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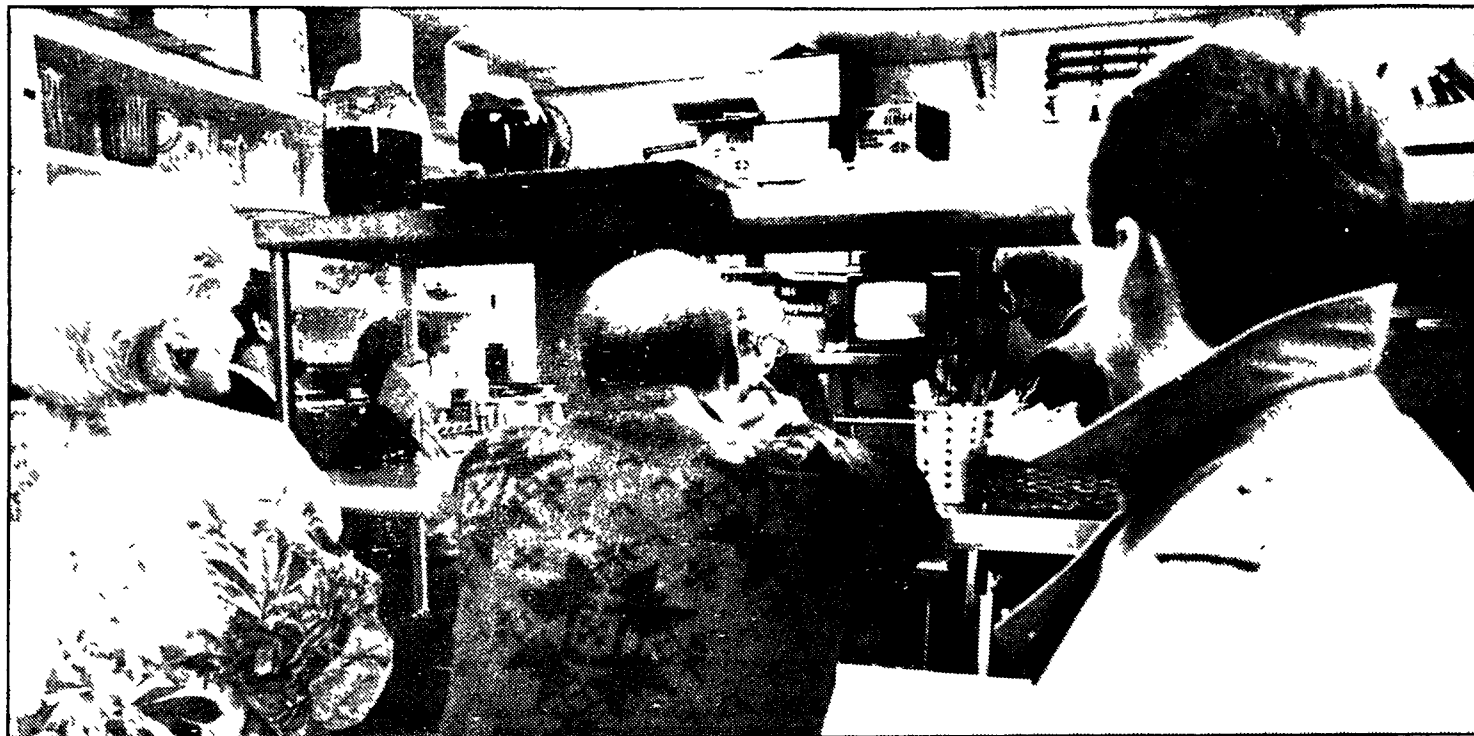

Dam erodes; lake drains

A section of aging Waterford Dam eroded early Friday, draining Waterford Lake and dumping a torrent of water and tons of ice and sediment into the Middle Rouge River.

Residents of Cedar Lake Apartments and Lakes of Northville subdivision awoke Friday morning to find their scenic lake abruptly transformed to mud and ice flats.

Sheets of ice and hundreds of dead fish littered the Waterford Bend portion of Cass Benton Parkway across the road from the dam.

A Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) official said dam erosion was responsible for draining the lake.

"I went out there briefly (Friday) to look at it and confirmed the dam gave way there," said Martin Hendges, environmental quality analyst with the DNR's Surface Water Quality Division.

Waterford Dam is located just east of Northville Road approximately one-eighth-mile north of Six Mile Road in Northville Township.

The dam is the property of the Jonna Company of Farmington Hills. The company did not return a reporter's calls by press time Friday.

Waterford Lake is created by damming the Middle Rouge River. Outflow is controlled by allowing water to flow from the dam to the portion of the Middle Rouge that undercuts Northville Road.

The dam was constructed in 1901. No information was available to suggest that renovations have taken place over the years, a township official said.

Hendges said fellow DNR officials had met with Jonna Company representatives Friday.

"It's my understanding (the owner) tentatively agreed to construct a new

WATCHING THE WAR

Northville mobilizes in support

The effects of Operation Desert Storm swept the streets of Northville last week, as local leaders declared their support for the United Nations forces now fighting in the Middle East.

City and township officials spent Friday morning drafting a resolution declaring Northville an official support city of Operation Desert Storm. The local resolution, citing the U.N. statement authorizing allied troops to use military force against Iraq for failing to pull out of Kuwait after its Aug. 2 invasion, endorsed the efforts of a local support group to aid families of military personnel involved in Operation Desert Storm.

The city's decision was praised by Ginny Hathhorn, co-founder with fellow Northville resident Sue Pittonet of the West Side Chapter of the Michigan Military Family Support Group. "I'm very, very proud of Northville for doing this, and we hope we're a model town and that other cities follow our lead," she said. "Our big hope is that when our boys come back home that

they will know they were loved, and missed, and thought of while they were gone. It's too good to be true, almost, to know that the whole town's going to get behind you."

The local resolution also endorsed the support group's organization of a more visible symbol of support. Hathhorn and other group members decorated Main Street storefronts Friday afternoon with red, white and blue ribbons. One store in particular, Perrin's, devoted its store windows to Operation Desert Storm, with a display highlighted by American flags, bunting, and model jet fighters.

Store employee Hugh Jordan, busy hanging flags in the window with his son, Jason, recalled watching the start of the attack on Iraq. "I was watching on CNN when they started a few nights ago, and you could see the flashes of light," he said. "I was thinking this doesn't look like a drill, this looks like the real thing."

Jordan modeled an "Operation Desert Storm" T-shirt being sold by the store. For every shirt sold, Perrin's will send a shirt to a member of the armed forces overseas. The store is also selling bumper stickers reading "We are proud of our troops," the proceeds of which will help pay for postage to send the T-shirts overseas.

Visitors to downtown Northville heard as well as saw evidence of the community's support for the armed forces.

At home, we wait and hope

Saddam Hussein was given sufficient warning to leave Kuwait and President George Bush took a necessary step by invading Iraq Jan. 16, local residents agreed.

Support for the president's action was unanimous among those interviewed, but some cautioned against moving too quickly to end the war.

American flags were flying high at Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 4012 in Northville last week. Bartender Merle Hoag said the VFW post was "very crowded" Wednesday night, when U.S. and other pilots first began bombing Iraqi military installations.

"Most of the people were interested in what was going on, and they wanted to get together with friends and discuss it," Hoag said.

Hoag, a member of the Army's occupational forces in Germany during the Korean War, said images of the Gulf war stirred disturbing memories.

"I wouldn't think that it would

bring back any pleasant memories for any veteran, because I think the veterans are a group that's more against war than any other group in the country," he said. "They know about the fear, the boredom and the loneliness."

Hoag said he approved of President George Bush's actions so far, but hoped that the president would not attempt to use ground troops too soon to run Iraqi forces out of Kuwait.

"It's fine to get it over with provided that the casualties aren't too high (but) I don't think we should go in there too quickly just to get it over with," he said.

The VFW was nearly deserted Friday afternoon, with Hoag and the bar's two patrons staring at the CNN newscast on a corner television. Display cases surrounding the men highlighted mementos from former wars: artillery shells, arm patches, medals, pictures and little American flags.

World War II Japanese rifles with bayonets attached to their barrels hung over two of the cases, grim reminders of a more face-to-face form of combat that, as of Friday, armed forces had not yet faced.

Traffic inside the post's clubhouse was light that afternoon, but reaction among the few assembled veterans was firm.

"They gave them plenty of notice," said Northville resident Cloice Myers. "Why give (Iraqis) more time to fortify?"

Lawmakers to override cut?

State Sen. Robert Geake assured concerned city officials City Hall Friday morning that Gov. John Engler's recent executive order slashing state-returned racetrack revenues to racetrack cities probably will be turned down by the Senate Appropriations Committee tomorrow.

But he warned the officials from Northville, Livonia and Hazel Park that the executive order would be resubmitted, probably with the call for cuts to state-returned racetrack revenues intact.

Geake, R-Northville, said the executive order would be turned down because of Democratic opposition to the order's deep cuts in General Assistance. The section, which would cut about \$450,000 from this year's state-returned revenue to the City of Northville, is one small part of an order announced Wednesday that would cut more than \$500 million from the state budget.

Officials from Livonia and Hazel Park met with Northville City officials and Geake at Northville City Hall on Friday to discuss a strategy to oppose the cuts in state-returned racetrack revenue. The city officials hope to lobby legislators about the need to

maintain the revenues, which pay for locally provided police and other services at the racetracks.

The order will be voted on tomorrow by the Senate and House appropriations committees. Geake is one of five members of the 13-member Senate committee who represent cities with racetracks.

In Northville, the effect of the cuts would be "very serious," said City Manager Steven Walters. Northville Downs generated \$865,566 in state-returned revenue for the city in 1990. Of that amount, \$558,043 paid for the increased police patrols used at the track.

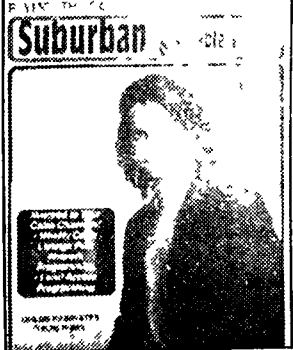
As Walters explained, the seven-man patrols represent a major share of the city's total police service. "Our regular shift is only three people, so in manpower it's like two extra shifts," he said.

Another \$235,788 was divided between development of a new Cadby Street parking deck and replacement of water mains in South Center Street, both of which benefitted the racetrack, according to Walters' yearly report to the racing commissioner on the revenue's use.

The remainder of the revenue went to provide fire services and refuse collection at the track.

MUSTANG UPDATE: The Northville gymnastics team notched its highest score of the young season on Jan. 14, and it came on the road against the state's top-ranked team.

That's why Mustang Coach Jeff Pergament wasn't the least bit disappointed in the wake of his squad's 133.15-125.8 loss at Plymouth Salem.

The Mustangs (1-1 overall) will not get back into action until Jan. 24. A meet scheduled for Jan. 16 against Farmington Harrison was canceled because the Hawks have not been able to field a team this season.

WILDCAT UPDATE: It was a unique format, but the outcome was hardly a surprise.

In what is believed to be the program's first competition in a three-team format, the Novi swimmers turned back both Walled Lake schools on Jan. 15. Student earns part of 'the Wall'

All Northville student Bill McClintock got for winning second place in an international contest between 100,000 students was a piece of rock. But he's not complaining. McClintock, a Northville High School freshman, won a piece of the Berlin Wall. The wall once divided the East German city of Berlin. That was when there was an East Germany. McClintock's knowledge of history and current events during the time of the reunification of Germany helped him win second place in the contest. The contest was given by the Goethe House New York, which is an arm of the German government. "The German government is very supportive of our teaching their language," Northville High School German teacher Judith Kammeraad said.

Kammeraad had her class, including McClintock, prepare for the test by making a scrapbook of news clippings related to Germany's reunification.

First place was a trip to Berlin. The 3-inch-by-4-inch pieces of the Berlin Wall were given to 1,000 second-place winners.

Besides McClintock, two other Michigan participants won prizes in the contest. Students from Onsted and Ann Arbor were winners.

One side of McClintock's concrete chunk of history is covered with blue paint, once part of wall graffiti. With his rock, McClintock received a picture of his piece of the wall being carved out by an unknown man with a chisel in hand.

McClintock plans to frame the rock, and keep it for awhile. But he would part with it, for the right price.

"If someone offered me a lot of money, I would probably sell it," he said. "But I wouldn't go out and try to sell it."

The test was given Oct. 9, a week after the reunification of Germany.

"They had to watch TV every night to prepare themselves for taking the test," Kammeraad said.

First lady praises class act

Village Oaks Elementary is to be a kinder, gentler school this year, and even Barbara Bush knows it.

After receiving letters from students and teachers at the Village Oaks Elementary School in Novi, the first lady replied with a handwritten response. The students got Bush's attention when they informed her that the school's theme for the year is to have a kinder, gentler school. A sign outside of the building announces their intentions to all who enter.

It all began when teachers and administrators at Village Oaks were looking for a theme for the school year.

"We wanted to teach respect. (Kinder and gentler) is just a phrase that's been used a lot and it fit what we wanted to do," Village Oaks principal David Brown said.

The phrase was used by President George Bush, Barbara's husband, during his campaign for the presidency. Despite having borrowed a Republican politician's phrase, the school remains nonpartisan, Brown

said.

The opportunity to send word to Washington, D.C., of the school's "kinder and gentler" disposition arose when a friend of first-grade Village Oaks teacher Pam Conger was scheduled to meet Bush for lunch. Conger informed the school of her connection to the White House, and a package of letters and pictures was compiled.

Bush responded to the students' letters with her own handwritten letter which said:

Dear students of Village Oaks Elementary School, I received your wonderful letters about your "kinder and gentler" school. I am so proud of you all — you, your teachers and your parents. You will make the world better for us all. Have a great Christmas and a peaceful, kinder, gentler 1991.

Finances slow new school

A sluggish economy could somewhat delay the building of the Northville School District's newest elementary, planned for a site on Nine Mile Road in Novi.

But the doors may open in September 1993, Northville School Superintendent George Bell told the Novi City Council Jan. 14.

"Growth has slowed down somewhat, so we're not in a hurry to open a building until there are students to move into it," he said.

At that time, the school on Nine Mile Road between Taft and Beck roads is expected to be at two-thirds capacity, he added.

The city council unanimously granted the school district a lot split for the land, previously denied by the Novi city assessor. The property division was also requested by the Autrys and Beztak Dunbarton Limited Partnership, subdivision developers who have also purchased a section of the horse farm.

City Assessor James Klausmeyer vetoed the split in December because the ownership of the land seemed to be in question and violations of the city's setback requirements due to the locations of a barn, shed and animal shelter.

However, further documents then supplied by the applicants resolved the ownership question, Klausmeyer wrote in a memo to the city council.

To clear up the setback question, the district wrote the city that Autry would remove his barn by May 31, or Northville schools would.

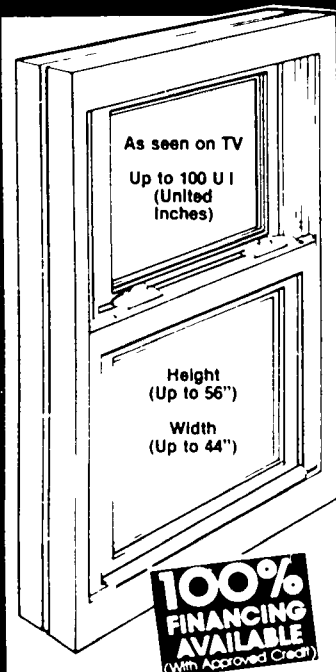
The grade school will be built on 18 acres of land currently occupied by Thurman and Lillian Autry's horse farm.

The construction will be funded by a 1989 school bond issue. The school board paid \$750,000 for the land alone.

The school did not acquire the oil and gas leases for the land. These are held by Elexco Land Services, Inc.

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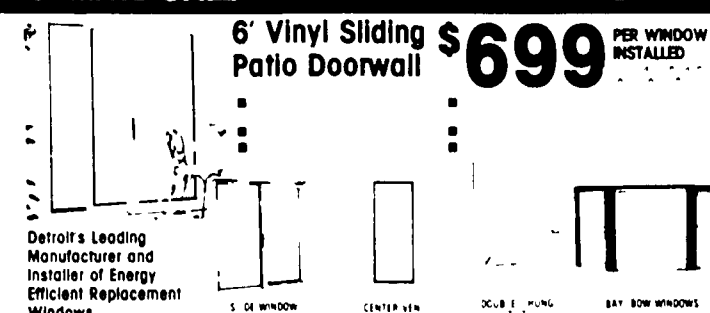

Union halts work on MainCentre

Picketers halted interior work on the MainCentre project Friday morning, protesting the wages and fringe benefits paid by Mac Interiors of Taylor.

Half a dozen carpenters stood at the corner of Main and Center and at the south end of the building, carrying signs that read "Mac Interiors does not pay prevailing wages and fringes." The picket was organized by the local Carpenter's District Council, according to the signs.

The protesters, who said they did not want their names used for fear of retaliation, said other union workers had left the building in response to their picket. "Every trade in there has pulled off; electricians, plumbers, fitters, insulators, cement finishers, sheet metal workers, everyone," said one worker.

Others said the picket came after talks among the workers, Mac Interiors and Singh Development had fallen through. "We've been trying to

work things out for a year now," said one. Another said, "We had a meeting set up with the owner of Singh, but he keeps balking."

A business representative of the Carpenter's Union said the picket is due to unfair pay rates by Mac Interiors. "We got an interior contractor in there that does not pay the prevailing rate established in our collective bargaining agreement, and no fringe benefits," he said. "We have other union contractors here, we feel it's a un-

"We don't have a problem with Singh; we have a problem with Mac Interiors."

Mitch Kuffa, construction supervisor at MainCentre, said the picket had not driven all workers off the site. "A lot of them are still here," he said.

Mac Interiors could not be reached for comment.
Singh Vice President Michael

Kahm downplayed the effect of the picket, saying, "It's just one of the many things you go through during a construction job." Kahm said the picket was intended to alert Mac Interiors owner Mac Amburgey to the protester's concerns. "They wanted to get his attention, and that's how they do it," he said.

