Gans said in an interview following the vote on the rezoning of the proper1 also did not even say a word." Not talking during the discussions is not the point. Any commissioner on the board during a vote on a rezoning has an obligation to represent the township residents concerns during discussion of the issue. If a commissioner feels it he may be seen as having a direct in he may be seen as having a direct in there.

Gans said that discussions concer ning the area, particulariy after the planned Ward Presbyterian Church is built, will directly affect his property

$\because$ On. a recommendation 'from Walters, the council decided to call a public hearing to consider using some CDBG) money to und the said Gran tiese guidelines. Walters said some preliminary contacts indicated that this work would cost between $\$ 5,000$ and $\$ 15,000$.

The proposal to be considered a the hearing is a transfer of $\$ 10,000$ in installation at city Halianned elevator tural standards project. The elevato is designed to improve barrier-lree ac cess between floors at the municipa
building.
The standards will definitely be helpful if the city is to continue its pat ern of historically appropriate redevelopment. And in a very tight city oudget year, to have this work done in the near future.

Now, the caution: The councl should keep the whole idea of the CDBG program in mind. We agree tha the elevator project is not a pressin concern until the library moves ou and general city funclions are spread ed soon though, and we hope the council does so as soon as possible - like with next year's money.

In addition, using CDBG money for Historic District architectural stan dards is really stretching the pro glock grant program, in principle, is supposed to improve disadvantaged areas or meet some vital community need. Central Northville is hardly disadvantaged, and the community standards But the program goals are being eroded all across the country and the city surely deserves what it can get. It's up to county and tedera officials to qualify or disqualify a proposal, and we won't be surprised if this one makes the cut.

The proposed project is a good idea and worth pursuing. But there are some concerns here, and they're worth some discussion.

There appears a time in every young per use drugs comes often not at the best of times or when the student is feeling rea low or maybe in a mood of celebration. To make the correct decision they need the lacts and often parents or concerned ohers they know little or nothing about.
In essence to not talk about drugs is to say it's okay. To not talk about how druga Is the same, in many cases, as condoning it and looking the other way. Here are some tips for parents on what to say to kids about alcohol and other drugs.
First choose what educators refer to as a "teachable moment". This is simply a relaxed time when you can bring up the ed to a "formal talking to". My advice is to not walt until you discover your chice is ex perimenting, because in my experience their use may be well progressed and beyond the talking stage.
coood times to talk might be when you see drinking and other drug situations on TV or in magazine ads, if someone smokes in a
restaurant or if you're serving alcobol as part of a holiday meal Surveys haye revealed that children and drugs from TV and movies. However, many of these perceptions may be wroag. You can dispel some of the myths by making sure your child understands:

- While the media portrays drtinkers and smokers as attractive and talented, in real talentede are just as many attractive and - Alcohol and other drugs carn tull jud ment and muscle control and they don't solve problems
- Drinking is an activity for adults only, but drinking won't turn a minor into an
adult. Only time and experience can do that. Drinking is illegal for mloors and so is' smoking in many states. This is a very important issue for parents to address because kids are allowed to smoke and
drink "once in a while" in many homes. What parents need to realize is that what they are saying in essence, and what kids hear, is that it's OK to use drugs and in most cases this use is carried on outside the home in-excess. This is a fact. Young peo-
ple should not be allowed to use cigarettes or liquor underage and in my opinion whether they should use at all is an issue for each family to discuss.
- People shouldn't depend on alcohol and
other drugs to help them make friends. To
grow into well adjusted adults, children nust learn the social stills involved in making friends without depending on who your child's friends are and talk to the parents, if you're not already involved in actively visiting other homes.
- Everybody is not drinking smoking and doing drugs. About 10 in 100 people have tasted alcohol or tried drugss by the ime they are in sixth grade.
The key is education first by parents. Know about drugs, take a class or seminar or call the Student Assistance Program at library.
