Liugiams at Cooke face 1990 reopening

Though nothing is set in stone, Northville Public School officials have begun planning for the reopening of the Cooke School on Taft Road, and the fate of the programs now using the facility.

While reaffirming his support for the programs now using the school, Dr. George Bell, school superintendant, said his responsibility was first to his school. "Our first obligation has to be with the K through 12 students," he said.

The Cooke Scool reopening, just five years after it was closed, is due to the increased school population. When the school was closed and the students taken in by Moraine School in 1984, the middle school population was 646 students, Bell said. Now, the population is 870.

The reopening of Cooke should solve the population crunch for at least a decade, Bell said. "Those two buildings will handle this poulation well into the late 1990s.

Much work remains to be done before Cooke is actually reopened. Attendance boundaries still have to be set, and public hearings will be scheduled in January to determine the nature of the Cooke School population and the fate of the programs now using the facility. Those decisions should be made by the first of February, Bell said.

Ward will not defend township

Ward Evangelical Presbyterian Church has not been asked by Northville Township to help defend a controversial decision by the township Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA), according to Supervisor Georgina Goss.

Goss said Monday that Ward and the township were not joined in a plan to combat an appeal filed against the township in October.

A group of Township residents filed the appeal in protest of the ZBA's decision to grant a height variance to the church. The variance had paved the way for the church to build a 107foot sanctuary on its proposed development site on the corner of Six Mile and Haggerty roads.

"Ward absolutely will not be paying the township's legal fees," Goss said. "Whatever they do is as a private entity.

"They (Ward) are trying to protect their petition for appeal by the ZBA." Ernest Essad, the attorney handling the case for the township, said he has not been approached by Ward

"Ward has never offered, nor has the township sought to have their legal fees paid (by the church)," he

Essad said the decision whether to allow Ward into the appeal would be determined Nov. 15 in Wayne Circuit Court (after the Record went to press).

Selection of treasurer postponed

The absence last week of two members of the Northville Township Board of Trustees has temporarily delayed the selection of a new

A successor to former treasurer Richard Henningsen was to be named at the board's Nov. 9 meeting, but Supervisor Georgina Goss and Clerk Thomas Cook were unable to attend a pair of candidate interview sessions. Four board members conducted the interviews and spoke to 14 applicants during the two evening meetings.

Wednesday evening, Nov. 9, the

board decided to hold their decision until the other members were present and able to vote on the applicants.

According to Henningsen, who was hired as the township's new manager in October, the choice will be made near the end of November.

'The board will be meeting the 29th or 30th (of November), mainly to get the treasurer's job taken care of." he said.

Henningsen said he was happy with the candidates and the interviewing process. He also said the response to the open position pleased township

"I thought it was fantastic that that

many came out to interview for the he said. "There were a number of candidates that were qualified for the position, in my opinion.

Henningsen said he doubted a second round of interviews would be held to whittle down the candidate list. He said at least four or five applicants deserved further consideration for the position.

Each of the 15-20 minute interviews were taped, and Henningsen said Goss and Cook would listen to the interviews before making their decision. He said the board would then dicuss the merits of each candidate before a selection was made.

Recreation plan studied for township

A large recreation complex may be constructed in Northville Township, despite last week's overwhelming defeat of the city's recreation

Plans for a new shared services recreation facility were thought to have ended after the millage was defeated 1,200 - 392, but township officials Monday said an alternative recreation plan may be adopted.

Township Manager Richard Henningsen said a site on Beck Road may be developed for recreation purposes if a wetlands mitigation plan is approved by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

'This plan could provide some relief for the recreation needs of the area," he said.

Henningsen said between 25-30 acres of township land on Beck and Six Mile roads may benefit as a result of a plan to relocate a wetlands site on that property. The proposed plan would involve 5.1 acres of wetlands being moved from a development site near Eight Mile and Haggerty roads to the Beck Road

The development groups, identified by township officials as First Commercial and Detroit Partners Realty, would absorb the cost of moving the wetlands to Beck and take care of the basic construction of the recreation fields.

Attempts to contact an official with First Commercial were unsuccessful

According to Henningsen, the plan has yet to be sent to the DNR for approval. The DNR's positive review of the plan is necessary for wetlands mitigation, he said.

Henningsen said preliminary plans for the Beck Road recreation facility would include the grading, clearing, grass planting, and preparing of four soccer fields, three multi-purpose fields (with baseball as their primary use), and four tennis courts

He estimated that the developer would spend between \$250-\$500,000 on the construction of the site

The wetlands portion of the Beck Road property would consist of 5.1 acres buffered by trees and thick growth cover, with a five acre partition between the wetlands and the

Henningsen said the recreation complex would start to be developed as soon as the DNR ruled on the wetlands mitigation. He would not estimate when that decision might

The Beck road development was based on the defeat of the city recreation millage, Henningsen said. If the millage had passed, he said the funds collected by the township and city probably would have been combined to develop the 71 83 Haller property

on Six Mile and Sheldon roads He cited the pressing need for recreation sites in the area as the main factor for pursuing a plan for

"We need something that will at least alleviate the recreation fields

Funds approved for recycling

Northville Township has entered the age of recycling.

Nov. 9 approved \$2,300 in initial funds to buy materials to start a recycling collection center on a site on Sheldon Road between Five and Six Mile

The money will be used to purchase road signs, instructional signs, wooden pallets for bins, steel posts for signs and bins, plastic barricade fencing, treated lumber, 140 tons of limestone for the area and driveway, steel containers for household batteries, and a 300 gallon drum to collect used oil.

'It's the simple start to a long, drawn out affair," said Walter Holinoty, township Water and Sewer Department supervisor "We're go-The township Board of Trustees ing to attempt to work with the Western Townships Utilities Authority (WTUA) as we set up this initial collection center.

Holinoty authored a study on the township's recycling plans, and passed his findings on to the board members. He said the majority of the communities in the area are keeping the size of their centers and the type of collectables received to a mınimum







'Fame' is very challenging, it's like nothing we've ever done before," said Carl Brown, a senior and a veteran of six plays during his high

"It's amazing, it's outstanding," she said. "It's knock-your-socks-off singing and dancing."

Popularized by film and television in the late 1970s and early 1980s, 'Fame' is the story of a diverse group of students attending the New York School for the Performing Arts. The play focuses on a group of young people as they enter the school's freshman class and follows them as they learn and grow physically and emotionally.

"The play shows how they grow up," Brown said. "You see their personal conflicts and how they pull together and try to help each other with their problems."

The two Northville students say the parallels between the characters in 'Fame' and their own school are

about teenagers. Most high school plays are about adult characters, but 'Fame" gives the students a chance to take a different look at the lives of teenagers.

Brown and Bickner said the play is set in a dance classroom. Spotlight effects, high energy music and danc-

ing, and multiple characters are all a part of the up-tempo scripting meant to symbolize the whirlwind life of a young student attempting to break into a difficult field.

Ironically, Brown and Bickner are cast as adults — teachers — in a play dominated by the vibrancy of youth. Brown is Mr. Farrell ("he's laid back, casual, very helpful") and Bickner is Mrs. Sherwood, the English teacher ("she absolutely loves the school; she cares about her

students"). But both say they like their roles, and don't envy the actors portraying the struggling teenagers.


And they say the show isn't just for teens, despite the youthful premise.

Court decison may affect proposed Providence Hospital site

NOVI - On Nov. 21, the state will reach a final certificate of need appeals decision on seven hospitals, four of them planned for com-munities bordering Novi, the site of Providence Hospital's proposed 200-

The Northville City Council recently voted unanimously to urge state officials to approve Providence Hospital's certificate of need for the site at Beck Road and Grand River.

Several of the hospitals undergoing the final appeals review before the certificate of need board in Lansing could be seen as competition for the proposed Providence-West - two of them are planned for West Bloomfield, one in Farmington Hills and one is an extension of Huron Valley Hospital in Commerce Township. Representatives of three of the hospitals involved in the appeals process - Henry Ford, Sinai and Mercy

Health Services asked for a denial of Providence's application at an Oct. 26 public hearing in Southfield.

The time frame for a response to the Southfield-based Providence Hospital's certificate of need application remains Nov. 29. The hospital, which would be located at the southwest corner of Beck Road and Grand River Avenue, must have the certificate to begin building.

The Michigan Department of Public Health, which issues the certificates by "sub-area", has not yet determined which sub-area Providence-West would be located in. The seven projects currently under appeal are in sub-area 48. In assessing a certificate of need application, the department takes neighboring sub-areas into consideration.

To qualify for a certificate of need, an applicant must demonstrate that the project is geographically accessible and serves an unmet medical need in the area to be served. Pro-

jects awaiting health department approval or under appeal are included the assessment of an area's medical services.

On Oct. 12, state assistant attorney general Robert Taub ruled that a cer-tificate of need could not be issued to a hospital in an area with an overabundance of hospital beds.

The seven hospitals submitted applications for certificates of need in late 1983 and early 1984 and were denied in September 1984. Since then, they have gone through the appeals process, including a comparative review of the competing applications. Tuesday's hearing is the final step in the state Department of Public Health's review process.

A review officer has already recommended that the five-member Certificate of Need Board deny the applications.

The unusually large flurry of applications came in after Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital filed an ap-

plication, said Robert S. Hicks, Chief of the Michigan Dept. of Public Health's Health Facilities Construction Division — the division which grants the certificates.

Hicks said that some of the applications were probably filed to block the other projects and keep the market open for any future building plans.

We spent literally 100 days or more reviewing the applications, while the attorneys had a field day,' Hicks said.

At the Oct. 26 public hearing, Providence Chief Executive Officer Brian Connolly argued that the Novi hospital should be considered as being located in sub-area 69, not subarea 48. A determination has not yet been made on which sub-area of 71 created by the health department encompasses the Novi project, Hicks

The applicants are:

William Beaumont Hospital, which plans to build a 160-bed, \$29 million hospital in West Bloomfield at an undisclosed location.

· Crittendon Hospital, which seeks to build a 65-bed rehabilitation facility on its present site on University Drive in Rochester.

 A Sinai Hospital and Henry Ford Hospital collaboration, a 200-bed West Bloomfield Hospital, planned to be built adjacent to Henry Ford Clinic Medical Center on Maple Road near Drake Road in West Bloomfield. This would be about seven miles from the proposed Providence-West.

 Huron Valley Hospital, on E. Commerce Road in Commerce Township, a 150-bed addition to the existing 153-bed facility. This fall, a new but similar application for a 150bed expansion was submitted to the health department by Huron Valley

· Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital in

Pontiac - 200-bed remodelling of the existing facility and a new 112-bed hospital in Clarkston at White Road and Dixie Highway.

 Mercy West Oakland — a 200-bed hospital proposed for Eleven Mile Road in Farmington Hills. To build the hospital, Mercy Health Care Services would remove 156 beds from Mount Carmel Hospital in Detroit and 50 beds from St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac, leading to six fewer beds overall for the corporation, owned by the Roman Catholic Sisters of Mercy. (Providence Hospital is owned by the Daughters of Charity, a sister organization.)

