

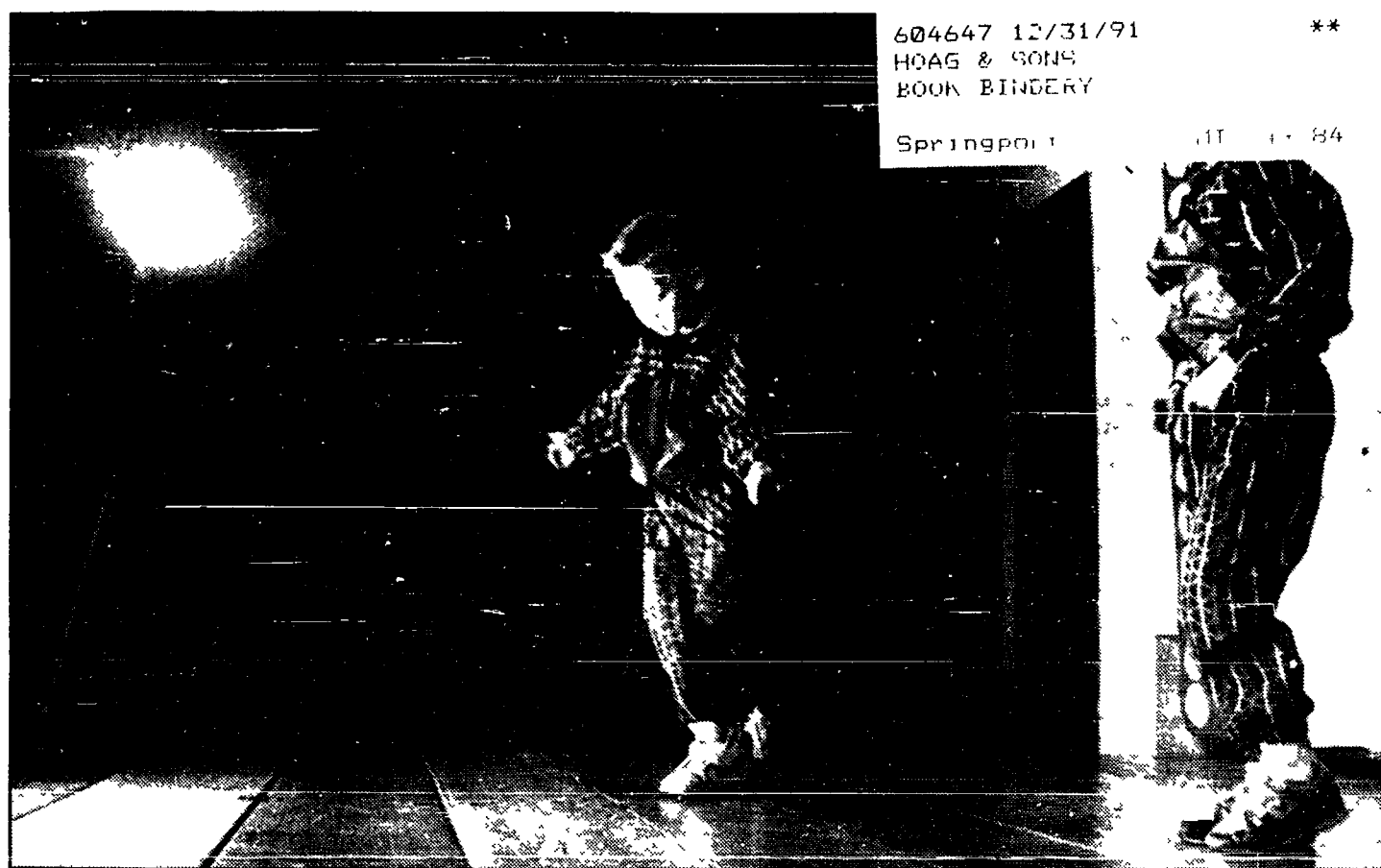

Township alters plan at corner

Township planning commissioners last week moved to curtail commercial development along a busy intersection by approving a change in the township master plan.

Planners unanimously voted to amend the township's Haggerty Road Corridor Plan by redesignating the area northwest of the Haggerty Road/Six Mile intersection from Freeway Service to Large Office.

A perceived need for area uniformity prompted the change, said Carol Maise, township planning and zoning administrator.

"The key is to make the whole area consistent," she said. "There is so

much large office (zoning) between Six and Seven Mile roads (and) we're making it consistent with the Livonia side, too."

Freeway Service zoning previously was allowed along the intersection to provide a buffer to township residential neighborhoods and I-275. But commercial developments began to sprout along the Haggerty Road/Six Mile intersection, frustrating planners and area residents.

The last straw apparently appeared last fall when McDonald's Restaurants announced its intention to build on the south side of Six Mile west of Haggerty.

Angry residents told the planning commission the restaurant would further congest an already trouble-

some intersection.

Planners agreed, but said they were hamstrung by the availability of Freeway Service zoning. If McDonald's adhered to township standards, the fast-food giant could not be barred, the commission determined.

Planners then decided to shut the door on similar developments by amending the master plan.

Maise and representatives of township planning consultants The WBDC Group told the commission the corridor amendment plan was acceptable because development along Haggerty Road has changed since the plan was originally adopted in 1985.

In a report issued to commission-

ers, Maise and WBDC's Brad Strader pointed to development consistency as the logic for the change.

"A change from freeway service type uses to office uses is more consistent with the adopted goals of the township to be a primarily residential community," the report states. "Office uses are primarily daytime, while freeway service uses generate traffic and other impacts throughout the day and evening."

"The township envisions Haggerty Road as the transition between the intense development pattern to the east and the residential character to the west."

The report also notes township go-

Meijer hopes to add gas station

Meijer advertises itself as a one-stop shopping center.

Patrons can select food, sporting goods, plants and hardware under one roof. Now Northville Township's Meijer is looking to add another product line: gasoline.

Following the lead of other Michigan Meijer stores, the Grand Rapids-based firm hopes to build a self-service gas station and convenience store adjacent to its building at the southwest corner of Eight Mile and Haggerty roads.

Meijer will present a preliminary site plan for a

1,600-square-foot gas station at the township planning commission's April 2 session.

The WBDC Group, the township planning consultant, recommends that the township approve the preliminary site plan, despite perceived plan deficiencies.

In its review letter, WBDC said the Meijer plan needs work on issues such as setbacks, internal vehicular circulation, street access, traffic impacts and landscaping.

Parking, signs, and outdoor lighting are adequately covered, according to WBDC's review.

The proposed gas station is a use subject to special conditions under terms of its commercial zoning district. Most special conditions are met,

WBDC has determined.

WBDC's review letter noted that Meijer has been a WBDC client for approximately 30 years. The firm designed the Northville Township Meijer store but says it has no involvement in the proposed gas station.

The township will not comment on the Meijer proposal until after the planning commission review, but police Chief Chip Snider wrote to planners: "Location seems conducive to larceny of gas ... easy access to Eight Mile is inviting for stealing an unattended vehicle with keys."

The commission's April 2 session begins at 7:30 p.m. at township hall.

Group home move raises concerns

Residents of a Northville Township subdivision are reacting with frustration and fear after learning their neighborhood has been targeted as a state group home site.

The state Department of Social Services, through a home search agency, is planning to place six developmentally disabled adult males in a leased home at 19749 Scenic Harbour, in the Highland Lakes subdivision.

Group home residents will be moved later this month from a facility at 42777 Eight Mile Road to the Scenic Harbour site.

The move is based on the state's desire to place residents and employees in a newer home, said Denise Mogos, director of public affairs at Wayne Community Living Services,

an agency that oversees county group homes.

"Our decision to relocate is based on a need for newer property," Mogos said. "The Eight Mile facility is a 100-year-old farmhouse. That speaks for itself."

Word of the impending move troubled some township residents, especially those living in Highland Lakes.

Scenic Harbour resident Gail McPhee expressed concern about the group home and its developmentally disabled residents.

"Yes, there's fear," she said. "They'll be living across the street from me, living across the street from little kids."

"Little kids being subjected to this is our biggest fear," she said.

McPhee said a group of Highland

Fast-food plan back at table

McDonald's will serve Northville Township planning commissioners a third helping of a controversial Six Mile/Haggerty Road restaurant site plan April 2 at township hall.

Planners in January tabled the fast food company's preliminary site plan after questioning the validity of a traffic study mandated by the commission.

A new 115-page revised traffic study cooked up for planning commission review analyzes anticipated traffic from the proposed McDonald's, Ward Church, Northville Hi-Tech Park, Country Club Village subdivision, and Northville Trails subdivision, said McDonald's attorney Joseph Galvin.

The study also includes existing counts of traffic at the Haggerty and Six Mile intersection, he said.

The study was conducted Jan. 14-15 by Goodell-Grivas of Southfield.

The township initially requested the traffic study at its Oct. 31 session after residents and commissioners expressed concerns about traffic volume at the intersection.

Lack of an acceptable traffic study provided the major barrier to McDonald's developing a restaurant south of Six Mile and west of Haggerty. McDonald's presented its site plan prior to a township master plan revision intended to block fast food and other similar uses.

Some residents and planners still harbor strong reservations about McDonald's, but The WBDC Group, the township planning consultant, recommends that the township approve the firm's preliminary site plan at the April 2 session.

WBDC's recommendation is that the township "approve the preliminary site plan and direct the applicant to address the remaining issues noted in this memorandum, and other staff or planning commission

concerns prior to submission of a final site plan."

Outstanding issues include street access and driveways, internal vehicular circulation, pedestrian circulation, landscaping and screening, and a tree inventory, according to WBDC.

But WBDC also says the traffic study is incomplete.

WBDC's review letter states: "The study is generally acceptable and addresses most of the issues raised by the planning commission. However, there are several important omissions which should be addressed prior to final site plan review."

A "glaring omission" from the traffic study is a level-of-service analysis for two service drive intersections, said WBDC traffic engineer Pete LaMourie.

The level-of-service review "is critical in determining the safety of McDonald's traffic entering and exiting the public street," he said.

The traffic study should also note peak traffic volumes at an existing neighboring business and anticipated future left turns at the Six Mile and Haggerty intersection, according to the consultant's review.

Issues such as zoning district use, parking, and outdoor lighting have been satisfactorily addressed, according to the WBDC review.

Township Planning and Zoning Administrator Carol Maise said the township will not necessarily comply with WBDC's recommendation.

