

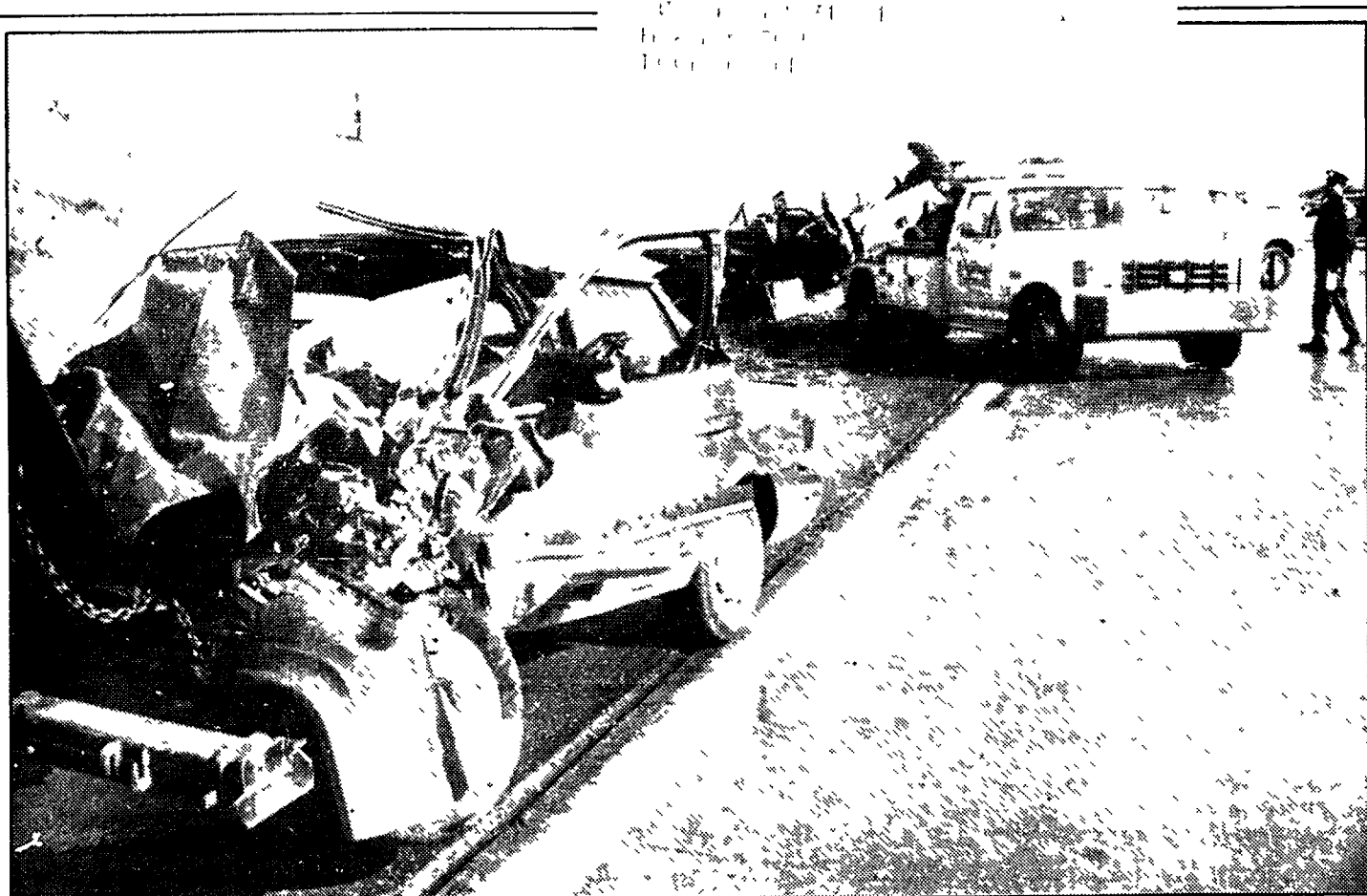

I-275 crash kills two people

A Westland man faces two counts of manslaughter after he allegedly triggered a four-car collision on busy I-275 Friday morning.

Arthur James Bowes, 22, was arraigned on two counts of manslaughter with a motor vehicle Friday afternoon. Earlier that day his car was "weaving in and out of traffic" on northbound I-275 near the Six Mile Road exchange before his vehicle struck the back of a Ford Tempo driven by Mirja Kalaj, 47, of Canton, Michigan State Police Sgt. Larry Richardson said.

Impact sent Kalaj's car hurtling through the median into the southbound lane where it eventually struck a Ford pickup driven by Karl J. Beebe, 34, of Shepherd.

Kalaj and Beebe died in the head-on collision, Richardson said.

Before the fatal crash Kalaj's car hit another vehicle, but police said its driver, a Farmington Hills man, was not seriously injured.

The suspect was arrested approximately 600 feet from the scene as he attempted to flee, Richardson said. The suspect was not injured, he said.

"His car had some minor scrapes," Richardson said.

The collision occurred at approximately 7 a.m. during heavy traffic. Traffic was shut down to one lane on southbound I-275 for several hours Friday morning.

City council drops tax rate, but also ends trash disposal

The city council Thursday night voted to end millage-paid curbside refuse collection and return half the resulting reduction in the city's cost to residents in the form of a millage reduction.

But residents will likely be charged per bag of curbside trash under the new system.

The council set the city's operating millage at 9.48 mills for next year, 13 percent below this year's 10.93 mills. The total city millage, including levies for the South Main Street paving bond, Randolph Drain project and street reconstruction program, would be 13.94 mills. The total is 6 percent below this year's figure.

Though the proposed millages are both below this year's city millages, the city's property value growth — due to increased assessments and new construction — will result in a revenue increase of about 5 percent.

The council called a public hearing for May 13 on the proposed millage rates. The operating millage rate is well below the city's maximum allowed rate of 15.99 mills, the amount allowed under the Headlee roll-back formula. The rate is also under the amount requiring a Truth-in-Taxation hearing.

The millage rate will allow the city to fund a \$150,000 Budget Stabilization Fund, on the advice of city auditors Plante & Moran. The fund, about 5 percent of the total city general fund, is designed to assuage the potential fears of current bond investors and help assure favorable ratings

on bonds to finance projects like the expanded Cady Street parking deck.

The council still needs to trim about \$93,200 from the general fund to meet the millage target. Council members plan to ask city employees to agree to deferred pay increases to cover most of the amount. Police union officials had stated their willingness to back a similar proposal at previous council meetings.

The alternative to deferred pay raises, according to the council, may be more layoffs.

Next year's proposed budget does include funding for the two police patrol positions that were cut in April, based on the proposed early retirement of one officer. Two officers took dispatching positions under a union option after being issued layoff notices in March, resulting in the layoff of two dispatchers in April.

A patrol position vacated in January when an officer was fired would not be refilled under the proposed budget.

City council members cited the inequity of a millage based refuse collection system in their de-

cision to end millage-funded refuse collection, pointing out that residents who generate less trash are not charged differently than those who generate more. They reasoned that a per-bag charge would likely encourage more recycling, because residents would not be charged for curbside pickup of recyclable materials. The recycling program is mandated by the Wayne County Solid Waste Plan.

Ever-increasing refuse disposal costs also influenced the council's decision. The city's refuse collection program has more than tripled in cost over the past five years, from \$149,686 during the 1986/1987 fiscal year to \$481,175 for the 1990/1991 fiscal year. Next year's cost was projected at \$563,995, a 17-percent increase over this year's figure.

The rising costs have been due largely to increased disposal fees at the Arbor Hills landfill in Salem, which takes the city's trash.

Next year's cost was projected to pay at least part of the curbside recycling program as well.

Major push under way to fund 4th

Independence Day may be two months away yet, but the date is approaching more than fast enough for members of the Michigan Military Family Support Group.

The support group's West Side Chapter, led by co-founder Ginny Hathorn, is spearheading efforts to make this year's Fourth of July celebrations bigger and better than ever in honor of troops returning from the Persian Gulf.

Operation Desert Storm members and families are being invited to the festivities, as are soldiers from past military engagements.

Hathorn and others involved in planning for the Fourth met Wednesday night at city hall to review fund-raising efforts and activity schedules for the day. The group hopes to raise \$20,000 to make up for a loss in city and township fireworks funding and sponsor a day's worth of entertainment.

