Best Fourth of July slated

If everybody loves a parade, then this year's Fourth of July procession through downtown Northville will really turn some heads.

Patriotic fervor may reach an all-time high as the parade is combined with a coming-home celebration for the U.S. troops that served in Operation Desert Storm.

Mayor Chris Johnson said the celebration already has a long guest list. "It looks as though we're going to be expanding on the parade quite a bit by inviting most of the area's military support groups, their families and of course the servicemen and women," he said. "The theme ... will be Operation Homecoming."

Johnson met Wednesday with Ginny Hathhorn, co-founder of the West Side Chapter of the Michigan Military Family Support Group, Bob Cummings of the Northville Jaycees and other community leaders to plan a strategy for the celebration. "Most important was to set up the time and location, and those are set now," he said.

The annual Fourth of July parade will start at 10 a.m. on South Main Street this year and march west on Main Street, to leave Northville Downs free to set up the tribute program. From there the parade will follow its traditional route to Rogers, south on Rogers to Cady, east on Cady to Wing Street, south again to Fairbrook and east to Northville Downs.

The parade will be capped off by a tribute to the troops featuring speakers and singing groups outside Northville Downs.

The hourlong tribute will begin at noon.

The Northville Jaycees are still planning to host the Mill Race barbecue and fireworks display, though plans have not been finalized. "At this point, we're still planning on a parade, barbecue and fireworks, but that may change," said Jaycee Teresa Folino.

Other potential Fourth of July activities include the annual bed race, decorated bicycle contest and a fly-by by military jets.

The Downtown Merchants' Association and other local groups are planning several fundraising efforts to pay for the celebration.

The Fourth of July falls on a Thursday this year.

HOME AT LAST

Northville service person returns

You could call him a victim of advertising. But when Craig Hicks was challenged to be all that he could be, the fact that the challenge was coming from a television didn't bother him.

Hicks just returned to Northville from the war in the Persian Gulf. He joined the Army as a high school senior.

Over two years ago, Hicks was watching television with his friend, Chris Parker, and an Army advertisement came on.

Parker and Hicks decided to get an edge on life and immediately joined the Army.

"Two weeks later we were in the service," Parker said.

And a trend in their Lake Orion high school was begun.

"It started a big thing. A lot of our friends joined," Hicks said.

Since enlisting, Hicks has seen his share of excitement.

A member of the 82nd Airborne, he has jumped out of an airplane into Honduras and Panama.

He can now add Saudi Arabia to his list of countries visited, although on arrival in the Middle East he exited the plane the old-fashioned way, after it landed.

Hicks is a combat engineer. To the layperson, that means he explodes mine fields before an unsuspecting American soldier can step on one.

When asked what led him to such a career choice, he answers that the job offered a chance to jump out of airplanes.

"I knew I wanted to go airborne; I wanted to jump out of airplanes," Hicks said.

Hicks, 21, moved three times during high school, living in Lake Orion, Farmington Hills and Georgia.

Northville is home to Hicks now. His mother, Sherry Harper, owns Hot Spot, an aerobics and tanning shop in Northville.

Harper, 11 other family members and friends, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 4012 met Hicks when he arrived at Detroit Metro Airport last Wednesday.

The reunion turned into a celebration when Hicks and his entourage left the airport in two limosines drinking champagne and beer.

Among those meeting to greet Hicks was 2-year-old Broc Chaiker. "Every letter I got, I heard about Broc," Hicks said.

But he was not able to see the new member of his family until Wednesday.

Hicks will be on leave from the Army for 30 days, but the entire vacation won't be fun and festivities.

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Township to oppose new group home

Northville Township will challenge a state attempt to place a group home for six developmentally disabled adults in the Highland Lakes subdivision.

The township will petition Wayne County Circuit Court this week seeking injunctive relief against a group home application for a residence at 19749 Scenic Harbour, township attorney Ernest Essad said Thursday.

The township board on Thursday also unanimously voted to provide a negative response to a state group home license application. The board's action culminated an uproarious public hearing attended by an overflow crowd predominated by Highland Lakes residents.

State agencies want to move the group home from an aged two-story frame house at 42777 Eight Mile Road to the Scenic Harbour site because they say a newer facility is needed to house six developmentally disabled adult males.

But township officials said the proposed move would constitute "excessive concentration" of state-licensed facilities in the area. The township's claim is based on the presence of a day care center operating at 41316 Windsor Court.

The day care center is a state-licensed facility located less than 1,500 feet from the proposed Scenic Harbour group home site.

Two state facilities positioned that closely could violate state law.

Michigan Act 29 pertains to townships and states in part: "A state licensing agency shall not license a proposed residential facility when another state-licensed residential facility exists within the 1,500-foot radius, unless permitted by local zoning ordinances, of the proposed location or when the issuance of the license would substantially contribute to an excessive concentration of state-licensed residential facilities within ... the township."

Essad called the proximity of the day care center and the proposed group home potential "a per se violation of state law."

The township must forward its official response to the state by April 9. Failure to do so would mean the township automatically forfeits any opposition to the application.

The township may face an uphill climb in its attempt to block the group home relocation.

"Nobody has ever attempted to define excessive concentration (but) it's easier to stop a license from getting issued than to get one revoked," Essad said.

A stream of township residents spoke out against the proposed move to Scenic Harbour. Leigh Lane resident Judy Hanson struck a common chord when she said group home residents faced potential danger from

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Track's figures decrease slightly

Nearly as many people walked through the gates at Northville Downs this racing season as last, but they did not reach as deeply into their pockets.

Total wagering and attendance dropped slightly this season, with attendance down less than 1 percent and the amount of money bet down more than 3 percent.

Last year's total wagering had been the first increase at Northville Downs in five years. The racetrack had posted a total "handle," or amount of money bet, of \$79,141,726 during the 1989-1990 season.

That amount was a 4.3-percent increase over the previous year's handle.

The yearly handle at the track had been declining since the 1985-1986 season, when the track took in a record \$89,370,335 in wagers.

Executive Manager Margaret Zayti attributed last year's handle and attendance growth to a number of factors, including the opening of 1-696 and \$2 million in renovations to the racetrack in the last two years. The grandstand has been refloored and refurbished and its 3,000 seats were replaced in 1989. A new tote board and driver's lounge were also installed. Last year, the racetrack's clubhouse was remodeled and new lighting installed.

Zayti blamed this year's drop on the weather, the Persian Gulf war and recession fears. "The month of January we had three bad weekends and we were down 20 percent," she said.

"We were making that up and then came the war — everybody was home watching TV. But I think the recession had something to do with it, too. All the tracks all through the U.S. are down about 10 percent."

The Jackson at Northville met fared somewhat better in attendance this year but worse in overall wagering. "We were down just a little over a percent in handle but we were up two percent in attendance," said Joyce Schultz, controller and office manager at Jackson Harness Raceway.

"The people may have been there but they didn't have the money to spend," she said.

This season's Jackson at Northville meet ran from Oct. 15 to Dec. 31, while the Northville Downs meet ran from Jan. 4 to March 30. Overall, people placed \$76,487,109 in wagers.

The newly renovated Northville Downs drew 391,059 people this season, an average of 2,607 people each of the 146 days the track was open. The average person bet just under \$196 a night.

A total of 393,794 people walked through the gates last year, averaging 2,773 people each of the track's 142 race days. The average person last year bet just over \$200 a night.

Graham accepts South Lyon post

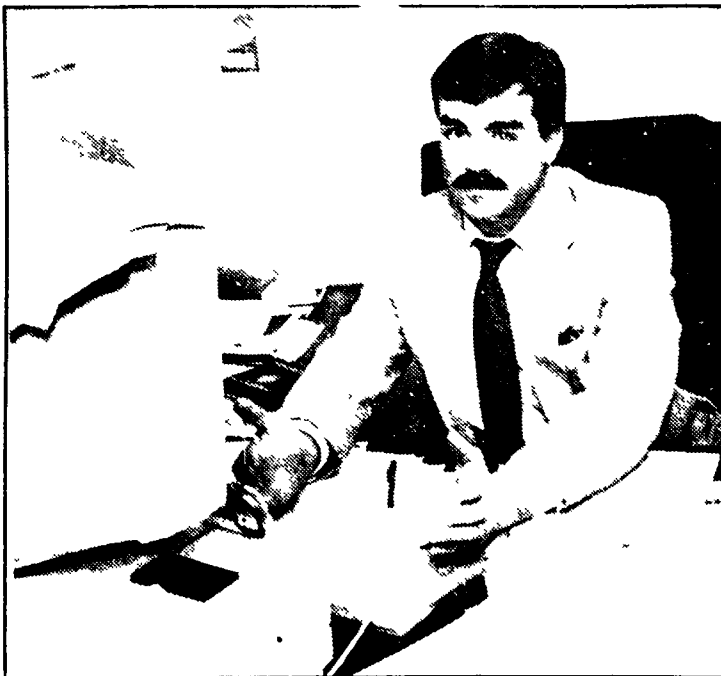

The end of April is the end of the line for a valued Northville Township employee.

Finance Director James Graham will bid farewell to township co-workers April 26 to ready himself for a position with South Lyon Public Schools.

Graham, 29, last week informed township Supervisor Georgina Goss that he had accepted the role of manager of business services with South Lyon schools.

He will begin his tenure with the schools April 29.

Graham was hired by the township in 1986 to shore up township financial matters. A graduate of Central Michigan University who is nearing an MBA with Eastern Michigan University, Graham twice filled vacancies in the township manager position.

The switch from local government to public school administration should be challenging, but not overly difficult, Graham said.

"There are parallels between government and schools," he said. "The

job requirements were almost identically matched."

And Graham has long felt an attraction to the educational process. "I've always had a desire to help youths," he said. "For 10 summers in a row, I've either been a camp counselor or a playground director. I've been involved with Northville Youth Assistance."

"Hopefully, I will be able to do that in this position," he said.

Graham, a South Lyon resident, said his school duties will include budgeting, managing funds and investments, and overseeing the school's accounting system.

"The new challenges are exciting," he said.

Graham said he was "real fortunate" to get the finance director's job in 1986. He came of age soon after, when township manager Bruno Scacchitti was killed in an automobile accident. The tragedy forced extra duties on Graham, who thrived with the additional chores.

"I had only been here seven months when the manager was killed," he said. "We split (his) duties

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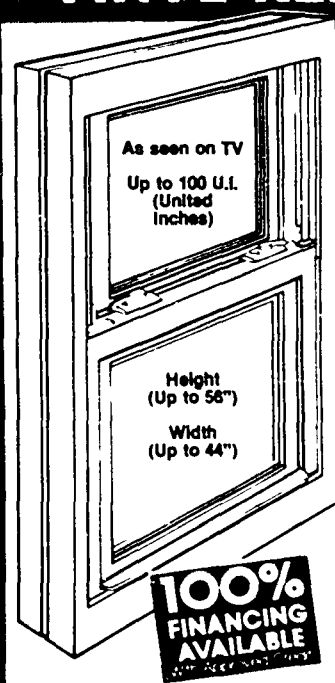

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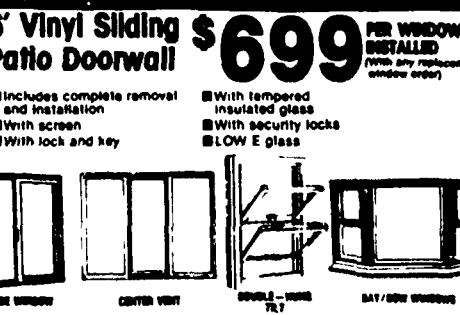
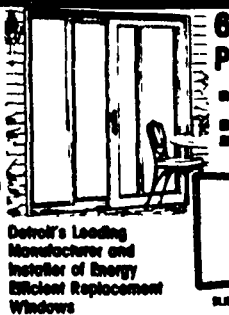

Group discusses party laws

The Northville Action Council met March 21 to discuss the possibility of pushing for an ordinance against persons under 21 holding parties with alcoholic beverages.

However, several police representatives at the meeting said outlawing such parties would make little difference.

The meeting came shortly after a teen-ager's party in Northville Township led to over \$40,000 damage when it got out of hand. The party took place while the parents were away on vacation.

"I guess the thing that scares me about that is that there was such malicious disregard for other peoples' property," said Jacques Martin-Downs, a member of the group who had introduced the idea of seeking such an ordinance shortly before the party occurred.

Martin-Downs said she had hoped the teen-ager's mother could speak to the group, but that she was "distracted and having a lot of difficulty rectifying the situation with her daughter."

"These kids were trying to laugh this off, but now that the police are involved they're getting a little nervous, and they should be nervous," she said.

The NAC examined a Farmington Hills ordinance that would hold parents or children over the age of 17 accountable for the party, and would levy fines up to \$500 or jail terms of up to 90 days for such parties.

That ordinance holds the parents of teen-agers under 17 accountable for such parties, unless the parents took "reasonable steps to prevent the possession, or of consumption of alcoholic liquor or unlawful controlled substance at the residence or premises."

Northville city Det. Sgt. David Fendelet told the group he didn't think such an ordinance was necessary in Northville.

"If we had this on the book, they'd still have parties," he said. "It doesn't seem to sit in my mind that it would matter."

However, he added, "Parents might have better memory recall to an ordinance like that. A young adult wouldn't remember or wouldn't care."

Fendelet said such parties are generally broken up by police in Northville when a call is made by a neighbor.

Once the door is open, he explained, if police see anything illegal going on inside, they can legally enter the house.

"There has to be a violation of some sort, and it has to be observed," he said.

Fendelet said the ordinance developed in Farmington Hills "because there was a serious problem. They were reactive. That doesn't mean we shouldn't be proactive. But we don't really have a problem here."

NAC member Roxanne Casterline disagreed. "I'm not so sure we don't have a problem," she said. "Maybe we're just not as verbal in this community. Maybe people aren't as willing to talk about it here as they are in Farmington Hills."

Novi Police Juvenile Detective John Zimmer also told the group he didn't believe such an ordinance would be effective.

"What are you going to do? Outlaw parties?" he asked. "An ordinance is not going to stop people from having parties."

Zimmer said he believes a set of ordinances against behavior often observed at out-of-control parties, such as fighting, is a good way to break up parties.

"You start looking for someone to violate the law in any way, to break up the party," he said. "Every city has an offense section in the ordinance (book) and a police officer can apply those ordinances."

"You can't legislate parties out of existence," he said. "But we can stop people from having loud parties. We can stop kids under 21 from having alcohol at parties."

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Divisions include: Men and women under 20, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49, 50-59, 60 and over.

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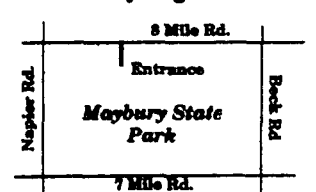

Seven members of Hicks' company died when clearing a minefield in Saudi Arabia. One was a friend.

"I've learned a lot about life and how quick it can end," he said.

Unlike some returning soldiers, Hicks reported little boredom during his stay in Saudi Arabia. Training and frequent relocations kept his company busy.

Hicks was also kept busy reading

letters and opening packages from his family and friends, although he suspects some of the mail he should have received was lost. His letter collection was enhanced by his sisters, Kristen and Lauren Harper, who got their Silver Springs Elementary School class involved in sending letters.

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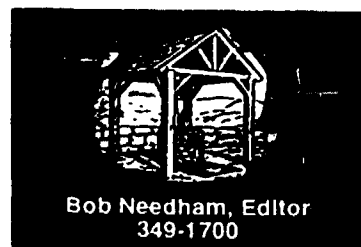

CBN plan would mean chaos for the schools

The latest campaign of Citizens for a Better Northville (a misnomer if we've ever heard one) focuses the group's attention squarely on the school district, after previous efforts aimed at the city and the township. This time around, CBN takes on the very structure of local government, offering a proposal to dramatically change school funding locally. And this change would be a horrible mistake.

CBN wants Northville to abandon the traditional system of residents voting a millage and the school board deciding what to do with it. The new plan would pass the spending authority on to the voters as well.

The district would present spending proposals in each of 10 areas, including things like athletics, transportation, and teacher salaries. Voters would consider each item separately. Those that passed would receive funding; those that did not pass would be out of luck, at least for a time. The district could then return with revised proposals or simply do without.

Maybe this sounds like a great idea at first; more power to the people paying the bills. That's CBN's goal.

The actual result, however, will more likely be complete chaos in the school system.

Picture the way this system would likely run. First, many parents might be tempted to vote only for aspects of the system which directly affect their own children. Non-parents, not having the inclination to become informed in detail about which proposal goes for what, may well vote against all 10 parts. That could result in a much weaker, and much lower quality, school system.

Some items the schools could, conceivably, get by without. Losing all athletics, for example, would be a major blow, but basic education could continue.

Others, however, are essential. If the people who go to the polls happen to think that buses cost too much, the entire transportation system gets decimated. Many kids might not be able to get to school. The district administration puts together a revised proposal, but what happens in the meantime?

Other costs are basically fixed. Teacher salaries come about through a process of contract negotiation. What if voters decide teachers get paid too much? There will suddenly be no money available to pay them, but the district is locked into paying them a certain amount, under the terms of a legal agreement. This type of conflict could only end up in court, and, of course, the voters would end up paying the legal bills.

Similarly, the state requires the district to provide some programs, such as special education. CBN argues the amount of money spent on such things, however, is largely discretionary. Even if that's true, we again run into a problem: Until the district comes up with a figure voters find acceptable, there is no spending at all on these state-required items.

