Sewer cost estimates close to \$40 million

It could cost Northville, Plymouth and Canton townships as much as \$39.4 million to send flows to the Ypsilanti Community Utility Authority plant for treatment.

The figure is nearly \$14 million more than would be required had the three townships remained in the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley project and sent their sewage to the Detroit treatment plant.

The \$39.4 million price tag, which assumes no federal funds for the project, was the highest of two estimates provided the members of the Western Townships Utility Authority by McNeely & Lincoln Associates Inc. in cooperation with Plymouth Township engineers Dietrich, Bailey and Associates, P.C. and Thomas Casari, P.E., the Canton Township engineer.

The plans call for sending sewage flows to both the Ypsilanti and Detroit treatment plants until 2010, when flows to Wayne County would cease.

Another alternative, which engineering estimates show could cost \$25.4 million, would send all flows from the

WTUA service area to Ypsilanti by the year 1990.

Northville Township is contracted to the Detroit plant until 2010 under an agreement between the township and Wayne County signed in August 1981.

Northville Township Supervisor Georgina Goss, noting that the costs estimates were merely estimates, said any additional costs are worth paying, especially since the Ypsilanti option would allow the three townships to have some control over actual costs.

"Under the terms of the contract we are negotiating with YCUA, we will retain control over costs, including capital expansion and rates," Goss said. "We think that this project will solve our capacity needs for the next 50 years."

A WTUA attorney noted that it was very difficult to make a true comparison of costs between the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley project since there were a number of unverified assumptions for both projects.

"The sewer cost allocations are made assuming that the federal government, under the Clean Water Act, will pay 55 percent of the project's cost. That figure does not include the amount required for local im-

provements," the attorney said.

He added that the preliminary figures for the WTUA communities assume no federal funds.

Also, the attorney said, the WTUA project, if the Ypsilanti plant were to expand, would solve the capacity problems for the three townships for perpetuity. "They would not have to purchase additional capacity," he said.

The attorney noted there are some questions about costs that might have to be borne for the Detroit plant and the entire North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley system.

"We have some questions about whether the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley project actually would increase the capacity for the communities remaining in the project," he said.

Goss said the figures offered by engineers representing the three townships are "very, very preliminary. These are working figures and the actual costs could be much lower or even higher," she said.

She added it was necessary to have some idea of the project cost, but the figures listed in a "Report of Preliminary Engineering Design for a Wastewater Management and Disposal System" were by no means ab-

solute.

"We really do not want to commit taxpayers' funds for a full study until we are sure that the Ypsilanti plant will receive approval to expand," Goss added.

Goss said that the figures, as proposed by the engineers, represent total costs of the project and that individual funds would be allocated under an as yet to be determined formula.

"It is more important now to know whether YCUA will be given the right to expand than to determine costs for the individual communities," she said.

YCUA must receive approval from the Water Resources Commission before any expansion can be completed. The three townships have formed the Western Townships Utility Authority and are exploring the possibility of sending sewage flows not contracted to be handled by the Detroit plant to YCUA.

And, as of the June meeting of the Water Resources Commission, approval or denial of Ypsilanti expansion has not been resolved.

Goss said she hoped the matter would be on the August Water Resources Commission agenda.

Report lists crime totals; few robberies in township

Figures on major crime in Northville Township during 1986 were released Saturday as part of the annual FBI Uniform Crime Report, showing the township's totals for several different types of crime.

While the FBI warns that comparison of statistics can be misleading, a survey published last weekend places the township in a favorable position.

The FBI report compiles data on eight different categories of major crimes from police departments serving populations greater than 10,000. The City of Northville — with an estimated population of 6,200 — reports to the FBI but is not included in the national summary, FBI special agent John Anthony said.

Northville Township's major crime totals for 1986, as reported in the FBI summary, are: murder, 0; forcible rape, 2; robbery, 3; aggravated assault, 10; burglary, 120; larceny/theft, 424; motor vehicle theft, 33; and arson, 5.

Anthony, who works in the bureau's Detroit office, said that FBI definitions of the crimes may differ somewhat from local departments' definitions. He explained the difference between robbery, burglary and larceny.

• Robbery is the taking of property against a person's will by force or violence.

• Larceny is the taking of property without force or use of fraud, and includes shoplifting and picking pockets.

• Burglary is illegal entry of a structure to commit theft, with or without the use of force.

Sunday, July 26, The Detroit News published a summary of the data for Detroit area communities which concluded that Northville Township had the lowest robbery rate of the area communities covered by the report. But Anthony said such comparisons

can be very misleading, and are discouraged by the FBI.

"We think there are factors that play an important role in determining the figures that are not statistical in nature," Anthony said. "We discourage (community-to-community) comparison based

Chain of crimes ends with arrest of suspect

Northville city police arrested a Farmington Hills man after a car theft, a three-car accident, a break-in, and an attempted break-in early Saturday morning, police reported.

Richard Kay Crowell, 30, pled not guilty to charges of breaking and entering an occupied dwelling with intent to commit larceny and of malicious destruction of property over \$100, police said, after arraignment on the charges Monday, July 27. An examination is scheduled for Aug. 7 in the case.

As of Monday, no charges had been filed in the car theft and accident which preceded the arrest.

Before 12:30 a.m. Saturday, a car and trailer reported stolen from Farmington Hills ran into the rear of a car parked on Carpenter just north of

Eight Mile, police said. The force of the crash slid the parked car forward and into another parked car, according to the police accident report.

While investigating the accident, a Northville police officer ran across a man walking east on Hill between Horton and Novi and wearing only cutoff jeans. Noticing a cut on the man's leg, the officer offered first aid, a police report said.

At about 12:35, while the officer prepared to get medical supplies the man ran away, the report said.

At 12:49 the police department received a report of a break-in on Grace Street. The homeowner told police he confronted the man with a shotgun, ordered him to leave, and

Merchants take to the streets for annual sale this weekend

Friday and Saturday are bargain days in Northville as downtown merchants hold their annual two-day summer clearance. In addition, a crafts, collectibles and antiques street sale will be held Saturday on Main and Center streets.

Merchants will display sale merchandise in front of their stores from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Friday.

Saturday Main Street will be closed from Wing to Hutton and Center will be closed from Main to Dunlap from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. as 140 vendors set up booths of art, crafts, collectibles and antiques.

Special booths feature the Friends of Northville Library's sale of used books in front of the M.A.G.S. building, a craft sale by the Northville Pom-Pom Squad and a dunk tank run by Northville Jaycees as a benefit.

Del Black, who is serving as sidewalk sale chairman for the Northville Merchants' Association, is being assisted by the Northville Kiwanis Club, John Genitti, Scott Lapham and John Bueter.

"We're just hoping for good weather," Black noted Tuesday. If it rained out Saturday, the sale will be held the following Saturday, Aug. 8. Black said that, in past years, the decision to call off the sale because of rain has been made by 10 a.m.

Black, who has been signing up craftspersons and collectible and antique dealers for street spaces for several weeks, added that he is pleased with the response. Street space is

full, he said, with two thirds of the space taken by craftspersons and artists. The remaining third will have antiques and collectibles dealers.

He added that the general rule is that most collectibles are 50 years old, and antiques are at least 100 years old.

Many excellent craftspersons who have taken space at previous sales will be returning, Black said.

Because of stringent health department and agriculture department regulations, this year Black said he had to turn down organizations and individuals wishing to serve food at the sale.

"The agriculture department asks

that anything sold to the public must be cooked under controlled conditions," Black said, mentioning that the regulation is being enforced locally and also is affecting such events as the Plymouth Fall Festival.

Betty Griffin, president of the Friends of the Library, reported that hundreds of used books, both hard-bound and paperback, will go on sale at 9 a.m. Saturday at the Friends' space at 133 Main west of Center.

The goal of this year's sale is to purchase a computer for the library.

Griffin noted that this year books

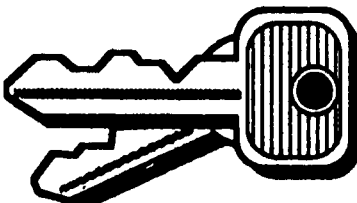

will not be available for purchase before 9 a.m. but will be sold until 5 p.m. Saturday.

"A full range of books is available — from automotive manuals to bestsellers, from children's literature to classics. A large selection of collectibles, books dating to

All hardbound books with the exception of collectibles will be sold for 50 cents and all paperbacks for 25 cents each, or five for \$1. Bargains are available in children's books with the price ranging from five to 25 cents. All collectible books will be priced according to age and condition.

NEWS BRIEFS

CITY APPOINTMENTS — The Northville City Council confirmed two appointments last week. Anne Bureck was reappointed to a three-year term on the Beautification Commission, and Lewis Koppich was appointed to a three-year term on the Board of Zoning Appeals.

SAFETY TOWN DEADLINE — Registration deadline for the Aug. 10-21 session of Safety Town will be 5 p.m. Monday. The nationally recognized safety program for pre-kindergartners is offered by the Northville Community Recreation Department. Registration fees of \$30 a participant are being accepted at the recreation department, 303 W. Main.

Each day the two week safety program looks at a different safety topic, ranging from boating and water safety and bus riding techniques to practicing crossing streets. Visits to the police and fire stations are included.

AYERS SELECTED AS REP — City Council member Carolann Ayers has been appointed to be Northville's representative to the annual meeting of the Michigan Municipal League. The MML convention is scheduled for Sept. 9-11 in Detroit.

TELL ME TRUE — A medal for honesty goes to Barbara O'Brien for her comment during the public hearing for Dun Rovin planned residential unit development.

O'Brien questioned Lawrence Garon about the density at Burroughs Farms, which Garon had presented as an example of what the Dun Rovin development would be like. Garon responded by explaining the differences between Burroughs Farm and Dun Rovin.

"I hope I have answered your question," Garon said. "You've given me a lot of information but didn't answer the question," O'Brien responded, telling him like it was.

NEW OFFICERS — Lee Holland of Northville has been elected treasurer of the Schoolcraft College Foundation. Other officers elected to serve a one-year term include John Landis of Livonia, president, Thomas Tybinka of Plymouth, vice president and Betty Jean Awrey of Farmington Hills, secretary.

PUNCTUAL OFFICIALS — The clock on the wall of the Northville City Council chambers has shown exactly 8 p.m. at the start of the last few council meetings. Even though just before the meeting starts, the clock has read anywhere from 8:05 to 8:10. Council member Paul Folino, who sits just in front of the clock, has taken to moving the hands back to show a correct starting time, then replacing them once the meeting is called to order. "We always start on time," Folino jokes.

County, DNR deny sewer holdup

Refuting comments made July 20 to the Novi City Council by Novi City Manager Edward Kriewall, Wayne County officials said last week they were totally committed to the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley sewer project and to helping Northville, Plymouth and Canton townships work out an agreement with the Ypsilanti Community Utility Authority.

"I think, were you to talk to Mr. Kriewall today, he would be willing to take back some of those comments," said Deputy Wayne County Executive Michael Duggan.

Kriewall's comments were reported in The Novi News July 23.

Kriewall had said "I think what's been going on is Wayne County has been holding up the (North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley) project purposefully to entice the three other Wayne County cities into the project. The DNR has been helping by block-

ing the Ypsilanti expansion permit." Duggan categorically denied any action on the part of the county to hold up either sewer project.

"It's just total hogwash," Duggan said. "I have made it clear and Mr. (Edward) McNamara has made it clear to the three townships that if they want to go to Ypsilanti, we will do anything in our power to help them."

Roy Schramack, DNR surface water quality supervisor for the Detroit district, also denied any action by the DNR to delay or hinder the plans for YCUA expansion.

"The first month (in June) when the question (of YCUA plant expansion) came before the Water Resources Commission, the DNR staff recommended approving expansion. It's difficult to rationalize the feeling that there is some kind of conspiracy given that action," he said.

The three townships have opted out

of the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley project, a 10 community project which would provide sewer service to those communities at the Detroit wastewater treatment plant.

Kriewall indicated that Commerce Township, which originally had sought inclusion in the super sewer project, had wanted to join the current North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley system.

The Novi manager said he was "not happy" with the possibility of Commerce Township's inclusion in the plan, but Duggan said he had not had any serious talks with Commerce Township officials about rejoining the plan.

The three townships — Northville, Plymouth and Canton — would continue to send their contracted flows to Detroit, but had anticipated sending new flows to the Ypsilanti Community Utility Authority facility in Ypsilanti.

Negotiations between the three

townships, which have formed the Western Townships Utility Authority and YCUA have been stalled by the failure of the Michigan Water Resources Commission to allow expansion of the Ypsilanti treatment plant.

