Moi, Il plagues drain

Randolph Creek north of Eight Mile Road was the site of apparent illegal dumping last week, when a petroleum product was poured into a storm drain on Lexington Boulevard.

According to a Department of Natural Resources (DNR) official, the dumping was most likely done by an asphalt company which was repairing pavement in the area.

"We're pretty confident that the source of the contamination emanated from an asphalt company working in the area," Tim Jaski, an environmental quality analyst said Friday.

"We were able to trace it back to a catch-basin where somebody had obviously dumped something down into the basin," he said. "The iron cover was all covered with this stuff."

Jaski estimated that only one or two gallons of contaminant were poured into the drain. "It was just enough to be a real nuisance to the neighbors, as well as a violation of the law," he said.

But he added that the company believed responsible for Tuesday's contamination will probably not face charges for the act. The DNR has little enforcement power in such cases and cannot issue its own penalties, he said, and must work through other legal channels. "For one or two gallons, we'll work more on education," he said. "If it were a bigger spill, this would be a different situation."

Jaski said the DNR would locate the asphalt company believed responsible, to inform them of the contamination. "We'll follow it up so we can close it out, and have a talk with them," he said.

The contamination was first seen Tuesday afternoon, June 12, by local resident Erwin Wietrick. He said he first noticed oil on the surface of the creek while out walking his dog. After calling the condominium complex's management company late Tuesday, Wietrick reported the incident to the DPW Wednesday morning. "When it started yesterday, it was just a little trickle," he said at the scene Wednesday.

"That's the first time I've ever seen something like that," he added.

Paul Vertrees, supervisory fore-

man for the Northville Department of Public Works, and DPW worker Gary Cash inspected the area Wednesday morning, along with Jaski.

By late Wednesday morning, the small stream of water flowing out of a cement storm drain between Yorktown and Revere Court just north of Eight Mile was cloudy with a contaminant that smelled strongly of petroleum. Pea-sized droplets of dark brown oil floated on the surface of the stream, and the water in both the

drain and creek was tinged with red.

The drain empties into Randolph Creek, which runs under Eight Mile and eventually empties into the Middle Rouge River just south of Mill Pond.

City workers were able to clean up some of the oil with absorbent pads designed to soak up oil without absorbing water, Jaski said.

Asphalt companies typically spread an emulsion down on old pavement before paving over it, Jaski

said. He said the contamination could have come from such emulsion, or from the solutions used to clean tools after asphalt work is done.

Randolph Creek was the site of contamination earlier this year, when chlorinated pool water from the Northville Swim Club was drained into another storm drain leading into the creek in late April. Because the act was believed to be unintentional, the DNR did not press charges.

Township considers U-M survey

Are obsolete roadways and traffic flow the biggest problems facing the township?

Should a public library and recreation fields take precedence over other public services?

Are stricter ordinances needed to check area development?

Are taxes simply too high for local residents?

The Northville Township Board of Trustees would like answers to these and other questions.

Citing a need to determine a projects priority list, the Board last week agreed to survey township residents — if the price is right.

Supervisor Georgina Goss said the University of Michigan's Institute of Social Research has been contacted about devising a survey of township priorities.

"Our constituency has changed drastically over the past two years," she said. "We need to know what issues are critical for the residents and if they're happy with the way we're going."

"I think we need a scientific survey; we need the credibility of (an outside source)."

Goss said she hoped the survey would be distributed to residents "by the end of July."

Cost of the survey has not been discussed yet, Goss said.

"Cost is always a factor and we need an estimate," she said. "They (U-M) are sending me information and the board will not take action until we see a price."

Goss would not speculate on how much the board might be willing to spend on a township survey, but she made it clear the Board was interested in hearing from residents.

She said the board is looking for direction on a public library in wake of the May 1 defeat of the Haller Library proposal.

She also identified issues such as police and fire services, environmental programs, development strategies and shared services as "key township issues."

"We need to know what services the residents feel are most critical, less critical, important and less important," she said. "This is about what direction the township will take in the future."

Potential survey questions about the library, shared services and recreation fields do not mean the township is considering ending its cooperative agreements with the city, Goss said.

"Because we're a township, we can't levy taxes like the city does," she said. "We have to hold a vote on new taxes and we need to know what the residents feel is most critical."

Survey responses could help determine what the Board has to say to Frieda Haller in September.

Haller, a former township resident, donated 72 acres on Sheldon and Six Mile roads to the township with the condition that a 44,800 square foot library be built.

Township voters rejected the library plan by a 2-1 margin May 1 and Haller later called her agreement with the township "null and void."

She left the door open for a new plan to be discussed in September, after the deadline for her original letter-of-intent expires.

Goss said the decision to contact U-M was based upon the credibility of the institution.

If the plan is accepted, Goss said the Board would put together a list of topics to be included in the survey, but that the design, development and implementation of the questionnaire would be up to U-M.

Board members seemed to like the idea of a survey.

"I'd like to know what the cost is, but we need to build a new foundation," said Trustee James Nowka. "Why get involved with (projects) that the public won't support?"

Novi teachers agree to contract

The Novi Board of Education and the Novi Education Association tentatively have agreed to modify their existing contract and extend it through the 1992-93 school year.

The school board Thursday voted 6-0 to modify the contract for the 1990-91 school year and extend it for the 1991-92 and 1992-93 school years, pending receipt of the official results of Thursday's vote by teachers, as well as a copy of the final contract language. Board Secretary Michael Meyer was absent for the board vote.

Martha Franchi, president of the Novi Education Association, said Friday she expected the association's voting results to be formally ratified by Friday or today.

Both sides said they were pleased with the modified contract. District officials and the union representing the Novi Community Schools' approximately 240 teachers discussed the contract for four weeks.

Superintendent Robert Piwko said this was the first time the teachers' contract had been settled so far in advance.

"That's what is exciting," Piwko said. Also, it guarantees the school year through 1992-93, he said.

Franchi said the association previously had participated in "expedited

bargaining" with the district. However, she added, "This has been a whole new process."

"When you have the cooperation of the professionals, the Board of Education and the administration," Franchi said, "something like that is possible."

"We're grateful that we have that kind of good communication."

Board of Education President Raymond Byers praised Franchi, Jean Rose of the Michigan Education Association and John Swallow, district director of special services, for their quick resolution of the contract issues.

"Everyone wins in a situation like this," Franchi said. The education process can continue and teachers can go home with a contract, he added.

Franchi agreed, "We can go onto the break with a certain sense of security — a good feeling."

At issue were the district calendar, the salary schedule and insurance coverage.

"The calendar issue was very important to our members," Franchi said. Novi schools will return to a calendar similar to what was in effect prior to the contract that began in 1988, she said.

The revised calendar again will be similar to those in surrounding districts, Franchi said, including a "full" winter break, for example.

Swallow said Friday the extended break at Christmas time will necessitate a pre-Labor Day start. The school board is considering methods by which to inform district residents about the calendar changes, through a newsletter or a special mailing, for example.

The two bargaining sides also agreed on adjustments to the teachers' salary schedule for each of the three contract years.

For the 1990-91 school year, the planned salary increase will be two-tenths of a percent greater than originally planned, Piwko said. The total pay raise will now be 7.2 percent, in-

stead of the 7 percent increase initially negotiated, Swallow explained.

The proposed budget for next year — to be approved later this month — allows for that increase, which represents approximately \$23,000, Piwko said.

For the 1991-92 and 1992-93 school years, the extension proposal calls for the teacher salaries to be increased by 6.8 percent and 6.5 percent, respectively, Piwko said.

The tentative agreement also includes general modification to the teachers' insurance coverage, Piwko said.

The coverage that a teacher's spouse has now will be considered and compared before coverage automatically is provided to the teacher, he explained. That includes a spouse employed in or out of the district, he added.

"It will be a considerable cost savings to the district," Piwko said.

Franchi said, "We feel it was a good way to deal with it . . . in a district that's attempting to be very generous."

Board members specifically stated their support for that aspect of the agreement.

"That is absolute proof that there is more concern in the district for educating than playing contract games," said Board Vice President Robert Schram. "I'm proud of the staff and the administration."

