

Walters eyes manager post in Plymouth

Northville City Manager Steven Walters said Saturday that he is seriously considering becoming the City of Plymouth's new manager.

"It just feels like it might be time to move on," he said. "This time, there are an awful lot of things that make me think it's meant to be."

Walters was offered the inside track on the job being vacated by former Battle Creek City Manager Gordon Jaeger May 1. He was one of two final candidates for the position last April, but Plymouth officials gave the job to Jaeger instead.

Jaeger has since announced his decision to step down as full-time manager, and the Plymouth commission agreed to search for a new full-time manager despite Jaeger's offer to stay on as a part-time manager.

This time, the Plymouth City Commission decided to give Walters first crack at the position, and held a special meeting Saturday morning to interview the Northville manager. The commissioners explored Walters' views on downtown development, shared services and city finances in the hour-long interview, in front of a crowd of about 30 residents.

The commission voted after the interview to appoint a negotiating committee to approach Walters more formally about his candidacy, and Plymouth Mayor Pro Tem Ralph (Jack) Kenyon named commissioners Ronald Loiselle and James Jabara to the committee to work out a potential contract.

Loiselle said the committee would meet with Walters within the next week to begin negotiations. He said no preliminary salary range has been set for the position.

Walters cited several attractive aspects of becoming Plymouth's new manager. "Sometimes change can be good," he said. "After a while, the new perspectives you have somehow become old perspectives ... and there's something to be said for challenges."

There would be no shortage of challenges to the Plymouth position, with residents still fuming over the city's agreement to back Plymouth Township's attempt to operate Mettetal Airport, and commissioners still recovering from Mayor Dennis Bila's sudden resignation last Wednesday, not to mention Jaeger's decision to step down after a year on the job. Plymouth's chief of police also announced his resignation last week to take a similar post in Lisle, Ill.

But Walters said he welcomed the opportunity to set up Plymouth's proposed Downtown Development Authority and explore the potential combination of public services, including the police and fire departments in Plymouth city and township.

"I'd be doing the same things all over again," Walters said.

Walters was instrumental in the Northville City DDA that funded Main Street '78 and other downtown improvements, and still serves as DDA director. He and Township Manager Richard Henningsen are also overseeing the combination of Northville's police dispatching services.

Walters said salary was important to him, but likely would not be a final factor in his decision. He now earns a base salary of \$60,580 after a 9-percent raise last year, and an additional

Cora dogs drugs, dealers

For a non-drug user, Cora is a big fan of drugs.

Cora, a 5-year-old, drug-sniffing dog for the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, lives with deputy investigator Greg Morris by night and searches Metro Airport for drugs by day.

And the differences between the affectionate, playful Cora and the Cora that wears a duffle bag apart with her teeth are like night and day. But not to Cora.

When she is tearing a suitcase apart in search of drugs during her day job at the airport, Cora is just playing.

"The only time she gets to play is when she smells drugs," said Morris, who is also her trainer. "This is all done through fun. It's all a game to her."

Morris recently visited three Northville schools as part of Red Ribbon Week. Sponsored by Northville school organizations and the Northville Action Council, Red Ribbon Week is intended to remind students of the problems related to substance abuse.

Morris told Amerman, Moraine and St. Paul's elementary school students a story of the life of a drug dealer.

"Drug dealers don't wash their hands; they're dirty people," he said. Money belonging to drug dealers gets drugs on it via the drug dealer's hands, he said.

That's where Cora comes in. "She doesn't go after just any money, otherwise I wouldn't have any pockets left in my pants," he said.

Drug dealers lose their money and their freedom thanks to Cora, Morris said. He showed a picture of a pile of

drug money found by Cora.

"Now he's getting 50 cents a day washing dishes in the state prison," Morris said of the dealer.

Drug dealers cannot use checks to avoid carrying so much cash, Morris explained, because no one trusts their credit.

Cora will search 1,000 bags a day for drugs in her job at the airport. So, searching the Amerman library for a duffle bag that once contained drugs was no problem.

Cora found the bag — which had been planted earlier by Morris — while Amerman students tried to restrain their cheers.

Loud noises excite Cora, Morris warned.

The dog's reward for finding the bag was a quick, playful romp around the library with Morris and the duffle bag.

Cora demonstrated her determination when she clung to the duffle bag with her teeth while Morris lifted the bag above his head.

One visitor to the demonstration commented that the strength of Cora's teeth would make a drug user think twice before trying to slip on a plane with an illegal substance stashed in his or her pocket.

Troubled Shores site might be right for sale

Major investors in a controversial Northville Township development are not actively courting buyers, but if the right offer came along ...

But speculation that Shores of Northville developers are anxious to get out of the former Thomson Sand and Gravel site project is unfounded, the primary investor in the 400-acre proposed subdivision said Friday.

"If anything came along ... it would have to be a good offer," said Angelo Evangelista, primary investor in the Seven Lakes of Northville Limited Partnership.

"We can develop or sell (it) if we find somebody interested."

The developers have not been approached by potential buyers, Evangelista said.

Evangelista said a scheduled March 13 meeting with the state Department of Natural Resources will shed light on his suspended multi-million-dollar project.

Developers are seeking DNR approval of a plan to repair a creek that

has caused erosion on the Thomson site and has damaged neighboring residential properties.

The DNR could approve or reject the developer's proposal at that time.

The DNR/developer meeting is set two days prior to court action involving the developer and the DNR. The DNR alleges developer agent D & T Construction violated the state Inland Lakes and Streams Act during gravel pit rehabilitation last year.

A DNR-issued cease-and-desist order has effectively halted work on the Thomson site.

DNR approval of the developer's permit application will prompt immediate rehabilitation work, Evangelista said. If the permit is rejected "then something has got to happen," he said.

A lawsuit against the DNR could result from a rejected permit application, he said.

Application approval is in the best interest of all parties, Evangelista said.

"We want to have peace in the family," he said. "If we work together, we can have a nice project."

If the DNR approves the permit, the developers will repair off-site properties damaged by the redirected creek, Evangelista said.

"If they (DNR) say go ahead, we'll remedy the problem," he said. "We told them (residents) we are going to take care of them."

Evangelista said his development team is eager to complete site rehabilitation and focus on constructing a sewer system and roads for the proposed subdivision.

"We want to do things right," he said. "Are we going to work against ourselves? How can you sell anything like that?"

Evangelista also said he is not seeking a replacement for general partner Vincent DiLorenzo. DiLorenzo is the front man for D & T Construction, and has handled the bulk of the reclamation and preliminary site plan work with Northville Township officials.

The relationship between DiLorenzo and the township has been strained at times, but his partners

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annual \$800 in longevity pay and \$3,000 in car allowance.

"I'm not going to come here for \$1,000 less," Walters said. "Why should I?"

But he said his decision hinges more on the nature of the job than on salary. "If I decide that this is right for

me, then even if Northville offered me more money, I wouldn't stay," he said.

For a person who said he had not yet made up his mind, Walters talked like a person who had at least thought through some of the ramifications of his departure. "Heck, they're not going to have a problem

finding a manager in Northville," he said. "There's all kinds of managers in Michigan that are envious of my position."

Being given first crack at the position also sat well with Walters. "It's quite flattering . . . to have the commission vote to declare me the final candidate subject to negotiating with

me," he said.

"A change may be right for me at this time," he said, adding after a pause, "and maybe not."

Walters, 46, has served as Northville City Manager for the past 17 years. He served as Plymouth's assistant city manager between 1967-1970.

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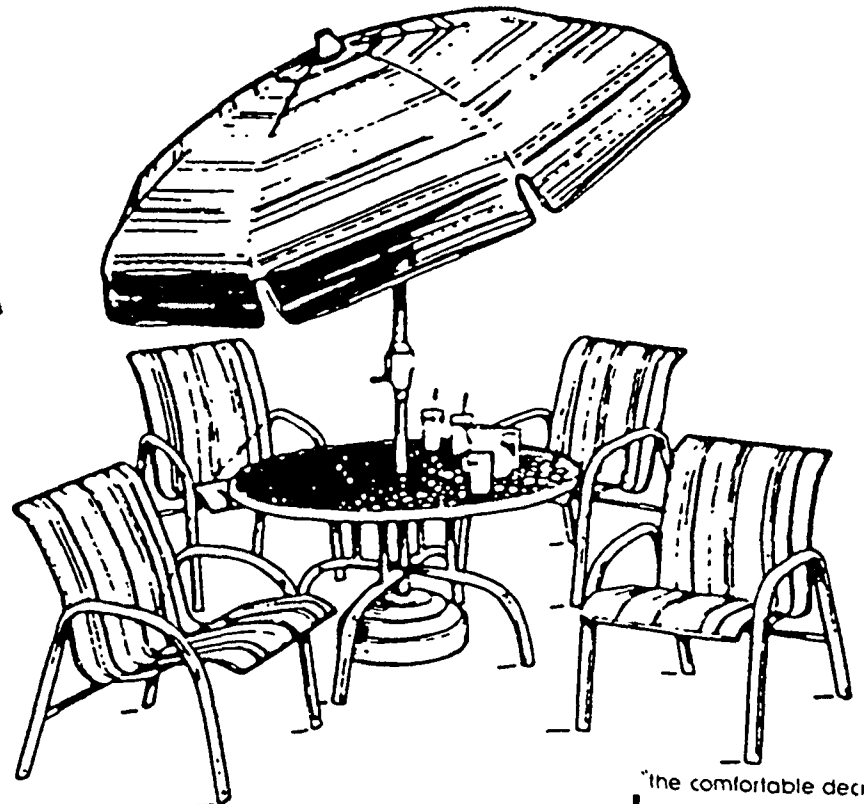

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school districts like Northville.

"The budget gives property tax relief on school operating millage but does not specify a formula for reimbursing school districts," he said. Geake said he feared that any formula agreed to by both the house and senate would favor in-formula school districts rather than out-of-formula ones.

"It's likely to hurt communities like Northville," he said.

Though the Department of Social Services faces another round of deep cuts under Engler's plan, the Department of Mental Health and the Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital may emerge relatively unscathed, Geake said. "The General Fund spending for mental health will probably be about the same as last year," he said.

Geake chairs the both the Social Services and Mental Health appropriations subcommittees.

One major concern of city officials this year involved Engler's attempt to end state-returned racetrack revenues, which pay for police and other services to Northville Downs and city improvements that benefit the track.

Engler's attempt to sever state-returned racetrack revenue altogether was replaced by a 9.2-percent cut. The city, which had been receiving about \$900,000 annually in state-returned racetrack revenue, will get \$82,500 less this year than last because of the cut.

State officials initially were uncertain whether Engler's new budget attempts to cut the funds even further. Tom Tomaszewski, administrative

officer for the Department of Agriculture's finance department, said his department is seeking that information. The Department of Agriculture oversees Michigan racetracks.

"We know there is an overall reduction in the spending of the racetrack revenue funds," Tomaszewski said. "I would say it's being hit. Now, how hard it's being hit or whether it's being eliminated, we don't know... That's what we have to find out."

Though Engler's new budget increases slightly the budget earmarked for the Department of Corrections, a department spokesperson said the budget likely will result in less money for existing facilities like Scott Regional Facility on Five Mile Road.

"In general, even though there's more money, there's actually less money because we're going to be

opening three or four new prisons," said spokesperson Gail Light.

"It'll be tight as it is this year," she said. This year's budget included plans to turn Scott into a women's facility and close Phoenix Correctional Facilities, both of which are proceeding.

Engler's budget-cutting measures this year included a failed attempt to lay off more than 2,000 Corrections employees, but Light said next year's budget does not indicate another such attempt. "We don't expect any additional layoffs except for sergeants at housing units throughout the system," she said.

Light said next year's budget continues the trend started this year. "It'll be at least as severe as this year," she said. "And of course this all still has to go through the Legislature, so who knows what we'll end up with."

are not ready to push him aside, Evangelista said.

"No, I don't think so. What's the difference, DiLorenzo or another guy?" he said.

DiLorenzo did not return a reporter's telephone calls Friday.

The primary lending institution behind the Shores of Northville project on Friday offered little comment on rumors of a project buyout.

"I can't answer that question," said Dale Watchowski, assistant vice-president at Alexander Hamilton Life

Insurance. "That would have to be sought from the project's general partners."

Alexander Hamilton Life is a limited partner in the Shores of Northville project, Watchowski said. The firm's primary watch in the development is "collecting what's due us," he said.

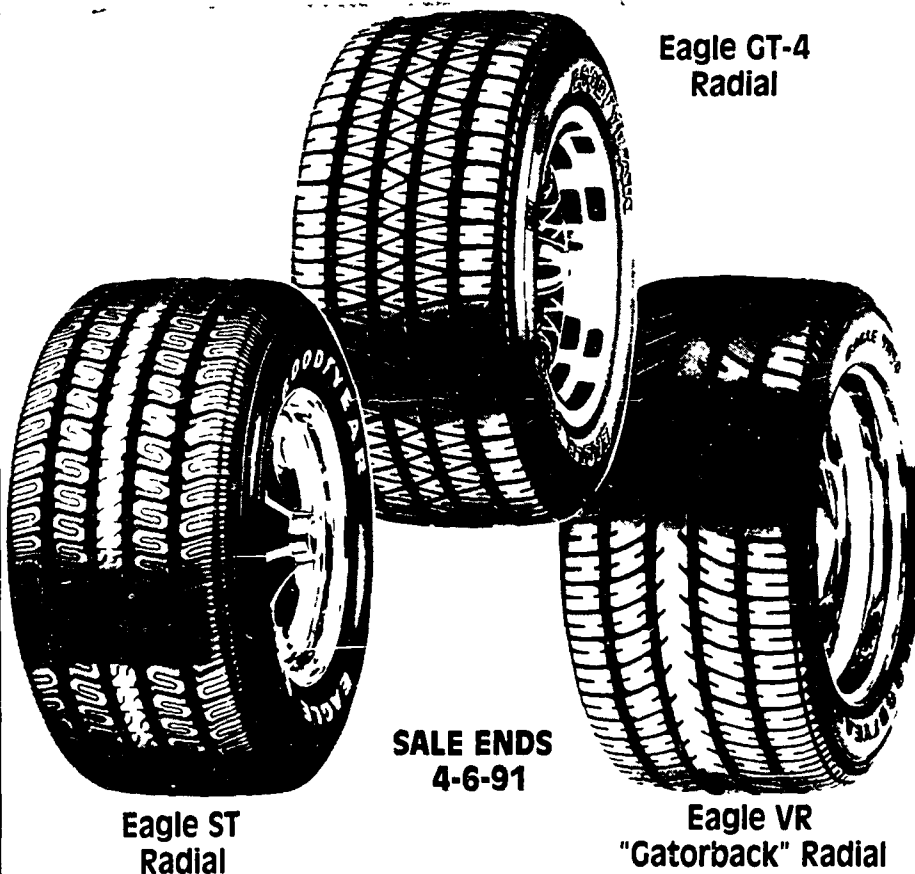
Responsibility for a potential sale would be handled by DiLorenzo and Evangelista, Watchowski said.

