Park millage defeated by city voters

A local park development millage passed in Northville Township but failed in the city, meaning that it falls overall — at least for now.

Township voters, who had another local millage on the ballot, favored the park millage by a vote of 3,697 to 3,322. City voters rejected the tax almost two-to-one, with 1,853 voting against and 1,076 in favor.

The proposal was set up so that it had to pass in both the township and city if it was to pass overall. The

defeat in the city means that the proposed tax — a .9-mill, two-year increase — will not be levied anywhere.

But the story is not over. Recreation Director John Anderson said Wednesday that the Recreation Commission will continue to pursue development of the park. The commission was scheduled to meet Wednesday night to discuss its options.

That discussion might mean

Township passes police millage

Unlike the defeated community park millage, a two-mill increase dedicated solely to the township police department, passed was by Northville Township voters.

Manned with a 57.9 percent margin of approval, Township Police Chief Ken Hardesty said Northville voters have demonstrated that they want to maintain law and order in the community.

"Recent Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) statistics show that Northville is the fifth safest community (in the tri-county region) and I think voters indicated they want to maintain and build on that," Hardesty said.

Specifically, the police millage question was approved by 4,101 voters to 2,986 residents against the proposal.

Approval of the millage, which was previously renewed in 1986 for 2.2 mills, will raise the police millage

tax rate to 4.2 mills and generate an extra \$557,000 for the department.

One mill is equal to one dollar of tax per \$1,000 of assessed value. For a resident whose house is valued at \$100,000 and assessed at \$50,000, a two-mill increase will translate into a \$100 tax hike.

Hardesty said not only will the police department be able to balance the 1989 budget, but consideration will be given to adding two officers to the current 17 member staff.

He added the police department will be able to function within the new millage limit at least until the next election, which won't occur until 1992.

Township Supervisor Georgina Goss said she never doubted whether the police millage would pass "because the residents of Northville Township are used to excellent police service and they knew that the millage is needed to maintain those

Northville home raided for drugs

Confiscation of more than two kilos of cocaine from a Northville Township resident's home and business last week resulted in criminal charges against him.

Resident Zoueflickar (Joe) Nehmeh, who lives in the Maple Hill subdivision off of Six Mile Road, was arraigned Friday on a charge of delivery and possession of a controlled substance. River Rouge resident Alonzo Maxie, an employee of Nehmeh's, was charged with three counts of delivery and possession of a controlled substance. Both men pled not guilty to the charges.

Bond was set at \$350,000 for Nehmeh and \$150,000 for Maxie. Both men were able to post bond and are scheduled to face a preliminary examination before 26th District Court Judge Raymond Charron on Nov. 16 at 9 a.m. in River Rouge.

If convicted of the charges, the defendants could be sentenced to life in prison.

Wayne County Sheriff Robert Ficano said an undercover sheriff's deputy bought a kilo of cocaine from Nehmeh at his business, Nehmeh Car Center on 11246 Jefferson in River Rouge, at about 3 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 3. The deputy paid \$23,000 for the cocaine, Ficano said.

Nehmeh and Maxie were both arrested, and another five ounces of cocaine was found at Max-

ie's residence in River Rouge.

"After we arrested (Nehmeh) we executed a search warrant" at the couple's home, Ficano said. They live at 41200 Aldea, just off Six Mile Road near the Northville Township Hall.

"We seized 30 ounces of cocaine, \$500 in cash, and 10 weapons — two handguns and eight rifles," Ficano said. Three cars were also seized. The 30 ounces of cocaine could have a street value of \$70,000 or \$80,000, Ficano said.

Ficano said Nehmeh appears to be "a pretty prominent (drug) distributor" in the downriver area.

New test results in for radon

New radon test results show a smaller problem in Northville than found in earlier figures, but still a wider problem than average in the state.

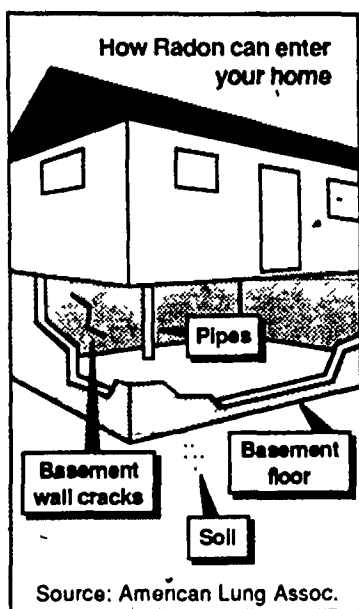
Figures released Tuesday by the American Lung Association of Southeast Michigan (ALASEM) show about one in three homes in the 48167 ZIP code with a radon gas level above four picocuries per liter. Sixty homes were tested.

The level of four picocuries has been set by the federal Environmental Protection Agency; levels above four are recommended for additional testing and possible corrective action (see related story). Health officials believe prolonged exposure to high concentrations of the gas cause lung cancer.

ALASEM Project Director Alex Johnson said the new Northville-area results are cause for action, but not panic.

"We certainly haven't done a huge sample," he said. In the City of Novi, a larger sample was taken with about one-fourth above the standard, Johnson said.

"Basically, about one in three homes we tested in the area are



above four (picocuries), and we haven't seen any above 20," Johnson said.

Above 20 picocuries, the EPA recommends action to correct the problem. Above 200 picocuries, the action should be immediate, Johnson said.

"Don't panic, because we aren't seeing emergency-type numbers in Michigan. We are seeing high numbers, but they're the kind that you can take your time to fix, and you don't have to spend a lot of money to fix them," Johnson said.

Last week, the private Radon-One testing company announced that 23 of 31 Northville homes tested — 74 per-

Call 911 Emergency line is in

Starting Monday, the emergency phone number for the City of Northville — and all of Oakland County — will be 911.

Anyone in the city requiring emergency service — fire, police or medical — can just dial 911 starting Monday. In Northville Township, the emergency number stays 911.

Both the city and township will benefit from a new, enhanced system for locating the source of an emergency call. And phone customers in both jurisdictions will find a new, 20-cents-per-month

charge on their phone bill to pay for it.

Both the City of Northville and Northville Township will be participating in Oakland County's Enhanced 911 network, which is going on line several months ahead of a planned Wayne County-wide system.

The enhanced system automatically routes an emergency call to the appropriate jurisdiction to handle the call. In other words, if you call 911 from the City of Northville, the call automatically goes to the Northville Police Department. If you are in Holly or Rochester — or anywhere else in Oakland County, whether or not you know what city or township you're in — a 911 call will send you to the right place.

In addition, the enhanced system has an almost-instant readout of where the call is placed from. Each dispatcher in the system has a computer which shows the address of the source of the call about two seconds after contact is made.

So if you are driving up Haggerty around 14 Mile Road and need emergency service, things will be a lot simpler than in the past. Instead of trying to figure out if you are in Novi, Farmington Hills, West Bloomfield Township or Commerce Township — and then finding the correct department's phone number and

trying to figure out your location — just dial 911. The call will automatically go to the right jurisdiction, where the person answering the phone will get a readout of the address you're calling from, before you

even speak a word.

The enhanced system is therefore expected to be particularly useful to children, the elderly, the hearing impaired and people who don't speak English.

A call to 911 can get any type of emergency service — fire, police or

medical. For any non-emergency calls, though, the regular department seven-digit numbers should be called. The non-emergency number for City of Northville police and fire is 349-1280. The non-emergency

number for Northville Township is 349-9400.

Although Northville Township's emergency number has been 911 for some time now, the enhanced system will be new Monday.

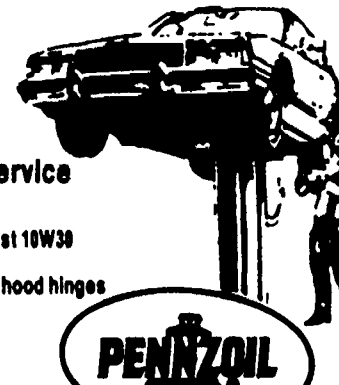

NEWS BRIEFS

HIGH SCHOOL HONOREE — Northville High student Lori Bernardo is one of 23 seniors named as Wayne County regional finalist in the 1988-89 U.S. Senate Youth Scholarship Competition.

The students are eligible for a \$2,000 scholarship and a trip to Washington, D.C. which will be awarded to two state finalists by the State Board of Education in November.

The Wayne County regional finalists were recognized in an awards ceremony at the Wayne County Intermediate School District on Nov. 2.

Selections were based on leadership, scholastic standing, articulateness, achievement, and community involvement.

FORD PLANT MEETING SET — A special meeting of the Northville Planning Commission is scheduled for 8 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 29, to consider preliminary data and ideas for future uses of the Northville Ford Plant.

The architectural firm Quinn Evans is scheduled to discuss alternatives for using the building at the meeting. Earlier this year Ford announced that the plant will close at the end of the year.

COATS FOR KIDS — A metro-area Coats For Kids program kicked off this week, with the help of 56 One Hour Martinizing Dry Cleaning stores, including the Northville location in the Northville Plaza on Seven Mile Road.

Program officials are asking residents to "help warm up Detroit" by donating coats their children have outgrown, so they can be given to needy area youngsters. Through the end of November coats can be dropped off at the Martinizing stores, which will dry clean them for free. The coats will then be distributed by the Salvation Army.

NEW HORSE COUNCIL PRESIDENT — The Michigan Horse Council elected its 1989 officers at the group's annual meeting Nov. 1 in East Lansing, and Northville resident Bev Grunheid was named president of the organization. TAKING ON THE TRASH — Wayne County officials are seeking public input on the new revision of the county's Solid Waste Management Plan.

The plan is designed to help the county achieve a goal set by Executive Ed McNamara of reducing solid waste by 75 percent by the year 2000. Officials consider it important to reduce the amount of waste produced because of rising costs and declining space in landfills.

Copies of the plan are available at the Wayne County Department of Public Services, 415 Clifford in Detroit.

Election count delayed in township

While local officials paced the Northville Township halls in anticipation of key vote totals, a breakdown of the election counting machine delayed posting of the results until early Wednesday morning.

The computer breakdown led to an all-night odyssey for election officials, with township votes finally being tallied in a Dearborn warehouse.

After the polls officially closed shortly after 8 p.m., township election personnel immediately encountered problems with a pre-computer check, according to Township Clerk Thomas Cook.

Cook said the Nova 3 tab ballot counter, which has been the election machine used by the township since 1984, would not accept and count any of the ballots.

"The ballot machine ran rough in

the primary election (on Aug. 2), so I had a representative of the company come out and take a look at the machine two weeks ago and everything seemed OK," he said, adding that a Texas-based company markets and services the Nova 3 machine.

Cook said a Nova 3 repairman, who was in Detroit to make sure their system ran smoothly, was unable to fix the township's machine "because he was required to stay in Detroit until all the votes were counted."

Following three hours of tinkering with the machine and numerous phone calls to the Dallas company, Cook said he was able to locate a similar election machine in Dearborn.

Dearborn officials, who use a more advanced election counting machine, gave Northville officials the OK to use their spare Nova 3 in a computer warehouse at about 12:30 a.m.

After re-packing and sealing all ten

precinct boxes, a four-member group of township officials, led by deputy clerk Eunice Switzler, were accompanied by two police officers to the warehouse for the ballot counting.

Switzler said the group arrived in Dearborn at about 1:45 a.m. and began counting ballots between 2:30 and 3 a.m.

Other people present for the ballot counting included County Commissioner Susan Heintz, Township Attorney Ernest Essad, the clerk and deputy clerk of Dearborn, two members of the Wayne County corporate counsel and one representative each from the Carl Pursell and Lana Pollack campaigns.

"The warehouse was filled with computers and we really did the best we could," Switzler said. "We were under a lot of pressure because I was advised there could be a congressional recount. So, we all got a little 'uppy' about counting ballots."

Switzler said by the time all of the ballots were counted and returned to the township it was around 7:45 a.m., Wednesday.

That made it a very long night for officials interested in races which were extremely close — particularly the 2nd congressional district race between Pursell and Pollack.

Also, Recreation Director John Anderson and Township Police Chief Ken Hardesty stayed to the wee hours of the morning for results on their respective millage questions, only to have to wait until the next day.

Cook, who said the current township election machine is one of only a handful approved by the state, noted the snafu provided "everyone with a little more suspense."

"But I'm gonna have a new machine before we conduct another election I can tell you that," he added.

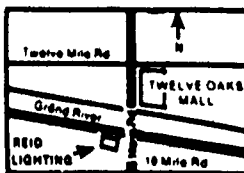

Few surprises and heavy turnout mark local elections

High turnout from Northville city and township voters helped the community back quite a few winners in Tuesday's national and statewide elections, but local balloting went against the grain on a few races.

The township reported 74 percent voter turnout and the city reported 71 percent. A majority of voters in both the township and the city voted for Republicans in every partisan race in which a Republican was running.

Both municipalities helped in George Bush's victory over Michael Dukakis in Michigan and the nation. Both also went with the majority, on all four statewide ballot proposals. But local voters were nonconformist on some races, most notably in supporting Republican challenger Jim Dunn over incumbent Democratic Senator Don Riegler.

Here are the unofficial local vote totals for partisan elections and state ballot issues (key races are covered in separate stories elsewhere in this issue):

• President and Vice Presidential electors — In the township, 5,475 for Bush and Dan Quayle; 2,050 for Dukakis and Lloyd Bentsen; 48 for Libertarians Ron Paul and Andre Marrou, one for Workers League Ed Winn and Barry Porster; two for Lenora Fulani and Mamie Moore; three for Eugene McCarthy and Florence Rice; and one for James Warren and Kathleen Mickells.

In the city, 2,149 for Bush; 942 for Dukakis; 19 for Paul; seven for McCarthy; two for Fulani; and one for Warren.

• U.S. Senate — The township cast 4,016 for Dunn; 3,325 for Riegler; 97 for Libertarian Dick Jacobs; 16 for Workers Against Concessions Sally Bier, and three for Independent Mark Friedman. The city went 1,532 for Dunn; 1,407 for Riegler; 23 for Jacobs; 2 for Bier; and one for Friedman.

• State Board of Education — The township cast 4,849 for Republican

The township reported 74 percent voter turnout and the city reported 71 percent. A majority of voters in both the township and the city voted for Republicans in every partisan race in which a Republican was running.

Barbara Dumouchelle; 4,550 for Republican Marilyn Lundy; 1,785 for Democrat Lawrence Crawford; 1,671 for Democrat Stephen Economy; 291 for Tisch Independent Citizens Robert Tisch; 101 for TIC Fanyane Kaufman; 92 for Libertarian James Clifton; 85 for Libertarian Virginia Cropsey; 29 for Workers Against Concessions Annette Johnson; and 21 for WAC Verna Baird.

The city went 1,905 for Dumouchelle; 1,774 for Lundy; 791 for Crawford; 761 for Economy; 75 for Tisch; 26 for Kaufman; 24 for Clifton; 24 for Cropsey; four for Baird; and three for Johnson.

• University of Michigan Board of Regents — The township voted for Republican Deane Baker, 4,789; Republican Clifford Taylor, 4,298; Democrat Nellie Varner, 1,818; Democrat Thomas Lewand, 1,778; Libertarian James Hudler, 133; and Libertarian John Salvette, 115.

The city voted for Baker, 1,856; Taylor, 1,716; Varner, 841; Lewand, 764; Hudler, 33; and Salvette, 33.

• Michigan State University Board of Trustees — The township cast 4,584 for Republican Tom Reed; 4,338 for Republican Edward Liebler; 1,846 for Democrat Robert Weiss; 1,814 for Democrat Barbara Rom; 179 for

Libertarian Dianne Szabla; and 164 for Tisch Joseph Kozlowski.

The city's totals were Reed, 1,807; Liebler, 1,676; Weiss, 804; Rom, 789; Szabla, 43; and Kozlowski, 21.

