I or kill rats out issues

Angela Thompson likes to take relaxing afternoon horseback rides along Six Mile Road in Northville Township.

She thinks the rolling, tree-lined mile stretch between Sheldon and Beck roads offers perhaps the definitive sampling of the township's rural flavor.

The sparsely populated area also provides abundant habitat for a variety of animal life, including fox, raccoon and deer. Thompson especially enjoys watching deer and often views them from atop her horse.

But a Wednesday encounter with a freshly-butchered deer carcass has left the township woman enraged — and concerned.

"I was riding my horse along the

easement on Six Mile at about 4:30 p.m. when I saw it," Thompson said. "The blood was bright red and carved pieces of meat were on the ground next to it."

Thompson found three dressed leg sections of a deer within a couple of feet of a sheet-covered deer carcass. The deer — an antlerless adult — apparently had been killed and gutted elsewhere and wrapped in a sheet and newspapers and placed along the Six Mile easement.

The sections of meat Thompson found are among portions of deer flesh most coveted by hunters. Lt. Cliff Johnson, district supervisor for conservation officers in a five-county southeastern Michigan area, said,

Fire hall may expand

The latest plan to expand Northville City's fire hall was approved recently by the city council.

But the addition is still more than a year from becoming a reality, city officials said.

The addition would provide two new vehicle bays west of the existing fire hall and storage space under-

neath its south side, and would be similar in form to the east wing of city hall. A new sidewalk from the police department parking lot would lead into the basement storage area.

Measuring 28 feet wide by 51 feet deep, the addition would require the relocation of the police department's communication tower. It would be slightly less wide than the existing west wall of city hall.

Fire Chief Jim Allen told the coun-

cil that the addition would allow the fire department to run more efficiently by giving firefighters easier access to vehicles. The department must now park two of its five trucks behind the other three, because there are only three bays.

"Stacking your trucks is not the ideal way to run your fire station, no way," Allen said, explaining that

Racing returns to the Downs

Harness racing action returns to Northville with the opening of the winter season tonight, Oct. 15.

The racing meet, conducted by Jackson Trotting Association, will span 66 programs, on a Monday-through-Saturday basis concluding Monday, Dec. 31. Matinee racing will begin on Saturday, Dec. 1 with post time at 1 p.m. and the evening program following at 7:30 p.m. Matinee racing then continues every Saturday (Dec. 8, 15, 22, and 29), post time 1 p.m., evening program follows with the first event going postward at 7:30 p.m.

Post time will remain the same this season, with the first race going post-

ward at 7:30 p.m. Daily Double wagering will take place on the first and second races and perfecta and trifecta wagering on every race. Tri-Super wagering takes place on the fifth and seventh races and consists of picking the first three finishers in the fifth races and the first four finishers in the 7th races (with a mandatory payoff after the Tri-Super pool reaches \$25,000).

Four-year-old standardbreds will take center stage during October and November in the Michigan Bred Pari-Mutuel. Four-year-old colt trotters go postward on Saturday, Oct. 27 and four-year-old filly pacers on Saturday, Nov. 10.

Eliminations, if necessary, will be held on week prior to the finals, Oct. 20 and Nov. 3, respectively. Both events carry an estimated purse of \$100,000.

The Oktoberfest pacing series, a late closer for three and four-year-olds go postward on Friday, Oct. 26. Eliminations will be held one week prior to the finals (Friday, Oct. 19).

The Harvest Moon pacing series, a late closer for three-year-olds go postward on Saturday, Nov. 24. Eliminations will be held one week prior to the finals (Saturday, Nov. 17).

Three-year-olds move into the spotlight on Friday, Nov. 2 for the Ron Hodge Memorial Pace.

A Mustang mermaid worked at sinking the U.S.S. Charger on the sophomore float. The sophomores received third place.

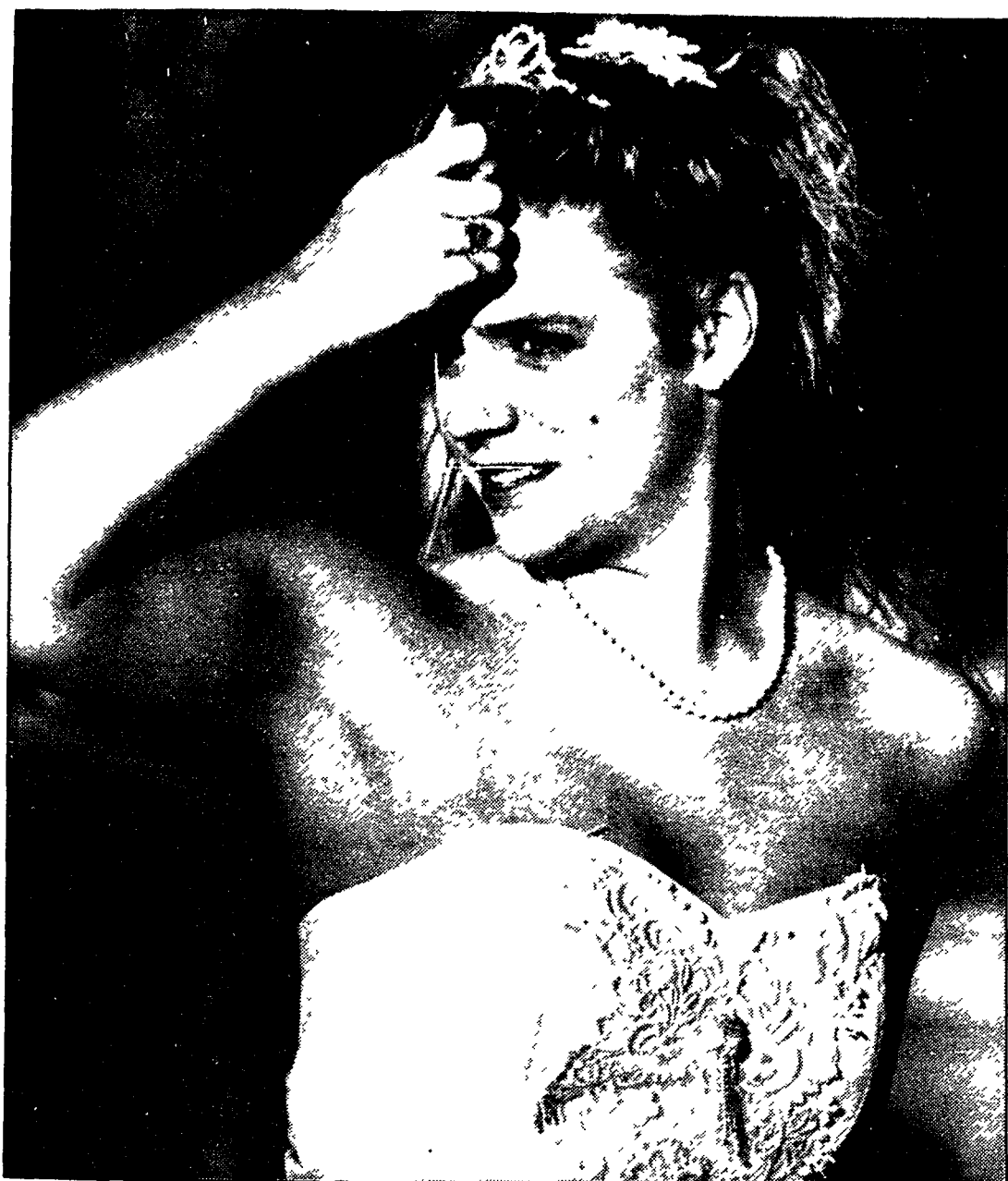
The senior class came in fourth place with its float of a fish.

Students offer ideas to ease graduation day

A group of 35 Novi High School seniors agreed the commencement ceremony needed to be changed to help control discipline problems, but they drew the line at moving the ceremony inside.

The newly formed Student Advisory Council reported Thursday to the Novi Board of Education on its decisions to cut out several speakers, eliminate performances by the band during the ceremony, and add a short speech of between three and five minutes by the valedictorians and salutatorians to the 1991 commencement exercises.

The students also planned to add ribbons and sashes to the commencement garb to denote honors rather than having time spent at the ceremony announcing each student's honors.

They decided they absolutely did not want the ceremony to be held inside unless it rained.

Students will no longer be lined up by height if the Student Advisory Council plan is put in action. They will have the students lined up alphabetically and alternating women and men.

Board members began to comment on the students' decisions when they heard the idea.

Secretary Sandra Thornton supported the idea because parents could find their children easier.

But President Robert Schram said he thinks the procession looks better when the students enter by height as they have in the past.

The students' most controversial idea would have the new graduates surround the football field after receiving their diplomas. They planned to run on the football field and throw their mortarboards when everyone had received a diploma, but the student group had not yet approved the idea.

But the idea sounded a little risky to some board members.

Thornton said the women's high heels could damage the track. Trustee Raymond Byers said control of the students would be lost if they were allowed to throw their mortarboards.

"That's where you lose it," he said. "As soon as they throw the hats you'll never get them back under control."

Whether the students would attain the goal of decreasing discipline problems by shortening the ceremony was a concern to several board members.

Novi High School Principal Robert Youngberg said he expected discipline problems to be solved or at least lessened because students have been given a voice in the planning process.

"The relationship between students, administrators and the board creates a good feeling and contributes to good behavior," Youngberg said.

Superintendent Robert Pwko noted that the students were becoming frustrated with the board's suggestions after having spent so much time making decisions about the ceremony.

Trustee Byers said the board will accept whatever the students come up with, but one parent was not convinced.

George Hoffman said he was afraid the board would not allow the students to do the ceremony as planned.

"I'm concerned that I heard some meddling on the part of the school board," Hoffman said.

He suggested the board allow the students full control over the 1991 commencement exercises and monitor the results.

Hoffman was generally pleased that the board was allowing the students to participate in revising the ceremony.

The 'tough' teachers are often the best ones

My son's friends were discussing their teachers recently. They complained of one English teacher who was very "tough," who really pours the work on. A student has to work to get an "A" from her — and these are all high-achieving students. Sometimes, my son and his friends are working till 10:30 p.m. on her assignments. To me, she doesn't seem reasonable. She doesn't seem to be very popular the way the kids talk. Do you think I should talk to her about this?

No. Because you also told me that college-bound juniors and seniors in your high school all want to get into her class. That tells a story. According to you, she expects that the students will write at a college level before leaving her class. She does not accept mediocrity. Let's thank her. From my experience, the most popular teachers are not necessarily the best teachers. Yes, a very popular teacher can be one of the best teachers in the building, but there is no hard and fast rule on this issue.

Some of the most effective teachers have non-charismatic personalities but can teach up a storm. And, yes, many very charismatic teachers can teach up a storm. There is no fixed rule.

