Township sewer pact is signed

Almost two years after abandoning the heavily publicized and often troubled super sewer project, Northville Township joined two other Wayne County communities in signing an agreement with the Ypsilanti wastewater authority last Friday.

The project, which is being hailed as an historic agreement, will allow the Townships of Canton, Plymouth, and Northville to route their wastewater to the Ypsilanti Community Utilities Authority (YCUA) facility next to Willow Run Airport.

The communities, which together form the Western Townships Utilities Authority (WTUA), are currently using the Detroit treatment plant.

Northville Township Supervisor Georgina Goss said it has been a long, hard battle to finally reach an agreement on the project and she is delighted that the negotiations are finished.

"There's still a long way to go, including cost allocation, designs, and total cost estimate. But this is the

Project is discussed

The company proposing a major development on the southwest corner of Main and Center in downtown Northville hopes to begin the project next spring and finish about a year later.

Michael Kahn, vice president of Singh Development Company, outlined the company's schedule at a meeting of the Downtown Development Authority Tuesday. The company is currently revising its initial plans and hopes to go before the Planning Commission, at least for initial consideration, Tuesday, Aug. 16. The company is aiming for site plan approval by the end of September, Kahn said.

"We're trying hard to get stuff done for the 16th," Kahn said. "We're refining the plans we presented to you the last time we were here. Conceptually, it's the same; we've just made some design refinements."

The project proposed includes a restaurant on Cady street, retail stores along Center and Main, and three floors of apartments. The latest plan shows a total of 68 apartments, Kahn said.

"Our plans are to start construction in the spring," Kahn said. "We feel we have time to put all the pieces together."

Local Boy Scouts clean up

Spending a warm summer afternoon taking apart an asphalt road may not be seen like the ideal day to most people, but it was for a group of Northville high school students.

Jason Stringer, an 11th grader at Northville High, said he coordinated the project of cleaning up a playground at the Moraine Early Childhood Development Center as a way of achieving his promotion from life scout to eagle scout.

"I've been working eight years to make it to eagle scout and I'm finally going to do it," Stringer said, adding he must complete a 200 hour community project to qualify for eagle scout.

For his project, Stringer is taking apart a 500 cubic foot asphalt playground at Moraine, carting away the asphalt pieces, and covering the surface with sand.

He added the idea for the project came from a friend of his mother's, who indicated the need for the work due to the inability of the Moraine children to play in the area.

"They (school officials) wouldn't let the kids play here because of the asphalt surface and they made them march to the back corner of the school to play, so I wanted to help the kids," Stringer said. "It's satisfying to see something get done that will benefit the kids in the community."

In addition to helping the com-

munity and earning his eagle scout rank, Stringer said the activity has become enjoyable. 13 of his friends have come to help him with the project.

"This is becoming a good time because a lot of my friends are here and we're all working together," he added.

Jamie Sonderman, an 11th grader at Northville High and a friend of Stringer's helping with the project, said hacking away at the asphalt for four hours a day is helping him work out for the football team.

"All of us working together definitely helps develop team skills," he added.

Not to mention the children of Moraine.

Five run for trustee slots

Northville Township voters planning on going to the polls Aug. 2 will have only one real voting opportunity in the local portion of the primary, to elect township trustee candidates.

That's because there are no challengers to the township supervisor, clerk, and treasurer positions.

As for the trustee election, five Republicans are seeking four spots as the party's nominees to the position. The four candidates who win the nomination will in effect win the trustee spots, as no democrats are running for the position.

Because all five of the challengers for the trustee spots are running as Republicans, any voter choosing to vote the Democratic ticket in the primary will be locked out from voting in the trustee election. Voters in primaries must choose which party they will vote for, prior to selecting individual candidates. No crossover is allowed.

Four of the five candidates running for trustee are incumbents. James Nowka is the leader among the candidates in terms of longevity on the board. A 14-year veteran as trustee, Nowka, 56, has also served as chairman of the planning commission and been a representative on the township board of appeals and recreation commission. He is a sales

engineer for a chemical company and is married (Bette Lynn) with four children.

Incumbent Richard Allen has served on the township board and planning commission for the last eight years. In addition, Allen, 56, has also served on the wage and salary commission and on a three-member committee which selects township employees. Allen, a supervising engineer with the Ford Motor Company, is married (Patricia) and has two children.

Don Williams, 60, has served the township as trustee for the last six years. He also has served on the beautification committee and the senior alliance. Williams owns an electrical engineering firm, is married (Sally) and has one child.

Tom Handyside, 44, is the newest trustee, serving on the board for the past 1 1/2 years. He has also served on the township wage and salary commission. Handyside, an engineer, is married (Linda) and has two children.

Myron Kasey is the challenger for the trustee position. Kasey, who would not disclose his age, has been a Republican precinct delegate for Wayne County. He is a professional engineer, married (Sophie), with two children.

County, state races on ballot Tuesday

Although the ballots for Tuesday's primary feature many uncontested races, local voters can help decide the fate of nominees for a few key offices and of two millage questions.

The only strictly local contests on the ballot are for precinct delegates and for Northville Township trustees (see related stories).

Except for judicial races and millage questions, the primary ballot works on a partisan basis; the election is for party nominees to the general election. Voters must choose to vote on the Republican or Democratic party ticket all the way down the ballot. The name of the Tisch Independent Citizens Party appears on the ballot, but the party has no official nominees for any of the races affecting Northville.

A summary of the ballot follows:
WAYNE COUNTY
Non-partisan section
(Everyone votes)

Two millage proposals appear on the ballot:

• A new, 10-year, one-mill tax for more jail space. If approved, at least one-tenth of the money would go for a work/training institution for juvenile offenders. The rest of the money could be used to buy, build and/or operate more jail space. One mill means \$1 of tax per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

• An increase of one mill for education of handicapped persons proposed by the Wayne County Intermediate School District. This proposal would double the present one-mill tax for this purpose.

In addition, all Wayne County voters may vote for two of nine candidates for judge of the Court of Appeals, first district. The candidates are Y. Gladys Barsamian, Thomas J. Brennan, Patrick J. Conlin, Gary Ed-

ward Gardner, Richard P. Hathaway, John R. Kirwan, Martin Thomas Maher, Maureen P. Reilly and M. John Shamo.

Partisan - Republican
Republican voters in Wayne County have only one race beyond those named above: the choice of the party's nominee to run against incumbent Democrat Donald Riegler for a six-year term to the U.S. Senate. The two candidates are Jim Dunn and Robert J. Huber.

The Republican party is offering a few candidates for office with no primary opposition: Carl D. Pursell, to return as representative in Congress from the 2nd district; Gerald H. Law, to return as state representative in the 36th district; Donnelly Wright Hadden for prosecuting attorney; Lawrence G. Schweiger for county clerk; and incumbent Susan J. Heintz for county commissioner from the 10th district.

The Republicans have no candidates on the ballot for Wayne County sheriff, treasurer or register of deeds.

Partisan - Democrat
Democratic voters have three primary races to decide.

Lana Pollack and Dean Baker are vying to be the party's nominees against Pursell.

Bruce D. Kennedy and Richard M. Novak are both opposing incumbent Robert A. Ficano as the party's nominee for sheriff. Ed Wilson and Robert A. Zwolak are opposing incumbent County Clerk James R. Killen.

Democrats who are unopposed for their party's nomination include Riegler for U.S. Senator; Jeanne Stempfen to oppose Law; John D.

Oil firm stops hunt for leases

The controversy regarding oil leases in Northville Township took a new turn recently, when the Pangborn Exploration company, a Traverse City based oil company, told its leasing agent, Elenco Land Services Inc., to stop seeking new leases in the Meadowbrook and Grandview Acres subdivisions, for the time being.

Randall Hansen, general manager for Elenco, said that the company has in excess of 50 percent of the land owners signed in lease agreements with the oil company. No new leases will be sought by the company per the order from Pangborn, Hansen said. Pangborn land manager Paul Domagalski said the cease order would stand on a "day-to-day" basis.

Domagalski said the oil company is "quite active in the state" and has been involved in drilling in several environmentally sensitive areas. The company is working on obtaining leasing agreements on two other projects in Northville Township and those efforts will continue, Hansen said. He declined to release the locations of those two projects.

Pangborn hired Elenco to seek oil leases from 106 property owners on

120 acres in the two Northville Township subdivisions. The company is seeking the rights to explore for oil or natural gas on the property. The subdivisions are located on the north side of Seven Mile Road, directly across from Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital.

At a meeting of about 50 residents from the two subdivisions last Tuesday, the general consensus of agreement among homeowners who had previously signed oil leases with Elenco, was for each individual to send a letter to the land service company requesting that they be allowed out of the lease.

As of press time Tuesday, July 26, none of the residents who had signed and were contacted by the Record, had sent a letter to Elenco.

Furthermore, each of the residents contacted refused to be interviewed about any of the circumstances concerning the oil leases.

The idea for sending a letter to Elenco requesting release from the lease was suggested by Carol Andrikides, a project area resident who had not signed a lease.

Andrikides said the idea was conveyed to her by her attorney, Carl

NEWS BRIEFS

TOWNSHIP INSURANCE RENEWED — The Northville Township board voted to renew its property and liability insurance coverage with the Michigan Municipal League Liability and Property Pool for another year, last Thursday.

The cost of the coverage is about \$82,000, up from last year's premium of \$78,000.

Township Manager Steve Brock said with all that has been added in equipment and the new fire station, the coverage is a good price.

SUMMER LIBRARY PARTY — Northville Public Library's Summer Readers met for their final party in the Recreation Building yesterday. Refreshments were served by the Friends of the Library and the Mask Puppet Theatre presented "The Monster that ate your Garden". Reading certificates were awarded to those readers who finished five books and 10 books. Last week's poster-puzzle winners were Shelley Guldry, Karen Kumiega and Megan Turnbull.

VOLUNTEER COMMUNITY WORKERS — The Northville Township board unanimously voted to institute a pilot program in which misdemeanants will provide volunteer labor as part of their sentence.

Board members expressed concern about the liability and workers compensation insurance for the workers.

But, Steve Brock said prior court cases have established the precedent of volunteer workers not being eligible for worker's compensation and receiving coverage under the Township's liability insurance.

EMPLOYEE DEFERRED COMPENSATION — Employees of Northville Township are now eligible for deferred compensation, following a ruling by the Michigan Township Association and vote by the Township board.

Under the plan, which the board approved 6-1, an employee will be able to defer up to 25 percent or \$7,500 of income (whichever is less) exclusive of any pension contributions.

The plan is voluntary and can be discontinued at any time. Township officials said they plan to meet with eligible employees to discuss the benefits of the plan.

DDA looks over new parking plan

Discussion of rebuilding a downtown parking lot may lead to a smaller plan than originally proposed.

The Downtown Development Authority (DDA) has been talking over plans to rebuild all the lots downtown with a more efficient layout, thereby creating more parking spaces within the same physical dimensions. The first in line is the lot northeast of Main and Center streets, behind the Marquis Theater.

Earlier discussion centered on redoing the entire lot, moving landscaping and reconfiguring to bring the lot's 144-car capacity up to around 220 cars. But at the DDA meeting Tuesday, authority members suggested a scaled-down plan — addressing only the area of the lot just off the Hutton / Dunlap corner — might be better.

The new direction started when Greg Presley presented an alternate plan which created fewer new spaces but kept a wider central lane — so truck traffic would not be forced to back out into the street — than pro-

posed for the revision. Presley is not a DDA member, but is an architect with an office downtown, is a member of the Planning Commission, and is part-owner of Edwards Caterer, which sits within the lot in question.

Dewey Gardner, a DDA member and owner of IV Seasons Flowers, which backs up to the lot, echoed Presley's concerns about truck maneuvering. In addition, he said, a total rebuilding of the lot might eliminate some valuable landscaping.

"I'm just afraid we're going to lose what we've created. The reason we're having a parking problem is because of the downtown atmosphere we've created," Gardner said.

He suggested looking at the most inefficiently used section of the lot in detail, to see how much improvement rebuilding that single section would create.

DDA member Glenn Long agreed, and added that a study of the area just south of that might prove valuable as well.

