# Township board opposes license for group home

Faced with a vociferous crowd of residents who contended the region was too dangerous for location of a group home, the township board of trustees June 14 voted to oppose the proposed licensing of an adult foster care home on west Seven Mile.

The board resolution opposing the licensing exceeded the state department of social services request that the township ascertain whether or not the proposed site was within 1,500 feet of a similar facility but was accompanied by the confirmation that no other group homes are within that distance.

The home, which may receive its state license despite the local opposition, would be operated by Our Lady of Providence Center to meet state standards for the care of developmentally disabled persons over age 18.

# Detroit judge to decide on EDC dispute

Township Supervisor John Mac-Donald will remain aboard the Wayne County Economic Development Corporation at least until Thursday of next

That's when Detroit Circuit Court. Judge Marianne Battani said she would decide whether to deny or render permanent a temporary restraining order preventing Wayne County Executive William Lucas' firing of MacDonald and three other EDC directors who are seeking the restraining order.

Lucas had "fired" MacDonald and three other directors on the EDC for excusing what Lucas called FitzPatrick's "mismanagement" by voting to reinstate FitzPatrick on the EDC. But EDC directors are claiming EDC appointments are made by the legislative body, not county administration, and therefore may not be terminated by the county executive.

FitzPatrick has filed a \$10 million lawsuit against Lucas alleging defama-FitzPatrick's personal services contract. The temporary restraining order is tied to that suit.

Four years remain in MacDonald's six-year term on the EDC. MacDonald sought the non-paying post to exert some control over development of the Wayne County Child Development

FitzPatrick, Lucas' opponent in the 1982 general election race for county executive, has been the subject of an executive-ordered audit by Plante and Moran. MacDonald has characterized Lucas' actions against his former opponent as a "power struggle, pure and

MacDonald said he thought Judge Battani would see the dispute his way. She doesn't agree with Lucas, that's for sure," he declared.

Six young women from OLP's Beck Road facility would be placed in the home, said the school's Sister Theresa. The residents of the school for mentally impaired girls are not emotionally disturbed, she stressed, and would be under constant supervision by persons with college degrees.

But the township's group home committee recommended against licensing, citing concerns with safety resulting from Seven Mile Road traffic, the lack of sidewalks, distance from the police and fire departments, and several ponds and empty buildings in the area. The committee also cited the "historical practice" of group home operations and "general opposition" to the location of group homes in Northville Township on ground that the community is already saturated with untaxed state facilities.

Several residents of the area spoke out against the licensing, arguing that sight distances on Seven Mile are unsafe and that youngsters playing in the area would be in danger.

In response, Sister Theresa noted that the residents would be aged 19-26 and absent from the facility daily until 4 p.m. She eventually asked "if this area is so dangerous, why do you live there? The problems and difficulties that would face us are the same as any that face any other family."

She noted that the school has been asked by the state to send its older residents out into the community because it has more residents of age 19 and up than its present facilities are licensed to accommodate.

She added that the school has only 100 students, and that those selected for placement would be the ones "most ready to return to a normal environment." No placements would be made from other facilities. The school wishes to establish its own foster care home for the girls because it has found present homes in which they could be placed inadequate, Sister Theresa said.

After DSS licensing representative Katria Heslip, in response to questioning, said she did not think the safety concerns raised would be sufficient to forbid licensing, those objecting stressed the "saturation" argument and strongly argued that the board should adopt a resolution opposing the license in addition to responding to the DSS request.

Treasurer Richard Henningsen made the motion to oppose the licensing, citing the three reasons named by the committee. The board voted unanimously to adopt that posture.



# NHS Class of '84 takes final bow

"You have made me very proud of you this year, and you always will be special to me," Northville High School Principal David C. Bolitho told the 323 members of the 1984 graduating class last Friday evening as they received their diplomas in impressive commencement exercises on the athletic

"Your class," he said, "will be remembered for its cohesiveness, its sense of humor and its scholastic achievement.

"You have had a very cooperative attitude and a very competitive spirit that will be a model for classes to follow," Bolitho said, noting that the class "always will be special as my first graduating class."

Bolitho, who became NHS principal almost a year ago in July, 1983, in his farewell remarks to the class told the graduates, "Always remember where you came from and the individuals who

Superintendent George R. Bell also lauded the class, saying, "You are part of a great tradition of excellence, some of you are part of a fourth generation ...

He urged the graduates to "do what you're good at" as he noted that 90 percent of all knowledge has been ac-cumulated in the last 30 years. He added that statistics show the graduates will change careers three times in a

He advised the graduates to master the basic tools and said, "the day you stop learning is the day you start being part of the problem."

