Store hours expand on Thursdays

Northville shoppers can browse by moonlight under new business hours approved by the Downtown Merchants Association.

The majority of the city's 56 retail shops have agreed to remain open until 8 p.m. Thursdays, to build a better evening business climate in town. Though several stores have already begun offering Thursday evening hours, the new schedule officially will begin this Thursday, Nov. 1.

Merchants Association President Ronnie Cambra said the decision is the result of years of lobbying by her group. She hopes the decision will convince other merchants to join the majority and offer increased Thursday hours.

"For so long, we've had everybody saying, 'I'll stay open if everybody else stays open,'" Cambra said. "But in the past it's been very hard to get everybody to agree on one night. Some people would be open Thursdays and some would be open Fridays. Other stores like Orin Jewel-

ers remained open nearly every night during the Christmas holiday season, and both Thursdays and Fridays throughout the rest of the year.

Cambra said the new hours reflect comments by many of her customers at the Kitchen Witch, 107 N. Center St. "We're always having people come in and say, 'Aren't you open on weekends?'" she said.

The fact that both parents work in many modern families has also intensified the need for stores to offer evening and weekend hours, Cambra said. She noted that many city restaurants offer evening hours, and said that working women should be particularly pleased with the new store hours.

"It's nice for them to know that they can come down here and get in three hours of shopping and a little dinner," she said.

"I think people realize that times are changing, and Northville is changing," she said. "We're eventually going to have 15 more stores over there at Main and Center (in the MainCentre development), and if we

get national chains in there like The Gap, we're going to have to stay open because they do.

"To be competitive with the malls, they have to offer this service," she

added. "It's building a reputation, and it takes a while to build this and let people know that we're serious about it. But it won't work if we don't all stay open... You've got to have a

good percentage doing it."

As usual, the downtown merchants will also offer extended business hours on Sundays from 12-5

p.m. between Thanksgiving weekend, Nov. 25, and Dec. 30.

"It's pretty rare that a store won't participate in that," Cambra said.

Hospital probate court post sparks race

In perhaps the most pessimistic press release published by a recent political candidate, Patricia Campbell predicted she would be beaten by her opponent in the Nov. 6 runoff election for a new probate court judgeship in Northville.

The cover of her release says in capital letters, "I WILL LOSE," and her opening statement reads, "I'm a candidate for probate judge, and I'm about to lose an election. Maybe you don't care."

Campbell warned voters that her opponent, William Leo Cahalan Jr., stands a good chance of winning the November election on name recognition alone. He is a cousin of the late Wayne County prosecutor and circuit court judge William Leo Cahalan, and the son of Third Circuit Court judge William Leo Cahalan.

Cahalan, of Grosse Ile, is himself a Detroit-based attorney with Feikens, Foster, Vander Male & DeNardis. A

former assistant Detroit Records Court law librarian and pretrial diversion assistant, he has worked with that court's probation program for first-time non-violent felons. He received his degree from the Detroit College of Law in 1987.

But his opponent argues that her eight-year lead in legal experience and the "Well Qualified" rating she received from the Michigan Bar Association are proof of her superior judicial credentials.

Campbell, of Detroit, has been a referee in probate court's juvenile division since 1981, a legal advisor to the probate court and a juvenile division attorney.

The mother of eight college graduates — three of them lawyers — she earned her law degree from Wayne State University in 1975.

"If you don't decide to tell someone about the choice for Probate Court, I'm in the soup," she wrote in her press release. "But that isn't my fam-

ily business — I'm no relation to the Campbell Soup Company.

"Of course, the Wayne County court system isn't a family business, either," she added. "Not yet."

Campbell and Cahalan are seeking an eight-year probate court seat created in April to hear mental competency hearings and cases involving juveniles from western Wayne County. The new judge will be stationed at the Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital and will hear adoption, child neglect, mental health and other family-related cases.

The two candidates beat out four other candidates in the August primaries, including attorney Carolyn Blanchard of Northville, for the \$91,807-a-year seat.

Cahalan won more votes in the primary, outpolling Campbell by 37,217 to 29,425.

Campbell has been endorsed by both metropolitan Detroit daily newspapers, and she received top ratings from the non-profit citizen

group Civic Searchlight and the Detroit Bar Association. Campbell was rated "Well Qualified" for the position by the latter group — the only one of the six original candidates to earn that rating.

Cahalan was judged "Not Qualified" by the same group. But he noted that his rating was due more to the Detroit Bar Association's rating policy than to the quality of his legal work. "Their policy is that if a lawyer hasn't been a member of the Bar for five years, then they're not qualified, and that's it," he said. "But I've been interviewed by several other organizations and been rated qualified, and, in fact, have been endorsed by most."

Cahalan said he's been endorsed by the Michigan Trial Lawyers Association, and rated "Qualified" by the Wolverine Bar Association and Civic Searchlight, among others.

PUBLIC HEARINGS ON RECREATION NEEDS: Northville Community Recreation will hold two public hearings to discuss the community's recreation needs over the next five years. The 7:30 p.m. hearings will be held tonight, Oct. 29 at City Hall, and Wednesday, Nov. 7, at Township Hall.

The purpose of the hearings is to gather public input for a recreation master plan. Recreation Director John Anderson said they should help his department determine resident desire for different forms of recreation, in light of two recent recreation millage defeats.

SENIOR FLU SHOTS: Flu shots for senior citizens will be held in November at the University of Michigan M-Care Health Center in Northville.

Anyone over the age of 62 is eligible to receive these injections at a reduced fee of \$5 during these clinics. Anyone 61 years or younger will be charged the regular \$13 fee.

Seniors will be required to wait at the center for 10 minutes after their shot to be sure they have no reaction.

Only those who have preregistered for shots will be inoculated. To provide timely services, only one inoculation every 15 minutes will be scheduled. The schedule will not accommodate additional people who come with someone who has an appointment.

Appointments are limited; call the Northville Senior Center by Oct. 31 to schedule an appointment. The number is 349-4140.

THE BATTLE FOR THE JUG: Everything that could go wrong for the Novi football team did as the Northville Mustangs maintained their stranglehold on the Baseline Jug. Northville defeated the Cats 17-0 Friday, and also earned a trip to the Class A playoffs for the first time in the school's history.

The Wildcats (5-4) fumbled a punt on their first series setting up Brandon Hayes' 19-yard field goal, and a 3-0 halftime lead for the Mustangs. In the second half, the Northville offense caught fire as Ryan Huzjak scored on a one-yard sneak, and Bill Kelley rambled in from six yards out.

Through the course of the game Novi had three touchdowns called back for penalties, missed a 31-yard field goal attempt, and were halted on fourth-and-goal from the 1.

The Mustangs (6-3) will meet Wyandotte Roosevelt Friday or Saturday in a prerregional contest.

MUSTANG UPDATE: After a slow start, Northville basketball coach Ed Kitch predicted that his team would have to come up with a strong finish to salvage the season and qualify for the WLAA post-season tournament.

As if on cue, the Mustangs did exactly that. In prep action last week, Northville topped Walled Lake Central (45-44) and Farmington Harrison (61-32) to extend its winning streak to six.

Dance classes are for all ages

Who says you can't do it all?

You can become a performing tap dancer, jazz dancer and ballerina by the end of the school year. Community education dance classes are gearing up in Novi, and preparations for a spring recital will soon be underway.

A program called "That's Dancing" teaches several dance forms and culminates with a spring recital. The \$285 fee covers the entire year including lessons, recital costumes and end-of-the-year pictures.

The fee can be paid in installments of \$95, but after Nov. 26 newcomers will not be permitted to join the class to allow the dancers to begin progressing toward recital time.

The recital will be held May 21 at Novi High School.

Since becoming a performing dancer may not appeal to everyone, a half-hour class teaching tumbling, tap, jazz and ballet skills is also available.

Called "Just Dance," the class gives kids a smattering of dance forms while parents watch and sometimes participate.

"It gives kids a chance to try things on for size," said Dennis McVittie, owner and teacher for That's Dancing, the dance company hired by community education to teach the classes.

Learn actual dances in the "Combination Dance" class. This class also teaches several dance forms. Because the class does not participate in the year-end recital, new students can join before each session.

All classes are offered in groups of 4- to 6-year-olds and 7- to 10-year-olds.

In addition, specialists can take classes in specific areas like ballet, tap, jazz or even pompon.

Adult classes are also available including ballroom dancing.

That's Dancing teaches in 16 school districts with a staff of 16 teachers.

In Novi, all of classes meet at Novi Middle School.

Registration and a list of classes is available through Community Education in the Educational Services Building on Taft Road in Novi.

States offer aid for private school choice

We and some of our friends want to put our children in a private school but don't have the money to do so. Do you ever see parents given the choice of the school they want and some money from education to help pay for the schooling?

Is this an opportunity for black families to choose an educational setting where knives and guns are not the focus, where teachers work in a stress free environment? Or is this a conspiracy to destroy public education?

Are the "moderate" citizens (not the super-liberal Democrats or the super-conservative Republicans) beginning to say, "Maybe a little competition for our public schools is healthy"? Looks that way when one remembers that 14 other state legislative bodies are considering the school of choice option.

You ask, if I ever envision parents in Michigan getting a choice — and some money.

Choice is already happening. Look at the home schooling movement. Years ago, parents who kept the kids home were hauled into court; some went to jail. Today, a parent can fill out a few forms at the local Intermediate School District, follow or pretend to follow some curriculum guidelines, submit children to a periodic basic skills test and keep them home. That is a school of choice — the home.

On a local level, and a few steps short of parents selecting a private school, is the open enrollment movement. In open enrollment, parents can select any school they want in their own district. Is open enrollment a part of the old "stepping stone" theory of evolution leading to private schools of choice for parents? I don't know!

I do know that if eventually parents do receive cold cash to use to put their kids in a private school, there will be schools opening all over the place — a few great, some good but many an entrepreneur's dream of the quick buck.

So, there is no simple answer. I do know, however, that 1,000 academically talented Milwaukee students are going to receive an outstanding educational opportunity. That I like.

