Chief Toms to step down

Two weeks of fishing in the balmy climes of Florida helped convince township Fire Chief Robert Toms that it was time to hang up the boots.

Toms, the colorful co-founder of the township fire department and 42-year firefighting veteran, Monday announced he will step down from his position at the end of January.

Toms informed Supervisor Georgina Goss of his intentions Monday morning.
"I'm so tanned and relaxed that I

just told them I quit, "Toms said, after emerging from Goss' office. "I built their fire department and now I've had enough.

Toms' departure was not completely unexpected, Goss said, but the announcement still had a big im-





Theft suspect nabbed at scene

An early-rising restaurant owner may have helped police foil a robbery attempt at his Northville Township

business Monday morning.
Robert Riffle, owner of Riffle's Restaurtant, 18730 Northville Road, entered the front door of the restaurant at approximately 5:10 a.m. and heard "loud banging noises", according to township police Sgt. John

Sherman. Riffle alerted township police, who surrounded the restaurant, Sherman said.

Moments later, a man identified as Livonia resident Michael Brian Moesta, 31, emerged from the back

door of the restaurant, police allege. Moesta was arraigned Monday at 35th District Court. He faces a Nov. 26 preliminary exam on a breaking and entering charge and is currently lodged in Wayne County Jail.

Police said Moesta was holding "over \$2,000 in property" when he was arrested

According to township police reports, Riffle said he arrived at the restaurant at 5:10 a.m. and heard loud noises and hammering. He contacted police, who responded and witnessed a broken lock on a glass and steel security door Pry marks were noticeable on the door, police said, and the door was not locked shut.

Ten minutes after police first arrived, they allege that Moesta walked out of the building on, a read kitchen door. Police said he had a set of keys in one hand and restaurant property in the other.

Moesta dropped the property vhen police identified themselves. but did not resist arrest. Police said Moesta's 1986 Toyota was parked behind the building and said it did not appear that he was working with an accomplice.

A search of the restaurant did not reveal other suspects, police said.

Moestra was also carrying what police called "a suspected crack co caine pipe.

Moesta has prior convictions for armed robbery and counterfeiting, according to police records

pact Monday at township hall. "It's truly a major loss to the community." Goss said of the 64-year-old fire chief. "He started the department from scratch and was only going to (work) a couple of years.

"He is a township institution (and) we'll all miss him."

Township Manager Richard Henningsen said Toms had dropped retirement hints in the past, but had never really set a date.

"People should appreciate his efforts," he said. "He's built the fire department from nothing and now

we've got a pretty good department. "I think it just gets tough getting up at 4 a.m. and putting on the boots to go to a barn fire." Henningsen said.

YOU REALLY CARE

Toms signed on with the township in July 1977 to build a fire department. He had retired from the Detroit Fire Department in 1974, but agreed to return to the hot seat because he wanted to do something for the place

Toms spent the past two weeks at his Panama City, Fla., retreat, pulling trout and flounder from the Gulf of Mexico. He said he longed for more freedom than his job could afford and realized it was time to step aside.

"After 42 years, it's time to hang it up," he said. "I've probably fought 80-90,000 fires and that's enough.

"I'm getting older and I'm getting tired of sitting on the edge of the bed (waiting for an alarm). I want the freedom to come and go when I want." The township must find a new fire

chief for the first time in 13 years. Goss said it was too early to tell which way the township board would go in a search for his successor.

Assistant Fire Chief Rick Rosselle is waiting in the wings and he received strong support from his boss.

"I highly recommend my assistant chief to take over my position," Toms

said. "He's got all the qualifications." Goss would not commit to Rosselle.

We've never been through this process," she said. "(But) our assistant fire chief is a well-trained firefighter, there's no doubt about that."

Toms admitted to being discour-

aged by recent battles over a township fire millage. He said the millage controversy may have greased the pole for his slide into retirement.

"I've killed myself trying to make the fire department run in the most economical fashion," he said. "When people say we're wasting money, or

Turn lane added at MainCentre

Drivers heading north on Center Street may soon be able to make a

move that's been illegal for 16 years. City officials approved a plan to install a center lane for northbound traffic on Center at Main, to allow

drivers to turn left onto Main. Left turns have been illegal at the intersection since 1974 because of the poor sight distance north on Center south of Main. But Singh Development's regrading of Center in conjunction with their MainCentre development will improve the sight distance enough to allow left-hand

The regrading will allow drivers heading north on Center to see at least 150 feet north, to spot southbound vehicles.

The city council originally approved a Center Street redesign which added 14 parallel-parking spaces along the street. The new plan

will do away with three of those spaces along the east side of the street north of Mary Alexander Court, and install a center lane for northbound traffic.

The lost parking spaces would have been between I and 3 feet above the sidewalk grade on the east side of Center, and would have required steps down to the sidewalk. "You eliminate the need for steps . . . where the heights are the most severe. City Manager Steven Walters told the council.

"I suggest we go with this (center

lane plan) first, because we can always replace the parking later," Wal-

City officials hope the new plan will improve downtown traffic circulation, and say that the move may allay the danger of vehicles sliding on the hill when ice forms on the road, because fewer cars would have to stop

on the slope of the hill.

Council Member Dewey Gardner opposed the plan at first, saying he liked the protruding landscaped island on either side of Center Street in the original street design. When

Council Member Paul Folino said "that's the trade-off for improving the traffic pattern," Gardner replied, "I don't think we need to make trade-

But he eventually deferred to the rest of the council, saying, "if you could embellish the Mary Alexander Court area, I think it would work."

Council member Jerry Mittman also was opposed to the plan at first, but for a different reason. While the plan first designated the center lane as a left-turn lane, Mittman argued that using the center lane for both left-turning and through traffic and designating the right lane as rightturn-only might make for a better traffic flow pattern.

The council finally voted to go with the center lane plan, while postponing a decision on a left- or right-turn

City officials plan to have Center Street reopened and the barricades on the south side of Main west of Center removed within two weeks.










Elitist tone overheard in master plan draft

By STEVE KELLMAN Staff Writer

The city planning commission's fi-nal draft of the 1990 Master Plan has come under fire for its "elitist" tone from the city council and other city

The draft - the result of two years of meetings by the planning commission - was the subject of close scrutiny at a recent joint meeting between the commission, council, historic district commission and downtown development authority.

The master plan provides "a legal basis for any zoning changes," planning consultant Don Wortman explained during the meeting. "But also, and I think more importantly, the master plan provides guidance to the community over the next five

"It tries to give the community a road map as to where you are headed."

The heart of the plan is a land-use map to assist future city planners. Wortman said, "especially in terms of future rezoning, and what is our idealized picture of what this community should be in 20 years.

"It may not all be practical but it's certainly what we'd like to head for,"

Wortman said the land-use plan showed few changes north of Eight Mile Road from the current zoning map, except for its designation of the northwest corner of Center Street and Ely Drive North as a park. The land use plan also adds an "Office/ Research" category, and shows slight expansion of the Central Business District east and south of its present boundaries.

If the master plan acts as a road map for the community's future, some city officials did not seem happy with the direction in which the

Officials were most concerned with sections of the plan that suggested revising single-family (R-1A and R-1B) zoning districts. Council Member Carolann Ayers asked, "So the idea of the master plan is to have larger lots, which means higher land costs, which means that we want to move the city to a more elitist, more restrictive community?"

Planning Commission Chairperson John Hardin replied that the commission's intent was to maintain the existing neighborhoods when lots are rebuilt, not make them more exclusive. We were concerned that whatever goes back into place fits the character of the neighborhood, so that it isn't destroyed by infill more dense than the existing area," he said, "not to create larger lots per se."

Wortman agreed, saying, "it wasn't so much to create anything exclusive or elite, or shut anybody out of the community."

But other officials were reluctant to drop the matter. City Manager Steven Walters asked why the plan proposed changing some neighborhoods from their existing R-1B designation to a more restrictive R-1A, when most neighborhoods are already R-1B in character.



Man with weapon confronts couple at track

A man carrying a concealed weapon reportedly threatened a Detroit couple and their six-month-old child in the Northville Downs parking lot

Shared service budgets placed under microscope

Recreation and library budget requests faced close scrutiny in both the township and city recently, with both municipalities looking to trim the proposed budgets.

Library Director Pat Orr's request for a 26-percent increase in the 1991 library budget — to \$457,867 — to fund an extra day of summer library service was shot down by the township board. The board approved a 6.7-percent increase to \$387,841.

The city council also seemed unwilling to fund added services, though council members disagreed on the best way to cut the proposal.

"I think there's still room to reduce more from the library," Council Member Jerry Mittman said. One line item he criticized was the request for \$4,500 in postage fees, up from the \$300 budgeted this year.

The library staff planned to send out a mass mailing in the coming year, but council members have previously suggested combining a library flyer with other municipal mailings to cut the cost. "I think the economic times we're in right now, that (postage) item should be more a carryover number," Mittman said.

But Council Member Carolann Ayers disagreed with such close scrutiny of the library budget. "I would not like to see us decide what we do want or don't want line-item by line-item, but rather decide on an (overall budget) amount," she said.

Ayers also serves on the city library board. The township board also cut the proposed increases in the recreation and senior citizen budgets, though by more modest amounts. A \$183,900 recreation budget was approved, which was \$1,200 less than requested. and \$300 was trimmed from the proposed senior citizens budget for a \$78,075 total.

Despite the township cuts, Mittman said he was still concerned about the budget increases. "The senior citizens budget is still going up 15 percent for us, which is still more than I'd like to see . . . There's always ways to cut a budget," he said.

The increase approved by the township would be 11.3 percent higher.

The council postponed approval of the budgets pending clarification of city/township contributions.





Fighting time

Bobcat' tries to keep war memories alive

His comrades called him Zbik the Bobcat - because he was so ferocious in tracking down his prey.
That was in 1942-44, when Mar-

ian Szczepanski was a member of the Polish Underground Army fighting the Nazis in Warsaw, part of an assassination squad gunning for Germans sentenced to death in secret

Today, the 70-year-old Northville resident is equally flerce in his opposition to the reunification of Germany, although he admits the battle is already lost. The two nations - divided in 1945 — became one in October.

"I went through every phase of German persecution of other nations, especially the Polish nation. My motto is this. United Germany equals strong Germany. Strong Germany equals war," Szczepanski tells anyone who will listen, including Detroit-area veterans organizations.

"Let German people live in prospenty and freedom but don't ever let them be united."

A naturalized American citizen, he

is waging a war of words, firing off letters to newspapers, the United Nations and heads of state to get his viewpoint across. He is hoping to get a book and a movie made about his

It was this same persistence which kept him alive for a year-and-a-half in the most notorious death camp of all time. Auschwitz.

It was this same dogged determination which sent him across Brazil, Argentina and Paraguay in a campertrailer almost 20 years ago in a fruit-less search for Josef Mengele, the prison camp's Angel of Death.

As Americans snap up tiny pieces of the Berlin Wall at \$10 a chunk, Szczepanski sees a nation - and world - in the grips of a collective historical amnesia. Diving into his extensive collection of material on World War II to illustrate his point in his living room an oil painting of Szczepanski is juxtapositioned against a shelf which holds a copy of Mein Kampf — he sounds like the proverbial voice in the wilderness as he recalls the four million dead at



Auschwitz. His mission in life, he says, is to tell people what happened.

The world is ecstatic about the destruction of the Berlin Wall. The world has forgotten that it was Germans who first built walls in Warsaw separating the Jewish ghetto, it was Germans who built walls around concentration camps. It was Germans who separated families, children from mothers, son from fathers," Szczepanski, a non-Jew, said.

"I suggest that a monument will be built at Bradenburg Gate in Berlin commemorating destruction of all walls that separate human beings. At least this monument should enum-

erate all walls and not only the Berlin Wall. I would be the first to contribute money to it.

The marketing of chunks of the Berlin Wall makes him "sick," he added. In a 1977 return visit to Auschwitz, he brought home pieces of that wall, barbed wire and human

bones "Just lying on the ground."
He draws on the lessons of history to prove his point. The Versailles Treaty barring German rearmament after World War I, broken. Munich 1938, when the Germans convinced the British and French that they had achieved peace and then invaded Czechoslovakia sive months later. The 1934 10-year non-agression pact with Poland, broken in five years by invasion. The 1939 nonaggression pact with the Soviet Union, broken in two years when the Nazis marched to the east.

As Szczepanski sees it, Hitler had the support of the entire German nation and the entire nation shares his guilt. And it could happen again, he believes. His theory is that a unified Germany could lead to a major war in Europe for a third time, with Germany seeking to drive east into Po-

land again. "Who is sending chemical wea-pons and poision gas to Iran? Germans. U.S. sends boys to Saudi Arabia. If they have to fight Iraq, Iraq will fight with weapons built by Gernany. What sort of allies are they for


the United States? Szczpanski said. You cannot change, you cannot change the spots on the fur of the leopard. There is something in the spirit

of the German nation which for thousands of years makes them commit crimes against humanity."

At Auschwitz, he was one of the last groups of Poles to be set free from the camp. He still has his release papers signed by Commandant Rudolf Hoess. Szczepanski says he is not sure why he was let out - perhaps to spread the word about what was happening as a warning to other Poles: "I survived because I hypnotized myself because I had to get out of there. You cannot kill me here because I have to pay you in percentage."

While at Auschwitz he worked 14-hour days in freezing weather, on a starvation diet. He was tortured. He was subjected to cold and hot water experiments. He witnessed the execution of 15,000 Soviet prisoners of

In Warsaw, he watched helplessly while his mother was beaten half to death by the Nazis for selling beef on the black market. Twenty-two percent of the Polish people were killed by the Germans and Szczepanski can't forget witnessing men, women and children being gunned down. He now plans to sue the united German government for compensation.

price on his suffering. And if he could, he's unlikely to get a payback.

The Germans broke my fingers, they broke my head, they broke my ear. I have German bullets in my shoulder. I have wounds all over my legs and body but what the Germans did not succeed in doing, they could not break my spirit and if anything But he concedes you can't set a they made it stronger," he said.

"Germany is too poor to compensate me, my family or Poland. If they were to give me a billion dollars, it is not sufficient for a year and a half in Auschwitz. Auschwitz was the worst place in the history of mankind."

Somehow, Szczepanski survived, earned a master of science degree at the University of London, married an Englishwoman and eventually found his way to Northville. In 1962, he formed the International Diamond Tool Company. ("Be sure to put in the article that I am looking for a wife anywhere from 35 to 150 years old," the widower said.)

But he is keenly conscious that he will never recover five lost years of his youth, years when he "should have been chasing girls."

Youths are waiting for a friend

Somewhere inside the confines of the Northville community, a child sits alone, troubled by thoughts he cannot comprehend.

Maybe he feels distant from his parents, unable to talk about changes in his life. Perhaps he withdraws from friends and relatives, and his school work and social life suffer.

Loneliness may turn to bitterness and he may begin to make wrong choices. He may eventually travel down the path of self-destruction. For want of positive influences, a

young life may be lost. And people would ask why. Northville Youth Assistance (NYA)

wants to help answer the whys before tragedy strikes.

NYA, a non-profit organization funded jointly by Northville city and township, matches local volunteers with young people who are perceived to have a void in their lives. The organization hopes to fill that void by providing the child an older friend, someone in whom they can confide.

But NYA needs to plug a gap of its own, according to Director Mary Ellen King. The group needs volunteers especially men — to lend a shoulder to young people from the Northville community.

"We're looking for anyone who cares about Northville kids," King said last week. "We have a waiting list of male youths that need male

say they're okay," she said.
A NYA volunteer training session will begin Jan. 3 at Cooke Middle School on Taft Road and will run five consecutive nights, King said. Potential volunteers will learn communication skills such as listening, problem-solving, decision-making and empathy - as well as boning up on substance abuse warning signals, she said.

If accepted by NYA, volunteers are asked to spend and hour and a half a week with their matched child, who may come to NYA via police, school, or parental referrals.

Volunteers can play catch with the child, take them for a walk through Maybury State Park, go out for a bite to eat, or just talk, King said.

"It's all about being a companion; it's being comfortable enough with each other to have a discussion," she said.

At least one Northville woman knows first-hand the benefits of the NYA volunteer progam. The woman, who preferred not to be identified, is a recently widowed, full-time worker and mother of three boys, aged 12, 8,

All three boys see NYA volunteers.

"I can't say enough about the program," she said. "I'm widowed, and they have no male role model.

"At first, I was worried about it replacing the dad figure, but now they look forward to seeing the gentlemen. It's the highlight of their day."

