubmit," Mary Margaret asked, "what's to say they won't decide we shouldn't have our Sunday sales permit or the package license? Those are parts of our business here, we shouldn't have to give them



The special section for Northville's Mainstreet Downtown Dedication took second place in that category for Class B-size weekly papers in the 5,000 to 15,000 circulation range while the special "Neighbors" section in the Sliger/Livingston Publications took third. It was entered in Class A for circulation over 15,000.

The Northville Record took third place in weeklies of its category for the spot news picture of the plane crash on the high school hill, published May 26, 1982, taken by Steve Fecht.

A series on "The Changing Athlete" written by John Myers, former Record sports editor, captured an honorable mention in sports writing category. He left the beginning of this year to work at the Sturgis Journal, a daily newspaper.

Jerome's column, which also appears in The Record on the editorial page, won first place for local columns.

The Sliger/Livingston Publications newspapers won a total of 26 awards. Stating he was "extremely proud," Sliger/Livingston vice president and general manager Jack W. Hoffman noted that no other newspaper organization in the state — daily or weekly -- came close to winning that

The judges worked with 1,392 entries from 81 weekly newspapers and 38 daily papers from throughout the state. The Michigan Press Association, which sponsors the annual contest, noted that the number of entries in various categories increased significantly, as did the number of newspapers entering the contest.

Announcement of winners is made in conjunction with National Newspaper Week, the MPA states, as it is "a time when a concerted effort is made to stress the community service role of a newspaper and the relationship between personal freedom and a free

For seven years the John Brugeman family has grown the mums at their home at 46040 Nine Mile between Taft and Beck roads.

"It's been a family venture up to this point," says Mary Jane Brugeman, explaining that as a "treat" for the mumtending from May through October the family has taken in the circus or gone to Disney World.

This year the older children have been assisting with special goals in mind. Daniel is looking at a winter sleeping bag for Boy Scout outings while Beth would like a lamp for her

Mrs. Brugeman says the chrysanthemum-growing project has been good as it is one in which the whole, young family has been able to 'ake part. She adds, however, that as

Beth and Daniel are getting older, "their own time becomes precious" and they may decide to pay them by the

The activity begins in May when John Brugeman starts by setting out 500 mum cuttings. He sends to a nursery in Connecticut for them and also divides.

his own plants. After the hoeing, weeding and tending, the gold, orange, white and rusthued plants are sold at the Northville Farmer's Market and also at the Ann Arbor market. Between 40-50 plants are sold at the Northville market each Thursday and even more in Ann Arbor until the 500 are gone, Mrs. Brugeman reports.

"This has been a remarkably good season," she observes, recalling how the family sometimes has dug the mums "in freezing rain."

The mums sell well because they are choice, full plants.

The chrysanthemum-growing project. was a natural one for the family as John. Brugeman's field is horticultural land-. scaping. He is horticultural landscape supervisor for Ford Motor Company in Dearborn. He also currently is serving. as president of the Northville Historical Society.



In order to gain bipartisan support for the township position (locallyelected Republicans have all denounced the plan), McCarville, herself a Democrat, arranged a meeting of a subcommittee of Second Congressional District Democrats at township hall last Thursday evening.

The group drafted a resolution opposing the plans to renovate Plymouth Center and supporting construction of the originally-planned regional prison at Five Mile and Beck roads, according to McCarville.

The prison issue had already been scheduled for consideration at last week's meeting of the capital outlay subcommittee, MacDonald said, but has been removed from the agenda.

'We asked for more time to gather our facts," MacDonald said Monday. "The principal argument on our part was that we only heard about this a few weeks ago. The state had already put all its information together and we didn't want it being rushed through before we could gather our arguments."

MacDonald said he expects the township board will approve a contract with Karoub and Associates, a Lansing lobbying firm, at the board meeting this Thursday.

"We feel it will give our presentation more credibility," MacDonald said. "It looks as though little Northville Township is going to need something like this or all the other governments and municipalities that own land here are going to be able to jerk us around whenever they want.'

Costs for the lobbyists will be paid by the Concerned Citizens group, Mac-

Donald noted. "No tax dollars will be expended on this."

The group's fundraising efforts have generated a strong response, though organizers note they will need more money to fund all planned activities. The initial goal, MacDonald reported, was to raise \$20,000 and at last report, he said, more than half of that amount had been accumulated.

"We're talking hard cash - these aren't just promises. There have been some substantial contributions. The money's in the bank," he said.

One purpose of the October 22 rally is to generate additional funds, he added.

According to Law and others involved in the lobbying effort, the proposed renovation of Plymouth Center also represents a split within the Blanchard administration. The department of management and budget, they explain, wishes to add as many beds to the corrections system as swiftly and cheaply as possible.

But, given the choice, corrections officials would prefer to follow the regional prison concept as outlined in a long-range planning document drafted over two year's time and subsequently approved by the state house.

