Self-interest votes limited under policy

In the wake of an August vote that posed conflict-of-interest questions, the Northville Township board of trustees adopted a new policy last week governing its members' actions.

The conflict-of-interest policy does not prevent members of the township board from having a financial interest in contracts to perform work for the township, but does restrict a member from voting on such issues except under specified circumstances.

Drafted by township manager Bruno Scacchitti at the request of supervisor Susan Heintz, the new policy addresses a situation that arose at the board's August meeting. Had it been in place last month, the policy would have prevented trustee Donald B. Williams from voting to pay his own electrical contracting firm (DBW Electric) for work performed at township hall.

At the least, the new policy would have required Williams to disclose his financial interest in the issue.

DBW Electric billed the township for more than \$1,100 in electrical services on three separate contracts. Williams voted with the rest of the board to pay those bills, among others, later saying he did not recognize the potential conflict and would have asked to abstain from the vote had he thought of it.

Heintz said the incident was partially her fault for not recognizing the situation and immediately ordered the drafting of the policy adopted September 12.

Under the policy, any member with a financial interest in actions of the board is required to disclose that interest and is prevented from voting on the issue unless the monetary value of such interest is less than \$250 or five percent of the total contract value (as documented by signed affidavit).

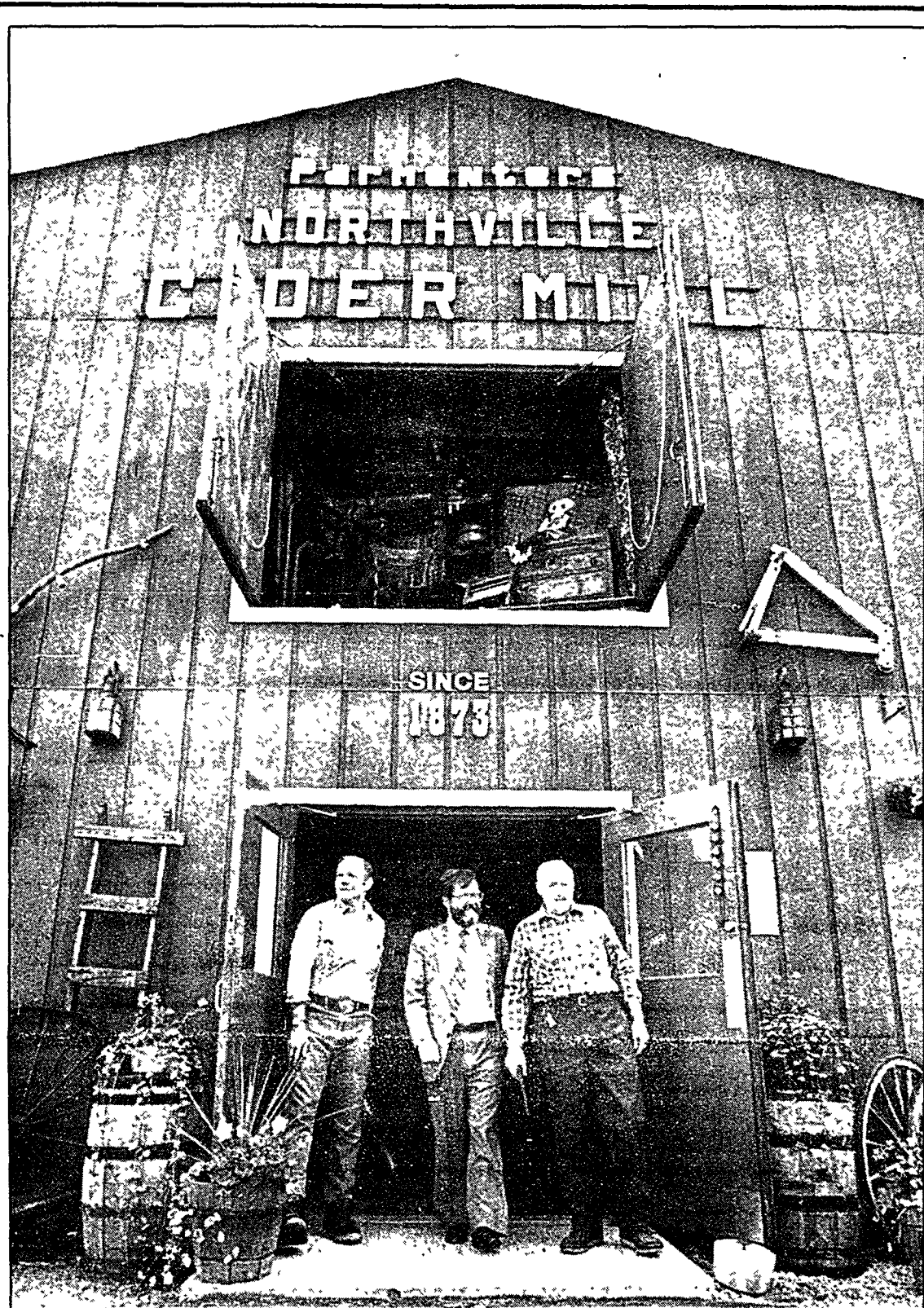
A potential conflict is defined as a situation in which the board selects a vendor or awards a contract and a board member, one of the member's immediate family or a member's partner has a financial interest.

The only situation in which a board member may vote on an issue that involves a financial interest above the \$250/five percent rule is when all three of the following conditions apply:

- The member's vote is required to constitute a voting quorum on the issue (this occurs if only four of the seven members attend);
- The member works less than 25 hours per week for the township;
- And the financial interest is disclosed before the vote.

Administration of the policy is assigned to the township clerk, who is to be notified by the member with a potential conflict of interest. The clerk then rules on the member's eligibility to vote.

Residents oppose apartment zones for Six, Sheldon

There was little doubt about how residents attending last week's public hearing on a rezoning request felt about multiple-family housing at Six Mile and Sheldon.

They don't want it. They dislike the idea enough that one fellow who told Occidental Development Company representatives to take their proposal and "shove it" got a ringing ovation from his peers.

The firm, the development arm of Edward Rose and Sons of Southfield, has petitioned to rezone nearly 300 acres at the corner of Six and Sheldon from R-2 and R-3 (single family residential classes) to RM (multiple family housing).

The area involved includes roughly 145 acres at the northwest corner and 150 acres at the southwest corner of the

intersection. The two parcels are subjects of separate but related rezoning petitions; there were two hearings. September 10, one for each petition.

The land was the subject of a 1980 rezoning petition seeking commercial status for a large portion at the corner. The request was denied despite a township master plan that, at the time, showed commercial use at the corner. The potential developer sued and won, but the option to purchase the property expired and the court order no longer applies.

The township master plan was subsequently altered to show the entire corner as single-family residential.

Site plans for a subdivision tentatively designated Ravines of Northville were approved, but Elro Corporation never executed its purchase option and

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Slate still wide open

With less than two weeks left before the nominating deadline the only sure thing about the November 5 city election ballot is that Eugene (Bud) Kunz will be on it.

Kunz was the only candidate to have returned nominating petitions to the city clerk's office as of Tuesday morning. Kunz plans to challenge Mayor Paul Vernon, whose campaign manager Robert Brueck has taken out petitions. Vernon has announced his intention to seek a fifth two-year term.

Candidates have until September 30 to file nominating petitions bearing the signatures of no less than 50 and no more than 75 registered city electors.

Another potential mayoral challenger, council member Carolann Ayers, is still in the wings, trying to gauge the quality of the field of candidates who might fill her seat should she opt to resign from council. City charter provisions require that an incumbent council member whose term is not expiring must resign upon becoming a candidate for mayor. Ayers' term does not expire until 1987.

"There isn't a lot of definite information (about candidates) out there," she said Tuesday, estimating that she has another week to go before she must make a decision.

Besides Vernon, Kunz and Ayers, others who have picked up petitions are Mayor Pro Tem Dewey Gardner (whose term is expiring), Luigi Folino,

Lee Holland, Ron Bodnar, Maclyn Burns and John Buckland. At least one new name will gain a seat on council this year, as incumbent Burton DeRusha has announced he is not seeking re-election when his term expires this November. Gardner and Bodnar are the only ones to have confirmed that the petitions represent their own candidacies — the others may be seeking signatures for yet-unnamed candidates.

Ayers said that, if she resigns to pursue a mayoral candidacy, she does not

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Board grants EMS contract

The Northville school district made a major dent in its future energy bills last week with the board of education's approval to grant a \$500,000 contract to Mechanical Controls and Maintenance Incorporated for installation of a district-wide Energy Management System.

The Energy Management System, the most comprehensive and expensive of the energy conservation measures recommended by Moylan Engineering and Coquillard, Dundon, Peterson and Argenta (the architectural firm working on the high school renovation), is expected to provide the district with the greatest amount of energy savings.

In presenting the EMS proposal to the

board, Assistant Superintendent Burton Knighton noted that the pay back period for the system is estimated to be slightly more than two years.

He also noted the system should provide a minimum energy cost avoidance in excess of \$200,000 per year.

Knighton explained the system will incorporate controlled switches, valves and monitoring devices in all of the school district's buildings with the exception of transportation.

The system includes a central control unit for each building and a centralized computer for controlling settings and monitoring energy consumption throughout the district.

The central controls will be located in

the operations office at Main Street School and will provide monitoring reports for each building and for each zone within a building.

The system also will allow the school district to monitor energy consumption and reduce usage in off hours as well as spot trouble areas causing an inordinate amount of energy usage.

Mechanical Controls and Maintenance Incorporated was one of only two bidders for the project. Knighton noted that specifications and plans for the system were distributed to companies in mid-July and an initial bid deadline was set for August 7.

With only one bid submitted by the August 7 deadline, the district opted not to open the bid and extend the deadline to August 22.

Though eight companies received copies of the specifications and plans, only two submitted bids on August 22. In addition to Mechanical Controls and Maintenance Incorporated, the lowest bidder, Micro-Mizer, Inc. also sent in a bid for \$583,000.

"We solicited bids from companies we knew could do the job," architect John Argenta told the board. "Because of the complexity of the project or other reasons, several dropped out."

Argenta said some companies indicated they were too busy with current projects while others noted they had problems getting subcontractors.

He also said "some of the companies felt they couldn't be competitive with a public bid."

Jacob Burstein of Moylan Engineering, who has been working with the architectural firm since early spring in

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Record takes top awards

The Northville Record has won the General Excellence award in its circulation category, highest professional honor for Michigan newspapers, in the Michigan Press Association 1985 Newspaper Contest.

