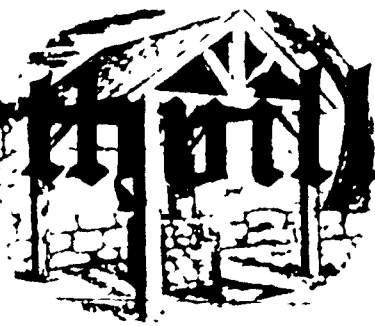

## Gas spill forces day-long cleanup

An unknown amount of gasoline spilled at a gas station on Taft and Eight Mile roads Friday morning, setting off an all-day effort to clean up the ground, the storm sewer and a small stream nearby.

A tank truck was filling underground storage tanks at the Gas 'N' Go station on the northeast corner of the intersection at around 9:45 a.m. Friday when the gas spilled, Northville Fire Chief Jim Allen said. A vent pipe — to let air escape from the tank as it's filled — did not

work, causing gas to back up and flow over the ground, Allen explained.

When the fire department arrived, "there was in excess of a hundred gallons of gasoline spilled on the ground," Allen said.

Tony Pitts, of the Michigan Depart-

ment of Natural Resources environmental response division, said the figure was lower. "A number of statements were made as to the number of gallons, in between 25 and 200. I didn't see enough for it to be 200, so I have to go with the 25," he said.

The fire department put sand on the ground, from Taft Road across the whole length of the gas station, to help prevent the gas from flowing away, Allen said.

"A little bit of it got into the storm sewer," though, he added. Cathy Morse, an environmental quality analyst in the DNR's Northville office, said some gas also got into a lawn area at the station and seeped into the ground, and some flowed into the Randolph Drain, a small stream in the area.

"It was not a big spill. It was very minimal," Morse said. "What was lost in the stream itself was very minimal."

She said at the most, five or 10 gallons of gas ended up in the Randolph Drain. "That's extremely small. That's also not much impact (on) the environment," she added.

Morse said she used a board she found as a crude skimmer to begin cleaning the gas out of the river. "Being a petroleum product, it floats, and is recoverable to some extent," she explained.

Downstream from the spill, Morse said she placed in the water some

## Icy roads lead to accidents

Drivers throughout the city and township reported several minor accidents Friday morning caused by the season's first snowfall. The snow didn't stay around long, just long enough to cover area roadways with a thin but solid veneer of ice.

In the most serious of the incidents, a car lost control, hit the median and bounced into a school bus on Northville Road near Seven Mile. The accident caused slight injuries to an 11-year-old passenger on the bus, as well as significant damage to the car, a city police report said.

The accident occurred at 8:05 a.m. Friday. There were 13 students on the bus, the report said.

Other auto accidents Friday morning included:

• At about 8 a.m., a Northville resident driving on Clement north of Clement Court lost control of the vehicle at the point where the gravel road changes to pavement, a police report said. The vehicle slid into a mailbox near the road. No injuries were reported.

• Just before 8 a.m., on Clement west of Lexington, a Northville resident lost control of the vehicle. Another driver on Clement saw what was happening and stopped, but the first car slid into the second.

## NEWS BRIEFS

**DECISION STILL PENDING** — The Michigan Department of Natural Resources is still about two weeks away from announcing a decision on the Pheasant Hills wetlands, DNR Water Quality Specialist Brooks Williamson said Monday.

"It's pretty much at a standstill," Williamson said. "We are still talking to the developer, working things out. Not necessarily in his favor, but (for) the best decision possible."

## Township eyes utility master plan

Northville Township took a giant step forward — toward putting a master plan for utilities in place.

During a joint meeting of the Planning Commission, the Board of Trustees and the hosting Water and Sewer Commission, Abe Munfah, a vice president with Ayers, Lewis, Norris & May, explained how the plan would be devised and the advantages of implementing such a plan to township government.

"Once the plan is in place, any developer coming into the township will know going into his project what the township requires in terms of sewer lines and water lines. Once you have the plan in place, it is like gospel, but it can be changed," Munfah added.

The township engineers, who were selected by the township after responding to requests for proposals to put together the utility plan, detailed the steps to prepare the plan in three different areas: water, sanitary sewer and storm sewer.

The first step is to collect data, including reviewing existing water main maps, add to that information on known future development, review the land use master plan to identify areas of potential future growth and then look at the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments small area forecast for Northville Township, Munfah explained.

Community Development Director Matthew Modrack told Munfah that there were more accurate figures

available garnered through the recent mid-decade census.

"Although we realize that SEMCOG figures may not be accurate, in the case of federal grant applications, SEMCOG is the clearing house and it's their figures that the government is going to be looking at," Munfah said.

Once the data is collected, the engineers will set up a computer model and then test the model with actual field tests.

A similar program will be used for sanitary sewer and storm sewer evaluation and analysis.

"I think the Water and Sewer Commission is the point body for this project," noted Trustee Thomas Han-

dyside, who is chairman of the commission.

"Just as the Planning Commission is the point commission for the land use master plan, we would be doing the grunt work and making sure the project is completed to the satisfaction of the township."

Charles DeLand, planning commission vice chairperson, suggested there be another joint meeting halfway through the study.

Munfah said he expected the study to take about four months to complete, but noted it could take longer if the township requests a slowdown.

"It's a possibility that we could tie this project into the negotiations with the (state) Department of Natural

Resources about sending sanitary sewage to the Ypsilanti Community Utility Authority," Munfah noted.

Right now, those negotiations are proceeding very well. But if they slow down, we could delay our release of the report especially since a portion of the sanitary sewer capacity analysis makes the assumption that we will be going to YCUA.

While there was little discussion from planning commissioners, water and sewer commissioners or trustees on the scope of work for the study, Township Manager Steve Brock closely questioned Munfah and Donald Weaver, who has been assigned by Ayers Lewis as the contact with the township about developing a policy on utility plans.

"Policy is something that should be arrived at in discussions among yourselves," Weaver said. "But the policy is something that you expect developers to adhere to."

"We are not going to write policy but you have to have it in place so that if you go into court, you can use it as a basis for your decisions," Munfah added.

"Other communities have done this (adopted a master plan for utilities) and have been very successful at forcing adherence to it with very little cost to the homeowners," Munfah said.

He noted that the company would develop the plan that would last for 20 years. "It is important to look at it every five years or so to make sure that it is still the way you want it," Munfah said.

## Municipal update will draw a crowd

Three City of Northville public bodies are scheduled to meet in a special joint meeting to discuss updating the city zoning ordinance, fence ordinance and sign ordinance, and any other concerns the members may have.

Members of the city council, planning commission and historic district commission have been invited to the meeting, which is scheduled for Tuesday, Dec. 8. Other officials — including City Manager Steve Walters, Planning Consultant Ron Nino and Building Official Joe Attard — are also invited.

The idea for the meeting arose from a recent city council discussion of a planning commission recommendation to update the city's zoning ordinance.

At the close of the city council's meeting Nov. 16, council member Jerry Mittman asked about the status of the recommendation. Before being elected to the council in the recent city election, Mittman was a member and three-year chairperson of the planning commission.

After a request from the council three years ago, Mittman said, the commission began a zoning ordinance review which was finished about six months ago. The commission recommended changes which were mostly consolidation, minor reorganization and updating

language of the ordinance.

Mayor Chris Johnson said that members of the historic district commission had also asked for a review of the zoning ordinance, and sign and fence regulations. Johnson suggested the three bodies meet in a study ses-

sion to discuss the issues.

At the planning commission meeting Nov. 17, Walters said one item that may be considered in the review is allowing certain historically-appropriate front yard fences within the historic district.

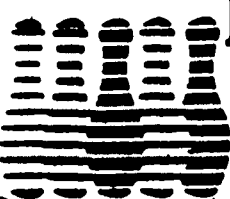

## School heads decry Harden report

If the Harden Commission report is adopted by the Michigan State Board of Education, there will be few winners among the state's school districts.

At least that's the assessment of George Bell, superintendent of the Northville Public Schools, and John Hoben, superintendent of Plymouth-Canton public schools.

The two men were guests Friday afternoon on the Omnicon Cable television show, "County Impact."

"Any program that is premised upon the idea that you are going to equalize funding across the state is going to take from the out of formula districts to give to the in-formula districts," Bell said.

Hoben's whose district is in formula, albeit "just barely," said that if the commission report were implemented, at best "we could hope to break even."

The commission report calls for equalizing business taxes statewide at 23 mills, and limiting residential and farm taxes to 18 mills.

Bell noted that there was a need to equalize opportunities (in terms of funding per student) across the state,

but said, "I do not see our purposes being met by diminishing the opportunities available to some students in order to enhance those for others."

Hoben pointed out that the issue is one of "excellence and equity."

"When we have districts across the state that are offering foreign language for the first year to a high school student, and when geometry is the furthest they can go in high school mathematics, then there certainly is a problem and the economics is what causes those inequities to exist. The Harden report does not address that," Hoben said.

Hoben said the commission report really reflects the composition of the 47-member body. "There were a number of people from the Chamber of Commerce, the business community and corporations. They were obviously looking out for their interests and they did that."

"It's also interesting to note that of the people who voted in favor of the report, many of them now are adding 'buts' and explanations to their favorable votes," Bell said.

Both men also said they were opposed to the role the state would take in local education.

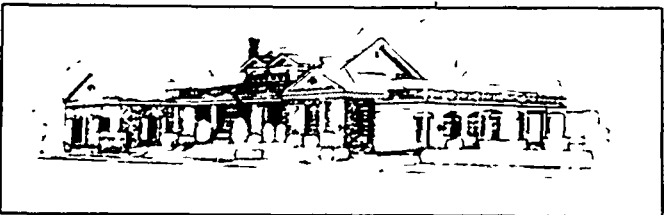

## Area Navy man finds challenge

Take a helicopter with the flight characteristics of a dragonfly, put it in the hands of Navy men like David Fisher of Northville, give them a mission crucial to national defense, and you have one of the U.S. Navy's newest submarine hunting helicopter squadrons.

Based at the North Island Naval Air Station in San Diego, Fisher is a pilot in Helicopter Anti-Submarine Squadron Light 47.

"I'm responsible for flying helicopters, but my primary job is to schedule flight training operations," says the 25 year old, who is the son of Larry and Dolly Fisher of Northville.

"It's a challenging job, but the Navy has given me the training and experience to get it done. The pace is often hectic, but the end result is an operations department that can project our commitments to the fleet and other squadron assignments."

As a new squadron, HSL-47 currently is in the establishment phase of administration, maintenance and tactical training activities.

The squadron has only one helicopter but will receive a helicopter each month for the next 12 months.

Within seven months the squadron will be ready for deployment aboard Navy ships. The squadron flies the Sikorsky SH-60B helicopter. Known as the Seahawk, it is loaded with state-of-the-art computers and electronics designed to detect, track and neutralize enemy submarines in the event of war.

A 1980 graduate of Northville High School, Fisher earned a bachelor's degree in general engineering from the Naval Academy.

After his graduation and commissioning in 1985, he completed Navy

Flight School in Pensacola, Fla., where he earned his "wings," the insignia of naval aviators.

"I joined the Navy because I knew it would be tough, but the challenging environment is what I wanted, rather than a routine 9-to-5 private-sector job," said Fisher.

"The Navy has helped me become a naval officer with skills to achieve my best at any task," said the Navy lieutenant junior grade.

