Clerks report low primary voter turnout

Area election officials were calling it "a slow day at the polls" yesterday as light turnouts were reported bet-ween 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. Usually, it was noted, however, there is a surge about dinner hour as workers vote on returning home.

Even with three millages on the ballot two police renewals totaling 2.2 mills and a fire station request for .6 mill in Northville Township, clerk Georgina Goss said that her preelec-


tion predicton of a 35 percent turnout voters in two counties, almost evenly was closer to 16 percent at 4 p.m. Twelve percent of the 9,397 registered voters in the township voted absentee ballots.

In the city, clerk Cathy Konrad said there had been a total of 400 voters at the two precincts during the day with no lines. She had received 175 absentee ballots, about the same number, she said, as in the 1982 election. The city has 4,613 registered nout. Heintz who is running for 10th

Clerks in Plymouth also reported low turnouts. Only Livonia whose mayor, Edward McNamara, is a favorite in the race for Wayne County Executive, reported a heavy turnout. Northville Township Supervisor Susan J. Heintz said she was "disappointed" by the apparent low turDistrict Wayne County Commissioner had spent the early part of the day campaigning in key Livonia precincts.

Despite the low turnouts, election officials throughout the area said they expected returns to be late because of having to use paper ballots in many instances, for precinct delegate selections, in addition to machines or punch cards for county-wide and local races.

Police, staff examine death at state hospital

Kimery funeral today

A state police investigation and a separate administrative investigation by Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital staff are continuing into the death of a 25-year-old patient at the hospital, who died July 30, three days after reportedly drinking a half gallon of a highly toxic

cleaning solution. State Police Sgt. Wayne Bullen said Monday the state police were "not anticipating" filing criminal charges, although there was a possibility that the hospital might file disciplinary charges against some hospital staff members. Bullen said no evidence of misconduct had been found.

Dr. Robert Brown, NRPH director, said he anticipated his investigation would be completed "by the middle of next week."

However, concerns still remain over how the patient, Ronald Doll, who reportedly was under one-on-one supervision and under restraints at the time of the incident, managed to

Bullen refused to speculate how Doll obtained the solution, nor would he speculate on the outcome of the state police investigation.

He did say, however, that the state police post was not notified by the psychiatric hospital, but instead was called by St. Mary Hospital in Livonia, where Doll was taken. Brown disputed that information, saying that hospital records show hospital officials did notify the state police as well as poison control in Ann Arbor. "It is policy that the state police be notified in an incident like this," Brown said.

The Northville Public Schools may have a new tenant for its Main Street facility following recent negotiations with the Department of Natural Resources

School Superintendent George Bell said he met with state officials last week to discuss leasing the first two floors of the building.

"Definite plans are there," Bell said, noting that while details of the agreement have not be ironed out the district is looking at a maximum three-year lease on the Main Street site.

"I'm concerned about the potential growth in the area," Bell noted. "I didn't want to ask the (school) board for a commitment much more than three years.

The district has been awaiting word from the DNR about a possible lease agreement since early July when state officials toured the site. With the start of the school year quickly approaching, the superintendent said he contacted the Department of Management and Budget a few weeks ago to "try and bring it to closure.'

The Main Street facility would house the DNR's Southeast Michigan Field Office, currently located in the Howe Building on the former Plymouth Center for Human Development site. With plans calling for the DNR to occupy only the first two floors of the building, the

district's administrative offices will remain on the third floor.

Bell said that following last week's discussion, the two parties are tentatively looking at an October 1 move-in date.

"Our main concern is school district functions," Bell noted, ad-ding that the district will not be able to move its operations out of the first two floors until staff returns from summer vacation later this month.

Though the district moved its maintenance operations to the Cooke facility at the close of the school year in June, several departments still are


Under terms of a proposal outlined to council, Presley noted that the hotel would have 40 guest rooms, two lower-level meeting rooms for 35-50 people, catered space for group luncheons, dinners or special events and retail space for crafts or a bakery.

Presley said the concept for the hotel would mix the intimacy of a European hotel with the convenience of a Bed and Breakfast facility. He said current plans called for the facility to include breakfast service in the \$65 room rate and added "there was a possibility of lunch service. But certainly, we have no plans to serve dinners, except for special events."

In agreeing to promise some sort of tax relief, council members expressed some hesitation as to wording, since tax abatements are no longer being granted.

In addition, Steven Walters, city manager, noted the possibility of problems regarding parking for the facility. Both Presley and Walters had met with neighboring merchants regarding the potential parking pro-





Commision slows Little Caesar's plans

A request for Northville Township Planning Commission approval for new development in Highland Lakes Shopping Center, including a new Little Caesar's carryout restaurant on the site, was turned down July 29.

