Man arrested in assault on wife

A Northville man charged with felonious assault against his wife remained in Wayne County Jail Friday.

The couple was separated at the time of the alleged attack.

The man broke into the couple's home Sept. 4 and confronted his wife in the living room. She told city police. He reportedly accused her of lying about him, pulled her off the couch and twisted her arm behind her back, and held a knife against her stomach before handing it to her.

The man then told her to kill him, she said, before he ran out of the house.

City police arrived shortly thereafter in response to a 911 call from one of the couple's two children. Police took the fishing knife with a seven-inch blade reportedly used in the attack as evidence.

The woman had small amounts of blood on her blouse and arm, but she was apparently not cut during the attack.

The woman, fearing for her safety, left the house with her two children that night. When she moved back in Sept. 11, city police found the man sleeping under a basement stairwell in the deserted home. He was arrested and lodged at the city police station.

Police also found the clothes reportedly worn by the man during the attack when they searched the

house Sept. 11. The clothes were "extremely soiled with blood," according to the police report, but it was unclear whose blood it was.

City police interviewed the man the following morning. He admitted breaking into the house, but said he never touched his wife other than to hand her the knife. He could not explain where he received a cut to his thumb.

The man was arraigned Sept. 12 in front of Judge John MacDonald of the 35th District Court. MacDonald set bail at \$4,000 cash, and forbade the man from going near the family, their home or businesses.

A preliminary examination will be held on the case Oct. 5 at 35th District Court.

County land sale is ready to move ahead

A Wayne County Commission subcommittee Thursday recommended approval of a purchase contract between the county and the proposed developer of 926 acres of county-owned land in Northville Township.

The subcommittee's action clears the way for a commission "committee of the whole" review of a proposed \$31.75-million cash deal between Wayne County and the Huntington Falls Limited Partnership development team headed by Northville Township resident Robert DeMattia.

The Committee of the Whole will meet Tuesday afternoon at 2 p.m. If the committee agrees with the subcommittee's recommendation, the proposal will go before the entire commission Thursday afternoon.

Wayne County Commissioner Susan Heintz, R-Northville, called the subcommittee decision "a significant step."

"The whole deal could be done next week," she said.

Thursday's meeting was the final step in an investigation of the county's protracted developer selec-

tion process. A development team ousted during a final-three cut had asked the county to research the process that eventually awarded the county land to the DeMattia team.

The committee found flaws in the selection process used by the county's Department of Jobs and Economic Development, but agreed

Storm blows past Northville area

The early stages of the Northville Victorian Festival got a little soggy Friday afternoon, but initial reports indicated that was about the worst the storm did in town.

Just up the road in Novi, however, a funnel cloud destroyed one house and damaged several others before moving on to inflict additional harm to the Novi Civic Center complex.

Friday began cloudy, but festival preparations were well under way by mid-morning. Several classes of Northville High School students toured the streets of downtown in period garb.

Afternoon brought rains, however — light at first, then heavier. Booths which had been set up were taken down; wares and pieces of art were put away.

At about 2 p.m. the two funnel clouds were sighted in the area. One, near M-14, did not touch down.

But in the Yorkshire Place subdivi-

sion — immediately northwest of Taft and Ten Mile roads — a home on Amherst Drive was destroyed. The four occupants of the house were not injured. (For more coverage of the storm damage in Novi, see pages 4 and 5.)

Initial reports from the Northville Township and City of Northville police departments reflected no serious damage locally due to the storm.

By late afternoon, the storm had passed through and the Victorian Festival was back on track. The trouble caused only a slight delay in Friday evening's main events, the opening parade and first performance by the Great Wallendas high-wire act.

The streets of downtown continued to be packed with festival-goers into the night, with people enjoying the food, music, costumes and atmosphere.

Weather for the rest of the weekend was expected to be much better.

Class size, money key strike issues

Every year we're faced with teacher strikes. You said you were president of a teacher union and as an administrator you negotiated from both sides of the table. Please share some observations of what occurs during school negotiations that many of us may not be aware of.

Both sides will bring what they believe are the 30 to 40 most critical education issues to the bargaining table. The closer a strike appears, the more the issue will narrow down to class size and money.

Teacher negotiators will be told by those teachers who have master's degrees that they spent considerable time and energy getting the degree and should be financially compensated for the effort.

Teachers with no master's degree will tell their negotiators that taking a couple of extra classes at some university doesn't make one a better teacher. Therefore the pay differential between a teacher with a master's degree and a teacher with a bachelor's degree should be minimal.

Teachers in districts where millage votes are failing, where there is no money, will go back to work without a contract. This is especially true in districts where salaries have been decent when money was available.

Most teachers, by late August, are ready for school and do not want to strike. Teacher union leaders don't want a strike but see it as their last and most powerful alternative.

Administrators and board don't want a strike and know, by law, it is illegal for teachers to strike. They also know judges are very reluctant to force teachers back to work. They know judges want to keep the disagreement in the school "family" and out of the court system.

Many elementary teachers would opt for a bit less money to get smaller class sizes. However, many teachers will opt for money rather than smaller class size. Especially those teachers with many years in the sys-

tem who know that their average salary for the last three years determines their retirement pay.

Most teachers have a master's degree. Few go on for an educational specialist or doctorate. Teachers' negotiations, therefore, will use the master's as a focal point for salary increases.

Nasty strikes tend to be shorter in very small districts. The Crestwood School District, a small district in Dearborn Heights, once fired its entire staff and hired new teachers. Nasty strikes in large districts can run longer because unions leaders know it is difficult to replace hundreds of staff members.

Some teachers and some board members will tend to circumvent their own bargaining team to resolve, in good faith, the conflict. Often this "white knight" approach fails.

In the early years of teacher negotiations (the '60s and '70s) many school districts gave up some of their management rights in lieu of giving money they didn't have. Management rights negotiated into teacher contracts during that period (i.e. seniority or bumping rights) are very difficult for management to recapture in the '90s.

Districts currently on strike will soon open. Many teachers will forget about the strike and go about their business. Some teachers will be bitter toward the administration which takes its direction from residents.

Students will want the strike to end. They want to see their classmates and continue their education. They sometimes feel like pawns and hostages in something most don't understand.

The state House of Representatives faces a controversial bill permitting schools to share property taxes on business countywide.

"We would hope you'd get around to statewide property tax sharing," Gerald Dunn, lobbyist for 10 western Wayne County school districts, told the House Education Committee.

But Dunn said his members "will not participate" in the voluntary plan, adding that the Livonia district opposes the measure.

Rick Simonson, lobbyist for Oakland Intermediate School District, said his 28 superintendents like the idea of tax base sharing but, for technical reasons, Oakland couldn't participate under the current bills.

The House Education Committee Tuesday recommended the bills — a victory for Michael Washburn, Forest Hills superintendent, who spoke on behalf of industry and 20 school districts in Kent County. Washburn is a former Garden City superintendent and Wayne-Westland principal.

Sponsor of the bills, committee chair William Keith, D-Garden City, said a dozen times that the measure is "permissive," that no one district would be forced to share business taxes, and that the plan could be adopted only by unanimous agreement of all school boards within an intermediate (county) district.

But opponent Lyn Banks, R-Livonia, said the Michigan Federation of Teachers union unveiled the hidden agenda by saying Kent County would be "a pilot project" for the rest of the state.

Added Washburn: "It (tax base sharing) wouldn't happen on a statewide basis without a

model."

To questions from lawmakers about whether districts with industrial tax bases would lose revenue, Washburn said, "There will be some losers in the short term, but in the long term there won't be."

Had the plan been in effect the last five years, Washburn said, Kent school districts would have closed much of the gap between poor districts, which spend \$2,500 per pupil, and his wealthy Forest Hills, which spends more than \$5,000.

"If we (the state) don't close the gap," Washburn said, "the courts will."

Keith's panel gave the bills 12-3 vote support. Voting yes were Keith; Justine Barnes, D-Westland; and James Kosteva, D-Canton.

Banks was joined in voting no by William Bryant, R-Grosse Pointe, and Ted Wallace, D-Detroit.

Action came Tuesday, opening day of a three-week fall session. The Kent County supporters hope for passage this year so they can implement the plan by July 1, 1991, the start of the next fiscal year.

The Grand Rapids Chamber of Commerce was joined by the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce in favoring the bills as equitable for all children in a region.

Keith's bills are among many legislative efforts to reduce the disparity in school revenue between poor districts, with \$2,000 or so per child, and rich ones, with up to \$8,000. Most of the highest spending districts in the metropolitan Detroit suburbs.

Under House Bills 5885 and 5886:

■ Growth in commercial and industrial property tax base could be shared countywide if every district agrees.

■ Agreement could be by vote of the school board or vote of the people. The agreement would last five years.

■ One district could kill the plan at any time.

■ Existing commercial and industrial property would be unaffected. The sharing plan could not apply to residential, farm or mining property.

■ A district receiving state aid could not lose any aid by joining a property tax base sharing plan.

■ Out-of-formula districts would have an incentive to join. Instead of losing categorical aid — as they do to the tune of \$72 million a year currently — they could continue to receive that aid. Keith was co-author of this year's law to increase the categorical aid "recapture."

Besides Kent County, Keith said, Midland, Eaton, Ingham and Jackson counties have expressed interest.

Several states — notably Kentucky and New Jersey — have been ordered by courts to equalize spending per pupil, resulting in major income, sales and property tax increases.

Grosse Pointe's Rep. Bryant said that if a court found Michigan's system unconstitutional, it could use Keith's bills as a vehicle to implement change.

Voting no, Bryant predicted, "The court will (1) take out the five-year time limit, (2) take out the ability of a district to get out and (3) make it statewide."

Banks said her Livonia district already has lost \$3.5 million through Keith's reductions in categorical aid. If the tax base sharing plan were ever forced on Livonia, the revenue loss would be \$32 million over four years, she said. The district's annual budget is about \$95 million.

Asian advantage lies in the home

Why do students in Far Eastern countries, such as Japan and Taiwan, consistently score higher than their American counterparts on achievement tests?

Cultural differences are a primary factor, according to Farmington Hills resident Paul Tai, professor of political science and director of the Asian Studies Program at the University of Detroit.

Tai directed a recent survey that compared the attitudes and behavior of Michigan residents and Taiwanese citizens concerning education.

Results showed that 46 percent of

the respondents in Taiwan spent at least five hours weekly helping their children with homework. That figure compares to 17 percent for Michigan residents who responded.

"Parents in the progressive Asian

countries place a great deal of emphasis on the importance of education from the time a child enters school," Tai said. "In general, they also devote more time than do American parents to helping their children

with homework."

"In that country's culture, most people would consider the student who works after school to be shirking his educational duties," the U-D professor said.

SEMCOG sees burden on Wixom

Wixom would bear the brunt of "unacceptable" peak hour traffic generated by Novi's Grand Plan, according to a Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) report on the industrial park slated for the Grand River Corridor.

With the analysis completed, the Novi City Council is scheduled to render a decision Sept. 26 on the rezoning needed to transplant industry from Grand River Avenue and Novi Road to a 300-acre site at Wixom, Napier and Twelve Mile roads. The relocation would clear the path for an old-fashioned downtown with commercial and office buildings. As part of the package, a Meijer store, with

the parking lot in Wixom, would be built at Wixom Road and Grand River.

The Grand Plan would make existing traffic worse, the SEMCOG study concluded. Hardest-hit would be northbound Wixom Road at the east-bound and west-bound ramps of I-96 and southbound Wixom Road at Grand River Avenue. The number of vehicles driving on the interchange at peak hours is expected to rise from 880 in 1985 to 1,200 in 1995 and 5,000 in 2005. In addition, congestion is expected to be critical on northbound Napier Road and southbound Twelve Mile Road, both at Grand River Avenue.

"I think the city (Wixom) is pleased with the results. It certainly has highlighted our concerns about the extent

of the improvements. We were happy with the recommendation that the communities get together and talk about it. It is our hope that the message will be received by the people of Novi," said Wixom City Manager William Barlow.

Wixom asked SEMCOG's regional clearinghouse review committee to conduct a regional impact analysis of the Grand Plan, but the members nixed this request, opting instead for a review of traffic studies commissioned by each of the municipalities. Both Wixom and Lyon Township officials have expressed strong reservations about the proposed industrial park.

SEMCOG's conclusions are nothing new, said Novi City Manager Edward Kriewall: "It's pretty much information we knew about before. There will be some long-range traffic concerns, but our position all along is that intersection will be updated. We're not really impacting that whole area more than any other development would. If it were mobile home zoning, it would be even worse."

Kriewall said that in the near future the city council would be asked to approve an application to the state Department of Commerce for a strategic planning grant to finance a Wixom/Novi traffic improvement program.

According to SEMCOG traffic analyst Carmine Palombo, the Wixom traffic analysis is more com-

prehensive than Novi's and should be used as a framework for future planning.

"They should all sit down and take a look at the improvements that should be needed and try and prioritize them," he said.

Both 1995 and 2005 projections concur that the traffic will worsen in the area whether the Grand Plan happens or not.

SEMCOG recommended additional traffic lanes on Wixom Road and Grand River and an upgrading of the Wixom Road/I-96 interchange, which is deemed the most serious traffic problem. The two cities have already split the costs for a study of improvements to the Beck Road/I-96 interchange.

SEMCOG planners suggested that Wixom and Novi work with the Oakland County Road Commission and the Michigan to develop the Beck interchange and offered to provide a 20-year traffic projection if federal funding is sought.

Barlow says he'd like to see a joint effort by the communities of Wixom, Novi, South Lyon, Lyon Township, Walled Lake and Commerce Township. He calls for a joint conceptual traffic design, which would include a plan on how state and federal funding could be won for the roadwork.

As Barlow sees it, Grand River Avenue and Wixom Road should be widened within two to three years after the project is initiated.

Tuesday blood drive should help shortage

The American Red Cross' recent announcement of a critical deficit in its blood bank has coordinator Gerry Stipp giving a competitive edge to Tuesday's Novi Community Blood Drive.

"I told the police and the fire department that the city hall and the DPW (department of public works) would challenge them as to what department will give the most blood. I told them we'd get the results published in the newspaper," said Stipp, who is also the city clerk.

Her target is to collect 160 pints of blood at city hall this year, 29 more than last year's total.

It's needed. Southeastern Michigan American Red Cross spokesperson Denise Morrow said that the current shortage is so severe that the chapter has been forced to tap its liver transplant reserve by 50 percent. The liver transplant procedure requires 100 pints per operation.

"We need 1,000 pints of blood per day for 65 southeast Michigan hospitals we service. For the past month, we've been getting 600 to

700 pints per day," she said.

Candidates typically wait two to three years for a donor liver to become available. Last week, Morrow said, two patients at Henry Ford Hospital had a chance for the operation but enough blood wasn't available locally.

"We didn't have it so we had to go to our Lansing reserves. Thank God, we were able to get all the blood we needed," she added. "We're still looking at a serious deficit for the next week."

In addition, when the blood supply runs low, elective surgery is sometimes cancelled. The type O-negative and O-positive blood inventory is dangerously low, Red Cross officials say.

The shortfall comes around the Labor Day weekend, when many would-be donors are on vacation or are getting ready for the new school year.

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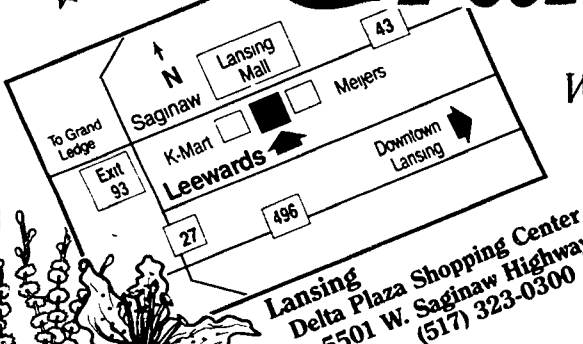

Funnel cloud hits Novi home

The National Weather Service reported Friday that the only tornado to touch down in Michigan hit the Livingston County town of Hartland.

Don't tell that to Novi residents. At about 2 p.m., a funnel cloud and high winds smashed into Linda and Randy Knockeart's wood and brick ranch at 45567 Amherst Drive at the corner of White Plains Drive in Yorkshir subdivision, shearing off the roof and crumbling the garage. The rear of the Colonial home next door was ravaged by the winds and eight other houses in Yorkshir and Simmons Orchard were lightly to moderately damaged.

Linda Knockeart, son Jimmy, 2, friend Cindy Vockler and her 20-month-old daughter were in the home at the time, but were unharmed. Turtle Creek resident Mark Fisher suffered facial cuts when windows in his car were knocked out by flying debris at the Novi High School parking lot. No other injuries were reported.

The tornado appears to have first hit Simmons Orchard on Ten Mile Road, ripping into the three-year-old Yorkshir subdivision at Taft Road

with full force before moving on to wreak havoc on the glass and roofs at the Novi Civic Center Complex. Timber from the Yorkshir homes traveled with the tornado to the Civic Center.

Witnesses in Yorkshir and at Novi High School reported seeing a black funnel cloud.

Consumers Power was quickly on the scene at Amherst Drive to turn off the gas. Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan said. The city also shut off the water lines on the street.

Police stood on guard Friday night to protect the Knockeart residence from looters.

A police officer, who asked not to be identified, said that electric transformers were flashing when he arrived at Amherst: "This was ground zero."

Just arriving home from Novi High School, White Plains Drive resident Nichole Burchbert, 17, watched the west side of the Knockeart home explode and tumble.

"It was like a vacuum cleaner noise. You just saw things whirling around. Trees knocked down. I saw patio furniture everywhere. I couldn't even breathe. I ran to the basement crying," she said.

