Prisoners undergo big changes

A correctional facility in Northville Township would become an all-female prison under a plan before the governor and state Legislature.

Scott Regional Correctional Facility, 47500 Five Mile Road, is an advisory committee's choice to house an all-female population, a state Department of Corrections spokesperson said Friday.

A decision on the future of Scott could come today, when Governor John Engler and state lawmakers announce 1991 budgetary recommendations.

The future of Phoenix Correctional Facilities, 47900 Five Mile Road, may also be discussed today. Phoenix is one of the correctional institutions in Michigan that may be closed due to decreases in state prison spending.

A proposed change to a female population at Scott is the result of overcrowding at the state's two medium-security women's prisons, said Department of Corrections spokesperson Gail Light.

An advisory committee comprised of state prison wardens selected Scott because the facility is modern, is built to house one prisoner per cell and features the ability to segregate close-custody prisoners, Scott Warden Lloyd May said.

Financially, Scott is a "domino" in a chain of prisons spanning across the state, Light said, but she did not anticipate problems with state lawmakers.

"In the big scheme of things, I don't seriously think it won't be approved," she said.

An all-female population will not pose serious difficulties for prison

personnel, May said.

"The security aspects would remain the same," he said. "If we can house a male prisoner, we can house a female prisoner."

The status of Scott will change with the switch to a female facility.

Scott now houses only first-time offenders. If the proposed conversion takes place, all types of offenders will be incarcerated there.

A classification change would be unavoidable, May said.

"You couldn't set it up like that (first-time offenders)," he said. "The state is looking for 300-400 immediate beds."

Prison population will not rise above the 528-bed limit now set for the facility, Light said.

"There aren't any plans for that," she said. "We have a capacity at Scott and don't want to get any higher."

The state says "disproportionate growth" in female prisoners increased the need for additional women's facilities.

The state presently has two women's prisons—in Coldwater and Ypsilanti. Prisoners at Huron Valley Women's Facility in Ypsilanti currently are double-bunked and are housed in gymnasiums and day rooms, Light said.

Male prisoners currently housed at Scott will be moved to other facilities throughout the state, including two sites in the upper peninsula and one medium-security facility now under construction in Adrian, Light said.

The change to an all-women's facility at Scott is budgeted for "this fiscal year," Light said. She said the conversion will not take place until bed space is located for all 513 male prisoners currently housed at Scott.

Lawmakers differ on pay raise

Two of Northville's state legislators have taken opposing sides on the issue of legislative pay raises.

Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, is one of a handful of state senators in favor of a two-year, 16.2 percent pay hike recently recommended by the State Officers Compensation Commission, while Rep. Gerald Law, R-Plymouth, has sided with the majority of legislators who have said they will vote against the hike.

The recommendations would raise the current legislative salary 4 percent to \$47,287.50 on Oct. 1, 1991 and raise the salary an additional 11.7 percent Oct. 1, 1992, a total raise of 16.2 percent over the present salary.

The final legislative base salary would be \$52,800 a year.

The House and Senate each are reportedly within a few votes of the two-thirds majority

needed to reject the recommended pay raises. Rejection would result in a two-year pay freeze for the legislators, governor, lieutenant governor and state Supreme Court justices. If not rejected by Feb. 1, the recommendations will take effect automatically.

Most of the legislators who have not stated their opposition to the raises are reportedly undecided or have declined to comment on the issue, while few have spoken out in favor of the raises. Geake is one of those few.

"Public officials have been underpaid for years, and this (pay raise) is beginning to catch up," Geake said. "It's a very modest increase compared with what the U.S. Congress voted itself, a 30-percent increase which was effective Jan. 1, and the Wayne County Board of Commissioners, which voted itself a 38-percent increase, also effective Jan. 1. So for us to accept a 16-percent increase, with a pay freeze until next October, I think is very reasonable."

Geake said that despite the proposed pay raise,

the Legislature will be cutting back on expenses along with the rest of state government. The state has passed an across-the-board budget cut that will affect all state departments, and Geake said the Legislature will not be immune. "There will be a similar cut to the legislative budget; that is to say, the 9.2-percent across-the-board (cut) that's affecting every state department (cut) that's affecting the Legislature," he said. "We will be cutting back in terms of staff and office expenses, just as each department will be. . . . The number of positions will be reduced, including in the Legislature, so I feel that we're handling our own situation with the legislative budget in an even-handed way compared with the rest of the state budget."

The senator also pointed out that the recommendation incorporates some cost-cutting measures by delaying the pay raises until Oct. 1. "This is the first time I ever remember them not making it effective Jan. 1," he said.

PUBLIC HEARING ON MASTER PLAN: A public hearing on a new city Master Plan will be held Tuesday, Jan. 15 at 8 p.m. in the city council chambers at City Hall.

The plan includes a five-year capital improvement plan, community plan goals and objectives, and policy statements on land use, traffic and parking, parks and recreation and public facilities and services. Copies are available for perusal at the clerk's office at City Hall, 215 W. Main St.

ACTION COUNCIL MEETS: Northville Action Council will meet at 7 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 17 in the council chambers at Northville City Hall, 215 W. Main. The speaker this month will talk on the "Think" program and the "Drug Free Zone."

Recapture suit may go to Supreme Court

Novi and Northville schools may take a lawsuit against the state to the Michigan Supreme Court in an attempt to have \$72 million lost to funding cuts returned.

A steering committee made up of representatives of the 56 school districts involved in the lawsuit has authorized their attorney, Dennis Pollard, to proceed with an application to the Supreme Court to grant superintending control over the case.

The lawsuit was filed after the

state recaptured \$72 million from out-of-formula school districts last summer when, for the first time, social security payments were declared "categorical" aid and subject to recapture.

Categorical aid is state money given to school districts to fund specific programs like transportation or special education. Social security payments for school employees had formerly been paid by the state. By declaring the money categorical, the state was able to take money allocated for the payments from property-wealthy school districts

and use it to help fund poorer schools.

Northville schools lost over \$1.3 million to the recapture. Novi lost \$890,000. The districts joined forces with 54 other school districts in a lawsuit attempting to have the money returned and prevent future recapture.

The state Court of Appeals dismissed the case on Nov. 9. Pollard said the dismissal was based on a court error.

The court, Pollard said, in dismissing the suit quoted Section 30 of the Headlee Amendment, the law upon

which the grievance is based.

But the school districts have filed the suit based on Section 29 of the amendment, he said.

He filed a petition for rehearing with the Court of Appeals soon after the case was dismissed. Because the court has not responded, Pollard may ask the Michigan Supreme Court to assume jurisdiction.

Northville Superintendent George Bell has not decided if Northville schools should continue participation in the lawsuit. He hopes to learn more and make a final decision at a Michigan Out-of-Formula District

Association meeting later this week.

"It's going to depend on the price tag," Bell said.

Bell is unsure whether the \$72 million would be returned even if the lawsuit were successful.

"If we did win the case, where would the state get the money?" Bell said.

He said if a lawsuit were successful the governor could issue an executive order returning the money once again to the state.

But setting a legal precedent that could prevent future recapture may make the legal costs worthwhile, he

said.

If the Supreme Court rejects Pollard's request to have the court assume superintending control of the case, then the 56 school districts will have to wait until the Court of Appeals rules on Pollard's motion to rehear the case.

If the appellate court rejects the motion, the schools will have the direct right to appeal to the Supreme Court.

Impending cuts to schools due to a state budget crisis is the justification the schools will use in asking the Supreme Court to take immediate control of the case.

The modern-day equivalent of each Middle English menu item will be prepared under the direction of Northville High School's master chef Yvonne Stephens.

"People will eat and be entertained almost nonstop," Pryce said.

Novi's visitors from Japan just left, but plans to develop an exchange program with the Owani Town School District are just beginning.

The process of developing a sister-school program with the Owani, Japan school district will soon be underway, Superintendent Robert Piwko told the Board of Education Thursday.

The announcement came following a visit by 18 students, two English teachers and three administrators from Owani, Japan. The visitors, who stayed with Novi families, arrived Jan. 5 for a five-day stay.

Novi students will be involved in developing an exchange program, Piwko said.

"We will be in contact with the students and ask for some help as it relates to setting up a cultural exchange," Piwko said.

The program would help integrate a global perspective into Novi's curriculum, he said.

"As we begin looking at the concept of global education for all of us this is something we want to look at," he said.

Besides reaping the education-

al benefits, some hosting students made some new friends, too. Piwko said he saw a few tears when the bus came to take the Japanese delegation to the airport.

"I can't say enough as to what it meant to all of us," Piwko said.

Student board representative Jennifer Fornwald reported to the board about school activities and then discussed her experience hosting a Japanese student at her home.

Fornwald said the Japanese student who lived with her learned a few new English words during the visit. And by the end of the stay, Fornwald was learning a little Japanese.

"It was such a good friendship in three days it was hard to say goodbye," she said.

Fornwald showed the board the gifts given to her by her new Japanese friend. She received cloth-covered pencils and a silk bag.

Board President Robert Schram hosted a Japanese student. He received an aerial photograph of Owani which he showed the board.

"It was a worthwhile endeavor on everyone's time," Schram said.

Parkview playground gets dirty end of stick

A little rain may have never hurt anyone, but the playground at Parkview Elementary School has a few problems handling excessive showers, in the opinion of Novi resident George Forsyth.

Forsyth has two grandchildren attending Parkview. The Parkview students reported to Forsyth that they could not use a new playground at the school because it was too muddy on a few occasions when the weather would have otherwise permitted outdoor activity.

"They've got a mud problem, they may have some kind of drainage problem as well," Forsyth said.

Forsyth said he is afraid the playground will remain unusable in the spring because of mud.

"My thought is if they don't do something quickly, the weather will get too bad and they won't be able to do anything," Forsyth said.

But the mud problem is one that may be indigenous to new playgrounds everywhere.

"Most anytime it rains we're going

to have mud someplace on the playground," Novi associate superintendent William Barr said.

The problem at Parkview may be a little worse because the playground was recently seeded with grass, Barr said.

"It's going to be muddy for a while till we get a few growing seasons," Barr said.

"Anytime you have 300 to 400 kids beating a path to the playground equipment you're going to get some mud."

But Forsyth can rest assured that the district is aware of the problem and is working to correct it.

The areas immediately surrounding playground equipment already are covered in woodchips, Barr said, which helps alleviate the problem somewhat.

The Parkview playground area is part of a drainage system, Barr said. The problem is expected to be further diminished when gravel or sod is laid in a nearby area in the spring.

"There's not a thing we can do about it until the spring," he said.

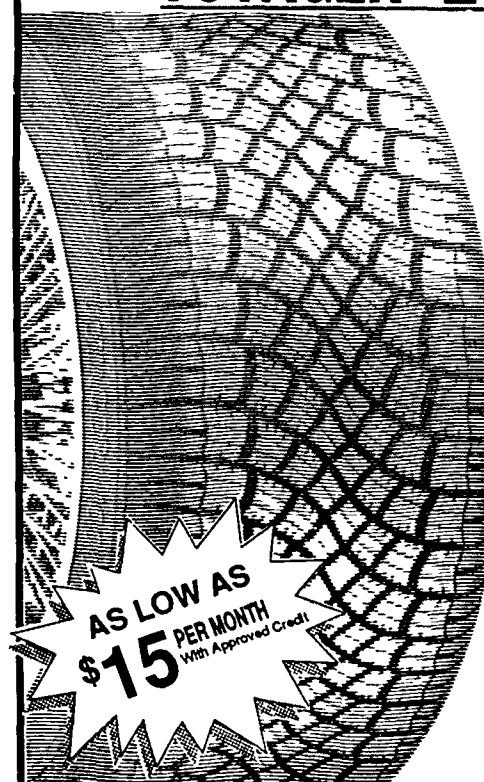

Candlelight vigil for our forces overseas

A non-denominational candlelight prayer vigil for armed forces in Saudi Arabia has been scheduled for tonight at St. Anne's Episcopal Church in Walled Lake, in conjunction with Holy Cross Episcopal Church in Novi.

"This is not a political statement or an activist statement," stressed Rev. Leslie Harding of the Novi church. "We will simply be praying for peace and the safe return of the troops."

Harding's son Sean, a 1987 Novi High School graduate, is among the U.S. troops in Saudi Arabia. He said the vigil, which will begin at 8 p.m. tonight and continue until 8 a.m. tomorrow morning, will consist of "silent prayer and meditation" with a short prayer service each hour on the hour.

"People can stay for as short a period or long a period as they want, and they don't have to dress up for it," he

said. "We will have a sandbox—a box of sand—there, and people are invited to take a candle and light it and stick it in the sand in memory of the person or persons in particular."

"The vigil's very simple," he added. "It's not going to be a big service or anything like that because that's not the purpose of a vigil. We will be praying for peace over there and the safe return of our troops. That's what it's all about."

Harding stressed that the vigil is for everybody, regardless of religious or political beliefs. "We will be asking the almighty God in his grace for strength and guidance in this time that affects so many people—including the Iraqis," he said.

"It affects the people of the world—the 28 nations that have people over there, including the Iraqis and all the people of the middle east."

"If we're going to get so bottled up praying for ourselves, we're losing sight here," he added. "We're praying for the world."

Wild chase starts in Novi

A stolen car in Novi Tuesday led to a police chase involving four cities and damaging three police cars.

Rodney Darrin Hoskins of South Lyon is charged with stealing a 1990 Pontiac Grand Am that was parked at the Speedway gas station at Pontiac Trail and Beck Roads. The owner had left the engine of the car running when she went into the station shortly before 1 p.m.

Hoskins had appeared in 52nd District Court that same morning on charges stemming from a previous stolen car incident.

Novi Police, responding to the stolen car report, broadcast a description of the car. Shortly after, a Keego Harbor police officer spotted the vehicle and attempted to pull Hoskins over.

However, Hoskins refused to pull over and instead led Keego Harbor, Sylvan Lake and Waterford Police on a chase that ended in White Lake Township.

Oakland County Sheriff Deputy Ron Roy said Hoskins at one point rammed into the side of a Sylvan

Lake police car. A Keego Harbor police car was also damaged.

Before the chase ended in White Lake, he apparently stopped along Orchard Lake Road to pick up a hitchhiker. Roy said the hitchhiker was released.

"We firmly believe the (hitchhiker's) story," Roy said. "The guy was astounded by the chase." In addition, Roy said, the two men would not have had time to collaborate on the story.

Roy said Hoskins, a recovering crack addict, also had a stolen VCR with him in the Grand Am Tuesday.

When Hoskins reached White Lake, he evaded a roadblock only to spin-out at M-59 and Elizabeth Lake Road, where he was apprehended, White Lake police said. One White Lake police car suffered front-end damage in the chase.

Hoskins is currently being held in Oakland County Jail on a \$60,000 cash bond. He is charged with unlawfully driving away a vehicle, two counts of felonious assault, one count of larceny in connection with the VCR, malicious destruction of property and fleeing and eluding a police officer.

UTILITY seeks source of stench

Consumers Power officials are offering a \$1,000 reward for information useful in determining the source of an odor that drifted through parts of Oakland and Macomb counties Friday afternoon, Jan. 4.

The natural gas utility company announced the reward after an extensive investigation failed to locate the source of the mysterious odor. "We have not been able to identify it," company spokesperson Garth Behrendt said last Tuesday.

Behrendt said the company followed up on numerous reports related to the odor throughout the day and night Friday and into Saturday morning. "We got about 1,500 calls, and we've checked out all 1,500 of those calls," he said. "We had reports that ranged anywhere from the west side of Oakland County way over to Macomb County."

The odorant is stored separately from gas and routinely transported in trucks, Behrendt added, saying an open valve or damage to any of the storage locations or trucks could be possible sources of the leak. But "nothing has turned up yet," he said.

"We're not finished with it yet. We're continuing to try to get to the bottom of it. We'll rest a whole lot

According to Consumers Power, the odor did not emanate from a gas leak or the spillage of a gas odorant anywhere in its system. Thomas L. Rugh, community services manager for the utility company's Metro region, said, "Our investigation has not discovered the source of the odor and, to our knowledge, no other company that deals with natural gas or gas odorant has acknowledged responsibility."

Rugh said Consumers Power personnel worked with state police, local police agencies, sheriff's departments and others in their attempt to determine the odor's source. "The volume and pattern of calls indicated to us that there was a substance in the air that smelled like gas odorant and that it was moving in a southwest to northeast pattern," Rugh said. He explained that natural gas in its pure state is colorless, odorless and tasteless. The gas used to heat homes and cook food has an odorant added to it—which is described as

smelling sulphurous or like rotten eggs—to aid in detecting leaks.

The odorant is reportedly harmless to inhale, and had the odor actually been natural gas, company officials said there would not have been a threat to people because of the large area into which it was leaked.

The odor, believed to have originated in the Walled Lake-West Bloomfield area, prompted the evacuation of five schools in the Walled Lake district, and one in the West Bloomfield district.