Planners defeat reduced condo project

The city planning commission rejected an already-scaled-down plan for the Hatchery Lane Condominiums on Fairbrook Street during last Tuesday's meeting. The major problem with the plans, according to commission members, is still a lack of space.

"It's like life on a submarine; there isn't room for much," Commission Vice Chairperson John Hardin said.

The plans, which were presented to the commission by the project architect, Ron Myers, and its engineer, Richard Scramstad, propose a five-unit condominium complex on less than one acre of land. Because of the limited space the occupants of the proposed condominiums will have to be tolerant of each other, commis-

sioners said.

"They will have to be good neighbors," Planning Consultant Don Wortman said.

A new fire hydrant must also be installed somewhere near the building, before approval could be granted. In compliance with fire regulations, a fire hydrant should be installed at least 50 feet away from any multiple residential building.

Several locations for the hydrant were discussed because its placement must allow for safe access by fire trucks. Since the plans allow for 13 parking spaces, two for each unit and three for visitors, the placement of a fire lane which would occupy two parking spaces is also a problem.

The plans, according to some commissioners, also do not realistically provide enough visitor parking.

Before a requested variance on the side and rear yards was denied by the Board of Zoning Appeals, the proposed plans showed seven visitor parking spaces; now the plans show three. The minimum required by the city is 2½ spaces.

Commissioners commented at the meeting that anyone parking outside the designated parking spaces may "car lock" another condominium owner.

"These people aren't going to be able to have any New Year's Eve parties," Commissioner David Totten said.

The developer must also obtain a five foot easement for a water main on the area to the west of the development. The property next door to the proposed condominiums is a public park and the easement may have to

be obtained through the city council. The possibility of donating the five feet of landscaping to the City of Northville was also discussed.

The commission also addressed additional problems with the plans including the survival of two large oak trees, the amount of garage space, the species of trees included in the backyard landscaping plan, and drainage problems.

"We're not thrilled with what we see," commissioner Totten said.

The commission recommended the plans be changed to include four units instead of five. According to a partner in the development, George Constantine, these setbacks will not scrap the development.

"We hope to remedy the situation and be back with a suitable plan for the commission," he said.

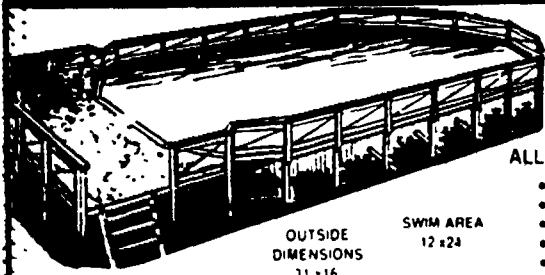
Ypsilanti; a brother, John Ely of Washington; and two sisters, Judy Harrison of California and Marianne Acord of California.

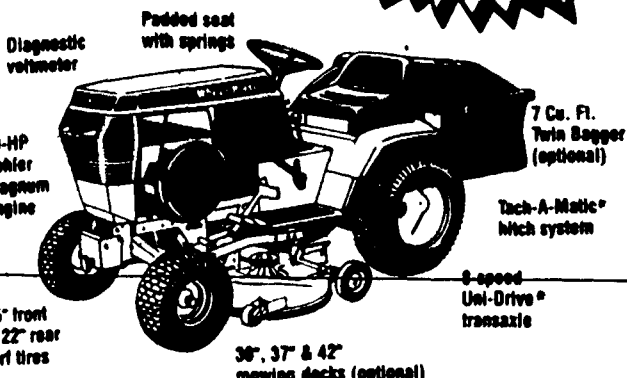

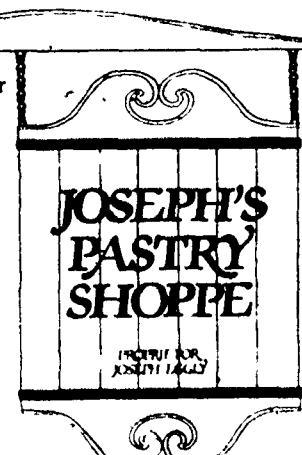

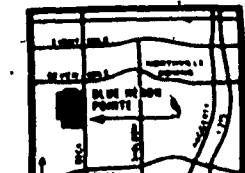

Two local youths arrested in connection with break-in

Lapham Field funds require signature

As of Tuesday afternoon, the availability of state money to negotiate for the purchase of Lapham Field was still not certain.

The bill budgeting the money was presented to Governor James Blanchard Friday, according to a clerk in the state House of Representatives, along with a group of other budget bills. As of late Tuesday afternoon,

Blanchard had taken no action on the bills — but no problems were expected.

If Blanchard signs the bill, money becomes available for 40 projects to be funded from the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund. Most of the projects, like Northville's, are for land acquisition, and under trust fund rules negotiation may not for-

mally begin until the money is approved.

The grant would be for \$123,000 or 75 percent of the purchase price, whichever is smaller. The Northville Community Recreation Department

has money set aside in a fund to make up the difference.

Lapham Field is on the north side of Six Mile west of Beck. The recreation department currently leases the land for soccer fields.

New B and B rules OK'd by planners

A set of rules proposed to regulate bed-and-breakfast inns in Northville moved from the Planning Commission to the City Council last week, after a public hearing resulted in one significant change.

The Planning Commission developed the proposed ordinance over the past few months and, after a hearing Tuesday, July 19, recommended its passage to the City Council. The planners took up consideration of an ordinance after plans for one such inn came before the Board of Zoning Appeals and officials realized the city had no specific regulations for the inns.

The commission sent the ordinance on to the council with one substantive change — and one minor language change — from the previous version of the proposed ordinance. Instead of a maximum stay of 30 days in one year, the proposed ordinance now includes a maximum of 30 consecutive days, to a maximum of 60 days in a year.

Don Mroz and Susan Sommer — owners of the Atchison House, the only B and B yet proposed in the city — were the only members of the public to speak at the hearing. The addition of the word "consecutive" was suggested by Mroz, who said the 30-day rule would limit guests who might have company business in the area for more than 30 days in a year.

Commissioners agreed that the intent of that provision was to prevent B and Bs from becoming boarding

houses, but it took considerable discussion before the group reached a consensus on what the exact provision should be.

"I think having 'consecutive days' is a problem with enforcement. Thirty days and he picks up his bags and walks around the block, and you start all over again," Vice Chairperson John Hardin said.

"I think (enforcement) would be an issue if there was a complaint," Planning Consultant Don Wortman responded.

Commission member Greg Presley supported the change, saying that corporate clientele "is a welcome revenue to make them a viable operation and I don't think it should be discouraged."

Commissioner David Totten suggested the 30 consecutive / 60 maximum wording, which died once on a 3-3 vote but then later passed 4-2. Hardin and Chris Gazlay dissented.

The commission rejected a suggestion from Mroz that the maximum sign size allowed under the ordinance be increased from two to three square feet, or that the commission review each sign individually. A motion to make that change died for lack of support.

The commission recommended the whole text of the ordinance to the City Council 4-2, with Hardin and Gazlay again dissenting. The council has not yet taken up formal consideration of the proposal.

Police and fire learning water rescue

It's always better to be prepared for an emergency before it happens rather than after.

With that in mind, members of the City of Northville police and fire departments are undergoing special training in diving rescues offered free to the department by a local instructor.

John Rapp, owner of Great Lakes Diving, has been active in diving since the 1960s, when he served in the navy's Special Warfare Group. He dove all over the world as part of that experience and has kept it up ever since, in one form or another.

Diving wasn't always a viable business for him, however. "I

remember recovering anchors for \$50 apiece — just enough to recover expenses and not make any money," Rapp recalled.

He was involved in a pioneering diving program at Northern Michigan University.

"It was incredible. We were up in Marquette making dives in January and February. The wind was blowing so hard the snow was horizontal. There was just one spot above Marquette where the water wasn't frozen," and that's where they dove, Rapp said.

A few years ago, he finally decided it was time to put his knowledge to work as a professional diving instructor.

"I've got a lot of people interested

in diving over the years," he said. "I've got all kinds of students out there floating around."

Just recently, Rapp incorporated his efforts as Great Lakes Diving and started marketing in the area. But in addition to making his company work as a commercial enterprise, he saw room to do some volunteer work as well.

"I noticed out here there are quite a few bodies of water. And there is no rescue team," Rapp said. So he decided to offer his services to local police and fire departments free of charge — and Northville took him up on the offer.

For the last few weeks, Rapp has met with four volunteers from the city for classroom work and training in

the high school swimming pools. "Whatever they're taught and lectured on in the classroom, they practice in the water."

There are several different levels of training they can pursue — open water, advanced rescue, air evacuation, land evacuation, and so on — and Rapp hopes that training will all combine into a very useful team.

"Eventually, I hope to have enough guys trained in Northville, Northville Township and Novi that on any given shift, there will be a couple of guys certified. You wouldn't have to wait the hour or two hours for the state

police or the sheriff," he said. "We'll have the ability to effect a quick response and rescue in one of the bodies of water near here."

There really hasn't been a problem caused by the lack of a rescue team in the area, Rapp said. But that doesn't mean such a team might not be needed some time in the future.

The big disadvantage to the present system — relying on rescue teams from the Sheriff's Department or the State Police — is the amount of time it can take for a response.

A local team could change that. "It

will be the quick response time that will really make the thing work," Rapp said.

Even if a person has been under water for 20 minutes, there may still be hope. "There's a damn good chance of reviving that person, saving that life," he said.

The students are making quick progress. "They're used to systematic type training processes," Rapp said.

"They're really excited about it. They've got busy schedules, but they're making the time. That's the sacrifice we're all making, because they are very dedicated to do this."

Council approves temporary parking

A plan to use land along the east part of Cady Street as a temporary parking lot was approved by the City Council Monday, sending the plan on for consideration by the First Presbyterian Church.

A memo to the council from City Manager Steve Walters explains that

the church came up with the idea originally, using land near the church owned by the private Driving Club. A city analysis indicates that the land could be turned into a temporary lot using waste millings from the city street repair program.

This would provide 144 parking spaces for a couple of years, while

the city pursues new permanent parking. Walters' memo estimates the cost at \$24,000.

The council approved a formal proposal under which the church would pay half the cost, up to \$12,000, and secure the cooperation of the Driving Club and Northville Downs; the city would pay the rest of the cost and

possibly build pedestrian access to the track.

The proposal suggests using a combination of city labor and local contractors as the cheapest and most efficient way to complete the project.

The council approved the plan 4-0 and sent it to the church for formal consideration.

first concrete, optimistic step that we've taken," Goss said, adding the first step is to receive a discharge permit from the water and resource commission.

Goss said the discharge permit, which should be secured in either September or October, will allow the Ypsilanti plant to expand to accommodate the three communities.

Under terms of the agreement,

WTUA will tie into the YCUA system by Jan. 1, 1993. YCUA will treat up to 8.7 million gallons per day from WTUA in its facility. WTUA will construct an outfall to the Rouge River, which YCUA will lease for 99 years; WTUA will have the right to participate in any YCUA plant expansion and will have a 99-year lease on the portion of the plant expansion WTUA finances, and WTUA will pay all costs of transporting wastewater to the Ypsilanti plant.

The agreement will run for 40

years and is automatically renewed at the time of plant expansion.

In addition to the sewer agreement, the six-year-old YCUA plant was honored this month by the Chicago office of the Environmental Protection Agency as the best operated wastewater treatment plant in the six-state Great Lakes Region.

Northville Township Attorney Ernest Essad said the YCUA agreement is an excellent move for the township. "I think it's a great deal in

that it provides the independence and capacity for the three communities at very reasonable prices."

Essad said the YCUA agreement gives the township the ability to control cost effectiveness and capacity in a more advantageous way than Super Sewer. "If you go back in history, no one could tell how the rates were set with Super Sewer, but now, in effect, we're setting the rates based on available data and those rates will be auditable."

Plymouth Township Supervisor

Maurice Breen said he was happy the agreement could be worked out. "Sometimes it seemed as if we'd never make it. But the respective staffs have done excellent work to make this possible. It's the best solution for all parties concerned."

Canter Township Supervisor James Poole said there are three significant policy considerations in favor of the agreement.

"First, this gives the best value for any dollars we will have to expend," Poole said.