"The consultant is strictly the consultant," Maise said. "I have no comment on McDonald's until after the planning commission discusses it (Tuesday evening)."

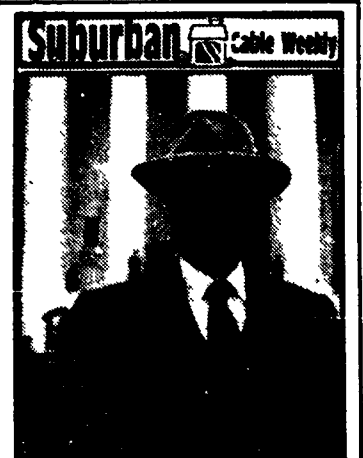
Maise said the township attorney and engineers would be present at the meeting to review the McDonald's plan.

Home move raises concerns

Lakes residents were scheduled to meet Saturday to discuss the group home. Residents were expected to convey their comments to the township board at a public hearing scheduled for 7:30 p.m. April 4 at township hall.

Residents' fears are understandable but unnecessary, Mogos said. "It's fear of the unknown," she said. "Typically, it takes about six months to calm their fears."

Mogos said some Highland Lakes residents have called to express their support of the home. Others will accept the home after they determine that supervision and upkeep are adequate, she said.

"The home will sell itself; it's no different than any other neighbor," she said.

Mogos would not comment on the ages, sex or individual handicaps of the group home residents, citing confidentiality and federal Fair Housing Act guidelines. She did say her agency serves those afflicted with mental retardation, cerebral palsy, epilepsy, and autism.

Group home clients differ from state mental hospital patients such as those interned at Northville Regional Hospital, she said.

"The state hospital serves those with mental illnesses," she said. "Mental illness is more of a thought disorder."

"Developmentally disabled are slower to learn and apply that knowledge."

McPhee noted that township police have responded to numerous complaints at the outgoing Eight Mile Road group home.

Township police Chief Chip Snider said reports dating back to June 1989 indicated eight incidents at the group home.

Complaints and investigations included criminal sexual conduct allegations, assault and battery and larceny charges, and citizen assistance requests.

None of the criminal allegations were aimed at group home residents, Snider said. Most cases involved group home employees victimizing handicapped residents, he said.

Snider said relocation of the group home to the Scenic Harbour site should not endanger residents.

"My information indicates all those crimes occurred within the home itself," he said. "The crimes were on the group home residents... There appears to be no threat to residents of the community."

Snider said the presence of group home residents "can be frightening" but that group homes "are a whole different ballgame" than patients at state psychiatric hospitals.

Police do not plan to change patrol patterns after group home relocation, Snider said.

"We're not going to actively saturate that area because I don't think it presents a problem," he said.

But residents apparently foresee problems. Snider said his department has handled several handgun permit inquiries in the Scenic Harbour area since the relocation plan became public knowledge.

One resident who asked not to be identified said gun permit requests were understandable.

"People are under the impression they are going to be threatened," the resident said. "We feel we're going to be threatened by walkways in our backyard."

Northville Township government stands behind those who oppose group home relocation, Supervisor Georgina Goss said.

"We felt the location on Eight Mile did not negatively impact the residents of Northville Township," she said. "I think the new location is too expensive and is negatively impacting the residents."

Township records indicate the assessed value of the new site is \$64,990. The Eight Mile residence has an assessed value of \$34,510.

Goss would not say if the township would take legal action to stop the group home from relocating in Highland Lakes, but she said such a decision could come soon.

"The township attorneys will be at the public hearing and are currently reviewing the application," she said.

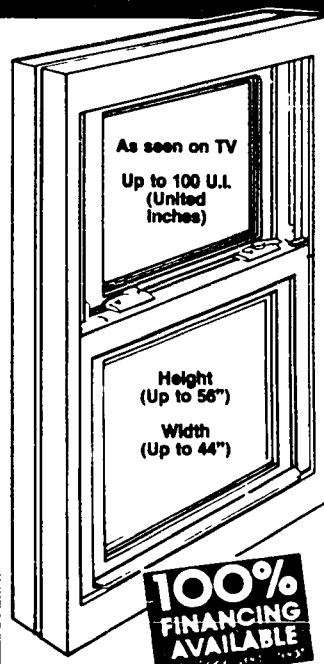

CITY ADVERTISES FOR MANAGER: The Northville City Council approved an advertisement seeking candidates for city manager in a special meeting March 23. The city will offer the new manager a negotiable salary in the range of \$50,000-\$60,000 annually.

The advertisement, drawn up by departing Manager Steven Walters, lists the basic training a potential candidate should have. It seeks a candidate with a master's degree in public administration, at least five years of experience in general management, "and proven leadership in financial management, labor relations, planning and community development."

The notice sets an April 30 cutoff date for submissions. Council members said they plan to move quickly with the search. The council hopes to whittle down the number of final candidates to a single digit and begin interviewing the finalists by the first week in May.

"We want somebody on board by June 1 if possible," said Mayor Chris Johnson.

Walters earned an annual salary of \$61,380 and a \$3,000 car allowance after 17 years here. He will earn \$66,000 annually and a \$4,800 car allowance when he becomes Plymouth City Manager June 1.

Parents must remain in the library during these half-hour sessions and are asked to arrive 5 to 10 minutes early to allow preschoolers to adjust to their surroundings and be ready to enter the Story Room with the group.

BOOK SALES ARE BACK: After a lapse of a year and a half, used book sales are being resumed by the Friends of the Northville Library. The first will take place on Saturday, April 20, in the city council chambers in the municipal building.

Contributions of used books are now welcome at the library and will be moved for sorting as they come in.

Most used books are acceptable for resale with some exceptions. The Friends cannot accept encyclopedias more than 10 years old or textbooks up through the high school level.

Picture magazines of a relatively current vintage are now acceptable.

Book sales were suspended 18 months ago because the Friends no longer had a sorting and storage place for contributed books, but since that problem has been solved, the popular sales are now back on the Friends program.

Revenue from book sales is used to provide many goods and services for the library not possible within the constraints of the budget.

ROTISSERIE BASEBALL: The Northville Public Library is organizing a simplified version of the very popular Rotisserie-style baseball leagues which are active nationwide. "General managers" choose or "draft" major league players who they feel will perform well during the coming season.

The deadline for enrollment is today, April 1, after which the general managers need only sit back and await the results. Different leagues will be formed depending on the number and type of responses received. The action begins on opening day and will continue until the All-Star break on July 9. Standings will be updated and posted in the library each week.

Cloverdale goes Guernsey

The former Cloverdale Cafe, 134 N. Center St., has dropped the "Cloverdale" moniker from its name after dropping the Plymouth ice cream manufacturer as its supplier.

Now known as the Center Street Cafe, the restaurant offers ice cream from Guernsey Farms Dairy instead.

Cafe owner Mike Beshara said he switched brands after experiencing "inconsistency in the quality" of the Cloverdale ice cream.

"They just weren't supplying us with the type of quality I'm used to supplying to my customers," he said. "Sometimes it was gritty, and I had orange pineapple ice cream that tasted like mint chip . . . no cherries in the black cherry, no pecans in the butter pecan, that type of thing."

Cloverdale Farms also had trouble supplying all its flavors at any one time, Beshara said.

At Cloverdale Farms Dairy in Plymouth, General Manager John Kownacki reacted with surprise to Beshara's complaints.

"That's the first we ever heard of it . . . the gentleman never even spoke to us," he said.

Kownacki said the lack of ice cream flavors may have been due more to the seasonal nature of some flavors than to a supply problem at the creamery. "There are flavors that you just create seasonally," he said, naming maple walnut, pumpkin, and eggnog as examples.

A frequently requested flavor called chocolate peanut butter was an experimental one, Kownacki said, and the creamery was waiting on delivery of containers before it could

supply the flavor to retailers on a regular basis.

"The grittiness, that's from his own equipment . . . We make 1,500 gallons of ice cream a week and we get no complaints about the grittiness except from him," Kownacki said.

The Center Street ice cream parlor and restaurant had sold Cloverdale ice cream from its present location since 1939, before changing brands March 18.

The family-owned and family-run Guernsey Farms has been churning out dairy products in Northville since 1940. For more than 20 years, the dairy competed with Cloverdale's from its own downtown store at 125 S. Center St., before opening a restaurant and creamery at its present 21300 Novi Rd. location.

Guernsey offers more than 50 flavors of ice cream, including Mack-

inac Island peanut butter fudge, praline pecan and Black Forest. The company's Black Forest flavor consists of a vanilla ice cream with brandy sauce rippled through it, interspersed with chocolate-covered cherries.

The company also makes four flavors of sherbet, five sorbets or ices, and eight yogurts.

Guernsey earned national recognition several years ago when its butter pecan ice cream was voted one of the best in the country by People magazine.

The ice cream is made at the company's Novi Road location.

The Center Street Cafe was closed most of last week after a grease fire destroyed the kitchen grill early last Tuesday, but Beshara expected to reopen for business by today.

New funding plan would hurt area, Bell believes

A nine-point plan by two state legislators, including a statewide tax-base-sharing proposal, has little or nothing to offer Northville and could do serious damage to the district's finances, Superintendent George Bell said.

"You couldn't do any worse with a law even if you decided you were going to pick on Northville," Bell said of the plan's tax-base-sharing proposal.

The initiative, introduced by Sen. Dan Degrow, R-Port Huron, and Rep. Jim O'Neill, D-Saginaw, proposes to take 50 percent of growth in state equalized valuation for industrial and commercial property and share it with schools statewide in an attempt to equalize state funding of schools.

In return, the out-of-formula or property-wealthy school districts that would be losing money would gain as "recapture" would be "phased out," according to the state plan.

Northville is involved in a lawsuit attempting to prove that a 1990 state recapture of \$72 million from out-of-formula school districts was illegal. The move was a state attempt to equalize funding of school districts. Northville lost over \$1.3 million in the move.

The Degrow/O'Neill plan also has eight points to improve quality in state public schools.

Schools of choice makes an appearance in their proposal.

DeGrow and O'Neill want to see in-district choice established by 1992-93. They want to establish grants for cross-district choice in the 1991-92 State Aid Act.

Northville already has in-district choice: "We've been doing that since I've been here," Bell said.

Cross-district choice is not the solution to education problems, Bell said, but he expects Northville, like other out-of-formula school districts, to be ineligible for grants establishing choice pilot programs.