Apparently, the tactic worked. By 11 a.m., Amburgey reportedly was at the job site meeting with representatives of the carpenter's union and Singh representative Rick Grenier. The results of those negotiations were not known by press time.

Construction workers at the site reported some vandalism in connection with the picket, though it was unclear who was responsible for the incidents.

Conrad Payne, a foreman for Mac Interiors who said he and his crew honored the picket line, reported that two tires on his pickup truck were slashed sometime during the morning. "Today there's picketers out here and my tires are slashed," he said. "I don't know who did it."

Engler's tax cuts may draw some protest

Here are some taxpayer questions and answers about Gov. John Engler's proposed 20 percent property tax cut:

Q. Engler's plan sounds like the Headlee II tax cut initiative. Is it?

- A. There are major differences.
- Engler's would be phased in over three years; Headlee's, in two.
- Engler's would cut school operating property taxes (about 65 percent of your total bill); Headlee's, all school, city, township, county and community college taxes.
- Engler's would cap future assessment increases; Headlee's wouldn't.

They are similar because they would require the state general fund budget to make up lost local revenue. Engler hasn't said exactly where it would come from, but he clearly aims to downsize state government. Headlee calls Engler's plan too complicated.

Q. Suburban home assessments have been rising faster than the consumer price index. Would Engler's plan control them?

A. Engler proposes a constitutional

amendment to cap assessment increases by class of property. You would vote on it in 1992.

Currently, assessments are capped by community. Suppose the CPI rises 5 percent. Homeowners can be hit with 10-percent increases if business property values remain flat. This is widely seen as a flaw in the 1978 Headlee tax limitation amendment.

Engler would cap increases for each class of property (homes/farms, commercial, industrial and mining) at the CPI rate or 5 percent, whichever is less.

Q. That cap on assessment increases would mean lost revenue to cities, townships, villages, counties and community colleges. Will the state make up the difference here?

A. No. Neither will out-of-formula school districts, which get all their revenues from property taxes, be reimbursed for losses due to capping assessment hikes.

Q. How does the 20 percent tax cut go into effect — assuming the Legislature passes it?

A. Your property is assessed at 50 percent of the supposed market value now. That ratio would be cut to 45 percent in calendar 1991, then 42.5 percent in '92 and 40 percent in '93

and thereafter.

Q. What about millage rates?

A. No change.

Q. In dollar terms, how does the typical Michigan family make out?

A. The typical family with a \$70,000 home would save \$119 this year and \$380 a year by 1994.

Q. Do commercial, industrial and mining property get the same cuts as homes and farms?

A. Yes — under both Engler's and Headlee's plans. Democrats don't like that feature. Ex-Gov. James Blanchard had proposed cuts only for homeowners. House Democrats are talking about a graduated scale favoring lower incomes.

Q. Many senior citizens object to paying school operating taxes. Do they get any special benefit under Engler's plan?

A. Yes. They would be exempt from 50 percent of school operating taxes in '91, 75 percent in '92 and 100 percent in '93 and thereafter. This exemption would apply only to the primary home. Only those with income below \$73,650 would be eligible.

This idea will get lots of quiet resistance. Critics say education is a community obligation, and seniors are still part of the com-

munity, aren't they? Young people aren't exempted from paying taxes for Social Security, the Office of Services to the Aging and senior citizens' centers — so the argument goes.

Q. There has been talk in Lansing of tax-base sharing — taking business tax growth from well-heeled districts and spreading the wealth on a per-pupil basis. Is that part of Engler's proposal?

A. No.

Q. Our assessments are adjusted, usually upward, every year. Engler wants to change that to every two years. Why?

A. This will give the state time to put the 5 percent assessment cap on the ballot. It will mean you won't get an increase every year. It will allow two years to complete all tax appeals.

And as noted above, it will cost local governments revenue — for which they won't be reimbursed.

Q. Our household has been getting an income tax rebate because our property taxes are more than 3.5 percent of household income — the "circuit breaker." How will Engler's plan affect us?

A. That's a tough one. First, your rebate will go down because your property taxes will

go down.

Second, the maximum allowable income tax rebate would go up. Currently, you can't receive a rebate of more than \$1,200. That would increase to \$1,400 this year and rise \$100 a year to a maximum of \$2,500.

This feature could be politically unpopular — "help the rich."

Q. It looks like all these property tax cuts will cost the state general fund a bundle. How much?

A. It's tricky to figure because the property tax year is different from the state fiscal year, which started Oct. 1.

Engler's figures show the cost at \$123 million in the current fiscal year (ending Sept. 30), then \$439 million in fiscal year '92, then \$885 million in fiscal year '93 and \$1.2 billion in fiscal year '94.

The current general fund budget is about \$7.4 billion. So, finding the money to reimburse schools will become progressively more challenging. It will eat up much of the normal growth in state revenue.

dam out there," he said.

Hedges did not know when the dam was to be reconstructed.

Residents were upset to see the muddy remnants of the lake.

"This is a migratory site for geese," said Cedar Lake Apartments resident Richard Henriette. "I don't know what's going to happen to the geese without a lake."

Sylvia Elvy, manager of Cedar Lakes Apartments, called the situation "disastrous."

"The residents are very concerned, very upset," she said. "A lot of the people, this is why they live here, for the beautiful, natural lake," she said.

Hedges said the dam woes "put a lot of sediment into public waters" but he doubted the owner would be fined.

"It's possible, but it doesn't sound like (the DNR) is going to go after them," he said.

"I hope to hell we knock the hell out of them in a hurry. I think we're going to bomb them real good."

Myers, an Army and Air Force veteran who paid his dues in World War II and Korea, swirled his straw in a bloody Mary and marveled at the technology showcased by the U.S. military.

"With the weapons today, they can pinpoint anything," he said.

But Myers worried about his grandson, who he said works with a tank crew at an unspecified site in the Persian Gulf region.

"I hope it gets over as fast as possible," he said.

Plymouth resident Gaspar Valenti sat on a bar stool at the Starting Gate Saloon and intently watched the war unfold on a big-screen television.

"It's too bad this wasn't settled peacefully," he said. "It never should have happened; it looks like greed one way or another."

Valenti, a World War II Navy veteran, said he backs President Bush

but worries about an extended conflict.

"I feel bad for the boys that are over there, real bad," he said. "I personally think its going to last awhile."

"I'm no expert, but from what we hear through the news media, (Hussein) has something up his sleeve."

The war was a hot topic of conversation among Northville City's own armed forces, at the local police department.

"I sure hope that Bush keeps on doing what he's doing, that is letting the military handle the operation," said Det. Sgt. Dave Fendoleit. The detective echoed others' fears when he said, "After (the Iraqis) dig in, if they're not demoralized we'll have to go in with ground fire."

Patrolman Bill Edgar agreed, saying, "The biggest thing is rooting those guys out of where they're dug in."

Builders foresee strong '91

Robert Meisner/Condo Queries

Craving for carport could cause trouble

The condominium complex I live in has covered carport areas for its residents to use. The problem is that there is not a sufficient amount of spaces for the number of residents in the complex. I have learned from other residents that a number of years ago, quite some time before I became a resident, the association had asked all residents whether they wanted a carport space. Those who said yes were assigned a space. Those who said no were not. This policy has stuck through the years despite the fact that there have been numerous resident changes since the time this policy was adopted.

I have been watching certain spaces for a while now, which always seem to be unoccupied so I know there are a select few that are not being used. I would like one of these covered carport spaces but I do not know how to go about addressing the issue in the condominium. They aren't too receptive to residents who try to bring about change. Do you have any suggestions?

Review your condominium documents to determine whether the carports have been assigned as limited common elements or otherwise. Also determine whether alternatively the association has a right to assign carport spaces or otherwise license them.

Depending upon your review, preferably with the benefit of competent counsel, bring the matter to the attention of the association under the guise that the assignment of carports is discriminatory and irrational. Write the board a letter and demand that it deal with this problem in a proper fashion. If it ignores your request, you may have a basis under the condominium documents to pursue the association for redress.

Our subdivision consists of 100 lots. Each lot is subject to various building and use restrictions that limit the use to single family residential purposes and prohibit the construction of fences higher than four feet. The Michigan Department of Transportation expropriated various lots for construction of a highway that now violates subdivision building and use restrictions on those lots condemned. Are we entitled to any compensation for violation of the deed restrictions and the resultant damages

due to the proximity of our homes to the new highway?

Yes. There is, in effect, deemed a partial taking of your property for which you may be entitled to compensation similar to an out-and-out condemnation. You should be able to establish the diminution in value of your property as a result of the construction of the highway and the disturbance of your restrictions. If you cannot resolve the matter reasonably with the Department of Transportation, you should consult with an attorney who will obtain an appraisal indicating the amount of the diminution in value of your property. You may also be entitled to recoup your legal fees.

I am buying a condominium unit. The Realtor insists that the seller have at least five days from the date of closing to vacate the premises. I do not have an attorney, but somehow I am uncomfortable with that proposition. What is your suggestion?

When I represent a purchaser of any property, I insist that the occupancy or possession of the premises be at closing. If that is not possible or feasible, I require a substantial penalty well in excess of the amount of the mortgage payments to be held in escrow by an escrow agent and collected out of the proceeds to insure that the purchaser is adequately funded in the event that the seller does not vacate the premises on the date promised. In other words, the seller may be penalized in the amount of \$150-\$300 per day for each day he stays in the premises beyond the date when he is to vacate.

That puts a great incentive on the seller to vacate on time so that it will not be necessary for the purchaser to begin eviction proceedings to obtain possession of the unit. I would seriously question the propriety of any contrary provision.

The environment, planning process and what buyers are looking for also were discussed by BASM officers.

"Builders are not really indifferent to the environment," said Robert Halperin, a BASM vice president. "We're residents of this world, too, and we know how critical it is to protect the natural ecosystem. Home buyers, too, are demanding more preservation of natural surroundings in the development of land."

"We will oppose unnecessary restrictions in the name of environment that serve only the interests of a few in a community, that make it more costly to purchase a home and that pose no real rewards to nature," Halperin added.

Irving H. Yackness, BASM executive vice president and lawyer, spoke about the planning process.

"Zoning for low density, large-size lots does limit the amount of land that can be developed. It also drives up home prices to the point where the term 'affordable' does not include lower- and middle-class families."

"Lots must be designated for future residents of all economic means,

not just the wealthy," Yackness said. "Master planning must not only involve developers, engineers, environmentalists as well as planners in order to arrive at meaningful solutions for future growth."

Bernard Glibberman, first vice president, talked about what prospects are looking for in a new house.

"Innovation is the name of the game as we try to accommodate a more discerning home buyer. Great rooms continue to be a major feature. We'll see more of fitness rooms and media rooms in custom houses."

"Builders are getting more requests for skylights, radius corners and tone-on-tone floor surfaces. More built-in storage space and plentiful shelving are also important. There are more built-in appliances and entertainment centers."

"As we approach the 21st Century, we're seeing more use of remote controls for appliances, heating and cooling, and security systems," Glibberman said.

Builders have been able to weather the recent economic downturn because they have downsized their own operations.

"Nobody is panicking," Halperin said. "The building industry is a lot like the car industry. Sales are down but there's not a lot of layoffs. Maybe hours will be reduced. I don't think there will be wholesale layoffs."

"There's not a lot of spec housing. We don't have a supply of lots like 1979, '80," he said.

Capaldi said, "I think Detroit at one time was known strictly as an auto town. When the industry grew sick, everything slowed down. We don't see that now. Different occupations seem to be building, buying houses. We seem to have diversified so we aren't as affected as years ago."

Traffic from would-be buyers has picked up the last couple of months, builders said.

"It seems to me by April or early May, we should have a handle on what will happen for the year," Capaldi said.

Funds for builders will be available either through traditional banking channels or other private sources, Halperin projected. The National Home Builders Association will lobby for fewer restrictions on financial institutions.

"One of the greatest problems facing the industry today is the availability of development funds," Halperin said. "Restrictions placed on banks have curtailed that severely. It will be addressed and funds again may flow back to the system."

Private funding, such as syndications for specific project, is an alternative, Halperin said. "Funds will be available because housing must be built. There is a need."

Sponging paint gives unique look

Sponging is one of the quickest and easiest decorative paint techniques.

It involves simply dipping a sponge in paint, then lightly dabbing it onto the desired surface.

According to *Decorating magazine*, sponging works well on furniture and walls, and offers a variety of effects. By sponging light colors over a dark base, for example, a different look will be achieved than if sponging a dark color over a light base coat.

Likewise, the results will be different when sponging on one color than if sponging on several shades. By using two or more colors, more subtle results can be achieved than if choosing only one shade, especially if the single shade markedly contrasts with the base coat.

Depending on the size of the pores in the sponge

selected and spacing used, either a dense or airy surface can be created. The best bet for a soft, dappled effect is to use a natural sea sponge, not a synthetic, and to choose one with medium-sized holes.

Begin by soaking the sponge in clean water to make it soft and pliable.

As a general rule, the paint is sponged onto a wall that already has been painted the desired base color. A semi-gloss latex can be used both as a base coat and for the sponging, but a solvent-based paint or tint glaze will give a more cloudy effect.

For one-color sponging, simply dip a sponge lightly into the paint and press it to the wall. Space the patches of color as evenly as possible, but alter the sponge's position frequently to achieve an irregular, mottled effect.

For a multi-color application, dab the first color over the entire surface, keeping the prints well spaced. When the surface is dry, apply the second, third or fourth colors using different sponges for each shade. Concentrate on blank spots, but overlap the first prints as well. Remember, too, that the final color added will be the most dominant.

Card sharks

Baseball cards become hot investment items

Local sport card and comic book collectors are enjoying a number of area shops specializing in their hobby.

Sam Pashigian, owner of World-wide Exchange and Collectibles in Wayne, thinks they are making wise investments.

The Wall Street Journal rated sports card collecting as one of the top five investments you can make today, Pashigian said.

In addition to possibly making a profit, collectors enjoy a great way to hone organizational skills and exercise memory techniques that can help in many areas of life.

"Kids who collect cards and comics are set apart from the other kids," says Mike Odettalla, co-owner of Play Ball, on Warren Road west of Wayne Road.

"These kids are well behaved," he said. "You rarely see them steal, or get into trouble."

Stores provide collectors with a wide selection of sport cards including baseball, football, hockey, basketball and others. There are also a variety of companies that produce the cards like Score, Donruss, Topps, and Upper Deck.

Shop owners are happy to give advice to hobbyists who visit their shops. The owners agree that collectors should decide on one sport and one company, then concentrate on completing their "set."

A set may be a team set, or a set of one player from their rookie year card on through their current year card. Other collectors work on collecting a complete set of players who played pro that year. Complete sets can be purchased from dealers for about \$20 to \$50 depending on the company that produced the set.

This is the best way to insure you have one of each player according to Richard Rey of A to Z, on Ford west of Merriman.

But, if a collector buys individual wax packs, working toward a complete set, he has the opportunity to obtain duplicates of key players, that can be traded or sold for cards they need, Rey said. So, there are possible advantages for the collector either way.

"It's always exciting to open a wax pack," said Rey. "They're like little lottery tickets." Older wax packs are still available from dealers and "for a \$75 pack of 1986-1987 Fleer basketball cards, you still have a chance at a \$300 Michael Jordan card," said Rey.

According to Rey, buying individual wax packs is the way most collectors get started.

Keeping cards or comics in good condition plays an important part in their value, said Rey. "A small crease in a card can reduce it to a fraction of its original value," he said.

There are several ways to store and protect cards and comics, from cardboard boxes and backings, to individual acrylic cases for special cards. Magazines and books are available at the shops for collectors to keep up on the latest information giving collectors updated card and comic values and other helpful or entertaining information about their hobby.

David Tourangeau, owner of The Treasure Hut on Middlebelt just north of Ford, opened his shop after he got tired of packing up everything on weekends to take to card shows.

Tourangeau, a full-time Ford Motor employee, enjoys the business

and says he likes working with kids and because "its like you never have to grow up. I also get a lot of information from the kids, as well as give them information," he says.

For Tourangeau, the only real drawback to the business is "sorting commons," which is organizing cards that are worth only about three or four cents each.

Sorting commons isn't as distasteful to Odettalla of Play Ball.

Odettalla, who recommends collectors follow their sport closely and try to determine who may have a good year, found plenty of Cecil Fielder cards in the "common" files at a card show this spring in Atlantic City. "Cards that were 10 to 15 cents a piece jumped to \$20 or \$30 this summer," he said.

Odettalla dropped out of law school in order to devote his time to what he really enjoyed — sport card and comic collecting. So far, he hasn't been sorry. For a few years he worked card shows. "I've been to shows all over the country," he said.

Odettalla opened Play Ball in August with Fred Farhat, a long-time friend who became interested in collecting after Odettalla took him to New York for company as he attended card shows there.

Odettalla urges collectors to stick to their plan and "don't run after the fads, like the error cards. They never never get their money back," he said. "One hundred percent of the time they go down in value. Usually in about a month."

Odettalla says there are two type of collectors, "investors and collectors." Investors might buy up rookie cards by the hundreds hoping to cash in on future stars, he explained.

Collectors, on the other hand are more specialized and usually have less to spend on their hobby.

Odettalla enjoys working with collectors, especially when they open a pack at the store and get the card they've been looking for. "People jump up and down like they won the Lotto," he says.

Richard and Michael Rey are co-owners of A to Z in Garden City. The brothers come from a collectors family. "My father's sole support comes from stamp collecting," says Richard.

"Right now sports card collecting is in, but all collectibles are cyclic," he says. "They will slow down sooner or later."

The brothers opened their Garden City store about five years ago. They were owners of a stamp and coin shop in Dearborn before that time.

Richard feels fortunate to be able to make a living doing something he really enjoys, although he admits he might make more money doing something else.

He advises collectors to keep their cards in good condition and to keep them organized, so they will be able to find what they're looking for.

"Cards should be organized first by company, then by year and then by numerical order," he suggests.