Due to a hang-up in the rules procedure, Law added, the Senate did not approve the long-range plan and it will be resubmitted in the current

legislative session.
"The irony of it is, that plan, which both houses demanded be done, cites the Northville Township Five Mile and Beck location as the number one priori-

ty site," Law explained. 'Now, because of the management and budget proposal, the corrections people have to bring that plan back to us for approval while they're supposedly abandoning their number one priority site," he added.

McCarville noted that the DMB posi-

tion contradicts state party position papers that support "long range planning" for state finances and oppose stopgap measures such as the proposed Plymouth Center renovation.

"The problem is," she said, "that (R-Augusta).
ere's this big need for prison space Chairmansh

Law echoed McCarville's perception, relating that DMB officials have practically dismissed the long-range prison planning document as the product of dreamers.

"They say "those prisons will never be built — that's just pie-in-the-sky from the corrections people," Law said. "And, of course, they won't be built if the plan is abandoned. What they ought to do is stick to their original plan and spend the money to build real prisons that will improve our system."

With a capital outlay committee meeting likely to be scheduled on short notice, McCarville said her current efforts are in gathering support from the Democratic party regulars in hopes of influencing the votes of the committee members and, if necessary, the decisions of the full legislature and the administration if the proposal continues through the process.





Detroit sludge may be dumped in Salem Township

wastewater treatment facility, may find its way into the Holloway Sand and Gravel Company's landfill at Six Mile and Napier roads in Salem Township.

Salem Township Supervisor Floyd Taylor told area residents at the township board's October 4 meeting that Dan Holloway, owner of the com-pany, has "submitted a conditional bid to the City of Detroit to remove its wastewater treatment residue." The lucrative sludge hauling contract formerly held by the Vista Disposal Company is currently the subject of a heated court battle in Detroit.

Taylor explained that Holloway told

of a referendum election, with township voters being asked to approve Holloway's sludge hauling proposal. The supervisor added that Holloway's representatives had said the company might possibly be willing to pay for the sewage treatment facility for the hamlet of Salem as part of an agreement allowing the sludge to come to the

The township was cited more than 15 years ago for pollution caused by the individual septic systems in the hamlet and the board has been trying ever since that time to get state and federal funding to help with construction of a

Recently, the board hired the engineering firm of McNamee, Porter and Seeley (MPS) to draw up a new plan and assist in seeking the funding. Taylor said at the October 4 meeting that Smit has indicated a \$740,000 ballpark figure for the facility.

"I want to emphasize that Holloway said he would not consider bringing the sludge here without the people voting to accept it," the supervisor stated. "There is no letter of intent yet (on what Holloway would offer to the township if permission is granted)."

Taylor went on to explain that Holloway has offered to pay for the

received by the City of Detroit and if the township board decides to proceed with a referendum. "It is legal for an in-dustry to pay for a referendum," Taylor said.

According to Elmore Eltzroth, supervisor of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) ground-water quality control division in Jackson, Detroit wastewater treatment residue has been checked several times in toxicity tests by his department and has been verified to be in the nonhazardous waste category. (wastewater treatment residue) is in-

waste allowed under Public Act 641 (governing landfills)," Eltzroth said, adding that the Holloway landfill is correctly classified to accept the residue.

Township Clerk Nancy Geiger noted that the Holloway company has the facilities available to mix the residue with lime as required by law before it goes into the landfill.

At the October 4 meeting, board members agreed to ask Geiger to ob-

tain an opinion from the Michigan Township Association (MTA) on whether it would be legally bound by the results of a referendum election. Geiger said Friday that she had talked with Kent Sharp, an attorney with MTA, and that he will research the question.

Geiger said election workers for a special election would cost about \$400 but she did not have a figure on what it might cost to have the ballots printed.

In Salem

Land restoration may be settled out of court

The question of restoration of a 60acre parcel on the north side of Six Mile at Napier Road in Salem Township may be settled out-of-court, according to John Brennan, attorney for Holloway Sand and Gravel Company.

The restoration, or lack thereof, is one count of a multi-count suit brought by the Citizens for S.A.L.E.M. (Salem Area Local Environmental Management) against Salem Township. The suit charges that the township board has not properly enforced its zoning ordinance in connection with the Holloway operations.

On September 16, Judge Ross Campbell of Washtenaw County Circuit Court determined that Holloway must be included in the suit in order to "give appropriate relief" to the restoration

Although Campbell has signed an order for Holloway to be entered into the suit, the company had not yet been served with an order to appear, Brennan said October 7.

"There has never been a question of restoration as far as we are concern-Brennan explained. "We have always planned to restore it and the only reason it hasn't been done is because of the possibility that more cover material would be needed for the landfill (located on the south side of Six Mile at Napier)."