DeGrow and O'Neill also endorse competency testing. They want to require students to pass a competency test to be eligible for graduation. Schools would be required to continue providing education to students until they pass the test.

Bell said he has no problem with competency tests. But because Northville does not receive per-pupil funding, the requirement that districts provide instruction to students who fail the test does not apply to Northville schools.

Competency tests provide another concern for the learning disabled and special education student, Bell said. And disruptive or borderline students could choose to drop out of

school when faced with another hurdle to jump before graduation.

"It's not possible to put an assembly line together when you're dealing with students," Bell said.

The state plan also encourages establishing pilot programs to extend the school year. A report and recommendations on expanding the program would be expected by 1993-94.

Bell said extending the school year would be expensive, and possibly would yield few results.

"I question whether adding five to 10 days would improve education in the state of Michigan," he said.

DeGrow and O'Neill also propose to offer \$10 per pupil as an incentive to begin foreign language programs in elementary and middle schools.

With a class of 30, the proposal would provide \$300.

"Are you going to hire a teacher for \$300?" Bell said. "The state certainly isn't providing the funding."

Northville already offers a language orientation in the middle schools, and some elementary school teachers begin foreign language instruction in earlier grades, Bell said.

The state initiative also proposes:

- To establish rules and conditions for business and education partnerships involving adult and vocational education programs.

- To provide funding for math and science centers.

- To permit and possibly fund university programs for kindergarten through 12th-grade students.

- To establish a program for high school students to attend and earn credit through community colleges and universities.

Bell said the nine-point plan offers nothing new.

He would, however, like to see the state decide funding issues soon so that the district can begin work on its 1991-92 budget.

"I'm just nervous until they get this defined," Bell said.

The district's operating mills are up for renewal in June.

"I can't even begin to talk to the community until I know what (the state) is going to do," he said.

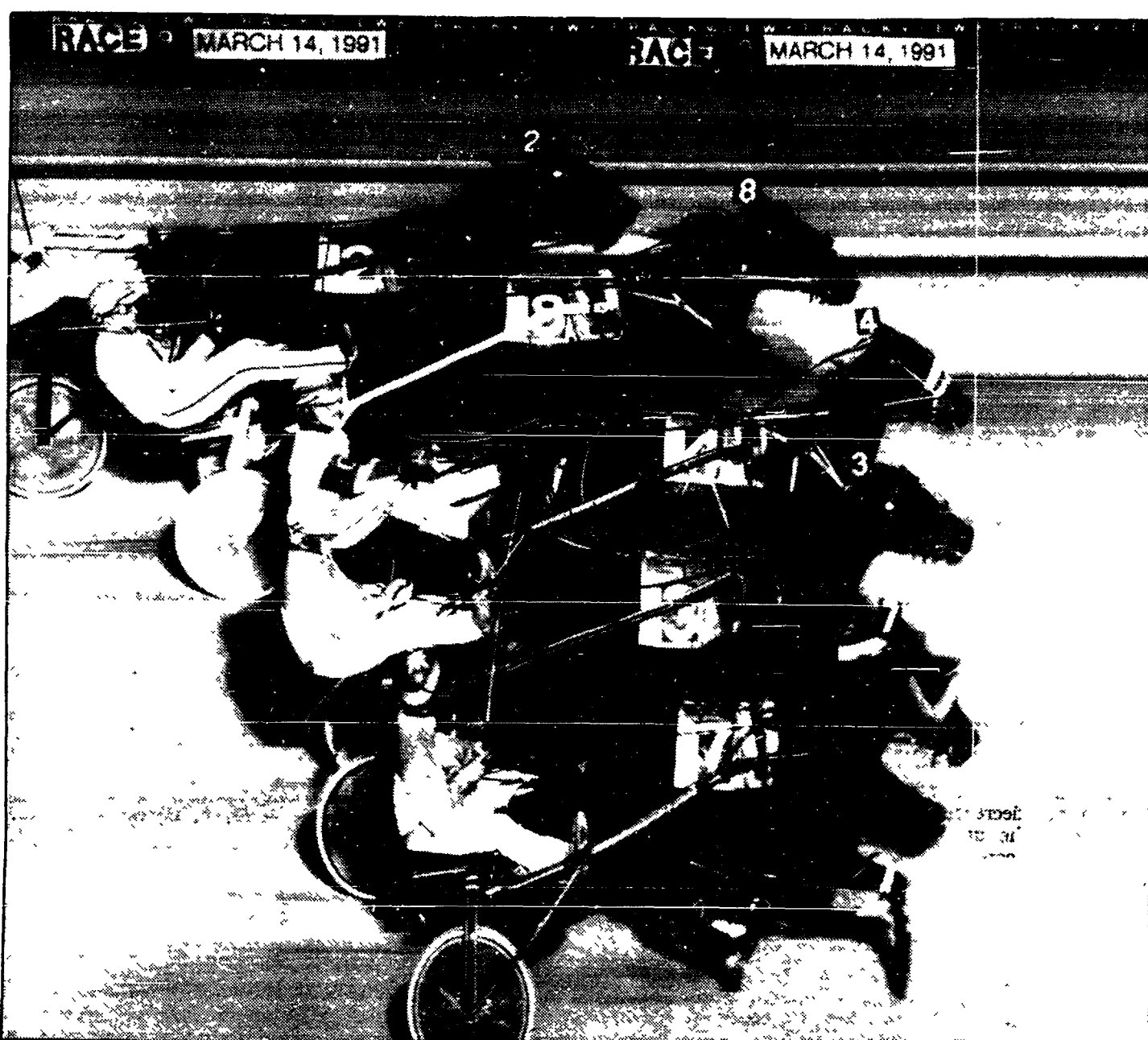

When Pryce gets to Ann Arbor she may be directing some of her choir students from Northville High School.

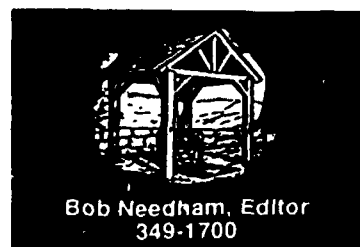
"Northville always participates and always has students in the honors choir," Dehn said.

City is gambling on deck financing plan

The city council's recent agreement to issue bonds to fund an expanded Cady Street parking deck raises many more questions than the council answered last week.

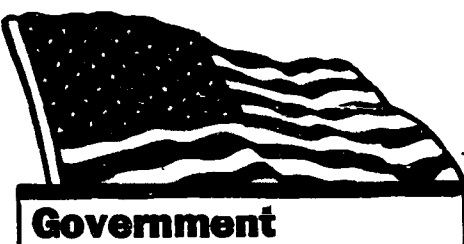
The council adopted notices of intent to issue up to \$5.5 million in bonds despite City Manager Steven Walters' acknowledgment that, under the city's current financing plan, the city could not afford to finance the deck without dipping into the general fund. Walters also admitted that there probably won't be enough money in the general fund in the near future to pay the excess cost.

The bond plan currently calls for funding about half the deck's cost with a percentage of the property taxes captured by the city's Downtown Development Authority (DDA) from Main Centre and the proposed Cady Centre and Long Development projects, and the parking credits charged to those developments.

Under a "worst-case scenario," the city could not afford to finance the deck without dipping into the general fund, Walters told the council last Monday. But the council approved the notice of intent to issue the bonds anyway, after Walters assured them the cost could be brought under the amount requiring general-fund help.

Walters said factors including a favorable construction climate, a low bond bid, and faster growth in the city's state-equalized valuation (SEV) than he has estimated may decrease the cost. SEV growth affects the amount of property taxes that can be captured for the project by the DDA.

But the manager also admitted the possibility of problems with the financing plan, including a couple of state leg-



islative proposals that would restrict the amount of tax capturing allowed under Downtown Development Authorities (DDAs) and cut tax-capturing bond issues altogether after a certain date.

The state proposals have not yet been passed.

Another factor that could affect financing is whether the Northville School District will agree to the city's proposal to recapture a larger percentage of Main-Centre property taxes than originally agreed to with the schools.

As of last week's council meeting, school officials had not yet been approached about the plan.

"The numbers are close enough," Walters told the council last week. But there are still a whole lot of ifs involved, and a lot of numbers that must go the city's way before funding for the project is possible.

Rather than betting that the financing plan comes up a winner for the city, we wish the city could have taken less of a gamble with the project and answered some of the questions before issuing the notices of intent.

The council planned to discuss the bonding proposal further at its meeting tonight. Let's hope there is time and concern enough to answer some of these questions, before this April foolishness gets completely out of hand.

Whom do you trust in court?



Whom do you trust, the prosecutor who argues one side of the story or the judge who listens to both sides?

That's one core of the debate in Lansing. The question is whether to ease up the law giving drug couriers mandatory life sentences without hope of parole when they're convicted of dealing 650 grams or more of cocaine or heroin.

The judge has no discretion. Only the prosecutor has discretion, when he or she decides how to charge the arrested person.

The bill before the House Judiciary Committee would continue to provide for mandatory life but allow judges to mete out as few as five years for good reason.

Naturally, Oakland County prosecutor Dick Thompson and the hard liners were favoring the prosecutor. Thompson recalled how judges gave "revolving door" prison sentences in the early 1970s.

Ingham Circuit Judge James R. Giddings put the other side well:

"The law transfers discretion from the courts to prosecutors. Court decisions are subject to public scrutiny and judicial review."

"Many (big drug dealers) are buying their way out (of life sentences) with forfeiture procedures (surrendering property in return for more lenient prosecution). These decisions are made behind (the prosecutor's) closed doors."

"Discretion in private is more subject to abuse. We should return these decisions to the public arena."

That reasoning is music to the ears of believers in open government.

The Open Meetings Act applies only to legislative bodies, not to administrators like the prosecutor or to judges. But you get Giddings' point: Judges operate in open courtrooms. Their decisions are almost automatically appealed to higher courts.

But prosecutors cut deals behind closed doors. Ergo, we should trust the judges more than those wheeling, dealing, secretive prosecutors, he says.

Well, maybe.

Yet we must remember with disgust how judges campaign for re-election. They never talk past cases. They have themselves photographed in robes, in front of a shelf of law books.

Instead, consider the law on its merits. It requires a lifetime in prison without hope of parole for anyone caught dealing, or even talking about dealing, 1.4 pounds of drugs.

Common sense says we should provide some "light at the end of the tunnel," some hope 10 or 20 years later for the convict who gets an education, gets clean of his own drug habit, matures and seems ready to go back into society.