How can you tell a good teacher? First off, they care about the kids and want them to be successful. Second, they are organized, they know their subject and are continually, on a daily basis, self-evaluating their performance. Their self-evaluation is usually more stringent than their principal's formal evaluation of their performance.

They set high standards for themselves and have high expectations for their students.

They don't "shoot from the hip." When class starts they're ready.

They are not the arrested adolescent "Freddy Fraternity or Sally Sor-

ority" types who think entertaining the kids — wasting class time — will endear themselves to their students.

Students in the "Freddy Fraternity" class may initially appear to enjoy the antics but later on will complain about what they didn't learn.

When I was a high school counselor, we visited colleges to get information from our former students regarding how we could do a better job. The discussion invariably came down to our teachers.

Teachers I thought were average or marginal, whom the kids complained about the most while in high school, often turned out to be the teachers they said helped them the most. They also told us what they didn't like in teachers.

What don't they like? They don't like the "I'm your buddy" teacher. Indeed, their message is: I've got my own buddies, you be my teacher.

One teacher showed so many movies, the kids would say, "I never recognized him until the second semester because the lights were always out."

Students don't like teachers who grade ridiculously hard; a class in which one has to be a Fulbright Scholar to get an A or B.

Teachers who use grades as a means and a weapon to control classroom behavior are not in the students' hall of fame.

Also, teachers who give out almost all A's and B's for mediocre performances to be liked by the kids, or to keep parents off their backs, are not really respected.

Teachers who lower a student's grade from an A to a B because the student "mouthed off" in class one day creates an even more angry adolescent to deal with.

These above situations, of course, are exceptions, but they do occur. Most teachers use reason and logic in assignments and are fair in grading. These college-bound students you

refer to need teachers who set high standards, teachers who require quality work, teachers who prepare students for the challenge they will face in college.

Indeed, university professors respect and often personally know or at least know of those high school teachers who deliver students well-prepared for college work.

Candidly, I know the high school principal of the teacher to whom you refer. The principal says her students write letters of appreciation to her from college. Many students visit her just to say thanks.

The students say, "Mrs. X really

taught me how to write."

So, it seems Mrs. X is not interested in being the most popular teacher. She wants to be a teacher students say prepared them for college and life.

She is the teacher students will always remember.

Headlee says no to write-ins

Richard Headlee said no to a write-in campaign for governor on his behalf by the Oakland County Taxpayers Association.

"It's a waste of their votes. All my money, time and effort are going to rolling back (property) taxes and electing John Engler, who's helping me," said Headlee, 60, chairperson of Taxpayers United.

With that he tossed a 5-cent piece on the table, symbolizing the weekly property tax relief he and John Engler say Gov. James Blanchard's program will provide.

Engler, the Republican gubernatorial nominee, came to Headlee's quarters in the Alexander Hamilton Insurance Co. in Farmington Hills to declare Blanchard's tax relief plan "an insult."

"Engler endorsed Taxpayers United's proposal to cut all property taxes 20 percent over two years — \$1 billion in relief."

Headlee, 60, learned about the write-in endorsement Tuesday morning when he reached his office. He had been in a Salt Lake City hospital for tests three years to the day after receiving a heart transplant.

Dominick Vincenti, chairman of the Oakland anti-tax group, said it could endorse neither Engler nor Blanchard for governor, charging

they had frustrated the intent of the 1978 Headlee tax limitation amendment.

Vincenti said his board acted without consulting Headlee. "But in a free election, we don't need his OK. Voters can vote for whomever they want."

Headlee was the GOP's 1982 nominee for governor.

Engler urged angry voters to mail nickels to Blanchard's State Capitol office in Lansing (ZIP 48913) to protest the governor's "meager, nickel a week in property tax relief."

Blanchard proposed capping homeowners' assessments at the rate of consumer price inflation and returning the difference as an income tax rebate. Cost to the state treasury: \$20 million a year, divided by 9.3 million people, divided by 52 weeks — or less than 5 cents. The bill is locked in the Senate Finance Committee.

Headlee's group would cut assessments from the current 50 percent of market value to 45 and then 40 percent over two years. It will go on the 1992 ballot unless the Legislature adopts it first.

Cost estimates of that plan, which Engler favors, range from \$1 billion (Headlee's) to \$1.5 billion (House Taxation chairman Lyn Jondahl, D-East Lansing). Relief would go to businesses as well as homeowners.

State government would have to reimburse local units the lost revenue if Headlee's plan becomes law. The candidates differ on how it should be done:

- Blanchard's treasury department said, "The most likely revenue source would be local revenue sharing" — the money state government already gives local units.
- Engler said \$200 million to \$250

million could come from freezes on state hiring and on "unsound contracts" that the administration has awarded "political allies." Other savings could come from "taking out layers" of employees in such departments as Licensing and Regulation and using state workers to provide "protective services" rather than to fill four new Lansing office buildings.

Added Headlee: "State government growth has been almost double the rate of inflation since 1982 (when Blanchard was elected and the bottom of the recession)." He suggested dismantling the infrastructure in the Department of Social Services, eliminating some of the 2,000 non-teaching employees in the Department of Education and ousting "thousands of flaksters."

Engler denounced the influence of two teachers unions, the Michigan Education Association and Michigan Federation of Teachers, on Blanchard's educational policy. "The unions are fighting reform and are hypersensitive to rich, out-of-formula school districts," he said.

Reminded that he was speaking in a rich, out-of-formula school district, Engler didn't back down, equating Blanchard's program with "statist" big government and his with "populism."

Taylor takes shots at opponent Kelley

In normal times, a state attorney general can chase dishonest cellular telephone dealers and transmission repair shops. "But these aren't normal times," said Cliff Taylor.

The Republican challenger said incumbent Democrat Frank Kelley fails to understand "the threat to civilized life in our cities" from organized crime and drugs.

"I'm running against a 30-year incumbent," Taylor, 47, told Oakland Young Republicans in Farmington Monday night. "The only other public figures who have been around that long are Fidel Castro and Queen Elizabeth II."

"Unless one is a divine-right monarch or a despot, 30 years are enough. Thirty and out!" said Taylor, echoing the auto union's pension slogan.

Kelley, now 65, was appointed by Gov. John Swainson (1961-62) and won his current term with more than 65 percent of the vote.

Nevertheless, Taylor, an East Lansing trial and defense lawyer and former two-year assistant Ingham County prosecutor, insisted Kelley's priorities are askew.

"The attorney general can be more than a consumer ombudsman. He need not be reflexively anti-utility."

"Kelley has only one lawyer, out of 290, in organized crime. There have been no prosecutions. I'm not saying he's soft. Kelley just doesn't understand what's happening."

"I don't know why we have a drug czar (Don Reisig, former Ingham judge and prosecutor) when we have an attorney general."

While paying lip service to tougher crime bills, Taylor said, Gov. James Blanchard and Kelley have failed to use their clout with majority Democrats to pry good bills out of Rep. Perry Bullard's House Judiciary Committee.

"They know how to generate a firestorm in the media," Taylor said.

Bullard, D-Ann Arbor, has locked up bills allowing no-knock search warrants, wiretapping, and forfeiture of assets of corrupt businesses.

"These are not novel proposals. They're law in many states," Taylor said.

A close associate of gubernatorial candidate John Engler, Taylor is known in legal circles and is co-chairman of a screening panel for the appointment of federal judges.

In an interview and in reply to Young Republican audience questions, Taylor also said:

- Sobriety check points are "fine."
- Blanchard's "COPS" program to put state-paid officers into selected neighborhoods is "window dressing. That is not the essence of the problem we're dealing with. We're dealing with the problem of criminal activity (drugs), which is different from cops on the beat."

- The attorney general's office shouldn't prosecute Open Meetings Act cases against university boards as long as there are "willing litigants" such as major newspapers who can sue.

- Critics are mistaken in saying the attorney general has sufficient authority to go after polluters without the new bills enacted by the Legislature and signed Monday by Blanchard.

- Kelley selectively enforces pollution laws, letting Democratic Detroit off the hook but beating up on Republican Grand Rapids.

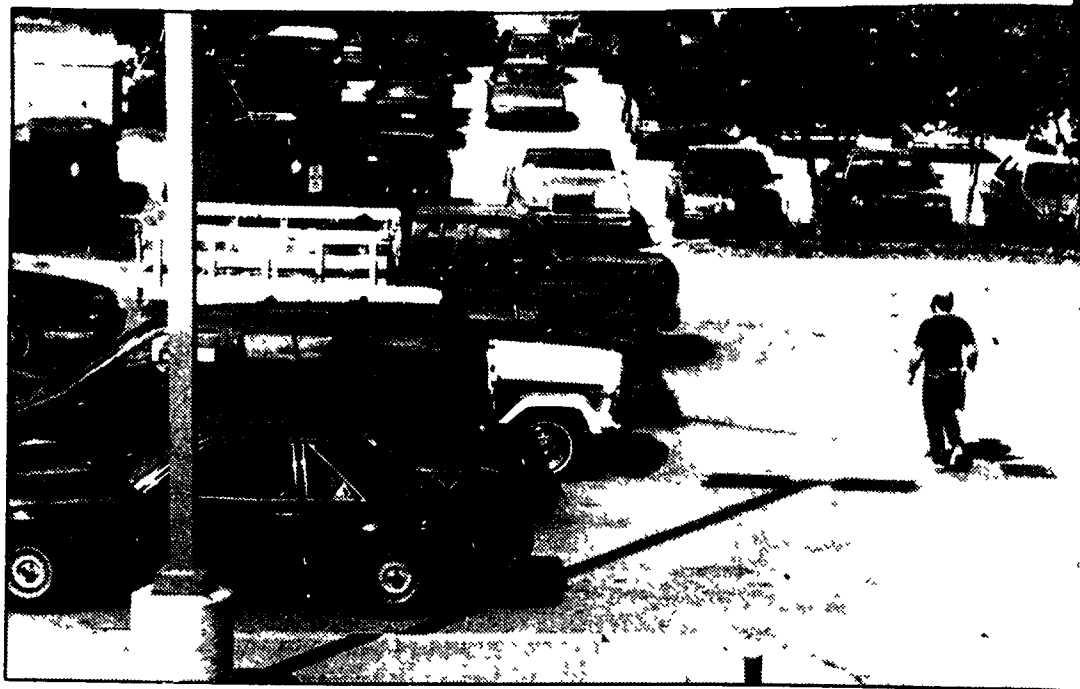

Lot rebuilding OK'd

The city council has approved a \$93,565 reconstruction plan for the parking lot behind the Marquis Theater.