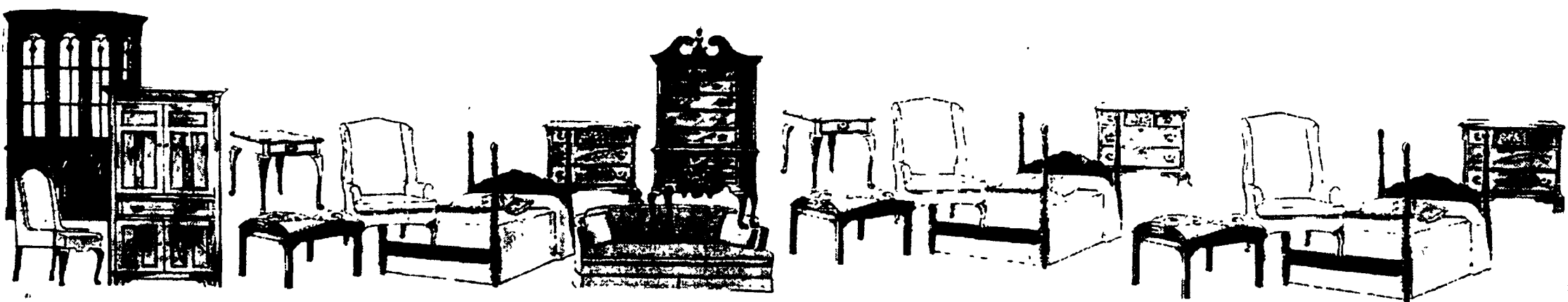
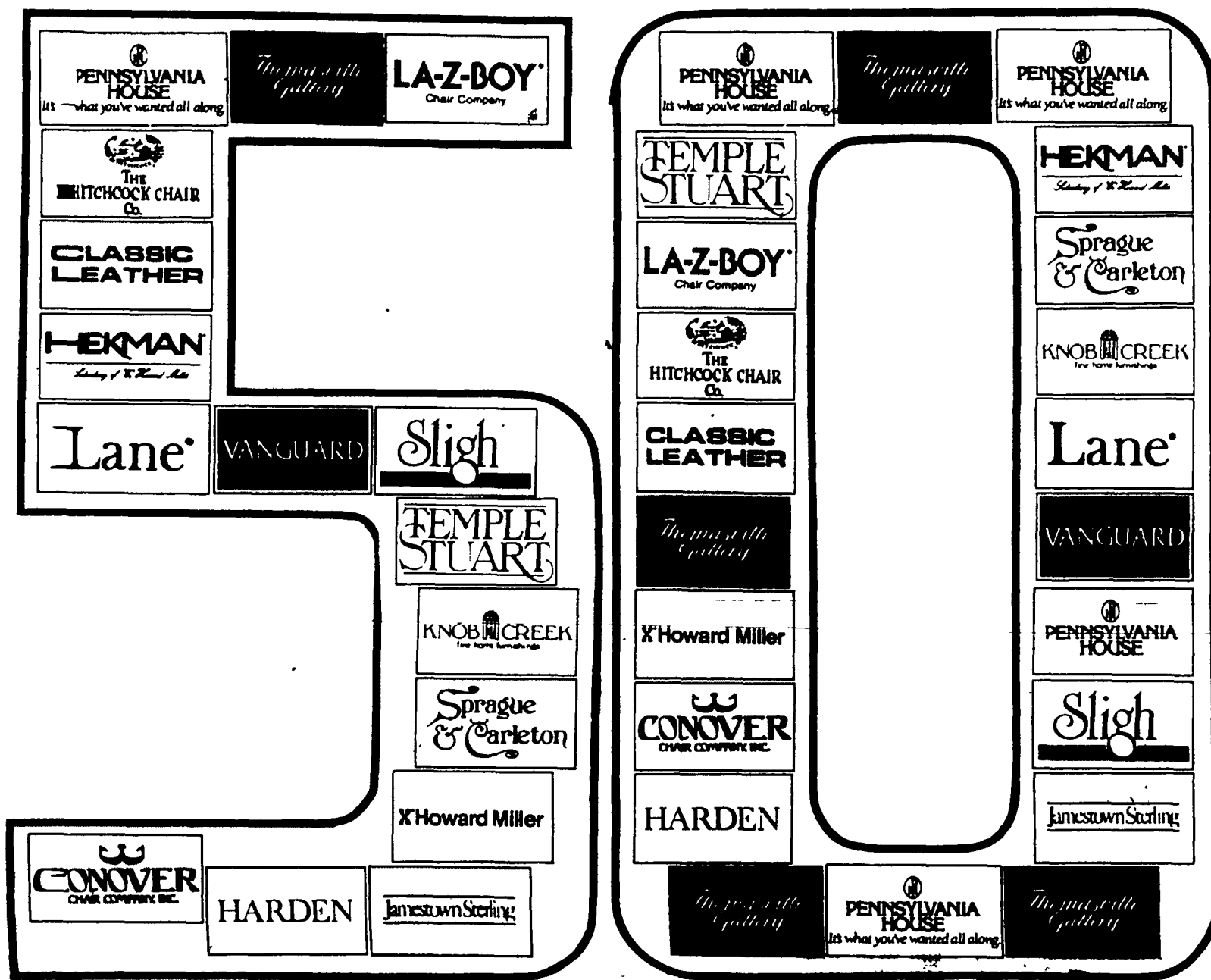

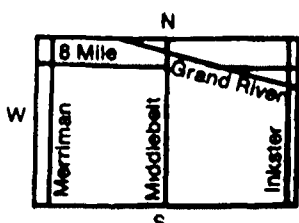

A Dearborn resident told township police she was northbound on Sheldon when the animal ran in front of her car. She was unable to stop in time, and struck the animal, wounding it.

Reserve officer Donald Lanning, who was called to the scene at 7:28

p.m. Nov. 22, shot and killed the animal.

**BEWARE FALLING OBJECTS** — A Rogers Street resident told township police Nov. 16 that while traveling in his car southbound on Edward Hines Drive, he observed some people throwing objects from the Six Mile Road bridge.

The complainant said he thought the people on the bridge were throwing rocks or pebbles, some of which struck his vehicle and did approximately \$200 worth of damage.

Although the man said he stopped his car and tried to locate the individuals involved, he said by the time he reached the bridge area, it was deserted.

The officer was able to apprehend the subject and to hold him until NRP safety officers arrived at the scene.

No one was injured in the incident.

The band director watched as the suspect walked out of the room carrying a "large object" which the director said he thought was the missing drum set, although he was not able to positively state that he could positively identify the "large object" as the missing drum set.

## Two men found guilty in local armed robbery

Michael Harwood and Frank Blair, accused of the Oct. 3 armed robbery of two Domino's Pizza employees making a night deposit at the Comerica Bank on Eight Mile Road, Monday were found guilty of armed robbery and using a gun during the commission of a felony.

Sentencing is scheduled for Dec. 18 and the two men could be sentenced up to life in prison plus two years, Northville Township Police Capt. Philip Presnell said.

Presnell, Detective Michael Panagiotides and officers John Werth and William Harrison were instrumental in the capture of the two men and in testifying during the week-long bench trial before Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Kathleen MacDonald.

Harwood had been in the Wayne County Jail, unable to post bond, since he and Blair were deported last spring from Canada after serving time in an Ontario jail for counterfeiting.

Blair's \$25,000 cash bond was revoked and he was remanded to the custody of the Wayne County Sheriff's Department.

"Without the excellent police work of Panagiotides, who headed up the investigation, with the assistance of Werth and Harrison, it would have been very, very difficult to break this case," Presnell said, noting that Blair and Harwood wore nylon stockings over their faces when they committed the crime. "The officers performed their jobs extremely well."

# Plymouth concerned about Five Mile

In case Northville Township planning commissioners thought they were working in a vacuum, a letter from Plymouth Township may have convinced them that they are not.

The letter, written by Plymouth Township planning director James Anulewicz, said that Plymouth Township is concerned about commercial development along Five Mile Road between Haggerty and Bradner and that the neighboring community would like some "cross communication regarding the potential of developing commercial on the north side of Five Mile extending from Beck Road to Sheldon Road."

The Northville Township Planning Commission had discussed the possibility of allowing some type of commercial development along Five Mile as part of the land use plan for the county acreage. However, the planners took no action on that possibility and the county land, which extends from Five Mile to Six Mile roads and from Beck Road to Sheldon Road still has not gone on the

open market

"I would agree that not only is there potential, but there is a need for some commercial development," Anulewicz said. He noted that on the Plymouth Township (south) side of Five Mile, there currently is a high-quality light industrial development.

"We adhere to the idea that the extension of strip commercial along a major thoroughfare is not advantageous to a community. We would not, however, see these areas (commercial development at Beck and Five Mile) extending in a long lineal fashion similar to the kind of development that previously occurred along Ann Arbor Road in our community," he concluded.

Anulewicz said it was not uncommon for Plymouth Township to send letters to neighboring communities regarding their planned developments at their borders with Plymouth.

"We have done this (sent letters) in the past to Canton Township, to

Livonia and to other communities and none of our letters have been met negatively."

Noting that there has been a history of cooperation between Northville and Plymouth townships, Matt Modrack, Northville Township's director of community development, said that the letter was "interesting."

"I had talked to Jim about the plans in Northville and he expressed his concerns. I told him to put them in writing and he did," Modrack said.

Pat Wright, chairperson of the Northville Township planning commission, said she was not upset by the letter.

"It seems like a rather congenial letter, but I don't know whether it carries any weight. I think he just wanted us to know that Plymouth Township is concerned about what was happening along Five Mile Road," she said.

Wright added that she had no idea whether there would be any discus-

sion about the missive during the planning commission meeting last night.

"It's very possible that we will just receive and file it," she said.

Larry Sheehan, the planning commissioner who first proposed the possible commercial development, said he still thinks the best use of the land at Five Mile and Beck would be a commercial development.

"I don't think, judging from the letter, that our plans are inconsistent with those in Plymouth Township. I think they are just trying to be neighborly," Sheehan said.

Anulewicz said he really did not expect any immediate action from Northville Township. "This is more of an informational type of letter."

He noted that in the past, most recently with a Canton Township development that bordered Plymouth Township's Main Street, Canton ensured that its bordering commercial development was well landscaped and bermed.

## Drain surplus won't trickle down to Northville

Neither Northville Township nor the City of Northville will be sharing in \$17.5 million in surplus drain money retained in accounts under the Wayne County Drain Commissioner.

In most cases, the money was surplus from original drain construction and neither of the local municipalities was involved in that effort under the time guidelines.

"As I understand it after talking to our county commissioner, in order to get the rebate, you had to spend the money in the first place," said Nor-

thville Township Manager Steven Brock. "We didn't, so we don't get any money back."

The Wayne County general fund was able to recover \$1.7 million from the account, left behind when Charles Youngblood's elective office as drain commissioner was eliminated by the voters in November 1986.

"This money should have been turned over to the communities over the years," said Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara. "Instead, it was just allowed to accumulate in the bank while the drain

commissioner continued to hit the communities with additional assessments."

The refunded money falls into two categories, McNamara explained: money from drains with outstanding bonds for the original construction and money from drains where the bonds have been retired.

The money can be used to offset a community's drain assessments on outstanding bonds, or, if the bonds have been paid off, a community may opt to use the money for other drain projects or reduce general fund

millages.

The downriver community of Taylor will receive the largest rebate, slightly more than \$3 million, Livonia will get about \$2.1 million, and Plymouth Township, \$79,000.

McNamara said he is forwarding a recommendation to the Wayne County Drainage Board that the surplus funds be returned to the communities "immediately." Drainage board action is required for the refunds to take effect and McNamara indicated he hoped to have action completed by the end of the year.

The regular meeting of the Northville City Council was called to order in the Council Chambers by Mayor Vernon at 8:00 p.m.

1. **PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:**

2. **ROLL CALL:**

3. **APPROVAL OF COUNCIL MINUTES:**

The minutes of the regular meeting on October 19, 1987, of the Northville City Council were approved and placed on file as submitted.

4. **DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS:**

a. Finance — Utility Billing report was discussed and placed on file.

b. Library 1988 Budget:

City Council was in agreement that due to a proposed reduction by the Township, a joint budget study group should be formed for discussion and a recommendation. It was noted the study group should consist of two City Council members and two Township Trustees.

Mayor Vernon asked Councilwoman Ayers and Councilman Buckland to sit on the study group and report back to the Council with recommendations.

5. **CONSENT AGENDA:**

Moved, supported, and carried to adopt the Consent Agenda A, through E.