Michigan's law, one of the most severe in the world, simply isn't helping us capture the drug "kingpins," whatever that means. We're coming down on a few "mules" like a ton of bricks. Myself, I would be inclined to make the minimum penalty 10 years rather than five years or mandatory life.

But not because I trust judges.

There's a long way still to go



I saw another one last week.

I was headed west on Eight Mile about 11 o'clock at night when I saw him (or her) standing in the middle of the road — right in front of the Meyers' farm, about a half-mile west of Beck Road.

It was the third red fox I've seen in Northville since January.

I was still excited about it the next day so I mentioned it to Bob Henshaw, the fellow who runs our composition department when he isn't tending his farm.

"Saw another red fox last night," I reported. "That's a good sign. I read somewhere that the fox population is down in Michigan and the DNR is making a strong effort to bring them back."

"I can't remember ever seeing a red fox in the wild before. And now I've seen three of them within the last three months, right here in suburban Northville."

"Probably has more to do with the price of pelts than anything the DNR is doing," observed Henshaw. "Yep, a few years ago you could get \$50 or \$60 for a fox pelt, but now it's down to about \$15. Just not as profitable to trap them any more."

"Not as many people buying fur coats as before," he continued, offering a possible explanation for the declining value of fox pelts. There's been a lot of negative publicity the past few years about fur coats, and it's apparently having its effect."

He said all this stuff rather matter-of-factly. Analytically, almost... without any hint as to what his personal feelings on the controversial issue might be.

But, still, he seemed rather knowledgeable on the subject. And the fact that he knew about the changing market value of

fox pelts made me suspect that good ol' Bob might be one of those people who has trapped and sold a pelt or two over the years.

He must have figured out what was going through my mind because he changed the subject rather abruptly.

"Nice shoes, Phil," he said. "They leather?"

"I think they're imitation something or other," I replied quickly, not really knowing for sure.

"What kind of watchband you got on your arm?" he asked next. "Looks like it might be alligator."

"I know for certain my watchband is some kind of synthetic material," I answered. "I made sure not to get real leather when I bought it."

"Synthetic material," he replied, verifying my response. "Hmmm, probably made with some kind of oil-based product. Too bad. Oil is a non-renewable resource; not like fox. You can raise and harvest fox. But you ever hear of anybody raising and harvesting oil? I wish sometimes that we would start paying more attention to preserving our non-renewable resources."

All this conversation took place in a calm, low-key manner, mind you; neither one of us getting upset or even openly stating our own beliefs on the issue for that matter.

There are valid points to be made about some seeming hypocrisies in the conservationist viewpoint, and I thought he had made them rather well — without even asking me what I was having for dinner. (It was a Pizza Cutter pizza with double cheese, mushroom, green pepper, ham and sausage).

So I acknowledged the points he had made, but I also told him there's a long way to go in many areas. "We're making progress in the animal preservation area," I said. "Let's not use our lack of progress in some areas as an excuse for wiping out what we've already done in others."

Sports Briefs

GYMNASTICS REVIEW: The Northville gymnastics team finished with a 5-4 dual-meet mark during the 1991 campaign, including a fifth-place finish in the seven-team WLAA. It was similar to previous seasons because the Mustangs were again able to beat the area's lesser programs (like Walled Lake Western and Livonia Clarenceville) but weren't at the level of the premier programs (like Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton).

With most of the top performers expected back next season, first-year coach Jeff Pergament is optimistic about the future.

"Next year looks very promising," he said. "I will be much more prepared now that I am familiar with the high school gymnastics system. Also, this year I had to learn how to motivate all the gymnasts. Next year only the freshmen will be new to me."

The top two performers — junior Mia DeHart and freshman Sara Kolb — will again be the backbone of the program next season. Kolb had Northville's highest score in the vault (9.25) while DeHart led the team in the remaining three events (9.05 in uneven parallel bars, 8.85 in balance beam and 9.35 in floor exercise). DeHart was also the team's top all-arounder, and notched a season-best 35.75 versus North Farmington.

According to Pergament, the most valuable performers in each class were Kolb (freshman), Leslie Allen (sophomore), DeHart (junior) and Tracie Surdu (senior).

The team's highest meet score was a 133.7, which is within a point of the school record.

SIEVING SETS RECORDS: Northville's Jeff Sieving placed (top six) nine times at the 1990-91 14-and-Under Midwest Open Championships held in Minneapolis, Minn., in mid-March.

The local swimmers won two events in the 11-12 boys division and set new meet records in the process. The wins came in the 50-yard breaststroke (30.64) and in the 100 breaststroke (1:08.08).

Sieving also added three fourths, two fifths and two sixths. The fourths came in the 100 freestyle (54.9), the 50 butterfly (28.6) and the 100 IM (1:04.37), the fifths included the 200 freestyle (2:02.59) and the 100 butterfly (1:03.39), and the sixths came in the 500 freestyle (5:26.92) and the 200 IM (2:18.10).

Sieving was the runner-up for the boys 11-12 high-point award.

Earlier in March, several Northville swimmers represented the Clarenceville Cohoes at the Short Course State Swimming Championships at Novi High School.

Sieving was the runner-up for high point honors in the boys 11-12 division by placing first in the 200 IM (2:15.93), first in the 100 breaststroke (1:08.65), first in the 100 IM (1:03.60), second in the 100 butterfly (1:03.61) and second in the 50 butterfly (28.32). Sieving joined Northville's Danny Belanger as members of the 200 freestyle relay team that placed third. In addition, Sieving, Belanger and Craig Sieving were three-quarters of the 200 medley relay team that placed third (2:05.55). Individually Belanger placed 10th in the 100 breaststroke (1:19.33).

In the boys 15-18 age group, Bob Holdridge was eighth in the 100 breaststroke (1:04.18), 10th in the 200 IM (2:04.63) and 10th in the 100 freestyle (49.43). He was also a member of two relay teams that garnered a pair of fourth place finishes.

In the girls 15-18 category, Teri Juhasz was ninth in the 100 breaststroke (1:11.17) and 12th in the 200 breaststroke (2:36.92). She teamed with Megan Holmberg to place fifth in the 800 freestyle relay (8:16.91), fifth in the 400 freestyle relay (3:46.86) and sixth in the 400 freestyle medley (4:15.57).

als to limit commercial acreage to primarily residential uses and to prevent negative traffic impacts on nearby streets.

Township resident Sue Hillebrand lives near the intersection and supported the amendment.

Hillebrand said residents do not want to see Six and Haggerty develop into "a nightmare like Eight Mile and Haggerty."

Not everyone was pleased with the master plan revision.

"I would ask this be tabled so I could properly advise my clients," said Harold Larsen, an attorney representing Ward Presbyterian Church.

Ward has received final site plan approval for a 40-acre parcel located within the affected area. Larsen said the church could be "significantly affected, potentially" by the master plan change.

"We're concerned about it," he said.

Planning Commission Chairperson Charles DeLand told Larsen the revision would not affect Ward's ability to develop its property as approved under terms of its final site plan.

But Larsen indicated the church's disapproval was based on the possibility that the land might eventually be sold without a church.

"We're now talking about land use," he said. "If there was ever a time when a church was not built..."

Ward reportedly is negotiating with representatives of St. John's Seminary in Plymouth Township about relocating its church site. If Ward did purchase a portion of the seminary property, it presumably would seek to sell its Six Mile/Haggerty land.

DeLand refused Larsen's request to table, saying the church had received ample notice of the proposed master plan amendment.

Larsen would not say if the church planned to challenge the township's switch to Large Office master planning. He also would not comment on church negotiations with owners of the seminary site or inquiries on Ward's Six Mile property.

Midwesterner turns investment into 2nd career

How does a Midwestern businessman become a top Napa Valley vintner?

John Shafer, a native Michiganian, was a 23-year veteran in textbook publishing for Scott, Foresman and Co. in Chicago. While doing research in long-range planning for new markets and products, Shafer began to apply his investigative techniques to his personal life. He viewed the wine industry as an investment opportunity and a second career.

In 1972, he pulled up stakes, moved his family to California, and bought a 210-acre wine estate in the foothills of Napa Valley's Stag's Leap palisades along the Silverado Trail.

Lacking grape-growing and winemaking knowledge, Shafer spent the next six years learning to grow chardonnay, cabernet sauvignon and zinfandel. He sold his entire production to neighboring wineries.

It is an old story, but when a grower tastes wine that someone else makes from his grapes, he always thinks he can do it better. In 1978, Shafer produced 1,000 cases of his first cabernet sauvignon.

Winter and early spring are slow times at a winery. Many winemakers find this a convenient time to get into the marketplace. With production levels approaching 20,000 cases per year, John's son and winemaker Doug Shafer travels the country visiting with restaurateurs, retailers and consumers — the people who buy Shafer wines.

This year's travels brought Doug to the Midwest and afforded us an opportunity to taste the wines of Shafer Vineyards with the man who makes them.

"Our style of chardonnay emphasizes fruit," says Shafer. "We strive for rich creamy textures that retain fruit and finish with an elegant richness. Barrel fermentation and aging the wine in French oak barrels adds complex elements while maintaining elevated fruit."

We concur with Shafer's remarks. The 1989 Shafer Vineyards Napa Valley Chardonnay (\$15) emphasizes pineapple and tropical fruit with balanced vanilla oakiness. The length and finish of this wine make it a good complement for food.

The "in" wine, seducing even white wine drinkers, is merlot. Shafer Merlot captures the lush, vibrant fruit of the varietal. "It's the hottest selling wine for us," affirms Shafer. "It's blended with 14 percent cabernet franc, which enhances the raspberry perfume and gives the wine a great front end. To add a little beef and overall structure, it's also blended with 8 percent cabernet sauvignon."

The 1988 Shafer Vineyards Merlot (\$19.50) yields blackberry and raspberry fruit aromas and flavors in a supple, soft, smooth flavorful rendition. Paired with a simply prepared Cornish game hen, it makes an elegant presentation.

