ect review decision near

A reclamation project under way on the former Thomson Sand and Gravel site may have exceeded township guidelines, a township engineer said Tuesday.

Work on the 360-acre tract which is adjacent to Ridge Road between Six and Seven Mile roads appears to have moved beyond the grading of slopes near the site's manmade lakes, said Abe Munfah, of Ayres, Lewis, Norris & May Inc., the engineering firm contracted by the township.

"I stopped in at the site personally . . and certainly, without having the drawings with me, it looks like they've gone a little beyond reclamation into site preparation," he said.

"I have no proof at this time (but) one of my guys will be out there in the next day or so with the plans.

We should have a little better idea by the end of this week and we'll be responding to the township's letter," he said.

Munfah said township Supervisor Georgina Goss requested an extensive review of the property, which is intended to be a 401-unit singlefamily residential community.

Homes on the site are expected to sell for a half-million dollars or more. according to Vincent DiLorenzo, partner in the Shores of Northville project.

DiLorenzo's D & T Construction .#Mt. Ciemens is handling the work on the site, which is supposed to be limited to reclamation of the gravel pit area, under the township's mining ordinance.

DiLorenzo has stated that all work on the site has fallen under the provisions of the ordinance and crews have not moved into site preparation, which must be authorized by the township planning commission.

He said township officials have been notified about the activities onsite as the reclamation project unfolded.

The work that was done was never shielded from anyone," Di-Lorenzo said.

A multi-million dollar "solid waste Hills. shopping mail" is being considered for land adjacent to Browning-Ferris Industries Inc.'s Arbor Hills Landfill in Salem Township.

Approximately 125 acres of BFI property south of the Napier Road landfill will be proposed for use as a materials recovery facility, recycling and composting center, gas recovery system and medical wastes disposal area, BFI representatives said Tuesday.

This is a conceptual plan, not a proposal," said Dan Nelson, vice-president of Regulatory Affairs for BFI of Southeastern Michigan, Inc. We're asking for input in formulating this plan."


The city had proposed assessing the owners the following amounts: The Selective Group of Farmington Hills, developers of St. Lawrence Estates, would be charged \$201,145; Singh Development of Birmingham, the builders of MainCentre, would pay \$74,304; and Northville Downs would pay \$90,317.

But representatives of all three property owners were on hand at Monday's meeting to protest both the narrow scope of the assessment district and their individual shares of the assessment.

Mike Kahm, vice-president of Singh, said his company's opposition to the assessments was two-fold. "We're saying that, based on benefit, we're not receiving any benefit because our project is supported by the existing system.

Kahm added that his firm considered the enlargements as a capital improvement for the entire city. "We believe that this is an improvement of the overall network . . . and the benefit should be looked at in that light," he said.

Reducing property taxes and stronger environmental cleanup measures are among the priorities of State Representative Willis "Bill" Bullard Jr., R-Highland, who is seeking re-election to a fifth term in the Mi-

Planners study new master plan

The township planning commission will consider an updated land use master plan at its June 26 meeting.

Planners will study and vote on whether or not to accept a revised master plan for the 930-acre Wayne County parcel in Northville Township purchased by the R.A. DeMattia Company in January.


The land use plan is meant to serve as a guideline for future development of the site, said township Planning and Zoning Administrator Carol Maise, who added that the master plan for the area had not been updated since 1979.

We realized a lot was happening on Five Mile Road that warranted another look," she said. "The update was done in conjunction with the PUD (planned unit development, an ordinance recently approved by the commission), which had to conform to the master plan."

Maise said the new master plan for the DeMattia property includes large tracts designated for single-family residential housing.

Approximately 20 percent of the land use map — an area stretching most of the length of Five Mile Road between Sheldon and Beck - is targeted for research and development or light industrial use.

Maise called the master plan and PUD very appropriate for surrounding land uses." She said master plan revisions were dictated by Plymouth Township development south of Five Mile, residential areas north of the DeMattia property and Scott Regional Correctional Facility to the west

Maise said the master plan and PUD ordinance are meant to serve as development guidelines.

"What it's all about is flexibility," she said. "We look at this in a real theoretical sense; you present some-thing and we'll work with you."

A conceptual plan designed by De-Mattia for the site shows signs of compatibility with the township land use map, Maise said, although the developer shows light industrial areas extending north along Beck Road in locations the township has penciled in as residential.

The developer will also pursue multi-family housing on a portion of the property, a plan Maise said may meet with resistance from the commission.

The planning commission will hold a public hearing on the new master plan at 7:15 a.m. June 26. The regular meeting and a vote on the plan will follow.

Police sift through assault case leads

Township police are investigating leads in an attempted criminal sexual assault against a Northville Township woman, but do not have any suspects in the case, a police official said Tuesday.

Det. Fred Yankee said the police department has received calls and tips about a man who al-legedly entered the apartment of a local woman and engaged in a struggle with her early June 3.

Several tips have been received from the picture (composite drawing) that was in the paper," Yankee said. "We're following up on everything that comes in and some calls are possibilities."

Police are looking for a white male of medium build, approximately 5'8", with sandy brown to red hair. The suspect is believed to be in his late 20's and had a closecropped beard at the time of the incident.

"I can't tell you much about this because it involves juveniles," DNR Officer John Jurcich told the Record Monday. "But I think I have whose responsible."

Usually our department doesn't, as a rule, pursue juveniles," he added. "But I thought this was a serious enough violation. We had nothing like sport hunting involved, it

Northville City Police had found the decomposed bodies of eight malPond May 30. The ducks were pre-sumed to be among some 27 waterfowl that Dorisa Court residents had fed on a regular basis before they disappeared more than a month ago. Jurcich took the case over from police because wildlife was involved.

"I have some dead ducks and I have who I believe is responsible for it," Jurcich said. "But the exact method they were killed, and even the exact day that they were killed is still unclear. There are some things that are still unclear even in my mind.'



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City swallows insurance rate hike

The city council voted to renew Northville's liability insurance with the Michigan Municipal Risk Management Authority this week, despite a 50-percent increase in the policy's cost.

But officials had little choice in the matter, since the Authority would not grant the city an extension to review other options. The city's present insurance contract expires June 30. We obviously can't leave

ourselves uninsured and we can't get the extension," City Manager Steven Walters told the council Monday.

Walters told the council the city's price increase was similar to those faced by other municipalities.

Liability insurance will cost the city \$80,713 in 1990, a \$27,099 increase over last year's \$53,614 cost.

Michigan Municipal Risk Management Authority blamed the 50-percent increase on several factors, including the fact that the Authority is no longer granting "the sizeable discounts allowed in the past," in the words of Regional Risk Manager Thomas Burr. Burr added in a letter to the city that Northville is still receiving a 35-percent discount from the base pricing, which is now the maxi-

mum that the Authority will grant. Burr attributed about \$10,000 of the increase to a "15-percent capital accumulation surcharge that the Authority's board of directors approved earlier this year.

Because of the sizeable increase in your contribution, however, the Authority has agreed to review your pricing to see if anything can be done, Burr wrote.

But Burr said the Authority could not grant the city's request for a 60-day extension on the contract. City officials had wanted the time to explore other insurance options.

Another use of the property may include a medical-wastes disposal facility, or autoclave, Myers said. The medical wastes would not be incinerated; instead wastes would be steam-heated at 290 degrees for 20 minutes until sterilized, he said.

Other conceptual uses include a tire-shredding

plant, a confidential documents destruction center, a contaminated liquids leaching facility and an environmental preserve on the west end of the property

"(This facility can be) an asset to this community," Myers said.

Nelson said he has had discussions with offitals from Salem Township and Washtenaw County, as well as with representatives of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

"It's just a concept so far; I'm moving as fast as I can for preliminary site approval," he said. Nelson said he did not have a cost estimate for

the project, but agreed that the project would cost several million dollars.

"The whole thing may take several years (to develop)," he said.



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
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Anti-MX rally festive

A festive mood prevailed at Saturday afternoon's Lansing raily against the proposed MX missile rail garrison.

Demonstrators bearing placards with slogans like "No MX in Northville" wandered the sidewalk leading to the capital, while protest singers including Victor McManemy of Traverse City entertained the crowd estimated at more than 400 people.

Of course, the demonstrators on the steps of the state capital had good reason to be happy. Just two weeks ago, state legislators in both the house and senate introduced a concurrent resolution opposing the rail garrison proposal in Michigan.

The resolution opposes the U.S. Air Force plan to station up to eight MX missiles at Oscoda's Wurtsmith Air Force Base on the grounds that rail transport of the missiles during times of national tension threatens the health and safety of the state's citizens. At the rally, speakers from across the state applauded the demonstrators for their campaign, and urged continued opposition to the MX plan. Jackie Victor, coordinator of the Michigan Coalition to Stop the MX, urged people to support state and national legislation opposing the MX rall garrison proposal. "Today's not the end to showing our opposition to the MX, it's only the beginning," she said, "but I have to say, it's a pretty impressive start."

Tobi Hanna-Davies, of the Interface Council for Peace and Justice in Ann Arbor, offered advice on making local politicians take a stand against the MX. Her group helped convince the Ann Arbor City Council to pass a resolution opposing the rail garrison.

"Available for loan immediately, we have an actual-length, 71-foot cardboard MX missile," Hanna-Davies said. To gain attention for their cause, demonstrators had held the missile aloft on railroad trestles crossing major streets in Ann Arbor, days before the city council voted on the resolution. Detroit City Council President Maryann Mahafley said voters should insist that future political candidates make their positions on nuclear weapons clear.

