Family, police seek answers in patient death

Questions about the death of Northville Regional Psychiatric patient John Zelepis have recently prompted the Michigan State Police to begin an independent investigation.

But family members of Zelepis, 56, are still not satisfied with the speed of law enforcement official's progress in discovering why he died.

On February 13, Zelepis fled from his ward at the Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital (NRPH), only to be found dead three days later in a field about a quarter mile away from the hospital. NRPH is located on Seven Mile Road just west of Haggarty Road in Northville Township.

Local authorities, who are also investigating the case, said the death was caused by hypothermia and currently believe it to be accidental.

"The medical examiner has determined the cause of death as being hypothermia, and at this point classifies it as being an accidental death," said Capt. Phil Presnell, of the Northville Township police.

Yet, while family members are accepting the fact that hypothermia caused Zelepis' death, they are bewildered as to reasons why Zelepis was ever out of the hospital.

Zelepis' brother-in-law, Tom Paros, 66, of Livonia, said his family "will pin someone's tail to the wall," in trying to find out the circumstances surrounding his death.

"In our opinion this is a wrongful death caused by somebody's negligence," Paros said. "That man (Zelepis) definitely died before his time."

"I mean so far I'm not saying this death was murder or accidental. But I want to know — how did he die?"

Detective Sgt. Dean Sanderson of the Michigan State Police, said he has been directed to conduct an independent investigation, studying the events leading up to Zelepis' escape from the hospital and eventual demise.

"We are not proceeding under any foregone conclusion; rather, we are now gathering facts, and based on those facts we should reach a conclusion."

Track tax reserve is sought

There is \$6.6 million sitting in the state treasury earmarked for return to cities with horse racing tracks, but Northville and the others may not see a penny of it, the City Council learned last week.

The situation is the result of a decision by the state auditor general, City Manager Steve Walters told the City Council Tuesday, June 28.

The state racing act is set up so that the cities housing tracks receive back a portion of the state taxes on the tracks. For several years, however, the state legislature has appropriated less than the full amount stipulated in the law.

Walters said he learned early this week that some surplus money from track taxes has gone to the state general fund for the past six years. "In some kind of general auditing process the auditor general advised them they were violating the state racing act," Walters told the council. "They got caught, and now it's restored in a lump sum."

The money is held in a reserve, and under present circumstances may only be disbursed to track cities, Walters said. However, if the cities get any of the money at all, it will likely be no more than \$1 million, he said.

State Senator R. Robert Geake (R-Northville) said Tuesday that the issue will probably not be resolved for a couple of weeks, after the state budgets are settled. "Hopefully, they won't figure out some way to spend it

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Grant for field looks good

Grant money to buy Lapham Field may be approved by the end of the week, a Department of Natural Resources Official said Tuesday.

The Northville Community Recreation Department has applied and been recommended for up to \$123,000 toward buying the field from the Lapham family. The department currently leases the land, which holds four soccer fields.

The grant proposal is part of a 40-project list recommended to be appropriated from the DNR's Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund. The trust fund board made the recommendation, and the state House and Senate have both passed slightly different versions of a bill appropriating the money.

The two versions "were 99.9 percent the same," DNR Grants Coordinator Mike McDonald said Tuesday. "We've been told everything

was ironed out... Northville's difficulty."

McDonald said the bill was expected to be passed some time this week.

"Things look excellent," he said. "I think it's almost a sure thing."

If the Legislature does pass the bill the money will still not become available for a while. "It does take a

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Drought Township tries to cope

Northville Township officials, at present, are not planning any water rationing or sprinkling bans, despite the summer drought which continues to plague southeast Michigan.

And the National Weather Service, in a 30-day forecast released last week, predicts a 55 per cent chance of below normal precipitation for the metro Detroit area.

"We're in a severe drought in the lower peninsula, and there's only a slight chance that we'll receive any significant precipitation in the near future," said Walt Fitzgerald, meteorological technician for the National Weather Service in Ann Arbor. Fitzgerald said, since April 1 the normal rainfall for metro Detroit is 9.94 inches, but the region has only received 3.55 inches.

And he warns, "don't expect rain any time soon, because it looks like we won't get any rain for at least the

next 72 to 120 hours."

Northville Township Supervisor Georgina Goss said at this point there are no water problems confronting the township, but if there is no rain for 30 days she cannot predict what will happen.

"So far there have been no complaints (about water pressure) and there is no ban," Goss said. "But we still expect our residents to use common sense and so far they have been reasonable in monitoring the water situation."

Goss added, however, that 65 per cent of the Northville residents who use city water may feel the "crunch" if the drought continues. She has indicated she would not be surprised if some water conservation measures are enacted if the drought lasts for some time.

Despite the severity of the drought of 1988, lawns in Northville Township

Fire on county land put out

The Northville Township Fire Department battled a stubborn fire on the former Wayne County Child Development Center grounds Tuesday night. The fire, located in a large pile of rubble next to one of the center's buildings, appeared to have been deliberately set, according to Assistant Fire Chief Rick Rosselle.

Firemen responded to the blaze just after 9 p.m. Tuesday. They were able to confine it to a four foot by ten foot pile of debris lying outside the old power station, located off of a service

drive that connects with Sheldon Road.

Firemen hosed down the outside of the two story building but Rosselle said the fire was never in danger of spreading. A concrete slab underneath the blaze prevented flames from spreading to nearby dry grass.

"It was a pile that started around four feet high and burned down to about two and a half feet," Rosselle said. "It had just about anything you can imagine in it."

Firemen had difficulty getting to the fire, which was started underneath a large pile of old metal

filing cabinets. Rosselle said the fire department has responded to at least eight fires in the same location in the last several years, all believed to have been started by youths who frequent the area.

Firemen last responded to a fire near the power station about six months ago, Rosselle said.

Two firefighters reported stinging sensations in their eyes due to what is believed to have been burning plastic in the large pile of junk.

Several firefighters also reported smelling a horrendous or gas smell near the blaze.

Wayne County voters will face millage for impaired students

Supporters have six weeks to convince Wayne County voters a tax increase is needed to benefit programs for mentally and physically impaired students.

But they admit it won't be easy.

The 1-mill tax increase request, doubling the current county special education tax, will face voters during the Aug. 2 primary. (For more information on the request, see related story.) To succeed, however, the measure needs to overcome several obstacles, including:

• A similar, though better-publicized 1-mill tax increase proposed for Wayne County jails.

• Voter uncertainty over proposals being debated in the state Legislature that would shift the burden of school support from property to sales taxes.

• Anti-tax sentiment exhibited in some school districts, like Plymouth-Canton where a recent Headlee override proposal was rejected by voters.

• Lack of public enthusiasm from superintendents in the district's 34 public school districts.

• A short campaign season. The Wayne County Intermediate School District only decided to seek the tax increase in March, giving supporters less than five months to sell the proposal to voters.

Supporters, however, believe they can overcome all obstacles if they could forge a network of special education parents.

"Parents are going to have to do it," millage supporter Robert Redden said. "They're the ones who are interested in this more than anything else."

Redden, a Plymouth resident and Lincoln Park elementary school principal, is also the parent of a special education student in Plymouth Canton Community Schools.

A strong emotional appeal will be used.

"The campaign calls for people who will emotionally buy in to the special education program," said Jerry Montecillo, Taylor superintendent of schools, another member of the millage support task force.

The Wayne County Intermediate

School District, which proposed the tax increase, is targeting parents and special education teachers.

"We're dealing with the directors of special ed and the parents and handicapped groups within those communities," Intermediate schools spokeswoman Katherine Mathey said. "Those seem to be the people who know where the positive voters are."

Supporters also say local schools will face severe budget cuts, some even to the point of bankruptcy, if the proposal isn't passed.

Currently, they said, school districts are forced to divert money from their general operating budgets to support regional special education programs because state grants and taxes aren't covering program costs.

One-fifth of all operating costs are accounted for by "charge backs" to individual school districts, Mathey said.

The 1-mill increase would double taxes currently paid for special education. The initial 1-mill special education tax was approved by coun-

ty voters in 1974.

Under federal law, public school districts are responsible to provide programming for mentally and physically impaired students from birth through age 26.

Wayne County's special education population includes 6,000 "low incidence" students — students with severe retardation or severe physical handicaps or a combination of disabilities.

Programs for some of these students are provided in their homes, but most are based, often at great expense, to regional centers.

Programs can't be cut, supporters said.

"There's no option to look at these programs and cut them back," special education consultant David Soebbing said. "You're going to be paying for it one way or another."

Nor can programs be consolidated.

"We did a very exhaustive study of all the center programs (between 1982-84) and we looked at each and every one of the center programs," Mathey said. "As a result of that we

did consolidate some center programs. But we're now to a point where we feel we've done as much as we can do."

The 36 centers are operated within 14 districts, including Livonia, Wayne-Westland, Garden City, Redford Union and Southfield.

As to the obstacles, supporters are being optimistic.

"We don't know whether the jail

millage is to our advantage or disadvantage," Mathey said. "It may be that people would vote no on the jail and yes for special ed but who knows?"

"I think we can demonstrate there is a need and I think we can demonstrate we've done all we can. We've got our facts and figures. I think our rationale is a sound one."

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NEWS BRIEFS

WATER HEARING DATE SET — The Northville Township board set a public hearing date of Thursday, July 14, at 7 p.m. for the Phillips/Smock/Pierson water main special assessment district.

The public hearing date had to be rescheduled after the township board mistakenly advertised the public hearing as a sewer main special assessment district.

An unidentified township resident expressed resentment to township board members for their handling of the situation. "We apologize for the mistake, but you've got to do it by the book," said township clerk Thomas Cook. "We'll have the vote (on the district) that night (July 14)."

DISTRICTS SET, ALMOST — The Northville City Council approved inclusion and exclusion in several special assessment districts for water and sewer service Tuesday night.

The council confirmed the rolls for water and sewer on West Eight Mile, and for water and sewer in the second (southern) part of the Northville Estates subdivision. Since a public hearing on the issue June 20, several Northville Estates residents opted into the district, City Manager Steve Walters said.

Although the deadline for making a decision was June 30, the city will still allow people in the process of buying a Northville Estates home into the districts.

TAX BILLS ANNOUNCED — The treasurer's department of Northville Township has announced that township tax bills will be out by the end of the week. The bills, due out by the first part of July, have been delayed slightly because of a computer problem in Wayne County. The bills will be out within a day or two but taxpayers have until the middle of September to pay them.

LICENSE TRANSFER APPROVED — The Northville City Council Tuesday approved the transfer of a Class C liquor license from the owners of the now-closed Elizabeth's restaurant to the establishment's new owners.

The restaurant has been bought by the people who operate Ristorante de Maria in West Bloomfield. When ownership of a licensed premise changes hands, the state Liquor Control Commission must approve the license transfer.

Although the final authority for a transfer rests with the LCC, local approval is required for the transfer to occur. The council approved this request 5-0.

NEW WATER MAIN IN PROCESS — The wheels have been set in motion for a new, larger water main extending down Center Street to serve the new St. Lawrence Estates condominium development.

The condo development is planned for the area southwest of Seven Mile and Center, on the site of the old St. Lawrence horse barns. The existing city water main down Center is considered too small to adequately serve the new development, especially in case of a fire.

The City Council Tuesday requested the city administration to begin the paperwork required to set up a special assessment district to fund the new main.

State funds still held from cities

The Michigan House recently passed a bill which attempts to give 38 local governments around the state, including Northville Township, an additional \$3.6 million in revenue sharing money.

The passage of the House bill comes one week after the Senate voted to restore the money to municipalities who showed a mid-decade population increase of at least 15 percent.

The legislation has since moved into a conference committee, comprised of three house and three senate members, who will attempt to work out a compromise package.

"Each of these communities conducted a special mid-decade census to prove that it had a substantial increase in population since the 1980 census," said State Representative Gerald Law (R-Plymouth). "Because of the growth they qualified for additional state revenue sharing payments."

According to State Senator Robert Geake (R-Northville), Northville Township has increased by 17.1 percent since the 1980 census and qualifies for additional funds of \$97,000.

Geake said that Governor James Blanchard vetoed last year's revenue-sharing payments because "he needed to cut the funds to balance the budget."

He added this year's budget includes adequate funds to allow the senate to appropriate the money to make the payments, and he expects the governor to ask house Democrats

to approve the money if it is available.

Law said through the house passage of the payments, the state is one step closer to making the

payments that it owes to its communities.