• Wayne State University Board of Governors — The township voted 4,623 for Republican Richard VanDusen; 4,199 for Republican Hattie Massey; 1,748 for Democrat Vicki Krenn; 1,738 for Democrat Murray Jackson; 163 for Tisch James Kaufman; 129 for Libertarian Jack Freeman; and 111 for Libertarian Randy Szabla.

The city went 1,853 for VanDusen; 1,624 for Massey; 784 for Jackson; 727 for Krenn; 36 for Freeman; 34 for Szabla; and 29 for Kaufman.

• Proposal A, to ban Medicaid funding of abortions — The township was in the majority, with 4,115 yes and 3,344 no. The city was as well, with 1,632 yes and 1,440 no.

• Proposal B, to include crime victims' rights in the state constitution — The township and city both helped the passage. The township voted 6,136 yes and 1,111 no. The city voted 2,442 yes and 525 no.

• Proposal C, environmental bonds — Again, both municipalities helped

passage. The township was in favor by 5,890 to 1,354. The city endorsed it 2,410 to 572.

• Proposal D, recreation bonds — In the township, 4,611 yes and 2,488 no. In the city, 1,825 yes and 1,103 no.

• Wayne County Prosecutor — The township and city both voted for a losing effort from a Republican challenger. In the township, the vote was 4,392 for Republican Donnelly Wright Hadden and 2,354 for Democratic incumbent John D. O'Hair. In the city, Hadden got 687 and O'Hair got 466.

• Wayne County Sheriff — Democratic incumbent Robert Ficano got 3,704 votes in the township and 626 in the city. The only challenger, Libertarian Robert Gale, took 520 in the township and 35 in the city.

• Wayne County Clerk — In the township, Republican challenger Lawrence Schweiger polled 4,207 in a losing effort; Democratic incumbent James Killeen took 2,468. In the city, Schweiger took 651 and Killeen took 515.

• Oakland County Executive — City voters in Oakland County endorsed incumbent Republican Dan Mur-

phy's reelection bid by a vote of 1,207 to 325 for Democratic challenger William Wolfram.

• Oakland County Prosecutor — In L. Brooks Patterson's vacated seat, Northville voters cast 1,100 for Republican Dick Thompson in a successful race against Democrat Barry Kraemer.

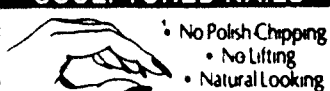
• Oakland County Sheriff — Northville cast 1,261 in a successful reelection for incumbent Republican — and favorite son — John Nichols. Democratic challenger Tommylyle Dizotell got 282.

• Oakland County Clerk and Register of Deeds — Incumbent Republican got 1,117 votes from Northville in a successful reelection bid. Democratic challenger Diana Trivax took 362.

• Oakland County Treasurer — Another incumbent Republican and favorite son, C. Hugh Dohany, took 1,129 Northville votes to help win reelection. Democratic challenger Steve Allen got 356.

• Oakland County Drain Commissioner — Incumbent Republican George Kuhn took 1,125 to help with reelection; Democratic challenger Douglas Kuthy got 358.

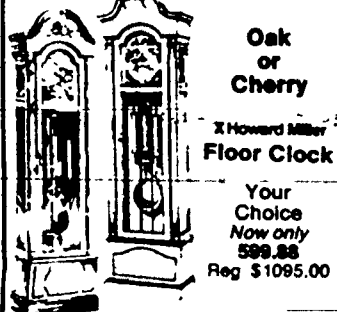

High voter turnout marks local election

By BRUCE WEINTRAUB

A heavy voter turnout marked the 1988 election in Northville Township, despite the absence of opposition in any of the township office races.

Township Deputy Clerk Eunice Switzer said 7,871 or about 74 percent of the registered township voters voted in Tuesday's election.

Calling the voter turnout high, Switzer said she expected a turnout of between 65 and 75 percent.

"Voter turnout is usually higher in Northville Township than the national average of around 55 percent because of the type of residents living here," she added. "Township residents are typically intelligent and they want to exercise their right to vote."

In addition to deciding on the police and park millage questions, township voters were asked to decide on all

local officers, although each of the incumbent Republican candidates ran unopposed.

All of the winning candidates won four-year terms in office.

Township Supervisor Georgina Goss won reelection by receiving 5,782 votes, Clerk Thomas Cook and Treasurer Richard Henningsen also won reelection and received 5,716 and 5,652 votes respectively.

All four Township trustees won reelection, with Richard Allen leading the way by receiving 5,268 votes. James Nowka finished second with 5,187 votes followed by Thomas Handyside with 5,131 votes and Don Williams with 5,157 votes.

Finally, both Township constables on the ballot won election to the four-year post with Edward Mroz getting 5,088 votes and James Schrot receiving 5,026 votes.

Voters OK tax hike

A proposal to double the Wayne County Intermediate School District tax for special education seemed headed for passage Tuesday, just two months after a narrow defeat of the same question.

With 86.6 percent of the vote counted Wednesday morning, a one-mill increase for special education was leading county-wide with 286,487 in favor and 210,375 against. Township voters were in the majority, but the city overall voted against the proposal.

In the township, 3,612 cast votes in favor of the millage and 3,158 voted against.

In the city, the vote was 1,217 in favor and 1,451 against. The proposal carried the part of the city in Wayne County, 613 to 566, but lost in Oakland County, 604 to 885.

The entire Northville School District is included in the Wayne County Intermediate School District.

For a \$100,000 home assessed at \$50,000, passage of the request will translate into a \$50 tax increase each year for an indefinite period of time.

The money will go to fund center special education programs run through the intermediate school district. Center programs are for "low incidence" special education students — those whose special needs occur so infrequently that individual districts cannot efficiently set up programs to meet those needs. About 45 students from Northville participate in center programs.

The passage will also mean a small financial benefit to the Northville School District itself, since the intermediate school district has been charging local units extra money to make up for revenue shortfalls. The Northville district will save between \$25,000 and \$50,000, at least for a year or so, until rising costs take over.

Wayne County Intermediate School District officials expect to ask for another millage increase in the early 1990s as costs continue to rise.

This millage request suffered a narrow defeat in the August primary election. Voter turnout this time around was about two and a half times higher than in August.

Local voters deny county road tax

Local officials are considering what to do next after the not-surprising failure of the county's proposed \$25 vehicle registration fee.

The question failed by an overwhelming margin throughout Oakland County. In Northville, Oakland County voters turned the fee down 1,369 votes to 291.

In Novi, it failed by a 9,699-2,434 margin. Novi Township voters turned it down by a slimmer margin — 16-13.

If approved, it would have channeled approximately \$20-million into road improvements over the next 10 years, by placing a \$25 fee on all county vehicle registrations. That would have meant about \$500,000 per year for the City of Novi and \$56,000 for the City of Northville.

County Commissioner John Calandro (R-Nowi) said the proposal was "doomed to fail," even though he supported the concept — albeit reluctantly.

"No one likes to impose a tax on

themselves and I think you saw evidence of that," Calandro said. "But really, there was a failure on the part of a lot of people... to get the questions from the local units of government answered early on."

"It's really in the hands of the legislature and the governor now," Calandro said. "The question is whether or not the governor will come forward and give Oakland County what it has been asking for."

Calandro said the countywide two-cent gas tax is likely to resurface, as well as discussion of impact fees and a wide variety of other road financing concepts.

Oakland County Road Commission officials are estimating anywhere from \$700 to \$900 million in revenue shortfalls over the next 10 years. Those types of estimates spurred action on a legislative package to help solve the funding disparity last year. The \$25 vehicle registration fee was the only part of the funding package to make it through the state legislature.

another park development millage question on a ballot in the future," Anderson said.

"The first thing we're going to do is evaluate why it didn't pass. I'll be looking for suggestions from the Recreation Commission on what they think," Anderson said. "We'll try to analyze it, and once we figure out where we went wrong, we'll try to go right."

Anderson said he had no immediate thoughts about why the millage failed in the city.

If it had passed in the city as well as the township, voters in both municipalities would have paid .9 mill for two years. On a home worth \$100,000 and assessed at \$50,000, passage of the request would have

meant a new \$45 tax for each of two years. A mill is \$1 of tax per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

Passage of the millage would have raised an estimated \$732,600 to develop a community-owned park site on the west side of Beck Road between Five Mile and Six Mile.

The Community Recreation Department's plan for the site includes three lighted ball diamonds, two soccer fields, three outdoor volleyball courts, restrooms, a concession stand, spectator seating, a parking lot and a maintenance shed.

This is the third failed attempt to fund development of the park. Before the millage vote, two grant requests for state money were turned down.

Anderson thanked all the voters who "looked to Northville's future" and voted yes on the proposal.

Voters OK county gambling ban

Out-Wayne County voters — including those in Northville and Northville Township — said no to gambling Tuesday by approving a measure which effectively bans casinos throughout the county.

A proposal to take any type of gambling banned in the City of Detroit and extend the ban throughout all of Wayne County passed handily Tuesday. With 86.6 percent of the vote counted Wednesday morning, the proposal led in balloting by a count of 328,843 to 188,354.

Both township voters and city voters in Wayne

County strongly endorsed the proposal.

In the township, the vote in favor was slightly more than three-to-one, with 5,279 votes in favor and 1,727 against. In the city's Wayne County precinct, the vote was better than two-to-one, 889 to 350.

The proposal — which came under some criticism for confusing wording — extends any gambling ban approved by Detroit voters to all of Wayne County. It was put on the ballot by the

Wayne County Commission and supported by Northville's representative, Susan Heintz.

Passage of the proposal cannot affect Northville Downs or other horse racing tracks in the county. Horse racing is regulated by state law, which supersedes county and local ordinances. Officials said the proposal also cannot ever end charity bingo games or similar events, since — even if Detroit ever banned such events — other local communities could pass their own ordinances specifically allowing them.

Local state Rep. Law captures reelection

Incumbent State Rep. Gerry Law (R-Plymouth Township) handily won reelection Tuesday against a challenger from Northville Township.

With some precincts still not reporting Wednesday morning, the Wayne County Clerk's office reported Law

ahead in the race by 17,203 to 5,077 for Democratic challenger Jeanne Stempien. Libertarian challenger Jeffery Hampton, also a Northville Township resident, had polled 188 votes.

The win returns Law to Lansing for another two-year term in the state House of Representatives. It will be

his fourth consecutive term in the House.

Law easily won in both the township and city of Northville. In the township, the vote was 5,275 for Law; 1,937 for Stempien; and 76 for Hampton. In the city, totals were

Law, 825; Stempien, 428; and Hampton, 13.

Law's district, the 36th, includes the Wayne County part of the City of Northville; all of Northville Township; all of the City of Plymouth Township; and about a third of Canton Township.

Incumbent congressmen wins reelection

Congressman William Broomfield (R-Lake Orion) was re-elected to the U.S. House of Representatives, easily outdistancing Democratic challenger Gary Kohut, a Troy attorney.

Broomfield appeared to have secured another large victory Wednesday morning.

He beat Kohut by a 9,117-2,784 margin in the City of Novi and a 1,232-350 margin in the Oakland County section of the City of Northville. He also

took Novi Township 74-9.

The large 18th District extends from the center of Oakland County, northeast into parts of Macomb County, and southwest into a portion of Livingston County, including Novi and Northville.

Broomfield was first elected to the U.S. House in 1956 and holds a ranking positions on a pair of House committees.

Kohut said he was not surprised by the strong

showing of the veteran congressman.

"There is no question, nationwide, it has been tough to beat the incumbents," Kohut said while reviewing early results at the Oakland County Board of Commissioners Auditorium.

A final, official tally on the Broomfield-Kohut race wasn't expected to be completed until late Wednesday, according to county officials.

State Rep. Bullard wins fourth term reelection

State Rep. Willis "Bill" Bullard (R-Nowi) swept to victory in the 60th District Nov 8, earning his fourth term in the Michigan House of Representatives.

Bullard beat Democratic challenger Kurt Thornbladh, a South Lyon attorney, by a wide margin.

With several precincts not yet reporting by press time Wednesday, Bullard had secured a large victory, sweeping all of the communities reporting by approximately 2:30 a.m.

Bullard won big victories in Novi (8475-3006) and the Oakland County

section of the City of Northville (1155-372).

He also came away with victories in Highland (4535-1803), Milford (3500-1284), South Lyon (1321-698), Rose Township (1067-512), and Novi Township (72-9).

Thornbladh, making his first bid at public office, collected about 27 per-

cent of the vote reported Wednesday morning. Bullard had him beaten by an approximate 20,125-7,684 margin district-wide, with results not yet in from some parts of the district.

Neither candidate could be reached for comment by press time Wednesday.

Calandro easily wins return to county board

Oakland County Commissioner John Calandro kept mum and made few predictions in his race with challenger Leo Foley, but as expected, had little trouble in his bid for re-election to the Oakland County Board of Commissioners.

Calandro (R-Nowi) defeated Foley by a 10,564-4,202 margin, with several precincts not yet reported by press time Wednesday. That vote count represents a 72 percent to 28 percent victory for Calandro.

change and I'm very happy to see that I represent a majority of the views of the district," he said.

Calandro won Novi by a 8,219-2,977 margin — 73 percent of the vote and swept the rest of the district. Lyon Township results weren't yet available Wednesday morning.

Foley, a South Lyon attorney and two-time challenger for the seat, was able to muster 863 votes in South Lyon — still not enough to match Calandro's 1,125 there.

Calandro also won Novi Township by a 70-6 margin, and swept the Oakland County section of the City of Northville by a 1,150-356 margin.

Calandro was re-elected to a fifth term on the Oakland County Board of Commissioners with the win.

Foley could not be reached for comment.

"I'm very pleased to have the opportunity to serve the people of the 24th District again," Calandro said Wednesday morning at the Oakland County Commissioners Auditorium. "The next few years are going to be very important — with solid waste, and transportation issues coming up."

Commission OKs rezoning request

As part of the Haggerty Road corridor's continuing development, the Northville Township Planning Commission recently recommended approval of a rezoning request by Stratford Development Company for a small office complex.

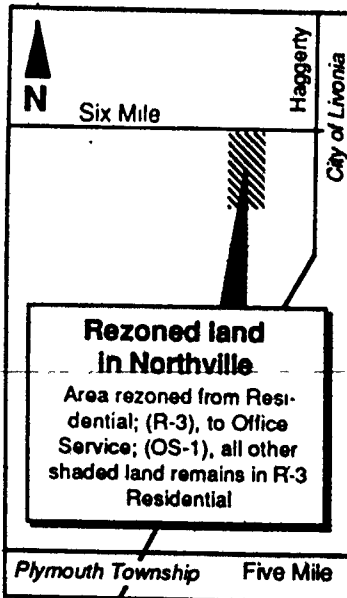
By a unanimous 8-0 vote, commissioners approved Stratford's rezoning from residential (R-3) to small office service (OS-1) for the 7.5 acre parcel, located on the southwest corner of Haggerty and Six Mile roads.

Despite granting the rezoning, commissioners sent a message to developers by making it known that they do not want rezoning to "creep" any farther along Six Mile Road.

"We were told by the township planning consultant (Claude Coates) that the side lot line rule can be legally supported as a place to stop or change zoning," said Planning Commission Chairman Charles DeLand.

He added that by adhering to Stratford's side lot line, the planning commission intends to stop the rezoning of residential land along Six Mile Road.

"We're trying to be consistent with development along Haggerty Road



and if we (the planning commission) allow rezoning to creep westward along Six Mile Road, then we'll be moving commercial development with residential housing," DeLand said.

"We want a residential community, and the community itself has told us that," he added.

Township Planning Director Carol Henry said since one parcel of Stratford Development's land was already zoned small office, the planning commission made the proper decision.

"All three parcels are needed to make a quality development, so I think the right decision was made," she said, adding small office zoning provides a good "buffer" between nearby residential and large office on the northwest side of Haggerty and Six Mile roads.

Henry noted the planning commission has recently discussed the possibility of conducting another study of the master plan with respect to the Haggerty Road corridor, although no firm discussion dates have been set.