Students have close encounters

• 1:55 p.m. — The school bell rings, marking the end of the day of regular classes. Students quickly exit the building, some heading to buses and cars in the parking lot, some walking home. Assistant principal Jennifer Cheal, on bus duty, and biology teacher Don Crockett, standing in front of the school, both spot what they believe is a funnel cloud approaching from the northwest. They quickly move to the main office to inform principal Robert Youngberg.

• 1:59 p.m. — Youngberg goes on the Novi High School public address system, which can be heard in the parking lot and around the building, ordering students back into the building.

The Novi High faculty, administration, secretarial staff and students spring into action, directing students returning to the building to designated tornado shelters. Youngberg remains on the PA system throughout the storm, broadcasting what he is seeing from the school office windows.

• 2:00 p.m. — The Novi Fire Department receives its first call that a tornado has touched down in the Yorkshir subdivision, less than a quarter mile from the school building. Stragglers in the parking lot were pushed to the ground by high winds.

That was the scenario of events at Novi High School Friday, as told by Youngberg and district Superintendent Robert Piwko.

"I'd say it was pretty close, yes," Youngberg said. "I'd also say our tornado drills paid off. Everyone almost

was to a safe position in time. The teachers, administration, secretarial staff and students really pulled together and worked as a team."

Piwko also was complimentary of the quick action of officials at the high school. Piwko explained that it is indeed in compliance with district policy to release students from school when a tornado watch is in effect. A watch had been issued, but a warning had not yet been posted.

"The tornado siren was going off and all I could think to myself was I'm going to die," recalls Novi High School student Betsy Fisher.

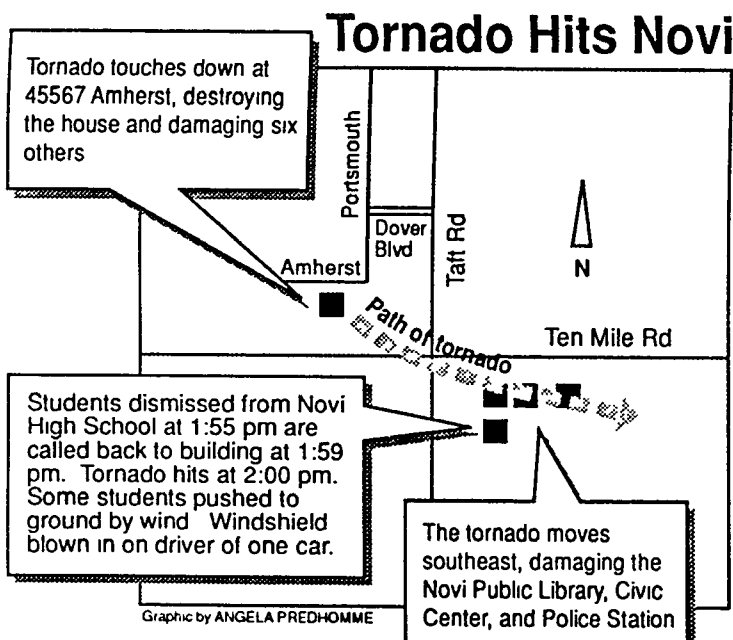
Worried that she was late, Fisher, 17, was walking to the school parking lot to wait for her brother, Mark, at about 2 p.m. She was sidetracked by a friend and stopped to chat. Suddenly, her companion screamed and pointed to a black funnel in the sky

racing east towards the Novi Public Library.

"It jumped back down and dissolved and formed again. Then it started to come down again and that's when I took off. It just swirled and it went down boom," she said.

Arriving at the school she found her brother, his face covered in blood. Mark Fisher, an Oakland Community College student, may have been the only person injured in the storm.

The former Novi High basketball player was seated in his burgundy 1985 Ford Escort waiting for his sister when the wind slammed a hunk of sheet metal into the vehicle, shattering the passenger and rear windows. He had cuts and welts covering the right side of his head, his sister said, and was later taken to Henry Ford Hospital in West Bloomfield, where several small pieces of glass were removed from his face.

that offers tendered by DeMattia's team were superior to bids and proposals from other hopefuls.

Committee Chairperson Arthur Blackwell II said DeMattia should have been awarded the contract.

"I think we're arriving at the correct (developer)," he said. "We're looking at the process. We don't want any developer to have a bad taste about the county."

"I don't think the process was tainted," he said.

Walter Cohen, of Charter Develop-

ment, told the subcommittee that his group was prematurely eliminated from the negotiating process.

"We feel (the process) was changed throughout," he said. "We didn't think it was going to be a total cash sale. It's very likely ours (bid) would have been higher than Mr. DeMattia's."

"(The process) left some lingering doubts."

Cohen's group made a final-four cut, but was eliminated at the next step in the process. Another development team soon dropped out, leaving

the DeMattia group and a team headed by Oakland County developers Holtzman & Silverman in a bidding war for the prized land.

Blackwell agreement with the contract award did not prevent him from casting stern words at other county personnel. He said the negotiating process may have usurped the commission's authority.

"I don't think the county executive's office should be making deals and proposals," he said. "It appears the County Executive (Edward McNamara) got into the business of

making awards."

Jobs and Economic Development Director Dewey Henry defended his department's negotiating practices.

"In any bidding process there are going to be losers," he said. "Competition drove this process."

Henry said offers on the land had stalled at approximately \$21-million before the bidding process intensified.

"I firmly believe we never would have gotten (the extra \$10-million and other conditions of the sale) without this process," he said.

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Neighbor saves mom, child

Two women and a pair of small children were unharmed, tucked away under the basement stairs, while a tornado plowed through their Yorkshire subdivision home Friday afternoon.

Linda Knockeart, the owner of the demolished Amherst home, thanks God that her neighbor ran into her house minutes before the cloud struck, and ushered her and her two-year-old son down into the basement.

"Right before it hit, I was sitting in my living room watching TV," she said, still shaken from the incident. "My son, Jimmy, was asleep in his bedroom — just thank God we weren't hurt."

"I heard the siren, but there wasn't any tornado warning or anything on the TV," she continued. "I jumped up to look out the window and saw it was dark — that's when my neighbor pulled into my

garage, ran out, told me to grab Jimmy and get in the basement because she had seen a funnel cloud."

The heroine, neighbor Cindy Vockler — who is six months pregnant — said, "We weren't down there in the basement and under the stairs more than 45 seconds when we heard everything crash down above us."

The basement windows to the ranch home blew in, but none of the occupants were injured, she said.

"I always thought you were supposed to hear a whistling noise or something, but we didn't — all we heard was the crash," Vockler said less than an hour after the incident.

She recalled what went through her mind before the tornado hit. "I was pulled into the garage with my 20-month-old daughter, when I spotted this spiral cloud overhead," Vockler said. "I grabbed her, ran in the house and told Linda to

grab Jimmy and get downstairs."

"It seemed like an eternity, but it could have been more than 45 seconds before the thing hit," she said.

When asked about the incident, Vockler said, "I realize some people are saying I'm a hero, but that doesn't matter — I'm just glad we are all okay."

Knockeart wasn't certain where she, her husband Randy, daughter Jennifer, 5, and Jimmy will stay until they secure permanent housing. Jennifer was at school when the tornado hit. At press time, Knockeart and the children had taken temporary shelter at the Novi Police Station.

A Walled Lake police officer was first at the scene and escorted Linda and Jimmy Knockeart to the Novi station. Vockler and her daughter were able to return to their home.

Knockeart said she had never seen a funnel cloud before, and she says she never wants to see one again.

Residents pick up pieces in Yorkshire sub

Huddled in a hallway for safety Friday afternoon, Terri Naumann and her co-workers from "Scribbles and Giggles" in Twelve Oaks Mall were laughing. No one took the storm that seriously, she said.

"We were joking about it. I was saying with my luck I'll go home and my house will be blown down and my insurance would have expired yesterday," she said.

Naumann had good news and bad news. Her insurance policy hadn't run out. But her home on White Plains Drive in Yorkshire subdivision was hard-hit by the tornado. Aluminum siding was peeled off the south side of the gray Tudor, the roof and gutters were damaged and the building's very foundation may have been dangerously shaken.

Consumers Power immediately cut off the gas lines to the devastated streets.

"I couldn't believe it," she said, while sheltering in her garage from the rain with Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan.

"If I had gas, I'd make you a cup of coffee."

It is often said tornados sound like rushing trains, but Yorkshire Subdivision residents would dispute that.

Barbara Kushman listened to the strong winds that afternoon and headed for her basement. Kushman was lucky, her house was on the north side of Amherst Drive. Just

across the street, the storm wreaked thousands of dollars worth of damage to her neighbors' homes.

"I didn't see anything. At two o'clock I heard the siren and I went down to the basement. I prayed my son was in school. I heard a little noise. I could see that it was hailing. The next thing I knew, my son was knocking at the door," Kushman said, while watching the police and fire department cordon off her street.

Betty Zentz said she couldn't believe her eyes. Just a few houses west from hers, all was devastation. Trees were upended. Insulation clung to shrubs like soggy cotton. Tar paper and timber beams littered lawns. Patio chairs and tables were scattered about like dollhouse furniture. From her window, she watched Linda and Randy Knockeart's house tumble to the ground.

"I saw all the lumber collapse. I saw it just kind of break up in the garage. The next thing I knew the lumber was all lying there. I'm just all wound up. It's a dreadful thing," Zentz said.

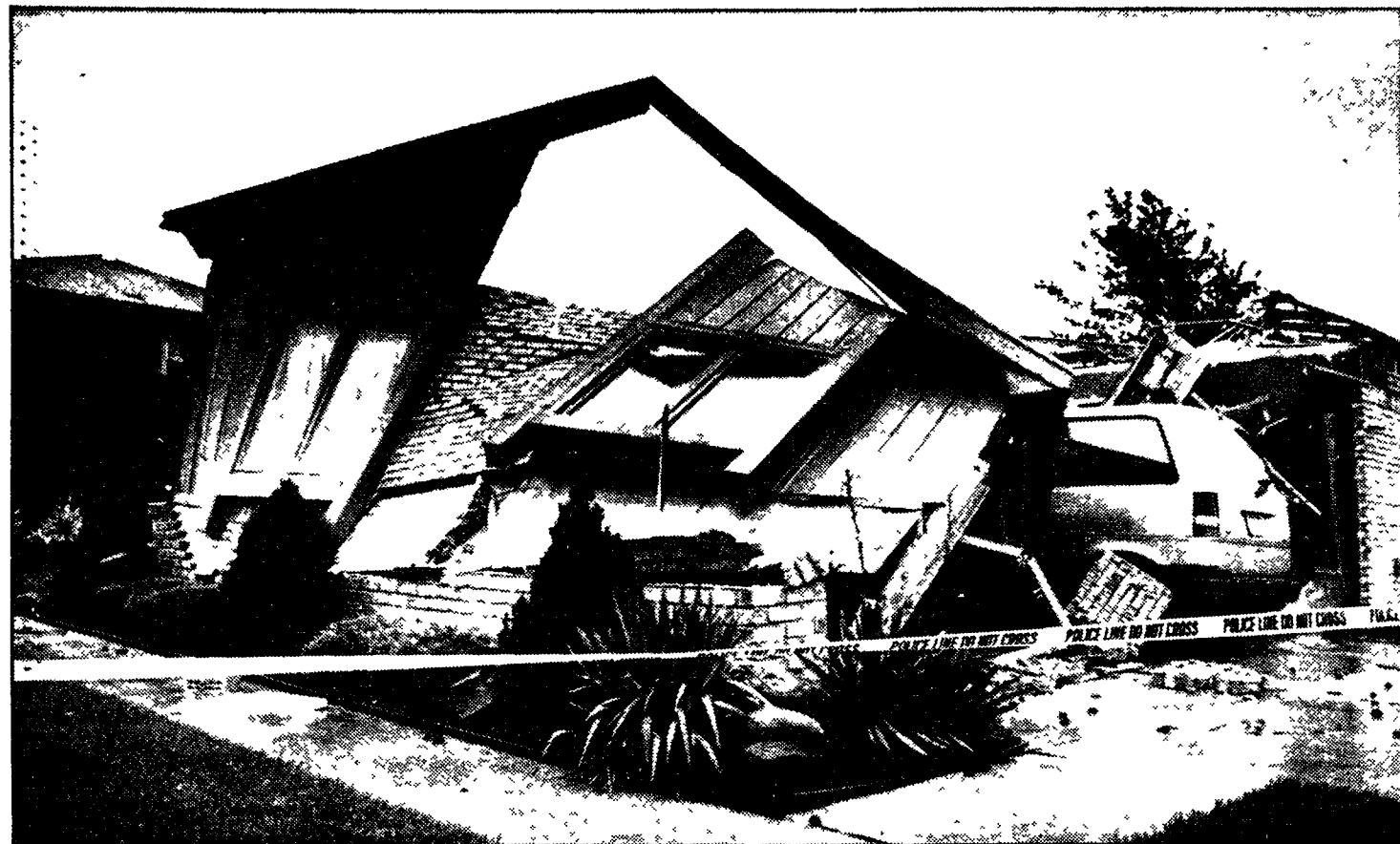

Twister opens hole in city hall

A tornado swept across Ten Mile Road near Taft Friday afternoon, causing what one Novi employee dubbed "the day it rained in city hall."

Employees at city hall found themselves looking out at the sky after the funnel whizzed by, sending the building's glass ceiling crashing down.

In addition to the rain of glass at the Civic Center, the funnel uprooted nearly a dozen trees in front of the library, and blew out a window of the adjacent police station and damaged its roof.

No estimates had yet been made as to the cost of the damage by press time.

Zora Lavich, a water and sewer department em-

ployee, recalled what happened.

"A couple of employees looked out the windows and saw the funnel clouds, like right overhead," she said. "Then our ears started popping because of the pressure change and we made a mad dash for the council chambers and hid under the conference table."

She said that at least 40 people wedged themselves under the table, while other employees took shelter in other sections of the Civic Center.

Immediately following the incident, Novi city employees were sent home and cleanup began.

As further evidence of the funnel's force, a piece of plywood from a demolished house in the Yorkshire Place subdivision blew over a half mile to the Ten Mile Road police station. A heavy air scoop,

which takes two men to lift, blew off the station's roof and was still missing at press time.

Even Police Chief Lee BeGole took cover from the approaching whirlwind. "We heard the siren go off and at first we thought it was just a drill — even I was lackadaisical," he said. "But then some people spotted the cloud, and sure enough it was heading straight for us, we all saw it coming."

"I was the last one upstairs, when I saw one of the windows bulge," BeGole continued. "At first I thought I could hold it in, so I yelled for Deputy Chief (Richard) Faulkner to come help me, but then I thought twice and got the dickens out of there."

The police station sustained limited damage to its new roof and main airshaft.

Lightning zaps power lines

Clubhouses help sales, but novelty wanes

Clubhouses in condominiums or apartment complexes can be looked at in two ways.

Yes, they are important marketing tools and are especially attractive to younger, more active residents who like to play and party as hard as they work.

On the other hand, many people don't much use clubhouses and other recreational amenities after an initial rush, owners and managers said.

"I think it's important to have these facilities, but they're probably used by a small percentage of people," said George Nyman, president of a property management firm.

His clients include Somerset Park Apartments in Troy, opened in 1964 and one of the first in suburban Detroit to offer clubhouses, pools, tennis courts and a golf course as amenities to tenants.

"It's a bigger selling point than use point," concurred Mel Kaftan, president of Kaftan Enterprises of Southfield and president of the Apartment Association of Michigan.

"Young people come in and see a pool, an indoor Jacuzzi and all kinds of images come to mind," he said. "I think it's like all exercise equipment. We all have a piece, but don't use 'em."

Regardless of how much use clubhouses actually get, there can be no denying that they're getting fancier.

Holtzman & Silverman of Farmington Hills has built what it considers to be a state-of-the-art clubhouse at its newest apartment development, Village Green of Madison Heights.

The 6,000 square-foot clubhouse contains an indoor racquetball court, a sauna with showers and lockers, aerobics studio with workout equipment, a business center with a personal computer, printer and typewriter, a community room with kitchenette and wet bar, two TV's and a loft with a pool table.

Outside, there's a waterfall that tumbles into a pool; a heated whirlpool open year-round, a sand volleyball court and a tennis court.

"It's going to remind you more of a resort hotel than an apartment, and that's what it's designed to do," said Jonathan Holtzman.

Rents at the Madison Heights complex range from \$525 to \$830.

"I think it's important to recognize who your renter is," Holtzman said.

"At Village Green, they're renting one, two or three years before they become home buyers. They can afford a house, but they want to save to get a better home or condo.

"What we're really achieving is trying to make it seem like a vacation," he said.

Kaftan Enterprises has a clubhouse at its Westbury Village Townhouses in Auburn Hills that includes an exercise room and equipment, showers, a kitchenette social area with fireplace for rental, plus an outdoor pool, whirlpool and playground.

The pool is twice as large as in his previous developments and his first complex to include playground equipment, Kaftan said.

Monthly rents range from \$850 to \$950.

"Developments nowadays have been getting a little bigger and we've been increasing the amenities package," he said. "It's a competitive thing. Lifestyles change."

The Irvine Group of Farmington Hills intends to build a clubhouse of some 2,500 square feet at Berwyck on the Park, a condominium complex with an equestrian motif in Millford.

Seventy-eight detached units, priced from \$250,000-\$350,000 are planned around a recreational area that includes stables, riding trails, an outdoor pool and clubhouse, said Paul Levine, Irvine's president.

The clubhouse will contain a sauna, exercise room and equipment, showers and lockers and two fireplaces.

A whirlpool also may be included, Levine said.

"It is our belief they (purchasers) would like to have everything right there," he said. "A lot of facilities on the property are already there."

Clubhouses and other recreational amenities usually appeal to younger residents, owners and managers agree.

"Empty nesters are more interested in square footage, safety, location and value for the dollar," Holtzman said.

The Lagoons of West Bloomfield doesn't have a clubhouse because

the older buyers there didn't really want one, Levine said.