"Will they support a peace dividend back to our cities, back to our farms, back to our schools and to health care?" she asked.

Novi resident Leona Riebling and her granddaughter Kate, 12, were two of the few local residents attending the June 16 rally. Riebling had testified against the rail garrison proposal at two public hearings in Oscoda on the Air Force's environmental impact statement on the MX rail garrison plan.

"It's not surprising that the announcement that the MX missile was coming to Michigan, right in our own backyards, would get me moving," Riebling said.

A member of the United Church of Christ, Riebling has served as a peace coordinator for the church, discussing justice and peace issues with local parishes.





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
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Seniors get red carpet party

Stop signs for the Pines

Dunbarton Pines III homeowners' concerns about a dangerous intersection, much-traversed by their small children, were brought to a full stop Monday.

The council unanimously overrode a recommendation from the city administration and agreed to the residents' request to place four-way stop signs at the junction of Waycroft Drive, Courtview Trail and Lightsway

Waycroft is a bus stop for children within the Northville school district. There are no sidewalks in the subdivision.

"I can't tell you how many times I hold my breath, hoping a child won't be hit at this intersection," said Way-croft resident Paula Crawford, who has served as a spokesperson for her neighbors. A contingent from Dunbarton Pines was at the council

meeting. Crawford said she counted 57 children under age 8 living in the vicinity of the intersection.

'It's (Waycroft Drive) the type of straight-way quality road that encourage people to go a little faster than they should be," said Richard Azanger, president of Dunbarton Pines Homeowners Association. "I urge you to listen to the neighbors because in my opinion they are the experts. The Paula Crawfords of the world are the ones looking out their windows every day."

Crawford said she first contacted the city about the issue in September. The city council was petitioned by 25 area residents in March. In April, the residents said they were told by Department of Public Works Supervisor Bruce Jerome that a study showed that stop signs were not necessary but that yield signs would be placed on Courtview/


Lightway.

In a June 14 memo to the council, City Manager Edward Kriewall explained that the four-way stop would create a dangerous situation because motorists would fail to stop there and would pass on to a stop sign at the next intersection, while children would rely on the drivers obeying the first signs.

"I think the city has done what they are required to do in following the procedures." said Mayor Matthew Quinn, adding that he supported the residents' request. "Please, please don't get a false sense of security . . . Stop signs are only as good as the people willing to abide by

Council members Nancy Covert and Joseph Toth requested that the city administration study the subdivision to see if additional stop signs are needed.

Township to consider curbside refuse collection

Northville Township will study plans for collection of compost materials after a local composting program is launched in July.

Supervisor Georgina Goss said the township Board of Trustees will schedule an August study session to discuss the possibility of curbside collection of all garbage, including compost materials.

Compost materials eventually will be hauled to an 80-acre compost center on the corner of Beck and Geddes

The collection center is to be funded by a \$242,000 grant from the state's Protect Michigan's Future environmental bond issue and by contributions from the member communities of the Western Townships Utilities Authority (WTUA).

WTUA members include Plymouth, Canton and Northville townships.

Northville Township has contributed \$34,820 to the composting program.

Goss, a member of the WTUA executive committee, said the township

has much to consider before adopting a compost pick-up plan - including a uniform trash collection service in the township.

We're looking at the possibility of township-wide trash collection," she said. "Pickup of composted materials would be a plan set up by WTUA and arranged with a private hauler."

Goss said township residents presently contract with private trash haulers, but the need to lessen the impact of compost - grass clippings, wood chips, branches, leaves - on landfills could necessitate a change. "One option is for one hauler to pick up everything," she said. "The potential would be there if the WTUA project is on line."

Goss said the WTUA composting site is "still on a go mode" and will protect township residents from the type of expense facing Plymouth city readents, who beginning in the fall will be charged \$1 per bag of garbage

collected by the city. "Once the composting site and equipment are in place ... the potential will be there for township residents' use," she said.

The August study session may be the key to determining how compost

Planned fire hall addition revived, reworked

City officials revived a decade-old plan to expand the city's fire hall last week, only to have the plan postponed Monday by a 2-1 city council vote.

The latest version of the original fire hall expansion plan calls for two bays to be added to the west of the three existing bays at city hall, at an estimated cost of \$108,000.

City Manager Steven Walters warned the council Monday the city may have to work out "a property issue" with Northville Public Schools, because the proposed addition would encroach on their Recreation Department property. The school leases the property to the city and township for community recreation.

The fire hall addition would extend about 10 feet west of the city hall property line onto Recreation Department land.

Walters asked the council Monday to authorize a \$1,200 payment to the architectural firm of Merritt McCallum Cieslak for a schematic design of the plan, arguing that the city could then take the plan to school officials for their approval.

While council members Carolann Ayers, Dewey Gardner and Paul Folino all agreed with the planned addition, Folino voted against proceeding further with it until the city received some sort of approval from Northville Public School officials that the plan was acceptable to them.

"I just can't see paying \$1,200 even on a preliminary-type thing," Folino said, if the school would not go along with the plan.

Mayor Chris Johnson and Council Member Jerry Mittman were unable to attend Monday's meeting.

to the council, in which Walters recommended that the city contract with Merritt McCallum Cieslak of Farmington to prepare plans for the addition.

Merritt McCallum Cieslak, under the name Merritt Cole McCallum, designed the city hall's library addition in 1980, Walters wrote. The firm also presented a preliminary design for a two-story addition to the back of city ject of a two-page memo from Walters hall at that time, to house police gar-

ages underneath and a deeper firehouse above.

Walters argued that because the firm was already familiar with city hall and the fire department's needs that the bid should be awarded to Merritt McCallum Cieslak without going through the usual bid proposal process.

The firm's proposed percentage fee was also in line with other firms for the size of the project, Walters said.

Merritt McCallum Cieslak partner Ronald Cieslak quoted the city a fee of 8 percent of the construction cost to cover the firm's architectural and engineering services. The fee includes an estimated \$4,800 for construction documents and building specifications, and \$2,000 to oversee bidding and construction, as well as the ini-

tial \$1.200. The total cost of the addition was estimated at \$108,000, which in-



cluded \$9,000 in contingency fees. The latest proposal, for an addition to the west of city hall rather than behind it, was developed recenthy by Walters and Fire Chief Jim Al-len while they were reviewing Merritt Cole McCallum's original proposal. The new proposal has several advantages, Walters wrote. The one-story addition would be less costly than the original two-story proposal, and the arrangement of five bays side-by-side would allow more flexible fire response than making the three existing bays deeper.

And because the city is exploring the possibility of consolidating police services with neighboring communities, Walters wrote that the police department may not need more space for some time. Also, an addition to the police department could be added later if needed. The police addition could be built like the library addition on the east side of the building.

Walters described the need for more fire hall space as "critical," an assessment few city officials would debate. The current vehicles are so tight to each other that personnel cannot walk between the vehicles, and there is very little space available for storage and office space," Walters wrote. "By adding the two bays, all vehicles could be parked in the front part of the Fire Hall, and the rear portion would be freed up for other Fire Department uses."

The addition would measure 36 feet deep by 28 feet wide, and the existing fire hall driveway would be widened to allow access to the two extra bays.





<u>Our Opinions</u> True test of surveys is following up results

Surveys are the last hope of the desperate, a political wag once said. The insinuation is that when things get rough on the home front, a survey will soothe constituents by making it appear politicians are concerned about pocketbook issues affecting Marge and Joe Average.

Surveys are also notorious for their ability to slant responses in the direction desired by the survey-taker. A carefully worded question can mean one thing to a respondent and something altogether different to the person back in the office adding up numbers with "a 3-to-5 percent margin of error."

But surveys continue to be an important information gathering tool for some in government and industry. Northville Township Board members last week discussed the merits of surveying their constituency in hopes of determining exactly how residents are willing to spend their tax dollars.

Supervisor Georgina Goss suggested the survey - to be developed by the University of Michigan's Institute of Social Research — in a letter to fellow board members. Goss said the rapidly changing nature of the township dictates credible, scientific polling of residents over major issues facing the township.

Goss listed library services, roadways and traffic problems, police and fire services and environmental programs as issues requiring attention by township government and she wants to know the extent of community financial support these programs can expect.

The board was seriously rebuked by the May 1 defeat of the Haller Library proposal. Many township politicians and officials worked long and hard to get a pair of millage proposals passed, only to lose by a 2-1 margin. Those same officials are now wondering about the future role of Northville Township government.

Officials are also concerned about the political clout of the local no-newtaxes mavericks. A group going by the name of Citizens for a Better Northville ran aggressive campaigns against a city recreation millage last fall and the Haller proposal. Both millage requests were soundly defeated and Rick Engelland, a member of the anti-tax group, has joined a four-way race for the township treasurer position held by Betty Lennox.

Township officials feel that a survey will help them understand what taxpayers need and want. They now realize the low rumbling sound rolling through the township is more than the effects of a summer squall and they want resident input.

The cost of the survey has yet to be determined and Board members say the plan hinges on the price tag. From this viewpoint, the feeling is that a survey probably won't hurt — and may well be helpful. If a survey is presented, residents are encouraged to share their thoughts.

The real test will be for the township to listen to its constituency and devise and implement strategies based on the outcome of the survey. In the future, township government officials would be wise to take steps to insure that voters are polled every step of the way - informally - because the best sort of local government is an in-touch local government.

for their "bird books." These are notebooks that birdwatching fans keep where they log all of the different types of birds they see.