The question of the YCUA expansion is tentatively scheduled to appear on the August Water Resources Commission agenda, however, discussion of the expansion was also scheduled for the July meeting but was withdrawn at the request of YCUA officials.

In June, the Commission rejected a staff recommendation that would have allowed YCUA to double its capacity, instead directing the DNR staff to provide further information.

Maurice Breen, WTUA president, said that the three townships have not been kept current on the status of the North Huron Valley/Rouge

Novi manager defends explanation to council of super sewer delays

Novi City Manager Edward Kriewall said he met last Friday with Michael Duggan, deputy Wayne County executive, and that Duggan "confirmed what I reported" (to the Novi City Council July 20).

However, Kriewall said he no longer thought Wayne County had been holding up the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley sewer projects in an attempt to lure Northville, Canton and Plymouth townships back into the project.

Kriewall said Wayne County officials told him they were "getting ready to move ahead with it," referring to the super sewer project.

He added that while he "may have gleaned from Wayne County workers," rather than officials, that the Michigan Department of Natural Resources was blocking expansion of the YCUA plant, he certainly did not mean to imply anything more than that there "was a lot of politics" surrounding the project.

Kriewall said the county had "wanted to wait for the three" com-

munities not currently in the super sewer project, but had now decided to move ahead with the plan as currently outlined.

"They plan to wrap it up prior to Christmas," Kriewall said, referring to cost allocations for the 10 communities currently interested in the regional sewer project.

"The county officials were not happy with the extension of the grant deadline," Kriewall said as it "lets everything slide" but they had decided to "shoot for before Christmas" as the deadline in handing out the cost allocations.

Kriewall said Commerce Township had asked Wayne County about the possibility of joining the regional system but had been told "they were ineligible."

I told them (Commerce Township) they could probably buy any extra capacity from us once the project goes through," he said. Kriewall said the admission of Commerce Township to the group could "jeopardize the whole project."

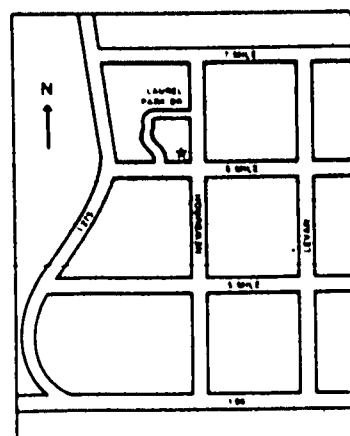

Archaeology society president likes challenging pastime

John Colling says he felt a little surprised to learn that archaeology thrives as a hobby and a profession in southeast Michigan.

"Like a lot of other people I didn't know there were archaeological sites around here," he said, when a friend first offered to take him out to an archaeological site. He and his wife went out, met the person in charge of the operation and learned that this region boasts many important sites.

"He put us right to work and I've been hooked ever since," said Colling, who lives in Northville Township.

So hooked, in fact, that he soon became involved in the Michigan Archaeological Society, a 500-member collection of professional and amateur archaeologists with nine chapters around the state. And this year, his colleagues in the society elected him president of the group.

"(Archaeology) is a frontier of discovery," Colling said. "You have to have some imagination to be a good archaeologist. To pick up something no one has picked up in 1,000 years, or 2,000 years, or 5,000 years — it is more than artifact collecting, it's recreating a lifestyle of a people who had no written history."

Some members of the society enjoy the academic aspects of the field more, while others find the most satisfaction getting out to archaeological sites and doing the work, Colling said. "We do get out in the field and do manage to get our hands dirty," he said.

"It's like any other pastime. If you are a buff, you like to get out with other archaeology buffs," he said. "They are also, generally speaking, one of the nicest groups of people I've ever been associated with."

Many members of the society do not pursue a career in archaeology. Colling spends his weekdays as communications manager for the Troy-based Travel and Tourist Association of Southeast Michigan. But the

presence of "amateurs" in the group does not detract from its work, he said.

"We function as a mix of amateurs and professionals and we try to keep a professional level," he said. Members of the group strive for the highest archaeological integrity when working on sites, he added.

The Michigan Archaeological Society welcomes anyone interested to its meetings, although the group does not usually meet during the summer months. If the interest continues, the prospective archaeologist may be invited to participate in work on an archaeological site, Colling said.

Nearby Michigan Archaeological Society chapters are located in Ann Arbor, Royal Oak and Monroe, anyone interested in learning more about the society may contact Colling through the Travel and Tourist Association at 585-8220.

Piecing together various aspects of a prehistoric people can be very exciting, Colling said. "It's a detective game. You've got to be knowledgeable about the people that lived here," he explained. "It's like a jigsaw puzzle with most of the pieces missing."

"They were amazing people," he continued. "It just amazes me how these people did so well here. And if it wasn't for the invasion of a more modern technology, they'd still be doing fine here."

Colling's interest in archaeology includes the academic aspects as well as the field work. He is presently a master's candidate in anthropology at Wayne State University, and for his thesis is writing an archaeological paper on artifacts discovered at an archaeological site in Clinton Township. He hopes the paper will be published in Michigan Archaeologist, the society's journal.

The society's work is interesting, fun, and substantial, Colling concluded. "There is archaeology in Michigan, and it's important archaeology," he said.

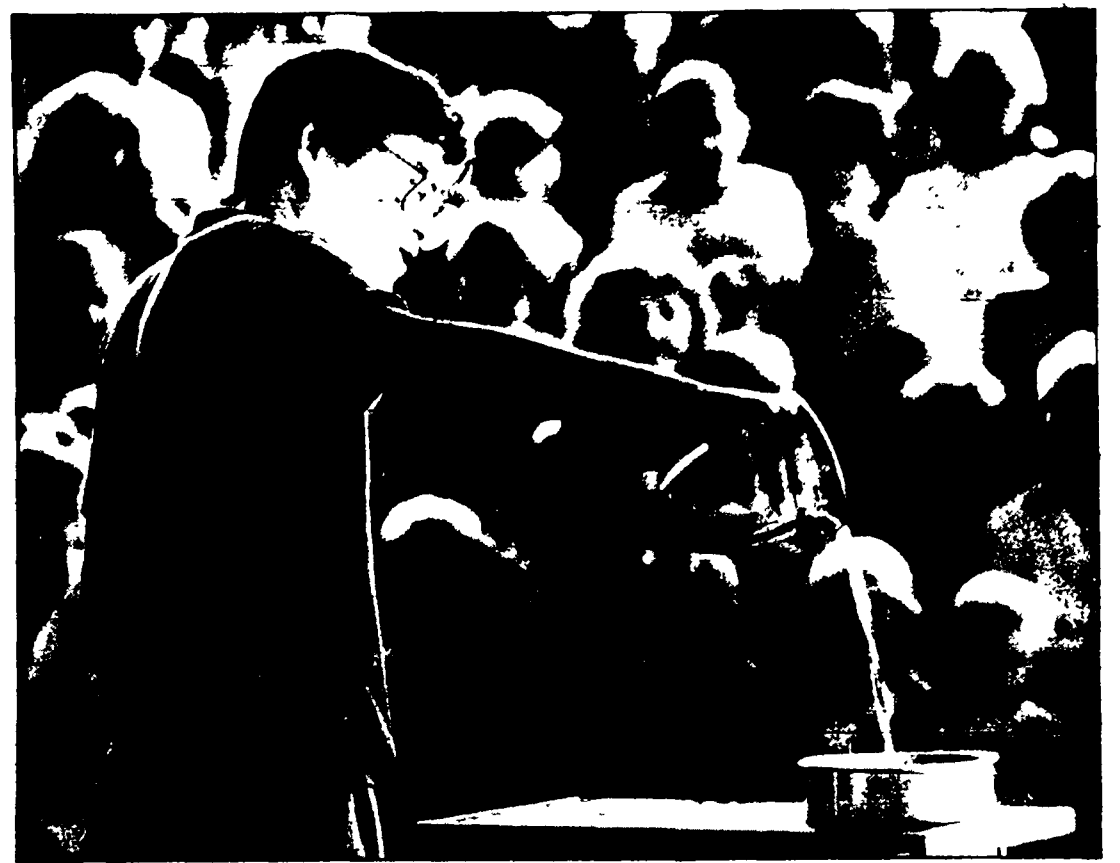

Police Blotters

Township officers investigate party store robbery

Township officers are searching for a white male in his 30s who July 26 robbed the Cap and Cork party store.

Store employees said the man, described as a 5-foot-10, 150 pound blond, entered the store about 5:40 p.m. and picked up a six pack of beer. He took it to the cash register and, when the store employee began to ring it up, the man pulled out an automatic and told the employee to "give me everything you got."

The cashier signalled another employee who was working in the back of the store and the robber then picked up the beer, worth \$4.75, and fled.

Witnesses were able to get a partial license plate as well as the make of the suspect's car as it took off west on Five Mile Road.

Although the description of the man and his vehicle was broadcast to neighboring departments, officers were unable to apprehend the man.

The store employee told in vestigating officer Michael Wildt that the suspect appeared to be intoxicated since his speech, when he made his demands to the cashier was slurred.

ABDUCTION REPORT RESOLVED — An report to city police of an attempted abduction last

month has been determined to be false, police said.

A 21-year-old woman had reported an attempted abduction at about 3 a.m. June 19, when she said a man wearing panty hose over his head pulled a knife on her near Center Street and Eight Mile Road. However, after further conversation with the woman, the story was determined to be a hoax, police said. The woman later admitted the report was false.

TRIAL SET — Frank Blair and Michael Harwood, accused of the armed robbery of a Domino's Pizza manager, are scheduled to go on trial in Wayne County Circuit Court Nov. 12.

The pair was apprehended by township officers after an investigation of the robbery, however, they spent eight months in an Ontario jail after they were convicted of counterfeiting charges in Canada.

INDECENT EXPOSURE ARREST — A man has pled guilty to an indecent exposure charge in connection with a recent incident in the city, Northville police reported.

Richard Joseph Sinda, 22, pled guilty to an indecent exposure Saturday, July 11, in the northwest part of

the city.

A woman reported that a man drove up while she was in the driveway of her home and asked directions to Novi High School, and when she approached the car she saw he was naked. He drove off, but she noted the license number and reported it to the police.

Sinda was arrested and arraigned Friday, July 24, and was scheduled for sentencing Tuesday.

BICYCLES FOUND — Two bicycles were reported found to Northville city police last week.

A Schwinn boy's 10-speed bike was reported found Friday, July 24 at the rear of a business on South Main. A Raleigh bike was found in a front yard and the homeowner told police he left it there several days in case the owner came for it, but he finally reported it found Thursday, June 23.

SMALL CHANGE — A Beck Road resident told township officers that his home was broken into July 25 and four quarters, which were on a kitchen counter, were taken.

Entry to the house was gained by breaking a door jamb, but the homeowner told officers he had repaired it before they arrived on the scene.

BOXED OUT — A North Valley resident told township police officers that a mailbox, nailed to a post outside his home, was stolen for the second time.

According to the police report, the mailbox was taken sometime between July 18 and July 25, when the man returned from a vacation and discovered it missing.

Although police questioned neighbors, no one saw anything unusual, except one neighbor said she noticed the mailbox missing.

SUDDEN STOP — A 25-year-old Canton woman is facing charges of operating a vehicle under the influence of alcohol and failure to keep her own car under control after her car struck a parked car on Silver Spring Drive July 24.

The woman, whom officer John Werth discovered by the side of her car, told the township police officer she had fallen asleep at the wheel and her car struck the parked vehicle.

Werth noted in his report that the woman's speech was slurred and he administered a preliminary breath test. She flew over the 10 limit.

Planning commissioners considered recommending changing the zoning of the two parcels from R-1A, first density residential, to R-3, third density residential use

Commissioner Michael Kowalski said of the applications, "The property adjacent to this is R-3 except for the school. They know it will be R-3 if it's rezoned and they don't have any objection to it."

The rezoning of the first parcel, which would allow the sale of a small piece of land to the party store while the apartment complex remains within allowed density, passed the commission 6-0 with little discussion

On the second parcel, Mett W. Mett told the commission that he has an agreement with the Board of Education to buy the strip of land contingent on the rezoning. With the additional land, he said, he could then increase the size of a planned

condominium development on the land from 11 units to one or two more. Commission Chairperson Jerry Mittman said that the requested rezoning would allow a total of 18 units on Mett's land, or 16 under a zoning ordinance revision which has been recommended to City Council but not yet formally considered

Mett said that whatever density is present on the land, the development would be high quality. "High density does not mean there will be a tenement or a low quality project," he said.

