## Incumbents win in township trustee race

In an election characterized by an extremely low voter turnout, all of the incumbents of the Northville Township Board of Trustees won reelection.

As of early Wednesday morning, the unofficial results in the trustees race show that Donald Williams was the overall winner with 799 votes, Richard Allen was second with 756, followed by Thomas Handyside with 742, James Nowka with 700, and challenger Myron Kasey had 361.

The top four finishers in the trustee race won the Republican primary and since there is no Democratic opposition, they in effect won reelection to the board. Voter turnout for the primary was only about 11 percent.

Township Clerk Thomas Cook said

the voter turnout, which he characterized as extremely low, was probably due to the fact that there was little opposition in the local election.

Township Supervisor Georgina Goss, Clerk Thomas Cook and Treasurer Richard Henningsen all won the Republican primary without opposition and will all be running unopposed in the November general election. Likewise, Wayne County Commissioner Susan J. Heintz (R-Northville) won the Republican primary, as she was unopposed.

In the primary for township constable, Edward J. Mroz received 681 votes, and James Schrot received 770 votes. Both were running unopposed for the two constable openings.

Challenger Myron Kasey, who lost in the trustee election but was elected

as precinct delegate to the county convention, said he still feels he accomplished what he went after in the election.

"I always believe there should be enough candidates to give people a choice," Kasey said. "As a challenger, I forced issues out onto the table which I believe enriches the township."

Kasey said he feels it is his responsibility to run in local elections "because we should all do what we can to make this community a better place to live."

Goss agreed with Kasey that more participation by the community helps to bring out the issues, but said it is good for the township to return the board of trustees intact.

## Local votes copy most area totals

Although the unofficial results show a couple of oddities in local balloting, Northville voters for the most part fell in line with the totals in area races.

Totals show 1,709 Northville Township voters turned out for Tuesday's primary, a turnout of about 11 percent. The City of Northville — with the only local race being one precinct delegate position — saw just 610 voters, about a 6 1/2 percent turnout.

Here's a summary of how local votes went on county and state questions:

#### NORTHVILLE TOWNSHIP

##### Non-partisan ballot

Township voters helped pass the one-mill, 10-year tax proposal for new Wayne County jail space. The township total was 744 yes and 675 no, as the county as a whole passed the issue.

On the one-mill tax for handicapped education in the Wayne County

Intermediate School District, Northville Township voters voted no by a margin of 757 to 662.

In the Court of Appeals, first district race — in which a field of nine candidates was cut to four, with two judges to be elected in November — Northville Township totals were basically in line with the early returns throughout the district. Township voters cast 415 votes for Maureen Reilly, 348 for Thomas Brennan, 332 for John Kirwan, 319 for Y. Gladys Barsamian, 199 for Richard Hathaway, 149 for Martin Maher, 64 for M. John Shamo, 54 for Patrick Conlin and 53 for Gary Gardner.

##### Republican ballot

Northville Township gave a strong push to Jim Dunn over Robert Huber in the race to challenge Donald Riegle for the U.S. Senate in November. In this, the only non-local

## A few residents want out of oil leases

A small group of Grandview Acres subdivision residents have sent letters to Elexco Land Services Inc., in an attempt to break their oil leases with the company.

As of Tuesday, Aug. 2, six letters were sent to Elexco, copies of which were also given to the Record. Of the six, three of the residents writing to the leasing firm asked to be let out of their signed leases. The other three letters sent back unsigned leases and uncashed checks for \$100 — a signing incentive given by the leasing company.

Donald Bladorf said he signed a lease, but will have "considered the lease null and void due to the circumstances surrounding the signing."

"Mr. Steve Kerr misrepresented your policies, the laws of the state of Michigan, and your company in his sales pitch to us," Bladorf wrote.

"Mr. Kerr's assurance of the site of the well and the fear generated by 'missing out' on royalties from the well were what caused us to sign the lease. Therefore, we are sending you a check for \$100.00 as return for the payment made to us."

Carl Erickson, an attorney for a project area resident, said that if misrepresentation had occurred during any of the leasing attempts, that may constitute fraud and fraud is a basis for rescission of a lease.

"The letter does not relieve a resident from an agreement, but it establishes a basis of rescission of a lease," Erickson said, adding if a company did not release a homeowner from a lease, the next logical step would be to take the matter to court.

Elexco General Manager Randall Hansen said he received one letter from a project area resident as of Tuesday, Aug. 2, and has had a full investigation into the situation.

"Based on a corporate investigation into our land agents, unless something substantiates the misrepresentation claims of the resident, we've uncovered nothing and there will be no discharging of any leases," Hansen said.

He added that Elexco would respond to all letters sent to the company concerning the securing of the oil leases.

Hansen said his company has secured leases for many other projects and Northville is the first community in which allegations of misrepresentation have occurred.

Pangborn Exploration company, a Traverse City based oil company, recently told Elexco, its leasing agent, to stop seeking new leases in the Meadowbrook and Grandview subdivisions on a day-to-day basis.

Pangborn Land Manager Paul Domagalski said he gave Elexco terms by which to secure the leases, and based on conversations with

Elexco officials he believes there has been no misrepresentation.

Pangborn hired Elexco to seek oil leases from 106 property owners on 120 acres in the two Northville Township subdivisions. The company is seeking the right to explore for oil or natural gas on the property. The subdivisions are located on the north side of Seven Mile Road, directly across from Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital.

Domagalski said Pangborn Exploration has been in business since Dec. 1983, and they have done drilling in many southeast Michigan communities, although none in Wayne County.

"Wayne County is new (for oil drilling) because it is heavily populated," he said. "All the easy stuff has been found in the state, but the more difficult projects are now being taken on."

## Officials say the city can't enforce sub rules

to the council.

Members of a subdivision association looking for the city's help in enforcing its bylaws heard Monday that the city does not have that power.

Fred Nickrand, chairperson of the architectural review committee for the homeowners' association in Abbey Knoll Estates, told the City Council about two cases in which homeowners did not follow pool plans approved by the association.

In one case, Nickrand said, the city issued a final permit for a pool before the owner completed a required fence. Mayor Chris Johnson said the city administration would investigate that issue and report back

But the larger issue Monday concerned the nature of the bylaws of a subdivision association. In the second case Nickrand described, the association approved a plan for a pool which the owner changed before going to the city for permits.

Nickrand said the city should enforce the association bylaws, or at least notify the association when a plan reached the city with changes.

But City Manager Steve Walters said the city did notify two or three people involved in the association. And Mayor Chris Johnson explained a recent legal opinion from the city

## Council rejects lower Allen Terrace entry age

The minimum age for entering the city's senior housing complex will stay at 62, the City Council decided Monday.

The council unanimously rejected a Housing Commission recommendation that the city drop the minimum age for entering Allen Terrace from 62 to 55. Several council members said they were concerned about the effect of the change on the waiting list and the trust fund; and that the reasons in favor of the change did not outweigh these concerns.

Housing Director Fran Hopp presented figures showing that there are only four people younger than 62 currently on the Allen Terrace waiting list. However, City Manager Steve Walters commented that this does not mean there are not more people interested. People probably simply have not applied until they reached the minimum age, he said.

Walters gave the council a memo on the trust fund which stated the ef-

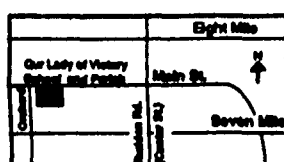

## NEWS BRIEFS

**RIVER ROUGE TABLED** — The Northville Township board postponed action on paying \$800 in dues to the River Rouge Watershed Council, last Thursday.

The action was done to allow township manager Steve Brock an opportunity to report to the board on the work done by the council.

**TRACK TAX LIMBO** — State legislators have taken no action on a \$6.6 million sum designated to be returned to Michigan cities with horse racing tracks.

The money, in the Department of Agriculture, is left from annual returns of state taxes to track cities. However, officials have said that it likely will not be returned to the cities but used for agriculture programs instead.

The issue is before a committee in Lansing, but the committee has not met recently, City Manager Steve Walters said last week.

**BID DEADLINE SET** — The City of Northville has set a deadline of 5 p.m. Aug. 22 for firms to submit bids on conducting three studies for the city.

The studies, to be funded with Community Development Block Grant money, will consider commercial development of the Cady Street corridor area; will explore future uses of the Northville Ford Plant; and will update the official city Master Plan.

The city has advertised the project in a trade journal and with direct mailings to planning firms.

**YOUTH SYMPHONY AUDITIONS** — The American Youth Symphony will hold auditions for all interested musicians between the ages of 8 and 20. Auditions will be held Aug. 24-27. Call Susan Gardner, 349-1894 for an appointment and further information. A number of Northville youths are already a part of this orchestra.

**SCHOOLCRAFT ENROLLMENT UP** — Schoolcraft College's summer student enrollment increased this year. Compared to last year, student enrollment increased 61 percent and credit hour enrollment increased 71 percent. These figures represent the greatest increase in students and hours taken since 1983. The College's continuing Educational Services department reported a 21 percent increase in student enrollments and a 50 percent increase in courses taken.

Northville teen charged with shooting school windows

A local youth has been charged with five counts of malicious destruction of property in connection with the shooting out of five windows at Northville High School last month. After turning himself in to Northville police, the youth, 17, was released on \$50 cash bond, police said. He faces a court date Aug. 23. fect of lowering the age would be tough to guess. However, he said the trust fund - which provides rent subsidies to low-income residents - is

being completely used for the current fiscal year.

"I just really can't see the practicality of lowering the age limit,"

Mayor Pro Tem Carolann Ayers said. Council member Paul Folino suggested there might be people who would take advantage of a lowered age by continuing to work while pay-

ing Allen Terrace's lower-than-market rent. "That would be my main concern," he said. "The case really hasn't been made at this point," Mayor Chris Johnson concluded.

The council voted down the recommendation 5-0. The Housing Commission had based its request for the minimum age on four factors: maintaining a

senior citizen age group, the recognition of the Older Americans Act of 60 as the minimum age, the difficulty of finding affordable housing before Social Security benefits start, and minimal impact on the waiting list.

## Gas tanks won't affect Ford plant

A gas tank warranty extension for two Ford Motor Company models probably won't have an effect on the future of the Northville Ford Plant, a company official said Monday.

Ford recently announced a warranty extension — wrongly reported in the Detroit News as a recall — on the gas tanks of 609,898 1986 and 1987 Ford Taurus and Mercury Sable models.

The Northville Ford Plant, which the company has scheduled for a final closing in December, assembles gas tanks. And upon hearing of the tank problem, some Northville Ford workers thought that might mean the plant would stay open longer, at least for a while, to fill the extra tank demand.

"Dearborn Engine can't really make our tanks. If they have to make that 600,000 — that was their whole production for last year," UAW Local 896 President Norm Fultz said Friday after reading the incorrect Detroit News article. "That might even help us, for another year or so."

But Chuck Searly, public affairs manager for Ford Parts and Service, emphasized that the company does not expect the problem will be very widespread, and therefore not requiring a recall.

"We're not recalling 600,000 vehicles. We're extending the warranty and if you have a problem, you can bring the vehicle in and have it

fixed for free," Searly explained. "We think it's going to be a fairly small number. I guess we'll know more once people start bringing them in."

Searly said he understood the plant employees' reasoning about a recall possibly meaning a new life for the plant. "It very well could have, if we were going to need 600,000 tanks. (But) I don't think it'll have any effect on that plant at all," he said.

A written statement from John P. King, parts and service engineering office manager, says that the warranty extension covers 1986-87 Taurus and Sable cars with 3.0-liter V-6 engines. The warranties will now run through Oct. 31, 1989, and will cover all parts and labor costs. The company will reimburse owners who have already paid for repairs.

The company's concern is that the cars may experience driving problems at low fuel levels. Problems might include hesitation, stumbling and / or a short loss of power during acceleration or sharp cornering, the statement reads. The fuel gauge might also fall to "empty" and stay there.

The release states that the problems are caused by expansion of the tank resulting in unusable fuel below the fuel pickup.

Searly said the company expects that any problems which are going to develop will do so relatively soon.

Owners are to be notified by mail of the warranty extension.

## City to study Beal Avenue bridge repair

A bridge on Beal Avenue in Northville has been closed for several weeks for safety, but plans are underway for repair.

"It's deteriorated quite badly, and it just isn't safe to have it open," Department of Public Works

Superintendent Ted Mapes said Tuesday.

The city engineers are studying the bridge for repairs, Mapes said, and a report might be finished within a couple of weeks. The cost of repairing

the bridge, and how to pay for that cost, are the two big questions, he said.

Depending on the answers to those questions — and how much work needs to be done — the bridge may or may not be repaired during this construction season, Mapes said.

The bridge is on Beal Ave between River and Griswold streets, just east of the Northville Downs parking lot. It crosses a small branch of the Middle Rouge River.

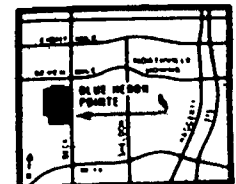

## Fire guts resident's barn

The Northville Township fire department battled a fire in a pole barn behind a resident's home off of Ridge Road near Seven Mile Road last Friday.

Township Fire Chief Robert Toms said an exact cause of the blaze, which lasted for about an hour, is still unknown, but he speculated that extreme heat combined with oily rags and propane tanks kept in the barn probably had something to do with it.

Fireman responded to the blaze at 10:30 a.m. Friday. Toms said the fire was probably smoldering for seven or eight hours before an explosion caused it to get out of control. He estimated the damage to be around \$45,000.

Debra Cullen said her parents, who own the house, were on vacation at the time of the fire. She said she heard a noise while she was inside the house and went to the barn to investigate. As she opened the barn door, Cullen said the fire began to intensify.

"I looked out the window and saw smoke," Cullen said. "I thought the neighbors were burning leaves but I went out to the barn and opened the door and saw the fire."

Cullen said a young girl babysitting for the neighbor's children called the fire department.

She added she felt extremely lucky that the fire was confined to the barn, since the structure is only about 30 feet from the house.

## City to look into Taft Roads

The City of Northville is going to be paying some extra attention to Taft Road after some area residents asked the city for permission to install an earth berm along the road.

"Coming down the hill that road is in terrible condition," one resident told the council Monday, adding that a lot of trucks and buses use the road. "It's 'clatter-bang-boom' all night long."

The residents at the meeting asked in a letter that the city allow them to build a berm along the west side of Taft from the Lexington Commons parking lot north to Morgan. The residents would pay for the work, but

it would be installed on a city easement. There is a berm just to the south of the new request, but it sits on Lexington Condo Homes land.

Council members agreed that Taft is a problem spot, but some wondered if a berm was the best solution — and if so, whether the city should consider one all the way north to the city limit and on both sides of the street.

Council Member Jerry Mittman suggested other ideas might solve the problem; for example, limiting truck traffic or lowering the speed limit.

City Manager Steve Walters said that Taft is scheduled to be paved in

the city street repair program, probably yet this year, which could help the road condition somewhat.

Mayor Pro Tem Carolann Ayers suggested any City of Novi plans for Taft should be considered in any action Northville takes.

A January, 1988 update of the City of Novi Master Plan projects Taft as a "minor arterial" road. The document does not include any plans to widen Taft, but does plan an extension of Taft above Grand River, across I-96 and eventually all the way to West Road.

Mayor Chris Johnson directed the city administration to study the issue.

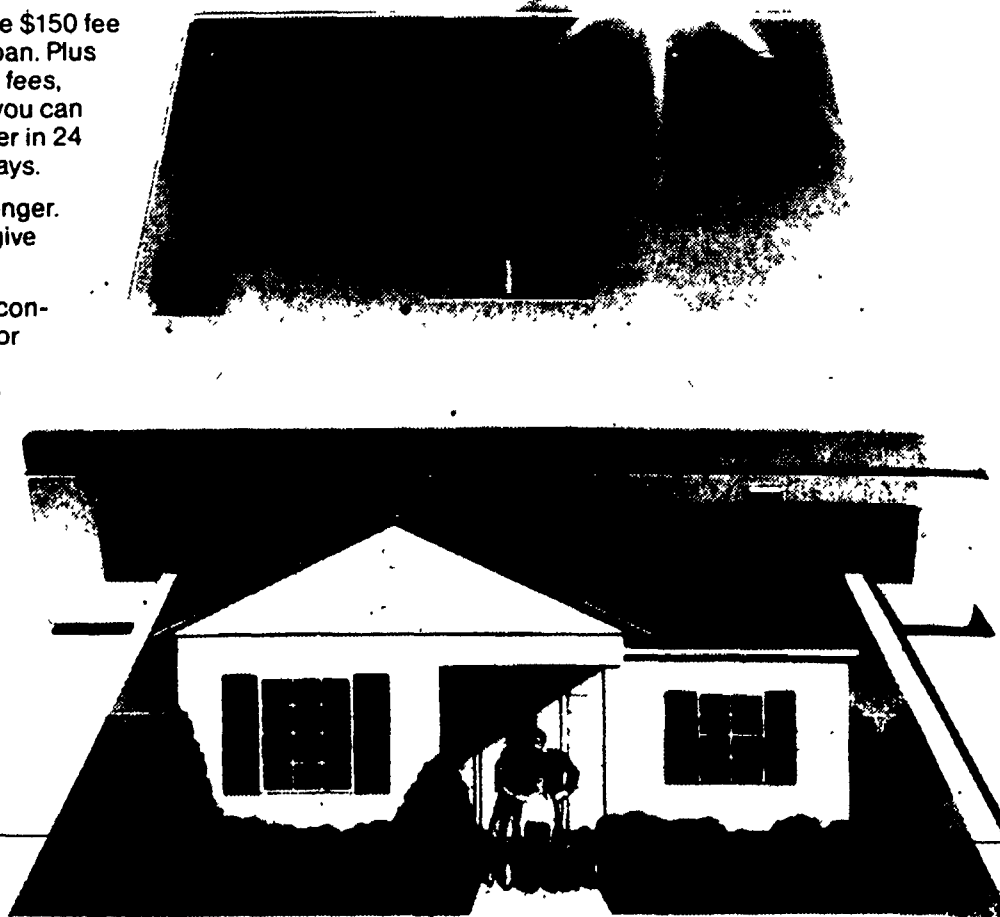

## Woodlands to be studied

In an attempt to work out all the bugs, the Northville Township planning commission postponed action on the proposed woodlands ordinance Tuesday, July 25 and scheduled a study session for August 16.

Officials from the planning commission, planning department, and beautification commission all said they are pleased with the progress on the ordinance and were not concerned with the time it was taking to put it together.

"Certain things are mandatory obligations, such as the necessity of having two readings of the ordinance before the township board," said Planning Commissioner Richard Allen. "But right now I think it is moving along at a good pace."

Allen said the major problems with the proposed ordinance are centered around its administration and how it applies to single family homeowners.

Planning Commissioner Karen Woodside, who was unable to attend the meeting, said in a letter to the commission that the ordinance in its present form is an "administrative

nightmare."

"The ordinance as presently written is far too complex and again in my opinion, is written from a particular perspective," Woodside said. "Adhering to the guidelines specified in the current proposed ordinance would be exceptionally costly for the petitioner as was pointed out by other Commissioners at our last meeting (July 12)."

"We need to keep the objectives of the ordinance, streamline it, and lessen the economic and administrative burden to make it feasible," she added.

"I believe that the integration of the ordinance into the site plan review process is key to the enforceability of the ordinance as well as to the proper administration of the ordinance," said Township Attorney Ernest Essad, adding that a review of the ordinance would be needed prior to its adoption.

Township Planning Director Carol Henry said there is a sense of urgency to move the ordinance along, but the planning commission wants to make sure it can work when it is adopted.

"We're trying to anticipate the

potential concerns and write them out of the ordinance before it's adopted," Henry said, adding some technical aspects and application specifics still need to be addressed.