"If there are offers, the decision we expect to be made by the managing general partners," he said.

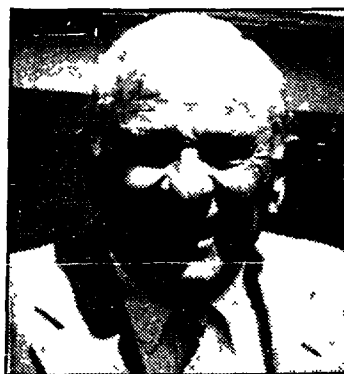
Ross B. Northrop Jr., 73, died Friday, March 8, in William Beaumont Hospital.

Huron River Hunting and Fishing Club, and past president of the Michigan Funeral Directors Association.

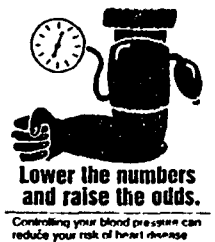
He is survived by his wife Betsy, his son Ross III, his daughter Mandy

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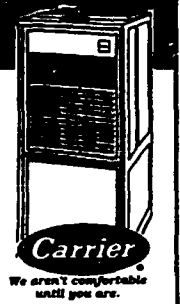

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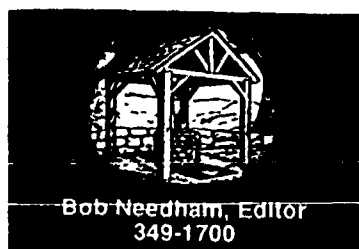

Assessment season points out problems

The whole process of property assessments and property taxes is kind of an unpleasant business. It gets more unpleasant when a homeowner believes a piece of property has been overassessed. But if that homeowner wins the appeal to the board of review, that should be the good part, right?

Right — until the next year. That's when the homeowner lands right back at the starting point — with an overassessed home.

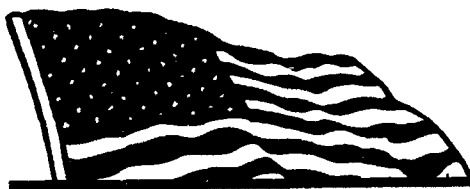
The recent mailing of assessment notices in Northville and around the area brought the bad news to those people who won board of review appeals last year: Their homes this year seem to be just as overassessed as before. Those people aren't imagining things.

See, the assessment/appeal system works with a built-in flaw. When an assessor sticks a value on a house, that number stays in the assessing records — even if a board of review adjusts it down, agreeing with the property owner that the figure is too high. By law, the assessor next year will use as a starting point the original, old value — the one which an official body decided was wrong. Any increase will be applied to the old incorrect figure, guaranteeing a new incorrect figure.

In other words, if a person starts out with a bad assessed value, that person must appeal every year in order to correct the situation. Sounds inefficient at best, and downright unfair at worst? It is.

Nancy Molloy, administrative assistant to the treasurer in Northville Township, put it like this: "The individual has to prove himself again and again. It's always been like that."

This system either results in a lot of repeated appeals or a lot of unfair assessments going unchallenged (because people get tired of jumping through the hoops). Maybe it results in a lot of both.

The hapless homeowner does have an out, however. It is possible to make a less formal appeal to the assessor or assessing company; if the assessors are so inclined, they may make a permanent adjustment to the records.

That's all right as far as it goes, but it's certainly an odd way to address the problem. In effect, that puts the assessor in the position of appropriating the authority of the board of review.

A Northville township resident raised these issues with us last week, using his own situation as an example. He won an appeal last year, and this year has to go back and do it all over again, if he wants a fair assessment. He thinks there is something wrong with the system.

He is absolutely right. This ought to be addressed, on whatever level is appropriate. Perhaps ways could be found locally to take board of review results into account and still follow the letter of the law for establishing new assessments. What seems like a better response, however, would be for the state Legislature to take up these questions. If this situation plays itself out every year all across the state, the resulting waste of time and effort appears staggering.

Curiosity proves compelling



The most-watched show on television last week was the 60 Minutes program that featured the interviews with Bob Simon and his fellow journalists who were held prisoner in Iraq.

I was one of those with my eyes glued to the Sony that night, and I watched a second interview with the unfortunate quartet the next morning on Cable News Network. Call it professional curiosity, but I just wanted to know what they were trying to do when they got caught.

I think it was producer Peter Bluff who pointed out that they weren't trying for any great scoop or daring, sensational footage. "We just wanted to see what was going on at the front," he said.

All four were veteran war reporters, and had placed themselves in more dangerous places before to get a story. It was a false sense of security, peppered with a little naivete, that put them in a spot where the Iraqis could capture them.

The interviews with Simon, Bluff and the others were riveting for me because, given the circumstances, I'm almost certain I would have done the same damned thing. So too, I think, would most journalists.

I remembered an incident that happened to me when I was a freshman in college.

One Friday afternoon in the spring, alarms went off in my dorm, and our resident advisers told us a tornado had touched down about 10 miles away. They shuttled everyone

down to the basement of the building for safe keeping.

I had grown up in New York City, and I figured if I could ride the subways at night, then a tornado ought to be a piece of cake. Never having seen or experienced a tornado, I wanted to see what they were all about. I slipped back to my room, grabbed my rain poncho and walked outside.

All was eerily quiet, and the light rain fell on my cheeks as I looked skyward. From a hill alongside the dorm, I could see for a mile or two to the west, north and east. I watched the western horizon, but saw nothing. The rain got a little heavier, and a light breeze kicked up, but nothing catastrophic. After a half hour or so, I gave up, disappointed.

Now older and wiser, I realize the danger in which I had placed myself. Looking back, I'm fascinated with the innocence that put me in that position.

I wasn't trying to be a thrill-seeker or a daredevil. I wasn't looking to impress anyone. I just wanted to see a tornado. I was curious.

That emotion is what drove Simon and his crew to put themselves at risk, and it is what drives journalists to do their jobs. So often the media are assailed for "carrying out witch hunts," "trying to make headlines," or "trying to get the big story." For the majority of journalists, it's nothing quite so complicated.

It's just a little occupational hazard called curiosity.

E. & J. Gallo Winery is this nation's largest wine producer. E. & J. Gallo's Hearty Burgundy may well be America's best-known wine. But let's face it, Gallo offers no competition in the premium end of the market. Until now!

Born within 100 miles of Modesto, Calif., the city they put on the map, Ernest and Julio Gallo grew up working a small vineyard bought by their father in 1925. At the end of Prohibition in 1933, the brothers borrowed about \$6,000 and started the greatest wine success story in a rented warehouse.

At the start, their table wines were shipped in barrels. Distributors at the other end of the line bottled the wine under a variety of labels. It was only in the early 1940s that the first Gallo label appeared.

Sorry, folks, you can't find these wines at the supermarket. Gallo's doing it right. They are showcasing these wines in restaurants. And in this area, we're not talking about dinner houses. We're talking upscale restaurants — the Whitney and the Van Dyke Place in Detroit, Fox and Hounds in Bloomfield Hills, the Round Table in Plymouth, Country Epicure in Novi and Pike Street Restaurant in Pontiac, to name a few.

The 1988 Gallo Limited Release Chardonnay (\$12-14 restaurant list price) is a departure from early 1980s releases. "The attempt is to highlight fruit without overly emphasizing chardonnay's inherent apple qualities," said Carmen Castorina, Gallo's regional communications director.

Detroit carmakers have their auto show, but for chefs in the area, the chance to showcase their successes comes at the annual chef's seminar at Schoolcraft College.

"The people enjoyed it a lot," said Janos. "They enjoyed the new techniques and different flavors and the new plating. At least they said they did."

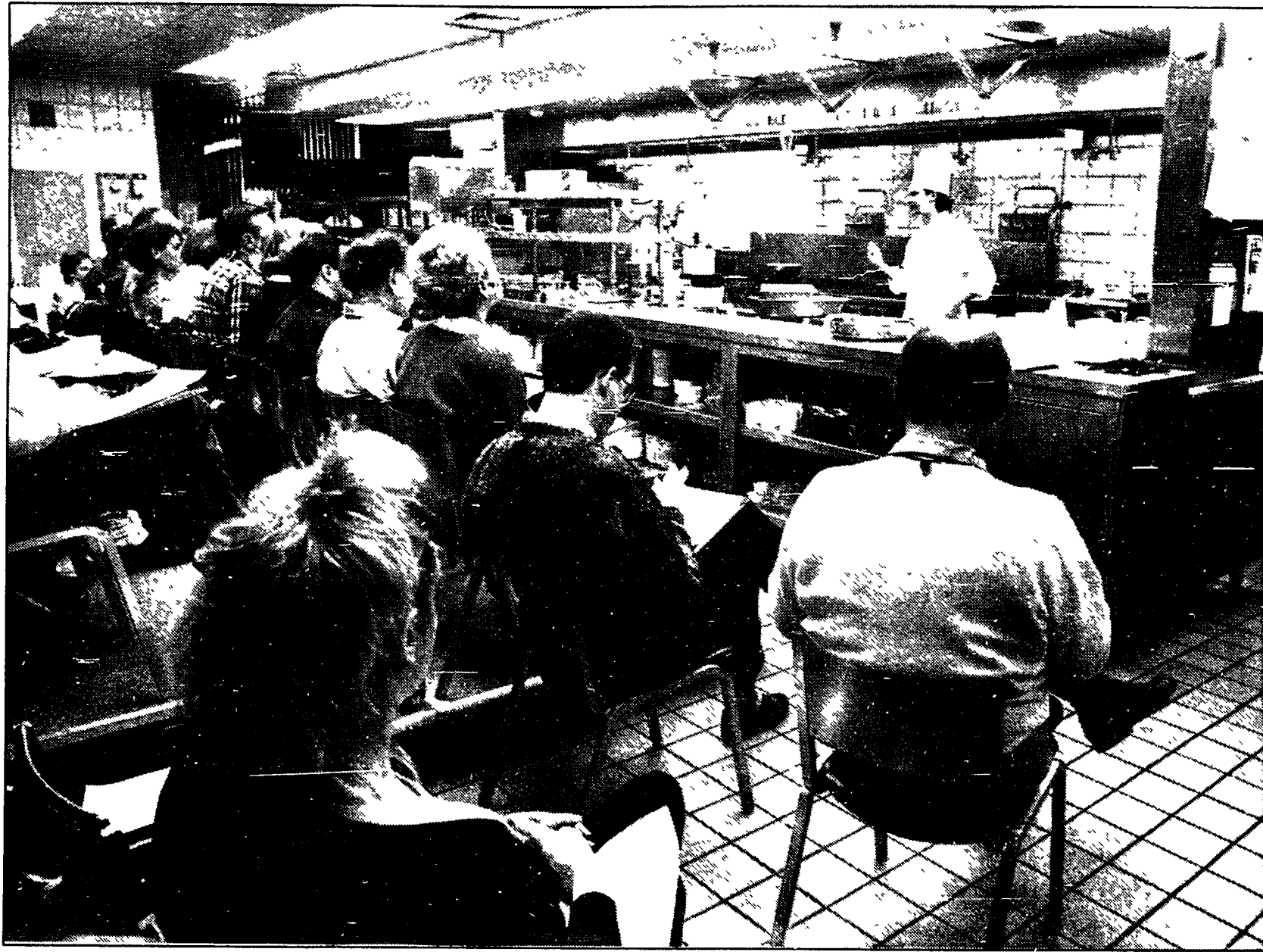
For his session, Chef Gabriel drew on his experience in competition. Ga-

Put on the pressure for good food

Early last summer on one of my runs, I happened upon a block garage sale. After six miles, I was ready for a break, and what a good excuse.

My husband Tom, along on his bike, is not a browser, and strongly urged me on. Of course I couldn't pass up potential bargains and we went through at least 10 garages before I found it: a like-new, only-used-twice, 1950s Sears pressure cooker for \$5.

Against the protests of "What will you use that for?" and "How many gadgets do we need?" I promised the seller, an older gentleman, that one of us would be back to retrieve our purchase later that day.

I had dreams of cooking beans, tougher cuts of meat and soups, and canning quarts upon quarts of tomatoes and sauces to get me through the winter. My mother used a pressure cooker — for what I don't remember — so it seemed "right" that I should learn also; not to mention that as a chef and lover of cooking, my curiosity to discover another cooking method had been aroused.

Well, the summer went on and the time came to try the new toy. Carefully I read the instructions, recalling the extreme danger always associated with cooking under pressure. I readied my ingredients, assembled the cooker, turned on the heat and waited with anticipation.

And waited, and waited . . .

No pressure ever built up. The rubber gasket

had deteriorated with time. With disappointment, everything was packed up, put into storage and forgotten — until now.

Toula Patsalis, owner of Kitchen Glamor with her husband, Chris, and director of their cooking schools, has written a book entitled "Joys of Pressure Cooking." And what a book it is. Full of quick, delicious and nutritious recipes. From appetizers to desserts, this colorful, fun, easy-to-follow book has them all.

The advantages of pressure cookers are varied: up to 70 percent less cooking time, energy savings, one-pot cooking with easy cleanup and little preparation time. In addition, as Toula points out, the meals are tastier because of the concentration of flavors, and more nutritious because leaner cuts of meat can be used.

The book goes into detail to explain the ins and outs of a pressure cooker. The selection of the proper cooker is where the process starts. As with any other kitchen tool, there are varying grades. The stainless or enamel cookers are preferred over the aluminum because there is no darkening of food due to acid interaction.