A deck which is associated with a residential structure shall maintain a distance of at least twenty-five (25) feet from the rear lot line, and shall not occupy any required side yard or front yard area; and shall be subject to the following restrictions:

- a. the portion of a deck which occupies the required rear yard shall not be above the elevation of the first floor of the residence;
- b. no more than twenty-five percent (25%) of any deck shall be covered with structures such as a gazebo or a screened porch and such structures shall be non-habitable; provided, that the portion of a deck which occupies the required rear yard shall not contain any such covered structures;
- c. the portion of a deck which occupies the required rear yard shall not be converted into any enclosed habitable space;
- d. a deck shall be subject to lot coverage limitations.

Section 2. Section 22.2, Definitions, of Title 4, Chapter 12, the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Northville, is hereby amended by adding the following:

25.a Deck: A structure associated with a residential structure which provides a surface for tables and chairs, and is intended to be used as a means of access between the residence and the yard, and as an area for passive outdoor recreation.


Section 3. This ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after enactment thereof and after publication thereof.



Guardian merges with firm

Novi — Guardian Glass last week announced a multi-million dollar merger with a state-owned Hungarian glass firm. The deal, worth a reported \$115 million, is believed to be the largest in Hungary's history.

Under the terms of the arrangement, Guardian's European division, centered in Luxembourg, would operate the newly-created "Hunguard" works, located near Oroshaza in the southeastern section of Hungary.

The purpose of the merger will be to convert the less efficient Hungarian sheet glass plants to the modernized float glass production. The Hunguard facility would be staffed by Hungarians.

"It was important to assure that we would be a local corporation," said Alan Schlang, assistant secretary and general counsel to Guardian. "That was important to them and it was important to our corporate citizenship."

Schlang said the "local" operation was a key to the negotiations over the deal, which had been going on for over a year.

Guardian's European division will own 49 percent of the newly created operating partnership.

Guardian officials completed the deal Wednesday, July 20 in Chicago, according to Executive Vice President Ralph Gerson. They announced it Friday, July 22 at a press conference at the Townsend Hotel in Birmingham, complete with interpreters for two high-ranking Hungarian officials who attended the event.

Guardian official Oscar Feldman said the float glass production technique would allow greater production with fewer people. The system uses a high degree of automation and little human labor, other than packaging. Feldman said that won't necessarily mean workers will be laid off at the current Hungarian plant.

"Expansion into a variety of different glass making areas is planned," he said. "There are a lot of ways you can go with it."

It would be the first float glass plant in Eastern Europe and could perhaps open the door to further eastern expansion, perhaps to the Soviet Union, Feldman indicated.

Feldman said the Hunguard plant will also eliminate the need for Hungary to import float glass and possibly allow Hungary to take a role as an exporter in the next several years.

Guardian is the fifth largest glass manufacturer in the United States. The firm is owned by William Davidson, who also owns the Detroit Pistons of the National Basketball Association. Guardian is located on Nine Mile Road, just east of Novi Road.

City seeks bids for firms to conduct grant studies

Three studies which will figure in debates about the Northville's future are being advertised to firms which might be interested in conducting them.

The city recently sent notices describing the studies to 18 planning firms — to "everybody east of Grand Rapids," City Manager Steve Walters said — and will also advertise the projects in a daily report of the architecture and building industry.

The studies will cover the future of the "Cady Street Corridor," including possible future uses of Northville Downs; revising the city's Master Plan; and possible future uses of the Northville Ford Plant.

The city is planning to fund the studies with Community Development Block Grant money. The Master Plan guidelines have been reviewed by the Planning Commission and the Cady Street Corridor

study by the Downtown Development Authority. The guidelines for the Ford Plant study were presented to the City Council Monday, July 18.

The mailings to planning firms contain just an overview of the three studies, Walters said. An interested firm has to contact the city for a detailed outline of any study in which the firm is interested.

The outlines will be the basic document for planning or architectural firms to work from in conducting the study. The guidelines will also serve as a base for those firms to submit bids on conducting any study in which they are interested. However, the specific nature of the outlines is subject to later revision, Walters said.

The deadline for bids will be set this week, Walters said, and will probably some time around mid-August. After bids are in, city officials will decide if they wish to interview firms

and, if so, which ones.

The Ford plant study is to consider all sorts of possible uses for the plant and an analysis of the impact of each one. The city is not asking for a single recommended use.

The Cady Street Corridor study, expanded from earlier discussion, will look closely at Cady to consider what sort of development might work along the street. In addition, the study is set up to specifically consider meeting parking needs, what might happen if Northville Downs ever closes, and traffic patterns and other planning concerns in a corridor stretching from the Ford plant and Mr. Glow Car Wash southwest to the library and post office.

The Master Plan project will start an update and revision of the original plan used by the Planning Commission and other official bodies in making zoning decisions and the like.

To meet the city's parking requirements for new developments, Singh is proposing to rebuild and reconfigure the lot on the south side of Cady west of Center. But the development will still require almost

200 more spaces.

"We certainly had parking plans that had the potential of that kind of extra parking in it," City Manager Steve Walters said. "The difference, obviously, can be planned if the finances can be handled."

Walters said the parking re-

quirements will have to be included in plans for studying the entire Cady Street corridor, and that parking details might not be firmed up when the rest of the site plan is approved.

"The discussion of parking may be slightly abstract at the point of site plan approval," he said.

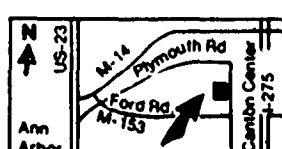

Trustee candidates outline their positions

Five Republican candidates are running for the four trustee spots on the Northville Township Board in the Aug. 2 primary election.

The four candidates nominated for the position will automatically win the trustee spot, since no Democratic candidates are running. Four of the five candidates are incumbent board members.

Each candidate was contacted last week by Northville Record and asked to respond to the same five questions.

The following are their answers to each of the five questions.

What are your qualifications for the trustee position?

I've held the trustee position for eight years and I feel that I've done a conscientious job and tried to represent all the people of the township. I've also been on the planning commission for the past eight years.

Well, I've spent ten years on the water and sewer commission, with the last three or four as chairman, so I'm very familiar with the activities within the township as they relate to water and sewer drainage and generally department of public works activities. I've been very active in most of the other civic and political activities within the township, so I have a very good feel for the pulse of the community in terms of their goals and objectives for development and growth and what they would like to see in the community.

I am a concerned citizen of the township in which I live. I'm concerned with the services and taxes of this community, that gives me one qualification. I am academically trained in the field of engineering which I feel qualifies me to see things and be able to analyze situations.

Well, I believe my qualifications have been related to the experience that I've had as a trustee. I have been a trustee for approximately 14 years. Prior to that I was chairman of the planning commission, chairman of the board of appeals and I've been on various other community activities that were related to governmental functions and things of that nature. And probably, the most significant area, I believe, is that I'm vitally interested in Northville Township and have been since I moved out here 21 years ago.

I've been on the board of trustees for six years and I've been on the following committees: Zoning Board of Appeals, Beautification, the Senior Alliance, the Senior Advisory Council, the Budget Committee, and others. I'm very watchful over the police and fire departments to see that we've got the best that we can give the people for their dollar.

Do you support the idea of a woodland ordinance?

You better believe it. I started on the ad hoc committee for it because I hate to see developers come with what I call a "bulldozer mentality." They want to flatten everything and do it that way and I've been opposed to that for a long time. In fact, I made inquiries about a woodland ordinance a long time ago and the beautification commission finally got things pulled together and it started to move.

Yes I do. I think there are two issues that come into play. The first issue is the kind of development that a community should look for and obviously, Northville Township is noted for and I would hope continue, a high quality-type of development. We do not want to see developers come in and just scar the land and put in unattractive types of development. The implementation of a woodland ordinance is going to help preserve the rural setting and the kind of development the people in the township would accept and that is not to say the general tone of the township is pro-development. In fact, in a lot of instances the township is cautious as to whether they want development or not. So, I think this is going to give us another mechanism to control and develop the township in a manner that is going to be acceptable to everyone.

Oh yes, very much so. We should have more trees and we should have more parks. In areas where there are new developments we should put in more parks within that area, with trees, where parents with young children can take them to that park area. Very much so. I'd like to see more parks and trees because this is what we have at the present time. Once we lose a tree we'll never get it back.

Oh, absolutely. I served on a future needs study and that was one of the concerns that we did have and what we encourage. There is a need for almost a reforestation of these northwestern suburbs, to strengthen an image of the attractiveness to benefit the way community looks anyway, and of course, to enhance it.

Oh, certainly. I was one of the advocates of that to begin with. Only we put certain other people on there like (Richard) Allen and Pat (Wright). Being in the construction business I just feel that I'm tired of seeing developers let builders just come in and scalp the ground and cut down the trees. Now what's left over in the Wayne County area? We have a man on the Beautification Committee that will identify these trees and have that young girl working to size and spot them and I think this is something that should be saved.

Once sewers are laid, it is predicted that development will boom in Northville Township. How much development would you like to see take place in Northville and what policy decisions should be made to curb or aid it?

Well, I think everyone would like to see it go slowly but I'm a little afraid that won't happen however, particularly along Haggerty Road. How you can legally control the development I'm unsure at this time. I've been watching what Bloomfield and Rochester Hills are trying to do and I'm a little skeptical that they'll be able to get away with that in court. But if they do I think they may set a good precedent for us. I want to watch and see how they make out.

Well, first of all I favor controlled development, particularly if it could encourage industrial or research type development that would help our tax base. I think we're going to see development. It's quite obvious what is happening in all the communities around us and for our community to not accept that and put our head in the sand and say "we don't want any development" would be crazy. On the other hand, I would like to begin seeing controlled development and high quality that would be as less dense as permitted under the existing ordinances.

We can't stop progress, but we can build a big city with big buildings — but we should have it in proportion — an area of scientific growth, with buildings in proportion to and in ratio with the people we have. I don't think we can stop progress, it's happening, right across the road from Haggerty there are big buildings there and our's is green. Eventually it's going to overflow to our area, so we have to have ordinances and laws on our books to protect ourselves from such situations, but at the same time we can't forbid them from coming in because we need the taxes.

I think our master plan, which was adopted probably 20 years ago, has established some pretty good guidelines as far as the holding capacity of the township and formed a good basis or good road map by which the township would be developed. And of course, the holding capacity is not as huge as people might tend to realize, but I think there are many things as far as development is concerned that we can be very proud of because we're not a heavily dense type of community like some others and I think the quality of development here has been extraordinarily well done.

We've already started in laying out the master plan for sewers. First, we've got to get all ours and start our sewer to Ypsilanti. We've got to get that all in hand first. And we've got to do the Haggerty Road corridor first. In the meantime this will allow the planning commission and the other people to see what we can do with Wayne County. Because Wayne County is just stalling it and playing around. And we have already been talking about residential lots so we can have one-acre areas and we will be extremely tough and critical as to what developer will be allowed and the developer is going pay for a portion of his sewers and other utilities because I am not going to see the township keep paying the bill all the time.

What problems are facing Northville Township and what solutions would you suggest to fix them?

I think one of the things that will be forthcoming will obviously be if the county sells the land along Five Mile Road that we get the proper type of development down there to benefit the township. We're working at the planning commission trying to figure out what is the proper kind of development and I think we have a pretty fair consensus of what it should be at this time but I think we've got to make sure it goes that way. But we also see what people have to offer — maybe some developer has a better idea than we have. I don't know. Maybe he doesn't. Sooner or later we've got to do something about finding the police department more space. More sooner than later. They are so crowded in there it's ridiculous. How we're going to go about that I don't really know at this point but this is an issue that's got to have a high priority.

Well, I don't know that we have any tremendous problems at this point in time. I think for the last several years the township has been run very well and I think it has been well managed. I think we've got an executive committee that pays particular attention to making sure we spend our money wisely and our commissions and departments are cooperating well with each other. I think particularly in light of possibly police service, the level of service expected in the township certainly from my standpoint, because of the hospitals and prisons and things, I would strongly support as great a level of public safety as we can accommodate within our current tax structure. And if the citizens would feel more comfortable with a higher level of police and safety protection, then I would be in favor of increasing revenues to accommodate them.