The cost includes \$75,884 for construction; \$10,092 for engineering, surveying and inspections; and a 10-percent contingency fee.

The reconstruction will increase the lot's capacity to 179 spaces,

through a more efficient layout of parking spaces. Most of the spaces will run in rows from east to west. An exit from the lot at the corner of Dunlap and Hutton streets will be closed.

Council members were satisfied with several changes made to the plan after an initial review Sept. 10.

City engineers McNeely & Lincoln Associates eliminated a drive into the northeast section of the parking lot off the Hutton Street entrance, a move that added parking spaces and

left more room for landscaping on the corner, and added a row of parking along the west side of the Edwards Caterer building in response to council suggestions.

The new plan adds a total of 35 parking spaces to the 144-space lot, at a cost of \$2,456 per space if the contingency fund is not used. The reconstruction will be funded by a recently-issued \$130,000 special assessment bond, and should begin this month.

Tough blaze wrecks barn

Spontaneous combustion is a possible cause of a fire that destroyed a hay barn and damaged horse trailers at TJM Farms on Seven Mile Road last week.

Township Fire Chief Robert Toms said the cause of the Oct. 10 early morning blaze has not been determined. But he said a chemical reaction among bales of hay and straw inside the building at 50265 Seven Mile could have started the fire.

"Absolutely, if you put green hay inside a barn you're going to have a fire," he said. "Barn fires with hay are not uncommon. We're not sure that's what it was, but it's part of our investigation."

No animals were inside the barn and Toms reported no fire department injuries.

Township firefighters responded to a burning barn call at 1:58 a.m. Oct. 10. Assistant Chief Rick Rosselle was at the scene by 2:02 a.m. and immediately reported a "condition red" fire. Flames had engulfed one barn by that time and were threatening an adjacent structure.

"There wasn't much you could do for the first barn," Rosselle said. "We just tried to save the other one."

Firefighters were able to limit the fire to one building, which Toms said was a complete loss.

The other building — which contained hay, straw and antique horse sleds and carriages — was spared.

Firefighters spent six hours Wednesday morning attempting to douse the stubborn hay and straw fire. Small fires re-ignited Wednesday afternoon and Friday morning, despite the use of thousands of gallons of

water. "We'll probably have to take every bit of straw out of there and burn it," Toms said.

Toms said the cause of the blaze should be known early this week.

City fire hall may expand if schools agree

stacking often forces the department to move other trucks before being able to respond to an emergency with the appropriate vehicle.

Allen said the stacking is not the only problem with the existing fire station. "We've got no space for any indoor training at all right now," he said. The station does not even have room for storage lockers for the firefighters themselves, he said.

An air compressor to recharge oxygen tanks has to be stored in the station's small office now because of the lack of space, he added.

Architect Ron Cieslak was on hand at the Oct. 1 council meeting as well, to explain the changes to the latest plan. "The retaining walls to support that portion can, in effect, be the walls of a basement storage area," he said.

Council Member Paul Folino asked if a police garage could be incorporated into the proposed storage area, saying, "For 15 years I've been trying to get a police security garage down there." But City Manager Steven Walters said the need for a new garage might not be so great if police duties like dispatching become another shared service between the city and township.

"I think it's quite possible in 12 months we won't be using our jail cells," he said.

Heating equipment between the proposed storage space and the existing police department would prevent inside access to the area, Walters added.

Council Member Jerry Mittman asked, "If there's any potential that we're going to combine these services (with the township), is it wise to do this expansion now?"

Walters pointed out that the expansion is still more than a year away at best. He said council approval of the preliminary plan would merely allow him to approach Northville Public School officials about the plan. The addition would extend several feet west onto the school-owned Community Center property at 303 W. Main St., and school approval of the plan is needed before final design work and construction could begin.

"I think it's basically on hold at that point, until we get into budget discussions in the spring," Walters said.

A preliminary cost projection set the price of an early version of the addition at \$108,500. But that addition did not extend as far south as the present plan, and provided no basement storage.

Possible poaching case points up several issues

a hurry to leave the carcass, township police officer Matthew Mayes said. Mayes investigated the possible poaching complaint and said the deer killing was "suspicious."

"Someone that had permission to take the deer wouldn't have left the meat like that," he said.

And the hasty exit of the person or persons who butchered the animal gives Thompson cause for concern.

"It makes me think I scared them away," she said. "I don't know what people like that will do. It really bothered me. . . I was kind of frightened later."

Thompson's discovery of the slaughtered animal — which township police and Department of Natural Resources officials say probably was poached — brings to light several points to consider when discussing the local deer population.

● Plenty of deer live within an elastic boundary that includes Northville Township, despite the area's rapid development. DNR Wildlife Biologist Tim Payne said five to ten deer per square mile inhabit the area, with higher concentrations in more remote portions of the township.

● Those remote areas, including large parcels of state and county

land, attract poachers to a deer herd that the DNR said has no natural enemies.

● Development is pushing more deer into area roadways. The DNR estimates that car-deer accidents have doubled in the past four years. Last available statistics — from 1988 — indicate 180 car/deer accidents.

Deer poaching in the area is a painful reality, Johnson said.

"We haven't had a lot of problems with poaching in Northville Township (but) we have had arrests," Johnson said. "There are deer and there are undeveloped tracts (where poaching could occur)."

Poachers take no small risk when they engage in their craft, Johnson said.

Illegal possession or illegal killing of a deer bring mandatory penalties, including a fine of between \$500-1,000, a mandatory five days in jail and loss of hunting privileges.

In addition, the violator must pay \$1,000 restitution to the state. Those mandatory penalties do not include court costs, Johnson said.

Deer killed by vehicles are offered to those involved in the accident, according to township Police Chief Chip Snider. He said one car/deer accident was reported in Northville

Township Wednesday — but at 7 p.m., well after Thompson found the butchered animal.

Johnson said the animal found on Six Mile displayed traits associated with a poaching victim. He said "saddling", or stripping off valuable sections of deer meat, can be accomplished with "a couple of slices with a knife."

The deer probably was not felled by bow hunters, Johnson said. He said a legal bow season is open from Oct. 1 - Nov. 14 and again Dec. 1 — after the close of firearm season. Bow

hunters have a legal right to take deer and would not have left the dressed animal, he said.

"There's absolutely no reason to do something like that," he said.

Bow-hunting is allowed in Northville Township. Township ordinance forbids the use of firearms on all township land except designated rifle ranges.

Johnson said a DNR-sponsored poaching hotline is a good tool to curtail poaching. Those who think poaching is occurring can call 1-800-292-7800 to get a conserva-

tion officer dispatched to the scene, he said.

Thompson said illegal deer kills will stay on her mind.

"Butchering deer and leaving them alongside the road to rot is disgusting," she said. "I hope they (DNR) will patrol the area."

Firing is unpleasant but necessary

It's been said that incompetence is as visible as excellence, laziness as evident as dedication.

Is your business just getting by? Have you found that the future of your company is being suffocated by lack of performance? Has your bottom line level of profit petered out with the passage of time? If so, it may be time to prune your organization.

Pruning means cutting away at weak or dead limbs so there is more room and light for the strong ones to grow. It makes complete sense to any gardener, but it represents one of the most difficult jobs there is when the garden we're talking about is your business.

It's easy to put off this sometimes-painful management responsibility, but it's much worse to leave a bad situation alone. Without periodic evaluation and realistic pruning, your company will become burdened with one or more employees who do not have the skills, motivation and persis-

tence to move your business into the potential it is capable of developing.

The first step in pruning your organization is to evaluate individual employee performance, perhaps using a 1 to 10 rating system, with 10 being the highest score indicating exceptional performance. Anyone with an overall score of 5 or under is a candidate for pruning.

Once this has been done, poor performers may be given a short probation period to improve performance. If they do not, be rid of them.

Although employees are seldom fired because they are habitual goof-offs or intrinsically lazy, the vast majority who are terminated simply are unable to perform their duties satisfactorily.

Assuming that you provide employees with the appropriate training and support necessary to succeed at their jobs, don't let their problems be-

come your own.

Just as incompetence must not be rewarded or tolerated, neither can mediocrity. Successful business owners and managers realize that mediocrity is as contagious as excellence. Just as your top people inspire and motivate performance from all their fellow employees, your mediocre performers erode the strength of your entire organization.

As a successful and competent business owner, you must accept the responsibility to cut the weak limbs away carefully so those remaining have ample opportunity and space in which to sprout and grow. Your business cannot afford to carry around dead weight.

Home gas fees remain steady

Despite soaring oil prices, Consumers Power Co. says its natural gas customers can anticipate stable home-heating prices and ample supplies this winter.

The Jackson-based utility, serving many Oakland, northwestern Wayne and Livingston suburbs, has 100 percent of its fuel requirements secured by firm, long-term supply contracts with interstate pipeline suppliers and producers, according to Michael G. Morris, executive vice president for natural gas and marketing.

"These agreements protect our customers against historically uncertain energy prices which have rapidly increased for other home heating fuels," Morris told a Lansing news conference Monday.

Consumers Power's gas customers can expect costs similar to last winter — a 22-percent decrease from five years ago. For a normal month this winter, a typical CP residential gas user will pay \$112.81, based on consumption of 25,000 cubic feet. CP serves 3.4 million Michigan residents.

Home heating oil and propane consumers are seeing sharp cost increases, and Morris said the company is receiving 80 to 90 requests per day for natural gas service — double the rate of the same time last year.

CP's large natural gas storage capacity allows it to buy gas during off-season periods, when the cost of gas decreases.

State's jobless rate heads down

Michigan's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped 0.7 percent to 7.2 percent in September. Jack C. Barthwell III, director of the Michigan Employment Security Commission, reported.

According to estimates prepared for the state by the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics, the number of jobless workers declined by 31,000 in September to 331,000.

In September 1989, Michigan's jobless rate was 7.8 percent with 360,000 out of work.

Barthwell attributed the decline in unemployment partially to employment gains in retail and wholesale trade, the service industries and in government, where colleges, universities and local school districts re-

sumed fall classes.

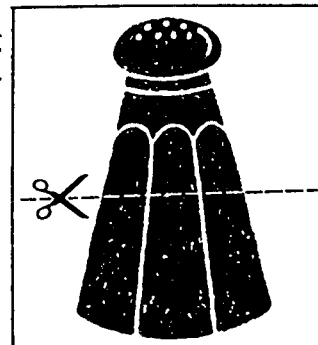
Auto industry employment held steady in September, but construction and other manufacturing employment declined.

"A larger than normal number of summer jobseekers leaving the workforce also contributed substantially to the drop in unemployment," Barthwell said. "Most of these job seekers were young people who stopped looking for work and returned to school."