Wayne's Pashigian has been in the area eight years and dealt in stamps and coins before buying into the card shop. He still has a few coins and stamps available, but most of his inventory is sports card, comics, and collectors supplies for these hobbies. Pashigian quit his brick laying job to enter the collectible business.

All the owners buy, sell and trade cards and comics.

More markets accept debit cards

Magic Touch, the on-line debit point-of-sale system from Magic Line Inc., will now be available at all Farmer Jack and A & P stores in Michigan.

Magic Touch allows holders of bank cards that display the wiggly ML to use their cards to pay for purchases. To date, more than 500 retail locations in Michigan, including gas stations, gift stores and con-

"The addition of Farmer Jack and A & P stores represents a significant step forward for Magic Touch," said Magic Line President James L. Outland.

"Now we can offer the convenience of an on-line debit point-of-sale service to customers where they shop for food and packaged goods, where they buy their gifts and luxury items and where they put gasoline in their cars. To us, that's progress." Michigan National Bank is the sponsor for the Magic Touch network at the 124 Farmer Jack and A & P stores in Michigan.

"The key word here is convenience," said Gilbert Borman, Farmer Jack/A & P director of public relations. "Today's consumers want a convenient alternative to carrying a lot of cash or having to stop at the bank every time they need to buy bread and milk."

PART 1. The Charter Township of Northville Zoning Ordinance No. 94 as amended is hereby further amended by amending Article XVIII, Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION

Section 1 — Change subparagraph 2 of Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION by changing paragraphs e through i to read as follows (no change in a, through d, and j through l):

e Landmark Tree: a tree, of the size and/or species listed in paragraph 6, of Section 18 34 and meeting the health/condition standards of said paragraph 6.

f. Material: shall include soil, sand, gravel, clay, peat, mud, debris, and refuse, or any other material organic or inorganic.

g Protected Trees: all trees of eight (8) inches d.b.h. or greater within a woodlands area and of twelve (12) inches d.b.h. or greater outside of a woodlands area; all landmark trees and all historic trees, including such trees which were previously existing for a period of three (3) years prior to a Site Plan being submitted.

h Protective Barrier: a physical structure limiting access to a protected area, composed of wood or other suitable materials to insure protection of trees and woodlands

i Shrub: a woody plant of one (1) to thirteen (13) feet in height with several erect, spreading or prostrate stems and a general bushy appearance.

j Transplant: the moving of a tree from one place on a property and the planting of the same tree in another place.

k Tree: a woody plant with an erect perennial trunk, which at maturity is thirteen (13) feet or more in height, which has a more or less definite crown of foliage.

l Vegetation: referring to plant life in general (i.e., shrub and groundcover) and as it pertains as part of a woodlands as protected herein.

m. Woodlands Area: areas which are designated on the Northville Township Woodlands Area Map and which are characterized by a distinctive assemblage of vegetation which is unique because of tree size, diversity, density, species, health and vigor, and may include the presence of landmark or historic trees; because of vegetative understory species and quality; of soil or habitat quality; or because of value as a scenic asset, windbreak or noise buffer; and including such areas which were previously existing for a period of three (3) years prior to a site plan being submitted.

Section 2 — Change paragraph 3 of Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION to read as follows:

3 Woodlands Applicability & Tree Protection

a. Site plans shall be reviewed for woodlands area and tree protection when the site contains any protected trees.

b See Section 18.24 SITE PLAN REVIEW subparagraph 3d (3) and 3f. (3)(3 for information required.

Section 3 — Change subparagraph a. of paragraph 4, of Section 18.34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION by deleting two words to read as follows:

4 Woodlands Area Map

a. The Woodlands Area Map is to be used as a guide for determining whether a project is applicable for Tree Protection Review as provided in Section 18 34 subparagraph 3. The Woodlands Area Map also shall include the location of designated historic trees.

Section 4 — Change paragraph 5, of Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION to read as follows:

5. Historic Trees

A nomination for designation shall be brought up for consideration by the Planning Commission

a. Any Township resident or property owner may nominate a tree within the Charter Township of Northville for designation as a historic tree.

b. The Planning Commission may designate a tree as a historic tree upon a finding that, one or more of the following unique characteristics:

(1) No change

(2) No change

(3) No change

(4) The tree has historical significance to the Township.

Section 5 — Add a new paragraph 6, to Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION to read as follows and correspondingly renumber paragraphs 6-9 to numbers 7-10.

6 Landmark Trees

a. The following landmark trees shall be protected under this Section:

b. Landmark trees shall be replaced on an inch for inch basis (see paragraph 9 a. below) unless, in the opinion of the Planning Commission, the health/condition of the tree is such that it should not be counted. In requesting that a landmark tree not be counted toward replacement, the applicant shall indicate the health/condition of trees as determined by the forester, not to be counted based on the following criteria:

(1) The health/condition of a landmark tree shall be calculated according to the following standards

2 Any listed landmark tree with a score of sixteen (16) or higher is protected under this Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION.

Section 6 — Change paragraph 6 Review Procedures to paragraph 7.

Section 7 — Change subparagraphs c (7) of new paragraph 8 Review Standards of Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION to read as follows.

(7) Other factors such as the value of the woodlands area as a scenic asset,

windbreak, noise buffer, environment asset (i.e., — cooling effect, etc.), and the value of landmark or historic trees within the woodlands area.

Section 8 — Change the introductory paragraph and subparagraphs d. and e. of new paragraph 8. Review Standards of Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION to read as follows

8. Review Standards

The following standards shall be used to review site plans that contain protected trees or woodlands (as defined by Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION paragraph 2):

a. No change

b. No change

c. No change

d The removal or relocation of trees or shrubs within woodlands areas or of protected trees outside of the woodlands area shall be limited to the following instances:

(1) When necessary for the location of a structure or site improvement and when no feasible and prudent alternative location for the structure or improvements can be had without causing undue hardship.

(2) The tree is dead, diseased, injured and in danger of falling too close to proposed or existing structures, or interferes with existing utility service, interferes with safe vision clearances, or conflicts with other ordinances or regulations.

(3) When a landmark tree does not meet the health/condition standards of paragraph 6 above.

e. Where the removal or cutting of any protected trees is permitted, replacement trees shall be provided.

Section 9 — Change the subparagraphs of new paragraph 9. Relocation and Replacement of Section 18.34 TREE AND WOODLAND PROTECTION to read as follows:

9. Relocation or Replacement

Trees shall be provided by relocation or replacement whenever:

a. Protected trees are proposed to be removed. The number of caliper inches required for trees to be replaced shall be equal to fifty (50%) percent of the d.b.h. of the trees to be replaced which are not landmark or historic trees and one hundred (100%) percent for landmark or historic trees, provided that all replacement trees are of a two and one-half (2½) inch caliper or greater. If crowded conditions do not permit the replacement of all trees on this basis, the Planning Commission may adjust this requirement.

b. All purchased replacement trees shall satisfy American Association of Nurseryman standards, such as:

(1) Nursery grown.

(2) State Department of Agriculture inspected.

(3) Tree space transplanted while in the dormant state, or, if not in the dormant state, having been balled and burlaped with a solid well-laced root ball when in the format state.

(4) No. 1 Grade, with a straight unscarred trunk and a well-developed uniform crown (park grade trees are unacceptable).

(5) Staked, fertilized, watered and mulched in accordance with standard planting practices.

(6) Guaranteed for one year, including labor, to remove and dispose of dead materials.

c. Deciduous trees shall be replaced by deciduous trees and evergreen trees shall be replaced by evergreen trees. Replacement trees shall be of the same species as the removed trees, when available from Michigan nurseries. When trees of the same species are not available, replacement shall be pursuant to the replacement chart, used as a general guide, on file in the office of the Planning and Zoning Department. Group 1 trees may be replaced by other group 1 trees. Group 2 trees may be replaced by Group 1 trees or other group 2 trees. Group 3 trees may be replaced by Group 1 or Group 2 trees or by other Group 3 trees. Site factors (i.e., wet site, dry site) must be given consideration in replacement choices.

d. Transplanted trees from a Woodlands Area which are to be removed by development may be used for replacement trees.

e. Replacement or relocated trees shall be subject to the applicable requirements of paragraph 5 of Section 18.16, Plant Materials.

f. The location of replacement trees on the site shall be subject to the approval of the Planning Commission.

g. Where woodland densities permit, tree relocation or replacement shall be within the same woodlands as are the removed plants. Where tree relocation or replacement is not feasible within the woodlands area, the relocation or replacement on the site may be elsewhere on the property. If location on the site is not feasible relocation or replacement may be made at another approved location within the Township on public land, at the discretion of the Planning Commission.

h. At the time of submission of a Final Site Plan, the developer shall submit an estimate of the cost of replacement trees and of proposed relocating of existing trees. The estimate shall also include the costs of a one year guarantee on the health and on the maintenance of the trees. The Planning Commission shall review and approve the estimate. Prior to issuance of a building permit, the developer shall deposit cash, irrevocable letter of credit or other equivalent form of security, approved by the Township Attorney, in the amount of the estimated costs of the tree relocation and replacement and including ten (10) percent as a contingency.

Section 10 — Add the following subparagraph d. to new paragraph 10. Tree Protection During Construction of Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLAND PROTECTION to read as follows:

d. The developer shall be required to replace trees originally indicated and intended to be saved when such trees are damaged during construction to the extent that the probability of death is likely as determined by the Department of Planning and Zoning or by the Building Department. The replacements for such damaged trees shall be one (1) inch caliper for each one (1) inch d.b.h. of the damaged trees and shall have characteristics comparable to those of the damaged trees and each shall be a minimum four (4) inch caliper. Deciduous trees shall be replaced by deciduous trees and evergreen trees shall be replaced by evergreen trees.

Section 11 — Add a new paragraph 11, to Section 18.34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION to read as follows

11. Penalties

(1) Each unauthorized removal of a tree protected by this Ordinance shall be deemed a separate offense, punishable by a fine of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for each tree and by replacement of such trees by trees equal in size to one (1) inch caliper for each one (1) inch d.b.h. of the removed trees.

by amending Section 18 29 USES NOT OTHERWISE INCLUDED WITHIN A SPECIFIC USE DISTRICT: 6 MINING AND QUARRYING:

Section 1 — Change the present subparagraph (17) of Section 18 29 USES NOT OTHERWISE INCLUDED WITHIN A SPECIFIC USE DISTRICT, paragraph 6 c (1) (b) to be (18) and add a new subparagraph (17) to read as follows:

(17) Submit information relating to Tree and Woodlands Protection as required by Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION.

Section 2 — Add a new paragraph (14) to paragraph 6 c (4) (a) General Standard for Approval: Mid- And Long Range Planning Considerations to read as follows:

(14) That the review standards for the Protection of Trees and Woodlands of paragraph 7 of Section 18 34 shall be followed and that trees be relocated, replaced and protected as required by paragraphs 8 and 9 of Section 18 34

by amending Section 18 24 SITE PLAN REVIEW

Section 1 — Change subparagraph d (3) 3 4 of paragraph 3, of Section 18 24 SITE PLAN REVIEW

3.4 For all protected trees a topographic elevation at the base of the trunk shall be indicated. A summary by number, species, and size of trees less than eight (8) inches d.b.h., shrubs and ground cover within a woodlands area and information as to whether they are to remain, to be removed or to be transplanted shall be provided.

Section 2 — Change all of subparagraph (3) 3 3(c) of paragraph 3 of Section 18 24 SITE PLAN REVIEW, to read as follows:

(c) Protected trees to be removed, to remain or to be relocated shall be field identified with tree tags. Tags shall be made of a minimum 18 gauge aluminum material or similar corrosion resistant material. These tags shall be permanently imprinted with a number that corresponds to a number designation defined on the tree survey. Tags shall be attached to trees by way of a galvanized roofing nail or other similar means.

PART II. Conflicting Provisions Repealed.

Any Ordinance or part of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed save that in all other respects Ordinance No. 94, as amended, is hereby ratified and reaffirmed.

PART III. Effective Date.

The provisions of this ordinance shall be in full force and effective immediately upon publication.

PART IV. Adoption

This ordinance may be adopted by the Township Board of the Charter Township of Northville, pursuant to authority of Act No. 184, Public Acts of 1943, as amended at the next regular/special meeting

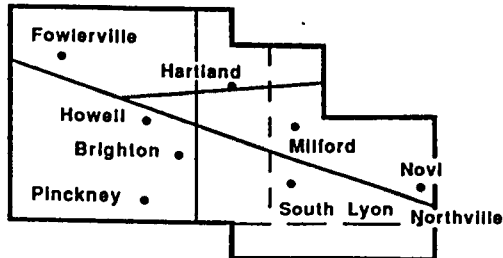

ADVERTISING UNSELLS.

In 1986, drug abuse officially became America's number one concern.

In that same year, the Partnership for a Drug-Free America was organized by the American Association of Advertising Agencies (AAAA). Its mission: to decrease drug use in this country by changing attitudes.

Many of the country's top persuaders—members of the AAAA—were enlisted by the Partnership. Some 200 ads created for all major media have been donated by the agencies. The messages have been run by the media on a pro bono basis at an estimated weight of \$310 million since the program began in

April 1987. Massive consumer surveys have tracked the results.

Some highlights:

From 1987 to 1989, children who think "it's easy to get hooked" rose 5 percentage points. Those who are "scared of drugs" rose 4.

Teenagers who "don't want to hang around drug users" increased 6 points. And those who think "doing cocaine occasionally is risky" went up 4.

Most significant: Changes in attitudes and consumption were greatest in markets where the advertising appeared the most:

| Among Adults | Low Media | High Media |
|-----------------|-----------|------------|
| Basic Attitudes | +5.2% | +9.7% |
| Fear of Drugs | -1.0% | +3.7% |
| Act Against Use | -1.7% | +4.5% |

Two independent studies confirm declining usage. One, from the

University of Michigan, found drug use among high school seniors to be down. Marijuana usage dropped from 21.0 percent in 1987 to 16.7 percent in 1989. Cocaine use fell from 4.3 percent to 2.8 percent in the same period.

The second was conducted by The National Institute of Drug Abuse (NIDA). It found that, between 1985 and 1988, trial of marijuana and cocaine among people 18 to 25 declined at a significant rate.

Releasing this data, NIDA's director, Dr. Charles R. Schuster, said, "...a significant decrease in trial and occasional use of illicit drugs is a result of major changes in social attitudes. In my opinion, the Partnership's messages have had a direct impact on these attitudes and usage declines."

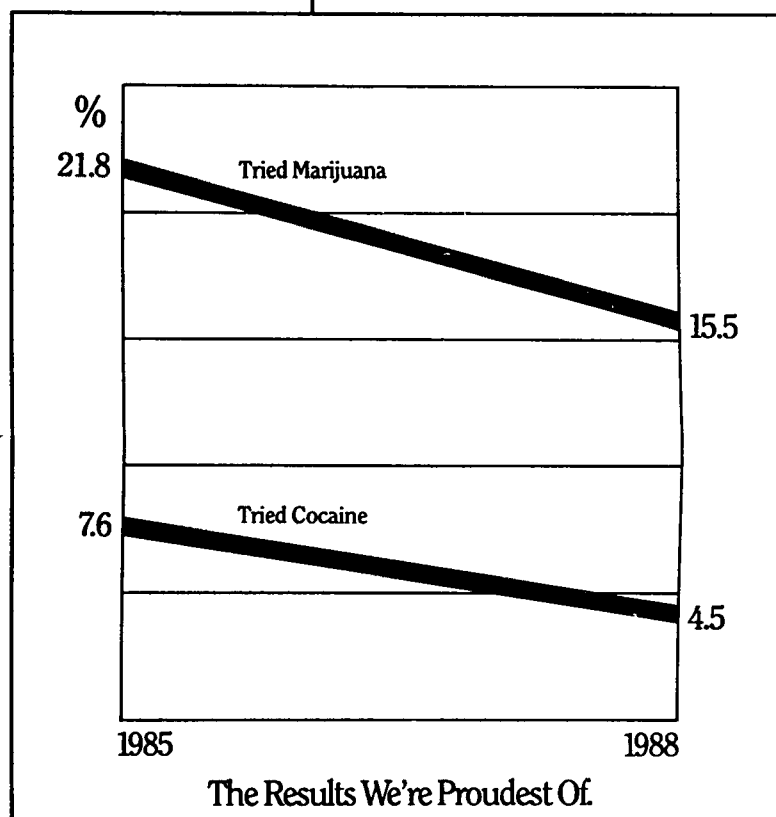
At a special White House conference, Gordon S. Black, Ph.D., president of the firm that conducted the Partnership research, concluded, "If these were the results of a tracking study for one of your own advertising campaigns, I think your advertising director would be rather pleased, to say the least."

New bird at Air Zoo

Wildcat...Hellcat...Bearcat...Flying Tiger...these are among the historic military aircraft that inspired the nickname "Kalamazoo Air Zoo."

These and other vintage war planes on display at the Kalamazoo Aviation History Museum preserve our nation's military aviation heritage for present and future generations.

The "Air Zoo" collection of 28 aircraft is unique, not only because of its quality, but also because many of the planes are in flying condition. Weather permitting, one of the immaculately restored planes takes to the air each day.

Now, one of the most famous bombers of World War II has joined the rest of the award-winning warbirds at the museum.

A falcon-nose B-25 Mitchell from the 345 Bombardment Group, the famous Air Apaches of the South Pacific, was unveiled this past Veterans' Day. This variant of the bomber, named after aviation great General "Billy" Mitchell, saw service in low level attacks on enemy shipping, both strafing and skip bombing Japanese naval vessels.

The elaborate paint scheme of the airplane--falcon's beak on the nose, bright yellow speed rings around the engines, the Apache symbol on the vertical stabilizers--resembles the same paint scheme of ship 115 which flew one of the most important missions of World War II.

On Aug. 19, 1945, this plane, with two other B-25s, an escort of P-39 Lightnings and a rescue B-17 backup, was sent out over an expanse of the Pacific Ocean to intercept two Japanese bombers. These were no ordinary enemy aircraft though. They were painted white, had large green crosses on their fuselages, and carried the Imperial envoys that were to arrange Japan's unconditional surrender which ended the war.