The smell permeated the air in at least a 12-mile wide swath, drifting eastward and causing hundreds of residents to call their local police and fire departments.

Behrendt said the gas company is confident the odor was not actual gas because workers checking out hundreds of odor complaints—particularly at the schools—found no gas leaks whatsoever.

Consumers Power fielded hundreds of calls beginning at 3 p.m. Jan. 4 throughout the Northville/

Novi area. The odor was detected as far south as Northville City Hall, where officials called Consumers Power fearing a gas leak in the building.

By 3:30 p.m. the odor was detected in Troy, and one half hour later it was found in Rochester. By 4:30 p.m., Oakland County calls had subsided and the company began getting calls from Macomb County.

West Bloomfield Police received some calls on the smell, but did not believe there was cause for concern, said Sgt. Mike Madigan, who earlier guessed the problem was likely caused by odorant only.

Bloomfield Township Fire Department Capt. Jim Moor said firefighters received at least 200 calls and responded to about one dozen, finding no gas leaks anywhere.

Troy Police Sgt. Mike Kerr said the police department alone received about 150 calls from people "who thought they had gas leaks in their homes."

"You can smell it all the way from Square Lake, to Big Beaver to Adams to John R," Kerr said. He called it a "gas cloud."

Police in Rochester and Rochester Hills also fielded numerous calls Friday, but told callers there was no cause for concern.

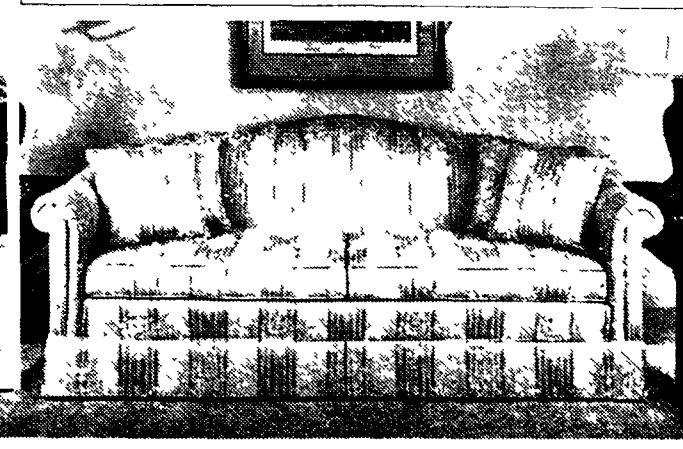

A local church opens its doors to the homeless

Weeklong program runs with Detroit shelter

Parishioners at the First United Methodist Church, 777 W. Eight Mile Road, are opening their doors to the homeless this week.

The church is participating in a joint program with the Cass Homeless Drop-In Center in Detroit, a day center for the area's homeless which does not have the facilities for overnight shelter.

The church's involvement is part of a county-wide effort organized by the Interfaith Hospitality Ministry to provide a place to sleep to people who otherwise would be forced to spend the night on the streets of Detroit.

Roughly 70 participants from the shelter will be driven by van to the church each evening for dinner between 6-7 p.m., and returned to the day shelter the next morning between Jan. 13 and 20.

LeeAnn Schanne, coordinator of the local relief effort, said she decided to pursue the program after participating in last year's housing program at Our Lady of Victory. "Talking with Anne Bright, who coordinated last year, I decided that it was something that we should pursue," she said.

"Members of our congregation had actually brought it to our Church and Society Committee before, and we'd always said, 'Oh, we can't do that, we're too far away.' And then when OLV did it, we didn't have that argument anymore."

Our Lady of Victory, one of 28 churches participating in the program last year, was the first church outside Detroit to take part in the county-wide program.

That is not to say that First United Methodist parishioners have not taken part in their own relief efforts

for the underprivileged. Church members work at a soup kitchen organized by the Baldwin Human Services Center in Pontiac, a center which currently faces a financial crisis due to cuts in federal and state funding, and a sharp drop in private donations. The 24-hour Pontiac shelter may have to change to an overnight shelter and close its weekend soup kitchens.

"The past couple of years we've probably been working more with the Baldwin Center than we have with Cass," Schanne said. "That's a shel-

ter that's run by the Baldwin Methodist Church in Pontiac. They don't have a program like this, though. Baldwin itself has their own shelter."

Schanne said some parishioners have expressed curiosity about their forthcoming guests. "Someone asked me last night, 'What do we talk with these people about? I'm not great at that but basically, I had no trouble last year. They really are quite open and friendly.'"

Schanne remembered missing a highway entrance after picking up the group in Detroit during last year's

program. "They helped me wind through all these streets in Detroit," she recalled, laughing. "They were probably wondering what kind of a crazy person they were with."

The Cass Drop-In program opened in 1988 as part of a three-year demonstration project funded by state Department of Mental Health. Like many homeless shelters, the Cass shelter has seen the need for its services climb sharply since it opened. Nathaniel Thomas, vice-president of the Detroit-Wayne County Union of the Homeless, said "We're averaging 150-200 people a day right now, now that it's gotten cold." Last year, the center drew an average of 90 people a day.

A proposed cut in hours at the city recycling center does not reflect a drop in interest in recycling, said City Manager Steven Walters.

Walters said he proposed cutting Wednesday hours at the recycling center due to a drop in customers at the 650 Doherty Drive site after 5 p.m., but that business at the center overall remains high.

"They're getting very little customer action after 5 p.m. on Wednesday night, partly probably because it's dark, and partly because it's cold," Walters told the council last Monday night. "It doesn't seem like there's really enough activity to warrant a volunteer and a DPW man." The cen-

ter typically is staffed by a Department of Public Works employee and a volunteer during hours of operation, to assist recyclers and assure that the facility is only being used by Northville city residents.

Walters recommended cutting back the Wednesday closing time from 7 p.m. to 5 p.m. until April 30, when warmer weather may bring more evening traffic to the center. Council Member Jerry Mittman countered with a proposal to re-extend the hours March 31 rather than April 30.

The council approved the reduced Wednesday hours until March 31. The center remains open 11 a.m.-5 p.m. Saturdays.

Audience member Kathleen Otton asked, "Does this indicate that fewer

residents are participating in recycling?"

"No," Walters replied, "just when they come down . . . typically, we have 50-60 people on Saturday. It's not a lack of interest in recycling, because the volume of cans and bottles and newspapers is not dropping off."

Becky Dozier at the DPW said the recycling center has developed a dedicated group of regular customers. "We have some that come every week," she said. But she agreed that the center has had reduced traffic Wednesday evenings.

"We never had a high interest in people coming between 5-7," she said. "And then all of a sudden it dropped off. We had volunteers sitting here for a whole hour without

seeing a single person."

Dozier said the six yard bins still have to be emptied on a regular basis. "The newspapers are having to be emptied every six weeks, the plastic once every four to six weeks," she said. "Clear glass is emptied every two months, and green and brown glass and tin cans don't move as quickly."

Dozier also urged recyclers to crush their plastic milk jugs before recycling them, because the city must pay to have the bins emptied and crushed containers allow the bins to be filled with more than hollow ones. Customers sometimes forget to crush the containers themselves, Dozier said, "and then we have to get out there and stomp around on them."

Lawmakers differ on pay raise issue

In Law's opinion, however, any raise at all would be unfair with state programs facing deep budget cuts and state employees facing the fear of layoffs.

"We're already issuing layoff notices to folks in state government; we're already going to cut back services in areas where people need them," Law said. "The pay increases even without those problems are in my opinion too large. I could have seen them recommend maybe the cost of living, but they recommended twice the cost of living . . . Anytime you're going to sit out there with anybody who's an elected official and talk about pay increases of a percentage that's double-digit, it's probably always going to be unacceptable."

Law said the size of the recommended pay increase may not be justifiable even in a healthy state economy, and said that given the state's current economic condition, salary freezes may be in order.

"I think at any time you have a raise this large, even in good economic times, you have to really be able to justify that size of a raise," he said. "Looking at it now that I've seen the budget, and the response from the departments and what they have to do to meet their 9-percent cut, and the people they're going to let go, and the numbers that you see now, I would probably have to say that the

Legislature and all government officials should probably freeze their pay, because the numbers are growing and there's a lot of uncertainty . . . I think out of sheer fairness, probably, everybody in government should freeze their pay until we see exactly what the magnitudes are and what the future of the economy is."

The Compensation Commission's recommendations were based on a drop in the real salaries of elected state officials over the past several years, Law said. "They go back 15 years for all of these offices — judges, legislators, governor, lieutenant governor — and they look at the history of the office, the history of the raises, inflation over that whole period, and they derive what it should have been today," he said. "If somebody 10 years ago didn't do a proper job (setting the salary), they attempted to rectify that. Unfortunately, I don't think this is the time to do it."

"They just didn't pull it out of a hat . . . but they're operating somewhat in a vacuum, and we do not. So I think it's difficult really to accept almost any pay increase, especially when we have to lay off employees. We're going to be laying off quite a few of them, maybe forever depending on how some of these departments might be restructured."

Law said this is the first time that the Compensation Commission's recommendations have been so close to rejection by the Legislature. "In

fact it has never been voted on," he said, "probably because (for) a number of the years there were freezes, I mean there was no raise, and in many, many years (the raise) was very small. So this is probably the highest recommendation of all."

The two legislators are also divided on the possibility of the recommended pay hike being rejected. "I think it has a good chance of being rejected, but I haven't talked to a lot of legislators personally about it," Law said. "But you never know until we have a day and we vote on it, which we are going to have apparently before Feb. 1." Law was one of more than 30 co-sponsors of a House resolution to reject the recommended pay raises.

Geake doubted the recommendation would be rejected, saying, "No pay raise has ever been rejected by the Legislature, and I would be surprised if this pay raise was."

The Senate is scheduled to consider the recommendations Jan. 24, but the House has not yet set a time for a vote.

The State Officers Compensation Commission was formed in 1968 to set salaries for elected state officials including governor, lieutenant governor, state Supreme Court justices and legislators. The commission proposed the latest pay hikes in December. The pay raise for Supreme Court justices would trigger raises for nearly 600 other judges as well.

Parking policy unfairly enforced

Our co-op has a so-called traffic and safety policy that isn't being enforced on all members. Some members are being asked to pay a \$25 fine for a second offense of parking more than two cars and the third offense will call for eviction proceedings. Is this possible when a policy is not enforced on everyone, and board members change the policy when they themselves are noted for violations?

Simply put, no. The restriction, rule or policy must be enforced uniformly against all members. It cannot change depending on who is being prosecuted. Accordingly, it would appear that if the restriction was ever contested, your co-op's policy of unequal treatment would not stand the test. I would write the board and tell them about the problems you perceive in regard to the fine policies.

Can you tell me if the recent amendments to the Michigan Handicappers' Civil Rights Act apply to condominiums?

An employer under the Michigan Handicappers' Civil Rights Act is defined as a person who has one or more employees. An employee employed in domestic service of any person. Therefore, the Handicappers' Civil Rights Act would apply to a condominium association if it has one or more employees. The act is designed to provide the opportunity to obtain employment, housing and other real estate and full and equal utilization of public accommodations, public services and educational facilities without discrimination because of a handicap.

Please note that there is a specific provision in the condominium statute regarding modifications to the common elements requested by a handicapped person, but that specific provision is exclusive of the rights guaranteed to handicappers under the Michigan Civil Rights Act.

My ex-husband and I are divorced but paid off a house on a land contract but still owe taxes. Now that we are divorced, we would like to know if we did not have the title recorded, do we own the house or do we have to wait until the taxes are paid? I want to sell my half of the house. How do I go about doing this?

You will probably not be able to record the deed until the back taxes are paid. If the taxes are paid, presumably by getting half of the contribution from your ex-husband, get a deed from the land contract seller, ask them to make the deed to "Jane Smith and John Smith, tenants in common." If you got a deed, record it, and then do another deed from yourselves to yourselves as above and record that. I am assuming, of course, that the divorce judgment did not discuss the house.

Once you own the property as tenants in common, you are legally free to sell your half. Bear in mind, though that as a practical matter, it can be difficult to sell a one-half interest in real estate. Perhaps your ex-husband will join in the sale and you can split the proceeds. You should seek the advice of an attorney to protect your interests once you are clear as to your intent concerning the disposition of the property.

Mortgage rates still declining

Buyers of houses and condominiums in metro Detroit continue to find fixed-rate mortgages attractive, as rates for 15 and 30-year instruments held in the range of 9 1/4 - 9 3/4 percent for the week of Jan. 1.

Mortgage rates are lower now than a year ago, and in some instances, are at their lowest levels in several years.

"I won't say rates have never been better, but they're as low as they have been in the last 10 years," said Michael Lubig, vice president and general manager of the mortgage department for Standard Federal Bank.

Gregory Quick, vice president of secondary marketing for Comerica Mortgage, had a similar observation. "In general, we haven't seen rates at this level since the first part of 1987."

Lower mortgage rates means more house for the money for buyers at the upper end of the spectrum and more people able to enter the market as first-time buyers at the lower end.

Refinancing activity also has increased. Several factors have resulted in lower mortgage rates.

One was the decision of the Federal Reserve to lower its discount rate in mid-December from 7 to 6 1/2 percent to stave off a recession, said Al Marshall, vice president of business development for First Federal of Michigan.

"Hopefully, they (financial institutions) can pass that savings on to their customers," he said. "The key was the discount rate being reduced and supply and demand, the market being down."

Rates can now fluctuate daily, Quick said. "Most residential mortgages are packaged into securities purchased by investors."

"What's going on in capital markets basically is the belief we're in a recession and we'll continue to be in a recession for a time period in 1991 and that typically ushers in a reduction in demand for money. Consum-

ers zip up their pockets and rates come down," Quick said.

Many banking executives, including Daniel B. Smith, vice president and branch manager for Republic Bancorp Mortgage, believe that rates will fall even more.

"With the economy slowing down, people aren't buying big-ticket items. They (Federal Reserve governors) are trying to keep the economy going," Smith said.

"There's an ample supply of mortgage money now," Lubig said. "It's a buyer's market. A lot of mortgage bankers are competing for a smaller piece of the pie."

Fixed-rate mortgages generally are more popular now than adjustable rate mortgages or balloon payments, executives in the business indicated.

During the week of Jan. 1, rates on 15-year mortgages could be had from 9 1/4 - 9 3/4 percent, 30-year mortgages at 9 3/4 percent. Mortgagees would pay 2 points on those loans, or 2 percent of the amount borrowed, at the time of closing.

Adjustable rate mortgages that week were available at 7 1/4 percent.

The attraction for fixed rates? "Borrowers know the worst-case scenario," Marshall said. "They know what's going to happen every month for the life of the loan."

Lubig projected that upwards of 80 percent of all first mortgages originated at Standard Federal are of the fixed variety.

"It's essentially consumers wanting to lock in relatively low rates for a long time," Quick said. "That's a case of a lot of people wanting to reduce

financial uncertainty."

Loans fixed for a period of years then ballooning to a final payment or refinancing also have niches.

Republic Bancorp's most popular product now is a seven-year balloon at 9 1/4 percent on a 30-year amortization schedule, Smith said. After seven years, mortgagees pay off the loan or refinance.

"I'm getting a lot of people absolutely sure they're not going to be in the house for seven years so they won't have to refinance," he said.

Comerica Mortgage offers a 5/25 plan at 8 1/4 percent annually for five years. A formula determines payments for the final 25 years.

First-time buyers and "anyone who finds himself relocating periodically" would like that option, Quick said.

The general rule of thumb on how much debt lenders believe consumers should handle for housing still holds, Marshall said. That's 28 percent of gross income to service the principal, interest, taxes and insurance on the mortgage, 36 percent of gross income including all other debt.

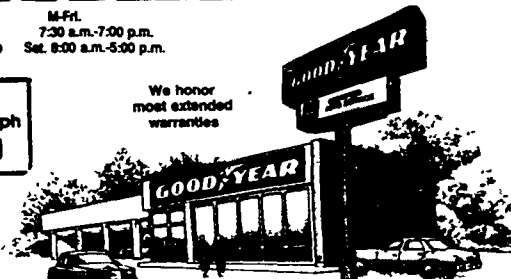

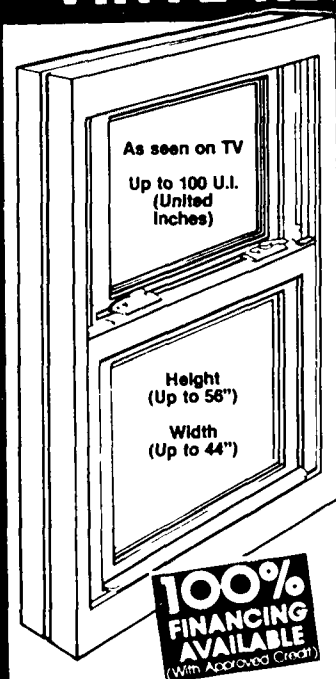

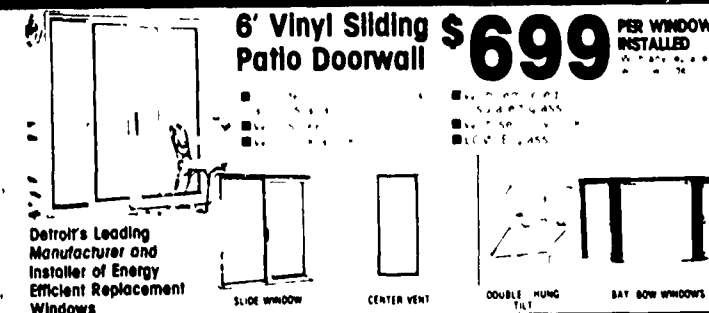

Sometimes you've got to break the rules

Kitchen responsibilities have diminished since the holidays, but quick and simple meals must still remain attractive and flavorful, even if classified as "carry-out."