The parcel in question was a former gravel pit, according to Township Clerk Nancy Geiger. She said restoration involved some leveling of the surface and the pasturing of cattle on the property, all part of the mining permit Holloway the leveling has not taken place during the time frame allowed by the permit.

Brennan said he has talked to Jacob Fahrner Jr., attorney for the citizens group, and to Margaret Austin, attorney representing Salem Township, and had told them that he would recommend to Holloway that the group meet in a conference with the court in an effort to resolve the restoration matter. Brennan added that the meeting may take place some time this week.

Fahrner said October 7 that no date had taken out on the parcel. The had been set for a meeting and that SALEM citizens have complained that other counts in the case would be addressed by the judge after this one is

Meghan McDonald's miracle birth

Meghan McDonald's birth won't go down in any obstetric journals, but to the police officer who delivered her it was something of a miracle.

The six pound, 12 ounce baby girl made an earlier than expected arrival into the world Tuesday, October 4. She was born on the family room floor of her parent's home on Gilbar in Meadowbrook Glens. And Novi Police

Officer Ken Meier was there to assist. Judy McDonald had her first labor pains just one hour before the baby was born. Since her previous labor lasted 19 hours she and her husband believed there was plenty of time to pack her bag and leave for the hospital.

'I got home for lunch at quarter to two. We started timing the contractions and they started coming more and more regularly," reports the father, Brian McDonald.

Brian tried to get his wife into the car to take her to the hospital, but she had begun to deliver and could not move. She reclined on the couch in the family room, while her husband called for

When Meier was dispatched on a call of a woman having labor pains his first thoughts were: 'I hope the ambulance gets there.

But he beat the paramedics to the

He was met by Brian McDonald and led to the family room.

"I took a reassuring role, telling them the ambulance was right behind me," Meier says. "Mrs. McDonald kept saying: 'my baby's going to come.'

Meier put everyone to work, sending Brian and his mother-in-law, Gerry McGhan, to get towels and other things needed for the delivery.

Then Meier and the woman's husband moved her to the floor and calling on his experience when his wife delivered their baby, Meier guided the McDonald's baby and delivered it.

"I told her to keep her knees up and things like that. We were lucky everything went the way it was supposed to," Meier says.

"I was so happy when the baby started crying. We knew it was okay then," Meier says. "It was such a good feeling to be there. It was almost like being part of the family.

"It brought back memories of when our baby was born," Meier added.

The baby was born just minutes after Meier had arrived. Soon the ambulance appeared on the scene and mother and baby were transported to St. Mary's Hospital.

Neighbors gathered outside the McDonald's home congratulated the

Mother and baby are now both home, joining father and six-year old sister

Looking back on the incident, the three-year member of the Novi police force says it is the kind that gives a lot of personal satisfaction.

"When you're put into a role where you have to perform it's good to know you can do it. This is something we're taught in the academy, but you never realize it will happen to you.'

Police officers learn first aid and view a training film on delivering babies at the police academy before they go into duty, he explains.

And for a former Detriot police officer who saw what happend when one mother abandoned her baby on Eight Mile, the delivery was an exhilarating

"So many times baby's are found in dumpsters," Meier says. "It's such a shame. It's good to know this baby has come into a loving family.

"Compared to catching theives or anything else, this has to be the high-point of my career," Meier added.

Law advocates proposal to set education tests

As he visited city and township officials in Northville Monday, 35th District Representative Gerald H. Law, who represents the township and the Wayne County portion of the city, expressed concerns about education in the state, as well as other local issues, including the prison.

He is in favor of a Republican education proposal setting tougher curriculum and certification standards for Michigan public schools. Under it, graduating high school students and new teachers alike would have topass competency tests.

The proposal also earmarks 1.5 percent of the revenue generated by the state individual income tax to "adequately fund K-12 education."

By dedicating part of the income tax we not only pump an extra \$420 million into the schools, but we clearly state that education is our number one priority," said Law.

'Over the past decade education funding has declined seriously. We can reverse that trend by reordering the budget, but money is only part of the

solution," he continued. "A comprehensive program that ensures that teachers are well-prepared to teach and that high school graduates have met specific educational standards is essential," Law said.

"This three-pronged program can produce the educational quality that parents are demanding, that children in our state deserve and that most teachers want to deliver."

In addition to competency tests, Law said, the program addresses certification standards for teachers, effective classroom time and teacher preparation programs.

"It would ensure that children with weak skills are identified long before they reach the 12th grade, and that the people who are teaching them every step of the way are the most capable, best-educated teachers we can produce," hè added.

According to Law, Michigan's


graduation requirements - a single class in civics — are the most lax in the nation. The state is one of only four without periodic teacher preparation program approval and one of only 12 that have taken no action in the area of teacher competency.