Four of the crew members from that mission, which was the "beginning of the end of the war," attended the Veteran's Day dedication ceremony.

While ship 115 played an important role in the "beginning of the end," 16 other B-25s played an equally important role in the "beginning." On April 18, 1942, the USS Hornet, off the coast of Japan, launched these 16 special bombers on America's first retaliatory strike after Pearl Harbor. It was the start of the downfall of the

Imperial Japanese Empire and the ships were those of Congressional Medal of Honor winner Gen. "Jimmy" Doolittle.

One of Doolittle's Raiders, Lt. Jack Sims from Kalamazoo, took part in the unveiling ceremony. A special display of Sims' artifacts is on display to complement the newest aircraft to join the "Air Zoo" stables.

According to museum executive director Bob Ellis, the dedication of the B-25 celebrates the 50th anniversary of the first flight of the aircraft and marks the culmination of a painstaking restoration process lasting more than two years. Ellis says more than 15 employees and volunteers in the museum's restoration center spent more than 10,000 manhours to complete the refurbishing.

Ellis also reports that the museum obtained the B-25 from Jack Hanson, an antique auto collector in Manistee, Michigan, who traded one of the cars in his collection for the B-25, then

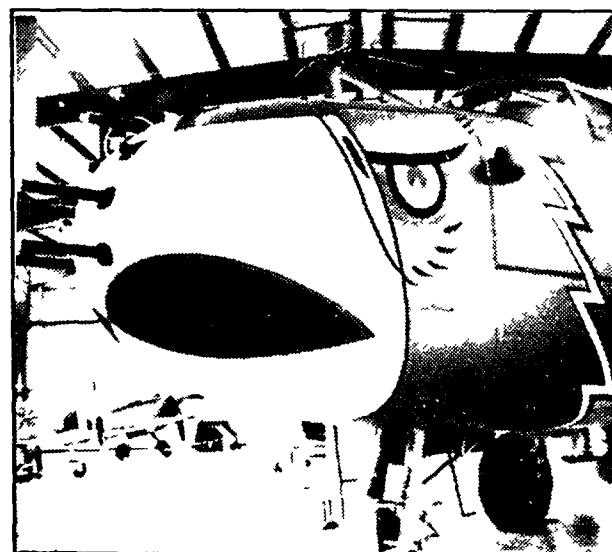
sold it to the museum. Hanson told the museum that one of the highlights of the career of this particular B-25 was its service over the Philippine Islands during World War II.

At the "Air Zoo," the B-25 joins a menagerie that includes a Grumman F6F-5 Hellcat, Republic P-47D Thunderbolt and Curtiss P-40-N Warhawk. Although most of the museum's collection is centered around World War II aircraft, it includes planes that participated in Korean and Vietnam conflicts.

Air museum visitors may also examine engines, vintage uniforms, combat pictures, model planes and authentic memorabilia from both the Allied and Axis powers. There are murals of World War II action photographs with aircraft, ships and troops in astonishing panoramas.

You can visit the "Air Zoo" by either car or plane. By car, take Interstate 94 to the Portage Road Exit (#78). Take Portage Road south two traffic lights, then turn east at Milham Road to the museum. By plane, simply fly to the Kalamazoo/Battle Creek International Airport and taxi up on the museum's flight deck.

Museum hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday-Saturday, 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., Sunday. A nominal admission fee is charged. For more information, call 616-382-6555.

Some of the best viewing spots are downtown Marquette for the start and finish, the Escanaba harbor area, and along the Ford River from Escanaba northward.

His lifestyle is envied by most...fishing when the urge strikes him, spinning tales with old-timers regularly, daily handcrafting a product that's considered folk art, raising a close knit family in a wayside Michigan village...and probably prolonging his existence.

Nick Torello, former General Motors executive, former Detroit area dweller, had a heart attack in the mid 1970s. During his recovery, he vowed to change his lifestyle -- and he did.

With his wife, Caryl, and two daughters, Rachel and Renee, Nick Torello established "Nick's Wood Shop" in a four-square building in Au Gres. Pronounced "Aw Gray" by locals, the village sits astride US-23 on the Lake Huron shoreline north of Bay City. Most travelers, passing through to points north, might stop at the bakery and restaurant for meals, or at a summer-only ice cream shop for a

snack. Fishermen know it as the site of the Au Gres River, which flows through the north end of town.

Turn east from US-23 in the center of town and you'll spot the converted Oddfellows Hall which houses Nick's Wood Shop. Part furniture repair shop, part antique showroom, part living quarters upstairs, the building is crammed with odds and ends of wooden pieces, a few upholstered settees, shorebird decoys, and fish. The fish will widen your eyes.

There's a red, white and blue striped specimen guaranteed to brighten the corner of even the most staid room. Others, some authentically rendered in acrylic paints by Caryl Torello, some fancifully conceived and finished, delight viewers.

Upstairs, the wonders unfold. Several antique painted china cabinets hold hundreds of fish decoys ranging from fine museum quality specimens dating from early Native American fishing days to contemporary carvings rendered by craftsmen all over the Great Lakes area. Nick can tell you the type, the area each came from, sometimes the name of the carver, and an approximate price range.

It wasn't always so.

"Back in 1979, shortly after we'd opened the wood shop, a fellow came in looking for contemporary decoys. I told him to stop back in a week and I'd have some for him. The next thing I knew, we were in the fish business with both feet." Nick began carving basswood decoys -- specializing in the types used in Saginaw Bay: perch, walleye and pike. These days, he'll produce just about any type of "attractor" known.

Fish decoys, used to lure fish within spear range while fishing through the ice, were used by Native peoples and were made of ivory or bone. The wooden fish spearing decoy has been made for several hundred years, particularly by people of the

Great Lakes region, primarily Michigan, Minnesota, Wisconsin and New York. They range from small, two-inch decoys used to lure perch and walleye within spear range on the Saginaw Bay, to 50-inch specimens used at Black and Mullett Lakes when fishing for sturgeon. The 50-inch decoys, explains Nick, were used both as lures and as measuring devices, since 50-inches is the minimum legal size for the fish.

Decoys vary in form from almost abstract shapes, finless and thin in aerodynamic smoothness, to classic, finned and detailed decoys found in the St. Clair and Mt. Clemens areas.

They sometimes couldn't be simpler -- and sometimes couldn't be more complex. Some are merely a bit of wood, with lead added to the body cavity for weight and a single screw-eye on top for attaching a line. Others are finished to the nth degree -- boasting each fin and gill to almost perfection. Some, under an examining loupe, even have individual scales detailed! They can be a crude fishing expedient or a fine bit of art and craftsmanship -- depending upon the character of the carver, the amount of time expended, the innate "artistic" bent of the person holding the knife -- and yes, occasionally, a touch of genius.

Some of them cost as little as a few dollars while others fetch prices that make non-sportsmen wince. At a recent Sotheby's auction in New York City, a nine-inch carved trout with glass eyes and metal fins snared \$18,700. It was, of course, by Michigan's legendary Oscar Peterson of Cadillac, a premier carver.

Nick Torello holds a decoy, turning it over in his hands, pointing out the differences between it and one on the table before him.

"Now, these from Harsen's Island are heavy, not curved, like mine are. The fishermen down there have to contend with swift current, and this

decoy will hang in the water like a real fish would."

The decoy is perhaps four and a-half inches long.

"These," Nick says, spreading an array of several decoys, "are made by the fishingest people I ever did see!"

They're made by various members of the Veihl family, mostly of the Onaway area. A father, five sons, a grandson and a first cousin all carve. Their individual styles are distinctive, and Nick points out the differences.

Nearby, in a large fish tank, a needlenose gar pike and a northern pike fish lazily as bubbles float upward. The bubbling aerator adds a soothing rhythm to the room as two cats snooze and two dogs nose a visitor's hand, looking for attention.

The rows of decoys on the shelves are a cross section of time, linking native hunters of yesterday to ice fishermen of today. They might be considered one of the first functional art forms, as each was carved for one's individual use and to provide food for the family. The shapes, forms, and patterns have been passed from father to son throughout the years.

These days, a newsletter with Nick as editor, links decoy carvers and collectors. The American Fish Decoy Association was formed last year and the newsletter is entering its second year of production. The group held a

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Easy sledding with 'Pucker Brush Dan'

Indian River, Michigan—

As the season's first heavy snowfall arrives, Dan Nivelt is immediately consumed by a passion that infects a growing army of folks throughout the Great Lakes region--snowmobiling.

"I can't wait to get started," he says, twirling a wrench under the hood

of the car inside his repair shop. Outside, the snow is quietly building towards that magic one-foot mark. Nearby his "sled"-the outdoorsmen's name for their machines-is at the ready.

No ordinary snowmobiler this.

Nivelt is a snowmobile guide, who from late December through February leads caravans of snowmobile enthusiasts through this Tip of the Mitt region of pristine forests and snow.

He's been guiding for 13 years. Snowmobiling for 30 years.

Owner and operator of a

automotive repair shop here, Nivelt and his wife also raise trout year-round and operate a half-dozen "catch your own" trout ponds in summer.

Both businesses are located just off Michigan's "Main Street," Interstate 75, smack dab in the middle of the state's snowmobiling capitol that averages nine feet of snowfall annually.

Although the repairs and the trout keep him busy from sun up to sun down, he manages somehow to squeeze in two months of fun in the snow.

Guiding, he says, "is really just a hobby. It gives me an opportunity to get out into the snow and explore the wonders of this place, to meet people. It's my favorite recreation. Guiding pays for my gas and my repairs but it doesn't pay for my sled. I live for snowmobiling, more so than even hunting or fishing, which I love. If you took my snowmobile away I'd be a kid without a sucker.

"My wife enjoys it; I love it."

The average snowmobiler living in Northern Michigan puts about a 1,000 miles a year on a sled. Those from downstate may ride only 400 to 500 miles a year. Nivelt averages 5,000 miles in basically two months.

"It's really an expensive hobby," he points out. "Figure it out. The average sled will cost from \$3,500 to \$4,000. You'll probably get 12 to 15 miles a gallon on gas. Figure in the cost of travel, the motel room, if you're in from out of town, your food, and I think they figure the average snowmobiler will spend about \$100 for his day in the snow. That's why snowmobiling is so important to the tourist business. It's a real boost to the economy."

Indian River, he explains, is in the middle of some of the state's premier groomed trails. Most are linked, allowing snowmobilers to travel virtually the entire tip of Michigan's northern Lower Peninsula. And that link now extends across the Straits into the Upper Peninsula where Nivelt

leads his longest safaris.

Despite the preponderance of groomed trails here, Nivelt normally only uses them to get from one area to another. Most times he makes his own trails. And that's why enthusiasts look him up.

"They want to explore, and that's what my safaris are all about. Getting out into areas where snow is fresh, where we're more likely to see wildlife, where around the next corner there's something new, unexpected.

"Riding groomed trails is lot of fun if all you want is a smooth, safe course in spectacular surroundings. For 90 percent of the people who come into our area that's all that is necessary. And we've got plenty of those kinds of excellent, well marked places to travel. For me, though, I like a foot or more of fresh snow flying in my face, the getting away from man-made adventure.

"Once you've experienced it you're hooked.

"Last year, for example, I took a guy from town with me to check out an area to see if I could get through it. He came back and said, 'I never thought snowmobiling was like this. I've been snowmobiling for 10 years and I've never had so much fun.'"

Nivelt never takes a party of snowmobilers through areas that he has not previously scouted. "I want to be absolutely sure it's safe because, if you're leading 25, 30 or more sleds, safety's on your mind all the time. You certainly don't want to end up in a swamp or at the bottom of a hill that leads nowhere. Pre-checks are important, too, because I want to be absolutely sure we'll not be trespassing on private property. Respecting the rights of others ought to be on every snowmobiler's mind no matter where they operate. One slob can ruin the sport for all of us.

"You just have to read maps. You just can't start going across country without knowing the area. You certainly don't want to end up in someone's yard. Quite obviously, snowmobiling is a privilege and you



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don't want to abuse it. When I scout out an area and find that it crosses private property I go in and ask people if they'd mind if I take a safari through it the next weekend. And in most cases they'll let you cross. But you've got to ask first."

Many of the parties guided by Nivelt return year after year. They've given him the handle "PBD"-Pucker Brush Dan, based on an experience they had years ago when he led a party through some unexpected brush. Others affectionately call him "Mr. Snowmobile."

Most are families who know each other. They may include parents, grandparents as well as children. A safari may involve from three or four to as many as 50 snowmobiles. "I prefer families because you don't get into the drinking and rowdiness problems. Kids range from 4 and up, whoever the parents feel can handle the cold. Usually that's not a problem nowadays because of the clothing available. We used to take along our own kids, when one was just a baby and rode in a backpack."

Before taking a party out, Nivelt reviews rules he insists be followed. And he personally checks the gas tanks of each snowmobile. "I've found that people who come up from downstate aren't accustomed to the distances we will travel. Down there they think 40 miles is a long way. Up here, we seldom go less than a 100 miles on a trip, so a full tank of gas is essential. I'll carry a couple extra gallons on my sled, besides what's in my gas tank. It's a lot more convenient than siphoning gas. I also carry a first-aid kit, and a packet of tools just to be on the safe side."

Most safari's are "day trips." These begin from Indian River and may extend into the Pigeon River Country Forest, across to Harbor Springs and Lake Michigan, or over towards Rogers City and Lake Huron. Day trips average 100 miles, with frequent stops to look at wildlife or to enjoy a particularly nice view.

Longer trips, which may last up to a week, normally always occur in the Upper Peninsula. The longest trip last year, involving his only all-male safari, covered 470 miles in a single day.

With the tools he carries, Nivelt normally is able to repair sleds that may breakdown along the way. If it's a more serious breakdown that cannot be fixed on the spot, "we'll leave the sled at the nearest road. Then, in the evening, I'll go back with the people and get their sled."

"For food, I try to plan day trips so that we eat lunch out someplace, about 12:30 to 1 o'clock, and then ride until evening before returning home to eat here in town."

"In the Upper most often we'll make a base camp at a motel and take day trips out into the forests and return each evening. This year, though, I've got a group that wants to start in Indian River and go across to the Upper and all the way to Copper Harbor."

One of the repeat annual safari's Nivelt enjoys most involves a party from Angola, Indiana-not so much because of the places he takes them-but because they are such a "happy, fun-loving group. They love the snow. They may have a drink at noon, but they don't drink on the

trail. For them, it is the outdoors adventure, the togetherness that's fun. Not gulping alcohol."

No tea-totaler, Nivelt never carries alcohol, and he makes sure that others follow his rule-"no drinking and driving." "If someone gets out of hand the safari ends at that point and we go home. Problems like this are rare."

In the meetings before the safari begins, he reviews hand signals, goes over a variety of other rules, among them-"Never pass the leader."

"It's absolutely important that all members of the party stay behind the leader because if you don't know the area and you pass me you could hit a wire or bounce into a road you don't know is there."

Generally, the poorest riders are placed immediately behind Nivelt where he can better judge his own speed to accommodate them. If they were in the rear, they could fall behind and get lost. In longer safari's that may stretch for a half mile or so, Nivelt will hire an experienced driver to serve as the "drag rider"-the snowmobiler who brings up the rear to look out for the breakdowns and persons who may become disoriented.

The most important rule of all is, "Have fun!"

Aside from the outdoors and the weather, "it's the people I meet who make leading safaris enjoyable. Except for one occasion on all of the trips I've taken the groups have been very nice, congenial, happy, people. I get Christmas cards from them; some stop by in summer to say hello and chat. They come from as far away as Cincinnati, Ohio."

In 13 years of leading safaris Nivelt has left only two snowmobiles in the woods. Most breakdowns are

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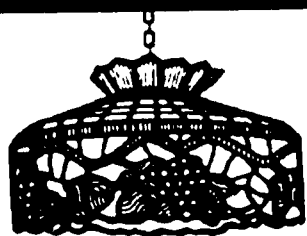
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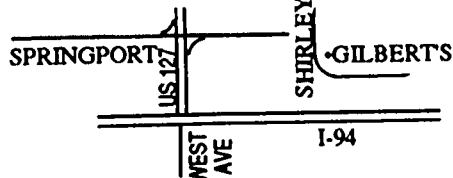
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Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan—

Saturday, Feb. 3 will signal the high point of Winter Carnival activities in the eastern section of Michigan's Upper Peninsula with the 22nd running of the International 500 Snowmobile Race.

Sault Ste. Marie, famous as the site of the historic Soo Locks, changes its traditional reputation as a mecca for summer tourists to that of an exciting winter racing community every February: The longest closed circuit snowmobile race in the country draws thousands of enthusiasts to an event patterned after the Indianapolis 500 automobile race.

Time trials will be held this year on Jan. 30 and Jan. 31. During the time trials and throughout the race, speeds in excess of 100 miles per hour are reached on straightaways. A two-lap computed record time of 94.2 miles per hour was established in 1986.

A field of 35 snowmobiles is expected for the International 500 with race time scheduled for 9 a.m.

Each year, machines become more sophisticated, but surprisingly, local drivers and amateurs have had excellent success competing with professionals.