"It's one thing to set up an ordinance, but it's another to put the teeth in it to make it work effectively," she said. "We're just going to take a lot of time and try to write this ordinance correctly the first time."

Beautification Committee member Catherine Sellas, who helped draft the original woodlands ordinance, said she is delighted that the planning commission is going through the ordinance and attempting to simplify the administrative process.

"I think the planning commission is doing a fine job and I hope the woodlands ordinance can be put in place by the end of this fall," she added.

Henry said since the meeting on Aug. 16 is only a study session, no action on the ordinance could take place. She added the first opportunity for the planning commission to take formal action on the ordinance would be at its next regular meeting on Aug. 30.

## Local teens hurt in car crash

NOVI — Two Northville youths are in fair condition this week after being burned in a rollover accident near Beck Road and I-96 Wednesday, July 27.

Novi Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan said a 1985 Chevrolet pickup truck driven by Robert Spradlin, 16, of Northville, flipped near an exit ramp at Beck Road just after 6 p.m. Wednesday.

Spradlin and passengers Garnett Potter, 16, of Northville, and Richard Lynch, 17, of Livonia were injured as the cab of the truck burst into flames.

"It went over and it ignited," Lenaghan said. "They received varying degrees of burns, all attempting to get out."

Spradlin and Potter were taken by helicopter to the University of Michigan Hospital burn center in Ann Arbor. Lynch was taken to Botsford Hospital in Farmington Hills with minor burns.

Spradlin and Potter were in "fair" condition this week, according to hospital officials. Lynch is set to be released Thursday.

Michigan State Police trooper

Charles Kemp said the truck was traveling eastbound on I-96 and took the Beck Road exit at a high rate of speed. Kemp said Spradlin was ticketed for careless driving.

Potter reportedly received third degree burns on an arm, several small burns on his face, and a torn knee ligament. Injuries to the other two victims were not available.

## City Ok's Cady repairs

provements could include making the steps wider and safer, and adding a wood superstructure.

A report on improving the stairway should be ready by the Aug. 15 council meeting, Walters said.

The city and the First Presbyterian Church are planning to work together to put a temporary parking lot in along the stretch of Cady between Church and Center.

The temporary lot will be made with material left from other streets torn up for the ongoing street repair program. The lot will be expected to last a few years while the city develops parking in other areas.

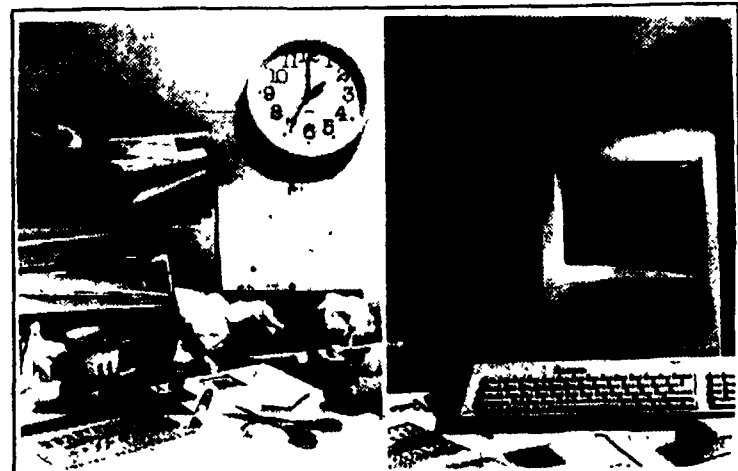

# Township leads Wayne County area in home building

While Northville Township officials said their area is experiencing a housing development boom, officials from neighboring cities also are indicating a recent housing surge.

Township officials added there appears to be nothing in sight to slow down the increased housing development trend.

Township Planning Director Carol Henry said the increase in housing permits over the last two years can be attributed to the desirability of the Northville area.

Figures compiled from the Northville Township building department show that of the 354 building permits issued in 1986, 162 home starts were made. In 1987, the number of home starts dropped to 101, and in 1988, 68 home starts have been made through July 4.

In addition to the high number of home starts, Northville Township was recently declared the Wayne County leader in housing units under construction with 1,735 according to a recent article in *Crown's Detroit*

## Business

The desire to live out here has been going on for years," Henry said. Development will no doubt keep coming to Northville Township because we offer a country atmosphere, but are in close proximity to the city of Detroit.

Henry added the I-75 corridor has helped in attracting people to the Northville area because it provides easy access to Detroit, allowing residents the opportunity to "work in the city but live in the country."

Yet while Northville Township is experiencing a housing boom, Novi and the city of Northville are also enjoying a housing bonanza.

Figures compiled from the city of Northville building department show that 31 housing permits were issued in 1986, 105 in 1987 and 35 through June 30, 1988.

Northville city building official Joe Attard said the large increase in housing permits from 1986 to 1987 "is probably due to the construction of the Abbey Knoll and Pheasant Hills subdivisions."

"I expect that single family dwell-

ing permits will slow down due to high interest rates and peoples fear of the economy," Attard added.

He said the number of housing permits issued has already begun to slow down because Abbey Knoll and Pheasant Hill subdivisions are almost totally filled.

The city of Novi building department reported that 188 housing permits were issued in 1986, 328 in 1987, and 193 through June 30, 1988.

Novi building official Earl Bailey said low interest rates in 1987 is the biggest reason for the dramatic increase in housing permits over 1986.

He added that he does not expect a significant yearly decrease in the amount of housing permits. "I look forward to a lot of building in the city of Novi for a long time to come."

Bailey said the west section of Novi is completely undeveloped and as soon as the area receives sewer capacity and water, he expects that region to be developed.

Sewers are also holding up some housing development in many parts of Northville Township, according to Henry.

"The number of housing permits will rise once sewer capacity comes to the majority of Northville Township," Henry said. "That's what's holding housing development up right now."

Township officials said the quality of the homes have not deteriorated despite the high number of housing starts.

The Township recently signed a sewer agreement with the Ypsilanti Community Utilities Authority (YCUA) and Township Supervisor Georgina Goss said construction on the project could begin within one year.

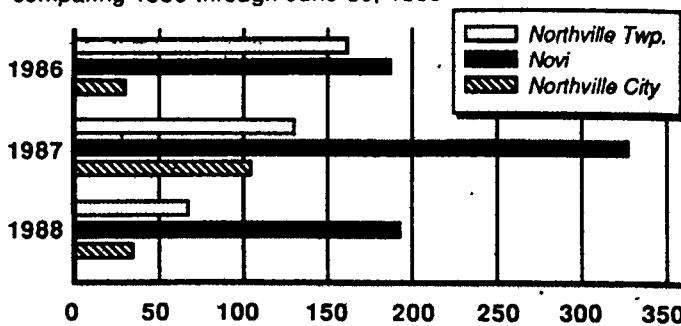
Despite the high number of housing permits, Township officials said they are pleased with the quality of building.

"I'm satisfied with the quality of development we're demanding and attaining from developers," Georgina Goss said. "We have a restrictive zoning ordinance in which we demand quality."

Goss added that the woodlands ordinance, which is currently being discussed by the planning commis-

sion, should not curtail the amount of development in Northville Township.

"The woodlands ordinance will enhance development because development which includes trees is much more attractive, and I think that is a bonus for not only the

township, but developers as well," she said.

"I see it (the woodlands ordinance) as being one more requirement in the zoning ordinance and developers will learn to live with it as such," Goss added.

## Commercial and industrial building sluggish in Township

In many communities such as Novi, the prosperity associated with housing development will spill over to commercial and industrial development.

However housing development and commercial and industrial building have not grown at a proportional rate in Northville Township.

Township planning director Carol Henry said the relative lack of commercial development in Northville can be attributed to the township's master plan, which is zoned mostly residential.

The residents who live here expect a bedroom community wherein they can go to other communities for their services. (i.e., shopping, employment and so forth), she said.

The township philosophy is generally to keep Northville

Township as a bedroom community and keep it mostly residential," Henry said, adding the potential for commercial appears to be in the west end of the township near the prisons, off of Five Mile Road.

In Northville Township, four commercial building permits were issued in 1986, 17 in 1987, and two through June 30, 1988. The city of Northville building department reported one commercial building department in 1986, five in 1987, and none through June 30, 1988.

In comparison, the city of Novi issued 61 commercial permits in 1986, 35 in 1987, and 22 through June 30, 1988.

Novi building official Earl Bailey said the planning commission has provided a good mixture of residential and commercial building.

"Our planning board is planning a city with a good commercial, industrial, and residential mixture and

I think it's good planning," Bailey said.

He added that while the number of individual commercial permits may decrease in the next few months, the buildings are getting larger, meaning more stores are fitting into fewer buildings. Bailey cited the Trammel-Crow and West Oaks malls as examples.

"A lot of large buildings are currently being worked on right now," he added.

Henry noted a potential problem for Northville Township is that residential land does not do much for a township's tax base and an increase in commercial development would help the tax base.

Along with commercial development, however, Henry said some negative impacts can be incurred, such as traffic congestion, an increase in crime, and so forth.

Georgina Goss, Township supervisor, said Township residents generally want to stay a residential community because of the vast commercial opportunities in surrounding communities.

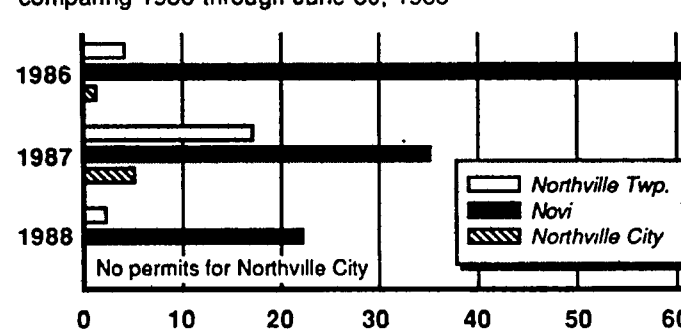
"It has always been the interest of residents for Northville Township to be a residential community because the city of Northville has always taken care of our commercial needs," Goss said.

Northville city building official Joe Attard said the low number of building permits over the past 2 1/2 years is mainly because there has been a higher amount of renovation.

"I think the reason that there is a lot of renovation in the city of Northville is because of the limited space to develop," Attard said, adding a large commercial development is currently being discussed for the Main Street and Center Street area.

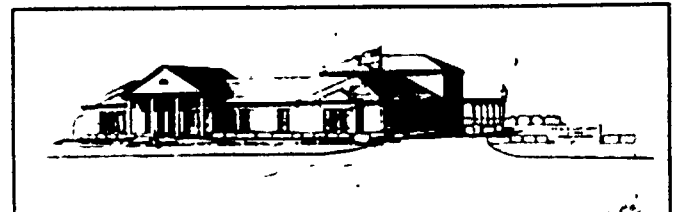

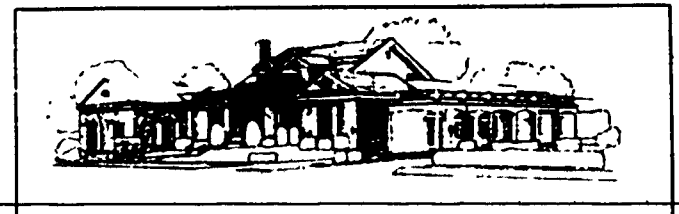

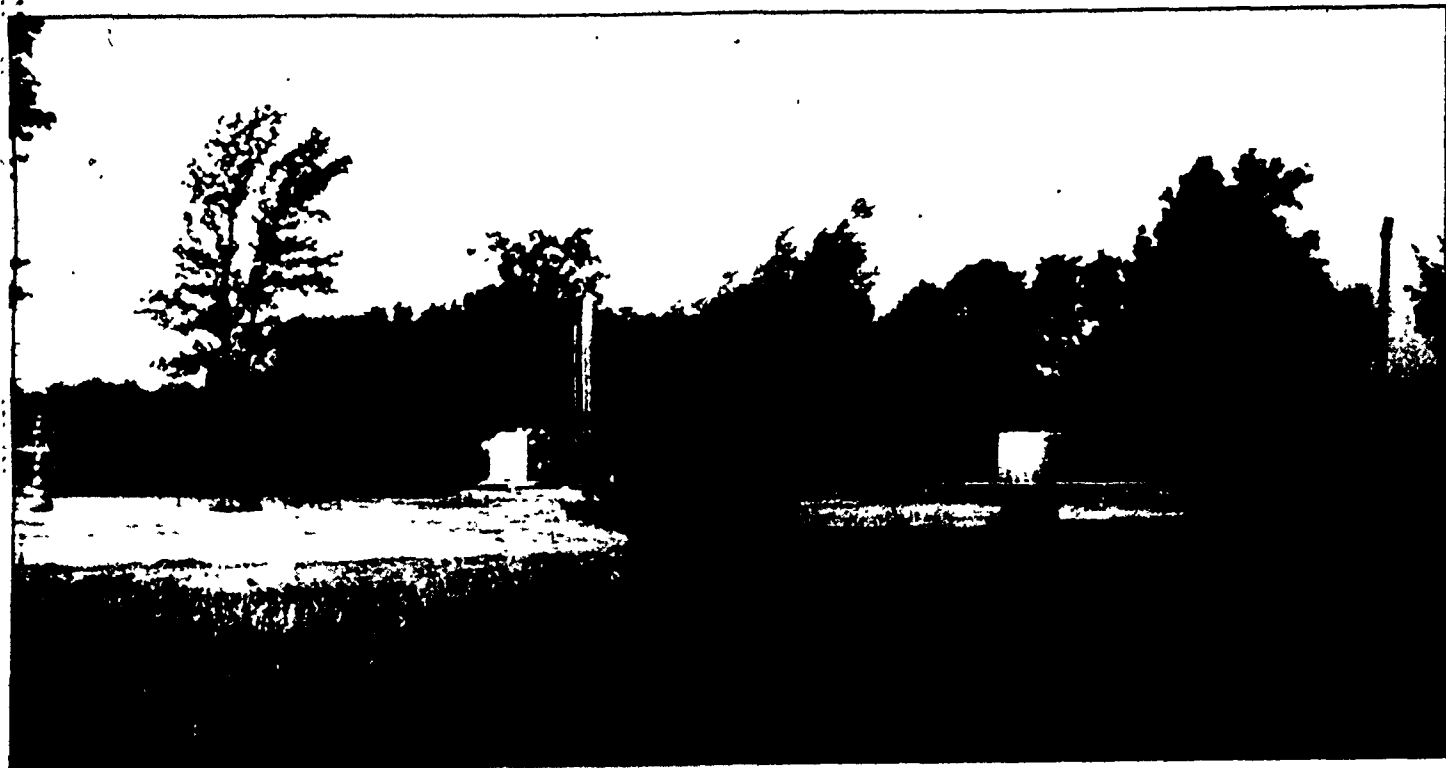

Domagalski said Pangborn has driven wells in Romeo and Rochester, but both came up dry and the project was stopped.

Hansen said he believes that gas

will turn up in the area and that gas facilities are much less obtrusive than oil.

One of the closest gas wells in the immediate area is located in the southern portion of Lyon Township

and is run by a competitor of Pangborn's.

Robert Schultz, a Lyon Township resident who lives close to the gas well, said a couple of times the smell has been unbearable, but he called

the gas company and they took care of the problem immediately.

He added that he has no other problems with the well. "I don't want it there, but times are changing and what can I do about it?"

## Park grant money may be signed tomorrow

The bill which would release negotiation money for the public purchase of Lapham Field is still awaiting action by the governor but he may sign the bill as soon as tomorrow.

An enrolling clerk in the state House of Representatives said final

action may be taken on the bill tomorrow, Aug. 5.

The bill has been passed by both houses of the Legislature and was first presented to the governor a couple of weeks ago.

If he signs, the bill will make money available for 40 projects

across the state to be funded from the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund. One of those projects is for the Northville Community Recreation Department to negotiate for the purchase of Lapham Field from the

Lapham family.

## Traffic light eyed at 10 Mile / Beck

NOVI — The earliest a traffic signal could be installed at the dangerous Ten Mile/Beck Road intersection is Oct. 1. And the actual installation of the light is not likely to occur until some time after that, according to John Joy, public information officer with the Oakland County Road Commission.

"That particular intersection has met the criteria for installation of a traffic light and it's proposed in our 1989 budget, but we haven't yet set priorities for installation of lights across the county," said Joy Tuesday afternoon.

Novi City Manager Edward Kriewall called for the Road Commission to step up the date for the installation of a signal at the Ten Mile/Beck Road intersection after an accident which occurred Tuesday, July 27.

In that accident, a car driven southbound on Ten Mile by an Ohio woman, stopped at the stop sign, then proceeded through the intersection, striking a garbage truck traveling eastbound on Ten Mile. The woman reportedly told officers that she thought the intersection was a four-way stop.

Following that accident, Kriewall criticized the Road Commission, saying there's something wrong with the criteria used to determine the need for a traffic signal.

The dangerous nature of the intersection was demonstrated further by another accident which occurred the following day, Wednesday, July 28.

In the July 28 accident, a car driven northbound on Beck Road by Garnet Potter, 81, of Florida came to a stop then proceeded out into the intersection, striking a car driven by Jeffrey Klepser, 25, of South Lyon on the left rear quarter panel.

The impact caused the Klepser vehicle to roll over onto the passenger side. Neither driver nor the passengers in their cars were seriously injured, according to police reports.

Potter was issued a citation for failing to yield the right of way, police reports indicated.

Despite the number of accidents, Joy said it is doubtful that installation of a traffic signal can be speeded up, however. Although the signal is included in the proposed 1989 budget, the budget has not yet been approved.

After the budget has been approved, the Road Commission can begin prioritizing traffic safety projects and scheduling installation of signals, Joy said.

"There's an awareness of the need (for a signal at the Ten Mile/Beck Road intersection). The criteria has been met, but we can't establish a definite date on the calendar for the work to be completed," Joy said.

In the meantime, Novi police expect the situation to get worse, rather than better.

"There's a new subdivision going in on that intersection which will only make things worse," said Robert Starnes, commander of the Novi Police Department's Road Patrol. "That's an awfully bad intersection right now."

# Developer receives partial rezoning of Oasis

The Northville Township planning commission unanimously recommended rezoning two parcels of land on the Oasis Golf Course last Tuesday, but postponed action on the third parcel for further consideration.

Oasis parcels B (37 acres) and C (8.5 acres) were rezoned from residential (R-3) and general business (B-3) respectively, to small office space (OS-1). Parcel A, the northernmost section of the area, is a 6.7 acre piece of land currently zoned cluster residential. The Oasis Golf Course is located at Haggerty and Five Mile roads.

The golf course was rezoned in the Northville Township master plan two years ago to small office for parcels B and C and cluster residential for

parcel A.

Developer James Blain has asked for the rezonings in order to erect a one-story office building on the property.

About 50 Livonia residents attended the meeting, as the Quakertown subdivision in Livonia backs-up to the Oasis course.

Quakertown Civic Association president Ray Whitney said a majority of the 50 residents who attended a homeowners meeting last month were in favor of Blain receiving the rezoning.

"The Northville planning commission decided that the township master plan will dominate what's going on there," Whitney said. "We knew this rezoning would happen so we're trying to work with the developer to be least hurt by the cir-

cumstances."

However, not all of the residents at the meeting were in favor of the rezoning.

Quakertown resident Kathleen Bilger said the area does not need office space as much as it needs a place for families.

"I'm pleading for the family aspects and I'm pleading for you people to not destroy what's beautiful in this area," Bilger said.

Blain, owner of J.D. Blain and Co., said he has met with the Quakertown residents on at least five occasions in order to minimize the effects of the office development.

"I plan to meet with them all through the design phase of the project," Blain said, adding that he feels a majority of the 300 homeowners in the Quakertown subdivision are will-

ing to work with him on the project.

In addition to the proposed office building, Blain has also built the Northwest Airlines Reservation Center and other commercial building north of Quakertown.

"I plan on being cooperative with the township and surrounding neighbors because that's the way I've done business in all developments and I'm not changing," Blain said.

