News Briefs

DARE fundraiser: Card exhibitors and dealers are being sought for Novi's first trading card show scheduled for 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. July 7 in the Novi Civic Center. There will be a small fee for participation and entry, with all proceeds benefiting Novi's Drug Abuse Resistance Education program.

Parking Deck Meeting: The Northville City Downtown Development Authority (DDA) will meet Tuesday morning, May 29 at 8 a.m. to discuss a MainCentre parking deck plan. Under the proposal, the deck would replace the city's current Cady Street parking deck instead of being located on the MAGS parking lot south of the MainCentre project. The proposal was revised following public protest against the MAGS plan in February.

Love that dirty water! Novi is looking for volunteers to pitch in for the 5th annual Rouge River Rescue on Saturday, June 2. Wear your grubbier clothes, rubber boots and work gloves and sign in at 8 a.m. at the Novi Civic Center's multi-purpose room, where coffee, doughnuts and the day's assignment will be distributed. Novi school buses will take the workers to the river and back to the civic center for a free lunch provided by over 12 local restaurants and stores.

Tree limbs, logs and other debris will be hauled from the six miles of the Middle Rouge coursing through Novi. For information, call the Department of Public Works, 347-0495.

Northville rescue: Volunteers are needed for the Northville and Northville Township components of the annual Rouge Rescue project.

This year's project will be held on Saturday, June 2, from 9 a.m. to noon. Both Northville and Northville Township will work on the same project this year.

Volunteers should be at least 16 years of age or older unless accompanied by a parent. They should wear work boots, long sleeved shirts, and long pants, if possible. The clothing protects from poison ivy and scratches. Volunteers should report at 8:30 a.m. to the Northville Community Center at 303 W. Main St. to be transported to the site, as parking at the site is extremely limited.

Volunteers will assist in breaking up the logjams and removing them so that the flow of the river can cleanse the river by itself. Small hand tools will be available.

A lunch will be provided for the workers at the conclusion of the event. Donor restaurants are welcome again this year.

Volunteers are asked to RSVP to Northville Community Recreation (349-0200), prior to May 30 so that proper preparations for the event may be made.

Group puts wilderness in class

Domestic Fracassi fell for it instantly.

"Look at those fangs, man!" the seventh grader at Our Lady of Victory School in Northville said incredulously as his bulging eyes followed the movements of the swimming shark.

The two sharp-looking, fang-like features hanging from the shark's mouth were actually "barbels," an instructor quickly assured a disappointed Fracassi. Barbels are sensory organs similar to cat's whiskers.

Fracassi's class huddled excitedly around a portable tank which contained a 4-foot nurse shark and a horseshoe crab as they learned about ocean life through the Living Science Foundation's "hands on" technique.

Founded in 1981 by a disillusioned biology teacher and three others, the Living Science Foundation has changed locations, increased curriculum and expanded greatly since its inception.

Tim Joslyn, trained as a biology teacher, was unable to find a teaching job when he was recruited to start a Battle Creek zoo. While attempting to promote awareness of the new zoo, Joslyn and his partner took the zoo animals into school classrooms.

The response to them and their animals was overwhelming and the basic idea of the Living Science Foundation was born.

"Our goal is to increase the study of science by increasing children's positive experiences with science," Joslyn said.

Joslyn explained that too often children have a negative experience with science either from an animal dissection in a biology course or simply believing they are "dumb" in science.

Their program seeks to combine fun and learning by not forcing children to participate and allowing the students to get as close to the animals as they feel comfortable. For example, with their Burmese python they set up a three-tiered participation plan: students can simply watch and listen, touch the snake's skin or even get a hug from the snake.

"Because of the three choices we get a 90-97 percent (physical) participation rate with the children," Joslyn said.

Joslyn emphasized student participation as a critical element of their program.

"These kids are going to be making decisions on endangered species someday," Joslyn said. "If they have never seen these animals, how are

they going to make informed decisions?"

The growth of the organization has been tremendous: From the founding four employees, the Foundation now employs 20 people. And after visiting 14 schools in the first year, in the 1989-90 school year more than 200,000 children in 550 schools will have had the Living Science experience.

"I like the hands-on approach because it really keeps the kids' interest," said Linda Okasinski, seventh-grade teacher at Our Lady of Victory. The LSF's "Ocean's Edge" program was brought to Our Lady of Victory as a gift from its PTA. The cost of each program is \$50 per class.

In 1985 the Foundation moved to a nondescript building in Novi to be closer to their growing number of Detroit-area clients and is a veritable zoo of both common and unusual creatures. A visitor knows he has reached the right place when greeted in the waiting area by a 20-pound Burmese python lying motionless on the carpet, curled around a water-filled dog bowl. Contained behind the closed doors are chinchillas, prairie dogs, tree frogs, lizards, snakes, sponges, sharks and various other animals which live between their Novi cages, transport boxes and

classrooms throughout the state.

A variety of programs featuring different regional habitats and the corresponding animals which live there are offered. Our Lady of Victory opted for the "Ocean's Edge" program which introduces the students to live sea stars, sponges, crabs, shellfish, and, of course, the shark.

"Unless you live by the ocean you don't get to see this stuff," said Donna Valente, eighth-grade teacher at Our Lady of Victory School. "It really brings to life the things they see in their textbook."

In addition to the informational ocean life program, the Foundation also offers "Scaly Survivors" which introduces kids to snakes, lizards, turtles and frogs, "Amazon — The Magnificent Jungle" which features parrots, snakes and other jungle animals, and many other programs for schools or interested groups to choose from.

Additionally the Foundation has branched out to include astronomy classes with a portable planetarium and plans to build an aquarium facility in Novi which will be a "real hands-on place."

"There is a lot of learning that can be fun," Joslyn said. "They are not necessarily antagonistic."

Gypsy moth no threat — for now

Gypsy moth caterpillars — the very words strike terror into the hearts of New Englanders and central Michiganders alike.

Fortunately for local residents, the furry scourge which can defoliate whole forests in a single summer has not made significant inroads in Wayne and Oakland counties.

But a Michigan Department of Agriculture (DOA) official warns that may change over the next few years.

"It's in a few communities: Beverly Hills, Bloomfield Hills and Bingham Farms," said Carl Dollhopf, the DOA regional supervisor for southeast Michigan. "We're also expecting within the next few years that the large infestation that is in central Michigan will move down here."

"Oakland County got its name from the oaks, so there's plenty of food for them here," he warned.

Gypsy moth caterpillars have long been a threat to forests in the northeast. The caterpillars feed on the leaves of trees and shrubs, particularly oaks, birch and maples. Imported from Asia, the insect was ac-

identally released into the environment from a Massachusetts laboratory in 1869. The insect keeps spreading because it has no natural enemies in this country.

The caterpillar can be identified by rows of blue and green dots down its back. It does its greatest damage between May and July. Unlike its less-destructive cousin, the eastern tent caterpillar, the gypsy moth caterpillar does not build tents.

The gypsy moth gets its name from its habit of traveling great distances. As tiny caterpillars, they can be blown by the wind for miles. But they cover even greater distances with the unwitting help of people.

In Highland, for example, DOA of-

ficials have tracked the source of that area's gypsy moth infestation to a wooden shed that a homeowner transported from the East Coast. In Bloomfield Hills, 13 gypsy moth egg masses were found on a clothespin bag that a woman brought from her former home on Cape Cod. A snowmobile trailer in Rochester Hills, which was previously parked in an infested area in central Michigan, has been identified as one of the sources of the gypsy moth there.

"That's where it gets its name; it hitchhikes," Dollhopf said. "It's a gypsy."

Dollhopf urged residents and visitors to the area to examine trailers and items brought back into the area

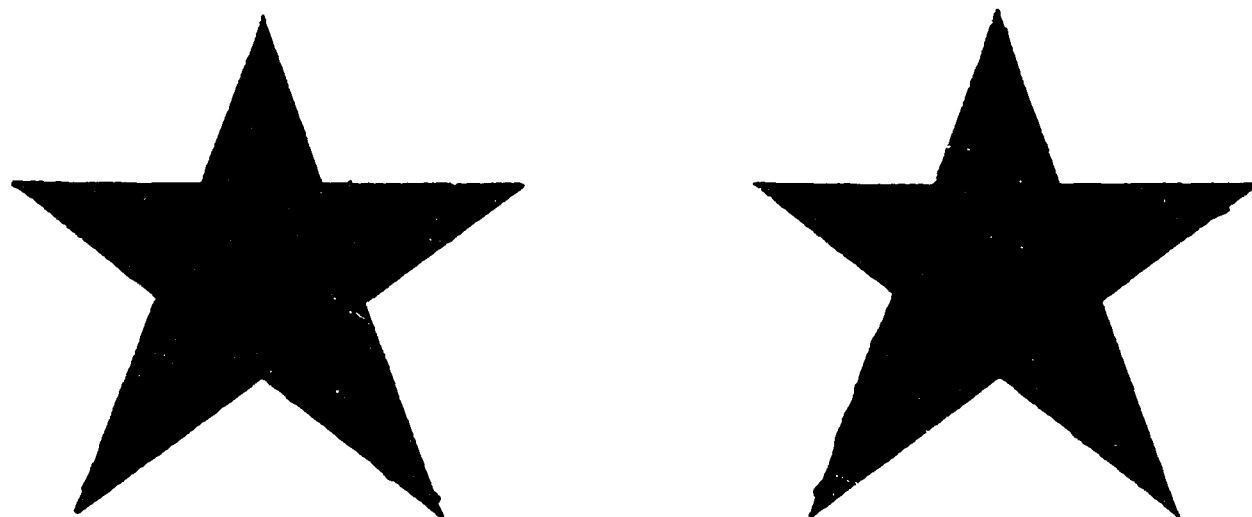
from infested regions, looking for the buff colored, velvety egg clusters, particularly in July and August when the adult moths lay their eggs. If found, the egg masses should be either burned or dropped in kerosene or bleach.

Beverly Hills, Bloomfield Hills and Bingham Farms were all intending to perform aerial spraying this year to control the caterpillars, but decided against it for several reasons. "They couldn't get a bid that was reasonable and also by trap count I could tell them that they weren't going to get any defoliation this year," Dollhopf said. He warned that defoliation is likely next year, as the population keeps on increasing.

Fortunately for local residents, few if any gypsy moths have been spotted yet in Northville and Novi, and no defoliation is expected to occur here. "Any spraying for gypsy moth in that particular area is a waste of time," Dollhopf said.

State and federal authorities are involved in several efforts to control the insect, including introduction of insects and parasites which feed on the caterpillar, quarantines to prevent their spread, and sex lure traps to track their population and spread.

Novi schools start recycling

Novi schools this week are implementing a program that will teach students that a little extra effort when disposing of waste can help protect their future.

Starting Tuesday, the Novi School District will test a district-wide recycling program. In every school children will be asked to help sort the materials used to serve and package their meals.

Novi is the first district in the county to start such a program. The recycling efforts are being initiated as a pilot program that will run through the end of the school year.

At the Board of Education meeting Thursday, district officials viewed three videotapes about the benefits of recycling and how a program similar to Novi's has been successful in the Lexington School District in Massachusetts.

The tape, "Do the Right Thing: Recycle," emphasized that recycling programs in schools help teach children at the earliest possible stages not to be wasteful.

Superintendent Robert Pitwko said many children already are recognizing the need for recycling. The board members expressed their support for the new program.

Toward a larger goal of helping to preserve the environment, the recycling program specifically is aimed at reducing the amount of waste going into landfills, explained Pat Hill, director of food service for the district.

Since the 1989-90 school year started, Hill has been working with other district officials toward implementing the program. Assistant Superintendent William Barr said committees were formed in each building to set up the process, and the children were told about the start-up of the program.

Hill said she expects the children's reactions to their new duties to be "very interesting."
"I think it will work well once we get started," she added. "It will take total cooperation from everyone involved."

In each school, the program calls for the installation of at least two stations where students will dump any waste from their food trays, rinse the trays, and put the trays in one container and other plastic materials in another.

Hill said the degree of difficulty in accomplishing this task will vary with the menu selections. The children might have a harder time scraping off the remains of nachos and cheese or pancakes and syrup than a hamburger bun, for example.

After the sorting process, the materials to be recycled from throughout the district are bagged and taken to a central location from which they are transported for processing.

A recycling company washes and grinds the used materials into fluff, which is later heated and formed into pellets. Manufacturers buy the pellets to make new products, such as hangers, hair combs, flower pots and building insulation, according to the videotape.

A few students have been selected to demonstrate the sorting to their peers. They will wear hats that say, "Recycle Novi" and tend the station in their schools.

The district has been using recyclable materials — polystyrene trays and food wrapping, for example — since the early 1980s, Hill said. Recent national emphasis on preserving natural resources prompted one of the district's suppliers to come forth with the recycling plan at this time, she said.

"The timing is perfect," Hill said. "We're working on cutting down on

the volume of trash that the schools generate," she said.

"The kids are learning about recycling and we should be teaching them about it even at the lower grades."

At a recent parent advisory meeting, Hill said that a fourth-grader asked what percentage of his classmates he thought would participate in a recycling program responded "75 percent."

Hill admitted his estimate might be a little optimistic, but she thinks the practice will become acceptable to the children.

"There is a lot of interest in the schools about landfills and recycling," she added.

Barr said he expects the program to be implemented throughout Oakland County by the start of the next school year. A video and photographs of Novi's pilot program will be shared with school districts throughout the county, he added.

Senate passes bus, drug zone bill

LANSING — The state Senate last week passed bills to make schools safer from drugs and update school-bus safety rules.

For law-abiding drivers, it means they will stop 20 feet from a school bus with flashing lights instead of 10.

"We're not going to tolerate drug tampering with our children," said the sponsor of the drug-free zone bill, Sen. Fred Dillingham, R-Fowlerville.

This started as a drug-free school bill, but it became a drug-free zone bill, he said. His Senate Bill 553 was amended to cover public parks, playgrounds, swimming pools, youth centers and even video arcades.

All area senators supported the bills, which go to the House.

The drug bill increases penalties for dealers who invade the drug-free zones.

"It's a tiered approach. There are three times the normal penalties for drug distributors," said Dillingham.

For this reason, he worries aloud that House Judiciary Chair Perry Bullard, D-Ann Arbor, may

frown on the Senate bill. Bullard usually criticizes bills calling for putting more people in prisons or for lengthening sentences.

"But the penalties are not mandatory," Dillingham said, adding it may make the bills more palatable to the House. "The judge has increased discretion based on the crime."

SB 533 was approved 34-0. The school bus code is contained in three bills sponsored by Dillingham and Richard Fessler, R-Birmingham.

"It's a total, comprehensive compilation of the bus safety rules — a one-stop shopping center for people concerned about school bus safety," Dillingham told the full Senate.

"Currently, there are several laws, conflicting rules and attorney general opinions covering school buses." Among the changes Dillingham cited:

- Beginning drivers will have to complete a course, and all must take six hours of continuing education every two years. Currently, a new driver has a year to complete the course. The state will pay for training, estimated roughly at several million dollars.

- There will be a uniform system of four red and four yellow flashing lights on buses.

• A new mirror system will enable drivers to better see passengers they have discharged. Sponsors told of children being run over and killed by buses when they stooped to pick up articles and couldn't be seen by drivers.

- State Police will inspect all school transportation vehicles, not just buses.

The bills passed 32-0. They are tie-barred, meaning all must pass for any one to take effect.

In committee, Fessler inserted an amendment telling the state to study the feasibility of a right-hand discharge rule. If adopted, the rule would prohibit drivers from discharging passengers who had to cross the road to the left of the bus.

The rule would raise transportation costs and lengthen children's bus rides. But proponents say it would save school districts millions in lawsuits.

Fessler's Transportation Committee received a late proposal that the state require "pusher" or rear engines on school buses. Such buses would have no hoods that would cause blind spots for drivers. The proposal surfaced too late in deliberations for action.

House bill splits area lawmakers

LANSING — Area state representatives were deeply split over a new school aid bill that stripped \$650 million in "categorical" aid from well-off school districts and spread it around to poorer districts.

Brushing aside party lines, lawmakers from rural and low-valuation areas generally backed House Education Committee Chairperson William Keith's substitute school aid bill.