The location and size of a development also sometimes determine whether a clubhouse rises in a particular area, Levine said.

The smaller the complex, generally the less room for amenities, he said. Also, the closer to a major metropolitan area, the more opportunity there is to join private health clubs.

Even people who use amenities apparently use only certain ones and generally don't sample all the candy in the store.

A small number will do aerobics, another group will play cards and a different crowd yet will take swim lessons, Nyman said.

But you have to make things available to compete, he added. "I think if you don't have them, you're hindering yourself."

Clubhouses and pools can be costly for the builder.

The facilities at Village Green of Madison Heights cost upwards of \$500,000, Holtzman said, while Kaftan said that facilities at Westbury Village cost \$400,000.

Beware of developer trying to sidestep statute

The developer of the condominium in which I am interested wants me to waive the nine-day provision in the purchase agreement. He says there are a number of interested purchasers, and that if I don't trust him with respect to the documents I probably shouldn't get involved. What is your suggestion?

A developer with that attitude ought to be forgotten by you as quickly as possible. The condominium statute provides that you are entitled to nine business days to review the various condominium documents including the disclosure statement, master deed, condominium bylaws and other related documents.

It is imperative that you have a full understanding of the aspects of buying a condominium and have the opportunity to review with competent and experienced condominium counsel what these condominium documents mean.

The suggestion that you should waive your review of these documents because of high-pressure tactics should be looked upon with great suspicion. You are best off to accept the developer's invitation to walk.

We are considering doing an office complex for doctors. Do you have any suggestions as to how we might do it giving the most flexibility to the doctors as possible?

Considering doing a "site condo" in the sense that you are selling lots and giving the doctor-purchaser an opportunity to build his or her own suite or offices on the premises through you as the developer or through a separate corporate entity that may or may not be controlled by you.

This gives the doctor the flexibility to build the kind of structure that he or she may desire. The other alternative is to construct one large building providing for various convertible areas between the units to allow for flexibility for expansion or contraction of the doctors' facilities. Obviously, planning is the key to any successful commercial condominium project.

Do you have any information about a Neighborhood Builder's Alliance that apparently provides grants to certain neighborhoods?

The Neighborhood Builder's Alliance grant program is designed to improve the quality of life in Michigan's neighborhoods. Grants are awarded to existing neighborhood and community groups to support specific activities directed at general neighborhood improvement

projects, crime prevention activities, housing and neighborhood service projects.

Grants may be used for a variety of purposes depending upon the need of the respective organizations. The grants range from \$1,000 to \$200,000 and are awarded to groups with a history of accomplishments, fiscal stability and involvement. Books offer ideas for earth-friendly gardening

The authors of "Secrets of the Soil" (Harper & Row, \$24.95, hardcover), Peter Tompkins and Christopher Bird, believe that there are alternative methods to using chemicals in our gardens and surroundings so that bigger and better disease-free crops can be obtained.

The book tells why and how to build a healthy soil and use non-chemical techniques to achieve these goals and thus protect our earth. Some of the methods may sound bizarre and even mystical, but the authors have researched the subject thoroughly and report that they work.

From saving dying forests to achieving non-chemical pest control to a discussion of the "greenhouse effect" and whether the earth's temperature is warming or cooling,

this book provokes thought on how we are treating our earth.

"My Weeds," Sara B. Stein (Harper & Row, reviewed in Dec. 1988 column), is now available in paperback at \$8.95.

A Harrowsmith "Gardener's Guide to Spring Flowers" (Camden House, \$9.95, paper) is a small 96-page book, third in a series of how-tos. The personal experiences of the writers make for easy reading and provide sound advice such as to go slowly when planning and planting a bulb area with instructions to achieve good results.

Other plants such as perennials, wildflowers, ferns and shrubs make up the remainder of the book with directions for success with them. The descriptions and line drawings are good, although I missed seeing information about the ultimate height of plants.

"Building a Healthy Lawn," Stuart Franklin (Garden Way, \$9.95, paper) guides the reader in the proper and ecological way to do just that. The statement, "A healthy lawn will crowd out most weeds and resist insects and disease" is sound advice. By learning how grass grows, how and when to cut, watering procedures and understanding soils, one can begin to put these principles into practice. Chapters dealing with weeds and insects and their control are quite thorough. A month-to-month maintenance program will be of great help.

"Building Healthy Gardens," Catharine Osgood Foster (Garden Way, \$9.95, paper) stresses the balance of nature to maintain a healthy garden. Biological control, companion planting and recipes for homemade natural sprays (garlic spray on mosquito larvae, for instance) and planting dill near tomatoes to deter tomato worms are practical and natural solutions. The chapter on composting is very thorough. Descriptions of garden plants are included with the author's personal remarks.

"The Backcountry Handbook" and "The Rural Living Handbook" (Fireside/Irwin & Schuster \$11.95 each) will be invaluable to those who like the outdoors and new challenges. The first describes many ways to enjoy a day (or longer) in the woods or wilderness with information about the proper equipment for everything from backpacking and fishing, to building a fire, rafting, first aid and charting a course.

There are tips to get the most enjoyment from all outdoor activities. Boat building and other winter-month projects will enable the outdoorsman to be prepared for the various seasonal activities. I enjoyed reading about wildlife and how and why it needs to be understood and protected, and how we can help preserve the natural habitat. Does your Scout troop have a copy?

The second book tells the reader about buying and surveying property (The North does beckon), planning and harvesting a garden, animal husbandry, ideas for carpentry projects (including how to keep tools sharpened) and much more. The book concludes with many recipes for using the bounty, including curing meat, making jams and jellies and even beer and wine. Both are written by editors of Mother Earth News.

Sbarro has taste of Little Italy

In the narrow streets of old New York is the tiny neighborhood called Little Italy, home to generations of Italian-Americans ever since the first Italians came to these shores.

There among the tenements you can find Italian bakeries, gift shops, book stores, record shops, and of course, restaurants and pizzerias.

It's in the tradition of these family restaurants and pizzerias that Mario and Joe Sbarro started their chain with just one pizza shop. Today they have a growing network that stands at 300 stores from coast to coast, and one of the newest is at the Twelve Oaks Mall in Novi.

"Jerry Sbarro is the one we answer to here," said Don Waldenmayer, manager of the Novi Sbarro. "He pops in pretty regularly. He has strict standards for crispness and doneness on our pizzas."

You can order traditional round pizza by the slice or whole, but the hot item right now is the stuffed pizza, with a crackly crisp crust and cheese oozing out of every crevice.

Aside from the pizza with pepperoni, sausage or supreme (four items) topping, there are Italian entrees

available on the steam line.

On a given day, you can find a ricotta-filled lasagna, or a spicy, tender chicken parmigiana, or a light seafood cannelloni. Steamed vegetables are nearly always available, cooked with just the right amount of snap to them. The lineup of entrees changes daily.

"Every item we make is made fresh that day," said Waldenmayer. "We make our own pizza dough right here. And we have no deep fried stuff. It's all baked or steamed."

Salads are available, but if you re-

ally want to do in your diet, try some of the desserts a new addition to the Sbarro chain. Tall chocolate cakes, creamy cheesecakes. You get the picture. Jerry Sbarro hand-picked the cakes himself.

"The Sbarro family is very selective," said Waldenmayer. "They still select all the tomatoes we use themselves."

Customers can be selective, too. Everything that Sbarro has to offer is displayed behind a glass counter.

"In the old Sbarro restaurants, everything was behind the line," said

Waldenmayer. "You never saw the product until you'd already bought it. This way the customer can see it and feel comfortable about ordering it."

One of the unique treats of stepping into a mom-and-pop pizzeria in New York is watching the cooks make the pizza behind the counter. They slap and knead the dough before stretching it with their twirling sleight of hand.

Sbarro's pizza makers don't quite reach that level of showmanship, but they still make the pizzas in full view of the customer.

And for something to wash your meal down, you might want to skip the traditional Coke and try one of the half-dozen varieties of soda (it's not called pop in New York) that Sbarro has created. Sbarro even has the uniquely Italian-American coffee soda, known among old-timers as a Manhattan Special.

Though the store has been open for just seven weeks, the Twelve Oaks Sbarro has already become the top volume producer in Michigan. There are 11 Sbarros in the state. That's not surprising, considering that the company waited five years to get in the spot near Hudson's.

Take a taste of old New York, and you'll know it was worth the wait.

Cooking vegetables takes delicate touch

While walking through the Farmer's Market on Thursday, I was jealous of my sister Kiti, who lives in California and has access to beautiful produce year-round. The gorgeous tomatoes, candy-sweet corn, tender string beans and brilliant red peppers will be a memory before long.

Those of us who do not can — or freeze — this late summer bounty will be at the mercy of mass-produced and purchased vegetables.

The quality of grocery store produce is better than ever. However, we must remember the buyers are limited by supply and overwhelmed by demand. Produce is expensive and it is important to know proper handling procedures to use for preservation of quality, nutritional value and taste.

All vegetables can be classified as part of a plant. For example, carrots and turnips are roots, asparagus a stem, lettuces and spinach are leaves, broccoli and cauliflower are flowers, tomatoes, peppers and squash are fruits and corn, beans and peas are considered seeds. Their flavors range from strong to mild. The colors vary in hues of green, yellow, orange, red and white.

It is preferable to make your selections of perishable vegetables rather than the pre-packaged when possible. They should be firm, crisp, and bright in color with no sign of decay or bruising. Do not purchase large quantities that will go to waste if not used quickly. Learn to distinguish between defects that only affect appearance versus those that affect quality. Never handle vegetables unnecessarily or extensively while shopping.

Most fresh vegetables, even under ideal conditions of temperature and humidity, retain top quality for only a few days. It is obvious that fresh green vegetables, because of their high water content, become wilted when left at room temperature for any length of time.

The superior quality of vegetables stored under refrigeration is well known. In addition, vitamin losses are kept at a minimum. Some vegetables such as cabbage and carrots are kept for months in cold storage without appreciable loss of vitamins.

Store fresh green vegetables in bags or covered containers to reduce moisture loss. Drain and dry well if washing before refrigeration to delay decay.

Seeds remain fresh longer if left in the pods. Tubers (roots) and bulbs may be held for short periods of time in a cool dark place. Store unripened tomatoes at room temperature and

ripe tomatoes in the refrigerator.

Preliminary preparation of vegetables is important. Most produce grows in or near the ground and is exposed to dirt, sprays and microorganisms present in the soil and acquired during the marketing process. Thorough washing is essential. A vegetable brush aids in the removal of tough dirt.

Extra care should be taken with vegetables to be eaten raw. Trim all spoiled or discolored portions. Leafy vegetables may require several washings in deep water to remove all the debris. Lift the leaves out of the water carefully to assure leaving the dirt behind.

If vegetables must have their skin removed peel with a swivel peeler. Save peelings and stems for vegetable stock. It is preferable to leave skins on when possible as many nutrients are located just below the surface and are peeled away.

Remove the woody stem portions of asparagus and shiitake mushrooms. Cooking will not soften them. The thick stems of broccoli can be peeled and used in addition to the flowery buds. Care must be taken to cook heavier stalks a few minutes before adding the tender portions.

Holding vegetables in water prior to cooking is not recommended due to the rapid loss of vitamins and nutrients.

Vegetables are cooked for several reasons. The first is to break down the cellular structure and thus increase palatability and digestibility. Cellulose is softened by cooking.

Secondly, flavor changes occur with cooking. Consider the difference in flavor between raw and cooked onions. Finally, texture changes are numerous. Cole slaw versus boiled cabbage is a good example.

The general rule for any vegetable is to cook in the smallest amount of light salted water for the shortest time possible. Bring the water to a boil, add the vegetables and bring back to a boil as quick as possible. There will be fewer color changes, less nutrient loss and a greater retention of vitamins with the observance of this method.

With stronger vegetables such as brussels sprouts and cabbage more water is preferable to dilute some of the strong flavors. Steaming is the best way to cook most vegetables if quality and nutritive value is desired.

The accompanying recipes will help you to use up some of the excess veggies you may have grown or have had donated.

ROASTED EGGPLANT RELISH

- 2 medium eggplants
- 4 cloves garlic
- 1 red onion, diced
- 2 roasted red peppers or 1 jar pimientos
- ¼ cup red wine vinegar
- 2 tbsp. chopped parsley
- salt and pepper to taste

Prick skin of eggplant and roast in a slow (300 degree) oven until tender. Cool. Remove skin, saving any juices that accumulate. Roast garlic in same manner. Chop garlic and eggplant. Add rest of ingredients. Season to taste. To change flavor, substitute rosemary, basil, sage, or thyme for parsley. Serve with croutons or crackers.

ROAST PEPPERS

Roast in hot (400 degree) oven until skin is black. Place in paper or plastic bag

CROUTONS

- Day old bread
- Olive oil

Brush bread with oil on both sides. Cut decoratively. Place on cookie sheet. Toast at 350 degrees. Turn when brown.

VEGETARIAN LASAGNA

- Tomato Sauce
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 tbsp. minced garlic
- 2 tsp. basil
- 1 tsp. oregano
- 2 tsp. salt
- 2 bay leaves
- 3 tbsp. olive oil
- ½ tsp. cup chopped mushrooms

Heat oil over medium heat in a large kettle. Add all ingredients and saute until onions are clear and soft.

- 1 13 ounce-1 pound can tomato puree
- 1 6 ounce can tomato paste
- 2 tbsp. dry red wine
- 1 cup fresh chopped tomatoes
- ¼ tsp. pepper

Add Turn heat way down and simmer at least 45 minutes, stirring occasionally

- ¼ cup fresh chopped parsley
- salt and pepper to taste
- Mix in at end

Filling

- 2 cups ricotta or low fat cottage cheese
- 2 beaten eggs
- Mix together.
- Saute or steam any vegetable combination to equal 3 cups, i.e. broccoli, egg plant, zucchini, red pepper, carrots, spinach, cauliflower, pea pods, etc
- Have ready:

- 12 lasagna noodles half cooked, drained, and rinsed in cold water
- 1 pound shredded mozzarella
- ½ cup grated parmesan, romano, or asago

Procedure: Spread ½ cup sauce over bottom of a 9-by-13-inch casserole. Cover with 4 noodles. Use ½ filling and ½ veggie mixture to cover. Cover with ½ remaining sauce. Top with ½ mozzarella. Repeat. Finish with last 4 noodles, remaining sauce and grated cheese. Bake at 375 degrees for 45 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. Serves 6-8.

Fetzer: big doesn't have to be bad

Founded in 1968, by Barney Fetzer, Fetzer Vineyards is celebrating 22 years of commitment to fine winemaking. Owned and operated by 11 family members, the winery has experienced double-digit growth rates through the 1970s and 1980s.

The bottlings from this Mendocino County, Calif., winery represent quality and value, and American wine drinkers are, more than ever, saying "yes" to Fetzer wines.

These wines are available everywhere from the most prestigious restaurants to the smallest grocery store in all 50 states, Puerto Rico and several foreign countries. The Fetzers see no end in sight to their phenomenal growth.

"We have been growing grapes since 1958. That's an advantage we have over other wineries," contends the winery's CEO, John Fetzer. "We also know the best growers, and each family member knows all the vineyard techniques and spends a lot of time in vineyards."

"Our buildings are not fancy, but they are very functional. We spend our money on equipment, technology and people. Only after 15 years did we fix up the grounds. Other wineries built elaborate buildings first. There isn't that kind of money in this business. We need to be very frugal."

"Our business grew from nothing. We learned to work hard as children. It's easy to get carried away in this business with a big lifestyle, but we remember hard times and struggles."

Paul Dolan, the head of Fetzer's winemaking team since 1977, says, "Our staff is probably half to a third the size of any other winery in our production range. We operate on a small-winery philosophy. Our equipment is designed around react-

ing to the wine as expediently as possible during the harvest period when it could make or break us."

Fetzer currently produces cabernet sauvignon, chardonnay, chenin blanc, fume blanc, gamay beajoulais, gewurztraminer, johannisberg riesling, petite syrah, pinot noir and zinfandel, with a variety of labels. Bel Arbors began as a private label in Michigan and was developed into a second label by Fetzer for its lower-priced wines. The Merlot under this label is a definite best buy.

In a mid-price range, Fetzer's "ranch" (vineyard) wines are top values. Its first "ranch" success was Sundial Chardonnay (\$8.50), first produced from the family ranch in 1980. Valley Oaks Fume (\$7.50) is modeled similarly. Both wines are light, fruity, easy to drink, and make perfect accompaniments for lighter summertime fare.

"The key to our other wines is blending," Dolan says. "We blend grapes from different counties and different vineyards. Each of the areas produces a different style of wine. We use different percentages from various tanks to make what we think is the best wine."

"It's really the blending process more than the winemaking process. With whites, we have developed a system that makes the wines softer in character and fruit without the bitter components."

Fetzer's largest-selling red wine is cabernet sauvignon (\$8.50), followed closely by red zinfandel (\$7.50), both with a California appellation. They have intense fruit aromas and palate flavors. They are soft and drinkable because they are processed with a short fermentation on the skins and

aged in older barrels.

Concentrating on the two most popular varieties, chardonnay and cabernet sauvignon, Fetzer bottles Barrel Select wines priced at \$12 per bottle. The Barrel Select chardonnay comes from vineyards with potential for more intense fruit and complexities of character which are barrel-fermented.

As cabernet sauvignon goes through the barrel-aging regime, certain wines develop to fit the profile of a Barrel Select release. The 1986 is highlighted by cherry and cassis-like fruit with gentle clove spiciness and hints of tobacco and oak. The finish is rich, round and complex and perfect for a rosemary-accented filet of beef.

"Barrel aging for 12 months tends to soften our Barrel Select and Reserve wines," Dolan says. "After six months' bottle age, the reds are just about ready to drink, but many will age five years or longer."