Stratford Development President Michael Thomas said he is pleased with the planning commission rezoning decision, but added he is not certain when, or if, he will build an office complex in Northville Township.

Thomas said he currently holds an option to buy the property, but has not decided whether to purchase it.

He added that he has until January to make the decision to purchase the property.

At present, the purchase agreement calls for the property to be sold for about \$420,000 per parcel or almost \$1.3 million for the entire 7.5 acre piece of land.

"I agreed to pay \$4.25 per foot, which looking back I probably overpaid for the property because it is not worth that much, especially with present market conditions taken into account," Thomas said, adding a bidding war made the price exceed what the property was worth.

He noted that along I-275 from Eleven Mile Road to Six Mile and along Haggerty Road from Ten Mile Road to Six Mile there is "an absolute glut of office space."

"We don't plan to build a vacant building, especially when the demand isn't there," Thomas said, adding even if he decides to purchase the property he does not intend to construct an office building within the next three years.

"There will have to be several years of inventory into the area and demand will have to exceed supply before I decide to begin construction," he said.

Gans votes on issue

A sidelight to the recent rezoning of Stratford Development's property on Haggerty, is the proximity of Planning Commissioner Marvin Gans' property to the newly rezoned land.

According to figures obtained from the Northville Township Planning Department, Gans' property is less than 500 feet from the newly rezoned land, located on the southwest corner of Haggerty and Six Mile roads.

Gans, a township planning commissioner for the past 11 years, said he has owned the 3.51 acre parcel of land, on which his home is built, for over 21 years. His land is currently zoned residential (R-3).

He added that if he had owned the rezoned property in question, he would have excused himself from the commission's vote on the issue.

"During the (rezoning) discussions I also did not even say a word," Gans said, adding the rezoning to office service is consistent with the township Haggerty Road master plan.

He admitted however, that if and when Ward Presbyterian Church is built, the rezoning of Stratford's property could have an

impact on his land.

"I did not see any conflict of interest in Stratford's rezoning with respect to my property, and when developer Larry Garon presented a rough outline of the area at a previous commission meeting I did sit down off of the commission," Gans said.

In general, fellow planning commissioners said they had no problem with Gans not excusing himself from the rezoning vote.

"I personally have no problem with him voting on the issue," said Commissioner Richard Allen. "If someone has a financial interest that's one thing, but if they don't that's another."

Allen also said he was not approached by Gans in an attempt to sway his vote on the rezoning.

Planning Commission Chairman Charles DeLand said legally, unless in immediate proximity to the property in question, a planning commissioner is allowed to vote.

DeLand added that "immediate" means directly next door to the property. He also said Gans did nothing to try and sway his vote on the issue.

Gans is not directly next door to Stratford Development's newly rezoned land.

Township officials review district rules

Only months after altering procedures regarding the formation of special assessment districts (SAD), Northville Township officials said they might have to look into making more changes.

That disclosure comes on the heels of one case pending against the township regarding an SAD, and another group of homeowners who are disgruntled about an SAD being formed in their area.

"We're looking at the possibility of having two petitions, one asking the township to form the district and the other after the feasibility study has been completed, so residents know how much the assessment will be," said Township Supervisor Georgina Goss.

She said this type of plan would eliminate confusion as to homeowners signing petitions without knowing how much the district will cost.

At present, after receiving a petition and having its signatures verified, the township sends the matter to the water and sewer commission.

The water and sewer commission conducts a feasibility study within 30 days of receiving the matter, and provides affected residents with the information.

Trustee Thomas Handyside, who chairs the water and sewer commission, said that after providing residents with the information, he takes an informal vote of the homeowners.

"If 51 percent of the landowners still want the district, then the matter will be referred to the board," Handyside said. "By this method we are giving people who were original petition signers an opportunity to change their mind."

If approved by the water and sewer commission, the matter is sent to the township board for approval. A hearing is then conducted, at which time a

project study is assigned. Following two more hearings the district is put in place.

Some residents however, claim they do not get an opportunity to change their mind when the matter is before the water and sewer commission.

Township resident Jacob Israel, who is in the middle of forming a SAD, said to his knowledge a majority of residents have objected to their district, but it is still continuing before the board.

Resident Norman Warner, currently involved with seven other homeowners in a case against the township over formation of a SAD, said a second-petition process "would help tremendously."

"If we had been able to see a feasibility study before going ahead with the project this (the case pending before the Tax Tribunal) never would have happened," Warner said.

"Once people are made aware of

costs and designs, they are free to make a decision," he added. "Then people know the facts, unfortunately we didn't know the facts or enough information to make a decision."

Warner said the only statement on the petition he signed was a preamble, which states the residents intention to form a SAD.

Goss said the institution of a second petition would eliminate any confusion as to the number of homeowners still in favor of the district, following the feasibility study.

Township Attorney Ernest Essad said he knows of a couple of communities in Michigan who conduct a two-petition district.

Essad said although SAD's are currently run by state statute (public act 188 of 1954), it would be possible to set up a legal way to use two-petitions.

"Residents would still have to pay for feasibility study costs if they vote not to form a district, but my guess is the township can adopt a two-petition procedure," he added.

Board OKs contracts for 12 new teachers

Twelve Northville Public School teachers were granted probationary contracts for the 1988-89 school year by the Board of Education.

Assistant Superintendent Burton Knighton said eight of the new teachers were hired for the K-12 program and four for the special education program.

In addition, five of the K-12 teachers were hired for new positions as were all of the special education teachers.

"I feel that we have a very fine cadre of new teachers this year and I am recommending them to the board for probationary contracts," Knighton said.

Northville Schools Superintendent George Bell said the district receives many applications for teaching positions each year and is very selective about hiring teachers.

"We have a very intense screening process for selecting new teachers," Bell said. "Considering the intensity of this screening process, I believe this is a fine crop of teachers coming in."

Knighton said the State Tenure Law requires a two year probationary period for teachers, but only one year of probation is required for teachers who have already received tenure in another Michigan Public School district.

He noted of the 12 new teachers, nine will serve a two year probationary period and three a one year period.

Bell said each of the 12 teachers will be evaluated after one year. Those serving a one year probationary period will be recommended for tenure or not, at that time.

He said teachers serving a two year probation period will be recommended for a second year and after the second year will be recommended or not, for tenure.

The nine board approved teachers serving a two year probationary period are Jane Benes, Paul Durkee, Robin Ellingsworth, Sharon Hubbard, Christine Lalinsky, Barbara Lowry, Roxanne Minch, Anne Niemi, and Lynda O'Shea.

The three teachers serving a one year probation are Chris-Anne Kelly, Janice Loeffler, and Janice Nagle.

City sidewalk repair slated for spring

Homeowners in the City of Northville whose sidewalks need repair are still going to be required to have the work done, but they are getting a little longer to do it.

Notices were expected to be sent out soon informing property owners who needed to repair sections of sidewalk, City Manager Steve Walters said Monday. Getting the

mailing list together was somewhat difficult because of the long process and because, in a few cases, city records did not appear to match existing addresses or property lines, Walters said.

Once homeowners get a notice, they may choose to fix the problem independently or to wait and have the city do it. Residents will have

through the winter to decide which way to go, he said.

Any notified property owners who do not fix the sidewalks independently will automatically be included in the city repair program, and billed for the work.

Certain areas without sidewalks

will come before the City Council later this fall for decisions on whether the city will require sidewalks to be installed, Walters said.

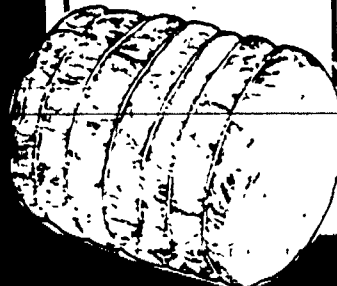

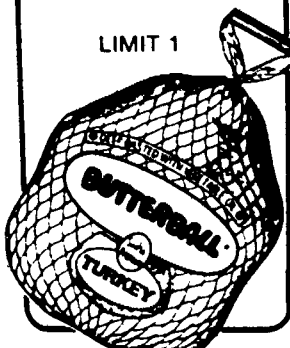

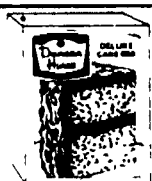

Talking eases crime hurt

Only two weeks after red ribbons were hung in downtown Northville to signal substance awareness, school officials are preparing to help the community deal with last week's drug raid in the township.

Following the raid by the Wayne County Sheriff Department, Maple Hill subdivision resident Zouefickar Nehmeh was charged with one count of delivery and possession of a controlled substance.

Neighbors said the Nehmehs have two children, age 10 and 2. They added that no family members have been seen in the Nehmeh home since Saturday.

According to Northville Student Assistance Program Coordinator, Charlie Stilec, reaction from the community with respect to the Nehmeh incident is already being expressed.

Stilec said a parent had already contacted him about how to discuss the incident with her children.

He noted some questions parents may have with respect to the drug bust, include: should we isolate our children from the family involved; should we talk to our children about the incident; and at what age should we discuss drugs with our children?

"I am basically telling parents that they need to sit down and talk to their children about the dangers associated with drugs," Stilec said, adding he recommends parents begin talking to their children at kindergarten age and up.

Stilec said Northville residents can turn this negative incident into something positive for the community by educating itself on how drugs affect a family.

"Parents can educate themselves from this type of incident by learning what coke and drugs are and what they can do to a family and community," he said.

Northville Youth Assistance Director Mary Ellen King said the community, through a variety of programs conducted by herself, Stilec and the Northville Action Council, have begun to address substance abuse.

"A few years ago I felt the community had blinders on, but with new programs in place I think we're making people aware that a drug problem exists in Northville," said Mary Ellen King, Director of Northville Youth Assistance (NYA).

King said children, especially those living in the vicinity of Nehmeh's home, will be most affected by the drug raid.

First and foremost, King said Nehmehs children should not be ostracized by the community "because they are not responsible for their parent's actions."

She added it is incumbent upon parents to be as open and honest as possible with their children when discussing the incident.

"To hold in feelings can be detrimental to children; getting feelings out is healthy," King said.

She added that a parent support group meets every Tuesday from 7 to

8:30 p.m. at Moraine Early Childhood Development Center, to give parents an opportunity to learn how to talk and deal with children on a variety of issues.

"The parent's support group is run by two social workers and it gives parents an opportunity to bounce ideas off of each other," King said.

In dealing with the drug raid incident, King said specific warning signs parents should look for in their children include nightmares, anger and/or sadness.

She added parents with children experiencing these problems can call the Northville Youth Assistance at 344-1618.

"If the child is experiencing anger or sadness we will attempt to match them with a volunteer," King said.

"If the problem is more severe, then we will have individual counseling for that person."

A neighbor of Nehmehs, who asked not to be identified, said about 12 to 15 kids live in the immediate area of the raided home.

For that reason, Stilec said the community must face the reality of drugs "that it can happen to any of us."

"It is definitely sad what happens to a family when drugs are involved, because everyone's lives are hurt," Stilec said.

He noted that parents with questions about how to handle the situation with respect to their children may also contact, in addition to the NYA, NAC and himself, their local police departments, M-Care and Providence Hospital.

President-elect campaign in area

Vice President George Bush visited Schoolcraft College Friday, promising a roaring crowd that, with their help, they could be part of history.

"You can tell your grandkids," Bush said, "that one cool, kind of camp day, Friday in November, 72-hours-plus before the campaign ended, that you met with the vice president, that you helped him become president of the United States of America."

Enthusiastic Bush supporters, including many from Northville, packed the Schoolcraft gym to the rafters Friday for the chance to see the vice president and participate in the final few days of the campaign. They cheered every element of the Bush message, giving full endorsement to his request for a "mainstream mandate for common sense."

Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson was the master of ceremonies, introducing several high school bands and a long list of state and local Republican officials. State Senator R. Robert Geake (R-Northville Township) and U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) each said a few words, as did former Governor George Romney and state Senator John Engler.

Geake listed other officials in attendance, including state Representative Gerald Law, Wayne County Commissioner Susan Heintz, Nor-

thville Township Supervisor Georgina Goss and Northville Mayor Chris Johnson, whose name drew the biggest cheer. ("We had a lot of Northville people here," Johnson later said. "And I brought a lot of family.")

Actor Gabe Kaplan — who said he is an independent voter — spoke in support of Bush and drew laughs with an imitation of Mike Dukakis.

Bush localized his rally speech with words of praise for Schoolcraft President Richard McDowell — "one of the nation's outstanding community college presidents" — and the junior college national title earned by the Schoolcraft women's soccer team — "that's not bad either."

He also had high praise for U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth), one of many prominent state and local Republicans in attendance.

"He doesn't get all the headlines and he knows how to get something done in Washington. The last thing we need is another liberal guy (in Congress)," Bush said. "Elect Carl Pursell again. We need him."

The basic theme of Bush's speech was the desire for a "mainstream mandate," something the crowd seemed willing to do its part to provide. He spoke of a "great divide" between himself and Dukakis, calling the showdown "the clearest philosophical choice of any election in modern times."

"I do represent the mainstream values of America: family, faith,

neighborhood. These are the mainstream values," Bush told the crowd.

Speaking of the current economic situation, Bush described his national agenda as building on past accomplishments. The listeners cheered each element of his plan as he mentioned it.

"This country is not going backwards, we're going forwards, and we want to keep it that way," he said. "The best answer to poverty is a job in the private sector."

But possibly the biggest cheer of the day greeted Bush's best-known campaign promise: "I will keep your taxes down. I will not raise taxes."

After Bush spoke, the gym exploded with red, white and blue balloons and confetti as Bush left the stage. The members of the audience appeared uniformly glad they had come.

Northville resident Lonna Lemmon brought her sons Chris and George. Once they got there, they all enjoyed the experience and she said the trip was "well worth it."

The event gave them a great firsthand view of a presidential campaign, she added. "I think it's important they see all the work. It's not all fun."

Raid finds cocaine in house

The arrest of Nehmeh and Maxie is the result of a three-week investigation by the Sheriff Department's Narcotics Task Force, which Ficano said was "tipped off" by sources whom he would not disclose.

Northville Township Police Chief Ken Hardesty said he was asked by the Wayne County Sheriff Department to send a uniformed officer to the Nehmeh home on Thursday night to serve a warrant.

"Our officer served the warrant without incident," Hardesty said, adding all drug related incidents are handled by either the Western Wayne Narcotics Department or the Wayne County Sheriff.

Maple Hill residents said they were surprised and shocked by Nehmeh's arrest.

"I had no idea whatsoever what was going on in their (Nehmeh's)

house and honestly hope they won't be coming back," said neighborhood resident Jeanette Hagerdorn. "They seemed nice, but I just had no idea."

Hagerdorn said the Nehmehs moved into their home on Aldea a little more than three weeks ago.

"We were at a toy party the night they (the Nehmehs) were arrested and I saw the police come in and tear apart their home," she added. "All of us at the party were shook up and a little nervous."

Hagerdorn noted about 12 to 15 kids live in the immediate vicinity of Nehmeh's house and said she is scared about what could have happened.

"I heard they had 10 guns in their home," Hagerdorn said. "Imagine what could have happened if the police didn't catch them sooner and all the children were playing outside. This would become a totally unsafe area."

One of Nehmeh's neighbors, who asked not to be identified, said she talked to Nehmeh's wife two hours before the police raided the home.

"She (Cindy Nehmeh) came over here at 3:30 p.m. and brought her two-year-old child with her," the neighbor said. "I thought she was nice in coming over and thought nothing suspicious."

The resident said she allowed her children to play with both of the Nehmeh kids (ages 10 and 2), but found out something startling after the police raided the home.

"My seven year old son told me that after the police left the home he remembered seeing Nehmeh's wife carrying down a box full of guns that day they moved in," she said. "I thought to myself 'Oh my Gosh.'"

The neighbor said Nehmeh's wife was in the home on Saturday but no one has been back since.