Township trustees declined to fund the annual Fourth of July fireworks display this year due to liability concerns, and the city council followed suit. Several spectators at last year's event were slightly injured by falling debris. The township agreed to donate \$500 to the parade, and the

city is expected to match that offer.

"People have got to understand that the city and township are not doing it this year, and the citizens of the community need to make up the difference," Hathorn said.

Some groups have come forward already to help take up the slack. The local chapter of the Okinawan Karate Clubs is planning to raise thousands through a benefit karate tournament starting at noon June 8 at the Northville Recreation Center. Hundreds of karate students from across Michigan, surrounding states and Ontario are expected to attend.

Fund-raisers plan to target businesses in and around Northville for help as well. The preliminary budget for the day's festivities includes the parade, fireworks display, live entertainment, and food for the \$20,000 estimate.

Plans for the Fourth call for the traditional Main Street Bed Races, morning parade, a downtown Fun Fair with clowns and other live entertainment, a special afternoon Homecoming Ceremony at the Main Street bandshell, and a bandshell Dance-a-Thon.

The CBS network may televise the local festivities, organizers said.

Jaycees lose state affiliation

The Northville Jaycees officially ceased to exist last month when its membership dropped to 18.

The local group, which formed in 1956 and has coordinated local events including the Fourth of July parade and fireworks displays for more than 20 years, was disaffiliated in April in accordance with national Jaycees policy for falling below 20 members.

Jaycees President Bob Cummings was uncertain about the reasons behind the decline of the group, which claimed more than 100 members a few years ago.

Cummings was elected president last year, and said membership problems have been evident since the start of his one-year term. "Since last May, I've had a meeting every month," he said. "There were so many times I'd sit at Township Hall and 7:30 would come and go and nobody else would show."

"We've switched meeting nights to actually accommodate people ... and it didn't make any difference."

The Jaycees group has sponsored activities as diverse as hayrides, volleyball tournaments, banquets and other social events during its 35-year history.

During Cummings' first term as president, in 1984, the group regularly boasted three-figure membership numbers.

"We've been doing real well since,"

he said, "until about two years ago, when everything started to crumble. We were not seeing the commitment from the community."

"It's become, for me, very discouraging," he said. "I've been through good times and bad times, but this has been the worst."

Cummings said the group could have adopted a strategy used by some others to stay alive, signing up inactive members to swell its ranks. "Not to drop below 20 I could have renewed two people," he said, but he questioned the purpose of such a strategy. "Why become just a paper chapter? The state does have a couple of them. They claim to be a chapter but there's no members."

The Jaycees' membership plight was the subject of a March 21 Northville Record article, but the news caused little reaction, Cummings said.

"I got one call (from a potential member) and then she changed her mind," he said.

Another Jaycees organization attempted to come to Northville's aid, with little success, Cummings added: "Westland came in and recruited 10 new people; I've never seen them."

The group's ultimate demise is not yet assured, Cummings said. "If we're dead or not, I'm not sure. We are disaffiliated," he said.

"This community deserves a Jaycees chapter, but it can't exist with-

Republicans prepare for race

One candidate jumped in head-first. Another is toeing the water.

Both are Republicans eyeing immersion in Lansing's political pool. Plymouth City Commissioner Jerry Vorva and Plymouth Township Trustee John Stewart have diverse personal approaches to the state house vacancy created when Gerald Law abruptly left his 36th District seat.

Vorva, a real estate agent and ex-Plymouth police officer, last week eagerly announced his candidacy for a run-off election expected this summer. He intends to mount an aggressive "grassroots campaign" aided by local voters he feels are disaffected by the political status quo.

Stewart, an attorney, hedged his bets, spent the weekend talking to "good, personal friends" and is expected to announce his decision today.

Vorva and Stewart would join Northville Township Supervisor Georgina Goss as possible Republican replacements for Law, recently named Plymouth Township supervisor.

Vorva hit the campaign trail running. He said he already had decided to challenge Law in the 1992 Republican primary and the representative's departure merely hastened his candidacy.

"Feedback I received was that Gerry (Law) had been a little discontented," Vorva said. "We need someone in there with the energy I have; someone who is accessible to the people."

Vorva lists his strengths as "tenacity, intelligence, and the ability to get things done" and rattles off an imposing list of issues he said need immediate attention.

"We have to address the tax situation, education, and crime," he said.

A high-priority item is using the educational system to reduce criminal activity among juveniles, Vorva said. He said teens especially can benefit from strong educational programs.

But Vorva said he does not believe in throwing educational money to the wind.

"It's not necessarily how much we spend... but what we are getting for our money," he said.

Vorva spent 10 years patrolling Plymouth's streets before a former city manager fired him from the police department. He said he was dismissed "unfairly, unjustly" and he later won a cash settlement from the City of Plymouth.

In 1989, he was elected to the Plymouth City Commission.

"I was completely vindicated by the citizens," he said, adding that "ethics, behavior and propriety in public life are always important to me."

Vorva does not boast the big name, local pol support group that Goss has garnered. His appeal is the average voter, he said.

"I have an outstanding grassroots support system that is widespread throughout the Plymouth area," he said. "We want a representative that listens to the people and not the special interests."

Stewart on Friday said he "hadn't decided" whether to run for Law's seat. But he certainly did not close the door on the chance that he might.

"I don't know when the filing deadline is; I'm working on a press release for Monday," he said. If Monday is his official announce-

ment day, Friday was a practice run.

"It's hard for me to imagine anybody better prepared (for) the issues," he said. "I'm contemplating (running) and talking with a lot of people."

"I'm fortunate to have a lot of good, personal friends."

Stewart, whose township board terms expires in 1992, already mentioned himself as a candidate in one publication.

His picture, with the caption "Candidate for State Representative — 36th District" appeared in a program for a recent GOP dinner.

But Stewart said the decision on his candidacy may lie with local political movers and shakers, the "political aspect" of the race, as he calls it.

Stewart called for a candidate debate to discuss topics such as equal rights for women, abortion, schools of choice, and unemployment compensation.

"Let's get into the substance of the issues," he said.

Stewart does not believe the Republican race will dissolve into a blood-bath. But he does want to be involved in party skull sessions.

"I'm a team guy (but) people have to talk to me," he said.

Democrats shy away from seat

Timing is everything, and the timing has been poor for the potential Democratic opposition to a Republican successor for Gerald Law's state House seat.

At least two previous candidates for the 36th District seat being vacated by Law have already made bids for more local positions.

Jeanne Stemplen of Northville Township, current vice-chair of the Schoolcraft College board, is seeking re-election to that post. She ran against Law four years ago but says it is now too late to withdraw from the Schoolcraft race.

Plymouth attorney Dennis Shrewsbury ran against Law last November and lost by a 2-1 margin. He has now submitted petitions for a seat on the Plymouth City Commission and would have to withdraw them before running for the House seat.

"That's a real problem, because I'm really technically an announced candidate for the Plymouth City Commission," Shrewsbury said. "This other thing came up kind of suddenly."

Shrewsbury cited the uphill battle faced by any non-Republican candidates in the Northville / Plymouth / Canton district as another imped-

ment to his state candidacy.

"In this district, unless there's a real strong commitment to a Democrat, it's tough to win... as I learned last year," he said.

Though he would not promise to keep his hat out of the state ring this time, Shrewsbury suggested political differences against a Republican candidate might not be strong enough to convince him to run against one.

"If there's a decent Republican who's running, and actually I think there are, then maybe that Republican could put forward some issues that I would be comfortable with," he said. "If it turns out that there are no decent candidates, I'll reconsider."

Former Wayne County Commissioner William Joyner, who challenged Law in 1982, declined to enter the fray this time. "I would love to go for it, but I'm having too much fun being out of politics," he said.

Calling Law "as conservative as they come," Joyner suggested that the best hope for Democrats in this election may be a more moderate Republican.

"I wish a Democrat could run and win," he said, adding "I know the difficulty in my district." Joyner also had words of praise for at least one

declared Republican candidate. "I think (Northville Township Supervisor) Georgina Goss is a wonderful lady. I think she'd make a great state representative," he said.

But Joyner said he was bothered by the appearance of political cronyism, and the image of deals made beforehand in "smoke-filled rooms," behind Law's support of Georgina Goss for his seat and Wayne County Commissioner Susan Heintz' backing of former Plymouth Township Supervisor Maurice Breen for her newly-vacated spot.