The crown jewel of the Fetzer line is the limited production of Reserve wines, handsomely packaged with a new, simple, elegant label. We particularly liked the 1986 Mendocino Zinfandel, Ricetti Vineyard Zinfandel and Petite Syrah. Bottled aged for an average of 18 months before release, they are value-priced at \$14.

The 1985 Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon at \$25 is rich with blackberry, cassis and oak nuances, reminiscent of a young red Bordeaux from a ripe vintage. It's a big, dynamic wine with opulent fruit, good structure and controlled tannins that will age gracefully.

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HOOKED ON GRINDSTONE CITY

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Putting on the pulp

Michigan's "pumpking" is in pursuit of the ultimate Golden Globe Award.

Andy Todosciuk already claims the state pumpkin growing crown with a 543-pound behemoth. Not content to rest on his laurels, the 27-year-old St. Johns farmer has set his sights on the world record.

Andy's a member of the World Pumpkin Confederation, a group of like-minded melon mavens dedicated to breaking the 1000-pound barrier by the year 2000. The current world's best, a 755-pounder, was grown last year in Quebec.

Could the next world record holder come from Andy's prize patch? While it's too early to be certain about this quality of this year's crop, growing conditions have been favorable and Andy's keeping his fingers crossed about the progress of one monster that was nearing the 400-pound mark in mid-August. It was putting on pulp at a rate of 20 to 40 pounds per day.

Dry weather, high winds, early frost, insects, plant disease—even a tiny mouse hole—the list of maladies that can wither and kill a potential prize winner is as long as one of Andy's pumpkin vines.

"It takes constant babysitting to grow the really big ones," Andy says.

The quest for the best starts with seed; cross-strains of the same Atlantic Giant variety commonly available for home garden planting. World Pumpkin Confederation members trade and sell seed among themselves. Andy says he's paid as much as \$5 for a single seed from a former world record holder. Last year he bought an entire pumpkin for its seed at a cost of \$250.

But expensive seed alone is no guarantee of success. The seed from the world record pumpkin produced smaller fruit than seed from Andy's own production.

Good fertility, disease control and weed control practices help get the

plant off to a healthy start and Andy can give text book explanations of foliar feeding, soil phosphates and the like. He's a graduate of Michigan State University's ag tech program; his schooling paid for by his teen-age pumpkin-growing profits.

Once established, vines must be positioned properly to prevent stems from breaking, excess blossoms are plucked to add strength to existing fruit, and leaves must be protected from wind damage. It's here that Andy becomes a little close mouthed.

"I don't mind sharing, but I can't reveal all my secrets," he says.

He will reveal that high winds can dislodge the tiny roots sent down by new leaves—roots that are essential for

the continued growth of humongous pumpkins. But he declines to reveal how he prevents uprooting.

At harvest, the gargantuan globes are rolled onto tarpaulins, hefted by six men onto wooden pallets, and transported from the field to Andy's farm market one mile

south of St. Johns. It's easy to spot. It's the one on US-27 surrounded by 30,000 pumpkins, a pumpkin playground for kids, a pumpkin totem pole and a pumpkin tree.

Besides the giants, Andy grows and sells pumpkins ranging from 100-pound jack-o-lantern varieties down to the decorative miniatures, with plenty of mid-sized pie pumpkins thrown in for good measure.

Colorful hard-shell winter squash are also a mainstay at the market. Acorn, butternut, turban and the huge hubbard varieties are among those available. Oh yes, Andy holds the state record for the largest squash, which tipped the scales at 393 pounds.

"It was awesome," he says.

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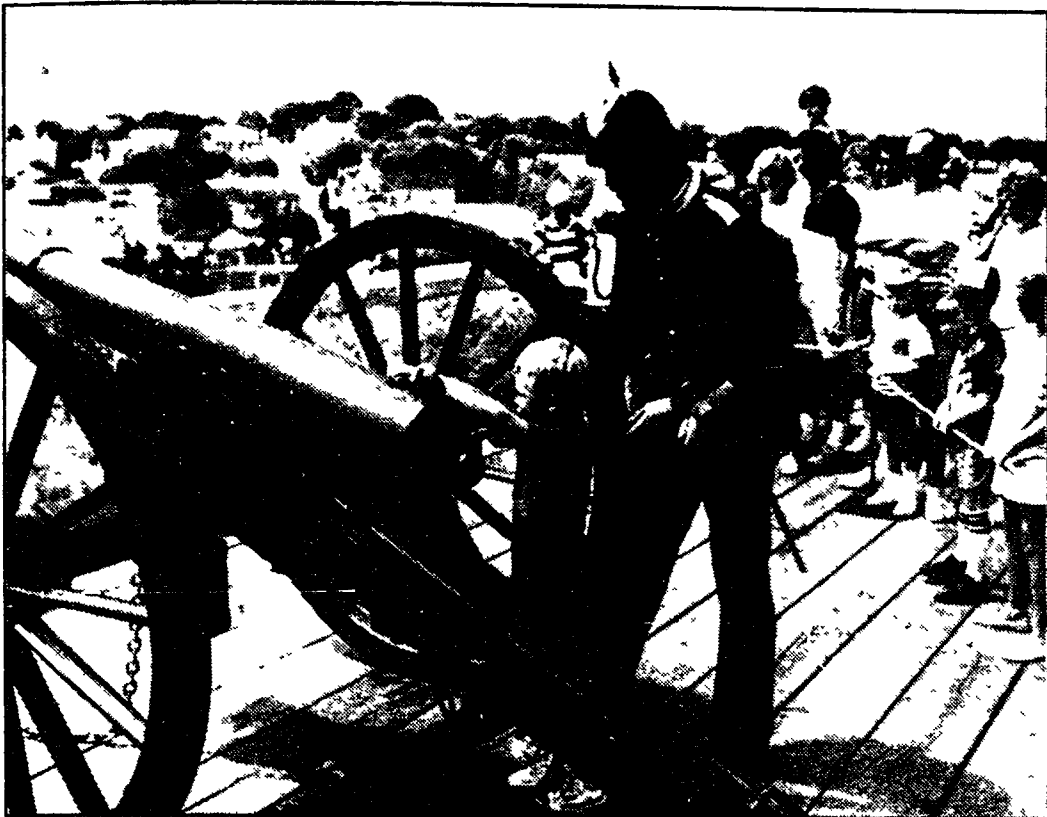

Mackinac parks in fall: Up-close look at history, Mother Nature's finery

Mackinaw City, Michigan—

Autumn colors rainbows across the Straits of Mackinac, dappling northern Michigan forests surrounding historic forts with the brilliant hues of nature's paintbrush. With reds, gold and oranges highlighting the trees, autumn is a good time to visit the four Mackinac State Historic Parks.

Colonial Michilimackinac at Mackinaw City hugs the shores where the Straits of Mackinac squeeze between lakes Michigan and Huron. White-tipped waves lap against fine sand as Indian Summer warms the village gardens ripe for harvest.

Climb the steps and promenade along the palisade catwalk, savoring the view and the color surrounding this 1700s fur-trading village. Visitors gather to the summons of a musket demonstration, then follow a "British Redcoat" through the Water Gate to the cannon platform near the beach. Soon the boom of cannon resounds across the waters as imaginations picture how village life must have been more than 200 years ago.

An easy three miles east of Mackinaw City on M-23 lies Mill Creek State Park. Nestled among 625 wooded acres along the Lake Huron shoreline, Mill Creek's reconstructed sawmill depicts 18th century methods used to furnish lumber to neighboring settlers. After autumn rains, Mill Creek runs full over the dam near the footbridge. With crisp air and warm sun on the shoulders, linger on the bridge to watch the stream ripple over the rocks below.

At the mill, the wooden water wheel picks up power to turn the saw. The pungent smell of sawdust awakens the senses as an interpreter

sets the blade into another log.

Mill Creek is a perfect setting for a picnic. Bring along a lunch and choose a table under the trees.

Sail across the Straits of Mackinac from Mackinaw City or St. Ignace to Mackinac Island and two other state parks: Fort Mackinac and Mackinac Island State Park. Climb the white walkway up the limestone cliff to the fort which has dominated the island since 1780. Historic interpreters portray life of the 1880s, and Victorian touches grace many of the period settings.

Fort Mackinac soldiers march across the Parade Ground for drills and rifle firings as visitors watch from the long porch of the Soldiers' Barracks. While cannon firings from the platform beyond the South Sally Port are always interesting, they take on a personal touch in the autumn when crowds are smaller.

For an up-close look at Mother Nature in autumn, Mackinac Island State Park offers an interesting contrast, with a forest mix of northern hardwoods, cedar and spruce. Mother Nature dabbles her paint brush on the hardwoods, leaving the cedar and spruce for green contrast. Trails for walking, bicycling and horseback riding wind through the park which covers 80 percent of the island. Some of the trails are self-guiding, with species of trees marked at regular intervals.

While parks maintain a more abbreviated schedule than at the peak of summer, activities do continue through Oct. 21. For a complete list, contact Mackinac State Historic Parks, Box 370, Mackinac Island, MI 49757. (906) 847-3328.

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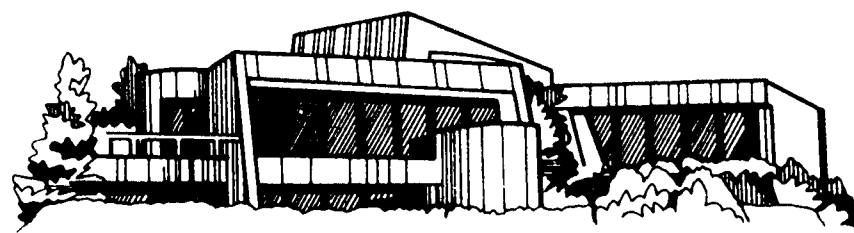
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Shimmering landscapes, luminous canvases: Major Impressionist exhibit visits Toledo

When most of us who have lovingly gathered antique furniture for our homes begin to accessorize, we seek out artwork for our walls to complement our furnishings. And most of us want pictures depicting real

scenes or people. Museums are a good starting place to learn about the best of such artwork.

While few are able to afford the beautiful pictures of a group of French artists termed "Impressionists," we all can appreciate their work.

Beginning Sept. 30 and until Nov. 25 we all can view a world-class exhibition of 80 paintings and sculptures by 21 of the most celebrated Impressionist and Post-Impressionist artists - including

Claude Monet, Pierre-Auguste Renoir, Mary Cassatt, Edgar Degas and Vincent van Gogh - only a few miles south of the Michigan border at The Toledo Museum of Art.

"Impressionism: Selections from Five American Museums" has been jointly organized by a consortium of five museums whose collections offered the potential for a major exhibition of extraordinary quality.

"When combined, the Impressionist and Post-Impressionist paintings in the permanent collections of these five museums rival any in the world," writes Dallas Museum of Fine Arts Director Richard R. Brettell in the introduction to the exhibition catalogue.

The exhibit of this most popular of art movements already has enjoyed record-breaking attendance in Pittsburgh, Minneapolis and Kansas City. Participating museums are The Carnegie Museum of Art in Pittsburgh where it opened, The Minneapolis Institute of Arts, the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art in Kansas City, The Saint Louis Art Museum and The Toledo Museum of Art where the exhibit concludes.

One of the featured paintings by Degas is certain to be one of the exhibit's most popular. It is an appealing oil on canvas of Mille. Hortense Valpincon, *Enfant*, 1871. It is from the Minneapolis Institute of Arts. Also on view will be a Degas bronze, *Little Dancer of Fourteen Years* about 1880-81. From the Saint Louis Art Museum, the little bronze dancer with hair tied back is in a position of repose, just waiting to begin her dance.

From the Toledo museum's own collection, a Degas painting, *Portrait of Victorine Dubourg*, about 1866-68, is included in the exhibit. The subject who was Degas's friend, is sitting in a relaxed pose.

Another featured portrait is of Lise Campineanu, 1878, by Edouard Manet from the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art. Also from the same museum by Claude Monet is a beautiful scene, *Boulevard Des Capucines*, done in 1873.

Brochures of the exhibition feature Claude Monet's distinctive *Water Lilies*, 1916-26 from the Saint Louis Art Museum as well as the dramatic impression of trees in *Place Des Lices, Saint Tropez* by Paul Signac in 1893 from the Carnegie Museum of Art.

The latter was selected to be featured by officials of Ford Motor Company, national sponsor for the exhibition. Harold A. Poling, chairman and CEO of Ford, explained that the company was "impressed by the quality of the exhibition and the collaboration among the consortium of five museums. By working together, Ford and the five museums have created a program of unprecedented scope, as well

as a model for future endeavors."

The exhibit is further supported in part by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency. Toledo museum officials are quick to express appreciation for the Ford sponsorship, noting it is "an enormous area employer and an incredibly huge corporation impacting the Ohio-Michigan area."

The Toledo contribution to the exhibit is very considerable. Roger M. Berkowitz, deputy director at the Toledo Museum of Art, is the Consortium Coordinator.

Marc Gerstein, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Art History at The University of Toledo and a scholar of Impressionism and its art historical context, wrote the catalogue and selected the works in the exhibition.

The fully-illustrated, 200-page catalogue was the Literary Guild selection last December. It is available in the museum gift shop at \$19.95 in paperback.

In addition, a special guide, "My Look at Impressionism," written by Cynthia Schubert, coordinator of Youth Programs, the Saint Louis Museum, has been prepared for older children. This booklet was made possible by Ford contributions.

Sponsors stress that this is an exhibition to be enjoyed by families.

As I read the vast amount of information on the exhibit, I felt the guide for young people offers a simple but clear definition of just what Impressionism is:

"The Impressionists were a group of painters who lived in France about 100 years ago. The Impressionists did something new; they painted outside, to show the way light changes. They painted their impressions of things in a way no one else had painted before. Life around them, such as street scenes, gardens, and people doing ordinary things interested the Impressionists."

Illustrations include a lush, green painting, *In The Garden At*

Maurecourt by Berthe Morisot about 1884 from the Toledo museum's collection.

Over the years, as styles changed, younger followers learned new techniques of painting and were known as Post-Impressionists.

Georges Seurat experimented by using tiny dots of color, a technique called pointillism. His summertime painting of the small fishing village *Port-en-Bessin*, 1888, from the Saint Louis Art Museum is included in the exhibit.

Vincent van Gogh, a follower of the Impressionists, is represented in the exhibit by eight paintings, including *Stairway At Auvers*, painted in 1889 in characteristic bright, bold strokes.

Toledo staffers point out that the exhibition "illustrates the entire history of one of the most remarkable and popular movements in Western art from its beginning in the 1860s to its final manifestation in the mid-20th century.

"From the heyday of Impressionism in the 1870s and 80s, the exhibition is rich with portraits by Manet, Degas and Cassatt and with shimmering landscapes by Monet, Renoir and Sisley. Later Post-Impressionists are documented in a spectacular array of canvases by Cezanne, Seurat, Signac, Gauguin and van Gogh.

"The exhibition includes a panorama of the achievements of Monet and Pissarro, the two painters who remained longest dedicated to the original ideals of Impressionism ... concludes with some of the finest works by the youngest Impressionists, such as Bonnard, whose luminous canvases carry the movement to the middle of the 20th century."

Timed tickets for a specific date and time are required for entrance to the exhibition. Tickets are available for docent-guided or self-guided groups as well as individuals.

Exhibition hours Sept. 30 through Nov. 25, will be Tuesday to Friday, 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Saturday, 11 a.m. to 9 p.m.; Sunday, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.; closed Monday.

Prices are adults (18-64) \$5; seniors (65+) and students (6-17) \$3; children (5 and under) free with timed ticket.

Wednesday is a free admission day with free, timed tickets available at the museum that day on a first-come, first-served basis. A limited number of tickets will be available each day for walk-in visitors.

Tickets may be ordered by telephone with a credit card or by mail. There is a \$2 handling charge.

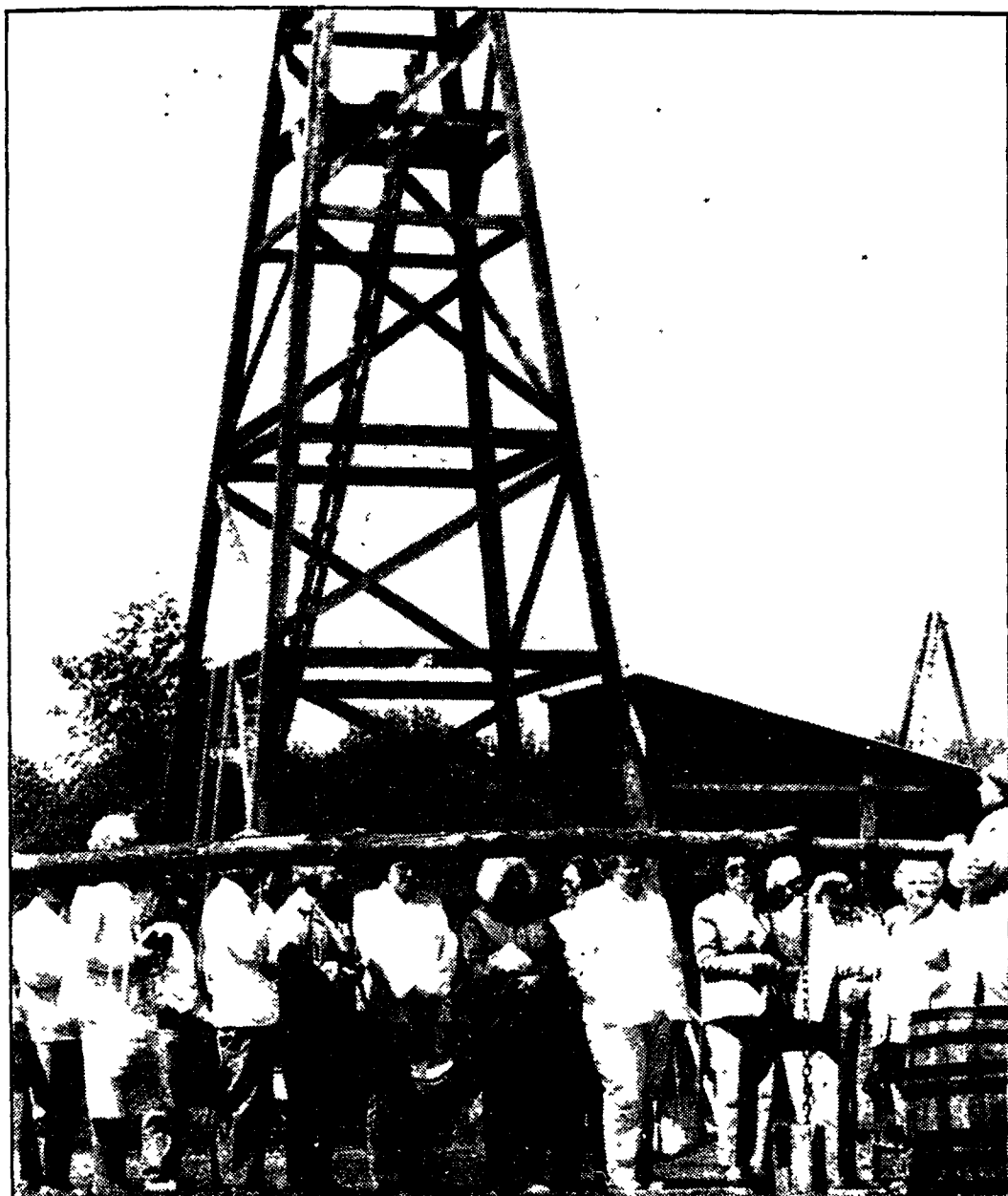

Eureka!: Historic oil wells pump black gold

Petrolia, Ontario—

Before there was OPEC, lipstick and nylons, Iran and Saudi Arabia, there was Petrolia. Here, the world's oil industry started in the mid-1800s and it's waiting for you today.