And what if the district never floats a voter-acceptable figure? Back to court we go.

Then consider the logistics of voters facing 10 different millage proposals just for schools. It's difficult enough to stay informed on a single proposal; 10 times the research is a ridiculous thing to ask of the average citizen.

In reality, only a very few people can possibly become informed enough to cast reasonable votes on every individual item. And we've already got that. They're collectively called the school board, and they're doing a fine job.

The impossibility of direct citizen involvement in every public decision gives rise to our whole system of representative government. The people cannot reasonably keep up total involvement; that's why they elect like-minded representatives to look out for their interests. It's a system which has worked relatively well for the past 200-plus years, and we do not think Citizens for a Better Northville has a better idea.

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Township seeks director

It won't be an easy task to fill township Finance Director Jim Graham's ample shoes.

Graham was the finished product; an employee polished by five year's experience in township government, Manager Richard Henningsen said last Thursday.

And now the training process begins anew.

Graham recently announced his resignation — effective April 26 — to

take a job with South Lyon Public Schools.

Financial restrictions will force the township to seek less experienced talent, Henningsen said. The township may even have to dip into the ranks of recent college graduates to fill Graham's slot, he said.

Henningsen said the township posted an opening Friday for a finance director. The township will advertise in the daily Detroit newspapers, local papers and through local college campus job networks.

The township is seeking candidates with a four-year degree in ac-

counting, preferably with a CPA certificate, Henningsen said. A graduate degree is "not completely necessary," he said.

"I'm primarily interested in an accounting major," said Henningsen, who said the salary level for the department head position begins at \$28,000 to "a level depending on education and qualifications."

Interested applicants should send resumes to the township by April 26, Henningsen said. A decision on the finance director position should be finalized "sometime on or before May 15," he said.

(and) I had the task of finishing the budget.

three lakes near the proposed site. "Does somebody have to drown again?" she asked, referring to a 1975 incident in which a Northville State Hospital patient died when he attempted to swim across Swan Harbour Lake.

Other residents questioned the compatibility of the group home and subdivision single family zoning. Some blasted the "secretive" nature of the state's home selection process and the inability to gain information on their potential new neighbors.

"Right now I have no idea of the mental capacity of (the group home residents)," said Scenic Harbour resident Allen Huard. "How do I deal with one of them...?"

Still others expressed concern over criminal conduct allegations that have swirled around the Eight Mile Road group home.

Township police responded to eight incidents of criminal conduct at the group home since June 1989. Incidents included allegations of criminal sexual assault, larceny and assault, according to police reports.

In all instances, residents of the home were victims of crimes perpetrated by employees, township police Chief Chip Snider said.

Barbara Stevens, Department of Social Services Adult Foster Care Licensing Consultant, was the lone state representative to attend the public hearing. Stevens reviews applications and possible group home sites.

Stevens explained that a 10-year lease on the Eight Mile Road home is near expiration. The DSS's role is to review potential group home sites after they have been identified by other state agencies, she said.

"The Department of Social Services has nothing to do with site selection," she said. "In this case... Wayne Community Living Services found the (Scenic Harbour) home. (They) have to have an address before they even apply."

Wayne Community Living Services is a branch of the state Department of Mental Health and is located at 15480 Sheldon Road. The agency's role, in part, is to locate group home sites.

Stevens said the Scenic Harbour

residence was purchased by a private party in December 1990. A designated operator, Life Center, 15419 Middlebelt, Livonia, intends to lease the home to the state, if the application is approved.

"We'll evaluate (the) site after we receive a zoning response from this community," said Stevens, who said she has reviewed the proposed Scenic Harbour residence. "I'm aware of the physical proximity of the home to lakes and streets."

Stevens did not say how long it would take to conclude the application evaluation process.

"The application approval length varies," she said. "(We're) not under any particular time length."

Trustee Richard Allen summed up the mood of the township board.

"We all agree (the group home) is an improper use of zoning," he said. "The state took that right away from us."

Allen called the state licensing process "a sham, in a sense" because local officials "take the flak but can't do anything about it."

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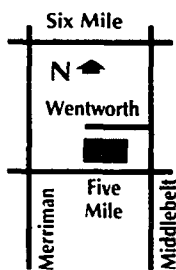
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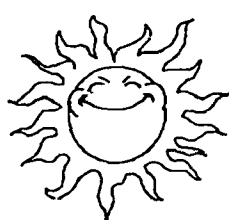
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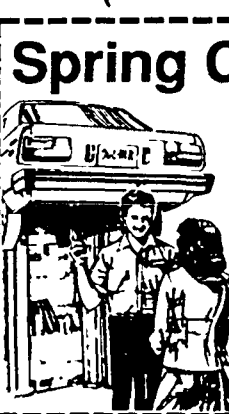

Wine pricing is simple matter of economics

One of the simple pleasures of life is enjoying a glass of wine with a meal. The pleasure is multiplied several times when the wine is an inexpensive little treasure that you've discovered at a shop or on a restaurant wine list. Everyone who enjoys wine searches the wine bins in hopes of finding a gem or two.

What makes some wines so expensive? Part of the answer is based on economics — supply and demand. When asked about the price of his wines, a champagne producer once told us that if a shoe salesman had two pairs of shoes and three ladies walked into his shop, he would have to raise the price until one of them decided to leave.

The great wines of the world have generally had hundreds of years to build a reputation that demands a high price. Burgundy, Bordeaux and Champagne are at the top of the list. Names like Chateau Margaux, Chateau Latour, Domaine de la Romanee Conti, Krug, Taittinger and Roederer have taken care to produce consistently top-quality wines.

Recently, the power of the wine press has elevated some wines to celebrity status. The enthusiastic journalist of Robert Parker Jr., editor/publisher of *The Wine Advocate*, lifted the great Cote Rotie producer E. Guigal to star status. Since these wines were "Parkerized," the rarest of Guigal's wines now fetch twice the price of Chateau Lafite.

The phenomenon of instant acclaim has also touched some California wineries. When *The Wine Spectator* selected the 1985 Caymus Vineyard Special Selection Cabernet Sauvignon as the best of 100 outstanding wines, the price of the wine doubled.

When Robert Parker gave the 1985 Groth Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon a score of 100 points, not only did the price double, but it became scarce. The 1986 Groth Reserve (\$50) and 1986 Caymus Special Selection (\$75) are now doled out with a one-bottle-per-person limit.

If you could find and afford these wines, when would you drink them? Bruno Prats, owner of Chateau Cos D'Estournel, a super second-growth Bordeaux, drinks his Chateau wines only on special occasions.

"I decided to make a value wine that I could afford to drink at home, with my family, on a daily basis," Prats explains. "When I decided to market my house wine, Maitre D'Estournel (\$9.75), the consumer recognized it as a flavorful wine for the money."

There are many wines on the market that present flavor and value. We recently tasted 30 of the wines of Chile and Australia at Royal Oak's Les Auteurs restaurant. We were impressed by the number of tasty, inexpensive wines from these Lands Down Under (see Wine Selections of the Week).

Les Auteurs presents monthly wine tastings that feature great food as well as wine. The next tasting, "Pinot Envy," will be held on Wednesday, April 24 from 7-9 p.m. for \$25 in advance or \$30 at the door. American pinot blanc, pinot gris and pinot noir wines will be featured. You can get more information or make reservations by phoning 544-2887.

WINE SELECTIONS OF THE WEEK

From a recent tasting of Australian and Chilean wines, one of the best chardonnays for the money is the 1989 Penfolds Chardonnay, Australia (\$10.75). It boasts great fruit with balanced oak and a touch of butter. Other white wines with merit include: 1989 Santa Rita Reserve Sauvignon Blanc, Chile (\$8.25); 1990 Undurraga Sauvignon Blanc, Chile (\$5.50); and 1988 Lindeman's "Bin 77" Semillon/Chardonnay, Australia (\$9.50).

Of the red wines tasted, the 1988 Rosemount Shiraz, Australia (\$9.75) focuses on bright fruit with peppery accents and a rich, smooth finish. Other attractive reds are the 1988 Santa Carolina "Santa Rosa Vineyard" Cabernet Sauvignon, Chile (\$7.50); 1984 Cousino-Macul "Antiguas Reservas" Cabernet Sauvignon, Chile (\$9.75); 1988 Undurraga Cabernet Sauvignon, Chile (\$5.50); 1987 Tyrrell's "Long Flat Red," Australia (\$7.25); 1988 Tynrell's Great Merlot, Chile (\$5.00); and 1987 San Martin Cabernet Sauvignon, Chile (\$5.75).

The Saucier's Apprentice

Use a juicer for healthier sauces

Today's trend-setting chefs are adding flavor and subtracting fat with sauce sorcery. This is the first of a two-part series focusing on different approaches to healthier sauces.

Tracy Ritter is grinning.

"A lot of people have the idea that vegetable juices are bad, heavy and thick," says the young, animated chef of the Golden Door Spa in Escondido, Calif.

"But they can really be delicious," she adds, relaxing into a broad smile. "For instance, a tomato vinaigrette is nice with a green bean salad, and a beet vinaigrette flavored with fennel can be served with asparagus and golden beets. It's nice to use vegetable juices with vegetables. It tastes good."

Twenty years ago, when French chef Paul Bocuse scrapped traditional flour-based sauces and created the sheer, buttery ponds of nouvelle cuisine, we all thought he had given the coup de grace to the rich, velvety sauces of French cuisine.

But in fact, Bocuse merely fired the first volley.

Today, young chefs such as Ritter are gaining national notoriety by adding flavor and subtracting fat from sauces.

While most chefs dabble in new sauces to stay trendy, Ritter has another concern: health.

"At the Golden Door, I have a double whammy: I have to be low-fat and low-calorie. So I constantly need to develop new recipes that are traditionally sound but exciting and healthy. I use classical French techniques but use vegetable juices and purees where there would normally be butter and cream."

A graduate of the French Culinary Institute and a veteran of 12 years in New York City restaurants, Ritter is known for her straight-from-the-garden creations.

Surrounded by carrots ("we just yanked them out of the back yard this morning"), multicolored bell peppers, cucumbers, squashes, spinach, pineapple, tomatoes, basil and dill, she sets to work.

"It's best to use a juicer, because then you can use raw vegetables," Ritter explains, guiding fat carrots through her trusty old Champion juicer. "You can use a blender, but the vegetables need to be blanched first. You can use a microwave to do that, which keeps the flavor and nutrients in."

Bright orange liquid froths into a bowl under the juicer, and Ritter scoops out the dry, fluffy pulp, setting it aside for garnish on a green salad.

"Now we can take this juice, or any vegetable juice, and make it into a sauce by adding vinegar or a little water, the juice the vegetable was steamed in, stock or a touch of oil, along with herbs and spices" she says. "It's as healthy as you can get."

Ritter feeds plump, yellow squash into the juicer, and minutes later the kitchen is filled with the aroma of their juice simmering with lemon juice, thyme-infused olive oil and cayenne pepper. The sheer sauce, the very essence of summer squash, will bring out the best in seared scallops.

She drops steamed spinach into the machine. Out comes a vivid green liquid. Pineapple chunks go next; their juice will be mixed with the spinach juice, fresh mint, salt and pepper and used atop grilled salmon.

Large tomatoes, warm and aromatic, are up next. Ritter's tomato vinaigrette, made with rice wine vinegar and fresh basil but without a drop of oil, is one of her favorite creations.

"We experiment every day," she says with the glee of a schoolgirl. "We call them our science projects."

Those science projects also yielded a refreshing cucumber sauce made creamy with low-fat cottage cheese ("great on pasta, poached fish and grilled poultry"), a snappy lime-peach vinaigrette for cold seafood and steamed vegetables, and an oil-free tomato pesto made with sun-dried tomatoes, garlic and Balsamic vinegar.

Ritter says the newest wave of sauces is a natural progression in the revolution that started with nouvelle cuisine almost 20 years ago. (Even the word "sauce" is being replaced by such terms as "coulis," a liquid puree, "concasse," finely chopped vegetable pulp, "puree," "vinaigrette" and "infusions.")

"Originally, we had heavy stocks and roux-based (flour

and butter) sauces; then we lightened up for nouvelle cuisine with cream sauces that still had fat but at least you could taste the food underneath them. Then there were vinaigrettes, which came from California cuisine. Now people want something even lighter," she says.

And Ritter is out to deliver what they want — vegetable juices, salsas, chutneys, bouillions, broths, vinaigrettes and oil infusions.

"There's a lot of play with all of this right now," she says. "My guess is that in five years, you won't see beurre blancs and cream sauces anymore, not even in the old restaurants."

The revolution goes on, but it's already clear who's winning: everyone who wants to stay fit while eating more flavorful food.

Here are some tasty, low-fat recipes developed by Ritter.

SEARED SEA SCALLOPS WITH YELLOW SQUASH SAUCE

1 1/2 cups yellow squash or zucchini juice
2 tablespoons thyme-infused olive oil
1 teaspoon lemon juice, freshly squeezed
salt and freshly ground black pepper
pinch cayenne pepper
non-stick vegetable spray
16 sea scallops, cleaned
freshly ground white pepper
1/2 cup fish stock or low-sodium clam juice

pinch freshly ground nutmeg
fresh thyme leaves for garnish
Yields four servings.

Juice squash in juicer to make 1 1/2 cups. Heat skillet and add squash juice, olive oil, lemon juice, salt, pepper and cayenne. Bring to a boil. Reduce immediately to simmer and stir constantly. Sauce will thicken slowly.

Meanwhile, heat skillet very hot. Spray with vegetable spray. Season sea scallops with salt and pepper and sear on one side. Turn over, sear and add fish stock. Bring to boil and cook for one to two minutes more until done. Sea scallops should be slightly translucent.

Place small amount of yellow squash sauce in center of plate. Arrange four sea scallops in sauce "puddle." Grate tiny amount of nutmeg over each dish and garnish with fresh thyme leaves.

CREAMY CUCUMBER-BASIL SAUCE

1 hothouse cucumber, washed and seeded
1/2 cup low-fat cottage cheese
2 tablespoons fresh basil, chopped
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon rice wine vinegar
Yields about two cups.

Place all ingredients in high-power blender and blend until smooth and creamy. Serve with pasta, grilled poultry and seafood, poached fish such as salmon.

Your cooking is crying out for some onions

The onion and its relatives — leek, scallion, shallot and garlic — come in a large number of varieties and are indispensable as seasonings and vegetables.

The onion is probably one of the oldest cultivated vegetables. Ancient Egyptians revered the onion as a symbol of eternity and fed raw onions to the builders of the Great Pyramids to provide workers with strength. An onion was carried into King Tut's tomb as a farewell offering. In Medieval Europe onions were considered so valuable that they were given for wedding gifts and used for rent. The rent sounds fair, but a wedding gift? I wouldn't be too happy.

Onions have been believed to possess medicinal qualities throughout time. A book written in 1596 claimed onions could cure baldness, colds, bad complexion, rid the body of arthritis and help with digestion. The truth of these proclamations is questionable.

However, modern scientists are substantiating medical findings that prove onions supply health-protecting chemicals which contribute to a healthy heart and circulatory system. Many experiments and studies have been conducted that prove the onion's ability to lower blood

pressure and help stop blood clotting.

I am not recommending that you give up your heart or anti-blood-clotting medicine in favor of onions, but with only 60 calories, no fat or cholesterol, a source of vitamin C, B6, potassium and other minerals, it surely can't hurt to augment your diet with a few extra onions here or there.

It matters not if onions are cooked or raw to produce the same cholesterol-lowering effect. Because the onion is a member of the lily family it possesses the same healing qualities as aloe. They may be used to soothe burns and insect bites.

Onion bulbs are left to dry after harvesting to form the papery outer skin. Most familiar are the globe or common yellow onion. They store well and are stronger-flavored and best used for hearty dishes. When sauteed gently their flavor is rich and caramel-like. Cooking too high or fast will produce dark, bitter onions.

Large white onions are milder and will not develop the same caramel taste. The sweet white and mild yellow onions are often named for their place or origin such as Bermuda, Valencia, Maui, Vidalia or Walla Walla. Sweet onions are used raw as a garnish, and are good for stuffing, grilling or barbecuing.

Red onions can be sweet or strong, depending on the variety. They are from a different family and are referred to as Spanish or Italian onions and valued raw for their color. They are interchangeable with yellow or white onions in cooking.

Choose onions that are firm and reasonably free of blemishes. There should be no sign of sprouting. Onions should be stored in a well-ventilated, dry area in single layers.

The onion's flavor, odor and tear-inducing characteristics come primarily from sulfuric compounds in the vegetable. When the onion is peeled and sliced this chemical is freed. Peeling the onion under cold water or refrigerating for a few hours before cutting can help alleviate the problem.

To counteract the "onion breath" syndrome here are some suggestions: Rinse your mouth with equal portions of onion juice and water, chew a piece of citrus peel to sweeten the breath, chew on a piece of cinnamon stick or whole clove, eat a fresh apple or chew a sprig or two of parsley since it is a natural breath freshener.

The scallion or green onion is the imma-

ture bulb of the yellow onion cultivated for its grassy flavor. They are best raw or cooked quickly, as in a stir fry.

Leek is the mildest member of the onion family and much more popular in Europe than the United States. Leeks are sometimes served raw in a salad but more often cooked. Braised leek in a veal or chicken stock is hard to beat for taste. Leek is also excellent when added to a stock with the other aromatic vegetables for flavoring.