"This is what I propose to break the trend," said Keith, D-Garden City.

Under his bill, 78 percent of Michigan's 562 school districts will receive state aid next fall compared to 70 to

72 percent in 1985-90.

The \$3.15 billion bill goes to a House-Senate conference committee to iron out differences.

Big losers would be suburban out-of-formula districts with high business property tax bases. The Keith bill would not pay their Social Security, pension and aid for such categoricals as media centers, pregnant teens and professional development.

Keith's goal is to reduce state aid for categoricals, which aids all districts, and shift the money into the general state aid formula, bringing "equity to more students and districts."

The measure, a substitute to the Senate-passed bill, squeaked

through the House last week on a bare 56 votes, with 29 voting no and 25 absent.

Area representatives voting yes were Susan Grimes Munsell, R-Howell, and Francis Spanioia, D-Corunna.

Voting no were Willis Bullard, R-Highland, David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield, and Judith Miller, R-Birmingham.

Not voting were Gerald Law, R-Plymouth, and Kirk Profit, D-Ypsilanti.

Bullard and four outstate Republicans filed a printed protest against the lack of information on the impact of the bill. They said:

"A major budget bill with extensive changes introduced hours before the

vote, and a new substitute not even available in print before session, allowed no time for personal analysis nor even cursory study and response from affected school districts. In fact, those superintendents able to do a brief review expressed concern."

Speaking for suburban districts was Rep. Maxine Berman, D-Southfield, who said, "There is a persistent notion that equity is more important than quality. There's no new money (for schools) in this budget. All they did was take from out-of-formula districts and spread it over hundreds of districts."

She accused the House of making its goal "across-the-board mediocrity."

O'Brien is vindicated

Barbara O'Brien will retain her township planning commission seat, Supervisor Georgina Goss said last week.

A May 22 meeting between Goss and O'Brien was the fourth contact between township officials and O'Brien in the past two months and focused on the duties of the planning commission.

Goss' announcement apparently put to rest discussion that O'Brien would be removed from the ordinance and development review post.

"We discussed ways to improve the situation of the planning commission," O'Brien said. "It has to function effectively."

O'Brien said Goss told her May 9 that she would be staying with the planning commission.

"And there was no question I would stay," O'Brien said.

O'Brien said she has suggested modifications to planning commission procedures, such as allowing citizens the opportunity to speak at meetings and making official site visitations to areas that are on planning commission agendas.

Goss was not available for comment Friday, but in a press release issued last week, she said O'Brien symbolized an important view on the future development of the township.

"It is the right and, in fact, the duty of each commissioner to represent the best interests of the people he or she serves," she said. "I also respect their right to agree or disagree. That is the situation as I see it today."

A controversy over O'Brien's future on the nine-member planning commission unfolded in March after commission Chairperson Charles DeLand sent a letter to Goss outlining perceived inadequacies in O'Brien's performance on the commission.

The letter to Goss apparently was sparked when O'Brien left a February

commission meeting at 11:40 p.m. and dissolved a quorum.

DeLand was critical of O'Brien's behavior at the meeting and O'Brien countered by saying she told the chairperson she needed to leave early that evening.

DeLand asked Goss to consider removing O'Brien from the planning commission, and Goss directed the township attorney to research methods for removal.

O'Brien countered by purchasing an advertisement in the Record and blasted DeLand for his comments.

Township Manager Richard Henningsen said Friday he will moderate a May 31 meeting between O'Brien and DeLand.

Henningsen said the meeting would be an attempt to initiate a "dialogue between the commissioner and the chairperson."

The discussion would include ways to shorten planning commission meetings, Henningsen said.

"Everybody's real desire is to shorten the meetings," he said. "When the meetings go too long, people's attentiveness tends to wane."

But O'Brien said she will not meet with Henningsen and DeLand.

"Henningsen's done his job and done it well," she said of the manager's role in earlier meetings. "It has to be Goss meeting with us. There's no point in meeting with anyone else."

O'Brien said she felt vindicated by Goss' decision to keep her on the planning commission. She said she would be able to work with DeLand, but was not ready to forgive his published comments.

"I feel he has injured me," she said. "When I first met with Henningsen, I had three things that I wanted. I wanted to stay on the planning commission, I wanted an apology from DeLand and I wanted to determine there was a violation of the (township) ethics code on his part."

"I feel he owes me a public apology."

Handicap access set for Community Block grants

To pave the way for handicapped pedestrians, the Northville City Council voted last Tuesday to reallocate \$90,000 in community development block grant (CDBG) funds to barrier-free sidewalks.

The money will allow the installation of handicap ramps at sidewalk road intersections throughout the city. The ramps will replace the typical six-inch curbs to allow wheelchair-bound citizens and those with limited mobility easier movement around town.

A survey by city engineers McNeely & Lincoln found 143 locations in need of the ramps, mostly outside the

downtown area. Most downtown sidewalks had ramps installed prior to or during last year's sidewalk repair program.

The ramps cost about \$600 each to install. Funds for the project are from 1988 and 1989 Wayne County CDBG funds. The grants can only be used for programs which benefit handicapped, elderly, or low-income citizens.

The \$90,000 in funds had been allocated to a planned city hall elevator project. But the council decided because the relocation of the city hall library is uncertain since the May 1 defeat of the Haller Library proposal, the elevator project should be postponed until 1991.

The exact location of the elevator could change depending on the ultimate use of the library space.

Candidates vie for seat

Seven-term incumbent Congressman Carl Purcell (R-Plymouth) will face off against Ann Arbor lawyer Elmer White for the 2nd District seat in November.

Purcell, 57, was first elected to Congress in 1976, after serving six years as a state senator and two years as a Wayne County Commissioner.

The Plymouth native currently sits on the influential House Appropriations Committee.

Ann Arbor lawyer Elmer White (D-Ann Arbor) is considered a longtime supporter of equal opportunity rights, and was honored in 1983 for "significant contributions to the advocacy of the rights of individuals" by the Washtenaw Trial Lawyers Association.

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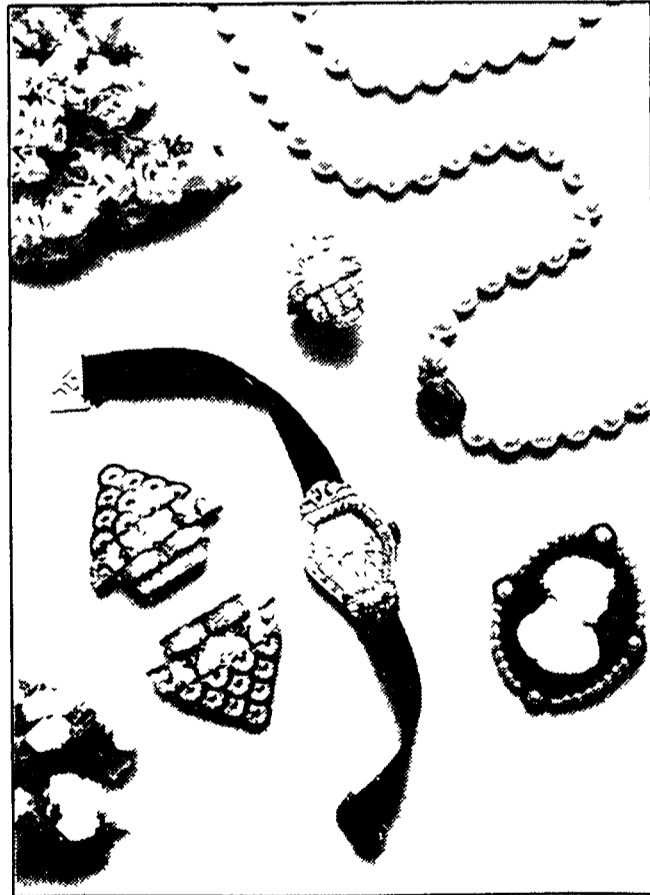

Area comics hit the airwaves

Club owner puts acts on local cable

Many comics that Joey Bielaska brings to town have been known to do double duty.

They appear at Joey's Comedy Club in Livonia or at Joey's Comedy Club and Sports Emporium in Allen Park. They also appear on Joey's "Spotlight on Comedy," a cable TV show which has been broadcast on Omnicom for just over a year.

"We have fun with it," said Bielaska, who serves as the show's host. "We have a real good time with it. No one gets paid for this. We all chalk it up to experience."

The show's producer, Pete Smith of Novi, recalled meeting Bielaska at the Omnicom studio during the annual "Baskets of Love" telethon for the Salvation Army.

"I asked him for a card and said I would really like to do a show," said Smith. "I think it's worked out really well."

Bielaska, 32, appears on the show with Chip Karnaby, the Ed McMahon-type sidekick, and with musician Jeff Antalose.

Many comics who appear at the clubs appreciate the chance to do the half-hour show as well.

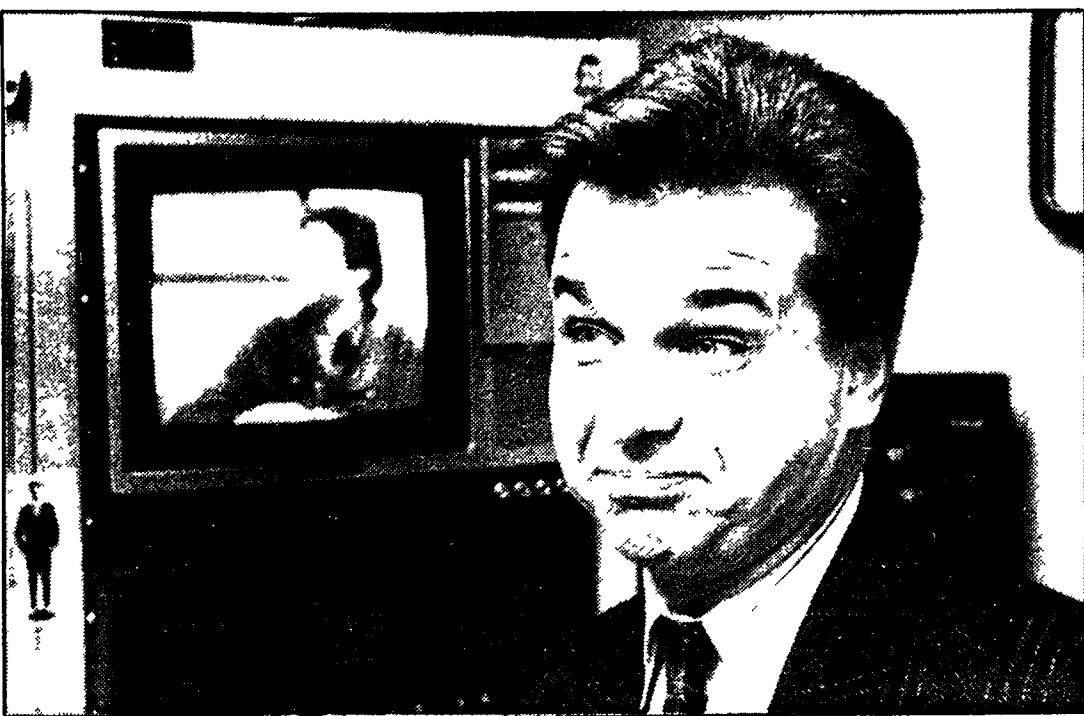
"Every time they hear about it, they want to get on it. It's just really good exposure for a comic," Bielaska said.

Joey's Comedy Club in Livonia opened in February 1988 and the Allen Park club opened in the fall of 1989. Bielaska and his brother, Ed, were the original owners. They took on a couple of partners when the Allen Park club opened.

Headliners from the two comedy clubs appear on "Spotlight on Comedy," as do local comedians who are performing at the clubs. Shows often include an interview with another guest; a man who had developed educational games appeared on one show.

"We brought him on to promote that," Bielaska said.

Rehearsal for the show is minimal. Comics generally have a set routine, and Bielaska asks them about that in advance so he knows what to expect.

"It falls together for some reason and it does really well. What I like about it is we're real relaxed," he said.

Bielaska writes some material for the show and Chip Karnaby does some writing. Bielaska and the others get together in advance to talk about their ideas for the show.

"I think it's quite a privilege to be able to do this right here," said Bielaska.

He and the others enjoy working with Omnicom staffers and with student interns from the Specs Howard School of Broadcast Arts.

The show is taped Saturday afternoons before an audience at the Omnicom studio in Canton Township. Performers have to concentrate on playing to the camera.

Their material has to be clean, and that can take some getting used to for comics accustomed to appearing at clubs in front of adult audiences. Bielaska recalled one taping where a local Boy Scout troop was in the audience.

"Then we really had to clean it up," Smith, the producer, has also found it challenging to keep the show

clean.

"I don't like to bleep, and if I do have to I will."

Most times, taping is done at Omnicom, although Smith would like to do more live remotes, along the lines of David Letterman's show. During last year's Plymouth Fall Festival, Bielaska went from booth to booth to sample the food, and that was used on "Spotlight on Comedy."

"We really do have a lot of fun," Smith said. "So far, it's been going very well. It's fun, it's simple and it keeps people interested."

The backgrounds that each person brings to the show are varied. Bielaska graduated from Eastern Michigan University in 1984 with a bachelor's degree in communications and a minor in aviation. Right after graduation, he went to work as an airline pilot and has continued to do that full time.

Bielaska, who is single, has been plugging away at comedy for a number of years and serves as emcee for some weekend shows at the clubs. He'd like to work for a major airline and be based in New York or Los

Angeles, making it possible for him to work as a comic as well.

Bielaska wouldn't mind becoming the first airline pilot/talk show or game show host.

"I don't know. Maybe it's possible," he said with a smile. "We're working on it."

Smith, 29, who lives in Novi with his wife, Mary Ann, recently graduated from Specs Howard, where he studied radio and TV. He's a former Plymouth resident and works at United Stationers in Livonia, a stationery wholesaler.

Smith and Bielaska are looking forward to continuing to work on "Spotlight on Comedy." They've been pleased with the response to the show.

They'd like to get the show on other cable systems. Syndicating the show and lining up sponsors would help, Bielaska said.

Ah Wok's tested recipe is still stirringly good

Long before Novi was an up-and-coming suburb, Ah Wok restaurant was drawing people westward with meals that had Detroit restaurant critics raving.

Today, Novi has changed. Ah Wok, thankfully, hasn't. Szechuan, Mandarin and Cantonese meals are still prepared with the utmost care.

Ah Wok advertises "gourmet cuisine," terminology more familiar to French or American menus than Chinese, but this is gourmet, and it is special.

A selection of innovative dishes offers intriguing alternatives to more customary Chinese fare—like an absolutely perfect Seafood Wor Ba entree featuring a combination of lobster, crab, shrimp, scallops, baby corn and other vegetables served over sizzling rice.

Not only was this a fantastically well-prepared meal, but the entree was loaded with lobster and the other seafood ingredients. At \$13.75, it was a bargain.

That seems to be the way it is at Ah Wok. The chef doesn't scrimp on ingredients and the portions are hearty. He also uses first-class, fresh ingredients and doesn't treat the vegetables as filler.

At the suggestion of another Ah Wok fan, we tried General Ching Chicken, a breaded chicken dish served with a "hot-spicy" sauce with scallions, ginger and garlic.

We found this a little sweet, rather than hot and spicy, though a very interesting dish.

Because it was so sweet, it would

best be tried when ordering several entrees to share—everyone could enjoy a small portion of it rather than try it as an entire meal.

Other interesting special dishes include Sam Pan Wor Ba, a dish of beef tenderloin, chicken, pork and vegetable served on sizzling rice (\$10.50), and Wor Dip Har, an entree featuring shrimp wrapped in bacon (\$11.25).

The two entrees we tried from the more conventional part of the menu were superb also—shrimp egg foo young and chicken chop suey.

Both were flavorful, especially the chop suey, which was among the best we've ever tasted.

This entree wasn't laden with bean sprouts. Instead it had a hearty combination of celery, onions and tender chicken. The shrimp egg foo young also was excellent and filled with baby shrimp.

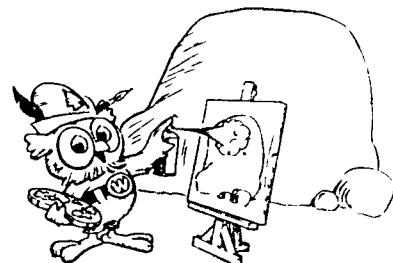
Main dishes are a la carte, though you can complete the meal with soup, an egg roll and tea for another \$1.50.