Oil is still pumped in the Petrolia and nearby Oil Springs fields by a central power plant, with jerker rods reaching out to each well, just as it was 100 years ago. At Petrolia, such a field comprising 60 acres has been set aside as a living museum, a major educational exhibit called The Petrolia Discovery.

Here, wells are being restored and visitors see crude oil as it was drawn from the ground almost from the beginning of the industry and examine the technology that sent many Petrolia oilmen off to foreign lands to teach others their drilling methods.

In an age when few people traveled beyond the borders of their own home town, these pioneer oilmen went out from southwest Ontario to discover most of the major oil fields of the world. They were on the Gobi Desert and in the Arctic, in Iran when it was Persia, Indonesia, Australia, Russia--87 countries in all. See the little known story of these men on the boardwalk of the Petrolia Discovery.

Petrolia became known not only for its oil industry but also for its cultural amenities. The opera house, fine sport-playing fields and a quality horse racing track were just some of

the benefits enjoyed by all residents.

Visitors are invited to enjoy the beauty of Petrolia's Victorian buildings on a two-hour walking tour encompassing 24 sites. These architectural works of art, sculpted by some of the leading building designers of the time, attest to the vast fortunes made in Petrolia during the late 1800s.

Nemo Hall, 419 King St., was built in 1878 as the residence of a prominent oil man. Its three floors encompass 20 rooms and five fireplaces. The marble fireplace in the drawing room won first prize at the 1893 Chicago World's Fair for its design and craftsmanship.

Fairbank House, 4248 Petrolia St., was built in 1890. The exterior is made of Ohio clay bricks, each wrapped in waxed paper before it was shipped to Petrolia. The house featured 22 rooms including a second floor ballroom, billiard room, and servants' quarters. Today it houses an antique business and dance studio.

Petrolia is located about 20 miles southeast of Sarnia, Ontario and is easily accessible by crossing the Blue Water Bridge at Port Huron, Michigan, then east on highway 402 and south on highway 21.

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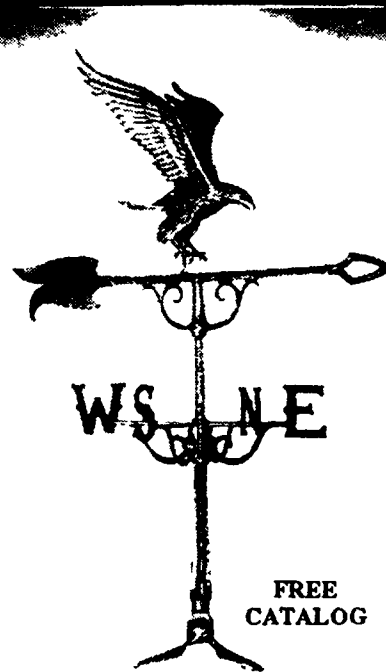
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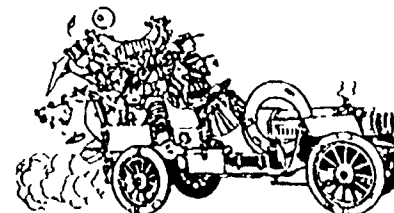
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Hidden goodies: Travelers stalk down state's little-known tourist attractions

There are some things that never seem to be in the guidebooks. Like Celery Flats, the Petroglyph Trail or Deadman's Hill.

Everybody knows that official

surveys pick Walt Disney World as the top tourist attraction in the world. There is another, less official, survey that is taken regularly around the dinner tables and at cocktail parties, and that survey pinpoints places that nobody would ever find without a little help from their friends.

"The Tamarack Gallery in Omena is one of the finest art galleries in Michigan."

"Climb Dead Man's Hill on Highway 131 between Mancelona and

Alba. There's a marvelous view of the Jordan Valley. A logger in a horse-drawn logging wagon fell over the hill and was killed there during the big logging days so it is always called Dead Man's Hill."

One of my favorite reports about "little-known places" comes from Doris Scharfenberg of Farmington Hills, who discovered "the state's newest 'theme park.' It plows it furrows straight back to the days of a one-time big-biz crop --- celery."

The Celery Flats Interpretive Center, which is open noon to 6 p.m. Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays and holidays, and from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sundays (\$1 adults, 50 cents kids 5-15) is in Portage, south of Kalamazoo. Call (616) 329-4522.

"The south side of Kalamazoo is the largest supplier of bedding plants in the U.S.," Scharfenberg says. "Once upon a time the fields were solely for celery. Celery historians talk about the days when Kalamazoo meant celery the way that Florida means oranges.

"In 1870 this land was semi-swamp. Dutch immigrants, knowing a thing or two about pumping out water, planted the first stalks of what became a million-dollar crop. Youngsters hawked celery on street corners.

Folks on passenger trains were given a stalk while passing through town. At peak production, seven-year-olds rose at 3 a.m. to pick stalks before the leaves wilted, tied them, crated them, planted more. All before breakfast, before walking two miles to school.

"When California's Pascal celery crowded out Michigan's product, state growers turned to bedding plants."

The Celery Flats Interpretive Center looks like another neat farm tucked between rural neighbors, but it has picnic tables, playground swings and an 1856 school. Doris Scharfenberg says you will recognize it when you see a suspiciously mobile celery stalk walking around greeting visitors.

I challenge you to find that in your

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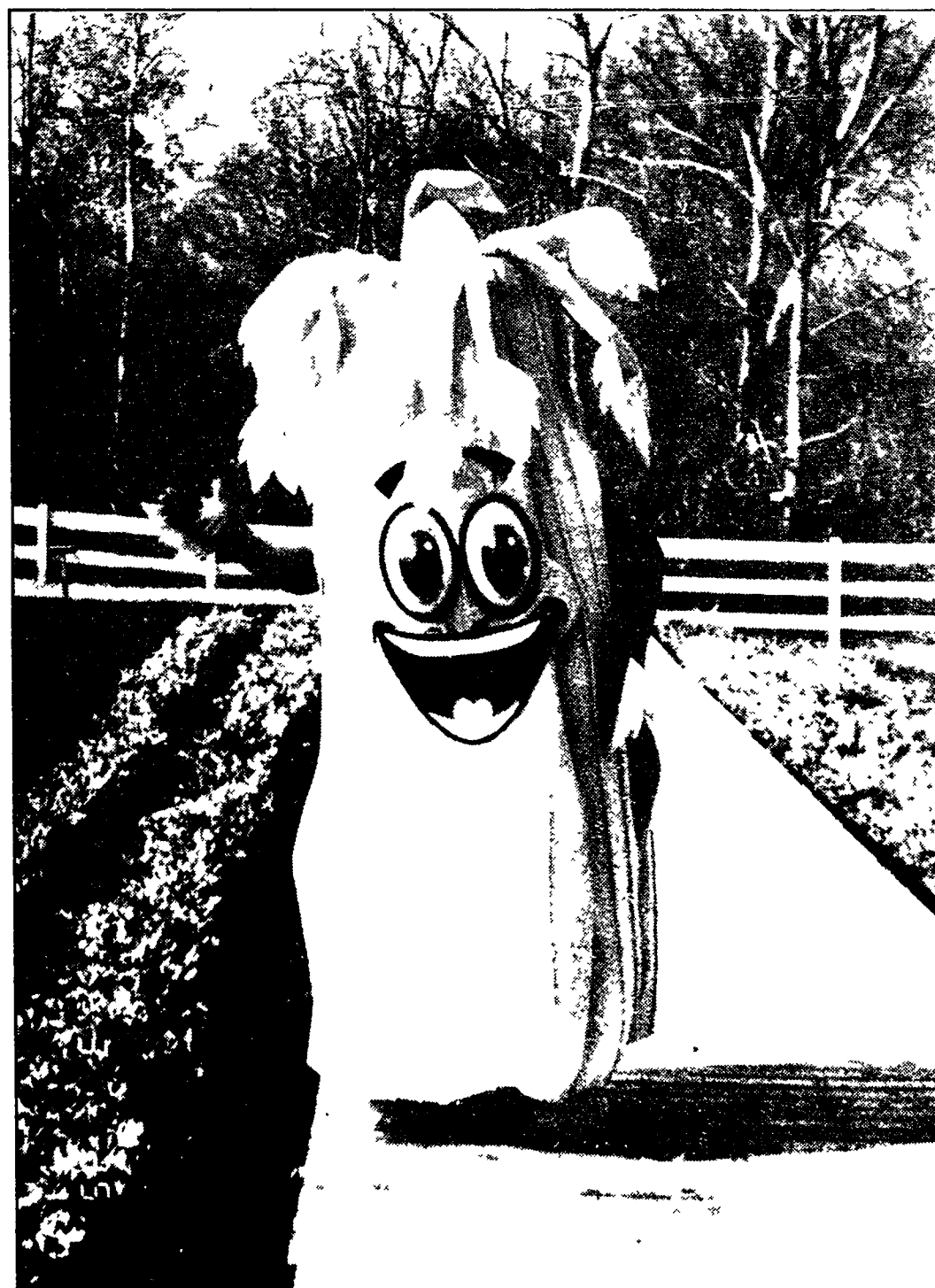

national travel guide book.

Another hidden treasure, passed word-of-mouth to those of us sitting around a table in a cottage last week, is The Petroglyph Trail. It's in Sanilac County in the Thumb but you will never find it if you don't find Marian and Lynn Spencer on Germania Road in Uby; the 240-acre park is about three-quarters of a mile from their home.

The Spencers have been caretakers and guides at the site for 40 years. Lynn Spencer used to bring visitors to the site, which is next door to her grandfather's farm, and still holds the

key necessary for you to see the Indian designs carved on a large rock face.

You can walk the mile-long trail through Michigan history while you are at it. The trail circles near the junction of the north and south forks of the Cass River.

Start one of these "did you know" conversations and you will find a million little hidden places you didn't know were there.

"Ocqueoc Falls off Route 211 in Presque Ile, in the Upper Peninsula."

"Have you seen the model of Traverse City in the park near the lake?"

While at Cripp's Fruit Farm, be sure to visit Cripp's Cider Mill. During the fall, the mill produces 30-40 gallons of fresh cider daily. Visitors can watch the entire process from washing to grinding and pressing to bottling. The Cider Mill is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekends from Oct. 6 through the 30th and on an unscheduled basis throughout the week. A visit to a "U-Pick" apple orchard is another great way to enjoy autumn. Sherman's Orchard features a variety of fresh, tasty apples ripe for the picking. A fun family adventure awaits, and what better souvenir to

Jesse Besser Museum in Alpena will again this year host Fall Harvest Day from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 6. The museum will provide, free to the public, a day of "plain and fancy" crafts and demonstrations, circa late 19th, early 20th Century, which are indigenous to Northern Michigan. Activities will be spread out over the entire museum grounds, and artisans and craftsmen will be on hand to demonstrate crafts culturally inherent to their ancestry. Musical presentations reflecting Northern Michigan's folk tradition are also scheduled. Call the Museum at (517) 356-2202 for more information.

Imagine a place where your car is a boat. If you want to visit a neighbor, or run to the store for a can of soup, you drive there in your motorboat. It may be a vintage mahogany Chris Craft, or maybe a Hacker Craft, a Gar Wood or a Lyman. If the winds serve, it might even be a sailboat.

That's what it was like 90 some years ago in the salty little Upper Peninsula villages of Hessel and Cedarville. What roads they had were little used. To this day, the boat is a car for people who live or summer on the nearby islands of Les Cheneaux, bordering the southeastern shore of the Upper Peninsula.

That's why this area recently drew us to a showing of the kind of beautiful old boats that still cruise these sheltered waters. On Saturday, Aug. 11, the communities of Hessel and Cedarville presented their 13th Annual Antique Wooden Boat Show and Festival of Arts. It features boats built before 1968. That was when they began making boats of fiberglass, which are not allowed in the show.

The oldest boat in the show is *Sparky*, a 14-foot outboard built in 1913, owned by John and Mary Ruth Dieter of Hessel.

We were joined by 11,998 people, or an estimated crowd of 12,000 counting us. They jammed the Hessel

waterfront and the docks of its harbor of refuge to be dazzled by the polished brilliance of 165 lovingly tended wooden boats. The sponsors claim it's the biggest show of its kind in the country.

We arrive about dusk the night before the show and step into the lively-looking Hessel Bay Inn to eat. We can see we are near the docks and across the street from a general store. It has gas pumps outside. Allan asks the waitress the way to the rest of the town.

"This is it," she tells us.

After dinner we look around. We missed the 4 p.m. cocktail party and get-acquainted chicken barbeque. But we are in time for a concert by the city band and ballads by four excellent musicians who call themselves Song of the Lakes. We also catch the arrival of a band of 18th century French traders, the Voyageur Gouvernait of Saginaw, in their 34-foot canoe.

We talk to Bob Smith, Cedarville real estate man who is co-chairman of the show for the 11th straight year.

"Fourteen years ago people from here went to an antique boat show in Clayton, New York," he says. "They looked around and said we have more old boats than that in Les Cheneaux. We should have our own show."

"This show has done a lot for restoration," he adds.

Enthusiasm for restoring old boats, stimulated by this and other boat shows, has brought thousands of zealots to these events all over the country. Resurrecting beached and abandoned old wooden boats has become such a passion that a well-restored boat can bring up to

\$100,000.

The Antique and Classic Boat Society was formed in the early '70s, according to Ronald W. Ballantyne, its president. A resident of Orchard Lake, he owns three show-presentable boats, and has "one to go." Now the society has 5,000 members with 9,000 registered boats in the U.S., Canada and Europe.

"You used to be able to find people who wanted to get rid of an old boat for a few hundred dollars," says Stanley Durst of Livonia. He is the owner of *Ann Teak*, an 18-foot Chris Craft utility boat (open boat with a motor box) entered in the show. "A friend bought one for a hundred dollars a couple of years ago. He calls it the *C-Note*."

"Mahogany is expensive. Hardware is expensive. You go to the shows and find people selling hardware, or you find an old boat that nobody wants and strip it for the hardware. You're always looking for something you can use."

Every year Durst sands the hull and decks—all the mahogany—by hand, and adds two coats of varnish. "I'd buy another boat," he adds, "if I find a good deal on one."

We wander around the docks to look at some of the early arrivals. Aboard a 20-foot Holiday Chris Craft we see Philip Weber, of Marshall, energetically cleaning and polishing. He's too busy to talk, but his wife, Wanda, says he has been working on the boat ever since he bought it two years ago.

"It was in bad shape. He had it all reupholstered and brought it all back. He still has more varnishing to do. He's 73 years old, but he says he's not quitting."

We admire *Old Me*, a gorgeous 15-foot Century utility tended by 24-year-old Mike Flood of Mt. Clemens. He tells us the boat was

stored for 32 years before his father purchased it in 1987. It was 50 years old. They rebuilt the engine, stripped the seats down to the original upholstery, and rubbed out old scars left by some idiot with a disc sander.

"My father owns it, I'm the labor," says Mike. "He stripped it down and I put two new mahogany planks in the hull. Every year we take off the chrome, and sand it and revarnish it."

Many of the restorations are done by companies that specialize in the work, such as Tassier Boat Works in Cedarville and the E. J. Mertaugh Boat Works in Hessel.

Murray Cotter, of Birmingham, had his 18-foot 1953 Chris Craft Riviera (no name) restored by Cuthberton Boat Works in Algonac, after he bought it 11 years ago.

To recognize the skill and hard work of the do-it-yourselfers, the show committee has established the Stanley Easter Award for the best restoration by a non-professional.

At 7 a.m. Saturday, Bob Smith and the other committee members are busy positioning 165 beauties in their assigned moorings. A local service club is dishing up a pancake breakfast. Other volunteers are staffing the admission booth (tickets \$4 each) and setting up fish-fry and hot-dog stands. Everyone in the community—including the children—is working harder than a deckhand.

