Brown issues moratorium at state prison

The state's top corrections officer has issued a moratorium on prison transfers to the Western Wayne Correctional Facility in Plymouth Township following a meeting last Friday with local government and law enforcement officials.

Robert Brown, Director of the Michigan Department of Corrections, met with local officials at the medium-security prison last week to discuss the two recent escapes from the facility.

"He was not happy with what he saw," said Representative Gerald Law, R-Plymouth, who arranged the meeting between local and state officials.

Law said Monday that Brown told him he has "no intention of bringing anymore (prisoners) in at this point."

State Senator Robert Geake, R-Northville, told The Record Tuesday that corrections officials have agreed to place a 350-prisoner cap on the population at the medium-security prison until all architectural renovation is complete.

"How long this quasi-moratorium will go on I don't know," Law added, noting that the state corrections director also has addressed several other concerns voiced by local officials at last week's meeting. (A state corrections official was scheduled to meet with Plymouth Township trustees last night to outline changes in security at the prison. The meeting was held after The Record's deadline.)

Among those attending last Friday's meeting were Law; state Senator Robert Geake, R-Northville; Northville Township Supervisor Susan Heintz; Plymouth Township Supervisor Maurice Breen; Plymouth Township trustees; Northville Township Police Chief Ken Hardesty and Plymouth Township Commander Chip Snyder. In addition to Brown, who was mak-

ing his first visit to the nearly 50-year-old site since it has housed state prisoners, local officials also met with Emmett Baylor, superintendent of the Western Wayne Correctional Facility.

The meeting with corrections officials was arranged by Law after WWCF personnel failed to contact either Northville or Plymouth township police when three men escaped from the prison September 24. Five additional prisoners escaped October 1. In both cases, prisoners escaped through underground passageways leading to manhole covers beyond the prison's fence.

Law voiced concern at last Friday's meeting regarding the lack of experienced staff working at WWCF.

"The problem as I understand it is that out of 230 people working here, no more than 15 have experience in another state prison," Law noted during last week's meeting.

"I can't think of any prison in the state where you would put that number of inexperienced people in one prison," he added.

Concerned that many of the prison staff members were former Detroit House of Corrections (DeHoCo) employees, Law asked Brown if additional or more experienced employees could be transferred to the Western Wayne facility.

"In terms of staffing, we have more staff here than at most of the state facilities," Brown responded, noting that an additional 40 employees currently are in training.

Though he noted that "you can't discount the experience the employees gained in the city prison," Brown told Law he would explore the possibility of transferring more experienced personnel to the Plymouth Township facility.

"I might be able to do some switching

Railcars smash autos at Seven Mile

A Florida woman was killed and two persons injured October 3 when two runaway freight cars raced onto the C&O grade crossing at Seven Mile Road and slammed into two passing cars at an estimated 35 miles per hour, pushing one mangled automobile nearly a mile down the tracks.

Calene Yokich, 68, died of head injuries received when the Chessie System boxcars loaded with auto parts smashed into the side of the Oldsmobile Cutlass driven westbound onto the

tracks by her husband, George. Michigan State Police and Chessie System officials are both investigating the accident.

The boxcars had rolled away from a Novi siding near 11 Mile Road at Grand River, passing through several grade crossings without incident, then collided with the Yokich car at Seven Mile before being brought to a halt near Six Mile by a Michigan State trooper who witnessed the collision.

Trooper David Haire was credited

with saving the life of George Yokich, 68, by jumping aboard the runaway cars and applying the brakes before the Cutlass reached the narrow rail bridge over Six Mile (see related story).

Northville Township fire and police officials assisted at the accident scene, employing the Jaws-of-Life tool to extricate the victims from the crumpled automobile.

George Yokich was treated and released from St. Mary Hospital in Livonia. Also injured was Northville resident Olive Kiesgen, 80, whose east-bound Ford Granada was hit by the Olds during the initial impact and sent careening into a nearby telephone pole. She was also treated and released.

Neither the signal flashers nor the crossing bars operated when the runaway cars entered the grade crossing shortly after 2 p.m., since the warning signals are operated remotely from a Chessie control panel in Saginaw. The dispatcher who operates the panel had no way of knowing the cars were rolling

down the track, being dependent on radio dispatches from railroad engines, Chessie officials said.

Chessie officials were still investigating the cause of the accident Monday. Workers who parked the cars in the siding said the brakes were set before they left on a 20-minute break. When they returned, the cars were gone.

Local officials were angered that the warning mechanisms are not operated automatically when trains approach the crossings. Township supervisor Susan J. Heintz said there should be a mechanism to make the crossing "fail-safe" and called the remote-operation "ridiculous."

Chessie officials said automatic operation was eliminated because of complaints that trains stopping on the tracks near enough a crossing to operate the signal often interrupted road traffic unnecessarily. Chessie operates major railyards in both Plymouth and Wixom.

Green chain-link fence installed on three sides of psychiatric hospital

Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital grounds are now fenced-in after years of debate and months of delay.

Township supervisor Susan Heintz said Tuesday that a green-colored, six-foot high, chain-link fence has been completed on three sides of the Seven Mile road mental health facility.

Local officials have long sought the fencing of the hospital grounds in hopes of reducing the number of mental patient "walkaways" leaving the property without authorization.

The state legislature appropriated funds for a three-sided fence in the department of mental health's 1985 fiscal year budget. A contract to con-

struct the fence was issued in late summer with a target completion date of September 30. Heintz said she did not know if the September 30 deadline was met, but that she had toured the grounds Tuesday morning and seen the fence in place. There was no official notification from the department of mental health as of noon Tuesday.

Heintz noted that the three-sided fence, which is to be augmented by a hedge along the Seven Mile Road frontage, is not continuous but interrupted in at least two locations — once where an internal road passes through and again between the main hospital building and the power plant near the southern perimeter of the property.

Heroics part of job for Trooper Haire

Michigan State Police Trooper David Haire was "almost on the tracks" on Seven Mile east of Northville Road heading back to the Northville Post with a police prisoner when two Chessie System freight cars rolled by at a minimum of 35-40 miles an hour last Thursday afternoon.

Haire saw a westbound auto hit broadside, impaling it on the boxcar, and the auto directly in front of him clipped and spun around into a pole.

What happened next has earned the trooper the title of "hero" with his family and many others.

Haire drove south on Northville Road, which parallels the railroad tracks, and was able to see that the car was still attached to the boxcar. He parked at the overpass at Six Mile where he says he knew the car would not be able to make it across the narrow span, handcuffed his prisoner to the bumper of his police car and began running north along the tracks.

"As the boxcar went by with the car on the front, the gentleman in the car was waving, calling, 'Help us!' I grasped the handrail and swung on between the boxcars.

"I've seen a lot of cars and each has a handbrake — I figured the best place to board was between the cars as they were going south. I cranked the hand brake as hard as I could as soon as I boarded."

Trooper Haire's action stopped the boxcars loaded with auto parts about 500 feet north of Six Mile.

"I didn't really give it a lot of thought," Haire says, until a relative called to say he was reading the story on the front page of the San Antonio paper.

His family was aware that he was going to be late for dinner, however, as daughter Wendy, 13, a student at Meads Mill Middle School near the Six Mile overpass, heard about the accident.

When Haire arrived home three hours late Friday night, he was greeted in the front hall with a banner inscribed

"What a Hero" made by Wendy. The family ate dinner at 9:30 p.m. Friday.

The sign still was up Monday at the Haire home on Sheffield off Galway in Novi as the family celebrated son David's third birthday.

"There was absolutely no warning," the trooper remembered Monday, noting that he had been off duty for a four-day weekend, which had been scheduled prior to the accident, and would not have more firsthand information until he reported for duty Tuesday.

He says he understood the train wasn't expected and, therefore, the warning signal and crossing gates weren't activated. Noting that he had heard of runaway cars happening before, Haire said he had never operated a train brake but was familiar with how they work.

He explains he decided to board between the cars as it was impossible to board in front where the car was impaled and, if he waited until the back of the second car, he was concerned that it might not brake.

"It's our (state police) accident investigation," Haire noted Monday, saying it will be necessary to ascertain whether the brake failed or was released. He explained that he understands a brake can be released by the crank wheel or by a pull lever.

"It's possible that kids not knowing what they were doing tried to board by lifting themselves up by the lever, releasing the brake, and then not knowing what to do," the trooper theorizes in discussing what happened.

He mentions that it is fortunate he did not use the rear boxcar's brake as railroad personnel were saying that was the brake that had been set and it may be possible to determine if and how it was released.