I actually think these birders travel to Point Pelee to compare binoculars, birding hats and rain gear. It is truly an L.L. Bean festival. The birds hide deep within the branches of the trees. Birders stand hundreds of yards away and claim they see them. "See his orange breast?" "Where?" "On that branch." "Which branch? "That one." Sometimes it's easier just to nod and move on.

But heavily influenced by this experience I have started my own bird book. Here are notes from a close-tohome birder:

GIANT URBAN CROW --- sighted outside of home, evening of June 9. Crow the size of a Volkswagen Beetle perches high above Linden Street in Northville. Small but dignified gray cat saunters out into street. George (cat's name known, crow's not) stops to wash front left paw. Crow - with screech that



Allergy tips

To the Editor:

On May 31, 1990, an article was published in your periodical regarding tips for allergic individuals. Neither the source for the information nor the author was stated. Unfortunately, some of the information given was either incorrect or misleading.

As a local physician who is board certified in allergic and immunologic diseases, I would like to comment on the information given. Only individuals who are predisposed to having allergic difficulties will react against those substances that the immune system perceives as foreign. In people without allergic tendencies, the immune system ignores these substances. Allergies are always specific even though many people have

multiple allergies. True food allergies (which can be life threatening) are not very common. The most frequent food allergies are milk, egg, wheat, fish, soy, shellfish and nuts. Some of these disappear with time, others may be life-long. The most common allergens are pollen (ragweed, grass, tree and weed), mold, and animal dander. Smoke, fumes, chemical and cosmetic odors are not true allergies. but are irritants which may give symptoms similar to allergies.

Skin testing is the most sensitive and reliable way to prove that difficulties are allergic in nature, however, a positive test does not necessarily mean that the allergen in quesiton causes trouble for the person nor does it necessarily predict the severity of difficulties. The blood testing mentioned (RAST, FAST) does not generally reveal any further information than the skin tests and is usually less accurate, more costly and takes longer for results.

Food allergies are best treated by total avoidance. Sometimes, food allergies are diagnosed through elimination diets, but this is not very scientific. Food skin testing can be used to support or refute suspicions with double-blind testing as the ultimate, but cumbersome, method of diagnosis.

I hope that your readers find these clarifications helpful. Michael S. Rowe, M.D. F.A.C.P.

Heads nodded gravely. Conventional wisdom

To think the solution to our nation's problems will come out of Washington is both naive and masochistic.

Naive because Washington, whether ruled by Republicans or Democrats, is concerned soley with what goes on in Washington, not the rest of the country. Visit D.C. People ask, "What's going on out there in the real world?"

Masochistic because Washington, whether run by liberals or conservatives, is at bottom nothing more than a vast monument to enduring bureaucracies. The vast changes sweeping our economics and government mean an end to the central role of bureaucracies.

Historically, bureaucracies evolved to coordinate and control many individual transactions - Social Security claims, tax pay-

offwine glasses. Dessert cards from school.

But today, when the personal computer, phone modem and voice mail are becoming common, the need for bureaucracies - ravenous, centralized, inflexible — is fast disappearing.

While Washington remains captive to its bureaucracies, the real action is in the real world. Examples:

• In Minnesota, a new law lets parents choose their child's school anywhere in the state, eliminating residence requirements and forcing schools to compete.

• Near Miami, Fla., an experiment in "school-based autonomy" lets 32 schools be managed by teachers and parents, not central school bureaucrats. A similar test is under way in Rochester, N.Y.

 Michigan's State Board of Education is developing a core curriculum — setting out what kids should learn in our schools. But the plan is that school districts will be free to choose how to achieve the defined educational outcomes. (Indeed, Gov. James Blanchard recenthy called for abolition of the State Board of Education, in part on the grounds that it is excessively centralized and bureaucratic and unresponsive to parents and teachers.)

• In New York, a company called America Works is paid \$5,000 by the state for each welstayed seven months. Taxpayers win: The fee is less than half the \$12,000 per year to keep a family of three on welfare.

Everywhere, experiments in decentralizing are cropping up.

I think this issue will come to the fore in politics, too.

The start is that the workings of government - especially the federal - have become less and less efficient. Next came the Republican charge that Democrats were apologists for taxing and spending, regardless of results.

Michiganians from both parties are working on new models of how government might work. Community self-help groups, funded by diversion of local property taxes and managed by networks of personal computers, are being designed.

Certificates of minimum skill attainment are being talked about as a precondition of jobs for youth. Not far off is a rule requiring that those who collect unemployment checks also be enrolled in training programs.

Never has politics been so filled with imagination and experiment. But you would never know it if you lived and worked in Washington.



In some situations renting is better than buying

With housing costs rising at only about 5 percent annually, the hous-ing market projections for the 1990s are not very rosy. According to the Michigan Association of CPAs, a key question potential home buyers might want to be asking is whether to buy at all.

CPAs suggest that the decision whether to buy or rent can best be made by weighing the pros and cons of each option. Your ultimate decision will be influenced by the living arrangements you require, plus your current financial situation. Here are some factors CPAs suggest that you may want to consider when deciding if renting or buying is right for you. RENTING IS CHEAPER THAN BUYING

First of all, in many parts of the country it is now cheaper to rent than to buy - even when taking the tax benefits of home ownership into consideration. Remember that although home ownership does open the door to numerous tax deductions, the dollar value of those deductions has been somewhat deflated by lower tax rates.

In addition, if you want to buy a home, you must be prepared to make a 10 to 20 percent down payment and pay closing costs, title insurance, and points. For first-time buyers, the substantial down payment often presents the major stumbling block to buying a home, expecially in light of the slow growth in the real income of young people today. And if you do have enough money for a down payment, renting offers you the opportunity to invest the money you would have had to tie up in the down payment and other closing costs.

Of course, the cost of owning a home extends beyond the initial payments. In the first year, the average cost of owning a home (after taxes) is approximately 32 percent of your income. In 1970, that cost was only 23 percent.

As a homeowner, you must be prepared to make a long-term commitment to expensive monthly payments, including maintenance, landscaping, trash and snow removal, as well as unexpected major repairs such as a new roof or furnace. **RENTERS HAVE MORE MOBILITY**

Suppose you lose your job, or must transfer to another location. If you are tied to a short-term lease, you have far more mobility and flexibility than you have as a homeowner. And with some lease agreements, you can

even sublet your apartment.

Furthermore, renting offers you the oppoortunity to test out a particular neighborhood before making a long-term commitment to stay in that location. If you know that you will be moving within four years, it is almost always more advantageous to rent. CPAs say that in most cases, it takes at least four years for your home equity growth to offset the costs of buying and selling. SOME CAUTIONARY ADVICE AB-OUT RENTING

If you decide to rent, be sure you understand all the terms of the rental agreement. For example, some leases do not allow sublets. And some rental agreements require that you pay for utilitites and other maintenance costs.

Check your lease to see if it mentions whether your rent will increase if there is an increase in oil prices or local taxes. The lease should also specify how much notice you must give the landlord of your intention to vacate the apartment - and how much notice the landlord must give you if he or she decides to evict you. You should also find out whether you can fix up your apartment by building shelves or making other alterations.

WHEN IS BUYING RIGHT?

On the other side of the scale, there are considerable advantages to buying a home. For many Americans, the increase in space, privacy and freedom to remodel associated with home ownership is vital to happiness.

Obviously, the decision to buy a home depends to a great extent on your ability to pay for the costs of the purchase plus the on-going monthly costs of ownership. Some first-time

If your finances are tight, but your heart is set on buying a home, consider a smaller home in a desirable location. You may also want to explore less expensive homes that may involve a longer commute to your place of employment, although these homes may not appreciate as quickly as you would like. Another option is a handyman's special, or a home that has the potential for expansion.

TAX BENEFITS AND EQUITY

Owning a home can still be a good investment - even if the mortgage interest rates exceed the annual appreciation of your home. The reason for this is simple: in the early years of

buyers turn to relatives to help with the down payment; others find loans. real estate taxes and points paid to secure a mortgage. What's more, you can defer tax on the gain realized by selling your home simply by purchasing a home of equal or greater value.

WHICH WAY WILL THE SCALES TIP?

A recent survey reveals that an increasing population of single individuals is turning away from home ownership and opting to rent or purchase condominiums. Put off by the costs of home owndership, many young couples between the ages of 25 and 29, once a major house-buying group, are opting to rent. But don't let the demographics dictate your per-sonal decision. Carefully consider your own priorities and financial realities, and act on those factors. Builders seek controlled growth

As pressures for controlling growth in southeast Michigan and in boomtowns on the west side of the state mount, draft legislation designed to give local communities more authority over development is nearing completion.

In the works for nearly two years, the legislation according to its authors, strives to balance the interest of existing development against the need for new development.

But builders are concerned efforts to restrict or stop development could be disastrous to them, the local econmony and the freedom of people to choose where they wish to live.

Neither side expects to see growth management legislation introduced until after the November general elections.

According to Mark Wyckoff, president to the Planning and Zoning Center, an Ann Arbor planning consultant firm, current planning and zoning regulations were adequate for the past, but they approach growth in a piecemeal fashion.

"They were designed for the problems of a different age," Wyckoff said. Wyckoff and Gerald Fisher, an at-

torney with Kohl, Secrest, Wardle, Lynch, Clark and Hampton in Farmington Hills, presented an early draft of the new legislation at a growth-management meeting in Southfield sponsored by the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) and five communities.

The legislation, developed for Independence, Oakland, Waterford and West Bloomfield townships and the city of Rochester Hills, will not be introduced in Legislature until next year.