If an NYA applicant is at least 21. age is no barrier to a volunteer. King says volunteers range from young professionals to more mature, grandfather types.

All volunteer candidates are carefully screened though interviews and police and reference checks, King

Northville Township Finance Director James Graham has shared his time with a local youth for three years. The program serves a purpose both for him and his 11-year-old con-

fldant, he said. The whole idea is to be a nonthreatening person for them to talk to," Graham said. "But they still have to solve the problems themselves."


Graham said his youth comes from a one-parent household and was new to the community when they met. Outings generally include sports-related activities, food, pumping quarters into machines at a video arcade, or reading and studying in a local library.

Graham said the relationship helps him see the world from someone else's point of view.

"I was fortunate to have a father around a lot," he said. "I think this situation helps their self-esteem and I think they feel important, too, knowing that someone is volunteering to spend time with them."

For King, who asks potential volunteers to call her at 344-1618, NYA is all about caring.

"I can tell you there's a lot of hurting out there," she said. "I'm not saying they're bad kids; they're just in a





MainCentre seeks tenants

Singh Development has yet to sign a single commercial tenant for its MainCentre building, despite several interested retailers.

But residential space has found a more receptive audience at the fourstory development, where tenants have signed leases for 14 of the 74 apartments.

"I think we're blazing a little bit of a trail in Northville for this amount of retail all at one time," said Singh Vice President Michael Kahm. While several retailers have begun negotiating with Singh over potential stores, he said last week, "Nobody's to date put their name on the bottom line."

Kahm said the potential tenants may be waiting until Center Street is rebuilt and the streetscape along the east side of MainCentre resembles the rest of downtown

That work should be completed within the next several weeks.

Other stores interested in relocating from their current locations may be waiting until after the holiday season to sign a new lease, Kahm said.

Kahm estimated that one of four retail owners expressing an interest in MainCentre were business owners in this area looking to move to a more central location.

The top three floors of the fourstory building are devoted largely to apartments, while the ground floor is available for retail shops and professional offices. More than 27,000 square feet of retail and office space is available.

Singh is seeking a restaurant for the building and currently is negotiating with two eateries, a seafood restaurant and a family-style restaurant, Kahm said. "Both of the ones that we're talking to now would get a liquor license," he said.



Saving a classic structure

Northville man rescues home of Novi pioneer

Propped on I-beams, surrounded by waist-high weeds, vacant and neglected, for several years the Thornton House seemed to be the house nobody wanted.

Novi pioneer Sally Thornton's clapboard home faced an ignominious bulldozing in the near future if no one took owner Irwin Arkin up on his offer to give the circa 1838 Greek Revival structure to anyone with a good homesite.

Northville resident Bill Garfield came to the rescue recently, with a scheme to restore the farmhouse once owned by his high school sweetheart's family and turn it into a residence for his son, Bill Garfield Jr.'s family.

The Garfields won't plop the house down on a new lot just anywhere in Novi. The designs call for a village green surrounded by the Thornton house and six new homes, all built in a similar 1830s style. The 19thcentury-style community, Old Novi Village, is planned for a six-acre site on Eleven Mile Road east of Taft

and a minister.

"We hope to create an on-going community so none of us are outsiders any more. We need to quit moving around. Go west, young man? No. stay still, young man. This is where your roots are.

Garfield and his wife may also move into Old Novi Village.

He hasn't been the only one eyeing the simple white. Greek Revival home, since June a local cause

As a pet project, Novi Historical Society President Kathy Mutch founded the "Friends of the Sally Thornton House" to try to save the house from destruction. Thornton family members came back to town and offered moral support. The "Friends" plans, which Mutch is not ready to disclose, were just ready to jell when Garfield took ownership of

the house. "We welcome any effort that will successfully achieve our goal which was to preserve, relocate and restore the Thornton house. The plans we were working on would have placed the house in a position to be used for educational purposes that focused

on local history in a public setting." Mutch said. I've gotten attached to that house. I really have."

The Novi Chamber of Commerce was also looking over the building, for possible use as an office.

Garfield first became acquainted with the Thornton house when he was hired by his girlfriend Mary Rogers' father to paint it in the summer of 1948. He and Rogers — a direct descendent of Sally Thornton — dated throughout their junior high and high school years in their hometown.

Birmingham, but later went their separate ways.

"I haven't seen her in years and years. I do want to get her out here," he said.

The Garfields have the qualifica-tions necessary to tackle the ambitious job. The owners of Garfield Building Company in Northille, the family specializes in custom construction and residential and commerical historic restoration.

Garfield projects include renovating Victorian homes in Northville. WMUZ radio station in Detroit and the historic buildings from 109 to 121 North Center in downtown Northville, including the Veranda

The Thornton house will need to be transported several miles from its present site by a professional moving company. As a worst-case scenario, one wing of the house might be temporarily removed so the building can clear local streets. A foundation and basement will be waiting for it.

Once in place, Garfield predicts that Sally Thornton's homestead will be ready for a new family within two to three months.

"The house is basically sound. A few of the timbers are rotted at certain points, but not prohibitively so, he said.

"It is my hope I can see my son and daughter-in-law and grandchild in the home early in the spring.

Our Opinions Work in good faith on Huntington Falls

At Thanksgiving a year ago, talk of a not have to drag on to hours fit only for buyer for the Wayne County property in Northville Township was nothing more than rumor, gossip, and innuendo. True, the county was involved in negotiations for the former Wayne County Child Development land, but like everyone else, we'd heard it all before.

January rolled around and suddenly, surprisingly, the county announced that a group headed by local developer Robert DeMattia was its choice. Lock, stock, barrel and crumbling buildings — take it away for \$31.75

After the Wayne County Commission formally approved the sale, County Executive Edward McNamara and De-Mattia got together for a ceremonial handshake amid the rubble of the county land. And earlier this month, at a township board meeting, a DeMattia representative offered a glimpse of the future by unvieling the plans for Huntington Falls, a dramatic, 930-acre three-part harmony combining industrial, recreational and residential development.

Despite a drawn-out negotiating period, environmental clean-up concerns and nit-picking by the county commission, the developers in no way can be assured that smooth sailing lies ahead. The project has qualified for planned unit development (PUD) status and now will undergo township planning commission scrutiny in what promises to be an excruciating review process.

We have some suggestions for the planning commission.

First, individually schedule all Huntington Falls site plan reviews. Under this scenario, planners, consultants and developers can sit down and focus all their attention on one subject and already too-lengthy meetings will night-prowling animals.

Second, we ask the nine planning commissioners to scrap their personal agendas and get on with the business of reviewing this plan. We know some won't care for the way we've stated this thought, but individual posturing by some members has been too evident in the past. We ask that they come together and focus on the needs of the whole community.

The third point concerns a fight that may be brewing over an industrial park penciled in for the Five Mile/Beck corridor. Early indications are that some commissioners are prepared to turn their noses up at distribution warehouses and the like in the southwest portion of the development. They say truck traffic from such facilities will have an adverse impact on the community. Please. The most negative impact on the community at this time is inflated property taxes. Development of perhaps 300 acres of light industrial area will shore up the tax base and may - by providing unobtrusive revenue for the school district — eventually help lower tax bills.

Finally, all indications are that De-Mattia wants to be a good neighbor. Gary Roberts, a spokeperson for the developer, recently hinted that badly needed facilities such as athletic fields and a fire station may find a home on the Huntington Falls range. Chances to obtain land for these uses should not be squandered.

The PUD ordinance under which this plan will be implemented encourages creativity and planners would be wise to work with that thought in mind. They must stick to township zoning values, but the last thing a project of this magnitude needs is overindulgent review. It's time to move ahead in good

Finally came the traditional season closer against Novi. But this time, everyone knew, a win meant the season would continue. Beat the Wildcats, keep the Baseline Jug in town, and . . . MAKE THE PLAYOFFS!

The Mustangs did it all. Playoff time, for the first time ever. Coach Dar-

rell Schumacher and his players could have been happy just making it that far - but they went farther.

The playoffs opened against Wyandotte Roosevelt, on the Roosevelt field. The experts picked Roosevelt. The experts were wrong and Northville pulled off a stunning overtime win.

Next week, the Dearborn Pioneers. Again the Mustangs went to a hostlie field. Again the picks went against them. And again they won in grand style. That made them regional champions and brought them a trophy to remember the dream season.

Traffic woes? Knock on wood



A traffic expert for the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments told a yarn that would curl my hair if I had enough to curl.

He was consulted by a county to prepare a report on where traffic accidents occur. He dutifully pulled out and analyzed the crash

He made two copies of the report and sat down with the county officials and the designated "risk man-

ager." It's standard procedure. You learn where your problems are and systematically improve the road conditions to reduce damages, injuries, deaths — and lawsuits.

At the end of an hour, the county's risk manager asked the SEMCOG consultant, "Are these all the copies of the report?" The SEMCOG consultant said he had the only other copy.

"May I have it?" asked the county official. The consultant gave it to him. The county official dropped both copies in the trash basket

and ignited them with a match. "Now we don't know where our problems are," he said.

It meant that the county couldn't fix its problem areas. And if an injured person sued on the basis that a road was defective, the county's alibi could be that it had had no "constructive notice" of the road defect.

The SEMCOG staffer won't reveal the identity of the county. SEMCOG is financed by dues paid by member

Shocking as the story is, it's typical of a lot of what passes for traffic engineering in southeast Michigan.

A normally intelligent person would assume local governments and voters want to provide safe roads so we don't smash up our vehicles and get hurt. Wrong.

Bruce Madsen, the honcho at the Oakland County Traffic Improvement Association, has produced a terrific 20-minute videotape on useless stop signs, a favorite device of people

who deliberately seek hazardous roads. There is such a stop sign in front of my house. It stops traffic on a heavily traveled residential street that is 41/2 miles long. Drivers are expected to stop for a stub of a street that is

only one block long and has no driveways feeding into it. Naturally, after dusk hardly anyone stops at the useless stop sign. Through the bedroom window, we can hear 20 cars buzz through for every one that stops.

Goofy teenagers? Hah! The cops stopped violators one night, and they were mostly middle-aged adult males from the neighborhood.

Madsen's film calls such stop signs counterproductive.

giving pedestrians and kids on bikes a false sense of security. My city has put up hundreds of such counterproductive stop signs. I wish the city council would view TIA's film. I've written about it before.

City's problems are ours



"You don't have to come here on Devil's Night to see that Detroit is burning.'

That was ABC correspondent Judd Rose's one-sentence conclusion to a 17-minute segment titled "Detroit's Agony" and aired recently on Primetime Live.

Reaction to the piece has been strong. I have yet to see or read a comment from a Detroit city official or resident who didn't agree with

Mayor Coleman Young's assessment that Primetime set out to do a "chop job" on the city.

Interestingly, however, the reaction of suburbanites has been a bit different. I sort of conducted an informal poll, among as many people as I could ask what they thought of the piece, and the reaction among suburbanites was that Primetime essentially got it right, that essentially it was accurate. Incomplete perhaps, but that is more a function of the medium, television having limits on the amount of information it can convey in a given period of time.

"It didn't tell me anything I didn't already know," was one comment that basically summarized the feelings I heard expressed from suburban area residents.

What I have not heard from anyone, officials or residents inside the city or out, was the idea that the things which are causing problems in Detroit are the same things that are causing problems in the suburbs, Novi and Northville being particularly good examples.

Our problems out in this area have to do with growth rather than decay. Our problems have to do with building up

community services and facilities to meet the demands of a growing population. Consider that the City of Detroit has a road network built to handle the traffic of two million residents. Today, that city has less than one million, or at least that is the count offered by the U.S. Census Bureau. Oakland County, on the other hand, has more than a million residents and its basic road network was designed at a time when there were only 200,000 residents living here.

If you are one of those people who will be paying for Novi's recently approved road bond issue, you should recognize that the problems of inner-city Detroit and "flight" to the suburbs just hit you in the pocketbook to the tune of \$100 per vear or more. And that is only one example of the way this problem costs residents.

Consider that the City of Detroit has so much excess capacity in its water supply system it can sell to much of the rest of the region, including Flint. Yet in Novi, because of inadequately-sized mains, residents often cannot get adequ-

ate water pressure. Consider that in Pontiac, another example of urban decline despite its recent gains, the city's sewer system is running at less than half capacity. Out in that area, getting new sewer lines to the residential areas is a major issue and construction of sewer lines is almost constant.

Finally, consider that the inner ring of suburban cities, considered the haven of those fleeing the city only as far back as the '60s, are now themselves lighting flight and decline.

Could it it be that in only another 20 to 30 years, Novi and Northville will also be looking for ways to keep residents around and fend off decay?

If Detroit really is burning, and the flames are now spreading, perhaps we can't just move further out. Perhaps we need to see if you can somehow put that fire out.

Playing with sparks misses fire

From the perspective of an expert on group dynamics (I facilitate organizational meetings for a living) the Northville Record front-page article (Nov. 5) about "Forum Raises Sparks" missed the real story. I was personally offended at the unbalanced reporting. The pastor and the reporter made playing with sparks (an isolated incident) the news, rather than seeing the fire lit for parental concern and involvement in their children's education as the

As a participant in the session, I had several reactions to this incident. The pastor opened his church for discussion of an issue: the role of parents in deciding what their children will or will not learn in school about values, feelings, and abstinence versus "responsible usage" of drugs, alcohol and sex.

This was not an "anti-religious" group, yet the pastor treated the people as if they were. Not only did he put a letter in The Northville Record before the meeting to be clear about his "neutrality" concerning this forum, but he introduced the session with a strong message that "controversy" was the real issue. Clearly his bias against those challenging the state's educational system, further revealed in his Nov. 8 letter to the editor, prevented him from even beginning to understand the topic and its significance. He truly missed an opportunity to support a meeting where parents who are concerned about potentially dangerous techniques being performed on their children in school exercised their responsibility to become informed citizens.

There are some important points that Northville citizens should know concerning the Nov. 1 meeting, which were misrepresented in the Record article. First, the Michigan Model advocates chose not to come to this meeting. This has been true of most other attempts to get state agencies and local school administrations who back the Michigan Model to represent it in an open forum. This fact seems to have eluded the pastor and its signifigance was lost on the reporter. So much for understanding an open forum.

Second, if we followed the pastor's logic (a forum is open if both sides are presenters or everyone can just jump in), then the "established order" could just decline participation in any such forum. This would automatically close down this type of opportunity for raising and sharing alternative viewpoints. So much for supporting an open forum.

Third, the format for the session has been planned ahead of time. noted at the beginning of the meeting, and led to over an hour of questions and answers at the end. As most would recognize for a group this large (over 200), it is a well-advised practice to have questions written down (National Press Club, for example). Furthermore, people were free to and did take up new questions throughout the question and answer

period. No attempt was made at stifling discussion, which included varied viewpoints from the audience. The forum was open to those who

chose to appropriately participate. Fourth, although the speaker was a bit irritable (having left his sickbed to attend the session), the incident highlighted in the Record article occurred when the format was violated. An individual interrupted the speaker during his presentation. This person blurted out a question. and when the speaker tried to get back on track, there was an open accusation that the speaker was using the state's tactic with respect to this topic by not answering questions. The accusation was misguided at best at that point, was proven to be inaccurate (as noted above), and tended to create a combative atmosphere. This led to the real "shouting" incident as the pastor intruded on the meeting and interrupted a woman who was obviously caught up in the combative atmosphere. The Pastor was so intent on his intrusion that he talked right over her. This led to the negative remark quoted in the Record. Sparks flew from disruption, but the forum stayed open.

Now, given all of the above, the reporter either:

 did not understand the circumstances of the meeting; decided to make this "neutral" pastor (his letter to the editor on Nov. 8 shattered this myth) look like a hero.

• reported several quotes correctly, while ignoring their broader

• advertently or inadvertently became the news instead of reporting on a very signifigant meeting in the life of our community.

• became embroiled in providing a vehicle to further put down parents who have legitimate concerns about parts of the Michigan Model; or some other bias. So much for objective

Keep in mind that the state has put down parents through an organized approach for "handling" opposition to Michigan Model. Parents along with committed and competent teachers have been caught in the middle. Unfortunately for Northville, the other putdown came in a North-ville Record editorial. The whole point of these genuine concerns about portions of the Michigan Model was missed. I hope we all understand that just having a solution is not enough. Specifically, the issue is not do we have problems with some children in our community (easily shown by statistics), but the real issue is - should all children be exposed to this solution (the entire Michigan Model) that targets some children's problems or worse should any children be guinea pigs for an unproven solution that has been shown to do more harm than good in some areas (as documented, but not reported, at the Nov. meeting).