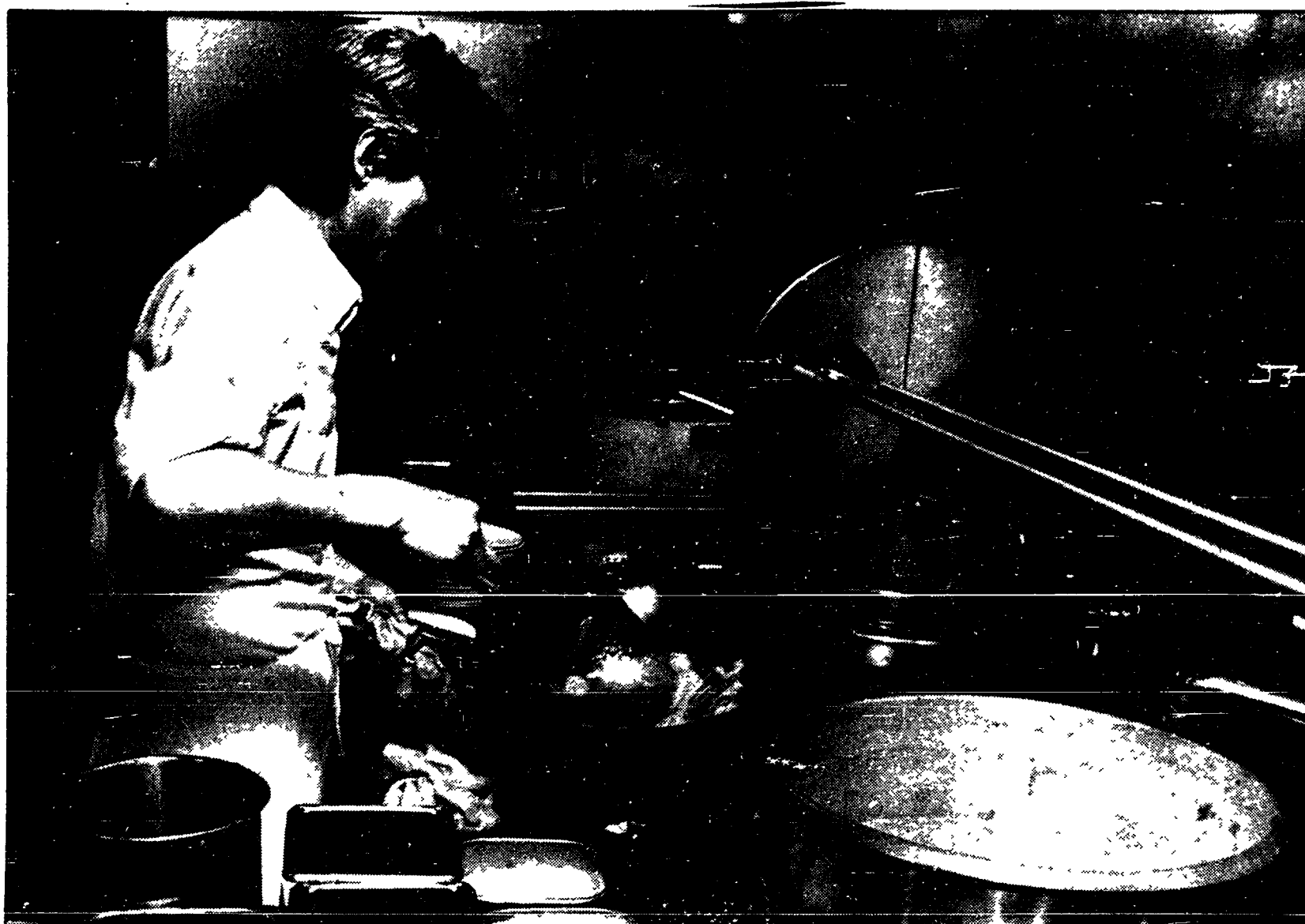
Showcasing the Stag's Leap District, Shafer produces two distinct styles of cabernet sauvignon. The 1987 Shafer Vineyards Stag's Leap District Cabernet Sauvignon (\$20) emphasizes the region's abundant fruit and is a stellar example of the first style.

"The Stag's Leap District offers wines with soft tannins," Shafer comments. "They are approachable early on, but are more masculine than our merlot, with a firmer structure."

Shafer Vineyards Hillside Select from the Stag's Leap District is 100 percent cabernet sauvignon and represents the second style. "I get to play blending with our other cabernet," says Shafer. "The Hillside Select is designed as an in-your-face, slam-dunk cabernet."

WINE SELECTION OF THE WEEK

1986 Shafer Vineyards Hillside Select Cabernet Sauvignon (\$34) is a gangbuster, give-em-all-you-got wine. Every aspect of this wine is big, except the tannin. Opulent fruit greets the taster and complex, extracted fruit and oak elements combine in a well-focused presentation. The delicious, lengthy, smooth aftertaste lets you know that while this wine tastes great now, it will age handsomely.

Step into the Dragon's lair

Novi's newest Chinese restaurant is hot stuff

There's a new city in Novi. The newest Chinese restaurant to hit the dining-out scene there is Dragon City.

Dragon City has been tucked into the northeast corner of the West Oaks shopping plaza for only a month, but already has a loyal following.

Owner and chef Sho Jinn Wang (who has Americanized name to Scott) says, "Everyone that comes in here, everybody all comes back."

Even as he speaks (albeit in broken English), a couple walks by and greets him before taking a table.

"That customer been here three, four times already," says Wang, then leans closer. "He likes the Mongolian beef."

Though Dragon City is new, Chef Wang draws on a rich background in Chinese cooking. He spent his young years in China and Korea, and began cooking in Korea 28 years ago. Over the last 20 years, he's made quite a name for himself in the United States as well. He worked for 10 years at the popular Forbidden City in Ann Arbor.

His proudest achievement was a recent call to prepare the banquet meal for 200 persons at the convention of the International Food and Wine Society in Philadelphia.

"But the customer is a different test," he says. He's drawn on experience at different restaurants to arrive at a completely Mandarin menu.

The Chinese food that most Americans are familiar with is Cantonese. From the southeast region of China, Cantonese food tends to have subtler flavors.

Mandarin food comes from the central provinces like Hunan and Sichuan provinces and the port city of Beijing. The spices used are generally sharper and the flavors more pungent.

An example of the Mandarin influence is in the soup offerings at Dragon City. In addition to the familiar wonton and egg drop soups, you can order the spiced sour soup, a slightly thick and peppery broth. It's loaded with green onions and two kinds of mushrooms.

"The Hunan taste is hot, but you can choose anything hot, anything on the menu," says Wang. "Everything is very, very good."

Indeed, the menu allows you to choose four levels of spiciness in your dishes, from "spicy, not hot" to "full strength." The full strength produces enough fire worthy of the restaurant's dragon namesake.

Citrus fruits are year-round import in Michigan

Although citrus fruits are available all year long I seldom think of them in the warmer months when Michigan produces its bounties of cherries, blueberries, plums, peaches and strawberries.

Citrus is invaluable in cooking and nutrition. These fruits are low-calorie, flavorful and chock full of vitamins. I would venture to guess that 99 percent of the population likes citrus.

The first seedlings were planted over 2,000 years ago and since that time have been cross-bred to provide the superior fruit we have available to us today. In addition to the "common" citrus obtainable in the produce section I have seen kumquats and blood oranges in local markets. Citrus, with their aromatic acidity, are used in soups, salads, meat, fish and egg dishes, sauces and desserts. The possibilities are endless.

Citrus fruits are covered with a thick rind that is mostly white pith. The thin outer layer, or zest, is colored and contains the citrus oils, or flavors, and the largest concentration of vitamins. Very few varieties of citrus actually turn color on the tree. They remain a

light green until treated with ethylene gas and then transform into the bright orange and yellow we are used to.

Almost all citrus on the market have been treated with wax to prevent moisture loss. If the peel is to be eaten, scrub the fruit under hot water to remove this wax. All citrus should feel heavy with juice, be firm yet resilient, free of blemished skin, and have a uniform color.

Nutritionally citrus offers one gram of protein and no fat or cholesterol per piece of fruit. There is little or no sodium and a good amount of fiber. Citrus is generally sour if underripe and dry and spongy if old. The shelf life of citrus is long but not forever. With the exception of the lime, all fruit may be stored at room temperature for one week and refrigerated up to a month. Ideally, limes are good for one week under refrigeration. To freeze for later use peel and remove pith. Fruit is good for one year in the freezer.

Oranges are available year round with the peak season winter/spring. The lemon peaks in the summer, grapefruit in autumn and early summer and the lime year round.

The most versatile member of the citrus family is the lemon. A good lemon is heavy for its size and has a fresh, perceptible smell. The lemons available in the market are "acid" or "common" lemons. They have few seeds and are valued for their juice (thin-skinned) or for their peel (thicker, pebbly skin). The juice is more easily extracted if the fruit is first rolled on a hard surface with the palm of your hand.

Lemons have varied uses in cooking: a squeeze of lemon juice enlivens fish, chicken and vegetables; it is a useful substitute for salt in restricted diets; lemon juice prevents the discoloration of fruit and vegetable flesh and often takes the place of vinegar in salad dressings and marinades; and the tang of lemon in desserts such as lemon meringue pie is unforgettable. One lemon supplies 20 calories and 3-4 teaspoons of juice.

Limes are used in the same ways as the lemon. While vacationing in Mexico years ago, I fell in love with a squirt of fresh lime on my papaya. Lime juice was also a popular marinade for service or marinated fish. The acid actually "cooked" the fish without heat.

Mixed with cilantro, tomato and spices this was a local favorite. Substitute limes for lemon with cold seafood for a nice treat. A lime yields 2-3 tsp. of juice and provides 30 calories.

Orange trees have been symbols of opulence for centuries and their fruit one of the most important in the world. Sweet oranges can be separated into three categories. The common orange, varietal name Valencia, is a medium-sized heavy fruit prized for its juice.

A Sunday morning treat at our house is fresh-squeezed orange juice. For special occasions a splash of champagne makes an elegant, light aperitif.

The navel orange, recognized by the growth of a tiny second orange at the flower end, contains less juice but peels easier. Very rare in our markets is the blood orange. Its pink-red seedless flesh is a sight to behold. It is mainly grown in Italy and has a rich flavor reminiscent of berries. Beware, they are expensive! One medium orange will produce ¼ - ½ cup of juice and furnish 50 calories. One of the larger citrus is grapefruit. The yellow fruit have a white flesh, while the pink

fleshed have a pinkish blushed rind. The two differ little in taste so the choice is merely personal preference. The State of Florida produces 50 percent of the grapefruit grown in the world. Grapefruit salsa is becoming a popular garnish with fish and poultry. Use grapefruit as a substitute for orange in a spinach salad or perk up your everyday tossed salad with a few pink sections.