Wyckoff stressed communities are we must have ongoing construction," autious about controlling growth for he said. "I think we can all recall cautious about controlling growth for fear of stifling it. "(Despite) what developers believe, these are not antigrowth efforts."

Irvin Yackness, executive director of the Builders Association of Southeast Michigan (BASM), said he hasn't examined the proposed legislation, but regulations that inhibit development should be scrutinized closely.

The builders association is committed to growth management, but it is concerned the builders' and public sector's definition are widely different, he said.

Most growth management proposals appear to be no-growth based, which is why a continuing dialogue is needed, Yackness said.

Limiting or slowing development through any means restricts the right of property owners to develop their land, increases housing costs and prevents people from choosing where to live.

"It is wrong for people to stop development just because they have their house in the suburbs," he said. "They (the rights to choose) were certainly important to the citizen who earlier had the opportunity to move to the area.

"Stopping growth will not stop traffic congestion, loss of wetlands and woodlands, rising property values or protect the envirionment," he said

But building does have a direct effect on the local economy, Yackness said. Building not only adds to the tax base, but creates and sustains jobs as well as providing a continuing source of revenue for local businesses.

"If we want an ongoing economy,

what 1981 was like when we had only 1,200 building permits pulled."

Fisher of Kohl Secrest said an important tool would allow communities to transfer and purchase development rights. Transferring development rights from one property to another permits dense building in one area in exchange for light building in another regardless of current zoning.

To ensure a land owner is not deprived of property rights, new legislation would permit communities through special assessments or other means - to compensate owners for lost profits, he said.

New legislation establishing urban and general-service districts spelling out where water, sewer, paved roads and other infrastructure will be provided would enable developers to know well beforehand that a given parcel will not support dense development, according to Fisher.

Closely related, he said, is legislation requiring a "concurrency of services and facilities" that would tie new development and infrastructure construction together. Currently, infrastructure construction - particularly roads - lags behind development, which results in traffic congestion and gridlock, he said.

To ensure a concurrency of services and facilities, the legislation would allow communities to establish impact fees — monies payable for improvements that are substantially related to and provide a material benefit to the new development, Fisher said.

New legislation would also require public agencies — including city, vil-

lage, township, parks and recreation, county road agencies --- to designate areas intended for public development.

When a developer makes a proposal conflicting with a master plan, the affected agency would be required to acquire the property itself or amend the plan to allow the development, Fisher said.

The legislation also proposes a regional impact coordination act that would require developers to present an impact analysis to surrounding communities.

"The difficulty," he said, "is in preserving a community's right to home rule.

During site plan approval, the home community would hear testimony from other communities and determine if theirs is an "unreasonable impact." Fisher said if the home coummunity discovers an unreasonable impact, the project would not be approved until the impact was mitigated.

The new legislation would also allow communities to enter into "development agreements" which would ensure builders that laws affecting their projects will not change during the project's construction.

In turn, communities negotiate for developer-financed infrastructure and project phasing to insure a concurrency of services and facilities.

Fisher also said new legislation is needed to reform special assessment laws because recent court cases have "over-limited" the ability to assess special taxes.

Current laws allow assessments only for work that directly effects or adjoins a parcel, he said.

Builders hurt by S & L restrictions

(AP) — House builders and some congressmen are mounting a campaign against a "credit crunch" they say is crippling the construction industry and threatening the loss of 200,000 jobs.

Coinciding with a recent Commerce Department report about the smallest number of housing starts since the last recession, the National Association of Home Builders called a news conference to announce the details of its latest industry survey.

Association President Martin Perlman said the survey showed that "builders are being indiscriminately cut off from the credit markets. Production is dropping. People are losing their jobs and businesses. The disruptions in the housing delivery system are far more severe than anyone anticipated."

The Commerce report said hous-

ing starts had dropped 5.8 percent to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.25 million units, the lowest level since 1.17 million units were started at an annual rate in October 1982.

At issue, the house builders said, is the new savings and loan bailout law that limits the amount of loans to an individual and tightens requirements for loans by commercial banks.

But other housing industry observers say steep mortgage rates, overbuilding and the high cost of new houses also contribute to the downturn in construction.

The S & L reform law limits to 15 percent the amount of capital that a thrift institution can lend to one borrower. Before the law was enacted last August, thrifts could lend all their money to a single builder. U.S. Rep. Peter Hoagland, a Demo-

crat from Nebraska, told the news conference that 68 congressmen have joined him in sponsoring a bill that would remedy the problem by permitting a transition period during which builders could find alternative sources of money for construction.

Hoagland said he believes the bill will reach the House floor within two weeks. A similar bill has been introduced in the Senate by Sen. Richard Shelby, D-Ala.

"Further complicating the situation is the fact that commercial banks have not been able to pick up the slack and are tightening their lending requiements due to a February bulletin from the Comptroller of the Currency warning commercial banks about the dangers of real estate lending and urging bank examiners to look closely at all of the real estate loans in the banks under their

Old and new ways to battle common garden insects

Erecting barriers and setting traps are environment-friendly mechanical methods for controlling many of our most devastating and common garden pests

Among the trapping methods available to the home gardener are various kinds of sticky traps that immobilize pests forever on their gluey surfaces.

An old favorite sticky trapping material is Tanglefoot, applied on paper or cloth bands wrapped around tree trunks to prevent caterpillars and other insects from climbing trees to feed on foliage, buds or fruits, or to lay eggs. Such sticky materials are also barriers to ants, which protect aphid colonies by fighting off aphid predators.

I apply Tanglefoot to adhesive or masking tape, though sometimes I simply will use double-sided caterpillar tape purchased at a garden outlet. frost to catch egg-laying insects climbing trunks, and 1 renew the bands at different sections of the trunks in spring to bar ants and munching crawlers.

I band the fruit trees in the fall before

Some sticky traps are designed to attract and fool pests into settling on them. Yellow traps capitalize on the attraction that color holds for whiteflies and leaf miner flies, aphids, thrips and fungus gnats.

Sticky yellow traps for both indoor and outdoor use are available at garden outlets. They can also be homemade. I purchase the small size to control fungus gnats in the soil of indoor plants.

Cabbage maggot flies are atracted to gray and can be caught on gray sticky board traps set on posts in cabbage family plantings. Just don't count on trapping every single fly and totally eliminating injury when large numbers of flies are present.



The old folklore that ashes snuggly circling cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli and brussels sprouts stems will deter cabbage flies from laying their eggs at the bases of the plants is not true. On the contrary, the flies will be attracted to the gray ash color. A sneaky sort of trap uses powerful

A sneaky sort of trap uses powerful sex attractants called pheremones, which draw and trap a target pest. These traps are used both as direct controls and as monitors to show when a pest population has built to a point where sprays are necessary. Sex pheremone traps are commonly used as codling moth monitors in apple orchards. Sound cultural practices together with mechanical methods such as barriers and traps offer many excellent, safe measures for controlling pest problems and maintaining a healthy, ecologically balanced home garden.

Yet another pathway to the same goal it to select resistant varieties. This is no mysterious procedure. Simply plant more than one variety of your favorite flowers and vegetables each year, and note the varieties that

grow most strongly and seem the least affected by insects and diseases. This way, year by year, you will be upgrading your selections to best

fit your own garden conditions. There is a good deal of concern these days about pesticide residues

these days about pesticide residues in our foods, and public demand has surely had much to do with the increasing numbers of natural, environmentally kind pest-control products in use today. Here's a sample:

• Pesticidal soaps: There is on the market a broad range of natural soap-based products for controlling most insects pests.

In the Safer line there is also a fatty acid and sulfur-based fungicide, a natural vegetation killer, moss killer, sticky traps and coddling moth traps. Read the labels carefully to make sure you are purchasing a product that will control the problem you are concerned with.

• Bacilius thuringiensis (Bi): Bacterial spores sold under the names Dipel, Thuricide, Liquid Organic are mixed with water and sprayed on plants to control butterfly and moth larvae such as loopers and caterpillars.

• Rotenone: A botanical material derived from the roots of tropical legumes, rotenone's active ingredient is of moderately high toxicity to mammals. However, the dust and wettable powders on the market usually contain a concentration of only 1 percent.

Rotenone biodegrades quickly but is an effective control for many beetles, aphids, caterpillars, larvae and bugs. It is toxic to pigs, fish, frogs and toads.

• Pyrethrum: Another botanical product, pyrethrum provides quick control of caterpillars, aphids, beetles and thrips. It breaks down quickly to leave no harmful residues but is toxic to fish.

As with rotenone, observe label cautions carefully and avoid breathing in the fresh dust.



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
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
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
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

Below-grade ambience

Q: We're planning to make a family room of sorts in a corner of the basement. It's the only place we can grow into--our house is a Colonial, built in the 1930s. The basement is large and dry, but it is also dark since there are only small well-type windows. What can we do to make it less claustrophobic?--L.G.

A: I haven't heard of anyone adding a basement family room for a long time, given today's quest for open, airy "great rooms" and outdoorsy living. Assuming there's a reason you're looking down—not out for family room space, here are several ways to upgrade your below-grade ambience: • Rely on light, bright colors—

your best ally in opening space and brightening things up to the eyes as well as psyche.

 Supplement your small windows with make believe ones—use mirror squares instead of glass to glaze old wooden window frames. You often can find them inexpensively at salvage yards. Hang the "windows" on the wall, dress them with curtains as if they were the real things, and you'll be delighted with your bright new outlook.

