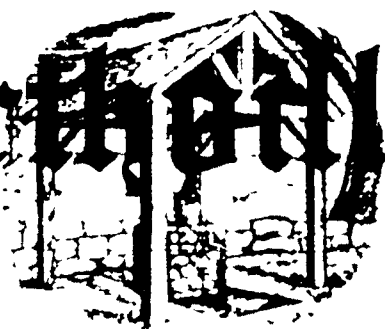

Five of six Beal lots zoned to current use

Both the residents of Bealtown and the owner of the Wagon Wheel Lounge gained some success in a rezoning case before the city council Monday, with five of six lots in question going from industrial to residential use and commercial zoning proposed for the sixth.

In a unanimous vote Monday night, the council upheld a Planning Commission recommendation for five of the lots on the north side of Beal Avenue between Griswold and South Main. Although single-family homes currently stand on the lots, the zoning of the land had been industrial use.

The Planning Commission recommendation also included the sixth lot — the one closest to South Main — for rezoning to residential, but the City Council dropped that lot from the proposal in order to consider commercial zoning.

Wagon Wheel Lounge owner Robert Runk, who also owns the sixth lot, has opposed a rezoning to residential because he hopes to be able to expand his parking lot in the future. Parking is a permitted use in both industrial and commercial districts.

Most of the discussion focused on Runk's lot, with the zoning change for the other five lots meeting only support from residents and council members.

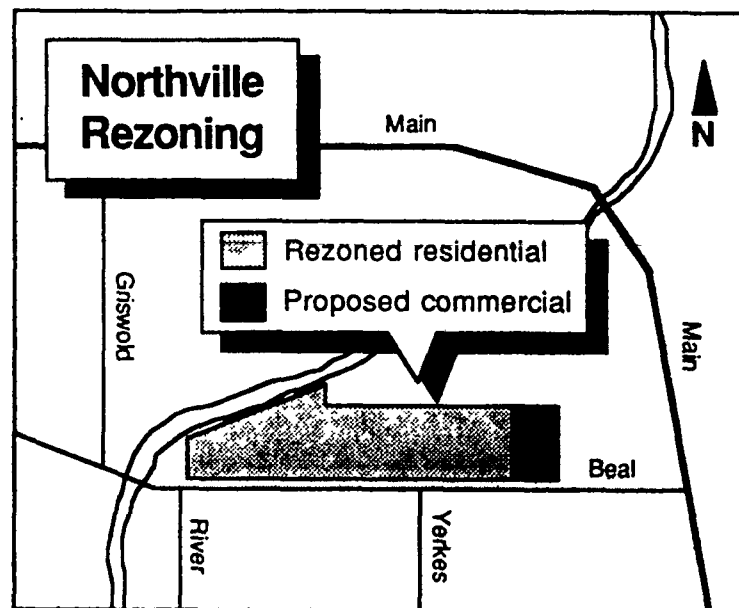
"Originally our idea was that all of the lots involved have single dwelling homes on them and are now occupied by one family. We would like to preserve what little neighborhood we've got left. It's slowly being taken away and we'd like to keep what we've got," area resident Marian Smith said at the council meeting.

Bealtown resident Carol Strauch added that rezoning all six of the lots would allow an alley behind businesses on South Main to function as a "buffer" between residential and commercial areas.

Charles McDonald, Runk's attorney, said that "to zone this back to residential when it has been industrial for some time seems to me regressive rather than progressive." McDonald added that rezoning the land so that Runk could not use it "constitutes, in my opinion, perhaps taking of his property without due process of law."

Several council members said they supported Runk's position.

Parking lot changes to commercial zoning

The site of the parking lot for the Wagon Wheel Lounge — just adjacent to the Bealtown lots rezoned Monday night — was rezoned from industrial to commercial designation.

Parking is a use allowed on both industrial and commercial land, but City Council members said that they felt commercial zoning was a more appropriate zoning to be in place so close to newly-rezoned residential lots on Beal Avenue (see related story). The Wagon Wheel is on South Main north of Beal.

In adopting the new zoning, the City Council followed a recommendation of the Planning Commission in favor of the change. The Planning Commission had initiated the change with the agreement of Wagon Wheel owner Robert Runk.

Some area residents questioned if commercial zoning would be best for the area, saying that if the parking lot was ever replaced with a business it would be an "eyesore" for the area.

Mayor Paul Vernon responded that commercial "is a more restrictive zoning than industrial, in terms of protecting the neighborhood... Industrial is a very undesirable type of zoning in a residential neighborhood."

Council members said that industrial zoning potentially would have allowed a factory to go up on the land, while the new zoning — formally called "general commercial district" — would allow free-standing stores similar to the nearby businesses on South Main.

However, at a Planning Commission meeting last month, Runk said he plans to continue using the land, located immediately north of the lots on Beal, for Wagon Wheel parking.

One resident asked why an industrial zoning was ever put on that land. Vernon said, "There were a lot of reasons... Zoning is not etched in stone. Zoning is very fluid, and it changes as circumstances and needs change."

The City Council approved the change 5-0.

Offices get okay pending sewers

There are two hurdles remaining before Kirco Development Company can begin work on its Northville Corporate Campus, but one of those snags is a big one.

The Northville Township Planning Commission June 30 gave unanimous approval for phase one of the 600,000 square foot office complex on Haggerty Road near Six Mile Road, contingent on sewer availability, and favorable determination from the zoning board of appeals that the company be allowed two signs on its property.

The commission indicated that its willingness to allow the additional sign, but could offer no such promise on the sewer availability.

Developers of the office project had hoped to tie into the Haggerty Road sewer, originally planned to be let out for bids in 1984. However,

design changes and most recently a question of capacity have put the sewer project on hold.

"Certainly the availability of a sewer has a bearing on the project. But we have no doubt the township officials are doing their best to resolve the problem," said Kirco vice president Douglas Winkworth.

Winkworth said he hoped to be able to tie into a sewer while construction of the first phase of the project was under way, even if the entire sewer is not complete.

Initial construction plans call for four one-story buildings and a single, four-story building to make up 273,000 square feet. The entire site would be landscaped with more than 150 trees.

A four foot berm would shield the office center from the road, and fire hydrants would be provided to the site.

Paul Bertin, architect for the pro-

ject, presented earthtone brick as the color scheme for the outside of the buildings and noted in his presentation that the glass would be bronze and clear.

After the approval, Winkworth thanked the commission for the time spent in reviewing the project and praised the consultant's efforts.

"The quality of the review by the consultants was excellent, and I am sure that you will be very pleased with the finished product," Winkworth said.

The entire commission approved the final site plan, but was less than pleased with a traffic impact study presented by Matt Modrack, development director.

"The bottom line of this study says that we can't force anyone to widen Six Mile Road," said commissioner Richard Duwel.

A skateboard contest and exhibition may take place in a downtown parking lot, Northville City Council agreed Monday night.

The Town and Country Cyclery is sponsoring the event, which is scheduled for 1-4 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 16. The council approved a proposal to allow the contest in ci-

ty parking lot number three, on the southwest corner of Dunlap and Hutton streets.

Last year, a similar event was held in the parking lot of Northville High School.

City Manager Steve Walters told the council that the city had received word that a skateboard

contest is included among routine programs of a municipal recreation department, and is therefore covered by the city's insurance.

A memo to the City Council from recreation supervisor Traci Johnson reads in part, "Hosting this kind of event will certainly give our community a positive

image, as opposed to other communities who have placed bans on skateboards even though they are a popular form of recreation for today's youth."

A professional skateboarder is scheduled to be on hand for the event to give a demonstration and judge the competition.

Plagens plan reduced to one story

The retail development planned for the northeast corner of Hutton and Main streets will be one story tall rather than two, the Northville City Council has learned.

The Plagens retail development — subject of a land swap with the city — was originally planned to be two stories. The new one-story plan came before the council Monday night in case the council members objected to

the change

The council took no formal action on the matter, but several spoke in favor of the smaller plan.

In a letter to the city administration, project architect Donald DiCorno explained, "The second floor was omitted because it was determined that the cost of the required elevator, two stairs, and common lobby area is too great to justify the additional floor area of only 6,000

square feet."

City Manager Steven Walters explained that the new version must follow the appropriate site plan consideration with the city's Planning Commission and Historic District Commission, as well as a revised calculation of parking requirements.

DiCorno's letter said that the developers hope to break ground on the project before Sept. 1.

City may require home numerals

Some City of Northville residents may be required to equip their homes with new house identification numbers, if the City Council adopts a proposed revision of the ordinance regulating the numbers.

A proposed new ordinance regulating house numbers came before the City Council Monday for an initial consideration. The council may vote on the ordinance next month.

