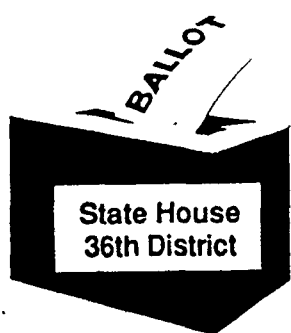
## Law, Stempien face off for state house seat

When local voters decide Nov. 8 who will represent the 36th district in the state House of Representatives, they face a classic choice in many area elections: between a Republican incumbent and a Democratic challenger.

Gerald Law, a Plymouth Township resident, has been the 36th district representative since his first election in 1982, holding off challenges in 1984 and 1986. His opponent this time is Northville Township resident Jeanne Stempien, an attorney and a trustee for Schoolcraft College.

In a recent joint interview, Stem-



pien charged that Law has not aggressively worked for new legisla-

tion, saying that she would bring a new creativity to the post. Law responded that he and the state Legislature have made good progress on issues affecting Northville.

The winner of the election gets the seat for a two-year term. The 36th District includes all of Northville Township, the City of Northville south of Baseline; all of the City and Township of Plymouth; and part of Canton Township.

This year's two candidates show some surface similarities: both hold law degrees, both are former teachers, both are married with two children. They hold similar positions on a few state issues, including sup-

port for the state bond issue ballot proposals, support for testing prison inmates for AIDS, keeping casinos out of Detroit, and the need for reform of public school financing.

There are substantive differences, though. They favor different ways of reforming school finance. Stempien supports Medicaid funding of abortions and Law does not. They suggest somewhat different approaches to the problems in the state prison and mental health systems.

Additionally, in the interview Law stressed his concern for issues directly impacting the district, while Stempien underlined the importance of statewide issues.

"What I am saying is: As a legislator I would be aggressive; I would be creative," Stempien said. "I haven't seen aggressiveness and creativity coming out of this particular district, addressing all of these issues, putting us out on the forefront as having leadership representative of the type of communities that we have."

Law answered: "I have tried to be specific and gone down the issues that affect the Northville community and what we've done. We've worked with them, we have had good results with the issues. You can always find some issues that people are not happy about."

"We've had a lot of success. We can do better in some instances, but we've done very well in a lot of them," he continued.

Stempien said that a Democrat in the state House of Representatives has a better chance to pass legislation because of her party's majority in that house, but Law disagreed.

"I would be a member of the majority party and I think that speaks a lot to the ability to get legislation passed when you are in the legislature," Stempien said.

But Law responded, "We (Republicans) have the majority in the senate and as we move legislation

## Downs planning big renovations

Northville Downs harness race track plans to undergo \$2 million in renovations over the next two to three years as part of a new lease agreement.

The planned work includes new concession stands in the grandstand; stadium seating to replace the folding chairs; and a completely enclosed paddock, Recording Secretary Margaret Zayti said Tuesday.

"Northville Downs has always tried to maintain itself, but there is just so much you can do with paint and cleaning. You've got to do some

revamping somewhere," she said.

Plans call for renovation of the entire grandstand and clubhouse area, including paving repair and a new rail to be installed before the beginning of the fall meet Oct. 17, Zayti said. The track will start the bulk of the work after the winter meet finishes next April.

In a public hearing on requested racing dates for 1989, Downs representative Ed Draugelis said the cost of the improvements — in addition to the large investment already made — is one reason a fall meet should be run at Northville.

## State tells tracks to settle differences

Northville Downs and the Jackson Harness Raceway have not yet agreed on a new lease, and they heard last week that they had better do so quickly, or one would suffer.

During a public hearing on allocation of race dates for 1989, state Racing Commissioner William Cahalan heard Jackson and Northville representatives explain the lease situation. And he then told them if they didn't settle their differences — and soon — one of the two would regret it.

Traditionally, Northville Downs leases the track from the private Northville Driving Club. The Downs then sub-leases the track to Jackson for a fall meet from October through December, and runs its own races at the track from January to April.

But the new 10-year lease between the Downs and the Driving Club raises the operational cost. The Downs and the Jackson Trotting Association are far apart on how much of the increase Jackson should absorb, and on whether Jackson should pay for a share of a \$2 million capital improvement program planned at the track.

In preparation for possibly not resolving the issues, Jackson applied to the state to hold its fall meet at either Northville Downs or at the Hazel Park Harness Raceway if negotiations fall through. In addition, Northville Downs requested the same fall dates for itself.

State Racing Commissioner William Cahalan is scheduled to announce the allocation of harness rac-

## Main Centre plan approved

The plan to develop the southwest corner of Main and Center streets downtown won a final site plan approval from the city Planning Commission Tuesday, although the OK included a list of conditions still to be met.

An officer of the development company — which had pushed for an approval by Sept. 30 because of an expiring option to buy the land — said the company can meet the conditions.

"We're not done coming before

you," Mike Kahm, Singh Development vice president, told the commissioners after the approval. "At least we know we've got a product that's acceptable to the city, and can proceed with that comfort."

The approved plan includes a row of stores on Main and Center streets, a restaurant on Cady, and three floors of luxury apartments. At ground level the building is set back from the Main Street sidewalk and abuts the old Winner's Circle building at ground level, but the upper floors are set back from the adjacent building and extend back out to

the sidewalk.

"What we're really saying is we have an arcade that wraps all the way around (Main and Center)," architect Al Tumaala said. "We're quite excited about the way that developed."

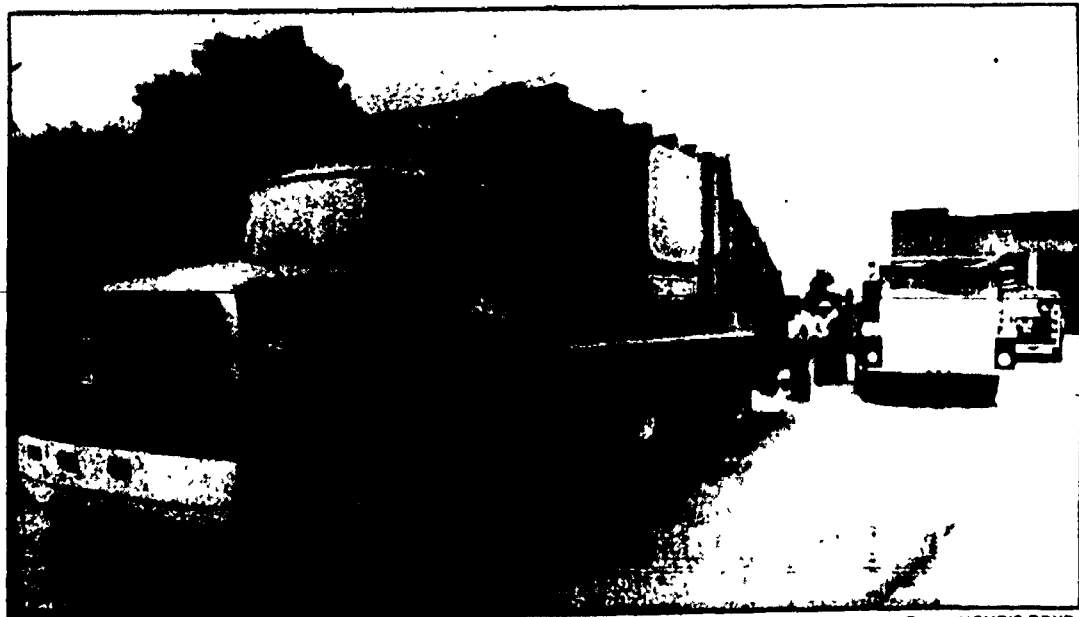
Commissioners said the latest version of the plan addresses many of their objections to earlier plans, including creating an undesirable "canyon" effect with a large building. But the OK included nine conditions yet to be met, some of which are major.

The commission approved the plan 5-3. Commissioner Chris Gazlay suggested reaffirming preliminary approval rather than awarding final approval. That move was suggested in a memo from Planning Consultant Don Wortman, who was not at the meeting because it had been moved and he had a schedule conflict.

The plan does not include the required parking, a subject the City Council is scheduled to discuss Monday. City Manager Steve Walters has suggested the city help finance new parking for the project. Resolution of parking between Singh and the City Council was one of the conditions placed on the approval.

Planning Commissioner David Toten said he felt nervous about approving a plan with "totally ephemeral parking arrangements ... I've been

## Acid starts small trash truck fire

A minor fire ignited in the hopper of a Browning-Ferris Industries (BFI) garbage truck Wednesday, Sept. 21, after workers apparently picked up a container of acid that had been put out with household trash.

BFI workers said the trash compartment of the truck began emitting smoke and a strange odor after trash pickups on Seven Mile, just west of Edenderry. They drove the truck to the Northville Township Fire Station No. 2 on Seven Mile, where a small fire was extinguished quickly.

The three workers who manned the truck said the smoky fire "look your breath away." The bottle of acid apparently broke, allowing its contents to mix with other substances in the truck's hopper, causing a small chemical reaction.

None of the three BFI workers was injured in the incident and the garbage truck sustained no damage.

One of the refuse handlers said they are instructed not to pick up liquids, but that it is often impossible to tell what the materials are in household trash.

## Township group organizes to support police millage

Citizens for Organized Police Service, (COPS) is the new Northville Township citizen's group organized in an effort to convince voters to pass the proposed two-mill increase for the police department this November.

Northville Township Treasurer Richard Henningsen recently announced the formation of the group, which will actively campaign in support of the millage. Henningsen said the group plans to raise about \$5,000 through a yet undetermined fundraiser.

COPS will employ the campaign consulting firm of Powers and Associates to decide how the money should be spent and how the campaign should be run, Henningsen said.

"This will be an intensive campaign in the next 30 days (before the Nov. 8 election) trying to enlighten residents of what we're trying to accomplish with the police millage," he said.

"It is important to let the people of Northville Township know why the millage is important, what their

dollar represents and what it will be spent for," he added.

Township Police Chief Ken Hardesty said he thinks that residents have a general idea of the accomplishments of the police department, but it is important to get out facts which are "behind the scenes."

"I think it is important to take all measures necessary to give a picture to citizens of what they're voting for," he added.

Hardesty said he and Henningsen are currently the only members of COPS, but the group hopes to attain a fairly large group of volunteers by

the time the campaign is finished.

Henningsen said the citizens group will play a key role in determining the success of the police millage because "this is a large millage and if we don't inform residents about it I don't think it will have much of a chance."

He noted that passage of the police millage is especially important because the police department currently cannot cover its own expenses.

"I've always felt that each group should cover their own expenses and we'll designate the millage to fund the police department," Henningsen

said.

Township Finance Director James Graham said the police department has been operating at a deficit over the past five years. The deficit has been covered by the township's general fund.

"As a board we all believe that we need the money to continue the excellent police service which we provide," Henningsen said.

Hardesty said he thinks the police department would have to make cuts in the near future, if a proposal of some sort is not passed.

"We need the millage increase

because the population is not big enough to support the police department (at the current millage rate), and we cannot continue drawing from the general fund," he added.

If any money from COPS is left over after the election it will be kept in a campaign fund for future millage elections in the township, according to Henningsen.

However, he said the group probably will not have any money left over because he intends to get the message out about the necessity of the police millage.

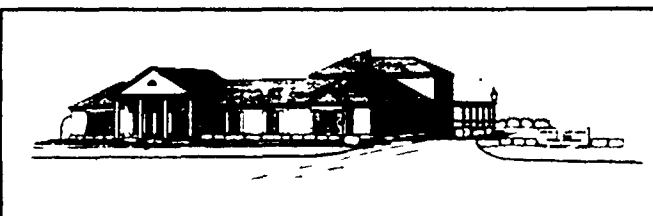

# New land

## Student learns America

Japanese exchange student Shizuka Horiuchi isn't exactly staying with "the typical American family." After all, not many families have four huge sheepdogs, nine cats, a 143-year-old home, and eight acres of sprawling countryside.

But she is getting an indication of what it's like to be American — the people, the schools, the music, the food, the shopping malls, games, and toys. A lifestyle that's distinct and unique, even though you might be able to look forever and not find a "typical" American.

Horiuchi, a petite 18-year-old, is staying with the Leland family of southern Novi. She is part of a worldwide 4-H student exchange program and a resident of Kawanschi, a suburb of Osaka.

She has been in the United States for slightly over two months. She'll go home after one year.

"It's just an excellent program," said Dorine Leland, her host and a local 4-H leader. "It's not like being a tourist. You learn about the people... and that's one of the most important parts of it."

Besides, what really is the "typical" American family anyway?

"I don't think there is such a thing as the 'typical' American family," said the elder Leland. "I don't know that there is a Donna Reed family out there anywhere."

"This is definitely country, but we live in a city," she continued.

Unfortunately, Shizuka doesn't yet have a firm grasp of the English language, but she's catching on very quickly. Through a steady, wide smile, she shows a slightly puzzled look over most words — but catches on very quickly with others. Like "shopping."

"Very big, very beautiful," she said, eyes wide, pointing with both hands, gesturing off in the general direction of Twelve Mile and Novi roads.

She has also had a chance to learn her way around from Dawn Leland, a senior at Northville High School.

Besides cooking, sewing, writing letters and playing with all the Leland animals — including a pig and chickens — shopping has become a particularly fond pastime.

The biggest problem thus far? What to do with all the free time.

Horiuchi is used to a rugged Japanese 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. school schedule. With that comes discipline, tough competition for grades, school uniforms etc.

It's nothing like what she's seen here.

"It's very expensive and very hard to get into college in Japan," Dorine Leland said, with Horiuchi nodding in approval.

For the Japanese student, college is viewed as a be-all, end-all. Few students get a shot at college, but those who do are almost assured of good opportunities with burgeoning Japanese industries.

For women, it's somewhat of a different story. The choices are limited. Teaching, nursing, or office work, is what most Japanese women aspire to.

Most women who do not go to college become secretaries, she said. Her goal is to go to college and later go on to teach grade school or high school.

"There just aren't as many doors open to them," Dorine Leland said.

### METAL INLAYS

The most popular material for filling cavities is amalgam often called a "silver" filling (actually a mixture of mercury, tin, copper, zinc and about 65-75% of silver powder). This material has proven successful for filling small and average sized cavities.

However, if the decay has ravaged a large section of the tooth, silver amalgam may not be up to the task. It does not always add strength to the tooth. In fact, it requires strong tooth structure to support it.

In the case of a large cavity or a fractured tooth cusp, a filling of metal casting may be in order. The gold casting restoration derives its effectiveness from its great

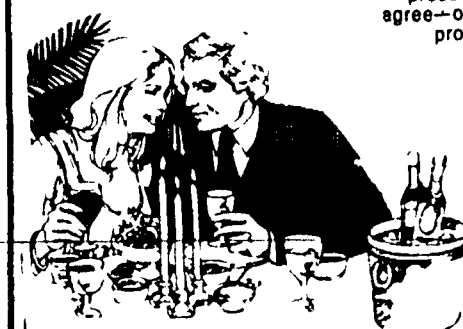
strength and resistance to breakage under chewing stress. Because of this property, the metal casting is used mainly to support weak tooth structure.

When casting for the filling, the casting from the dentist's lab will have a thin layer of gold inlays. This layer is much stronger than the amalgam filling.

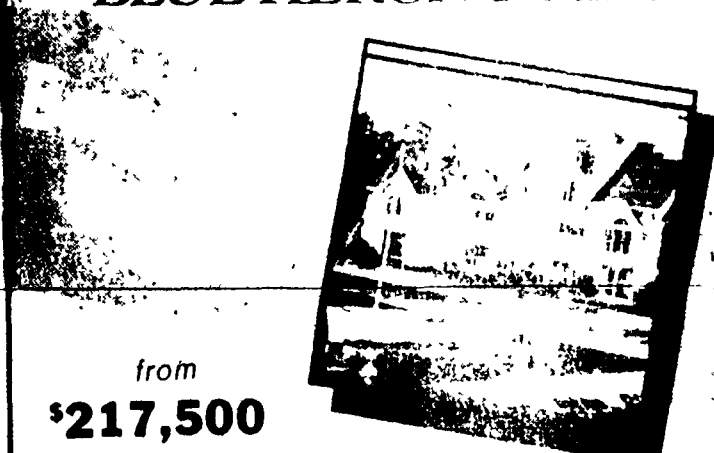

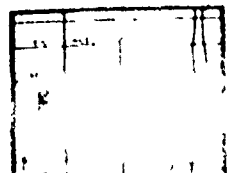

## Novi to study Eight Mile issues

NOVI - The City of Novi will attempt to initiate a new study of Eight Mile Road in an effort to determine current problems and get a clue as to what might be done to keep it fixed in the future.

Novi Community Development Director James Wahl said the city plans to approach Northville Township and Northville City officials, as well as the Oakland County and Wayne County road commissions "within the next week or two."

Novi also hopes to involve elected state officials.

The decision to study the road comes on the heels of a new Oakland County Road Commission priority listing which basically eliminated the road from consideration for further improvements. Novi had earmarked potential funds from the \$25 vehi-

cle registration fee question for Eight Mile improvements.

Oakland County voters will decide that question in the Nov. 8 general election. Funds from the vehicle registration fee basically go back to the local municipalities.