"I'm sure they're (Chessie Systems) definitely facing a suit," the trooper said Monday. After the boxcars were stopped, he and others worked through the car window to release the oc-

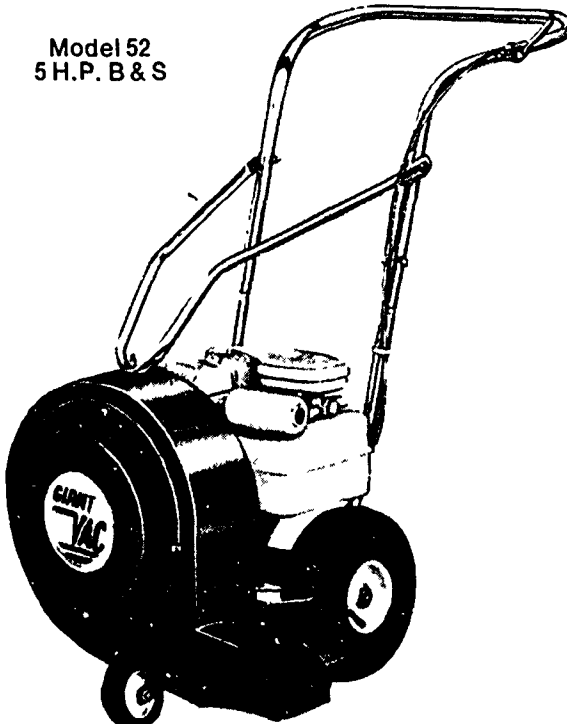

City buys patrol car, DPW vehicle, road salt

Northville city council approved the purchase of a new patrol car to replace the vehicle that was demolished in an

accident at Taft and Eight Mile at its September 23 meeting. DPW bids also were awarded for a 1/2

ton pickup truck, four-wheel drive tractor, a salt spreader and road salt.

Low bid of McDonald Ford Inc. of Northville of \$12,669.11 was approved for the patrol car purchase.

The council unanimously approved the recommendation of D.P.W. superintendent Ted Mapes to accept the low alternate bid of Blackwell Ford for a 1986 pickup truck for \$10,772. He noted that the bid included options above the specifications and is a Value Discount Package offered by Ford Motor Company. Blackwell Ford was the only dealer to offer the alternate.

The low bid of \$11,292 for a 1985 model 750 four-wheel drive John Deere Tractor from Thieser Equipment Company of South Lyon was approved. Both DPW items were in the 1985-86 budget.

The council also accepted Mapes' recommendation to purchase a salt spreader from Midwest Epoke of Dayton, Ohio, at \$6,395.

Ford Motor Company and many cities are using the spreader, Mapes told the council, explaining that it is designed so that salt falls "straight down," giving more control. He said there are guaranteed savings of 50 percent on salt as it uses only half the usual amount. The city had tried the spreader for a month early in the year.

Bid of Morton Salt Division of Morton Thiokol, Chicago, for salt at \$24.22 a ton also was approved.

While it was the only bid received and is \$3.79 a ton over last year's price, Mapes recommended it be approved, saying it was competitive.

Plymouth Center property value is at center of debate

State and Wayne County officials have reached a basic understanding regarding ownership of Plymouth Center for Human Development properties at Five Mile and Sheldon roads, but remain far apart on estimated values of the property.

The legislative joint capital outlay committee recently approved, in outline form, a settlement offer being reviewed by county officials.

While the state has owned and operated Plymouth Center for 28 years, the county claims that title to the property should be returned to Wayne County under terms of a 1957 deed by which the property was conveyed from the county to the state.

Under a "reverter clause" included in the deed, the property is to return to county ownership if the state uses it for any purpose other than mental health treatment for children.

Attempts to reach a negotiated settlement of the ownership question began in early summer, culminating in the state's recent proposal which basically concedes the county's claim to an interest in the property.

The state's offer would:

- Deed all property east of the main building, approximately 69.5 acres, to the county without financial consideration;

- Deed all property west of Sheldon (165.3 acres) to the state for a payment of \$963,300 with the provision that the state must sell the land for private development. Buildings on the western parcel, constructed by the state, are assessed at more than \$3 million. Proceeds from the sale of the parcel would be put into the state general fund;

- Retain state ownership of the A Building (main hospital) on 13 acres at the northeast corner of Sheldon and Five Mile. The state built the structure, and would pay the county an estimated \$79,000 for the value of the land it sits on.

According to William Dietrich of the Wayne County Corporation Counsel, who is handling negotiations for the county, the latter two provisions are the ones most likely to cause disagreement between state and county.

County assessors are currently performing their own evaluation of the property values involved, he said, and may determine that the state offer understates the market value of the land involved and overstates the value of the buildings.

"The state is basically in agreement that we are entitled to that land and the value of that land," Dietrich said. "We're not exactly in agreement that the land is worth a nickel while the land with the buildings on it is worth \$2, however."

Noting that Northville Township Supervisor Susan Heintz has received expressions of interest from several potential purchasers for the property, Dietrich said it is likely that any developer would demolish the state buildings rather than make use of them.

"If the state were to sell (the parcel west of Sheldon) for, say \$3 million, and the purchaser just went in and destroyed the buildings, we would be pretty stupid to accept \$960,000 as the value of the land," Dietrich said. "You could make a case that someone might pay more than \$3 million for the land alone if the buildings weren't in his way."

Similarly, Dietrich suggested that the value of the portion the state intends to keep — 13 acres plus the main hospital building — is difficult to separate into land and building components.

"It's an open question whether that parcel would be more valuable with the high-rise building on it or whether a developer might not be more interested in simply having vacant property at the corner," he said. With the state offering less than \$80,000 for 13 acres at a prime intersection, Dietrich suggested considerable difference may arise between state and county assessments of its value.

"We have some agreement on principles," he said. "We don't think we're going to try to hold out for a windfall from the situation, but at the same time we believe we're entitled to a fair shake. If we were to reach basic agreement on what the value of the land is, we could probably reach a settlement agreeable to both parties."

Hines closed for color tour

The Middle Rouge Parkway of Edward Hines Drive will be closed to motorized traffic between Newburgh and Northville roads from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Sunday as the county park system sponsors a "Fall Color Bike Tour."

Wayne County Executive William Lucas, who ordered the closing, is encouraging bicyclists, runners and walkers to take advantage of the traffic-free park, and to enjoy the

beautiful autumn colors of Michigan.

The American Diabetes Association also will be holding a bikeathon, and the county park system will be continuing its "Trail of Quarters-Quarters for Bike Trails" program to raise funds to complete the bike path system in the parkway. 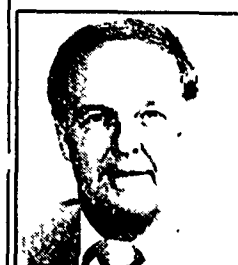

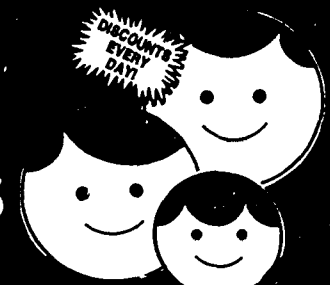

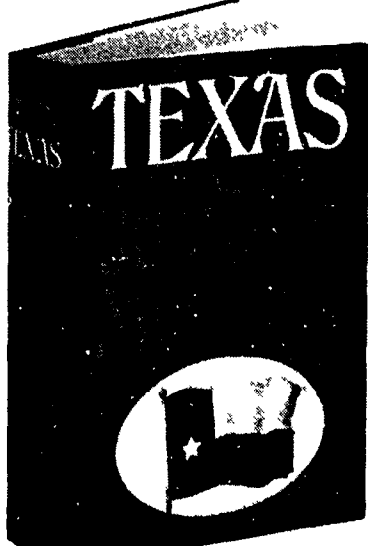

Moratorium issued on prison transfers

with personnel from Phoenix (Correctional Facility across from WWCF)," Brown noted.

"However, I can't make any promises," he said. "We don't have a big reservoir of experienced employees in the system."

Approximately half of the employees currently working on staff at the medium-security prison were "grandfathered" in when the state purchased the former DeHoCo facility from the City of Detroit last June.

While 230 employees seems adequate staffing for a facility currently housing 330 prisoners, local officials noted the two recent escapes seem to indicate either a lack of security or experienced personnel. Though the prison population currently is only at half its total capacity (650), an additional 320 inmates are expected to be housed at the facility once renovation is complete.

Currently being remodeled to qualify for a medium-security prison, WWCF inmates are temporarily being housed in barracks behind the main cellblock area.

Noting that prisoners are free to roam the grounds of the facility in the barracks area, local officials questioned corrections personnel as to why the main cellblock is not being used.

Brown said transfer to the main cellblock area has been stalled by a "severe asbestos problem" and the state fire marshal.

"The fire marshal will not allow us to bring prisoners in until we have another fire exit," Brown said of the main cellblock. "I'm not willing to put people where the fire marshal tells me they can't go."

Corrections officials said it would take anywhere from 45-50 days to comply with the fire marshal's request for an additional exit in the cellblock area.

Superintendent Baylor offered some unsolicited support for transferring prisoners to a more secure building on the grounds when he noted "there has never been an escape from the cellblock area during all my years here."

He added that the "outside area has been a minimum security area for the last 50 years."

Baylor, formerly superintendent of DeHoCo, has worked at the facility since 1977.

According to Law, Brown said Monday that corrections officials will have to "look a little further" at the main cellblock area before putting it into use.

"The building is in worse shape than corrections people ever thought," Law noted.

Pointing out that only seven prisoners escaped last year from secure prisons in Michigan, Law said Western Wayne's eight escapes in a one-week period have given local residents some cause for alarm.