The program, a response to the "National at Risk" report commissioned by the U.S. Department of Education, calls for:

- competency testing as a condition of graduation by the 1986-87 school
- extending the school year from 900 hours to 1140 hours by 1988-89;
- · establishing instructional audits of every school building; · mandating the minimum cur-
- riculum content outlined in the "Nation at Risk" report; 🗢 • financing summer institutes for the
- establishing scholarships to state institutions for students scoring in the top 25 percent of those taking the ACT to qualify for the Michigan Higher Education scholarship test;
- · requiring competency tests for new
- requiring a three-step certification s for all new teachers and establishing three forms of endorsement on teacher certificates;
- requiring that from the sixth grade on subjects be taught only by a teacher with a major or minor in that subject;
 • establishing a master teacher plan;
- dedicating the first 1.5 percent from the personal income tax to K-12 educaton to add some \$420 million more to the system;
- · extending tax incentives for contributions to colleges, universities and K-12 school systems;
- establishing a statewide network of Industrial Education Councils to guide and advise schools.
- "This program can bring Michigan into the educational mainstream in the '80s," Law concluded, "and bring a new standard of excellence for our students and our teachers.'



Payments not income

Legislation that would exclude Social Security payments from the definition of household income when filing for a state homestead property tax credit has been introduced in the Michigan House.

I am co-sponsoring this legislation because thousands of Michigan senior citizens would benefit if old age, survivor's and disability insurance payments were excluded from the definition as this bill (H.B. 4819) sug-

If such recipients would not have to

their household income, they may be eligible for a larger property tax credit rebate.

Currently, taxpayers can claim a credit against state income tax liability for a portion of the property taxes or rent paid on their Michigan homesteads during the tax year. This "circuit breaker" tax credit is claimed on the taxpayer's state income tax return as a reduction in income tax liability.

Eligibility for the credit is based on income, with certain types of revenue such as energy assistance grants, relief supplied by a government agency, and contributions by the person's employer to life, accident or health insurance exadd these benefits in when figuring cluded from consideration as income.



Prison move's not viable solution

Eternal vigilance very obviously is the price Northville residents are being required to pay to protect the quality of life long established in their community. Residents and business people have demonstrated their willingness to spend their money to ingness to spend their money to support good schools and establish pleasant residential areas and a viable commercial district. Now they are in the position of having to protect that which they have nurtured - from, of all sources - their state government.

Because of the great amount of state land (untaxable) in Northville Township, the township is a target for state officials seeking easy solutions to such economic problems as prison overcrowding
— without any interest in the impact such stop-gap measures will have on the community.

We are sure that correctional officials who have sought the prototype regional prison that already has been funded by the legislature do not wish to substitute a medium security facility converted from buildings on the Plymouth Center

for Human Development. Citizens of both Plymouth and Northville certainly do not want the change in planning that moves the prison site a mile east and into the mainstream of the community adjacent to Sheldon Road.

The argument that \$20 million can be saved by converting the facility that is to be completely closed by the end of the year ignores the planning and thinking of those in the criminal justice field because the budget and management people in Lansing have found a "convenient" solution. They see the conversion as a temporary measure to alleviate prison overcrowding faster — and also as a use for a state "white elephant."

This is not — or should not be — a political issue. We hope that members of the legislature can understand what is at stake. To move the planned prison site would be a short-sighted solution that ultimately could cost the community, hard-pressed Wayne County and the state future tax monies. It must not be allowed to happen.

An unfinished farewell

Though she's been gone two weeks today, I still cannot rid myself of the empty, sorrowful feeling which seems to be harboring in the pit of my stomach. While most of us knew my grandmother's death was imminent, the loss has left an indelible mark on a family which looked upon that tiny woman as its greatest stronghold.

Those gathered at her funeral more than likely will not be together again for many years to come — if ever. Looking around the church, I couldn't help but think how delighted my grandmother would have been at that family reunion of sorts. Though her children, grandchildren and many great-grandchildren had come to pay homage to the matriarch of the McElmurry clan, the gathering was in many ways a rekindling of broken family ties.

My grandmother was first and foremost devoted to her family. Even in the last years of her life, she never forgot a grandchild's birthday or the graduation date of a great-grandson. Perhaps that is why I feel I failed her particulary toward the end when she most needed to know she hadn't been forgotten.

My grandmother spent the last months of her life in a nursing home — the last place she ever wanted to be. After 93 years, she simply had tired out. Staunchly religious, she could not understand why God would not take her. I will never understand why she was left to suffer . . . thankfully it wasn't for long.

Though I knew her death was in many ways a blessing, I have yet to come to terms with what I left unfinished. There were so many things I had wanted to tell her; so many questions I never asked. I had let time run out on the one person who always was there for me.

I'm ashamed of all the time I wasted — all the phone calls I never made, all the cards I never sent and all the times I failed to visit just to let her know I cared. I had some of these same regrets when Ethelwyn Verschaeve died here last May. Though I didn't know her very well, we became acquainted when I delved into her life history for a feature story.