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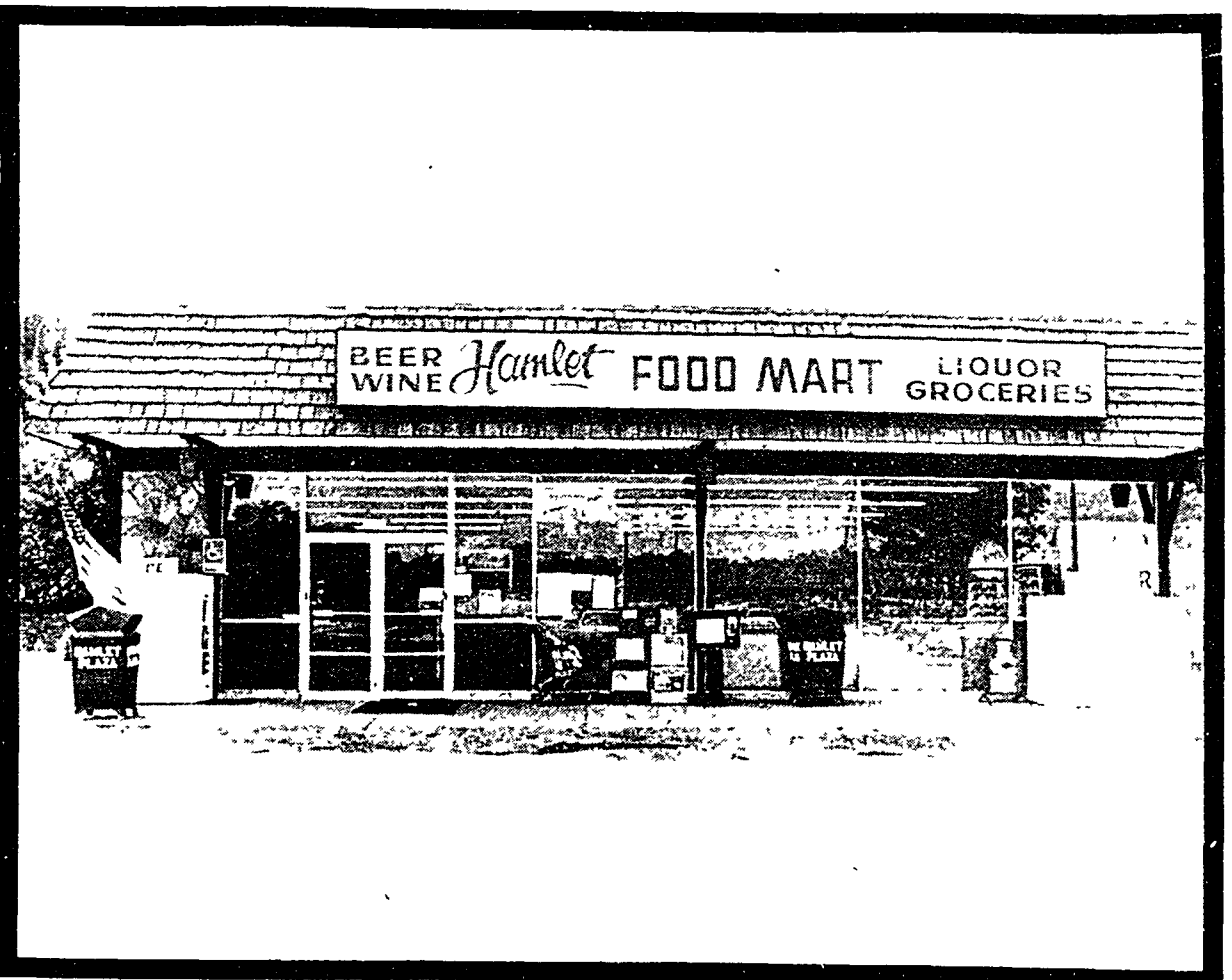
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Township board okays truth-in-taxation millage cut

A property tax rollback of 2.77 percent was approved by Northville Township board of trustees last week, dropping the total of township operating, police and fire millage to 3.5976 mills.

The rollback complies with Michigan Truth in Taxation legislation requiring a millage reduction proportional to the

increased property valuation experienced in the past year.

Truth in taxation requirements exclude from the calculations those valuation gains due to new construction, so the 2.77 percent figure represents the growth in value of existing development in the township. The computation is made as of December 31, 1984, and reflects one year's activity.

Northville Township is authorized to levy 3.7 mills of property tax — one mill

for operating, one-half mill for fire protection and 2.2 mills for police protection (the latter voter-authorized in separate 1.5 and 0.7 mill levies). One mill of tax equals \$1 per \$1,000 of State Equalized Valuation (SEV).

In order to levy the full authorized millage under the truth-in-taxation law instituted in 1982, the township board would have to conduct public hearings and take a roll call vote to "raise" taxes above the rollback figure. Such hear-

ings and votes have become common since institution of the law.

"I still think we're going to be the only ones, or one of the few, to (accept the rollback)," supervisor Susan J. Heintz said at the September 12 board meeting.

State representative Gerald H. Law (R-Plymouth Township) attended the board meeting and told trustees their action would affect not only the

township's tax revenues, but a portion of its state shared revenues.

Law explained that state shared revenues are derived from the sales, income, single business and intangible taxes assessed by the state. All but the sales tax are shared with local government under a formula that factors in the local property tax rate.

"It's kind of strange, really," Law said of the state revenue sharing formula. "It rewards communities with high taxes. It was developed with cities in mind, really, where most are authorized to levy up to 20 mills. And you can be sure Detroit's situation was a consideration."

He noted that a one-half mill tax rollback in Plymouth Township cost that community \$40,000 in state revenue sharing and that the recent defeat of a millage election there will increase the loss.

Township manager Bruno Scacchitti said he did not factor in a state revenue sharing loss when computing preliminary 1986 budget figures. But, since revenue sharing is based on the previous December's millage rate and uses a fiscal year six months out-of-phase with the township's, the impact of the millage rollback won't be felt until the 1987 fiscal year, he said.

For 1985, the township's revenue sharing from the state sales tax is fixed

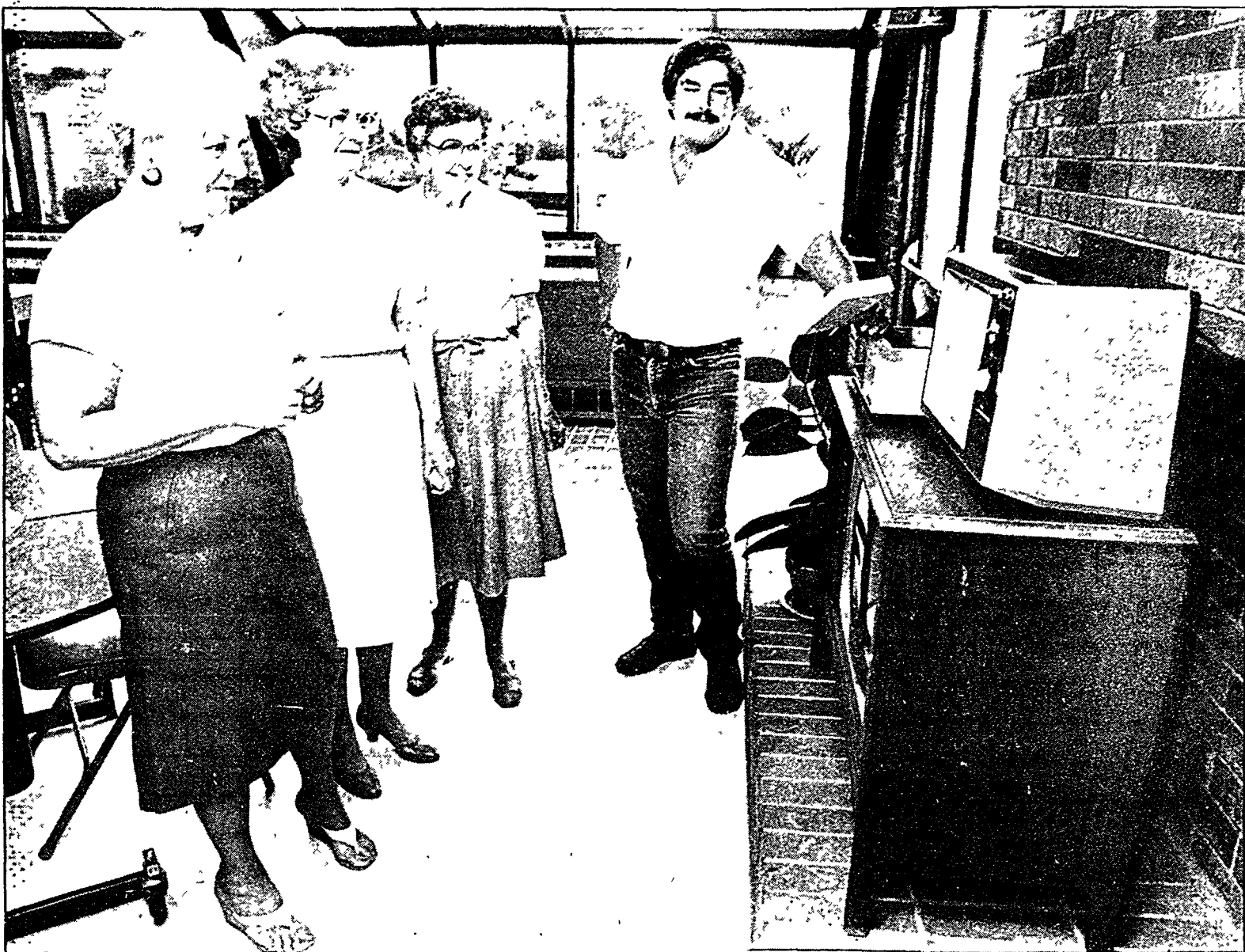
at \$395,265 with the first check due in October. The 1986 projection is \$427,900, beginning next July and paid next October.

The sales tax revenue sharing is based on population and represents the largest portion of the township's revenue from the state — it will not be affected by the millage rollback.

Subject to reduction will be projected 1986 revenues of \$38,000 from the income tax (\$36,687 in 1985), \$25,900 from the single business tax (\$22,911 this year), and \$12,400 from intangible taxes (\$12,680 for 1985).

The payments lag the period designations, so the July-September period share is paid in October (at the start of the state's own fiscal year). That means the reduced millage will not result in reduced revenue sharing payments until October, 1986, when the first payment of that state fiscal year is due — that's 10 months into the township fiscal year 1986.

The township is also slated to receive roughly \$12,000 each year in a "census correction." Due to its fiscal crisis, the state delayed adopting the 1980 census figures as the base for state sales tax revenue sharing. The township's population has been adjusted upward from the 12,097 figure determined in 1980 to 13,197 today, a figure Heintz said "is still too low."

Phoenix earns accreditation

Phoenix Correctional Facility in Northville Township is the latest Michigan prison to earn national accreditation.

Accreditations are awarded by the National Commission on Accreditation for Corrections. The accreditation was awarded at the annual conference of the American Corrections Association in New York City recently.

The 311-bed medium-security men's prison was converted from the former Detroit House of Corrections Women's Division in 1980. Superintendent is Lloyd May.

There are more than 440 nationally recognized standards for delivery of correctional services that accredited institutions must meet, grouped into 26

major areas. These include administration, security and control, sanitation and hygiene, medical services, programming, prisoner rights and rules, and prisoner discipline.