• Literally add a new view with a wall-covering mural such as the dramatic landscape we show here. It's called "Horizon"—no surprise—from James Seeman Studios' Master Collection of hand-screened murals and comes with matching background paper so it can be made to fit almost any wall.


• Install indirect lighting behind a valance board to wash the walls and make them appear taller. It's important that you can't see the light source, so in the mind's eye, it looks as if natural light were flooding in from outdoors.

Q: My In-laws-to-be are giving us our bedroom furniture as a wedding present, actually, the money to buy it. So we have been looking at suites of furniture. I don't like anything we've seen, at least, not the whole set. My mother—and his—say bedroom furniture should match, like luggage. Are they right? Please answer fast—we're getting married in two months.—B.S.

A: Dear Bridal Suite: Not only don't you have to match all your bedroom furniture—you shouldn't. Matched "suites" are both boring and passe, even if furniture stores insist on showing things en masse.

Buy a good-quality mattress and box spring now and ask your in-laws to bank the rest of their glf in your name so you and your husband can take your time shopping for individual pieces that will add up to a bedroom that's very personally yours.

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Pewter was common over 3 centuries ago

Q: Antique dealers who have examined this pewter stein say that the date of 1640 is the true vintage. It is 15 inches tall and holds about 21/2 quarts. The handle on the lid is in the shape of a llon.

Can you evaluate this stein for me? A: If the dealers are correct, your stein probably would sell for about \$500 to \$600.

Three hundred and fifty years ago there were more utensils made of pewter than there were made of ceramics.

Q: My covered stoneware teapot is tan and brown, with white and blue floral decorations. Inscribed on the bottom is "Doulton & Slater's Patent." Can you tell me about the origin and

value of this teapot?

A: Your teapot was made by the Doulton Co. Ltd., in Burslem, England, about 1890. The company produced stoneware under Slater's patent from 1886 to 1914.

A dealer would price this at about \$225 to \$235.

Q: What can you tell me about my antique portrait plate? It depicts a beautiful girl wearing a curly white wig and red hat with an ostrich plume. The rim is decorated in blue and gold. It is marked "Austria."

A: Your plate was made after the McKinley Tarrif Act of 1890, probably about 1900. There were many companies that made porcelain in Austria, particularly in the area around Carlsbad. Plates similar to this are selling in


the \$165 to \$185 range.

Q: Can you tell me anything about a 2-gallon stoneware crock?

It is marked "J.E. Norton, Bennington, VL," and is decorated in blue with a bird sitting on a branch.

A: The mark you describe was made about 1850-1860, Earlier Bennington stoneware was marked "L. Norton," later Bennington was marked "E & L.P. Norton."

Your crock probably would sell for at least \$1,000. You should have this verified by a local expert who can actually examine it.

Also popular among home exercise enthusiasts, says Merritt, are treadmills. And while the purchase price might seem a bit steep to some — they cost on the average betwen \$1,200 and \$4,500 — Merritt says that a treadmill is a convenient, easy-to-use and much sought after piece of equipment.

"You just set the pace and go," he says. "People do it everywhere. And a treadmill is quiet enough while in operation so that you can put it in front of the television or what have you and still be able to hear above the treadmill."

On an added note, Merritt says that when purchasing a treadmill, the customer should be sure the width of the treadmill belt is wide enough for one's particular pace and step. "You don't want to have to be looking at your feet constantly to make sure you stay on the belt," Merritt says.

For people who are seeking a somewhat newer twist on a traditional piece of equipment, some of the ever-popular stationary bicycles are designed with added fea-

tures for those who need a little extra motivation. With price tags that edge up past the \$2,000 mark. some of the fancier models come equipped with screens whereby the exerciser can experience simulated roadway with changing scenery while pedaling. Or, one can record his or her speed and distance with a special memory feature that lets one set-up pseudo races or competitions.

"Of course, the work-out is the same no matter what features and exercise bike might have. The added features are just a bit more of a motivator. You can make it as easy or as difficult as you want to,"

Merritt says. Jim Kirchoss, who manages another of Novi's home exercise equipment shops, The Procycle Center, says his market focuses on low-impact equipment. While stair climbers and Air Resistance Ergometers (rowing and pedaling machines) are hot sellers at his store, Kirchoss says he also sees a

fair demand for ankle weight sets, chest expanders, jump ropes and other "easy-on-the body" type exer-

cise aids. "We even sell Recumbant Bicycles which can be used in a reclining position," Kirchoss says. You could lay down and eat chips while exercising, if you wanted to."

On a more serious note, Kir. choss says that people's interest in health and fitness is indeed on the upswing, but time constraints and noncommital attitudes often get in the way.

"You have to make that time commitment — decide when to exercise and then make the time. That's the bottom line," says Kirchoss.

He says that those who choose to exercise at home usually have no one there pushing them to set and achieve a fitness goal, which can really be a detriment.

"You need to set a goal and work toward obtaining that goal," he says. "You need to have a reason to exercise - of course, health is the best reason.

You must be realistic in what you hope to achieve as far as fitness goes. You can't expect to be in the same shape you were at age 20 after a few weeks of exercising."





Getting under a squeaky floor problem

Q: We have wall-to-wall carpeting throughout our home. However, In some areas the floor makes a noise when we walk on It.

is there some way to eliminate these squeaky noises without removing the carpeting?-F.J.S

A: Squeaky wooden floors can be relatively easy to fix. Whether or not you will be able to fix the problem without removing the carpeting will depend on your access to the flooring construction from below.

If the floor is open underneath (as with an unfinished basement ceiling), then it is easier and more effective to work from below. Typical suspended wood floors are supported by beams called joists. These are usually spaced 16 inches apart.

Running across the joists is the

subflooring, which can be made of lumber of plywood sheets. On top of this is the finished wood floor, and these boards are nailed or screwed into subfloor.

Squeaks result when two loose floorboards are stepped on and rub together. A common cause of squeaks is loose subflooring that has dried out or warped and has pulled away from the joist.

This may be your problem if you have carpet installed over subflooring rather than over a finished wood floor (a common practice in today's construction). Have a helper walk on the floor above, while you stay below and try to find the squeak. Look for any movement in the subflooring.

The loose subflooring will most likely be near or directly over a joist. To fill the gap between the subfloor and the joist, drive a thin wedge of wood (cut from a wooden shingle)

into the space. The wedge will eliminate movement in the subflooring which causes the squeak.

If a board for the finished floor has come loose, this can also be fixed from below. To tighten the board back into the subflooring, drive 114 -inch wood screws up through the subfloor and into the board.

Have someone stand on the loose board so it is held down tightly while the screw is going in. Don't use a screw that will go all the way through the finished floor.

If the ceiling below the floor is fin-ished, you will have to remove the carpeting and do repairs from above. A loose floorboard can be nailed back into subflooring with finishing nails.

Have a helper assist you by walking around on the floor while you watch for the loose board and listen for the squeak. Hammer two nails in at an angle crossing each other, so nails a much better grip than if they were driven in straight.

The nails should be spaced an inch or two apart. Hammer the nails most of the way in; then use a nail to countersink the nailheads.

When a floorboard is badly buckled, it is better to secure it with long wood screws, as this pulls the flooring and subflooring together more effectively.

Drill pilot holes; then drive in the screws so they are toenailed, and countersink the heads. The pilot holes prevent splits. Once the screws are countersunk, fill the holes with plastic wood.

A loose subfloor can be tightened using the same technique, but in this case the nails or screws must be driven into the joist. A simple way to locate a joist is to use a block of wood

that they form a V. This technique is and a hammer, and tap along the called toenailing, and it gives the surface of the floor. The sound will be dull and hollow; when it sounds more solid, you are over a joist.

After locating the joist nearest to the loose subfloor, drive in nails or screws as described above. When finished with floor repair, simply restretch and retack the carpeting to the wood carpet strips.

Q: When we repainted our kitchen, the painters were careless and dripped latex paint on the Formica counter top and splash boards. It has dried, and I have been unable to remove it.

Do you know any of product that will remove these unsightly dried paint spots?--S.F.

A: There are two products on the market recommended for the removal of dried paint.

Goof Off from Atlanta Sundries,

6480 Chupp Road, Lithonia, GA 30058, is available in a 4- and 6-ounce can and a 7-ounce spray can.

Klean-Clean also is effective in removing dried paint splatters. It comes in pint, quart and gallon sizes, 7-ounce aerosol can and a 4-ounce flip-top can and is available at hardware stores or from Klean-Strip, Box 1879, Memphis, TN 38101.

Both cleaners also are effective in the removal of other types of stains (gum, glue, lipstick, crayon, etc.) It's a good idea to test any product of this type in an inconspicuous area to make sure that it does not mar or damage the finish of the surface you are trying to clean.

Assisting a teacher in a classroom of nine developmentally impaired girls for three hours one morning a week at Our Lady of Providence Center in Northville is a volunteering activity which, Sharon Lineman said, is filling a need in herself.

Chronologically, the girls range in age from 6 to 26. Developmentally, they could be 6 to 8, maybe 10.

They have a variety of ailments, she said, some of which are Down Syndrome, autism, muscular dystrophy, and head injuries.

Most of them have a home or foster home to which they go every two weeks for a weekend. The rest of the time they live, study, and play at the Center.

When they reach their maximum academic level and "if they're competent enough," Lineman said, they're put into situations of usefulness.

Some will go into the workshop and help fulfill contracts the Center has - for example,

filling plastic bags with knife, fork, and spoon sets for catering services.

Other girls, Lineman said, may be sent to work in restaurant kitchens or with household cleaning services.