We have a big problem facing Northville. We're at the crossroads of a charter township to a city. We're growing fast. We have Plymouth Charter Township which is next door to us picking up a lot of industry. We have the City of Northville hemmed in. We have a problem of whether we're going to become a city or whether we'll incorporate with Plymouth Township or with the City of Northville to be one big city or to be a city by ourselves. And we need paid people, full-time jobs in the township office to cope with the problems.

Well, I think we have to basically give the people the services. I think that is one of the things that we're going to face in the future. I think that many of the things that we've done as far as the safety services such as the police department and fire department, I think those directions are excellent. I think that we will have to come to grips very soon with responding to the needs for space for the library and we're probably many years behind on taking an active step to acquire recreational land for those opportunities. I think that some of those things are being spoken of, especially providing some millage support for the development of a community park and even going behind that. I think that those things are wise steps at this time. But I think overall, the course the community has taken in the joint services and that type of thing has been quite good but we do need some additional support in those areas.

The problems with the township are just the expansion and being careful in watching over it. We have to keep track of the prisons. I do that too, on the prisons, occasionally. And keeping up our ordinances and bringing them up to date. You'll find they're a little lax on the board and I'm the person that stirs them up.

What should be the long range goals for Northville Township?

I think basically to keep the township providing good services and keep the taxes as low as we can possibly do it. We've been trying to do it and I certainly think we can keep it going in the same way.

Well, I guess controlled, well-planned, well-thought out development. The improvement of our services, such as fire and police. And trying to maintain a well-balanced community.

We should develop a system of parks within the neighborhoods. Every new development should have a parcel of land, at least five acres if it is a large development, so the young parents can take their children into the small parks, instead of putting them in a car and driving four or five miles away and driving back. A little community within itself. We need a central area for Northville Township, an area of shopping centers and buildings and office buildings, so we can say "Here, this is Northville Township." It's as if here's the City of Northville, here's the City of Plymouth, but we don't have a place we can recognize as a Northville Township area. That's something we have to think about. We have to think about our sewers, completion of our sewers, because you can't develop anything unless you have a good sewer system.

Well, that's an interesting question. I think growth fitting the pattern of what's existing. Responding to the needs of our citizens. We're an interesting township out here, we don't have a lot of geographical or topographical characteristics that would make it a heavily attractive area for other uses, so I think our focus is on residential use and I think that if we proceed in the course that we've taken and strengthen it, strengthen that course to meet the needs of the people, I think that from my point of view that would be development as I would like to have it done. I think that we'll have other needs that will have to be met as time goes along and I think we have to begin anticipating them rather than reacting to them, perhaps even like the woodland ordinance — reaching out and basically making a positive effort to do things before they become a problem.

Well, my long-range goals, I think five to ten years ahead whenever I'm talking, are to get a development of residents; a proportionate rate of business; and some industrial, so that we can get some tax money in here to do something instead of always being so damn close on everything that we have to watch everything in order to get another police car. We want some expansion (for the police). We're running out of room here and we've got to get the police some more area and we have to keep the fire department up. We must do that.

Local artist brightens high school

Steve Janik may not be another Leonardo Da Vinci — yet, and Northville high school will definitely never be mistaken for the Sistine Chapel.

But, by painting a collection of murals on the school walls this summer, Janik is carefully bringing color and style to the barren cement walls of Northville High.

Janik, 18, a recent graduate of Northville High School, was asked by school principal David Bolitho to paint the murals with the money left over from the Class of 1988 fund.

Boltho said the Class of '88 left the money for school improvements and the murals were chosen to add a "kind of finishing touch" to the building.

"The murals enhance the school," Bolitho said. "We had bare walls before and the murals enhance the

school environment and make the school look less dark."

Bolitto said the murals, which are painted on various walls in the school, add a sense of departmentalism and portray a better building environment.

By departmentalism, Bolitho is referring, for example, to the science section mural which depicts a skull, test tube, and computer, and the geometric shapes on the mural on the mathematics section.

Janik said Bollitho told him before school let out for the summer that the Class of 1968 donated money for improvements, and asked him if he wanted to paint some murals.

Janik said he accepted the job, drew some preliminary sketches, and was given the go-ahead to begin painting them.

In painting the murals, he placed his free-hand sketch onto an opaque projector, traced it onto a wall, and

painted the mural using his own
 choice of colors.

Janik, who will be a freshman at Central Michigan University, this fall, said the ideas for the murals came naturally to him.

"I'm pretty quick at thinking creatively," Janik said, adding he intends on majoring in commercial art at CMU, but would like to eventually transfer to the Center for Creative Studies in Detroit.

As for the mural painting, Janik said he began painting after the July 4th weekend, and has been working four days a week, six hours a day. By working through the end of the summer, he intends to paint a total of seven murals.

Bolitto said Janik has done an "excellent job on the murals thus far" and added all of the credit for the creative and planning work should go to Janik.

Elexco responds to concerns

Erickson.

Erickson said if misrepresentation had occurred during any of the leasing attempts, that may constitute fraud and fraud is a basis for rescission of a lease.

"The letter does not relieve a resident from an agreement, but it establishes a basis of rescission of a lease," Erickson said, adding if a company did not release a homeowner from a lease, the next logical step would be to take the matter to court.

He added if only one homeowner claims misrepresentation then that makes the case harder to prove, but if several landowners say that false things were said that makes the case for rescission much stronger.

Elenco has vehemently denied any form of misrepresentation has occurred during the project leasing attempt.

Mark Trudell, manager, business administration, for Elhexco, said that Pangborn ultimately would make the decision regarding any petition to be released. "It's not really our position to decide that (letting a homeowner out of a lease). We inform our client of that request, but ultimately it's the client's prerogative, but a deal's a deal," Trudell said.

Hansen noted that there were several reasons that misrepresentation in the field was unlikely to happen. He said that field representatives were given explicit instructions on what points to raise, that any complaints found to be true would be dealt with harshly and that there was no financial reward for the representative based on the number of leases obtained.

"We're not standing by each one of those agent's (in the field) and just listing every word they say," Hansen said. "But we have given them very

firm instructions and recognize the situation at hand. We recognize how tense it has become, so to speak; and we've given them very strict instructions as to these are exact terms of reference."

"Point number two, misrepresentation by an agent in the field are grounds for dismissal; and point number three in terms of an incentive for them to misrepresent a situation is there one? . . . No, these people are not paid on a commission or bonus basis, they are paid by a wage basis," Trudell said.

Hansen said he should be contacted directly if any resident feels they were misrepresented. As of last Friday, July 22, Elexco officials said they had received no letters claiming misrepresentation by any agent. The company has received one telephone complaint which Hansen said is being investigated.

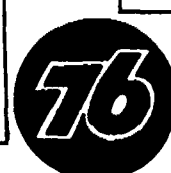

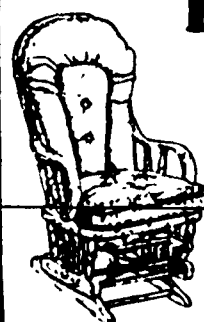

Planner finds many challenges

Being a township planning and zoning director may not be the world's most glamorous occupation. Spending an entire week mountain climbing in the Canadian Rockies may not be the ideal vacation plan for people wanting to relax at elevations somewhat lower than 10,000 feet above sea level.

But, for Carol Henry, being the Northville Township planning director and an avid mountain climber presents some of life's greatest challenges and excitement.

Henry said trying to find a happy medium for developers who want to begin building immediately and residents who want construction never to begin in their area, can be very grueling.

"Trying to be responsive to developers and residents who are coming from different philosophies and pleasing both can be difficult," Henry said, adding it can also be very challenging.

"I look around and have contact with both sides, trying to figure out how the plans apply to the township and taking feedback for all involved."

And while these challenges may be an "uphill climb" for some people, it has been a "smooth ride" for Henry, who has been the township planning director only since last April.

Northville Township Supervisor Georgina Goss said Henry has acquired an excellent grasp of the planning director's duties.

"Carol works well with the planning commission, as she has brought fresh and innovative ideas into the planning department," Goss said. "She also works well with residents and developers which is a plus."

Henry, 28, graduated from the University of Michigan in 1981 with a Bachelor's degree in economics and sociology and with a master's degree in urban planning in 1983.

After graduation, Henry went to work for the Southeast Michigan Council of Government (SEMCOG), where she held the position of planning analyst.

which were technical, but not a programmer level," Henry said, adding she enjoyed the technical aspects of the job.

However, in 1985, Henry left SEMCOG and joined the Wayne County planning department as a general planner. "I worked on a staff which gave support for the planning commission's ordinance changes and rezoning review."

Henry said that during her stay at the county planning department her responsibilities included the overview of solid waste and roads, in addition to day to day requests.

"Yet, despite her seemingly downward progression from her regional job at SEMCOG, to a county job, to a local job with Northville Township, Henry insists she is moving in a positive direction.

"I find it to be much more of a challenge to go from bigger to smaller," Henry said, adding she has always been inclined to do things in a reverse kind of order.

"At Wayne County I provided a general overview, but here in Northville Township I'm getting down to a lower level and having more of an effect because here people listen to you," she added.

In addition, Henry said many more women are being attracted to a career as a planning director, especially at the local level. "Township planning is not a male dominated field by any means," she said.

Police remind of property I.D. rules

The City of Northville Police Department is reminding homeowners that the city has certain rules for identification numbers on buildings.

The City Council adopted the ordinance last October to make it easier for police, firefighters and emergency medical services to find buildings in an emergency. The ordinance includes provisions for minimum size and placement of

street numbers.

The Police Department is going around to buildings within the city which do not meet the ordinance requirements to inform the owners of the rules. Police plan to check again 60 days after the initial visit.

Complete copies of the ordinance are available at City Hall. Among the requirements are:

- Numbers must be on the appropriate side of the building so that

they are clearly readable from the center of the road by a person of normal vision travelling in either direction. If this is impossible, the number must be posted separately from the building, either in the middle of the property, next to the driveway, on a curbside mailbox or on a sign identifying the property.

- Numerals — rather than words — of at least three inches in height must be used. The color must contrast with

the background so the number is readable from the center of the road.

- During construction an identification number must be posted separately from the building.

The ordinance allows for violations penalties of 90 days in jail, a \$100 fine, or both; but penalties may be waived if the Police Department or Building Department certifies compliance with the requirements.

Yerkes house future still up in the air

What's happening to the old Yerkes house?

The house, which many feel could be the oldest historical home in Novi, stands on the north side of Eight Mile Road, between Meadowbrook and Novi Road. The home was built in 1870 by Joseph Yerkes and was slated for a massive refurbishing by a partnership of three developers.

Patricia Hahn, one of the developers, has been working on plans that would have renovated the house itself and added an addition on to the home, making it usable for what she termed, "low-key" offices. The land to the rear of the house has been rezoned by the Novi to permit the construction of eight condominiums. The rezoning is based on renovation and preservation of the historic home.

Hahn and partner Greg Presley received special land use and preliminary site plan approval for the project back in November of 1987. Since that time no work has occurred at the site.

Hahn said the developers have run into a hitch — one partner has pulled out of the deal and the second is looking for either another person to come in on the development, or a buyer.

"We need some more interest," Hahn said, noting that she is still extremely interested in doing the project. She has had preliminary plans drawn up and believes that saving the house is a must for the community and for some intrepid developer.

Hahn realizes the sooner the renovation occurs, the better. The house currently is boarded up, but keeping out vandals and preventing further destruction of the home has been a chore for the developers since

they started, she said. Last Halloween, house watchers were on guard round the clock, she said, to prevent any problems.

"The house is a must," Hahn said, referring to fears by the Novi planning commission that if approval for the condominiums were given, the old house might go by the wayside, leaving only the condos. "If you lose the house you're left with just a piece of ground and you could have gone anywhere," Hahn said. She said the whole point to the design of the condominiums was to tie-in with the spirit and design of the historic home.

She would love to get the concept moving again, and to do so would be willing to work with another partner or to sell to someone who could carry on the idea of the redevelopment, she said. "I'm going to keep pushing for it," she said.

"Novi was marvelous," Hahn said referring to all the work done to allow the office and multiple zoning on the historic home site. Her plans call for "very much an Italian architecture," for the condominiums, she said.

"I still have hope. It's a piece of history and Novi should have it," Hahn said.