"The action itself may not have been improper but it gives the appearance of impropriety," he said.

Law was appointed Plymouth Township supervisor by township trustees April 23 after Breen resigned to take Heintz' seat on the commission. Heintz left two weeks ago to take a job as head of Gov. John Engler's regional office for southeastern Michigan.

Law earned an annual salary of \$45,000 and an additional \$10,000 in travel expenses in his fifth term as state representative. He cited the rigors of travel to and from Lansing as the reason behind his acceptance of the local position.

Fight at lodge may give rise to assault charges

Dispute between landlord, ex-manager heads to court

The former manager of the Winner's Circle apartment complex is being sued by her landlord, Vernon Huntoon of Novi.

Huntoon signed the first two of three complaints against Lisa Foucha and her husband April 19, the day after she was quoted in a Northville Record series that detailed the substandard conditions at Huntoon's 111 W. Main St. apartment complex.

Huntoon's wife Doris, in a telephone interview Friday, said there was no connection between the timing of the lawsuits and Foucha's interview in the Record.

Foucha received the first of three court complaints, a notice to appear in small claims court over back rent and damages, on Monday, April 22. The complaint had been signed by Huntoon on April 19. A police complaint for damage to an apartment door against her husband, Justin Bodenschatz, also was signed April 19.

On April 26, the couple received an eviction court no-

tice dated April 22 seeking back rent and money for damage to the door.

"That's three times he's suing us for one . . . door," Foucha said.

Huntoon is seeking differing amounts of rent in the different court cases. The small claims notice seeks a total of \$1,695, including \$1,370 for 21 weeks of back rent, \$240 for rent that Huntoon claimed Foucha collected from another tenant but did not turn in to him while she was manager, and \$85 for replacement of the damaged door.

Foucha disputes the amount of back rent owed, and she said she believes Huntoon received the \$240. At that time, she said, Huntoon also claimed not to have received a money order from another tenant, but she has documentation that Huntoon cashed the money order two weeks later.

On the April 22 eviction notice, Huntoon claimed the couple owed a total of \$1,450, including \$1,365 for 21 weeks of back rent at \$65 a week and \$85 for damage to the apartment door.

Huntoon first handed Foucha an eviction notice April

1, claiming she owed a total of \$1,435 — \$1,175 for back rent plus \$260 he claimed she collected from another tenant but did not turn in.

Doris Huntoon would not give a Record reporter the exact amount of back rent and damages owed by the couple, saying she would give it to the couple instead.

"They've got two rooms and I'm only charging them for one," she added.

Vernon Huntoon filed the malicious destruction charge against Bodenschatz April 19 after reading about the incident in the Record. Bodenschatz had reportedly kicked in a door at 111 W. Main St. early on the morning of April 14, and the report was mentioned in the newspaper's "Police News" section.

Bodenschatz turned himself over to city police last Thursday on the malicious destruction charge and was released on a \$500 personal bond. He is due in 35th District Court May 30 on the charge.

Foucha claimed much of the damage to the door was done previously, when city firefighters broke into the apartment during a medical emergency Jan. 20. Her

claim is supported by a fire department report on the emergency.

Neither the door nor a broken lock had been replaced as of press time Friday.

Foucha's troubles with the landlord began months before the April 18 Record series. The couple and their two children, both under 2 years old, had lived in two adjoining rooms upstairs at the Winner's Circle for several months until Huntoon ordered her to vacate one of the rooms to make way for a furnace in February.

The couple has since moved the furniture from the room, but the landlord has not installed the furnace or a door between the two rooms. The family still uses the vacated room's door for entry to the apartment due to the un-repaired lock on the other door.

Foucha quit as manager in March. Huntoon handed her the first eviction notice April 1 for failure to pay back rent, claiming she owed \$1,435. She questioned the amount and said then that she would let him take her to court before moving out.

The couple's next court date, for the eviction notice, is Wednesday, May 8, at 35th District Court.

Police warn of building cons

Northville police are warning residents to be wary of driveway paving and maintenance deals that sound too good to be true. Chances are, they might be.

Every spring, traveling bands of criminals take advantage of homeowners by selling them substandard paving and resealing work, often at inflated prices, police warn. The criminals may say they just happen to be in the neighborhood, or have material left over from another job and can give the homeowner a great deal on the work. They prefer to work fast, unloading equipment and beginning a job before victims have a chance to change their minds.

The travelers typically work in groups of three

or four men, but they may bring along women and children to give the illusion of a family affair. They are usually polite, and use relatively new and clean equipment, according to police. Their trucks may bear magnetic signs with the name of a legitimate-sounding company, and they may even have professional-looking business cards.

Though they appear professional, their work often is not. Asphalt may be laid much thinner than a reputable contractor would do it. Or a sealing application on an existing driveway may be thinned so much that it soon washes away.

The con artists may ask for, and get, thousands of dollars in advance for a job, so they can go and buy materials. They seldom return to the job after-

wards. They also have been known to talk their way into a home just to case it out, and one will distract the owner while the other grabs cash and valuables.

Senior citizens are a frequent target, and the con men prefer to work rural areas though they have been known to take advantage of city residents as well.

Homeowners can defend themselves from such scams in a number of ways, police said. Before agreeing to a job, ask a contractor for credit and bank references and call the local chamber of commerce. A quick call to local or state police may also help.

The homeowner's greatest protection is taking the time to check out a contractor's claims.

Group reviews school millage

A local citizens group planned to survey local voters on a line-item school millage proposal, but instead decided to postpone the action.

Citizens for a Better Northville (CBN) school coordinator Jeff Hampton said the group's proposal—to allow voters to make line-item decisions on the school budget—might have to be put on hold to give the group time to review the district's preliminary budget.

The budget was presented at a school board meeting April 29.

Hampton said that based on reports he has heard about the budget, he suspects the request to renew levied mills is actually a tax increase because of increased assessments.

At the April 22 meeting, a district finance committee said the increased assessments would not make up for rising costs and increasing student populations, requiring the district to cut \$700,000 from its preliminary budget.

Hampton said he is not convinced, and CBN plans to review the budget proposal.

Superintendent George Bell said if CBN members want to become informed about where money in the budget will be spent, they will have the opportunity during upcoming meetings.

The survey of voters may begin in a few weeks if the group finds the budget proposal satisfactory, Hampton said.

However, Bell said the Citizens for a Better Northville proposal to allow voters to make line-item decisions on the budget would remain illegal even if a majority of Northville voters agreed to the plan.

"Certainly the proposal as it was identified by (CBN school coordinator Jeff) Hampton in his letter to me isn't even legal," Bell said.

Hampton recently wrote Bell asking that the June 10 millage proposal be broken down to allow voters to accept or reject expenditures for specific areas of school operations.

For example, voters could choose to reject the amount of money the district proposed to spend on athletics, forcing the board to cut athletics from the program or ask voters for a lesser, greater or equal amount in a future election.

A state Department of Education official questioned the legality of the

proposal, saying it could be considered an inappropriate expenditure.

And because the law specifically gives local boards of education the power to adopt budgets, setting up an election asking voters to do the job could be an illegal expense.

A line-item voter approval of school budget items is unprecedented in Michigan, according to the education department.

Hampton said the opinion was not surprising, but questioned its accuracy.

"My considered judgement is the state's opinion is going to run conducive with the school district's," Hampton said.

Northville schools should follow the desires of local voters if the survey shows voters would prefer a line-item budget proposal and let the state sue if the election was illegal, he said.

"Everybody's saying it may be this or it may be that; let's find out," Hampton said.

If Northville schools refuse to put a line-item budget proposal on the ballot, Hampton said he "can't say" whether or not he would take the issue to court himself.

CBN first planned to begin surveying voters May 2. The group would give the results to the Northville School Board at the first scheduled meeting following the survey if the results show public support for the idea.

"Should the public support the proposal, we will submit the survey results to Dr. Bell and the Northville school board with the hope that the public's preference could find its way into the board's decision on the millage ballot language," a CBN press release said.

If the survey shows voters are happy with the current method of voting on millage proposals, CBN will drop the issue, Hampton said.