Of utmost concern to local law enforcement agencies is the prison's lack of communication regarding the two recent escapes.

"The one that really concerns me is the one that occurred last week," said Plymouth Township Commander Chip

Snyder. Noting that Plymouth Township Police were notified about the October 1 escape, Snyder said no follow-up information was provided despite frequent phone calls by police to prison personnel.

Snyder noted that two hours after the escape, prison officials stopped answering the phone.

"Four hours later we had no idea where the prisoners were headed," he said.

Though neither Northville nor Plymouth Township police were contacted after the first escape September 24, Michigan State Police were notified of the incident.

The September 24 communication break-down was attributed to an unfamiliarity with proper notification procedures. However, failure to contact local police after the second incident resulted in Friday's meeting.

"I think what needs to be established is a hotline," Snyder said, noting that a command post also needs to be set-up in a designated area.

"I'll take responsibility for calling other departments," Snyder said.

Northville Township Supervisor Susan Heintz pointed to the Phoenix Correctional Facility as an example of a good working relationship between corrections officials and local governments.

"I'll put in a plug for Phoenix," she said. "The superintendent has been very cooperative. Even when they were going through their conversion, they brought the local police chief in to see what they were doing."

Brown directed Baylor to work with local officials and law enforcement agencies in forming a prison liaison board to meet on a regular basis.

The board is likely to include officials from WWCF, Phoenix Correctional Facility and the Scott Regional prison under construction at Five Mile and Beck.

Plymouth Township Supervisor Maurice Breen told Brown "we were promised prisoners would not be moved until the facility was secure."

"Who is responsible," Breen asked.

"Ultimately, I am responsible,"

Brown said. "The buck stops here."

"If I find a weak spot in the system, I'll do what is necessary to plug it up," he said. "If that means standing over a manhole with a firearm — that's what I'll do."

Brown apologized to local officials for the current problems and noted that he will consider their concerns.

"I'm not happy with the escapes," he said. "I don't expect escapes from secure facilities."

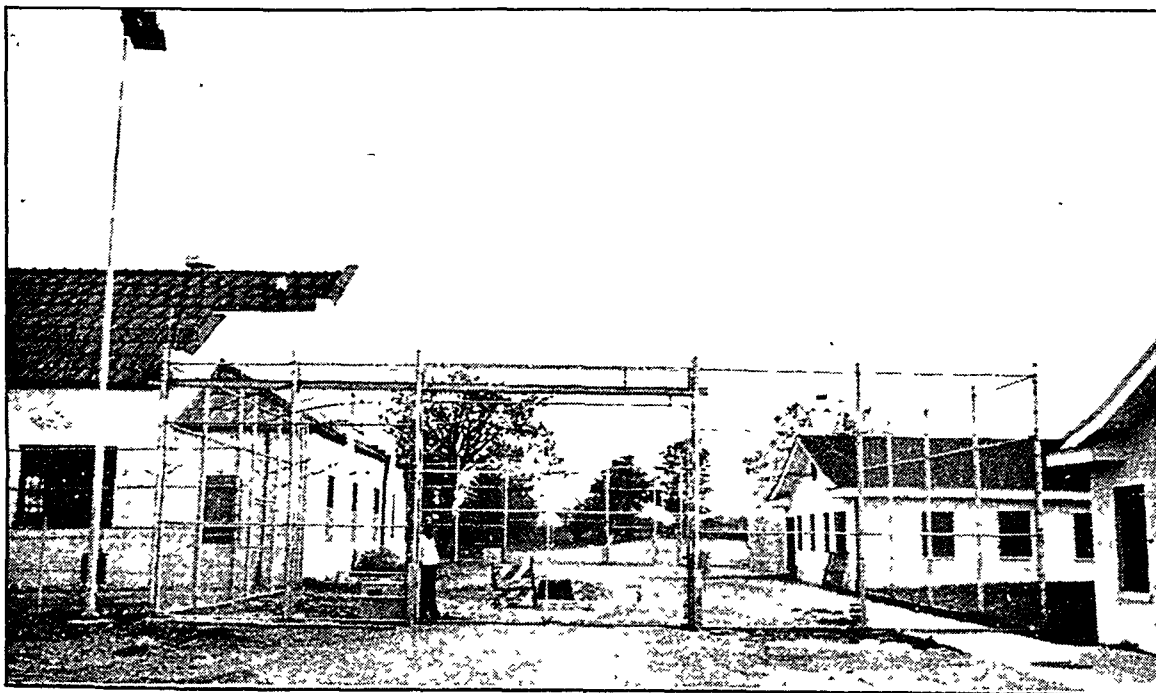
Law noted that in addition to the moratorium, Brown also said Monday that he plans to have the perimeter road around the compound immediately repaired and is working on getting the manhole covers secured.

"He (Brown) did admit that the place is not up to state standards," Law said.

"I think the facility will end up being a white elephant for them," the Plymouth lawmaker noted. "They wanted a few more beds and now they have them. But they have a few more problems to go with it."

TOO MUCH WAX

Individuals who have an overabundance of ear wax (cerumen) usually have one or more of three problems: (1) overly active wax-producing glands, (2) narrow or curved ear canals, or (3) secretion of wax that is harder or softer than normal. In the elderly, the presence of long hairs in the ear canals contributes to impaction — a common cause of hearing loss. And because wax accumulates slowly, diminished hearing may go undetected.

It is tempting to clean the ears with a cotton-tipped applicator or swab. Doing so may push wax deeper into the ear canal and against the drum; permanent damage may result. A better approach is removal at a physician's office with a special instrument.

Wax accumulation can often be prevented, and existing wax removed, with nonprescription products designed for that purpose. Many wax-softening products contain either *glycerin* or *propylene glycol*. Olive oil, also known as *sweet oil*, has also been used. After product use, the ear may be washed with warm water using a soft rubber syringe (not recommended for children under 12 years).

cupants, an elderly couple staying at the Northridge apartments.

Haire says the car had Florida license plates and he understands the couple was visiting relatives in the area. He mentions that two ambulance crews were at the scene almost immediately as "one was sitting at the Plaza mall."

Calene Yokich, 68, was killed in the accident. Her husband George survives. Both were taken to St. Mary Hospital. Olive Kiesgan, whose car was pushed against a pole at Seven Mile, also was treated at St. Mary.

As he raced to the Six Mile overpass, Haire was in communication with the Northville Post and received assistance almost immediately from Sergeant Leonard Goretski. It was Goretski who realized what Haire had done, learning of the trooper's fast action when he asked how the boxcars had been stopped.

Haire first was assigned to the Northville State Police Post in 1978, was transferred to the criminal investigation division in Livonia where he was involved in auto theft investigations before being transferred back to Northville in 1982.

Haire was born and raised in Fowlerville where his parents, Erwin and Doris Haire, still live.

As Haire detailed the events of the accident Monday, he mentioned that railroad personnel on the scene said the boxcars "must have been doing all of 35-40 miles an hour" when stopped. Had they continued through Plymouth, he was told, they would have come through at 60 mph as the tracks lie downhill all the way to the Detroit River.

"Those cars," he tallied, "must have crossed (the road) at Novi, Ten Mile, Nine Mile, old Novi Road before crossing Seven Mile — Seven Mile must have been the fifth crossing."

What happened to the prisoner left handcuffed to the bumper of the police vehicle?