6. **PUBLIC HEARING: VACATE ALLEY BETWEEN GARDNER & JOHNSON STREETS**

Following discussion, it was moved, supported, and carried to deny the request for vacating the alley between Gardner and Johnson Streets.

7. **VACANT CITY PROPERTY REPORT:**

Lake and Grace Street Property: Moved, supported, and carried to place the City property at the corner of Lake and Grace Streets, known as the W 40 Ft. of Lot 8, Yerkes & Horton's Addition (approx. 40' x 60') located at the northwest corner of Lake and Grace Streets, up for sale on the basis that it would not be built on in any way which does not conform to the Zoning Ordinance for standard-sized lots.

High and Randolph Street Property: Council preferred the City Manager's third recommendation to remove the encroachment and place the property, Lot 588, Northville Assessor's Plat Number 6, located at the northeast corner of High and Randolph Streets up for sale since the encroachment is a portion of the driveway that could be removed without appearing to cause a hardship for the adjacent property owner.

Mayor Vernon asked the City Manager to approach the property owners adjacent to the City lot and request they remove the portion of the driveway which is on the City lot, unless they can show a hardship, and report back to Council.

Gridwood and Cady Street Property: Moved, supported, and carried to offer the W part of Lot 60, measuring approx. 30 Ft. on the N line and 18 Ft. on the south line, and 120 Ft. north to south, Assessor's Northville Plat No. 2, located at the southwest corner of Gridwood and Cady for sale to Tri-County and Community Federal Credit Union, noting that selling the property as described is clearly to the City's advantage to sell without bidding the property for sale.

11. **LEXINGTON CONDOS: Request to Lease Land:**

Moved, supported, and carried to authorize the City Manager to prepare a lease agreement with the Lexington Condominium Home Owners Association to lease the City property located within the condo complex for the amount of \$1.00 per year with a release included, as well as insurance requirements that name the City of Northville as additionally insured with underlying limits coverage and that all State of Michigan conditions be adhered to.

12. **LEXINGTON CONDOS: POND SEDIMENT PROBLEM:**

City Council was in agreement that Singh Development Company, the developer of Pheasant Hills Subdivision, should be notified regarding the removal of the soil sediment from the drain and pond.

City Manager Walters stated he will contact the condo association so they can be present at the meeting with Singh Development concerning the removal of the soil sediment.

17. **POST OFFICE PARKING - WING STREET:**

Moved, supported, and carried to ask the Police Chief to rescind the handicapped and restricted parking traffic order and reinstate the former parking conditions in front of the Post Office.

Councilman Folino reviewed his letter dated October 28, 1987, addressed to the City Council. # Northville students do well on the MEAP test

voluntary part of the examination. "We chose not to administer that portion of the test," McMaster said. "We feel our children are tested enough. They take the California achievement test and the results of that show we stack up very well nationally."

Results of the 1987 examination which was given in late September, showed that of the 241 students taking the mathematics portion of the test, 97.5 percent achieved 75 percent or more of the test goals. In the reading portion of the exam, 94.2 percent of the fourth-graders achieved 75 per-

cent of the goals.

Seventh-grade results showed that 86.7 percent of the students achieved 75 percent of the goals in math and 92.0 percent met the upper limit in reading. Among 10th-graders, 79.3 percent in math reached the 75 percent goal and 89.5 percent in reading. McMaster said she was "not at all concerned" about the results which showed the 0.4 percent of the seventh-graders and 1.8 percent of the 10th-graders met only minimum standards.

"In a district the size of Northville, that number can equate to one student. And since the test was given to every fourth-, seventh- and 10th-grade student in school that day,

some of whom are classified as special education students, I think we did very, very well overall."

McMaster noted that some Northville students are classified as learning disabled, and, while they may take some classes through the special education programs, the majority of their time is spent in a regular classroom setting.

While information provided by the state lists the district's students performances in 1986, 1985 and 1980, McMaster said those figures are misleading as a comparison for this year's results.

"You can't compare the results of the students in 1987 with the 1986

results. It's not the same group of youngsters."

She said she planned to complete a building by building analysis of each portion of the test and to provide a comparison to board of education members of how the students who currently are 10th graders performed as seventh and fourth graders and how the current seventh graders performed as fourth graders.

"That way, we can see whether we as a district are meeting the goals and, if there is a problem, we can correct it," she said.

McMaster said she hoped to have the analysis complete for a January meeting of the board.

commercially-produced sheets which absorb petroleum and repel water.

A company called Marine Pollution Control pumped out catch basins in the storm sewer to clean out the gas in the sewer system, and also loaded the gas-logged sand into drums for disposal, Morse said.

Both Allen and Morse said the procedures to handle a gas spill worked well. "That's the important thing," Allen said.

After the spill occurred, in addition to the fire department and the DNR, other agencies notified included the Environmental Protection Agency and the state police, Allen said. The Northville Police Department also assisted at the site.

"It was really not the worst (spill) I've ever seen," Morse said. "I think they caught it in time."

Elena Coccari, manager of public affairs for Gas 'N' Go, also said the situation was handled well. "It's not our position to point fingers of fault. It's our position to work with whoever we have to and get the problem solved," she said.

## Our Opinions

### Utility master plan will aid township

A master plan for utilities in Northville Township is an excellent idea and needs to be implemented as soon as possible.

Just as a master plan for land usage details for developers and residents exactly what types of development and efforts are planned for what areas of a community, a utility master plan can leave no uncertainty of requirements for development of water lines and sewer systems.

With a number of projects delayed because of on-going questions by state and county agencies about the township's current capacity to the lines that carry sanitary sewerage to the Detroit treatment plant, there is no time like the present to earmark exactly what capacity is necessary in the future.

Representatives of Ayres, Lewis, Norris & May, the engineering firm which has been selected to work with township officials and the water and sewer commission to create the plan, say they anticipate having the work completed within four months, and that is well within time constraints — not only for the next construction season but prior to when the county-owned 1,000 acres will go on the market — should be in place.

If, as township officials hope, the utility master plan spells out in no

uncertain terms the sizes of pipes, locations of interceptors and water lines for an entire area, rather than an individual development, then there can be no excuse for ignorance on the part of those who would hope to build in those areas. They will have the information necessary to determine costs for water and sewers for a particular area and then can determine whether or not to build in that area.

Like the land use master plan, the utility master plan provides flexibility. Although the plan is designed to service the community for the next 20 years, the representatives of Ayres, Lewis, Norris & May stated that the plan should be reviewed every five years. That is a logical time span.

Recognizing the need to bring together trustees, planning commissioners, water and sewer commissioners and the department heads who will most closely be affected by the plan during initial discussion of the project was a good first step. Hopefully that cooperation will continue as data is gathered and the plan actually created.

It is surprising that more communities have not developed a utility master plan given that so many municipalities rely daily on their land use master plans. It is hoped that Northville Township's plan, once complete, will be detailed, and well thought out.

### Redesign of corner: good use of funds

At the risk of jinxing something before it actually happens, it looks like the City of Northville may be able to redo the intersection at Novi Road and Eight Mile Road without even spending very much money to do so.

It's kind of hard to figure out whom to thank for this. The city council recently voted to submit the project for funding from Oakland County's annual tri-party road program and its one-time budget surplus refund program.

So — assuming the project is approved — the gratitude should be distributed among City Manager Steve Walters, who suggested the project to the council and pursued it with the county; the council, for voting in favor of the idea; the Oakland County road,

commission and board of commissioners, for keeping the tri-party program running; and the county board again, especially commissioner John Calandro, for voting the surplus money to local communities.

That's quite a list, but they all deserve a pat on the back. Really, this project is a good example of government really acting to serve the needs of the people.

Admittedly, a poorly-designed intersection isn't the most pressing concern in the world — but it sure is inconvenient. It's going to be a while before we actually see any tangible results of this plan, but we're glad such results are at least on the horizon.

### Study session will improve operation

City officials are taking a step in the right direction with a study session type of meeting being planned between the city council, planning commission and historic district commission.

The idea for such a meeting came up recently when council member Jerry Mittman asked when the city council would consider a revision of the zoning ordinance recommended by the planning commission several months ago, when Mittman was its chairperson. That recommendation — which would basically just update the ordinance and make it better organized — has been sitting around too long without consideration by the council.

But that is just part of the probable discussion at the meeting; the officials likely also will talk about other changes to the zoning ordinance, fence ordinance and sign ordinance.

This meeting should provide an excellent forum for three of the city's most vital entities to discuss perspectives and opinions on what is happening and should be happening for the city. Mayor Chris Johnson and the other officials deserve commendation for agreeing to this session; we look forward to improved communication and other positive results.

## Giving is hard

Excuse my bleeding heart for getting upset, but I had a recent very disconcerting experience.

After living in Michigan for her entire life, my mother has opted to retire to Arizona. You know, the place where the sun always shines and the temperature seldom drops below 70 during the day and 40 at night.

To prepare for her move, she has 59 years of winter clothing to dispose of, not to mention the furniture from five houses, two apartments, five children, four grandchildren and a few other sundry moves and individuals.

While some of the stuff is not in mint condition, the real junk has already been given to the trash collector. What's left is good, clean clothing and furniture, with a collection of canned and jar goods thrown in for good measure.

Last week, I tried to give away the stuff that will not be going to Arizona. It seems nobody wants it.

I know that Goodwill Industries will not take furniture that needs repair or is outdated or that its drivers don't approve of, but I also had heard that a number of other agencies will take the good-condition castoffs.

So far, I have been unable to find those organizations. A call to a local community service organization resulted in the comment that it only will accept Thanksgiving-related food items prior to Thanksgiving. I guess that means only canned yams, but no canned spinach.

As for the winter clothing, that may find its way to the local landfill. No organization that I contacted had anyone on hand or who would be on hand before Thanksgiving to accept the donation. One woman at one organization went so far as to tell me that it would be better were I to take it to a resale shop.



With that attitude and the fact that each holiday season we hear constantly about homeless people who do not have winter coats in January, or who are wearing tennis shoes instead of boots when there is 10 inches of snow on the ground, it is no wonder people who have and are trying to reach those who don't, and those who are needy and want winter clothing all get frustrated. Somewhere there has to be someone or some group that would be willing to accept a donation.

If not, there's always an area landfill, but even those facilities are getting picky. They aren't taking anything from anyone who doesn't have a contract to deliver goods and materials at the fills. It's not that landfill operators are picky, it's that we are rapidly running out of capacity.

Someone should be able to come up with a solution, even a temporary one.

It will seem strange to have my mother 1,500 miles away. Somehow, it was different when I made my first move away from home. Children are expected to leave the nest. Parents, on the other hand, are supposed to stay home and act as a clearing house for acquisitions like the 10 waffle irons (two from each of the five children), clothing from various stages of development of their children, not to mention the wall hangings that looked great on dormitory walls but somehow don't fit in with adult decor.

When she moves, I won't be able to stop in for a home-cooked meal when I forget to keep the refrigerator stocked, or to borrow her car when mine is in the shop or even to gossip over a cup of tea.

Of course, there are some benefits. She won't have to worry about what she will find on the floor of my condo should she stop in unannounced, either. But maybe I can surprise her and keep a pile of dirty laundry, just in case.

# New mayor introduces changes in the setup of city council agenda

Anyone attending a Northville city council meeting in the weeks ahead may notice some changes in the way the meetings are organized.

New city Mayor Chris Johnson has initiated a few changes in the way the city council's agenda is set up, in an attempt to streamline the meetings. In a recent memo to city council members, Johnson outlined the changes and said he hopes to end most council meetings by 10 or 10:30 p.m. so that our decisions are not made while we are tired.

Johnson introduced the changes at the council's meeting Nov. 16, which was the first regular council meeting Johnson presided over.