As for the rezoning of parcel A, township planning director Carol Henry said the planning commission tabled the matter in order to take a closer look at the proposal, but it usually likes to adhere to the master plan.

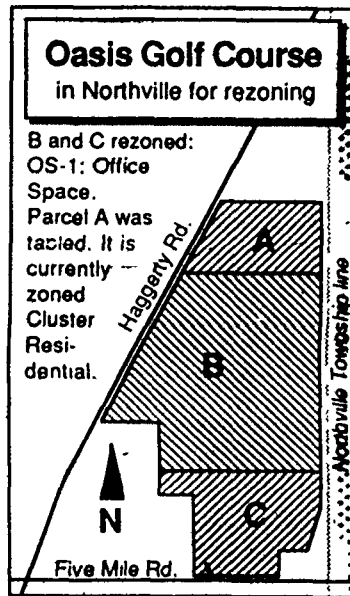
She added the recommended rezonings will be reviewed by the Wayne County Planning Commission, who will probably come before

the Northville Township Board with their findings in September.

Planning Commissioner Richard Allen, whose motion to deny a rezoning of parcel A drew no support from fellow commissioners, said a rezoning of the parcel would fragment a portion of land north of the property.

Blain contends that a denial of the parcel A rezoning would fragment the golf course property. In his negotiations with the Quakertown residents, Blain has offered to put in a 50-foot berm and limit the building size to one-story.

A vote on the parcel A rezoning is scheduled for the next planning commission meeting on Aug. 30.

## Employees take a look back

At the reunion picnic for UAW Local 896, the word "family" turned out to be a very accurate one.

About 250 current Northville Ford employees, former employees and relatives gathered at Waterford State park Saturday afternoon to have a picnic lunch, talk over old times and wonder about the future of the plant.

But in spite of the recent announcement that the plant will close in December, most of the people at the picnic concentrated on their happy memories of working there — with their "family."

Invitations, sent to current employees, retirees, and transferred employees, brought a good crowd out to the park. Guests were greeted by a sign reading "You came from the city. You're now in the sticks. Welcome to the picnic. Of Local 896."

The guests enjoyed a picnic lunch, horseshoe pitching and a lot of reminiscing, seeing faces they hadn't seen in years.

"You can't remember a lot of people's names," Jim Ayers of Farmington commented, but everyone remembered the people themselves.

Bill Nipp, who came to the picnic from Plymouth, spent 27½ years at the plant, and several of his relatives worked there too. But the plant family went beyond that, and seeing everyone was the reason he came to the reunion.

"I just wanted to meet some of the family," he said. "You got to know everybody (at the plant). It's just a closeness — usually, it's not that way in a plant."

Several of the present and former workers said the Northville plant is the friendliest they'd ever heard of.

"I wouldn't have it nowhere else but there. It's a beautiful place to work," said Terry Robinson of Detroit, who has worked there for 10 years. "You can't beat the job. You can't ask for more. It's about the best plant you can work for."

Delmer Schuler drove down to the reunion from the thumb area. "We had good people to work for," he said. He spent "29 and nine-tenths

years" at the plant, ending July 31, 1975. "I left the day after Hoffa did," he laughed.

Bob Brown, a committeeman at the plant, also mentioned the cooperation "Everybody always worked together. If somebody didn't show up, somebody else did their job," he said.

The good work environment resulted in an excellent-quality product, the workers said, whether it was valves or gas tanks.

Norman Witt grew up in the area and worked at the plant from 1942 to 1972. "The valve plant was there since I was a boy," he recalled. "We could make a lot of valves when we were making them. You wonder what they ever did with them all."

Alfred Hawley, who still lives in the area, started working at the plant right after the old sawmill closed on the same site and ended up spending more than 45 years there. He had maybe the most concise description of life at the old plant.

"You got to know the gang," he said. "I never hated to go to work."

## Hospital to get hearings

The Michigan Department of Mental Health announced Monday that public hearings to determine the competency of allegedly mentally ill people would be held at the Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital.

The announcement shifts the hearings from the Wayne County Probate Court in downtown Detroit to the Northville hospital.

State mental health director Thomas Watkins said the Northville facility, which is the largest regional hospital in the state serving 800 patients and 3,000 to 4,000 admissions per year, is the last hospital to conduct commitment hearings off of hospital grounds.

"Up until now we've been unable to accomplish this (having hearings at hospitals) at Northville because of its size and the heavy workload at the Wayne County Probate Court,"

Watkins said.

He added the pilot program would begin Aug. 15 for a three-month period, and then would be evaluated from a hospital and court perspective.

"Our goal is to provide the appropriate legal process with all of the dignities and rights, and maximize the resources available to provide it to people who are mentally ill," Watkins said.

He said the program would be a better utilization of everyone's time, particularly the patients, as previously they had to wait in a locked holding area before their hearing.

Watkins also noted it costs about \$500,000 a year in transportation and staff costs to conduct the commitment hearings in Detroit. "Any day of public hearings there would be four psychiatrists at the City County building giving testimony and now we're making more of a commit-

ment to the patients by keeping the hospital staff at the hospital."

However, the program has drawn criticism from the Michigan Protection and Advocacy Service, a state mandated group that works for the developmentally disabled and the mentally ill.

"I think the state is compromising the rights to a full public proceeding in order to save money and I don't think that's a fair way to do things," said Elizabeth Bauer, director of the advocacy group.

Bauer said although the hearings will still be open to the public, by law of the department of mental health, the public may not perceive them as being open because they're being held at the hospital.

"We're concerned that by having the hearings at the hospital in a less formal atmosphere the changes will make judges believe that the patients are where they belong," she added.

## Officials say city can't enforce sub bylaws

attorney stating that the city has no authority to enforce an association's bylaws, just its own ordinances, and is obligated to issue permits if a project meets city requirements.

"The city can't enforce the bylaws," Johnson said. Anything the city is to enforce must be citywide and equally applied, he added.

Mayor Pro Tem Carolann Ayers explained, "It is the legal right of the person living in that subdivision to apply for a permit and receive one even if they are against the bylaws of the subdivision. And that has happened in other cases. . . I know that for a fact."

"I don't know how you can expect us to enforce ordinances that we have not passed," she added.

When council members suggested the association's best course of action might be legal, Nickran responded, "That's terrible. We don't want to sue."

Nickran also presented a paper listing requirements to be met before a city permit is issued, and one requirement was association approval in Abbey Knoll, Pheasant Hills and Northville Estates.

However, Walters explained that list was prepared to inform people considering a building project of the necessary procedure. It is not a part of the zoning ordinance, he said.

Walters said if someone applies for

a building permit without the approval of their subdivision, the city's policy is to accept the application, notify the association, and "not review it especially rapidly" — with

the hope that the association and the owner will work out any differences in the meantime.

Nickran objected that he had not been notified about the pool case, but

Walters answered that two or three people related to the association — who had previous contact with the city — were notified. Walters agreed to notify Nickran in the future.

## 8 Mile speeds eyed

Several references to speeds on Eight Mile Road at Monday night's City Council meeting spurred one member to ask for a formal look at the street.

During miscellaneous comments at the end of the meeting, Council Member John Buckland noted that the topic of speeds on Eight Mile had been mentioned a few times at different points during the meeting.

The speed on the street "is just horrendous," he said. In addition, he

said uncovered trucks can be a special problem when travelling so fast.

City Manager Steve Walters suggested the city step up speed limit enforcement on Eight Mile west of Taft for a while to try to control the problem. In addition, he said a local ordinance against uncovered trucks — in addition to a state law already in place — might be a good idea so the city could collect any fines for violations it cites.

"This township board, which works together with a common goal being the good of the township, is a group of very experienced and extremely dedicated people," she said.

Heintz said she congratulates Myron Kasey for showing a great deal of interest in the community by running a second time for trustee.

She added, however, that she thinks it's a sign the community is happy with the local board to reelect it intact.

"I think it's good for the appointed people because it shows that the board made an excellent choice after I left," Heintz said, referring to newly appointed Trustee Thomas Handyside.

Trustee Richard Allen said it will be an advantage to keep the board intact for the next four years because

the members will not have to be reacquainted with the issues and it can proceed as "business as usual."

"If a board works well together, and this one does, then staying together is an advantage," Allen said. "This board has a variety of different opinions, but works their differences out without animosity to anyone."

Allen said a key issue the board will have to address in the near future will be finding extra space for the police department.

Trustee Don Williams, who received the most votes in the trustee election, said he will continue to campaign for the November election even though he will be running opposed.

"I'm already planning for the November election because I want to find out what the people in the community want to have changed," he said.

contest on the Republican ballot. Dunn took 528 votes in the township to Huber's 367.

Voters endorsed Republicans in unopposed races by the following vote totals: Carl Pursell for U.S. representative, 900; Gerald Law for state representative, 961; Donnelly Wright Hadden for Wayne County prosecutor, 811; Lawrence Schweiger for Wayne County clerk, 801; and Susan Heintz, 937.

## Democratic ballot

In the race to challenge Pursell for U.S. Representative, township voters contributed to Lana Pollack's victory over Dean Baker. The local vote was 244 to 120.

In the only other Democratic contests, Northville Township voters — like those across the county — endorsed the incumbent sheriff and county clerk. For sheriff, township voters gave Robert Ficano 249 votes; Bruce Kennedy, 93; and Richard Novak, 64. For county clerk, James Killeen got 225 township votes, Ed Wilson, 81, and Robert Zwolak, 59.

Northville Township totals for the unopposed Democratic races were: Riegle for U.S. Senate, 391; Jeanne Stempien for state representative, 348; John O'Hair for Wayne County prosecutor, 339; Raymond Wojtowicz for county treasurer, 347; and Forest Youngblood for register of deeds, 352.

## CITY OF NORTHVILLE WAYNE COUNTY Non-partisan ballot

City voters in Wayne County bucked the trend by voting against the jail millage proposal, 140 to 123. The city also said no to the special education millage question by a total of 140 to 119.

The city vote totals for Court of Appeals candidates were: Kirwan, 119; Reilly, 74; Brennan, 72; Barsamian, 56; Hathaway, 27; Gardner, 20; Maher, 18; Conlin, 14; and Shamo, 10.

## Republican ballot

Dunn won the city in the race for Republican nomination to the U.S. Senate, 85 votes to 50 for Huber.

Vote totals for the unopposed Republican races were: Pursell for U.S. representative, 137; Law for state representative, 138; Hadden for prosecutor, 113; Schweiger for county clerk, 111; and Heintz for county commission, 136.

## Democratic ballot

City voters helped Pollack's bid for the Democratic nomination to the U.S. House by a vote of 71 to 21.

The city also endorsed Ficano for sheriff with 54 votes over Kennedy's 29 and Novak's 21. Killeen got 61 votes for county clerk with Wilson taking 24 and Zwolak taking 8.

Totals in unopposed races were: Riegle for Senate, 98; Stempien for state representative, 81; O'Hair for

prosecutor, 72; Wojtowicz for county treasurer, 72, and Youngblood for register of deeds, 70.

## CITY OF NORTHVILLE OAKLAND COUNTY Non-partisan ballot

The city's second precinct — within Oakland County, but also in the Wayne County Intermediate School District — voted for the special education millage question, 78 to 76.

In the court of appeals, second district, the top four vote-getters throughout the district move on to the general election. Northville city voters endorsed Patrick Cleary with 74 votes; Ellen Mason and Paul Cassidy, 56 votes each; Marilyn Kelly, 48; M. Richard Knoblock, 44; J. Martin Brennan, 36; Mark Cavanagh, 35; Dean Alan, 34; Richard Kuhn, 32; Kathleen Jansen, 18; David Serotkin, 16; E. Thomas Fitzgerald, 9; and Paul Fischer, 6.

In the Oakland County Probate Court race, city voters gave 57 votes to Hugh Dean, 54 to Thomas Brennan, 25 to Joan Young, 17 to David Kaufman and 13 to James Delaney.

## Republican ballot

The unofficial results show city voters offering a few different results than the overall race totals. For U.S. Senate the city voted for Huber exactly two-to-one over Dunn, 142 votes to 71.

In the Oakland County prosecutor contest, the city totals show 119 for Richard Fessler, 56 for winner Dick

Thompson, 25 for Jack McDonald and 20 for Jeff Leib.

The city voted 126 to 51 for challenger William Eckstein over incumbent Oakland County Drain Commissioner George Kuhn, who won the nomination easily.

In uncontested Republican races, city voters cast 189 votes for William Broomfield for U.S. representative; 173 for Willis Bullard Jr. for state representative; 179 for Daniel Murphy for county executive; 182 for John Nichols for sheriff; 166 for John Calandro for county commissioner; 167 for C. Hugh Dohany for county treasurer; and 162 for Lynn Allen for county clerk and register of deeds.

## Democratic ballot

In the only Oakland County Democratic contest, city voters gave 29 votes to Diana Trivax over 27 for Philip Marcuse for the party nomination for county clerk and register of deeds. Trivax also won county-wide.

City Democrats endorsed unopposed candidates Riegle with 76 votes; Gary Kohut for U.S. representative with 51; Kurt Thornbladh for state representative with 51; William Wolfram for county executive with 54; Barry Kraemer for prosecutor with 54; Tommylyle Dizotell for sheriff with 52; Steve Allen for county treasurer with 49; Douglas Kuthy for drain commissioner with 48; and Leo Foley for county commissioner with 49.

1. The term of the Lease is for 99 years, commencing upon the granting of a building permit to the Lessee for the construction of a motorsports museum. The Lease may be terminated by either the Lessor or Lessee prior to the granting of a building permit, by the giving of 30-days written notification to the other party. The lease will terminate if its own accord if no building permit is issued within 5 years of the execution of the Lease.

2. The property may be used by the Lessee solely for the construction and operation of a motorsports museum. The Lessee will pay an annual rent commencing on the fifth anniversary of the granting of a building permit for the construction of the motorsports museum. The rent shall consist of 10% of the net profit realized from admissions to the motorsports museum and the sales of any products at the motorsports museum.

3. The Lessee is responsible for all construction costs of the proposed motorsports museum and is further required to keep all buildings, furnishings, fixtures and equipment constructed or placed on property in a good state of repair. The Lessee is responsible for any tax obligations of any type which are imposed on the property or which arise out of use of the property.

4. The Lessee does not have the power to subject the property to any liens of any kind, and has the duty, if such lien is filed or claimed, to cause the property to be released from such claim. The Lessee must indemnify the Lessor against any claim, debt, demand or obligations which may be made against the Lessor arising out of any act or omission of the Lessee. The Lessee is required to maintain insurance protecting against loss or damage to the property and any improvements constructed on the property. The Lessee is further required to maintain personal injury liability insurance, insuring both the Lessee and Lessor against liability arising from the property.

5. The Lessee may not assign its interest in the Lease without the prior approval of the Lessor. Should the Lessor receive a bona fide offer to purchase the property, Lessee shall be given a right of first refusal as to such purchase.

## Lexington pond issue still unresolved

The future of the pond and creek through Lexington Condominiums is going to stay up in the air for a while longer, while the city finds out what it will cost for different options.

The Lexington Condo Homes Association has two basic choices: improve the pond and creek to the point where the Oakland County Drain Commission will assume responsibility for the waterway as an official county drain; or retain responsibility.

But there is also another decision:

whether to keep the current creek and pond setup — created with a dam on condo property — or to remove the dam, eliminating the pond and recreating a free-flowing creek.

At the City Council meeting Monday, the council agreed to an investigation of costs for the different ideas and authorized the city administration to discuss the issue with the condo association and the county. A 1987 Drain Commission report estimated that restoring the pond to county standards would cost \$30,000 while eliminating the pond and

restoring the creek would cost \$9,000.

Condo association President John Haas emphasized that the association has not yet decided what it wants to do with the area.

"We don't have \$30,000 or anything near \$30,000," he said. "I'm sure we could fund some amount, but nowhere near the amounts we've been shown so far."

The Singh Development Company, developers of the adjacent Pheasant Hills subdivision, are also going to share in the cost. After residents said the new building contributed to a

siltation problem, Singh agreed to pay for repair of whatever damage it caused.

"Until the cost is really known, I don't think there's a whole lot to debate about," Mayor Chris Johnson said.

Council members informally agreed to direct City Manager Steve Walters to pursue the issue further and report back to the council.

Walters said most of the creek, called the Randolph Drain, is already assumed as part of the formal county drain system.

### Road woes continue; cooperation is needed

There seems to be a sort of running theme — beyond the primary election — in this week's issue of the Record. There are an awful lot of stories about roads, and particularly about problems with them.

A head-on collision on Seven Mile Friday sent one driver to the hospital. People in Novi — and those in Northville who drive the area — are worried about the dangerous intersection at Beck Road and Ten Mile, still without a traffic light even after a baker's dozen of accidents in a six-month period. Just up the street, at the Beck Road / I-96 interchange, three people (two from Northville) were hurt in a recent accident.

At Monday's Northville City Council meeting, the topic of dangerous speeds on Eight Mile came up again. Not long ago, the school board was worried about the same thing. Residents at the same meeting brought Taft Road to the council's attention. Although the discussion concentrated on noise, safety on Taft was mentioned and is certainly an important concern.

It seems like a lot of these problems are coming to a head all at the same time, but there have been plenty of similar items in the news in the past few months. Taking an overall view, it

looks like the thing a lot of residents feared is becoming more and more true: the continuing, booming development in the area is dangerously overloading our area road system.

The leaders of local communities like to talk a lot about cooperation between their municipalities. So does this newspaper, in this very space. It's looking more and more like roads are a vital issue in which this cooperation needs to materialize.

Northville officials, worried about the future of Taft Road, are going to ask Novi officials what their plans are. That's a good start, but the communities might be able to help each other much more. Maybe Northville, Northville Township and other communities — whose residents all drive the area — could join in urging the Oakland County Road Commission to make a 10 Mile / Taft signal a top priority. Similarly, maybe the communities could work together on pushing for an improved Beck / I-96 interchange, lower speeds on Eight Mile, and other concerns.

We're always going to experience traffic problems. But banding together to limit such problems as much as possible is an excellent way for officials to turn their rhetoric into results.

### Master plan is guide

The Northville Township Planning Commission faced a difficult decision at its July 26 meeting.

After granting a rezoning request to developer James Blain for two parcels of the Oasis Golf Course land, (located at Five and Haggerty Roads) the commission had to decide whether to rezone the third and final portion.

The two rezoned parcels (B and C) went from residential and general business respectively, to small office. Although the commission listened carefully to the concerns of Livonia residents of the Quakertown subdivision who border the Oasis property, the planners made a decision to follow their master plan and rezone Oasis.

After all, when the new master plan was being worked on two years ago, commissioners said they notified Livonia residents that the Oasis Golf Course property would be looked at, but no residents attended any of the rezoning meetings.

So, to rezone parcels B and C was a relatively clear-cut decision for the commission, since the land was master planned small office. Deciding whether to rezone parcel A is a bit more difficult. The land is zoned residential and is master planned cluster residential. This means rezoning the land to fit Blain's request of small office would require the commission to go against its master plan, a practice commissioners said they like to avoid.

There is no doubt that Blain has been very willing to work with Livonia residents to reduce the impact of the office project on their homes as much as possible. We applaud his decision to put in a 50-foot berm rather than a six-foot wall. Ditto for limiting the size of the proposed office building to one-story when the legal limit for small office zoning is two and one-half stories.

A testimonial to Blain's spirit of cooperation is the vote of confidence given to him by the Quakertown Homeowners Association. Quakertown President Ray Whitney said the association is behind Blain and will work with him during the entire development procedure. That type of cooperation will only help to make the project a better one for everybody.

However, despite Blain's cooperation with Quakertown, the planning commission made the right decision by tabling the third rezoning issue. The planners said they want to use the extra time to let the proposal "sink in". Any decision to go against the master plan must be carefully made and we applaud the commission for not deciding in haste.