The truth is that there are validated programs and modules that have been shown to reinforce family values and relationships, while reducing the incidence of illegal alcohol and drug use and the sexual misconduct of our children. The Michigan Model is broken, so let's it fix together. An open forum will surely lead to fire for change and improvement, which has already begun across the state and has now reached Northville — that's the news! R. Kraft Bell

Soccer program faces an immediate crisis over fields

To the editor:

The Northville Soccer Program is at a crisis point right now! All six of the soccer fields normally available for spring play are being lost to development. Even we who are involved with youth soccer applaud this economic development, but mourn the ss of recreation use of this land.

We have been very fortunate to have had the free use of the four Lapham fields and two Training Center fields all these years and we appreciate the generousity of both the Laphams and Wayne County. The crisis we face for next spring, however, very forcefully reminds us that if the community doesn't own its own recreation facilities, it certainly can't depend on their future availability.

Well, Northville, its time to get our heads out of the sand. Next May there will be no soccer fields available in our community for regular season games. We will have only one borwed field to use at restricted times at Fairlane West Assembly and two half fields for practices behind Cooke Middle School. We will try to rent Schoolcraft fields for home games, but they cannot be used for practices. Teams may be restricted to one practice every other week, coupled with increased fees to pay for field rental for games. This is not a happy scenario for players and coaches who are used to practicing two times a week. We are searching for additional fields for the Spring and we welcome any suggestions from the community. Any 50-60 square yard grassy area could used for practice.

Thankfully, the Recreation Commission has finally taken some action to improve the long-term posi-

tion, as follows: Two new "borrowed" soccer fields have been graded and seeded behind the current "borrowed" field at Fairlane West on Six Mile Road. These three fields should be available to use for three years or until the church develops the property. All three fields,

however, will have restricted hours. The Beck Road "community park" property between Five and Six Mile Road will be cleared to add three permanent fields.

None of these fields will be ready before the fall of 1991, nor do they permanently replace the six lost

If we have great luck in growing grass on these new fields next summer they may be available by fall 1991. But, in three years we will still be short six fields compared to the nine to eleven fields needed for a program of 650-700 players per season, based on current rates of growth.

With soccer the fastest growing youth sport in the USA and growth likely to accelerate due to the 1994 World Cup games (which could be as close as Ann Arbor), we need the community's help and support.

The Recreation Commission has reluctantly agreed to develop the Beck Road park, but this does not solve Northville's recreation field programs for the future. We believe the Township Planning Commission must take a stronger stand with respect to how land is allowed to develop, and we believe the citizens of this community must take a far-sighted view of our children's recreation

or legal representatives of children who have died or been permanently injured by diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, measles, mumps, rubella and polio vaccines are eligible to apply for federal compensation. Our federal government does not compensate

The doctor is doing no service to parents by not informing them that some children do indeed suffer permanent brain damage from DPT

vaccine. Dr. Laurent calls it a "myth." We, the parents, caring for these brain damaged children call it reality.

NURSING TRAINING: Thanks to an innovative program established this fall, Schoolcraft College's Business Development Center is providing on-site nursing training for nurse's aides at the Westland Convalescent Center. The new program is the first in the state to provide worksite training for nurse's aides. Upon completion of the program, the students will be licensed practical

The current nationwide nursing shortage has made it necessary to develop creative methods to recruit and train more students. Westland Convalescent Center administrator Judy Caroselli knew many members of her staff wanted to receive training to become nurses, but finding time for full-time, traditional college courses was difficult. Caroselli worked with representatives of Schoolcraft College's Business Development Center to work out a plan to bring classes and instructors to the Westland Con valescent Center.

Caroselli says, "I have been a nurs-

ing home administrator for 20 years. If I were to retire tommorrow, I would consider this the finest thing I could ever accomplish in employee relations. I'm glad to be able to help our staff reach their personal goals and professional potential."

Requirements for the program were that students be employees of the Westland Convalescent Center for at least one year. Students receive financial assistance through funds earmarked for scholarships, and federal grants and loans. There are 13 students in the program who meet at the Westland Convalescent Center twice each week for four-hour classes. The program began in September 1990 and students will graduate in March 1992.

This contracted program is just an example of Schoolcraft College's Business Development Center onsite education programs that can be

developed for area firms. For more information, call 462-4438.

NURSING GRANT: Schoolcraft College has received a \$20,000 grant from the Helene Fuld Health Trust to fund interactive video equipment for its nursing department.

The video equipment will provide nursing students opportunities to view simulated patient care situations on a video screen. 

South Lyon restaurant returns with new identity

If enthusiasm and friendliness help business grow then the South Lyon Bar-B-Que House at 22870 Pontiac Trail should have no problems with success.

Of course, a restaurant has to offer good food at reasonable prices and an attractive and clean environment for dining. The Bar-B-Que House has it ali, with Rubin Dimoski of Livonia as the manager and his brother, Louie Dimoski, and their father, Tom Dimoski, as the behind-the-scene

Not that the senior Dimoski is always in the kitchen. Quite the contrary since Tom owns and runs Kevin's Diner in Southfield. Louie is the full-time chef at the diner and parttime chef at the South Lyon restaurant. Tom makes all the soups for both places as well as the specials which are offered.

*My dad is the owner of the diner and Louie and I are co-owners of the Bar-B-que House," Rubin explained. "I do the books for both places and my brother comes out here to cook after the diner closes since it is only a breakfast and lunch place and is open 6 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Rubin said the family, which purchased the South Lyon restaurant about six months ago, at first viewed it as a lunch and dinner place, open from 8 a.m. to around 9 p.m.

The breakfast trade is good around here and I saw an opportunity to expand the business so we started opening at 6 a.m.," Rubin reported.

He added that weekends are "excellent" with lots of senior citizens coming in to enjoy their 10 percent off anything on the menu.

This is basically a dinner place and our barbecued ribs are the house special," Rubin said. "But we have five fish dinners and other seafoods as well as steak and chicken."

. Possibly the local restaurant's most popular meal is the full slab of barbecued ribs for two. The barbecue beef sandwich at lunch time is also a favorite with the customers. Rubin

"We keep our barbecue sauce on the light side, not too spicy," he said.

There is always a bottle of sauce on the table so that people can add more if they want, but a lot of people don't want too much spice.

What does it take to build a restaurant business in a small town, or anywhere for that matter? According to Rubin Dimoski, lots of personal attention from the owner and plenty of good help are two prerequisites.

"Appearance is important, too. The food plates have to look good. People then automatically think it is good and it just tastes better to them if it looks good," he said. "And the food has to be good every time and served quickly. The customer may come in 10 times and be happy and then something isn't quite right on the 11th time and that's what they

The Dimoski family, orginally from Yugoslavia, brought a good number of years of experience in the restaurant business with them when they purchased the former Silverman's Restaurant on south Pontiac Trail. Kevin's Diner has been serving satisfied customers in Southfield for nine years. Prior to that, the senior Dimoski and his brother owned a Flag's Restaurant" in Belleville.

Tom eventually bought his brother out and changed the name to Vaskos', but the quality remained the same. When he bought Kevin's Diner, he sold the Belleville business.

Like most small business owners, Rubin, a business graduate of Oakland Community College, has learned that you have to know how to do every job in the place.

"You'd be surprised how often somebody calls in sick," he said. "I run the register, serve the food and even cook when I need to. I think I'm a good cook, but I'm not as fast as the regular chefs.

Rubin said the key to his family's success as restaurateurs is always buying quality food to start with. "We don't cut corners. What you start with is what you end up with. All our food is homemade."

Rubin, who admitted his own breakfast included a "big" steak and four eggs, said the restaurant offers five breakfast specials under \$2 Mondays through Fridays. "We offer smaller portions on those breakfasts

CPAs advise strategies for investing in stocks

Just because the stock market sometines behaves like a roller coaster, that doesn't necessarily mean you should pass up the ride. In fact, the Michigan Association of CPAs says that market fluctuations can mean profits for small investors, if you follow some carefully tested market strategies

THE GROWTH FACTOR

Smart investors do research before they invest in the market It's up to you to look for companies that meet important criteria for growth, including several years of solid earnings, a reasonable or even declining debt and the ability to expand into new markets

Take the example of a major fastfood chain When its rocket rate of growth began to slow, the company took action. It introduced new services, including drive-in windows and a breakfast meal in addition, it moved into the European market. Those steps moved it back onto a growth track

Information about a company's earnings and future plans can be found in its quarterly and annual reports One way to determine how a company's stock is expected to perform in the future is by checking to see if officials of the firm have purchased stock of the firm over the last few months People tend to sell slocks for various reasons, but they only buy when they expect to make money Publications that list this kind of information are available in libraries or from a broker.

Before you invest in a company that has had a great track record of growth, find out if it can sustain that growth One sign would be a high reunvestment rate which indicated that the company is profitable and is pouring most of its earnings back into the company.

INVEST FOR THE LONG-TERM

To make money in the market, be prepared to hold onto your invest-

ments for at least a year. A company's earnings grow over time, which means it may take three to five years before you'll see a real return on your investment. In other words, if you are planning to withdraw funds in the very near future in order to pay for a child's college education or purchase a new home. think twice. You don't want to be forced to cash in an investment just when the stock market hits a new low

PLAY DETECTIVE

Cautiously follow up on any solid leads related to your own profession or trade. For example, suppose you own a retail store that, among other products, sells personal computers. You notice that the cost of computer paper is beginning to rise. If you then decide to buy stock in companies that supply paper, you may have an edge of six months to a year on professional investors. Stay alert for market trends that indicate the time is right to invest in a company whose stock is still a bargain.

A WORD OF CAUTION

Vaulted ceiling and double doors for the master suite

By James McAlexander A large living room with a vaulted ceiling dominates the Jonell, and catches your attention the minute you enter.

Twin picture windows flank either side of a wood stove, which is installed against a brick backdrop, on a brick hearth.

The dining area claims full view of the living room attraction, as well as having its own view window.

The kitchen has long work counters and sufficient cupboard space, but its outstanding feature is an island with Jennaire range and serving bar. It is open to the dining room, to allow the cook and guests to continue to enjoy each other's company, to enlarge visual space and to take advantage of the flow of the wood heat.


Nearby, a utility room also includes a pantry and space for the bulkier items not often needed.

The entryway provides a guest closet, and the short hallway in the bedroom wing holds closets for a central heating unit and linens.

The two bedrooms on one side of the hall have considerably larger closets than usual. A full bath opens off that hallway for their use.

The master suite opens with the grand gesture of double doors. The windows see double duty as sliding glass doors to a patio and yard. A small privacy garden could be planted here for the year-round pleasure of the master suite

Cafe doors give some privacy to a spacious bathroom and dressing area without interrupting communications. The dressing area has a double vanity and opens to a walk-in closet. Another special feature is the oversize shower.

"A dumpster on the front lawn is the status symbol of the '90s. It's what the Rolex and the BMW were to the '80s."

That's the latest from Home Magazine's merchandising editor, JoAnne Pier, speaking at a recent seminar co-sponsored by Home and Schoolcraft College's Continuing Education Service.

The theme of the program, at the Michigan Design Center, was "Redesign, Redecorate, Remodel"—the buzzwords of the 90s, according to Pier.

That's where the dumpster comes in. Pier didn't say whether dedicated trendies were abandoning last year's Rolexes and BMWs in the dumpster, but there seems to be room in there for almost everything else.

Traditionalists among us may think of redecorating in terms of new wallpaper or paint, but not those folks at Home.

"Redecorating and remodeling are synergistic," said Joseph Reggiero, editor-in-chief of the California-edited publication. "Redecorating now means tearing down a wall to enlarge an area or to add a bath or potting corner. The ranch home of the '50s is being re-thought and re-designed.

"Housing is prohibitively expensive, people just can't afford to move. A cheaper, more efficient use of money is to turn the attached garage into a master bedroom suite or to install custom-designed windows and French doors to open up a room to the outdoor

Many California homes, influenced by indigenous Spanish architecture, are open to the environment, hacienda-style. Master baths open to inner courtyards, kitchens and dining rooms to herb gardens. Often, shutters replace curtains, resulting in a less cluttered, country effect."

Ruggiero predicts that, in the '90s, gardening will replace gourmet cooking. Why would anyone want to watch a souffle rise when they could watch a cabbage grow is his argument.

That's how we got the potting corner. After all, you can't very well throw your garden tools in the garage - you've just turned it into a master bedroom suite. When you were a gourmet cook you displayed your copper pots. Now that gardening is your thing, it's logical to display your garden tools.

So, just take a little space near the back door and

To the dump, to the dump

strew the area with clay pots, pruning shears, a few seed packets and some nice black dirt. (But no pesticides — just hide them under the bed.)

It's part of the California rustica look, said Ruggiero, who moved to California from New York a year and a half ago. "Which is adapted from European country. Gardens are European, especially vest pocket gardens in the front yard.

'First impressions are very important. A combination of perennials — old fashioned flowers, such as hollyhocks, roses and daisies - along with pots filled with herbs that smell luscious as you come up the front walk, creates a much warmer, more welcoming, entrance than closely clipped grass and boxy foundation plantings.'

Together, Ruggiero and Pier elaborated on important new decorating elements of the '90s.

To create a personal style, mix textures - real or simulated natural elements, such as stone, metal, natural grain woods, stoneware and tile fabrics are nubby and textural. Mix is what's important here. Minimalist is out.

American country is giving way to Eurocountry a cohesive look, putting together a mix of styles, traditional blended with country. The days of one style furniture or one furniture finish are ended. No more relentlessly "Mediterranean" rooms. Mix fabric pat-

terns — plaid, floral, ribbons. Pier said that natural whites are the bridge between formal and casual. Shades and textures determine the mood. For example, an antique lace runner on a scrubbed pine table modified the country-ness of the table and adds a note of elegance. Queen Anne's lace in a silver teapot, completes the formal/country

"Grey was the neutral of the '80s. It was everywhere. The neutrals of the '90s are earth tones taupe, brown, mocha. Jewel and spice tones are hot

But if you like pastels, as I do, stay with them. It's your home. The main thing is to suit yourself. Live with whatever you're most confortable with."

Tablescapes and mantelscapes are an important way of displaying both your personal interests and your good taste. A dish of vanilla creams and a pot of ivy just won't do it any more.

Pier cites an understandably anonymous authority who decrees that it's the kiss of death not to change the accessories in your tablescape once a week, a stunning blow if you expect a merit badge for dusting

Tablescapes combine a melange of objects such as books, flowers (in non-traditional containers, such as a mug or a pitcher), a pretty plate, a piece of Majolica ware. All combine to achieve a French country look. "Put a picture on the table and lean it against the wall," says Pier. "It's a very casual look, like you forgot to hang it."

Harmony is vital to a successful mantelscape. Unlike the charmingly disarrayed tablescape, the mantelpiece is a disciplined still life.

For an asymmetrical look, place everything at one side of the mantel, leaving the rest of the mantel bare. Such an arrangement might include an "important" piece of sculpture with Art Deco candlesticks or a 'classical" stoneware vase filled with flowers and one or two pictures layered against the wall.

Or, if your life is spent juggling career and family and housekeeping, you might just like to repair to the sinkscape and do the dishes.

Slow homes sales mean resurgence of rentals

When home sales are sluggish and prices remain high, residential rentals emerge as a more dominant element in the real estate

That is precisely what is happening in many areas today. Many sellers are opting to rent their home in slow-sales markets. And prospective buyers, facing high prices, are turning to rentals—at least as a temporary housing alternative.

In my local area, a typical example situation was cited by John Herrick, president of the Ventura (Calif.) Board of Realtors-an active broker and property man-

'Several owners of our listed homes have recently decided to take their property off the for-sale market and rent it for a year of two," Herrick said. "It's a way to cover ownership expenses while waiting for a more active sales market.'

That trend is motivating an increasing number of real estate firms to organize a rental department. And the strategic value of that move is supported by a recent national survey.

The survey, conducted by the RELO International Relocation Netwrok, revealed that corporations planning to relocate employees are now more inclined to seek out a real estate company that offers "full services"—including rental services.

The survey also documents the more transferees are now electing to rent rather than purchase a home initially in their new community. Responding to this growing niche in the real estate market, the RELO organization recently formed a new rental division.

Rental amounts have been bouncing up and down over the past year, seemingly unsure of the proper level in the market, Venture broker Herrick noted one of his own rental properties. A year ago it was rented for \$850 a month. He then had to lower the rent to \$795. It's now back to

Nationally, the three most expensive rental markets are Honolulu, New York City and San Jose, Calif., according to a report from Runzheimer International, a leading management consulting and research firm.

