Wetlands may force change in Haggerty sewer plans

Plans for the construction of the Haggerty Road sewer have hit another snag, albeit a minor one.

Permits for the sewer, which was proposed to service building along Haggerty Road and existing homes and planned construction on Six, Seven and Eight Mile roads, are now being withheld by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' Land and Water Management Division, as well as by the department's Surface Water Quality Division.

Brooks B. Williamson, water quality specialist, wrote the township that the DNR could not authorize the (Haggerty Road sewer) project as proposed.

"Overall, the proposed route for the sanitary sewer is reasonable. The present proposal calls for the placement of the sanitary line in a wetland area," Williams wrote in a letter dated Sept. 1.

The water quality division also is withholding a construction permit until the township can show it has sufficient capacity downstream for the additional flows that would be realized were the sewer to be built.

"The problem which we have pointed out is only a minor one," Williamson said Tuesday. "Frankly, were

the township to move its proposed lines closer to Haggerty Road, and not cut through the wetland, it could possibly save some money and we would be willing to approve the plan."

In his letter, Williamson said the township has 30 days to provide revised plans for the sewer.

"We have asked the township to redesign its sanitary line so the wetland is not disturbed. But if that is not possible and if the township can show us documentation as to why it is not possible, we might be willing to approve the plan as designed," Williamson said.

The wetland in question is located on Haggerty Road near Eight Mile and is part of a 21-acre wetland that sits on the site proposed for the Hampton Inn and being developed by Jonna Construction.

Hampton Inn officials have received a DNR permit to mitigate their portion of the wetland, and on-going construction by Jonna in Livonia does not touch the wetland.

Williamson said a permit request by Jonna had been denied.

The portion of the wetland located in the township is a very small part of the entire wetland, Williamson said, noting that the Hampton Inn portion of the wetland is bet-

ween .6 and .75 of the entire emergent scrub/shrub wetland and the portion on which the proposed Haggerty Road sewer would impact is even smaller.

Matt Modrack, Northville Township community development director said he had not talked to the DNR directly, but that he had the sense that the location of the sewer was a minor issue.

"I believe the engineers were aware that there could be a problem with a stream crossing, and my sense is that we can design around it," Modrack said.

Hampton Inn, however, is faced with mitigation — building a new wetland in another location.

Donald Tilton, a principal with Johnson, Johnson & Roy, said his firm was currently working on the mitigation on property in Commerce Township.

Tilton said the mitigation project would involve altering hydrology on the Commerce Township site, changing the plants on the site and in essence creating a wetland where none exists.

Under terms of the state's Wetland Protection Act, if approval is given to mitigate an existing site, the new site must match as nearly as possible the wetland that is being built upon.

Johnson, Johnson & Roy currently handles about 40 wetlands-related permits each month, although only about 13 or 14 total permits have involved mitigation, Tilton said.

The firm has had great success with its projects, Tilton noted. "There is only one mitigation that in its first year did not come along as quickly as we had hoped." That one is a mitigation involving the site on which the Metro West Industrial Park now stands in Plymouth Township.

But there is another concern with mitigation, a concern that hovers behind any proposal approved by the DNR. If the mitigation does not "take", the DNR, which retains jurisdiction, can impose penalties or force the company which was given the mitigation approval to continue to invest in the mitigated parcel until it meets DNR approval.

Tilton said he expects to have documents prepared in two to three weeks for bidding in an attempt to find a contractor to complete the actual wetland construction for Hampton Inn. He anticipates an additional two weeks once a contractor is found to complete the legal requirements and would not speculate on when the actual mitigation work would begin.

To grab a Tiger is his art

OK, maybe Northville resident Bill Herzog didn't exactly write the book on the Detroit Tigers' success this season — but he did paint its cover.

In fact, Herzog — who works from his home as a free-lance commercial artist — has designed or rendered the cover of the Tigers Yearbook every year since 1975. And the Tigers organization is only one of the regular clients for which he paints, draws or designs; he keeps busy, but still remains "his own boss" and can be creative in his work.

"I've got the best of it," he said. "I'm not wealthy and I never will be wealthy" — however, "It's a lot of fun doing this job."

Herzog works in a studio in the basement of his home. He and his wife, Patty, who teaches art in the Detroit school district, live in the Lexington Condominiums above Eight Mile Road. "We've loved living in Northville," he said.

A graduate of the Ringling School of Art in Sarasota, Fla., Herzog's first career inclination was toward engineering.

"My father was an engineer and I always thought I would be a better engineer than I was an artist. . . . At that time, it seemed there were going to be tons of engineers. So I said, 'I've always enjoyed art; I'll go to art school instead.'"

Even though he works free lance, Herzog said his work life is fairly settled. "I have had five or six clients for the past 20 years and that hasn't changed, unless they've gone out of business," he said.

In fact, someone at a company he used to work for first suggested he talk to the Tigers.

Some of the early yearbook covers he did used more photos than his more recent work. "They like to stay away from (using photos) a little bit," he said. "The last few years they've had a lot of guys leave (the team)" — making photo selection a little risky.

He said he enjoys working for the Tigers, but he spends a lot of time on projects for other clients. One recent job was storyboards he did for Ford's annual introduction show — which involved 54 slide projectors on 105 feet of screen.

It's nice to have some control over his own work schedule when that's possible, Herzog said. But for the month of August, he worked more than 71 hours a week preparing for the Ford show.

"That's an unusual situation," he said. "It's nice when I get a couple days off. Especially after this Ford show."

When he manages to find some spare time, Herzog said he enjoys flying — he has built two airplanes, one an award winner — and doing even more painting.

"I'm a commercial artist. I have been for years, but I've got to get loose again," he said. "When you work at it all day long, you don't feel like (painting) on weekends."

But his experience does help during the work week, he added. "I know a lot about printing and how to do things. Being in the business this many years it's hard not to," he said.

Service held for Scott Anderson

Scott Anderson, a former Northville resident and 1967 Distinguished Alumnus of Northville High School, died last week after a fight against cancer.

He died Wednesday, Sept. 2, at Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills. A funeral service was held Tuesday at the Casterline Funeral home in Northville, with the Rev. James Russell and the Rev. William Fleming presiding. He was buried in Rural Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Anderson, 23, was born March 17, 1964 in Grand Rapids. He graduated in 1982 from Northville High School, where he was homecoming king, class treasurer, and a member of the cross country team. He graduated cum laude in 1986 from Lawrence Institute of Technology, where he received a full four-year academic scholarship.

Since last year he worked as an engineer for Chrysler Corp. He had recently been living with his mother, Jane Kenyon, in Dearborn.

Mr. Anderson first learned of his cancer during his freshman year at Lawrence Tech. He had thyroid surgery, but doctors later discovered that he had cancer in his lungs as well. That tumor was too large to remove, and he flew to New Jersey several times for an experimental treatment there.

Before his death, Mr. Anderson arranged for a scholarship fund to be established at Northville High

School. The award is to be given on a need basis to a student pursuing an engineering career. The family requests memorials be made to the scholarship, called the Scott Anderson Scholarship Fund, at NHS.

The Northville Public Schools currently are looking toward the establishment of a pilot gifted third-grade program to be in operation for the start of the 1988-89 academic year.

County lowers speed limits on mile roads

There are new speed limits along Five, Six and Seven Mile roads and while there was much discussion about the plans to lower the speed limits, the signage informing motorists of the limits went up virtually without any fanfare.

As of Monday, new signs have been posted along Six Mile Road, and it is expected that the additional signage will be in place along the other county roads soon, if it is not already in place.

Drivers can take heart, however. They are not likely to be ticketed, at least not immediately, if they continue to obey the old speed limits.

After all, a lot of people weren't aware the new limits were in effect, or that signage had been posted.

Some of those people who were surprised were township officials and employees, many of whom drive daily on Six Mile.

It seems the only people who were sure about the 45 mile an hour limits were Township Clerk Thomas L.P. Cook, Deputy Clerk Eunice Switzler and the township police officers.

"It's (the speed limit on Six Mile) 45 and the signs were posted last week," Switzler said.

"I know they changed it and I know it is lower," said Supervisor Georgina Goss.

But many other employees said the speed limit was 50.

Lt. Gary Batzloff of the township police said Thursday he had checked with Wayne County and was informed the Six Mile signage was posted "sometime last (Aug. 24-Aug. 28) week. They wouldn't commit to an actual date," Batzloff said.