Size is also of importance. Even if your family is small, you should consider a model large enough to provide some leftovers. Regardless of the number of portions a recipe yields, cooking time will remain the same.

For perfect pressure cooking every time, there

are certain steps that should be followed. Always read the manufacturer's manual and take particular care to understand the explanation given for the various parts. Keep extra rubber rings on hand and check the flexibility of the valve.

Study your recipe and collect the ingredients. Trim excess fat and cut veggies to the same sizes. Use adequate liquid, never less than what is recommended.

Purchase a heat diffuser if one isn't included with your unit, and use when cooking rice, pasta and beans. Be sure the lid is securely attached and build steam until the desired pressure is reached. Turn the burner to medium heat to maintain pressure and begin timing. Invest in an accurate timer as time is crucial to success. Follow instructions to relieve pressure.

Finally, thoroughly wash all parts of your unit in hot, sudsy water. Cleanliness is imperative for the proper functioning and long life of your cooker.

Secure lid. Over high heat, develop steam to medium pressure. Reduce range heat to medium and cook for six minutes.

Release steam according to manufacturer's directions. Remove lid. Stir chicken and sauce.

Combine sour cream and potato starch. Stir into chicken and sauce and cook over medium heat for one minute.

Place taco shells on large tray. Spoon chicken and sauce into shells. Add pinch of cheese, lettuce, green pepper, and tomato to each filled shell, topping with sliced avocado.

These tacos are a real winner for football Sundays. Chicken filling may be frozen for up to three months.

Letting your microwave chip in

Chocolate chips come in milk chocolate or semisweet, and the latter — only slightly sweetened with sugar — is by far the more popular. Manufacturers sell more than 123 million pounds of semisweet chocolate chips — that's about 1/4 pound per person per year.

Chocolate chip cookies are perhaps the most popular vehicle for these tasty morsels, but your microwave can transform them into a variety of sweet treats to tempt your palate.

Melted chocolate chips make an easy candy coating — and melting them is a snap in your microwave. Always be sure that utensils are perfectly dry when melting chocolate.

Never cover chocolate when melting, and melt at medium (50 percent) or medium-high (70 percent) setting rather than at full power. This will help ensure against overcooking.

Check chocolate frequently when melting, and always check after minimum time specified in recipe.

Overheating chocolate chips when melting can result in scorching and a plastic-like, hardened mass — or in "crumbs" of dried-out chocolate. If this happens, add 1 or 2 tablespoons of vegetable shortening (not butter or margarine) per 6 ounces of chocolate; stir until fluid.

Do not allow chocolate to come into contact with wet utensils during melting as this can result in a cohesive, hardened lump. Should this occur, add shortening as directed above.

For an easy chocolate candy coating, combine 2 cups semisweet chocolate chips with 1/4 cup grated food-grade paraffin. Microwave at medium-high (70 percent power) setting about three minutes; stir until smooth. Microwave again at medium-high setting one to 1 1/2 minutes, if necessary. Stir until smooth. Use while warm to coat homemade candies, pretzels, fresh whole strawberries or to dip corners of plain butter cookies.

Out of chocolate chips? In some recipes, you may replace 6 ounces (1 cup) of chocolate chips with 1/2 cup cocoa plus 1/4 cup sugar plus 1/4 butter or margarine.

Ever wonder why chocolate is so popular for Valentine's Day? It might be because chocolate contains a small amount of energizing caffeine and a tiny amount of theobromine (a mildly addic-

tive stimulant) as well as a hint of phenylethylamine (a chemical that has been linked to romantic feelings).

(Recipes in this column are tested in 625-700 watt microwave ovens.)

MICRO-TIP OF THE WEEK

How to tell when chocolate chips are melted? Microwaved chips will hold their shape as they melt; they will look soft and puffy and the surface will appear shiny. With stirring, chocolate will become smooth.

DELUXE HAYSTACKS

1 (6-ounce) package (1 cup) semisweet chocolate chips
1 (6-ounce) package (1 cup) butterscotch chips
1 (3-ounce) can crispy chow mein noodles
1 cup crispy rice cereal
1/4 cup salted Spanish peanuts

Preparation time: 5 minutes
Cooking time: 2 1/2 to 4 minutes
Oven setting: medium-high (70 percent power)
Combine chocolate and butterscotch chips in 2-quart microwave-safe casserole. Microwave 2 1/2 to 4 minutes, stirring every minute, until chips can be stirred smooth.
Fold in all remaining ingredients until evenly coated. Drop by teaspoons onto waxed paper-lined baking sheet and let stand until firm. Yields about 4 dozen clusters.

COCONUT ROCKY ROAD BITES

1 (6-ounce) package (1 cup) semisweet chocolate chips
2 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups miniature marshmallows
1 1/4 cups chopped walnuts
1 cup shredded coconut
dash salt

Preparation time: 10 to 15 minutes
Cooking time: 1 to 3 minutes

Oven setting: medium-high (70 percent power)
Combine chocolate chips and milk in medium-size microwave-safe mixing bowl. Microwave 1 to 3

minutes, stirring every minute, until chocolate chips are melted.

Stir in all remaining ingredients, mixing well. Let cool slightly, then form into small balls. Place on waxed paper-lined baking sheet and refrigerate until set. Yields about 2 1/2 dozen candies.

FUDGE CREME FROSTING

1 cup granulated sugar
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/4 cup evaporated milk
1 (6-ounce) package (1 cup) semisweet chocolate chips
1 cup marshmallow creme
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/4 teaspoon salt

Preparation time: 5 to 10 minutes
Cooking time: 3 to 4 minutes
Oven setting: MEDIUM-HIGH (70 percent power)

In medium-size microwave-safe mixing bowl combine sugar, butter or margarine, and evaporated milk. Microwave, uncovered, 2 to 4 minutes, stirring every minute, until mixture is bubbly.

Immediately add all remaining ingredients, stirring until chocolate chips are melted and mixture is smooth and creamy. Use to frost brownies or layer cake. Yields about 2 cups frosting.

EASY CHOCOLATE CHIP FUDGE

1 1/2 cups (14-ounce can) sweetened condensed milk (NOT evaporated)
1 (12-ounce) package (2 cups) semisweet chocolate chips
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup chopped salted almonds

Cooking time: 2 1/2 to 4 minutes
Oven setting: medium-high (70 percent power)

Combine condensed milk and chocolate chips in medium-sized microwave-safe mixing bowl. Microwave 2 1/2 to 4 minutes, or until chips are softened and can be stirred smooth. Stir in vanilla. Spread evenly in buttered 8-inch square pan. Sprinkle evenly with chopped almonds and press in gently. Cover and chill until firm. Cut into 1-inch squares. Yields about 5 dozen squares.

Pritikin diet still requires getting the fat out

Polished and tan, Robert Pritikin looks very much like a living advertisement for the program his father Nathan began more than 20 years ago. Though most people associate the name Pritikin with weight loss, in fact it is a lifestyle plan.

Diet, exercise and stress management are all part of a program which goes by the credo "Live Your Life in Your Prime."

After years of concentrating on research to support their clinical findings, the Pritikin people are reaching out to the community at large via the "Eat Healthy! Live Healthy!" program. Events include a free evening seminar with Pritikin, which was held last week at the Townsend Hotel in Birmingham; the Pritikin Culinary Classic, a chef's competition (not open to the general public) Monday, Feb. 4, at Schoolcraft College; and free, educational handouts in local food stores which began last month.

The point of this program "is to let people know that they can eat well without compromising taste or lifestyle," says Pritikin, who is director of the Pritikin Longevity Center.

Citing numerous studies, Pritikin points to dietary fat as the culprit which leads to the major causes of death in the United States: heart disease, cancer and diabetes. People in countries like China eat a 10-percent fat diet and consequently have a much lower incidence of these life-threatening diseases.

The Pritikin Program advocates a diet of 10 percent calories from fat. Getting the fat out of what we eat is the bottom line, according to Pritikin, whose plan is said to reduce average blood cholesterol by 23 percent in three weeks.

This is no small feat for Americans whose diet straddles the 30- to 40-percent range of calories derived from fat. When one considers that food which derives 30 percent of its calories from fat can be labeled low-fat, this is not surprising. And although Americans appear to have become more health-food conscious in recent years, Pritikin maintains that things haven't changed all that much.

In 1978, one study revealed that Americans ate a diet made up of 40 percent fat. In 1989, despite an increased interest in nutrition, fat in the American diet was reduced by only 3 percent.

People deceive themselves, Pritikin explains. They may eat more vegetables but they stir fry them in oil.

They add a bit of butter before broiling their fish, or add oily dressings to large salads. He agrees that they are making better food choices in some respects but that ultimately the preparation of foods is critical to reducing fat consumption.

This is why the ingredient restrictions for the Culinary Classic, the chef's competition, are largely based on fat, not calorie content.

What about the use of cholesterol free oils? Pritikin again refers to studies which demonstrate that eating

polyunsaturated fat indirectly stimulates the production of cholesterol. Additionally, he points out that by eating fried foods one nurtures a taste for them. Ironically, according to Pritikin, people are born with an innate preference for sweets. A taste for fat is cultivated.

He also attributes the failure of most weight-loss diets to the focus on portion control instead of the elimination of fats. "Buy a frozen diet dinner and see how small it looks on a dinner plate," he recommends. Analyze its contents and you will discover that the portion is small because the fat content is so high. Fat is so calorically dense that it requires portion control.

Pritikin maintains, and he cites several studies again to back him up, that a person on a fat-free diet can eat as much as he wants and still lose weight. "A person should be able to walk away from the table feeling satisfied," he says.

One of the many diet pitfalls is dining out, and although restaurants are trying to offer more healthful options, Pritikin believes the choices are still too limited. "We go out to eat as a reward and end up punishing ourselves by eating and drinking the wrong things," he says emphatically.

It is hoped that the Culinary Classic will inspire noted chefs—including Steven Allen of the Golden Mushroom in Southfield, Ed Janos of Too Chez in Novi, and others—to create culinary adventures using Pritikin-approved foods.

"Fat-free food that is prepared well is wonderful," Pritikin says, "and it should have a regular place on the menus of all fine eating establishments."

How does one adapt to a fat-free diet, especially in a world of microwaveable and fast foods? According to Pritikin, planning ahead is key. "If you keep your kitchen stocked with healthful foods that are easy to prepare, eating well will become second nature," he says confidently.

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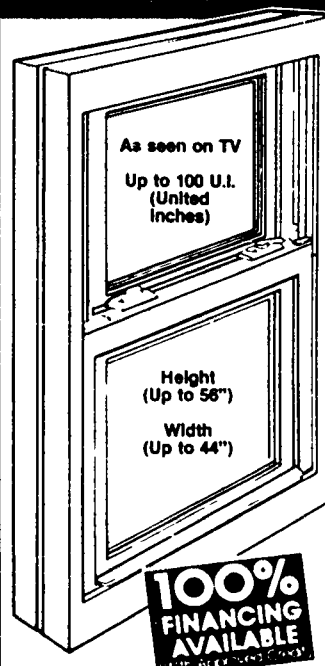
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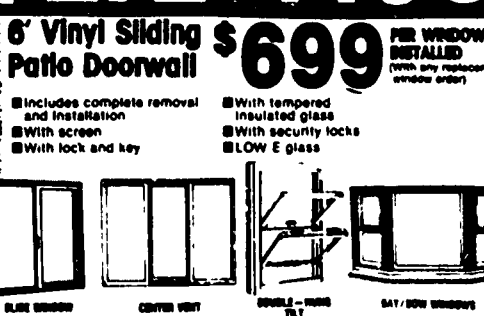
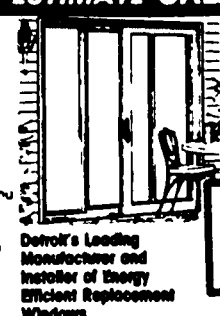
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Buzzard buffs take flight

Binoculars trained on the horizon, anxious bird watchers and curious on-lookers vie to be the first to catch a glimpse of the flock.

Suddenly, these winged harbingers of spring appear, as they have for countless years.

The expectant cry rings out, "They're back!"...the Buzzards of Hinckley, Ohio, that is.

The uncanny clock-like return of a flock of buzzards to Hinckley Ridge each March 15 has been the stuff of legend roundabout northeast Ohio for more than 150 years. More recently, the fame of the Hinckley Buzzards has soared to the extent that the locals compare their arrival to that of the Swallows of Capistrano. (I am not making this up.)

Few other than local historians paid much attention to the return of these birds--also known as turkey vultures--until 1957, when Robert Bordner, a Cleveland Press writer, became intrigued by the carrion claim. Hinckley habitue Walter Nowaleniec told

the reporter that he had personally observed the buzzards arrival each March 15. And furthermore, Nowaleniec said, his late friend Charlie Willard had kept a personal log of the vulture visits that stretched back some 23 years.

The reporter's interest was aroused. On Feb. 15, 1957, he wrote and printed the longtime legend of the Hinckley Buzzards. He further predicted their return in exactly one month--March 15.

Excitement mounted as the month progressed, Naturalists, ornithologists and reporters repeated and embellished the original story--and the suspense grew.

March 15 arrived and so did the buzzards, right on schedule. News traveled fast and the following weekend brought throngs of media and sightseers from Ohio and surrounding states.

Tiny Hinckley was unprepared for the 9000-plus visitors who flocked in to participate in one of the biggest bird walks in history. By mid-morning, every food and drink establishment in and around Hinckley had its supplies depleted. Kids fell in icy park creeks and grown-ups sloshed through ankle-deep mud. There was no place in town to eat, clean up or get warm.

The hospitable community of

Hinckley was dazed by the volume of people and embarrassed "to be caught with its manners down," town merchants recall. Plans to prevent a reoccurrence began almost immediately.

Hinckley Chamber of Commerce members teamed up to make arrangements for a pancake and sausage breakfast on the first Sunday after March 15. This day was forever more declared, "Buzzard Day."

Since that first breakfast, the Chamber has served untold thousands of buzzard buffs at the Hinckley Elementary School on Center Road (State Route 303). Meals are \$3.75 for adults and \$2 for children under 12. Hours are 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.