Each institution applying for accreditation is audited by an accreditation team made up of experts from other states.

Phoenix is the seventh Michigan prison to earn accreditation. Facilities accredited earlier are Muskegon Correctional Facility, Huron Valley Women's Facility and Huron Valley Men's Facility (both near Ypsilanti), Michigan Dunes Correctional Facility (near Holland), Kinross Correctional Facility (near Sault Ste. Marie) and the Michigan Training Unit in Ionia.

A three-part revue containing excerpts from American, British and Continental light operas and operettas, the production will feature works by Romberg, Frimil, Victor Herbert, Oscar Strauss, Offenbach and Gilbert and Sullivan.

Among the Gilbert and Sullivan selections will be excerpts from "Pirates of Penzance," "H.M.S. Pinafore," and the first full operetta planned by the company, "The

Mikado," slated for a February 14-16 run.

Fire hall architects to be chosen tonight

Township board members will decide tonight (September 18) which of four architectural firms will be awarded a contract to design a new fire station for construction on the west side of the township.

Fire chief Robert Toms and township manager Bruno Scacchitti recommended awarding the contract to one of the four bidders (Coquillard/Dundon/Peterson and Argenta) at last week's regular board meeting, but members requested further investigation of references supplied by the bidders before acting.

The board is scheduled to have a joint meeting with the township planning commission this evening to discuss revisions to the master plan of land use as it applies to the Haggerty Road corridor.

The contract award was tabled until

tonight, to allow time for further investigation of the potential contractor's references.

Scacchitti and Toms recommended Coquillard/Dundon/Peterson and Argenta based on a bid to do the work for six percent of the construction cost and because of the firm's experience in designing six fire halls.

One lower bid was received, with TKACZ and Associates bidding a fixed fee of \$19,350. Scacchitti said that figure would represent about 5.9 percent of the estimated construction cost.

"We thought it better to have a variable cost," Scacchitti said, suggesting the recommended bidder be contracted to complete only the schematic design and design development stages (the first two of six steps in design and building) for a cost not to exceed \$6,000.

He added that James Argenta, a Northville resident, would probably be the architect assigned to the project.

Toms said his independent observation was that he liked the fire stations designed by Coquillard/Dundon/Peterson and Argenta. TKACZ and Associates had two fire hall projects among its references, board members noted, one of them being an expansion of the Plymouth Township facility.

But trustee Richard Allen, noting that Argenta is the architect for the Northville High School improvement project, and saying that "percentages bother me" asked whether TKACZ and Associates might not be a more appropriate selection.

"They've got something of a disaster in the building (at the high school)," said Allen.

But trustee Donald B. Williams, an electrical contractor in private life,

said the problems at NHS "are not the architect's fault. He's pulling his hair out. The problem is the builders can't get the materials on time."

Still, Allen said he would be "more comfortable with a fixed fee — then they have no incentive to pad the building out."

Noting that the bids had only been received that morning, Scacchitti said he had not had time to explore the references supplied by each firm. Supervisor Susan Heintz asked that the fire chief and township manager "formally check some references" prior to tonight's meeting.

Other firms bidding were TMP Associates (eight percent of construction cost) and Kamp DiComo Associates (7.5 percent of cost). Okley Associates was invited to submit a proposal but did not do so.

Theatre discount offered

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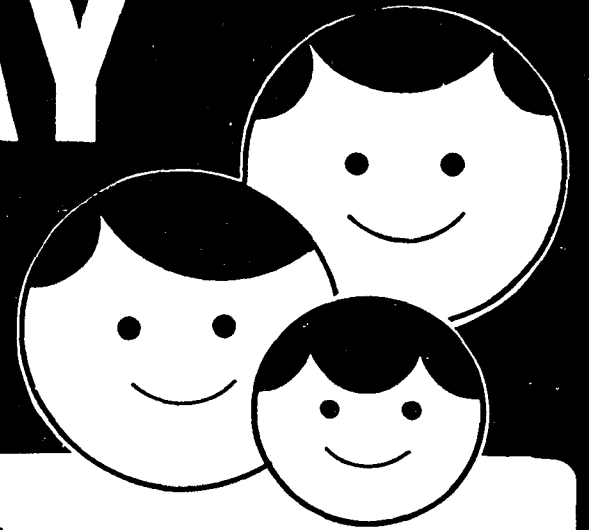
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Pressman gains hearing through implant

For the first time in his life, Clark Berke can hear the voices of his grandchildren. A pressman at News Printing Inc. in Northville with 31 years' experience, he never knew that newspapers made crinkling noises.

"Hi," he says, and smiles to the stranger at the door of his Brighton home.

"He can talk," said his daughter, Carol McCollum, explaining that he is very shy about his own voice. "He's leery to use his voice because he doesn't know what he sounds like." And, he hasn't yet learned to talk very well.

Born deaf, the son of deaf parents, Berke was recently the recipient of a new kind of hearing enhancer. It's not a hearing aid, but a receiver and a series of wires implanted in his head which transmits sound waves directly to his brain by way of electronics.

Since his was the first implant of its kind in the metropolitan Detroit area, Berke became something of a celebrity in the last few months via the local television and newspapers. The operation was filmed by news cameras and he was interviewed over and over again through his daughter's interpretations.

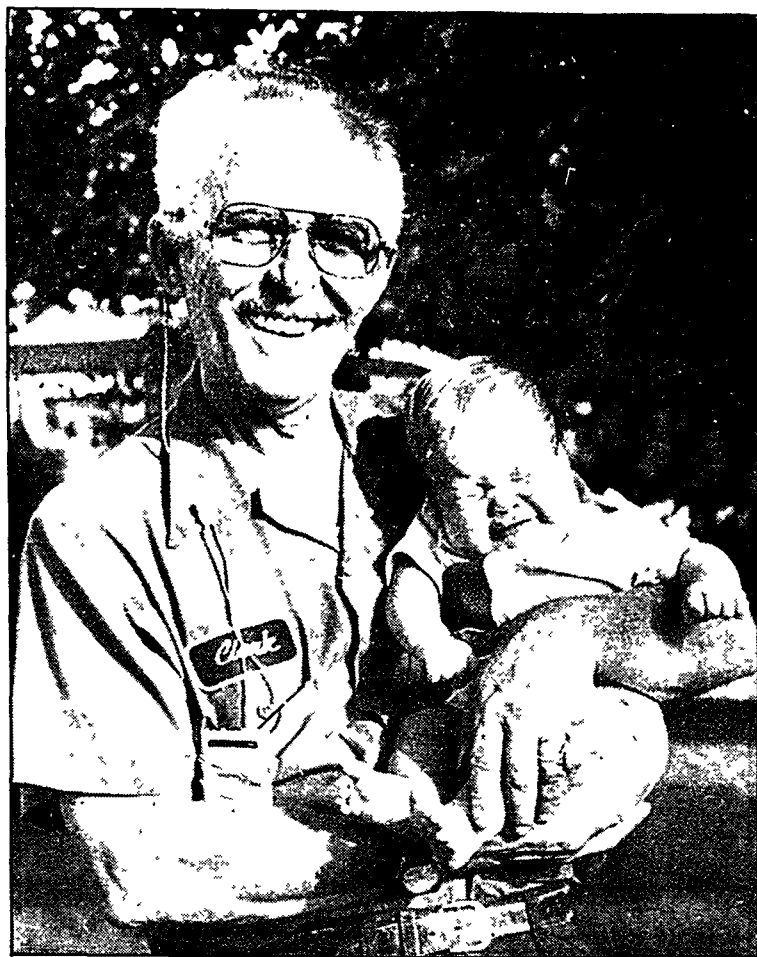
Berke keeps the clippings from all the newspapers which ran articles about him. He smiles when he watches the news, recognizing the television reporters who clamored to meet him.

"(The publicity) doesn't bother him. He just wants deaf people to know this is available," said McCollum.

The cochlear implant operation which gave him hearing was approved by the Food and Drug Administration last November. Berke had gone to his doctor to clear up a routine sinus infection when the doctor told him about the newly-approved procedure.

Berke was eager to try it, but there was one drawback—his insurance would not cover the \$15,000 medical costs for what was considered an experimental operation. He was lucky. He found a doctor and a hospital willing to absorb the costs.

"Dr. Warren Brandes, who performed the operation at Oakwood General Hospital in Madison Heights, said Berke, 61, was an excellent candidate because of his intelligence and motivation and because he understood the

seriousness of the operation.

"Dr. Brandes did not have to pick up the cost," McCollum said. "He's just a genuinely warm person."

Brandes said the operation will only be successful in those patients who are born with a cochlea, and are physically sound otherwise. Berke was lucky in that respect, too. There was no physical cause for his deafness; it was a bit of a mystery to his family.

His worries were that the operation might not work as hoped, and as with any operation there were certain risks involved. All the media coverage didn't

make him any more comfortable, either.

"That was a hassle in June, because we were so unsure (about the outcome of the operation). But his theory is to get it out. He doesn't really like being on TV but it's a worthy cause."

The implantation was done in June, but his new ears were not completed until last week when the external microphone and receiver were attached. McCollum still does most of his speaking for him, because he cannot understand the spoken word. He is going through speech therapy to help that.

"He can already hear a dog barking," she said. A neighbor's pet saw to that. "And last night we took him out and he heard crickets, didn't we, Dad?" As she speaks, she talks slowly and uses sign language, to allow him to become accustomed to the meanings of sounds.

"He's just amazed that everything has sound. He didn't know. The first couple of days he was dizzy because there were too many signals going to his brain."

McCollum, who has been very close to many deaf family members, said she hates it when people look down on the deaf.

"In Michigan you are considered handicapped if you're deaf. You're not; you can lead a normal life. I was constantly teased about having parents who were deaf and dumb. I never felt my mom and dad were worse than the people next door."

"When my grandmother died, she didn't know one sign. She never communicated with my mother. She thought she was odd. The neighbors never said 'hi' to my dad. A lot of people think that deaf people are stupid, that they can't read or write. Deaf people are considered second class citizens and it's not fair."

Berke was educated in South Dakota, but moved to Michigan looking for work. He became friends with Bill Sliger who offered him a job in the pressroom of the Northville Record in 1954. Soon after, he moved to Brighton.

"He is very dedicated to his work. Once he went to work with chest pains when his lung had collapsed. He never once said to us kids, 'Hey, I can't do that because I'm deaf.'"

Berke hopes to retire soon, but he doesn't expect his life to change much. "He says he will be able to enjoy life more, but he still considers himself a deaf mute."

Maybe so, but every day he hears a new sound. He can listen to music and enjoy watching MTV with his 8½-year-old granddaughter. The sound clarity he receives was never expected to be as good as natural hearing, and has been described as sounding like "a scratchy record." Only Berke knows what it really sounds like, and he has nothing to compare it to.

But, he adds, it is much better than nothing.