The lowered speed limits included are in effect along Five Mile, where the limit is 50 miles per hour between Ridge and Napier roads, 45 MPH between Beck and Ridge; 50 MPH between Northville and Beck; 40 MPH between Haggerty and Northville and 45 MPH between Inkster and Haggerty, along Six Mile Road, where the speed limit is 45 MPH between Inkster and Sheldon Road and 55 MPH on Sheldon Road west to Napier, and, along Seven Mile Road, where the top speed fluctuates between 35 MPH between Clement and Northville road to 50 MPH between Beck and Napier.

Wayne County authorized the new speed limits on June 3.



Two girls are victims of indecent exposure

Two 11 year-old girls were the victims of an indecent exposure last week, Northville city police reported.

At about 4:15 p.m. Monday, Aug. 31, the girls were walking in the northern central part of the city when they saw a white pickup truck drive up slowly. The driver's door was open and the driver — a white male with blond or brown hair — was naked below the waist, the police report said.

Police are continuing to investigate the incident.

Garbarino talked to the man, who identified himself as a patient at the hospital. The 31-year-old male was turned over to hospital security.

CAR STOLEN, RECOVERED — A Brighton man was victimized for the second time in two years by an auto thief.

An investigation into the latest incident is continuing.

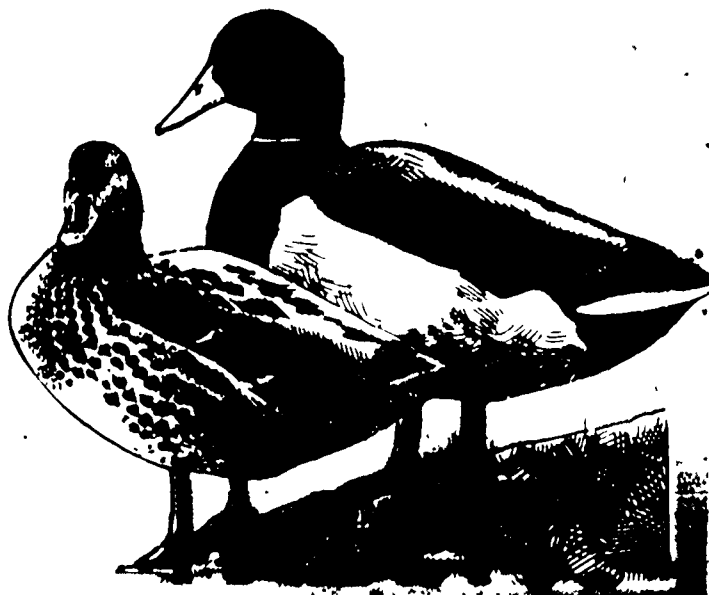

City paving hits new bump

The company in charge of the street repaving program in Northville has raised its prices since completing the first phase of the program, leading to uncertainty about when the rest of the paving will start and who will do it.

Detroit Concrete Products had in formally told the city it would pave the Phase II streets for almost the same prices as it did Phase One. The City Council agreed to the offer, but DCP then raised its estimate from \$866,764 to \$943,000.

City officials had hoped that the second-lowest bidder on Phase I, Thompson McCully, would extend its

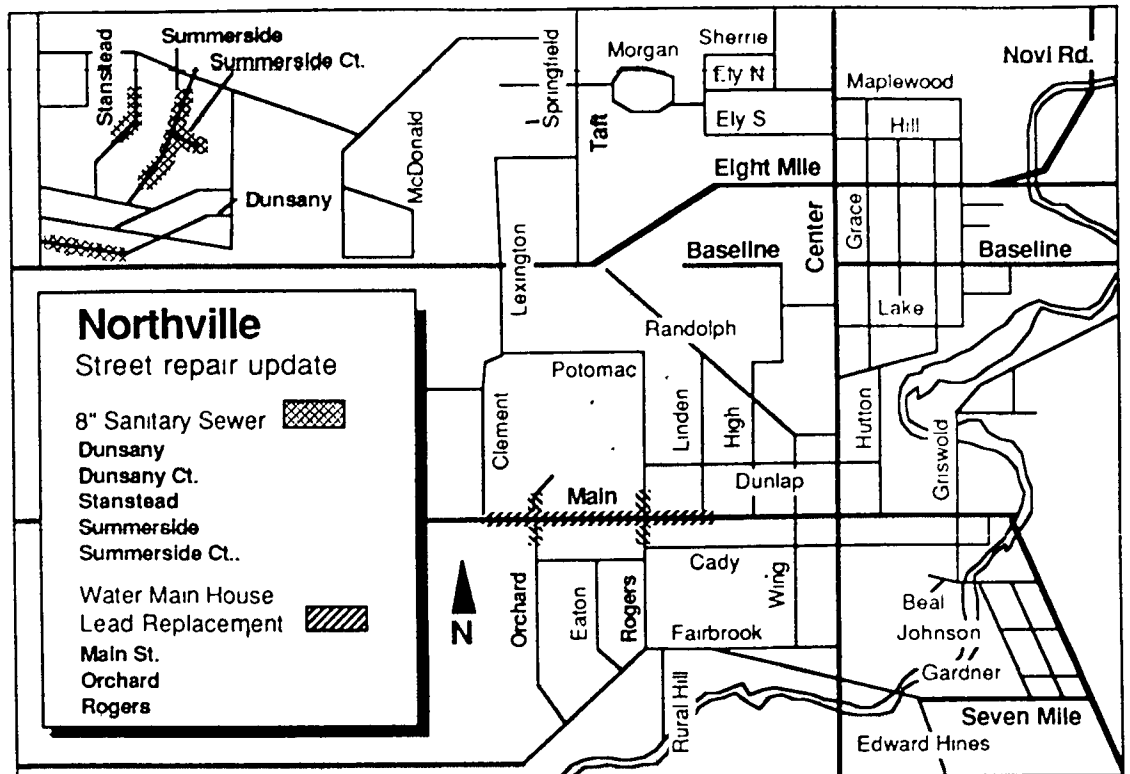
Phase I prices to work on Phase II — but City Council members learned Tuesday that those prices would rise from \$863,667 to just over \$884,000.

City Council directed City Manager Steven Walters to ask Thompson McCully to do the Phase II work at its original prices. The council also called a special meeting for tomorrow at 4 p.m. to hear the company's response.

City Engineer Jack McNeely explained that the prices rose because of an increase in the cost of liquid asphalt, and because Thompson McCully had to find some new sub-contractors.

McNeely said that Thompson McCully had told him that if the city hired the company, it could begin work as soon as Monday, Sept. 21, and finish most of the remaining city streets this fall. The streets north of Randolph and west of Center would not be included because of the condominium development in the area and because of plans for sanitary sewer work on Baseline.

Walters said that if Thompson McCully does not lower its latest bid, the city may be legally required to bid Phase II separately — and possibly delay the start of work until next spring.



New library group may be formed

Northville city and township officials may form a new committee to consider expanding the community library facilities.

City Mayor Paul Vernon and Township Supervisor Georgina Goss

met recently to discuss the issue, Vernon said at the City Council meeting Tuesday night. Library Director Patricia Orr has appeared recently before the council and the township board in support of larger

facilities.

At the council meeting Tuesday, Vernon said a new committee might consist of four citizen representatives, two each from the city and the township, one Library Board representative, one City Council representative, and one Township Board representative.

Council member Carolann Ayers suggested that since much information has already been gathered when expansion was considered in the past, that the focus of a new committee should be how to finance any expansion.

The council took no action on the suggestion, but reached a consensus in favor of forming a new committee. Vernon said he would inform the township of the council's opinion, and discussions may proceed from there.

Fees may rise for Wayne services

It may soon cost Wayne County residents more to tee off or conduct a title search.

Fee increases for a variety of county services have been recommended by County Executive Edward McNamara, Treasurer Raymond Wojtowicz and Register of Deeds Forest Youngblood.

Increases would produce \$2.8 million for the financially-pressed county next year, the officials said.

New revenue would be used to pay off Wayne County's debt.

"The objective is to have these services begin paying for themselves," Deputy County Executive Michael Duggan said.

Fee increases expected to produce an additional \$300,000 already have been enacted, officials said. The rest

depend upon county commission approval.

Most new fees are based upon recommendations from David Griffiths and Associates. The Bay City-based cost management firm was hired by former county executive William Lucas. The county executive, treasurer and register of deeds added additional fee increases after a series of interdepartmental meetings.

Ashley begins her recovery

Two-year-old Ashley Brazen, a Northville girl who has a rare heart condition, is back at home and doing fine after her open heart surgery.