The ordinance under consideration is a revision of the Northville Township ordinance. If adopted as currently proposed, the city would require that all homes be identified

with numerals visible from the road.

The revision, which is proposed by the city police department, would include a provision that script words would not be enough identification for a building. That is, a building which uses a sign such as "Three Thirty-Three" as its only identification would need to replace that sign or add one in numerals, "333."

City Manager Steven Walters explained to the council that the reasoning behind this provision is that the numerals are easier to read in police and fire emergencies. A script address "is obviously awkward to read and it's harder to read at night; and

that's obviously when the police and fire are making a lot of their calls."

The proposal which came before council Monday included penalties for violations to be levied by a judge, up to a maximum of \$500 and/or 90 days in jail. At the suggestion of council member Carolann Ayers, Walters agreed to include a change to bring violations of the ordinance under the city's own violations bureau, with less severe maximum penalties.

The City Council called a public hearing on the proposed ordinance for its meeting scheduled for Monday, Aug. 3, at 8 p.m.

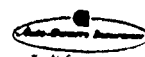

NEWS BRIEFS

DELAYED AGAIN — A planned inspection of Scott Regional Facility by township police officers has once again been delayed at the prison's request.

Although the locks for the close custody cells have arrived at the prison, they have yet to be installed on the individual cells, so, according to Reta Johnson, administrative assistant, Tuesday's planned inspection has been postponed. Johnson said she did not know when a new inspection would be requested.

Under terms of a court order, the township must certify the facility as safe before prisoners can be housed in the close custody portion of Scott, located at Five Mile and Beck.

BARN LAND HEARING — A public hearing on the proposed rezoning of the St. Lawrence Barns land has been scheduled by the Northville City Council for its meeting Aug. 3.

The Selective Group, a Farmington Hills development company, has petitioned to have the land rezoned to a multiple-family residential use, saying that a garden condominium development would be constructed if the rezoning is approved.

The city's Planning Commission has recommended that the rezoning be granted. The final decision rests with the City Council. Council meetings are scheduled to start at 8 p.m.

Officials ready for sewer decision

In spite of a Michigan Water Resources Commission decision to delay consideration of a sewage treatment plant expansion officials supporting the plan remain hopeful that approval is forthcoming.

The Ypsilanti Community Utility Authority YCUA and the Western Townships Utility Authority WTUA have been trying to work out an agreement which would send WTUA's non contracted sewage through YCUA's treatment plant. But first YCUA needs state approval to expand its plant for the increased sewage flows which WTUA would send its way.

Officials of the state Department of Natural Resources DNR met with YCUA and WTUA officials in Lansing last Thursday in preparation for a Water Resources Commission meeting next week at which a final decision is expected on the expansion proposal.

At least some people on the Water Resources Commission want to approve it. I don't know whether it's a majority or not. Plymouth Township supervisor Maury Breen said.

At its June 18 meeting, the WRC did not adopt a staff recommendation to approve expansion of the treatment plant operated by the Ypsilanti Community Utility Authority YCUA. Instead the commission approved a request for more information on the expansion plan.

YCUA executive director Eldor

Ahles said he feels hopeful that the commission will reconsider the proposal. At the work session last week officials discussed issues of what timing and flows we might reasonably expect from WTUA. Ahles said.

The decision against immediate approval of the expansion was attributed in part to worries about what such an expansion would do to the already fragile environment of Belleville Lake and to the health of Willow Creek and the Huron River.

YCUA and WTUA — composed of Northville, Plymouth and Canton

townships — have supported a doubling of the allowable capacity at YCUA's plant so that WTUA could send sewage to that plant.

A lack of Northville sewage capacity is causing delays in several planned projects including a hotel on Haggerty near Six Mile, an office park on Haggerty between Six Mile and Seven Mile, and a residential development off Haggerty south of Six Mile.

We are putting some information together for DNR staff. They supported our program wholeheartedly at this first meeting and will do so again. Ahles added.

He added that even with the increased flows that the phosphorus loading of area waterways can be lessened. "Protection of Belleville Lake is foremost in our minds, too," he said.

I'm kind of hopeful that they'll reconsider. Ahles concluded. People have to live in this area.

Wall still worries subdivision residents

Two heavy rains and a new proposal about landscaping the wall separating the Lakes of Northville subdivision from the Kosik office property on Six Mile west of Bradner have done little to allay the concerns from some of the homeowners in the subdivision.

Marilyn Weber watched as water cascaded through her back yard after a recent storm and again last week.

"I wrote the township and told them this would happen," Weber said. "When they allowed the wall to go up, they also allowed the subdivision to take the excess water from his property. It has nowhere to go except my back yard and it did go in my back yard," she said.

Weber notified the township police department when the rain started accumulating in her yard.

"I wanted them to have a report so

they would know that this is still a problem," she said.

But Weber along with five of her neighbors, is facing another problem or a potential solution, too.

The homeowners whose property abuts the wall had requested that the wall either be torn down and a berm put in or that Joseph Kosik landscape the wall.

Kosik wrote an individual letter to each of the homeowners noting that he and his partners are willing to landscape the wall.

"Such landscaping is for the purpose of decorating and covering the wall, not necessarily covering and blocking my entire project from your view," Kosik wrote.

He also noted, in his letter, that after the landscaping is in, he would not be guaranteeing it in any way.

It will be yours to keep and maintain, etc," he wrote.

However, under township ordinances, landscaping must be kept in a "healthful growing manner," explained development director Matt Modrack.

If the landscaping is on Kosik's property it would seem he would be responsible for keeping it up. If it is on the individual property owner's land, the property owner has the

responsibility," Modrack said.

Kosik said in the letter he would be willing to meet with the individual homeowners to work out details of arranging people to provide the landscaping on the homeowners' side of the wall. He asked that he receive a response from each owner wishing to participate in the program within 10 days.

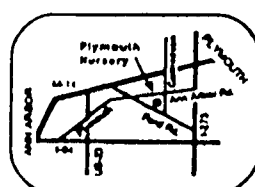

Gas & Go station on Six Mile at Haggerty will close to expand

Gas station wins nod to expand

One of the busiest self-service gas stations in the state will close in September and the station owners aren't complaining a bit.

The Northville Township Planning Commission June 30 gave final site plan approval to Boron Oil Company to expand its Gas & Go station on Six Mile and Haggerty.

My E. Hole, site developer for the oil company, told the commission that the station will be shut down while construction is being com-

pleted.

The approval brings to a close nearly eight months of haggling between the oil company and the township, with the company first providing a simple expansion plan and the township planners being equally adamant about signage and station construction materials.

"The station is located at the entrance to Northville Township and should reflect that status," noted Commissioner Marvin Gans, who, on

at least three separate occasions, surveyed other Gas & Go facilities.

Part of the delay for the project, which first was presented to the planning commission in 1986, centered around the zoning for the station. The station was located in an area zoned business; however, the township instituted a new freeway service zoning, and Boron officials opted to wait for the freeway service district to be created before going ahead with their plans.

The final stumbling block to approval dealt with signage for the 1.4 acre parcel. Gas & Go officials originally had proposed a back-lit sign and overhang, however, the township planning commission stood its ground, finally getting the company to agree to a single, eight-foot sign.

Hole said he anticipates work will begin on the expansion in September and be completed in October.

Northville Estates districts expanded

The long journey toward city water and sewer service for the south part of Northville Estates development continued Monday night, with the city council approving new boundaries for the special assessment districts.

The development's sanitary sewer district number two and its water district number two were both expanded on a unanimous vote to include all the houses in the development which had not been included previously.

When the districts were established at the end of 1986, several lots were excluded from the water and sewer service areas because of low homeowner interest, a memo to homeowners explains.

When the city contacted those outside the district this spring, a fairly large number of homeowners indicated interest in being included in the district, the memo says. Since the number was too high to efficiently

handle individually, the council voted to expand the districts.

Expansion of the districts does not affect any individual decision to be a part of the water or sewer districts and assessments, the memo explains. The city policy allows homeowners to refrain from connecting to the city system if a safe well and/or septic field is present.

The district leaves open the possibility of any lot joining the city sewer and water service in the future, although costs would probably be higher.

Cost estimates for connection in the initial construction are \$4,500 per lot for water and \$6,000 per lot for sewer.

A final confirmation of the assessment roll is still in the future, probably at an August city council meeting. Construction is expected to be completed this fall.

- bKids' contests at 12:30 p.m. with a 25 cent entry fee for each contest — balloon and egg toss, sack races, hay bale rolling, watermelon eating and greased pig chase.

- Barbershop quartet at 6 p.m.
- Crosstown Cloggers and old time fiddler at 7 p.m.