District to get guidelines

The Northville Historic District may be getting a formal set of standards for architecture in the area.

The Historic District Commission is responsible for, among other things, reviewing and approving the architecture of projects planned for the city's central Historic District. The idea is to ensure that new work preserves the appearance and heritage of the area.

But the commission does not now have a full, formal set of standards for what does and does not constitute appropriate architecture in the district.

In a memo recommending that the council consider establishing standards, City Manager Steve Walters wrote, "This makes it difficult for applicants to know what limits they are working in, makes the review process appear somewhat arbitrary in some instances, and puts the Historic District Commission at a disadvantage in defending its position in some cases."

As we become more fully developed, there will be more pressure to build structures on scattered vacant parcels, and to expand existing structures. Thus, such guidelines will be important for the future in protecting existing structures as the city's development approaches full density."

The City Council Monday night took the first formal step toward getting such a set of guidelines. Walters told the council that developing standards for Historic District architecture will probably cost between \$5,000 and \$15,000, depending on how specific the standards are and on how many varieties of styles are included.

Walters suggested that the city might be able to use Community Development Block Grant money to fund the development of the guidelines. Specifically, he recommended the council consider

transferring \$10,000 from CDBG money earmarked for a City Hall elevator to the architectural standards project.

The council agreed to hold a formal public hearing on the idea at its first meeting in December.

CDBG money comes from the federal department of Housing and Urban Development, and is administered locally through Wayne and Oakland counties. The program is designed to address and prevent slum/blight conditions in communities or to meet a community need where money is not available.

The city has used CDBG money in the past to expand the library, improve barrier-free access at the Northville Community Center, and conduct studies of the city's future.

Walters said the city hall elevator project will not really be needed until such time as the library moves out of the building and the amount of traffic between floors increases.

cent — had radon levels above four picocuries per liter.

Johnson said that Radon-One may have a large percentage of high radon readings in the area partly because those residents most likely to have a radon problem will suspect that, and buy test kits early.

"(Radon-One) is probably experiencing what we did when we offered these test kits for the first year," Johnson said. "I think the first people who took advantage of

the testing program were ones who suspected they have a problem.

"The bottom line is you still have a specific number of homes with a radon problem. One in three is still pretty significant. It's above the statewide average... but it's very different from what (Radon-One) has," Johnson said.

Radon is a colorless, odorless gas which forms naturally in the ground as part of the breakdown of uranium. It seeps into buildings through cracks and openings, and collects in areas with poor ventilation.

The most common test kit is a can-

nister of charcoal shaped like a shoe polish tin. After exposing the kit to the air for a few days, a lab reads the results. Kits are available at local hardware stores or from the lung association's Southfield office.

"Really, testing is a fairly easy process for people in the Northville, and Novi and Plymouth area," Johnson said. "The key is not to spend a lot of money and not to panic."

Nationally, the EPA blames high radon concentrations for 20,000 lung cancer deaths every year.

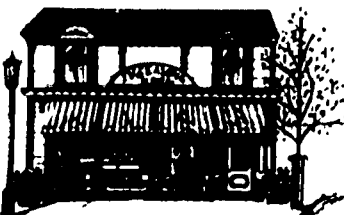

Winchester election

Northville Township, meet Ellen Sciba.

Residents, keep that name handy for future reference, as Sciba is running unopposed for the office of township supervisor in Winchester Elementary's Election 2000.

A member of the United Peace Party, fifth-grader Sciba said she is running for township supervisor "because it sounds like an interesting job."

The election is part of a school project designed to teach kids about the election process, according to Winchester Principal Kathy Morhaus.

"This (the school election) is a creative way for students to learn about the election and electoral college process," Morhaus added.

In addition to the township supervisor position, Winchester students can also run for United States representative and senator, state representative and senator, all township offices and so forth.

Morhaus said students wanting to run for an elected office were split up into two parties - American Freedom and United Peace.

"We created two parties so that kids would learn about the election process without voting the way their parents did," Morhaus noted.

Party platforms included achieving world peace and finding ways of eliminating poverty and homelessness.

A primary election was held last month to nominate one candidate per party for each office. Following the primary, candidates campaigned for their respective office by hanging signs throughout the school and shaking hands with supporters during lunch last Monday.

Fifth grade teacher Ron Bird, who coordinated the election project, said he came up with the idea during a brainstorming session with his wife.

"I was trying to think of a project that would get kids away from the election prejudices of their parents," Bird said.

The election project was divided into 10 steps, Bird said, ranging from political party research to campaigning for election to campaigning for office.

He noted the election vote was conducted Tuesday and the results were posted the following day.

"Classes were given one electoral college vote for every five students in the class," Bird said. "The kids really got into the election. It turned into a popularity contest, but that's the way real elections are too. So, with the electoral college votes it evened things up."

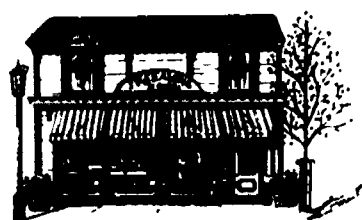
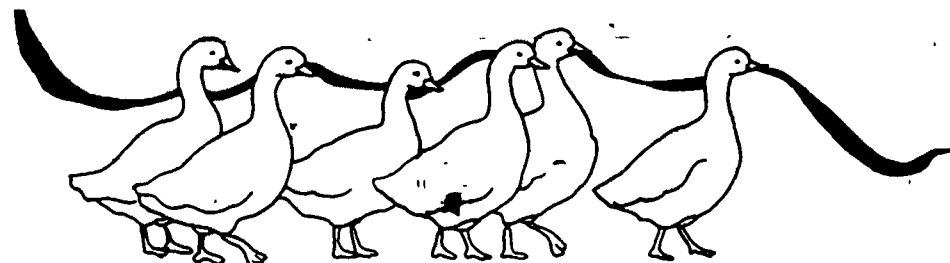

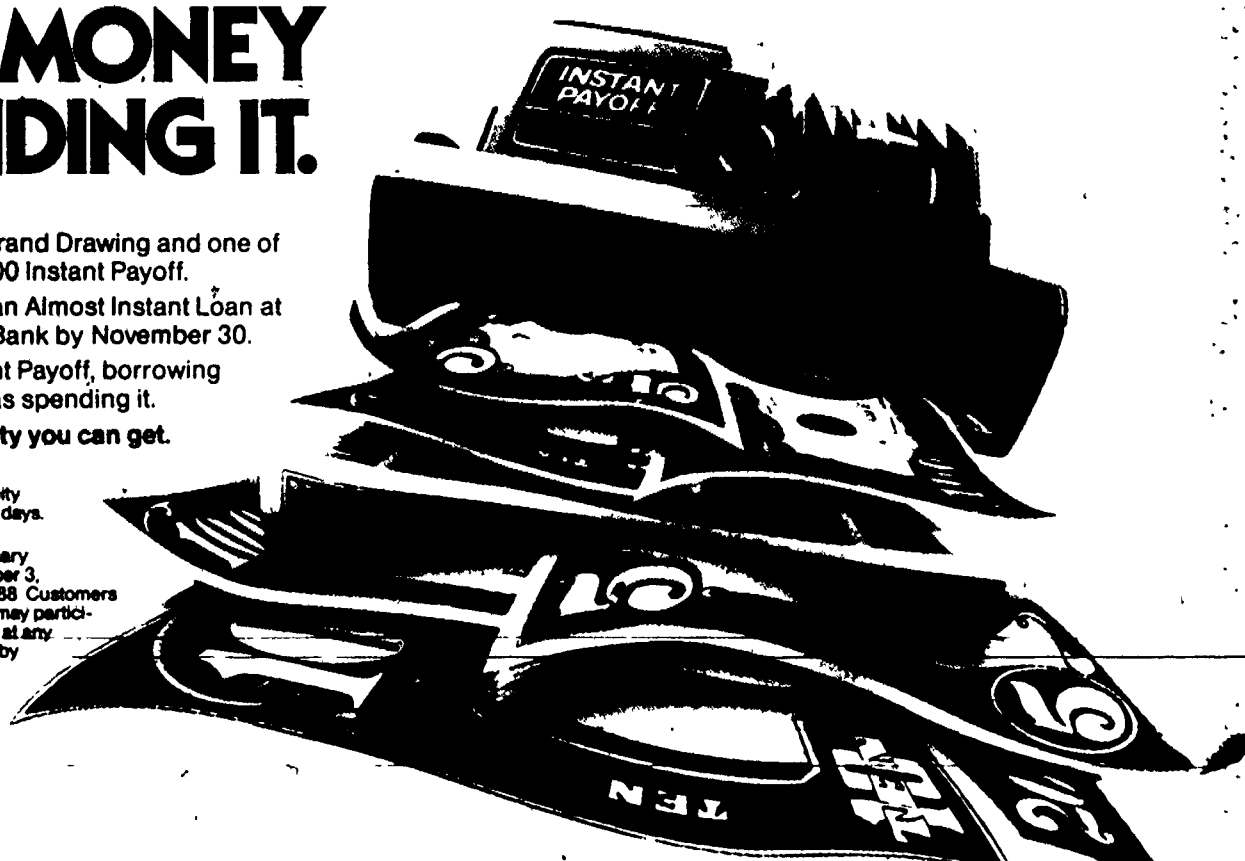

Planner should have used better judgment

The Northville Township Planning Commission recently voted to recommend approval of an office zoning request in the Haggerty Road-Six Mile area. Planning Commissioner Marvin Gans, owner of a 3.51 acre piece of property less than 500 feet from the site under discussion, voted for the rezoning request.

Commissioner Gans' decision not to step down from the board to avoid the appearance of any conflict-of-interest allegations was not a wise one. While he was within his legal rights, as he had no immediate financial interest in the property directly involved, he should have bowed to a greater consideration — namely that it was inappropriate for someone that close to a rezoning request to vote on it.

Gans said in an interview following the vote on the rezoning of the property. "During the (rezoning) discussions I also did not even say a word." Not talking during the discussions is not the point. Any commissioner on the board during a vote on a rezoning has an obligation to represent the township residents' concerns during discussion of the issue. If a commissioner feels it would be inappropriate to talk because he may be seen as having a direct interest in its outcome, he should not be there.

Gans said that discussions concerning the area, particularly after the planned Ward Presbyterian Church is built, will directly affect his property and as such he will not participate in

planning decisions regarding that future. "I did not see any conflict of interest in Stratford's rezoning with respect to my property, and when developer Larry Garon presented a rough outline of the area at a previous commission meeting I did sit down off of the commission," Gans said.

He should have carried that one step further. It does seem inappropriate for a planning commissioner to vote on a rezoning request for a piece of property that is less than 500 feet from his own. If Gans had stepped down from the board for the vote, the discussion and eventual recommendation for rezoning would probably not have changed. The vote was 8-0 to recommend a rezoning of the property. That is certainly not a close ballot requiring every single commissioner's participation.

Public officials would best serve the residents they represent if they took care to follow the letter of the law in spirit and in word. It is always better to err on the side of caution and ethics than to give even the appearance of selfish motives.

City should take care with lock grant money

In the never-ending tale of Northville Community Development Block Grant Money, the latest chapter is cause for both a word of agreement and a word of caution.

First, the agreement: A City Council move toward establishing written architectural standards for the Historic District is a fine and overdue idea.

At Monday's council meeting, the members heard from City Manager Steve Walters and Mayor Chris Johnson that the Historic District Commission does not now work with any formal guidelines for its architectural review. Part of the commission's job is to ensure that building design and related concerns fit in with the character of the Historic District. Without some specific, clear definitions, this is obviously tough. And trying to defend a given decision is even tougher.

On a recommendation from Walters, the council decided to call a public hearing to consider using some Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) money to fund the writing of these guidelines. Walters said some preliminary contacts indicated that this work would cost between \$5,000 and \$15,000.

The proposal to be considered at the hearing is a transfer of \$10,000 in CDBG money from a planned elevator installation at City Hall to the architectural standards project. The elevator is designed to improve barrier-free access between floors at the municipal

building.

The standards will definitely be helpful if the city is to continue its pattern of historically appropriate redevelopment. And in a very tight city budget year, CDBG money may be the only chance to have this work done in the near future.

Now, the caution: The council should keep the whole idea of the CDBG program in mind. We agree that the elevator project is not a pressing concern until the library moves out and general city functions are spread more between floors. It should be funded soon, though, and we hope the council does so as soon as possible — like with next year's money.

In addition, using CDBG money for Historic District architectural standards is really stretching the program's goals to the breaking point. The block grant program, in principle, is supposed to improve disadvantaged areas or meet some vital community need. Central Northville is hardly disadvantaged, and the community isn't about to collapse without these standards. But the program goals are being eroded all across the country, and the city surely deserves what it can get. It's up to county and federal officials to qualify or disqualify a proposal, and we won't be surprised if this one makes the cut.

The proposed project is a good idea and worth pursuing. But there are some concerns here, and they're worth some discussion.

Tragic experience

It was a nightmare.

The kind you never wake up from and must deal with every day.

Two weeks ago, on my way home from work, I turned on the radio and learned that Detroit Lion defensive end Reggie Rogers was involved in a car accident, which killed three people.

Oakland County Prosecutor Brooks Patterson later informed a stunned public that Rogers was allegedly driving drunk at the time of the accident.

Rogers now faces three counts of manslaughter and must deal with injuries that may end his football career.

As a police beat reporter for The Record, drunken driving arrests are nothing new to me. Each week I report on one, two, even three OUIL arrests.

Furthermore, the fact that an athlete was involved is not startling. We, as a society, have had to put up with this from athletes in the past. One need look no further than Detroit Red Wings Bob Probert and Petr Klima to substantiate this point.

What makes me cringe about the Rogers' tragedy is the public's tolerance with this behavior. How many lives will have to be lost before the public realizes how serious and dangerous drinking and driving is?

When I was a kid, I looked up to athletes as role models. I remember following the stats of Bob Lanier and Greg Landry for many years. To this day, I am still enamored with athletes. But what about today's kids who follow the stats of Probert and Klima and Rogers?

Athletes are human. No question. But as persons in the public eye should they live to a higher code because of their visibility? If so, can we as the public expect them not to cause accidents because of mixing alcohol and

driving?

True they are just like you and me. True they have a lot of pressure on them. But what about the three teens who lost their lives? Those who died one week ago will never be heard from again. All of their talents and dreams are wasted because a human being decided to drink and drive.

Get the hint. All of us lose in the Reggie Rogers tragedy. Kids lose a role model, the Lions lose a player, the public's trust is betrayed and three innocent teens lost their lives.

Rather than promote the importance of Klima and Probert returning to the Red Wing line-up, I believe we should look to the more important game — the game of life.

Recently I have worked closely with the local groups Students Against Drunk Driving (SADD) and the Northville Action Council (NAC). The people in these groups are hard working individuals who are dedicated to limiting and possibly ending drunk driving in this area.

We the public can only learn from this occurrence. Because a celebrity was involved the incident will be in the public eye. The only way to save the tragedy from being a complete waste is to not allow this to happen again.

SADD and NAC members are the real heroes. Kids would do well to channel their energy into these groups, rather than sports personalities. I'm not saying all athletes are bad. True, many aren't.

But what about the kid who idolized Bob Probert last year because he scored a lot of goals for the Red Wings? How will his father explain that Probert can't play this year because he's in trouble with alcohol and refuses to help himself?

I hope that kid doesn't live a nightmare like I had to.

Find time to talk about drugs, alcohol

This is another in the continuing series of columns written for the Record by Charles Stille, Northville High School Student Assistance Program Coordinator.

There appears a time in every young person's life when the decision to use or not to use drugs comes, often not at the best of times or when the student is feeling real low or maybe in a mood of celebration. To make the correct decision they need the facts and often parents or concerned others are not prepared to talk about a subject they know little or nothing about.

In essence to not talk about drugs is to say it's okay. To not talk about how drugs can maim and kill and leave one powerless is the same, in many cases, as condoning it and looking the other way. Here are some tips for parents on what to say to kids about alcohol and other drugs.

