Group home move OK'd

Highland Lakes subdivision residents last week gained a new set of neighbors.

But residents and township officials did not rush the community welcome wagon to 19749 Scenic Harbour, new home of six developmentally disabled adults.

State officials on June 20 rejected a second Northville Township claim that an over-concentration of state-licensed facilities exists in the township.

That decision prompted a transfer of an Adult Foster Care group home license from an Eight Mile site to Scenic Harbour. Group home residents moved into the Scenic Harbour home June 25.

"We concluded this facility would not contribute to excessive concentration by moving from one location to another," said Jim Quigley, Department of Social Services licensing director. "It would not increase (concentration) at all."

Quigley said the DSS conducted an analysis of Northville Township, researching the township's excessive-concentration complaints. None of a handful of categories that could signal excessive concentration were legitimate, he said.

"None of these points indicated a propensity for excessive concentration in the township," Quigley said.

Quigley noted the township's charge that another similar state-licensed facility existed within 1,500 feet of the Scenic Harbour site.

A state-licensed family day care home on Windsor Court does not qualify under the same laws as the group home, he said.

"The law didn't allow us to consider the family day care home for the purposes of the Scenic Harbour home," he said.

State facilities such as Northville Regional Hospital and Scott Regional Correctional Facility also fail to qualify as contributors to excessive concentration, Quigley said.

A Wayne County Circuit Court judge in May granted the DSS the right to issue a temporary group home license while Northville Township pursued legal avenues to challenge the move.

The license would be canceled if the township wins its excessive concentration plea in circuit court, Judge James Hathaway ruled.

Township and state DSS representatives are scheduled to appear in Wayne County Circuit Court July 12. Both parties are asking the court to dismiss each other's case, said township attorney James Hage.

Hage would not predict the outcome of the July 12 summary-disposition hearing, but did say that the judge could schedule a hearing on merit, a more in-depth review of the township and state rift.

For now, the group home residents have every right to live in Scenic Harbour, Hage said. The township must bank on a favorable decision by the circuit court to reverse the move, she

Word takes over helm of the city

Northville's newest city manager, Gary Word, will spend this morning moving into his new office at 215 W. Main St.

Word takes the reins at city hall from Acting City Manager Mark Christiansen, who has filled the position since Steven Walters left to become Plymouth city manager June 1.

The new manager admitted that the change in leadership at city hall may make some people nervous. "The community, I'm sure, is very apprehensive about the new city manager, and possible changes," he said.

To help allay that anxiety, Word sent a letter to all city employees June 13 explaining his perspective on the job.

"I realize that Steve was an excellent City Manager and it will be difficult to follow him," Word wrote. "I am also very mindful of Northville's reputation as a community that does things well and I hope to work with you in trying to build on the successes and achievements that have made Northville a special city. While my style and approach may be somewhat different from Steve's, I am confident that we can form a good team and a positive working relationship."

Though he would not cite specific differences between his and Walters' management styles, Word said they would differ. "It's inevitable when you're dealing with two different people that things are not going to be handled in the same way," he said.

"Part of my effort will be to focus on the organization," he said. "I'm kind of into a customer-service mode right now. I'm a real believer that the public

sector must provide customer service as efficiently as the private sector."

Word said one of his first goals is to meet the people with whom he will work. "Mark Christiansen has kept me apprised of the current issues and agenda items. Other than the issues that are there to be dealt with, I want to meet with department heads and go over some expectations and policies," he said. "I realize we've got to work with the state to ensure the funding for the racetrack security that's been withheld from us."

Word also plans to meet with all city employees in the coming weeks. "I just want to get to know them and see what, if any, concerns they might have, and what they see for the city's future," he said.

As for his decision to move to Northville, Word said, "There were many reasons . . . including the stability of the situation. I was impressed with the quality of the council and the quality of the management."

"Northville's reputation precedes itself, and it's a good reputation."

Word, 40, was named Northville City's new manager in May after a two-month search by the city council. His application was one of 95 for the position from across the country. He has served as city administrator in South St. Paul, Minn. for the past three years, and as city manager of Three Rivers, Mich. for more than six years before that. He'll earn an annual \$58,000 in salary and an additional \$3,300 in car allowance as Northville City Manager.

Word's wife, Denise, and daughters Rachael, Gretchen and Brittany will follow him to Northville within the next two months.

Mining proposal faces long review

Site review of a proposed 177-acre mining operation in Northville Township is bound to be a lengthy, difficult task, developers and township officials agree.

Their accord likely will not occur often in the next few months.

Township planners and Holloway Sand and Gravel officials last week

did shake hands on a step-by-step review procedure for a quarrying operation proposed for a tract at the southwest corner of Six Mile and Ridge roads.

An 18-point review process recommended by township planning consultant WBDC could span more than a half-dozen planning commission and township board meetings, said Carol Maise, township planning and zoning administrator.

Holloway is scheduled to make its initial presentation to the planning commission at a July 23 public hearing. The hearing is set for 7 p.m. at township hall.

The township could face four separate reviews of Holloway's elaborate proposal.

Possible reviews would include a special land use request, site plan approval for sand and gravel mining, approval of a sand and gravel operat-

ing license, and a potential amendment to the township's zoning ordinance to address asphalt plants, according to an overview provided by WBDC.

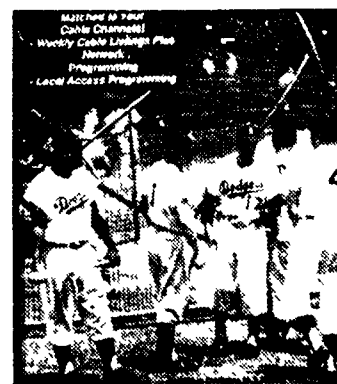
Holloway is proposing an asphalt plant to accompany its mining operation. Local zoning ordinances currently do not permit the processing of

raw materials in Northville Township.

