New recreation field clearing to start soon

Tree-clearing will begin within the next two weeks on property destined to become the next Northville community recreation park.

Recreation Director John Anderson on Thursday said 39 acres of township-owned land on Beck Road will be cleared to develop the first phase of a community park.

The proposed community park is north of Scott Regional Correctional Facility on Beck between Five Mile and Six Mile roads. The property fronts 1,035 feet along Beck and juts more than 2,600 feet west at its deepest point.

Three soccer fields, two multi-purpose fields and a baseball diamond are scheduled for construction. Soccer fields — identified by the

recreation department and local youth sports organizers as the top facility priority — could be ready to be romped upon by spring, Anderson said.

"We'll try to get the whole thing leveled, graded and seeded and use it for soccer next year," he said. "We probably won't be able to use it for baseball until 1992."

Recreation user fees will pay for the proposed facility, Anderson said.

The first phase of field development was revised after the township planning commission detected flaws in a site plan proposal offered by township Manager Richard Henningsen.

Planners listed several problems with the site plan, including access road width, parking, and a proposed

Rice squeaks past Mustangs in final seconds

The Northville football squad affirmed its place among the state's elite programs, taking perennial powerhouse Birmingham Brother Rice to the final seconds before succumbing to a 14-7 defeat Saturday in Flint.

With 33 seconds left, Warriors' freshman Marcus Harvey reached paydirt from three yards out to break a 7-7 deadlock. His score capped a nine play 52 yard drive which took up most of the final three minutes of the Class A semifinal matchup.

Despite the loss, the Mustangs gained the respect of the entire Rice outfit. The two-time state champions are regulars in post-season play, while Northville was making its first trip to the playoffs in the school's history.

"It was a very good football game — hard hitting," said Warriors' Coach Al Fracassa. "Northville wasn't real big, but we have a lot of respect for their quickness. We knew coming in that they were a fine team."

Rice drew first blood in the contest, scoring on its second possession in the first quarter. Sean Johnson tallied for the Warriors with 4:35 left

in the quarter.

Northville bounced back with lightning quickness, using just five plays to set up Bill Kelley's 16-yard touchdown run on a reverse. Quarterback Ryan Huzjak, despite his respected arm, used his feet to key the 63-yard drive. He kept the ball for 31- and 16-yard gains in the series.

The defenses ruled the field for the next two quarters. The Mustangs' best scoring opportunity came in the third quarter as they tackled the Rice punter and snared the ball at the Warriors' 17.

The Rice defense delivered a sack on Huzjak to spoil the drive, and then blocked Brandon Hayes' 30-yard field-goal try.

Workhorse running back Jon Bertaw spearheaded the Warriors' offense. He racked up 168 yards on 40 carries to lead both teams.


The loss ends Northville's season at 8-4. Brother Rice now advances to the Class A finals at the Pontiac Silverdome where the Warriors will meet the winner of the Midland-Grandville contest played Saturday at Central Michigan University (after Record deadline).

Forum blasts useless studies

A western Wayne County teacher raised her hand to ask her congressman and a U.S. Department of Education administrator: "How does all that research out there apply to us in southeastern Michigan?"

Her question, asked in Livonia's Randolph Elementary School, echoed the words of a reading teacher in Ann Arbor's Abbott Elementary a day earlier: "I think grants are given to researchers on the basis of what they want to research, not what we need to know."

Listening and taking notes were U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, a senior member of the House appropriations subcommittee on education, and Christopher T. Cross, assistant secretary of education in charge of \$96 million in research grants.

A week after being elected to his eighth term in Congress, Pursell held forums with teachers in Jackson, Ann Arbor and Lansing to test several ideas on the nation's growing education budget:

■ The findings take 10 years to "trickle down" to classroom teachers.

■ Much research on education is done in think tanks with a "Washington Beltway/University of Michigan mentality" and is less than useful to classroom teachers. In the words of James (Doc) Doyle, HomeTown Newspapers columnist and Pursell consultant: "A lot of educational research is a bunch of crap."

■ The money might better go to state departments of education or regional teachers' colleges like Eastern Michigan.

■ Classroom teachers themselves

Teachers flunk lab test

U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell said he won lunch in a bet with Chris Cross, assistant secretary of education. Cross said he won a second bet.

The two are at odds over the usefulness of federal educational research grants.

"We have a federal (education) lab that serves Michigan. How many of you know where it is?" Pursell asked educators from Plymouth-Canton, Northville and Livonia.

need to be actively involved in research projects. "We need more collaborative research," said a Livonia master teacher.

■ Teachers need help dealing with new social problems — kids from broken homes, parents from Asian and other cultures, the continuing "achievement gap" between black and white students.

Pursell said two national problems prompted what will be a two-year project: First, the \$1.3 trillion federal budget is next to be \$300 billion in the red next year, and cuts are needed. Education gets \$27 billion, all research \$96 million, education research \$50 million.

Second, in a global economy where Japanese and Taiwanese companies are gaining dominance, American kids are falling drastically behind in such critical areas as math by fifth grade.

No hands went up — except for Livonia Superintendent Joe Martelli.

Answer: The Midwest Educational Research Lab in Elmhurst, Ill. — a \$200 million-a-year lab serving seven states. It's one of nine regional labs in the country.

Cross claimed his victory when he asked teachers whether they knew about certain research and innovations. Many said yes.

"You're using the product coming from it, but you don't know where it's coming from," said Cross.

"Our assistant superintendent is excellent in pulling research," said a Northville teacher — a distinct minority. Most teachers complained they didn't know what was being done and had little time for in-service training.

"Here we are, talking on all the social problems of the world," said a teacher in the Livonia forum. "The divorce rate is sky-high. They (kids) are left at home alone."

"Years ago we used to see only one or two (with emotional problems), now we see a lot."

Other teachers' comments: "We need more information on what's available to us" — an Ann Arbor teacher.

Pursell's reply: "At U-M, 400 researchers are getting National Institute of Health grants."

Teacher's comment: "They're there, and we're here."

"A lot of research is good because it tells us to keep on with what we're doing or to ditch it . . . Sometimes we don't give the federal government credit" — a reading teacher. She cited a federal finding that says girls have as many problems as boys, confounding the conventional wisdom that boys have the majority of reading problems.

"It takes 10 years for research to get to the practical level" — Ann Arbor teacher.

Pursell's comment: "We can't afford 10 years."

"We don't know what's going on around the country" in improving blacks' performances.

Cross' reply: "We're making progress. Among blacks the high school graduation rate is 81 percent; among whites, 84 percent."

Teacher's response: "We're not closing the gap. Where do we go to find out what other districts are doing?"

"There's no time to plan" — a western Wayne teacher.

"You have three months every year" — a Jackson County superintendent.

Cross, as an administrator, often is at odds with Pursell, a former classroom teacher in Taylor and Livonia in the 1960s.

Cross said laws and the bidding process require many educational research grants to go to universities.

"I've put emphasis on the dissemination. We have that on the boards — get the information into the hands of teachers," Cross said, citing the addition of a journal from U.S. News & World Report to his staff.

It's never too early to start reading to baby

We just had our first baby. We know it is important to read to your child. However, we don't know how soon we should start reading to the baby. What do you suggest?

As soon as possible! At birth the baby howls — its first communication. Therefore, prior to reading, you should continually communicate in a gentle voice with your baby at its earliest age.

You see, recent research found that by the 10th week babies can not only recognize their own mother's voice but can literally sense or smell their own mother's presence in the room.

Jim Trelease stated in his "Read-Aloud (To Your Child) Handbook" that children are programmed from birth with an immediate need to communicate.

Studies constantly find that if early language interchanges are not fostered between six months and two years, intellectual curiosity will most likely not be present at age five.

What do I mean? Babies first use one word, i.e. "Bottle" for "I want my bottle," or "Up" for "Mom or dad, please pick me up." The parental response should be something like, "Oh, you want your bottle" or "Let me pick you up" . . . a full sentence to nurture language development.

When should you start reading to your child? As soon as the child can sit in your lap. Why?

The emotional bonding that is nurtured between the parent and the child is as critical to the process as teaching the child a love of reading. This belief, although a bit Freudian, is one I personally believe.

As a specific example, have the child bring their favorite teddy bear to you and just happen to have a book on "bears" available. An immediate interest will be generated. Have the child point to the bear in the story.

Say, "bear."

Let the child turn the pages, learning left to right as an initial experience for the left to right eye movement needed for successful readers.

Be aware of the child's body language. When the child pushes the book away from you or bangs on it, go to something else. Please don't force the child to be a Shakespearean scholar by age four. The whole concept is to make reading enjoyable, a natural phase of life.

As the child grows, solicit thoughts. Have the child articulate parts of a story they have become familiar with. And remember, some very active children initially can't sit still for long periods of time. They are into motor skill development and it may take this type of child longer to "settle in" to reading.

But all children will settle into reading if the "reading aloud to your child" experience is perceived as a warm, safe and natural part of life. It won't be long before the child will bring the books to you.

Reading aloud to your child is one of the most important gifts you can give the child. Please let it be natural . . . don't be the drill sergeant parent who wants Johnny reading by the second grade level in kindergarten.

I can assure you those children who learned to love reading, who can pick out the main character, sequences, activities and draw conclusions will catch up and past robot reader children trained to regurgitate information.

Walled Lake finally has a winner

Walled Lake Schools Superintendent James R. Geisler, reaching a landmark in his 22-year career in education, has been named Michigan Superintendent of the Year.

Geisler, 46, learned Nov. 12 that he had earned the top honor bestowed by the Michigan Association of School Administrators.

His reaction? "Disbelief, really," he said Tuesday. "It's real nice."

News of Geisler's award spread quickly through the Walled Lake Consolidated School District.

"That's just great," said Al Kaczowski, a parent who worked on a committee that developed a long-term strategic plan for the district. Geisler initiated that project.

"He wants to see a strong future unfold for the district," Kaczowski said. "He believes that by working together we can have the best district in America, literally."

in America, literally."

Geisler, nominated by school board president Esther McInnis, beat out four other highly respected superintendents to win the prestigious award. They were Francis Higgins of the L'Anse Creuse District in Macomb County, Robert Hagerty of Ionia Public Schools, Randall Neelis of the Menominee School District and Donald Shubuski of Ingham Intermediate Schools.

Serving as judges were representatives from such diverse groups as the Michigan Education Association, the Michigan Parent-Teacher Association and the state Board of Education, among others.

Geisler will receive a plaque during MASA's midwinter conference in January in Dearborn. He also will become a finalist for a national award given by the American Association of School Administrators.

During his two years in Walled Lake, Geisler has led successful campaigns for a \$47.8 million bond issue for new construction and a Headlee Amendment override that let the district's school taxes outpace inflation.