Group F winners were, first, Redford Jaycee Lawn Mowers; second, Clowns of America; and third, Farmington Elks Motor Drill.

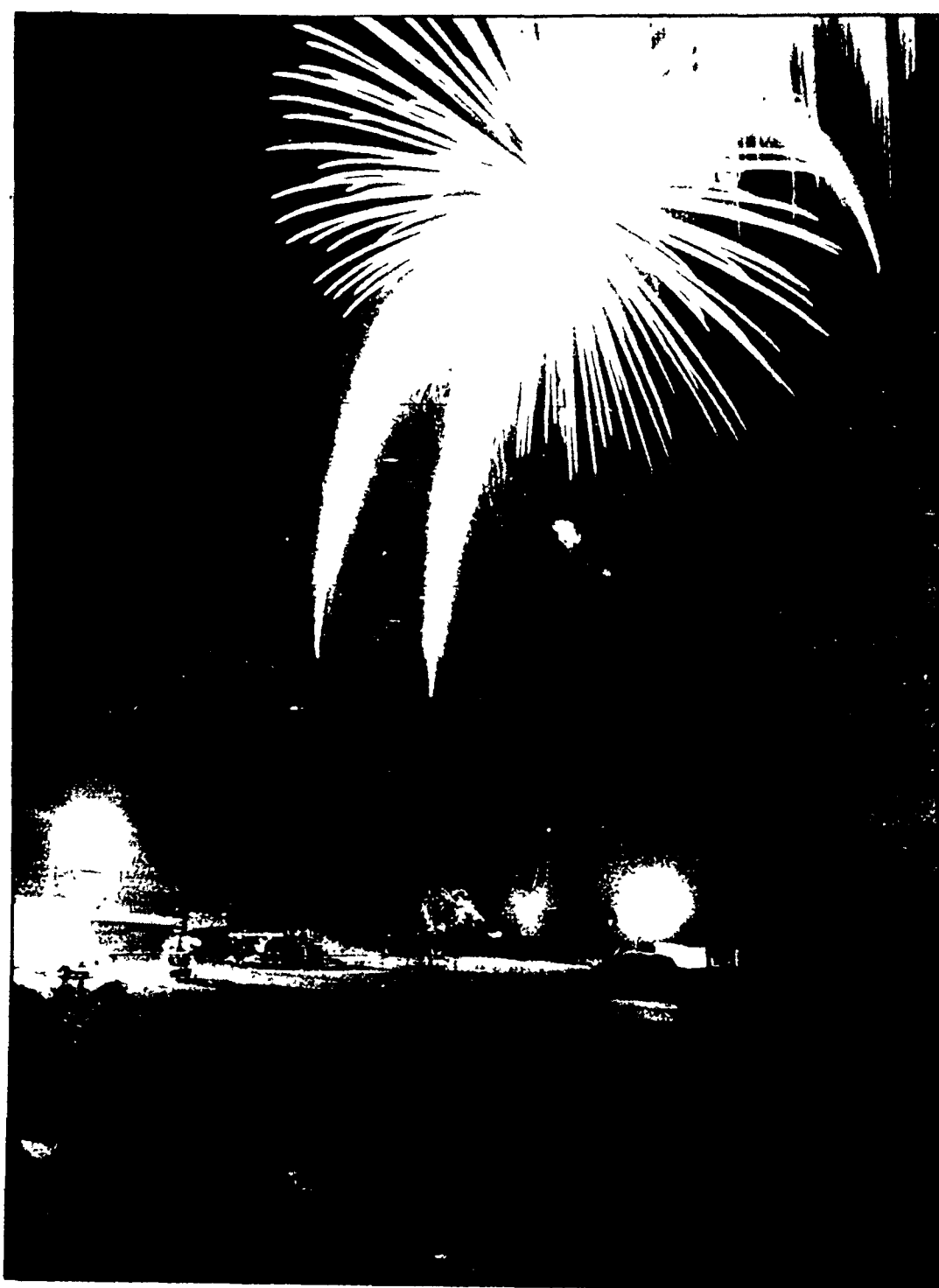

Woman loses \$1,065 in 12 Oaks robbery

A 43-year-old Pontiac woman was robbed at gunpoint by two white males while she was getting out of her car at Twelve Oaks Mall shortly after noon on Wednesday, July 1.

The two men made off with an estimated \$1,065 worth of cash and personal property.

The woman, who was uninjured in the incident, told police she arrived at the mall shortly after noon when the robbery occurred. She said she had parked her car in the Blue Lot and exited the vehicle, shutting and locking the door behind her, when she was approached by the two robbers.

The first man, who was holding a black .22 caliber handgun, told the woman, "If you be quiet, you'll be all right." He then grabbed her beige leather shoulder-strap purse.

The second suspect then approached the woman and grabbed three gold chains from around her neck, breaking off two of them. The man also pulled a bracelet-style Seiko watch from the woman's wrist and pulled a

ring off a finger on her left hand.

The pair then left in an unknown direction, and the woman ran into JCPenney's where she notified Penney's security officers of the theft. The security officers subsequently called Novi police.

The woman said both the robbers were approximately 20 years old and thin with dirty blond, collar-length hair.

The suspect holding the gun was said to be wearing blue jeans and a grey Mickey Mouse T-shirt. The second man was said to be wearing loud, flowered three-quarters length shorts and a blue T-shirt with the words "Party till you puke" written on it.

The purse contained an estimated \$740 worth of cash in addition to a checkbook and pictures of the woman's grandchildren. The watch and the gold ring were valued at \$125 apiece, while the two gold chains were valued at a total of \$200.

Boy slightly injured in hit-run accident

A 16-year-old boy riding a bicycle was hit by a car Sunday evening and suffered minor injuries, a Northville city police report said.

The VCR was described as a gray 1986 Sharp in good condition, with a wireless remote control. A video monitor connected to the VCR was left untouched, the custodian said. As of Monday, police had no suspects.

Cummins stands mute at preliminary exam

George Earl Cummins, part-owner of the Westbrook Golf Course on Grand River and Beck Road, stood mute during his pre-trial hearing on June 30.

Cummins has been charged with two counts of killing Canada geese with an automobile.

He will appear before Judge Martin Boyle in 52nd District Court in Walled Lake for a bench trial Aug. 11 at 10 a.m.

The killing of wild water fowl is a misdemeanor, punishable by up to 90 days in jail or a fine of up to \$500 upon conviction. In addition, anyone found guilty of the charge may be assessed restitution costs to the state of up to \$500.

Denise Muscat, a resident of Beck Road, said she called Novi police after observing a blue Mercedes Benz convertible chasing geese on the golf course at 4:10 p.m. on May 19. Muscat said she saw the car hit the geese and a man reach out and put the dead geese in a "white sack."

Sergeant Gerald Burnham of the Novi Police Department responded to the complaint and said he recovered a white sack containing two dead baby Canada geese from the dumpster behind the clubhouse at the Westbrook golf course.

Burnham contacted the Department of Natural Resources which filed the charges.

Nichols supports statewide law on guns

Michigan has some of the most restrictive gun laws in the U.S. and there's no need for a "hodge-podge" of local handgun ordinances, according to Oakland County Sheriff John F. Nichols.

"Passing a law is the greatest thing in the world if you have the resources to enforce it," Nichols recently told a county Board of Commissioners panel.

"It's OK (enforceable) if you give up the (constitutional) right against search and seizure. You don't have that authority."

"And I suggest you don't give anyone that authority (to search homes for handguns)," the veteran law enforcement officer said.

"Only about one-third of all handguns are registered, and mere passage of a law is not the solution," he told a general government committee.

Nichols' comments persuaded the committee to support Senate Bill 179, prohibiting local units from passing gun control ordinances.

The bill, sponsored by freshman Democrat Chris Dingell of Trenton, has been passed by the Senate. It was supported by Republicans Doug

Cruce of Troy, Richard Fessler of West Bloomfield and Rudy Nichols of Waterford, and opposed by Democrat Jack Faxon of Farmington Hills.

Oakland's general government committee, chaired by Richard Skarritt (R-Milford) gave 4-3 approval to a resolution backing the bill, but only after intense debate over "home rule" and the need to "do something" about hundreds of firearms deaths in Detroit.

Current law, the sheriff said, puts many legal barriers in front of handgun ownership:

- The gun must be registered.
- It must pass a police safety inspection.
- You must be licensed to carry it.
- If you sell it, you have to inform the state.

"We have gun legislation, and we've had it since 1927," Nichols said.

