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## Cancelled No fireworks this year

There will be no official Northville fireworks display this Fourth of July, thanks to the recent dry weather and cancellations of other nearby displays.

The annual Independence Day fireworks celebration sponsored by the Northville Jaycees was cancelled Tuesday, although the rest of the day's activities are still planned (see related story). The Jaycees may still sponsor a display in the future, although not for a while.

The city will not sanction fireworks "until we get enough steady rain to make it safe," Mayor Chris Johnson said Monday.

"It's going to take some real concentrated rainfall to get over this," City Manager Steve Walters said.

Johnson, Walters and Fire Chief Jim Allen together decided Tuesday to cancel the display.

Jaycee Teresa Folino said the group will consider sponsoring a fireworks display in the future, but nothing has been decided yet.

"It's something that can be considered at a later date. At this point, we can't say anything for sure," Folino said.

Walters said — considering the fireworks cancellations in nearby communities — crowd control would be an even bigger problem than weather if Northville went ahead with its display. The community would draw more spectators than it could handle, he said.

"It's hard enough as it is with the crowds that we have," Walters said. "It would be completely out of control if we had (the display)."

"The risk just seems to be beyond what we can do," Walters concluded.

## Union to fight Ford plant close

The president of the employees' union at the Northville Ford Plant said Tuesday he will oppose the company's plan to close the plant, in spite of Ford's position that the decision is final.

Norm Fultz, president and bargaining chair of United Auto Workers Local 986, said profitability and a contract clause on plant closings are two strong reasons to keep the plant operating. However, company spokesperson Judith Muhlborg said the company does not compare profits between plants. And before Fultz approaches the company over the contract provision issue, he first wants to convince the International UAW that it applies.

"It's not over 'til it's over. That's what they say, isn't it?" Fultz said Tuesday.

The company announced June 17 that the plant — which assembles steel fuel tanks — will close by the end of the year, with fuel tank production being consolidated at the Dearborn Engine Plant. Company officials have said the move is necessary because of a shift to plastic fuel tanks. The company has offered Dearborn jobs to all 42 hourly workers at the Northville plant.

But Fultz said the Northville workers don't want to leave. "They love it here," he said. The plant's system of Quality Technicians — in which the workers switch tasks every two hours, at breaks and lunchtime — combined with the surroundings, make the Northville plant a great place to work, he explained.

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## New Main-Center plan unveiled

A new developer presented a new proposal for a building on the southwest corner of Main and Center streets Tuesday, and this time the plan calls for one floor of stores, a restaurant and three floors of apartments.

The Singh Development Company unveiled its plans for the corner at a meeting of the Downtown Development Authority. Singh recently pur-

chased the site from Equity Advance, which had prosed a retail / office development that never materialized.

The Singh plan covers the entire former Northville Lanes site from Main to Cady along Center, wrapping around the back of the building which houses Perrins Sport Gifts and T-shirts.

"We are a little bit concerned with the plan that was presented to you previously," Singh Vice President

Michael Kahm said at the meeting. The new plan includes about half the amount of retail space as the former, and includes apartments instead of offices.

The plan proposes an all-brick building with a slate roof including a series of arches and gables.

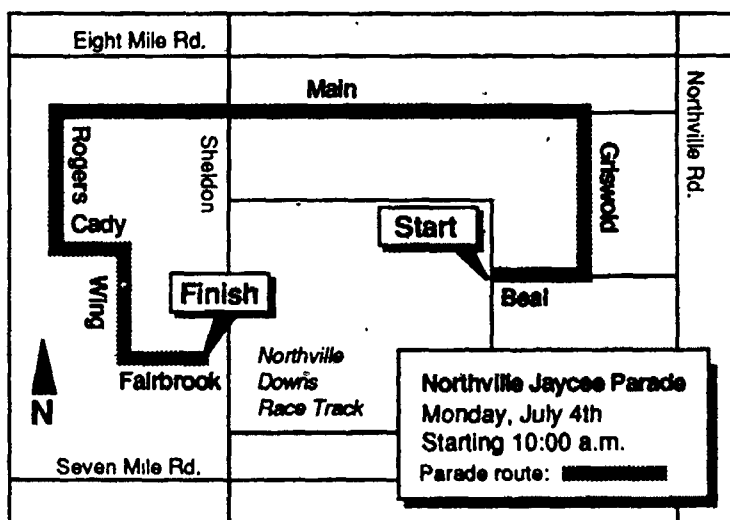
Architect Al Tuomaala explained that the bottom level will include a restaurant of 4,100 square feet facing Cady Street and 14,300 square feet of retail space facing a colonnade along

Center. Because of the Center Street hill, the north end of the first level will be completely underground and could be accessed from the level above, Tuomaala said.

The upper three levels will be all apartments except for retail space along the Main Street frontage of the second level, Tuomaala said.

The three upper levels will be arranged around a roof garden. "The

## Folino, parade to lead celebration

Grand Marshall Paul Folino will lead the Northville Fourth of July Parade Monday through the streets of downtown in one highlight of a day planned to be filled with activity.

Although the celebration won't be capped off with the traditional community fireworks display, Independence Day in Northville will still offer the rest of the local traditions.

The holiday weekend kicks off with the usual Friday night concert in the bandshell downtown.

Beginning at 7:30 p.m. Friday, the Gazebo Band will present music from the early 1900s to the present. Marches, Dixieland, big band and patriotic tunes will be performed by musicians from Northville, Novi and surrounding areas.

The actual Fourth of July activities will begin at 6:30 a.m. Monday, July 4, with the annual breakfast at the Northville Masonic Temple, 106 E. Main Street. The Masons plan to offer an expanded menu with serving continuing until parade time, 10 a.m.

The menu will feature "all you can eat" pancakes, scrambled eggs, ham, hash browns, orange juice, coffee, tea or milk. The breakfast costs \$3.25 per adult and \$1.25 for children through age 12.

Pre-parade activities continue with the Northville Community Recreation Department's fourth annual "Satin Sheets" bed race through the business district. Adult teams are welcome to enter and compete for the prizes of fastest time and best decorated bed.

Entry fees are \$25 for new teams or \$15 for returning teams that still have

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## City maintenance rules move forward

Using a Northville Township ordinance as its base, City of Northville officials are quickly moving toward adoption of new requirements for maintaining property.

City Manager Steve Walters introduced a first draft of a property maintenance ordinance at a City Council meeting last week, and council members' initial reactions were positive.

"I like the ordinance, I like the intent of it, and I think it will be a good ordinance once we have it set up," Council Member Paul Folino said.

"I think this will give us a leverage we haven't had before," Council Member John Buckland agreed.

The draft presented to the council last week did not include provisions for an appeal procedure or for penalties for violations. However, the council informally agreed that violations of the ordinance should be subject to the usual city maximum penalty of a \$500 fine and / or 90 days in jail.

Under the proposed draft the city building official would be responsible for enforcing the ordinance.

In addition, a memo from City Manager Steve Walters suggested the city should also consider related ordinances requiring inspection and the issuance of occupancy permits when a building changes owner or occupant; and requiring licensing of rental units.

Those changes would probably require more city staff, Walters said, but the permit and inspection fees could cover the extra cost.

The council has not taken any formal action on the ordinance yet, and plans to ask for input from the city Planning Commission and Board of Zoning Appeals. Walters prepared the draft using a recently adopted Northville Township ordinance as a base, then adding other provisions, he said.

The draft of the ordinance would require maintenance of property in a "workmanlike manner," which the draft defines as "carrying out such activities as construction, maintenance and repair with a reasonable degree of skill and

knowledge; i.e., the person which a reasonably prudent person would expect or require from a person who was hired to perform such activities."

Specific provisions in the draft would include:

- Property must be kept free of accumulated rubbish or garbage.

- Areas not occupied by a structure or pavement must be landscaped and maintained.

- Furniture, toys and recreation equipment cannot be kept in the front yard unless being used.

- Dog pens and runs cannot be in front yards, must be 10 feet from adjoining property or blocked by an

## Pay detailed for members of the Wayne County commission

No one disputes that Wayne County is in tough times — after all, it needed a bailout from Lansing and can't afford to keep all its felons in jail. So, it might seem as if some of its part-time help is overpaid at \$26,426 a year.

The part-timers who make that kind of money — and who will make \$29,750 a year in 1989 — are 14 county commissioners. The 15th commissioner, Arthur Carter, makes an extra \$6,000 a year for heading the legislative body. Commissioners also receive medical benefits.

Commissioners are required to attend meetings twice a month and most are members of at least three committees with varying meeting schedules.

The commissioners, however, say they are not overpaid for their elected, two-year terms, that the job is part time in name only and full time in reality.

**THE BUDGET** for the commission is nearly \$3.6 million for 1988, which includes individual office budgets of about \$66,000 a year to cover staff assistants, travel expenses, printing cost and miscellaneous needs.

In comparison, the 27 commissioners in Oakland County make a base salary of \$17,191 a year with the

chairperson at \$18,719. There is no office allowance.

The 25 Macomb commissioners make \$14,453 a year with a \$35 per diem meeting allowance that has a cap of \$3,000 a year, and the chairperson makes \$24,117 with an unlimited per diem. There is no office allowance.

**SUSAN HEINTZ**, Wayne County's sole Republican commissioner, defends the pay rate, as well as the \$34,000 salary she pays her chief aide, former state representative Robert Law.

Heintz, in the second year of her first term, is on the ways and means committee, the committee on roads, airports and public services and is chairwoman of the economic development committee.

She represents the 10th District, which includes the cities of Livonia, Plymouth and Northville and the townships of Plymouth and Northville.

"I represent one of the fastest growing districts; there's lots of involvement with the county on issues like sewage connection (and) utilities," said Heintz, who describes herself as a workaholic. She said she works 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekdays, plus some night work.

"It can't be a part-time job —

there's too much work. I'm on three committees, they're all important. I spend lots of time in the district. I usually spend three weeknights out of five working, and there is usually a weekend function to attend. We have to be held accountable."

Heintz maintains an office in Plymouth, where she does most of her work "because constituents prefer coming here over going downtown." The office is funded by campaign contributions, not tax dollars, she stressed. It is in the same building where Law practices law.

Her other full-time aide, Dolores Newell, a former Westland city council member, is paid \$14,700 annually.

"Some (commissioners) hire one aid for up to \$40,000 and others hire several, including college students," said Carter. "You can have one aide or 10, depending on how you want to break it down."

"He (Law) used to be Gov. Milliken's chief legislative aide," said Heintz. "He serves as a liaison between myself and state officials. He spent a tremendous amount of time on the Wayne County solvency plan. I feel fortunate to have such a

reputable staff. He is probably worth three times more than I am. He is an attorney with a tremendous amount of government experience. I couldn't pay him enough."

**MILTON MACK** represents nine communities in the 11th District, including Canton Township. He has one aide and shares a secretary with commissioner William O'Neill of the 14th District. He publishes an annual directory out of his office budget.

"I guess I've spent about \$50,000 of the allotment," he said in a telephone interview from Washington, D.C., where he recently attended a conference as a representative of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG).

Mack is an attorney with what he described as a "flexible practice." He said he spends between 40 and 50 hours a week on county commission work, including meetings with city councils and township boards and visits with constituents.

He is chairman of the Solid Waste Implementation Commission, which is writing the solid waste policy for the county; vice chairman of the

special task force on drains; and a member of the audit and economic development committees.

His aide is Jerry Higgs, a retired Wayne County Road Commission employee whose duties include checking complaints about roads and ditches and attending meetings Mack can't make.

"With nine communities and 200 square miles to cover, he's really a valuable resource," said Mack. "If you're going to be effective, you can't do it alone. My feeling is based on the reaction I've received — (constituents) are happy with the way my office is set up."

**KAY BEARD**, who represents the 12th District, which includes Garden City and Westland, also said she considers the job of commissioner as full time.

"You're expected to be involved in lots of things outside of commission work," she said.

Beard is chairwoman of the committee that deals with the owners of the newly renovated old County Building, which is leased to the county, vice chair of the audit committee

and a member of the special enhanced 911 and human services committees. She is also active with the National Association of Counties and the Michigan Association of Counties.

Her staff aide is David Keith, son of state Rep. William Keith, D-Garden City.

**RIHARD MANNING** is in his ninth term representing the 9th District, which includes Redford Township. An attorney with a practice in Redford, he said he is busiest on commission work during budget time, from August through December, when he said meetings are called daily.

"The balance of the year it consumes 2 1/2 to three days formally, informally. It's many nights with citizen groups. The lifeblood of politics is finding out what people want," he said.

Manning is vice chairman of the health and human services committee and a member of the public safety and judiciary committees. He has a secretary, an aide, Clem Bykowski, and two part-time staffers who work about eight hours a month attending meetings, working on constituent complaints and doing research.

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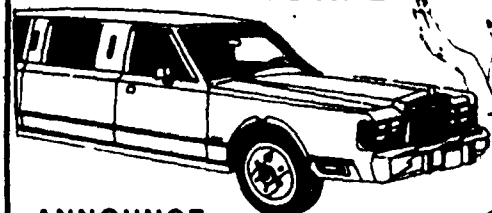
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## NEWS BRIEFS

**TAXPAYER CONVENIENCE** — That's the idea behind a new City of Northville interest-earning checking account at the Community Federal Credit Union.

The account, which the City Council approved Monday, June 20, will let taxpayers deposit tax payments directly into the account without going to City Hall to pay.

