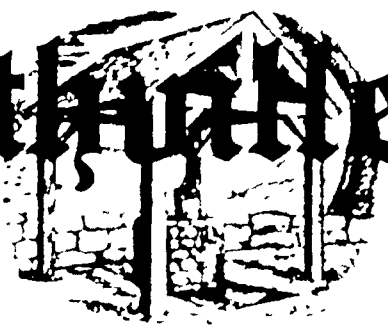

## Township asks court to uphold prison caps

Northville Township and its supervisor Georgina Goss are suing the Michigan Department of Corrections and Robert Brown, its director, once again.

This time the issue revolves around the number of prisoners being housed at the three prisons located on Five Mile Road: Scott Regional Correctional Facility which has a court and legislatively-mandated cap of 550 prisoners, Phoenix Correctional Facility which has a cap of 311 prisoners and Western Wayne Correctional Facility which has a cap of

500 prisoners.

Scott and Phoenix are located in Northville Township and Western Wayne, the former Detroit House of Corrections, is located in Plymouth Township.

Phoenix Warden Emmett Baylor informed the township by letter that as of April 4, Phoenix would be housing in excess of the 311 inmates and, on April 21, Lloyd May, warden at Scott also informed the township that his facility would exceed its capacity by some 96 prisoners.

In papers filed with Wayne County Circuit Court on Monday, the township and Goss are asking the

court for an injunction prohibiting corrections from housing the additional prisoners at the three facilities. A hearing has been scheduled before Judge Charles Farmer for Friday, May 6 at 9 a.m.

Thirty-five of the additional prisoners had arrived at Scott by April 21, ironically the day that state Rep. Michael Nye and the House Republican Task Force on Prison Reform toured the facility.

Also on the tour was Wayne County Commissioner Susan J. Heintz, R-Northville Township.

"We were assured that there would be no more than 550 prisoners at

Scott and that each prisoner would be housed in his own cell," said Heintz, as May led the group on a tour that showed the new prisoners housed in two common areas of the medium security pods.

May said that he expects the additional inmates' stay to be "temporary."

Leo LaLonde, deputy director of the Michigan Department of Corrections said the department had "no choice but to violate the caps."

"The director had three choices: he could refuse to accept any additional prisoners, he could move the additional prisoners to the decreed in-

stitutions — Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson, the Michigan Reformatory at Ionia, or to Marquette — and face a \$10,000-a-day fine for violating a federally mandated cap, or he could do what he did — move the prisoners to the western Wayne facilities," said LaLonde, adding that in March the system took in 1,000 new prisoners, the highest number of entries into the system in the history of the Department of Corrections.

May said he received a phone call from Lansing informing him of the impending arrival of the additional inmates at 3:30 p.m. on April 20 and

by 7:30 p.m. the first of the new prisoners had arrived.

May said he had been assured by the department that the violation of the cap would be "temporary." But neither he nor LaLonde would give any indication as to the length of time the additional prisoners would be housed at the three prisons.

"We are facing a severe overcrowding problem. I don't know how long the prisoners will be staying at Scott, Western Wayne or Phoenix," LaLonde said.

Goss said that while she

### Elizabeth's to close

Elizabeth's restaurant was sold last week.

The Hutton Street restaurant which helped establish Northville's reputation for quality dining was bought by West Bloomfield restaurateur Al Valenti. The entire Campbell family, including former owners Doug and Elizabeth, plans to move to East Orleans, Massachusetts, and open a new restaurant there.

The new restaurant will be called the Nauset Beach Club. It will be more casual than Elizabeth's, and will feature various cuisines, son Chris Campbell said Monday.

"They like it out east, and just

decided that's the place they wanted to be," Chris Campbell said. Chris is the manager at Elizabeth's.

Daughter Kim is already out on Cape Cod, and Sally Campbell will go to school out east and work at the new restaurant in the summers, Chris Campbell said.

New owner Valenti and his son Jeff own and operate Ristorante de Maria, on Walnut Lake Road near Inkster in West Bloomfield. Valenti could not be reached by press time for comment on his plans for the restaurant.

Elizabeth's will close after dinner May 14.

## Group asking help to find library site

The Library Site Committee is asking the community for any final suggestions on where a new library building could be located.

The committee, a group charged with recommending a place for a new library, is approaching a deadline of May 1 for selecting a site. It will recommend a site to city and township officials, who have not yet decided if a new library building will be pursued.

The committee has narrowed its preferences to three sites, but is open for any suggestions from the community, library Director Patricia Orr said. Orr is the head of the committee.

A telephone survey of city and township residents found that the majority of respondents favored a

site within the city, Orr said.

"The site committee has been working since its appointment in December and searched every avenue to come up with a location within the city but there is no vacant property to be had," Orr said. "A couple of sites have disadvantages that make them unsuitable for a building that would meet the needs of the community as it stands now and with room for the growth expected in Northville Township."

She said the committee has three sites under serious consideration: At Fish Hatchery Park off Fairbrook; a vacant lot on Cady west of Church, on the north boundary of the Northville Downs parking lot; and city-owned

## Early budget lists possible shortfall

A revenue shortfall of over \$100,000 in the city budget is cause for concern, but the situation isn't quite as bad as it first sounds, City Manager Steve Walters said this week.

In special review sessions Monday and Tuesday, Walters led the City Council through its first detailed look at the proposed city budget for the 1988-89 fiscal year. And the council members heard that although the figures show a gap between revenues and expenditures of \$118,200 in the general fund, things aren't quite that serious.

Several figures in the budget are necessarily estimates, and they are

estimates on the conservative side, Walters explained. For example:

- The budget assumes no money will be left for use at the end of this fiscal year. But after seeing the latest spending figures, Walters said, there probably will be a slight balance in the general fund.

- Contrary to earlier reports, the Headlee tax limitation amendment will not come into play in Northville's deliberations. This year, the city is levying several mills below its Headlee ceiling.

However, the state Truth in Taxation law is a concern. This law requires a special hearing to inform the

## Herb Scott

### Grant funds put poet back in high school

Herbert Scott does not fulfill anyone's stereotype of a poet.

"He does not have horns. He is a common everyday person," said Dr. Dolly McMaster, assistant superintendent for curriculum.

What he is, and the reason Northville Public Schools are so excited about having him as their poet in residence, is a talented, published poet.

Scott, an associate professor at Western Michigan University, sold his first poem while taking his first poetry class at Fresno State University and he's been writing poetry ever since.

"I was on my way to work, got the idea for the poem, pulled over to the side of the road and wrote it in 10 minutes," he said. "I sent it off to Harper's, and they took it and paid me \$40 for it."

Scott knows now that not all poems come quickly. He related how he once wrote 21 poems in 10 days, one of them having 100 lines. "But in the three months before that, I wrote nothing," he said.

Although Scott is spending 10 days at Northville High School, he isn't easy to ignore. He's the tall man with the low boots, his shirt open at the neck and a valise, one of a collection he has amassed at garage sales, falling apart in his hands.

He's also the only adult at the high school who looks lost.

"I still haven't quite found my way

around here," he explained.

Finding his way is something that Scott has become proficient at, not only in academic circles, but in less

exalted areas as well.

Born in Norman, Okla., he worked as a gravedigger, a factory hand, and for 11 years in supermarkets from Chicago to California. And, at each job, Scott said he learned, he observed, and finally, he wrote.

But his love of language was something that was instilled in him, rather than learned.

"My grandmother was a wonderful storyteller and my parents taught all of us to love language, love stories and to love books."

He said he has tried to instill that

Former UAW president speaks out on politics, union activities

Although Douglas Fraser retired from the presidency of the United Auto Workers, he has not retired from local or national politics and he is not hesitant to promote his ideas.

Fraser, a Northville resident, was the guest recently on County Impact, a cable television show hosted by Wayne County Commissioner Susan J. Heintz.

On presidential politics, Fraser said there was no doubt that George Bush would be the Republican presidential candidate, but on the Democratic side, the issue was a bit more confused.

"I think Mike Dukakis has a slight lead now, but if you look at the states that lie ahead, I look for him to widen his lead. I don't think anyone is going to have a majority at the Democratic convention," Fraser, a professor at

Wayne State University, said.

He said that Jesse Jackson's supporters came out in force, especially in the heavily Democratic and black 1st and 13th congressional districts, providing for 43 percent of all the Jackson votes.

Organized labor stayed out of this year's Democratic vote and Fraser said that action was very beneficial to the caucus process.

"We're very close to (former can-

didate Richard) Gephardt because of his stand on trade and if labor had taken a more active role, Gephardt would have done better than he did and Dukakis would have done worse.

"It's hard to measure the direct impact, but the labor movement has taken a neutral stand at this point because under the rules adopted a few years ago, if no candidate can generate 60 percent of the support, you don't make an endorsement,"

Fraser said.

He added that he did not expect any Democratic candidate to be able to generate that 2/3 support and said he sees labor as remaining neutral throughout the rest of the campaign.

Fraser said that in the presidential campaigns of 1980 and to a greater extent in 1984, the line workers have tended to switch their historical support from the Democrats to the Republicans.

"A sad fact of life as far as the Democratic party is concerned is that the more affluent people get, the more they are inclined to switch their voting habits. If you look at the patterns of 1984, there's no question but that a huge number of blue collar workers voted for Reagan. The majority still voted for (Walter) Mon-

## NEWS BRIEFS

**LITTLE MAYORS** — Northville's first family will be a family. Mayor Chris Johnson announced April 20.

While speaking to the Northville P.T.A. Coordinating Council's Founders' Day Dinner, Johnson told Superintendent George Bell and the almost 200 people in the audience that there "would be four Johnson cousins attending Amerman School in five years."

**EVERY LITTLE BIT** — The City Council had a minor surprise in going over the city budget recently \$6 they didn't know about.

The figures for the first eight months of the current fiscal year show \$6 in revenues under the "private contributions" line item. That line does not include donations for specific projects like the Town Square Park bandshell.

"That's a strange one there," City Manager Steve Walters said at a budget meeting Monday. He explained that the "private contributions" line is used if, for example, someone finds money on the city hall floor and turns it in. Or, sometimes, someone just wants to help out.

**LAST CHANCE LUNCH** — For those who have been putting it off, you only have one day (today) to try out the American Harvest restaurant at Schoolcraft College.

The tasty facility, run by students in the college's culinary arts program, closes today for the summer. Luncheon reservations are being accepted and almost are required.

**BITING THE HAND** — At the City Council meeting Monday, Mayor Chris Johnson opposed the idea of filing suit against the state to increase Northville's returned tax money from Northville Downs.

"I don't want to spend lawyers' fees just for the sake of making a lawyer rich," Johnson said — and then, after a perfect double-take, he demanded, "Who said that?" Johnson himself works as a municipal attorney.

**NEW MEMBERS TOP GOAL** — Friends of the Northville Library recently held their annual membership drive and according to final figures managed to exceed their goal of 40 new members by more than a few. 65 new members were added to the group's roster after a week long push at the library.

**WATKINS APPOINTED** — Karen G. Watkins of Northville has been appointed trustee of the Judge's Retirement Board for a term to expire Sept. 17, 1988. The appointment was announced by Gov. James J. Blanchard and is subject to Senate confirmation.

Watkins is a Wayne County assistant corporation counsel. She is a member of the Women Lawyers Association and chairperson of the Wayne Region, Candidate Endorsement Committee.

## Teachers, schools near agreement

Northville Public School teachers voted yesterday on a new, three-year pact. A ratification vote by members of the Board of Education is tentatively scheduled for Monday.

Members of the teachers union's representative assembly, the executive board, unanimously approved the tentative agreement on April 20.

Although neither board nor union negotiators would release details of the contract, they did say that this agreement reflects not only the community, but the needs of an older teaching staff.

"Because we come from a community that is management oriented,

the negotiations reflected that bent," said Dwight Sieggreen, president of the Northville Education Association and a science teacher at Meads Mill Middle School.

"We did maintain management's rights," noted Burton Knighton, the board's chief negotiator.

Sieggreen noted that the average age of a Northville teacher is 40 and that the contract makes concessions to the older workers.

"The primary issue this year is not salary or job protection. It is retirement, contract language and calendar and the tentative agreement addresses those issues," said Sieggreen.

Knighton noted that the agreement

includes a locally generated incentive for retirement.

"The only way that works is if you have a growing district, a community where you intend to replace teachers who retire with new teachers," he said, adding that the local incentive could save the district \$15,000 per year per teacher who retires.

George Bell, superintendent of schools, called the agreement "fair to both sides."

"Anytime you go into negotiations, you expect a give and take. I think we did that," he said.

Included in the contract is a provision to reopen the salary issue if the educational funding procedure is

changed by the state legislature.

"Because Northville relies heavily on residential property taxes, if there is a change in that procedure, there obviously would have to be a change in the salary structure," Knighton said.

But Bell cautioned he did not expect the legislature to change education financing.

"I think, as we have said in the past, that the voters will not approve the sales tax increase. But if it does happen, we would need to be able to address that."

The teachers' vote began at 4 p.m. Wednesday and results of that election were not available as The Record went to press.

## UAW's Fraser speaks out on jobs, diversification, mass transit

dale, but the full country tide was to Reagan.

Fraser said that events have caused a change in the bargaining philosophy of the unions.

"When we negotiated the pension during the 1950s, that was because people used to get cast out as they got old. And then we negotiated supplemental benefits because of the cyclical business that we are in — the ups and downs of the auto industry and the severe layoffs — so we filled that gap. So now we're at the stage in 1987 when we have 200,000 fewer people, so your attention is riveted on how do you gain greater security for the members you represent."

Fraser said there was no doubt that the UAW leadership had the pulse of

the membership so in '87, everything was coordinated toward job security. "It was not because of a change in philosophy, but because of need."

He emphatically noted that the UAW has not written off organizing the membership of foreign car manufacturers who are making cars in this country.

He said that at the end of the year, he expected to see four Japanese plants organized and two not.

"But we're not going to give up on those two."

Fraser noted that productivity in the auto industry has been increasing at "an astonishing rate" in the last 6-7 years.

"What that allows the auto companies to do is pay higher wages that are normally paid and richer fringe benefits. As long as productivity in-

creases faster than the wages and fringe benefits, the unit costs go down and the cost of labor actually decreases," Fraser noted.

He said the relationship between General Motors and its workers was hurt when the company paid no profit sharing to the workers, and the "corporate elite in 1987 divvies up \$168 million."

"You can't explain that. And the workers want to know how come if they (management) are entitled to profit sharing, how come we're not?"

On women in the labor movement, Fraser said that the hierarchy of the UAW reflects the society.

"There is discrimination in our society against women and our union represents the workplace," he said, noting that there really had not been a large influx of females at the auto

plants except during World War II. "And they (the women) were kicked out right after that."

But he noted that women were rising through the union ranks, being elected at the local level and then working through the ranks.

"The handicap women suffer is that they have two jobs. They have the job at the workplace and they have a job at home, taking care of the family, and so they couldn't be successful politically."