Incumbent trustees deserve re-election

Residents of Northville Township must go to the polls next Tuesday and vote in a primary election that will, in fact, decide the outcome of the November election. Five Republican candidates are running for four seats on the Township Board.

While it is heartening to see at least one person, Myron Kasey, come forward from the community to run for a place on the board, after reviewing the qualifications and goals of all five candidates, we endorse the four incumbents, RICHARD ALLEN, THOMAS HANDYSIDE, JAMES NOWKA and DON WILLIAMS to return to their seats on the board.

The incumbent board has handled most issues before it in a responsible and effective manner, and their collective knowledge of the current issues facing the township is worthy of note. The most recent signing of the sewer agreement between members of the Western Townships Utility Authority, which includes Northville Township, and the Ypsilanti Treatment facility is a good example of an organized and effective board working steadily toward a solution to a highly critical problem for the residents of the township.

While the board does seem able to work toward common goals and to tackle complicated issues in a systematic way, each of the members of the board does give voice to independent thought, an important considera-

tion when choosing representatives.

Kasey, the challenger, is to be applauded for taking an active interest in the work of township government. Kasey expressed several good ideas for the betterment of life in the township, the most interesting of which was the need for more small, neighborhood parks in individual subdivisions within the township.

One of the values of having active participation in elections is that each candidate brings with him or her ideas that represent a segment of the entire population. An election can become a clearinghouse for those ideas, and although the candidates themselves may not reach the board, hopefully many of their thoughts will.

Likewise, candidates must do more than just communicate vague "wish lists" that capture the imaginations of voters. Each wish must be accompanied by realistic methods for funding, or they become merely election rhetoric.

It is hoped that the future will see more residents of the township coming forward and getting involved in government. While Kasey may not at this time have the necessary experience for a job on the board, it is hoped that he, and others, will remain involved in the township and volunteer for other committees where they can become familiar with issues on a first-hand basis.

Township primary vote highlights flaw in rules

The primary ballot for next week's election in Northville Township points out a serious flaw in state election law — a flaw which the appropriate officials ought to correct.

The ballot includes party nominations for all the elective township offices: supervisor, clerk, treasurer and four trustees. On the Republican side of the ballot, the only contest is for the trustee positions.

On the Democratic side of the ballot, there aren't any contests at all. That's because there aren't any candidates. For any of the offices.

That's not a big surprise, we all know the area is largely Republican. But the result is that, in effect, township voters are electing their officials in the primary.

In itself, this fact might not be a problem. But the way the primary is set up — on a party basis — causes a very serious problem.

First, anyone voting in the Democratic primary automatically loses their chance to vote for their local officials, those who oversee the workings of the community. Democrats in the township should not have to choose between exercising their vote on the township level and exercising it elsewhere.

Of course, the argument can be made that if township Democrats are so concerned about their local government, why don't they run for office? But there are several legitimate answers to that question — most obviously, they don't run because they couldn't win.

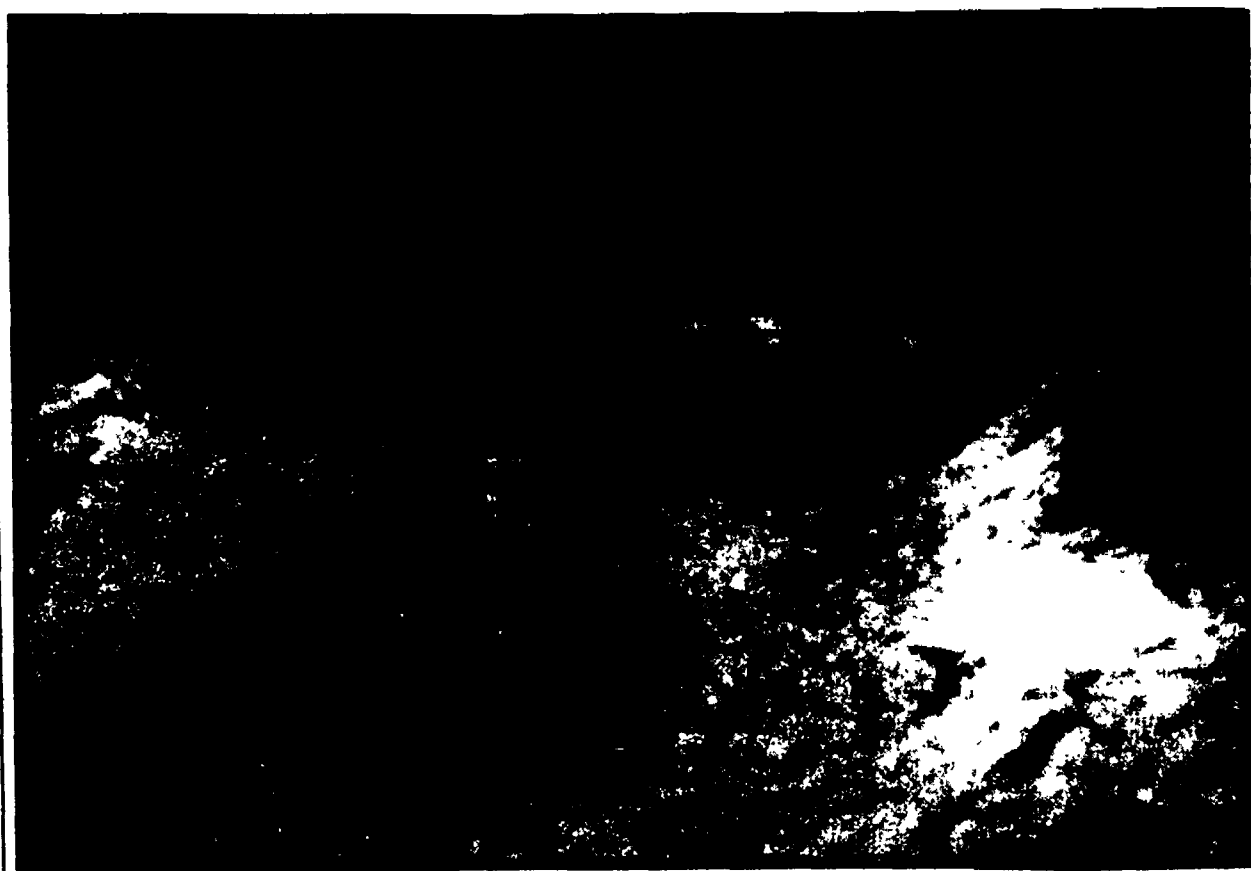
Ditto with that brash men's club, the State Legislature. They're still getting mileage out of the BEST program, the largest bureaucratic joke on earth. Haven't done much else.

S.W.A.P. program goes on successfully

This is another in the continuing series of columns written for the Record by Charles Stilec, Northville High School Student Assistance Program Coordinator.

Two weeks ago this article concerned itself with a recent development in the Northville Public Schools named S.W.A.P. (Summer Workshop on Awareness and Prevention) which at this writing is in its third week of operation and doing well. For the community, the schools and families it was felt that a further explanation of the program and the forces behind its implementation would be helpful for the present and future.

The Summer Workshop on Awareness and Prevention began in the summer of 1986. The Community Commission on Drug Abuse (CCODA) submitted a proposal for a program geared towards "at-risk" teens to the Skillman Foundation. The vision was to develop a program which would provide education, prevention and early intervention services to teens. SWAP was for and about adolescents.

Thanks to the generosity of the Skillman

Foundation, SWAP was up and running. Students from Livonia Public Schools and Wayne Westland Community Schools benefitted by increasing self-knowledge, self-esteem and group skills. In addition, many were referred to counseling and special programs in order to continue the process of positive growth and a substance abuse-free lifestyle.

Last summer SWAP was continued and once again offered to high risk junior high school students in Livonia and Wayne Westland. CCODA funded and operated the program on its own energies. SWAP was a clear expression of CCODA's commitment to the adolescent population. Once again participants increased self-esteem and self knowledge. Many SWAP students continued with therapy self-help programs and treatment.

The year 1988 saw the expansion of the program to include the Northville Public Schools thanks to the support once again of a Skillman Foundation Grant. Skillman's commitment to programming for this "at risk" population has made it possible to further develop and expand this successful

program. CCODA is grateful for this opportunity and looks forward to new horizons for SWAP this year and in the future.

Presently 45 students are involved in the program which runs five weeks from July 5 - August 4, four days a week, 9 a.m. - noon each day. The daily routine includes community meeting, energizers, art/recreation therapy, presentation of projects and group therapy.

Fifteen Northville students are involved and thanks to the school administration support, a bus has been made available. Thanks also to the teachers, counselors and parents who referred and supported the program.

It's one big step in the right direction in providing alternatives for today's youth, helping them look at themselves, their decisions, their families and supporting positive growth in a creative but also therapeutic way.

Invalid signatures keep Jensen off ballot

U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) won't have a GOP primary challenger after all.

Ann Arbor resident Paul S. Jensen, who filed to run against Pursell in the Aug. 2 primary, was disqualified from the ballot last week. The State Board of Canvassers ruled Jensen failed to file enough valid petition signatures to place his name on the ballot.

Nearly 350 of the 751 signatures Jensen filed were disqualified, state elections spokesman Brad Whitman said. Jensen needed 483 valid signatures.

"There were a variety of reasons

signatures were disqualified," Whitman said. "For instance, 301 signatures were disqualified because signers didn't specify the jurisdiction in which they were registered to vote. Some who said Ann Arbor were really Ann Arbor Township."

An additional 49 disqualified signatures were on a petition page that didn't contain Jensen's name, Whitman said. Another 48 signatures didn't live within the Congressional district. Another page of signatures was disqualified for having improper information.

"He filed with us early, and we told

him there were problems with a number of signatures," Whitman said. "He had time to rectify the situation."

Jensen was unavailable for comment. A spokesperson for Pursell declined to comment on the situation.

Jensen announced his candidacy in December. He is a former Ann Arbor mayoral candidate. In an announcement mailed to newspapers, he listed his political experience as "campaign manager for six years (and) registered lobbyist in Lansing and Washington."

With Jensen off the ballot, Pursell, a six-term representative from


Plymouth, automatically secures the GOP nomination and has no contest until November, when he'll face either state Sen. Lana Pollack (D-Ann Arbor) or Ann Arbor resident Dean Baker. Pollack and Baker, the 1986 party nominee, will face each other in the Democratic primary.

O'Hair to return as prosecutor, Raymond J. Wojtowicz to return as county treasurer and Forest E. Youngblood to return as register of deeds.

The Democrats have no formal opponent for Heintz.

OAKLAND COUNTY Non-partisan

Oakland County voters within the Northville School District will vote on the one-mill proposal from the Wayne County Intermediate School District (see above). In addition, the non-partisan section of the ballot includes two judicial races.

Oakland voters may vote for two of 13 candidates for new terms on the Court of Appeals. The candidates are Dean David Alan, J. Martin

Brennan, Paul A. Cassidy, Mark J. Cavanagh, Patrick Cleary, Paul J. Fischer, E. Thomas Fitzgerald, Kathleen Jansen, Marilyn Kelly, M. Richard Knoblock, Richard D. Kuhn, Ellen E. Mason and David M. Serotkin.

One six-year term on the county Probate Court is also up for election. The five candidates are Thomas M. Brennan, Hugh Dean, James P. Delaney, David I. Kaufman and Joan E. Young.

Partisan — Republican
Local Republican voters can participate in deciding three area races: candidates for U.S. Senate, Oakland County prosecutor and county drain commissioner. Dunn and Huber are running to oppose Riegle for the Senate (see above).

Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson is not seeking reelection, opening the way for four candidates to seek his party's nomination. The four are Richard D. Fessler, Jeffrey M. Leib, Jack J. McDonald and Dick Thompson.

William Eckstein is opposing incumbent Drain Commissioner George Kuhn for the Republican Party nomination to that post.

Several Republicans, all incumbents, have no primary opposition. They are Representative in Congress William Broomefield, County Executive Daniel Murphy, Sheriff John Nichols, State Representative Willis Bullard Jr., County Clerk and Register of Deeds Lynn Allen, County Treasurer C. Hugh Dohany and County Commissioner John Calandro.