Geisler also has improved community relations and united a school board that had split into opposing factions under former Superintendent Don Sheldon.

"Dr. Geisler is a very strong leader, and he's very person-oriented," said Margaret Guzzio, an Oakland Technical Center teacher who has taught in the Walled Lake district for 19 years. "He takes a lot of input from a lot of people, and I think he really listens to people. He respects their opinions."

"He's a very positive person," Guzzio added, "and I have a great deal of respect for the man."

School board secretary Joel Sil-

berblatt said that Geisler "works very well with the board and the community, and I think everybody around has seen that. I personally am totally pleased for him, and I'm pleased that the district will get the recognition. It's another shot to bring the district into where we should be."

Geisler said the Walled Lake district "has the kind of environment that allows you to do your best."

School board members hired Geisler in July 1988. Prior to that, he served as assistant superintendent of Royal Oak Schools, principal in North Muskegon and assistant principal in Chicago, where he launched his career as a teacher.

The Walled Lake district serves 9,583 students in the townships of West Bloomfield, Commerce, White Lake and Waverline Lake, and the cities of Farmington Hills, Novi, Orchard Lake, Walled Lake and Wixom.

Students learn court is supremely important

For one day last week, the Novi High School auditorium became the scene for real courtroom drama. Judge Brian MacKenzie of the 52nd District Court, Division 1, brought a courtroom setting to students last Wednesday (Nov. 14) as part of a continuing educational program with school districts in the court's jurisdiction.

"The program is set up to educate the students about the courts and to show them what a district court judge does," said MacKenzie. "They will be in a better position to understand what we do when it's time for them to get out and vote for a district judge."

Novi was the last stop on the program's tour this year, which included South Lyon, Milford and Walled Lake Western high schools. This is the second year of the "Court Day" program with the high schools.

According to Diane King, a business law teacher at the high school, students had the chance to watch the proceedings of a real day in the life of the court. She said every student had the option of attending the sessions, which covered the majority of the school day.

"It's a great opportunity for the students," King said. "It's probably



the only exposure that many of them have had to the court."

The docket for the day included cases from simple assault and driving on a suspended license to operating a motor vehicle while under the

influence of liquor.

"It's was a realistic cross-section of the court's docket," said MacKenzie.

The docket was arranged to show a mixture of cases that are heard in the court each day, he said. MacKenzie

added that he got authorization from all the parties involved in the cases before putting them on the court day schedule.

Perhaps the most interesting case that students heard was that of Ed-

ward Ray Rock Jr. of Highland. He was scheduled for pre-trial at the court, but, after his lawyer arranged a plea-bargain agreement, was sentenced by MacKenzie.

Rock was to be charged with a second offense of operating a moving vehicle while under the influence of liquor, driving on a suspended license and driving with expired plates and registration. The plea-bargain agreement, however, allowed him to make a plea of guilty on the first charge in exchange for the other two being dismissed.

As a result, Rock received a year in the Oakland County Jail, two years of probation, a \$570 fine and suspended license, among others, for the offense. MacKenzie warned Rock of ever having such charges brought against him again.

"Alcohol is a drug," he told Rock. "You're an American and I suppose you have a right to kill yourself any way you want. But, you can't take anybody with you."

"If I see you again in my courtroom," MacKenzie continued, "you better be prepared to spend the maximum amount of time in jail."

Students were surprised by the severity of some of the punishments against the law breakers.

"It's very real," said Amy Burrows,

a student in King's law class. "It's different to see that (drunk driving) is being punished and how harshly."

Brian Molloy, 17, agreed with Burrows that the penalties for some of the crimes were stiff. He added that the court was much different than what he has seen on television. Molloy, who had a chance to observe last year's court day session, said other students seemed to follow what was going on better.

"The kids are asking better questions," he said.

At the end of each session, MacKenzie took questions from students. One student asked the judge why some people that are convicted of crimes receive work releases and others don't.

MacKenzie replied that it was "a balance of factors." He said when considering work release he must take into account such things as: not punishing an entire family for the actions of one, the family's financial dependence on that person, or the offender's potential to learn a skill or be rehabilitated.

"With some individuals there is no point of assigning work release," MacKenzie told the students. "I have to remove them (from society) as long as I can. It's depressing to give that sentence."

Changes planned at police station

Northville Township police are willing to do almost anything — including tearing down walls — in an attempt to increase public accessibility.

The police department has received the go-ahead from the township board to knock out a wall and construct a more open dispatch center at township hall.

The current dispatch area is housed inside police department offices between the township hall meeting room and township administration offices. Dispatchers are shielded from the public by an acrylic sheath.

Those requesting information from police literally must raise their voice and speak through the glass barrier.

The facelift is an attempt to humanize the department, Police Chief Chip Snider said.

"It's deplorable to have to shout through (a glass window) to the public," he said.

Snider's plan includes the removal of the brick wall which fronts the dispatch area. He intends to move the dispatching area out five feet into the

township hall lobby in a circular pattern to provide better public access.

The project will "improve the efficiency... and increase the aesthetic value of the police facility which is constantly viewed by the general public," he said.

Snider said impending changes in the dispatching area have created some concerns among dispatchers who now "feel secure in there."

An open-air dispatching center potentially could leave employees vulnerable to attack or threat of harm, especially during evening or early morning hours when township hall is otherwise unoccupied.

But the new facility would include a door that dispatchers could retreat into and lock if threatened, Snider said.

Snider estimated dispatch area renovation would cost \$14,700. The board agreed to expend that amount if necessary, but directed Snider to get at least three project bids.

The township is now entertaining construction offers, township Manager Richard Henningsen said.

"We're in the process of getting bids," he said. "We're trying to get this done in this calendar year."

Health model discussion set

maintenance building. The commission eventually granted the fields preliminary approval, pending compliance with its objections.

Henningsen last week said the proposed site had been redesigned. According to the new plan, a multi-purpose field — a baseball field that could be transformed into a soccer field during appropriate seasons — will front the northern portion of the park on Beck Road. A second multi-purpose field and a baseball field are stacked directly west.

Three soccer fields are to be constructed south of the three northern fields. An access road will separate the soccer fields from the multi-purpose fields, Henningsen said.

The township had hoped a developer interested in an Eight Mile/Haggerty Road property would receive state Department of Natural Resources approval to reconstruct a wetlands area on a portion of the Beck Road site. The developer had offered to pay for recreational development of the park if the plan materialized.

The mitigation was not approved.

and dwindling recreation space — recently deemed "critical" by Henningsen — forced the recreation department to play its hand.

Northville's booming population and increased youth attraction to soccer have helped cause "a tremendous shortage in soccer fields," according to organizers.

Henningsen said initial development of a Beck Road park is a no-frills undertaking at this time, but he said stop-gap recreation measures are a better solution than no step at all.

"The main point is trying to get in the three soccer fields," he said.

The Building Official shall issue said permit with an expiration thirty (30) days from the date of approval by the applicable commission, or thirty (30) days from the date of issuance if commission approval is not required.

Juke box is sound investment for nostalgia buffs

When the neon lights are shining and the mirrored ball is turning in Ed Blain's showroom, you may think you've stepped into jukebox heaven. A nickel or a dime is all you need to fire up Glenn Miller or The Supremes.

But walking away with a jukebox for your own home requires a bit more capital.

Blain, Detroit's king of jukeboxes, has been tracking down, restoring and selling vintage jukeboxes for 20 years. He began his career in a Pontiac flea market and now works exclusively out of several storefronts on Gratiot Avenue near Six Mile in Detroit.

Over the years, he has restored close to 2,000 jukeboxes, servicing restaurants, homes and even customers as far away as Berlin, Germany. According to Blain, more than half of his sales are to people in Oakland County suburbs like Rochester, Birmingham and the Bloomfields.

"My wife and I went to this place looking for an inexpensive newer model machine," said Gus Doerfler, a paper sales manager

from Rochester. "But then we saw this and knew we had to have it."

A metallic clank echoes at the bottom of the coin box of his circa 1950 Rockola Rocket, setting into motion one of 25 record selections, visibly spinning through a window in the front.

The centerpiece of Doerfler's basement rec room, it is surrounded by a black-and-white tile floor, a soda counter and pictures of Elvis and James Dean.

For him, the jukebox recalls his childhood.

"We used to go to a pizza place about as big as this room and, of course, it had a jukebox," he said.

A similar sense of nostalgia got Blain into the business.

"When I was a teenager, my mother had this restaurant with a big wooden jukebox in it," he recalled. "I wanted to find one just like it. By the time I had found it about eight years ago, and just a mile away from here, I already

had hundreds of machines."

With his slick black hair and gravelly, tough-guy voice, Blain, 65, is a perfect complement to the machines he sells. He estimates that he has 800 machines in his 18,000 square feet of storefront and warehouse space.

Pointing to one of 50 machines that line his paneled showroom, Blain conducts a brief history of jukebox styling.

"The value of a machine doesn't depend on how old it is," he said, explaining why the '30s models, similar in design to an old radio cabinet, can be obtained for considerably less than the neon and chrome gems from the 1940s and early '50s.

Perhaps the best known of these is the Wurlitzer 1015 of 1946. The crowning achievement of famed designer Paul Fuller, this bullet-shaped steeple of wood houses glass colored by green, blue and red flashing neon. An electrically operated bubble device runs up tubes along the sides.

Jazz guitarist Earl Klugh bought one for his home in Bloomfield Township and stocked it with 78 rpm recordings of Count Basie, Duke Ellington and other jazz greats.

"There's something intangible about the sound," he said. "It's certainly more fun than playing your stereo. As a musician, I appreciate that unique, bassy sound."

Perhaps the last great jukebox design was 1961's AMI Continental, a futuristic bubble-topped model with aquamarine accents. Hotel manager Bill Kirkhuff has one in his Art Deco-style basement in Birmingham. He's got it filled with everything from Patsy Kline's "Crazy" to the Pet Shop Boys' "Opportunities."

"I originally bought it as an investment, but it's grown into something more," he said. Unlike earlier models, the '60s and '70s machines no longer allowed the player to see the record selections spinning.

"The companies thought the public was

too sophisticated to be enthralled by a piece of mechanism," Blain said. "Actually, it was just a cockamamie excuse for building cheaper machines."

Now, with the price of a vintage jukebox rivaling that of a new car (a clean Wurlitzer 1015 sells for about \$13,000), customers are looking to the newer, less expensive alternatives. A model from the '60s or '70s can be obtained (including delivery) for around \$500.