Garlic and shallots play a double role in the kitchen, that of a seasoning and vegetable. Roasted garlic and shallot are sweet and mild in flavor. Both grow in heads, as opposed to individually. Shallots' flavor is similar to a mix of onion and garlic without the acidity of the onion and pungency of the garlic. The leek and shallot are two members of the onion family worth investigating.

Members of the onion family are available year-round. However, the peak seasons for each are: onions, summer; scallion, spring; shallot and garlic, summer to winter; and leeks, summer. The time of the year is fast-approaching for the members of the onion family.

SAUSAGE STUFFED ONIONS

4 large sweet onions
1/2 pound sausage meat
1/2 cup fresh or purchased bread crumbs
1/2 cup chopped parsley
1 clove garlic finely chopped
1/2 finely chopped red pepper
salt and pepper to taste

Peel and par-boil the onions. Cut a slice from the top and remove the centers leaving the outside shell. Sauté the sausage meat with the garlic and celery. Add the chopped onion centers, salt and pepper and parsley. Stuff onions with the mixture and sprinkle with the bread crumbs. Bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes. Can also be cooked on the grill. Substitute smaller onions if to be used as an accompaniment to a meal.

History is Mayflower's best asset

Dishing It Out/by K.C.

If there's one restaurant around where time seems to have stopped, it's the dining room of the Mayflower Hotel in Plymouth. The dining room today wears the same endearing decor it has had for years — ever since hotel owner Ralph Lorenz commissioned a decorating feat at a time when restaurants did little more than slap on a coat of paint and cover tables with white cloths.

The feat involved photographing paintings in Pilgrim Hall in Massachusetts and then having the photos blown up, retouched and fitted into covers along the dining room walls. The room itself is patterned after one room in the governor's mansion in Williamsburg, Va. The result is a museum-like atmosphere, where scenes of the pilgrims' first years in Massachusetts surround guests.

Its historic theme (even the phone number — 453-1620 — marks a significant date) isn't surprising, given the nature of the City of Plymouth and the Lorenz family's longstanding role in the community. Lorenz be-

lieves "history never goes out of style" and he has proven that.

But atmosphere, or ambience, is only one element in dining out. What about the food? Not surprisingly, the Mayflower menu follows a traditional course here too: steak, chicken, fish — mostly scrod, and ribs are served baked, breaded and broiled. A few more contemporary offerings are the cajun scrod and swordfish steaks. Prices hover around \$9.95-\$12.95, with a few exceptions, for a full meal.

Steak and scrod are the restaurant's specialties. Although the scrod almondy is a specialty, it was our least favorite entree. It was dry, listless, boring and a tad overcooked. The baring could be said for the steak, which was cooked beyond the degree ordered.

A chicken picata entree, with mushrooms and artichokes added to the cream sauce, was pretty good — and

the best prepared of the four entrees we tried. Alas, a steak and lobster special of the evening looked mouth-wateringly fantastic, only to be overcooked.

A seafood appetizer gave us a taste of the scrodettes (scrod rolled in bread crumbs) that were tasty as an appetizer but seemed too bland to take on as an entree, as many apparently do. The shrimp and scallops in the appetizer were much tastier, cooked more appropriately than our main entrees. Accompaniments, a la baked potato, rice or fries, are about average, with the baked potato the best selection.

The all-you-can-eat dinner salads are good, especially with the house-made creamy garlic dressing. Desserts are terrific, most notably the lemon meringue pie and the rice pudding, both served in hearty portions. Next time we may start with dessert.

The service is friendly — and familiar. Several waitresses have worked there for years, as many as 25 years.

Try hot soup for cool spring picnics

A spring picnic may be just the thing. True, there is still too much nip in the air to be comfortable without a warm jacket; and the ground is too cold and damp to spread a blanket.

Be sure to take along a stale loaf of bread to feed the ducks or geese. And don't forget a plastic bag to carry home your garbage and that of others that you may decide to pick up along the way. It's always a great feeling to leave a place looking better than when you found it.

Head for the park, the beach, the woods. If you can't find a picnic table or a dry place to sit, then park your car in a quiet spot and eat while enjoying the scenery.

In the state of Michigan, no one is more than six miles from a natural body of water, whether it be a creek, a river, a lake, or what have you. No matter where you live, it's not hard to find a spot where you can enjoy a bit of nature. We hope to be doing that very thing, this week.

And the menu we have planned is as follows:

● Hot Cheese and Vegetable Soup. This recipe is a specialty of the Frymont Inn in North Carolina. It's good anytime and anywhere, but it is terrific carried in a thermos on a spring picnic.

● Sandwiches made of cold, sliced roast pork, roast beef, corned beef, or ham. But remember, more than half of your sandwich is bread, so choose carefully. A good, fresh baked loaf of rye or perhaps nice fragrant onion rolls go well with these meats.

● Fresh fruit. Whatever happens to look good on that day. Apples, pears,

grapes and bananas are the neatest for such an outing, of course.

● Homemade cookies — good, old-fashioned oatmeal cookies with raisins and nuts. You can add chocolate chips instead of the raisins if you like.

● Beverages. We'll take along our favorite bottled soft drinks and a thermos of cold milk.

FAMOUS FRYMONT CHEESE SOUP

2 stalks celery, finely chopped
2 carrots, finely chopped
1 small onion, finely chopped
1 cup chopped cauliflower
1/4 cup chopped broccoli
1/4 teaspoon finely minced or crushed garlic (1 small clove)
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/4 cup all-purpose flour
3 cups strong chicken broth
1 tablespoon French's Worcestershire Sauce
1/4 teaspoon French's Pepper
2 1/2 cups milk
2 cups shredded, sharp orange Cheddar cheese
Salt to taste
1/4 cup sliced almonds

Cook celery, carrots, onion, cauliflower, broccoli and garlic in butter in large pan over medium heat 6 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in flour. Cook, stirring 3 to 4 minutes over low heat. Slowly add chicken broth, stirring, with Worcestershire sauce and pepper. Simmer, covered, over very low heat 20 minutes, stirring frequently until vegetables are tender. Add milk, cheese and salt to taste. Cook over low heat 10 minutes, or until piping

hot. Garnish with almonds. 6 servings.

OATMEAL COOKIES

1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup oil
1/4 cup sour milk (or 1/4 cup sweet milk plus 1/4 teaspoon vinegar mixed)
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup sifted flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 cups quick oats
Nutmegs (optional)
Raisins or chocolate chips (optional)

Beat together all ingredients except the oats, nuts and raisins or chips. After you have a smooth batter, stir in oats, etc. Drop by spoonfuls on a buttered baking sheet and press down slightly. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 minutes.

TOMATO PESTO
 ½ cup sun-dried tomatoes, reconstituted in one cup warm water
 3 cloves garlic, blanched for one minute in boiling water
 ¼ cup balsamic vinegar
 ¼ cup fresh basil
 ¼ cup fresh chopped parsley
 freshly ground black pepper
 Yields one cup.
 Reconstitute dried tomatoes for 15 minutes or until tender. Drain and reserve liquid. Place tomatoes, garlic, vinegar, basil, parsley and pepper in food processor or blender. Add ¼ cup tomato liquid and begin to pul-

sate mixture until smooth but slightly chunky. Add extra liquid if necessary.
 Serve at room temperature.

TOMATO VINAIGRETTE
 3 ripe red tomatoes
 3 tablespoons rice wine vinegar
 ¼ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
 ¼ teaspoon teaspoon salt
 1 tablespoon chopped fresh basil
 Yields 1 ¼ cups.
 Wash and core tomatoes. Place in juicer and extract liquid. Add remaining ingredients to tomato juice. Allow to marinate for one hour. Use with vegetables, grilled poultry, fish and shellfish.

Most doctors on lookout for good, bad cholesterol

Most U.S. physicians believe HDL ("good" cholesterol) levels are better predictors of heart disease than total cholesterol, according to findings from a recent Louis Harris survey. The survey also shows Americans are far more aware of HDL and LDL cholesterol than they were three years ago in a similar Harris poll, but many are still not taking steps to prevent heart disease.
 The nationwide random survey of 300 primary care physicians and 100 cardiologists shows between 80 and 90 percent of doctors believe there is "overwhelming" of "very conclusive" evidence of the link between cholesterol and heart disease. About 75 percent of both physician groups believe LDL and HDL are better predictors of the disease.
 • Among the 1,254 consumers

surveyed, 64 percent say they have heard about "good" and "bad" cholesterol — twice the level of awareness just three years ago. However, the survey shows there has been little improvement during that time in heart-healthy behavior. For example, while slightly more Americans say they avoid high cholesterol foods (from 42 percent to 50 percent), those who say they exercise regularly dropped slightly (from 79 percent to 77 percent).

The survey was conducted for the American Lipid Information Bureau (ALIB) and was sponsored by an educational grant from Warner-Lambert company's Parke-Davis division. ALIB services as an information clearinghouse for professionals and the public on cholesterol issues.

Rice rediscovery makes for variety

Rice, the ancient food of kings and paupers, has been rediscovered and is now the trendy side dish of the '90s. Calorie awareness, fitness, health, low-fat foods and back-to-basics cooking all have contributed to the rice trend.

Today, each American eats an average of 18 pounds of rice a year. That may sound like a lot until you realize that the average Asian consumes 400 pounds a year.

Rice offers a good source of vitamins, minerals and protein, and has very little fat or sodium. It is highly digestible, suitable for special diets, inexpensive, simple to prepare and has no wasted parts.

There are thousands of varieties of rice that are available in a rainbow of colors, but rice still is basically offered in three sizes: long, medium and short grain. Look on your grocer's shelf and you'll be amazed at the flavors and varieties, though. The new trendy rices are very aromatic, with distinct nutty or popcorn flavors. These aromatics have names like Texmati, Basmati, Wehani, Arborio, Wild Pecan and Popcorn.

Texmati, or hybrid rice grown in Texas, has a nutty flavor and an aroma like freshly popped corn. Basmati is probably the queen of aromatic rice and a staple in Indian cooking. It is not grown in America, so it comes from Pakistan and Northern India for now. When Basmati cooks, it nearly doubles in length and cooks up very fluffy.

Wehani can be honey-red or comes in an assortment of red, brown and black that has the scent of hot buttered peanuts. Arborio is a short-grain rice that cooks up creamy but still tastes crunchy. (This is the rice that is mixed with stock

or wine and other ingredients to create risotto.) Wild pecan rice is not made from nuts, although the grain does look like brown rice. It has a pecan-like aroma and taste and comes from Louisiana. It is faster to cook and lighter than most brown rices but chewier than white rice.

Popcorn rice will make you think you are popping corn rather than cooking rice. These are aromatic rices, a gourmet cook's delight. But if you're not that adventuresome, consider trying a rice mix.

A fast-growing part of the rice market is rice mixes, or flavored rice such as chicken, herb, broccoli, oriental, long grain and wild rice and many others. Be watchful of the labels if you're concerned about sodium. One cup of these cooked mixes can have 800 milligrams of sodium.

The reason rice is so popular now is that it is a low-sodium food, until we add all this stuff to it. You could prepare a cheaper and healthier version yourself with minimal effort.

For example, saute a white or brown rice in olive oil with a combination of garlic, onion, herbs and spices, then add hot water or broth and cook in the usual way. This way you can keep track of the amount of salt.

Perhaps you're still not convinced and prefer the more traditional rice. Long, medium and short-grain rice are probably more familiar to you. Long grain means that the kernels are to 4-5 times longer than they are wide. When these are cooked, the grains are separate and fluffy. Long grain is the best for salads, casseroles and stuffings.

Medium-grain has a softer, more tender texture and is slightly plumper than long-grain. This is

good for desserts, meat loaf, croquettes etc. Short-grain sometimes is called round rice and tends to stick together after cooking. Use this for stuffings, rice balls, pudding, pancakes, etc.

Brown rice has become more popular with many health food enthusiasts. Only the outer hull of the bran is removed. Of course, it has a slightly nutty flavor and a chewier texture. More liquid is needed in cooking brown rice and a longer cooking time.

If you're not ready to try brown rice, try a combination brown/white. Start the brown rice cooking and when there is about 20 minutes to go add the white rice. This makes for an interesting combination.

Other rice on the shelves are regular milled white rice, parboiled or converted white rice, precooked or instant rice and wild rice. Wild rice is not really rice but the brown seed of an aquatic grass native to America.

Here are tips to make the perfect rice. Never allow rice to go into a full rolling boil. It produces a starchy mass. Rice should be cooked at a very low simmer, as higher heat makes the grains stick to the pan. Let the rice absorb residual moisture by keeping the lid on tight for at least five minutes off the heat.

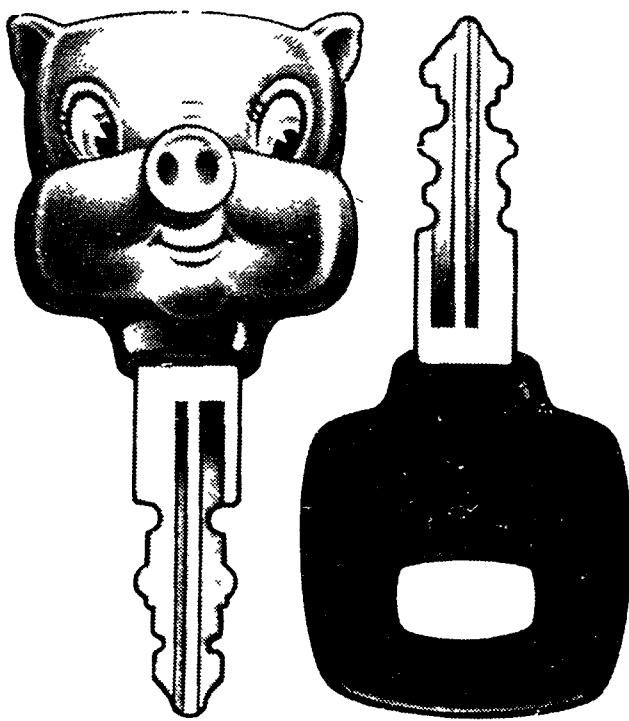

Whether you prefer traditional rice or one of the exotic new products, they all are a healthy choice. For a change of pace, and for improved health, rice is certainly worth a try.

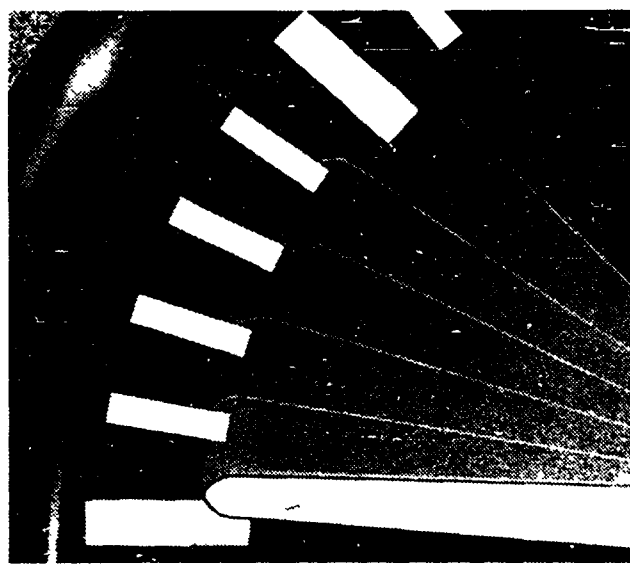

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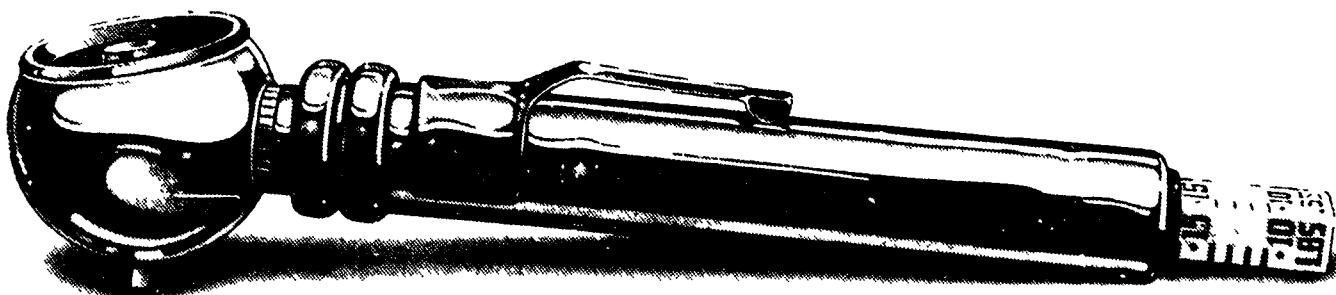

History is Mayflower's best asset

Dishing It Out/by K.C.

If there's one restaurant around where time seems to have stopped, it's the dining room of the Mayflower Hotel in Plymouth. The dining room today wears the same endearing decor it has had for years — ever since hotel owner Ralph Lorenz envisioned a decorating feat at a time when restaurants did little more than slap on a coat of paint and cover tables with white cloths.

The feat involved photographing paintings in Pilgrim Hall in Massachusetts and then having the photos blown up, retouched and fitted into covers along the dining room walls. The room itself is patterned after one room in the governor's mansion in Williamsburg, Va. The result is a museum-like atmosphere, where scenes of the pilgrims' first years in Massachusetts surround guests.