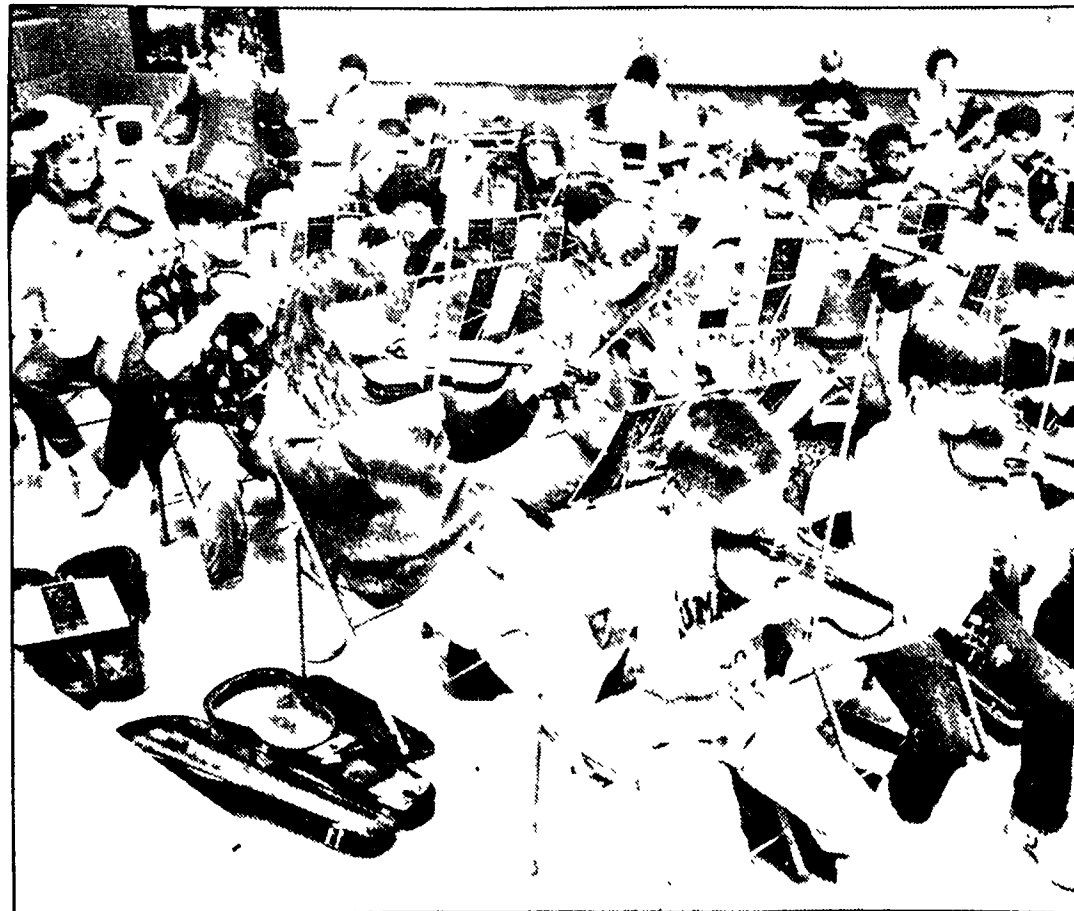

MONDAY UPDATE

Novi hall hails racing legends

Over 500 people were in attendance at the Renaissance Ballroom at Detroit's Westin Hotel on June 13 — from almost every state in the union and from as far away as Scotland — to pay tribute to nine new inductees at the Second Annual Induction Ceremony and Banquet for the Novi-based Motorsports Hall of Fame of America.

World-famous racers like Mario Andretti and Shirley Muldowney were on hand for their induction, and others like Johnny Rutherford, Al Unser Jr., and astronaut Jack Lousma were there to honor them. It was a first-class event and a proud day for the City of Novi.

"Novi — what a great racing name," said racing broadcaster and writer Chris Economaki.

"The City of Novi is behind this project 100 percent and it will be a centerpiece for the city and southeast Michigan," said Michael Hedge, chairperson of the Hall of Fame.

The 1990 inductees included Andretti, Muldowney, Jim Clark, Glenn Curtiss, Mark Donohue, Bill France Sr., Kenny Roberts, Mickey Thompson and Gar Wood.

Three-time Indianapolis 500 champion Johnny Rutherford served as the honorary chairperson of the ceremony, with veteran CBS racing announcer Ken Squire as the master of ceremonies. Highlighting the awards program was a multi-screen video presentation featuring historical footage of all 1990 inductees.

The ceremony was also the reunion of two of the most legendary cars in all of motorsports history: the last Novi Special to run at the Indy 500 and first rear-engine winner at Indianapolis. In 1965, Bobby Unser drove the STP Ferguson four-wheel drive Novi Special, marking the end of an era. That same year, 1990 inductee Jim Clark won the race in a green Lotus-Ford that went on to revolutionize auto racing with its rear engine. The Henry Ford Museum in

Dearborn made a rare loan of the car for the festivities.

"I had a flashback to Indy back in 1965 when I walked into the room and saw the old Novi Special," Rutherford said.

Perhaps the most famous of the inductees was Andretti, who is a four-time Indy Car National Champion, the 1969 Indianapolis 500 winner and the 1978 Formula One world champion. In town for yesterday's Valvoline Detroit Grand Prix, Andretti had nothing but kind words for the Motorsports Hall of Fame and Novi.

"This is something I'm really over-

welmed about," he said. "An honor like this usually comes after you've retired, so it's a great honor. Tonight represents one of the peaks in my racing career and I certainly want to thank the Hall of Fame Committee."

"I'm still young enough to come back again and again to visit this award in Novi."

Accepting the award for the late Mickey Thompson was his son, Danny Thompson, and his sister, Colleen Thompson-Campbell. Thompson was a promoter and participant in drag racing, Indy cars and off-road racing and was the first American to travel over 400 miles per

hour on land.

"We want to thank the people of Novi for the vision of getting this worthy project off the ground," Thompson-Campbell said. "I know Mickey would want me to thank the wonderful people of Novi like (Executive Director) Ron Watson and (Vice Chairperson) Larry Clancio."

A roster of distinguished presenters were on hand to present the MHFA "Horsepower" award to the inductees or their representatives. Driver of Miss Budweiser, Tom D'Eath, the winner of the 1990 Gold Cup Hydroplane race in Detroit earlier this month, presented the award

And now, racing legends from land, water and air have theirs — an official Hall of Fame to pay tribute to the contributors of racing legends and historic moments of racing in America. The \$6 million, 70,000 square-foot Motorsports Hall of Fame Museum of America (MHFA) will be built in Novi. The museum's temporary home is located in the Novi Civic Center.

The City of Novi is an appropriate site for the Hall of Fame since one of the most popular and famous American race cars of all time was the Novi Special. Featured at the Indianapolis 500 from 1946-65, the Novi Special was owned by Novi industrialist Lew Welch who named it after his home town. The last of the fabulous Novis, owned by Andy Granatelli, was the 1965 Ferguson four-wheel drive piloted by Bobby Unser. This historic vehicle is now exhibited at the Civic Center.

The Motorsports Hall of Fame project, now in its fifth year, recently shifted into high gear with the development of a new corporate identity.

"A few years ago, in the major restructuring of our organization, the name of our project was

changed from the 'Novi Motorsports Museum' to the Motorsports Hall of Fame of America," says Larry Clancio, MHFA vice chairman. "As a result, we needed to reflect an identity that would let people know that the Motorsports Hall of Fame is not just a community function, but a national undertaking."

The new logo could be described as having a Post-Modern look because it assimilates an eclectic collection of design styles. A classic Novi race car is juxtaposed against a backdrop of various Art deco shapes and vibrant colors. Above the car, the word 'Motorsports' boldly grabs the viewers' attention, while the words 'Hall of Fame' and 'Museum' appear in smaller print.

The Comark Group created the logo and also produced the program booklet for the induction ceremony and the nine new additions to the permanent exhibits that are on display at the Novi Civic Center. Each exhibit consists of a photograph of the motorsports legend, biographical copy, an action shot and a bronze plaque commemorating the champion's accomplishments and induction into the Hall of Fame.

posthumously to legendary powerboat racer Gar Wood.

Michael and David Donohue were also on hand to accept the award from Al Unser Jr. on behalf of their father, sports car legend Mark Donohue, who was tragically killed while racing in 1975. Lousma presented the award to the family of aviation pioneer Glenn Curtiss, America's first air race winner and a land-speed record-holder for motorcycles.

In addition, the three sisters of two-time Formula One champion Jim Clark — Isobel Henderson, Betty Peddie and Mattie Calder — traveled from Scotland to accept his award. Clark won 24 Formula One races and one Indy 500 before his untimely racing death in 1968.

The health of Bill France Sr., the founder of NASCAR, didn't allow him to attend the ceremony, but his

award was accepted by his son, Jim France. Motorcycle king Kenny Roberts was busy competing in Europe at the time of the awards, but had a message for the audience: "I have received quite a few of these types of awards, but it means something special to be honored in your own country."

Muldowney, the first woman auto racing superstar and one of 10 honorary directors to the Motorsports Hall of Fame of America, received a standing ovation from the crowd and a special introduction from Rutherford.

"I'd like to say thank you to the Hall of Fame for this very special honor," she said.

The dedication of the exhibits honoring the 1990 class of inductees was held the following day at the Novi Civic Center — the temporary home of the Hall of Fame.

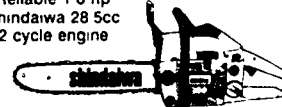

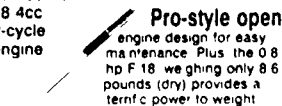

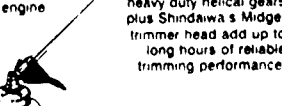

Sneeze attack

Center seeks volunteers for allergy relief study

Summertime, and the living is sneezy—at least for 25 percent of the population.

And if you're one of them—and feeling pretty miserable these days—you may want to sniffle your way over to the Allergy and Asthma Center of Southeast Michigan. The Novi clinic is offering people with spring and summer respiratory allergies a chance to contribute to medical science, get free treatment and earn some money by enrolling in a series of pharmaceutical tests.