Planners put a lot of time and money into redoing the master plan, and any decisions to go against it must have overriding positive points. Commissioners should study the issue carefully before deciding.

# Peer pressure requires real solutions

This is another in a continuing series of columns written for the Record by Mary Ellen King, Director of Northville Youth Assistance.

For the last several years we have heard the phrase "peer pressure". As parents we wonder if this concept is real or if it is overemphasized by the media and pop psychologists. In my experience working with teenagers, peer pressure is real and is especially difficult for youths who have a low self-esteem. When a teenager feels good about him/herself, handling peer pressure is a lot easier. A teenager with high self-esteem believes in himself, accepts his strengths and weaknesses, respects others, trusts his own judgement and is able to make his own decisions because he knows what's right.

As adults we can help youngsters to deal with peer situations by suggesting that they consider the following four suggestions.

1. Ask yourself what is really going on in a peer pressure situation.
  - Where are you;
  - Who are you with;
  - What are you doing;
  - How you feel about what's happening.Advise the youth to trust their senses. Once they have figured out what's really going on, ask themselves: "Will I be pressured to do something I don't want to do?"
2. Think about the consequences of behavior suggested by peers.
  - How will I feel about myself tomorrow?
  - Could I get into trouble with friends, parents, teachers or the police?
  - Could I be harming my health?
  - Will people who care about me be disappointed in my decision?
  - What are some of the positive or negative consequences that could result?

3. Make the decision that's right for you. Do the positive consequences outweigh the negative ones? The decision that is made will often affect how the youth feels about him/herself.
  4. Once the decision has been made, try to look and act confidently even if you feel nervous or scared. When a youth decides to say "NO" to peer pressure there are phrases that they can have ready to use such as, "No thanks." "I'm not interested." "I've got something else to do." "I don't feel like it." "It makes me sick." If the youth continues to be pressured they can say: "No. Please don't ask me again," or "I've got to leave now."
- It is much easier for adults than it is for teenagers to say "no" to peers. Many times teenagers need someone to help them make their decision — a coach, teacher, relative, parent. Encourage them to do so or to call NYA at 344-1618.

# Census money for township still waiting for action

The saga of the mid-decade census money continues, as the bill allocating the payment of about \$3.6 million to Michigan cities and townships continues to sit on Governor James Blanchard's desk.

The state shared-revenue payment, which amounts to about \$97,000 for Northville Township, was sent from the Michigan Legislature to the governor last week and he has until Aug. 6 to sign the package or it will become invalid.

State Representative Willis Bullard (R-Highland) said bills to allow for the payment of last year's funds, which were cut by Blanchard, and this year's money have both been put before the governor.

"I am encouraged because I oppos-

ed the governor's veto of the money last year," Bullard said, adding that the growth of the communities eligible for the payments should be recognized.

Blanchard's veto of the funds from the budget last year was a move that stripped over \$3.7 million from communities which had taken the mid-decade census.

Communities who take the counts and show a population increase of more than 15 percent can qualify for additional funds.

State Representative Gerald Law (R-Plymouth) said as of last Monday the governor has still not signed the bills. He added that he does not think that the governor is stalling by having not signed the package.

"I think he is waiting for all the budget bills to be put together in a package before he signs them, rather than addressing each bill individually," Law said, adding that move would allow the governor the opportunity to assess the budget and make any necessary changes.

Law added, however, that once the township gets the money he'll feel more comfortable, because the mid-decade program has had a lot of problems in the past.

blems in the past.

"The process of paying the additional monies should be smooth and I don't see why it isn't, unless you look at the 38 communities eligible for the payments and find that 90 percent of them are Republican," Law said. "They must not be high on his priority list."

Blanchard sent letters last week saying he endorsed the mid-decade funds.

"Last year, my budget director informed me that there were insufficient revenues to fund special census revenue sharing," Blanchard wrote. "As a result, I could not approve the expenditure at that time. This year, however, I have been apprised that the revenues are available for special census payments."

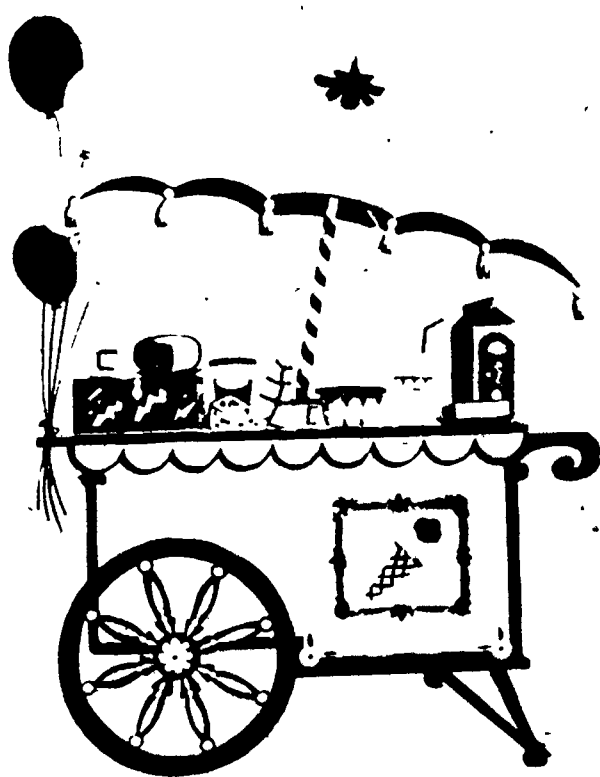
Law said it is ridiculous for the

state to allow communities to conduct the mid-decade census and refuse to pay them.

"The state has a moral obligation to pay these funds and I hope that the governor will not turn his back on our local communities again with another veto, Law said. "He has been sitting on this bankroll of \$3.6 million for a year now, it is time to stop playing unfair fiscal games."

Northville Township manager Steve Brock said he believes the township is owed the money, and certainly could use the funds. Brock added the township has not included the funds in their 1988 budget, but they are counting on the money to make some capital improvements.

Brock said Northville Township spent \$12,500 to conduct the mid-decade census.

# 'Last-minute repairs seldom pay off' — Realtors

Putting a home in top working order before placing it on sale can bring a good return, but last-minute remodeling seldom pays off.

"If a home has been reasonably well-maintained, it generally doesn't cost much to restore it to sale condition," says Marjory R. Pickett, president of Metro MLS, the state's largest multiple listing service.

"Major repairs, unless needed to bring a house up to code, can only force up your asking price and chances are you'll only gain a small

share of the investment back. In most cases, it's better to keep the price down to attract buyers who can decide on their own when additional costs are warranted.

"A seller who has spent lavishly to make the home a neighborhood showcase often is the loser when the built-in value far exceeds that of other properties in the same general area. Few buyers want to spend \$100,000 for a home in an \$80,000 neighborhood when the same money could move them into a more upscale

area."

For a faster sale, Pickett said the best advice is to make the property a "best buy" among all homes for sale in the area and put in condition to show well to prospective buyers.

"At this time of year, lawns and landscaping should be made to look their very best to create a favorable impression," she said. "Blooming flowers, either annuals or perennials, and healthy plants in any area set aside for vegetable growing can demonstrate a fertile soil.

"Every seller should make a complete appraisal of the property from a buyer's point of view. With your asking price in mind, make a walk-through inspection to see if anything detracts from the fairness of that figure."

Here's her list of some of the things to check:

- The roof should be leak-proof, the eaves clean and in good repair and all exterior trim newly-painted or freshly washed.
- There should be no loose brick,

stone or stucco, and all siding should be firmly affixed.

□ All plumbing should be working to perfection, bathroom tubs and showers well-caulked and all brightwork and tile firmly secured. There should be no sticking doors or drawers, loose knobs or cracked windows. Walls, carpets and drapes should be freshly cleaned.

Few homes ever seem to have enough closet or storage space so unnecessary items should be discarded. Excess items that overcrowd the

space should be stored off the premises and everything else neatly arranged to show capacity.

Bedrooms also should be arranged to accent available space even if it means removal of present furnishings that give a crowded look.

"Realtors know buyer likes and dislikes, so take advantage of their counsel," Pickett said. "They also know the questions likely to be asked, so make sure they have honest answers on such things as the age of the roof and the furnace.

## Residential housing sales show continued increases during June

Residential housing sales continued to climb during June, according to reports from the Michigan Association of Realtors.

Figures released by the association indicate that there were more residential real estate closings during June than during the previous month.

June sales figures in a representative area checked monthly by the association were up 3.6 percent over May sales. Sales for the first six months of this year are down 2.7 percent from the first half of 1987.

Last month, the association reported a 3.4 percent difference. At the same time, the rate of change for the average sale price — 5.7 percent over the first six months

of last year — is the lowest all year.

"Our members are reporting a slight increase of available housing, which is contributing to more competitive pricing," said Peter M. Cornell, president of the Michigan Association of Realtors.

A shortage of houses on the market — combined with uncertainty about the direction interest rates were going — have kept sales down.

"However, now that the market is loosening up a bit and interest rates have stabilized, people are deciding that now is the time to act on buying or selling," Cornell observed.

# WINDSURFING

## Rookie touches bottom while riding the waves

It's a darned good thing I don't mind getting my hair wet.

That was my first thought as I fell off of the pitching wind surfer board for about the ninth time in ten minutes. My second thought was that this was a lot harder than it looks.

I have dreamed about windsurfing for a long time. The look was cool. Bright blue water and hot, hot sun. The spray of water and the color of sails. In pictures and from far away the sport looked great. Up close the sport looks... wet.

Actually windsurfing is a sport unto its own. Don't be fooled. Just because you're a jock on land does not mean those skills are transferable to a small board, buoyed by water and subject to the whims of the wind.

Since I knew nothing about the sport of windsurfing, other than that from my car window it looked like a great time, I decided to take a lesson. On a somewhat sunny Saturday afternoon I ventured to Whitmore Lake to the Washtenaw Wind Surfing and Sail Club for a two hour lesson in the art of windsurfing.

The lesson was a smart move. While there are wind surfing en-

thusiasts who learn by doing, the process is slow and frustrating, and for those of us who want our leisure time activities to be fun — lessons are definitely the way to go.

A walk into a wind surfing shop is like a walk into California. Sure, just minutes ago you were in Michigan but with the pull of a door you are transported to the midwestern version of surfing. The instructors are young, tan and wind-tousled. The language is about glide, rush, lean-time and other vaguely mellow sounding terms. The clothes are jams, bright t-shirts and day-glo colored foot-coverings. It's a different life.

But one to which I aspired, so there I was, eager to be shown the skills that would let me take a board to the middle of a lake and take off into the wind.

My instructor was Mike Rasmussen. He has been teaching for only four months but began windsurfing over four years ago and swore "nothing beats it." After an hour of dunking your head in and out of a lake you will begin to think that just about anything beats it, but that's because you are learning, Rasmussen explained. I just spit

out water and got back on the board.

In lessons you start out on dry land. They like to build your confidence. Also, it's easier to try and learn something when you're not soaking wet and treading water. On land you learn how to lift the sail from the water. This is a very good thing to know because for the first few times you are out wind surfing the sail will be in the water more than it is in the air. I paid close attention to this portion of the lesson.

While you are on land you begin to think that you can do this. You begin to get a little cocky. Rasmussen egged me on. "That's it, that's exactly right," he said as he taught me how to pull up the sail using my own body as a counter weight to get the sail up. Many people believe they can muscle the sail out of the water and end up paying for that with tired shoulders and bad backs the next day, he said.

As I moved my feet to the rear of the board once the sail was up he congratulated me on what a fine job I was doing. I believed him.

Piece of cake, I thought to myself. I started asking about the price of boards. I want one of these I said as

I "sailed" around the lawn of the windsurfing school.

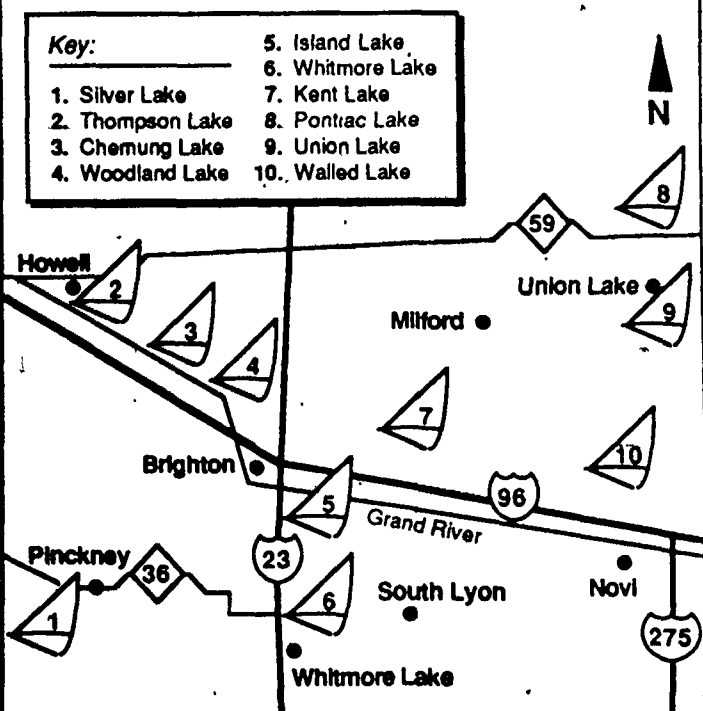
We decided it was time to get out on the water. No problem. I clambered up on the board like I had been born to the sport. The sail was a little heavier than on land and my balance was not quite as steady on the lake as I had been on land, but I was staying on the board. I got the sail up. I moved my feet. I moved my hands. I stared down at my feet as I steadied myself on the wobbly board — and then I fell off.

When I came out of the water Rasmussen was ecstatic. I had sailed. I had actually moved the board from the spot where I had started. And I had missed the whole thing because I was too busy worrying about my hands and my feet.

The next half hour I spent crawling from the bottom of Whitmore Lake to the top of the windsurfing board. Again and again and again. I looked like a prune. I felt pretty incompetent. Rasmussen tried to cheer me up.

He told me about two 15-year-old girls who had no trouble at all with the sport. "They walked across the board like they were on dry land,"

he said. That cheered me up a great deal.

The lesson ended for me with the onset of the only thunderstorm we've had for the entire summer. I believe in omens and I think it was an appropriate ending to my first time on a board. But I also believe what Rasmussen said.

"It's cool, it looks good and it's affordable," he said. Used beginner boards start at about \$400 and that

comes with a sail. From there, boards run right up to about \$2,000.

Age is no barrier to wind surfing and my instructor's father "may be a better surfer than I am" he confided to me. That's good to know, because at the rate I'm going I may be very old before I learn to feel the "effortless glide across the water" that he spoke of so highly.

For me, it's just a good thing I don't mind getting my hair wet.

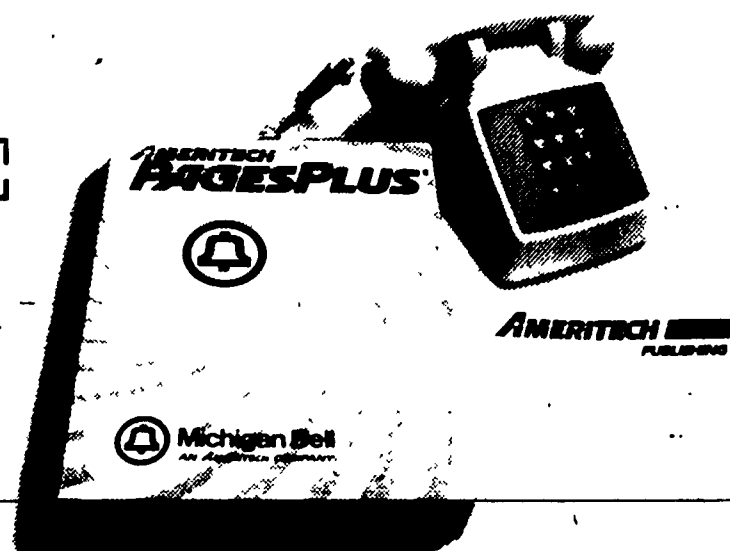

## Threesome hits "golden years"

It was supposed to be a surprise birthday party and it almost was. Only a power failure due to a Saturday night storm caused the secret to be shared prematurely.

Lillian Rakestraw, lifetime area resident and former teacher in South Lyon schools, learned of the "surprise" party her daughter, Lila Taft, had planned when her home on Eight Mile Road was without power on Sunday, July 17.

"Lila, who was visiting me, came in and said we had to go to my brother's (Harry Lyke) home in South Lyon to get washed up and so forth for the day," Rakestraw related. "When I asked her what the hurry was because I couldn't get her any breakfast, she had to tell me there would be a reception in my honor that day at the Salem Bible Church."

Rakestraw, who was 86 on July 12, said she was surprised and honored that more than 100 friends, relatives and former students were present to extend their congratulations. Among the guests were her two brothers, Russell Lyke, 84, and Harry, 81.

"One of the those who surprised me by coming was Dr. Russell Atchison of Northville. He was one of my first students and he's 78 years old himself. When I went to Michigan Normal College (now Eastern Michigan University) in Ypsilanti,

you could get your teaching certificate after only two years so my students weren't much younger than I was.

"I was awfully glad to see everyone who came."

Rakestraw began teaching in the Baseline School in September 1920. Later, she taught in Northville, Plymouth and several rural schools, rounding out 38 years as an instructor with 20 years in the South Lyon school system. She retired in 1967, after having taught in Sayre and South Lyon Elementary schools and the annex building at 235 W. Liberty Street.

After retirement, she took care of her husband, Lyle, who was ill for some 10 years before his death. They spent their winters in Florida. She says, she now "putters" around her house and yard.

Rakestraw and her brothers, also octogenarians, have lived in the Salem/South Lyon area all of their lives. Russell graduated from Northville High School in 1923 and worked at the Ford Motor Company, Northville plant from 1933 until retirement in 1969. He married Virena Lau of Romulus.

Harry, a 1924 graduate from Northville High School, also worked at the Northville Ford plant from 1934-69. He and his wife, Theda (Fritz), are active members of the South Lyon Area Historical Society.



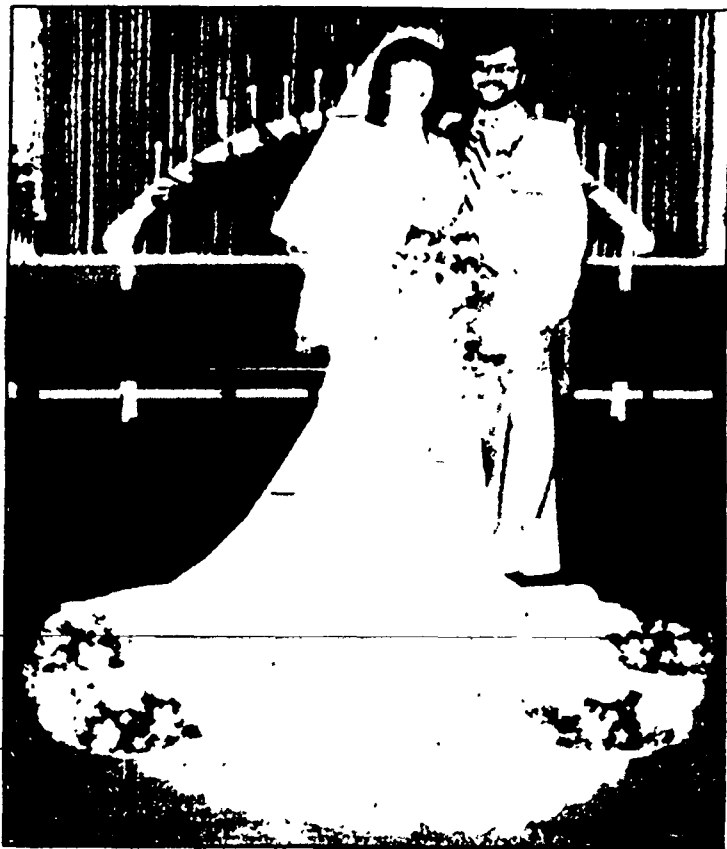

## Summer picnics are for everyone

A young couple strolling hand-in-hand, toting an overstuffed wicker basket of food, spots a patch of lush green grass sprinkled with tiny pink wildflowers.