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Life gives comic her best material

Norma Zager has a bachelor's degree in Journalism from Wayne State University. Good. Then why not have her write her own lead?

"When Norma turned 39, she had to make a choice. Her children no longer required her constant care... so what was she to do with her extra time?"

"I love chocolate cake too much so the choice was easy."

Not bad, Norma, not bad at all. As the West Bloomfield-based comedian sees it, she's been "lucky. I feel like a show business veteran, but it's only been less than four years."

A native Detroit, who graduated from Mumford High School in its heyday back in 1964, the comic is a normal, red-blooded wife and mother of two, who does the laundry, the cook-

ing, and most everything other homemakers do.

"West Bloomfield has been our home for 10 years now," she said, adding that her professional commitments take her out of the state. "Mostly, I go to Los Angeles and Las Vegas or entertain in local clubs and comedy spots."

Asked about how her son and daughter respond to their mother's entry into the world of entertainment, Zager said "My 12-year-old enjoys it, but for the 17-year-old... the jury's still out."

Whatever the youngsters think about their mother, the comic, Zager gleans from their experiences, their attitudes, and their sibling rivalry as fodder for her act.

"I talk about my husband, my

sister-in-law and all kinds of everyday incidents in my life," she said. "In fact, I went to the school of life to get my feel for comedy and the ability to put it all together and make it come out funny."

While attending that school, Zager looked to the brilliance of several comics for the inspiration.

"My special mentor has been Carl Reiner," she said. "And I always paid attention to Sid Caesar, Milton Berle and Lucille Ball."

"I set little goals for myself, but sometimes unexpected things happen that even surpass my goals," she said. "I had a half-hour comedy show on cable television—called 'Norma.' It was nominated for an ACE award—and a show on channel 4.

Developers throw in curves

Diversity sells in subdivisions

Attractive residential subdivisions usually start with a good plat or site plan design — the physical layout of roads and individual lots.

Cookie-cutter neighborhoods with straight, parallel streets, one house behind another on relatively small lots, have faded into development history.

The trend now is for lots of different shapes at least 60 feet wide on winding roads, and, where possible, various grades of topography.

"The overall goal . . . in recent years has been to maintain light and air — to preserve open space, green areas," said Dale Countegan, director of planning and community development for Farmington Hills.

That's what buyers crave, too, developers maintain.

"They want creativity, privacy, as much as you can give them, a statement when you come into the development either through landscaping or an entrance," said David V. Johnson, chairperson and president of Victor International in Southfield.

"We look for things that attract the general public — rolling terrain, streams, whether we can create some ponds," said Bob Paciocco, vice president of PAMA Investment and Contracting Co. of Plymouth.

"Rather than a straight entrance from A to B, we put in curves. It gives more character to the sub," he said. "Rectangular lots of the '50s and '60s are pretty much gone."

Community planners and political officials have established stricter density, setback and landscaping requirements to help promote that open look.

But perhaps the biggest impact on platting and site plan development has been the emergence of the state Department of Natural Resources to protect wetlands.

Some municipalities like Novi, Rochester Hills and West Bloomfield also have adopted local wetlands ordinances.

Developers have responded with more creative plats for traditional subdivisions and site plans for con-

dominium projects. Planned residential or planned unit developments have become popular.

In some situations, some setback and density requirements are relaxed in exchange for saving unusual land features.

Tree preservation has impacted subdivision layouts, too.

Since last year, developers in Farmington Hills have contended with a tree protection ordinance.

"That's a common element to a community," Countegan said. "You just can't cut them without some sort of oversight."

Actually, all lots aren't created equal, even within the same subdivision. Lots with many trees or parcels that back up to woods often sell at a premium.

"A premium lot is a lot that maybe backs to a park area, stream, open space," Paciocco said. "Corner lots aren't too desirable. People don't want to be exposed on two sides."

"Cul-de-sacs are very popular. The only traffic is people who live there."

"We try to come up with as many (cul-de-sacs) as we can. Those are the kind of lots that get a premium. You

end up with fewer houses, but they bring more money with a premium and the end result is the same," Paciocco said.

Lot prices can vary by more than \$30,000 within the same subdivision.

"If you develop on a lake and sites are close or contiguous (to water), they would be more of a premium," said John Shekerjian, a partner in the John Richards Development Corp. of Bloomfield Hills.

"Others further away from a major street might be more valuable," he said. "Some lots may open up to an out-lot or large common area."

"A lot is not premium because it's nicer, but costs more to develop," Shekerjian said.

Lots alone can account for more than half of the total cost of building a new house, especially on lakefront property, Johnson said.

But there's no accounting for specific tastes. That's why Johnson includes plenty of options when he plats a subdivision.

"Some like a corner lot, some a pie-shaped lot for kids to play on, while the guy next door might want the pie

reversed for a big frontage to show off," Johnson said.

He and other developers just don't slap a land-use plan together when they acquire property. "We spend time looking at a piece from the ground . . . from helicopters," Johnson said.

Plats or site plans originally submitted for review generally don't come through the approval process unchanged.

"Density, that's one of the first things I look at," said George Wilhelm, Westland's planning director. "Usually, you cut out a number of lots to create livable space. We've got some cases of triangular lots where actual utilization of the lot would not really make it livable," he said.

"We like at least two entrances. If there's only one, we ask them to make it as short as possible then put in a perimeter road or loop road," Wilhelm added.

"We're always looking at landscaping, protection of trees, layout, how it flows, traffic implications," said Countegan.

Impact fees could be double-edged sword

Developers may replace the government as the principal financier of road, sewer and water improvements should impact fees — which are becoming increasingly common in other states — become a reality in Michigan.

Mark Wycoff, president of Planning and Zoning Center Inc. in Lansing, a planning consulting firm, called impact fees a "legitimate public activity."

He is currently working with Rochester Hills, Springfield, Independence, Oakland, West Bloomfield and Waterford township officials to draft legislation to allow impact fees.

The language, which should be completed in about two months, will be presented to lawmakers who have expressed an interest in introducing the legislation, Wycoff said.

State legislators and groups from around the state have contacted him about legislation.

In a January poll, impact fees — which range from \$200 to \$30,000 per unit — are the No. 1 concern of developers, said Ann Beale of the National Association of Home Builders (NAHB) land and development office.

Beale said builders may absorb some costs, but impact fees will be passed to consumers, which means rising housing, office and commercial costs — all of which could have a stifling effect on economic growth.

There are alternatives to impact fees, she said. Bond sales based on tax-increment financing districts and special-assessment districts, for example, could pay for infrastructure improvements, Beale said.

Despite a general dislike for impact fees, developers have come to accept them as a part of doing business, Beale said.

"Impact fees have pretty much become a reality," he said. "As long as they are put together fairly, builders don't have that much of an argument with them."

Developers often take an active role in the development of impact fee regulations.

Several states have passed legislation to allow impact fees, including Nevada, Oregon, Georgia and Texas. Vermont and Florida have included impact fee language as part of growth management legislation.

Several California and Maryland communities created local impact fees that resulted in court cases, Beale said, and Pennsylvania and Indiana are considering impact fee legislation.

It is still unclear what impact fees will do to development, Beale said. "If it's not statewide, builders can move to the next county, but if it is statewide, impact fees could have a chilling effect."

The communities actively investigating impact fees are the same communities considered by builders to be anti-development, said James Bonadeo, president of the Builders Association of Southeast Michigan (BASM).

"It's not only that they want the impact fees — they want to stop building."

An impact fee is not directly injurious to a builder; he just passes it on to the buyer, he said. But impact fees do prevent people from buying houses and that would impact builders.

"If impact fees go through, you're going to see a hell of a lot of people go out of the building business."

Impact fees are often presented under the guise of controlling growth, but the community's definition of "control" is different from builders'.

"You can call it control, but remember a control can be turned off." Bonadeo didn't have an easy answer for financing infrastructure, he said.

"We've gone through 15 years now in which the federal government has decreased money for infrastructure, and it's been a dramatic decrease."

Local community infrastructure financing options have also been limited, Wycoff said. The Headlee Amendment, "Truth-in-Taxation" laws, court decisions and other state laws have restricted the ability to raise revenues for infrastructure.

Wycoff differed from Bonadeo on the intent of impact fees.

"It's difficult for a legislative body to take an anti-growth stance because growth is a big source of revenues."

To deny growth, he said, is to deny tax revenues. Without revenues generated by new development, government would need to raise taxes to pay for increased costs and new services.

Federal and state governments should free up the money that went to infrastructure and now goes to other uses, Bonadeo said.

"Do we really need another stealth bomber that costs half a billion apiece?"

"Maybe we'll have to put the homeless people in those bombers and submarines."

This is not the first time impact fees have been proposed in Michigan, said Lynn Egbert, executive vice president of government affairs for the Michigan Association of Home Builders. Impact fee legislation was defeated in 1987.

The association is still apprehensive of proposals in which development is hit with an up-front cost, Egbert said. The 1987 effort to establish impact fees, for example, was not specific about what impact fees could be used for and how much could be levied.

Some impact fees address transportation needs while others address only water and sewer needs. The more complicated the proposal, the more closely it has to be looked at, he said.

"Should new development shoulder the brunt for infrastructure improvements?" Egbert asked.

Fees shouldn't be used to pay for improvements that benefit other areas, he said.

Defining "impact," he said, will be a major source of conflict between advocates and opponents of impact fees.

Egbert is unsure what the proposed impact fee legislation will mean because builders have not been privy to the tentative legislation, he said.

"We would like to work with them, but we weren't invited."

Builders weren't invited to participate because of their fervent opposition in 1987, Wycoff said.

Robert Meisner/Condo Queries

Flowers poor bedfellows in condo yard?

I live in a condominium where the board has to give in front of our yard. I have petitioned the board, but they indicate that they are not prepared to give us permission because of the additional cost of maintaining the flowers. That makes no sense to me. What can I do?

I presume from your question that the board has the authority under the condominium documents to grant permission with respect to the planting of flowers at the condominium. If it is purely a matter of economics as far as the board is concerned, offer as a condition of its approval that you will maintain the plants, if necessary.

If you can show that the flowers are not going to be a detriment to the condominium project as a whole and you agree to underwrite the costs of maintenance or replacement of the flowers, I believe that the board would be abusing its discretion in not granting you such approval.

a land contract and want to run for the board of directors. The president of the association has indicated that I must be a title holder in order to qualify for the board. Is this fair or reasonable?

As a land contract purchaser, you do not have legal title to the property, but what is considered by the law to be equitable title. You must check the condominium documents to determine whether an owner is defined to include a land contract vendee.

In many condominium documents, that is the case. If so, you have the right to run for the board of directors since you are, in a sense, a member of the association. On the other hand, if vendees are not deemed co-owners, and the requirement to be on the board is that you be a member of the association, you may not be qualified to serve on the board.

Consult with your attorney concerning the particular condominium documents of your project.

I am on an advisory committee, and the developer is talking about turning

over control of the association to the members. I want to know what I should be doing to prepare for the turnover along with the other advisory members. Several members of the board do not think it is necessary to consult an attorney at this early stage, but I tend to think otherwise. Can you help?

The advisory committee is a body established in order to prepare for the transition of control from the developer-controlled board of directors to a co-owner controlled board of the association. There are a number of audits which should be undertaken by the association coincident with the taking over control of the association. One of these audits, namely a legal audit, is designed to insure that the condominium documents are well-drafted and in accordance with the condominium statute.

There are also other protections that should be undertaken by the association incident to the takeover, including a review of the various contracts of the association, including

its management contract, as well as its operating procedures. Simply put, legal advice, even before the turnover, is appropriate, and you should ask the developer to fund the advisory committee out of association funds so as to retain the services of an attorney to prepare the co-owners for the turnover of control of the association.

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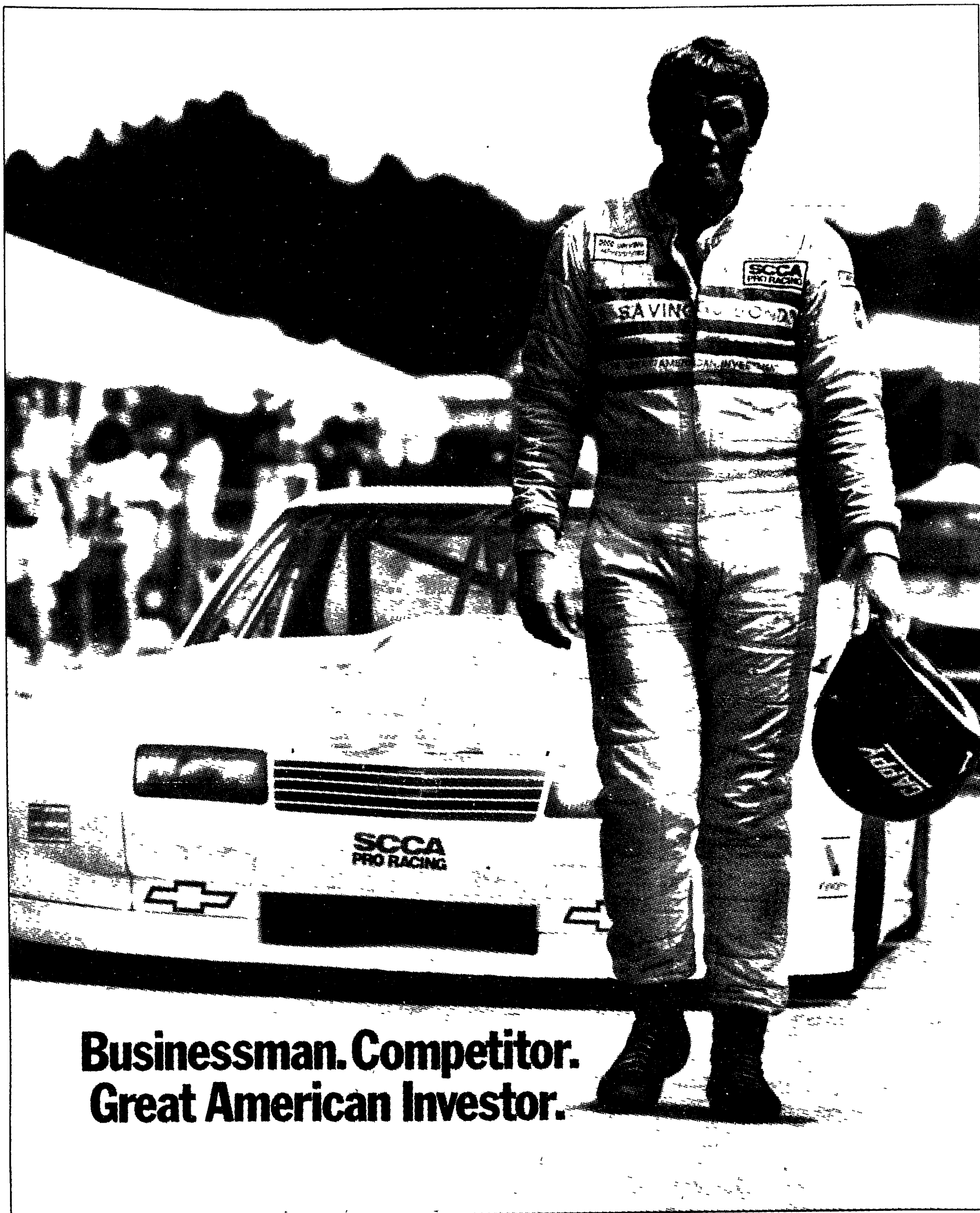
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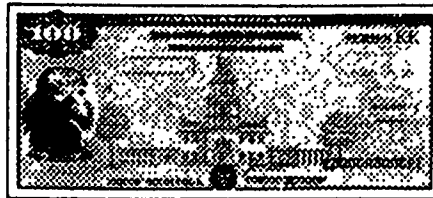


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Camp for ventilator-dependent children

Despite the need for 35-pound ventilator units, their accompanying 16-pound batteries, plus 15-pound oxygen tanks, these kids are going camping.