The arrangement is similar to an account already in place at Manufacturers Bank, City Manager Steve Walters said. Heritage Federal Savings also accepts city tax payments, but simply transmits the payments to the city in a lump sum check without an account, he said.

"We'll see after one tax season how it works," Finance Director Beverly Morrison said of the credit union account.

**HALF-LOT SOLD** — A Northville couple bought a chunk of land from the city for \$800.

The couple submitted the only bid for the land, which is adjacent to their lot. The land on its own is too small to build on, under Northville regulations.

The City Council approved the bid unanimously Monday, June 20.

**NORTHVILLE COLTS ALUMNI** — are being sought by the Junior Football League. Alumni of the popular team, both players and cheerleaders, are being asked to participate in this year's Fourth of July Parade through downtown Northville. **PLAN DELAYED** — A proposal for multiple-family dwelling units off Taft and Eight Mile was deferred by the city Planning Commission recently at the request of the applicant.

Metti W. Metti has been appearing before the commission to try for approval of the plan, and has objected to the length of time taken to consider different versions of his plan. He was scheduled on the agenda at last Tuesday's meeting, but requested to have the plan considered at a later date instead.

**POLICE COOL OFF** — Two air conditioning units were approved for the police department by the Northville Township Board at a special meeting Thursday, June 23.

First, the board approved a Bryant brand air conditioning unit for the 911 equipment room at a cost of \$3,082.40. The low bid was submitted by Comfort Zone, and the system is scheduled to begin on or before August 1, 1988.

Next, the board approved a Bryant brand air conditioning unit for the police department at a cost of \$6,246. The low bid was again submitted by Comfort Zone.

**STOP SIGN CONSIDERED** — A request from the Bealtown Residents Association to replace a yield sign on Johnson at Yerkes to a stop sign was not recommended by the city Police Department, but the City Council has asked the police to take another look.

A police recommendation stated that the yield sign is working properly, but council members Monday, June 20 suggested a stop sign might provide better speed control.

"I think, with all the children in the neighborhood, we could easily justify a stop sign," Council Member John Buckland said. The council asked the Police Department to reconsider the request with speed control in mind.

## Prison officials answer crowding

Officials from the three western Wayne county prisons are blaming overcrowding in their jails last April and May on increases in the populations of Wayne County jails.

At a community liaison committee meeting Thursday, June 23, Warden Emmet Baylor, of the Phoenix Corrections facility, said the overcrowding of Scott Regional, Western Wayne and Phoenix Correction, the three western Wayne prisons, was part of a state order to help remove people from the county jails.

The Michigan Department of Corrections had requested Judge Charles Farmer amend an earlier order prohibiting the department from placing more than 528 inmates at Scott Regional Facility, more than 311 at Phoenix Correctional Facility, and more than 500 prisoners at Western Wayne Correctional Facility.

On May 12, the Department of Corrections informed the township that it planned to move an additional 149

prisoners into Scott, an additional 82 prisoners into Western Wayne, and an additional 50 prisoners into Phoenix.

"We began to experience an insurmountable situation (in the jails), and the Wayne County sheriff threatened to run folks out of jail," said Phoenix Deputy Warden William Overton. "The view of the department is to expand the prisons rather than let the individuals back onto the street."

However, on May 18, Farmer ordered the department not to send any additional prisoners to the three western Wayne prisons, and to reduce the prisons' population to the state mandatory caps by June 5, which they did.

Baylor said during the overcrowding period of April 8 - May 31, he called Northville Township officials to alert them of the overcrowding situation. "We did not try to keep any information from anybody."

Northville Township Attorney Ernest Essad said prison over-

crowding is a problem facing the entire State of Michigan, and the increased population of the Wayne County jails is not the only reason why the western Wayne prisons were overcrowded.

"This (prison overcrowding) is an entire system wide issue that goes back to 1977 when the Michigan prison system began to first experience overcrowding," Essad said.

He added that since prison overcrowding is now a state-wide problem, the only reason why the three western Wayne prisons are not overcrowded is because the Township obtained a court order keeping them at their legal limit.

Essad said the problem stems from the county being unable to house state prisoners, and the state not hav-

ing any room for them either.

He noted the county used to hold state prisoners, but had to stop the practice after it experienced an increase in its populations.

At present, all three of the western Wayne prisons are at or under their legal caps.

Lloyd May, warden at the Scott Regional Facility, said the Department of Corrections is experiencing extreme overcrowding. She added that the overcrowding last month was only a temporary move and the prisons had no choices available.

May said since the cap is in effect he sees no reason why it can't be honored, and overcrowding should not be seen as being an affront to the community.

# City police investigate vandalism at the high school

Four local youths are being investigated in connection with vandalism reported at Northville High School and the Northville Swim Club last week, according to city police reports.

City police responding to a vandalism complaint at the swim club Wednesday, June 22, stopped a car with four local boys in it, a police report said. A police officer saw the stock of an air rifle sticking out from under the seat, in a plastic bag also containing some BBs.

Police released the carbon dioxide from the gun and issued a citation for possessing an air gun under age to the gun owner. He faces a July 21 court date.

The four youths admitted to breaking onto the swim club grounds and swimming in the pool, and then throwing objects — including chairs, flowers and a starting block — into the water.

The four are suspects in the breaking of several windows at Northville High School. The night of June 22 five windows at the high school were shot with what appeared to be BBs, a report said. Damage was estimated at \$2,265.

**GOLF COURSE THEFT** — A water pump, sign, tee markers, and a flag stick, collectively worth over \$4,100, was stolen last Thursday from Brooklane Country Club on W. Six Mile Road, according to a township police report.

The course manager said between 1:30 and 2:30 p.m., an unknown person or persons entered the golf club and stole the listed items. Police said all the merchandise was recovered on the south side of the golf course.

No evidence or suspects have been found, as police continue the investigation.

**STOLEN AUTO RECOVERED** — An automobile stolen from Novi was recovered last week in Lake Success, according to a police report.

A Northville resident diving in the lake reported that he observed the vehicle, a 1985 Ford EXP, underwater, and it had appeared to have been there for quite some time.

The vehicle belongs to the State Farm Insurance Company.

**UNDERAGE CAR ACCIDENT** — A 14-year-old Northville resident was ticketed for driving without a license and careless driving after hitting a telephone pole on West Five Mile Road, a township police report said.

A witness stated he observed the vehicle make a quick left turn off of West Five Mile Road onto Portis Road. The witness said the vehicle appeared to be travelling too fast, lost control, and drove across the opposite traffic lane and into a telephone pole.

The driver of the car was uninjured, and after failing to contact her parents, she was released to an aunt who lives in Northville.

**DRUNK DRIVER** — A Northville resident was issued tickets for operating a motor vehicle under the influence of liquor and for refusing to take a breath test Friday.

A township police officer saw the driver take a wide turn from Six Mile onto Northville Road at around 2 a.m. Friday, a township police report said. When the driver went over the center line twice, the officer pulled the car over.

The driver had trouble with field sobriety tests and did not blow into the breathalyzer when asked to take a breath test at the police station, the report said.

Police issued the driver citations

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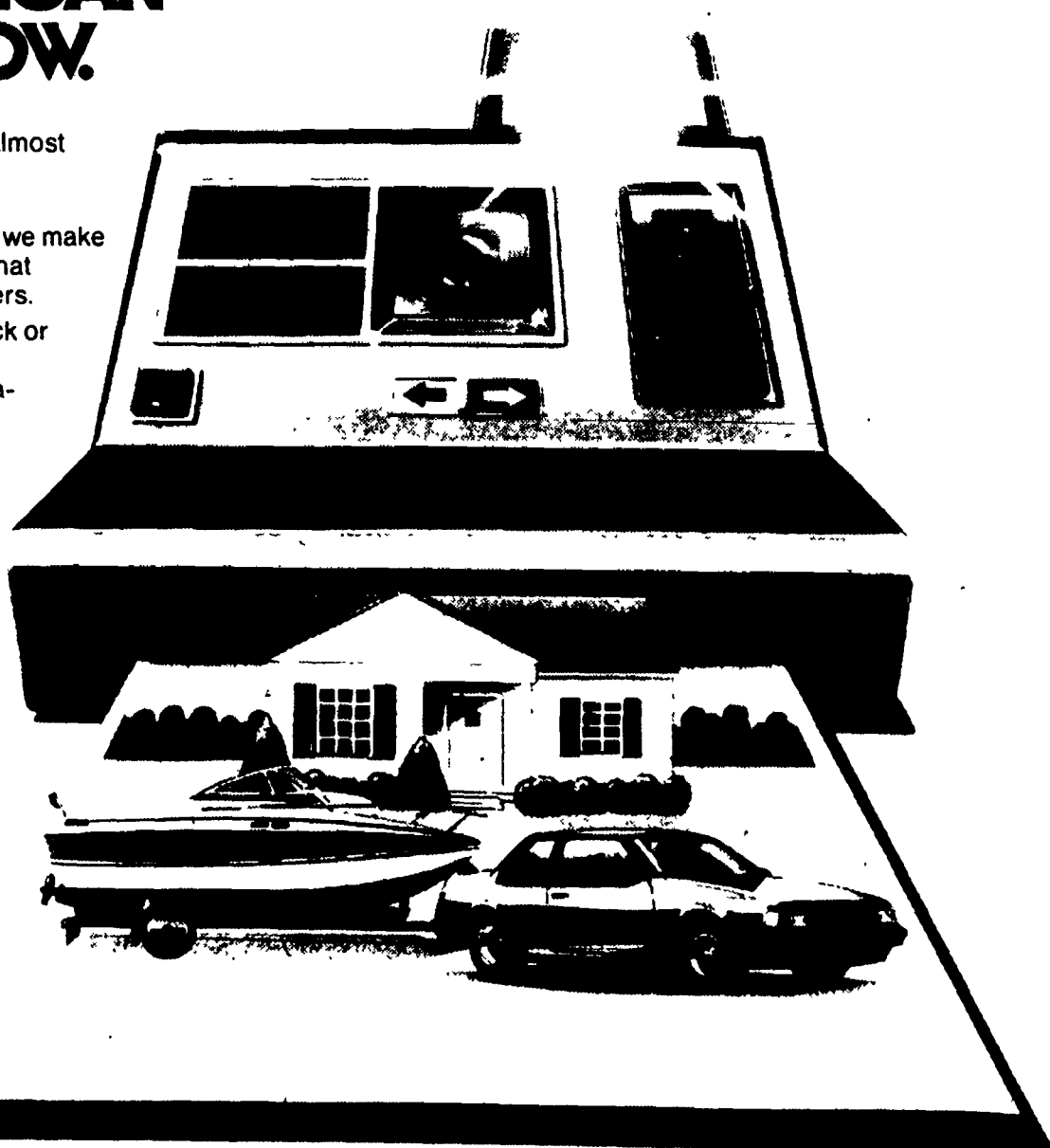

## Weather may stop another fireworks

Usually rain will cancel a fireworks display, but because of this year's drought, a heavy amount of rain will have to fall to save a Northville Township July 4 fireworks festivity.

That was the message from the Northville Township board during its June 23 meeting. The board issued a fireworks permit, contingent upon approval from the township fire chief, to John Swienckowski for a fireworks display to be held at dusk on July 3.

"We will issue the permit, but put it in the hands of the fire chief who will determine if sufficient rain has fallen," said Trustee Thomas Handyside.

Assistant Fire Chief Rick Roselle, who will make a decision on the fireworks display while Fire Chief Robert Toms is on vacation, said if conditions do not significantly change before July 3, then there will be no fireworks display allowed.

"Conditions now are not safe and if there is no rain (before the fireworks display date) then we can't afford to have a fireworks display get out of control and burn a house down," Roselle said.

Roselle said in addition to a considerable amount of rain, the wind conditions would also have to be perfect for a fireworks display, since houses in the area are quite dry.

Township Supervisor Georgina

Goss said Swienckowski will have to place a bond in order to receive the fireworks permit. She added as of Tuesday, June 28, Swienckowski had not applied for the bond, which can be as high as \$1 million.

Swienckowski agreed with the board that if a considerable amount of rain does not fall before July 3, having fireworks would be dangerous. He added there is nothing but dry fields surrounding the site of his display, which is to be at his home on West Seven Mile Road between Napier and Ridge Roads.

In a related move, last Thursday, Governor James Blanchard not only extended the open burning ban to include the entire state of Michigan, but prohibited fireworks displays on all forest and adjacent land, except places of habitation.

Art Sutton, fire prevention specialist for the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), said each fireworks application must be approved by the local governing body and reviewed by the local fire chief before a display can take place.

He added the state fire marshal recommends that a piece of fire apparatus be on site for every fireworks event.

"Traditionally, we have no problems with fireworks displays," Sutton said. "But, because of the severe fire problems we're having we could shut it down (fireworks displays). However, we're allowing them to occur, under regulated conditions."

## City may see more use of shuttle buses

The City of Northville may consider asking downtown workers and exhibitors to park at the Northville Downs on some sort of regular schedule, after such an arrangement

was used during last weekend's Summer Song festival.

During the festival downtown Friday and Saturday, two vans shuttled people between the Downs parking

lot and two locations on Main Street.