The action on the Seven Mile shopping center proposal was taken, not because the planning commission did not agree with the project, but because the site plans presented did not match the actual building on the

The denial, however, did not stop the placement of a sign on the shopp-ing center property, alerting passersby that a new Little Caesar's was "coming soon."

It had not been long since the original Little Caesar's was closed. Larry Sheehan, a planning commissioner and owner of Sheehan's restaurant, said he had sold his franchise back to the parent company just one week before Little Caesar's and the shopping center developer came before the planning commission. There was a Little Caesar's located next to Sheehan's until the sale was finalized.

Noting that the request was atypical because it called for an addition to an existing building, Deborah Meyer Bobowski, representing Vilican Leman & Associates, the township's planning consultant, said

her firm had difficulty in making a recommendation to the commission since "the configuration of the Michigan National Bank Building on the blueprints did not match the actual building on the site.'

The problems with the development were further compounded by the existence of a consent judgment, obtained by the shopping center developers against the planning commission in 1979, which planning commissioners questioned whether was still enforceable under the Phase 5 plans for the shopping center.

Phase 5 development calls for a 4,800 square foot structure to be built in front of the current shopping

center. Floor plans indicate the building would have four retail spaces

Noting that he had sold his interest in the Little Caesar's franchise recently, Sheehan said, "I know the developers are anxious to get started." He asked if it would be possible to give a preliminary approval and deal with the questions brought by the planning consultants and the engineering consultants when final site plan approval was sought.

However, Sheehan voted with the rest of the planning commissioners to table the request until the blueprints would agree with the actual on-site facilities.

North Beacon Woods homes fail inspections

While S & S Homes, developers of North Beacon Woods subdivision say they are "proceeding with business as normal," five of the seven residences on which inspections for a permanent certificate of occupancy were requested failed to achieve that level.

The subdivision homeowners, many of whom are occupying their houses under a temporary certificate of occupancy, had twice approached the township board of trustees for help in getting problems they contend they have with the developer

resolved. However, some progress has been made. For one thing, S & S Homes has a full-time crew in the subdivision working just on repairs. For another, the township building

department no longer is issuing temporary occupancy permits. Although Bill Spagnoli, S & S vice president, said he was aware of the complaints against his firm, he said that none of the homes in the subdivision was "unsafe or uninhabitable." He added that of the 160 houses built,

only

"a small percentage of

homeowners seem to be having problems and some of those problems are not the fault of the builder."

Spagnoli said also that each resident signed an agreement with S & S noting that warranty repairs did not have to be completed until the time the warranty expired, usually one vear after occupancy.

"A lot of the problems people are complaining about are cosmetic. Maybe a grading wasn't completed; maybe a door is scratched. But sometimes, the problem occurs when an outside person - maybe a carpet

layer - scratches a wall or a door while doing his work, and we cannot be responsible for that," Spagnoli said.

He added that repair work is ongoing in the subdivision, but the work is being done in the order requests are received by the company.

Noting that the building business is "booming," Spagnoli said his com-pany was "having difficulty" getting tradespeople to work on repairs.

"Everyone is busy now. We are getting the work done as quickly as we can," he said.



Court sets Aug. 29 hearing on prison

A hearing on a lawsuit by the township, seeking to prohibit the **Michigan Department of Corrections** from moving prisoners into Scott Regional Prison prior to the facility being made safe, has been postponed until Aug. 29.

Attorneys for both sides agreed to the postponement Friday prior to a scheduled hearing in front of Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Charles Farmer.

The suit, filed against the Department of Corrections and the individual department commissioners, and the new warden of the facility, John Jabe, sought a temporary and permanent injunction to halt moving prisoners into the facility until such time as the cell block portion of the prison is completed and the entire prison site secured against escape.

The township also contends that the law, signed July 21, was unconstitutional.

Although the prison was not scheduled to open until November, Gov. James Blanchard's signature on a bill allowed the corrections department temporarily to doublebunk prisoners as well as to make use of the still uncompleted facility to ease prison overcrowding.

Gail Light, a spokesperson for the corrections department, said it was her understanding "about 250 prisoners would be housed in the common areas at Scott." She did not give a specific date as to when the prisoners would move onto the site.

tant attorney general, representing the state, the corrections department will not move any prisoners onto the

site until Aug. 29. "One of the reasons we consented to the postponement was that the prison was not yet ready for occupancy." Vittands said. "We are very hopeful that it will be ready by the date of the hearing, and there is a good chance that the concerns of Northville Township will be met by that time.'

Vittands added that he saw much of the problem to be a "lack of communication between the corrections department and the township" and disputed the claim that the law signed by the governor was unconstitutional.

"Our position is that the law is not only constitutional, but it is necessary," Vittands said. He added that the ultimate decision

as to when, if ever, the prisoners would be moved to Scott rests with the office of Dan Bolden, assistant director of the corrections department. However, he said, the decision would not be made in a vacuum.