Village Oaks Elementary student Mara De Luca, 9, has already spent in anticipation the \$200 she will take home as a participant in a test for children ages 6 to 11—by buying a new bike. Mara, who is a dedicated consumer of Kleenex, inherited hay fever from her father. Her seasonal allergies make the normally even-tempered child tired, run-down and grumpy, says mother Pamela De Luca. The over-the-counter medication she takes saps Mara's energy further.

Volunteering for the month-long test was the first experience Mara has had with allergy treatment.

"We're doing our part for research. The doctor had a nice talk with her about her room and too much dust and things lying around. That was my motive," Pamela De Luca said.

To qualify for the program, Mara had to react adversely to grass pollen. While the cottonwood tree takes a bad rap for inducing spring allergies as its fluffy white seeds rain down this time of year, it's actually the microscopic grass pollen that's the culprit, says Dr. Michael Rowe of the Allergy and Asthma Center.

Mara is participating in a "double blind" test where 75 percent of the

children will get medication in varying dosages and 25 percent will take a placebo. But neither doctor nor patient will know which is which.

"Some people just get better with the placebos. Some people think they're marvelous with the placebos," Rowe said. "Sometimes people will get better because they're under a doctor's care regularly; there's some magic for some people."

The clinic will test two medications this summer. The first is an antihistamine which causes drowsiness. The second is a British prescription nasal spray for hay fever. Both medications, variations of products already available here, are currently on the market in Europe. The companies' names cannot be released due to the confidentiality of the study.

Rowe, who is affiliated with Royal Oak's William Beaumont Hospital and a member of the drug committee of the American Academy of Allergy and Immunology, says he conducts the test because "it keeps me up to date with the field."

The research studies are commissioned by pharmaceutical companies to demonstrate the safety and effectiveness of new drugs pending the drawn-out approval by the federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Ten to 15 sites throughout the U.S. may be conducting the same study on thousands of patients.

"Certain medications have priority, such as those for AIDS and cancer," Rowe said. "Unfortunately, allergy and asthma medications don't have a lot of priority. With allergies people just basically suffer, they don't die."

Along with the children's research study, the clinic will also conduct a test for people aged 12 to 65 with spring and summer grass pollen allergies. There will be another in August and September for the same age

group, but targeted for the long-suffering victims of ragweed. The tests have been evaluated and approved by Beaumont Hospital's human rights committee, a group of medical professionals and lay people, Rowe said.

"It's very safe and effective medication and I think a lot of people find this intriguing, too," he explained. "They'll learn a lot about allergies. In the future, they don't have to suffer like they did in the past. There can be a great benefit to making life more comfortable."

Allergies are hereditary. If neither of your parents have them, you've won only a 25 percent chance of developing allergies. But with one allergic parent that soars up to a 55 percent chance and with two allergic parents the odds zoom to 85 percent.

"A child may not develop the same allergies in the same manner as the parent at the same time of life," Rowe said.

Their immune system mistakenly sees some of these things as a foreign invader to their bodies and decides to fight it. It's an overaggressive immune

system. . . . It really affects the quality of your life."

Only insect bites, drug and food allergies are actually life-threatening. The rest just make you feel rotten. No one knows why people respond this way to otherwise harmless substances, Rowe said, although blondes and redheads are at the highest risk. While for most people the hyperactive immune system serves no practical purpose, in Africa it helps fight off parasitic diseases.

While the first step to getting your allergies under control is avoidance,

this is a difficult task, he said, "unless you're willing to stay in a closed bubble." Air conditioning helps filter out 90 percent of the nasty inhalants, Rowe said.

The next step is medication for relief. About 20 percent of allergy sufferers will opt for shots, which ultimately cure the condition by altering the way the body reacts to an allergen.

Historic Botsford Inn up for sale

After nearly 40 years, innkeeper John Anhut has decided to pass the Botsford Inn into another set of hands.

Though it is not yet sold, Anhut is making a serious effort to do so.

"The area has been good for me but it (the inn) needs new direction," Anhut said recently. "I just feel it needs someone with a lot more energy than I can give."

"This place is a very, very personal place," he added. "I put my life into it."

The 68-room inn, which has three apartments, 10 banquet and meeting rooms and a 100-seat restaurant, was listed for sale several months ago at a price of \$3.5 million.

The 154-year-old inn is on the north side of Grand River, north of Eight Mile—at the gateway to Farmington Hills and at the borders of Livonia and Redford Township.

Anhut has seen the inn's business change in four decades from parties with strolling violinists to weddings with disc jockeys and a hip beat. Competition for business meetings has also become stiff with the area's growth and addition of hotel chains, he said.

"We've had to completely change the concept here," said the innkeeper, whose family bought the Grand River business from Henry Ford in 1951.

"It was a nice quaint place to eat," with specific meal hours, he said. "Today, you bend and twist the hours to suit the customer—and we're glad to have them."

According to Farmington Hills assessment records, the building and property on which it sits has a state equalized value of \$762,900, 50 percent of the fair market property

Botsford Inn history

Known by various names over the years, including the Weston House, the Plank Road House and for the past 130 years, the Botsford Inn, this Farmington Hills landmark has had a number of owners.

Here's a short history:

- 1836—The Inn was built and operated by brothers Orrin and Allen Weston. The Weston family also established the first stagecoach line between Detroit and Howell.

- 1841—Milford resident Stephen Jennings acquired the Inn.

- 1849—John Clagherty bought the Inn, prompting the postal service to dub the community clustering around the inn "Clarenceville."

- 1860 Bought by the Botsford family, the inn was first run by Milton,

then, after he died, by Frank in 1883. Their family name is retained on the landmark to this day.

- 1924—The inn was bought by auto mogul Henry Ford, who moved it back 200 feet from Grand River, and began restoring it. Ford's era of Botsford ownership included the Great Depression, when the inn was closed for periods of up to 21 months, according to local historians.

- 1951—The Anhut family bought the business. It was operated by John Anhut Sr., and his son and namesake, who is the current innkeeper.

- 1989-90—John Anhut seeks a buyer for the historic inn—someone who has the same love of history and personal business savvy to keep the inn special.

torical tradition.

The inn is listed in the National Register of Historic Places and the Michigan Registry of Historic Homes as well. It has been here as long as Michigan has been a state.

Built in 1836 by brothers Orrin and Allen Weston, the original Botsford Inn—then known as the Weston House—came into being shortly after President Andrew Jackson appointed a commission to plot a statewide route from Detroit to the mouth of the Grand River on Lake Michigan.

Local historians note that things began to boom and grow as the Wes-

tons started their stagecoach route from Detroit to Howell, and continued after they sold their business to Stephen Jennings in 1841.

When John Clagherty bought the business in 1849, other businesses grew up around it, prompting post office officials to dub the area "Clarenceville." Although it did not survive as a municipality, a school district in the area surrounding the Botsford Inn remains with the same name.

The man for whom the inn was eventually named, Milton Botsford, came on the scene in 1860 as an experienced innkeeper. He got a post office reinstated in Clarenceville and even served as the postmaster. The Botsford family held ownership of the inn for 64 years.

After years of courting his wife at dances and parties at the Botsford, Henry Ford bought it in 1924. He did extensive restorations to the interior and exterior, added modern conveniences and furnished the inn with many antiques. Many mementos of those days can be seen at the Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village in Dearborn.

The Anhut family, headed by John Nicholson Anhut, bought the Botsford in 1951, three years after Henry Ford's death. Anhut acquired the inn from the Ford estate. Eventually, Anhut's son and current proprietor, John W. Anhut, took over the business.

The current innkeeper said he is considering writing a book about the nearly 40 years he has been involved with the historic inn and the people who have visited. "I have often thought about it," he said. "All the characters I've known . . ."

professionals.

Critic John Kelly, D-Detroit, said applying the gross negligence standard means "the physician will no longer be required to do what is reasonable under the circumstances."

Replying to the argument that physicians are leaving the state, Kelly said their departure is related to population loss, and that liability insurance costs \$7,000 to \$20,000 a year, not the reported \$35,000 to \$50,000.

Kelly blamed insurance company lawyers who settle out of court for raising insurance premiums, advising physicians: "Don't settle out of court. Take it to the jury."

Detroit Smith said the bill discriminates against one million poor Michiganders who have no health insurance and take their ailments to emergency rooms.

Supporter Joe Mack, D-Ironwood, said small towns like his ski resort area are particularly badly hurt when Chicago lawyers sue the few doctors they have. Without Schwarz's bill, Mack said, "We'll have towns full of lawyers with no doctors."

Senate approves Geake's belt bill

LANSING—The state Senate gave insurers two victories and the Michigan Trial Lawyers Association two defeats on liability bills last week.

Injured passengers would find their lawsuit damages reduced under a bill sponsored by Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville.

"There should be no windfall for a negligent individual who didn't wear a seatbelt," said Geake.

But opponents bitterly attacked the measure, which was passed 21-17 and sent to the House, where it faces an even stiffer battle.

"This bill will buy the insurance companies a new yacht," said Sen. Virgil Smith, D-Detroit.

Current law says failure to wear a seatbelt "may be considered evidence of negligence and may reduce the recovery for damages . . ." but limits the reduction to 5 percent. Geake's Senate Bill 762 strikes out the sentence limiting the reduction.