"The state has a moral obligation to pay these funds and I hope that the governor will not turn his back on our

local communities again with another veto," Law said. "He has been sitting on this bankroll of \$3.6 million for a year now. It is time to stop playing unfair fiscal games."

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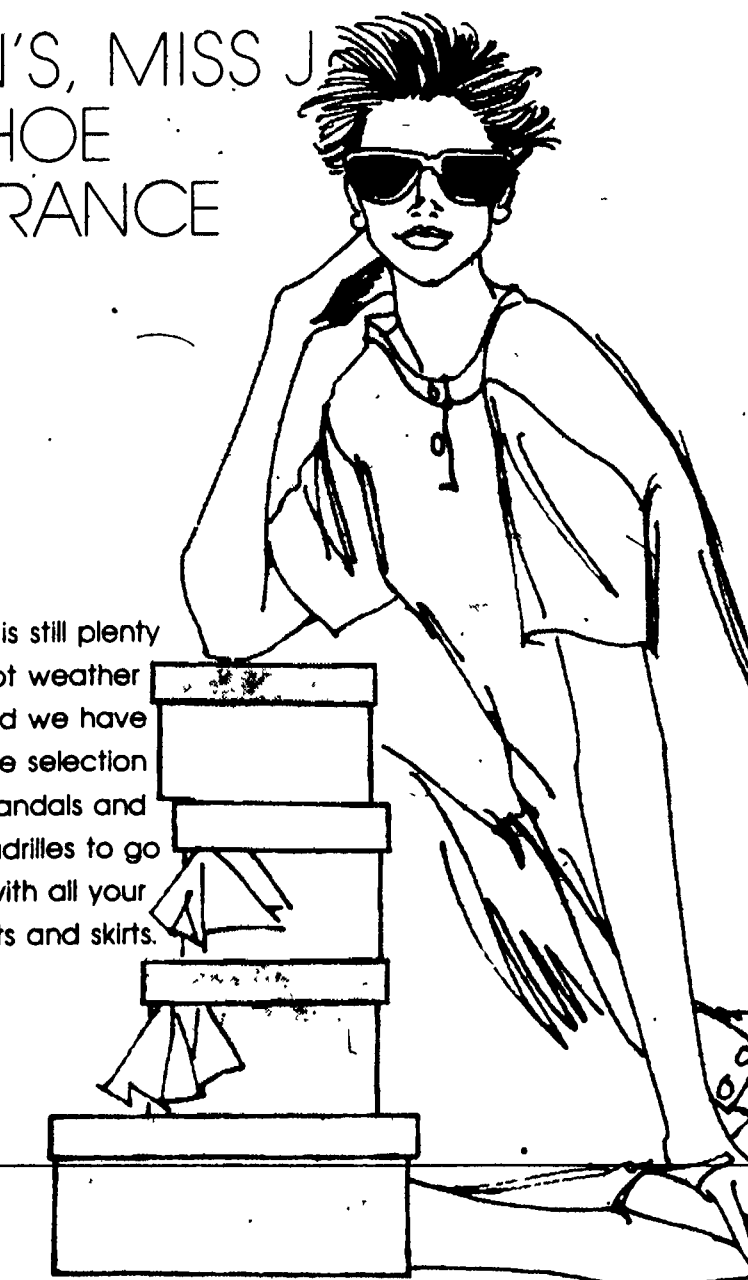
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Police Blotters

Three in township cited for driving under influence

DRUNK DRIVER ARREST — A Northville resident was issued a ticket for operating a motor vehicle under the influence of liquor last Tuesday.

A township police officer observed the driver in excess of the posted 45 mph speed limit, while travelling eastbound on Seven Mile Road near Haggerty.

The officer reported after pulling the vehicle over, he noted a strong odor of intoxicants coming from inside the car. He asked the driver to exit the vehicle and the driver had problems with field sobriety tests, according to the township police report.

A preliminary breath test showed a blood alcohol level of .22 percent.

Police issued the driver a citation OUIL and he posted a \$100 bond and was released.

TIRE RIP-OFF — Northville Township Police reported two Goodyear Eagle tires and rims were taken from the right hand side of an automobile parked outside of a residence on Northville Place last Wednesday.

According to the police report, the complainant stated that sometime between 11:30 p.m. on June 30 and 6:30 a.m. on July 1 the tires, worth \$400, were stolen off of a 1987 Ford Escort.

On that same evening, police reported two Eagle tires and rims were stolen from the left hand side of

a car belonging to different residents of Northville Place.

Police report nothing else but the tires were taken from the 1986 Ford Escort, which were also valued at \$400.

Currently there are no suspects, witnesses, or evidence in the case, according to the township police report.

TWO CAR COLLISION — A Northville Township resident was issued a citation for failing to yield while making a left turn, in connection with an accident last Wednesday.

The collision, which took place on Haggerty Road, occurred when the driver of a vehicle making a left turn

from Meljer's struck a vehicle going southbound on Haggerty.

Neither driver was injured in the mishap.

HIT AND RUN DRUNK DRIVING — A Northville Township resident was issued tickets last Wednesday for operating a motor vehicle under the influence of liquor and leaving the scene of a property damage accident, according to a township police report.

The driver of the vehicle drove up and over a curb, striking a yield sign, on the corner of Farmcrest and Winchester Roads.

A preliminary blood test showed a blood alcohol level of .29 percent.

Anything above .10 percent is legally drunk.

The man was given a citation for OUIL and leaving the scene of a property damage accident. He was released on \$100 bond and faces a August 4 court date.

DRUNK DRIVING ARREST — A Northville Township resident was ticketed for operating under the influence of liquor last Saturday, according to a township police report.

Police observed the vehicle, which was travelling northbound on Sheldon Road, to be going 55 mph in a 45 mph zone, then saw the vehicle go left of the center lane and then onto and over the white shoulder.

Police reported they pulled vehicle over and advised the driver of his rights, but the driver would take a chemical test.

The driver was given a citation OUIL and was released on \$100 bond.

FOURTH FIRE — City firefighters extinguished a small fire Monday which was caused by a bottle rocket in the ashes, Allen said.

A city resident smelled smoke next to a garage. The firefighter didn't have any trouble putting fire out, and they found a bottle rocket in the ashes, Allen said.

There was no significant damage, he said.

Wayne County commissioners settle on proposal to end debt

Wayne County is seeking a state loan of up to \$120 million plus authorization to issue up to \$100 million in bonds in an effort to put its massive debt to rest — once and for all.

County commissioners agreed Tuesday to seek the loan and bond issue, continuing a process that began in December.

Then, the state Legislature approved a series of measures, most notably a cigarette tax increase, designed to help the debt-ridden county balance its budget and pay off past debts.

County debts are listed at \$217 million.

The county's cigarette tax allotment will be used to pay off the bonds, while the loan could be interest-free.

"It could be interest free if the county shows financial responsibility," said F. Thomas Lewand of Jaffe,

Snider, Raitt and Heuer, the private firm hired by the county to assist with the application process.

Financial responsibility, Lewand said, includes demonstrated ability to produce a series of balanced county budgets.

The emergency loan program has been used by debt-ridden communities, including Highland Park and Benton Harbor, though the county loan is believed to be one of the largest in state history.

The county is petitioning the state's emergency financial assistance loan board for the loan. The three-member board includes state treasurer Robert Bowman, budget director Shelby Solomon and commerce department director Douglas Ross.

Another body, the state administrative board, would approve

bonds because of the county's debt-ridden status.

That board includes representatives of the state's highest elected officials including Governor James Blanchard, Attorney General Frank Kelley and Secretary of State Richard Austin, among others.

In addition to approval from the respective state bodies, the loan and bond issue must also be formally authorized by the county commission.

County debt includes an accumulated deficit of \$135 million, much of it for health care, plus more than \$50 million yet to be paid from a 1984 agreement with the state that

unsuccessfully sought to eliminate county debt. The \$217 million figure also includes this year's projected health-care debt, plus costs involved in issuing the bonds and applying for the loan.

The bonds will be part of a massive state bond bank July issue. The county is using the bond bank, instead of a private firm, to save interest costs.

Wayne County's once-shaky financial reputation is improving, Lewand said, in part because of a five-year solvency program that was also presented to the commission Tuesday.

Selling the bonds should prove no trouble, county officials said. Bonds

are set to be issued July 22.

Area commissioners Kay Beard, D-Inkster; Susan Heintz, R-Northville Township, and Milton Mack, D-Wayne voted to approve seeking the bonds and the loan. Beard's district includes Westland and Garden City. Heintz' district includes Livonia, Plymouth and Plymouth Township. Mack's district includes Canton Township. Commissioner Richard Manning, D-Redford Township, was absent.

Though commissioners also approved the solvency plan, the noted rising health care costs doomed the 1984 agreement and warned they could do so again.

"That's the single most frightening aspect," said commission chairman Arthur Carter, D-Detroit.

Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara recently announced the county expects to save \$13 million in health care costs this year, especially with the expected Oct. 1 introduction of a health maintenance organization (HMO) for needy county residents.

While they applauded the HMO concept, commissioners said they were skeptical \$13 million could be saved.

"We're praying for that," commissioner George Cushingberry, D-Detroit, said.

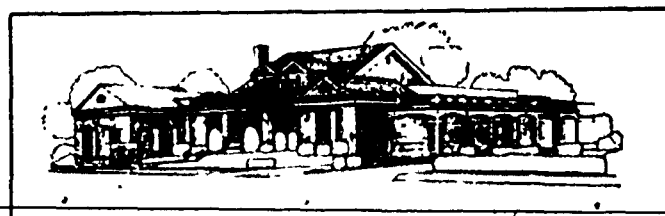

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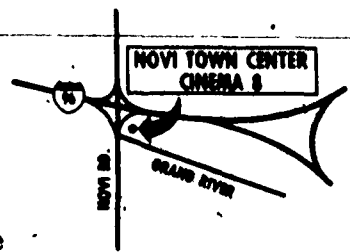
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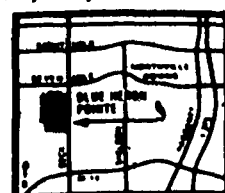

Black's to move into D & C site

The D & C store on Main Street will leave Northville this fall to make room for an expanded Black's Hardware store.

Gerry Dodds, the Realtor who handled the leasing arrangements, announced the move last week. The D & C lease expires Oct. 1, and hardware store co-owner Donna Black said the new operation should be in place around Nov. 1. No tenant is yet set for the current Black's site, she said.

D & C Manager Betty Steele said the company would like to stay in Northville and is looking for another site. The store has been in Northville for 31 years, beginning at a location a few doors west of the present one.

The company is seeking a new site downtown, but the prospects do not look good, Steele said. "They have been looking, but they would want to stay in town and they would want as much space as we have now," she said.

Dodds said that economics forced D & C's move out. "Rates in Northville have gone up and they couldn't afford it," she said. "D & C were excellent tenants... It's just that Northville prices have gone beyond them."

Black's Hardware has been too large for its current location for a long time, Donna Black said. The store has been in Northville for 15 years.

"We've thought about it for years. We've been waiting for something to open up."

"We've thought about it for years. We've been waiting for something to open up," Black said. The move will almost double the store's space, from 3,000 square feet to nearly 6,000, she said.

"We're thinking of just taking what we have and spreading it out. You can't even see what we've got, it's so crowded," she said.

"We've got a couple weeks worth of work to do there (before moving in)," Black said. "It's going to be difficult to move all that stuff." She asked that Black's customers bear with the store during the move.

There are currently a couple of options for new tenants for the present Black's building, she said, but nothing is settled yet.

If the D & C store does shut down completely the current staff will be laid off, but right now that only means Steele, one other full-timer and several part-time student workers. "So right now it will not be too bad," she said.