A recent road commission memo re-programmed most of the funds and eliminated Eight Mile from consideration. Cities are able to choose most of the priority items, unless the road commission recommends a different alternative.

Wahl said the study will take a look at conditions on Eight Mile as well as improvement possibilities. It is also expected to study what impact new or planned development might have on the roadway.

It is also expected to study traffic incidents on the strip. Wahl said.

uncomfortable all along with the approval of a project that doesn't have parking," he said. "We have effectively passed the buck to (the City Council) and I think that's very smart."

Another question raised concern of a not-yet-final swap between Singh and the city, trading 10 feet of Singh land on Main to the city for 10 feet of city land on Cady to Singh. The building plan has the upper floors of the building extending back over the 10 feet on Main.

Gazlay called that "a slap in the face" to the city, and resolution of the land swap was another condition in the approval. Kahm and Tuomaala said it was simply an effort to bring the pedestrian arcade around the building and expand a rooftop courtyard.

Other conditions in the approval

are:

- Review of a newly-submitted landscape plan by the city's engineers and planning consultants.
- Redesign a rear loading area to eliminate blind corridors and alleys.
- Submission of a lighting plan which satisfies the planning commission and city zoning requirements.

- Details of a streetscape/sidewalk plan to be reviewed.

- Enclosing a stairway on Cady in glass rather than brick.

- Remote placement of air conditioning units to avoid sound insulation in roof courtyards.

- Relocation of a Main Street entrance to the apartments.

The approval passed 5-3 with Gazlay, Don McCullough and Rotland Stapleton dissenting. Stapleton later said he liked the project, but voted against it because of a concern for the amount of housing stock in the community.

## New senior housing may be coming to area

Management officials at Novi Senior House announced this week that the local congregate-housing facility has merged with the American House Retirement Residences group.

The move may have significance to Northville residents since the partners in the merger have indicated they are looking at the possibility of developing an American House senior citizen congregate housing complex in the Northville area.

Alan Mendelsohn, owner of Novi Senior House, explained that the move will allow him to join forces with Robert Gillett, president of Bloomfield Hills-based American House Retirement Residences.

Mendelsohn said he and Gillett plan to pursue development of a senior housing facility in the Northville/Plymouth area in the near

future. He acknowledged that there is a demand for senior housing and said the Northville area is a logical location for a senior housing complex.

Mendelsohn said the merger won't negatively affect the staff or basic operation of the Novi Senior House, although the facility's name will change to "American House Novi."

Most changes to the Novi Senior House won't be implemented until Oct. 1, he added.

Likewise, the Livonia Senior House, also owned by Mendelsohn, will join the American House Retirement Residences group, bringing the number of senior housing projects included in the joint venture to 13.

"Bob (Gillett) and I feel we'll be able to develop and pursue new projects together and to maintain services at reasonable rates," Mendelsohn said about the merger. "We'll be sharing marketing and

joint venturing on new projects, sharing transportation and combining efforts on special projects," he added.

Mendelsohn noted that he was partners with Gillett when establishing some of his first senior complexes in 1981. The two men are currently developing a senior citizen residence in the Waterford/West Bloomfield area, with construction slated to begin in early 1989.

Two additional American House complexes are under construction in Pittsfield Township, near Ann Arbor, and in Sarasota, Florida.

Bob Moreillon, public relations coordinator for American House, said the Novi Senior House will soon gain the services of a full-time music director, just one example of the benefits now available through the merger. The director, Betty Houghton, plans to arrange programs and an orchestra composed entirely of seniors for all of the American House facilities.

## Township officials look at woodlands

Before giving final approval to the reworked woodlands ordinance, Northville Township board members and planning commissioners took a tour of the affected areas last Saturday.

Bob Leighton, consultant for Dun Rovin Golf Course, led the woodlands tour which began at Dun Rovin (located at 16377 Haggerty Road) and ended at the Wayne County Child Development Center off of Sheldon Road.

Riding golf carts along the edge of the Dun Rovin course, Leighton pointed out to township officials what trees will be protected by the woodlands ordinance.

Township Supervisor Georgina Goss said the woodlands tour gave her a feeling of what, in reality, the ordinance will address.

"When you're writing a woodlands ordinance how can you have an idea of the impact unless you see the impact?" Goss asked. "This tour gives the board an understanding of the woodlands ordinance."

Township Planning Director Carol Henry said she organized the tour, along with Planning Consultant Linda Lemke, to give commissioners an opportunity to get a feel for what the woodlands ordinance is all about.

"A lot of people think we're trying to save one tree, but this tour gives township officials an understanding that we're trying to save a whole system," she added.

At a recent woodlands study session conducted by the planning commission, Henry said the commission decided to make the woodlands provisions part of the existing site plan review regulations.

Henry said for developers, there will be no difference in having the woodlands provisions part of the site plan review as opposed to it being a separate ordinance.

Lemke said prior to building, developers must submit plans of their project to the planning commission and township board for approval. There are provisions they must adhere to and the woodlands amendment will become one of the many amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

She added by having the woodlands provisions as part of site plan review, the single-family homeowner and utility company would be exempt from its provisions.

Planning Commissioner Jerry Chisnell said the original woodlands ordinance was too restrictive and the new proposal looks much better.

He added that in developing a woodlands ordinance, the planning commission has looked at it as a trade-off. "We're trying to preserve the natural assets of Northville Township without prohibiting development."

Chisnell said the intention of the woodlands ordinance is to leave something for Northville Township's next generation.

"Some place along the line people must take responsibility for their actions or we won't have any woodlands left," Chisnell said, adding the proposed woodlands ordinance is a step in the right direction.

## Baseline businessmen ask for road repaving

While the City Council considered a proposal for spending about \$12,000 in road money Monday, several business people suggested an alternative project they expected to be finished by now — the repaving of Baseline Road.

Baseline is one of several city streets not yet paved under the city-wide street repair program approved with a special vote in 1986. The city voters approved a special bond issue to go toward repaving all the city-maintained streets which needed work.

Several officials from businesses along Baseline near Griswold attended Monday's meeting to ask that the road surplus money go to work on Baseline.

However, City Manager Steve Walters said Baseline will need about \$250,000 or \$300,000 for complete

rebuilding. "The price tag was simply much larger than we had anticipated to do the job right," Walters said.

Walters and Mayor Chris Johnson said Baseline will get some action — either a complete rebuilding, a simple resurfacing, or something in between — next year.

"It will be at least resurfaced. We wanted to find out if we can reconstruct it as well," Johnson said.

Needed work on Baseline includes excavation, changing grades and rebuilding the crown near Griswold, Walters said.

River, Hutton, Fairbrook and First streets have also been delayed for different reasons, but will be looked at next year, Walters said. Once Taft Road is rebuilt the city can see how much money is left and how extensive a job can be done on Baseline, he said.

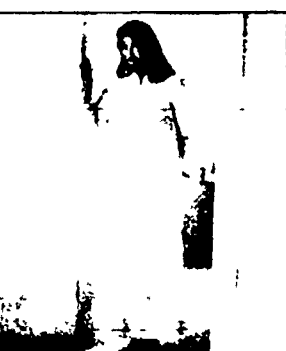

# Older racetracks oppose new dates

While officials from old, new and not-yet-existent horse racing tracks pushed for race dates from the state racing commissioner last week, some warned that additional allocations would jeopardize existing tracks.

Several officials said that although a shortage of patrons is a concern, especially in the metro-Detroit area, the bigger problem is a shortage of horses.

Representatives of not-yet-built, not-yet-licensed tracks in New Buffalo and Berrien Springs requested dates from the state next year, arguing in a public hearing at the Novi Hilton Thursday that their outstate locations would not detract from existing operations.

Similarly, Frank Marotta of the Sports Creek Raceway in Swartz Creek requested an additional allocation of dates, saying that two days a week of thoroughbred racing would end a "monopoly" of Ladbrooke DRC in Livonia without hurting that track's operation.

But officials of established harness race tracks in the area objected, saying any expansion of dates — standardbred (harness) or thoroughbred — would definitely hurt.

Herb Tyner of the Hazel Park Harness Raceway said Michigan should take a lesson from New York's Roosevelt Raceway, which has been in financial trouble.

"Roosevelt Raceway had simulcasting, Roosevelt Raceway was part of the largest off-track betting operation in America," Tyner said. "It was closing for one single reason: its market share had been so significantly decreased because of competition that it could

no longer compete.

"It's a lesson to learn," he said. "There's too much out there today, and an extension of it would be disastrous."

Jackson Trotting Association Vice President James Young echoed the worries. "(Sports Creek races) have affected Jackson at Northville and they've affected Northville Downs, to the tune of about 10 percent," he said.

"What concerns me the most is the proliferation of racetracks, especially in outstate Michigan," he said. "We're not talking about customers as much as we are racing stock. This is a very serious problem. My contention is there should not be more than two outstate tracks operating at the same time."

Northville Downs Lou Carlo also agreed. "There is an application in there for harness racing days for Mount Pleasant in the winter, and on the record I want to object to that for every reason you have heard before," he said. The Downs runs races during the winter.

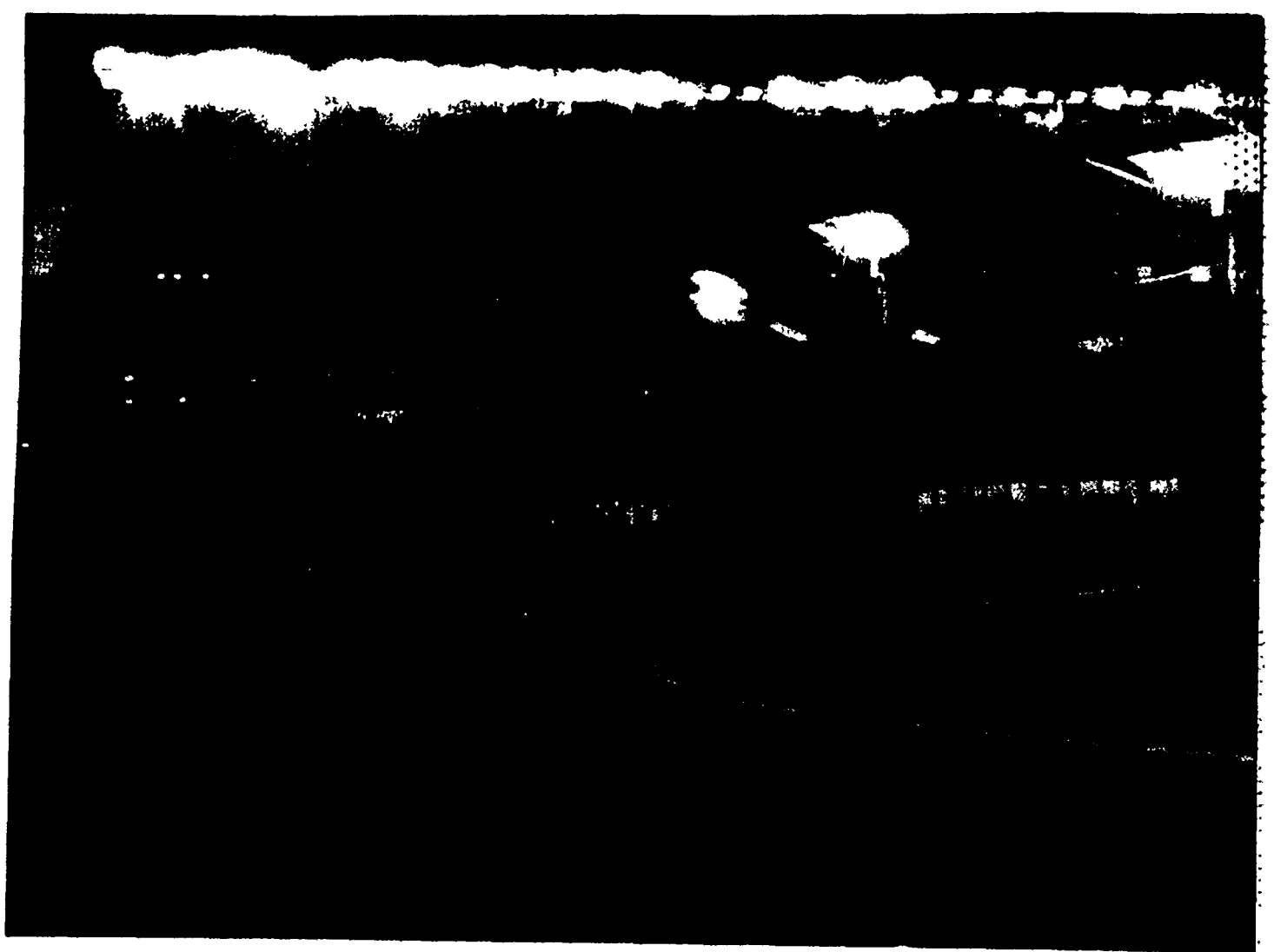
sublease negotiations fall through with the Jackson Harness Raceway (see related story).

"We need the total income we counted on the total income for 144 days when we contractually agreed to make the improvements," Draugelis said.

ing dates for 1989 by Oct. 15. Cahalan also faces requests for additional harness dates from other tracks including the Sports Creek Raceway near Flint.

During a public hearing on race dates at the Novi Hilton Thursday, Cahalan told Northville and Jackson officials they would be best off working out their differences by themselves.

"If you leave it up to me, one of you is going to have to suffer a great deal," Cahalan said. "One of you is really going to be in trouble. There's no way I can resolve this without making one of you suffer a great deal."

"Keep at it (the negotiations)," he concluded.

Jackson Trotting Association Vice

President James A. Young told Cahalan the group wants to run next year "an early winter meet in the metropolitan area," at first without specifying Northville or Hazel Park.

He later explained the lease situation. "We're presently negotiating with Northville Downs. We also have a verbal commitment with Mr. Tyner at Hazel Park," Young said. "I hope that this will be worked out in the near future."

Ed Draugelis, representing the Downs, explained the finances in detail.

"I'm hopeful that these negotiations will result in Jackson having a sub-lease at Northville Downs, but so far these negotiations have been futile," he said.

Lease costs raised by .25 percent plus \$150,000 in higher taxes will mean a cost increase of \$260,000 to

\$375,000, in addition to the cost of the planned improvements, he said. Jackson's most recent offer was for a rent increase of .125 percent plus \$50,000 for taxes, with no contribution to the improvements, he added.

"Jackson's investment at Northville Downs is zero. Absolute zero," Draugelis said.

He also mentioned the track's value to the community as a tax base. The track is by far the single biggest source of tax money for the city.

"The City of Northville itself has a major stake in keeping those dates at Northville Downs," Draugelis said.

Northville City Manager Steve Walters also spoke at the hearing in support of the fall racing at Northville, whether it be sponsored by Jackson or the Downs.

"It's very significant to us that

there is six months of racing," Walters said. The tax money allows for a larger police force than a typical community Northville's size could otherwise support, he said.

Losing a fall race meet at the track would drop the city's revenue from the track by about 40 percent, Walters said. "I think (having only the winter dates) would harm the long-run viability of Northville Downs as a facility," he added.

The Downs requested dates from Jan. 1 to April 1, 1989, its traditional meet; and also Oct. 16 to Dec. 30. The Jackson Trotting Association requested April 5 to July 2 and Aug. 22 to Oct. 14 at Jackson as well as Oct. 16 to Dec. 31 at Northville or Hazel Park. In all, 904 harness racing dates were requested for 1989.

This fall's Jackson at Northville race meet is scheduled to start Oct. 17.

## New official enjoys building

For most adults, playing with an erector set or building a soap box racer is a fond memory that has been safely tucked away for many years.

But for Northville Township Building Official Mick Kruszewski, these childhood activities have led him to a career in construction.

"My grandfather was a carpenter and I remember building things with him when I was young. I still enjoy building up to this day," Kruszewski said.

Kruszewski, who recently assumed the position of township building official replacing Troy Milligan who died last June, said he especially enjoys making sure that what is being built in the township is safe for occupancy.

"I review plans and inspect homes, making sure that construction in the township is sound and fire resistant," he added.

While inspecting both plans and homes, Kruszewski said he strictly adheres to the Building Official and Code Administrators (BOCA), national code regulations which are also recognized by the state of Michigan.

He added these regulations, which change every three years, are contained in a five-volume set and are more commonly referred to in the construction trade as "the bible for building officials."

"It is the law for building officials," Kruszewski said. "It's the same type of thing that traffic officials use, but they protect people on the streets and I protect them in their homes."

Township Supervisor Georgina Goss said Kruszewski has been able to answer every question that township officials have posed to him so far.

"It's amazing but he knows the BOCA codes backwards and forwards," she added.

Kruszewski said he plans to use the BOCA codes extensively in the future, as he is looking forward to a lot of controlled growth in the township.

"I came from Lincoln Park, which was overbuilt and the local government has lost control of the building," he said. "Coming from Lincoln Park I think I can help Northville Township keep control of their development."

"I took a look at the (Northville Township) master plan and from a

building standpoint it looks good because they're (the township board) trying to keep good control over development," he added.

Currently, a resident of Lincoln Park, Kruszewski said he spent 14 years with their local building department, the last four years in the structural inspector position.

Kruszewski said he is licensed by the state as a builder and building official and added he hopes to graduate soon from Henry Ford Community College with a degree in architectural design.