The least expensive markets are Oklahoma City, Okla., Houston and Colorado Springs, Colo.

In Honolulu, an 800-square-foot apartment residence with three rooms, one bedroom and one bath rents for abotu \$890, it was stated in the report. In Oklahomoa City a comparable unit rents for \$280.

The national median rental amount for the above-described unit is \$375.

Q. What is "Fannie Mae" in the world of real estate?

A. Fannie Mae (Federal National Mortgage Association) is the largest secondary buyer of home mortgage loans in the world. This organization buys existing mortgage loans from primary lenders such as commercial banks, savings and loans and mortgage bankers.

The company is chartered by Congress and shareholder-owned. Its basic function is to recycle more loanable funds into mortgage coffers for more home loans.

Recently, Fannie Mae announced agree-


ments with six major banking companies to provide a total of \$14.1 billion in funding for new single-family home mortgages at points throughout the United States. It's the largest single deal ever announced by

Q. Since a homeowner can save thousands of dollars by opting for a biweekly payment mortgage loan, as opposed to a conventional monthly payment loan, why don't more people go for this type of mortgage?

A. A couple of reasons. First, many homeowners are paid by their employer either monthly or twice a month-not biweekly. Also, with most well-structured mortgage loans, the borrower can make additional payments anytime without incurring a prepaying penalty. So those extra interest-saving payments can be made



A variety of ways to clean wallpaper

By Gene Gary

Q. We rented our condominium for a year, but are now preparing to return to it as our permanent home.

When we decorated it, I invested in rather expensive wallpaper. My problem is that the renters did not take good care of our condo and some of the wallpaper is now smudged with stains.

I would like to clean these walls, but I am unsure how to go about it. Do you have any suggestions?

A. If the wallpaper is washable, such as vinyl or vinyl-coated paper, most stains can be removed easily by applying thick soapsuds with a soft sponge, then rinsing well with clean water. Products such as 409 also work well and don't require as much rins-

If the walipaper is not washable, or if a soap and water treatment is not effective, try removing the stain by rubbing gently with a soft gum eraser, or a kneaded wallpaper cleaner (available through major wallpaper out-

Sometimes a dry piece of fine steel wool can do an effective cleaning job.

For greasy stains, make a thick paste by mixing an absorbent powder (talc, commeal, cornstarch, etc.) with a grease solvent such as carbon tetra-

Cover the stain with the paste and leave it on until the paste is thoroughly dry. Then brush it off with a soft cloth. Repeat the treatment if

Stubborn non-greasy stains can be treated as follows: Use acetone for stains such as nail polish and ballpoint pen ink (hair spray also is good for ink staining). Other effective solvents include amyl acetate (also known as banana oil), rubbing alcohol, naptha, and turpentine (primarily used to remove paint and varnish

All of these solvents should be used the solvent will leave a ring. cautiously because they can damage the wallpaper finish or the printed dyes on the paper as well as the wallous area. Never use flammable solvents near stain lightly. Repeated applications any type of open flame or heater. If of a small amount of solvent are better solvent get on your skin, wash imme-

Q. I was given a very nice table

that has an inlaid leather top.

It is fairly good condition, except that the leather is somewhat sticky and has several small marks (indentations) on the surface, which might have been caused by glasses. What is the proper way to clean

and care for this leather top? A. The sticky condition is usually

the result of using polishes (wax on leather, which should not be done). Leather needs oiling to retain its natural beauty. You can wash the surface with a mild soap, such as

saddle soap, following the label directions.

Another recommended cleaning method is to clean the surface with a clean cloth dampened with mineral spirits; wipe dry. Repeat this process until all wax buildup is removed.

After the leather has been cleaned, apply lemon oil (natural lemon oil, not a lemon oil furniture polish). Reapply the lemon oil several times in the following weeks.

The leather will absorb the oil, and all indentation marks will slowly disappear. Afterward, a little lemon oil every two or three weeks is all the care your leather-top table will need.

Q. The hearth of my stone fireplace is black slate, which is quite dull and dingy. How can I clean it and make it attractive?

A. Scrub the slate with a strong

solution of detergent. Spread this over the surface and let stand for several minutes.

Then, with a fresh solution, scrub the surface with a stiff brush (a floor machine is helpful).

After the slate has been thoroughly cleaned and allowed to dry, apply a solution of half turpentine and half boiled linseed oil, heated over boiling

Apply warm to the slate and let set for an hour. Wipe off the surplus. Apply two or three coats of this preparation. Let dry thoroughly between each coat. This is a rather tedious process but worth the effort.

By Marilyn Herald and Dawn Needham Sending Christmas cards today can be fun if you have only a few people on your list, or it can be a real chore — and expensive — if you have a

Imagine what it would have been like 150 years ago when personal calling cards were popular. These were decorated with bits of lace and tinsel and personally presented as Christmas

As the tradition developed, homemade Christmas cards drove the U.S. postal system to distraction. In 1822, the Superintendent of Mails in Washington D.C., complained of the need to hire 16 extra mailmen because of these handmade greetings. He even petitioned Congress to limit the exchange of cards by post.

Gerri Dorais, postmaster of the South Lyon post office, said that "our attitude has greatly improved" since that time.

'We work long hours, but we love it," Dorais said. "We get into the spirit of it. Sometimes our employees adopt needy families. Our bulk mailers slow down on their advertising mail and let us concentrate on the heavy volume of first class Christmas cards."

During the holidy season, the post office implements an "operation plan" designed to move the mail quickly and give the best service to this volume of mail, Dorais said.

"Every Christmas, we wheel a tray out into the lobby, with signs for 'South Lyon only' and 'all other mail'," she explained. "This eliminates handling and we keep it here. Anything we handle here (rather than send on to Detroit) relieves the burden and it's easier for us to keep it here."

The volume and the fasct that most holiday mail is handwritten means it takes longer to sort, Dorais said. And once it's sorted, it takes more people to carry it.

The South Lyon post office has 13 routes and carriers for ch route, plus nine substitutes. All of them will be kept busy — sometimes even on lots of overtime — through the

"We have no control over what comes through our door," Dorais said. "It's really hard to plan. All you can do is go by what happened last year."

The practice of sending cards escalates every year: it's

estimated that more than 2 billion are mailed today.

The first commercially printed Christmas cards are generally credited to a London artist, John Calcott Horsley, in 1843.

It all began that year when Sir Henry Cole, a wealthy British businessman, commissioned Horsley to design and produce a Christmas card he could be proud to send to his friends and professional acquaintances.

Horsley's card was a triptych (a tri-panel creation) with the center space depicting a group of people enjoying holiday food and drink. The two side panels were scenes showing the clothing and feeding of the poor and the hungry. Some straitlaced individuals strongly objected to the panel showing food and drink as indicating Christmas (a

religious holiday) was a time for carousing. That first Christmas inscription wished the recipients a "Merry Christmas and a happy New Year." Merry was at that time a spiritual word meaning "blessed," as in "Merry old England."

There are still 12 of Horsley's original 1,000 cards in existence today, all held byprivate collectors.

Most reference books state these new cards were very expensive to produce and did not really catch on in England for another 20 years. It took Americans even longer to accept this commercialized form of greeting.

Boston lithographer Louis Prang, a native of Germany, began producing cards in 1875 for sale in the United States. From this he earned the title of "Father of the American Christmas card."

These cards were also costly and while Americans liked the idea of Christmas cards, they did not favor Prang's versions which featured colored floral arrangements of roses, daisies, gardenias, geraniums and apple blossoms.

It was the inexpensive, penny Christmas postcards produced in Germany that were the rage until World War I ended American-German trade. These featured religious scenes, Christmas trees and wreaths and

By the end of the war, the America greeting card industry had been born. In fact, Christmas is the number one card-selling holiday of the year in the

Two favorite themes of early cards, in addition to religious depictions, were feeding the birds and decorating the home with traditional holly.

During the Victorian era, some kind of moral for the young was often included in the Christmas message. Lots of lace, tiny flowers and scalloped edges, often with tassels attached were also in vogue.

Mistletoe and holly, candle-lit trees and presents were portrayed with lots of angelic-looking children and often angels with trumpets, proclaiming the good news of Christ's

Today, a trip through any card shop indicates how far things have come. Popular cards show anything from cows in Santa-type hats and other types of irreverent humor, including one card depicting a jolly-looking older woman rubbing her tired feet on the front.

When you open it up, it refers to how tired Mrs. Claus gets after "kicking elf butt" all year long.


The cats and dogs of the family can send or receive Christmas cards; traditional Christmas movies can be parodied.

One card shows a department store with cars parked closely together — with one open spot in front of the door, which a car is approaching. On the bottom, the card reads "Miracle on 34th Street."

Overeating and overspending are common themes in Christmas cards today, although the most popular are still the more traditional winter and holiday scenery.

Another option people are choosing more and more is to send holiday postcards. At 15 cents for a postcard stamp, that saves the sender at least 10 cents per holiday greeting.

Which means more holiday green for all the other trappings of Christmas.



Town Hall features former hostage

Town Hall lecture series ticketholders learned about patriotism Nov. 8 from a man who experienced it firsthand — Col. Charles Scott.

Scott was a hostage in Iran for 444 days in 1980-81 and, through his own inner strength, never gave up his

love for his country.

Scott was chief of the army liaison office in Iran when the American embassy was invaded by terrorists and his nightmare began.

I haven't had a single bad day since I came back to the freedom of this great country." Scott told the Town Hall audience at the Plymouth Radisson Inn.

Scott told the audience that, for the first three months of his time as a hostage, he was tortured and beaten. The remaining period was spent blindfolded, with his hands tied behind his back, in a small cell

because he kept his sense of humor.

"If you can keep that sense of humor, when you are faced with a crisis. you will walk away with that almost superhuman strength that will allow you to survive.

"If you lose your sense of humor, not only the major crises but even the little ones will tend to get you down."

In addition, Scott said, he never gave up because "I didn't know how to surrender. There is no class called Surrender 101 — How To Do It. It's alien to everything we stand for." Scott said that on the day he was

taken hostage he remembered reading that people who survived tough situations - who got out with their honor, sanity and integrity intact — had a deep and abiding faith in a su-preme being and also had set goals with a fixed point beyond which they would not be forced to go.

Scott said he set four realistic goals for himself that took into account

Scott said he survived his ordeal his known strengths but also his weaknesses. He said he considered what he would sacrifice to meet those

"Finally, I came up with these:" he

"Number one, no matter what they did to me I would not do or say anything to endanger another hostage.

"Number two, no matter what they did to me I would not do anything to embarrass the United States of

"Number three, I would not write anything for them.

"And, number four, I would not aid and abet or cooperate with (the terroristskin any way.

"I still have scars on the bottom of my feet where they were beaten raw with cables," he said. "I hung for three days by my arms, and I was not

taken down, not even to go to the

"But when I would start hearing a voice inside my head saying 'give up.' I would remember my goals, and that the only thing I've got left is my humor and integrity.

When the ordeal was over and Scott went home, he said, he had changed in some ways but he was still sane.

"And there is not a day I don't wake up and think how lucky I am to be alive and to have been born in the United States of America."



When the United States was celebrating its centennial, an amazing voice-throwing contraption was invented by Alexander Graham Bell in Boston, Mass. He called it the telephone, but it was regarded as a plaything by most people at first.

That year, the first telephone exchange was created in Detroit, with six miles of wire and 20 subscribers. Only six months later, a directory was published, listing over 100 new customers.

The Michigan Telephone Company in Detroit grew repidly, to nearly 8,000 miles of wire in 1896. Almost 5,000 telephones were in service by the turn of the century.

Independent phone companies abounded. By 1897, the Northville Telephone Company extended its wires to Novi, with its central offices in E.C. Goodell's general store.

Other Novi customers on the line included the Whipple Lumber Company, Warner's Cheese Factory and the residences of George and W.A.

Warner and Whipple soon formed yet another independent company, thus creating a widespread dispute between the two local firms. On March 4, 1898, the situation exploded and the Northville Record reported on the dissension:

The directors of the Northville Telephone company were red-headed Wednesday morning when it was learned that George Whipple, of the Warner-Wipple Telephone company had cut the Northville Co.'s wire near the Whipple Lumber Co.'s offices at Novi. The Northville Co. says it is a piece of spite work and a most contemptible trick.

Whipple reportedly wanted as many subscribers on his line as possible, despite the fact that his company was already over-burdened with customers. The paper was clearly on the side of the Northville company, and declared that Mr. Warner was neither a part of "the wire-cutting act or that he even knew that it was to be done.

The publicity directors of United States Telephone, Alinet and DCI may fight with their pens these days, but — luckily — the days of wire-cutting are far behind us.

An old-fashioned Thanksgiving

Massachusetts village retains flavor of 19th century harvest celebration

By Sally Sawyer

It is Thanksgiving season at Old Sturbridge Village, an outdoor living history museum reminiscent of Greenfield Village, New England

The autumn sun warms the chilly rain-drenched earth. Trees arch across narrow village streets. Gold and yellow leaves wander silently

They only "speak" 19th century here, so if you ask a costumed "resident" where he was born, he will say why I was born right here in the vil-

Ask Isaiah Thomas, for example. ahead of the British troops during the American Revolution.

Everything smells freshly washed. Blue jays caw and nuthatches walk comically head-first down trees, chattering over a harvest of worms. It is mid-morning, the best time for a quiet stroll through the rural life of the 1830s as it is shown today in Old Sturbridge Village, an hour's drive west of Boston in the town of Sturbridge, Massachusetts.

The village opened in 1946, the combined effort of Albert B. and Joel Cheney Wells, executives at the Southbridge, Massachusetts. It de-

veloped as an overflow of a Wells Family Museum started in the early 20th century. As more antiques were collected, the idea of displaying them in a year-round setting evolved.

Today you find 400 accurately costumed interpreters on the staff, learning first-hand about the physical discomforts of being too warmly clothed in summer and not dressed warmly enough for the severe New England winter.

"Sometimes I drop a couple of pet-ticoats when it's hot," an elderly resident said. "I'll bet the women did that back in 1830 too!"

Streets are still unpaved, in keeping with the 1830's atmosphere, so the mire is thick under our boots. The No, he doesn't play basketball, he Center Common grasses are unevenly 'mowed' by close cropping

This is living history so everyone dresses, acts and speaks as if they were the 19th century residents of the Freeman Farm. The livestock have been fed, the eggs gathered and gardens tended.

Pliny Freeman must have gotten up at dawn to stoke the fire with wood gathered by his sons. Now logs in the huge ever-present fireplace glow and cast dancing shadows. Females of all ages stand around the large table preparing the Thanksgiving feast.

Meredith, a three year old, adds American Optical Company in her expertise as "taste tester." Imported spices such as, cinnamon, nutneg and tea have been bartered for fresh eggs, butter, cheese and

Delia Freeman has added only a clock and wallpaper to the possessions they owned when they were married. Farmers chose to invest in land and livestock rather than domestic comforts, like carpet and curtains, favored by village residents. A "middling" farm family owned 70-80 acres of fenced orchards, livestock and land growing field and kitchen produce.

A farmer sickle-cut hay while his apprentice tied the bundles, each wearing straw headgear reminiscent of Abe Lincoln's stovepipe hat.

Why are your hats so high? "Cooler that way," he said.

Everything is stored in cool root cellars and barns from one harvest to the next. At noon, before the main meal of the day, Pliny Freeman gives thanks for a successful year and for being able to raise seven children.

We walk back to the center of the village past the district school and town pound to Asa Knight's Dry Goods Store. The shelves are stocked with fine fabric, shoes, tobacco, writing tablets and coffee. In the back are common items like molasses, vinegar, rum, brooms, shovels and clothes pegs.

Patent medicines are readily available. Most popular is Moore's Essence of Life. It was what most women took when they weren't quite sure what ailed them. It didn't seem to cure them, but it certainly made them feel better. It was 80 percent

Advice books are also popular. "The Mother's Book" and many cookbooks are for sale.

I found Laurie Smith of Michigan explaining that a woman's bonnet was a "platform for fashion." Laurie was born in Ann Arbor, attended Central Michigan University, did summer work at Mackinac Island and is now "head interpreter for textiles" at Old Sturbridge Village.

Thanksgiving service is held at the Center Meeting house at 1 and 3 p.m. Visitors sit in pews with high sides to keep out the cold. Some "residents" bring blankets and mini-foot warmers from home. Ecumenism was unheard of in 1830 so small religious groups met in homes or places like the Richardson Parsonage, a few steps from the meeting house.