Its historic theme (even the phone number — 453-1620 — marks a significant date) isn't surprising, given the nature of the City of Plymouth and the Lorenz family's longstanding role in the community. Lorenz be-

lieves "history goes out of style" and he has proven that.

But atmosphere, or ambience, is only one element in dining out. What about the food? Not surprisingly, the Mayflower menu follows a traditional course here too: steak, chicken, fish — mostly scrod, and ribs are served baked, breaded and broiled. A few more contemporary offerings are the cajun scrod and swordfish steaks. Prices hover around \$9.95-\$12.95, with a few exceptions, for a full meal.

Steak and scrod are the restaurant's specialties. Although the scrod almonline is a specialty, it was our least favorite entree. It was dry, listless, boring and a tad overcooked. The same could be said for the steak, which was cooked beyond the degree ordered.

A chicken piccata entree, with mushrooms and artichokes added to the cream sauce, was pretty good — and

the best prepared of the four entrees we tried. Alas, a steak and lobster special of the evening looked mouth-wateringly fantastic, only to be overcooked.

A seafood appetizer gave us a taste of the acrodettes (scrod rolled in bread crumbs) that were tasty as an appetizer but seemed too bland to take on as an entree, as many apparently do. The shrimp and scallops in the appetizer were much tastier, cooked more appropriately than our main entrees. Accompaniments, a la baked potato, rice or fries, are about average, with the baked potato the best selection.

The all-you-can-eat dinner salads are good, especially with the house-made creamy garlic dressing. Desserts are terrific, most notably the lemon meringue pie and the rice pudding, both served in hearty portions. Next time we may start with dessert.

The service is friendly — and familiar. Several waitresses have worked there for years, as many as 25 years.

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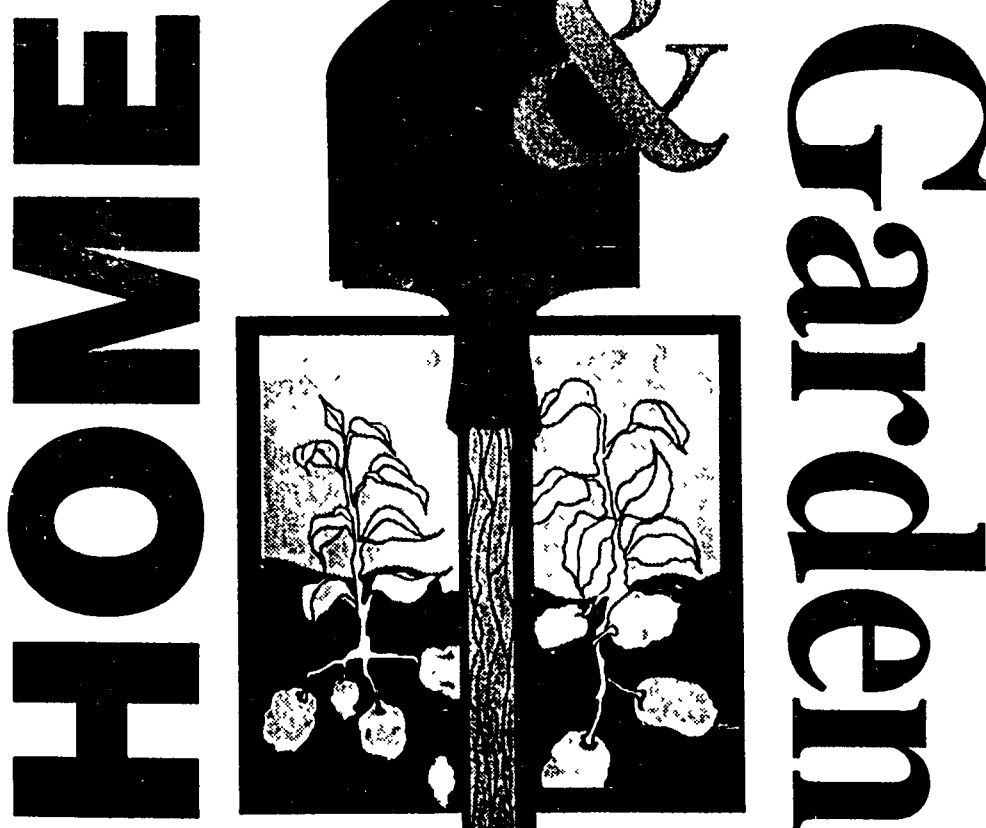

TOMATO PESTO

1/2 cup sun-dried tomatoes, reconstituted in one cup warm water
3 cloves garlic, blanched for one minute in boiling water

Most doctors on lookout for good, bad cholesterol

Most U.S. physicians believe HDL ("good" cholesterol) levels are better predictors of heart disease than total cholesterol, according to findings from a recent Louis Harris survey. The survey also shows Americans are far more aware of HDL and LDL cholesterol than they were three years ago in a similar Harris poll, but many are still not taking steps to prevent heart disease.

The nationwide random survey of 300 primary care physicians and 100 cardiologists shows between 80 and 90 percent of doctors believe there is "overwhelming" or "very conclusive" evidence of the link between cholesterol and heart disease. About 75 percent of both physician groups believe LDL and HDL are better predictors of the disease.

Among the 1,254 consumers

surveyed, 64 percent say they have heard about "good" and "bad" cholesterol — twice the level of awareness just three years ago. However, the survey shows there has been little improvement during that time in heart-healthy behavior. For example, while slightly more Americans say they avoid high cholesterol foods (from 42 percent to 50 percent), those who say they exercise regularly dropped slightly (from 79 percent to 77 percent).

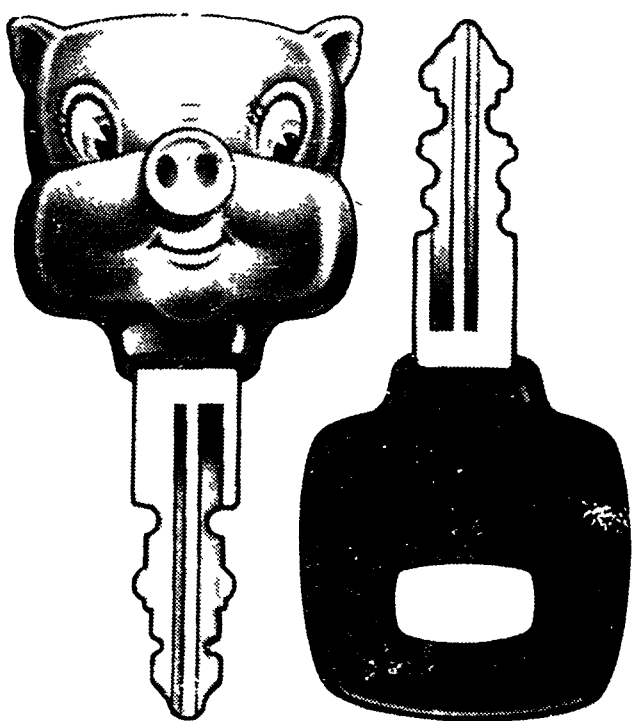

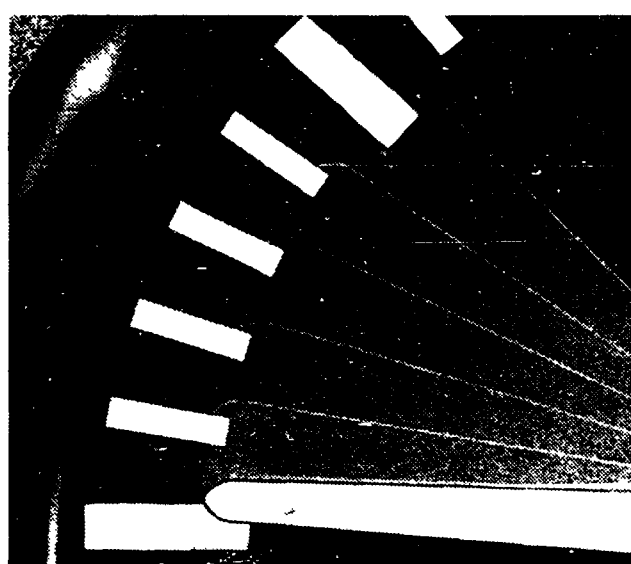

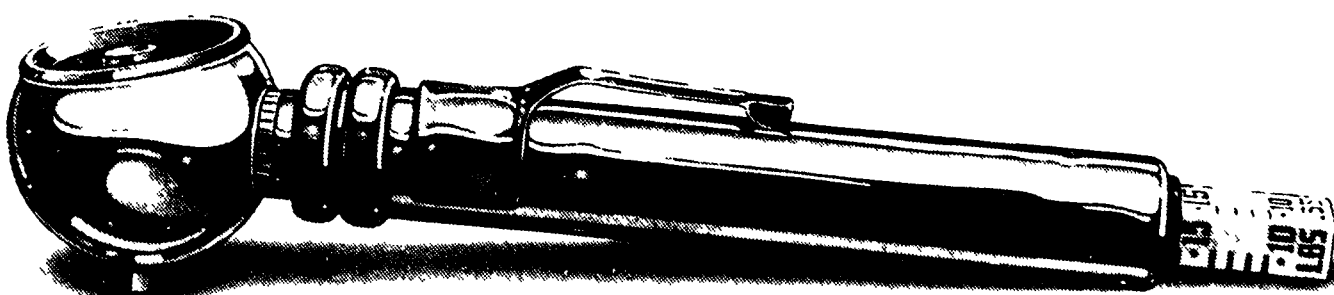

History is Mayflower's best asset

The service is friendly — and familiar. Several waitresses have worked there for years, as many as 25 years.

Dishing It Out/by K.C.

If there's one restaurant around where time seems to have stopped, it's the dining room of the Mayflower Hotel in Plymouth. The dining room today wears the same endearing decor it has had for years — ever since hotel owner Ralph Lorenz commissioned a decorating feat at a time when restaurants did little more than slap on a coat of paint and cover tables with white cloths.

The feat involved photographing paintings in Pilgrim Hall in Massachusetts and then having the photos blown up, retouched and fitted into covers along the dining room walls. The room itself is patterned after one room in the governor's mansion in Williamsburg, Va. The result is a museum-like atmosphere, where scenes of the pilgrims' first years in Massachusetts surround guests.

Its historic theme (even the phone number — 453-1620 — marks a significant date) isn't surprising, given the nature of the City of Plymouth and the Lorenz family's longstanding role in the community. Lorenz be-

lieves "history never goes out of style" and he has proven that.

But atmosphere, or ambience, is only one element in dining out. What about the food? Not surprisingly, the Mayflower menu follows a traditional course here too: steak, chicken, fish — mostly scrod, and ribs are served baked, breaded and broiled. A few more contemporary offerings are the cajun scrod and swordfish steaks. Prices hover around \$9.95-\$12.95, with a few exceptions, for a full meal.

Steak and scrod are the restaurant's specialties. Although the scrod almondoine is a specialty, it was our least favorite entree. It was dry, listless, boring and a tad overcooked. The same could be said for the steak, which was cooked beyond the degree ordered.

A chicken picata entree, with mushrooms and artichokes added to the cream sauce, was pretty good — and

the best prepared of the four entrees we tried. Alas, a steak and lobster special of the evening looked mouth-wateringly fantastic, only to be overcooked.

A seafood appetizer gave us a taste of the acrodettes (scrod rolled in bread crumbs) that were tasty as an appetizer but seemed too bland to take on as an entree, as many apparently do. The shrimp and scallops in the appetizer were much tastier, cooked more appropriately than our main entrees. Accompaniments, a la baked potato, rice or fries, are about average, with the baked potato the best selection.

The all-you-can-eat dinner salads are good, especially with the house-made creamy garlic dressing. Desserts are terrific, most notably the lemon meringue pie and the rice pudding, both served in hearty portions. Next time we may start with dessert.

Try hot soup for cool spring picnics

Tell your sweetheart, your best friend or your grandkids that you are going to kidnap them for a couple of hours and take them away from it all. Warn them to wear warm clothing, a hat or a scarf for their heads and waterproof, mudproof boots (even if it looks dry in the city).

Then pack a lunch. A spring picnic is not like a summer one. The menu should include some good hot soup,

very hearty sandwiches, fruit and cookies.

Hot chocolate or coffee is fine. But if you bring soup, you can even have your favorite cold beverage and still stay warm.

Be sure to take along a stale loaf of bread to feed the ducks or geese. And don't forget a plastic bag to carry home your garbage and that of others that you may decide to pick up along the way. It's always a great feeling to leave a place looking better than when you found it.

Head for the park, the beach, the woods. If you can't find a picnic table or a dry place to sit, then park your car in a quiet spot and eat while enjoying the scenery.

In the state of Michigan, no one is more than six miles from a natural body of water, whether it be a creek, a river, a lake, or what have you. No matter where you live, it's not hard to find a spot where you can enjoy a bit of nature. We hope to be doing that very thing, this week.

And the menu we have planned is as follows:

● Hot Cheese and Vegetable Soup. This recipe is a specialty of the Fryemont Inn in North Carolina. It's good anytime and anywhere, but it is terrific carried in a thermos on a spring picnic.

● Sandwiches made of cold, sliced roast pork, roast beef, corned beef, or ham. But remember, more than half of your sandwich is bread, so choose carefully. A good, fresh baked loaf of rye or perhaps nice fragrant onion rolls go well with these meats.

● Fresh fruit. Whatever happens to look good on that day. Apples, pears,

grapes and bananas are the neatest for such an outing, of course.

● Homemade cookies — good, old-fashioned oatmeal cookies with raisins and nuts. You can add chocolate chips instead of the raisins if you like.

● Beverages. We'll take along our favorite bottled soft drinks and a thermos of cold milk.

FAMOUS FRYEMONT CHEESE SOUP

2 stalks celery, finely chopped
2 carrots, finely chopped
1 small onion, finely chopped
1 cup chopped cauliflower
1/2 cup chopped broccoli
1/2 teaspoon finely minced or crushed garlic (1 small clove)
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup all-purpose flour
3 cups strong chicken broth
1 tablespoon French's Worcestershire Sauce
1/2 teaspoon French's Pepper
2 1/2 cups milk
2 cups shredded, sharp orange Cheddar cheese
Salt to taste
1/4 cup sliced almonds

Cook celery, carrots, onion, cauliflower, broccoli and garlic in butter in large pan over medium heat 6 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in flour. Cook, stirring 3 to 4 minutes over low heat. Slowly add chicken broth, stirring, with Worcestershire sauce and pepper. Simmer, covered, over very low heat 20 minutes, stirring frequently until vegetables are tender. Add milk, cheese and salt to taste. Cook over low heat 10 minutes, or until piping

hot. Garnish with almonds. 6 servings.

OATMEAL COOKIES

1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup oil
1/2 cup plus 1/4 cup sweet milk plus 1/4 teaspoon vinegar (milk plus 1/4 cup plus 1/4 teaspoon vinegar mixed)
1 cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 cups quick oats
Nutmegs (optional)
Raisins or chocolate chips (optional)

Beat together all ingredients except the oats, nuts and raisins or chips. After you have a smooth batter, stir in oats, etc. Drop by spoonfuls on a buttered baking sheet and press down slightly. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 minutes.

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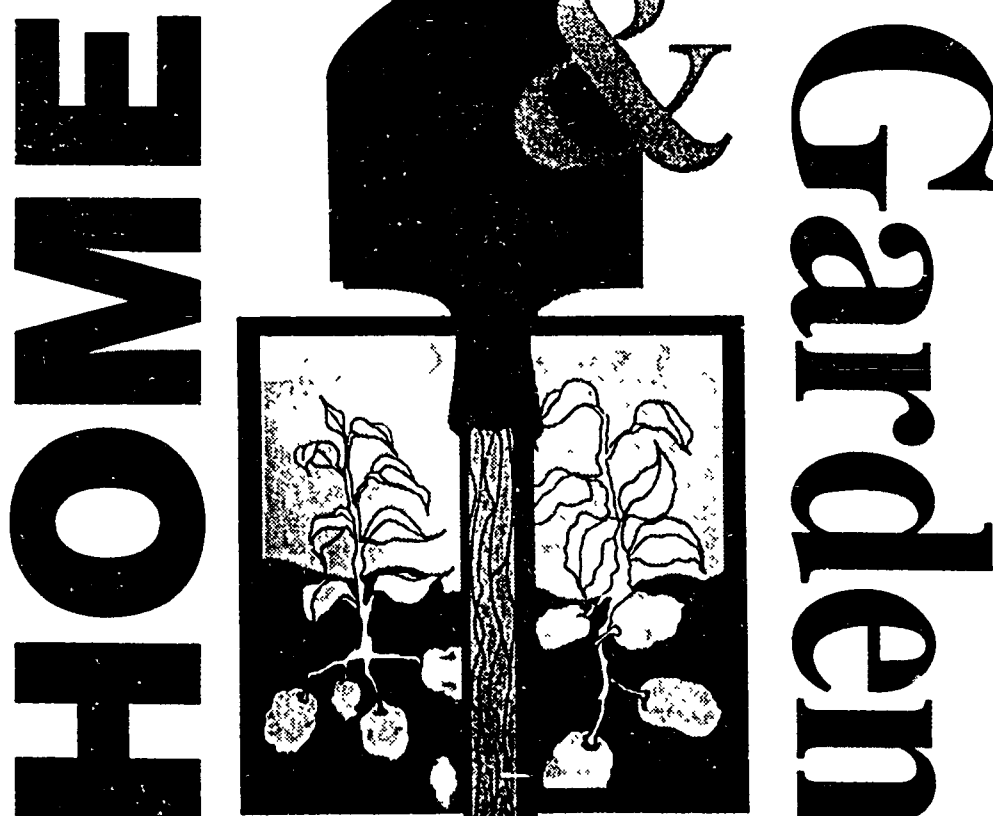

TOMATO PESTO

1/2 cup sun-dried tomatoes, reconstituted in one cup warm water
3 cloves garlic, blanched for one minute in boiling water
1/4 cup balsamic vinegar
1/4 cup fresh basil
1/4 cup fresh chopped parsley
freshly ground black pepper
Yields one cup.
Reconstitute dried tomatoes for 15 minutes or until tender. Drain and reserve liquid. Place tomatoes, garlic, vinegar, basil, parsley and pepper in food processor or blender. Add 1/4 cup tomato liquid and begin to pul-

sate mixture until smooth but slightly chunky. Add extra liquid if necessary.
Serve at room temperature.