In addition to constructing things, he said he recently finished building a resort community near Jackson. He said he also enjoys golfing. "I really enjoy anything that will keep my hands busy."

Along with getting the building official job, Kruszewski said he found out the next day that his wife is pregnant with their first child. "I found out that I was going to be a building official on Monday and a dad on Tuesday."

Kruszewski said he hopes to move to Northville Township in the near future. "I very much want to move here," he said. "This seems like a good area to raise a family."

Kieb said the raffle drawing will be held on Oct. 14 and prizes include six hours of free limousine service.

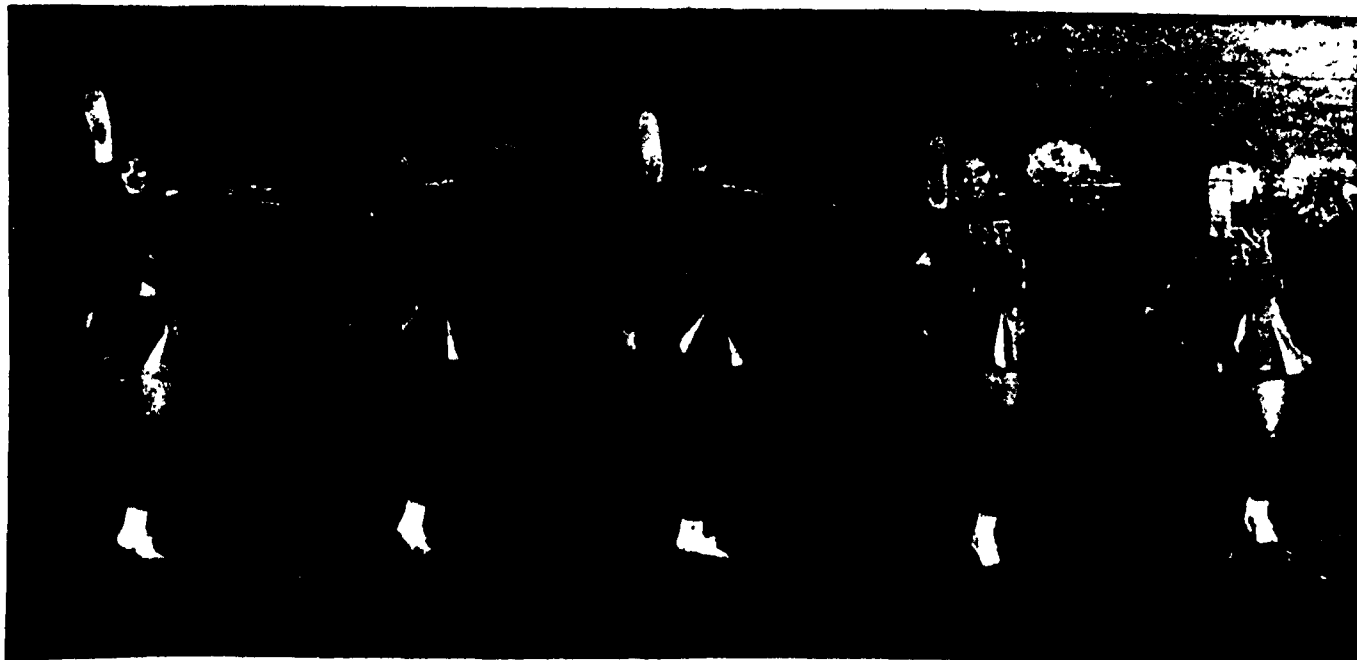
"Things are going quite well this year, but this always seems to be a special time of the year, what with all the enthusiasm shown by parents and students," Kieb said.

from one house to the other, it is a lot easier for a Republican to pass legislation through the Senate than a Democrat. You can cut it both ways."

Law said he feels it is especially important for a legislator to follow issues within municipalities. "I think they're probably equally important as some of the state issues we talk a lot about but very seldom ever legislatively get down to," he said.

"There aren't any real legal answers to a lot of these problems," Law said. "A great part of the job of state representative is dealing with the local communities. We do have a problem, because we do have prisons. We have a very aggressive

corrections department that would like to circumvent the law on the number of prisoners they can put there and other things that they do, and it's something we're very diligent of. It's an ongoing battle, a fairly nasty battle."

Law said other important state issues with great local impact are sewers and dealing with the Department of Natural Resources; making sure Wayne County takes action on the land it owns in Northville Township; and continued pursuit of revenue-sharing money.

"The state has the great laws ... but doesn't want to live up to them. It took us two years of constant battle just to collect on one year of additional revenue sharing for the township; now we have to gear up

and go back to battle in the next budget, next year, to continue that revenue sharing which the township and other communities rightfully are entitled to," he said.

Stempien said a legislator must recognize the impact of the statewide issues on individual communities.

"There are many many issues," she said. "We're looking at Northville, the township, Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Canton. There are some common thread items that are of importance to the entire district."

"I believe that the education issue is one," she said. "It's right here in our back yard. The environmental issue is right in our back yard. We have the Rouge tributaries; we have people over at Lakes of Northville wonder-

ing what's going on with their common ground around the lake out there."

She continued, "(These issues) may be global because, yes, they're common to many areas; but they're right here in our own back yard and we have to address them."

Stempien concluded: "We have a very well educated, motivated group of citizens living in these areas, I believe. I think they deserve a representation that is equally aggressive, equally creative for these items that are in our district as well as global ... The roads still are in need. We talk about how we want to change the formula; well, where is the legislation, where is the creativity about helping to bring about that?"



**Gerald Law, Republican.** Law, 43, is seeking his fourth consecutive term in the Michigan House of Representatives. Serving since 1982, he serves on the state affairs, judiciary, insurance, and public health committees. Before being elected to the Legislature, he was a Plymouth Township trustee for four years. He has worked as a financial analyst for Ford Motor Company and as a teacher. He holds an M.A. in business administration from the University of Detroit and a J.D. from Wayne State University Law School. Law is a member of the Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis, Knights of Columbus, Plymouth Historical Society, the Trailwood Homeowners Association and Our Lady of Good Counsel Parish. He lives in Plymouth Township. He is married and has two daughters.



**Jeanne Stempien, Democrat.** Stempien, 42, is seeking her first state office. She has been a trustee of Schoolcraft College since being appointed to fill a vacancy in 1986; she won re-election last year. She has served as a delegate to SEM-COG and as a Democratic precinct delegate. Stempien is a partner in the law firm Stempien & Stempien of Livonia. She has also worked as a teacher, and at Titor Insurance, Livonia Court Reporting and Livonia Towing. She holds a B.A. from the University of Michigan and a J.D. from the Detroit College of Law. Stempien is a member of several bar associations, the Chamber of Commerce, the University of Michigan Alumni Association, Northville Business and Professional Women's Club, the National Organization for Women and Our Lady of Victory Church. She lives in Northville Township. She is married and has one daughter and one son.

## Candidates answer issue questions

These questions were asked of Rep. Gerald Law and challenger Jeanne Stempien in a recent interview. Responses were edited for brevity and clarity.

### • Why are you best for the job?

**Law:** I enjoy serving in state government. By background, I was a teacher. I worked at a major bank in Detroit and at Ford Motor Company. I got started years ago and was on the planning commission and was a trustee in a local township. And I've spent the last six years in state government. With my background in education, business and in local government, I've found that my experience at work and an educational background has been more suited to serving my constituents in the state government.

**Stempien:** I think I have the background and skills developed. I, too, was once a teacher. I'm an attorney; I do a lot of trial litigation. I know how to be an advocate. Often times, being an advocate in a trial situation requires quick thinking, creative thinking, problem solving on the spot. I think that through my life experiences, my maturity, and the fact that I have children ... that I can contribute a great deal to the area by being creative and aggressive in bringing about legislation.

• Are you in favor of the environmental bond issue proposals on the state ballot?

**Stempien:** Yes, I am. I think that even if it had to go through a bond issue, it's an investment that we have

to start making. We probably should have started a little earlier, but we must start now. We must maintain; we must clean up what already exists.

**Law:** The environmental bond issue is a little misleading. We started out, some time ago, with an \$800 million environmental bond issue, primarily for toxic waste cleanup, some of the 700 sites we have in the state. What you're going to end up with is something considerably less than that, even though it is some money.

It will be separated into two bond issues, one for the environment and one for recreation. So you're down to \$660 (million), of which ... about \$425 goes for toxic waste environmental cleanup, which is our biggest, immediate, most pressing problem.

The way it all ended up to be structured isn't going to do nearly what it was promised to do. We have been spending \$12 million a year in the budget for environmental cleanup. That was cut by 40 percent in the last budget to \$7 million.

It's our understanding that if the bond issue passes, there will no longer be any general fund help for environmental cleanup. So it means we're going to lose the \$12 million a year that we have been spending in the last few years for environmental cleanup. You take that over the 20-year life of the bond issue. You can see that we're going to lose, from state help, from our general fund, over \$200 million.

So you're left with the \$425 (million), subtract from that the \$40 million in administrative costs, subtract from that what the state has

been putting in ... and you're left with, at best, a \$200 million program for toxic waste cleanup in a 20-year period.

So it's really not a substantial amount of money. We could have achieved that same level by increasing our state-supported help by \$10 million out of our multi-billion-dollar budget.

We're going to end up paying that \$800 million about \$1.7 billion in principal and interest over 20 years.

You might say, well, why should you support it? It's better than nothing. It really isn't that great, but without any other alternatives — and this is the program that was argued and negotiated for some months between the governor and the legislature — it's better than doing nothing. We could have done a lot better.

• Are you in favor of Medicaid funding for abortions?

**Law:** I support the ballot proposal (which would eliminate most Medicaid-funded abortions).

With myself, it doesn't deal with the dollars and cents that are involved. I have a real problem with abortion in general, and this particular issue ... becomes one of personal belief and conscience after a while, and what you feel about the particular topic. We've had such an argument and polarization within the Legislature that we end up with a ballot proposal at this point.

I have a serious problem with abortion, period, let alone the Medicaid funding, which is this particular item. The Supreme Court ruled that states have no duty to fund abortion.

It do, 36 don't. We are at the point where we are determining a budgetary item under the constitutional guidelines of the U.S. Supreme Court.

It really comes down to individual choices by individual legislators and individual voters on exactly how they feel.

**Stempien:** I think that saying that it's personal is precisely my point of view. I don't support banning the availability of abortions because it's done through Medicaid.

However, it is a personal decision, and if that decision belongs solely with that particular woman, based on her beliefs, her personal feelings, it is her decision to make. It is not for me to dictate my personal views on the matter to someone else whose views may be entirely different, and I think there is a lot of room for differences of opinion on this issue. Being as important as it is, I don't believe I should impose my personal feelings or anyone should impose their personal feelings on someone else.

I would be against the ballot proposal. I think when you take a position it should be consistent for all strata of society. I think that it's a personal decision of the woman, and that's where it belongs, and the Legislature should not be involved in it.

• We've seen the working of the higher speed limit on some rural highways for some time now. Are you in favor of the 65-mile-an-hour speed limits? Should they be increased, scaled back, or eliminated?

**Stempien:** I am in favor of the 65-

mile-an-hour speed limit in rural areas. I do a tremendous amount of work with the Michigan Department of Transportation and their engineers and I am familiar with how speed limits are set. Quite frankly speaking, to the point of a maximum they are set by the 85th percentile of drivers.

For a number of years you had drivers ignoring the 55-mile-an-hour speed limit, and that in turn creates a lackadaisical attitude toward the regulatory signs on the highway. When you bring the driving speed within that group of people that basically are law abiding but driving their car at a particular speed, then you are forced to obey regulatory signs on the highway.

Eighty-fifth percentile is the measure all departments of transportation — U.S. and all states — use to determine what a proper speed limit should be on any state trunkline. You clock it and see where 85 percent of the drivers are driving.

Sixty-five is where drivers are doing their best. When you have a regulation that people will find reasonable, and comfortable, and obey, I think that it's best for the roadway and the safety of the drivers on that roadway.

In the urban areas, (55) makes sense, because of the traffic volume and the congestion.

**Law:** I supported the change. Of course, we used to drive 65, 70, until the oil embargo and energy saving. The federal government forced the states, basically, to go to 55, which was somewhat ridiculous, especially in the western states.

The biggest problem we as legislators have with the federal government is we wish they would allow us to set our own guidelines. Right now, the federal government came up with a real hodgepodge system of what's rural, what's urban

I think it creates a mass confusion.

This 55-65 changing in many areas creates a lot of confusion. The drivers don't slow down. I wish the federal government would allow much more authority to set those speed limits at the state level. They're much better adapted to do it, depending on their own history and monitoring.

The biggest problem we have with speed limits is really a difficulty with the state police on many of the highways: the ability to enforce. We find that accidents really happen when people are going much faster or much slower than what the prevailing traffic is.

The issue of overcrowded state prisons is possibly a greater concern to people in this district than elsewhere in the state, because we have three in our backyard. Is there a permanent solution to the issue, and if so, what is it?

**Law:** We're overcrowded by 3,000 prisoners as of today. I don't think there's any immediate short-run view of building more prisons, which is very expensive, over \$700 million in capital outlay alone to build the new prisons that are on line right now.

The capital outlay is only 10 percent of the cost; the other 90 percent is the operational cost. What's going to happen to the corrections budget as time goes on is it's going to be increased tremendously, which is lost resources to other parts of the budget.

We have the problem now where we do not have the early release program now, which had its problems ... so according to the Department of Corrections in their testimony (in a recent court case on overcrowding at local prisons) that act alone has created a tremendous amount of increased numbers of people into the system. Whether you like early release or not, it was a safety valve used. I don't support the program.

People want longer and stiffer sentences for criminals, and the Legislature has reacted by basically getting into and passing laws that make these things happen. Judges are cooperating and dealing out longer sentences. Paroles are not as

easy to get. And therefore, you have an overcrowding situation that's going to exist for a long time in the state of Michigan.

The only thing that's ever going to lower the number of individuals in prison is really dealing with these individuals at a very young age in the education process. The standard profile is that over 90 percent of males who are in the corrections system have no skills. Over 90 percent have never graduated from high school. You're dealing with a group of people who are really not equipped in any form or manner to work in society at a productive job. There really is no avenue and they probably got into crime because of it.

So it's probably going to be best for the state ... to hopefully deal with kids at risk at a very young age, preschool age, and try and get them motivated within the system ... to be a responsible citizen when they grow up.

I don't really see an immediate, short-term solution, other than starting with the very, very young now. (For) those caught in the system, rehabilitation has not been very successful. With the state and the monitoring of the people who return to prison, we have almost lost a generation who have got into an "element of crime."

**Stempien:** With respect to capital outlay, I don't think there's any question, if you're going to put people in jail for crimes committed, you have to have some place to put them. Now, the capital outlay will come to an end, by its nature; then you have the operational aspect of it.

As long as someone is going to jail, that's going to happen. The idea is to keep them out of jail in the first place. Of course, that deals with getting them earlier. I don't have any argument with that.

It is education, but it is also economics, job support, job training. One of the things I have seen cut back as a Schoolcraft trustee ... is support from the Department of Corrections and from the Legislature for the community colleges to go into the prison system and offer courses and offer training to inmates. I don't think that we can afford to cut those back. The community college, the universities can't take it on by themselves. It's too much of a drain on the budget for

the many other items they have to provide, but that's one area the state could help with. That's one area the Legislature can go in and do some creative legislation.

There are people who can benefit. I'm not saying this is a panacea. I've had clients myself that were rehabilitated, at least to the best of my knowledge. So I don't want to give up on those people that are already in prison ... But of course, keep them out in the first place.

• Do you favor testing prison inmates for AIDS?

**Stempien:** I don't know if it's to the point of an epidemic in the prison system at this time, but (testing) is going to eventually become necessary in order to control the disease.

What you have is housing of a group of people in a controlled environment where there is going to be sexual activity. That's a reality. It's there. And supplying the proper precautions so that it does not spread is essential.

The disease is absolutely devastating. We must contain it. We must do everything available for containment, and ... that's going to include some type of testing. But I'm very leery of testing and then just having some public record of an individual having contracted some type of positive test. Because testing in many cases is inaccurate. There are limits to going around broadcasting who has a certain disease.

I think that that individual also should have available alternative testing.

There are balances that have to be worked out: the privacy versus the greater good. In the prison system I think you do have the loss of some individual rights.

In that controlled environment I would like to see education about AIDS and of course the availability of condoms and that type of thing to prevent the spread of the disease.

**Law:** I've supported testing in correctional facilities. We argue a couple of points: whether you should test everybody in the system or test those that we call "high-risk" inmates.

A profile of the average male prisoner is ... over 50 percent are there because of drug use. In the

Michigan area, our primary way of transmitting AIDS is through needle-sharing; obviously, drug use. It's not as large a homosexual population as some other states.

When you get somebody in the correctional facility, they're obviously ... not a responsible individual in society.

We are getting a lot of pressure and have a lot of sympathy for all the employees who work in the corrections system. They're dealing with thousands of people who are very irresponsible and they want to know ... how to deal with them, and they would like to know who they are.

So I think we have to treat (inmates) a little differently. We may not be able to afford them the confidentiality — due to the nature of who they are and the setting they are in — if you're going to protect other prisoners, because we do have a high instance of homosexuality in prisons.