Their faces alight with smiles as they stumble upon the perfect place to enjoy their dinner — the scene is set for a peaceful summertime picnic. They uncork a bottle of wine and munch on chilled green grapes, crusty French bread and assorted cheeses.

Not far away, a family of four grills hotdogs and marshmallows over white hot coals, dividing their time between turning the food and playfully tossing a yellow frisbee back and forth.

In a shady county park a few miles from there, an elderly couple unpacks ham and cheese sandwiches, zesty pasta salad and cold cans of orange soda from their cooler while

nestling at a quaint picnic table to enjoy their lunches.

And at a sun-blazed, sandy beach across town, a group of burly young men lounge beneath an oversized colorful sun umbrella, feasting on burgers and fries ordered take-out from a local fast-food restaurant.

Picnics are favorites of all ages. Sometimes reserved for occasions such as family reunions or company get-togethers, they bring dining to the great outdoors. For a break from the day-to-day eating routine, picnics can even be enjoyed in the comfort of a cozy family room. They can take any form and suit any event, as long as Mother Nature cooperates.

At area parks, beaches, lakes, cottages or in the privacy of residential backyards, picnics can be elegant or casual, romantic or sensible.

Picnics know no limits. For roman-

tic outdoor dining, replace paper cups and plates with fine china and crystal wine goblets. Take along finger food, such as cheese cut into bite-sized pieces, fried chicken or specialty breads.

For traditional family picnics, paper plates, plastic silverware and ample napkins are preferred, as well as food requiring little preparation — submarine sandwiches, potato chips, brownies, or whatever the occasion calls for. If grilling appeals to the head of the family, hotdogs, burgers, chicken or ribs are favorites.

Food experts suggest that food normally requiring refrigeration — potato or macaroni salads and coldcut sandwiches, for example — be appropriately packed in coolers to prevent spoilage in summer temperatures. Likewise, try to prevent setting any food in direct

sunlight.

Thirst-quenching fruits such as oranges, grapes, peaches, pineapple or watermelon usually adapt well to picnicking and are easy to take along.

When picnic tables aren't available, an oversized tablecloth or blanket spread upon the ground will do — red-and-white checkered designs are the tradition, but again, any type of cover will suffice. Infants and fair-skinned individuals may prefer the protection of an umbrella, clubhouse roof or simply a shady tree.

The hectic summer pace always seems to slow down during a leisure picnic.

But no matter where the picnic takes place, no matter what food is served, just remember not to invite the ants.

### Explore the magic of Colon

On one street corner, three men with goatees watch another man with a goatee turn a blue silk hankie into a red silk hankie. Across the street, a silver cube floats mysteriously through a hoop. In the diner, two women stare across the table as a man with slicked-back hair pulls coins out of his ears.

In most small towns in Michigan, activity like this might draw stares. In Colon, though, it's business as usual.

Colon, a sleepy town of about 1,000 located south of Kalamazoo, is known far and wide as "The Magic Capital of the World." And for a week every summer, the town doubles in population as magicians from around the globe congregate for the best magic convention ever.

Colon is home to the Abbott's Magic Manufacturing Co., the world's leading producer of magic supplies. Every August, the company hosts the Abbott's Magic Get-Together—a four-day convention of fun and magic.

This year's Get-Together is set for Aug. 10-13.

The Get-Together (they call it that because it sounds friendlier than "convention") offers magicians a chance to meet, trade secrets, buy tricks and see some world-class magic shows.

During the day, Get-Together attendees spend time buying new tricks (Abbott's moves its stock in to the Colon Elementary School gym for the week, turning it into a huge magic store) and listening to magic lectures.

At night, everybody herds over to Colon High School for the big show, which features six or seven of the top magic acts in the country.

And while the Get-Together is

primarily for magicians, the general public is invited to attend the shows—four at night and a Saturday matinee.

For the nightly shows (Wednesday through Saturday), admission is \$10 and \$7. For the family-oriented matinee (set for 2 p.m. Saturday), tickets are \$6 for adults, \$4 for senior citizens and children.

Tickets can be ordered by calling Abbott's at (616) 432-3236. You can order them by using your MasterCard or Visa charge card.

You won't be disappointed with the quality of the shows, either. Each one features magic superstars, such as Harry Blackstone Jr., who grew up in Colon. He'll be headlining the Thursday night show.

And since Colon is only two hours from the Brighton area, it's no big deal just driving down for the night.

If you'd rather drive down Saturday for one or both of the shows, you can make a day of it. There are sidewalk sales downtown and an arts-and-crafts fair on the lawn of the Colon Public Library. There's also a beach in town—Colon sits on the shores of Palmer Lake.

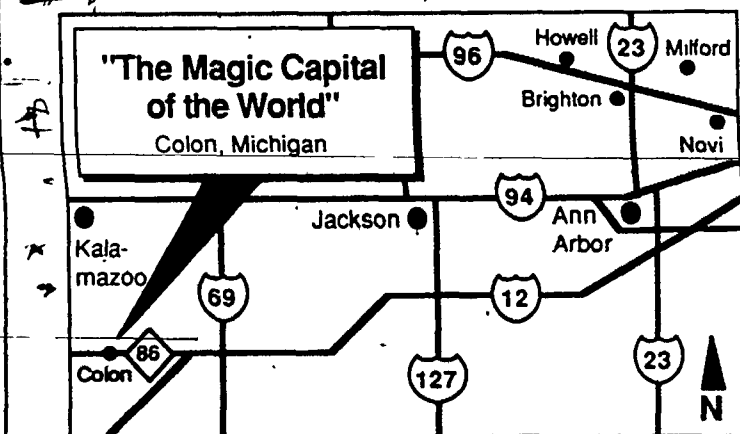
You'll also have the chance to purchase some tricks, if you catch the magic bug in Colon. Abbott's will have a display of beginning tricks for sale in its showroom during Get-Together week.

If you're wondering, by the way, how Colon came to be the world's magic capital, you have to go back to 1933.

That year, Harry Blackstone Sr. was vacationing in Colon. He fell in love with the area, and decided it would be the perfect place to locate his new magic company.

Together with Australian magician Percy Abbott, he opened the Blackstone Magic Co. Soon after, though, they had a falling out, and Abbott bought out Blackstone. He also changed the name to the Abbott's Magic Manufacturing Co.

Abbott later became partners in the business with Recl Borden. In 1959, when Abbott died, Borden took over the company. Borden died in 1981, and his son, Greg, currently runs the business.

## Chili's: 'No Place Else is Chili's'

The slogan on the menu says "No Place Else is Chili's," and although that's certainly true, the new restaurant at Haggerty and Eight Mile may remind you of several other establishments in the area.

That's meant as a compliment. Chili's—billed as a "grill and bar"—is a nice sort of cross between T.G.I. Friday's and Chi-Chi's. It takes shares the best elements of those restaurants, including both surroundings and the food itself.

The atmosphere at Chili's is friendly and relaxed, thanks in large part to a casual-but-classy decor. Dress ranges from jeans and polo shirts to full business suits, and neither end of the spectrum looks out of place. The restaurant is noisy enough to be entertaining and homey, but not so much that it becomes tough to talk.

The staff does more for the atmosphere than anything else. We were there at a busy dinner time, but everyone working there was smiling and courteous. Service was quick and efficient, even when the restaurant completely filled up.

Chili's has a nice selection of bottled beer and wine, as well as the expected margaritas. Nothing especially outstanding about that, but

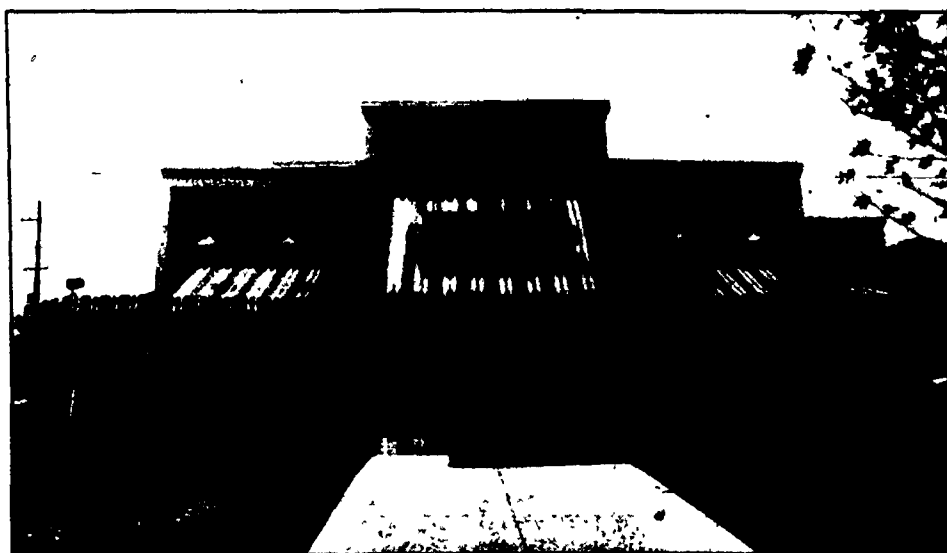

the place gets high marks for offering to call — and pay for — a taxi if there is no sober driver in a party. This service is announced on a blackboard at the pay phones.

The restaurant offers some interesting choices for appetizers, but we went for the classic plate of nachos. They were excellent, probably spicy enough to satisfy anyone but not so hot that the average diner can't enjoy.

Dinner entrees range from \$4 sandwiches to \$10 ribs, but we chose middle-of-the-line diners. (A report from a colleague says the ribs are first rate.)

I had a Chili's specialty called southwestern shrimp, served on a bed of rice. The shrimp was terrific and came in a generous portion.

My friend decided on chicken fajitas and said they were delicious. The fajitas are served with onions and a side warmer of soft tortilla shells, which is a nice setup.

The food was uniformly high quality, and obviously prepared with care. But the thing that impressed me most about Chili's was the attention to detail; they seem to get everything just right. The ice tea is brewed, the beer glasses are chilled, and the music is at the perfect volume to provide background noise but not impede conversation.

The only minus Chili's gets — and this is not something that really detracts from the visit at all — is a shortage of parking.

We got there just before 8 p.m. on a weeknight and saw several empty spaces in the lot. By the time we left, though, the lot was full and some people had resorted to parking up on the bare dirt berm between Chili's and the Novi Hilton property next door. As anyone knows who regularly passes by, this happens pretty regularly. Although this situation is hardly ideal — and has captured the attention of city officials — it's at least workable for the time being.

But again, that's a very minor point when the experience is taken as a whole. Overall, Chili's is a fine restaurant for all kinds of different occasions, and ought to continue its land-office business even in this restaurant-rich area.

# Smalec resigns as Northville soccer coach

## '84 state crown highlights tenure

Stan Smalec — one of the most successful coaches in Northville High School history — has decided to step down from his girls soccer post after five seasons and give way to junior varsity coach Bob Paul.

The announcement came from Northville Athletic Director Dennis Colligan last week, but it apparently wasn't a surprise move. According to Colligan, Smalec had been thinking of retiring from the coaching ranks as early as a year ago.

"There were no hard feelings whatsoever — Stan just decided to give it up," Colligan said. "It was no surprise to me — I knew he was thinking about this for quite some time."

Smalec's head coaching career at Northville started with a bang in 1984 when the Mustangs grabbed their first, and only, state title for girls soccer. Although Smalec's teams were never able to duplicate the feat in the next four seasons, Northville was consistently among the state's best and always in contention for that second title.

In five seasons, Smalec's teams posted an overall record of 80-16-9. That's a winning percentage of 75 percent — by far the best among current Mustang varsity coaches. Under Smalec, Northville was recognized as one of the finest programs in the state, and were routinely ranked among the top 10 Class A teams.

"Every season has been a high point for me," Smalec admitted. "That first season was a great thrill

because we won the state title, but the last season was a great one too.

"I've been fortunate and blessed with talented kids — that's why we've had success. We were always able to function as a unit and that's why I had a good feeling heading into every season. We were able to compete at the highest level and that was always our goal. We could compete with anybody in the state."

The reasons behind the decision are many, according to Smalec. But the fact that Bob Paul was in line as the successor made the decision easier to make.

"I feel it's the right time to make a change," Smalec said. "The girl's knowledge of soccer is approaching my knowledge of soccer — they are catching up to the old coach."

"I think Bob Paul will be good for the program because we need to expand. He will keep the program fresh with his ideas and energy."

Paul was the Mustang J.V. coach under Smalec for two seasons and had great success there. He supplied the varsity with quality young players and impressed many — including Smalec and Colligan.

"I felt kind of bad about Stan's decision because he's done such a great job, but he had a hand in interviewing his successor," Colligan said. "I think everything is going to work out very well."

"I think the program's in good hands."

Last spring, Smalec led the Mustangs to a 17-3-2 campaign and a berth in the state Class A semifinals.

Northville ended up dropping a heartbreaking 1-0 decision to Plymouth Canton in the semis and the Chiefs went on to grab the state title. But despite the sad ending, it was probably the most successful season of Smalec's tenure — other than 1984. Led by his daughter, Jodi Smalec, the Mustangs featured their most potent offensive attack ever.

Smalec combined with fellow senior Jennifer Schuerman to score 56 goals and 39 assists during the campaign. Smalec led the team with 30 goals and 25 assists to lead the Western Lakes Activities Association — the best girls soccer league in the state.

"I always wanted to coach but it was nice to be able to coach my daughter," Smalec said. "It was definitely a plus to have such a talented player like her on the team but at the same time, I think it's hard for a kid to play for a parent."

"One of the reasons I stayed on last season was to coach Jodi in her senior year. I thought we had a shot at the title again, and as it turned out, we did."

Smalec will stay involved with Northville's recreational soccer program, which is the main feeder program to the high school teams. He will coach an under-12 girls recreational team this fall and will keep Bob Paul informed on any potential rising stars.

"To be a head coach was a chance of a lifetime and a dream come true

for me," Smalec said. "It's something I'll cherish for my whole

life. I'm leaving with an immense feeling of success and pride and I know I'm leaving a strong team and a solid program."

"It was a privilege to work with so many outstanding people like Dennis Colligan, David Bolitho, Ralph Redmond and many others. I'd especially like to thank my assistant coach Doug Lyons and my wife Dianne. We have great support and commitment for soccer here in Northville and that's important because we are a small Class A school."

"We've been solid every year but it's something that we've worked at year-round. It hasn't been easy."

## Paul anxious to install new techniques, system

Bob Paul, 26, is the new head mentor for the Northville girls soccer team.

As one of the top programs in the state, it's an enviable position in the coaching ranks but Paul has the unenviable task of trying to replace Stan Smalec — one of the state's most successful coaches.

Paul served as the junior varsity coach under Smalec for two seasons and will take over the varsity reins next spring. He was recommended for the job by Smalec, who resigned last week after five years as the head coach.

"Bob's going to have his own style of coaching," Smalec said. "The game is on the threshold of a changing style and he's the perfect guy to lead the program through the changes."

According to Smalec, Paul is recognized as a hot young coaching prospect. He is currently the head coach for the University of Michigan's girls team — which is a club rather than an intercollegiate program — and is the coach of the under-18, Michigan Olympic Development Team. When the head coaching job opened at Farmington High School earlier this summer,

Paul was reportedly one of their first choices.

"He's got a lot of background and he's got the youth to go with it," Smalec said.

Paul is inheriting a solid program and a team next season that should again challenge for the state title.

"There are a lot of good young players coming up here in Northville and that's exciting," Paul said. "I have a lot of new and different ideas about soccer. I'm looking forward to implementing some of the more advanced techniques in coaching."

Paul is confident he can continue to keep the program on the winning track. You can tell by the way he talks that he is very impressed with the program and with Stan Smalec.

"Stan is really a very well-organized, down-to-earth person," Paul pointed out. "He worked hard at keeping the girl's respect and because of that, they were willing to play hard for him all the time."

"I think we can maintain this success. My only problem is going to be trying to establish myself as the leader and as a disciplinarian. We're going to train very hard — the practices will be highly structured."

## Holzer advances to LCBL finals

It didn't take long for an upset to take place in the Livonia Collegiate Baseball League (LCBL) playoffs, and Northville's Tom Holzer Ford was the upset victim.

In Friday's (July 29) opener at Livonia's Ford Field, third-place Walter's Appliance (15-14-1) surprised second-place Holzer (23-7) with a 6-5 victory. Fortunately for Holzer, they got another chance against Walter's on July 31 and made the most of it, winning the game 11-4 and moving the team into the LCBL championship game against old rival Little Caesars.

A fired-up Walter's team got some sterling relief help from Dave Houghtby to beat Holzer. He came on for starter Joe Mackiewicz in the fifth inning and set down eight batters in a row to preserve the win.

Holzer jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the top of the first on a two-run single by U-M bound Andy Fairman but Walter's got a run back in the bottom of the inning on Rick Karcher's RBI double, off Holzer starter Tom Cotter.

In the third, Walter's tied it up when John Knittel tripled and came home on another hit by Karcher. In the next inning, Walter's exploded for four runs after Steve Rudelic's solo homer had given Holzer a short-lived 3-2 advantage.

But Holzer would not quit, scoring twice in the fifth thanks to an RBI single by Fairman following an error

by Walter's. But Houghtby slammed the door shut after that.

"We beat (Walter's) in four of six times during the regular season and we thought we could outlast them," Holzer coach Bob Peterson said. "It just didn't happen."

Fairman (3-for-4), Kevin Ritter (2-for-4) and Rudelic (2-for-4) paced the Holzer batsmen.

In the second meeting two days later, it was a different story. Holzer leadoff batter Scott Peterson rapped out two-run singles in both the second and third innings to give the locals an early lead. Starting pitcher Mike Salach kept Walter's in check through six innings and then gave way to reliever Chris Willerer, who closed it out. Salach fanned five, walked three, scattered seven hits and allowed just two earned runs en route to his fifth win of the season, against no defeats.

loss.