Having lost her husband and only child long before her own death, Mrs. Verschaeve spent the last years of her life alone. I'll always remember the time she invited me for tea and served cookies which she had baked that afternoon. I was touched that this 92-year-old woman had gone to so much trouble. I only wish I had returned her kindness in the year before her death.

There is a lesson to be learned from all this. Unfortunately, I learned mine too late. If I could bring back what has past, I would visit more often, call more frequently and say all the things which I left unsaid.

Looking at my grandmother the day of her funeral, I suddenly remembered the bedtime prayer she taught me as a child and I was struck by how appropriate it seemed. I remember her sitting on the edge of the bed, her checked apron tied around her waist, and slowly repeating that simple little verse — "Now I lay me down to sleep, I pray thee, Lord, my soul to keep . . .

I regret never telling her I remembered that prayer. Most importantly, I regret never saying goodbye.


But if you think I'm hard on metro dailies, ask me what I think of the trash mail advertising which provides no service to communities whatsoever.

Kiwanis Club opposes prison change

To the Editor:
The Northville Kiwanis Club vigorously opposes the proposed prison development on the property of the Plymouth Center for Human Develop-ment near Sheldon and Five Mile roads. We believe this proposal is neither economically nor functionally advantageous to the state.

Furthermore, we believe it represents a serious, unnecessary threat to the economic and social welfare of Northville and adjacent municipalities.

Our position is a non-political one.

Our membership represents a crosssection of political views whose interest must and does support the welfare of the community, the state and the nation in which the Kiwanis service organization operates.

To not speak out on this non-political issue, which clearly suggests a violation of the community's welfare and the well-being of the State of Michigan, would be a disservice to those we serve and an affront to the charter under which we operate.

We therefore strongly urge administrators of the state and our elected state officials to reconsider this matter immediately. We are convinced that, with more thoughtful and intelligent study of potential solutions for the state's penology problems, wiser minds will prevail, this obviously illconceived proposal will be abandoned, and a sound decision developed.

More specifically, we urge abandon-ment of this proposal because:

 It represents revocation of the state's good-faith commitment to the people of Northville who several years ago were promised confinement of prison development to nearer Beck Road.

- It grossly under-estimates the real cost of converting the Center's buildings to prison housing and, in so doing, jeopardizes the state's economic

- It seriously endangers nearby industrial development which can aid in the state's economic recovery and improvement of municipal and educational support.

It may cause irreparable harm to planned development of adjacent senior citizen housing — a large project which already represents a major financial commitment by government.

- It once again ignores Northville's preponderance of non-taxed, publiclywned lands which place an unfair burden on Northville taxpayers.

I read with interest and a great deal of concern the letter to the editor from Carol Mackinder regarding the proposed stop sign at eastbound Eight Mile and Randolph. As a regular driver of this route, I wholeheartedly agree that to come to a complete stop at this in-tersection is virtually impossible and would propably result in many rear-end

What bothers me about this whole subject is that the intersection is not the problem. According to Chief Cannon. the review was based on complaints from Randolph Street residents of speeding on their street. So let's just address that problem and not expand it into a major project.

The traffic island was created to simplify and make this intersection safer. It separates eastbound Eight Mile traffic from those who wish to go into the city via Randolph. It also makes it possible for those going west on Randolph to enter Eight Mile in a safer manner — even though you may have to be patient at certain times. In the traffic island is doing the ich short, this traffic island is doing the job it was created for, and quite effectively.

Now, regarding speed on Randolph, which is really the only pertinent issue. It's entirely possible to reduce your speed, while traveling eastbound on Eight Mile from 50 to 40 to 25 (miles per hour) by the time you enter Randolph with a minimum of braking and then maintain the speed of 25 into town by keeping your foot off the accelerator and watching the speedometer. Should you choose to ignore the speed limit, as apparently many do, you will eventually get caught.

Since speeding on Randolph is the real issue, let's solve it the simplest way, by posting a patrol car on Randolph at random times and issuing a few tickets. Drivers catch on quickly and will adjust their speed accordingly. Let's not solve this problem by creating one that is worse. What we don't need, at this time, is more administrative over-kill."

It's almost 1984. Let's not forget the lessons Orwell tried to teach in his book. We have more than enough "Big Brothers" in Federal and State government. Please, on the local level, let's keep it simple. Remember, SPEED is the issue. Each individual driver can solve that right now, without any study commission or any delay, by simply being a more responsible citizen.

Oh, yes, don't forget to vote on November 8. One more very important responsibility of a good citizen.

Report from Lansing

Law supports changes in prevailing wage bill

Michigan's prevailing wage law would be determined by federal guidelines rather than state statute under legislation introduced Tuesday in the Michigan House.