An automobile accident last fall changed 7-year-old Jill's life forever. It left her quadriplegic, leaving her unable even to breathe on her own. The simplest of childhood pleasures now seemed unattainable.

One of those pleasures was going to camp, which she used to enjoy each summer before the accident. Because of the generosity of donors and the efforts of volunteers, Jill will be going to camp this summer. She and 19 other ventilator-dependent children will fish, gather around campfires, and traverse nature trails June 3-8 at Camp Fowler in Mayville, 106 miles north of Ann Arbor.

With her pretty brown hair tied back in a ponytail with a pink ribbon to match her pink fingernails, Jill goes through another day on the rehabilitation floor at C.S. Mott Children's Hospital. Through the ventilator her voice barely gets above a whisper, but her excitement is clear when she says that, yes, she is looking forward to camp. The other children, aged 2-20, are also looking forward to camp, as are their parents, according to Mary Dekeon, a clinical specialist in respiratory care at Mott who played a crucial role in organizing Trail's Edge Camp for ventilator-dependent children.

"The amount of equipment the children need is overwhelming," Dekeon said of the ventilator-dependent children who have since been discharged for home care. "In some cases, the homes these kids are living in are like little intensive care units, especially if lung disease is the primary problem."

Children with lung disease require, in addition to the 35-pound ventilator unit and its accompanying 16-pound battery, a 15-pound oxygen tank. Also, portable suction equipment is necessary, and sometimes feeding tubes. The children's mobility varies — some are wheelchair-bound, some are not.

"My son is extremely mobile," said Laura Hewitt of Walled Lake, whose son Sean, 3, needs a ventilator at night and oxygen all the time. "He has a 21-foot tube to his oxygen tank and he uses all 21 feet of it."

Sean was born two months premature with severe respiratory distress failure. He is now an active

three-year-old whose care, like any oxygen/ventilator-dependent child's, is a full-time job.

"It can wear you out — it's a 24-hour a day job that does not go away," Hewitt said. The camp will provide her and the other parents with a welcome respite from that job.

"It makes you nervous (to send your child away), but the people will all know Sean, and I feel safe leaving him in their care. The camp is a wonderful idea because parents don't have the time, energy and often the money to do such things with the kids."

Money won't be a problem this year. There is no charge for the 20 campers. The bulk of the fees is being paid by a grant from friends of University Hospital and staff contributions.

The camp staff is participating on a volunteer basis, using their own vacation time. A full-time physician, nurses and occupational and physical therapists will be on hand. Each child will have a full-time partner, a nurse or respiratory therapist disguised as a camper.

"The partner is supposed to be their friend," Dekeon said. "We had a three-day seminar to get in the spirit of the camp, to teach the nurses and Respiratory Therapists to be more like real camp counsel-

ors." Two other such camps in Minnesota and Florida have had parents and families attend as well, but Dekeon said that idea was rejected on the basis of giving the families a break from caring for the children, and the children an opportunity for some independence.

"Some of these kids are in their teens and have never been away from their parents, even for one night," said Dekeon, "and the parents have never had a chance to go out to dinner."

Mott has discharged 35 patients on ventilators since a landmark lawsuit in 1981 allowed ventilator-dependent patients to live at home and still receive Medicaid. As the Hewitts and countless other families have discovered, the full-time care of such a child can be a frustrating test of will.

Last year, Mott formed a parent support group for these families, and the response has been favorable, said Dekeon. "It's a forum where parents can

Transplants help children start anew

When asked about his chosen profession Darrell A. Campbell, Jr., M.D., associate professor of surgery and director of the Kidney Transplant Program at the University of Michigan Medical Center will tell you it is "tremendously satisfying."

Dr. Campbell and his associates who comprise the transplant team of doctors at U-M Medical Center — Dr. Robert Merion, Dr. John Ham, and Dr. Jeremiah Turcotte — refer to organ transplantation as an "acceptable alternative" to organ failure.

"Our work allows us the opportunity to restore health and happiness. What more is there?" and with that Dr. Campbell reached into his coat pocket and pulled out three slides — the first of which he inserted into the projector. The slide was that of three young girls, sisters, ranging in age from 11 months to 5 years old. Dr. Campbell focused his discussion on the 11-month-old child who was sitting expressionless next to her two wide-eyed, smiling sisters. Her eyes were focused on some unidentifiable distant object. Her face was colorless and bloated.

Dr. Campbell explained that when the child's parents brought her to the Medical Center to be

examined, she was in desperate need of a kidney donor. The second slide was inserted. It was the photograph of a healthy, happy baby in the arms of her mother. This was the same child one year after a successful kidney transplantation.

The last slide was inserted showing a once desperately ill child who had grown into an adorable young lady of five years. She was dressed in cap and gown, preparing for her graduation from

kindergarten, smiling at the world with a look of anticipation.

Within the last ten years, the success rate of transplantation operations has dramatically increased. From 1980 to 1990, what had been a 40 percent success rate for kidney transplantation has increased to 85 percent. More drastic than this is the 20 percent success rate for liver transplantation to 80 percent today.

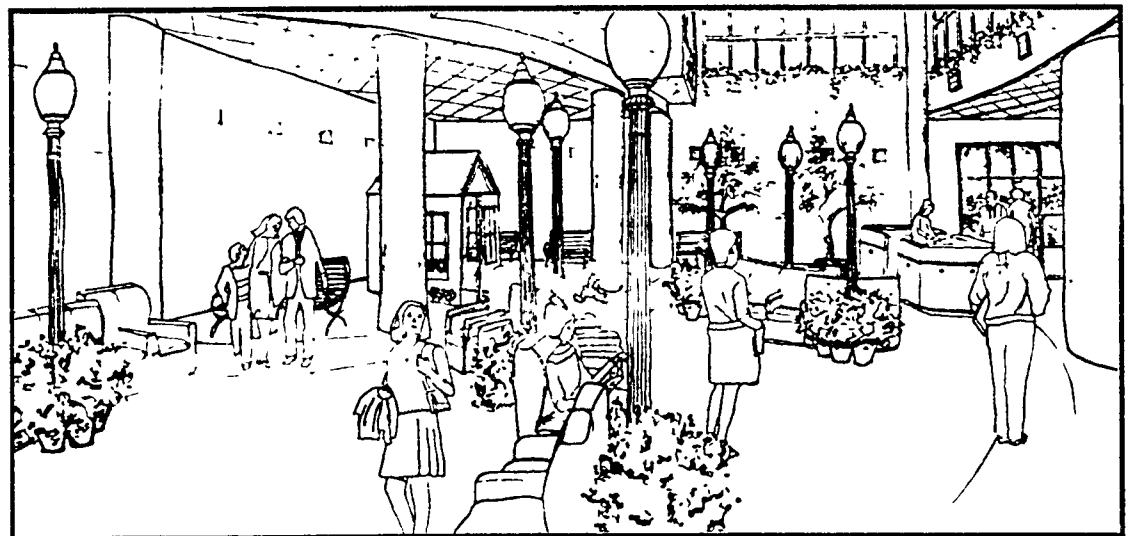
Dr. Campbell attributes the dra-

matic improvements not only to modern technology but also to the countless number of individuals involved in each transplant operation from start to finish. "With each procedure performed, there are several individuals involved," said Dr. Campbell. "Everyone is important to the ultimate success of each case."

However, as Dr. Campbell warned, organ availability is always a problem. To be considered an eligible donor, the candidate must be pronounced brain dead. This means that all vital organs are functional and that only the brain is incapacitated. According to *Healthwise*, a University of Michigan Medical Center publication, of the 25,000 potential organ donors who die each year in the United States, only 20 percent provide organs.

"It's a shame organs are available and not used," Dr. Campbell said. "The situation is even more serious for children than it is for adults. An organ donation, in a small way, may relieve some of the pain of the tragic loss of a loved one. It can bring new life to a seriously ill child."

Maternal and Child Health Center due to open this fall

Nurturing care for pregnant women, new mothers and their babies. Life-saving medical treatment for critically ill babies. Innovative medical and surgical care for children. Psychiatric treatments for children and teenagers. The University of Michigan's new Maternal and Child Health Center (MCHC) will offer all this — and more.

"The goal of the Center is to provide space uniquely designed to accommodate today's trends in the care of mothers, infants, children and adolescents," said John D. Forsyth, executive director of the U-M Hospitals. "By upgrading existing facilities and creating new ones, the Center will offer convenient, sophisticated health care for women and children of Michigan and surrounding regions."

Maternal and Child Health Care Planning

Improvements in maternal and child care facilities were originally included in the Replacement Hospital Program (RHP) that culminated in the February 1986 opening of University Hospital and the A. Alfred Taubman Health Care Center. This project replaced University Hospital's 626 adult medical/surgical, special care and adult psychiatric beds, and the greater portion of ambulatory clinic facilities.

During RHP planning, it became apparent that the needs in maternal and child health care exceeded the scope of the replacement program. Planned improvements in those areas were with-

drawn from the RHF and developed as a separate center. The result of the planning is a 221,000 - square-foot center for maternal and child health designed by the architectural firms of TMP Associates, Hansen, Lind Meyer Inc and Roger Margerum Inc.

The seven-level structure will link directly with Mott Children's Hospital, Women's Hospital, Holden Perinatal Hospital, the Taubman Center and a new parking structure, while maintaining the separate identity of each hospital. Construction of the center has been under way since September 1987. With the opening of the new construction this fall, the project will move into the second phase renovation of the existing Mott/Women's/Holden facilities. The targeted completion is summer 1992, with a new construction, equipment and renovation budget of \$48,950,000. With the fall opening, the new MCHC construction phase will include, a new pediatric intensive care unit (ICU) with an ICU bed expansion from 10 to 26 beds, a new neonatal intensive care unit with an ICU expansion from 24 to 29, relocation of child and adolescent patients into new patient units of 14 and 18 beds respectively, relocation of obstetrics, gynecology and psychiatric ambulatory operations and expansion of pediatric medical and surgical ambulatory operations, into the new center, expansion of pediatric support services such as radiology and respiratory therapy, addition of another rooftop helipad allowing direct access for children and expectant mothers transported by Survival Flight, U of M's emergency helicopter transport service.

The MCHC will have its own entrance for patient/visitor drop-off, planned with easy access to parking through an underground entrance. The lobby is filled by natural light from an atrium and large expanses of glass.

A "park theme" has also been used throughout the lobby. The white terrazzo flooring will be the "sidewalk," green carpet will suggest grass, with authentic park benches and lamp posts included. A children's playhouse will be set in the middle of the park.

In close proximity to the center lobby, a new vending service is being offered in an outdoor cafe setting of tables with colorful umbrellas. Also close by, the new gift shop will have much more space with greatly expanded lines of merchandise.

Families and visitors will benefit from easy access to the Med-Inn, a 90-room hotel linked directly to Mott Children's Hospital, and the nearby Ronald McDonald House, which provides accommodations for families of hospitalized children at the Medical Center. Patients and visitors can enter the three ambulatory clinic levels of the expanded Taubman Center directly from the adjoining parking deck.

Pediatric Perspective

"The new Maternal and Child Health Center will bring together all aspects of care for both mother and child, from the time of conception all the way to adulthood," said Robert P. Kelch, M.D., professor and chairman of the Department of Pediatrics and Communicable Diseases.

Kelch said demand for pediatric intensive care is growing at tertiary medical centers like Mott Children's Hospital. Today, a lot of pediatric care is being provided on an outpatient basis with hospitalized children more critically ill, requiring the expertise of a tertiary medical care center.

The new Pediatric Intensive Care Unit will include three sections of beds, with an isolation room in each section. More private consultation rooms will be readily accessible for staff to speak with families about the condition of their child. Two large waiting rooms will reflect the park theme with painted wall graphics and playhouse elements. In these rooms comfortable seating for families and visitors will be provided, including chairs that convert to beds for sleeping overnight.

The Pediatric clinic expansion, adjacent to the Taubman Center lobby, will increase the number of examination rooms and include expanded waiting space for patients and families. In the new waiting area, there will be an attrac-

On September 25, 1990, the first phase of the Maternal and Child Health Center Project is scheduled to open with pediatric and labor/delivery/recovery services. tive, well-equipped play area for patients and siblings.

Obstetric Perspective

In each of the new eight birthing rooms, there is sufficient space and available equipment to accommodate the labor/delivery/recovery of the mother, together with her support partner. Each soothingly-colored room will have a shower and bathroom, natural lighting through a bay window and a phone for spreading word of the new arrival. The birthing rooms and support space are planned to provide a quieter, more organized, esthetically appealing atmosphere in which family togetherness is promoted.

"Added space and updated labor/delivery/recovery facilities will help keep the obstetrics and neonatology departments on the cutting edge as well," according to Preston V. Dilts Jr., M.D., professor and chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology. He added, "the locations of these facilities have been planned to hasten the moving of sick newborn babies to the physically adjacent neonatal intensive care unit with immediate access to many life-saving treatments."

Molly Gates, M.S., R.N.C., coordinator,

Perinatal Outreach Program, said, "as a state-designated perinatal center, the University of Michigan Medical Center provides all levels of obstetric and neonatal care ranging from the well-woman care offered by our certified nurse midwifery service to the most advanced technologies required for high-risk pregnancies and newborns. Referrals are received from our primary region, which is approximately a 50-mile radius, as well as transports from other tertiary centers in Michigan and surrounding states." She added, "one of our biggest responsibilities at the U-M Medical Center is to work with our referring hospitals to identify which types of patients need the types of service we can provide."

In the renovation phase of the center project that begins this fall, a new mother and baby unit and nurseries will be constructed adjacent to the new neonatal unit and the labor/delivery/recovery area. The mother/baby unit will be predominantly private rooms with the remainder being double. The patient rooms will be larger to accommodate a trend toward "rooming in" — keeping the infant in the same room as the mother. Increasingly, the traditional nursery-down-the-hall will be used only for infants who need closer observation.

Neonatal Perspective

James and Lynelle Holden Perinatal Hospital, the first hospital in Michigan to offer neonatal transport and routinely treats premature or sick infants transferred from about 10 hospitals in a 50-mile radius. "We offer a full range of neonatal surgery, as well as specialty services that many other neonatal units can't handle, such as neonatal neurology and cardiology," Gates said.

"The neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) in the Holden Perinatal Hospital provides advanced and experimental treatments which attract referrals from other NICUs," said Gates. These unique treatments include extracorporeal membrane oxygenation (ECMO) and high-frequency jet ventilation. Dietrich W. Roloff, M.D., professor and service chief of neonatology, said the center will allow the intensive care unit to grow further.

The ECMO treatment has been most successfully used to support newborns with respiratory failure long enough for their lungs to strengthen. ECMO was developed by a UMMC faculty member nearly a decade ago.

The high-frequency jet ventilation treatment provides respiration at a rate about six times faster than conventional ventilation. This treatment prevents further lung damage in newborns with severe respiratory defects.

In the colorfully painted NICU, each baby will have his or her own bed space with ample surrounding area for the necessary support equipment. This space also has ample natural light. More private consultation rooms will be readily accessible for staff to speak with families about the condition of their baby.

Psychiatric Perspective

Each of the new larger inpatient rooms for child and adolescent psychiatric patients will have a bathroom and shower and a communication system for calling staff. The layout of the unit and the open design of the patient unit station will enhance communication between staff and patients. Such support services as laboratory and pharmacy will be readily accessible through the units' central location.

Through the new child and adolescent psychiatric ambulatory operation, we will serve a wide range of outpatients. In car-

He predicted that her skills would serve her well in her new position. "As a resident, she demonstrated a tremendous ability to work with others to accomplish complicated tasks. I have seen her encourage professional collaboration in research dealing with children's issues, and I have great respect for her dedication to her colleagues and to the field. Everyone who encounters her, likes her."

ing for these patients, our staff will have more and better equipped interviewing rooms and convenient access to diagnostic services located within the center.

Patients will have both medical and psychiatric care delivered in the new center, according to John Greden, M.D., chairman of the UMMC Department of Psychiatry. "This is a good situation for the many children and adolescents who have conditions which involve both physical and psychiatric problems such as diabetes, seizure disorders, eating disorders, sexual abuse and substance abuse."