2 small peaches, peeled and thinly sliced
2 grapefruit, peeled and sectioned
¼ cup low-fat yogurt
¾ cup fresh raspberries or sliced strawberries
orange-flavored liquor or champagne (if desired)
mint leaves

Mix fruit with liquor or champagne if desired. Arrange decoratively. Dollop with yogurt and garnish with mint leaf.

Mandarin cooking fuels the fire

But Wang doesn't rely on the red chili peppers alone to flavor his dishes. Even the hottest of dishes is full of flavors like ginger, garlic and tamarind.

Our Hunan spicy chicken had some black beans mixed in, and bright green broccoli and red bell pepper chunks lent some festive color to the dish. Again, the mushrooms were plentiful, indicating that no corners are being cut in this kitchen.

We ordered a Hunan shrimp dish at the "full strength" level of spice, and it definitely made us sit up and take notice. An accompaniment of steamed broccoli was not coated in the same sauce, and by alternating bites of shrimp and broccoli, we were able to keep the fire in our

mouths at a low boil.

Shrimp with red sauce is well-suited for the milder taste, yet is quite flavorful. Traditional favorites like sweet and sour chicken are also available.

The menu is heavy on seafood dishes, with some 20 fish and shellfish entrees available. Beef comes in 11 different methods of preparation, and poultry and pork 10 each. There are also four vegetarian entrees available for those who wish to avoid all meat.

Stir-fried vegetables, which were heavy on the snow pea pods, were quite tasty, and not at all hot.

Dragon City also goes easy on your wallet. The most expensive entree at \$13.95 is called the Happy Family, a selection of various seafoods cooked with Chinese greens. Most meals are in the \$8-\$10 range.

Lunch is a true bargain, however, especially if you take advantage of Dragon City's grand opening special, which continues through the end of April. Right now, all lunches are priced from \$3.99 to \$4.50. Even at the regular prices, which run up to \$5.95, the lunch makes a filling meal.

In addition to a hefty helping of your choice of entree, you get soup, fried rice and a superb egg roll (crunchy, yet not greasy).

During the grand opening period, dinners are also 20 percent off for everyone.

Dragon City, in the West Oaks II mall, is open 11:30 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays, 11:30 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays, and noon to 9 p.m. on Sundays. Visa, MasterCard and Diner's Club accepted. All items are available for take-out.

Cut fat by avoiding the a la mode

Food and nutrition issues have become a national pastime, with the battle cry of "You are what you eat!"

Food, of course, enables our bodies to operate and function by providing energy, building blocks to support growth and repair of tissues, and providing nutrients to keep our systems running smoothly. The role of nutrition from the foods we eat helps us to reach our potential for growth and development and maintenance of good health. The bottom line is to choose more nutritious foods for better health.

Avoid foods such as: a la mode, au gratin, baked, bisque, buttered and scalloped, when checking recipes or eating out. Casseroles, pan-fried, sautéed or creamed also could spell trouble for the health-conscious.

High-fat soups include cream soups, chunky soups and peas with ham. A medium-fat soup choice would be beef noodle, black bean, chicken noodle or chicken vegetable. Lower in fat choices are chicken bouillon, vegetable, vegetarian, gazpacho or onion.

Cream soups are the most common ingredient in any casserole and not great nutritionally. Beware of the high sodium content in most canned soups. For a casserole opt for the low-sodium version or make your own casserole base. Replace cream soups with chicken stock, wine or a combination and thicken with cornstarch or arrowroot.

Add your own mushrooms and you have an unbeatable cream of mushroom base for a casserole. For a richer soup base, combine non-fat dry milk with the chicken stock.

High-fat meat choices are bacon, tuna in oil, rack of lamb, luncheon meats and spareribs. A medium-fat choice would be eggs, ham, veal or beef roast. Even lower in fat are chicken or turkey, lean beef, fish, scallops, oysters and crab. Basting any meat product with butter adds fat. Instead, baste with tomato or lemon juice, stock or wine. Use a non-stick spray or non-stick skillet to avoid adding more fat.

High-fat dairy products include American cheese, blue, Brie, Swiss, brick and cheddar. Medium-fat cheeses are creamed cottage cheese,

sour cream, feta, mozzarella, Lorraine or Alpine Swiss. Choose instead a lower fat such as Laughing Cow, skim milk, one-percent milk, low-fat cottage cheese or yogurt.

Substitute Neufchatel for cream cheese, and use cold skimmed evaporated milk with a touch of honey and vanilla for a super whipped topping for desserts. It takes longer to whip but the nutritional gains are worth the extra time.

Recipes calling for sour cream or mayonnaise will usually allow you to substitute plain, low-fat yogurt or low-fat cottage cheese that has been blended smooth. This makes a low-calorie treat for baked potatoes. Add a few chives or grated Parmesan cheese for a taste delight.

Other high-fat food choices are avocados, butter, mayonnaise, margarine, almonds, pecans, cashews, coconut, olives, oils and shortening. Medium-fat choices are Brazil nuts, peanuts and salad dressings. Even lower in fat are sunflower seeds and reduced-calorie salad dressings. Use canola oil, safflower oil, corn oil or olive oil for salads or cooking. They

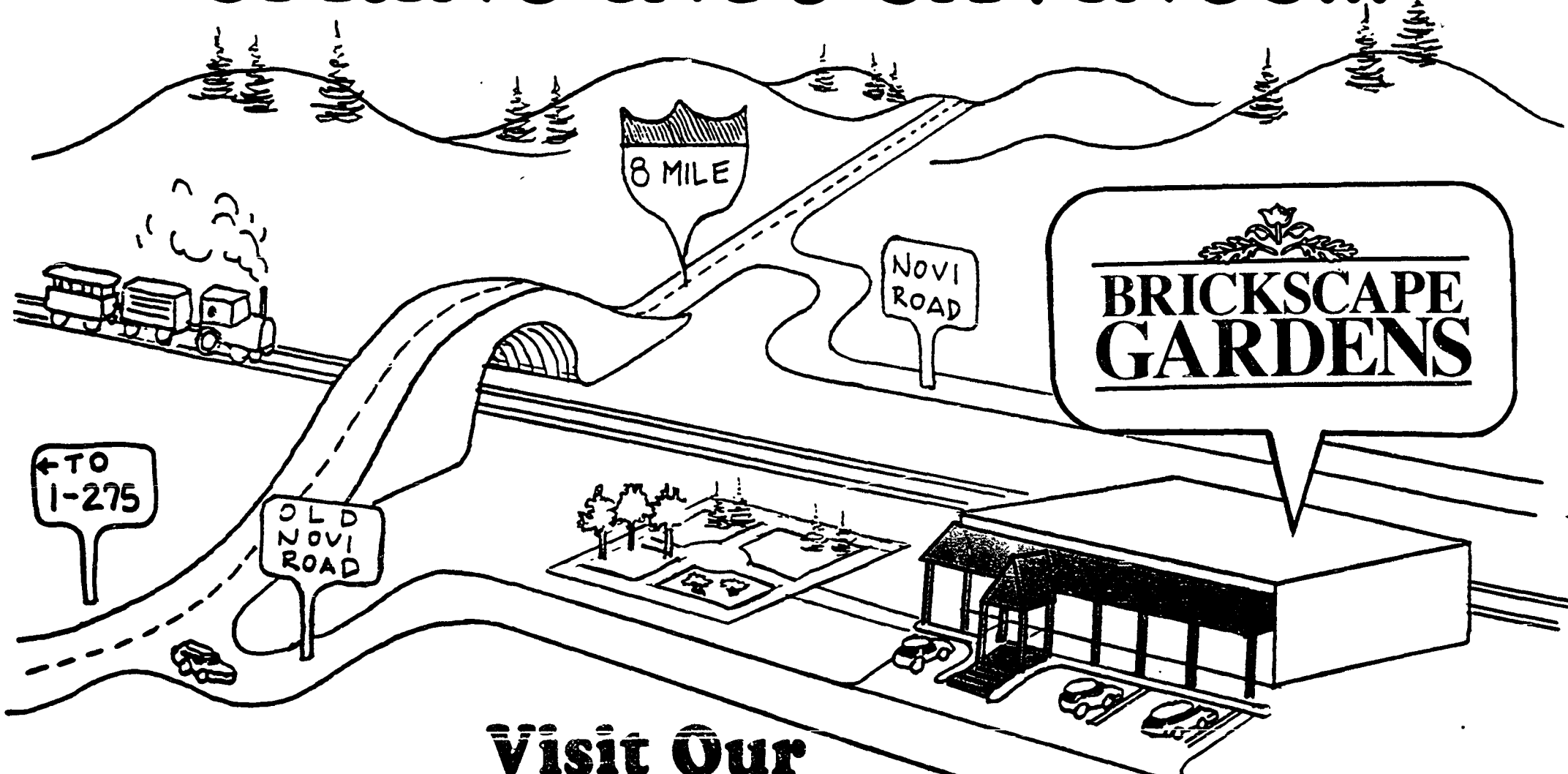
are valuable sources of polyunsaturated and monounsaturated fats.

Points to consider when buying a margarine or spread: The first ingredient listed on the carton should be a liquid vegetable oil. Always look for a higher percentage of polyunsaturated fat to saturated. A ratio of 3:1 or 2:1 is good. Choose tub margarine over stick. The tub has less fat because it is made with water, and less saturated fat is needed for soft brands.

Try legumes (dried beans and peas) as a main dish or a meat substitute for a very high-nutrition, low-fat, low-cost meal. Use brown rice instead of white, whole wheat pasta, and whole grain crackers instead of saltines.

When baking, use a little more vanilla and spices in a recipe. This will help cut down on sugar. The vanilla and spices give the impression of sweetness and have very few calories. Use some healthy substitutes to make your favorite recipes even better and more nutritious.

Organic garden relies on high-tech biology

If you've ever tasted home-grown vegetables you know they're worth the effort that goes into harvesting them. No salad can compare with the one made from fresh vegetables picked from your own garden. No tomato sauce tastes better than the one started from scratch.

This season, why not try a new wrinkle when growing vegetables: Grow a chemical-free vegetable garden. Modern science has not only created new, tastier vegetables, but also new products that make gardening without chemicals a breeze.

TASTY VEGETABLES

Through the use of biotechnology, scientists have been able to develop some exciting new vegetable varieties this season. Among them is "First Lady," a meaty tomato hybrid known for its great flavor. The right balance of sugars and acids is what makes First Lady

so tasty. Easy to grow and disease-resistant, this hybrid is ideal for home gardens.