Consultants recommend the township view the proposed asphalt plant as a special land use "with specific standards provided regarding siting, site plan and operations to insure compatibility with surrounding existing and future land use."

In WBDC's eyes, the asphalt plant would not be an accessory to the

sand and gravel operation "because it is not customary or incidental to the mining use."

Under WBDC's proposal, Holloway would present a detailed plan of its proposed operation at the July 23 public hearing. The township, developers and public would discuss site impact and planning and engineering consultant reviews at that date.

The planning commission could then vote to recommend that the township board approve or reject the spe-

cial land use request. Planners could table the request based on a need for further information.

Board approval of the special land request would set site plan application wheels in motion, followed by planning commission consideration of a sand and gravel license.

Major conceptual questions already have begun to percolate.

WBDC consultant Dennis Larkin told the planners to envision the Holloway site in the mining aftermath.

Special consideration should be given a 55-acre lake Holloway proposes for the site, he said.

"If you put a 55-acre lake on this particular property, what have you done to the (future) industrial use?" he said. "We really have some big concerns; it's something the planning commission needs to consider at the outset."

Planners produced their own lengthy list of questions.

Commissioner Karen Baja asked

Holloway representative Richard Zanotti to respond to concerns about possible water contamination, sand and gravel trucking routes, and the firm's 10-year commitment to the site.

Local developers also voiced concerns. Builders and developers of Crestwood Manor Subdivision on the corner of Six Mile and Beck roads have sent the township two letters protesting the asphalt plant and mining facility.

Approval of the Holloway plan "could kill any and all growth for upgrade buyers who are interested in creating a prestigious community..." said Crestwood Manor builder Melvin Menuck, of Curtis Building Company of Detroit.

Holloway's Zanotti agreed to WBDC's review strategy.

"It is an involved process," he said. "It will be an arduous task."

saids.

A township victory may be a long shot.

"The deck is truly stacked against us," Hage said. "But we feel it's not a frivolous case."

"If ever there has been a good case (for excessive concentration), North-

ville is it," she said.

Hage said the township is also slated to appear before an administrative hearing board and administrative law judge. The judge in that

instance would hear the township's concerns about excessive concentration and would review the state's response to that posture.

It is unlikely the township would

emerge victorious from the administrative hearing, Hage said, but the appearance is crucial on a larger scale.

"We're avidly pursuing the admini-

strative procedure (because) we don't want them to kick out the circuit court case," she said.

An administrative hearing date has not been set, Hage said.

NOTICE OF PROVISIONS OF THE NOXIOUS WEED AND REFUSE ORDINANCE

TO: All owners, occupants or possessors of subdivided lands or lots:
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that in accordance with Section 21-20 of the Novi Code, all noxious weeds, or other weeds, grass, brush or deleterious, unhealthy growths exceeding a height of twelve (12) inches, or any refuse or debris growing, standing or lying upon any property in the City of Novi, shall be cut down, destroyed or removed as the case may be, at least twice in each year, once by the end of the last half of the month of May and again during the last half of July of each year and more often as may be necessary.

In the event the owner or occupant, or any person or persons, agent, firm or corporation having control or management of any subdivided land in any subdivision in which buildings have been erected and where such subdivisions has a zoning classification that is "residential," shall fail, refuse, or neglect to comply with the above mentioned Ordinance, the City shall cause said weeds, grass, brush, deleterious, unhealthy growths, rubbish or debris to be cut down, destroyed or removed. Provided, further, that any lands which are situated within the flood plains or any natural streams or water courses, or any area between the lower or upper banks of such streams or water courses shall be exempted from the provisions of this Ordinance. The expense incurred by the City in cutting, destruction or removal of same together with a ten (10%) percent administrative charge will be levied and collected against such property in the manner provided by law.

Failure to comply with the requirements set forth in Section 21-20 of the Novi Code may also result in the prosecution for same, and liability to the extent of the penalty thereon provided.



Sports Briefs

McGREW UPDATE: Novi tennis star Mark McGrew competed in the Boys 16 Southeast Michigan Tennis Association (SEMTA) in Detroit in late June, and was one of the top 11 players to qualify for the five-state Western Regional Tournament.

McGrew — a sophomore-to-be at Novi High School — was seeded seventh but moved up to fifth in the six-day tournament, winning the consolation championship. After topping ninth-seeded Chris Beley 6-4, 6-4 in the round of 16, McGrew fell to Mikl Pusztai of Ann Arbor 6-3, 6-1 in the quarterfinals. Pusztai of Ann Arbor was the No. 1 seed and went on to win the title. He was also the state's Class A No. 2 single finalist.

In the consolation bracket, McGrew eliminated 16th-seeded Joe Vincler 6-3, 6-2 and then turned back sixth-seeded Jon Aspatore 6-2, 6-1 in the consolation semis.

"It was a big win because Aspatore is a highly-ranked player and Mark had never beaten him before," said Mike McGrew, Mark's father.

McGrew then avenged a loss to Arvid Swan (two weeks earlier in a Memorial Day Tourney in South Bend, Ind.) in the consolation finals. In a grueling three-hour marathon played in 90-degree heat, McGrew beat Swan 6-3, 4-6, 7-5.

"Mark played one of the gutsiest tennis matches I've ever seen, not only in surviving but winning the match," said Steve Kirschbaum, a pro at Franklin Racquet Club.

The regional tournament in Indianapolis will continue through July 5. The top-14 finishers there will compete in the National Junior Championships later this year.

"This has been Mark's best first year start (in a particular age division) ever, and probably his best chance to be seeded at the Western Regional Tournament in his first year," Mike McGrew said. "The Western Regional gets 14 spots for the National Championships, so a seed is very important."

City seeks Beck/Eight review

Northville City police have requested a traffic survey of Eight Mile Road east of Beck, following last month's double fatality on that stretch of road.