"But now," Fraser said, "it's a new day. Women are making arrangements, their husbands are more cooperative in sharing home responsibilities so they can become active in the union. You're going to see a dramatic change immediately in the years ahead with more and more women holding positions in the

union."

Fraser said there will always be a labor movement as long as there are bosses. "Look around in the totalitarian countries and you won't find a union. Look at the military dictatorships and you won't find a union. But look at every single democracy around the world and without exception, you'll find a strong, viable labor movement. And the reason is that in a democratic society you have to have a union to counterbalance so that corporations won't dictate to workers. So, have no fear at all that you're seeing the demise of the labor movement."

Fraser sits with Chrysler Chairman Lee Iacocca on the governor's jobs and economic development committee and noted that the committee has been meeting for three years.

He said that the main thrust of meetings is to try and diversify the state's economy so that it is not so heavily dependent on the auto industry. "That's the No. 1 mission of the committee," he said, noting that recent figures have shown a definite trend away from that dependence.

Fraser said he expects to see a huge expansion in the medical industry, but notes that the job expansion will be in the service industry.

"That doesn't mean slinging hamburgers at \$4 an hour, either. There are a number of good jobs that are service related," he said. Fraser added that the diversification will also take place in southeast Michigan, but it would not be as rapid as in other parts of the state.

# City chooses not to push state for full track funds

Although one City Council member still opposes the way the state returns racetrack tax money to the city, other city officials aren't going to complain too much.

During a budget review session Monday, council member Paul Folino said the annual shortfall in track money is not fair to Northville, but City Manager Steve Walters said the city has nothing to gain by pressing the issue.

Under the letter of state law, a city is supposed to get back 20 percent of the tax money the state collects from a race track within the city, up to a certain cap. For Northville, the cap is \$900,000, but even though the 20 percent goes over the cap each year, Northville gets only around \$750,000.

Walters explained Monday the state legislature appropriates a lump

sum which is split among cities with race tracks. For several years that amount has fallen below the 20 percent figure — a situation made possible by an attorney general's decision saying state law cannot mandate a certain annual appropriation like the track money.

"We should do something to take our case to the state," Folino said Monday. "I'd be in favor of starting a suit against the state of Michigan because of that."

The theory behind the track tax return is that the money will pay for extra city services required by a track, for example, police protection.

Folino said Northville has some expenses other tracks do not, for example, most tracks have private security forces while Northville police do all the security work at the Downs. "Their expenses are far, far less

than what ours are," Folino said. "For years and years I've said the same thing, and I guess I'll go on saying it until I either die or am no longer on council, one or the other."

Walters said that very few legislators have track cities in their constituency. "When it comes to a vote it's a real touchy subject, because every other legislator wonders why his district doesn't get a part of that (track money)," he said.

"You have to make the case that our expenses aren't being met and the fact is, they are," Walters continued. In addition, he said, other cities can make arguments that they deserve revenue above what Northville receives because of the Downs.

"The more it's discussed, the more risky it gets for us, quite frankly," Walters concluded.

## Township's assessors resign

Northville Township may be looking for new assessors.

Supervisor Georgina Goss told the Board of Trustees April 14 that Gene Chmielewski and Julian Kamarynski had resigned as township assessors, a position they had held on a contracted basis.

Chmielewski said that the company no longer had the time to devote to the township.

"We're getting a little too busy and Northville Township probably is in need of someone who can devote more time to it," Chmielewski said.

He suggested that the township seriously consider a door-to-door effort and completing a total reassessment of property within the township.

"We've been working through

sales figures primarily, but the way the township is growing, it would not be a bad idea to consider a reassessment," he noted.

In making the announcement of the resignation, Goss said it might not be a bad idea were the township to consider a full-time assessor.

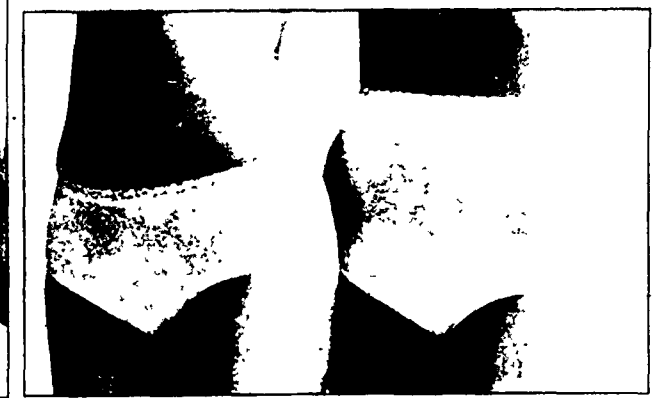

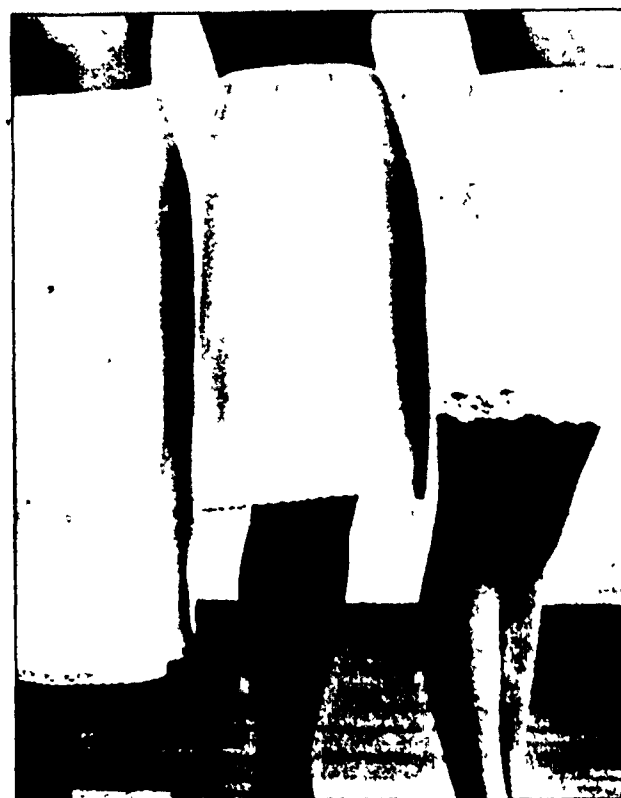

land west of the post office and south of the "scout building," which houses the engineering firm McNeely and Lincoln Associates.

A fourth site, the Open Door Christian Church building, was eliminated from consideration by the site committee but may not be out of the running (see related story).

The committee's charge is to recommend a site to the City Council and Township Board. Those bodies hold authority over the location and funding of any new library building.

"At this point we are calling on the public to tell us of any sites we may have overlooked that would accommodate a 24,000 square foot structure," Orr said.

"We need not only the building but adequate parking. Our users mention insufficient parking space as one of our greatest problems," she added.

We have more than 10,000 library card holders and only eight parking spaces with a 30 minute limit on each.

Orr is also asking the community to identify sites that could be purchased or, perhaps, contributed to the library as a tax write-off.

"If an appropriate site of the size we need cannot be found close to our downtown, we may have to locate farther out in the township," Orr said. "If the community continues to expand and grow, there will eventually be a need for a branch library in the outer edges of the township,

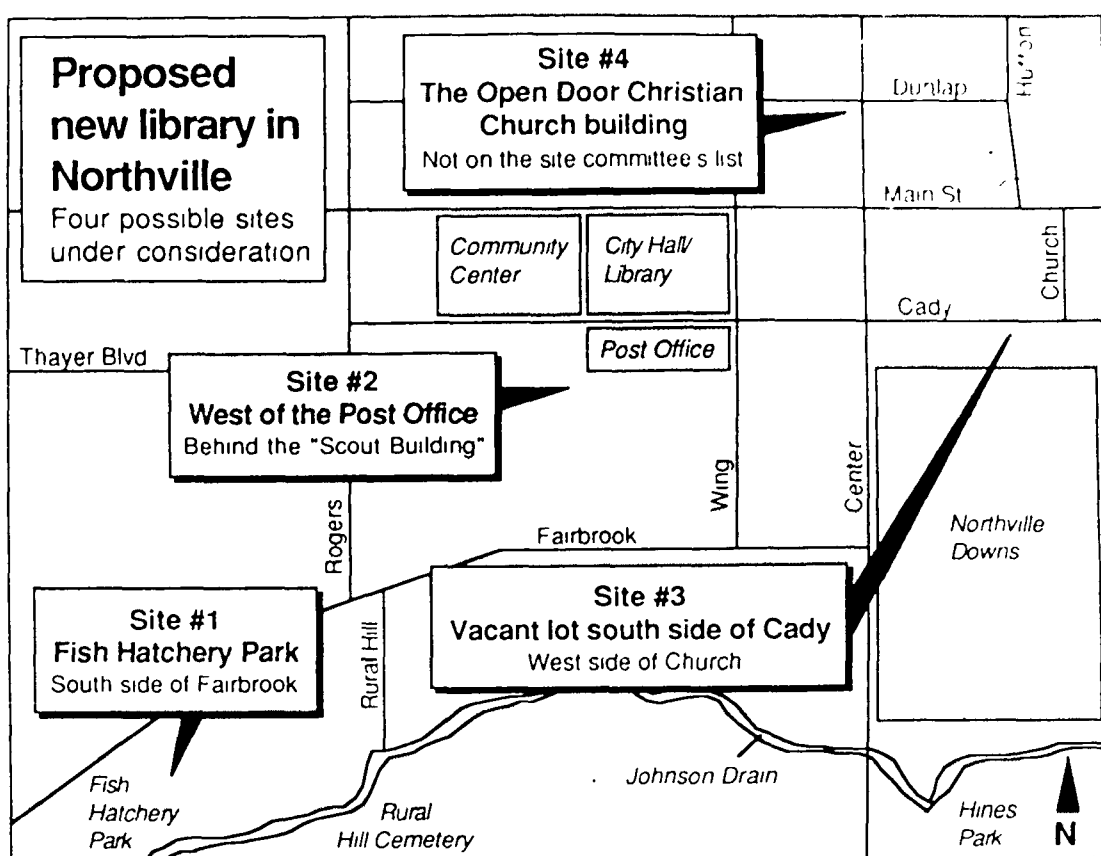
but our hope is to be close to or in the city to meet our needs for the next five to 10 years."

The committee might not quite meet its self imposed May 1 deadline for a decision, but "we'll come close," Orr said.

If the library moves out of the city hall building, it is expected that city government would expand into the library's area.

A survey of library users showed that 59 percent of those returning the survey use another library. Of those who do, 44 percent said the other library is more likely to have what they need.

Suggestions pertaining to sites to be purchased or donated may be made to Orr at the library at 349-3020.



## Views differ on church site

While the Library Site Committee has given up on the Open Door Christian Church as a potential new library site, city officials have not.

Two tours of the building resulted in similar conclusions, but different interpretations. Both the committee and Gary Cooper, an architect who examined the site for the city, concluded that major renovations would be needed to turn the church into a usable library.

The committee concluded the changes would be too much to make the project worthwhile, but the city has decided to pursue the issue further.

"The building is too small, and the walls and floors couldn't take the weight," library Director Patricia Orr said Monday. "You'd have to destroy the character of the building to be able to use it as a library."

Betty Griffin, a member of the site committee and past president of the Friends of the Northville Library, said the church is "totally inadequate from the standpoint of size."

The building contains many small rooms of no real use to a library, Griffin added. "You'd have to totally gut the building and even if you did, there wouldn't be enough square feet," she said.

Cooper's preliminary review comes to similar conclusions, but recommends further study of the issue — which city officials plan to do.

A memo from Cooper to City Manager Steve Walters states that a two-story addition with a basement — most likely on the building's east side — would probably be required to make the church building into a usable library.

"The original church building has been significantly altered both by subsequent additions and architectural changes. In considering reuse, you would have to assume that only

the original church structure and possibly the fellowship hall are reusable," Cooper wrote.

"This space would also require major upgrading of its building systems and interior finishes. The remainder of the structure would likely have to be removed and reconstructed in a different manner," Cooper continued.

"The result if carefully planned and executed, would be a very attractive facility. In the process, you would be retaining a historically significant building, visually enhancing a significant property in downtown and maintaining a

desirable downtown use. Potential drawbacks could be the physical limitations of the existing building, the cost of the property and its preparation or selective demolition, and the internal organization of the library," Cooper wrote.

The city recently applied for its Community Development Block Grant money, an annual federal program for redevelopment and special projects. One part of the city's application was for \$15,000 to be used for a study to further consider the feasibility of using the church

building as a library.

The City Council approved the application after public hearings and sent it to Wayne County where it becomes part of the county's application. The county's application must be approved by the Board of Commissioners and is due to the federal department of Housing and Urban Development July 1 for consideration.

The Open Door Christian Church — formerly the United Methodist Church — is on the southwest corner of Dunlap and Center streets.

## Fireworks funding approved

Officials in the city and township have approved spending the money for the annual Northville Fourth of July fireworks display — and it's going to cost considerably less than last year.

The Northville Jaycees are sponsoring the Independence Day activities again this year. The total cost

is expected to be \$5,200 — a drop from last year's cost of \$8,880.

"For less money than we had last year, we'll actually have more fireworks and more insurance," Northville Jaycee President Teresa Folino said at the City Council meeting Monday.

The fireworks will be provided

from a new company this year, one which will provide a package — both the fireworks and the insurance, which lowers the overall cost.

The Northville Township Board approved contributing \$2,600 to the display Thursday, and the City Council okayed a matching contribution Monday.

## Veterinarians' office proposed

A proposal to open a veterinarians' office off South Main is going to depend on the ability to work out a parking agreement with the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Dave Hamilton owns the house on South Main just above the VFW hall, and appeared before the city Planning Commission last Tuesday to request site plan approval to use the building as an office for two veterinarians who specialize in

horses for Northville Downs and other race tracks.

A review from Planning Consultant Don Wortman objects to the plan on several fronts, including access through a public alley, lack of a 20-foot-wide driveway, and lack of a detailed parking plan.

Hamilton said the VFW uses the alley for access. "There is no other way to get to that property," he said. Wortman and City Manager Steve

Walters suggested a shared parking arrangement between the proposed office and the VFW could solve problems by giving the VFW extra room at night and giving access to a new office.

The commission voted 7-0 to defer the application until Hamilton brings the application back after talking to the VFW about a shared parking agreement.