"John Jabe, the new warden, and the corrections department officials are on top of the situation. I don't think that the guards would stand for being moved onto the site if they did not think the facility was safe," Vittands said.

Demolition scheduled

Parliament Construction Co. of Oak Park is expected to ask for a demolition permit within the next two weeks, the first step toward ac-Itual construction of the Main-Center project in downtown Northville.

Kevin Callahan, president of Equity Advance, developers of the residential-retail center on the corner of Main and Center streets said Tuesday he was "optimistic" the demolition of the bowling alley on the site could be completed by the end of

August and that groundbreaking on the new construction could begin by mid-September.


Callahan said Parliament, which will be doing the actual construction on the building, estimated to cost about \$6.6 million, plans to use precast concrete which will enable workers to continue building on the site through the winter months.

State panel gets guided Western Wayne prison tour

By ANITA CRONE

Despite giving officials at Western Wayne Correctional Facility plenty of advance notice that he would be touring the medium security prison, State Sen. Robert Welborn, R-Kalamazoo, said he found the 50year-old prison to be "one of the poorest facilities" in the state.

"I think the state bought a pig in a poke," Welborn said, referring to the sale of the former Detroit House of Corrections to the state for a prison

Welborn cited problems with sanitation as well as with the actual facility, noting that trays used in the kitchen were cracked and broken and

that, when it rained, the land beneath the security fence washed away possibly allowing prisoners the opportunity to walk away from the prison site.

Welborn said the trays used at the facility were similar to the insulated trays, which cost \$50 each, used to feed prisoners in confinement at the southern Michigan Prison at Jackson. "At Jackson, though, only prisoners unable to come to the dining areas use those trays. At Western Wayne, apparently everyone uses them," Welborn said.

"The problem with the fence is something the prisoners told me about," Welborn noted, adding that

he was informed thus far no prisoner rights advocate," Welborn said, adding, however, he was certainly considering requests by prisoners that "I'm not normally a prisoners' they have something to do.

"Seeing the condition of the prison, I don't find it at all unreasonable that prisoners could be given pails of paint or buckets of water to help clean up the prison," he said.

While the senator said he was in the process of reviewing information gathered during his 21/2 tour of the facility July 30, he was also investigating the "probability of a second, unannounced tour of the site' as soon as his schedule permitted.

Welborn is touring each of Michigan's prisons and noted that with the exception of the facilities in the southeastern portion of the state, his visits are nearly complete.

He said that, while Western Wayne

is overcrowded, the problem with overcrowding is nowhere near the problems in other state facilities.

Accompanying Welborn on the tour was Northville Township Manager Bruno Scacchiti, State Rep. Justine Barns, D-Westland, Plymouth **Township Supervisor Maurice Breen** and a representative from State Rep. Gerald Law's, R-Plymouth, office.

Although Welborn's office had earlier approved the media accompanying him on the tour, when The Record and representatives from WJBK-TV and WXYZ-TV arrived at the prison, the media persons were informed they would not be allowed to accompany the group through the prison.



Local chainsaw sculptor puts life into dead wood

The Chainsaw Man of Michigan has struck again, this time at the Glenhurst Golf Course in Livonia.

Northville resident Kenneth D.-Boshell is the celebrated chainsaw sculptor of southeastern Michigan. A self-proclaimed tree doctor, he works under the title of Dr. Boshell, OB (Obste-Tree-Trix). He can turn an unwanted tree stump into a unique conservation piece.

The latest creation he is currently taking on, at Glenhurst, will feature four golfers, two men and two women

Right now all you can see is the faces of the golfers, and it kind of looks like Mount Rushmore, so I decided to name the statue Mount Glenhurst," said Boshell, He also said the tree he is using is over 100 vears old

Some of his most elaborate works appear at other golf courses in- both the Detroit Free Press and

cluding Meadowbrook Country Club. Once a 15 toot statue, his creation of a squirrel standing on a tree stump was moved and cut down to eight feet. The Farmington Country Club hosts a six-foot squirrel and the Baypoint golf course in White Lake exhibits a three-foot goose.

Boshell's main studio is in Sterling heights, but he also does business at his Northville residence.

"If the order is small, I do it right at my home. The minimun I charge for a sculpture is \$175, and it goes up from there depending on size and detail," said Boshell.

The Chainsaw Man works mainly out of Michigan, but also has private businesses in eight other states. He said most of his orders come from the metropolitan Detroit area.

Boshell has received a lot of publicity from the media, including appearances on the front pages of

Detroit News, on CBS Evening News with Dan Rather, "In the News," 'P.M. Magazine" and "Good Afternoon Detroit.'

Also working with celebrities, Boshell produced a sculpture purchased by the Pensacola Florida Golf Association as a gift to Bob Hope.