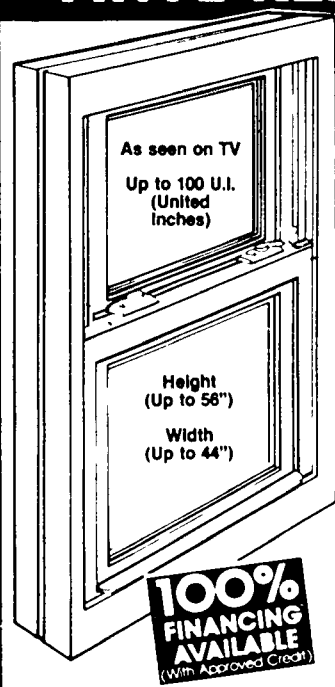
A special board meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. tonight, May 6, at Old Village School. The next regularly scheduled meeting is May 13 at the same time and place.

Bell said the CBN proposal will not be on the June 10 ballot. A Department of Education spokesperson said the deadline for filing petitions to have an issue on a June 10 election ballot was April 22.

Bell said the district has already begun plans to get the ballots printed, and it is too late to place any additional items on the ballot.

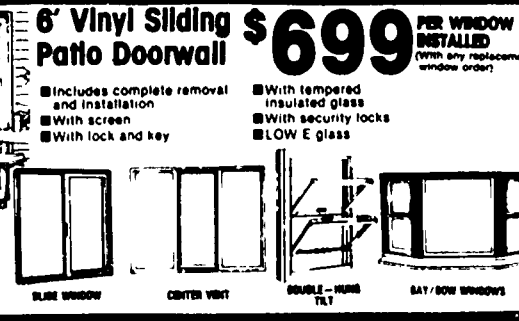

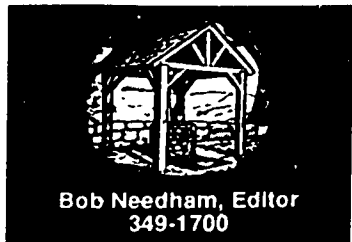

Time to pull together for the Fourth of July

Never has a bigger Independence Day celebration been planned in Northville, and never in recent times has the event been without the Northville Jaycees, not to mention publicly funded fireworks. What's a community to do?

The disaffiliation of the Jaycees is disturbing news for Northville. Their membership dropping below the magic number of 20, the group which does so much for the community suddenly does not exist.

Jaycees President Bob Cummings fought to generate new interest in his group, but couldn't find enough. Much to his credit, he did not try to keep the organization afloat with "paper memberships" of people not really involved in the group.

The Northville Jaycees work very hard for this community, and we'll be poorer without them. The group's demise may not be permanent one; we certainly hope that the Jaycees will rise again soon.

For now, though, they do not exist as a group. And in one sense, the loss of the Jaycees comes at a particularly bad time.

In Northville the Jaycees are known, more than anything else, for organizing and sponsoring much of the community's extensive Fourth of July celebrations. The fireworks and parade have been Jaycees projects for years.

Planning for this year's Independence Day observances is already in high gear, with hopes high that this year's will be the biggest such celebration Northville has ever hosted. What happens without the Jaycees?

Meanwhile, the city and township this year did not renew their usual funding of the fireworks display which attracts thousands to the mall by the high school.

Frankly, those decisions made sense for a couple of reasons. Both governments face ever-tightening budget pictures, and any expense beyond basic services deserves close scrutiny. In addition, last year's fireworks display resulted in some minor injuries to viewers. Nothing serious, but enough to raise a red flag of liability for local officials.

Both governments will still donate to the parade. But what happens without their fireworks money?

It appears the Northville-based West Side Chapter of the Michigan Military Family Support Group will, to a large extent, pick up where the Jaycees left off. That group, which gained tremendous prominence before and during the Persian Gulf War, appears prepared and determined to pull off a tremendous Fourth of July this year. We're grateful for its efforts.

Support group members and other organizations, however, need a lot of support and assistance from the rest of the community. They have established an extremely ambitious program for the Fourth this year. The parade will be bigger than ever before, but that's only the start. In addition to the rest of the traditional day's happenings, organizers this year hope to add a downtown fun fair, a special homecoming ceremony for members of the armed forces, and a danceathon.

Organizers plan a tremendous, extensive Independence Day for Northville — but it's going to cost an estimated \$20,000, much more than ever before, and past sources of funding have almost dried up.

The scary world of aerobics

My answer came in the form of a flyer dropped at my apartment door. It said the complex was organizing aerobics classes three nights a week.

Sounded simple enough. I have cable. I've seen "Bodies in Motion." You know, that show on ESPN where some Denny Terrio lookalike leads a couple of female assistants through an aerobics session like Tony Orlando leading Dawn through "He a Yellow Ribbon." I mean they never stop smiling on that show. No wheezing. No red faces. No howls of agony.

Well, I'm here to tell you that Hollywood is once again misleading you.

My aerobics sessions don't make me smile. Grimace and wince maybe, but no smiles. Except when they're over.

Our instructor's name is Terri, which I'm certain is short for Terrorist. And my stagnant sinews are tops on her hit list. Ah, but she's a cunning one, since all of her torture is set to music.

The group meets at the community center. The tape begins and we start off by marching in place. Deceptively simple. Then she throws in a few kicks. Then some turns, sidesteps and lunges.

A lottery player born every minute



P.T. Barnum, the 19th Century circus entrepreneur, said, "There's a sucker born every minute."

A million suckers were born in 1972 when Michigan voters amended their constitution to allow a government lottery.

There's nothing wrong with gambling if you keep the wagers small and friendly and can afford the loss without jeopardizing your family's welfare.

But there is something cancerous about gambling when government (1) encourages the get-rich-quick mentality and (2) discourages work, thrift and investment as the way to the good life.

Now comes the Heartland Institute, the conservative think tank, with research proving what many of us guessed — namely, the lottery is a sucker bet in which state government plays P.T. Barnum at the expense of the poor and minorities.

Horses, as political pundit Bill Ballenger has often told us, are a better wager. Bettors get back more than 80 cents on \$1, said the former state racing commissioner, who should know.

The Michigan Lottery has lousy odds, say Heartland researchers Robert Allan Cooke, a

professor of philosophy at DePaul University and executive director of the Center for Business Ethics, and Sandeep Mangalmurti, a University of Chicago student.

Ticket sales from 1972 to 1989 totaled \$9.5 billion, producing \$3.9 billion for the school aid fund. That's after deducting administrative expenses. Bottom line: Bettors get back only about 50 cents on \$1.

The suckers voted yes on the theory the lottery could help schools. They leaped to the conclusion the lottery would help schools. All the while, the money was intended for the general fund, only a fraction of which goes for schools.

The suckers demanded the lottery money go for schools, so in 1981 the politicians earmarked the lottery for education. The suckers figured the lottery really did help schools. Actually, the law enabled the state to use the freed-up general fund money on other things.

So much for the financial machinations. What do lotteries do to people?

The poor, blacks and hispanics are proportionately bigger spenders on these sucker bets. Say the authors:

"Lottery advertisements tend to run in ethnic newspapers, not The Wall Street Journal; lotteries are promoted over rhythm and blues, not classical, radio stations.

"In some states lottery advertisements are most intense and frequent at the beginning of

the month, when Social Security and public assistance checks arrive. Such targeted advertising often portrays the lottery as a plausible, easy, and even recommended way of escaping the ghetto.

"The poor are told that success can be achieved painlessly, without hard work and perseverance . . . 49 percent of lottery players nationwide never finished high school."

They present a dizzying array of statistics demonstrating that lotteries are regressive — that is, they take a bigger chunk of lower incomes than higher incomes.

They tell the story of Rev. Thomas O'Gorman, a priest serving a poor black congregation in Chicago: "Curious about the amount of lottery play in his neighborhood, one Sunday he asked parishioners to save their losing tickets and bring them to services the next week. The following Sunday, he collected nearly \$5,000 in losing ticket stubs."

The authors say bad effects of lotteries could be mitigated by reducing promotions to the poor and paying out a bigger chunk of the wager. In practice, it won't happen. They want governmental lotteries eliminated.

In the meantime, we can all avoid suckerhood by not buying lottery tickets.

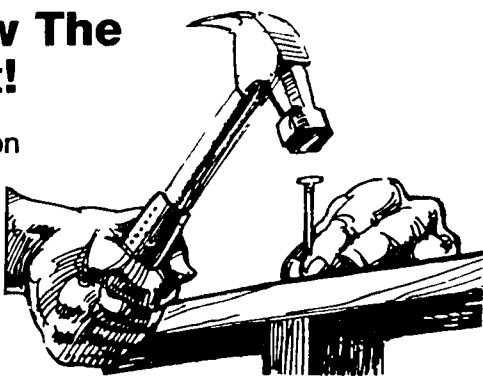

Notice is hereby given that a public hearing will be held on Monday, May 13, 1991, at 8:00 P.M. in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 215 W. Main Street, for the purpose of receiving testimony and discussing the proposed 1991-92 City Budget.