People who work downtown were asked to park at the track to provide more close parking for visitors. Lots were closed off and manned for a time both mornings so people coming into town early — mainly workers and exhibitors — would park at the track for the day, City Manager Steve Walters said Tuesday at a meeting of the city's Downtown Development Authority (DDA).

The system opened up between 150

and 200 parking spaces downtown, he added.

"When they opened the lots at 9 there was a fair amount of parking compared to the typical situation for the customers during the day," Walters said. The system might be used in the future, "at least in terms of major events and those times when parking is short," he added.

"For a first try, it seemed to have some positive effect," Walters concluded.

## City asks owners to maintain lots

Owners of three private parking lots within the City of Northville are being asked to fix up the lots, after two citizens groups objected to their condition.

The lot behind the Wagon Wheel lounge and hotel, the Veterans of Foreign Wars lot on Yerkes and the small Driving Club lot on Center across from Northville Downs were all discussed at the council meeting last week. Although the city has been concerned about the lots for months, the immediate discussion was prompted by letters from the Concerned Residents of Northville and the Bealton Residents' Association about the lots.

A memo from city Building Official Joseph Attard states that the Wagon Wheel was notified last September that city approval is required for any parking expansion. An area adjacent to the existing lot has been recently regraded and part of a curb along the creek has been removed.

Attard mentioned at the meeting that the lot now looks better than

before, since weeds have been removed. But council members agreed restaurant should be required to the area as no parking and that curb should be repaired.

Similarly, the VFW lot — site of a house which burned down — was the subject of a letter last September in which Attard wrote that site plan approval is required for parking expansion. The council also agreed to direct the city administration to post the land as no parking and enforce the requirement.

The council agreed the small Driving Club lot should be subject to strict compliance with the approved site plan for the lot — which limited the amount of parking — and should be better maintained. The council is in the process of drafting a specific ordinance governing property maintenance (see related story).

"I think the tool we'll have after the maintenance standards ordinance is adopted will give us the tools to keep these areas up," Mayor Chris Johnson commented.

## Rezoning denied

A request to rezone a lot across from Northville Downs on South Center Street from residential to commercial use was rejected by the city Planning Commission last week, but could return as part of a plan for the entire area.

Owner Ruth Cole applied for a change of zone from R-2, a single-family residential district, to GCD, a zone which allows gas stations, motels, restaurants and retail uses. The application states that Cole wants to open a bridal shop on the site.

Cole's representative at the meeting, Donald Samhat, argued that the land is best suited as commercial because it is on Center Street and close to the Downs and other businesses. The site is not suited for residential use — in fact, cannot be sold as such — and is a natural extension of the business district, he argued.

"We're not asking for anything that's different from what's directly across the street from us," Samhat

said at the meeting June 21.

However, city Planning Consultant Don Wortman recommended against the rezoning.

"We still feel that it's contrary to the established land use pattern and the Master Plan," Wortman said.

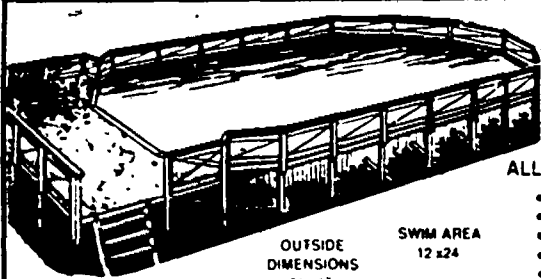
Even though the Master Plan may be outdated — the city is beginning a revision of the document — the plan is still in effect, Wortman said. In addition, it would not be a good idea to rezone one piece of land along South Center when the whole area deserves consideration, he said.

Wortman also asked why Cole applied for GCD zoning when a more restrictive commercial zone would still allow a bridal salon. Samhat said someone at the city had said GCD would be the appropriate request.

Members of the Planning Commission agreed with Wortman's objections to the application and voted down the request 8-0. The applicant may still take the application before the City Council.

## Young inventor wins state contest

If nine year-old David Craig is as successful on his next invention, kids all over America will want to erect a statue in his honor.

David, 9, a third-grader at Amerman elementary school, recently was selected as the third grade winner in the state of Michigan in the Invent America! contest, for his automatic detergent measurer invention.

And he said his next invention "will be something to make homework a lot easier to do."

David, son of Dave and Mary Craig, was selected from hundreds of entries by a prominent panel of judges, who evaluated the works on the basis of originality, usefulness and marketability.

"I've always liked mixing things and making potions and finding an easier way to do things," David said, adding the idea for the automatic

detergent measurer "just came out of the blue."

David's mom said the idea for the measurer was all David's, and even though his father tried to help out with the construction of the invention, "David's pieces turned out better than his dad's," she said.

David said after getting the idea for the detergent measurer, he cut out a piece of plastic from a milk carton and taped it to a box of Tide. Then, he cut a hole in the box of detergent, and in the plastic, and stapled a cardboard lever to the plastic. Finally, he attached a piece of folded paper to the box to measure exactly one-half of a cup of detergent.

Craig said she was really excited to see David win the contest, but added she was surprised because of the simplicity of the invention.

"I was surprised David won, but his invention shows that the simplest

things are more successful because they are plausible," Craig added. "Ever since David was 3 or 4 years old he wished someday to come up with an invention. His ideas are usually far fetched and weird, but this time he came up with something that is very simple and workable."

Craig said another reason she was surprised David won is because she uses liquid detergent, and his invention is designed for dry detergent.

By winning the contest, David received a \$200 bond, his third-grade teacher Mr. Babich received a \$300 grant, and Amerman school received a \$500 grant. "David is real excited to make a contribution to his school," Craig said.

And David will be able to make a larger contribution if he is able to sell his invention. Craig said her husband does not think the invention should be patented, but she added people have told her they would buy

David's invention. "David will write to Proctor and Gamble over the summer and see if they want to buy it."

David said he plans to put all of the money made from the invention in the bank and save up for college, as he hopes to become a doctor when he grows up. "Ever since I was 4 and I broke my arm, I've wanted to be a doctor," he said, adding someday he would like to invent something that will cure a disease.

Craig said she believes David will become successful at whatever he decides to do because "his nature is to be serious, and when David sets a goal for himself nothing gets in his way of achieving it."

She added the Craig's will probably only have one inventor in the family, as David's 3-year-old brother Justin is very different from his older brother, "and currently is only an inventor of messes."

## School officials contracts OK'd

The Northville School Board approved Monday, June 27, new contracts for the superintendent and central office administrators, effective July 1.

School Superintendent George Bell was given a three-year pact, which will increase his salary from \$68,207 in 1987-88 to \$75,171 for 1988-89.

"Dr. Bell is doing an outstanding job and good things are happening in Northville because of his presence," said Assistant Superintendent Burton Knighton. "He is an omnipresent person in that he is active and visible in the community."

"I think we continue to get a bargain" said Trustee Robert McMahon, in reference to Bell's contract.

"This is a step we have to take if we want to keep quality people in the (Northville) school program," said school board Vice President Glenna Davis.

Along with Bell, assistant superintendents, Knighton and Dolly McMaster, were given 10 per cent raises to keep them on the same ratio with all central office administrators.

Knighton's and McMaster's salaries will increase from \$60,931 in 1987-88 to \$67,152 for 1988-89. "I feel good

about Northville and I've seen positive things happen in the school district over the past 12 years," Knighton said.

Knighton added when he first came to Northville 12 years ago, the community was skeptical about education, but now the feeling is very positive.

"There is a very strong feeling of working together (between the school district and the community) to do what's best for the children of Northville schools," he said.

In addition to the administrators raises, the board also approved a \$7 per day raise for substitute teachers.

In actual figures, the substitutes salaries will increase from \$43 per day to \$50, and for being in the same position for 10 days or more the salary will increase from \$47 per day to \$55.

A survey of substitute teacher salaries from Novi, Farmington, South Lyon, and other nearby communities shows that the average per day salary for a substitute teacher is \$49.62.

John Street, director of business and management for the Northville school district, said the increase in substitute teacher salaries has been accounted for in the 1988-89 school budget.

Structures may not be painted with designs, patterns or words except in commercial areas when approved by the Planning Commission or Historic District Commission.

Structure exteriors must be kept in good repair and free of health risks.

Structural members, foundations, roofs, windows and the like must be maintained for safety and

appearance.

Features such as cornices, canopies, signs, stairways, awnings and the like must be safe and maintained.

Basement hatches must be built and maintained to prevent the entrance of vermin and water.

The City Council is expected to further consider the ordinance in upcoming meetings. The council is required to call a public hearing on the proposed ordinance before voting on adoption.

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# Allen Monuments works to rescue area gravestones

To the rescue.

That appears to be the call of Northville's Allen Monuments, responding to a neighboring community's outrage. Outrage over an act of vandalism that has the entire north end of Oakland County up in arms.

Vandals kicked over gravestones in Highland Township's West Highland Cemetery June 4. Some of the gravestones had been standing tall from the civil war era. Others were well over 100 years old.

The vandals — minors — confessed after a few days. Their parents have agreed to fund repair, estimated to cost in excess of \$5,000.

"My first reaction was to hang them. Just hang them," Highland Township Supervisor Tom Dunleavy said. "It's carelessness, malice — anything you want to call it."

"The people here just can't believe it," he added. "They're upset. They're very hostile."

Into play comes Northville's Allen Monuments, one of the few companies in Michigan with the expertise to, among other things, repair damaged gravestones. The company submitted a bid for the West Highland work last week. Highland Township officials haven't yet made a decision on the bids.

"It's saddening to see," said Scott Allen, a third generation manager of the family business. "I don't really

know what motivates these people to do something like this. There's not a lot of respect for life or death these days."

Repair certainly isn't the focus of the business and they don't solicit such work, but the requests come in fairly steadily. From Farmington Hills, Southfield, even other states. Someone, somewhere, in perhaps a brief night of euphoria, lays to waste generations of history. Generations of memory, which had previously been disturbed only by the wear and tear of Father Time.

"The sad truth is that you would probably be hard-pressed to find a cemetery anywhere that hasn't experienced some kind of vandalism," Allen said. "That's just the way it is."

Depending on the situation and the specific break, the Northville firm can use a number of different sealing procedures to restore the headstones. Smaller tablets that are over 100 years old are mostly made of a fine marble, Allen said. They often have a "sandy" feel. Many of the tablets have surfaces that are no longer completely readable.

When broken in half, they can be repaired by "pinning," the most expensive repair procedure. Holes are drilled in the top of either broken end and brass pins are inserted in the holes. Epoxy is placed around the outside of the breakline in some cases, concealing the break. The process is effective most of the time,

Allen said.

"It won't break again where it's pinned," he said. "We've had cases where they were broken, but the break is usually in a different spot."

Brass pins are used to prevent rust and staining.

In other cases, epoxy and bonding is used to right the headstones. The epoxy is laid liberally along the crack areas and the headstone is splinted for several days to allow it to harden.

"It's a relatively new development in the industry — maybe in the last two to three years," he said. "It was developed for use in the monument business."

Allen has special equipment available to stand the broken headstones back up on-site. It's the same equipment that they used to "set" local sculptures and artwork, gaining them critical acclaim. They set the sculptures of world-renowned artist Peter Rockwell at the Plymouth Township park in 1986.

Allen said the problem with old gravestones is that they don't belong outside.

"It's unfortunate to see them outside in the elements, running the risk of being vandalized," he said. "They really belong in museums somewhere. The techniques, the handmade construction, is from era that is gone."

"But how would you convince anyone to do that?" he added. "These are memorials for people. People are buried there."

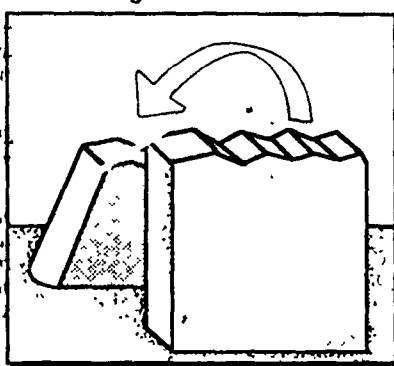

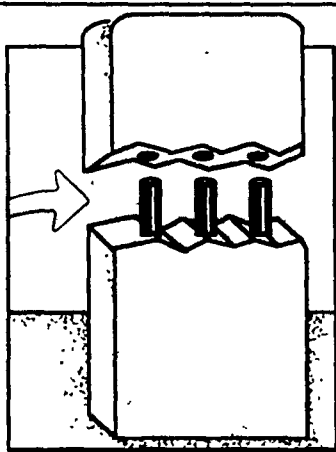

The Pinning Process

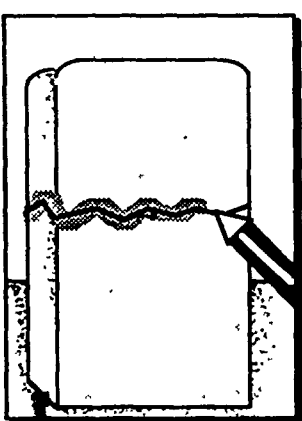

## Farmers cope with drought

The drought that has hit the lawns and flower beds of Northville may have residents out doing a little extra watering, but one phrase keeps creeping into the conversation, "Think about the poor farmers."

Well, the farmers at the Northville Farmer's Market last Thursday were doing just that — sitting and thinking beneath a clear, sunny sky while they sold what few vegetables are available early in the season.

Is the drought hurting them? Yes, came the answer from two of the three vendors out last week. Mark Prielipp who works a farm in Britton, about 50 miles away from Ann Arbor said he is definitely seeing the effects of the lack of rain.