Christmas is an especially busy season for Blain. Last year he was making deliveries at 11 o'clock on Christmas Eve. He remembers one clever customer who hid a jukebox behind a paneled wall in his basement. When it came time to open gifts, he simply removed a bit of paneling and revealed his surprise.

The dimly lit back rooms of Blain's operation are overflowing with machines, some completely stripped for parts. Others wait for a finishing touch to make them operational again.

Jukebox history started in 1930s

With a swift smack, The Fonx could make the Seeburg Model C jukebox in Arnold's start to play in the television show *Happy Days*. Tunes like "Blueberry Hill" and "Rock Around the Clock" would fill the hamburger joint.

The crackling sounds of 45s playing on the jukebox have become a thing of the past. Today, jukeboxes filled with compact discs give the customer a choice up to 1,200 tunes rather than the 100 The Fonx had to select from.

But at one time, vinyls were the mainstay of smoke-filled roadhouses, sock hops and malt shops.

The first modern era jukebox was built in 1934, but the music machine's popularity didn't take off until 1950-60. In its heyday, 50,000 jukeboxes were manufactured annually and there were 500,000 in distribution.

The "granddaddy" of jukebox manufacturers is Wurlitzer, which dominated the jukebox industry through the 1940s. Wurlitzer manufactured classic jukeboxes, including its highly prized 1015.

But even though the 1015 was a classic, it had a few drawbacks. It played clumsy 78 rpm records and its selection was limited to 24.

In 1951, Seeburg introduced 45 rpm records. They were smaller than their cousins, the 78s, and cheaper to manufacture. They also spawned Seeburg's Model A jukebox, designed to play 100 selections.

The Seeburg Model A soon rendered the Wurlitzer jukebox obsolete and within a short time gave rise to the B and C models.

Jukeboxes were the mainstay of coin-operated businesses until video games came along. Between 1972 and 1982, the demand was for video games as opposed to jukeboxes.

Today, jukeboxes are becoming collector's items. It's estimated that there are 20,000 private collectors in the United States.

And for collectors, the cost depends on the jukebox being bought. When it was first made, the classic Wurlitzer 1015 cost between \$700-800. A few years ago, one in mint condition had a value of \$15,000 to \$20,000.

Villas are step up for Livonia

Even with the economic climate slipping into the doldrums, there are still some people willing to take aggressive financial risks.

The partners in the Villas, a Livonia condominium community unveiled last Tuesday, are just such people. Angelo D'Orazio and Tony Carnacchi, along with Northville natives Earl and Steve LaFave of Beck Development in Wixom presented the luxury development in a ribbon-cutting attended by many Livonia and area dignitaries.

That The Villas contains so many firsts for Livonia represents a substantial gamble for the principal partners.

"It's an uncertain time, but we feel strongly that it's going to be a successful community," said Earl LaFave. "We feel there's a large void in the Livonia market for a large, upscale, detached condominium development."

The Villas is located south of Eight Mile Road just east of I-275. Homes in the Villas feature three different models, ranging in price from \$199,500 to \$235,900. Every home is completely detached, which is a first in Livonia. This building method which has proven extremely popular in the Bloomfield-Birmingham area, and was most recently tried in Novi at the Briarwood condominiums.

"We found that there are a lot of empty-nesters here in Livonia," said LaFave. "But they have strong ties in the community and don't necessarily want to relocate to another area."

People looking to move up to the Villas will be first impressed with the visual appeal of the community.

"Two considerations were of the utmost importance in developing these homes," said LaFave. "One, the style should be European with a Mediterranean blend of brick and cedar. Two, there should be at least one amenity that is not only accessible to all residents, but also allows them

the opportunity to interact with one another. This was accomplished through the central waterscape — complete with lighted fountains, cascading waterfalls and an adjacent walking course."

The 42-unit community is built on a gently sloping piece of property, and it is that slope which makes the waterscape — the first built in Michigan — possible. Water rises out of a fountain at the far western end of the property, then trickles and cascades 500 feet downhill to the eastern end, meeting another fountain at the entrance to the community.

LaFave also proudly points out, "Many luxury options, usually termed as 'extras' by other developers, will be standard at The Villas."

Some of the amenities include a natural log-burning fireplace with marble or ceramic tile hearth, central air conditioning, solid oak cabinetry, insulated double pane wood-frame windows, first-floor laundry, full basement, two-car attached garage with openers, electronic cooktop grill and range, dishwasher, built-in self-cleaning double oven with microwave, covered custom cedar deck and many other features too numerous to list.

Most importantly, there is an emphasis on large, open interior spaces. There is extensive use of windows and glass, and the plans allow for long diagonal views throughout.

The elegance of The Villas was underscored at Tuesday's grand opening. Livonia Mayor Robert Bennett, planning commissioners, council members and more than 300 invited guests will preview each Villa model. They were entertained by strolling violinists, and champagne, wine and a selection of hot and cold hors d'oeuvres was served throughout the evening.

Is it a risky time to develop such an elegant and innovative community in Livonia? LaFave would rather think of it as a carefully calculated risk.

"We're proud to be a part of the Livonia community," said LaFave.

"And we know that our buyers will appreciate the time and research that went into developing these exciting condominiums."

With investment observers saying now is the time to buy a home, Beck Development's risk could be a Livonia homebuyers gain.

Consider liabilities of security choice

Our association is considering getting a master key instead of a key lock box. What do you think?

With the increase in the amount of liability the association is incurring with respect to security, it is my recommendation that the association not have a master key for all the units but have a visual key lock box whereby there are individual keys for individual units.

If the master key is lost, you have placed all the units in jeopardy, whereas an individual loss of a key results only in changing the locks on that particular unit.

Of course, you will want to investigate the question of whether the association wants to retain access to any units under any circumstances, particularly if they have the right to gain access to the unit in case of an emergency in the condominium documents.

I also recommend that the co-owners have deadbolts to enhance security.

I am planning to develop a condominium near a golf course. Are there any suggestions that you would have with respect to this undertaking, particularly to this setting that I am describing?

I would also be concerned about the drainage of the condominium as a physical matter in connection with the golf course waters, although I presume that your site engineer has looked into this matter thoroughly.

Drainage is one of the largest causes of construction defect legislation in a condominium project both in Michigan and around the country.

Our condominium is large enough to consider hiring an in-house security guard. Do you have any recommendations?

In comparing in-house security guards to the alternatives, including outside guard services, it is my recommendation that you hire outside security and that you pay a sufficient wage to get top quality personnel.

Believe it or not, some security guards are paid as little as \$6 or \$7 an hour. I am told by people in the industry this makes it extremely difficult for them to hire a trained person.

The reason that you want to get an outside guard service is that it would be independently insured and have direct supervisory control over its personnel.

Therefore in the event of a lapse in security or an "inside" job, you will have recourse against the outside security company.

The item that was recently discussed at the community associations institute seminar was a failure on the part of the developer to disclose the statement, which, in your case, would include the fact that there is a possibility of errant golf balls on the condominium premises.

Some courts have held that associations are responsible for dangerous conditions being established because of the proximity of the condominium to the golf course.

Veggies get taste of Southwest

Ventured into any trendy restaurants lately? One glance at the menu is all it takes to notice the influence the Southwest is having on our cuisine.

A few weeks back, dinner at Chimayo, Chef Brian Polcyn's new quasi-Tex-Mex spot in downtown Pontiac, turned up Chamo peppers stuffed with three cheeses. Last week, lunch at Chef Ed Janos' upscale Too Chez found another South-of-the-Border stuffed pepper sitting atop a bed of angel hair pasta.

Many of our local eateries are packing up the old steamed and sauteed vegetable routine and replacing what used to be fodder for folks without teeth, with a mixture of roasted vegetables. Grilled green onion strips, shards of carrots, slices of eggplant intermingled with an assortment of green, yellow, red, sweet, tangy, spicy and downright incendiary peppers are the latest food trend to hit the metropolitan area.

Sure, the chefs in these kitchens have \$4,000 char-grills. You can easily duplicate char-grilled conditions at home with a \$1,500 Jenn Air or \$3,500 Gaggenau grill, but what about the folks like you and me with a \$299 Harvest Gold Tappan?

There are some tricks left over from my Halloween bag of goodies. For starters, anyone can use a backyard grill to duplicate trendy grilled vegetables. Gas grills are more convenient, and at a recent visit to a discount store, I found a small propane grill discounted from \$30 all the way down to \$13.99. Resisting the urge to upgrade the Janes Gang's debt-ridden Visa card, I remembered the old Farberware grill borrowed many moons ago from Momma's fruit cellar. This electric version of the in-home grill produced stunning results.

But not to be outdone with electrics, propane and barbecues, I remembered a visit with international cooking guru Julia Child a few years back and her use of a portable propane torch to singe meringue on a baked Alaska dessert. This interesting device, long relegated to a basement or garage workshop, can do wonders for blistering the skins on many of the trendy peppers and vegetables available at any good upscale produce market.

With the simple flick of a Bic lighter, any basic baked or sauteed vegetable can be brushed with a simple Italian dressing and then torched to a glaze with remarkable results. Better yet, propane torches can be picked up for under \$10 at any hardware or building supply shop.

Imagine what flavors can be intermingled into a basic chili by gouging a jalapeno pepper on the tip of a fork and then blistering the skin with the torch. Drop the pepper into a small bag, wrap and allow the skin to steam off, then perform a fine chop and, Voila!, instant flavor. Ditto for green peppers and their flavorful sweet counterparts, the red pepper.

Yours truly likes to slice eggplant about 1/4-inch thick, place on a greased cookie sheet, brush lightly with a bottled Italian dressing, bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes and finish with a subtle glaze of the torch to a delicious golden patina. This will have your vegetable lovers shouting for more. The same procedure can be followed with parboiled carrot slices, plain green onions and fresh mushrooms.

Last week, the torch was used on basic sliced tomatoes topped with chopped basil and a sprinkling of Parmesan. The possibilities for using a torch in the kitchen are endless.

If you are sick and tired of basic old humdrum veggies, find a grill or torch and get roastin'.

1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon finely chopped shallot OR onion
1 tablespoon olive oil
Dash EACH of salt and pepper
4 cups lettuce, torn into pieces
1 cup sliced fennel (1/4 inch-thick slices)
1 medium pink OR red grapefruit (about 1 pound), peeled and sectioned

Over a small bowl remove pith and membrane from one half of pomegranate. Separate seeds from membrane and set aside.

In a small bowl using a hand juicer, squeeze juice

(scant 1/4 cup) from remaining half of pomegranate. Add lemon juice, shallot, oil, salt, and pepper and whisk to combine.

To serve, line serving platter with lettuce and decoratively arrange fennel slices and grapefruit sections. Top with dressing and sprinkle with pomegranate seeds. Makes four servings.