On the other side of it (is) protecting the general public, as the corrections commission in Georgia has done. They want to know who has AIDS and is eligible for parole. They want to monitor them in their parole status in the general public. They want to see what they're doing and just how they're conducting their life. Because they are an AIDS carrier who has shown a great tendency to be very irresponsible in their past behavior.

• The mental health system in the state continues to come under fire. Are there actions the state Legislature could take to address the problems in the mental health system, and if so, what?

**Law:** Well, we're trying to accredit all of our mental health hospitals.

Northville is not. Of course, the federal guidelines look at your patient-to-service relationship.

We have a good mental health department. Tom Watkins is very up-front about the problems. The problem that he has explained ... is if you want to improve patient care you have to have in the system, you are going to have to downsize hospitals the size of Northville. They are apparently unmanageable at 800 or 900 or 1,000 patients.

They just cannot provide the care or the proper management, nor can they have any real control over the number of individuals that are there and the passes that are released. And the walkway problem that we've had, traditionally, over the years there.

They oppose, as they have for many years, any type of massive fencing around the hospitals. In Kalamazoo and other areas, they have smaller hospitals right in residential areas, which work out very fine. The community accepts them and they don't have major problems.

Until you can get the better patient care and better staffing ratios — which you only get with small hospitals — you really won't improve on Northville's situation.

A better public acceptance will help. We are in the process of instituting that type of program.

We have a system of licensing which is archaic.

We have no cooperation outside the mental health hospitals, in the delivery system. Until we change that in the state constitution, we couldn't change it.

**Stempien:** What could the Legislature do? Well, obviously,

what everyone wants: some more money for them. That's not necessarily going to do what you want, anyway, because a lot of it has to do with the quality of care.

That is money, though. How many people can ... the individual doctor see in one given week? That is a severe problem.

If we could, perhaps, put our heads together and think of alternatives — I firmly believe the state has a responsibility to take care of its citizens that have severe mental health problems.

I've been in a number of state institutions; I've been in Northville a number of times; I've represented some of those people a number of times in their commitment hearings and re-hearings and other reasons. There are people who may have been in a job that was in a low-paying, non-health-care-providing job, that when it comes time to get mental health services, there is nowhere to look but to the state. I think it's time to factor that out to the private area somehow. I don't have specifics for you here today, but I would like to see some basic insurance for people that would include some mental health coverage.

If we could have that type of thing, we could perhaps look at having them placed in some other private facilities, rather than burden down the small number of hospitals that we have.

I think mental health is becoming a growing problem, not a lessening problem.

• We've heard a lot of discussion about school finance reform. Do you favor reform of the system, and if so, what direction would you head in?

## DNR looks into pond pollution

According to Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) officials, residents who live in the Quail Ridge subdivision near Eight Mile Road don't have to worry about the water quality in their streams and ponds — for now.

DNR environmental quality analyst Tim Jaski, said subdivision residents contacted the DNR after they noticed that water in a pond near Quail Ridge turned a dark color.

He added that residents also reported a bad smell was being given off from the pond and fish were in distress and dying.

"We're investigating the situation and currently believe the discharge to be from a storm sewer drain," Jaski said, adding the DNR is investigating the incident, but as of yet does not know who caused the contamination.

He noted the contamination of the Quail Ridge pond, which occurred

last Thursday, was corrected by the heavy amount of rain which fell Thursday night.

"The rain washed away whatever stuff was in the pond," Jaski said, adding he does not yet have a clear knowledge of what contaminated the pond.

Quail Ridge resident Nick Doinidis said he reported the contamination after he was told by his daughter that the pond water was black.

"The water in the pond looked like ink and it has never looked like that," Doinidis said. "I went down to the lake and it smelled like asphalt paving or rubber."

He said the heavy rain Thursday night made the water muddy, which is a normal occurrence, and since then the pond has been getting clearer and less muddy.

Jaski said the contaminated water stayed pretty much in the pond and there is not much chance of it getting into the groundwater. Quail Ridge residents use city water.

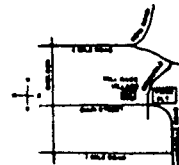

## Board OKs teacher contract

The Northville Board of Education unanimously approved an agreement with the Northville Education Association, Monday, concerning preparation time and assignments of elementary school teachers.

Assistant Superintendent Burton Knighton said the contract between the district and the teachers, which runs from 1988-91, contains a reopener for discussion about elementary school working conditions.

Knighton said the contract reopener was included to give the district's teacher/administrator committee time to complete its work on alternatives for improving preparation/planning time at the elementary school level.

In the new agreement, which the NEA unanimously approved at its Sept. 14 meeting, elementary school teachers will have a minimum of 170

minutes of preparation time per week and one collegial planning period of at least 40 minutes per week.

In the original agreement, the elementary teachers had 180 minutes of preparation time per week. Knighton said the teachers felt the 170 minutes of planning time was adequate for the elementary school level.

In addition to the preparation time change, the district agreed to name a total of six elementary grade level chairpersons per K-5 building and an additional five district wide chairpersons representing art, music, physical education, media, and special education.

Knighton said the chairpersons will supervise the collegial planning program which is being introduced into the elementary school level this year. Knighton said the collegial planning time will give elementary

teachers in the same grade level an opportunity to get together and discuss programs and techniques.

"We've run this program at the high school and middle school level and it has worked extremely well, so well that we're expanding the concept to the elementary school level," he added.

Knighton said the collegial planning chairpersons will be responsible for conducting meetings, putting together agendas and doing follow-up work.

He noted each chairperson will receive a \$500 per year stipend for the added service.

Knighton said he felt very good about the items that have been worked into the collective bargaining agreement.

"I'm very positive (about the agreement) because in a sense we've now built in time for teachers to work together to solve problems which occur in each grade level," he added.

## Asbestos examined

Although school district officials said there is no danger, the Northville Board of Education granted a deferral request for asbestos testing until May 9, 1989.

Assistant Superintendent Burton Knighton said the extra time is needed to give the schools an opportunity to complete and analyze asbestos testing.

Knighton said the district is close to completing the testing necessary to comply with the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) 1986 Asbestos Hazardous Emergency Response Act.

He added Northville schools complied with the 1980 Asbestos School Hazard Act, which required schools to make only visual checks of school buildings.

"There were many guidelines to the 1980 Act but they were not clear," Knighton said, adding the district hired Bens Engineering to find and correct any asbestos problems.

"They (Bens Engineering) found some areas of concern in all schools buildings except Silver Springs and Winchester," he noted. "All of the

problems were identified and the exposed asbestos was encapsulated."

Knighton said about \$94,000 has spent by the district since 1984 to deal with asbestos problems.

He added that in Nov. 1987 the district was notified of the new asbestos act and the compliance deadline of Oct. 12, 1988.

Knighton said the extended time will be used to check areas which have had only one sample taken. "There have been no surprises in our testing and it would appear that we are in good shape."

Northville schools contracted with PTM Consulting in March of 1988 to provide an asbestos inspection and management plan. Knighton said the district is paying PTM \$24 per asbestos sample and added the consulting firm has taken about 295 samples.

Paul Milhizer, of PTM Consulting, said although the deferral date is May 9, 1989, "we anticipate being done much earlier than that."

Knighton said after the inspections have been completed, the district will continue to monitor the asbestos situation by conducting in-house inspections every six months.

SYNOPSISTUESDAY,

The regular meeting of the Northville City Council was called to order in the Council room by Mayor Johnson at 8:00 p.m.

## 1. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

Present: Ayers, Buckland, Folino, Johnson, Mittman  
Absent: None

Also Present: Anderson, Cannon, Hopp, Konrad, O'Neil, Walters, Warner

## 3. APPROVAL OF COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES:

The minutes of the regular meeting of August 15, 1988, were approved as corrected.

## 4. CITIZEN COMMENTS:

Tom Walsh, 820 Potomac, stated he is opposed to adding sidewalks to his property after he has been there a couple years and has landscaped the property without planning for sidewalks.

## 5. ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA &amp; APPROVAL OF THE CONSENT AGENDA:

Moved, supported, carried, to adopt the agenda as amended and the consent agenda A through Q.

## 8. ENGINEERING REPORTS:

A. Taft Road Berm.

Manager Walters reviewed the engineer's memo of 8/31/88, stating the area would only allow a berm height of 2 to 3 feet at a cost of \$33,500.00.

Bob Warner, engineer, stated Taft Road resurfacing would start in a couple of weeks. He felt that a berm to be effective should be six feet and that the combination of the asphalt surface and the restriction in Novi of "No Thru Trucks" would greatly reduce the noise problem. If it did not, they would look into a shrubbery type screen.

Mayor Johnson Ayers asked that the legality of public spending on private property be researched.

## B. Beal Street Bridge

Manager Walters reviewed the engineer's report of 9/2/88. A temporary bridge would cost \$75,000.00 to rent for one year vs. \$70,000.00 as an estimated cost of repairing the bridge. The Manager recommended postponing the bridge repair until Federal/State funds are available in 1989. The south lane of the bridge can be used and would be feasible as a one lane bridge.

Mayor Johnson requested that grant funds be applied for as soon as possible with a formal application.

## 7. OAKLAND COUNTY RE SURPLUS ROAD FUNDS:

Manager Walters reviewed the Oakland County Board Road Appropriation of \$11,955.00, which needs to be allocated by December 11, 1988. He recommended Council defer action until the next meeting when the traffic study will be on the agenda. Notice could then be sent to the County by the end of September.

## 3A. POLICE CAR PURCHASE:

Moved, supported, carried, that Councilman Mittman abstain from voting on the new car for the Police Department.

Moved, supported, carried, to purchase a new police car through the Oakland County Cooperative Purchase Program from Dick Morris Chevrolet for \$12,774.19.

## B. 1988 RECREATION BUDGET:

City Manager stated the 1988 Recreation Budget approval deadline was the 1st of November. City Council's responsibility now is to raise questions for the Township to cover at their hearing. The Council would then adopt the same budget at their budget hearing in the Spring.

Mayor Johnson accepted the Recreation Director's reports and requested Council contact John if they have any questions.

## 3. 1988 COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT APPROVAL:

The three study proposals for the Master Plan Revision, Ford Plant Redevelopment and Cady Corridor Development Plan were bid higher than expected. Manager Walters advised that additional funds would have to be allocated and delay other projects such as the proposed elevator at City Hall.

Further discussion of this item was tabled until September 19.

## 3. PROPERTY EXCHANGE FOR MAIN AND CENTER PROJECT:

Manager Walters expressed a desire for more open space on Main Street to create a pedestrian plaza. This is not required of the developer and they were reluctant to give up retail space, but they are willing to cooperate with the City to provide a setback in exchange for City property on the south side of the project.

The Mayor and City Council endorsed this concept in principle, subject to the final site plan approval by the Planning Commission and that the legal process be resolved to make the exchange of property.

## 11. PROPERTY MAINTENANCE ORDINANCE:

Manager Walters reviewed the second draft of the proposed ordinance with 6 changes. The City Manager requested Council review the contents of the Property Maintenance Ordinance and give their comments to him for the next meeting on September 19, at which time a hearing will be called for a regular meeting in October. He will forward their comments to the City Attorney for his review for the 19th also.

## 12. PURCHASING ORDINANCE:

Manager Walters proposed an Amendment to the Purchasing Ordinance to increase the dollar limits on purchases for sealed bids. The proposal is not to eliminate City Council approval, but rather to require formal quotations from \$1,001 to \$5,000 and sealed bids over \$5,000 with City Council approval.

Mayor and Council requested the City Manager to prepare a draft purchasing ordinance amendment for their consideration on September 19 as proposed by his memo of 8/31/88.

## 13. EIGHT MILE TRAFFIC AND SCHOOL CROSSING:

Councilman Buckland asked when the last speed check on Eight Mile Road west of Taft Road was done. Chief Cannon stated they are monitoring and enforcing the speed limit, but they have not conducted a formal speed check. If a county study shows the majority of traffic traveling at a higher rate of speed than posted, they would be likely to raise the limit. We can protest but cannot control county roads.

Mayor Pro-Tem Ayers questioned Chief Cannon about the yellow flashing light around the school sign. Chief Cannon stated this could be done but without a reduction in the speed limit. He does not have any cost estimates at this time and he has talked to Superintendent Bell and Dr. Knighton.

Mayor Johnson stated this will be discussed with the School Board along with the traffic study.

Councilman Buckland requested a speed check west of Taft Road.

## 14. COUNCIL COMMENTS:

Mayor Pro-Tem Ayers asked the Mayor to write a letter to Detroit Edison inquiring as to the reason for Northville's peculiar power outages, expressing concern and possible improvements.

Councilman Folino asked for an update on the street repair program. Manager Walters responded as follows: Center Street, delay due to cost and lane width, Fairbrook & First have been deferred because of the sewer needing repair, Hutton Street deferred because of water main replacement, Baseline & River are delayed because of drainage, grade changes and money cost.

and East Dunlap because of major changes in the street.

Councilman Folino requested approval of bids on the main agenda.

Councilman Folino asked how the committee to review the study proposals was selected. He wants to be informed of all committee selections and feels this should be a City Council function.

There being no further business to come before City Council, Mayor Johnson adjourned the regular meeting at 10:05 p.m.

## Our Opinion

### Questions need answers before acting on parking

It almost seemed like everyone connected with the City of Northville heaved a collective sigh of relief Tuesday night as the Planning Commission awarded final — but conditional — site plan approval to Singh Development's Main Centre project.

The project, if eventually built, will undeniably benefit the entire community. From all accounts it will look fine, make downtown Northville more of an attraction for visitors, give a lot of tax money to the city, and provide much-needed housing downtown.

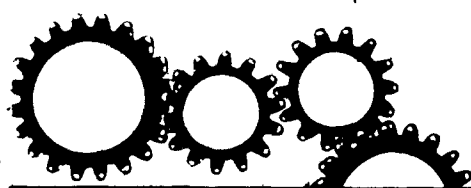
But although the commission gave final site plan approval, this project is not yet a *fait accompli*. And it shouldn't be treated as such.

The number of conditions — nine — on the approved plan make us question the likelihood of the project materializing. But one is a particular worry.

Leaving parking unresolved at the Planning Commission level was probably necessary — if such approval was going to be granted — because of Singh's position on time constraints. But when the City Council takes up the issue Monday night, we hope they proceed with particular caution.

City Manager Steve Walters has suggested the council consider financing a good share — more than half — of the parking needed for the development. In fact, a memo to the council implies that refusal to help with the parking situation could lead to Singh dropping the project, and a much longer wait for anything to develop on the corner.

Walters makes compelling arguments for such financing. If the council and Singh agree to his plan, the city wouldn't actually be paying for the parking; it would sell bonds to be repaid from new taxes coming from the development. There would still be tax money beyond that needed to pay off the bonds. And once paid off, Main

Centre taxes would be gravy for all the tax-collecting units in the city. And the site in its present condition is not doing anyone any good.

So if this proposal was occurring in a vacuum, it would be ideal. But the city is no vacuum, and the idea raises a lot of serious questions.

City financing was not an option for other downtown projects — smaller projects which, it could be argued, faced just as difficult a time paying for their required parking as Singh does. If it decides to finance the Singh plan, what can the city tell these people? What ever happened to the policy — adopted just last year — of charging for parking credits based on approximate actual cost?

And what would happen in the future? Is this going to be an option offered to every project from now on? Probably not, since the city faces a limit on the amount of bond debt it can carry.

That brings up another point. Is parking the best way to use the city's allocated debt capacity and existing debt retirement millage? Maybe it is, at this immediate time, but something more important could be lurking unseen just around the corner.

In short, we understand and empathize with the desire to bend over backward to make sure Main Centre really happens this time around. But Walters and the council really need to consider every last implication of this financing before moving ahead with it.

### Eight Mile study needs immediate work, results

The degree to which government relies on consultants and studies is indeed disheartening at times, though perhaps not worthy of universal condemnation.

Eight Mile Road is an example that pops up.

Novi announced plans for a multi-agency study of the road two weeks ago, hopefully bringing in the road commissions from both Wayne and Oakland counties, as well as Northville city and township officials.

Northville, Northville Township, and Novi City administrators are expected to contribute heavily to the committee proceedings. State legislators and county commissioners could be invited to participate.

They are promising to map out a long-term strategy for the road. Though details are skimpy, this study is expected to analyze what developable lands are left near Eight Mile and what impact that could have on traffic — besides taking on a variety of other topics.

Predictably, this study will probably end with participants calling

upon the road commissions and the state to meet their obligation and come forward with some funds for road improvements. That would not be a surprise. Nor would it be wrong. These are positive steps.

But a concern is that local officials will take to the table a "start from square one," "back to the drawing board" approach to Eight Mile's problems. That would be inappropriate. The road's immediate problems — potholes, congestion, lack of light synchronization — are easily recognizable and don't need a lot of intense study.

We recommend that this group adopt "fast-track" improvement plans, in addition to all of the long-term, 21st-century planning.

This should include some immediate recommendations for stepping up regular maintenance, such as filling in some of the cavernous holes in the road right away — while the talk goes on in other directions.