Supporters included Fred Dilling-

ham, R-Fowlerville, and Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills.

Opposed were Richard Fessler, R-Commerce, and Lana Pollack, D-Ann Arbor.

It was praised by the Michigan State Medical Society, the Michigan Hospital Association and the American College of Emergency Physicians. "The intent of the bill is to provide some protection to specialists who are called into the ER during emergency situations when no previous doctor-patient relationship exists," said Dr. Susan H. Adelman, president of the medical society.

Sen. Dick Posthumus, R-Alto, chair of the Senate Commerce Committee, said Geake's bill didn't remove no-fault insurance benefits, as critics charged.

"All health care would be taken care of," Posthumus said. "In 95 percent or more of cases, there's no lawsuit. This (bill) only pertains to lawsuits."

"A person who is suing who didn't wear a seatbelt wouldn't be able to collect a lot of non-economic damages," said Posthumus, the GOP

point man on insurance issues.

Smith of Detroit said the bill would allow attorneys for insurers "to line their pockets at the expense of children who suffered disfigurement."

In related business, the Senate gave 21-15 approval to a bill protecting hospital emergency room professionals from liability suits.

"This bill is to keep physicians in emergency rooms in this state," said sponsor John J.H. Schwarz, R-Battle Creek, the Senate's only physician.

Senate Bill 910 allows recovery only for gross negligence, a high standard of proof. Besides physicians, it protects nurses, anesthesiologists, therapists and technologists.

The vote was 21-15. Supporters were Dillingham and Geake. Opponents were Faxon, Fessler and Pollack.

Gubernatorial candidate John Engler, R-Mount Pleasant, came to Schwarz's aid. He said the bill "invites physicians back to the emergency room," agreeing that Michigan's liability laws had scared off

Researcher says the future is now

It's been talked about for years. Two-way, real-time picture phones, on-line information via the television, movies on demand, home shopping — the stuff of science fiction until only recently, when technology caught up with the fantasy.

Many of the potential uses anticipated for the computer can be done on a television screen with a simple device not unlike today's remote control, according to David Decker, research manager at GTE Laboratories.

Instead of a keyboard, the user makes selections from multiple-choice menus, he said.

GTE has taken the concept out of the laboratory and into the field. "These things are already in operation in the test project in Cerritos, California, and if everything continues to work as expected, much of the country could be wired by the year 2000."

"What we're seeing now is the forerunner of what will be available in the 21st century," he said. "All this technology is available in the labs and in experiments — this is not a fantasy; it works."

Now that the technology is available, the two biggest obstacles to having such a system in homes by the end of the decade are public acceptance and federal regulations.

"What is the market acceptance?" he asked. A great deal of the acceptance will depend on costs and what services are offered.

GTE envisions a system offering home shopping, financial services, entertainment, travel, restaurants guide, public services, and even on-line data bases — all at the touch of a button.

Cost, Decker said, should be comparable to current cable television rates with additional services costing more.

But offering such services at a relatively low cost is dependent on who offers the services. Under current federal regulations, which the telephone companies are attempting to

change, companies like GTE and Michigan Bell are restricted to offering only telephone services.

If those laws are not changed, GTE and other phone companies would have to lease out capacity on the systems and allow private firms to offer the services.

"You would probably see a higher cost if that were to happen," he said. GTE's pilot project in Cerritos, which is being done in cooperation with local cable companies, was given a special waiver by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC).

Although it sounds simple, the technology is complex, he said.

Some technology necessary for two-way visual communication has existed for years, he said. Picture tubes provide the main communication media, and computers make possible some of the difficult tasks that must be performed automatically.

Conventional copper wires cannot transmit video signals quickly enough for the two-way communication necessary in an interactive system, Decker said.

Coaxial cable, which is primarily used to transmit video signals via cable systems, has shown promise for more advanced roles and the switching necessary for two-way communication is possible, but wiring the entire country to one cable system would be a daunting task, he added.

"And why would we, when we already have the entire country hooked up to telephone lines?" he added.

Fiber optics, the ultra-thin, ultra-fast medium used for most long distance telephone calls, provide greater possibilities, he said. "Fiber optics provide the superhighway for data transmission."

When coupled with a new broadband switch developed by GTE late last year, fiber-optic cables will permit the transmission of broadcast quality video signals, opening the door to two-way visual communication.

Consultant likens cash to blood flow

You see the bills and know what your obligations are. There's some money in the account and, of course, there are the accounts receivable.

Just then, your accountant delivers the company's monthly financial statement. Although it indicates that your business has been profitable, you find yourself still wondering where your company stands.

If this sounds all too familiar, you may want to consider starting a workable weekly cash flow management system for your business. For those interested in seeking a better way to handle their money and plan for its use, such a system has proven very successful for companies of all sizes.

Weekly cash flow management systems often are confused with accounting and, as a result, usually are ignored as a management tool, said

Ron LeTourneau, principle with the Southfield-based management consulting firm of LeTourneau, Lobb & Associates.

"Accounting basically serves to identify and ultimately summarize the financial aspects of past business transactions for the firm," LeTourneau said. "The main audiences for the financial statements include bankers and tax authorities."

Business owners often don't understand them or find them to be irrelevant. When compared to a weekly cash flow management system, accounting merely tells firm management "what happened" as opposed to what will happen in the future.

"Anybody can make money," LeTourneau said. "The trick is being able to keep it."

As such, a weekly cash flow man-

agement system gives the decision-makers the ability to predict the company's cash needs before they occur — and could potentially harm its financial position.

Such systems are not meant to replace a firm's current accounting procedures, he said.

"The right system is simply a process that assembles the firm's financial information in such a way that it becomes understandable to company management and, as a result, truly useful for short-term business planning purposes," LeTourneau said.

As a management consultant working with small- to medium-sized companies, LeTourneau has found that cash flow-related problems prevent a majority of firms from dealing with issues requiring attention and action before they occur.

"No matter what a company's specific problems or opportunities might be, nothing can happen without first being able to accurately forecast the level of funds that are available to work with," he said.

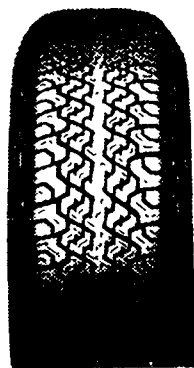

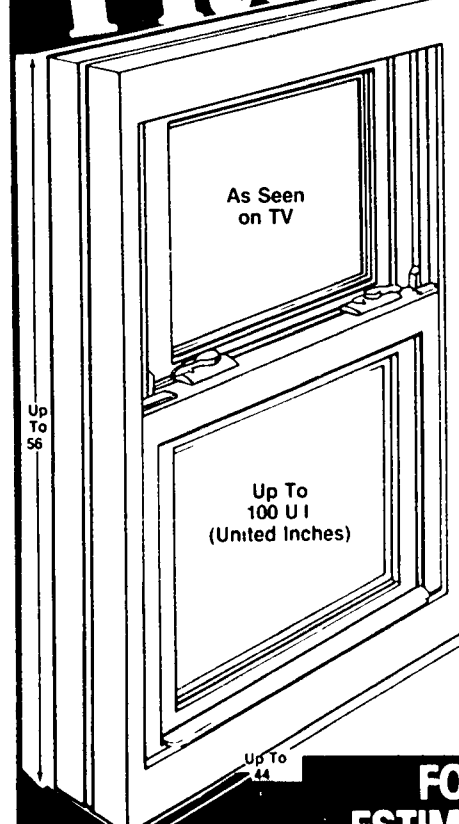

Computers help pinpoint building sites

The Information Age — it was only a matter of time before some sharp entrepreneurs would start specialized information services geared to the needs of land and building developers.

Land Data Inc., founded in December 1988 by Steven and Kathy Golden, and TOXICHECK Environmental Services Inc., founded in 1987 by Mark Bennett, cater to the needs to know about land.

Land Data, in West Bloomfield, offers an on-line computer database on vacant and developed property and a hardbound directory that includes plat maps of improved and vacant lands, according to Kathy Golden, vice president.

A commercial multi-list of properties for sale, a mortgage rate index and a mailing label service are also available.

"Anyone with a computer, phone and modem can access information by zone and street (or other parameters) and get legal descriptions, own-

ership, assessed value, taxes, school districts and other information," Golden said.

The database is also valuable for keeping a general tab on a particular piece of property or the real estate market in general, she said.

Databases include plat, zoning, vacant land, water line and sewer line maps, as well as a vacant land directory sorted by zoning and location with sidwell numbers, owner information, school districts, assessed value and a property address if assigned, she said.

Previously, those looking for similar information would spend hours in county clerk offices, Golden said.

"The time savings is incredible — we allow small companies to compete with the large and middle-sized companies.

"Now you can punch in a name, or a street, or a parcel and out pops all the property they own in the county."

A user can also learn who owns nearby property, how it's zoned, and

how it's used.

And it is easy, she said.

"We designed it so it would be easy — our market is basically one with little or no computer experiences."

Land Data's database, which already covers Oakland and Wayne counties, will expand into Livingston, Macomb, Washtenaw, Kent and Ottawa counties before the end of the year, Golden said.

The idea was conceived when Golden's husband, a partner in the development firm of Universal Development Inc. in Bloomfield Hills, became frustrated trying to locate vacant land, she said.