Partisan — Democrat
Area Democrats in Oakland County have only one party contest in the primary: Philip R. Marcuse and Diana Trivax are both seeking a chance to oppose Allen for Oakland County Clerk and Register of Deeds.

Democrats are offering a full slate of opponents to Republican incumbents, but none of the other positions feature primary opposition. The candidates are Riegle for senator, Gary Kohut for representative in congress, Kurt Thornblad for state representative, William G. Wolfram for county executive, Barry E. Kraemer for prosecuting attorney, Tommylyle Dizotell for sheriff, Steve Allen for county treasurer, Douglas Kuthy for drain commissioner and Leo Foley for county commissioner.

Walters reports no pressure problems

City residents have not been reporting any serious water pressure problems lately, but that is due more to the recent rain than to any improvements in the water system, City Manager Steve Walters said Tuesday.

"It isn't at all that anything's been corrected," Walters said, but simply that water demand throughout the Detroit area has fallen recently.

The high demand caused by the drought has worsened an annual water pressure problem in some city homes, particularly those near Amerman Elementary School. The

problem usually isn't bad enough to cause the City of Detroit — from which Northville's water comes — to change the system, Walters said.

The only real long-term problem will arise if a drought like this year's becomes a regular happening, he added.

However, some improvement may be on the way in the form of a planned new water main along Maple Road. That line, if and when it is completed, will serve a large area north of the city. That would reduce the demand on feeder lines in this area, Walters said.

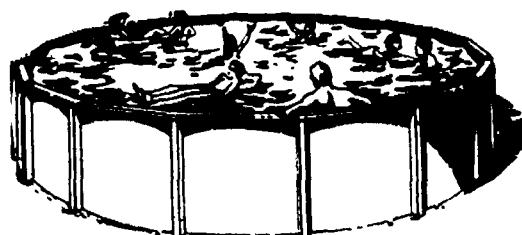

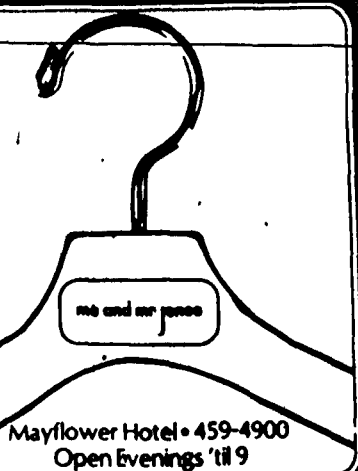

"Before you start house-hunting," says Gerald Kosmetsky, president of Southern Michigan Home Owners Warranty Corporation, "you need to consider the qualities that will make your home a wise investment for resale — the features that will maintain and may increase your home's value even eight years down the road when it's time to sell."

Some builders offer only a one- or two-year personal warranties without insurance backing. That isn't going to provide you or your potential buyers with much protection against structural defects that might surface in later years and reduce the value of your home. You should look for a builder who provides 10 years of insurance and warranty protection.

"With a HOW (Home Owners Warranty) resale home," Kosmetsky says, "buyers gain an extra advantage from the transfer of the 10-year protection plan. That can be a key selling point."

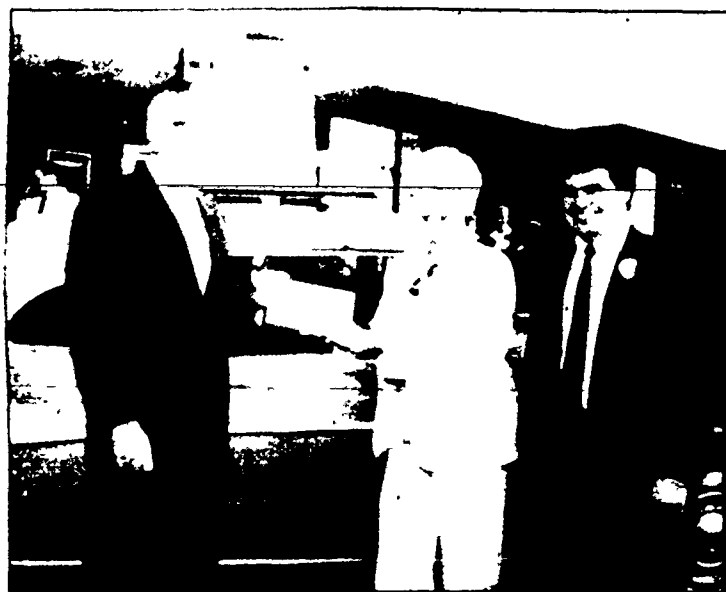

Raising 'Junior' requires wise planning

Money Management

As Junior lies napping in his crib, it's easy to forget that your bundle of joy will likely cost you a bundle of money — a very large bundle.

According to moderate estimates of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the basic cost of raising a child to 18 years of age has skyrocketed nearly 73 percent in the past nine years — from \$55,685 in 1978 to \$95,933 in 1987.

Those figures represent the cost of food, shelter and clothing only. Add on medical bills, vacations, day-care, summer camp, a college education and perhaps a wedding, and you are easily talking a quarter of a million dollars.

How can you raise the funds to finance your child's future? According to the Michigan Association of CPAs, the answer is relatively simple — plan wisely, start saving as early as possible and invest carefully.

In order to accommodate the new addition to your family, you will probably need to adjust your monthly budget — cutting back on such expenses as travel and entertainment. But as most new parents soon find out, those expenses have a mysterious way of diminishing all by themselves as soon as an infant is in the house. More importantly, if your budget has not included a savings factor up until now, it's time to make a change.

Your primary concern should be building a nest egg to support your child's later expenses, such as a college education. And for good reason. Some financial soothsayers predict that in 18 years, four years at a reputable college could cost close to \$100,000.

If you are struggling to move your savings account out of the three-digit range, building an account of \$100,000 may seem an impossible dream. But

if you start saving now, when your child is young, the dream is obtainable. Invest \$2,740 a year at an interest rate of eight percent and in 18 years, you'll have \$100,000.

If you can't afford to save a little over \$200 a month, invest whatever amount is reasonable — just make sure that as your annual income increases, so do the deposits to your child's savings account.

How you invest your savings is one of the most critical decisions you can make. Don't let time pressures lure you into following an investment strategy that a neighbor or favorite uncle suggests. Get expert advice and research all options.

Let's look at the most common financial advice that young parents receive: Build funds and shift tax liability to your child by moving income and assets into a "Custodial Account for Minors" or by having each parent donate a tax-free gift of up to \$10,000 to the child. For the average family, there are several reasons why this advice should be viewed with caution.

First of all, tax reform has greatly reduced the benefits of income shifting. As of January 1, 1987, any investment income over \$1,000 that belongs to a child under 14 is taxed at the parent's top marginal rate. For children 14 or older, however, earned income is taxed at their own rate.

Secondly, shifting income into a custodial account means relinquishing control of the assets to your child. You cannot use the funds for your own purposes, even in emergencies, nor can you use the funds to pay for ordinary expenses for your child.

Moreover, in most states your child will gain full access to the money at age 18, and may very well opt for a trip to Tahiti instead of four years at Harvard.

Finally, by shifting income to your child, you may adversely affect the amount of federal financial aid he or she may one day receive. Under the Congressional Method of determining the amount of money a family can contribute to the cost of a college education, parent's assets are calculated at 5 percent of their value as opposed to 35 percent for the student's assets. Thus, a savings account of \$10,000 held in your name would add only \$500 to the family contribution, while the same account in your child's name would increase the family contribution by \$3,500.

You can avoid some of the drawbacks of shifting income to a child by placing the funds in a trust for minors. In many states, the trust will not release assets to the child until he or she is 21, and you can impose conditions as to how the money is distributed and for what purposes. For these benefits, you will generally have to pay a lawyer to set up the trust as well as an annual fee for the bank or trust company acting as trustee. The trust also has to pay any taxes due on the accumulated interest.

Generally, saving for your child's future should be no different than saving for your own. Choose investments which have a risk factor and yield compatible with your goals. If tax deferral is of great concern to you, consider options that defer taxes without requiring you to shift

substantial amounts of income to your child. For example, you can buy U.S. Treasury EE series bonds in your own name and defer taxes on the interest earned for up to 12 years, or buy them in your child's name with a maturity date that defers taxes until after your child reaches age 14. In either case, you receive decent interest and a guaranteed minimum return.

Another type of bond to consider is the "zero coupon" bond, which is offered at a price substantially lower than its face value. What makes these bonds a good investment is their high rate of return when they mature. Note that while these bonds pay no interest to the holder, the investor is nevertheless taxed as if interest were paid out annually. For this reason, you may prefer zero-coupon municipal bonds. The interest is exempt from federal taxes and from state and local taxes if you buy bonds issued by the state in which you live. Certain municipal bond funds can also offer triple tax-free returns.

Single-premium annuities have become an increasingly popular way to accumulate tax-deferred savings. But be warned — in many cases, you may be subject to surrender charges if you decide to withdraw a portion of your investment before a specified amount of time has elapsed. Equally important, Congress is considering provisions that would reduce or eliminate the tax benefits of using insurance policies as savings plans.

When saving for your child's future, consider the potential risks and returns of an investment first and tax implications second. Follow sound financial strategies and make sure your portfolio is diversified.

If you are overwhelmed by all the options, CPAs advise you to consult a financial expert.

Painting houses keeps college student busy

and is graduating from Michigan State University. Scott Sinkwitz is in his second season with Neal, as is John McRae who attends the University of Missouri.

Last week another veteran of the crew, Doug Ayers, a student at Purdue, was on vacation — he was serving as a counselor at American Legion Boys State in East Lansing.

"You can't judge a painter just by age," Neal warns, pointing to Chris Goode, a Northville High School graduate of the Class of 1988. "He's going to be my best painter," predicts Neal.

When he adds a crew member,

Neal explains, the new painter goes through a training period before he ever dips into paint.

"First I have him moving things — ladders, drop cloths. Until he's learned, he won't start the actual painting."

Neal adds that he's careful about allowing painters on the roof of a home being painted. If it's interior painting, Neal himself does the painting with an assistant to help with preparation.

Neal also is the firm's only estimator.

"There's a lot of responsibility (to being in business)," he observes.

While he cuts down on hours during the school year, Neal and his crew

work at Christmas and other breaks as well as on weekends.

But Quality Home Painting Company is far from an amateur operation. No loud music accompanies the painters who arrive with a fully-equipped van and work steadily as Neal lays out the job.

"How come I'm the only one who can see where you missed?" he questions as he inspects work closely.

Neal thinks the professionalism has helped keep his workers with him. He also notes realistically that "they get paid more than others (summer painters)."

In addition to hoping eventually to transfer to University of Michigan "where I'll probably end up in

chemical engineering," Neal dreams also of buying an old house in Northville and redoing it completely.

He's still living with his parents, the Ken Neals, in Northville Commons. The Neal family has lived in Northville for 18 years. Les Neal is one of five children. He has been living with his brother in the commons while his parents were in England. Both are natives of Great Britain. Ken Neal has been on assignment there with Ford but now everyone's back in Northville.

Of his usual 94 home painting jobs for a summer, Neal already has 64 lined up for summer '88 and by the last week in June had completed work on 30 of them.

BACK TO WORK for senior citizens

They show up on time. They catch on quickly.

They work ambitiously; these dedicated employees, endowed with a work ethic that's all but dead now.

It's a legion who learned the value of a buck when there weren't many around. They're well-educated. They're downright old-fashioned folks.

All of that explains pretty well why local fast food restaurants, hardware stores, offices, and the like are clamoring to find them and get them on board. That group includes empty-nesters, senior citizens, or mothers who perhaps want a little bit more than "life-at-home" when the children are away at school.

They'll swing back into action this fall, taking their spots in the kitchen, behind the counter, or out

on the sales floor. They'll take the spots usually held by fuzzy-chinned teenagers or struggling college students. They'll do what many local employers are afraid to admit ... a much better job.

Hiring the "older worker" has been a part of the local job scene for years and years, though it's just recently become highly visible. Any daytime trip to a local McDonald's or mall retail store confirms that.

The Oakland County senior citizen population increased 55 percent from 1970 to 1980. There are over 149,000 in the county with more than a third either in the job market or willing to work.

"This is something that's not news to McDonald's," Regional Marketing Supervisor Jan DiNezza said. "We've been hiring senior citizens for years and years."