MAPLE-PUMPKIN PIE

1 refrigerated ready-to-bake nine-inch pie crust
2 cups canned pumpkin

2 tablespoons granulated sugar
1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
1/2 cup thawed frozen dairy whipped topping
Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Fit pie crust dough in nine-inch pie plate and press edges of dough up sides of plate, flute edges, removing excess dough. Set pie plate aside.

Form excess dough into a ball. Between two sheets of wax paper roll dough, forming a 10-inch circle, about 1/8 inch thick. Using a sharp knife or cookie cutter, cut out eight cookies. Place cookies on non-stick cookie sheet and bake, in the middle of center oven rack, for four to five minutes. Remove to wire rack and cool.

While cookies are baking, prepare filling. In medium mixing bowl combine pumpkin, yogurt, egg substitute, syrup, sugar and pumpkin pie spice and stir until thoroughly blended. Spread pumpkin mixture evenly in pie crust and bake, in middle of center oven rack, for 35 to 40 minutes (until a knife, inserted in the center, comes out dry). Remove to wire rack to cool. Serve at room temperature or cover and refrigerate until ready to serve.

To serve, top each portion with an equal amount of whipped topping and one cookie. Makes eight servings.

Nouveau is in stores for holiday

Beaujolais Nouveau is released for sale in France the third Thursday in November. It is always the first wine to be consumed following the fall harvest.

Some say it is barely wine, but in France there is always great celebration upon its release and the excitement has spread to the United States.

This year, the Beaujolais Nouveau release date was Nov. 15. At midnight in Paris, bistros, brasseries and restaurants along the Champs Elysees are crowded with patrons anxious to be among the first to taste the "nouveau" Beaujolais. Yellow and orange stickers in the windows announce, "Le Beaujolais Nouveau est arrive."

Several local distributors will be at Detroit Metropolitan Airport to receive their air-freighted shipments. These same people will then work long hours to ensure that the local wine shops have their share of nouveau wine.

The price of Beaujolais Nouveau will be more expensive this year, according to Ed Jonna, owner of the Merchant of Vino in Birmingham. "French Nouveau will cost from \$7.50 to \$9. However California nouveau wines will be about \$5-\$6 per bottle," he said. "Even the French realize the problem and are producing a less expensive Vin Nouveau, but it won't say Beaujolais on the bottle." Discussions with local distributors lead us to believe that air-freighted Beaujolais Nouveau may cost as much as \$11 per bottle.

Wines shipped by sea, available a week to 10 days later, will cost less than \$10.

The Merchant of Vino stayed open until midnight Wednesday to welcome the nouveau wines from France and California. "All stores in Birmingham will be open until 9 p.m.," Jonna said. "Customers can enter a drawing to win a trip for two to France. We will also feature a 30-percent-off wine sale where we encourage customers to come in to make their best deal."

Beaujolais Nouveau is a light, purplish-red, fruity wine, only a few weeks past the fermentation period. Often it still has slight spritz indicating the fresh petulance of youth. The wine is meant to be consumed young and slightly chilled so that all its grapey character can be enjoyed. Its quality is an indication of the greatness of the Beaujolais harvest that year. It previews the more elegant Beaujolais from that vintage to be released in the spring.

The Beaujolais wine region is the most southern portion of Burgundy. Today, 6,000 estates and 200 shippers sell 100,000,000 bottles of this wine. Twenty years ago, Beaujolais was not considered a serious wine in America and the hype of Beaujolais Nouveau was considered a Parisian fad until the late 1970s.

Unlike Burgundy, which produces its red wines from the pinot noir variety, Beaujolais wines are principally the product of the gamay grape. A modification of the carbonic maceration technique is used for fermentation. With this method, the grapes are not crushed. Whole bunches are fermented. The result is a wine of extraordinary fruitiness.

If you have not yet sampled a light red wine with poultry, then we suggest a Beaujolais Nouveau to accompany Thanksgiving turkey.

Thanksgiving celebrated

They want to "postpone" Christmas in Plymouth

"Let's put it off until the first weekend in December," suggested downtown businessman Fred Hill. What Hill wants to delay is the Christmas display and advertising push that usually explodes just after Thanksgiving. Instead, he wants to keep a more timely emphasis on Thanksgiving.

After proposing the idea for "A Plymouth Thanksgiving" in late September, Hill has gained community support, including \$3,000 from the city commission.

The event is scheduled for Friday and Saturday.

Emphasis on a Thanksgiving celebration in Plymouth would be a reaction to the modern over-celebration of Christmas, Hill said.

"It's too early to celebrate Christmas (in October)," he said.

By mid-October, the malls that compete with downtown Plymouth for business have already erected Christmas displays.

"Let's just slow down, and celebrate a great American holiday, Thanksgiving."

The event would be a good way to promote downtown businesses, by contrasting Plymouth's style with that of the malls, he said.

A highlight of the celebration is a reenactment of the first Thanksgiving in

Kellogg Park on Friday — complete with residents, business people and even actors dressed as pilgrims and Indians.

Also on Friday, a 10-minute non-denominational service is scheduled for 1 p.m. in the park to commemorate Thanksgiving "and take a moment to recognize our troops overseas," Hill said.

As part of the celebration, folks dressed as pilgrims are to pass out flyers at intersections promoting the event, and "bespeaking 1620," Hill said — using "thee" and "thou."

Irish crystals help put sparkle in Christmas

TO CONNOISSEURS, elegant lead crystal means Ireland, where mouth-blown, full-lead pieces have been made for centuries.

Irish crystal does come dear, but a relatively young Irish company, Tipperary Crystal, offers a line that equals the quality of the famous Waterford but sells for about 30 percent less.

According to Bernadette Ryan, who owns the Grafton Shoppe in New York City and the Irish Shoppe in Block Island, R.I., the crystal is one of the best selling lines at these two Irish crafts stores.

"My customers buy it for special occasions, especially for weddings and anniversaries," she said.

It also is much more readily available than Waterford. Many of the pieces are engraved, either with initials or with dedications for special events, "a nice alternative to silver," she said.

Tipperary might be considered a lineal descendent of Waterford, since it's run by a group of former Waterford craftsmen who formed the new company in the wake of Waterford's restructuring two years ago.

A leader of the group, Joseph Foley, was a 24-year Waterford veteran who took advantage of a restructuring buyout option and found a backing partner to start the company.

THE GROUP makes crystal the traditional way by mouth-blowing, then hand-cutting each individual piece. The lead content is 33 percent, which gives the crystal strength, durability and imparts a slight bluish color. Cutting serves the same function as faceting in gems, adding sparkle and iridescence.

Traditional suites, or patterns, are named after landmarks near the company's cottage factory in Ballynoran, County Tipperary: "Carrick," after the historic village; "Slievenamon," named for the legendary mountain; and "Dovehill," a Norman castle once commanded by Connet O'Moore, a 14th-century Irish chieftain.

One of the most attractive ways to display crystal is to mix patterns, Ryan said. "Use it every day. It's meant to be enjoyed."

The combination of quality and price (a water goblet will sell for about \$40, a wine glass for \$33) has made it popular with Americans, who make up much of its market, according to the company. American sales have helped the company nearly quadruple its staff.

The crystal, imported through Kraftware/Morgan in New York, is sold at Irish and other specialty shops around the country as well as through the P.J. Carroll catalog: 1-800-255-3933.

Where every day is Christmas Day

Can't get enough of Christmas?

Would your kids like to live with Santa? Could you decorate with holly all year round?

There are places where the spirit of the season never ends—real towns where the calendar always reads December 25th. And there's no need to head for the North Pole. These communities are right here in the Great Lakes states, just a few minutes off the Interstate.

Santa Claus, Indiana

For nearly 135 years now, it's been Christmas every day in this small southern Indiana hamlet. Visitors numbering in the hundreds of thousands pack this community each December to take part in the holiday celebration.

Appropriately, it was a child who provided the inspiration for naming this community.

Late in the year 1852, so the story goes, residents of the area were haggling over the selection of a town name. For awhile it seemed that "Wyllenbach," the surname of the circuit-riding reverend, would gain approval.

Then on Christmas Eve, the congregation gathered at the church for yet another meeting when the sound of bells was heard outside. "Santa!", a jubilant child cried. "It's Santa Claus!"

That's it!", shouted one of the elders. "Why not call it Santa Claus?" The residents agreed, and the town of Santa Claus was born.

The town's 1000 residents now host an annual Festival of Lights, set this year for Dec. 8-9. Visitors will be treated to millions of colored Christmas lights festooning houses, trees, lawns and nearby Christmas Lake.

Neighborhood committees erect elaborate outdoor displays themed upon the street names where they live. Melody Lane, for instance, will create Santa's Workshop, where colorful dolls and marching soldiers come to life.

The public is invited to tour Santa Claus from 4:30-9:30 p.m. (CST) on Dec. 8-9. Motorists will receive a map of the 15-mile festival route, which can be covered in about two hours.

Santa Claus, Indiana is located 10 miles south of Interstate 64 via either Exit 57 or Exit 63. Call 812-937-2551 for more information.

Holly, Michigan

The benevolent spirit of Charles Dickens walks the streets of Holly each holiday season. And why not? He'd feel right at home among the town's Victorian buildings bedecked with green garlands, red bows and twinkling white lights.

Christmas Carol characters come alive under the lights of majestic old street lamps for 12 full days before Christmas, presenting vignettes from Dickens' holiday masterpiece.

Scrooge, Bob Cratchit, Tiny Tim, The Christmas Ghosts and Old Marley will weave stories through music and song.

The Holly Festival Carolers keep spirits cheerful as they stroll about town, raising their voices in the spirit of the season. Costumed merchants welcome shoppers to their decorated

stores which hearken back to a time when Christmas wasn't so rushed.

Many cut-your-own Christmas tree farms are nearby. After a wagon ride to the woods in search of the perfect pine, revelers are invited to Holly for the holiday festivities.

Christmas, Michigan

This town may well be Santa's first rest stop after leaving home. It's a few hundred yards inland from Lake Superior, four miles west of Munising on M-28.

Residents believe the community was named by a wooden toy manufacturer who hoped to capitalize on the notoriety. The factory failed years ago but 300 or so hearty snow lovers still call Christmas home for the holidays, and every other day for that matter.

Christmas shares a zip code with Munising but issues its own post mark during the holiday season. Be sure to request the special post mark when forwarding cards and packages.

Fantasy fairyland: Holiday exhibition transforms Krasl

St. Joseph, Michigan—

Visitors to the Krasl Art Center's holiday exhibition, *The World of Fantasy*, will find a veritable fairyland awaiting them in the main gallery and salon now through Jan. 6.