"We found out there wasn't an easy way to do it so we decided to do it ourselves."

Now, almost a year after publishing its first directory, Land Data boasts 3,000 subscribers including developers, builders, real estate agents, survey companies, appraisers, title companies and banks.

Annual hookup fees start at \$800

with unlimited use plans running from \$85 to \$110 depending on options.

Discounts are offered for customers who hook up more than one terminal. Other plans, per-call services and specialized services are available at less expensive rates.

TOXICHECK Environmental Information Services Inc., a Birmingham company that provides information on potential hazardous contamination of properties, has doubled its sales yearly since opening.

According to president Mark Bennett, concern about the environment and cleanup costs for contaminated sites fuels his business.

Developers dealing in land need to know if property they are considering is polluted.

"It goes back to the old adage information is knowledge and knowledge is power," he said.

TOXICHECK's database incorporates information on landfills, federal super-fund sites, and properties de-

signed as contaminated by state and county agencies.

The database covers more than 30 counties throughout Michigan, Illinois and Indiana, he said.

Bennett's company is not the solution for developers and builders who are considering property purchases, but only the first step, he said.

"It's one element in the process of a purchase."

After consulting his database, most developers undertake on-site testing and evaluation.

Some land buyers might use his service to make an initial decision on whether to buy land, but most do more extensive work through environmental engineers and consultants.

New laws have put the responsibility for environmental contamination on the owner, he said. A person who buys property also buys the responsibility for the cleanup.

A buyer's only defense is to practice "environmental due diligence,"

he said.

No one can afford to buy a parcel of property without checking into possible hazardous contamination, he said.

"We generate a custom map with a radius of two miles — any site that has been discovered to be contaminated is shown on the map."

Customers of the service include real estate agents, developers, builders, attorneys and banks.

In addition to the custom maps, TOXICHECK also provides written executive summaries explaining the maps for clients.

Bennett got the idea for his company while working for a law firm with an emphasis on environmental policy for its developer and building clients.

He found that individual research on each property was time consuming and costly, and so he started his own company.

Customized, detailed maps range in cost from \$95 to \$295 depending on property zoning.

Face intimidation tactics head-on

I live in a small condominium community with a management company. We have one neighbor who is a builder and developer who is always ignoring condominium regulations. Will you discuss what can be done to control this person? Each time he is confronted, he laughs and says that we should sue him because it will take years and thousands of dollars to do anything about it and we could lose in court. Do small condominiums like ours have any way of controlling people like this without a legal battle?

I would write a letter to the board of directors of your association demanding that it take action against the co-owner. If it fails to do so, seek legal redress both against the board and the management company who apparently are not living up to their legal responsibility to pursue a co-owner such as this, particularly where you can obtain a legal opinion from counsel to the effect that you have a reasonably good likelihood of success. The co-owner is obviously trying to intimidate a small condominium project, but should not be allowed to get away with it.

Our managing agent is new to the

association. One of the members of the board believed that it was not necessary to have the management agreement reviewed and was in a hurry to retain this person as he believed that the managing agent would put everyone in shape, including the association's attorney, CPA and the insurance consultant. The board got around to advising its attorney of the retention of the management company. The attorney recommended that the management agreement be reviewed. The board, realizing that it made a mistake, asked the association's attorney to review the management agreement, and it was determined that there were a number of items in the agreement that needed revision. What can be done now with the management agreement, which we have to admit belatedly is inappropriate?

I have seen this situation occur often in condominiums where the managing agent, perhaps in a good-faith effort to consummate the deal, does not give the board an opportunity nor does he or she suggest that the board have the management agreement reviewed by counsel. Unfortunately, the management agreements

generally are drafted to the benefit of the management company, and there are normally provisions in the agreement concerning indemnification, termination of the managing agent and a change in ownership in the managing agent, which are extremely important to condominium associations and that may have to be negotiated.

In your situation, I would contact the managing agent and indicate that you are unhappy with the fact that it did not suggest to you that your attorney review the management agreement and that it would appear to be the professional thing to do. Perhaps you will then be in a position to point out the items to the management company and if it is operating in good faith it will seriously consider revising its agreement to meet your reasonable requests. Learn from this lesson for the future.

We are a very affluent condominium project with most of the units in excess of \$400,000. We have just taken over control of the condominium association. The lawyer for the developer is a friend of one of the board members. I am afraid that our condominium is being run like a country

club in the sense that the directors do not think they need legal advice, and if they do, they can just defer to the developer's attorney. How can I convince them that they may be wrong? I am one of the five board members.

Somehow they must be led to recognize that they are incurring potential liability and that they have a responsibility to retain independent counsel who has no affiliation with the developer to advise the association of the various issues, particularly if the project has been recently turned over to the members of the association when there are a number of audits that must be undertaken, including a financial and a legal audit. Perhaps you can show this answer to your board in hopes it will recognize that it is perhaps operating in a potentially precarious manner.

Black walnut is still our premier timber

(AP) — Ancient Romans loved walnuts, and thought so highly of the meaty fruit that they planted the tree throughout south central Europe and England. Attention always focused on the walnut for its nut crop, while oak prevailed as the choice for furniture.

In America, though, native black walnut has always been prime stock. Wood magazine reports that while frontier families gathered walnuts to eat, city craftsmen worked the dark wood into classic pieces. Today, black walnut continues as the aristocrat of native hardwoods and the hallmark of tradition.

Black walnut's range covers most of the eastern half of the U.S. and southern Ontario. Prime walnut requires moist, deep, rich, well-drained soil, such as is found in the upper Mississippi River valley.

In idyllic conditions, walnut reaches a height of 150 feet and a 6-foot diameter. More commonly, it matures at about 100 feet with a 3-foot diameter. The tree's thick, dark-brown to brownish-gray bark has marked ridges.

Walnut's distinctive leaves measure one to two inches in length and carry a dozen or more leaflets. In

spring, flowing catkins emerge on branch twigs. In mid-summer, nuts appear.

Walnut's heartwood varies from a purplish-brown with thin, dark veins to gray-brown and even orange-brown. The narrow sapwood tends to be white.

Unfigured walnut has straight, somewhat open grain. Figured walnut — fiddleback, burl, stump and crotch — feels coarse-textured. A cubic foot of dry walnut weighs about 39 pounds, making it just a little heavier than cherry.

Walnut remains a favorite for furniture, paneling, musical instruments, turned bowls, relief carvings and sculpture. Veneer proves popular in marquetry and as furniture accents. Walnut's shock-resistance, strength and stability also make it perfect for shotgun and rifle stocks.

Black walnut rates as classic cabinet stock not only because of its eye appeal, but because woodworkers get good results with either hand or power tools. But it does sometimes require special treatment.

Walnut works best for sculptures and large figures with simple lines, or signs and relief carvings.

Capitol Hill tackles child care problem

As Congress gears up to take on child care legislation, it is interesting to note how our legislators in Washington, D.C. have reacted to their own child care concerns.

Both the House and Senate have established on-site child care centers, each of which is operated very differently.

The Senate Employees' Child Care Center has been in operation for six years. According to its director, Arlene Altman, who is a native of Detroit and a graduate of Wayne State University, theirs is a parent-governed center.

"Parents lobbied for space, and we had to have a law changed," said Altman. "The original law stated that no children were allowed on Senate grounds." A Senate roll-call vote was taken to grant \$20,000 in start-up funds, and the Senate provided rent-free space in the old Immigration building. Two years later, however, the building was refurbished for the Capitol's police department. The Senate then had to find new quarters for all of the tenants. "We couldn't find an appropriate space for a child care center," said Altman. "In the end, the Senate gave up a corner of its parking lot, and with some of the 'rehab' funds, we purchased a prefabricated building that was especially designed for a child care center."

Altman is proud of the center, which is NAEYC-accredited. "Our center has real parent involvement and a pleasant environment. We have room for 48 children, ages 18 months to five years, but we also have a long waiting list," said Altman. Any one who draws a Senate paycheck is eligible to enroll their children. Children are taken on a first-come, first-served basis.

Since the establishment of the Senate's center, the Tribble Amendment was passed. This amendment allows federal agencies to allot space to any

individual or entity to provide child-care services to its employees. Space is rent-free, and start-up funds are provided for renovations and equipment. In Michigan, the Federal Center in Battle Creek and the MacNamara Federal Building have centers that are funded in this manner.

The House of Representatives established its center, housed in part of a two-story office building, in 1987. As a result of the Tribble Amendment, they, too, were provided start-up costs and rent-free space. Certain utilities are also paid. Director Natalie Gitelman notes that the center has an unusual mix of children. "The parents of our children are members of Congress, clerks, secretaries, police — children from different ends of the economic strata. Approximately 20 to 30 percent receive scholarships."

Their center is also filled to capacity, with 68 children 10 weeks and up, and the waiting list is long. "There has been a push for expansion," says Gitelman, "but space is expensive."

Gitelman cited some of the reasons for opening the center. "There is a tremendous lack of quality child care in the area. In addition, many parents have long commutes. If there should be a problem with a child, the parent is close by." The commute to work now gives the parents extra time to be with their children.

"Although we are not a co-op," says Gitelman, "parents play an important role. They serve on the board, help with parties and trips, and visit during lunch. What a relief it is to working parents to know that their children are in a safe and happy environment."