"Exactly what do I do?" asked Lineman. "As a teacher's aid, I talk with the girls, assist in penmanship, English, and reading. And I grade papers. I'm freeing the teacher so she can spend more time with individual girls."

One thing, Lineman stressed, is the importance of her giving attention impartially.

These girls have had so much rejection that I can't give more time to one than to another because they would think I liked her better than the others.

This volunteering," Lineman said, "has given me a totally different outlook. I've become more compassionate. And I'm doing something for myself. I'm giving aid to someone." For more information on this and other vol-

Poor women. Leafing through the the various popular, glossy magazines I am struck by the difference between men's and women's fashions. Theirs say "comfortable." Ours say "ouch."

So, why do we do it?

As I stood talking to a shoe store salesman, I discovered why we would fight against what is a natural human instinct - the avoidance of pain. As he spoke to me of the new, "exceedingly-comfortable", moderate-height heels he claims his store sells, he unwittingly revealed the reason women give in to wearing painful, hard to walk in high heels that study after study has shown to be detrimental not only to our feet. but also our legs and backs.

They (the new shoes) have really re established that a woman can look feminine and still work on her feet all day," he was pleased to tell me.

First of all I would disagree with the definition of femininity as being "one who wears high-heels."

Luckily in this world of modern medical miracles there are corrective measures available for those women who buy into the often painful preferences for those defining high-fashion items.

For the feet: If the high-heeled pump and the characteristic narrow, pointed tip have prompted the onset of toe corns the size of ball bearings, relax. There is relief.

For the weak-kneed, temporary help can be found in a store-bought corn file if, perhaps, a last minute summer date requires a baresandalled foot. A couple of hours in a hot bath will soften the dead skin enough so it peels off like the skin of an orange as the sandpaper file rolls over the conspicuous lump. Remember not to wear toenail polish, as this only draws unwanted attention to unsightly feet.

Sadly, however, the corn file is only a temporary remedy to alleviate minor symptoms of a deeper problem --- the narrow, pointed vise-like shoe and its consequences. Corns can be controlled by frequent filings but will continue to reappear until the source of irritation has been vanquished. Similarly, many other manifestations of illfitting shoes - hammer toes, ingrown toenails, bunions - are corrected through shoe style changes or more severely, medical attention.

When Steven Schleuder was four months old he weighed 16 pounds, four ounces. Seven months later, he weighed exactly the same

"Finally I looked at the kid and knew something was wrong," said his mother, Terri Schleuder of Novi. "The child looked like a concentration camp victim."

Little Steven went almost a year without gaining any height or weight before the family's frequent trips to numerous doctors' offices provided them with any answers.

Steven was diagnosed as having a rare disease known as cystinosis, which affects no more than 300 people, mainly children, nationwide.

The most critical organ affected by the disease is the kidney. A normal functioning kidney is respon-sible for filtering waste out of the blood as well as re-absorbing the "clean" fluid after filtration. A cystinosis-affected kidney is unable to perform the crucial function of taking back necessary nutrient-filled fluids. As a result the child loses water, salt and other nutrients important to proper body functioning which eventually have to be replaced.

One of the main side effects of cystinosis is chronic dehydration and the constant need to replenish the body's water supply.

"At nine months old Steven was waking up four and five times a night to drink lots of water," said Terri Schleuder.

Now, 28-month-old, 22-pound Steven is never without his 36-ounce plastic Little Caesar's water container which his mother says he "downs every three-four hours."

Because the disease causes many of the nutrients important to the body's functioning to be washed out with the water, child-

The Schleuder family recently returned from the sixth annual Cystinosis Conference in Washington, D.C., where they talked about shared experiences with other families and the few doctors that specialize in the treatment.

Additionally, the Schleuders turned their brief visit into a first legislative lobbying attempt when they met with U.S. Rep. William Broomfield, R-Birmingham, to urge him to vote for continued funding of the Orphan Drug Act, a little-known law on which families like theirs depend enormously. This law provides economic incentives for drug companies that research rare-disease drugs.

"Steven wouldn't be here if it wasn't for orphan (rare disease) drugs," said Terri. "And the only hope for Steven to have a normal life is continued research."

Steven relies on five different drugs, which his parents give him daily through a chest tube. The price tag for just one of the five critical medicines is \$6,000 every year.

"If it wasn't for insurance, we would be bankrupt," Carl said.

Terri Schleuder, who is a nurse. remembers the frustration of not knowing how to help him as she traveled from doctor to specialist and back again, each time receiving a different diagnosis.

"We don't fault the doctors," Terri said. "It is just so difficult because we know so much more about the disease than most of the doctors do.

"We just hope it becomes a more recognizable disease.







Goin' north

Fort Clapsop memorializes Lewis and Clark expedition

In high wind, 31 men, one woman, one baby and one Newfoundland dog fled the tides and storms of the Pacific Ocean, looking for a calmer place to camp

Making their way along the Columbia River in five dugout canoes. they turned in to a smaller path of water. Soon they beached their boats

on the edge of a dense forest. Tall Douglas fir trees rose above them, along with Grand fir, Sitka spruce, Western Red Cedar, Mountain Hemlock and Red Adler.

In spring, summer or fall, sunlight would slice through the branches the of these trees and the forest would be blossoming and protective. But this sodden crew, members of the Lewis and Clark expedition, arrived in December 1805, in the cold, dampness of winter when the woods are like a rain forest with water dripping from every limb.

The early 19th century Lewis and Clark crew were sent by President Thomas Jefferson to explore unclaimed and unknown parts of the northwest. The presence of Ameri-cans was believed to help establish a United States claim to the territory.

Located on the northwest corner of Oregon near the Columbia River and four miles from the Pacific Ocean, the 125-acre property, originally settled upon by the Lewis and Clark crew is now called Fort Clatsop National Memorial. Owned by the federal government, it is administered by the National Park Service, which in 1989

welcomed approximately 207,000 people. The name, Fort Clatsop, was cho-

Indians. Captain William Clark were the leaders of the Northwest expedition. They admired each other's abilities and were longtime friends. Clark named

Once the explorers left the forest in March 1806 to return home, their fort gradually deteriorated and disappeared. Small efforts to memorialize the site were made in the 19th and early 20th centuries.

But success did not come until 1955, the year of the Lewis and Clark Sesquicentennial. Groups from the nearby port city of Astoria, Ore., joined with the Oregon Historical Society to build a replica of the original fort. Three Finnish carpenters from Astoria are credited with the actual construction.

Other areas of interest near Fort Clatsop include the city of Astoria, the first permanent settlement in the U.S. west of the Rockies. In 1811, it was a busy fur trading center. The city boasts the first port for ships entering the Columbia River, a Maritime Museum and three other museums celebrating the town's history. Charter fishing is available, and the nearby deactivated Fort Stevens is now a state park.

South of Fort Clatsop is the town of Seaside, where a replica of the salt works used by the explorers can be seen.

scenic Columbia Gorge drive should not be missed and anyone who enjoys the sight of ocean water crashing against rocks or rolling in on smooth eaches will want to take a drive along the Oregon Coast. All beaches are public and camping places are available in the area.

The coast is very popular so tourists should make reservations by writing, calling or visiting the Chamber of Commerce in cities along the coast.

These events take place on veekends in late spring, and daily through Labor Day.

Driving into the Fort Clatsop National Memorial, the first building in sight is the Visitor Center, which is being expanded this year to triple its size. It features audio-visual material on the expedition, wall maps, memorabilia and a bronze statue which includes Lewis and Clark, a Clatsop Indian and Lewis' dog, Seaman.

Members of the staff, clothed in buckskin, are ready to take visitors back to the winter of 1805-1806. Visitors participate in candle making,

sewing hides and lighting fires with flint and steel. They also try their hand at five ways to make buckskin resist water and other crafts.

And the staff will break the silence of the woods by demonstrating muzzle loading rifles.

Dugout canoes like those used by explorers can be viewed by fort visitors at the edge of a small river now named for Lewis and Clark. The interpretive staff sometimes take the heavy 35-foot boats into the water. To maneuver them they need at least five strong paddlers.

It's a short walk under calming, stately trees to the main entrance of the 50-square-foot Fort Clatsop. It sits snugly under a canopy of Sitka Spruce. In recreating the fort, carpenters followed a rough sketch of the stockade made by Clark on the cover of his field book.

An American flag with 17 stars hangs on a pole in the small parade ground between the two sections of the fort. Fortunately, the advantage of the new fort today is the absence of troublesome fleas that used to drive

the explorers crazy.

On the left are three attached log cabins, each with a crude fireplace and double decker bunks for the men of the U.S. Army Corps of Discovery. Almost all members of the outfit were soldiers. On the right are four attached cabins.

In the rear cabin is a cookhouse and store room. Next is the room used by men on guard duty. Clark's black slave, York, is believed to have bunked there.

York was Clark's boyhood companion on Clark family farms in Virginia and Kentucky. Clark took him on the difficult journey because he was strong, tall and a hard worker. Little did he guess that York's contribution to the expedition would be more than work. Many Indian nations became so fascinated with him that the outfit was generally wel-comed. Time and time again he patiently endured their washing his skin to remove the blackness. When they failed, some decided he was Big Medicine, a person to respect.

For the explorers, activities of the

winter included exploring the area. and constantly bargaining with the Indians. They also buckled down to the difficult task of scraping, stretching and rubbing elk skins. They saw to it that their clothing was fringed. Dan Dattilo, park service supervisor of the fort living history program. recently wrote a book on the fort, entitled, "Fort Clatsop - The Story Behind the Scenery."