First choose what educators refer to as a "teachable moment". This is simply a relaxed time when you can bring up the subject of alcohol and other drugs as opposed to a "formal talking to". My advice is to not wait until you discover your child is experimenting, because in my experience their use may be well progressed and beyond the talking stage.

Good times to talk might be when you see drinking and other drug situations on TV or in magazine ads, if someone smokes in a

restaurant or if you're serving alcohol as part of a holiday meal.

Surveys have revealed that children and teenagers get a lot of their ideas about drugs from TV and movies. However, many of these perceptions may be wrong. You can dispel some of the myths by making sure your child understands:

- While the media portrays drinkers and smokers as attractive and talented, in real life there are just as many attractive and talented non-smokers and non-drinkers.

- Alcohol and other drugs can dull judgement and muscle control and they don't solve problems.

- Drinking is an activity for adults only, but drinking won't turn a minor into an adult. Only time and experience can do that. Drinking is illegal for minors and so is smoking in many states. This is a very important issue for parents to address because kids are allowed to smoke and drink "once in a while" in many homes. What parents need to realize is that what they are saying in essence, and what kids hear, is that it's OK to use drugs and in most cases this use is carried on outside the home in excess. This is a fact. Young people should not be allowed to use cigarettes or liquor underage and in my opinion whether they should use at all is an issue for each family to discuss.

- People shouldn't depend on alcohol and other drugs to help them make friends. To

grow into well adjusted adults, children must learn the social skills involved in making friends without depending on alcohol and other drugs. Parents — find out who your child's friends are and talk to the parents, if you're not already involved in actively visiting other homes.

- Everybody is not drinking, smoking and doing drugs. About 10 in 100 people have tasted alcohol or tried drugs by the time they are in sixth grade.

The key is education first by parents. Know about drugs, take a class or seminar or call the Student Assistance Program at 344-1825, your local mental health center or library. For your information: Maple Grove Community Education, 661-6170; Livonia Counseling 261-3760; Catherine McAuley Health Center 572-2470; Brighton Hospital 227-1211 extension 276; or Providence Hospital-Department of Psychiatry 424-3301 — all offer education programs and lecture series often free on the subjects of chemical use, abuse and dependency.

In all my years of working in this field one of the hardest taught lessons is to parents who thought they knew what their children were doing and didn't realize until use had become abuse or dependency that the signs they were seeing were not just normal adolescence but drug use.

Please get educated. An investment of your time might make the difference later.

Thank you Soviet Union, from Northville, Michigan, U.S.A.

Third grader Tim Schovers said he thinks the Russians were very generous in helping to save the whales.

"Dear Soviet Union," Schovers writes, "Thank you for saving the California whales with the ice breakers. I thought they were going to die. I was very happy when I heard the whales had been saved this morning. It was very generous of you to bring your ice breakers and save the whales."

Meanwhile, fourth grader Heather Lockridge took the whale rescue and applied it to a much larger perspective.

She writes "Dear Soviet Union, Let's not have wars, let's have peace. If we work together we could get a lot done. Just like when we freed the whales. Without your help we would have never got those whales out safely. And we did not have to ask you to volunteer."

Lockridge also noted she would like to meet a Russian girl, around her age, "and find out what she is like."

"I think it was important to help the whales because they might become extinct one day," Lockridge said. "And if we can work to help the whales, imagine all the other things we can help each other with."

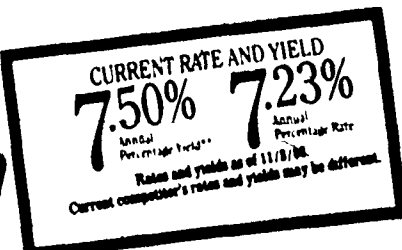

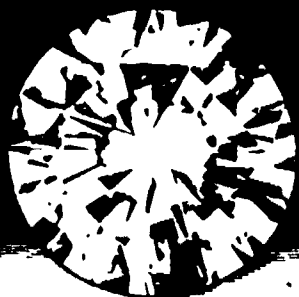

Milford optician keeping up with fast-paced times

Having "four-eyes" is out. Being "fashionable" is in.

Wearing eyeglasses today has taken on a new look indeed.

That's the trend Milford optician Tom Hein has seen during his 25 years in the business.

And in the current lightning-paced society of today, fashion goes hand-in-hand with fast service, which was exactly Hein's vision for Heinsight Optical Co., his wholesale eyeglass lab at 343 North Main Street in downtown Milford.

"People want fast service as well as a variety of frames at a reasonable price," said Hein, who noted that he has received a large and favorable response since opening his shop eight years ago.

According to Hein, many people are under the false impression that they are obligated to choose and pur-

chase their prescription eyewear from the frame selection offered where they have their eye examination.

"Better places will automatically give patients a written prescription, but some doctors won't unless they are asked. This is very misleading," said Hein. He added that existing laws in Michigan require doctors to release such information to patients.

Hein said a broader awareness of the distinction between opticians, optometrists and ophthalmologists is needed by the public at large in order for people to realize their options in eyewear.

For the record, Hein explained that opticians make and sell glasses. Optometrists test vision and prescribe corrective eyeglasses. Ophthalmologists, meanwhile, are further qualified for vision-correcting

surgery
"Lots of places offer a number of services or specialize in eye exams, surgery or contact lenses, but not strictly glasses," said Hein.

Heinsight's uniqueness centers around the concept of only grinding prescription eyeglasses.

As a wholesale lab, Heinsight stocks pre-ground, standard power lenses that are further fabricated for individualized prescriptions on the premises.

This enables the business to offer same-day service for most orders, opposed to the usual two- to three-week waiting period through a doctor's office.

Hein, who previously worked exclusively out of his brother's optometrist's office in Birmingham, decided to branch out into his own business when he realized that emergency cases weren't the only glasses that could be made in one day.

Variety in frames is a trademark at Heinsight. Some 700-900 selections are kept in stock at any given time, ranging in price from \$20 to \$500 each.

Eyeglasses have become as much of a fashion accent as jewelry, said Hein. This is particularly evident by

the number of famous designers who have entered the frame market — Anne Klein, Benneton, Cartier and Polo.

"This is directly opposed to the time when I first started out in the business. People didn't want to wear glasses then, and now they come in wanting to wear glasses when they don't even need them," laughed Hein, referring to the recent trend to don glasses with non-prescription plastic lenses.

When choosing which style and color of frame that best suits you, Hein suggested keeping in mind your skin tones, facial shape and size of your features.

"There are definite cosmetic illusions — such as making your nose appear smaller — that can be created with the right pair of glasses," Hein explained.

Demand for tinted lenses has decreased in recent years as a result of such discoveries.

"First of all, too much tint on the eyes can make them appear hollow, dark and baggy, especially on older people. Also, it looks artificial, and, today, the natural look is in," Hein pointed out.

In addition to fashion, modern technology has greatly influenced the eyeglass industry, most notably the

progressive, multiple-focal length lenses which offer a gradual change in power opposed to the sharp contrasts that bifocals offer.

Research concerning the harmful effects of the ultra-violet sun rays has led to a great availability in UV-filtered sunglasses, both prescription and non-prescription.

"This is a very important feature because when you don't have that protective coating on the glasses, the pupil is opened up and the inner eye is exposed to more UV rays than if you weren't wearing sunglasses at all," said Hein.

He added that without UV-filtering protection, the lens of the eye eventually turns brown and cataracts can result.

Ninety-nine percent of the lenses Hein makes are constructed of newer, light-weight plastic because it is harder to break and scratch and is considered safer than the safety glass of the past.

New strides have also been taken to accommodate and reflect people's lifestyles, said Hein.

"Some folks have two and three pairs of glasses, each for different purposes," noted Hein.

Glasses for reading, sports, out-

doors and computer work are just a few of the specialty glasses purchased, said Hein.

Hein, who resides in Milford with his wife and four children (two are Lakeland High School students and two attend Michigan State University), keeps up with the continually changing field by attending monthly, quarterly and annual meetings and seminars.

He is a member of the American Board of Opticianry, Michigan Society of Dispensing Opticians and the Optical Retailers Association.

Much of the Heinsight clientele has been built on longtime Milford residents as well as many of his Birmingham patients who have moved to this area.

Sharing time between his brother's Birmingham office and the Milford store, Hein is quick to credit the work of optician Carol Sawyer for maintaining Heinsight's high standards.

"At first I spent one day a week in Milford, but now I'm here at least three days. Carol has been a great asset for the five years she's worked for me," Hein said.

Heinsight is open daily from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. with special hours on Thursday (noon to 7 p.m.) and Saturday (10 a.m. to 2 p.m.).

'Merchants aren't required to grant refunds'

While laws protect consumers from misrepresented or defective goods, there are no laws that require merchants to offer refunds, exchanges or credits on merchandise they sell, warns the Better Business Bureau (BBB).

These voluntary practices have become wide-spread among retailers wishing to make shopping in their

stores as attractive as possible to customers. But consumers should never assume that merchandise can be returned unless this policy is specifically stated by the store. Return and exchange practices vary from store to store, so customers should understand the store's policy when making a purchase. Virtually all stores with exchange

or refund policies require that the product be returned within a specified time period, in new condition, with all packaging in place, and with the original sales slip.

Because of health laws, these return policies seldom apply to underwear, bathing suits or hats. The BBB emphasizes that

customers should not confuse return and exchange policies with product warranties. Products often come with stated or implied warranties from their manufacturers. Read the warranty before returning a defective product to the retailer.

Prevention best defense to lawsuit

"Employers should not wait until an employee files a lawsuit before considering what legal options are available to them," according to Steven J. Fishman, senior principle of the Fishman Group, a law firm representing management in employment law issues.

"Prevention is the only sure way to avoid lawsuits," he said.

The best form of protection is a detailed employee handbook and positive employee relations, Fishman recently told participants at a Michigan State Chamber of Commerce seminar. "These are the tools that help employers avoid situations that could put them at risk of

being sued."

Recent jury verdicts have awarded plaintiffs \$1 million for discharge without cause, over \$61,000 for discharge without warning for poor job performance, and over \$46,000 for discharge because of race and in retaliation for filing a complaint against an employer, Fishman says.

"To protect themselves, employers need to know the laws governing hiring and firing practices in Michigan, and how they apply to their business," Fishman said.

The Fishman Group represents employers in labor law, employment discrimination and employee relations matters.

Veterans eligible for financial benefits

You've served your country. Now, how does your country serve you? As Americans all over the nation hang out their flags in honor of Veteran's Day, this is the question you may be asking yourself.

The answer is not simple. But with a little bit of research and persistence, you may be surprised at some of the benefits available to eligible veterans. The Michigan Association of CPAs advises you to explore all options — from re-employment rights to VA-guaranteed home loan.

RE-ENTERING THE job market: First off, almost all veterans who are honorably discharged have re-employment rights. What that means is that you have a right to return to whatever job you left in order to join the military service.

As long as you apply to your previous employer within 90 days after your discharge, you are generally entitled to either your former job or one of comparable status. Don't assume that a disability automatically invalidates your re-employment rights. If you are disabled and cannot do the job you were previously assigned, the company must offer you another position of similar quality and compensation.

Reinstatement is just the first of your rights. Your company must also grant you any seniority, salary raises or benefits you would have earned had you remained in your job.

For example, if your company awards vacation time, promotions or pension benefits based on the number of years of employment, you must be credited for any time served in the military. In addition, you are protected against being fired or demoted,

without cause for one year.

What if the company has been sold or has moved to another state? As long as the company remains in operation, you have a right to your former job. And remember, if you have to relocate to a new state in order to return to your job, your moving costs may qualify for a tax write-off.

Now, you may have little or no desire to return to your previous job. In that case, the Veterans Administration (VA) can help you find a job. Disabled veterans get special consideration. If you register at a state employment service, make sure you remind them that veterans are supposed to get preference and priority in both job counseling and placement.

Another option is pursuing an apprenticeship in a trade such as carpentry, plumbing, fire fighting, aircraft mechanics or photography. Working as an apprentice, you will probably earn a minimum salary while learning the business and receiving technical instruction.

The payoff usually comes after one to six years, when you are ready to launch a career of your own. As a veteran, you may be entitled to receive monthly training allowances from the VA over and above the amounts you receive as an apprentice. The amount of the allowance will depend on the number of your

dependents and the year of your apprenticeship.

Finally, if you are interested in opening your own business, the Small Business Administration has a number of programs to help you transform your business plan into a reality, including financial and management assistance.

PAYING FOR an education: Depending on your years of service, you may be eligible for one of several different educational-assistance programs.

If you served 180 days or more between Feb. 1, 1955, and Jan. 1, 1977, you may be able to receive educational assistance under the old GI Bill. If, on the other hand, you served between Jan. 1, 1977, and July 1, 1985, you may qualify for the Veteran's Educational Assistance Program (VEAP).

To be eligible, you had to actively contribute to the fund while in the service. For each dollar you contributed — up to a maximum of \$2,700, the government contributes two dollars. At discharge, VEAP provides a tuition nest egg of several thousand dollars. Veterans of such fields as the Infantry may also be entitled to additional bonuses that can add up to as much as \$18,300.

The new Montgomery GI Bill covers everyone who has enlisted in the military since July 1, 1985. A contributory program similar to VEAP, the new GI Bill generally requires

participants to contribute \$1,200 to an education fund during their first year of service. If you met this requirement, the Government will give up to a maximum of \$9,600. Again, bonuses may be available if you served in so-called "Military Occupation Specialties."

If you are totally disabled, your spouse and children may also be eligible for educational benefits. In addition, if you belong to such organizations as the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars or the Retired Officers Association, you should find out about any scholarship funds available for your children.

BUYING A Home: If you are planning to buy a home or condominium, consider applying for a GI loan. If you meet the eligibility requirements, the VA will help you obtain a mortgage with a lower interest rate, a long repayment period and no down payment. (In some cases, however, a bank or other lending institution may require a down payment.)

The loan funds can also be used to repair, improve or build a home.

In addition, the VA insures that you have the right to pre-pay the loan at any time without incurring penalty fees. On the other hand, if circumstances arise which temporarily prevent you from making repayments, the VA encourages lenders to extend forbearance and indulgence.

TAX BENEFITS: The Michigan Association of CPAs reminds you that most veterans' benefits are not included in gross income. Included in this category are educational allowances, disabled veterans' pensions and veterans' insurance proceeds.

Counselors recommend retirement planning

If you work an average of 40 hours a week, you will suddenly find yourself with over 2,000 extra hours of free time per year when you retire.

Perhaps you think you'll pass the time by sleeping in, playing golf and taking those long vacations you've been looking forward to.

But retirement planning counselors advise people to think seriously about their retirement expectations long before that last day on the job.

Where do you want to live? How do you want to spend your time? Are you doing everything you can to ensure you will be in reasonably good health? Have you discussed your plans with other people in your life — spouse, friends, children?

"People often don't ask themselves these questions until six months into retirement," said Larry Slabotsky, pre-retirement planning services coordinator with the Quadrant Group, Inc.

To force his clients to consider their use of leisure time, he asks them to use a seven-day calendar to decide what they would do all day, every day for a week, if they were retired.

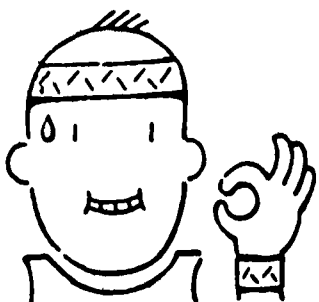
"This generation of people is really a phenomenon — it's the first generation of retirees. In the past people died with their boots on," he said.

Now, however, people who retire in their 50s or early 60s may live as much as a third of their lives after retirement, said Slabotsky.

Cindy Cole, vice president of REPS, a retirement planning service, said many people limit their options as they get older. She encourages senior citizens to pursue any goal they want, including furthering their education and going back to work full- or part-time.