The measure would place Michigan under the requirements of the federal Bacon-Davis Act and would blunt the effects of a prevailing wage law that is hurting job prospects throughout the state.

The bill would reduce the costs of construction projects in non-union areas and eliminate paperwork for the Department of Labor.

The prevailing wage is a real point of contention with many public employers, school districts and programs funded by economic development corporations. The prevailing wage, calculated on collective bargaining agreements, must be paid to anyone working on a state-funded or EDC project. This naturally increases the cost of projects in areas that aren't highly unionized, and in fact many projects

never even get off the ground because of the prevailing wage requirement.

Under the guidlines of the federal Bacon-Davis Act, the prevailing wage is calcuatled on collective bargaining agreements in counties in which 50 percent or more of the construction workers receive union wages. In areas that aren't as highly unionized, the prevailing wage is figured as an average of both union and non-union

wages.

I think adopting the federal guidelines is a reasonable approach for Michigan. With the highest unemployment rate of any industrial state in the nation, we should take every step we can to spur job growth.

The Michigan prevailing wage is the single largest deterrent to publicly funded construction projects. This legislation would not repeal the prevailing wage. In fact, in many areas of the state, the prevailing wage wouldn't change at all as a result of this legisla-tion. But its negative effects would be modified in many of our more rural and northern counties where unemployment is the highest.







Energy Saving

Conference aim to assist community energy savings

With fall comes cooler weather and a sound that causes many a homeowner to flinch - that of the furnace kicking into operation.

The costs associated with that sound are not, of course, limited to homeowners. According to the Energy Administration of the Michigan Department of Commerce, for most communities, school districts and businesses, energy costs are the second largest budget cost following only wages

and fringe benefits.
That's why the Energy Administration has slated its second annual Community Energy Management Conference October 27 and 28 in Battle Creek. The cost of energy, most of it imported, has enormous effects on the state economy and the conference will focus on methods to conserve and plan energy usage more efficiently.

The Energy Administration reports that Michigan depends upon on imported energy for 85 percent of all energy needs, exporting billions of dollars each year to buy imported oil, natural gas and coal.

More than 10 cents of every dollar in Michigan's economy is exported to other states and foreign countries to import energy, compared to only

two cents in the early 1970s. According to the Department of Commerce, this drain on our economy causes investment capital, jobs and the multiplier spening effect to shift away from Michigan and to the fuel exporting states and countries.

The conference is designed to assist community leaders in coming to grips with energy issues and to provide information to assit in the formation of local energy programs.

Keynote speakers are Martin Klepper, author of several books about innovative financing techniques for energy projects and David Morris, director of the Washington, D.C.-based Institute for Local Self-Reliance and author of "Self-Reliant

There will be more than 20 workshops covering community resources, financing options, facility and vehicle fleet management, local energy policy issues, and renewable energy resources. Conference fee of \$60 includes luncheon both days. For more about the conference, co-sponsored by the Michigan Municipal League and Michigan School Business Officials, contact the EA's toll-free hotline service at 1-800-292-4704.

Insulate at no interest

Consumers Power Company is encouraging its gas space-heating customers to look into a special loan program that could save them money every winter for years.

The loans are available to residential customers whose homes now have 2.5 inches or less of ceiling insulation, according to Jim MacIntosh, metro region general manger for Consumers Power.

'The loan interest rate is zero, and customer can take up to five years to repay the loan."

Customers are being encouraged to sign up for the loan now before the inevitable freezing weather moves in. MacIntosh said the company is promoting the program to help as many customers as possible to insulate their ceilings before they begin to receive higher winter heating bills.

Customers may contact the utility by telephone for information and a free attic inspection.

Family income is not a factor in determining whether a loan will be granted, according to MacIntosh. The program is aimed at all residential gas heating customers regardless of their income.

Renters who are Consumers Power gas heating customers, including those in multi-family dwellings. may also qualify if they have approval from their landlords.


MacIntosh said the company implemented the program in 1981 with the approval of the Michigan Public Service Commission, as an energy conservation measure.

Under the zero-interest loan program, a qualifying customer can borrow up to \$1,000 to have a contractor perform the insulation work or up to \$700 to finance a do-ityourself project. The company can also assist in finding a contractor or supplier for the materials. In either case, Consumers Power will handle all the paperwork and pay the contractor or materials supplier direct-

The company will also send out a representative to inspect the completed work.

Participating customers have up to five years to repay the loan through monthly installments included with their energy bills. The monthly installment for do-ityourselfers has been averaging \$5 since the program was initiated while the payment for contractorinstalled work has averaged \$8.

MacIntosh said the company's ecords show that the money saved each month by the added insulation is usually greater than the monthly installment to repay the



Booklet helps solar shoppers

Despite our northern latitude, more than 10,000 Michigan residents have discovered that solar energy systems work well in this state, providing much of the home's space or water heating requirements while reducing the need for costly

In 1981, Michigan ranked fifth among all states in the number of solar heating installations, behind only California, Florida, Arizona and Colorado.