His changes to the agenda organization include:

- Moving the adoption of the agenda to the beginning of the meeting. In the memo Johnson explained that this still will allow revision of the agenda with regard to the number of people present at the meeting for a specific item.
- Adoption of the agenda now also includes approval of the consent agenda. The consent agenda is a list of routine business which is passed in a single motion. If a council member wants to discuss an item on the consent agenda, he or she just asks that it be removed and placed on the regular meeting agenda.
- Adding a specific time for citizen comment. "This particular item on the agenda would permit any citizen

to address the city council on any particular item not found later on the agenda or to address the council if the person cannot stay until that agenda item is discussed," Johnson's memo reads. In the past, citizen comment has been heard during agenda revision and public hearings, but has not been a specific agenda item.

- Deleting the agenda item "Department Reports." The acceptance of reports from city departments now becomes part of the consent agenda. "Those items of business (in department reports) that require affirmative action by the council will now be handled as specific agenda topics," the memo reads.
- Deleting reports from county commissioners as an agenda item. The memo explains that when the city's Oakland or Wayne county commissioners (John Calandro and Susan Heintz, respectively) do attend meetings to give a report, they may be placed on the agenda when it is adopted.
- Finally, Johnson's memo says that "I will be asking the city manager to become more actively involved in the presentation of the background, options and recommendations of the city administration on agenda topics. This will have the additional benefit of educating the audience on those items for which they are specifically attending the meeting and those items that may precede their particular concern."

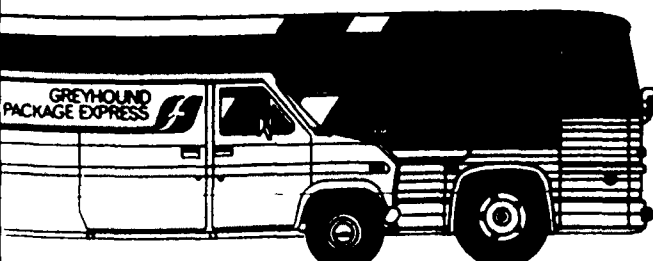

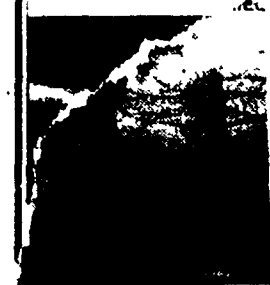

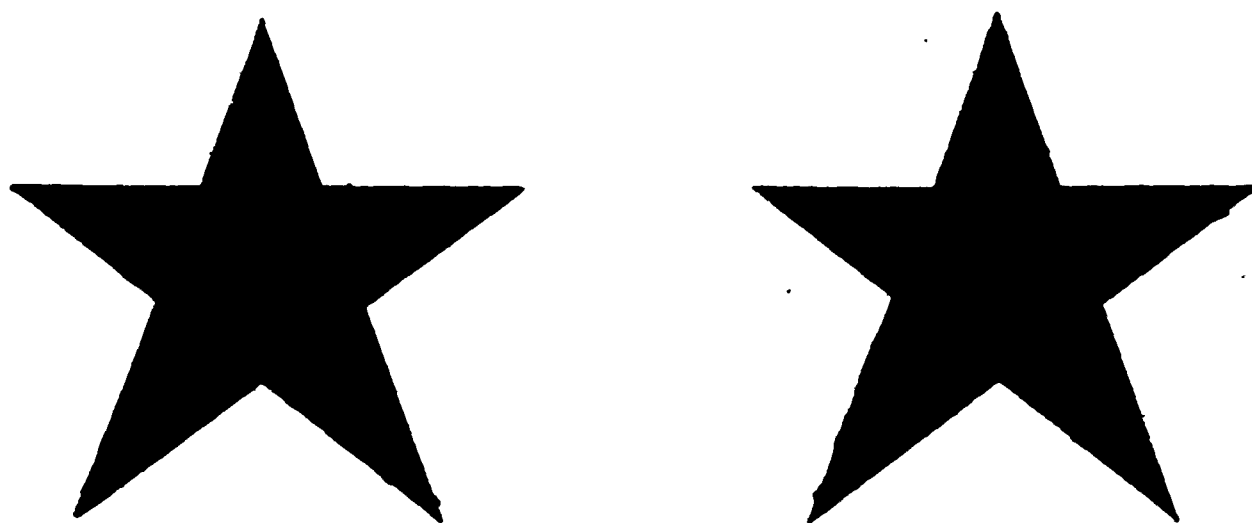

### Utility master plan will aid township

A master plan for utilities in Northville Township is an excellent idea and needs to be implemented as soon as possible.

Just as a master plan for land usage details for developers and residents exactly what types of development and efforts are planned for what areas of a community, a utility master plan can leave no uncertainty of requirements for development of water lines and sewer systems.

With a number of projects delayed because of on-going questions by state and county agencies about the township's current capacity to the lines that carry sanitary sewerage to the Detroit treatment plant, there is no time like the present to earmark exactly what capacity is necessary in the future.

Representatives of Ayres, Lewis, Norris & May, the engineering firm which has been selected to work with township officials and the water and sewer commission to create the plan, say they anticipate having the work completed within four months, and that is well within time constraints — not only for the next construction season but prior to when the county-owned 1,000 acres will go on the market — should be in place.

If, as township officials hope, the utility master plan spells out in no

uncertain terms the sizes of pipes, locations of interceptors and water lines for an entire area, rather than an individual development, then there can be no excuse for ignorance on the part of those who would hope to build in those areas. They will have the information necessary to determine costs for water and sewers for a particular area and then can determine whether or not to build in that area.

Like the land use master plan, the utility master plan provides flexibility. Although the plan is designed to service the community for the next 20 years, the representatives of Ayres, Lewis, Norris & May stated that the plan should be reviewed every five years. That is a logical time span.

Recognizing the need to bring together trustees, planning commissioners, water and sewer commissioners and the department heads who will most closely be affected by the plan during initial discussion of the project was a good first step. Hopefully that cooperation will continue as data is gathered and the plan actually created.

It is surprising that more communities have not developed a utility master plan given that so many municipalities rely daily on their land use master plans. It is hoped that Northville Township's plan, once complete, will be detailed, and well thought out.

### Redesign of corner: good use of funds

At the risk of jinxing something before it actually happens, it looks like the City of Northville may be able to redo the intersection at Novi Road and Eight Mile Road without even spending very much money to do so.

It's kind of hard to figure out whom to thank for this. The city council recently voted to submit the project for funding from Oakland County's annual tri-party road program and its one-time budget surplus refund program.

So — assuming the project is approved — the gratitude should be distributed among City Manager Steve Walters, who suggested the project to the council and pursued it with the county; the council, for voting in favor of the idea; the Oakland County road

commission and board of commissioners, for keeping the tri-party program running; and the county board again, especially commissioner John Calandro, for voting the surplus money to local communities.

That's quite a list, but they all deserve a pat on the back. Really, this project is a good example of government really acting to serve the needs of the people.

Admittedly, a poorly-designed intersection isn't the most pressing concern in the world — but it sure is inconvenient. It's going to be a while before we actually see any tangible results of this plan, but we're glad such results are at least on the horizon.

### Study session will improve operation

City officials are taking a step in the right direction with a study session type of meeting being planned between the city council, planning commission and historic district commission.

The idea for such a meeting came up recently when council member Jerry Mittman asked when the city council would consider a revision of the zoning ordinance recommended by the planning commission several months ago, when Mittman was its chairperson. That recommendation — which would basically just update the ordinance and make it better organized — has been sitting around too long without consideration by the council.

But that is just part of the probable discussion at the meeting; the officials likely also will talk about other changes to the zoning ordinance, fence ordinance and sign ordinance.

This meeting should provide an excellent forum for three of the city's most vital entities to discuss perspectives and opinions on what is happening and should be happening for the city. Mayor Chris Johnson and the other officials deserve commendation for agreeing to this session; we look forward to improved communication and other positive results.

## Giving is hard

To prepare for her move, she has 59 years of winter clothing to dispose of, not to mention the furniture from five houses, two apartments, five children, four grandchildren and a few other sundry moves and individuals.

While some of the stuff is not in mint condition, the real junk has already been given to the trash collector. What's left is good, clean clothing and furniture, with a collection of canned and jar goods thrown in for good measure.

Last week, I tried to give away the stuff that will not be going to Arizona. It seems nobody wants it.

I know that Goodwill Industries will not take furniture that needs repair or is outdated or that its drivers don't approve of, but I also had heard that a number of other agencies will take the good-condition castoffs.

So far, I have been unable to find those organizations. A call to a local community service organization resulted in the comment that it only will accept Thanksgiving-related food items prior to Thanksgiving. I guess that means only canned yams, but no canned spinach.

As for the winter clothing, that may find its way to the local landfill. No organization that I contacted had anyone on hand or who would be on hand before Thanksgiving to accept the donation. One woman at one organization went so far as to tell me that it would be better were I to take it to a resale shop.

With that attitude and the fact that each holiday season we hear constantly about homeless people who do not have winter coats in January, or who are wearing tennis shoes instead of boots when there is 10 inches of snow on the ground, it is no wonder people who have and are trying to reach those who don't, and those who are needy and want winter clothing all get frustrated. Somewhere there has to be someone or some group that would be willing to accept a donation.

If not, there's always an area landfill, but even those facilities are getting picky. They aren't taking anything from anyone who doesn't have a contract to deliver goods and materials at the fills. It's not that landfill operators are picky, it's that we are rapidly running out of capacity.

Someone should be able to come up with a solution, even a temporary one.

It will seem strange to have my mother 1,500 miles away. Somehow, it was different when I made my first move away from home. Children are expected to leave the nest. Parents, on the other hand, are supposed to stay home and act as a clearing house for acquisitions like the 10 waffle irons (two from each of the five children), clothing from various stages of development of their children, not to mention the wall hangings that looked great on dormitory walls but somehow don't fit in with adult decor.

When she moves, I won't be able to stop in for a home-cooked meal when I forget to keep the refrigerator stocked, or to borrow her car when mine is in the shop or even to gossip over a cup of tea.

Of course, there are some benefits. She won't have to worry about what she will find on the floor of my condo should she stop in unannounced, either. But maybe I can surprise her and keep a pile of dirty laundry, just in case.

# Tax reform changes holiday shopping

If you haven't already begun your holiday shopping, you've probably at least started thinking about it — haven't you?

Well, last year's Tax Reform Act (TRA) has given you something more to think about than what to get your Aunt Kathy.

According to the Michigan Association of CPAs, you might want to start thinking about how to pay for those holiday purchases in light of the phasing out of the income tax interest deduction for consumer debt.

This year, only 65 percent of consumer debt interest from credit cards, auto loans, personal loans, etc. is deductible. Next year it drops to 40 percent, in 1989, 20 percent, 10 percent in 1990, and is finally eliminated in 1991.

Before you start calculating 65 percent of the interest on your holiday purchases, be aware that the 40 percent figure goes into effect January 1. So if you don't pay your credit card bills in full by that date, you'll only be able to deduct 40 percent of your interest charges. And the deduction will be worth less because of generally lower tax rates.

The best way to pay for holiday gifts is, of course, with cash. Better

yet, pay with cash that you saved over the course of the year expressly for holiday shopping. Well, hindsight is twenty-twenty. Still, if you can afford to pay with cash, you probably should — even if it means dipping into your savings a little more than you wanted to.

Keep in mind that even after tax considerations, an 18 percent credit card interest rate in 1987 will cost you about 14 percent if you are in the 35 percent tax bracket. Your savings would need to generate at least that 14 percent for it to make sense to use your credit card.

A home equity loan is a possibility, after all, the interest on it is generally still deductible. But think carefully about whether you want to put your home up as collateral for holiday gifts. Because that is, in effect, what you would be doing.

There are a few other drawbacks to using a home equity loan to pay for holiday shopping. First is the lead time required to obtain the loan. And

there probably will be closing costs involved. In addition, the interest deduction on home equity loans may be limited and Congress may limit it still further in the future.

The TRA allows you to deduct interest only on loans up to the original purchase price of your home less the amount you owe on your mortgage, plus the cost of any improvements you have made.