Chairman Skarritt added, "I've owned several pistols. I've hunted. I don't think local legislation is the answer," he said, detailing the legal steps from a gun owner's point of view:

"You have to obtain a permit to

purchase a handgun

"You are fingerprinted for FBI records

"You have to show the permit when you purchase the gun, and then take it in for a safety inspection.

"You need a hunting license to own one.

"You can carry it only to and from a shooting range or a hunting area."

"Look at what happens in a certain metropolitan area to the south of us," said Nichols, who was Detroit police commissioner until 1973.

"If you count the number arrested for CCW (carrying a concealed weapon) and the number sent to jail, you'll have some hellish surprises," he said, indicating the conviction rate was very low.

"And I'm not a member of the NRA (National Rifle Association, which opposes bans on handguns)," said Nichols, who was Farmington Hills police chief before being elected sheriff as a Republican in 1984.

"It's what I hear from the NRA — 'Guns don't kill people; people kill people,'" replied Commissioner Dennis Aaron (D-Oak Park).

"It's time we do something to get guns off the street. If a local govern-

ment wants to do a job, I applaud that because the federal government is doing a lousy job and the state is doing a lousy job.

"I'd gladly give up a constitutional right (to keep and bear arms). We should ban the passage of handguns in this country, the way we banned private ownership of machine guns. I don't see any need in this country for handguns.

"We should tell the NRA to jump in the lake."

In reply to Nichols' comments about the procedural hassle police face to get search warrants, Aaron, a lawyer, said: "You can get a warrant based on the information. There were 675 people killed in Detroit last year, and in May two Jehovah's Witnesses were shot in my district at Ten Mile and Greenfield."

Commissioner Ruel McPherson (D-Hazel Park) favored allowing cities to attack the problem locally. In some areas, store owners and people who carry large amounts of cash feel compelled to protect themselves with handguns, he said, because "if you don't carry a pistol, you're absolutely out of your mind."

City council approves drainage system plan

A "swale" design — with a raised lip on each edge of the street, but not a full curb — was approved for Grace from Eight Mile to Maplewood and for Horton from Eight Mile to Hill.

About 25 residents turned out at the June 29 meeting to register an opinion with the council.

"I do not think this gentleman should be penalized for buying a house with a certain zoning," council member Carolann Ayers said. "I think it is unfair for that particular homeowner just as it would be unfair for any of you homeowners to remain on a zoning you didn't want."

After a 5-0 vote in favor of rezoning all the lots except the sixth, council approved a zone change from industrial to commercial for the current area of the Wagon Wheel parking lot (see related story).

The council then voted unanimously to call a public hearing on changing the zoning of Ronk's lot from industrial to general commercial district. The hearing is scheduled for the council meeting at 8 p.m. Monday, Aug. 3.

After that vote, Strauch said to the council, "We've lost our battle to have (Ronk's lot) go to residential. Our area is only two streets wide and every house counts in there to every (resident)."

"Council has been sensitive to the wishes of those residential property owners along Beal," mayor Paul Vernon said. "I'm sorry you feel you lost a battle."

He added that, if at the public hearing the residents presented any arguments for zoning the lot residential, the council would consider that option as well.

Modrack's memo indicated that once the first phase of the office center was completed and leased, an additional 4,000 average daily trips would impact on Six Mile.

In addition, Modrack wrote, the

county has no present plans to widen Six Mile, "and, when pressed on the likelihood of devoting county funds to this project, the county pleads poverty."

Modrack said the township had met with Kirco officials, as well as representatives of Dun Rovin, a 724-

unit condominium and single-family development at Haggerty south of Six Mile, as well as with representatives from Ward Church and BP Oil.

"We will continue to meet and try to reach a resolution to this problem," Modrack said.

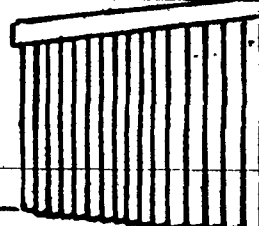

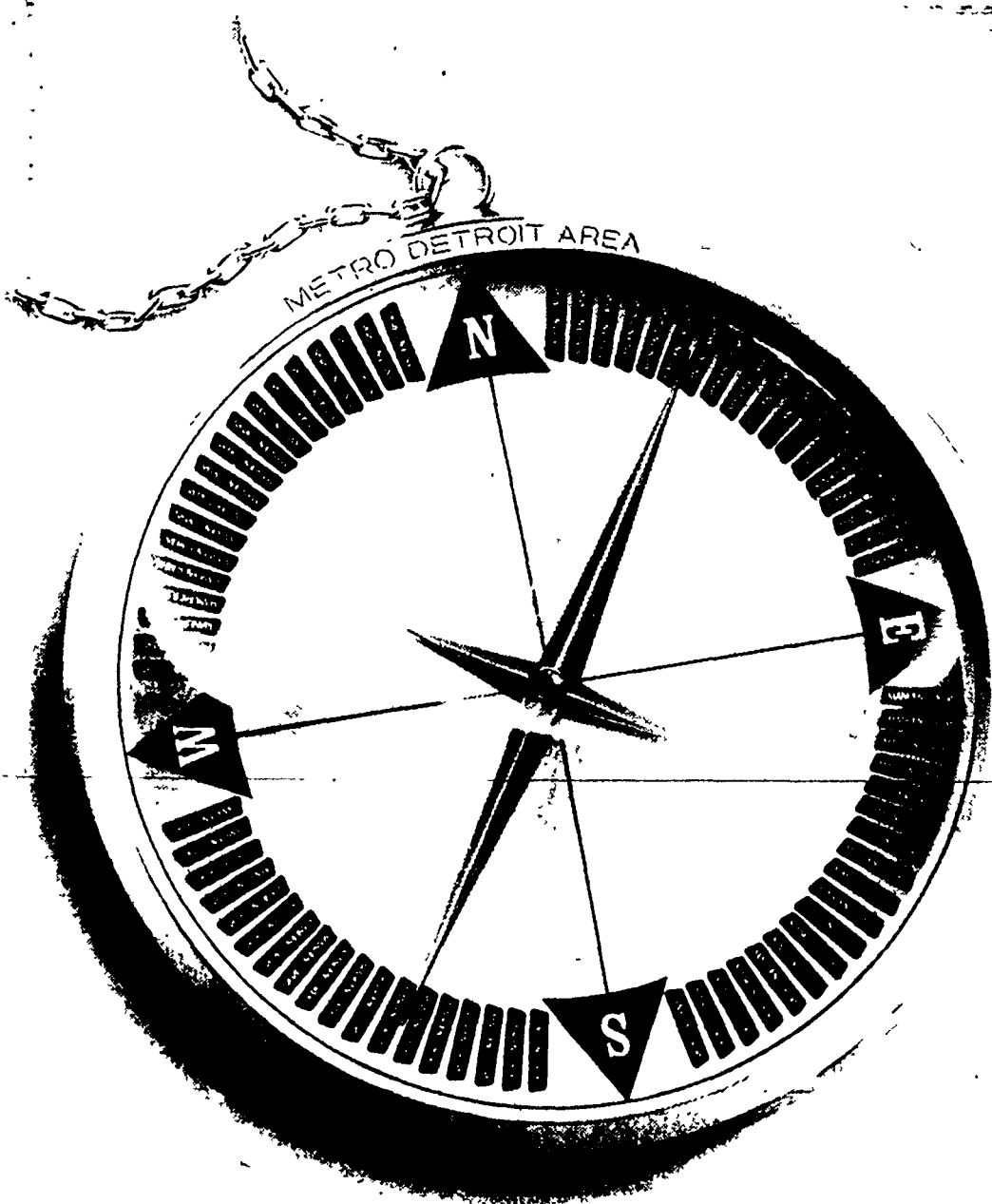

Fireworks cleanup should be needless

Northville's Fourth of July fireworks display last Saturday was a spectacular ending to the day's celebration. Everyone we've talked with since has agreed that the fireworks which illuminated the sky over the football field on Eight Mile were, indeed, wonderful to watch.

The litter that was left behind by spectators on the high school property — where those spectators enjoyed a vantage view — was not a pretty sight over the weekend, however. Containers that had held drinks and papers covered the hillside. Drinks and cotton candy had been purchased from a vendor who obtained the concession from the sponsoring Jaycees.

It was summer employees of the school district who cleaned up the mess Monday. However, there seems to have been a communication

breakdown between the Jaycees and the recreation department which, Jaycee Bob Cummings says, had assumed the responsibility as a community service in the past. Cummings, who was in charge of parade arrangements, and much more, had a major responsibility. Getting all the events of the day in place is a big undertaking alone — not to mention having to raise funds for them.