The 115th NHS commencement exercises opened with an invocation by Blakely Anderson, a member of the graduating class, which was followed by a welcome to those attending by Douglas Doyle, co-president of the

He recalled that the Class of '84 had entered high school three years ago with a wave of expectation that it could be one of the best classes at the high school. He said that the graduates now were beginning a new "and possibly frightening era" but that "the interaction with teachers and families will help us deal with it."

Class co-president John Letarte introduced class officers, the two valedictorians and two salutatorians.

Valedictorian Diana Schneider told her classmates, "We're not the bewildered sophomores we once were." recalling new high school experiences and then the pressures and decisions during the junior year.

Valedictorian Scott Yaekle, citing a child who hides from problems in the dark simply because he doesn't know if he can solve them, told his fellow graduates, "It's better to light candles than stay in the dark — encourage others to light candles."

The two salutatorians, who missed being valedictorians by one grade of B each, also spoke briefly.

Jennifer Merrifield said the graduates who had come through "13 years of winter" were soon to blossom and had many to thank. She listed "moms and dads and teachers who truly prepared us to be our best selves we have been given the right nutrients to grow. Class of '84, let's go for it!'

Salutatorian Daniel Perpich said the Class of '84 has served as a checkpoint for years preceding and following it

# Sewer estimate request approved

It looks as if Meadowbrook Estates homeowners are going to get some of the information they requested before being placed in a Haggerty Road sewer special assessment district.

The township board of trustees June 14 took the unusual step of asking the township engineer to prepare a rough cost estimate of the charge to individual homeowners in that subdivision and along Pierson and Smock roads north of Seven Mile.

Leonard Field, of the subdivision's homeowners' association, told the board that a survey of the residents showed strong opposition to being included in the district unless an individual cost estimated "within 20 percent'' was offered.

Noting that there are no guarantees, since assessments are contingent on the number of parcels in the final district, the final design, the actual bid cost of construction and several other Super Sewer plan. When it was dropped from prepare a rough estimate for consideration by the homeowners.

McNeely provided figures last week that appeared to show that the cost could exceed \$8,000 per buildable lot if the subdivision were to install sewers by itself. By joining the Haggerty Road project, he suggested, residents would see a substantial savings due to spreading fixed costs among more parcels and anticipated contributions from the township and the city of Novi.

Meanwhile, Pierson Road resident Patrick Coyne said he and several neighbors (he counted five) "don't really want a sewer. I'm very confused. Who really wants it besides the

township?" He was told by supervisor John Mac-Donald and clerk Susan Heintz that the plan for the sewer has existed for near-

the federally-funded project, the township decided to pursue it on its own because the Haggerty sewer offers considerable benefits to the operation of the township system.

Coyne acknowledged that history, but argued that the residents of his area are not in favor of having sewers installed at this time.

Residents of other areas in the district were told their costs could actually decrease if homeowners in the area between Smock and Haggerty north of Seven Mile were deleted from the project.

The board adjourned the public hearing on the issue until its next regular meeting July 12. It tabled consideration of a resolution that, once passed, would establish the properties to be included ly 40 years as a part of the so-called in the district.

vestigation by city engineer Edward J. McNeely comparing costs between repairs and complete reconstruction of the street, where the subsurface has been eroded by storm water runoff.

Although removal and replacement of the pavement is slightly more costly than filling in and leveling the existing pavement with asphalt, McNeely believes the effects will be more perma-

City manager Steve Walters agreed, saying that the new construction — estimated to cost \$35,765 — would require less future maintainance than 'patching up an old street".

The proposed construction will result in entirely new pavement extending from the north side of the turnaround up to (and including) the north curb of

Springfield. Included in the cost will be the creation of a berm and swale on the commons, said McNeely, who has also been investigating the causes of drainage problems in the area. intended.) He hopes that the development will alleviate much of the trouble, as it will direct surface drainage to an existing catch basin located at the northeast corner of Fairfax.







# Northville says goodbye to two longtime teachers



Teacher, principal, coach — Fred Holdsworth has worn many hats in his career

# Holdsworth finishes 35-year career

This fall, for the first time in nearly 20 years, Fred Holdsworth won't be a part of Northville High School.

Holdsworth is retiring after 35 years in education as an administrator, teacher and coach - his last 18 at Northville. He and his wife Peggy plan to move to Florida this year.