After the service we head hungrily toward Bullard Tavern, following the fragrance of spices wasting from pumpkin, mince and apple pies. You can eat oyster bisque, combread, relishes and salad anytime, but a popular feast is prepared in the Publick House, Sturbridge, and served during several seatings on Thanksgiving

Make dinner reservations a year in advance if you can, or hope to be

lucky enough to find a cancellation. You should also start saving your pennies. Thanksgiving dinner costs \$50 per adult, \$35 for youths 6-15 and \$22 for children two to five. Infants can share your dinner free. That price includes admission to the village, all the facilities and activities. and allows you to return the following

You will recognize Bullard Tavern by its sign, created by village curators to look as it would have looked six generations ago in 1830. The tavern is brown clapboard with white trim. Enter to the dim light of candles and wander among the period furniture with a cup of mulled cider in your

A series of tables is set according to the size of your party, although singles are asked to join other tables. The portions are substantial and come in waves of food.

The menu starts with apple cider, relishes, oyster bisque, "winter salad with a most delicious sauce" and In-

dian corncakes. The turkey follows, with giblet gravy, country stuffing, Cape Cod cranberries, whipped pota-toes, brussel sprouts, buttered carrots and turnips.

And then the desserts start. For dinner reservations, send a \$3 deposit to Marketing Dept., Old Sturbridge Village, Sturbridge, MA. 01566 or telephone (508) 347-3362. Book as far ahead as you can for

Thanksgiving dinner.
Avisit to Old Sturbridge Village is a celebration of the past. It is also an appreciation of the present. As we passed the graves of so many women in the old pioneer cemetery. I remembered that childbirth was the first cause of death for women in those days; the second cause of death was

Their long skirts caught fire as' they leaned over the open fireplace to cook their food. I am grateful for the double oven that will cook my Thanksgiving turkey, even if it goes out every time the electricity goes off.

Toledo Zoo lights up the holidays

"And God said, 'Let there be light,' " a voice said in the darkness. "And there was light!" another voice replied.

No, we were not walking through the first book of Genesis, we were walking into the Toledo Zoo. It was full of lights. Lights on the trees. Lights on the buildings. Lights on the animals . . . Lights on the animals?

"There's a giraffe!" "Hey look at the polar bear!" "How did they get the animals to stand still so long," a tiny voice asked. "And how did they plug them in?

. They didn't plug them in, of course. This is "The Lights Before Christmas," a holiday celebration of lights that is in its fourth year at the Toledo Zoo. It's one of yuletide's most electrifying attractions.

Lights. Why does it seem so appropriate to see lights against a dark winter sky during the Christmas season? A question like that makes me want torush to the encyclopedia and look up the word

Ilearned a lot of things. Light is the sensory impression made on the eye. Newton discovered the spectrum while playing with soap bubbles. Huygens saw the sparkle in the Iceland spar. Fresnel was high on refraction.

There was the Nicol Prism and the Fraunhofer Diffraction Phenomena and the Atomic Theory of Refraction, but I seemed to be getting further and further away from the lighted outline of a hippoppotamus against a November sky in Toledo.

Let's look up Christmas. Ahhh . . . "In the beginning many of the earth's inhabitants were sun worshippers because the course of their lives depended on its yearly round in the heaven, and feasts were held to aid its return from distant wanderings."

And that's where I learned, on page 643 of my very ancient Encylopedia Britannica, that mid-December was a critical time in northern lands, where the light got weaker and weaker, and that ancient people held feasts to celebrate the lengthening of the days after the winter solstice.

They built great bonfires in order to give the winter sun god strength and to bring him back to life again . . . Thus the central idea of the winter solstice—the return of light—became the hope of the world . . . " Any northerner knows that feeling

Nobody was absolutely sure about the exact date of Christ's birth, but "when the fathers of the church in A.D. 440 decided upon a date to celebrate the event, they wisely chose the day of the winter solstice which was firmly fixed in the minds of the people and was their most important

They lit bonfires. Later the Romans decorated homes and temples with green boughs and flowers. The Druids collected mistletoe to hang in their homes. The Saxons used holly. The Germans introduced the Christmas tree, the pioneers brought it to America, we decorated it with lights in accordance with the ancient custom of celebrating winter with lights and . . . animals outlined in lights against a darkening winter sky.

This may be more than you care to know about

lights. It may remind you of the young boy who thanked his grandmother for a book about alligators, although it told him more about alligators than he cared to know.

But when you travel from one lighted festival to another this holiday season, think about those pagans of long ago who lit up the world to bring the sun god back to life.

If you won the lottery, you could watch them turn the lights on for Christmas at the Ritz in London or watch them light the candles on the Christmas trees in Germany.

It might be less expensive and more practical to celebrate in the Grand Traverse area, where the Grand Traverse Resort throws the switch on 175,000 shimmering lights Nov. 16 to launch the Northwoods Festival of Lights.

You could tour Connor Prairie, Indiana, by candlelight, strolling down candelit paths through the restored 1836 village near Indianapolis anytime after Dec. 8. Admission is \$7.50 adults and \$4.50 children 6 to 12.

There are a thousand points of light during the yuletide, but you might just like to travel to Toledo and watch the animals light up. They probably did it on Noah's Ark when it got dark, very dark, in December. They will turn on the switch for 'Lights Before

Christmas' Nov. 30 and keep them on through Jan. 6, except for the following days: Dec. 24, 25, 31 and Jan. 1, 1991. The zoo reopens at 5 p.m. and gates close at 9

p.m. Admission is \$2 for adults, \$1 for children 2-11 and for seniors.



Rice knocks Northville out of playoffs

Last-minute score nips Mustangs, 14-7

Showing the entire state they are, perhaps, the gutsiest football team around, the Northville gridders took highly favored Birmingham Brother Rice to the limit in Class A semifinal action on Nov. 17 at Flint's Atwood Stadium before falling 14-7. With the game tied 7-7 and just

over three minutes remaining, the Warriors drove 52 yards in nine plays for the winning points. Freshman runner Marcus Harvey scored from three yards out with only 33 seconds remaining, to send Brother Rice into the state title game tommorow (Nov. 23) at the Silverdome. The score also sent the disappointed Mustangs home, but not before an exhilarating playoff run.

"We were elated to get this far but very disappointed we didn't make it to the Silverdome," Northville coach Darrel Schumacher said. "It's very hard to mesh those two emotions.
The kids are crushed because they believed they could win."

The bigger, deeper Warriors doubled the Mustangs in total yardage (303-150) but Northville stayed in the game with a defense that bent but didn't break and an offense that suffered zero turnovers.

"I can't be disappointed with the effort we put forth," Schumacher said. "I thought we were outmanned and yet we played with them and were very competitive."

Brother Rice's two-platoon system and hard-nosed runner Jonathan Burtraw were just the advantage the Wairiors needed. With a half-dozen Mustangs going both ways, Rice slowly wore them down, and then drove for the winning score. Burtraw carried the ball 40 times and rushed

for 168 yards. "When you have to keep hitting a power back like (Burtraw), it can take a lot out of you," Schumacher explained. "It wears you down.

Many so-called experts were expecting a blow-out, and after the Warriors marched 77 yards on their second possession of the game, it ap-Johnson scored the touchdown on a fourth and inches at the six, but the big play in the drive was a 44-yard pass from quarterback Steven Mer-



Turkey Day without turkey?

Fresh turkey, basted in butter . . . giblet gravy...prime rib, with a sav-ory dollop of horseradish...These are what make holiday meals memorable — unless you're a vegetarian, faced with the prospect of trying to get through Thanksgiving, Christmas or Chanukah surrounded by an extended family of carnivores.

Some vegetarians may feel a tinge of nausea just looking at a platter of meat. Others may experience a different kind of agony, finding themselves gnawing on a table leg to avoid a turkey leg.

If that's not enough, family members may get pushy about stacking a non-meat eater's plate with "just one slice" of ham or roast beef.

During the season for food orgies, vegetarians can stuff themselves on meat substitutes like soybean, turkey-flavored sausage or patties. tofu sloppy joes, and ground grain products shaped into "meatloafs."

But an alternative, said Cindy Stewart. Novi's Director of Public Relations, is to fill up on the fixings potatoes, cranberries and salads. Sixteen years ago, ill while pregnant with her first son, Stewart was unable to eat much of anything. Later, she decided to keep to her vegetarian diet for health reasons.

"Sometimes it's hard. We're a meat and potatoes family. If I go to my sister's and her family's, they all go, 'Oh, we don't know what to serve you." They think the whole meal is meat,

she said.
"I will nevereat red meat. It doesn't bother me. I like things like rice and zuchinni and broccoli all mixed up for the holidays. But I have to cook all the other things for my family."

"It's not as hard anymore as it used to be. It's not as hard as people think.

Stewart's parents worried that she wasn't eating enough: "They thought I was going to get sick. I said, 'Hey, I'm line. Who says you have to eat

For Christine Olson, Zerbo's Health Food Supermarket in Livonia, turning vegetarian was an ethica' decision.



"I don't like how the meat industry works. I don't like how the animals are treated. I would never force anybody to be one (vegetarian). This is something personal," she said. "I never had any real problems. My

family has accepted it. If anything we have encouraged family members to become aware of how animals are treated in the industry."

About five years ago, Olson, a Canton resident, took six months to gradually eliminate meat from her diet, starting with red meat and then re-

moving poultry and fish.

For holiday meals, she and her brother, also a vegetarian, prepare their own pasta, salads and macaroni, as well as spooning into the side dishes like stuffing.
"I don't really make a big deal ab-

out it. I just eat what's there on the table," she said, adding that her family and friends are understanding.

"I really haven't had anybody force it on me. If they really are making a big deal about it, put it on your plate and don't eat it. I never have a prob-

lem with people."
"You have to be strong and you have to get your point across. I also make a point not to make anybody feel bad. If my boyfriend wants to eat prime rib or a steak in front of me, I never make a big deal about it. You have to treat others fairly because that's what you want in return," she

When you're stringing lights up outdoors. don't overlook lawn decorations. Create a nativity scene or dot the lawn with charmingly primitive-looking reindeer made with logs and twigs. And lights aren't the only way to perk up trees and shrubs — dress them up with bright streamers of wide red and gold ribbon.

DECK THE HALLS

Deck the halls with anything — poughs of nolly wags of evergreens, garlands of fruit and vegetables. The choice s limitless and he effect is always cheerful.

In "Entertaining in the Victorian Style' (Dutton Studio Books), Marilyn Hansen suggests that festive excess is best:

"To give a Victorian flavor to your decorations, hang garlands of green over doorways and mantels — and over a tall pier mirror if you have one — letting them fall down the sides. Twine greens around the banister or in and out balusters of a prominent staircase."

Hang sprigs of mistletoe in strategic locations. Chandeliers and other hanging light fixtures provide another venue for decorations.

Add a touch of whimsy with decorations made from unusual materials. Create a Southwestern centerpiece of red and green chili peppers. Or decorate an archway with a garland of vegetables for an effect that is surprisingly festive.

Use moss, ornaments, bows, evergreens, dried flowers and other materials to create your garlands. Even include scented sachets

of bay leaves, cloves and innamor o invoke the noliday spirit. Chicke vire orist's tape and wire available at nardware fores and hobby snops will telp ou hape he garland.

Use them to create abletop decorations or dress up tabletop holiday oppraries. Hang them on wreaths or garlands or use them to decorate your packages.

LIGHT THE NIGHT

Warm lighting is another indispensible feature of holiday decorating.

In addition to lighting up the tree, electric lights can be strung across the ceiling or included in a garland.

If you have a fireplace, now is the time to light it. Also use candles to create a warm glow Options range from elegant white or vory tapers in crystal and brass holders to tiny tea candles set in a nest of fragrant potpourri. Or burn scented candles in cheer holiday colors.

Some families use the time a candle burnto celebrate the holidays. Jewish families will spend the half-hour or so it takes a menorah candle to burn to play Hanukkah games.

Or, to create Christmas excitement, but long taper every year and mark it into 25 sections. Beginning on the first of December burn one section each night, spending the time wrapping gifts and preparing for the holiday.

Outdoor lights present a festive face to the world. Tips for lights include using bulbs from the same color family—blue and green for example, or red orange and yellow. Use all minibulbs or all large-size, all colored or all clear bulbs.

Find out what the neighbors are doing. Create a harmonious look on your block with the size and color of your lights.

If you're entertaining, line the way to your front door with festive luminarias — paper bags weighed down with sand and a candle inside.

Their paletted twist on the "greening of America" include colors such as maroon, spice eggplant, rust, sea foam, marine blue, coral, wine, licorice, sandstone, dill, elderberry, burnt cherry, sea green, periwinkle, aubergine, pine and mushroom. Almost sounds like Baskin Robbins 31 flavors ice cream, doesn't it?

In addition, For Members Only sports leather outerwear in skins such as Velvet Suede, Nubuck, Ultra Antique Cow and Waxy Lamb.

JC Penney says all that hunting and fishing President Bush does in his off-hours may have made it very "in" to look like an outdoorsman this fall.

"Men are ready for a break from the fast lane," says JC Penney Fashion Director Joe Sapiendza. "Thery're in a town-and-country mood for the fall."

The impression men are toughing it includes napped, suede, stonewashed, sandwashed and brushed looks in cotton and flannels for shirts, pants and jackets. Rugged individualists and countrified city slickers alike also will see lots of leather and suede outerwear. Expect leaf colors for slacks as well as shades of sage and olive. And lots of blue-green tints: alpine green, spruce green, teal green. moss and hunter green, etc.

This fall, denims, the staple of men's wear, are lighter and more urbane looking. Work shirts by Joseph Aboud come in faded and dark indigo and stonewashed for a soft hand. Jeans are snug at the seat but loose on the thighs. Shirts have an easy drape, deep armholes, two pockets and rivet-style buttons. Classic denims also are playing at your local Gap, Banana Republic, Barneys, Macy's, JC Penney, etc.

"It's not just about cowboys and country and western, anymore," says Lou Holtz of the

Mention the name "Polo" and two images come to mind: Marco Polo and Ralph Lauren fashions for men, the clothing line he founded in 1968. What's on Lauren's hot list? Hilfiger also offers the Fraternity (no explanation needed), Academy (European accent) and Harvest (town and country) lines of clothing.

In other fashion news for the man with everything: Brooks Bros. says its suit line will recall the 1920s (long, lean, very elegant);

Austin Reed of Regent Street says adios to the Green Decade with its British-influenced country gentleman look, and the Leather Apparel Association says men will be hot to trot in new color combinations of olive, curry and mustard over the standard black and brown bomber.

States Postal Service Express Mail nextday delivery will get packages to their destinations on Dec. 25.

How do you ensure that presents are not broken or damaged during shipping? According to Sandy Greenberg, representative for Mail Boxes Etc., a 1,200-outlet national franchise network of business and postal services, the majority of shipping damage occurs because of careless or improper packaging.

"Your parcel should be able to withstand stacking, bumping or even a 30-foot drop," says Greenberg.

Packing experts at Mail Boxes Etc. have

successfull packaged and shipped gifts that range from an original Picasso painting to a stuffed and mounted rattlesnake. They offer the following conditions:

·Always use a rigid, corrugated cardboard box. Containers should be in good condition, with all flaps intact. Select a carton large enough to allow room for adequate cushioning material on all sides of the product Beware of using boxes more than once, since they lose resiliency in travel.


•Be sure the contents of your package are properly protected. Wrap each item separately, stuffing cushioning material firmly around, over and between items. Pack glass and china in a smaller box with 2 to 4 inches of packing materials between the two; the box shouldn't rattle. Foam peanuts are better than crumpled newspaper.

> •Close the carton securely using strong tape, 2 inches or wider. Do not use masking tape or cellophane tape because they crack and peel when exposed to heat or cold and don't provide necessary strength. Instead, use pressure-sensitive plastic tape, water-activated paper tape or wateractivated reinforced tape. Do not use string or paper on packages, these can get snagged on conveyor belts.

·Apply proper labeling. Always place clear tape over the label so ink will not smear; put an extra address label inside the box in case the outside is damaged. Include complete return addres and the ZIP code with the complete mailing address. Put the recipient's phone number on the label when

addressing to a post office box or a rural route; include the apartment number for all multidwelling addresses. Place the delivery label on top of the carton with no other address label — and never place the label over a seam or closure or on top of sealing

For peace of mind, insure the package (the cost is minimal). If you're sending a highticket item, the most secure way is to send it registered mail.



How to wrap thoses tasty edibles for the season

It's more pleasing, somehow, to present edible gifts in open containers rather than hiding them inside boxes.