Faced with the possibility of having to pay the school workers, Cummings says the litter, as well as spiraling insurance costs picked up this year by the city and township, may well signal the end of the fireworks.

Those spectators who sat, enjoyed the refreshments and the fireworks — and then left their trash — are the real culprits and have themselves to blame if the show does not go on next July 4.

Remember tornado

When something happens that we hear about through the news, we tend to rely on the news to keep us informed. That's natural, since the media will try to stay on top of any new developments.

But that leaves the media — and those who gain information from it — with a bit of a blind spot. When there are no new developments to stay on top of, the media usually stop covering a story. There's nothing to cover.

You probably haven't heard much lately about the tornado that killed a man and destroyed several homes in Novi's Chateau Estates mobile home park. If you look at the back page of the Record this week, you'll see three articles relating to the tragedy. But overall, there really isn't too much to write about.

That doesn't mean, however, that

everything is okay. Michael Muscatello's family will carry the memory of that storm around forever. Other residents of the park are still trying to pull their lives together, dealing with things like insurance claims — or, as is the case with the Muscatellos, with no insurance at all.

We can still help. Security Bank and Trust has set up a fund to help the Muscatellos, and there is another fund for general storm aid. Of course, direct donations are welcomed. Even better, \$50 buys a ticket for a special benefit on the 19th at Chez Raphael, with all the proceeds going to the Muscatello family.

At the very least, let's not forget about our neighbors up in the park. Even though Bill Bonds hasn't mentioned Chateau Estates recently, we should still be keeping the people who live there in our thoughts and prayers.

Prison was wanted

When most reporters go out of town for a weekend or an annual vacation, one of the first things they do is buy the local newspaper. It's a good idea for anyone who wants to know more about the area being visited.

While it can be expected that attitudes would vary when the area is, say, North Carolina, it is a bigger surprise when the attitude is very different less than 200 miles north.

An above-the-banner lead story in the June 24 issue of the Iosco County News Herald I bought in East Tawas is a case in point. The headline read "Last Ditch Bid for Prison" with the second headline, "Whittemore would provide utilities."

The story related that "faced with almost certain rejection of its bid to become the location of a maximum security prison, Whittemore City Council made a last ditch proposal Monday morning to the Michigan Corrections Commission in an effort to change some minds at Lansing."

The article went on to say that the council took unanimous action in a resolution adopted at a special meeting of the city council that "calls for the sale of revenue bonds in the amount of \$1.5 million to construct a municipal sanitary sewage treatment facility and a water supply system to serve the site of the proposed prison" in that community.

It noted that lack of such municipal facilities had been a major strike against the city in its bid for the maximum security facility. The next statement gave the reason for the community of Whittemore wanting the prison — it would furnish from 250 to 300 additional jobs — jobs much needed in that part of Michigan.

Thomas Chatel, secretary of the Iosco County Economic Development Commission working with the Western Iosco County Community, said the offer was the last minute effort to "address the deficiency in Whittemore's initial proposal."

That offer meant the state could locate a prison — a maximum security prison — at Whittemore with the community's blessing and could locate it there without

any initial capital cost for construction of water and sewer facilities.

Four days later the Metro dailies carried stories that the location for the next state prison would be in Macomb County, a county that was fighting having such an institution and one where the state likely was going to have to provide utilities to the site. This month the news is that, even with planned prisons, the need for cell space will not be met.

The Northville community has its share of prisons with the new Scott Regional Facility located in Northville Township and Phoenix and Western Wayne Correctional facilities located next door in Plymouth Township, but has had to fight to keep the state from adding more. None of the prisons provides any jobs to speak of locally. Few of the employees make their homes in Novi, Northville or Plymouth. That would not be the situation in Whittemore, however.

Chatel was quoted in the Iosco County News Herald as being of the opinion that "the selection of Whittemore as a prison site is highly unlikely, but because of the community's extremely positive attitude and the potential major economic impact offered by being selected, Whittemore officials decided to make one more effort."

That one more effort included the promise that the facilities would be on-site and operational when the prison was completed. It appears the corrections commission is determined to locate state prisons where they are not wanted, rather than where they might be welcomed with open arms. The logic completely escapes me. The argument for placing the prisons near Detroit is that families can visit the inmates. However, Detroit itself has fought having prisons in its limits. Families who really wish to visit certainly should not find a trip of about 150 miles impossible.

Additionally, the prison commission would find itself working with a cooperative community. As I observed, attitudes and conditions are different not too far away. I fail to understand why such an offer went begging and wonder who the corrections commission is trying to please. I hope our legislators will wonder why also.

Return to normality

"I was looking out the window, and I thought the blue house looked odd. Then I realized — it was upside down," a resident of Novi's Chateau Estate Mobile Home park was overheard saying to a friend

Things like that — the perfectly normal turned upside down, haunt my memories of the disaster scene. The welcome signs still waved outside of the clubhouse at the Mobile Home Park on the Monday immediately following the deadly tornado.

Amidst the complete devastation of scores of homes, small symbols of lives interrupted, stood out: a small red hobby horse, a box of Pampers, an ironing board still standing tall, Christmas ornaments, and one water ski.

"Is that your house?" I asked a man standing looking at a ruined home. "No, I'm just looking for my shed. I live over there," he said pointing in the opposite direction.

It seemed a reasonable thing to be doing. People were walking up and down the streets, slowly, just taking in the sheer magnitude of the disaster. This was back

when the streets were closed to outsiders. Just residents and families — and those of us who trod upon their privacy, interrupted their mourning and caught them with their emotions close to the surface.

It was easy to talk to victims of the tornado. The day-after relief and shock made people eager to tell their stories. One of the first signs that a disaster has brushed close to a person seems to be the need to tell about it — to share the fear, and the escape.

I heard some unkind comments about the media's coverage of the event. About how families of residents of the park were kept outside the dangerous area for safety reasons; yet TV camera crews, with deadlines breathing down their backs, were allowed into the park to transmit live from the front yards of destroyed homes. It's an old story, I know, about how much the public's right-to-know supersedes the privacy surrounding accidents. There is a fine line between bringing people needed information and asking an already confused and scared child to relive, one more time for the record, just what it was like to live through a tornado.



The issue comes up too, now that the disaster scene is again a public place. Car loads of gawkers drive slowly through the park, some taking pictures, others pointing. Most park residents seem to be taking the cruisers in stride, their lives have been overturned by a far bigger force than a few curious people. It is human nature to want to see the effects of a disaster, and in some ways viewing the devastation allows people to understand and care about those who have lived through it. And that, too, is why I was on the scene, asking questions and searching for stories.

As the clean-up of the park continues, lives return naturally to the habits of old, despite the absurdity of the surroundings. I have one vivid memory from late June, as I was leaving the park. It was a hot and sticky afternoon and next door to a completely destroyed home sat a family under an umbrella, sipping lemonade watching children jump through a lawn sprinkler. On another house, above grass sprinkled with glass and debris, a bright blue wind sock waved in the gentle breeze, completely unaffected by what had gone before.

Fireworks cleanup gets lost in shuffle

Summer employees of the Northville School District cleaned up litter left on the high school grounds Monday after the annual Northville fireworks display on July 4, and district Assistant Superintendent Burton Knighton said the Northville Jaycees may be asked to pick up the tab.

"It's clearly a Jaycee responsibility" to clean up the empty concession containers and other refuse,

Knighton said. And since the school district ended up doing the actual cleanup, "I have to charge the Jaycees for that labor," he said.

He added that the school district formally provided the Jaycees with the exclusive right to sell concession contracts and charge for parking in a letter to the Jaycees, the schools stated that the Jaycees would be responsible for cleanup. Knighton said, "I'd hate to see, any kind of wor-

thwhile activity get any kind of black eye," Knighton said. "Generally the Jaycees have been very good about the pickup, and there were no problems."

The problem this year may just have been a lack of communication. Northville Recreation Director John Anderson said that the recreation department organized a volunteer cleanup effort after the Jaycees requested it last year. But this year, he said, no one asked.

Jaycee parade chairman Bob Cummings noted Monday that "the Northville Recreation Department had done the cleanup for the last three or four years" and he understood it would do so with area youth as a community service.

He said the concession for pop, drinks and cotton candy was awarded to John Passamore of Plymouth who has "done a good job for the Jaycees."

Muscatellos will keep hoping for the best

"I'm not giving up, that's for sure," said Vanda Muscatello during a recent telephone interview.

Muscatello suffered a broken back during the tornado which swept through the Chateau Estates Mobile Home park on June 21.

Michael Muscatello, Vanda's husband, was killed when the family's mobile home was lifted from its foundation and hurtled into another home.

A third mobile home was then upended on the Muscatellos'. The couple's 19-month old son was also seriously injured in the sudden storm.