Robert Warner of the city engineering firm McNeely & Lincoln Associates, at the request of Police Chief Rod Cannon, sent a letter June 10 to the Oakland County Road Commission requesting a review of traffic control systems on Eight Mile between Beck and Taft roads. The letter was addressed to David Allyn, director of traffic safety.

The engineering firm had received no reply from the road commission by press time Friday.

"As you may know," Warner wrote, "there is a history of recorded concerns by area residents regarding the posted speed limits on this section of

Eight Mile Road. A recent accident that caused two pedestrian fatalities... has served to strengthen the community's focus on the posted speed limits."

The speed limits are 40 miles per hour east of Coldspring Drive and 50 miles per hour to the west, with a school speed zone between Coldspring and Taft at Moraine Elementary School.

Warner also raised concerns about the Eight Mile/Beck Road intersection, currently regulated by stop signs on Beck Road.

"We believe that the large size of the intersection, the limited sight visibility to the west of the intersection, the posted speed limits, the traffic volume, and the impact that will result from the paving of Beck Road between Seven and Eight Mile may be sufficient to warrant the upgrading of the signal to a fully-sequenced traffic light," he wrote.

"Other traffic control devices and intersection modifications may be needed as well."

Warner said that the repaving of Beck may worsen conditions at the often-crowded intersection. "With Beck Road being paved, we expect it's going to add traffic to that area," he said. He estimated that Beck would be open to through traffic in several months.

"It seems like a lot of the previous concern was closer to Taft Road and the entrances to the... subdivisions," he said. But the deaths of joggers Yusuf Hanania and Albert Abdelnour on the morning of June 5, who were struck by a west-bound vehicle just east of Beck, heightened anxiety about that stretch of Eight Mile as well. City police were still investigating the incident last week, at the direction of the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office.

Knighton stays a little longer during search

Burton Knighton will leave his position as assistant superintendent in Northville as planned, but he did not leave the district on June 30 as originally announced.

Knighton now plans to retire Sept. 30. The assistant superintendent for administrative services will stay an extra three months to act as an interim superintendent.

Superintendent George Bell retires July 31.

The board of education hopes to have a new superintendent in place by Jan. 1, but Trustee Glenn Davis said it would be premature to say the board had a "hard and fast" date set.

"A lot depends on the size of the field of candidates. We're hoping to get a lot of good candidates," she said.

Davis is leading the board on its search.

Every member of the board will review each application for the position of superintendent. The board met with Michigan Association for School Boards consultant Carl Brautigam June 25 to review the procedure for evaluating applications.

"It was very productive, real infor-

mative," Davis said.

The board learned tips on reading cover letters and resumes to help it separate the candidates that would work well in Northville from those who look good on paper.

"(Candidates are) showing you their best. The way people chose to present themselves on paper says something about them," Davis said.

A temporary secretary will be hired to help the board deal with the paperwork involved in finding a superintendent, Davis said.

Thursday the board received its first three resumes. Assistant Superintendent for Instructional Services Dolly McMaster has said she will be among the candidates for the position of superintendent.

The deadline for applications is Aug. 2. The board will review applications on Aug. 7 in a meeting that likely will go in and out of open session. Under Michigan law, meetings held to discuss applications can be closed only if the applicant so requests.

The position is advertised to pay a minimum of \$90,000. Retiring Superintendent George Bell earned \$88,353 last year.

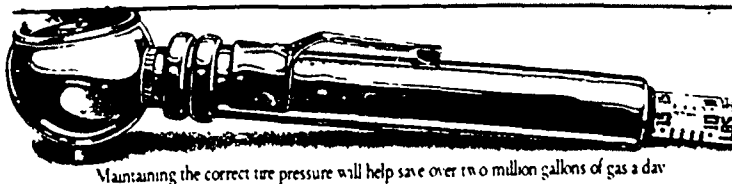

Ladder-carrying man is arrested on warrant

One of two men police saw lugging a ladder around the perimeter of Northville Regional Hospital early June 17 was arrested on an outstanding warrant charge.

According to township police records, a 33-year-old Detroit man and a 42-year-old Detroit man were seen carrying a ladder and running along the state hospital fence on Seven Mile near Meadowbrook at approximately 7 a.m. June 17.

Police said the men jumped into a 1982 Ford pickup and drove away from the scene, eventually pulling into the hospital's main entrance.

A computer check revealed that the 42-year-old man's driver's license had been suspended 17

times. He also was wanted on failure to appear and driving with a suspended license warrants out of Livonia. Township police tucked a driving-with-suspended-license charge onto the man's growing record.

The man faces a July court date at 35th District Court, police said.

House approves its plan for tax-base sharing

Richer school districts are almost certain to be sending taxes to poorer schools after the state Senate agrees to a House-passed business property-tax-sharing bill.

The Senate is expected to approve the bill July 11, said Sen. Dan DeGrow, R-Port Huron, a key supporter.

Suburban representatives bitterly denounced it Wednesday as "stealing" a "Robin Hood theory" and "a kick in the pants and a slap in the face." Northville school officials expect any form of tax-base sharing to harm the district's finances.

The House passed it, 74-30, mustering a two-thirds vote to give it immediate effect. Senate passage is likely because the upper chamber earlier approved the principle as part of the school aid bill.

The bill split both parties.

Rep. Willis Bullard, R-Highland, who represents part

of Northville, voted no. Northville's other state House seat sits vacant until elections in August.

House Bill 4267 requires out-of-formula districts (which receive no state aid) to give up half the growth of their commercial and industrial tax base to in-formula districts.

About \$27 million would change hands the first year — fiscal 1991-92. The total would grow to more than \$250 million in a decade, according to a House staff analysis.

Suburban districts around Detroit with business growth generally will be losers. So will some Lake Michigan shoreline areas and Midland.

"We will make a few school districts worse — maybe much worse," said opponent Maxine Berman, D-Southfield — "and make a few schools hardly much better."

Sponsor William Keith, D-Garden City, cited the case of Inkster, in his House district, which raises only a frac-

tion of the revenue per mill of property tax that Bloomfield Hills does.