For example, if you purchased your home for \$50,000, made \$5,000 worth of improvements and owe \$35,000, you could borrow up to \$20,000 and deduct the interest cost. The interest on any amount above the \$20,000 is only deductible if used for medical, educational or home improvement purposes.

If you've only recently purchased your home, you may not have built up that much equity on the original purchase price because most of your mortgage payment goes to pay interest. In short, a home equity loan may not be the way for you to pay for

holiday shopping.

If credit is your only alternative, there are a number of steps you can take to make it less expensive. First, if you use a credit card, use a card that has a low interest rate. Even though other interest rates are down, many credit cards still command 18 percent interest or more. But there are some lower-cost cards out there. And be sure to pay your bill off as soon as possible. Paying the monthly minimum is tempting, but expensive. Another possibility is a loan from a credit union if you belong to one. Generally, the credit union's interest rate will be lower than that of a credit card and probably lower than most banks.

If you must use credit for your holiday shopping, also use your head. Every dollar you spend will eventually have to be paid back — with interest. Set spending limits for yourself and stick to them. Avoid the temptation to buy something just because you have a roll of money in your pocket or can put it on your credit card. And, while you're out at the mall, stop by your bank and open a holiday account. That way, you won't have to borrow to pay for next year's presents.

# Realtors report drop in average home cost

The average price for area resale homes dropped to \$77,856 in August to continue the decline from the record \$80,219 reached in June, according to a report from Metro MLS, the state's largest multiple listing service.

"In the face of an early September rise in home mortgage interest rates, a near three percent decline in average prices should be welcomed by buyers," said Jerome A. Delaney, Metro MLS president. "The 1987 median price for single family homes in the 1,600 square mile territory served by our members also has dipped to an estimated \$65,936."

Although currently at the lowest mark since last January, Delaney said prices this year have been strongly affected by newer homes coming on the market with selling prices of \$100,000 or more.

"This year about one in every four homes is sold in this price range compared to about one in five last year," he said. "The median, in which half sell for more and half less, is a much better indication of overall area prices."

While still some 14 percent below a

year ago, the level of new listings for Metro MLS appears to be holding close to \$2,600 a month for single family homes and about 200 for condominiums, Delaney said.

"Our sales-to-listing ratio remains comparable to last year, and we will pass the \$1 billion mark for residential sales for the third straight year in September," he stated.

Sales by Metro MLS members in August included 1,365 single family homes and 90 condominiums compared to 1,494 and 90 in July. Sales in August 1986 were 1,478 homes and 84 condos.

"The rise in prices during the year undoubtedly has deterred some buyers, but the recent dip combined with a threat of even higher interest rates may now bring them into the market," Delaney said.

"Recent reports on prices in New York suburban areas could help convince them that homes here are still an excellent bargain. Over the long term, we think prices here will continue to rise as more recently-built homes with greater amenities continue to come on the market."

### Northville man restores auto for museum display

One part of the Henry Ford Museum's "Automobile in American Life" exhibit would not have been possible without the volunteer work of Northville's Lynn Stringer.

Stringer, who works in the truck engineering division of Ford Motor Co., has been an antique car hobbyist and automobile restoration expert since 1959, when he purchased his first 1932 Ford coupe and souped it up to meet hot rod standards.

That first coup, still part of his personal automobile collection, was only the beginning of Stringer's affection for antique autos and his 28-year-old love affair with 1932 model Fords.

Since his first restoration project, Stringer has added two more cars to his collection, in addition to coordinating the Henry Ford Museum's project to restore its 1932 Ford Cabriolet.

Stringer said he first became aware of the museum's 1932 Ford when he was approached in March 1983 by an out-of-state friend who was interested in trading the museum two of his own cars for two of the museum's automobiles. The friend asked Stringer to inspect the car.

The museum nixed the proposal (museum property can only be acquired by way of a public auction), and Stringer said in the process he realized that the car should be kept by the museum.

"When the individual came in from out of town and thought he would be able to trade the museum for the car, I got particularly interested because really I did not want to see the car leave Dearborn and the museum," Stringer said.

It wasn't long after he inspected the car when Stringer was contacted by the museum to help restore the car to its original condition.

"I went down to the museum and looked over the car, and told (the wishful car trader) what I thought was wrong with it," Stringer said. "Well, when the curator realized at that time that there were problems with the car and that it was not completely authentic, he asked me if I would help update it."

Stringer said the 1932 Ford Cabriolet is a rare automobile because not many were produced, and — because of its roll-up windows and popular body style — it became a forerunner of today's convertibles.



He said the car featured many new features for American production cars; chief among them was the first-ever V-8 engine.

Stringer said the museum's '32 Cabriolet was donated by the parents of Michael Young, who was himself a 1932 Ford fan who worked to restore the car until he was killed in an automobile accident. Stringer said Young's parents donated the car to the museum because they wanted it somewhere where they could see it and others could enjoy its unique character.

At that time, Stringer said the car was modified and was missing many of its original parts, including an authentic V-8 engine, interior, braking system and accessories.

The most challenging task, as with any automobile restoration effort, was locating original parts for a car which has been out of production for decades.

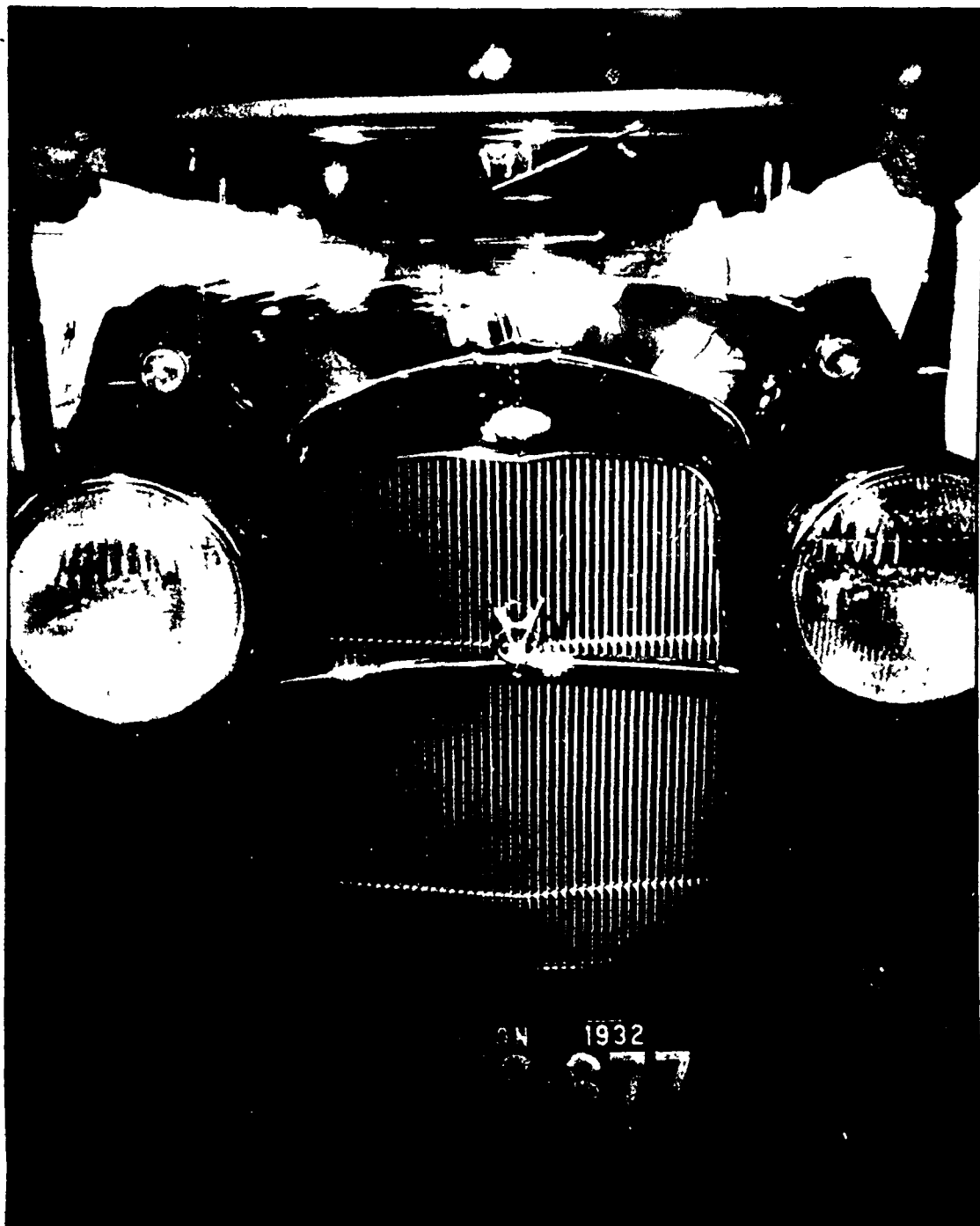
"I spent a lot of time and effort getting the correct parts for it, taking the parts off that were incorrect, and essentially changing the engine, brakes, the interior, the top material and redid the car in all respects to make it 100 percent authentic," Stringer said.

This was where Stringer's experience paid off to the benefit of the museum and its patrons.

"Well, (locating the parts) would have been impossible for some people," Stringer said. "It was difficult for me, but not that difficult because I have been into this for a long time and I have a lot of contacts."

"I have collected a lot of parts and

Stringer (left) points out some detail work for Randy Mason, Henry Ford Museum Transportation Collection coordinator

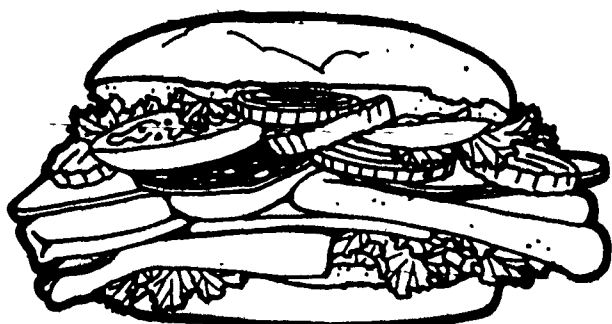

## Village revives Christmas past

For older folk, a holiday season visit to Greenfield Village and the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn evokes memories of Christmas past; for youngsters, the village and museum bring to life "how it used to be."

For many families, a trip to the village or museum has become an annual Christmas tradition.

During the week of Saturday, Dec. 5, to Jan. 3 (except for Christmas and New Year's days), visitors can enjoy the sight of a giant, decorated Christmas tree in the museum and, in the two dozen historic buildings in the village, Christmas trimmings and customs from past decades of American history.

The museum tree will be decorated in the theme, "A Child's World of Christmas," with cookies, candy, small toys and circus characters.

The circus characters are part of a special attraction being unveiled for Christmas — the Howard Brothers' Circus, offering the Big Top in miniature in the museum. The circus is reproduced on a scale



of three-quarters of an inch to the foot. The miniature circus exhibit will

continue to be on view throughout 1988, museum officials promise. The museum theater will present

"Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," a two-hour play originally produced on Broadway in 1912. It will be given on Saturdays, beginning Dec. 5 with additional performances scheduled Dec. 27-30.

In the buildings in Greenfield Village, traditional customs and trimmings from past decades of America's history will be on view.

One of the first homes to visit inside the village is that of the Wright Brothers. Here, it's a turn of the century (1900-1910) Christmas celebration with a tree, elaborately adorned with ornaments and popcorn strings, in the parlor. Pictures and doorways are adorned with greens, and nuts and fruits are set out on tables.

Down the road, in the Connecticut saltbox house, a more sparse holiday is observed. Decorations are at a minimum because of the holiday's religious significance.

The imposing Noah Webster House will feature a celebration of the 1840s.

In addition, the life member group will host an open house. Hosting the 10 active member open houses are Lani Bond, Linda Handyside, Karen Hill, Kathi Jerome, Jenda Mills, Jackie Payne, Carol Rahimi, Margie Sievert, Joan Sellen and Judy Somershoe, assisted by their respective spouses.