And according to DiNezza, the partnership has been a good one,

spurred in recent years by well-crafted McDonald's television advertising.

"Bill" is what did it," she said, referring to the quaint "New Kid" commercials which ran last year.

In "New Kid" a silver-haired old gent passes on his friends' invitation to go fishing and instead saunters off "to work," much to their surprise. Work is at a McDonald's restaurant.

"We've got more requests from the media because of that commercial," DiNezza said. "Are we on a senior citizen recruiting program? The answer is no. It was never intended to be that."

"It's just a good commercial," she added. "We've had an overwhelming positive response."

Nonetheless, the "older workers" have definitely become a focal point at McDonald's and other fast food restaurants, where they are

perhaps most visible.

"They're more dependable and they definitely help to fill out the day schedule," said Wixom McDonald's manager Kathy Klink. "We get the full range - 30s, 40s, 50s on up. You'll begin seeing a lot more of them during the fall months."

Northville Hardee's manager Susan Mishler said probably more than half of the restaurant staff will be made up of workers over 40 when the school year rolls around.

"They are generally very reliable and the quality of the work is very good," Mishler said. "Many will take the summers off."

Black's Hardware manager Donna Black has a problem of a different sort. They want the seniors, but can't get enough.

"I like it," she said. "These are things all of these people have done before. On a nice day, the kids just

take off.

"We would love to have them back," she added.

And each day they go off to work, they bust another myth about "the older worker."

To the person, local business operators scoffed at criticisms associated with older workers — that they miss more time because of illness, that they can't adapt, that they are too slow to handle today's modern tasks.

"If you want to come spend a day with them, they'll wear you out," DiNezza said.

Novi Senior Center coordinator Jan McAlpine employs three senior citizens on a part-time basis.

"They can spell, they can add figures," she said. "It's no wonder that they've become very valuable to employers."

"They just have a younger attitude, that's all," McAlpine said.

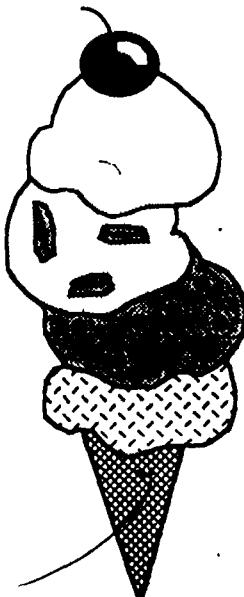

Schoolcraft volunteer gives helpful answers

When a woman of any age suddenly loses her financial support, through death or divorce, she knows she has to do something about it, but doesn't always know what.

And that's where Schoolcraft College's Women's Resource Center comes in with a volunteer peer counselor like Betty Griffin providing someone with whom to talk.

Griffin is in the office, located at the College, for three hours one morning of the five days a week the service is available.

"There are usually two of us there at a time," Griffin said. "One of us answers the phone, and the other handles walk-ins."

The typical clients are women who need to talk about their problems, which primarily include bereavement, divorce, and lack of education in a marketable skill, she said. Sometimes the problems are

complex and the women have difficulty sorting through them.

"As a peer counselor I try to understand what a woman is saying," Griffin said, and then tries to help her look at all of the factors and offers her solutions.

In the office where Griffin sits there is a large bulletin board to which she refers. It lists all of the available information on a variety of support groups plus information on Michigan Department of Labor programs such as Apprenticeship for Women and the Displaced Homemaker Program.

Betty Griffin admitted that peer counselor volunteering isn't for everyone. She found that out when she took the required 48-hour empathy training course three years ago.

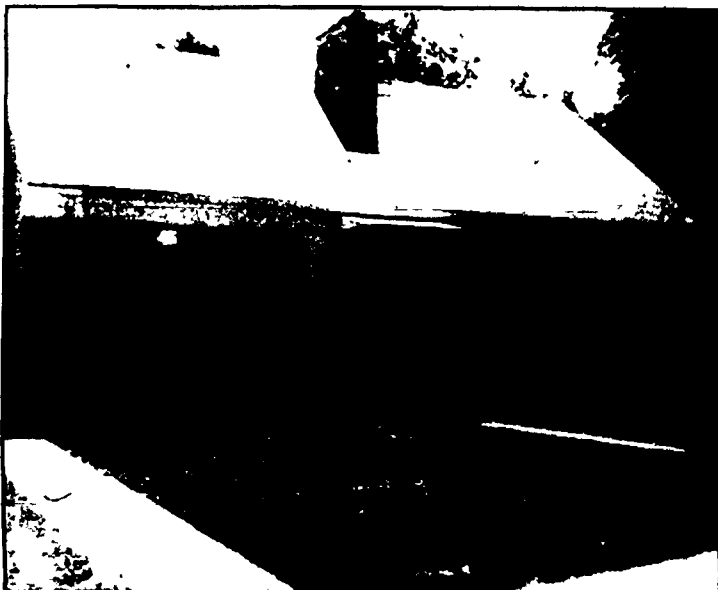
Color is achieved with ageratum, alyssum, impatiens and begonias. A flower garden in the back is a free

Outdoor cafes offer summer treats

It may be overstating the case to say that outdoor cafe arrangements are the latest trend for restaurants in the area — after all, there really aren't very many.

But then again, none of the more popular outdoor cafes in the immediate area has been around for more than five years or so. And three new ones have opened within the past couple of years alone.

So, although the Novi / Northville area may have a way to go before it boasts as many outdoor eateries as Ann Arbor or Royal Oak, people working at the restaurants say they are tremendously popular around here.

Outdoor cafes are particularly popular around lunch time, when harried office workers can get away

from their desk — maybe without windows — and into the fresh air and sunshine.

"It's pretty popular as long as the weather's permitting," said Lisa Parmentier, office manager at Home Sweet Home. "If it's nice weather, people like to get outside if they're stuck in an office building all day long. If you work in a cubicle it kind of drives you nuts."

Maggie O'Neill, a floor supervisor at Key Largo on Walled Lake, agreed. "Office people want to get outside," she said. "The deck is the most popular spot."

Edward Postliff of Edwards Caterer said one attraction is the whole relaxed setting created by the diners or smokers. "That's one of my favorite scenes," he said. "They just don't have any time pressure. It works out well for a lot of people."

Dan LeVan, a bartender and

waiter at MacKinnon's, mentioned the summer atmosphere. "Being out in the fresh air, with a little breeze going — I would always prefer to eat outside. It's really nice," he said.

Here is more information about the four popular, local cafes for outdoor eating:

• **Edwards Caterer** — In addition to a catering business, Edwards has a few tables both inside and outside for light lunches, coffee and muffins, or an afternoon snack. It is located on Dunlap east of Center in downtown Northville.

Edwards has 10 chairs at three tables outside from April through October. Lunch entrees range from about \$4 to \$6.

• **Home Sweet Home** — The newest addition to the area's outdoor dining scene has already expanded once and hopes to do so again. A patio area has been joined by a second-floor cabana

area with about 50 seats between them. A carry-out window with picnic tables is planned for the future, maybe before the end of the summer.

Lunch entrees range from about \$4 to \$7. The restaurant is on Nine Mile just east of Novi Road.

• **Key Largo** — A drive to Walled Lake is rewarded with a lake view from the restaurant's deck, which holds about 65 seats.

Lunch entrees cost between \$4 and \$7. The restaurant is on East Walled Lake drive near downtown Walled Lake.

• **MacKinnon's Golden Goose Cafe** — The deck in back of MacKinnon's on Main Street in Northville is the granddaddy of outdoor cafes in the area. The restaurant offers lunch entrees from about \$4 to \$8.50, with daily specials.

The outdoor cafe includes 10 tables with four seats at each.

Mack squad nips Livonia

There hasn't been a whole lot to cheer about this summer if you're a Northville Connie Mack fan, but the squad ended the regular season with a little fireworks on July 23 against Livonia Churchill.

Northville played one of its best games of the season, according to acting head coach Larry Skynar, en route to a slick, come-from-behind, 4-3 triumph. The victory — combined with two losses last week — gave the Mack team a 6-12 overall record for the season.

Skynar was substituting for John Osborne last week because he is in East Lansing preparing for the Michigan High School All Star Football Game slated for July 30. The longtime Novi mentor is the head coach of the East team.

"It was one of the best games I've seen our team play this season," Skynar said. "This game was for coach Osborne and they won it for him. It was the last game of the regular season and we ended it on a high note. It was an excellent game."

Livonia broke the deadlock with a pair of runs in the second and then added another in the fourth to take command, 3-0. But Northville came back with three in their half of the fifth to tie it, and they did it without the aid of a hit.

"We had three walks, two fielder's choices and a passed ball," Skynar admitted. "It wasn't pretty but we were playing well and running the bases real well."

Northville scored the winning run in the sixth when Jim Willerer and Brian Frellick had back-to-back hits and Willerer scored on another passed ball. In the seventh, starting pitcher Derek Osborne sent Livonia down 1-2-3 to secure the victory.

"Derek did an excellent job," Skynar said. "He picked off two players at first and went the distance."

"Everybody contributed in this game. It was a total team effort and that's the way we wanted to end the season."

WINDSOR 6, NORTHVILLE 5: Windsor scored four runs in the first inning of this game on July 16 so Northville was forced to play catch-up the rest of the way. The locals did eventually pull even to send the game into extra innings but ran out of gas and lost it in eight innings.

"It was a good game but the outcome was very disappointing," Skynar said.

After Windsor jumped in front 4-0, Northville began chipping away at the lead. Mike Yard tripled in Adam Behen in the first and Dave McKee tripled home Osborne in the fifth to cut the lead in half. Then, in the bottom of the seventh with two out, Osborne ripped a clutch two-run single to tie it up.

But in the eighth, Windsor scored twice, their first runs since the first inning, and Northville couldn't match it in their half of the eighth. Randy Jones did double and Frellick did knock him in with a hit, but it was one run shy.

"We didn't give up," Skynar said. "We probably would have won the game if we didn't give them four early runs."

Adam Behen started the game and after getting tagged in the first, he settled down and held Windsor without a run until Jones relieved him in the sixth. Jones gave up the go ahead runs in the eighth and was saddled with the loss. Offensively, Osborne paced the team with three hits in three plate appearances.

HURON VALLEY 9, NORTHVILLE 6: The first time these two teams met, Northville was buried 20-4 so if it's any consolation, the loss on July 21 wasn't nearly as one-sided.

Huron Valley scored three runs in the first inning and another in the fourth before Northville got untracked offensively. In the fourth, Northville narrowed it to 4-3 and the big blow was a three-run homer by Eddie Walsh.

"We came back and it really sparked the kids," Skynar said.

But just when it seemed like Northville would gain the lead, Huron Valley exploded for four runs in the fifth off starter Todd Ebersole. Northville countered with a pair of runs in the bottom half of the inning on RBI hits by McKee and Steve Ventura to make it 8-5 but both teams scored single runs in the sixth to round out the scoring.

Ventura came off the bench to go 2-for-3 with two runs batted in. No other Northville player had more than one hit.

"We put up a pretty good fight," Skynar said.

Northville is now hosting the NABF Senior Regional this week. The seven-team tournament will conclude July 30.

For the third straight year, the city of Northville will be the focus of attention for little leaguer's between the ages of 12 and 16 from all across the United States.

That's because the National Amateur Baseball Federation (NABF) 1988 Junior and Sophomore division World Series will be played here once again. The Senior Regionals is hosted by the Northville Connie Mack entry (coached by John Osborne) and got underway July 28. The six-team, double-elimination event will continue through Saturday (July 30). Other teams competing for the right to advance to the NABF state championship tournament include Huron Valley, Clintondale, Detroit Renaissance, Lincoln Park and Troy. The finals will be held on July 30 at 5 p.m. at the Northville diamond.

Despite winning 16-of-17, Holzer settles for 2nd place

Despite winning 16 of its last 17 games, Tom Holzer Ford can not possibly catch Little Caesars for the Livonia Collegiate Baseball League (LCBL) regular season title this season.

On June 19, Holzer was mired in an early season slump and had a very unimpressive 6-6 record. But since that time, the Northville entry in the LCBL has been on fire, reeling off win after win — transforming a 6-6 mark into a 22-7 record today. Unfortunately, the bad start was a little too much to overcome and now Holzer stands two games out of first place with just one game left during the regular season. Translated it means the team is mathematically eliminated from first place and must settle for the runner-up position for the second straight year.