This year's 33rd annual Buzzard Day celebration on March 17 includes

a live buzzard exhibit and a report from Hinckley's "Official Buzzard Spotter," who will give the exact time the birds were sighted on March 15. The Chamber will sell its coveted t-shirts, decals,

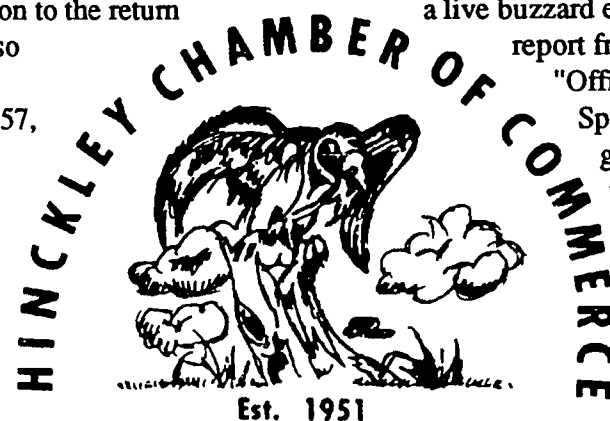
patches and post cards featuring Hinckley's official buzzard logo designed by cartoonist Al Capp of Li'l Abner fame.

So why do the buzzard return to Hinckley? Theories are plentiful.

Some believe that the buzzards were first attracted to the area by the tons of butchered refuse and unwanted game left behind from the "Great Hinckley Varmint Hunt" of 1818. At that unenlightened time, men and boys lined up along Hinckley Township's 25 square mile perimeter and began moving inward, in a drive to rid the area of what were characterized as predatory animals destroying local farm stock.

Others point to an old manuscript account by William Cogwell, one of the first settlers to reach the area in 1810, who makes several references to "vultures of the air." The finding of this manuscript may indicate that the buzzards were making their home in Hinckley before 1810, so the "why Hinckley" question remains up in the air, so to speak.

If you're inclined to take flight to Buzzard Day, know that Hinckley is located in northeast Ohio, on State Route 3, between Cleveland and Akron. Call 216-225-4011 for more information from the official "Buzzard Hotline."

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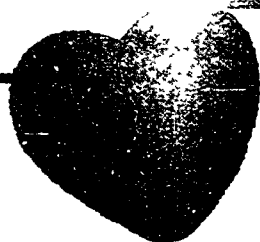
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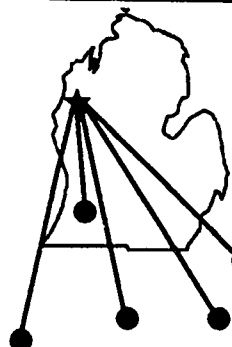
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From buffalo burgers to Inuit art in Traverse City

Traverse City's newest attraction had some grassroots support last autumn when a buffalo barbecue attracted thousands of hungry college boosters to the campus of Northwestern Michigan College.

Part of the proceeds from the annual event were earmarked for the college's new museum center, a multi-faceted facility that will open this summer, said Director Eugene Jenneman.

"We've also been selling seats in the William G. and Helen W. Milliken Auditorium to help fund the project," he added.

The \$6.4 million museum center will fill a void in northwest Michigan, said Jenneman.

"This is the only area of the lower peninsula that isn't being served by a major art-related museum. The closest museums are at Alpena, which is 140 miles away, and at Grand Rapids, which is 137 miles south."

The Museum Center of Northwestern Michigan College will serve more than 180,000 permanent residents of the six county area, including Grand Traverse, Antrim, Benzie, Kalkaska, Leelanau, and Wexford counties, as well as hundreds of thousands of visitors who flock to the area to enjoy seasonal recreation in the waters of Grand Traverse Bay.

Besides offering art to viewers, a Discovery Gallery will invite hands-on investigation and exploration of the visual and performing arts, science and technology.

"We're calling it a children's gallery that adults will enjoy," explained Jenneman. "The Tri-County Medical Society's Auxiliary has already raised more than \$70,000

towards the gallery. It will explore sight, sound and touch and will feature a video wall with textures and sound as it's touched," he added.

Hoping to take the Discovery Gallery beyond what is currently offered at similar attractions in the country, Jenneman says the installation will take "different perspectives" and offer exploratory opportunities with an artist's perception.

Another gallery and permanent interpretive area will feature the museum's signature collection of Inuit art. The collection, which totals 800 works, contains prints and sculpture of the Native peoples in Canada's north.

"This collection is one of the largest in the United States and even rivals many Canadian collections," said Jenneman. "When Dr. Marian Jackson of the University of Michigan came here and saw what we had, she was really impressed."

The Inuit art collection was started in 1960 when Wilbur Mennecke, a Chicago publisher, donated a number of pieces of Inuit art to the college to sell. That began a tradition which has continued: the college annually holds a sale of Inuit art and with the proceeds, adds to its collection.

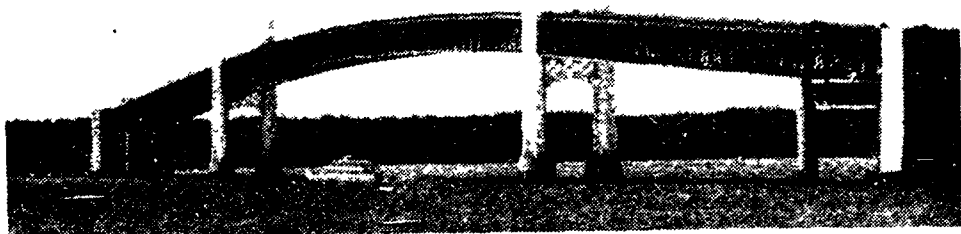
That sale draws buyers and collectors from all over the country.

"I've had telephone calls from all over, buying the pieces sight unseen," says Jenneman. "As soon as the museum center is opened, the annual sale will be changed - the Inuit art will be sold through our new gift shop year round."

While sculpture and carvings have long been part of the Inuit tradition, printmaking is a relatively new medium for the artists. Traditionally a hunting and gathering society, the Inuit needed other means of support, and in 1948 James Houston went to Japan to learn printmaking methods to teach the Inuit as part of a government program to encourage and market the products.

The woodblock technique of the Japanese was translated to stone and

prints were made, as well as by sealskin stencil techniques. Some of the first prints imported into the United States are in the Northwestern Michigan College Collections, said Jenneman.

With their intimate knowledge of animals and the hunt for food, strong images of their prey and Native peoples hunting and fishing are depicted in the arresting works which line the college's library walls. Stone, ivory and even whale vertebra are used in the sculpture, which have an abstract quality all their own. The individual styles of the artists are readily identifiable by those who take the time to observe closely the distinctions in form and rendering.

"When Inuit art is sold in the gift shop, the proceeds will be used to continue to build the collection," Jenneman stated. "We feel it's of both cultural and anthropological importance to keep traditions of the Inuit alive through art."

The new museum center boasts both a large auditorium and a mini-theater, which will be used for intimate shows. "We can accommodate video artists in the mini-theater, which will have audio-visual facilities," Jenneman explained. "Most planetarium or 'sky' shows will be adaptable to that space, because they were planned for a flat-screen environment," he said.

"Visiting artists will be able to tape videos and discussions about their work which will be of educational and cultural importance," he added.

Citing a need to build new audiences, Jenneman is candid about the museum's mission. "We need to get people in the door. After all, here in Traverse City we'll be competing with the bay!"

Jenneman, who came to Traverse City from Erie, Pennsylvania, where he was director of a museum of history, was formerly assistant director at Alpena's Jesse Besser Museum.

He is a Wisconsin native whose formal training at the University of Wisconsin was in the physical sciences. "I'm trained in physics, chemistry and astronomy," he laughs. "I don't have the traditional academic approach to museums."

His different perspective and enlightened approach may well be what the museum center needs to make it more than a college resource,

an art experience for regional residents, and an educational and cultural opportunity for school children. It has the potential to be a significant tourism destination — not just seasonably, but year around.

With visual and performing arts, it promises a great deal.

And the opening date?

"If all goes well, we hope June 15," Jenneman says cautiously. If it does, the 40,000 sq. foot building of creamy stone will inaugurate a series of art exhibitions and summer theater. Dale Chihuly, a major glass artist, will be featured, followed by a retrospective exhibition of Carol Wald, which is now on view at the Butler Museum in Youngstown, Ohio. Wald, a graphically oriented artist, is a nationally known illustrator working with "found" images, as well as her own.

Jenneman expects the museum to be open seven days a week in summer, from 10-5 daily and from 10-9 when there is a performance.

INUIT ART— The museum's "Drummer," stone and antler figure by Davle Atchetak, illustrates the Inuit sculpture and carving tradition.

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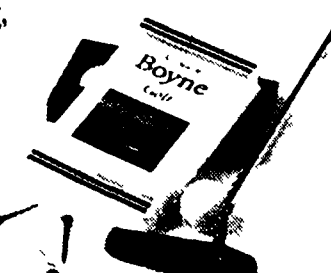
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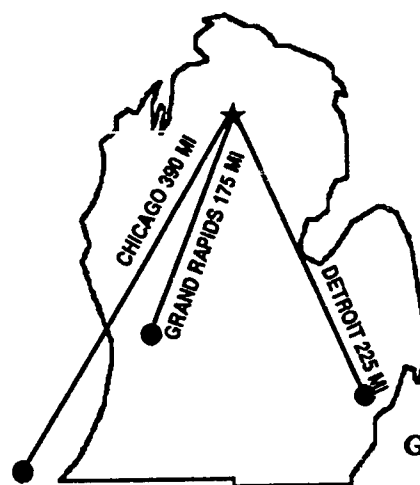
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Moving tribute to state military vets

Frankenmuth, Michigan—
Memories must be fed.

Without nourishment, they wither and fade into a vague, uncelebrated, unappreciated thing we call The Past.

Certain memories are particularly deserving of continued feeding and appreciation. Foremost among them are those of the men and women whom fate thrust into armed struggle on our behalf.

Michigan's Own Military and Space Museum exists to nurture the memories of people from Michigan farms, offices and factories who heeded the summons to military service during America's five foreign wars, from the Spanish-American War to the Vietnam conflict.

Michigan's Own is unique; it is the only repository in the country devoted to the wartime experiences of one state's people.

It is not, however, a museum of war; not an archives dedicated to the strategies or the killing machinery of battle. It is instead, a shrine to ordinary lives caught up in—sometimes ended by—the extraordinary experience of war. It is also an eloquent statement about the passing of time, and the debt later generations owe to those that preceded them and helped preserve our freedom.

The museum, located in Frankenmuth, holds more than 300 exhibits, each devoted to a Michigan-bred soldier, sailor, or airman. Youthful faces peer at a visitor from photographs on the walls and in the display cases. Some are accompanied by pictures of the frail old men the young soldiers became. Some of the faces—of those who fell—are frozen exclusively and forever in young manhood.

A powerful sensation of bygone times, distant places and desperate struggles clings to the fabric of the old uniforms on display. The garments, the sundry accessories of brass and leather the soldiers used, the battle souvenirs and citations they received—all of these leave a visitor pondering the men and women more than the wars.

The artifacts communicate a sense that he is connected to their users, that his present freedom and well-being are in no small way attributable to those men and women. They make him wonder if the soldiers were ultimately able to do what they did because somewhere in their souls they understood they were doing it for him.

The displays at Michigan's Own reflect American military adventures, crusades and tragedies of the last century through the personal histories of people who, in the inexorable press of day-to-day life, might otherwise be forgotten.

Michigan's Own focuses not just on the past or on combat, however. It honors also the peacetime bravery of Michigan astronauts, including Commander Roger Chaffee of Grand

Rapids, who died in the Apollo I launchpad fire of January 1967.

His words could stand as a motto for Michigan's Own.

Michigan's Own Military and Space Museum is located at 1250 S. Weiss St., near Bronner's. Hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday, and noon to 6 p.m. on Sunday. A nominal admission fee is charged.

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Studebaker Museum traces path from blacksmith to auto giant

South Bend, Indiana—

Think of South Bend today and you think of Notre Dame. Think of South Bend 50 years ago and you think of Studebaker.

From the Studebaker brothers' first carriage to the last Avanti sports coupe, the Studebaker National Museum's collection of more than 100 carriages, wagons, cars and trucks tell the story of America's Industrial Age.

The history of the museum is both new and old; new because the

Studebaker National Museum has been an entity for just five years and old because there has been some form of the Studebaker National Museum since the turn of the century.

The Studebaker Corporation operated its own museum for many years. By 1920, its collection included the carriage that Abraham Lincoln rode to Ford's Theatre that fateful night in 1865, the first automobile built in South Bend and a large collection of World War I military vehicles built by Studebaker for the Allies.

The collection continued to grow and at the end of automobile production in South Bend (1963) and in Hamilton, Ontario, (1966) the last cars off the assembly line were put into the museum. Since Studebaker was leaving automobile production and South Bend had been its home from the beginning, the corporation decided to donate its collection to the city in late 1966.

The City of South Bend began displaying the vehicles in temporary locations and in 1977, Discovery Hall Museum was opened in the new Century Center convention complex. In 1983, the city leased a former downtown Studebaker dealership building and put the majority of the collection on display there.

These two locations still serve the museum, which is now non-profit organization separate from the city. The Studebaker National Museum retains the corporate rights, records, artifacts, vehicle and wagon collection of the former Studebaker Corporation.

Exhibits in the Century Center location are set up in a timeline format, tracing the growth of Studebaker and its industrial neighbors in South Bend from 1852 to the present. Here, visitors can view the recreation of the Studebaker brothers' 1852 blacksmith shop containing their first carriage, the fabulous '50s aerodynamic Studebakers designed by Raymond Loewy and a 1964 Lark Daytona, the last South Bend-built Studebaker.