Besides, the quality school districts this newspaper reaches are probably not going to see a student exodus if parents are given a choice; if competition with private schools becomes a way of life. Right?

Districts begin to offer child care

As the need for child care increases, more school districts are becoming actively involved in this business as an extension of their services to the community.

Not only do they offer before and after school programs, but day care and preschool programs, as well.

Many Oakland county districts, such as Troy, Rochester Hills, West Bloomfield and Bloomfield Hills, have developed a wide range of child care programs to meet the needs of their communities.

In 1985, the Recreation and Community Services Division of Bloomfield Hills Schools opened the Fox Hills Early Childhood Center, in the former Fox Hills Elementary School, which had been closed due to declining enrollment.

According to Fox Hills Supervisor Sally Smith, the idea for the center was that of School Superintendent W. Robert Docking.

Virtually the entire one-story, open-wall style building has been overtaken by hundreds of preschoolers in a variety of programs.

Opening with just over 100 children in 1985, last year's enrollment almost reached 400.

The Fox Hills Center offers a variety of programs: parent-toddler classes; a program for 2 1/2- to 3-year-olds, where the parent initially stays with the child until he is ready to be left by himself; and two, three, and five-day programs for preschoolers of different ages.

In addition, the Center has a day care program, which operates from 7

a.m. to 6 p.m. Children in the day care program may also be enrolled in the preschool, which is in the same building.

The center makes use of Bloomfield Hills resources, with a social worker, speech pathologist and others to help children with special needs. Special education programs are also offered there.

Most of the teachers at the Fox Hills Center have either advanced degrees or specialized training in early childhood.

In 1988-1989, the school district participated in a collaborative program with Oakland University.

Participants included 48 preschool through second-grade teach-

ers throughout the district who completed a 20-credit program.

According to the joint report on the project, this group was singled out "because P-2 children learn differently from older children. Young students acquire knowledge and social skills best from active, hands-on techniques including games and dramatic play."

Female bench candidates agree on issues

The male candidates didn't show up, so the female candidates had a love-in.

State Supreme Court Justice Patricia Boyle, a Democratic nominee, said, "On criminal matters, she would be similar to me."

Judy Hughes, a Republican nominee for the high court, said "I'm not running against my esteemed sister. There are not many cases in criminal law where I disagree with Justice Boyle."

They went on to prove it in a discussion of "basketball score" prison sentences.

Not showing up Wednesday for the forum on the University of Michigan Dearborn campus were Justice Michael Cavanagh, a Democratic nominee, and W. Clark Durant, a Republican nominee. Under a quirk in Michigan law, Supreme Court candidates are nominated by political parties but run on a non-partisan ballot.

The sentencing question was raised by one of just a handful of students attending the session. The state's highest court threw out a trial court's sentence of hundreds of years of a man convicted of stabbing, killing and robbing.

"I wrote the dissent," replied Boyle. "The trial court had authorized something that couldn't be done (sentences running beyond life expectancy). But the Legislature had authorized any term of years. I lost 4-3."

"I would have joined in the dissent," said Hughes, adding "Some members of the court have been eroding the authority of trial judges for

20 years."

The candidates didn't discuss workers compensation or unemployment compensation cases, where Boyle and two Democrats have lined up solidly against three Republicans. Justice Charles Levin, elected as an independent, has been a swing vote.

On criminal matters, however, Boyle votes with the most conservative members of the court.

Each boasted a tough-on-crime career in other ways.

Boyle said, "I worked on the Criminal Sexual Conduct Act (of the 1970s). It assures a woman's sexual history can't be brought out in a rape case. It's one of the most significant accomplishments of my life."

Hughes said that in Barry County she successfully prosecuted "a dirty drive-in movie west of town. The drive-in flew in lawyers from California and Georgia." When the place burned down, Hughes said she helped prevent its being rebuilt because it was a non-conforming use under the zoning ordinance.

Boyle: "I'm the only justice with significant trial court experience."

Hughes: "You don't necessarily have to be a trial judge (to be an appellate court judge). You need trial experience — and common sense."

Both bore children while attending law school and had to fight for their early jobs.

"I was first in my law school class, the only woman," Boyle said. "Out of 350, I was the last person to get a job. I've never forgotten to win the Barry County prosecutor's election, said

Hughes, admitting she was something of a carpetbagger for being new in town. The Indiana-born lawyer also said she spent her junior year of high school in Japan, "immersed in Japanese culture."

Courts are heavily burdened, they agreed.

Boyle said, "The system is extremely overburdened — too many cases, too much time, they cost too much."

Boyle called for "equitable funding" of the trial courts — circuit, probate and district. Outside of Detroit and Wayne County, local courts are financed by local units, with wide disparities in caseloads, pay and facilities.

The state 10 years ago began to move toward paying the entire bill but gave up in the recession. Many outstate communities have sued seeking complete state financing.

Hughes, a member of the Michigan

21st Century Courts Commission, said its consensus is that "things are going well. We've just gotta tinker here and there."

Both strongly endorsed efforts at alternative dispute resolution — quicker, less-formal methods of settling minor cases.

They made pitches to voters of both parties.

Boyle said she got her first judicial appointment, to the Detroit Recorder's bench, from Republican Gov. William Milliken. Her other two appointments came from Democrats, President Jimmy Carter and Gov. James Blanchard.

Hughes said her appointment to the courts commission came from Senate Republican leader John Engler and her appointment to the Michigan Criminal Justice Commission from Gov. Blanchard.

At the end of their appearance, they hugged.

Be a deer friend: watch the roads during the rut

Deer are becoming a growing traffic menace on Michigan roads, forcing Michigan motorists to stay extra alert this time of year.

According to Michigan Police, nearly 47,000 car-deer accidents were reported in the state in 1989, the highest ever for a single year. These accidents killed six people and injured 1,857. In Oakland County last year, there were 777 car-deer accidents resulting in 48 injuries. In Wayne County, 193 car-deer accidents caused nine injuries.

Many motorists are taking the precaution of installing small warning devices on their bumpers to help keep deer off the roadway.

The device is activated by onrushing air and emits an ultrasonic tone, audible to humans, that startles deer and usually stops them in their tracks before they cross roads.

Michigan's deer herd is estimated at 1.8 million head — among the top three in the nation — so Michigan motorists are constantly exposed to

the threat of deer on the roadways. The most hazardous time of year is the fall rutting season, when deer are on the move much more.

"Always be aware that no matter where you are in Michigan, deer are nearby," said Lt. Dan Smith, of the Michigan State Police Traffic Services Division. "When you see a deer along the road be especially alert. It usually means there are more deer right behind or close by, even if you cannot see them."

Smith, who said that 67 percent of car-deer accidents occur at night, advises motorists to watch for deer's eyes shining in the dark. If you see a deer at night, slow down and try blinking your headlights or sounding your horn.

"If a deer runs in front of your car, do not swerve to miss it," he said. "That's how most serious accidents happen. If you swerve, you will probably lose control of your car and hit a tree or roll over. That is a lot more dangerous than what might happen

if you hit the deer."

Another word of caution from Smith: Do not approach the deer after you hit it. The animal may be only stunned and could leap up suddenly causing injury to you. The accident should be reported immediately to the local police department.

"There are two things every Michigan driver should know about car-deer accidents," Smith said. "First, they can occur anywhere in the state; and second, when you see one deer, be alert for all the others that are nearby but cannot be seen."

Many groups also endorse certain deer alert devices as an effective means of preventing car-deer accidents.

Tests of the device indicate an 80 percent effectiveness. The device, which is adjustable to fit all bumpers, must be cleaned periodically to maintain its effectiveness.

Many law enforcement agencies, company fleets, and major corporations require the device on all their cars and trucks.

Cold War end spurs White to run for Congress

Democrat Elmer White, 50, an Ann Arbor lawyer, is challenging incumbent Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, for Michigan's 2nd District seat in the U.S. Congress. White graduated from the University of Michigan Law School and has practiced law in Ann Arbor for the past 25 years.

White is the father of two daughters and served three years active duty in Texas as an Air Force Captain during the Vietnam War.

This is his first attempt at an elected office. White discussed his candidacy with the Record Friday.

RECORD: Why are you running for this position? What can you bring to the 2nd Congressional District?

WHITE: The reason I'm running is because we're at a historic place in our history. The Cold War is over and we're right now standing at the doorstep as to what will happen in our society over the next ten years and into the 21st century.

All my life I've been hearing that the Russians may bomb us. As a kid I remember paper drives for the war effort. Maybe you remember the air raid drills of putting your head under the desk. This is now over with. In a way, we should have been celebrating winning the Cold War. I think this new Congress has got to make some decisions on how we're going to go into the new century.

The thing I want to do is to cut the military budget. That money has been going to the sunbelt states. When we cut the military budget, money will be freed up to go to the private sector and the public sector to come into the 2nd District where we're geared up for peacetime production.

RECORD: What are some of the areas of expertise you could bring to Congress?

WHITE: My basic assets are that I'm honest, I'm innovative, I'm willing to look at ideas and I'm pretty good at spotting phonies. In summary, I have the qualities that would make a good congressman. I understand the human condition and I lead a healthy lifestyle.

RECORD: Please comment on the present budget situation. How would you have voted on the proposed budgets to date?

WHITE: Looking at the last two weeks, I would have favored a 10-percent surtax on incomes above \$100,000. I would have fought to the bitter end against any gasoline tax because gasoline tax makes people pay more to get to work.

I think in some sense the president has invented the deficit as a political issue. I don't think the deficit is as bad as the president has painted it. I think it's benefited the president that we had this big stir over the budget because it's shifted our attention away from Kuwait.

The solution is to spend less — by cutting the military — and to look at the pet projects of each congressman. In this district, we've never got anything in the way of pork barreling, so it won't hurt us a bit. The 2nd District in Michigan, for the last 14 years, has never got anything from Washington.

RECORD: What about Bush's veto of the Civil Rights Bill? Would you vote to override that veto?