 West Oakland Community Hospital, a 200-bed facility to be built by Harper-Grace Hospital in Detroit at an Oakland County location. (Robert Yellen, vice-president of governmental affairs for Detroit Medical Center, which includes Harper-Grace Hospital, said he could recall no details of the application.





Home delivery question debated

The Northville city council and planning commission still fail to see eye to eye on allowing home delivery restaurants in the city's Central Business District. Council member Jerry Mittman explained the planning commission's position at a recent council meeting.

"There was very little desire to make any changes to the existing regulations," Mittman told the rest of the council. "There was more willingness, it appeared, if a restaurant was required to have a certain square footage of sit-down

Planning commision member Kathleen Otton, who attended the council meeting, voiced the opinion of several commission members. "We want people who come downtown to stay downtown," she said, "not to get food to be taken

The city council had drafted a proposal to allow home delivery

restaurants under certain conditions. including the requirement of some provision for sit-down clients, and onsite parking for clients and the delivery vehicles The proposal would also restrict the maximum number of delivery vehicles to two per restaurant

The one existing home delivery restaurant in the CBD, Domino's Pizza, was established before the present restriction against such uses was passed.

Commission members had also questioned the proposal's provision to require all the vehicles to be parked on-site.

'That's what our intention was," Mayor Chris Johnson said. Johnson said the provision was to alleviate the likelihood of double-parking on the site, and leave spaces open for the delivery vehicles as well.

The matter was referred to the city administration for another proposal, specifically regarding parking requirements and a requirement for sit-down space

childhood bride, Minda. Hilda married Harold Benjamin Ruhl in 1920. They lived in Ann Arbor where he completed his BA at U. of

After her divorce in 1958, Hilda lived in Birmingham and Naples, Fla. On May 14, 1965, at Christ Church Cranbrook, she married Arthur Fales Veinott of Boston, Mass., whom she had met in Naples, and began a new life as first mate on a large sailboat traveling down the Atlantic seaboard and up the eastern

In 1967 Arthur died, and Hilda lived in her homes in Naples and Torch Lake, then in Birmingham in a historic house with a beautiful garden on Willits Hill; and, finally, in Northville on Dunlap. 





Recycling comes to township

will be located next to the new fire department facility on Sheldon Road A 60 foot wide by 40 foot deep area will be used to house such items as newspapers, glass, plastic, cans, used motor oils, car and household batteries, and grass and leaves.

Holmoty said the township will have to lease dumpsters on a monthly basis and pay hourly transportation charges to have the materials hauled away. The Water and Sewer Department's dump truck will be used to haul away items such as plastic bottles, batteries and grass and leaves during the fall.

According to Holinoty's report, the time in which discarded materials need to biodegrade varies widely. He said an aluminum can may take 80-199 years to biodegrade, a glass bottle a million years, a plastic bag 10-20 years, and a plastic bottle 50-80 years.

The township's recycling program will begin with a voluntary stage, with possible periodic curbside pick up of some items, he said. The project will eventually become mandatory in conjunction with the WTUA projects timetable, which has yet to be determined.

Trustee Thomas Handyside said the township has committed itself to a recycling plan by resolution which must be acted upon by January 1991. He said the township would have to initiate a recycling/composting plan with mandatory curbside refuse and leaf pickup; or develop a waste energy incinerator; or create a township landfill; or use an existing landfill or ship refuse out of the county. He said the last two choices were not practical because of pressures on the facilities by surrounding communities.

"It's an issue that's moving fast. It's going to involve a lot of people," said trustee James Nowka

The township will be incurring a number of costs as it tackles the recycling plan. The lease of dumpsters and hauling fees are estimated by Holinoty to be \$375 monthly for the dumpsters, and approximately \$40 an hour for the hauling. The fees are based on quotes from Canton Waste Recycling, the firm which will probably be used by the township, he said.

Recycling recommendations listed by Holinoty included: bagged or string tied bundles of newspapers, which would be stored in a closed trailer; glass separated by color (rinsed); steel and aluminum cans separated, and grass and leaves, to be accepted only in bio-degradable bags.

Township manger Richard Henningsen said the board's authorization of funds will get the collection program underway soon, but he said he could not say exactly when the collection center would be open to the public.

School Board rejects plan for new varsity ski team

Students skiers who visualized schussing their way down Mt. Brighton as a member of the 1989-90 Northville High School Ski Team need more than a couple of snowfalls to enjoy their sport. They also need a blizzard of funding to get the plan approved for next year.

The Northville Public School District Board of Education Monday rejected a proposal to establish a varsity ski team this season, citing budget restraints and the fact that four other proposed athletic teams are awaiting school district funding.

Northville resident Robert Neff forwarded the proposal to the board, and told members that the chance to join the Mt. Brighton Interscholastic Skiing Association League was "a window of opportunity" that might not be available in the future.

Neff presented the board with a copy of a letter and proposal for a team that he had sent to Northville High Principal David Bolitho, Athletic Director Dennis Colligan, and Superintendent George Bell. He said the presence of 75 people at a Nov. 8 ski team organizational meeting and 91 signatures on a student interest petition showcased the popularity of the sport in the Northville area.

"We have put together a two year proposal to show what the cost (for establishing a varsity ski team) would be," he said.

Neff said the cost of putting together a team to compete in a league at Mt. Brighton, excluding transportation, would amount to a district expenditure of approximately \$3,300 for the first year of the plan. The second year would cost the school district approximately \$3,000, with the fees going toward gate, drill, and coach expenses. The cost to the individual student, excluding personal items, would be \$290 for lift

Bell noted that the cost of transporting students to races and practices at Mt. Brighton would amount to approximately \$4.000 approach

proximately \$4,000 annually.
Greg Jarvis, the president of the Brighton Ski League, and ski instructor at Mt. Brighton, told the board that his league had an opening with Northville's name on it.

"We've made room for them," he said. "We've scheduled Northville in, and we're awaiting confirmation from the school board."

Approximately 50 students and parents supporting the ski team proposal were in attendence. Groans and grumblings were audible when the board began to discuss the problem with implementing such a plan.

But the board had a number of questions for Neff and Jarvis, including why they sought to appear as an unscheduled agenda item two days before the proposed start of their practice season. Bell said the first he had heard of the plan was about two weeks ago, from an item that appeared in the Northville Record. The letter to Bolitho, Colligan, and Bell was dated Nov. 9.

Bell asked Bolitho about the standard practice the district employs when considering the establishment of high school athletic teams. The principal responded that the rationale to determine the new teams included: high interest from students, funding availability, similarity of activity by close proximity schools, demand on the district's facilities, manageability, and Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) sanctioning of the event.

Bolitho then noted that Northville High has four athletic teams that have been approved, pending a funding plan by the school district. Those teams are: varsity women's golf, an equestrian team, and freshman softball and baseball. He and Bell both said those teams should receive funding priority.

But Neff countered by telling the board that the ski team would be coeducational, and that skiing was the only outdoor sport available to students in the winter. He said many of the student skiers had progressed to the point that the caliber of competition offered through club skiing was not sufficient to help them improve.

Bell advised the board against funding the ski team. He told the ski team supporters they needed to work their plans into the district's funding system much earlier if they expected their efforts to produce positive results.

"When you give us (advance notice) there is more time to look at the needs of students," he said. "I propose you function as a club this year."

A ski club originating from Northville High School would receive no funding from the school district.

Several members of the Board of Education expressed sympathy with the ski enthusiasts, but none offered a motion to approve funding.

Board President Glenna Davis said

Board President Glenna Davis said the district could not afford to approve the ski team, for more than just financial reasons.

"The level of interest you've shown is impressive," she said. "But we don't want to break down the process" of funding plans. She said the board could not base its decisions only on large groups of people attending meetings and voicing their opinions.

Decision on county land sale to come next month

A decision on who will win the right to develop approximately 930 acres of Wayne County land in Northville Township is less than a month away, a county official

"It'll be another week before the enviornmental impact study is completed," said Michael Duggan, Deputy Coun-ty Executive. "After the report is in, we'll share the results with the developers.

"Any decision is still two to three weeks away."

Two groups, Plymouth developer R.A. DeMattia, and a team headed by Oakland County developers Holtzman & Silverman, are in the running to purchase the tract of land on Sheldon Road between Five and Six Mile roads.

In an effort to assist the developers in determining the expense of an environmental clean-up, the county enlisted the aid of soil specialists to inspect the site. Approximately 20 gas tanks are buried on a portion of the county land, and the developers paid \$15,000 apiece to have the results of the study before presenting the county with their final bids.

Wayne County reportedly expects heightened bidding if the study does not indicate that a wholescale cleaning is

Duggan said the bidding process was halted during the environmental study.

"We're not entertaining any bids while the impact study is going on," he said. "The program is going on exactly as it's supposed to," he added.

R.A. DeMattia spokesman Gary Roberts said the environmental investigation had revealed "no particular problems" to this point.

"I don't think as a practical matter we've uncovered anything of major importance," he said. "I don't believe we're going to find environmental issues that will preclude the development of this site," he said.

He said the investigation of the underground gas tanks was just good business.

"Any developer that would get involved with (such a large deal) would need adequate insurance that the site (did not need a great deal of clean-up)," Roberts added.

Student expelled from NHS

A sophomore at Northville High School was formally expelled by the district Board of Education Monday for his role in a fight which injured another student.

The Record is not releasing the name of the expelled student because of his status as a juvenile and pending legal action.

Superintendent George Bell said the expelled 16-year old student used the marble base of a trophy, taped it around his gloved hand, and attacked the other student. The second student. 15. received several stitches. according to Bell.

Bell said the fight occured at the high school Sept. 29, and an expulsion hearing was conducted before Principal David Bolitho and Assistant Superintendent Dolly McMaster Oct. 11. The expelled boy's parents attended the hearing and waived their right to appeal the decision to the Board of Education within five days

of the ruling. 'It's an unfortunate incident, but it's best for all concerned if the student is expelled," Bell said. "He'll be attending the Bentley Center in Livonia (an alternative educational Northylle city police records show that the 16-year old was petitioned to his diploma."

Homebound citizens in the Northville and Novi area may well have a happier Thanksgiving and a merrier Christmas this year, as at least two area agencies continue to provide meals on wheels for the holidays.

Because state food grants cannot be used to provide meals on the holidays, the programs are made possible by gifts of time and money from the community.

The Senior Alliance, Area Agency on Aging 1-A is responsible for all the seniors aged 60 and over in southern and western Wayne county, estimated at 130,000 in the 1980 census. The area includes both Northville Township and the southern half of Northville City.

Amy Punke, a communications specialist for the Alliance, said the holiday meals program is in its second year. Meals are provided on Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter, with Thanksgiving being the busiest holiday in terms of the number of meals served.

"As of right now," Punke said, "we have a little over 500 meals requested for Thanksgiving." Last year, over 1,000 meals were served over the three holidays.