The N. H. Whitesides will host the life member party. Assisting them will be the David Longridges, I. M. McLeods and the Donald Willoughbys.

For each open house club members are preparing a variety of appetizers. While such perennial favorites as meatballs and sauce and pepper jelly with cream cheese remain, this year's menu will include three new dishes: Mexican layered bean dip, Tasty Treats

with chopped sausages and Spinach Balls.

The idea of holding the open houses simultaneously to herald the Christmas season was begun in the early 1970s as a way to raise funds for the club's work for local school children. It was an overwhelming success from the beginning — and a major project for the active group of 35 women.

The cocktail parties are one of the club's major fundraisers. It also produces the community telephone directory and sponsors marathon bridge play. This year it is estimated the parties will raise between \$4,000 and \$5,000 for school projects. The life member group uses its proceeds from the \$12 a couple event to provide scholarships to graduating Northville High School seniors.

# Wild creatures find their way to caring veterinarian

Northville veterinarian Carol L. Geake not only cares for domestic animals, but she cares for wild animals, too.

She worked with two wild animals, a horned owl and a deer, at her clinic at 48525 Eight Mile Road in Northville this fall.

"The horned owl case is upsetting, but the deer case is a definite uplifter," Geake said.

She explained the horned owl was brought into her clinic because of its abnormal behavior.

"It was seen sitting upright on a tree branch one day," she said. "The next day it was hanging upside down from the branch. And the following day it fell to the ground."

Geake did everything she could for the owl. She gave it antibiotics, water and even force fed it when it would not eat.

"But it still seemed to be getting weaker and weaker," she said.

After two weeks of trying to cure the owl's sickness, and getting no results, its inevitable death came.

The sadness from the death of the owl, she said, was helped with a new case was brought in, an injured deer, by Dan Boyer, an employee of Kensington Metropark farm.

Boyer explained he had received a call from a woman who lived near the park farm and who had noticed a deer had caught its leg in the woven wire fence surrounding her house.

"Apparently the deer was attempting to jump the fence and tangled its leg in the wire," Boyer said.

Boyer related that, when he arrived at the woman's house, she already had untangled the deer's leg.

"The deer couldn't even stand up because its leg was cut to the bone," Boyer said.

Boyer took the deer to the park farm where he tried to care for the leg. He said he gave the deer antibiotics and wrapped the leg.

"When I realized the leg was not healing, I decided to take the deer to Dr. Geake," he said.

After seeing the depth of the cut, Geake said she thought the leg might need to be amputated. "But, first, I wanted to give it a chance to heal on its own," she said.

She gave the deer some more antibiotics and bandaged the leg again.

After two weeks of waiting, she

said she knew the leg would not heal, so it needed to be amputated. The operation was performed and it went smoothly, she said.

"After the surgery, the deer seemed more happy (in less pain) and ate much better than before the surgery," she related.

She noted that the deer seemed to be adjusting to its three legs quite well.

Boyer picked up the deer two days after the operation and brought it to Julius G. Nelson, a park employee. "Nelson will take care of the deer until it is able to care for itself," Boyer explained.

Geake, who has had her own clinic adjacent to her home on Eight Mile since 1970, is a 1968 graduate of Michigan State University with a doctorate in veterinary medicine. She was one of five women in her class.

She is the wife of state Senator R. Robert Geake.

Her patients also have included a cat that swallowed a penny and a lion with an abscessed tooth.

After the deer departed, another wild animal was brought into the clinic. This time it was a skunk.

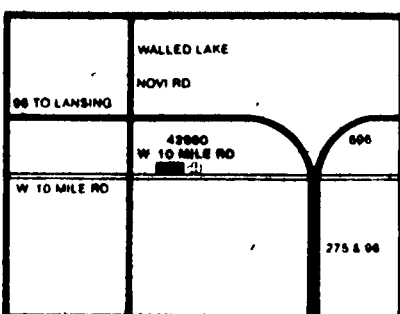

## Joel Visnyak plans to have business ready at graduation

Despite the hard work, Joel Visnyak, a Nine Mile Road resident, is building up a fresh produce and meat market business before he graduates from Michigan State University.

"I wanted something ready when I graduate," Visnyak said. "Most people wait until they graduate and then don't have jobs. I wanted something I can step right into."

Visnyak, 21, raises a variety of fruit and vegetables to sell at the Eastern Market and at his roadside stand. He said that every weekend he drives from East Lansing to Northville to take care of the business he started in high school with his father Zolte Visnyak. The business started out with hogs and expanded to fruit and vegetables. The major crops Visnyak sells are sweet corn and apples.

Visnyak has two apple orchards, one in Northville and one he rents in Brighton. He has about 340 trees on over 10 acres and this year had about 200,000 pounds of apples.

On his breaks from school, Visnyak said that he works every day spraying, picking, pruning or selling his produce. He added that the work is "labor intensive" and that not many people would start a business like his. "It's still at the trial and error stage," he said, "so it's hard work with some very long hours."

Visnyak added that at times he has

worked up to 120 hours a week picking apples. The hard work is a bad point, Visnyak admitted, but said that the benefits of being his own boss outweigh the routine hard labor. "I think how hard you work is how successful your business will be," he said.

With all the work he does, Visnyak, an animal science junior still finds time to study. "Going home every weekend doesn't hurt my school work because I study every night except two," he said. "It's the same as everyone else, only they go to football games and stuff. I go to work."

Visnyak primarily sells produce but he also raises a few hogs and puts his animal science skills to work. He said that he chose the animal science program because someday he would like to own and operate a major hog

farm. Visnyak said that his business has helped finance his college education. He added that he has earned most of his college money from the hogs he has raised. "I'm really just starting out and the business doesn't make much money," he said, "but it gets me through college."

Even with all the time Visnyak spends working and studying, he still finds time to set new goals for himself and his business. After graduating from MSU, he plans to expand his business by investing in a piece of land in the metro area for a cider mill and fresh produce market.

# Northville man restores Ford for major automotive exhibit

I have made a lot of contacts," Stringer said. "I know people who specialize in the early Ford V-8s. So, we did not have a lot of trouble finding the parts we needed."

Stringer said once word got around that the Henry Ford Museum was looking for parts for its 1932 Ford Cabriolet, many of the country's antique automobile collectors turned out in force to offer their car parts for the project.

"We ran advertisements (asking for auto parts) in old car magazines, like Hemmings Motor News," Stringer said. "When you broadcast or advertise something like that when you are doing something for the Henry Ford Museum you get a lot of responses."

"We had a lot of people come forward because it was a museum project, and a lot of people who knew the car had known it for years. They knew it had incorrect parts on it and were willing to provide parts out of their own collections for us to upgrade the car. Some of the people thought of it more as an honor that parts they had been saving for years were going to go in this particular

car

"We knew back in 1983 that we needed an original V-8 engine, which is very, very scarce," Stringer said. "The contact that I know found us an engine in New York State, and the museum had gone ahead and procured that engine at the time I started last fall."

"But the car needed some of the brake parts, running boards and a lot of engine accessory items," Stringer said. He added that he has been collecting parts for the car during the last year, and that work to restore the car did not really end until just before the new car exhibit opened at the museum earlier this month.

"We brought it back from the upholstery shop in Wisconsin Labor Day weekend, and I had it at my home in Northville for about five days doing the final detail work on it, putting some of the last-minute touches on it before we had to turn it back over to the museum," Stringer said.

Working slightly over budget, Stringer estimates that it cost about \$7,500 to restore the car, most of which was raised by donations. Stringer estimates he spent at least 400 hours restoring the car, along with

the help of many other volunteer enthusiasts.

The 1932 Ford Cabriolet is not Stringer's only contribution to the new permanent display at the museum.

While tracking down parts for the Cabriolet, Stringer said he found out the museum was also looking for a 1932 hot rod for display in the exhibit. He said he came across a vintage hot rod in Phoenix, Arizona, and persuaded the car's owner to donate the car to the museum.

Although he developed a fond attachment for the Cabriolet, Stringer said he is pleased the car has become part of the new Henry Ford Museum display — a display he regards highly.

"They have put automobiles in a setting that was typical for that particular time in automobile history," Stringer said. "And the whole display is really fantastic."

Stringer said he has no immediate plans to increase the size of his own collection, which includes a 1932 Roadster, coupe and four-door sedan.

"Usually when you finish one of these projects you like to rest for a while. It is not something I do day after day every year."

## Area theaters offer film alternatives

Every year, the Hollywood film industry shifts into high gear in the month or so before Christmas, with new movies popping up more frequently than streetcorner Santas. But even with all the holiday releases, there may be times when a moviegoer can not find anything interesting showing at the multi-cinemas.

Of course, that's why the powers that be created cable television and videocassette recorders. However, even this might not satisfy the craving for a real movie — where you go out, and see the film on a big screen, and spend a week's salary on popcorn.

For the moviegoer in search of something a little different, the Detroit area offers several alternatives. They're a bit farther away than some first-run theaters, but that extra drive can be a result in a chance to see a wide variety of films that are classic, foreign, or just plain weird.

The list below should not be considered comprehensive. Often, colleges and community groups schedule alternative films on an irregular basis, so it's a good idea to watch the listings in the Detroit papers.

In any case, here is an overview of some of the most prominent alternatives to the first-run movie houses:



• **The Maple III** — When the giant cinema company AMC bought the Maple recently, area industry watchers worried that the Maple would lose its distinctiveness. It hasn't. The king of Detroit area alternatives, the Maple offers a year-round program of recent releases, both foreign and

domestic, which usually are not playing anywhere else in the area. On the south side of Maple Road just west of Telegraph in Bloomfield Township; phone 855-9090.

• **Detroit Film Theatre** — A weekend program at the Detroit Institute of Arts, offering a fall and

winter season. High quality foreign films, both old and new, dominate the schedule, but off-beat new American releases and an occasional Hollywood classic also show up. In the DIA auditorium, on John R. (just off Woodward) north of Warren Road; phone 832-7676.

• **Afternoon Film Theatre** — A year-round series, mostly of Hollywood classics, every afternoon but Monday. A Christmas series of filmed versions of Charles Dickens stories is currently underway. At the DIA auditorium (see above), call 832-2730.

• **Royal Oak Cinema Society** — Offers a very diverse mix, but mostly high-quality American films from the past. The society has operated from three different locations in the past couple of years. The current schedule is at the Main Theatre, on Main just north of Eleven Mile Road in downtown Royal Oak, phone 541-0889.

• **Redford Theatre** — Shows family-type American classics (often Hollywood musicals), usually on every other weekend. The Motor City Organ Society sponsors traditional theater organ music before the show and during an intermission. At 17360 Lahser (one block north of Grand River) in Detroit; phone 537-2560.

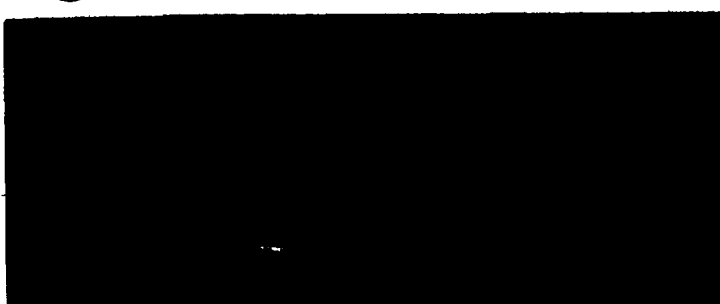
## "Tango Argentino" hits town

# Mustang forward featured on All-Area unit

In basketball lingo, the Sliger-Livingston East, first team All-Area girls' basketball team 'can really fill it up.' The five players on our first team combined to score more than 90 points a game this past season, which is incredible.

This team features all you could ask for in a team — a point guard who is a great ballhandler and outside shooter, an off-guard who is a devastating scoring machine, a pair of tough forwards who can be effective inside or outside, and a tall center who can dominate games.

All five of these players have 'serviced' their teams well throughout the years and especially this season. All five started for their respective teams as sophomores and have continued to improve with each passing season.