Members of the commission briefly discussed the possibility of rezoning a part of the requested site, but eventually voted 5-1 in favor of the original request. John Hardin voted against the request, but without comment.

Commissioner David Totten said, "I would just as soon let Mr. Mett go ahead, and trust his judgment, and let him do a decent job of it."

Final authority in all rezoning applications rests with the City Council.

New Dial-A-Ride number starts Saturday

Beginning Aug 1 senior citizens and handicapped residents of the city and township of Northville will be calling a new Dial-A-Ride telephone number as Alternative Community Transportation begins servicing the community.

The new Dial-A-Ride number will be 474-6222.

In announcing the change from Northwest Transport, Fran Yoakam, director of the City of Northville Housing Commission, noted that she was pleased the new service includes eligible handicapped persons as well as senior citizens 60 and older.

Alternative Community Transportation will be servicing the communities of Northville, Northville Township and Plymouth Farmington, Farmington Hills and Livonia's Farming will begin in September.

To receive reduced fares, riders must have ID cards which will be provided by ACT.

The reduced fare rides will be provided only within the six participating communities and to health facilities in Plymouth Township; to the Northwest Skill Center and the Tri-City Therapeutic Center in Westland. Eligible persons wishing to travel outside these areas must pay the full fare of \$1 a mile.

A flat rate of \$1 will be charged for the first four miles traveled. After four miles, the charge will be 50 cents a mile.

Shared ride fares will be available for two or more persons who are picked up at a common location and are traveling to a common location. Each rider will pay \$1 for the complete trip. The number of miles traveled will not be a factor.

After reaching a destination, ACT drivers will wait up to 15 minutes, if necessary, at no additional charge. After the first 15 minutes, the passenger will pay \$2 for each additional 15 minute period.

The service will operate from 6 a.m. until 11 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 7 a.m. until 9 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

The 474-6222 ACT number should be called to schedule transportation.

Senior transportation will be on demand. Handicapped transportation (with a wheelchair lift) should be scheduled 24 hours in advance.

The service notes that the sooner a reservation is placed, the better the person's chances of getting to a destination on time.

There is no membership fee for the user.

ACT says the service response time will be within 30 minutes of designated pick up time. Riders should be ready 15 minutes before appointed time and the system will try to pick up within 30 minutes of appointed time.

This program is run exclusively for seniors and handicappers. ACT notes

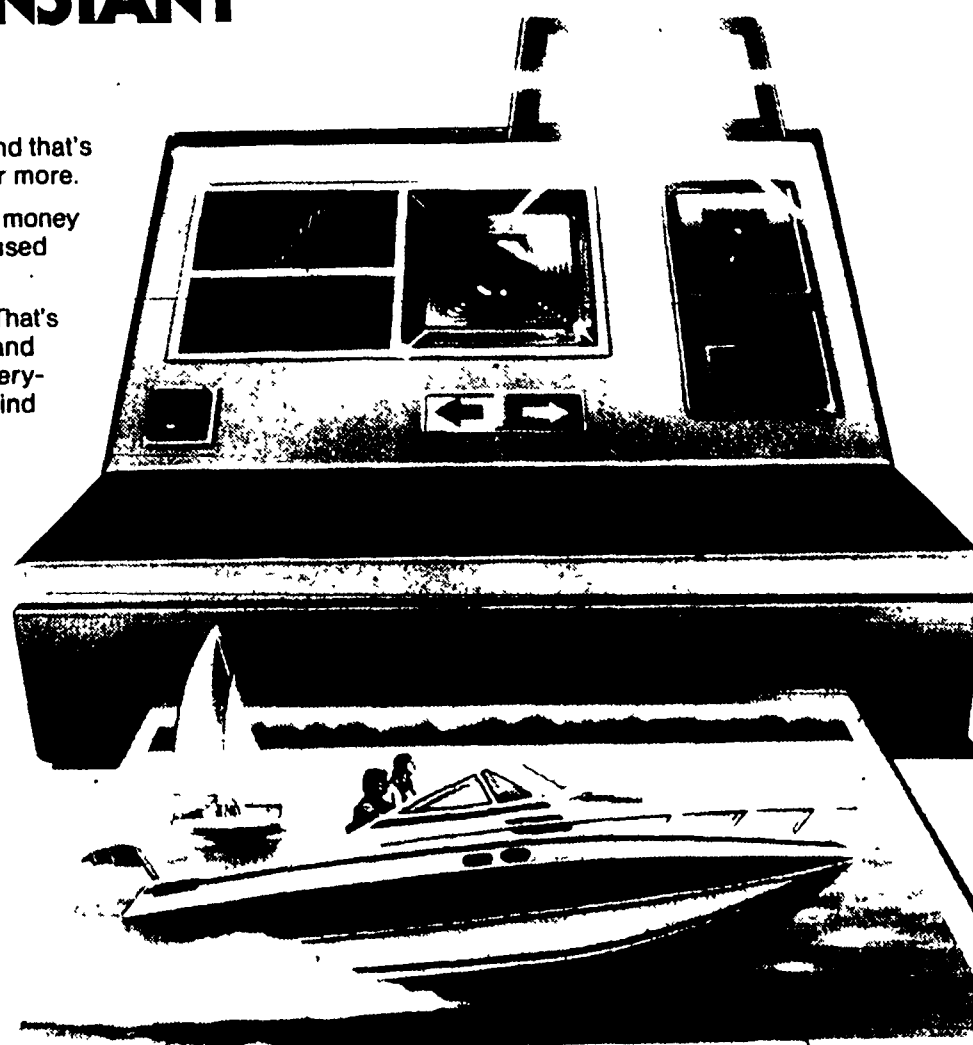

Northville's Bluegrass Benefit

Sunny, warm weather, good music and a laidback, hand-clapping crowd were the ingredients for the successful, 11th annual Northville Folk and Bluegrass Festival Sunday afternoon at Ford Field.

All of the proceeds from the benefit, which went from 1 to 9 p.m., will go to the Huntington's Disease Foundation of America.

"It was very positive, very positive," said Tom Rice, organizer of the festival. "We had 900 people throughout the day, with about 400 people there at one time."

The audience had to pay a minimum of \$6 to gain admittance, while senior citizens paid \$3 and those under 12 were charged \$1.

"We took in a net of about \$8,000," Rice said. "All of the money will go to the Huntington's Disease Foundation, not for research. The federal government already spends thousands of dollars on research."

Some of the acts at the festival included Josh White, Jr., Michigraass, Motor City Grass and Neil Woodward.

Rice said the festival attracted two sorts of groups: fans who enjoy the music and those who went to help the foundation.

Rice said he would like to see more Northville residents at the festival. "It could be better represented," Rice said. "I don't expect anybody to come. I send flyers in all directions. We had 15,000 flyers made up."

Putting on an event like this takes a lot of teamwork and support from the community and others. This year marked a point in the history of the festival where Rice received 100 percent support from those around him.

"This is the first year that we had no expenses," he said. "Even if we had half of the crowd that we did Sunday, we would have still made twice as much as we did last year."

The list of those who contributed to the festival is a long one. For starters, the city of Northville let Rice use Ford Field for free. Commercial interests backed Rice as well.

"Budweiser co-sponsored the event," Rice said. "So they paid for the PA system and the stage, which cost \$1,000."

M-Care Health Center in Northville paid for the postage on the mailing of flyers telling of the festival and the Northville Jaycees donated \$300 for the event.

"They (Jaycees) also handed the concessions," Rice said. "They will donate 25 percent of their proceeds from concession sales to the foundation."

As for next year, Rice plans on having the festival again.

"It's starting to be a lot easier," he said. "I almost ended up in the hospital one time, now it almost runs itself."

The 900 people who watched and heard the folk and bluegrass bands perform ranged in different ages, sexes, races and amounts of hair and clothes worn.

Many people were at the festival for the very first time.

Eric Frizzell, 34, and Kimberly

Decker, 33, of Redford, were one such couple. They were handed a festival flyer last week on Eight Mile and Southfield Road as they were buying flowers. They decided to go to the musical event and were glad Sunday that they did.

They planned on staying at the festival for at least six hours. "This is a good time to get some sun," Frizzell said, as he lay in the sun, shirtless, with a piece of paper over his eyes listening to the music.

"I always have a good time here," Mike Clark, 34, of Garden City, said. He used to live in Northville but has lived in Garden City for the last four years. He has been a regular visitor to the musical event. His friend, Judie Rickel, 25, was at the festival for her first time. "I'm really enjoying the music," Rickel said.

Bill and Amy Snyder of Redford Township were visiting the festival for their third year straight.

"We plan on staying here to 9 p.m.," Bill said. "We plan on being here next year, too."

strictly on statistics because we feel it can give a false impression."

Many factors may contribute to higher crime rates, he said, including higher population density, younger population, more mobile population, effective mass transit, poor economic conditions, poor family conditions; a less effective police force; a weak criminal justice system; a lack of citizen involvement, and even good weather.

"If you were in Nome, Alaska, in February, you wouldn't be keen about going out and robbing a bank. If you were in a moderate climate, it would give you a chance to be out and about," Anthony said.

The effect of these variables "is an unknown quantity," he said. "To compare a Novi with a Northville, or to compare Saginaw to Detroit, based strictly on numbers, is not a true representation of crime in the community," he concluded.

The figures are used for such purposes as research and budget determination, Anthony said.

Li Gary Batzloff agreed with Anthony's assessment.

"In some ways, you can attribute Northville's low robbery figures to a lot of good fortune combined with the routine work by our officers," he said.

Batzloff said that because the township is not directly accessible to the freeway system, it makes it more difficult for people to get off the freeway and find themselves in the township.

He added that township officers also spend a lot of their shift work, particularly in the night and early morning hours on patrol.

"We try to give businesses extra attention, and we put as many officers as possible on the road," he said.

The process used to report the year-end totals involves a standard, computerized form filled out by local departments and sent to the Michigan State Police in Lansing, Anthony said. From there the figures go to Washington for final compilation. The FBI issues the Uniform Crime Report each July for the preceding year, he said.

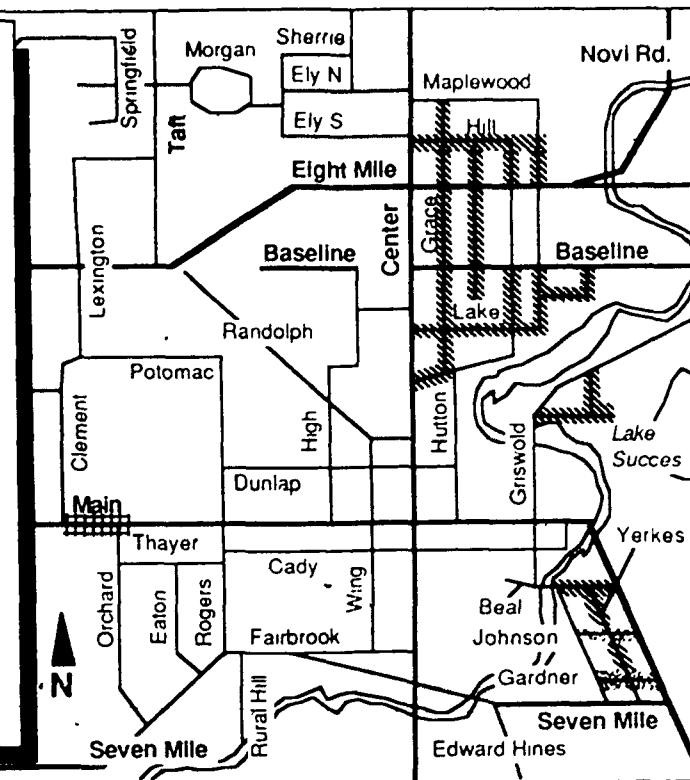

\$12,000 of Oakland surplus may return to city

Although the City of Northville is well into a major street repair program funded by a special citywide two-mill tax, the city may soon receive an additional \$11,985 for further road improvements.

Oakland County ended 1986 budget year with a surplus of over \$6 million, and county officials have spent several months debating the uses of the money. Rejecting a recommendation from county executive Daniel

Murphy to use the money for several different projects, the county Board of Commissioners voted Thursday, July 23, to return \$5 million of the money to the 61 municipalities within the county to go toward road im-

provements.