This is all done through private fundraising, donations from individuals and organizations," she said. The Alliance runs ads in local papers and has done some directmail marketing for donations. 'We've had a response to all the

things we've done," she added.

Because of its dependance on private funds for its holiday meals on wheels program, the Alliance needs all the physical and financial support it can get during the holidays. About 80 volunteers are signed up to par-

ticipate in this Thanksgiving's meals program. Though the group presently has enough volunteers to deliver meals in the Northville area, volunteers are still needed to deliver meals in the Westland, Dearborn, Dearborn Heights and Inkster areas.

Drivers will each be given between five and ten meals to deliver, to keep the demand on the volunteer's time to a minimum and assure that the meals are still warm when they ar-'We're only asking for an hour rive. to an hour and a half of their time," Punke said. "We could use some more volunteers for Christmas, and we're always looking for donations,' she added.

The meals themselves are provided by the Westland Medical Center, Botsford Hospital in Farmington Hills, and Riverside Osteopathic Hospital in Trenton.

Those wishing to make donations can send their tax-deductible contributions to the Senior Alliance, Area Agency on Aging 1-C, at 3850 Second Street, Suite 160, Wayne, Mich., 48184.

"We're much more than just meals on wheels," Punke added. The group also provides personal care, homemaker's and vision services, health screening and Medicare assistance. "All the programs are designed to focus on their in-dependence and help them maintain their dignity," Punke said.

In northern Northville City and Novi, holiday meals are provided by the Area Agency on Aging 1-B. The Agency, the first in southeastern Michigan and only the second in the country to offer holiday meals,

covers Oakland County and the other five counties surrounding Wayne County — Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, St. Clair and Washtenaw.

The agency serves over 5,000 peo-ple during its regular "meals on wheels" program, and as many as 2,500 on any given holiday. The program is made possible through donations from individuals, businesses and organizations in the six counties. According to Linda Peterson, director of resource and development at the Agency, the largest share of donations comes from private individuals.

"The thing that is particularly exciting is what happens to the volunteers and the way the community responds," Peterson said. "Every penny of the money for the holiday meals comes from the community. It's the community's gift back to its elderly people.'

In the past, she said, school children have taken donations for the program, and made greeting cards for the seniors themselves. Many volunteers supplement the meals they give with fresh fruit or candy.
"We always need more volunteers,

for Christmas and any of the holidays," Peterson said. "People should call now for Christmas."





New city Fire Inspector Bob Turner

Battling blazes

City welcomes new fire inspector

Fire bugs in Northville had better beware. The city has a new fire in-

Northville City Firefighter Robert Turner took the position of fire inspector in October from Alan Matthews, the former inspector for both Northville and Plymouth, when Matthews was appointed fire chief in Plymouth.

Matthews had been the city's inspector for nine years.

Turner, a nine-year member of the city's on-call fire department, is also full-time firefighter for Detroit Metro Airport. A graduate of the Michigan State Fire Inspector's School, he has two years of education in criminal justice in connection with his position as an arson investigator, and is completing a four-year program in fire science.

The change in inspectors was the result of Matthew's increased responsibilities in Plymouth, Turner said. The city had previously contracted with Matthews through a shared services fire prevention program, but his promotion in Plymouth kept the new fire chief from being available more than once a week for Northville. Because of the development and redevelopment in the area, Turner said, "our city has a great need for somebody more than just one day a week."

The fire inspector has authority over any building open to the public, including apartment complexes with common hallways or basements.

The new fire inspector certainly has his work cut out for him. All the city's businesses, over 200 in the downtown area alone, must be inspected once a year. In addition,

plans for new construction, such as the five-story MainCentre project now underway at the corner of Main and Center streets, must be reviewed ın detail. Turner must make sure that such plans meet the state's fire safety codes, which are updated every three years. The codes require sprinkler systems in buildings above a certain size, and fire alarms.

Though older buildings are grandfathered when the codes are updated, a separate life safety code requires that all buildings be updated in areas that could pose a serious health threat.

Fortunately for Turner, businesses in the city are - for the most part responsible when it comes to fire safety. "We really don't have any major problems in Northville," he said. The most common problems are improperly-installed or unsafe heating devices, and old or missing fire extinguishers.

Turner said that the inspection itself is relatively simple. "It would be no different than going into your house and looking for things that would start a fire," he said. "Except these buildings are open to the general public.

Turner also makes preplans of area businesses - maps detailing entrances, exits and storage locations of combustible and hazardous materials. These plans can be lifesavers if a fire does break out in one of the buildings. "Because I'm the only person that's going to see the building from the ground up, that's not going to help the 20 other guys who will have to go in there," he said, in the event of a fire.

"Every building in the town is dif-ferent," he said, "and usually when you go in there you can't see anything," because of the smoke. The plan helps firefighters fight the fire more effectively, and avoid possible hazards in the building.

Such a fire would be particularly devastating in the city's historic district. "There's nothing worse than losing one of these buildings, or a block of buildings, because you could never replace it," Turner said.

Another issue Turner must deal

with is the removal of underground fuel storage tanks. There are presently about 25 such tanks which must be removed because of a state law requiring the removal of tanks over 25 years old. "We have a lot of tanks that are going to be pulled out in the near future," he said.

Being a firefighter, even an on-call firefighter, is not what it used to be, Turner said. All the city's 23 firefighters must undergo intensive training in fire fighting techniques, weekly training meetings, and yearly updates in fields such as hazardous materials. Many of the firefighters are also emergency medical technicians. "It's not just fun anymore, it's a job," Turner said.

"We have a responsibility to the community to see that things are done safely," Turner said. "That's where I come in."

But Turner was hesitant to take a large share of the credit for maintaining fire safety in the town. "It's all one team," he said. "When it comes time to do the work, we all blend together."

Turner, 33, was born and raised in Livonia. A Northville resident for the last nine years, he is now married and has three children, all boys, who he fondly refers to as the "Bruise

Former resident wins men's pageant

Whether walking down a model's runway or moving up the corporate ladder, Carl Lang seems to be headed for success. Lang — a former Northville resident and student at Northville High — is the state's newest Mr. USA Michigan.

Lang, 25, originally had no desire to compete in the fifth annual Mr. USA Michigan contest. But after being talked into entering by his younger brother Russ, he went on to

Lang won the title from a field of 130 entrants, and 15 finalists. Held at the Macomb Center for the Performing Arts, the pageant included both an evening wear and swimsuit competition, in which Lang wore surfer shorts, and personal interviews. Entertainment was provided by the 'Isiah Thomas All Star Cheerleaders"

Unlike the Miss America pageant, in which state pageants lead to the national competition, victory in the Mr. USA Michigan competition does not qualify a person for a shot at Mr. USA. "The men's pageants haven't taken off like the women's pageants yet," Lang explained.

Lang described the men's pageant as "a fantasy world." "A lot of these guys are real gung-ho about it," he said. "A lot of them put too much faith in it. I think that's one of the things that helped me win, because I was more well-rounded."

Born in Detroit, Lang spent most of his childhood in the Northville area. He attended Our Lady of Victory and Catholic Central schools, and finished his secondary education at Northville High School

A graduate of Albion College with honors in geology and chemistry, Lang is now an account executive and analytical consultant with the Nalco Chemical Company in Troy. 'You always dream about winning and getting some recognition," he said of the pageant. "But first and foremost is my job at Nalco, that's what pays the bills."

"This is it for me as far as my pageant career," he said. But Lang is not resting on his laurels. He's using the connections he's made at the pageant to line up photo sessions with top Chicago and New York modeling agencies. Lang has also signed contracts with area modeling agencies such as Affiliated and Elite. "What's really nice is I've already got some contacts," he said.

As Mr. USA Michigan, Lang will also receive \$25,000 worth of prizes. I hope I don't have to pay taxes on it," he said with a short laugh.

One of the most exciting things

about all the prizes, Lang said, is that he has the chance to play Santa Claus. "I get to distribute them out to my friends and family," he said. Lang is hoping that he can give a \$10,000 scholarship to the business school, Stautzenberger College, to his brother Paul. He's less certain whether he'll give away his free trip for two to Acapulco.

Other prizes include spots on several television comercials, a waterbed, a leather jacket, a car phone, stereo and weightlifing equip-

This is not Lang's first taste of the modeling profession, but it has been a noticeable improvement over his last one. Several years ago, he approached an area modeling agency but was disillusioned by the treatment he received. "I ran into the wrong people," he recalled. "It just seemed like they were after the money, not caring about the people. You felt like a piece of meat."

Though he is pleased with his current success, Lang refuses to become too enthusiastic about his future in the modeling industry. "It's something you've got to keep down-to-earth about," he said. Two field trips for Northville High School students were approved by the Board of Education Monday, on the condition that a slide presentation be shown to board members after the excursions.

Board Secretary Carol Rahimi's proviso for approval of the trips was tongue-in-cheek, but understandable, considering student groups will be heading for Africa and Europe in the summer of 1990.

Nine students will be participating in a 12-day trip to Kenya in late July, according to Barbara LeBoeuf, social studies teacher at the high school and tour counselor for the trip. "Most of the trip will be spent on

safari," she said. "One of the highlights of the trip will have students spending two days on camel She said the students will be obser-

ving herd migrations during their stay in Kenya, which she called a wonderful and unique area of study. She also said the group will be welcomed with open arms in the African country.

"Kenyan people really love Americans," she said, adding that the student groups would spend most of their time away from cities.

The complete cost of the Kenyan tour is \$2,595, to be paid by the students and parents, who also must sign a document releasing the Northyllle Dibblic Cobes District. thville Public School District from liabilities which may result from the

The safari group will fly into Nairobi, visit the Samburu Game Reserve, take a two day camel trek, visit the Masai Mara Game Reserve, and meet the Masai people in a tribal village before returning to Nairobi.

The trip to Kenya will be a valuable learning experience, LeBoeuf said.

"It's really one of the few places you can go where the people and sights are completely different from Americans and their influences," she

The trip to Europe has not been finalized, although it has gained board approval. The cost of the trip has been pegged at \$2,300-\$2,400, and approximately 66 Northville High students will visit England, Germany, the Swiss Alps, Spain, Monaco, and France during the three week jaunt. The trip to Europe is being sponsored by the foreign language department at the high

The position for a Cooke School principal has been posted as well, and Bell said the position should be filled in early February, to allow the new principal to take part in the school's refurbishing and reopening.

As for the new locations of the ex-isting programs, Bell had little to We're going to do our best to diversify them around the district,' he said, to make them accessible to the entire community.

Organizations affiliated with the school system like the gifted students program and science and math technology may be able to remain in either Cooke or Moraine school, he said, since the decreased population in Moraine School would likely leave empty classrooms.

Bell was uncertain as to the fate of the other programs at the school, in-cluding Northville Cooperative Preschool, Early Childhood Development Center, Civic Concern, Community Education, Youth Assistance and and the senior citizens program. School officials are searching for possible locations for the programs, he said.