PROPOSED 1991 MILLAGE RATES: The following statements are provided, as required by State statute, concerning the 1991 proposed millage levies for the City of Northville:

The 1991 tax rate for City Operating Millage is proposed to be 9.48 mills, which is a reduction of 13.3% from the 1990 Operating tax rate of 10.93 mills. The City Council has authority under the City Charter to set the Operating millage rate within its maximum allowed rate of 15.99 mills, as adjusted by the Headlee roll-back formula.

The 1991 levy for the South Main Street Paving Bond retirement is proposed to be 0.35 mill, which is the same rate which was levied in 1990. This is the last year that this debt millage will be levied, since the bonds will be fully retired during fiscal year 1991-92.

The 1991 levy for the Randolph Drain Project is proposed to be 0.48 mill, compared to 0.52 mill levied in 1990, a decrease of 8.3%.

The 1991 levy for the Street Reconstruction Program, which involves a bond issue approved by the voters in 1986, and a second bond issue approved by the voters in 1990, is proposed to be 3.63 mills, compared to 3.00 mills in 1990, an increase of 21%.

The total City millage for both operating and debt is proposed to be 13.94 mills in 1991, compared to 14.80 mills levied in 1990, a decrease of 5.8%.

ANTICIPATED EQUALIZATION FACTORS: The 1991 equalization factors for both Wayne and Oakland County are expected to be 1.00 for all classes of property.

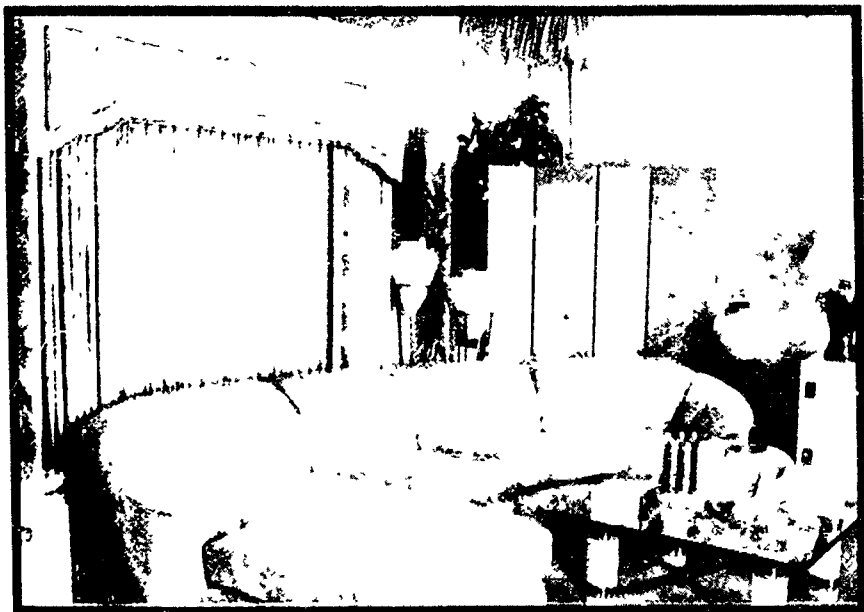

Getting off the beaten path in wine country

Learning about wine at the source makes an impression that is hard to forget. With the prohibitive cost of European travel, a California wine-country trip may be a sensible travel alternative.

Flying to either San Francisco or Oakland will put you within an hour's drive of Napa Valley. Napa is beautiful almost any time of the year, but it is becoming a busier place to visit. Traveling in off-season is best, but not everyone can plan his or her time that well.

In addition to more tourists each year, Napa Valley features bed and breakfasts, hot air balloons, gourmet restaurants, a wine train and nearly 200 wineries. All this is packed into a valley that is only 30 miles long and five miles wide.

If you would like to take a trip back in time and get a peek at what life used to be like in this old farming community, we suggest a visit to Villa Mt. Eden winery. Established in 1881, Villa Mt. Eden is Napa Valley's 11th bonded winery and still produces only 16,000 cases of wine annually.

It is off the highway, almost hidden from view, at the end of a curving gravel drive that takes you back 30 years. The cluster of small, white, frame buildings, complete with old water towers, offer a sense of history and a reminder that farming existed here long before indoor plumbing.

This land originally belonged to Mexican Gen. M.G. Vallejo and then George Yount, a viticultural pioneer in Napa Valley's early years, after California gained statehood.

You will not have to battle the tourist crowds here. Take a deep breath of fresh air and enjoy lunch with a chilled bottle of Villa Mt. Eden Chenin Blanc (\$8.50) at the picnic tables right next to the vineyards. Other Villa Mt. Eden wines available locally include the 1985 Cabernet Sauvignon (\$15), 1989 Chardonnay (\$14) and 1988 (red) Zinfandel (\$11.75).

After lunch, take a drive north on the Silverado Trail to Conn Creek Winery. The Silverado Trail runs along the foothills of the Atlas Mountains on the east side of Napa Valley, parallel to Highway 29. Napa's crowded main artery. The traffic is light because most of the wineries are small and do not cater to large crowds.

Conn Creek Winery is at the junction of the Silverado Trail and Conn Creek Road (Highway 128). Winemaker Jeff Booth has a fascination for scientific study and the technical advancements that have helped him improve the quality of Conn Creek wines.

Despite modern winemaking technology Booth's vineyard decisions — for harvesting grapes that have reached the peak of perfection — are based on taste. "I never lose sight of the gustatory pleasures of wine," Booth confesses. "I taste for a living and make it a part of every aspect of my winemaking."

Conn Creek's wines are made to enjoy with food, and Booth's taste for the piquant and spicy is obvious in his wines.

Currying favor

Search for Indian ingredients is worth the effort

More flavors are going into the American melting pot: the vigor of cardamom, the snap of cumin, the dark gold of turmeric, the exciting sizzle and pop of mustard seeds as they hit hot oil, the tart smoothness of yogurt.

For the first time in our history, a substantial community of East Indian heritage has joined our diverse society, and its cooks are bringing their distinctive tradition to our kitchens. The meeting of culinary cultures is bound to have a mutual impact. Perhaps we are watching the very start of a new hyphenated cuisine, Indian-American cooking.

Cooking teacher Fatima Lakhani is among those helping bring Indian dishes to our tables. In her nine years in this country, she has found Americans open to different influences and eager to adapt them to established eating patterns.

"People here are fascinated," she said. "But they cannot do without their large servings of meat. They want to use Indian recipes for side dishes, so we do a lot of mixing and matching."

This is a trend of which she fully approves, and she often serves Indian dishes this way herself.

Lakhani believes Americans are often misled about the cooking of her tradition.

Too many Indian restaurants, she said, prepare essentially the same sauce for every curry on the menu. In true Indian cooking, the blend of herbs and spices changes according to the main ingredients and the style of preparation. The effect is one of a rich complexity, far removed from prepared curry powders, which are to Indian cooking what bottled pasta sauce is to Italian.

"I had a neighbor come up to me and ask for a standard curry," Lakhani said. "But there can never be a standard curry recipe."

Still, Lakhani seems to have developed something much like that. In England, her basic beef curry was featured on a popular TV cooking show and then in a book developed from the program.

"In England, they're still cooking it," she said.

On a trip to Australia, she found it had traveled to the land Down Under, too.

Like her husband, Aziz, a consultant in information technology, Fatima Lakhani comes not from India itself but from the vast overseas Indian community, which spread into many parts of what was once the British empire.