The bill is designed to close the per-pupil spending gap between districts of \$2,500 to \$8,000.

Gov. John Engler is expected to sign it.

Rep. Tom Middleton, R-Ortonville, a freshman from northern Oakland County who rarely had spoken, said the bill was "a kick in the pants" because it returns only \$1 of categorical school aid for every \$2 of lost business tax base.

"Out-of-formula districts would take a cut. They would need a millage increase to maintain their quality. But part of that increase would go into revenue sharing. That's a slap in the face."

Middleton was angry that the House rejected amendments by Rep. Barbara Dobb, R-West Bloomfield. "They would have concentrated the shared money at the bottom (the poorest districts) instead of spreading it to the

ones in the middle and teasing them. She wanted to bring the \$2,500 per pupil districts up in a hurry to \$3,000."

Dobb lost that amendment on a 38 to 65 vote.

A freshman and member of the House Taxation Committee, Dobb won only one amendment. It guarantees that districts receiving business taxes from the regional pot shall not have their state aid grants cut next year by the Legislature. That amendment passed 104 to 0.

Rep. William Bryant, R-Grosse Pointe, said Keith's bill "unduly violates the principle that the property taxes voted, levied, collected and spent by a local unit belong to it. This bill says those taxes may be played with, redirected and stolen by the state."

Rep. Alvin Hoekman, R-Holland, denounced it as a "Robin Hood theory by stealing from the supposed 'rich' to give to the supposed 'poor.' I also voted no because my district has worked hard to bring in new businesses and diversify the economy. This bill is a slap in the face."

Geake loses in bid to end direct payments to landlords

Despite urging from Sen. Robert Geake, Gov. John Engler's administration has reversed itself and will continue welfare "vending" — mailing rent checks to landlords of welfare clients.

Gerald Miller, director of the state Department of Social Services, changed his mind after many landlords threatened to evict welfare tenants.

"Let the free market work," said

Geake, R-Northville. Although the owner of five rental properties, he had encouraged DSS to halt the program July 1 as planned.

Geake said welfare recipients would learn responsibility — a view shared by a welfare rights organization.

Two weeks ago, Geake released a survey showing only 11 of the 48 contiguous states mailed rent checks to

landlords. Virtually all were in New England, the northern Midwest and along the Canadian border.

In social services budget hearings, Geake heard landlords plead for continued vending.

A Battle Creek landlord leader, Iris Hendershott, summed up her group's case for continued vending:

"When the vendor payments are

cut, you have to be there the day the (welfare) check arrives because the minute the check is cashed, the money will be gone, and rent is the last thing that gets paid."

A lobbyist for the Michigan Rental Housing Association said its members would have evicted residents of 20,000 housing units if DSS had stopped the program.

About 40 percent of the state's

350,000 recipients of AFDC and general assistance allow the state to "vendor." Many landlords require it before they will rent to welfare recipients.

Some 55,000 landlords are paid by the state, costing the state \$4 million a month in clerical services and postage.

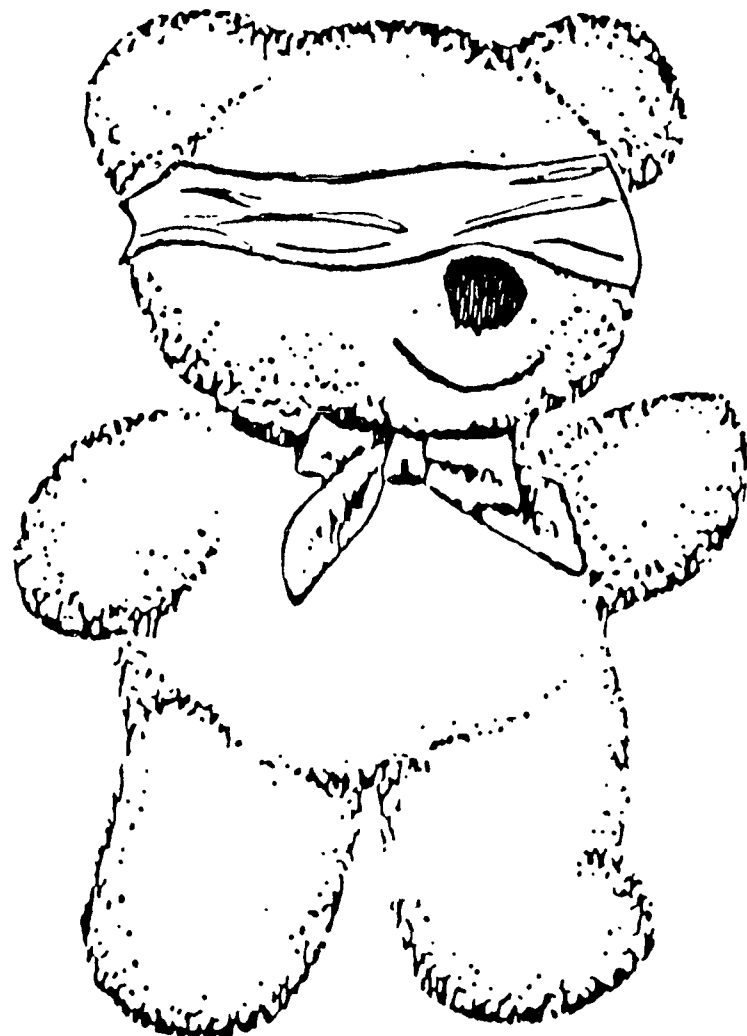
DSS chief Miller said the state would consider alternatives to en-

ding vending. To be eligible, landlords may have to:

- Pay the state a check-processing fee.
- Furnish proof of property-tax payments.
- Have their housing inspected.

A bipartisan group of state representatives passed a resolution urging Engler to continue vending. The Senate buried it in committee.