Displayed at the renovated and refurbished former dealership at the corner of Main and South streets are a

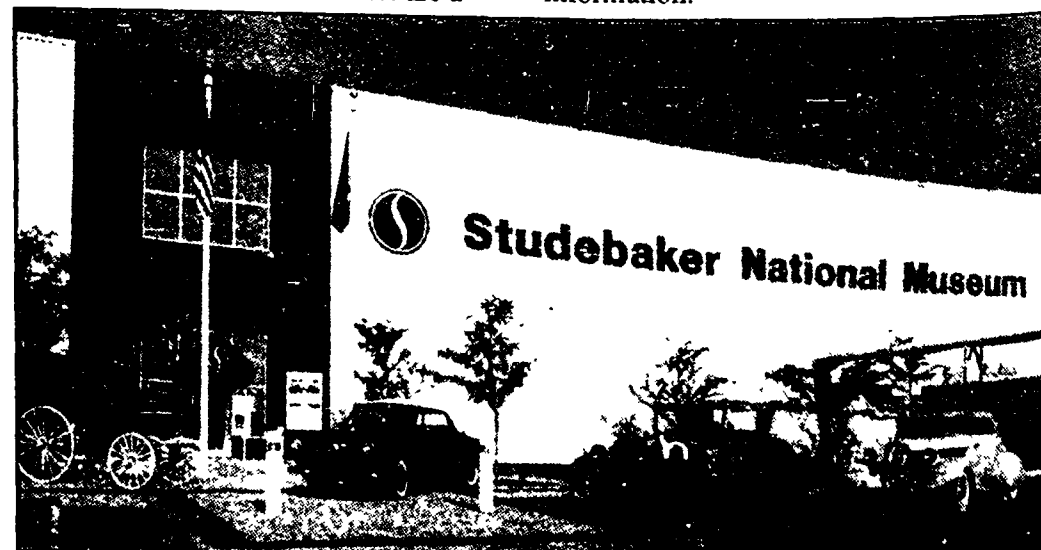
wide range of horsedrawn and horseless vehicles, including four Presidential carriages, a 1932 Rockne "65" honoring the fabled Notre Dame coach, and Commander, Sky Hawk and Golden Hawk models from the '50s.

The museum periodically hosts science and technology exhibits and antique car shows. The sixth annual Studebaker Festival featuring Packards from 1899 to 1958 is set for May 4-5.

Museum hours are 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Saturday; noon to 4:30 p.m. on Sunday.

Admission is \$3.50 for adults, \$2.50 for senior citizens, \$1.50 for children age 12 and under.

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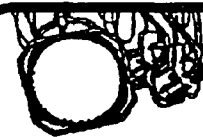

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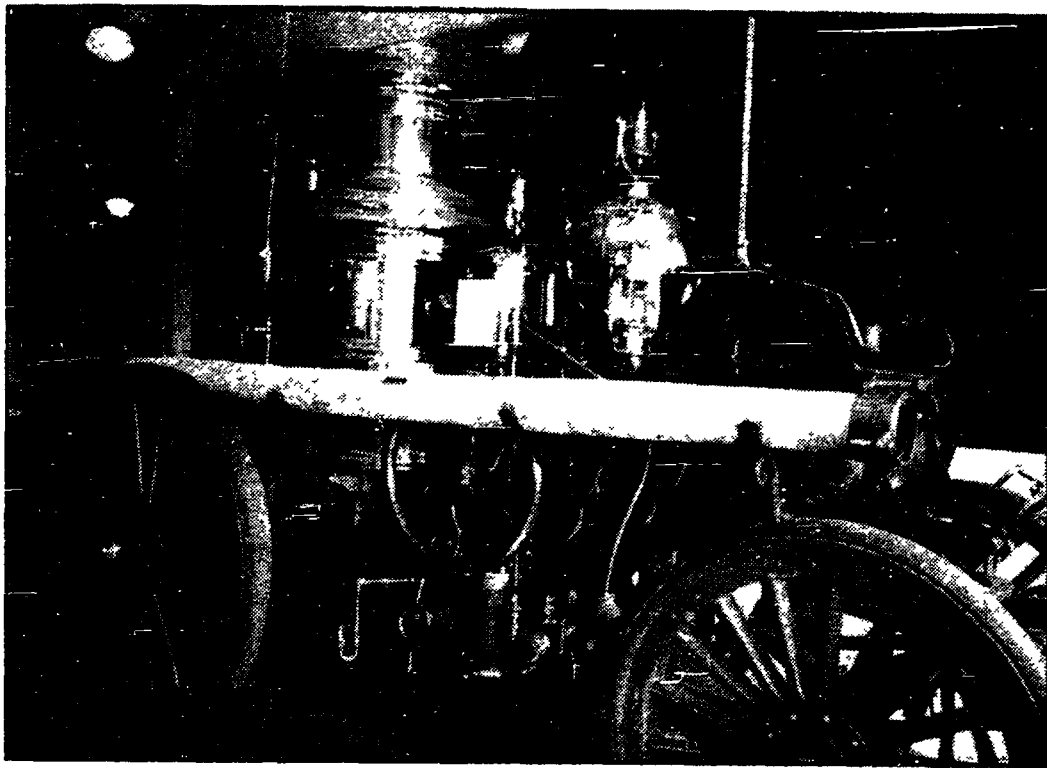

Blaze of glory: Museum houses antique fire engines

Fort Wayne, Indiana—

If you ever wanted to be a firefighter (and who didn't), there's place where your dreams can come true. Kids of all ages can live out those engine house fantasies at Fort Wayne's Firefighters' Museum. About all that's missing is the dalmatians.

Housed in a reconstructed 1893 fire house, the museum is a center for educating the public, and especially children, about fire safety. One of the highlights is the fire safety maze where visitors participate in a realistic setting with simulated life-threatening conditions.

The alarm room with its alarm boxes and watch desk reenacts the dispatch of turn-of-the-century fire fighting equipment. Antique nozzles, spanner wrenches, couplings and fire extinguishers are on display, as well as memorabilia from volunteer fire brigades and drill teams.

The museum's most eye-catching asset is its collection of antique fire fighting apparatus, which includes an 1848 hand engine. This engine required the muscle power of 24 volunteers, who when pumping at a steady beat, produced a one-inch stream of water that could reach the top of a four-story building.

One of the nation's few surviving steam fire engines is on display, a

gleaming 1893 model originally purchased by the City of Detroit. This over-sized steamer could deliver 1100 gallons per minute and saw service in Detroit for nearly 30 years.

The museum's Ahrens-Fox pumper was used in Fort Wayne from 1927 to 1962 and was capable of shooting water over 13-story buildings. Known as the "Rolls-Royce" of fire engines, this model is highly prized by collectors.

Other apparatus in the collection include a 1955 American LaFrance pumper, 1938 International pumper, 1947 American LaFrance 100-foot aerial ladder truck, two Seagrave ladder trucks from the '20s and a Cadillac ambulance, circa 1953.

The Firefighters' Museum is located in downtown Fort Wayne on West Washington Boulevard between Harrison and Webster Streets, about two blocks west of the Convention Center.

Hours are 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. daily. Tours are available by appointment. A small donation is requested for admission. Call 219-426-0051 for more information.

Fort Wayne is located in northeast Indiana along Interstate 69, about 40 miles south of Interstate 80-90 (Indiana Toll Road.)

The Lansing Civic Center is located at 505 W. Allegan St., near the State Capitol, and is easily accessible via Interstate 496.

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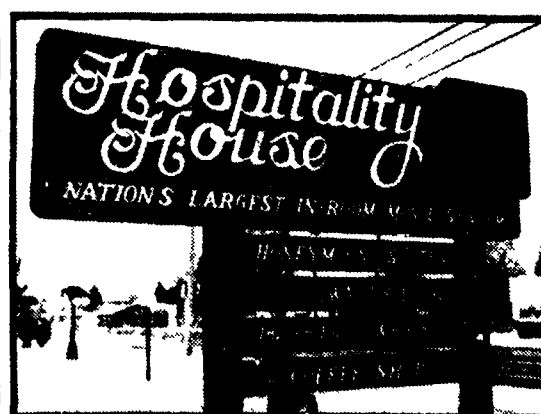
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Old post cards are highly prized as Michigan municipal memorabilia

Ann Arbor resident Wylan A. Stevens, an avid collector of Michigan post cards and memorabilia admits he "got into selling to support my habit."

"I was going to all the shows as a collector," he says, explaining how he

became a dealer as well to help pay his way.

Stevens, the son of the late Albert K. Stevens, a member of the University of Michigan English Department faculty for 41 years says his interest in local history really began 25 years ago while he was a U-M student.

In the early 1960s he recalls buying atlases and books about the University of Michigan for five or ten cents. Post cards, too, were in his growing collections.

"I had more than 100 in the 1960s when I met a man with several thousand. I now have better than 5,000 cards of Washtenaw County and 3,000 of Ann Arbor."

Stevens says that post cards depicted not only municipal buildings and town landmarks but also railroad depots, hospitals prisons and, yes insane asylums.

Around the turn of the century, says Stevens, "post cards were issued almost on demand by the local photographer or druggist who had a dark room in the rear of his store."

Especially in Michigan's small towns, post cards were prized, and residents today look for cards from communities like Dundee, Manchester or Tecumseh. Rare views of towns' main streets are sought. In Northville, Stevens mentions, views of its early fish hatchery are in demand.

Both post card collectors and collectors of Ford memorabilia look for pictures of old Ford plants of the 1920s and '30s.

Prices have risen lately on post cards of railroad depots, Stevens says, relating that a view of an Ypsilanti depot sold six or eight years ago for \$4 and today is selling for \$25 or \$30

Old views of railroad stations and Great Lakes ships are hard to find today because both post card collectors and specialized collectors of railroad memorabilia or Great Lakes

shipping buy them.

"From 1900 to 1915 was the so-called Golden Age of post cards," says Stevens. Photos from that period are the most sought after cards with cards from the 1920s and '30s not so hard to find. Collectors fill out their gaps with such printed cards, according to Stevens. "People also are into a second wave of collecting with these cards," he adds.

The very earliest picture postal cards date to 1898, he says, as it was not until that year that the government permitted picture post cards to be sent with adhesive stamps. Earlier, in 1873 the United States first issued penny postal cards with printed stamps. Stevens says that in 1893 views of the Columbian World Fair in Chicago were printed on the backs of such cards.

In 1907 the post office permitted messages on the same side of the card as the address, leaving the reverse to be covered completely with a picture. This was the post card mailed throughout the country for one cent.

By 1910, however, domestic producers were worried about competition from German imports of better quality than their own. They were successful in getting tariffs imposed. World War I then ended the problem, and the Golden Age.

Stevens sets up his booth in shows as far west as Chicago and as far east as Cleveland. At such out-of-town shows, he says, he has the best chances of buying Michigan cards from other dealers.

This year he will be setting up his folding card table at the Adrian Antiques Markets at the Lenawee County Fairgrounds, held the fourth Sunday of the month, May through October, and at the Caravan Antiques Markets at the Centreville fairgrounds, which will be held on the following Sundays this year - May 5, June 9, July 14, Aug. 11 and Oct. 13.

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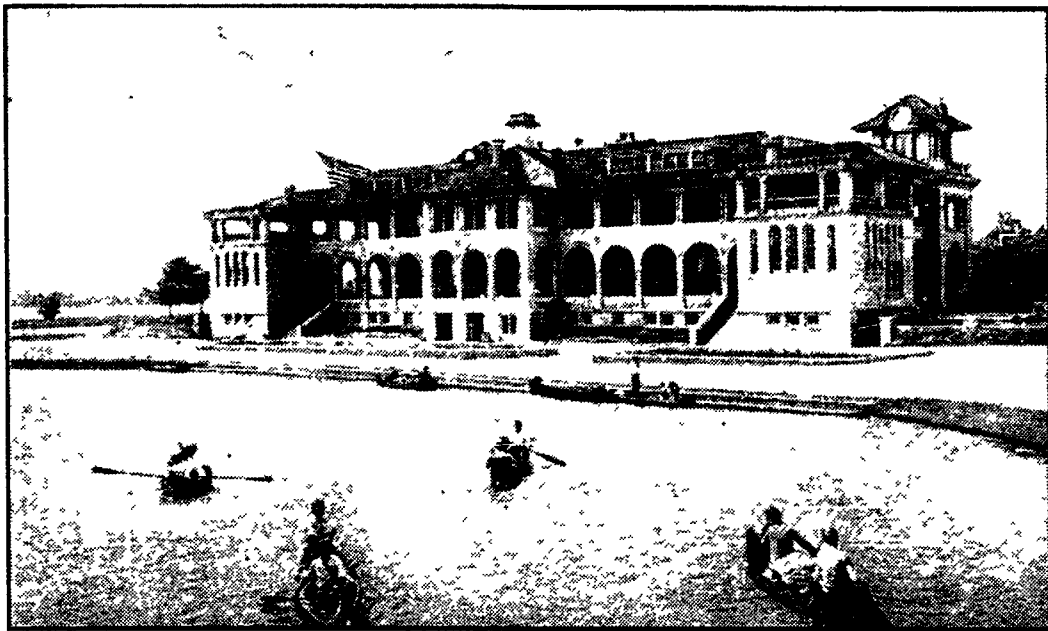

Beginning collectors might like to browse through what he terms his "junk box" of 25 or 50-cent items. Look for him - unless it's raining. He doesn't take his collections out then.

Last December, he reports a successful sale of his Michigan memorabilia at the Ann Arbor Winter Antiques Market promoted by Nick Easton in the University of Michigan Sports Coliseum.

Stevens says other post card dealers have told him that it is almost impossible to be successful by selling only post cards. Therefore, he is branching out and including books and other local history materials.

One of his most unusual offerings is a handsomely framed colorful map of Ann Arbor.

The maps originally were sold in 1925 and 1926 to help finance the building of the Michigan League on the University of Michigan campus as the women students felt they should have a facility similar to the Michigan Union of the men students. The maps included the old University of Michigan seal used from 1817 until 1837, Stevens points out.

The maps were reproduced in 1975-76. Stevens notes that he has both an original and a reproduction. It is the reproduction that has been framed and is for sale.

A true collector, Stevens confides that he "can only part with duplicates" and would like to see the creation of a museum for Ann Arbor memorabilia. Stevens doesn't mind being contacted

by collectors or sellers at his Ann Arbor home. He may be reached at 313-662-5438.

As post card dealers know, almost everyone has cards from the past, sometimes treasured by parents as scenes of their childhood.

After interviewing Wystan Stevens, I recalled a leather-bound volume of Detroit scenes that had belonged to my stepfather. It was exciting to pull out the views of Detroit in 1912 that visually portray another era. And, sure enough, the cards required one cent postage.

A new antiques show, the Birmingham Antiques Festival, makes its debut April 11, 12 and 13 at the Birmingham Community House 380 S. Bates, as a benefit for the community house, a not-for-profit facility.