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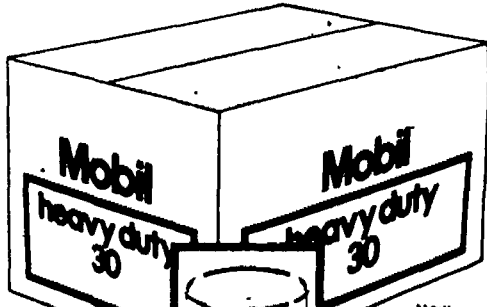
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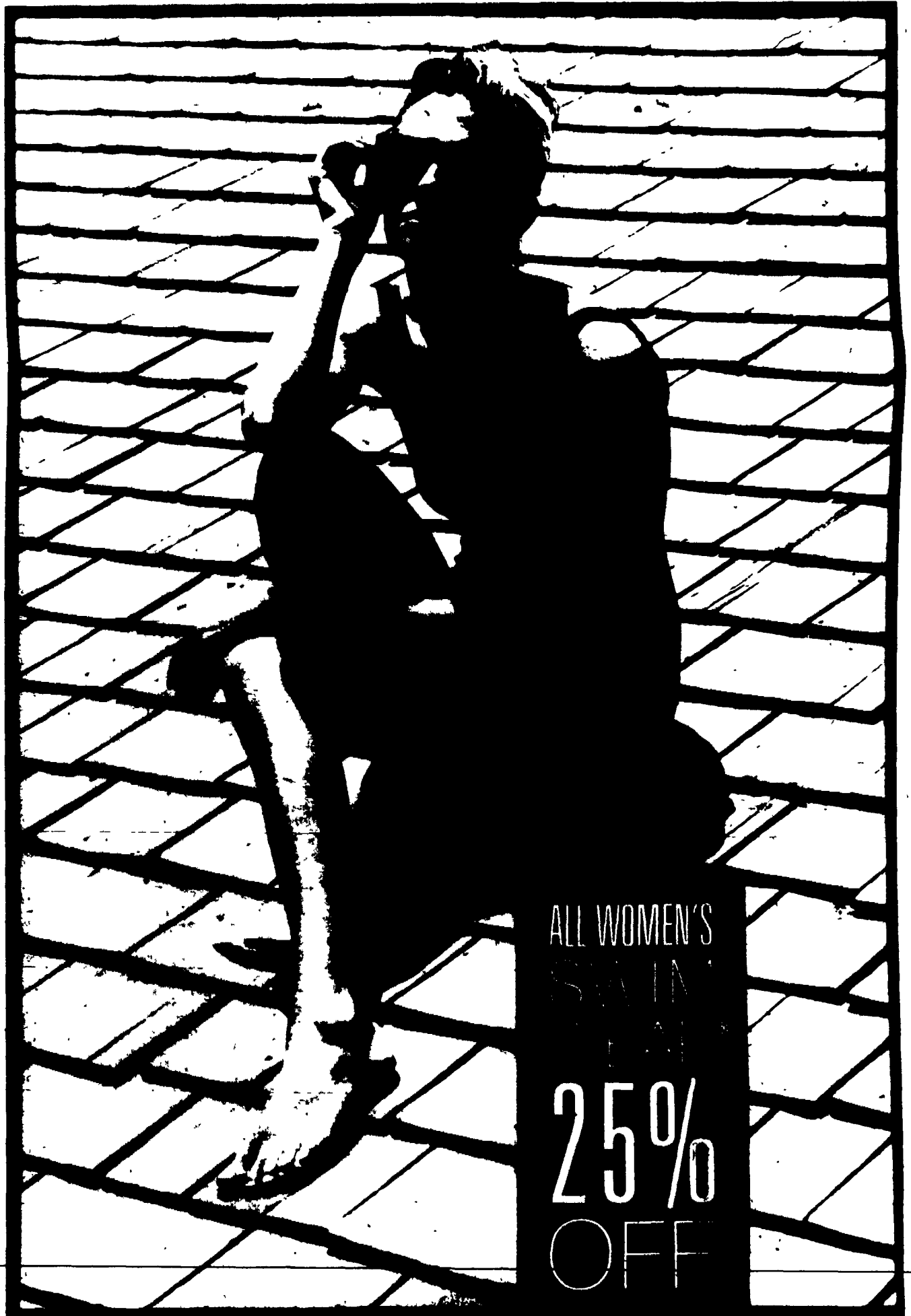
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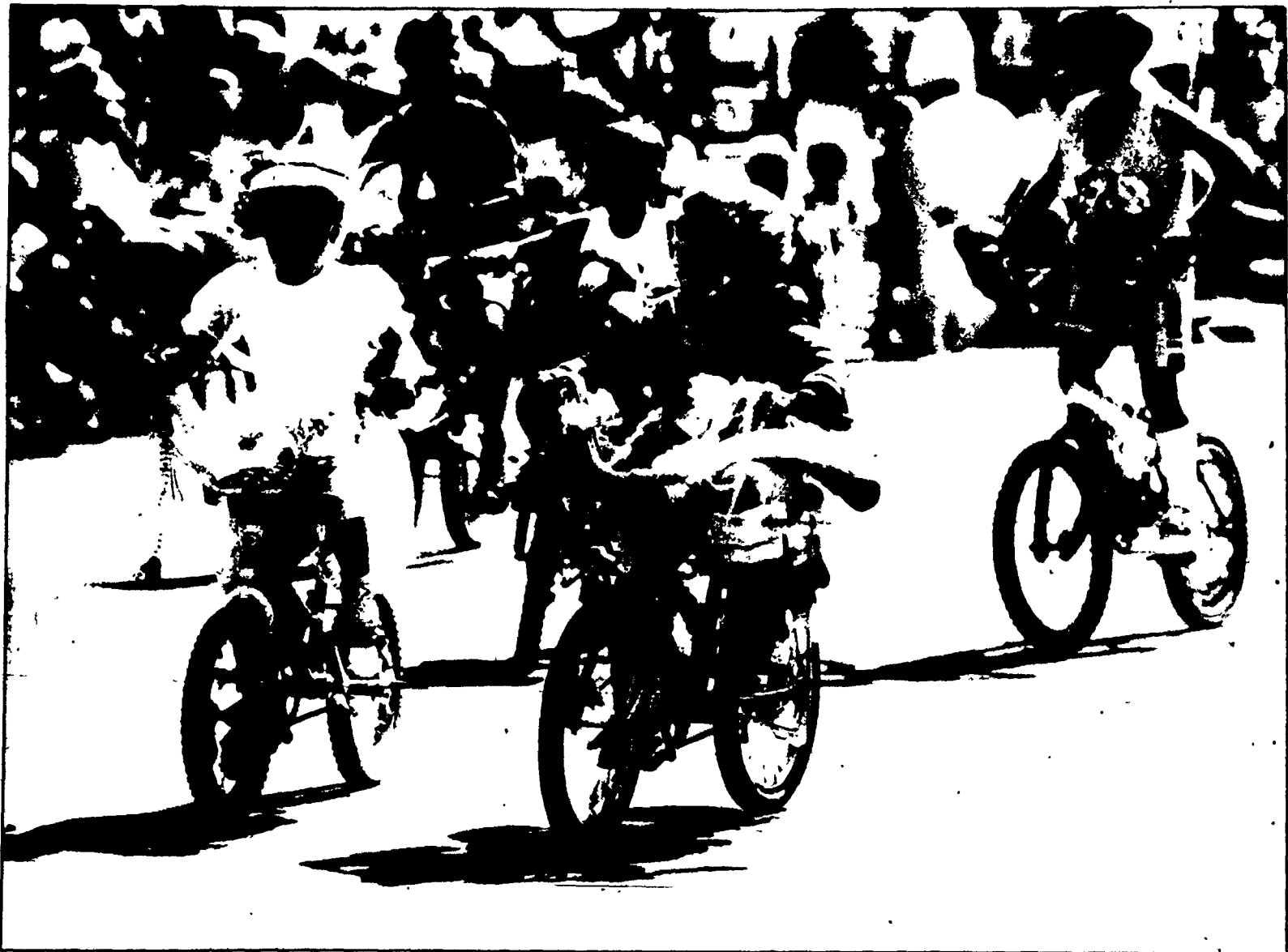

The Plymouth / Salem Rockettes were named the best marching group in the senior division. The Spiriters Baton and Cheerleading Group won the junior division.

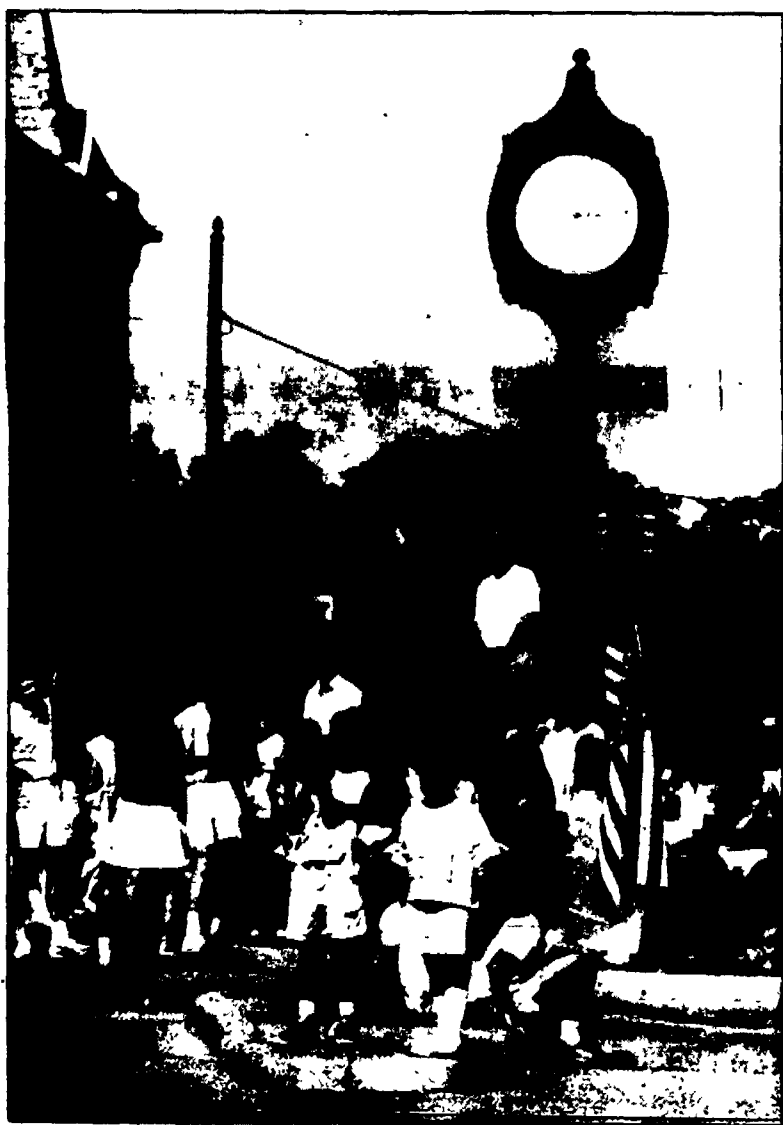
The Roamers and Clowns of America won an award as a special group.

Pond questions close to answers

The Singh Development Company has offered to pay \$5,000 to restore the condition of a pond off Taft and Eight Mile roads, and the offer may clear the way for a resolution to the pond's future.

The pond has been an issue for several months, since residents at a public hearing over Singh's Pheasant Hills development said the construction had filled in the pond and the creek running through the area.

Singh Vice President Michael Kahn said the company would repair whatever damage it caused. After the completion of an engineering report on how to fix the pond, the issue came back before the City Council for consideration. Last month Singh firm-uped the offer to \$5,000 based on two contractors' estimates.

"He's not raising an issue about other sources of sediment, although

there were some," City Manager Steve Walters said at a council meeting last month.

The offer, as well as the entire situation of the pond and the Randolph Drain, is currently under consideration of the Lexington Condo Homes Association, which owns the land on which the pond lies. The engineering report said the dam at the south end of the pond also needs attention, and at a council meeting members of the association said they might try to get the Oakland County Drain Commission to take over the waterway as a county drain.

One question is whether the drain commission will assume the drain if the pond remains.

The issue is scheduled to return to the City Council at its next meeting, Monday, July 18, possibly for a permanent resolution to all the issues.

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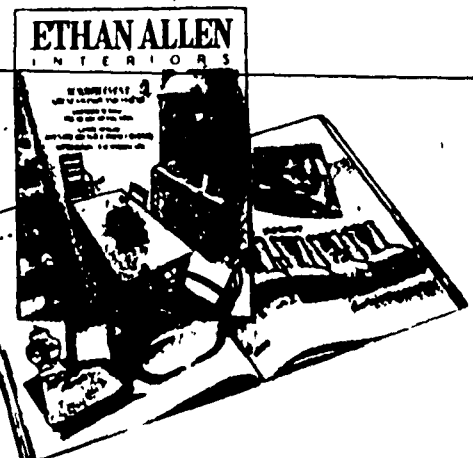

son," Sanderson said. He added the Northville Township police have been very cooperative in providing the state police with the proper documentation, even though the investigations are completely independent of each other.