His most common order from the

public is an owl. The majority of his business orders come from golf courses.

Attributing most of his publicity to word of mouth, Boshell said, "The majority of my customers are those who have seen my sculptures around town and want to know who did them. They find out and tell their

neighbors."

The former butcher started chain saw sculpting in 1976, and claims he has never made a mistake. He said that he changes what could have been a mistake into a variation that makes the sculpture original. He uses no other tools, just a chain saw. "Indians have been doing this a

long time, it is nothing new, and L thought, if they can do it, I can!" Boshell said.


Boshell said he puts a lot of time into his works to make them as life-like as possible. "I work hard, but the end result is



Domino's Pizza employees robbed outside bank

In the Township

An armed robber escaped with more than \$1,662 Sunday after holding up two employees of the Domino's Pizza in Northville while they were attempting to make a night deposit at the Comerica Bank on Eight Mile west of Haggerty.

The two employees, one male and one female, told police that they drove separately to the bank, and, while the male watched from his vehicle, the female went to the bank to drop the day's receipts in the night depository.

At that time, a male approached the woman, pulled a handgun and told her to drop the deposit bag and her keys and not to look at the suspect, who then fled across the street with his companion.

The victims told police they watched as a cream or white late-model Oldsmobile Cutlass exited from the National Bank of Detroit parking lot. Neither victim could positively identify the two white males, both of whom reportedly wore nylon masks over their faces. One suspect is described as being 5-foot, 2-inches tall and weighing approximately 110 pounds. The other suspect is described as being about 6-feet and weighing between 130-140 pounds.

A \$14,000 1986 two-tone brown Dodge Caravan was reported stolen July 30 from a Jamestown Circle residence. The owner of the vehicle told police that he parked the car in his driveway at 9:15 p.m. July 29 and when he went out the next morning at 7:30, the locked vehicle was missing.





Proposal makes the grade

So what about Proposal 48, the new standard developed to determine academic eligibility for incoming college freshman athletes? Is it fair? Are the entrance tests fair? Are you in favor of it?

Lately, I've been getting questions like this and it's kind of funny. I've known about the proposal since 1982, and nobody asked me about it then. But then again, it wasn't in effect yet and consequently there weren't any hot-shot blue-chippers dropping like flys - failing to make the grade and being shipped off to the land of junior colleges and remedial college courses.


Since that has happened, everybody seems to have an opinion as to why it is wrong or why it is right. Four years ago nobody even knew about it, and hardly anybody had an opinion on its effects. Let's face it, a lot of the gripers have pretty selfish motives. University of Michigan basketball fans were in favor of cleaning up the NCAA's act until it hit home and wiped out a year of eligibility for Coach Bill Frieder's two prized recruits: Terry Mills and Rumeal Robinson.

People who know me know that I'm a moderately humble kinda guy. So, hopefully, you'll excuse me if I brag a bit about having gone "international."

Longtime readers may remember that back in March I wrote a column about a P.R. person in minnesota associated with company that makes Bisquick who wrote me a letter saying she had read my column about the cinnamon roles my mother used to make.

With reports of the latest death of a patient at Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital drawing media attention to the facility, we cannot help but be alarmed at the rumors that are surfacing about the hospital.

For one thing, the Michigan State Police maintain they were not told by NRPH officials about the incident until after the police were notified by Livonia St. Mary Hospital. However, NRPH Director Robert Brown, after checking his records, contends his staff notified the state police as well as poison control in Ann Arbor.

For another, we find it difficult to believe that a patient, reportedly in restraints and under one-on-one supervision, was able to find and drink nearly half a gallon of extremely toxic cleaning solution.

For a third, we have heard that the cleaning solution, described as having the same chemical composition as 'germ warfare'' chemicals, was in an Junlabled container. And the actual container from which the patient drank has not been located.

And perhaps most importantly, the State Police report the incident occurred the last weekend in July yet the public did not learn about it until nearly a week later.

It does not take a genius to discern that there is a major problem with reports of this incident. Nor does it take a great deal of intelligence to realize there are serious discrepancies regarding the reporting of the incident. Perhaps, if this were an isolated incident, there would not be much concern. But this is not a one-time incident. The death of Ronald Doll and the apparent cover-up surrounding the details of his death are symbolic of activities at the hospital.

Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital is supported with taxpayers' money and, as such, deserves taxpaver scrutiny. It is the taxpayer who can demand that staff be trained and accountable to the hospital director and the State Legislature, which funds the institution.

We sympathize with the families of patients who must be institutionalized, but we have no sympathy for an institution which has consistently put itself above the public and apparently feels it is not accountable to anyone. Perhaps, as with other institutions, it is time someone really looks at what is going on inside Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital and takes steps to correct any problems which may be discovered.