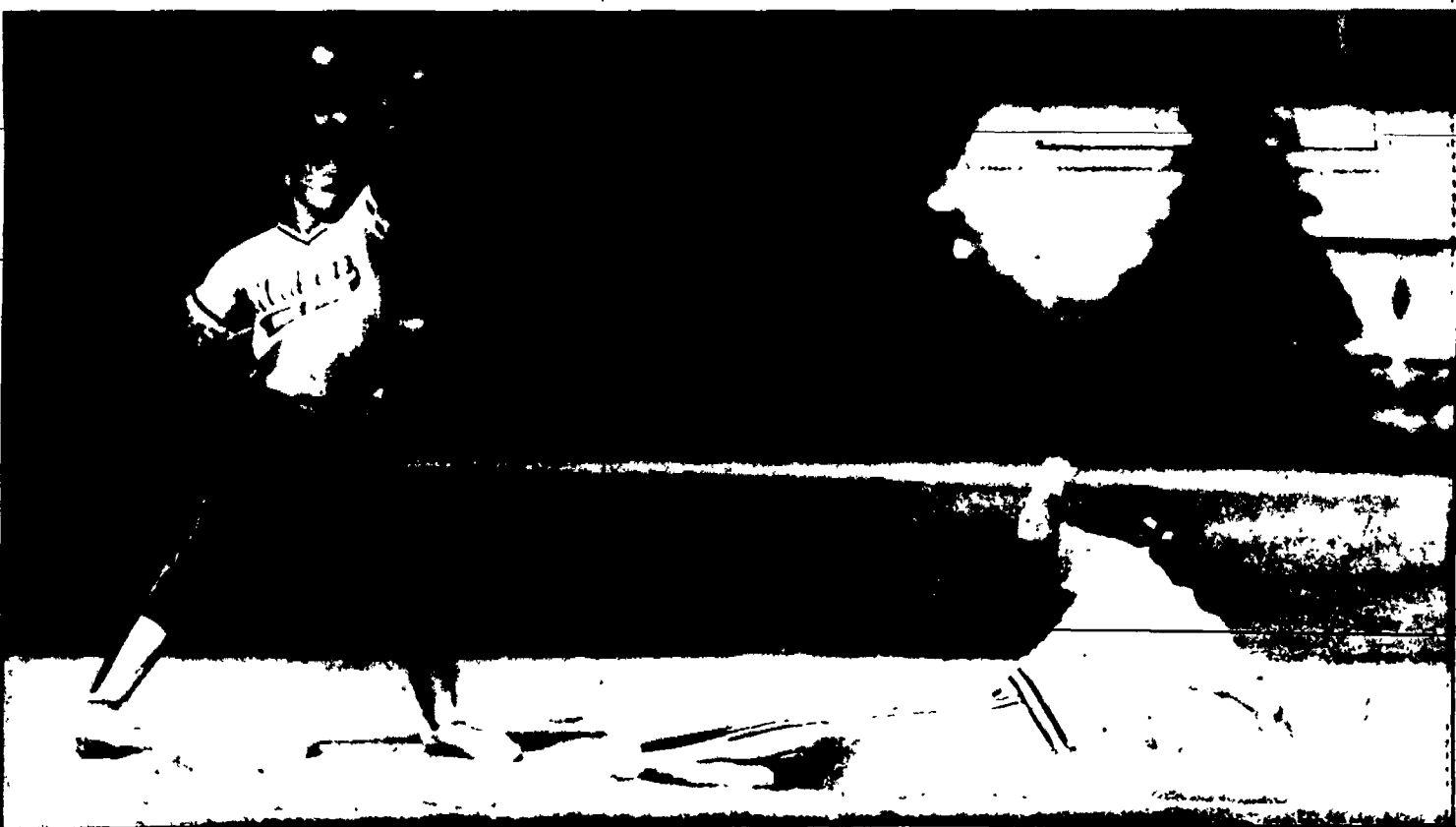

## Northville's Nielson drafted by Pirates

The dream goes something like this: After being brought up from the Pirates' Triple-A ballclub in the mid-season, a young pitcher from Michigan is warming up in the bullpen down the rightfield line at Three Rivers Stadium in Pittsburgh.

The Pirates are ahead of the St. Louis Cardinals by a run but the starting pitcher is in trouble. It's the sixth inning and he's just surrendered a double and a walk. Pittsburgh Manager Jim Leyland heads out to the mound and signals for the right-hander in the bullpen.

The youngster makes his way to the mound — very nervous but excited — and the public-address announcer says "now pitching for the Pirates, number 34, Dan Nielson."

It may never happen, but Northville's Dan Nielson would like nothing more than to pitch in the big leagues. That's the ultimate goal and he's been working hard for years trying to make that dream a reality.

He's actually a lot further along toward that goal than most

ballplayers. After four years at Western Michigan University, Nielson was drafted in the 1988 Amateur Free Agent Draft on June 12 by the Pirates. After reporting to the team's rookie camp in Bradenton, Fla. for a week, Nielson was then assigned to the Pirates' Class A club in Watertown, N.Y.

"It's not that much different from college ball," Nielson said in a telephone interview. "Almost all of the players in the league are from colleges. I'd say some of the team's I played against while I was at Western were better than some of the teams we face here."

The Watertown Pirates compete in the New York-Penn League — playing other Class A teams from the area. The 1988 season is only roughly half over and Nielson has been used strictly as a middle reliever. Naturally, moving up the ladder to the big leagues is something he thinks about all the time.

"I think about it every day," he admitted. "I still don't feel like a professional — I guess it hasn't hit me yet. The pay is not much, so maybe that's part of it. You really don't

make any money until you get to the Triple-A level and right now I don't know how far away I am from that."

Dan, the son of Dennis and Sandra Nielson, was an All-League and All-Area hurler for Northville High School and graduated in 1984 before signing to play at Western. His first season was spectacular and he was named to the All Mid-American squad as a freshman. His 7-0 record was tops for the Broncos.

But in practice prior to his sophomore year, Nielson injured his shoulder and was red-shirted. Through isometric exercises he rebounded without the aid of surgery and he was back ready to pitch — but not until his junior year. Halfway through the third season, Nielson suffered a broken foot and missed roughly half the campaign. His record was 1-4.

But he came back for his fourth year this spring and was one of Western's top pitchers in the starting rotation. Nielson had a slump of sorts midway through the season — losing four of five decisions — but he came on strong down the stretch to grab the attention of professional scouts

from Pittsburgh and Boston. Nielson won his last four to raise his record to 6-4 and earned run average to 3.59. He gave up just six runs in the final four games and had an impressive 59-to-24 ratio of strike outs to walks.

Even though he had another year of college eligibility, Nielson signed with Pittsburgh after he was drafted in the middle rounds.

"He had a decision to make but once they draft you, you have to take advantage of the opportunity," Nielson's father Dennis said. "It may never come again."

According to Nielson, the Pirate organization is a good one. Optimism remains high from top to bottom since General Manager Sid Thrift came aboard, and the organization is known to bring its own talent up through the system — unlike, say, the New York Yankees.

"Sid Thrift has installed a new attitude in the organization and I feel I was lucky to be drafted by the Pirates," Nielson pointed out. "They told us they don't draft players unless they feel they have big league poten-

## Osborne's East All Stars fall 17-10

Northville's John Osborne has won well over 100 high school football games during his illustrious coaching career at Novi High School.

But his record as head coach of the Michigan High School All-Star Football Game will probably forever remain 0-1.

Last Saturday (July 30), the Osborne-coached East squad surrendered two fourth-quarter touchdowns, blew a slim 3-0 advantage and fell to the West squad 17-10 in the annual summer classic at Michigan State's Spartan Stadium.

The 8th intra-state clash was played before a crowd of 9,500, and the players—as well as the spectators—had to endure temperatures of nearly 100 degrees. The win was the second in a row for the West team and evened the series at four wins apiece.

Joining Osborne as members of the East team were Novi assistant coach Cole Rowcamp and '87 Novi quarterback Brian Schram. Rowcamp was assigned to coach the interior lineman, while Osborne handled most of the offensive play-calling.

"I really wanted to win the game, but it was a neat treat to be elected as head coach by my peers," Osborne said. "It's probably the highest honor a high school coach can receive in this state, and I was very honored to be a part of it."

"It was a very competitive game. Those kids hit mighty hard, and they all want to show off their talents. It's supposed to be fun, but it is upsetting when you don't win. I've been replaying the game in my head all day. I thought we had the players to win it, but the West team executed

better offensively in the fourth quarter."

For the game, the East squad outgained the West 255 to 186.

"I was very impressed with the whole thing," Osborne said. "The facilities at Michigan State were outstanding, and the athletes were great. I was very impressed with the players' foot speed and strength, and most of them came in in very good shape."

Schram made a leaping catch for a 22-yard gain and a first down in the first quarter. Even though it was his only grab of the game, he was open time and time again against All-State defensive backs like Alan Haller (Lansing Sexton), Carmel Dennis (Ypsilanti) and Obble Franklin (Ann Arbor Pioneer).

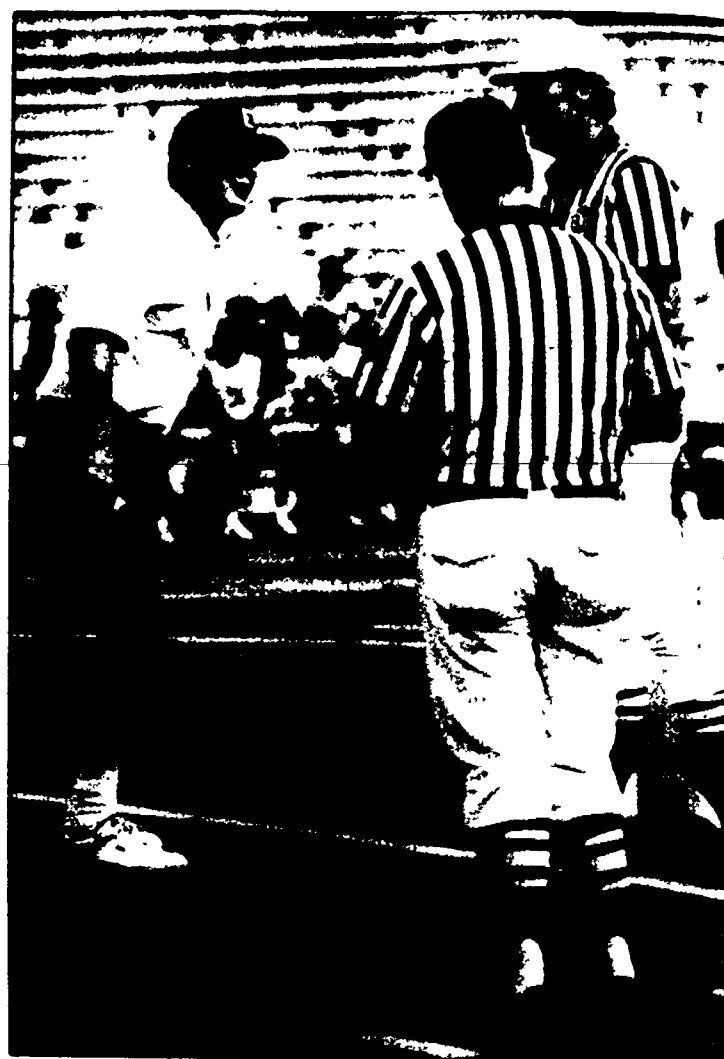
"I was open a lot," Schram said. "I was open deep numerous times, but the quarterbacks didn't have much time to throw. It was actually easier than I thought to get open."

Schram said that he thought Osborne played a very fine game and represented his school and conference very well.

"He played a nice game," said the veteran Novi coach. "He didn't make any mistakes and we're very proud of him. He proved that he's every bit as good a player as the rest."

Schram is planning to walk on as a receiver at Michigan State and believes his appearance and performance in the all-star game will help this fall.

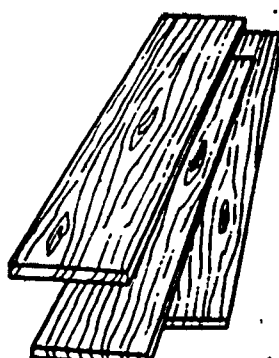
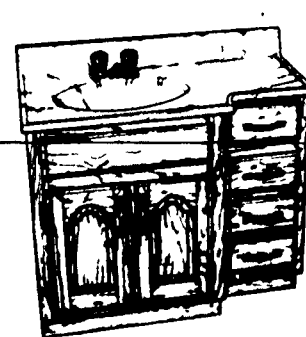

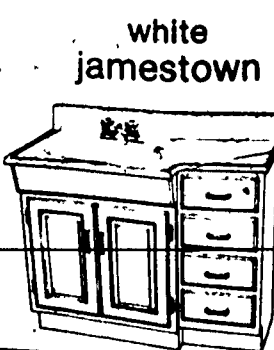

## Connie Mack's season ends with losses at senior regional

Baseball tournament time in Northville is now underway full-force with the NABF Sophomore World Series and the NABF Senior Regional being played last weekend. Unfortunately for area players and fans, the regional signaled a quick end to the 1988 season for Northville's Connie Mack entry.

Northville lost two of its first three games in the double-elimination tournament and were promptly knocked out. The only win for the local squad came on a forfeit, while the two losses came against two of metropolitan Detroit's best teams and were very close and competitive.

The opener for Northville was against Troy and was played on July 26 at the Northville High School Field. The locals took control of the game in the middle innings and had an 11-7 lead heading into the last inning but couldn't hold on and eventually fell 18-11.

"We played hard, so it was very heartbreaking," Northville Coach Larry Skynar said. "We were leading by four runs heading into the seventh but we just couldn't stop them. I'm sure the whole team felt we had an excellent chance to win and we let it slip by."

Troy drew first blood off starter Todd Ebersole, scoring five runs in

the first, but Northville bounced back with two in their half of the inning. Two walks, a wild pitch, a sacrifice and a fielder's choice by Brian Frelick scored the two runs.

Troy made it 6-2 with a single run in the second but again Northville came back, this time with four runs in the fourth to knot the score. Randy Jones led off with a solo home run to start the rally and following a walk and two singles by Frelick and Ed Walsh, Derek Osborne crunched a three-run homer.

Northville then took the lead with five more in the fifth. Jones, Willerer, Mike Yard, Walsh and Steve Ventura all had run-scoring hits in the inning.

Troy narrowed the score to 11-7 in the sixth and then exploded for 11 runs in the seventh. Ebersole left with Northville still ahead 11-9 but his reliever Adam Behen allowed five runs before he was pulled. Jones finally got Troy out, but not before surrendering a grand slam.

Jones was the hitting star with two hits and two RBIs. Willerer (2-for-3) and Walsh (3-for-4) also had big days at the plate.

Northville was set to take on Detroit Renaissance the following day in a consolation bracket match-up, but the Detroit team didn't show up.

The forfeit win advanced Nor-

thville into a game on July 28 against Clintondale, and again the locals hung tough until the later innings. But a 2-2 battle suddenly became a 13-2 triumph for Clintondale after a nine-run rally in the sixth. The loss ended Northville's season with a 7-14 record.

"We had another bad inning and it really cost us," Skynar said. "That's been the story of our season. We just don't seem to have the pitching depth we need."

Clintondale scored the game's first run in the game but Northville took the lead with two runs in the bottom of the second on a two-run homer by Walsh.

It remained 2-1 until Clintondale tied it with a single run in the fourth, and then blew it open with nine in the sixth. Osborne was the starting pitcher and cruised along until tiring in the sixth after walking four and allowing four runs. Ebersole came on and gave up the final seven runs.

"The score did not reflect the game," Skynar said. "Clintondale is a real powerful team and we held them in check until the end. They merited their first opponents 10-0."

Northville managed just three hits in the game.

In a very exciting final, Clintondale slipped Troy 10-9 on Saturday to win the regional and advance to the NABF Senior World Series.

## Brooklyn wins Sophomore Series

The 1988 NABF Sophomore World Series for boys age 14 and under made another appearance in the area last week, and according to tournament coordinator Bob Frelick, it came off with no hitches or problems — again.

Northville has been the host site for three NABF tournaments for several summers now, and they keep coming back year after year for good reason.

"I thought the Sophomore World Series and the Senior Regional went very well," Frelick said. "There was some interesting baseball to watch, the crowds were good and the teams well behaved."

Brooklyn — the squad representing the New York Region winner — ended up winning the title with a perfect 4-0 mark, but the road to the title wasn't easy. As a matter of fact, Northville's Sandy Koufax squad — the host team — gave Brooklyn all it could handle in the first round on July 28 before falling 3-2. Brooklyn then downed Warren TSI, the Michigan champs, to reach the finals, where they slipped past Huber Heights (Ohio) 8-7 on July 30 to grab the NABF championship.

"Both tournament championship games were decided by one run so that means a lot of excitement," Frelick said. "I'd say the talent level was equal to — or better than — what it's been in the past, but it's hard to judge those things. At the sophomore level, you don't see the real standouts that you see in the older groups, but all the games were very well played."

The highlight — and lowlight — for the Northville Koufax team — was the opening round clash with Brooklyn. Northville starting pitcher Mike Lang may have staged the best individual performance of the tournament when he blanked the New York squad through seven innings, allowing just one hit and no earned runs. Unfortunately, several costly errors and offensive production woes cost the locals dearly.

"Mike Lang gave up one hit but they scored three unearned runs," Koufax Coach Joe Stankis recalled. "We had a few inopportune errors and we didn't take advantage of our scoring opportunities when we had them."

Northville scored first with a single run in the opening inning. Kevin Shaw singled, stole a base, was moved to third on a sacrifice and scored on a wild pitch.

Brooklyn took the lead with two runs in the third and one in the fourth on just one hit (an infield single) but Northville came back in the top of the seventh to narrow the deficit to 3-2 as Matt Osiecki walked, moved into scoring position on an error and scored an another wild pitch. But with the tying run on third base, Brooklyn got the final out.

"This was the best outing of the season for Lang," Stankis said. "By watching him in action, I suspect he was head and shoulders above the rest of the pitchers in the tournament. We just couldn't get him any runs."

On Friday (July 29), Northville bowed out of the double-elimination event when Huber Heights tagged the team with a 12-2 defeat in the consolation round. Just like the first

game, Northville hung tough in the early going and was leading 2-1 after two innings. In the second, Aaron Hodgins (double) and Joey Stankis (walk) reached base and later managed to score on errors.

Huber Heights took the lead for good with a five-run rally in the third and then rounded out the scoring with two runs in the fourth, fifth and seventh innings.

"We actually outthrew them 5-4 but again the errors and walks cost us," Stankis said. "We seemed to fall apart midway through the game and I think a lot of it had to do with the first loss against Brooklyn. I think it took a lot out of us but the kids never quit."

Northville ends the season with a record of 14-14 overall.

**JUNIOR WORLD SERIES:** The NABF Junior World Series, featuring boys under age 16 from seven teams from across the country, is slated to get underway today (Aug. 4) at Northville's baseball field.

The first game will start at 9 a.m. and will pit the Bayside (N.Y.) Yankees against Town Center of Seattle, Wash. St. Clair Shores — the Michigan representative — will take on the Maumee (Ohio) winner at noon, while the host Northville Mickey Mantle squad will go up against Putty Hill from Baltimore, Md. at 3 p.m. The Shoetiques of Nashville, Tenn. will receive a first round bye.

The pre-tourney favorite is probably the Bayside Yankees. This year's appearance marks the Yankees' fourth appearance in the Northville for the World Series. The team placed first in 1983 and 1986 and second in 1984.

"The Yankees are always a strong club but I suspect they'll all be strong," Frelick said. "The Baltimore and Seattle areas always seem to send strong teams so we're expecting a highly competitive tournament."

## Home fitness surges in popularity

Cross country skiing at Maybury State Park, rowing a boat across Walled Lake or riding a bike in Hines Park are all great ways to keep fit in the Novi/Northville area. Unfortunately, these activities are impossible at certain times of the year. Ever try rowing across a frozen lake in the winter or cross country skiing in July?

The answer to these problems is simple but it can be expensive. By outfitting your home with fitness equipment, you can ski, row, bike and run in the comfort and privacy of your basement, garage or anywhere. And you can simulate the same aerobic conditioning you get from the real thing.

Home fitness gear can also include isometric equipment like free weights and hand weights. And smaller or inexpensive items like jump ropes and speed bags.

"We've seen an increase in home fitness items of at least 20-30 percent in the last couple of years," said Keith Miracle, the Leisure Sports Department Manager at Herman's Sporting Goods in Twelve Oaks Mall. "I think a lot of it has to do with the fitness craze. People seem to be more health oriented."

To outfit your residence with a home gym, you need to decide how much you want to spend and what type of activity will provide the best results.

"Most customers want to know what type of equipment is best for their situation," said Herman's salesperson Dan Compton. "If you

are trying to tone, the stationary exercise bikes and the rowers are the best. If they are trying to build, the weights are the best way to go."

According to Compton, Herman's currently sells large quantities of rowers and stationary bikes for the fitness minded. The rowers sell anywhere from \$150-\$200 and most fold up to fit under a bed or against a wall. The bikes cost about the same as the rowers and both can give you a complete all-around workout if used properly.

"We deal with a lot of rowers and bikes," Compton said. "They don't take up much room and they are affordable."

Cross country ski simulators (\$300-\$600) are also quite popular, according to Compton, but they can be difficult to find. Treadmills have also seen a resurgence in popularity in the last year but they can be expensive (\$1,000-\$3,500) and bulky.