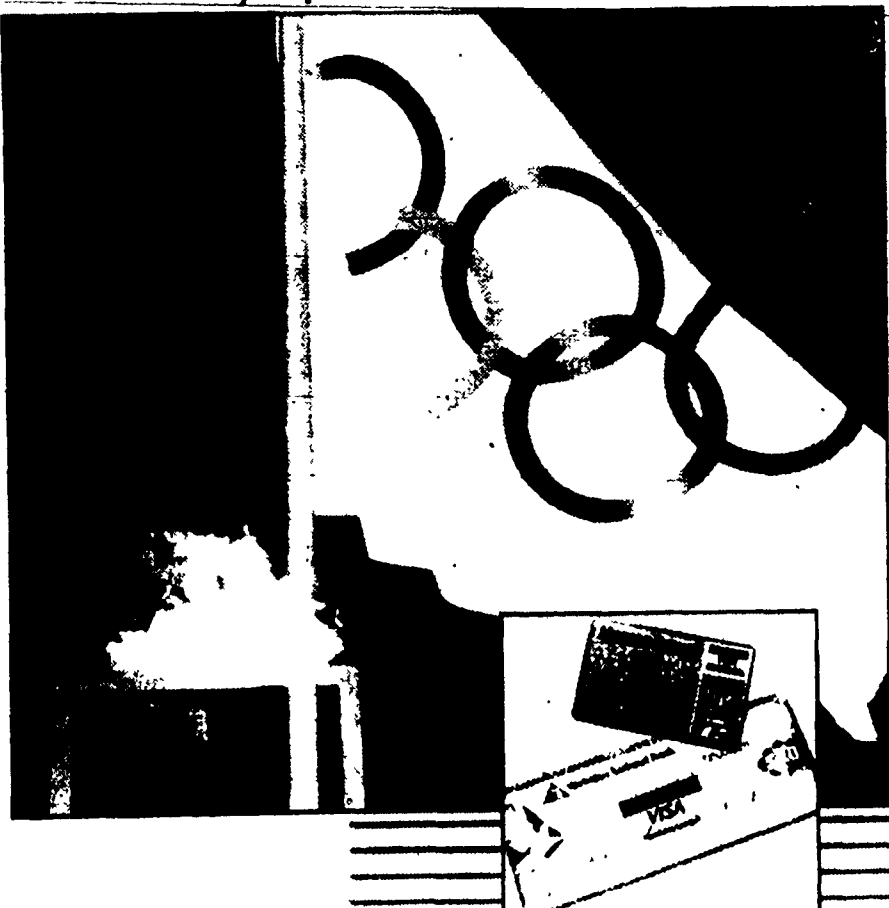

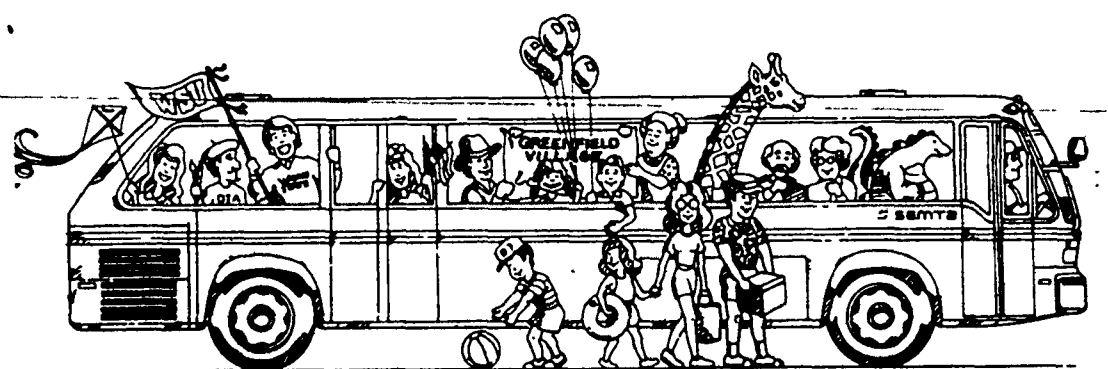

County, DNR deny stalling super sewer, YCUA

Valley project, which has become known as "super sewer."

Breen said he was not surprised by Kriewall's comments. "I think we are at a stage where anybody would like us back in the project to help pay for it," Breen said.

"Beyond that," Breen said, "I keep getting calls from people about what Mr. Schramack is doing and about what everybody else is doing. I can't respond for them."

But Georgina Goss, Northville Township supervisor and a WTUA commissioner, said, "Off the top of my head, I am just delighted to find out from Oakland County what has been holding up our project."

"I am pleased that the Novi city manager has told us exactly what has been happening, because I thought our project was a clean water plan and had merit," she said.

Breen noted that the three townships were continuing talks with YCUA and would not speculate about whether the WTUA communities would re-enter the super sewer project if YCUA expansion were denied.

"I learned something from the Iran hearings," Breen said. "I learned not to answer speculation."

Kriewall also told the Novi council that Wayne County had been hopeful the three townships would swing back to the super sewer program, but Duggan and Dearborn Heights Mayor Lyle Van Houten, whose city is still in the super sewer program, denied there was any intention or hope on the part of the county that the three communities would return to the project.

"The county is going ahead with plans for the sewer without the three townships," Duggan said.

Van Houten, whose city experi-

enced two major floods in the past month, said although Dearborn Heights officials had been in constant communication with the county, the subject of the WTUA communities rejoining the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley project had not been discussed.

"The project has already been delayed because the three townships have dropped out and the sewer system had to be downsized," Van Houten said. "What we are interested in now is getting some action and the project built."

Van Houten said it was his understanding Commerce Township would not be included in the project.

"Commerce Township was dropped from the plan a number of years ago after it was determined that their inclusion would not help clean up the problems in the Rouge River, but rather would help them grow," he

said

The amended facilities plan for the 10-community project are currently being reviewed by DNR staff and proponents of the project are optimistic that staff review will be completed in time to bring the project back to the individual communities still part of the plan.

In addition to Dearborn Heights and Novi, super sewer participants include the City of Northville, the City of Plymouth, Livonia, Westland, Wayne, Inkster, Romulus and Redford Township.

Wixom, which initially was included in the project, has dropped out of the project, mainly because it was facing federal sanctions and could not wait for action on super sewer.

But the three WTUA communities are rapidly approaching their own deadlines. The DNR has withheld permits for five projects in Nor-

thville and Plymouth townships, citing a lack of available sewerage capacity in the western Wayne County system.

In Northville Township, the Haggerty Road sewer has been put on hold, despite completion of engineering drawings and final site plan approval given to Kirco Development

Company to construct the first phase

of a 600,000-square foot office park. Planning Commission approval was given conditional upon the county and DNR issuing the required permits.

Also put on hold are Ward Evangelical Presbyterian Church's plans for a new worship center.

the man ran north on Grace. He had apparently entered by breaking the lock on a screen door.

Then, a homeowner on Maplewood — about two blocks from the Grace home — heard breaking glass and found the same man pressed against the outside south wall of the house, police said. The kitchen window had

been broken.

The man told the homeowner he was an "auxiliary police officer" and then fled, the report said.

Later, the man was seen inside the Novi city limits and a citizen gave him a ride at Nine Mile and Center. A Northville police officer saw Crowell riding in a car, and he was arrested at Center and Galway, near the Nor-

thville/Novi city limits, police said.

While in the back seat of the police car, Crowell began bashing his head against the plexiglass partition separating the front from the rear seats, police said. He cracked the glass and cut his head, the report said.

Police took Crowell to the Providence Hospital satellite facility in

Novi where he was treated for his injuries. He was charged with breaking and entering an occupied dwelling with the intent to commit larceny, and with malicious destruction of property over \$100, pleading not guilty to both counts.

As of Monday, he was in the Oakland County jail on \$45,000 cash bond, police said.

Local artist's prize-winning poster design earns trip to Japan

Kaleen Valentine is a realist. She said that she knows an art degree and 50 cents will buy a cup of coffee, but, she also knows that a good idea, properly executed, will bring a trip to Japan.

Valentine, a 1987 graduate of Northville High School and the Livonia Career Center, won a week-long trip to Japan for herself and her immediate family when her poster was selected by Northwest Airlines during a promotion of the airline's new Detroit-Tokyo service.

Valentine's poster, along with 27 others designed by Detroit area high school students, will be on exhibit at the Fisher Building Arcade through Aug. 13.

"In a way, I always thought that I would win," Valentine said. "But when I really started work on the project, I had doubts. But, then I thought, even if I didn't win the trip to Japan, I gained a lot in experience. Then, I found out I won, and got really excited."

Valentine, who spent three hours a day her senior year at Northville High School and the other three hours in Livonia, said her teacher at the career center told the students in the class about the contest.

"He asked who wanted to go to Japan, and three of us started working on ideas," she said. As the final deadline drew closer, though, one of the students was offered a full-time job and the other just decided not to enter, Valentine said.

"That was when the real work

began. My teacher, Ed Hubert, acted as an art director and I was the commercial artist. It was just like working a real job in an advertising agency, even to the point where Mr.

Hubert kept rejecting my ideas," she said.

But Valentine, who ran her own Christmas card business as a high

school junior, persevered, finally hitting upon the idea of a bonsai tree and a Japanese temple in a diamond to represent Tokyo and the Renaissance Center and an oak tree

in another diamond to represent Detroit. In two additional diamonds, the bonsai tree changes to the oak. The poster is captioned, "cultivate new ideas."

"When I finally came up with the final idea, there were only two days left before the deadline," Valentine said. "I really worked hard, cutting out big squares, getting the paper and trees just right. I can tell you, my hand felt like it was ready to fall off."

Her hand didn't fall off, and just before she left on a spring break vacation, Hubert called her to tell her she had left something at the center.

"I knew something was up, since I had brought everything home. But he insisted," Valentine said. It took me a long time to ask him what I left."

What she had to pick up were the four round-trip tickets to Japan.

"My friends always appreciated my work, but this is the first time someone else appreciated it," she said.

She, her parents and twin sister, Shelly, a writer, leave for Tokyo Aug. 2.

When they return, Valentine said, she'll begin getting ready for Michigan State University, where she intends to study commercial art and advertising.

But she is one step ahead of the game. She already has a portfolio, and has succeeded at her first project.

Valentine's poster, along with those designed by other award winners, are available for \$5 at the Poster Gallery in the Fisher Building.

Proceeds from the sale of the posters will benefit the Boys and Girls Clubs of Southeastern Michigan.

No more politics

It is past time to put an end to the politics of sewers

For too long the issue has permeated city and suburban life without a resolution any closer today than when the project dubbed super sewer was conceived in the late 1950s as a means to solve capacity problems for Detroit and its suburbs, and to help clean up the Rouge River

Who knows how many careers have flourished and faltered while the super sewer grew from a metropolitan regional concept, encompassing all the communities who use the Detroit Wastewater Treatment Plant and about the Rouge or Detroit rivers to its current incarnation of a 10-municipality sewer. And who knows how many more men and women will have had a hand in the project before it becomes more than plans

No one has any doubt that something soon must be done to help ease the continuing pollution of the Rouge River. And no one doubts that the current North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley system has gained favor in Novi, in Dearborn Heights and in a number of communities who have committed to the project

But there can be no doubt, either, that Northville Township is adamant that the North Huron Valley project will not meet its needs. Nor will it meet the needs or concerns of Plymouth or Canton townships

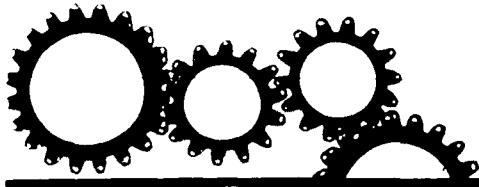
Perhaps it is time to put the matter to rest. Let the communities who wish to participate in the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley project make their intentions known once and for all. Let those communities who have other options pursue those options.

The preliminary plans for the Western Townships Utility Authority system, which will end up at the Ypsilanti Community Utility Authority, can become a reality in less time than it has taken the planners of the super sewer to get a plan (which everyone agrees to) to put a pipe into the ground.

The politics of who is in the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley system have delayed, postponed, and nearly killed the project in the past two years. It is too important a project for growing and existing communities to delay any longer.

In a perfect world, politics would not be the sole criteria for whether or not to participate in a plan that has been shown to be both necessary and economical. But this is not a perfect world, and, already delays caused only by politics, have raised the cost of the super sewer project to those who remain in the project's boundaries

A delay has reduced the participation of the federal government in the project from 75 percent of the regional costs to a current 55 percent share. And further delays, given the penchant of the current administration toward reducing Clean Water Act funds, can only mean the U.S. government will share in even less of the inflating price tag



DEVELOPMENT

Individual communities will still be responsible for paying the cost of local improvements, improvements that are long overdue. For too long towns have not paid attention to sewers beyond their own borders, and, unless there has been a backup, even within their boundaries.