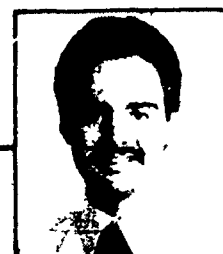
The very first concern is that all affected bodies get to the table and start working on something very soon. The improvements are overdue and sorely needed.

## Road maze

The traffic situation around here certainly isn't getting any better, but I've noticed that many people are driving smarter and making the whole mess a little more tolerable.

My 20-mile, half-hour commute every day to and from work has been a great learning experience. You quickly get to know the traffic patterns — you know when to avoid a particular area, when you can fudge a bit on the speed limit and basic traveling insights like how to get from one place to another in the quickest amount of time.

One thing I've noticed is that the Haggerty Road corridor isn't quite as bad as I was made to believe. Don't get me wrong, I'm not saying Haggerty is a joy to drive on — especially at rush hour — but it doesn't seem to live up to its billing as one of the country's most overcrowded two-lane roads. To the north of I-96, Haggerty experiences severe bottlenecks at the 14 Mile intersection during heavy traffic volumes, but the rest of the way moves surprisingly well, considering the whole system is so antiquated, originally designed for rural driving.

Because it is one of the few north-south trucklines in the area, Haggerty handles a lot of the north-south traffic. But I think Haggerty's terrible reputation has lured drivers to avoid it all together, and that's why it isn't as bad as it could be.

The most common alternate routes include Novi, Meadowbrook, Welch, Taft, Decker and Beck Roads. Unfortunately, these roads only continue about four or five miles before ending. That's why if you avoid Haggerty, you are forced to use the building block method of travel: west a mile, north a couple miles, then west again for a mile and then north for three miles. With all the right and

left hand turns, that can be especially frustrating.

I hear they are planning to extend Welch Road down to 14 Mile Road at the northern boarder of Novi, and that should help a bit. But just like when they extended Decker down to 13 Mile Road, it helped the situation but it wasn't a solution because the north/south route was still abridged.

Haggerty to the south of Eight Mile Road along the Northville Township border isn't much of a problem because I-275 runs right next to it and handles much of the traffic volumes. If I-275 continued north instead of stopping at I-96, the Haggerty problem would be solved, but that isn't in the plans, at least not for a long time.

A short-term plan that would help this whole mess is simple, but may not be very popular with folks living in northern Novi. Meadowbrook and Welch Roads could be connected, and that would provide an unimpeded north/south route from Eight Mile Road all the way to Oakley Park Road almost 10 miles to the north. And just as importantly, it would be just one mile west of Haggerty.

With Welch completed south to 14 Mile Road, and Meadowbrook extending north to 13 Mile Road, a new one-mile stretch of two-lane road would solve a lot of these problems. It doesn't sound like much, but opposition to such a plan — which would probably run just to the east of Novi's Chateau Estates Mobile Home Park — would undoubtedly be great.

Nobody wants to see a wooded area cut in half by yet another road, but progress marches on and we have to pay the price for the resulting increase in traffic. Just ask the residents who live on Haggerty Road.

Last Thursday night, the Northville Action Council sponsored a meeting at the Northville City Hall which could become the forerunner of new actions to support our community's youth. Hundreds of persons are involved in providing services to Northville's youth. Many of these persons provide services in personal matters which cannot be revealed except in general terms. Some of these persons have attended meetings of the Northville Action Council asking for additional support. The Northville Action Council is seeking to identify ways to provide additional assistance. In addition, we have been discussing the need for additional youth services which might eliminate some family difficulties before they reach the crisis stage.

Eighteen persons attended last Thursday's meeting including Tom Watkins, Director of the Michigan Department of Mental Health and Steve Thomas from his staff; Gerry Law, state representative; Tom Handyside, Trustee for Northville Township; Mike Panagiotides, Northville Township Police; representatives from various student assistant programs and members of the Northville Action Council.

Discussion at the meeting centered on the recreational and other needs

of the area's youth and the resources needed to fill those needs. Some of the subjects discussed included (1) continuing beyond July 1989 funding for the Student Assistant at Northville High School, (2) providing a youth center, (3) additional focus on substance abuse and (4) community support. We also discussed possible sources of funding for any programs selected.

Implementation of these or any other actions to serve our youth requires community-wide understanding of the needs as well as support for actions which might be taken. There is strong support among those on the Northville Action Council. We believe, but we are not assured, that the citizens of Northville and Northville Township will support well defined and well organized youth activities and programs.

I encourage citizens to write to the Record and to attend meetings of the Northville Action Council to share their opinions and concerns. The Northville Action Council needs broad citizen input as we seek to further develop ideas and to facilitate implementation of those programs which are selected.

# Adolescents face many peer challenges

This is another in the continuing series of columns written for the Record by Charles Stilec, Northville High School Student Assistance Program Coordinator.

The school year has started and with it our youth face many decisions. With those decisions are consequences which may or may not be positive. Between the ages of eight and twelve, peer groups are one of the most important factors in a young person's life. During age twelve to the teens, the emphasis is on identity and role confusion. The teen asks "Who am I?", undergoing tremendous physiological changes, regression, temper tantrums, and the teen often wants to get involved in something and needs to be stopped. The teen needs a safe structure to explore, but be protected also.

Other developmental tasks that are occurring in adolescents are:

- Adjusting to physical, intellectual and emotional maturation;
- Achieving new and more mature relations with peers;
- Acquiring a set of values and an ethical system as a guide to behavior;
- Preparing future goals;
- Desiring and achieving socially responsible behavior;
- Engaging in healthy and appropriate leisure time activities;

## Consolidating a healthy self concept.

In my opinion any chemical use, alcohol included, prior to age 21, is not OK. An adolescent's physical, mental and emotional systems cannot take it without negative consequences, severe in some cases. This is not to say chemical use after the age of 21 is condoned.

Adolescents use chemicals because of the following factors:

- Unprepared for the decision not to use;
- Genetic and environmental factors;
- Positive rewards from using;
- Self-medicate from pain;
- Cope, relax and avoid pressure;
- Fun, social, curious;
- Belong.

The adolescent stage is a transition period with parents. The umbilical cord must be cut by age 18 when the youth goes off to work or college. By gradually giving more and more cord over the four year span, 14-18, the parent can sever it easily by graduation. Gradual is the key word.

While the pre-teen needs a highly controlled environment, the teen should be given more and more freedom with responsibility attached. Still using the analogy of the umbilical cord, lengthened cord can be pulled closer if responsibility for freedom is not demonstrated. The controlled environ-

ment should give way to a structured environment and finally in the senior year, the freedom to pursue personalized philosophies within the greater societal structure. The parent then must slowly begin to give up power.

In exchange for the gradually lessened power, the parent ideally begins to develop a new relationship with the child based on established problem solving discussions, care and feeding of the youth's self-esteem, continued acceptance of natural consequences and the added communication concepts of active listening and conflict resolution. Issues and concerns are debated openly in the family, allowing everyone to voice opinions and facts.

More direct methods of dealing with alcohol and other drug use in the adolescent period are only effective when this new relationship is in place. Then alcohol and drug facts, attitudes and values can be openly discussed and a problem dealt with if it arises. With a foundation of active decision making, personally held and identified values and a good self concept, the teen can confidently make healthy decisions about drugs.

## State Bar recognizes Jim Tuck

James A. Tuck, a 1961 graduate of Northville High School, has been selected posthumously by the State Bar of Michigan as the recipient of the Roberts P. Hudson Award for outstanding service to the State Bar and its members.

The award is named for the State Bar's first president and will be presented to Mr. Tuck's family at the State Bar's annual banquet at Cobo Hall in Detroit today (Thursday, September 29) at 7 p.m. The banquet is the highlight of the State Bar's 53rd annual meeting.

"The selection of Jim Tuck as recipient of the State Bar's highest honor will come as no surprise to those who were fortunate enough to know and work with him," said Eugene D. Mossner, president of the State Bar of Michigan.

"His dedication, integrity and commitment to justice were in the best traditions of the legal profession. His contributions benefited not only his fellow attorneys, but all of our state's citizens, and will continue to touch our lives for years to come."

Mr. Tuck, who died in the crash of Flight 255 in August 1987, was a member of the State Bar Board of Commissioners at his death, and served on its Committee on Legislation. He was a former member of the State Bar's Consumer Law, Medicolegal Problems and Negligence Law committees, and had undertaken a major legislative policy review for the State Bar as co-chairperson of the Tort Law Review Committee, a position he held at his death.

In addition, he was a past president of the Metropolitan Trial Lawyers Association/Detroit Chapter and was a member of the Michigan Trial Lawyers Association, Association of Trial Lawyers of America, National Lawyers Guild and the American Society of Law and Medicine. He was also a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers.

A 1968 graduate of the University of Michigan Law School, Mr. Tuck spent his entire legal career with the Detroit law firm of Goodman, Eden, Miller and Bedrosian, primarily representing claimants in product liability and medical malpractice cases.

His community activities included service on the Board of Trustees of the Michigan Cancer Foundation, Board of Ethics for the City of Detroit, and Board of Trustees of the Robert Millender Scholarship Fund at Wayne State University.

In 1980, he volunteered his services in response to the request of Mayor Coleman A. Young to challenge federal census techniques alleged to understate Detroit's population, thus jeopardizing appropriations of federal funds.

# Milford firm emphasizes customer service

Some changes have been gradually taking place at Milford's Home Master Real Estate. Among them — the transition of its name to Homes Inc. and the addition of a Hartland office.

But the one aspect of the company that will always remain the same is its dedication to quality customer service, according to co-owner Tom Callan.

"No matter how well informed, educated or experienced you are in real estate, if you can't — or don't — service the needs of your clients, then you can't survive," said Callan, who is in partnership with his brother, Dan Callan, and Tige Reader.

Recalling the recession of the early 1980s, Tom Callan said it was difficult to budget money for advertising and promotion. "We survived because we had tried to service the needs of the customers in the past, and it all came back to us because those customers referred more business to us when we needed it," he said.

Callan is a familiar name in real estate to the Milford region. Tom Callan has been working in the business here practically his entire life — first for his parents' business, Callan Real Estate (which later became Emerald), when he received his broker's license in 1964. Then he opened his own business, Tomorrow Real Estate (later to become Home Master) in 1975. The current office is located at 212 East Commerce in downtown Milford.

Dan Callan worked for his brother about five years starting in 1979, before moving out to the Hartland area to establish his own reputation.

Tige Reader has also been involved in the Milford area his entire professional career since becoming a broker in 1964.

The partnership between the three men began nearly a year ago when they mutually decided that "three heads would be better than one."

"With our combined experience in this business, we have all been around long enough to see the shortcomings that the real estate business had, so our goal has been to eliminate as much of that as possible," explained Dan Callan.

The biggest shortcoming they have tackled is what they perceive to be a lack of special attention given to customers.

"Follow-up communication is very important," said Reader. "People tend to think the worst when they don't hear anything from you," he added.

The approach at Homes Inc. to fulfill such a communication commitment is two-fold. First, the staff at both offices is comprised of only full-time personnel. Second, all three brokers share the responsibility of ownership, and are more involved with each transaction as brokers.

"Sales people in most companies are pretty much left on their own, and we feel that's where a lot of the problems develop," said Dan Callan.

Phasing out the Home Master name has been a delicately planned operation. Early on it was decided that Michigan Property Brokers would be the title of the parent company, and Homes Inc. would be its residential section.

"Home Master has been such a

CONSUMERS POWER is putting the finishing touches on one of its most important tasks — storing natural gas for the coming winter.

Beginning in the early 1960s, Consumers Power began storing natural gas in large, porous-rock underground fields in Macomb and St. Clair counties.

The use of these fields has increased until today the 13 fields operated by Consumers or a subsidiary have a total working gas storage capacity of 160 billion cubic feet — about 60 percent of the total volume used by the utility's gas customers in the course of an average year.

The storage fields help keep bills from rising faster. Because the fields store gas year-round, the utility can buy gas at lower prices in the spring and summer when market demand for gas is lower.

"Michigan has one of the more ideal natural gas storage operations in the country," said Bill Beaudua, area field supervisor for Consumers Power's St. Clair gas storage and production fields.

"Because of the geological structure of our fields, more pressure can be exerted, meaning more gas can be stored and recovered more quickly," Beaudua said.

Getting gas out of storage quickly is as important as putting in large volumes during the off season. On a cold winter day, 65 percent of all gas delivered to the utility's customers can be supplied from storage.

## Start planning income tax strategy now

If you want to make filing your 1988 tax return smoother, pull yourself away from autumn chores to heed some mid-year tax planning tips offered by Grey & Trepeck of Birmingham.

Review your IRA options. If you qualify for a fully or partially deductible IRA contribution, make your contribution as early in the year as possible to stretch the time your fund can be earning tax-deferred dollars.

Consider tax-exempt investments. Investments which yield tax-exempt income (such as municipal bonds) may give you a better after-tax return than taxable investments.

If you invested in a tax-free bond yielding 8 percent and your tax bracket was 28 percent, you'd have to earn 11.11 percent from a taxable investment to get an equivalent return.

Reduce your debt. Pay off as much consumer debt as possible, especially high-interest credit card balances.

In 1988, only 40 percent of any such interest you pay will be deductible. If you have a lot of outstanding consumer debt, consider consolidating it under a home equity loan. Interest on home equity loans up to \$100,000 is fully deductible.

Use your vacation home wisely. If you own a second or vacation home, find out whether you get a better tax break by treating the property as a second residence or as rental property. The number of days you personally use the home can be a determining factor.

Avoid the "kiddie tax." Check any income of children under the age of 14. If unearned income exceeds \$1,000, the child will be taxed on the excess at your highest rate. Shifting investments or making other adjustments may be appropriate.

Buy a home. Owning a home is one remaining tax shelter. You can deduct real estate taxes and mortgage interest on loans up to \$1 million (\$100,000 loan limit on home equity loans).

Make your hobby a business. If you're making money from a hobby, turn it into a business so that you can write off your expenses. You must be able to demonstrate that you engaged in the activity for a profit.

To do that, conduct the activity as a business. Keep records and get a separate bank account for the activity. The IRS will expect your sideline business to show a profit in three out of five years, or you'll have to prove your profit motivation.

Get the rules on "material participation." If you have investments that are borderline passive/active, get details on the new material participation regulations.

Adjust your involvement in such activities so that income or losses produced by them get the most beneficial classification in relation to your other income and losses.

Segregate borrowed funds. Keep borrowed money that will be used for different purposes in

separate accounts so you will not risk losing interest deductions because you can't prove how the money was spent.

Wait until age 55 to sell. If you're approaching the age of 55 and are planning to sell your home, you may want to delay the sale until you qualify for the \$125,000 exclusion of gain. The election can be used only once by taxpayers 55 or older.

If you're planning to marry, realize that you and your spouse-to-be could each claim a separate \$125,000 exclusion before marriage. After marriage, you will be entitled to only one exclusion as a couple.

Manage rental property. If you have rental property and your adjusted gross income will be under \$100,000, be sure you actively manage the property if you want to deduct losses up to \$25,000 against "active" income. The \$25,000 limit phases out for AGI between \$100,000 and \$150,000.

Expense \$10,000 of equipment. In planning your business equipment purchases, remember that you can expense up to \$10,000 for newly-acquired equipment in 1988. The write-off for business cars is limited to \$2,560. If your total equipment pur-

chases exceed \$200,000, the expensing option phases out.

Send children to day camp. If you work, send your children to day camp this summer. Costs qualify for the child-care credit. Overnight camps no longer qualify.

Contribute to a 401(k). If your company has a 401(k) plan, you can defer up to \$7,313 of your salary this year.

Don't overlook medical deductions. If you help support an elderly relative who lives in a nursing home for medical reasons, the cost of the nursing home qualifies for the medical deductions.

If you make improvements to your home for medical reasons, the cost of such improvements are medical expenses to the extent they do not increase the value of your home. That includes such things as widening doorways or hallways for wheelchair use or modifying the home to accommodate an individual with a medical problem.

Hire the disadvantaged. Consider hiring individuals from economically disadvantaged groups to qualify for the targeted jobs credit. The credit is 40 percent of the first \$6,000 earned during the individual's first year. Hiring economically disadvantaged 16- and 17-year-olds during the summer can qualify you for a credit of 85 percent of the first \$3,000 of wages paid.

Time equipment purchases carefully. Be aware it may no longer be good strategy to make business equipment purchases as late in the year as possible. The new law requires you to adjust depreciation if you make more than 40 percent of your equipment purchases in the fourth quarter of the year.

## 'More singles purchasing single-family homes'

Sellers preparing to place their homes on the market can no longer assume that prospective buyer traffic will be made up of only married couples or families.

A recent survey of buyers this spring found nearly one of four was single with females accounting for 12 percent of all buyers and males 11 percent.

"Faced with increasing rental costs, today's singles are discovering that building equity in a home investment makes good sense in planning their futures," said Marjory R. Pickett, president of Metro MLS, the state's largest multiple listing service.

"If they decide to marry or remarry, the home is ready to accommodate the shift in lifestyles while it offers added privacy for entertaining prior to the change.

After a few years of residence, they also have built a good housing downpayment if a career change relocates them to another area."

Pickett said that 38 percent of homes sold nationally this spring were to first-time buyers who paid an average price of \$84,100. The average for repeat buyers jumped to \$126,900.