No matter what you decide to do after reaching retirement age, the key to a satisfying retirement is pre-planning, the experts agree. Nestor Cole, president of REPS, says that when people plan ahead, "It takes the trauma out of retirement. They can hardly wait to retire."

Keep your working parts in order.

A tradition

Christmas Workshop a gift to kids

Ten years ago a group of dedicated volunteers started an annual tradition in Northville — the Children's Christmas Workshop. "Mill Race Village was just being formed," workshop coordinator Carole Jean Stockhausen said, "and the community was so supportive in coming out and making time to help... that we thought it would be really neat to do something for the community — to thank them. We decided to do it through the children."

The workshop will take place on Dec. 3 this year. Registration will be this Saturday, Nov. 12 beginning at 9 a.m. at 218 Dunlap. Children in first through sixth grade are eligible for the workshop. The workshop is a break-even affair, Stockhausen said, with the new registration price of \$10. Any leftover money will go to the Northville Historical Society.

For the first time registration will be accepted on a first-come-first-served basis for those who are present at registration only. In the past, checks for children not present during the registration were accepted. These checks will be taken only if spaces remain open once everyone is in line, up to the 150-child maximum, has been registered.

Two sessions will be held, one from 10 a.m. to noon, and from 1-3 p.m. Registration is limited to 150 children, 75 in each session. The workshop takes place at New School Church in the Mill Race.

The idea behind the workshop is two-fold, Stockhausen said. First there was the idea of introducing children to a different era, to how things were done in past days by other children, using the Mill Race buildings as a guideline for the time period.

The second goal was to allow children a chance to make gifts for their families, themselves. Children are to be dropped off at the Mill Race and adults should contain their curiosity and stay clear of New School Church, Stockhausen said, because this gives the children a chance to have one of the biggest holiday thrills of all — a secret present for members of the family.

Putting together the yearly workshop is truly a labor of love for the entire Stockhausen family — and for almost 50 other volunteers from all over the community. While many volunteers have children still eligible for the workshop, some have found it to be such a wonderful experience that they put in the time despite having children far beyond the age limits.

Children themselves are an integral part of the workshop volunteers, Stockhausen added. Girl Scout and Boy Scout volunteers help out at various stages of the workshop, and many past participants ask to be workers when they cross over to the seventh grade.

The workshop begins with volunteers explaining to the children that in days gone by money and stores were not as readily available to children. "They had to use things that were available around the house," Stockhausen said, "like pieces of cloth, logs from the fireplace — whatever they could find." So these types of materials are the basis for most of the gifts at the workshop.

"The biggest problem children have is making something nice that's a secret," she explained. Cadet Girl Scouts wrap all presents there — so secrecy is maintained. The children are offered the opportunity to make seven gifts. Not all children will complete all seven gifts in the two hour time span, and Stockhausen points out, not all will want to make all seven gifts. The choice is clearly with the child.

Workshop organizers try to plan for a gift from the kitchen, a gift for a man, a gift suitable for a man or a woman, a toy, and several other types.

"When the kids come home they are so excited," Stockhausen said.

"They have this bag full of surprises and they can hardly wait for Christmas."

"The beauty of it is the spirit, the excitement and the look on the children's faces," she said.

"I love it. It has just become Christmas to my family," she said. Stockhausen said the amount of preparation that goes into making the workshop possible is truly amazing. "My dad, I don't know what I'd do without them," she said referring to the number of men who contribute their time and talents sawing and painting and teaching at the workshop.

There are several things that parents can do to help out the volunteers, Stockhausen noted. First, if a child cannot attend the workshop due to illness, the best thing to do is to send another child who did not make the registration cut-off, in his/her place. No waiting list is kept, so an alternate should be found from within the neighborhood. No child should come to the workshop hoping to get in. That never happens and Stockhausen said it just leads to one very disappointed child.

Second, parents should take care to stay out of the workshop building. The whole point to the delight of the children is the fact that the presents are truly secrets from the family — things that they worked on and made themselves. By attempting to peek into the church parents can only take away the mystery.

Third, anyone who uses two pound coffee cans could really help out next year's workshop by donating them to the cause. Stockhausen said anyone is welcome to leave the cans on the porch of 218 Dunlap — anytime they're passing through, because the cans are the hardest things to collect for the workshop.

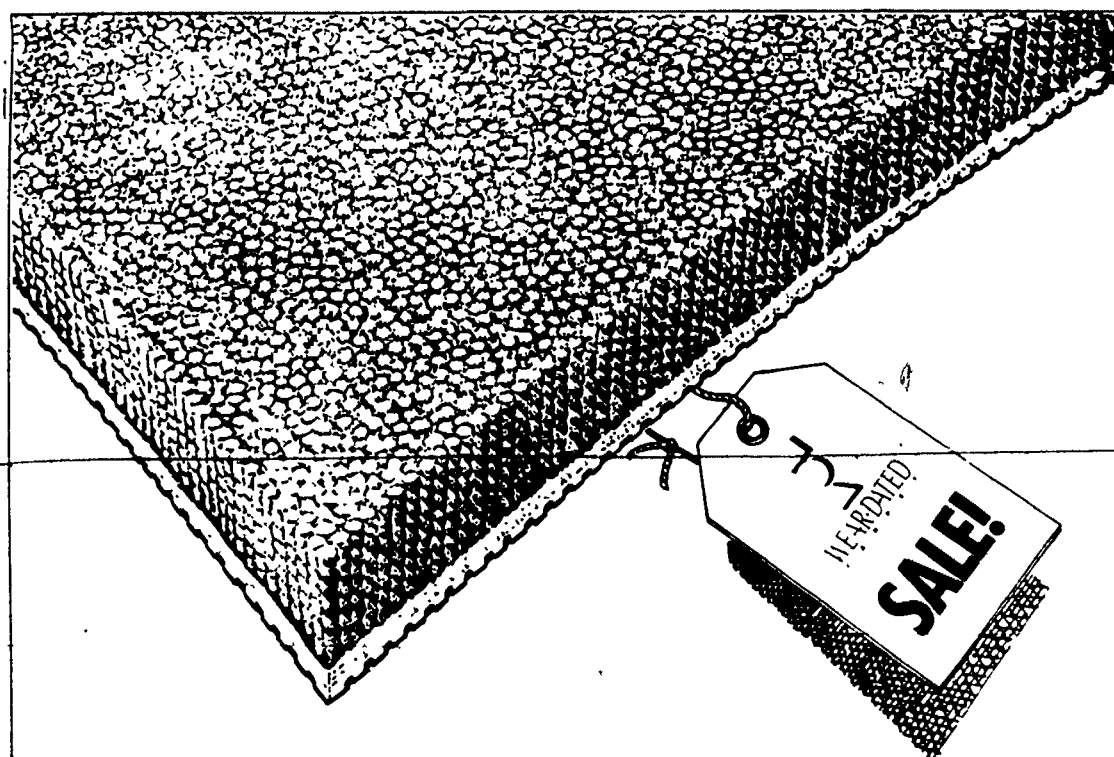

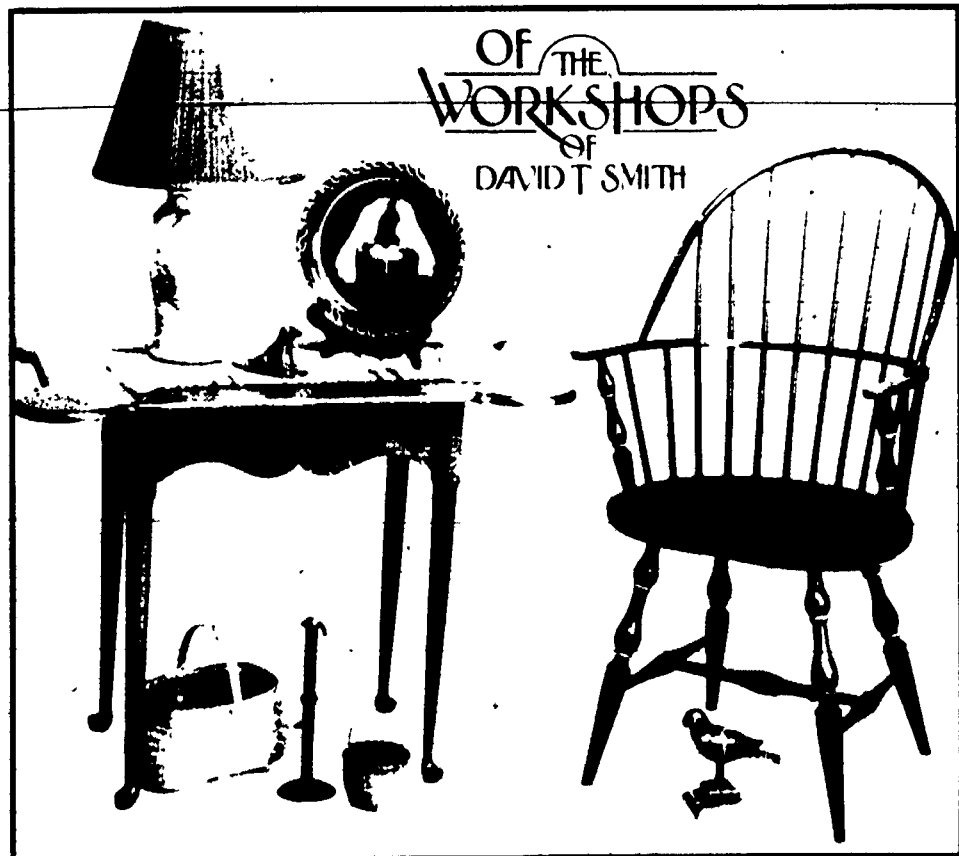

Cranbrook has something for all

The name of the Cranbrook Educational Community is recognized in art and architecture circles around the world for its history and excellence of instruction. What some people may not recognize is that Cranbrook opens three elements of its success to the public on a regular basis.

The Cranbrook Academy of Art Museum, Institute of Science Museum and Cranbrook House and Gardens welcome visitors throughout the year. And although the gardens are pretty much done for the winter, the other attractions make a great excursion during any season.

Institute of Science — The science museum offers a combination of temporary and permanent exhibits and shows, some of which are pure education and a few of which lean more to entertainment.

Most of the museum is devoted to traditional scientific disciplines like biology, physics, archaeology and mineralogy. Director of Education Janet Johnson said the Physics Hall is a particular favorite part the museum because of its emphasis on hands-on exhibits.

Other special features of the museum include a planetarium and an observatory. The planetarium is doing double duty lately with a series of popular laser light shows on weekends; the band Genesis is featured during November.

The nature center is another popular museum attraction. "It's good for kids and parents together. We like family units to work together, and this is one place that they can," Johnson said.

A robotic dinosaur exhibit earlier in the year was a big hit, Johnson said, so it will return next summer. A new fossil lab shows the actual recovery of a dinosaur's remains.

Another highlight of the science museum is the two gift stores: the Science Station, geared to children, and the general interest Explorer's Store.

Special programs planned at the science museum include a Native American Activity Day from 1 to 5 p.m. Nov. 19; and a holiday Science Toy and Book Fair during museum hours Nov. 25-27.

Science museum admission is \$3 for adults, \$2 for students and senior citizens. Group rates and programs are also available. Hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday; 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Friday and Saturday, and 1 to 5 p.m. Sunday. For more information, call 645-3200.

Academy of Art — The art museum offers both a permanent collection and space for changing exhibits.

The permanent exhibit, titled simply the "Cranbrook Collection," includes historical and contemporary art by the most important artists and designers involved with the academy. The exhibit includes works by Eliel, Loja and Eero Saarinen, Harry Bertoia, and Charles Eames. Carl Milles sculptures outdoors provide the perfect setting for the museum.

The museum has a bookstore concentrating on Cranbrook's role and achievements in art, architecture and design.

Beginning Tuesday and continuing through Jan. 9, the museum will again present the exhibit "Saarinen in Finland," which focuses on the early work of academy founder Eliel

Saarinen. The show includes architectural drawings and watercolors, examples of furniture design and plans for larger scale works.

Through Dec. 12 in the smaller, downstairs gallery, the art academy museum concentrates on another member of the community's founding family: "James Scripps Booth, Artist and Engineer." This exhibit shows the many talents of the man, who drew, painted and designed automobiles.

The Academy of Art Museum is open 1 to 5 p.m. daily, except Monday and major holidays. Admission is \$2.50 for adults, \$1.50 for students and senior citizens. Docent tours are available with advance registration. For more information, call 645-3312.

Cranbrook House — The impeccably decorated and appointed ground floor of Cranbrook House is open to the public at limited times. Once the home of Cranbrook founders George Gough Booth and Ellen Scripps Booth, the house now holds administrative offices for the educational community.

With its architecture, furnishings and decorations, it makes a fine museum in itself. But it is more than that.

"The house is used. It isn't just a museum. Tours are given, classes are held. The house is rented out for receptions and cocktail parties," Cranbrook Public Relations Director Roger Leavenworth said.

During warmer months, the gardens around the house are another popular attraction.

Vikings trip cagers, 63-60

The Northville cagers found out the hard way that a 17-point victory over an opponent earlier in the season doesn't mean a thing when the two teams hook-up again.

The Mustangs crunched Walled Lake Central 66-49 back on Sept. 15 but last Thursday (Nov. 3) the Vikings turned the tables and pulled out a 63-60 triumph in the first round of the Western Lakes League Playoffs. The loss dropped Northville's season record to 13-5 overall.

"It was a fast-paced, high scoring game and both teams played well — we just got beat," Mustang Coach Ed Kritch said. "I was pleased with our effort but we took some ill-advised shots and didn't make our free throws and that was the difference. If we'd have made our free throws, we would have won."

Kritch was right on the money when he commented that "the days of the 32-29 games are long gone in Northville." The high-powered Mustangs and Viking went basket-for-basket the entire first half. A 16-9 Northville lead was narrowed to 16-14 after one quarter as Central went on an offensive spurt. Over the next few minutes, the Viking scored 15 of the next 16 points.

But a clutch three-pointer by guard Karen Baird ended the run and got the Mustangs back into gear. They trailed by one (29-28) at halftime.

The third quarter was as tight as ever but Northville blew several chances to regain the lead with some poor free throw shooting. In the quarter, the Mustangs missed the front end of four one-and-one opportunities.

"That was discouraging because we worked hard to get to the free throw line and then we didn't convert," Kritch said. "It was like throwing the ball out of bounds — it was just like four turnovers."

Early in the fourth quarter, Northville knotted the score at 41-41 and then pulled ahead by four. But the Vikings opened a 61-57 lead with 20 seconds remaining when Kelly O'Hanlon rebounded her own missed free throw and converted. Baird came down and canned her second three-pointer with six seconds left to

make it 61-60, but O'Hanlon hit two more free throws with time running out to preserve the win. Debbie Stevens three pointer with four seconds left was just off the mark.

"That offensive rebound by O'Hanlon and our free throw shooting problems hurt us," Kritch said. "But we had a heck of an offensive output in the fourth quarter with 21 points. Offensively, the only thing that concerned me was some of our shot selections. At times we seemed to get caught up in the quick-pace of the game."

Baird had a team-high 21 points and Stevens added 16. Heather Sixt (11) and Kate Holstein (10) also chipped in offensively. O'Hanlon led all scorers with 26.

The loss drops Northville into the loser's bracket of the WLAA Playoffs. The Mustangs took on Westland John Glenn last Tuesday (Nov. 8, after Record deadline) and will then face either Plymouth Salem or Livonia Franklin this Saturday (Nov. 12) at Salem.

"All these playoff games are tough, competitive games," Kritch said. "They all seem to come down to the final minutes and whoever plays better down the stretch usually wins."

1988 grid campaign features highs, lows

If last impressions are the ones that stick in your mind, then the 1988 season was a rousing success for the Northville football team. But if you prefer to look at the big-picture, then '88 may have been a disappointment.