Paintings of elfin creatures peering from fantasy foliage by French artist Claude Schuch will be on exhibition in the salon. There will be a series of "carrot" prints by Michigan artist David Bigelow, showing the interesting and adventurous life of the common carrot, and several illusory paintings by Tarboro, North Carolina artist Susan Fecho, whose works incorporate various media including calligraph, monoprint, pastel and collage.

Mary Ellen McNaughton of Grand Rapids has created a spectacular hand-built glazed ceramic sculpture expressly for the Krasl's fantasy exhibition.

The art works have been installed in fanciful settings by the Krasl volunteer elves and carpenters who add so much to each year's holiday exhibition.

Holiday exhibition hours are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Thursday and Saturday; 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Friday; and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday.







Alpena's 'Old Town' puts on a new face for shopping season

Alpena, Michigan—

Customers, intrigued by the attractively restored building on Alpena's north side, may enter hesitantly the first time - not knowing what to expect from a gift shop located almost next door to a Salvation Army Thrift Store.

Once inside, they note a benevolent six-foot-tall cinnamon colored teddy bear gazing benignly down from his high perch at an artful array of goods. Displays of Lenox china, Avanti stuffed animals, David Winter cottages, Royal Doulton figurines, and Mikasa crystal are set amid polished old wood, scrubbed brick and tin ceilings - with an ambiance not often found in an industrial city which resisted change for too many years.

The Display Case gift shop was an almost-derelect building slated for demolition ten years ago when John and Connie Van Schoick saw its potential despite years of accumulated grime. They purchased the former Morley's Bicycle Factory and rolled up their sleeves.

Scraping, stripping paint, and refinishing the fine old wood beneath the front doors of the double building yielded results and sparked interest from passers-by who often stopped to chat, mistaking Connie or John for workers hired to do the dirty work. Many, while applauding the couple's efforts, wondered why anyone wanted to tackle such an ambitious project. Actually, few realized the scope of the final plan, for the Van Schoicks hoped not only to restore the building, but the whole neighborhood!

Where others saw a two-block area slightly down at the heels, the young business owners envisioned antique street lighting, brick sidewalks punctuated by trees and flowerbeds, and an atmosphere reminiscent of the 1800s.

Downtown Northville was an inspiration to them, says John, and the couple knew that with Alpena's rich lumbering days heritage, something as interesting and exciting could happen here.

John's attention to detail and Connie's art training are evident at mid-point. While both are Alpena natives, their vision was expanded by what other cities accomplished with the aid of grant funds, the support of the Michigan Department of Commerce and a personal vision of

the finished project.


With recent improvements at the city's harbor, a new plan to link the downtown areas to the marina and park is encouraging to the Van Schoicks. While most of the Display Case's summertime customers are tourists and boaters, this is the first time a concerted effort has been made to link the areas together. Old Town Alpena is located north of the Second Avenue bridge that spans the Thunder Bay River.

The Van Schoicks credit Duanne Swift, former executive director of the Alpena Area Chamber of Commerce, and Steven Fletcher, prominent businessman and former mayor, for encouraging and supporting their efforts. Grant funds are on the horizon now, after years of hopes and sometimes, frustration. "If it wasn't for our customers' support and words of encouragement, we wouldn't still be here," says Connie Van Schoick.

One of those customers was Kelly Fletcher, Steve's wife.

"Kelly showed up one day while I was outside stripping paint, and was interested in our plans from the first," Connie adds.

The couple bought the building in

1980 and opened half the first floor in 1982, with trophies and a few gift items. They continued to restore the other side of the main floor, installing a tin ceiling purchased from an old building in Posen, refitting wainscoting from the same source, wallpapering some of the 11-foot-high walls, and refinishing the maple floor.

"It was six times harder than we thought it would be," says Connie.

After opening the full downstairs and stocking unique gifts, customers found their way to Old Town. In 1982, gladdened by the response, the Van Schoicks purchased a building next door to house holiday gifts and decorations. Around the World opened for the 1986 Christmas season and is a browser's paradise, especially before Christmas. Ornaments from Germany, Austria, and from around the world sparkle on Connie's decorated trees. Mouth-blown glass baubles peek from garlands and dried flowers are tucked into boughs. Display cases feature Snow Babies, Duncan Royale santas, Dickens' Heritage Village, Memories of Yesterday and, of course, teddy bears by Raikes and Avanti.

Both stores are open from 10 a.m.

to 5:30 p.m. daily, and from noon to 5 p.m. Sundays. During the holiday shopping season, they extend hours to 8 p.m. daily but retain Sunday's 5 p.m. closing. Located at 428 North Second Street, the telephone number is 517-356-2758.

With the city and state targeting \$358,000 in financing for Old Town's redevelopment, the Van Schoicks will continue their restoration work with approximately \$60,000 in loans.

"One frosty night in Lau's old saloon...." begins an old-time ditty, referring to one of the 22 saloons which were in a several block-long area of Alpena's old downtown in the 1800s. It was the John A. Lau Saloon, situated in a third building which the Van Schoicks recently purchased, near their two stores.

They plan to restore the building to its former state -- dating to the 1880s. "Already, people are donating antiques and logging tools for us to use," says Connie. "The logging era antiques will help us preserve a remnant of the past for our diners, as we'll have a restaurant serving alcoholic and non-alcoholic drinks," she adds.

A four-sided clock was recently placed in a park across the street from The Display Case. Avery Park is a pocket park now sporting new antique-styled street lights along its Second Avenue side, and new paving should be installed in spring 1991, says John Van Schoick.

The north side of The Display Case features the remnants of a years-ago sign featuring 2 percent interest for the National Bank. It fits right into the newly appreciated theme of the Old Town area.

"We'll preserve that," says John.

Other interesting shops are now locating in Old Town. Lasting Expressions at 525 N. Second Avenue features dried and fresh flower arrangements - both attractively displayed and presented. Owner Mary Lou Smigelski relates a recent order came from Germany. Visitors had seen an ad for the flower shop and telephoned a request.

"Here we are," says Mary Lou. "A lot of people right here in town don't know about us, but they do in Germany!"

Artis Books at 410 North Second deals in used and rare volumes and is next door to Thunder Bay Theater, northeastern Michigan's only resident, year-round live theater.

The welcome mat is out in Alpena these days - and nowhere is it more evident than in Old Town. It's proof that vision and hard work can pay off - even after years of frustration for two people who hate to hear "no."

Dorothy Webster, a former newspaper and magazine publisher, is an artist/photographer living in Northern Michigan. She frequents out of way spots researching lighthouses and old general stores to paint and photograph. Her Native American heritage adds another dimension to her interest.







through November and December.







Diverse ski attractions will lure more visitors to Michigan slopes

Beginning skiers can learn the ropes, as well as the hills and trails, in Michigan this winter, while experienced skiers will find activities and facilities to match their skill levels.

Many of Michigan's gentler hills are well-suited to beginners. And Michigan resorts range from plush to rustic, with hills from 100 to well over 600 feet high.

A score or more of the state's 44 winter resorts offer family rates and activities, so learning how to enjoy the season needn't cost—or break—an arm and a leg. In fact, on "Learn to Downhill Ski Free Day," Jan. 18, first-time skiers can take advantage of free beginner lessons and free beginner-area lift tickets at participating ski areas.

Downhill and cross-country skiers aged 55 and over can ski for free and lodge for less at participating resorts during Silver Streak Week, Jan. 26-Feb. 1. (Call 1-800-5432-YES for more information on "Learn to Downhill Ski Free Day" and Silver Streak Week.)

Michigan offers cross-country skiers more than 1500 kilometers of trails. Skiers can find well-groomed trails at resorts that also provide lessons and rental equipment, explore the trails of state and local parks, or break their own trails in state or national forests.

For those who can't quite put summer to rest, snowboarding, the cold-weather cousin of skateboarding, is offered at more than 30 Michigan resorts. This hybrid that combines elements of downhill skiing, surfing, and skateboarding has hit the downhill resorts like an avalanche. Many offer lessons and equipment rental and provide special "half-pipe" stunt surfaces for the "shredders," as they are called.

"This season, more ski area dollars are going into improvements and auxiliary additions such as lodging, cafeterias and apres-ski attractions than in hill improvements," reports AAA Michigan Club Services Director Peter Erickson.

Additionally this year, many ski areas offer season passes, special weekday rates, and half-day or hourly tickets, along with discount days and night skiing. Bargain hunters often find the most economical ski packages at the start and end of the season, Erickson says.

More than half of the state's downhill resorts offer incentives to help the family budget: kids ski and stay free; low-cost day care and children's programs and senior citizen discounts.

travel dollar has also become a high priority for ski operators in the '90s" Erickson says. "On most Michigan slopes, a day of skiing is comparable in cost to dinner and a movie."

While a family of four spends an average of \$500 for a weekend ski trip, it is possible to ski a couple of hours for as little as \$3, if you're close to home, he added.

For the cross-country skiing enthusiasts, trails passes vary from free to \$8. And the welcome mat is out with nearly three-quarters of the downhill facilities offering groomed and marked trails.

Despite 13 fewer ski areas than a

decade ago, the number and length of Michigan downhill runs have increased. AAA Michigan's ski guide lists 44 ski areas, fees, number of runs and lifts, and special offerings.



Tip-Up Town rates with best wintertime fests

Houghton Lake, Michigan—

Tip-Up Town, USA is nothing less than a Michigan winter tradition: two weekends of parades, fishing contests, games (including softball on the ice) dinner dances and prizes.

As many as 50,000 visitors from as far away as California are expected for this year's event, set for Jan. 19-20 and Jan. 26-27. What started as a simple fishing contest has now expanded to include sky divers, hot air balloons and a torchlight trip around the lake on snowmobiles. It's no wonder that Tip-Up Town is now acclaimed as one of the 10 top winter events in the nation.

Tip-Up Town has come a long way since 1951, when Bob Sweet and Bob Carman, two Houghton Lake businessmen, conceived the idea of creating a little fun on the ice to relieve the long winter months and boost off-season tourism.

A nationwide contest to rename this "Winter Festival," as it was called then, drew more than 500 entries. The contest judges chose Tip-Up Town, USA after ice fishermen's use of a red flag attached to a line which tips up whenever a fish strikes the baited hook.

The ceremonial Mayors, Marshalls, Queens and Political Parties have always been a part of the community-wide participation. Many of the political candidates that have run for office of Mayor or Marshall have been accused of everything from chicken thievery to wife stealing. The campaigning of the candidates take on all the trappings and flamboyance of a major political convention, complete with speeches, bands, parades and crazy costumes.

Section 3 of the Tip-Up Town by-laws clearly states that the purpose of the village on ice is to promote bigger lies, hilarity, tom foolery and good will.