"It's bad . . . anything that we're

not watering," Prielipp said they just bought "a bunch more pipes" to extend their well watering system to try and save more crops.

"We'll save some of it and if it would rain now it's not too late to save more. But if it doesn't come within the next two weeks it will be too late," he said.

Prielipp farms 80 acres of vegetables which he said they are trying to water and 700 acres of field corn and soybeans — which are impossible to water. The field corn and soybeans are used as animal feed and he noted "the price of feed is already up," due to the drought.

Prielipp said the price of vegetables will be rising for the consumer, but shoppers will most likely see the increases in the supermarkets — not at the Farmer's Market.

Carl Prielipp noted that all yields are down about one-third to one-half because of the lack of rain. "If it continues (the drought) for two more weeks it could be a disaster for the whole country, the national news is not exaggerating," he said. "It's very exasperating, very discouraging."

Carl Prielipp noted that the few days we have had where it has clouded over and sprinkled just slightly have been the most frustrating of all.

"The general consumer doesn't believe it's going to affect them, the American public is spoiled by having a full pantry at reasonable prices and can't get adjusted to the fact of a shortage," he said.

Mark Prielipp summed it up. "Every day without rain cuts the yields down even more," he said squinting into the sun.

## Planners to hold meeting on woodlands ordinance

The Northville Township planning commission unanimously voted to hold a special meeting Tuesday, July 12, to discuss a woodland ordinance that has been drafted by the beautification committee.

If adopted, the ordinance "will be looking to protect the woodlands within the township," said Linda Lemke, a landscape architect with the firm Brandon Rogers & Associates, who is assisting the beautification committee in drafting the ordinance.

Beautification Committee Chairperson Catherine Sella said the proposed woodlands ordinance is

patterned after a similar ordinance passed last year in Novi.

She added the differences between the Northville proposal and the Novi ordinance include: the administration area is simplified; a flow chart is included to assist in the follow-through process; a more simplified tree exchange system; and builders must post signs warning all construction workers to care for trees.

At the 7:30 p.m. special meeting, commissioners said they intend to go through the proposed ordinance thoroughly, before taking action on it.

"We must be totally clear as to how this ordinance fits with us (planning commission) and how it applies to us," said Commissioner Marvin

Gans.

Commissioner Jerry Chisnell said many questions need to be answered about the ordinance, but there is a need to move fast on the ordinance because a lot of woodland lots are ready to be developed.

Lemke, who provided a brief overview of the ordinance, said the overall legislative design does not prevent developers from developing, but urges them to replace trees or preserve them altogether.

She added that the woodlands map, which will define the protected areas and provide an inventory of the protected trees, has been completed in a preliminary form and should be finalized by the end of August.

## 1987 school budget amended

The Northville Board of Education closed the books on the 1987-88 school year by adopting four amendments to its budget for the past year.

"The board is supposed to amend the budget when you know the actual figures are different from the existing budget," said John Street, director of business and management for the school district.

Among the changes, is an increase

in revenue in the general fund budget from \$14,915,300 to \$15,029,000. Street said the positive increase was due to the sale of some property and an unexpected refund on insurance.

Both the cafeteria fund budget (\$499,000) and the special education budget (\$4,023,000) were amended to reflect a balance in each account.

In order to balance the 1987-88 budget, the district had to take about \$25,000 out of the fund balance, leaving

only \$138,000 in the account.

Street said he is concerned about having to dip into the debt fund to balance the budget, but added the move was expected.

"I think we went into the 1987-88 budget knowing it would be close. It is a thin fund balance but we've set aside \$150,000 from the 1988-89 budget to go into the fund balance."

Street said an increase in revenue for 1988-89 has allowed the district to set aside the money for the coming fiscal school year.

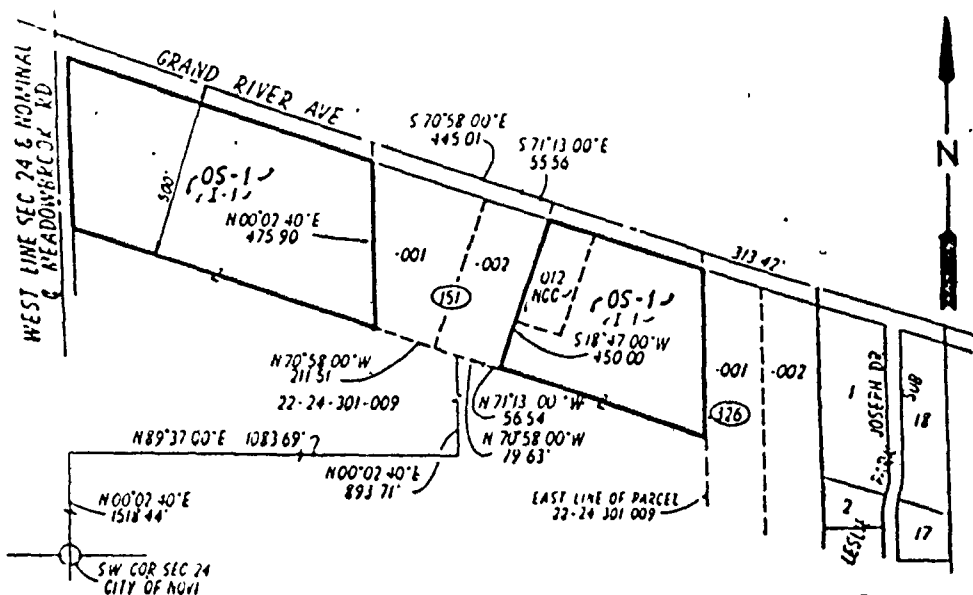

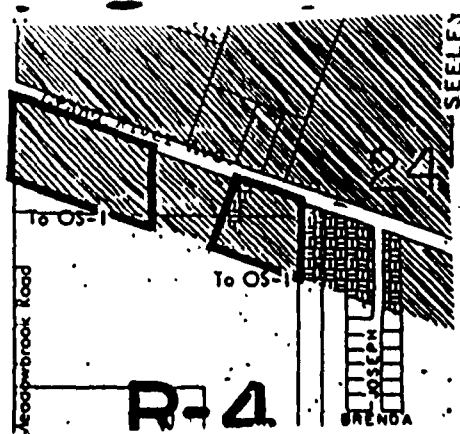

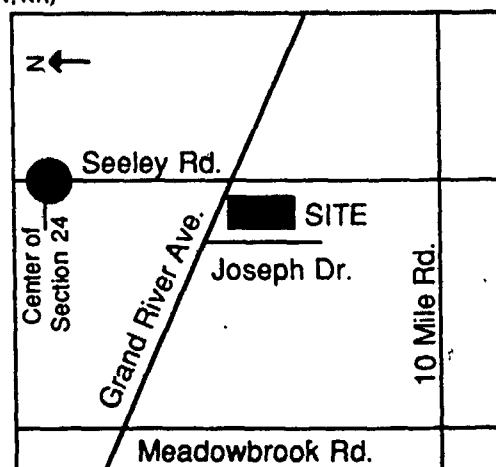

## City plans temporary Cady parking

The downtown area might soon see a little relief from its tight parking situation, in the form of temporary parking space along Cady Street east of Center.

While the Cady Street corridor is being studied for future uses and parking configuration, City Manager Steve Walters is proposing that some temporary parking be set up along

the street to ease the parking demand downtown. The concept came to the city's Downtown Development Authority (DDA) Tuesday, and the authority members liked the idea.

No cost figures are available yet, Walters said, although estimates are between \$3,000 and \$10,000 for the project.

The city could make parking —

"quite a large number of parking spaces," Walters said — out of city-owned land behind the First Presbyterian Church and along Cady. The plan would be to regrade the land and cover it with grindings from torn up pavement created in the city's street repair program, he explained.

"It would be a surface that would

be firm enough to be like paving for a while. It just wouldn't last for as many years," Walters said.

The new parking would be ideal for employees of businesses near Cady, he added.

A specific proposal including cost figures and expected number of spaces will go to the City Council some time soon, Walters said.

## Singh buys lot at parking deck

The vacant lot at the northeast corner of Center and Cady streets downtown has been bought by the Singh Development Company, which recently proposed a major development just across Center from the lot.

The company bought the site from Dennis Roux, Singh Vice President Michael Kahm said Tuesday at meeting of the city's Downtown Development Authority (DDA).

Singh first planned to propose a sister project on the smaller lot to complement the company's plans across the street. But, in light of the

city's plan to conduct a comprehensive study of the entire corridor along Cady, Singh decided to hold off on developing a specific proposal, Kahm said.

"We're probably thinking of more retail space in there with office above it," Kahm said at the meeting.

The city owns a small strip of the land on the site. Walters said the study should consider alternatives for who owns what in that area, particularly in light of parking needs.

The study is expected to be started within a couple of months.

roof of the retail space becomes a roof garden," Tuomaala said. The apartments along Cady and Center streets will look out into the city while those directly against the Michigan Association of Gift Salesmen building or the Perrins building will look into garden space.

The plan shows 40 one-bedroom apartments, 20 two-bedroom apartments and one three-bedroom. The company is proposing carports in the Cady Street parking lot to serve the apartments. "We'd like very much to work something out with the city to be allowed to do that," Kahm said.

In the discussion before the DDA, parking was the major issue to be solved for the plan. Tuomaala said the plan would require 238 spaces under the city's regulations, 41 of which could come by reconfiguring the municipal lot on Cady Street.

Kahm and Tuomaala indicated

Singh would pay for developing the rest of the required spaces, but where they might go is an open question. City Manager Steve Walters said a planned study of the Cady Street corridor could extend all the way to Wing Street and thereby address the Singh proposal and its required parking.

Several members of the DDA expressed approval of the plan.

"You're on the right track. Apartments are badly needed in this town," DDA member and former Mayor Mike Allen said.

Kahm said the company would begin construction "as soon as we get our approvals. I think the biggest thing we need to resolve is parking. As soon as we get that resolved, we're ready to go."

Although the plans were first presented to the DDA for reaction, the authority is not required to approve the plan. Eventually the site plan will go before the city Planning Commission for consideration.

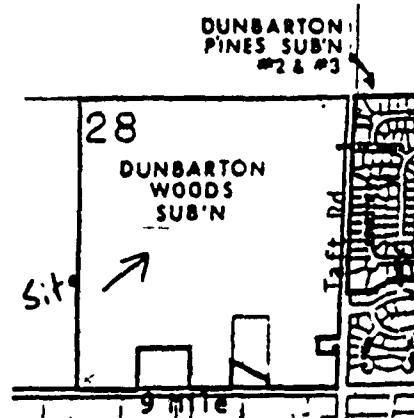

Section 1. Title 4, Chapter 12, "Zoning Ordinance" of the Code of Ordinance of the City of Northville is hereby amended to include the following: SECTION 18.17 — BED AND BREAKFAST ACCOMMODATIONS

A Special Land Use to the R-1A, R-1B and R-2 zoning districts. A Use Permitted by Right in the R-3 and R-4 zoning districts. All districts subject to the following provisions:

a. Useable Floor Space: Not more than fifty (50) percent of the total number of bedrooms or twenty-five (25) percent of the total floor area of the residence, (which ever is least) to a maximum of 8 rooms shall be used for bed and breakfast sleeping rooms.

b. Cooking Facilities: There shall not be separate cooking facilities used for bed and breakfast stay.

c. Signs: No sign larger than two (2) square feet identifying the bed and breakfast shall be permitted. Internal illumination of signs shall not be permitted and all signs, placement and illumination shall be reviewed by the Planning Commission.

d. Parking: One parking space shall be provided off-street in the interior side yard or rear yard area for each occupant room, plus one space for the resident manager. The Planning Commission may require a landscape buffer between lot and parking area.

e. Off-Street Parking Layout and Design: Such off-street parking shall meet the design and layout requirements of Article 15. However, the Planning Commission may waive selected dimensional requirements for parking areas and entrance drives if safe and efficient parking is not impaired.

f. Length of Stay: No transient occupant shall reside on the premises for not more than thirty (30) days in any one year.

g. Compliance: All such facilities shall comply with all applicable local, county, and state building, occupant living area, plumbing, electrical, mechanical, fire and health codes.

SECTION 22.2  
11a "Bed and Breakfast Accommodations: A use in which transient guests are provided a sleeping room and board in return for payment. Section 3. This ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after enactment thereof and after publication thereof.

### Woodlands rules coming just in time for township

Northville Township is counting its trees and that's good news for everyone.

Specifically, the township has undertaken the study of its woodland resources and is considering enacting a new woodlands ordinance to regulate development of wooded sites. As part of the study the township has hired the consulting firm of Brandon Rogers & Associates, and the firm is physically out in the township counting and measuring trees in the preparation of a woodlands map that will once and for all define and locate Northville's woodlands.

This is a terrific move on the part of the township. Real congratulations should go to the Township Beautification Commission who started the whole ball rolling by instituting the study and by petitioning the board to make funds available to hire the consultants necessary to draft the ordinance. This group of volunteers saw the need to protect a valuable resource, the township trees, and made a move to bring it to the attention of their elected officials.

The township is starting work on the ordinance in the very nick of time, however. While development has occurred in the township, the bulk of the building is still held up due to sewer capacity limitations. When the sewer snafu is eventually ironed out, the development craze will begin in earnest, and it behooves township authorities to have a woodlands ordinance passed and in place before the bulldozers start their engines.