"Hopefully before winter comes." Holdsworth said Friday, his last day at

Recent students are most familiar with Holdsworth as a history teacher and coach. But a closer look at his background reveals there's quite a bit more in his career.

He took the post of Northville High School principal in 1966, after spending 17 years in the Berkley School District. He had been a teacher at Berkley since 1949, when he was graduated from Wayne State University with a B.S. in Social Studies.

At Wayne State, Holdsworth was an outstanding baseball player, earning all-state honors as a pitcher/outfielder.

He was assistant principal at Berkley for his last nine years there. But he had achieved more notoriety earlier for his baseball and basketball coaching skills. He guided Berkley's varsity baseball team to four league championships and in 1955 was honored as Oakland County Basketball Coach of the Year.

Besides his son, Fred Jr., a Northville High School valedictorian and a pro baseball player for years, Holdsworth coached Dick Radatz, former Detroit Tiger, at Berkley.

He continued to broaden his background in history as a graduate student at Michigan State University and the University of Michigan.

Outside his teaching and coaching duties, Holdsworth was Recreation Director of Berkley for eight years and was Athletic Supervisor of the Highland Park Boys' Club.

Holdsworth was principal of Northville High School until 1974, and since then has taught American History.

And coached, of course. This year was one of his most memorable, and that's saying quite a bit. He guided Northville's girls' junior varsity basketball team to a winning season last fall, and this year piloted the varsity baseball team to a co-championship of the Western Lakes Activities Association's Western Division.

The Mustangs made it to the Class A District final before they were defeated by eventual state champion Walled

Lake Western. Along the way, they accumulated an outstanding 17-4 record.

"This year especially was most satisfying," Holdsworth said. "I had a good bunch of guys to work with this spring, and it was a pleasure working with

Holdsworth was among the honorees May 22 at a Quality of Work Life Committee of the Northville Public Schools retirement/recognition party, where he was presented a golf outfit and equip-

Does he play golf?
"I'd better now," he chuckled.
That honor was one of many recent testimonials to Holdsworth this year that left him a little overwhelmed. "Everybody's been saying so many nice things about me, I'm ready to change my mind and stay," he added.

That's not likely. In Florida, he'll be closer to daughters Diane and Hilary, both working in Texas. Besides Fred Jr. and his two daughters, Holdsworth has a son, John, now working with AT&T.

"I've enjoyed working with kids as a teacher and coach," Holdsworth summed up. "I've met a bunch of nice ones over the years."

# For Talmadge, departure offers new teaching environments

"Creativity," says Shirley Talmadge, "is everyone's birthright most people just need someone to help them direct it."

For 14 years the soft-spoken artist has been doing just that — 1984 marks the end of her teaching career in the Northville Public Schools.

Talmadge received her Master's degree from Wayne State University in 1969 and began teaching art at the Main Street School a year later. In 1976 she moved to Cooke and Meads Mill schools. For the past seven years she has been at Winchester Elementary; she has also been teaching at Silver Springs for three years.

Although she enjoys working with children, Talmadge says she is looking forward to her retirement. "I have so many avenues open to me right now, explains Talmadge, whose first priority is to travel.

The first stop on her agenda is a workshop in Rockport, Maine, taught by Ray Loos. "I am going there to paint the ocean," says the artist, whose favorite subject is water.

Talmadge describes herself as a location painter. "I usually paint on the spot if it's possible," she explains.
"If not, I'll make sketches and write in the colors and go paint it right away."

The best thing about painting, says the artist, is that it allows her to ex-

joys watercolor, explaining that it is the 'mest exciting medium."

"I'm not an abstract painter - I'm more realistic," says Talmadge, adding, "I paint my impression of or feeling for a subject.

She adds that she does not consider the monetary value of her paintings when she is working on them. "I don't think about selling my paintings. When I see something I like I've just gotta paint it," she explains enthusiastically.

"That kind of inspiration that hits







The class processional and recessional were played by junior Dave



# Northville debuts Sunday in 'Popcorn Man' movie

"I learned a lot making this film," Zaremba said. "I found out I don't need gory special effects to make a film work. I can rely on the actors to do their jobs. Now, I have to let my work speak for itself."

The plot of "Popcorn Man" is a far cry from Zaremba's first 16 mm film venture — the story of a hatchet murderer named "Sarah" that won him first prize at the Michigan Student Film Festival in 1983.

This time, he and his mother Patricia Zaremba penned an instructive and heartening tale about two outcasts who become friends. One is Walter, a slightly retarded youngster roughly Zaremba's own age who works at a popcorn stand and thus earns the nickname Popcorn. The other is Jason, Mayor Milford's alcoholic son who returns to town after five years' absence.