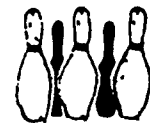

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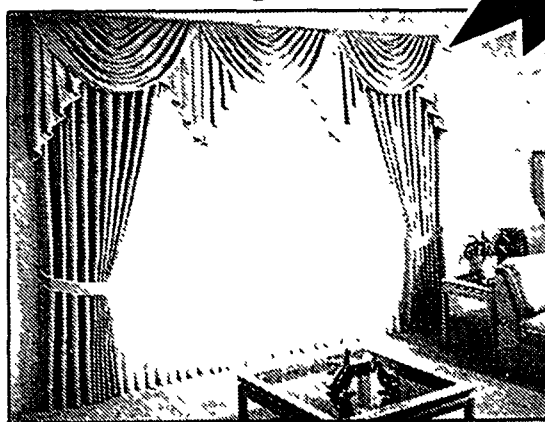



A Michigan DNR-led effort to clean up the Rouge River is designed to require local governments to help fund the project, Northville Township supervisor Susan J. Heintz said last week.

"It is my opinion that the DNR wants to clean up the Rouge River using local dollars," said Heintz, who is also chairperson of the Rouge River Watershed Council.

Heintz said the organization of communities in the Rouge River valley was not consulted before the DNR issued its report and launched efforts to clean up pollution in the Rouge.

A major source of pollution in the river is effluent from sewage overflows — a problem that was to be addressed in various sewer improvement proposals made over the years, none of which has yet come to fruition.

Vestiges of the so-called Super Sewer plan remain, but agreement among all the affected local units of government has been difficult to achieve due to the costs involved. A cutback in federal financing of such projects further com-

plicated the latest effort.

The DNR Water Resource Commission (WRC) has scheduled an October 1 meeting at the Henry Ford Estate, Fair Lane, on the University of Michigan-DeAnn campus.

On the agenda is adoption of a "preliminary strategy" for clean-up of the Rouge basin. The WRC has announced plans to develop a detailed "Remedial Action Plan" over the next year.

"Some cleanup projects can begin this year and should proceed, while other long-range projects must await more comprehensive studies of the river and pollution sources," WRC chairperson James Murray said in a letter to elected officials.

The goal, Murray wrote, is to make the Rouge "a resource people can use" for boating, fishing, wading or picknicking along the banks. There are 1.5 million people living in the basin and 50 miles of parks and public lands along its branches.

Heintz said a report to Wayne County supervisors recently included the com-

ment that the Rouge "is one of the most polluted rivers on the planet" and that it "regularly went on fire" before industrial pollutants were brought under some control.

Heintz said one reason communities bordering the Rouge haven't done more to clean it is the expense and the need for coordinating effort.

"Garden City invested hundreds of thousands of dollars to separate its sanitary and stormwater (sewage) systems, and it didn't really do any good for the river there because there was so much coming from upstream," Heintz said. "Inkster is planning to do the same thing, but it's hard to justify when the river going through the community doesn't get any better."

DeHoCo lands rezoned for research park uses

More than 160 acres of Detroit-owned property in Northville Township has been rezoned for research and development uses.

Research and development zoning allows research parks consisting primarily of offices but with some limited light industrial uses permitted.

Township trustees September 12 approved the rezoning from single-family residential. The property involved is north of Five Mile and east of Ridge Road and defined as the west half of section 17 (a section is a surveyed square mile area — there are 36 sections to a full township, 18 sections in Northville Township). The property is down-used land once part of the Detroit House of Correction complex.

Detroit lodged no official objection to the rezoning, which Northville Township Supervisor Susan Heintz initiated in May. The township planning commission and Wayne County Planning Commission both recommended approval of the rezoning.

County planners included in their approval recommendation a comment that development of the site should include replacement of aging water lines that served DeHoCo. The comment was included on the recommendation of the county health department.

DeHoCo property west of Ridge is already zoned for industrial or research and development uses. The southeast one-quarter of section 17 (a one-half mile square west of Beck and north of

Five Mile) is the site of Phoenix Correctional Facility and the under-construction Scott Regional Correctional Facility. The northeast quarter section includes Our Lady of Providence Center and various residential properties.

Heintz said the rezoning is intended to encourage Detroit to sell the property. Bills authorizing the sale of a portion of DeHoCo to the state included a provision requiring development on the remaining city-owned land comply with the local zoning ordinances.

Plymouth Township earlier this summer rezoned the Detroit-owned land on the south side of Five Mile for industrial development.

In related discussion at the trustees'

September 12 meeting, state representative Gerald H. Law (R-Plymouth Township), reviewed the bills authorizing the formation of a state prison at the former DeHoCo property.

He noted that the last bill Governor James Blanchard signed in the 23-bill package includes provisions abolishing all Detroit authority to own or operate a prison facility outside the city limits.

"The Detroit (legislators') bills were worded in such a way that it would retain the authority to operate a house of correction," Law said. "My bill abolished all the enabling statutes. The governor signed that one last, and I expect that it would take precedence since it was the most recent legislation enacted on the issue."

Township limited to 'safe' investments

An investment policy requiring Northville Township to consider "the probable safety of its funds as well as the probable income to be derived" was adopted by the board of trustees last week.

Such a policy was recommended by township auditors Plante & Moran to protect the township from risky investments that have caused extreme financial distress in various local governments in Michigan and the nation.

The policy defines seven types of investments considered prudent and requires all investment decisions be made by a committee consisting of the township treasurer, clerk and township

manager.

It also requires interest from investments to be returned to the fund from which the investment was made.

Township manager Bruno Scacchitti said the only change in the township's current investment portfolio required by the policy will be to drop some commercial paper investments in some funds.

The policy limits the amount of a fund which may be invested in commercial paper to 50 percent of the total fund value at any one time. Some funds, Scacchitti said, have a majority investment in commercial paper right now.

Investments considered appropriate are:

- Bonds, bills or notes of the United States or a U.S. agency or instrumentality;
- Negotiable certificates of deposit, savings accounts and other interest-bearing deposit accounts of financial institutions organized in Michigan that have posted a profit for their two most recent fiscal years. Banks must be members of FDIC, saving and loans must be members of FSLIC and credit unions must have deposits insured by the National Credit Union Administration (NCUA). Township investments are limited to 20 percent of the institution's combined capital and unimpaired surplus.
- Bankers' acceptances issued by U.S.

- banks that are members of FDIC.
- Commercial paper rated in the two highest classifications of prime by two standard rating services. Total invested in any one corporation is limited to no more than 20 percent of stockholders' equity except in specific circumstances.
- Mutual funds, trusts or investment pools composed of instruments that are considered eligible collateral.
- Repurchase agreements against eligible collateral, the market values of which must be maintained at levels equal to or greater than the amount advanced. Northville Township's interest must be undivided in the instruments pledged.

Trustees asked Scacchitti if a similar policy might not be needed for members of appointed boards and commissions, noting specifically the planning commission and zoning board of appeals.

"It's an ethical situation for them rather than a legal one," he said.

Scacchitti noted that most planning commission actions are advisory and that no appointive body is authorized to enter into contracts without board approval. Township trustee liaison to the

planning commission Richard Allen said he could think of "at least one instance right now" in which a planning commissioner has a potential conflict.

Commission chairman Richard Duwel normally abstains from acting on reviews of site plans drafted by his employer, R.A. DeMattia Company. He ordinarily hands over his chairmanship to another commission officer for that portion of the meeting devoted to reviewing DeMattia plans.

There is no specific policy requiring Duwel to step aside during consideration of such issues.

developing plans and specifications for the system, said Mechanical Controls and Maintenance, Inc. is known throughout the country for its work.

He explained also that the energy management system will be interrelated with a fire alarm and security system.

The \$500,000 contract approved by the board last week will include training for employees as well as a one-year warranty on both hardware and software.

Funding for the system will come from bond monies sold last year under Public Act 431.

Under P.A. 431, approved by the state legislature in December, 1982, school districts may sell bonds in an amount up to 1.25 percent of the State Equalized Valuation of the district for a period of up to 10 years to finance energy im-

provements in schools.

Sale of the bonds does not require a vote of the electorate as the debt is paid through general fund monies saved through the utility cost avoidance of the completed energy measures.

The Northville Board of Education approved the sale of \$1.5 million in bonds in August, 1984, to the New Jersey-based firm of Liss, Tenner and Goldberg.

Approval to install the Energy Management System culminates more than a year and a half of study to determine ways to save on school district energy costs which totaled more than \$1 million annually.

In February, 1984, the district hired the engineering firm of Moylan Engineering Associates, Inc. to conduct an energy audit of the district's facilities and make recommendations for improved energy maintenance.

Gymboree open house slated next Wednesday

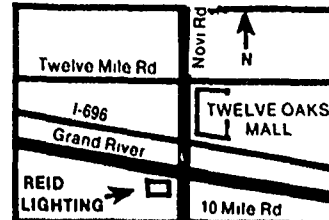

Residents oppose petitions to rezone at Six, Sheldon

the land was never platted. The site plan approval has since expired.

After reviewing the history, and noting that development of the site is an expensive proposition because sewer lines must be extended from 2,500 feet east of the corner and because of irregular terrain (most notably a ravine that divides the southern portion at its midpoint), Occidental representatives said the only practical use for the property is for multiple-family housing.

Conceptual site plans presented at the hearing showed "high-rent" apartments laid out on curving roadways with 13 man-made "lakes" in the northern parcel alone. Occidental Development's Mike Meyers said the upscale complex would fit into the community well and suggested that if the rezoning is not approved "there's always the possibility the something worse than what we propose would be developed on this property."

But residents weren't buying. One

after another, they stood up to oppose what they said would be a massive shift away from the township master plan of land use. Time after time, neighbors of the parcels stood before the planning commission and said they didn't want high-density housing adjacent to their land. They said the road system wouldn't bear the added traffic. They said the developer could build single-family homes there if it wanted. They said rental properties detract from the value of adjacent owner-occupied housing.

A petition opposing the rezoning was presented. It was signed by members of the Thornapple Lane Association, including every resident of the lane itself, association president George Purcell said. The petition claimed single-family home values in the area would be downgraded if multiple-family use was allowed at the corner.

In response to questions raised by planning commissioner Larry Sheehan, Purcell said the primary objection to multiple-family zoning is the high-

density population which residents believe is not in keeping with the "character of Northville Township."

Purcell also said that the higher density would increase the expected traffic volume in the area, pointing out that Sheldon becomes very congested when Northville Downs is operating. The final objection, he said, to multiple-family zoning was that "the zoning goes with the land" and there is no guarantee that Occidental's proposed development would be the one built on the property.

"If we're talking high-quality rental, there is no problem," Purcell said. "But if it becomes a situation of \$300 or \$350 a month rentals, then I think it would be a problem."

Sheehan said the traffic situation is not a legitimate objection to the zoning, because an increased volume would likely result in widening of the road.

"I just wanted to know your objection wasn't only to the traffic, because traffic is something that can be taken care of — if something like this came in

there, they would probably end up widening Sheldon," said Sheehan. "But if the objection is to high-density, then that's different. The density will definitely be higher with multiples than with single family."