That neglect has led to even more pollution in an overburdened waterway that most experts concede will be able to support aquatic life only if drastic measures are taken. Everyone shared in creating the problem; everyone is responsible for sharing in the solution.

Today, it is apparent that the problem extends beyond the metropolitan Detroit area. Already involved is the State of Michigan, which must make a decision as to whether to allow YCUA expansion and risk turning Willow Creek or Belleville Lake into another Rouge River.

But we have come a long way since the combined sewers of the downriver and older communities were built. Technology has made it possible to prevent the rape of more rivers and waterways, should we choose to use modern designs and methods.

Technology has also made it possible to link the Detroit plant with its suburban customers, but politics have driven people farther apart.

The Detroit treatment plant, because of its age and because of lack of care, is overburdened. It cannot and does not provide tertiary treatment, but, were money to be spent, it could be modified to handle the flows brought to it by the growing metropolitan communities.

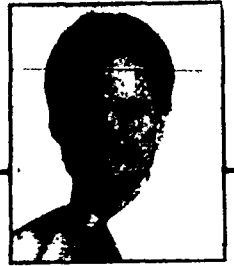
But someone will have to pay for that renovation, and that someone will be the western suburbs. Because Detroit's tax base is dwindling, its taxpayers cannot pick up the tab for the sewer treatment plant. But the suburbs can, and, with the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley proposal have shown a willingness to share in the costs of renovation.

So what is the problem? It seems that each time a new super sewer proposal is put forth, everyone scampers around to decide whether or not to participate. Each community looks over its shoulder to make sure that no one is paying less for the project and no one is being overcharged. Enough, already.

Put the pipes in the ground, let the developers who are chomping at the bit to build in the growing suburbs share in the development and the cost of that development and put the regional sewer in the ground.

Apparently almost everyone wants prisons — except those communities in southeast Michigan which already have them and feel they do not benefit their residents. While the state Department of Corrections decides where to locate the prisons that almost everyone agrees are needed, in Wayne County the Health and Human Services Committee is deciding where to place youthful offenders.

In the July 9 issue of The Record I related that the Whittemore City Council was making a last ditch bid for a prison, offering to accept a maximum security prison and to provide a municipal sanitary treatment plant and a water supply system to serve the site. In a lead story in the Iosco County News Herald, it was estimated that the prison would provide from 250 to 300 additional jobs, jobs much needed in the Whittemore area about 160 miles north of us between West Branch and Tawas City.

The community did not get the nod for the prison.

However, it was not alone in seeking a maximum security prison. In Cheboygan citizens were polled recently to determine if

they favored the Cheboygan County commissioners actively seeking a maximum security prison somewhere in the county. Even closer to our area, a July 22 front-page story in the Genesee County Herald noted that Genesee County commissioners were considering seeking an informational meeting with the state Department of Corrections about building a prison in Genesee County similar to one that had opened in Lapeer County.

Of course, the reason for the interest is economic. While this area has its share of prisons with the Scott Regional Facility located in Northville Township and Phoenix and Western Wayne Correctional facilities located in Plymouth, they do not provide any jobs to speak of for Novi, Northville or Plymouth residents. That probably would not be the situation in the communities mentioned.

The presentation recently made to the Wayne County Health and Human Services Committee and invited juvenile judges is most interesting in view of the department of corrections' philosophy of locating prisons close to the families of those who would be incarcerated.

The presentation was made by a camp in Concordville, Pa., which houses youthful offenders from 14 other Michigan communities. Wayne County Commission chairman Arthur Carter estimated that the proposal being considered would cost less than to place the youths in a youth camp in Michigan. At \$73.50 a day charged by the Pennsylvania camp, the county was estimated to be able to save \$750,000 a year. Camp officials said they could accept up to 50 youths from the county.

Granted action has not been taken on the proposal, the fact that the committee has no qualms about considering sending youths hundreds of miles east is amazing to me. Apparently having family nearby is not a consideration.

I do not know what kind of a program the Pennsylvania camp provides or whether it is a good idea, but I do know the philosophy has to be vastly different from that of the Department of Corrections. I'm still hoping our legislators will look at proposals from communities which would benefit economically from having prisons or youth camps in their part of the state. No one else seems to be.

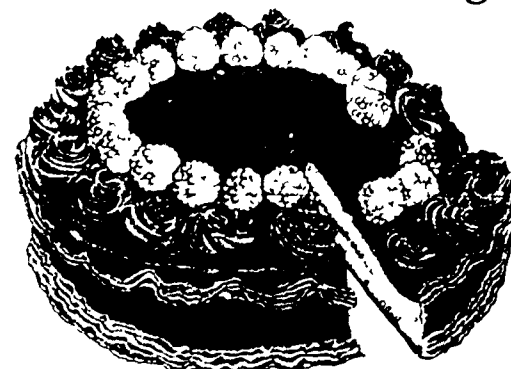

Briningstool to lead East unit

It's been nearly nine months since Tony Briningstool put on the pads and played some high school football. On Aug. 1 at Michigan State's Spartan Stadium, Tony will finally end his brilliant prep career and usher in his college days along with 80 of Michigan's top graduating seniors from last season.

Briningstool, Northville's 6-foot 5, 225-pound all-verything linebacker has been invited and will compete in the prestigious 1987 Michigan High School East West All Star Football Game. Kickoff is scheduled for 1:35 p.m.

"I'm very excited," Briningstool said. "Back when I was a junior, I watched the All-Star game and I thought 'this is where I want to be in a year.' It was one of my goals to make this team and play in this game."

The seventh annual event will feature 40 players on each squad — 18 offensive, 16 defensive, one kicker, one punter and four at-large. Both teams will have a minimum of eight players from Class A schools, six from Class B, four from Class C and two from Class D.

Briningstool is the only player to represent this area, although South Lyon mentor Bob Scheloske is a member of the East team coaching staff. The Northville native will be a member of the East squad, which will feature players from Wayne, Oakland, Monroe, St. Clair, Lapeer, Sanilac, Macomb, Huron and Tuscola counties. This area represents 229 high schools and approximately 269,300 students.

The West unit includes nominees from all of the other counties in the state representing 418 schools and approximately 277,900 students. No high school may have more than one player in the game. The contest is promoted and funded by the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association, Lakeshore Marketing Association and General Motors Parts Division. It is also scheduled to be televised by the Pro Am Sports System (PASS) with announcers Ray Lane and Jim Brandstatter.

Briningstool traveled to East Lansing on July 23 to begin 10 days of workouts, conditioning, practicing and scrimmaging prior to the big game. He will be housed in a dormitory along with the rest of his East squad teammates.

Briningstool will be playing his college ball at MSU and, because the game is played in East Lansing, he sees it as a big advantage.

"It's a big advantage for me," he pointed out. "It's fun because it will be my first game at Spartan Stadium. We'll practice in the stadium and the indoor practice facility for 10 days so it will definitely

give me a good idea about the facilities and help me get familiarized with the area."

Briningstool will be one of three inside linebackers on the East unit, and the three will be rotated in and out. That means that Tony will likely see a lot of playing time, but he isn't worried about injuries due to the nine-month layoff.

"It's been a while since I played but I'm very excited to get back out there. About this time of the year, I always get anxious to play again."

"I'm not worried about injuries at all because since May I've been following a strict summer workout program including running and weight lifting. I feel in good shape and strong. The only players who need to worry are the ones who've been taking it easy this summer."

In all, three Northville players (including Briningstool) have competed in this event during the past seven years. Steve Schrader was a member of the East squad in 1982 before going on to college ball at Miami (Ohio). Two years later, lineman Greg Wendel made the key block that enabled the East to score the winning touchdown in '84.

"Tony is really excited about playing — he's acting like a little kid in a candy shop," Northville Coach Darrel Schumacher said. "I think this can prepare Tony for the coming season mentally and physically, and it will give him a chance to compete against the top players in the state. It should give him an idea of the caliber of play in the Big Ten."

Entering this year's competition, the East All-Stars hold a 4-2 advantage in victories. Briningstool knows it is supposed to be a fun game, but he also knows it is very competitive.

"It's a serious game, but it is a lot of fun," he said. "It's an honor to play in the game — it's kind of like the Super Bowl for high school football."

"I'm going to do the very best I can — I want to help make it 5-2."

Caesars dumps Holzer to second

Tom Holzer Ford controlled its own destiny. The Northville entry in the Livonia Collegiate Baseball League (LCBL) was poised to capture its first league title ever — but something went wrong.

The LCBL defending champions, Little Caesars, also controlled their own fate, and when destinies collided three times last week, Caesars came out on top to capture their second league title in as many years.

As the final week of the regular season unfolded, it was a two-team race, with Holzer and Caesars locked in a season-long battle. Only a half-game separated the two, but a doubleheader sweep by Caesars (5-2 and 4-3) in a head-to-head confrontation on July 22 put the Northville team in serious trouble. Holzer gained a brief reprieve with a 13-7 victory over Ann Arbor Wendys on July 24, but all mathematical possibilities were exhausted when Caesars wrapped up the regular season with an intense 7-6 win in 12 innings over a reeling Holzer squad.

The LCBL playoffs got under way yesterday (July 29, after Record deadline) with Holzer tackling Walters and Caesars going against Wendys. The losers will meet in the consolation game tomorrow (July 31) at 5:30 p.m. followed by the championship game between the winners at 8 p.m.

In the opener on July 22, Mark Coburn outdualed Holzer starter Dan Kopitzke. The key hit for Caesars came on a Mike Looney two-run homer in the sixth off Kopitzke, which put Holzer into a 4-0 hole. The locals fought back with a pair of runs in the bottom of the inning on hits by Paul Newitt and Tom Cotter, but Caesars added an insurance run in the seventh.

Kopitzke fanned four, walked two and gave up eight hits, but the Holzer defense provided little support, com-

mitting five errors.

In the nightcap, Holzer scored a run in the top of the seventh to knot the score at 3-3, but Caesars came back with a single run in the bottom of the inning to pull out the win. Winning pitcher Tom Liss struck out eight while loser Gary Zwolinski walked five.

The Northville entry got back on track on July 24 with the win over Wendys. Scott Peterson paced the attack with three hits and two runs batted in, Kevin Ritter added three RBIs (including a three-run homer), and Eric Engel drove in three. Starter Larry Wendt retired 12 straight batters, including five strike outs, and gained the win in relief of Cotter.

The last chance for a regular season title eluded Holzer last Sunday as Caesars scored an unanswered run in the top of the 12th inning to pull out a tension-filled 7-6 win in extra-innings. Zwolinski pitched the whole game, but suffered the loss despite a valiant effort.

Ritter went 2-for-5 on the day including a dramatic two-out single that kept the game alive for Holzer in the 10th. Steve Merriman, Newitt, Tom Dowd and Wendt all had two hits in the game. In addition, Newitt stole home to complete a successful double-steal in the 11th inning to tie the score at 6-6.

The nightcap against Wendys didn't have any effect on the standings, but that didn't stop Brett Loomis from hurling a curfew-shortened no-hitter. Holzer went on to win the five-inning game 1-0 on a Dowd RBI in the fifth as Holzer topped Wendys for the eighth time this season.

Novi gymnast battles back against injuries

To keep track of Barry Muzbeck's college gymnastics career, you almost need to be an orthopedist.

The Novi resident and former Wall Lake Western gymnast has been on a full-ride scholarship at Big Ten powerhouse Ohio State University for two years now, but she has never really been healthy yet as a Buckeye. Muzbeck left the high school ranks as one of the most successful gymnasts in Michigan high school history in 1985. That year she dominated any and all competitors by sweeping first place honors in four events at the Michigan High School Athletics Association state championship meet.

During her high school years, Muzbeck had her share of injuries, twice requiring surgery on an ailing right foot, but she left Western as a great champion. With her sights set on the 1988 Olympics, Muzbeck tried to qualify for the U.S. National team in the summer of 1985, but disaster struck again. During an early qualifying session, Barry landed hard and solid on her right foot and the force caused two small bones in her ankle to separate.

The injury continued to puzzle doctors for many months. At first they gave Muzbeck crutches and told her to keep off the foot. Later came a cast, but nothing seemed to work. As a last resort, a small screw was put into her ankle to hold the two bones together and that's the way she arrived in Columbus in the fall of '85.