Paros, however, said he is skeptical about the impact of the state police in solving the case, since there has been little progress so far by either the Northville police or NRPH officials.

"The place where John's body was found is literally a stone's throw from

Capt. Presnell's office," Paros said. "There was a three-day lapse from the day he (Zeleps) escaped, to it being reported. So far Presnell hasn't done diddy crap on this case because I haven't even gotten a report on it."

Presnell said the police department is involved in so many cases, that a lack of overtime and staff have made it difficult to move quickly on this investigation.

Paros said he has had two meetings with NRPH Director Walter Brown, but still has not received a copy of the hospital's report on the incident. He added recent attempts to contact Brown have

been unsuccessful.

Brown was unavailable for comment. Repeated attempts to contact him were unsuccessful.

"He's been antagonistic and never calls us," Paros said. "He's accused us of giving him the third degree, but all we want is for Brown to come forth with a dossier on what happened."

Paros said his brother-in-law had a history of schizophrenia for the past 18 years, and frequently escaped from psychiatric hospitals during his visits. He added Zeleps held a job as district manager for the Detroit

News in the downriver area, but was placed in NRPH on February 3, after being found wandering in Grosse Ile.

Paros said in previous escapes, Zeleps was found in Arizona or New Mexico, and definitely knew how to handle himself. He added that's what makes him being found in a field not far from the hospital so odd.

"We want to know what he was doing in the clearing," he continued. "John did run away, but only when he had a (hospital) ground pass. This time though, he did not have a ground pass."

"All we want is answers."

Livonia residents oppose rezoning

Livonia residents are voicing their concern over the proposed rezoning of the Oasis Golf Center, located at 39500 Five Mile Road east of Haggerty. And they're voicing that concern in Northville.

The rezoning request was submitted by J.D. Blain and Co., who plan to develop an office complex on the golf course site. The land, which is currently zoned residential on the north side and business on the south side, would have to be completely changed to office space.

Homeowners of the Quakertown subdivision, which backs up to the golf course protested the rezoning at a recent Northville Township planning commission meeting.

Although the residents live in Livonia, the golf course is situated in Northville Township.

Andrew MacMillan, a resident of Quakertown, said he is fundamentally against the rezoning until the developer comes forth with some information on the project.

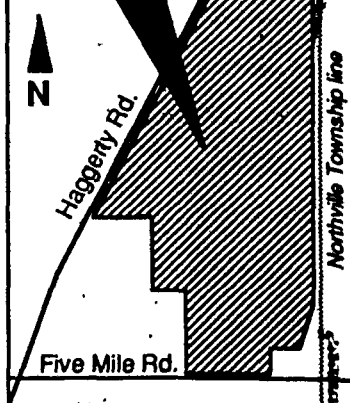
MacMillan said he is concerned about the conformity of an office building with the Quakertown subdivision, and what impact an increase in traffic would have on Haggerty Road.

"We also need a commitment from the developer that what he shows the planning commission he does in fact do," he added.

But, James Blain, owner of J.D. Blain & Co., said he purchased an additional 22 acres of land north of Quakertown and has been working with subdivision residents in an attempt to use the land for a berm. Blain also said he intends to put in a one-story building, even though he is allowed to construct a two-story structure.

"I am trying to put in a 50 foot

berm, when I am only required to put in a six-inch wall," he added. "I initiated talking to the residents, and I am putting in the berm only as a courtesy to them."

"First of all, the (Oasis Golf Center) land is zoned office space in the Northville Township master plan, so residents should have thought about getting angry two or three years ago," Blain said. "I am beginning to get irritated at being portrayed as a bad guy, because I can put in a two-story building and a six-inch wall and I don't have to talk to the residents at all."

A planning commission vote on the rezoning will take place at the July 26 meeting, as the issue was delayed to allow Blain the opportunity to resolve issues raised by Quakertown residents.

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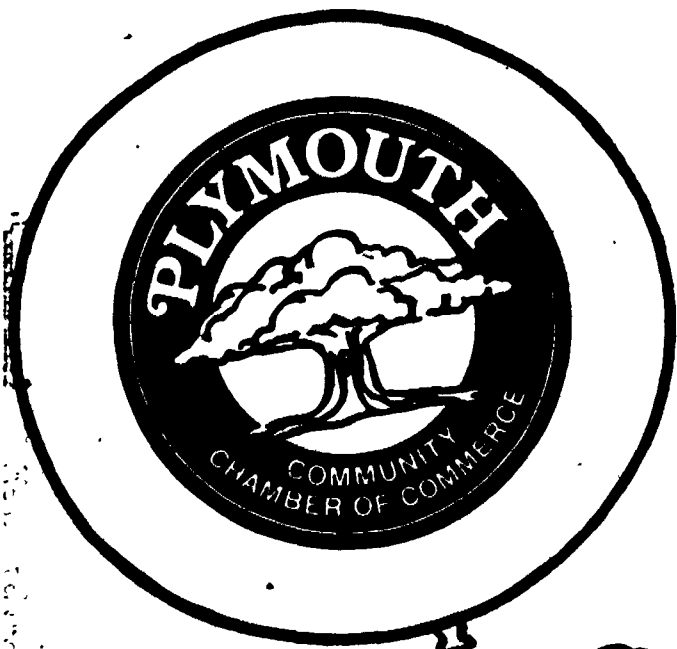
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Rules will move quickly

Northville Township officials said the proposed woodlands ordinance, which will go before the planning commission at a special meeting July 12, should move toward adoption quickly.

If adopted, the ordinance "will be looking to protect the woodlands within the township," said Linda Lemke, a landscape architect with the firm of Brandon Rogers & Associates. The firm was hired as a consultant to assist the beautification committee in drafting the ordinance.

Northville Township Supervisor Georgina Goss said two members of the planning commission sat in on the ad hoc committee so that the commission would be familiar with the ordinance when it was completed.

"We encouraged the beautification committee to go forth with the woodland ordinance and we worked with them to form an ad hoc committee, so that when the ordinance is ready we should move it forward quickly," Goss said.

"The whole Township Board of Trustees supports a woodlands or-

dinance, and it is in character with Northville Township," Goss said.

She added the township is developing at such a rapid rate that the sooner the Board of Trustees acts to conserve the natural resources, the better off everyone will be.

"We don't have time to wait (to pass the woodland ordinance)," Goss said. "Once the sewers are put in the woodland ordinance will already be in place. We've decided to conserve now, rather than play catch-up at a later date."

Beautification Chairperson Catherine Sellas said she is not disappointed the ordinance was tabled at the planning commission's June 28 meeting until the July 12 special meeting.

"I was expecting exactly what happened because the commissioners need time to review the ordinance and go through it page by page," Sellas continued.

She said the proposed woodlands ordinance is mainly patterned after a similar ordinance passed last year in Novi.

"We looked at woodland ordinances from West Bloomfield and

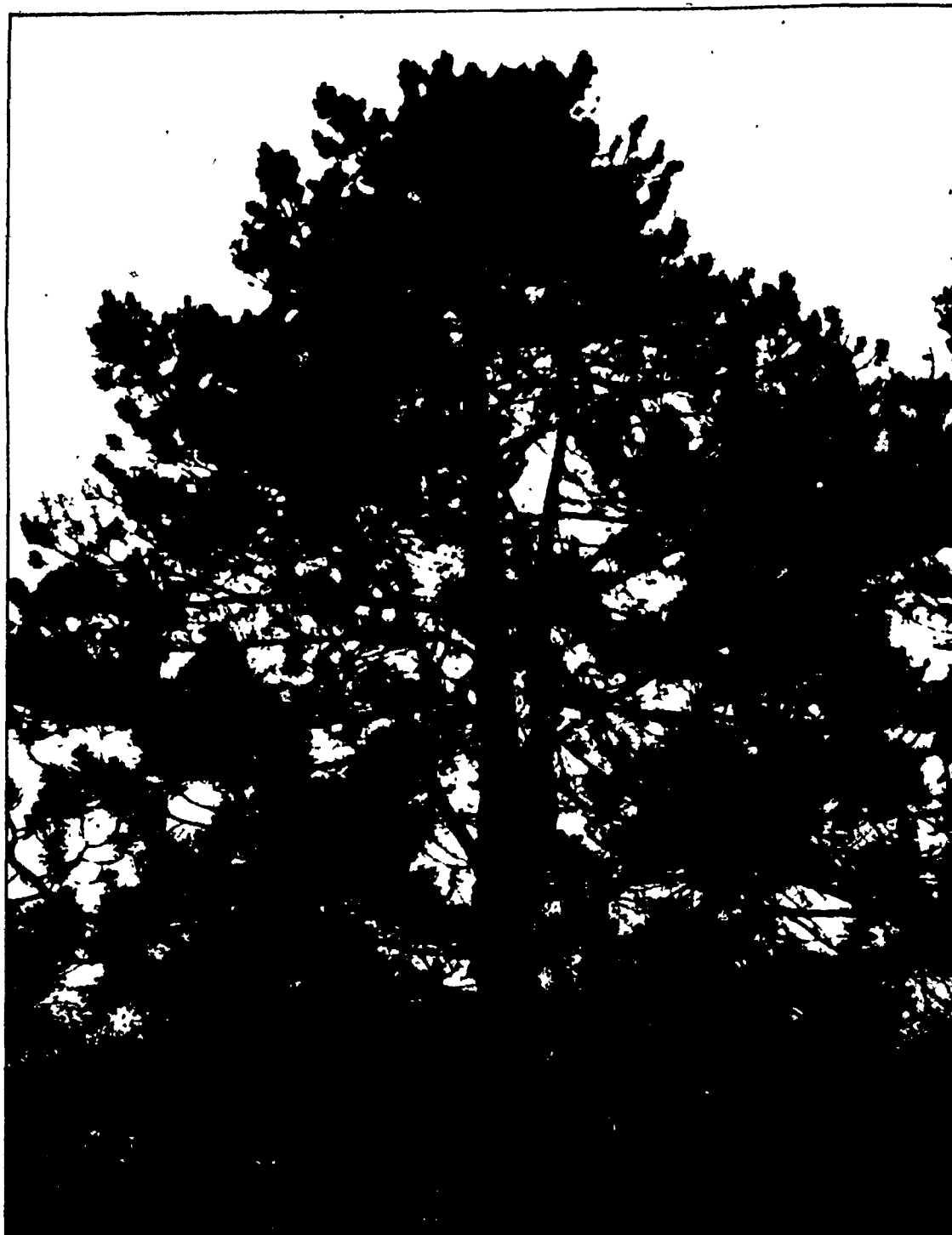
DeWitt, but we definitely looked at Novi the closest," Sellas said. "However, we did not take it intact, we made it more applicable to Northville Township."

Sellas said the purpose of the ordinance is to let developers know that they can't take all the trees down in the township. "We feel the woodlands ordinance is necessary because considering the character of the township is its hills and trees, we want to keep its countryish character."

Although the beautification committee and Township Board appear ready to see action on the woodlands ordinance, planning commission members said they intend to go through the ordinance thoroughly before making a recommendation.

"We must be totally clear as to how this ordinance fits with us (planning commission) and how it applies to us," said Commissioner Marvin Gans.

Commissioner Jerry Chisnell said many questions need to be answered about the ordinance, but there is a need to move fast on the ordinance as many woodland lots are ready to be developed.

Heather Hopkins, a recent graduate in forestry from Michigan State University, has completed a preliminary woodlands map. She is currently working on the finalized version which should be done by the end of August.

Hopkins said the purpose of a woodlands map is "to give people in the township the knowledge of where the woodlands are and to show the developers which areas to stay out of."

She added that although a woodlands map is not a necessary feature of a woodlands ordinance, it can be an advantage. "The

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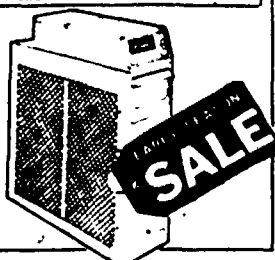
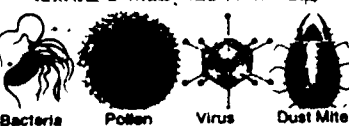

The game raised \$3,200 to benefit the Northville Recreation Community Park Fund. Close to 2,000 people showed up on the Northville Athletic field to watch the game.