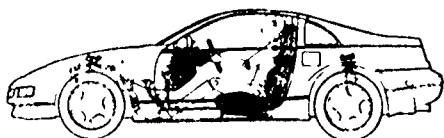
Luke Tsai, M.D., chief of service at Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Hospital, said "Child psychiatry as a field is on

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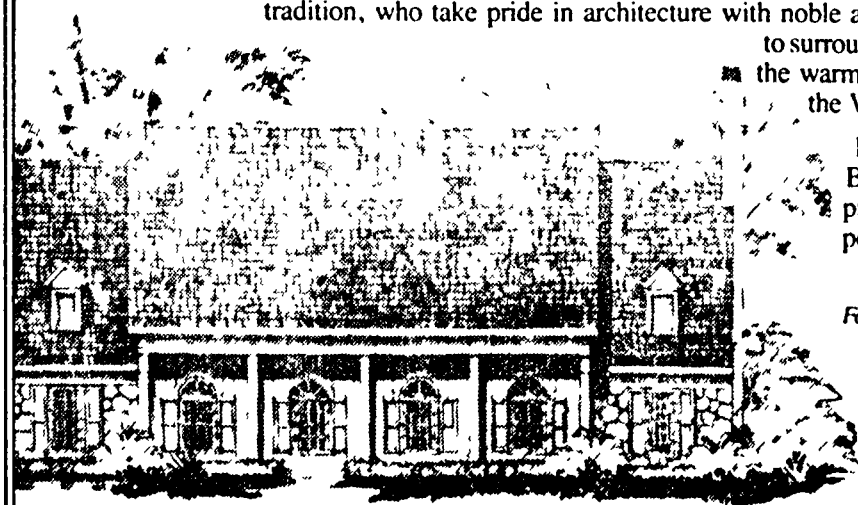
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TWIGS: Raising dollars for Mott

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Psychosocial Dwarfism: The link between emotions and growth

Psychosocial Dwarfism, or PSD, an often reversible, emotionally-induced pituitary disorder can result in dramatic retardation of developmental growth

Anna looks like a perfectly normal 3-year-old. The problem is, she's 9. The only physical evidence of her chronological age is in her teeth. Everything else — including her heart rate, blood pressure, bone age and sleeping patterns — are typical of a toddler.

Emotionally, Anna is stunted as well. Although she knows how to talk, she frequently regresses to garbled baby talk, especially in the presence of her parents. When asked how old she is, she says 3, even though she'll turn 10 in several months.

She also has frequent temper tantrums, wets the bed and soiled her underclothes.

She is not malnourished despite her small size. In fact, she is voracious and she compulsively consumes huge quantities of food, including loaves of bread, a jar of mayonnaise or several whole pies. She also ingests bizarre, non-food items such as dirt, paper, crayons, hair, garbage and dog food.

Her thirst is equally insatiable. She has been known to drink stagnant water from the sink, the toilet and the fish bowl.

Anna suffers from psychosocial dwarfism, or PSD, an often reversible, emotionally induced pituitary disorder that can result in dramatic retardation of physical and developmental growth. Children with psychosocial dwarfism are most commonly diagnosed between ages 3 and 4. They have no hereditary disposition to small stature and otherwise are generally healthy physically.

While Anna is a fictitious composite character, she represents many of the most classic symptoms of psychosocial dwarfism. In addition to dramatic growth retardation, these children have a history of bizarre behavior that revolves around eating, such as gorging and vomiting, stealing and hoarding food. Other common abnormal behaviors can include insomnia, night wandering, chronic depression, poor peer relations, self-injury, and general destructiveness. Many also are accident prone and have poor motor skills, delayed language development and IQs in the borderline of retarded range.

Victims of emotional deprivation

A common denominator among psychosocial dwarfs is that they are victims of emotional deprivation, both subtle and overt, says Nancy J. Hopwood, M.D., a professor of pediatrics and communicable diseases in the Pediatric Endocrinology and Metabolism Service at the University of Michigan Medical Center in Ann Arbor.

PSD represents one end of a wide spectrum of emotionally induced growth disorders, Hopwood says. "Environmentally-induced growth retardation associated with psychosocial deprivation, emotional stress and/or neglect may be the most common single cause of deviant growth in infants and children in the United States today. All too often, however, the child's small stature is ascribed to other causes because environmental factors are unappreciated," she says.

"Among preschoolers and children who are growing slowly and don't have a known medical illness, the incidence of emotional component growth failure is at least 50 percent," she continues. However, Hopwood is quick to emphasize that not all children with stress-induced growth disorders are psychosocial dwarfs. "We see children all the time who experience periods of slow growth that may be emotionally based, but they don't have the classical symptoms of psychosocial dwarfism," she says.

The most striking feature of PSD is that physical and developmental growth resumes at an accelerated rate almost immediately upon removing these children from their family environment, Hopwood says. The earlier the intervention, the more dramatic the improvement.

"In very severely growth-retarded children with PSD, if you put them in a different environment, such as a hospital, they start gaining weight right away, even though they're not eating any differently. Some of these young children can gain 3 or 4

Heal the Children treats needy children of the world

Heal the Children, a nationwide program dedicated to helping the children of the world, has established a home for its international heart patients at the U-M Medical Center Department of Pediatric Cardiology.

The program, established at U-M Medical Center accompanied Dr. Edward Bove, director of the Pediatric Cardiac Surgery Program, when he moved from the New York area to practice at the Medical Center five years ago.

Prior to his departure from New York, Dr. Bove was approached by Mr. and Mrs. Tom McDonald, the parents of a former heart patient. Because their child had recently had successful heart surgery, they wished to fund a program to help children who otherwise would be unable to afford needed medical treatment.

Dr. Bove responded to their request by informing them of the great need which exists in other countries where life-saving surgery is unavailable. The McDonalds were very interested in this idea because they wanted other children to have the same opportunity as their child.

Through their generosity, Dr. Bove said, the McDonalds funded the program when it came out here. And the McDonalds continue to fund this program. They give us a certain amount

of money each year," explained Dr. Bove. "We try to do our best with it." Unfortunately, the team at U-M Medical Center frequently has funding problems towards the end of the year. "We had hoped, in the past, to recruit people and corporations to donate other monies. We just haven't been successful," said Bove.

Upon his arrival in Ann Arbor, Dr. Bove

contacted an established agency, Heal the Children, Michigan. With the assistance of the Michigan coordinator Jan St. Martin and local coordinators Donna and Bob Baird, the staff of the Cardiology Department, under the direction of Amnon Rosenthal, M.D., professor of Pediatrics and director of Cardiology Service were

committed to the program. All the physicians involved donate their time and waive their professional fees to help make this program a success.

"Many times the children who seek medical help at U-M arrive with not only heart disease but also parasites, lice, and very bad teeth." Everyone helps, from the cardiac team to the dentists, the infectious disease staff and on down the line. "We try to take as many children as we can with the amount of money we have. It usually means only a handful of children," states Dr. Bove. Twenty-eight hospitals in Michigan are involved in this program.

"Although U-M does all of our cardiac patients, many of the children who are hosted in this area are also assisted by the medical teams at St. Joseph Hospital and Chelsea Hospital," explains Donna Baird, local coordinator.

Each case varies depending upon the complexity of the problems. "We try to accept out children that we are reasonably confident we can help," explains Dr. Bove. "Sometimes these children have such advanced diseases that they are inoperable. It is survival of the fittest in some of these countries. Although they are stricken as infants, their problems are not serious enough to keep them from developing into young children and these

are the kids who become inoperable because of irreversible changes in their hearts and their lungs."

According to Dr. Bove, "It would be nice to somehow influence these children as babies. That is when we do this type of work routinely here (the United States)."

The children are assisted through Heal

the Children by a medical team that travels to other countries once a year. The team performs those medical procedures which are possible in a "not so sterile" environment. While the medical team is in that country, they also prepare referral cases for between 300 to 400 children. A medical package is prepared for each

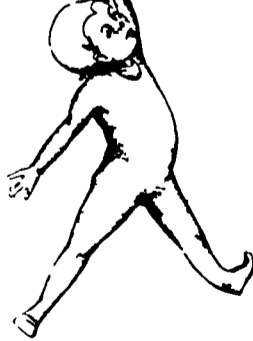
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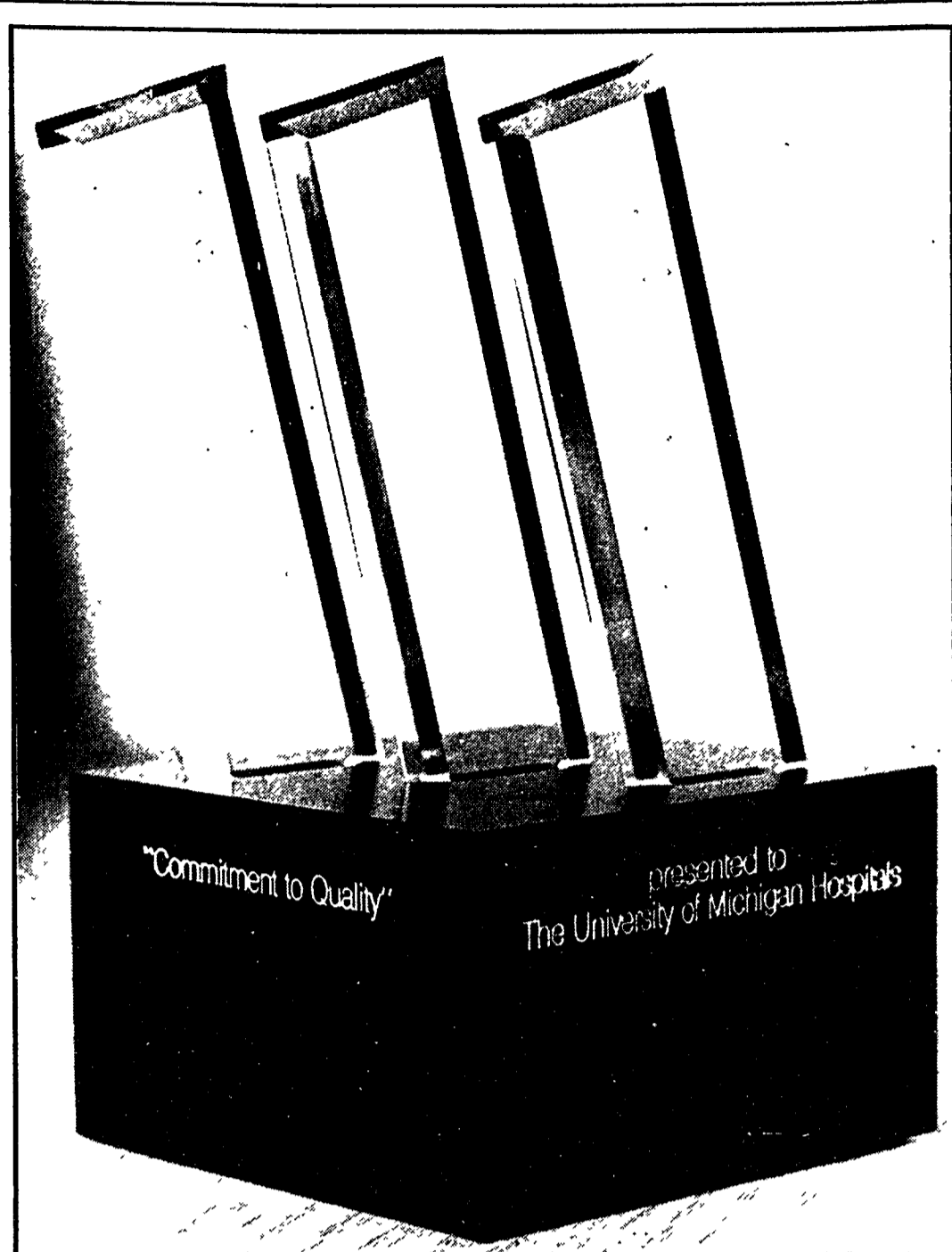

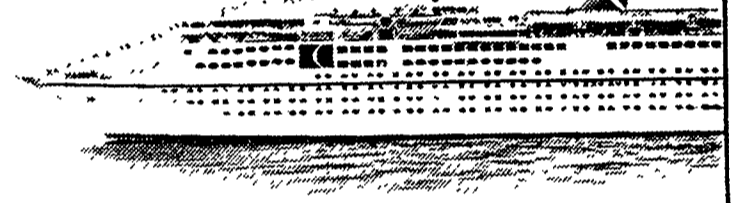
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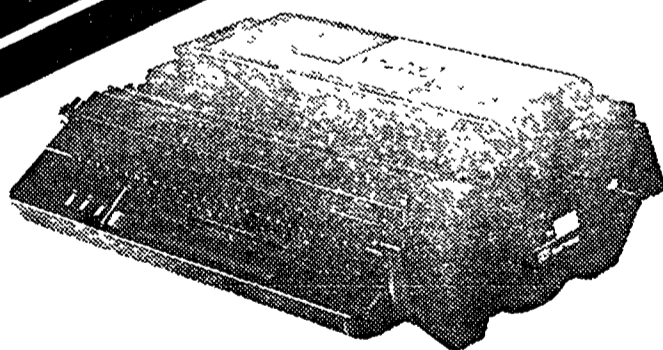
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Activity therapist puts her heart into helping children create art

It's one of the smallest Hospitals departments, with one of the longest histories. The Child Life Department in C.S. Mott Children's Hospital began in 1922 as the Hospital School. Its current employees have their own claims to history, too. Out of 12 staffers, five—or close to half—have worked at the Hospitals for 20 years or more. One who has served the longest activity therapist, Toni Leeds, who has both worked at Mott since 1958.

Toni can turn a tongue depressor into a brightly kimonoed doll, help a child lying on a stretcher create a picture without having streams of paint running down his arms, make a smiley-face puppet out of a plastic spoon. After 30 years as a Mott activity therapist, Toni is still a collector—not only of crafts ideas, but of memories and memorabilia.

Raised during hard times in the 1930s, Leeds still has "in my attic somewhere," sketches she drew on waxy sheets of paper that the laundry wrapped around still-damp clothes for delivery. She has a few full-page drawings of the faces of movie stars—Clara Bow and Norma Shearer—that she copied from screen magazines and sold for 25 cents apiece. ("A lot of money then—my mother bought groceries for a week for 50 cents.") The artistic memories are just as accessible. Asked for one, she rummages quickly and comes up with a vivid picture of a 5-year-old girl, sent to a storage room as punishment in 1925.

"Well, my mother thought it was punishment," chuckles Leeds, a sharp-faced woman with ruffled white hair. "I had no pencils, no paint, no scissors. There were only three trunks and a rolled up rug in one corner. Then I noticed a roll of that laundry paper. I tore out a raggedy doll with arms and legs, and then tore out

clothes for her. On top of the trunk, I had the whole layout of where she slept and where she was going. I sat there playing all afternoon. Eventually, of course, my mother knew, but she let me be. Actually, she was tickled by it, I think."

As an adult, Leeds still retains the enthusiasm and thirst for creative expression that inspired her, as a child, to make roses out of pink, water-stained crepe paper she obtained second-hand. There have been hospital name changes, department name changes and title changes since she started at the Hospi-

tals in 1958, but her essential "job" has remained the same—passing her love of art to children.

Though she may see hundreds of different children in a year, Leeds admits there are few who stand out in her mind. One she talks about is a 12-year-old girl who fought with her parents one icy winter evening, ran away and hid in a chicken coop all night.

"She was hospitalized with frostbite," Leeds remembers. "One morning when I went down to see her, they said she had gone to surgery to have her feet amputated. I don't know how I got back upstairs to my office. Weeks later, though, she came up to me, with a blanket over

her wheelchair. She told me to shut my eyes. When I opened them, she was standing up with her artificial feet on, a big day in her life," says Leeds, who recalls the story as if it happened yesterday. Actually, the incident occurred 28 years ago, but she has kept the red-and-black bowl and ceramic mask that the youngster, an exceptional artist, gave her.

"There's a lot of kids as I think back," she says, remembering a 13-year-old girl in traction who loved dogs. "My husband had just bought a beagle puppy, Suki, that was just small enough, at five weeks old, to slip into my purse. I sometimes brought Suki with me to meet the kids. When fall arrived, though, this little girl got worried that Suki would suffer in bad weather and, without telling me, started knitting a gift. I still have photos of her with this pot-bellied beagle wearing four purple booties," says Leeds with a hearty laugh.