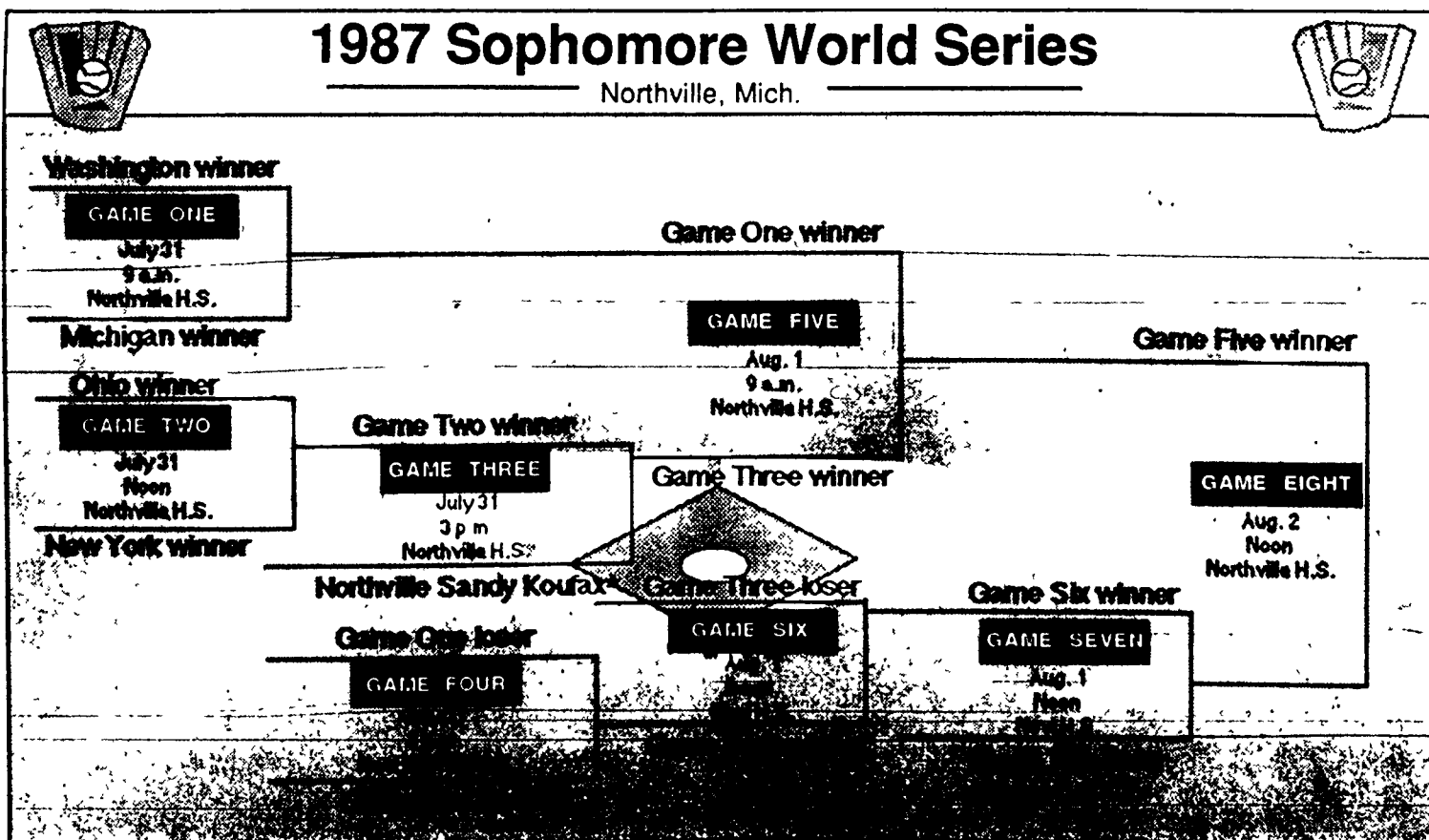
During her freshman season, Barry experienced more pain in the ankle, so doctors took the screw out. They told her not to compete in any events that would put further stress on the ankle, so Barry was left to participate in just one event — the balance beam. Despite the injury, Muzbeck excelled on the beam her first year and even set a school record of 9.7 in the event.

"It was frustrating as a freshman because I just finished a great high school career but once I got to Ohio State, I was only able to compete in one event," she explained. "It was real hard on me."

Muzbeck competed in the beam and floor exercise on occasion during the season but Buckeye Coach Larry Cox was hesitant to use her in fear of aggravating an injury. The highlight of the season came at the NCAA Regional Championships when Barry was a medalist on the balance beam with an impressive second place.

Muzbeck is currently taking summer classes at OSU and continuing to train for her junior season with the team. With the graduation of several top performers, Cox is now counting on Barry for a solid season in all four events — as long as she can remain healthy.

"I haven't been injured for quite a while so I'm hoping nothing will come up — but you never know," Barry said from her apartment in Columbus. "Right now I feel healthy and I don't have any chronic pains — so far, everything is going great."

Northville squads gear up for tourneys

In 1983, Northville hosted its first National Amateur Baseball Federation (NABF) World Series, and this year the city is preparing to host the event for the fifth straight time.

The NABF Junior Division World Series for 15-16 year olds was the city's first in '83. Previously, Northville was the host city for several American Amateur Baseball Congress (AABC) and NABF regional tournaments. 1983 marked the first time the city had requested and been granted the opportunity to host such a prestigious tournament. Regional winners participating in the tourney included Bowling Green, Ohio; Long Island, N.Y.; Plymouth, Mich.; Baltimore, Md. and Louisville, Ky. In the championship game that year, the Bayside Yankees (representing Long Island) defeated Miamisburg, Ohio, 12-11 for the championship.

Northville has been the site for the Junior World Series ever since. The 1987 series will get under way on Aug. 6 and will continue through the double-elimination tournament for four days.

Last year's series saw the Bayside Yankees capture their second World Championship in four years with a 14-6 victory over the Victoria Fire

Fighters of British Columbia, Canada. The Yankees put together an awesome display of offense and defense, just like their namesakes from the Bronx, en route to a five-game unbeaten streak in the tourney.

In light of the outstanding performance by the community in the Junior World Series, Northville was selected as the site for last year's Sophomore World Series (age 13-14), and the event will be held in Northville again this year, starting July 31 and continuing through Aug. 2. Last year, A-1 Transfer from Renton, Wash., came back from a fourth-round loss to grab the '86 crown with a win over Huber Heights, Ohio, in the finals.

The Northville High School field is also playing host to the NABF Senior World Series (players age 16-18), for the right to represent Michigan in the Senior World Series. The regional began last Tuesday (July 28) and includes the following teams from Berkeley, Southgate, Detroit and Clintondale and Northville's Connie Mack squad, the hosts.

The winner of the Regional will represent Michigan at the Senior World Series beginning Aug. 6 in Youngstown, Ohio. All games will be played at the Northville High School diamond at 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. nightly. Tentatively, this double-elimination tournament is slated for play through today (July 30) but will likely extend into the

weekend.

Northville Coach Ed Harp picked up a pair of pitchers for the tournament, as allowed by NABF rules. The new additions to the team include left handed pitcher Todd Griggers of Westland and righty Danny Bell of Windsor.

The NABF was the first amateur baseball organization in the United States. It was originally called the National Amateur Baseball Association and was organized at a meeting in Louisville in 1914. The first championship tournament was played in 1915 at Brookside Park in Cleveland, and it drew over 100,000 spectators.

The name of the organization was changed to the National Baseball Federation in 1916, the group adopted its first constitution and bylaws and named Cleveland's Clayton Brown as its first president. The name later was changed to the National Amateur Baseball Federation in 1933 but the organization operated only a Major Division Tournament for players of unlimited age.

The Senior Division (for age 18 and under) held its first tourney in 1944, the Junior Division (16 and under) was created in 1962 and the Sophomore Division (14 and under) was established in 1973. In 1982, the NABF created a tournament for boys under age 21 called the College Tournament.

Dart named state coach of the year

Northville's Bob Dart had mixed emotions when he found out that he'd been awarded the first annual "Outstanding Volunteer Coaches Award," presented to a coach who demonstrates strong standards of excellence through work with the youth of Michigan.

He felt proud and embarrassed. He was tickled and yet felt undeserving. But it's clear that Dart is indeed a deserving recipient when you look back on his accomplishments. He was rated as "superior" in his knowledge, organization, teaching skill, leadership and role model as a youth sports coach in 1986. It apparently impressed the Youth Sports Institute and Michigan State University, who were co-sponsors for the award.

"I was proud for my team," Dart said. "My kids and their parents get all the credit — they make it easy. I think this award is for the whole program. I love the sport — the players I've got and their parents are just great people. You like to see all the efforts awarded, particularly the kids — we do it all for the kids."

"All the involvement in soccer is hopefully for the kids and sometimes, unfortunately, that gets lost."

Dart has coached soccer in Northville for eight years at the recreational and select level. In 1984, he became the coach for WSSL United, a

Northville-based Bonanza Premier Soccer League entry and has since led the team to league championships five times. He has also been the mentor of three state championship teams as United won the Under-12 title in '84, the Under-14 crown in the spring of '86, and the Under-16 championship in the fall of '86. It marked the first time any team has held two state championships simultaneously.

In the spring of '86, United was named the eighth best Under-14 girls' soccer team in the nation. This year, United was the '87 Michigan State Cup and has advanced to the Midwest Regional in Minneapolis, Minn. this summer to compete against 12 other state champions. The winner will then travel to Seattle, Wash., for the national championship. United has competed in four consecutive State

Cup tournaments and has won the right to represent Michigan in regional play three times.

Bill Tolstedt, President of the Northville Soccer Association, nominated Dart for the award. He was given the highest possible marks in basic coaching criteria such as leading skills and teaching skills.

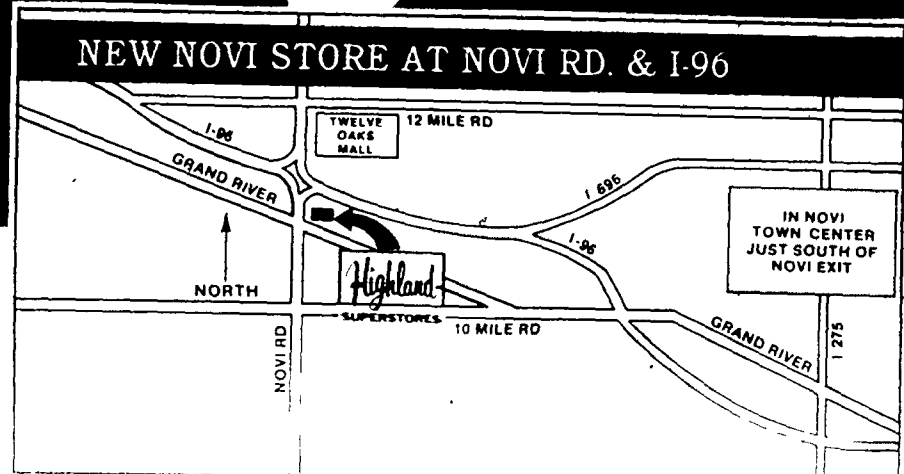





Part-time ministry is full-time job

Could you use a hand with housework? Are you tired of dusting, scrubbing, sweeping, straightening, washing and wiping? Carol's Helping Hands will be happy to help you out.

Carol Meyer began her housekeeping service nearly nine years ago as a church ministry. Together with her minister's wife, she began cleaning homes of people who needed help — women who went back to work, people too ill to manage housework, bachelors, widowers and others in need of a "helping hand." The part-time ministry quickly grew into a full-fledged business, but Carol still stresses and enjoys the "helping" aspect of the service.

Carol manages Helping Hands from the farmhouse on Eight Mile which is also the headquarters for husband Larry's "Meyer Berry Farm." Larry grows and markets strawberries, pumpkins, assorted

summer crops, evergreens and mums from the 45-acre farm in Novi which has been in the Meyer family since 1942.

If you count Larry's full-time job as an engineer with Eaton Corporation in Southfield, the couple juggles three businesses while parenting six children — three each from previous marriages.

"Just like the Brady Bunch," quips Carol, "but, of course, it's not that easy." Their children range in age from 27 years to 14 — four attend college at present. The combined families and careers have led to some unusual rules. Like Carol's business claim to clean almost anything — even windows — but not barns.

Their home is, appropriately enough, a perfect ad for Carol's business, sparkling clean and impeccably neat with a comfortable, lived-in atmosphere. Carol's neat appearance and quiet manner inspire

confidence also. The petite brunette manages to look unruffled even while collecting nickels and dimes from a crowd of excited, pumpkin-toting youngsters.

When it was clear that Helping Hands had grown beyond the scope of a personal ministry, Carol and Larry took a Novi Community Education course on "How to Start Your Own Business" and hired an accountant.

"Larry can grow anything," Carol smiled, "and I can sell anything." Administration is her forte. "I'm an extremely organized person. I make lists."