Typical take-home delights such as pizza, burgers, chicken, ribs and Oriental dishes can be a special dining experience with the addition of a flavorful wine selection — a wine that can please the palate without pinching the purse.

With this goal in mind, we recently tasted Famie's Chicken (2707 N. Woodward Ave., Royal Oak) with a dozen red and white wines especially selected by local wine distributors to complement the herb-roasted chicken.

We were joined in our tasting by Les Auteurs restaurant manager John Baumgartner and Maitre d' Michael Hardy. In search of the wine candidate for the Chicken Hall of Fame, we tasted each of six white wines with Famie's Rotisserie Chicken seasoned with herbs and then with each dipping sauce — honey mustard and Southern barbecue.

The favorite white wine with the chicken (no sauce) was the 1989 Buena Vista Lake County Sauvignon Blanc (\$8). By itself, the wine is fresh and attractive. With the chicken, the wine is refreshing, fruity and complementary.

Other compatible wines that added flavor interest to the chicken were the 1988 Forster Bischofsgraben Riesling Kabinett, Burklin-Wolf (\$8 per litre) and the 1989 Liberty School California Sauvignon Blanc (\$8).

We all agreed that the tomato-smoke flavors of the Southern barbecue dipping sauce killed the flavor of the white wines. While the 1989 Z-Moore "Quaff" Gewurztraminer (\$8) was too sweet for the herbed chicken, it was a clear winner with the honey mustard sauce.

We frequently recommend red wine with grilled poultry and game birds. Therefore, it was a natural to repeat the tasting with several light, flavorful red wines that could be served slightly chilled.

Three of the reds were particularly good with the herbed chicken. Those that paired best showed rich fruit, good body and a fair amount of structure. Lighter red wines gave a thin impression against the mixture of 13 herbs and spices.

Outstanding matches were the 1987 Seghesio Zinfandel (\$7.20), the 1988 La Vieille Ferme Cotes du Ventoux (\$6) and the 1989 Preston Vineyards Estate Red, a blend of carignane and zinfandel.

With the dipping sauces, the tables were turned. While the Southern barbecue sauce killed the white wines, it did not dampen the richness and depth of the Seghesio Zinfandel or the Preston Estate Red. The sweet honey mustard sauce detracted and confused the palate.

Food and wine combinations are fun when you do not take them too seriously. Remember, you can learn as much from a poor combination as a good one. You may discover wine harmonies that you prefer to those recommended here, but you have to be adventurous enough to try them.

Please notice the best wines in this experiment did not include a cabernet sauvignon or a chardonnay. Another surprise was that the sweetest wine, "Quaff," complemented the chicken with honey mustard sauce, while a dry wine assaulted the palate. Finally, red wine went as well as white wine with the herbed chicken, but the choice of sauce changed all the rules.

One of the real pleasures in life is a simple meal with friends, especially one that you didn't have to prepare, accompanied by a delicious, yet affordable wine.

Wine is fine for at-home fundraiser

To some people wine is an indulgence or a luxury. For one Northville couple, wine is the vehicle to help those who may never know such indulgences.

On Saturday, Mike and Jan Mnich hosted their third annual private wine tasting and auction. Hardly a major event on the community calendar, it's more of a party among close friends with the proceeds benefiting a charity. The money raised has gone to a different cause each year, this year benefiting the Children's Hospital of Michigan.

Mike, a true aficionado of the grape, provides the bottles to be auctioned. By day, he runs a janitorial firm that cleans buildings in several Midwest cities, but in the evening, he can often be found sipping wine from his own collection of some 400 bottles.

"I'm definitely not tooting my own horn with this auction," said Mike. "I do it to pull in money for charity. In my case it's the wine that we auction, but you can do it with anything that's collectible."

The auction began three years ago when Mike and Jan moved into their home on Edenderry Drive.

"We've lived in Northville for 10 years," Mike said. "Our first year here, we moved all my bottles over here, but I had to build my own cellar. This house has no basement so I built it under the stairs. To christen the new cellar, Jan and I decided, 'Why don't we hold a wine tasting?' and we came up with the program."

The cost of admission that year was a can of food, which was donated to charity, and at the auction, some \$500 was raised for the American Cancer Society. Just about a dozen people attended. Mike was astounded by the competitiveness, and the amount raised exceeded his expectations.

"My friends were going crazy trying to outbid each other," Mike said. "I had a \$10 bottle of wine fetch \$100. Last year, there was a \$100 bottle of champagne that went for \$300."

In the second year, guests were asked to bring a winter coat to donate. That night \$1,500 was raised for the Salvation Army. Tom McKinnon, owner of McKinnon's restaurant on Main Street in Northville, served as guest auctioneer for about 30 friends.

"I've told people that my goal for this year is just to raise one penny over \$1,500," said Mike. "But my personal goal is \$3,000."

There will be 40 guests this year, and several people — friends, wine merchants and others — have donated wine to be auctioned. In all, 15 "lots" will be sold at the live auction, and there will be a silent auction of four other lots.

Though the rare and exquisite labels might draw some intense bidding on their own, Mike and Jan aren't content to let the wines alone be the stars of this occasion. They've thrown in some creative curves to encourage more bidding.

For instance, one lot consists of a backpack filled with some California white wines.

"It's a nice, summery kind of wine," said Mike. "So on June 14, I'm going to get out my shorts, slip on the backpack and walk that wine to the door of the successful bidder. Jan will meet me there with a cooler full of ice, so it will be properly chilled when the winner gets home from work."

Now, Mike may only have to walk next door, or he may have to walk 38 miles. That's how far one of his guests has to travel.

"And that's just the highway mileage," Jan pointed out. "He may have to walk twice that going by the back roads."

Another lot includes a dinner for two at the Mnich's home on July 19. Sometime in the future, they may auction a trip to the California wine country.

Successful bidders make out checks directly to the selected charity. Mike accepts no cash so that everything stays on the up-and-up.

The wine tasting and other festivities which take place

throughout the evening can best be described as fun and games for grown-ups.

Along with some catered edibles, there is a wine quiz, asking multiple choice and true-false questions about wine (with both the highest and lowest scorer receiving a bottle of wine as a prize); a blind taste test; a contest to see who can blend the best wine; a tasting of five different vintages of some Sterling Vineyards Reserve; and horse-and-buggy rides around Northville.

That's just the type of people the Mnichs are when it comes to wine.

Said Mike, "You listen to wine tasters and they say things like, 'It has flavors of chocolate, and anise, with a bit of nutmeg.' I can't taste those things. I just taste it and say, 'This tastes good to me.'"

Mike is also quick to point out that he doesn't collect wine for investment purposes.

"I think of those bottles as my children," he said. "I'll give them away as gifts, share them with friends, I'll use them to raise money for charity, I'll consume them and I'll pass them on to my children when I die; but I won't sell a bottle of wine."

The annual tasting and auction takes five months of planning. It seems like a lot of work to go to (and Mike and Jan finance the whole thing themselves), but for the Mnichs, the charities make it worthwhile.

"Jan and I met as volunteers with the Special Olympics," said Mike. "I always feel like I haven't done enough for charity, and I get to feeling a bit guilty. Now I can give to the charities through something I love."

He added that in a worsening economy, with tightening federal and state budgets, charitable organizations need help now more than ever.

"If five people can read this and pick up on the idea to auction something — whether it be art or whatever — for charity, than it will be worthwhile to me."

Auction planning, step-by-step

Here are Mike and Jan Mnich's steps to a successful charity wine auction. Remember, you can adapt this list to auction anything collectible, donating the proceeds to charity. Said Mike, "You will be absolutely exhausted by the end of the evening, a little poorer and out a few bottles of wine from your cellar, but the amount of money that will have been raised for charity by your personal efforts, as well as the memories you will have from the evening, will last a lifetime."

Consult an accountant or tax advisor on the deductibility of the costs associated with an auction party. To keep things simple, accept only checks, and stipulate that they be made out to the charity. Your guests will then have a record, and you don't have to handle cash.

Select a charity. You may want to poll your friends, or accept nominations prior to the party. Contact the charity and tell them of your plans. They may send information for you to distribute, or even send a representative.

Set a date that doesn't conflict with birthdays, holidays, major sporting events or peak vacation times.

Make a budget taking into account the number of guests and how extravagant you want to be.

Determine your guest list keeping in mind the size of your home or chosen venue. By planning activities at various "stations" to keep guests moving, you heighten the anticipation for the auction.

Invite a well-known local food or wine personality as a guest auctioneer. It's great PR for them, and can intensify the bidding.

Prepare invitations with an RSVP so you know how much food and wine to prepare. You can prepare your own if you have access to a computer and printer, or many stores now stock wine-tasting invitations.

Don't charge admission. People are more inclined to dig deeper during the auction when they see the effort you've invested in the evening. If people insist on bringing something, make it in the form of canned goods or used clothing for donation.

Make sure you have enough wine glasses. Plan on one per guest, with a few extras to be safe. Don't use plastic cups, as they tend to crack and leak.

Decorate in a festive fashion, perhaps with wine posters, or whatever suits your fancy.

Prepare a food and wine menu. A caterer helps, but don't let your friends bring anything. If they feel like a guest rather than a required participant, they may increase the amount of their donation.

Educate your guests if they aren't wine aficionados, and discuss what you'd like to serve with your favorite wine merchant.

Print up an auction booklet explaining each wine to be auctioned. Refer to each wine by lot numbers, just like the professionals. Set up some bottles for silent auction, with written bids.

Locate spill buckets throughout your home for guests who want to empty their glasses. A bottle of sparkling water by each bucket is nice for rinsing.

Provide auction paddles. Paint stirrers with numbers on them work fine.

How many bottles to pull from your cellar? Mike and Jan allow one bottle for every two or three guests. This fosters competitive bidding among guests for fear that someone they may go home empty-handed, yet won't leave anyone feeling lapped out.

Display the lots in a prominent location.

Break out those fondue pots for fun memories

While rummaging for Christmas decorations I discovered two electric fondue pots and dozens of forks neatly packed away. I contemplated the many times the pots and forks were used and the fun I had developing menus.

Fondue was my first experience with "gourmet" cooking. Why has fondue cooking lost its popularity over the last several years? The reasons are varied with the most likely being the high calorie, high cholesterol cooking mediums used. Another factor leading to its demise has been the introduction of new ethnic cuisines. Fondue parties were the "in" way to entertain. Now it's the tapas craze.

I remember with fondness friends gathering, everyone with a pot to pass. Color-coded forks crowding and intermingling. Lost morsels floating to the top waiting to be re-assembled. The food was secondary; the casual, fun, relaxed way of enjoying food and wine was our main reason for these dunking affairs. I vote for a revival for the fondue pot!

While fondue is traditionally thought of as "haute cuisine" it comes from humble beginnings. As with other provincial dishes it originated out of necessity and practicality. Because cheese has a tendency to become hard when stored for long periods it was discovered that the hard cheese would melt and that dipping pieces of bread into it made a simple and satisfying meal.

The word fondue is either French, meaning to melt, or from Swiss meaning to dip. Which is correct is immaterial because the traditional fondue is melting and dipping. Although the Swiss or cheese fondue is the most popular, meat and dessert fondues are pleasurable alternatives.

As with any other cookery some simple rules apply. Read recipes and gather all ingredients before starting. Once the cooking has started it moves rapidly.

When making a cheese fondue cook over very low heat or the cheese will become stringy. It is im-

portant to keep the cheese hot so that it does not become tough. Never allow it to cool unless the meal is over. If the cheese does not thicken at once don't worry — it will.

Adding a pinch of baking soda will lighten the sauce a bit. Add pre-warmed wine to the cheese and stir in a figure eight pattern to incorporate it completely. If the fondue becomes too thick from cooking too long, thin it with a bit of warm wine.

When cooking meat and vegetables or other tidbits be sure the oil is hot before placing the pot on the warmer.

Chocolate is a natural for desserts. Melt with a bit of cream on the stove.

The equipment requirements are minimal. A copper pot is ideal but earthenware pots and electric pots are more common. A warmer is a necessary resting place for the fondue pot after the fondue is ready to serve. Alcohol, candles or an electric hot plate are ideas. It is better to be able to control the heat as much as possible.

Use long-handled fondue forks, metal skewers or even metal knitting needles. The metal gets hot if you let it sit so beware!

Provide plates and forks for the cooked food. Eating off the fork is asking for a burnt mouth. Also, it is not as readily acceptable today as in past times.

Proper etiquette requires the spearing of the bread and swirling it figure eight fashion through the cheese. A final swirl is mandatory when lifting from the pot to avoid drips. This can be likened to the eating of spaghetti. Fondue is not an occasion for your best table linen. Drips are inevitable and part of the fun.

Tradition dictates that if you drop your bread or food in the pot you may kiss your neighbor. A variation of the dropped-bread penalty is that the dropper must provide the next bottle of wine. With a cheese fondue only one person may dip at a time. With a meat several forks may rest in the pot at the same time but be careful not to dislodge your

neighbor's fork.

Now comes the fun — the ingredients. Let your creativity take over. Choose your cheese with care. An aged Swiss or Gruyere is preferable. Cut cheese — or chocolate — into small lumps to speed the melting time. A basic rule of thumb is to add ½ cup of white wine to ½ pound of cheese.

Select breads that are fairly heavy and have some flavor and body. A sourdough, pumpernickel, rye or wheat loaf cut into 1-inch pieces are excellent choices. Apple sections, celery chunks, carrot slices, green or red pepper strips and boiled potatoes cut into cubes (or baby potatoes cut in half) are some substitutes for a cheese fondue.

For a meat fondue use any vegetable oil versus clarified butter. Peanut is agreeable for an oriental theme while olive oil or safflower oil is nice when a minimal amount of additional flavor is required.

A low-fat alternative to both is to use broth as the cooking medium. Cooking chicken and meat in this way adds flavor without the additional calories. I recommend a homemade heartily flavored stock. Marinate your meat for several hours before cooking. Don't limit the choices to beef and chicken; nicely trimmed pork and lean veal are distinctive backups.

Remember the dips and sauces. A nice mustard, curry or sweet and sour sauce are the icing on the cake. A salad, cole slaw and rice, pasta or potato casserole will round out the meal.

Chocolate is the desired dessert fondue. A buffet of angelfood cake, ladyfingers, marshmallows, puff pastries, apple, banana, strawberries, oranges or pineapple will please anyone's sweet tooth. Cut dunkables into 1-inch squares and proceed as in the cheese fondue.

Select beverages to go with the fondue: beer for cheese, red, rose or white wines for meat, sherries for dessert. A nice selection of mineral waters, non-alcoholic beer and wine should be available also. Enjoy. Long live the fondue.

FONDUE SUISSE

- 1 pound Swiss cheese finely diced
- 3 tbsp. flour
- 1 clove garlic
- 2 cups dry red wine
- ¼ cup kirsch
- ¼ tsp. salt
- ¼ tsp. white pepper
- ¼ tsp. nutmeg or paprika

Place cheese in bowl and toss with the flour. Cut garlic in half and rub the inside of the fondue pot then discard. Pour wine into pot and place over low heat until bubbles start to form. Do not boil. Add cheese by handfuls, constantly stirring with a wooden fork or spoon until the cheese is melted. Be sure each handful is melted before you add the next. When the last of the cheese has melted and the mixture begins to bubble add the kirsch and seasonings stirring quickly.

Mushroom Fondue:

- Add ½ pound chopped, sauteed mushrooms and ¼ pound minced, sauteed onion to completed fondue.

Fondue Champagne:

- Use dry champagne instead of the wine.

Tomato Fondue:

- Peel and seed two tomatoes and add when the fondue is ready to eat.

FONDUE ORIENTAL

- ½ pound meat or poultry per person
- beef or chicken bouillon or stock to fill
- ½ of the fondue pot

Slice all meat wafer thin. Slightly freezing meat will make it easier. Fill the pot ¾

with bouillon and bring to a boil. It must be kept at a boil throughout the meal. Spear meats and cook to desired doneness. Dip into selected sauces. Strain broth when done and use as a soup. Add broth as it evaporates.