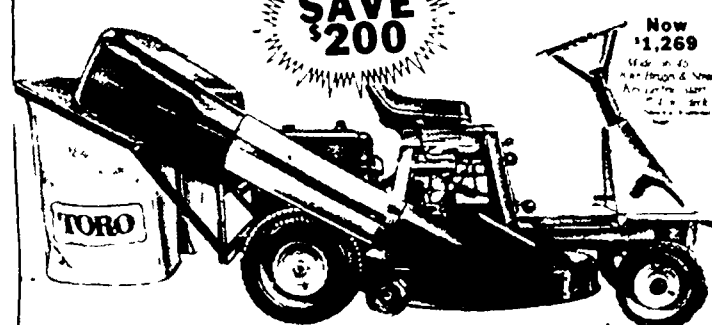

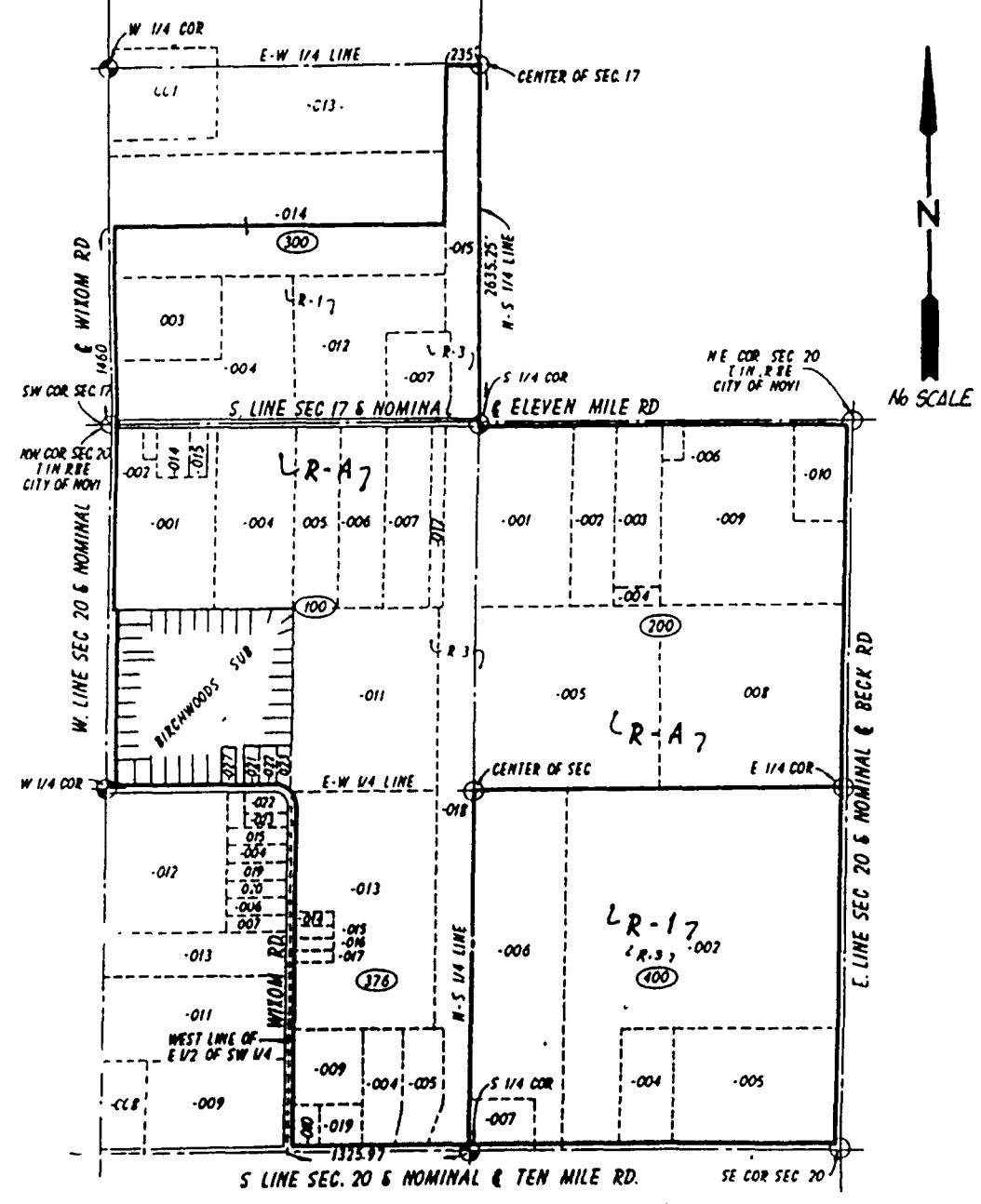

# Station plan stalls

The issue of two driveways at the Gas 'N' Go station at Taft and Eight Mile is turning into a major sticking point for remodeling plans.

Boron Oil, which owns the Gas 'N' Go stations, has applied to remodel the car bays at the station into a beverage and convenience store. That requires approval from the Northville Planning Commission, but appearances before the commission have not yet resulted in any decision on the proposal.

Members of the commission have questioned several aspects of the plan, including issues like drainage and landscaping, but at the commission meeting Tuesday, April 19, the major issue was two of the site's four driveways.

The gas station is on the northeast corner of Taft and Eight Mile roads, one of the more accident-prone intersections in the city, according to a police review of the area.

A traffic study commissioned by the city included a recommendation that the gas station's two driveways closest to the intersection be closed. And although the city has not yet begun formal consideration of the study, one planning commissioner suggested last week that closing the driveways might be a good idea. A representative from Boron strongly disagreed.

"My concern is that intersection is a very dangerous intersection, if not the most dangerous in the city," commission Vice Chairperson John Hardin said at the meeting. "It is not a good intersection. It needs to be ad-

justed and improved."

Jay Hole of Boron agreed the intersection is dangerous, but said closing the driveways would not make it any safer and would harm the business.

"I don't think there can be an acceptable internal traffic flow on the lot if those two entrances are closed, without an expenditure of several hundred thousand dollars ripping everything up," Hole said. "Traffic flow would pretty much stop. You'd put us out of business."

If the city required those driveways to be closed in order for the application to be approved, the company would probably withdraw the application, Hole added.

"I guess I have serious reservations that is the case (going out of business)," Hardin responded. "I have a great deal of sympathy for your bottom line, but it doesn't buy the life of one person at that intersection."

The commission eventually voted to defer the application to its May 17 meeting to allow Boron representatives to confer with city Planning Consultant Don Wortman about issues discussed at the meeting.

"I don't think we're in any kind of consensus position between the applicants and the members of the board," commissioner David Totten told the Boron representatives. "There needs to be some flexibility, and I don't mean all on your part, either."

The motion to defer the application passed 6-1 with Chris Gazlay dissenting. "I feel there are sufficient grounds to reject the application,"

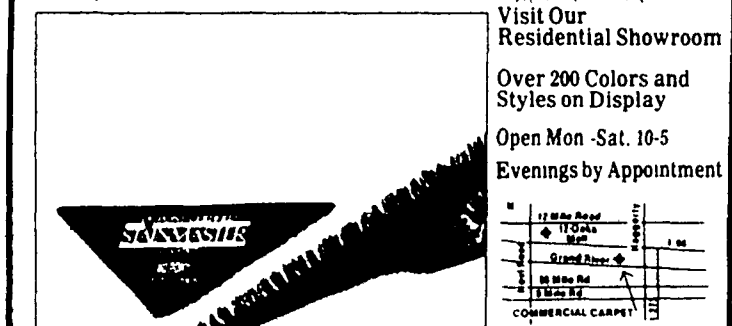

## Resort license on hold for Eight Mile store

A liquor license application from a store on Eight Mile Road is probably going to sit without action until at least next year.

The Northville Party Shoppe on Eight Mile east of Taft has applied to the state Liquor Control Commission (LCC) for a special resort license to sell package hard liquor. The store already has a license to sell package beer and wine.

The LCC considered applications for special resort licenses earlier this year and made no decision on the Northville store's request. And, an LCC spokesperson said Monday those decisions used up all such licenses for the year.

The Northville City Council recommended against issuing the

license. The LCC is not bound by that recommendation.

For the past several years, the LCC has allocated special resort licenses under a law which allows 25 to be issued each year through 1988. This year's 25 have all been issued.

The spokesperson added that since this is the last year of the law, the state cannot issue any more special resort licenses until the legislature adopts another law.

There are three businesses within the city licensed to sell package hard liquor. This is the city's limit based on the population count of the 1980 census. A special resort license, however, is considered a special case and not included in population limits.

## School board lays off 10 teachers

David Mayer was granted tenure in the Northville Public Schools by the Board of Education Monday and, less than five minutes later, found his name included in the list of 10 teachers slated to be laid off.

The layoffs were unanimously approved by the board and were necessary in order to give the teachers sufficient notification under the terms of the Michigan Tenure Law.

Although there are 10 teachers on the layoff list, Burton Knighton, assistant superintendent for administrative services told the board that it was highly probable that most of the 10 would be recalled prior to the start of school in September.

"It has been the practice in Northville to lay teachers off in April of each year to protect the interests of the district in staffing for the subsequent year," Knighton wrote in a memo to the board.

"We anticipate that there will actually be an increase in enrollment in the elementary schools, but there will definitely be a decrease at the secondary level," said superintendent George Bell.

"We expect that some of the teachers at the secondary level will be able, because of their certification, to bump into positions at the elementary or middle school level. We did not eliminate secondary teaching positions last year, even

though the enrollment declined at the high school and we have no choice but to eliminate them this year," Bell added.

The teachers slated for termination are teachers who were new to the district during the 1987-88 school year. Included on the list are David Babich, Linda Balfour, Mary Grosman, Denise Hinrichsen, Mayer, Kathleen Mroz, Elizabeth Mulligan, Suzanne Omiatek, Cheryl Walro and Jack Wickens, Jr.

## Township sues over too many prisoners

understood the problem with overcrowding in the prison system, she noted that Northville Township already had taken more than its share of the burden.

"I think if this was the first time we had dealt with the department or if this were the first time that the department had asked for special consideration it would be one thing. But this is not the first time and the department was very well aware of the caps. The reason the caps are there in the first place is because we have found that the caps are the only way to make sure the Corrections Department honors its commitments," said Goss.

Heintz, testifying before Nye's committee, said she was dismayed to learn that the cap had been violated.

"We were given a number of promises by the department before Scott opened regarding employment, the use of local vendors and the cap. Now we find that the Department has drawn a circle that includes Detroit

in the 'local community,'" said Heintz.

"The overcrowding issue is not our problem," said Heintz. "The Department of Corrections is aware that there is a state law, signed by the governor, limiting the number of prisoners that can be housed at these three facilities. And the department is aware that it is violating that law," she concluded.

Law told the public hearing that the local communities had been in court for almost a year prior to the opening of Scott, addressing the issue of security and the number of prisoners at the three correctional facilities.

"We have three prisons, the small, the old and the new. And we heard statements by Corrections Department officials while Scott was being built that they could not control the prisoners at facilities that had more than 500 inmates.

"In their own words, they said you roll the dice if there are more than 500 prisoners," said Law.

Said Heintz: "The problem is that

we feel we have been lied to. We went to the governor to try to solve the problem and he signed the law. Now that law has been violated."

Nye commented that as he understood the problem, "we have people inside the prisons who are there because they have broken the law. Now we have the Department of Corrections violating the law. Which is worse?"

Martin Vittands, an assistant Attorney General representing the Department of Corrections, said Friday that he had not been informed of any violation of the cap.

"I have no comment on any potential suit until I see the paperwork," he said.

While May said that he had tried to persuade corrections officials to not send the overflow to Scott, he said the response was that there was no where else to put them.

"The fact of the matter is that if we continue to receive people into the state correctional system at the rate we have done so up to now, by the end of this year there will be 10,500 new

people coming into the system," said LaLonde. "That means, all things being equal, there will be 5,000 more people coming into the state system than leaving it."

LaLonde said that he hopes the overcrowding will be eased with the opening of the Chippewa Temporary Correctional Facility in the Upper Peninsula, which is scheduled to open in June.

However, Keith Fecteau, acting administrative assistant to the warden at Kinross Correctional Facility, said that he did not know if the facility would actually open in June.

"Yes, the facility was supposed to open in April. But we had a hard time finding staff and at the same time, the facility was not completed," he said.

That facility is supposed to house 660 medium security prisoners when complete.

Kinross now has 1,285 inmates, most triple bunked and some living in what formerly was a gymnasium when the facility was an air base.



# Williams files early for township vote

Although the filing deadline for the township election is still more than a month away, Trustee Don B. Williams has already filed his nominating petitions with the township clerk.

Williams turned in petitions containing 80 signatures, said Eunice Switzler, deputy clerk. She said that petitions for township office must contain a minimum of 52 and a maximum of 405 valid signatures.

The filing deadline for township office is May 31. In addition to four trustee spots, the township supervisor, treasurer and clerk positions are open.

Georgina Goss, the supervisor, Richard Henningsen, the treasurer and Thomas Cook, the clerk, have announced their intention to seek election.

Cook and Goss were appointed to their offices and Henningsen was elected to his.

Trustees Richard Allen also said he was seeking election and has pulled a petition, as has Thomas Handyside, who was appointed to the board.

James Nowka has not pulled a petition from the clerk's office Switzler said, and could not be reached to confirm whether he would be seeking re-election. Myron Casey had requested that petitions be mailed to him.

"This office is not the only one where petitions are available," said Switzler. "Candidates can pick up petitions at the Wayne County Clerk's Office and it is possible that others prospective candidates have pulled petitions from there."

## City has new court date over Rural Hill title

After not hearing from anyone claiming a stake in the defunct Rural Hill Cemetery Association, the City of Northville is set to return to court in an effort to clear its title to all of the cemetery.

Rural Hill Cemetery straddles the city / township border below Fairbrook. The city has a clear title to the land within its limits, but — apparently due to an oversight when the title was transferred years ago — the part of the cemetery lying in the township still legally belongs to the Rural Hill Cemetery Association,

which no longer exists. The city now administers and maintains the cemetery.

As part of a legal effort to quit title to the township part of the cemetery, the city filed a lawsuit. Wayne County Circuit Court Judge William Cahalan required the city to advertise for any surviving members of the cemetery association.

The city published a legal advertisement asking for any surviving association members for three consecutive weeks in the Record and received no response.

"(City Manager) Steve Walters and I have discussed it. He hasn't heard anything, nor have I," John Kelly, the attorney handling the case for the city, said Monday. The city concluded the schedule of publishing March 17.

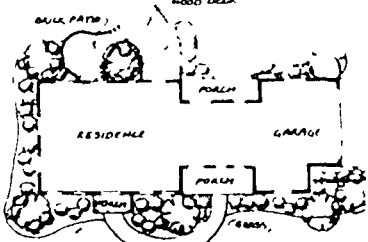
The city was scheduled to return to court last week, but the hearing was adjourned at the judge's request.

Kelly said. A new court date is set for May 13.

"We should not have any trouble at all" reforming the deed, Kelly said.

If the deed is settled, city officials may consider annexing the part of the cemetery within the township. Township officials have discussed fighting such action before the state Boundary Commission.

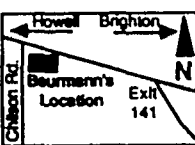

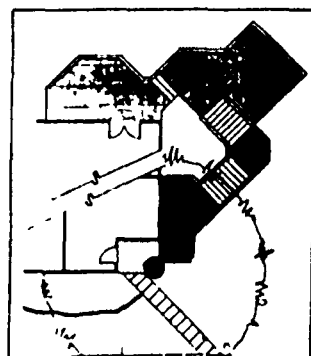

### Township has no choice but to sue Corrections

The violation of the court and state mandated cap on the number of prisoners who may be housed at Scott Regional Correctional Facility, Western Wayne Correctional Facility and Phoenix Correctional Facility is nothing less than a blatant violation of the law by the people who are supposed to manage violators, the Michigan Department of Corrections.