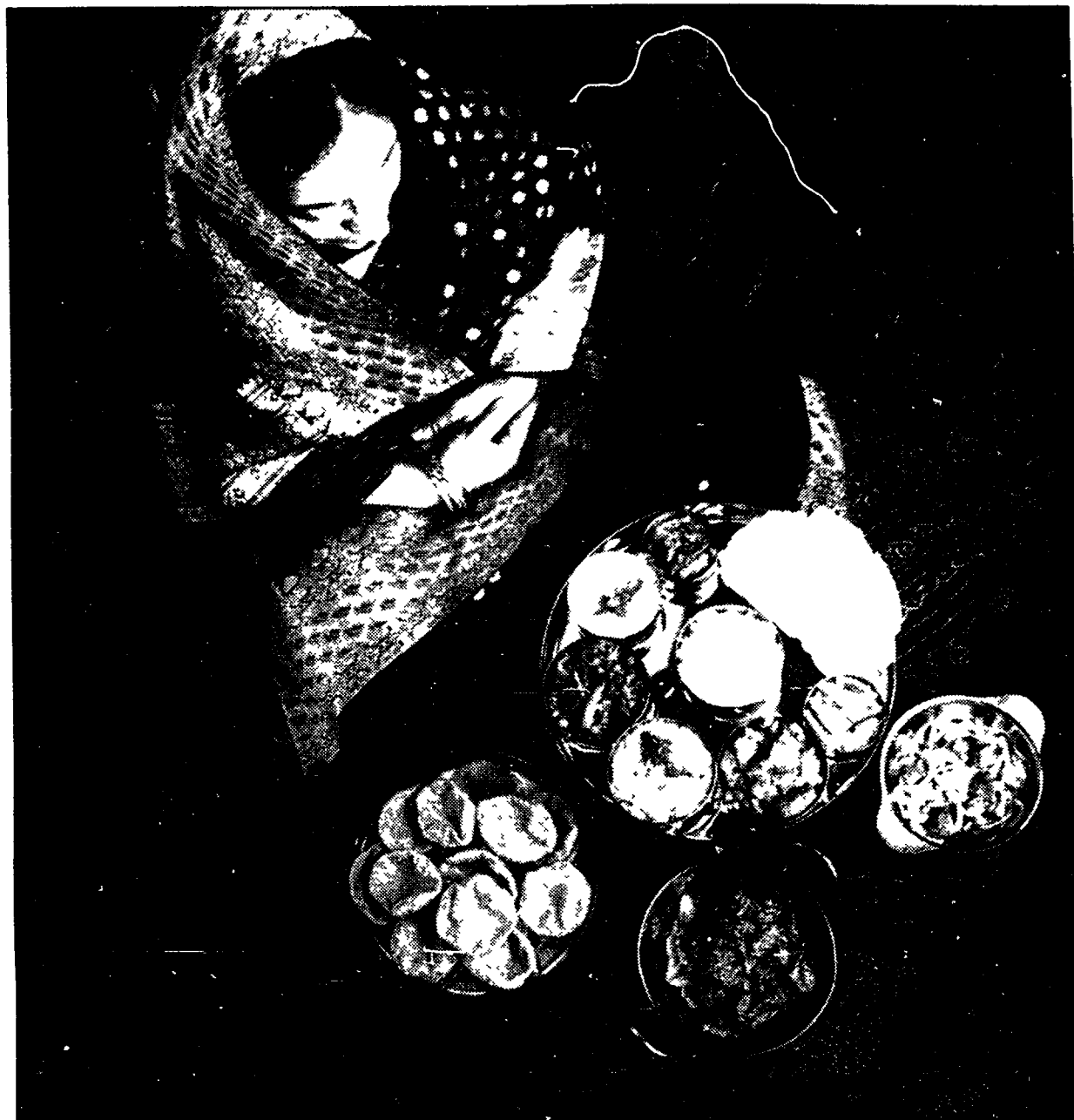
Both were born in Nairobi, Kenya; her family originated from northwest India near the Iranian border, his from Kathiawar region of western India.

"In our community, a girl was supposed to cook. It was a must by the time a girl was 16 or 17," Fatima said. "My father had to have everything made fresh at home — he still does. I used to make 40 chapatties a day. Now I do it for my husband and children."

The Lakhani's have a daughter, Zara, 18, and a son, Karim, 22.

Chapatties are the most common of the hot breads that are both a staple and a delight of the Indian meal. The whole-wheat dough is formed into a thin cake and cooked on a griddle. The same dough when deep-fried is called a poori.

Indian food made in this country is bound to differ from what you find in

Kenya or India, Lakhani said. Some ingredients are not available fresh — or even at all.

There is the problem of the essential spices. Those that are ground lose much of their flavor in a few weeks. Whole spices last much longer, so the best policy is to grind your own to meet your needs. A small coffee grinder dedicated to the purpose works well.

For the best selection of ingredients, seek out markets that cater to an Indian clientele. It's a good policy to buy no more than you can use in a month or so. Some products are now being imported from Britain and India in hermetically sealed containers; these have a much longer shelf life as long as they remain unopened.

Indian cooking seems well-suited to present-day preoccupations with health. Vegetables play a large role, and meat is not nearly so important as it is in European and American traditions.

The type and amount of fat can be modified. Clarified butter or ghee would be the traditional choice, Lakhani said, and it

gives an inimitable flavor and texture. But vegetable oil can readily substitute in most dishes.

Indian cooking is not fiery hot with chilies, Fatima and Aziz both insisted. This is a refrain often heard from Indian restaurateurs, too, and it appears to be a matter of regional variation and individual taste.

In the following recipes, from Fatima Lakhani's collection, you can adjust the red pepper to suit yourself. And if you wish to add some of the more incendiary prepared condiments available at Indian grocers, that's up to you.

We begin with Lakhani's beef curry that swept Britain.

MILD BEEF CURRY

Spices:

- 2 rounded tablespoons ground coriander
- 1 rounded tablespoon ground cumin
- 1 level teaspoon ground turmeric
- 1 rounded teaspoon Garam Masala (see recipe)

- 2 large cloves garlic, crushed
- 1 piece fresh green ginger, size of a walnut, finely chopped
- 2 teaspoons salt

Other ingredients:

- 3 tablespoons cooking oil
- 2 large onions, chopped
- 1 cup canned tomatoes
- 2 generous tablespoons tomato puree
- 2 pounds chuck steak, cut into cubes
- 1 cup water

Yields 6 to 8 servings.

Mix dry spices together, mix in garlic, ginger and salt. Set aside.

In heavy pan, heat oil and fry onions until even golden brown. Take care that they do not burn. Add spice mixture, tomatoes and tomato puree and cook over medium heat without lid, stirring until oil starts to separate slightly.

Then add meat, cover and simmer 15 minutes. Add water, cover again and simmer gently for about 2 1/2 hours, or until meat is very tender.

Nosy cooks know rosemary and sage

My favorite time of the year is here. Days are not too hot, but it's sunny and my garden is exploding with new growth.

I check each day to see what has sprouted. Already I have used chives, and oh, what a treat. Freshly cut and oniony, they added "depth" and texture to what otherwise would have been a wintry garden salad.

The thyme, oregano and marjoram are all sprouted and ready to be used. And two of my favored, rosemary and sage, are turning green. My perennial plants have reappeared relatively unscathed from the winter cold.

Rosemary and sage seem to be two herbs that people are hesitant to cook with because of their "pinney" flavors and in the case of rosemary its unpleasant texture. Both are considered to be aromatic herbs and are native to the shores of the Mediterranean. Anyone who enjoys the food of Italy, Spain or southern France has a place for them in their heart.

These herbs are indispensable in the above-mentioned regional foods. There are a few herbs that can elevate the flavor of simply cooked meats or vegetables as rosemary and sage. Summer may be enjoyed year-round if the plants are grown in pots and brought inside during the winter.

It is important to note that fresh herbs are

preferred for use versus the commercially dried variety. The dried herbs bought from the store are often musty-tasting and -smelling.

Unlike delicate basil and chervil, rosemary and sage will stand up to and often times require long cooking times. Their uses in the kitchen are numerous. Save the stems for marinades and the flavoring of stocks.

I love to stuff rosemary and garlic under the skin of chicken before baking, barbecuing or broiling, for the flavors seep into the meat for a real taste treat. Alternatively, a few sprigs of rosemary or sage in the cavity of chicken or turkey to be roasted has the same effect.

Chop sage fine and add to stuffing or try it in potato salad, veal dishes or egg dishes. Its flavor is milder than rosemary so it can be used a bit more gracefully. Sage is most frequently used in this country to season pork sausage. It is very easy, and more reasonable, to prepare your own sausage patties. Simply purchase bulk ground sausage and add your own seasonings. This works well for ground turkey or veal as well.