While details of the draft ordinance have not yet been examined, the planning commission will begin work on it in the next few weeks. They are correct in stating that they should take the time to really examine and carefully understand the ordinance.

### Upkeep rules needed to keep city polished

For a city without a property maintenance ordinance in effect, Northville does pretty well for itself. A combination of pride and neighborhood pressure keeps most of the property and buildings in the town looking fine.

But there are always exceptions. We can all probably point out a spot or two that really grate us because we regularly see them. The better the surrounding properties are kept up, the worse the other ones look.

As more and more people come to visit and live in the city — and as the downtown area resurges — the city seems to be becoming more and more image conscious. That's only appropriate, since appearance may be the single most important factor in bringing people to town.

That image consciousness is translating into some proposed new or-



#### Environment

This is a major piece of local legislation and the commission will be dealing with developers on the issue for many years following its enactment.

Careful consideration should be given to details, particularly the enforcement of the ordinance and how mediation will occur between developers and the township over trees removed and trees replaced. This legislation must be workable. Development will occur and the goal of any woodlands legislation must be to find the line between restrictive and protective.

Zoning questions will need to be addressed by the commission. How can the township balance the developer's right to build and the need to make the venture profitable, with the goal of maintaining not individual trees, but wooded areas and habitats of value aesthetically and environmentally?

Using the Novi Woodlands Ordinance as a starting point for the township one is a good beginning. The Novi ordinance has been in effect for over a year and the outcome, both good and bad, can be seen and adjustments made.

Development of the woodlands map will aid the township in all phases of future planning. With one look at the map they will be able to determine whether a developer will be treading on large woodland areas and whether extra caution and care need be exercised.

dinances for the city which will, if adopted, require regular, basic property maintenance outside and inspections inside when owners or occupants change.

The City Council has already seen a draft of a maintenance ordinance, based on one adopted in the township not long ago. It's pretty basic stuff, just legally requiring the care and concern that most people show anyway. The city seems to be moving quickly on the ordinance, and we can expect it to be adopted soon.

That's very appropriate. The city probably should have had something like this a long time ago to really put the final touches on the city's appearance. It's too bad that some people must be forced to keep up their property, but not doing so infringes on the rights of the rest of the community.

## Make book mall

To the Editor:  
The closing of the Ford Valve Plant brings to an end an era of good neighbor relations between the City of Northville and the Ford Motor Company that started with the original Henry in 1919. The Northville plant was the very first of the two dozen Ford "village industries" that dotted the landscape in southeastern Michigan. Not just any site would do — it had to have water power and it had to be located in a rural/small community setting. The Northville plant fittingly stayed a Ford manufacturing facility the longest. It deserves to be used properly into the next era.

The Ford plant and its waterwheel is a landmark to our city and its future use can play a key role in our city. Other small Ford plants have been creatively converted into such uses as a community center (Tecumseh) and a mall of small shops (Clarkston). Coincidentally, a committee is studying the possibility of a new home for the Northville library and the perfect spot would be the Ford plant. It is centrally located, has easy access and ample parking.

The plant is presently assessed at \$760,000. Even though refurbishment would raise that value, could a new library facility be built as reasonably?

Because the building is so large it could accommodate generous room for library expansion and in the meantime the extra space could be rented, supplying income for the library or the city to offset costs. It has been suggested that the whole building could be devoted to reading and books — literally a "Book Mall."

Many different types of book stores would be attracted to such a concept. A new and used paperback exchange, old and hard-to-find books, new books

and religious books are a few. Due to its unique nature a book seller like John King Books might consider opening an "outlet store" in Northville. The various branches of AAUW would find it a perfect place for their used book sales.

Benches could be placed by the pond to provide a peaceful opportunity for people to read outside during the summer months — truly an excellent source of a wide variety of books as it is for its beautiful downtown and historic areas.

Henry Ford founded the Edison Institute and Greenfield Village as an educational tool for all people. Making his first village industry into a community center for learning and knowledge would make him proud.

# Identifying at-risk kids is important

This is another in the continuing series of columns written for the Record by Charles Stille, Northville High School Student Assistance Program Coordinator.

Educators need help in meeting the needs of their "at risk" youth according to a recent survey conducted by Research for Better Schools. Improving programs for these youth was among the top five needs indicated as needing external assistance such as Summer Workshop On Awareness and Prevention (SWAP), offered this year to the Northville Public Schools.

There may be no exact definition of what constitutes at-risk youth, but there is a growing consensus that this means low achievers. They differ from their more successful peers in the development of self-esteem, task performance, cultural aspirations and life experiences.

It is estimated that two-thirds of these students are from families at the poverty level and that many are black and Hispanic. Many are victims of family trauma or physical, emotional, alcohol or drug abuse. Nationally these students number 4 1/2 million.

The SWAP program is for adolescents who are completing seventh, eighth or ninth grades, ages 13-16 who are experiencing problems in one or more areas:

- Academics; currently failing one or more academic classes or working below potential.
- Family; frequent involvement in sibling/parent conflicts, problems due to divorce, etc.
- Peer related issues; conflicts with peers, withdrawal or aggressive behavior, etc.

The SWAP program will begin July 5 and run through August 4, meeting four days a week from 9 a.m. - noon for youth of families mainly from Northville, Livonia and Wayne Westland. It is supported and funded by the Community Commission on Drug Abuse (CCODA).

Each day will consist of group therapy along with art therapy and recreation therapy. The staff to student ratio is two students to one staff member. Staff members come from the Adolescent Recovery Center, Livonia Counseling, local colleges and the community. All are trained to support and work with these students.

Program goals are to help youths develop a positive self-image, develop a sense of responsibility, reduce acting out behaviors and provide a variety of experiences including art, recreation, problem solving, education and fun. Goals also include possible referrals of these students and their families to further counseling and treatment if deemed necessary. The families who sign up realize through a thorough orientation

and registration procedure that further help may be necessary.

In my opinion this type of program can make the difference. Families in our community are getting involved with the support and guidance of their school counselors, teachers and social workers.

At present these kids may be identified as "at risk". Down the road they will and are many times those kids who turn to drugs.

## Store plan OK'd

The area in front of the Giftfiddler music store on Main Street will be improved into a sort of outdoor plaza with new trees and grates under a plan approved last week by the city's Planning Commission.

The new plaza will be developed along with an expansion of the Giftfiddler building to allow more room for display, offices and lessons. The commission approved the entire plan 7-0.

The original site plan submitted for the expansion did not include the improvements in front of the store. At the previous commission meeting, Planning Consultant Don Wortman suggested the additional improvements and Tom Rice, owner of the Giftfiddler, agreed to consider the idea.

The donation program run through the city could provide the project with four benches, architect Greg Presley said at the meeting Tuesday, June 21. The design also includes two L-shaped planters and brick pavers at some points, he added. The area in the center of the plaza will be a grass hill.

The revised plan presented to the commission included other changes from the original, including a new elevation for the west side of the building, a new canopy over the planned addition and a wood — rather than steel — stairway.

Presley, who is a member of the Planning Commission, sat in the audience during discussion of the plan and abstained from the vote on it.

\$13,000 of Community Development Block Grant money on a study to consider future uses of the Ford plant site.

A special committee has been looking for a potential new library site for months to ease crowding in the current facility in the city's Municipal Building. The committee had narrowed down its choices to a list which did not include the Ford plant — but that's only because the committee did not know it would be coming available, Orr said Monday.

"It's an inviting spot," Orr said. She added the committee will consider the site's possibilities as a library.

The library is seeking around 25,000 square feet of space, and the present Ford building is slightly more than twice that size.

"Even if the library could occupy a portion of that building... it would more than meet the needs of the library for years to come," Orr said.

"The building has historical significance," she continued. "I would like to see the appropriate sources, including the committee, take a serious look at it."

"I expect that the committee will meet as soon after the holiday as possible," Orr said.

Johnson, Mayor Pro Tem Carolann Ayers and City Manager Steve Walters are scheduled to meet Friday with representatives from Ford, Walters said Tuesday. One topic of discussion will be the city and the company cooperating in the future use study, Walters said.

"People have proposed everything to me from new factories to a library site," Johnson said Tuesday at a meeting of the city's Downtown Development Authority. "This could be in the nick of time; who knows?"

One thing to consider in any speculation about future use is the tax value of the property, Johnson said after the meeting; the site is currently assessed at about \$700,000.

## Land sale sought

For about 16 years the city of Plymouth has been unsuccessful in its effort to sell some property it owns on Beck Road in Northville Township, but it's going to try, try again.

The city commission voted last week to advertise for bids on a 48-acre plot of land that was a well field until the early 1970s.

"They closed the well field down in 1972 after they started buying Detroit water," said city manager Henry E. Graper Jr.

Sale of the land, between Five and Six Mile, has been hampered by matters over which the city has no control, Graper said.

"It all depends on what's happening in the real estate market," he said. "Every time we seemed to get a good bidder... interest rates shot up."

Graper also placed some blame on the shoulders of city commission members, saying the officials "couldn't make up their mind how much they wanted for it."

Earlier this year, two bidders who were turned down sued the city over the rejection. That matter is still pending, but Mayor Karl Gansler said the judge handling the case gave the city permission to continue seeking bids.

The city did manage to sell the property a few years ago, but the deal fell through when the buyer failed to maintain payments, Gansler said.

"It's genuinely my hope that we can sell this piece of land once and for all and be done with it," he said. The well site provided water for all businesses and residences in the city until the commission voted in 1972 to tap into the Detroit water system. The well water left much to be desired, Gansler recalled.

"It was full of iron," he said. "Everybody had water softeners at that time." The bid specifications say that the minimum price to be considered is \$412,000. Income from the sale would go into the water fund and be used for maintenance and repair of water and sewer lines.

Gansler said the property is "trees and brush." It has 1,000 feet of frontage on Beck Road and goes back about 1,000 feet, said Graper. City officials will open bids for the land Friday, July 29.

## Take CARE on 4th

The Operation C.A.R.E. effort, which places extra emphasis on the three summer holiday weekends by the Michigan State Police, is over 10 years old and will be in effect again this Fourth of July weekend.

The program is a three-part effort, which includes obtaining federal grant monies to pay troopers who would normally be on pass overtime to work; the various organizations that set up coffee breaks in the many freeway rest areas, and the tremendous assistance from all media outlets to remind the motorists of the additional risks of traveling during a

holiday weekend in heavier than normal traffic.

During the 1987 Fourth of July holiday weekend, 13 persons lost their lives in traffic accidents in Michigan. The State Police hope to see a reduction in that number this year.

All motorists are reminded and encouraged to obey the speed limits; Don't drive after drinking, and always wear safety restraints.

With this cooperative effort, the holiday weekend can be an enjoyable time, and hopefully, an accident-free weekend.

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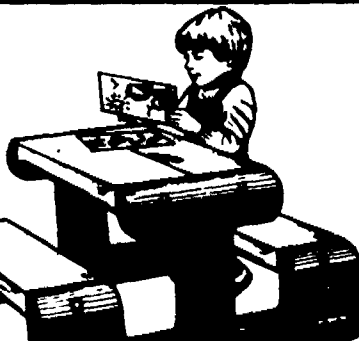
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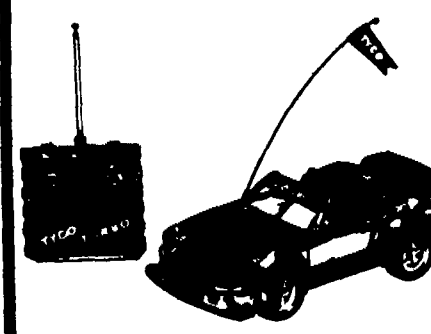

# Northville store reflects European flavor

Inside it looks like a cottage in the south of France. Instead it is a gift shop on East Main Street in Northville, and it is called "Traditions by Emmy MacKay."

Owners JoAnne MacDonald, Karen Slack and Kathy Bates have recently remodeled and changed the name of the store that used to be called Handicrafters. The store is named for the owners, Emmy is a fictitious Victorian lady, and MacKay is a combination of the owners' last names.

The store, located in a 115-year-old building, previously sold only hand-made country knick-knacks, but now concentrates on more European merchandise.

"We're a whole new store," MacDonald said.

MacDonald, Slack and Bates first initiated a change after touring all the similar businesses and deciding there were too many country stores in this area. Since most of the merchandise in the previous store was hand-made by the owners themselves, the threesome was also burned out from the endless after-hours work spent on keeping the stock in the store.

"We wanted something different," Slack said.

The entire remodeling, including redecorating and recovering the floors, took one week. The store reopened for business on March 1. The owners decided on the European/Victorian image because it most closely reflected their personal tastes. Each of the owners has received compliments about the decoration styles of their own homes.

"We decided, 'Why not take all that wonderful stuff and put it all in one place?'" MacDonald said.

The store now features custom flower arranging, silk flowers, cloth-covered hat boxes, antique reproduction jewelry, pictures and hand-painted Caspari greeting cards. Most of the store's merchandise is acquired through nation-wide trade shows, but some is made by local artists. So far the change has been positive.

"We're very pleased, our sales are up 20 percent from last year,"

reported Slack.

The store also requires constant maintenance. The owners believe the merchandise must be constantly rearranged for "fresh looks."