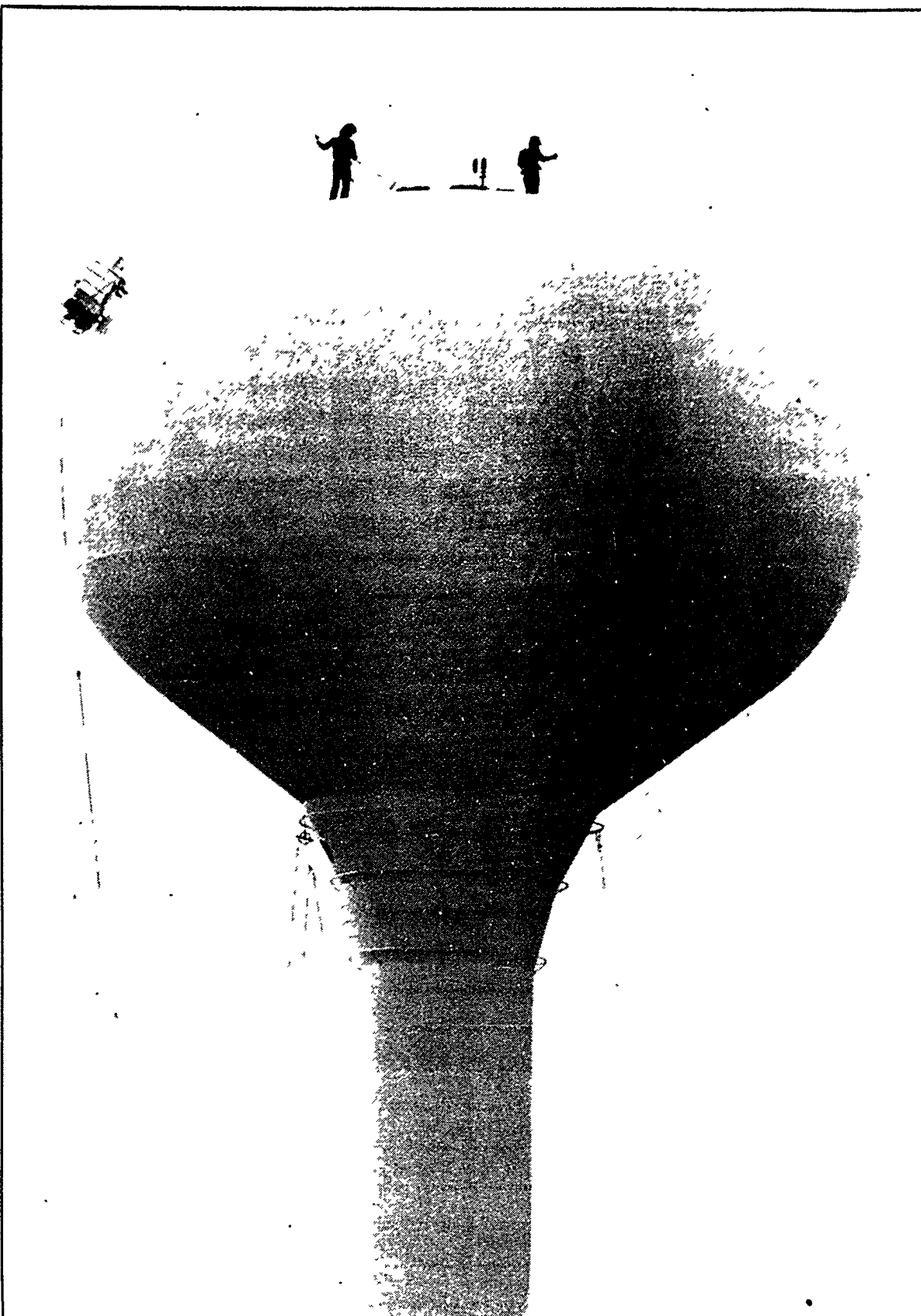
"He was picked up almost immediately," Haire smiles, but he wasn't really noticed, Haire adds. "He was leaning against the car trying to look nonchalant."

Michigan's color tour at its peak

The curtain is going up on Michigan's fall color extravaganza for a six-week run staged for hikers, bikers, boaters, festival goers and, of course, motorists, according to AAA Michigan.

This year's autumn showcase begins in early October in the Upper Peninsula and northern tip of Lower Michigan. Trees should wear brilliant hues of magenta, gold and orange from late September to mid-October south of Mackinaw City to north of a line from Ludington to Standish.

The best time for color viewing should be early and mid-October in the lower peninsula's midsection, south of a line from Ludington to Standish and north of a line from Holland to Port Huron. Fall color should peak in southern Michigan in mid- and late October.

Fall color enthusiasts can choose traditional or off-beat ways to see the state's autumn beauty.

Among the most favored pastimes is touring the state by car. Motorists and hikers may wander through more than 8 million acres of state and national forest land to see vivid fall displays. Sugar maples turn brilliant golds, and red maples are noted for bright red leaves. Aspens are drenched in brilliant yellow, while oaks become light brown to russet, and sumac trees glow nearly iridescent red.

Local parks and several scenic gardens in the state, such as Midland's Dow Gardens and Kalamazoo's Nature Center, also are choice spots for color viewing.

In Southeast Michigan, the Huron-Clinton Metroparks' nature centers schedule special programs relating to fall color. Oakwoods Metropark near Flat Rock hosts an autumn canoe tour from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. October 12-13.

Fall color cruises aboard a paddleboat begin at 10 a.m. October 12 and 13 at Kensington Metropark near Milford.

Upper Peninsula vacationers may see the fall color show while on the Pictured Rocks Cruise departing from Munising at 1 p.m. through October 10.

In northern Lower Michigan, gliding along the AuSable River near Oscoda for a color tour via open or enclosed paddleboat is an option from now through October 20. Sallings on Lake

Charlevoix at Charlevoix are scheduled on the Beaver Islander October 12 and on the Star of Charlevoix daily through October 13.

Those who want a light or heavy aerobic exercise may go biking. Michigan Bicycle Touring of Kingsley sponsors weekly and weekend tours.

Several communities are sponsoring festivals and other special events which offer good opportunities to see fall color.

Rush to use prison was irresponsible

One major concern local leaders brought forward during negotiation of the state purchase of the Detroit House of Correction was that of security — DeHoCo had an abysmal escape record and local officials trusted that we'd be better off with the state running the prison. The conversion to Western Wayne Correctional Facility would be more than a name change, we were told; it would involve massive improvements to both the physical plant and management techniques.

So it is doubly disappointing that the security lapses of recent weeks were allowed to occur. They are evidently the result of a rush to occupy the facility before it is truly ready to house state inmates combined with a lack of state prison experience among the former Detroit employees hired to run the place. That more than 300 inmates were being housed at Western Wayne before anyone thought to brick up the steam tunnel escape route is inexcusable. Those tunnels were a known security risk before the first inmate was delivered to the prison. That it took two escapes to have the route closed speaks poorly of the prison administration.

The state has already shown it can — if it does things right — convert such a facility and secure it. Phoenix Correctional Facility on the north side of Five Mile was once DeHoCo's women's division and now boasts one of the finest security records in the entire system. To the extent that a prison can be considered a good neighbor, Phoenix passes the test. But the conversion of Phoenix took considerably more time than was allowed for similar work at Western Wayne.

While it's possible to pick apart the various mistakes that led to the escapes and to bemoan the poor communication with local agencies, the core of the problem at Western Wayne is that the state

tried to move too swiftly to add beds to the corrections system. Having failed to address the prison space problem when it became evident years ago, our elected leaders gave us the early-release law instead. When that became a political hot potato, we were given the specious promise that converting facilities like DeHoCo would provide an immediate solution while we tried to play catch-up with new prison construction.

With the governor on record refusing any additional early releases despite severe crowding in the system, the timetable for occupying Western Wayne Correctional became dependent on politics rather than rational corrections procedures. Various delays, political and otherwise, made the need more critical. Within hours of finishing the installation of the perimeter fencing, inmates were moved into Western Wayne. Then, instead of gradually stepping up the population while having inmates work on renovations, the state started pumping in newcomers at a rate of better than 40 per day and giving them little better to do than figure out how to cause trouble.

Given hindsight, it seems the result should have been predictable. Prison space created in haste is really little better than no prison space at all. Given the need to ensure that our prisons are not only secure, but also humane, it seems likely that one more early release order is needed to gain the time necessary to expand the system properly. One might just as well release prisoners in some orderly fashion as to create conditions that allow wholesale escapes or, worse, set the stage for riots. A prisoner who is released may feel lucky, while one who escapes can be nothing but desperate. Which one would you rather meet on the street?

The kid actually giggled when the ride down into Orlando rivalled any roller coaster in the world. Then he screamed his fool head off when we took the elevator down one floor at the airport — go figure.

Orlando was not our destination. The kids are too young for Disney World and I'm too cheap to drop a \$50 bill to get into something they will neither appreciate nor remember. Instead, we got a rent-a-car and drove two hours to St. Augustine (charter airfare to Orlando plus car rental was cheaper than airfare-only to nearby Jacksonville — thank you airline deregulation) to visit my wife's brother and his family, including boys aged four and not-quite-seven. Another day we drove more than two hours to Silver Springs (glass-bottom boats, beautiful park, kids enjoyed it). The last half-hour of the ride, the baby cried. The last half hour is through a national forest — no shoulders, no place to pull the car over and change a diaper or feed a hungry baby. We all ate together at McDonald's before visiting the main attraction. French fries devoured, a hamburger mangled but not consumed, and we got this conversation:

"Daddy, let's go back to Uncle Tom's house."

"NO! I didn't drive two hours in 92-degree heat to eat at McDonald's!"

"Why not?"

"Shut up and enjoy yourself."

Which is what I eventually did myself. The trick to a family vacation is in expectation. Expect a vacation and you're dealing with an oxymoron. Expect to be family, though, and you find yourself on vacation. At the price, you can't complain.

Readers Speak

Candidate clarifies reasoning behind his statement

To the Editor:
I would like to use a few lines of "letter" space to clear up a possible misunderstanding regarding my candidacy for Northville City Council.
I am not running simply because I feel there are not enough other candidates running. When I contacted The Record shortly before the printing deadline recently it was with the intent of informing that I had not yet made up my mind fully whether to run or not.

I wanted any possible candidate who had not picked up a petition, thinking there were already enough candidates, to know that the field was still open and to have time to obtain the necessary signatures prior to the filing deadline.
I am running because I feel the position is within my capabilities and the welfare of the City of Northville is of interest to me. In addition to many previous years as an area resident (since 1953) I have been in business here for the past 12 years and I now own commercial and residential properties within the city. I pay business and property taxes here and I'm in the same boat as virtually every other business owner or resident in the city.

