The application deadline for this year's Land Trust allocations may have precluded a thorough investiga tion and presentation. But rather than waiting for the directors of the fund to make a decision, the recreation comperform as much as the background work as possible

That way, should the funding be approved, the recreation departmen quisition And even if the request is turned down, the department will be one step up on the competition for next year.
agreed on the idea of a committee, but has not made any appointments yet.

Unfortunately, the committee will probably have to cover some ground that's been covered beiore. The initial data gathering phase will surely volve some updating of old inform tion, but this is probably unavoidable.

We hope the committee members can eventually agree on some firm recommendations about what the

The community certainly needs expanded library facilities; that much might be a foregone conclusion to the commitee members.