It sounds like a nice size show with 45 dealers coming from eight other states - Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Iowa, Indiana, Illinois and Ohio. Several well-known Michigan dealers will be participating, including Danbury Antiques from Suttons Bay, Leonard Berry of Birmingham, Marcia Petrillo of Troy and the Wolfs of Flint.

Offerings will include samplers, quilts, linens, pewter, 18th and early 19th century furniture as well as children's collectables and English "smalls." (I love this term, which is an accepted way of describing just that, small British accessories.)

Preview night from 6-10 p.m.

Thursday, April 11, will be \$30 a person; Friday, April 12, hours will be 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. and Saturday April 13, hours will be 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. with admission on these days \$5. Managing the show is the Jennings and McMillan Network. The Bates Street Cafe in the Community Building will be open during the show.

Dinosaurs revisit Flint after 65 million years

Flint, Michigan—

They're back, big as life! The popular Dinamation Dinosaurs! have returned to Flint's Sloan Museum for an eight-week exhibit ending April 7. For the first time in three years, the animated display of prehistoric creatures will consist entirely of dinosaurs -- those strange "terrible lizards" that disappeared from the earth over 65 million years ago.

Dinosaurs! features eight half-scale replicas that swing their heads and tails as they roar at visitors. The creatures are operated by a computer controlled pneumatic system and were created by Dinamation International, a company based near Los Angeles, California.

The dinosaurs featured at the museum include:

Apatosaurus and

Baby--Formerly known as Brontosaurus, this creature's name means "deceptive lizard" because it was often confused with other Sauropods. This four-legged plant eater featured a horse-like head, elephant-like feet and a brain about the size of an adult human fist. It weighed approximately 30 tons and was 15 feet tall and 75 feet long. Its remains have been found in Western North America and Europe.

Ankylosaurus--This "stiffened lizard" is best known for the boney armor and extensive club at the tip of its tail. This club was often as large as its head. The muscles of the thigh/pelvis/tail complex were massive and allowed the club to be swung with enough force to topple or disable possible predators. This plant eater weighed 4 tons and was 4 feet tall and 25 feet long. Its remains have been found in Western North America.

Allosaurus--One of the largest of the carnososaurs, Allosaurus was the most formidable predator of the Jurassic Period. This animal was more lightly built than Tyrannosaurus. Its forelimbs were larger and probably of

far greater use in helping to subdue prey than the largely useless 2-fingered forelimbs of Tyrannosaurus. Both hind and forelimbs were strongly clawed. Allosaurus means "different lizard." It lived in the Western United States, East Africa and West Europe. It weighed 4 tons and was 16 feet tall and 35 feet long.

Tyrannosaurus--This "tyrant lizard" was a massive animal, weighing 7 tons -- about the same as a large African elephant. It was the largest and last of the giant meat eaters. Unlike Allosaurus, Tyrannosaurus had small forelimbs, useless for subduing struggling prey, so its jaws had to do all the work. Although not very quick, given the great length of its stride it is likely that Tyrannosaurus could achieve a top running speed of slightly over 25 miles per hour. The excessive fortification of the skull indicates that its main strategy was to collide head-on with its outmatched prey.

Visitors will be able to see how they stack up to a full-scale Tyrannosaurus leg and head. The leg measures 10 feet 8 inches tall, while the head is nearly 8 feet high. Educational materials accompanying these displays explain how this predator's legs, body and head worked together to locate, chase, capture and consume its prey.

A cut-away model of a Dimetrodon lets visitors see beneath the resin skin of this animated beast to examine the metal skeleton and computer controlled pneumatic system that causes the robot to move. Two joy sticks allow visitors to operate the Dimetrodon themselves.

Dinosaurs! can be seen at the Sloan Museum seven days a week through April 7. Hours are Monday through Friday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday and Sunday 12 to 5 p.m. The Sloan Museum is located in Flint's Cultural Center at 1221 E. Kearsley Street. For more information, call 313-760-1169.

Islamic 'beautiful writing' a brocade of the pen

East Lansing, Michigan—

The Kresge Art Museum will present an exhibition of Islamic writing entitled *Brocade of the Pen: The Art of Islamic Writing*. Curated by Carol Fisher, museum education coordinator, the exhibition runs until April 21.

As the most important design element in Islamic art, writing holds a special place in the Islamic aesthetic. In this exhibition, 85 objects will demonstrate the use of "beautiful writing" on two and three dimensional objects, and selected photographs will illustrate its use on important Islamic architectural monuments.

These items and photographs are drawn from private collections in New York City, Washington, D.C., Cambridge, Massachusetts, Detroit and East Lansing, as well as the collections of the Detroit Institute of Arts; the University of Michigan, Rare Book Room; the University of Michigan Museum of Art; the Aga Khan Photographic Archives of Islamic Art, Harvard and MIT; and the Wexner Center, Ohio State University; as well as the Kresge Art Museum.

Rather than a comprehensive overview of the art of writing, the goal of this exhibition is two pronged in that it presents the concept of Islamic writing as an introduction for the general public and at the same time uses the objects to raise questions of a more specialized nature pertaining to the study of writing within the body of Islamic art for those interested in probing more deeply.

The exhibition will focus on

questions concerned with: the manufacture of beautiful writing; the aesthetics of beautiful writing; symbolism in the art of beautiful writing; examples of the function of beautiful writing and examples of the use of beautiful writing on three dimensional objects such as metalwork.

A catalogue subsidized in part by the Institute of Turkish Studies, Washington, D.C. and The Center for Integrative Studies in the Arts and Humanities, Michigan State University, edited by Carol Fisher and containing essays by Ulku Bates, Holly Edwards, Heath Lowry, Nancy Micklewright, Raymond Silverman and Mohamed Zakariya will be for sale.

Docent-led tours of the exhibition will be offered to the general public upon request and a teacher's resource packet designed to supplement history, social studies, humanities, geography and art classes is for sale at the museum for \$2. Videos *Islamic Art* and *Suleyman the Magnificent* are available for viewing upon request throughout the exhibition.

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Tales of Hoffman: The Compleat Angler

Indian River, Michigan—

Sweating and annoyed by the mosquito that buzzed near my ear, I was reaching to swat it when a brown lashed the bait in a boil of water. Excited, adrenaline pumping, I set the hook and unwittingly stepped back for the battle.

The powerful river swept me off my feet and I splashed backwards into icy water, unable to control my body in the torrent that swept me, bump, bump, bump along the pebbles and sand toward Devil's Bend and the deep, dark, foamy water that slams into the tangle of debris.

Fortunately, in stepping into the froth of the Sturgeon I'd tightly cinched a belt around the waist of my waders. It prevented the waders from filling and sending me to the bottom. Instead, the trapped air inside the waders kept me afloat as I crashed into the logjam, struggling to keep upright and holding onto the fish that thrashed about at the end of the line.

Later, on shore, having somehow struggled out of the vicious current, I lamented the loss of the fish I'd barely seen. But I was alive, my new fly-rod was intact, and amazingly the fire in my corn cob pipe was still ablaze. The escaped trout, I knew, would be back another day.

I've learned a good deal since then about fishing the Sturgeon. It, like its sister stream the Little Sturgeon, is unforgiving for those who flaunt safety. But it's perhaps Michigan's finest trout stream.

Living on the west bank of the Little Sturgeon and owning 10 acres adjacent to Devil's Bend on the Sturgeon, I enjoy this fishing paradise as frequently as newspapering will permit. Browns and rainbows in the Sturgeon, brookies in the Little Sturgeon. And if I tire of these waters, which happens infrequently, I can ply the waters of the Indian, Pigeon, or Maple rivers, all just 15 minutes away. Each of these magnificent streams has its own attractiveness, but all are excellent fisheries.

If you enjoy fishing or if you would like to take up this infectious sport I can, without fear of contradiction, say that both expert and novice will find joy here. Even if you return with an empty creel, you will have enjoyed nature at her finest.

But before heading out for our neck of the woods in the Tip of the Mitt, be absolutely sure you've packed plenty of safety reminders. Without precaution, don't for a minute think you can step into the Sturgeon and not be swept into Devil's Bend; walk the

bank of the Little Sturgeon and not sink out of sight into the 100-year-old silt of Michigan's lumbering era; or hike into the wild, uninhabited regions of the Pigeon and not become lost. Care is absolutely essential in fishing our trout streams. Oh, boy, is it!

Although I'm no expert, by any standard, I've learned enough about trout fishing here to suggest the following:

- Fly fishing is the pits.
- Spinning outfits work best.
- Don't pay attention to moon phases.
- Honor the lowly worm.
- Shadows scare trout.
- Carry a compass.
- Tomorrow's fishing will be better.

About fly fishing: Unless you are particularly agile and don't mind climbing into treetops for a favorite lure, none of our rivers--save perhaps the Indian--is sufficiently open to permit unencumbered, full, smooth, round-house casts. That isn't to say fly fishing is impossible, but it requires shorter, on-the-mark casts that few but the expert angler can manage with regularity. It is a rare day, no matter how carefully I work the line, that I don't lose an artificial lure or a tippet or two. Yet, I persist, taking as much satisfaction in infrequently dropping an untangled bait into a deep pool as actually experiencing a strike.

Spinning outfits: I've had much more success with a light-weight, open-face spinning reel. With cedars and aspen hugging the edges of our rivers, it's far easier to lay down a short line and let the bait drift back towards me over a chosen hole. Even with spinning outfits, short, often side-arm casts are a necessity to avoid the hungry limbs of trees and brush.

Also, I've not forgotten something Mike Preville taught me years ago while fishing a stream in the Porkies. "Dunk for 'em," he said. Laughable as it seems, "dunk 'em" works. Brookies love it. A downstate advertising genius who grew up in the U.P., Mike dangles a line from his spinning outfit while slowly edging along with the current in hip-deep water, bobbing his line off the bottom. His crude brand of fishing belies every rule in the game, but I can say from experience that it produces more fish fries than many a sophisticated experiences.

Mike summed it up in our Porkies days when he asked, "Do you want to catch-and-eat or fish?"

Moon phases: Frank Kochalko, a retired South Lyon band director, who twirls a fishing rod as well as he did a baton, won't venture forth unless the moon table tells him its worthy of his time. And, as much as I scoff, I must admit that wildlife--in and above the water--seems to become more active when the moon phases are right. We have been on the water, with nary a

creature stirring, when the moment arrives and, right on cue, all manner of wildlife suddenly appears and the rods bend. Yet, alas, his tables have never worked on our rivers. Except for late evening, when the mosquitoes swarm, there appears to be no especially better time to get bites. I've taken fish...and struck out...in all hours and in all kinds of weather conditions. Patience, however, is essential whenever one fishes here or elsewhere.

The lowly worm: Many successful anglers on our rivers use fish eggs carefully wrapped in patches of discarded nylon stockings. Joe Drielt, who probably fishes the Sturgeon more and with greater success than anyone, swears by spawn. Retired with a home overlooking the river, he takes giant steelhead in winter and summer. I've not had much luck with spawn. Give me a fat worm anytime. Hook him several times, allowing its tail to trail. Pitch this gob into the water, letting it bump along the bottom with the current to fall into the pool where you suspect a trout may be hiding. This method seems to work better for me in the Sturgeon than does over-casting the pool and dragging the worm back across the trout's quarters. In the Pigeon, however, where the current isn't as swift, I've found the over-cast effective. Whichever of our rivers you're fishing, be sure to take along a good supply of worms. You'll feed a lot of smaller fish before taking that big one.

Shadows scare: Until fishing the Sturgeon, I had no idea how easily fish can be frightened by the angler's shadow. Working upstream from the fish, the sand and silt loosened by your careful steps doesn't seem to bother the fish. But if you're shadow stretches out across the water you're working, don't expect to catch fish. Same thing holds true when fishing from the bank. I've got a few favorite holes I can easily reach from our property. I'm so certain shadows scare fish, I'll crawl to the bank if the sun's at my back. Or better yet, I'll approach the hole from another direction just to be sure my shadow falls elsewhere.

Some of my friends suggest it isn't the shadow that frightens the fish when angling from the bank but rather the tremble in the earth caused by the fisherman's steps. I'm not so sure. Nevertheless, you can be sure I walk or crawl quietly. Trout fishermen need every advantage they can find. I even heed the "wind's in the west, fishin's the best" adage. So yes, approach the water with care.

This quiet approach produced some startling results last year. Crawling 20 feet in wet weeds to the bank of the river one early morning, I raised my head a bit just as I reached the edge and found myself eyeball to eyeball with a great blue heron who had arrived earlier at my hole. Frightened as much as me, he rose in a clatter of flapping wings, carrying away a bellyful of my fish.

Carry a compass. I've fished in the Pigeon River Country Forest

where one would think the stream would be a good trail identification. Don't believe it. Cross the stream a dozen or more times on a sunless day, dodge logjams, wander a way into the forest to inspect deer rubbings or elk digs, sit a spell and gulp a sandwich or two, walk a couple miles in the water while catching fish, and you can easily become confused in this vast forested land. Oh, sure, you'll know which way the stream is flowing, but can you be sure which is the east or west side of the Pigeon? Guessing is a troublemaker, I've learned. That's why I carry a compass pinned to my jacket. It's nice to know after a day of fishing you won't have to spend the night with the elk and bobcats.

Tomorrow's better. One of the really nice things about living in this fisherman's paradise is that I can be sure that tomorrow's fishing will be better--no matter how successful it was today. For those of you who must pack up and head back to the ribbons of concrete and the world of smoking tailpipes, today's adventure is all or nothing. Not for me. Tomorrow, work day or not, there's always a few minutes to ply the jewels of our forest...and maybe catch your fish that got away. Eat your heart out!