Rosemary is excellent for use with lamb also. Marinate chops in a mixture of whole leaves, olive oil and garlic then grill for a spectacular taste sensation. I have recently come

to love the one-dish, old-fashioned casserole dishes such as lamb or veal shanks. Sauté the shanks and bake them with white beans and a sprig of rosemary for an incredible yet easy and reasonable meal. A bit of pre-planning is important as the beans need to be soaked overnight.

Or, rub new potatoes with chopped sage and rosemary mixed with a bit of olive oil and bake until tender. And, let's not forget the easiest condiment of all, flavored oils. Simply pour olive oil over rosemary sprigs and allow to sit for several days. The oil will turn a green hue and emit a piney odor. Use on salads, pastas and vegetables.

Both rosemary and sage are easy to grow, given the right conditions. They flourish well in ground where temperatures do not drop below zero for any length of time.

In Michigan, it is preferable to grow them near to a wall so the soil stays warmer and the winter wind is blocked. For plants year round, grow in pots and move indoors when the weather grows cold. I know several people that have huge bushes of rosemary and sage so it is possible to grow them outside year round in our climate.

Rosemary is an evergreen shrub and thrives in hot, sunny dry areas. Flowers appear from January to May and vary in color from

white to pink to blue. The blossoms are excellent for seasoning also.

Plant rosemary in the sunniest area of the garden with the poorest soil possible. Once it is established rosemary should never need water except in a severe drought. Keep growing tips pinched off so that the plants don't become too leggy.

Sage needs a bit more T.L.C. than rosemary. It will put up with shade for part of the day but requires more water and richer soil. The most common garden sage grows two to two-and-a-half feet tall, and has soft, gray-green, tongue-shaped leaves.

Other varieties with green, purple, and white leaves are available too. There are even flavored sages: lemon and pineapple.

The best place to find rosemary and sage is no further than the Northville Farmer's Market held each Thursday across from the racetrack. (This year it opens May 16.) There is an "herb lady" that I have bought many plants from over the years. She brings cuttings by the hundreds and is a hot-bed of plant knowledge. Another alternative, if you feel like a ride, is Fox Hill Farm in Parma. Although I have never visited this herb farm it is on my list for this spring. I've heard it is a worthwhile trip. Call first to verify hours.

GRILLED ROSEMARY AND GARLIC CHICKEN

- 1 broiler cut into quarters or 4 chicken breasts
- 5 cloves garlic, peeled and crushed
- 8 small sprigs rosemary
- Rinse chicken and pat dry. Carefully loosen skin. Mix garlic with salt if desired. "Stuff" garlic and rosemary sprigs under skin and grill over hot coals until tender.

GRILLED POTATO AND VEGETABLES

- 1 medium zucchini, yellow squash, white onion, and red pepper cut into 2-inch squares
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 8 baby redskins cooked 3/4 done
- 4 sprigs rosemary
- 8 leaves sage
- 2 cloves garlic chopped
- salt and pepper to taste
- Toss vegetables with all ingredients. Divide into four foil squares and fold into a packet. Add to grill during last 20 minutes of cooking time for chicken.

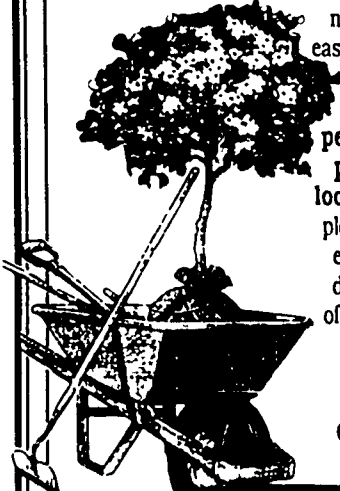

Indian cookery calls for more than just one curry

Serve with rice. Sliced fresh mango makes an attractive garnish.

Variation: Those who like a hot curry can add red pepper to taste: ½ teaspoon is enough for most.

Garam Masala means "dry spice mixture," and it appears in numberless variations, each with its partisans among Indian cooks. Such mixtures were the precursors of commercial curry powders.

GARAM MASALA

2 parts ground cinnamon
1 part ground cloves
1 part ground cardamom
Mix together and use as required. Keep airtight.

MIXED VEGETABLE CURRY

1 large clove garlic, crushed
2 tomatoes, finely chopped
1 teaspoon tomato paste
1 teaspoon salt
1 medium onion, diced
1 teaspoon ground coriander
1 teaspoon ground cumin
1 teaspoon Garam Masala (see recipe)
½ teaspoon turmeric
5 tablespoons oil
1 large onion, sliced
2 cups eggplant, cut into pieces
2 cups peas
2 cups green beans, cut into small pieces
2 small potatoes, cubed
Yields 3 to 4 servings.
Combine garlic, tomatoes, tomato paste, salt, diced onions and spices in bowl.

Heat oil in saucepan and fry sliced onions until golden brown. Add spice mixture, mix well and cook 5 minutes, stirring frequently. Add vegetables and stir well. Cover and cook over medium heat for 10 minutes. Add ½ cup water and potatoes; mix well and cook 20 minutes or so, until potatoes are tender.

This curry is intended as a main course instead of or along with other curries in a large meal. You could serve it as side dish for simply cooked meat, poultry or fish.

VEGETABLES IN SWEET-SOUR SAUCE

2 large potatoes
1 cup peas
2 large tomatoes, finely chopped
1 tablespoon tomato paste
½ teaspoon salt, or to taste
1 teaspoon sugar
½ teaspoon turmeric
½ teaspoon red pepper (optional)
4 tablespoons oil
2 teaspoons whole mustard seeds
1 green chili, cut into small pieces a few curry leaves (see note)
juice of ½ lemon
Yields 3 to 4 servings.
Boil potatoes until tender, drain, peel, cube and set aside. Boil peas until cooked; drain and set aside.

In bowl, mix together tomatoes, tomato paste, salt, sugar, turmeric and red pepper. Heat oil in saucepan. Have cover handy. Add mustard seeds, green chili and curry leaves. Mustard seeds will start popping; partly cover pan until this stops, about 15 seconds.

Add tomato-spice mixture and cover saucepan; cook 3 minutes. Lower heat and cook uncovered, stirring frequently for 15 minutes. Add cooked vegetables. Mix well, cover and cook over gentle heat for 10 minutes. Take off heat, season with lemon juice.

Note: Curry leaves have nothing to do with curry powder, nor do they give their name to curry dishes; the name is coincidental. They resemble small bay leaves and are available in Indian

markets. They are used fresh in India but are found dried here. They tend to lose their flavor rapidly. So try to find a reasonably fresh source.

KACHUMBER

2 small onions, cut into thin rings
½ teaspoon salt
1 large tomato, cut into bite-size pieces
1 green chili, chopped into very fine pieces
1 teaspoon cilantro, finely chopped
1 teaspoon whole cumin seed
½ cup malt or tarragon vinegar, or juice of 1 lemon
Yields 4 servings.
Separate onion rings in bowl; sprinkle with salt. Add tomato, green chili and cilantro. Mix gently. Rub cumin seeds between palms to release flavor; add to mixture in bowl. Add vinegar or lemon juice, mix well and chill.

Serve as accompaniment with spicy curries.
Variations:
Add any or all of the following: ½ cup sliced cucumber; 1 small carrot, peeled and sliced; 3 radishes, sliced; chopped lettuce leaves. Add lettuce just before serving. Adjust quantity of seasoning accordingly.

POORI
2 cups whole-wheat flour
½ teaspoon salt (optional)
2 tablespoons oil
about ¾ cup water
oil for frying
Yields 4 servings.

Mix flour and salt in large bowl. Make well in center of flour and add oil. Mix together until it becomes crumbly. Add enough water to make stiff dough; knead until dough becomes elastic, about 10 minutes. Dough can then rest in refrigerator—indeed, some recipes recommend this.

Divide dough into 20 or 22 equal parts and roll each into a ball. With rolling pin, roll out each ball into a disc about 3 inches in diameter.

Heat about 1 inch of oil in frying pan. Slip a poori into hot oil. When it turns light golden brown on first side, turn it over to brown on the other. While it is cooking, gently press the bread with a spatula to encourage it to puff up. Drain well and serve hot or at room temperature.

Poori is typically served with an Indian meal.

Morel hunters come out this month

May is Michigan morel month. It may be a tongue-twister, but April showers and warm temperatures bring on Michigan's luscious morel mushroom crop.