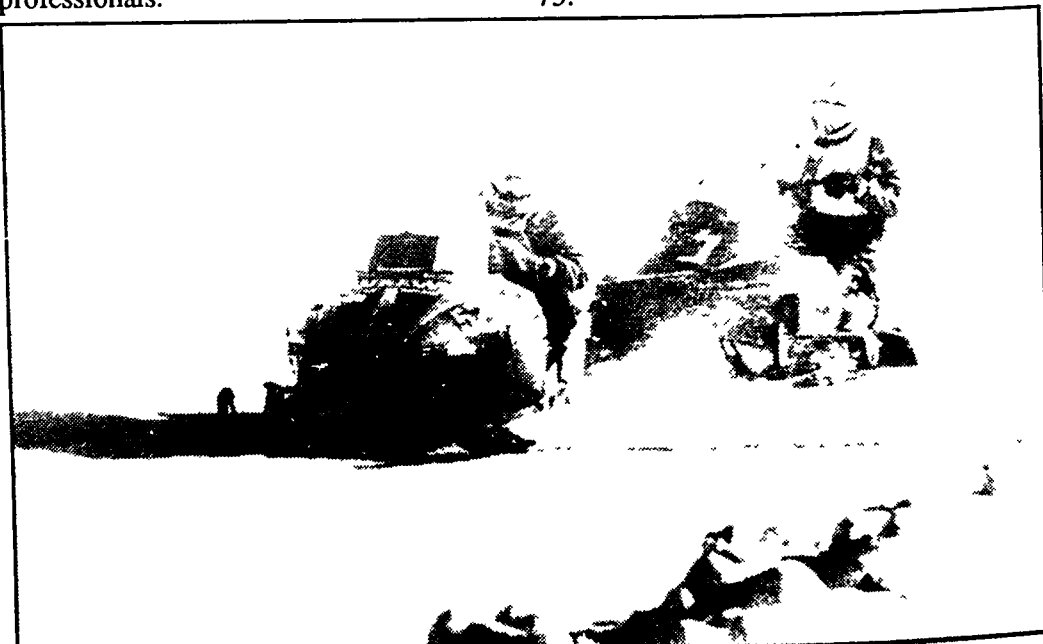
In addition to excellent snowmobiling, the winter sport enthusiast has 17 different cross-country ski networks available nearby. This year, the Algonquin cross-country trails include an illuminated loop for night skiing.

Downhill skiing at the Searchmont alpine complex just north of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, offers a 700-foot vertical drop. A unique attraction is a cozy trip on the Agawa Canyon Snow Train offering an exciting view of the Canadian wilderness in the middle of winter.

Spectator sports, including world class college hockey at Lake Superior State University, are available for evening entertainment. The beautiful city of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, a few minutes away in Canada, offers a special appeal for visitors. An additional unusual attraction is the Vegas Kewadin casino, found within the Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, city limits.

The festival snowmobile torchlight parade at 7:30 p.m. Feb. 2 winds its way across frozen Lake Cadillac. Free torchlights are provided

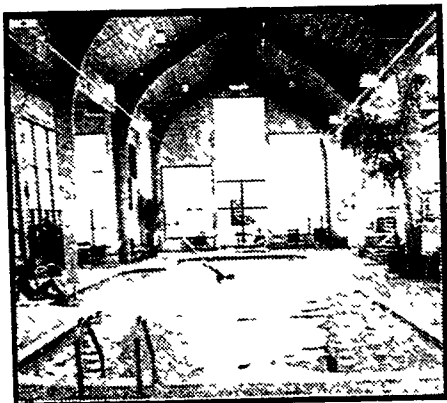
to riders wearing a festival button.

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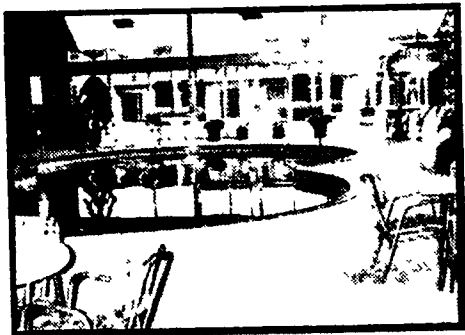
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Masterpieces of Dutch Golden Age depict famous sea and naval events

Toledo, Ohio—

In the Dutch Golden Age, 1600-1700, supreme achievements in painting paralleled the Netherlands becoming the richest and most powerful nation in Europe. The country's wealth came primarily from its great maritime power, global discoveries and exploration, and creation of an overseas empire.

Landscape painting was born in Holland in this century, and one of its most remarkable branches was depiction of sea, shipping and famous naval events.

Mirror of Empire: Dutch Marine Art of the Seventeenth Century is the first major exhibition to survey the rise of marine art as a separate category of painting, reflecting the historical, political and cultural values and aspirations of the Netherlands as the greatest maritime power of that century. The Toledo Museum of Art plays hosts to the exhibit Jan. 27-April 28.

The exhibition features approximately 140 masterpieces from more than 40 collections in 11 countries with works of art, including paintings, drawings, prints, as well as a cartographic section of maps, globes and navigational charts.

The work of 24 preeminent artists of the time including Ludolph Backhuysen, Jan van de Cappelle, Jan Porcellis, Jacob van Ruisdael, Willem van de Velde the Elder and Younger, Simon de Vlieger and Hendrick Vroom illustrate the development of Dutch marine art. These artists essentially shaped a new category of art, and the artistic style that the Dutch initiated in the 17th century had continuing ramifications in Europe and the United States throughout the 18th and 19th centuries.

The exhibition traces the development of Dutch marine art from its meticulously detailed, rather topographical beginnings through phases paralleling the great general developments of painting and graphic arts in Holland. Thus, the subdued tonal phase of the 1620s to 1640s evolved to the brilliantly colored, magisterial climax of Dutch marine art from the 1650s to 1680s.

Many of the paintings are extraordinary for their combination of size, brilliant color, vivid detail and dramatic action. Several panoramic drawings by Willem van de Velde the Elder were actually drawn on the spot during furious battles between Dutch and English naval forces.

Van de Velde risked his life sailing between the fleets as they maneuvered for tactical advantage during these contests for maritime supremacy. Van de Velde also executed remarkable large "ink paintings" executed with pen on canvas. His son, Willem the Younger, became one of the great marine specialists, and the exhibition includes outstanding paintings by him, including The Toledo Museum of Arts famous

Ships in a Stormy Sea, about 1672.

The exhibition catalogue is the first scholarly survey of Dutch marine art in any language. In addition to texts on each work, it includes a historical survey of the subject, essays on the political and economic context, on the place of marine painting in contemporary Dutch life, and on Dutch marine cartography. Fully illustrated in black and white and color, it has been published in association with Cambridge University Press. The softbound catalogue is available in The Museum Store for \$49.95 or can be ordered by telephone, 419-255-8000.

The museum will also stage a complementary exhibition, Dutch Prints in the Age of Rembrandt from The Toledo Museum of Art Collection, Feb. 9-June 2. This exhibition features landscapes, seascapes, portraits and genre scenes. The admission-free exhibition will be shown in the museum graphic arts galleries.

The Dutch marine art exhibition will be open during regular museum hours: Tuesday-Saturday, 10 a.m.-4 p.m.; Sunday, 1-5 p.m.; closed Mondays. There is an exhibition admission charge every day except Wednesday, which is a free day. Timed tickets are necessary for admission but may be purchased prior to viewing the exhibition. The museum adjoining the Hall of Fame display contains priceless memorabilia dating from the late 1800s to present day. The collection was gathered by Thomas C. Eakin,

founder and president of the Ohio Baseball Hall of Fame.

Included in the rarities: Cy Young's personal scrapbook from 1892; the ball Bill Wambsgans caught and converted into the only unassisted triple play in World Series history; Babe Ruth's 1930 paycheck; Bob Feller's glove and spikes from the late '30s; seats from Cincinnati's Crosley Field; bats used by Tony Perez, Joe Morgan and Pete Rose.

Serious baseball enthusiasts can browse through a research library which holds everything from line-up cards to Christmas cards. A souvenir shop offers mementos such as

T-shirts, baseballs, and badges.

Hall of Fame hours are 10 a.m.-5 p.m., weekdays, through March 31. The Hall of Fame has expanded hours April 1 through Sept. 30: 10 a.m.-8 p.m., Monday-Friday; noon-8 p.m., Saturday; noon-6 p.m., Sunday. Admission is \$1 for adults, 75 cents for seniors and 50 cents for children under 12. Call 419-893-9481 for more information.

The Ohio Baseball Hall of Fame is located west of Toledo at 2901 Key St. in Maumee and is easily accessible via Exit 4 off Interstate 80-90 (the Ohio Turnpike.)

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Viewing the lore of sweetwater seas

We're standing in what was once the smoking lounge of the *City of Detroit III*, a giant sidewheeler steamboat that carried passengers in luxury all over the Great Lakes. We're in the Dossin Great Lakes Museum on Belle Isle in Detroit. It's one of the

many museums throughout Michigan that preserve the history and the nautical lore of the Great Lakes, the largest body of fresh water in the world. Their exhibits also provide a wealth of useful boating information.

The *City of Detroit's* elegant lounge is like a beautiful chapel. It is typical of the opulence of 1912, the year the ship was built. It was the largest sidewheeler in the world at the time.

The lounge, known as the Gothic Room, was the showpiece of the ship. Hand carved wooden Corinthian columns flow into lacy golden oak

arches suspended below the blue and gilt ceiling. The room is washed with the reds, blues and greens that shine through a three-paneled window containing more than 700 pieces of stained glass.

Throughout Michigan, lovers of our sweetwater seas have joined in efforts to restore and cherish memorabilia of the lakes. This steamboat Gothic Room, for example, was rotting in a barn in Ohio years after the ship was scrapped in 1955. The museum and volunteers raised the money to purchase the historic treasures. They donated thousands of hours to the task of stripping, varnishing and reassembling the magnificent room, piece by piece.

From the Gothic Room we step across to a separate wing where *Miss Pepsi* occupies a prestigious place. She was an early unlimited hydroplane and first of her class to qualify for a race at more than 100 miles per hour. The Dossin family, owners and racers of *Miss Pepsi* from 1949 to 1954, donated the boat as well as substantial funds to the museum.

We watch as a volunteer works on the painstaking task of stripping *Miss Pepsi's* 34-foot mahogany hull and refinishing it. We also view other exhibits at the museum devoted to powerboat racing on the Detroit River.

Next, we experience the Great Storm of 1913. Allan follows all the steps in the museum's interactive exhibit, and temporarily becomes a Great Lakes seaman facing that November storm. It rocked the Great Lakes with the greatest havoc and destruction since the introduction of commercial navigation. Its 70-mile-per-hour winds and massive waves blew dozens of vessels ashore, sank eight huge freighters in Lake Huron, and cost the lives of 235 seamen.

Allan survives the storm, but just barely.

Afterward, he studies the huge topographical map of all the Great Lakes. He is fascinated by the underwater geography visible from

that perspective. Lake Superior, he notes, looks like a mixing bowl, Lake St. Clair like a butter dish, and Lake Erie like a long, shallow platter.

The Dossin Museum also displays antique navigation instruments, dozens of beautiful models of ships and boats important in Michigan history, and continuous videos on marine subjects. Visitors can view Detroit River traffic through a submarine periscope.

The next major Dossin exhibit, scheduled to overlook the Detroit River by February, 1991, will be the 30-foot working pilot house of the *William Clay Ford*. The 767-foot flagship of the Ford fleet carried iron ore to the firm's Rouge Steel plant until her retirement in 1984. Visitors will be able to walk the deck, handle the controls, and learn the history of the huge lake freighter.

Moving to the Upper Peninsula, the Great Lakes Shipwreck Museum and Lighthouse overlooks Lake Superior's Whitefish Bay, often called the graveyard of the Great Lakes. The museum opened in 1989 in a small white clapboard structure on Whitefish Point, near Paradise and Sault Ste. Marie. Its exhibits demonstrate the rugged life of Great Lakes sailors. They begin with artifacts from the *Invincible*, a small fur trading schooner that in 1816 became the first documented shipwreck on Lake Superior.

The museum's most popular shipwreck exhibit memorializes the *Edmund Fitzgerald*, which went down in November, 1975, with all of its 29 crewmen.

Thirty miles southeast across Whitefish Bay, you can explore an actual lake freighter. The former ore carrier *Valley Camp* welcomes visitors from a dock on the St. Mary's River at Sault Ste. Marie. You can see her steam engine and how the crew lived, slept and worked in her dining room, crew's quarters and pilot house. Le Sault de Ste. Marie's Historical Sites, Inc., calls the *Valley Camp* the world's largest Great Lakes maritime museum.

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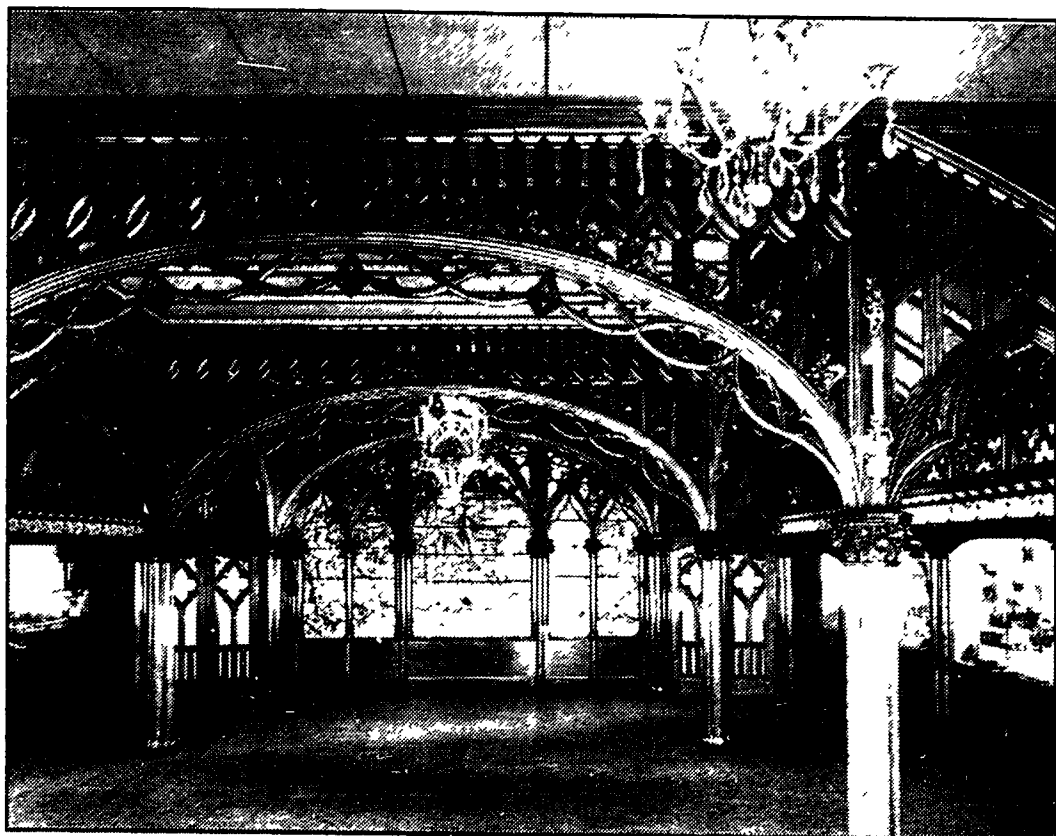

It contains aquariums and video presentations as well as exhibits. It also displays the only major artifacts from the shipwreck of the *Edmund Fitzgerald*, its two lifeboats.

You can dock at Mariner's Park Marina, adjacent to the *Valley Camp*. From atop the Tower of History nearby, enjoy a view of the 500 Sault locks and Michigan's oldest city.

Back to the south at Port Huron, you can tour the lightship *Huron*. Now a National Historic Landmark, she is being restored at Pine Grove Park and will become a permanent exhibit of the Museum of Arts and History. For 36 years this lightship guarded the Corsica Shoals in Lake Huron north of the Blue Water bridge. She was retired in 1971. Self-guided tours are available to the public.

The Museum of Arts and History at the corner of Wall and 6th Streets features ship models, photos and artifacts from Great Lakes ships and pleasure boats. In a reconstructed pilot house, visitors can ring bells, bellow orders into the speaking tube, spin the great ship's wheel, and generally play at being a seaperson. They made the pilot room hands-on so children of all ages can have a good time with it.

Across the state, at South Haven on Lake Michigan, the Michigan Maritime Museum occupies a large interpretive center overlooking the Black River Turning Basin. Its newest treasure is a wooden dugout canoe discovered by two fishermen last summer in a small inland lake in Allegan County. Scientific data shows the native American vessel was built in the 1700s.

With models, photographs and artifacts, it demonstrates how vessels, from canoes to great ships, were built and used on the Great Lakes. It displays underwater archaeology, native American traditions, fishing, shipping, US Lifesaving and Coast Guard Services, small boatbuilding, and recreational boating.

The museum received a National Preservation Honors Award for its archaeological study of the *Rockaway*, 19th century scow schooner that went

down nearby in Lake Michigan. Its 1,000-volume Marialyce Canonic Great Lakes Research Library specializes in the anthropology of maritime man.

Also worth a visit is the *USS Silversides*, America's most famous surviving World War II submarine, welcoming visitors at Muskegon. Replicas of the Great Lakes schooners *Madeleine* and the *Malabar* are moving museums in Traverse City. The Marquette Maritime Museum explores maritime history in its area of Lake Superior. At Presque Isle, the Old Lighthouse and Museum focuses on 19th century lighthouse service and seafaring life.

The former passenger steamer *SS Keewatin* invites visitors to tour its 350-foot length as it rests permanently at a dock in Douglass. A steam tug and sailing fishing boat are also on hand at the site.

In Lansing, the Michigan Historical Museum offers occasional temporary exhibits on Great Lakes subjects such as lighthouses and lifesaving stations, plus a permanent collection that includes a native American dugout canoe.

Outside, well-known Michigan artist Glen Michaels has created a sculpture of fused glass that he describes as "depicting the beauty and power of Michigan waterways." He and architect William Kessler wanted both the building and Michaels' Great Lakes Fountain and Sculpture Pool to illustrate "the changes and reflections of Michigan waters."