You'll want to choose a container that is useful long after its contents have been enjoyed. A wonderful woven basket, for example, can become a towel or magazine holder.

But beyond baskets, you can pack your items in such creative containers as an outsize salad bowl, ice bucket or even a wire gardening basket. It's better to select a smaller

container that will look brimming full, rather than a large one that seems to have lots of

To add a warm, elegant touch to your gift, line the container with a swatch of colorful fabric. Other alternatives are tissue paper or lightweight wrapping paper.

Wrap in clear plastic, tied simply with a ribbon; busy paper and frills can detract rather than enhance—but you might want to tie an ornament or two in with the ribbon.

James people play

Whether they roll the dice or pick a card, folks are moving forward in this post-Nintendo age to enjoy good ol' games that promote human interaction - no flashing TV screens, no joysticks, no computerized sounds. Just a few hours of fun between parent and child, siblings or a dinner party of adults.

While classic games such as Monopoly, The Game of Life and Scrabble — and new classics such as Pictionary, Outburst and Scattergories — are family favorites, there are more than a few new worthwhile amusements on the table this holiday season.

TV's Simpsons family and Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles both are game-sakes this season, and kiddie takeoffs of grown-up games and adult guessing contests are two fast-moving categories.

With the selection available, the biggest game in town this season may be deciding which games are right for your family.

A trip to any hobby shop, stationery outlet or bookstore will take you 'round the board of games — but for now just head to start, roll the dice and follow us on a brief tour of some of the season's blockbusters for every age and situation.

Perhaps one of the hottest categories of games is that for adults.

Get folks into the party spirit with Encore! by Parker Brothers. Competing teams challenge each other to come up with - and sing - songs from selected categories, such as any song that contains the word "heart." The team with the biggest repertoire wins.

Parker Brothers also offers Claim to Fame, in which players will talk, draw pantomime - they'll do anything to get their teamates to say five specific things that made a certain celbrity famous. Each of the game cards lists a famous person and five claims to fame -

such as a rock star's five greatest hits.

Clever Endeavor by The Games Gang was invented by people across the United States. Thousands of people submitted clues for this game of hints and guesses. Each card offers six clues about a specific person, place or thing. The clues are read aloud one at a time, and the player who guesses the correct answer first scores. The fewer clues needed, the higher the score.

Gender Bender by The Games Gang is a sort of matching game that challenges players to think like a member of the opposite sex. In a sample round, a male player is asked a "suppose you were a woman" multiplechoice question. He attempts to guess how the female players will answer, and scores a point for each woman he matches. Topics range from dating and sex to politics and finance.

From Golden Games comes a variety of successors to its popular Outburst. Look for Outburst II with its all-new topics to challenge and entertain. Teams work against the clock to shout out the 10 items listed on topical cards such as "things in a taxicab" and "heavy-metal music groups." In Bible Outburst, players shout out guesses to categories such as "10 books of the Old Testament."

Milton-Bradley brings glasnost to the United States with its Gorbachev game. Players take a romp through the Soviet Union on a search for things like American blue jeans and Japanese cameras. The player who acquires the most Western-style items wins.

When it's time for family-style play rather than adult dinner party action, here are some winning games ffor kids over 10 and adults to share.

An environmental board game by Aristoplay Ltd. called Pollution Solution encour-

ages players to think green. Each player owns various sections of the PS Township playing board. Pollution hits randomly throughout the town, and players learn solutions to stop the spread and protect the township.

Bilingual families can pick up Milton-Bradley's Sabado Gigante, based on the popular Hispanic television program that features singing, dancing, special guests and contests. The board game features six of the games currently played on the show for Spanish-English good times. Buena suerte!

Cardinal Industries presents another TV takeoff in its The Simpsons Mystery of Life Game. Each player assumes the role of one of the show's characters and has an agenda card he has to complete to win. For example, Marge has to get her hair done, go grocery shopping, etc. In the spirit of the show, players can sabotage each other's accomplishments — for example, Bart can mess up Marge's hair after she has it done. Ay carumba, dude!

For younger kids, 5 and up, look to games such as Golden Games' Whacky Blasters. Each player gets a chance to be a blow-hard as he uses a Whacky Blaster to blow a Puffball up the mountainside to the summit. Players must get through obstacles like Volcano Valley, and one wrong blow can send a player falling down the mountain back to start.

Parker Brothers brings the Magic Kingdom into your home with the Disney Game. Players move their train-shaped tokens around the Disneyland map board collecting point cards as they visit Adventureland, Tomorrowland, Fantasyland, etc., and meet Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck and other favorite Disney characters. Whoever collects the most points before the park "closes" wins.

If your little ones love to shout "cow-

abunga" and eat pizza, take a look at the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles Tower of Doom by International Games. The games with the turtles trapped in the Tower of Doom, a city scene wiht a plastic sewer tunnel. Players pull Ninja swords out of the tower to free the turtles, sending them swooshing down through the sewer. Players win a piece of pizza each time they use Rescue Scoops to catch a turtle; if a player catches an enemy by mistake, he loses a piece of pizza. The first player to collect six pieces







Picking your tannenbaum treasures



Combined beloved heirlooms and handmade ornaments to create a tree thats traditional and individual. The tree shown here is *Memory Tree* from "The Spirit of Christmas-Book Two."

Every Christmas, my mother couldn't resist getting creative with the family tree. After years of living with flocked trees, we switched to an ecologically correct living pine.

Then she dispensed with the traditional pine or spruce altogether, choosing to embellish our ficus benjimina with tiny clear lights, which looked oddly fitting for a Southern California Christmas, which drooped nade the ree look embarassed

But it was our family s treasured annenbaum — the perfect home for Mom's elaborately wrapped gifts (she had a penchant for intricate Egyptian motifs)

If the ficus is our family tree, early celebrants favored small potted cherry and hawthorn trees during the holidays. The first decorated trees surfaced in Alsace in the early 17th century.

We have Queen Victoria's German royal consort, Prince Albert, to thank for the lavishly decorated trees we now associate with the holiday. When German immigrants brought the tradition to the United States, we added our own homespun touch with strings of popcorn and cranberries.

To this day, my mother's ficus notwithstanding, tradition reigns supreme during the holidays, and most families opt for a pine, spruce or fir.

There is a myriad of places to find your perfect tree. Every year, empty lots are transformed into tree emporiums. You'll also find trees at large home improvement stores and nurseries. For those city folk who want the experience of chopping down their own trees, there are tree farms.

SELECTING A TREE

Start by deciding where the tree will go and measuring the space. Remember that a tree that's too large is overpowering while one that's too small loses impact.

Then shop early in the season, when you'll have the best selection of fresh trees. You can judge a tree's freshness by its needles, which should be resilient and flexible. (Needles that snap when bent indicate a dried-out tree). Pull your hand across a branch — needles shouldn't fall off in your hand. Then lift the tree a few inches and let it drop on its stump. Green outer needles shouldn't fall off.

Consider how you'll decorate the tree. If you plan to load it with heavy ornaments, opt for a hardy balsam or noble fir. The Fraser fir has short, soft needles and open branches that

are better for lighter ornaments. Other options are the dense, bushy Scotch pine and the silver-green Colorado blue spruce.

TREE SAFETY

Once you've selected the tree, keep it in a protected place outdoors until you re ready to decorate it

Make a straight cut across the trunk 1 inch above the original cut and put the free in a pail of fresh water. It will drink up to a gallon in the first 24 hours, tapering of after that. Make sure the water level stays above the cut line.

Use a tree stand with a water bowl or a Tree I-Vee system (an intravenous feeding system for your tree; it's available at nurseries) to keep it watered. You even can add a commercial plant nutrient to the water. Check the tree's water supply daily.

Keep the tree away from drafts and heat. Avoid setting it up near fireplaces, television sets, heating vents or radiators. Also make sure lights are in good condition before stringing them on the tree. Opt for miniature lights instead of the old fashioned strings of larger bulbs; not only do they twinkle festively, but they're less likely to spark a fire.

After the holidays, the best way to dispose of your tree is to recycle it by chopping it up for garden mulch. Avoid the temptation to dispose of it by burning it in the fireplace.

TREE TRIMMING

Safety tips aside, the real fun of having a tree is decorating it. These days, the trend is toward the traditional.

Trees are festooned with beloved family ornaments. Everything from bona fide heirlooms to the bread dough Santa Susie made in second grade finds a home on the tree.

If you don't have boxes of treasured heirlooms, you can create your own tradition. Maybe you'd like the Americana feeling of plaid bows and strings of cranberries and popcorn. Or you can opt for a more sophisticated tree.

Not all of us have an eye for tree-trimming, however, and a little help will go a long way. You can turn tree-trimming into a social event and ask friends over to help with the chore.

Or you can hire an interior decorator or a florist to do the job.







Gift bags, bright tissue paper and small ornaments make it easy to create pretty packages in a hurry.

Quick, clever ways to package gifts

Wrapping gifts can be fun or a hassle, an opportunity to exercise your creativity and ingenuity or an unwelcome way to spend precious time.

However you see it, heed the following and you'll find the process more enjoyable.

IF YOU HAVE TIME

Put extra sparkle in your holidays by wrapping a gift in an especially creative or beautiful way.

Use tinsel instead of ribbon, for example. Or tie some foil "icicles" into the bow. Jazz up a package with a small, shiny Christmas ball or appealing hand-crafted ornament; add a few tiny tinkling bells.

Select something unusual for gift wrap—the Sunday funnies, tin foil, wallpaper or fabric with a holday print or something with texture, such as velvet, velour, silk or chamois.

Make you own wrap, and encourage the kids to help. Start with white butcher paper, then embellish it with pine trees drawn with felt pens, a repeating star pattern, goofy elves and reindeer, red-and-green abstract designs, patterns made with rubber stamps or stickers sold by the roll.

Tie a spring of mistletoe on the gift and hold it above the recipient when you give it to

him or her. (All the better if the gift is lingerie or jewelry!)

Take a big piece of white paper and write a huge (felt pen) letter to Grandma or another out-of-town loved one; then wrap the gift with it.

Visit a craft or variety stre for unusual embellishments, such as silk poinsettias, feathers, pompoms, metallic yarn, colorful miniature birds, pipe cleaners (use them to spell names, make ornaments) and more.

Hobby shop "sleds" made of balsa wood can be used to hold festive packages — and they also make attractive centerpieces.

Handmade gift tags can become lasting treasures.

Cut tiny snowflakes from colored tissue paper and glue them on tags of heavy white paper. Or have your toddler "draw" a picture of the recipient on the tag (Grandma will love it).

You can also make tags from cut-up greeting cards and used calendar pages. Heavyweight wrapping paper works well, too, or stiffen regular wrapping paper with a layer of clear contact paper; punch a hole in one corner for the string.

Women can apply bright red lipstick to their lips and then use them to stamp kisses on a white tag or plainly wrapped gift.

Instead of words on your gift tags, use pictures. On the front of a card, a snapshot of

the recipient; on the inside a photo of the giver.

Traditionalists will be pleased that even "ordinary" gift-wrap items have been improved. New curling ribbons come in metallic colors, and bows and tags are now patterned to match papers.

IF YOU DON'T

Let's say you remembered to buy wrapping paper, ribbon, tape, tissue and tags — in sufficient quantity — and you've located the scissors. If you have 20 gifts to wrap, at 10 minutes each, you'll spend over three hours at it.

That's not a small chunk of time, particularly at this time of year (and it doesn't include cleaning up bits and pieces of paper and ribbon and finding a place to stash the rest).

Fortunately, card and gift-wrap manufacturers realize that many people who love to give gorgeous presents loathe the wrapping process, and they've come up with a solution: handsome decorated gift bags and boxes.

All you have to do is slip your item into the container; add tissue, a bow and a tag (if you wish). A bonus is that the bag or box is a gift in itself and will probably be reused by the recipient.

Carlton's Euro Bags, for example, feature vibrantly colored traditional holiday scenes and subjects and a durable, high-gloss laminated suface. Rope handles make the bags even sturdier.

Lighter-weight bags with pinched and flat bottoms are ideal for last-minute gifts or gifts that come in bottles. Decorative boxes come in several sizes: large (bathrobe size), medium (shirts or blouses), and small (lingerie, gloves, scarves).

Bag designs get more clever every year, and many of the this year's crop appeal to kids. American Greetings features a cartoon polar bear skipping (his jump rope is the bag handle). Other new designs include cartoonish caroling reindeer and Santa making his rounds.

But what if you bought something big, bulky and awkward to wrap? Not a problem. Slide that sled, doll house or tricycle into a huge red or green plastic bag imprinted with a holiday pattern. (These larger gift bags can be found in stationery stores and shops that specialize in containers).

Another way to "wrap" an awkward gift is to enclose a picture of it in a card. The recipient has the pleasure of anticipation, giftunwrapping and surprise; you can keep the object hidden in a closet or the trunk of your car.

Holiday gifts from your kitchen

Does the idea of fighting the crowds in search of gifts for friends and relatives leave you with a "Bah, humbug" attitude?

Here's one cure: stay home and cook. Give 'em goodies from your kitchen: breads, muffins, cookies—or herb mixtures and flavored vinegars, oils and mustards. (In this season of excess, foods that last beyond the holidays are a good idea.)

GIFT BASKETS

It's fun to select themes and design gift baskets. A "country holiday" basket, for instance, might contain fresh biscuits and jams, while a "high tea" hamper could feature a platter of scones, special teas and holiday napkins.

A "holiday vaking" ensemble might include recipes, cookie cutters and a rolling pin. "Holiday brunch" could have French

bread, goat cheese and plenty of fresh fruit and pastries.

A "pancake basket" might contain different kinds of mixes and syrups; a "treat basket," Belgian chocolates and champagne.

For someone who loves to cook, stuff an oversize kitchen mitt with small kitchen accessories or an interesting assortment of gadgets (cookie cutters, an apple peeler, colorful measuring spoons, wire whisks in several sizes).

Combine mustard seed, mustard, turmeric, tarragon and boiling water in small bowl and let stand for 1 hour. After 45 or 50 minutes, combine vinegar, wine, oil, sugar, onion, garlic and spices in saucepan.

Bring to a boil and simmer 5 minutes. Pour mixture into blender or food processor, add

mustard mixture and blend for two minutes.

BRANDY-APRICOT JELLY

3 cups apricot nectar

7 cups granulated sugar

1ba1/2ea cups brandy 4 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

ba3/4ea cup liquid fruit pectin

Yields 8 cups.

Combine apricot nectar, sugar, brandy and lemon juice in sauce pan. Bring to a boil and cook for two minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in pectin.

Mix well, and skim off any foam. Pour jelly into sterilized jars and seal with parraffin.

ORIENTAL ALMONDS

4 cups blanched almonds

bal/2ea cup butter or margarine

4 tablespoons soy sauce

4 tablespoons dry sherry

bal/2ea to 1 teaspoon ground ginger



Ringing in a bright new year

Pull that time-worn rug out from under the old year and roll out the red carpet for the new year with a novel New Year's celebration. Here are some approaches guaranteed to launch you, your family and friends into a Happy New Year.

With all eyes focused on the clock, the countdown to midnight can be interminable. Don't invite guests until at least 9 p.m. Avoid the peril of watched watches by padding out the evening with absorbing activities.

Marvelous food is made more engaging when guests are involved in its preparation. Work with a group of from 10 to 20 people. A festive menu might be Sherried Consomme with Miniature Lemon Biscuits, Broiled Oysters with Pureed Mushrooms, Pear Ice, Filet Mignon, Rosemary Scalloped Potatoes, Sauteed Winter Vegetables, Escarole Salad with Avocado and Orange Slices, Chevre Cheese with Walnut Bread and Pine Nut Tart.

Less elaborate but still all-inclusive are doit-yourself events. A late evening omelet party makes eating a more casual but still time-absorbing affair. Get together several frying pans and make a huge bowl or pitcher full of beaten eggs. Have omelet-making instructions and the butter near the stove. Close at hand, offer a variety of fillings such as artichoke hearts, sauteed mushrooms, scallions, sliced sausage, cheese, minced parsley, caviar and sour cream.


Your friends may want to try more than one variety during the course of the evening. Keep a steady supply of warm wheat bread and champagne circling. As midnight approaches, break out the sorbet assortment and chocolate truffles. This kind of buffet lends itself to charades or trivia games.

If you feel up to preparing the whole meal yourself but are short on ideas, consult the "The Fearrington House Cookbook" (Ventana Press) by Jenny Fitch. This lovely book shares the secrets of a popular Southern restaurant, including the six winter menus and seasonal flower arranging instructions.