It also is a whole lot more. It is the culmination of an overcrowding situation throughout the department that cannot and should not be tolerated.

Unfortunately, the only action that the Michigan Department of Corrections seems to understand is legal action. It took federal action and the threat of financial hardship — \$10,000 per day — before the Corrections Department stopped shipping convicted felons to the Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson, the Michigan Reformatory at Ionia and Marquette Correctional Facility.

It took legal and legislative action before the department agreed to stop double-bunking prisoners at Western Wayne and Phoenix and a legal action by Northville Township before the department agreed to take the necessary safeguards to allow medium and close custody prisoners to move into Scott.

And now, the department has violated its own guidelines for regional prisons, double bunking prisoners at its showcase facility less than a year after the facility opened.

A tour of Scott last week just brought home once again the arrogance of the state correctional system.

When Scott opened, the department was justly proud of its \$35 million facility. The prisoners assigned to Scott were first-time offenders, men who, we were told, would spend their entire sentence at one prison, men who would be able to keep their dignity as long as they obeyed the rules of the facility.

### Flower sale is welcome addition to city events

As spring inevitably approaches, so too, does the season of outdoor craft, antique and sidewalk sales for the Northville community. Now, according to Del Black, the Northville Merchants Association will be sponsoring the city's first ever Spring Flower Sale. What a welcome addition this show will make to the city's agenda of activities.

Plans call for 10 of the best flower vendors from the incredibly popular Eastern Market Flower Show, to bring their wares to Northville on May 27 and 28. The Eastern Market sale has been a tradition in the Detroit area for years, with families loading up the car with wagons and kids for the trek downtown to walk amid fragrant, colorful blossoms to pick up the season's plants.

Now that same fun comes closer to home. While Northville has a fine tradition of craft and antique shows

Today, those same prisoners are on the outside watching as some 96 new prisoners, men who are not necessarily either first-time offenders nor from the metropolitan Detroit area, are being housed in Scott's common areas.

It would be irresponsible and not accurate to tell the Michigan Department of Corrections that Northville Township did not care about the overcrowding throughout the corrections system.

But it is precisely because the township cares about the prisoners and its own residents that it has gone to court to have the additional prisoners removed from the three western Wayne County prisons and moved elsewhere.

It is precisely because of the past actions of the Michigan Department of Corrections that the legislative cap was put in place. And it is precisely because the department has not yet learned that it cannot violate the law, that the township has gone to court once again.

State Rep. Gerry Law told a House Republican prison oversight committee that spokespeople in the Department of Corrections have said that they cannot guarantee control of the prison if more than 500 prisoners are housed at Western Wayne. Yet there are more than that now, and unless firm action is taken, more are on the way.

Northville Township has fulfilled its obligation to the Michigan Department of Corrections. Now, it is time that the department take responsibility for its promises and seek a solution that is fair not only to Northville Township, but to the prisoners within the system.

For too long the department has shirked its responsibility. Someone, and in this case that someone is Northville Township, has to force the department to face up to its shortcomings.

during the summer, the flower sale will enhance the popularity of the city and no doubt draw residents from surrounding communities to the city and to its shops as well.

We support the Merchants Association's work in this area. This move to go beyond the usual will have far reaching, positive results for all. Turning the streets over to flowers for two days at the start of the planting season is a wonderful idea indeed.

A walk through Northville on a pleasant spring day is a wonderful experience, and the city's first Flower Sale should introduce both Northville residents and their neighbors to the experience, while providing winter-frustrated gardeners with just the right inspiration to begin the work of turning the hard earth into rainbows of color.

### Touch of gray

I must be getting old. Ordinarily, that wouldn't bother me much, since the alternative is so much worse. But I felt guilty enough on a recent Monday for performing an immature act — avoiding a school board meeting to go to a rock concert.

Here at The Northville Record, the managing editor is usually understanding. I mean, if you have died and have a doctor's excuse, he usually will allow you not to attend a scheduled meeting. Anything less than that, however, requires groveling and 20 lashes with the whip.

But long in advance of the school board meeting in Northville, I had put in my request to attend the Grateful Dead concert in Detroit.

I don't skip work for just any rock group. But the Dead are something special, and have been in my book ever since I learned of their existence while still a college student.

I remember the first time I saw them perform. It was at Jenison Field House in East Lansing, a place where no respectable U-M student would be caught unless there was a basketball game scheduled. But I figured that few people would recognize me as a Wolverine, especially since my jeans were properly faded, patched and tight and my army jacket had not seen a dry cleaner or washing machine in two years.

The Dead did not disappoint. In fact, they were very much alive and so was the crowd. It was a proper homage to an excellent group.

The second time I saw Jerry Garcia and company in concert was in Ann Arbor. They played Hill Auditorium as it had not been played before. Somehow, I never thought Hill could survive the experience. The old place rocked and rolled, rolled and rocked, and still is standing.

I was older, wiser but the Dead had not changed much. They still played the kind of music that propelled them from another of San Francisco's usual bands into cult heroes, people who routinely hung out with Ken Kesey. I guess that gave them a cultural designation.

But on that Monday, as I prepared for the encounter, I remembered that it had been a long time — a very long time, since I had been to a Dead concert. I assumed, given that radio stations were playing their music, that they had changed, and I wasn't sure it was for the better.

The big question was what to wear, not what they would play. A decade ago I threw out the last of my tie-dyed shirts, my mini dresses and my army clothes. My semiformal, the same dress I wore to my high school prom and the Ann Arbor Dead concerts, stopped fitting 15 years ago, so I couldn't wear that, either.

I figured that there would be enough old people there to be comfortable, but what I didn't count on was the number of kids. When you get to be past 35, anyone under 25 is a kid.

The kids showed up in their off-the-rack tie-dyed outfits, matching pants and shirts. The old folks just showed up, wearing the required attire, jeans.

The Dead had both groups on their feet for the entire event.

But I'm not sure they would have played as well or as long as they did had they heard the comments from the crowd. Right after playing "Touch of Gray", the members of the band tuned their instruments. As they worked their way to the back of the stage, one youngster standing at my elbow asked her date if they were taking an intermission.

His response: "I think they need it. They are pretty old."

Ever feel like a consensus All-American jerk? I did Saturday.

I was at the Novi Hilton, attending Rotary District 638's annual conference as the personal guest of Mav Sanghvi, the Novi physician and devoted Rotarian who is district governor this year.

Mav told me several years ago that Rotary is the most-nearly perfect organization he knows because it truly transcends political and religious differences in the interest of world peace and service to humanity.

At any rate, I was at the conference as Mav's personal guest. I heard U.S. Senator Carl Levin speak, attended the luncheon, heard some more speeches and then stepped outside to shoot some pictures.

Now comes the part about the All-American jerk. While I was outside, Boots Greengood came rushing up and told me to get back inside right away. "Run," she said.

I got back in time to learn that Novi Rotary had made me a Paul Harris Fellow. This is no small honor, folks. It's the highest honor in Rotary. Paul Harris was the fellow who founded Rotary in 1905, and to be named a Paul Harris Fellow well, it's an honor that only a handful receive — a handful who practice the ideals of Rotary over a long period of time.

So selective is the Paul Harris Fellow award that a local chapter must pay Rotary International at least \$1,000 for the right to bestow it. That's what Novi Rotary and Mav Sanghvi had done for me — and I'm not even a Rotarian.

# Know the facts about crack cocaine

This is another continuing series of columns written for The Record by Charles Stille, Northville High School Student Assistance Program Coordinator.

Lately, I have received more than a few inquiries from students and adults wanting information on crack cocaine. After talking with the students, some of whom I know use cocaine, and hearing them say, "Yeah, it's around," it becomes apparent that with a rise in interest, the arrival of warmer weather, and the progression from the city to the suburbs, that the facts about crack cocaine need to be known to adult and adolescent.

Kenny, an ex-cocaine abuser relates: "When I was doing cocaine I got so selfish. I wished I didn't have no one — no kids, no parents, no people who love me. I didn't care about nothing, that's how crazy it was. I just couldn't get enough. You know what? Anyone who tells you cocaine's OK is a liar."

From William, a former user: "I had a beautiful family, a big house in the suburbs, everything I wanted. Then I got into cocaine and I almost lost it all. It's a lie that cocaine's not addictive. I didn't choose to be an addict. Quitting cocaine was the only thing I couldn't do by myself. I'll be a recovering addict the rest of my life."

Cocaine is instant addiction. It's a white powder that comes from the leaves of the coca plant. Sold on the street, it's often a mixture of cocaine and other substances.

Cocaine belongs to a class of drugs called stimulants, which tend to give a temporary illusion of limitless power and energy.

Crack is a form of cocaine that has been chemically altered so that it can be smoked. It

looks like small lumps or shavings of soap, but has the texture of porcelain. It's called "rock" or "readyrock" and can come in pill form.

Crack appears to be a cheap and easy way to use cocaine. It's usually smoked in water pipes or in cigarettes. The crack habit is cheap at the start. The first dose may cost as little as \$5. This makes it appealing to more and more young people. They also like crack's harmless appearance and small size. They don't know that those tiny white chips are a vicious drug and that eventually the habit will cost hundreds of dollars a week.

Seconds after the crack vapors are absorbed into the lungs and bloodstream, they hit the brain. This produces a short, false sense of euphoria that lasts from 3 — 10 minutes. Then comes the crash. The deadly cycle has begun.

Crack triggers an explosive chain reaction. It rapidly bankrupts the brain's supply of essential biochemicals and sets off a craving for more stimulation. Most crack users try to feed this compulsive craving with more crack. But the drug has set up a vicious cycle. It blocks the return of these natural biochemicals to the brain so that more crack simply aggravates, rather than relieves, the craving.

Initially, the user may have a false sense of self confidence, power and exhilaration. Then comes severe depression, paranoia, violence and even suicide. Crack produces intense ups and downs. It's addictive because of its hangover, which is so severe and immediate, beginning within six minutes after use. The user wants to use the drug again to escape the crash.

Physical effects of crack use include lung damage, dangerous changes in blood pressure, tremors, convulsions, brain seizures causing

suffocation, overdose, heart attack and strokes by elevating blood pressure and bursting blood vessels in the brain.

Psychological effects are seeing and hearing strange things, hallucinations, anxiety, inability to sleep, memory lapses, social isolation, violence, deep depression and suicide.

Crack becomes more important than the user's health, food, sex, school performance, family or work. This also is the progression cycle of all drugs if the user abuses and becomes dependent.

The long-lasting craving for these drugs makes addiction hard to treat without assistance. There are many treatment programs throughout the country that can help get people off and keep off, cocaine or crack.

The first step is detoxification, ridding the body of the drug, sometimes followed by medication to help control the craving and to treat the severe depression that occurs after cocaine or crack is withdrawn.

Treatment can help the drug user find alternatives and provide assistance through a combination of individual, group and family counseling. The goal of recovery programs is to improve self image and promote healthy living without drugs. Attending Cocaine Anonymous or Narcotics Anonymous meetings, which are self help groups modeled after the Alcoholics Anonymous program, can be helpful. These groups are listed in the phone book.

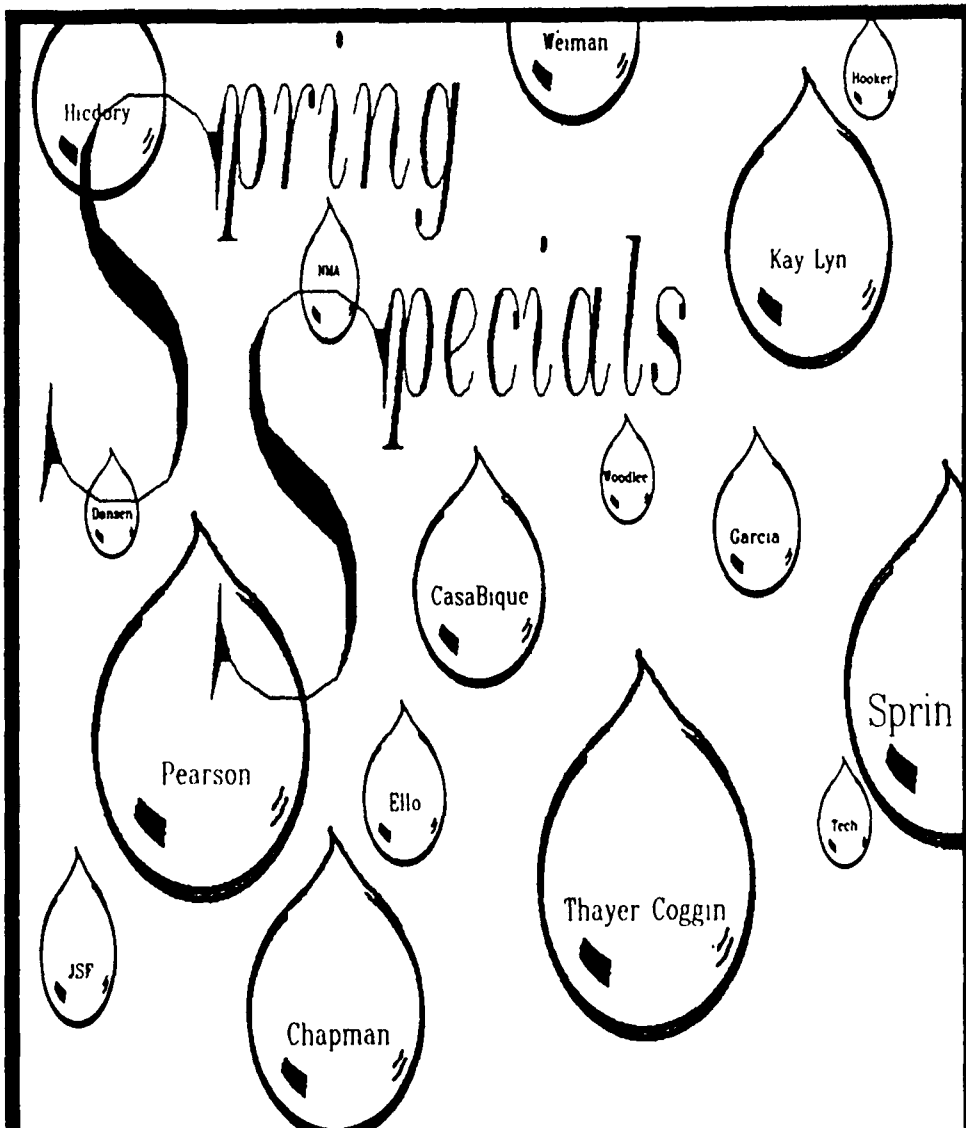

## Lapham Field fund bill in legislature

The bill which could provide money to buy Lapham Field may get its first committee hearing next week.

The Northville Recreation Commission has been recommended for a \$123,000 grant to buy about nine acres of land at Lapham Field, the site of four soccer fields used by Northville Community Recreation. The North-

ville funding request would come as part of the annual spending from the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund.