CURRY SAUCE

- ½ medium onion chopped
- 1 clove garlic minced
- 1-inch piece ginger peeled and sliced thin
- 1 tbsp. butter
- ¼ tsp. curry powder
- ¼ tsp. brown sugar
- 1 ½ tbsp. flour
- ¼ tsp. salt
- 1 cup chicken stock

Saute onion, garlic and ginger in butter until onion is slightly browned. Stir in curry and brown sugar and cook for one minute. Stir in flour and salt. Gradually add chicken stock and cook stirring until sauce is thickened. Cook over low for 10 minutes stirring often. Strain and serve hot or cold.

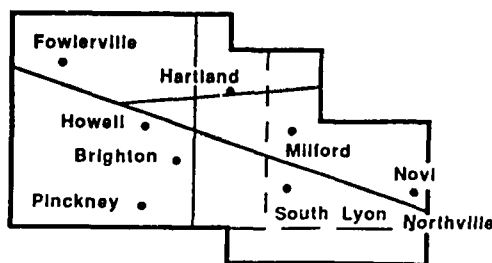
MOCHA CHOCOLATE FUDGE

- 1 tbsp. butter
- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate
- 1 7-ounce jar marshmallow creme
- ¼ cup coffee liqueur

Melt butter, chocolate and marshmallow creme together in fondue pot. When melted and well mixed add coffee liqueur and stir well. Serves 4-6.

Bogeyfest '91

Festival revives his love affair with the camera

Humphrey Bogart was one of those rare actors whose love affair with the camera made even his worst films watchable. So it's no big deal that the monthlong tribute to Bogart at the Livonia Mall runs the gamut from great to godawful.

"The Treasure of Sierra Madre" (1948) kicked off the series on Tuesday. In perhaps his finest performance, Bogart is Fred C. Dobbs, one in a trio of prospectors who grows paranoid and crazy with greed after striking gold.

The adventure was directed by John Huston, whose natural gifts as a storyteller plus his use of deep focus and natural locales made his film unlike any others at the time.

The film also featured the director's father, Walter Huston, in an Academy Award-winning role as the old prospector. John Huston even shows up as a white-suited tourist early in the film.

In one of the film's many amazing sequences, Bogart and partner Tim Holt encounter a shady contractor who refused to pay for their work. The high contrast lighting and simply staged violence make the ensuing barroom brawl one of the best conceived fist fights in the movies.

There are similarly great moments in Huston's "Key Largo" (1948), which paired Bogart with Lauren Bacall for the fourth time. It screens Jan. 30. Bogart plays one of a handful held hostage by psychotic gangster Edward G. Robinson in a Florida hotel.

In an odd shading of his heroic persona, Bogart is a war veteran and pacifist forced to kill again. In a truly suspenseful climax, he guns down Robinson aboard ship. The foggy setting and more high contrast lighting add realism to the violence.

Raoul Walsh directed the 1941 effort "High Sierra" (playing Jan. 22), but Huston co-wrote the screenplay for this sympathetic study of a convicted killer on the run. "Mad Dog" Earle was a breakthrough for Bogart which added a new dimension to the tough guy characters he was typecast into playing.

And the truly awful title? In what has arguably been hailed as the actor's worst drama, "The Two Mrs. Carrrolls" (1947) wastes both Bogart and Barbara Stanwyck in a melodramatic tale of an artist who marries women, paints their portraits and "The Angel of Death" and then murders them. It plays Jan. 15.

Warner Bros. obviously knew it had a dog on its hands. The film was actually completed in 1945, but held back from release until 1947. Audiences weren't likely to forget Bogart, who completed some 25 features in the 1940s.

For movie buffs, Bogart remains a larger-than-life actor. The opportunity to see any of his films — uncolored and on the big screen — is well worth skipping a morning of work for.

'The Civil War' is a stunning chronicle

Beginning the new year with a look at America's past may prove rewarding. Ken Burns' stunning presentation, "The Civil War," which aired on PBS last fall, is now available on nine videocassettes, totaling more than 11 hours of excellent, engaging documentation of America's bloody Civil War.

Burns has emerged in recent years as one of the country's outstanding practitioners of the documentary film form, with diverse productions ranging from "Brooklyn Bridge" to a feature-length presentation about Louisiana's Governor Huey Long.

The nine tapes in "The Civil War" series are chronologically ordered and present a superb, detailed view of the war, its causes and complications and many of the background issues, issues not always apparent but extremely important in understanding how human culture inflicts so much suffering on its members.

The nine are "The Cause — 1861" (99 minutes), "A Very Bloody Affair — 1861" (69 minutes), "Forever Free — 1862" (76 minutes), "Simply Murder — 1863" (62 minutes), "The Universe of Battle — 1863" (95 minutes), "Valley of the Shadow of Death — 1864" (70 minutes), "Most Hallowed Ground — 1864" (72 minutes), "War Is All Hell — 1865" (69 minutes) and "The Better Angels of Our Nature — 1865" (68 minutes).

All were first aired in 1990 and are unrated. Although they're marked "color," a good deal of the photos Burns incorporated so creatively are black and white.

Burns' technique and his superb research are at the heart of the film's impact. Here as in his other films, Burns incorporates all available sources to present a vivid, gripping picture of the subject.

Letters home, the music, newspaper reports, journals and diaries, contemporary historians as well as the many paintings and photographs of the Civil War are rich sources. Burns uses them to great effect in a superb mix.

The thought of stills on motion picture film is not particularly inspiring, but here the effect is sensational.

The third episode, "Forever Free," opens with a montage of portraits of soldiers. Rather than the obvious technique, which has the camera linger on individual stills, Burns cuts rapidly from photo to photo, using gunfire sound effects as his motivating transitional force. In addition, he cuts with a variety of visual transitions creating the dynamic impression of war's violence.

Just as Vietnam was our first war reported live from the front via television, the Civil War marked the first

combat in our national history reported via photography.

In the 1860s, photography emerged as a viable commercial and professional medium, replacing painting and drawing as the preferred visual format. Mathew Brady, in particular, popularized the photograph with his Civil War work and his extensive, by contemporary standards, photography of President Lincoln.

But Burns' technique does not rely on these visuals alone. His impact evolves from careful integration of sound and picture tied together with voice-over narration by David McCollough and the finest professional actors available to read the letters and other reports of the Civil War.

Sam Waterston is President Lincoln, Jason Robards reads General Grant's words, Morgan Freeman is Frederick Douglass, Garrison Keillor is Walt Whitman and Arthur Miller is William T. Sherman. Julie Harris and Jody Powell are among the voices.

Ex-slave recordings from the Library of Congress and extensive traditional music combine with sound effects to create an energetic and engaging soundtrack to match the vivid visuals.

Reading the lengthy closing credits indicates the extensive research Burns and his staff accomplished in producing this fine series.

But the greatest significance of "The Civil War" is what we can learn about ourselves and our world.

The current Persian Gulf crisis has revived the use of the term "McClellanism," referring to Union General McClellan, whose reluctance to attack the Confederacy degenerated from prudence to timidity, if not cowardice.

McClellan's reluctance to act was at its worst just when President Lincoln needed a battlefield victory as background for announcing the Emancipation Proclamation, which took effect 127 years ago this past New Year's Day.

Episode Three, "Forever Free," clearly relates the complicated national, international, military, political and socio-economic forces at play as Lincoln moved to free the slaves.

Those forces and issues highlight the terrible savagery humanity inflicts upon itself, and Burns presents them most effectively.

There is a great deal to be learned by viewing these nine tapes in Burns' "The Civil War." We should be grateful for his work. It's a fine experience with which to begin another year of trial, tribulation and, it is hoped, peace and prosperity for all.

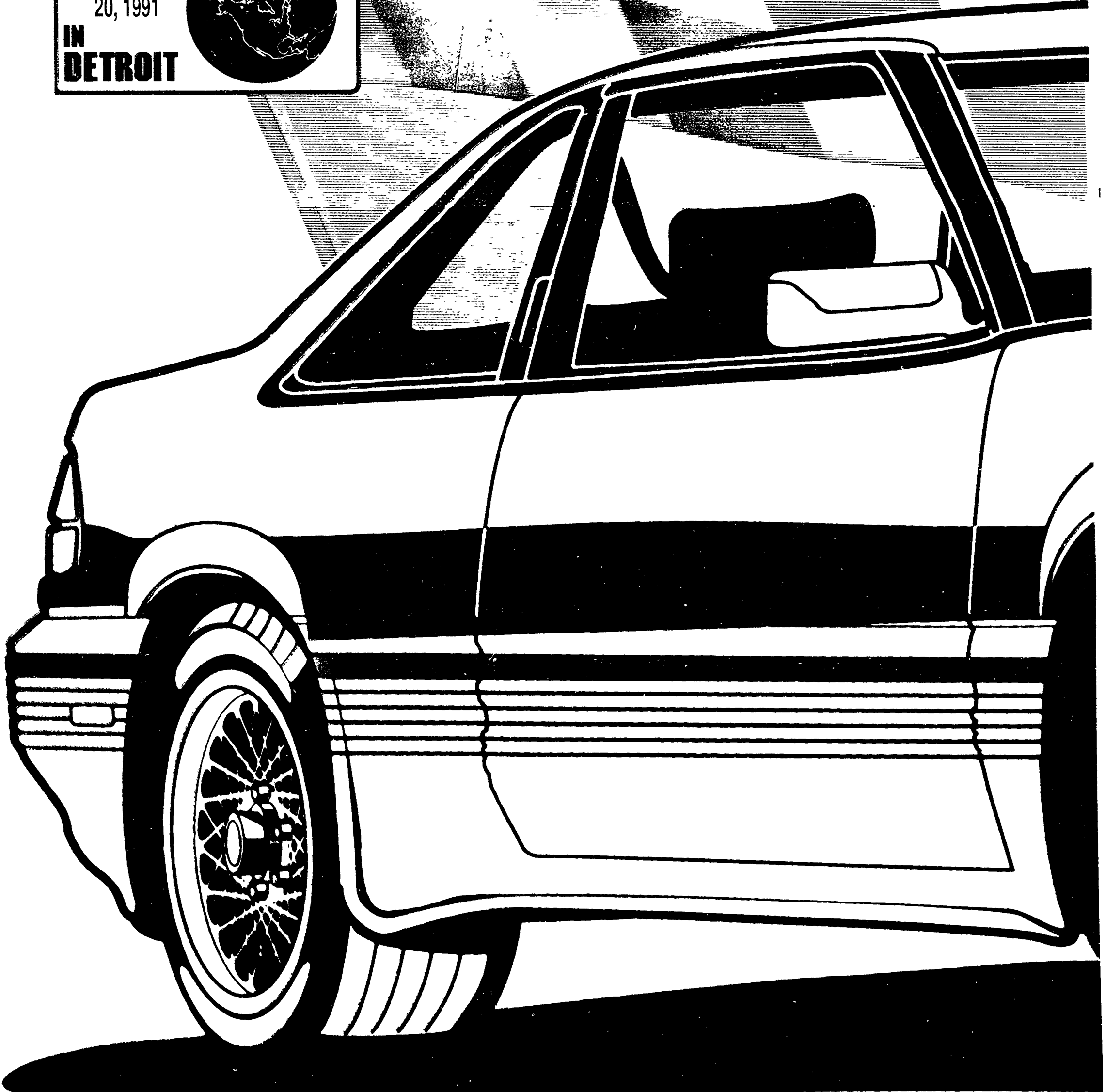


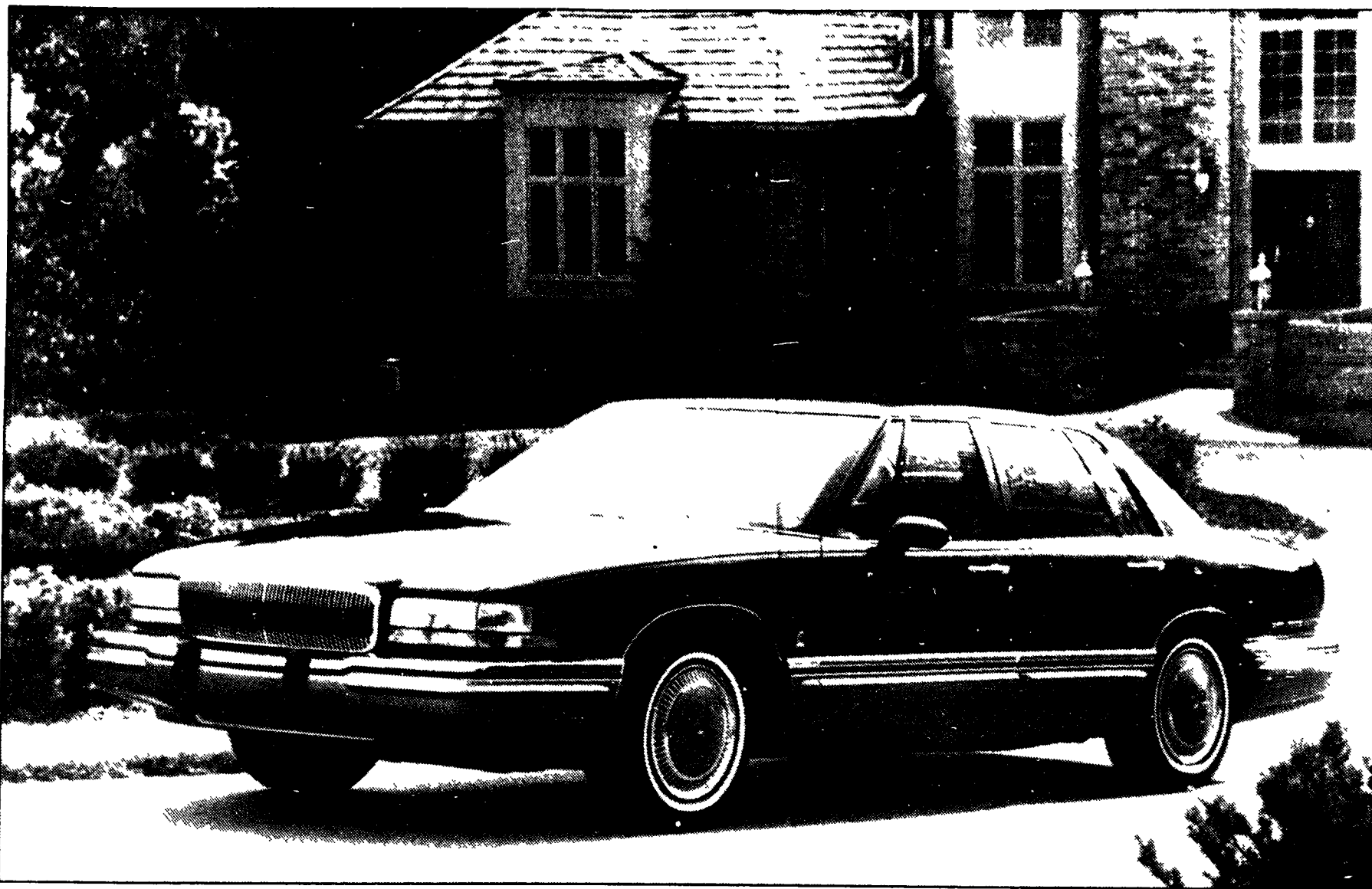

Arguably the most significant of these new lines will appear on the American automotive landscape this fall: General Motors' controversial and much bally-hoed Saturn nameplate. To launch the new division, Saturn dealers will offer two models, a compact sedan and coupe.

The concept is a new one for GM, with both versions being designed from scratch, uniquely for Saturn. The cars will not be shared (at least at first) with any other GM divisions.

A separate factory is dedicated to building only Saturns. The goal is to match the quality and value of the Japanese imports. If so, it could be a real bright spot: Toyota is considering marketing the Saturn in Japan.

Prices for a Saturn are expected to begin in the \$12,000 range. Styling will be fresh, but still mildly reminiscent of other GM products.

Both the sedan and coupe will offer front-wheel drive and two different four-cylinder engines, each about two liters in displacement: a frugal eight-valve engine producing about 100 hp, and a 16-valve version that pumps out another 20 to 30 horsepower. There will be a choice of a five-speed manual or four-speed automatic.

While Saturn will be a big new name, the division hopes to sell hundreds of thousands of cars annually, the next new brand to show up will be much smaller. Late in the model year, Citroen will return to the American marketplace it abandoned back in 1974.

This French automaker is part of the Peugeot S.A. Group. It will offer a car currently on sale in Europe, the Citroen XM. This is a sophisticated and luxurious automobile with many high-tech features, such as a "hydropneumatic" suspension. This car will become available next spring as a 1992 model.

At about the same time, Citroen's parent company will likely begin selling its large Peugeot 605 sedan in

the U.S. The latter shares much of the same technology as the XM, but will be a bit less posh and more affordably priced.