Thrown together in unlikely fashion, they manage to establish a strong friendship. In only 30 minutes of film, the story seems somewhat compressed, with Jason's conversion particularly stretching our suspension of disbelief.

But "Popcorn Man" is clearly a cut above what most would expect of a 19year-old, and ranks with some fullyprofessional film shorts used the same way Zaremba hopes his new movie may be used — on cable television and as an instructional film.

His mother said the two main characters were invented with the idea of showing that, although such persons are often rejected by society, "they are human beings who have their own

The story aside, Northville viewers will soon get to share an experience with residents of New York, San Francisco and other common movie settings - realizing that what you see on film could never happen just that way in

In an amusing driving scene, for instance, you'll have to let go of your ideas about which streets run in which direction. The sequence is believable to those who don't know the street layout around town, but offers some strange

A montage sequence of Walter and Jason doing things together around town presents Northville in an attractive light. The two feed the ducks at the Ford plant, walk the nearby dam and fish in the river. A canoeing scene under the Mill Race bridge cuts away just a second too late to avoid having Northville residents notice that the two are about to run out of pond and into concrete.

Other scenes include Walter working at Sweets-N-Treats on North Center, complete with a walk-on by Jim Cowie as the boss. You'll recognize the well, the post office and the mayor's residence as a large Lakes of Northville home. With virtually all scenes being filmed here, the views of recognizable Northville sites are virtually non-stop.

The two leading actors are Wayne State drama students while Mayor Milford (a cartoonish vision of a selfimportant small town mayor) is played by the director of the arts department at William Ford Vocational Technical Center, where Zaremba attended one

Besides Cowie, local people appearing in the film are pretty much like the buildings - they're there because they were in the background on weekends last July, August and early September when Zaremba shot the film.

Since then, he has received assistance from Grace Garland, who led him through the editing process as

jumps to those expecting views to occur in some sequence related to the routes through town.

the young producer/director/cameraman/film editor pared 8,000 feet of film down to the 1,200 feet in the final version.

Zaremba once hoped to premiere the film in town at the Marquis Theatre, but found that venue too small for the number of people interested in attending - cast, crew, family and friends "all wanted to bring other people - we

needed more room."
A Northville showing is still possible, Zaremba said, if details can be worked out. But if you want to be among the first to see "Popcorn Man" it'll have to be the Redford Theater, similar to the Marquis in that it is an older movie house being restored to its former

And what now for the young filmmaker who once said he wanted to attend film school in California and would use "Popcorn Man" to help gain admis-

"Most film classes teach you the technical things that I already have a lot of experience with," he said. "I'll probably move into English, writing, I want to get more into the creative side. What I want to do, I think, is write and direct."

For now, the Detroit area will be a good place to work on his own films, Zaremba said. "We've really got everything you need right here in this area," he said. "Right now, after this premiere is all over with, I want to go out in the woods somewhere, look up at the stars and think about what I could do for another film.'

# Congratulations to a special class

Last Friday evening Northville High School's 323-member senior class was graduated in commencement exercises that were the most impressive in recent years. Superintendent George R. Bell, Principal David C. Bolitho, the board of education, faculty, parents and the entire community could take pride.

From the moment the graduates took their places on the field promptly at 7 p.m. there was no doubt that this was to be a meaningful event. The invocation by Blakely Anderson, a member of the Class of 1984, opened the program fittingly. The brief remarks by valedictorians Diana Schneider and Scott Yaekle and by salutatorians Jennifer Merrifield and Daniel Perpich reflected thought and expressed different viewpoints.

Valedictorian Schneider took her classmates back to their first days as sophomores at Northville High, tracing their feelings from bewilderment with such new experiences as Spirit Week to driver's education. Sitting in rows in their blue and white caps and robes the class demonstrated a maturity not always seen in the past. When a problem in the loud speaker system caused a momentary delay in announcing the graduates, they waited quietly.

The introduction of a Distinguished Alumni Award is intended to begin a new graduation tradition which will call attention to the accomplishments of Northville High School graduates of the past. The choice of Major and Mrs. James Jiggens was an excellent beginning. They are 1963 and 1964 NHS graduates, respectively. We hope the community will continue to nominate outstanding graduates.

As he told the graduates that the class will be remembered for its cohesiveness, it sense of humor and its scholastic achievement, there was no doubt that the graduation was as important an event to Principal Bolitho as to many parents. "My first graduating class always will be special — you have made me very proud of you this year," he said before shaking hands with each graduate crossing the stage to receive his or her diploma.