Any efforts now will not save Ronald Doll. But they may save the next patient. And the patients to come. If the Legislature will not take control of the situation, it is time to find someone who will.

Our original staff was composed of just five students. After the second edition, we boast of a staff of 50 and have people calling every day asking if they can help," Hutton said.


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



Northville Charley's, together with other participating Chuck Muer restaurants, is boosting the state's yield of good things to eat in a "Michigan Tastefully Done" special menu promotion through Aug. 28.

The celebration is a joint promotion of Muer's with the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Dinner patrons at Northville Charley's at 41122 Seven Mile in Northville Township are being greeted with a display of Michigan produce and Michigan-made wines at a "produce market" set up in the restaurant foyer. While they wait for a table, diners are invited to "sample" one of five Michigan wines in the promotion and may buy the fresh produce on display.

The restaurant reports that Grunwald's fudge is made nearby in Plymouth. Northville Charley's has bought 350 packages already and gives each diner a piece when the bill is presented.

The walleye is pan fried in batter with the black walnut butter sautee on top.

Five Michigan wines are served -Grand Traverse Chardonnay and Grand Traverse Johannisburg Riesling, Fenn Valley Vidal Blanc, St. Julian Village Blush and Tabor Hill Vidal Blanc demi sec. The wines are priced from \$2.25 to \$2.50 a glass and from \$7.95 to \$9.95 a bottle.

The waitors and waitresses wear blue jean aprons inscribed with the Celebrate Michigan logo, red bandanas and straw hats to carry out the Michigan country theme as they greet customers. Landstrom notes that most are from the Northville and Novi areas so customers often are their neighbors.

The Michigan Department of Agriculture has supplied "Yes!Michigan" banners and the posters that decorate the restaurant as the Michigan products are spotlighted.


Muer notes, "We're a product of Michigan, ourselves," adding that he started his 31-restaurant organization at the Hotel Pontchartrain in 1964





State's home sales fifth in nation

Michigan was on the move in more ways than one in 1985, according to the Metro MLS, which reports the state was fifth in the nation in home resales last year.

"Figures from our national association indicate sales of 167,200 existing homes in Michigan last year, in-cluding single-family, condos and co-op apartments," said Joanne R. Bryngelson, president of the multiple listing service.

"The only states topping us were California with 407,200 units, Pennsylvania with 210,800 units, Texas with 203,800 units and New York with 190,700 units."

Bryngelson said figures for surrounding states showed 162,500 resales in Ohio, 140.900 in Illinois, 90,100 in Indiana and 65,500 in Wisconsin.

'We think existing home sales are a good indicator of overall economic activity and this shows Michigan moving up faster than a lot of the more populous states," said Bryngelson.

"The good news is that the trend is continuing. The

report showed Michigan with a 17.1 percent sales growth in the first quarter this year compared to 1985.

"Nationally, the first quarter gain was 10.3 percent. With a 21 percent increase through the first six months, sales by our members are running even higher and we are looking for a strong third quarter which is usually the best of the year.'

Bryngelson credited much of Michigan's increased home sales to new industry attracted here in the past few years.

"Managers and workers coming here from most other states will see prices as a bargain compared to what they are leaving," she said.

"A report from the National Association of Realtors for the first quarter of 1986 showed the median price in the Detroit area at \$54,000. This ranked us as the fourth lowest among 46 metropolitan areas covered in the survey," she said.

Take a nine-mile round trip ride back through time and on board the Coe Railroad. Board the train, 1921 Erie Lackawana coaches pulled by a 1945 Alco electric diesel engine, at the 1887 Walled Lake depot and travel at about 20 miles an hour on the railroad tracks, through wetlands, past scenic ponds to Woodpecker Lake in West Bloomfield, then turn around and come

The whole trip takes about 50 minutes, but spans enroute. Sometimes Larry Coe, her husband, gets into the storytelling act, but more often he's the engineer. At the end of the trip, train riders can browse through the gift shop where nearly everything is trainrelated. A yo-yo and magic show completes the activities.



While the Stratford Festival in Stratford, Ont., is in the midst of its 34th season, many area residents still haven't crossed the border to enjoy its Shakespearian delights.

For those who may have found it difficult to get away for a weekend or more, or who may wonder if this Canadian summer festival (rated as one of the three great English-speaking classic theaters) is for you, consider a day trip. Albeit, it's a full day's outing but a rewarding one. First step is to use the festival's Detroit number (964-

4668) to find out what tickets are available for a Wedneday, Friday, Saturday or Sunday matinee and to reserve with a credit card. Or, if you wish to take a small risk and don't care what play you see, just go. Tickets may be purchased at the Festival box office.

If MacBeth or Hamlet seem heavy fare for a starter, remember that Rodgers and Hart's hit musical based on The Comedy of Errors – The Boys from Syracuse - is among the 10 offerings at the 2300-seat Festival Theatre, the 1100-seat Avon Theatre and the Third Stage this season.