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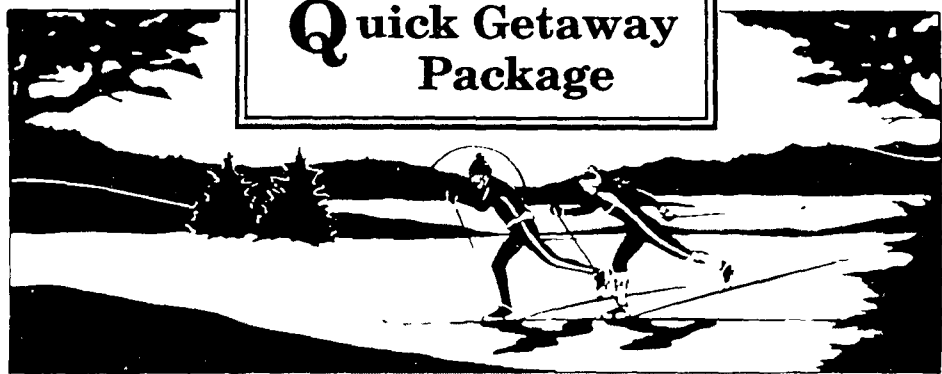
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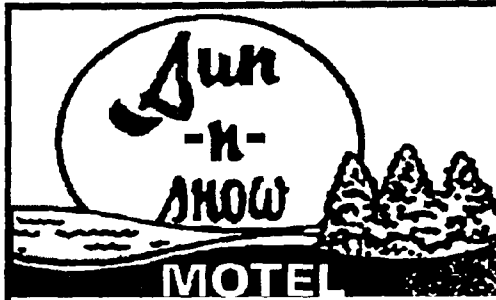
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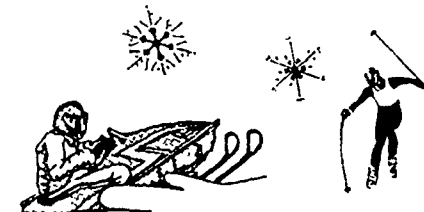
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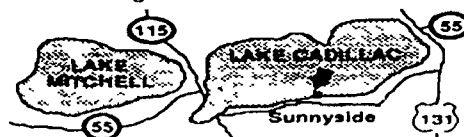
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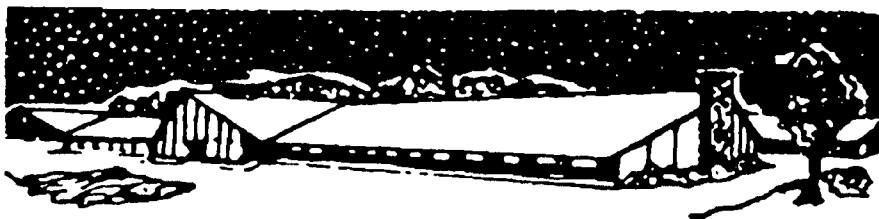
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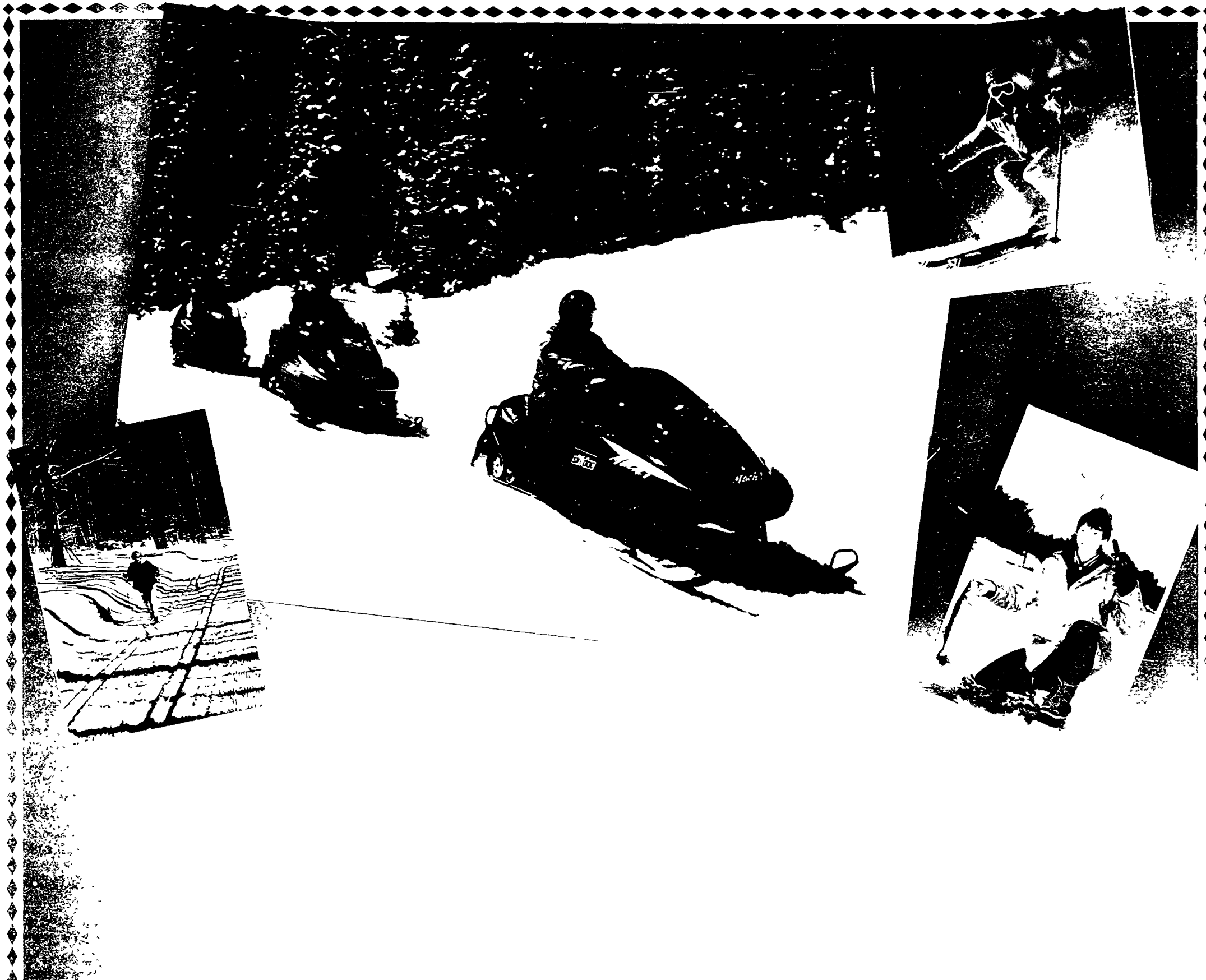
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Chef Hermann makes mark — Austrian tortes, Thai curries prepared in downtown Cadillac

Cadillac, Michigan—

There's a little bit of Vienna in downtown Cadillac, and a touch of Nepal and the Caribbean islands too.

Nope, the UN hasn't opened a new agency in this northwest Michigan city. This international flavor can be experienced at Hermann's European Cafe and Inn.

Opened in 1985, the Mobil Guide three star restaurant and hotel offers gourmet cuisine in a bistro-style atmosphere. The newly refurbished guest rooms have been designed to reflect European taste while providing the convenience American travelers require.

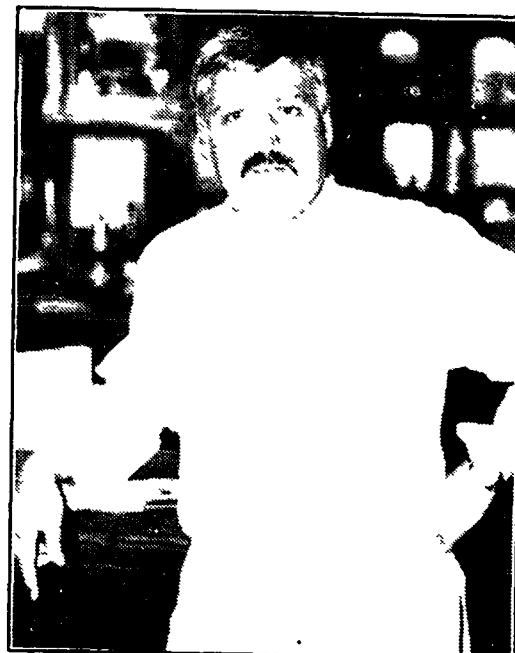
Globe-trotting chef Hermann Suhs was born and raised near Vienna, where he spent five years as an apprentice to learn his trade. His first certificate was earned in a Vienna pastry shop. Next he apprenticed in the famous Hotel Sacher in Vienna with European master chefs.

Since Vienna, chef Hermann has cooked his way around the world. In Sweden, he earned his master chef certificate. In Nepal, he served as a personal chef to the king. He has worked in Thailand, Bermuda and the Caribbean islands, and at resorts in Florida, Maryland and Michigan.

So it's easy to see why chef Hermann's international dishes are prepared with a rare authenticity. The wiener schnitzel tastes of the cafes of Vienna and the curries are reminiscent of Bangkok. After dinner choices include a tray of "sweet surprises" in the Viennese pastry tradition, of course, Italian cappuccino and a special blend of coffees from around the world.

Ethnic and regional buffet nights are scheduled on the first Friday of the month. A New England clam bake is set for Feb. 1, foods from the South Pacific is the March 1 culinary theme, while a Greek food festival is the April 5 offering.

Suhs has overseen an incredible transformation in the building, which formerly housed a "\$3.25 buffet joint" with four run-down upstairs apartments. Two truck loads of plaster were hauled away to reveal the restaurant's original brick walls. Seven large hotel rooms were created on the second level. All are individually decorated (mauves and

teals predominate), have private baths with telephones, contain cable TV and VCR, and come complete with a continental breakfast delivered to the door.

The Chef's Deli adjacent to the restaurant is stocked with Hermann's favorite foods from around the world: European chocolates, fresh-baked pastries, imported grocery items. The deli case is stuffed with sandwiches and sea food, plus imported meats and cheeses.

One complete section of the deli case caters to the sweet tooth; cheesecakes, mousse cakes and petit fours, to name a few. The wine inventory numbers 200 selections.

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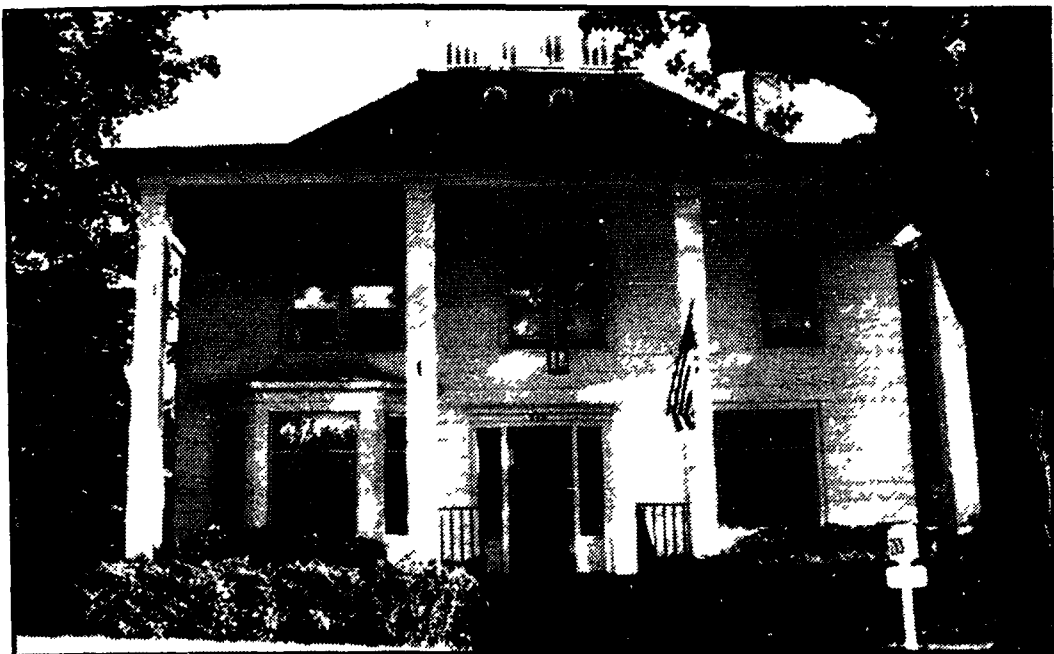

Spa, sauna, hot tubs update 1895 mansion

Cadillac, Michigan—

Here's a bed and breakfast that offers the best of two worlds: turn of the century ambience AND luxurious contemporary amenities.

Built in 1895, The American Inn's ornate carved wood and stained glass windows still reflect Cadillac's boom-town lumbering era. The beveled glass in the front door, ceramic tile floor in the entrance way and magnificent fireplace mirror were all imported from Paris by the original owner, a wealthy downtown merchant.

The gleaming birch in-lay flooring throughout the home's first and second levels was produced by a Cadillac saw mill. Local legend has it that this firm also made flooring for the White House.

An overstuffed couch and chair, an antique platform rocker and paintings reminiscent of the late Victorian era continue the turn of the century theme in the downstairs sitting room and dining room. An eight-foot carved oak fireplace and mantel is a real standout.

Upstairs, French doors open to reveal four comfortable guest rooms, sauna and hot tub. The decor and furnishings (country print wall paper, a wrought iron bed, pine dressers, etc.) give the rooms an early American flavor. All come complete with private baths and phones, air conditioning, and color television with movie channels.

The third floor is more 21st century than 19th. The 1100-square-foot suite can accommodate up to six persons and features a spiral staircase leading to an outdoor deck with a view of Lake Cadillac. Skylights bath the suite in a warm glow which accentuates the soaring cedar walls. A dip in the three-person private spa is especially inviting after a cross-country ski outing.

Innkeeper Cathy Feister prepares a continental breakfast for guests which includes homemade muffins

and sweet breads, fresh fruit, yogurts and hot and cold cereals.

Cathy and her husband Mike, transplanted Livonia, Michigan natives, opened the bed and breakfast in 1988. The inn has been featured on the city's home tour.

The American Inn is located at 312 E. Cass (M-55), three blocks from the downtown shopping district and four blocks from Lake Cadillac. Call 616-779-9000 for reservation information.

Cadillac, at the junction of US-131 and M-55 in northwest Michigan, is a mecca for outdoor enthusiasts. Downhill skiing at Caberfae is a 15-minute drive away, while cross-country fans will enjoy the lighted trails along the shore of Lake Cadillac. A snowmobile festival is set for Jan. 31-Feb. 3. 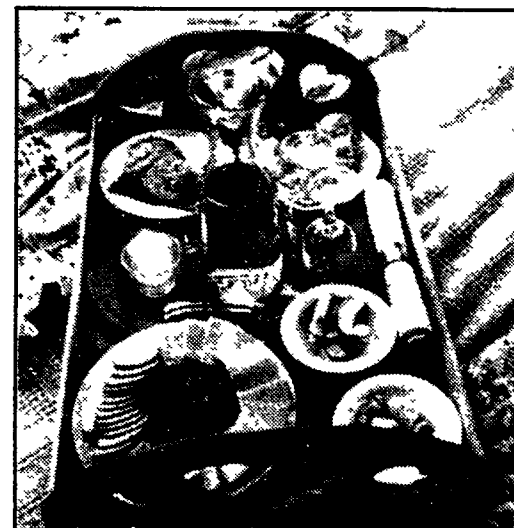

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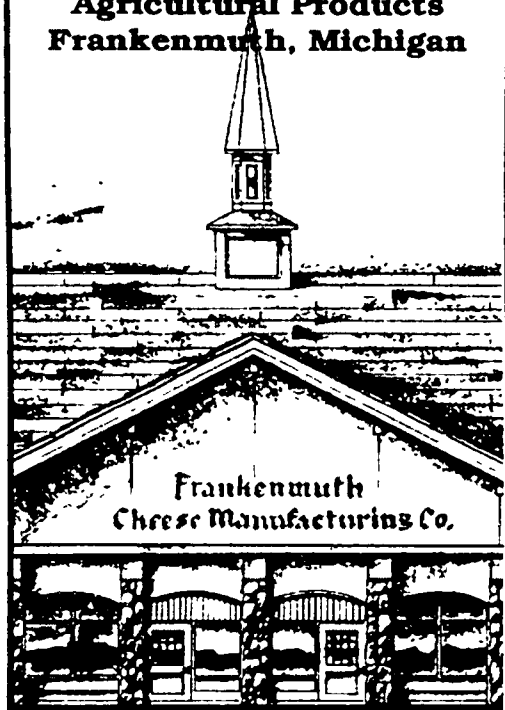


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Black history has strong roots in southern Ontario settlements

"I stand as a free man upon the northern shore of old Erie, the fresh water sea..."

That's an old runaway slave song. I learned it from my grandmother when I was just tall enough to press my nose against the edge of the piano keys as she played the many verses. My grandmother was born Annie McNamee, the tenth child of an Irish family that had settled in southern Ontario, and I have no doubt that she learned that song from her family as a child.

The verse went, "They worked me all the day, without a cent of pay, so I took my flight in the middle of the night when the moon had gone away."

I found myself humming that song when I drove along Highway 21 towards the village of Dresden, Ontario. I turned the corner and there was the sign "Uncle Tom's Cabin."

Uncle Tom is not a popular phrase in this enlightened age, but it was on everybody's tongue in 1852 when

Harriet Beecher Stowe wrote the controversial book by that name.

Uncle Tom's Cabin is only one of several memorials to black settlers in southern Ontario. If you do the tour, you will visit the Raleigh Township Centennial Museum, a black heritage museum in North Buxton, which is also in Kent County; the John Freeman Walls Historic Site in Maidstone Township; and the North American Black Historical Museum and Cultural Center in Amherstburg.

You reach Uncle Tom's Cabin by crossing the Ambassador Bridge from Detroit and following Highway 401 to Exit 109, which leads you north on Highway 21 to Dresden. The historic site, now owned by Kent County, is one kilometer southwest of Dresden on Park Ave.

The sign beside the road was erected by the Ontario Heritage Foundation. It reads: "THE JOSIAH HENSON HOUSE: In this house lived the Reverend Josiah Henson (1789-1883) whose early life in slavery provided much of the material for Harriet Beecher Stowe's novel, "Uncle Tom's Cabin."

"Born in Maryland, Henson escaped in 1830 to Upper Canada. In 1841, he and a group of abolitionists

purchased 200 acres in this vicinity and established a vocational school, known as the British American Institute, for fugitive slaves.

"A sawmill and grist-mill were built, and a considerable number of former slaves settled here. After emancipation was proclaimed in 1863, many returned to the United States, but Henson continued to occupy this house until his death, and is buried nearby."