The store's location is both a help and a hindrance to business. Traditions is located on East Main Street and sometimes does not receive the attention of the stores located nearer the busier downtown streets. Since Traditions has regular customers and ample parking space, the location has not hurt business very much. "We're worth the walk," Bates said.

Traditions attracts customers from communities around the Detroit area including Grosse Pointe. The owners also are working to attract a larger clientele. The owners are currently concentrating on advertising.

"We would like to have more Northville residents," Bates said, noting that the prices on their merchandise are their own best advertisements. Unlike most department stores, Traditions' overhead is very low. The three owners are the only employees, and because MacDonald, Slack and Bates are the only people who buy merchandise for the store, the quality is very high.

"Our prices are 25 percent under mall prices, and we have a bigger selection," Slack said.

Traditions is open Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. In the fall, the store will be open on Fridays until 8 p.m.

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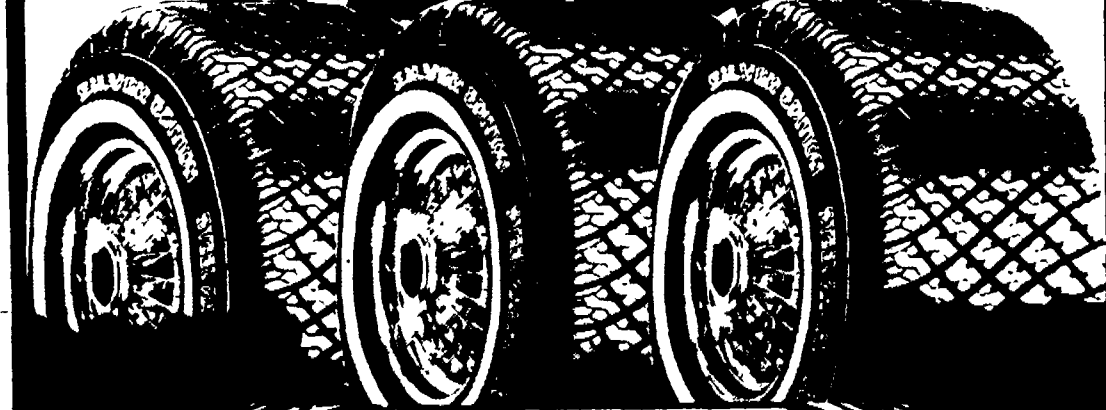
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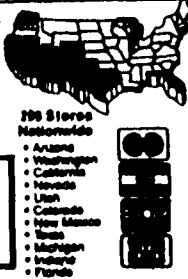
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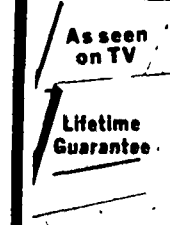
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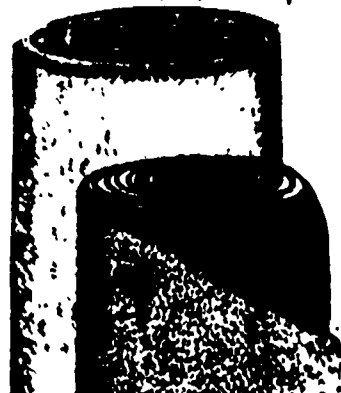
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# CPAs tell how to figure your net worth

The Jones up the street seem to live like millionaires. They've got a new Mercedes in the driveway of their brand new house. And they always seem to be going out to dinner or on vacation. They must be wealthy.

Don't be too sure of that, says the Michigan Association of CPAs. Lifestyle is not always a reflection of wealth.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones may owe a substantial amount of money on their new car and home while sinking even more money into vacations and dinners that add nothing to their net worth. And net worth is the ultimate measure of wealth.

You, on the other hand, may owe only a small mortgage on your house, your car is paid off and you've got a nice little nest egg in the form of an IRA, savings accounts and some stocks and bonds. In short, your net worth is probably much more than the free-spending Jones'.

What is net worth? Simply put, net worth is the difference between what you own and what you owe. For example, if you recently bought a \$300,000 home, but owe \$180,000, the house contributes only \$120,000 to your net worth. On the other hand, if you own a \$100,000 house and owe only \$5,000 on it, the house contributes \$95,000 to your net worth.

To calculate your net worth, add up

the market value of all of your assets — home, car, bank accounts, investments and retirement assets. From this, subtract your liabilities — mortgage, car loans, consumer loans and the like. The figure you come up with is your net worth. But what does it tell you?

Net worth is, in effect, a snapshot of your financial standing at any given time. As such, it is most useful when compared to other "snapshots" taken at different times. The comparison allows you to gauge your financial movement — are you accumulating wealth or losing it?

If your financial goal is to reduce your debt load and build up assets, a semi-annual or annual net worth calculation will let you chart your progress.

This is not to say you won't be able to learn anything from your first net worth calculation. On the contrary, it creates a benchmark against which all future calculations will be measured.

Let's assume you've calculated your net worth and to your horror,

you discover not only are you worth nothing, you actually have a negative net worth. Should you worry? Not if you are young and still paying off student loans in addition to taking on debt to pay for a new car and new furniture and all the other things required for setting up an independent household.

Remember, after all, most of us will build up net worth the way our parents did — slowly through savings. As a result, younger people tend to have a much lower net worth than older, established people.

In fact, the federal government estimates half of people below the age of 35 have a net worth of less than \$6,739. CPAs recommend, however, that you should be saving at least five percent of your net income. If your savings account doesn't reflect that, you should consider boosting the amount you save.

Your net worth also allows you to identify financial problems so you can move to solve them. If, for example, your liabilities outstrip your assets and you have the negative net

worth cited earlier, you may need to cut back on credit card purchases.

Conversely, if the bulk of your assets are in the stock market, you may want to diversify to reduce your risk exposure.

If you are nearing retirement, you may want to move your assets to investments that generate dividend payments to supplement your retirement benefits. For example, if you and your spouse live in a large home with no children present, you may want to sell it and either move into a smaller, less expensive one or perhaps even rent an apartment. This may free up some of the equity you've built up in your home and allow you to use it for investments.

And if you are over 55, you may be able to exclude up to \$125,000 of the profit from the sale of your home from your taxable income. The \$125,000 exclusion has some limitations and you may take it only once, so be sure to check with your accountant.

Whatever the case, the Michigan Association of CPAs recommends you begin to monitor your financial health by calculating your net worth. If nothing else, you may discover you're better off than you thought you were.

# Employers impressed by goal-oriented teens

Teenagers seeking a part-time job to earn money for college, a savings account, or new bicycle or car should communicate their goals to prospective employers who look for motivated young workers.

"There are many eager young people searching for part-time jobs, and the students with the best chances of getting hired are those who express their motivation in interviews," said Denise Ilitch Lites, vice president of Little Caesar Enterprises, Inc. in Farmington Hills.

The company operates nearly 2,000 Little Caesars Pizza restaurants across the country, most of which hire teens throughout the year, and especially during busy summer months.

"We have found that teens with direction, teens who have a purpose in obtaining a job, are the best, most-productive young employees," said Lites. "When young people work toward a goal, they work with more care and dedication."

Lites also recommends teens to be ready to tell their prospective employer why they want to work for the company.

"If a teenager tells me what he or she has learned about our company it indicates extra preparation for the interview," said Lites. "I have found that a youngster is more likely to learn well and be prepared on the job."

Lites offers the following 10 tips for teenagers looking for part time employment:

1. Check with free community services: In many communities, employment services, especially for teenagers, keep listings of available part-time jobs and will review them with teens at no charge. These services also can help you with advice on interview techniques and work skills.

2. Do your homework: Ask family and friends about the employer's company. If it's a particular store, perhaps you, or someone you know, has shopped there and can tell you about what is sold and to what type of customers.

3. Dress neatly: Since first impres-

sions are so important, dress well, even if you're simply filling out an application. For the interview itself, proper dress is even more important.

4. Be on time: Never arrive late for an interview. Arriving five or 10 minutes early shows initiative and consideration for the employer's time.

5. Tell them why you want the job: An employer wants to know why you want the job. Tell him or her what your personal and professional goals are. Employers are looking for dedicated, goal-oriented people.

6. Display your values: When hiring a teenager for a part-time job, employers want to hire someone who demonstrates honesty, integrity and loyalty. Show you have these qualities by explaining your previous employment or describing your participation in school functions, sports programs or any organized activities out of school.

7. Answer questions completely: Employers want more than just "yes" or "no" responses to their questions. Use the interviewer's questions as opportunities to give him or her a total picture of yourself within the question's limit.

8. Ask questions: Show an employer you're interested in the position by asking about job requirements or the company itself. These questions will reinforce your interest in a career with that company.

9. Set a deadline: Confirm a date or time when you'll be notified of a decision.

10. Show initiative: Immediately after your interview send a short, handwritten note, again expressing your desire to work for the company. In the note, thank the interviewer for the opportunity to speak with him or her. Several days after you feel the employer has received the note, make a call or go back to inquire as to whether a hiring decision has been made. But limit your follow-up to one call or visit.

# Top companies encourage consumer feedback

Companies want customers to come to them with questions, ideas, compliments and complaints.

Why? Because top management in businesses across the nation have discovered the vital importance of customer feedback — and a company's responses to it.

With each response a business reveals its level of concern for the quality of its goods and services, as well as its commitment to customer satisfaction.

In a study conducted by the technical Assistance Research Programs Institute (TARP), it was reported that the majority of customers don't bother to express dissatisfaction with a product or

service to the firms concerned.

It also revealed that 70 percent of those who do complain and receive a satisfactory response continue to be customers. Only 37 percent of those who do not complain, on the other hand, are willing to give the product or service another try.

According to Elaine Glasser, Oakland County Cooperative Extension Service Home Economist, dissatisfied complainants tell twice as many people about their negative experiences as satisfied complainants tell about their positive interactions.

Based on findings that customers are more likely to communicate with companies if they're confident of a positive response, firms are installing

toll-free, easy-access 800 numbers in their consumer affairs departments.

More and more consumers are calling. They're finding it easier, not to mention quicker, to ask questions or describe a problem over the phone than in a letter. Studies show that the number of complaints doubles, even triples, and inquiries increase three to 10 times when 800 numbers are made available.

Consumers may want to straighten out a billing matter, obtain information on product use and care, learn where they can obtain service.

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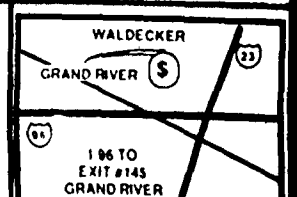
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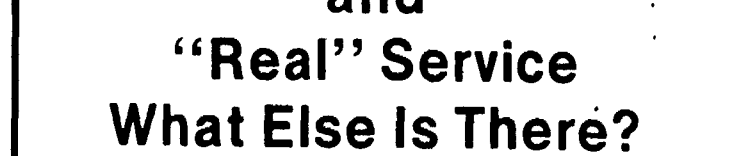
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# Ann Arbor Art Fair

## How to 'do' the fair like a true insider

Visiting the Ann Arbor Art Fair is sort of like taking a weekend trip to Disneyland—so much to see and so little time.

But if you know what you're looking for and where to find it, a trip to the art fair will be infinitely more enjoyable.

With that in mind, we'd like to offer this as an insider's guide to the Ann Arbor Art Fair, set for July 20-23 this summer. From where to park to where to eat to where the best art is located, we'll tell you everything you need to know to properly "do" the art fair.

What is art? Well, that's a question that has troubled philosophers for ages. And while you might not find the answer at the art fair, but you're bound to find something you like.

The art fair is actually made up of three separate art fairs, each with its own specialty. To help you sort out who has what and to key in on what you're looking for, here's a brief description of each of the fairs and their offerings.

**The Ann Arbor Street Art Fair**—Located on South University and East University, this is the festival's oldest art fair (29 years) and bills itself as "the original juried art fair." That means artists have to submit entries to judges, who then select them to be in the fair.

"Even though all three art fairs are juried, I still feel we're the one that juries more completely... which helps to keep our quality high," said Susan Froelich, AASF coordinator.

"We feel that the quality of our art is the highest and has been the highest for 29 years."

The fair has 300-320 artists practicing in a wide variety of media, everything from clay sculpture to mixed media that combine prints with collages and painting.

While every artist has something special to offer, Froelich recommends keeping an eye out for these artists:

Patrick Dragon, a Florida-based artist who has an innovative firing technique for his clay work; Denise Lisiecki of Kalamazoo, in her first art fair ever, displays watercolor paintings that combine flowers and everyday objects in deep colors; Ken Schmidt, currently working on his doctorate in art education, uses some aerospace metals to create unique jewelry and sculpture; and Tiffany Hopkinson, a Florida man—"He does really beautiful, intricate wood sculptures," Froelich said.

She recommends visitors peruse the whole art fair, and take time to talk with the artists about their work. "The one thing I think people don't take advantage of enough is talking to the artists," she said.

**Summer Arts Festival**—Now in its 18th year, this is Ann Arbor's youngest arts festival. It's made up of 540 artists in booths on Main Street, State Street and a section of Liberty Street.

On those three streets, you can find everything imaginable in arts and crafts. "Our part of the fair has something for everyone," said coordinator Mary Strobe. "You could buy something for \$2 to \$1,000 in our part of the fair."