By 10 a.m. the tents are up and artists have set up the Festival of Arts held jointly with the boat show. VFW Law White Post and Boy Scout Troop 140 join in the opening ceremony. Victoria Fair, 1990 Miss Michigan, and Richard Sligh, guest of honor and wooden boat maker, greet the crowd from the central gazebo. Folk singers perform songs of the lakes, and people swarm over every inch of dock and waterfront.

At noon, the Chippewa, the

Arnold Transit Co.'s inter-island passenger boat, arrives to tour visitors around the Les Cheneaux waters. (\$8 adults, \$5 children, for a two and 1/2 hour cruise.)

Meanwhile, back at the dock, Allan is disappointed by the poor turnout of antique sailboats. There are six, about par for this event, according to Bob Smith.

One sailing replica catches Allan's eye--the *Edna B*, an 18-foot period sloop copied from an old boat rotting on a Les Cheneaux beach. The builder was Paul Wilson of Hessel, who used the bronze hardware taken from the wreck. Otherwise he built it from scratch, demonstrating the incredible skills of the local people.

We ask Joe Neihardt of Traverse City to tell us about the majestic

sailboat, *Aquilo*, in whose cockpit he is sitting. He tells us the boat is 50 years old and belongs to his brother in law, Bruce Lehman of Traverse City. It was built of mahogany over white oak and is 45 feet overall.

"You want to hear the story of this boat?" he asks. "It has a bullet in the bulkhead. Come back when it's quieter and I'll tell you about it."

Later the *Aquilo* wins a prize in its class, but it never gets quieter so we never hear the story.

The day ends with Miss Michigan handing out the awards as Bob Smith announces the winners in each class. The grand prize for best in show goes to *Doodad*, a 1929 runabout built by the Chris Smith Boat Company. Owner Clark E. Hill of Green Lake, Wisconsin, rushes to his boat to ready

it for leading the parade of boats that climaxes the show. To avoid marking his mirror-finish craft, he takes off his shoes and goes aboard barefoot.

Next year's show will be on Saturday, Aug. 10. If you plan to go, get your reservation early. When we tried two months in advance we learned that every available room in Hessel and Cedarville was reserved. However, we got a room in St. Ignace and made the 35 minute drive several times.

We recommend a visit to Les Cheneaux Historical Museum on Meridian Road in Cedarville. Attendant Elvina Firack will show you an excellent 20-minute videotape depicting the history of Les Cheneaux and its wooden boats, written by Dean Coffin and produced by Jack Kausch,

both of Birmingham. The interesting museum is open by appointment in October, and maintains a regular schedule during the summer. (906) 484-2821.

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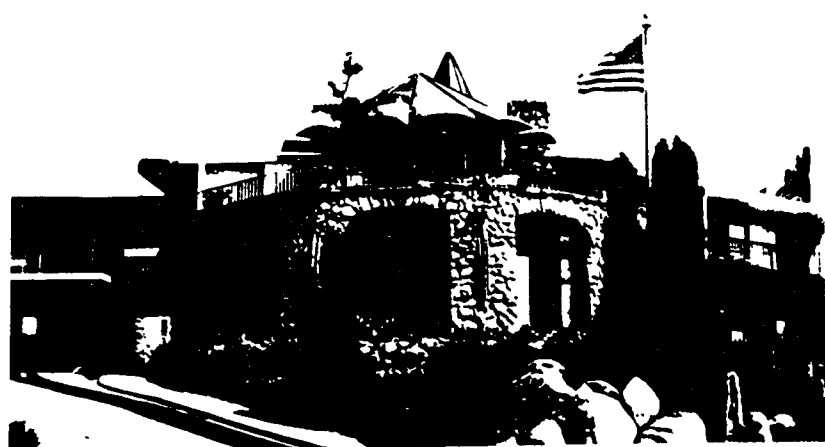
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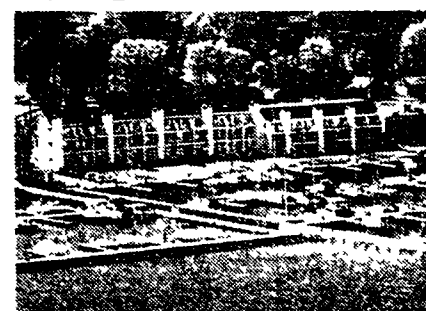
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Ohio town butters up apple fans ...

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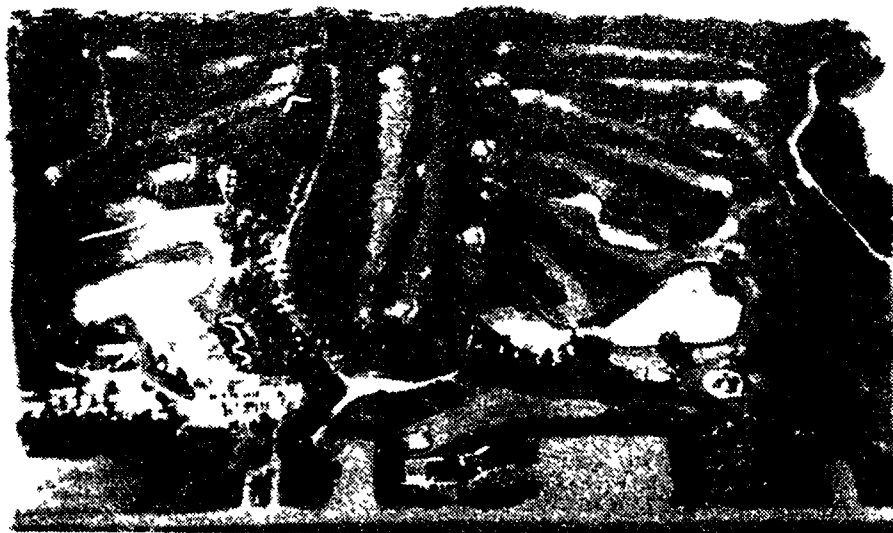

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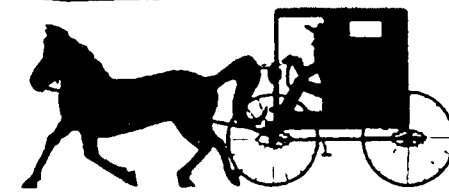
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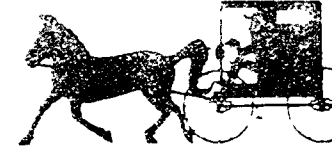
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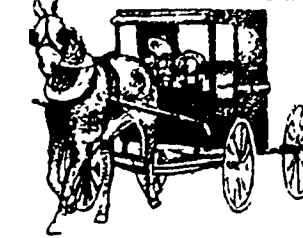
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Historic Chicago Pike Inn gets new set of wheels

and purchased this spring at an Amish buggy sale in Topeka, Indiana. The interior is done in burgundy velvet upholstery and seats six.

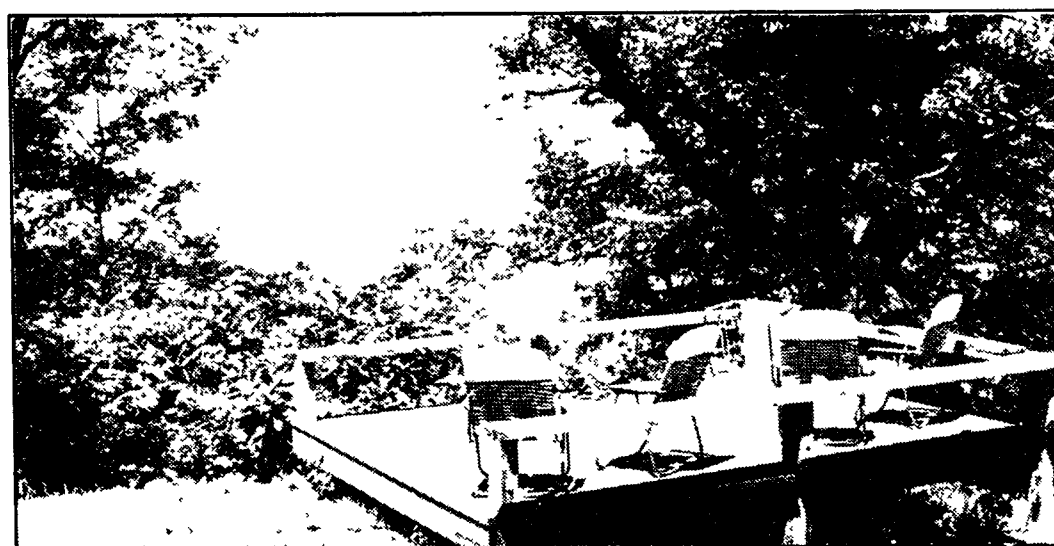
Carriage rides come complete with a period-costumed driver who puts a gray Percheron through its paces.

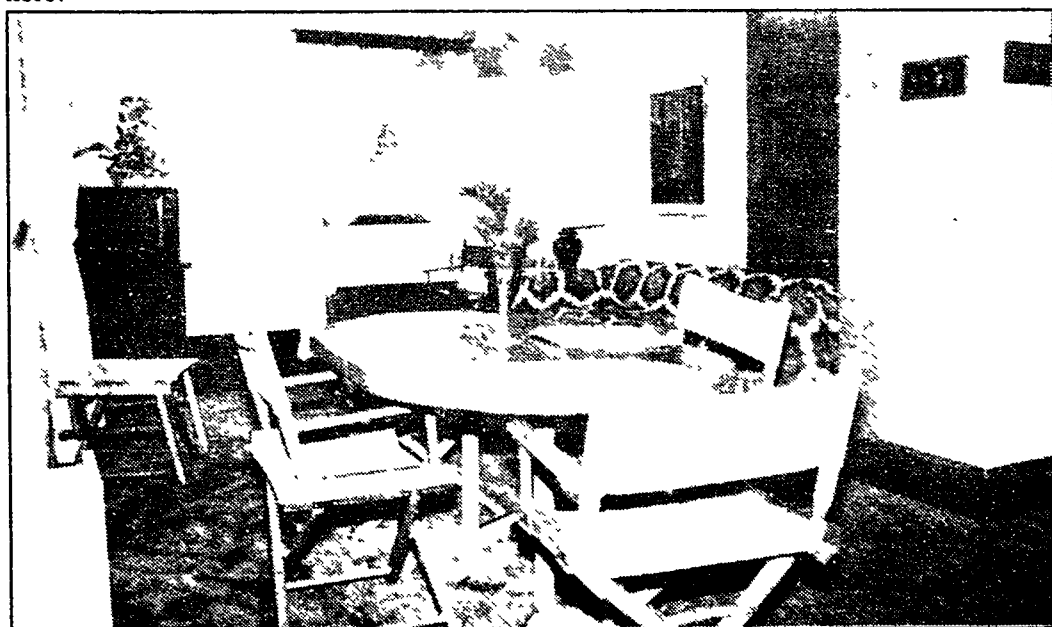
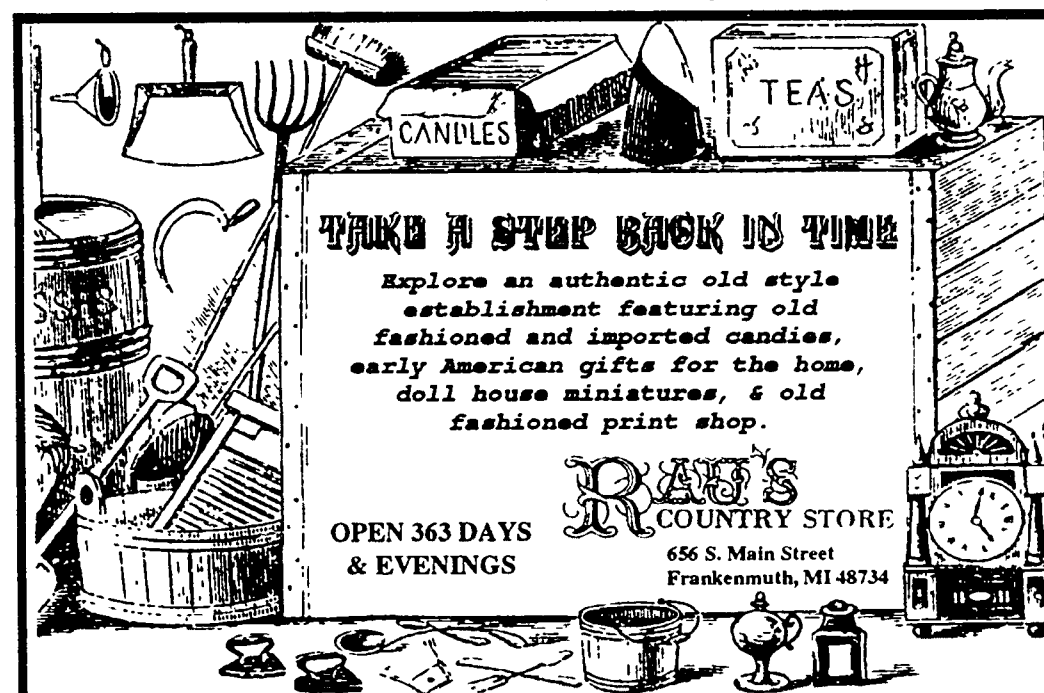

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Michigan hosts premier wildlife art exhibit

Wildlife: The Artist's View, now on exhibit at the Krasl Art Center in St. Joseph, Michigan, is a milestone. It's the first appearance in Michigan of an exhibition from the Leigh Yockey Woodson Art Museum in Wausau, Wisconsin--which is virtually a household name to hundreds of artists, birders, sportsmen, environmentalists and nature art lovers worldwide.

The high quality of its annual *Birds in Art* exhibition has established the LYWAM as the foremost proponent of art dedicated to celebrating the natural world around us. In 1987, the museum sponsored its first departure from the *Birds in Art* format when it originated *Wildlife in Art*, an exhibition subsequently acclaimed in 10 cities. The success of that tour led to the decision to organize a similar exhibition on a triennial basis. *Wildlife: The Artist's View* is the result.

Kathy Kelsey Foley, director of the Leigh Yockey Woodson Art Museum, says in the exhibition catalog's foreword, "Our intent was to signal a basically unlimited range of acceptable subject matter--the entire spectrum of the wild kingdom--but, more significantly, to put the burden of responsibility on the artist to interpret and present the subject for the viewer--the artist's point of view."

A distinguished panel juried the nearly 400 entries down to 80 pieces which were presented at the LYWAM earlier this year. The traveling exhibition includes 60 two and three dimensional works which will journey to six additional sites through next year.

Wildlife: The Artist's View

opened at the Krasl Art Center Sept. 15 and will continue through October 31, when it travels to the R.W. Norton Art Gallery in Shreveport, Louisiana, and then to the Cleveland Museum of Natural History in Cleveland, Ohio, until May 4, 1991. After Ohio, the works will be on exhibit at Grassmere Wildlife Park in Nashville, Tennessee, and then at the High Desert Museum in Bend, Oregon.

"The exhibition brings together a remarkable assortment of artistic styles, interpretations, subject matter and talent," says Foley. "Many well-established, familiar artists are included side by side first-time exhibitors. Similarly, views of Arctic animals share the spotlight with desert critters. Whales, reptiles and birds provide both a complement and a contrast to depictions of African elephants, giraffes, lions and hippopotamuses--the classic images the word 'wildlife' brings to mind. In short, the exhibition is a veritable menagerie encompassing the animal world's A to Z--alligator to zebra!"

If you haven't yet had the pleasure of viewing an exhibition organized by the LYWAM, treat yourself to this one--and then underscore your pleasure by a trip to Wausau this autumn to view the annual *Birds in Art* exhibition.

I can't speak too highly of the caliber of work selected for this exhibition or for the several *Birds in Art* exhibitions I've been privileged to see. I can only urge you to view them for yourself. You'll experience the highly detailed paintings of Carl Brenders of Belgium, the inspiring African paintings of David Shepherd of England, the almost impressionistic pastels of Dino Paravano of Italy, an acrylic by Jorge Mayol of Argentina, a wonderful oil painting of elk by Chuck Kneib of the United States, and a misty watercolor by Lars Jonsson of Sweden. That's just a sampling...

You'll certainly want the 96-page catalog detailing the works as a souvenir--or a poster by Bob Kuhn, this exhibition's featured Distinguished Wildlife Artist.

Perhaps my own enthusiasm is understandable: While I served as Director of Administration and Marketing at the Krasl Art Center in 1987-1988, it was at my urging that the board of directors agreed to sponsor this exhibition as part of the art center's 10th anniversary celebration.

The Krasl Art Center is an intimate space and overlooks Lake Michigan. St. Joseph offers good overnight accommodations and fine places to dine. With nearby wineries, it's a wonderful spot for an autumn weekend getaway. Of course, if you have more time, Wausau, Wisconsin, is perfect for an extended weekend visit during autumn's color

spectacular.

Birds in Art at the Leigh Yockey Woodson Art Museum celebrates its 15th anniversary this autumn. The exhibition runs through Oct. 28 and consists of 118 works by artists from 10 countries, and, for the first time, an artist from the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics will be represented in *Birds in Art*.

To commemorate the anniversary year, LYWAM offers a special poster featuring the works of 14 past Master Wildlife Artists. It's reasonably priced at just \$5. An exhibition catalog with 118 color reproductions is also available at \$7.50.

Each year, the *Birds in Art* exhibition features the work of a Master Wildlife Artist and this year, again to commemorate the 15th anniversary, a linen bound publication, *Birds in Art: The Masters*, has been printed. At \$24.95, it's a lasting souvenir of the exhibition and contains six large-size reproductions for each of the Masters as well as extensive text material and introductory essays.

All exhibitions at the LYWAM are free of charge, and the museum is located one mile northeast of downtown Wausau at the corner of Twelfth and Franklin Streets.