We share mutual concerns over many issues, including a limited tax base and an apparently ever-increasing cost of local government and services. I happen to believe that our proudly high levels of services (including governmental) can be maintained in the face of rising costs with an enthusiastic ongoing program of judicious "watching of the pennies." This is vital if the "pound" load is not to become too great for our tax pockets. While there is, of course, no quick answer to this problem, and while no existing council member or candidate can be expected to provide an ironclad perfect solution by themselves, I believe that the fire to find those answers has been banked a bit on the existing council and could use a bit of fanning back to a roaring blaze. In cooperation with the other council members I believe this can be done.

There are of course a thousand details to running a city which fall within the precepts of a council person. Some of my additional interests would include working for the establishment of a humane society (in conjunction with the township, utilizing state and private funding — no additional tax millages), an equitable solution to the parking space losses sustained downtown under the Mainstreet 78" project (Downtown is definitely prettier, but major access problems remain for shoppers) and I would seek the relocation of the clock from the middle of Main Street — most likely to the immediately adjacent "Victorian" park.

I would also ask that no council member be allowed to sit as a voting member on any other city commission or board. Serving as a liaison member is appropriate, but it makes no sense for a petitioner to debate a point before council, have the question referred to a

board or commission and find the same members sitting on that board.
Any candidate for council must face the reality of many hours of public meetings well into the night and many more hours of preparation for those meetings. There is a great amount of responsibility involved here. The winning candidates must serve all of the residents, who trust that the job will be done actively and with good intention. They deserve more than they ask.

An important caveat: Certain terms, while apparently logically appropriate to either of these categories, are to be avoided. Among the frowned-upon nature terms are: swamp, cliff, quicksand, bog, quagmire, volcano, crater, crag, flatland, coulee, depression, trough, wormwood, pasture, plot, weed, turf, pool, gully, drain, dune, grade, incline, upgrade, downgrade, descent, slope, precipice, shrub, bush, sprout, dandelion or kudzu.

Possibly the worst thing that can be done is to combine the two and arrive at subdivision titles like Yankee Doodle Weed, Puritan Volcano, or Harlem Dune.

So remember: next time you're shopping for a property investment, remember Shakespeare's query, "What's in a name? A rose by any other name would smell as sweet," or something like that. Then remember that Shakespeare will never be remembered for his real estate investment acumen. Enough said.

Don't buy into Fort Bog

YOU can RAISE your property value and NOT SPEND ONE DOLLAR.

I'll say it again, Mr. and Mrs. Homeowner. Without so much as buying insulation, building a deck, putting in a skylight or installing a fireplace, you indeed can RAISE your property value this minute.

You say to me, how can I do this thing? Two words. Two words that can make the difference between slum and snob hill.

Subdivision names.

For the smart real estate investor, choosing the right subdivision name is more important than choosing the right roofing material. When considering what to name one's neighborhood, the property owner is faced with numerous choices, which should be mulled over carefully before deciding.

In the highly successful Novi-Northville area, there basically are two motifs: the idyllic pastoral and the neo-colonial.

The identifying characteristics of the idyllic pastoral or I.P. style are terms from nature. The following examples are appropriate: glen, pike, cove, fields, heather, cedar, pine, grove, cypress, willow, sierra, chestnut, pond, lake, loch, walnut, forest, beech, birch, poplar,

meadow, shire, vineyard, field, woods, garden, concourse, ford, brook, hills, dales, bluff, woodland, knoll, highland, ridge, valley, vale, dell, crest, and so forth.

A stumbling block for many property owners is the widespread misunderstanding that these natural terms have to describe the property in some way. It cannot be stressed strongly enough that this is not so. You want to be a ridge, be a ridge.

The identifying characteristics of the neo-colonial style of subdivision name are proper and antiquated nouns available from any comprehensive textbook on late-18th century American history. Examples include: Lexington, Princeton, Carleton, Covington (in fact, any proper name ending in —ton), Concord (or Concordia), Colony, Portsmouth, New Haven, Commons, Saratoga, Yorktown, Yorkshire, Devonshire (in fact, any proper name ending in —shire), Williamsburg, Davisburg, Richmond, Newport, Washington, Jefferson, Lafayette, Franklin, et cetera.

Ideally, the I.P. and the neo-colonial styles are combined to produce an even stronger name: one that suggests an embrace of the natural ideal while suggesting a timeless place in the American chronology: Covington Glen, Saratoga Bluff, Concord Ridge, etc.

Pizza Cutter battles industry giants

Yes, Jim DeLano has heard of Tom Monaghan of Domino's Pizza and Detroit Tiger fame.

And, yes, DeLano has heard of Mike Ilitch, owner of Little Caesar's and the Detroit Red Wings.

But the owner and star pizza-maker at the Pizza Cutter on Center Street in Northville swears that his goals and aspirations do not include following in the illustrious footsteps of the two famous pizza millionaires.

"I don't have any aspirations to be like either one of them," said DeLano. "I'm happy with this one store. I just want to keep growing at this location."

DeLano, 28, has been in the pizza business almost since he started working — when he was a sophomore at Farmington Harrison High School.

His career in the pizza business began when he was hired to work at Papa Romano's, a pizza parlor owned by Ron Hancock in Southfield.

DeLano said he started at the bottom — cleaning up and working in the stock room — and worked his way up to a "pizza-maker."

After graduating from high school, he reports, he thought about going on to college but decided to give the pizza business a whirl instead.

"It (the pizza business) was one of the doors open to me," he said. "I figured I could always go back to college if it didn't work out."

DeLano, a soft-spoken, easy-going individual, continued to work at Papa Romano's until he persuaded Hancock to join him as a partner in opening a pizzeria called the "Northville Station" on Center Street. Hancock and DeLano opened the Northville pizzeria in 1978 and continued to operate it jointly until DeLano purchased Hancock's share of the business in 1982 and renamed it the "Pizza Cutter."

"It was our plan all along that I would eventually take over the business," said DeLano. "Ron (Hancock) stuck around as a partner until I was able to stand on my own two feet."

Like most pizzerias, the Pizza Cutter offers a variety of items on the menu, including chicken, barbecued ribs and 10 different types of submarine sandwiches as well as several varieties of pasta — spaghetti, lasagna, mostaccioli and ravioli.

But the mainstay of the operation — 75 percent, according to DeLano — is pizza.

And it's a tough competitive business, as well. DeLano says there are six or seven competitors in

his primary market area, including Domino's and Little Caesar's. But despite the competition, DeLano said business at the Pizza Cutter is continuing to grow.

"When Domino's opened in Northville last year, we felt it the first two or three weeks," he reported. "But our volume returned to normal and continued to grow fairly quickly after that."

"We have a lot of loyal customers and they continued to come back here for their pizzas."

DeLano's competitive nature is usually well-hidden, but it comes out when he's asked to explain why his small operation has continued to grow despite the competition from the larger companies with their large advertising budgets.

"We didn't make any changes when Domino's came to town," he said. "We just try to make good pizzas."

"The big chains use gimmicks to try to lure new customers. Our gimmick is making good pizzas. We don't have the two-for-one deals that the big chains offer; we just make one good one with the best in-

gredients we can get."

DeLano's pride in the quality of his work is one of the reasons he has no plans to expand his operation with pizzerias in other communities. Several customers, he reports, have talked to him about becoming partners and putting pizzerias in towns like Plymouth or South Lyon.

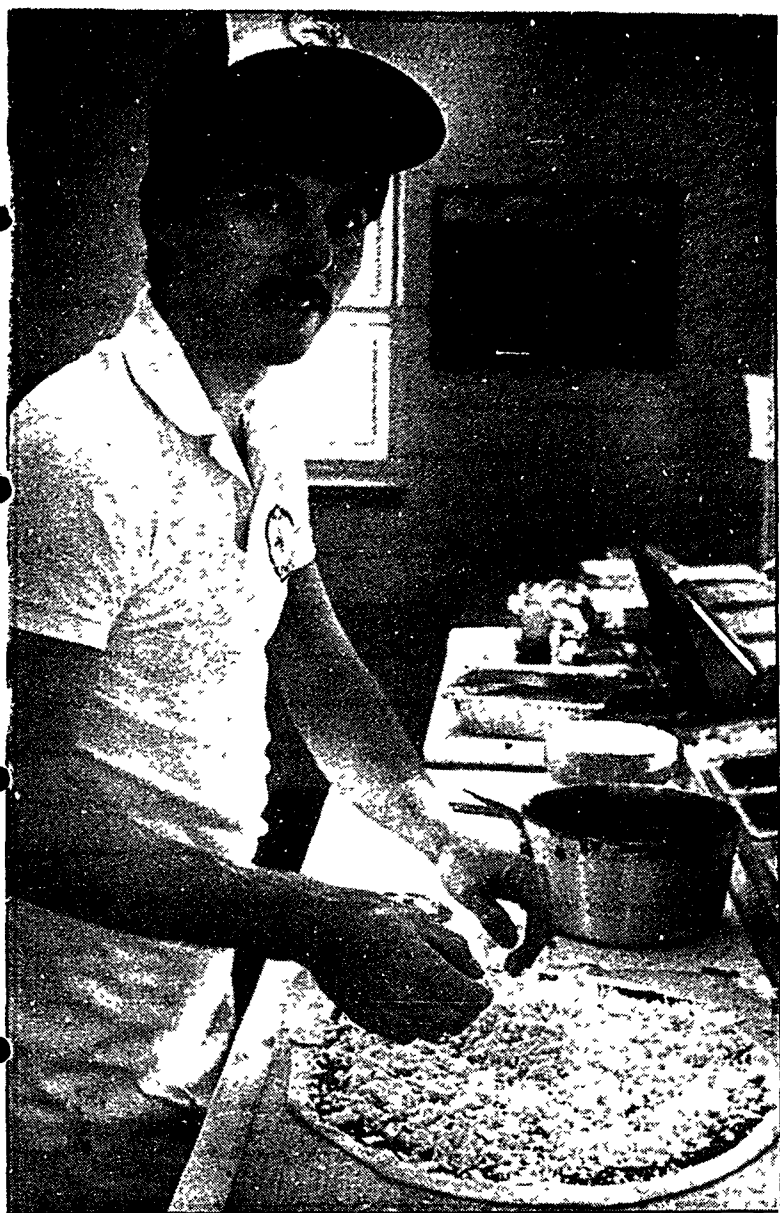
"You don't have the quality control in a chain that you do in a single operation," he notes, explaining why he has not been receptive to business propositions.