Patients also seem to remember Leeds. When the Detroit Free Press wrote a lengthy article on the demolition of Old Main, the reporter interviewed Leeds. A former patient read the story and wrote her a letter.

"I remember you, 'Toni the Crafts Lady,' who, although I was flat on my back in a body cast, made it possible for me to make a purple papier mache pig, crepe paper flowers and other such treasures," wrote the woman, now a physician in Manistee.

Walking through Old Main with the reporter and other longtime Hospitals employees like David Dickinson, M.D., former chief of clinical affairs, Jeanne Collins, who started as an elevator operator 40 years ago, and Marge Becker, now an assistant dean and director of Allied

Health, was a wistful, at times traumatic experience, Leeds says. Ceilings were recently dismantled to remove asbestos, walls had been moved long ago.

"I was so disoriented when I reached the old Galens 'shop,' an activity room for kids on the 13th floor, that I only recognized the room by a view I remembered from one window," she says. "I turned to Dr. Dickinson and said, 'This is worse than a funeral.' I really felt like it had been mutilated and died." True to her penchant for saving things, Leeds had already managed, in 1969, to bring over pieces of the original 1927 shop, a jigsaw and band saw, that she still uses in Mott.

Gone, too, for the most part, are the days when children were routinely hospitalized for weeks at a time. "When you have a child who's going to be here for awhile, you can engage them in art work that has several parts," Leeds says, recalling the creation of large Christmas decorations, including a three-foot high reindeer and four-foot tall angels, dipped in glue and cloth and displayed in local shop windows.

"Nowadays, you have to be creative enough to think up projects that can be completed in one day: papier mache birds, metal rubbings, keychains," she notes.

Leeds still gets to know one group of hospitalized children very well, though. She regularly puts aside paint brushes and paper to teach academics to children in the rehabilitation unit. Suffering from closed head injuries or rheumatoid arthritis, and away from school for long periods, they need to keep up with academic subjects. One of her current favorites, for his mischievous, bright spirit, is Jonathan, seriously injured in a car accident last year.

"I've worked very hard, hoping he won't miss more than one year of school," Leeds confides. "He's brilliant, with a fantastic sense of humor that has helped him thrive." She recalls a time when he could barely hold a pencil and it was a struggle just to focus his eyes. "When I asked him to write the word 'desert,' he worked intently for a minute, then burst into giggles. Startled, Leeds looked over his shoulder, only to discover a crude, but realistic drawing of a cactus and sand

When Leeds retires next year, she'd like to write a children's cookbook. She's already well-known, in hospitals around the country, for a book she wrote in 1976 for a national conference of the Association for Child Life in Hospitals. Still deeply influenced by a Depression-era background of "using what you have on hand," she wrote about whimsical things she has helped children create out of hospital "whatnots."

"You can make a shadow box out of an empty tissue box, a place mat out of a shower mat, cotton ball Christmas trees and kitty cats, Thanksgiving turkeys out of medicine cups," she points out. She says she still peddles the copiously illustrated "Hospital Arts and Crafts," and believes that, over the years, almost every hospital in the United States has bought a copy.

Leeds' flair for creative adapting goes even deeper than innate talent and life-long experience. It is rooted in a rich cultural past.

"My parents were Italian immigrants," says the woman who was born Antonietta Ferretti. "They encouraged every one of my artistic endeavors, even if it was just helping my mother out with the annual painting of the kitchen chairs. I'll always remember that rich banana oil smell. I was also influenced by Zia, my

aunt in Italy. I still have the leather book with blank pages that she made and decorated for us. Nobody had the nerve to write in it because it was so beautiful. She also did pyrography, now a lost art, using hot needles to burn in designs on napped fabric. Whenever I did something artistic, my mother would say, 'You're going to be just like Zia.'

"Just like Zia," she repeats softly. "That's all a child needs, you know, encouragement. I love the look I see on a child's face when they're pleased with what they've done, when I know they started out thinking, 'I just can't.'" With a down-to-earth chuckle, her mood changes. "When it comes down to the art part, I guess I'm just a show off. I'm part ham, and I like that captive audience. I just love showing someone how to make something pretty."

U-M's Holden Neonatal ICU deserving of its excellent reputation

Intensive Care Unit's high standards of care and modern facilities help critically ill infants get well and their parents cope

Brian, a baby born 12 weeks premature, squirms incessantly inside his isolette. Assorted tubes connecting him to the machines that keep him alive in his new womb puncture his undeveloped, deep-red skin. His eyes are firmly shut, keeping him from seeing the mothering machinery or the smiling teddy bear his parents brought to keep him company during his stay in the Holden Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at the University of Michigan Medical Center.

Brian is so small he could swim laps in the kitchen sink. Around him in the NICU are other tiny infants, most of whom are a little bigger. Brian's prognosis is good, and he will most likely be going home to his parents—but no sooner than the end of his original gestation term.

"Technical developments over the past couple of years have radically changed the outcome for these micro-preemies, but once they're out we can't grow them any faster than the mother can," says staff nurse Liz Workman, a six-year veteran of the 24-bed unit.

Along with the intensive care units, Holden boasts two high-risk delivery rooms for mothers going into premature labor and for those whose babies have previously-identified congenital problems. These rooms are conveniently located so the infant does not have to be moved from one facility to another. He or she is wheeled around a corner and the necessary equipment is immediately available. More often than not, the child needs to be placed on a ventilator—a machine that breathes for the baby.

Respiratory failure is the biggest killer of newborns, Workman says. "Some are preemies whose lungs aren't fully developed. Others are unexpectedly critically ill, but most have to be on ventilators to sustain their lives."

One look around the NICU confirms this. Although about a dozen babies fill the room, not a cry is heard. A baby on a ventilator has a tube going through his or her voicebox and into the windpipe, forcing oxygen into the lungs.

Some of the children are on the highly-specialized Extra Corporeal Membrane Oxygenation (ECMO). ECMO is a breathing process in which the baby's blood is run through tubes out of the body and oxygenated in a machine, then pumped back into the body. It is used with the assistance of specially-trained ECMO technicians and respiratory therapists when an ordinary ventilator is unable to correct the respiratory problem, or when its potential side effects are too risky for the infant.

Seeing their baby hooked up to an ECMO ma-

chine, or any of the technical equipment in the NICU, can be a tremendous shock to parents, especially those of an anticipated healthy baby, who were only prepared by Lamaze classes and Dr. Spock. Holden NICU has open, unrestricted visiting hours for parents, family and friends of the infant, and offers a weekly parent support group.

Holden stresses parental education prenatally, for those who already know a problem exists, at the bedside, and at discharge. The ultimate goal is to establish a parent-child relationship amid all the intravenous tubing and beeping high tech equipment.

"What we try to do is to help parents understand all the equipment so that they don't focus on it," says Luan Miller, R.N., in charge of prenatal parental education. "We want them to get to know their baby, because it helps all of them."

The parents can't be at the bedside all the time, but the nurses can, and are.

"This is a 24-hour unit," says Workman. "Every shift is a complement of every other shift. You start by hearing what the previous shift was like."

On the floor at any given time are 13-15 nurses, respiratory therapists, and resident physicians and two interns. There are also immediately available attending neonatologists and fellows.

But the neonatal nurses are the ones NICU beds, at no more than a two-to-one patient ratio, often one-to-one.

"The nurse is like an anchor by the bedside," Workman says, "constantly watching."

Workman, an Omaha native, calls the Holden staff "categorically the best staff I've ever worked with. We have a mutually agreed upon standard of care that we absolutely expect out of everyone."

She enjoys pediatric nursing because of its profound influence on young lives, both the infant's and the parents'.

"When things go well at this critical time, you're giving the patient a good start on life, a foundation on which other good things are going to happen," Workman says. "So you're looking at 75 years down the road all of which can be better because of what we do here now."

This fall Workman and her colleagues will move to a new building that will increase their capacity by five beds. The new Maternal Child Health Center is being built adjoining the C.S. Mott Children's/Holden Perinatal/Women's Hospitals. The new facility should enhance Holden's national reputation, patients are sent here from across the eastern United States for specialized neonatal care.

pounds in as many days — just a phenomenal growth rate. They grow at rates five or six times the normal linear growth over short periods of time," she says.

This accelerated "catch up" growth is almost always accompanied by developmental and behavioral improvement. These changes occur without specific medical, hormonal, or psychiatric treatment. In fact, the use of growth hormone therapy is futile with these children. "Nutrients aren't being metabolized for growth, so there's a real resistance to hormone therapy," Hopwood says.

Separation from family is the treatment of choice

The only known successful treatment for classical PSD is to promptly remove these children from their homes and quarantine them from their parents and siblings. In most cases, foster placement under court order is the intervention of choice, Hopwood says. Returning these children to

their natural families is successful only about 10 percent of the time, as only families that are willing to seek help and undergo marital and/or family counseling are capable of reintegration.

"Reintegration is the ultimate

goal, but it's not usually achievable," Hopwood says. "With few exceptions, it is our experience that therapy has not been successful in bringing about enough of a change in these families that are resistant to change and refuse

help of any type. Others are geographically isolated and referral agencies are unavailable."

The majority of children she evaluates for PSD are referred by public health nurses, state social workers, physicians, school counselors, community clinics and concerned neighbors and relatives. Rarely are these children brought in by their parents.

"Unless given strong evidence of parental motivation and ability to change...our recommendation is that the children be placed in a foster home at least until they reach the third percentile in height. Usually this is accomplished in 1.5 to two years," Hopwood says. "Contact initiated by the natural parents through phone calls, letters and/or presents is discouraged. As this type of recommendation is opposite to how physicians, psychologists and social workers have been trained, we have to repeatedly remind ourselves that the parent is stressful to the child."

Children with PSD frequently come from two-parent families or newly blended, reconstituted households in which there is a lot of unresolved stress and anger. Poor communication, chronic maternal depression, physical and/or emotional spouse or child abuse, parental alcoholism and/or drug abuse are among the most common stressors in such households. Unemployment, financial hardship and chronic illness also can play a large role in the psychodynamics of these families, Hopwood says.

Emotional 'sponges' that absorb anger

Psychosocial dwarfs are extremely emotionally sensitive children who perceive themselves as being caught in the middle of such parental or family conflicts, and often act as scapegoats, or emotional "sponges" that absorb and internalize the misdirected anger.

Other dynamics that can stunt a child's growth include symbiosis, when a parent is pathologically bonded to the child. "We treated a child once who was 4, but was the size of a 13-month old. The child was not permitted to function as an individual. The mother fed him with a spoon, she carried him around, and she cradled him like an infant... She was bonded to him, but it was pathological bonding, and so the child never became an individual — he never grew emotionally or physically, so therefore he was developmentally very, very delayed," Hopwood recalls.

Some parents inadvertently encourage their children to remain small, with frequent comments such as "I like little children," or "I like you little, I don't care if you're small." Children can internalize such cues and conclude that their parents will love them only if they stay small, like a

baby, Hopwood says.

Such psychic stress is thought to negatively affect the endocrine system, which leads to inhibition of growth hormone production and stunts physical and developmental growth. "It's generally thought that the emotionally negative stimuli alter the neurotransmitters of the brain, which leads to an absence of growth hormone releasing factor (GHRF), which in turn

externally. And the growth can resume at a supernormal rate in just a few days."

One of the world's leading authorities on PSD, Hopwood has identified approximately 150 such children since the condition first was described in 1967 by Gerald F. Powell, M.D., at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Md. Hopwood later worked with Powell in evaluating some of the earliest-documented cases of PSD at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston, where she completed her residency training.

Psychosocial Dwarfism remains largely undiagnosed

While PSD over the past 20 years has become more widely recognized by pediatric endocrinologists, it remains largely undiagnosed by many health professionals, Hopwood says. "People who tell me they've never seen PSD have never looked for it or thought about it," she says.

Because emotionally-related growth disorders are more common than previously thought, Hopwood says it is essential that pediatric psychiatrists and psychologists become increasingly aware of this syndrome.

"It's very important for parents and health care professionals to realize that emotions can effect mental and physical growth. It's very important to treat children according to their age, and not their size."

"We're not all aware of how we project our emotions onto other people," she continues. "For example, when we snap at someone, are we really thinking about something completely different? This kind of unconscious interaction plays a role in everyone's life. And more so in children who are very sensitive."

causes a period of actual pituitary deficiency," Hopwood says.

When psychosocial dwarfs are removed from their negative environment, the pituitary function usually resumes, but researchers still don't know how. "Psychosocial dwarfism manifests in an energy imbalance. In catch up growth, we don't really know how that energy is re-shunted. The same energy is available as before, but somehow it now gets channeled into growth," Hopwood says. "I think there's a change in metabolic rate, and there have been some studies that have looked at that. It is very difficult to know how someone has catch up growth... But once the child is removed from his or her dysfunctional environmental, the permission is there, both internally and

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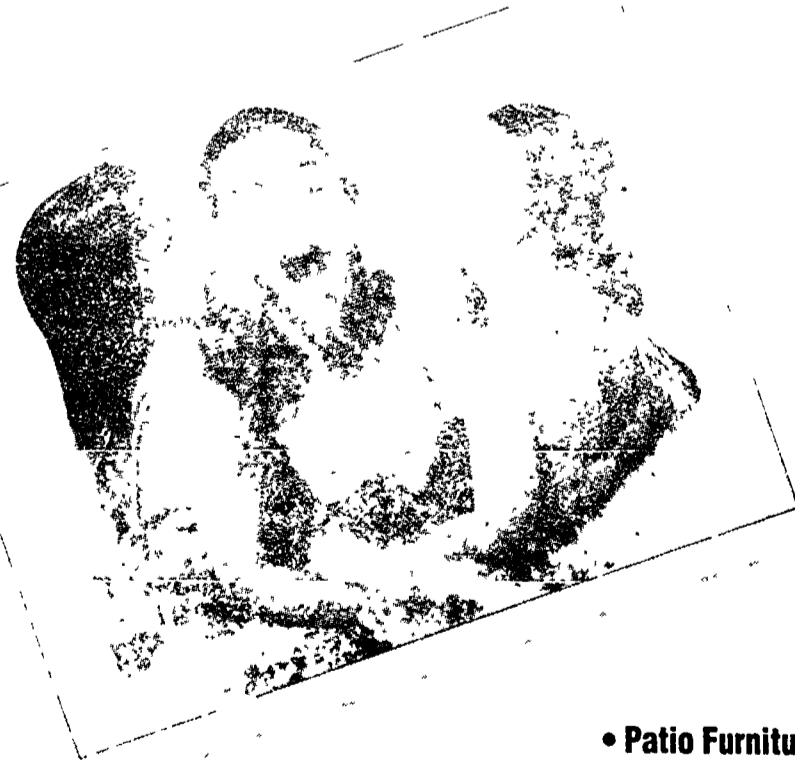
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Medical breakthrough: U-M researcher and collaborator isolates cystic fibrosis gene

discovery of the genetic defect responsible for 70 percent of cystic fibrosis cases—the most common fatal inherited disease in North America—has tremendous implications.

After eight long years, successfully caught up with Francis S. Collins, M.D., Ph.D., last summer in a dorm room at Yale University. Collins was there, hovering over a machine in a makeshift office, while the University of Michigan researcher realized with certainty and his collaborator, Hae Tsui, M.D., Ph.D., of the University of Michigan, finally had capped one of the most competitive, exhaustive research efforts in medical genetics—the search for the gene that causes cystic fibrosis.

Like many medical "breakthroughs," the discovery of the gene came slowly and only after false leads, says Collins, associate professor of human genetics and internal medicine at the University of Michigan Medical School and U-M's Hughes Medical Institute.

In retrospect, Collins said that the moment of "eureka" came in such an inauspicious setting—he and Tsui were in a dormitory while attending a scientific meeting in New Haven, Conn.

Between meeting sessions, Collins and Tsui would go back to their dorm, where they communicated via fax machine with Tsui's laboratory at the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto, where he is an associate professor of genetics. As the data poured in, Collins and Tsui knew they were getting

closer

In comparing the U-M and Toronto data on a Wednesday night in mid-June, it became clear that a subtle mutation in the suspect gene, located on the long arm of chromosome 7, was present in 70 percent of the cystic fibrosis chromosomes, while this defect was absent in virtually all of the normal chromosomes.