Those programs have been donated the space they now occupy at Cooke School. "These are all there because space was available and there is a need in the community" for such programs, Bell said.

Some space will be freed up with the departure of the state Department of Natural Resources (DNR) from the old Main Street Elementary School Bell said. The DNR presently leases space in the school, and school officials have decided not to renew their lease next year. Bell suggested that a preschool program and part of the school's maintenance operations, now housed at Cooke School, could use that space.

A new storage facility financed by the recent passage of a \$16 million bond will house the rest of the maintenance department, he said.

Wayne County budget may be revised

Wayne County Commission chairman Arthur Blackwell II said changes may be made to the newly approved county budget — but not because of pressure from county Executive Edward McNamara.

McNamara has threatened to veto the \$1.3 billion budget approved last week by commissioners. The county executive said he was upset by changes commissioners made to his original budget proposal, especially in cutting off \$37.8 million in funding for the new county jail.

Blackwell, however, minimized the

"We gave ourselves 30 days to make changes and I know some com-

missioners feel they want more information," he said. "So we may review our action, but not because of the executive.'

Commissioner Kevin Kelly, D-Redford Township, was among three commissioners who voted against the budget, requesting more explanation of budget projections.

The dispute with McNamara centers, in part, on cuts to his proposed jail construction budget. Commissioners eliminated more than three quarters of the amount McNamara had specified, saying they needed

more details on proposed jail bonds. Blackwell said the executive nould have made it bonds would be necessary during last year's jail millage campaign.

"What if we have 20-year bonds and a 10-year millage (to pay for them)?" Blackwell said. "What happens if the millage isn't renewed? We

aren't going to shut the jail." Blackwell said many commissioners favored a greater jail tax, 1.5-mills, during debate over last year's proposal.

Another dispute centers on acrossthe-board increases for county fees. McNamara calls tha increases a tax increase in disguise. Commissioners said increases are necessary to provide computer equipment for the county clerk's office.

An additional \$1.3 million added to the county's \$272.8 million budget for day-to-day operations is another sore point for the executive.

McNamara has said commissioners were spending money the county didn't have in increasing the ouaget; said the money was available because McNamara's original revenue projections were too conservative.

Cooke reopening forces relocations

Make way for the school children. The reopening of Cooke School as a middle school in 1990 will force the relocation of several programs now using the site.

Many area programs now use the facility at 21200 Taft Road. Civic Concern, Community Education, Early Childhood Development Center, Northville Cooperative Preschool, Northville Youth Assistance and Northville Area Senior Citizens programs all presently call the Cooke School home.

Public hearings will be held in January on the reopening of Cooke as a middle school, though dates has not yet been set. Residents can give their opinions there on the relocation of the

school's current programs.

Though school administrators have given program heads permission to use the facilities until June, 1990, at least one area program coordinator is planning to move out earlier to avoid conflicts with the building's refurbishment, which is scheduled to begin in February.

SENIOR CENTER

In a letter to the Northville city council and township board of trustees, Recreation Director John Anderson said the Recreation Department's Senior Citizens program, located at Cooke School for three years, will likely move before the June deadline. He wrote, "I believe the sooner we move, the smaller the disruptions we will

The senior program, which serves over 500 Northville senior citizens a year, needs office space for Senior Coordinator Karl Peters, a meeting room capable of housing 15 to 20 tables for activities such as card games and crafts, restroom facilities, and if possible, a small kitchen. The meeting room, according to the letter, "should be relatively handicapped accessible.'

CIVIC CONCERN

For the Civic Concern program located at the Cooke School for the last three years, this will be the latest in a long series of relocations since the group's founding in 1983. According to Chairperson Marlene Kunz, the group grew out of an annual "Good Fellow Drive" organized by local citizen Charles Smith. The drive provided children in the community with toys and food for the holidays.

First operated out of Smith's garage, the program then moved to a modular trailer, a church, another garage, City Hall, and the Old Village School — a former elementary school on Main Street - before moving to its present location in 1986.

The group provides emergency relief, mainly in the form of food, to

as many as 200 needy individuals a month. 50 to 60 families use the service every two weeks, and an additional 23 senior citizens participate in a Focus Hope program run by the group. Focus Hope is a supplemental food program for senior citizens with low income.

Civic Concern also provides emergency assistance to people about to be evicted from their dwellings or about to have their utilities shut off. The group steps in when an eviction or shut-off notice has been issued. "We never give out cash to the individual," Kunz added. "We deal directly with the utility or the

The program's space needs are relatively simple — just two rooms or a room separated by a partition. But because the group accepts government grants, it must have access to refrigeration and freezer space, a prerequisite of grant candidates.

The program's status as a nonprofit organization limits the type of space available to the group. "We can't afford to pay rent," said Kunz. ""We just can't afford that and still afford to service the community."

The program receives grant assistance from Oakland and Wayne Counties. "We're totally reliant on our community," Kunz said.

City and township officials have been actively seeking a site for the various Cooke School programs for several weeks. A preliminary investigation by City Manager Steven Walters has turned up the old Scout Building next to the Post Office on Cady Street as a possible site for both the Senior Citizen and Civic Concern programs.

The building is owned by the city and currently rented to the city's engineering firm, McNeely & Lincoln Associates. The firm pays the city \$12,000 annually for the building, and pays for utilities and maintenance of the building's interior. "It's an expense to have the engineers move out and the senior center move in," Walters explained. "There are bills to deal with and somebody's got to pay them." Walters said the city council will likely discuss the proposal at its next meeting.

EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT

The Early Childhood Development Center's Cooke School programs will also need to relocate next year. The Center provides child care and preschool classes to children between 21/2 and 5 years old at the Cooke

The Early Childhood Development program is extensive, serving over 500 children at its Cooke, Moraine and Silver Springs school locations. More than 185 families are served by the Cooke School program alone.

Conservancy works to save open space

A new group is trying to set aside open land as natural areas before development in greater Detroit leaves none left.

The newly formed Southeast Michigan Land Conservancy hopes to work with developers, individuals and other conservation groups to preserve natural areas in the region, according to its president, Jack Smiley of Detroit

"It's certainly not an anti-development thing. It's pushing for quality development and balancing development with preservation, Smiley said recently. "It's much cheaper to preserve areas (before they are developed) than to do it after the fact '

The group's first focus is a 40-acre plot of vacant land adjoining the William P. Holliday Forest and Wildlife Preserve — which is the only dedicated wildlife sanctuary in Wayne County, according to the group. The preserve runs through Westland and parts of Canton and Livonia.

The conservancy plans a much wider concentration eventually, though: Smiley said the conservancy wants to get involved in projects throughout Wayne County and the surrounding area.

"Our focus is primarily on the urbanized southeast Michigan area. No other group covers that area," Smiley said.

"I'd like to see something in Northville before the condos go everywhere," he added.

The conservancy is structured along the lines of the Nature Conservancy, a national organization which buys and protects natural areas across the country. Smiley said the new group is important because it concentrates its efforts on southeast Michigan and will deal with parcels smaller than those which would interest the Nature Conservancy.

"Our focus is on areas they might not consider," he explained. However, he does hope the local and the national group will work together on some projects.

The philosophy behind both groups is simple preservation — not for parks or any other purpose, but to keep natural land natural. "We have to approach saving habitats so many of these species don't become endangered in the first place," Smiley

The conservancy plans to inventory areas which would be good to preserve. From there, it hopes to buy the land or negotiate "conservation easements" which would protect key natural features.

The first major effort is at the Holliday preserve, which Smiley called "without a doubt the best natural area in Wayne County." It provides a home to fox and deer, and is the only documented place in

Wayne County with broad-winged hawks, he said.

The site is about half wetlands making development difficult and the owner eager to sell to the conservancy. The group aims to raise \$20,000 by February under the terms of a land contract. Total price of the land is \$150,000, Smiley said.

The cooperative effort at the Holliday site is a good example of what the conservancy wants to do, Smiley said. Sometimes efforts to preserve nature have a strong anti-

development tone, he explained. "It's kind of a negative role," he said. "We want to be more of a positive force in the communities . . . We are and will continue to work with

The group welcomes suggestions of areas to preserve, as well as requests for membership or more informa-tion. The group's address is 6410 St. Mary's, Detroit, MI 48228; the phone number is 582-8377.

City considers use of trolley

A streetcar named Desire? No, a trolley that may have Northville's

Local residents John and Toni Genitti along with Valente's Little Italy Restaurant have purchased a trolley similar to the Dearborn trolley used during the city's Vic-torian Festival in September, and have offered to donate its use to the city. Northville officials are currently exploring that possibility.

City Manager Steven Walters told the council of the purchase at a re-cent council meeting. "It's now under local control," he said, 'though with no city involvement as

Walters was charged with figuring the cost of city operation of such a vehicle when the Genittis and Valetne's first approached city officials with the idea several weeks ago. He said that insurance of the vehicle under the city's fleet insurance policy would be "quite practical," citing the fact that several public transportation-type vehicles are already similarly insured, including a Community Recreation and Senior Citizen's bus.

The cost of insurance under the ci-

ty policy would be about \$600 a year, he said. The cost to a private in-dividual such as Genitti, on the other hand, would likely be prohibitive. "What we have to do is develop a cost picture that has the amount of rental revenue required each day," Walters

City officials also discussed building an extra bay on the new Department of Public Works barn, which could be used to house the trolley or other city DPW vehicles. The cost of such an addition would be about \$4,000.

Several council members still had questions about the city's operation of the trolley. "Do we want to be in the rental business?" Paul Folino asked. Carolann Ayers asked about other benefits to city operation of the vehicle. "The use of it on public streets," Walters said. "Who would operate that in a policy sense if not for the city?"

Such issues as routes, schedules and drop-off locations could be better coordinated by the city than a private individual, he said.

Walters said he will present two cost analyses to the council at their Nov. 20 meeting — one with city involvement, and one without



Local lawmaker blasts budget cuts

those charging Governor James Blanchard with overstepping his bounds in ordering \$46 million in cuts to the state welfare budget.

State Senator R. Robert Geake, R-Northville, whose district includes Livonia, Redford Township, Plymouth Township, Plymouth and Canton Township, in addition to Northville, said the governor had no authority to issue cuts to the social service budget in the manner he did.

At issue is a little-used provision of a 1974 state law.

State budget director Shelby Solomon recently announced portions of the \$2.2 billion social services budget won't be fully funded. In doing so, Solomon said he was complying with the law's requirement of 15 days's notice to legislators.

Geake, however, said the law was incorrectly interpreted and that the cuts needed to be preceded by an ex-ecutive order — subject to approval by the Senate Appropriations Committee, which Geake heads.

"The issue is whether the executive branch has the ability to make changes without issuing an executive order," Geake said. If that were the case, he added, legislators

A Northville lawmaker is among would have little or no say over the budget.

Solomon has said he doesn't expect to use the budget-cutting law again this year but would do so if necessary.