Ashley's mother Cindi Brazen said that Ashley had surgery Aug. 25 and returned home Sunday — which was a much shorter hospital stay than expected.

"This is the fastest any child with this surgery has ever come home," Cindi Brazen said. "They're really

kind of scratching their heads" over the quick recovery, she added.

Ashley has hypoplastic right heart syndrome, a rare congenital heart condition in which the right ventricle is much smaller than normal. Ashley has been in and out of the hospital 16 times for surgery for her heart condition, treatment for related problems, and other health concerns. Her surgery was performed at Children's Hospital of Michigan.



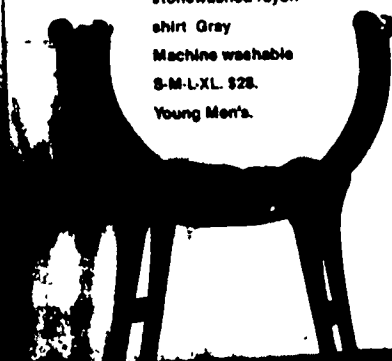

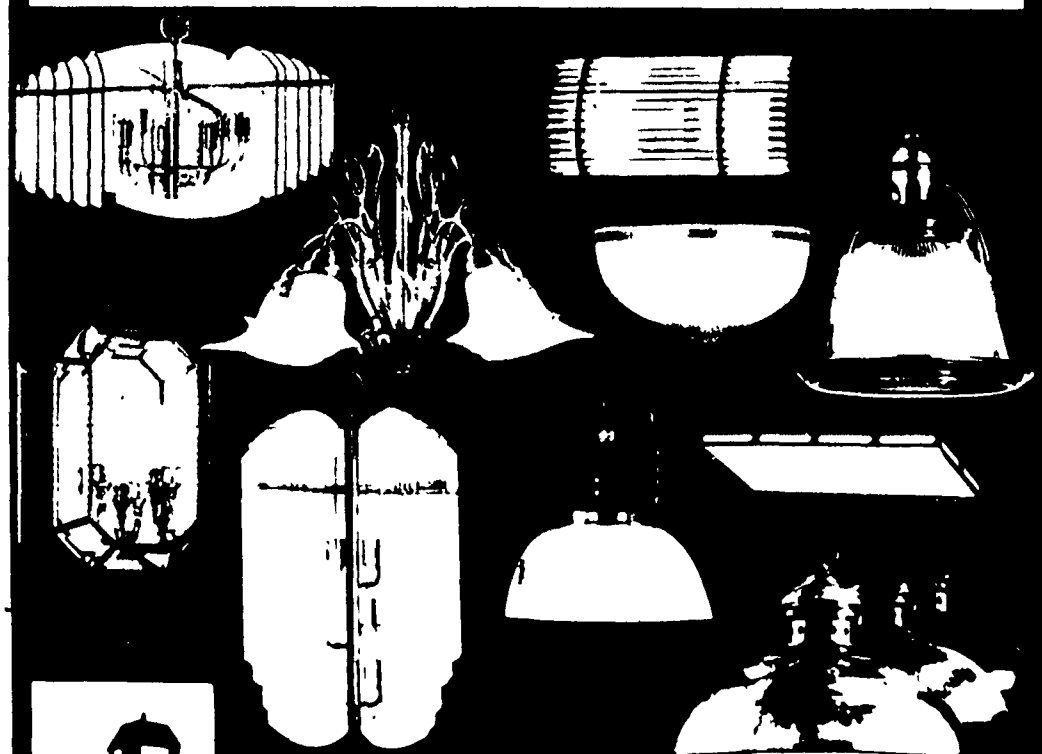

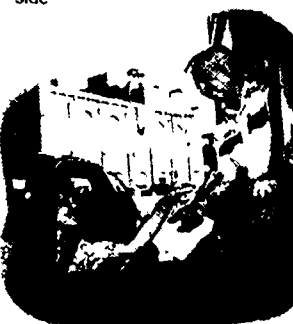

learner we've helped the average student, but pretty much left the gifted child to fend for himself or herself. With the proposed program, we're going to do something for the academically gifted child," she said.

She noted that much of her work will be involved with developing the curriculum for the gifted youngster, starting with third grade.

"The intent is to start with third grade and use that as a building block, adding each year as the students advance through the school system," Najarian said.

She said she does not believe in promoting a youngster over his grade level just because the student is gifted.

Just because a child is academically gifted does not mean that he or she has the social skills to go along with the intellect," she said, noting that there has been a change in the way non-educators and other students regard the gifted child.

"When you or I were in school, it may have been that the gifted child was looked upon as a bookworm. But at least in Northville, the gifted children are no different than their counterparts," said Najarian.

"The girls still go to ballet class, the boys still participate in sports. The difference is that everything they do turns out well. The gifted learn much faster and they are more vocal."

If there is a drawback to Najarian's new post, it is that she says

she is afraid she is going to miss working in the classroom on a day-to-day basis with the children.

If that happens, though, she has the opportunity to return to the schoolroom next year. She won't, however, return to teaching physical education, the area in which she started her career with the Northville schools.

For Parker, the change from teacher to coordinator is a welcome one. After all, the Northville schools is the only one in her teaching career where she has not been a department head.

"When I looked at the posting for the science coordinator, I thought that it was my resume I was looking at," she said.

She said she sees her new position as a means of impacting thousands of students all at once.

"By teaching teachers, you impact a staggering number of students, and that's what I'll be doing, teaching teachers to teach science," she said.

Parker has worked in seven different school districts in at least three different states, always in a science-related area.

In Northville, she was instrumental in working with the science extravaganza at Meads Mill, and has helped coach students to first place in science fairs.

"What I want to see happen is that every child in the Northville schools will have a well-developed understanding of science," she said.

Part of her responsibilities will be mentoring other teachers, she explained, as well as making sure every kindergarten through eighth-grade teacher has the proper equipment on hand to teach science.

"If that means that I will have to say 'no,' I'll do it. But if that means making sure everyone has the proper equipment as well as the knowledge of cleaning up, the safety aspects and the logistics, I'll do that too."

While Najarian and Parker each are filling newly created positions within the Northville Public Schools, the district has hired seven new teachers for the 1987-88 academic year. They are:

DAVID MAYER, who earned a bachelor's degree in music from Grand Valley State in 1983. Mayer will be teaching elementary vocal music at Silver Springs and at Winchester. He taught for 2½ years at Muskegon Junior High School and for one year at Hartford, Mich. public schools.

ELIZABETH MULLIGAN, a 1979 graduate of Denison University who recently earned a teaching certificate from Oakland University. Mulligan will teach a kindergarten class at Silver Springs Elementary School.

CHERYL WALRO, who will be teaching mathematics at Meads Mill Middle School. Walro, a 1971 graduate of Indiana University of Pennsylvania, has been a substitute teacher in Northville and in Novi.

KATHY MROZ, a graduate of Wayne State University who has been teaching for four years at Our Lady of Good Counsel. Mroz will teach academic enrichment at Meads Mill.

JACK WICKENS, JR., the son of Jack Wickens Sr., a counselor at Northville High School. Wickens will teach fifth grade at Amerman. He received a bachelor's degree from Eastern Michigan University.

DAVID BABICH, who graduated from Michigan State University's school of natural resources in 1985 and received a teaching certificate from Eastern in 1987. Babich will teach third grade at Amerman.

MARY JO GROSMAN, who has taught for six years at St. Genevieve in Livonia, will teach sixth-grade social studies and English at Meads Mill. Grosman has a bachelor's degree from Eastern.