Vanda remains hospitalized in the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor. Although her father Bill Tori, said doctors told the family that Vanda will never walk again, she is not giving up hope.

"I'm not going to give up ever, there's always new technology," Vanda said.

She has been moved from the hospital's intensive care unit and is undergoing rehabilitation therapy.

Her son, Michael, has been released and is staying with her parents, she said. "He's great. He's been a little trooper," Vanda declared.

The Muscatellos' home was destroyed in the tornado, and Tori said the family has no medical or homeowner's insurance.

Three metro-Detroit area chefs will host a benefit dinner to aid the Muscatello family, victims of the deadly tornado which swept through Novi.

The benefit dinner will be held at Chez Raphael in Novi on Sunday, July 19, from 5-9 p.m. Tickets are \$50 per person.

Chef Keith Famie of Chez Raphael, Chef Joseph Yezbick of the Sheraton Oaks Novi and Chef Ed Janos of the Money Tree restaurant in Detroit will prepare hors d'oeuvres and appetizers for the occasion. Wine and champagne for the evening are being donated by The Merchant of Vino. Entertainment also will be provided.

"This is not a sit-down dinner,"

Famie said, "because we're hoping for 250-300 people and it would be impossible to serve that many."

The three chefs are donating their time, all proceeds from the event will go into the Security Bank and Trust Fund for the Muscatello family.

Michael Muscatello was killed and his wife Vanda and 19-month old son were seriously injured in the tornado which touched down in Novi's Chateau Estates Mobile Home Park on June 21. Vanda is still hospitalized with a broken back. The family had no medical or homeowner's insurance, according to Bill Tori, Vanda's father.

Reservations for the benefit can be made by calling Julie Traub of Victor-Forbes Ltd., public relations, at 542-0095.

In addition to the benefit dinner, a tennis exhibition will be held July 19 at 1 p.m. at the Detroit Racquet and Squash Club at Fourteen Mile and Drake Road. 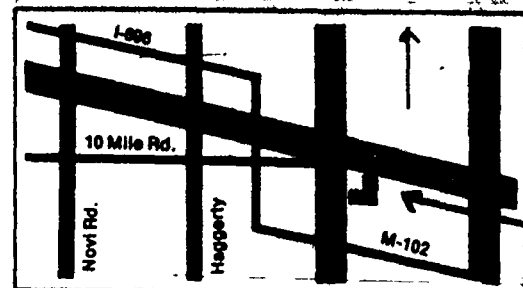

Newlyweds must consider finances, too

Can two live as cheaply as one? Probably not, according to the Michigan Association of CPAs. But, chances are most newly-married couples really wouldn't know. That's because they haven't devoted enough time to financial planning.

Many young couples think financial planning is something for the very rich or very old. But the truth of the matter, say CPAs, is that financial planning should be an integral part of every family's life right from the beginning.

In planning their financial future, there are some financial matters a couple should consider even before exchanging rings — like questions about the ownership of property brought into the marriage. If one partner enters the marriage with not much more than a sleeping bag and a guitar and the other has an investment portfolio worth \$300,000, a legally binding contract, often called a prenuptial agreement, can outline what each partner owns and what will become of the property in case of divorce or death.

As a married couple, your tax liability is one of the first matters you'll want to examine. If you're both working, CPAs say you can count on your marriage to put you into a higher tax bracket.

And since the Tax Reform Act eliminated the so-called marriage penalty deduction, beginning in 1987, two-earner couples will no longer be able to deduct a portion of one spouse's income. In most cases, married couples pay less tax by filing jointly but, in certain circumstances, filing separately may reduce your total tax bill. A CPA can help determine which filing method will better

suit your particular situation

Setting up a budget forms the groundwork for your financial plan. But before undertaking this task, it is important that both partners work together to formulate short- and long-term financial goals. You need to know where you want to go before you can plan how to get there. So give careful thought and discussion to determining your objectives.

Although there are countless ways to set up a budget, the basics of every budget are the same. There are two sides — one for the money coming in and one for the money going out. But the most important thing to keep in mind is that, to be successful, a budget must reflect your lifestyle. If you both love to ski, by all means, budget for it, paring down expenses in some other area, if necessary. If your budget is too rigid, you probably won't stick to it.

These days, when most married couples have two incomes, the "if" and "how" of merging two paychecks is another question you'll have to resolve. Some couples prefer to pool all their income together, using one source from which to pay bills, save money and draw spending cash.

Others prefer to maintain two separate accounts with each partner taking responsibility for certain expenses. Maybe he pays the mortgage and utility bills while she takes care of food, household expenses and charge payments. Still others like to set up a joint account for fixed ex-

penses and separate accounts for other expenses and individual use.

Whatever way you decide is best, each spouse should maintain at least a small separate account as well as some form of credit in his or her own name. If you find that you and your partner have duplicate charge accounts or just too many, you may want to close some. But when doing so, be sure to structure your credit accounts so that each of you will have a credit history to fall back on in the event of a divorce or a spouse's death.

Although, in the past, you may not have given a lot of thought to insurance, marriage tends to get you thinking about the effects of loss, disability or death. You'll want to be sure you have adequate insurance — both on your lives and on your home or apartment.

You'll need to review the many types of life insurance that are available before determining what is best for your circumstances. "How much do we need?" and "How much can we afford?" are the two key questions you'll want to address.

Cash value policies, like whole life or universal, allow you to build up savings but cost considerably more than term insurance which gives you the greatest amount of protection at the lowest cost. Consider, too, your need for disability insurance, which provides you with an income should you be unable to work because of sickness or injury. In making deci-

sions on insurance, you have to balance your needs with your resources.

Homeowner's insurance and its equivalent for renters, protects your home and its contents. The amount of coverage you should have depends on the replacement cost of your home and your personal possessions. Life insurance, your choice of homeowner's insurance will require you to study your particular situation and compare the policies available.

Overlapping employee benefits is an area many new couples overlook. If both partners work, there's a good chance that both employers provide health and other insurance benefits. By examining both policies carefully, you can determine whether it might be advantageous to merge some benefits. If both policies provide free or low cost coverage, it might be best to keep both since many plans allow for coordination of benefits. This means that after you submit your claim to the primary plan, you can submit the claim, along with a record of how much the first plan paid, to the other plan and you'll be reimbursed for some or all of the remaining amount.

But if the cost of health insurance to one partner is high and your medical expenses are generally low, you might save by dropping that coverage and covering both of you under the plan that costs the least.

CPAs suggest that financial planning in the early years of your marriage can lay the groundwork for the financial planning process that will take you through your marriage on firm financial footing.

of things in the art of ceramics. "I am continually learning new processes and techniques," she said. "I take every class and seminar I can get."

Also active in the Ceramic Dealers Association, Smith is publicity director for the group's ceramic show at the Michigan State Fair.

"The organization also helps me in keeping up with the latest trends," said Smith. "And there's always something new."

Choosing a small house as the location, Smith opened her first ceramic studio five years ago. Within six months, the shop had outgrown its tiny quarters.

So Smith packed up and moved to a commercial strip in downtown South Lyon. This time it took a little longer to outgrow the new location, but after four years it was apparent a larger shop was badly needed.

And it was back to a house. The present location at 317 Lafayette is said to be 140 years old, but isn't on the books until 1901. Not surprisingly, it went through extensive refurbishing before Hatzl Craft moved in.

"This place suits us very well," said Hatzl's son, Lloyd, who assists in running the shop. "There's so much room for expansion. We can go up, down, sideways or back."

Stressing uniqueness, the Smiths believe their success is partly a result of providing pieces that are unusual and often hard to come by.

Carrying over 2,000 molds, Hatzl Craft offers many that are collectors

items, and others that have been discontinued or are rare.

But Smith attributes her success to more than just the selection and services she offers.

"I would've never been able to do this without my friends," she said. "When we first got started they were such a help, and they still are."

Through the years, she has added to that list of friends. "I have made beautiful friends out of my customers," she emphasized. They aren't just customers or students, they are very good friends.

Smith said her patrons "come in and out, in and out," and she has gotten to know them and their families well.

To give her students the opportunity to learn as much as possible about ceramics, Smith regularly schedules traveling teachers who hold seminars at Hatzl Craft.

"We want to expand to more of a teaching studio," said Smith. "It's good for the students to experience other teachers and other methods."

Of course, Smith will continue sharing her talent with students also. "I love teaching," she said. "It's great when they pick up their first piece and say 'Wow, I did that!'"

Hatzl Craft is open Monday through Thursday from noon until 5 p.m. In addition, the shop is open Mondays from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Winter hours, however, are extended to accommodate a heavier flow of customers. Class times vary, but can be set up by calling Hatzl Craft at 437-4900.