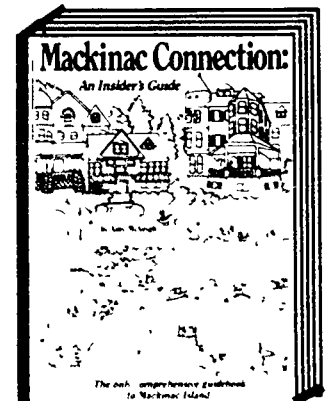
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Restored Grand Rapids mansion featured on historic homes tour

Grand Rapids, Michigan—

Make plans now to experience the Heritage Hill Annual Weekend Tour of Homes on Oct. 6 and 7. That weekend, 10 beautiful homes and one church in this historic district will open their doors to offer a glimpse of the splendor of a by-gone era. These homes feature a variety of architectural styles from the 1850s to the 1920s and represent historic restoration at its best.

Tickets for the tour are \$8 in advance or \$10 on the weekend of tour. Tickets are available in at the Heritage Hill Association office, phone 616-459-8950, and are good for both days.

This year's tour will include the 1908 Frank Lloyd Wright masterpiece — The Meyer May House. The Meyer May House, owned and restored by the Steelcase Corporation, is an excellent example of Wright's Prairie Style design. The home features interior furnishings designed by Wright.

Also featured on the weekend tour is the Philo Fuller House. Built in 1855, this graceful Italianate mansion was once enveloped by a synagogue. It later fell into such disrepair that it was slated for demolition. Today, it stands as a magnificent example of



PHILO FULLER HOUSE— Built in 1855 and lovingly restored, this graceful Italianate mansion was once enveloped by a synagogue. It later fell into such disrepair that it was slated for demolition.

historic preservation and restoration. It also has a stellar view of downtown Grand Rapids and the Grand Valley.

Heritage Hill is one of the largest urban historic districts in the United States. Its 365 acres contain 1,300 homes featuring over 60 architectural styles.

**McCabe Marlowe House - 74
Lafayette NE**

This elegant Italianate Villa style residence was built in the late 1850s. Grand Rapids Junior College Foundation preserved and renovated this gracious home with the help of students and instructors for the College's Occupational Training program. This stately home stands as an excellent

example of a historic residence that remains a vital and functional part of today's community as a conference and hospitality center.

168 Prospect NE

This charming home, built circa 1865, ranks as of the oldest residences in Heritage Hill. The original structure was a fairly modest country home in design and lacked such luxuries as indoor plumbing. The home has been extensively remodeled and includes beautiful antiques (and indoor plumbing).

309 Madison SE

This half-timber - stucco house would be equally at home in a country setting. Built circa 1920, it was home to John McDonald, who was a Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court. Its many rows of windows create a sun-brightened airy atmosphere.

12 Portsmouth NE

This unique home at 12 Portsmouth NE is celebrating its 100 year anniversary. Built for Eugene Carpenter, a prominent educator in West Michigan, this house has avoided much of the interior modification which is common in many Heritage Hill homes. The owners of this home spearheaded the playful color scheme which bounds this alley-like street.

265 Paris SE

This 1866 home had a rebirth over 120 years later. Plagued by neglect and severe deterioration, this house

was purchased by block residents who formed a partnership. The house was boarded until owners were found who could tackle the rebuilding project. During this reconstruction, the home was aptly described as a maze of 2x4's and a roof. Today, it is once again a beautiful single family home.

252 Madison SE

This circa 1880 home represents the quality family life-style which has characterized the Hill for over 100 years. Its first

resident was Mary Hubbard, the wife of a frontier lumberman. Today, the home is divided into three apartments, each occupying one floor.

534 College SE

The true highlight of this home is its many antique furnishings. Of all the homes on tour, the furnishings are most true to the period. The slightly odd look to this grand house resulted from the illegal demolition of the front porch by a previous owner. What remains is a portion of what was once a magnificent front porch.

304 College SE

This house was built in 1906 and is a combination of both Georgian and Colonial styles. It was converted to a two-family dwelling in 1912 as it remains today. The kitchen is uniquely furnished in a mixture of elements typical of the 30s to 50s and has a diner motif.

Central Reformed Church

The congregation of Central Reformed Church is celebrating its sesquicentennial. Although their present church was dedicated in 1956, it replaced the original church which was completely destroyed by fire in 1953. The only original remains is a pair of stained glass windows. In addition to the church's history, on-going organ concerts will be featured.

The Heritage Hill Historic District is adjacent to downtown Grand Rapids, the center of the cultural, shopping and business district.

The tour is self-guided. Homes may be seen in any order. Free shuttle buses run continuously throughout the tour route. Free parking is available. The tour is also walkable.

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Cider is the 'core' of Michigan autumn

As autumn's crisp air and colorful foliage sweep Michigan in September, state cider mill operators will polish their apple presses and prepare to open doors to thousands of visitors, AAA Michigan reports.

"Travelers often plan a trip to a cider mill for cider, caramel apples, doughnuts and jam in conjunction with a drive through the panoramic fall color regions in the state," said Peter Erickson, AAA Michigan Club Services director.

Michigan is the nation's third largest apple producer this year, behind Washington and New York. The state boasts 1,500 apple orchards and nearly 6 million apple trees. The most abundant variety of apples grown are Red Delicious, followed by Jonathon, Golden Delicious and Idared.

While the U.S. Department of Agriculture predicts that cooler than normal temperatures and frost last spring could result in an 11 percent decrease in Michigan's apple crop from last year, 848 million pounds of apples will be produced this season—one third of that amount processed into cider and juice.

The average cost of a gallon of cider this year is \$2.76, 12 cents higher than 1989. Prices range from \$2 to \$4.25. A dozen doughnuts averages \$2.76, costing from \$1 to \$4.

Since 75 percent of Americans name apples as their favorite snack fruit, it follows that apple cider ranks as one of

the nation's favorite drinks. A glass of cider is not only delicious, it's nutritious—low in fat, cholesterol and calories, and high in fiber and essential vitamins. Cider also makes a unique addition to recipes. Recipes that include apple cider as an ingredient follow:

MULLED APPLE PUNCH

3 lbs. cooking apples
2 tsp. cinnamon
½ tsp. cloves
1 tsp. nutmeg
3 cans frozen lemonade concentrate
1 red apple
Whole cloves
1 gallon apple cider

Wash apples; do not peel or core; cut into eights. Cook in small amount of water until very soft. Put through food mill or sieve. Stir in spices. Add frozen concentrate; heat gently until lemonade is thawed. Stud red apple with whole cloves; place in heatproof punch bowl; add spiced apple mixture. Heat cider (do not boil). Pour into punch bowl. Serve in mugs. Makes 20 1-cup servings.

CIDER POT ROAST

1½ C. cider
1 Tbs. brown sugar
2 tsp. salt
¼ tsp. cinnamon
¼ tsp. ginger
2 whole cloves
3 to 4 lbs. pot roast
Flour for dredging

Fat, shortening or oil

Make a marinade of cider, sugar, salt, cinnamon, ginger and cloves. Pour over meat; marinate about 24 hours in refrigerator, turning meat at least once. To cook, remove meat from marinade

and dredge with flour. In Dutch oven, large fry pan or electric fry pan, brown meat in hot fat. Turn heat to low. Pour marinade over meat. Cover, simmer for about three hours. Make gravy with pan drippings, if desired. Serves 12.



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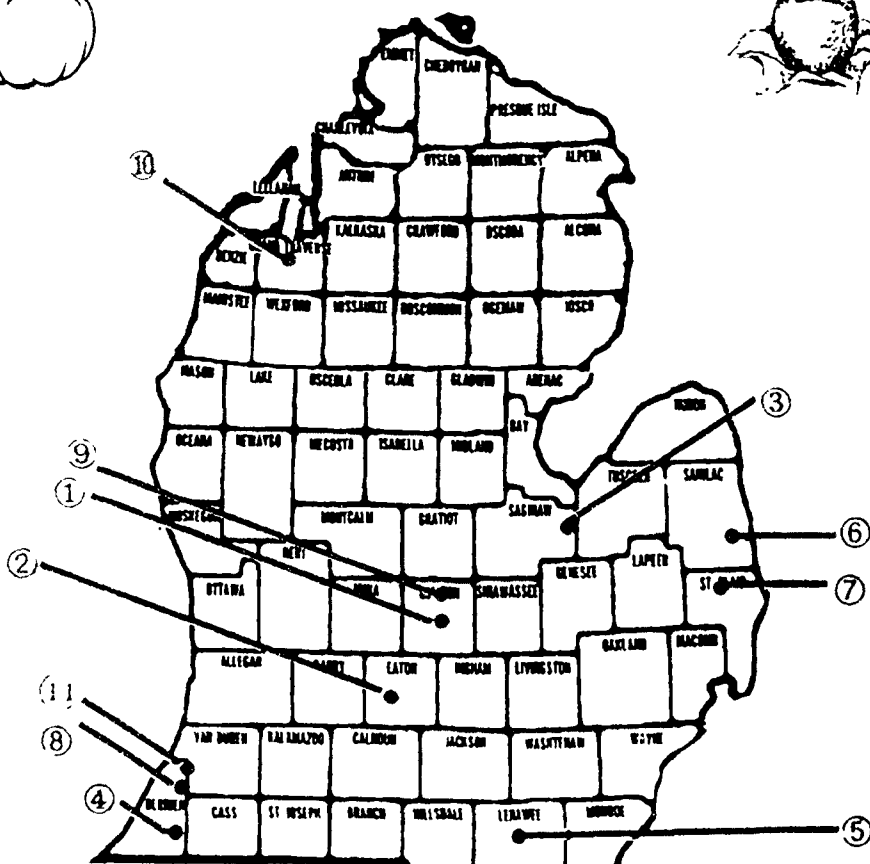
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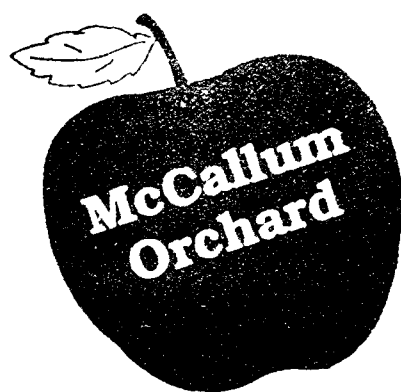
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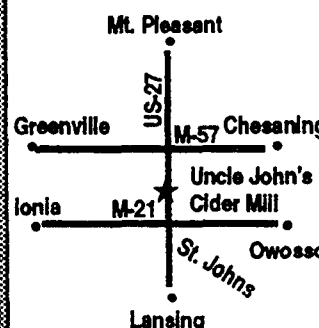
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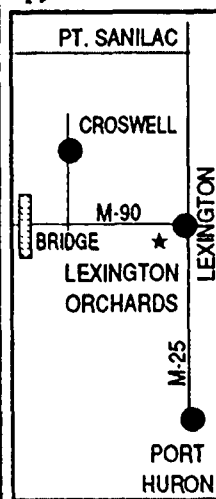
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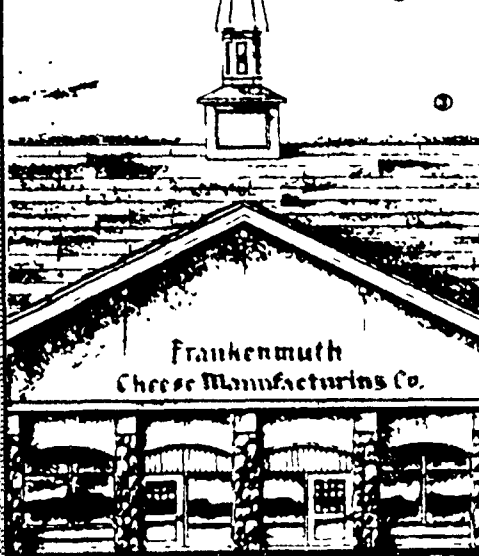
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Jordan Spectacular: Northern Michigan's out-of-the-way autumn color extravaganza

Bellaire, Michigan—

Just a hint of the golds and crimsons to come were nibbling at the leaves in late August as we jockeyed the pickup along the two-track that winds some 20 miles from Bellaire to US-131.

Here, we knew, that in little more than a month the splendor of autumn would cascade down from Canada and embrace the whole of the Jordan River Valley, creating what undoubtedly is one of the finest spectacles in Northern Michigan.

So rich in fall color is this valley of hardwood trees that those of us who live in Michigan's Tip of the Mitt take a recess from our own magnificent forests to enjoy, year after year, the Jordan Spectacular.

The pity of it all is that most downstaters who head north for the early October color zoom past the Jordan, unaware of the adjacent valley show.

We traveled through the valley to

meet with the DNR's forest fireman, Carl Stahl, who manages the vast valley forest making up a big piece of Antrim County.

"Welcome to the land of color," he says, holding out a hand.

Having worked in Northern Michigan's forests for more than a quarter century, Stahl minces no words when he proclaims "there's no place quite as beautiful in fall than right here, along the Jordan River."

"Right here" means the northeast corner of Antrim County, along the western edge of US-131 and midway between Mancelona and Boyne Falls. If you're coming from the south of 131, it's almost directly west of Gaylord by way of Highway 32.

"It's all pretty," he says, brushing his hand across the map stretched out before him. "But I'd say the best color is up here in the corner and the best way to see it is to take the two track that starts just south of M-32 (at US131) and wind your way along the Jordan River to just east of Bellaire. Or you can start at Bellaire, if you're coming by way of US-31, and head east over this same trail to US-131."

And either way, he adds, the "must stop" is "Dead Man's Hill."

The latter lies at the end of Dead Man's Hill Road, just a couple miles

off US-131 and just south of the M-32 intersection. There, in any season, the panoramic view of the valley is breathtaking. Down below, stretching as far as you can see, is the Jordan valley, river, hardwood forest, and the twisting two-track. On clear days your eyes will take you to Torch Lake and beyond to Lake Michigan.

In late September and early October the color is dazzling. If you haven't got time for a two-hour drive through the valley, a few minutes at the top of the hill will give you a good snapshot and an unforgettable experience.

Dead Man's Hill, explains Stahl, came by its name because a lumberjack and his horse-pulled Big Wheel, loaded with logs, went crashing to the bottom of the hill.

And, indeed, a state marker at the crest of the hill tells of 21-year-old Stanley "Big Sam" Graczyk's demise on that May 20th day in 1910. We sat on one of the scenic benches, to catch our breath and to contemplate his fate at so beautiful of a place. Above, an August wind whistled through a big pine and reminded us of the invigorating season already on its way.

Far below, following the river and the two-track but hidden in the waves of trees, is a hiking and camping trail that, says Stahl, is a backpacking adventure covering two-days and 18 miles.

Called the Jordan River Pathway, the trail offers several options for hiking lengths. Deadman's Hill loop is three miles; it begins and ends at the top of the hill. Other segments can be hiked individually or in combination. Although pathway is not an extremely strenuous hike, a trail jaunt will

necessitate plenty of rest stops for those who have been regularly watching TV and munching chips.

Within the Jordan forest are two rustic state campgrounds—one, Graves Crossing, for vehicles; the other, Pinney Bridge, for those who hike in.

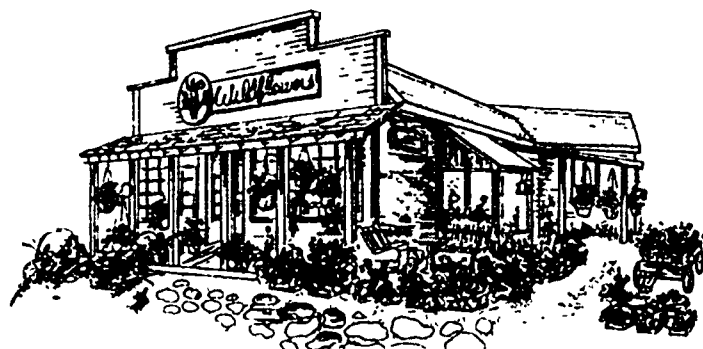
Aside from the autumn colors, the Jordan River is the centerpiece of the valley. Too shallow to canoe, the Jordan is a fishing paradise for either fly or spin-cast trouters. Eastern brook trout is the dominant fish species; Easterns are numerous but generally of small size. The river also has a spring spawning run of steelhead trout.

Dedicated in 1972 as Michigan's first "Natural Scenic River, the Jordan and its tributaries derive 90 percent of their flow from springs, which are predominant natural features of the valley. The river watershed covers 101,800 acres, of which 22,000 are state owned.

The forest's main species of trees are sugar maple, basswood, American beech, white ash and American elm, according to Stahl. It also contains many aspen, white birch and red maple and, of course, a vast number of cedars along the winding river, he adds.

It's the hardwoods that drape the Jordan in autumn finery, which, he insists (and we agree), is "the best dang color you'll find anywhere in these parts. And it's free!"

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Fall salmon outlook: Good coho, fair chinook

Michigan anglers can expect good coho salmon and fair chinook fishing during this fall's spawning runs, AAA Michigan reports.

Fisheries biologists with the state's Department of Natural Resources expect coho and chinook catches to match last year's, in spite of the mysterious Bacterial Kidney Disease (BKD) affecting Lake Michigan chinooks.

The disease, common even among healthy fish, is normally not lethal but fisheries experts are trying to determine why BKD has triggered spring die offs of Lake Michigan chinooks.

An estimated 500,000 anglers are expected to spend nearly 3 million fishing days seeking salmon in the Great Lakes during August and September and tributaries through October.

Chinooks average 14 to 20 pounds with the largest concentrations in Lakes Michigan and Huron streams. Cohos average 6 to 8 pounds with the greatest numbers running in Lakes Superior and Michigan connecting waters.

The heaviest salmon runs in Western Michigan are expected in the Manistee, Grand, Muskegon and White rivers. Rogers City and

Harrisville areas along with the Au Sable River should provide the best action in East Michigan.