An abundance of bubbly on hand makes for an effervescent beginning to the the new year. Good and reasonably priced are Cadiz Champenoise, Schramsberg Blanc de Blanc, Culbertson's Brut Rose and Piper Sonomas's Blanc de Noir.

Friends who are musicians can be invited to bring their instruments and favorite sheet music. These kind of impromptu musicales can ignite a shared enthusiasm that should reach a pitch in time for "Auld Lang Syne."

Roll back the rugs, turn down the lights and throw on some classic dance tunes from the big band era.



Ring in the new year with a glass of bubbly and festive decorations.

Occasions for true formality are few for most people. Why not have everyone come in black tie. Issue invitations well in advance so your guests will have time to get glamorous. Or ask them to create New Year's themed masks or futuristic costumes to wear to the event.

Canned streamers, confetti, crepe paper, balloons, noisemakers and paper hats comprise the usual New Year's Eve decor. This season's favorite styles are black with metallic combos. Silver Mylar curtains, balloons and ribbons extend the reflective glitter. A big paper Chinese dragon can be tethered to ceiling fixtures. If budget allows, rent a bubblemaker and strobe light.

Some party purveyors rent animated figures — Father Time, New Year's babies with champagne glasses or huge champagne bottles. Load up on rich-hued flowering plants such as poinsettias and azaleas to accent tables and corners.

It's a Southern belief that no new year should be undertaken without eating black-eyed peas. These hearty legumes, properly prepared, make a delicious stew that can double as a hangover remedy. Invite your nearest and dearest to relax and recover on New Year's Day afternoon.

HOPPIN' JOHN

- 2 chopped onions
- 8 ounces bacon, fried (reserve drippings)
- 8 ounces dried black-eyed peas, soaked overnight with water to cover
 - 2 cloves minced garlic
 - 1 tablespoon salt
 - 1 chopped green pepper
 - 1 cup chopped parsley
- Tabasco sauce
- 1 lemon
- 1/2 pound shredded Monterey Jack cheese Yields six servings.

Cook onions in 6 tablespoons of bacon drippings over medium heat until translucent but not browned. Put peas and onions in Dutch oven and cover with water. Bring to boil, reduce heat to simmer and continue cooking for an hour. Add garlic, salt, green pepper, parsley and several shakes of Tabasco. Continue cooking for 20 more minutes. Taste for seasoning and add a few squeezes of lemon juice as desired. Serve garnished with crumbled bacon and cheese. Accompany with crisp green salad and corn bread.

Persuade your guests to hop around the table when the Hoppin' John is served as they did in yesteryear. Conduct a resolution-making ritual. Each guest can inscribe his or her best intentions on parchment. The document will be John Hancocked by all present, then buried, burned or even shredded and swallowed.

HANNIKAH Eight days of light



What, exactly, is Hanukkah?

There are those who sail through the holidays thinking it's simply the Jewish version of Chrisimas, a major event of well-wishing and gift-giving that revolves around a candelabrum rather than a tree.

There are those who know better. And there are more and more who are learning.

As interfaith marriages become increasingly common, and as we go with the shift back to basic beliefs and familiar ground on which to raise our children, the "true meaning" of Hanukkah becomes as important as getting beyond the wrapping paper of any commercialized holiday.

Here, then, is a brief explanation of this special holiday.

The story is this: In the second century B.C., Palestine was caught in a rivalry between the two great Hellenistic powers (Egypt and Syria), which divided the empire of Alexander the Great. Under Syrian power, there was a campaign to establish political and religious conformity in "Hellenizing" the Jews, forcing them to adopt Greek dress and customs.

Even more serious, the Syrian emperor decreed that the Temple in Jerusalem, the national house of worship, would become a temple to the Greek god Zeus.

A small band of soldiers, led by Judas Maccabeus, staged a successful rebellion against the Syrians, and rededicated the Temple. (In Hebrew, Hanukkah means "dedication.") Jewish customs were reinstituted, as was the traditional Jewish worship service.

A miracle occurred during the rededication of the Temple: when the Jews sought to rekindle the sacred lamp in the Temple sanctuary, there was only enough pure oil to last a single day. (Although there was more than enough oil to keep the lamp lit, there was only a small amount of pure, holy oil — signifigant in the importance of purity to the people.)

But the lamp, to the worshipers' amazement, spread light for eight days; thus, the Hanukkah celebration came also to be known as the Festival of Lights.

And this is how it has come to be celebrated: the candelabrum, called a menorah, holds eight lamps (or candles today) representing the eight days the lamp in the Temple burned. The ninth holder on the menorah is for the candle from which all the others are lit

The story goes that the traditional shape of the menorah was fashioned after the sage plant, Salvia officinalis, a hardy bush that survived in the desert granite of the Sinai wilderness — as did the Israelites who traveled this harsh place on their way to the Promised Land.

The plant's growth pattern is a single, upright branch with symmetrical branches sprouting on either side. At the tip of each branch, oil glistens on unopened buds — and

so the oil in the tips, or cruses, of the branching menorah.

The first night of the eight-day celebration is usually the favorite, with family gathered around the menorah for the first lighting. Songs and prayers are illuminated by the flickering light, and children are told the story of the small band of brave soliders who fought an army for the purity of the Jewish belief.

Because the Jews believe that a story told with food is a story remembered, Hanukkah tradition calls for foods fried in oil, the most loved of which is the potato latke (potato pancake) served with applesauce and sour cream. Here's one recipe:

Wash and peel 4 medium potatoes and soak in cold water for about two hours. Grate them and squeeze out excess liquid. Peel and grate a medium onion into the potatoes. Add a lightly beaten egg, a tablespoon of flour, a bit of salt, pepper and nutmeg, and 1/2 teaspoon baking powder. Mix well.

Heat butter or peanut oil (for less cholesterol) to very hot in a skillet; drop pancakes in by the tablespoonful, flatten slightly, and brown gently on both sides. Add more oil as needed for remaining batches.

Also symbolic are cheese and dairy products; the tale told is of the brave heroine Judith. It is written in the Apocrypha that the beautiful widow arranged to dine with an enemy general who had plans to destroy her town.

Judith fed the general cheese and great quantities of wine, which caused him to fall asleep in a drunken stupor. She then beheaded him! Without their leader, his army fled, and the town was saved. Her bravery is said to have inspired Judas Maccabeus and his followers.

If you're invited to a Hanukkah celebration, bring the children Hanukkah gelt, or gold foil-covered chocolate coins. Most scholars believe this tradition originated in Eastern Europe during the Middle Ages when gifts of pocket change were tossed to children during the holidays.

For very special children, consider a gift of real gold: each year the Israeli government mints a commemorative coin celebrating Hanukkah. They're available through coin dealers and some jewelers.

The dreidel is another child's delight at this time of year. The four-sided top is marked with Hebrew letters representing the phrase, "a great miracle happened here."

Anyone newly familiar with Hanukkah — whether through marriage or friendship — might be surprised to discover the number of cards and decorations marking the holiday. It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas, in other words.

Most communities offer public celebrations, readings and ceremonies marking this special time of year. To find them, contact a nearby synagogue.

Our Pilgrimage to Bethlehem

ach Christmas we make a pilgrimage, in spirit, to Bethlehem. It is always an interesting adventure.

The journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem was 80 miles. That seems a short trip to those of us living in the fast lane. But for those of that day it was an arduous journey of several days.

All kinds of people would have been en route. The first such mass pilgrimage on record occurred when "there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus, that all the world should be taxed (Luke 2:1, KJV)." Among the travelers on that occasion were, of course, Mary and Joseph of Nazareth.

Most, no doubt, complained about the need for the trip. Perhaps many asked, "Why do they need more money? Why must we be taxed again? How is the little man going to make it?" Others would have been concerned about the need to change their schedules or miss work. In short, they were absorbed with current events, unaware that they were in the very city and at the precise time when God would speak with a world-shaking, calendar-changing event, the birth of His Son. Sadly, most left Bethlehem with no understanding about what had happened.

Scripture, of course, contained well-known prophecies about the coming Messiah. Through the centuries His coming had been not only foretold but longed for and anticipated. We do not know how many others, like Joseph and Mary, were required to go to Bethlehem. But it certainly would have been a major movement. The account that there was no room at the inn further substantiates this.

Just as many in that day failed to comprehend the significance of the events, so today many will not perceive the true meaning of this annual pilgrimage. For them the trek will be uneventful. They will not understand what it is all about, nor will they enter into the spirit and sense of this holy season. For others, it will be a crowded, somewhat helter-skelter trek, with frantic rushing here and there and only a passing thought about what they are really doing and why they are found on this road to Bethlehem. Still others will profit from the crass commercialism that takes advantage of the season, without participating in or accepting any of its eternal truths.

But for those of the faith, this season is a wondrous spiritual saga. We contemplate God's action in history. We note that His previous actions to reconcile sinful man to Himself failed. So, in a final act of love and mercy, He interrupted the affairs of the world, the plans of man, and boldly arrived on the face of the earth in the person of Jesus Christ. We are aware that all has changed.

Shepherds of old who witnessed this event could never again think of God or themselves in quite the same way. When they returned from Bethlehem to find pasture for their sheep, it was not to the previous dull, uneventful life. They had seen the very Son of God and they glorified and praised Him.

The wise men came to Bethlehem with no illusions about the world in which they lived. They knew its wickedness. They knew the evil ruler Herod. They were alerted to the rebelliousness of men and women. But they knew that new

hope had arrived and that evil would be defeated. They had not only seen a star but, more significantly, they had seen a Savior, and the world would never be the same again. They returned a better way, and so must we.

The aged Simeon, who worshiped regularly in the temple, was promised by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death until he had seen the Christ. He knew the joy of faith against odds, and faith rewarded. With the naked eye, he saw only a babe in arms. Spiritual insight helped him see that he held a gift for all the world, a great light unveiled, a spark that would grow, a glory revealed, a Savior. We of this era may also have granted to us at Christmas a glimpse of God in the face of Jesus Christ. Let it not be fast, fleeting and too quickly fading, but rather an enduring revelation of the radiant Christ.

Upon our return from Bethlehem, are we unchanged in direction, no different in pace, similar in spirit as when we arrived? If so, we will have missed the mighty meaning and miracle of Christmas.

Let us return from our Bethlehem trek glorifying and praising God with new light for our path, with increased faith in the ultimate victory, knowing again the faithfulness of God. Then we will not have kept this Christmas in vain.

What's New About Christmas?

Recently someone asked me, "What can you say that is new about Christmas?" He was referring to the fact that I have to write innumerable articles and speak so often during the Christmas season.

"Do I have to say something new about Christmas?" I thought. Of course, we live in an age that is obsessed with novelty. We overuse the word "new." We hear so much about "radical new ideas," "new insights," "new techniques," "new fashions." This age is often called "the age of obsolescence." Nothing is made to last. We are always looking for something new.

Why must we always have to "say something new"—even about Christmas?

Dr. Samuel Johnson wrote, "The number of new things a man needs to learn is less important than the number of old things he needs to be reminded of." Wise words.

So Christmas can be an annual refresher course in the things we need to be reminded of. There's a grave danger that the lessons may be lost in the overlay of Christmas wrappings like trees and tinsel, carols and cards. Can I invite you to stop for a moment and consider those facets of Christmas that we need to be reminded of?

Christmas reveals God's great intention to restore to mankind the

image—the divine family likeness—which has been spoiled by sin.

His plan was that His Son, Jesus, should be born to a simple Jewish girl of unblemished character and live among us, sharing our life, identifying with us, in preparation for the day that He would become our Savior and Lord. Let's remind ourselves of that.

Christmas reminds us that here is God at work in the most unexpected way, in the most unlikely place, through the most surprisingly ordinary people.

This poem about the innkeeper who gave space in the stable for Mary and Joseph makes the point so well:

THE INNKEEPER LOOKS BACK

There were, after all, extenuating circumstances;

The holiday season is always heavy and we were quite booked out.

I felt very sorry for his wife, of course, but you can't have women Having babies all over your hotel And disturbing the guests. I've got my living to make.

I would ask you to bear that in mind. Had we known, of course, at the time, He could have had

Our own room; we would have been honored—

But how am I supposed to recognize
God when He comes asking for help
In places where I don't expect to find
Him?

We need to remind ourselves that

God comes to us, too, in places where we would not expect to find Him. So be watchful this Christmas!

We need to be reminded that in God's plan, Jesus broke through all the barriers and effected a reconciliation between a loving Father God and His rebellious offspring. We can't separate Bethlehem and Calvary, and we need to give thanks to God for both at Christmas time.

In this world of broken relationships, we need to remember that in Christ Jesus there is the hope of families brought together again, of nations reconciled, of people living in harmony.

We need to be reminded that there is joy for everyone at Christmas, like the joy of that first Christmas.

If it's true that there is joy in heaven over one sinner who repents, then the angel hosts over Bethlehem must have sung with ecstasy when the Redeemer of all mankind was born. What "tidings of great joy" they carolled on that starry night.

The humble shepherds returned to their fields and their flocks "rejoicing and praising God" because they'd been let in to see the King of Kings born that day.

The learned wise men, those seekers after truth, "rejoiced with exceeding great joy" when they saw

the bright star and found the Christ child. That disproves the contention that the gospel story is only for the simple, and therefore unacceptable to the intelligent and well-educated.

Yes, there's joy for the simple and the noble, the working man and the scholar, the housewife and the business executive. But we cannot truly know that joy—know it at depth—until Jesus is "born in us," as an English carol says. That is a mysterious expression, but it is the work of the Holy Spirit to bring Jesus Christ alive in us.

Someone has written, "Which is more remarkable? That the Holy

Spirit should form Christ in the Virgin Mary or that He should form Christ in me?"

When we allow Him, the Holy Spirit acts in our lives to reproduce the life of Christ in you and me. That's the wonderful, deep and divine meaning of Christmas that we need to be reminded of. That's why we can sing, "O holy Child of Bethlehem, be born in us today." And that's the source of true joy.

What do you want for Christmas? How do you answer that perennial question? Can you say, "I want to see God's plan brought to completion in my life as the meaning of Christ's coming is made more per-

sonal and real to me this Christmas"?

So what's new about that? Nothing, really. It's just a restatement of the old things we need to be reminded of, don't you think?

The Crippled Camel

he sky at dawn two days before Christmas was cold and leaden, too rigid to yield even a desperate flake or two. As I peered out the nursery window, I felt winter in my soul. I had taken little interest in the carols, the gift-buying and the parties. The Christmas spirit, whatever that was, had flown like some unhappy ghost.

I had been so full of expectation and dreams. Every new mother knows such exhilaration. But a few days following the birth of our first son we discovered the fragility of dreams. Something was making our baby sick. After Christmas he was to return to the hospital for more tests.

What did the future hold? I wondered. How could I continue my life as a Salvation Army officer if my child did not get well? Uncertainty ate every small corner of joy. I was alone that day, as my husband carried on the work of the corps for both of us. And that only deepened my distress.

How could I come to Christmas? I unearthed the box that always signaled Advent in our home. With fingers made mechanical by sadness, I unwrapped the figures and placed them on the mantel. First came Mary, gentle—eyed and soft in her blue gown, then Joseph, watching the small Savior through solemn eyes.

The animals, the shepherds, the white-robed angel, all stood where I placed them and gave no message to me. One news-wrapped figure remained in the bottom of the storage box. It would be the poor crippled camel.

It had happened when I was a child. Some draft had blown the flame of a candle, and a fire had quickly ignited. Most of the creche figures had to be discarded . . . an angel with one arm and her harp torn away, a shepherd with no feet and sheep blackened beyond recognition. Mother had saved the camel, perhaps because only its legs were gone, and it could be displayed as a resting camel, burned stubs camouflaged by dime—store cotton.

I tore away the paper and held the creature in my hand. Mahogany ears and proud neck, humped back with its gaily-colored burdens it could no longer carry and four little charcoal stubs where the animal's strong legs had been. Suddenly, I felt akin to the creature. I looked into the patient, enigmatic eyes and saw there the consummate sufferings of the world and my own personal pain.

Gently I set the camel inside the stable—behind the manger where no one could see its disfigurement. No one, perhaps, but the Christ cradled on yellow straw so near that the warmth of Heaven encircled the beast like holy breath.

It was then I remembered the why of Christmas and that the Child born that day had come to suffer, to take upon Himself the pain of a burdened human race. "A Man of sorrows and acquainted with grief," Isaiah had written. "He has borne our sorrows and carried our griefs." His life would culminate in a cross so terrible, yet so wonderful, that death and its sting would be vanquished forever.