"Locally, both these figures would likely be quite a bit less," she said. "Our median price is just over \$68,000 while the median reported for the nation as a whole in early May

was about \$20,000 higher."

Average income for the nation's homebuyers this spring, including 73 percent married couples, was \$47,200. There were 25 percent earning more than \$60,000 and only seven percent with incomes less than \$25,000.

With 48 percent, mortgage bankers originated the greatest share of home mortgages followed by thrift institutions with 24 and commercial banks with 15.

Fixed rate mortgages remained

the most popular method of financing with 66 percent of all first mortgages. Of the 32 percent of home buys financed with adjustable rate mortgages (ARMs), 83 percent were one-year ARMs. Only eight percent were three-year and nine percent had rate adjustment periods of six months or less.

A newly-added question in the survey, found that 37 percent of ARMs originated this spring offered the option of converting to a fixed rate mortgage at some future point.

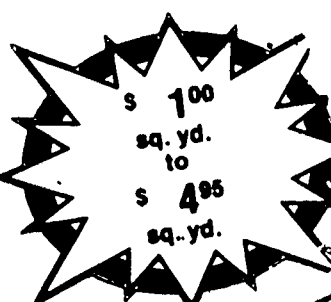

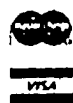

# Newlyweds should plan financial base

When the honeymoon is over and you come back to earth — and your credit card bills, don't despair. Your financial future can be solid, says the Michigan Association of CPAs. If you lay the groundwork for your financial security right from the start.

In the excited rush to select wedding gowns and reception halls, couples often ignore the impact that marriage can have on their finances. Especially when both partners work, marriage may mean a major overhaul of financial responsibility.

First, you need to re-examine your tax liability. If you both work, marriage may elevate you into a higher tax bracket. Since recent legislation eliminated the so-called marriage penalty deduction for federal tax returns, two-earner couples no longer get a special deduction for spouse's income. Many married couples will still pay less tax by filing jointly but, in certain circumstances, filing separately may actually reduce your total tax bill.

Besides taxes, the most fundamental financial responsibility newlyweds face is setting up a household budget. Start by sitting down together and discussing your short- and long-term financial goals.

If both of you work, decide on how you want to manage two paychecks. Traditionally, married couples merge incomes in one checking or savings account. Today, some couples opt for separate accounts, with each partner taking responsibility for particular expenses.

For example, the husband may pay mortgage and utility bills, while the wife takes care of all household expenses. Others choose to set up one joint account for their mutual living

expenses, while keeping two other separate accounts for individual use, such as hobby expenses.

Once you have determined your priorities and agreed on a way of handling a two-paycheck household, list your monthly and yearly expenses. Make sure that you include such fixed costs as rent or mortgage payments, insurance premiums, automobile and educational loans, utility bills and commuter expenses. Don't forget to add in the amount you hope to save each month.

If you really want your budget to be feasible, include estimates of variable expenses, such as those for entertainment and travel. If both of you love to ski, by all means budget for a few trips — even if that means trimming your expenses in another area. Remember, if your budget is too rigid, you probably won't stick to it.

Next, calculate your combined income, including any dividends or interest payments that you receive on a regular basis. If you cannot meet all your expenses, including your savings goal, it's time to look at your finances — and budget — more realistically.

In trimming costs, don't overlook duplication of credit cards. If you and your spouse have many of the same charge cards, consider eliminating those with higher interest rates or annual fees. Just make sure that you retain at least one card in each of your

own names so that you both have a credit history to rely on in case of a divorce or a spouse's death.

Another factor that many newlyweds overlook is redundant benefit policies. If both spouses work, there's a good chance that each partner is covered by some form of employer-sponsored health and life insurance. If this is the case, compare your benefit policies carefully. Read the fine print and ask your company representatives to explain all aspects of coverage.

If your employers' policies are free or inexpensive, you may want to keep both policies active — especially if your benefit plans can supplement each other. In such cases, you may be able to submit a claim at one spouse's insurance company, and then ask the second company to reimburse you for any expenses not covered by the first plan.

If, however, the cost of one spouse's health insurance plan is excessively high or if his or her coverage is generally insufficient, you probably would do best by electing to cover both partners under whichever benefit plan is more comprehensive and less expensive.

Once you have reviewed the benefits supplied by your employer, you may want to consider purchasing additional insurance. Remember that marriage, almost inevitably, makes partners somewhat financial-

ly dependent on each other. To protect yourselves from the potentially devastating effects of a spouse's disability or death, make sure that you have adequate insurance on both your lives and your home.

Ask yourself how much insurance you need, as well as how much insurance you can afford. In making decisions on insurance plans, always balance your needs with your resources. Weigh the strengths and weaknesses of different types of policies.

Cash-value policies, for example, are like whole life or universal policies. While these plans enable you to accumulate savings, they may cost considerably more than another type of policy — such as term insurance.

Consider, too, your need for disability insurance, which provides you with an income should you or your spouse be unable to work because of sickness or injury.

Homeowner's insurance, and its equivalent for renters, protects your home and its contents. The amount of coverage you need depends on the replacement cost of both your home and your personal possessions. Again, before you make a decision on a policy, study your particular situation and honestly assess the degree of protection needed.

If you rent an apartment and your furniture came from an uncle's basement, you may not want, or need, insurance of this type.

Don't ignore the financial responsibilities that marriage brings. CPAs suggest that you start building for your future now by making financial planning an integral part of your family life.

# Milford firm stresses customer satisfaction

strong part of the Milford area real estate business that we didn't want to do anything overnight to hurt ourselves business-wise or to cause confusion to our customers," said Reader.

"It has taken eight months to get to this point, and it will take four to six more months to complete the transition. The name change is the hardest thing to deal with as far as when the timing is right," he added.

As part of a promotional campaign to introduce the new name, some 5,000 American flags were planted on neighborhood lawns the night of July 3 in Milford, Highland and Hartland. The next day, thousands of residents woke up with a star-spangled announcement on Independence Day.

"It was really fun to do, and the response has been great," said Reader.

The new Hartland office at 11518 Highland Road was opened Jan. 9 of this year.

"We are extremely pleased with the reaction to the new office," said Dan Callan, who added that it has actually helped business at the Milford office by being an alternative source. "They work well hand-in-hand," he said.

The brokers are finding that the two communities, although geographically close, tend to be miles apart when it comes to selling points to prospective buyers.

Milford, according to Reader, is a "bedroom-type" community with very strong resale, usually to families with children who are looking for a small-town atmosphere.

Hartland, on the other hand, is more of a transient community due to its location near the expressway, making it a one-hour drive to most metro business centers. This area usually attracts the sales and professional people, Reader noted.

Drawing cards for both areas are the school systems and the lower tax bases, he added.

No matter who may be buying a home, the success of Homes Inc. can be found in the dedicated staff of each office, agreed all three partners.

"Our most important asset is the constant efforts of our hard working staff," said Dan Callan, who heads up the six sales people in Hartland.

Tom Callan oversees 12 sales people in Milford, and Reader divides his time between the two locations.

"We heavily expose our sales people to the top sales trainers in the nation, and it is not slick sales techniques either. They just learn to do things more thoroughly and to pay attention to the little things," said Dan Callan.

"There's not one thing that makes a difference between real estate companies — it's all the little things that we do," he added.

Some examples of the "little things" that make a difference, is the fact that sales people are on call 24 hours a day to their clients to answer questions or calm nerves.

"Selling and buying a new home is a major decision and an emotional experience," explained Tom Callan. "It's not abstract bricks and mortar. There's memories like, 'I planted that tree,' which are important to people," he added.

Other features of Homes Inc. include being part of a relocation network which works with other Realtors and major businesses around the country to help find homes for workers who have been transferred.

Video taping and viewing of homes is also available. According to Reader, the idea is big on the West Coast, but hasn't been extensively implemented in this area as of yet.

"Our whole approach is not to do as much business in a short period of time, but rather to build up as much business over a long period of time and develop good relationships with fewer customers, and in turn do a return business," explained Dan Callan.

# CPAs offer tips for reading annual reports

If you find annual reports baffling, you're not alone. People try to read them the way they read a book or magazine — and that's a mistake. Annual reports are reference works. You don't read the dictionary the way you read Dickens, and you don't approach an annual report the way you do People.

For anyone who has ever tossed aside an annual report in confusion, the Michigan Association of CPAs offers some basic advice on how to decipher annual reports.

When you are considering an investment or looking for a job, annual reports can be a valuable source of information if you know how to read between the lines. The first section of an annual report usually contains the chief executive's letter to shareholders and management's discussion of the company's condition. The letter generally highlights the company's financial data, summarizes the year's events and describes the company's goals for the future.

Occasionally, management may use the letter to shareholders to express a position on relevant social or public policy issues. While the letter to shareholders makes every attempt to put the company's best foot forward, a good letter will point out both the firm's weaknesses as well as its strengths. Special themes such as the accomplishments of individual employees, may also be clever attempts to divert attention from financial problems.

To test a chief executive's credibility and gauge past management predictions, review the annual reports of the past few years. Compare projections made in previous years with subsequent results. How did the CEO's promise to increase company earnings fare? Were research and development projects

completed on schedule and within the budget outlined by the chief executive?

If read carefully, the section called "Management's Discussion and Analysis" can provide valuable insight into a company's financial condition and operations. Generally, this section includes information about the company's liquidity, capital resources and operational results.

For many readers, the biggest mystery of annual reports is the financial statement — also called the "numbers" section. Consisting of a series of elaborate tables, this technical section may fool you into thinking that financial statements are beyond your understanding. Don't believe it. All you need are some basic clues to finding the essential facts.

The care of the financial section consists of a balance sheet and an income statement. The balance sheet shows where the company stood as of a particular date and should be viewed as a snapshot rather than a moving picture. The balance sheet describes what the company owns (its assets) as well as what it owes (its liabilities). The difference between these two figures is the company's net worth or shareholder's equity.

While the balance sheet reveals the

company's book value, the income statement measures the firm's earnings, costs and profitability. If you can't find the income statement in your annual report, don't panic. Income statements are also called profit-and-loss statements, operating statements or income-and-expense statements. Whatever its name, the purpose is always the same — to detail how much the company made or lost during the period reported.

The income statement matches the amount the company received from selling its goods and other items of income against all the costs of operating the company. The difference between the two figures is the net income or net profit — the proverbial bottom line. This number represents the amount available to pay shareholder dividends or to be re-invested in the company. Search the income statement for extraordinary items that don't recur each year, such as a large tax credit or the sale of a subsidiary. Keep in mind that such an isolated event may distort the current year's profit statement.

Some experts suggest that the fastest way to evaluate a company's financial statement is by reviewing the auditor's opinion which appears near the end of most annual reports. In this section, an independent

auditor issues an opinion on the financial statements provided by the company's management.

The auditor's primary responsibility is to provide the public with reasonable assurance that the company's financial statements and the related disclosures conform with generally accepted accounting practices.

On February 9, 1988, the Auditing Standards Board of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants approved nine new statements on auditing standards. As a result, auditors will now have the increased responsibility for detecting and reporting fraud or illegal acts, for evaluating the system of internal control and for considering and disclosing doubts about a company's ability to continue in existence.

Although reading an auditor's report cannot provide a thorough examination of the firm's entire financial statement, it may post a red flag to any potential problems the company faces.

Another useful tool in ferreting out important information is the footnote section, usually found at the end of the annual report. If the footnote section is long, read all the items with special care. Footnotes generally serve one of two purposes — either they explain the company's accounting policies or they provide critical disclosures.

The condition of the company's pension plan, heavy use of tax benefits, plans to sell a subsidiary or pending lawsuits are all examples of the type of information tucked into footnotes.

If you need to analyze financial statements for investment purposes, CPAs advise you to consult an expert for help in understanding the facts behind the figures.

# Female workers fight employment barriers

In the United States today there are women anchoring national news shows and sitting on the Supreme Court.

Women have walked in space and run for vice president. They've entered a wide variety of "non-traditional" occupations, from engineering to veterinary medicine.

Yet for all the progress some women have made in breaking employment barriers, women in both white- and blue-collar jobs still face difficult obstacles in the workplace.

Professional women, for example, who obtain positions in traditionally male-dominated jobs, often encounter a "glass ceiling," according

to Marian McCracken, president of the Michigan chapter of the National Organization for Women (NOW). These women are prevented from rising any farther.

According to McCracken, displaced homemakers and women without much education face the most difficult problems.

Patricia Curran, director of the Michigan Department of Labor's Office of Women and Work, says the media have chosen to highlight women in the professions, ignoring women at other occupational levels. "The vast number of women who are working to support a family are in low paying jobs," she said.

## Children's story times are big hit

Once upon a time ... are four magical words guaranteed to cast a spell of magic around a group of children. Stories have always been special friends for children. They have been a way to introduce children to books, to history, to foreign places and to open their minds to the adventures of the imagination.

Libraries have always been special places for children. The children's area in any library has meant small chairs and picture books, a place where a child could feel comfortable.

Now libraries have gone a step further, creating rooms and programs built for children to explore and have fun in. Local story hours at libraries have been overflowing and in many cases, parents have been clamoring for more.

Librarians are of the philosophy, "if you get them into the library at a young age and they have a good experience with the library — they'll be back," according to Clara Bohrer, Michigan Library Association president.

Jennifer Edison, children's librarian at the Novi library, noted that the demand for story hours in the area is extraordinary. Libraries are starting story hours for children beginning as young as age two and three, "with Mom or Dad in attendance," Edison said.

These story hours, actually about 25 minutes in length, consist of simple stories or rhymes that often include a lot of finger play and audience participation.

"We want to get them comfortable with the library and to get their parents comfortable with the library," Edison noted.

Pat Orr, library director in Northville, said the philosophy of children's programs is "to introduce them to the pleasures of reading as early as possible."

She noted that the use of libraries in a child's life appears to be cyclical that there are times when libraries are not high on the child's agenda, but if the child is comfortable and has had a good experience with libraries at a young age — he or she will be back.

Story hours are important to children for several reasons, Orr observed. "It's not just the colors of a picture book, but the way in which a book can be read out loud that interests and intrigues them," she said. Libraries include finger plays, puppetry, parades and active portions to the story hours to involve the entire child in the book.

"Sometimes a story will touch a child and then they will have a story to tell us," Orr said. The experience becomes one of sharing.

"In our children's room we do not expect the children to be quiet," Bohrer said, a librarian with the Farmington Hills Public Library. "It is not a playground, rather a controlled environment where they are encouraged to move around and explore." That library has a free-form sculpture that children play with to help them develop their small motor skills, she said.

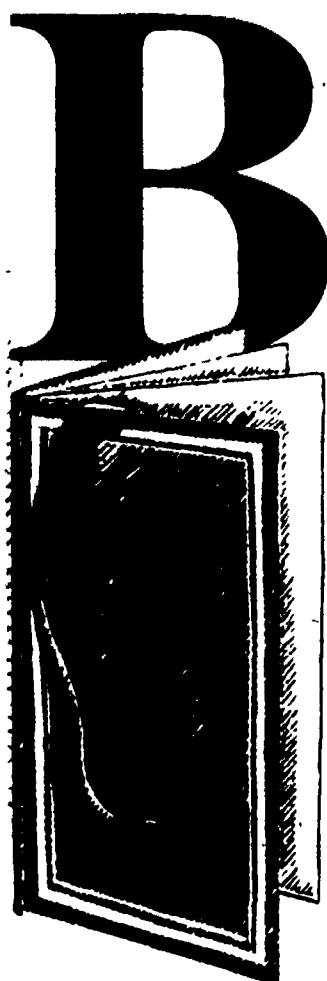
Having a place geared toward the child helps that child feel comfortable with the building and its contents, the librarians noted. This feeling of belonging will make the child a library patron for years to come.

Children's programming includes summer reading programs at area libraries as well. In an effort to keep children reading even when school is out, the libraries have put together special story hours, reading lists and programs that encourage children to use the library during the summer months. The number of books read by each child is catalogued and at the end of the program a party is given, with each child rewarded for individual reading effort.

Parents are enthusiastic over the programs, and in most cases, the list of participants in story hours and reading programs is growing. Just like the libraries.

ooks and scarred wooden tables. Creaking floors, dusty shelves and long lines for the card files.

Quiet rooms disturbed only by the scratch of chairs on the floor and the trundle of the book cart. Librarians in half-glasses, "ssshhhhh" everyone in sight.

Labyrinths of books and magazines where students often wandered, searching for reference sources for term papers. This was the library.

A building for book lovers, certainly. But a building with clichéd images and old-fashioned looks. A place of tradition and the written word.

Well, look again

Things have changed. Libraries are not the quiet, dusty rooms of old. There is a light, excitement, noise and vibrancy to today's library.

"I think that like every other segment of society, libraries are going to automation and new technology — not only are there books — printed medium, but now there is data base access and access information from CD ROM," said Clara Bohrer, current president of the Michigan Library Association.

Technology and change have come to the library.

For library patrons that means no more long sessions with the "Readers Guide." Before, a researcher looking for information on teenage alcoholics would have had to look up all publications under teenage and all publications under alcohol, and then look for references between

the two, Bohrer explained.

Enter technology. Now a researcher can merely type both parameters into a computer and the machine "spits out the bibliography," she said.