ONE MUTT'S makeover

Sammy Sam, Cashmere and Scamper may not be common names found in appointment books where you get your hair cut, but they certainly would not be considered unusual in places where some of your best friends go for a total body makeover.

Business is booming for pet grooming salons across the country as more and more pets become "part of the family," according to Judy Ayers, an independently licensed dog groomer at Northville's Puppy Love salon.

As professional organizations go, groomers have only just begun to form associations and set standards of practice (see story below). But groomers are no secret to millions

of pet owners nationwide.

Commonly associated with dogs, groomers treat pets to exotic hair cuts and bathing treatments very similar to treatments people receive at their own hair salons. With the exception of facials and hair dyeing, dogs are treated to everything from shampoos and blow dries, to medicated baths and manicures. . . not to mention the fact they get to exchange the latest gossip with all their friends. (It is so difficult, though, to discuss the latest look in flea collars while underneath those noisy dryers!)

Tips for 'doggie parents' on glamour do's, don'ts

BRUSHING: The key to keeping your pet and your groomer happy (not to mention costing you less) is to make sure your pet is brushed often. Dogs who have badly matted coats take longer to treat. According to Judy Ayers of Puppy Love in Northville, some dogs are so badly matted they must be shaved completely instead of trimmed. In addition, it is more painful for the dog to have to be cut under matted conditions. Ayers said matting adversely affects a dog's grooming experience, and the dog may not ever be comfortable with a visit to the pet salon.

MEDICAL ALERT: Ayers said it is important to let your groomer know if your dog is currently on medication. Certain medications, when combined with a routine flea bath, can cause serious side effects. Ayers said dogs which are infected with fleas are always treated separately and kept from other dogs. Some salons fumigate monthly and chemically treat the premises with anti-flea disinfectant.

NOT JUST DOGS: Many salons are patronized by more than just "man's best friend." Cats commonly get hair cuts every 3-6 months (depending on the cat), and many salons treat birds, hamsters and guinea pigs. Ayers said one regular customer at Puppy Love is a goat named "Scamper."

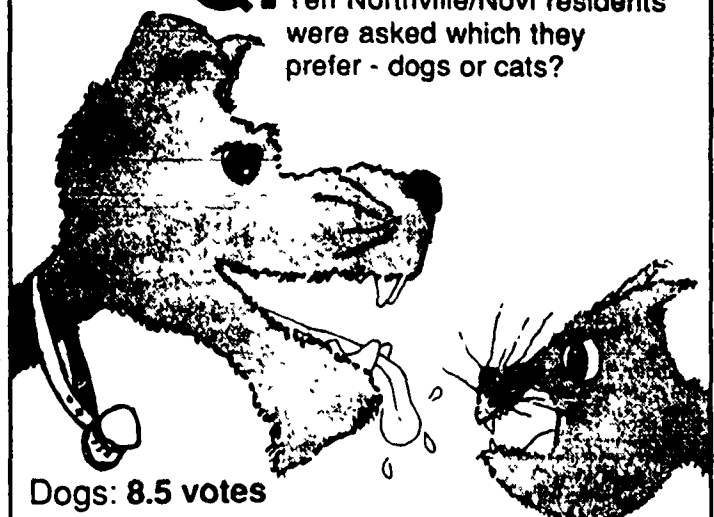

Groomers share professional 'tails'

Scott said the MPGA has been in existence since 1982. The group was formed to enhance the dog grooming profession and increase the general public's awareness of standards and practices of dog groom-

ing. She said conventions of this type take place all around the country and offer groomers a chance to exchange information with their peers, as well as offer them insight into the latest techniques and trends in the profession.

Scott said the recent convention at the Novi Hilton represented the first time the MPGA has involved participants from Canada, marking a trend in her profession to be more aware of the United States' international neighbors.

Although dog grooming has been around nearly as long as there have been dogs, groomers have attempted to unite as a profession only in recent years, according to Jerry Schinberg, a Can Am Classic participant.

Schinberg, who owns and operates the "A. Tondeur" grooming salon in Niles, Ill., organizes one of the most popular groomer conferences nationwide. The event draws about 600 participants from 29 states.

Schinberg estimates that there are about 25,000 people who groom-

dogs in shops and in their basements across the country. He added that the biggest reasons to attend dog-grooming conferences are education and camaraderie.

"There is a lot of fun in getting together in meeting people who are your peers, people who are in the same industry that you are in," he said.

The Can Am Classic featured organized lectures from various grooming industry professionals on a wide variety of topics including: clever sales techniques, veterinarian dentistry and cardiology, "professionalism in the grooming shop," and how groomers can take advantage of new tax breaks.

Arts Commission begins poetry book to celebrate community's many faces

The Northville Arts Commission wanted to find a truly unique idea to kick off its Fine Arts Series of local works, and the project's leaders think they've found it: a book of poetry by a local author celebrating the community.

Northville poet Kathleen Ripley Leo is already working on the book, which may be the first of its kind to be commissioned by a local arts organization. Set to be in print by the end of the year, the book will feature drawings by local artist Allen Berlin sky as well as Leo's poems, and will probably run about 64 pages and sell for about \$10.

"Very few communities, if any, have sponsored anything like this. We are, as a community, taking the role of patron of the arts," commission chairperson Virginia Patak said. "We are really making a renaissance effort to do something."

Leo speaks of ambitious plans for the book, which she is tackling by considerable reading and interviewing about the community today and in the past.

"I want to talk with a lot of people who know the history and hold the stories of Northville," she said. "We never know where poems will come from. I want this to be a book of poems that's going to explore the traditions, the heritage, and the present day," Leo said.

Her working title for the book is "Buchner's Hill," named after the Allen Terrace site thought to be the highest point in Northville. Leo said the book will be written in a contemporary poetic style including narrative, vignettes and images, with themes possibly including ranch life, farm life, Mill Race Village, cemeteries and historical fires.

Leo is well qualified for the job. Two books of her own work have been published, and she has participated in editing five others. Students in Northville and throughout the area know her from her many appearances in classes, talking about her craft.

While Leo seeks help from people who know a lot about the community, the Northville Arts Commission is looking for help financially. Patak estimated that the book will cost \$11,000 to produce, of which the commission has about \$2,000. Half of that came through a Michigan Council for the Arts sesquicentennial mini-grant, which Patak said is the first-ever grant for a commission undertaking.

"We're hoping we're on a roll now," she said, but in the meantime the group needs to find money for the current project. The group will

welcome both financial contributions and in-kind donations, she said, and will recognize contributors.

For \$1,000 a contributor receives the title "patron," for \$500, "benefactor," for \$100, "sponsor," and for \$50 "donor." The commission is planning some type of fundraising event to help with the cost, Patak said.

All contributions will be acknowledged in the book and patrons and benefactors receive a signed and numbered copy. A copy will also go to every intermediate school district in the state, Patak said.

The Northville Arts Commission has received strong support for the project from the Susan Smiley of the Poetry Resource Center. "I think this is the first time a community has supported this type of project," she wrote. "The book will be a historic as well as creative statement. It will be something that people can pass on for generations and generations."

Patak said the Northville Arts Commission has grand plans for its Fine Arts Series, once the poetry book becomes reality. The commission would like to continue sponsoring community-oriented work by local artists with possible future projects including something like a sculpture for some public place. "Who knows where it could lead," she said.

The commission has produced a brochure about the project. Anyone who wishes to have a copy of the brochure, to donate, or to talk to Leo about possible subjects may contact the arts commission through the Northville City Hall, 349-1300. Patak may be contacted directly at 349-0205.

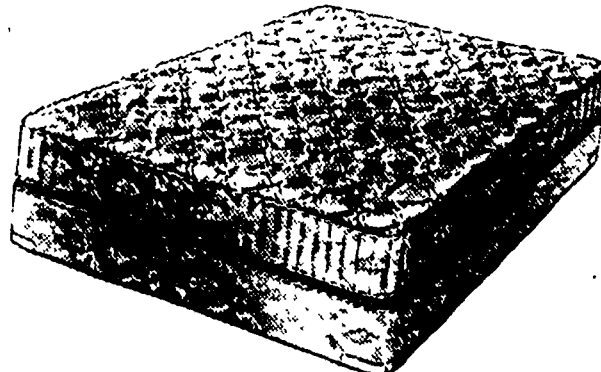

Swallow to skate in third Olympic Fest

For all of you wondering about one of Northville's favorite sons — Jerod Swallow — the 20-year-old ice dancer is still chasing his ultimate dream of a berth in the Olympics.