He identified with us in our deepest sufferings and rose triumphant over sin and grief. "Lo, He comes with healing in His wings." The whispered promise filled me with an astounding sense of His presence and peace.

I had come to Christmas with my suffering and a wistful longing for what I did not know. It was for Him. Suddenly the future held no threat, the present no hurt but the sweet ache of loving and being loved by the One who said, "Lo I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

I touched the crippled camel's ears and thought him the most noble of creatures. Christmas had come. Unexplainable joy reigned where my sadness had been.

I felt winter in my soul. Uncertainty ate all my joy. How could I celebrate Christmas?

The funds are used to assist about six and one-half million people during the holidays.

During the Christmas season, everything The Salvation Army does is increased. More ill and elderly people are visited, more children receive gifts, more homeless people receive beds, nutritious meals and counseling, and more people hear the message of Jesus Christ.

The red kettle is the medium for this increase in service, and the generosity of the public is the reason.

Last year, the Army's efforts to serve over 6 million people at Christmas time were jeopardized when some malls and stores around the nation prohibited the familiar red kettles manned by volunteer bell ringers. When First Lady Barbara Bush learned that nearly half the malls in the nation's capital had taken this action, she promptly

made public her support of the Army's drive to feed the hungry, house the homeless, comfort the distressed and give love and hope to children in need.

The bell ringers also characterize the spirit of the season. One shopper noted, "You hear

the bell ringing and you know it's Christmas."

When Mrs. Bush told a bell ringer last year, "What great work you do. I'm a great fan of The Salvation Army," she was referring to the dictum that the Army puts into action through its shelters, rehabilitation programs, services for battered women, day-care centers, probation services and hundreds of community-based charitable activities: "Inasmuch as you have done it for one of these, you did it for me."

Let Heaven Catch your Eye this

The exploits of the Star Ship Enterprise and its coura-Legeous crew remain a flight of imagination for most of us, even with the recent dramatic developments in space exploration. We may never mount a "Star Trek" exploring new worlds and boldly going where no man has gone before. But each Christmas becomes a "Star Trek" for the faithful, begun long centuries ago when magi from the East followed a brilliant star to the little town of Bethlehem. Those early astronomers were captivated by the light that dominated the western sky. Clearly, heaven had a story to tell.

To the magi it was all an omen. There was an event to be marked, perhaps a birth to celebrate. We know little about these men, even their actual number. We know only that they were drawn irresistibly by this fascinating phenomenon, crossing the desert to the land of Israel and the place where the Christ child was born. There they offered Him royal gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

How much can be missed when the garish lights about us block out the glory above us. The season's celebrations must not be allowed to obscure the event. Christmas is a time when we should let heaven catch our eye.

What happened in Bethlehem two thousand years ago merited a heavenly announcement. It was good news for all people everywhere and in every age. "I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you. He is Christ the Lord!" (Luke 2:10-11).

Upon arriving in the land of

Israel, the magi discovered that the birth of a promised Liberator—a Savior-had long since been prophesied and eagerly anticipated by the faithful. It did not surprise them. The religious rulers of the people, summoned by the ruthless and paranoid puppet-king Herod, knew immediately where the Christ child was to be born. They seemed, however, to have missed the wondrous star and its message. They chose to doubt that the ancient prophecies that foretold His birth, and the stellar phenomenon that marked it, both focused on the humble hamlet of Bethlehem, where Jesus was born.

Herod, however, took the possible emergence of a royal pretender more seriously. He would brook no challenge to his throne. In a paranoid fury he issued a savage order to butcher the babies in Bethlehem in hopes of eliminating this potential threat to his sovereignty.

Sadly, we moderns miss the meaning of this human drama as we relegate it to the mists of legend. Christmas becomes then a "trivial pursuit"—a journey into nostalgia, with cardboard figures and bathrobe drama, a mockup of a touching folk tale. Delightful, but irrelevant to the vital issues of our time.

For the actors in this historic drama it was very real. The jealousy of Herod, the blood-stained steel of the executioners, the anguished cry of mothers bereft of their babies, were all painfully real. The agony of birth, the smells of the stable, the improbable devotion of the magi were real and remembered. The baby was real. The whack on its bottom and its first gasping cries of life were real. He was a warm, breathing, living person born into

a world of homelessness, poverty and violence.

Christmas is not an escape into nostalgia, but an engagement with the toughest, most painful realities of our world. At Christmas, the Word of God in Jesus was born among us, not just to delight us or to inspire mellow music with sweetness and light, but to save His people from their sins.


For Jesus, that meant taking up the rough tools of a carpenter's trade. It meant striking out on the open road with its perils, risking the approach of Satan and the rejection of God's people. It meant giving His back to the whip and His face to the spittle of His enemies. It meant giving His side to the spear of His executioners, His hands to the nails and His body to the Cross. All this, to save us from our sins—our self-serving rejection of His sovereignty and saving love.

Here is reality not to be ignored. Certainly, we must not reduce it to the realm of childish fables. All that has happened since has only confirmed the eternal consequences of what happened there long ago, marked by these heavenly wonders. His followers, in every nation, irradiated by the light of His love, bear witness to the reality of His coming and the power of His presence to touch every life with hope and salvation. "In him was life, and



Almost fearfully I lift them to a safe spot on top of a high cabinet. There we can see the mingled adoration and puzzlement on the faces of Mary and Joseph as they gaze down on their divine Son.

The two manger scenes match

my Christmas moods. The one, with its colorful figures crowded into a common stable, makes me smile as I think of how God thrust Himself into this world. Who could have guessed that He would come cooing and kicking His little feet? With childlike delight I throw myself into the season, getting pine pitch on my fingers and cookie dough in my hair as I celebrate His birth.

And yet the other crèche scene, in its fragility, reminds me to approach Christmas on tiptoe. Almighty God was in that manger in Bethlehem. How can I fathom a Lord whose love for me is so pure and perfect that He became vulnerable as a baby for my sake? The wonder of it makes me catch my breath.

ne December, General William Booth, who founded The Salvation Army in 1865, decided that his family should have a real old-fashioned Christmas. For once he forgot about expense.

A tree was arrayed with tinsel and candles. The living room was tastefully decorated with special ornaments. Gifts were colorfully wrapped. Bowls were filled with candy. And there was plenty of food.

But when the Founder returned from preaching at Whitechapel just before the festivities were to begin, he was utterly downcast.

"What's the matter, William?" asked his wife Catherine.

"Oh, the poverty that I just saw," he replied, wiping a tear from his eye. "Here we are with a tree, food, presents and a warm house. But out there the streets are full of those who have nothing. Nothing!

"Kate! Some of them have even pawned their watches in order to have a crust of bread." He paused. "The church bells mean nothing to them." He slowly moved around the brightly colored living room, thoughtfully fingering one of the table decorations.

"Today, as they sup, the bells will be mocking them. As I mentioned when we first met, the bells speak another language to the poor."

After a pause, he said, "Kate, we have to do something!"

"And what shall we do?"

"I just don't know."

That old-fashioned Christmas was the last the Booths celebrated in the usual way. From then on, each member of the family honored Christmas by going into the slums and distributing plum puddings to those in need. The children soon discovered that this new kind of Christmas celebration gave them more lasting satisfaction than the old-fashioned ones had.

Thus began the Army's tradition of reaching out to

others in need at Christmas. Today this outreach brings Christmas cheer to six and—a—half million people in the United States and millions more abroad.

General Eva Burrows continues that tradition. Christmas 1989 was a busy time for her. On one of the Sundays during the Advent season, she preached at two London corps. At Croyden Citadel she said, "If Christmas began in the heart of God," she said, "it finds its completion only in the heart of man. Just as His coming into the world changed the world, so His coming into our lives can change our lives."


A few days before Christmas, the General addressed a lunch—time service in Wesley's Chapel, the mother church of world Methodism. She spoke of the joy Christ brought into the world. She looked forward to sharing that joy with homeless, elderly and children.

On Christmas Day itself General Burrows put her words into action. She visited five Salvation Army institutions in and around London to share the joy of Christ's coming.

During the afternoon, the men and women of Glebelands (a retired officers' residence maintained by The Salvation Army) enjoyed the General's reminiscences of Christmas in Africa.

She spent the middle of the day in the company of men in the Army's care at Booth House, Riverside House and Greig House hostels.

During a Sunday service at Upper Norwood, General Burrows described Advent as an adventure. And she has discovered, as William Booth did, that it is an adventure that gains its fullest meaning when shared with others.

The Wise Seek Him Still

with me the following letter that came from a donor, citing the amount he had donated to the Army over a period of time. The letter was in response to last year's Christmas War Cry cover that portrayed Mary with the Christ child in her arms and the caption: "God in the arms of a virgin mother."

Although I have been supporting The Salvation Army for many years, I take the liberty to point out to you that your Christmas 1989 cover caption is rather farfetched and outside the very narrow frame of mind of some of your supporters. God, if he exists at all in the form that you think, is certainly not in the arms of anybody, let alone a Virgin mother! The major contradictions within the confines of eight words is a little much, don't you think!

My reply to the divisional commander was as follows:

To the skeptic's mind, albeit a donor to charity, the miracle of the Incarnation is a stumbling block.

To The Salvation Army, it is the central and unequivocal tenet of our faith. Here we stand, we can do no other!

Indeed, it does stretch the imagination and our faith to consider the true meaning and miracle of the Incarnation—God in the form of that tiny baby in the feeding trough in lowly Bethlehem. General Eva Burrows has said: "It is wonderful that man was made in the image of God. It was more wonderful that God was made in the image of man."

C. S. Lewis describes Christ's Advent as "the divine humility, the stooping down of the Highest." John Milton, the poet of towering genius, describes that moment as the time when God "Forsook the

courts of everlasting day,/And chose with us a darksome house of mortal clay." No tongue of man or brain of scholar can explain this marvel, this mighty transition that wrapped deity in the dust and decay of human flesh.

When we come to that manger scene again this season, we realize that something colossal, inexpress-

esus was God in the garb of humanity, the heart of God wrapped in human flesh

ibly great happened that starlit night in Bethlehem. We are in the presence of a miraculous mystery. The cry from that infant's throat became the first time God's voice could be heard coming from human vocal cords. There, on that night of nights, Jesus was God becoming visible to man's sight, vocal to man's hearing, tangible to man's touch. He was God in the garb of humanity, the heart of God wrapped in human flesh.

Indeed, the Christ child was "God in the lap of a virgin mother." Seven centuries earlier Isaiah had proclaimed the inspired prophecy: "Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel" (7:14). This speaks of an extraordinary phenomenon that shall take place. In this conception the Infinite became the Intimate, the Lord of space smaller than a speck of dust.

The doctrine of the virgin birth has been a battlefield of theological controversy through the years. Biologically, a virgin birth is an impossibility. But so was the raising of Lazarus and the Resurrection. Someone has stated, "The presence of mystery is the footprint of the Divine." In harmony with God's miraculous power, the virgin birth was but one of a chain of supernatural events in the marvelous life and mission of our Lord.

When Constantine became the first Christian emperor, he arranged for a great church to be erected over the place where Jesus is believed to have been born. Beneath the high altar of that Church of the Nativity is the cave believed to have been the very one in which the Christ Child was born. When we visit this sacred site, we need to stoop or kneel to enter. On the floor of the cave is a star and a Latin inscription, "Here Jesus Christ was born of the Virgin Mary."

There is a beautiful truth symbolized by the fact that the pilgrim must kneel to enter the birthplace of our Lord. It is supremely fitting that we all approach the observance of the birth of Christ with a deep sense of reverence.

Many of us will no doubt again this season sing Charles Wesley's carol:

Christ, by highest heaven adored, Christ, the everlasting Lord, Late in time behold Him come, Offspring of a virgin's womb, Veiled in flesh the Godhead see; Hail the incarnate Deity! Pleased as Man with man to dwell, Jesus, our Immanuel

As the Wise Men of old, let us come in faith to worship the "Off-spring of a virgin's womb," and bring to Him the costliest gifts of our love and adoration. Let us approach with awe the majesty and mystery of the miracle of God in a cradle! For it will ever be true that the wise seek Him still.

BEHOLD, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, which is Christ the Lord.

No other news ever delivered to human beings can approach in happiness this simple statement of a birth. The Scripture says that His name shall be called Emmanuel, which means—God with us. This is the heart of the Christmas message, that Almighty God abides with us.

What a glorious truth! He who rolled back the curtain of the night at the dawn of creation, He who hung the stars in spangled glory upon the skies, He who sets the sun in motion and the planets according to their orbits, the eternal everlasting Creator and Ruler of the ends of the earth—He, according to this story, is with us; with you and with me. This is the only wonder of the world. The greatest, finest, most intellectual men among us have discovered this truth in their personal experiences.

Why did Christ come? Have you asked yourself? When last did you think about it?

He came to save the world. To redeem us from our sins. And to show us how to live.

Now those of us who have come to love and serve God have learned how practical are His teachings, how never failing His help, how ever dependable His advice and directions. We use His way of life, knowing it works daily miracles—and yet we sometimes wonder why it doesn't solve everything.

Is it because we shun the first and real mission of His coming? To save us from our sins—us sinners?

The modern generation does not like to talk about sin; some even go so far as to say there is no sin. Well, what shall we call it? Is it just sophistication? As a matter of fact the word does not apply, because a man who lives a sinful life is not sophisticated, he is a fool. Sophistication means worldly-wise, to know your way around in the world so you will not get licked by the world. But those sinful ones who call themselves sophisticated are licked. What is their trouble? They are doing wrong and they cannot stop it. So they try to rationalize it.

Rationalization is when the mind tells you that what you are doing is not wrong—it used to be wrong years ago, but it is not wrong anymore. Whenever you do a wrong thing your mind tries to save face. It says to you, "Now wait a minute, what you did is not wrong at all; you are really a very fine fellow. These preachers are all out-of-date, behind the times—do not believe them, talking about sin and the like!" That is the way the mind sometimes works.

I once heard a very wise man say something that brought me up short. A university president and author of numerous books, he observed: "The smartest thing the devil ever did was to get people to believe that the devil does not exist"

We believe in God who is a Spirit. We believe in a universal force that is spiritual. We believe we ourselves have an unperishable spirit. Yes, we believe in the power of the spirit of good. We believe the Bible. But too many of us dismiss the power of the spirit of evil, though we see its work all about us.

The devil, sin? Archaic, childish, old-fashioned, don't you know! And certainly not scientific.

But Christ came to our earth to save mankind from sin—to redeem us—to be our personal salvation. He gave us tools of infinite worth to build our road to Heaven.

Yes, we have a world full of conflict and hate—but God is with us. We cannot save ourselves, but in Him we put our trust.

If today—this minute—we open our hearts and embrace Him and His teachings—not only to reap abundance and joy and health and happy fulfillment, but also for the cancellation of our sins—then this is the greatest welcome we can give to the Christ Child.

hristmas won't be merry for some people this year. It will be, in fact, a haunted season, rather bleaker than other days of the year.

Christmas won't be merry for many of the newly-divorced, still trying to come to terms with the break-up of their marriages. Adjusting, in the case of the childless, to life as singles during a season that's especially oriented towards the family. Adjusting, in the case of those with children, to the hybrid life of the parent, trying to be all things to their young and trying to resolve the problems of where the children eat dinner and with what grandparent.

It won't be merry for the newly-bereaved, coping with the first Christmas without the loved one they have lost. Inevitably they will think of what they were doing at Yuletide last year. Some will be struggling with bitter regrets about time not spent with the one now gone, gifts that could have been bought and weren't.

In most cases there is little need for regrets, but they will come nonetheless, the burden of those



left behind to get on with living.

Christmas may be made merry for some of the newly homeless by some of the agencies working in this field. But nothing that is provided will entirely assuage the feeling of rootlessness and the sense of insecurity about the future that comes to those who find themselves of no fixed abode.

And, as always, there will certainly be homeless people who will slip through the net and find themselves alone and comfortless on Christmas day.

Christmas won't be merry for some of those who have over-spent to try and give their families everything, and know that the bills with interest added are going to come in the new year, which is already overshadowed by the ghost of Christmas past.

What's the answer for those who aren't going to find Christmas merry this year?

Perhaps it's to realize that the Christ who was born nearly 2,000 years ago understands those whose hearts are heavy or anxious. A description from the Old Testament has often been applied to Jesus: "He was a man of sorrows, acquainted with grief."

It's a description that has very little to do with the usual image of Christmas. But, for those who are hurting, there's sometimes a need to look beyond the glitz and holly of Christmas to the one whose birth we are celebrating—or can celebrate.

For 2,000 years He has helped the heavy-hearted pick up the pieces and live again. He can still do it today.