Northville's request is number 36 on a prioritized list of 40 projects recommended for trust fund money. A bill which would authorize the release of the money has been in-

troduced in the state legislature and is awaiting a hearing before the Joint Capital Outlay Committee.

Deborah Apostol, a staff assistant for the recreation division of the Department of Natural Resources, said the bill might come before the committee next Thursday, May 5.

Once reported out of that commit-

tee the bill would go to both the House and Senate Appropriation Committees, she said, before going to the full House and Senate and the governor's desk.

"If it's like the last couple of years, it will be late July or early August" before the bill's fate is decided," Apostol added.

public if a government levies a millage rate which will increase taxes through higher property assessments. To avoid such a hearing, a government must set a tax rate which brings in the same amount of revenue as if property values had stayed even, not including higher values due to new construction.

This year the city levied 13.58 mills. Under the Truth-in-Taxation formula, the city can only levy up to 12.48 mills next year without holding a special hearing to announce a tax increase.

The latest figures on state

equalized value of property in the city are higher than the first estimates, and some figures are still not in from Wayne County. The latest estimates, combined with a 12.48 mill tax rate, will yield \$37,000 more in property taxes than the budget estimates.

Other expenses might not come as soon as the budget assumes. "There are some expenses that can realistically be deferred" until the financial picture sharpens over the next fiscal year, Walters said.

One expense which won't come as soon is electricity for street lights. The new budget assumes a full year of street lighting in the still-developing Pheasant Hills and Abbey

Knoll Estates subdivisions. DPW Superintendent Ted Mapes said Tuesday that the lights will not go on by the start of the fiscal year July 1.

But in spite of these changes in the picture, there will probably still be some budget cuts necessary. "We will have to make some choices," Walters said. He will present a plan to make ends meet at Monday's final budget review session, he said.

That proposal will stay within Truth in Taxation guidelines of 12.48 mills, Walters said. The council would be free to override that recommendation by conducting a Truth-in-Taxation hearing.

The bright side of the picture is

that the city might face a tough year next year, but after that, things should improve, Walters said.

"In a sense this is our tightest year," he said. This is because the city is adjusting to new growth — like the Abbey Knoll Estates and Pheasant Hills subdivisions — but is only getting a part of the tax revenue that will come once that area is fully developed and inhabited, he said.

For example, the city has added two Department of Public Works employees and is doing a lot of water and sewer work. So, other things being equal, next year will see more revenue without significantly more expenses.

## Commission approves plan for credit union

The Community Federal Credit Union won Planning Commission approval for a new building last week, in anticipation of a groundbreaking later this year.

The credit union plans to put up a new building on the southwest corner of Main and Griswold, the lot which currently only holds some trees and a "Welcome to Downtown Northville" sign. The new building will more than double the credit union's current space and will add drive-through teller windows.

James Cantrell, general manager of the credit union, said the credit union's current building is for sale, but that the union has not yet received any firm offers.

In addition to the credit union, that building also houses the Northville

Record, a beauty salon and an attorney's office.

In presenting the plan to the commission, architect Walt Coponen said a driveway on Main Street will be enter-only, which was a police department request to discourage traffic backup.

The credit union's present office at the northwest corner of Main and Center has about 1,200 square feet of room, Coponen said, which will increase to about 2,500 in the new building.

The new credit union building will have two drive-through teller windows, with a third able to be added later, Coponen said. The Planning Commission approval of the proposal includes a provision stating the third window will be installed when the city directs it to be because of traffic congestion.

love in his eight children and now his three grandchildren. What he has not taught them is to enjoy television.

"It's really kind of mindless," he said of TV, although he admits that once in a while he finds himself watching it. "I turned it on the other night I was watching something called 'Spencer for Hire' and all of a sudden, one of the characters said something about sitting around and whittling his thumbs. It's a great image, but someone didn't catch the

mistake."

Scott said his main goal is to help students keep their eyes open and to write about what they see.

"It's like when a baseball player is on a hot streak. He explains that he sees the ball so clearly, even the seams. That's what writing poetry is about. Seeing things clearly."

One of the exercises Scott has given his Northville High School students is to write about body parts. He rummages through the valise and pulls out a lined sheet of paper

"This is a poem, written by a girl about armpits. Boys usually write about that, not girls. But she writes, 'You are like arches into a secret place, made of delicate stone. That's what I want. A way of looking at very mundane things in a new way.'"

Scott said he remembers the day he knew he wanted to write. "I was a seventh-grader and it was in Mrs. Buchanan's room. She was a mean teacher. But I can remember exactly where I was standing when I knew

that I was going to be a writer. It was a while later that I became a poet."

"I thought at first that I might be a fiction writer, and I still may write fiction one day, but now I'm concentrating on poetry," he said.

And, he certainly is a success. He has collaborated with two other Michigan poets in editing a book containing 53 poems from Michigan poets, and published three books of poetry, "Durations," in 1984, "Disguised," in 1974 and his Pulitzer Prize nominated work, "Groceries," in 1976.

## New jewelry shop helps to continue a family tradition

Gary Weinstein is living proof that dreams can indeed come true.

Weinstein's mother had a dream that he should open a jewelry store in Novi. And that's just what he did.

"My mother woke up one morning and told me she had a dream about a 'Weinstein Jewelers of Novi,' no kidding. So the next day I came out here and started looking for a store. It took me about six months to find a spot I liked and I'm really happy with it," Weinstein commented.

Gold, silver, precious metals and sparkling gems have played an important role in Weinstein's life throughout his upbringing. His father and uncle originated the reputable

Weinstein Jewelry Store located in the Metropolitan Building in downtown Detroit during the early 1940s.

Eventually, the first Weinstein jewelry stores grew into catalog showrooms, where everything from diamonds to toys to blenders and other appliances were sold. The catalog showrooms — in Dearborn and on the city's east side — enjoyed success in the 1950s and 1960s. # 'IRAs are still valuable retirement tool'

Remember the good, old days when you could trim your tax bill simply by contributing to an individual Retirement Account, affectionately known as IRA?

Well, Congress decided to do a little trimming itself and, in the process, snipped off IRA's wings. The new IRA is still an excellent means of building retirement funds, but tax reform and a roller coaster economy make watching over earthbound IRAs a little more complicated than in the past.

According to the Michigan Association of CPAs, tax reform has returned the IRA to its original purpose: providing a retirement fund for lower-to-middle-income Americans.

**IRA DEDUCTION RULES:** If you and your spouse did not actively participate in a retirement plan at work for any part of the taxable year, an IRA will still work its old deduction magic. You can contribute and deduct up to \$2,000 or 100 percent of your earnings, whichever is less. If you have a working spouse earning at least \$2,000, you can deduct an additional \$2,000, a non-working spouse up to the allowable deduction by \$250.

If you or your spouse are covered by a retirement plan, the deductibility of your IRA contribution is based on your adjusted gross income (AGI). How do you know if you are an active participant in a qualified retirement plan? The simplest response is check the information box on your W-2 form or ask your employer.

Don't make assumptions. If your employer's pension plan says you are eligible for coverage, then you are considered an active participant. In fact, even if you changed jobs and your current employer doesn't offer

a retirement plan, the IRS still considers you an active participant if you were eligible for coverage at your previous job for any portion of 1987.

Participants in retirement plans do not necessarily lose the IRA deduction. Married couples with an AGI of \$40,000 or less and singles with an AGI of \$25,000 or less are still entitled to the full deduction.

Once your earnings exceed those limits, however, your deduction whittles away. For every \$1,000 income over the ceilings of \$40,000 and \$25,000, you lose \$200 in deductions. The deduction is completely eliminated for married couples with an AGI greater than \$50,000 and for singles with an AGI greater than \$35,000.

**WITHDRAWALS:** If you suspect the change in the rules for depositing money into an IRA affects the rules for taking it out, you're exactly right.

Previously, withdrawals from IRA accounts were taxed as ordinary income. Clean and simple. If you don't make a non-deductible contribution, the rules remain the same. But the game plan changes as soon as you make a non-deductible IRA contribution — because these funds have already been taxed.

From now on, distributions from IRA accounts will not be taxable only to the extent of non-deductible contributions. To insure that you will not be taxed on withdrawals of funds that have already been taxed, you have to

inform the IRS of any non-deductible contributions made between now and the time you receive the entire sum of your IRA funds — in other words, for life.

Most of the other rules governing IRA withdrawals remain intact. Unless you are permanently disabled or die, any withdrawal of IRA money before age 59½ will suffer a 10 percent penalty tax in addition to any regular tax due. On the other hand, you must begin withdrawing funds from all IRA accounts no later than April 1 of the year following the year in which you turn 70½.

**PUTTING IRAs TO WORK:** Most investment experts still recommend post-reform IRAs as a vehicle for retirement savings. Despite your instincts that say "it ain't so," the tax deduction is not the only reason why IRAs have long put a gleam in taxpayers' eyes. IRAs still enable you to accumulate dividends, interest, and capital gains which are tax-deferred and, thus, compound faster.

More than half of all taxpayers invest their IRAs in a bank certificate of deposit (CD), perhaps because of convenience and security. But CDs often pay lower interest rates and may not keep pace with inflation over the long haul. Other investment options include money market accounts, mutual funds, stocks, annuities and bonds.

In the ominous light of "Black Monday," the day the stock market

dropped 508 points, you may hesitate to invest in an IRA in anything but a cash-equivalent account. In this case, money market accounts and Treasury notes may yield a higher interest rate without a marked increase in risk. Mutual funds can also be a good choice for investors whose retirement is 20 or 30 years away — a conservative, diversified, no-load fund will often result in a much healthier nest egg for your retirement years.

Whatever investment option you choose, keep an eye on how your IRA is performing. If you are unhappy with your IRA's return, don't sit by and watch potential income waste away. If you have thousands of dollars in a mutual fund that's floundering, switch to an investment with a more consistent record of success.

Remember that you can make as many direct transfers between IRA trustees or accounts as you deem necessary. If, however, you actually withdraw your IRA funds and close your account, the transfer is considered a rollover (you are allowed one a year) and must be re-deposited in a qualified IRA account within 60 days. If you miss the 60-day deadline, the amount withdrawn will be taxed and, if you are under 59½, will also be subject to a 10 percent early-withdrawal penalty.

In spite of the withdrawal penalties and the tax-deduction restrictions, IRAs remain one of the most widely recommended tools for building a retirement nest egg.

The Michigan Association of CPAs suggests that you compare the tax advantages of IRAs with those of other tax-deferred or tax-free instruments before making a final investment decision.

# Realtors note shortage of single-family homes

A shortage of single family home listings may prove the biggest deterrent to growth in this year's local real estate market.

Metro MLS, the state's largest multiple listing service, said the 12 percent decline in homes coming on the market in 1987 has been followed by another five percent drop so far this year.

"Our sales-to-listing ratio was nearly 57 percent in February, but an 8.4 percent cut in listings from a year ago helped reduce sales more than 12 percent," said Marjory R. Pickett, Metro MLS president.

"With mortgage interest rates down and other market conditions favorable going into the month, we expected to see more sellers entering the market. While about one-in-four sales this year are for homes priced at \$100,000 or above, the most active markets in February were those well below this."

The February sales ratio was 86 percent in Westland where prices

averaged \$54,934, above 83 percent in Livonia at \$88,903 and 80 percent in Redford at \$49,276.

"The median price year-to-date figure last month was \$68,080. The average price of \$81,561 set a new record for our 1,600 square mile territory."

Pickett attributed part of the price jump in February to lower interest rates helping many buyers qualify for larger loans. "While we do expect local prices to continue to rise, the 6.3 percent jump from January doesn't reflect the real trend," she said. "The year-to-date average of \$79,505 is only \$1,354 or 1.7 percent above this time in 1987."

Pickett said the continuing price growth should encourage more prospective buyers to begin their search as spring weather moves in. Sellers hoping to take advantage of higher buyer volume should now be putting their homes in top sales condition, she added.

# Sales of existing homes show 9 percent decline

While ranking eighth in the nation last year, Michigan sales of 169,600 existing homes showed a drop of 9.1 percent from 1986.

"The market varied considerably throughout the state as it did in the Detroit Metropolitan area," said Marjory R. Pickett, president of Metro MLS, the state's largest multiple listing service.

"Within our 1,600 square mile territory primarily in Wayne and Oakland counties, we sold about 10 percent of the state total. Our decline from 1986 was 10.6 percent. At the same time we experienced a 12.8 percent drop in single-family home listings as their average price rose 8.4 percent to \$79,225."

"But, there was no common trend throughout the area. We saw considerable differences in listings, sales and price among the varied communities we cover."

# CPAs offer tips on buying a new home

If owning a home is the American dream something about spring mustget dreamers dreaming.

Year after year the spring months bring a new influx of potential homeowners to the real estate market. What are they looking for? A roof over their heads? A safe and profitable investment? Or both?

Whatever the motive if you're like most people buying a home is likely to be the biggest purchase you make and you want it to be a wise one. The Michigan Association of CPAs recommends that you consider any house you are planning to buy both in terms of whether it is a good home to live in and whether it is a solid investment.

Here are some basic guidelines any potential home buyer should follow.

First of all before you start looking you'll want to determine two factors — where you want to live and how much you can afford to spend. Allow yourself plenty of time to look — buying a home is not something you want to rush into.

Surely you've heard the old adage. There are three things to consider when buying a house — location, location, location. This statement may sound trite but it certainly isn't an overstatement. Without a doubt location should be the primary consideration in selecting a house. The value of a house is largely determined by the location and character of the neighborhood it is in.

Take Beverly Hills, for example. A house there recently sold for \$71,000

— unbelievable by Beverly Hills standards. Only one problem — the entire house's living space measured only 22 feet by 26 feet. And to top it all off the house was not even in Beverly Hills proper. But because it had a Beverly Hills telephone exchange and its mail was delivered by the Beverly Hills post office someone was willing to pay \$71,000 for less than 600 square feet of living space.

But just how do you go about finding the right location? Success partly depends on common sense. Look for neighborhoods where the houses and lawns are well maintained.

A more scientific measure of the desirability of a location is how quickly houses in that community are selling. If the average time on the market is 90 days or less chances are the area is a strong one.

You could also do some research to uncover the difference between the asking prices and the selling prices of homes in the area. If the difference is small — say under five percent — you're probably looking at a desirable area. You can generally obtain this information from the local Board of Realtors.

It's wise to look for an area that has an excellent school system. Because of its appeal to parents with school-age children the resale value of your home is likely to be higher in an area with good schools.

Property taxes vary widely and have been rising quickly. Check into the property taxes in the area you're considering. You might even want to

review the property taxes for the past few years to see how fast they are going up.

Once you settle on a neighborhood find out about future plans for the area. To do so, you might make an appointment with the township clerk, township attorney or building inspector who can update you on the town's master plan. Ask about plans for surrounding land use. Pity the homeowner who buys a house bordering undeveloped land only to find out that a large condominium development is on the drawing board.

Check, too, to see if there are any zoning changes under study that could drastically affect the character of the community.