WHITE: Yes. I would vote to override his veto. He's looking in the wrong direction by vetoing the Civil Rights Bill, but what do you expect from a guy that's a millionaire and was raised in a wealthy family that doesn't understand the human condition.

RECORD: I'd like you to comment on an issue that is very volatile and could be one of the major issues of the 1990s — abortion. Should abortion remain the individual's choice or should government restrict abortion?

WHITE: This is an issue that men debate and legislatures that are dominated by males decide but I am very strong pro-choice. The reason that I am pro-choice is that I believe that's a decision a woman should make in consultation with her doctor. If you allow the state to interfere with a person's control of their own body, I believe you establish some dangerous precedent and the state can pass other laws that would control us.

Under the U.S. Constitution, there must be this freedom of choice. I am unalterably opposed to any law that would outlaw medical abortions.

RECORD: How would you downsize the military? What kind of cuts are you talking about?

WHITE: Fifteen-percent cut. Strategic capability. Research for strategic applications. Not a cut at this time for

conventional forces, research and equipping. But we also have to have a national debate, and we have to start it right after Christmas, as to what our role is as an international police force over the next ten years. If we (U.S. troops) are mercenaries, who are we selling ourselves to? Are we just giving it away?

If you look at the Kuwaiti oil situation, and I'm very angry about this when you examine it, the Japanese are the beneficiaries. You look at the modern automobile, besides the gasoline in the gas tank, there's petroleum in the dashboard and all the plastics that are used in it.

When we build here, General Motors pays taxes that support the military forces in Arabia. Auto workers pay taxes. But if you look at Toyota and Nissan, they're not paying any of those taxes, but there getting the benefit of oil.

RECORD: What would you do to rectify that situation?

WHITE: One way to equalize it is to examine the petroleum content of an automobile and then tax every car sold in this country, whether it's produced in Japan or the U.S., tax them all at time of sale, and then rebate to the manufacturer in terms of the national origin of where they paid taxes to bring this oil out. It's different than a tariff. It's just to recognize what the true cost of an automobile is. The Japanese then would have to realize that they have to support the troops in Arabia or (Japan) would have to look at their own defense forces.

RECORD: That sounds like kind of a bureaucratic approach. Is that preferable to straight-forward compensatory agreements?

WHITE: Well, that's the tin cup approach. Like whatever the Japanese are willing to give us. Hey, they gave us a billion dollars. Well, that's great, but that's only one month's expenses. Looking at it in a bigger sense, I think we've got to decide. Are we going to be willing to send several hundred thousand troops to any place in the world... We would feel a lot better about the Kuwait situation if there was 250,000 troops over there with 20-percent from each of the major powers. We'd feel a lot different.

RECORD: Do you support the present approach to the Middle East confrontation? They're attempting to find a solution through economic sanctions but we really don't know what the policy is or what it's going

to be.

WHITE: I am ready to start a national debate, as soon as the troops come home. During Vietnam, people said, "Never again are we going to sit by and let this happen." And it looks like this is another Vietnam situation. Looking ahead to the next 24 months, we've got to be ready politically and we can't sit back and let the president make the decision all by himself.

RECORD: Should the U.S. get into an actual military engagement in that region if economic sanctions do not work?

WHITE: The first question is should we send the U.S. Air Force on a mission to Baghdad to bomb it back to the stone age? I'm absolutely against that. The second question is should we cross the line in the sand with the troops? The problem with that is they have one million men with ten years of battle under their belts. We have 250,000. We have one trigger-puller for every four that they have. I think it's obvious — despite our fine troops — that it would not be wise to cross that line in the sand. Will Saddam Hussein cross that line? Apparently he's willing to go on with a waiting game.

I say this embargo is not going to work. Then we get down to a 15-year-old Iraqi who's been sitting up all night drinking coffee and maybe 200 yards away a 17-year-old from Northville, Michigan, who's been sitting up all night drinking coffee and the dawn comes, and somebody fires a gun, and somebody else fires a gun and we're into an all-out war that's triggered by something like that.

I think it's very bad policy and I think Bush is totally wrong for getting us into a situation where two teenage boys in the desert could get us into war. If Kurt Vonnegut had written up a scenario, he would have done it like that.

RECORD: You're running for Congress in a Republican stronghold. What can you say to the voters to make them turn against the tide and vote for you?

WHITE: Look at what has occurred in the last ten years in terms of how we're allocating our resources and what our national policy is and ask yourself if you want a congressman who will go along with this or am I looking at the future opportunities that we have now that the Cold War is over. I'm a commitment for change in the 2nd District and change in the budget so we don't have to support the huge military machine that we've supported the last 50 years.

Campbell says her experience has been perfect preparation for the new position. "You're going to have one judge sitting all alone — new staff, new docket — so you need somebody that knows what they're doing," she said. "I've got enough experience that I'll be sitting alone, I know the procedures, I know the policy, I know the law, I know the rules, I can function alone as a beginning judge."

"I've basically spent the last 11 years gaining experience to do this particular job, and that's why I'm seeking it," she said.

"The young man I'm running against is not only fairly new out of law school, three years, but hasn't had any probate experience in general, let alone sufficient to accept a judgeship that may be sitting all

alone," she said.

Cahalan argues that he is a much more qualified candidate than his opponent makes him out to be. "I do have quite a bit of probate court experience," he said. "I handle most of the probate matters at our law firm; I establish and write up trusts for people. I've been involved in will disputes in court, and I do quite a bit of mental incompetency hearings."

Cahalan also argues that his experience as an attorney would be helpful as a judge. "A judge should have the background of an active trial practice to be an effective judge," he said, "because for the court system to work efficiently and effectively, I think the bench and the bar have to work together... If you have an understanding and appreciation of both, things are just going to work more smoothly and, well, the effec-

tiveness of the court will be enhanced."

Both candidates say they see the judgeship as a chance to have a positive effect on families' lives.

"It's funny, the probate court doesn't get as much publicity as the trial court," Cahalan said. "A lot of people probably don't know what a probate court is. The only understanding they have is what they see on TV (in shows like) 'L.A. Law' or 'Matlock,' and that's either the criminal or personal injury type of suits. But the probate court is probably the court most people will have contact with, in one way or another, and the court has a more personal involvement in everyone's lives, because it has to do more with family law: decedents' estates, mental incompetency, abuse and neglect."

"It's a very important court and I think I can do a lot of good," he said.

That may be the one thing the two candidates agree on. "There is a real feeling of satisfaction," Campbell agreed, from uniting couples with children in adoption hearings, to reuniting families after trying times. "I've been there sufficiently long to have some of the young men and women that I've dealt with on a delinquency basis come back and tell me they were in college," she added. "And," she said, smiling, "it makes your own family look good."

Job prospects bright for teens

These generally are good times for teens looking for part-time jobs, since collegians have gone back to campus and federal and state labor laws limit work hours for high-school students when classes are in session.

"Are employers finding difficulty getting students? Yes. There are a lot more part-time jobs than students who have to work," said Dorothy Wolff, job placement coordinator for the Rochester Community Schools.

Wolff, who recently reported the availability of 78 jobs broadly categorized as clerical, retail and food service, wasn't the only one to paint a rosy picture for high-school job applicants.

"I can always use people," said Phil Burley, manager of a Southfield Burger King. "When they (students) go back to school, their availability changes. Once school starts, they cut down drastically. Instead of one, I need three or four to cover shifts."

Work opportunities also were confirmed by Ralph Souter and Jerry Takis, managers of K mart stores in Canton and Farmington Hills, respectively.

"At the end of August, we do lose a lot of kids," Souter said. "We do a lot of hiring."

"We try to work around kids' schedules," Takis said. "There's a lot of different opportunities."

Mary Schirle, assistant manager of The Gap in Bloomfield Township, cited the need for about three clerks in that store.

"There are jobs available, turnover, when college kids go back," she said. High-school students under 18 years of age interested in entering the job market should know that federal and state labor laws limit working hours and require a working permit, usually acquired through school counseling offices.

Children under 16 can work no more than three hours per day, 18 hours per week. They can't work between 7 p.m. and 7 a.m. unless they have a newspaper route.

Youths 16-17 can work only during the hours of 6 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. when school is in session, until 11:30 p.m. while on break.

Federal law prohibits anyone under 18 from operating dangerous equipment like slicing, baling or dough mixing machines.

"There's a pressing need to see that children aren't exploited and are paid properly," said Bob Cuccia, a spokesperson for the U.S. Labor Department. "Kids belong in school first, working second."

Business managers and owners said they're careful about complying with hours restrictions.

"Each manager is highly trained so that he doesn't make foolish mistakes," said William Welch, an owner of five Hollywood Markets. "We're very careful about this."

"We have made it explicitly clear to every franchise and company people

that there will be no fluctuations when it comes to child labor standards," said Michael Evans, a corporate spokesman for Burger King. "We have terminated managers on the spot."

The feds have recorded 20,000 child labor violations relating to hours or working conditions nationally since March, Cuccia said.

"Basically, we'll make an investigation on an inquiry," said Yvonne Clark, an employment standards supervisor with the Michigan De-

partment of Labor.

Managers said they realize that part-timers have definite time constraints.

Some of Takis' students work 20 hours per week, while others might work only one day on the weekend for six hours.

"We usually have three or four hour shifts, nothing more, and at most, three days a week," said Schirle of The Gap. "Part-timers, they have other things to do."

A part-time job can be good for stu-

dents, educators say, as long as young people and parents keep a proper perspective.

"There's a lot to be learned from a job other than the money earned," Wolff said. "You can learn to be there on time, loyalty to an employer, how to organize your time."

"If kept under control . . . there's value in a part-time job for kids," said Mary Ann Reidinger, a counselor at Adams High School. "At this stage of the game, school work should be number one."

If you're a partner, get treated like one

I have been asked to enter into a partnership with someone who claims to need my professional expertise in the prepared foods industry. This person wants me to invest \$15,000 to help him plan and open a carry-out food business within his video store, yet he's already treating me like an employee rather than a partner. Not wanting to miss out on what could be an excellent opportunity, how can I go about correcting the present situation?

with the proposed project or go your separate ways.