Because there's much to enjoy in the town on the banks of the Avon River, get an early start, at least by 9 a.m., because you must pick up reserved tickets an hour before the 2 p.m. performance. Cross the border at Windsor and follow Highway 401 east to interchange 189, taking highway 126 through London and following the markers.

If you didn't pack a lunch to eat in the grassy parkway by the Avon River, stop at the Leslie Cheese House Ltd. at 423 Erie Street on the way into town and pick up a sandwich, and some excellent cheese. Or a littla h y on Ontario

The Mud Hens, a Toledo baseball francise since 1883 (not including a decade layoff from 1955-65), play their home games at the Lucas County Stadium, which is part of a large sports facility called the Lucas County Recreation Center. The complex includes softball, football and soccer fields, tennis and handball courts, a track and a swimming pool in addition to the baseball stadium. Three years ago, the 10,025 seat stadium was renovated with all new seats installed closer to the field, and a new press box was built along with a luxurious glass-enclosed restaurant call the Diamond Club. Klinger would have been proud.

The complex is located in Maumee, Ohio, a suburb south of Toledo. Traveling south on either I-75 or US 23, Mud Hen fans should exit at Anthony Wayne Trail (Ohio Route 24), follow the signs into Maumee and turn onto Key Street and into the Lucas County complex, which is actually the old county fairgrounds.

Ticket prices are very reasonable: \$4 for box seats, \$3 for reserved and \$2 for general admission. All children and senior citizens receive a dollar off each ticket price — and parking is free.

The Mud Hens are the AAA minor league affiliate for the Minnesota Twins and are currently stumbling through a 44-60 season. But Hamilton reports that since late June, the team's play has picked up.

The German immigrants knew a good thing when they found it and the rest of the state, not to mention U.S. and Canada, are still finding it in Frankenmuth.

Known for years as THE place for chicken, Frankenmuth is just now beginning to strut its other finery.

Municipalities and large department stores have known of and shopped at Bronner's for years. That's where they find their Christmas displays, which include nearly everything religious and secular for the holiday season, more than 30,000 displays.

Santa Claus coming down the chimney can be found nestled among numerous creches and artificial Christmas trees abound. Bronner's also welcomes retail shoppers as well as those "just looking" 361 days a year. Hours are from 9 a.m.-9 p.m. weekdays, 9 a.m.-7 p.m. Satuday and 1-7 p.m. Sundays June 1-Dec. 24; 9 a.m.-5:30 p.m. Mondays-Thursdays and Saturdays, from 9 a.m.-9 p.m. Fridays and 1-7 p.m. Sundays the rest of the year.

If it's hard to get into the Christmas spirit in August, get into the German Lutheran spirit while wandering the cozy general stores that abound on the city's main street. For the little ones, penny candy still exists; for older people, the Carling brewery welcomes visitors, and there is a winery. The real fame of Frankenmuth, however, is its

chicken dinners. It's not fancy food served at either the Bavarian Inn or its across-the-street neighbor, Zehnders, but there is a lot of it and you can't beat the price.

Each of the eateries has a number of dining rooms to accommodate the thousands of people that want the dinners and each dinner comes with a number of side orders, including noodles, mashed potatoes, gravy, relish trays and breads baked on the premises.

Chicken livers are extra and well worth the price. Come with a hearty appetite, since it's the same price whether you eat one plate or 10 plates of food. Unlike most all-you-can-eat restaurants, Zehnders and Bavarian Inn offer all you can eat of the side dishes as well.

To walk off the meal, the town is full of little nooks and crannies, including the covered bridge behind the Bavarian Inn and a number of antique shops, all open late. Another "must see" is the world famous glockenspiel tower, where three melodies are played daily at noon, 6 and 9 p.m. while carved figures move to the music.

Part of the charm of the Coe Railroad is its location in reference to Novi and Northville. You don't have to plan a full day of it - two hours is time enough to travel to the depot and back and participate in the ride, which leaves plenty of time for other activities.

Regularly scheduled trips leave the station at noon, 1:30 and 3 p.m. Saturday and at 1, 2:30 and 4 p.m. on Sundays. During the rest of the week, the Coe Railroad is a fully functional, ICC-approved carrier.


The excursion is designed to span all age ranges, but Coe says young teenagers usually aren't very excited by the trip.

The Coes also are very willing to help with private parties, including birthday celebrations, and there is a special group rate available.

The Coe Railroad trips run on weekends through October and Coe says he is hoping to include a Christmas ride in December.

No matter which car participants enter, they have the opportunity to go back in time. Each of the Erie-Lackawana cars has been refurbished and each is 80 feet long. While the cars aren't air conditioned, the windows do work and the ride on the stuffed seats is comfortable.



if you've really arrived early, enjoy a light meal at the Terrace Restaurant on the terrace of the Festival Theatre. It's only a few blocks from town center.