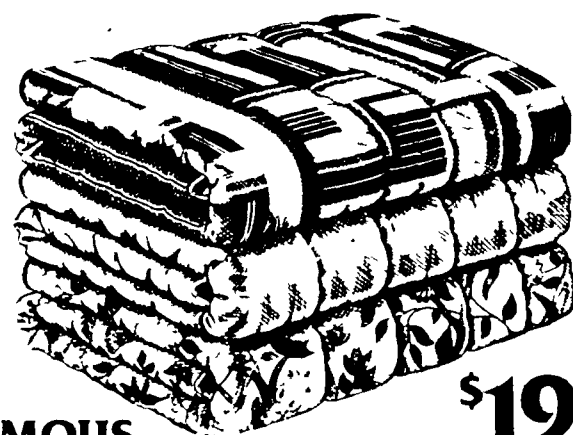

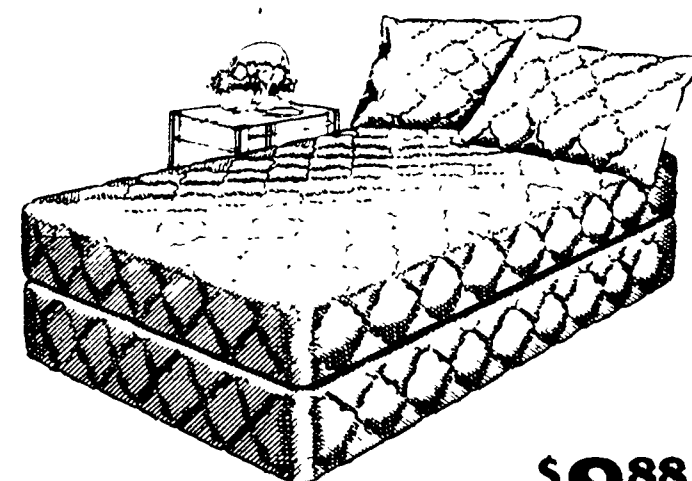

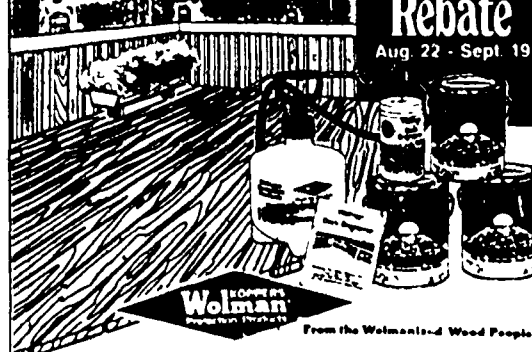

Northville's dream homes cost more than \$125,000

Those who want to buy a used house in either Novi or Northville and have \$70,000 to \$100,000 to spend won't find much of a selection.

"There's nothing being built (in Novi, Northville) that costs between \$70,000 to 100,000," said Conrad Jakubowski, president of the ERA Rymal Symes. "Homes here cost usually \$125,000 and up."

"The cost of land has skyrocketed since the recession in '81 and '82," Jakubowski said. "The amount for a lot can cost \$30,000 to \$35,000. In Northville, a lot without a house can cost up to \$75,000."

So what are the attractions that draw home buyers to Novi and Northville? Having 1-275 so close is one of the biggest pluses to those who are thinking of moving here.

"We also have 1-94 and and 1-96," Jakubowski said. "These major expressways gives residents flexibility when they want to travel somewhere," he said.

People also move here for the high level of public education, good parks and recreation and living within five miles of Kensington Lake.

Land on which to build houses is very much available in both Nor-

thville and Novi. Jakubowski said He estimates that over 50 percent of land is still available for residential home development in these areas.

However, Jakubowski said one of the biggest road blocks to land development is a lack of a super sewer. And when will one be built?

"Now we're getting political," Jakubowski said. "You have to ask Mayor Coleman Young that."

Even though there is room to grow, buyer's income will always be the key on what will be purchased, he said.

Other areas of the country have houses that are priced much higher than here, he said. And lower-priced houses in this area has little to do with Michigan weather.

"Go to New Jersey and their weather is much like ours," he said. "We are not as concentrated as they are. We generally have larger lots. We are more spread out."

Since summer is here, and many people are on vacation, the housing market is somewhat soft at this time. In other words, homes are not selling as they were before the summer.

Since 1960, this state has been through eight recessions. But the housing industry was affected in only two of those.

And (housing prices) immediately popped back up," Jakubowski said.

He adds that many homes that sold for \$70,000 to \$100,000 about 10 years ago, are now selling for a higher price today. So those people who own those homes are in a position of making higher profits if they sell them today.

Carol Mason, who is the owner of Carol Mason Realty in Novi said she believes the next housing boom will be in a city next door.

She states that a house with 1,200 to 1,400 square feet, a two-car garage and one and a half baths is selling for about \$102,000 in Novi. But in South Lyon, that same house might sell for about \$80,000 to \$89,000.

Mason said there are homes in Northville that would sell for \$69,000 to \$100,00, but nobody is selling them. The main reason is the prices of the next level of houses.

"Houses after that are priced over \$139,000 in Northville," she said. Many couples can afford that because with two incomes combined, are bringing home \$80,000, she said.

But many young, single people, just starting off in their professions, may find it hard to afford a new home in this area.

"And that's a shame," she said.

Many couples will buy a condo so they can get money in April (home ownership for single people is a prime deduction on federal income taxes)," she said.

"They want property. After they sell their condo, they move up to the \$80,000 to \$89,000 level." After that, many will buy the next price level of houses, which cost over \$100,000.

Dennis W. Cohoon, who is co-owner of Century 21 Suburban in Northville, said that out of 66 houses on the market in Northville, only six are priced under \$100,000. Of the 85 in Novi, 20 are priced under \$100,000.

"The average sale price for Northville homes is about \$146,000," he said. The average sale price in Novi is about \$115,000.

Cohoon said his business is up 33 percent over last year, spurred by homebuyers in the Novi/Northville area.

His clients that buy Novi and Northville homes have the following characteristics: 53.7 percent are married, 28.4 percent are either single, widowed or divorced, 9 percent fall into miscellaneous categories and 9 percent buy company-owned homes.

The 35 to 50 year olds make up the majority of his clients, with 74.6 percent not being first time buyers.

Cohoon said that home owners in Novi and Northville have different lifestyles. Northville residents want to keep the historic aspect of their city, he said.

"It seems as though the people that buy homes in the Novi community are more mobile," Cohoon said. "Being middle managers, they tend to get transferred in and out."

"In Northville, we don't see the turnover in homes as often as we do in Novi. They (Northville residents) tend to be in homes for longer lengths of time. I'm not sure of the reason."

Cohoon said many people consider homes in Northville and Novi to be their dream home. "Many would call it a goal to move here."

He adds that builders often have no choice but to charge a high price for a new home.

"It may cost \$50 to \$60 a square foot to build," he said. "If they build a 1,000 square foot house, we're talking \$50,000 to \$60,000 a house, not counting a lot. Sometimes you can spend as much on land as on a house."