It was the conclusion of the ceremonies, however, that capped an evening for parents and graduates to remember. Led by representatives of the next senior class, graduates circled the field from both sides of the platform as Northville High School band under the direction of Michael Rumbell played the recessional. 

All the taverns in the town, and not one with a decent live band appearing regularly. I think that makes it clear communities should be more careful awarding liquor licenses.


So former UAW chief Douglas Fraser has settled in Republican stronghold Northville. Isn't that sort of like Lech Walesa settling in Moscow?

# Land resolution placed on ballot

It's official — Michigan voters will have the opportunity to approve a resolution guaranteeing the autonomy

of the Recreational Land Trust Fund. House joint resolutin "M" has cleared the Legislature and will be placed on November's general election ballot. The fund will be used to purchase and develop recreational land and facilities, and protect scenic areas throughout the state.


Begun in 1976, the Kammer Recreational Land Trust Fund (named for then-senator and sponsor Kerry Kammer) has been raided by the Legislature when our state government

was short on cash. When it was originally conceived and passed, a cap of \$150 million was placed on the fund, which it would have reached earlier this year if it had not been raided. Instead, this spring saw a paltry \$14 million in the fund, which was nearly diverted to pay for part of the Michigan Youth Corps pro-

This misuse of funds specifically earmarked for development and acquisition of public recreational lands prompted two state legislators to introduce a joint House-Senate resolution prohibiting government raids on the fund. The resolution, which was approved by two-thirds of the members of the House and Senate, creates the Michigan Natural Resources Fund.

Modeled after the Kammer Trust Fund, the new fund will be generated by oil, natural gas and mineral royalties from state-owned resources. The cap will increase to \$200 million, and no money may be transferred for any purpose other than that specified in the resolution.

The Michigan Legislature is committed to preserving and upgrading our state natural resources, as evidenced by the overwhelming support this resolution received in both House and Senate. Now it is up to the voters to finish what we have started to ensure our children will have abundance wildlife to enjoy for many years to

# Law supports state payment measure

By GERALD LAW State Representative

Legislation that would force state government to pay its bills on time won unanimous approval by the House State Affairs Committee last week. The prompt payment measure (H.B.

4134), which I co-sponsored, requires the state to pay bills for goods and services within 45 days or a penalty fee of nine percent a year will be added to the unpaid, past due balance.

The state doesn't pay any interest on late bills right now and so really has no incentive to pay on time. As a result, many small businesses which operate under tight cash flow restrictions are reluctant to deal with the state for fear they won't be paid promptly.

Twenty-seven states have passed similar legislation, with interest rates ranging from one-quarter of one percent a day to 15.5 percent a year.

The Congress approved this kind of lation in 1982 federal government paid 66 percent of its bills on time; since then it has paid 99 percent on time. Obviously the

legislation is quite an incentive. Although Michigan's payment record is better than the federal government's, concern over late payments has been

one reason that many small businesses are reluctant to enter state contracts.

Because the state should be contracting with the people who can best provide the services and goods the state needs, this is a very important bill. Legislation just signed into law will take government out of competition with private business, and I believe this

bill is the next logical step in assuring that our private employers receive fair treatment.

This measure was one of the top 10 priorities to come out of the 1982 Small Business Conference sponsored by Governor Milliken and is also a part of Governor Blanchard's small business

# Money greases the wheels in racing

By KEVIN WILSON

There's an old saw in motor racing circles that runs: "Speed costs money; how fast do you want to go?'

There is plenty of speed around, as any witness to last month's In-dianapolis 500, last week's stock car races at Michigan International Speedway or this weekend's Detroit Grand Prix III can attest.

And it's impossible not to notice who's putting up the money. Their names are everywhere — on the cars, lining the guardrails, on banners, on the sides of the footbridges that carry spectators over the track surface, even on the T-shirts, hats and handbags of those spectators.

They are the names of companies both large and small that have found some worthwhile payback from participation in motorsport — after all, Goodyear, Budweiser and Mariboro, to name but three, didn't get to be industrial giants by throwing money

What do they get out of the millions invested in one of the world's most expensive sports?

Simply one of the best advertising and promotional venues going. according to Henry Starr, president of Starr Advertising in Northville.

"If a budget will stand participation in motorsports, we'll almost always advise our clients to get involved," Starr explained. "It's not cheap, though it doesn't have to be as expensive as most people think. But it is the most costeffective way to reach that audience which is huge.