"I think that's when I sort of went over the threshold and said,

"Yeah, this is probably it," Collins recalls. "The setting was doubly amusing because in the next room was one of our major competitors. The dorm walls were pretty thin so we had to talk in whispers and not yell and scream."

Although they couldn't celebrate at the moment, Collins, Tsui and colleagues have been humbly basking in praise since the finding was published in a September issue of *Science*.

The discovery of the genetic defect, which is responsible for 70 percent of cases of the dis-

ease, already has led to the development of screening tests for potential carriers of the gene, and brings closer new treatments—and an eventual cure—for people suffering from cystic fibrosis, the most common fatal inherited disease in North America.

The discovery also proves for the first time that it is possible to track down a gene by "reverse genetics"—that is, without any information about the defect or normal function of the gene that causes the disease. The cystic fibrosis defect involved only three base pairs in an exceptionally long gene of 250,000 bases.

Proof that the process of reverse genetics works places modern science squarely in the "golden age of genetics," Collins says. "What was done for cystic fibrosis should now be available for a very large number of other diseases. Admittedly, it will take a huge amount of work. Still, it is clear that you can do this and actually succeed," he said.

"There are some 4,000 genetic diseases that afflict us. In the vast majority of those the gene hasn't been found and nobody understands what the basic defect is. The only way those diseases are going to be effectively approached is by reverse genetics," he says.

Once such genes are identified, it will be possible to isolate defects responsible for genetic diseases and devise treatments. "The opportunities are enormous for cloning these genes and figuring out how they work," Collins says with enthusiasm.

But the initial work of finding the responsible gene is a long, laborious step. The process of identifying a single gene has been compared to finding an unknown

object in a closet in a house somewhere between New York and Los Angeles without a street address.

A technique called "chromosome jumping" developed in the U-M genetics labs has hastened the process dramatically. Collins, Michael C. Lannuzzi, M.D., assistant professor of internal medicine, and other U-M researchers used the technique to jump over large chunks of genetic material and move along the chromosome to the area they were investigating. This process is five to ten times faster than conventional techniques, Collins says.

Collins, 39, has been fascinated with genetic research since his first year of medical school at the University of North Carolina School of Medicine. He chose to pursue a medical degree after earning a doctorate in physical chemistry from Yale because he found that field "a bit too abstract."

He went to a medical school unsure whether he wished to pursue research alone, or practice clinical medicine. Genetics offered him the opportunity to do both. "Genetics has just the right combination of obvious medical applications and scientific elegance. It is principle-based, instead of detail-based, which is just what I was looking for," he says.

His research load is heavy. In addition to the CF gene, he logs many hours in the lab searching for the genes responsible for Huntington's chorea and neurofibromatosis, and studying the regulation of the human hemoglobin genes. He also is actively involved in the Human Genome Project, a worldwide \$3 billion effort to map and sequence the entire genetic endowment of humans and other

organisms

On top of this he juggles administrative duties as chief of the Division of Medical Genetics, and is directing a project on human gene therapy.

Still, every week, he sees patients who come to the U-M for diagnosis and treatment of all

types of genetic diseases. The CF patients he sees have provided ample evidence of the impact of his lab work. "They are excited about the gene. They have a renewed sense of hope that something is going to come along. I could show you incredibly touching letters I've gotten from all over the place from parents who have children with the disease."

"They realize that this isn't a cure, but they feel that now the clock has started on finding a cure. They have hope, and I do too, that a cure will be found in the lifetime of their sons and daughters."

Although he sees patients regularly, Collins says he still feels a need to "help people more directly." This long-standing urge led him to leave his work on the CF gene at its peak, shortly after the fateful meeting at Yale, and go to Africa for three weeks to

care for patients in a Nigerian mission hospital.

The switch from a high-tech lab to a primitive jungle hospital was "a total change," but a very satisfying one, he says. "Since I became a Christian about 10 years ago I've wanted to see what I could do as a short term effort to help people more directly. I worked as an internist treating large numbers of very sick patients in a short period of time. With a shortage of laboratory services, mostly you had to just go by your eyes and your head and your hands and your heart," he says.

"I've enjoyed it. It certainly was good for my spiritual well-being, and it gave me a new perspective on all the minutiae we worry about in our ivory tower academic setting."

The trip to Africa also gave Collins a chance to work with his 19-year-old daughter Margaret, who accompanied him. An undergraduate at her father's alma mater and a veteran of several summers spent working in her father's lab, she is interested in becoming a physician.

Collins has mixed feelings about his daughter's career plan. "It's a very rewarding thing to do but you pay a price," he says, referring to the preciousness of time spent with his wife and two daughters while maintaining his hectic work schedule.

Despite the time demands of his career, Collins clearly loves his chosen field, and he's well aware of the impact his work

"Current advances in molecular genetics will change the face of medicine," he says. "Researchers will look back on this time 100 years from now and feel a little envious."

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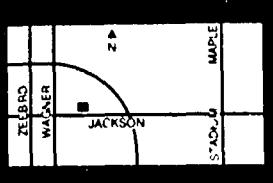
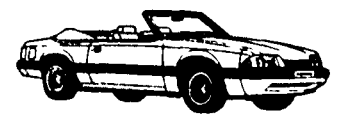

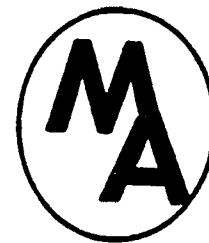
Our friends at Rick's American Cafe raised several hundred dollars for Mott Children's Hospital this year.

interact, and offer their frustrations. They experience such isolation because they can't leave the house, and their friends sometimes feel uncomfortable coming over."

It was from this support group's summer quarterly meeting last August that the idea of a summer camp was born. One parent mentioned how her boy had always gone to camp before his severe neuro-muscular disease made him ventilator-dependent, and if there was one week out of the year they could look forward to, their lives would be easier.

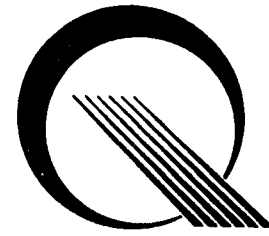
Dekeon went to work exploring the idea. By November, she was referred to Camp Fowler and began to realize that the distressed parent's dream could become reality.

"Camp Fowler is about 10 years old and it's absolutely perfect," said Dekeon. "It's used for mentally handicapped children and adults, so it has all the facilities."

The entire camp, including its nature trails, is wheelchair accessible. A pontoon boat large enough for five wheelchairs will be used for fishing, even by the children who cannot move their limbs.

Besides fishing, the kids will be doing various arts and crafts, going on scavenger hunts, and writing and participating in skits.

These activities will help the children express themselves artistically, intellectually and socially. The camp's philosophy is that although these children have "special" needs, they also have "normal" needs. Trail's Edge is designed to meet both.



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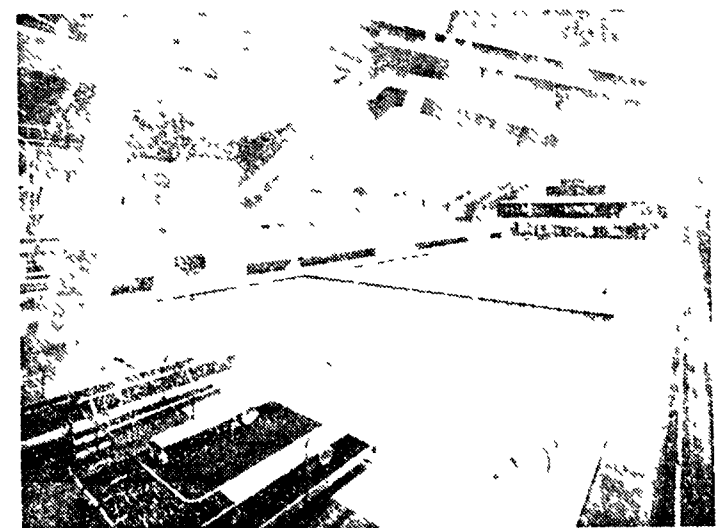
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Pediatric researchers working for healthier, happier children

As the last decade of the 20th century dawns, pediatric researchers at the University of Michigan Medical Center are working to ensure healthier, happier lives for the children of the 21st century.

The U-M's Department of Pediatrics and Communicable Diseases is on the cutting edge of research into possible therapies and eventual cures of genetic disorders such as cystic fibrosis and Down's Syndrome that can cause malformation and mental retardation in children.

Dr. Robert P. Kelch, chairman of the department, divides the research into two general areas: clinical, physiologically-oriented work, and molecular and cellular biological research. Scientists working in the latter area experiment with genetic engineering techniques, attempting to solve the riddle of genetically transmitted diseases, while those in clinical research are involved in such areas as the testing of new drugs.

"The research of the department spans from practical clinical studies to someone working on a basic level trying to understand the minute alterations of a gene that will lead to a severe disease," Dr. Kelch said. "It'll take a little bit of time before that basic information is turned into some sort of gene therapy or drug that can be taken to the bedside. What's exciting is that it isn't taking anywhere near as long as I thought it would."

In the mid-'60s scientists were just learning how genes worked, and now scientists are routinely isolating genes in attempts to single out defects and correct them.

"Science is moving very quickly," said Dr. Kelch. "The time from basic discovery to clinical application has shortened rather dramatically."

Treatment of patients with abnormal immune systems being done at Mott Hospital is an example of how basic genetic research can be applied clinically in a matter of a few years.

Investigators in several laboratories, including some at Mott, discovered that some cells release hormones which regulate the functions of other cells. One such hormone is granulocyte-colony stimulating factor (G-CSF). G-CSF regulates the actions of white blood cells, the body's chief defenders against infection and inflammation. Over the past year, 40 patients with white blood cell deficiencies, most of whom suffered from chronic infections, have all been successfully treated with G-CSF at Mott under the direction of Laurence A. Boxer, M.D., professor of Pediatrics and director of Pediatric Hematology/Oncology Service.

This type of genetic research accounts for about

two-thirds of the enormous amount of research in progress in the department which has an annual research budget more than \$5 million.

"We're looking at all sorts of genetic diseases that control normal development of the brain and body, diseases that afflict patients and cause severe mental retardation," said Dr. Kelch. "We're using genetic engineering to understand the very basis of these disorders, such as isolating the gene for a certain type of malignancy, then determining why the gene is abnormal, what the abnormality means, and finally developing a way to treat it, prevent it, or both."

Working to solve malignancies is Edward Prochownik, M.D., Ph.D., associate professor of Pediatrics, who is doing research with oncogenes, a special type of gene involved in cell differentiation, related to normal and abnormal cell growth. Dr. Prochownik's research is breaking new ground into the determination of how cells become malignant, or cancerous. Once that is determined, Dr. Kelch pointed out, a better way of combatting malignancies can be found.

Dr. Kelch said that the biggest steps can be made when scientists not only isolate the genes for genetic disorders, but find ways to put back the normal gene into enough cells to cure those genetic diseases. "I believe that's a process that will happen over the next ten years or so," he said.

In clinical drug research, Dr. Kelch pointed out the work of Robert Levy, M.D., associate professor of Pediatrics and Pharmaceutics, a pediatric cardiologist who is developing a way of delivering drugs directly to the heart and various components of the heart. He is trying to prevent calcification, or blockage, of artificial valves in children with heart defects, the primary reason for the failure of artificial valves.

Dr. Levy has developed a ring that, when surgically placed around the artificial valve, releases a special chemical to prevent calcification. The chemical is localized to the heart, and not enough of it gets into the rest of the body to do any harm. Similar rings are also being tested in animals to treat irregular heartbeat.

Mott pediatric specialists are undertaking many other research projects at the facility and at the Clinical Research Center, both in actual clinical testing, and on the most basic level of genetic research.

Dr. Kelch, like any scientist, is optimistic about the immediate future. "I think that over the next decade we will be involved in studies that will unravel the basic causes of genetic disorders."

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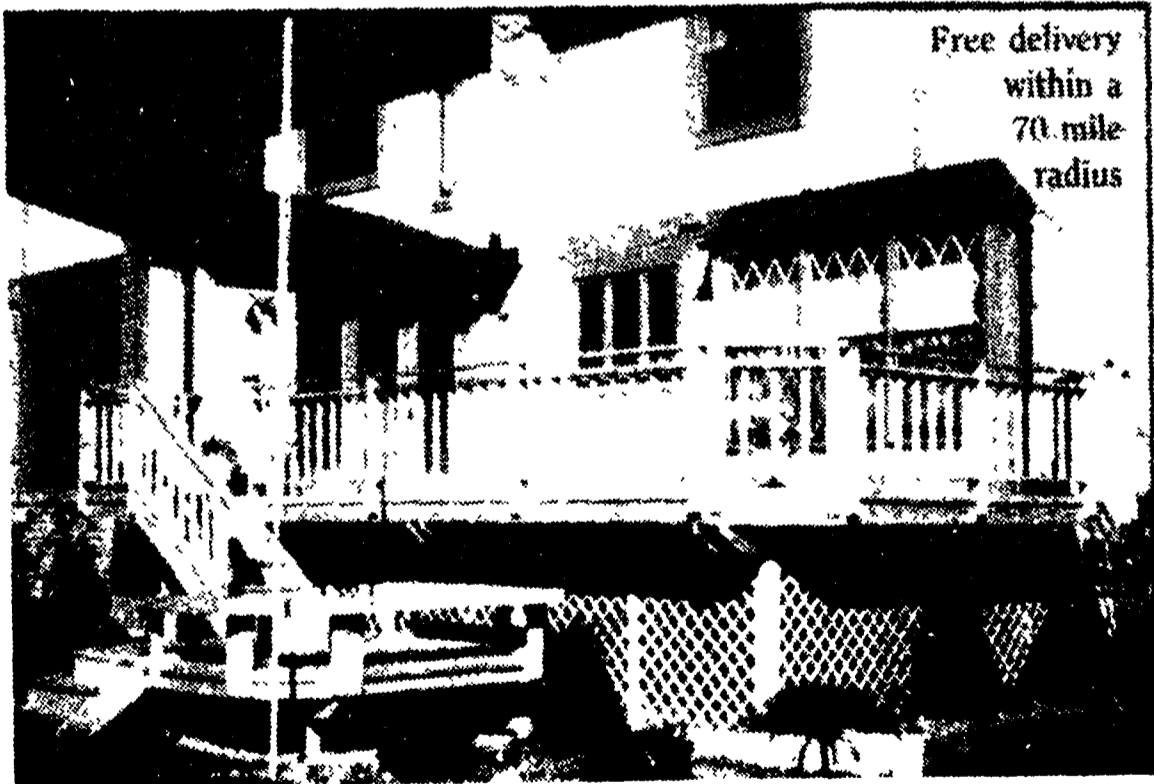


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Cable Comments

Canton and Northville, and Metro Vision in Farmington, Farmington Hills and Novi, handle their community access channels.

Within each community the cable companys have operated in a unique fashion. Omnicom has been very visible at all large community events. They have enjoyed an excellent reputation for becoming involved with the organizations and causes of importance to their communities.

Omicom's local production staff and volunteers have participated in the coordination and taping of such programs as the four day live "Plymouth Fall Festival," the WSDP Live Auction, the Substance Abuse Telethon, the Northville Bluegrass Festival, the 4th of July and Memorial Day Parades, Soccer Tournaments and Graduations. Production manager Maria Holmes feels that their ability to coordinate with community organizations is best exemplified by the production of the Salvation Army's "Baskets Filled With Love" Food Drive and Telethon. In one season, over 140,000 canned goods were collected to feed the needy in the community. John Martin is the Executive Producer of the event.

On May 19, Omnicom was proud to support the WSDP Radio Auction by Cablecasting the event live on Saturday, May 19, from 2:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Channel 8. The live coverage took place at the auction site in the upper commons of Salem High School. The money raised this year will benefit both WSDP Radio and the "I Care" Committee.

Cathy O'Loughlin is the Executive Producer of the auction's video coverage. She emphasizes that the three camera live shoot, such as the WSDP Auction, takes a great deal of preparation. Programming Engineer David Zmich is responsible for coordinating the complicated technical details that are necessary.