TOMATO VINAIGRETTE

3 ripe red tomatoes
3 tablespoons rice wine vinegar
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon chopped fresh basil
Yields 1 1/2 cups.
Wash and core tomatoes. Place in juicer and extract liquid. Add remaining ingredients to tomato juice. Allow to marinate for one hour. Use with vegetables, grilled poultry, fish and shellfish.

Rice rediscovery makes for variety

Rice, the ancient food of kings and paupers, has been rediscovered and is now the trendy side dish of the '90s. Calorie awareness, fitness, health, low-fat foods and back-to-basics cooking all have contributed to the rice trend.

Today, each American eats an average of 18 pounds of rice a year. That may sound like a lot until you realize that the average Asian consumes 400 pounds a year.

Rice offers a good source of vitamins, minerals and protein, and has very little fat or sodium. It is highly digestible, suitable for special diets, inexpensive, simple to prepare and has no wasted parts.

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Popcorn rice will make you think you are popping corn rather than cooking rice. These are aromatic rices, a gourmet cook's delight. But if you're not that adventuresome, consider trying a rice mix.

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For example, saute a white or brown rice in olive oil with a combination of garlic, onion, herbs and spices, then add hot water or broth and cook in the usual way. This way you can keep track of the amount of salt.

Perhaps you're still not convinced and prefer the more traditional rice. Long, medium and short-grain rice are probably more familiar to you. Long grain means that the kernels are to 4-5 times longer than they are wide. When these are cooked, the grains are separate and fluffy. Long grain is the best for salads, casseroles and stuffings.

Medium-grain has a softer, more tender texture and is slightly plumper than long-grain. This is

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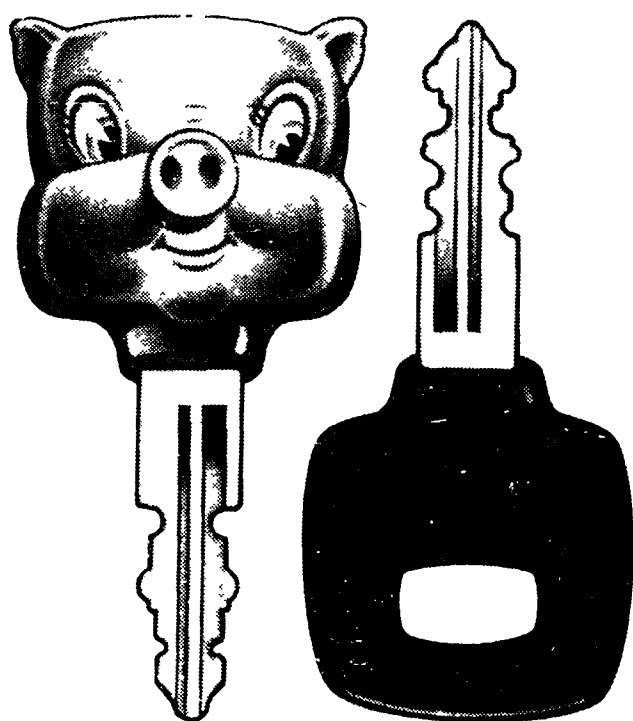
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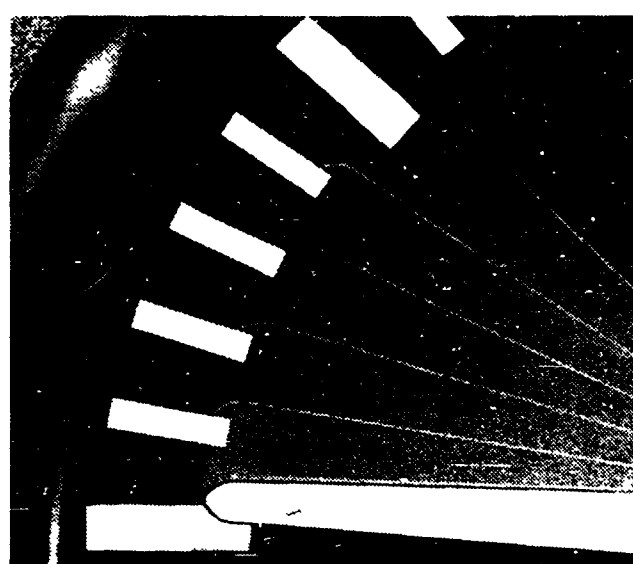

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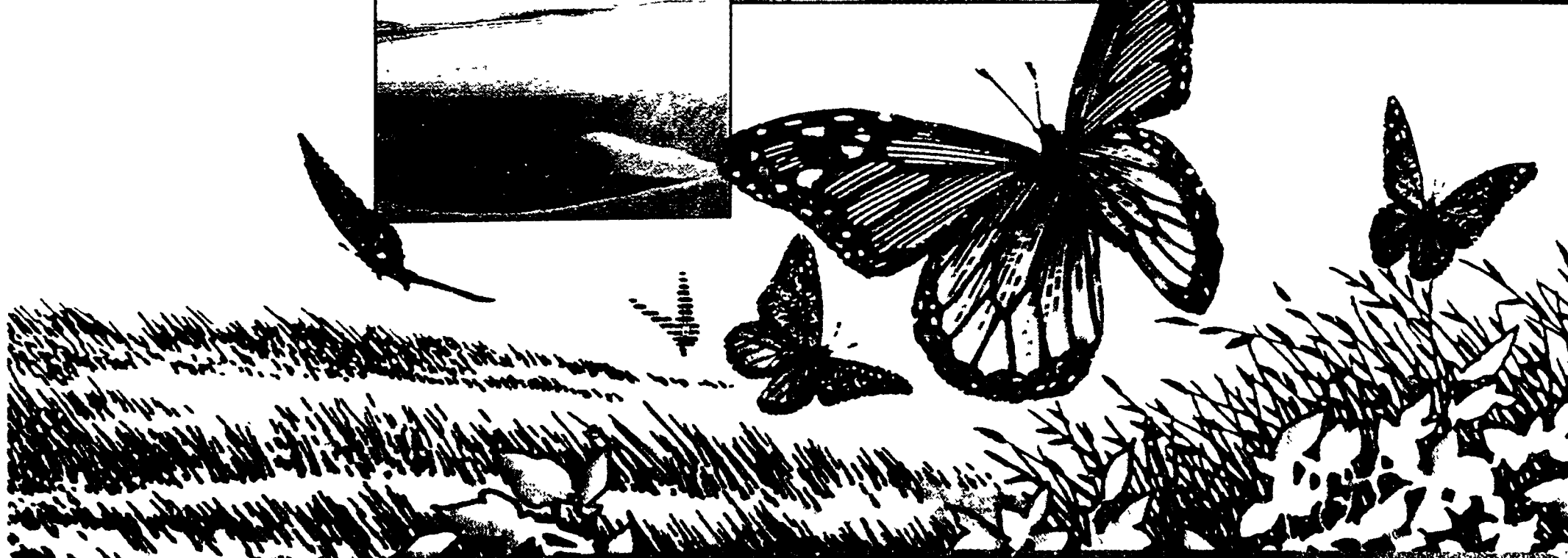
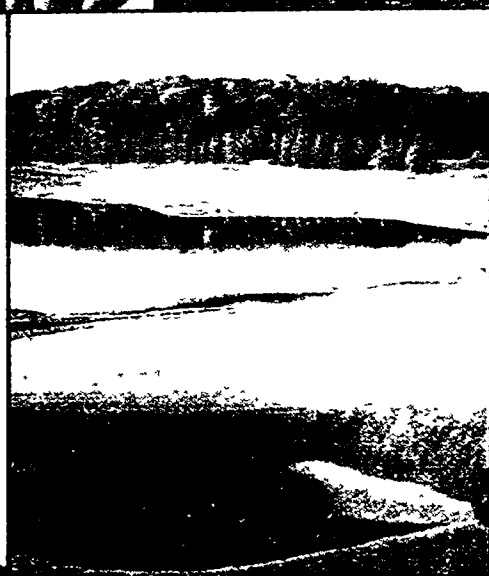
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Durand's durable depot

In the early part of this century, travelers could reach any town in American that had a railway line by changing trains at Durand, Michigan. Known then as "the busiest town in the state, except the metropolis of Detroit, of course," Durand was served daily by 42 passenger trains, 22 mail trains and 78 freight trains. Railroads were king, opening frontiers to settlement, and settlements to industrialization.

Built in 1903, Durand's Union Station captured the rich essence of that railroading epoch, when depots were often considered transportation cathedrals. The building was designed by the Detroit firm of Spier and Rohns in the Chateau Romanesque style. Constructed of Missouri granite brick and Bedford cut stone, the depot was capped by several dormers, two towers with conical roofs and a large curved canopy.

The interior contained oak woodwork throughout, and the first floor featured wainscoting of Tennessee marble in the corridors, dining room, waiting room, men's smoker and ladies lounge.

In 1905, just 18 months after the depot was dedicated, disaster struck. A fire was discovered in the baggage room and the alarm sounded. The Durand fire department responded quickly and might have confined the damage, if the railroad hadn't ordered the hoses cut to let pass the *International Limited*, a fast east-bound passenger train. This 10-minute delay gave the fire a headway which could not be checked, destroying the depot.

Recognizing Durand's importance as a railroad hub, the depot was quickly rebuilt. Just five months after the fire, Durand's Union Station was again open for business. It differed little from the previous structure and was called "a finer and more handsome structure than the former one" by the *Durand Express* newspaper.

But the declining spiral in rail traffic took its eventual toll on the

station. In 1974, the Grand Trunk Western Railroad abandoned the building and its destruction appeared imminent. Enter a group of dedicated Durand citizens, helped by state officials, who saved the depot and began the preservation process. More than \$300,000 has been raised to restore the structure to its former grandeur.

Since 1985, the responsibility for restoration of the depot has belonged to Durand Union Station, Inc., a non-profit corporation whose ultimate goal is the complete rehabilitation of the building and the establishment of the State Railroad History Museum and Information Center.

Today, the depot stands as a lasting tribute to the Golden Age of Passenger Trains. The building's historical value has been formally recognized with its inclusion on the Michigan and National Register of Historic Places.

Union Depot has been featured in national magazines and visited by rail buffs from all over the country. It is classified in railroading articles as "the most photographed station in the United States."

Each spring, Durand sets aside three days to celebrate its heritage. Durand Railroad Days, scheduled this year for May 3-5, showcases the grand old station along with other reminders of the steam-powered past—the 5632 Memorial Engine, the Railroad History Museum and Gate Tower M-25.

The massive (268,200 pound) engine saw service on Grand Trunk lines from 1929 to 1958, when it was retired from service in Durand. The city took ownership in 1960 and maintains the engine as a tribute to the thousands of engineers, brake men and gandy dancers who once called Durand home.

The Railroad History Museum is housed in a 1919 Pullman car built for the Canadian National Railways. It contains displays of local railroad memorabilia.

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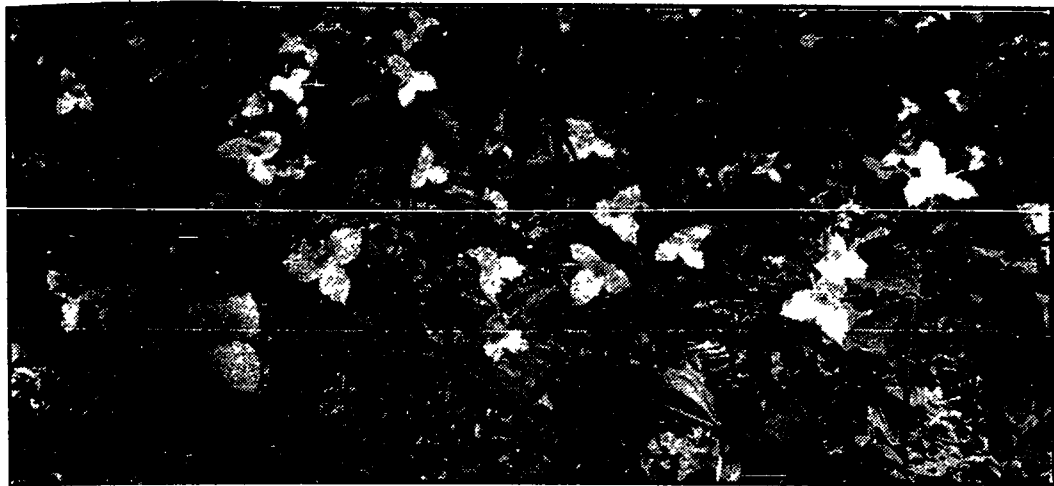
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THREE-WAY MEET— Steam-powered locomotives converge at Durand's Union Station in this photograph from the 1950s. Photo: William J. Miller

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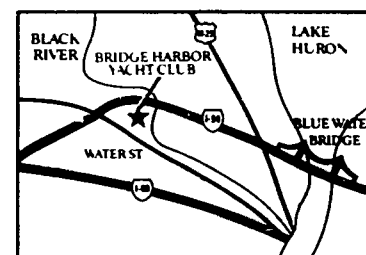
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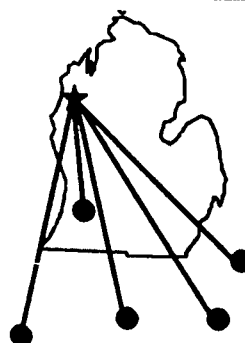


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Holland, Michigan—

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Against this background, thousands of klompen (wooden shoe) dancers perform, and three parades and nine musical and variety shows are staged during a festival that easily outlasts the dates set aside for it each year. The 62-year-old Tulip Time Festival is the fifth largest festival in the United States, drawing upwards of 500,000 attendees annually.

The May 15 Volksparade is

preceded by the town crier's announcement that the streets are too dirty for a public event—or at least not up to the standards of good Dutch cleanliness. He orders a brigade of costumed scrubbers to the streets and they, with pails swinging from shoulder yokes, splash and scrub until the pavement shines—and the parade begins.

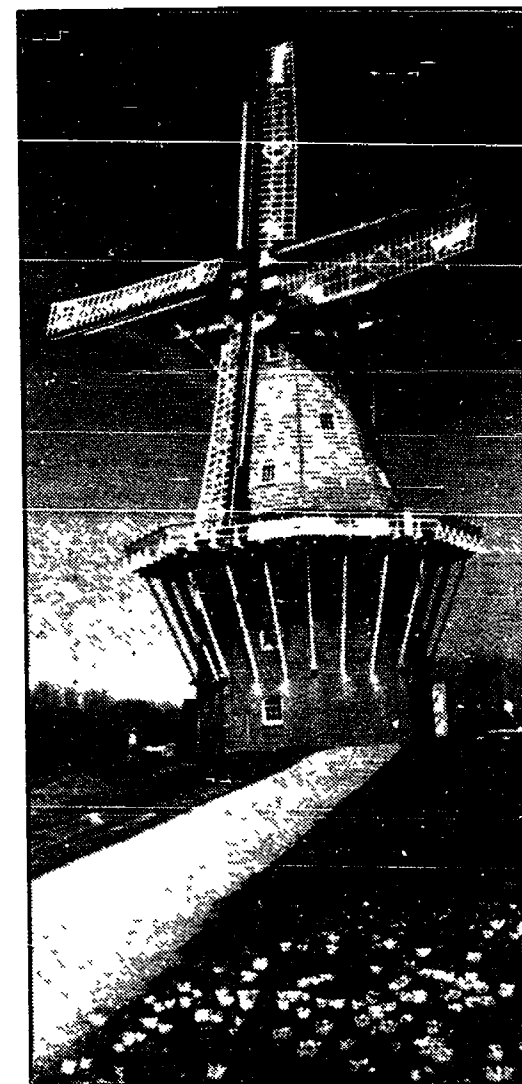
The Parade of Bands on May 18 is the grand finale of the festival. Over 50 bands, and as many floats, perform along a two-mile route to the delight of young and old alike.

One look at the names on the mailboxes and the 10-story windmill

turning on the horizon and you know that this community on the south shore of Lake Macatawa was founded by the Dutch. The fields of tulips surrounding the town, the Dutch Village, and the Wooden Shoe Factory confirm the impression.