The style of home you choose — be it colonial, split level, ranch or contemporary — is basically a matter of personal preference. But stay within the confines of general acceptance. Outlandish houses with trendy amenities are often difficult to resell.

In fact, the condition of the house is more important than whether it is a colonial or contemporary. The kitchen is probably the most important room — it should be bright with a good layout, plenty of counter space and modern appliances. Three or four bedrooms are ideal and you'll want a house with a minimum of two baths. A family room has become a must for many buyers these days and a fireplace always adds to the value of the house. Consider, too, a home's energy efficiency.

Under tax reform, owning a home

is likely to be your biggest tax break. You'll be happy to know that most of the tax benefits of home ownership survived tax reform unscathed.

Mortgage interest on primary and secondary homes is generally still tax-deductible and the deduction for property taxes was preserved as well. There are, however, certain restrictions or limits governing the amount of interest you may deduct. Be aware, too, that under tax reform, your deductions may not be worth quite as much because lower tax-rate reductions automatically lessen the value of tax deductions.

On a first mortgage, you can generally deduct any "points" or loan origination fees you pay in advance for a mortgage. However, on a second mortgage or refinancing your deduction may be limited depending on the amount you borrow and what you use the proceeds for.

Under tax reform, you may still defer paying taxes on the profit from the sale of your primary residence if, within two years before or after the sale of your home, you buy another home of equal or greater value. And taxpayers who are 55 or older retain a special one-time tax break that allows them to exclude from tax up to \$125,000 of profit from the sale of their primary residence, providing they meet certain criteria.

To make sure you are reaping all the tax benefits you are entitled to, consult a qualified tax professional before buying a new home.

## Small business group lobbies for tax relief

Michigan small business wants property tax relief so badly it's willing to fund other tax increases in return.

The 1988 member survey of the National Federation of Independent Business/Michigan finds more than half of all respondents supporting legislative proposals to cut property taxes 50 percent, even if that requires new taxes to offset lost revenues.

Among replacement taxes, those most favored are state income taxes on lottery winnings (73 percent), increased beer and alcohol taxes (69 percent) and increased state sales taxes (61 percent).

Alternate taxes most opposed are an increased single business tax (98 percent), increased state income tax (81 percent) and expanding the state sales tax to include services (76 percent).

The strong reaction to property taxes recognizes Michigan as having among the highest property taxes in America and the burden they place on business owners, says NFIB/Michigan Director Juanita Pierman.

Among other small-business concerns noted in the survey are

employee drug testing and rising health care costs.

For drug testing, 83 percent of respondents feel business owners should have the right to test job applicants for drug use. Most want the right to random test all employees (69 percent) and the right to test those whose job behavior created "reasonable suspicion" of drug impairment (83 percent).

Notwithstanding, 82 percent feel there is no current drug problem at their workplace.

Rising health care costs were felt by 82 percent of respondents the last two years. Of these, two thirds reported premium increases of 25 percent to 50 percent or more.

Despite high costs, nearly 70 percent of all small-business owners offer health care coverage to employees. But a projected 16,000 businesses have had to drop this coverage recently because of "excessive" premiums.

NFIB/Michigan is the state's largest small-business organization with 20,000 members. It uses this annual survey to identify top issues then set a member-directed legislative agenda for 1988.

## 'Unemployment insurance rates hurt business'

Two new studies point to Michigan unemployment insurance rates that are "excessive, hurt the state's business climate and need reform," according to the National Federation of Independent Business/Michigan.

A report by Laurdan Associates, Inc. finds Michigan ranking third highest in the nation with \$550 of an annual unemployment insurance taxes per person. "Michigan would have been second highest except for a dramatic increase by Washington State last year," said NFIB/Michigan Director Juanita Pierman.

Michigan is also far ahead of neighboring states, like Illinois (\$396 per person), Ohio (\$336) and Indiana (\$161). The national average is \$231 per person, according to the Laurdan report, which was commissioned by the Wall Street Journal.

Another study by the Upjohn Institute last month found Michigan first among 28 industrial states in unemployment insurance rates and

liberal benefits. It's 20 to 25 percent above the industrial-state average in major cost categories.

Comparisons in both studies will worsen this year with a substantial 1988 unemployment insurance increase just taken effect, Pierman said.

"High unemployment insurance charges raise the cost of doing business," she said. "They discourage job growth and encourage firms near the Ohio and Indiana borders to relocate."

They also spur the growth of employee leasing, which absolves companies of certain taxes. Unfortunately, Pierman said, these employees normally don't qualify for pensions, health insurance, paid vacations and other benefits.

Pierman said that small business suffers most from high unemployment insurance, paying a disproportionately greater share of its costs. Furthermore, it pays taxes on taxes, with the Single Business Tax paid on

unemployment insurance taxes.

To help resolve these problems, NFIB/Michigan supports legislative changes in the Omnibus Unemployment Insurance Reform Bill now before both houses in Lansing.

She called on legislators to reinstate the waiting week provision (the time before benefits begin).

Another reform is removal of the indexing provisions, which ties benefits to the rising Consumer Price Index.

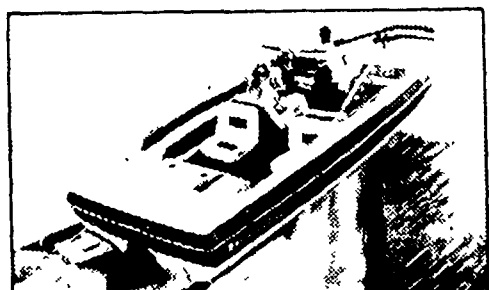
Small business also needs part-time and seasonal employee relief, having to pay taxes even though many of these employees don't qualify for benefits.

She also asked for repeal of the alternate qualifier clause, which lets some workers earn benefits faster than others.

"Reforms to unemployment compensation will certainly improve our business climate," Pierman said, "and contribute to stronger Michigan growth."

# HOT TIPS

You've checked into the hotel and the bellhop has deposited your bags in the room. You know a tip is expected, but you're not sure how much. You don't want to look cheap, but you don't want to be handing out all your spending cash in tips either. You decide to give him a \$5 bill. Did you give him enough? Did you give him too much?

It's your anniversary and you've decided to take your wife to a nice restaurant. You order a good bottle of wine, the wine steward brings it to the table and — after all the rituals of tasting and accepting it have been completed — prepares to leave. Are you required to tip him? You don't want to look cheap, but you don't want to be handing out all your spending cash either. You decide to give him a \$5 bill. Did you give him enough? Did you give him too much?

It's been a rotten day. You decide to have a drink before heading home and stop off at your favorite watering hole to knock one down and wash away the memories. You sit at the bar and have one drink. You know the bartender should get a tip, but what kind of tip is expected for one \$2 drink? You don't want to look cheap, but you don't want to be handing out all your spending cash either. You put a \$1 bill on the bar and leave. Did you give him enough? Did you give him too much?

Tipping. Who, what, why, when, where and how much?

An estimated 13.5 percent of the American work force is categorized as "service workers" — people who derive a significant portion of their income from the gratuities they receive for performing services.

You know it's proper to tip those people. But there's also something inside you which is a bit resentful, too. You recall reading somewhere about the fellow who makes \$45,000 a year waiting tables at a posh restaurant.

At the same time, many people are afflicted with an innate fear of appearing "cheap." You don't want the bellboys, valets, hat check girls and waitresses talking about you behind your back.

"Look out for Mr. Shallow Pockets in 503."

"The last of the big spenders just gave me a quarter for parking his car."

So what is appropriate in the way of tipping? Who gets tipped? And how much? In the interest of promoting *savoir faire* throughout the community, we conducted our own poll around the Novi/Northville area.

### THE WAITRESS

The general rule is that waitpersons receive somewhere between 10 and 20 percent of the bill depending on the quality of the service and the type of restaurant.

Gail Cotton, restaurant manager at the Sheraton Oaks, said the general policy at Anthony's is 15 percent, extending to 20 percent for excellent service.

"Of course we get some people who don't leave any tips at all," she reported.

Although 15 percent seems standard, the expected gratuity may be a bit higher at a restaurant like Chez Raphael's. Our waitpersons usually receive 15-20 percent because of the type of restaurant we are and the emphasis on outstanding service," said Chez Raphael's business manager, Kevin Aspinall.

### THE BELL BOY

When the bell hop carries your bags up to your hotel room, the appropriate gratuity runs from \$1 to \$5 depending on the amount of work involved.

"You usually get \$1 per bag for a light trip," said Shaun Saunders, who has worked as a bell hop at the Novi Hilton for two years. "If there's a lot of luggage and you have to use a cart to carry it all, we usually get \$1 but we like to see \$5."

The same scale holds true at the Sheraton Oaks. "For a couple of bags, it's usually \$1," said Mark Elker, office manager at the Sheraton Oaks and a former bellhop. "If a bell cart has to be used, it can be as high as \$10 for a load of 7-10 bags."

"If you're looking for a general rule it's this — 50 cents per bag or \$1 per person. It's usually \$1 in and \$1 out for light trips with a couple of bags."

### THE HAIR STYLIST

How much should you tip the person who cuts your hair?

"Fifty percent," laughed Joe Coshatt, a hair dresser at the Hair Affair in Northville. That, at any rate, would make him very happy.

But both Coshatt and Regina Lavagnino of Main Street Hair Design, also in Northville, agree that 10-15 percent of the bill is appropriate.

"It's appropriate to tip the person who cuts your hair, but it's not required," said Lavagnino. "If the stylist is pleasant and you're pleased with the hair cut, 10 to 15 percent is an appropriate tip."

The same amount is also appropriate for a manicure.

### THE CAB DRIVER

Ten to 15 percent is an appropriate tip for a taxi cab driver, according to the man who answered the phone at the ABC Cab Company, which serves both Novi and Northville.

"It depends on how much you appreciate the service," said the man who asked to be identified only as John, the Cab Driver.

"The tips are not what they used to be," he added. "Maybe people are a little tighter with their money than they used to be," he added.

The length of the drive doesn't make any difference because the proper gratuity is a percentage of the overall fare.

### THE VALET

One dollar is the appropriate tip for the person who parks your car, according to both Elker of the Sheraton Oaks and Gary Seibert, general manager of the Novi Hilton. "And you tip when the car's returned," said Seibert.

Elker suggested there may be occasions when you tip the valet a bit more. For example, you might want to give the valet a couple of dollars before he parks your car as an encouragement to find a good space and keep an extra eye on it.

Something more than a dollar also would be appropriate when there are unusually bad weather conditions, Elker suggested.

### THE MAITRE D'

Tipping the maitre d' is not a requirement, even though it's common, according to Aspinall at Chez Raphael's. "The amount of the tip depends on how much service he provides your party," said Aspinall.

Seibert agreed. "At some restaurants, there's tip pooling and the maitre d' gets a cut of that," he said.

Seibert said maitre d's generally do not get tipped unless they provide a special service. "If he holds a special table for you or gives you a table near a window with a good view, it would be appropriate to give him \$5," Seibert said.

### THE WINE STEWARD

Aspinall and Seibert also agree that it is not necessary to tip the wine steward. "A customer may tip him directly, but more often he gets an indirect tip from the server," said Aspinall.

"It's usually the server's responsibility to make certain the wine steward and the bus boys receive a gratuity for providing their customers with good service," he added.

Seibert said he often tips the wine steward 10 percent of the cost of the bottle of wine because he provides a specialized service. "But he has to be good," added Seibert. "If he doesn't know Liebfraumilch from Black Tower, then no. But if it's obvious that he knows how to present wine properly, then a tip is appropriate."

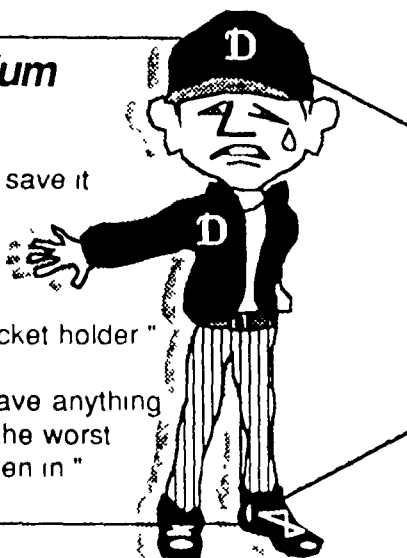

Exhibits include selections of furniture and accessories, paintings, jewelry, toys, clothing, glass and ceramics — all priced to a wide range of tastes and budgets.

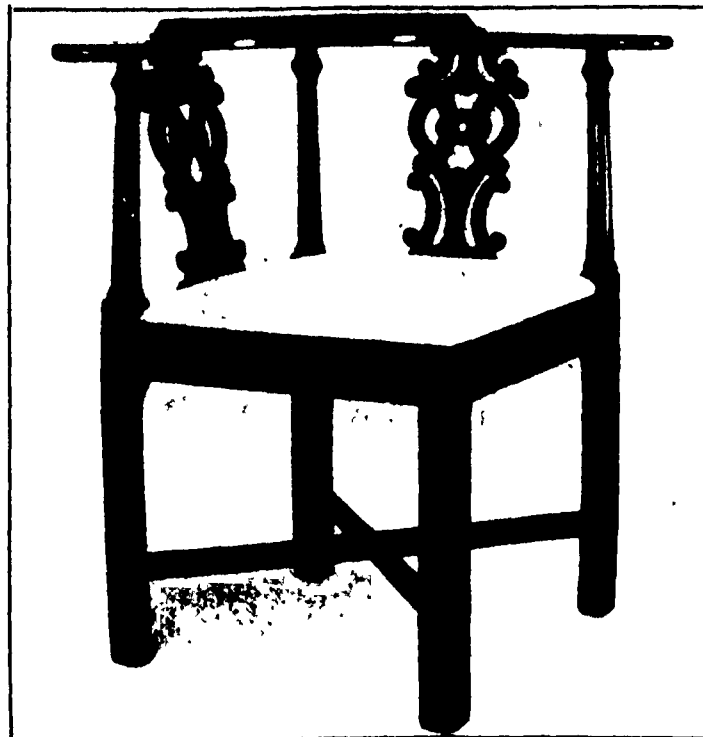
A Young Collectors Booth, presenting antiques priced for the

## Farm is just one of village's draws

Cars bearing Ohio, Illinois and Wisconsin license plates — as well as others from as far away as Texas — are parked at the entrance to Greenfield Village in Dearborn every spring weekend.

Local residents who haven't visited the village and Henry Ford Museum recently will find new attractions in the village as well as the much-publicized "Automobile in American Life" exhibit in the museum.

April and May are good months for Michiganders to enjoy the village before summer crowds arrive. Ideally, it's best not to combine tours of the 254-acre indoor, outdoor museum and village, but to savor the experiences of each separately.

For a day-long visit to the village, start at the village entrance building shortly after the 9 a.m. opening. Wear flat, comfortable shoes suitable for country walking along cobblestone or brick paths and dirt roads.

Save the first building inside the village, the Great American Emporium, for your return or you'll be carrying souvenirs throughout the day.