The highlight of the year was an obvious one — a season ending 23-18 upset over previously unbeaten and state-ranked Novi. The Wildcats went on to become one of the top eight teams in the state in the MHSAA playoffs but the Mustangs got possession of the 'Baseline Jug' for at least a year.

"When I think of the season, I think of the highs and the lows," Northville Coach Darrel Schumacher said. "We all thought we'd be a better club record-wise but we ended the season by beating one of the state's best."

The Mustangs failed to reach their goal of a better than .500 record. But the team's 4-5 overall record represents a 100 percent improvement over victory outputs in both the '86 and '87 seasons.

"We feel good about doubling our wins from the season before," Schumacher said. "But at the same time, we know we could have been 7-2 or, more realistically, 6-3."

A 10-9 loss to powerful North Farmington in week two was one of the swing games that could have easily been another notch in the win column. And a convincing defeat against top-ranked Farmington Harrison was actually the closest anybody's been to the Hawks this year.

"We had some key mistakes against North and that cost us," Schumacher said. "We outplayed them and still came up short and that's disappointing. Against Harrison, it was the closest game they had in the league but I don't think anybody could have beat them that day."

Schumacher admits that the biggest disappointment was a loss to winless Plymouth Canton in the fifth week, but the situation was com-

Tough schedule, injuries hamper kicker's stretch run

As far as the Northville soccer team is concerned, the 1988 season might as well be two separate campaigns.

The first half was a typical Mustang season. Through the first 10 games, Northville was very competitive and built an impressive 6-2-2 record.

But then the bottom fell out with injuries and tough opponents at every turn. In the final nine matches, the Mustangs were a woeful 0-8-1 and ended the season with a 6-10-3 mark — only the second losing season in the program's history.

"I think what I'll remember the most about this season was all the injuries," coach Dave Yezback said.

"It effected our record and we were already young in age and experience to begin with. This was one of the youngest teams I've ever had and the injuries in key positions compounded the instability of the team."

The injury list is long and imposing: Noel Korwin, Steve Nagy, Gordie Gray, Roger Kimary, Pat McGrail, Chris Hinz, Andy Frey, Tom Ursel, Steve Lang and Ed Petit all missed at least one match this season with a variety of physical problems.

"It's long list," Yezback said. "We kept our new trainer — Melissa Martis — quite busy. We weren't a big physical team and that was part of the problem."

The first half of season featured quality opponents, but teams that were ultimately beatable — and

that's what the Mustangs did. But the second half included programs like Livonia Stevenson, Livonia Churchill, Catholic Central and Ann Arbor Pioneer who are considered among the best in the state.

"Our schedule was tailored for developing a team but the injuries threw a monkey wrench into that," Yezback said. "We came out of the first half of the season with some wins, but also with a lot of players out."

The loss of Korwin for the season was perhaps the biggest blow. A broken arm sidelined the team's most prolific scorer and from that point on, Northville had trouble at the offensive end.

"You can't take away your top scorer and not have it effect you,"

Yezback said. "He was a threat last year and this year it forced our opponents to watch him closely — that frees up others on the team. It creates opportunities for everybody."

But without Korwin in the line-up, junior Brad Maliszewski picked up the slack and led the team with nine goals and four assists. In the last two years, Maliszewski has scored 13 goals, putting him number 10 on the all-time career scoring list at Northville.

"Brad rose to the occasion and did a fine job," Yezback said.

Senior captain Andy Frey was second in scoring (four goals, five assists) and Gordie Gray was third (four goals, three assists). Frey has been a standout at midfield for years but with production problems on of-

fer, Frey moved him to the scoring line to get more of a scoring touch. It seemed to work, but it was the expense of another area.

"Our midfield strength was Frey, but when we moved him, that took away some of our midfield control," Yezback said.

The defensive star was probably goaltender Roger Kimary, even though his statistics weren't outstanding. Kimary allowed 2.40 goals per game and ended with a 1.90 average for his career. He had a career win-loss mark of 19-14-5 in four years.

"It may look like Roger gave up a lot of goals this season but if you look at the number of shots the poor guy faced, he did a remarkable job," Yezback said.

The injury situation was

frustrating, but it may be an advantage in the future. With 13 returning letterwinners and a host of junior varsity players with potential, optimism abounds.

"We had a number of young players get playing time they normally wouldn't have if it wasn't for the injuries," Yezback explained. "Everybody played this year so it should help us out tremendously in the future."

The highlight of the campaign was probably a 3-2-1 record in the WLAA Western Division, which was good for second place. The team finished sixth in the conference out of 11 teams.

"To be in the middle of our conference with all the problems we had is pretty good," Yezback said. "It's one of the toughest leagues in the state."

Rebuilding season successful for boys cross country squad

With a sophomore and a freshman in his top two runners this fall, Northville boys cross country coach Ed Gabrys can hardly wait for the 1989 season to begin.

The '88 campaign was a rebuilding one, but the benefits from a 2-4 season (and fourth-place finish in the WAAA Western Division) will probably come to fruition soon. The future is certainly bright.

"This was a rebuilding year but at the same time we did well," Gabrys said. "At about the Canton Meet (Oct. 6) we hit our peak, but it came a little too early. I would have liked to have it come around Conference Meet time but it didn't happen. I think a lot of it has to do with our youth — it takes time and experience to know how to pace yourself in a race and during a season."

With just one returning senior — Jay Griffith — Gabrys knew he'd have to rely on some youngsters. And they came through with flying colors.

Freshman Steve Coon ended the season as the Mustangs' top runner. He inherited that spot in the last third of the season when sophomore Andy Haas faded down the stretch. Coon was given the 'Most Improved' award at the team's banquet on Nov.

9 and has shown signs of future stardom.

"Even as a junior high runner, I knew Coon would be good," Gabrys said. "He has desire to excel beyond what you can coach. I put him in a class with former Northville All-Staters like John Frisbie and Clark Couyoumjian."

When Coon made All-Division honors as a freshman, it didn't surprise Gabrys at all. He shattered the freshman record at Cass Benton Park by 19 seconds (17:32) and was by far the top freshman in the WAAA this year.

"Right now he's head and shoulders above his peers in the WAAA," Gabrys said.

Despite tailing off in the final weeks, Haas was chosen as the team's 'Most Valuable Athlete.' He topped his goal of a 17:45 in the first couple weeks of the season, leading Gabrys to believe he peaked too early.

"He peaked too early and that's a matter of experience," he said. "He's still got a couple years ahead of him and I see him leading us on and off the course."

By virtue of his 4.0 grade point average, Haas also received the 'Scholar Athlete Award.'

Griffith — the only returning senior

— was the number three runner for much of the year, and according to Gabrys, was a great team leader.

"Jay filled the role of a team leader and it was a valuable role," he said. "We had a real young group and they looked up to him."

Junior Jon Meek and freshmen Mike Huff were two more newcomers who helped the team tremendously. Meek held down the team's fourth spot and was elected captain for the '89 squad along with junior Jason Hoose. Meek was the fifth man on the team but was the second or third best frosh in the conference.

"Meek was very consistent but he still needs some experience," Gabrys said. "And Huff should be a good complement to Coon for the next three years. We're looking at a couple of the best freshmen around."

Gabrys goal for next year is to get his fifth runner under the 18-minute mark. And with a crop of talented youngsters, he estimates that there will be nine runners capable of doing just that.

"My formula for success is to get our fifth man under 18-minutes and we have the capability to do it," Gabrys said. "We'll be real competitive next year."

DNR: hunting accidents increase

Big and small game hunting accidents in Michigan increased during the 1987-88 hunting season compared to previous years, with 100 accidents (11 deaths, 89 injuries) reported; up from 81 accidents in 1986-87, 85 accidents in 1985-86 and 88 accidents for the 1984-85 season.

Michigan, however, still ranks below the national average for hunter accidents, with only 6.43 accidents reported for every 100,000 licenses sold annually, compared to a national average of 8.10. More than 1,571,000 Michigan hunting licenses were sold in 1987-88.

"We're disturbed to see an increase in accidents from previous years," said Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Director David F. Hales. "Nearly all of these accidents could have been prevented if hunters had worn the required hunter orange apparel or observed some very basic safety rules."

More than 70 percent of the 1987-88 hunting accidents fell into the following categories:

- Victim out of sight of shooter: 28 accidents (3 fatalities, 25 injuries);

- Careless handling of firearms: 18 accidents (1 fatal, 17 injuries);

- Victim mistaken for game: 10 accidents (5 fatalities, 5 injuries);

- Victim shot by hunter turning to shoot on game: 10 accidents (10 injuries);

- Victim moved into line of fire: 5 accidents (5 injuries).

Overall, 33 of the 100 accidents were self-inflicted, while 67 accidents were the result of another hunter's bullet. In addition, most of the accidents occurred within 10 yards of the victim, involved violators 32 years and older, and included persons of the same hunting party.

Two hunter safety laws have had a significant impact on the reduction of hunter accidents in Michigan since the mid-1970's when Michigan averaged 219 hunting accidents annually, said Lt. Jim Dabb, hunter education coordinator for the DNR's Law Enforcement Division.

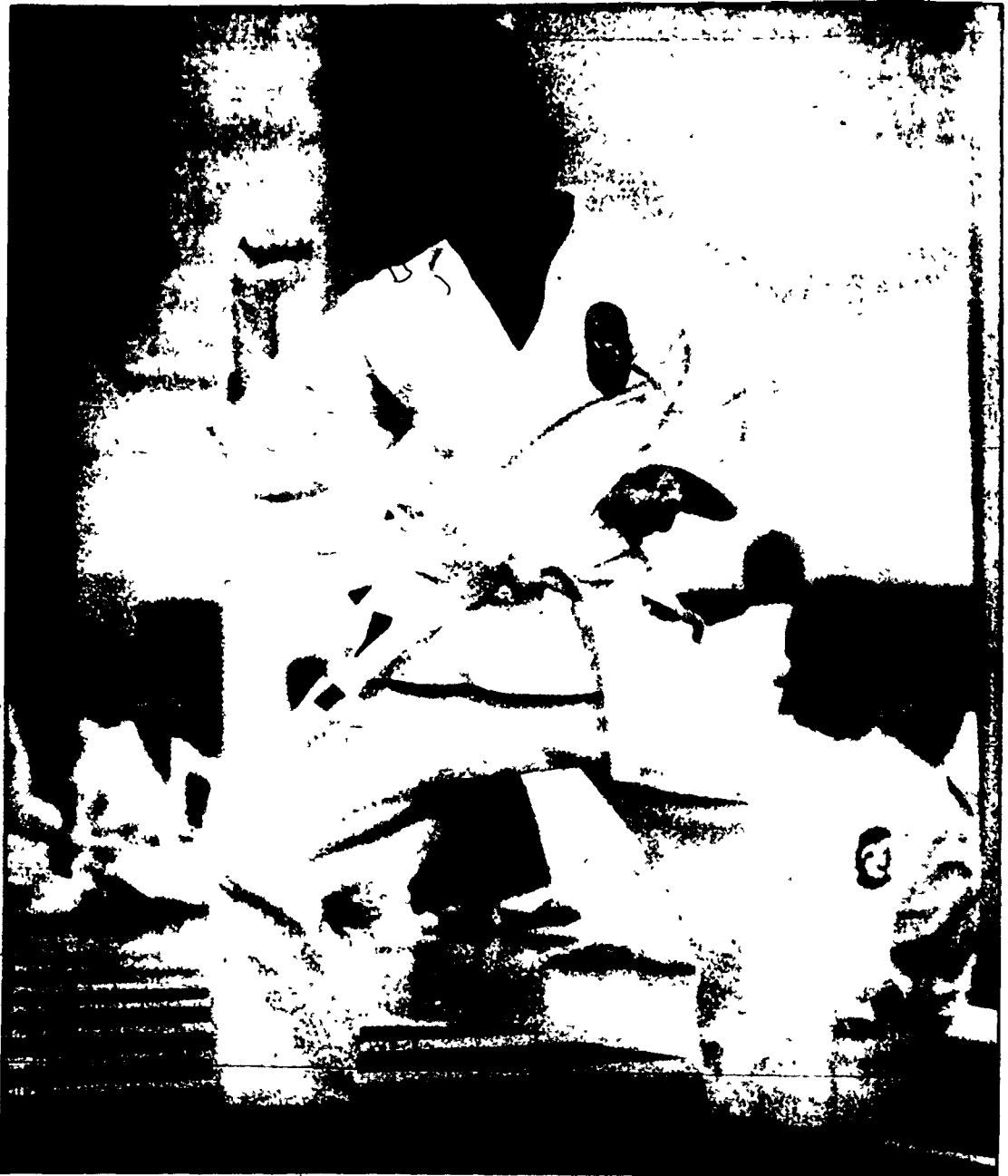
"Implementation of mandatory hunter safety training in 1971 for first-time hunters ages 12-16, and enactment of the hunter orange law in 1977, requiring hunters to wear a blaze orange cap or vest, continues to be a key element in reduction of hunter accidents," added Dabb.

For more information on the hunting safety training course, recommended for all hunters, contact the DNR's Law Enforcement Division at 517-373-1230.

To help insure a safe hunting trip, DNR law enforcement officials advise hunters to follow four essential safety measures:

1. Wear hunter orange — cap and vest or cap and coat, preferred.
2. Keep the muzzle of the gun pointed in a safe direction and keep the safety on until ready to shoot.

3. Make sure of your target — check what lies beyond your target and see whether a safe shot can be taken.
4. Keep track of where your hunting companions are at all times.

"Losing Kuffner hurt more than anything," he said. "Chris was one of our best — just an exceptional player."

A 13-0 Homecoming triumph over Walled Lake Western set up a fine finish, however. With Plymouth Salem and Novi (combined record of 14-2) on tap in the final two weeks, the prospects weren't very good, but the Mustangs played the Rocks very tough before falling 21-14 and then sprang the shocker against the 'Cats.

"We felt we could accomplish some things against Salem and Novi and we were very competitive," Schumacher recalled. "They were both excellent teams."

With quality returnees like Spradlin, Kelley, Neil White, Tim Kerns, Bob Townsend, Chuck Shuff and an impressive group of junior varsity players ready to move up, Schumacher is optimistic for next season. He is hoping the big win over Novi will provide the team with momentum for 1989.

Cholesterol-reducing drug studied

If you've got high blood pressure, a bit of plaque buildup in your arteries and a relatively normal cholesterol count, you're just what the doctor ordered.

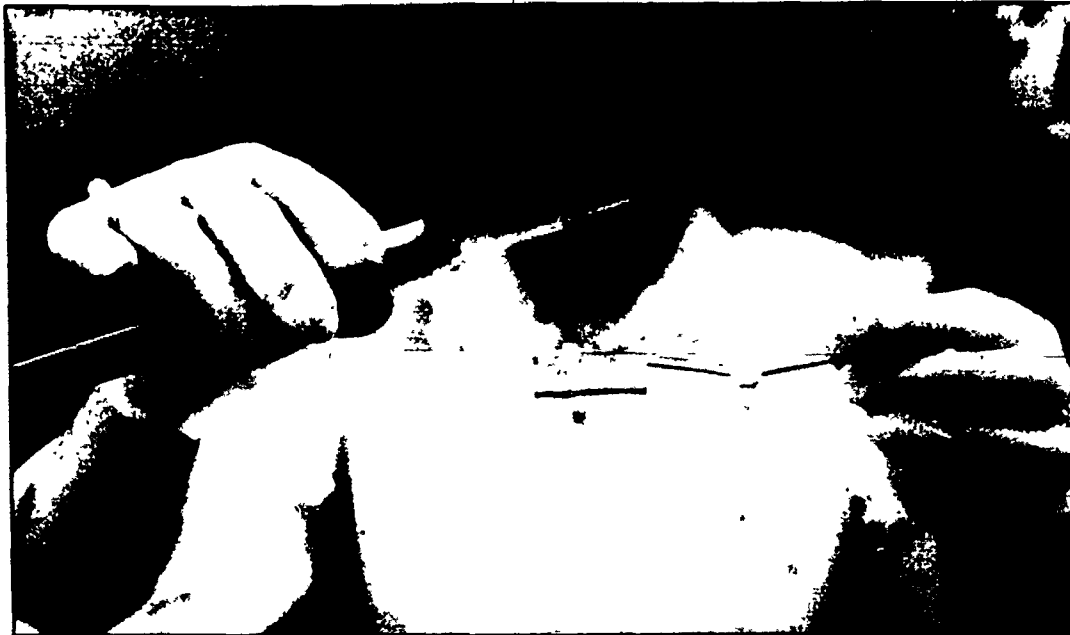
As part of a study into a drug that may reduce cholesterol buildup in the arteries, a team of researchers at Wayne State University will be giving free health screenings to hundreds of Detroit area residents over the next few months in their quest to find 120 who have the right combination of health problems. In return, the 120 will receive free health treatment (including medication) for the next three years.

