As for the winter clothing, that may find its way to the local landfill. No organization that I contacted had anyone on hand or who would be on hand before
Thanksgiving to accept the donation. One woman at one organization went so far as to tell me that it would be better were I to take it to a resale shop.


With that attitude and the fact that each holiday season we hear constantly about homeless people who do lennis shoes instead of January, or who are wearing now on the ground it is no wonder people who have and re trying to reach those who don't. and those who are needy and want winter clothing all get frustrated Somewhere there has to be someone or some group that dollo

If not, there's always an area landfill, but even those facilities are getting picky They aren't taking anything rom anyone who doesn't have a contract to deliver goods
and materials at the fills It's not that landfill operators are picky, u's that we are rapidly running out of capacıty

Someone should be able to come up with a solution. ven a temporary one
It will seem strange to have my mother 1,500 miles away Somehow, it was different when 1 made my first
move away from home. Children are expected to leave the nest. Parents, on the other hand, are supposed to stay home and act as a clearing house for acquisitions like the 10 waffle irons (two from each of the five children), clothing from various stages of development of their great on dormitory walls but somehow don't fit in with great on do