Instead, stroll east along the main road to the fence-enclosed walkway on the left which leads to the newest and largest-ever addition to the village, the Firestone farm. Decision to move the farmhouse, barn and furnishings to Greenfield Village from 200 miles away in Columbiana, Ohio, was made in 1983.

Raymond C. Firestone and Leonard K. Firestone, surviving sons of rubber pioneer Harvey S. Firestone, spearheaded the drive to move the buildings to the village founded by Henry Ford, a close friend of the senior Firestone.

Harold Skramstad, president of the museum and village, points out that the Firestone birthplace, restored to its condition of 1882, as a working farm has a major role in telling the story of America's transformation from a rural to an urban nation.

Now situated on seven acres in the village, the farm is comprised of the two-story brick house, a large Pennsylvania bank barn, outbuildings, a small orchard and fields for grazing and farming.

Adjacent to the farm is a cluster of buildings — the Martinsville cider mill, Tripp Up-and-Down Sawmill, Harahan Sugar Mill and manufacturing buildings where glass, pottery, printing and textile demonstrations are given.

Taking a fork to the right, visitors view the Henry Ford birthplace, modest farmhouse home of the auto industrialist. Nearby is the Miller School. In the next block is the

Wright brothers' home and cycle shop.

Sir John Bennett's store, where Gog and Magog regularly chime the time, now is a refreshment stop for cookies and coffee. But, if you're spending the day, don't spoil lunch at the Eagle Tavern, which opens at 11 a.m.

Costumed hostesses place visitors at the long, plank tables and request that diners "use the knife blade and not fingers to take salt."

The wine list ranges from claret and burgundy to hock, madeira, sherries and ports, tawny or ruby. "Cock-tails" include one made with Michigan corn whiskey as well as Jersey Lightning.

Temperance drinks include gunpowder or mint teas, hot cider, cherry, orange or strawberry drinks and coffee.

Entrees feature roast beef smothered with onions (\$7.25) baked chicken breast in celery sauce (\$7.75) and fried trout (\$7.95).

If a full meal seems too much at lunch, there are soup offerings, which on a recent Saturday included pea or Scotch barley broth at \$1.75 a bowl. Add a dessert like Apple Pan Dowdy at \$1.75, which will be accompanied by dried fruit and peanuts. It's easy to envision travelers stopping at the Eagle Tavern in the 1850s for food, drink and overnight stays.

Continuing east, at the crescent of the road is the Martha-Mary Chapel where village visitors are likely to catch a glimpse of a wedding party on weekends.

At the back of the village is the street of homes — a double wing, Ann Arbor House, the imposing Noah Webster House, Secretary Pearson House and the Cotswold Cottage buildings.

Here also are a Connecticut Saltbox House, Plympton House and the Susquehanna House.

Those who furnish their homes with antiques find the homes a "living library" of ideas for placing and using their treasures as well as ways to decorate and curtain rooms.

Before leaving the village, a stop at the Great American Emporium, a museum store, can yield mementos of the day's visit. The bookstore section stocks books on antiques and Americana.

It's possible to buy a variety of reproductions of Early Americana, including stencils. Most unusual are small brass stencils in kits complete with brush, paints and instructions.

Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum are open seven days a week from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is separate for each. Daily admission for either is \$9.50 for adults, \$4.75 for children 5-12, \$8.50 for seniors over 62. Children under 5 are free. Annual passes are \$20 for adults, \$10 for children. 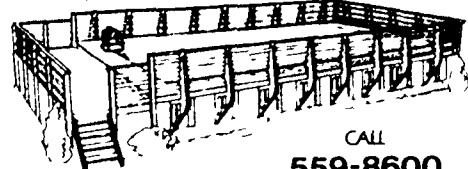

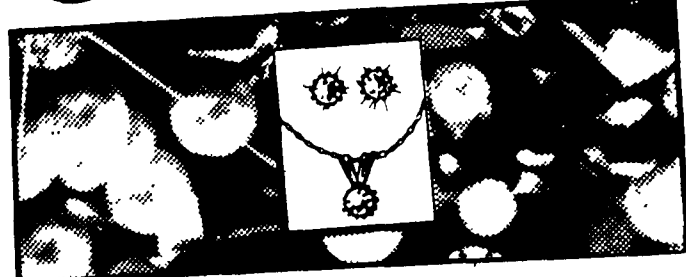

# Northville kickers stun top-ranked Canton

Northville soccer coach Stan Smalec is either a genius or a darn fine coach.

The latter is probably the correct choice. Smalec has his squad playing exactly the kind of soccer he mapped out before the season even got underway. The Mustangs have pulled together as a unit and are proving to all takers that a group of 11 players working in unison are a powerful weapon — just ask number-one ranked Plymouth Canton and the defending state champs from Plymouth Salem.

In action last week, Northville faced these two state powers and somehow, somehow managed to come out of those battles without a loss. The Mustangs fought Salem to a 1-1 tie on April 18, clobbered unmanned Walled Lake Central 9-0 two days later and then pulled off the coup of the young season by knocking off top-ranked Canton 1-0 last Friday.

"I can't begin to explain how great the kids played," Smalec said. "It was a super team effort. We were banged up a bit and a lot of people had little hurts but they came through and did an outstanding job. Everybody contributed."

The Canton-Northville clash was a wide-open, hard played game that

featured some outstanding defensive efforts on both sides. Mustang goaltender Kristi Turner turned in a stellar performance, kicking aside 16 shots on goal, 11 of which were considered outstanding. For the game, Northville outshot the Chiefs 21-16.

"The kids really pulled together," Smalec said. "It was a total team effort. We had a number of opportunities to put more goals in but (Canton's) goalie was outstanding too."

The lone goal of the game came at the 25 minute mark of the second half on a throw-in by Abby Edwards. Senior forward Jenny Stevens got to the pass in front of the net and then backheaded the ball between a Canton defender and the goalie for the score.

Smalec brought up sophomore Jenny Holland and along with starters Karen Cavanaugh and Heather Sixt, the Mustang defense was superb. In addition, freshman Marcie Dart had her best game of the season at center-halfback.

"Dart was all over the field and Holland, Cavanaugh and Sixt all did a great job on defense," Smalec pointed out. "Everybody I threw in there came on and filled their roles beautifully. It was great to see."

"Almost everybody in our league plays quality soccer so we have our work cut out for us. There will be a lot

of people gunning for us now."

**NORTHVILLE 1, PLYMOUTH SALEM 1.** Salem had a slight 14-11 advantage in shots but Northville hounded the highly regarded Rocks all over the field and held the team's explosive attack in check.

Salem's All-American Jill Estey failed to score and was held to just two shots by Cavanaugh, who marked her all game. The freshman basically shut down one of the country's premier scorers who tallied a whopping 35 goals a year ago.

"Everybody was really on and again, it was a total team effort,"

Smalec stated. "(Salem) can score from anyplace and anywhere and to hold them to one goal is a great accomplishment."

The Mustangs scored the first goal of the match at the 12:54 mark of the first half. Jodie Smalec took a pass from Loper, moved in on the left side and blasted a shot past the goaltender just inside the right post.

"It was a beautiful pass and Jodie smashed the shot," Smalec said.

The score remained 1-0 until the second half but Salem knotted the score with about 12 minutes left on a direct kick that bounced off a player's knee and then over Turner's head.

The final 12 minutes of the game were a frenzy of scoring chances for both teams, but neither could cash in. Smalec decided to give his exhausted defensive troops a rest so he moved Jenny Schuerman, Stevens and Smalec into defensive positions to help relieve the pressure for a five-minute span. Then the fresh players came back in with about five minutes remaining and Northville controlled the play until the game ended.

"It was a very evenly played game and the play was back and forth," Smalec said. "Kristi Turner made several point-blank saves — she was really on. We had a few defensive breakdowns but she rose to the occasion."

**NORTHVILLE 9, WALLED LAKE CENTRAL 0.** There was no real surprise on April 20 as the Mustangs scored eight goals in the first half against the Vikings and then went to a strict passing offense in the second half in order to keep the score down.

It was another great offensive day for Jodie Smalec who scored four times and added three assists in the blow-out. It was Smalec's second four-goal effort of the season.

"We played the entire team," Smalec said. "I thought Jenny Dragon did an excellent job at halfback along with Beth Swayne."

Heidi Wagner scored the first two goals of the game in the first two minutes of play. Both goals were assisted by Shannon Loper and Dart. Smalec then scored the next three at the five, seven and 18 minute marks. The first came on an assist from Dart, the second from Wagner and the third from Edwards.

Cavanaugh made it 6-0 at the 25 minute mark from Smalec and Stevens scored five minutes later on several nice passes from Edwards and Smalec. The final goal of the first half came from Smalec with five minutes left and it was unassisted.

Ten minutes into the second half, Amy Goode wrapped up the scoring by finishing off a nice passing play along with Edwards and Smalec. For the game, Northville had a 33-1 shots on goal advantage.

"Everybody got a chance to play so that was good but we picked up a couple more bumps and bruises so that didn't help," Smalec admitted.

Heather Sixt started as the goalie and turned back the only shot she faced. She was in goal because Turner pulled a muscle in her back against Salem two days prior.

Northville put on an exhibition of solid softball — nothing spectacular — en route to the successful week, and an added bonus was that all four of the wins came against conference opponents. The Mustangs downed Farmington 13-4 on April 18, destroyed Livonia Churchill 30-0 two days later, nipped Plymouth Canton 4-2 on April 22 and then grabbed the biggest prize of all — a 6-4 triumph over nemesis Livonia Franklin last Monday.

Even though Gerlach has been stressing the importance of every game to his players, the win over Franklin was extra special because the Patriots are without a doubt the team to beat in the Western Division. If the Mustangs are to win the title — which has been their goal from day one — beating Franklin is a must and Northville hadn't been able to do it in many years.

"They are the team we have to beat," Gerlach admitted.

With three walks to start the game, the Mustangs loaded the bases in a hurry without the aid of a hit, but then outfielder Kerri Bulin delivered a two-run single to pull the locals in front. Franklin added a run in the bottom of the inning to make it 2-1 and it stayed that way until Northville added a single run in the fourth.

Two innings later, following a walk and a hit by Bulin, Jenny Juhasz drove in a run with a hit and then two more runs crossed the plate thanks to several wild pitches, to make it 6-1. The Pats came back in the seventh and tagged starter Amy Freimund with three runs on four hits but it wasn't enough.

"(Franklin) earned all of those runs in the seventh," Gerlach admitted.

They ripped Amy but we held on.

"Right now, we're proud as a peacock but the nice thing about it is that the girls aren't acting cocky. They know we have some more work to do and they are only looking ahead to the next game. We take them one at a time."

Freimund went the distance, gave up eight hits, four earned runs and four walks but struck out seven and earned the win.

The Falcons finally got to Freimund with two runs in the bottom of the third but Northville came back with two more in the fourth.

Farmington cut it to 9-4 with a couple more in the fifth but the Mustangs won it going away after scoring four times in the seventh.

"All of our runs came on base hits and running once we got on base," Gerlach explained. "It was nothing spectacular, just solid softball. We took what they gave us."

Freimund surrendered six hits but struck out nine and walked just three. Leslie Wendel was the hitting star, going 3-for-5 with four RBIs.

**NORTHVILLE 30, LIVONIA CHURCHILL 0:** The Mustangs exploded for 30 runs in what amounted to three innings of play against the undermanned Chargers. After a scoreless first inning, the Northville bats went crazy and the mercy rule was invoked after Churchill's turn in the fifth.

"Needless to say we had a good day," Gerlach said. "(Churchill) is still learning and our kids played hard and took advantage of the situation. I played everybody."

Kristi Fortenberry and Cory Kincer each smacked home runs in the game while Freimund lead the team with four hits and three runs scored and surrendered just one hit and fanned nine on the mound. Nancy

Dutkiewicz chipped in with three hits and three runs scored.

"It only took us three innings to score 30 because we didn't score in the first and we didn't bat in the fifth," Gerlach pointed out. "Our scoreboard looked like a checkerboard."

**NORTHVILLE 4, PLYMOUTH CANTON 2:** In what most viewers called a great softball game, the Mustangs pulled out a clutch victory

in extra innings.

"It was a great game," Gerlach said.

Jeanine LaPrad opened the first inning with a triple and then scored on an overthrow to give Northville the lead but Canton slipped ahead in the third with two runs on just one hit and two walks.

Northville didn't get a hit in the fourth but still managed to tie it thanks to a pair of walks, a stolen base and a wild pitch. The Chiefs

threatened in the sixth with runners at second and third and no out but somehow the Mustangs got out of it without giving up a run.

"That was probably the key inning of the game," Gerlach said. "We were in some serious trouble and to get out of it gave us even more confidence."

In the eighth, Northville won it on an RBI hit by Kincer and a sacrifice fly by Freimund. In the bottom of the

inning Freimund sent Canton down without a hit to preserve the win. For the game, she struck out seven, walked four and surrendered only four hits and two runs.

"She's dominating teams right now," Gerlach said.

The Mustangs season record is now 5-3 overall, 3-0 in the WLAA Western Division.

## Mustang nine win 3 as bats come alive

Nigro went seven innings, gave up six hits and three earned runs and notched the victory. The big hitters for the game included Osborne (2-for-3, three RBIs), Brian Frelick (2-for-3) and Skynar (1-for-1, two RBIs).

"Nigro pitched a fine ball game," Frelick said. "He got into a little trouble in the fourth but he came back and shut them down after that."

Against Churchill, Northville took command early with three runs in the first on only two hits. Skynar and Jones delivered the hits but the Mustangs benefited from three base on balls. David Strange led off the second with a solo home run to make it 4-0 but Churchill narrowed the lead with two runs in the bottom of the inning without the aid of a hit.