Chris Duncan, a resident of the Edenderry subdivision, said he came from Philadelphia and, when seeking a home, "looked for a countrified atmosphere." He said he checked the zoning on surrounding property and "when I saw it was zoned single family, I felt quite secure."

He and others, notably Barbara O'Brien, a resident of the same subdivision and a member of the township beautification commission, said the master plan map showing single-family zoning constituted a "promise" to those who purchased homes nearby and urged commissioners to reject the petition.

Tom Lee, president of the Northville Commons Association, recalled master plan discussions of several years ago when it was determined that the township should be dominated by

single-family housing development to maintain a lower population density.

Meyers, the Occidental representative, said that rejecting the rezoning will not result in the land remaining vacant. He said Six Mile and Sheldon will "inevitably" be developed and urged citizens to support Occidental's proposal as a high-quality use for the land.

"It lies right in the path of growth," he said. "Six and Sheldon is the crossing of two (roads with) major freeway exits. You're going to get something there, and it's in the community's best interests to have something like what we propose instead of taking whatever comes along."

Planning commission chairman F. Richard Duwel three times asked for a show of hands of township residents who favored the rezoning. Not one hand was ever raised.

When commissioner Richard Allen, a township trustee whose role is as a liaison between the two bodies, asked Meyers what Occidental would do if only one of the two petitions was approved,

the developer said he would have to examine the issue. "We haven't really considered it," he said, noting that the firm has a purchase option on the two parcels that is contingent on the rezoning.

"I think you should consider it before you come back," Allen said of possible approval for rezoning only one of the two parcels. "It comes up sometimes. That's not to say that's what we have in mind — we may not even discuss it. But you should be prepared to speak to that possibility if it does come up."

Duwel noted that the planning commission will likely rule on the petition at its regular monthly business meeting September 24. The commission vote is advisory, with the township board holding final authority over zoning decisions. The commission's recommendation would be forwarded to the county planning commission for review before the township board would act, likely pushing a final decision on the issue back to November at the earliest.

want the remaining two years of her term filled by a council appointee and hopes to see a high-quality field of potential candidates for the vacancy.

"I can really resign any time before the filing deadline, but to be responsible about it I have to announce in time for others to make a decision about running for my seat," she said.

Ayers said she is getting "a great

deal of encouragement from a lot of people who are not really involved in city government. I find that encouraging. General citizen interest in city council has really waned over the past couple of years. I feel really encouraged when people who are not generally interested in government take enough interest to support me."

By the same token, she added, she is not receiving support from "people I didn't really expect support from," including longtime backers of Vernon and

a bloc of influential downtown business people represented by fellow council member Dewey Gardner.

"Considering his relationship with Paul (Vernon), I would not expect to get his support, and there's definitely a downtown element that would probably go with that," Ayers said.

In announcing his candidacy for reelection, Gardner also announced that he would be a candidate for mayor in 1987 but would support Vernon this year.

Given the shortage of solid information about potential replacements, Ayers said she is considering remaining in her council seat rather than abandoning it to run for mayor.

"I may decide I would be serving the community best if I continued to serve on city council and be more dynamic in my role as a city council person," she said. "I'm not sure exactly how I'd do that. It's not an easy decision. I know I have to make it within the next week or so. For now, I'm still hanging in there."

Third place — sports writing (Philip Jerome) also was won by The News for a story about cutting horses which ap-

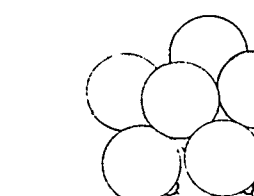
peared in the May 1984 Neighbors tab which was included with The Record.

Novi Hilton unveils collection of Michigan artworks



Artwork 'unveiled'

Louise Nobili was among the Michigan artists who attended the Novi Hilton's art "unveiling" this month. Nobili's "Mirrored Grid" is displayed in the Orchard Cafe. The artwork throughout the Hilton was selected by renowned lithographer Emil Weddige, who served as the hotel's art consultant. Altogether 15 artists are represented in the collection. Their works include watercolors, oil paintings, lithographs and sculptures.

When the Novi Hilton at Eight Mile and Haggerty formally presented its array of Michigan artwork earlier this month, it accomplished two notable feats.

The first was the "unveiling" of approximately 30 pieces, including watercolors, oil paintings, lithographs and sculpture, making the Hilton's lobby and dining areas a veritable museum of Michigan artwork.

The second was the collection of many of the artists themselves for the occasion of the unveiling.

"This unique idea of bringing the Michigan artists together... is taking me back to the time when I was a young man, to what was called a Varnishing Day," explained host Emil Weddige. Prior to a public opening, artists used to gather to check over their work, he said.

"Actually some of them would varnish their paintings at that time. They would make sure their work was hung properly, make sure their name was on it... and also complain about where it was hung," he laughed.

Weddige, a nationally-known artist/lithographer, served as a professional consultant in selecting the artwork displayed at the Novi Hilton. His works are part of permanent collections in the Detroit Institute of Arts, the Cranbrook Academy of Art and the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

"I wanted to be able to feel that when the guests of this hotel walked in, they would sense the atmosphere of a museum," Weddige told the group of artists.

Special care was taken to select pieces that would complement various areas of the hotel, including the main lobby, the Crystal Swan dining room, the Orchard Cafe and Whispers Nightclub. "I spent a week just picking out the molding that would be appropriate (for each piece)," he said.

Beginning with a Glen Michaels sculpture over the lobby desk, Weddige highlighted each work. "We really perspired over this one," he said of the untitled sculpture. Weddige consulted Michaels weekly, discussing the structure of the wall on which the 650-700 pound sculpture was to be hung. "To get this up into space and to say 'That's exactly where I'd like to see the guests of this hotel see it'... Every time I look at it, I think it's a miracle."

Moving from the lobby into the Crystal Swan, Weddige pointed out works by Zubei Kachadoorian, Sarkis Sarkisian, Barbara Keldan, Deena Morguloff-Kachadoorian and Jean Paul Slusser.

Whispers Lounge features the works of Mary Jane Bigler, Vincent Hartgen and Charles McGee. Stepping off the elevator guests face a Richard Kozlow piece titled "Blue Ridge." Works by Weddige highlight the Orchard Cafe,

along with an enormous piece on the far wall by Louise Nobili titled "Mirrored Grid."

Weddige said he spent about six months selecting the works, but used "a lifetime of background" in the process.

"The objective of the hotel was to represent Michigan art," he explained. "The art you see is representative from one end of the scale to the other, from one point of view to the other."

As construction of the hotel progressed, Weddige would walk through the

lobby and restaurant areas, getting a feel for the scale and intimacy of each room.

"We went through a multitude of slides," Hotel Manager Gary Seibert noted. "We narrowed it to about 100, then told him to just go ahead and select."

"The committee gave me freedom," Weddige added. "And when you are able to exercise freedom, you are able to do your best."

Stick to master plan for Six and Sheldon

Northville Township should stand firmly behind its master plan for use of property at Six Mile and Sheldon, rejecting the current petitions for multiple-family zoning.

Not only is multiple-family zoning inconsistent with the master plan, but such a use would establish a high-density precedent in an area of the township that has yet to see intensive development. We agree with the petitioner that development of the area is inevitable — which convinces us all the more that a major segment of land must not be turned over to multiple family uses.

While many of the arguments against multiple-family housing aimed at last week's public hearing seemed distastefully snobbish or elitist, there are more legitimate reasons to retain single-family zoning at the corner. Higher population densities put a greater strain on all public services — everything from roads, schools, police and fire protection to water and sewer systems. While the higher density also holds out the promise of greater tax revenues for the schools and township, whether the revenues offset the additional service demands is an open question. What is certain is that a community dominated by multiple-family housing requires more expensive services, such as a larger police force, than it would if single-family is dominant.

Multiple-family housing is not an evil in and of itself, and Michigan law requires that it be accommodated in all communities. We believe, however, that Northville Township is attempting to allow multiple development in more appropriate locations — the Seven Mile corridor already contains extensive multiple-family housing, there is a relatively small complex at Six Mile east of Northville Road, some is a likely element of the Haggerty Road plan now being drafted, and there is on the table a multiple-family region along Five Mile for part of the unused Plymouth Center for Human Development property. There are further multiple-family uses contemplated in the Sheldon Road retirement village, where the latest proposal allows half the 101-acre site to be open to general

multiple-family housing.

Given the generally high cost of housing today, there will be continued pressure to allow higher-density multiple-family uses on much of the undeveloped township property. Township residents and their elected and appointed representatives will have to be diligent in controlling such uses if they wish to retain single-family housing as the predominant type of development. The strategic location of Six Mile and Sheldon in such continuing battles should be a paramount consideration — the site is virtually in the heart of the undeveloped or underdeveloped region.

As the township's experience on Seven Mile Road should teach us, it becomes more and more difficult to defend single-family zoning once extensive areas are designated multiple-family. New zonings should be restricted to areas where they can be contained without posing a threat to the integrity of the master plan for the vast undeveloped portions of the township. No repeat of the Seven Mile multiple-family proliferation should be allowed — the negative aspects of multiple-family housing are worsened by concentration. The positive aspects are independent of location.

Residents at last week's public hearing expressed concern that most new proposals for residential development are for multiple-family housing. That Northville Township's single-family zones are relatively restrictive in terms of density, lot size and required floor areas — even in the highest-density R-3 areas — may be part of the reason. Developers base their plans on economic considerations and while the demand for very low-density (i.e. expensive) housing remains strong, we've not seen any rush to build in the designated higher-density R-3 zones. There have been many requests for multiple-family zoning, however. It would be worth some planning commission time and expense to see if the reason isn't that the zoning ordinance lacks an intermediate density between multiples and an R-3 single family class that is restrictive in comparison to surrounding areas.

Convenient timing for street repair plan

One must have greater faith in coincidence than we can muster to believe the city's fall street repair program has nothing to do with the November 5 mayoral and council elections.

Granted, the purpose of the program is to catch-up on street maintenance deferred over the past four years while the city battled a budget deficit, and the deficit is now virtually eliminated, but that doesn't explain the rush to get something started before election day.

All notions of competitive bidding went out the window when only one contractor submitted an estimate and won the contract because there "isn't time" to rebid the project. Ostensibly, the need for haste is to get started before winter weather sets in — which just happens to coincide neatly with the election. To be fair, the sealing work scheduled will be more effective if done in time to protect

streets from the freeze-thaw cycles of a Michigan winter and it appears the price is a fair one. Still, we wonder that the program wasn't started sooner.

The city knew last year that its budget would soon be out of deficit, and officials knew, too, that streets needed work. The program should have been in place for the beginning of the fiscal year July 1. Instead, we are treated to a minor portion of the work (conveniently on the most heavily traveled streets) being rushed into place this autumn while the major repairs needed to many neighborhood streets waits for the return of summer.

We don't wish to sound ungrateful — any work done to the streets is welcome and the sooner the better. We'd have thought July better than October. But then, we aren't looking for votes in November.