My brother is 35 years old going on 16. Every time someone tells him about a "great" business he should get into, he practically goes into a trance and drops everything until something disastrous happens to snap him out of it. Meanwhile, he hasn't held any job for more than a year or two, he's in debt up to his eyeballs, and he's totally oblivious to his other responsibilities. What advice would you offer?

If you haven't formally met to discuss your mutual ideas regarding this proposed venture, that would be the first place to start.

Unless you take the initiative to be actively involved with the project's planning and implementation as a partner, it comes no surprise that you might be treated like an employee.

But if you have found that your plans or recommendations have been consistently ignored by your prospective partner, perhaps this isn't quite the "excellent opportunity" you had originally anticipated.

Achieving success as partners in any business depends in large part on the ability to listen and communicate openly with each other. Perhaps your potential partner perceives your involvement with this venture in an entirely different way than you do or vice versa.

Regardless of the specifics, you need to talk about it and whatever other concerns you may have. Once you both understand what it is that the other wants and expects, you will then be free to either move forward

If your brother is genuinely serious about starting his own business, the first thing I would suggest is that he quit listening to other people about what he should or should not be doing regarding a career.

As I point out in my marketing seminars, the "hottest" new business opportunities in any given year mean nothing when one out of every two business start-ups fail within the first three years of operation.

His time would be better spent reviewing his own interests, skills and hobbies to identify what he is best suited for and prepared to do.

I would also recommend that he obtain employment in the field that most appeals to him before going off on his own. If he becomes disillusioned after a year or two, at least he would have earned, rather than lost, money in the process.

Money Management

Business is like home, location is everything

If you are thinking of opening your own business and are trying to decide on a location, consider this: poor location is frequently an important factor in the failure of small businesses. What this warning underscores is the importance of knowing what to look for in choosing a location for your new business. The decision to buy a particular piece of property should not be made on impulse or solely because the location is beautiful or close to home. There are some general guidelines you can follow to help you make the right choice.

LOOK AT THE DEMOGRAPHICS

The Michigan Association of CPAs suggests that you begin by investigating the make-up of several target communities and locations. One of the best resources for information about a community and a particular location are census bureaus. They can tell you if the community is growing or shrinking.

In addition, they can supply you with vital details about a community's population, such as the average income, predominant occupations and median age. By comparing this information with past figures, you can determine if and how a community is changing.

Also find out whether nearby residents tend to be college-educated or blue-collar, whether they rent or buy their homes and whether property values have increased or decreased. These statistics will paint a picture of the population and help you determine whether it can support your type of business.

For instance, if you're thinking of opening a children's bookstore in a neighborhood whose local population is near retirement age, you may want to consider another location that services younger customers.

Besides the census bureau, other sources of background information include local government agencies, chambers of commerce, the Small Business Administration, trade associations, local newspapers and local residents. By talking to the locals, you can get a feel for the distinct personality of the area and which types of businesses are more likely to thrive. Also, read the editorials and letters to the editor in the local press to find out some of the concerns of community residents.

TRAFFIC PATTERNS

Traffic patterns are an important factor in choosing the right location. For example, if your business is manufacturing, you should have quick and easy access to transportation routes and necessary suppliers. If you are a retailer, you should pay particular attention to store visibility and the amount of pedestrian and vehicle traffic. The Small Business Administration has a number of publications that can help you utilize

traffic studies.

Find out if any new construction is planned for the near future that might affect your business. For instance, if a new office building is under construction several blocks away, and you're thinking of opening a coffee shop, you may be able to service many of the employees who work in the building.

MAKING THE RIGHT CHOICE

Let's suppose that you've selected the area where you'd like to locate your business. The next step is to choose a particular property. Here again, CPAs suggest that you follow some basic guidelines to help you make the right choice.

Obviously, proximity to competition is often a factor in deciding where to locate a business. If it turns out that the shoe store you plan to open will be the third one of its kind to move in on the street, you might want to reconsider your choice.

Small business owners often make the mistake of ignoring the site's history. If four businesses have come and gone in the building you're thinking of purchasing, take a closer look at the property. You may have missed a subtle — but devastating — flaw in the building's location.

When you are satisfied with the site, concentrate on the physical condition of the building. Look at the age of the plumbing and wiring. Is the facility large enough to accommodate a future expansion? Will you have to make substantial modifications before you move in? Are there ample parking spaces available so that customers are not inconvenienced? How close is the building to major roads and public transportation?

When you're ready to buy or lease the property, you'll have to weigh all legal and financial ramifications. How high are the property taxes? Should you lease now or buy the property outright? Are there zoning regulations that may adversely affect your future plans? Are there local ordinances which restrict the type of business that can exist in the building or limit your hours of operations? These are basic but vital questions that you must get answers to before signing any agreement. To help you get those answers, consult your CPA and an experienced lawyer.

Unless you're planning to sell antique, gold-plated hammers, your wouldn't be wise in opening a hardware store on chic Rodeo Drive in Beverly Hills. But, opening the first video rental store in a middle-class town may be an excellent move. As they say in the real estate business, when it comes to buying property, the three key factors are: location, location, location. That's sound advice for anyone thinking of starting or moving a small business.

Everything in the American was built on a grand scale, from the huge oak entrance door to the living room, which required two structural columns to support the massive span of its ceiling.

The houses of Homearama are priced at \$500,000 to \$875,000. Each home was created by a separate builder in conjunction with an architect, an interior designer and landscaper. The result is 10 highly individualized homes, each with a laundry list of custom features suited to the lifestyles of the rich and famous, or maybe just the rich.

Managers may soon need credentials

I am having a water problem in my basement. The board of directors and management company repaired it but received no permit for the repairs or any inspection and the basement still leaks. I have been told by a contractor that the work done by the association was not proper. I contacted the Department of Licensing and Regulation and complained about the management company, and they responded by saying that the agency does not license or regulate condominium management companies. I am concerned that the management company is not working in my best interest to solve the problem of water in the basement and storage areas. What can I do?

I understand that there has been some question raised about the applicability or coverage of certain directors and officers policies regarding certain contingencies that arise in condos. Can you comment?

It appears that not all directors and officers' liability policies are alike. While that might not necessarily be a surprise to managing agents, all too often directors of associations look to the bottom line in terms of the price of the policy in determining what insurance company to retain as opposed to the extent and nature of the coverage.

This is particularly critical in connection with policies where certain protections regarding director coverage may not be provided by your particular insurance company. It is my recommendation that each association independently evaluate the extent and coverage of its insurance policies to ensure that it is obtaining the maximum coverage for the directors and officers in the event of the various contingencies including indemnification problems when they arise.

As in the case of any other service person retained by your association, you normally get only what you pay for. If you skimp on insurance companies, accountants, attorneys or the like, you may find yourself behind the eight ball at a very embarrassing time as directors.

Concerns hit home as sales take a dive

Consumer concerns with continuing economic fallout from the Persian Gulf situation and the threat of increased federal taxation brought a sharp September drop in local home resales, according to Metro MLS, the state's largest multiple listing service.

"September sales were down by nearly a third from August, our second highest sales month this year, and some 20 percent below the year earlier figure," said Douglas G. Courtney. "We think this same economic uncertainty will be reflected in national sales figures for September when they are released later this month."

He said Metro MLS members completed sales of 1,072 single-family homes and 105 condominiums in September, compared to 1,615 and 139 in August. For the first nine months, sales were reported down by only 6.7 percent.

"We look on much of the September decline as being deferred sales," said Courtney. "There still is a very high number of potential buyers interested in moving into the market, but we think many are declining to sit tight until emerging economic conditions become clearer."

He noted that prices in most local

areas were remaining relatively stable with the September median price of \$80,000 holding a mid-year level and up only \$100 from August. The national median price for resales remains at \$97,000.

"While a national news magazine reported time on the market for homes in some regions has grown to six months or more without any firm offers, our average stay on the market is up only slightly," Courtney said. "Despite some 10 percent more new listings this year, the average stay is still only about 50 days in 1990, just a few days longer than at this time in 1989."

Courtney said that with action being taken to reduce the growing federal debt and a slow-down to near stagnation in economic growth, steps should be taken to ease both short and long-term interest rates.

"Home sales remain an important factor in national economic trends and would respond to any substantial reduction in mortgage interest rates," he stated. "Both the public and private sector also must continue to seek better ways to assist first-time buyers. Their purchases bring a string of successive buys into play as successive sellers move up the housing ladder."

Home starts remain in slight upward trend

"In August, the value of residential building eased 4 percent from its July rates, however, the construction sector remains strong," according to Gary D. Smith, President of the Michigan Association of Home Builders.

Total year-to-date (January-August) starts have increased 11 percent to 32,497 units as compared to 1989 year-to-date units of 29,287.

"After a steep increase in the opening months of 1990, construction activity in Michigan is stabilizing," said Smith. The industry has started \$2.51 billion in residential construction activity during January through August 1990 and is up 9.9 percent over 1989.

In Oakland county, the growth has remained steady, though below the

state average. Year-to-date home starts in Oakland totalled 5,433, up just 1.5 percent from the 5,351 figure of a year ago.

The value of new homes through August was just seven-tenths of a percent higher than that of a year ago. Last year's year-to-date new homes were valued at \$481.2 million, while 1990's new homes were worth \$484.6 million.

In Wayne County, building enjoyed a 30-percent jump from a year ago. Through August, 2,969 homes were started in 1990, while in 1989 the total in the same period was 2,283 homes.

New home values were only up 5.5 percent in Wayne. Values through August totalled \$230 million, compared to \$218 million in the same period in 1989.

Small garden good idea for kids

Planning and planting a garden with youngsters can be fun for all. A small plot or a container such as a half barrel will suit the purpose and be the right size for children. We don't want to overwhelm them with the project.