Dattilio reported buckskin was edged with fringe because rain would run down the garment to the end of the cloth, then body movements of the wearer would "cast off the droplets."

By March 1806, the travelers were eager to start home. Their store of food was little, but they were able to make 338 pairs of moccasins during their stay. Before they left they gave their fort to the chief of the Clatsop Indians. Then they loaded their supplies into the canoes and paddled up the Columbia River toward home.

In 1859, some 53 years later. Oregon became a state and Thomas Jefferson's hopes were realized.

<u>)ne-day getaways</u> **KIBLAT** shows way

for devout Muslims

The first time I saw the sign it was inside a bureau drawer in the Rasa Sayang Hotel, one of several beautiful high-rise beach hotels in Penang.

Penang is an island connected by bridge and ferry to the northwest coast of Malaysia, on the southernmost peninsula of southcast Asia.

The sign was one word: KIBLAT. It was printed inside the outline of an arrow that pointed towards the rear corner of the drawer. Malaysia is a Muslim country, but it has large minorities of many religious persuasions, so we had been taking our shoes off all day: to enter the state mosque, to climb the hill to the Pagoda of Ten Thousand Buddhas, to creep into the Snake Temple and to admire the 100-foot-long Reclining Buddha. The second time I saw the sign

was on the ceiling of our room in the Perdana Hotel in Kota Bahru, across the peninsula on the South China Sea. We had photographed Malay fishermen pulling colorful boats through the surf on to a wide sand beach, watched the top spinners, the drummers and the Kelantan dancers, before falling into bed, so I didn't actually see the sign until I was flat on my back, ready to turn out the light.

The same word: KIBLAT. The same boxed arrow. Only this time it was on the ceiling of our hotel room, pointing towards the corner."It must be something to do with electricity or fire escapes," I said.

Malaysia is a small country, but we spent a lot of time traveling from one place to another aboard Malaysian Air Lines, so the mystery wasn't solved until we reached the capital city of Kuala Lumpur.

Our guide, Anuar Haji Abdul Hamid, took us for a walking tour around the minarets and domes of Masjid Jame, the public mosque, built on the very spot where Kuala Lumpur was founded centuries ago at the junction of the Klang and Gombak rivers. It is a simple but beautiful place of worship, no walls, just traditional Moorish arches looped above a large marble floor.

Why are the men stretched out all over the floor?" somebody asked. They look like they're napping."

"Muslims must pray five times a day," Anuar said. "Today is Sunday, these men don't have to work and they are waiting for the next prayer.

"Do they pray facing to the east?"

They face the holy city of Mecca," Anuar said.

The Saudi Arabian city of Mecca is the birthplace of Mohammed and the spiritual center of Islam. American Muslims need only face east to face Mecca, but Mecca is north and probably west of Kuala Lumpur.

The question kept nagging at me as we photographed the mosque, the old colonial buildings of Kuala Lumpur, the war memorial high above the Lake Gardens. How does a devout Muslim know the direction of Mecca when he travels?

It was a rhetorical question, long forgotten by the time we checked into the Hyatt Saujana Hotel and Country Club, eager to leap into the swimming pool. I pulled a stack of clothes out of my suitcase, opened a bureau drawer and there it was: KIBLAT. And an arrow pointing nowhere.

By that time I had bought a Malay-English dictionary. I dug it out of the bottom of my carry-on luggage and flipped through to the letter "K."

"Kiblat, Here it is," I said. "You're not going to believe this!"

"What does it mean," Micky asked.

"It means 'the direction of Mecca.

Most hikers and campers already know about the detailed U.S. Geological Survey maps that provide a close look at a small area

Folks just looking for a park to visit or a scenic attraction may want something less detailed but providing a wide range of possibilities. The government has four maps that may be helpful, all available from the Consumer Information Center, Pueblo, Colo., 81009.

The first is a National Park System map covering the whole country and

(AP) - If outdoor adventure is on showing the locations of national parks, battlefields, historic sites, monuments, lakeshores, preserves, riverways, recreation areas, scenic rivers and parkways. This map allows for quick location of National Park Service facilities in any part of the country. And on the back it lists them by state with a guide to facilities available, such as visitors centers, tours, campgrounds, museums and whether there is a fee. The National Park System Map and Guide sells for \$1.25. Ask for item number 150W. A second helpful map is National

Wildlife Refuges. Also a national map, it shows the location of national wildlife refuges across the country.

The back of the map lists them by state, along with information on the best seasons to visit and the activities allowed and banned in the particular location. Hunting, fishing, camping, swimming, picnicking and other such pastimes are allowed in some refuges but limited or banned in others. Checking the chart will allow visitors to be aware in advance.

The National Wildlife Refuge map costs \$1. It is item number 152W.

Folks interested in the Western states may also be interested in the Recreation Guide to BLM Public Lands. The Bureau of Land Management maintains large areas in the West, and these regions are illus-

trated on the map, including the locations of campgrounds

The back of the map isn't as detailed as the other two, but it does include a description of the BLM properties in each state and a list of offices that would-be visitors can contact for more detail about specific locations.

The BLM map costs \$1.50 and is item 153W.

A Guide to Your National Forests is the fourth map being offered, showing the locations of each national forest along with addresses and phone numbers of information offices. That map costs \$1 and it is item 166W.





Kaley also earned all-division honors in the Western Lakes Activities Association.







Faletti reflects on satisfying season

It would not be very difficult to make a convincing argument that the Northville boys track squad had it's best season in 13 years this spring.

After all, 1977 was the last time the Mustangs boasted a winning dual meet record — that is until Coach Dennis Faletti led his squad to a 5-3 mark this year (3-2 in the WLAA).

That was a very big goal we ac-complished," Faletti said. "We really wanted it last year, but we wound up 4-4, so we had even more incentive. This program was used to winning one meet a year, but we've changed that."

Faletti looks at milestones - like winning seasons — as just another step toward building a quality program.

"Now that we have a fairly good program, we can attract potential athletes," he said. "When you win one meet a season, it's hard to get kids to come out for the team."

One of the key highlights of the season came in the 400-meter relay at the MHSAA Regional Meet. The team of Noel Korowin, Matt Hemp, Jamie Miller and Neil White shattered the existing school record in the event with a 45.1 effort. The old mark of 45.3 was set back in 1975.

At that regional meet, Miller and John Okasinski qualified for the state meet in the long jump and pole vault respectively. For Miller, it was the high point of a surprising sophomore season that saw him consistently breaking the 20-foot barrier.

Jamie is just a 10th grader, so I was real happy with his season." Faletti said. "With the way he's per-

forming, it's going to be nice to have

him back for two more seasons." Okasinski was part of an impressive 1-2 punch in the pole vault, along with fellow senior Aaron Wiseley. They both cleared 11'-6" during the season, and it was supposed to be a down year in that event.

"We lost Shawn Steakweather to graduation, and we really didn't have anybody to fill in." Faletti explained. "So I plucked Okasinski and Wiseley from the distance runners and they performed very well."

Down the stretch, Northville had impressive performances at the regionals and against Farmington Harrison in the final dual meet that ultimately gave the team the winning campaign. But a disappointing outing at the Western Lakes Meet and lackluster performances by Miller and Okasinski at the state meet took a little lustre off the season.

With a top-half finish in mind, the Mustangs only managed to place 10th at the 12-team WLAA Meet. But the team was without injured high jumper Chris Lehr, who is also a key relay performer. Then three days later. Miller barely reached 19'-0" in the long jump at the state meet (his season-best was 20'-774 ") and Okasinski failed to clear opening height in the pole vault.

"We had more depth this year and we seemed to have a few quality performers in each event," Faletti said. comment.

"As a team, it all came together near the end of the season, but we couldn't keep it going."

With seniors like White, Jon Meek, Wiseley and Okasinski on the squad, Faletti will again have to do some scrambling in the pole vault and in the relays for next season, but he likes the returning group.

"Looking at my team and seeing who is coming back. I think we'll have an extremely good dual meet team next year," he said. "Two years down the road, I think we'll be a good team at multi-team invitationals."

Faletti is very proud of his team's performance in the classroom as well. The Mustangs, as a team, have a 3.02 grade point average.

GIRLS TRACK WRAP-UP: The Mustang girls tracksters haven't had a winning season since Cindy Pano-wicz led Northville to second place in the WLAA back in 1985.

With a 2-6 overall record, 1-5 mark in the WLAA and an 11th place finish in the 12-team conference, the 1990 Mustangs fit right in with the previous three teams of the late 80s. From '86 to the present, the Northville program has an anemic 8-37 dual meet record.

But with young talented performers like Trish Lukomski (So.), Ris Fleming (So.), Kendra Huard (Jr.), Lisa Aimone (So.), Julie Buser (So.), Mari Kissenger (So.) and Angle Tune (So.), the future looks bright.

As a pitcher, he went 8-3 with a 4.12 ERA. His other numbers include 59 strikeouts, 58 hits and 17 walks in 54% innings.


SCOTT ARMSTRONG, Milford, outfielder: This senior center fielder, best known for his basketball ability, is making his third appearance on the all-area team.

Hydro-Toning: wave of future

First imagine burning calories. Then imagine burning calories while developing all four components of physical fitness: that is, improving flexibility, converting fat to muscle, working the cardiovascular, and developing muscles, strength and endurance.

And then imagine burning calories without sweating, without boredom and without the aches and pains of most high-impact workouts.

Interested? If so, catch "the wave of the future."

That wave is Hydro-Toning, a lowimpact aquatic workout that utilizes and amplifies the natural resistance of water.