On the road to play

I wasn't among the first visitors to Stratford, Ontario, who sat on wooden, folding chairs in a tent 33 seasons ago to enjoy Shakespeare's plays in a summer theater presentation. But I did begin making the summer trips to the mid-Ontario town on the banks of the Avon River a few years later — and have been doing so almost yearly ever since.

I suspect there are many theater-goers like me who know the play's the thing — but only part of it. Like Northville, Stratford's broad streets are lined with homes of Victorian and Edwardian beginnings. (It was settled by the Canada Company in the early 1800s.) There are 175 acres of parkland running the length of the Avon where white swans swim calmly.

Two weeks ago the green grass was filled with picnickers taking advantage of the very warm day. It wasn't even necessary to have packed a lunch at home — the Leslie Cheese House in town offers brown bag lunches. Some visitors stop at a small bakery on Ontario Street to buy their croissants. Another stop at a grocery fills them with cheese or meat.

In recent weeks, I've watched tour buses of senior citizens and other visitors descend on Northville's downtown. The visitors pause at almost every store window, many eating

ice cream cones purchased at Cloverdale's. They shop, admire the Victorian architecture and the flowers that bloom almost everywhere — and, merchants tell me, they return. Some bring their families to see our town. When I think of the reasons for traveling four hours to Stratford, they're the same ones, I suspect, that bring visitors to Northville. It's pleasant and safe to stroll down the streets, there are interesting shops in which to browse (both communities have their share of antique and gift shops), and restaurants offer fine dining experiences.

Stratford's success has spread to surrounding communities. It's easy to "eat your way" through a weekend. Because of a late departure for Canada, mealtime arrived considerably before Stratford. This resulted in a stop at the Elm Hurst, a Victorian Gothic home built in 1872 and converted into a restaurant six years ago. Located just off the 401 exit to Highway 19 at Ingersoll, the stately home has been restored into a restaurant serving early Canadian food at both lunch and dinner.

The home itself is worth the stop, but the food also is excellent — the menu ranges from creamy cheddar cheese soup and stuffed rainbow trout to a hunt feast for two of roast pheasant. The home was built to be the manor house of the James Harris family. The family pioneered the cheese industry, later



adding apple orchards to its holdings and becoming involved in the apple export business. Present day owners say in restoring Elm Hurst they have tried to capture the atmosphere of an upper class Victorian home in an agrarian setting.

From the tent in Stratford, which was cut up with snips of the fabric sent to early supporters after the Festival Theatre came into being, theater activities have expanded to the Avon Theatre and the Third Stage. In mid-summer there are music concerts, and restaurants such as the Jester Arms offer after theater cabaret performances.

For those who may not have visited Stratford because Shakespeare isn't "their thing," take notice: for many years works by other authors have been offered. Currently Nikolai Gogol's "The Government Inspector" is being played by talented actors on the Festival stage while Oliver Goldsmith's "She Stoops to Conquer" is at the Avon, alternating with Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie." Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night" also continues into October.

I don't think it was Shakespeare who said, "Better late than never" but that's what this is all about — if you haven't been to Stratford yet.

of the Navy: surface ships, submarines and naval aviation.

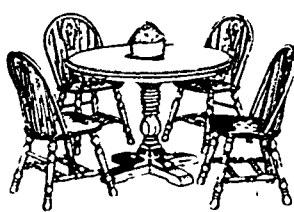

He spent a week at Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton, California.

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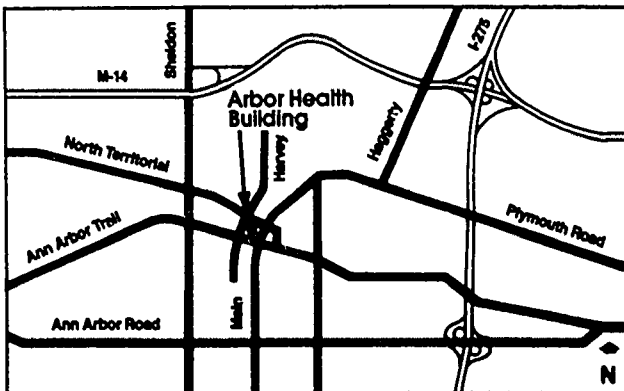
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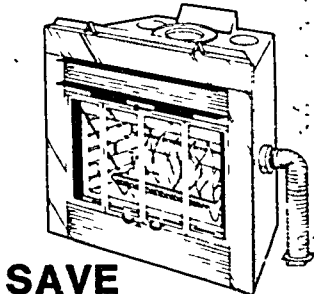
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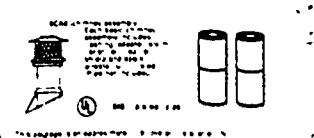
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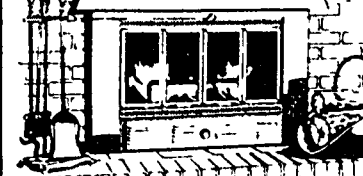
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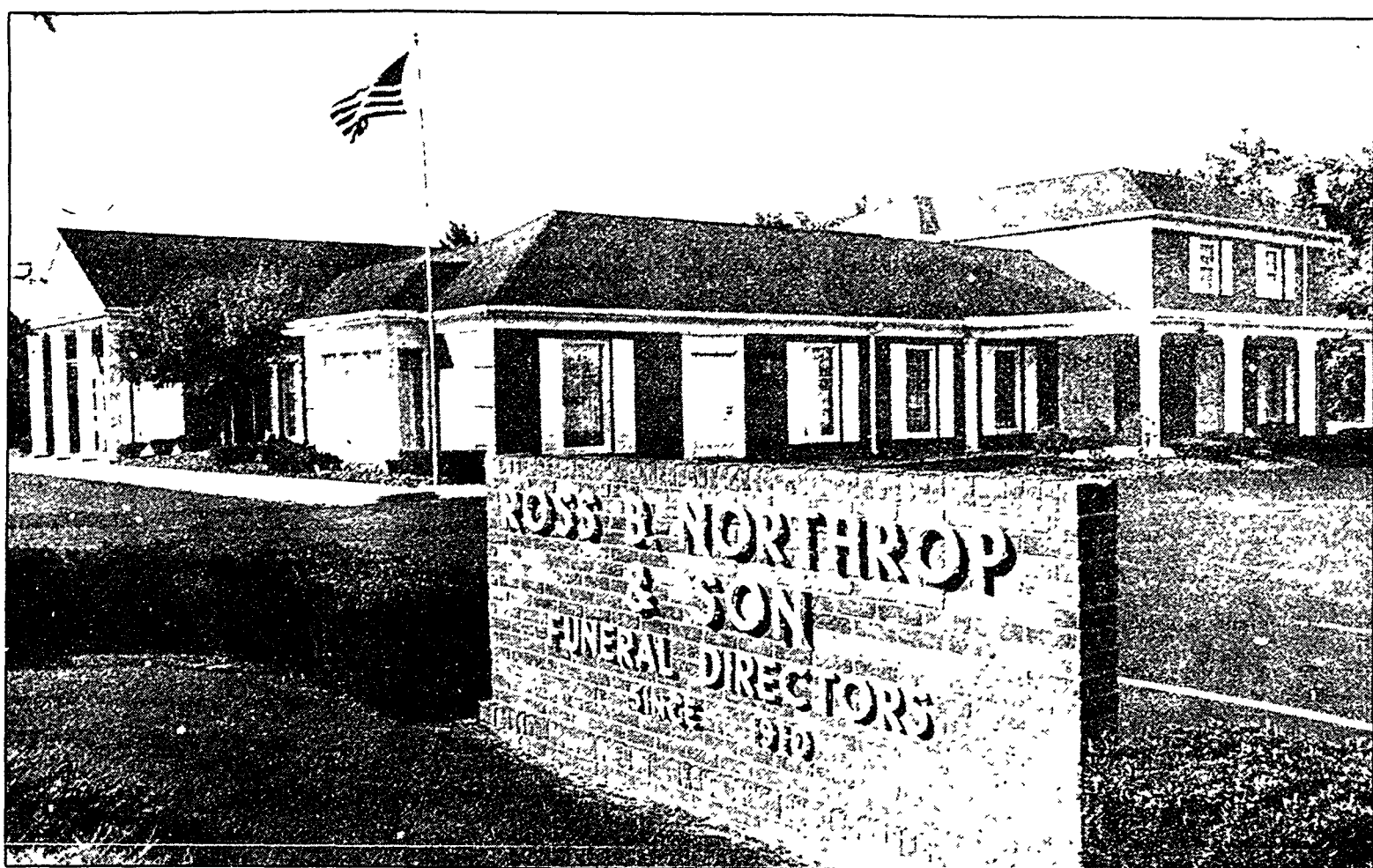

Northrops mark 75 years in funeral home business

As one who has grown up in the 75-year-old business established by his family, Blake Northrop is well aware of changes that have taken place in the funeral profession during the last three quarters of a century.

"Funeral directors often used to be cabinetmakers," he says, mentioning his grandfather began the business in September, 1910, with the funeral parlor operated in conjunction with a fine furniture store.

"In 1929, dad sold the store but kept the funeral business," he recalls.

Northrop's own involvement with the family-owned business began after he completed his mortuary studies at Wayne State University in the first class after World War II. He had been attending Michigan State University and Ferris Institute before entering the Air Corps in 1941.

While he is known as Blake to friends and associates, Northrop is really Ross Blake Northrop Jr., the son in the business name, Ross B. Northrop and Son Funeral Home.

The business established on Grand River, between Lahser and Telegraph, still continues. The colonial building at 19091 Northville Road in Northville was built by Blake Northrop in 1974.

He points out that Northville was a

natural location for the second funeral home as both his parents went to school in Northville. At that time students who lived in Livonia and Farmington often came to high school in Northville. "It was second home," he says.

The Northrops built their home in Northville 19 years ago this Christmas, using a copy of his grandparents' home for the plan and beams taken from the old farmhouse.

Noting that funeral directors have been forced to talk openly about all costs by federal regulations, Northrop sees this is one of the recent major changes in the industry.

And he agrees with the regulation requiring that costs be broken down.

"It makes for a better understanding. The investment in a funeral home is large today," Northrop points out.

He adds that maintenance is a big item for funeral home owners, noting that customers expect that it be an appropriate place to greet friends and family before the funeral.

"A lot of places used to stress the casket," Northrop observes as he lists items that now are broken down for the customer.

Licensed funeral directors also are embalmers, but many funeral homes,

he says, also have embalmers on the staff. Northrop has four. Staffing, which adds to the hourly wage total, is an ongoing expense, he points out as a director must be on duty through the night to receive calls.

"No matter how ill someone is, nobody's ever prepared," Northrop says, adding, "It takes many a week to two years to realize what's happened."

He feels that it is in the situation where the family is unprepared for death and the resulting expenses that there may be the feeling of being taken advantage of later with resulting talk of the "high cost of dying."

For this reason, he feels also the complete disclosure of prices is a positive thing.

"What it means is that people got a lot they didn't know they paid for previously," Northrop says, noting that services not used are not charged for today.