Suspect faces hearing in circuit court Friday

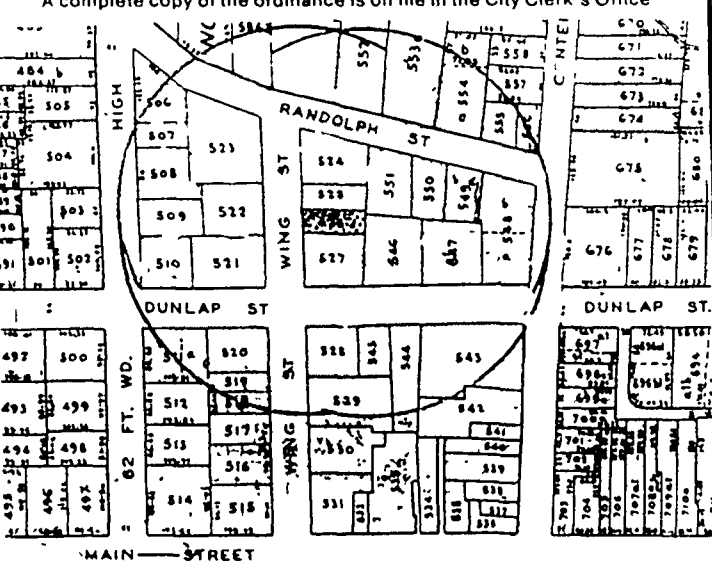

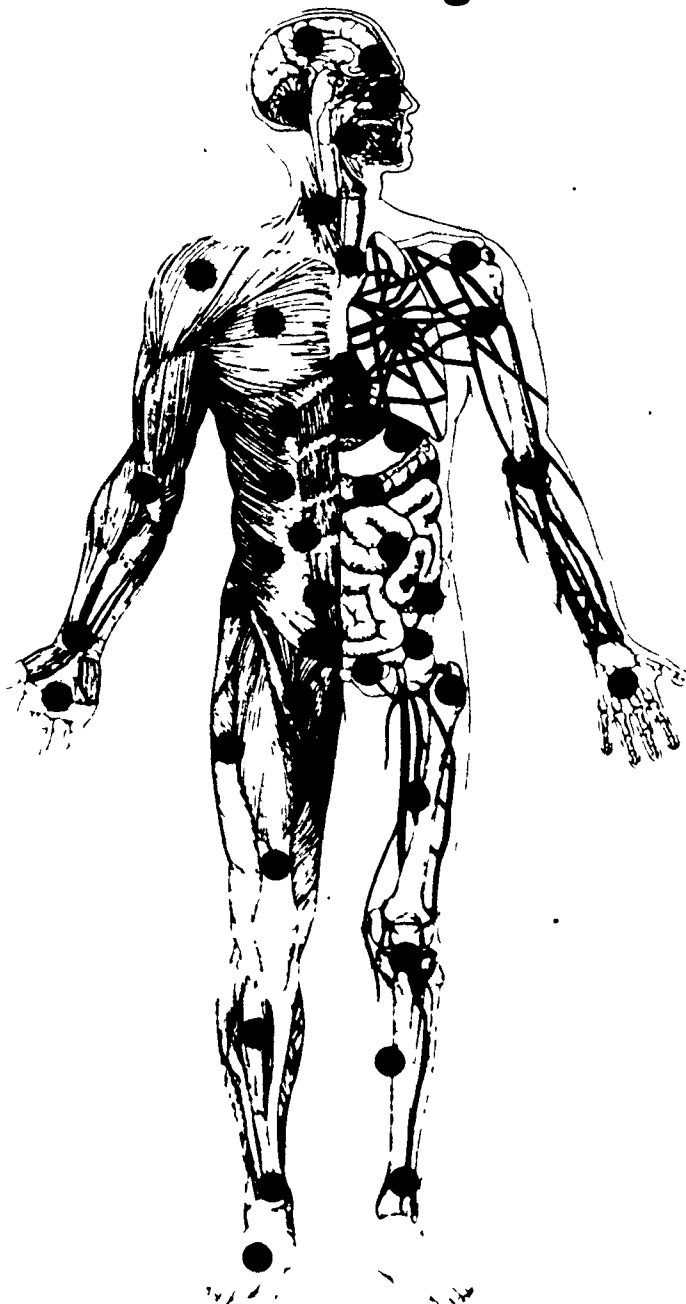

More than English taught in ESL class

They come from around the world to work and to settle in Northville. But once here, they find one giant obstacle to life in America and in a suburban community, the language barrier.

Jyotsna Patel spoke little English when she arrived in the United States from the Punjab State of India. Her husband, who had completed graduate work at U.S. schools spoke fluent English.

But for the woman he returned to India to wed 14 years ago, learning English was made easier through the English as a Second Language course offered by the Northville Community Education Program.

Patel took her first English class some years ago, she said, but dropped out because she was too busy settling into her new home. Last year she repeated the course and found it much easier.

"I learned some more words from the class," she said haltingly. "I took the class again because I need somebody to speak with."

She said the majority of the students in her class last year came from Japan and along with improving her English vocabulary, she was introduced to Japanese customs and culture by other students in the class.

Sanae Oishi is one of the students who took the English as a second language class with Patel. Oishi, from Japan, spoke no English when

she began her studies, but is now able to converse a little bit.

Oishi explained that in her Farmington Hills home, Japanese is the primary language, and for her, getting out to speak English was an adventure.

"I want to take a class again. But I am taking the class in Novi," said Oishi, who lives in Farmington Hills. "I want to meet other people."

Foreign-speaking people, no matter what city they live in, are welcome to take the community education program's English as a Second Language.

The course provides basic English communications, with emphasis on conversation and speech.

Students learn survival skills for living in the United States and can also receive preparation for becoming American citizens.

Courses are available in both day and evening sessions.

ESL courses are among the many classes offered by the community education department this fall.

Vocational classes in air conditioning and heating, cosmetology, dental assisting, industrial building maintenance, printing, landscaping

and office practices are available, and many classes are free to adults under 20 years old who do not have a high school diploma.

A 15-week preparation course helps students prepare for the GED which will be given in January 1988.

During high school and college, Mr. Anderson worked at the Good Time Party Store on Seven Mile Road. The store's owner Jim Roth, said that Mr. Anderson was an exceptional person and "everybody's friend."

He began work at the store as a bottle boy/stock boy, but eventually earned clerk, management and training responsibilities, Roth said.

Roth added that Mr. Anderson was "the one who lifted spirits when somebody was down. I'd like to have 10 more of him around."

"Anybody that he touched knows where Scott was coming from," Roth continued. "One fantastic individual. He was loved dearly by everybody."

Judy Beyersdorf, Anderson's next-door neighbor for a time, nominated him for the Outstanding Alumnus honor. "Scott was the type of person that made everybody comfortable with themselves and with him. He

had just a tremendous circle of friends," she said.

She added that Anderson tried to schedule all his hospital stays during breaks from school so that he wouldn't miss any classes.

"He was a real inspiration to his doctors and the nurses," Beyersdorf said. "They just felt he was one of the most outstanding persons because he never felt sorry for himself. He set goals and he looked ahead."

She concluded, "He's going to be missed by an awful lot of people."

At the 1987 NHS commencement, Mr. Anderson told the graduates of the importance of setting and achieving goals. "In 23 years I've lived the greatest life possible," he said at the ceremony.

In addition to his mother, Mr. Anderson is survived by his father, Larry Anderson, grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. K. Thompson of Muskegon, two brothers, Michael and Jeffrey, and his special friend, Amanda Kaminski.

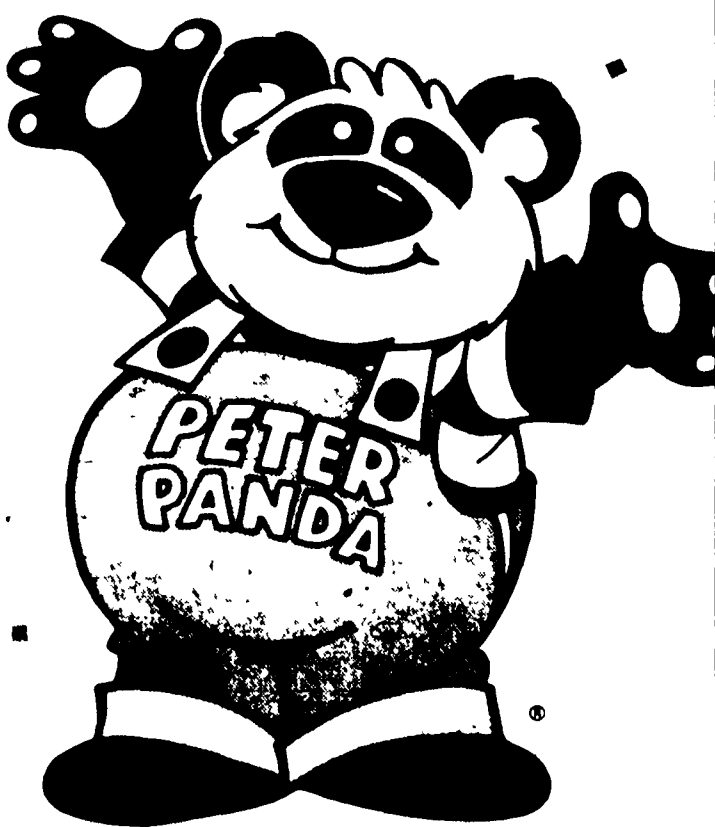
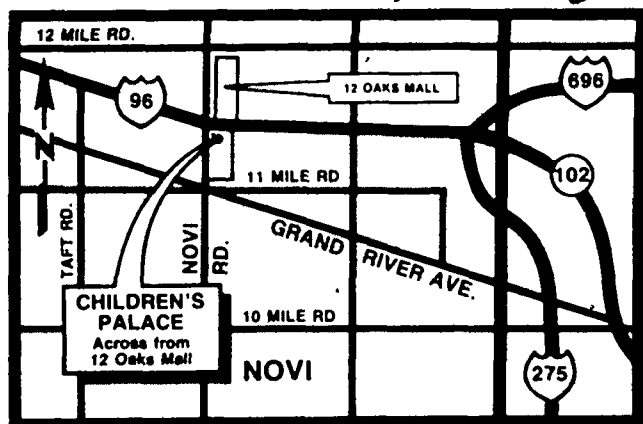

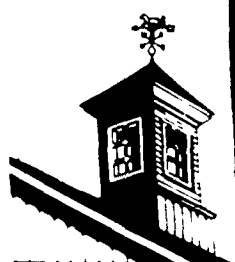

Our Opinions McNeely ouster leaves opportunity for review

The impending release of McNeely & Lincoln Associates as Northville Township's engineers points out in no uncertain terms what happens when there is not a timely review process for governmental consultants. The public is caught by surprise when a consultant is released.