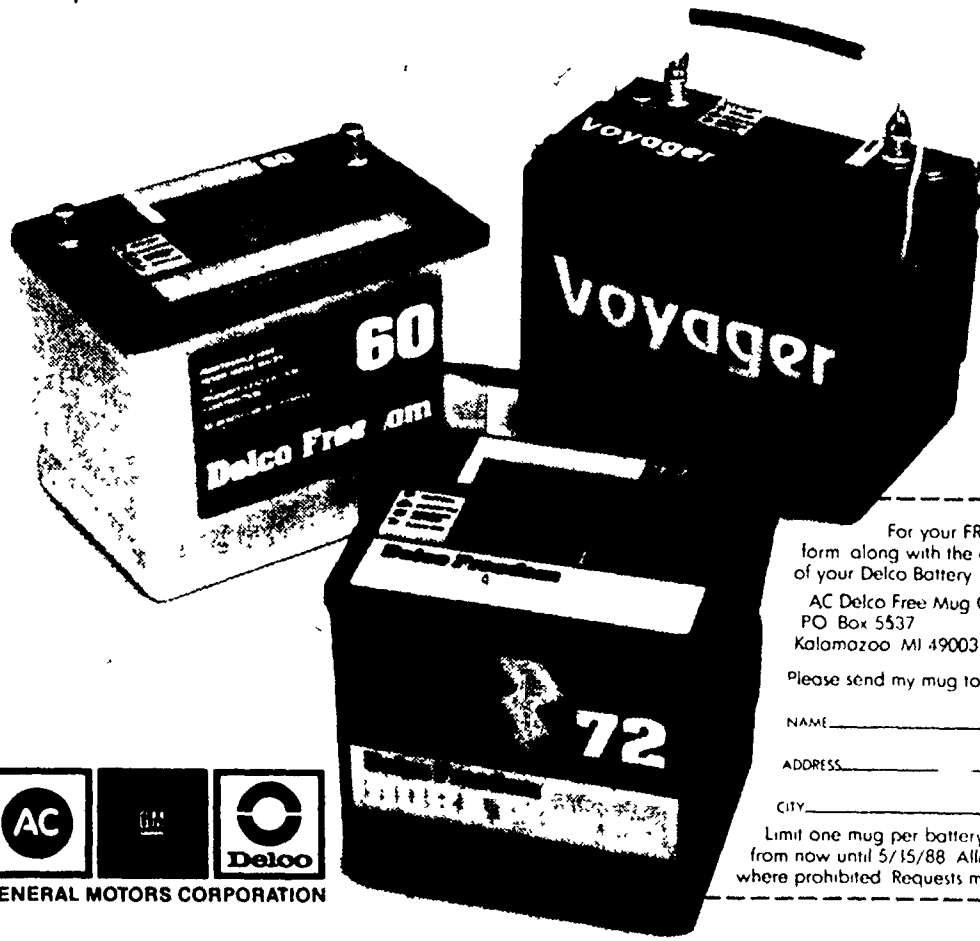

# Trackers give Novi a battle, fall 70-67

There is no denying that the boy's track programs at Novi and Northville are on the rise. So when the two neighboring schools hooked up on the track April 21, everyone was expecting an interesting meet and that's exactly what happened.

A year ago the Wildcats buried the Mustangs by a bunch, but this time around it was much closer. Novi ended up winning the meet 70-67 but it was Northville that received a heap of praise — especially from Wildcat coach Bob Smith.

"They were a pesky team," he said. "We had a good line-up in there and they were tough. Northville was a lot stronger than I thought they'd be — they are a solid team."

For Mustang Coach Dennis Faletti, it was the second close defeat in two

weeks but it was also another encouraging performance by the team. Understandably, he had mixed emotions.

"I was happy with the way things went — except we lost," he said. "We are continuing to improve but it's more than a little disappointing to lose two dual meets in a week by a total of six points."

"Last year (Novi) beat us by 51 so we definitely narrowed the gap."

Northville took first place honors in three of the four relay events, dominated the distance runs thanks to John Frisbie and held its own in the field events, but it still wasn't enough to overtake the 'Cats — who are undefeated and off to their best start in years.

Frisbie helped the cause with a

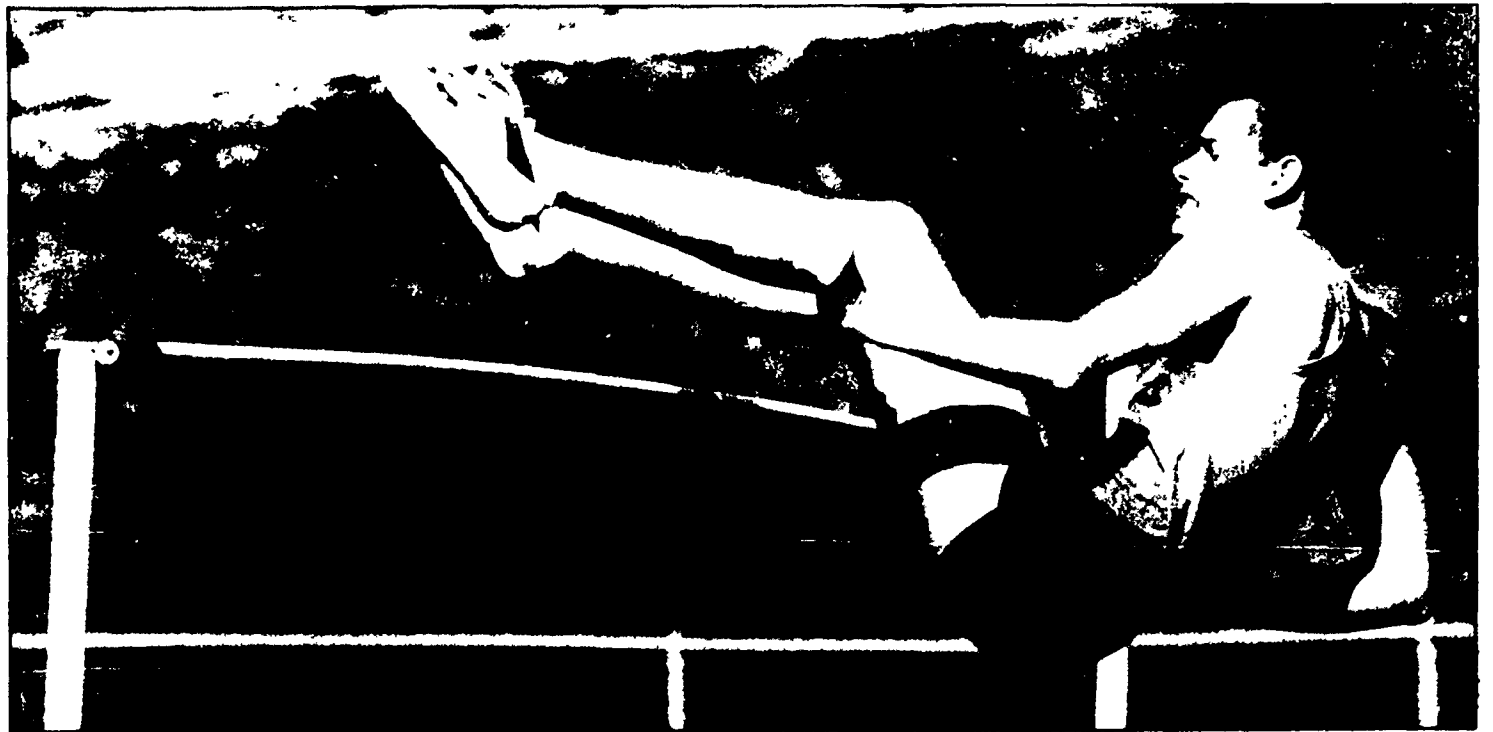
pair of wins in the 1,600 (4:43.4) and 3,200-meter (10:23.87) runs and was also a member of the winning 3,200-meter relay team along with Jay Griffith, Jeff Hoose and Scott Sinkwitts. The other teams to grab first-place honors were the 400 relay (46.7), with Mark Kiraly, Todd Daniels, Todd Feliks and Rich Subotich, and the 1,600 relay (3:40.9), featuring Steve Austin, Al Kuljurgis, Sinkwitts and Subotich.

The only other Northville firsts came from Feliks in the 110-meter high hurdles (16.7) and John Hacker in the high jump (5'-8"). Chris Kuffner had a good day in the field events and paced the second place finishers with runner-up efforts in the shot put (36'-6") and the discus (118'-7"). The rest of the seconds included Feliks

in the 300 intermediate hurdles (42.7), Kiraly in the 100 (11.8) and 200-meter (23.7) dashes, Austin in the long jump (18'-11½") and the 400 (54.9), Sinkwitts in the 800 (2:06.7) and a second place tie in the high jump between Jeff Cross and Kuljurgis (both went 5'-8").

Derek Forbing in the shot put (36'-6") and Eric Billmorla in the discus (107'-0") each added third place finishes for the Mustangs.

"It was pretty close the whole way," Faletti said. "If we could have went 1-2 instead of 1-4 in the two-mile we'd have won the meet, but you could probably say that about any of the events. We won the final relay race to narrow it to three, but it wasn't enough."

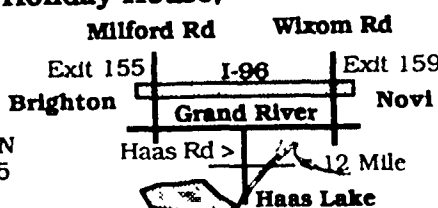

## Golf: on the right course to fitness

There is little doubt in the minds of those people that live with an avid golfer that the sport is an addiction.

Anyone who has watched a person who normally grumbles about getting up early each work day, eagerly set the alarm for 5:30 a.m. on a Saturday to get the 7:30 early tee-off, knows that this is not a passing fancy. This is serious. This is golf.

But in an age where games are played not only for enjoyment, but also for the healthful benefits of exercise, the question remains — is golf good for you?

While therapists and doctors tout the benefits of exercise programs in lowering stress levels and in aiding cardiovascular systems, the sport of golf is seldom seen on the list of recommended programs.

While it is true that golf may not give a player an aerobic work-out (although players who have missed two-foot putts may disagree), most long-time players will talk for hours about the beauty of a golf course early in the morning and the work-out they received by walking up and down the hills for four hours or so during their 18-hole round of golf.

The truth of the matter may be that golf is a form of exercise — in the same sense that a walk of approximately 4 or 5 miles is a form of exercise, for that's about what the average golfer will roam during 18 holes.

"Golf is good exercise — as long as you walk and don't ride," Joe Tank, the golf pro at Westbrook Golf Course in Novi said, referring to the golf carts which are very popular with some duffers.

Most golf courses have more than a few hills to make the courses interesting — and tougher — for the golfers, and those same hills can add an element of exercise to the game. Add the weight of a full golf bag, either carried or pulled, and the

average golfer may feel the stress in arms and legs after the game is over.

Bob Silagyi of Brooklane Golf Course in Northville said the game of golf is "definitely" exercise both in the walking and in the swinging. And both Silagyi and Tank said that the game can have a decidedly positive impact on those looking for a way to reduce stress.

"I don't care how much they complain about their golf game," Silagyi said, "it's relaxation." He said he has been golfing for "about 50 years" and that the game has been good for him.

While golfers who have watched so-called perfect drives slice toward the

trees, or chip shots that landed in the water or the sand, may disagree — overall both experts believed that the game of golf is relaxing.

"It's not stressful," Tank said, "it might be mentally stressful somewhat, but physically it's not. And it's not really stressful unless you're really serious about the game."

First time golfers and those who hit the links after a long winter's layoff will normally experience some stiffness and soreness, both from swinging the clubs and from the walking.

Most pros agree that easing into

the game by some pre-season stretching and a few visits to the driving range can help to avoid any muscle aches or pulls. And the exercise and warm-up also help with the golfer's game.

Golf professionals also stress that golfers who have suffered any heart disease or other ailments should check with their doctors before attempting the long walk associated with a full round of golf. While those wishing for a little healthy exercise are encouraged to walk — others may find a golf cart is the best way around the course.

## Fitness Tips

## Education is key to detecting breast cancer

Breast disease is a concern for many women. Although most breast disease involves benign conditions, breast cancer continues to be a leading cause of death in females. Because of this, it is important to learn as much as possible about breast disease.

The breasts undergo many changes as we age. The adult breast is composed of approximately 16-20 lobes. Within each lobe there is a branching system of ducts surrounded by fatty connective tissue. These structures respond to hormones produced with the menstrual cycle, pregnancy and menopause. Not every lobe within each breast responds in the same way to our hormones. This can cause irregularities or lumps in the breast. In addition, each lobe is not necessarily the same size, so it is common for one breast to be larger than the other.

Irregularities in the breasts are most prominent right before menses. This is in response to the hormones, estrogen and progesterone. The breasts tend to become more full and nodular. Because of these hormonal changes, it is best to exam the breast after your menses. The importance of monthly self-exams cannot be underestimated.

Menopause with the declining

levels of estrogen and progesterone is associated with breast involution. These changes first occur peripherally and then in the central regions of the breast.

As mentioned, most breast conditions are the result of benign disease. The most common benign disease involves fibrocystic changes. These changes usually occur in women between the ages of 25-50 years. They are most pronounced before menses and can cause a significant amount of discomfort. Dietary changes such as removing tea, coffee, cola drinks, chocolates and other foods with methylxanthines can help improve this discomfort.

If an abnormality persists through a menstrual cycle, it is important that it be evaluated. Four common methods of evaluation are mammography, ultrasound, thermography, and biopsy.

Mammography has been shown to be a very effective means of detecting changes in the breast. This method uses a very minimal amount of radiation and is an important adjunct to the breast exam. It can also detect malignant changes which are not yet palpable, but it cannot replace the physical exam. Additional evaluations, such as a biopsy, may be needed.

At the present time the general

recommendations for mammography are: 1) baseline mammography between the ages of 35-40; 2) mammography every two years between the ages of 40-50; 3) yearly mammography after the age of 50.

Ultrasound, which involves sound waves, is another useful form of evaluation. This may be more helpful in younger females who have dense breasts with fibrocystic changes.

Thermography is a diagnostic procedure which operates on the premise that tumors give off more heat than normal tissue. This method does not have a high rate of accuracy and, therefore, is not a normal screening test for breast cancer.

Biopsy is the only accurate way to determine the exact nature of the lesion. An excisional biopsy involves removal of the lump and is generally done in a hospital or outpatient surgical clinic. A second form of biopsy involves needle aspiration. This involves numbing the area with local anesthesia and aspirating the lump with a needle. In both instances the fluid or tissue is sent to a pathologist for examination.

Of course, a woman's greatest concern with the identification of a breast lump is breast cancer. This will occur in one of every eleven women, and is a significant cause of female mortality. The most important factor in curing breast cancer is

early detection. Self-breast exams and mammography cannot be emphasized enough in attaining this goal. It is important for a woman who locates a breast lump to seek medical attention. By all means, don't ignore it!

The things that put you at risk for breast cancer include a first degree relative with breast cancer, age of 50 years or greater, first child after the age of 35, no children and a previous history of breast cancer.

In order to increase your knowledge about breast disease the University of Michigan M-CARE Health Center in Northville will be sponsoring two lecture series. The first one will be held on May 10 and will focus on benign breast disease. The second lecture will be held on May 17 and will focus on reconstructive surgery and self-image after mastectomy.

Please call the health center for further information at 344-1777. A step-by-step guide to self-breast exam is also available.

## PREVENTING SPORTS INJURIES

No one would think of playing tackle football without wearing shoulder pads and a helmet. Yet far too many youngsters play contact sports, without wearing protection for their mouths. This results in all too many cases of split lips, broken chipped and knocked out teeth. For example, fifty two percent of all football injuries occur in unprotected faces and mouths.

The best way to prevent all this mouth damage is to wear a mouth protector. Bars across football helmets don't do the same job. They don't protect the teeth and jaws from an upward blow on the chin, only from a blow straight against the face. Dental injuries to football players wearing proper mouth protectors have been almost completely eliminated.

Most old style mouthguards such as those we see boxers using are not very easy to wear because they are bulky. Talking is just about impossible. Many players prefer to talk and be comfortable and risk the chance of injury rather than wear one. However, a modern mouth guard made to an accurate model of a boy's mouth doesn't interfere with mouth breathing, stays in place when the mouth is opened, allows clear speech and is comfortable.