Larry's computer skills are an added bonus. He handles much of the programming necessary to keep both businesses operating smoothly.

Carol employs 25 women as cleaners, assistants and clerical help. The bonded and insured service cleans nearly 100 homes and a few offices on a weekly or bi-weekly basis. Carol does not employ teams of

workers, but rather matches one cleaner to a home in an effort to personalize the operation as much as possible. "I'm an intermediary between the client and the worker," she says. "My job is to make both of them happy."

She visits each home personally and interviews the homeowner to assess his/her needs and estimate the costs involved. These home visits are a favorite aspect of the business for Carol. "I enjoy getting out and meeting new people," she says. "It's interesting and often inspiring to learn how others live and cope."

Carol maintains a four-hour minimum time limit for cleaning homes. "No one can really clean a house in less time," she says, and bases her rates on a formula which includes the size, accessories and activity level of the home, the level of cleaning needed and whether it will be cleaned weekly or bi-weekly.

She's very flexible, will substitute or revolve jobs on request and makes an effort to accommodate specific needs. In addition to the standard dusting, vacuuming, washing and sanitizing of kitchen and bath, Carol's "helpers" will clean cupboards, refrigerators, windows and blinds, and strip beds.

"Every woman has idiosyncracies or quirks. Some want you to use a specific product or method. They'll tell me, 'My mother did it this way, and that's the way I do it too.' That's fine with me," Carol explains.

"My mother taught me to clean, too. I walk through their house with them and list specific requests, room-by-room. Then I prepare a computer print-out on the information and give it to the cleaner."

CAN YOU CANOE?

More saying 'yes' to popular sport

There is an old joke that goes something like this "Can you canoe? Yes, canoe?"

A lot of beginning canoeists think they can, but really don't know a thing about an ancient and complex sport.

"There is a tendency to believe if you're born in Michigan you know how to do it," said Harold Kirchen, an American Canoe Association certified instructor who works for Canoesport in Ann Arbor.

"Most people think in terms of how many people fell in and how many cameras were lost. People think that's canoeing; and there's usually a lot of alcohol involved."

Contrary to that popular belief, there are literally hundreds of styles of canoes and canoeists. It can be as complicated as a two-week camping tour, or as simple as an afternoon trip to a canoe livery.

In our area, we have a little of both at Hell Creek Ranch, near the Huron River in Pinckney. The ranch offers day canoe trips with rental canoes, horseback riding and camping.

With any number of rivers and tributaries throughout the state, it's

no wonder canoeing is an easy way to spend a summer afternoon.

"One thing we find a lot of people go for one trip a year to the wilderness, and there is so often so much beautiful canoeing around here," Kirchen said.

"I've mentioned the (Huron River) tributaries—I actually paddled from Chelsea to Dexter on tributaries, which a lot of people don't know you can do. And with the chain of lakes in the Pinckney-Waterloo area, you don't need to drive up north. You can see mink and osprey with regularity. So if I have two hours to spend I can go out canoeing and be back home."

Canoeing began as the most natural mode of travel for land veined by small streams and major rivers, and in fact it was the canoe that is responsible for most of the exploration of our country.

Michigan's history is closely tied to the canoe. Native Americans used the Au Sable and Manistee rivers as a

cross-state highway of sorts, hiking a few miles of portage between the two.

Historians theorize that the birth of the canoe came when early people discovered they could float down a river on the back of a floating log. Hollowing the log with axes and fire made it suitable for carrying more people and gear.

The addition of flattened paddles allowed the early boater to push the craft along a little faster and also steer in any direction, even on still water.

Native people before the arrival of Europeans used the canoe as their only means of travel other than walking. It was vital to hunting, carrying freight and transporting war parties. Indians fashioned canoes from wooden frames stretched with birch bark or animal skin tied with sinews.

Today's canoes are made from a variety of materials and come in any number of sizes and shapes, designed for different types of canoeing. The most common are crafted from aluminum or fiberglass for lightweight, sturdy construction.

Canoes follow a basic design, but have several small alterations to fit different functions. Lake canoes are equipped with a keel, a ridge running the length of the canoe which helps cut a straight path in still water. Canoes for shooting rapids are designed with an enclosed deck to keep water from whooshing in.

Most canoeists travel in tandem with the "bowman" in the front and

the "sternman" steering in the rear.

Although canoes are equipped with seats, the best position for power paddling is on your knees because it allows the paddler to get a broad base of support and get low to the water.

There are a number of different strokes to learn, from the straight stroke to the "J" stroke to the figure eight, but a good book or instructor can go a long way toward teaching proper technique. And technique is everything if you plan on braving the whitewater.

Before leaving the banks of the river, however, you must do a little planning. You must dress for the occasion, decide how far you want to go and where you plan to stop. If you plan to picnic, you'll need to pack food as well.

Absolute essentials for the canoe trip are life jackets, called personal flotation devices or PFD's by canoe masters, some kind of bailing device (water will get in the canoe—just don't let it accumulate), and airtight containers for any gear you'll want on the trip, such as dry clothing, cameras and food. Garbage bags

The Bowman

The paddler in the front of the canoe is called the bowman, or bowperson, if you like. His or her job is to provide the bulk of the canoe's propulsion and, with the stern paddler's help, to initiate turns. It also helps to communicate with the stern person, telling him or her what lies ahead, such as a protruding rock or tree branch.

The Sternman

The stern paddler, who sits at the rear of the canoe, not only provides propulsion but also keeps the canoe on track with slight adjustments of the stroke. Again, communicate with your bow partner and work together.

What to Take:

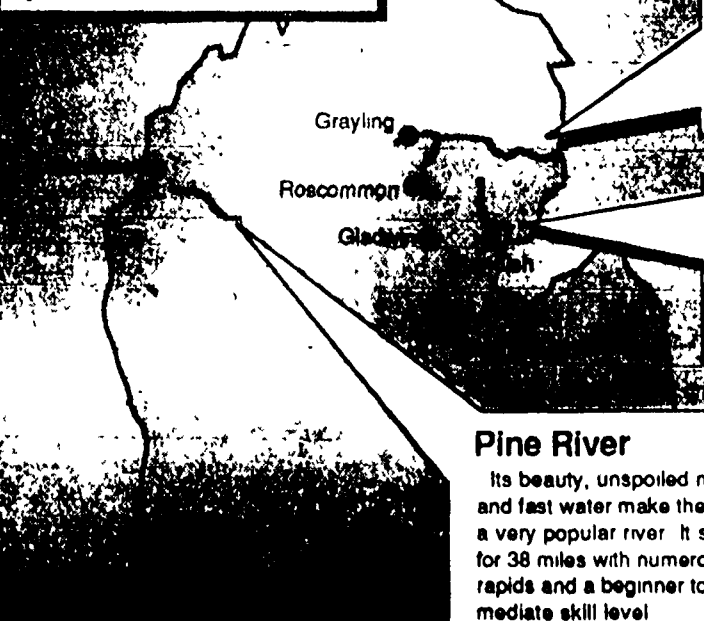
Common sense dictates how one should dress for a canoe outing. Obviously, weather conditions and where you'll be paddling are big considerations. Life jackets, a bailing device and water-tight containers for clothes, food and gear are musts. And don't forget to secure all items in case the canoe tips. In addition, it may be helpful to take some sunscreen, bug spray and a hat.

The Pitch Stroke

A variation on the J, using less flair at the end of the stroke and less energy too.

Dutch student, host reunited

A letter that arrived the day before Easter in Texas led to a special reunion in Northville last week.

The letter writer, Antoinette Michielson Stratenus, had been an exchange student in Northville from the Netherlands during the 1959-60 school year. The Charles Tremor family had been her host family.

Now married to a physician and the mother of three, the Dutch woman had written they were coming to Northville this summer.

When her news arrived in Texas — where the Tremors had moved 10 years ago — Edna Tremor immediately began making plans to return for a visit also.

Antoinette had been a Rotary exchange student and had attended the Northville club's Tuesday luncheon meetings while she was here. Last week she introduced club members to her family — her husband Maarten and children Felicie, Iman and Leopold.

She recalled she was a member of the first class to occupy the then new high school on the hill.

Edna Tremor said she had to make the flying trip from Kerrville, Tex., because it had been "real fun" having Antoinette live with her family on Napier Road.

She added that they had not corresponded in the years since the student left and that Antoinette had written when the family planned to visit the United States.

Because they had lost touch, the Dutch woman had written to Rotary International to try to obtain the Tremors' address. In turn, Rotary International contacted the Northville Rotary, which was able to supply the Tremors' Texas address.

Edna Tremor recalled that the Dutch student was the same age as her daughter, Gail, and that both enjoyed being high school seniors together at age 17.

When Antoinette arrived from Driebachen in central Holland, she

was pictured on the front page of the Aug. 13, 1959 issue of The Northville Record with Edna Tremor and two other exchange students.

The story at the time noted that Antoinette, the petite daughter of a Dutch aeronautical engineer, was thrilled that she was going to be living in a household that had a dachshund and a horse.

Just before last week's reunion, Tremor said "I want to show Antoinette and her family an American grocery store and Twelve Oaks." She said she had been trying to think of the most interesting American things for a Dutch family to see and felt our shopping centers would be very different.

She pointed out the coincidence that her daughter Gail and her husband Charles Gross also have a daughter, Mary Beth, and two sons, Charles and Kenneth. The Gross family moved to Kerrville where he owns a printing business.

We had a wonderful relationship," Edna Tremor recalled last week mentioning how so many things were strange to the Dutch visitor then.

"She had never tasted mashed potatoes," she related, adding that Antoinette liked the dish.

The Stratenus family lives in a small town outside Amsterdam and had planned the visit to the United States for some time.

The couple and their three children

flew to New York City where they rented a car and went sightseeing. This included a visit to the Statue of Liberty. They then drove to Washington, D.C. The youngsters had asked to see the John F. Kennedy and Viet Nam memorials.

They drove to Michigan and stayed at a motel on Grand River. Antoinette Stratenus showed her husband and children where she had lived on Napier Road when she was an exchange student known as Andy Michielson 27 years ago.

Her reunion with Edna Tremor was at the church. After the Rotary luncheon the six spent the rest of the day at Twelve Oaks where the Dutch family marveled at the number and variety of shops. Even though the family was used to shopping in London, everyone told Tremor that this was a very different experience.

The visitors also did some shopping, commenting that prices were less than at home.

Last week Wednesday, the Stratenuses crossed the river to Windsor, adding another foreign country to their itinerary.

Dropping their car off at Metropolitan Airport last Thursday, they flew to Denver where they were renting a motor home for a 12-day tour of the Rockies.

Edna Tremor visited relatives in Greenbush before flying back to Texas Monday.

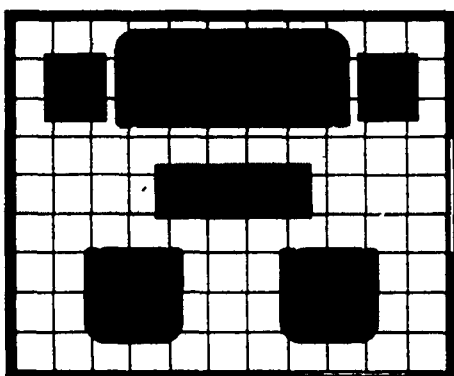

Tips listed for successful canoeing

securely tied, will do fine. Just in case the canoe should tip, you'll want to tie these things to the canoe with some sturdy rope.

Then, of course, the most important piece of equipment next to the paddles, is the canoe.

"We don't think liveries are the way to go," said Ned Sharples, owner of Canoesport, a canoe dealership and supplier.

"It's sort of like a single-speed bike. Rental canoes aren't very responsive. They don't teach you much about canoeing as a physical sport. They just float on the water in stead of cutting a path."

But for those who are just beginning, renting a canoe may be a better idea than buying, both because it saves the time and expense of purchasing, and because it eliminates the problem of transporting the canoe to water and having someone pick up the canoeist at the end of the run.

Canoes are generally carried on a

rack atop a standard automobile and two people can transport it to the water's edge by placing it over their shoulders with pads set on the thin support beams called thwarts (pronounced "thort").

To launch a canoe, carry, don't drag it, to the edge of the water and push it out gently until it is floating on the water. Then one person (bowman) should hold onto the seat and steady the canoe between his or her knees. The sternman should climb carefully into the canoe, holding onto the sides, or gunwales (pronounced "gunnel"), and sit down. Then the bowman climbs aboard and pushes off.

From there the ride depends on which river you choose.