Take a minute to make a dinner reservation, or call beforehand to ensure not being disappointed. Local residents long have dined at the venerable Queen's Hotel in the heart of town on Ontario Street. Unlike the early days of the festival, there's no shortage of dining places. A personal favorite is the Waterlot, a French country restaurant in an old home located 11 miles east via Highway No. 8 in New Hamburg. Reservations are necessary.

After the play, take a stroll along Ontario Street where shops carry English china, woolen goods and work of Canadian crafts people.

If you exclude a trip down to the corner of Michigan and Trumbull to see the Detroit Tigers, there really aren't any other professional baseball francises close enough for area residents to enjoy America's favorite past time on an exciting day trip - are there?

Actually there is a team. It's a pro team that plays in a real stadium and it takes around an hour and a half to get there from here. The distance is less than 75 miles, ticket prices are very low and the parking is free.

If you haven't already guessed, the team is the Toledo Mud Hens. Yes, Max Klinger's favorite team. "The best place in Toledo to watch a baseball game and down a few bottles of Stroh's Bohemian beer," as Max put it to his buddles at the MASH 4077th. The same team NBC sportscaster Bob Costas bragged about playing for, even though dedicated Mud Hen fans knew that the remark was made in jest — Costas was fibbing.

Make Point Pelee National Park in Learnington, Ont., the focus of a day-long circle tour that can include Jack Miner's bird sanctuary in Kingsville and restored Fort Malden in Amherstburg.

Cross to Canada at Windsor and take Highway 3 to Leamington. You'll be traveling through one of the most fertile farmland areas of Ontario and may want to stop at one of the many roadside stands for fresh pro-duce. Learnington has been dubbed the tomato capital of the world and, in season, you'll be able to smell the Heinz catsup cooking at the factory there.

In Learnington, follow signs to Point Pelee. When you pass the park gate, you will be in the most southern area of the Canadian mainland. Two thirds of the park is marshland that abounds with plant and animal life which visitors can observe firsthand from a mile-long boardwalk.

Each spring and fall thousands of birds invade the park there are more than 332 species on the park list with 90 staying to nest. Walking is the best way to view the park that extends into Lake Erie, but there are trackless trains operating from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. during the summer.

Swimming and sun bathing are popular on the sand beaches with changing houses available. At nearby Kingsville on Lake Erie is the bird sanc-

tuary established by naturalist Jack Miner in 1904. However, the thousands of wild geese, swans and ducks don't arrive until the migration season in late

In Amherstburg, the Navy Yard Restaurant at 252 Dalhousie Street at the river, is a popular restaurant. An 1849 hotel has been restored invitingly. Menu includes rabbit stew and salmon Wellington. Do make a reservation, however. The number is (519)736-6574.

If you've reversed the circle trip and find yourself in Learnington at dinner hour, seek out Thirteen Russell. This restaurant is in a turn-of-the century home and takes its name from the address. Lunch is served Monday through Friday; dinner daily. Make reservations by calling (519)326-8401.







Swallow pursues Olympic dream

For Northville's Jerod Swallow, the big goal always has been the Olympics. It really doesn't matter to him what year or where - a chance to represent his country against the best in the world is all that matters.

Swallow, with his ice dance partner Jodie Balogh of Livonia, competed in last week's National Olympic Festival in Houston, Texas, with the idea of impressing the judges, the members of the Olympic Selection Committee and the U.S. Figure Skating Association. An impressive performance there can be the stepping stone to a berth on the Olympic team in '88, or it can set the ground work for a push in 1992. Either way, Jerod Swallow would be happy

'We're still pushing as hard as we can for '88, but I think they really want us for 1992," Swallow admitted.

At 19, Swallow was the youngest ice dancer at the festival, and a sixthplace finish overall was encouraging to both Swallow and Balogh. When the two competed at the Olympic Festival in Baton Rouge, La., in 1985, they finished ninth.

'I was the youngest, and my partner was about average age, so we are one of the youngest teams coming up," Swallow said. "We were pretty pleased because we moved up from

last year. "We had a new routine that we've been working on, and it went well. A lot of the others just did the same routine from last year.

Swallow and Balogh flew down to Texas July 22, at the U.S. Olympic Committee's expense. They qualified for the festival by virtue of their top 10 finish at the National Championships last year. July 23 they began practicing on the ice of the Summit, which is the home of the Houston Rockets.

All the figure skaters were housed in dorms on the campus of Rice University along with other athletes, and Swallow was impressed with the city and the hospitality.

"Houston is a beautiful town, and the facilities were great," he said. "They treated us very well; they even threw parties for us."