"We did carry a ski simulator for a while but we had trouble keeping them in stock," he said. "They are a great machine and they are very popular now because they give you a total aerobic workout. They are mostly sold through the mail."

Walking and running is still a common way to keep in shape and that's why wrist and ankle weights are also big sellers. By putting the weights on their limbs, walkers and runners increase the resistance and that, in turn, enhances the workout.

"Walking is a big thing now and the weights are becoming more and more common," Compton said. "Of course, they want a bike for indoors when it's raining or snowing outside."

## Fitness Tips

## Vitamin claims, benefits often go unsupported

If you look on the shelves of any drug store, you will find a large, bewildering selection of vitamin and mineral preparations. A variety of benefits have been attributed to vitamins from increased energy to improved sexual performance. However, most of these claims have not been supported by research. It is not surprising that many people are uncertain whether they should take vitamins.

Vitamins are organic substances present in foods that are essential for normal metabolism. Most vitamins work as co-enzymes or helper molecules for chemical reactions. Minerals are inorganic substances that are also necessary in the diet, such as iron and calcium.

Only small amounts of vitamins and minerals are required each day. Classic vitamin deficiencies such as scurvy or lack of vitamin C are uncommon in the United States today.

Most people eating a well-balanced diet or even a diet consisting mainly of "fast foods" obtain more than sufficient amounts of vitamins.

Many food products are fortified with vitamins such as vitamin D in milk or B vitamins in flour. Some vitamins are manufactured by bacteria that live in the colon. And these vitamins are absorbed and used in the human body.

Thus, the majority of people do not need vitamin supplements. However, taking a multivitamin preparation in conjunction with a good diet is rarely harmful. The body is very efficient and usually only absorbs the amount of vitamins it needs and then eliminates any excess that is absorbed. Excessively large doses, however, may overwhelm the body and toxicity can occur. This is particularly true with vitamins A and D and niacin.

Several conditions predispose people to vitamin or mineral deficiencies

and supplementation is warranted. The more common situations will be discussed.

Clearly, anyone who is not eating a proper diet may develop vitamin deficiencies. This would include people in very low calorie weight loss diets or people with decreased appetite and poor intake secondary to cancer or other chronic diseases. Elderly persons may not have adequate diets especially if they are living alone on fixed incomes.

Pregnant women and women who are breastfeeding have increased nutritional requirements especially for iron, calcium and folate. A prenatal vitamin is generally prescribed. Menstruating women can develop iron deficiency anemia and then iron supplementation is required.

Strict vegetarians can develop B-12 deficiencies since this vitamin is only present in animal products. Others at risk for B-12 deficiency are people

who have had surgical removal of the stomach or pernicious anemia. In these latter cases, B-12 must be given by injection.

Certain medications can interfere with proper absorption of vitamins or interfere with the function of the vitamin in the body. For example, cholestyramine, used to lower cholesterol, can lead to malabsorption of vitamins A and D.

If you are concerned that you may be at risk for a vitamin or mineral deficiency, check with your physician. In some instances prescription vitamins are necessary to achieve adequate levels.

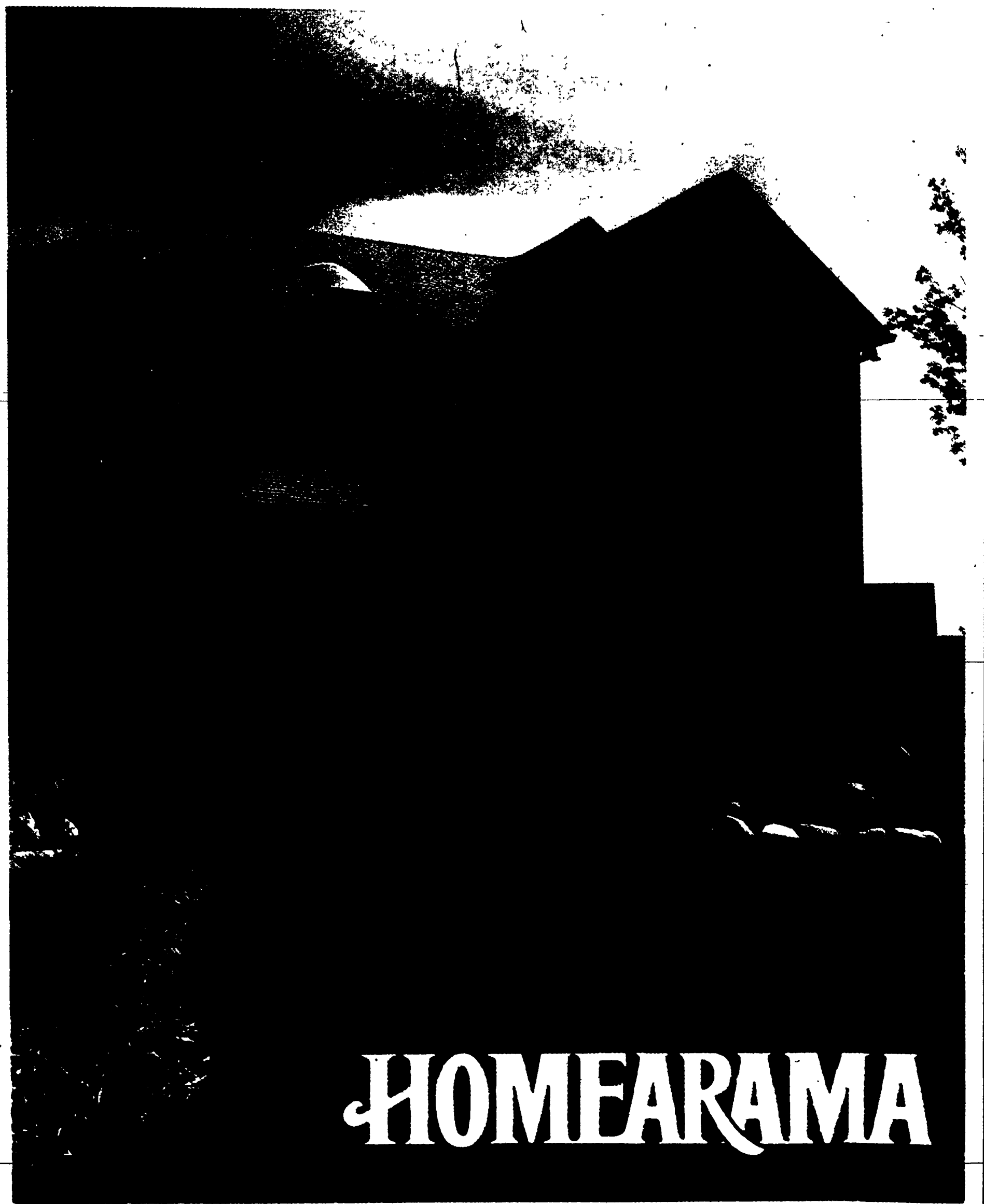

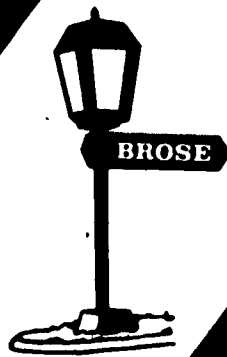

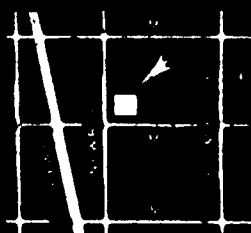

# Idea homes tout interior trends

**T**HE LATEST in home interior design and decor can be seen in the 18 homes of Homearama — Summer, the Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan's sixth annual showcase of "idea" homes, Aug. 4-28, in Autumn Ridge subdivision on Orchard Lake road just north of Walnut Lake Road.

High ceilings — a full 10 feet — and 8-foot doors are a noticeable trend among the homes, like the "Woodridge" by Kay Building Corp. of Farmington Hills, which uses them extensively on the first floor.

"The Biscayne" by L.K. Development Co. of West Bloomfield also uses them on the first floor, including library, laundry and kitchen, where higher ceilings allow use of extra tall kitchen cabinets for added storage.

Another innovation in ceilings and door openings is "stepped" construction. "The Bradley" model by Armstrong Development Co. of West Bloomfield makes extensive use of the concept in its foyer, with triple steps or soffits around the ceiling and door openings. The step-down effect is carried out with double soffits in the dining room.

"THE BRADLEY'S" dining room ceiling also exhibits another strong trend toward use of more recessed lighting, with 11 of them in that room, alone.

Slanted "studio" ceilings are now prolific in many HOMEARAMA homes. They are used in the kitchen as well as the great room — which incorporates 10 recessed lights — in "The Michael Anthony" model by G. Alan Associates Ltd. of West Bloomfield.

The great room of "The Michael Anthony," with its three-story ceiling, and the dining room are "sunken," another very popular trend in HOMEARAMA homes.

In walls, a popular twist is curved or "radius" walls, like those in "The American Living" by Center Building Co. of Farmington Hills and Kalabat Construction Inc. of Southfield. Among many are the curved glass brick wall that separates the dining room from the great room — with its circular bar, and a curved stairwell to the second floor.

IT'S IN THE EDGES of the walls that one finds a very practical innovation in the "Looking Glass" by Koch Development of Bloomfield Township. The edges are formed by a new product, a quarter-round aluminum corner that promises to keep these exposed edges from chipping.

Another new material usage is found in stainless steel front doors and the stainless steel, L-shaped stairway of "The Devin" model by S.S.R. Building Co. of Farmington Hills.

Kitchens are larger and more efficient these days, and Detroit Edison's "Bright Idea Home," the "Menlo Park" by Burdge Inc. of W. Bloomfield, has added the adjective "sumptuous," by making theirs circular, with curved glass block, aluminum wall panels and black granite counter tops and furnishing it with top-of-the-line imported cabinets.

In bathrooms, among many notable attractions is the semi-round, corner whirlpool tub of marble in the "Arlington II" by Benivegna Building Co. of Farmington Hills and Roux & Associates of Northville.

"MORE BATHROOMS ARE better," is a current axiom, and the four-bedroom "Garlinghouse" model, by Burley Associates Inc. of Canton, has three, each with its own bath and dressing area, in addition to the luxurious master suite bath with its step-up whirlpool tub and double vanities.

Spacious, two-person showers have been "in" for a couple of years, but S.S.R. Building Co. of Farmington Hills makes theirs in "The Devin" model very functional as well as fun by providing two separate shower heads.

The sun room is making a comeback at Homearama — Summer, in the "Garlinghouse," where it is situated between the breakfast room and the living room. Whoops! Did they say "living room"? There's another one trying to make a comeback.

If there is such a thing as trends in traditional interiors, it's toward more fine wood moldings and paneling. Bonadeo Builders feature custom moldings, including extensive crown molding, throughout its "Fairhill" model, and an elegant, open oak staircase with railings from the foyer to the second floor.

THE OTHER COLONIAL, the "Windsor" by Rembrandt Construction Inc. of Detroit, has custom designed, raised oak panels in the den, with built-in bookcases and boxed-beam ceiling.

Although beautiful, there are security "beans" behind the facades of the HOMEARAMA homes. The one installed by Kay Building Corp. of Farmington Hills in its "Woodridge" model even has a TV-monitored entry system.

Homearama — Summer is open to the public 7-11 p.m. Mondays through Fridays, and 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays.

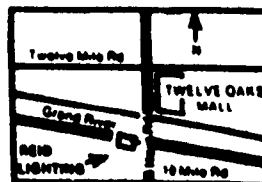

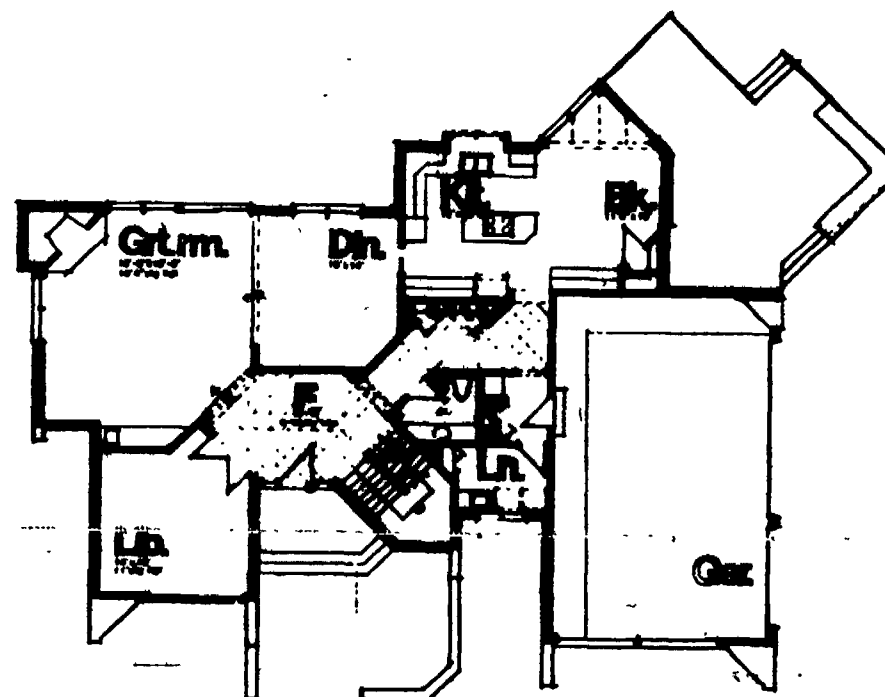

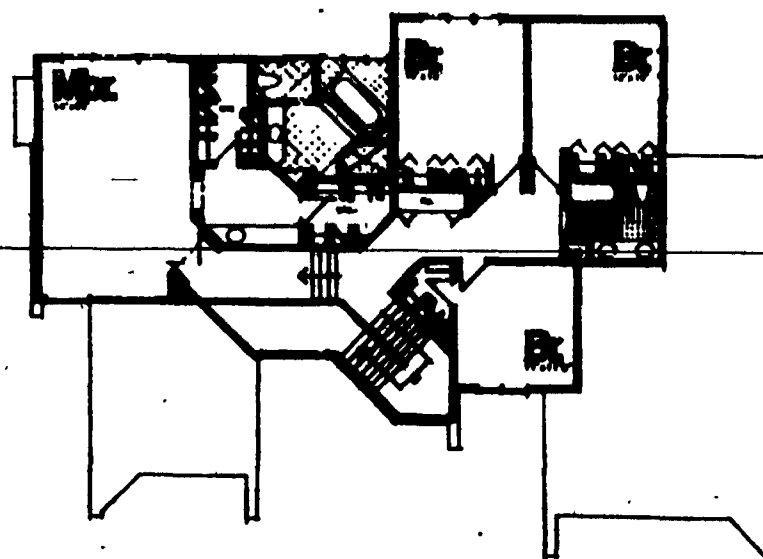

First Level Floor Plan



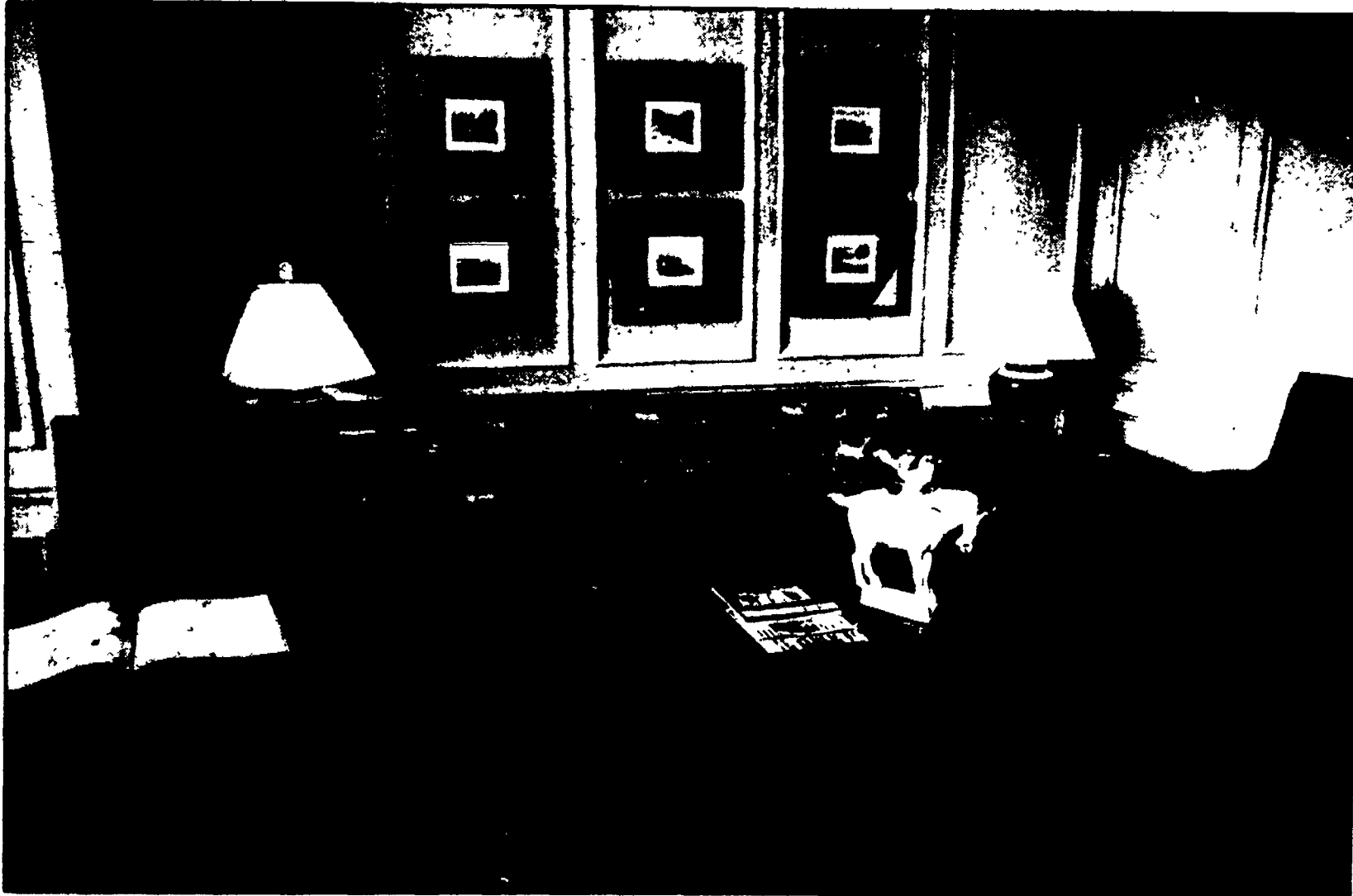

## Consumers should select home insurance with care

**C**ONSUMERS should choose insurance coverage for their home and personal belongings with care.

"A home and the possessions it contains are very special. Insurance for those items should be tailored to meet each individual's needs," according to Terry Buckles, president of Michigan Association of Insurance Companies.

One type of home insurance policy is the "broad form," otherwise known as HO 2. This covers damage to the dwelling and possessions from perils such as explosion, fire or lightning, windstorm or hail, riot or civil commotion, theft, vandalism, falling objects, building collapse and damage from a vehicle or aircraft.

Another, perhaps more common type of policy is the HO 3, often referred to as the "special form." This policy covers the dwelling against additional perils and, accordingly, is priced somewhat higher. There are also special policies to fit the needs of renters and condominium owners.

Most homeowners policies also cover a policyholder's legal liabilities if someone is injured on the premises, or if the insured damages someone else's property. "Personal liability insurance includes protection in the form of legal defense and payment of damages, if the insured is found to be at fault," Buckles said.

Policies usually provide a minimum of \$25,000 to \$100,000 in coverage for personal liability; however, consumers may wish to purchase higher limits for an additional premium.

**REPLACEMENT COST** coverage is the traditional type of home insurance. It pays for replacing, rebuilding or repairing the property to its original condition with materials of the like kind and quality.