The statewide unemployment rate fell to its lowest September level since 1988 when the rate was 7.0 percent. Illinois and Michigan had the highest September unemployment rate among the nation's 11 largest states.

Into a state of relative ease and well being, a terrifying feeling of impending doom intervenes, overcoming its victim.

Lynne Ponder, a Northville resident, recalls her first panic attack in just that way.

"I was 18 years old and doing fine, sitting in my college classroom, when suddenly my heart began to pound. I felt choked and dizzy, and I began to hyperventilate," she said.

"I was scared to death — thought I was having a heart attack."

Ponder picked up her books and just ran out of the class to her dorm room, resting until the dizziness and hyperventilating stopped.

"When it did stop, I thought I had had a minor heart attack. It was so real, so terrifying. I felt near death."

Div Buegeleisen, a counseling therapist in Southfield, has worked with a large number of panic attack victims in her practice.

"Some victims fear they are having a stroke or losing control of themselves. But people have panic attacks all over the world. It's an equal opportunity condition though there is a hereditary tendency for it," she said.

Dr. Harry Meisner, a Southfield internist, said panic attacks are related to agoraphobia (abnormal fear of open spaces).

"There is help for victims," he said. "There are anxiolytic drugs which may help, and also counseling. Some people settle for less than the optimum, giving in to the agoraphobia to somewhat limit their lifestyles."

Buegeleisen pointed out that panic attacks are hard to diagnose since they mimic other conditions such as hypoglycemia and heart problems.

"Agoraphobia used to be thought of as a homebound condition with serious elements of fear. Fear of a panic attack can be overwhelming," she said.

"General therapy is helpful for these people because they need therapy to help with cognitive thinking."

For Ponder, that first attack, more than 13 years ago, left her fearful and shaken.

"I went to a medical doctor who found nothing wrong and said: 'You may be burning the candle at both ends,'" she recalled.

"Even though nothing specific showed up, I was put on heart medicine and valium but continued having panic attacks, sometimes once a day. I had all kinds of treatments until I got counseling recently that taught me coping skills."

"I learned I wouldn't die from this and could recover from panic attacks."

Before Ponder was out of the woods, she had become addicted to valium, "found herself unable to drive a car, and discovered beer and crossed the line to alcoholism which masked her symptoms."

"I realized I needed treatment and went to a center for alcohol dependency," she said.

When she was finally on the way to getting her own house in order, she realized that she also wanted to become a therapist herself and help people find answers to their problems. Currently she attends an Oakland University counseling program "where Div went."

Buegeleisen, a native Detroit who is affiliated with the Midwest Center for Stress and Anxiety in Toledo, explained that panic attack victims have certain personality traits in common. "They set goals

that are impossibly high for themselves, have much anxiety, are afraid of life and living and always think negatively."

A veteran of years of helping panic victims, she holds a master's degree in education and a master's in

counseling, both from Oakland University. She utilizes the home study program of the Toledo center, and tapes and attends many seminars.

Ponder has succeeded in changing her life and is now speaking to groups, studying, and driving a car

(once impossible for her). To reach her, call 557-3960.

"As far as panic attacks, you can't tell by looking at someone. I know now that laughter is a wonderful way to handle anxiety."

School districts get in on child care game

As the need for child care increases, more school districts are becoming actively involved in this business as an extension of their services to the community.

Not only do they offer before and after school programs, but day care and preschool programs, as well.

Many Oakland county districts, such as Troy, Rochester Hills, West Bloomfield and Bloomfield Hills, have developed a wide range of child care programs to meet the needs of their communities.

In 1985, the Recreation and Community Services Division of Bloomfield Hills Schools opened the Fox Hills Early Childhood Center, in the former Fox Hills Elementary School, which had been closed due to declining enrollment.

According to Fox Hills Supervisor Sally Smith, the idea for the center was that of School Superintendent W. Robert Docking.

Virtually the entire one-story, open-wall style building has been overtaken by hundreds of preschoolers in a variety of programs.

Opening with just over 100 children in 1985, last year's enrollment almost reached 400.

The Fox Hills Center offers a variety of programs: parent-toddler classes; a program for 2 1/2 to 3 year olds, where the parent initially stays with the child until he is ready to be left by himself; and two, three, and five-day

programs for preschoolers of different ages.

In addition, the Center has a day care program, which operates from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Children in the day care program may also be enrolled in the preschool, which is in the same building.

The center makes use of Bloomfield Hills resources, with a social worker, speech pathologist and others to help children with special needs. Special education programs are also offered there.

Most of the teachers at the Fox Hills Center have either advanced degrees or specialized training in early childhood.

In 1988-1989, the school district participated in a collaborative program with Oakland University.

Participants included 48 preschool through second-grade teachers throughout the district who completed a 20-credit program.

According to the joint report on the project, this group was singled out "because P-2 children learn differently from older children. Young students acquire knowledge and social skills best from active, hands-on techniques including games and dramatic play."

One of the features I enjoy most in this particular paper is their "recipe request" column that has readers request favorite recipes from the old days. Seems that one particular reader had been searching for the old version of Rice Krispie Squares.

Following the paper in dated sequence, I noticed that everyone sent in their Rice Krispie Squares recipe that used the typical butter and melted marshmallows. The reader, however, was looking for an older version calling for corn syrup, vinegar, butter and molasses.

Lo and behold, yesterday, while searching for an oatmeal cookie recipe, I came across an old recipe box filled with my late mother-in-law's hand-inscribed recipes.

"Bosso," as I called her, would not have been put into the category as one of the world's better cooks. She could, however, whip up a mean roast beef, complete with lumpy mashed potatoes and slightly overcooked green beans. I miss that roast beef.

I didn't find an oatmeal cookie recipe in the old box, but I did find a recipe for a classic roast beef dinner, complete with gravy, lumpy mashed potatoes and a choice of overcooked green beans, carrots or broccoli. I found the old recipe for "sliders" (not the gut bombs served at most hamburger joints) and for an old family favorite that still gets baked on everybody's birthday, German Chocolate Cake, with a coconut-pecan frosting.

In addition to the recipes, I found some heritage. Remember "Frem?" How about "Blue Label Karo?" Does "Armour Treet" ring a bell? One of my favorite finds was the "No sugar, no molasses needed for delicious All Bran Molasses Muffins" that came with a P.S. labeled: "Important! During these days of food shortages, help feed your family better." I don't remember, but Mom, Dad and I spent a whole hour remembering the days of food shortages, tin-foil saving and all-day bread-making sessions.

If you know where the old recipe box is kept, make a mental note to someday soon get it out, pour yourself a cup of coffee and just kick back and remember where it came from.

Blend of apples makes best cider

Fall in Michigan, the time of year for leaves, crisp evenings and foggy mornings, also heralds the blossoming apple crop.

Many of our area's apple orchards are gearing up for hectic weekends. They beckon suburban families to load up the car and head out for an afternoon of sipping cider, sampling doughnuts and enjoying the gorgeous splendor let loose by Mother Nature.

Among the nation's apple crop, Michigan apples always attain excellent status. The reason is no small measure is due to Michigan's unique blend of climate and soil. But more than anything else, it is due to the Michigan apple growers themselves — people with an abundance of apple knowledge and experience, a deep understanding of the latest in horticultural methods and a commitment to making a great product even better.

But what makes the best apple cider? Plymouth Orchards says its award-winning cider is a blend of Michigan's best. In the early season, the cider mill starts off with a blend of Paula Reds and McIntoshes. As the season progresses, it switches to later harvestings of Michigan Delicious and Jonathans.

In the earlier part of the season, it takes about one bushel of apples to make one gallon. As the season progresses and the apples begin to ripen more and soak up more of those crisp fall nights, the yield will be almost three and one-half gallons per bushel.

Michigan is known as the apple variety state, where many different kinds of apple varieties are grown to meet the taste demands of folks like you and me. Major varieties grown in Michigan include the late summer Paula Reds followed by major year-round apples, the likes of McIntosh, Jonathans, Ida Reds, Romes, Delicious, Golden Delicious, Winesaps and Spys.

With Jonathans leading the pack in Michigan's apple production, it's no wonder they are billed as the fifth most popular apple in the nation. Jonathans are brilliant

red with a creamy white inside. They are loaded with juice and are firm, crisp, yet tender, with a medium-tart flavor. Not only is this apple a winner for eating out-of-hand but its versatility is unsurpassed for use in pies, sauces, cider and salads.

Next in line for Michigan favorite is the Paula Red. The apple was named after an orchard owner's wife, Pauline, and, again, this is a great all-purpose apple with a more tart flavor than Jonathans and a more bluish-colored flesh.

There's no secret why Michigan apple lovers enjoy the third most popular variety, dubbed the McIntosh. This apple has a snappy flavor coupled with an unmatched orchard-fresh aroma. All the benefits of the McIntosh were nearly lost to history. Seems that in the early 1800s, Ontario farmer John McIntosh found some interesting apple trees on his land and transplanted them to his garden. Only one of the trees survived.

All the millions of McIntosh trees planted since then owe their heritage to that one lonely survivor. Also considered an all-purpose apple, it's loaded with juice, and the aroma makes for the best-tasting and best-smelling apple pies around.

Coming around the corner a little later this fall will be Michigan's growing crop of Ida Reds. This cross between Jonathan and Wagener varieties was developed at the Idaho Experiment Station and introduced commercially in 1942. The Ida Reds are late-ripeners, usually not coming into the Michigan picture till mid-October. Again, an all-purpose apple, it is firm, crisp and juicy and makes for a popular lunch-box snack because it keeps well under refrigeration and tends to resist browning.

Another popular late-variety Michigan apple is the Empire. This apple was developed by Roger Way at the Cornell Agricultural Experiment Station at Geneva University. The Empire is a cross between McIntosh and Delicious and was developed for excellent storage under controlled conditions, in addition to being mild, medium-sized and a very attractive nearly red/solid red color. Best for eating fresh, it also can be used for baking and cooking because its

firmer flesh tends to hold up well during cooking.

One of our state's best cooking apples is the Rome variety (also called Rome Beauty). This medium-to-large variety holds its shape, maintains its firmness and retains its lovely texture during the baking process.

Michigan is considered a forerunner in innovative technologies and improved cultivation techniques, which aid in the development of new varieties. Gaining in popularity among Michigan favorites are the Winesap, one of the oldest known varieties in America, brought here from Washington State and New York, and the Mutsu-Crispin, a Japanese variety that is light green to yellow in color, with a delicate spicy taste, having the barest hint of anise.

Last but certainly not least on the list of home-grown Michigan apples are the Northern Spy and Cortland varieties. More popular in other apple-growing areas around the country, these varieties are available through some selected Michigan apple growers.