Also on the horizon, reports indicate that Mazda will follow the lead of its Japanese competitors and establish a second, separate network of upscale car dealerships in the U.S.

The new division will likely offer pricey vehicles that Mazda doesn't yet sell in this country, such as the recently introduced rotary-engine-powered, 280 hp Cosmo luxury coupe. The as-yet unnamed car line is expected to debut sometime in 1991 to be sold as 1992 models.

In addition to the aforementioned new marques, more models are being added to existing lines. The Japanese, for example, are becoming more aggressive in the sports- and luxury-car areas.

Toyota's Lexus division is already flush with the success of its LS 400 premium sedan and is readying a high-end coupe for the marketplace. The new model will reportedly match or exceed the refinement and performance (not to mention the \$35,000 price tag) of the existing LS 400.

Meanwhile, Nissan's luxury brand will have a less-expensive offering in the form of the Infiniti G20 four-door sedan. This is basically a plusher, more expensive version of the Nissan Stanza that will be priced around \$20,000.

Not to be outdone, Honda will finally begin selling its long-awaited \$60,000 high-performance sports car, the Acura NS-X. The first rear-drive Honda sold in the U.S., the NS-X is said to reach speeds of more than 160 mph.

In addition, the division will introduce a revised version of its Acura Legend sedan for 1991. Rumors have been flying about its being a larger car with a V8 (or even a V10, by some accounts) engine.

To keep a step ahead of the Japanese, the Porsche 911 Carrera Turbo will be back in the U.S. market after a few years' absence. With more than 300 hp on tap, this limited-production sports coupe should make a thundering impression among sports-car enthusiasts.

Not to be left far behind, Chrysler is entering the high-performance fray with its all-new Dodge Stealth

sports coupe.

Although there will be sleek front-drive versions with "only" around 150 hp, the top-of-the-line Stealth RT will offer twice that amount, via a twin-turbo 3.0-liter, 24-valve, V6 engine. What's more, all that power will be used to drive all four wheels full-time, to make this the fastest Dodge ever; pricing is expected to be in the \$30,000 range.

A companion model, the Mitsubishi 3000GT (Mitsubishi builds the drive-train and other componentry for both the 3000GT and Stealth) will add some high-tech frills, such as four-wheel steering and computer-controlled active aerodynamics (spoilers that rise and fall according to the vehicle's speed).

Intending to keep its position as king of the hill among performance coupes, the already blazingly fast Chevrolet Corvette ZR1 is said to be gaining a few more horsepower.

Chevrolet engineers know how to round the current 380 hp up to an even 400, but the catch has been preventing the car from falling subject to the federal gas-guzzler tax in the process. Word is that the problem may, in fact, be solved.

For those with a desire for horsepower on a budget, a new version of the economical compact Dodge Spirit sedan, the Spirit RT, will come equipped with a 16-valve, turbocharged engine that delivers around 220 hp.

This car is vying for the honor of having the most horsepower per dollar on the American road.

Not far behind, and also at a Chrysler division, is the Plymouth Laser (also available as the Mitsubishi Eclipse). In turbo-charged form, an automatic transmission will become available for the first time.

The same also applies to the car's other variant, the Eagle Talon, although the sure-footed, all-wheel-drive version will continue to offer only the manual transmission. However, big news for the Talon is the availability of antilock brakes, making this foul-weather performance champion stop as well as it goes.

Another all-wheel-drive powerhouse will get its first manual transmission. The Audi V8 sedan will add a five-speed to its list of options (current models offer only a four-speed automatic). With 250 hp, this will be

among the fastest four-doors on the road.

Also from Germany, the BMW 850i will be available in the U.S. later this year. With a whopping \$73,000 price tag, this 12-cylinder coupe pumps out 296 hp and can reach speeds of 155 mph.

The new BMW flagship will offer a host of new technology, including such features as multiplex electronics, said to improve electrical reliability by reducing the overall number of connections and cables.

The primary competition to the 850i are this year's all-new Mercedes-Benz 300SL and 500SL two-seat hardtop roadsters. They will include traction control, which prevents wheelspin during acceleration regardless of the road surface. With either 220 (300SL) or 322 (500SL) hp on tap, traction control makes these cars more manageable when navigating in foul weather.

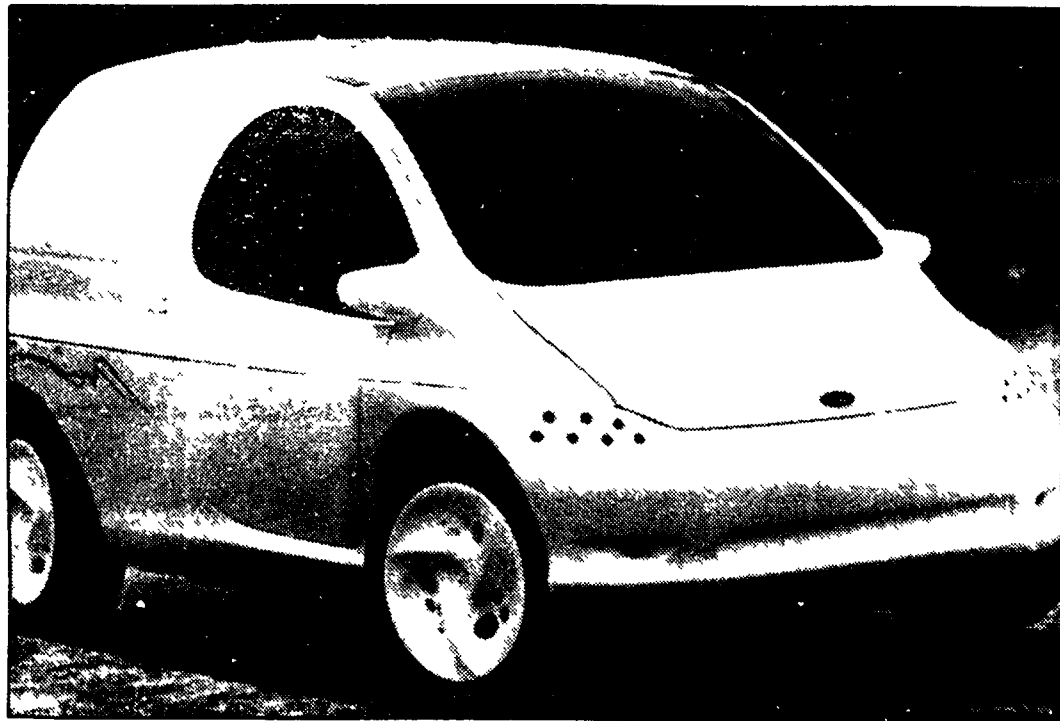
Even among such comparatively mundane cars as the Chevrolet Lumina, the 200-hp barrier will be broken in 1991. The same turbocharged V6 powerplant that made the Pontiac Grand Prix Turbo Coupe the fastest front-wheel-drive car from GM will appear in the Lumina coupe this fall.

There will also be a few changes in Ford's luxury coupes, the Ford Thunderbird and Mercury Cougar. The XR-7 version of the latter will offer a V8 engine for 1991, instead of its existing supercharged V6. The V8 will have a bit less horsepower, but will come in at a slightly lower price.

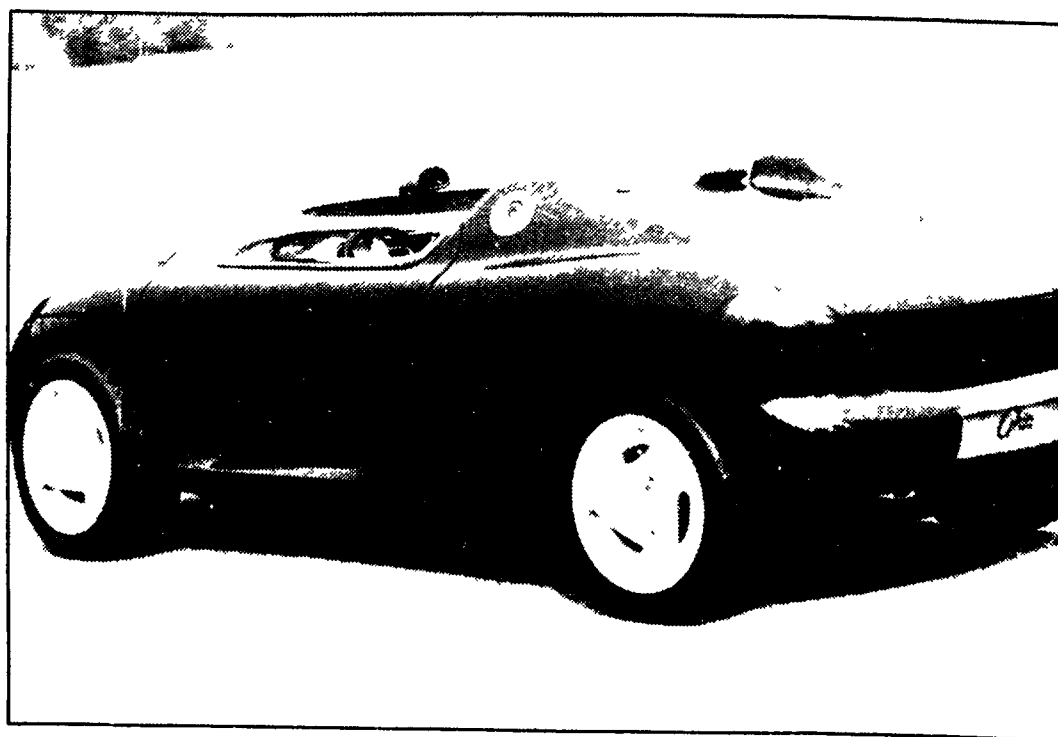
Cougar's sister car, the Thunderbird, will keep the supercharged engine in its SC model. However, the V8 will also become available in the T-Bird's mid-range LX model. Both power plants offer in excess of 200 hp.

Audi will also pass the 200 hp mark by turbocharging its five-cylinder, 20-valve engine. That engine currently resides under the hoods of both the Audi Coupe Quattro and the 90 Quattro sedan. It's not known which of these will get the turbocharger first, although the Coupe is the early favorite.

Another serious performance car is a bit farther into the future. The Toyota Supra will be renewed next spring as an early 1992 model introduction. Expect to see a version with at least 300 hp and some gee-whiz technology to keep up with the competition.

Ford concept cars, 'Zig' and Zag,' debut at Auto Show

Inside Ford, two concept cars are known informally as "Zig" and "Zag."

And while those names may, on the surface, suggest aimlessness, in reality these two concept cars represent a clear look at the next generation of automotive design.

Visitors to the 1991 NAIAS will have the first chance to see these futuristic products. Both are super-compact multi-purpose leisure vehicles named for the

Ghia Studio in Italy in which they were conceived.

"Ghia Zig" is a two-seater sports car which provides a modern interpretation of the classic sports racing cars of the 1950s and '60s. The forward position and steep rake of the windshield deflects air over the heads of occupants. Rally-type seats are trimmed in a bright blue stretch fabric with high-contrast color inserts.

Other features of the interior include a removable compact disc player and large door bins. Access to the

luggage space located behind the seats comes through a roller-type door.

"Ghia Zag" has removable rear seats and a front passenger seat which slides forward to increase cargo capacity. The horizontally split tailgate wraps around the rear quarter panels to improve access to the cargo area, while a retractable roof-mounting system allows large items to be carried outside the cabin. Special attachments in the rear cargo area are provided for secure

storage of a wide range of leisure or work accessories.

Based on a common modular configuration, both vehicles were designed for use with Ford of Europe's Fiesta engines.

A design goal was to reduce package size to a minimum. Both models share common lower body sides and door panels, as well as many of the basic interior design features. In addition, they both have fiber optic lighting systems which incorporate rows of miniaturized lenses molded into the slots above the bumpers.

Follow these basic steps for selecting the right car

Happy new car model year!

Perhaps one or two of your previous window-shopping trips to dealerships resulted in a new car parked in your driveway. Each time you drove off the lot, you were convinced you made the right choice. But six months later, maybe you weren't so sure.

Although you hear few confessions, many buy the wrong car. But by following a few guidelines, you can make sure your next new car is the right one for you. It just takes a little work.

The road to the right car begins at home. Spend some time researching and soul-searching. Research to determine the facts and figures. Soul-search to determine the "what I really want" factor.

Pick up one of the new car buying guides published by car and consumer-interest magazines. These list all the specifications and price ranges of every kind of car sold in the United States.

Next, analyze your automotive needs and (this is where serious mistakes are made) be mercilessly objective. Analyze how you use a car today. Just because you've always owned a full-size sedan isn't a good reason to buy one now.

Ask yourself a lot of questions. Do you often have back-seat passengers. If so, you probably need a four-door car. Do you haul items for work or a hobby? Consider a hatchback with a fold-down rear seat. It can carry unwieldy cargo and could be a nice change of pace.

Have you had a change in lifestyle that also affects your transportation needs? Then carefully select the car type that matches your current transportation needs.

Do some soul-searching about the kind of car you've always wanted. Perhaps you've longed for a carefree, sporty car but never felt it suited your needs before. Now may be the time to get one.

Your car should make you feel good every time you get into it. And you should also feel good, physically and emotionally, when you get out of it.

Once you've determined the general type of car that's best for you, use the buyer's guide to narrow your choices to no more than three different models. More than three makes the process time-consuming and tedious.

Drawing from your own experience and the buyer's guide, determine the engine and transmission combination you want. For some

cars, only one engine is available, but in most models, you have a choice between a manual and an automatic transmission.

Then decide on options you want. Although options add to the purchase price of a car, most also add significant value at trade-in time.

The trade-in value of options varies by model. Look at the current trade-in value of various options for an earlier model year of the same car you are considering. These values are listed in the Official Used Car Guide.

If the model is offered in several trim levels (upholstery, seats, wheels and basic equipment in plain, fancy or sporty), you will need to decide on that as well.

The idea is to be fully prepared when you start visiting dealerships because a prepared shopper deals from strength.

Look in the phone book to locate dealerships for the cars you selected. Dealership location isn't critical when you are car shopping, but it becomes significant when you consider having to return for maintenance and repair.

At a dealership, be direct and sure of yourself. When approached by a sales representative, be as specific as possible. You might say something like, "I'm interested in a Quarto LXZ with a V-6 engine and a five-speed transmission. Do you have one in stock?"

This approach will establish you as a serious customer, not a browser, and show that you know what you are talking about and, therefore, are less likely to be swayed by any fancy "showroom-ese."

Although a good sales rep will show you the car you're interested in and explain its features, that person will also likely try to steer you toward a bigger, more elaborate, more expensive car. Be firm. And ask for clarification of anything you don't understand.

The road test is essential. Don't consider buying a car without one. And there is a right way to conduct a test drive. Test a car similar to the model you want.

Seats, transmission, brakes and even upholstery can vary among models and dramatically affect the way you feel about a car. If you want bucket seats and the test car has a bench seat, at least sit in a showroom car with bucket seats.

When you get in the car, adjust the seat and look around. Can you see all critical dials, gauges and controls without turning or straining? Can you easily reach the radio? How is the

steering wheel position? Can you reach the pedals? How is visibility to the rear?

Drive the car in various situations. Do some stop-and-go driving and highway cruising. Parallel park.

During it all, consciously evaluate what you are experiencing. Does the engine have good pickup? Does the transmission shift smoothly? What about wind noise? Any glare on the instrument panel or annoying reflections in the windshield?

And, importantly, ask yourself if you really like the car.

If you are still interested after the test drive, you need to gather some more information back at the dealership. Find out the service department's hours and the availability of special services, such as transportation to and from home or work when you drop off the car.

Ask to see the shop. Though you can't judge a book by its cover, a dirty, disorganized shop may be symptomatic of other problems.

Emphasize to the sales representative that you are in no position to finalize a deal on your initial visit but that you want to hear an offer. Take good notes and jot down any numbers mentioned. Be certain you understand the offer and write it out in terms that will make sense to you later.

Ask about the dealership's financing plans. Note percentage rates and monthly payments for contracts of varying lengths of time. It's common to get a better offer if you finance through the dealership.

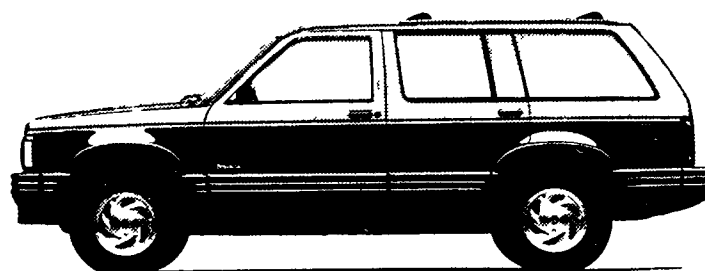
Then repeat this drill at each dealership you visit. After the initial round of visits, you will be armed with enough information and impressions to make a decision in the calm of your own home.