GOVERNMENT

A consulting company, like an employee, can continue to perform its duties as it sees fit, but without a review by the employer, in this case the Board of Trustees, the company has no indication whether it is properly performing the work the board wants done.

The taxpaying public has the right to ask for and to receive a legitimate explanation as to why McNeely & Lincoln, who have served as consulting engineers since February 1981, was summarily released.

The official reason for the termination is that "given the current demands and future engineering needs, the township has decided that a larger engineering firm is required to meet the demands being placed on it and to provide for the orderly development of the township."

Were the township not caught in a stranglehold by the Department of Natural Resources to develop a plan for sewers, the explanation might hold water. Were projects that have been on the drawing boards for construction actually under way, it could be that "orderly development of the township" would be taking place. But that is not the case. And the firing of the engineers during this time of turmoil can only add to the uncertainty of the situation.

Consultants in Northville Township do not volunteer their services. In fact, during the past three years, Plante-Moran, the auditors, have been paid \$31,960, attorneys have earned \$241,954, during the last two years the planning consultants have been paid \$43,555, and McNeely & Lincoln will earn \$221,000 in fees from the township this year alone.

There is no dispute here that the professionals hired as consultants adequately perform their duties. But

evidently there is a dispute over whether that was the case with the engineers.

How much easier it would be if, as in neighboring communities, a set schedule of public review were implemented for all consultants. The review does not have to be done annually, but certainly every three years would be a reasonable expectation.

The review process would provide checks and balances to the public — a check that indeed the consultants are performing satisfactorily and the opportunity for balance in allowing new firms a chance to bid for the township's business and the taxpayers' dollars.

In the City of Northville a plan was presented to have each consultant on retainer to the city reviewed as their contracts expired. However, the review committee was comprised of two city council members and, since the proposal was put forth, there has been no public report to either the council as a whole or to the public.

While the city's action is commendable, it does not go far enough toward opening government to the public it was elected to serve.

Both the city and the township have a rare opportunity to become more directly accountable by an open review process. The federal government has discovered that competitive bidding has saved millions of dollars. On the local level, the same criteria should apply. The public has a right to know what it is getting for its money and to become a wiser investor. Regular open reviews can go a long way toward accomplishing that goal and the time to start is now.

Real mayor's race has need for real issues

With the filing of G. Dewey Gardner and Chris Johnson last week, the City of Northville seems to be headed for a close mayoral race for the first time in many years. Both Johnson, a veteran of the Northville Board of Education and many civic activities, and Gardner, a veteran of City Council and many other government bodies, should prove to be strong candidates.

Both men are well known and respected in the community, and city voters may face a tough choice on election day. We hope the candidates are ready to help the voters make up their minds.

Although Northville is a relatively quiet and healthy city, it is not problem free. There are issues in the city — plenty of them — which we hope the candidates will address over the next few months in substantive debate and

exchange of views.

Among the concerns facing the city are implementing solutions to parking problems downtown; relations between the city and the township; continuing to provide adequate housing for seniors; maintaining and improving the viability of the central business district; and careful planning for the remaining developable parcels of land in the city.

There are certainly many other concerns just as important as these. It is obviously much too early in the race to begin picking favorites. We hope, however, that the candidates will each develop a substantive and meaningful campaign platform, so that come Nov. 3 we can all make an intelligent choice for someone to lead our city for the next two years.

Preserving memories

Grandma Willis showed me how to can tomatoes last week. We spent the afternoon turning the beautiful round, red fruit into the frothy wonderful juice that we poured into canning jars.

It really is a symbolic tradition, the canning of tomatoes. Those wonderfully aromatic plants are planted early in the summer, when cold nights are still a possibility and you only dream about jumping into a lake for a swim. They ripen during the golden days of summer, under high suns. If you brush by a tomato plant in July, you can smell the ripening fruit. In my grandmother's garden she raced the squirrels for the fruit. For every one my family ate — the squirrels chomped two. It wasn't an equal distribution of the spoils, but as in most of nature — one with which we were forced to live.

In early September the tomatoes are at their peak and that's when canning goes into high gear. I've talked to at least two people in the last week who were going to spend one day canning tomatoes. One woman said her family didn't even really like them in anything — she canned because it's what you do at the end of summer.

Anybody who has ever canned knows what a thrill those clear jars filled with tomatoes give a person. There they sit on the drain board, cooling. You look at them and imagine the spaghetti sauce, the soups, the stews — all the winter dishes that these summer jars will fill.

I felt like I had done this tremendous thing. "There, the family will be set for winter," I thought. Forget the fact that you can buy tomatoes at gas stations nowadays.

that is not the point. The point is that you did something yourself for once.

I remember the year my father planted a small garden in our backyard in Detroit. In a desperate attempt to be a gentleman farmer, Dad planted corn. The squirrels would not let the poor little ears ripen. They ate them when they were small. They ate them all the time. Dad would come into the house after walking around his garden. (The garden was planted in the dirt left by a small swimming pool. The walk did not take long.) "How will I feed my family this winter?" my father would wail each time he found a bitten ear. My father tended to the overdramatic and it's a trait I've inherited.

One of the neat things about learning how to cook from grandmothers is you learn more about traditions and family than you do about cooking. When I asked Grandma a question about why she did something, her answer tended to be "That's the way Mama always did it." My grandmother's mother taught her to can and to cook on a farm in North Carolina. Store-bought tomatoes for stews and soups were unheard of then, and it's a tradition we've managed to keep right up until today.

My grandmother is moving today. She is leaving the house she has spent so many years in, and she doesn't like it. One of the things that I hope she'll remember as we move her boxes of canned peaches, pears and chili sauce, as well as the tomatoes, is that we've managed to hang on to a little bit of the past wherever we've gone. Next year we'll need to can tomatoes again — just as we have every year since she learned the art so many years ago on the farm. Whether it's done in a house or in an apartment, really isn't the point. It's her, passing on the tradition.

Forgive my vocational prejudice, but it's hard for me to imagine anything better than making newspapers for a living.

Maybe a lot of people feel that way about what they do for a living. Perhaps mechanics get pleasure from doing a great job of repairing an engine. Or CPAs get excited about doing a really thorough audit or tax return.

But, as far as I'm concerned, making newspapers has got to be as fine a job as there is. The only things that might even come close are writing novels or making serious films. I live in awe of Woody Allen screenplays. And Oliver Stone movies.

I suspect my staff wearies at times when I talk about newspapers as an art form. Literature and photography are recognized art forms. And both are

main ingredients of a newspaper. And even though it may not be recognized as such by the majority of readers, so is newspaper layout and design.

The other thing that impresses me about making newspapers is that it involves so many elements. Good reporting, good writing, good editing, good photography, good editorials, good design. A snappy feature story. An informative article that people can read and adapt for their own use to make their lives better.

All this is by way of introduction to another element of a good newspaper — good headline writing. It's not as easy as it looks, folks. Try writing a 42 point headline that has to fit in 38 picas (newspaper talk). It can't be too short or it will look funny. And it definitely can't be too long or it will run off the side of the page.

Along with everything else, we've been trying to put more emphasis on the quality of our headlines in recent months. We award a weekly "atta, boy (or girl)" to the writer with the best headline.

A recent story about a stolen puppy led to "Dog gone — customer sought." Another story about a stolen baby goat led to "Thieves get goat — no kid ding."

Corny? Probably. But writing catchy headlines is another thing we do to try to make your hometown newspaper reading experience more enjoyable.

Environmental issues

I have often expressed my environmental commitment and concerns at various Novi planning and council meetings.

I have a deep sense of appreciation for the natural world and its wild features. I believe that our precious natural resources are an essential part of all our lives and must be protected and preserved as much as possible. If a balance between the needs of people and nature is ever to be achieved, it will require a greater commitment from developers and residents alike.

I believe that it is important to encourage open/natural space subdivisions in which development occurs around wetlands and woodlands and does not intrude upon them and damage their integrity at all.

I strongly support zoning for large subdivisions which would provide the maximum preservation of individual and clusters of trees on each

lot, more open space (breathing room) between homes and would ease the stress and strain on our infrastructure.

I also believe that we should try to purchase as much park land as possible for designated wildlife preserves and recreation.

In order to fund park-land acquisition, we could consider capturing a portion of our revenues, applying for any available state and federal (and other) grants whenever possible and a dedicated millage if residents so choose.

Naturalist Aldo Leopold once said — We abuse the land because we regard it as a commodity belonging to us. When we see land as a community to which we belong, we may begin to use it with love and respect. There is no other way for land to survive the impact of mechanized man. I couldn't agree with him more.