Let's make this first garden a cutting garden. We'll use annuals and sow the seeds directly into the soil. Annuals are colorful and the rewards are great.

The first consideration is where the garden will be. If a container fitted with wheels is used, it can be moved to take advantage of the sun as it moves across the sky. Most annuals need a minimum of seven hours of sunlight to produce their pretty flowers. Then the next thing is to decide what to plant. Look at photographs in garden catalogs or books and read the wealth of information on the backs of seed packages.

A design can be drawn on paper, but spontaneity will give the little ones more creative license. After all, it will be their garden, and surprises can add excitement to the project. Instead of planting the seeds in rows (although the flowers will be easier to pick), a pattern can be made that will be

both pleasing, interesting and more fun as the flowers appear. Write the name of the plant and the planting date on Popsicle sticks or slats from mini-blinds to mark the spots.

This might be a good time to invest in tools that will fit little hands. Can you imagine hoeing the garden with the handle twice the length it should be? Also, for close work an old spoon and fork will suit perfectly — a shoehorn makes a good trowel.

To teach the kids about seeds and sprouting, at the time you plant the seeds outdoors, make a seed viewer so that they can watch what happens as the seeds begin to grow.

You will need a glass jar with straight sides at least four inches tall, dark construction paper, paper towels, four or five large seeds (nasturtiums are good), paper towels and water. Fit construction paper inside the glass about an inch below the rim, then make a sleeve for the outside of the glass about two inches taller with the same paper, stapling them to keep their shape.

With the construction paper against the inside of the glass, crumple paper towels, one at a time, and fill the glass with them. Place the seeds carefully

into the glass between the paper and the glass — you will be able to see the seeds. Pour water on the paper towels until the construction paper is very moist.

It may be necessary to water again if the paper dries out. Now slip the sleeve over the whole works and set it in a sunny spot. The outer sleeve will ensure darkness in the container. Each day lift the sleeve to watch the progress and explain that the same thing is occurring in the ground with the seeds they have planted.

Here are suggestions and varieties that can be planted now. Approximate days for germination are in parentheses: African Daisy (8-14); calceola (4-10), their hot colors will keep witches away according to legend; coreopsis (8-14); cosmos (5-10), an easy one to grow; celosia (10-20), can be dried and cleome (10-20), the spider flower.

Others to try are: cornflower (4-8); dianthus (10-15) with a clove-like fragrance; forget-me-not (7-14) will self-sow; gaillardia or blanket flower (10-20); globe amaranth (10-15), also dries well in several colors; marigold (7-10); nasturtium (7-10) good, peppery flavor to add to salads; nicotiana (14-18) with heavenly fragrance.

of red, orange and yellow, choose sugar maple; for reddish purple, Japanese maple or callery pear; for deep red, red or white oak; for yellow, honey locust, hornbeam and poplar; for lemon yellow, larch; and for purple, ash.

Shrubs, too, can provide splashes of color in the landscape. Probably the most outstanding for fall color are the viburnums, some of which are known as "burning bush" because of their red fall foliage.

Ground covers and vines, too, have something to offer in the way of fall color. Ivy and other creeping plants will be green long after deciduous landscape plants have lost their leaves. And Virginia creeper and Boston ivy both turn red in the fall.

"Don't overlook the ability of fall and winter fruits to add color to the

landscape," Peterson suggests. "Shrubs, in particular, offer fruits in a variety of colors, from white and black through purple, red and pink. Crabapples bear yellow, orange, pink and red fruits, and some last well into the winter."

Birds and other wildlife may come to your yard to feed on these fruits, Peterson notes. The chance to watch them may be an added benefit of adding these trees and shrubs to your home grounds.

For information on selecting landscape plants, ask at your county Cooperative Extension Service office for "Selecting Ornamental Plants," Extension bulletin E-1938. It's just one of the dozens of bulletins on gardening and home landscaping topics available at your county Extension office.

Choose trees that give right fall color mix

Fall color from foliage and fruits isn't the only or even the most important consideration when you're selecting landscape plants.

Hardiness, ability to survive transplanting, size and shape, and freedom from pest problems usually rate higher than fall color on the list of desirable traits.

But once you've narrowed your selection to several plants that will meet your top priority needs, why not check out the possibilities for fall color, too? And what if you want to take the opposite approach?

Michigan State University horticulturist Curt Peterson: you can watch for attractive plants, then use a plant identification guide to figure out what they are and find out if they'll meet your other landscape needs.

Two examples of plants with striking fall color but other, less desirable traits are the sassafras and the gingko. The variably shaped leaves of the sassafras usually turn a brilliant red-orange in the fall, but it's not often planted as a landscape tree because it rarely survives being transplanted. The fan-shaped leaves of the gingko, a prehistoric species dating back millions of years, turn a pleasant butter-yellow in the fall. Female gingkos are undesirable in the landscape, however, because they bear messy, smelly fruits. To be sure of getting a male tree, you must buy nursery stock grown from cuttings, rather than trees grown from seeds.

Trees frequently recommended for fall color in the landscape include the red maples. "October Glory" turns a rich golden yellow, while "Red Sunset" is a flaming red. For shades

What really makes cookie crumble?

With the onslaught of school comes school lunches, and especially at the beginning of the school year, moms (and some dads) get roped into joining the great cookie brigade. You might get asked to make cookies for the school open house, Brownies or Boy Scouts, Indian Guides or field trips.

Unfortunately, most folks don't have a clue as to what makes a cookie crumble. Americans love to eat cookies and most love to make them, but all too often their ideas about why one cookie is crisp and another dry is pretty half-baked. It's because of the dough.

Basically, cookie dough is a combination of fat, sugar, flour, leavening and moisture, such as egg. Changing the proportion of any basic ingredient also changes the cookie's character. Little variations make the difference between a great chocolate chip and a mediocre one.

All doughs begin with the addition of a fat. This might be butter, margarine, solid shortening or lard. Butter creates the finest flavor but it also has a tendency to make the cookies bleed and spread out. Margarine helps hold the cookie's shape. Therefore, the best combination is half butter, half margarine. Avoid using whipped butter or diet fats because they contain too high a concentration of water.

Sugar not only sweetens the dough but it also makes the cookies tender. Most cookies call for granulated sugar, but light or dark brown sugar can be substituted in most cases. Brown sugars give the cookies a richer flavor and a more moist texture. Honey and molasses can be substituted for a chewier cookie but remember to lower the dry ingredients to substitute for the added moisture. Again, the best cookies use combinations of half granulated sugar and half brown sugar.

When it comes to using eggs, the protein in eggs is what binds the dough together while the moisture in the eggs adds liquid. There are no ifs ands or buts about this one — use only the freshest, Grade A Large eggs for the best results. Room temperature eggs are best because they blend in easier.

In most cookie recipes, baking powder or baking soda will provide fluffiness. Without this leavening, the cookies would be dry and hard instead of light and flaky. Adding leavening is another way of incorporating air into the dough. Baking powder and soda contain an alkaline and an acid that react when wet. This reaction forms carbon dioxide, a gas which will expand in a hot oven and fills the cookie with tiny air pockets. The pocket remains after the cookie is baked, creating light, tender cookies. Double-acting baking powder is the most common leavening and will give the best results.

Flour is the foundation of the cookie, but the flavor of flour should never be apparent when tasting the finished product. Cookies with too much flour are pasty and tough. Most recipes call for using an all-purpose flour, which is a mixture of hard and soft flour. Some recipes calling for whole wheat or other grain flours offer a more nutritious cookie with a nuttier taste. Even cookies calling for all-whole-wheat flour should contain some amount of all-purpose flour for best results.

Cake flour is best when cookies call for lots of handling, such as those formed by pressing or rolling the dough. Regardless of the type used, flour should be added at the last minute and mixed as little as possible for optimum results.

The use of flavorings can make or break a cookie. For best results, use extracts instead of flavors which leave a more intense flavor. How much is a matter of preference.

BROWN BAGGERS Lunches from home assure good nutrition

It's 11:30 a.m. Do you know what your child is eating?

You will if you've packed it yourself. That's at least one advantage to sending your elementary school youngster to school with a brown bag lunch instead of lunch money, according to Leslie Sergison, food program specialist for Weight Watchers, Inc. The registered dietitian is a former staff consultant for Beaumont Hospital and an occasional consultant for Livonia Public Schools.

The Type A lunches sold by schools provide 1/2 the recommended daily allowances, Sergison said, if the child eats all of the prepared lunch that's offered, "but the trading that goes on is incredible."

"Plus, it's still institutional food, cooked mass production, not home cooking," she added. "It's higher in fat than the average person should have and the selections are limited."

"It's real great for the working parent for whom it's really necessary," she said, but she suggests type A lunches should be limited to once a week to add variety or to serve as an occasional reward. "The menus are sent home. Choose the meal with the child," she said. "(For Type A lunches) pizza is tops on my list. It's better than most lunches kids could have — bread, protein, vegetables," Sergison said.

And at the bottom of her list? "Stay away from breaded, fried fish sticks," she suggested. "It's high in calories — which doesn't matter for kids, but it's also high in fats. Don't get them started early."

"Eating away from home starts at home with modeling. They need the knowledge to make the right choices."

Sergison cautions against regularly giving money to buy the cookies and snack cakes offered by some schools. "Make it a reward, something special," she said. "I'm going to deal with reality — kids are going to eat that. If you never allow it, they'll go after it to a greater extent, trade for it. Moderation is the key."

Milk should be the regular lunchtime beverage, Sergison said. "I prefer to see the 2 percent sold. There's no need for whole milk after the age of 3," she said, "and few children really need skim." As for chocolate, "I wouldn't want a child to get used to it, because of the fat content and sugar. Again moderation, as a special item. If you continually give the sweeter item, they get used to the 'desserty' approach."

Mention soda pop and children's lunches in the same breath and Sergison gets excited.

"I hate it! I don't think it's necessary. It has no redeeming value except for flavor. It (12 ounces of liquid) fills the child up like crazy and they're so full they don't eat the rest of their meal." If the child is getting milk for breakfast and dinner, the cans or boxes of real fruit juice — not the 10 percent drinks — are an acceptable occasional beverage substitute, she said.