Although last year's harvest was not as good as previous years because of a dry April, mushroom hunters are hopeful that this season will produce an abundant supply of morels. And so are tourism officials, since a good morel crop brings in thousands of visitors.

"About half a million people residing in and out of the state head for the Michigan north each year to hunt mushrooms," says Peter Erickson, AAA Michigan Club Services director. "Hotel rooms, restaurants and shops all benefit from morel fever."

Many folks with morel-mania, especially from Ohio and Indiana, also stay overnight in Michigan campgrounds in their search for the elusive morel.

Black morels surface first, usually in late April or early May. White

morels fruit about a week later, followed by giant morels.

Mushroom-hunters say the best spot to find morels is in the upper half of the Lower Peninsula, in woods near the base of hardwood trees and in hilly areas.

Experts advise the most important point to know about morel hunting is how to recognize false morels which could be poisonous. Inexperienced pickers should hunt with a knowledgeable guide.

When morel hunting, wear com-

fortable, long-sleeved shirts and long pants to avoid insect bites and poisonous plants. Bring a paring knife to cut morel stems and a paper sack or basket to carry the mushrooms. It's also a good idea to bring a compass if hunting in unfamiliar territory.

Erickson added that morel hunting can be cheaper than purchasing the savory mushroom, since a pound will average anywhere between \$8 and \$18 this season, depending on availability.

Tourists are encouraged to visit

one of four state festivals celebrated during Michigan's morel season which generally runs through May:
● The Harrison Mushroom Festival, May 11, will feature a mushroom-hunting contest, arts and crafts show, and mushroom maps and cookbooks.

● The highlight of Boyne City's National Mushroom Hunting Championship, May 11-12, is a two-day event with a carnival and various mushroom dishes served at restaurants.

● Mesick's Mushroom Festival, May 10-12, offers visitors a variety of activities, including a hunt, craft sale, parade, flea market, barn dance and mud bog (with drivers in 4-wheel-drive vehicles racing through a deep mud pit).

● Lewiston's Morel Mushroom Festival, May 11, will hold a contest for the largest and most morels, arts and crafts fair and cooking demonstration.

Gala chef shares lemon bar recipe

The Fox and Hounds Pastry Den was represented at Cranbrook Schools' 13th consecutive Le Gala de Cuisine Sunday, in Bloomfield Hills.

More than 45 of metropolitan Detroit's top chefs created hors d'oeuvres, entrees and desserts for the event.

Following is a recipe provided by Chef Eric Beerge of the pastry den.

LEMON BARS

Dough:
1 ½ cups powdered sugar
1 pound unsalted butter
¾ cups cake flour

Filling:
6 eggs, beaten
3 cups sugar
Lemon zest from 5 lemons

¾ cup lemon juice
6 tablespoons cake flour
¼ tablespoon baking powder

Mousse topping:
½ cup lemon juice
1 tablespoon lemon zest
6 egg yolks
1 cup sugar
1 ½ tablespoons gelatin
¼ cup water
¼ quart heavy cream

For dough — grease and flour one 18-by-12-inch sheet. In electric mixer cream butter and sugar until smooth, on low speed gradually add flour. Do not overmix. Spread on sheet with hands and pre-bake to a very light brown and cool at room temperature.

For filling — Beat together eggs, sugar, lemon juice and lemon zest, saving 1 tablespoon for mousse. When mixed thoroughly, sift flour and baking powder over egg mixture and beat in. Pour over pre-baked dough and bake to a golden brown. Refrigerate overnight.

Mousse topping — Measure water and gelatin. Keeping in separate containers gelatin should be in small stainless bowl and set aside. Whip cream to a soft peak and refrigerate. Combine in a stainless bowl, lemon juice, zest, sugar and yolks, place over double boiler while stirring until sugar is dissolved. Put mixture in electric mixer and whip to a stiff peak. While whipping, combine water and gelatin stir till smooth and place in 350-degree oven until clear. When egg mixture has peaked, slowly add gelatin while still whipping, then fold in heavy cream. Refrigerate 3 hours or until set. Spread mousse over filling and cut into desired portion.

Ellen Burstyn, Walter Matthau remember love in TV drama

Pair co-star again after 27 years

"Mrs. Lambert Remembers Love" is really a life-affirming story about the power of love," says Ellen Burstyn of the new telefilm in which she stars. Burstyn, who won an Academy Award for her performance in "Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore," co-stars with Walter Matthau in the heart-rending drama Sunday, May 12, on CBS.

"Mrs. Lambert Remembers Love" marks the first time Burstyn and Oscar-winner Matthau ("The Fortune Cookie") have co-starred together since their 1964 performance in "Goodbye Charlie." In their new project, Burstyn plays an elderly woman named Lil Lambert, whose failing memory leads to a custody battle for her young grandson, played by 9-year-old Todd Ryan. Matthau plays Clifford Pepperman, an old friend of the Lambert family who remains a loyal ally to Lil in her struggle.

"I loved working with Walter back then; I loved working with him in 1991," says Burstyn of her co-star. For 27 years I've been consciously and unconsciously looking for a property that would allow us to work together again."

Burstyn says although she loved the script of "Mrs. Lambert

Remembers Love," she wondered if she could possibly play a woman 20 years plus her senior. She's 58.

"As a matter of fact, I said jokingly to Robert Halmi, the producer who sent me the script, 'Do you think I look that old? If the answer's yes, I better get myself to a health spa, and fast!'"

The actress says Matthau, on the other hand, has hardly changed in the last 27 years. "The funny thing is, Walter had jet-black hair in 1964, and he's still got jet-black hair. To make him look the same age as me in this picture, the makeup people actually had to whiten his hair." Matthau is 70 years old.

It is likely both Burstyn and Matthau are hoping for a more highly acclaimed film with "Mrs. Lambert Remembers Love" than they saw with the less-than-successful "Goodbye Charlie" a generation ago.

"I did a lot of research for this picture," says Burstyn. "At first I thought Lil Lambert was suffering from a form of senile dementia," she explains of her character, "but after reading several books about gerontological diseases, I think she's probably suffering from the early stages of Alzheimer's."

"Lil has these occasional memory lapses. She just can't remember who people are or what events actually happened. She finds it terribly frustrating, and that's exactly what happens to people when they first become affected by Alzheimer's."

Actor Todd Ryan plays the grandson of Academy Award-winner Ellen Burstyn in "Mrs. Lambert Remembers Love," premiering Sunday on CBS. Burstyn plays an elderly woman struggling to retain her memory and custody of her grandson. Walter Matthau co-stars.

They know something's desperately wrong, but they can't figure out what it is."

Burstyn has high praise for both of her co-stars. "He makes it look so easy — and, of course, that's the secret of fine acting," she says of Matthau. "Walter brings a wonderful naturalness to his roles, and that's why I think people who watch him on the screen like him so much."

"Todd is a very special little being. He's so curious and bright, so open and warm. On the set he saw everything. He was totally tuned in. After a while, I really saw Todd and his character Jared, as one. Jared is very close to his grandmother Lil; Todd became very close to Walter and me."

Essentially, "Mrs. Lambert Remembers Love" is the story of three people whose love and loyalty triumphs over green and hurt. Moral of the story: Nice guys don't always finish last. "I think people who watch this are going to be moved," says Burstyn optimistically. "It may even influence some people to offer help to loved ones who need help."

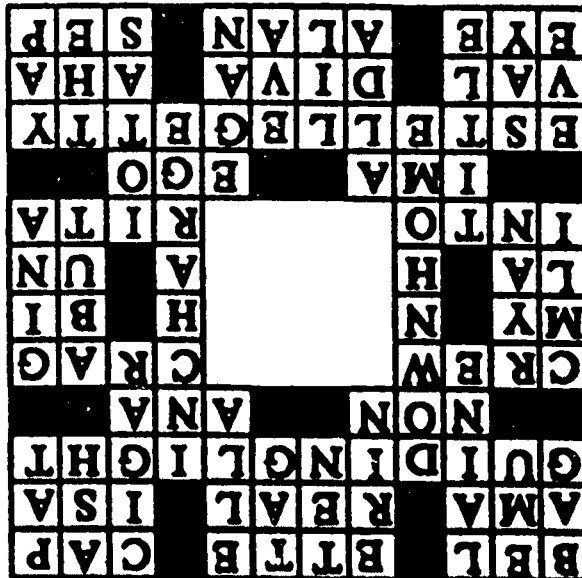