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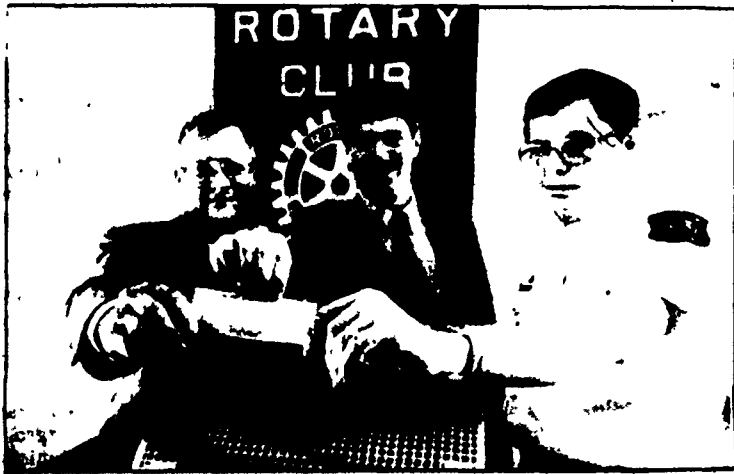

City closes year with amendments

In preparation for the end of the fiscal year June 30, the Northville City Council last week adopted several amendments to the current year's budget to balance out the books.

The state requires the budget amendments to the city's various funds at the end of the year. The council made the changes at a special meeting Tuesday, June 28.

The city's general fund required the most changes, although other funds were also amended, many for bookkeeping reasons.

Many of the general fund amendments were less than \$10,000.

Taken overall, the amendments to the general fund leave it in slightly better shape than anticipated in the 1988-89 budget the council recently adopted. The amendments anticipate a year-end surplus of \$70,850 to carry over to next year, and next year's adopted budget plans for only \$65,200. City Manager Steve Walters said the actual figure would probably be slightly more than the \$70,850 figure, but that a cushion is useful in case an audit turns up an unpaid bill or other missed expense.

Among the larger amendments to the general fund were:

- A decrease of \$63,950 in surplus from the 1988-87 year. The surplus was reduced after the annual audit.
- An increase of \$56,000 in revenue from overhead reimbursement. A note explains the increased overhead was due to more employees, including those in shared service between the city and township.
- Current-year taxes were \$54,000 above the budget figure.
- Interest earnings were \$30,000 more than budgeted.
- The city's share of revenues from the 35th District Court was \$16,000 less than expected because of a

- decrease in drunk driving enforcement, a note states.
- Fire Department administration was \$36,000 less than expected, while Police Department administration was \$36,000 more.
- Maintenance of City Hall was \$19,000 less than the budgeted \$103,900.
- Costs of insurance and bonds were \$16,000 more than expected.
- Refuse collection costs were \$14,000 above the budget figure of \$158,300.

The amendments passed the council 3-0.

while to set up the accounts, and obviously the governor hasn't signed (the bill) yet," McDonald said.

After passage and signing of the bill, the next step is for the DNR to get contracts out to the grant communities. That could happen around the end of this summer, McDonald said. Then the communities have the land appraised and try to negotiate a sale with the land owner. If they reach agreement, only then is the money released.

The Northville grant is for \$123,000 or 75 percent of the sale price of the land, whichever is less. A preliminary estimate by a Northville

Township employee put the cost at \$168,000, which would leave \$45,000 for the recreation department to provide.

A May 9 memo from Recreation Director John Anderson states that the department has more than enough to make a \$45,000 match in a

park fund. Much of the fund money is from a \$1.50 park surcharge on every recreation registration taken.

Lapham Field is off the north side of Six Mile Road west of Beck Road. The site is currently nine acres, featuring four soccer fields, but the grant request is to try to buy 28 acres,

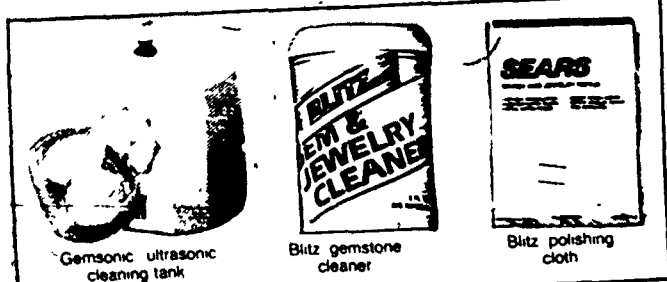
the memo states.

The Northville Community Recreation Plan adopted in 1986 emphasizes the popularity of soccer in the area. "Acquisition will insure continued long-range recreation use by the community and will allow the Recreation Department to improve the Lapham Field site without the fear that the lease may someday be terminated," the plan reads.

The Northville grant recommendation is part of a \$20.1 million recommendation for spending trust fund money. \$15.3 million of the total is for land acquisition, with the rest recommended for development. The fund includes dedicated money from oil and gas royalties on state-owned land.

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Local writer hears words come to life

For somebody who was anxious to quit the world of employment, Edith Dunbar works awfully hard.

The Northville resident has held down a number of different writing-related jobs in a career which has included an editing post in the downriver Melius newspaper chain, responsibility for the employee newsletter for the old Detroit / Macomb Hospitals Association, and public relations work for a hypnotist.

And while she enjoyed those situations, eventually she grew out of them. "I've done different things," Dunbar said. "As I grew older I thought I'd like to just quit, and I had the convenience of having a husband so I could do that."

Quitting the formal working world did not mean a stop to work, however — it just meant a change to what she really wanted to do: creative writing. Some hard work as a free-lancer has brought her considerable success, most recently including first place in a radio script contest sponsored by WDET-FM, 102.9.

The WDET award is the latest of several honors for Dunbar's plays. But this success was not immediate. "I wasted an awful lot of time writing short stories," Dunbar recalled. "Almost none of her stories sold, although one was accepted by the Buffalo city magazine."

"That was encouraging, and I have since done a radio play and a stage play on that story," Dunbar said. "I tried a mystery novel — an utter flop," she said.

The Red Door Players in Detroit had performed a one-act play Dunbar wrote "years ago," she said, and the Performance Network in Ann Arbor has performed a staged reading of a two-act. "That was really thrilling. The play had all kinds of nice things said about it."

She also nearly had a play produced at the Attic Theater in Detroit, but the project was cancelled for reasons unknown. Clearly, however, people were appreciating her scripts.

"I think what I'm doing now is sticking with what I've had some small success at, and that's plays," Dunbar said. Most recently, it has been radio plays.

Last November she submitted her

first radio play to the Midwest Radio Theater Workshop in Columbia, Missouri, and it won an honorable mention. Last month she sent another to the same place.

"Last December I heard about the WDET contest so I thought, 'Well, I'll just see what I can do there' — and to my surprise and delight, I won," Dunbar said. The contest was judged by John King, owner of John K. King Books; Hal Youngblood of WJR-AM; John Buckstaff, a lecturer at Wayne State University; and Ed Hayman, the Detroit News drama critic.

The play, "The Number Lady," has already been recorded, and is scheduled for broadcast at 4 p.m. July 24 on WDET.

Dunbar said the taping of her own work was exciting to see, although it didn't go off without a hitch. "In this 'Number Lady' play — it's a crazy play. There are two songs in it, 'Rock of Ages' and 'Amazing Grace.' When we got to that part, nobody seemed to know the words," she said.

Fate was with the production, though. Robert James, who does a blues show for WDET, happened to be there, happened to know the words, and happened to be available

to sing a solo. "I was so lucky," Dunbar laughed.

Her success has spurred more contest entries, including one recent play which is her first effort at science fiction. "I hope something keeps happening," she said.

She is supported in her efforts by a group called Detroit Women Writers, and she values the meetings very highly.

"We read our work and get some criticism beyond 'Oh, that's nice,'" Dunbar said. "Sometimes you can come home a little bit discouraged." For example, she was optimistic about a revision of one work, until the members of the group reacted. "I changed it and I think I changed it for the better, but they don't think I've changed it for the better at all," she said.

In any case, Dunbar is writing and finding success, and she feels good about that.

"I think I'm writing now because I write almost every day, and that's when you feel, 'Hey, I'm a writer,'" Dunbar said. "This isn't original, but I think it's true: When you write, you find out who you are."

between now and then," he said.

To get around the requirement that the money go to the track cities, the state legislature could simply amend the racing act, Walters said. And that appears to be what will happen.

Last week, Walters attended a state Senate subcommittee meeting considering the Department of Agriculture budget, which includes the track money. He heard a proposed distribution of the money including \$700,000 to be split between track cities; \$2.3 million for an "agricultural fair improvement program" and \$3 million into the general fund.

The comparable committee in the

House of Representatives has proposed returning none of the money to the cities and increasing the amount for fair development, Walters said.

"Nobody said anything favorable about giving the cities any money" at the committee meeting, Walters said.

Walters said opening the issue of amending the racing act could end up with a different formula for the tax money. In answer to a question he said "there isn't a chance in a million" of the legislature returning all the \$6.6 million to track cities.

Geake agreed that the Legislature is not likely to allot much money — if any — to the track cities.

"It's a very unpopular program among legislators. They feel that

money should be put in the general fund for the benefit of the entire state," Geake said.

"It's just an item in the agriculture budget. The conferees — three from the Senate and three from the House — are looking for a way to fund some programs, and they stumbled across that (reserve). Obviously, they'd like to get it, and I'm trying to keep them

from getting it," Geake said.

At the request of the council members last week, Walters notified officials in other cities with race tracks of the situation. 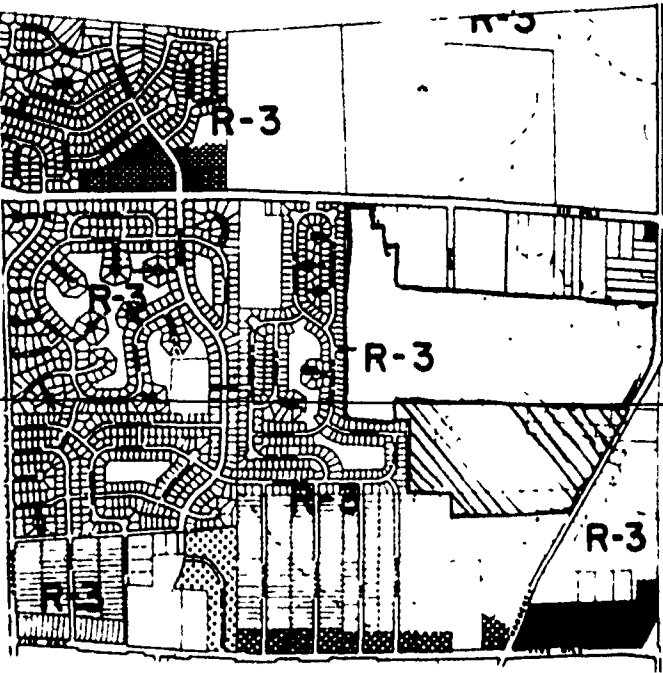

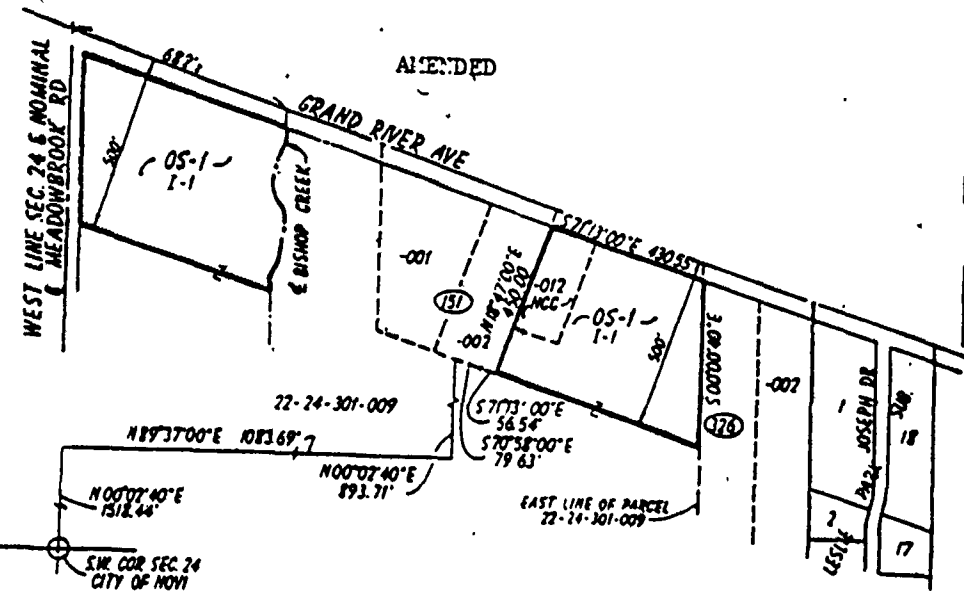

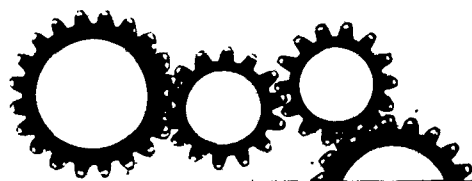

New Main/Center plan is cause for optimism



DEVELOPMENT

It seems that people around town — understandably enough — are being very cautious about their positive reactions to the latest plan for developing the old bowling alley site at the corner of Main and Center.