Another option offered by many insurers is the repair cost policy. This type of policy pays to replace, repair or rebuild damaged property to a similar condition using contemporary materials.

Many Michigan homes are dangerously underinsured, the insurance official noted. Inflation has doubled and tripled their value in recent years; but property owners have neglected to increase insurance

coverage levels accordingly.

**THE AMOUNT OF RECOVERY** for property loss is limited to amounts specified in the policy. So, even if a home is worth \$80,000 and insured for \$40,000, the owner would receive only the latter in case of total loss.

Most property losses, of course, aren't "total." Even with partial losses, however, many homeowners could have financial difficulties if underinsured. Replacement cost policies generally require the insured to maintain coverage levels equal to at least 80 percent of replacement cost. If the insured does not, the company won't pay the full cost of repairing, replacing or rebuilding for such partial losses.

Many companies offer a special policy endorsement or provision that increases dwelling coverage levels automatically to keep pace with inflation.

A homeowners policy will cover a family's personal belongings, such as furniture, appliances, rugs, clothing, jewelry, etc., as well as the home itself. The amount of insurance protection for personal property on the premises is usually 50 percent of the amount of coverage on the dwelling.

For example, if a policy provides \$80,000 insurance on a home, the contents would be insured for \$30,000.

Policies generally provide only limited amounts of coverage for certain types of personal property that are especially susceptible to loss, such as cash, securities, jewelry, furs, firearms, and stamp and coin collections.

Coverage for cash has a \$200 limit, while coverage for other valuables varies between \$1,000 and \$2,500. For an additional premium, the consumer can purchase a policy endorsement in which the items are described specifically and each is given a dollar value.

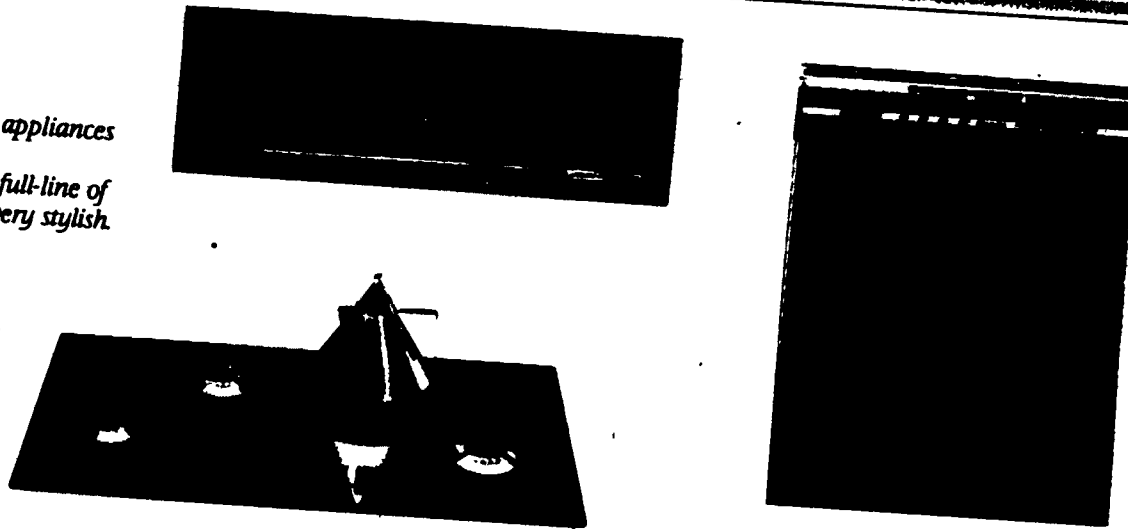
Buckles noted that home insurance premiums are based on the following criteria: territory (geographic location), amount and type of coverage, safety and security devices, structural defects, fire protection, construction, prior claims, use of smoking materials and availability of law enforcement.

# Trends, innovations are apparent

**A**PPROACHING the 18 homes of 1988 Homearama — Summer, down a winding cul-de-sac in Autumn Ridge subdivision in West Bloomfield, many trends and innovations in home building are apparent.

With an average price tag of over \$350,000, the builders, architects, interior designers and landscapers had budget room to incorporate the latest and greatest features available.

It is apparent that white has become a very popular exterior color, as seen on seven of the homes. The "Saturn" model by C & O Construction & Investment Co. of Farmington Hills combines white brick and white-painted horizontal cedar siding and shows an arresting triple-offset design in incorporating a triple garage into the attractive front elevation.

Walking into the basement of the "Saturn," the visitor will find that the walls have 20 different planes, in order to support the intricate, free-form architectural design.

Multiplaned and peaked roof lines are becoming more prevalent. The front view of "The Sheffield" by

Dakota Building Co. of West Bloomfield shows five separate roof levels, and the "Tri-Star" by Northbrook Associates of Rochester Hills show six peaks.

**INSULATION HAS BEEN** around for a long time. Now comes "outsulation," a new exterior finishing system on walls of "The Biscayne" by L.K. Development Co. of West Bloomfield. Touted as maintenance-free, it consists of a troweled-on acrylic finish over insulation blocks.

With the size of lots in Autumn Ridge, there is plenty of room for inviting courtyards as preambles to the house's main entrance. Rembrandt — Construction Inc. of Detroit effectively uses a large, brick-walled courtyard to carry out the French colonial theme of its "Windsor" model.

Around back, the deck's the thing, these days. Benivegna Building Co. Inc. of Farmington Hills and Roux & Associates of Northville have stretched a deck the entire length of the rear elevation of their "Arlington II" model. It is accessible through window walks from the great room,

dining room and kitchen/dining nook.

It's also apparent from a stroll through 1988 HOMEARAMA — Summer that lots of windows and huge windows are more "in" than ever. Walking up to Detroit Edison's "Bright Idea Home," the "Merlo Park" model by Burdge Inc. of W. Bloomfield, the visitor is impressed by a huge, 20-foot-by-22-foot entrance window wall composed of 18 large square panes, around the two towering 10-foot-by-4-foot glass-paneled entrance doors.

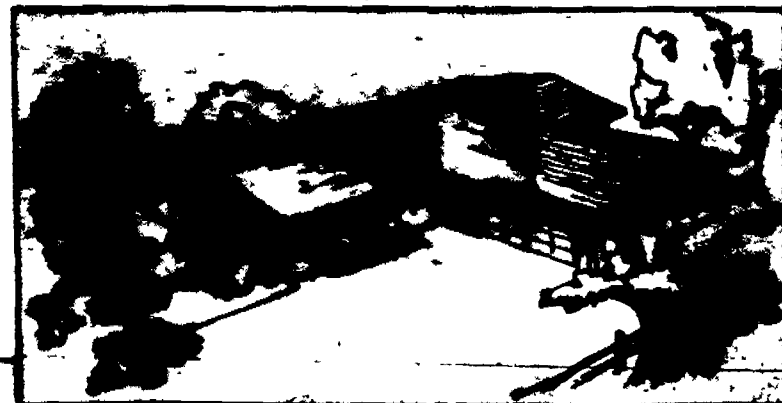
**HUGE WINDOWS MELD** into sheer glass walls in the aptly named "Looking Glass" model by Koch Development of Bloomfield Township.

Nine-foot-high glass walls in the multi-stepped-out design of the rear walls open up huge vistas of the treed area behind the home.

Not every home in Homearama is trendy. The colonial "Fairhill" model by Bonadeo Builders of Plymouth is staunchly traditional and exhibits fine workmanship and detail. Painstakingly done brick and stone lintels top all of the windows in the front elevation of the solid brick exterior.

The houses will be open to the public from Aug. 4 through Aug. 28, in the new Autumn Ridge subdivision on Orchard Lake Road just north of Walnut Lake Road.

Champagne, anyone?

- Separate master bedroom suites have been the rage for the last few years. Now, a number of HOMEARAMA models have "step-up" master bedroom suites. Four full steps are required to ascend to that suite in "The Elite" model by Grand Homes Inc. of West Bloomfield, raising it well above the level of mediocrity... and the children.

- Second-floor decks are found on quite a few HOMEARAMA houses, but Dakota Building Co. of West Bloomfield has put a 6-foot wall around half of the one on "The

Sheffield" so that sun bathing "au naturel" is possible.

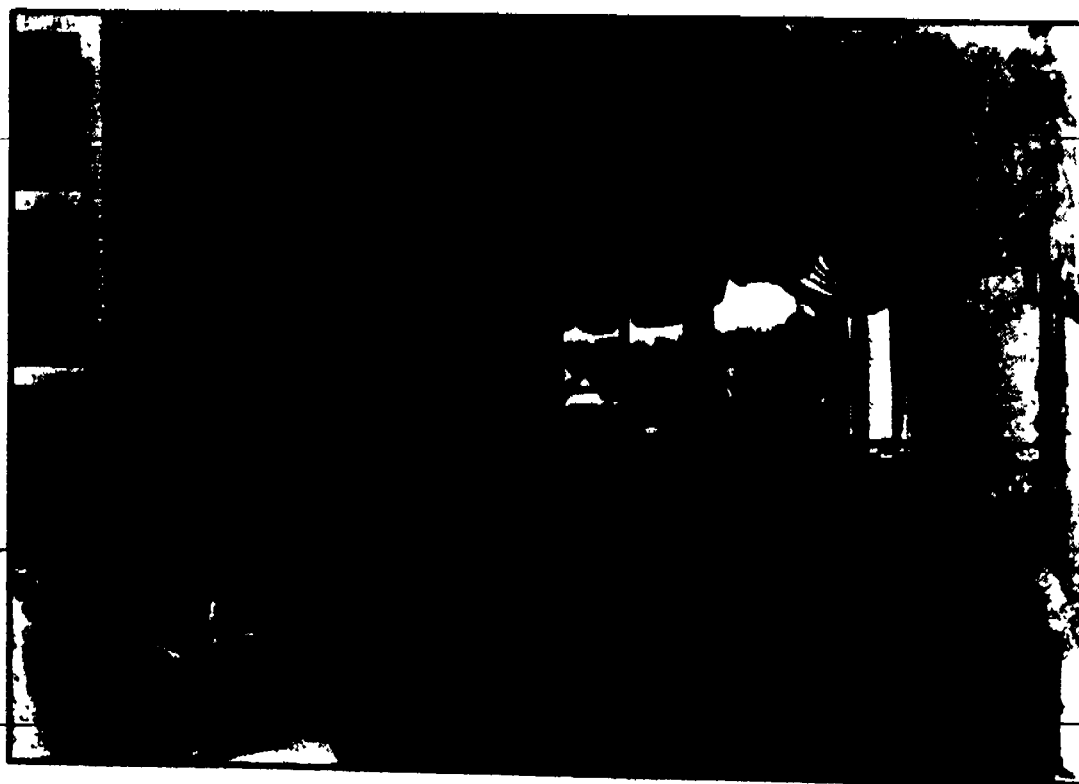

# Adult Communities

## Sharing a common bond is cornerstone

**I**n COLONIAL Acres adult community in South Lyon, Centaur Contractors Inc. have what they believe is the wave of the future for housing. We're going after the adult market," said Edward S. Tompkins, a partner with Jim Pelky, in Centaur. "People over 50 with no children, or children over 17. Part of what we're selling is the lifestyle - the community itself."

People at Colonial Acres share a common bond. They've moved out of houses they've lived in for 20 or 30 years. Some of them even lived in the same Livonia or Farmington Hills neighborhoods, or thereabouts, or worked at the same companies, but never had the time or the opportunity to develop any friendships.

"What we've found," said Tompkins, "is that they're rediscovering each other since moving there."

This well developed sense of community with neighbors looking out for one another has helped make the initial phase of Colonial Acres sell-outs. Pelky and Tompkins have already begun building more units at the \$100-million project in the Pontiac Trail - Ten Mile Road area.

COLONIAL NOW HAS ABOUT 600 units on 52 acres in phases one through four. Phase five will add another 500 units on 87 additional acres for a total of 1,100 with a projected completion date of 1993.

The acreage is wooded and has several man-made ponds that tapped into natural underground springs. One of the ponds will be stocked for fishing, and another will have a beach for swimming. There are two clubhouses, the newest one in phase 5 with a swimming pool. One and two bedroom units are attached in groups of six or eight. The newer units have lower level walk-out patios.

Enclosing a wood deck into a porch is one of the buyer's many options. It adds another 120 square feet to the overall 1,800 square feet of the unit. Base price for the walkouts is \$67,900.

TO SHOW WHAT OPTIONS are available, the model for phase 5 is loaded with options.

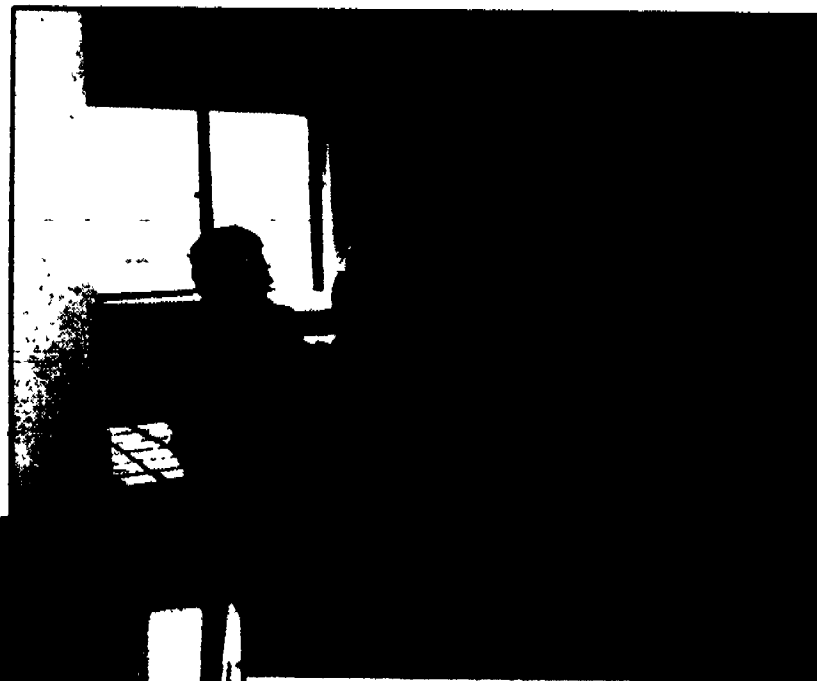
The units have California style walled courtyard entrances. A good-sized dining area is at the far end of the living room. The kitchens feature a breakfast bar pass-through to the living-dining room.

One of the standard features at Colonial Acres is hot water baseboard heating systems. "It's more expensive, but more effective," Tompkins said.

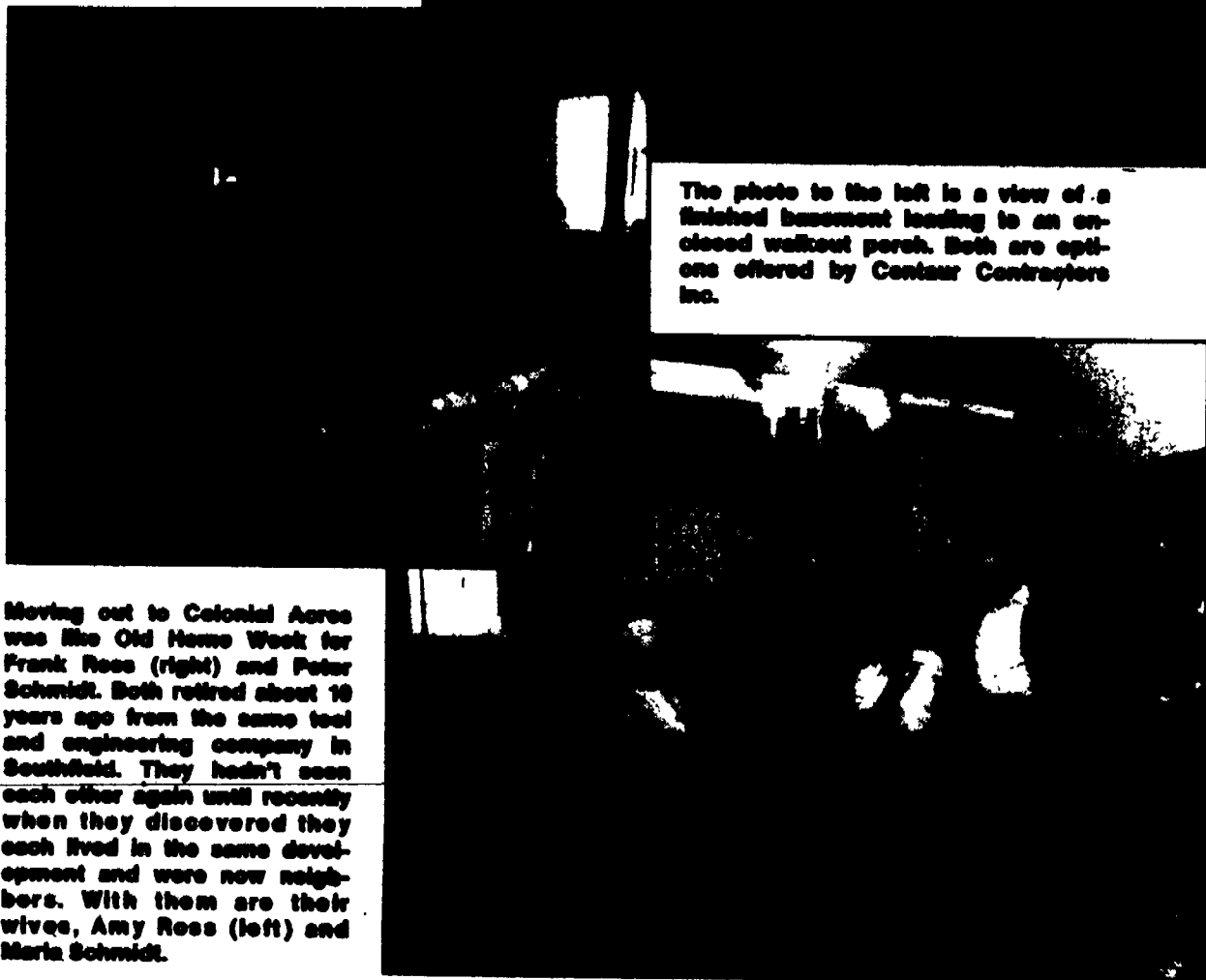
Centaur has an in-house service department to handle all maintenance problems. The fee at Colonial Acres is \$125 per month and includes insurance, boiler, hot water heater repair and/or replacement, land lease costs as well as snow removal, exterior painting, lawn and shrub care. "Unlike other developers, we don't leave the development when it's finished," Pelky said. "We're here and very accessible." For more information about the development, call 437-8193.

Kitchens in Colonial Acres have a breakfast bar pass-through to the living-dining room area. End units have windows, but inner units feature skylights to compensate for the lost window. Enjoying a coffee break is Roselle Webb, Gov. James Blanchard's mother, with her husband, Baxter. The couple have been residents since 1984.

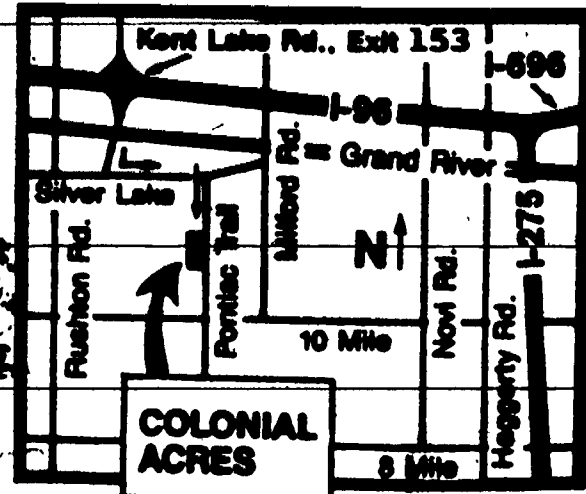