Another factor is that he likes living and working in Northville. DeLano and his wife, Liz, have two daughters — a two-year-old and a four-year-old.

"I'm having a great time and Northville is a perfect town," says the "little guy" battling in out with the giants of the pizza industry.

"There are a lot of great people here and it's an honor being part of this business community."

"No, I don't think I'll get rich here. But we're doing all right and it's very enjoyable living and doing business here."

RADIO-LOGY

Turning a critical ear to airwaves

If you're a commuter with distinctive modern musical tastes, you probably get sore fingers twice a day from punching buttons on your car radio dial. For your type, the state of the airwaves in Detroit's northwestern suburbs is likely a bit dreary: commercial radio formats as indistinguishable as they are undistinguished, playlists so short we accept it as normal when we find the same song playing on several stations at the same time.

Why is this? In theory, there never has been a better time for music. Great musical works of the past have been recorded and re-recorded on the most technologically advanced equipment ever. They're available for critical listening on record, laser disc, reel-to-reel, cassette, eight-track — and probably more and better packaging methods are on the way.

Some musicians enthusiastically explore new directions through experimentation; some reaffirm traditional genres or hybridize them in imaginative ways. Music education is stressed in our schools and universities. Through magazines, books, newspaper and television, there's more information on music available than we have time to assimilate.

And still commercial radio is by and large mediocre, its broadcast material a matter of demographic expediency — what the latest market studies indicate will stimulate maximum buyer response.

The inevitable result of music by market is already visible on the horizon: homogenization.

Even music in different formats is tending to sound alike. Right down to use of echo, instrumentation and chord progressions, many of the same production values exist on a new Kenny Rogers "country" song, a new Michael Jackson "urban contemporary" song or a new Foreigner "rock" song.

Is that so bad? Consider what's missing in new recordings in those genres.

The typical new country single is more likely to play electric piano and fuzz guitar than fiddles, banjos and pedal steel guitar. "Rhythm and blues" used to describe black music stations and styles. The new buzzword, "urban contemporary," is designed, like the music it describes, to not alienate white listeners. Not surprisingly, there's now a lot less rhythm and there's a lot less blues. And the best things about rock and roll — its danceability, spontaneity and lack of contrivance — have virtually all been eliminated from Album Oriented Rock radio stations in favor of sound that's still loud, but smoother and less individual.

What's emerging is something many originally thought would be a good idea: "crossover," the exchange of regional and ethnic influences in music to suit and encourage a more open-minded society.

What we failed to anticipate is that instead of using the lessons and techniques of each other's styles to energize and stimulate newer and better musical ideas, musicians and producers often have opted for a less challenging route. They removed the characteristics of certain styles that didn't fit in other formats. Instead of broadening music, crossover simply broadened audiences.

"We Are The World" is a good illustration of what we may expect if popular music ever reaches this ultimate equilibrium.

It was nice — even moving — to hear such different artists sing together. But are the echo-laden layered synthesizers Quincy Jones arranged for "We Are The World" what we want to frame the voices and songs of Ray Charles, Bob Dylan, Willie Nelson or Bruce Springsteen? The idea is scary.

So to strike a little blow for individuality, we're offering a brief tour, guided by yours truly, of some of the area radio stations. Buckle up.

WEMU

Some real creativity goes into the programming of this public-supported jazz and blues-based station. Detroit-area jazz artists are often highlighted in the playlists, and the DJs are informative without being intrusive. There's a homeliness on this station that's likeable. A record they play just might start to skip, but someone will get there to fix it soon enough. These folks buy the max that the record you put on the equipment is more important than the equipment you put the record on — a unique approach, unfortunately.

295.5 WHYT

Leave the dial here and let the party roll. This is Top 40 headquarters, emphasis on dance music. If there's a hit song you want to hear, you need only flip back and forth between these two stations for a few minutes to pick it up. Disc jockeys are laughably hysterical, as are the commercials and giveaways, especially on the Z. While WHYT will occasionally spread out with a long dance mix, single and dedications at night, their formats are virtually interchangeable during the day, which is nice because you can get past both of them in one flick of the dial when you're not in the mood.

WJLB

New R&B. As rigidly black-oriented as its rocking neighbors WRIF and WLLZ are rigidly white, WJLB's format will drive the latest party funk from Prince and his court right into the repetitive dance-focused ground, then follow it up with a sugar-coated ballad by some big-voiced smoothie like Jeffrey Osborne or Whitney Houston. Lots of giveaways with the rules disseminated by Venus Flytrap-types who sound like parodies of the quintessential hip-talking soul-station DJ.

WNIC WCLS

These two stations stake out the mellow part of the dial in much the same way as 295.5 and WHYT set the party groove. We're talking ballads typified by the heirs of Perry Como and Nat King Cole — Billy Joel, Lionel Richie, Fleetwood Mac, Kool & the Gang, for example. Singers you could take your mother to see, but even your Mom might want music with a little more of a beat sometimes. Don't look for too much imagination in the picks — they're songs you've heard before and will hear again and again and again and again....

WRIF WLLZ

That's not static you hear. It's electric guitars cranked up to maximum distortion. Don't look here if you're one of those lightweights who likes to hear a woman or a black singer occasionally. The 'RIF likes it ruff when it comes to music, preferably performed in neo-Led Zeppelin style by white male groups of three to five members. Virtually interchangeable with WLLZ 98.7, except WRIF disc jockeys try to keep the conversation lively, usually by discussing how great the party was last night.

WDET

Many consider this the best Detroit has to offer. It's a strictly jazz format with occasional entertainment information, and leans toward mellow jazz selections — but it's knowledgeable, engaging DJs aren't afraid to go back in the vaults and pull out some little-known favorites. It's also the home of "Prairie Home Companion," the weekly entertainment blockbuster from Lake Wobegon.

WQAS

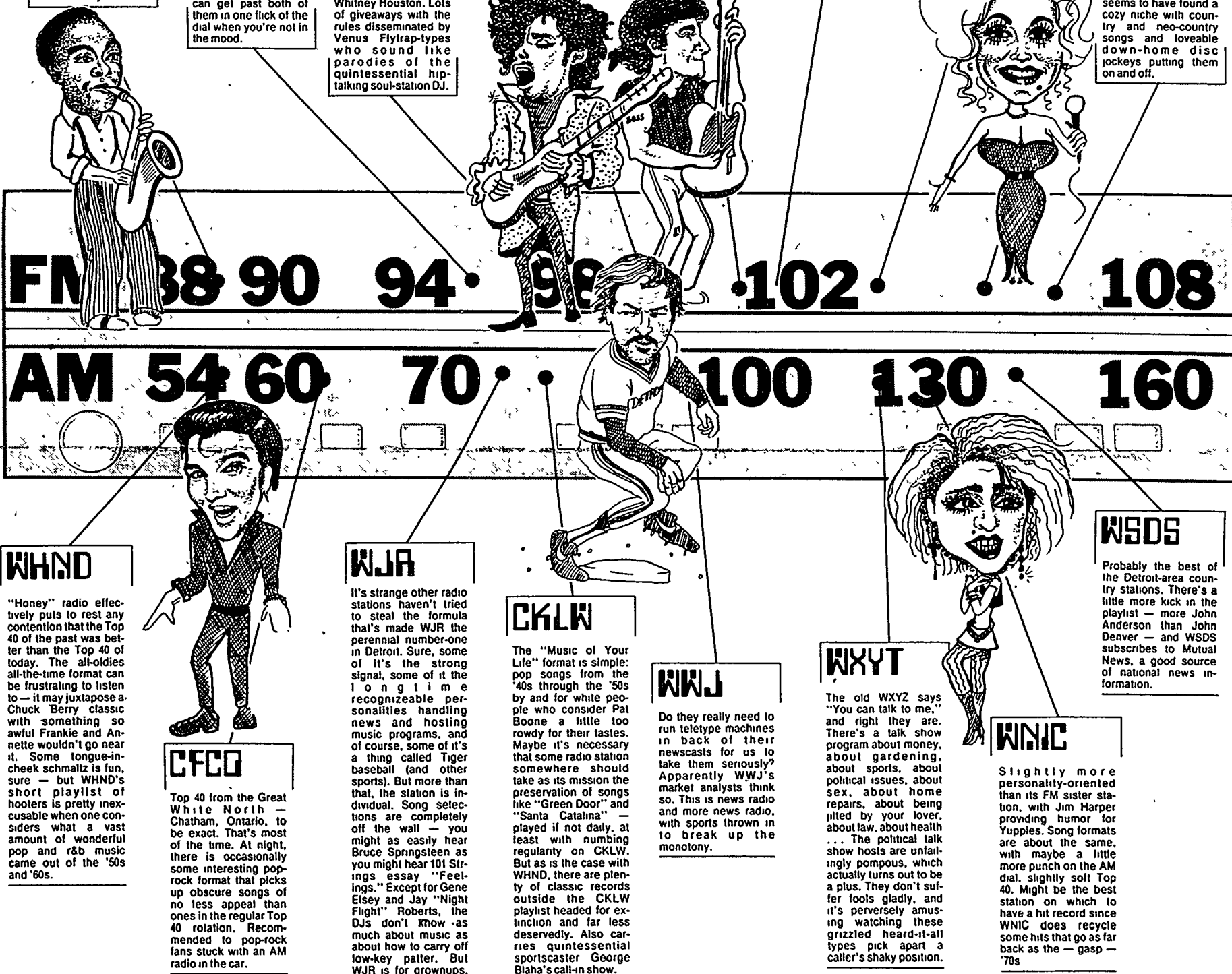
A very good classical station, with community-related news and information, informed on-air personalities and a variety of selections. The classical selections are chosen thoughtfully, and often are tied to classical music events in the Detroit area. If the Detroit Symphony is going to take a crack at some Mahler over the weekend, WQAS might program some Mahler into the format during the week.