The dispute is now before state attorney general Frank Kelley. A spokeswoman for the attorney general's office said an opinion was

expected sometime this week.

Proposed cuts include:
• \$11.8 million from Medicaid programs, including drug programs.

• \$1.6 million taken from the Office of Children and Youth Services, including spending for programs assisting juvenile deliquents and preserving troubled families.

• \$32.5 million in administrative reductions, including delaying hiring for replacements for departed staff members.

"These cuts would affect reimbursement for hospitals and pharmacists," Geake said.

Though adopted 15 years ago, the budget-cutting provision cited by Solomon had never been used before.

Regardless of the attorney general's ruling, state Rep. Joseph Young Sr., D-Detroit, has introduced legislation that would repeal the budget-cutting provision.

Community groups deserve our help

With the reopening of the Cooke School as a middle school, many programs now using those facilities will have to pack their bags and find another site to set up house. Several of these programs have been like foster children for the past few years, shuffled from house to house with no real place to call home.

Not that this is the fault of the Northville Public Schools, whose Superintendant George Bell has repeatedly affirmed his support for the programs. The school system has given the programs shelter in times of need. But the school's primary focus is the education of school children, and rightfully so.

It is the misfortune of the programs to be located in a growing community, one in which the growing need for school facilities is outpacing even the space for social services. The problem may be one of the classic Catch-22 situations. The more growth in the community — the more need for the programs — and the less space available to house them.

Maybe it's time for the rest of the community to come to these programs' aid. Thousands of Northville citizens have benefited from the services offered by the Civic Concern, Community Education, Cooperative Preschool, Early Childhood Development Center, Youth Assistance and Senior Citizens programs. They provide food to the needy, day care to children, emotional support to the young and old, and education to all.

These services have often been provided under trying conditions. Civic Concern has operated out of at least two garages in its history, and several of the groups just completed a move from Moraine School this year. None have called a single location home for more than a few years.

It's time to stop treating these groups like second-class citizens. The number of people which they serve in the community is growing, and it's about time their value to the community was acknowledged with more than a temporary lease.

City and township officials should be actively seeking a more permanent site for these programs, which have proven their worth to the community over the years. Perhaps consideration could be given to them in the design of a new library, or new public facilities. There may be private individuals willing to donate space, time or funds to their continued existence. One thing is for certain - the need for such programs will not go away.

Part of what makes Northville such a wonderful community is the intricate balance of people and programs. The community would be less without the weekly card parties at Cooke School. The work done by Northville Youth Assistance does not, by its very nature, stand in the spotlight
— but for the youths involved it serves a very necessary function.

The community as a whole has assumed that space would be provided for these programs as part of the Northville School system. That space has run out and it is time for everyone in the community to commit to finding the proper facilities for these necessary programs.

Residents urged to support recycling

Northville Township.

The township Board of Trustees last week voted to approve a modest expenditure of \$2,300 for materials which will kick into gear a temporary recyclable goods collection center on Sheldon Road.

We're pleased to see the township taking strides — without having to be coerced by higher powers — to tackle the very real problems posed by overflowing landfills.

And we hope the residents of Northville Township will not only actively support recycling programs, but also will prod the township to get the collection center up and running as soon as

There really is no choice but to get behind the recycling movement. To be sure, inconviences will accompany any plan which necessitates the separation of recyclable items, and your taxes most definitely will not be lowered during the formulative stages of recycling. But changes that may seem

The future is now for recycling in dramatic are the only remedies

In short, residents should not be afraid of recycling because of unfamiliarity with the concept. The cost effectiveness of recycling will not be known for some time, but the value gained by lessening our impact on the environment is immeasurable.

In the not-to-distant future, Northville Township will be forced to comply with recycling outlines mandated by Wayne County and the Western Townships Utility Authority (WTUA). By initiating a recycling program now, the township has the opportunity to lay the foundation for a solid collection plan, and work out the bugs which inevitably will follow.

Residents should get used to the idea of separating their recyclable items and take pride that they are joining the effort to better the community's quality of life. The government and residents of Northville Township should take a stand and promote themselves as enlightened leaders in the move toward recycling.

Student awareness

A spark of idealism flashed in the Northville Public School District last month when an enthusiastic group of young people got together for the inaugural meeting of Students Aware of the World (SAW). And unless some party-dampening guardians of the status-quo decide to put the clamps on the kids, SAW may burst into a fullfledged flame of hope.

Cynics may sniff at the idea of SAW. I can hear them grumbling already. "Students Aware of the World? Harrumph. Sounds like communism. Looks like they're up to no good."

It all depends on how one defines the word "good."

Whoa now, that's sure to raise the hackles of the put-Reagan's-face-on-Mt. Rushmore crowd.

Well, more power to the students.

The first meeting of SAW was poorly organized, to be sure. But there was no lack of energy, and the potential for commitment permeated the group's crowded conference room. Jock-types asked if anything could be done to protest the sale of ivory in the Northville area. Shy freshmen girls spoke against the harvest of animals for fur coats. Teens talked of recycling projects - and human rights issues in South Africa. In short, they were becoming aware of the world.

After a decade of white-collar-anything-goes, capped by the shameful for-sale foray into the Far East by a grinning ex-president, Students Aware of the World is more than refreshing. The idea is invigorating, and lends credence to the axiom that seeds (of discontent) will grow truer and stronger if manure is heaped upon them.

Jason Baker and his SAW crowd are apparently tired of holding their noses. They are trying to grow from the raunchy pile of greed the 1980's dumped on them and are eying at least partial rejection of the code of honor of the gimme generation. They are concerned about the destruction of the rain forests, the wanton slaughter of animals so that humans can enjoy glossier makeup. and the routine interruption of human rights worldwide.



Program stresses good parenting skills

This is another in a continuing series of columns by Northville Youth Assistance Director Mary Ellen King.

Some parents have irrational beliefs about what parenting is all about. The Systematic Training for Effective parenting (STEP) lists some of the common irrational beliefs of some parents.

1.In order to be a good parent, I must be approved of by everyone in the community. 2.To be a worthwhile person, I must be competent in all aspects of parenting.

3. When things don't turn out the way I want them to, I consider it terrible or even catastrophic.

4. People are victims of their heredity or environment and there is really very little one can do to change most behavior.

5.I am responsible for my children's misbehavior. If I were a more effective parent my child would always be well

behaved.

If a parent has a pattern of irrational beliefs, it is time to consider change. No one needs to go through life at the mercy of irrational beliefs.

The first step to develop rational beliefs is to try to reevaluate your view of a specific event. The event may only need to be put into context. For example, one may try to recognize that disappointments in the relationship with a teen are simply that disappointments. Disappointments are not catastrophes. They may be frustrating, unfortunate or incovenient problems but they are not catastrophes. Another example could be for a parent to recognize that just because he or she really wants things to go well, there's no reason why events should or must go well all the time.

Typically, parents can help themselves think more rationally when they express themselves to teens by stating preferences

rather than giving commands. Examples of preference statements are, "If I could choose . . I'd prefer . . . It would be better if." With more and more practice using preference statements, parents will help to gradually eliminate irrational beliefs. Preference statements are also a means by which parents can foster independent behavior in their teens. It is important for parents to have the courage to recognize that they are not perfect and to allow their teens to make mistakes also.

Parents can challenge their irrational beliefs by asking the following questions: 1. What proof exists that my belief is

2. What evidence exists that may indicate that my belief is not true?

3. What is the worst outcome of the situa-

A simpler system

We had to leave town suddenly, so I called Good Neighbor Harriet, who has a key to our house, to take care of a few things.

A movie videotape had to go back to Meijer's. An educational videotape had to go back to the local public library, a member of the Wayne Oakland Library Federation

Her husband, Good Neighbor Jim, took care of the Meijer's videotape. He explained that he didn't know when it was borrowed, and he was returning it for a friend. No problem. The clerk scanned it, sent Jim through the line and had a bill ready in seconds.

Harriet, however, had trouble at the library. "The computer is down. You can't return it," said the librarian.

"Can't" return it?!? That was the wrong thing to say to Good Neighbor Harriet. Consider: She has a job and a household to run. She was doing this as a favor. She had driven through combat-strength suburban traffic. She was standing there with the videotape in one hand and a \$10 bill in the other. And the librarian was telling her she "can't" return

Under the circumstances, I would have been less restrained than Good Neighbor Harriet.

"I am returning it," she said, handing the tape to the librarian. At this point, the librarian began to use the brains God gave her. Together they calculated when I borrowed it and how much was due.

In the Intelligent Days — that is, between the Good Ol' Days and Today — $\,$ libraries had a better system.

Each book, record or tape had a little manila card that was taken out of the folder and put in a file. When someone couldn't find a resource you had borrowed, the librarian could flip through the file and tell the client, "It's checked out."

When you returned the resource, the librarian pulled the card from the file and checked if you were prompt or late. If you were late, you paid a fine. Simple. Schoolkids could run it.

Barbara Louie is the local history Davis. They were delivered in large tins, and librarian at the Novi Public Library. She is currently working on two books of history one on Novi, the other on Northville. Her columns about the history of Northville will appear occasionaly on the pages of the Northville Record.

Back in the days of common place illiteracy, most shops were identified by visual aids rather than printed signs. A large, somber wooden Indian signified a tobacco shop; a giant boot hanging from a chain denoted a cobbler's shop; a candystriped pole indicated a barber shop.

In another shop of the 19th century, one would find green and red globes hanging in the window. This was the symbol of a pharmacy: the green globe supposedly indicated the bad (green) blood that went into the store, while the good (red) blood left the store with the prescribed medicine.

Many of the early druggist's medicinal ingredients were extracted from herbs and other natural elements received from pharmaceutical companies like Detroit's Parke- Charles Stevens, whose store was located on

the pharmacist kept the contents in glass jars, stored in a large cabinet behind the

On his scales he weighed the ingredients and, mixing together a specific "recipe" from his prescription books, would combine, smash and grind up the various substances with his mortar and pestle that he kept conveniently on the counter.

The pharmacy was a vital place for late 19th century individuals. In fact, most people went to a pharmacist before the doctor when they were ill, relying on the druggist's relatively inexpensive expertise to allay their aches and pains.

Pharmacies held an important place in many early communities, including Northville. The Peoples Drug Store was the name of a pharmacy and laboratory in Northville, which opened in 1869. It was run by Dr. C.C. Kingsbury.

Another early local druggist was

Main Street. He held a respected place in the community in the 1890s, with his large stock of drugs and related items.

Stevens also produced some of his own medicines, which reportedly sold well and were "recognized as strictly superior," according to a promotional pamphlet issued by

Many early pharmacies had, along with the prescription counter, a soda fountain or soda bar tended to by a soda jerk, who "jerked" the soda from the taps. Typical soda bars at the turn of the century had marble counters and a mirrored wall, with fancy stools and small tables and chairs.

Ice cream was brought to the western world by Marco Polo from China. By Dolly Madison's time, ice cream was the national dessert of the U.S.