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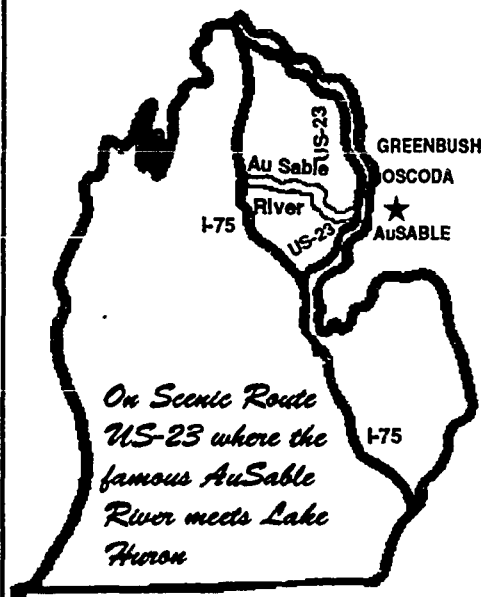
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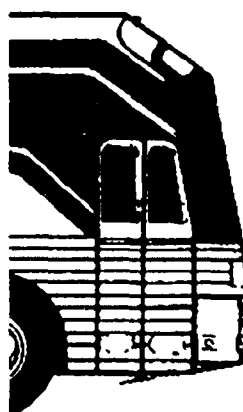
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Prints, carvings preserve wildlife heritage

Clare, Michigan—

The Michigan Great Lakes Wildlife Festival, set this year for May 25-26, has a two-pronged goal: to present a quality wildlife art show and to provide funds for wildlife conservation.

Now in its seventh year, the festival continues to showcase many of the state's top wildlife artists while channeling funds to many worthy wildlife causes. Funds raised by the festival have been used to support the release of Hungarian partridge chicks near Rosebush and to purchase trumpeter swans for the Kellogg Bird Sanctuary near Hickory Corners,

among other conservation projects.

The Doherty Hotel in downtown Clare is the focus for much of the festival activity--the judging of the festival Wildlife Photographer of the Year, the festival Amateur Carver of the Year and the Michigan Ducks Unlimited Artist of the Year and Carver of the Year contests. Entries for these contests will be on display throughout the weekend. The Doherty Hotel will also be the location for Saturday evening's Ducks Unlimited banquet and Sunday's wildlife art auction.

An art sales area, featuring the work of award-winning painter Kathleen Whitehead-Brogan, Plainwell, Mich., and noted carver Don Adams, Jackson, Mich., will be located in the pool area and lobby of the Doherty Hotel.

Limited edition prints of the Whitehead-Brogan painting, *Silent Descent*, will be available at a cost of \$65 during the festival. All proceeds from the sale of prints will be donated to conservation projects. An Adams' bird carving will be raffled at the Sunday art auction with proceeds also earmarked for conservation projects.

Prints, carving and photography by 35 of the Midwest's top wildlife arts will be on sale throughout the weekend at Town and Country, two blocks north of the Doherty.

The Clare Rod and Gun Club, located east of town, will offer

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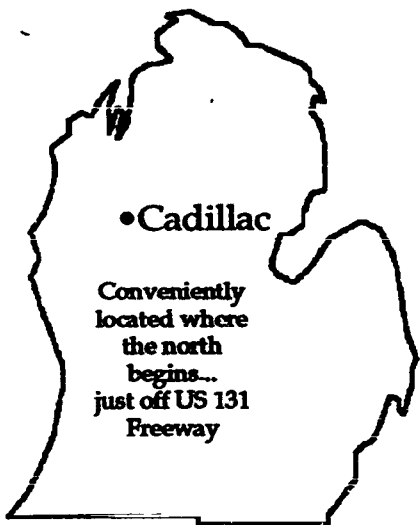


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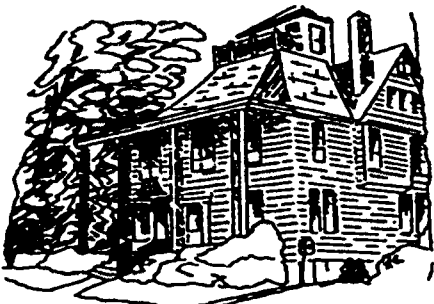

Frontier crossroads lives again

Mackinaw City, Michigan—

Life in northern Michigan from 1715 to 1781 will be relived for spectators on May 25-27 during the Fort Michilimackinac Pageant. At the fort, such pioneer activities as muzzleloader shoots, knife and tomahawk throws, and fur traders' fashion shows fill the three days—each of which climaxes with the not-so-instant replay of the June 2, 1763, storming of the fort during a baggataway (forerunner of lacrosse) match between the Indians at the British garrison.

The pageant officially begins at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday when the national anthems of both the United States and Canada are performed. A narrator then begins with the history of the reenactment and visitors are

transported back to an era more than 225 years ago at the very spot where the events took place.

French colonials and voyageurs mingle with fur traders and Chippewa Indians. Henry Bostwick, a prominent trader, Ezekiel Solomon, Michigan's first Jewish resident, and chiefs Minevavana and Matchekewis carry on their daily activities.

The plot thickens after the French and Indian War when the fort comes under the rule of the British, who treat the Indians as servants and do not offer them many gifts. Pontiac, the great Ottawa chief, calls for a war council and devises a strategy for each tribe in his domain to annihilate the British outposts in the Northwest.

This leads to the apparently innocent baggataway game at Fort Michilimackinac with great numbers of Indians assembled outside the stockade. Soldiers garrisoned at the fort are invited to watch, along with pompous Captain Etherington and his family. The ball is put into play. Will the plot succeed?

Mackinaw City looks out over the strategic Straits of Mackinac, where the waters of Lake Michigan and Lake Huron meet. It is a jumping-off point for the Upper Peninsula and Mackinac Island, as well as for the beaches and fishing spots of Lake Michigan and Lake Huron.

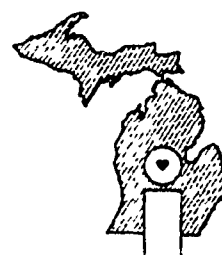
Mackinaw City is also the southern anchor of the soaring five-mile-long Mackinac Bridge and the southern gateway to the Straits of Mackinac Underwater Preserve, where divers can visit the wrecks of ships that failed to negotiate the tricky waters of the straits.

Restored Fort Michilimackinac, site of French and British garrisons in the 18th century, is now the subject of the longest ongoing archaeological dig in North America. Built by the French in 1715, it was surrendered to the British after the French and Indian War, and to the Americans after the American Revolution. Nearby is the 1892 Old Mackinac Point Lighthouse, which now serves as the Mackinac Maritime Museum.

Mackinaw City, along Interstate 75, is 281 miles from Detroit, 392 miles from Chicago.

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Zoo welcomes penguins, leopards

Toledo, Ohio—

After a 20-year absence, penguins are back at the Toledo Zoo.

A colony of 14 black-footed penguins arrived at the Zoo this winter from the Baltimore Zoo and were placed in a newly renovated exhibit near the Bear Grotto (formerly the sea lion exhibit).

Black-footed penguins are Africa's only native penguins and are listed as "threatened" due to the destruction of their habitat near the western waters of Namibia and South Africa. The Zoo's colony is made up of adult (over one year of age) and juvenile (under one year of age) penguins. Upon maturity, at four years of age, an active breeding program will begin in an effort to further multiply

the species in captivity and thereby guarantee the species survival.

The Zoo's new penguin colony is a gift from the Kroger Company.

The Zoo has opened a new naturalistic outdoor exhibit for their pair of critically endangered snow leopards. The eleven year-old female and five year-old male entered the beautifully landscaped exhibit for the first time on December 6.

The new exhibit simulates a Himalayan mountain setting with a flowing stream, brush, trees and a dramatic rock outcropping for them to climb. Mesh netting surrounds the exhibit and is the only barrier between visitors and the cats.

The cats were moved from their former home in the Carnivore House a week prior to their outdoor debut. This extra time allowed them to slowly adjust to their new surroundings.

Snow leopards are one of the world's most endangered species due largely to habitat destruction and poaching for their beautiful thick white, gray and silver coats. It is estimated that there are only 5,000 snow leopards world-wide, with 280 of that figure living in captivity.

The Toledo Zoo is located three miles south of downtown Toledo on the Anthony Wayne Trail (US-23). Hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. A nominal admission price is charged.



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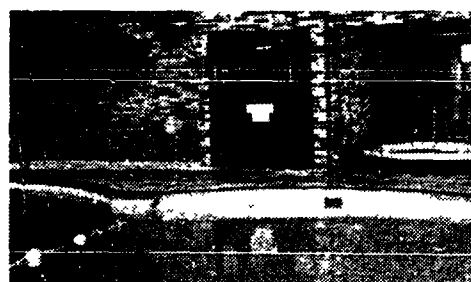
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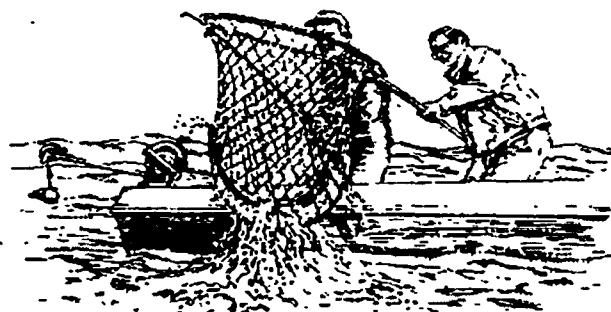
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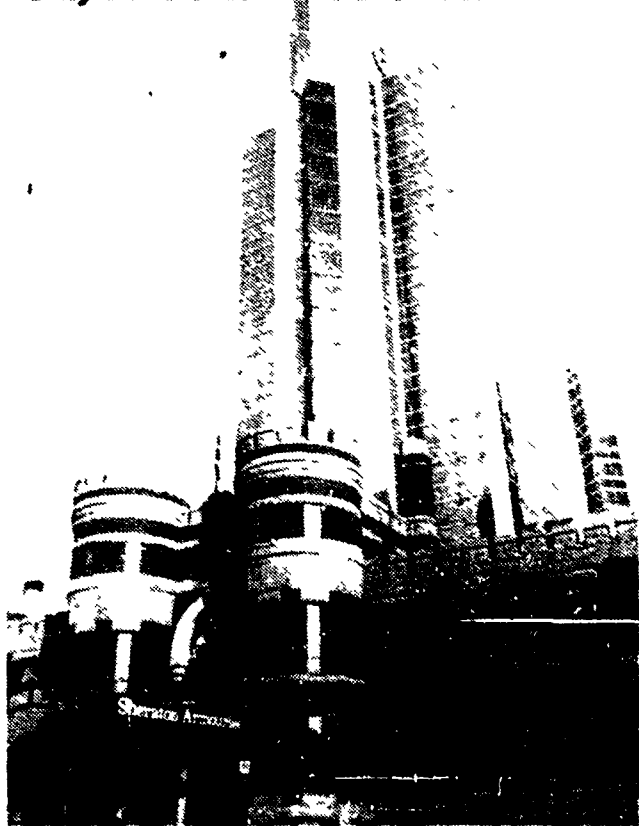
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Books to enhance, enrich your travels

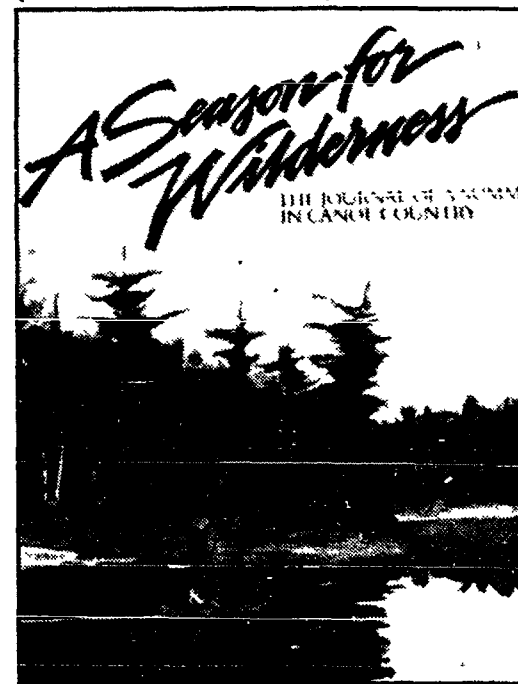
Perhaps you've been housebound during the snowy months, or, made of heartier stock, you've enjoyed winter, ice-fishing with gusto, snowshoeing with eagerness or skiing with elan. However you've passed the time, chances are you're thinking about summer travel - where to go, what to see, and how long to stay.

We've selected a slew of books to spark your interest in adventuresome by-ways, unexplored wilderness areas, old favorite haunts, and even unexpected places just around the corner that you've passed by.

Here are books you'll want to purchase and tote back home as souvenirs from well-spent days, books you'll want to buy in advance to consider new areas, and books you'll want to add to your reference shelf. There are even two featuring recipes to recall bygone days.

My personal pick of new volumes to enjoy is *A Season for Wilderness, The Journal of a Summer in Canoe*

Country by Michael Furtman
(NorthWord Press \$16.95).



If you haven't yet discovered books published by NorthWord Press, search them out, as each is well written, beautifully crafted, and attractively priced. A Wisconsin based company, they specialize in books celebrating the North.

A Season for Wilderness is a re-examination of the precious wilderness of the Boundary Waters Canoe Area from the interesting perspective of a volunteer ranger. In 1986, Michael and Mary Jo Furtman, along with their labrador retriever, spent a memorable summer doing what many can only dream of: living a life of simplicity surrounded by the Canoe Country's rugged beauty. For nearly three months they served as Volunteer Wilderness Rangers for the U.S. Forest Service, caring for a large section of Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness and living in a rustic log cabin near picturesque Lower Basswood Falls. During that summer the outside world almost ceased to exist for them as they went about their duties and grew attuned to the powerful message of the wild country.

"For what seemed like a long time the wolves sang, sometimes sounding almost sorrowful and occasionally rising to a crescendo of joined voices that reached peaks so pure they sent shudders down your spine. Never once did they hit the same note simultaneously and their cacophony was joyous," writes Furtman.

If you're acquainted with works by Sigurd Olson, you'll feel some of that same kinship with wild places as you read *A Season for Wilderness*, and if you've enjoyed a sense of the year's rhythms in books by Hal Borland, you'll rekindle that appreciation for the endless cycle in these pages.

Pen and ink illustrations by Susan Robinson are generously spotted throughout the book and a map of the area is included.

Michigan State Parks: Yesterday Through Tomorrow by Claire V. Korn (Michigan State University Press \$10.95)

State parks, writes Claire Korn, are like motherhood and apple pie: You can count on them. In this entertaining and fact-filled book, the author traces the history and development of Michigan's enviable state park system, noting that even now they are on the "cusp of change."

An inveterate researcher with the narrative skills to breathe life into what many may regard as dry facts and figures, Korn relates the controversial period at the beginning of organized conservation using yellowed clippings from the scrapbooks of James Oliver Curwood. She details the efforts of a single woman, Genevieve Gillette, to foster awareness of state park needs, and focuses on the political infighting that went on behind the scenes.

Dry and dull? Indeed not! Besides offering a wealth of informative detail on each park, Korn tells of the evolving state park system and the events of the past that are enough to make park users vigilant.


Detroit Kids Catalog: The Hometown Tourist by Ellyce Field (Wayne State University Press).

A lifelong resident of the Detroit area and a Detroit News columnist, Ellyce Field has produced a perfect wonder of a take-along book for almost anyone—not just for kids. Its boundaries extend far beyond Detroit—south into Ontario and west to Holland, and the information one needs to know on where to go, what to see and how long to stay is all there, in exacting detail.

Locations, hours, admission, parking, facilities, telephone numbers, calendar of events, maps and city activity listings are at one's fingertips. The handy size of the book, 4 X 8 inches, makes it perfect to tuck into handbag or glove box.

Field knows kids. She notes how long you can expect to stay, where you can find food, bathrooms, gift shops and stroller rentals, and includes sites more than 1½ hours away in a separate chapter, Overnight Adventures.



When you begin planning travel this year, start by buying this book. **Walk in Peace: Legends and Stories of the Michigan Indians** by Simon Otto (Michigan Indian Press \$8.95).

During his childhood, Simon, who is Ojibway and Odawa, heard these stories from Indian elders, his relatives and medicine men and women. The 18 tales are well illustrated by Kayle Crampton and include *The Legend of the Cedar Tree*, *The Eagle Who Flew Too High* and *The Rainbow Legend*—all charming stories to delight children.

If you buy cookbooks to read and enjoy as well as to try the recipes, then don't miss **Hollyhocks & Radishes** by Bonnie Stewart Mickelson (Pickle Point Publishing \$16.95).

It's a unique look at a little known corner of America, states the cover, and you'll find that's perfectly true. The author spent childhood vacations at Windswept, the camp of her grandparents, in the Les Cheneaux Islands in Michigan's Upper Peninsula, and returns there each summer.

Summer visitors buy produce at Mrs. Chard's, and find recipes and good cheer given with their purchases. The stand displays hollyhocks and marigolds along with neatly arrayed rows of vegetables grown by Judy and

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Each chapter of the cookbook begins with excerpts from letters to the author from Mrs. Chard, detailing her garden, her family, friends and community through the seasons to the year. The recipes themselves provoke nostalgia and hunger: Mama's Prune Cake, Marv's Pot Roast, Apple Bread Pudding with Maple Cream, New Peas and Tiny Potatoes, Islander Beef Short Ribs....I could go on and on. Do yourself a favor and add this superb volume to your collection - then enjoy!