WJZZ

Detroit's self-proclaimed jazz station takes on different identities during the day and late at night. During the day, it's jazz's equivalent of Top 40, heavy on sassy fusion, neo-jazz, vocalists and strings. At night, it appeals to the subterranean jazz fanatic made with oh-so-tasteful selections made by DJs a nuke attack couldn't faze. Pre-1950s jazz is virtually nonexistent at any time of day or night. Ellington? Basie? Armstrong? Get out of here, molydoy!

WKKW

A bit more radio personality-contest-giveaway-oriented than WQAS, its fellow country traveler, W4 has undergone at least as many format changes as any other station in town. Now it seems to have found a cozy niche with country and neo-country songs and loveable down-home disc jockeys putting them on and off.



WJND

"Honey" radio effectively puts to rest any contention that the Top 40 of the past was better than the Top 40 of today. The all-oldest all-time format can be frustrating to listen to — it may juxtapose a Chuck Berry classic with something so awful Frankie and Annette wouldn't go near it. Some tongue-in-cheek schmaltz is fun, sure — but WJND's short playlist of hooters is pretty inexcusable when one considers what a vast amount of wonderful pop and R&B music came out of the '50s and '60s.

CFCO

Top 40 from the Great White North — Chatham, Ontario, to be exact. That's most of the time. At night, there is occasionally some interesting pop-rock format that picks up obscure songs of no less appeal than ones in the regular Top 40 rotation. Recommended to pop-rock fans stuck with an AM radio in the car.

WJR

It's strange other radio stations haven't tried to steal the formula that's made WJR the perennial number-one in Detroit. Sure, some of it's the strong signal, some of it the long time recognizable personalities handling news and hosting music programs, and of course, some of it's a thing called Tiger baseball (and other sports). But more than that, the station is individual. Song selections are completely off the wall — you might hear Bruce Springsteen as you might hear 101 Strings. Except for Gene Eisey and Jay "Night Flight" Roberts, the DJs don't know as much about music as about how to carry off low-key patter. But WJR is for grownups, not cool cats.

CKLW

The "Music of Your Life" format is simple: pop songs from the '40s through the '50s by and for white people who consider Pat Boone a little too rowdy or their tastes. Maybe it's necessary that some radio station somewhere should take as its mission the preservation of songs like "Green Door" and "Santa Catalina." But as is the case with WJND, there are plenty of classic records outside the CKLW playlist headed for extinction and far less deservedly. Also carries quintessential sportscaster George Blaha's call-in show.

WNLJ

Do they really need to run teletype machines in back of their newscasts for us to take them seriously? Apparently WNLJ's market analysts think so. This is news radio and more news radio, with sports thrown in to break up the monotony.

WXYT

The old WXYZ says "You can talk to me," and right they are. There's a talk show about gardening, about sports, about political issues, about sex, about home repairs, about being jilted by your lover, about law, about health.... The political talk show hosts are unfailingly pompous, which actually turns out to be a plus. They don't suffer fools gladly, and it's perversely amusing watching these grizzled heard-it-all types pick apart a caller's shaky position.

WNIC

Slightly more personality-oriented than its FM sister station, with Jim Harper providing humor for Yuppies. Song formats are about the same, with maybe a little more punch on the AM dial, slightly soft Top 40. Might be the best station on which to have a hit record since WNIC does recycle some hits that go as far back as the — gasp — '70s.

WJR's Northville bureau

Maybe WJR should open a branch office here. That way, a handful of the radio station's announcers wouldn't have to commute all the way to Detroit.

"Tom Campbell and I purely by coincidence moved here when they opened the subdivision about 15 years ago," says Gene Fogel about his Highland Lakes home.

"Then when Dale Conquest was new in town, he was living in a motel, and we told him how much we liked it here. So he bought a home here, and eventually so did Ted Strasser. Ted lived in Livonia before he retired. He was looking for a place with less maintenance, and asked me what did I think of this area, and of course I really love this community."

For those of you trying to associate the names with your memory banks, Fogel and Campbell are probably WJR radio's best-known news reporters. Fogel is a

morning assignment editor, but his duties can keep him running all day and many nights as well.

Conquest handles sports broadcasts and is "color man" for football games; and Strasser an award-winning radio announcer best known for his program, "Patterns In Music."

Fogel would probably be well-known in Northville even without the notoriety of his job. He's been involved in recreation soccer programs here for years, and he's a frequent visitor to Northville's famous eateries.

"It's ironic; when my daughter first got involved in soccer, her coach had to back out and they asked me if I'd take over as coach," he says. "I'd played other sports before (Fogel was a baseball pitcher on scholarship at Western Michigan University), so I figured I could swing it; I learned a little about the game's techniques. And in the process I found it's probably the best sport invented. I literally fell in love with the game."

Fogel fell in love with broadcasting about 20 years earlier at Western Michigan. "I was taking speech classes there, and really en-

joyed them," he recalls. "I worked at the campus radio station and eventually did a little television too. You had to do a little of everything in Kalamazoo."

It didn't take long for WJR to spot the young talent and Fogel has worked at the station from almost the start of his career.

"I love the job," he says. "I think WJR is the ideal place to be in news broadcasting. They care about news there, and they have a good deal of respect in the Detroit area. When I run into Lee Iacocca or Roger Smith, they'll tell me, 'Oh sure, I listen to you guys all the time.'"

While AM stations are being superseded by FM stations across the U.S., WJR has been one of the most successful in the face of the competitive threat. "Well, it's more than a radio station; it's sort of like family," Fogel says. "People tune us in and they recognize J.P.'s voice, or Jimmy Launce."

"That's what I like about the station," he adds. "It has a reputation as an adult news and information station, and what goes on the air depends a lot on the news of the day. It's like a well-oiled machine."

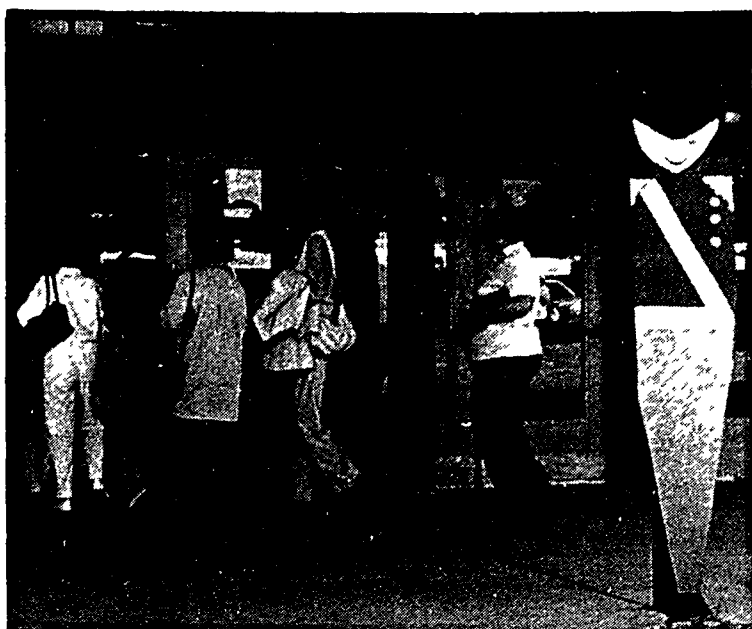

For their third straight game, Northville's varsity cagers showed how well they can dig themselves out of a hole. For the third straight game, they showed how quickly they can dig one.