Save the pop for an after school snack instead, said Sergison, and not the diet version unless there's a weight problem. "Most kids don't need diet soda. . . I'm concerned about Nutrasweet. I'd avoid it for children. Keep it to a minimum. There are no studies that show the effects on a growing body. Childhood is not the time to play games and experiment."

"Serve caffeine-free regular instead," she said. "Make sure the serving size is in proportion to the body size of the child. Twelve ounces is too many calories taken in by a small child."

In brown bag lunches for elementary school youngsters, peanut butter and jelly is still the standard, Sergison said. "It's a good satisfying lunch on whole wheat bread. Make sure there's a good proportion of peanut butter to jelly. That's a lot of fat, but kids don't have to worry."

Add carrot sticks, small containers of yogurt, an orange or an apple. "Small" is the key here, Sergison said — small cartons of yogurts, small fruits — so that the child is not

overwhelmed by the quantity. "Downgrade the portions according to age."

Add a small treat, Sergison said. A couple of cookies or a small cupcake is appropriate. "An oatmeal cookie is a better choice than a cream-filled Oreo or a chocolate-coated. If they have that they're less likely to trade their sandwich."

"If a child does not have a weight problem and is active," Sergison said, "chips are OK, but again as a special item, not an everyday occurrence. And use small servings, not the single serving bags. It's better to buy a large bag and put a small portion into sandwich bags."

Good lunches call for planning, Sergison said, and should include the basic food groups. Bread, protein, and fruit are easy, she said. "Get a vegetable in if you can, but it's tough at that age. Parents think a child won't like broccoli. If they've never tried it, don't assume they won't. Here's where modeling at home comes into play."

To add variety to the basic brown bag fare, the dietitian recommended bagels or English muffins instead of bread. "You don't have to have a sandwich. Wedges of cheese, for instance, are fun, especially for the younger child. A muffin, cheese wedges or yogurt make a fine lunch. We assume a lunch should be sandwich, fruit, chips and cookie, but we can get creative."

Sergison offered hints on lunch-packing. Get the child involved in the lunch-making process, she said. "Let them take possession of the lunch. Give them choices."

If you want a child to value a healthy lunch from home, serve healthy meals within the home, she said.

And with non-nutritive snacks, don't overdo it but don't forbid them altogether. "If they have an occasional Oreo at home they don't need to trade their sandwiches for them at school."

California label hits milestone

Oct. 1, 1990 was a historic day in the California wine industry. It marked the official release of the 1986 Beaulieu Vineyards Georges de Latour Private Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon — the 50th vintage of a wine first produced in 1936. It is the original California "private reserve."

In the youthful California wine industry, it is unusual to hear a winery boasting a 90-year history, or a 50-year track record for a single wine style, but Beaulieu Vineyards can do both.

The Georges de Latour Private Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon is a blend of selected cabernet lots from Beaulieu Vineyards No. 1 and 2," contends Beaulieu Vineyard's president Anthony Bell. "Each tank of fermenting, free-run cabernet (no press wine is ever used) is evaluated daily. The selected lots then go to large redwood tanks to complete malolactic fermentation. Following this, the wine is lightly clarified and cold stabilized before spending 30 months in a mixture of new to 15-year-old American oak barrels. The tannins are softened with a light egg white fining and the wine receives one full year bottle age prior to release."

"We use oak only as a spice in the Beaulieu Vineyards Private Reserve," explains winemaker Joel Aiken. "We do not want it to overpower the wine. The intense concentration, characteristic of the vineyards, comes through every year."

Although many California producers insist on using French oak barrels for aging cabernet sauvignon, it is mature American oak that gives the Beaulieu Vineyards Private Reserve its delicate cedary signature. One of the few truly collectible California cabernets, the Beaulieu Vineyards Private Reserve is noted for early approachability as well as longevity.

The wine's success can be attributed to the soil and location of the vineyards that produce small, intensely flavored berries. As the vineyards age, the vines are replanted in small blocks with cuttings that have been selected, by clonal trials, from the best parts of the existing vineyards.

Modern cellar methods and vineyard techniques help Aiken to retain a wine style that has proven its age-worthiness over the years.

Georges de Latour came from France to found Beaulieu Vineyards in 1900. Beaulieu Vineyard No. 1 and No. 2 were purchased by him. They are located on what is now commonly called the "Rutherford Bench," situated near the original Beaulieu property in Rutherford, Calif.

Nearly four decades after establishing Beaulieu Vineyards, Latour raised a glass of his 1936 Cabernet Sauvignon and said, "This is the wine I have been trying to make all my life." That wine, which received a gold medal and the sweepstakes award in the 1939 San Francisco Fair, was named the Georges de Latour Private Reserve following his death.

Apples a year-round treat

Yea! The cider mill is open for what I consider to be too short a time. There are very few pleasures in life that compare to a glass of cider, a sugar donut and the taking home of a bag of red beauties for a crispy treat at a later time.

The numerous apple varieties available in the United States today were developed either by accident or careful crossbreeding. Many date back to the 18th or 19th century.

In the not-so-distant past, when fresh fruit was considered a luxury, apples were one of the only fruits that could be stored for more than a week or two and were available for over half the year. With today's modern storage techniques apples are plentiful year round.

For the cook, apples are divided into two categories, dessert or cooking. Dessert fruit is sweet and fragrant when raw, while cooking fruit is generally tart. For poaching or sauteing select a firm apple such as Australia's popular Granny Smith.

Softer apples are good for baking and pureeing. A Rome is an example. Dessert or eating varieties include

Red and Golden Delicious and Jonathan. Ripe apples vary in color from deep red, to green to yellow depending on their variety.

Whether an apple is sweet or tart, soft or crisp depends on type, time of year and handling and storage procedures. When choosing apples look for fruit with a bright, even background color, firm, no bruising and a tight, non-wrinkled skin. The peak season for apples is early summer to late fall depending on variety.

To clean apples core the center with an apple corer for a whole fruit. If the fruit is not meant to be whole, cut into quarters and remove the core. The peel may be removed as desired or as the occasion dictates. Raw apples are a crunchy addition to salads such as chicken or waldorf. Grated raw apples live up to pancakes or waffles or a nice green salad.

Cooking times vary with the variety and firmness. As mentioned earlier choose firmer fruits for poaching and sauteing and softer for pureeing and baking. Most cooking methods may be used if the right variety is paired up with the method. Baking,

frying, broiling, poaching and simmering for applesauce are examples. Apples are done when translucent but still hold their shape, or soft for purees.

All apples discolor when cut, so until they're ready for use, store them in lemon juice mixed with water or full strength pineapple juice. Store in the refrigerator or cool dark place for three weeks. If storing for a long time at room temperature, separate them to prevent rotting. To speed ripening place in a brown paper bag with holes, add ripe fruit to quicken the process.

Apples are low in calories (60 per medium-sized), contain no fat, cholesterol, or protein. Much of the fiber is contained in the skin. Because modern day pesticides do not wash off with just a rinse and since most apples are treated with a waxy substance to prevent dehydration many people prefer to peel them. Most nutrients are present in the skin or just below so a personal choice must be made.

The recipes included are favorites served by my students at Schoolcraft College. Enjoy!

BAKED APPLES

4 baking apples: Rome, Grannies
1 cup dried fruit (raisins, currants, etc.)
2 tsp. lemon juice
1/4 cup granola
heavy cream or half and half
2 tsp. brown sugar
2 tsp. melted butter
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 cup apple juice

Pre-heat to 350 degrees. Core apples being careful not to go all the way to the bottom. Remove the 1/4 inch peel and trim bottom to level. Combine fruit with one tbsp. of the sugar, one tbsp. of butter, lemon juice and cinnamon. Sprinkle the tops of the cored apples with the granola after dividing the above mixture among the apples. Combine the apple juice with the remaining brown sugar and melted butter. Pour over apples, cover and bake 30 minutes. Remove the foil and bake another 30 minutes basting with the pan juices. Serve with cream or Creme Fraiche.

CREME FRAICHE

1 cup whipping cream
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 tsp. vanilla

APPLESAUCE

4 large green apples, peeled
sugar to taste
1/4 cup water
3 tbsp. lemon juice

Peel, core and cut apples into eighths. Put in water in sauce pan, cook stirring often until apples become tender 5-6 minutes. Add sugar and lemon juice, cook another 2 minutes. Remove from heat and mash with a fork.

CRANBERRY POACHED APPLES
6 small apples
3 cups cranberry juice
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup finely chopped walnuts
1 small lemon, cut in pieces, seeds removed
1/4 cup chopped figs
2 tbsp. brown sugar
2 tbsp. lemon juice

Peel apples. Core 1/4 of the way to the base. Put cranberry juice, sugar and lemon into sauce pan large enough to hold the apples in one layer. Bring to a boil, stir, add apples, add enough water to cover the apples halfway. Cover and simmer. Baste with poaching liquid often. Cook until tender and add figs. Cool in poaching liquid. Mix figs, brown sugar, walnuts and lemon juice. Sprinkle into cored apples. Bake 1 hour and 15 minutes. Serve in refrigerator.