The annual Kick-Off Program is held two weeks prior to the festival at which time the candidates for Mayor and Marshall complete their exhibitions and campaigning for the highly-coveted offices. Good fellowship abounds at this event, with more than 2000 people in attendance. The Mayor and Marshall for the coming year are elected at this time.

Throughout the years, the framework of activities has remained fairly consistent with the opening being the Grand Parade, with 50 or more floats followed by the flag raising ceremony on the ice. Various prizes and trophies are given for the best floats and for many other events that are offered for the amazement and amusement of the entire family.

Ice sculpturing, cavorting clowns, games, contests and many other activities have become a tradition of fun at Tip-Up Town. In recent years, exhibitions of sky diving and acrobatics have been crowd pleasers. Aside from fishing contests for northern pike, walleye and bluegill, snowmobile drag racing, helicopter rides and other features have been added each year to make a bigger and better festival.

The second weekend of activities was added in 1977 and is aimed at family participation. Among the events are a snowmobile treasure hunt, cross-country skiing and motorcycle races on the ice.

Grand prizes of snowmobiles, plus valuable second and third prizes, are given away on both Sundays of the event. More than 200 other prizes are awarded throughout the two weekends.



Grand spot for an attic cleaning sale

A few of my friends will be getting choice souvenirs of Mackinac Island this Christmas. No not the island's famous fudge, but mementoes from the island landmark, Grand Hotel.

Early on the morning of Sept. 1 my husband and I were on an Arnold Line Catamaran bound for the island

and the Grand's Attic Cleaning Sale.

By pure happenstance, I had seen an ad in *The Mackinac Island Town Crier* the first week of that month announcing the sale.

The thought of obtaining items from the elegant 103-year old Grand, billed as the world's largest summer hotel, was incentive to be up before dawn at our East Tawas cottage. We were on our way to the island at 6 a.m., hopefully, to acquire some of the advertised pieces--china wall sconces, assorted silver, glassware and more. Items, the ad said, "we no longer need."

There was no way a purchaser could lose, either, because it also promised: "Make a purchase of \$5.00 or more and receive free guest pass for the day to Grand Hotel and 50% off our Grand Luncheon Buffet."

Because only guests staying at the hotel may roam the premises without paying a \$5 visitor charge and because the Grand Luncheon Buffet normally is \$20, a \$10 purchase realized a saving of \$30 for two persons.

The breathtaking view from the Grand's magnificent porch is one of my most treasured memories from previous visits to the island. It was not

the least disappointing this time as we rested in the comfortable rockers admiring the brilliant red geraniums that overflowed the flower boxes and watching a freighter glide under the Mackinac Bridge that links the state's two peninsulas.

We realized on the trip to the island that area residents were well aware of the sale. While planned as a two-day event, most of the sale items were gobbled up in the first minutes of the sale. We arrived about 15 minutes after it began.

There was no sign announcing the sale in the lobby when we alighted


from our island taxi, but a uniformed employee was there to point the way to the hotel's Heritage Hall where the sale was held. The crowd was so dense it was almost impossible to see what was available.





A boater's wish list

In case you want Santa to bring you a new boat this holiday season, here's our wrap-up on design trends we've spotted in covering the boating scene. And for those who can't afford to give their favorite boater a new yacht--or even a rowboat--here's a few

sources of new nautical items and toys for the boat owner who has everything.

Motorboats are continuing the population explosion that is making sailboats a displaced minority in many marinas. Hoping to counteract the trend, sailboat manufacturers are introducing vessels that are easier to handle. They are also adding more creature comforts and livable space.

Meanwhile, motorboat makers also are stressing roominess and comfort. "People are using their boats more and they want to utilize every square inch," says Jerry Riedel, manager of Brennan Marine, St. Clair Shores, Michigan. "Many people use their boats more as a movable replacement for a cottage up north. They spend weekends on them, so livability becomes more important."

We looked around a \$115,000 Carver 33 aft cabin model available at Brennan's. With a 13'3" beam, it replaces a 32-footer with an 13'6" beam. The new model adds more space for a dining area. We saw it at Boat Show, USA, the in-the-water event, at Metropolitan Beach last September.

We could live happily for the duration aboard any of the show's big cruisers. Like the one we toured with Fred Wagner of Gregory Boats, Mt. Clemens. He pointed out the floating luxuries aboard a 3850 aft cabin model by Cruisers, Inc. of Oconto, Wisconsin.

He began with the wet bar and icemaker on the aft deck, then showed us the stowaway cabinet for the central vacuum system, the combination washer-dryer unit, trash compactor, entertainment center with TV, VCR, stereo and tape deck. On to the two handsomely furnished staterooms with cedar closets, private heads and showers.

The length overall of the model we toured, with integrated swim platform and bow pulpit, is 41'6". Beam is 14 feet. Cost is \$199,500. The icemaker is extra.

To shed light on its elegant ambiance, the 3850 had large windows on three sides, reflecting the trend toward more expansive use of glass.

Every manufacturer seems to be coming out with handsome, curvaceous and racy models. There's a trend toward adding padded areas on the decks, for the girls in bikinis.

Among smaller boats, we liked the bracket at the stern of the Pursuit 2550 Cuddy Cabin model by S2 boats of Holland, Michigan. Most manufacturers of fishing vessels have made the brackets available in recent years. With its two Yamaha 150 engines mounted on a wide stern bracket a few inches above the water line, the Pursuit 2550 gives fisherpeople more space and better maneuverability in the cockpit. It also keeps noise down, and lets the boat get up on a plane faster, trimming it out better for more fuel efficiency, according to Jim Frahm of Lands' End

Marina, Mt. Clemens. The 2550 model we saw sells for \$45,748.

The new models from Sea Ray Boats, Inc., Knoxville, Tennessee, include a 250 Weekender. Its cozy V-berth area below deck also contains a molded fiberglass galley, an enclosed stand-up head with portable toilet and optional shower, and 5'10" of headroom.

A good example of how much living can be packed into 27'5" is the Chris-Craft 25 Sports Express. We were impressed with the roomy cabin below deck, with a galley, head, fore-peak and amidships double berths.

Sea Ray came up with a unique cockpit design for its new 370 Sun Sport. The striking circular seating area behind the helm holds eight people and a wet bar.

New from Four Winns, of Cadillac, Michigan, in its express cruiser line, is its 30'6" 325, its first inboard cruiser. It features twin 270 HP V-drives and 17" props. Except for the power, the 325 is almost identical to the slightly speedier Four Winns 315. The two-person drive station is attractive and functional.

In sailboats, impressive cruisers small enough to trail are appearing. They have most of the basic cruising amenities and are easily handled by a minimum of two people.

Some of these vessels have water ballast systems, a concept that may have arrived. The idea here is to open a valve to allow water to fill a special tank located as far down in the hull as possible, to increase the boat's stiffness. When the boat is up on its trailer, the water can be drained out for lightweight trailing.

An example is Marine Concepts' Sea Pearl 28. It can accommodate two people in reasonable comfort, with room for two guests. It has a 400-pound stud keel and is designed to carry 800 additional pounds of water ballast. It's rigged as a "cat-ketch" (what used to be called a double cat; Allan's father sailed a similar rig on Saginaw Bay, 80 years ago.) It consists of two unstayed masts of equal length, each carrying a self-tacking mainsail but no foresails. The Sea Pearl draws 18 inches with the centerboard and rudder up. It has a sailaway price of \$28,000.

A less expensive water ballast boat is the MacGregor 26, which has been around for several years. Much more conventional in rig and appearance than the Sea Pearl, this 26-foot sloop can take in 1200 pounds of water for ballast. It has an enclosed head and bunks for six (but barely room to seat six in the cockpit, one of Allan's pet peeves). With trailer and sails, the MacGregor 26 sells for about \$11,000.

Larger family cruisers of the sailing variety are also featured, particularly in the 30- to 40-foot range. Three that interested us were built in Florida.

The Com-Pac 33 was designed by Charlie Morgan and built by the





Hutchins Company of Clearwater with a special keel that limits draft to four feet. Yet it somehow manages in its 34' length to contain three cabins, each with a double berth, and 6'8" of headroom in the main saloon. It also has a microwave, a TV, a hamper for dirty clothes in the head, and 10 bronze opening ports around the cabin, all unusual features in today's yachts. Base price: \$89,995.

The Vision 36 by Hunter Marine of Alachua has an easily handled rig consisting of a free-standing, unstayed mast with full-batten mainsail and a relatively small jib. There is plenty of space below including a roomy stateroom aft with a double berth. Its price, including sails, is \$69,900.

Cabo Rico Yachts, Inc. of Fort Lauderdale, now has a Pilot version of its 38-footer with a raised saloon and an interior steering station. Two- and three-stateroom versions are available. Base price without sails: \$186,000. Probably the most mouth-watering of all the sailboats we saw is what Beneteau of France calls a performance cruiser.

It's the latest in the Beneteau First series, the 45f5. It was designed by the Italian Pininfarina, auto designer who created the Ferrari Testarossa, and New Zealander Jamie Farr, inventor of the New Zealand Hull, winner of the America's Cup in New Zealand. It's 45 feet of sailing beauty and luxury. You can get it with two cabins, or three or four, all for \$215,000 or thereabouts--what's an extra thousand or two, more or less. Our advice is not to go aboard it unless you are sure you have the winning lottery ticket.

Among the smaller sailboats, the Hobie Cat people have introduced an intriguing two-man double-huller. Christened the Hobie Sport Cat 17, it is sloop-rigged with a boomless mainsail. It incorporates Hobie's high and dry detachable seating wing. It's faster than the ever-popular Hobie 16 and, at \$6400, costs less than the Hobie 18.

An interesting new daysailing monohull is the Quickstep 14, by Quickstep Boats of Bristol, Rhode Island. A sturdily-built centerboarder with kick-up rudder and built-in flotation for safety, it should be a fast fun-boat for racing, or just to sail. With sails it costs \$3,995.

Another is Shumway Yachts' Ideal 18, an updated version of the Bullseye, a racing keelboat designed by Nathaniel Hereshoff back in 1934. This fiberglass reincarnation of the old classic has a self-bailing cockpit, full-battened main and a self-tacking jib. It retails for \$11,800, including sails and trailer.

All of the changes and additions reflect your demands. "You have to keep coming out with new innovative products to keep up with consumers," says one boat salesman. "It's just like the auto business."

In the gift department, you can get a catalog full of ideas by joining Boat/U.S., Alexandria, Virginia. You can phone them at 1-703-461-2866. They'll send their Fall 1990 "Boating Equipment Reports" showing items featured at their Marine Centers. It contains the toll-free number for ordering any of their huge collection of boat clothing, flags and pennants, boating watches and nautical accessories.