The combination drug store/soda fountain lasted well up through the 1960s. Though together they are relics of a past age, individually both the pharmacy and the ice cream shop still hold almost equally important places in today's world.





committee searching for a new location, said the last move was difficult because the Cooke School location is in Oakland County, while Moraine is in Wayne. Because of the change in counties, the program had to reapply for a license as a day care center.

Though the present search is still in a preliminary stage, Droze said that letters nave been sent to Northville Public School (NPS) officials, in-cluding Dr. Burton Knighton, who helped locate the program's present site. "We are looking for another location, and we're trying to keep in contact with the NPS," Droze said.

Droze is philosophical about the loss of the Cooke School facility. "That's how Northville's expanding," she said.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION

Karen Hooper, supervisor of the Northville Community Education program, said Northville Public School officials were searching for a new home for her program as well. "We don't expect to be in this building," she said, "but we don't know where we'll be. So far I have no idea what they'll find for us." The program is overseen by the NPS in conjunction with the Garden City Public Schools.

The community education program has provided leisure classes and clases for high school credit to people of all ages, including senior

citizens, for the last six years. From 30 to 35 adult education classes are offered each session, as well as children's classes and field trips.

Adult education classes include arts and crafts, computer and aerobic classes, and field trips. Children's classes include painting, drawing and dance.

Most of the adult education classes are given in Northville High School, while the rest of the classes are given throughout the school system, with one classroom at Cooke School reserved for community education classes. Another Cooke classroom is reserved for Hooper's office. Because of the limited space now used at Cooke, Hopper did not anticipate that the move would present much of an inconvenience. "Most of my classes are held in the various schools," she said, "so I don't think it will have a big impact."

YOUTH ASSISTANCE

"We don't know where we're going," said Suzanne Markey of the Northville Youth Assistance program. The program officials are leaving it up to the NPS and School Superintendant George Bell to find a new site. ""Everybody knows," Markey said. "Our council knows, and Dr. Bell knows, but he has more pressing matters to deal with right now than our new location.'

Northville Youth Assistance was formed in February, 1987, to provide support to community youth between

the ages of 6 and 17. Clients are refer-red by the schools, police and parents, and are then paired with a volunteer. The volunteer spends

several hours a week with the client. "We're not even looking for problem kids necessarily," said program Director Mary Ellen King, just kids that need some support or

are new in the area." According to King, over 70 volunteers have been trained to participate in the program since its inception. This year, she expects to pair 40 children and teenagers with

volunteers. The youth stay in the program for different lengths of time. "Some are in the program eight weeks," she said, "while some have been in for two years.'

"We've had a real positive response from the community," she said, "especially when you look at the number of volunteers

The program is funded by both the city and township, while the NPS provides the office space. The program needs little space — just an office for King and a reception area for clients and volunteers.

The program also needs a larger meeting room occasionally for the training of volunteers. "We just had 19 people go through training," King said, "so we used the Senior Center area at Cooke. It would be nice to have a facility where I can share a conference room, but I can always

# 'No cause for alarm about takeovers'

"There's no cause for alarm, no reason for panic" because of corporate takeovers, a University of Michigan professor told an audience of business leaders recently.

"There's no supporting evidence of harm to people or communities" when one company bids successfully for control of another, Michael Bradley, a professor of business administration, finance and law told an audience gathered by the U-M business school.

Bradley's numbers showed that stockholders in targeted companies are big gainers, and there are no big layoffs resulting from takeovers.

"The popular press has Americans going to hell. They don't know what's going on or else they're listening to targeted managers," Bradley said.

Hostile takcovers are just one form of corporate restructuring. One company, often called a "raider," offers a price 30 percent or more beyond the market price for control of the target

Other restructurings, said Bradley, are negotiated merges nd "leveraged buyouts," or LBOs. With an LBO, a firm's managers fight a hostile takeover by issuing risky, high yield "junk bonds" to take a firm off the stock market and into private control.

"Junk bonds are not doing very well," said Bradley, adding that they are really equity rather than debt instruments.

During the Reagan presidency, the number of transactions doubled from 2,000 in 1981 to the 4,000 range currently. Total value of the transactions tripled from \$60 billion in 1981 to a high of more than \$200 billion in

Shareholders of the targeted firms are big winners. "Takeovers are paid for mainly by cash distributions. Much net wealth is created. These are not paper profits. These are pictures of George (Washington) you can go out and spend."

After a takeover, research and development expenditures tend to

He said a U-M doctoral student is studying the effects of takeovers on employment and so far has found "no negative effect. There's more employment ... That's where the research is going, but it's very slow."

An audience questioner raised the case of United Air Lines (UAL), where employees bought control at \$300 a share of a company whose stock earlier had been less than \$100

"Will you feel better getting on UAL? I'll feel a lot worse with an over-leveraged, rather desperate corporation run by desperate people," the listener said.

"I can make just as many arguments that it will be more efficient," Bradley replied. "We need some evidence. I don't know. I don't think there will be a material change (in safety).'

Merritt Fox, a law professor. replied that gains to targeted shareholders weren't the only consideration.

'There's a sense of demoralization (at the targeted company)," Fox said. "It's difficult to get managers to identify with team interests if they don't know the team will be around. The sense of team identity disintegrates . . . They are working in an environment where you have a high chance of losing your job.'

Fox noted a tendency for new owners to move operations to lower cost areas, resulting in a geographic redistribution of wealth between regions "There are clearly losers."

he said Joel Seligman, also a law professor, said the hottest area of antitakeover law these days is at the state level Legislatures are passing laws to protect local firms "But state law may have gone too far in protecting management," he said.

He noted the U.S Supreme Court, in a 6-3 decision, upheld an Indiana law saying target boards had the right to ask stockholder approval of a takeover. Michigan has adopted a similar law sponsored by Rep. John Bennet, D-Redford.

Seligman said there still are difficulties with state anti-takeover laws: The federal government has jurisdiction over interstate commerce, and federal law is preeminent when there is a conflict with state law.

Elias Brothers' personnel pointed out different features of the restaurant, including the salad bar, the waitress stations and the kitchen layout. The managers asked many questions about the restaurant, took careful notes and photographed what they observed.

The managers represented restaurants in the chain of 55 Big Boy restaurants in Japan. "All of the restaurants are owned by one franchise, Daiei, which is the fourth largest retail corporation in Japan," said Camille Cleveland, project coordinator for Elias Brothers.

Part of the agenda for the Japanese managers included learn-

ing about food trends in the United States, which tend to run about five years ahead of food trends in Japan. Frozen yogurt and in-store bakeries, which are food trends (in the U.S. now), will show up in Japan in about five years," said Cleveland.

In addition to observing food trends in the Novi and other Big Boy restaurants, the managers participated in a seminar on food trends at Elias Brothers' corporate headquarters in Warren.

When they return to Japan, the managers will be using their newfound knowledge in Big Boy restaurants which are in some wavs similar to American Big Boy restaurants. Visitors to the restaurants can count on seeing a statue of Big Boy, the well-known symbol of the Big Boy chain, decked

out in his red-and-white checkered overalls. The Japanese restaurants also use the Big Boy corporate symbols.

# Area man's service covers 81 lenders

If necessity is the mother of invention, then dissatisfaction may be the mother of entrepreneurship.

In 1983, Steve Conaway was a real estate agent for ERA First Federal Realty in Livonia, finding himself making dead-end phone calls to mortgage lenders, trying to get mortgage rate information for his clients.

Today he publishes that same information for lenders, real estate agents, CPAs and the public in the form of the Weekly Mortgage Reporter for his company, Residential Mortgage Consultants

"I had identified an area that was a fairly big problem, at least for me,' Conaway said from his home office in Northville's Highland Lakes subdivision. "There were a lot of programs out there that could help people get into a home but few knew about them. And I felt a responsibility as an agent to help my clients find a mor-

'I spent many hours on the phone getting ahold of people who didn't know what I was talking about and weren't very well versed in mortgages even though they worked for a mortgage company. It was costing me a lot of time. I knew if I could help my client, it was going to make a more solid transaction, which was to everyone's benefit.

With a partner, he started a service listing the mortgage rates of 30-35 lenders while continuing his real estate sales. When his partner took another job offer, Conaway left real estate as an agent to concentrate on running the business by himself.

He now covers 81 of 100 lenders in the tri-county area, listing mortgage rates, points and a weekly average trend. In addition to selling the service to professionals in the mortgage and real estate fields, he also sells a their mortgage rates, which are updated each Monday

Reasons behind Conaway's frustration in tracking down mortgage rates as a real estate agent

helped him carve a niche for his

"Six of seven years ago, you really didn't have to shop for a mortgage everybody's rate was the same. Now there's at least 100 lenders and there's a wide variance of as much as a 1-percent spread among lenders from week to week.'

Conaway also blames the advent of points for muddying the mortgage waters. A point is 1 percent of the mortgage amount that is due at closing. For the sake of simplicity, Conaway lumps charges such as origination and discount fees into the points category for his listing.

'Two points is the normal rate. Anytime it's more, you're paying for a buydown (reduction in interest rate), which is maybe something you

Conaway's rule of thumb is: On a 30-year fixed rate mortgage, it takes six points to buy down 1 full percent. On a 15-year fixed rate, it takes four points to come down a full percen-

tage.
But he cautions that the complexity of points and other fees is something that potential buyers take seriously.

"It behooves anyone who's shopping to compare rates carefully. They can save anywhere from a few hundred dollars at closing in points to thousands of dollars over the life of the mortgage.

Fixed-rate mortgages get the nod from Conaway over adjustable rate mortgages (ARMs).

"If you were to talk to a bank, they'd say the adjustable rate is very popular. But I'm in disagreement with ARMs There are a couple of instances when it's a good program. One is if you're going to be in the house two years or less. Then even in the worse-case scenario, it would average out to less than today's interest rate for a fixed-rate mortgage.

"The second is for young couples or others who can't qualify at fixed rates. But in general, fixed rates are a better program because ARMs can go up as much as 6 percent."

Although Conaway has been tracking the mortgage scene for six years, he has been unable to devise a formula for predicting the rise and fall of rates.

'I would say it's totally unpredictable. You can't even take it from month to month. There's no rhyme or reason because there are so many factors involved. It can be anything from (Federal Reserve chairman Alan) Greenspan's speeches saving six- and 13-week subscription to the public. Lenders are charged to list of Treasury Bills to the bond market. Inflation is also a key factor. If the CPI (Consumer Price Index) goes

up, it sends mortgage rates up. "But it's very hard to predict, and I stay as far away from it as I can.

"We recognize that the market in which we operate constantly changes and our success depends upon understanding the market place and consumer needs," Powner said.