Book helps employers fight drug abuse

Michigan employers who are concerned about tackling the controversial issue of drug testing in the workplace are finding the help they need in a recently published book dealing with substance abuse in the workplace.

The first book of its kind written specifically for Michigan employers, "Combating Alcohol and Drugs in the Michigan Workplace," is a 169-page guide published by the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce and written by Gary Klotz, a Michigan attorney specializing in employment law.

State Chamber President James Barrett pointed out that personnel practices and the issues surrounding alcohol and drug abuse in the Michigan workplace are changing rapidly. He said new legislative proposals and court interpretations appear each year, posing a challenge for employers who are considering establishing new drug-related policies, re-examining old ones or instituting a drug-testing program.

"More than one year ago, the state Chamber's board of directors recognized there was a need to address the problem of substance abuse in the workplace," Barrett said.

In the summer of 1986, the board approved a policy supporting efforts to protect the right of job providers to test employers and job applicants for illegal drug use. This action by our board provides guidance and direction in our on-going efforts to have positive impact on business-related issues important to the job providers of Michigan.

He noted that the state Chamber's 86-member board meets quarterly to establish policy on major economic, legislative and political issues that

have an effect on Michigan's business and economic development.

According to Barrett, this handbook for Michigan employers is designed to guide their approach to drug testing when to test, how to test, and what to do with positive test results. He said the book also addresses the legal and employee relations considerations applicable to work rules about substance abuse, disciplinary measures and in vestigative alternatives to drug testing.

Klotz, who is a member of the law firm of Keywell and Rosenfeld in Troy, is a frequent speaker/writer on the subject of employment law. He

said an innovative feature of the handbook is a workbook section which helps employers assess their substance abuse policy and procedure needs and develop lawful, effective policies and procedures based on those needs.

"The purpose of the workbook section is to guide an employer in the process of establishing new policies or reviewing existing ones. The book also contains a series of sample policies and forms," Klotz explained.

"What Michigan employers need is a practical way to do something about drugs hurting them most, the ones being abused in their workplaces. The book has had favorable reviews and has been well received by employers statewide," Klotz said.

Julie

Julie Stockdale is not the typical girl next door. But she did not set out to be one in 1983 when she began what would turn out to be a successful body building career.

Five years later, after one failed marriage and many months of dieting, weight training and self discipline, Julie Stockdale says she has never felt better.

Stockdale, 30, is a tailor at Lapham's men's clothing store in downtown Northville, a career move she made after having manufactured her own custom-made activewear clothing. You might say sports had always played a part in her life.

In junior high school she was active playing baseball and training horses. That was the beginning.

"I actually never was a wimp," she said.

Today, her waist measures 23 inches. Her thighs measure 23 inches (each). Her biceps measure 14 inches and her calves 14½ inches. Expanded, her chest measures 41 inches.

Although she said she is not a power lifter, and admits she could probably lift heavier weights, Stockdale admits that she bench presses 185 pounds, and that she lifts 315 pounds during her leg squatting exercises.

"Most people ask me how I got started," Stockdale said. "When I was a kid I really liked Arnold Schwarzenegger's body. I was really impressed with the way he was built. At the same time, I nothing about women body builders.

"I heard there was a gym in Brighton (where women worked out). I was living in South Lyon at the time. I started going to that gym, and they asked what I wanted to do and I said I wanted to be a body builder. So they kind of set me up on a program. From then on, I learned a lot about it, I read magazines and every piece of material I could get on it, and found out a lot about my own body, and did what worked for me," Stockdale said.

It was about this time that she said she began growing independently of her husband, which eventually would result in the end of their marriage.

"My husband had a hard time accepting it, and we ended up getting a divorce," she said.

"(Body building) really did not cost me my marriage, it just kind of enabled me to see things more for the way they really were, and I realized I had to do some things for myself at that point. (Body building) made me more independent at that point in my life."

Back then, she said she trained three days a week. Today that routine takes six days, for at least two hours each day. Even longer before competition. She said she exercises her

His focus at church is on youth

When Martin R. Body builder tailors her body, gains new independence

body parts in groups — one day her chest and triceps, the next day her legs and biceps, and another for her back and shoulders.

Looking at her, muscled and solid, one may think she is invincible. But Stockdale knows better, and she is not afraid to let you know what such a physique has cost her, physically.

"I take my body past what the average person would accept," she said. "I live with pain everyday" because of intensive training.

Dedication is what Stockdale's sport demands.

When not preparing for competition, Stockdale said she eats whatever she wants to eat. But when readying for competition, when

every bite counts and every weight lifted means that much more, Stockdale's exercise routine becomes obsessive and her diet makes eating scarce.

"Normally during the off-season I eat pretty much what I want," she said. "I do not eat junk food everyday, but I don't cut anything out of my life. If I want a pizza, or something, I eat it."

"But right before a contest, my basic everyday meal is egg whites, oat meal, rice cakes, chicken breasts and fish."

Immediately before competition, Stockdale said it is crucial to control her water weight. She said she drinks absolutely no liquids two days before competition, with boiled rice being her only source of liquid.

Biking becomes always an important part of her routine, but because of the nature of the competition, Stockdale said she cannot simply ride a bike like everyone else.

"I use a stationary bike because it is too dangerous for me to ride on the road," she said. "I mean, if I fall and scrape or bruise something before a contest, I am in trouble. I do not run because when you weigh as much as I do (128 pounds), running is hard on my joints and my knees."

But exercise is only part of preparing for competition. Stockdale said when judges are watching body builders pose, they are watching more than just muscle.

"Your hair has to be done, your nails have to be done, your make up has to be perfect, your tan has to be

perfect," she said. "Everything has to be just so, because every (body builder) is out there trying something (to be noticed). Everybody is looking for an edge. When you stand out in a (posing) line up, you have to have something, or do something, to get those judges to look at you."

And there are tricks to getting extra attention from the judges who are keeping score.

Stockdale said she tans regularly because darker skin shows off her muscularity. She said she oils up her body with almond oil in order to have a "healthy glow," and show off her muscle definition. She said judges like to see veins. So before the competition she eats sugar in order

to raise her blood pressure, which makes her veins pop out.

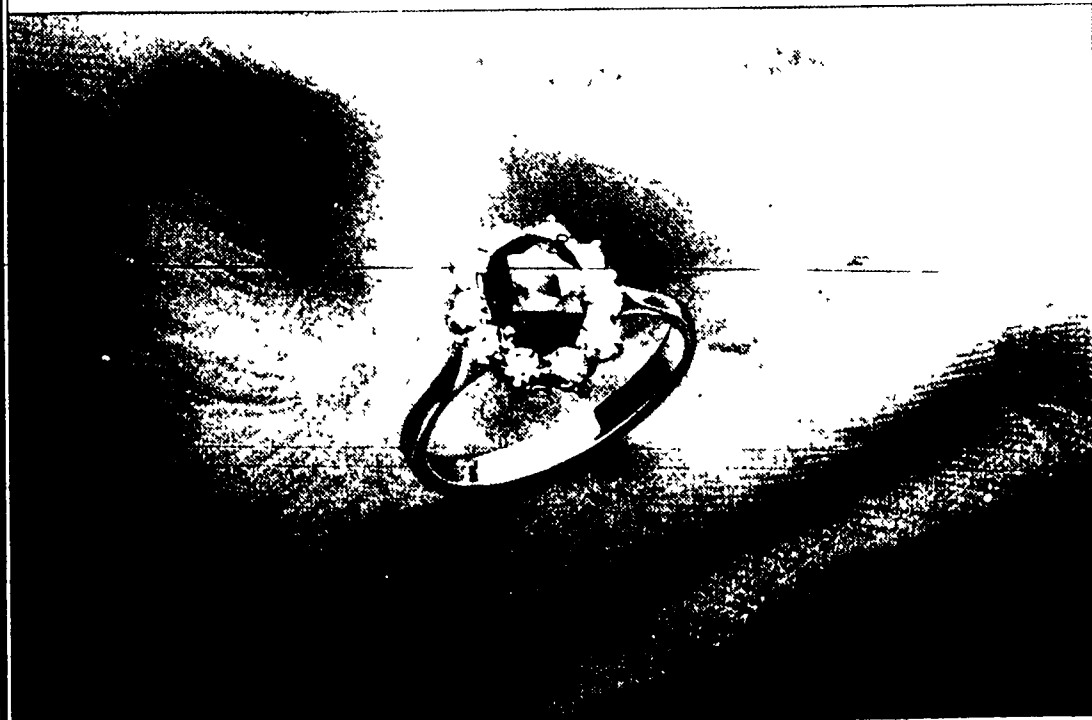
Whatever it takes to win. And Stockdale knows what it is like to win.