But why are apples so popular? Statistics show that the apple has become the fruit most favored by American consumers, with more than 93 percent of the families buying apples regularly. The average American eats more than 18 pounds of apples or apple products yearly, well behind the average Dutchman who consumes the whopping 100 pounds per year.

If you ever really doubted the facts, you would be surprised to know that the average apple has 81 calories and is chock-full of good dietary fiber. Vitamin A, potassium and carbohydrates while having zip in cholesterol and negligible amounts of fat and sodium.

Apples are great for dental health. They clean and massage the gums much like a natural toothbrush. Apples actually can reduce tooth decay, eliminating 96.7 percent of the bacteria in the mouth, compared to three minutes with a toothbrush, plus a mouth rinse, eliminating only 64.3 percent of the mouth's bacteria.

Anyway you slice it, Michigan apples are the best.

We read these publications and regard them highly.

Decanter Magazine is published monthly in London. Coverage of the European wine scene is unparalleled.

British humor livens most presentations and offers some delightfully unique perspectives. The annual subscription rate is \$80 air-speeded and can be addressed to *Decanter Magazine*, Subscriptions Dept., 23-27 Tudor St., London EC4A 3DF.

Connoisseurs' Guide to California Wine makes the statement of what it's about in the title. By the monthly publication rates California wines by variety.

An upside-down glass tells you which wines, in the opinion of the publishers, you should avoid. Additional symbols refer to ageability, availability and potential food complements. The publication is available for \$37 per year from *Connoisseurs' Guide to California Wine*, P.O. Box V, Alameda, Calif. 94501.

Wine & Food Companion suits the bill for those interested in matching food and wine. Written and published by David Rosengarten and Joshua Wesson, both knowledgeable about wine and food, this periodical is totally subscription driven — no advertising.

Only in its second year, the *Wine & Food Companion* has packed each issue with challenging ideas for food and wine pairings.

Take stock of your soup situation

Last week I asked my continuing education class what they would like their final lesson to cover. "Soup and stocks" was an almost unanimous cry. With the change in weather quickly upon us, and a flu bug rampaging, a cup of good, nutritious, soul-warming soup doesn't sound half bad.

Soups and stocks are culinary siblings. Stocks are a means to an end while soups are a finished product. A stock is water enriched by the things cooked in it: meat, poultry or fish bones, various vegetables and seasoning which have been slowly simmered together. Stocks are full of flavor and nutritional value and is the essential ingredient for soups.

Although commercially canned soup broths are available, many contain MSG and way too much salt. Nothing can replace a good homemade stock.

Any strained soup, or broth, can be served as a soup. Chicken stock is chicken stock seasoned with the addition of diced vegetables and rice or noodles. Many beginning cooks believe stocks are difficult and time consuming. Some stocks do take a long time to cook but do not entail much preparation.

The ingredients are simmered slowly only requiring an occasional watchful eye to assure the liquid has not dried up. Since stock is usually made in a larger quantity you can use some for a meal today and freeze the rest for a later use. Once you have made stock and realize how easy it is to prepare and how nice it is to have on hand you will

never want to be without it.

The ingredients for stock should always be fresh. Do not use vegetables that have been in the refrigerator for months and lost their flavor. I save trimmings from celery, onions and carrots when cooking and use as a flavor booster.

Leftover carcasses (Christmas or Thanksgiving turkey), bones, chicken necks, backs, gizzards, stems from parsley, thyme or most herbs, meat and vegetable juices can all be frozen and used as needed for stock. Buy bones from the butcher for your meat stocks. They are generally inexpensive and readily available if you call ahead and reserve them.

Bone your own chickens and save the bones until you have enough to make stock. Boring chicken is easy and economical. Like anything else it takes practice.

The main rule for cooking stocks is to start with cold water and to simmer rather than boil. Place bones, vegetables and seasonings into a large pot, cover with cold water and bring to a boil. Turn heat down to a simmer and skim the scum that raises to the top. A brown stock is achieved by browning the bones and vegetables in a hot oven beforehand.

Fish and vegetable stocks generally cook for 30 minutes while meat and poultry stocks require hours. If meat and poultry are desired ingredients add to the stock as it develops body, after several hours, poach and let it cook until tender enough to eat. When the stock is done strain through a sieve

to separate the bones and vegetables from the liquid. Cool stock as quickly as possible after straining.

Place in large shallow containers and put in a cold place, uncovered to avoid souring. Stock made with bones will get upon cooling. The easiest way to remove fat from stock is to lift off after it has congealed from cooling. If time does not permit this spoon the clear fat off the surface and run a paper towel over the top to absorb the residue left behind.

Moderate seasoning is the key, so that flavors in the final dish are prominent. Season at the end of cooking since flavors become very concentrated as the stock reduces. Do not season any stock you freeze since you will not know its final use.

Chef Jeff Gabriel, a colleague at Schoolcraft, has a great talent for soups and seasoning. Each day a student lines up salt and pepper, cayenne, lemon juice, Worcestershire sauce, tabasco and calls for Chef Gabriel to "season the soup." This is a ritual we all look forward to, knowing that in a few minutes we will be sampling the day's creation. It is always heavenly.

The recipes included are several of my favorites because they are fast and flavorful. After experimenting a few times with stocks, soup will become a staple at your house.

AUNT BETTY'S ITALIAN BEAN SOUP

- 1 cup dried navy beans
- 2 quarts chicken, beef, vegetable or veal stock
- 1 medium chopped onion
- 1 medium chopped green pepper
- 1 cup chopped carrots
- 1 1/2 tsp dried basil
- 1 1/2 tsp dried oregano
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 tsp dried mustard
- 1 8-ounce can no-salt-added stewed tomatoes
- 1/2 cup uncooked pasta of your choice

Sort, wash and soak beans overnight. Sauté onion, green pepper and carrots in small amount of olive oil. Add drained beans and the rest of the ingredients except pasta. Simmer 1 1/2 to 2 hours or until the beans are tender. Add pasta and cook until done. Yield 3 1/2 quarts. About 100 calories per 1 cup serving.

WHITE STOCK

- 4-5 veal bones cracked or cut into pieces
- 2 quartered onions
- 2 quartered carrots
- 2 stalks celery cut into 2" pieces
- large bouquet garni (bay leaf, thyme in tea infuser)
- 10 peppercorns
- 1 clove garlic
- 3-4 quarts water

Put the bones and vegetables in a stock pot, add the bouquet garni, peppercorns, garlic and water. Bring to a boil, skimming often. Simmer 4-5 hours, skimming occasionally. Strain and taste. Reduce to a full, if a more concentrated flavor is desired. Simm 3-4 hours.

JO'S CARROT SOUP

- 4 cups chicken broth
- oil to sauté
- 2 carrots, sliced thin (approx 2 cups)
- 2 large onions, sliced thin
- 1 1/2 cups chopped celery
- 2 cubed potatoes (skin on)
- 1 clove garlic
- honey to taste, 4 whole cloves
- pepper, lemon juice and cayenne to taste

Sauté garlic and vegetables in oil. Cover and cook over low heat 10 minutes. Stir occasionally. Add onion, pepper, potatoes and broth. Bring to a boil. Cook approximately 20 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Discard cloves and season. Adjust seasonings.

Odd lots break from the mold

Children might see a field overgrown with weeds near home as an adventurous playground. A building contractor spotting the same land in a thriving community would see dollar signs.

It's called in-fill development, and it happens when a builder is lucky enough to find a patch of land passed over by earlier developments.

The land might accommodate six houses, or be spacious enough for 16. Other contractors might specialize in building just a single home or two on a smaller site. The key to making successful sales in such speculative ventures is that the community is already well established.

"I love doing little projects," said Dennis Yashinsky, vice president of Jerry Richter & Associates, a company that builds residential dwellings primarily in southern Oakland County.

"Normally we take these projects on in a good area because development costs are so high. If the six lots are close to where I'm building, I could use the same overhead, the same superintendent from another project.

"I would do it in a good selling market in an established area. I wouldn't take a gamble in an untested market."

Yashinsky recalls three years ago developing a subdivision within a subdivision between Farmington and Drake roads, Walnut and Maple.

Called Woodland Oaks, the lots were attractive to buyers for their insulation from the hustle and bustle of traffic, in addition to being new homes constructed in an attractive setting.

But in-fill development is only as good as the current housing market. If home sales are fluid, the project will be successful. Likewise, in a downward cycle, sales will be sluggish.

Two years ago Richter & Associates bought 19 lots off Farmington Road and developed one long cul-de-sac called The Oaks in Farmington Hills — another success story for the firm.

"With 19, we go in there with a whole presentation, put up a model home, then a sales office."

Some in-fill projects look like extensions of earlier subdivisions, albeit newer versions.

"One negative (for would-be buyers) would be traveling through an existing area to get there. That could be considered a detriment."

Although the housing market is slowing, Yashinsky said West Bloomfield and Novi continue to be good areas for new construction. The firm has a handful of major developments currently under way.

Ashley Construction has carved a niche out of in-fill developments dotted across west Livonia. In a project off Levan north of Schoolcraft called Fox Run Estates, the firm bought a home with some acreage, removed the house to another site, and created 10 new home sites.

Fox Run Estates has four lots left for sale. The custom-built homes are priced from \$160,000.

"It's more costly to do it this way," said Margie Bourassa, a partner with her husband, Ernie Bourassa, and Michael Priest.

"You pay for the home, the property, the cost of removing the (old) home."

But the firm has completed several projects in Livonia, including a development on Gill Road between Seven Mile and Eight Mile, where an old home on a large site was relocated to create space for 15 new homes.

They've done larger developments — Prides Court is a 41-home subdivision west of Newburgh and south of Seven Mile. Whispering Hills off Newburgh north of Seven Mile will include 22 homes when complete.

"We've done quite well in Livonia. Livonia is a hot market. I sold a home yesterday — it was the second sale this week," Bourassa said.

"We like giving personalized service. People like one-on-one attention. You can't do that with 100 lots. We become friends with our clients. We don't work with Realtors. We don't even advertise, really. Our business is generated most by word of mouth."

"I don't think there's one client who wouldn't invite us into their home for a cup of coffee. We believe in quality and custom designing homes to meet the standards of the family."

The Bourassas have been self-employed for the length of their marriage: 25 years. They began in the swimming pool business, moved to home modernization and started building construction with 10 lots in Livonia's Laurel Park in 1984.

"There's nothing left in Livonia," Bourassa said. "Right now we're looking at the Plymouth-Canton area. There's plenty of land left there."

Roy Gonzales, a West Bloomfield

building contractor, is currently developing seven homes near the site of a former Homearama subdivision.