To assist Michigan residents interested in solar heating, the Energy Administration of the Department of Commerce publishes "Solar Home Heating in Michigan," a 24-page booklet presenting the fundamentals of the system for new and existing homes. It describes a variety of systems for space and household water heating and shows examples of solar homes and installations in Michigan.

The booklet also helps in determining the initial costs of a soalr system, the size necessary to meet heating needs and the potential savings to be ex-

"Many people mistakenly believe that Michigan's cloudy climate makes solar systems uneconomical," said Joann Neuroth, director of the Energy Administration. "Actually, solar systems in Michigan pay for themselves more quickly than those in sunnier climates because of our greater need for heating."

She added that solar heating has several advantages, including being safe, dependable and easy to do. Federal and state tax incentives further reduce the cost of installing solar systems. 

Ex-Cell-O aiming for an up year

E. Paul Casey, president and chief executive officer of Ex-Cell-O Corporation announced third quarter sales, net earnings and net earnings per share below those of the same 1982 period.

"We are pleased, however, that 1983 is developing into a stronger year than originally anticipated, reflecting the continued strengthening of most segments of the

economy," Casey said. 'We continue to expect earnings per share for the year to be above the \$3.25 earned in 1982," he added. While third quarter statistics were below 1982 levels, nine-month per share earnings were still ahead of the year-ago

figures. For the three months ending August 31, net earnings per share were \$.79 compared to \$.84 in the third quarter of 1982, a six percent decline. Sales were \$232.9 million, seven percent below 1982's \$250.2 million, while net earnings were \$11.2 million, nine percent below the 1982 figure of \$12.3 million.

For the nine month period ending August 31, net earnings per share were up five percent from 1982, at \$2.67. Sales were \$705.5 million, 10 percent the \$787.9 million tallied in 1982. Net earnings were \$37.9 million as compared to \$38.1 million a year earlier.

Casey said sharp improvement was seen in the firm's automotive components segment in the third quarter as car production continued at a fairly high rate.

"The Aerospace and Ordnance segments remain strong and the performance of the Specialty Products segment has improved significantly," he said. "The Industrial Equipment segment is oerating at a loss reflecting the depressed conditions in the Machine Tool Industry. We have not yet seen an upturn in orders as capital goods spending continues at low levels."



Handcrafters cooperative boasts unlimited offerings

The resurgence of country style living — in decorating, cooking, fashion and the like - seems to have put terminology such as homemade and homegrown back in the vocabulary.

In the past few years, many people have ventured into such endeavors as growing their own herbs, making rag rugs or learning cross-stitch.

With the emphasis on "back to basics" living, it's no wonder handmade arts and crafts are seeing a renewed popularity.

The current demand for handcrafted

items was among the reasons Livonia artist Kathy Bates brought together a host of talented artists and craftspersons to form a handcrafters' cooperative.

The cooperative venture has resulted in the opening of Handcrafters Unlimited located on the first floor at 342 East Main.

The cooperative carries a host of handcrafted items including quilts, handmade wood items, needlework, stained glass, stenciling, calligraphy, soft sculpture and much more.

The 14 artists belonging to the cooperative all have their own works

displayed along with the consignment items of 25 other area artists.

Bates says she found considerable interest for the cooperative from craft-spersons exhibiting at area crafts

Currently serving as cooperative president, Bates admits that a handcrafters' cooperative is a somewhat unique concept. However, she notes that the response thus far has been

Cooperative member Susan Barnes says she felt she could "take a chance" going into business with 13 other partners rather than just one or two.

A member of the cooperative's jury committee, Barnes says she feels com-fortable with the other artists and stresses the cooperative's demand for

"There are no commercial products here," she emphasizes. "Everything is

Barnes notes that "everything is juried before it comes in. . . we're really picky about what we take."

Handcrafters Unlimited opened in mid-September - just in time for the Tivoli Fair. In fact, Bates points out that three of the cooperative artists exibited at the fair.

She adds that so far business has been good and that they have been getting inquiries from several artists interested in selling on consignment.

Noting that "we all love the small town aimosphere," Bates says Northville seemed to be the ideal location for the cooperative's business.

The cooperative, which occupies the lower level rooms of the business/residence on East Main, is divided into

The talents of the artist-business owners is evident in the stenciled walls, unique displays and bright blue window trim and gingham curtains.

Bates notes that the owners are planning to open a fourth room in the near future exclusively featuring children's

While crafts items are mixed throughout the shop, one room primari-

ly features kitchen items including appliqued towels and aprons, needlework covered jars, pot holders, painted china With 14 business partners, work

hours are not quite so hectic as the regular 9-to-5, Bates says. She notes that each partner works approximately one day each week — which allows the artists time off to make their crafts.