Expenses of the business itself — credit and bookkeeping along with maintenance, utilities (that must include air conditioning) and taxes — are part of the fee to use the facility. In addition to this fee and the casket are personnel on hand during visitation and the funeral as well as the obituary notices.

Northrop points out that in the past

the funeral director also often took care of cemetery arrangements. Now, he says, the family understands these are separate costs.

Another trend he sees today is fewer "viewing days." Usually, there is one visitation day, perhaps from noon to 9 p.m., with the service the next day.

He notes that memorial services also are becoming more usual, but he estimates that 65 to 70 percent of services are the still the traditional ones. A small number have no service at all, or just a graveside prayer — with the family sometimes asking the funeral director to give the prayer.

In days past, Northrop recalls, he kept a memorial tribute in his pocket "to be prepared in any event."

Although the average person hates to talk about death and dying, Northrop says, he sees more people interested in pre-arranging and pre-financing funerals.

"It protects their families and us, too, for you know just where you stand," he says.

For the past two years he has had a former minister, Bill Yunk, who served at Trinity Lutheran Church, on his staff to speak to church and other groups interested about arrangement possibilities.

He has been speaking in the Livonia and Redford area where Northrop says the population near the Grand River funeral home is older, but stabilized with people staying in the homes they have lived in much of their life. The Northville business was established for a growing area.

In a business known as among the most family owned of any in the country, does Northrop see a future director in the family?

Northrop mentions his grandson Ben, who has just turned 14, as showing positive interest.

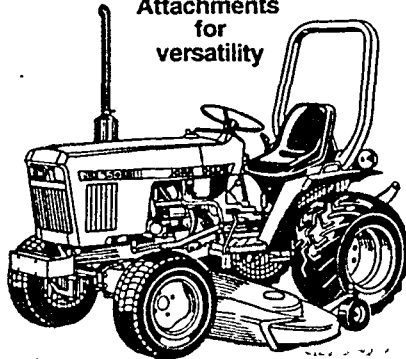

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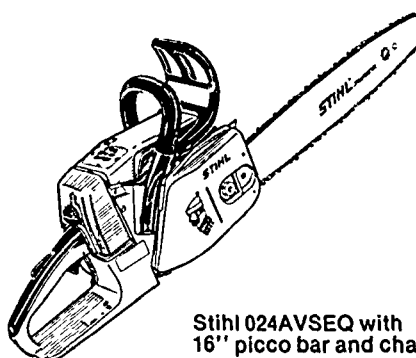

CPAs review chief tax reform proposals

If you don't know the first thing about income taxes but are wondering why everyone is talking about the President's tax reform plan, here's some help from the Michigan Association of CPAs — a checklist of the most significant proposed rules that will affect individuals.

Keep in mind, however, that the President's 461-page tax reform plan will change hundreds of rules in the current tax system if it is adopted by Congress and signed into law — so this is just the tip of the tax reform iceberg.

TAX RATES: Single persons with a taxable income between \$2,900 and \$18,000 would be taxed at the 15 percent rate, and married persons filing jointly would pay at the 15 percent rate on taxable income between \$4,000 and \$29,000. Singles would pay at the 25 percent rate on taxable income between \$29,000 and \$42,000. Singles would pay at the top rate of 35 percent on taxable income of \$42,000 or more. Those filing jointly would pay at the 35 percent rate on taxable income of \$70,000 or more.

EXEMPTIONS: An exemption would reduce your taxable income by \$2,000, nearly doubling the current exemption of \$1,040. You would generally claim one for yourself, your spouse and for each qualified dependent. Those 65 and older and blind persons would no longer be given an extra exemption, but may instead receive a tax credit if they qualify.

ZERO BRACKET AMOUNT: Sometimes referred to as the "standard

Money Management

deduction," the zero bracket amount is a deduction everyone receives. It is built into the tax table and that part of your income — along with exemptions — is not taxed. The zero bracket amount would increase to \$2,900 for single persons, \$3,600 for heads of households and \$4,000 for married couples filing jointly.

ITEMIZED DEDUCTIONS: These are expenses that can be subtracted from your adjusted gross income. It pays to itemize deductions and file a Form 1040 (long form) only when itemized deductions are greater than the zero bracket amount to which you are entitled. The major itemized deductions allowed under the President's reform proposal include charitable contributions, mortgage interest on your principal residence, medical expenses that exceed five percent of your adjusted gross income and interest on personal loans up to \$5,000 plus investment income.

LOST DEDUCTIONS: Several important deductions would be discontinued under the President's reforms. Itemizers would no longer be permitted to deduct state and local taxes on their federal tax returns. Virtually all

business deductions for entertainment would be eliminated. Only half the cost of a business meal over \$25 (per person) would be deductible, but you can still deduct the first \$25.

Another big change in deductions: So called "miscellaneous deductions" for investment advisory fees, tax preparation fees, safe deposit box rentals, professional organization dues, union dues, etc., would be lumped together with employee business expenses not reimbursed by your employer.

These items would become adjustments to income. Only those miscellaneous deductions and employee business expenses greater than one percent of adjusted gross income would reduce your tax bill. However, you would no longer be required to itemize to claim these deductions.

IRAs: These are Individual Retirement Accounts that give you a tax break for investing and building a retirement fund. Contributions reduce your taxable income and are not taxed until you withdraw the money. By that time, you'll presumably be in a lower tax bracket. The President's reforms would raise the amount that a married

couple with one working spouse can contribute to an IRA from \$2,250 to \$4,000.

MEDICAL INSURANCE: Employer contributions to medical insurance premiums would be taxed. The first \$10 a month for individual coverage and the first \$25 a month for family coverage would be added to the employee's gross income.

TWO-EARNER DEDUCTIONS: This currently takes some of the sting out of the so-called "marriage penalty" but would be discontinued under the President's reform package. Working married persons have been allowed to deduct 10 percent of the lower-earning spouse's wages — up to \$3,000 — from adjustable gross income. This tax break would be eliminated.

CHILD CARE EXPENSES: A tax credit that currently defrays the cost of caring for a child while parents are at work would be replaced by a tax deduction. If you meet the eligibility requirements, child care expenses of up to \$2,400 for one child and \$4,800 for two children would be deductible.

All these rules are only proposals and may be changed by Congress over the coming weeks. Keep in mind that this summary is meant only to provide a guide to understanding the tax reform debate, and you may want to ask a CPA to help you with any specific questions about your personal situation.

Lawmaker seeks panel to study state business

A special committee of the state's house and senate would be created to study Michigan's business climate if a resolution introduced earlier this year is approved.

The resolution calls for the creation of a 10-member committee that would "investigate precisely why businesses are leaving Michigan."

In addition, the committee would examine the criteria most used by businesses in deciding where to locate and would recommend changes necessary to make Michigan "the most desirable state in which to locate and operate a business," said State Representative Gerald H. Law (R-Plymouth).

Law said Michigan's business climate has been attributed with the loss of numerous businesses and job opportunities for years. He pointed out

that previous study groups have spent more time denying problems than in correcting them and giving lip service to improving conditions.

"But, unless we deal with the real criteria firms are using in making decisions, we can't adequately address the loss of Michigan business and employment," Law said.

With General Motors deciding to locate the Saturn plant in Tennessee, Michigan's leaders need to ask some key questions, said the state legislator. "It's time to examine what we offered to attract the auto company and what we could have done better," he stressed.

"The news about Saturn should serve as a catalyst to make our state competitive. By examining our shortcomings, Michigan can further improve its business climate and send the signal that our state is a good place to locate."

Sales of existing homes headed for record year

Buoyed by a 25 percent August increase over a year ago, members of the Metro MLS see the possibility for a new record in the sale of existing homes for 1985.

"August pushed sales by our members this year to 12,575 units, a mark not achieved last year until sometime in November," said Robert F. Craver, president of the multiple listing organization.

"If we can maintain the same pace through the next four months, our sales could end up near 19,000 to best the previous high in 1978 of 18,480. In that record year, we reached our present sales level about two weeks earlier."

The National Association of Realtors indicates sales across the country should reach 3.06 million units this year and top this figure by another 60,000 in 1986. The national sales record of 3.968 million also occurred in 1978.

"While most other sectors of the economy are slowing down after 30 months of expansion, housing

is continuing as a bright spot," Craver stated. "Both declines in home mortgage interest rates and the continuing improvement shown in our home affordability index are key factors."

He said home prices in the Detroit area, long considered bargains compared to most other major metro regions, may be starting to play catch-up.

"Our August average price of \$63,636 was up 11.4 percent from a year ago, but for the year the rise is a more modest 7.3 percent," he said. "This is still well below the \$91,800 average reported across the nation in June."

Craver noted that average prices generally run about 20 percent higher than median prices which indicates half are sold at lower prices and half higher.

"The national median price in June was \$76,500," he said. "Using the same formula would place the median price of homes sold by our members around

\$50,000." August statistics of the Metro MLS show that 14.2 percent of homes sold for less than \$30,000 while 13.3 percent sold for more than \$100,000.

The report of 1985 sales through August indicated 11 communities in which Metro MLS sales were 100 or more above a year ago. Included were Livonia, 1,000 year-to-date 1984 to 1,316 year-to-date 1985; Farmington/Farmington Hills, 679 to 910; Redford Township, 525 to 737; Canton Township, 467 to 673; Dearborn Heights, 371 to 547; Southfield, 555 to 726; Commerce/Wixom, 357 to 482; Westland, 573 to 683; Dearborn, 652 to 757; West Bloomfield Township/Orchard Lake, 489 to 593; and Birmingham, 156 to 256.

Metro MLS covers a 3,000 square mile territory, primarily in Western Wayne and Oakland Counties and including sections of Northwest Detroit where sales are up 72 units this year.

So you think it's "easy" being a newspaper photographer?

Well, I'm not so sure about easy, but it certainly is enjoyable.

Spending my days wandering about town, meeting old friends and making new ones certainly can't be all bad, right? Well, I would tend to agree with you if that was how I spent all my time.

Although I may bump into you more than once on a given day, I spend just as much time bumping into the four walls

of the newspaper darkroom. In addition to shooting pictures, I also do all the film developing and printing of the pictures that appear each week in The Northville Record and The Novi News (when I'm not in Switzerland on special assignment).

I also work many holidays and evenings when there is something happening in town that we think our readers should see.

No, there are not many 9 to 5 work

weeks in my schedule.

One of the questions I'm most frequently asked is: "How did you take that picture?"

With this week's celebration of National Newspaper Week (September 15-21), we offer the following explanation to provide our readers with some insight into the world of photojournalism.

Gearns Story July 25, 1984

This was the lead photo on a picture page titled "Family Ties: Facing death together."

As Bill's battle neared its end, it became increasingly difficult not to interfere in the family's last moments together.

In taking this photo, I was trying to go unnoticed in the corner of a downstairs room while Bill and Joanne shared a quiet moment.

Though I would have preferred to use a wide angle lens in this situation, I used a telephoto so as not to disturb this touching scene between husband and wife.