DIVORCED MEN

Learning to release imprisoned emotions

The media often portray them as the heavies, unable to express emotion or worse yet, devoid of it.

But men have just as many emotions and just as much difficulty sorting through them as their female counterparts, especially when it comes to those associated with divorce.

"They may have different sets of issues, but that doesn't mean one set is any less important than the other," said counselor Melvyn Raider. "Men are socialized to be strong and to internalize their pain, to absorb it as if they were a sponge."

"They act almost as a buffer for other members of the family and rather than seek to dissipate their feelings through support, they're taught they need to do whatever it takes to go on with living," he said. "Often at the price of not working through the issues and the feelings of divorce."

"A lot of men see the world in a linear way," Raider said. "The problem is that feelings and emotions are circular and we need to approach them in many ways."

Men are taught that if a problem exists, they need only to find a solution and it will go away. But things aren't that simple, Raider said, adding that sometimes men don't understand that they might have to approach a problem over and over again until they've worked through it and resolved it in their minds.

Raider has a private practice in Southfield and is also a professor at Wayne State University, where he earned his MBA and doctorate. He specializes in marital therapy and divorce counseling and also holds a master's degree in social work.

"We need to be cautious about not stereotyping, but as a group there are some (male) characteristics that are often similar," he said. "Men will sometimes respond to a problem by using alcohol, or by working overtime and when they do come home, by doing as much yard work or whatever they usually do at home to stay occupied so they don't have time to sit



and think.

"Men also don't identify with hurt and instead will turn it into anger," he said. "Women on the other hand, will feel hurt and will express that hurt to their family and friends."

That hurt then follows the natural progression into anger and rage before acceptance is achieved, he said. Men, however, may take longer to reach acceptance because they refuse to deal properly with the first stage, the hurt.

"Men will just get angry," he said. "They complain that their wife is trying to take them to the cleaners or is using the children against him. They make it a financial battle."

"They rarely look to themselves to see how they contributed to the marriage breakdown," he said. "It becomes a fight reaction and some will withhold alimony or child support because it's their way of getting even, of dealing with the anger."

"It's also a way of punishing the wife — to make her have to call and ask for it," Raider said. "It might not be right, but it can be a male way of dealing with the anger."

By refusing to accept and deal with the hurt, a man slows down his emotional acceptance of the death of the marriage.

"A man will often get into another relationship very quickly," Raider

said. "The problem is, if they haven't addressed their feelings first, they could wind up in a relationship very similar to the one that just failed."

A deep loss that often is part of the territory for men in a divorce but may go unnoticed by women is the loss of their children. Even though the courts arrange visitation, most children live full-time with their mother, and so the father loses day-to-day contact with them and the parenting and decision-making that goes along with it.

"Dad's role as a parent becomes an artificial one," Raider said. "They become a Disneyland dad, taking their children to the movies, and to McDonald's and to the amusement park and to ball games."

"They spend all of their time just doing fun things, and aside from the fact that the women tend to resent it, the men don't like it. They miss seeing their kids in the morning and helping them with their homework in the evening. Their relationship with their children could be likened to the difference between an adult dating relationship and a marriage — they're only there for the good parts."

Men often experience tremendous guilt, Raider said, knowing that because of the failed relationship their children usually can't live in as nice a place or have the same educational

possibilities for the sheer economic reality of taking one household and splitting it into two.

And if the divorce occurs when children are between the ages of 13 and 17, the father often loses their respect.

"Often times a son will say they don't want to be anything like dad and girls on average will go to the aid of their mom," he said. "So in effect, dad has now lost his companion, his wife, his sexual partner, the status that comes with being a married man, his parenting role and the respect of his children."

Raider offered a recent informational seminar for men only. He found that in past programs the men either didn't show, or were reluctant to talk around women.

"Basically I'm just trying to sensitize people to the issue," he said. "We do kind of an emotional inventory to give people the opportunity to assess where they are on certain points."

Although Raider said he does see more of an openness, it will probably be a long time before society changes the way men and women are raised, allowing men to be more open with their feelings.

"Some of the younger ones are a little more open, but I'm not sure there's any dramatic shift in that direction."

For summer 'visitors' treat home like a B & B

We have two students who are coming home again for the summer. I love them very much, but they don't cooperate very well and create so much clutter that, frankly, I dread it. Do you have any suggestions?

I asked Dolores Lamping, M.A., C.S.W. of Farmington Hills Counseling Services, and here are her comments.

Extensive studies have been done to understand both human and animal relationships to space or "territory." As with animals who routinely mark their territories with scents, humans have a strong need for territory or ownership of space. People who work in shared offices, for instance, often go to great lengths to distinguish their areas with plants, pictures or other ways to show ownership of their domain.

Lamping has counseled many families whose students have become accustomed to having their own spaces at college while their parents have also gotten used to spreading out at home. Standards have been different, with parents' standards usually higher (although this sometimes reverses, with the students insisting on more neatness and cleanliness). Just as it was an adjustment when they went away, now there must be another adaptation on their return.

The thought of home has served as an anchor of security while your stu-

dents were away, and it is important to reaffirm a sense of welcome and belonging to re-establish strong bonds. If you have had negative experiences in the past, think of creative ways to deal with the situation now.

When your children were small there was no question about who was "in charge," but that has changed now that they are young adults. You can no longer relate to them as children, so perhaps you can consider your young adult to be a guest for 10 weeks. This would not be a parent/child relationship, but an adult/adult one.

If you ran a bread and breakfast (B&B) inn what would you expect of a guest? Which rooms could guests use and which would be off limits? Would pets be allowed? Smoking? Alcohol? What would the guest's responsibilities be? While staying in a hotel is an impersonal experience, a B&B is personal — you are sharing a family's space on a temporary basis. Behavior at a B&B isn't negotiable. You respect the surroundings and stay on a pre-accepted basis or you go elsewhere.

Pretend your students are guests at your own B&B. If you establish ahead of time in a cordial and friendly manner what you will and will not do and what is expected of your students (recognizing that both sides will have to give a little), being together can be a joy this summer.

Area fans getting their kicks

World Cup interest on the rise

World Cup, you say? Yes, that's right. Maradona, Gullit, van Basten, Robson — they all will be there representing their respective countries in what is the grand international showcase for the game of soccer.

Who, you say? Maradona, Gullit, Van Bas . . . Uh, we'll get to that later. Here are some facts.

The World Cup takes place every four years, and is already under way in Italy. Some 24 countries will be represented, having spent the past two years qualifying, some as small as Costa Rica and others as large as the Soviet Union.

For the first time in 40 years, the United States will be there. Though playing against the likes of Italy, Czechoslovakia and Austria, the upstart U.S. contingent has been given about as much a chance as a six-pack staying cold on a foundry plate.

Favorites in the monthlong round-robin tournament include host Italy, Holland, Brazil and West Germany. Teams to watch out for are England and Argentina.

Whew! Got all that? Good, because this World Cup thing is big potatoes.

"The rest of the world stands still when football matches are played," said Roger Faulkner, a longtime promoter of soccer in the area.

Faulkner will be in Rome and Florence, Italy, watching the American side. He's on the U.S. Soccer Federation's national budget committee, which oversees the financial affairs of the national team.

Faulkner will also provide radio reports to WJR-AM's J.P. McCarthy in the morning during his two-week stay.

Some of us, though, won't be as lucky. Fortunately, Turner Network Television plans to carry a package of games, including the final match at 2 p.m. Sunday, July 8.

Previous finals have been classics. One such match was the 1966 final, in which host England beat West Germany, 4-2, in extra time thanks to a three-goal performance by Geoff Hurst.

Faulkner remembers listening with glee to the match on Canadian radio on his way to Niagara Falls. But the World Cup that followed four years later really sticks out in his mind.

In 1970, Faulkner helped put together a closed-circuit telecast at the Masonic Temple of the final from Mexico. Advance tickets didn't sell because no one knew who would be in the final.

When Brazil and Italy made it, twice as many people showed up as there were tickets available. Added to the hysteria was the fact that the tele-

vision feed from Mexico that went out a minute to kick-off.

"I thought we were going to have a riot," Faulkner said. "Fortunately, the picture came back on."

When Brazil won 4-1, fans danced in the streets outside the Masonic. Some 20 years later, the number of Americans playing the game has exploded. They are only starting to get the fever of the world game.

Places such as the Soccer Locker in Farmington Hills and Soccer Store & More in Livonia are well-stocked with 1990 World Cup memorabilia, such as T-shirts, shorts and soccer balls.

"Interest in their favorite country picks up," said Nick O'Shea, who is

owner of Soccer Store & More and is a former professional player. "We'll get people coming in asking for T-shirts for Ireland, England or whoever they're rooting for."

O'Shea is pulling for Ireland, which is in the same group as archrival England. He also hopes the United States does well, as does Sal Malek, owner of the Soccer Locker.

Both see this year's World Cup — not to mention the fact the United States hosts the International spectacle in 1994 — as a great boost for the game here.

"What it will do is give the game recognition," Malek said. "Without the U.S., the only people watching would be soccer people. Kids are be-

coming more aware of it. We need American heroes to promote the game."