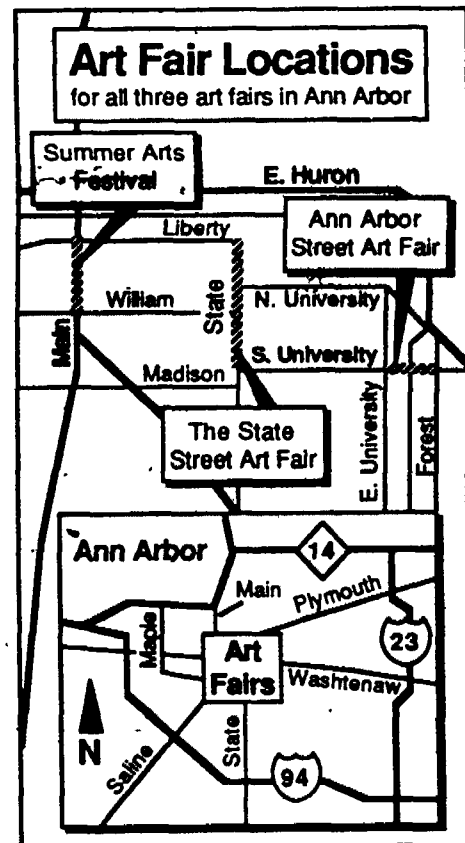
Strobe is director of festivals for the Michigan Guild of Artists and Artisans whose members

make up the show. About half the members are from Michigan and the rest come from all over the country.

Strobe said fair-goers can find fine arts, especially jewelry, at the Summer Arts Festival, but the list doesn't stop there. The show also offers leather goods, paintings, crafts and folk art, everything from glassblowers to colonial furniture makers. And don't miss the handmade stuffed animals on Main Street, and some special raku clay works on display.

**The State Street Art Fair**—This fair is the smallest of the festival, but don't overlook it. Now in its 21st year, the fair is located on North University and sections of Maynard, Liberty and William streets.

Last year, it featured metal working, mostly jewelry and sculpture, as well as clay works, fiber arts and photography. The State Street Art Fair also offers classical music noon to 3 p.m. at Liberty Plaza, at the corner of Liberty and Division streets.



### SIDEWALK SALES

If you can't find an art treasure to take home, the least you can do is find some bargain item. The art fair is best known for its art, of course, but it's also a bargain-hunter's dream as local stores roll out the merchandise and cut the prices to take advantage of the crowds.

Merchants along Main Street traditionally hold sidewalk sales offering their usual merchandise at cut-rate prices. It's also a good time to duck into some of Ann Arbor's more interesting shops—like Peaceable Kingdom, full

of interesting items—or After Words, a discount book store.

But if you're after real bargains, the place to go is State Street. Here you can score everything from a \$4 Hawaiian shirt to a \$1.98 bestseller. The sale usually includes every known item of University of Michigan clothing, as well as an array of discounted items like sunglasses, stationery supplies and record albums.

### PARKING

The art fair brings 500,000 people to Ann Arbor, and nearly all come by car.

Since there aren't nearly that many parking spaces in the downtown area (where parking is notoriously scarce 365 days a year), it takes some ingenuity and planning to find a place to rest your roadster.

Don't think for a minute that you can park illegally on some obscure side street and get away with it. According to the Ann Arbor Convention and Business Bureau, the Ann Arbor Police impound 120 cars during the fair, and 5,000 citations are issued. Another 1,000 tickets are handed out for parking violations on the University of Michigan campus.

Many homeowners, churches, fraternities and sororities offer spaces on their lawns and driveways. All-day rates are whatever the market will bear—anywhere from \$2-\$8, depending on proximity to the fair, and the principles of supply and demand.

Private operators usually fill up by 11 a.m., and you may get blocked in for the day. Some box cars in, other don't. If you have any doubts, ask.

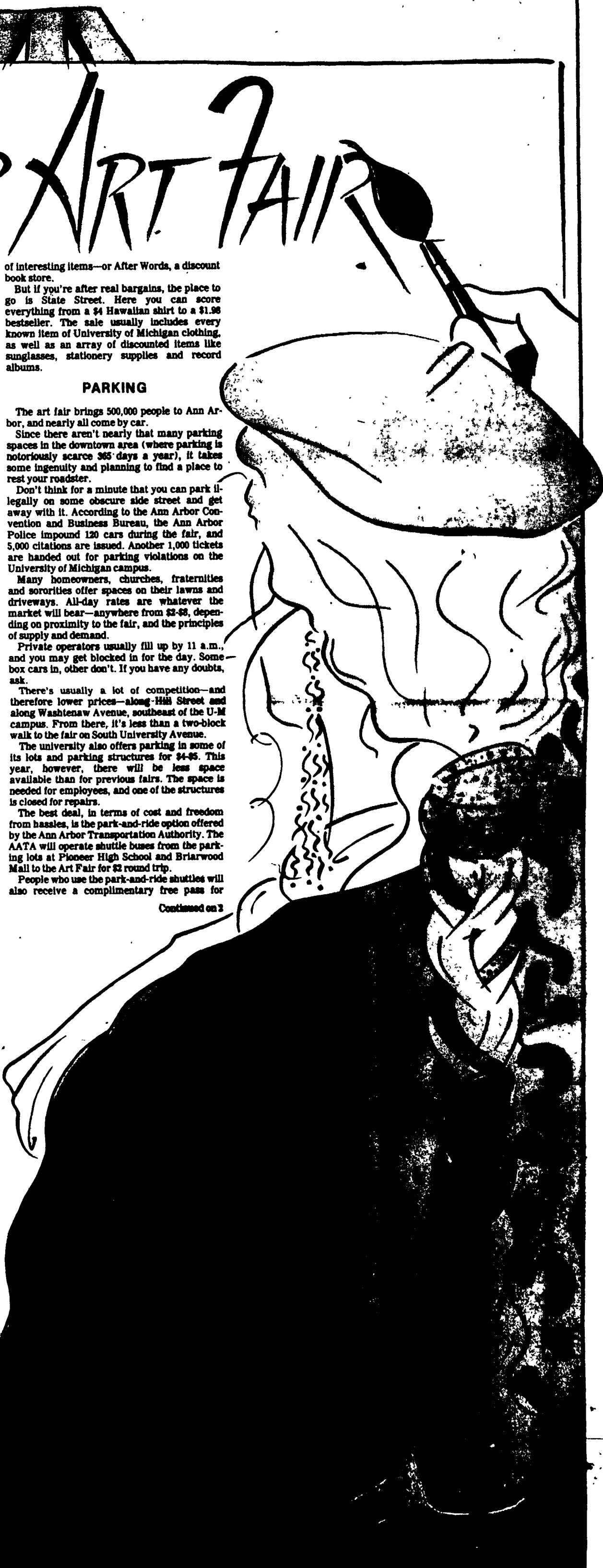
There's usually a lot of competition—and therefore lower prices—along Hill Street and along Washtenaw Avenue, southeast of the U-M campus. From there, it's less than a two-block walk to the fair on South University Avenue.

The university also offers parking in some of its lots and parking structures for \$4-\$5. This year, however, there will be less space available than for previous fairs. The space is needed for employees, and one of the structures is closed for repairs.

The best deal, in terms of cost and freedom from hassles, is the park-and-ride option offered by the Ann Arbor Transportation Authority. The AATA will operate shuttle buses from the parking lots at Pioneer High School and Briarwood Mall to the Art Fair for \$2 round trip.

People who use the park-and-ride shuttles will also receive a complimentary free pass for

Mary Strope, coordinator for the Summer Arts Festival, expressed the feelings of many people connected with the fair when she said, "By all means, don't try and park, take the bus."

## RESTAURANTS

You've gotta eat, right? At the art fair you have two choices: elephant ears and hot dogs at one of the outdoor stands, or a nice sit-down meal at one of Ann Arbor's fine restaurants.

If you choose the food-stand route, you can grab some grub from vendors which usually congregate along

the eastern end of South University Avenue, and the southern end of Main Street. Shish kebab, falafel, corn dogs and even the old standbys, hamburgers and french fries, can be had.

If you're in the area of the Michigan Union (South University at South State Street), you can't go wrong at the indoor and outdoor food courts operated by the Michigan Union Grill (the MUG). Pizza, breadsticks, salads, deli sandwiches and Stroth's ice cream are just some of the items you can sample.

On Main Street, there's also the Oasis of Cafes, an amalgamation of outdoor cafes operated by the Parthenon, the Full Moon Cafe, Gratzl and Trattoria Bella Ciao.

It's an indoor, sit-down meal you want, the only problem is deciding which of Ann Arbor's great restaurants to go to.

You could go out of town to any of

the air-conditioned spots along Washtenaw Avenue or South State, but then you'd give up your hard-earned parking space.

Or you could go to one of the popular eateries right on the fair routes, like Cottage Inn or Afternoon Delight or Maude's. In that case, you'd be almost guaranteed a long wait and an invitation to "have a seat at the bar," from the hostess.

Then there are those little, out-of-the-way, oft-forgotten treasures that don't take too long to get to, but are far enough away from the crowd that you can get a seat fairly quickly. Here's a list of some good ones, in no particular order. Unless otherwise indicated, most places serve lunch from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and dinner from 5-10 p.m.

Kana: 1133 E. Huron St. Korean food, some hot and spicy; open for lunch and dinner; free parking.

Krazy Jim's Bimpy Burgers: 551 S.

Division St. A campus-area greasy spoon, but with a little style. Burgers are the specialty, with an interesting variety of toppings; open 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Cedar Tree: 312 Braun Court, off N. Fourth Ave. Arabic and Near East foods; open 5-11 p.m., and may be open for lunch during Art Fair.

La Casita De Lupe: 315 Braun Court. Traditional Mexican specialties; open for lunch and dinner.

Fuji: 327 Braun Court. Japanese food, with both regular entrees and a sushi bar; open for lunch and dinner.

Southside Grill: 640 Packard St. at State St. In addition to a wide range of lunches, this place is known for its huge breakfast portions; open 7:30 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Tio's: 333 E. Huron St. A hole-in-the-wall Mexican restaurant, with most items available vegetarian, and a unique chili served with your

choice of ingredients; open for lunch and dinner.

Dominick's: 812 Monroe St. A favorite hangout of university professors, Dominick's has a varied ethnic menu (Thai, Vietnamese, Italian) along with some favorite standards; indoor and outdoor seating, but no table service (you place and pick up your own order from the kitchen); open 7:30 a.m. to 10 p.m.

DeLong's Barbecue Pit: 314 Detroit St. In addition to barbecued chicken, ribs, and so forth, there are other Southern specialties like sweet potato pie; carry-out only; open 11 a.m. to 1 a.m.

Argiro's: 300 Detroit St. Serving just about any kind of Italian food you can think of; open for lunch and dinner.

## SIDESHOWS

If you're just in the mood to do

some people-watching, the diag (located on the U-M campus, between State Street and South University) is the place to go.

Street performers are in abundance here, everything from mimes to jugglers. Another crowd attraction is the Hare Krishna tent. The Krishnas usually set up shop near State Street, playing their music and handing out literature.

Ann Arbor's well-publicized liberal side is on display on South University, near the Engineering Arch. That's where the political action groups set up their booths. Save-the-whales, gay rights, ban-the-bomb—you name it, it's there.

Dining aboard this blue and white luxury ship on the Detroit River during a warm summer's night offers restaurant-goers a breathtaking view and a pleasant change of pace.

The Star of Detroit cruise can best be characterized as a mildly festive ambience for families and couples alike. An attractive hot and cold buffet is accompanied by the sights and sounds of life on the Detroit River. Passing sailboats and the revitalized appearance of the city's waterfront are key pictorial attractions.

A view from the ship's large windows during dinner also offers passengers a glimpse of Bell Isle, neighboring Canada and the manufacturing home of Canadian Club whiskey. The ship cruises the Detroit River from mid-May through mid-October.

As for the meal itself, the dinner menus vary each night with the exception of peel and eat shrimp. The palatial delights on this particular June night consisted of assorted garden salads, raspberry chicken, seared bass with dill cream, steamed buttered corn on the cob, boiled red skin potatoes, peel and eat shrimp, cheese and fruit display and a chef's pastry tray for dessert.

During dinner a great deal of emphasis is placed on refilling the assorted trays of food promptly. The waiters and waitresses move swiftly to make sure no glass is half-filled. Mood music of the big band era filters down from the ship's top deck during dining hours.

The wine selection includes sparkling wines such as Chateau Grand Traverse of Michigan and several California wines. White wines include White Zinfandel, Riesling, Sauvignon and Chardonnay. Michigan-made wines include Red Table and Fenn Valley Raspberry. Wine can be purchased either by the bottle or glass.

Desserts consist of an assortment of beautifully-crafted pastries impossible to resist. Calorie watchers may want to caution themselves. All the food aboard the Star of Detroit is freshly prepared on board.

Perhaps the most typical way for passengers to conclude their trip on the ship is to head out onto the deck and watch the sun set on the Detroit and Windsor shorelines. Some sound advice is to bring along a jacket if you plan to head outdoors. The temperature can get quite brisk on the water. Even on the hottest of days the wind and water are refreshing.

The boat cruises at a speed of 7.5 to 9.8 nautical mph and can travel as fast as 12 to 13 nautical mph, according to the crew.

In short, the white tablecloth service, buffet meal and otherwise leisure-

ly cruise make for an exciting alternative to the everyday restaurant. The ship caters to dining for individuals, groups, conventions and charters, according to Star-Line Corp. management.