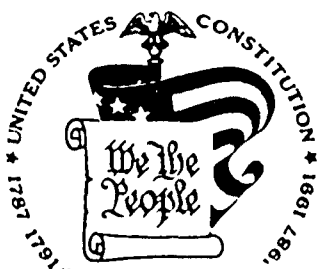

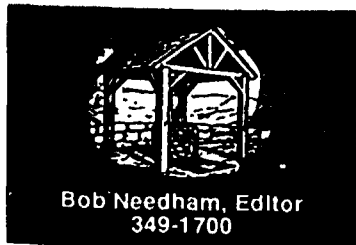

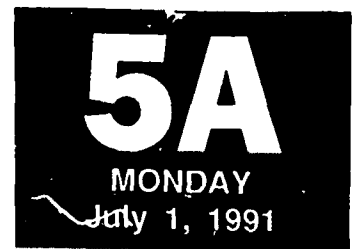

Public selection will serve township well

Let the race begin.

Actually, it might be a bit early for such sentiments, but we are heartened by Karen Baja's announced desire to succeed Georgina Goss as township supervisor.

Baja, chair of the township's zoning board of appeals and a member of the planning commission, is the first to toss a hat in the supervisor succession ring. And she surely won't be the last.

At least two other township pol-types are contemplating the jump, according to reliable sources. Still another supposedly is toeing the water. The would-be candidates we hear about are solid, knowledgeable and capable.

All of which should make for an interesting, enlightening local race, predicated, of course, on Goss' ability to whip two fellow Republicans in the Aug. 6 primary for the vacant 36th District state representative post.

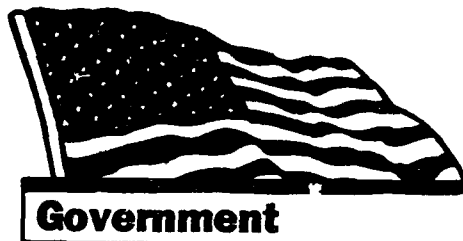
Township hall was all abuzz last week at Baja's aggressive coming-out announcement. Some reckoned she should have waited a couple of weeks — some may have felt they'd been beaten to the punch.

Some pointed out that Goss hasn't won a thing yet. Others were quite pleased with the decision.

Baja's experience with the planning commission and the ZBA makes her a strong candidate, but we're not here to plug any individual, at this time. What's important to us is the feeling that Baja's announcement virtually assures that the supervisor's search — if Goss is elected — will be a very visible, public process.

And that's the way it should be. The township supervisor's position is an extremely important slot in state and regional — not just local — circles. Due to the big-dollar growth in the area of late, Northville Township definitely carries more political clout than do communities with less high-priced development capabilities.

The supervisor must have solid working knowledge of Wayne County and state issues, and also must be well-versed in the tri-community juggernaut



known as the Western Townships Utilities Authority (WTUA) because of the expensive commitment the township has made to sewer-system and solid-waste arrangements.

The job demands much more than a tin star, a bronze nameplate and a few hours a week of hobnobbing with community leaders. Baja's announcement means that the other would-be candidates must soon make up their minds, go public, and kick off campaigns.

Newspaper interviews, public hearings, appearances before homeowners' associations, etc. will become a necessity, and even though residents won't vote on Goss' possible successor, the candidates will face a certain amount of scrutiny.

The possibility of backroom deals diminishes with increased public attention, and the likelihood that the township board will select the best candidate to lead the township into the future dramatically increases.

This newspaper pledges to treat the supervisor selection process as one of the most important races local voters will face this year. The interviews with candidates will be thorough, and positions on issues will be identified.

Whoever the board selects will have one year — prior to the 1992 general election — to imprint his or her philosophy on Northville Township. We think that one year is vitally important and we will do what we can to inform our readers of the individual candidate's agendas.

Our hope is that when the board chooses Goss' successor, the best, most-qualified candidate will be picked. And the public will have read his or her resume.

Here's problem with sharing



"Golly gee, what's wrong with tax-base sharing?" The GRALS (Guilt-Ridden Affluent Liberal Suburbanites) stare wide-eyed when the topic comes up. "Shucks, tax-base sharing seems fair enough. There are poor school districts with only \$2,500 to spend per pupil a year and rich districts blowing \$8,000.

"Gee whillikers, doesn't every kid deserve an equal chance?" ask the GRALS with charming innocence, as if the issue were really educating kids.

The proposal has minor variations, but it's basically this: School taxes on new commercial and industrial property would go into a common pot and be distributed on a per-pupil basis.

As currently floated in Lansing, the bills call for pooling only half the growth. That way it looks as if nobody loses anything. Don't be suckered. If Lansing can take half the growth now, in time it can take all, and then go after existing business property.

The Farmer originated the idea of tax base sharing no later than the 1950s, decades before education-minded city boys like Reps. Bill Keith of Garden City and Jim O'Neill Jr. of Saginaw bought in.

H.L. Mencken, in his 1924 essay "The Husbandman," called The Farmer the most "grasping, selfish and dishonest mammal" in existence. "Has anyone ever heard of a farmer making any sacrifice of his own interests, however slight, to the common good? Has anyone ever heard of a farmer practicing or advocating any political idea that was not absolutely self-seeking — that was not, in fact, deliberately designed to

loot the rest of us to his gain?"

Since 1924, The Farmer's ethics have spread. Here is how The Farmer and friends rationalize tax-base sharing:

● "I could get tax base sharing by consolidating some of Michigan's 526 school districts into 200. But I don't wish to give up my political control of my rinky-dink district.

● "I could get more revenue by collecting all property taxes in common. But with tax base sharing, I keep all my farm taxes and make the city feller surrender his business tax base.

● "We all could get new revenue by raising the income or sales tax and pumping it into the poorest districts. But I would have to pay, too. With tax-base sharing, I pay nothing more, and only the city jasper gives up anything."

And now the Keiths and O'Neills are helping The Farmer. Rep. Jan Dolan, R-Farmington Hills, denounced the scheme and offered its perpetrators a black bandit's mask. Not bad.