American heroes who, it is hoped, will become as synonymous with the sport as Argentina's Diego Maradona, Holland's Ruud Gullit and Marco Van Basten and England's Bryan Robson.

U.S. players such as goalkeeper Tony Meola and forward Paul Caligiuri are starting to get recognition. Bob Gansler's team is also charged up by a 3-1 win over Poland in a recent World Cup warm-up match.

"Obviously I'm not picking the United States to win it all," Faulkner said, "but they'll do better than expected."

Nicklaus' Bear can bite best golfers

If you're going to play The Bear, designed by Jack Nicklaus at Grand Traverse Village in Acme, better spend some time at the driving range.

That's because tee shots that stray from the terraced fairways end up in the rough below on either side. From there, you could be hitting the ball from a nasty side hill, thanks to mounds scattered throughout the course.

The layout — 7,065 yards from the championship tees, 6,176 from the men's tees and 5,281 from the ladies' tees — also demands high, well-placed iron shots.

That's because several greens are guarded by lipped sand traps or water.

Come to think of it, The Bear also demands well-planned approach putts, as some of the large, slick greens are two-tiered.

The Bear can rear up and bite. But while Nicklaus course design will challenge anybody, it's not so tough that an average golfer can't make a few pars.

Take the case of a humble writer, whose chip-in birdie attempt dies on the lip of the cup on the 352-yard No. 1 hole, leaving a tap-in for a par 4.

Never mind what he shot the rest of the way.

It's one tough, varied golf course, and you better bring a lot of golf balls.

But while your score will likely take a beating, the hazards and other design features are a treat to experience, not a chamber of horrors to endure.

The Bear will test your ability to judge the limits of your own game. And you'll be more entertained than beaten down.

Like the Legend at nearby Shanty Creek, The Bear was opened for play in 1985. The Nicklaus course has attracted more tournament play to date, including the annual AAA Michigan Open and the Ameritech Senior Open, scheduled for July 16-22.

While the Legend, carved out of dense woods near Lake Bellaire, may edge out The Bear for natural beauty, the Nicklaus course has a more varied topography. There are wooded holes, water holes and wide-open holes where the wind whips in off of Grand Traverse Bay.

"One of Nicklaus' ideas or trademarks are the mounds on the course," notes Roger Putman, one of the golf coordinators for the resort.

While some in golf course design favor a traditional approach that says don't mess with the natural lay of the land, Nicklaus is known for not being shy about using bulldozers to augment an interesting layout.

Some of the most striking holes on The Bear combine natural beauty

with a little bulldozer action. Among the test examples of this approach is the par-3 No. 4, 143 yards from the men's tees.

Upon surveying the scene from an elevated tee, one notices maples and poplars bordering on the right and scrubby growth in a wetland that angles from left of the tee area to right of the green.

The wetland gives way to water just in front of the green, which suggests using one more club than normal.

"This is the one the Michigan pros probably complain about the most, because of the narrowness of the green," Putman said.

And just behind that narrow, oblong green are bulldozer-created mounds. That means if the tee shot is strong, at tricky pitch or chip will be needed to save par.

Hit that shot too softly and you're still mired in mounds. Hit it too hard and you're in the water just off the front edge of the green.

A flat ball drop area sits just left of the putting surface. From there, the golfer who leaves a tee shot in the water or wetlands has a simple chip or pitch, and a good chance to make bogey.

This is a recent addition. "The course has been set up to be a little easier these days from the men's

tees to accommodate the higher handicappers," Putman said.

No. 5, a 376-yard par-4 from the men's tees, is also bordered by wetlands to the right and a stream on the left. That stream empties into a large pond which guards the front of the green. It's a medium-length par 4, but an accurate tee and fairway shot are required to avoid a splash.

To two-putt this green is also a challenge, because it's two-tiered. Because there are 63 sand traps on The Bear, one tends not to think as much of the water — but there are 10 holes with water hazards.

Adding to the beauty of the course are several cherry trees and a shadowing effect caused by the mounds, terraced fairways and grass-sided bunkers.

Other standout holes include the par-3 No. 9, 142 yards from the men's tees and surrounded by water on three sides. Water also comes into play on 10 and 11, and on No. 12. Here, a pond sits 270 yards from the men's tee, then continues along the right side of the green on this 361-yard par four.

Water and sand guard the front of the 141-yard, par-3 13th. It's an especially pretty hole, as the player hits to the T-shaped green from a tee area bordered by maple trees.

DNR takes aim at bluegill problems

Anyone who has fished an inland lake in southern Michigan is sure to have landed a stunted bluegill or two. They always seem to show up around feeding time at your favorite fishing hole and have little trouble tormenting you by continually stealing your bait.

"The (stunted bluegill) problem is pretty much unique to southern Michigan and we really don't know why," explained Jim Waybrant, fisheries biologist at the Pontiac district office. "The problem is that these small fish are actually pretty old. It's not just a problem of a large crop of young (fish)."

Bluegill can live up to 10 years but the average life span is closer to seven. They average seven inches in length but they can grow up to 12 inches. The state record for bluegill is two pounds, 12-ounces, although they usually weigh less than one pound. (The DNR will present a Master Angler award to anyone who catches a bluegill that weighs one pound or more.) Stunted bluegill rarely reach five inches in length and weigh only a few ounces.

"Similar fish eat similar food," Waybrant said. "For instance, a three-inch bass will eat the same thing a three-inch bluegill will eat. With a large number of stunted bluegill in a lake it presents a fish community problem. We think the stunted bluegill are dropping the food base for all fish of that size to zero. We think stunted bluegill, in fact, are the cause of poor fishing for all species in some bodies of water." (Remember that excuse next time you come home empty handed. Tell your wife there were just too many stunted fish.)

The good news is the DNR is in the third year of a research study project looking at ways to increase the average size of bluegill in inland lakes.

Sixteen lakes in southern Michigan are included in the project, which features several procedures, including gathering data on the size and

numbers of stunted gills in a body of water, treating some lakes with the fish toxicant Antimycin and stocking predator fish such as walleye in some lakes.

Three Oakland County lakes are included in the project. Two of the lakes—Big Lake and Crescent Lake—are scheduled to be treated with Antimycin this spring. The third lake—Big Seven Lake—will be used for comparison purposes after the tests are completed on Big and Crescent lakes.

Antimycin is a chemical that will be applied to each lake at a rate of one part per billion when the water temperature reaches 65 degrees. The chemical is very selective and will only affect small pan fish in the upper five feet of water. Large fish will not be affected. The toxicant is harmless to people, animals, reptiles and birds at this concentration and will break down into a completely harmless component in less than 48 hours.

"Antimycin will work in the top five feet of water and will become diluted as it sinks to the bottom," Waybrant said. "The beauty of Antimycin is that with the temperature of the water when we put it in, it will become harmless in three to four hours. It decomposes very rapidly."

The lakes treated with Antimycin will be stocked with six-inch walleye fingerlings this fall. Tiger muskie and catfish have also been discussed for use as a possible predator fish in other lakes in the future. DNR officials hope the walleye will then control the panfish population through predation.

The introduction of these fish could also lead to a new fishery in the respective lakes.

"If the (walleye) produce a useful fishery we would continue to stock the lake in the future," Waybrant said. "If we get a chance to get everything working and a lot of walleye aren't caught in the first couple years I think we stand a pretty good chance (of a new fishery)."

Stairclimber is a step in the right direction

Dear Myrna: My husband just bought a step machine for us to use. I really prefer an exercise class, but I feel I must use this machine. Are these machines good and are they considered aerobic?

Yes, stair climbing by machine is considered aerobic as long as you work continuously for at least 25 minutes at your target heart rate.

These machines are interesting inventions. The stair climbing machines have steps that work against hydraulic resistance.

Similar to a treadmill, the step falls as your weight activates it. A ladder-like climber lets you step with your left leg and pull with your right arm at the same time and vice versa against resistance provided by your body weight.

You haven't indicated to me what kind of machine you have. Some are more effective than others, although all of them are effective calorie burners and give you an aerobic training effect, too.

Several of these machines don't give you a sensation of climbing stairs, but feel like riding a bike by standing on the pedals instead of sitting on the saddle. The resistance can be increased on most machines to raise the intensity of your workout.

Stair climbing can be an effective part of an exercise program. This is

why my studio is now starting a new class called stepping. If you already prefer a class format and like climbing stairs, it adds a perfect variety to your aerobic workout.

Stepping (I call it), whether it be via machine or incorporated in an exercise class, is a nice change. You don't have to be coordinated. You can be a beginner. The intensity can be adjusted.

Being on the President's Council on Physical Fitness, I had a once-in-a-lifetime chance to teach aerobics at the Great American Workout, May 1 on the south lawn of the White House.

We had 15 sports stations headed by sports stars and Olympic gold medalists. To my surprise, the station next to mine (aerobic dance) was called stepping aerobics. I think that says a mouthful.

Happy stepping to you!