The new technology means that smaller libraries are not bound by the volumes within their walls. The resources of larger libraries, including the huge Detroit Public Library system, become open to them. "It's making life easier for the patron," Bohrer said.

formation, and much, much more.

Not every local library has personal computers or is on-line with data information links. But Bohrer pointed out that the future is bright for libraries. "Each one is moving in that direction at its own pace," she said.

And the popularity of the libraries couldn't be stronger. A visit to the local library during the day and in the evenings finds most crowded. Suburban

making programs available," she said.

The change in libraries is more than just adding technology. The feel of the library and the look of the library also are changing.

Comfortable chairs and reading rooms have replaced hard benches. There are plants and posters on the walls, bright colors and a sense of fun. Staff members are less inclined to demand rigid adherence to quiet hours and more inclined to direct those who need to talk toward rooms or sections set aside for the purpose.

"I like to tell a story," Bohrer said. "In my first job (as a librarian), my supervisor was the librarian who used to kick me out of the library as a teenager for being so loud," she said. Staff attitudes have changed.

Today's librarian is skilled in the new network of information available to libraries. Computers and data base searches are outdistancing paper and pencils at today's library science schools.

The trend of the future is to make the library a part of an information network that is readily available to everyone. Librarians are working with middle school and high school students to educate them to the tools available for research in libraries.

Books and tables and chairs. And now computers and cassettes, software and information network systems. The library is growing.

Look again. The future holds even more, Bohrer promised.

More and more libraries are buying computers for use by the public. Libraries are adding software programming to their shelves for use in the library and to loan out. Patrons can bring in their own software, as well.

It's a different world today, and the library system is keeping up, Bohrer said. Books will always be the basis of the libraries — and the true love of most regular customers, but now patrons can go beyond books.

There are video cassettes, music cassettes, albums for rent, compact discs for rent — in addition to paperback collections, specialized collections, tax in-

formation, and much, much more. libraries are suffering from overcrowding, and many are building additions, looking for more space and adding to collections.

There is a great spirit of community in libraries today, Bohrer said. The influence of education on the communities bring families to the library in record numbers. "There is a lot of interest in education, and the new resources at the library are a way to enhance education," Bohrer said, explaining the rise in interest in libraries.

Friends groups are very important to the growth of libraries, she pointed out. "They raise money and are instrumental in

"One school, one purpose, one commitment - excellence!"

That's the theme for the 1988-89 school year for Northville's Our Lady of Victory School, according to new Principal Marilyn Reagan.

"I like the firm foundation of academic excellence at Our Lady and I want to build on that foundation," Reagan said.

Reagan comes to Our Lady from St. Joseph School in Lake Orion, where she was principal for the past two years. Prior to St. Joseph, Reagan was director of guidance and counseling for St. Alphonsus High School in Dearborn from 1974-86.

She said she came to Our Lady of Victory "because I saw an opportunity for professional growth. I like the program they have and I have a desire to grow with it."

Reagan said Our Lady of Victory currently has about 275 students enrolled, with most of them from the Northville/Novi area. The school, which has been open since 1952, employs 10 full-time teachers and six part-time teachers.

Reagan said she is especially excited to be a part of Our Lady's TRIAD program, which is designed for gifted and talented students.

She noted the program is divided into three types: first, expanding the

classroom learning experience through the use of in-depth learning (ENGINE-uity) centers; second, teaching all students critical thinking skills; and third, independent research by about 20 percent of the students who are identified as gifted and talented.

"I hope to bring expectations for performance this year," Reagan said. "I think people perform up to expectations which others have for them."

Reagan said she hopes to bring in new programs this year for students which include the BABES and QUEST programs. "Both are related to education in terms of self-awareness, self-discovery, and substance abuse."

"I hope to put in a new computer lab in the school and at present, we are putting in a new library and initiating new physical education and music programs," she added.

Reagan takes over as principal for Sharalene Thompson, who left Our Lady after 10 years. She said she hopes to continue and expand the programs which Thompson began.

"We are a private Catholic school which teaches church values and ethics as part of the curriculum," noted Reagan. "We believe the church is an essential part of the lives of families and the student teaching."



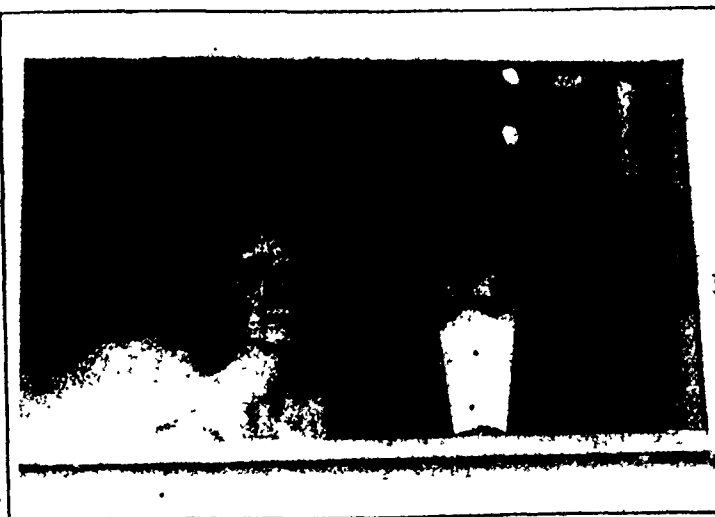

## Color tour season returns to state

For many people autumn in Michigan represents the very best the state can offer. Gone are the hot, humid days of summer. Gone are the mosquitoes. And gone are the hordes of summer tourists from the most popular vacation spots in our state.

In their place are beautiful bright days filled with sunshine and fall colors. This is the time of the year when a weekend trip to the north can relax and rejuvenate the traveler. For the amateur photographer, fall's foliage provides a wonderful background for pictures.

Each section of the state offers different looks at the changing colors. Trips can be planned depending on the time of the year, to take full advantage of the peak color season. The upper peninsula, and upper Michigan trees turn to gold and red earlier than their more southern counterparts.

The state has 18 million acres of forests and as many as 65 different species of trees. According to forecasters, the summer's drought, while wilting crops, actually will make this fall one of the most colorful in recent memory. The lack of water has forced many trees to begin the season early, and the cool nights and sunny days are bringing out the reds and golds already.

While Novi and Northville residents are blessed with beautiful scenery in the immediate area, those wishing to venture farther afield can enjoy the sights and activities of the entire state.

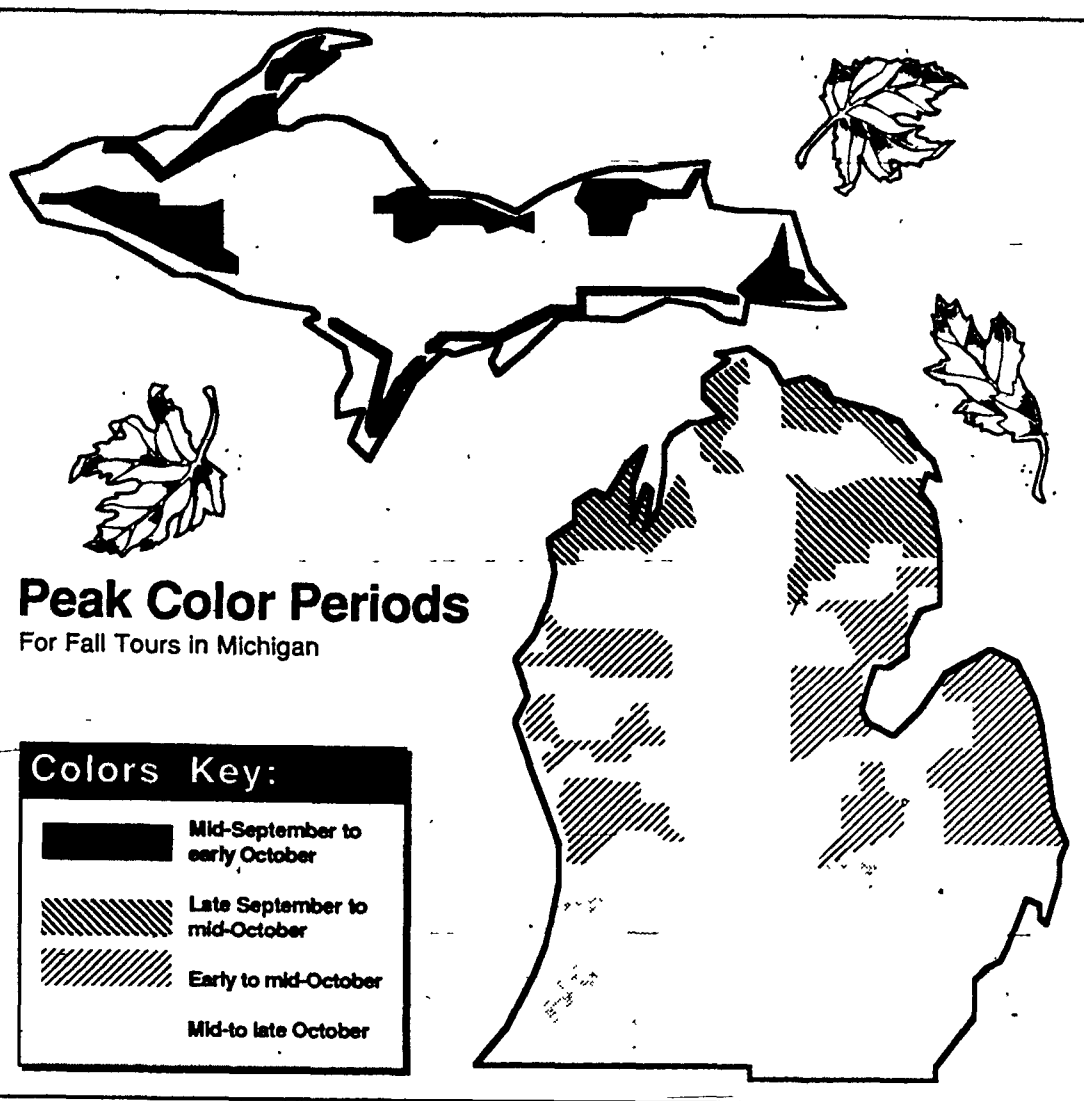
Color tours have been a part of fall for generations of Michiganders and many people know the perfect spots to look for the ultimate color.

There are several ways to enjoy the fall colors, either by bicycle, canoe or merely by driving along the winding roadways.

Best times and some recommended color tours for portions of the state put together by the Michigan Travel Bureau are:

**MACKINAW CITY TO BOYNE FALLS:** approximately 151 miles of round trip scenery. Recommended time for peak color is late September to mid-October. The loop suggested includes Mackinaw City, Pleasant View, Petoskey, Horton Bay, Boyne City, Boyne Falls, back up to East Jordan, Charlevoix, Harbor Springs and Cross Village.

**CHEBOYGAN TO ROGERS CITY:** approximately 175 miles round-trip. Recommended time is late September to mid-October. The trip



starts in Cheboygan, follows US 23 to Rogers City and around Grand Lake, then back up along Route 68 through Onaway, Indian River and Topinabee to Route 27 and back to Cheboygan.

**ALPENA TO HOUGHTON LAKE:** approximately 280 miles with peak times estimated at late September to mid-October. The tour takes US 23 to Harrisville, picks up Route 72 to Mio, through Rosecommon to Route 18 into Prudenville and Houghton Lake, on to I-75 up to Gaylord, Route 32 to Atlanta and back to Alpena.

**GREENBUSH TO WEST BRANCH:** approximately 183 miles and peak time is estimated to be late September to mid-October. This tour

takes US 23 from Greenbush to Oscoda, Tawas City and picks up Route 65 through Whittemore, to Route 55 to West Branch. Then takes I-75 to Saint Helen, Rose City and picks up 21 to Long Lake, Route 65 to Glennie and 30 back up to Greenbush.

• Closer to home tours include an approximately 140 mile trip from STANDISH TO MOUNT PLEASANT: Peak color season is from early to mid-October. Starting in Standish and taking Route 13 to Bay City, picking up US 10 to Midland, through Saint Louis up to Mount Pleasant. Then picking up US 27 to Clare and Gladwin, back to Route 61 into Standish.

• CEDAR SPRINGS TO HOLLAND: This trip of approximately 130 miles with peak color season estimated for early to mid-October. Starting in Cedar Springs on Route 44 through Rockford to Lowell and to Grand Rapids, picking up Route 11 to I-96 to Holland, up US 31 to Grand Haven and across Route 46 to Cedar Springs.

Tour maps provided by the Travel Bureau are simplified to point out only major highways and county roads to clarify routings. For particulars, a detailed highway map should be consulted.

Cornstalks and pumpkins, harvest moons and hayrides are September's invitation to a harvest of autumn activities.

The hayride is a popular autumn activity whether it be to hop on a tractor-pulled trailer for a ride to the orchards for apple picking, or a pre-planned outing on a crisp afternoon with a group of friends.

Sugarbush Farms, located off the I-94 Ford Road exit on Gotfredson Road in Ypsilanti, offers three group program packages and a special school field trip program.

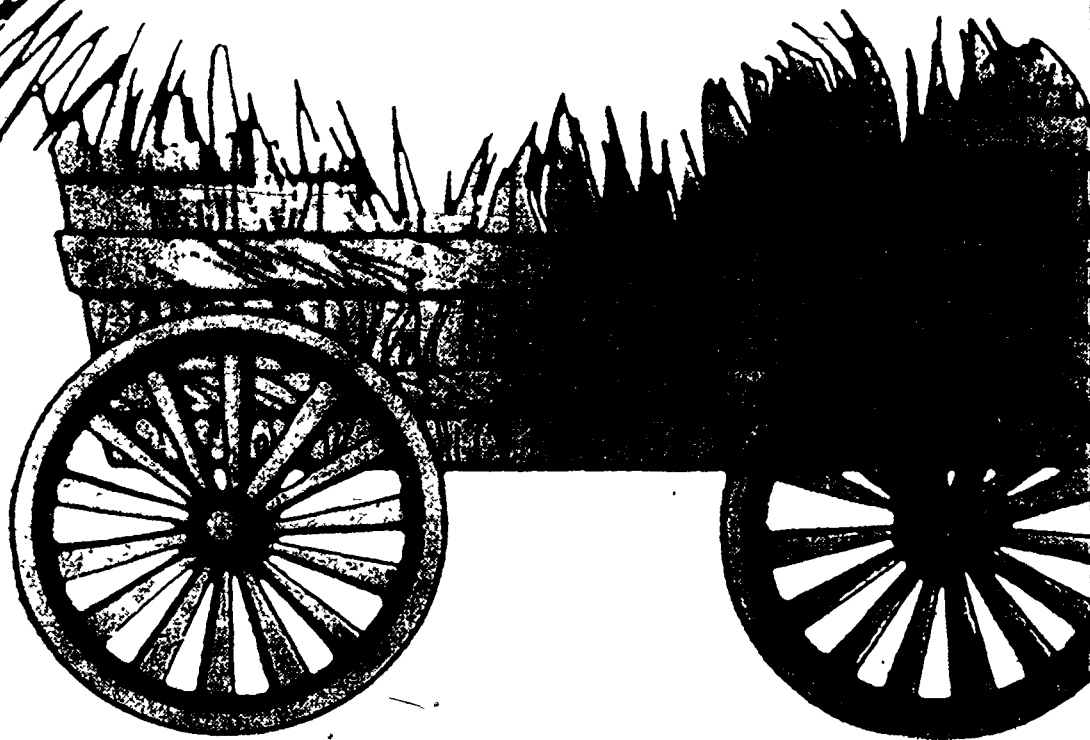

## Mama Pasta: Lunch for shoppers

There's a new entry on the restaurant scene in Novi for people who enjoy Italian cuisine. Mama Pasta is located near the theaters in the Novi Town Center and specializes in — you guessed it — pasta.

The new restaurant is not the first Mama Pasta restaurant — there are two others in Sterling Heights and Grosse Pointe. But it is the first Mama Pasta's franchise; and it's also the first venture into the restaurant business by owners William Reno and Richard Politi.

Politi acknowledges that the venture is particularly exciting for him because the location in Novi represents a homecoming of sorts. His parents purchased the second home constructed in Novi's Meadowbrook Lake subdivision. "There were still cornfields out there when I was a youngster," he remarked.

Novi has changed a lot since Politi's youth, and now he's a part of that change. Situated in the Novi Town Center with its 400,000 square feet of retail space, Mama Pasta is designed first of all to provide a haven where shoppers can stop in for lunch or dinner before heading back to the stores or into the Town Center movie theaters which are located right around the corner.

Physically, it's a most attractive restaurant — more than you would expect to find in a shopping center. Decorated with light-colored woods and plenty of hanging plants, Mama Pasta is well-designed with its 4,000 square feet of dining area nicely broken up to allow a feeling of intimacy.

The owners boast that the restaurant also is quite accessible to the handicapped with a 3½-foot front door and extra-wide aisles. The booths are large and comfortable, and there also are plenty of smaller "tables for two" along the windows and walls.

Another physical feature of the restaurant is the open kitchen which permits patrons to watch the chefs prepare the food. Politi says the open concept provides entertainment for customers while they are waiting to be served. "It's fun to watch the flames, see the pasta being made and the vegetables being chopped, while being able to smell the bread while it is baking," he said.