A colleague of hers described it as a "Sheriff of Nottingham bill." The evil sheriff collects the yeoman's regular state taxes, then invades the man's house and takes half the bread from his table, too. Pretty good.

The core of the problem is that our legislators, who have constitutional responsibility for providing free public schools, won't use the tools at hand.

They won't cut non-school spending and pump more into poor districts, as we noticed last week when they caved in to the welfare and arts lobbies.

They won't consolidate little districts.

They won't raise new state taxes.

Instead, the pickpocket bandits of Lansing want to dip into local school districts for revenue.

Arise, ye Guilt-Ridden Affluent Liberal Suburbanites!

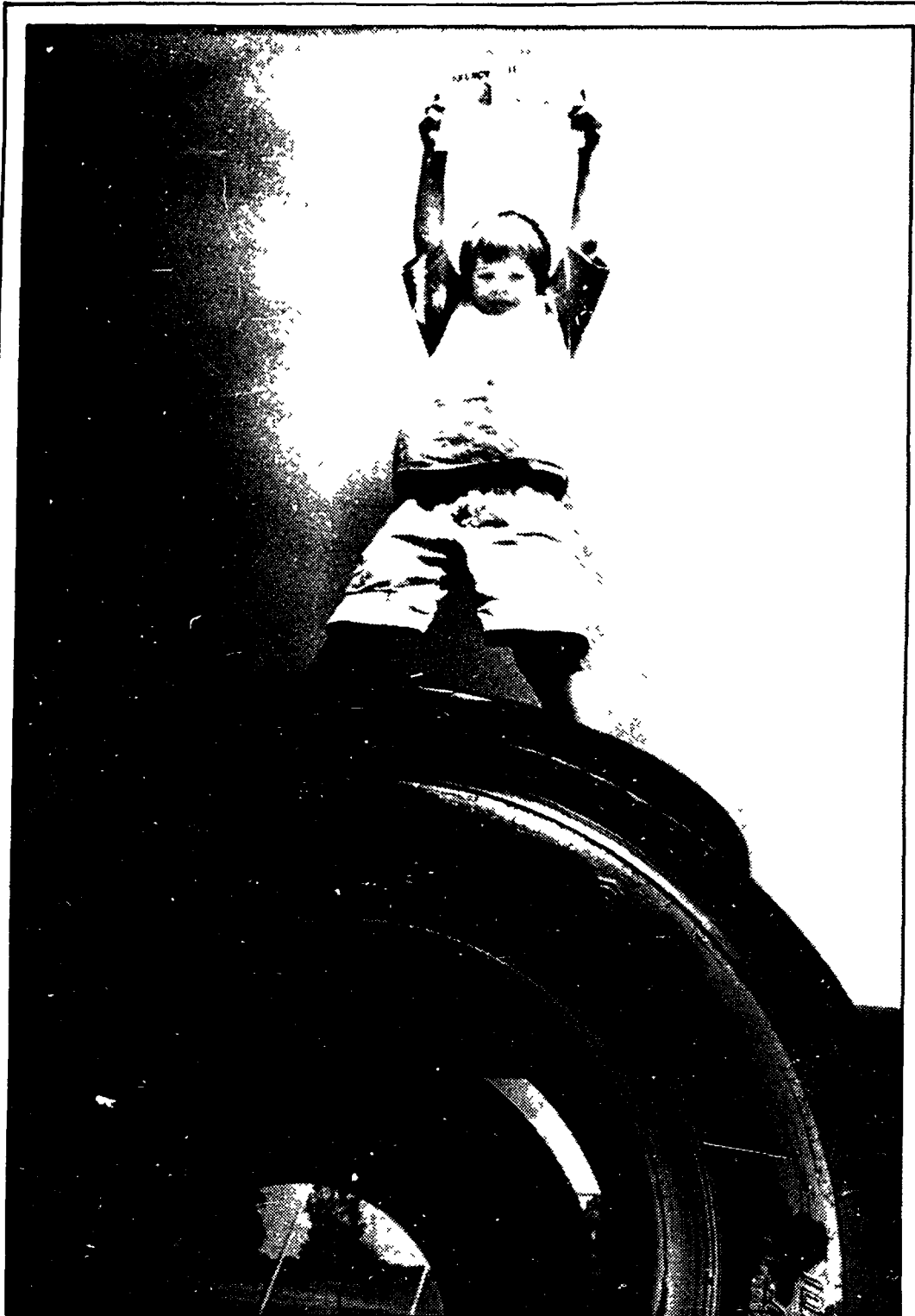

Abortion law removes schools

A few weeks ago, Northville Public Schools officials were resigned to dealing with a new law requiring Michigan schools to teach sixth- through twelfth-graders about how to obtain court permission for an abortion.

Now they won't have to. A bill reversing the requirement is on its way to Gov. John Engler's desk after winning 90-15 passage last Tuesday in the House of Representatives.

The measure changes the "parental consent" abortion law passed last year after a petition drive by Right to Life.

That law allows girls under 17 to obtain an abortion only with parental consent or the consent of a probate judge. It took effect at the end of March.

School districts were angry, however, at Sec. 9, which required them to teach students how to get a probate court order allowing an abortion.

In a key test, the House rejected, 43 for and 60 against, a substitute by Rep. Michael Bennane, D-Detroit, to give each district the option of teaching "how to circumvent parental consent."

Voting for the Bennane version were Republicans Willis Bullard of Highland, Susan Munsell of Howell, and Democrat Kirk Profit of Ypsilanti.

Voting no was Democrat Clark Harder of Owosso.

If it had been up to the women, however, the Bennane amendment would have passed: Of the 19 women, 12 supported the Bennane amendment, five were opposed and two were absent.

On final passage, all area lawmakers voted yes.

The House still has not acted on a Senate-passed "informed consent" bill. That measure would require a surgeon to give a woman seeking an abortion a two-page list of possible physical and mental ill effects and show her photos of a fetus at her own fetus' stage of development.