New cucumber varieties also abound this season. One of the most impressive is the "H-19 Little Leaf." The H-19 is known for its nicely shaped, high quality cucumbers. Also disease-resistant, the H-19 produces not only in heat and drought, but will continue to grow even if the temperature dips below 40 degrees Fahrenheit.

A green leaf lettuce makes every vegetable garden complete. One of the better ones available today is the "Black Seeded Simpson." With a growing cycle of 48 days, this lettuce is one of the fastest growing of all green leaf varieties. Perfect for salads, the Black Seeded Simpson produces juicy, light green leaves that make it the most popular "loose-leaf" lettuce.

GETTING STARTED

Once you've chosen your vegetables, preparing the garden bed is the next step. There are several chemical-free ways to improve or "amend" your soil: Try using compost to supply nutrients, and peat moss to aerate and neutralize. Also, apply a garden fertilizer. An all-natural, organic mixture will add needed nutrients and prevent weed growth — without chemicals.

After you've treated the soil, it's time for the actual planting. If you're transplanting a potted or established plant into the garden, a few reminders will help. Make sure you set the roots deep enough into the soil (depth will vary for each variety); then water each plant thoroughly. For seeds, just follow the directions on the back of the seed pack for proper spacing and planting depth to ensure a healthy start.

After planting, you should use a new product called Fast Start. A lightweight fabric, the clear-covered Fast Start produces a greenhouse environment when placed over plants or seeds. Simply lay the fabric over the garden bed, allowing room for plant growth. Fast Start will block out insects and provide protection from light frost. What's more, sunlight and water will be able to penetrate through the fabric while it "warms" the soil below.

CONTROLLING WEEDS

But what do you do to prevent weeds from growing along with your vegetables?

Chemicals and sprays would do the trick — but not in this environmentally conscious garden. Try White Weedblock, a landscape fabric designed specifically for vegetable gardens. White Weedblock is molded with thou-

sands of tiny "microfunnels," which allow air and water through while blocking out 90 percent of the sunlight needed for weed growth. In addition, one of the fabric's unique features is that it's white-sided — so it reflects light onto the plant, and also deters certain insects.

Once the temperature outside reaches 65 degrees Fahrenheit, it's time to remove the Fast Start from atop the plants. Continue, however, to use the White Weedblock during the entire growing season.

From there, just water the plants as needed and watch them grow. In no time you'll have the juicy, tasty vegetables that'll perk up your fresh salads — and you won't have harmed the environment in the process.

Kerby's: home of original coneys

To some they are franks, others weiners, some sausages and for most hot dogs. But for metropolitan Detroiters they are coney islands.

This Detroit-area phenomenon was the brainchild of Greek immigrants Gus and Bill Keros, who after visiting Coney Island amusement park in New York, recognized endless possibilities for this tasty and interestingly shaped blend of meat.

They left the mustard, eliminated New York's flavored sauerkraut, replaced it with onions and chili and christened it with the name of the place which inspired it. They opened the Lafayette and American Coney Islands downtown. The doors were open 24 hours a day, and people frequented the restaurant around the clock, including before and after games, theater or family outings.

That was 80 years ago. Since then, coney islands have become as much a part of Detroit's restaurant landscape as fast-food burgers. It is Kerby's Koney Island, however, established in 1968, which many claim serves the Cadillac of coneys. This has become popular knowledge, so much so that many visiting celebrities, former Detroiters and out-of-towners alike, are known to wait in their cars while their chauffeurs come in to pick up an order of coneys.

One of the Kerby's chain is located in the West Oaks II shopping plaza in Novi.

A family business run by three Keros brothers — Vafi, Tim and Bill

(nephews of Gus and Bill) — Kerby's boasts 11 restaurants throughout Southeastern Michigan, with many located in area malls. They opened their first store at Tel-Twelve, in 1968. The business took off in unexpected ways, and the rest is history. "Coney islands," says Tim Keros, "are as Detroit as cars, Stroh's beer and Vernor's."

What many patrons don't know is that Kerby's makes quality its number-one priority. Consequently, many of the items served in the restaurants are custom made. "We created the recipe for our hot dog, which we manufacture," says Keros. The chili, which is sold wholesale to other businesses, and Greek salad dressing, are homespun recipes, which they produce as well. Actually the Detroit Chili Co., the factory which manufactures the chili, is owned and operated by the Keros as well.

The only item they market to the public is the distinctive dressing, used on several Kerby's menu items besides the Greek salads. "The truth is we are not in the dressing manu-

facturing business, but as a courtesy to our customers who kept asking to buy dressing to take home, we started to bottle and sell the dressing at our restaurants," says Keros. A 16-ounce squeeze bottle sells for \$1.75 and can be purchased at all Kerby locations.

The menu has grown, especially in recent years with a health-minded public asking for a wider variety of menu selections. "When we started out the options were coneys, bottled Coke and chili in a bowl," recalls Keros.

Greek salads, soups, grilled chicken sandwiches, vegetable-stuffed pitas, as well as the ever-popular gyros, are some of the items growing in popularity. Gyros (pronounced yerros) are prepared by broiling specially prepared ground lamb and beef on a vertical rotisserie.

Almost all the fat drips off the meat, which is then shaved and served with yogurt-cucumber dressing in a pocketless pita. Keros points out, "without the proper equipment, even my wife, one of the best Greek cooks I know, can't make this one at home."

Desserts including the famous Sanders' hot fudge sundae, another Detroit favorite, are becoming hot menu items for Kerby's, two of which are housed in former ice cream parlors. Greek desserts including baklava and rice pudding also are available.

Catering is another facet of the coney island business which has been developing over the last few years. Kerby's transports its restaurant wares to many catered affairs, including one held in the lobby of the Fisher Theatre in Detroit. "We once served 5,000 people coneys when the owners of an office complex held a tenant appreciation day," Keros says, beaming.

Besides being original and distinctive in their taste, Kerby's coneys are unique in their spelling. "My uncle coined the term 'coney island,' but everyone began using it. We wanted people to know that our coneys were different from all the rest so we re-created the spelling to convey the message," Keros explains.

The third generation has joined the Kerby team with many cousins already training and waiting in the wings to further the success of this growing family business. Will we be seeing Kerby's coneys and chili in supermarkets in the near future? "We don't have any immediate plans," says Keros, "but one thing I've learned in this business is never to say never."

Coney alternatives

SPINACH PIE

- 20 ounces fresh chopped spinach
- 6 green onions, chopped
- 1 small onion finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon dill weed
- 3 eggs
- 2 cups cottage cheese
- 1 ¼ cups crumbled feta cheese
- ¼ pound butter melted
- 15 sheets filo pastry

In a large saucepan saute onions in 2 tablespoons butter, stirring often until tender. Add spinach, salt, pepper and dill; cook over medium heat until liquid is absorbed.

Mix eggs and cheeses. Add cooked spinach. Butter a 9-by-13-inch baking pan. Place 9 filo sheets which have been brushed with butter in pan. Fold to fit if necessary. Cover with spinach-cheese mixture. Top with remaining 6 sheets, brushing each with butter.

Cut through top layers to mark piece. Bake at 350 for 45 minutes or until golden brown.

BAKLAVA

- 1 pound walnuts, chopped
- ¾ cup sugar
- 3 teaspoons cinnamon
- ¼ teaspoon cloves
- 1 pound filo pastry
- 1 pound butter melted
- Syrup — see recipe below

Combine nuts, sugar and spices. Place 6 filo sheets in a buttered 9-by-13-inch baking pan, folding the sheets to fit, and buttering each generously. Sprinkle a thin layer of nuts over filo. Cover with 4 buttered filo sheets. Continue, alternating filo butter and nuts until all nuts are used. Top with 8 buttered filo sheets. Cut into diamond shapes before baking.

Bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour or until golden brown. While pastry is baking prepare syrup.

Syrup

- 3 cups sugar
- 2 cups water
- 1 stick cinnamon
- Juice of half a lemon
- 2-3 teaspoons honey

Combine sugar, water, cinnamon stick and lemon juice. Boil gently for 15 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in honey. Pour warm syrup over hot baklava. Let stand 1 hour.

VEGETARIAN PITTA SANDWICH

- 2 pita rounds
- 1 cup shredded lettuce
- 6 tomato slices
- 6 strips green pepper ¼-inch thick
- 2 red onion slices
- ¼ cup feta cheese, crumbled
- Kerby's Greek or Yogurt-Cucumber dressing — see recipe below

Warm pitas in microwave or in skillet brushed with oil. Top each with half of vegetables. Sprinkle with feta and dressing. Fold each side inward and secure with a toothpick.

Yogurt-Cucumber Dressing

- 1½ cup yogurt
- 1 cup chopped cucumber
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1-2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 3 tablespoons parsley, minced

Combine all ingredients; blend well. Variation: substitute sour cream for yogurt.

Grapefruit is a great diet food providing only 32 calories per piece. They can be squeezed as oranges for their juice and yield ¼ - ¾ cup.