Once you've settled on the car, stop at local lending institutions to look at other possible financing arrangements. And then head back to the dealership for what many buyers dread—negotiating.

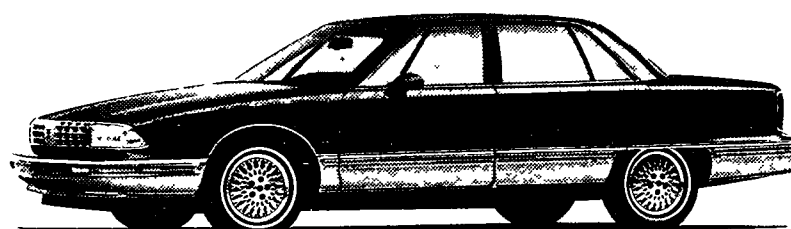
At this point, you have the sales representative's initial offer, so before you return to the dealership, decide on a counteroffer that is lower than what you are actually willing to pay. That leaves room for you to go up in price.

The sales rep has done the same thing in the other direction and likely will be prepared to come down in price. The deal is somewhere in the middle. Be firm when negotiating, but remember there is a point a dealer can't afford to go below.

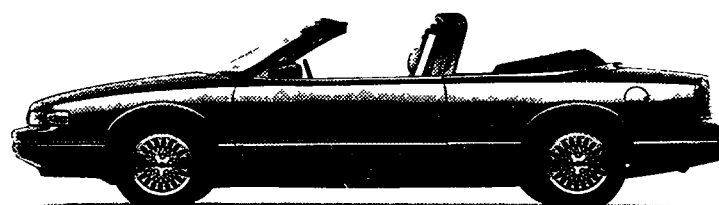

Safety takes a front seat

Safety, one of the hottest automotive selling points of the '90s, is taking a front seat in the Big Three domestic manufacturers' immediate and future product developments. Much evidence of the importance of safety will be seen at the 1991 North American International Auto Show (NAIAS).

For 1991, General Motors will offer driver-side air bags on 12 of its 20 passenger car platforms, including Chevrolet's Corvette, Camaro, Geo Storm and Metro convertible.

Automotive News reported that GM will make lower cost anti-lock brake systems (ABS) available in a range of models by the end of the year. By the end of the decade, ABS may be standard equipment on all GM models.

GM's Ralph Tredway, GM Trucks and Bus Group Engineering Operations light-duty vehicles director, said the company will introduce four-wheel ABS on most light-duty trucks by the 1994 model year. Air bags in trucks likely also will be introduced in trucks by the 1994 or 1995 model year. Front-wheel-drive minivans

will get them even sooner.

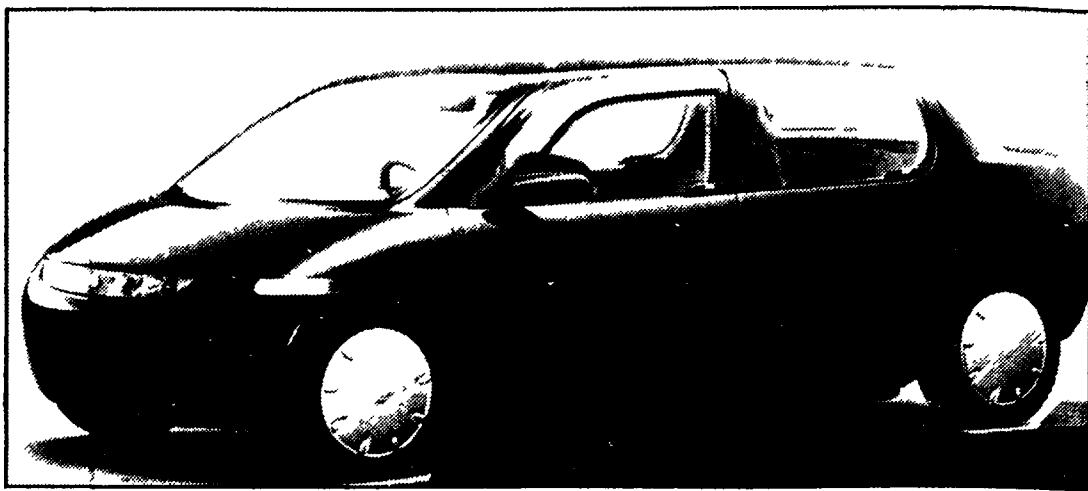
Safety-oriented displays highlighting anti-lock brakes and air bags will be an important part of Ford's overall program during the auto show. Ford general manager Thomas Wagner said safety will be a "very powerful sales tool" in future Ford products.

"When visitors to the NAIAS see the all-new 1992 Ford Crown Victoria, they'll be looking at a lot more than sleek, new sheet metal. It is equipped with some of the industry's most advanced safety features, like a driver-side air bag supplemental restraint system, anti-lock brakes,

traction control and speed-sensitive steering."

Randy Edwards, Chrysler's safety programs manager, believes higher dynamic side-impact requirements will be the next big step in the move to protect passengers during accidents. The company expects to devote much of its energies to researching high-speed frontal impacts and pedestrian safety.

Edwards also anticipates that trucks will be required to meet higher safety standards. By 1993 or 1994, the same safety standards that apply to passenger cars may be required on trucks.

Livelier colors forecast in future

Based on car colors being contemplated by automakers for the 1994 model year, Automotive News suggests that we ought to expect livelier hues and unique finishes in the next few years.

Designed to target niche buyers and differentiate similar vehicle models, not all of the colors are revolutionary.

Black, for example, is expected to remain popular as a high-tech statement.

Jewel tones are projected for conservative full-size and luxury cars, while somber hues and greys will give way to rich ruby, sapphire and emerald finishes.

Hot magentas, teals, yellows and other "sulfur bright" colors will grow in popularity for entry-level/compact, sport and utility vehicles in certain regional markets such as California.

Pastel aqua, purples and pinks—like those in the '50s and '60s, but updated and brightened—will be available for nostalgia buffs.

According to Janet Dougherty, Chrysler Design Public Relations Manager, Chrysler will be displaying a wider range of brighter, more intense colors. The '91 models will sport new hues including electric blue, aqua, turquoise and various shades of red.

Green also will be making a comeback.

Says Robert S. Daily, color marketing manager for DuPont Automotive Products Finishes Division: "The wider range of colors will let car buyers more easily express who they are or what they'd like to be."

Bertone to make debut in U.S.

For the first time in the company's history, Carrozzeria Bertone S.p.A., Italy's oldest coach builder, will exhibit a display of concept and company-designed production cars in the United States.

Four vehicles are scheduled to make their first North American appearances at Detroit's NAIAS.

The "Nivola," recalling the nickname of the legendary racing driver Tazio Nuvolari, is scheduled for its U.S. introduction in Detroit. Based on the Chevrolet Corvette ZR-1, the Nivola is a two-seater sports car with a mid-mounted engine.

It has a unique luggage compartment that is actually contained within the doors. The Nivola is painted the same yellow color as the knit shirt worn by Nuvolari during his racing heyday.

Also shown will be Bertone's "Opel Kadett," a convertible built in the company's Turin, Italy, factory.

The current "European Car of the Year" winner, the "Citroen XM," is scheduled to grace the Bertone stand as well. The Bertone designed XM is described as an up-model four-door sedan about the size of a Cadillac Seville.

The Italian automotive designer will also show a prototype "mystery car" which will be making its world premiere at Detroit's NAIAS.

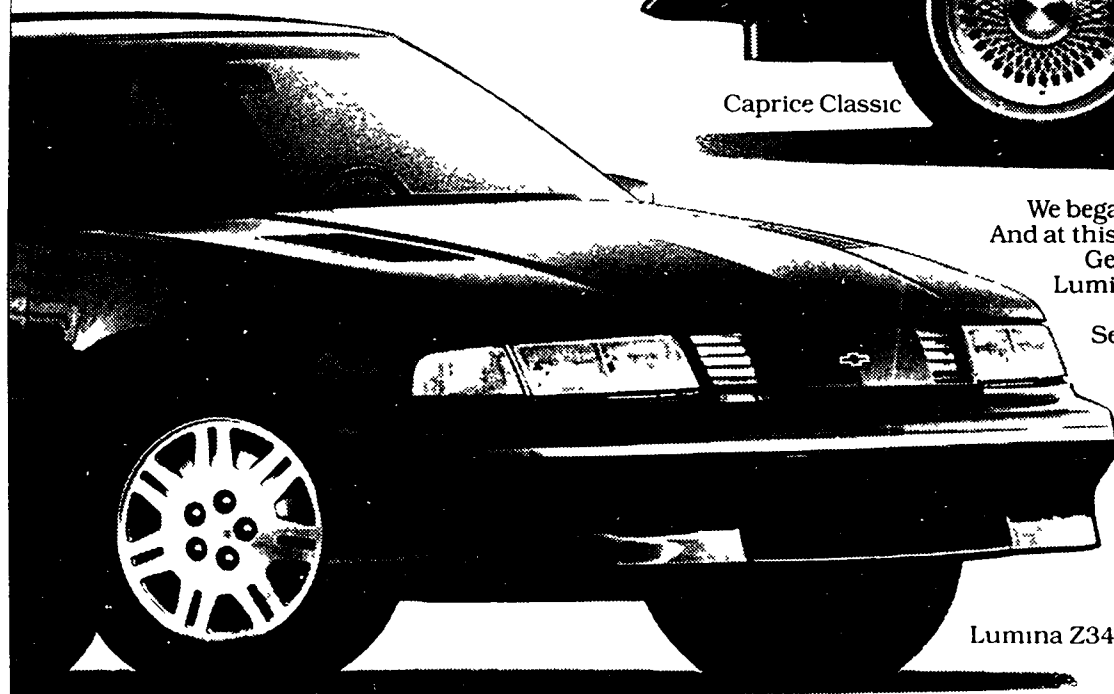

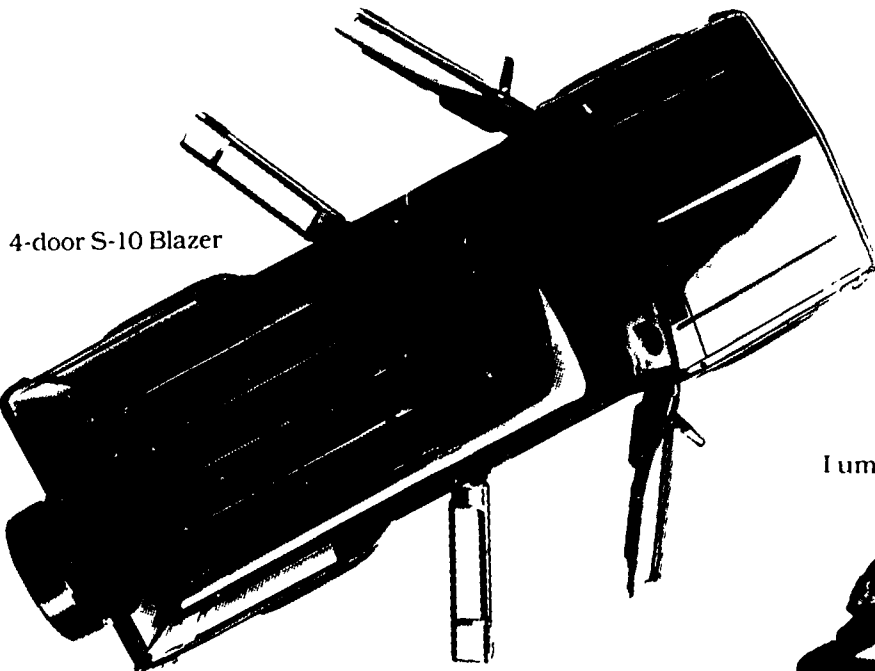

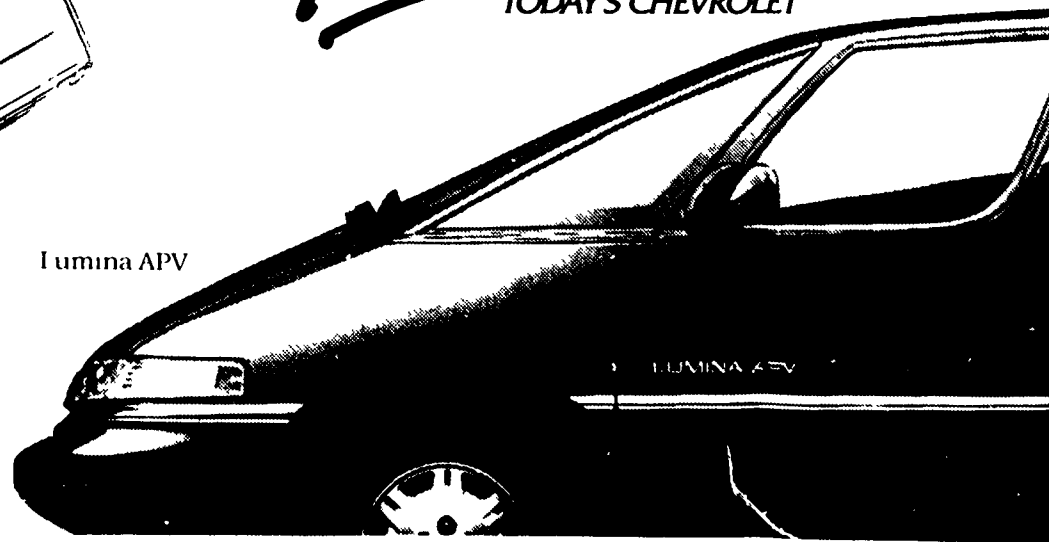

Stealth to pace Indy 500

A limited edition, 1991 Dodge Stealth will circle the brickyard at Indianapolis Raceway Park in May as official pace car of the world's most famous 500-mile race, but the public will have the chance to view the pace car at the North American International Auto Show Jan. 7-20 in Detroit.

The pearlescent yellow Stealth will be the first car to represent Dodge in the Indy spotlight since 1971, when a Dodge Challenger paced the field.

Except for fire and other safety equipment, very few modifications will be made to the Stealth. Because Indianapolis pace cars are traditionally open air, the Stealth's roof will be partially cut away to resemble, in the words of a Chrysler spokesman, a "quasi-convertible."

The 300 hp, 3.0-liter, 24-valve, twin turbocharged V6 engine that powers the top-of-the-line Stealth R/T Turbo will remain stock. And with almost every technological wonder available, the R/T Turbo's standard all-wheel drive, speed-sensitive, four-wheel steering and four-wheel, anti-lock brakes will be ready for any type of weather or track conditions at the race.

In street trim, the 2+2 sports car is

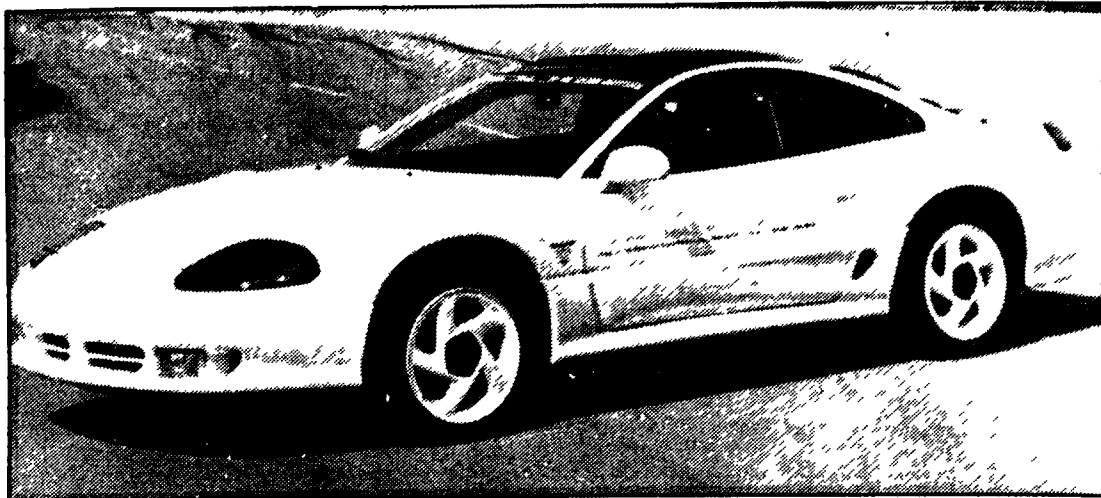
filled to the brim with interior creature comforts. Air conditioning, cruise control, power windows and door locks, and a 100-watt, six-speaker AM/FM stereo cassette system are a few of the R/T Turbo's standard features. The only options for the R/T Turbo are a CD player and leather seats.

The rest of the line, no less exciting but lower in price than the R/T Turbo, includes the base Stealth, Stealth ES and Stealth R/T. These models house a normally aspirated, 3.0-liter V6, ranging from the 164-hp version in the base, to the DOHC, 222-horsepower variant in the ES

and R/T. A driver's-side air bag is standard equipment. Prices for the Stealth run from \$16,000 to \$30,000.