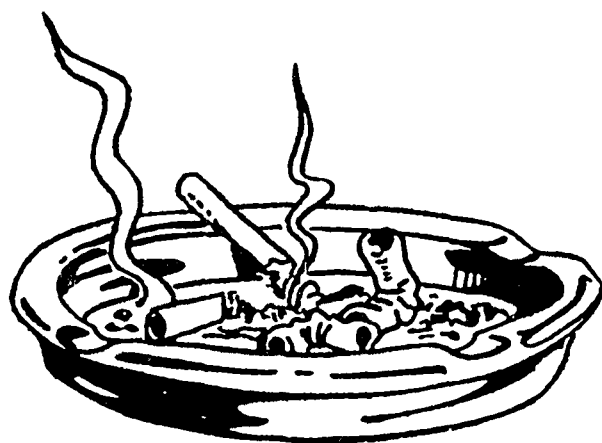

Krug Winery is Valley's oldest

While the wine consumer remains infatuated with wine offerings from "new" wineries, you should remember there is nothing more important on the label than the brand name. Quality, established wineries will not risk their reputation on an inferior product. One such winery is Charles Krug — Napa Valley's oldest winery.

In 1849, the first year of the California Gold Rush, Charles Krug fled to America from his native Prussia, not to pan for gold but to flee a repressive regime unwilling to cope with idealists.

Like so many after him, Krug was enthralled with the natural blessings of Napa Valley's climate and terrain and caught the wine bug. He moved to Napa in 1860 and began planting vineyards in 1861, completing construction of a stone winery in 1868.

Just in case Krug's contemporaries hadn't noticed his achievements, the long arm of fate reached out one night in 1874 when a cellar worker inserted a sulfur candle (used for barrel sterilization) into a fuming brandy barrel. An explosion and subsequent fire destroyed the winery. Local historical records report that before the embers were safely out, Krug was ordering lumber for the rebuilding project.

Krug died in 1892, leaving his ranch and winery to his daughters, but not without being recognized as an influential figure in the wine industry and the first person to establish a winery in the Napa Valley.

The Charles Krug Winery produced wine until Prohibition began in 1919. In 1943, the winery was purchased by Cesare Mondavi, an Italian immigrant who came to the United States in 1906 and prospered as a grape wholesaler in the Lodi area.

Today, Cesare's sons Peter and Robert are both influential figures in the California wine industry. Peter and his two sons Marc and Peter Jr. are involved with running the Charles Krug Winery while Robert and his family supervise the day-to-day operations at the Robert Mondavi Winery.

"Winemaking owes as much to tradition and the human element as to equipment and technology," said Peter Mondavi Sr. "My sons who have taken their places with me at the Charles Krug Winery help me to maintain that balance."

Peter Jr. is the technology expert. Armed with a Stanford University mechanical engineering degree, he designed all the stainless steel transfer piping for the new buildings that were constructed in 1982 as well as the state-of-the-art computer system that tracks wine movement through the winery.

Marc manages the winery's 1,200 acres of estate vineyards. Today, in addition to being the oldest winery, the Charles Krug Winery is one of Napa Valley's largest grape growers.

"The Charles Krug Winery and the Peter Mondavi family have a tradition of innovation in winemaking and viticulture," Marc Mondavi said. "I'm now a part of that tradition, as I hope my children will be after me. This is a source of pride and humility, and the reason for a lot of our hard work to make the best wines this valley can produce."

Politically Proper Packaging

Reducing use starts in the supermarket

There's plenty of talk about recycling in this area as communities begin to make it mandatory.

Wayne County and Oakland County have both required communities to begin curbside recycling as part of their solid waste scenarios. But now that that step is assured, it would be prudent to start looking ahead to the next step in reducing solid waste.

"Reduce your use" is the latest rallying cry from the green camp. In other words, if you stop wasteful products from coming into your home in the first place, you don't have to worry about whether to landfill them, reuse them or recycling them.

It starts when you go to the supermarket. The goal is to reduce the amount of packaging in your groceries, and take other steps to reduce the overall waste stream.

Michigan State University's Cooperative Extension Service has released a guidebook to environmental awareness in the home, called "The Green Pages." In addition to tips on government resources, disposal of waste and where to recycle, the booklet contains a how-to guide to more earth-sensitive grocery shopping.

Here are some dos and don'ts as recommended by the Cooperative Extension Service.

● **Do** buy items that are reusable. Sylvia Treitman pointed out that cloth towels make a better choice than paper, and you can buy your child a lunch box instead of paper bags.

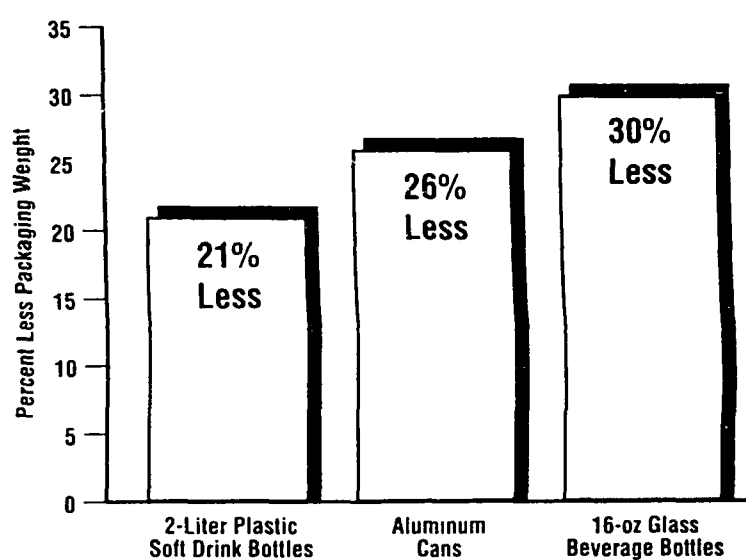
Cloth shopping bags are available. Instead of the brown paper ones, or you can shop at a market that allows you to reuse paper bags. Kroger and Meijer, for example, offer discounts of a couple cents a bag to customers who do this.