We don't mind admitting this may be the most explosive and talented All-Area team we've ever assembled. Here's a closer look:

**LISA MCCARTHY**, Novi, Guard: This 5-foot-3 senior has been a four year starter for the Wildcats and has led the team in scoring since her sophomore year. McCarthy was the only starter to return from last year's team, and despite an inexperienced supporting cast, she scored over 400 points on the season and averaged just over 20 points a game. Many teams double-teamed McCarthy, or used special defensive plays to shut her down, but she managed to score in double figures in 18 of 21 games and accounted for roughly half of the 'Cats' offensive output. She was also a team leader in assists (5.2 per game), steals and free throw percentage. "Lisa is an excellent ballhandler, a great passer and she has a lot of basketball court sense," Novi Coach Debbie Harris said. "She has a nice outside shot, she drives well and shows a lot of leadership — she's just a great all-around player. This season was very emotional for her and she's been frustrated at times — if she would have received some more help from her teammates, she could easily have had an even greater season."

**LORI MONTANTE**, Milford, Guard: When it came to offense, this 5-foot-7 junior was head and shoulders above the other area players. She averaged 25.9 points, 7.2 rebounds and 4.0 assists per game in leading the Redskins to a surprising 14-7 campaign. "I was very impressed," Milford coach Don Palmer said. "I didn't think Lori would be able to put together these kind of numbers, especially since she draws so much attention from the opposing defenses. I'm probably biased, but I think Lori's been more valuable to her team than any other player in the area. She did some things this year that were really amazing... and she did it without a great supporting cast." Montante converted 171 of her 447 field goal attempts for 38 percent and 183 of her 230 free throw tries for 79 percent. She also scored more than 30 points on eight different occasions, including a career-high of 41 against Novi.

**DEBBIE STEVENS**, Northville, Forward: Stevens is just a junior, but already holds numerous Northville school records and may go down as the best Mustang player ever before she's finished. Stevens scored 292 points during the season to set a new school mark, including a 25-point performance in one game — also a school record. She led the team in scoring (14 points per game), rebounds (7.3) and steals (3.3). "Debbie had a fantastic year," Northville Coach Ed Kritch said. "She's by far the most polished offensive player we've ever had here — she can score from the inside, she can score from the outside. Debbie would make an ideal swing-player, but in our program, she has to play inside and she holds her own, even on defense." Stevens had a knack for getting open and when she got her hands on the ball, she was versatile enough to either take the shot or put in on the floor and drive. Her 70 steals in 21 games illustrates her great anticipation and quickness.

**NATALIE PETERLIN**, South Lyon, Forward: This 6-foot senior has played a major role in South Lyon's success during the last three years. Whenever opposing defenses collapse on teammate Julie Howell, the Lions — without hesitation — look to Peterlin. "Natalie's been a great compliment for Julie over the years," South Lyon coach Ron Shanks said. "She's an outstanding player that some people tend to overlook. We're more than comfortable using her in key situations and that's something we've proven all season. I thought Natalie showed her worth when Julie was out with mono. Those were probably her best five games of the season. She really picked up the slack." Peterlin averaged 16.8 points and 9.1 rebounds per game during the regular season. Also, her 32 points against Ann Arbor Pioneer broke South Lyon's single-game scoring record.

**JULIE HOWELL**, South Lyon, Center: It's safe to say that, without this 6-foot-1 senior, the Lions would not be where they are today — atop the Kensington Valley Conference for the third straight year and recognized as one of the top teams in the state. Entering post-season competition, Howell was averaging 18.3 points and 12.0 rebounds per outing. She had converted 104 of her 168 field goal attempts for 62 percent and 65 of her 83 charity tosses for 78 percent. She also leads the Lions with 51 steals despite missing five games with mononucleosis. "Julie's had a great year," South Lyon coach Ron Shanks said. "She's gotten better statistically since last year, but I think her biggest improvements have come in the other areas of her game... like passing, dribbling and seeing the entire floor. In my opinion, she's definitely an all-state candidate. There just aren't that many post players around that can do a variety of things like Julie."

## Baird named to second All-Area team

Many of the players on our Sliger-Livingston East, second team All-Area basketball unit would probably be first teamers in any other year, but didn't quite make it because the area was filled with such outstanding individual talent in '87.

Lakeland's Dana Hicks, for example, is as fine a center as you'll find and was the cornerstone of the Eagles all season, but she was just a junior. Guards Karen Baird of Northville and Michele Allen of South Lyon were backcourt standouts for two of the area's best teams, and forwards Kelly Sheffler (Milford) and Kelly Forbis (Lakeland) were outstanding complimentary players who had the talent to be stars as well.

Here is a look at the second teamers:

**KAREN BAIRD**, Northville Guard: Baird is a great athlete, and it showed while she was on the basketball court. This junior guard scored over 200 points during the year and averaged over 10 points a game for the Mustangs. "Karen is a fine shooter from the outside," her coach Ed Kritch said. "She hit over 40 percent from the three-point range, and you don't see that often in the girls' game. She has good quickness and anticipation, she handles the ball well and pressure defenses really didn't bother her. Defensively, she has the athletic ability to intimidate players." Baird was first among her teammates in assists and second in steals and rebounds.

**MICHELE ALLEN**, South Lyon, Guard: Simply by looking at Allen's individual statistics, one may feel her presence on the all-area team is a mistake. She averaged only 4.7 points, 5.0 rebounds, 3.3 assists and 2.5 steals per game. Those aren't eye-opening figures by any stretch of the imagination. But what her statistics fail to indicate are the so-called little things — like intelligence, ball handling, leadership, clutch performances and defense. And let's not forget that Allen had knee surgery during the off-season, didn't play basketball all summer and saw limited action during the Lions' first five games. "Michele's the glue that holds us together," South Lyon coach Ron Shanks said. "We couldn't have been this type of team without her."

**KELLY SHEFFLER**, Milford, Forward: For the second straight year, this senior recorded more than 200 points and 200 rebounds. That's not bad for a power forward who stands a mere 5'7". "Kelly's a tough kid," MHS coach Don Palmer said. "She's not as big as the girls she plays against, but she's mean inside. She also jumps extremely well and she has a great set of hands. "There was a lot of pressure on Kelly to perform every night and I'd say she came through 95 percent of the time." Sheffler averaged 12.9 points and 12.6 rebounds per game. She converted 103 of her 238 field goal attempts for 43 percent and 66 of her 131 free throw tosses for 50 percent.

**KELLY FORBIS**, Lakeland, Forward: Recognized as one of the best defensive players in the area, Forbis received some tough assignments this season and held her own against stars like Julie Howell, Natalie Peterlin and Kelly Sheffler. "Kelly's real smart, so she picks up everything you say very quickly," LHS coach Sherry Bell commented. "She also gives 110 percent all of the time no matter what the situation is. That right there is half of defense... and the rest comes from her natural ability." Forbis, a 5'11" junior, averaged 6.3 points and 8.8 rebounds this season. She also netted 52 per-

cent of her field goal attempts.

**DANA HICKS**, Lakeland, Center: One has to wonder what this 6-foot junior could have accomplished had Lakeland possessed some perimeter threats. With the Eagle guards struggling, however, opposing defenses simply keyed on Hicks with two or three players. "Dana doesn't have the luxury like, let's say, (Julie) Howell or (Natalie) Peterlin at South Lyon," Lakeland coach Sherry Bell

said "We don't have anyone who can score from the outside... and teams know that. They just sag on Dana the entire game. Still, she's a dominating player when she's on. She posts up really well and she's cut down on the mistakes that she made as a sophomore. She could be tough to stop next year." Hicks led the Eagles in scoring (14.1) and rebounding (11.9) this fall. She also made 120 of her 195 field goal attempts for 61 percent.

## Miami-bound Howell named Player of Year

Since 6-foot-1 center Julie Howell joined South Lyon's varsity basketball squad in 1985, the Lions have posted an eye-opening 64-5 record. Not surprisingly, Sliger/Livingston East Player of the Year honors go to Howell, the third South Lyon player in the last three years to nab the award.

Howell has accepted a full-ride scholarship from Miami (Ohio) University last Wednesday and will

join the Redskin hoopsters next year. Howell seriously considered three other universities — Western Michigan, Michigan and Michigan State — before choosing Miami. She admits being confused during the days leading up to her decision. Despite an unselfish disposition on the court, Howell still averaged 18.3 points during the regular season. Even more impressive are her shooting percentages. She connected on 104 of her 168 field goal attempts for an area-best 62 percent and 65 of 83 free throw tries for 78 percent.

Howell's only disappointment this year was a severe case of mononucleosis, which forced her to miss five games. During her absence, the 19-2 Lions suffered their only defeats of the season.



# Salem clobbers Northville cagers, 60-21

Northville met Goliath on the basketball court last weekend in MHSAA District action in Plymouth, but the outcome certainly wasn't what legends are made of.

The overmatched Mustangs fell to Plymouth Salem 60-21 on Nov. 21 to end the 1987 season with an 11-9 overall record. Salem just may be the best team in the state and the Rocks went out and proved it once again by systematically tearing Northville apart in the final three quarters, after a fairly even first eight minutes.

"I will be surprised if (Salem) doesn't make it to the final four," Mustang Coach Ed Kritch said. "We came out and held the ball and forced them to take shots from the outside. We were giving Salem the wide-open perimeter shots in the first quarter, but they were missing."

With two minutes left in the quarter, Northville trailed by just two (6-4), but the Rocks put on a late surge to go ahead 14-4. At the buzzer, a three-point shot by Karen Baird narrowed it to 14-7, and Northville was still in contention.

But things quickly got out of hand as Salem outscored the reeling Mustangs 20-2 in the second quarter to go ahead 34-9 at the half. Rock's All-American Dena Head scored 10 points in the second quarter alone to put the locals away.

"We decided we would hold the ball against their man-to-man defense

because we felt confident we could play with them when they went into their zone," Kritch said. "But it didn't turn out that way. Once they went with the zone, they started to dominate us and it took us right out of the game. They pressured us at the top of the zone, caused a lot of turnovers and when you turn the ball over to Salem, it's like giving them two points."

In the third, things only got worse. The Rocks scored 18 to Northville's two to increase the margin to 52-11. Mercifully, Salem Coach Fred Thomann then took out all his starters, not wanting to run up the score in a game that was obviously over. The Mustangs won the fourth quarter 10-8 against the reserves, but still lost the game by 39 points.

"We knew going into the district that we'd have to play Salem eventually if we wanted to have any success," Kritch said. "I didn't feel we were intimidated — I thought we had a good game plan, but we didn't execute it. If we were to play them again tomorrow, I'd try the same things."

Karen Baird led Northville with nine points, all in the first half, while leading scorer Debbie Stevens was held to eight points and six rebounds — well below her average. Head paved all scorers with 20 points, while All-State teammate Jill Estey chipped in 12 for Salem, who is ranked among the top three in the state and sports an impressive 21-1 overall record.

## Bogataj named new Schoolcraft coach

The search for a men's new basketball coach at Schoolcraft College was swift and perhaps even painless.

The committee appointed by Louis Reibling, dean of instruction, to find a replacement for Bob Wetzel — who resigned Oct. 8 after failing to secure a full-time position at the college — sifted through the dozen applicants and selected David Bogataj.

The new Ocelot coach wasted no time. His selection was made on Nov. 4 and he was on the sidelines the following day to watch his new team scrimmage Concordia College.

"There was good quickness out there," the new coach said. "I like our quickness."

What he also will like is that 10 of the 12 players on the roster before Wetzel's resignation are still on the team, and the two who left are considering returning. That could help ease the transition considerably.

Still, with the start of the season less than a week away, Bogataj won't have much time to familiarize himself with his players. But he isn't worried; indeed, if SC lost every game this season, Bogataj seemingly would find something positive about it.