Wash Oak schoolhouse donors sought for open house

By JEAN DAY

Planners of the open house to be held at Wash Oak Schoolhouse in Mill Race Historical Village October 16 to recognize those who have contributed to its reconstruction and furnishing have been seeking information about the donors of

Curators Bob and Harriet Welland and Doug and Kay Otton report they are anxious to locate Mr. and Mrs. George Rigby, former residents of King's Mill, who contributed the building

when they moved to the Cleveland, Ohio, area.

At the time the schoolhouse was a shell located on property on Currie Road south of Eight Mile that had reverted to private ownership under terms of the orginal land grant of the Waterman and Deake families when the school closed in May, 1966. Parents of the students who lived in Washtenaw and Oakland counties had voted to join the South Lyon School District.
Through active Northville Historical Society member Jack

Burkman, the Rigbys learned of the desire to have a schoolhouse in the Mill Race Village. Originally, they had pur-

chased the property as a summer home.

Although the building was little more than a shell with a partially burned roof as it stood in the field, it was welcome because, as Burkman observed at the time, "school houses are hard to come by." It had been eight years since the last class had filed out and vandalism had taken its toll of the building as it sagged on the site.

allow for this. If inclement weather is in the forecast, you'll probably remember to pack along the umbrellas and rain slickers. What you may forget is an alternative to the grilled hamburgers and hotdogs you'd planned, which, in the case of a downpour, could leave you with only potato salad and a cool libation for the gang's noontime nourishment. Well, that's not all bad, but a few ham and cheese sandwiches packed along just in case rain quenches your grill would probably be appreciated.

Also in the category of versatility is planning for the expanded party. Where there is one tailgate party, there are usually many more tailgate parties, and "tailgate hopping" can be expected

Therefore, the ideal tailgate picnic menu is one that can be stretched to Pack securely in trunk; keep pot serve approximately two times the number of people you've brought in your own vehicle.

Of course, meals requiring an abundance of eating utensils are discourag-

Keeping all the above suggestions in mind, we offer the following tailgate menu ideas:

Appetizer: Crackers and cheese (slice your own). If you insist on giving the appearance that undue preparation has gone into your meal, you might brmg along a homemade dip, such as the one that follows, which is best served

2 packages (8 oz.) cream cheese,

2 packages corned beef, chopped 2 tablespoons finely chopped green 1 tablespoon finely chopped onion

1 carton (8 oz.) sour cream tabasco, salt and pepper to taste Mix all together and heat in oven (325 degrees) for about 15 minutes prior to packing in trunk.

Salad: Macaroni salad. Nice alternative to potato salad and just as easy.

1 cup elbow macaroni, cooked 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese 1/3 cup chopped celery 3 Tablespoons chopped green pepper 2 Tablespoons chopped onion 1/4 cup mayonnaise

1/4 cup sour cream 2 Tablespoons French dressing 1 Tablespoon sweet pickle relish

After cooking macaroni, drain and rinse with cold water. Toss with cheese, celery, green pepper and onion. Combine mayonnaise, sour cream, French dressing and relish. Toss with macaroni mixture. Cover and chill well before packing. Serves 6.

Main dish: Grilled hotdogs, of course. But if you wish to be a little different, here's an ultra-simple chili recipe. covered between servings to maintain warmth.

Add to one pound of browned ground beef:

Call it Blue Monday. The league tournament at Rolling Meadow Golf Course, Northfield Township, went anything but well for Northville. There was little anyone could do to touch Walled Lake Central, which again demostrated its supremacy in the league with a 390 over the 18-hole course - à full 10 strokes better than the second place team, Walled Lake Western, and 20 strokes ahead of Livonia Churchill in

Northville was at 419, behind Livonia Stevenson at 417 and Farmington at 418 and ahead of Plymouth Canton at 422, Livonia Bentley at 430, Plymouth Salem at 447 and Farmington Harrison

The league meet decided first place in the Western Division. Both Western and Churchill had 6-3 records in the regular season, but Western sealed first-place honors with the tournament win. Northville finished fourth overall, also behind Canton 5-4, but way ahead of Harrison, 0-9.

Bob Pegrum, senior captain of the Mustangs, was named to the All-Division team for his round of 79 at the par 70 course. Bob Justus lost a tie-breaker for a spot on the all-division team. He shot an 82. Bob Baird and Ron Lezowski posted rounds of 85 and Eric Morfe had an 88.

"It was a little cool, some wind," coach Joe Blake said. 'There was still some heavy dew on the course when we started out. We needed a couple scores in the 70s and a couple in the low 80s to stay near the top. Central played very well; 390 is a good score," he added.

"That one could have gone either way," Filkin sighed. "It was one of the closest matches of the year.'



the Mustang starters.