None of the Henson family were involved at the site as long as it was privately owned, but family members are now on the advisory board. You sometimes see a member of the Henson family tending the old graves nearby.

It costs \$2.50 for adults, \$1 for children 6-12 to enter the small museum with its documents and photos. From there you enter the grassy setting of the settlement, with its small unpainted chapel, a two-story house that temporarily housed fugitive slaves, a smokehouse made from the stump of a large tree and another two-story house fronted by a sign that reads "Uncle Tom's Cabin."

This small complex, open May 24 through September, is only one of the reminders of the Underground

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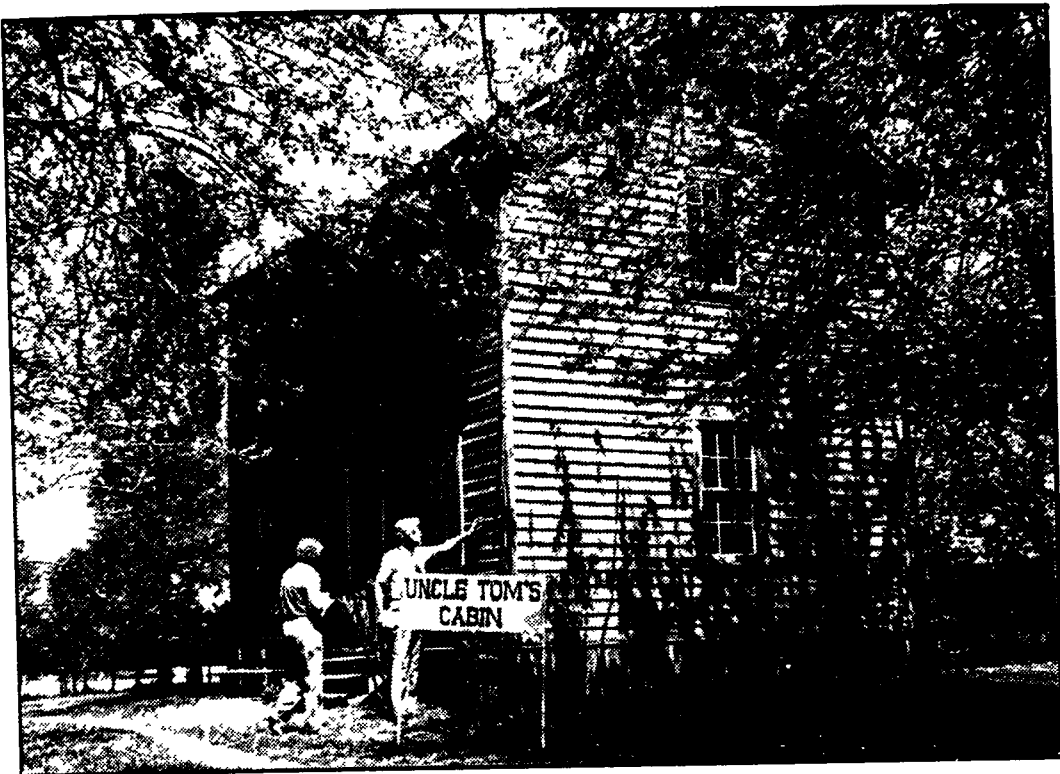

Railway, which carried 30,000 to 50,000 runaway slaves from the United States into southern Ontario.

To reach the Raleigh Township Centennial Museum, take Highway 401 to the Tilbury exit, follow County Road 8 to County Road 14, and then go north into North Buxton. Ice palace, light show top Winterfest attractions

Detroit—

An international indoor ice sculpting exhibition featuring a 15-man team of Japanese ice carving chefs is the cornerstone of WINTERFEST '91, a family entertainment extravaganza scheduled Jan. 25-Feb. 3 at the Michigan State Fairgrounds.

The Japanese team from the Sapporo Snow Festival (perhaps the most prestigious ice and snow carving event in the world) along with American chefs will fill the State Fairgrounds Coliseum with large, ornate ice sculptures, including a 30-foot ice palace. 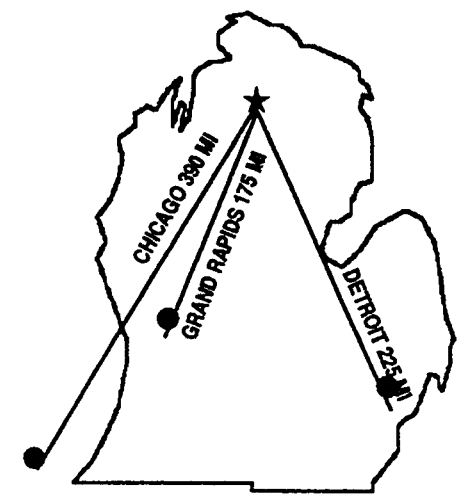


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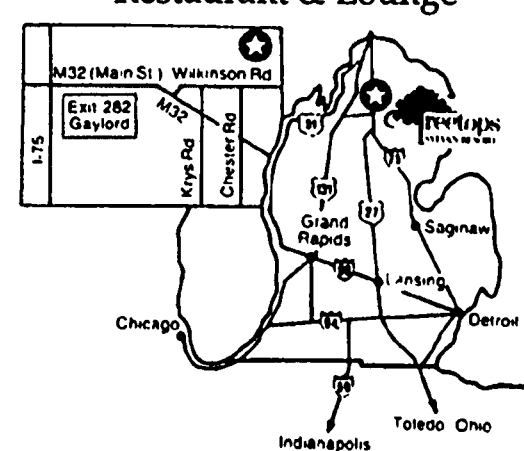


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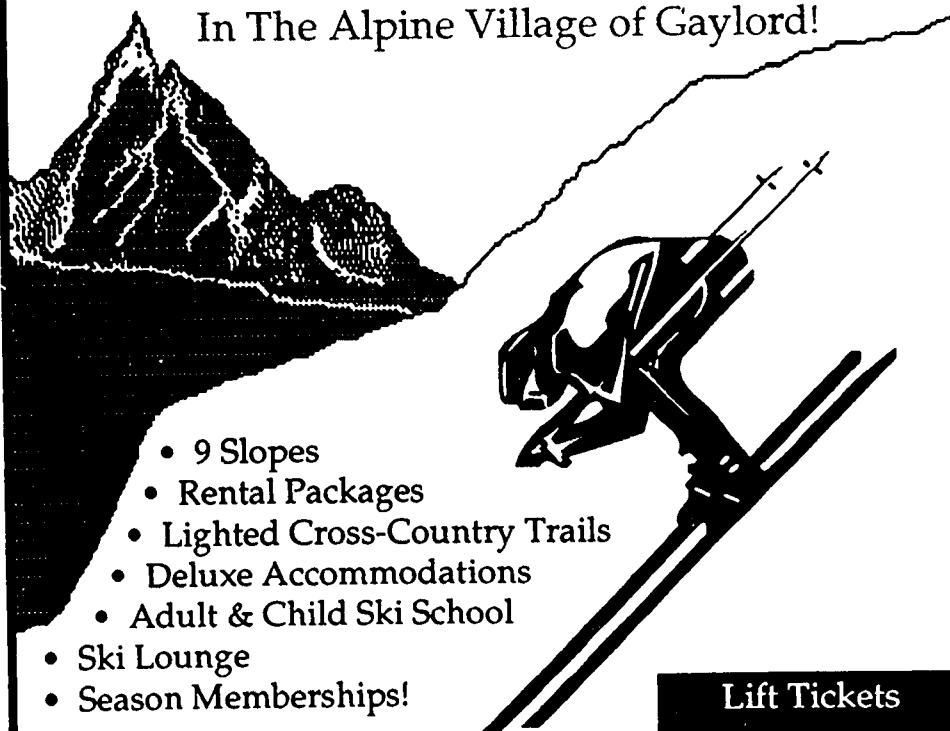
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Cook Energy Center visitors see what's behind the power

Bridgman, Michigan—

Nestled in the dunes along the shores of Lake Michigan is one of the nation's largest nuclear power plants. Capable of generating more than 2,100,000 kilowatts, the Donald C. Cook Nuclear Power Plant supplies electricity for more than 470,000 customers in Indiana and Michigan.

But unlike many nuclear power plants which keep a low profile within their communities, the Bridgman based, Indiana Michigan Power plant welcomes visitors to its information center next door.

"Keeping the public informed of advances in energy production and research has long been a commitment of Indiana Michigan Power (IMP) and its parent company, American Electric Power (AEP)," claims Eustace Smarrella, manager of the Cook Energy Information Center. "The Information Center was opened five years before Unit One of the plant began commercial operation in August 1975 and eight years before Unit Two started production. This gave visitors a chance to learn how nuclear energy is used to produce electricity and to observe the construction of the plant."

The Center also calmed many of the initial concerns about safety for the surrounding communities, the lake and dunes, Smarrella says. Today, I&M still credits the Center with the good rapport it has with area residents.

Cook Energy Information Center uses three theater presentations to explain how electricity is produced, distributed, and made available the instant a switch is flipped.

In Theater I, two humanoid newscasters, who bear a striking resemblance to real people, capture the future of energy today. A television studio, complete with monitors and cameras, sets the stage for a fast-paced presentation about how Americans will be using energy

in the year 2001.

Next, a rotating power plant model in Theater II demonstrates how each part of the Cook Nuclear Plant operates. Light animation, mechanical movement and sound bring the information to life while the tour guide fields specific questions about the plant and surrounding area.

In Theater III, visitors get the sensation of touring the Cook Nuclear Power Plant in person -- right down through the containment walls -- when a wide-screen film tour gives them a fascinating, closeup view of the inner workings of the facility. It's a rare chance to see more than if you actually walked through a nuclear power plant.

The tour concludes with a dramatic view of the Cook Nuclear Plant from the Cook Energy Information Center's 10' x 50' picture window.

"Visitors can also learn about energy through 'hands-on' displays in our recently remodeled lobby area," Smarrella said. "The nature of the lobby exhibits makes them as entertaining for adults as they are for children. And the variety of information gives everyone a chance to learn something new."

Included in the series of educational displays are a hand-powered generator that shows visitors how much energy is needed to operate various household appliances; touch-screen computer games to test energy knowledge; four video demonstrations of energy experiments that can be performed at home; a wall display explaining how energy is transmitted from the plant to local transformers; plus, information about radiation and radioactive waste.

The Center is open 11 months, rain or shine, making it a popular point of interest for both local and vacationing people. An indoor eating

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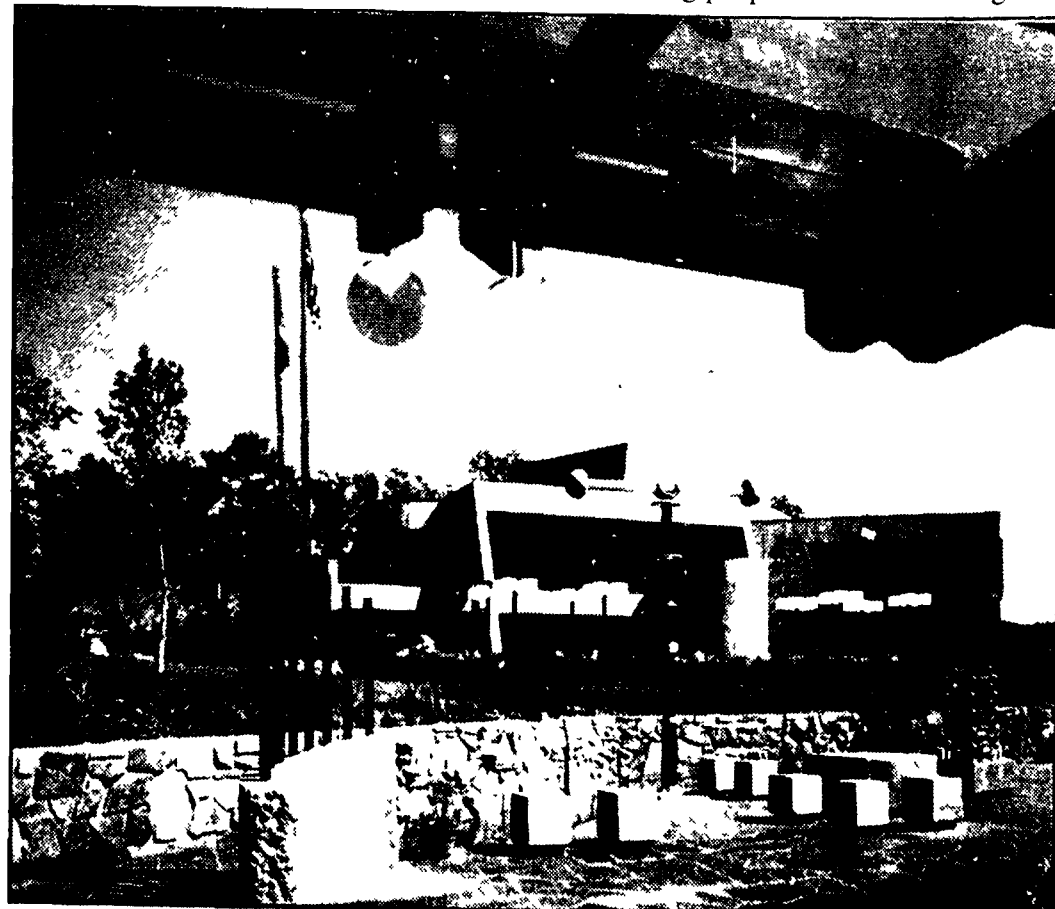
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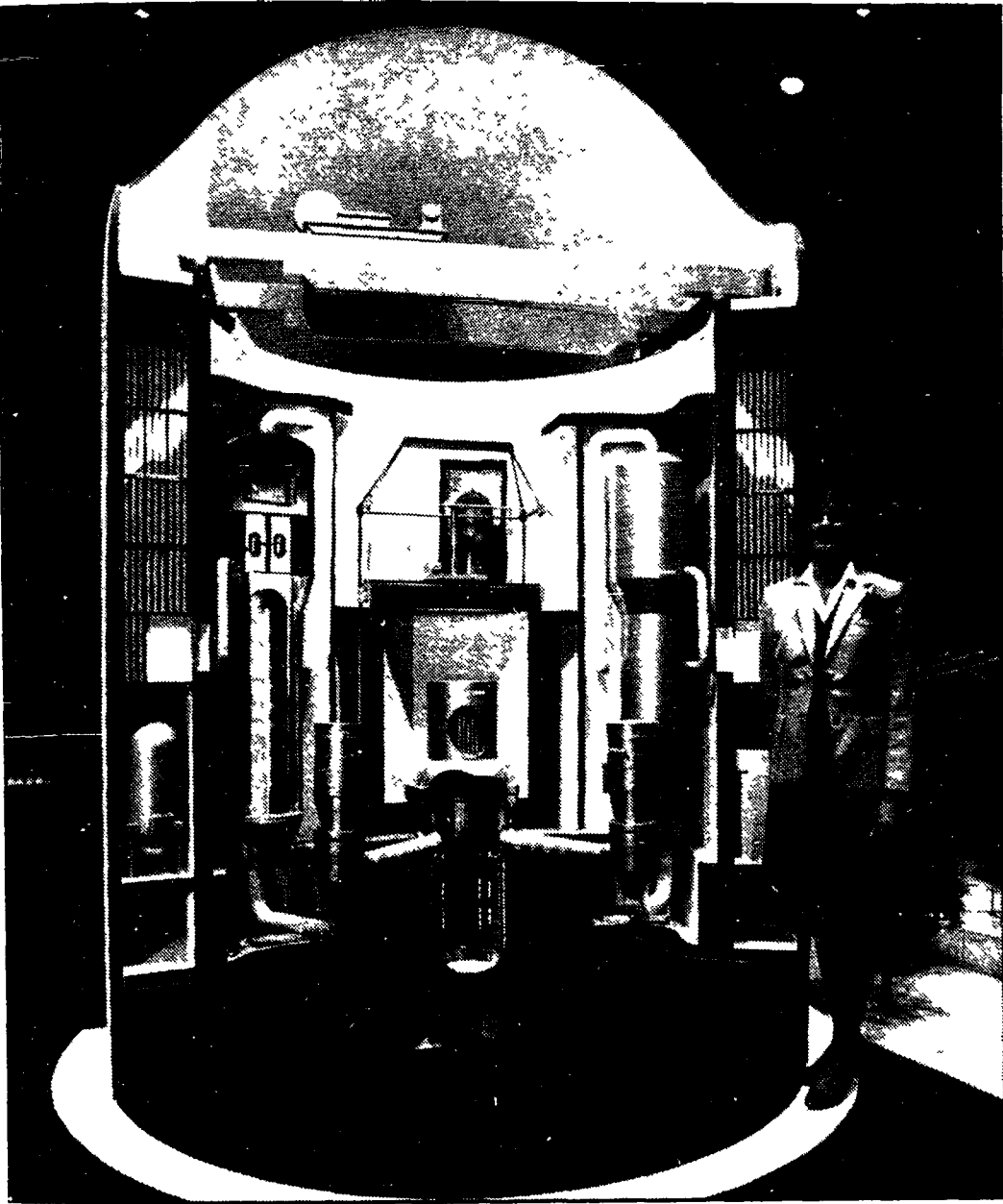
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TERRACED PATIO— Overlooking Lake Michigan, the Cook Energy Center picnic area is popular with warm weather visitors.

area features a snack bar and vending machines, or warm weather visitors can bring their own picnics to enjoy on the Center's terraced patio overlooking Lake Michigan.

Hours at the handicapped-accessible Cook Energy Information Center are Monday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., October through December and January through May (the Center is closed mid-December through mid-January and on all holidays). Summer hours are Wednesday through Saturday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Sunday, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. from June through September. Special monthly

shows.

To get to the Cook Energy Information Center take Interstate-94 to Exit 16. The Center is located just 3-1/2 miles north on Red Arrow Highway. A highway sign clearly marks the turn off for the dune-lined drive and visitors will find 200 parking spaces for cars, RVs and buses just outside the door.

The 55-acre resort will continue to offer special packages for skiing, snowmobiling, bowling and golf. The Cadillac Country Club is located adjacent to the facility.