The Huron River in the southeast part of the state should offer good numbers. The Upper Peninsulas Black, Big Iron, St. Marys, Two-Hearted, Manistique, Carp and Dead rivers are recommended.

Salmon snagging, which requires a snagging stamp, is allowed with artificial baits or unweighted hooks in certain areas from Sept. 10 through Oct. 15. Anglers should refer to the 1990 Michigan Fishing Guide, available

where fishing licenses are sold, for details.

Both species of salmon were introduced into the Great Lakes during the 1960s and populations are maintained through annual stream stocking programs.

Anglers concerned about contaminants in catches should trim the fat along a file's center and edges after skinning. Those fatty portions contain concentrations of contaminants. The fish should be baked, barbecued or broiled to allow remaining fat to drip off.

Capt. Sammy shuns metro waters in favor of little Grindstone City

Grindstone City, Michigan —

The first thing customers notice about *Great Laker Skipper Sam* Ciaramitaro is his size. Sam is 6'3" and weighs in at 250 pounds. The next thing they notice is how soft spoken he is and what a great smile he offers them as he warmly welcomes them aboard for their charter trip.

Sammy, as he is affectionately called by some close associates, is one of the best liked skippers on the Great Lakes. He is always willing to aid his fellow charter captains, both on and off the water. He has been known to take a new, inexperienced captain aboard his boat for a fishing trip and literally teach him all he knows about getting the fish they both seek. He presently heads up the new Thumb Area Charter Captains Association on Lake Huron at the tip of Michigan's thumb.

Sam grew up in St. Clair Shores along the St. Clair River and fished all the time, "since I was big enough to hold a pole." During the 1960's, he visited his grandfather who lived in the Thumb near Grindstone City.

"My friends and I would walk two miles each way to Grindstone Harbor to fish every chance we got instead of hanging out and getting into trouble," he said. They fished from shore for bass and perch. The shore was lined with trees, some growing into the water, which made for very good bass fishing. Water levels were quite low at that time and the only boats fishing offshore were small 14 to 16 foot outboards.

Sam spent five years working as a mate, first on a 28 foot Bertrum then a 33 foot Chris Craft on Lake St. Clair and Lake Huron. The first boat he owned was a 21-foot Whaler. He has been a licensed captain since 1983 and proudly describes his present charter boat as a 1986, 28-foot Marquette with an 11-foot beam, 25 inch draft and twin 318 Chrysler engines.

When he first started chartering, Sam could not afford downriggers so he used Pink Ladies and claims he did better than the guys who were fully equipped.

Sam's decision to bring his charter business to Grindstone Harbor was based on his early good memories of the area. The states DNR Fisheries Division was actively planting sport fish in the harbor so it looked like a good place to develop a business. He also liked the idea of being away from the crush of boats in the major metropolitan area of Detroit and thought his customers would appreciate the chance to "get away from it all."

The first fish planted at Grindstone were brown trout and it took two years to figure out how to

catch them. Soon lake trout became the target fish and the area adopted the title of "Lake Trout Capital of the World."

Numerous fish plants were producing great catches and Sam's business began to grow. He started chartering full time in 1985, devoting a good deal of efforts on promotion. He helped produce fishing videos which appeared on local TV stations. He made the circuit working trade shows and provided fishing reports to newspaper and radio stations throughout the state.

When asked if he believed his charter business directly affected the growth of his adopted community, Sam responded, "Absolutely, I book 75 charters a year, 80% of which are repeaters. This brings approximately 400 people into the area each year that otherwise would not know about it.

My customers return to camp or stay at local motels even when they are not planning a charter trip."

Sam suggests other charter operations might seek out areas 'off the beaten path' and offer to work with the local businesses to benefit themselves and the communities. He feels most marina owners are eager to lease dockage to charter captains, offering discounts on tackle and other incentives to attract them. Marina owners are aware charter boats bring new people to their marina. After fishing on a charter boat many folks buy their own boat and are therefore potential customers for the marinas.

The manner which charter captains care for their vessels and equipment also enhances a marina. Sam has approximately \$ 50,000 invested in his boat and equipment. His annual cost of operation runs from

\$7,000 to \$8,000 much of which is spent at his local marina for dockage, fuel and tackle.

Sam launches in April and runs right through October, chartering for lake trout, salmon and walleye. He often books double charters and, if weather allows, he may be on the water 10 to 11 hours daily, seven days a week.

When asked if his methods were different than other Great Lakes captains, Sam replied, "There are no secrets, if a stranger walks up and asks how I fish, I tell him. You have to go out and do it, listen and learn. My theory is, run less lines and catch more fish.

"My customer caught the biggest fish I ever boated this past season. I knew it was a good fish when it took all 240 yards of line out, it never stopped. I chased it and got line on. When I saw it 30 yards from the boat, I loosened the drag on the reel and told the customer, take your time, we have all day.

"The fish made three runs during a 45 minute fight with father and son sharing the rod. I was almost afraid to net it. When it was in the boat, I heaved a sigh of relief and got right on the radio telling everyone we had a 30 pound king salmon. Silence, they did not believe it. When we weighed it in, the scales tipped 33 pounds and 12 ounces. There's a tradition at our harbor, when a captain brings in a really good catch, they get hosed down. Boy, did I get doused that day."

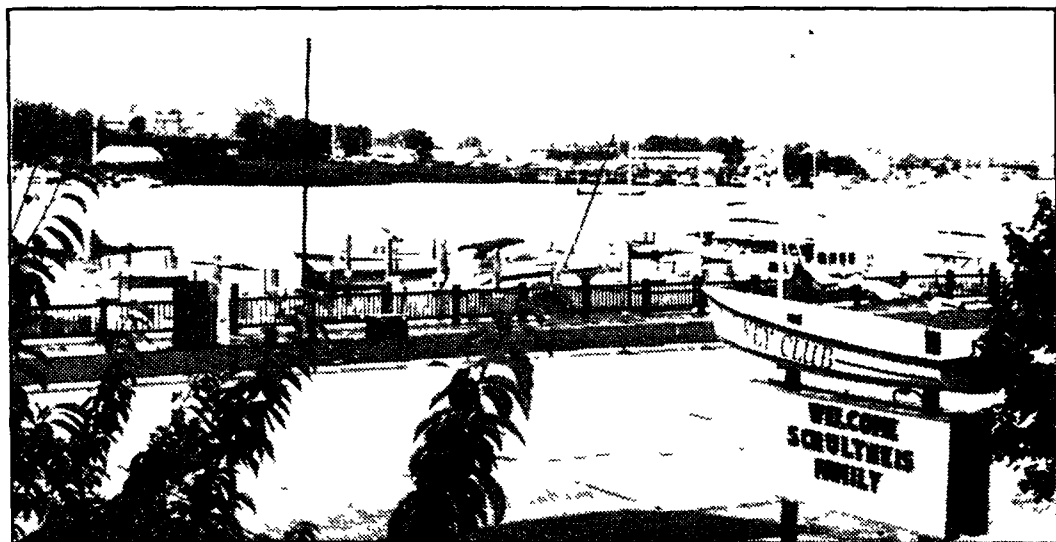
Sam is hoping to expand his business by additional promotion ideas. He has set a goal of 130 charters per year and thinks this is something very important.

He wants to keep reaching for new goals, learning and experimenting, thereby offering new ideas for his customers. He spends the off season working at a taxidermy shop but doesn't do fish. He also works the trade shows and mails out letters to his past customers. When asked what he enjoys in his leisure time he said, "I used to go fishing for my hobby but now it's a job so I go hunting."

When asked what he considered to be the most important aspect of a successful charter trip, Sam responded, "Happy faces, even when I'm down. I always send them away happy."

PBS makes bold move in beginning fall season

'The Civil War' brings era to life

It was the war that shaped this nation, and proved more costly in American lives than almost all American wars combined.

It was the Civil War, the war in which Americans took up arms against fellow Americans. "The Civil War," an 11-hour documentary detailing the events surrounding the war, will kick off PBS' 1990-91 season when it airs on five consecutive nights beginning Sunday, Sept. 23.

The series, which promises to be the most comprehensive and definitive history of the Civil War ever put on film, was five years in the making. It not only covers the maneuvers made by the Union and the Confederacy, but also delves deeper in the complex causes and lasting effects of the war.

"The Civil War" also humanizes the events of the 1860s, including scenes from the battlefronts and the homefronts and observations from generals as well as ordinary soldiers.

The 1860s was a time of mechanical evolution, from the building of

huge steel ships to the creation of numerous new war weapons. The invention of the camera played a big part in preserving memories of the Civil War, and those early pictures are invaluable to this PBS series.

The 11-hour series was edited from more than 150 hours of footage of photographs and interviews. Actual photographs convey the tone during the period, as do letters and journals saved and shared by descendants. In fact more than 16,000 photographs of the Civil War were filmed from more than 150 archives.

Period paintings, lithographs and headlines are combined with moving newsreel footage of Civil War veterans, live footage of the now quiet battle sites, interviews with distinguished historians and quotes from the time delivered by some of today's top actors.

Those images tell how the nation was torn apart over the issues of slavery and Union vs. States' Rights in a war that raged for five years and stretched from Valverde, N.M. to St. Albans, Vt.

Shelby Foote, "The Civil War's" principal on-camera commentator, is a Southern novelist who interrupted his career for 20 years to re-

search and write the critically acclaimed definitive history of the war, "The Civil War: A Narrative," a landmark three-volume work.

Through his narration in this series, Foote makes not only the war come to life, but also human events that were shaping the era, from slaves and free blacks who were beginning to speak out, to the farmers who left their land to become a part of history.

Brothers Ric and Ken Burns served as co-producers and co-writers for "The Civil War," while Geoffrey C. Ward, former editor of "American Heritage" magazine, was principal writer. Their companion book, "The Civil War — An Illustrated History," featuring more than 400 period photographs, paintings and cartoons will also be available this fall.

Of the subject of his epic work, "The Civil War," Ken Burns said, "The Civil War was history running on all cylinders. It was the most important event in the life of our nation, and its importance continues today. The blueprint of the America we know was drawn up then, and whether we know it or not, we're still walking around in the shadow of that war."

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Walter Cronkite to narrate documentary on marine pollution

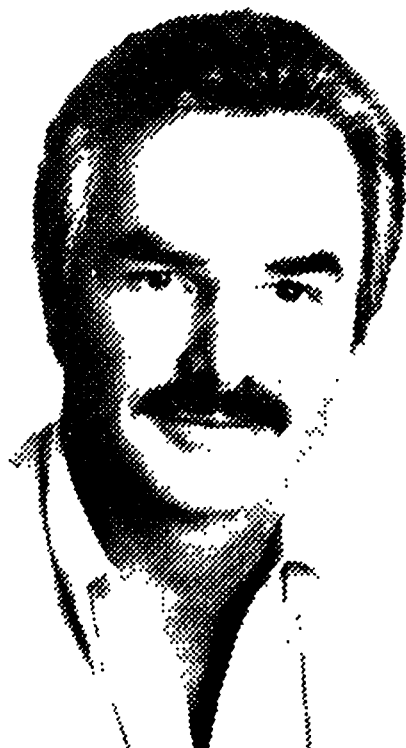

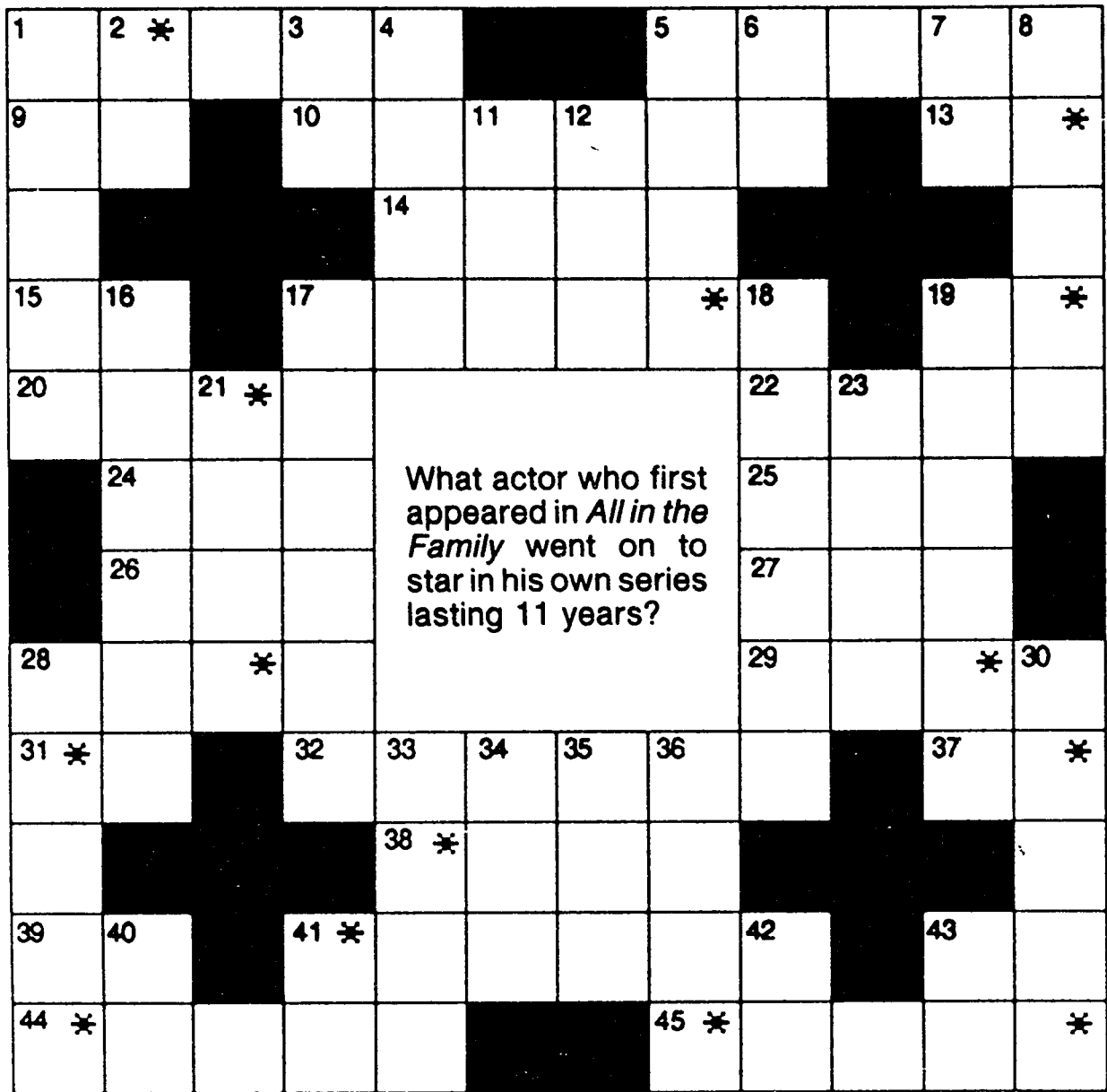

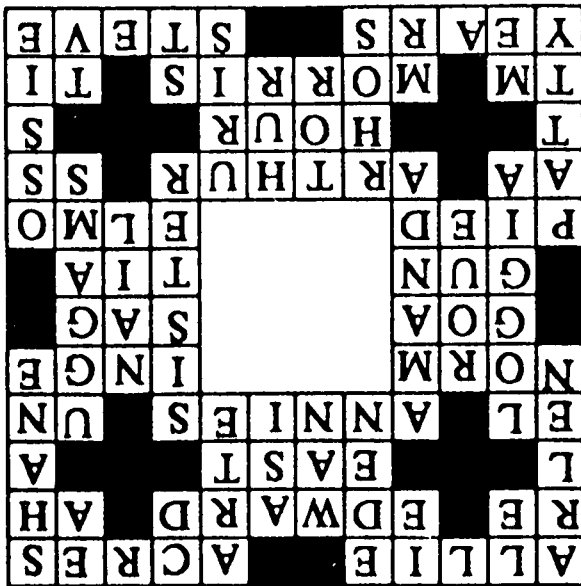

Mickey Rourke played tough guy even in British-made film

Q: I have been interested in Mickey Rourke's screen personality in the films I have seen him in, including Angel Heart, The Year Of The Dragon and Johnny Handsome. But I think I saw him also in a British film or in a film in which he played a British personality, and he may have even directed it. Would you happen to know anything about this? In all of the American films I have seen, he always carries across the Brooklyn personality type, but in the one I am trying to remember, he played quite a different type of character. One other thing came to my attention that Rourke looks, talks and acts in a manner similar to that of Bruce Willis. Is there any connection between the two actors? —Howard Duck, Greenville, Texas

A: Mickey Rourke played an IRA hit man, with a dubious Irish accent, in *A Prayer For The Dying*. The 1987 British film, based on a novel by Jack Higgins, also starred Bob Hoskins, as a priest, and Alan Bates, as a mortician. Rourke did not direct. A native New Yorker, Rourke spent much of his youth in a rough neighborhood in Miami, Fla., where he became very adept at streetfighting. He considered a boxing career, but upon his return to New York decided to try acting. Bruce Willis, who worked as a bartender before his success as an actor, is also from the New Jersey/New York area. Perhaps that would explain the similarity between the two actors, they both have that hard edge. There is no other connection.

Q: What ever happened to Brenda Marshall, the lovely brunette co-star with Errol Flynn in *The Sea Hawk* and only wife of William Holden? Is she still living and where? —Marilyn Cooper, Goodland, Kan.

A: Brenda Marshall, born Ardis Ankersen in 1915, has been quoted as saying of moviemaking "I hated it. One year they made me do eight pictures and I wound up with a nervous breakdown." She retired from films in 1950 after filming *The Iroquois Trail*. Married to William Holden for 30 years, she never remarried. She had two sons by Holden and a daughter by a previous marriage. She makes her home in California.

He seldom speaks of his career in films and many of his friends are not aware he was the famous child actor.