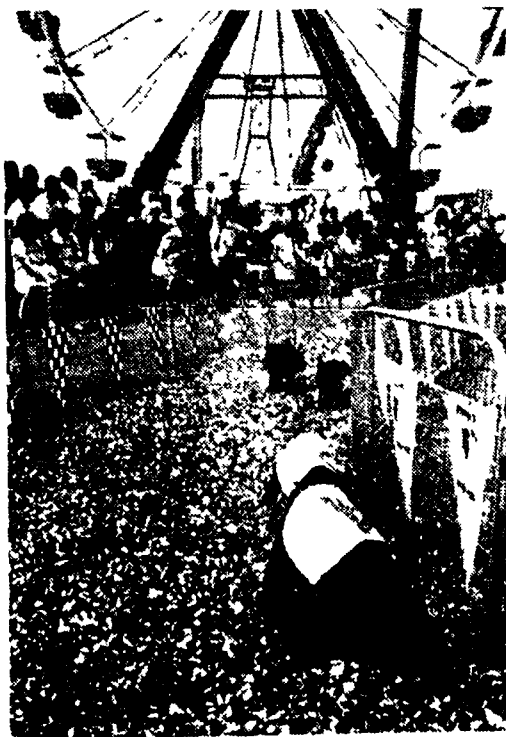
Swift sows in silk fun for spectators

Pigs sprinting around a 150-oval track in pursuit of an Oreo cookie is not something you can see everyday, anywhere.

But you can see pig racing each day of the Livonia Spree, Tuesday through Sunday, at Ford Field Diamond No. 4. And it's free!

ROBINSON'S RACING Pigs, operated by Paul and Carlota Robinson of Tampa, Fla., made its first appearance at Spree in 1988 and was a crowd favorite again last year.

Oreo cookies are used to motivate the pigs to race up to six times a day. Two races are held for each half-hour show. The animals run at about 15 miles per hour, and so each race lasts only about seven seconds.

Showtimes are: 6, 6:30, 8:30, 9, 9:30 p.m. on Tuesday; 5, 5:30, 7, 7:30, 9 and 9:30 p.m. on Thursday and Friday; 3:30, 5, 5:30, 7, 7:30, 9, 9:30 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

Robinson's Racing Pigs have become one of the most successful pig breeding-racing businesses in the country since its debut at the 1985 Florida State Fair in Tampa.

"After that first day we knew we had a winner," said Carlota Robinson. "People were interviewing us from sunup to sundown."

WHEN THE show season ended in 1985, the Robinsons and John Capobianco, manager for Creative Outlet of Florida, Inc., decided to turn the race into a travelling attraction.

The Robinsons organized their 64 pigs into six travelling shows and scheduled performances in more than 30 states and Canada. The pigs now perform in about 100 shows per year. A staff of 16 is evenly divided between the pigs' breeding and racing operations.

Four years ago Carlota Robinson and one of her prize races appeared on "The Tonight Show" to help settle a debate as to whether horses or pigs were smarter.

"People say pigs are stupid, but they aren't," said Carlota Robinson. "People also say pigs are dirty, but they are not. Pigs are actually far superior to dogs and cats, and rank only behind people, chimpanzees and dolphins in intelligence."

"You have to show them a lot of love, whatever it takes to get them to trust you. During the show, we point out that pigs have gotten a bad reputation."

The pigs travel in their own horse trailer and even have their own starting gate, fencing, and racing silks.

Cable Comments

SAMOUELIAN changes are self imposed, but others were unexpected and required adaptations. Learning to adjust and regroup has turned into a major energy drain. Amazingly, Community Television, be it Public, Educational or Governmental, has begun to play a significant role during transition periods.

Those in the throes of change need to have their purpose clarified. Questions of one's self-worth, quality of one's skills and reinforced peer acceptance may be jarred. In each area the individual can find an outlet within the Community Television structure.

Examples of groups going through change are: youth during the teen years; high school grads seeking out the work-trade force; college grads making the transition into the business arena; those within the work force seeking to enhance their marketability; people who have been laid off or have been transferred; people with relationship changes such as being single, divorced or widowed and most explicitly -- retirement.

Such experiences affect all of us at one time or another. Through television workshops, which are available to the general public, any number of people will gather together seeking something to enrich their lives. All age groups come through the studio doors.

The most beautiful part of the television experience is that everyone is welcome and everyone has some talent that can be developed as new skills are learned. The workshops stress hands-on experience and group participation. Recreation and friendships are readily found as everyone learns the new technology. Laughter is frequent as each person finds out first hand what is meant by 'technical difficulties'.

Individuals with physical and/or mental handicaps are also welcome in this barrier-free environment. The television process uses many levels of concentration and temperament. Frankly, the more unique one

is, the easier it is to find one's niche within the production team.

Once one enters the television environment ideas begin to come during one's daily life away from the studio. For a period of time everyone and everything becomes an object of a potential idea for a television show. I have always found this stage of the process particularly enjoyable. Imaginations are kindled and a freshness is breathed back into one's life.

This very real participation in Community Television is probably what 'hooks' us all. This may be in the form of talk shows either about serious subjects to inform or just to entertain; debates to air views or challenge positions of which may become public policy; dramatizations to learn through role playing or to characterize a familiar play or a new created work of expression; remote or on-location coverage of live or tape-delayed events; local news reporting or commentary; promotional pieces to encourage a better understanding or an organization's purpose or a clarification or

their philosophy; or folks experiencing transition may seek out support groups and/or experts to help them in difficult times.

Providing a greater understanding of a group or a problem is just one of the many uses of Community Television. For example: how should we raise our little children today?; What can we do for teenagers to cut down the huge lapses of time of which they loiter and drive around aimlessly in cars?; When do we listen to one of our nations most valuable resources, our retired population?

The television opportunity opens up the doors to a new lease on life. Each day brings purpose, comradery and an opportunity to learn the skills of tomorrow with rich hands-on experience and to lend one's own special talent to each project.

All in all the people in transition, you and I will find a haven of acceptance and peace if we would just venture through the welcoming doors of our neighborhood Community Access Television Studio.

Oprah Winfrey to host daytime Emmy ceremonies

Talk show host sets good example for daytime

Bright, natural and with a style that's uniquely her own, Oprah Winfrey has breathed new life into daytime television. Her earthy charm and rare blend of humor, spontaneity and sensitivity have endeared her to viewers of her daily syndicated talk show.

This week Winfrey will serve as host of "The 17th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards" ceremonies, to air Thursday afternoon, June 28, on ABC. This marks the second time Winfrey, who won an Emmy in 1987 for Outstanding Talk/Service Host, will serve as master of ceremonies.

Winfrey's sincere interest in people and her quickness to share in intense emotions have made her the success she is today, although that was not always the case.

Winfrey got her start in broadcasting her senior year in high school at WVOL in Nashville, which led to a job at WTVF, the CBS affiliate there. She moved on to become a reporter for WJZ in Baltimore, but her special magic did not work there. She had trouble concealing her emotions while covering sad sto-

ries. "I'd be reading something and break in to say, 'Wow, that's terrible!'" Finally the station sought another assignment for her — as host of its morning interview show, "People Are Talking." Winfrey knew she had found her niche. "The minute this show was over, I thought, 'Thank God! This is it! I've finally found out what I was meant to do!'"

Her success in that format speaks for itself. In 1984 she became host of Chicago's "A.M. Chicago" on WLS, going up against native son talk show host Phil Donahue. After six weeks she surpassed Donahue in the ratings, after seven months her show expanded from 30 minutes to an hour, and in September 1985, the name of the show was officially changed to "The Oprah Winfrey Show." A year later she signed a multi-million dollar contract for the show to go into syndication.

The talk show host's ability to elicit emotions from her guests and her audiences keeps the show at the top.

"A lot of people aren't concerned that women's husbands are leaving them or fooling around," she generalized about possible topics of her show. "And I realize that, just to the ear and if you read it in print, it may appear to be sleaze. But I sit there and I look at the pain and experience it everyday that these people go through. And I know, I get 3,000 to 4,000 letters a week that our show helps people to change their lives," she said.

Winfrey is often amazed at how her show helps people open up. Guests tell her they do because her show is easier to face than a one-on-one confrontation.

"Once you've told everybody else, it makes it easier to go to speak to the person one-on-one. That's what they tell me," she said. "The shows I

love the most are the shows in which I actually come away and I learn something from them. I'm really stimulated."

Koontz will serve as co-executive producer on the movies in development: *Face Of Fear*, which begins production this summer, *Darkfall*, *Eyes Of Darkness* and *Night Chills*. Koontz, who will write the *Darkfall* screenplay, sells six million books a year and there are 55 million copies of his books in print.

Two timely dramas will debut on HBO Showcase later this year. Jennifer Grey and Forest Whitaker will star in *Criminal Justice*, described as a no-holds-barred portrayal of crack cocaine's effect on the American court system. Ruben Blades stars in *One Man's War*, a story of a South American family torn apart by a brutal dictatorship.

Comedian Ross Shafer has been signed to host the new *Match Game*, the daytime series debuting Monday, July 16, on ABC. Shafer replaces the previously announced Bert Convy, who withdrew from the project to complete his recuperation from a recent illness. Shafer is a comedian and talk show host who is best known for his hosting of the the FOX Network's *The Late Show* and ABC's *Day's End*.

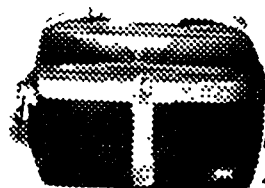