"You don't have the impact you have in land exercises," said Lavon Cook, who teaches aquatic exercise for the Troy-based Fitness Forum Unlimited. "You basically get a better workout in the water because of the resistance."

Cook was observing a demonstration Hydro-Toning class at the Oak-land Community College Orchard Ridge campus.

Tom McPhillips, OCC professor of physical education, introduced the program at the school in the winter of 1989. Now, the school offers both credit and non-credit courses in Hydro-Toning.

Exercisers are required to don Hvdro-Boots and hand-held Hydro-Bells, both of which are designed to increase resistance in the water.

The footwear somewhat resembles ski boots, while the two Hydro-Bells don't closely or remotely resemble anything.

In the deep end, the exercisers, supported by buoys, used only the boots but wore both devices in shallow water.

Symptoms, treatment for angina explained

An episode of chest pain can be very frightening. Chest pain may be caused by many body systems, including the respiratory system, the muscular system, the digestive system and the cardiovascular system. When chest pain is caused by the cardiovascular system, it is called angina.

Angina is a temporary chest pressure, tightness or pain caused by a reduction in blood flow through the coronary arteries. This results in a reduction of oxygen to the heart muscle and causes the pain.

Sometimes the pain radiates to the neck, the arms or the back. It frequently is triggered by exertion, emo-

tional stress or exposure to cold temperatures.

Classic angina occurs with coronary artery disease or arteriosclerosis, commonly called hardening of the arteries. This hardening causes a loss of elasticity and it happens gradually throughout a lifetime.

Arteries can also become narrowed or clogged with fatty deposits. When a considerable portion of an artery is blocked, angina may occur.

Treatment for angina uses a combination of lifestyle changes and drugs. Many episodes of angina will subside with resting until it passes.

Long-term treatment includes weight reduction to an ideal body weight for height, cessation of nicotine and alcohol habits, an exercise program with medical guidance and

relaxation techniques for stress reduction

The two classes of drugs used to treat angina are nitrates and betablockers

Nitrates may be used in three different forms. They may be used under the tongue, as a long-acting pill to prevent the episodes of angina or as a chest patch in either an ointment or slow-release disc to prevent or relieve an attack of angina.

Another class includes betablockers which help prevent attacks by slowing the heart rate and lowering the amount of oxygen the heart muscle needs by reducing its workload.


If angina is caused by a coronary spasm, a new class of drugs, calcium channel-blockers, may be effective.

Muscles require calcium for constriction; if calcium is reduced in the coronary vessel walls, spasms may be prevented.

Coronary bypass surgery or balloon angioplasty may be recommended in some patients. Many factors enter into this decision.

No single treatment works well for all people. Treatments must be evaluated by individual physicians and monitored closely for effectiveness.

The story is set in 1947 Los Angeles and Toontown, where humans and cartoon characters work side by side. The stuttering Roger Rabbit, a Toon as they're commonly called, is framed for murder, and a down-on-his-luck gumshoe (Bob Hoskins) is reluctantly drawn into the scandal.

Watch for "special appearances" by animated stars such as Bugs Bunny, Dumbo, Mickey Mouse, Yosemite Sam, Betty Boop, Tweety Bird, Goofy, Porky Pig and many others.

The story is straight from a '40s detective dime-store novel, but the creation took all the ingenuity its makers could muster.

The costly, \$45 million film received four Academy Awards, including the 1988 Special Achievement Oscar for Animation Direction.

The unusual blend of real actors and animated cartoon characters, occupying the same space and time in a three-dimensional format, presented almost insurmountable problems.


The film had to achieve a new reality, to blend the human and cartoon worlds so that the Toons would appear naturally in the scenes, not painted onto them. It's been done before in memorable moments in Mary Poppins and Song Of The South, but the challenge was to sustain the interaction for an entire picture.


It required a Los Angeles and London animation crew of 326 people, who painstakingly painted all of the 82,080 live-action frames. The film required more than 1,035 optical illusions, the equivalent of 10 special effects feature films.

Putting aside all the technical wizardry, this entertaining film can be enjoyed by both parents and kids.


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
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We have so far concentrated on introducing community television to the general

SAMOUELIAN public. The fact is that the community service of community access television may begin and end through governmental television. Please, read on for I know how ominous this sounds.

I have worked in and around local government for fifteen years. The length of time represents my commitment to the understanding that it really is at a local level where the differences are made. Local government is becoming ever more responsive to the individual. If you never venture down to city or township hall then you may feel alienated. However, just walk through those doors and your views will change. The formula to making change is to become involved. Your opinion will have more authority if your involvement entails more than just showing up to complain.

Over the past few years all types of government have shown a growing level of sophistication in communications by bringing on board community outreach staff and public relations professionals who recognize the need to reach the general public. Television is the 'power punch!' But with community television, we have to initiate all the action and productions ourselves. This is why it takes so much time developing the fine art of community television. One of the first signs that government is receptive to the option of the Television Channel is through the Government Alphanumeric Channel where the announcements are typed upon the screen. In the Canton, Plymouth and Northville Area this is Channel 10. In the Farmington, Novi and Farmington Hills area

this is Channel 18. Council meetings may also be seen on these Channels. (In the C, P, N, it is Ch. 15)

Through the Cable Contracts with local governments, moneys are available to develop a city or township cable television department if the municipality so chooses.

The City of Farmington Hills has funded a cable TV department through their Special Services Department for the last five years. They have been under the guidance of Cable Coordinator David Teitmeyer, producing twenty shows the first year (1985) and growing to 100 shows in 1989! David works very closely with all the city department heads. The City Public Relations person, Ester Frank, also works very closely with the television medium. David, reflecting on city television, said, "Video is there. Everyone is now very accepting of our presence." Ester Franks commented on the "sense of openess one feels on whatever goes on within the city." Both David and Ester emphasize how closely the city staff and the residents and city council work together on all projects. The television shows reflect such efforts.

To better understand what a city television department offers let's explore the programs which have been seen in Farmington Hills.

Viewpoint has so far produced 105 shows. It is taped twice a month. It highlights what is happening in Farmington Hills. City Manager William Costick and the Current Mayor Jean Fox host the shows. Past Mayors Jan Dolan and Terry Sever have also hosted. The subject matter stays within the confines of that which affects and is affected by City Hall. Seniors, the show provides local, state, and national news. Co-Hosted by Loretta Conway and Maggie Loridas of the Senior Adult division of the Department of Special Services, this lively and lovely pair captivate the Senior Audiences with a truly thought-provoking and entertaining show. They feature a Volunteer of the Month as well as highlighting the Senior Adult Center at Mercy Center.

Horizons is a monthly on-location program featuring some fascinating residents of Farmington Hills. Ester Frank is coproducer with David Teitmeyer and also hosts the program. David's creative eye captures the surrounding environment to enhance the subject matter. People and subjects have been: Jean Fox, an Historical perspective; Astronaut Sharon Newman; Medical Anthropologist, Phillip Singer on 'Ways We Go About Healing.'; Father Pat with his view of 'Times of Today'; Maskey Burnstein Ph.D. a view of the movies as in Irish Movies; and Floyd Cairns, 'Go with the Flow', join rather than fight.

Features are programs which dedicate an entire program to foster a better understanding of a city project.

These are only an example of the ways a city television department can create a better bond with the citizenry. David Tietmeyer says that their efforts are building a time capsule which will be an historical and accurate view of the city. May I encourage you as the NIKE commercial does, "JUST DO IT" !!! Your involvement may be as simple as just asking the first question of your city or township officials. Check with your city clerk to determine whether or not there is a Cable Committee or Commission established. What a wonderful feeling to be able to contribute to your community and be creative at the same time!



Prior to her current role on "Designing Women," Carter has been a regular in four series, cast as Aunt Marion in "Out Of The Blue," flip copywriter April Baxter in "On Our Own," TV show host Maggie Drummond in 'Diff'rent Strokes" and Carlotta Beck in "Filthy Rich." The latter began her association with Linda Bloodworth-Thomason, the creator and executive producer of "Designing Women."

In addition to television series, Carter has appeared in several made-for-TV movies as well, "Ohms" and "The Killing Of Randy Webster." While making that movie in 1981, she met Hal Holbrook, who she married in April of 1984. The two have appeared together on an episode of "Designing Women" and in TV ads.

When she is not acting, her interests include her family, and of course, singing. She has developed her own cabaret act which she presents at supper clubs across the country.

"Since I was a little girl. whenever I sing, the audience is the other participant," she said, explaining, "If I do my show right, they go right along with me — everybody knows the feelings of all the songs I sing."





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

What does he do for a living when he's not acting? Any and all information on this intriguing, mysterious gentleman will be appreciated. -Victoria Ross, Chino Valley, Ariz.

A: Kabir Bedi was born in 1944, the son of an Indian father and an English mother, in Lahore at a time of great conflict in India. His family moved to Kashmir and then to Delhi, with Kabir attending many different schools. His desire to act was nurtured in his teens at Sherwood College, a mini-British public school in the Himalayas. His interest in acting continued through his college years at St. Stephens, Delhi. He supported himself through college by working for radio and TV stationsannouncing, interviewing and doing quiz programs. After graduating with an honors degree in history, his natural acting talent and good looks led him to become India's highest paid and most widely known male model. In 1970 he was offered the starring role in the Bombay Theatre Group's production of Tughalq, which opened the door to the Indian film industry for Bedi. He made his American television debut in the 1978 NBC special The Thief Of Baghdad. He continues to make his home in Los Angeles and frequently guest stars on TV series.