The owners say the open kitchen also serves another purpose. "We want to have exceptionally high standards for the restaurant," explained Reno. "The openness is lots of fun, but it also requires us to keep everything spotlessly clean. We want the public to know we are committed to both healthy food and a healthy atmosphere."

The owners also boast about the freshness of the food. "Everything is made fresh every day," said Politi. "The pasta is made every day. The meats, herbs and spices are cut fresh. We make our own salad dressings. Nothing is preserved or frozen. Even the food tea is brewed right here."

Shortly after patrons are seated, the waiterperson arrives and places a basket of breadsticks on the table. The fact that Mama Pasta is, after all, a shopping center restaurant is brought home by the fact that the breadsticks are wrapped in a paper napkin — something of a surprise in light of the restaurant's generally superior physical appearance.

The owners' desires to have a restaurant which is somewhat nicer than a typical shopping center restaurant is reflected in a somewhat ambitious menu, however.

As you would expect in a restaurant featuring Italian cuisine, Mama

Pasta offers minestrone soup, stuffed eggplants and antipasta salad among its pre-entree selections. Particularly noteworthy is the calamari — chilled seasoned squid rings chopped together with tomato, parsley and onions in a red wine dressing.

Diners can opt for pizza, of course. But those who enjoy Italian food will make their selections from 18 different varieties of pasta (including baked rotini, linguine carbonara and fettucine primavera), nine chicken or veal dishes, four choices of beef or four seafood dishes (including shrimp parmigiana and seafood marinara).

For dessert, there is a pastry tray which includes cheesecake and cannolis along with a selection of Italian ices.

## Gridders slip past Chargers

For the first time since the 1985 season, Northville football fans left a home opener with smiles on their faces.

Mustang coach Darrel Schumacher was also happy, but more than anything he was relieved, as Northville nipped Livonia Churchill 13-10 last Friday (Sept. 23), winning a Western Lakes League clash, and overcoming some serious first half mistakes in the process.

"There isn't a team in our league you can turn it over to and not expect them to capitalize on it," Schumacher said. "We were awfully darn lucky to come away with a victory."

Senior tailback Randy Jones quickly went from goat to hero in the game, scoring two touchdowns and rushing for 80 yards — but not before he fumbled the ball away twice, deep in Northville territory. Jones' heroics included a 57-yard T.D. scamper — a big play the Mustang offense hasn't exhibited in years.

"Anytime you play poorly and come away with a victory, you have to be pleased," Schumacher said. "I believe we're a much better team than we showed, but we were lucky."

Early in the first quarter, cornerback Mike Karfis intercepted a pass which halted a Charger drive, but three plays later, Northville quarterback Greg Price gave the ball back when John Scholtz picked off his pass at the Northville 17. Several plays later, Churchill quarterback Eric Osen found receiver Rob Moraschinelli in the corner of the end zone for a 20-yard touchdown and a 7-0 lead.

"It was a case where our secondary people may have given up on the pass, thinking it was out of

bounds, but it was in the back corner of the end zone," Schumacher said. "It was a beautifully thrown ball and a great catch."

Jones' first fumble on the Mustangs' third possession gave Churchill the ball inside the 20, but the defense stiffened and the Chargers had to settle for a 27-yard field goal by Mike Spaccarotella. With 11 minutes left in the second quarter, Northville trailed 10-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, Jones fumbled again and Churchill took possession at the Mustang 32. But again, the defense came to the rescue and eventually forced Churchill to turn the ball over on downs. That set up Jones' 57-yard thriller down the left sideline on a sweep. Northville's first successful point after attempt of the season — by Chris Kuffner — made it 10-7, and that's what it remained at halftime.

"That run by Jones was great," Schumacher said. "It's been a long time since we've had a long T.D. run like that. (Randy's) our big play back. He has the speed to break it anytime and I thought he did a nice job trying to erase those fumbles from his mind and continue to play hard."

The second half turned into a defensive struggle with no major scoring threats, until defensive lineman Rob Spradlin caused a fumble and Mike Hale pounced on the loose ball at the Churchill 43. A 10-yard run up the middle by Karfis and a costly penalty to the Chargers helped set up Jones' second score, a five-yard run with about eight minutes on the clock. A low PAT kick was blocked to make it 13-10.

In the fourth, Northville continued to control things. The defensive line

## Canton stuns cagers, 71-25

When you're going up against the eighth-ranked team in the state on the road, a season-best performance is a good idea. Anything less could be a disaster.

For obvious reasons, Northville's 71-25 defeat at the hands of powerful Plymouth Canton in a WLA Western Division showdown on Sept. 22 was a disaster. The Mustangs came in with a perfect 6-0 mark and a high-powered offense that averaged nearly 60 points a game. But against the Chiefs, nothing seemed to go right. At a time when Northville needed a super effort, they laid an egg instead.

"(Canton) is better than we are, but not 46 points better," Mustang Coach Ed Kritch said. "It was an ugly game to watch but those things happen."

"Canton was playing at or near their potential and we were playing way below our potential. A combination of the two made for a very disappointing outing."

Canton busted out of the gates in the first quarter to take a 16-5 lead and things only got worse in the second. With about two minutes left in the half, and the Chiefs ahead 30-7, Kritch knew it was over.

"We were knocked out of the game before halftime," Kritch admitted. "Our biggest problem was executing our offense. We gave (Canton) good scoring chances in transition and that's when they are the most dangerous. Defensively, they pushed us out to the perimeter of the court and we never got into the flow of our offense."

A 33-9 halftime lead ballooned to 52-14, and the final margin of victory was the largest since Kritch became Northville's coach five seasons ago.

"Well, 71 is the most points we've given up since I've been here, and the margin was also the largest," he said. "I felt our experienced players played like rookies and our younger people didn't look comfortable on the court. We were intimidated, I think."

Debbie Stevens and Karen Baird each scored 11 points to lead the Mustangs, but it was more than 30 points under their combined scoring average heading into the game.

Heather Sixt was the only other Northville player to score. Canton (6-1 overall) had five players score in double figures — led by Michelle Fortier's 15.

**NORTHVILLE 60, LIVONIA CHURCHILL 45:** The Mustangs started the week with an uninspired victory over a weak Churchill squad on Sept. 20, and it was probably an indication of what was to come.

"I didn't think we played well, to be honest," Kritch said. "Churchill played hard and gave us problems. We were either looking ahead to Canton or reading our press clippings. I don't think the girls did it consciously, but we did relax a little."

The Mustangs had a modest six point lead after one quarter and held a 30-22 margin at intermission. Northville then scored the first eight points at the start of the second half and that increased the gap to 48-27.

"We really ended it in the first few minutes of the third quarter," Kritch said. "Churchill played a full-court, man-to-man defense the whole game and when we handled it, it made for some easy transition baskets."

Stevens, who scored 11 in the third quarter rally, led all scorers with 27, including 9-of-9 from the free throw line. Sixt added 14 points and eight rebounds while Baird chipped in 11 and five assists.

Northville (6-1 overall, 2-1 in the WLA) travels to Livonia Franklin tomorrow (Sept. 30) for an afternoon clash with the Patriots.

# Salem dumps Northville kickers, 4-0

If the Northville kickers didn't realize the easy part of the 1988 season is behind them, they do now.

With a 4-0 defeat to Plymouth Salem on Sept. 19, the Mustangs opened a treacherous stretch of matches that will carry through the end of the season in mid-October. The Rocks — the state's 10th rated Class A team — were the first of many highly-ranked squads on tap for Northville in the next few weeks. And if the first test was any indication, it could be a long, arduous trek.

"(Salem) took us apart in the pouring rain," Mustang Coach Dave Yezback said. "They let us know the hard way that the easy part of our season is over."

Northville never got anything going offensively, and had all sorts of trouble marking Salem's forwards. A combination of the two led to a lopsided affair — one that could have easily been 10-0 instead of 4-0.

"Salem straight-out beat us in all aspects of the game," Yezback lamented. "Their offense put us in disarray. If it wasn't for some great saves by our goalie, we would have been totally embarrassed. It could have been a lot worse."

Senior goaltender Roger Kimary did let four shots get behind him, but he stopped 21 others, many of which were prime scoring chances. For the game, the Rocks outshot the Mustangs 25-8, and Yezback admitted that Northville's shots on goal total may have been inflated by an over-zealous statistician.

"The eight shots may have been generous," he said.

Salem jumped in front 1-0 with a goal just four minutes into the game and a second goal at the 20-minute mark made it 2-0 at intermission. The Rocks then took command with two more goals — just a minute apart — midway through the second half.

"Salem is rated 10th and rightly so," Yezback added. "They gave us a clinic on how to mark. All their goals — and their good scoring chances — happened because men were left unmarked."

Central has been a league doormat since debuting a soccer program several years ago, but the 1988 edition is very strong defensively and has given just about every WLAA team a hard time.

After the almost non-existent offensive attack against Salem, Yezback moved midfielders Chris Hinz and Andy Frey up to forward positions against Central, and the move did produce more scoring chances. Remarkably, Northville had a whopping 35 shots on goal in the match and only connected once.

"We did have offense, we just stopped ourselves a lot," Yezback said. "We hit the goal post, we hit the cross bar, we hit other players, we missed wide on point-blank shots — we did everything except put the ball in the net. It was almost like a comedy of errors."

The only goal of the game came at the 26-minute mark of the first half. Ed Petit passed the ball ahead to Hinz on the right wing, he made a crossing pass to Brad Maliszewski and he headed it in. It was Maliszewski's eighth goal of the season.

"We should have scored more but I was happy about all our chances," Yezback said. "Central is much improved and to get 35 shots on goal against a good defensive team is impressive. But to connect on just one was disappointing."

The Mustangs (5-2-2 overall, 3-1-1 in the WLAA) now face the prospects of being underdogs in six of the next eight games.

## Sunglasses filter out harmful rays

You've seen them — athletes wearing sunglasses

And you've probably sneered at them. Called 'em "hot dogs." Or, at the least, thought they were showboating a bit too much to fit your definition of what constitutes good sportsmanship.

But don't be too quick to think poorly of those people who wear sunglasses while swatting the tennis ball or driving the golf ball down the fairway.

A study by John S. Werner, a professor of psychology and neurosurgery at the University of Colorado at Boulder, shows that prolonged exposure to the ultraviolet rays of the sun can damage the eyes.

And Dr. Paul K. Douglas of the Michigan Optometric Association says that having the right sunglasses for outdoor sports can make a big difference in performance.

Werner studied eight patients with corrective lenses to correct cataracts. One of the lenses was treated to filter out ultraviolet rays; the other was not.

After five years, Werner's research showed that the eye without the treated lens had lost sensitivity equal to 30 years of aging.

Dr. Martin Levin of the Northville Vision Clinic said the message of Werner's study and other research is clear. "The message," said Levin, "is to be smart about exposing your eyes to the sun."

"Lenses which have been treated to filter out ultraviolet rays are beneficial and should be utilized," he added.

In terms of enhancing athletic performance, Douglas noted that glare can sometimes be so blinding that you literally can't see what you're doing if you don't wear sunglasses or have an inadequate pair.

"Various types of sunglasses have different advantages so it pays to match your sunglasses with your sport," Douglas continued.

"Optometrists can offer advice about non-prescription as well as prescription sunglasses and special sports eyewear like ski and swim goggles.

Levin said basic to all sunglasses should be lenses that are industrial-strength, impact-resistant, block out 75 to 90 percent of light, and have maximum ultraviolet protection.

Medium or dark gray tints do not interfere with color perception, an important consideration in many

sports, including golf and fishing.

Levin said polarizing sun lenses are good choices for water sports, tennis, biking and jogging because they combat glare reflected from water, sand and roads.

Photochromic or light-sensitive lenses may be the choice for those who encounter changing lighting conditions, such as skiers, golfers and hunters. These lenses get darker or lighter depending on the amount of light available.

Tinted lenses with a mirrored, metallic coating are designed for intense glare and work well with both water and snow sports.

Levin reported that optometrists are becoming increasingly concerned about the effect of ultraviolet rays

on the incidence of cataracts and related retinal problems.

"One of the things being discussed right now is that the ultraviolet rays are worse now than previously because of the depletion of the ozone layer," he said.

Wearing dark-colored sunglasses is not necessarily the answer either, Levin advised. "Wearing dark glasses will color the light and make you feel more comfortable, but they don't necessarily filter out the ultraviolet rays," he said.

The key is to have glasses which have been treated to reduce the amount of ultraviolet rays reaching the eye. Even standard eyeglasses can be treated to filter out ultraviolet rays, and there's very little change in the actual coloration of the lenses.

The effects of ultraviolet rays on the skin are well-documented. Makers of sun tan lotions are required to list the degree of sun blockage on the bottle.

Levin said no such designation currently applies to sunglasses, which typically are marked as having been treated to block out ultraviolet rays but with no indication of the potential strength of the blocking power.

"There's an effort under way right now to develop some type of coding which will let consumers know how much protection their sunglasses provide from ultraviolet rays," he reported.

At this point, he added, a system to rate blocking power has not been achieved.

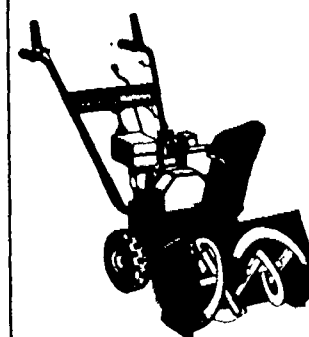

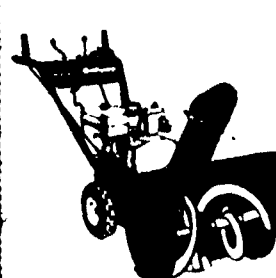

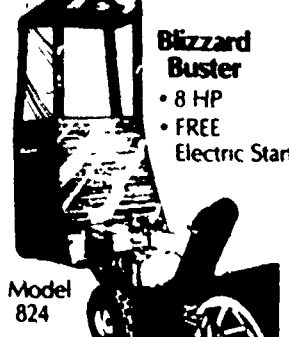

## Vaccines can prevent illnesses and deaths

Each year thousands of illnesses and deaths occur from diseases that could be prevented by vaccines. Many people think that vaccinations are just for children or for traveling, but adults also need routine vaccinations. Diseases that may be prevented by vaccines include diphtheria, tetanus, influenza, pneumococcal pneumonia, measles, rubella and hepatitis-B.

Tetanus is perhaps the best known vaccination for adults. Tetanus is a bacterial infection acquired from a dirty wound. The disease causes severe muscle rigidity. Although rare, tetanus still occurs and can be fatal. Most people recognize a tetanus vaccine as a shot given after a wound occurs. However, the time to get the vaccine is before a wound happens.

For an adult who has never received a tetanus vaccine, a primary immunization consists of three doses. The first two doses are given four weeks apart and the third is given six

to 12 months later. Thereafter, a booster is recommended every ten years.

Tetanus is usually given in combination with a diphtheria vaccine. Due to widespread immunization, diphtheria, a potentially fatal disease, is now quite rare. Boosters are recommended every 10 years.

Influenza (flu) is a viral illness causing fever, respiratory infection, muscle aches and headache. During epidemics, influenza is responsible for many hospitalizations and deaths. The influenza vaccine is given annually in mid-autumn. The vaccine is particularly recommended for anyone with a chronic disease (heart, lung or kidney problems or diabetes) and for all people age 65 or older. Health care professionals should be vaccinated to prevent spread of influenza to their patients. Of course, influenza vaccine is available to anyone who wishes to reduce their chance of having influenza. This vaccine only protects against influenza. It will not prevent the common cold or infection

gastroenteritis (misnamed "stomach flu"). Remember, October is flu shot month.

The pneumococcal bacteria can cause pneumonia and meningitis, an infection of the lining of the brain. Antibiotics are available to treat these infections, but in some people the infection can be overwhelming and become fatal. The pneumococcal vaccine only needs to be given once in a lifetime. It is recommended for people with chronic diseases and persons age 65 and older.

Measles and rubella, once expected childhood diseases, are becoming quite uncommon. All children are now vaccinated against them. Thus, outbreaks of measles usually occur among young adults in their late 20s to 30s. A measles vaccine is recommended for adults born after 1956 who have not had the disease or vaccine.

Rubella can cause birth defects if a pregnant woman acquires the infection. It is particularly important that women of childbearing age be vac-

inated against rubella. Blood tests are available to screen whether you are immune to measles and rubella.

Hepatitis-B virus causes an infection of the liver. This infection can cause cirrhosis of the liver and even death. The virus is transmitted by contact with contaminated blood or body secretions. A hepatitis-B vaccine is recommended for adults who are at high risk for infection. These include health-care workers, dialysis patients, active homosexual men, users of intravenous drugs and clients and staff at institutions for the mentally retarded. The vaccine is given in three doses.

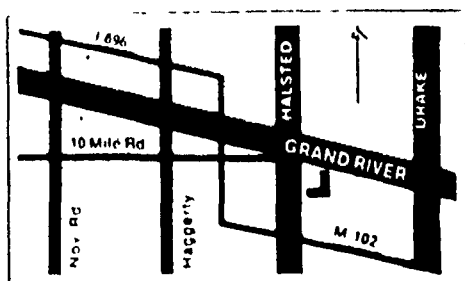
Vaccines not only protect the individual, but also help control the spread of diseases.