The reason for the caution is the recent history of the site: ambitious plans being proposed, discussed — and eventually abandoned. In spite of that history, though, there are a few reasons to feel pretty good about the newest plan.

For example, the developer behind this proposal has somewhat deeper pockets than has been the experience in the past. This means the company's investment is much more likely to be carried through to completion, and the main corner of downtown Northville will finally be the complete entity it should be.

But there are more important reasons to feel good about the plan, and they all have to do with the nature of the proposed development.

First, the preliminary sketches show a very attractive building which will mesh very well with the character of the community in general and downtown in particular. Four stories is a big building for this town, but judging from the drawings, the development will not overpower the rest of the area.

Second, this plan includes only one floor of retail space, which is considerably less than in other plans. And odd as it may sound, limiting the retail is probably a good idea. Downtown has been pretty volatile lately, with businesses moving in, moving out or just moving around. There certainly ought to be a market for more retail operations downtown, but if too much space becomes available too quickly the city might see a replay of the Northville Square failure. And the old

Schrader's building is not rented out yet, meaning even more retail space is open in the same area.

Third, including a restaurant in the plan is a great idea. That is one thing for which there is still a tremendous market downtown, to which anyone who likes to go out for lunch can attest. When the restaurant climate is as healthy as it is in Northville, more diversity only adds to the attraction for diners from out of the area.

Finally and most importantly, the inclusion of three floors of apartments is the key to the success of the whole plan. The last proposal, unwisely, had a lot of office space. There is considerable space sitting empty right now — for example, the old Detroit Federal Savings building — and more is expected with the redevelopment of the old Schrader's site. However, this immediate area is short of apartments, and downtown is an excellent attraction for potential renters.

In short, the Singh Development plan for the corner seems to be pressing all the right buttons. Assuming the city and the developer can reach a resolution of the parking issue, the finished product ought to be a real boon to the community.

Revenue-sharing funds are political football

The State of Michigan's well intentioned revenue sharing program, which is apportioned according to a municipality's population, seems to have become this election year's version of a "political football."

Initially, the state told the municipalities of Michigan to conduct a mid-decade census (at their own expense), and if they could prove a population increase of 15 percent, then they would be entitled to additional funds.

Northville Township decided to take advantage of these funds and went ahead and conducted a special census. The entire census cost \$12,000 to hold, and it proved a population increase of 17.1 percent, which should have translated into an additional \$97,000 for the township. The outlay was well worth the potential income. Or so the township had been led to believe.

But last year, when it came time for the state to provide the 38 qualifying municipalities with the additional funds, Governor Blanchard said the state needed the money to balance the budget.

This year, however, legislators have said the money for the revenue sharing payments has already been budgeted. So, what's the delay? Both the Michigan House and Senate passed legislation over two weeks ago, providing for the payments. Now, legislators say the issue is stalled in conference committee, waiting for representatives and senators to agree on the language of the bills.

Stalling this revenue-sharing package has only allowed politicians the opportunity to jockey for position during this year's political season. Legislators both for and against the program have suddenly become martyrs for the plight of the poor municipalities who have been denied their additional funds.

The 38 municipalities who proved the increased population are definitely entitled to the additional funds, and the money has apparently been budgeted. The state legislature should move this package through quickly, so the cities and townships which experienced a population increase can use the funds to bolster their public service departments. After all, an increase in population without an increase in revenue can only mean less services for residents.

Anger may produce health problems

This is another in the continuing series of columns written for the Record by Mary Ellen King, Director of Northville Youth Assistance.

Many of the adolescents that I have interviewed in the last year have a common problem — they are angry!! They are angry at their parents, siblings, school and society in general. It is important for adolescents to learn that anger is a perfectly normal emotion that we all feel from time to time. But failing to recognize and understand anger can lead to serious problems such as:

• Health Problems — These may include high blood pressure, heart problems, headaches, stomach problems, skin disorders, constipation, diarrhea and obesity.

• Tension — Some experts believe that repressing anger (holding it in because you don't know you're angry) is a primary cause of anxiety.

• Accidents — Repressed anger can make a person more likely to have accidents.

• Interpersonal Problems — Anger that's not expressed can disrupt relationships, especially if the angry person becomes hostile, sarcastic, critical, etc.

It is also important that adolescents learn how to manage their anger. Help them RECOGNIZE the anger and admit it. Commonly the adolescent feels ashamed or guilty about it. IDENTIFY the cause. For example, a teenager may be hostile toward their parents when they are really angry at a teacher for not giving them a fair grade on a test.

And DECIDE what to do and follow through. Decide which options will resolve the problem or situation that caused the anger. For example, consider whether a direct expression of anger will do more harm than good. Take positive steps to implement your options.

Teenagers and adults must find constructive ways to express their anger. Physical activities such as tennis, golf, weight lifting and jogging can be an excellent outlet for angry feelings. Rest and relaxation can

help avoid irritability. Meditation, breathing exercises and deep muscular relaxation are good ways to reduce tension that often occurs before an angry outburst. Talking things over can often be the best way to settle problems.

Some Do's: CALM DOWN before you discuss the issues. Shouting matches rarely lead to effective solutions. UNDERSTAND YOUR MOTIVES before you express your anger. Are you trying to defeat the person, or are you trying to solve the problem? If your motive is negative, the results are more likely to be too.

BE ASSERTIVE — not aggressive. Assertive people express themselves firmly and clearly without making insulting remarks. They understand the importance of negotiating and compromising to resolve differences. If your teenager is having trouble communicating his/her anger in a constructive way — SEEK HELP.

Call NYA at 344-1018 for guidance in dealing with an angry child or adolescent. Pent up anger can only lead to more serious problems.

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Township attempts to cope with severe water crunch

generally seem to be in good condition.

In the Northville Commons subdivision, 12 homes were running their sprinklers at the same time, but residents said a lack of water pressure has not been a problem.

"I water my lawn every other day and have had no problem with my water pressure," said Randall Conely, a resident of Northville Commons. He added the drought has had a

small effect on his lawn, but a big effect on his water bill. "Coincidentally, this is the first year that I signed up with a fertilizer company, so it would be foolish not to keep up the lawn, even though the water may cost a fortune," he said.

While some people may be suffering during the drought, the severe lack of water has been a financial bonanza for others.

Jim Jones, owner of Aqua Mist Lawn Sprinkler Systems and Supply in Southgate, was in Northville

Township on a recent afternoon installing a new system. He said his business has been in chaos the entire summer. He added there is a five to six week wait for the installation of a sprinkler system.

"This situation is positive financially, but we simply can't keep up with the demand," Jones said. "We're operating now as if it were the first day of summer, and there is no let up in sight."

Jones said his company is receiving about 30 to 40 per cent more calls

each day than normal for the sprinkler systems, which run between \$2,100 and \$2,600.

"This has definitely been a boost for the sprinkler industry, but this has also been a boost for my insanity," he said.

Yet, while lawns in the township have been able to survive with the help of sprinklers, other foliage not exposed to a regular water cycle have definitely been experiencing problems.

Grass along many roads in Nor-

thville Township and much of the parkland have been burned to a golden brown, and conditions are prime for a grass fire, according to assistant Township Fire Chief Rick Roselle.

"We're having more grass fires than usual and we're running tankers on anything because we don't know what's involved or how it's running," Roselle said.

Roselle said the current water supply is still sufficient to fight a fire, but residents should use common sense

to prevent a major fire from occurring.

He added people should quit smoking outside and stop throwing cigarette butts out of their car windows, as the cigarettes could be carried by the wind and start a major fire.

Roselle citing an example, said the grass fire that occurred last Thursday at Edwards Hines Drive, in which 3 to 4 acres of land was burned, was probably caused by a cigarette butt thrown from a car.

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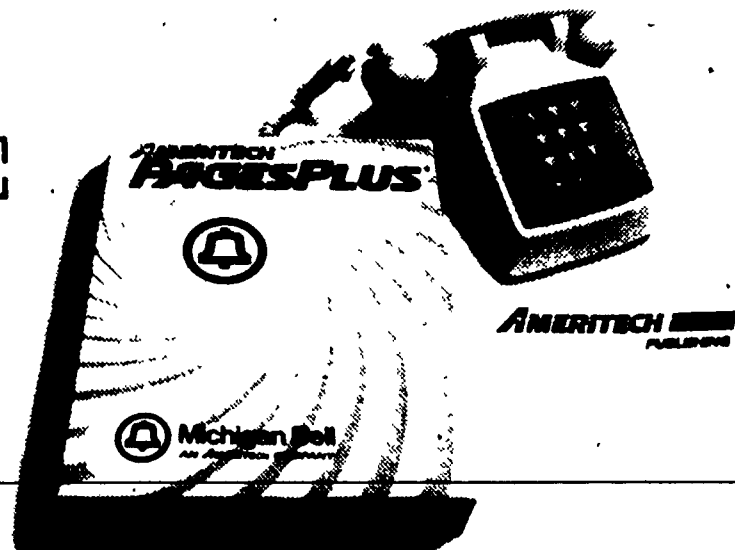

'Hotel for pets' celebrates 25th anniversary

It seems like any other family home. Two children swim in the pool which separates the house from a small office. There is a swingset and a wooden fence.

The only hint of the building's real purpose is the muted sound of barking in the background.

This homey haven for pets is Char Mur Kennels, which this month is celebrating its 25th anniversary of boarding pets for vacationing area residents.

Char Mur has boarded everything from furlless dogs to exotic birds — to fish, ducks and cats during its 25-year history, according to owner Barbara Goodwin, whose stylish dress seems somewhat unusual for someone who owns and operates a kennel.

She operates Char Mur with the help of long-time friend and all-around, good-natured individual Peggy Potter.

"We're just about sisters," Goodwin said.

Surrounded by picture albums and other memorabilia from her years as owner of Char Mur, Goodwin explained the history of the business. Char Mur Kennels is named for its first owners, a husband-and-wife team named Charlotte and Murray.

Although the Char Mur name is over 50 years old, Goodwin bought the property on Twelve Mile some 25 years ago after the previous kennel burned down. She was required to certify the land in order to operate a kennel lawfully in Oakland County. The site appealed to Goodwin immediately.

"We walked around and we liked it so much we bought it," she said. Goodwin believes the kennels have been so successful because of the career-oriented lifestyles of area residents. It has become increasingly inconvenient for vacationing executives to leave their pets with friends or relatives. The care and feeding of an animal is a large, time consuming responsibility.

"More people are vacationing more often," Goodwin said.

The Christmas and Easter seasons, as well as the summer months are peak season for boarding animals. Every year the kennel must turn away more and more customers. The

kennel houses animals from as far away as Grosse Pointe and Southfield, and has many regular customers.

Many "celebrity" dogs including the Michigan Humane Society's poster dog Ginger, occasionally call Char Mur home.

"We used to have slow times, but you don't see that anymore," Goodwin said.

Most Char Mur customers do everything they can to make the kennel a home away from home for their pets. During the Christmas season, some animals owners leave presents for their pets which hang outside their "rooms" and are distributed on Christmas morning.

The kennel also receives letters from vacationing children addressed to their pets.

"They say things like 'we miss you, are you having fun?'" Goodwin reported.

Goodwin and Potter do their best to make Char Mur seem like a hotel for animals. A circular courtyard outside the kennel accommodates Char Mur's walking service. Some of the animals also get lonely when their owners are away, so Goodwin must talk to them more than usual. A grooming service is also offered, but some owners do not request this service.

"That way when they get home they can fuss over their pet," observed Goodwin.

The inside of the kennels is a housekeeper's delight. The dogs are housed in either 3-by-3 foot or 4-by-5 foot cement runs which are surrounded by chain-link fences and covered with wood. The animals are clean, the cement floors are neatly swept and the scent of disinfectant hangs in the air. The runs must be cleaned daily to avoid infections because more animal allergies and diseases exist now than ever before.