On a dollar-per-exposure basis, motorsport promotions prove out as one of the cheapest ways to get a business message out. It's the size of that audience - some 150 million spectators in the U.S. alone attend or watch televised motor racing annually - that makes the total cost of involvement look large.

The enthusiast market is not, only large, it has the characteristics most sought by advertisers, said Cliff Carrol of the Starr public relations staff.

These people have high disposable income and an incredibly high degree of product loyalty," Carrol said. A

While the big names in motor sport sponsorship invest millions annually to have their product names associated with major events like Indy and Grand Prix racing, there is opportunity aplen-

mote itself in this way. "If you're a small retailer." advised Henry Starr, president of Starr Advertising agency in Northville, "there are opportunities right in your local community."

One such immediate opportunity is the Buist-Syfert Racing Team Pontiac Firebird driven by area resident Tim Evans that will compete at this weekend's Trans Am race in Detroit. The team is seeking sponsors for the

Despite long involvement in the sport, the team is not well known except among insiders, which illustrates a point about the total motorsport audience that explains Starr's assertion that you don't need to be drowning in spare cash to benefit from racing ac-

Of the 150 million people who watch auto racing in person or on television in this country annually, only 10 million are in actual attendance at the bigleague events such as the Detroit Grand Prix or the various NASCAR and CART races at Michigan International Speedway. Add in major network broadcasts and the number rises only to about one-third the total. A large portion of the rest are spectators at smaller venues, some of which are considered very significant among enthusiasts.

Meanwhile, there are even smaller, local races where the action is even much cheaper than what Evans is involved in — Waterford Hills Road Racing, Flat Rock Speedway and Mt. Clemens Raceway are regional tracks where a few dollars lavished on the right team can give a lot of practical exposure.

Many more watch on television and the advent of cable has enlarged the scope of what type of racing makes it to the home screen. Until recently, only the biggest races could be seen on

television. But ESPN, WTBS and the Nashville Network have changed that, All transmit coverage of lesser events (ESPN often covers the supporting races such as the Trans Am and Super Vee events while their cameras are on site for the main event, for example). As a real bonus for sponsors, cable networks often schedule several showings

of the same race. Add dozens of enthusiast publications, some targeted to very specific types of racing, (a quick scan of one magazine rack turned up Circle Track, Stock Car Racing, Open Wheel, On Track, Autoweek, Amateur Auto Racing News, National Speedsport News, plus a handful of periodicals devoted to off-road racing, motorcycle and motorboat racing), and you begin to see how much is available.

So how does the little guy get a piece of the action? Tim Evans is happy to explain that running one Trans Am race

costs around \$10,000. Any sponsor willing to put up at least that much could cover the car with its logo for one race. Which is cheap in comparison to the low-buck programs Starr has put together for major clients in the \$25,000 to \$50,000 range.

But involvement with Buist-Syfert could take even less than \$10,000 - at this point, only one-fourth the cost is covered by a sponsor.

"We don't much care if we have one \$10,000 sponsor or 1,000 \$10 sponsors," Evans said. "We can work out most anything."

What's more, the Buist-Syfert team posts good results for its relatively low cost. If results were measured in speed per dollar spent, in fact, the team would rank high on anyone's list.

"We have a little figure we like to work out," said team co-owner Chris Syfert of Birmingham. "We divide our lap times by the amount of sponsorship we almost always win when compared to the other teams. No one goes as fast as we do with so little sponsorship.'

Interested? Chris and her husband Greg Syfert (crew chief), car co-owner Pete Klain of Birmingham, team manager Dave Buist of Southfield, or Evans (who lives on Chedworth in Novi Township, with a Northville mailing address) would all be glad to hear it. They have four races scheduled this year, with two more tentative on how long their own money holds out.

Evans thinks he has a good shot at a qualifying spot in the top five in Detroit, thanks to his knowledge of the track as pace car driver for the Formula One race the past two years. If he makes it, there is likely to be a lot of regional media coverage of the team.

# Motorsport audience attracts advertisers

survey by Autoweek, the Crain Publications enthusiast newspaper, showed that the auto racing audience is about 77 percent male, earns a median income of \$34,750 and an average income of \$38,020 annually.

"The demographics skew like a lot of enthusiast markets — a fairly young, upscale group with a high degree of product identification and loyalty," Carrol added, noting that the figures are very similar for photography buffs and stereo enthusiasts. But there are far more racing enthusiasts.