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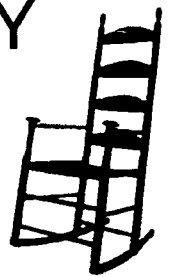
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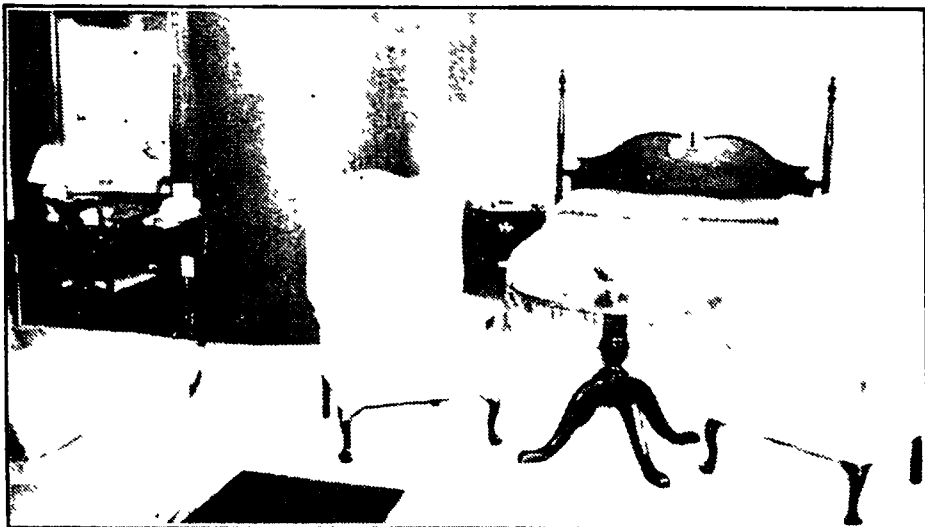

minor and can be fixed on the spot. They generally involve a fouled sparkplug, etc. And with his mechanical background, he is able to quickly find the trouble and correct it.

Today's snowmobiles, he points out, are far more reliable than the earlier models. With that change, together with the many miles of linked, groomed trails now available, snowmobiling has begun a surge of new popularity here, he says.

"Today, unless you've registered before hand you're not likely to find a weekend vacancy in our motels. What's happened is phenomenal and, unless the current gas shortage tosses a money wrench into the sport, I don't see any reason why its popularity won't keep on growing.

"The biggest change in snowmobiles are the suspensions and performance. Used to be when I first started snowmobiling, you rode on them for a day and worked on them for three days. Now, on my sled, with about 5,000 miles a year, I'll strip down my suspension about half way through the season, check the bearings and things, grease it up, and it's ready to go again. Breakdowns don't happen nearly as often as they used to. Last year I broke a suspension rod but that's the only time I was down for anything other than basic maintenance.

"Dependability. There's no comparison. Fifteen years ago you wouldn't go on a hundred mile ride. It was impossible. At least with a group of people. Maybe with two or three people you might make it. But if you took 20 people you'd be lucky to get 30 to 40 miles without one of the sleds breaking down. Now, 100 miles is nothing.

"Sled suspensions--the independent front suspension sleds, which give you up to nine inches of travel on the front end. Rear

suspensions have gone from about an inch of travel to eight or nine inches. The difference is like driving a go-cart and driving a Cadillac. The bumps on the trail are gone. Years ago I had to quit snowmobiling for a year because my back was giving me trouble. But with today's suspension you can ride some of the bumpier trails without the bumps going up through the top of your head."

Doesn't he or other snowmobilers get cold?

"With the new clothing today there's no reason for anybody to get cold.

"We've got handlebar warmers; we've got thumb warmers that run off our sleds. Suits are just unbelievably warm. Personally, all I wear is a pair of pants and a shirt under my suit. I don't even wear long underwear. We've gone to my favorite, the full-face helmet that keeps your head really warm. The open-face helmets were good but on really cold days you could get some frost bite. With a full-face helmet you don't get that. Plus, today's sled windshields block out so much of the wind and snow you don't have a problem there anymore."

Any advice for those just getting started?

"Get started on the groomed trails. Get to know your machine. And enjoy the outdoors that is all about you on the marked trails. Starting here at Indian River, for example, you can go all day long-going from one trail to the next without any fear of getting lost. Drive sensibly. Respect the rights of others.

"And, by all means, have fun!"

The man behind the boyish antics is comedian Chris Elliott. Elliott portrays 30-year-old Chris Peterson, a free-spirited man who refuses to grow up. His father, played by his real-life dad, Bob Elliott (of the legendary comedy team Bob and Ray), wishes his son would become something other than head paperboy, and possibly even move out.

It all began in 1983 for the younger Elliott, then an NBC tour guide, when he recognized David Letterman taking his mother on a tour of the studios and joked with the talk-show host.

When *Late Night With David Letterman* was launched, Elliott was hired on — to make coffee and run the office copier, that is.

"I almost left after the first month," said Elliott. "I was screwing up the coffee, and I wasn't answering the phones. I was scared I was going to be fired."

But Elliott's antics would eventually take him out of the office and put him in front of the camera. He became famous for his "Panicky Guy," "Fugitive Guy" and Marlon Brando and Morton Downey Jr. parodies. He also won four Emmy Awards for his writing contributions to the show, and in 1989 he published a book called *Daddy's Boy*, lampooning novels such as *Mommie Dearest*.

Louisville meets UNLV in hoops competition

The Louisville Cardinals could take a giant step in the direction of the NCAA Basketball Tournament when they face the top-ranked Runnin' Rebs of Nevada-Las Vegas before a national television audience on CBS Saturday, Jan. 26.

Louisville won two national championships and made three trips to the final four during the 1980s, but coach Denny Crum is rebuilding this season after the NBA and academic problems robbed his team of most of its veteran players. With All-Metro Conference center Felton Spencer passing up his final year of eligibility and super-sub Jerome Harmon sidelined by grades, the Cardinals have at best an outside shot of making it to this year's sweet sixteen.

Nevada-Las Vegas, on the other hand, is a team with a mission. A year ago the Rebs proved beyond a doubt they were the top team in the country when they pounded Duke 103-73 for the national championship. They

seemed destined to watch this year's tournament from the stands until a miracle ruling by the NCAA in November. Faced with a lawsuit, the NCAA, in effect, allowed Coach Jerry Tarkanian to dictate when the Rebels would have to face the music for recruiting violations. As a result, Nevada-Las Vegas will be back to defend its national title when the big boys gather for post-season play.

How we think and what action we take is taking on a serious dimension. There is no

kidding around we are now to be accountable for our luxurious lifestyles which result in solid waste. What a disgusting topic! And yet how ironic that we must go back to basics because of our need for instant results.

Community television is turning out to be a perfect vehicle to inspire each of us to follow through with necessary routines to assure that our environment improves quickly. Oakland County has an authority established to analyze and develop policies and educate the public as it pertains to recycling opportunities. Their purpose is to "establish the most cost efficient and environmentally sound manner to best serve the residents."

In Oakland County the Resource Recovery and Recycling Authority of Southwest Oakland County was formed in 1987. Lenora K. Kadun, P.E. is their General Manager. Lenora's educational background has major emphasis in Civil Engineering and Public Administration. Her primary responsibility is to plan, construct, and manage a Materials Recovery and Transfer Facility. Such a facility is crucial as landfill space across the nation is quickly running out. The RRRASOC has member communities of Farmington, Farmington Hills, Novi, South Lyon, Southfield, Walled Lake, and Wixom. As an educational tool, the authority has produced programming which may be seen on Community Television Channels which explain exactly how we may plan our home and office environment to recycle, reduce, and re-use our solid waste. Wayne County has established

the Conference of Western Wayne. This is a consortium of 18 communities which are: Belleville, Dearborn, Dearborn Heights, Garden City, Inkster, Livonia, Northville, Plymouth, Wayne, Westland, Canton, Huron, Northville Township, Plymouth Township, Redford, Sumter, Romulus, and Van Buren. The Board of this consortium serves as a program planning and development entity as it pertains to special projects.

They are to monitor design, and implement programs. On the subject of recycling, the consortium acts as a central network for all the communities. They have received a grant to facilitate Resource recovery education to residents. To receive a free presentation, those residents living in the communities of Western Wayne may call 525-8690. The Executive Director of the Conference of Western Wayne is Daniel Gilmartin. Marcia Bianconi is the Assistant Director. Each community in Oakland and Wayne Counties have established their own procedure for recycling, such as drop off recycling centers, composting areas, and curbside recycling procedures. In one of the educational pieces about recycling, it states, "every day each of us generates an estimated 3½ pounds of garbage. At face value, this seems like a small amount, however, compounded by the population of Michigan we collectively create enough garbage to fill the Silverdome each and every day of the year." Education and television programs tell us what we can recycle. The following

are the basic rules of thumb:

PAPER Newspaper: collect and tie in bundles. No books, magazines or catalogs please.

METALS Tin or metal cans such as soup or vegetable cans. Rinse out, remove both tops, and flatten.

GLASS Any non-deposit glass bottle or jar: clear, brown, or green. Rinse and remove lids for deposit in color sorted bins.

PLASTICS Cloudy, opaque, and colored plastic containers such as milk jugs, laundry detergent, and bleach. Rinse out and remove caps.

Most centers vary on what grades of plastic they accept. There are two other programs on recycling which may be seen on Community Television. **Community Forum: Environmental Concerns** is a panel discussion program about recycling in the home, underground water contamination, and techniques used to recycle. The other program is **Rescuing and Recycling It's Cool To Care**. It is hosted by fourth and fifth graders at Allen Elementary. They ask questions, which they have written, of guests Jan Hoffman and Janet Cameron.

As the future unfolds into the present, our local channels will help each of us as we sit in our own living rooms feel confident that we are doing our share to take action and make initial decisions which will help clean up our environment. As you can see by reading this article, the recycling issue is important to all ages. Let your television turn into an educational tool for your family as residents and local government staff create a team that will conquer every challenging issue that comes to each of our communities.

To find out more information, contact your respective township or city hall and they will direct you to the correct department to learn the procedures for recycling in your community.

Super Bowl has had ups, downs

Game one of TV's most-watched shows

In the 25 years since the National Football League championship game became known as the Super Bowl, there have been quite a few games that didn't live up to the expectations the name implies. But, cliff-hanger or blowout, ABC knows it can count on a Super Payoff in the A.C. Nielsen ratings when the AFC and NFC champions meet Sunday, Jan. 27, in Tampa, Fla.

The best of the two conferences have battled for the Lombardi Trophy 24 times beginning with Green Bay's lopsided 35-10 win over Kansas City in Super Bowl I.

According to Nielsen Media Research, which began monitoring the television viewing habits of the American public in July of 1960, 17 Super Bowls are among the top 50 watched programs of the last 30 years.

Super Bowl XVI between the San Francisco 49ers and Cincinnati Bengals became the top-rated sporting event of all time, garnering a 49.1 rating and a 73 percent audience share for CBS. The only programs ever to draw a larger audience were the 1983 final episode of "M*A*S*H," the Nov. 21, 1980, "Who Shot J.R." episode of "Dallas," and "Roots, Part VIII," which aired on Jan. 30, 1977.

Super Bowl XVI was one of those

games that lived up to its advance billing. With more than 150 million people watching, young Joe Montana led San Francisco to the first of three Super Bowl titles that gave the 49ers the undeniable right to be called the "Team of the '80s." Montana, who completed 14 of 22 passes for 157 yards and a touchdown, was named the game's Most Valuable Player. Although the 49ers built what appeared to be an insurmountable three-touchdown lead by the middle of the third quarter, they had to rally to defeat Cincinnati 26-20 after the Bengals came back to score three times in a 10-minute span.

There have been other games that truly deserve to be called "Super." Perhaps the most memorable Super Bowl of all time was played two years ago at Joe Robbie Stadium in Miami when Montana directed a 92-yard drive in the game's final seconds to beat the Bengals again, this time 20-16. All-pro wide receiver Jerry Rice was named the game's MVP after catching 11 passes for 215 yards and a touchdown.

The 1970s saw two unforgettable clashes between the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Dallas Cowboys. In Super Bowl X, the Steelers won the second of four titles in the 1970s by scoring twice in the fourth quarter to beat the Cowboys 21-17. Two years later, Steelers quarterback Terry Bradshaw had one of the most unforgettable days in the game's

history when he threw for 315 yards and four touchdowns in a 35-31 victory over Dallas.

But, there have been laughs, too. In Super Bowl XVIII, underdog Oakland faced a Washington team that had pounded its way to a 14-2 record behind the bruising running of fullback John Riggins. However, the day belonged to Raiders running back Marcus Allen, who ran for 191 yards and two touchdowns as the Raiders crushed the Redskins 38-9. Then, last year, the 49ers put the crowning touch on their dream decade by humiliating the Denver Broncos 55-10.

The silver anniversary of the Super Bowl will be ABC's third presentation of the post-season event. The "ABC Monday Night Football" trio of Frank Gifford, Al Michaels and Dan Dierdorf will be in the broadcast booth, while Brent Musburger will serve as pre-game and halftime host. He will be joined by commentators Bob Griese, Lynn Swann, Dick Vermeil, Beth Ruyak, Jack Whitaker and Jack Arute.

True Klan story earmarks Martin Luther King Day

Arnie Becker gets a conscience

In the spring of 1981, a young black man named Michael Donald was murdered in Mobile, Ala., and hung from a tree. On behalf of Donald's mother, attorney Morris Dees, founder of the Southern Poverty Law Center, filed a civil suit against the United Klans of America and won. The landmark case proved the killers carried out a policy advocated by the Klan, and therefore, the Klan itself was responsible.

This is the compelling story behind NBC's *A Season for Justice: The Morris Dees Story*, broadcasting Mon-

day, Jan. 21, on the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr. Actor Corbin Bernsen, well known for his role as Arnie Becker on *L.A. Law*, will play a more serious attorney when he depicts the courageous Alabama lawyer.

"There's a certain breed of people, and you've got 250- or 400,000 of them over in the Gulf right now," said Bernsen, "And Morris' life, as you may or may not know, is pretty much threatened day in and day out. And yet he's still defending human rights, and these kids in the Gulf are defending freedom.... I'm very impressed by people who do that," said the actor.

Bernsen also said filming the movie made him take a good hard look at his

own prejudices — prejudices we all possess.

During the 1960s, Morris Dees became active aiding minorities in court. In 1971 he opened the Southern Poverty Law Center, a non-profit legal organization handling cases dealing with employment discrimination, hazardous working conditions, tax inequities and the death penalty. In 1980, the center founded Klanwatch, which monitors hate groups and develops legal strategies for protecting citizens from violence-prone groups. Most recently, Dees was successful in prosecuting White Aryan Resistance leaders Tom and John Metzger in a highly publicized trial in Portland, Ore.

"I hope the spirit of the civil rights movement is revived in those who see this movie," said Dees.

Even though Holman refused to grant her a divorce in the beginning, she joined Olivier in Hollywood. It was several years later that they were married. Her daughter remained in England with her father. I haven't anything in print about a granddaughter and there isn't any mention of her daughter's involvement in the theater.

Beau Bridges set to star as press secretary James Brady

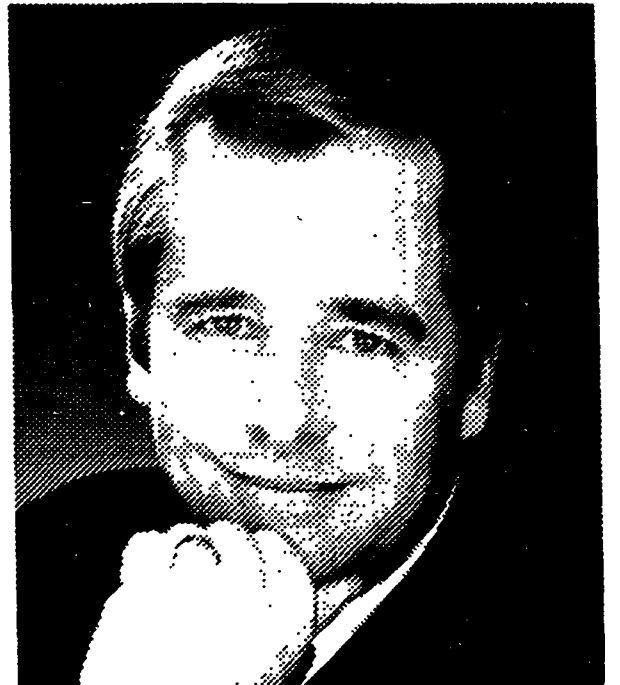

The Statler Brothers will debut their own weekly variety series on TNN in October. Taping begins March 18.



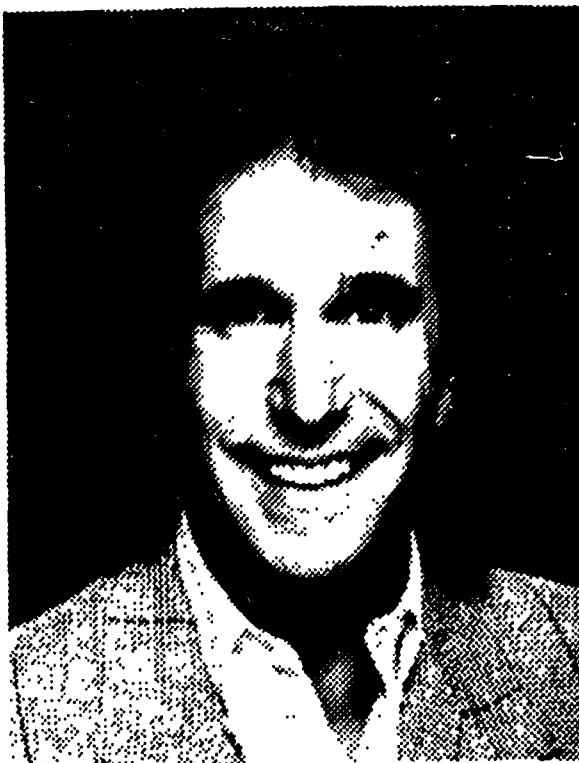