The Stealth is the result of a collaborative effort between Chrysler and Mitsubishi. Chrysler's design office styled the Stealth, which traces its heritage back to the 1988 showstopping Dodge Intrepid concept vehicle. Mitsubishi's version is called the 3000GT. It encompasses the same technological features as the Stealth.

A limited-edition Dodge Stealth pace car replica is expected to arrive on dealer showroom floors this spring.

Chrysler features concept vehicles

The 1991 NAIAS will showcase the efforts from Chrysler's design and engineering staff. Scheduled to appear are the Chrysler 300, Dodge Neon and Jeep Wagoneer 2000.

The four-door Chrysler 300 hopes to conjure up memories of the company's luxury performance vehicles of the '60s. The 300's all-black driver's cockpit, including performance style seats, instrument cluster and contoured steering wheel, makes a bold styling statement.

The rear compartment, accessible through a hinged back door, contains separate headphones and combination TV/VCR/cellular phone.

And, with more than a passing nod to the 300's performance heritage, the concept car's engine is filled with Chrysler's 8.0 liter V-10 "Copperhead" engine mated to a four-speed automatic transmission.

According to Chrysler President Robert Lutz, the 300's designers had one purpose in mind: "We want a car that will make everybody run out to the store and look at it."

The Dodge Neon will likely ensure that NAIAS passers-by will stop and stare a little more at Chrysler's display. According to Chrysler's vice president, product design, Thomas Gale, the Dodge Neon "addresses recycling and other environmental issues as well as investigates an array of new features in a fun-to-drive package." Underscoring the concept vehicle's environmentally-conscious design, nearly every section on the Neon is made up from, or can be, recycled. For example, the wheels are made from recycled aluminum, and all interior panels are coded to identify the type of plastic used in the manufacturing process.

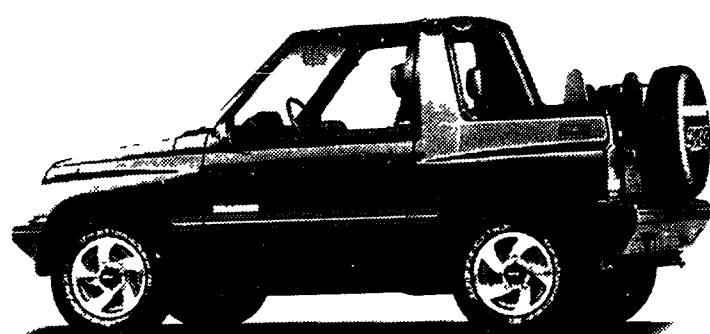
To fulfill the promise of fun-in-the-sun cruising, the Neon is equipped with an open-air sliding sunroof that incorporates a self-stowing rear window. Technically, the Neon showcases Chrysler's revolutionary External Breathing Direct Injection two-stroke engine. The powerplant provides greater output from a smaller displacement and weighs 40 percent less than a traditional four-stroke engine. The 1.1 liter motor produces over 100 horsepower.

In the heritage of Jeep's oldest and largest vehicle, the Grand Wagoneer, the new four-door Jeep Wagoneer 2000 provides a glimpse of what might be seen in future off-road vehicles.

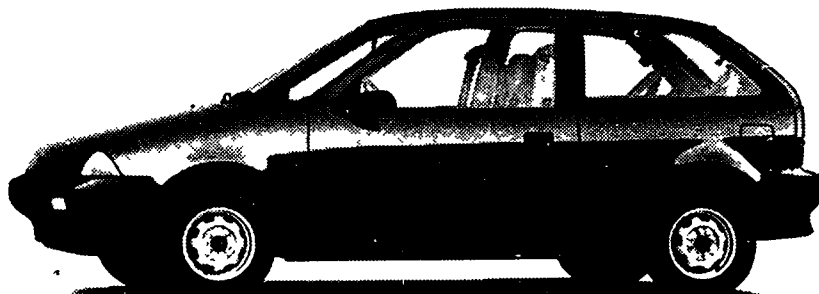
To start, the Wagoneer 2000 has an unusual six-person seating arrangement. What looks like two regular bench seats actually turn into a 2-plus-2-plus-2 bucket seat configuration. The middle of each bench contains a smaller center seat which can be relocated behind the second bench to vary the arrangement.

The "entertainment center"—featuring a TV, VCR and compact-disc player—moves on a track through the middle of the vehicle between six passengers.

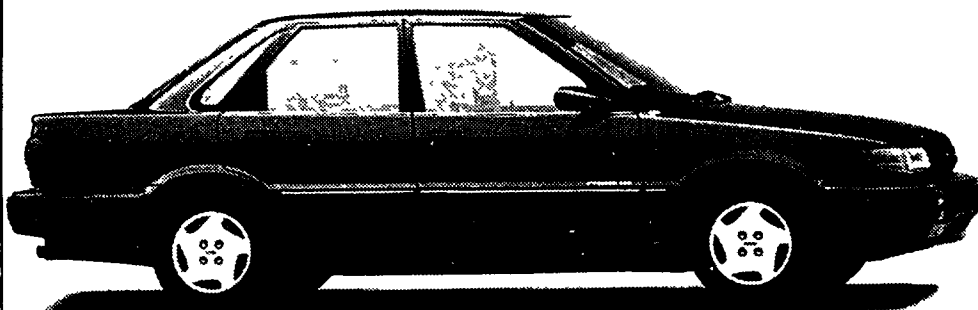
To keep the Wagoneer in the spirit of weekend fun, the tailgate pulls down to reveal two removable stadium seats. A flush-mounted pop-up roof rack accommodates the sports equipment owned by most Wagoneer buyers.



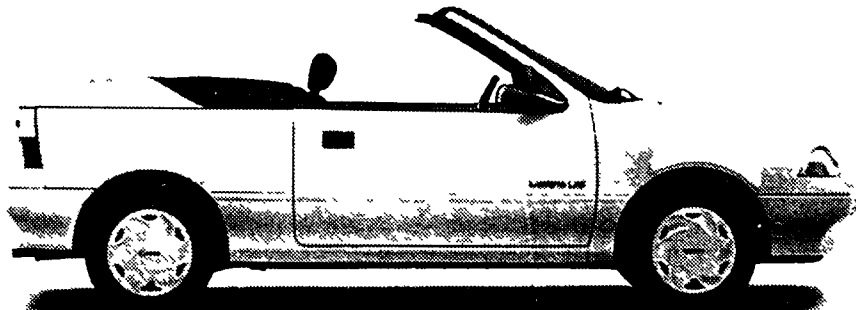

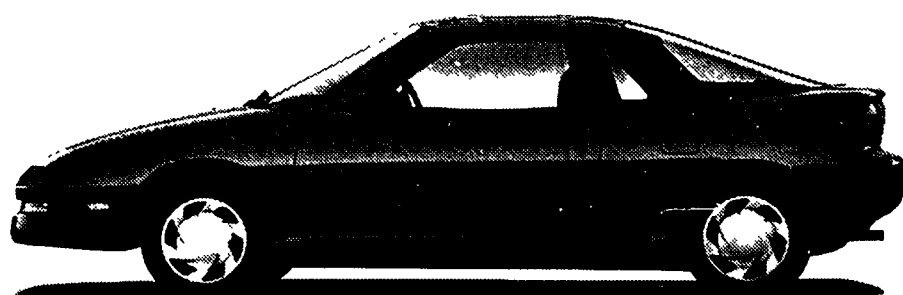

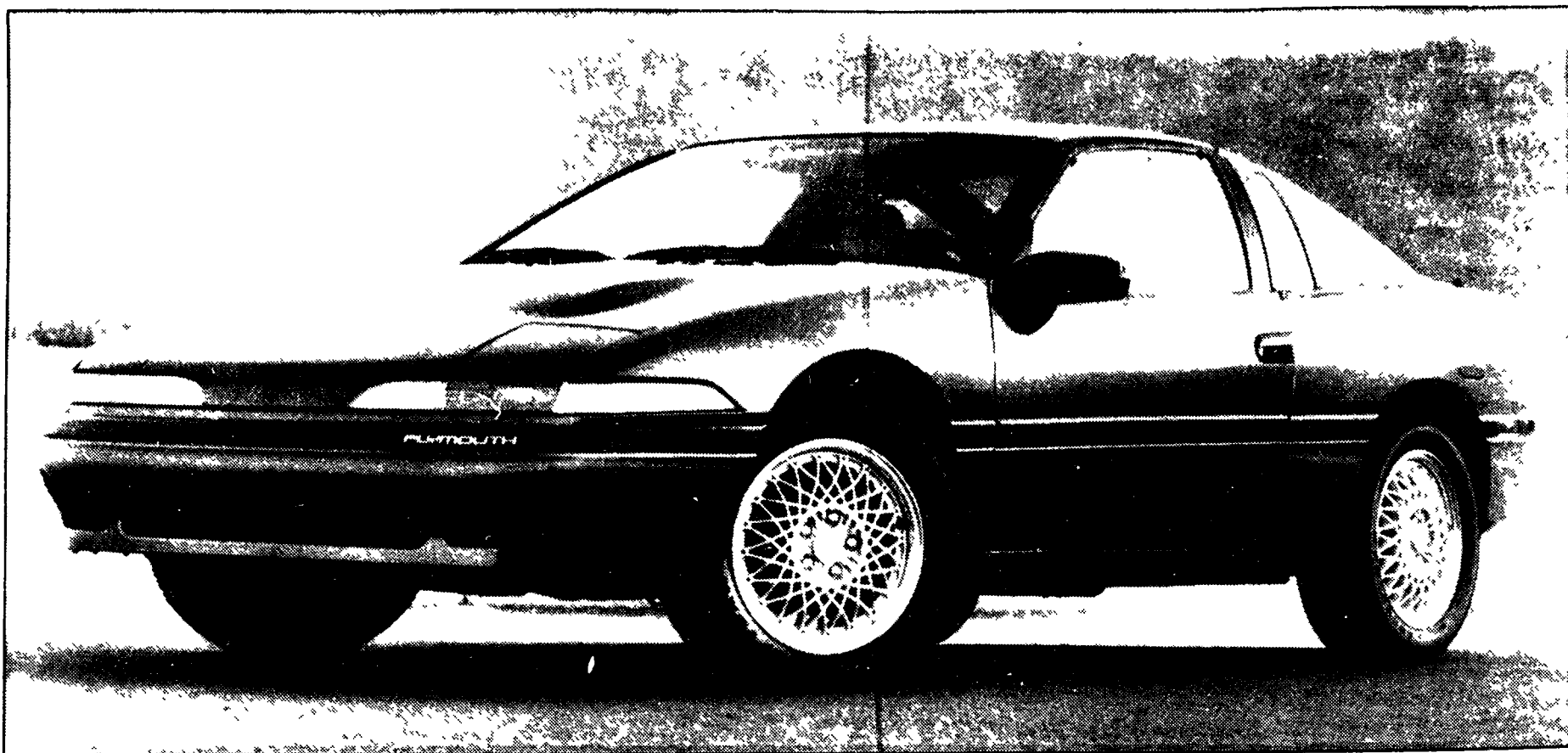

Performance cars: What's the future?

Industry experts discuss the future of high-end 'wonder cars'

Wealthy investors can still buy the following cars that more than double the national speed limit: Acura NSX (163 mph); BMW 750iL (158 mph); Chevrolet Corvette ZR-1 (171 mph); Dodge Stealth R/T (151 mph); Ferrari 348ts (166 mph); Porsche 928GT (169 mph).

Is it possible that governmental, environmental- or petroleum-backed laws will cause the demise of these high-end wonder cars?

Could it be that the only way we'll be able to come close to a Lamborghini Diablo is in a museum?

Actually, most of these high-line exotic cars will be on display at Detroit's North American International Auto Show.

Several questions require contemplation:

- Will performance be measured at the gas pumps and subsequently eliminate the 65 mph speed limit?
- Will we simply run out of open roads due to an ever-increasing population boom?
- Will higher gas-guzzler and luxury taxes put an end to mega-dollar performance cars?
- Will large cubic-inch V-8s go the way of the Tucker Torpedo?

A number of industry executives and experts were asked to give their opinions on the evolution of performance cars and to take the pulse of the present and future state of the performance car world.

They were asked:

- A. What defined "performance" 20-25 years ago?
- B. How has it evolved throughout the years?
- C. How will performance be measured 20-25 years from today?

Defining performance

Most auto manufacturers agreed that pinpointing the essence of performance in the 1960s was a simple contest of who had the most cubic inches.

Ralph Kramer, Chevrolet public relations director, said the nature of performance 25 years ago centered around "muscle cars that basically developed only gut-wrenching horsepower and straight-line, as in quarter-mile, acceleration."

Reg Harris, Pontiac's manager of media relations

sales and marketing, noted, "All it took was one sharp curve to let the driver know that powertrains in the original 'muscle car era' were certainly more advanced than the handling and braking capabilities of the cars."

Ford's Paul Preuss, public affairs manager, product and technology department, said these cars "were roughly 4,000 pounds and produced anywhere between 325-400 'advertised' horsepower." The combination of this weight and horsepower, coupled with unsophisticated braking and suspension systems, produced boulevard beasts that were extremely quick, but not very tame.

"Plus," Preuss added, "they only went about six to nine miles on a gallon of gas."

AutoWeek Editor Matt DeLorenzo echoed that view. He noted that the growth of the American muscle car was largely tied to successful factory-backed drag and stock car race teams that helped promote these cars.

The foreign manufacturers were equally influenced through racing endeavors and gained extensive exposure for their performance cars on Formula One racing circuits and endurance races like Le Mans. DeLorenzo also said that "the Europeans were much more sophisticated in their approach to performance in that they incorporated technologies like multi-valve double overhead cam V-12 engines that were, at the time, quite advanced."

Fuel efficiency, all-wheel-drive and computerized engine management systems were not part of the European or American enthusiasts' vocabulary.

Today's performance

The price of oil continued to rise throughout the 1970s and a balanced approach to finding more socially acceptable performance standards had to be developed.

With legendary V-8 engines like Chrysler's 426 Hemi and GM's LS6 454 achieving abysmal gas mileage figures, fans of American muscle cars saw the performance era characterized by these "big block" powerplants come to a screeching halt. Companies also began a phase of downsizing their product lines. As consumers witnessed more stabilized gas prices

in the 1980s, a new age of automotive enthusiasm was born.

Pontiac's Harris said, "Handling, fuel economy, interior packaging, freedom from squeaks and rattles, along with fit and finish were equally important as 0-to-60 mph and quarter-mile acceleration."

Preuss said the term "fun-to-drive" came to define well-balanced cars and not just stop-light screamers. "Since insurance companies almost singlehandedly put an end to the muscle cars, people found satisfaction in better handling and braking cars. You could sense a 'European influence' in the way new cars' suspensions were set up and less emphasis was placed on crude horsepower."

Automotive technology has progressed to a point where many high performance cars contain powerful multi-valve, four- and six- cylinder engines instead of just hulking V-8s.

Hugh Steward, national marketing manager for Ferrari, said, "Today's performance cars have as much speed and handling prowess as in the past, but many more creature comforts and sophistication."

"The domestic manufacturers," DeLorenzo said, "are still the best in the world at large cubic-inch engine applications and their overall packages, especially with the impressive advances made in the tire and handling departments, are much more sophisticated."

But that isn't to suggest that the Big Three are content. The Dodge Viper, for example, will have a V-10 engine. Chevrolet's Corvette ZR-1 thunders into the '90s with a 375-horsepower 32-valve V-8.

At present, foreign manufacturers are taking a page out of the domestic automotive history books by putting more emphasis on styling, offering more models with convertible options and equipping more cars with larger engines.

Future performance

"Human elements will not change," said Ferrari's Steward. "People will always want cars that boast impressive speed and power. The style of the performance business may change, but there will always be devotees."

Kramer believes that most future performance cars will get better fuel economy, weigh less and have all-wheel-drive.

BMW's Mitchell adds that "a car that heats and cools well and can be licensed for the road may be the performance benchmark."

He still sees performance as being properly "balanced," but adds that technologies focused on improving fuel efficiency, environmental concerns and safety regulations will have increasing influence on the cars we drive.

Technological breakthroughs aimed at "fine tuning" cars will probably become more prevalent, DeLorenzo said. "It may get to the point where you can 'program' a car to specific driving environments in the forms of adjustable suspension tuning and power output."

DeLorenzo also sees continued driving enjoyment for the future. "Pure performance will still be in, and advances in electronic engine management, all-wheel-drive and traction control systems will filter down to less expensive cars."

Nearly every manufacturer offers some sort of adjustable suspension system and "trick" transmissions, such as Subaru's Electronic Continuously Variable Transmission and Porsche's Tiptronic, are currently available.