The results of a nationwide study recently released by the J. Walter Thompson Performance Group, headquartered in the agency's Detroit office, showed a majority of American males expressing an interest in auto racing. Some 56 percent expressed such an interest, with one-third of those over age 18 describing their interest as

Of the females among the 8,000 randomly-selected consumers surveyed, 28 percent said they were interested in motor racing. Other studies have ranked motorsport third in the nation in attendance, behind only baseball and horse racing, neither of which provides the advertising potential of motor

Those people are the target for all those dollars poured in auto racing. So what kind of message does the money

"The obvious answer is that the race car is dynamic — there it is suffering

the stress of racing and surviving, per-forming well," explained Starr. "I think it proves the (auto-related) product, be it tires, motor oil, headlights, the engine, whatever."

A proliferation of types of racing has widened the opportunity for this kind of promotion-by-demonstration. High performance rallying, where competitors speed over unimproved roads through forests, Carrol noted, is growing as a venue for advertising road tires, lighting equipment and suspension parts, for instance.

"People see those cars doing that and they feel better about having that product on their own cars," Starr explained. "The consumer puts Goodyears on his family car and there's a warmth for the product, a feeling of security that they were made by the same people who make the tires that survive all those races."

Another benefit is credibility. "You better believe those drivers know who's paying the bills," Starr said. "They're professionals — they know that they may be on the track Friday, Saturday and Sunday but they're on the road doing promotions Monday to Thursday.

"And having a race driver on a commercial saying he uses your product is a lot more credible than some actor saying the same thing. People know that guy's putting his butt on the line and isn't going to use a lousy product just for the money."

But those putting money into racing aren't confined to automotive product manufacturers anymore. Beginning with the tobacco companies, who found

racing promotions one route to television exposure after cigarette commercials were banned, many other advertisers have come to see the value of racing involvement.

Starr cites as a quick example the Kroger grocery chain's decision to sponsor one of last year's Grand Prix supporting races. Kroger put up the prize money and had its name attached to the race.

"What they did was smart and what we advise all our clients to do — don't leave your racing promotion in a vacuum, capitalize on it," Starr said. Kroger gave away a car, a new Thunderbird, and took the car around to the various stores and showed it in their print advertising."

The Kroger case is also an example of the many types of promotion that can be undertaken — sponsoring a racing car, often one of the most expensive investments around, is far from the only

way into the sport.
"For example, at the Grand Prix, you can sponsor the Formula One car garage and post your signs on the walls and such," Carrol said. "Every time a newspaper or television camera takes a picture in there, you've got more exposure, over and above the people attending the actual event.'

Signage appears virtually everywhere at a major race event the sides of the safety barriers at Detroit, for instance. Tying enthusiast markets together was also effective last year for photo film companies both Kodak and Agfa offered consumers special areas from which to take photos and marked them prominently, tying them in with print advertising surrounding the event.

Major sponsors this weekend include all the major U.S. automakers - Ford has probably the largest involvement, and is still reaping the benefits from having its engines win the first two Grands Prix here (not to mention dozens of such races since 1967). In addition, virtually every photo of the front straight and the Renaissance Center. often reprinted in succeeding years, shows the company name spelled out in the windows of the tower.

Pontiac division of General Motors put up the \$45,000 purse for the Trans Am race Saturday and all references to the event are to the Pontiac Trans Am race - a nice tie-in with the name of Pontiac's high-performance Firebird. Chrysler attached its name to the small sedan supporting race to be run Sunday and American Motors, through its French partner Renault, is represented with the Sports Renault race for identical cars powered by Renault engines.

All expect attendance will exceed the 70,000 who viewed last year's Grand Prix. The big deal, though, is that CBS will beam the race to 40 nations. This one event will be seen by as many people worldwide as attend all major league auto races in this country in per-

son in a year — more than 50 million.
With those kind of numbers, it's easy to see why Starr says racing involvement "can lead to category dominance - most of the companies involved in major racing events are right at the top of their fields. A good racing program can make a company real healthy."

# Couple creates backyard wildlife habitat

Less than a mile from the expressway, surrounded by new apartment complexes and the hustle-bustle of Seven Mile Road, there is a certified natural wildlife habitat. It's in Jerry and Zo Chisnell's backyard.

Their acre of land, in a residential neighborhood along Maxwell Street in Northville Township, has been registered by the National Wildlife Federation as a Backyard Wildlife Habitat. The certification is part of a nationwide network of mini-refuges for

The Chisnells have lived in their home for 22 years. "When we moved in it was just a house in the woods with no plumbing," explains Mrs. Chisneli. "Since we had all this property, I bought a book (Gardening with Wildlife, by the National Wildlife

Federation) and started following it." That book sparked Mrs. Chisnell's interest in maintaining the natural state of their yard. She learned of the backyard program through Natural Wildlife Magazine.