Char Mur also requires certification of vaccinations, and the kennel is veterinarian-recommended, according to Goodwin.

"It's like running a hospital," she commented.

Goodwin believes her 25 years in the kennel business have been good ones.

"It's a nice business to be in," she said.

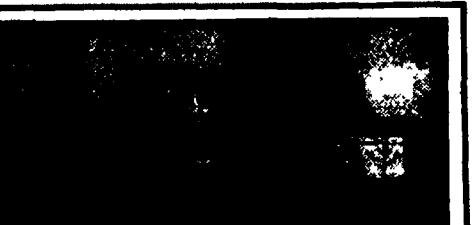

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DRIVE-INS

Story by Philip Jerome

During the middle of the 20th Century — the era that has come to be known as 'the '50s — a unique phenomenon, abetted by the invention of the automobile, swept across the United States. It was called 'the drive-in.'

"One, two, three o'clock. Four o'clock rock. Five, six, seven o'clock. Eight o'clock, rock. Nine, 10, 11 o'clock. Twelve o'clock rock. Gonna rock around the clock tonight."

It's summertime. The '50s. Bill Haley and the Comets are blaring away on the jukebox. And things are jumping at the Novi Drive-in. At Schott's Drive-in. At Bel-Nor. And at the Northville A&W.

"Happy Days" lives. Curb girls in white blouses and dark slacks. Guys and girls in convertibles. Cruisin' the drive-

Becker said the Novi Drive-in also had the reputation of being the best place to pick up girls.

"Skip" (Mrs. Donald) Tuck worked as a car hop from 1953-55 at both Novi and Schott's Drive-in. Schott's also was on Grand River, but east of Novi Road. In the building where Crain Chiropractic is now located.

"Everybody who was anybody came to Schott's," she said. "All the kids from Northville and Walled Lake hung out here because there weren't any drive-ins in their own towns. They'd drive from Schott's to Beckers and back to Schott's again looking for excitement.

Northville didn't have a drive-in until Bel-Nor opened in February 1957 on what had once been a swamp at the corner of Northville Road and the Seven Mile cut-off.

"We had five feet of fill put in, but the parking lot was still treacherous," recalled Velma Belasco, who owned the drive-in along with her physician husband, Walter.

"When we got the first thaw, the parking lot caved right in. We had cars disappearing in these big holes. I went down and made arrangements with the wrecker from the service station to pull them out. We had to pull out 15 cars that first night."

Technically, the Northville A&W missed the '50s. Art Jahn didn't open it on Northville Road, east of Seven Mile, until 1960. But it was a quintessential drive-in, nonetheless. Filled with cruising teenagers from Northville, Novi and Plymouth looking more for hot times than cold root beer.

It's now the Northville Moose Lodge. "That was a good business," said Jahn. "Outside of the race track and the Ford plant, we were probably the biggest employer in town. One year we handled over 100 W-2 forms.

"It was a natural meeting place," he continued. "We probably fed more kids during the summer than their mothers did.

"It was a 'see-and-be-seen' sort of thing for a lot of the kids."

Belasco was "the law" at Bel-Nor. "I used to sit in my car out in the parking lot to keep track of what was going on," she said. "When I saw something I didn't like, I drove up — never on foot — and told them politely to either stop what they were doing or to leave.

"I remember one young man who became quite obnoxious so I told him he couldn't come to Bel-Nor anymore. About six months later he came back and apologized. . . . asked me to please let him come back because it was where all his friends hung out.

"I accepted his apology and allowed him to come back. After that, he was a model customer."

The biggest reason teens went to drive-ins was to meet members of the opposite sex. Boys came to pick up girls; and girls came to be picked up —

or, at least, to be seen.

"There were a lot of convertibles in those days, a lot more than there are now," Becker remembered. "Convertibles, of course, were best for seeing and being seen.

"I had a red '47 Chevy convertible and Don Tuck had a nice one, too."

Best of all were the curb girls . . . the girls who took the orders from the car to the kitchen and brought the food back to the car. A drive-in with pretty curb girls could expect plenty of business from the young men.

"Some people came down just to see the girls," admitted Jahn. "We were kind of particular about the girls we hired. Honor students, drum majorettes. We wanted girls who were wholesome looking.

"We wanted a family-orientation to the drive-in. That's one of the reasons we offered the baby-sized mug of rootbeer. We'd get mom, dad and the kids. If the curb girls were too sexy, the moms wouldn't come back. We wanted the family trade."

"A lot of the boys were definitely on the make," recalled Skip Tuck. "That's how I got my name. I was sort of shy and I was the new girl in town with long blonde hair down at Schott's.

"This group of guys came in one night and yelled, 'Hey, Blondie, what's your name?' I just yelled back, 'Skip it!' And after that they all called me 'Skip' or 'Skip'. I was too embarrassed to tell them my real name was Violet. I thought they'd all laugh."

Summer romances sometimes turned serious. Even summer romances with curb girls.

"I used to tell all my girls to look good out there," said Jahn. "I told them they might be meeting their futures."

One of Becker's responsibilities at the Novi Drive-in was to drive the curb girls home at night in his red Chevy convertible. "There was one of them named Phyllis Fagerlie who I thought was pretty special. I married her.

"I used to comb my hair in a D.A. back in those days," he continued. "I still have most of my hair,

and I still have the D.A. And Phyllis is still my wife, too."

Skip Tuck also met her mate as a curb girl at Schott's. "Don (Tuck) was about the coolest guy around," she recalled. "He had a powder blue '49 Mercury with bubble skirts. He'd come into Schott's all the time where all these cute girls in his car. I wanted to spill pop on their laps, but I didn't and we eventually started seeing each other and finally got married. We've been married ever since."

The drive-ins are gone none. Extinct fossils of the '50s. A phenomenon for social scientists to examine.

Jahn has some theories as to why they disappeared. "Television is much more popular now. Air-conditioning is a lot more popular now . . . before air-conditioning people would drive around on hot summer nights just to stay cool.

"Plus drugs," he said. "Drive-ins were before drugs. Being bad in those days meant sneaking out in the park to have a beer. The days of the drive-ins really were happy days."

ins. Looking for something to do on hot summer nights. Looking for action.

"Nothin's nothing happenin' here. Let's go down to Schott's." It was called "doin' the circuit." Driving from drive-in to drive-in. Root beer and shakes. Burgers and foot-long.

Rumors of a beer party in the park. Rumors of kids from Farmington or Plymouth headed this way. Looking for a rumble.

"My parents bought the Novi Drive-in in '53," recalled Jerry Becker, who now lives in Kitchener, Ontario. The drive-in was located on Grand River, just west of Novi Road in the building currently occupied by Knight's Auto Parts.

"The building still looks pretty much the same," he added.

"We were the only drive-in around in those days. There was nothing in Northville or Walled Lake, so all those kids used to come over to our place.

"It was also before Novi had a police department. Lee BeGole didn't start until 1954 or so, and the only police around were the Oakland County Sheriff's Department. We had a pretty good time."

Stories from '50s have familiar ring

In some ways, the 1950s were just yesterday. In some other ways, they were another world.

That truth is brought home by looking through old issues of The Novi News/Northville Record from 1950 through 1959. The Record covered Northville, Novi, Salem, West Point Park and occasionally Livonia throughout the '50s, mostly under the motto "Friend, Companion and Kindly Counselor."

The philosophy changed in 1957 — to "If it's news, and it happens in Northville . . . you can read about it in the Record."

Many of the same places and issues that were in the news then are still, or again, making the papers. Others have probably passed into history for good.

Following are some excerpts from the '50s as seen by the local paper:

□ Consider Expansion for Mental Hospital: Exceptionally good progress is being made on the construction of the new Northville

State hospital located just west of Haggerty highway between Six and Seven Mile roads . . .

As members of the legislature predicted at the time the effort was first being made to secure the original appropriation for this new hospital for the metropolitan area of Michigan, there soon would be need for considerable expansion in the size of the institution . . .

Already reports from Lansing indicate that this expansion program is under consideration in order to take care of the mentally ill of Detroit who should have been committed months and years ago. It is pointed out that this expansion would be by far the most economical method to follow . . . (1/19/50)

□ "The Negro" Is Topic At Exchange Club: Northville Exchange Club Wednesday noon heard a fine talk given by Dr. —, minister of the First Methodist

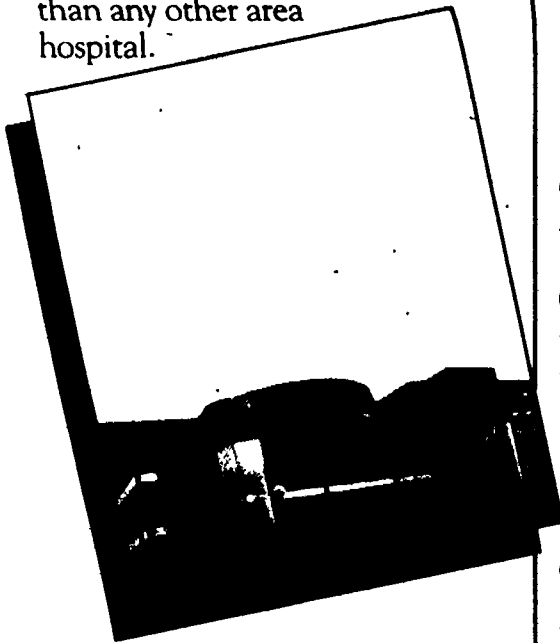

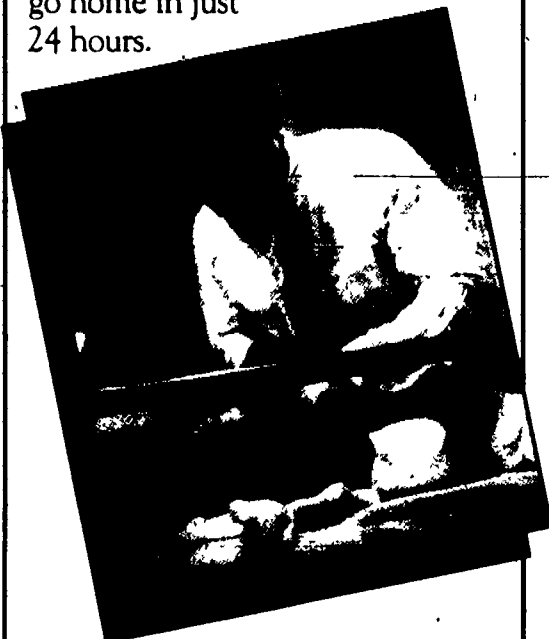

He joined the Navy in February 1988.

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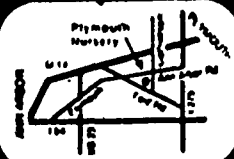

Comedy club finds ready audience

Comedy clubs which are popular across the nation have finally brightened nightlife opportunities in the Walled Lake area.

Dee Proffitt Agius is manager of a new comedy club called "The Looney Bin" located in the basement of the Wolverine Lounge at 1655 Glengary Road in Wolverine Lake Village.

We want everyone to go looney in the boozies, said Proffitt-Agius.

Appropriately enough, the Looney Bin opened April Fool's Day weekend and hosts anyone from two to four comedians every Friday and Saturday from 10 p.m. to midnight.

The comedians, some with national reputations, cover a wide range of humor. Some use props, music or magic to enhance their acts. And the humor runs from subtle to blatantly ridiculous.

You have to be willing to make a fool of yourself. They call me anything for a buck, Thison explained. Gary Thison, comedy writer, comedian and agent of Bands Galore, a Mt. Clemens based entertainment business which books acts for the Looney Bin and other clubs on the comedy circuit.

At 34, Thison has been in the business of making people laugh for 15 years.

I've always loved comedy. When other kids were playing army, I was playing Red Skelton.

There is a serious side to the comedy business. The competition between comedians is fierce. They vie constantly for the biggest laughs, to make the most money and — most of all — for the opportunity to break into television or films.

It's a lot of work, a young man's business, said Thison. "It's very competitive. It's cut-throat."

Hecklers pose another problem for struggling young comedians. "They try to be funny to upstage you," said Thison. "They're incredibly boring."

There were three comedians on the bill during a recent night at the Looney Bin — Thison, who also served as emcee, Marty McCollee of Los Angeles, and Tim Butterfield, a junior high school English teacher from Lapeer.

"In my class, the teacher is class clown," said Butterfield.

Butterfield has been one of the most popular comedians to appear at the Looney Bin in the three months it has been open. His impressions are particularly well received.