RUSSE'S ITALIAN APPLE TART

1/4 cup sweet butter, melted
1 cup granulated sugar
2 eggs
2 tbsp. grated orange rind
1/4 tsp. ALR
1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour, sifted
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. baking powder
5-7 large granny smith apples, peeled and sliced
2 tbsp. Cinnamon

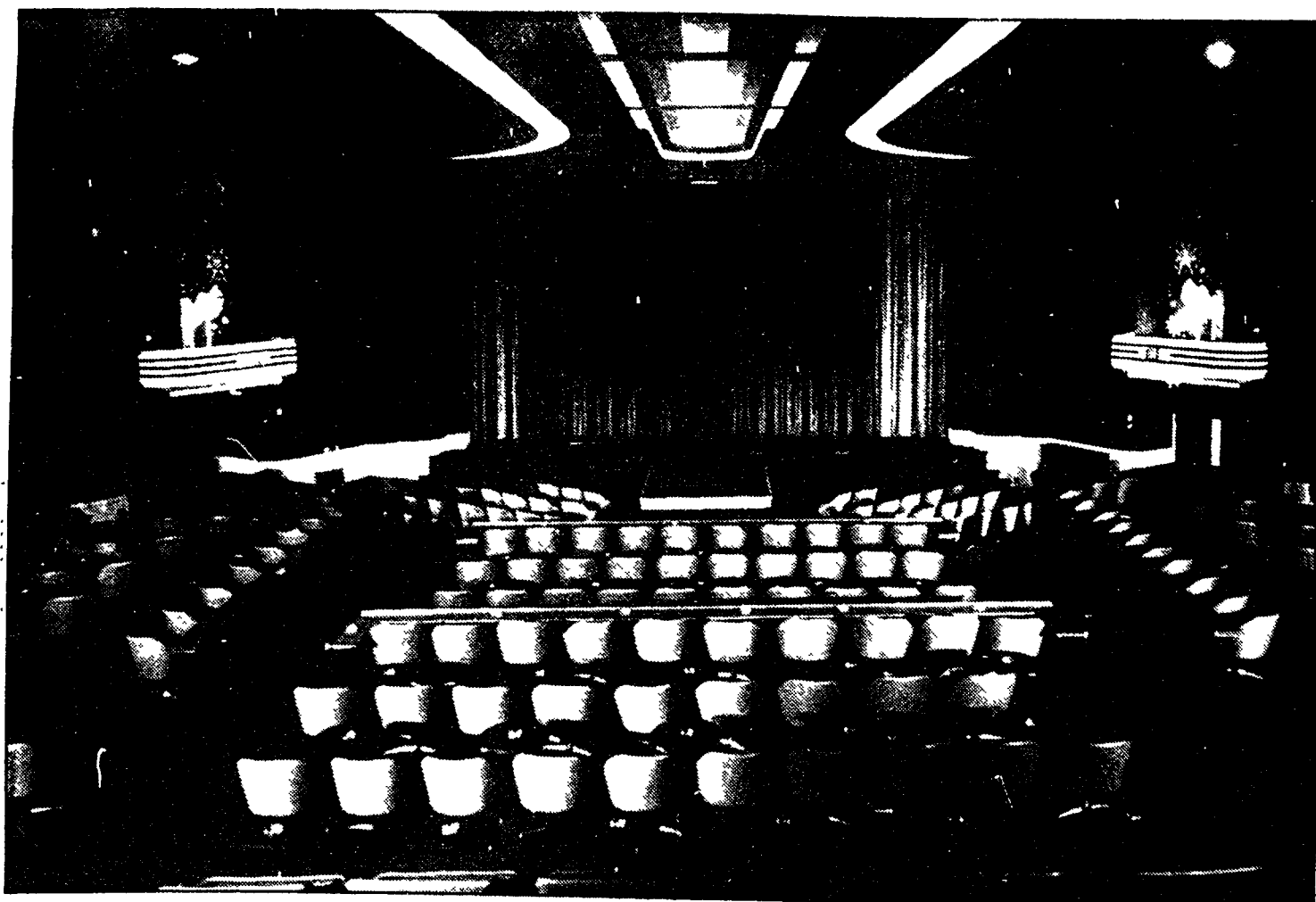
Beat sugar and melted butter. Add eggs one at a time. Add orange zest. Sift dry ingredients together and mix gently into batter. Mixture will be very thick. Spread over bottom of a buttered, floured 9-inch springform pan. Bake 1 hour in a 350 degree oven. Add topping and bake another 20 minutes.

TOPPING

1/4 cup sweet butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/4 tsp. Vanilla

Beat sugar and soften butter together for 3 minutes scraping bowl as you go along. Add eggs one at a time. Mix on medium high setting until mixture is quite thick. Mix in vanilla. Spread over top of tart and bake additional 20 minutes. Let cool at least 4 hours in refrigerator.

Eat, drink, and enjoy a movie -

Just when you thought all the fun things in life were already invented, something new and fresh appears. Enter the Wayside Cinema 'n' Drafthouse in the Ann Arbor/Ypsilanti area.

"It's a new entertainment concept for Michigan," said Gary Smyth, who along with Jon Kim are managing partners of the new dining/drinking/movie-watching emporium.

Take some friends and saunter into Wayside's art deco theater/restaurant. Ease into comfortable, movable, swivel chairs at round cabaret-style tables. A waiter appears, takes your beverage — beer, wine or pop — order while you peruse the menu choices. The lights dim, but not too dark, and suddenly a popular movie begins, shown on a full-sized screen.

Michigan's first Wayside Cinema 'n' Drafthouse will open Nov. 1 in the old Wayside Cinema on Washtenaw Avenue. Its philosophy of combining movie-going with a comfortable dining and drinking experience is designed for professionals, 21-35 years of age.

"I'm originally from Washington, D.C., and I've been going to the Cinema 'n' Drafthouse ever since I was able to drink," Kim said. "It's inexpensive and a lot of fun. When I came to Michigan, I looked for some-

thing similar and found that it just didn't exist."

The original Cinema 'n' Drafthouse opened in Orlando, Fla., in 1975. Its immediate success prompted a franchise start-up a few years later. Today, 19 Cinema 'n' Drafthouse establishments exist throughout the southeast and southern United States.

Smyth and Kim came together in 1989 as partners, due to their enthusiasm about Wayside and a shared belief that Michigan would welcome and enjoy such an activity.

"When I was first exposed to the Cinema 'n' Drafthouse in Orlando, I thought to myself, 'This is the best way to see a movie that I've ever come across,'" Smyth said.

Movable tables and chairs allow friends and families to assemble themselves in any fashion and enjoy the experience of eating, drinking and movie as close together or as far apart as they desire.

"The theme is art deco," Smyth said. "A lot of glass block and neon in the lobby. Indirect lighting and Charlie Chaplin motif can be found inside the theater."

The movies are intermediate run, which means they are accessible to Wayside six to eight weeks after their first release.

Standard, state-of-the-art projection and sound equipment is used.

The screen is the size of those found in theaters. The 13,000-square-foot building houses two 200-seat theater/restaurants, with shared kitchen and lobby space.

The customer chooses one of two movies being shown at the Wayside. Each movie is shown twice each evening weekdays, with a midnight showing on weekends.

"On the weekends, between the late show and the midnight show, we offer a live, stand-up comedian in each theater," Smyth said. "They perform for 15 minutes each and then switch theaters and perform again."

And although the age minimum for the Drafthouse will be 21, there will be exceptions, Smyth said.

"We plan on running specials during the Christmas holidays, spring break and summers as well as special events for families, children and the elderly," he said.

Smyth and Kim estimate that customers spend about \$7.50 each at the Wayside. That includes the admission price — \$2 Sunday-Thursday and \$3 Friday-Saturday — with the balance food and beverage. "It's an inexpensive night out," Smyth said.

The menu consists of sandwiches, salads and desserts, along with a variety of drinks.

You'll find party platters filled with such foods as baby back ribs, spicy

chicken wings, potato skins and teriyaki chicken strips. There's also the usual nachos, tortilla chips and salsa, popcorn, veggie platters, hamburgers, clubs, subs and sandwiches, coney dogs and pizza.

For dessert, there's chocolate suicide cake, cheese cake, root beer float or hot fudge sundae.

Beer is served in chilled mugs or the pitcher. Wines, wine coolers and champagne can be ordered by the glass, carafe or bottle. Soft drinks come in regular and jumbo sizes, and there's also iced tea and coffee.

Walters and Waitresses walk among the tables throughout the evening, taking orders, serving food and quietly removing dishes.

"The service is what you would find at a casual restaurant, such as a Bennigan's and TGIF," Smyth said. "You don't need any special skill to go to the Wayside. You don't need any special attire. You don't need to make reservations. You don't need to spend a lot of money."

"Everyone knows how to eat, drink and dress casually. It's for everyone."

Smyth and Kim also plan on featuring special events, such as closed-circuit broadcasts of boxing matches, NBA games University of Michigan and Eastern Michigan University away games as well as evenings targeted for special groups.

New releases focus on Nazi holocaust

Everything runs in cycles and video-cycles are no exception. One such cycle — World War II films emphasizing individual, human suffering because of the Nazis — started Oct. 25 with Claude Chabrol's "The Blood of Others" (1984, color, not rated, 131 minutes).

"Murderers Among Us: the Simon Wiesenthal Story" (1990, color, no rating, 157 minutes) stars Ben Kingsley ("Ghandi") as Wiesenthal. It's due out Oct. 31, while Nov. 7 is the release date for "That Summer of White Roses" (1990, color, R, 98 minutes), starring Tom Conti, Susan George and Rod Steiger.

All three are above-average in scope, cast and direction when compared to most video productions.

Along with Francois Truffaut, Alain Renais and Jean-Luc Godard, Chabrol became internationally renowned three decades ago as a leader of the French New Wave. That movement was instrumental in turning motion pictures from large-screen studio epics to subjective, interior films now so widely prized.

That small band of rebels evolved new techniques necessitated by low-budgets and lack of studio background or training. Now, however, success has given them access to mainstream money and major personalities.

That's not to say that they have the clout of Eddie Murphy or Sylvester Stallone. When it came to the first film made from a Simone de Beauvoir novel in 1984, "The Blood of Others," Canadian co-producers John Kemeny and Denis Heroux ("Quest for Fire" and "Atlantic City") had to scramble to raise the \$7 million budget.

Their creative solution was an international one involving several scripts shot simultaneously but for different release dates in France, the United States and Canada. The video available Oct. 25 is the two-hour American theatrical release filmed in English. "The Blood of Others" was also produced in four- and six-hour versions and dubbed in French.