That's his personality. It showed in his first practice with the Ocelots Thursday when he displayed the three Es — all integral parts of his coaching style: enthusiasm, energy and education. He was in constant motion and kept up a steady stream of chatter, instructing, joking and chiding his players non-stop.

Bogataj used the same formula the last three years as basketball coach at Allen Park Cabrini. In his first season Cabrini went 5-16; the Monarchs improved to 8-13 in 1985-86, and last season posted the best record in school history — going 12-11 and winning their Class B district.

Prior to his stint at Cabrini, Bogataj coached at Inkster Cherry Hill for 15 years. He is employed as a drafting teacher at Wayne Memorial.

Throughout his coaching career, Bogataj — who played at Henry Ford Community College from 1964-66 before enrolling at Eastern Michigan, where he earned his degree in 1968 — has preached fast-paced basketball, mostly from necessity.

"I like the up-tempo game," he said. "The main reason is, in my whole coaching career, I never had a big kid who would allow us to post up and play half-court. I really like to dictate the tempo."

His late hiring will hurt SC early in the season.

Bogataj knows it: "We're going to have to learn in the games. That's a tough way to teach at the collegiate level."

Bogataj plans on concentrating his first lessons on "defense." I like man-to-man as a base. I've always been a man-to-man coach, and I think I can teach it well.

"We'll change up, but I think if we can play good man-to-man, it will make our zone defenses that much better."

Perhaps the person most surprised with Bogataj's hiring was Bogataj himself. Asked if he expected to get the job, he replied, "No. It's very difficult for a high school coach to move up to college. They just don't get hired very often."

But that didn't keep him from trying. Bogataj has applied for almost every vacant college cage coaching job in the last 15 years. He even sent a letter to UCLA when the legendary John Wooden retired.

More recently, Bogataj said he applied for head coaching positions at Toledo and Ball State. He never expected to be hired — "It was really more of a joke than anything" — but he thought perhaps a new coach might take an interest in him as an assistant.

# Tankers place 4th at league swim meet

The Northville girls' swim team wrapped up the 1987 season with a quality performance at the Western Lakes Activities Association (WLAA) league meet on Nov. 18 through 20 at Plymouth Salem.

The Mustang tankers placed fourth overall in the 12-team meet with a point total of 146 — 72 points behind the winners from North Farmington, but just nine points out of second Plymouth Canton grabbed the runner-up position with 155 points and Livonia Stevenson nipped Northville for third by a single point.

"The girls all swam well," Mustang Coach Bill Dicks said. "In the preliminary races, we had 25 personal best times and had two state cuts — it just seemed to get better as we went along."

"Northville's most successful event was diving, as three Mustangs placed among the top 12. Junior Wendy Beach took second overall, Michelle Beacham was third and Barb Woodruff seventh. With the performance, all three have qualified for the diving Regionals to be held in Brighton (see related story).

"Our divers did very well — it was our best overall event," Dicks said. "We had at least one swimmer in every event and everybody swam at least as well as they have all year."

The only other runner-up finish by a Northville swimmer came from Michelle Stephens in the 100-yard freestyle race. Stephens — seeded fourth heading in — moved up to se-

cond, set a new personal best time and just missed the state cut. Stephens also blazed to a state cut time in the prelims of the 50 freestyle, and was seeded first for the finals, but failed to place.

Northville's 400 freestyle relay team of Debbie Buell, Pam Holdridge, Stephens and Megan Holmberg placed third overall and set a personal best time in the process. Buell, just a sophomore, added a pair of fourths in the 200 and 500 freestyle events.

Holdridge placed fifth in the 100 butterfly and sixth in the 100 backstroke. Julie Hilfinger was seventh in the 100 breast stroke and eighth in the 200 IM, and Holmberg placed sixth in the 200 freestyle and seventh in the 100 backstroke. The only other top 12 finish came from the ninth-place 200 medley relay team of Becky Frayne, Pam Wesley, Hilfinger and Kristy Fortenberry.

Outstanding swimmers in the preliminaries included freshmen Clair Cryderman and Kristen Woodsum in the 200 freestyle (both dropped at least five seconds from their personal best times), Woodsum again in the 100 freestyle (personal best time), Frayne in the 100 freestyle and 100 breast stroke (just missed qualifying for finals in both) and Fortenberry in the 100 backstroke (personal best time).

"We had a tremendous amount of quality swimmers," Dicks said. "The girls tapered very well and there weren't any sloppy swims. One first place swim separated us from second place in the league."

Northville Coach Bill Dicks will be taking five qualifiers and one alternate to East Lansing because these swimmers topped state qualifying cuts in eight of the 11 events during

the regular season. The contingent includes Debbie Buell, Julie Hilfinger, Michelle Stephens, Pam Holdridge, Megan Holmberg and Becky Frayne.

"Numbers-wise, this is one of the largest groups we've ever taken to the state meet," Dicks said. "It's something the girls work hard for all year and it's a reward for them to be able to go up against the best in the state."

In addition, three Mustang divers

— Wendy Beach, Michelle Beacham and Barb Woodruff — have qualified for the Class A Regional at Brighton High School on Dec. 1. The top 12 divers from the regional will move on to the state meet, so the Northville group could be as large as nine participants.

Sophomore Debbie Buell will be culminating an outstanding season at the state meet. She has qualified in the 200-yard IM (2:20.59), the 200 freestyle (2:02.49) and the 500

freestyle (5:27.09) and is a member of the 400 freestyle relay team that also qualified. She will be joined in the relay by Megan Holmberg, Michelle Stephens and Julie Hilfinger, with Pam Holdridge and Becky Frayne serving as alternates.

Hilfinger also qualified individually in the 200 IM (2:20.59). Holdridge made the state cut in the 100 butterfly (1:02.69) and Stephens qualified for the 50 freestyle in the preliminaries of the WLAA meet last weekend.

## Northville's Rikki Gans named Special Olympics Coach of the Year

Gans was honored as National Special Olympics Coach of the Year.

Several weeks ago, Gans received a surprise call from Eunice Shriver of the National Special Olympics Organization.

"When somebody told me Eunice Shriver was on the line I had to wonder what she was calling about," said a stunned Gans. "I really couldn't believe it. I'm still

floating on cloud nine."

Gans is well-known throughout the community for her work in Special Olympics. In 1988 she was named Special Olympics Coach of the Year in Michigan.

"I couldn't figure out 'why me?'" Gans admitted. "But maybe the state award had something to do with it."

Gans has been an adaptive physical education teacher since 1971 for the Northwest Trainavke Center at Webster School in Livonia where she works with mentally impaired students.

Special Olympics program through her endless hours of work.

"In 1974 we took three kids to the state Special Olympics meet when it was only track and field," Gans said. "Now we send over 50 kids to the state meet."

The Special Olympics has not only expanded from individual sports, but to team sports as well. On Nov. 20-22, Gans took a team to compete in the state floor hockey tournament in East Lansing.

"Seeing the kids' skills grow and their self-concept grow, along with watching their parents see how they

develop gives me a lot of rewards," said the new honoree.

"The kids love it and look forward to one event after another. It gives them a time to get away from home and a chance to stay somewhere overnight. They're able to practice together with one goal in mind and at the same time enjoy the festivities that surround these events."

Gans' husband Marv, formerly the athletic director at Schoolcraft College, is currently the associate dean of Continuing Education at Schoolcraft. They are Northville Township residents.

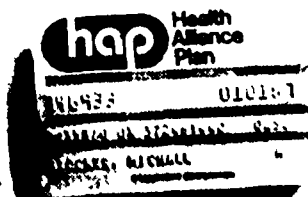

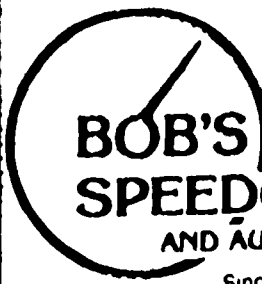

## Swimming: workout without risk

**Everyone into the pool!**  
That's the advice a lot of doctors and coaches are sending out to injured athletes and to people who just want to get in shape. Training and working out in a pool offers the same type of benefits activities such as jogging and running offer, but it doesn't strain the joints nearly as much.

"I think swimming is the best sport to get into shape and stay in shape," Novi High School swimming Coach Rick Anderson said. "It builds up your lungs, your heart and your muscles — there is not one single sport that does the total body like swimming — especially for people who have joints that are susceptible to injury."

"Running is great for building up your lungs and heart, but pounding the cement can cause sore joints and other problems. It just doesn't happen in the pool unless your techniques are wrong — but that's usually for people going 9,000 yards a day."

Even running coaches like Novi cross country mentor Bob Smith recognize the advantages of swimming for training and rehabilitation. His Wildcats train in the pool all season by running in the shallow end. It offers the resistance and not the pounding.

"Running, day after day, can break a runner's legs down," Smith said. "It's a lot of pounding and the runners end up with shin splints, stress fractures and the whole bit."

"But when we get them in the water, we can simulate running styles and there's no pounding — the water is the resistance. The guys get a tremendous cardiovascular workout and their total body is exhausted and that is what we're trying to accomplish."

According to Anderson, water resistance is the key. Pulling yourself through the water works the upper back muscles, the legs and especially the upper body. He recommends strokes such as the freestyle or backstroke.

"Freestyle may be the best because it's easy for people to do and it works both arms and the legs," Anderson explained. "If you have trouble putting your face in the water, the backstroke is good because you're really working the same muscles but your face is above water."

One of the big advantages of swimming is that it can be an activity for life. It's very popular among the elderly because it is so easy on the limbs and muscles.

"For people with arthritis and other types of bone stiffness, they are in the water and it reduces stress," Anderson said.

Rehabilitation is a natural in the water because it protects the injured area and yet provides the resistance

for a useful workout. Football, track and cross country teams use the pool for this reason more than any other sport, and the results have been en-

couraging.

"Our injured kids go in the pool for a couple days and we take them out then they are healthy," Smith said.

"In years past, we used to run the injured kids as much as we could but it didn't accomplish anything. It didn't work their bodies or their lungs — all they did was get sore and aggravate the injury. Now, we put them in the pool and copy our cross country workouts and they come out healthy and in shape. There couldn't be a better way for rehabilitation — the pool is perfect."

The Novi Parks and Recreation Department and the Northville Community Recreation Department both offer open swimming, adult swim laps, swimming lessons and even senior citizen swimming programs throughout the year. In Novi call 349-1976 and in Northville call 349-0203 for more information.

## FDA issues warning to tanning device users

Most of us know that too much sun is bad for you. But, is it safer to tan indoors with tanning devices, such as sunbeds?

Scientists at the Food and Drug Administration say that indoor tanning may expose you to just as much risk as the sun.

Indoor tanning adds to the total amount of damage received from the sun during a lifetime, increasing the odds of getting skin cancer. In fact, studies suggest you may be more likely to develop skin cancer if you are exposed to both sunlight and sunlamps than if you are exposed to the sun only.

Approximately 500,000 new skin cancer cases are expected to be treated this year.

The radiation from tanning devices may also increase your chances of developing cataracts (in unprotected eyes), may possibly suppress your immune system, and cause damage to blood vessels. It can also cause a special type of premature skin aging characterized by deep wrinkles, sagging and a leathery appearance. Like skin cancer, these problems may not show up until years after exposure.

There are immediate effects, too, including skin burn (if you over-

expose) and burns of the eyes of people who don't wear protective goggles.

Those who use certain foods, cosmetics and medicines — such as birth control pills — may become extra sensitive to ultraviolet radiation, suffering from an exaggerated burn, rash or itchy skin. Consult your doctor or pharmacist if you are unsure about products you use.

The FDA offers this advice about indoor tanning. First, consider your skin type. People who are especially at risk have light skin, blue eyes and red or blond hair. And remember: If you don't tan in the sun, you won't tan

using sunlamps.

If you choose to tan in spite of the risks, always wear protective goggles, follow the manufacturer's recommended time exposures for your skin type and be sure someone is nearby to help in an emergency.

If signs of injury occur, seek professional medical attention immediately. If you see an unusual lesion or sore, get a checkup.