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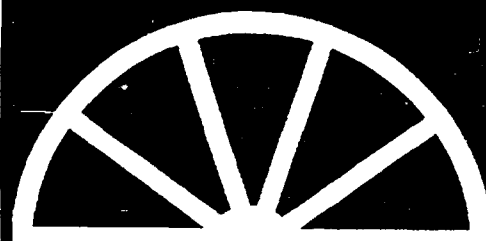

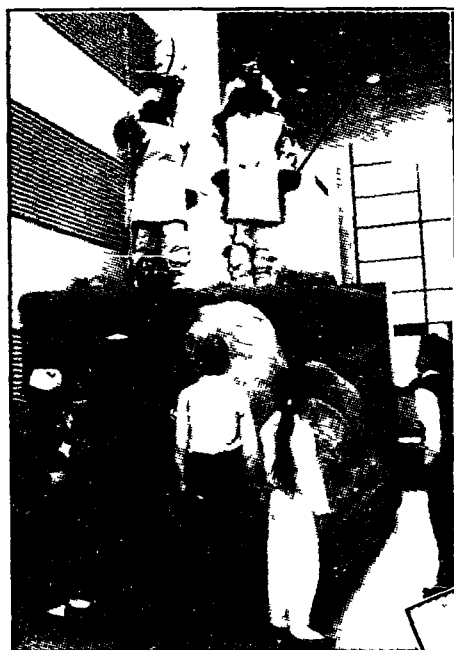

To help you develop your golf strategy Timber Ridge has a yardage book which not only indicates the boulders along the course as 150 yard markers but also offers tips on the best way to play each hole. Although very challenging, there is not a hole on the course the "average" golfer can not par.

As a boater cruising the sparkling blue waters of the Great Lakes, you see little to remind you of the mysteries, the dramas and the ghosts that rest in placid gloom beneath your boat. But knowing some of the history can double the fascination for both boaters and scuba divers.

More than 5,000 shipwrecks have been authenticated in these lakes. Most are believed to have happened during October and November storms and before the advent of modern navigational equipment. They are underwater time capsules of the days preceding rail and auto travel, when the lakes were Michigan's great highway.

In recent years Michigan has set aside (so far) seven bottomland preserves to safeguard these ghostly moments in time (see information about the areas and tourist accommodations at the close of this story). As of now, less than half the wrecks have been located and explored. Although well-preserved in the cold fresh water, many have been stripped of marine gear and other historical artifacts. Some wooden hulls have been removed to make furniture.

To prevent such atrocities, Michigan passed Public Act 184 of 1980, providing for bottomland preserves and preventing the stripping of shipwrecks.

Says Tom Graf, water quality specialist with the Department of Natural Resources, "The law forbids the removal of artifacts without a permit. The divers' ethic is changing dramatically -- from finder's keepers to leave it alone and observe it in place. If all the items are right out on the deck---shoes, plates in the galley and pots and pans---they add to the diving experience."

Each wreck has its own story, although many are lost to history. On a lovely evening in August of 1865, the passenger steamer *Pewabic* was down-bound in Lake Huron, headed for Cleveland. Passengers were relaxing in stained glass salons furnished with marble-topped rosewood tables.

The passengers aboard her sister ship, the *Meteor*, were dancing to the ship's band as she approached the *Pewabic* from the south, not many hours out of Detroit.

"It was just beginning to get dark when I saw the lights of the *Meteor* approaching us," reads the account of *Pewabic* Captain George Perry McKay. "I gave orders to stop the starboard engine and hold the steering wheel hard. We shifted wheels three times to clear the *Meteor*. Then came the crash. The *Meteor* didn't sink. The *Pewabic* did."

Children and grownups struggled to hold onto wreckage until the survivors were rescued at dawn. Altogether, 125 were killed. It was the Great Lakes' seventh worst disaster.

Today the *Pewabic* rests on the lake bottom, six and a half miles east of the Alpena County shoreline. She lies, intact and upright, 165 feet underwater in the 288 square-mile Thunder Bay Great Lakes State Bottomland Preserve between South Point and Middle Island.

The area, noted for its unpredictable and intemperate nature, is known as "shipwreck alley." More than 100 major wrecks lie in this treacherous shoal-haunted stretch of water. Every local boater is aware of the snaggle-toothed rock-reefs surrounding Middle Island at the north. A sheer rock wall under the waters along Thunder Bay Island has left ships' wreckage scattered along its base.

It was in the Straits of Mackinac that the brigantine *Sandusky* met her fate. She was built in 1848 in Sandusky, Ohio. She is 110 feet long, has two masts and a scroll figurehead. She left Chicago on Sept. 16, 1866 and took seven men with her when she went down two days later in a violent gale west of what is now the Big Mac Bridge.

After her discovery by a sport diver in recent years, the *Sandusky* suffered the illegal stripping of her dishes, tools, belaying pins and other artifacts. Still, divers today can explore her well-preserved interior and observe her broken masts.

She is part of the Straits of Mackinac Underwater Preserve. It covers 148 square miles of the waters connecting Lakes Michigan and Huron at the top of Michigan's mitten. It extends to the western shores of Mackinac and Bois Blanc Islands. The area is believed to contain more wrecks per square mile than any other in the lakes. Its shoals and reefs forced navigators to steer a tight course amid merging currents and wind forces.

Two shipwrecks with dramatic stories rest in the Thumb Area Bottomland Preserve, a 276-square-mile graveyard stretching northward from the shores near Harbor Beach to Pointe aux Barques.

The first is the *R. G. Coburn*, a passenger propeller that foundered six miles off Harbor Beach in 1871. A heavy October gale tore off her rudder in the trough of the sea.

In true seafaring tradition, her captain stood with his hand on the rail and went down with his ship. He was among 15 crew members and 16 passengers who lost their lives. She

sits intact now in 22 fathoms of Lake Huron.

A violent November storm in 1966 conquered the *Daniel J. Morrell*, an aging 603-foot lake freighter on her last voyage of the season. She was blown sideways in the waves, broke in two and foundered off the Thumb.

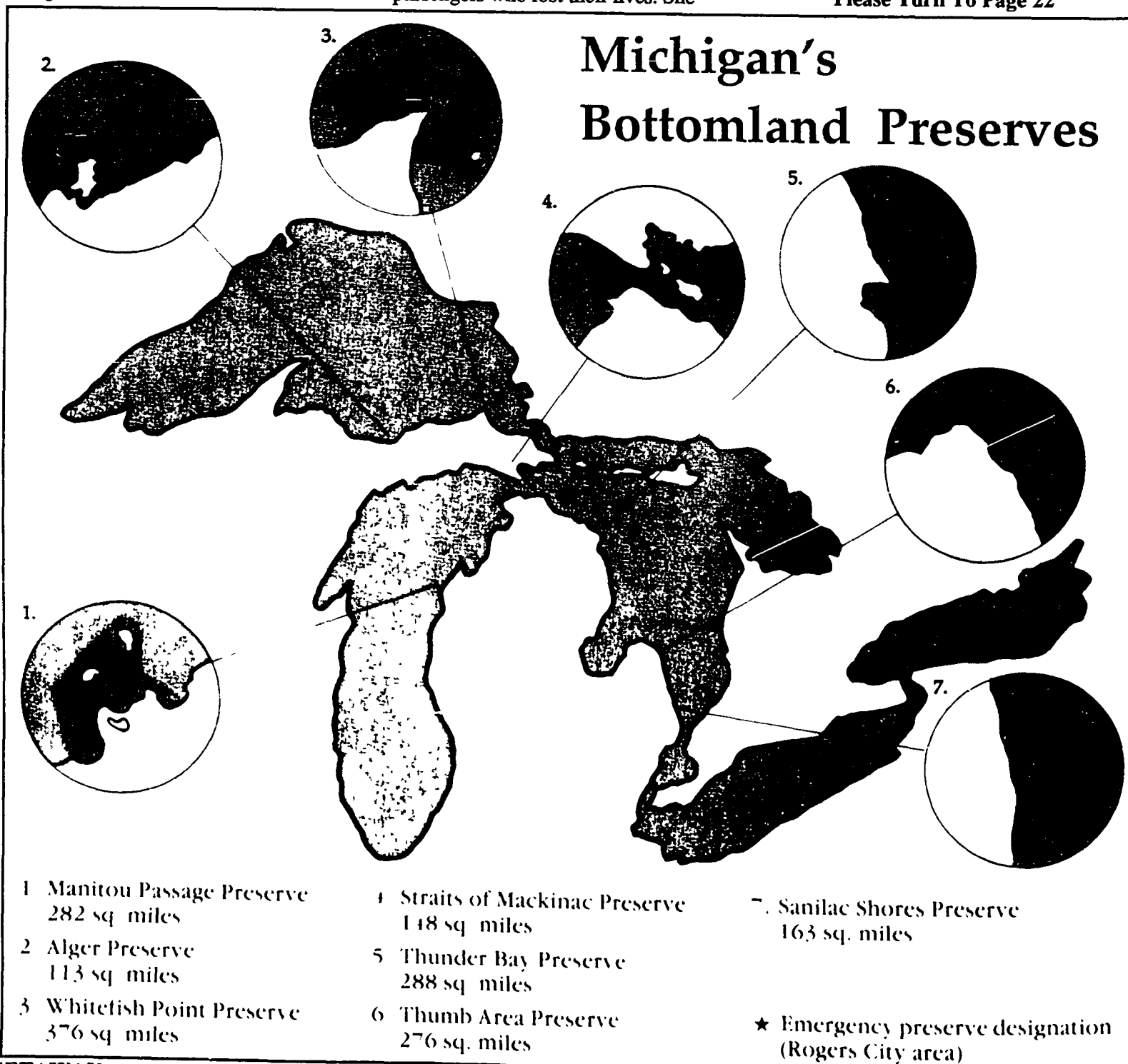
The only survivor was a young wheelhouse hand named Dennis Hale. He recalled clinging to the ship's front half while the rear, its engines churning uncontrolled, repeatedly rammed the front half, throwing crewmen into frigid water. Hale clung to an icy raft for 36 hours while, one by one, his companions dropped off and died. The ship now rests in peace, just beyond the perimeter of the Thumb Area Preserve.

A buoy marks the location of the mystery schooner *Dreadnaught* at the Alger Underwater Preserve. It's on the South Shore of Lake Superior near Munising in the Upper Peninsula. This 113-square-mile preserve surrounds Grand Island and borders on Pictured Rocks Natural Lakeshore.

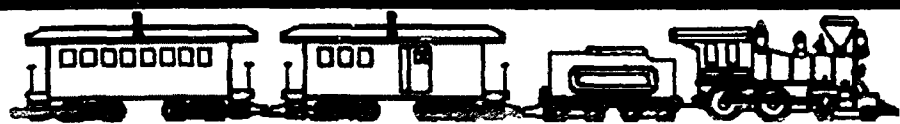
The *Dreadnaught* is a 150-foot, 500-ton ore carrier that went down in (they think) the 1880's. She sank in 30 feet of water in Murray Bay, carrying a cargo of iron ore.

One theory of her demise is that

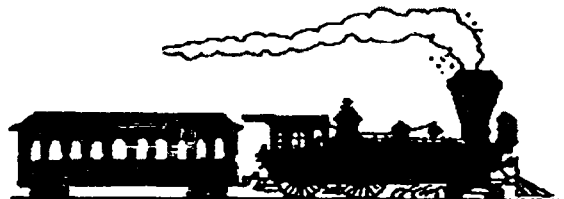

Late-season ski sprees

With spring comes the itch to hit the beach. Many Michigan ski resorts offer you a way to scratch that itch and enjoy great spring skiing at the same time with "snowbeach" parties, bikini races and spring carnivals.

A beach party atmosphere will be created March 23-24 at Indianhead Mountain/Bear Creek near Wakefield with outdoors BBQs, snow bars, "snowbeach" volleyball and beach music on the hills at this Upper Peninsula resort.

The Easter Bunny may have to wear snowshoes but diehard downhillers can still enjoy some excellent skiing at Michigan's Boyne Mountain and Boyne Highlands Resorts.

Boyne's current five-foot base is expected to last through Easter weekend and beyond, thanks to frequent late-season snowfalls and Boyne's extensive snowmaking capabilities.

she sought shelter near Munising during the gale that sank her. Another is that the captain beached her and she slipped into the water in his absence, drowning the crew as they slept in their bunks.

She may not even be the *Dreadnaught*, but rather the *Morehead* or maybe the *Wabash*. In any case she attracts divers like flies.

The most famous shipwreck lies beneath the Whitefish Point Underwater Preserve, marking one of the most notorious stretches of Lake Superior's navigable waters. The wreck is the *Edmund Fitzgerald*, from



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the song of the same name.

Four more bottomland preserves are in the works. One, the Manitou Passage Bottomland Preserve, incorporates Lake Michigan shoreline from Point Betsie to Goodharbor Bay. It includes the north and south Manitou Islands.

"The area is probably the most hazardous in all of Lake Michigan," says Tom Graf. "Ships used the Manitou Passage between the islands and the mainland as a shortcut. The prevailing winds bring storms across there. Many boats foundered on the shoals and sandbars, and sank."

The bones of one victim jut out of the water and can be seen rusting away on South Manitou Island. She's the *Francisco Morazan*, a Liberian freighter that was disemboweled just off shore in 1960.

Another Bottomland Preserve, named the Sanilac Shores, sets aside 163 square miles of Lake Huron, running north and south of Port Sanilac.

Proposed but not yet approved is Marquette County State Bottomland Preserve. Its 74 square miles take in an area of Lake Superior around Marquette and Presque Isle.

Also proposed is the Keewenaw Bottomland Preserve. Its 243 square miles stretch from Freda around the western shore of the Keewenaw Peninsula to Point Iabelle.

Wherever there's a bottomland preserve, local chambers of commerce welcome boaters, divers and underwater photographers. If you write or call the sources below, they will send you information about local marinas, charter boats running to dive sites and their communities' diver emergency action plans, so that you can visit the ghosts in person.

Already, the preserves are becoming national recreation attractions for scuba diver and non-divers, too.