She explained that NBD must be flexible in order to contend with factors beyond their control, such as weakening automobile production, personal consumption expenditure

declines and unemployment. "If the forecast of slowing growth proves to be correct, the next step in Federal Reserve Policy is likely to be a move toward ease in order to help keep economic growth from slowing

too much," Powner said. She added that the Mortgage Bankers Association forecast expects several modest easing actions by the Federal Reserve in the latter

"The anticipated decline in mortgage rates should cushion the decline in housing activity currently underway amd lead to a modest upturn in home sales before the end of this year and into 1990," she said. However, if inflation slows more

later this year than is expected, a larger decline in market interest rates and the cost of mortgage credit could occur

"In addition, the Federal Reserve's monetary policy decisions are likely to be influenced by the absence of significant progress in negotiations between Congress and the Administration to reduce the federal budget deficit," Powner



# Spare bedroom can easily become office space

Q: After 16 years as a full-time homemaker and mother, I've decided to take it easy for a change--- I'm going back to work full time (as the executive director of a preservation group where I've been a longtime volunteer). I'll be working out of an office at home—as soon as I figure out how to shoehorn it into the guest bedroom. Any ideas?-C.D.

A: An office is where you find it these days. For some 26.6 million Americans (according to LINK Resources Corp., a New York-based market research firm), going to work means staying home, at least part of the work week.

A home office should be conducted to efficient work, first of all. And it should be both comfortable and visually pleasant enough to keep you from dreading going in there. But aside from these logical considera-tions, you can, indeed, "shoehorn" a perfectly workable office into a comparatively small space.





# How to get rid of waxy build-up on table

### By Gene Gary

Q: I have an Oriental wood table, high-gloss brown finish, that has very ornate carving. Old wax and dirt have built up on the surface, clogging and marring the carvings. How can I clean this table without marring the fin-Ish?--C.O.

A: Wipe with fine steel wool and turpentine or dab with a stiff brush wet with turpentine. Also, try a product like Formby's Furniture Face Lift, which cleans and restores the finish in a three-step process. This product is usually available at larger hardware stores.

Q: I frequently read your column, which has included information on paints, especially the advice on using paint with a mildewcide for areas where moisture is a problem.

Q: This spring I had a drive and walkway installed out of concrete pavers. It looks more like brick than concrete, and is quite lovely. However, is there any way to prevent gaso-

line and other stains from penetrating into pavers? Everything seems to stain the pavers quite easily.—S.K.

A: Concrete is porous and subject to staining. To help protect the surface, apply a masonry sealer, available at masonry supply companies. Most sealers are clear. However, some come in colors which will provide a colored tint to the concrete surbrand name.

Q: I have several antique pewter bowls with have been stored for years. They are very tarnished and dirty. Can you recommend a cleaning process to restore the lustrous pewter surface?—A.M.

A: The standard way to clean pewter is to dunk it in hot, soapy water; rinse; then dry immediately and thoroughly wipe with a soft cloth. Use silver polish to get rid of light tarnish

Or use one of the special cleaners available at major hardware stores. Excessive grime and tarnish can be removed with "OO" steel wool, dipped

surface.

If the pewter pieces have a brownish scale rather than a really blackened appearance, soak the pieces in a strong lye solution. (Anything with wooden knobs or handles should not be treated this way.) Cover items completely, allowing to remain about 15 minutes; then remove with tongs, rinse carefully and scrub with a soft brush. Then polish the pewter in the regular way.

If you like your pewter with a mellow, antique glow, finish by polishing with a paste made of rottenstone and salad oil. For mirror-bright pewter. polish with rottenstone moistened with rubbing alcohol.

Why does John P. O'Brien of the O'Brien Chapel on Grand River, volunteer time in Novi Youth Assistance and also on the Advisory Board of Youth Assistance for Oakland County?

Because he is a trained social worker who used to have direct contact with neglected children an experience he couldn't forget when he changed careers

So four years ago he joined Novi Youth Assistance, the organization whose purpose is to provide growth experiences for families and youth which will help deter wrong-going life styles.

As vice-president of the organization and coordinator of public relations, O'Brien knows

what is being done in the organization, and he arranges the necessary publicity through newspaper, cable TV, direct mail, and posters

The public needs to know about the on-going and seasonal programs like family education, winter and summer camp experience, summer-time Teen Center recreation, and Plus, which is an opportunity for children who need role-model adults in their

And the public needs to know that all of this costs money, which is raised in many ways, but chiefly through an annual bowlathon

What is the Oakland County Advisory Board to which O'Brien also belongs? It's a group of persons representing 26 local Youth Assistance programs, and it meets several times a year at the court house to discuss and evaluate what they're doing.

"What I miss most is seeing kids," O'Brien said regarding his work volunteering, versus his previous work in social work.

But he does get an occasional opportunity when he goes on a field trip for summertime Teen Center.







# Bird expert offers suggestions for feeding feathered friends

Yes, those pesky yellow dandelions polk-dotting the lawn every spring are good for something.

Bird lovers may be delighted to learn that the dandelions feed their feathered friends as they turn to fluff, by producing tasty seeds.

And those prickly, bothersome thistles do the same. Flowering thistles attract insects, which in turn draw birds. In their non-flowering stage the thistles produce bird food in the form of seeds. Serving a dual role, the thistles also provide nesting sites for some species of birds.

Most bird lovers probably won't want to plant dandelions and thistles in their lawns or gardens. But they can plant more attractive greenery as a means of attracting birds to their yards.

Dr. Grover Niergarth, a professor at Schoolcraft College, shared some of his bird-attracting secrets with members of the Northville Woman's Club at their meeting on Friday, Nov. 6. He shared slides of trees, shrubs, birds, feeders and bird houses to illustrate his suggestions.

lustrate his suggestions.

Niergarth suggested planting decorative trees such as flowering crabapples, autumn olives or dogwoods to intice birds to the yard. The featured creatures also tend to be attracted to oaks — because they eat the acorns — maple trees and red cedars. Spruces serve as good nesting spots for birds.

Other shrubbery and greenery that appeals to birds include winter berry (also known as Michigan holly), Solomon's seal — a spring wildflower — and barberry. Although most people are repulsed by them the berries found on poison ivy and poison sumac also attract birds.

Instead of planting trees or shrubs, bird lovers may choose to put up bird houses, feeders or nesting shelves, equally effective in capturing the attention of birds.

"You can do anything you want with birdhouses," Niergarth said. "Use any type you want to attract the

species of bird you want."

Robins prefer nesting shelves. Bluebirds and swallows flock to long, narrow houses with small holes. Purple martins favor large houses with at least eight compartments.

at least eight compartments.

The best known method of attracting birds, however, is winter feeding. Only 10 percent of the bird population relies solely on domestic bird seed for its food during the spring and summer.

In the winter the scenario is different. Niergarth advises bird lovers to feed birds throughout the winter because they become dependent on the handout. Suggestions for feeding include oil sunflower seeds — the small black seeds rather than the striped ones — wild bird mix, thistle (Niger) seed, suet or suet with peanut butter or wild bird mix.

Feeders don't need to be elaborate, Niergarth stressed. Some may choose to spread a mixture of peanut butter and suet directly on the bark of a tree.



# Ladywood ousts Northville from Districts

A tough draw and a slow start were two factors the Northville basketball squad just couldn't overcome last Monday night (Nov. 13) in the first round of MHSAA District play.

The host Mustangs fell to a solid Livonia Ladywood team, 42-33, but did outscore the Blazers 18-14 in the second half. Two days earlier, in the final regular season game of '89, Northville nipped Westland John Glenn to guarantee another winning season. The Mustangs ended the campaign with an 11-10 overall mark (5-5 in the WLAA).

'We had a tough draw but we played (Ladywood) tough," Northville Coach Ed Kritch said.

Both teams started the game a bit tentative on offense. The Mustangs connected on just one field goal in the first eight minutes, but the Blazers had their problems as well - hitting just two-of-nine from the free throw stripe in the first quarter. Ladywood took an 8-3 lead into the second.

"We really had a number of decent scoring opportunities, but we came out really tight," Kritch said.

The Blazers started to crank up their powerful inside game in the second period and the lead increased. Cari Mitter and Rebecca Willey combined for 12 of Ladywood's 20 points in the quarter, to put Northville behind 28-14 at the break

"The second was the quarter that, obviously, salted the victory away for them," Kritch said. "We started to wear down emotionally and their two inside players dominated

Leading scorer Kate Holstein hit a pair of unanswered buckets early in the second half to cut the lead to 10 and then in the fourth, it was Holstein again, scoring three points in the first few minutes to pull the Mustangs to within seven. With just over four minutes remaining, the margin was 37-30, but Northville never got any closer.

"Ladywood is a very high quality team," Kritch said. "They beat (Birmingham) Marian earlier in the year when they were undefeated and ranked number one in the state. I was proud that we were able to go out com-

petitively. We don't like to lose but we gave it our all and gave them fits, especially in the second half."

Holstein paced the Mustangs with 13 points and Maria MacInnis added seven — all in the second quarter. Kara McNeil and Karen Pump - a pair of promising sophomores combined to haul down 22 rebounds in the game. Willey led a balanced Blazer attack with 12

Glenn cut it to one with 20 seconds remaining, but McNeil found Holstein for a breakaway lay-up on the inbound play, increasing the advantage to three. A late bucket by Glenn cut it back to one, but time expired before the Mustangs were forced to inbound the ball.

"It was a good win over a good team," Kritch said.

Holstein led all scorers with 15 and McNeil had 12 more rebounds and seven points. Point Guard Sue LaPrad chipped in with seven points and four steals.

As the '89 season progressed, expectations continued to rise for the Northville golfers. But as the season came to a close, the Mustangs were haunted by their inability to live up to some of those lofty expectations.

That may be the best way to sum up the campaign, but Northville Coach Don Morgan isn't complain-

"We improved so much that we were a little disappointed at the end when we didn't accomplish some things we never would have dreamed of before the season got underway, he said. "Some of our guys got their games together and that raised our expectations. Then in the tournaments at the end, we dropped down a bit. I think a lot of it had to do with our inexperience.

"On any given day, we were capable of beating anyone. But early on, we were capable of losing to almost anyone.

sported just one player with any varsity experience to speak of — junior Chris Lemmon. But when fellow 11th grader Jason Sherman started challenging Lemmon for the team's top scores, the rest of the team followed, and by midseason, the Mustangs were a tough unit to beat. The team's 8-3 overall mark was respectable enough, and the 6-2 mark in the conference play was good to third in the Western Division and fourth in the 12-team conference.

"Heading in, I would have been satisified with a .500 season," Morgan admitted. "But guys like (Kevin) Krupansky, (John) Schreiber and (Paul) Warner responded and it turned us into a very good team. The problem was, they weren't consistent.

Novi stunned Northville in the season's first dual meet action in late August, but the Mustangs regrouped to win four in a row after that and three of the last four dual meets. The Northville entered the season as most impressive was a one-stroke win at Bay Pointe Country Club over host Walled Lake Western. The Warriors went on to take the WLAA title.