Others rate it highly, too. **Hollyhocks & Radishes** has won three

Ben Franklin awards—one for Best Cookbook.

How to Make a Steamship Float by American Steamship Company (Harbor House Publishers \$9.95), is another cookbook in a handy size, spiral-bound.

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Stars come out for Village Antique Show

As May 9 date for the preview party of the Village Antiques Show that benefits Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village approaches, it is apparent that one of the newest antiques shows in the Midwest in just seven years has become one of the most prestigious.

One reason is the show's size: 47 fine dealers from the Midwest and the

East, including four Michigan dealers this year. J. Jordan Humberstone, show manager, declares that "each participating dealer has a reputation that is as distinguished as the antiques being presented" to make this show, he says, "one of the most prestigious in the nation."

Emily Murphy, who volunteers generously as publicity person for the event, has another reason: "Everyone participates--members of the honorary committee are not merely lending their distinguished names. They are on hand, as are the show chairpersons and committee workers."

She is absolutely right. The three-day show (May 10-12) begins with a gala preview night fundraiser as

benefactors and patrons pay for the first chance to browse through booths in Lovett Hall adjacent to the museum in Dearborn.

At last year's preview, popular WJR radio personality Joseph "J.P." McCarthy and his wife, Judy, were very much present as they greeted show guests and visited show booths. Mrs. McCarthy was chairing the preview night committee. They're now actively working on a committee for this year's show, Murphy reports.

Martha Firestone Ford (Mrs. William Clay Ford) and her daughter, Sheila Ford Hamp (Mrs. Steven K. Hamp), were spotted at last year's preview making a purchase from an eastern dealer.

Incidentally, Sheila Hamp now serves as chairman of the board of trustees for Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village.

Another couple serving on the honorary committee last year (this year also), the Richard P. Kughns, made news during the preview when he purchased a dealer's entire antique toy collection that evening.

"He bought everything but the display case," recalls Murphy, "and the happy dealer just went home."

Kughn, president of Kughn Enterprises in Southfield, previously was associated with A. Alfred Taubman. Incidentally, the Taubmans are honorary committee members, too.

Detroit millionaire businessman Kughn also made news when his love of Lionel trains led to his purchase of the Mount Clemens company in 1986--and when sales tripled under his

ownership. It was Kughn, too, who purchased the Whitney mansion on Woodward Avenue in Detroit in 1979 and opened the impressive property as a restaurant in 1986.

Joining such well-known names as Ford, Manooch, Prechter and Stroh on the committee this year will be Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Antonini, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph H. Booth II, Mr. and Mrs. Keith E. Crain, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lutz and Mr. and Mrs. Stanley P. Sax.

While preview tickets range in price from \$100 to \$300, tickets for the other three days of the show are \$5 in advance and \$6 at the door; they are good for all three days. Proceeds support all aspects of the museum and village, including such unique educational experiences as the one-room schoolhouse classes and preservation of Thomas Edison's Menlo Park laboratory and the dozens of other historic buildings in the village.

"Many still think that Ford Motor Company owns and supports the village and museum, and it's just not that way," Murphy points out.

A popular feature of the show is the Katherine B. Hagler Memorial Mini Forum, a free lecture series presented during the show.

On Friday, May 10 John Zolomij, director of the Raymond E. Holland Automotive Art Collection, will discuss *The Motor Car in Art* from his book of the same title.

On Saturday, May 11, David Lindquist, dealer in 18th and 19th century English and country French

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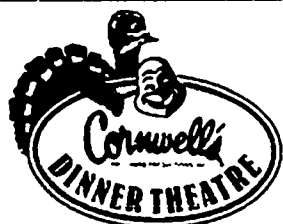
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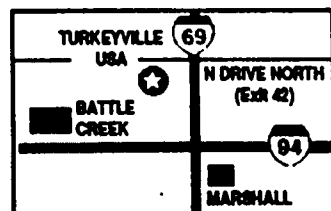

antiques will present *Antique Furniture: What to Know Before You Buy*.

In addition to joining Detroit's own "stars" at the black tie-optional preview, benefactors (\$300 a person), patrons (\$125 a person) and friends (\$100) a person, will enjoy cocktails and a gourmet buffet while viewing the best offerings of the select dealers.

While few of us are able to support the benefit by attending the preview, everyone who appreciates antiques can learn from the show itself. And during the show concessions will offer a variety of cold plates, sandwiches and pastries.

Humberstone has noted that the dealers bring furnishings, clocks, paintings, silver, brass, textiles and import porcelains that are comparable to those on view in the museum.

Last year I especially enjoyed

seeing American samplers, nice English brass candlesticks and china. I still regret not buying a small Chippendale looking glass, as mirrors often were called in earlier days.

Long-time collectors often say a show of the Village's caliber gives an opportunity to see current prices for items collected years ago.

This year, Emily Murphy thinks there may be good buys at eastern dealers' booths. She relates that local folk artist David Johnson and his wife Ruth, who are avid collectors of Shaker, came back from a trip east with the report that, not only were prices more reasonable, but that many items are on the market that had not been seen for a long time due to the depressed economy.

Gate Tower M-25, built in 1905, was owned jointly by the Grand Trunk and Ann Arbor Railroad and used for crossing protection on Main Street in Durand. It was moved to its present location in 1979 and represents another effort on the part of the city to preserve its rich railroad history.

Railroad Days activities include a model railroad exhibit, housed in the depot, which represents equipment operated in Durand. Steam powered equipment will be operated and railroad art will be displayed.

An excursion train operated by the Bluewater Michigan Chapter of the

National Railway Historical Society will bring in visitors from the Detroit area—a reminder that Durand is still very much a railroad town. Trains may be expected to move on any track in either direction at any time. So if you're a Railroad Days visitor, be sure to look both ways before crossing the tracks.

Durand is located just off Interstate 69 at the M-71 exit, about 30 miles from Lansing or 16 miles from Flint. The depot is on the south side of town, past the Roundhouse Restaurant and the Iron Horse Pub. Call 517-288-3715 for more information.



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
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


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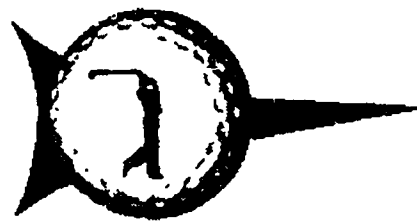

Northern Michigan summer camp breaks new ground

Kewadin, Michigan—

When Thomas Cohn founded Camp Maplehurst in 1955, he set out to break some rules. Cohn's philosophy was to offer an "alternative to the autocratic, hierarchically organized school and social systems that campers experience during the regular school year."

Over the years, a central feature of Camp Maplehurst has been the participation of the campers themselves in decision making in many areas of camp life. Another important facet of the program is that of a safe physical and emotional environment in which members of the camp community watch over and protect all others.

Set on more than 400 acres of rolling hills and wooded land on one of the highest points in northern Michigan, Camp Maplehurst overlooks seven lakes, including the camp's private spring-fed 80-acre lake.

Maplehurst offers activities in five areas—waterfront activities, land sports, arts and crafts, performing arts and science. Additional activities include creative writing, study in a foreign language, training in first aid and survival skills.

Every summer, Maplehurst welcomes recognized experts in many fields. At least once each week, these guest experts direct special activities

related to the arts, science, humanities, politics, business, education and sports. These special programs have included video production, mechanics and cartooning.

The nonsectarian camp enrolls 160 participants in each of two sessions. Campers come from throughout the United States and several foreign countries.

All campers live in spacious cabins, except younger girls, who are quartered in their own lodge equipped with a large recreation room. Maplehurst has newly surfaced tennis courts, basketball courts, softball

fields, soccer field, volleyball courts, arts and crafts building, science center and computer room, two riding rings, gymnastics area, archery range, auditorium, golf driving range and a private beach.

Founder Thomas Cohn is a professor of psychology at the University of Michigan-Dearborn and a past president of the Michigan Association of Gifted Children. Camp director Lawrence Cohn is a U-M Dearborn psychology professor and a scuba diver and water safety instructor. Co-director Brenda Cohn has a masters degree in counseling

psychology.

There are 50-60 counselors and administrators at camp each summer, each of whom has completed at least one year of college or a one- to three-year training program at Maplehurst.

Camp costs are \$1875 for four weeks (one session), \$3550 for eight weeks (both sessions), and \$1025 for two weeks. There is an additional \$100 charge for four weeks horseback riding instruction.

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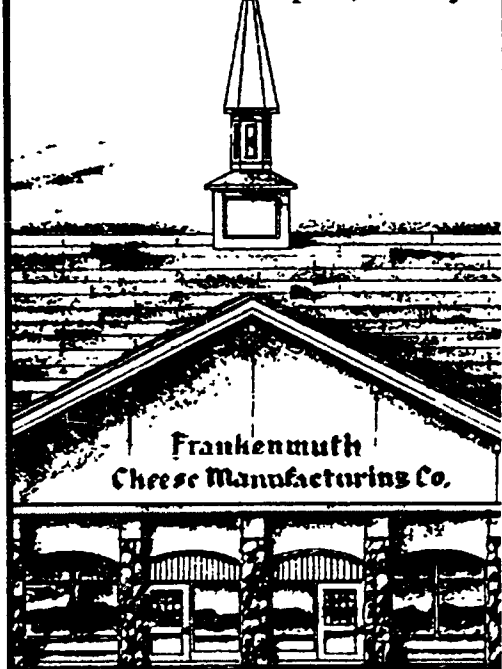

The Rock Resort is a 2,000 acre wilderness retreat on remote Drummond Island. Originally Tom Monaghan's corporate retreat for the many employees and friends of Domino's Pizza and the Detroit Tigers organization. Domino's Lodge has evolved into a unique resort. Lodging ranges from the original lodge to the Sawmill Center Hotel and individual full log cabins and cottages influenced by the designs of architect Frank Lloyd Wright.

The Rock itself enters its second full season and has matured nicely. The course was carved from 250 acres of forest and limestone. Architect Harry Bowers, formally of the Robert Trent Jones organization, has achieved a balance with the delicate ecology of the area. Trees, stone outcroppings, waterfalls, ponds and wildlife make this course one of the most spectacular in Michigan. Each hole is isolated by natural boundaries to give the golfer a feeling of solitude.

The Rock is located an hours drive north and east of Mackinac and a 15 minute ferry boat ride from the mainland. It's an ideal location for a corporate retreat or conference, or a fun filled family vacation.

Weekends fill early, and lodging is limited, so plan ahead. If the resort is booked, other rentals are available on the Island, or you can easily drive in from St. Ignace, the Soo, or Cheboygan.

Elk Ridge, which opens to the public in mid May, is a superb golf course on a spectacular site. Lou and Mary Schmidt, of Troy-based HoneyBaked Ham Company, acquired a 2,500 acre wilderness surrounding 400 acre Valentine Lake located five miles north of Atlanta, and set about building a golf course to rival anything in Michigan or the Midwest. Architect Jerry Matthews and Lou Schmidt have collaborated on the design which is spread over 550 acres.

The fully wooded course features a tremendous variety of mature timber, water, wetlands and terrain. Three holes follow the Lake, four holes cross a trout stream, and three holes skirt a 100 acre duck marsh, and the trees change constantly from hardwood stands to mature pines over 100 foot tall to conifers and plantation pine. The clubhouse sits atop "Elk Ridge" and overlooks the Par 3 10th hole with 110 foot drop from Tee to Green against a backdrop of 15 miles of untouched Pigeon River State forest wilderness.

No two holes look alike, and you rarely see another golf hole. You have the feeling that you are on safari, and you are likely to see some of the elk, deer, ducks, geese,

turkeys, eagles, loons, bobcats and beaver that inhabit the site. No residential real estate development activities are planned, other than the development of lodging in 1992, and perhaps a second golf course.

Thunder Bay Golf Resort
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Thunder Bay's challenging par 73 (Womens par 75) layout features water, marsh and rolling terrain and is carved from mature forest. At 6,466 yards, Thunder Bay is fairly tight with numerous dog legs and presents one of the tougher challenges on the Sunrise Side with a slope rating of 129. Thunder Bay also features a limited number of golf and river homesites. Condominiums are on the drawing board and may be available for purchase later in 1991.

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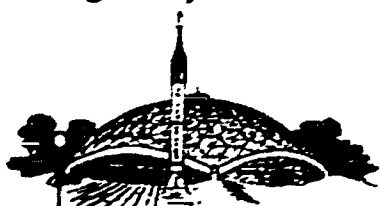
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Where the experts go for boating fun

How many people can say they sailed and ice-boated on the same lake on the same day?

Derrick Fries did, no doubt setting some kind of world's record. It's not his first.

He achieved this one on a Christmas Day on Watkins Lake in Oakland County, Michigan, one of his favorite places to sail.

We asked Fries and other expert boaters about their own choice places to enjoy the water, and to rendezvous with friends on shore.

"If I had my ultimate dream," Fries says, "I probably would haul out four or five Sunfish or other small sailboats on a really big power boat. Then I would power out to a nice place and launch the sailboats."

His selection is motivated because he prefers single-handed sailing on small boats such as Lasers, Sunfish and Force 5's.

"The advantage is that you can

rig quickly," he says. "It's more sporting. You have more control of your own destiny. It's you and the elements. You don't have the political and social angles of sailing with a large crew on a big boat, especially where owners' egos are involved."

Fries is a tall, good-looking 37-year-old who grew up on Watkins Lake in Drayton Plains, Michigan. He's been sailing since he started crewing for his father on *Snipes* at the age of four. He got his first Sunfish when he was ten.

"We had four Sunfish in our family---one for me, one for each of my two brothers, and one for my father, so that we could have races. I started winning them when I was around 12 or 13."

Later at Michigan State University, he captained the sailing team. He was a Collegiate All-American in 1973 and 1974, and in 1975 and 1978 he won the Sunfish World Title. Between 1980 and 1984 he won four consecutive World Force 5 Championships. He has also won national titles in small boats.

After competing in 26 different nations, he selects as his favorite sailing spot outside the United States the waters off the Caribbean island of Martinique.

However, he prefers fresh water and inland lakes. In Michigan, his favorite spot is Lake Leelanau. "It's clean, long and narrow," he says, "and it gets that nice thermal breeze that comes off Lake Michigan."

We agree with him. We have camped and sailed on Lake Leelanau, and loved it. Good winds and flat waters---the sailor's ideal. Even powerboaters don't mind the wind if the water is flat.

For a nearby place to relax, Fries likes the Bluebird Restaurant in Leland.

When he isn't sailing, he heads the high school special education program in the Birmingham Schools. His excellent book, "Start Sailing Right," is published by the United States Yacht Racing Union and the American Red Cross. It is their official learn-to-sail book.

Another expert is J. Patrick Wright, who made a name for himself as author of "On a Clear Day You Can See General Motors," an account of John DeLorean's career.

Now the owner of Wright Enterprises, Inc., in Harper Woods, Michigan, he is also an experienced sailor. Among his more memorable experiences was being aboard the *Tomahawk* when it sunk in 10-foot seas and bone-chilling 40 mile-per-hour winds during 1985's stormy Port Huron to Mackinac race. At present Wright owns and skips a Sea Ray Weekender.

He and his friends like to anchor on the sandy bottom of the Canadian side of Lake St. Clair. They raft off a friend's 40-foot sailboat and use a 20-foot bow rider for water skiing.

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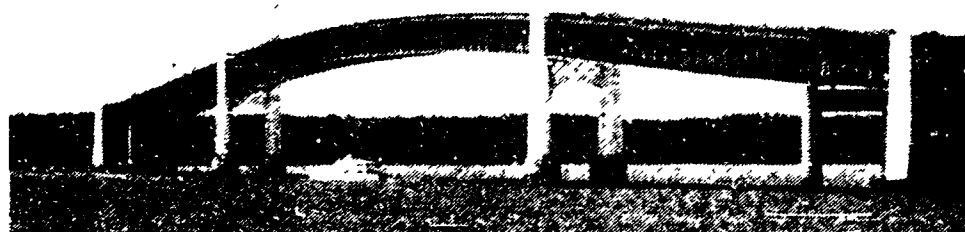

They also like to go ski-bobbing and tubing. Afterwards, they like the good fried fish at the nearby Belle Buoy Restaurant on the Puce River at Tecumseh, Ontario, a hangout for boaters.

He also recommends the Round Bar at Put-in-Bay in Lake Erie. "At the end of the Mills Cup Race the Round Bar is packed to the rafters," Wright says. "They have great hamburgers and fries there."

When he's in northern Michigan, the Wright recommendation is The Pier. He calls it "the happening place at Harbor Springs."

His favorite sailing is in the Bayview Yacht Club's Port Huron to Mackinac Race. "It's one of the great sailing opportunities, because you literally see all of Lake Huron. You wake up after your shift and realize you are in the northern part of Lake Huron. After you've rounded the Cove Island light, you can smell the pine trees and there's nothing more invigorating."

"The whole Mackinac Race," says Wright, "is geared to being the first crew in your class to get to the Pink Pony on the island. Another island rendezvous for sailors is the Mustang Lounge."

Other Wright stuff about Mackinac Island is having cocktails while watching the sun set from the porch at the Island House, or dining at the Lakeview, Chippewa and Grand Hotels.

A favorite Mackinac hangout for well-known sailor Rick Grow is the dining room at the Hotel Iroquois on the Beach. "From there you can see the bridge, and the boats coming in," he says.