Another catalog of temptations for boaters is "Nautical Interiors," filled with attractive home and boat accessories. You can order the 1990 holiday catalog of this Ware, Massachusetts firm by calling 1-800-222-9141, seven days a week, 24 hours a day.

Handsome but pricey gold and silver pins, brooches, necklaces and other jewelry for the nautically inclined is pictured in the catalog by A.G.A. Correa, Wiscasset, Maine. Call 1-800-341-0788 for a copy.

Favorite small town preserves the past

Grabill, Indiana—

Out of the way doesn't have to mean out of sight. Just ask the 700 or so residents of Grabill, who often see their town double and triple in size from the rush of shoppers.

No U.S. highway runs through Grabill. The closest state road skirts by the community three miles to the west. But that hasn't prevented Grabill from being named the area's favorite small town in a newspaper survey. And it's fast becoming one of the Midwest's best places to breathe fresh county air and relive "the good old days."

Nestled in the midst of a large settlement of Old Order Amish, Grabill preserves the past with a selection of businesses that include an antique mall, craft shops, art galleries—even a turn-of-the-century general store.

Chris Gerig serves up cinnamon/orange tea and a dose of humor to shoppers strolling through Sauder's General Store. "We don't sell one single thing that a person absolutely has to have," she says. "That's why it's such a fun store."

You may not need it, but it's hard to pass up the opportunity to take home a bag of J.R.'s Amish Country Potato Chips and a pound or two of hard candy that Chris scoops right out of the glass container. Sauder's General Store also sells *The Budget*, the weekly Amish newspaper and a great read.

The Old Lumberyard Shops are an assortment of craft and gift shops—all with a decidedly country flair. Thirty or so Grabill crafts persons have formed the Creative Hands Co-op and offer their creations for sale in what was once the lumberyard storage area.

Co-op members specialize in wooden miniatures, perfect for doll houses and shadow boxes. There's something soothing about losing yourself in this scale-model world. "Buyers bury themselves in here for hours," co-op member Lillian Maurice says.

Shoppers seeking something a little more sophisticated will find limited edition prints by the likes of P. Buckley Moss and Steve Polomchak at the Prints of Peace Gallery. Housed in a refurbished hatchery building, this gallery "caters to the upscale buyer," says proprietor Vanetta Eastes.

She also provides custom framing and creative matting to complement the image, services which have drawn clients from Michigan and Ohio as well as Indiana.

When visiting Prints of Peace Gallery, be sure to peruse N.A. Noel's charming posters portraying the Amish way of life.

And what's a trip to Amish country without a stop at an antique shop? The Country Shops of Grabill offer up the best from 50 dealers spread through 30,000 square feet of floor space in a century-old structure.

Magnificent obsession: Couple refurbishes 21-room mansion

Battle Creek, Michigan—

Whoever coined the term "sweat equity" must have had Tom and Kathy VanDaff in mind.

The husband-and-wife team spent two back-breaking years transforming a decrepit structure slated for demolition into an opulent bed and breakfast.

That's 24 months without a day off, 730 days without a vacation, 8 or 10 or 12 hours every day spent ripping, pounding, sanding and painting—on top of their day jobs!

The payoff: Greencrest Manor, the object of the VanDaffs' magnificent obsession, looks like a setting for "The Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous." This 21-room mansion is surely the place where Robin Leach would stay when visiting Battle Creek.

"Owning this home is like the American dream come true," Tom says. "You can accomplish anything if you work hard enough."

Greencrest Manor was built in 1935-36 as a private home for George R. Burt, one of Battle Creek's most prominent citizens. The site, overlooking St. Mary's Lake, was the favorite picnic spot of Burt and his wife Nellie.

In the course of purchasing the property, Burt passed away. His widow fulfilled their dream by completing the structure in the authentic French-Normandy style and surrounding it with extensive formal gardens.

In the early 1960s, the estate was purchased by the Catholic Church and for nearly 20 years it was used as a seminary. The estate was then sold, and the subsequent series of owners allowed the home and grounds to fall into near ruin.

Enter the VanDaffs, who purchased the property in 1987. Working from the original blue prints and interior designs, Tom and Kathy removed up to 18 coats of paint and replaced over 400 panes of glass to restore the home to its former glory.

Greencrest Manor guests are greeted in the central oval hallway with its marble terrazzo floor and winding staircase leading to the

upstairs guest rooms. To the east is the formal drawing room (easily mistaken for a ballroom) and an apartment-sized porch. Other first floor highlights include a luxurious pecan paneled library, 18- by 27-foot main dining room and a kitchen large enough to feed the entire Saudi royal family.

The 12 guest rooms on the second and third level are decorated in what Kathy describes as an "eclectic mixture of French and English, with lots of chintz and heavy on the decorative accents." The VIP Suite has a whirlpool bath. All rooms feature private baths.

Besides overnight guests, Greencrest Manor is available for receptions, weddings and catered banquets. The spacious rooms and formal gardens can accommodate up to 300 persons for special events.

Several fine cross-country ski trails are located nearby and the manor's 10 1/2 acres of landscaped grounds are also suitable for winter activities. Two 18-hole golf courses are within five minutes drive and offer weekend packages with reduced rates for Greencrest Manor guests.





Lakefront B&B nestled in cross-country ski paradise

Oscoda, Michigan—

Coffee, crepes and a glimpse of a Great Lakes freighter—that's regular morning fare at the Huron House bed and breakfast.

Guests can sip their hot java and survey the passing lake scene from the Huron House breakfast room. And in warm weather, raised decks right on the beach provide a shady, open air breakfast setting.

The morning menu whipped up by Martie Lorenz varies daily and might well include Belgian waffles or quiche. Fresh flowers grace the breakfast table and complement the B & B's country decor.

Martie and her husband Denny have converted a former lake front resort structure into a seven guest room B & B. The rooms are large, 18' X 20' is typical, and all feature private bath, air conditioning and TV.

Antiques purchased at local estate sales have replaced the generic motel-style furnishings included in the purchase of the property. Martie makes the grape vine wreaths and dried flower arrangements that provide decorative accents in the guest rooms.

The opening of the Huron House this past April represents something of a homecoming for the couple. Both are area natives whose professional careers (he's a former government auditor, she a former computer software engineer) took them to Grand Rapids for employment, if something less than contentment.

"We were both tired of the 8-to-5, living for the weekend lifestyle," Denny says. "So we opted for something new and different."

The extensive renovation work has proven challenging for Denny, who says his previous carpentry experience consisted of home do-it-yourself projects. One of the next additions planned is a wood stove in the breakfast room to warm the toes of cross-country skiers.

The Huron House is near the hub of 130 miles of cross-country trails in the Huron National Forest. Many of the trails overlook the AuSable River, one of Michigan most scenic waterways, and most trails are groomed.





A three-mile jaunt north along the sandy beach brings Huron House guests to Oscoda, where the AuSable meets Lake Huron. Oscoda highlights include the Lumberman's Monument, a nine-foot bronze statue, and the Canoe Monument, dedicated to paddlers who challenge the AuSable in the annual canoe marathon.

Wildlife enthusiasts and photographers will enjoy eagle nestings along the river and Iargo Springs, 200 feet of steps leading down to the AuSable and providing an outstanding view of bubbling waters. The waters off Oscoda and Tawas Bay just to the south are hot beds for charter fishing activity.



The geranium motif that echoes the flowers seen everywhere on the grounds also is used in the striking carpet of the lobby.

That the geranium bottles of shampoo were sold for a fraction of the \$9 price listed in the gift shop was explained by the Grand's president, R. D. Musser: "... the geranium bottles of shampoo do not winter well. The cold weather affects their color and because of that we were trying to reduce our stock as far as possible."

The Grand's president also said that the Attic Sale was advertized in

the classified sections of more than 100 Michigan newspapers.

He said this was the second year the Grand had held the sale and anticipated doing so again, noting, "but it depends on our surplus or non-surplus of items."

Towels and bath mats sold well. At \$4 each, a stack of bath mats was gleefully purchased by a young man in line ahead of me. He said he knew exactly who would appreciate them. The white mats did have the Grand Hotel name woven into the center.

President Musser's explanation of the reason they were included in the

sale tells a lot about how the Grand maintains its reputation of elegance:

"The bath mats were in fact new. They were not the quality which we desired. They were thin, did not have the pretty border around it and the Grand Hotel was not done as well as previous suppliers."

The Grand glasses with the red logo of the surrey were the first to be sold. Because we noticed similar glasses still being used in the Grand dining room at lunch, we questioned why.

Musser explained that the glasses still are used in the dining room for

breakfast and luncheon.

"We used them throughout the building as our water glass, but we have gone to what we feel is a finer glass for dinner and other outlets. Because of this we had a greater number of the old type and that is why we were trying to sell them," he said.

Snowshoe manufacturer weathers initial storms

Shingleton, Michigan—

A late October gale blew hard off Lake Superior, kicking up the first snow flurries of the season and triggering a big smile on my host's face.

"Nice weather, isn't it," she laughed.

Nice weather, indeed, if you enjoy winter's bluster...or if you happen to be the owner and president of one of only two wooden snowshoe factories in the United States.

And that's precisely what Anita Hulse is—a former nurse turned businesswoman in one of the country's most unique industries.

She runs the Iverson Snowshoe Company of Shingleton, just down the road a piece from the Pictured Rocks in Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

Recipient recently of the U.P.'s "Product of the Year" award, the company was founded in 1955 by Clarence Iverson who started making snowshoes in his garage as a hobby. As his shoes grew in popularity, Iverson gradually added a series of "tack-on" buildings to his garage to enlarge his operation. But soon after it became profitable, he sold the business.

Meanwhile, the current owner—four years after graduating from the Toledo Hospital School of Nursing in 1960—married Dr. Robert C. Hulse. He was a general practitioner in Munising where he had "lots of patients but few who could afford to pay."

So despite a love affair with Northern Michigan, Dr. Hulse bid good-bye to the U.P. and took a position with the Atomic Energy Commission in Las Vegas.

Subsequently, he established a private practice there. Although Dr. Hulse's Nevada practice flourished and he and his family enjoyed their Las Vegas home, he missed the beauty and serenity of the U.P.

Thus, upon retiring in 1986, he was anxious to return "to the land of trees and water." His wife shared that desire. They dreamed that they might find a business opportunity in which their sons, Clark and Casey, could become active.

By then Iverson's business had been sold twice. The Hulses learned about the business, looked it over, and concluded it would be a "perfect extension" of their love of nature. So with little knowledge about snowshoes and even less about making them, they bought the business and returned to Michigan with high hopes. They quickly learned that making snowshoes is a labor-intensive business and went to work rebuilding the company plagued by competing snowshoes entering the country from Canada.