Since she began competing actively in 1985, Stockdale has won four state titles and she has placed as high as fourth in national competition. Last week she competed in a national contest in Miami, Fla.

But just as when she started, she doesn't go through the pain and sacrifice just to be the biggest or the best. She does it most of all for herself.

"I know when something is happening to my body," she said. "If I did not know my body so well, I would not be able to do it."

Without injuries, netters can contend

You'll have to excuse Mustang tennis Coach Uta Filkin for predicating most of her expectations on the word "if."

Northville the defending W.L.A.A. Western Division champs, lost just two regulars to graduation. Filkin knows her team has a great deal of potential, but reaching that level can come only if the squad can stay clear of injuries.



Frisbie to pace Mustang harriers in '87

Nineteen eighty-seven could be a championship year or it could be a disappointing 500 campaign. But, the Northville boys cross country season is bound to be interesting.

Coach Ed Gabrys lost two of his top three 1986 performers to graduation, but he has one of the state's top long-distance runners returning. The Mustangs will be hard pressed to come close to equaling last year's 1-2 punch, but should be stronger through the top four runners. Gabrys has a nice group of veterans back in the fold, but a majority of the Western Lakes Activities Association teams are coming back with solid returnees as well.

So, will the '87 campaign will be one to remember or one to forget? Not even Gabrys knows the answer to that one.

"I'm really not quite sure what to expect," he said. "We have a lot of veterans back, but so does the rest of our division. It could be a very good season, or just a mediocre one — only

time will tell."

One of the few givens for this season is that senior John Frisbie will be Northville's top runner. If he can remain healthy, Frisbie could end up as one of the best cross country runners in the state and Gabrys is excited about his top performer.

"John is back and he was our No. 1 a year ago," Gabrys said. "The good thing is that he now knows what to expect and that's something that wasn't there a year ago. I think he'll go out and have an even better season (than last year)."

As a first-year performer in '86, Frisbie placed 27th in the state championship meet and was third in the always-competitive W.L.A.A. Now, both Frisbie and his coach are expecting more.

"There are about four or five guys coming back who will challenge for the top spot in our league and John is certainly one of them," Gabrys pointed out. "We are both looking ahead to what he can do at the state meet as well. Who knows, a top 10 finish is possible."

Frisbie has apparently recovered from a traffic accident that occurred a little more than a month ago. While riding his bike, he was accidentally hit by a pick-up truck, but escaped the incident with only cuts and scrapes. He suffered no broken bones. Doctors told him he may experience some aches and pains because of the accident, but that he should be able to run through it.

"I have a feeling he'll bounce right back and be OK," Gabrys said.

With their No. 2 (Kevin Haas) and No. 3 (Scott Willey) runners out of the picture, one of the big challenges for the Mustangs is to fill those holes. Seniors Scott Sinkwits and Doug Meadows were regulars a year ago and are the runners Gabrys is counting on Sinkwits and Meadows, last year's No. 4 and No. 5 competitors, respectively, have each broken the 18-minute mark and Gabrys would like to see them down near 17 by midseason.

The fourth man will probably be senior Jeff Hoose, who was injured

most of last season. He showed lots of potential as a sophomore but the injuries hampered his progress. Rounding out the starting five is junior Jay Griffith, a newcomer to the team.

Others on the varsity who could contribute include sophomore Jason Hoose, freshman Andy Haas and seniors Mike Nuechterlein and Dave Okasinski. Hoose and Haas are the younger siblings of previous or current Mustang runners, and both have been very impressive in early workouts.

"I don't think we have quite the depth as a year ago but we are more balanced," Gabrys stated. "I think we are better off at the three, four and five spots, and our fifth runner isn't as far behind our top runner as we were in '86 — that should help our scoring."

The biggest key for the Mustangs could rest with fate. The team needs to stay clear of injuries because of the potential lack of depth.

"Last year, the Western Division was very close and it's stacking up the same way this year," Gabrys explained. "(Plymouth) Canton is strong again and they would have to be the favorite. After that, (Livonia) Franklin, (Walled Lake) Western and Northville should all be close. It could be a tossup between those four — it's going to be a wild one."

Cross country team pounds South Lyon in opener, 16-48

Northville's lopsided 16-48 boys cross country victory over South Lyon last Thursday (Sept. 3) wasn't really a surprise, but it was a nice way for the Mustangs to open the '87 season.

Northville grabbed the top four places in the race at Cass Benton Park as seven of the top nine finishers were wearing orange and black Mustang star runner John Frisbie was an easy winner (17:28),

while seniors Scott Sinkwits (18:26), Doug Meadows (18:30) and Jeff Hoose (18:48) followed in order.

Junior Jay Griffith, running in his first cross country meet, placed sixth (19:19), freshman Andy Haas was

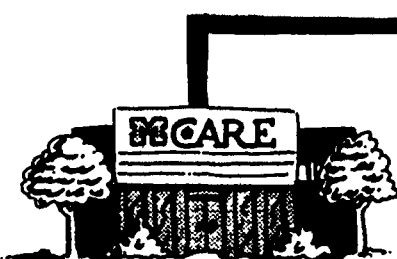
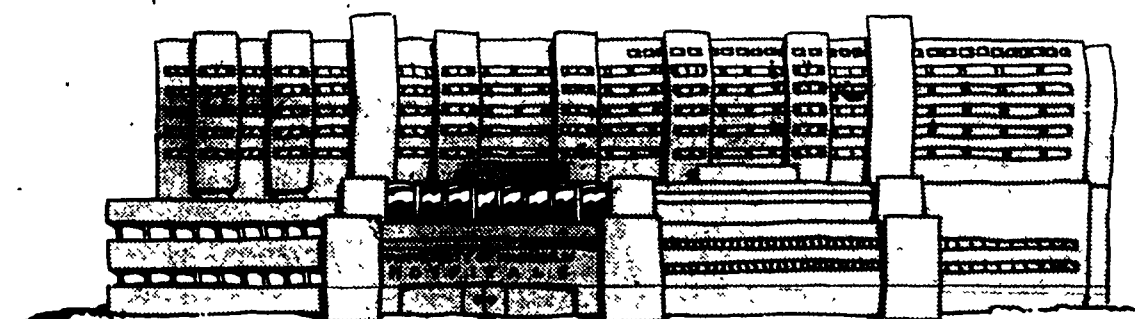
next for Northville (19:56), good for eighth overall, and senior Mike Nuechterlein finished ninth (20:07).

"Time-wise, it wasn't too bad compared with other season openers

It could be an important win for Northville. During the

'86 campaign, the Mustangs lost a few close matches and began to suffer from a lack of confidence.

"We had a practice the next day (Sept. 4) and you could just see the confidence and the momentum the kids have," Morgan explained. "It was almost like a load was lifted off their backs. They seem to be much more relaxed."

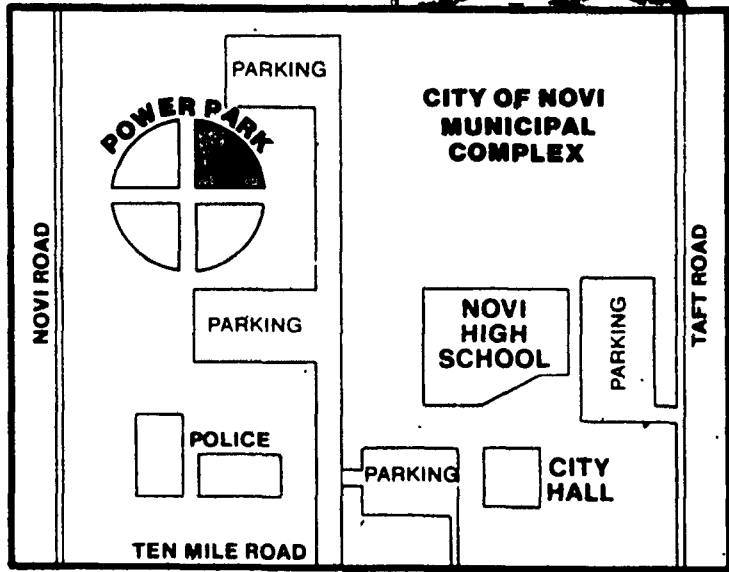