Grow and his former sailboat, the *Walloon*, have racked up a record six

wins in class in the Mackinac race. An attorney with the prestigious firm of Pepper, Hamilton and Scheetz, Grow recently sold his winning 35-footer. Now he owns the *Carreda*, a speedy 41-footer. He expects it to enable him to finish the Mackinac in even less time.

Another favorite Grow hangout is the Caddy Shack. "We've had fun there over the years. It's beside the Grand Hotel and it's a good place to have dinner, a small restaurant with a beautiful view."

Grow's family meets him at Mackinac Island every year when the race is over. "We all pile on the boat and take off for the North Channel. Those waters are Nirvana for a sailboater, the prettiest cruising area in the Great Lakes."

The Grow's like to wind through the Les Cheneaux Islands and then over to the Ontario shore. The area is where the last glacier melted, leaving watery pits and hollows. They once were filled with the drainage of the glacier's incredible mass.

"Parts of the North Channel are a lot like the fjords of Norway," says Grow. "There are gorgeous mountains in the background."

"It's interesting that this area is inhabited primarily by power boats through the middle of July, the time of the Mackinac Race. After that it's entirely sailboats."

The favorite boating area for Troy patent attorney Harold W. Milton, Jr. is Holland. He likes the combination of two boating options -- on the sheltered waters of Lake Macatawa, or through the channel marked by Holland's big red lighthouse and onto the open waters of

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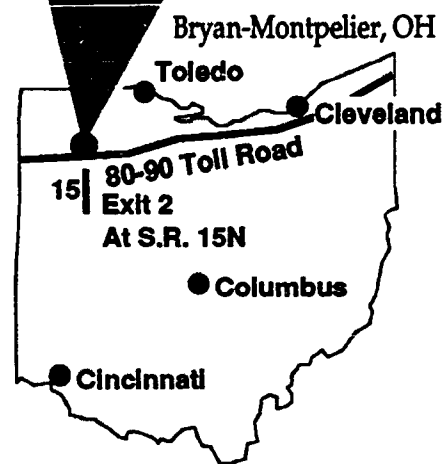

Lake Michigan. (He has another reason for preferring Holland for boating: his friend Shirley Swaney owns a cottage there.)

"If the winds are too high for sailing on Lake Michigan," says Milton, "you can almost always sail on Lake Macatawa."

Milton tells of taking friends for a sail several years ago, when he was first learning to handle his big 33-foot Hobie monohulled sailboat. "I told them we could sail on Lake Macatawa, but that it was a smaller lake and I would have to turn the boat around a lot, and I was just learning how to do that."

"If we go out on Lake Michigan," Milton told his friends, "we can sail for 80 miles and I won't have to turn around -- or come about -- until we get to Milwaukee."

Milton and Swaney like to take sidetrips, particularly northward to Grand Haven, where boaters are greeted with excellent docking facilities and empty slips. "We like shopping in the mall that occupies a renovated piano factory."

At Holland, the twosome enjoy docking and dining at The Sandpiper Restaurant. Their other recommendations for good food in Holland: for Italian, Pereddies on Washington Avenue; for hamburgers,

The Parkway on South Shore Drive, and for a health food deli, "Till Midnight on College Avenue."

Ben Walker had recently sold his Miami Beach Cable TV business, and he was looking for a challenging hobby. Ben bought Greenbush, and the dirt flew. Ponds and an island green were added, 7 of 9 holes were redesigned, 1,668 trees were added, and irrigation installed with the goal of creating the nicest little 9 hole course in Michigan.

If you have a good short game, you'll enjoy this 2,700 yard Par 34 layout. With 10 minutes between Tee Times, waiting between shots is rare, and players enjoy Greenbush. **Springport Hills**

Springport Hills is a pleasant, relatively open layout on gently rolling terrain. Owners Steve and Linda Ashford acquired the course seven years ago and have been renovating and upgrading ever since, adding irrigation and a new two story restaurant and clubhouse. Plans for expansion to 18 holes are on the drawing board.

At 2,902 yards, the course is relatively easy, but fun to play. The Course is well maintained and the Ashfords treat all their guests like family.

Since being purchased by a local investor group in 1988, Pine River has been undergoing continuous changes and improvements. The clubhouse has been refurbished, trees planted, equipment upgraded, and of course the new nine.

The golf course plays across the valley created by the Little Black River just northwest of Cheboygan. The river comes into play on 8 holes, and the changes in elevation and relatively open layout are accented by mature hardwoods and pine. The course offers a variety of holes with the front 9 having a Scottish look with many rolling mounds, while the back 9 has more of a picturesque northern woodlands design.

Golf can be combined with a trip to play "The Rock" on Drummond Island or any of the other Sunrise Side courses on the way to or from the downstate areas on US-23 or M-33.

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Janine Turner happy with role in revived 'Northern Exposure'

Sense of adventure common to actress, character

Janine Turner fits into her role as an adventurous pilot in CBS' "Northern Exposure" as snugly as residents of Cicely, Alaska, fit into their parkas.

"Northern Exposure," a refreshing one-hour drama with comedic overtones, returned to the CBS schedule earlier this month after a successful, but nonetheless short run last summer. It currently airs Mondays.

The show follows the antics of the eccentric residents of Cicely, a remote village deep in the Alaskan wilderness.

The part fell right into Turner's hands, she said. "I auditioned — they videotaped me in New York — and then they flew me out to L.A. the next day, and it happened very fast, which is a great way to have it happen because you don't have to think about it too much."

But even if she'd had the time to think about tackling the role, she undoubtedly would have taken it anyway. With executive producers Joshua Brand and John Falsey, who created shows such as "St. Elsewhere" and "A Year in the Life," Turner appreciates the show's wit.

"This show is eccentric and kind

of a touch of black comedy, and it's intelligent. And Maggie is a character that's the antithesis to cheese-cake," she said. "I moved to New York four years ago to study acting and to do off-Broadway and to be very selective with what I did. And for TV I think that Maggie's no-nonsense and a pilot and a landlord and is in big Alaskan boots and baggie pants all the time, so I love the role. She deals with people from her gut and her instinct and her intelligence."

Born in Lincoln, Neb., Turner moved with her family at the age of 3 to Euless, Texas, between Dallas and Fort Worth. Her love of the arts began in junior high school, when she studied dance and became an apprentice with the Fort Worth Ballet. At age 12 she took her first trip to New York City and fell in love with the pulse of the Big Apple. Three years later she became the youngest client of the prestigious Wilhelmina modeling agency.

However, her parents insisted she return to Texas to finish her schooling, which proved to be one of her first lucky breaks.

"Dallas at that time was no longer just a thriving commerce. It was the embodiment of the nation's new hit series 'Dallas.' I met Leonard Katzman, the producer, and was cast as Lucy's friend Susan. Leonard encouraged me to move west. I finished high school a year early, packed up my Buick Regal and

drove to Hollywood," the actress said.

In addition to her regular role on "Dallas," Turner's first show, a late-night soap called "Behind the Screen" ran opposite Johnny Carson for 13 weeks. Then came her role as Laura Templeton on "General Hospital."

Family is important to Turner, and her family is proud of her success so far, she said, especially her dad, a West Point graduate and airplane pilot among an elite group of pilots who have flown Mach II, twice the speed of sound. How does he feel about her role as a pilot?

"Well, he's thrilled," she said, although she admits she doesn't do her own flying for the show. "He's never really taught me anything about flying technically, but just the attitude, the approach to flying."

The actress finds a similarity between her move from Texas to California and her character's move to Alaska.

"She's kind of traveled and she's cultural but I think that she wanted to get away. She went to Alaska with her boyfriend and he left, and she ended up staying. I think that we mirror each other with the sense of adventure and independence."

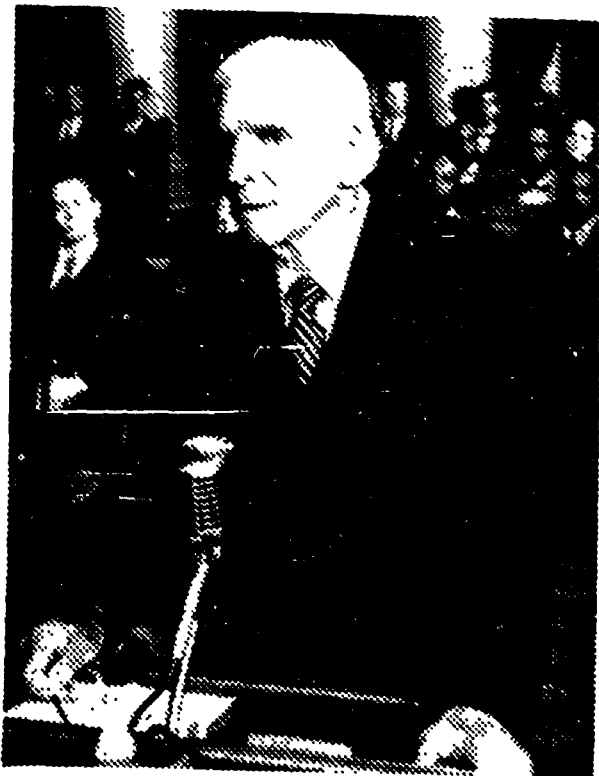
It seemed Nimoy had found himself a new niche. He followed with *Three Men and a Baby*, *The Good Mother* and last year's *Funny About Love*.

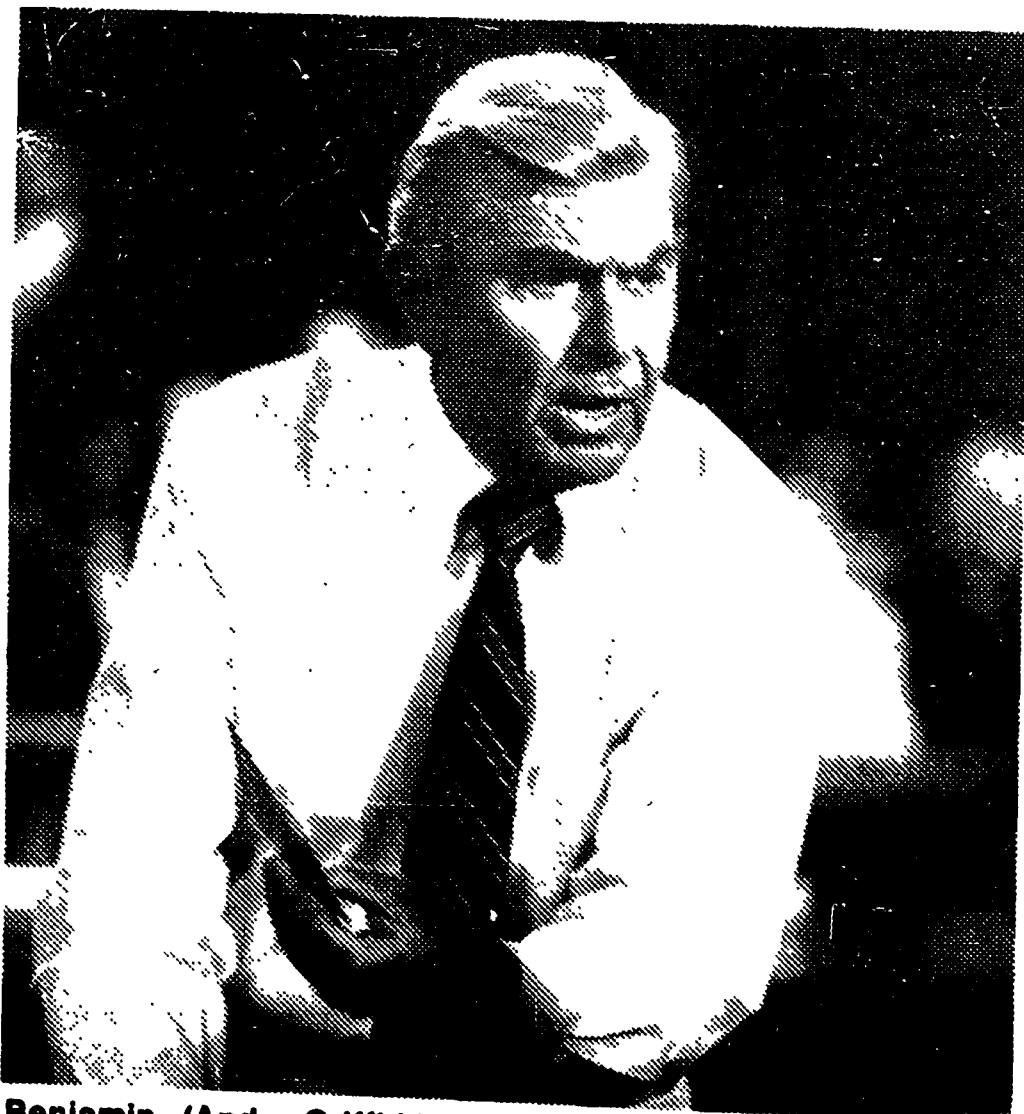

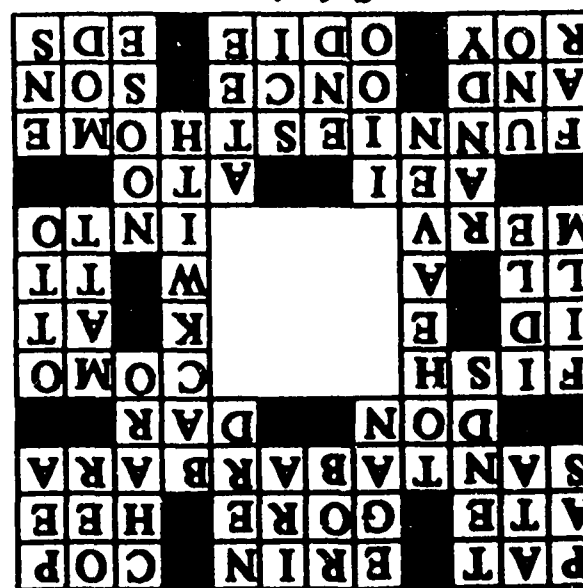

ESPN to air baseball's opener

ESPN begins its second season as the "Daily Electronic Voice" of Major League Baseball, Monday, April 8, with an opening day doubleheader that begins the season where the World Series banner ended last year.

The cable network provides exclusive coverage of the first pitch of the season at the traditional opener in Cincinnati, where the World Champion Reds will take on the Houston Astros. Then it's on to Arlington, Texas, where current media darling and future Hall of Famer Nolan Ryan will be on the mound when the Rangers take on the Milwaukee Brewers.

But the opening day games are just the tip of the iceberg. In 1989, ESPN

signed a three-year contract that allows it to carry up to 175 games a year through the 1993 season. Throw in the electronic cut-ins that switch from the scheduled game to live coverage of record-setting moments, and you have the most comprehensive coverage available.

This year, ESPN's *Sunday Night Baseball* will feature 25 games from 24 ballparks beginning April 14, when Oakland hosts Seattle.

Except already scheduled Sunday night and holiday matchups, games will be selected on a weekly basis during the regular season. However, games may be chosen on even shorter notice the last three weeks of the season to ensure they have a bearing on the divisional races.

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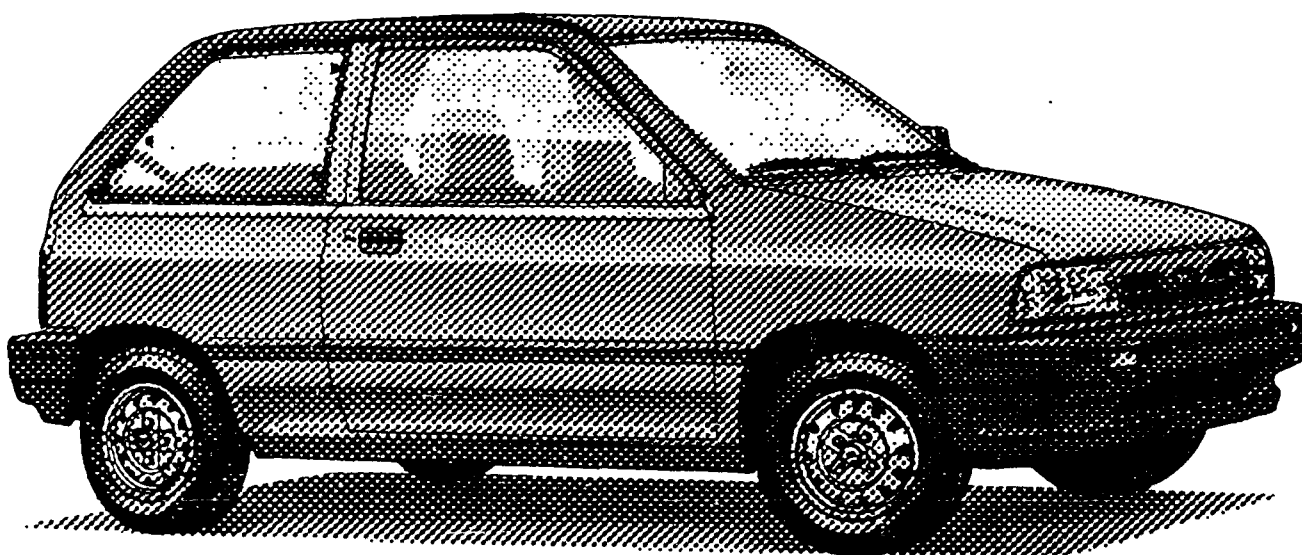
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