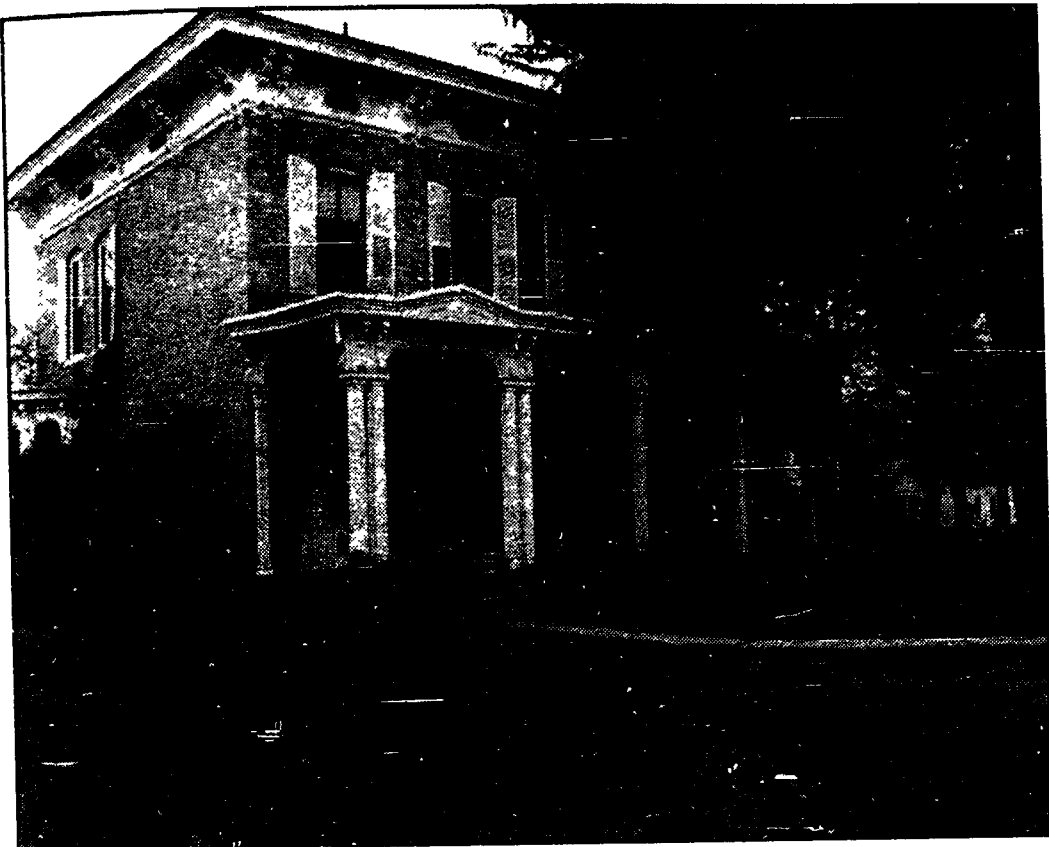

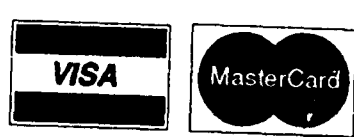
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St. Joseph County is proud of its natural beauty. The picturesque countryside is abundant with rivers, lakes, rolling lands and wooded acres. The 55 lakes and six rivers, plus numerous smaller streams, offer a generous share of Michigan's famed fishing, swimming and boating for summer adventures.

In the winter, there is an abundance of ice fishing, small game hunting, cross-country skiing and tobogganing.

St. Joseph County is a very old and historically rich area. Its recorded history began in 1680 when the

French explorer LaSalle's party traversed Michigan and visited the Marantette site in Mendon.

The St. Joseph Valley was the home of the Pottawatomie, Ottawa and Chippewa tribes known as the Nottawa-seepe. They lived in a reservation now known as Mendon. In 1833, a treaty was signed with the Nottawa-seepe ceding the reservation to the United States.

In 1825, a surveying party arrived in Detroit extolling the beauties of the St. Joseph Valley's prairies and noble river. The pioneers heeded the call and began to move west. By 1831, the following towns were established:

White Pigeon, Sturgis, Constantine, Three Rivers, Nottawa, Leonidas, Mendon, Burr Oak, Flowerfield, Sherman, Fabius and Colon.

Today, many of the county's historic structures are still present, silent sentinels from the past bearing witness to an exciting and adventuresome time. For those who love history, there is plenty to view in the county, including the Sue Silliman House in Three Rivers, U.S. Government Land Office in White Pigeon, Langley Covered Bridge near Centreville, Wakeman House in Mendon and Christmere House in Sturgis.

The Wakeman House and Christmere House are among the charming bed and breakfasts that help the county retain its flavor of the "old days."

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Zelda Rubinstein reprises her psychic role in *Poltergeist III*, debuting Monday on Fox.



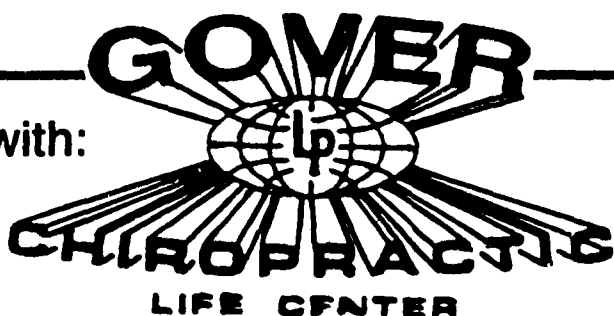

One of the most interesting committee meetings I have ever attended took place in the early 80's where Education, Religion, Government and Public factions gathered together with the Cable Industry. Their purpose was to determine how to proceed toward establishing cable use for each person represented.

The two elements most important to assume was that all could work together recognizing each group's specific mission and then establishing a common goal. Educational Districts historically have been receptive to teaching and administering through telecommunications options. Now as never before, efficient communication techniques are imperative, as funding becomes more difficult to come by. Tax dollars are being scrutinized as never before, and grant money is becoming more competitive and not as readily available.

Farmington and Novi School Districts have been participating on such cable committees for ten years.

Farmington has taken the lead under the direction of Media Specialist Peggy Schmidt and Telecommunication Coordinator Dean Cobb. Currently,

they have a full blown media center, including computerized and video applications. Although books are still on the shelves, the center features electronic encyclopedias, CD—Rom data bases, interactive video discs. Anyone can use and retrieve information in all areas of media and students and teachers learn how to regularly use alternatives. The fundamental concept of learning to be versatile is crucial to us all.

The Home of 'TV 10' is a television studio in North Farmington High School. They keep an active programming schedule with shows being produced by students as well as coverage of school events. The programs may be seen on Channel 10 via cable.

The studio has a two camera format and there is one TV intern class of Junior and Senior students. To be eligible for the class each student must first complete the course entitled "Mass Media." As you can imagine with only 18 students in the class there is a waiting list to get in. The students are drawn from North Farmington High, Harrison High and Farmington High Schools. The students interns do all the programming as part of the class.

To receive financial support for such a facility the district approached the tri-city cable commission several years ago. All committee meetings included the cable company in planning, and the district made a five year commitment which included teachers, curriculum, facilities and some equipment. The Commission and Committees recognized the serious long term impact of the program and jointly instituted a multi-phase plan with MetroVision to activate the signal distribution as well as provide studio equipment.

The second phase included the "Teacher On TV" project. It is referred to as a 'distance learn-

ing project' whereby one teacher provides several off site classes with one curriculum. Latin I is taught from Farmington High and goes to North Farmington High. German I is taught from Harrison High and goes to North Farmington and Farmington High Schools. The classrooms are equipped with television monitors, cameras and microphones so that the teacher may view and hear all the students. The students may also see and hear her. A special bond and interest is created among the classmates and the teaching is both visual and creative.

Novi School District was in the same committee structure over the past decade. They host a television studio also, in Novi High School. Assistant Superintendent Rita Trainor has always participated, showing a receptivity to telecommunication growth within the district. The television and radio teaches is David Legg. Jim Fry is also knowledgeable on the subject and is currently serving a Chairman of the Educational Access Advisory Committee.

In both school districts elaborate plans have been made, to assure the Communities and Cable Company that the improvements necessary to the cable distribution system will have long term use and therefore warrant any financial expenditure. In this way the Community Committee Structure participates in cooperative spirit into our future.

Plymouth School District, according to spokesperson Richard Egli, is in the futuristic planning phase with the Blue Ribbon Committees. These consist of three subcommittees. Committee 2010 is reviewing "What Education Should Be Like in the 21st Century. Another committee is reviewing technology and its practical applications. (This

'Shannon's Deal' makes long-awaited return

Lawyer pays more than his bar dues

"Shannon's Deal," NBC's perennially-reincarnated drama series makes its third return this week on the network. The series began as a two-hour movie way back in June of 1989. It won its time period, scored in the top 10 for the week and was praised by the critics. Tom Shales of the Washington Post wrote that the show "is about as prime as prime-time gets." CBS "Sunday Morning" critic John Leonard added, "good acting, snappy direction, cracker-jack entertainment."

Subsequently, NBC decided to make "Shannon's Deal" into a full-fledged series. The following spring, the show made its debut and garnered good ratings. Because not enough episodes had been filmed, the network passed over the series in the fall, vowing to bring it back in the spring.

Now the show is back along with its stars, ruggedly handsome Jamey Sheridan and perky Elizabeth Pena. Tony-winner Sheridan ("Stanley and Iris," "Distant Thunder") plays

corporate lawyer Jack Shannon. Shannon's gambling debts and moral debts have cost him both his marriage and his self respect, and now he's trying to turn his life around. He decides to set up his own practice in a dingy walk-up office and to recruit Lucy Acosta (Pena) as his secretary. Jack Shannon's new practice champions the causes of the poor and the indigent.

"Shannon's Deal" was created by Stan Rogow, an attorney and producer. "I was a radical hippie lawyer coming out of the sixties," says Rogow. "I would never take a poor person into court. The courts and the law aren't set up in a way that they could win," explains Rogow. "I always tried to make a deal with someone of authority and discretion to get what I wanted. That's what Jack Shannon does. He tries to make justice happen where there often isn't any." The 1984 theatrical film "The Verdict," starring Paul Newman, also provided him inspiration for "Shannon's Deal," Rogow admits. The producer's other credits include NBC's "Fame" series and the 1984 feature "Clan of the Cave Bear."

Rogow hired as creative consultant and writer for the series

John Sayles. Sayles is the writer and director of the critically-acclaimed films "Matewan" and "Eight Men Out" (in which, incidentally, he also cast himself as sportswriter). "I knew that a lot of legal cases never went to court," says Sayles. "I liked the notion of a main character having a second chance at putting his life back together with some kind of ethics — both legal and moral ethics."

This season, "Shannon's Deal" will begin as it did two years ago, with a two-hour movie. Titled "Shannon's Deal: Wrongful Death," the premiere involves two policemen in a bizarre pawn shop shoot-out that nearly kills Lucy. Shannon files a wrongful death suit against the pair, and butts heads with a tough detective (Ronald Joseph) when he suspects the cops responsible have something to hide. Tony winner B. D. Wong ("M. Butterfly") guest-stars.

Elizabeth Pena and Jamey Sheridan reprise their roles as Lucy Acosta and Jack Shannon in the long-awaited-return of the NBC drama "Shannon's Deal". The series debuts with a two-hour movie, Sunday, and regular episodes begin airing Friday on the network.

Lundy recalls a ballet recital as a child: "My mother told me I was a 'dancing poodle' when I came off stage. Afterwards, we were watching the other girls do a number when I told her, 'It's only fun when you're on stage.' She knew then that there was something going on," said Lundy. "I still have that tutu. I don't know how I ever fit into it."

Over My Dead Body was Lundy's first TV series. She has appeared in three theatrical films, *Bright Lights*, *Big City*, followed by *Caddyshack II*, and recently, *Madhouse*, premiering this month on cable.

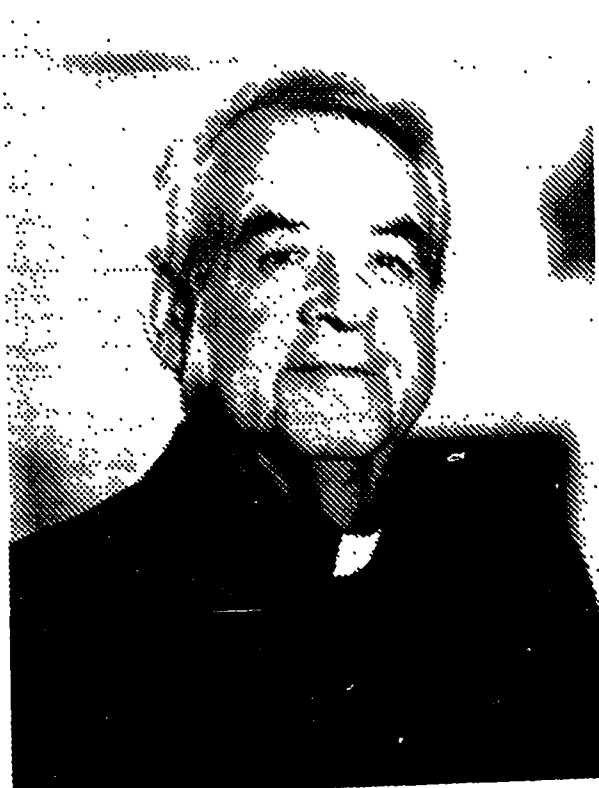

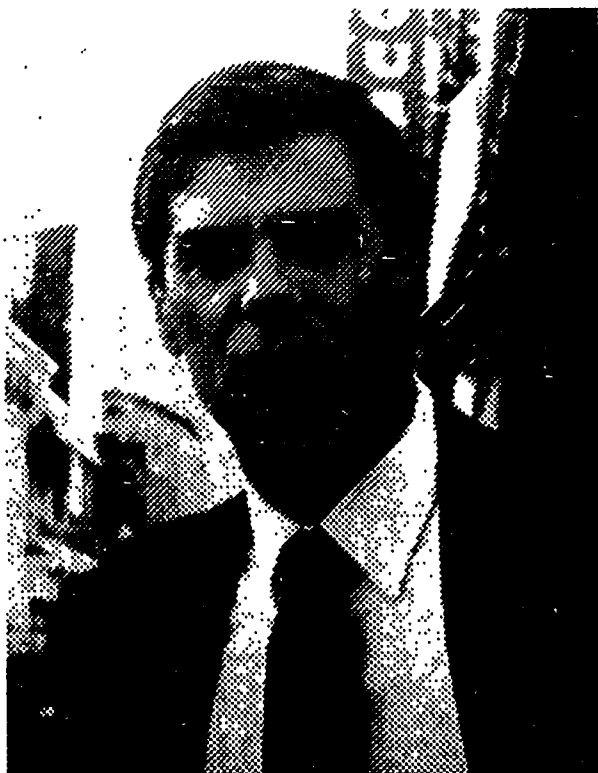