More and more cars are being offered with safety features like airbags and all-wheel-drive. Multi-valve engines (Dodge's 16-valve, four cylinder and GM's 3.4 liter, 24-valve, V-6 engines are new for '91) and traction control (Cadillac's Allante and Lincoln's Town Car to name a few) are also becoming more mainstream.

At the high-end of the performance market, a few companies are experimenting with active suspensions (now available on the 1991 Infiniti Q45) and increasing their use of light weight body and chassis components like aluminum (Acura NSX) and Kevlar (Ferrari F40).

But on a more affordable level, General Motors is offering a low-cost, anti-lock braking system on its 1991 Buick Skylark Gran Sport, Oldsmobile Cutlass Calais I-Series and Pontiac Grand Am SE models.

"Performance and high technology features will drift down to the consumer level," said Ford's Preuss.

GM's new Saturn line already attracting huge crowds

One of the biggest events at the North American International Auto Show has always been introduction of new cars for the upcoming year.

This will be the first year for the new Saturn line, General Motors' newest line of small, sporty automobiles featuring world-class quality designed to compete directly with the Japanese imports.

With new design characteristics, a manufacturing processes that includes state-of-the-art assembly, a greater emphasis on a management/labor team approach and a new marketing strategy aimed straight at the heart of the import car market, GM execs hope Saturn makes a big impact.

Saturn spokesperson Donald Haberek said despite this being Saturn's first year at the auto show, its display will be very restrained.

"There will probably be 10 or 11 vehicles (of four models) in a variety of colors, enough so people can get a good idea of what we're offering," he said.

Knowledgeable people will be on hand to answer questions.

The basic plan for the surrounding display is to emphasize the people who build the car, the process and perhaps a little of history behind the new line.

"It will reflect the type of company and the type of people involved in the Saturn. It will be very professional," Haberek said. "We want to focus on the car and the people rather than the flash and trash."

Karen Tibus, president of Saturn of Plymouth, said she hasn't seen a new product generate this much excitement in 18 years of automotive retailing.

"I have a customer who's getting a car Friday who says he is getting a lot of interest from co-workers," Tibus said. "He said he's getting more attention for buying a Saturn than he would if he were buying a

Lamborghini."

Of the 23 cars she received through early December, Tibus sold 21 and could have sold the other two, but she wanted to keep several on hand for test drives.

Tibus said she also has 35 deposits for cars on order. "I don't think we'll have any problems selling 150 to 200 cars a month."

Tibus said current car production has not met demand and many buyers are left waiting, but customers

have been understanding. It is far better that Saturn moves slowly and turns out high-quality cars than rushing imperfect ones to market.

"People would rather wait and get quality," she said.

In fact, the wait for the car may be creating more interest and adding to the car's appeal by making it more exclusive.

"People love it. They come in, test drive it and buy it," Tibus said.

Although the dealership isn't open

on Saturdays, Tibus said she recently stopped in the office to catch up on a little paperwork. "I wasn't there long, but there must have been at least 100 people who stopped by," Tibus said.

Tibus said several aspects of the new car line are readily apparent to the customers, most notably the car's spirit, its interior room and its serviceability.

"Somewhere along the line, people got the idea the Saturns would be sluggish," Tibus said. "Now after they

drive it, they're impressed with its pep."

And although the car is being marketed as a small car, customers are also impressed with the car's roomy interior.

Several buyers, she said, have also pointed out the car's "service friendliness." Sparkplugs are easily replaced, oil and air filters are accessible, and fluid levels are easily measured because they are in clear containers.

Surprisingly, Tibus said, few customers have mentioned the new line's affordability.

Saturn's initial line consists of three basic cars: the SL/SL1 sedan, the basic four-door model, the SL2 sedan, the luxury four-door touring sedan, and the SL two-door sports coupe. Prices range from \$8,200 to \$13,500.

Saturn Corp.'s four-million square-foot manufacturing and assembly complex in Spring Hill, Tenn., is still turning out less than 100 cars per day, limiting those available for sale, according to published reports.

According to Donald Hudler, Saturn vice-president for sales, service and marketing, the success of Saturn will depend largely on the partnership that's been established between General Motors, Saturn management, suppliers, workers and dealers.

Saturn dealers are playing a larger role in the manufacturing and marketing of automobiles. Dealers were involved in the development of dealership systems, the advertising and marketing strategy, and even in selecting other dealers, Hudler said.

Four Saturn dealerships have been granted in the Detroit area, including Saturn of Plymouth, Saturn of Troy, Saturn of Warren and Saturn of Clarkston.

Haberek said Saturn franchisees were chosen primarily because of their track records in customer service. "Essentially, these are people who are really interested in providing the ultimate in customer satisfaction," Haberek said.

Emphasis on customer service is part of the Saturn market-area approach, he said. Instead of having traditional full-service dealers, Saturn dealers will have more autonomy in tailoring their sales and service facilities to handle the various ways car buyers select, purchase and service their cars.

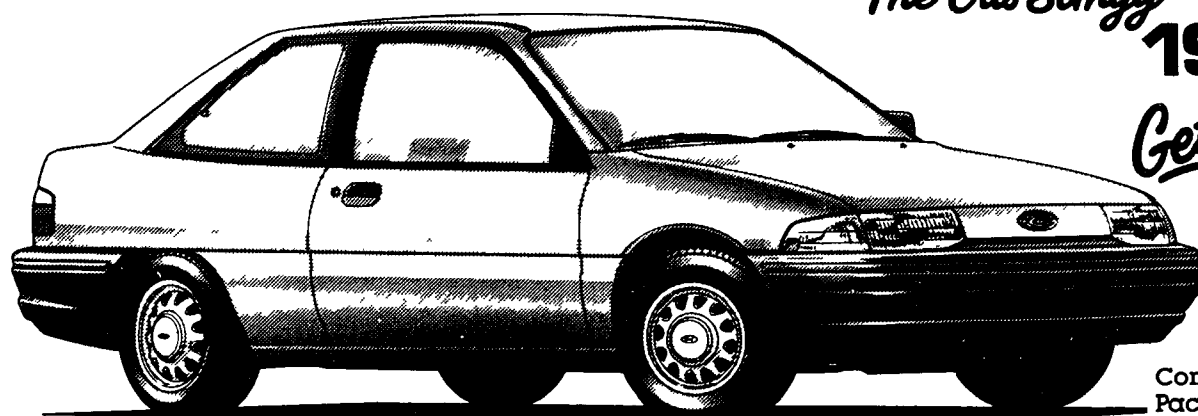

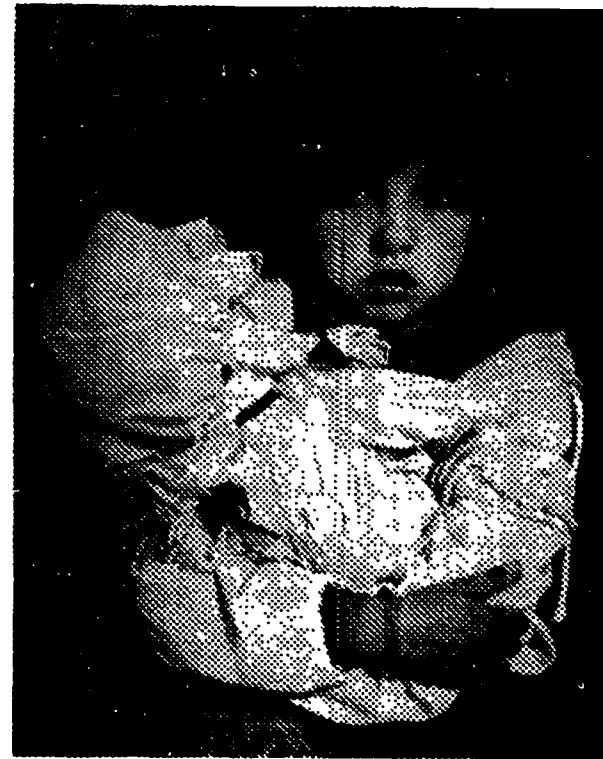

directing "because she can walk away and go home." She began as the 'Audio' person on shoots. She likes this position because you were expected to sit down and she could make comments and know that no one would hear her. Because of this responsibility she was able to have a vantage point from which she could see and understand what 'behind the scenes' means. Metrovisions' staff person urged Pat to go from audio to directing.

Both Patrick and Patricia emphasize the importance of trust throughout the crew. Keeping calm and concentrating on the responsibility of each crew position is a priority for each person. The Director is the supreme ruler during the taping therefore independent creativity is only explored upon the wishes of the director.

An important and yet difficult task is reviewing the show afterward and dealing with criticism. Everyone recognizes that they must learn the fundamentals even as they are having fun.

Eager and driven, Patrick would encourage all of you to participate. He would love to hear from the viewers and wouldn't mind new ideas. Look forward to the shows of 1991 as they strive for a more comfortable looking set. Make yourself cozy, sit back and enjoy the show!

Gregg Rainwater feels duty with 'Young Riders' role

Actor brings sensitivity to role as native American

Gregg Rainwater is in tune with nature as his character Buck Cross on ABC's "The Young Riders."

Before moving to Tucson last year for the show, Rainwater enjoyed seeking out quiet, natural environments in and around L.A. They say the grass is always greener on the other side of the fence, and that's the case with Rainwater. Now that he's in the serenity of the desert around Tucson, he has a new pastime.

"Right now I'm trying to understand this computer 'thang,'" he said, discussing the new computer equipment he had just bought. "I understand kindergarteners are learning computers these days, and here I am totally computer illiterate."

But the Young Rider does have several other passions: his Humane Society adoptee, a chow/malamute or husky mix named k.d. (after k.d. lang), and involvement in the Earth Communications Organization. E.C.O. consists of members of the media who try to get ecological messages across through their work. An example he gave of how the group works is the episode of "Murphy Brown" in which the "F.Y.I." staff begins recycling.

One effort he made last year was

to use china plates on the set of "The Young Riders" instead of the styrofoam plates provided by the caterer. Fellow cast members once thought him strange, he said, but this year the caterer offers a choice, and many cast members are selecting china.

"What this group is trying to do is to sort of weave environmental messages into the fabric of peoples' psyche through the media, through print," he explained.

The young actor takes that sensitivity about the world into his role as mixed breed Indian Buck Cross on ABC's "The Young Riders." Buck is the product of a Kiowa Indian mother and a white trapper father. He understands both worlds, but doesn't quite fit into either.

"I like his coming from both sides — the white part and the Indian part. He has a wider perspective than a lot of the other riders have. He's had to; he's seen both sides...He's actually more on the stabilizing side of the characters," Rainwater said.

Rainwater in real life is part Indian. The grandson of a Cherokee and Osage Indian, Rainwater believes he has extra responsibility to provide a positive role model through the character. His fan mail seems to suggest he is succeeding.

Female fans of Rainwater's may be interested in knowing that, at present, he is not romantically involved. He's still looking for a woman who's more Earthly than glamorous. "I've met many of them, but not 'her.' That will come. Whatever will be will be," he said with an uncomfortable pause that lightened up with, "Right now I have a dog."

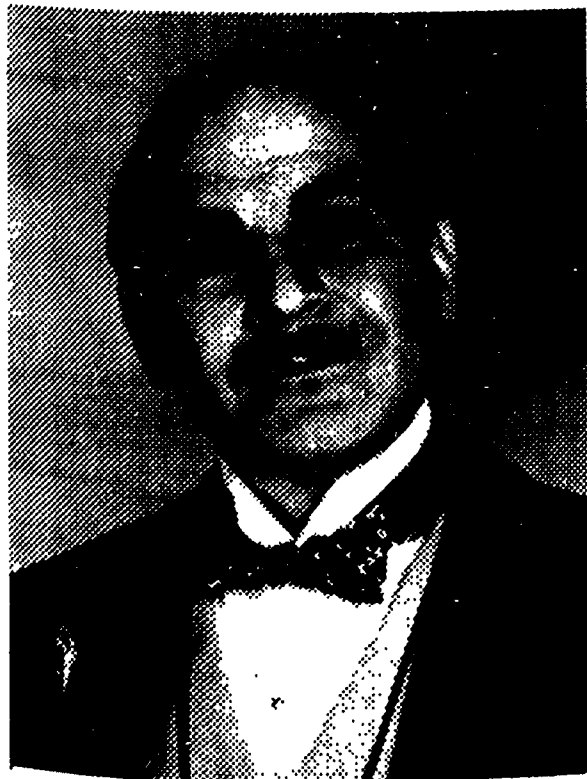

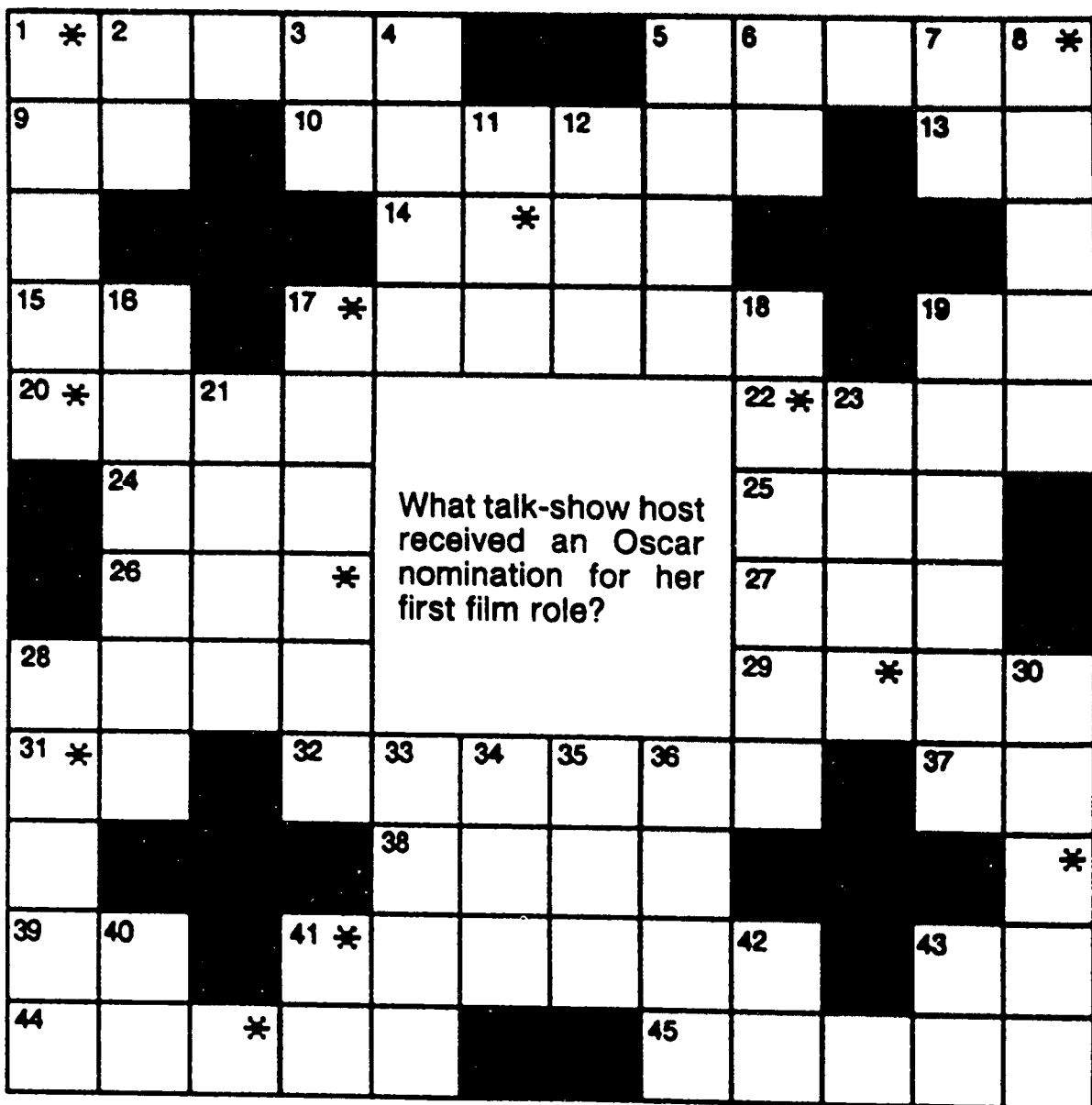

A: When you say "recently discovered Carole Lombard," I feel I must tell you something about this charming actress. She was one of Hollywood's most talented and glamorous stars of the '30s as well as a sophisticated comedienne. Happily married to Clark Gable, she unfortunately was killed in a plane crash, returning from a War Bond selling tour. She was 34 years old. She had appeared in over 50 films, but I will give you only the names of her films available on tape: *High Voltage*; *In Name Only*; *Made for Each Other*; *My Man Godfrey*; *Mr. and Mrs. North*; *Nothing Sacred*; *Power*; *Racketeer*; *Swing High, Swing Low*; *They Knew What They Wanted*; *To Be or Not to Be*; and *Twentieth Century*.