"Our bad start really hurt us and we certainly didn't get any help from anybody else," Holzer coach Bob Peterson said. "Nobody could beat Caesars except us."

While Holzer was winning three of five against the first place team, Hines Park and Walter's Applance (the league's third and fourth place teams) had a combined 1-11 record against Little Caesars.

In action last week, Holzer merited last place South Lyon 12-2 on July 20 and then proceeded to win their final three games to extend the winning streak to six.

South Lyon actually played Holzer quite tough in the early going and had a 2-1 lead after one inning. Holzer scored three times in the third inning to wrestle back the lead and then closed it out in a hurry with an eight-run explosion in the sixth.

"It was a struggle for much of the

game," Peterson said. "We were a bit apprehensive about the game because it was the third straight game we had played against (South Lyon). But I think it was just a matter of time before we really got the bats going."

Five Holzer starters had two hits in the game, including Paul Newitt, Rick Tavormina, Scott Peterson, Keith Dutkiewicz and Kevin Ritter. But there were only five RBIs because South Lyon chipped in with numerous errors and passed balls.

Bill Bragg started the game for Holzer and pitched four innings before giving way to Dan Hilliard. Bragg fanned four and allowed four hits and registered the victory. Hilliard only gave up one hit in two innings of relief.

TOM HOLZER 1, WENDY'S 0: This July 22 game was actually a forfeit win for Holzer.

"It was rainy on Friday and I guess several of their players assumed incorrectly that it would be rained out," Peterson said. "Only seven of their players showed up and their coach was very upset."

HOLZER 7-6, HINES PARK 2-5: Holzer wrapped up a perfect week with a doubleheader sweep on July 24 over Hines Park. In game one, the Northville entry scored the game's first three runs and then steadily pulled away to win the game easily.

Steve Rudelic (3-for-3, three RBIs), Tavormina (2-for-3) and Newitt (2-for-4) led the hitting attack while pitcher Dan Hilliard provided the pitching. Hilliard held Hines Park to three hits through six innings to notch the win and Tom Cotter relieved in the seventh.

"The pressure was on us to keep

winning and stay within striking distance of Little Caesars," Peterson explained. "We got a good game from Hilliard. His control was real good but he only had one strike out. He made them hit the ball and earn everything."

"We had a lot of timely hits and the bottom of our order really contributed."

The nightcap was much closer. Holzer fell behind early, took the lead in the middle innings and then lost it in the seventh as Hines Park rallied for two runs to knot the score at 5-5. Holzer then calmly scored the game winner in the eighth on a single by Dutkiewicz that scored Rudelic.

"It was beneficial to play in a close game under some pressure," Peterson said. "Hines Park stuck with us in the second game but we kept our composure."

Mike Salach pitched five strong innings in relief of Kevin Knoche, who left with a sore arm, and notched his fourth victory of the season. Salach fanned seven and allowed four walks and five hits.

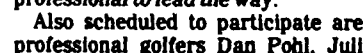

Novi's Schram named to All-Star team

On July 30, Novi's Brian Schram will wrap up a brilliant high school athletic career in style — at the 1988 Michigan High School East-West All Star Football Game in East Lansing.

For Schram, being named to the team was a great honor and thrill. He will be joining 79 of the premier senior football players from all across Michigan in the most prestigious all star game sanctioned by the Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA).

Schram will long be remembered as a versatile athlete who starred as a wide receiver and quarterback for John Osborne's two Kensington Valley Conference (KVC) championship teams in 1986 and '87. He was also one of the area's top basketball centers, one of the county's premier high jumpers and a fine baseball player as well.

Despite leading the Wildcats to within an eye lash of the state Class A title last fall as quarterback, Schram is officially listed on the East squad roster as a wide receiver. At 6-foot-6, Schram is a big target with good hands and surprisingly agile moves, and catching the ball isn't very foreign to him. As a junior, Schram

was a first-string receiver for Novi and a second-string quarterback. He led the team in receiving touchdowns that year and was an All-Area selection.

"I'm not sure why I'm a wide receiver instead of quarterback — I'm just glad to be going," he said. "In my senior year, if we'd had another quarterback instead of me, I would have liked to remain a wide receiver. I like catching the ball more than throwing it."

Schram should have an advantage that nobody else on the East team will have because Osborne — a Northville resident — is the East head coach. Playing for your high school coach in a game like this can have many advantages: knowing the playbook, catching the coach's eye, familiar coaching techniques and the like.

"I've been looking at the playbook and getting football back in my mind for a while now," Schram pointed out. "The playbook is very similar to what we had at Novi so it's definitely an advantage for me. Coach Osborne knows what I can do so hopefully he'll put in a good word for me. Everyone is required to play half the game so I'm not worried about playing time."

Schram is planning to walk-on as a freshman football candidate at Michigan State this fall, and believes his performance in the all star game can help. Being a star in many different sports in high school would lead most to believe that Schram had a hard time settling on one sport to try in college, but it wasn't that way at all.

"It was an easy decision," he said. "I love basketball but I don't see myself as a big-time college player at a place like MSU. But I feel I can contribute to the football team and I'm going to give it my best shot. I have talked to several MSU coaches and they know I'm going to be playing in the game."

"I think (the all star game) will help me — especially if I do well. Maybe the coaches will look at me more in the fall. I'll be out there trying to impress them."

Schram reported to Michigan State on July 21 and has been going through two-a-day practices ever since with his East teammates. The all star game will be the eighth annual and will get underway at 1:35 p.m. at Spartan Stadium.

"I'm confident I'll do well," he said. "This will help me get a head

start on conditioning and I'm sure it will get me thinking more about football."

Schram has put on about 25 pounds since last fall because he believes he'll need to get bigger and stronger to make it in the collegiate ranks. He currently tilts the scales at about 205 but still has a way to go before getting to the desired weight.

"I've been lifting weights this summer at Bo's Gym and it's helping out a lot," Schram explained. "I want to play at about 210 and I'm about five pounds under that right now. It's obtainable but it won't be easy."

During Schram's varsity football career, he started 19 games as a junior and senior and the 'Cats had a remarkable 17-2 mark in that span. In addition, since Schram was brought up to the varsity ranks after his sophomore year, Novi did not lose a single KVC clash in 11 tries and grabbed back-to-back conference crowns.

"It's a great record and I'm proud to be a part of it," he said. "I honestly feel our team should have been the state champs, but I was glad to see the team that finally beat us (Ann Arbor Pioneer) go all the way."

Stay fit with a little common sense

How much of staying in shape is just common sense?

The idea occurred to me while I was unloading groceries in a supermarket lot. A mini-van circled the not-so-large lot four, five and finally six times looking for a close-in parking spot. The day was a warm one, but sunny with no hint of rain in the sky.

While I was watching the van I saw person after person unload their groceries and leave the cart beside their car. The handicapped parking spaces had become a cart zone. If someone had needed to use the spaces they would have been unable to pull in, for able-bodied people had decided the walk back to the store to return the carts was too time consuming or too far.

On the way home from the store I saw three landscape companies cutting and edging lawns in Novi and Northville subdivisions. This is not an unusual sight. The days when mom, dad or junior mowed the lawn themselves are decreasing. More and more people hire out the work that would make them break a sweat.

Yet health club memberships are soaring. Diet and exercise books dominate the bestseller lists and video markets. People spend time every day doing aerobics, jogging, lifting weights and stretching in an effort to give their muscles a workout. Is one kind of sweat better than another?

The truth is that it may be more socially acceptable to sweat in a health club in matching leotard and tights rather than while washing walls in a paint-spattered t-shirt. But is spending money to hire people to do the dirty work and then spending money to go out and sweat, contradictory?

"There's no question about it," Dr. Thompson at Providence Hospital in Novi said. "There is some indication that you don't have to go out and jog 30 minutes every other day to stay in

shape — although that's good if you can do it," he said.

Experts point out that there are different sorts of workouts and different values to be obtained by each one. While almost any diet and exercise book will urge people to spend more time walking — most encourage their readers to park further from stores and walk to the entrance, to take the stairs and not the elevator, they all stress the necessity for some type of aerobic workout as well.

But don't discount the value of picking up a rake and taking to the yard. For too many of us days are spent sitting behind desks and the

walk from the car to the office is the only exercise we get. A regular program of movement, be it yard work or vigorous household tasks, is good for us. Anyone who has spent the day painting after months of inactivity will remember the aching muscles that accompanied the sudden movement.

Painting, or weeding, or raking all involve muscles and all burn calories. Like any form of exercise, inactive people should ease into chores that require a lot of energy. Pulled muscles, tendonitis and other sports related injuries are also com-

mon with people who dive into scrapping an entire house after sitting for the winter watching television.

Moderation and balance seem to be the key words to any form of exercise. While construction workers may develop their upper body strength with continual lifting of heavy beams, they may not be doing enough aerobic activity to ensure a healthy heart. Likewise, a balanced program involving several types of activities, be it weeding and walking or lawn mowing and painting, combined with stretching and other forms of exercise lead to a healthier overall lifestyle.

Red Cross offers health, safety classes

"Babysitting" teaches young people ages 11 years and older basic child care skills which include diapering, feeding and bathing infants and handling emergencies. Certificates will be awarded upon successful completion of the course. The cost is 50 cents for materials.

"Church Nursing" provides basic health care skills to aid the sick or injured in the church and community.

A nine-hour course, "Parenting," explores alternate approaches to raising children and

focuses on nurturing and teaching. Topics covered include discipline and guidance, television viewing, language and intellectual development, nutrition and health. The cost of the course is \$4.16 for books and training supplies.

Fitness Tips

Pregnancy puts stress on structural weak points

As humans evolved from walking on four legs to walking on two legs, the functions of the support structures changed and the role of the muscles became paramount in supporting the body in the upright position. The spine, abdominal muscles and the muscles forming the pelvic floor became structural weak points in our anatomy. Pregnancy, although a natural physiological process, puts additional stress on these and other structures. Often that additional stress and potential problems that can arise from that stress, such as lower backache, are only recognized once the problems occur. However, most problems can be avoided through proper preparation, such as with a regular exercise program.

The "S" shape of the spine evolved to counteract the force of gravity on erect posture. Pregnancy adds additional weight and a change in the body's center of gravity that cause the curves in the spine to be more pronounced. The more pronounced

the curves in the spine, the more the muscles are stressed. Inadequate muscular support of the spine will cause the pelvis to tip forward, resulting in poor posture, fatigue and backache because the muscles are forced to do work they were not designed to do.

The abdominal muscles, which support the spine against gravity in four-legged animals, do little in the vertical position that humans assume. Due to our industrialized society in which we mostly sit or stand, they do even less, resulting in weakened muscles. During pregnancy, the abdominal muscles have the task of supporting the growing uterus and weight of the baby and, therefore are required to be stronger and more elastic than normal. If the abdominal muscles are weak, then during pregnancy they will become stretched and will strain rather than support the spine.

In assuming the upright position we forced the pelvic floor muscles to do more rather than less work. They must now withstand the forces of

gravity and support the pelvic organs. Although the action is minute, we do have the ability to contract these muscles to counteract the effects of gravity. Pregnancy, due to the weight of the uterus and child, puts additional stress on these muscles. If these muscles are not kept in a healthy state prior to and during pregnancy, they run a greater risk of being injured during the delivery.

All other muscular systems, during and after pregnancy, are similarly stressed due to the additional weight of the child that the mother has to carry. If the muscles have been exercised and are strong and healthy, then the burden of the extra weight becomes easier to handle. If the muscles are weak prior to pregnancy, then it can be difficult to move, which will result in fatigue, less movement and, therefore, weaker muscles.

To avoid the problems made prevalent by evolution and industrialized society, it is important to engage in a regular exercise pro-

gram throughout your lifetime, especially during pregnancy when there are additional stressors placed on your body. Before starting an exercise program, be sure to check with your doctor.

If you are pregnant, make sure your program is designed for pregnant women because pregnancy predisposes a woman to certain kinds of injuries. Also make sure the program follows the guidelines set up by The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists to ensure that you and your child will be as safe as you can be.