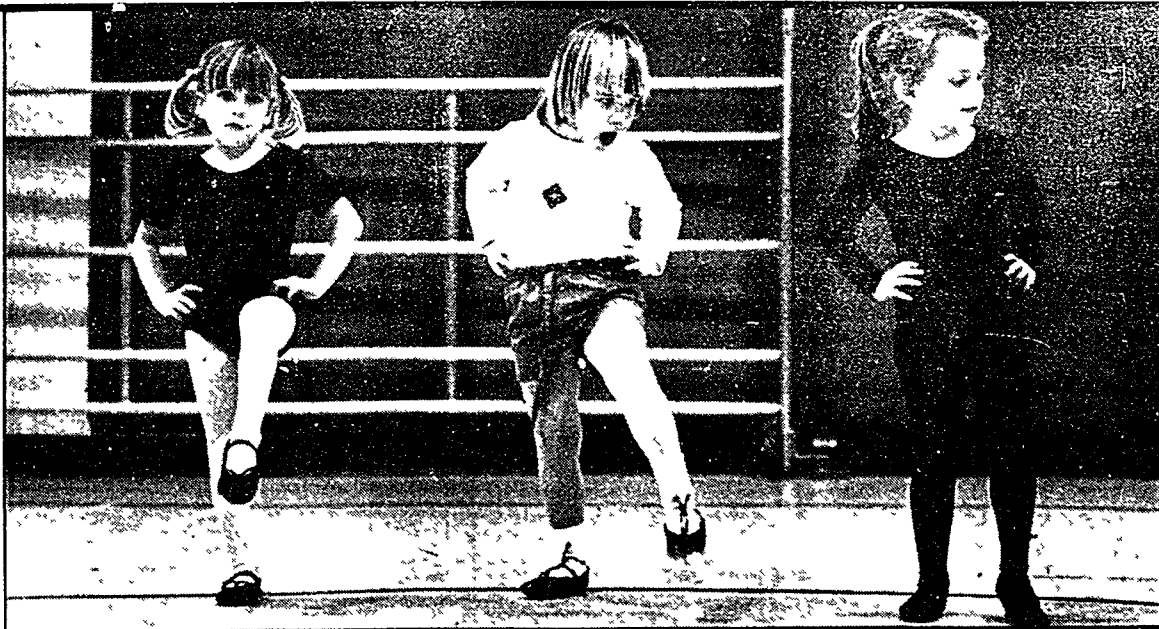
Tiny Dancers March 3, 1982

There always is one in the crowd. I often go on assignment and know right away that there is a picture waiting for me. It's just a matter of holding out for the right moment — the decisive moment.

Mistakes add up: Lions win, 21-17

If you weren't there, it might be hard to compute how South Lyon's 21-17 win over Northville last Friday could qualify as a defensive war.

All it takes is a little math. Start with subtraction. Take away two Northville mistakes that gave the Lions possession of the ball inside the Mustang 20-yard line.

Now multiply each of those mistakes by six points.

Now divide Northville tailback Jim Ceratanni's 29 yards rushing by his 17 carries.

Now add five Northville turnovers and one more name to the Mustangs' injury list.

What do you get?

One (1) loss. One Friday-the-13th-jinxed-go-home-and-grumble-about-it loss.

"It was an even, aggressive game; I thought our defense played well enough to win," said Northville Coach Dennis Colligan. "We just failed to move the ball and make the big play when we needed to."

Credit South Lyon's tough defense for that. But also credit the injury epidemic circulating through the Mustang tailback ranks.

Last week, word came out that Gary Harper will be lost for the season with a broken ankle he picked up in the season opener. On the fourth play of last Friday's game, Harper's substitute, John Bugar, joined him in sick bay. Bugar sustained a shoulder separation. Bugar will be out of the lineup for at least a month.

Ceratanni did a good job filling in for Bugar Friday night. He scored both Northville's touchdowns and almost set up another when his 39-yard carry to the Lion seven was called back on a penalty.

But the Lions pounded him so hard, it's a wonder he didn't join Harper and Bugar on the sideline.

"Our offensive line has to execute better than it did," Colligan said. "And our passing game wasn't what it should

have been, considering we're supposed to be going away from a power-type game."

Indeed, Mustang quarterback Hutch Kerns was only 6-for-20 passing with just 77 yards to show for it. About the only consistent offense Northville could muster came from fullback Phil Pendleton, who had 56 yards on seven carries.

Northville put together two good drives all night, one to open the first half and one, to open the second. Ceratanni's three-yard TD plunge capped a solid 14-play, 66-yard march midway through the first quarter. Things looked auspicious when Paul Newitt bobbled the extra-point snap, then improvised a sweep left into the end zone for a two-point conversion.

The Lions answered with their own scoring drive and passed for a two-point conversion. Then they pounced on the Mustangs' first big error: a fumble South Lyon recovered on the Northville five-yard line.

Dave Iafolla ran it in from the one two plays later for a 14-8 South Lyon lead at the half (a two-point conversion attempt failed).

The Mustangs took a 15-14 lead early in the third quarter with a seven-play 62-yard march capped by Ceratanni's five-yard TD run and Jack Sylvestre's extra point. "I felt O.K. at that point," said Colligan. "I felt we were moving the ball and pretty much in control."

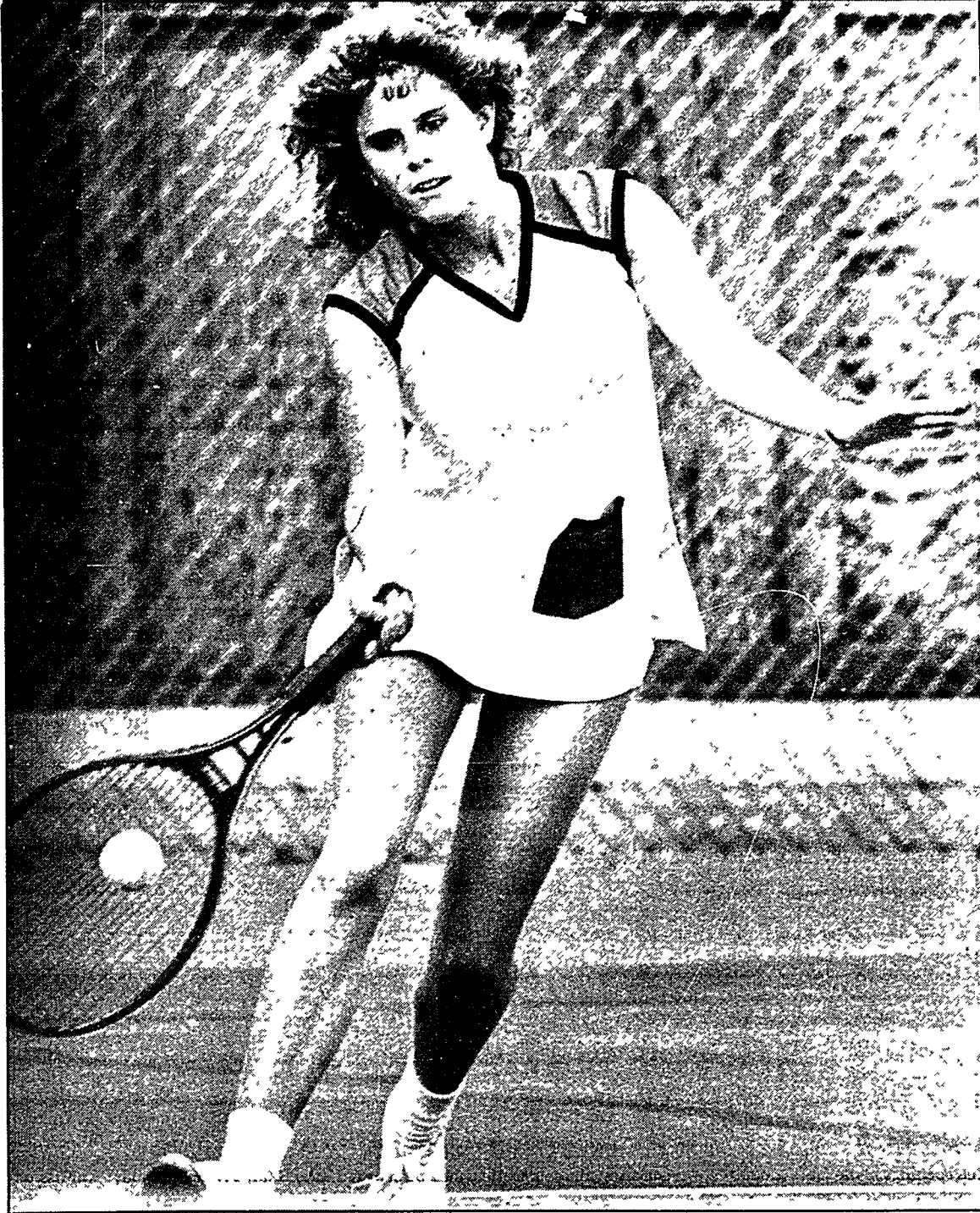
He felt O.K. too soon. After a Lion interception at midfield, the Mustangs played almost the entire second half in their own half of the field.

Eventually the dam broke.

On Northville's fourth punt of the second half came the second big error: a fumble that gave South Lyon the ball on the Mustang 19. Five plays later, Iafolla went in from the two-yard line with the game-winning TD.

Northville made it interesting in the final 15 seconds after a Lion squib kick that backfired and gave the Mustangs the ball on the South Lyon 40. But two desperation heaves by Kerns ended in

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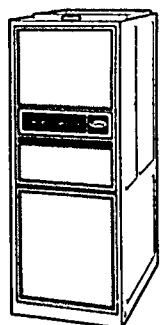
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Mustang cagers fall in final 30 seconds

Goal drought? What goal drought?

The Mustangs rained goals on conference soccer foes Livonia Franklin and Farmington last week for their first two victories of the season.

Northville topped Franklin 4-1 on Tuesday and blanked the Falcons 4-0 on Thursday to stay alive in the race for the Western Division crown. But more importantly, the Mustangs finally found a way to put the ball in their opponents' goal more frequently.

"I'm particularly happy we got four goals from four different players," said Coach Yezback. "I think that reflects we've got some balance on the front line."

In similar fashion, four Northville players each scored a goal in the win over Farmington. Nick Morris goal, assisted by Steve Yezback in the game's opening minutes, stood as the game's only

score until midway through the second half when Morris returned the favor, setting up a goal by Yezback.

Ashby made it 3-0 when he charged in from the right wing and vollied a cross from Steve Yezback into the Falcon goal.

Nick Morris capped the scoring on an assist from backup winger Jim Burkowski.

Coach Yezback said the Falcons had him worried — but only for the first half: "We were getting beaten to the ball, but in the second half the defense and (Northville goalie) Todd Stoll just dominated the game. There weren't any dangerous situations at all."

Northville swept firsts in all but three events to dunk Ypsi and start off the '85 season in the win column.

"They're low in numbers right now, but they're coming along," Mustang Coach Bill Dicks said of the Braves. "They've got a lot of beginning swimmers and one excellent diver."