The team leader was undoubtedly Lemmon, who paced the team with a fine nine-hole average of 39.4. He was a first-team All-Conference pick but missed qualifying for the state meet by one stroke

"Chris has great ability to score incredibly low scores, but he was a lit-tle inconsistent at times," Morgan

Lemmon's big moment came on Sept. 29 when he blistered Salem Hills for a two-under-par 34 — his best effort ever. It helped the Mustangs beat Livonia Franklin 206-

'We did a lot better as a team than I thought we would," Lemmon said.
"But I didn't play very well this year as a whole. I played a lot better during the summer I shot a lot of 40s and I just wasn't as consistent as I would

Sherman was also an All-Conference selection, but he was the only Mustang to advance to the MHSAA State Meet His nine hole average (40.5) was second on the

"Jason is a smaller guy, physically, so he has to rely on finesse and accuracy. Prior to this season, he had shown streaks of greatness but this season he put it all together and had a great year."

The program will lose Warner (44.3 average) and Schreiber (44.5) to graduation, but will have letterwinners like Steve Porter (45.3). Krupansky (46.0) and Todd Christianson (47.8) back next fall. Morgan is also excited about Matt Telepo, the younger brother of former Northville star Kevin Telepo, who will be a freshman next year.

"Anybody who is shooting in the low 80s at Meadowbrook, like he is, has the potential to be a fine player," Morgan said.

"We tried to groom a lot of these young kids this year and we hope to reap the rewards next year. With Lemmon and Sherman, we have the two stars Now we need to develop a little more depth to go along with

The Mustang swimmers didn't notch a single individual victory at the WLAA Meet but Northville's team depth was evident at the 12team event on Nov 8-10 at Plymouth

The Mustangs ended up grabbing 22, top-18 finishes in the 11 events, but it wasn't enough for the team to successfully defend its WLAA title of a year ago - but it was close. Northville ended up placing second overall with a point total of 257½. As expected, North Farmington took first place honors

The Mustangs, who finished the regular season with a 9-2 record, were particularly impressive in the 200-yard IM and the 500 freestyle. In both events, Northville swimmers grabbed four of the top 18 places. In the IM, Debbie Buell was second (2:16 77), Jodi Wesley third (2:17.58), Pam Holdridge seventh and Erica Anderson 12th In the 500, Claire Cryderman led the way with a third place finish (5:18 09), Anderson was 11th, Allison Sieving 13th and Kristin Woodsum 18th

Northville's diving corps also per-

formed well, placing two divers in the top five Beth Frayne came the closest to giving the locals a victory, but her point total (363.55) was fifteen-hundredths out of first place and had to settle for runner-up honors Teammate Barb Woodruff was fifth (317 65 point total)

Holdridge was the only other Northville swimmer to notch a second as she tied for the number two spot in the 100 butterfly (1:01.54). In addition, Teri Juhasz was sixth (1:01 4) and Kathy Lang was 16th in the

trailer, snowmobile, horse trailer, dune buggy, or other similar equipment
Change Section 15.25 to read as follows:
SECTION 15.25 PARKING OR STORAGE OF CERTAIN VEHICLES, AIRCRAFT, BOATS AND DISABLED VEHICLES.

The following limitations shall be applicable in all RM-1, RE or RME Districts and io all zoning lots of two (2) acres or less (excluding road right of way) in any one-family

1. The storage or parking of trucks over one (1) ton capacity, truck tractors, truck railers, moving vans, aircraft, automobile utility trailers over twenty four (24) feet in ength, motor honies over twenty four (24) feet in length, or boats over twenty four (24) leet in length, in any yard area or on a street or highway shall not be considered a legal

2 The storage or parking of passenger cars, trucks, farm or garden tractors, motorcycles, or motorbikes which are wrecked, disabled, abandoned, unlicensed (when

torcycles, or motorbides which are wrecked, disabled, abandoned, unlicensed (when required) or incapable of movement under their own power, located in any yard area or on a street or highway, shall not be considered a legal accessory use.

3. Recreational equipment may be parked or stored only in a garage or carport or in a location beyond the nearest portion of a building to a street; provided, however, that such equipment may be parked anywhere on residential premises during loading or unloading for periods not to exceed twenty-four (24) hours.

Part II. Conflicting Provisions Repealed.

Any Ordinance or part of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed save that in all other respects Ordinance No. 77, as amended, is hereby ratified and reaffirmed Part III. Effective Date:

# Mustang kickers suffer through another losing season

The bottom line is that the Northville soccer squad suffered through its second straight losing season in 1989 — which is unusual for a team in such a hot-bed of soccer talent.

But the Mustangs had a few major obstacles to hurdle along the way, including a very youthful, inexperienced squad and an extremely difficult schedule

"We always have a tough schedule," Northville Coach Dave Yezback said. "We even played a few tough non-leaguers as well as our normal conference games.'

The Mustangs ended up winning just seven games in 18 tries, but Yezback is the first to point out that the team did show vast improvement as the season continued. Despite the los-

"I'm disappointed we didn't win more games but we started off a young, inexperienced squad and turned into a team that could be competitive with anybody in the state. We were one of only three schools to score against Churchill this season."

The Mustangs finished seventh in the 12-team WLAA (5-6 record) and placed fourth in the always-tough Western Division. But four of the 11 losses came against non-conference teams like Redford Catholic Central, Ann Arbor Pioneer, Dearborn Edsel Ford and Birmingham Groves -

"We played five teams ranked in the top-10 in the state this season, and some were games we didn't have to play because they were non-league," Yezback said. "But we feel we will get better by playing good competi-tion Our record reflects our youth and the strength of our schedule.

Unlike a year ago, Yezback isn't faced with staggering graduation losses Four starters will be lost — including Brad Maliszewski, Chris Hinz, Dan Brugeman and Paul Hodgins — but the rest of the team will return intact.

Maliszewski was Northville's leading scorer for the second year with eight goals and five assists. In three years on the varsity, Maliszewski has 21 goals and 13 assists, putting him eighth on the school's all-time scoring list. Mid-fielder Chris Hinz added three goals and five assists, and like Maliszewski, was an All-WLAA Honorable Mention selection. Junior halfback Steve Lang (four goals, two assists) was also on that list.

But the real star for the Mustangs was junior goaltender Larry Osiecki, who had a relatively inexperienced defense in front of him, but still held opponents to an average of 1.8 goals per game. Osiecki faced 210 shots in '89 and turned back 186 of them. He was an All-Division pick, along with junior defender Ed Petit.

"We need to quit allowing 20 shots on goal every game," Yezback said. "We really overworked Larry. He is probably the best goalie I've ever had — he saved us a few games and kept many others pretty close."


Karfis was an All-Area, All-Conference and All-Division fullback / cornerback with Northville last fall and was an All-State honorable mention selection. The son


planning to major in business. Karfis suffered a knee injury early in the season but has successfully recovered from surgery and is expected to return next year.

# New report links diet and health

If it seems like you've been hearing a lot of advice about what to eat to lower your risk of major chronic diseases such as coronary heart disease, you're right!

It was just last year that the federal government published the Surgeon General's Report on Nutrition and Health. Now this year, another report called 'Diet and Health: Implications for Reducing Chronic Disease Risk' has been

This new report, the most comprehensive to date, is published by the Food and Nutrition Board (FNB) of the National Research Council/National Academy of Sciences (NRC/NAS) — the same organization that publishes the Recommended Dietary Guidelines (RDAs). A committee of 19 diet and health experts appointed by the NRC/NAS took three years to examine nearly 6,000 scientific references to develop "new" dietary recommendations.

Whether or not the FNB's reports are similar, both reports recommend that Americans cut down on their fat intake and increase their consumption of carbohydrates, especially complex carbohydrates. The reports differ, however, in their specificity. The FNB report puts numbers or quantities to many of its dietary guidelines.

Listed below are the FNB's recently-released recommendations:

• Fat and Cholesterol: Reduce total fat to no more than 30 percent of calories, saturated fat to less than ten percent, and cholesterol to less than 300 mg. a day. This can be done by eating leaner and smaller cuts of meat, poultry without the skin, lowfat dairy products and fewer fried foods, oils and fats.

• Complex Carbohydrates: Eat five or more half-cup servings of vegetables (especially green and yellow) and fruits (especially citrus) a day and at least six servings of starches such as bread, cereal, and beans daily. About 55 percent of total calories should come from carbohydrates, especially complex carbohydrates.

• Protein: Maintain intake at moderate levels by meeting the RDA of 0.8 g/kg body weight but not exceeding twice this amount (i.e., 1.6 g/kg). About eight grams of protein can be obtained from an ounce of meat or fish or eight ounces of milk.

• Body Weight: Achieve and maintain appropriate body weight by balancing food intake and physical activity.

• Alcohol: It is not recommended. However, if you drink alcoholic beverages, drink no more than one ounce of pure alcohol/day (equivalent to two beers or two glasses of wine). Pregnant women should avoid alcoholic beverages.

dSalt: Lower intake to six grams or less (i.e., about one teaspoon) a day by using less in cooking or added to foods at the table and by consuming fewer salty, highly processed foods.

 Calcium: Achieve and maintain an adequate intake of calcium by meeting the RDA from foods such as low or nonfat dairy products and dark green vegetables. Although low calcium intake is associated with a high frequency of bone fractures and possibly with high blood pressure, the potential benefits of calcium intake above the RDA to prevent osteoporosis or hypertension are not well documented and do not justify the use of calcium supplements.

• Dietary Supplements: Avoid taking dietary supplements that are in excess of the RDA unless prescribed by a health professional.

 Fluoride: Maintain an optimal intake of fluoride from water, especially during the years when teeth are forming, to reduce the risk of tooth



# Smoking: largest preventable cause of disease

Today (Nov. 16) marks the 13th Annual Great American Smokeout. The day is designated to encourage smokers to kick the habit. In support of the Smokeout, this article will discuss quitting.

As a smoker, you have been dependent on a chemical - nicotine. Each cigarette fends off withdrawal and satisfies your craving. But the problem is without question; cigarettes

are harmful to your health. The best thing you can do for your health is to quit smoking. Just one

cigarette: • increases your heart rate 15-50

•temporarily raises blood

pressure 10-20 points. Further, the chemicals in cigarette smoking cause the heart to get less oxygen by narrowing your blood vessels. And your lungs become incapable of properly cleaning

themselves.

Smoking is the largest single, preventable cause of disease, disability and premature death. Here is a list of some diseases that threaten a smoker's survival:

 lung cancer heart disease and stroke

• cancer of the mouth, bladder, kidney and pancreas

 high blood pressure · chronic bronchitis and em-

• If you are pregnant and continue to smoke, you risk having a miscarriage, stillbirth or low birth-weight

According to the University of California, Berkely Wellness Letter, the Surgeon General's 1989 report on smoking indicates that in 1965 about 40 percent of adults in the U.S. smoked and in 1987 about 20 percent. If this trend continues, only 22 percent will smoke in the year 2,000. This translates to prevention of 2.1 million smokingrelated deaths by the year 2,000.