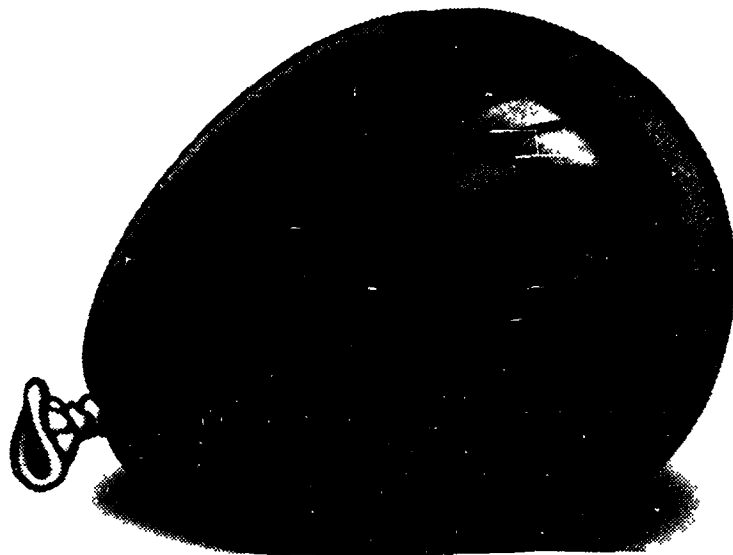
Some of my fondest memories include citrus, peeling an orange and eating it au naturel, or sectioning a

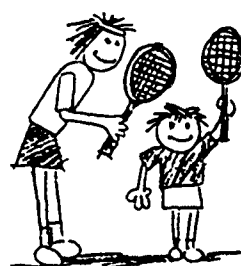

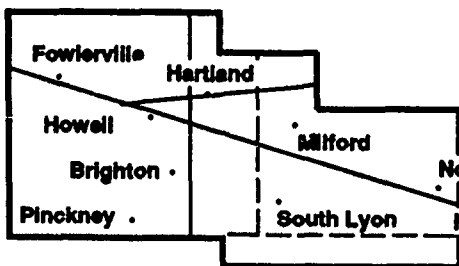

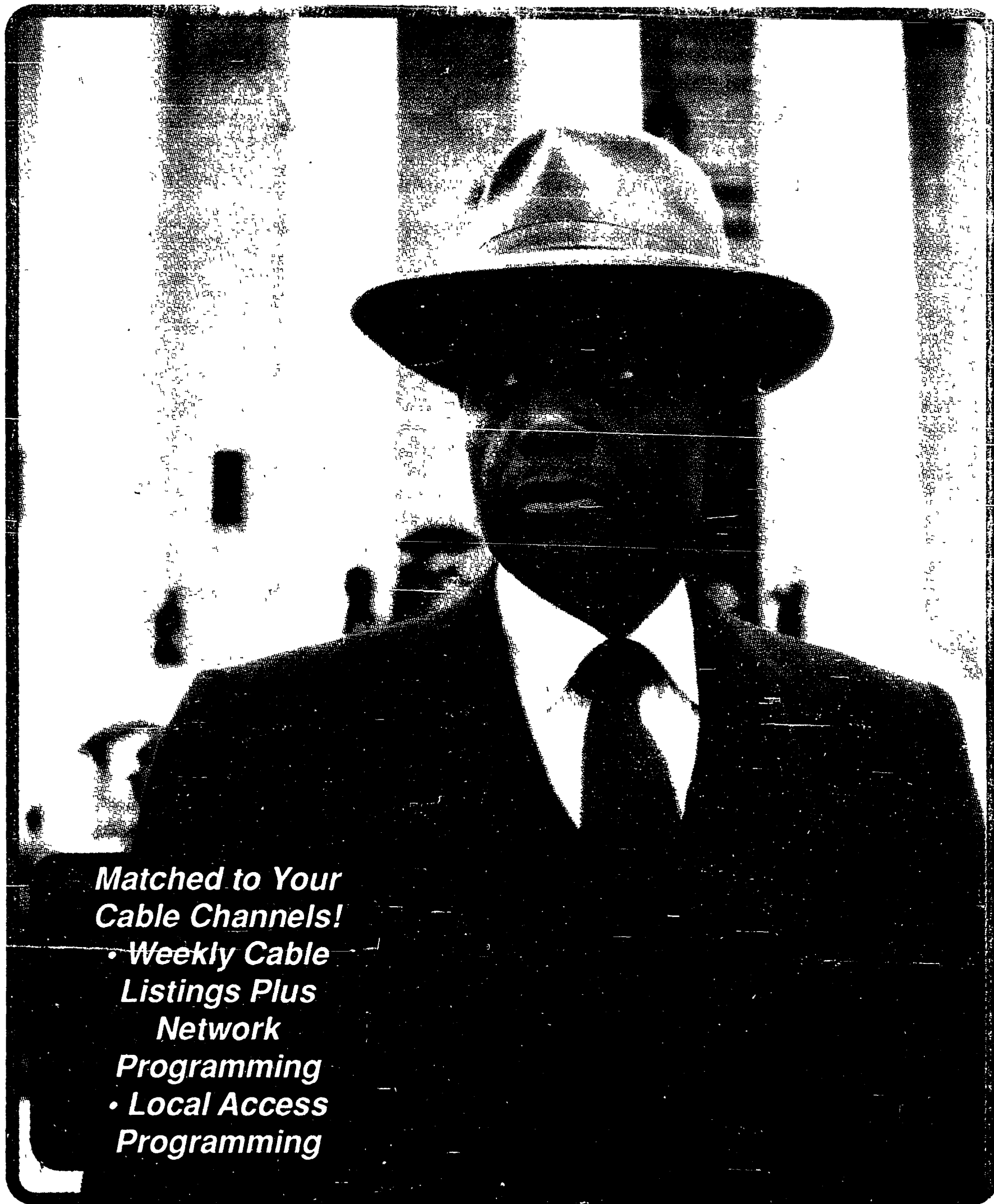

'Separate But Equal' a landmark TV movie

Poitier returns to TV after 35 years

Oscar winner Sidney Poitier returns to television for the first time in 35 years to star in ABC's miniseries "Separate But Equal," Sunday, April 7, and Monday, April 8.

"Separate But Equal" chronicles the events leading up to the U.S. Supreme Court's 1954 ruling on the landmark case "Brown vs. Board of Education." Brown vs. Board of Education declared racial segregation illegal and set the wheels in motion to integrate our nation's schools.

A young NAACP lawyer, earning a paltry \$3,000 annually, led the fight. That man is Thurgood Marshall, who was to become this nation's first and only black U.S. Supreme Court Justice.

Poitier portrays the young Marshall in "Separate But Equal." Co-starring is Burt Lancaster as Marshall's most formidable opponent John W. Davis. Davis, the 1924 Democratic Presidential candidate, was one of the country's most brilliant attorneys. (A footnote: Lancaster finished the project before suffering a stroke. He is now in therapy recovering.) Also starring is Richard Kiley, who portrays U.S. Supreme Court Chief

Justice Earl Warren.

Writer/producer/director George Stevens Jr. says he was inspired to write "Separate But Equal" after reading a yellowed newspaper clip from May of 1979. The clip was a column by James J. Kilpatrick, who said he vigorously opposed the Court's ruling in 1954, but 25 years later reflected that it was one of the most valid, important decisions ever made.

From the very beginning Stevens said he wanted Poitier for the lead in "Separate But Equal": "I had been told Mr. Poitier does not do television. I went to see him, and I told him what I had in mind, and in that princely fashion of his, he looked at me and said, 'I do not do television. But if you come up with a compelling script, this is something I would like to do,' " tells Stevens. "Time passed, and the script was finished, and I sent it to him. He called and said, 'This is something I must be apart of.' "

Throughout his career, Poitier has portrayed people in racial confrontations. In his Oscar-nominated role in "The Defiant Ones," for example, he and Tony Curtis played prejudiced prisoners shackled together and forced to solve their racial differences. Other memorable performances have included "To Sir, With Love," "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner,"

"In the Heat of the Night" and "A Raisin in the Sun."

"I cannot work unless there is an affinity with the material," says Poitier. "I just have to feel something about it. That was my criteria, and that will be in the future."

When Thurgood Marshall found out Poitier was to portray him, the 82-year-old Justice wanted to buy him lunch. "It was quite an experience because, you know, he is not as spry as he used to be and he moves with great difficulty," says Poitier. "Every time I tried to help him he would thank me, but he liked to move under his own steam, however slowly. It was to me an example of innate courage that is part of his personality."

"I think it's one of the misfortunes of our times that we have a great deal of celebrities around us, but very few genuine heroes," continues Poitier. "Thurgood Marshall is a genuine American hero."

Actor Sidney Poitier returns to the screen for the first time in 35 years when he stars in the ABC miniseries "Separate But Equal." The dramatic chronicles the landmark Supreme Court case which desegregated schools. Burt Lancaster co-stars.

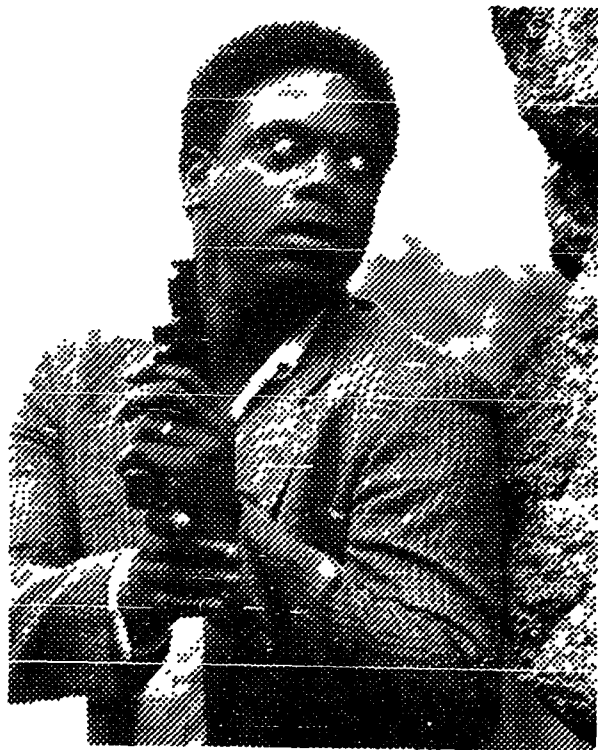

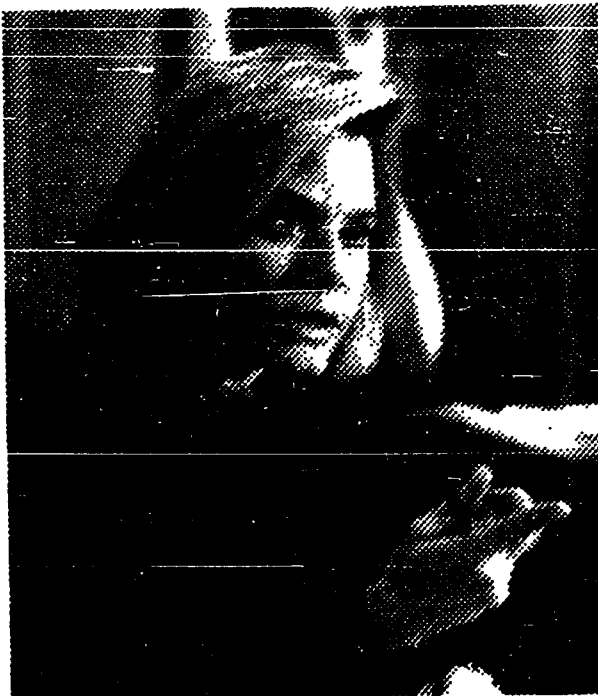
Several main cast members leaving 'L.A. Law' at season's end