Between Orchard Lake and Middlebelt roads in West Bloomfield, the homes will be secluded — in an established area and yet removed — and be priced from \$400,000, Gonzales said.

"You're always scouting an established location, one that's a little further back in a subdivision," Gonzales said.

But finding that little Shangri-La is becoming more difficult, he said.

"There's woodlands and wetlands regulations that are making it more restrictive and very costly."

Yet builders seem to seek out the challenge.

"It's good if you can develop fast enough and turn it fast. It's a creative challenge. A bigger custom home on nice wooded property is very appealing."

Gonzales will next develop 16 condominium units in Southfield, abutting a city-owned golf course. He also has plans to develop in Mexican Town on Detroit's southwest side.

Member must check his ego at the door

I am a board member on a five-person board. There are four women and one man. He wishes to inflict his will not only on the board but upon the advisors that we have, including the managing agent and the attorney. It seems that if the attorney says something is black, he says that it is white. He is continuously undermining the attorney and the managing agent in connection with their deliberations. How can we deal with this man who apparently has his share of problems?

I have observed over the years the tendency on the part of certain persons who assume leadership roles on the board to get carried away with their new found control and power sometimes to the detriment of not only their fellow board members but of the persons who are providing services to the association.

In the case of the managing agent or the attorney, they are presumably providing their best advice with expectation and hope that the association will follow their advice. That is why they are being utilized.

In the last analysis, the decisions have to be made by the board with the benefit and consent of the managing agent, the attorney, the accountant and other persons. The board has to evaluate their recommendations and make an independent analysis.

If members of the board allow their egos or personal problems to interfere with their ability to make reasoned decisions or to follow the reasoned opinions of their consultants, you have a serious problem that could result in the undermining of the board's ability to effectively carry out its responsibilities and in some cases to commit malfeasance.

It would appear timely in your situation to have a meeting with the board member in question, expressing your concerns and asking for his understanding and cooperation so that he might temper his "control problem" in the best interest of the association.

Our board is interested in finding out whether a co-owner who is seriously delinquent in her assessments can place a lien against a unit. The co-owner may also be in jeopardy of foreclosure by her mortgage company. It is not our intent as a board to intimidate the resident, but we wish to protect the common interests of the association as a whole, preserving the association's assets at this time.

The condominium statute and presumably your condominium by-laws provide the association with a right to place a lien on the unit of a co-owner for the non-payment of assessments. This lien is secondary, to the right of the first mortgagee to assert its lien for non-payment of mortgage payments.

Accordingly, if the first mortgagee forecloses, the priority of the association in regard to using the lien as a security may be wiped out, depending upon the circumstances. Nonetheless, the association should perfect its lien and begin foreclosure proceedings on its own, to the extent that the circumstances so provide. The association may also pursue a claim for money damages against the co-owner, which is unsecured by the unit. This action may be combined in one lawsuit.

The association should be prepared to pursue the delinquent co-owner aggressively and consistently. Keep in mind, of course, that the condominium statute provides that the association's reasonable attorney fees and costs are chargeable to the delinquent co-owner.

I am a board member but want to examine various bids that were obtained on a job, one of which was tendered by an affiliate of the managing agent. The board refuses to provide me with a copy of the bid. They have already given a copy of that bid to another co-owner who is not on the board. What can I do?

The board sounds as though it is playing games. Whatever basis the board may have had to withhold that information from you was obviously waived when it provided that information to a co-owner who is not on the board, or did not have any fiduciary responsibility in behalf of the association.

That, of course, assumes that there was any basis in the first instance for the board depriving you of that bid since it presumably would be a part of the records of the association to which you are entitled. This would be so stated not only under the condominium documents of your condominium, but under the condominium statute that mandates your right to inspect the books and records of the association.

If the board continues to refuse after reasonable attempts by you, I would contact a lawyer and begin legal proceedings against the board for intentional malfeasance and perhaps a host of other potential abuses.

Terms every home buyer should know

When you start shopping for a new home, you may encounter some words and terms that are unfamiliar to you. The following glossary will help you be a better new-home shopper:

ADJUSTABLE RATE MORTGAGE (ARM) — A loan whose interest rate is adjusted according to movements in the financial market.

AMORTIZATION — A payment plan by which a loan is reduced through monthly payments of principal and interest.

ANNUAL PERCENTAGE RATE (APR) — The annual cost of credit over the life of a loan, including interest, service charges, points, loan fees, mortgage insurance, and other items.

APPRAISAL — An evaluation to determine what a piece of property would sell for in the current marketplace.

APPRECIATION — The increase in the value of a property.

ASSESSMENT — A tax levied on a property or a value placed on the worth of a property by a taxing authority.

ASSUMPTION — A transaction allowing the buyer to assume responsibility for an existing loan instead of getting a new loan.

BALLOON — A loan that has a series of monthly payments with the remaining balance due in a large lump sum payment at the end.

BINDER — A receipt for a deposit paid to secure the right to purchase a home at terms agreed upon by the buyer and seller.

BUYDOWN — A subsidy (usually paid by a builder or developer) to reduce the monthly payments on a mortgage loan.

CAP — A limit to the amount an interest rate or a monthly payment can increase for an adjustable rate loan either during an adjustment period or over the life of the loan.

CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY — A document from an official agency stating that the property meets the requirements of local codes, ordinances, and regulations.

CLOSING — A meeting to sign documents that transfer property from a seller to a buyer (also referred to as

a settlement).

CLOSING COSTS — Charges paid at settlement for obtaining a mortgage loan and transferring a real estate title.

CONDITIONS, COVENANTS, AND RESTRICTIONS (CC AND RS) — The standards that define how a property may be used and the protections the developer makes for the benefit of all owners in a subdivision.

CONVENTIONAL LOAN — A mortgage loan not insured by a government agency (such as FHA or VA).

COVERTIBILITY — The ability to change a loan from an adjustable rate schedule to a fixed rate schedule.

CREDIT RATING — A report ordered by a lender from a credit bureau to determine if the borrower is a good credit risk.

DEFAULT — A breach of a mortgage contract (i.e., not making the required payments).

DENSITY — The number of homes built on a particular acre of land. Allowable densities are determined by local jurisdictions.

DOWN PAYMENT — The difference between the sales price and the mortgage amount. A down payment is usually paid at closing.

DUE-ON-SALE — A clause in a mortgage contract requiring the borrower to pay the entire outstanding balance upon sale or transfer of the property.

EARNEST MONEY — A sum paid to the seller to show that a potential purchaser is serious about buying.

EASEMENT — The right-of-way granted to a person or company authorizing access to the owner's land; for example, a utility company may be granted an easement to install pipes or wires. An owner may voluntarily grant an easement, or can be ordered to grant one by a local jurisdiction.

EQUITY — The difference between the value of a home and what is owed on it.

ESCROW — The handling of funds or documents by a third party on behalf of the buyer and/or seller.

FEDERAL HOUSING ADMINISTRATION (FHA) — A federal agency that insures mortgages with lower down-

payment requirements than conventional loans.

FIXED RATE MORTGAGE — A mortgage with an interest rate that remains constant over the life of the loan.

FIXED SCHEDULE MORTGAGE — A mortgage with a payment schedule that is established at closing for the life of the loan. The payment and interest rate are not necessarily level.

GRADUATED PAYMENT MORTGAGE (GPM) — A fixed rate, fixed-schedule loan that starts with lower payments than a level payment loan; the payments rise annually over the first 5 to 10 years and then remain constant for the remainder of the loan. GPMs involve negative amortization.

GROWING EQUITY MORTGAGE (RAPID PAYOFF MORTGAGE) — A fixed-rate, fixed-schedule loan that starts with the same payments as a level payment loan; the payments rise annually, with the entire increase being used to reduce the outstanding balance. No negative amortization occurs, and the increase in payments may enable the borrower to pay off a 30-year loan in 15 to 20 years, or less.

HAZARD INSURANCE — Protection against damage caused by fire, windstorm, or other common hazards. Many lenders require borrowers to carry it out in an amount at least equal to the mortgage.

HOUSING FINANCE AGENCY — A state agency that offers below-market-rate home financing for low and moderate income households.

INDEX — The interest rate or adjustment standard that determines the changes in monthly payments for an adjustable rate loan.

INFRASTRUCTURE — The public facilities and services needed to support residential development, including highways, bridges, schools, and sewer and water systems.

INTEREST — The cost paid to a lender for borrowed money.

JOINT TENANCY — A form of ownership in which the tenants own a property equally. If one dies, the other would automatically inherit the entire property.

LEVEL PAYMENT MORTGAGE — A

mortgage with identical, monthly payments over the life of the loan.

MORTGAGE BROKER — A broker who represents numerous lenders and helps consumers find affordable mortgages; the broker charges a fee only if the consumer finds a loan.

MORTGAGE COMMITMENT — A formal written communication by a lender, agreeing to make a mortgage loan on a specific property, specifying the loan amount, length of time and conditions.

MORTGAGE COMPANY — A company that borrows money from a bank, lends it to consumers to buy homes, then sells the loans to investors.

MORTGAGEE — The lender who makes a mortgage loan.

MORTGAGE LOAN — A contract in which the borrower's property is pledged as collateral. It is repaid in installments. The mortgagor (buyer) promises to repay principal and interest, keep the home insured, pay all taxes, and keep the property in good condition.

MORTGAGE ORIGINATION FEE — A charge for the work involved in preparing and servicing a mortgage application (usually one percent of the loan amount).

NEGATIVE AMORTIZATION — An increase in the outstanding amount when a monthly payment does not cover the monthly interest due.

NOTE — A formal document showing the existence of a debt and stating the terms of repayment.

PITI — Principal, interest, taxes and insurance (the four major components of monthly housing payments).

POINT — A one-time charge assessed by the lender at closing to increase the interest yield on a mortgage loan. Generally, it is one percent of the mortgage amount.

PREPAYMENT — Payment of a debt prior to maturity.

PRINCIPAL — The amount borrowed, excluding interest and other charges.

PROPERTY SURVEY — A survey to determine the boundaries of a property. The cost depends on the complexity of the survey.

RECORDING FEE — A charge for

recording the transfer of a property, paid to a city, county, or other appropriate branch of government.

REAL ESTATE SETTLEMENT PROCEDURES ACT (RESPA) — A federal law requiring lenders to provide home buyers with information about known or estimated settlement costs.

R-VALUE — The resistance of insulation materials (including windows) to heat passing through it. The higher the better, the greater the insulating value.

SALES CONTRACT — A contract between a buyer and seller which should explain, in detail, exactly what the purchase includes, what guarantees there are, when the buyer can move in, what the closing costs are, and what recourse the parties have if the contract is not fulfilled or if the buyer cannot get a mortgage commitment at the agreed-upon terms.