Probably the easiest river to paddle in this area is the Huron. It stretches from Proud Lake west past Milford then south through Island Lake Recreation Area, dumps into Portage Lake in southern Livingston County and winds back to the east through Ann Arbor and the Ford-

Belleville Lake chain.

Its 10 miles offers marsh, woodland and wildlife preserves within easy access.

It travels through three Huron-Clinton Metroparks, where, at Delhi Metropark (which offers canoe rental) the slightly more advanced canoeist can brave 100 yards of mild rapids.

The current is easy and most of the way is smooth running. So much so that many canoeists paddle down a ways, stop for a picnic, then paddle back up. Maps of the Huron River, noting portages and canoe rental locations, can be picked up at any of the Metroparks.

Other good spots, say those who know, are the Au Sable, Pine and Rifle rivers.

The Au Sable, which flows east from Grayling to Oscoda, is a gentle river suitable for family canoeing and also noted for excellent fishing.

The Rifle River, which runs south to the Saginaw Bay, emerges from the Rifle River Recreation Area in

Ogemaw County. Known to any Boy Scout worth his salt, the Rifle is a very popular river because of its camping facilities and attractive surroundings.

The Pine, located in the northwestern Lower Peninsula, runs through Lake, Wexford and Manistee counties. Navigation of the Pine requires a little more skill than the other two, but it is also one of the most popular canoe rivers in the state.

Because of the Pine's popularity the U.S. Forest Service requires permits for every craft entering or leaving the river using national forest land, the major access route, between May and October.

Both the Rifle and the Pine are designated National Wild and Scenic Rivers because of their unspoiled water and natural surroundings.

A good reference book on Michigan canoe routes is "Canoeing Michigan Rivers," by Jerry Dennis and Craig Date. It is available for \$12.95 and is published by Friede Publications.

What a ZOO!

Attendance is up at new Detroit Zoo

Next year, the Detroit Zoo will be 60 years old. Many visitors, young and old alike, have seen rare and not so rare animals that suburbanites rarely get to see elsewhere.

The 125-acre animal haven at Ten Mile and Woodward had almost 900,000 visitors last year who observed 300 species of animals — including insects, birds and fishes.

"We're running about 10 percent higher than last year (in attendance)," Pat McClary, marketing director for the zoo, said.

There have been many zoo improvements made this year, some made possible by a cooperative development between the city of Detroit and the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT).

"We needed 12 acres for construction of the I-696 Freeway through south Oakland County," said MDOT Director James P. Pitz. "The Zoo needed financial help to upgrade its facilities. We got together and made improvements to the zoo using federal and state funds."

Additions or improvements at the zoo included a three-level parking garage for zoo visitors and SEMTA park and ride commuters. New refreshment stands and rest rooms were installed at the entrance and a gift shop, Zootique, was built. New park benches, lamps and turnstiles were installed.

A new zoo train station and extensive landscaping, storm and

sanitary sewers were added — plus condors, a grizzly, and tree kangaroos.

Tiger, bird and barn yard graphics to make education at the zoo easier were added to complement the recent \$600,000 remodeling of the Penguinarium.

Many improvements are planned for the future of the zoo. These include a renovation of the elephant and rhino house for indoor viewing, renovation of the lion and tiger houses with glass-fronted cages for nose-to-nose viewing and a new zoomobile.

Also planned is a visitor educational center, plus polar bear and other graphic displays to describe exhibits and a plan to improve the habitat for native wildlife on the zoo grounds.

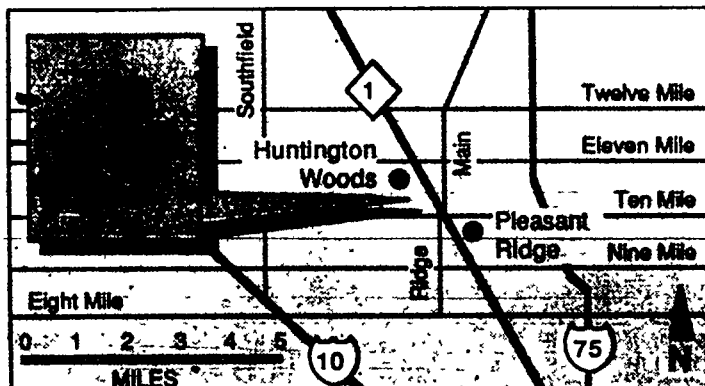
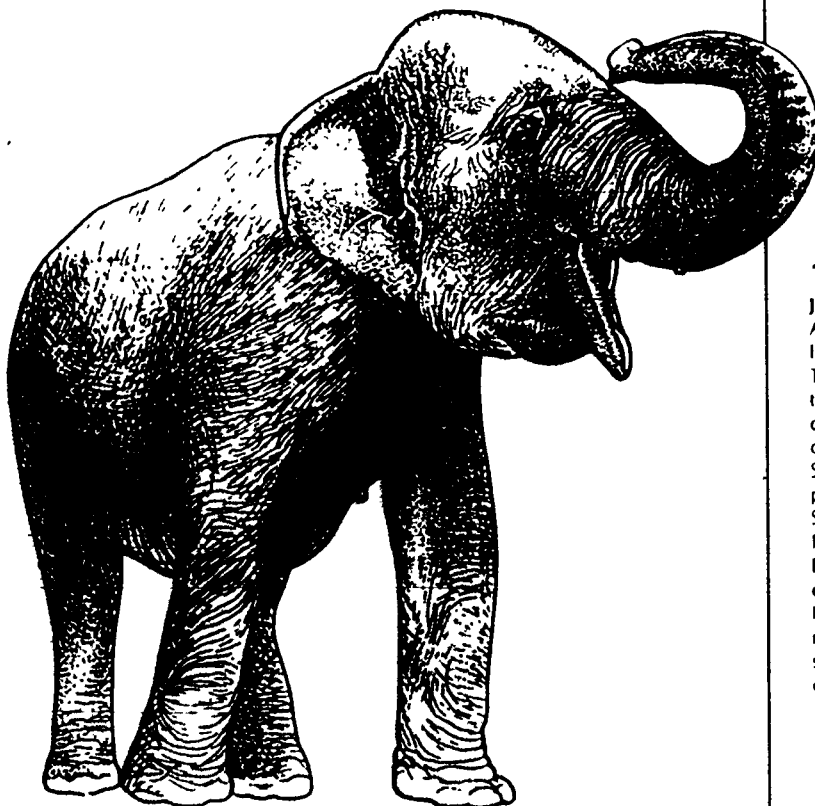
"The improvements in the zoo, such as using bear graphics, are intended to improve education, not to enforce misconceptions about animals," McClary said.

Some events planned for the summer include the curator program. "This allows the public time to spend with curators and ask them questions," she said. "We also have winter and fall walks."

McClary said a great deal of the attendance is made up of families — mom and dad bringing the kids to the zoo. But there are others who come to the zoo as well.

"It's also trendy for dates," she said. "It's a cheap date."

On a recent sunny Tuesday afternoon, the zoo was busy with life and laughter as adults and children explored this animal



haven. And everywhere, there was talk about animals.

"The zoo has changed for the better," said Canton resident Ron Chomiuk, who was visiting the zoo with his wife Sheryl and their daughter, Lindsay, who is 18 months old, for the first time in years. "It's cleaner and more organized."

"I liked all the animals," Rick Remer, 8, of Detroit, said. "Like the polar bears and the elephants."

Jackie Warren, 25, of Detroit, loves the zoo and visits it often. "I often come here for a date," she said.

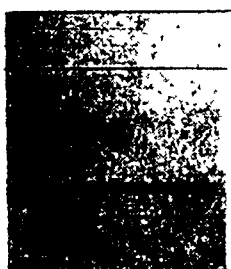

Jennifer's Cafe:

A continuous source of new experiences



East meets West in Walled Lake, and the result is food that is as pleasing to the eye as it is to the palate at Jennifer's Cafe.

The restaurant, which opened in May 1985, is named after Jack and Jayna Suidan's first-born child, and Jennifer is often at the restaurant.

The Suidans note on their menu: "As she (Jennifer) is a breath of fresh air and a continuous source of new experiences that is our goal here."

They have certainly accomplished that, and more. Jack Suidan, the chef and proprietor, worked with Tom MacKinnon at the Holly Hotel and Bay Pointe Country Club, and Jayna has worked with MacKinnon at his Northville restaurant before Jennifer's Cafe opened.

A full menu that includes very little red meat offers diners choices that run the gamut from sandwiches to salads, from entrees to desserts.

In addition to classic sandwiches — Reubens, clubs, and ground sirloins — a variety of sandwiches wrapped in thin pita are offered. All sandwiches are served with the house specialty, homemade potato chips. The chips, thin, brown and not as salty as commercial potato chips, are available for purchase in half pound and pound bags, and are made fresh daily.

Most popular of the special sandwiches is poached chicken breast with broccoli, mushrooms, cheddar cheese and lettuce. That sandwich, like most of the others, is \$4.95. A vegetarian pita sandwich — sauteed onions, mushrooms, carrots and broccoli, topped with harvarti cheese, tomatoes and alfalfa sprouts is \$4.50. Two corned beef sandwiches, one with swiss and honey mustard on rye and the other

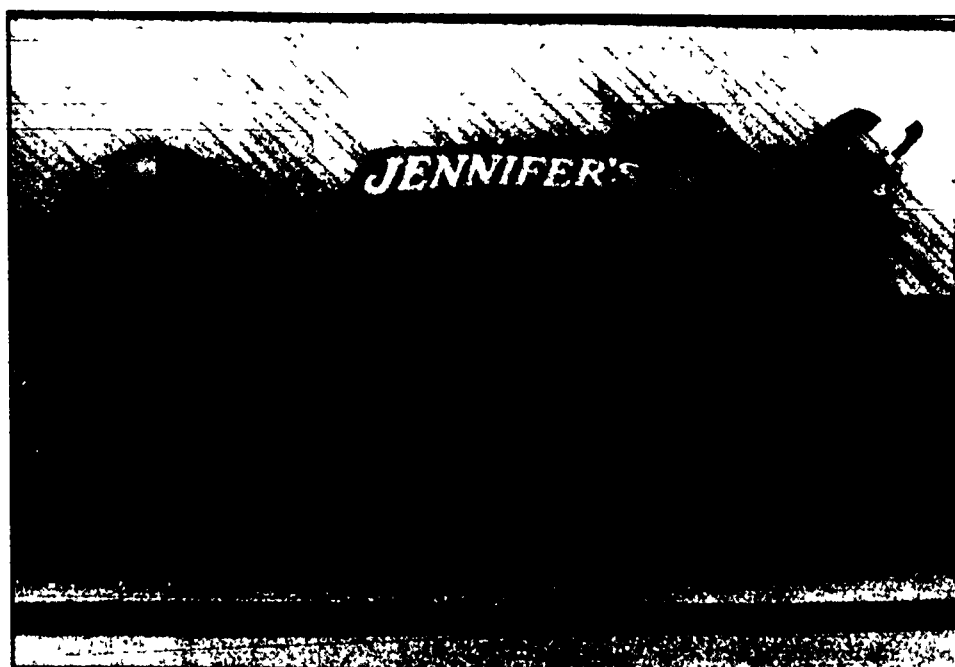

with grilled onions, swiss cheese, honey mustard, lettuce and tomato wrapped in a pita, are \$5.45.

Not all sandwiches are westernized. At Jennifer's Cafe, diners can enjoy middle eastern treats such as baked kibbeh, falafel or shish kabab (lamb and beef with onions, parsley and seasonings), all wrapped in a pita.

Sandwiches are available all day. "We want people to be comfortable here and not think they have to order large entrees," says Jayna Suidan.

For those who do opt for the dinners, entrees include lots of chicken, some shrimp dishes, whitefish, veal and only one beef dish, sauteed tenderloin tips.

Although Mike Suidan, who shares cooking duties with his brother, Jack, says its a tossup as to whether the sauteed garlic chicken or the veal piccanti is most popular, there are enough different entrees to satisfy most tastes.

The entrees and the three specials which are found on both the lunch and dinner menus and

change at 4 p.m. all are served with a choice of fresh tossed salad or the soup of the day.

It's a difficult choice, since the salads are crisp, tasty and large and the soups, especially the house specialty chicken rice with lamb meat balls, are tasty.

My favorite dishes are the sauteed lingonberry veal - veal medallions in a Marsala wine with imported berries, which is not overly sweet — and the Lake Superior whitefish — broiled and glazed with a white cream sauce.

All of the entrees are served with crisp sauteed vegetables. If there is a problem at Jennifer's Cafe, and there is none with the food, it's that no reservations are accepted and, especially on weekends, the 64 eating spaces are quickly filled.