And for the third straight game, they didn't dig themselves all the way out.

Livonia Franklin used a 16-3 game-opening spurt to hand the Mustangs their third straight conference defeat, 48-41.

"I really couldn't put a finger on it and say this is why we lost," puzzled Northville Coach Ed Kritch. "I just think that when we fall behind early, we burn up a lot of energy trying to catch up."

Indeed, most of Northville's players had a pretty good game—at least after the first quarter. Tricia Ducker, averaging 13.0 points per game this season, popped in a game-high 18 points to match her previous best this year. The junior forward also led Northville with nine rebounds.

Junior center/forward Sue Schrader turned in one of her best games of the season, scoring 11 points and pulling down six rebounds. Michele Siemasz added eight rebounds.

Basketball

The Mustangs hit respectably from the free throw line (17 of 31), a little less so from the floor (29 percent), and got a superior game at point guard by Julie Anger (five assists).

Anger, Jenny Stevens and Anne Griffith all were assigned the job of guarding Franklin's high-scoring point guard, Tracy Leckta. That they did, holding Leckta to 12 points.

So what went wrong? For one thing, Franklin forward Rose Obey surprised Northville with 13 points and center Linda McCaul notched eight. For another, the Mustangs turned the ball over against Franklin's pressure defense at several key moments.

The Patriots' record climbed to 6-2 overall, 6-1 in the WLAA to stay near the top of Western Division standings.

With the loss, Northville fell to 2-4 in the WLAA. The Mustangs now trail 6-0 Plymouth Canton, Franklin and 4-2 Livonia Churchill. The Mustangs are 4-4 overall.

Gridders bash Western, 31-6

Maybe Walled Lake Western was looking past Northville last Friday. Maybe the Warriors had an off night.

But it sure looked as if they just got stomped pure and simple by a better football team, 31-6.

"We were due," said Northville Coach Dennis Colligan, as relieved as he was jubilant.

"Those three straight losses were weighing heavily on our guys," he explained. "We knew we were better than our record showed, and Western just happened to be the team we proved it against."

Prove it they did, by dominating Western as nobody else has this season. The Mustang defense allowed the 3-1 Warriors, unbeaten in league play, just one first down and 88 yards total offense.

Good as the Mustang defense was, it almost wasn't needed. Northville's offense simply wouldn't let the Warriors have the ball. The Mustangs ground out 322 yards, 17 first downs, and reeled off a season-high 62 plays to Western's 24.

Phil Pendelton and Tim Millen combined to rush for 167 yards, while Paul Newitt in his quarterbacking debut completed six of eight passes for 67 yards and one touchdown.

Northville never was forced to punt.

"Our offensive line gets all the credit in the world," said Colligan. "They really did their jobs well." In particular, Jason Lazar, John McRae, Adam Morris, Dave Trumbull, Kyle Boring and Dan Boland earned high marks from Colligan.

Northville grabbed a 14-0 halftime lead on a 39-yard TD run by Pendelton on a pitch from Newitt, and a one-yard dive by Tim Millen, a score set up by Mike Hilfinger's blocked punt and recovery at Western's six yard line.

But it was on Northville's opening drive of the second half that the Mustangs applied the crusher. Capping a time-gobbling 18-play, five-first-down march, Newitt reared back and fired a 24-yard touchdown pass to Hilfinger to make it 21-0.

Western got on the board on its only play from scrimmage in the entire third quarter. After a kickoff return and a penalty gave the Warriors the ball at the Northville 27, Western quarterback Andy Rourke found Chris Haney for a 27-yard touchdown pass.

Jack Sylvestre struck a 29-yard field goal on Northville's next possession and Western faded fast. The Mustang second-team unit added one more score on John Bugar's 25-yard run just after the two-minute warning.

Along with his field goal, Sylvestre converted all four of Northville's point-after tries — no small accomplishment in Friday's windy, wet conditions.

Western didn't run enough plays for Northville's defense to mount some impressive statistics — with the exception of Don Norton. The senior safety picked off three Western passes to give him five interceptions for the season — not far off Norton's '84 pace, when he led area defensive backs with nine pass thefts.

Northville (2-3 overall, 1-2 in the WLAA) will try to get back to a .500 record in Friday night's Homecoming battle against Livonia Franklin. The big, pass-oriented Patriots are tied at 2-1 with Farmington Harrison, Western and Churchill in the WLAA Western Division, with their sole conference loss against Western.

Nuechterlein, Belding boost Mustang harriers

There's a formula for it: WNC-TX. It translates like this: Wendy Nuechterlein's cross-country clockings are directly proportional to temperature. When the mercury drops, so do the senior cross-country runner's times.

Following an early-season illness that slowed her training regimen, Nuechterlein showed her late-season flash for the first time last Thursday, turning in a season-best 19:47 at Farmington Harrison to lead the Mustangs to a 21-34 victory over the Hawks.

Nuechterlein was 30 seconds behind Harrison's sensational lead runner, Jenny Anderson, but her second-place finish led a Mustang 2-3-4-5 sweep.

Following the senior co-captain were

Jennifer Goshorn in 20:16, Sue Blanchard in 20:27, Pam Cavanaugh in 20:40 and in a surprisingly strong seventh-place finish, freshman Nancy Belding in 21:16.

"Nancy ran a very good race," Northville Coach Ann Turnbull said enthusiastically. "She's got the potential to give us a credible fifth spot as she gets herself into shape. That's going to be very important in the weeks ahead."

Carol Olsen clocked a 23:34 to take 12th place overall, and Lynn Bills took 13th in 23:40.

The victory gave Northville a 2-1 Western Division record going into meets against division rival Walled Lake Western this Thursday and Plymouth Canton Thursday, October 17.

Stephens' 41 paces finale

Golf

Northville wrapped up its regular-season golf schedule last Thursday with a solid 212-231 victory over Farmington Harrison.

Ric McCulloch's match-low round of 38 against the Hawks matched his season-best score on the Salem Hills course. Mark Stephens carded a round of 41, Kirk Windisch 42, Keith Dutkiewicz 45, Mark Olsen 46 and John Taschner 47.

Going into this week's Western Lakes conference meet (run after press deadline Monday) and this Friday's Class A Regional at Hilltop, last week's match left Northville with a 7-3 overall record, 5-3 in the Western Lakes Activities Association.

The Mustangs got a good look at the Hilltop course

Friday at the Midwestern Invitational. Playing 18 holes, Northville's foursome of McCulloch, Ron Demeter, Stephens and Mike Oglesby shot a 350 to take 15th of the 23 teams competing.

That was 33 strokes off host Livonia Churchill's winning pace of 317.

McCulloch's 89 led Northville. Demeter carded a 90, Stephens 91 and Oglesby 93 to round out the Mustang foursome.

Men's squad now 4-0 in league

Cross-Country

While the Blue Jays, Royals and Cardinals were clinching their division titles last week, Northville's men's cross-country team came a step closer to clinching its own division championship.

Northville's "magic number" is now two after last Thursday's 16-47 drubbing of Farmington Harrison at the Hawks' short, fast course.

If the Mustang harriers can post two more division wins — one against Walled Lake Western tomorrow and one against Plymouth Canton next week — the division championship is theirs.

"We haven't beaten Western in years," noted Northville Coach Ed Gabrys. "And against Canton, we're maybe underdogs, too, according to how we've matched up in tournaments so far."

"It's going to be close — very close," Gabrys added. "The way I figure it, it'll be within five points in both dual meets."

In Thursday's meet, the Mustang snapped up nine of the first 10 places against the Hawks. Times and pack times again showed continued improvement.

Kevin Haas and Scott Wiley (Gabrys has taken to terming the inseparable junior duo as "Hiley") ran first and second in 15:25 and 15:44 respectively. Ken Booth and John Kissinger finished together in 16:07 for a third-place tie that clinched the victory.

Harrison's Tom Blisson broke up the string with a fifth-place 16:25, but Northville then reeled off

another string. Jeff Hoose took sixth in 16:34, Tim Munsell seventh in 16:43, and Greg Newton eighth in 16:44.

All those times were season bests for the Mustangs, but probably should be taken with a grain of salt, if not a scoopful. Harrison's course is flat and a bit shy of the required five kilometer distance. Matching those times at Cass Benton would be a pretty tall order.

Northville's reserves blanked the Hawks 15-50, led by Kevin Legel in 16:45, Kirk Kabel in 16:50, Matt Hinds in 17:02 and Dave in 17:02, all with season-best times.

Irven Meadows continued to improve following his injury, recording a 17:10. Mike Nuechterlein ran a 17:28, Jeff Cross a 19:09 and Mike Leavitt a 22:41 to round out the reserves.

Following Thursday's meet against Western (expected to begin at 5 p.m. at Cass Benton), the Mustangs will travel to North Farmington for a cross-division WLAA match at 4 p.m. Tuesday before facing Plymouth Canton Thursday, October 17 at Cass Benton.