SHARED MORTGAGE APPLICATION — A loan in which partners agree to share specified portions of the downpayment, monthly payment, and appreciation.

TENANCY IN COMMON — A form of ownership in which the tenants own separate but equal parts. To inherit the property, a surviving tenant would either have to be mentioned in

the will or, in the absence of a will, be eligible through state inheritance laws.

TITLE — Evidence (usually in the form of a certificate or deed) of a person's legal right to ownership of property.

TRANSFER TAXES — Taxes levied on the transfer of property or on real estate loans by state and/or local jurisdictions.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION (VA) — A federal agency that insures mortgage loans with very liberal downpayment requirements for honorably discharged veterans and their surviving spouses.

WALK-THROUGH — A final inspection of a home before settlement to search for problems that need to be corrected before ownership changes hands.

WARRANTY — A promise, either written or implied, that the material and workmanship of a product is defect-free or will meet a specified level of performance over a specified period of time. Written warranties on new homes are either backed by insurance companies or by the builders themselves.

ZONING — Regulations established by local governments regarding the location, height, and use for any given piece of property within a specific area.

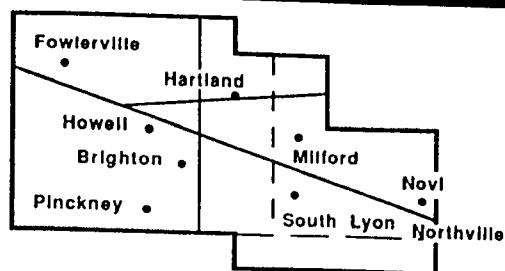

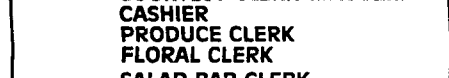

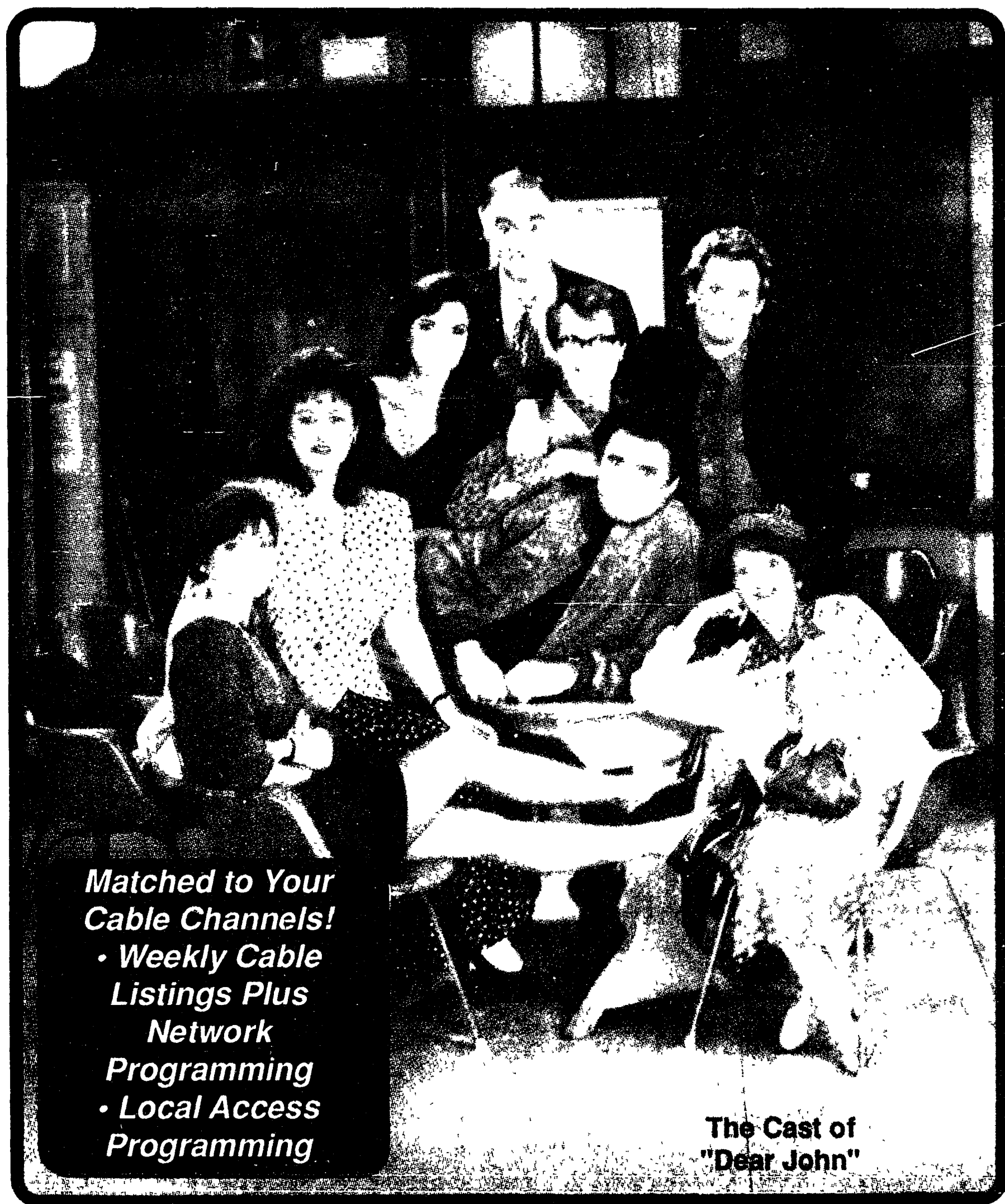

Author Danielle Steel's novels come to television

Family life important to stars of melodramas

NBC hopes its made-for-TV movies will attract female viewers who won't want to watch the World Series on CBS. Accordingly, the network is throwing two of its best movies, *Danielle Steel's Kaleidoscope* and *Fine Things* into the ratings ring, Monday and Tuesday.

Both movies are based on author Danielle Steel's best-selling melodramatic novels. Jaclyn Smith and Perry King will star in *Kaleidoscope*, while Cloris Leachman, Tracy Pollan and D.W. Moffett line up for *Fine Things*. "Put everything aside sit down and just enjoy this thing. It's totally entertaining ... absolutely feature film time," said Leachman of her project. Smith had no less raves for her film and role. "I love Danielle Steel. She's just so popular world-wide, and I see why."

In *Kaleidoscope*, Smith plays a network news executive separated

from her two childhood sisters by the death of their parents. When a private detective (King) locates her sisters, Smith's character hesitates at the prospect of a reunion. Rightly so, for the meeting uncovers old secrets which could potentially destroy them all. In *Fine Things*, actor D.W. Moffett plays a wealthy bachelor charmed by the wiles of a little girl. He subsequently falls in love with her mother, played by Tracy Pollan. After Pollan's character dies, he and his doting, Jewish mother (Cloris Leachman) are left to care for the girl.

A parallel between *Kaleidoscope*, and *Fine Things* is that both movies involve familial separation. Amazingly, Danielle Steel is the mother of nine children, herself. If anyone understands families, she does. "She writes all those books, and has all those babies," said Smith of Steel. Said Leachman, "Danielle has a way of getting her finger on the pulse. She's caught the human condition. It's real life."

Both Smith and Leachman, the big

names in Steel's productions, understand families and that split families are real life, too. This undoubtedly gives them greater perspective and sensitivity to their roles. Both are divorced, and both are very dedicated moms.

Smith is divorced three times. But it is apparent that family is the most important thing to her in the world. Her children (Gaston and Spencer Margaret) travel everywhere with her when she does a shoot. "I don't do well without them. So we stick together," she said. Smith has been trying to get her Houston-based parents to move to Los Angeles for a long time. "I believe in families being together. It's just that Daddy loves Houston." When asked, Smith said she still believes in marriage. "I haven't been through what the tabloids say I've been through," she retorted.

After 23 years of marriage, Leachman and her husband, producer/director George Englund, divorced. "Family life has always been very important to me," said Leachman. "Of all the gifts in life, my family has given me the greatest satisfaction. My children have been my greatest joy because they are all so unique and so special."

Cable Comments

Politics and elections pose an interesting challenge for Community Access Television as the standards are left to individual

discretion. Most access centers base their policies upon first come first serve. The very premise of freedom of expression encourages those of opposing views to come forward. But these candidates need a forum in which to express their views and these forums must be put together by the people who come together to staff local access TV. If you stop and think about the fact that the general public's contribution to the television process has been as an observer you can understand why most people are at sea when they realize that the local opportunity is there and yet how do they access it?

We, as television staffs, may encourage and listen without taking a stand. We must take this posture to remain detached enough to serve the general public. (Personally, I have found this reserve to afford plenty of opportunity to gather much needed information and put it into the proper perspective to enable me to enter the voting booth and cast my ballot with confidence.)

Neutrality of the TV staff is a crucial component to candidates and leaders of an issue or cause. This staffing posture goes a long way to insure an accomplishment of objectivity.

In the months leading up to an election there is a flurry of activity. Remember, community television

be it public, education or government is non-commercial. This means we may not advertise. Or in other words may not send out "a call for action." There are Broadcast and Cable companies and advertising firms, along with independent production houses, that are available for hire to produce a commercial to say "VOTE FOR ME."

A smart candidate is involved with television 12 months a year by providing and sponsoring "informational" programming. For example many State Senators and Congressmen and County Commissioners host their own shows to keep everyone informed. A talk show or new format is most common.

Others are guests on shows that feature consumer concerns. A candidate or established office-holder would be wise to send out a press release to all community television studios in their districts to advise local producers of the subject matters on which they are proficient. Mentioning their schedule is also helpful.

Candidates can also participate in public service announcements. These are non-commercial commercials. This keeps them in the public eye.

The League of Women Voters as well as the Republican and Democratic factions host candidate debates as well as issue forums. Most communities are comfortable with this type of format. Once again it reinforces the concept of fairness. All candidates and/or all sides of an issue are invited. The show goes on with those who agree to participate.

There are also Committees to Increase Voter Participation. In Farmington Hills this group has designed and is presenting a television

series entitled "MY VOTE COUNTS" Resident Julieann H. vanesian is chairperson and has earnestly encouraged the entire committee to get involved with the media options.

Dan Potter, the Director of the Department of Special Services, encouraged Cable Coordinator David Tietmeyer to lend technical support and guidance. The purpose of the show is to directly increase voter participation, increasing the quality and quantity of publicity and information regarding local elections. The Committee members will take turns as interviewers and encourage guests from the public at large. Messages will be from "citizen to citizen" to get out the vote. The program "MY VOTE COUNTS" may be seen on Tuesdays at 8:00 p.m. in Farmington, Novi and Farmington Hills. Plymouth, Canton and Northville may request to see the program through Omnicom.