HBO screened the four-hour version in the fall of 1984 and the six-hour cut was designed as a miniseries. The cast reflects the interest of international backers with American actress Jodie Foster taking the lead as Helene Bertrand, a dress designer in Paris just before (1938) World War II. She is employed by Madame Gigi

(Stephane Audran), a real operator. A well-known French actress, Audran is the ex-wife of director Claude Chabrol.

Chabrol's father joined the French resistance shortly after the Germans entered Paris in 1940 and fought the Nazis throughout the war. Hence, the subject of "The Blood of Others" had a particular appeal for Chabrol.

Helene's boyfriend, Paul (Lambert Wilson), is involved with the Communist Party and its anti-Fascist activities. One of his comrades, Jean Blomart (Canadian actor Michael Ontkean), is attracted to Helene — and she to him.

The film's strong, contemporary theme depicts Jean as gaining stature and identity through his actions in the external world — here as a political figure fighting, first fascism in general, and then later the Nazis in particular.

Those actions define his character while Helene is identified solely by her relationship with the man she loves. Helene leaves Paul for Jean and, as time passes, the Nazis occupy France.

She performs remarkably heroic acts, but solely for the man she loves. Her activities have nothing to do with war or politics which she considers unimportant, irrelevant to life, love and personal relationships. Here is a naive position.

Ultimately, and quite ironically, she becomes a heroine of the Resistance for the wrong reason. She just wants to please her man. It's an interesting philosophical comment. "The Blood of Others" is an effective statement about these issues while avoiding typical war film melodrama and battle scenes.

The film concentrates on character development and the evolution of ideas. That's a particularly difficult thing to do in a film where actors largely perform actions to reflect emotions and attitudes.

With the exception of Foster who is too plump, brash and stereotypically American for the role, the cast performs realistically and effectively. "The Blood of Others" evolves slowly as character and situation develop. Once under way, however, the film builds considerable impact with exciting underground activities.

In the final analysis, "The Blood of Others" greatest appeal is its wonderful visual recreation of the World War II era. Such images and the courage of those who fought the Nazis will remain with you long after the final credits have faded from the screen.

'Memphis Belle' shot down by its cliches

There's a reason they don't make movies like they used to. Simply enough, the styles, values and popular cliches of the good old days have passed into history and have little or no meaning for contemporary audiences.

But whoever was responsible for "Memphis Belle" (D+, PG-13, 100 minutes) ignored that simple fact and turned out a World War II bomber film with enough cliches for a dozen old-time war movies.

Despite an authentic B-17 plane, the support of the Yankee Air Museum at Willow Run Airport and the impact of "based on a true story," "Memphis Belle" is trite by any standard.

Try this list of World War II film cliches:

The crew of the "Memphis Belle" has one more mission to complete their tour of duty. A public relations officer (John Lithgow) wants to make the most of this PR-photo opportunity. Of course, he's at odds with the tough commanding colonel (David Strathairn) who is concerned only with his men's well-being and the success of their mission.

The "Memphis Belle" has the obligatory diverse crew headed by a very straight Captain (Matthew Modine) — his family manufactured furniture. There's the dark, romantic type, Val (Billy Zane), who supposedly completed medical school before the war.

Naturally, there's a farm boy, a coward and a hot-shot — about the only missing cliché was the Jewish kid from Brooklyn, a World War II necessity when it was important to prove that all the population was united by their need to defeat the Axis

Powers.

Defeating any hope for this film, the acting ranged from stilted to wooden and the dialogue was no better — "We've done our job for Uncle Sam, now we're flying for ourselves."

Surprisingly, there was no U.S. War Bond appeal after the film so we all went over to the USO and had a few.

One helluva terrific pitchman sold Paramount the concept that "Welcome Home, Roxy Carmichael" (D-, PG-13, 95 minutes) was about "hope, celebrity and dreams" and would be an attractive film to teenagers searching for identity and grown-ups eager for satire of smalltown, middle America.

On the contrary, it's a generally humorless, tacky and boring series of stereotyped vignettes, revolving around the impact on Clyde, Ohio, when it's announced that the town's most famous prodigal, Roxy Carmichael, will return to dedicate the Roxy Carmichael School of Cosmetology and Drama.

Primarily, audiences are treated to the impact on the Denton Webb family (Jeff Daniels) and on Dinky Bossett (Winona Ryder).

Denton had been Roxy's boyfriend and they had had a child before she left Clyde. Roxy's scheduled return totally unhinges Denton which proves that he's as dippy as the movie.

Dinky is the town's current non-conformist. Nobody understands her except the new high school guidance counselor, Elizabeth Zaks (Laila Robins) — but she's got her own problems so how can a kid trust her?

As it turns out, Dinky is the essence of everything and she does

understand Ms. Zaks, even helps her re-discover herself. Dinky is not the great but misunderstood character intended. She's kind to animals and all that but mostly she's just going through adolescence with stupid parents, especially her mother.

"Welcome Home, Roxy Carmichael" is soapy melodrama at its worst — slow and boring, a dull story about uninteresting people who aren't worth the time of day. Don't waste your time.

"Mr. Destiny" (A-, PG-13, 102 minutes) is a sentimental but hip little movie which showcases a surprisingly charming James Belushi. His character, Larry Burrows, is a decent yet hapless fellow whose 35th birthday is haunted by the pivotal point in his life — Burrows made the last out in the state championship baseball game when he was 15 years old. Everybody in his small town remembers, especially Larry.

The Touchstone hand is evident in "Mr. Destiny." A fine supporting cast is led by Jon Lovitz and features strong performances by Linda Hamilton and Hart Bochner. This delightful, modern fairy tale is sprinkled with warmth and humor and manages to avoid the bland and predictable.

Michael Caine turns in another subtly restrained performance as Mike, the bartender, who changes Larry's life with a little concoction he calls "Split Milk." A few sips and Larry hits the game-winning homer thus changing his life dramatically.

"Mr. Destiny" is ultimately about a man whose journey leads him to discover that what he had is what he wanted all along, something most of want, but fail to believe. "Mr. Destiny"

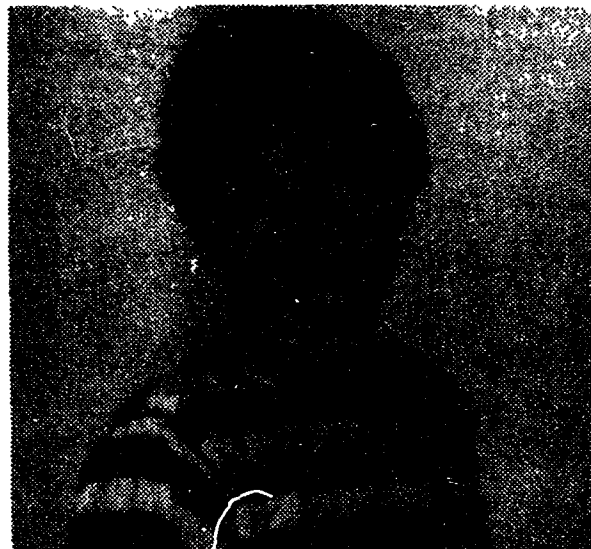
Everyone is invited to enjoy an evening with the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra. I would encourage especially those who have community television experience to consider working with the non-profit organization.

'thirtysomething' troupe used to yuppie criticisms

Show polarizes audiences

"Not again," said the stars of ABC's "thirtysomething," when producers Marshall Herskovitz and Ed Zwick asked them to appear at their last TV critics press conference.

Once again the troupe would have to face criticism that the show is "yuppie-ish," that the characters are agonizingly self-concerned, or just plain "whiny."

"You behave like you're the first generation who ever had a baby, or ever had to do a number of other things. In Shakespeare's phrase: 'Why all this muling and puking,' you know?" blasted one critic. Another suggested that perhaps the show was "much ado about nothing."

This was no revelation to "thirtysomething's" stars, Patricia Wettig, Timothy Busfield, Mel Harris, Ken Olin, Peter Horton, Polly Draper and Melanie Mayron. "We hear this all the time," said Horton. "Over and over. We hear it over and over. It's not a surprise at all," reiterated Wettig. Mayron joked that perhaps they could have a show of hands from the critics, and the ones who didn't like the show could beat it.

It probably would have been a split vote. People either seem to like

"thirtysomething" or they don't. The show targets female viewers ages 18-49 — and does a good job of it. Ad time for the hour-long program is consistently sold out. Additionally, "thirtysomething" was the first freshman drama ever to win an Emmy for Best Drama. During its four-year run, the drama has received a fair share of the industry's honors.

The big winner among the cast is Patricia Wettig who's captured two Best Actress Emmys. Her husband on the show, Timothy Busfield, has been nominated twice for Best Actor. Busfield had this to say in defense of the show:

"I thought, 'Gee, you know. I guess I should be maybe addressing more world rights or world peace or whatever it is.' And then I thought for a second. 'I think about myself most of the time . . . you know, does my wife love me, does my son, who lives half-way across the country, does he feel close to me? Am I doing a good job at work?'" Wettig has suggested that the in-depth writing makes "thirtysomething" what it is.

But some people don't care for in-depth self-examination. It's as if on the one hand you have the Lennon

fans — on the other, the McCartney crowd.

"It was never our intention to make a show that 200 million would embrace and take to their hearts," said Herskovitz candidly. I don't think that's necessary in order to do a television show."

The "thirtysomething" cast doesn't seem to think so either. The close-knit group seems to be having a lot of fun with the show, anyway. And "close-knit" is no understatement. In real-life Ken Olin is married to Patricia Wettig. (Mel Harris plays his wife.) Coincidentally, both Harris and Wettig are Pennsylvania natives. Wettig and Busfield both were one-time members of the prestigious Circle Repertory Company in New York. Additionally, Horton, Olin and Mayron each have begun directing "thirtysomething" episodes.

"We're trying to do a good show, and if people don't want to watch it, we would think that by now they'd be aware that there's two other networks, and they're both programming 24 hours a day," said Olin. Story lines for the drama's 1990-91 season include Gary's wedding, the birth of Hope and Michael's baby, and the continuation of Nancy's bout with cancer.