"The shoes from Canada are made mostly by firms employing Indians. With all the cheap labor available to Canadian firms, we couldn't compete in price; it forced us to put our emphasis on quality," she recalled.

Today, that emphasis is paying off. Iverson shoes are generally recognized as the "Cadillacs" of snowshoes and they are in demand throughout the upper tier of eastern and midwestern states and in Canada with 8,000 to 10,000 produced annually. And it is the largest snowshoe supplier for L. L. Bean, Inc., the prestigious "outdoors" mail-order conglomerate.

And, smiled the owner, "we're beginning to make inroads in the western states where the Canadian metal shoes have a toe-hold."

The former doctor and nurse were literally up to their armpits in snowshoes and the firm's sales were

growing steadily when Dr. Hulse died. Devastated, his widow briefly considered getting out but her business sense prevailed. "Fortunately, my husband had prepared us for this possibility. The business framework was solid; it was a good family operation. So we stuck it out."

Nevertheless, Hulse had no previous experience. Under her husband's operation, her role had been largely supportive with little day-to-day operational involvement. She had a nursing background and, while living in Las Vegas, had obtained a bachelor's degree in history. So, with the loss of her husband, she was forced into the business classroom of hard knocks. "There are a million reasons why a small business cannot survive and I

think I have faced nine hundred thousand of them. I have become wiser, tougher and definitely much older as a result," she said.

She weathered the initial storms and today takes pride in her own business acumen. And she enjoys the spotlight the business has thrust on her. Being one of a kind--a woman owner of one of the country's rarest companies-- attracts a lot of attention. The business has been featured in the National Geographic, U.S. New & World Report, and "World News with Peter Jennings," just to name a few.

Yet, she is keenly aware that the success of the company rests in large part on her sons, Clark and Casey, and on the half-dozen employees (not counting the part-timers).

"This company would go

nowhere without them," she said. "Making snowshoes, especially the kind made here, requires a dedication and craftsmanship of people who cannot be replaced by machines. We don't mass-produce shoes; our people make them, one by one, using a lot of muscle and care. People ask me how long it takes to make a pair of snowshoes. I tell them products of craftsmen cannot be measured by time. You make what you make, however long it takes."

Iverson uses a very select grade of Michigan-grown ash to make its shoes. Logs are quarter sawed, then cut into sticks at the factory, with the grain running the full length of each resulting stick that becomes the shoe frame. Each stick is bent separately under steam, utilizing one of a

half-different kinds of specially-made jigs. Bending wood, even under steam, so that the ends touch without cracking or snapping is no easy task. It requires the muscle of two people.

Shoe "sticks" vary in length up to the 12 feet required of the largest of the Iverson shoes. The sticks are just simply bent so that the ends touch but the bend is a compound one to produce the upraised shape at the toe of the shoe. The bent and kiln-dried stick is secured by solid copper nails and washers at the heels.

When frames have been produced, workmen carefully select matching pairs to ensure more than just "look-alikes." Shoes are matched by toe rise, cross sticks, wood grain, color, and overall appearance.







Once frames are completed, the painstaking task of "lacing" takes place. Much of this work is done by families living in and near Shingleton, sometimes inside the factory, but also in the homes of the workers. Iverson offers both the standard rawhide lacing and reinforced Neoprene material pioneered by the company's founder. Neoprene (the same material used in producing the rubber-like suits of divers), said Hulse, is more durable than rawhide but many still prefer the "old fashioned" lacing represented by rawhide. Whichever material is used, lacing is a slow, intricate process.

Iverson uses a specially formulated clear lacquer to enhance

the grain of the wood and to give the shoes added strength and more resistance to abrasion.

Because the making of wooden snowshoes is so labor-intensive, the shoes are produced throughout the year. "We cannot just wait until the snow is here and then step up production. We've got to make them in warm weather and cold to ensure we have enough to keep up with demand."





Novi has a program entitled "Inside Novi City Hall" hosted by City Manager Ed Kriewall.

Political Office holders who host informative programs throughout the year are: Wayne County Commissioner Suzie Heinz; House Representatives Jan Dolan and Bill Bullard and Senator Jack Faxon.

Suzie Heinz produces a show entitled "County Impact." Starting her third term she tapes a program every two weeks. The program has been running for 4 years. She shares the planning with volunteer Dorothy Gaul who coordinates the crew and guests while John Martin of Omnicom directs the show. This monthly 30 minute program may be seen on the MetroVision Cable System on Thursday nights at 9:30 p.m. Jan Dolan also appears on other television programs including "Viewpoint" and "Women On the Move." Her philosophy is to be direct and conscientious.

Senator Jack Faxon hosts the "Capitol Report." It is also a monthly 30 minute program. On this program, one topic is discussed with two guests in order to get different viewpoints. Faxon has also appeared on art shows and children's programming. His approach to television acknowledges the diversity that exists among the population.

Each month will see more of our elected representatives as they become comfortable with Community Cable Television.

Linda Evans, Tom Skerritt star in "I'll Take Romance"

Skerritt not always in leading ladies' shadow

Tom Skerritt is the kind of actor who is frequently cast opposite strong leading ladies. He's not a household name, but his co-stars frequently are. Skerritt portrayed Shirley MacLaine's low-key husband in "The Turning Point." In "Poker Alice" he co-starred with screen queen Liz Taylor. "Miles to Go" saw him cast opposite Jill Clayburgh. TV audiences, though, are most likely to know him as wealthy Evan Drake, Kirstie Alley's love interest on "Cheers."

On Sunday, Nov. 25, Skerritt will once again co-star with one of Hollywood's most notables—lovely Linda Evans—in "I'll Take Romance" on ABC.

Skerritt believes that quite often actresses are not given the chance to play strong lead roles, and he's happy to see it happen and to support them when it does.

"I'd rather play opposite an important actress than take second or third star billing in another kind of

film," said Skerritt. "It's a much meatier experience."

Apparently it's paid off. Skerritt's other film roles have, for the most part, been good. In the 1986 hit "Top Gun," Skerritt was cast as a commanding officer. In "Alien," another box-office hit, he convincingly played the captain of the doomed space freighter.

Said Skerritt, "I've been fortunate enough to not have to make movies that I wouldn't pay five bucks to see myself." (OK, we'll concede that, perhaps with the exception of "Poltergeist III.")

At 5 feet 8 inches tall, blonde, beautiful and recognized the world over, Skerritt's co-star in "I'll Take Romance" has an undeniable strong screen presence. Off-screen, however, Linda Evans strength has only come through the years.

After a promising beginning with a role alongside Barbara Stanwyck in "The Big Valley," Evans quit working for 10 years at her then-husband's (John Derek) request.

Jay Bernstein, the manager who credits himself with the discovery of Farrah Fawcett, claims Fawcett was only his second choice: "I came to Linda and told her she could be the woman of the 70's...She said, 'Thanks, I appreciate your enthusi-

asm, but I just want to go home to John."


Years later, of course, Derek left Evans for the 16-year-old who was to become Bo Derek. It was a terrible blow, said Evans. "Not only had Bo been a friend, but she was a younger version of me. I asked myself, 'What do I do now? How do I survive?' I knew there was no going back. I knew I had to create a new life for myself."

And that's what Evans did. After a divorce from her second husband, real-estate magnate Stan Herman, in 1979, she went back to work. From 1980 to 1989 Evans found her home on the set of "Dynasty" where she played Krystle Carrington.

"The show helped me discover my independence, finally, and I was able to give up the idea of needing a man, or anyone else, to take care of me. 'Dynasty' was an answered prayer. Now," said Evans, "every day I wake up smiling."

That's a change for Linda Evans. As for Tom Skerritt, in "I'll Take Romance," he won't completely take the back seat to Evans. This time around he'll be the center of attention, playing a weatherman pursued by a group of female suitors. And that's a welcome switch too.

Celebrities entertain in 'Circus of the Stars'

Training requires solid commitment

Celebrities from stage, screen and television leave those mediums behind to take on death-defying feats in the *15th Annual Circus of the Stars*, airing Wednesday, Nov. 21, on CBS.

With Robert Urich, Whoopi Goldberg, Joan Van Ark and Richard Crenna serving as ringmasters, the two-hour extravaganza features more than two dozen stars performing acts of physical skill and mental endurance, some of which required three months of training.

This year the aerial acts are more difficult and sophisticated than ever before, with John Buchanan (*Family Man*), Dah-ve Chodan (*Uncle Buck*) and Shane Butterworth (*Saved By the Bell*) on the trapeze and Tony Carreiro (*Doctor, Doctor*), Victoria Rowell (*The Young and the Restless*) and Lisa Rinna (*The Hogan Family*) on the high wire.

The feats of these performers are augmented by celebrities who have trained to work with animals.

David Soul, who takes eight Bengal tigers through their paces, discovered he had more to do than learn the commands. For two weeks before he even stepped into the cage with the big cats, he had to take a crash course in Polish, since that was the language used by the animals' original trainer.

"And sometimes," Soul smiled, "I throw in some Italian — 'Bella, bella' — for good measure."

The actor, who played on *Starsky and Hutch* for four-and-a-half years, said he had no idea what kind of commitment he was making when he took on the task. "I thought the process would mean saying, 'Hi, how are you, Ma'am' once or twice a week to a docile tiger, and that would be the show. Like the kid who hears he has to practice the piano every day, I thought, 'I can't do this — I'm too busy.' And I am. But I found something within me that said, 'I really want to do this.'"

Actor Dick Van Patten made a commitment of a different kind. He agreed to tackle an act never before done on a *Circus of the Stars* show. Van

Patten will enter the cage with an American black bear and two Himalayan bears who are neither muzzled nor declawed and who have all of their teeth.

"I have great respect for these animals," Van Patten said. "And I have fear, make no mistake about that. Because, if you don't have a little fear, it's not very healthy. I know the bears can take me out in seconds if they dislike me or if I do something wrong. I can't wear any jewelry or belts or anything that will attract or annoy them."

Other animal acts include Morgan Brittany, who is dubbed queen of the elephants, and Ann Jillian, who plays "now you see him, now you don't" with an elephant.

Although the elephant acts may seem tamer than the acts with the more ferocious animals, the stars work just as hard in perfecting their acts for the *15th Annual Circus of the Stars*, according to Phil Braverman, who has been producing the popular wild animal acts since the show's beginning. "Celebrities in animal acts are expected to train seven days a week for two solid months," he said.

"You can train a star to run through the paces and perform magnificently," Braverman said, "but the most important thing for our stars to remember is that they must always be the dominant animal in that cage."