The National Wildlife Federation began the residential area preservation program in 1974. "We'd already been doing that all along, so I thought it was a nice idea," Mrs. Chisnell says, adding that she finally applied to the program last vear.

In order to be registered by the Federation, applicants must illustrate the efforts taken to attract bird and animal life to their yards. "We try to maintain and restore what was here in order to keep the animals and birds coming back," says Mrs. Chisnell.

She estimates that the number of different types of birds in their yard now numbers almost 90, not all of them native to this area.

When we moved in, I assumed we'd have robins and sparrows - I was surprised to discover there were so many different kinds of birds," notes Mrs. Chisnell. She says that hummingbirds and thrush are among those in the yard, and adds that the "wrens are in the pro-

"I like to put out different types of food to see what kinds of migrating birds pass through the area," says Mrs. Chisnell.

Birds are not the only ones that take advantage of the Chisnell habitat. "A long time ago we used to have deer and quail -- once we even had a bobcat. Now we still have an occasional fox, but most of the animals are possum, squirrel, woodchucks and raccoon.'

As the area becomes more commercialized the animals leave, she says, despite efforts by nearby apartment complexes to maintain a 'natural' set-

In order to help the small animals that do appear in the yard, the Chisnells keep a goldfish pond, which birds, frogs and toads also take advantage of. Although the pond serves its purpose well, the Chisnells are planning to build a larger pool for the animals.

Mrs. Chisnell says that she doesn't need to do a lot in the way of feeding her backyard guests. She does put out corn, thistle, sunflower seeds and peanut hearts, but notes that the animals are fairly self-sufficient.


"A lot of those feed packets that you buy at the store are a waste — and they make weeds grow," she maintains.

In addition to the animal life in the

Chisnell backyard, there is also a large variety of wildflower growth. There are so many, in fact, that Mrs. Chisnell has to identify them with plastic markers.

"When we first moved in I learned the names of all the wildflowers we had, but every year we get new ones and I have to re-learn them," she laughs.

When transplanting or buying new plants, Mrs. Chisnell tries to choose a variety that birds like. "They can be

pretty and still serve a purpose," she

Trees can also be found in abundance in the yard. Among them are cherry trees; birch, which were transplanted from northern Michigan; and maple, which the Chisnells tap in the winter.

Unfortunately, when the area's sewer system was put in, the Chisnells lost 12 of their largest trees. "It was a big disappointment," says Mrs. Chisnell, because the conservation department believed those trees to be the largest of their kinds in the southeastern

The Chisnells do replace and add new

trees; their most recent addition was evergreen trees. "It's great air conditioning," laughs Mrs. Chisnell, "the temperature is 10 degrees cooler here than up the block.'

The backyard habitat does have its problems. Mrs. Chisnell fights "an endless battle" with weeds. She mulches maple leaves and uses those to help combat the problem. "If I get a really stubborn one that I can't get rid of, I just declare it a wildflower," she

Maintaining the yard is relatively inexpensive, according to Mrs. Chisnell, who spends only about \$50 a year for

new plants. Their only large expense is hiring someone to clean out their maple

"But I do have a wish list about two

pages long," adds Mrs. Chisnell, laughing. The "Tree Freak", as her three children call her, spends about three or

four hours a week in the yard. "I also spend a lot of time at the window with my binoculars," says the self-taught bird watcher. ----Although the habitat is mainly her.

project, her husband is in charge of the vegetable garden. And, adds Mrs. Chisnell, "He cuts the lawn and tries

not to mow anything down."

Mrs. Chisnell is glad to help anyone who would like to get involved in the program. "I don't think many people are aware of it," she says.

There are only three other Northville residents who have had their yards registered as backyard habitats. They are the David Sharpes on Beauford Lane; Sandra and Lowell Cook on Tralee Trail; and Andrew Weinrach, who lives on Eight Mile Road.

"I think it's great," comments Mrs. .Chisnell, "too many of us end up with subdivision yards. It's nice to counteract all the new cement with something like this."

In the fourth, Paul Newitt socked a long double, moved to third on a wild pitch, then sprinted home on a deep sacrifice fly by Scott Swienckowski.


Redford threatened in the bottom of the seventh, putting two men on. But Dominique piccked off the lead runner and retired the final two hitters for the complete-game victory.