Prices for the dinner cruise, Sunday through Thursday, are \$39.95 per person and \$14.95 for children 12 and under. The price includes meals only. On Friday and Saturday the charge for dinner is \$44.95 per person; children, \$14.95.

The Star of Detroit lunches cost \$20.95 per person Monday through Friday; children, \$9.95. The brunch on Saturday and Sunday is \$24.95 per person; children, \$9.95.

Moonlight cruises are also offered on the Star of Detroit. The price is \$14.95 per person. Hors d'oeuvres are served on this cruise.

Senior citizen and tour/travel operator discounts may apply, according to management. Passengers are asked to arrive at the Hart Plaza waterfront one-half hour prior to departure.

## Osborne takes over as Connie Mack coach

John Osborne is a very busy man, but he has somehow found the time and energy to coach the Northville Connie Mack-level baseball team this summer. This is in addition to supervising a summer weight lifting program at Novi High School — which is just a small portion of his duties as the Wildcat head football coach. Osborne is also the outgoing Novi Athletic Director — a job he found very difficult to keep up with in conjunction with his coaching duties.

Osborne will be coaching a high school-level baseball team officially for the first time since 1970. He was the first head coach for the Novi High School program back in the 1960's but gave it up 18 years ago. Now he has a chance to work with his son Derek, who will be playing first base and pitching for the team this season.

"I think it's a nice bonus to be able to coach (Derek)," Osborne said. "In football, we were on opposite teams, so it's a nice change of pace to be on the same side for once."

Derek has been one of the Mustangs' top baseballers the past two seasons — grabbing all area recognition two years in a row. He is joined on the team by three other 18-year-olds from the Northville High School team and they form the veteran faction of the squad. The starting catcher is Mike Yard — another all area and all-conference performer this spring — who has good power and is top-notch on defense. Ed Walsh will hold down a starting spot in the outfield — most likely left field — and has a great arm, according to Osborne. The fourth veteran is utility infielder Tom Skynar, who is a streaky hitter but can be unstoppable if he's hot.

Perhaps the best of the youngsters on the team is Randy Jones, a speedy outfielder who's another Mustang player in the spring. Jones will play in center and will also pitch on occasion.

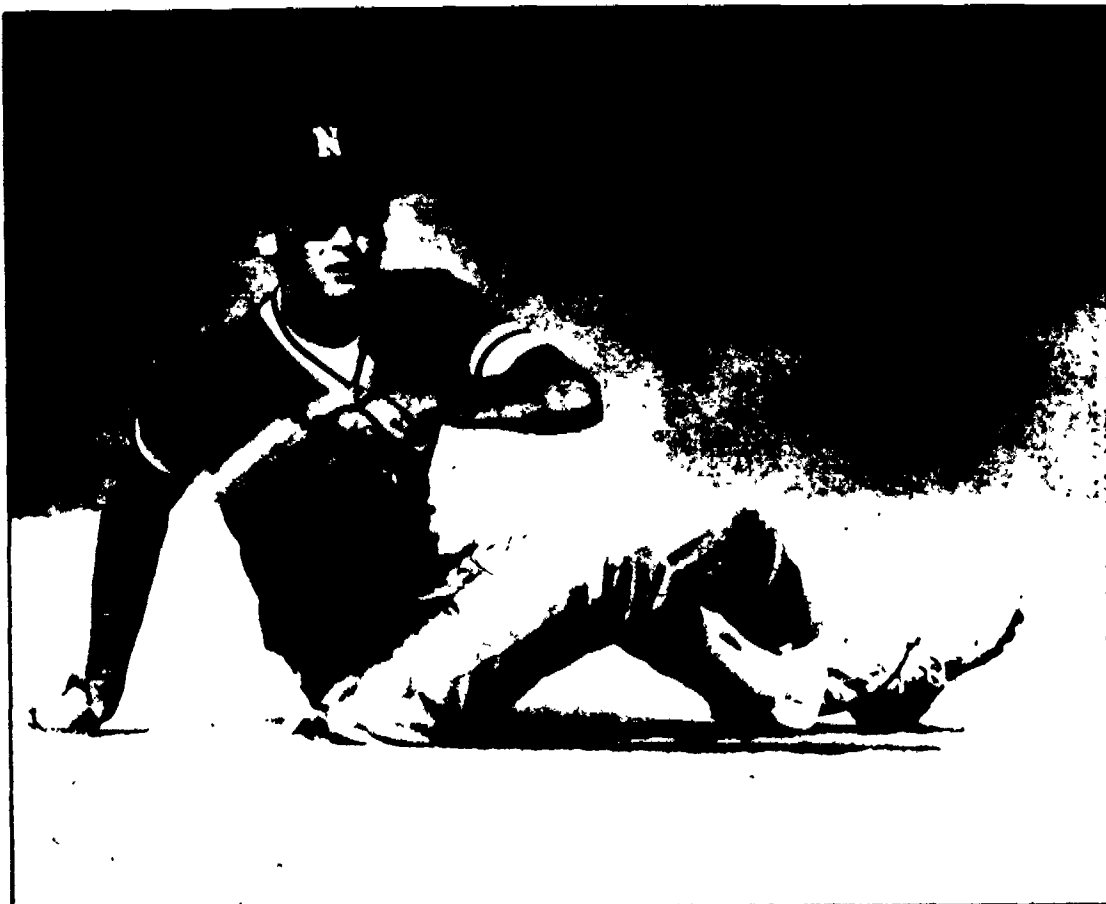

"He's got great foot speed, he runs well and he can hit for power," Osborne said. "He has a knack for getting on base a lot — he's a good one."

The shortstop will be Jim Willerer, who is a steady influence on the infield. He will be joined in the infield by Dave McKee and Adam Behen, two slick fielders who need to improve offensively. McKee was one of the finest fielding second basemen in the WLAA last spring and Behen was a solid fielder for Northville during the 1987 season. He will play third base.

"This McKee kid is a player," Osborne said. "His range is excellent, so if we can get his hitting going, he's going to be a very valuable player for us. Behen is another veteran who will also pitch a little for us if we need it."

The final outfield spot will be handled by Brian Frellick, who Osborne categorized as "a sound player who hustles, is a nice hitter from the left side and is a good bunter."

The team's top pitcher is lefty Todd Ebersole, who was Northville's top hurler in '88. The rest of the pitching staff includes Steve Nigro and Scott Probert — who are also part of the Mustang connection. The rest of the team includes R.C. Heaton, a back-up catcher and outfielder who attended U-D High School; Steve Pierce, a good fielder from Southfield Christian High; Darren Kehoe, a designated hitter from Northville and Steve Ventura, a reserve outfielder from Northville.

"Our approach this season may not be like some of the other teams in our

league," Osborne said. "All our kids are from Northville and we don't really recruit anybody from outside this area, so we may not be as highpowered as some of the other teams that do. It puts us a little behind some teams, but I'd say we can be very competitive with about seven teams in our 10-team league."

In the early going this season, Osborne has had trouble fielding a complete team. The squad has been hit extra hard by illnesses, vacations and other problems.

"We haven't been able to field the same line-up game after game and as a result we haven't been consistent

enough yet," Osborne explained. "Right now we need our pitchers to get back into form and we need to play better all-around defense."

"We have quite a few youngsters on the team — but don't get me wrong — these kids can play."

In the first two weeks of action, the Northville Connie Mack team won two of its first five games (with one tie) but then dropped the last three in a row. Losses to Windsor (5-3 on June 18), Milford (23-2 on June 21) and Livonia Churchill (8-4 on June 22) came at a time when Osborne was having a difficult time fielding a full team.

## Delwal 'banks' on healthy workers

William Walker, owner and president of the Delwal Corporation in Novi, is literally "banking" on the idea that exercise is good for both the body and mind of his employees.

"If a man is physically capable of working out, that means he is strong and he will have an increase of eight to ten per cent more efficiency in his job," said Walker, who installed an employee workout facility in his new factory and offices, which were completed in August, 1987.

Walker, 47, said all of his employees must participate in a one-hour workout session every other day, because "that's what I do and I'm 20 years older than they are."

He added an employee must be with Delwal for at least one year before they can receive workout room privileges. "I want this to be like a private club, and to make this private club we have to find out if an employee is worthy or capable of joining the club."

Walker noted since the installation of the workout facilities, Delwal has experienced an increase of eight per cent in production.

The workout room comes complete with the latest in high-technology equipment, ranging from a modern stationary bicycle to a computerized rowing machine, that pits the user against a computer in a simulated rowing tournament.

In addition to the exercise equipment, Walker also provides his employees with a spacious lunch room, loaded with numerous vending machines, a pool table, and two video games.

"We didn't spare any expense on the equipment because we felt if you give the employees something you should show that management is behind them," Walker said.

Walker said he got the idea to put in a workout facility at Delwal, which produces metal fabricated welded assemblies for General Motors, Chrysler, Ford and Mazda, from his days on the assembly line years ago.

"When I worked in the plant 12 or 13 years ago, management was not caring to the needs of employees," he said. "I thought that if I was ever lucky enough to have my own company I would listen to the needs of employees. They thought that it (the workout facility) would be a good idea."

Walker also said by putting his employees through the workout program, it will "improve the mental stability in any individual."

On both of these management tenets, Walker's workout facility seems to be a big success.

George Mitchell, a welder at Delwal for the past three years, said he used to get tired very easily at work, but now the exercising gives him a break in the day and allows him to get a fresh start in the middle of the day.

"A good workout keeps me in better shape and if I'm better in shape I

won't get as tired and I can keep the pace up better," he added.

Ron Dring, a three-year pressman at Delwal's, said exercising makes him stronger, which in turn, makes him work harder. "It (exercising) raises my endurance."

Walker added, jokingly, he also hopes the exercising will give the employees an opportunity to release their hostility without attacking

management.

In addition to eventually installing an outdoor track, Walker said his workout program has room for improvement. "I would think that our program leaves a lot to be desired and as we (Delwal) grow up I would like to add more equipment."

But, Walker said smiling, he will stand firm against putting in a pool, despite his employees suggestions.

### Fitness Tips

## Summer can be prime time for illness, injury

Summertime is fun time, but it is also prime time for injury and illness. Some common summer illnesses and hazards include sunburn, poison ivy, stings and bites, heatstroke, and bicycle and swimming injuries.

**SUNBURN:** To avoid sunburn, apply sunscreen to your child's skin in a thin even film. Re-apply sunscreen after swimming or any activity producing excessive sweating. Dry the skin before application. Sunscreens with PABA (Para-aminobenzoic acid) do not wash off as easily as the others. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends using water-proof sunscreen with a minimum SPF of 15. Limit the time your child is in the sun.

Mild to moderate burns may be treated with cool tap water or Burrow's compresses applied to the burn area for 10-15 minutes, three to four times a day until the redness subsides. You may then use bland emollients like Eucerine, Nutraderm or Lubriderm. Do not use petroleum jelly.

**HEATSTROKE:** Avoid strenuous exercise during periods of high heat

and humidity. If your child wants to exercise, increase the intensity of the activity gradually. Wear light clothing and drink cool water before exercise and during rest periods.

Also, never leave an infant in a closed car even for a short period; and if your child has a fever, do not wrap him in blankets.

If heat stroke does occur, the child's skin will be hot, red and dry. The temperature may be as high as 105 degrees Fahrenheit. The child may lose consciousness. Bring the child to a cool environment, remove clothing, place in a reclining position, cover the body with towels cooled in ice water and call for medical assistance.

**POISON IVY:** Contact with poison ivy usually produces a reaction within 24 hours. The rash tends to appear in a linear fashion and is very itchy. Teach your child to avoid plants with clusters of three leaves. After contact, wash the affected skin area and clothes with soap and water. Make sure you scrub under the nails to prevent spread of the rash by rubbing or scratching. The best treatment is Calamine lotion to relieve itch and dry the rash. If the rash is very ex-

tensive and oozing, consult your physician.

**MOSQUITO BITES AND BEE STINGS:** These can be avoided by not wearing bright colors, flowery prints, shiny jewelry, perfume, hairspray, cologne and scented soap. Insect repellent sprays may be used.

If stung by a honeybee, remove the stinger immediately by horizontal grazing; do not squeeze. Then apply ice and topical anti-itch medications. If systemic reactions occur (hives, tightening of the chest, hoarseness, wheezing, thickening of the tongue, facial swelling, dizziness, fainting or shock), seek medical help immediately.

**BICYCLE SAFETY:** Since most bicycle injuries are head and neck injuries, a plastic helmet is the best protection. Also:

- Make sure your child knows how to get on and off the bike, can ride in a straight line, and brake properly.
- Specify the places and times of bike rides depending on the child's age and experience.
- For biking with children between 6-12 months old, use a backpack carrier.
- For children between 1 to 4 years old, make sure their hands and feet

are protected from the spokes. The child should be belted and both you and the child should wear helmets.

**WATER SAFETY:** Never leave a child unsupervised in or near water even for a moment, even near a wading pool. No child is drown proof. Also:

- Teach your child safe water behavior: no horseplay, no diving in shallow water.
- Never dive into above-ground pools except from a diving board.
- Never swim during electrical storms or immediately after meals.
- Swimming lessons for children under 3 years old are not without risk, and have been associated with water intoxication. Total submersion should be prohibited. It is doubtful that infants can be made water safe, and parents may develop a false sense of security.