Subjects which will be covered are Insights from a naturalized American voter from Hungary, Ideas on "How to Judge a Candidate," the November Ballot, etc. Suggested topics will include interviews with experienced voters as well as those who never have voted. The Committee to Increase Voter Participation is proud to present this program because the concept speaks to the public in terms of voter to voter and not as an elected or appointed official to the public.

Your vote does count and the Community Service of Community Television stresses this truth. Contact your local cable company to understand the guidelines which they have pertaining to local election coverage.

NBC's comedy 'Dear John'

persists in its third season

Judd Hirsch plays 'Taxi'-like role

Two Emmy Awards, a Golden Globe Award, Obie Award, Tony Award and an Oscar nomination. These are the impressive credits of Judd Hirsch, star of NBC's half-hour comedy series "Dear John," airing Wednesdays.

Not bad for a guy who plays everyman. "John is typical of the characters I play on TV," says Hirsch of John Lacey, the title character on the show. "My character is always the normal, believable person."

Born into a working-class family, it seemed like Hirsch was destined not to play the part of a regular guy, but to become a regular guy. By the time Hirsch was in the second grade his family had moved 13 times. He remembers compulsively combing his hair and worrying about his looks as a kid.

"The first thing I was given to know was that I wasn't going to

amount to much. But I was lucky to grow up where I did, because eventually I found the theater," says the actor.

But not before he was to embark upon an everyman career. Hirsch did a stint in the military, studied engineering and architecture, graduated with a degree in physics, and got married.

A scheduling error at City College of New York landed Hirsch in a humanities class in which the teacher had students act out scenes from plays. Hirsch was hooked. He enrolled in three different acting schools simultaneously. His parents had a bit of trouble understanding their son's aspirations. "It wasn't a happy time for them," he reflects.

In the summer of 1962 Hirsch got his first professional acting role in the back room of a restaurant, in Estes Park, Colo. In 1974, he landed his first TV role in the movie "The Law."

Hirsch's two Emmys came from playing Alex Rieger on "Taxi." Like "Taxi," it is Hirsch's role which is the foundation for "Dear John." It's a crazy world, as evidenced by the

nutty One-Two-One Club, the singles support group around which "Dear John" centers. But down-to-earth John Lacey (Hirsch) holds things together.

Hirsch is not necessarily satisfied with that. "The whole time we did 'Taxi' I was jealous of Chris Lloyd because his character could do anything ... I want to play the crazy man, get in a funny wagon," he says.

"Dear John" is not the hit "Taxi" was, though. The show, in its third season, managed to stay near the top 15 partly due to its powerhouse positioning between "Cheers" and "L.A. Law."

Hirsch is still eager to see "Dear John" do well. For one thing, it supports his expensive hobby of house building. ("It's no good for me to buy houses," he says.) It also allows him to maintain residences both in California and New York. And Hirsch can't complain too loudly about being typecast. He has played a wide variety of roles in his career. Recently, he portrayed a villain in the TV movie "She Said No" co-starring Veronica Hamel. Everyman could do worse.

The 86th World Series may be the most precious jewel in the CBS sports crown this week, but the network isn't about to forget its legions of football fans.

On Sunday, Oct. 14, *NFL Today* kicks off a full day of football featuring a doubleheader of regional telecasts. First, viewers will see either Detroit at Kansas City, Green Bay at Tampa Bay or San Francisco at Atlanta. The fans have their hopes high in Kansas City, where the Chiefs showed glimpses of playoff potential last year and finished the season winning five of their last eight.

The Giants nosed out Philadelphia for the conference title with a 12-4 record last year, but suffered a frustrating 19-13 overtime loss to the Los Angeles Rams in their first playoff game. Washington struggled to a mediocre 5-5 record through the first two-thirds of their NFL schedule but caught fire to win their last five. Redskin fans think a 13-3 loss to a 1-15 Dallas team kept them out of the playoffs.

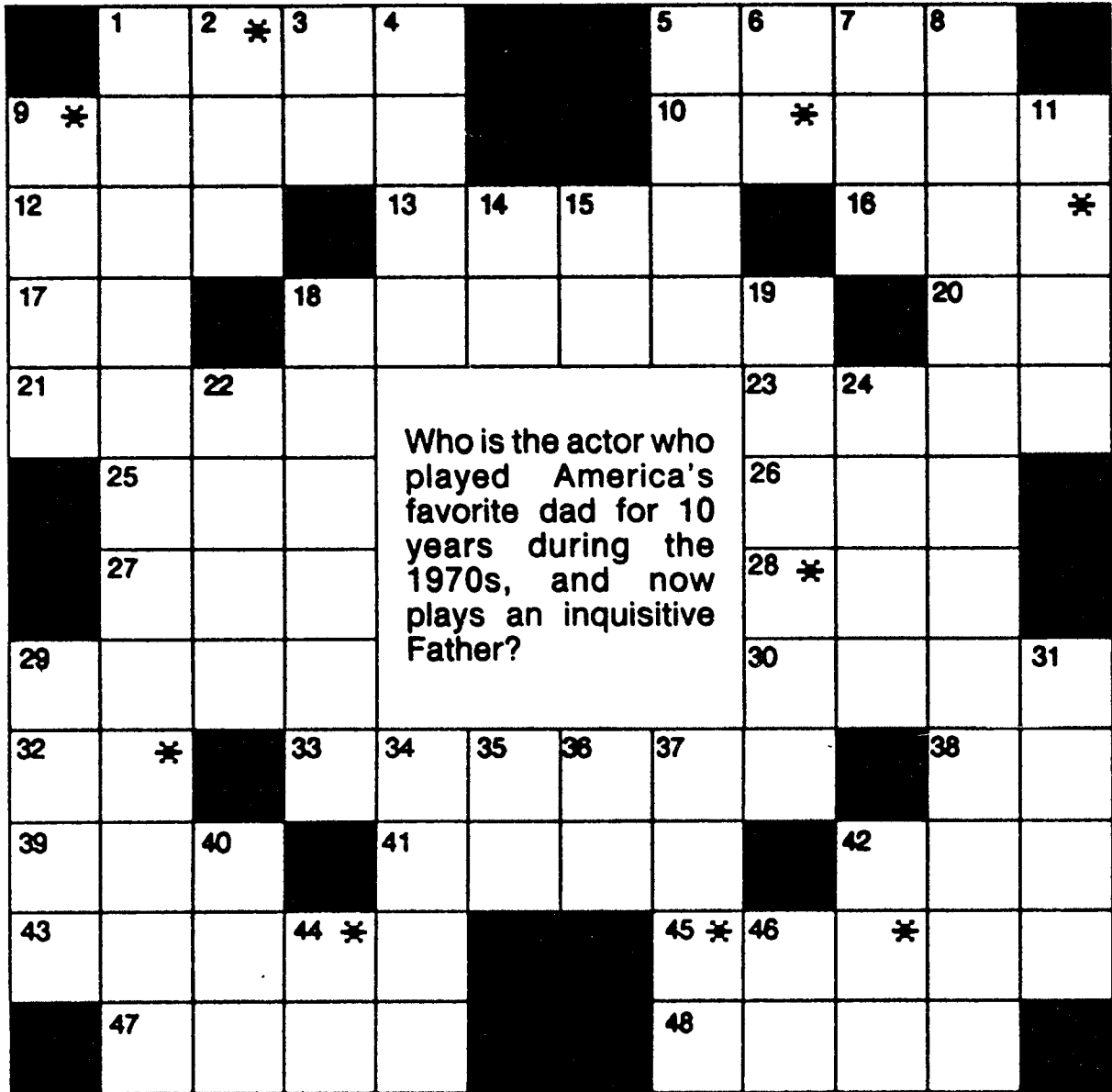

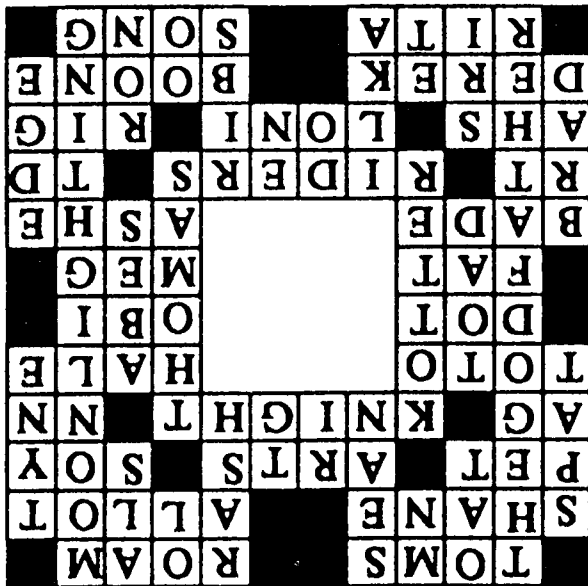

A: The new fall programming is now in the process of premiering, perhaps there will be something on now that



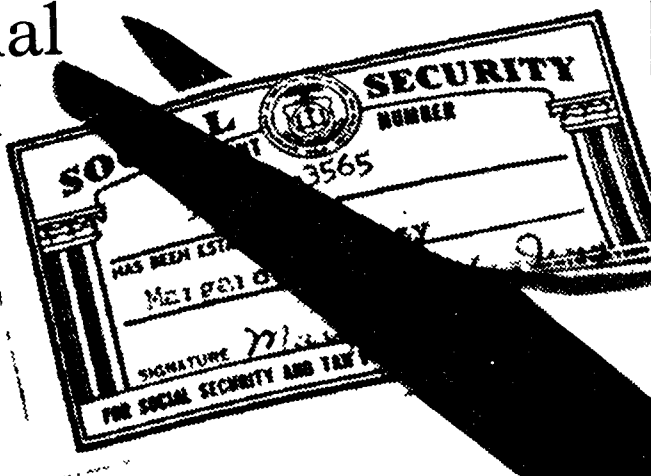

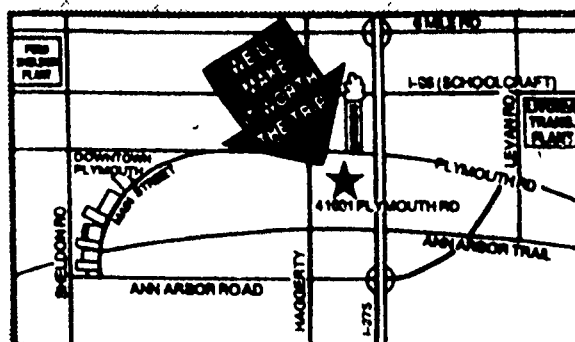