This is all part of a study on a drug that may be able to decrease plaque buildup, and at the same time eliminate the need for surgery to correct too-narrow arteries.

Drs. James R. Sowers, Paula Zemel, Robert Brug and Michael Zemel — all Wayne State faculty members — are coordinating the study to determine the effects of the drug Isradipine on plaque in the carotid artery. This drug is one of a class of calcium channel blockers, many of which are already used to treat hypertension.

"We're addressing the possibility that there may be a nonsurgical treatment to repress plaque," said Michael Zemel, associate professor of food and nutrition science. "With this drug, atherosclerosis may be blocked or possibly reversed."

The Sandoz Pharmaceutical Co. Research Institute is developing Isradipine and is providing funding for the study. The drug has already shown positive results in rabbits, said Dr. Sowers, professor of internal medicine. Wayne State and the affiliated University Health Center will

be one of eight sites from around the nation to test the drug.

Isradipine works like other calcium channel blockers in that it reduces the amount of calcium in the smooth muscle cells that surround arteries. When the calcium is reduced, the muscle loosens up, allowing the artery to expand. The result is a lessening of blood pressure.

Isradipine also appears to decrease plaque buildup, Zemel said. "This may be the case for several calcium channel blockers, but the others require much higher doses than Isradipine."

Paula Zemel, also in internal medicine, will concurrently conduct a series of tests on the quality of life of persons using high blood pressure drugs, which include beta blockers and diuretics. "Often, people taking these drugs will be sleepy, experience sexual dysfunction, develop concentration problems. It can affect their whole lives. As far as we know, calcium channel blockers have few side effects that effect the quality of life."

The health screening includes testing for blood pressure, plaque buildup and cholesterol level. For

those who qualify for the continued treatment, it's only the beginning. "For the first year of the study, we will see people quite frequently — about every three months for the first year," said Jackie Greene, study coordinator. "Then we'll see them every six months."

The participants will receive a periodical physical exam, testing for plaque regressions and blood pressure check-ups, Dr. Zemel said.

Motivation needed for smokers to kick habit

The adverse effects of cigarette smoking are well established. Smoking is a major risk factor for heart disease, emphysema and lung cancer. With clearly labeled warnings on all packages of cigarettes, few people can claim ignorance of the hazards of tobacco. Yet 50 million Americans continue to smoke. Many wish to quit but find the task too difficult.

There are a few superhuman individuals who are able to quit "cold turkey" and never give cigarettes a second thought. Most people, however, need help to quit. There are two requirements to successfully stop smoking: a strong motivation to quit and a plan for quitting.

Thinking of reasons to stop smoking will increase your motivation. If you need reasons, here are a few. Quitting will protect your future good health. If you have already developed heart or lung disease, quitting will decrease disease progression. Think of your family's health. Children of smokers have more respiratory infections. There is an increase in lung cancer in family members of smokers. Pregnancy is a great time to quit as tobacco can af-

fect your baby.

Smoking has become a less attractive habit in our health-conscious society. Public censure may motivate you to quit. Your personal appearance will improve by eliminating stained teeth and fingers and smoke on your breath. Lastly, think of all the money you can save by not buying cigarettes.

Once you decide to quit, it is important to set a date when you will stop smoking completely. This will give reality to your decision; visualize yourself not smoking on that certain day.

Prepare for the quit date. Take a few days to chart the times when you smoke so you can identify those situations when you will be tempted to smoke.

Tell your family, friends and co-workers when you plan to quit. Enlist their aid by requesting that they not smoke around you or offer you a cigarette. Rid your home and workplace of all visible cues of smoking such as ashtrays and lighters.

Be aware of the symptoms of nicotine withdrawal. You may feel anxious, irritable and have difficulty concentrating. Physical symptoms include increased appetite,

headaches, gastrointestinal upset and sleep disturbances. These physical symptoms last about a week, but some ex-smokers report it took them up to three months to completely withdraw.

Switching to a lower nicotine brand of cigarette prior to your quit date may help. You may wish to discuss with your physician a nicotine chewing gum prescription that will ease your symptoms of withdrawal.

When the quit date arrives, it is important to stop completely. Cutting down is not a successful way to quit. The remaining cigarettes tend to be smoked more vigorously with greater intake of harmful smoke products. There is also a natural tendency to regress to smoking more cigarettes.

Develop coping mechanisms to deal with the urges to smoke. This may require lifestyle changes. Avoid situations where you will be tempted to smoke such as parties or drinking alcohol. Eat low calorie snacks when you want to smoke. Choose a different activity: for example, take a walk rather than have that cigarette after dinner. Techniques such as deep breathing or progressive relaxation can help you through stressful moments where you ordinarily might

smoke.

Stop-smoking materials are available through various organizations. Contact your local American Lung Association, American Cancer Society or American Heart Association for information. These organizations also provide group programs.

Don't be discouraged if your initial attempt to stop smoking is not successful. Most ex-smokers had to quit more than once. Twenty percent of those who try, succeed on their first attempt. After seven tries, 60 percent are successful. If you've tried to stop before, look back and discover why you resumed smoking and learn from your relapse. You will be better prepared the next time you quit.

The Great American Smokeout, sponsored by the American Cancer Society, is Nov. 17. Why not start planning for your quit day?

Novi advance to Regional Final with 22-14 victory

The Novi gridders weathered the wind, the rain and the mud last Friday (Nov. 4) in the opening round of the MHSAA playoffs.

But more than anything, the 'Cats overcame their own mistakes to nip previously unbeaten and seventh-ranked Okemos 22-14 in overtime.

It was Novi's first-ever playoff victory in three tries and puts the Wildcats just three victories away from a state championship. Because the game was played in Okemos, Novi's victory was considered an upset. But, in reality, the Wildcats could have easily won the contest by several touchdowns.

"We had three or four very big mistakes at inopportune times," acknowledged John Osborne, coach of the Wildcat gridders. "We should have won it in regulation."

With the victory, Novi advances to the Class A Region II Finals against Monroe on Nov. 12 at Jackson High School's Withington Stadium. Monroe also registered an upset in the opening round of the MHSAA Class A tournament, topping third-ranked Lansing Sexton 11-8.

A turnover by Joel Scheffler on the first possession of the game spotted Okemos a 7-0 lead, but the 'Cats fought back to tie it at halftime, 14-14.

In the second half, a regrouped Novi defense started to take control while the offense continued to move the ball. But another key fumble — with the Wildcats inside the Chiefs' five yard line — squandered a chance to take the lead and it was on to overtime.

In overtime, a one-yard plunge by quarterback Ken Hendrian and a successful two-point conversion gave Novi the early advantage. The Wildcat defense stopped Okemos once again to preserve the victory.

"It was a big thrill for all of us," Osborne said. "A great win for Novi High. Our supporters came out for the game in great numbers and were great — it was nice how it ended."

"I feel darn good about the game. Both teams played hard and it was an even-match, but somebody had to win. I felt good about our momentum at the end, and I was impressed with how strong we played in the second half, particularly on defense."

The Wildcats got off to a nice start with a 38-yard kickoff return by Craig Berry. But a couple of plays later, the Chief's Jeff Turnage stripped the ball from Scheffler and Okemos recovered at the 42. Ten plays later, Perry Paschal scored on a four-yard run. The extra point gave

Okemos a 7-0 lead.

Early in the second quarter, Novi put together a 12-play, 72-yard scoring drive, with Berry carrying it in from nine yards out. But the extra point was low and with 11:03 remaining in the first half, Okemos led 7-6. The big play in the drive was a 11-yard gain by Hendrian on a fourth-and-three situation at the 32.

Matt Snyder, Okemos' junior quarterback, continued to pick the Novi coverage apart and the Chiefs' next possession resulted in another score — and a 14-6 lead. A poised and confident Snyder steadily moved his team down the field and then connected with Andy Wozniak on a 39-yard pass play for the touchdown.

Things only got worse when the 'Cats drove down inside the Okemos 15 with a couple of minutes remaining in the half only to fumble it away on a bad exchange between center and the quarterback. But in an amazing turn of fate, defensive back P.J. Kee came back to block a punt and give Novi the ball at the Okemos six. Several plays later, Scott Wladischkin scored from a yard out. Wladischkin then took a screen pass and outdueling four or five defenders for the two-point conversion to knot the score at 14-14 at intermission.

"The blocked punt by Kee was the big play in the game," Osborne said. "It kind of balanced out the fumble we had right before that. And the two-point conversion by Wladischkin was a great effort. I think Mark Gronowski said afterwards that it was a great effort, even for Scottie."

"In the first half (Okemos) looked good offensively and we couldn't stop them. They appeared quicker, and they had our defense off-balance, so I felt fortunate it was 14-14."

The first time Novi got possession of the ball in the third quarter, Hendrian hit Mark Tolson with a perfectly executed 48-yard pass and that set up what appeared to be the go-ahead score. But on second and goal at the three, Scheffler lost the ball again and Okemos' Tom Wendt recovered.

"The ball was wet and slippery and we had trouble hanging onto it," Osborne explained. "That play really hurt us — it would have been the winning score."

Disaster struck again with a little over six minutes to play. A bad snap on a punt gave the Chiefs possession of the ball at the Novi 21, but the Wildcat defense rose to the challenge. With leading tackler Darin Johnson and Scheffler on the sidelines with injuries, Novi pushed Okemos backwards on three con-

secutive plays and out of field goal range.

With time running out and the Chiefs in Novi territory, they tried a last-gasp fake punt but it was unsuccessful — and that meant overtime.

In Michigan, each offensive team is given the ball at the 10 yard line and receives four chances to score. After both teams get possession of the ball, the team ahead wins. If it remains tied, another overtime session ensues.

Okemos won the coin flip and elected to defend the north end zone. After two runs by Berry moved the ball inside the two, Hendrian took it in on a quarterback sneak for a 20-14 lead.

Osborne then decided to go for the two-point conversion instead of the kick and it worked as Wladischkin took a pitch, rolled to his right and hit receiver Doug Justus in the end zone with a two-yard pass.

"My assistant coaches talked me into going for the two," Osborne said. "I have great respect for their opinions and I guess it was the right decision."

Okemos then failed to score in four tries from the 10, but did get down to the four before Snyder misfired on a pass to Wozniak in the back of the end zone on fourth down.

"Our defense did a great job," Osborne said. "In overtime, our kids seemed to be in the right spots at the right times. Okemos had some real nice calls offensively but we were ready."

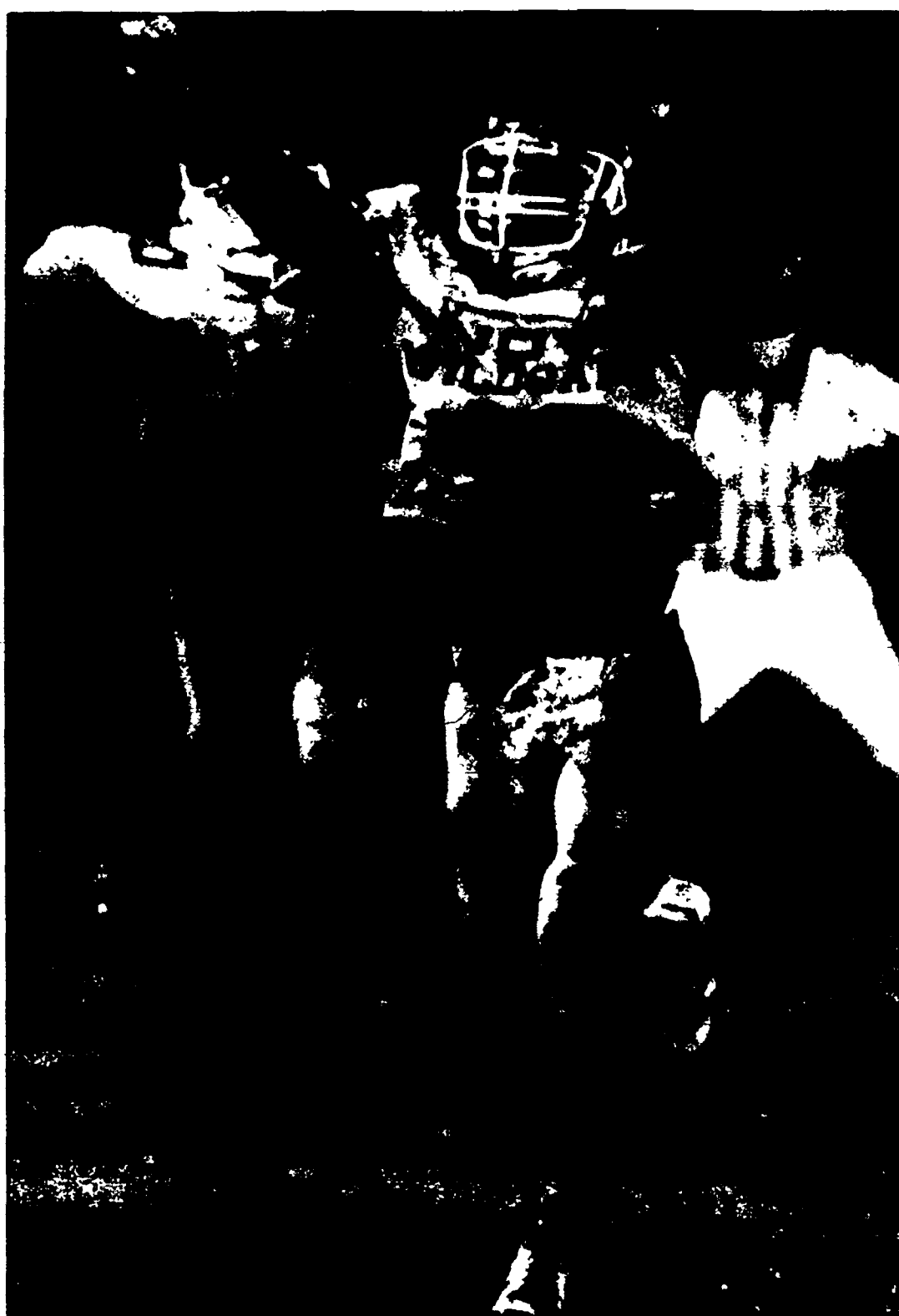
Wladischkin gained 80 yards on 20 carries to pass the 1,000-yard rushing mark for the season. Hendrian had one of his best outings of the season, hitting on 7-of-12 attempts for 127 yards.

"Ken's a solid quarterback and he's been improving," Osborne said. "I feel real confident in him. He had some nice touch passes and a couple of good runs."

Linebacker Steve Tashman paced Novi with seven solo tackles and eight assists. Scheffler (seven solos, seven assists) and Johnson (seven solos, four assists) also had big days before leaving with injuries.

"It was a great high school football game," said Okemos Coach Keith Froelich. "You have to give Novi credit — they did what they had to do to win. It was a very evenly-matched game — Novi is an awfully good team. Wladischkin and Berry are about 90 percent of their offense and we focused on stopping them, but they did a good job passing the ball."

"They threw a little more than we anticipated tonight."