Swallow and partner Jodie Balogh of Livonia have been together on the ice for over five years now, but are relatively young compared with the rest of the best the United States has to offer in this type of competition. The two are former National Junior champions who are now competing at the senior or Olympic level, and the opposition is as stiff as it's ever been.

The summer of 1987 promises to be one of the busiest and most important for Swallow and Balogh have ever experienced. Their goal of making the U.S. Olympic team by 1992 could very well hinge on their performances this summer.

We don't know if he'll be on T.V. but ESPN does extensive coverage so if they televise a lot of the ice dance events, he'll probably be on. Jerod's mother Gayanne Swallow said.

For Jerod, he wants to impress everyone, but mainly the judges who pick the Olympic team. This type of exposure certainly doesn't hinder his chances.

At the Olympic Festival, they usually invite the top 10 pairs in ice dancing and the competition is similar to the National Championships, except there isn't as much pressure. Jerod pointed out "Things just seem to be a little more laid back."

"How well we do will probably determine if and where we will go this winter for an international competition."

According to Jerod, one of the highlights of this summer will follow the actual competition in Colorado Springs. Renowned Russian ice dance coach Natalia Dubava will be conducting a coaching seminar for the top 10 pairs. The trip to Colorado is being sponsored by the United States Skating Association.

"Jerod and Jodie are real excited about training with the Russian coach because she's world renowned and an excellent coach," Gayanne

said.

After the busy summer, it's on to the annual regional, midwestern and national competitions held throughout the fall and winter months for Swallow. An invitation to international competitions in either Prague, Czechoslovakia, or Vienna, Austria, are also strong possibilities.

Every move is a calculated attempt to step ever closer to the Olympic team. The general consensus is that the 1988 team has already been picked without Swallow and Balogh, who are still much younger than the average competitors.

There is a lot of politics involved in skating so we figure we need to wait for '92 or even '96," Jerod admitted. "The Olympics has always been the ultimate goal so we just have to wait our turn."

"The judges have almost guaranteed us that we will be on the world team after the '88 Olympics and that is the last step before the Olympic team."

Gayanne pointed out that even though Swallow and Balogh were the 1985 Junior Champs, it is still a long way to the top of the seniors' level.

"You have to start all over again and climb back to the top," she said. "My gut feeling is that they will be there (on the Olympic team) in 1992."

Seven Tom Holzer players named to All Star squad

Tom Holzer Ford, Northville's entry in the Livonia Collegiate Baseball League, still sits atop the league standings, even if it is by just a few percentage points.

And even though roughly half of the '87 season is still to be played, it's become clear that Holzer has gained a good measure of respect among the other teams in the LCBL as one of the league's elite. With the All-Star games fast approaching, Holzer's improved status is apparent as five players were voted to the squad as well as two pitchers.

"I think we got our fair share on the team," Holzer Coach Bob Peterson said. "We would have liked maybe one more pitcher picked but there are only so many spots."

"Overall, we are pleased with the picks. It's pretty well distributed, proportioned to the way the teams are in the standings."

The LCBL All Star squad is scheduled to play a team from the Detroit Adray league on July 13 at 10 a.m. at Tiger Stadium, and will then take on the first place team from Pontiac's Class A League later that evening (8 p.m.) at Ford Field in Livonia.

The five Holzer players voted to the team include rightfielder Keith Dutkiewicz, catcher Kevin Ritter, third baseman Scott Peterson, designated hitter Larry Wendt and first baseman Steve Merriman. Pitchers Dan Kopitzke and Tom Cotter were also selected to the team by Livonia.

the Caesars Coach John Moraitas.

Ritter, a member of Central Michigan's team last spring, has been tearing up LCBL pitching during the first half of the season with a .421 batting average (16-for-38). He is currently second in the battle for the league batting title and is Holzer's leading run scorer (15). Dutkiewicz, a former all-area selection from Northville High and a current varsity ballplayer at Ferris State, sports a fine .400 batting average (third in the LCBL) and is tied for the team lead in runs scored and is second in RBIs (16).

Peterson, another Northville High product, has been Holzer's top defensive player with just two errors despite playing every inning of every game so far this season. He also leads the team in walks (16), has nine RBIs while batting lead-off and has an on base percentage of .536 (second in league play). Merriman — who also plays for CMU — has the highest batting average of any first baseman in the LCBL (.323) and has been a solid player defensively. Michigan State's Larry Wendt is the league's premier DH with a .318 batting average.

Kopitzke has been Holzer's pitching ace for several seasons now and this will be his second appearance on the All-Star team. The University of Detroit hurler currently leads the league with four victories versus one defeat. In just over 28 innings of work, Kopitzke amassed 28 strike outs and has a very respectable earned run average of 2.34.

CMU's Cotter was never really considered a pitching prospect for Holzer until this season, but he's turned out to be best bullpen specialist in the LCBL. Pitching strictly in relief, Cotter has a 2-0 record, 14 strike outs in 12 innings and a fine 1.82 ERA.

"It appears that we are getting more respect now," Peterson said. "You can only get it one way and that is earn it."

"I still think our hitting can improve because we got off to such a slow start. There is room for improvement there but we've been getting excellent pitching."

Holzer's contest with the Adray Kings scheduled for July 1 at Henry Ford Community College was rained out. Combined with the holiday break, the team went 10 days without competing before the July 8 game against Ann Arbor Wendys (after Record deadline). Holzer's 9-5 record in league play prior to that game was 17 percentage points ahead of Caesars, who were at 10-6. Overall, Holzer's record is a much more mediocre 9-9.

"I think the layover will help us," Peterson admitted. "Even though we seemed to have picked up our play, I think the break is good. The rest will be good for us."

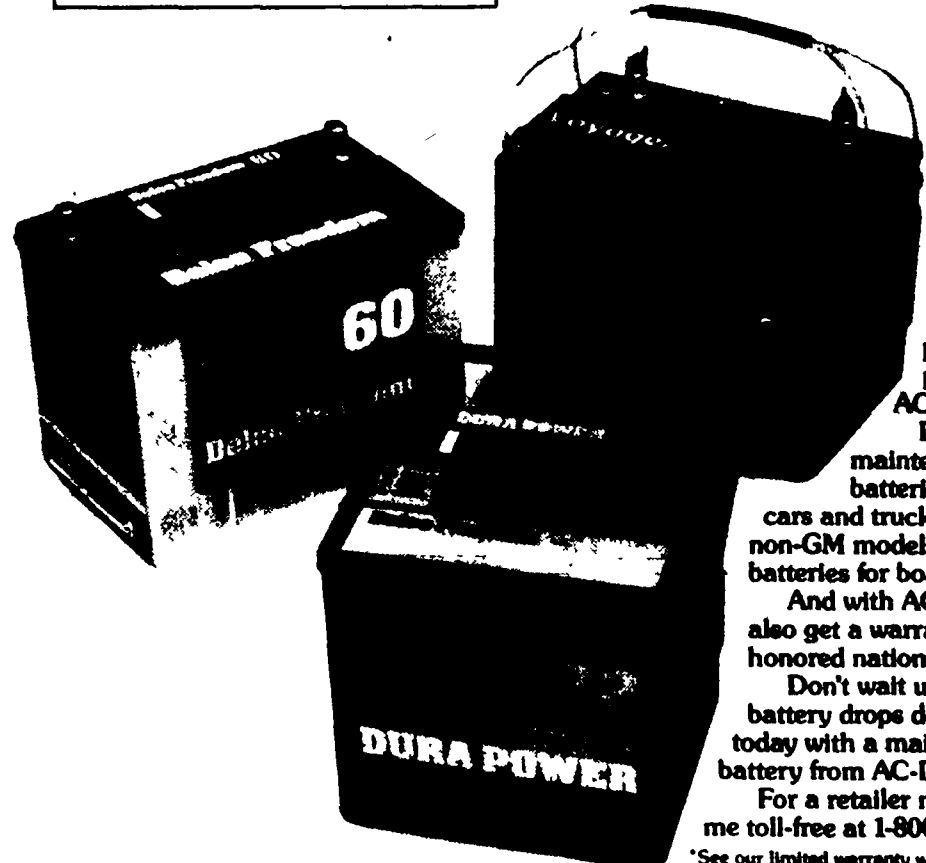

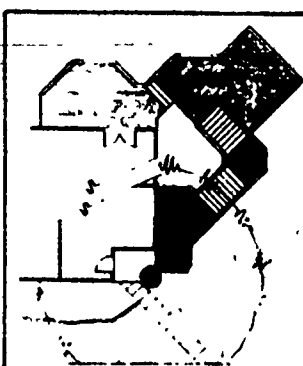