O'Loughlin is responsible for designing the background set as well

as coordinating the programming staff and the access volunteers, who will be assisting in this production. O'Loughlin stresses that the most important part of this production are the volunteers. "We couldn't do it without them," he said.

Another example of an organization becoming directly involved in community television with the assistance of the cable company staff is through, "the Wednesday Report: LIVE". This show is produced by the Canton Community Foundation. Foundation coordinators, Bill Joyner and Cindy Burgess, co-host a weekly newscast on Omnicom's Public Access Channel 15.

Each week they present current events and information about organizations in the Canton Community. Coverage includes service organizations, issues of interest, government and school news. The program also consist of a guest interviewee for their segment entitled "The Cutting Edge."

One of the main purposes of Foundation is to focus on communication between residents and the government, organizations, Chamber of Commerce. Cindy Burgess emphasizes that "a weekly show that is live on the same day each week and at the same time best serves the goal to better communication between the residents." Other goals of the Foundation include establishing a scholarship and developing a Canton Economic Club.

The name "The Wednesday Report: LIVE" is taken from the monthly back page of the Community Crier Newspaper. Overall the production is simple and straight to the point. The program's technical staff includes Omnicom's programming personnel and interns, guided and directed by Associate Producer Lee Dimitroff. The camera people for the show include Laura and Susan Fanslow. The foundation ahs found the weekly newscast to be hard work, yet very rewarding.

In the Farmington, Farmington Hills and Novi area the local news has taken several forms over the past five years. The spring of 1990 finds the "Newscenter 12" under redesign with a committee of resident television producers, Cable Company Staff of MetroVision, Southwestern Oakland Cable Commission Staff and Interns. Tracy

Thompson, Farmington resident and Telecommunication Masters Grad is at the helm. Bob Carlson is the resident Corporate Planning expert. Kevin Southers, Production Specialist of SWOCC is the Promotion and Technical expert. Joan Lillie, Production Specialist of MetroVision, is the expert with working with the public. Lisa Smith of Eastern University and Claudette LeMieux of Michigan State University will intern and lend Tracy Thompson a hand.

"Newscenter 12" is interested in selecting a team of local news writers and remote camera crew. They are considering securing a token grant to help entice regular contribution that will sustain such a weekly program. All organizations and homeowner groups are encouraged to send their press releases and announcements to "Newscenter 12" c/o SWOCC at 35494 Grand River Ave., Farmington Hills, Michigan 48024.

44th Tony Awards celebrate the magical power of actors

Joe Cates has a passion for his work as a television producer, and that passion becomes clearly evident when he puts his mark on "The 44th Annual Tony Awards," airing Sunday, June 3, on CBS.

Live from the Lunt-Fontanne Theatre in New York, the awards are a memorial to the late Antoinette ("Tony") Perry, the American Theatre Wing's World War II chairperson, and they honor excellence on Broadway.

To attain that goal, Cates announced the theme "The Year Of The Actor" for this year's awards, and has been working in bits and pieces since February to find ways to demonstrate the meaning of that theme.

Among the first things he did was select a host for the show, Kathleen Turner, who, herself, is a Tony nominee for Best Performance By a

Lead Actress in the play "Cat On A Hot Tin Roof."

"I was very lucky," he said about Turner accepting the hosting duties. "I got an authentic theater star, currently working in the theater, who's an international film star, and to top it off, lives in New York, so it's not a strain or a stretch, and that's luck and that's wonderful," Cates said. "She is wonderful, she has humor, she has warmth."

Cates has been producing television since the early 1950s, having started with the DuMont Network. He knows that for the show to be a success, the producer has to be involved as a creative force, and has to know the material.

"I had to screen the last six Tony Awards shows, that's 2 hours and 20 minutes, average, a piece. I also had to break them down myself, to get an understanding, some sort of underlying philosophy, what I felt was

right, what was wrong. What I thought about the value of the show, how it should be presented," Cates explained.

He knew with the theme "The Year Of The Actor," he needed to give tribute to actors, not just through words, but through actions as well. Actors such as Morgan Freeman, Tyne Daly and Kevin Kline will take the spotlight and try to command the audience in solo readings, rather than flashy and, what Cates called, phoney television production numbers.

"That's how we represent "The Year Of The Actor," by the art of the actor, the single actor dominating the stage," Cates said.

Also, director Peter Stone, who rewrote the book "Grand Hotel" for "Grand Hotel, The Musical," a multiple Tony nominated musical this year, has collected stories and anecdotes from all the great actors he has worked with through the years. The presenters will intersperse those stories throughout the Tony Awards program.

Finally, Cates' version of the Tonys pays tribute to all of the actors who are appearing on Broadway at awards time. The marquees and final bows of all of the shows have been filmed.

"A lot of wonderful shows are not nominated, but why should they be ignored from the Tonys? Some of them are not nominated because they were nominated in years past, or some of them have opened after (they were eligible), Cates said. "We estimate that there will be between 23 and 25 shows on Broadway. We're shooting the bows of them and incorporating them into the show, for every actor on Broadway to take a bow."



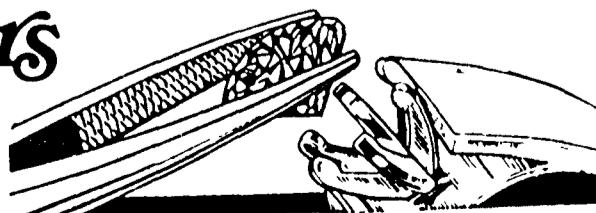

James Woods, John Lithgow to star in drama about tested friendship

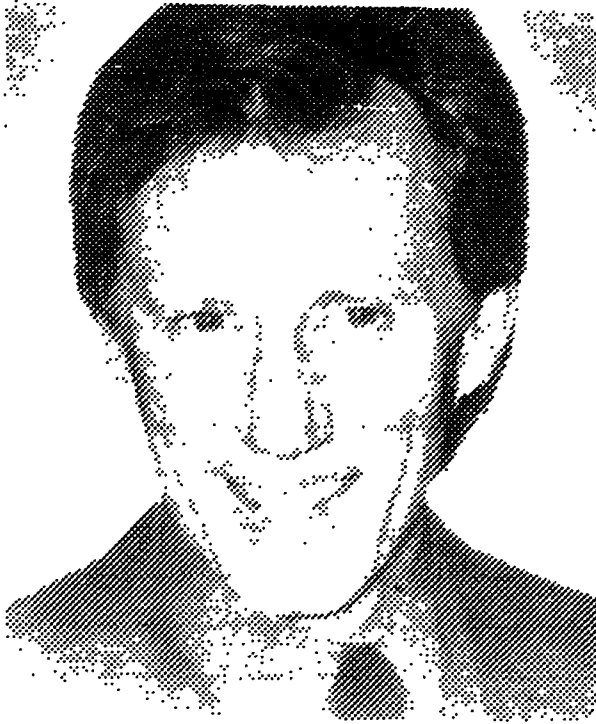
Two of Hollywood's most acclaimed actors, Emmy-winner James Woods and two-time Oscar nominee John Lithgow will star in *The Boys*, a moving drama of two men, lifelong friends and writing partners, who are suddenly confronted with the frightening realization that one of them is terminally ill. The two-hour film will air during the 1990-91 season on ABC.

Astronomers in Flagstaff, Ariz., have confirmed what music fans have known for a long time. The Beatles are stars. Two Lowell Observatory astronomers have named four asteroids Lennon, McCartney, Harrison and Starr. The Fab Four of heavenly bodies are located between Mars and Jupiter and were discovered in 1983 and 1984 during a photographic survey of an asteroid belt, according to star-watchers Britan Skiff and Edward Bowell, who are longtime Beatles fans. "We thought it would be kind of nice to honor people who don't usually get recognized in space," said Bowell, a native of England.

Fawn Hall, Oliver North's secretary during the Iran-Contra scandal, has taken an assignment for *Evening Magazine* at KDKA-TV in Pittsburgh. She will report on three beach resorts favored by Pittsburgh vacationers.

Comedian Bob Goldthwait claims he was into recycling long before ecology was the rage. "Sure, I recycle paper, glass and plastic, but that's not all. What I also do for the environment is that I keep using the same jokes over and over again," he says. "I'm using bits that I wrote when I was 4."

Gary Cole, star of *Midnight Caller*, is set to play the controversial General George Armstrong Custer in *Son Of The Morning Star*, the towering epic history of the bloody Plains Indians Wars and of the flamboyant cavalry officer who rode to his destiny at the disastrous Battle of the Little Big Horn. The four-hour miniseries, based on the acclaimed best-seller of the same name by Evan S. Connell, will air during the 1990-91 season on ABC.

The 42nd Annual Primetime Emmy Awards will be telecast live by Fox Broadcasting Co. on Sunday, Sept. 16, from the Pasadena Civic Auditorium in California. Nominations will be announced on Thursday, Aug. 2.

Jim Byrnes, who stars as Lifeguard in *Wiseguy*, fronts what he calls a "rocking blues band" when not acting. Byrnes, who lives in Vancouver, B.C., where the series is filmed, loves to play and will perform almost anywhere, no matter how remote. "I once played a date on an oil rig in Canada's Beaufort Sea, 600 miles above the Arctic Circle. That was a great audience, though I'll admit those guys might have been a little desperate for entertainment."

"Next to having a hit and continuing on to next season," says Vickilyn Reynolds, star of CBS' *Sugar And Spice*, "the thing I hope for most is that we'll get to sing more. It's time to get more music, and in our case singing, back into series television." Both Reynolds and co-star Loretta Devine are acclaimed as singers in the stage and cabaret worlds.

Lou Gossett Jr. and Sara Gilbert (*Roseanne*) will star in Lifetime's second world premiere film, *Sudie and Simpson*. The film, set in 1940s Georgia, about a young Southern girl who befriends a black man in a small town where racism is the norm, is to debut in the fall.

LET'S TALK

'Maverick' was turning point in James Garner's life

Q: My question is that I would like any information on the personal lives of Tony Bennett and James Garner. They are two entertainers that I greatly admire, but rarely hear anything of their private lives. —Irene Bandow, Eagle River, Wis.

A: James Garner was born in Norman, Okla., on April 7, 1928, of German and Cherokee Indian extraction. He left home at age 16 to become a merchant seaman. Shortly after his return home, he was the first draftee from that state's National Guard to be

called into the Korean conflict. After his discharge, a friend got him a small part in the stage play *The Caine Mutiny Court Martial*, which led to small parts on television and a contract with Warner Bros. After guest appearances in several minor films and TV productions, he was cast as the co-star of *Maverick*, which was the turning point in his life. Married to the former Lois Clarke in 1956, they are the parents of two grown daughters and make their home in Brentwood, Calif. Tony Bennett was born on Aug. 3, 1926, in Queens, N.Y. Twice divorced

he has two sons by his first marriage and two daughters by his second. He has three grandchildren. He was virtually an unknown when he won a spot as one of the staff singers on the 1950 summer series *Songs For Sale*. He left after a month and soon became one of the hottest names in popular music with his 1950 hits "Because Of You" and "Cold Cold Heart." 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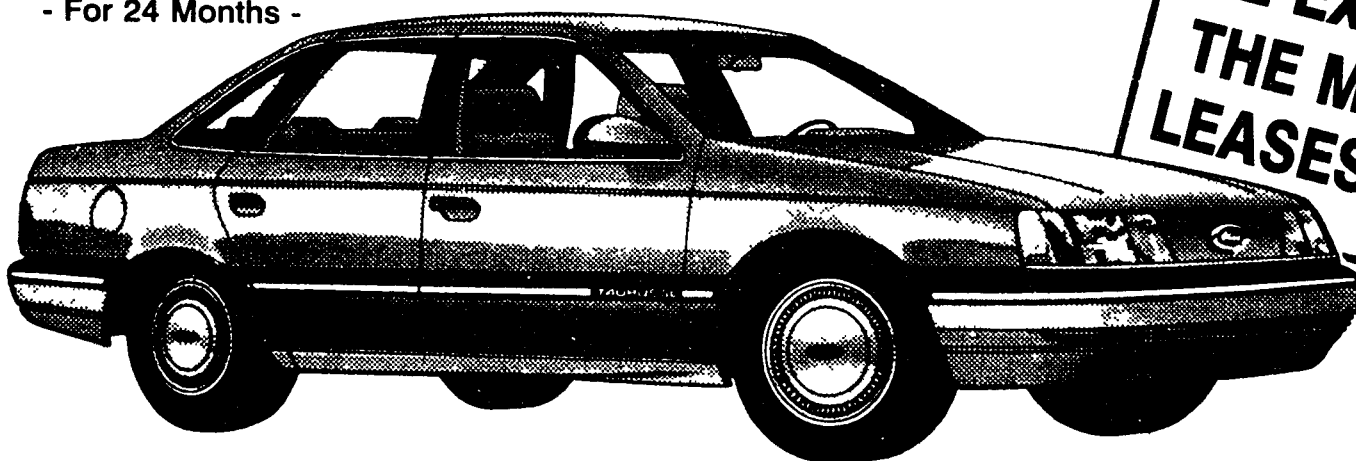
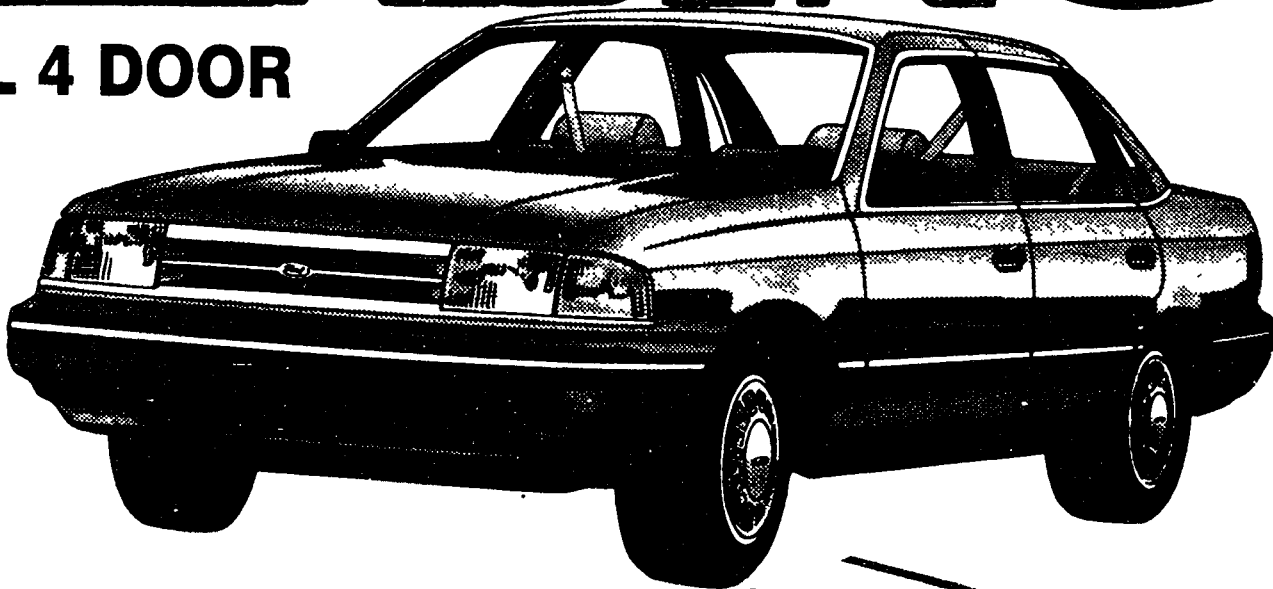
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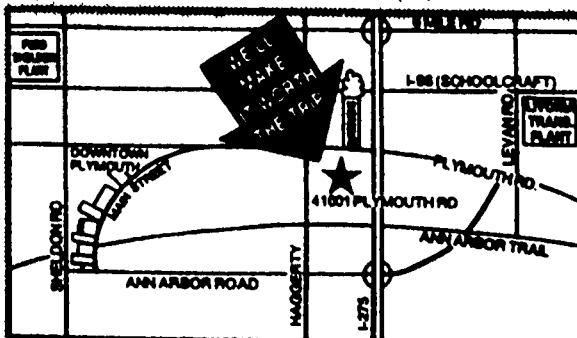
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