So far, the comedy club has been doing well Saturday night per-

formances have been sold out consistently.

"It's mostly local people who are coming," said Jimmy Agius, the chef at the Looney Bin and husband of the manager. "They're coming back and bringing their friends."

"It's a family business," added his wife.

Wolverine Lounge was built in 1974 by Paul and Teenie Proffitt. They opened for business on Friday, March 13, and operated primarily as a restaurant with the help of their three children. The restaurant was

sold soon after, but returned to the family 13 years later as a result of legal difficulties.

During those intervening years the Proffitts were gaining valuable experience as waitstaff and bartenders. Proffitt-Agius put herself through Oakland University in Rochester, where she earned a degree in psychology, as a bartender.

The whole Proffitt family, including cousins and a nephew renovated and reopened the Wolverine Lounge on Friday, March 13, 1987.

The lounge had been operating as a

family restaurant and bar with complete banquet facilities when a friend, Rich Paul, suggested the idea of a comedy club.

The Looney Bin plans to expand this fall and will host two more shows a night on Friday and Saturday at 8 p.m.

"We're really excited about it," said Proffitt-Agius. "We're thinking of continuing forever."

John Osborne found out just what it's like to compete against guys like Scott Wladishkin and Dave Skown — and it certainly wasn't as enjoyable as coaching them.

Osborne — the Northville Connie Mack Coach — led his team against the South Farmington/Novi Connie Mack team on June 28. The opposing team sported several players who were football stars for the Osborne-coached squad at Novi High School last fall — players like Wladishkin and Skown.

Northville actually got off to a great start but soon fell behind after a couple innings and ended up losing 12-3. Osborne's crew scored three times in the opening inning on two walks, a bunt single by Brian Frelick, a two-run single by Mike Yard and an R.C. Heaton sacrifice. But that was it for the Northville offense.

In the bottom of the inning, Wladishkin led off with a single, stole second and scored on a hit. In the second, South Farmington/Novi scored three runs to take a 4-3 lead and then added three more in the fourth. Wladishkin again caused a lot of damage with a walk, two steals and a run scored.

"We got off to a great start," Osborne said. "But we let it slip away and that's the kind of thing we can't do. I'm not sure what the problem is but we're not sharp defensively. Obviously we need to change our emphasis in the pre-game practice from batting to defense."

South Farmington/Novi scored the last five runs and they all came with two out. Northville starter Steve

Nigro went the first four and two-thirds innings and allowed seven runs. Randy Jones relieved him, but didn't fare much better. Yard was the hitting star for Northville, batting 2-for-3 and driving in two.

NORTH FARMINGTON 3, NORTHVILLE 4: In the 100-plus degree temperature on June 25, Northville fell behind early and couldn't make up the lost ground. Osborne's squad did have chances but squandered several bases-loaded opportunities and it cost the team dearly.

Jones and Yard strung together back-to-back singles in the top of the first to put Northville in front 1-0 but in the bottom of the inning, North Farmington/West Bloomfield sent nine players to the plate and scored five times.

Fundukian replaces Osborne as Novi athletic director

John Fundukian isn't exactly a household name yet.

But Novi residents will soon become more familiar with the name and the face as Fundukian leaves the Wall Lake school district to become Novi Community School District's new athletic director.

During a special meeting in late June, Novi Board of Education members voted 6-0 to offer Fundukian a contract with the school district to oversee the district's athletic program.

Fundukian will be responsible for scheduling athletic games as well as supervising the district's K-12 sports curriculum. His title will be "Director of Physical Education and Athletics," and his salary is about \$48,000.

Superintendent Robert Piwko explained that Fundukian was the unanimous choice among subcommittee members who interviewed possible candidates for the job.

School Board President Robert Schram said 32 applications were received for the position. The subcommittee

then narrowed the field of candidates down to seven. After interviewing possible candidates, the subcommittee agreed Fundukian was the best person for the job.

"He's going to take the ball and run with it, and he's not going to stop at 100 yards," Schram remarked about Fundukian.

Thus John Osborne's lengthy tenure as the head of the Novi Community School District's athletic program has come to an end after over 25 years of service as the official and unofficial athletic director.

When the Novi Board of Education decided that the district needed a full-time athletic director, Osborne was given a choice — he could remain as either varsity football coach or athletic director, but not both.

As the only football coach and A.D. Novi's ever had, it was a tough decision for the Northville resident, but he eventually chose coaching — an activity he loves, even after 20 years.

"I obviously would have liked to continue to do both, but it's not what's best for me. It's what's best for Novi athletics," Osborne said. "It wasn't an easy decision because I enjoy doing both. But I think they're right — it

was time to make the load lighter because the job is very demanding. As it was, we haven't been able to devote enough time to everything and if it wasn't for all the help I received, we wouldn't have gotten anything done."

In 21 seasons as the Wildcat football mentor, Osborne has won 111 games — an average of six per season. In the past two seasons, Novi's had a remarkable 17-1 record, including a perfect 9-0 regular season last fall and two consecutive Kensington Valley Conference titles. He has been named the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association Coach of the Year in this region six times — including 1987.

"(Coaching) always seems to be fun — win or lose," Osborne admitted after last season. "It's something I really enjoy doing — my priorities are probably not in the proper order but football rates awfully high with me."

When Osborne was informed that Wall Lake's John Fundukian was named as the full-time A.D. in Novi, he seemed happy with the decision.

"John is a good man," he said. "From my dealings with him he seems to be very well organized and a good leader. I think the (board of education) made a good decision."

Without having to worry about running the Novi sports programs, Osborne now has more time to devote to coaching. He is currently running a summer weightlifting program for the Novi footballers and is coaching the Northville Connie Mack baseball team — which includes his son Derek. In addition, Osborne was picked as one of only two head coaches statewide for the 1988 East-West Football All Star Game to be held July 30 at Michigan State's Spartan Stadium.

"It's a thrill and I'm real excited about it," he said. "It promises to be quite an experience."

The game will feature 80 of the top graduated seniors from the state. Osborne will be coaching the East team, consisting of players from the Metropolitan Detroit area. His coaching staff will include Novi's defensive coordinator Cole Rowcamp and three highly respected head coaches from the area: James Reynolds of Detroit Martin Luther King, Bob Dozier of Detroit Mackenzie and Bob Kelgen of Bloomfield Hills Lahser. Rowcamp will serve as a lineman coach, Reynolds will be the defensive coordinator, Dozier a defensive backfield coach and Kelgen an offensive receiver coach.

Holzer nips South Lyon, 5-4

With a two-week push that included five victories in a row, Northville's entry in the Livonia Collegiate Baseball League (LCBL) has moved right back into contention for the league title chase.

In abridged action last week due to the July 4 holiday, Tom Holzer Ford mounted a comeback and then held on for dear life to beat South Lyon 5-4 on June 29. Granted, the triumph came against a team that has yet to win a game in 17 tries, but it was a win nonetheless. It was Holzer's fifth straight and raised the team's overall mark to a fancy 11-6. first base, Holzer's Paul Newitt made a running, over-the shoulder catch of a 330-foot drive by Fred Londo in deep rightfield. The catch saved a certain extra-base hit and a game-tying run.

"We've had about three or four straight nerve-racking seventh innings but we've won all of them, so we must be doing something right," Peterson said.

University of Detroit's Rick Tavormina paced the hitting attack for the Northville team with two hits and two walks. Kevin Ritter was 2-for-4 with an RBI.

Scott Peterson drew a bases loaded walk in the second inning to tie the game and Keith Dutiewicz was hit by a pitch to score the go-ahead run. Andy Fairman blasted his fourth homer of the season in the third inning to help the cause.

Myths about watering dismissed

At one time, in the dark ages of sports, athletes could be assured a solid "wimp" label simply by being the first one to break down and take a drink of water.

The recommendations ran rampant: Drinking water made you weak. Once you drink, you'll need a drink every minute. Or the classic — drinking water is okay as long as you swirl it around in your mouth then spit it out.

In spirited lockerroom rhetoric, players upheld the watering myths. They practiced in dust and dirt, parched, but not able to water down because of the unwritten rule of jockdom.

Sad but true, those bits of advice turned out to be no more than that — myths. Myths which led to players dropping like flies from heat prostration on the athletic fields of America.

Now it's changed "180 degrees," said one local doctor. Large water coolers are as much a part of athletic practices as helmets, bats, and gloves. They have been since the mid-1970s.

Pick-up athletes and recreation league participants still lag behind somewhat. They are sometimes at greater risk since they may slug down soft drinks or beer while playing.

"We're recommending that people hydrate (drink water) as much as possible," said Farmington Hills doctor Marshall Solomon, whose practice deals with sports medicine. "It never hurts to drink water — not necessarily in large amounts — but adequate amounts to compensate for perspiring heavily."

Depending on the individual, that means an eight to ten ounce drink before playing and at various intervals during the contest.

Solomon said runners and recreation or pickup athletes should "steer away" from commercial products that contain sugar and completely avoid alcoholic beverages while playing sports.

"Beer has an alcohol content and a sugar content," Solomon said.

"Everybody has a feeling that they need to drink a 'nice cool one' when hot and thirsty but it doesn't have a good effect. There is no place for alcohol in sports."

"It doesn't help the system hydrate properly," he added, while warning against the other risks associated with drinking and playing, such as decreased hand/eye coordination

and possibly impaired judgement.

Solomon said children are at great risk during the summer season and should be watched carefully.

"They may go and go and go, then just stop all of a sudden," he said.

Elderly golfers are also at risk. "Some will get out in the sun for a very long time and then begin to lose their orientation," he said.

If experiencing some of the symptoms of heat stroke, such as heavy perspiration or mild dizziness, Solomon recommends finding a cool spot while slowly beginning to replace some of the body's fluids. Anyone experiencing extreme dizziness or loss of consciousness should be transported to the hospital immediately, he said.

Fitness Tips

Poison ivy, insect bites common in summer

Our newspaper article last week covered some general safety tips for the summer. This week we are providing more detailed information on two of the most common summer problems: poison ivy and stinging insect bites.

Poison ivy is present almost everywhere in the United States and has a variety of appearances. Depending on the area, it can take on the form of a bush to a woody vine. Because of this chameleon-like quality, it can be difficult to recognize.

To decide whether it is or isn't poison ivy, an old adage "leaves of three, let them be" is good to keep in mind: Other tip offs are the presence of white berries and shiny black spots on damaged plants. These spots represent the sap which turns black

when exposed to air. The sap is responsible for the typical rash that occurs upon exposure to the plant.

The rash, which usually appears in 24-48 hours after exposure, begins as redness with bumps that become water blisters accompanied by itching. The rash can appear on areas not contacted by the plant due to sap present under the fingernails, which can be transferred to these areas by scratching.

Home management of mild poison ivy consists of immediately washing with soap and water after contact and scrubbing under the fingernails. Cool compresses and soothing lotions such as Calamine are helpful. For severe reactions, when there is much swelling, a physician should be consulted.

Insect bites are another summer nuisance. Mosquitoes, bees and wasps are the most common an-

noyances. The easiest remedy is prevention, i.e., avoid the insect. (This is easier said than done.)

Mosquitoes are largely present during late evening. They also are attracted to areas of standing water which serve as a breeding ground. The color of clothing worn may not be very protective because mosquitoes are repelled by lighter colored clothes, whereas bees are attracted to them. Insect repellents may be used, but caution should be used when applying them on children. Very minute amounts over a small area should be used and clothing should serve as the major form of protection.

Bee and wasp stings only cause discomfort in most people but can be life-threatening to a small number of people. For simple stings, try to remove the stinger with gentle scraping of the skin; it should not simply

be pulled out as this can cause the venom sack to rupture. The most common reaction is localized hives or itching. Local application of cool compresses and soothing lotion such as Calamine should be applied.

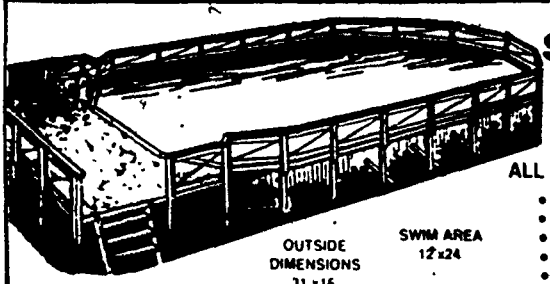
A small number of people are allergic to bee venom and react with widespread hives and swelling over the body. They should receive immediate attention by a physician.

One last word of advice: Enjoy as much of the summer outdoors as you can.