Following the opening ceremonies July 25 in the Astrodome, the ice skating events began the next afternoon at the Summit. For nearly three hours, all the ice dance partners performed their compulsory exercises with the free dance competition on July 27

'We did well," Swallow said. "Being the youngest really boosted our confidence. After two days, it was

Most of the skaters left Houston the following day, but Jerod stayed behind with his parents for a few extra days, then drove home.

"It was really relaxing," he pointed out. "It was like a minivacation. Because I went to the one in Baton Rouge, I pretty much knew what to expect — it was a lot easier this time around."

Members of the U.S. Figure Skating Association were on hand in Houston to begin the selection process for international competition later in the year. According to Swallow, that makes the festival showing even more important.

"It was really important to us," he said. "The World team and Olympic teams usually come out of the skaters they pick for international competition.

Since the skating season doesn't start until late October, Swallow and Balogh will continue practicing, with occasional exhibitions thown in, until the next big competition. Because the season usually ends in February, Swallow said getting ready for such an important summer competition wasn't easy.

Next on the agenda is an exhibition on Aug. 13 at the Detroit Skating Club. But for Swallow and Balogh, the long range agenda also includes a trip to the Olympics - whether it's in 1988 or 1992

post-season tournaments were about to get under way.



For accurate drives **Reid stresses basics**

'Sports Skills'' is a Northville Record weekly series designed to help you improve your game whether your game is golf or tennis, or whatever. Every week, a local expert will give tips on certain skills associated with a specific sport.

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When it comes to golf, Joe Reid believes in the basics - the fundamentals: Reid, the head golf pro at Meadowbrook Country Club in Northville, knows that to become a good golfer the correct fundamentals are a must.

'Everybody plays golf a little differently, including the pros, but the fundamentals should all be the same," Reid pointed out. "I don't care what your particular problem or concern about your game is, the fun-damentals are still the most important. If you never work on the fundamentals, you'll never get any better. You will just end up engraving bad habits.

When you look for direction from Reid on a particular aspect of the game - like driving - he will start out examining your fundamental execution. Your basic grip, your stance, your positioning - these are the things he looks at.

"Distance isn't very important in driving, accuracy is the thing you really want to try to focus on," Reid said. "Hitting the ball straight means that you want the club face to meet the ball squarely.

"That means everything about your swing should be lined up. Your feet should be in a straight line as well as your hips - your shoulders should be lined up with the target and the club face should meet the ball squarely. If you do all these things, you will hit the ball to the target."

But for many golfers, the drive doesn't always go to the target. Often times the ball curves to the right (slice) or to the left (hook).

"If you open the club face, the ball is going to go to the right, and you have sliced it," Reid pointed out. "If you close the club, it's going to hook. There is no secret to correcting the problem, you just have to work hard at hitting the ball squarely. Many times, people hit the ball nice and it feels good, but it's just not straight."

The grip of the club is also very important, but the philosophy on the subject has changed over the years. No longer will you hear that one way to hold the club is the right way.

'I heard Lee Trevino say the other day that there is no right or wrong way to hold the club — just that you hold it firmly and are able to control it," Reid said. "That sums up the current teachings now about grips."

The basic grip which is becoming



short-stubby fingers or younger kids. Jack Nicklaus uses the interlocking grip, where the left index finger is locked around the right pinky, because of his short fingers.

"The key with a grip is that you want both hands to work as one,' Reid said. "If you don't do that, one hand will dominate. That's why a baseball grip isn't effective - you can't control the club head.

"Doug Ford once told me, 'I've seen bad players with good grips, but I've never seen a good player with a bad grip.'''

The distance to stand back from the ball when driving depends on the person's height, length of arms and what is comfortable. There are some general rules, but Reid is quick to point out that it is different for everybody.

"You want to stand a confortable distance away from the ball so that your arms are free from your body and your feet should be spread apart the width of your shoulders," he explained. "For an iron shot, the ball should be about two inches behind your left heel (for a right handed golfer). For a wood shot it can be anywhere from two inches to even with your left toe."

What's the reason for the difference in positioning between irons and woods? According to Reid, it's better to hit the woods on the upswing and the irons more on the downsw-

ing. "There is no part of the swing that is more important than any other,' he said. "If you mess up one one part, it will probably cause you trouble on the drives.

"But as a teacher, you don't want to bombard the student with everything at once. You have to give them one or two things to work on until they can do it without thinking about it. Then you can move onto something else. It's bad teaching if you give them a bunch at one time because it's too much to think about.

What is the most common driving error Reid spots? Is it slicing, or hooking, or not watching the ball, or not a long enough backswing, or a bad follow through? No. 'The most common error - at

least for men - is they try to swing too hard," Reid said. "The harder they swing, the more it will magnify the mistakes they are making - it just makes the whole situation worse.




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