● **Do** buy refills for reusable products. Said Treitman, "When buying soft soap or liquid soap products, you can buy the dispenser, and then buy a big bottle and refill it — instead of buying the dispenser over and over."

Some hair stylists also sell hair care products in bulk to customers who bring in their refillable bottles.

● **Do** buy products made from recycled and recyclable materials. Remember, there's no such thing as recycling if no one buys recycled products. You have to com-

plete the cycle in order to say you recycle.

Milk jugs and plastic soda bottles are two examples of containers that are made from recycled materials.

"There are paper towels — if you use them — that you can buy made from recycled materials," said Treitman. "You have to look around in the grocery store. If you have a choice, pick the things that can be recycled."

● **Do** buy food or other items in bulk. Pasta bought by the pound at a bulk food store is more earth-friendly than that purchased in a box (with a plastic window in it, yet).

"A similar idea is to buy things in large packages, instead of individual servings," said Treitman. "You can either buy a very large box of corn flakes, or buy it in bulk."

Though you shouldn't buy perishable products in this manner, things like laundry soap and dish detergent are best bought in the biggest quantity you can afford (or find space for). You'll also find that, in the long run, it's cheaper to buy

large sizes.

● **Don't** buy convenience foods. TV dinners, instant processed foods like Hamburger Helper, and microwavable products in individual packages contribute to wastefulness at every step.

For example, a microwave meal comes in a tray (often not recyclable), wrapped in plastic (which you immediately throw away), in a box (often wax-coated making it unrecyclable). Not only is the packaging wasteful, but so is the manufacturing process that created it.

"Your dinner will have three or four layers of packaging on it before you get to the food," said Treitman. "People don't realize, you can make chicken and rice ahead of time, wrap it up in the freezer and make your own frozen TV dinner. Or you can bake a big pan of lasagna and reheat portions in the microwave."

Treitman likes to encourage people to learn home freezing and canning tech-

Degradable packaging not a cure

When it comes to the environment, doing your part by buying biodegradable may do more harm than good if we don't look at the total solid waste picture.

A new study released by the Expert Panel on Food Safety and Nutrition of the Institute of Food Technologists states that biodegradable packaging may help in a small way with the litter problems in the streets and oceans, but the bigger problems of solid waste are better served by what scientists call an "integrated approach."

"There is no quick solution," said Dr. Robert A. Uebbersax, of the department of food science and human nutrition of Michigan State University and IFT Regional Communicator for Michigan. "Packaging choices based solely on biodegradability ignore the primary purposes of packaging, which are to protect our foods and minimize public health hazards."

The study, published by IFT — a 25,000-member scientific society — explained that if biodegradability is required on packaging, some products would need additional layers of packaging to protect foods or satisfy strength requirements. Thus the amount of material requiring disposal (that may or may not degrade) in a landfill would go up.

A bag made of biodegradable plastic must be thicker and heavier than conventional bags, the study concluded.

Biodegradability also complicates recycling, and may add to landfill disposal of packaging, according to the study.

The IFT report recommended a multifaceted approach to the total solid waste problem, combining and improving methods of reducing materials prior to or during manufacturing (source reduction), recycling (including composting), incineration, and landfills.

Even Escoffier felt the lure of the grill

Most people read novels. I read cookbooks.

Friends talk about the latest top 10 on *The New York Times* book list. I rave about the newest culinary publication I just purchased. My friends and family think this is peculiar behavior. I tend to disagree.

There is so much to be learned from journals of any type. Because I am a chef by profession, a food scientist, out of necessity and extol food in general, what better pastime than to read about foodstuffs?

A current project is reading "The Complete Guide To The Art Of Modern Cookery" translated from French. The author is considered to be the grandfather of classical cooking — Auguste Escoffier. The book was written in 1907.

Escoffier's belief lives today: the basic fundamentals of cooking do not change. Science and social trends force us to update and modernize traditional methods but the rudimentary principals always remain the same.

I don't recommend that you run off to the bookstore and purchase this manual as it is a guide only and does not go into the

minute details of preparation. If, however, you are a history buff and have sound cooking knowledge, it could be a great addition to your bookshelf.

He (Escoffier) says it (the book) is for those who practice the art of cookery whether they be the professional chef or manager, the housewife or the gourmet. As a guide, it should be read and studied and referred to constantly; a book kept somewhere in the kitchen and not relegated to the library shelf to gather dust.

In my reading I came across a section on grilling. I never assumed that Escoffier would be very interested in what we refer to as barbecuing. I was wrong.

Some interesting fun facts. Grilling is the roasting over an open fire. It is the most primitive method of cooking. As prehistoric man's desire to eat finer edibles grew, the idea was born to prepare food over heat. The need for preserving foods for long periods was eliminated, the food tasted better and harmful parasites were killed in the process.

Along with cooking came the spit made

from various woods which imparted their flavors to the meat. Smoking then became prominent, then cooking with utensils and so on. Experience rendered conclusions, and cookery advancements were on their way — and still are today.

The fuel best for grilling is charcoal. Smoke produced by other materials may cause a bitter, unpleasant taste in the food. Ventilation is very important in all instances. The amount of fuel used is dependent on the amount and sizes of food.

It is critical to layer the charcoal pyramid-style until the fire takes hold and the coals are glowing. A natural draft is formed.

When ready to cook, spread the coals out evenly to the size required for the food to be grilled. It is also vital to have the metal grill in place and hot before adding food thus eliminating sticking to the rods.

Different foods require different grilling procedures. When grilling red meats consider the size. Big items require a hot fire to quickly brown and sear the exterior. The better the quality of meat the more the ex-

terior should be cooked since there are more juices present and their pressure will build up with heat and break through a lightly seared piece of meat.

Once the meat is brown the intensity of the heat should be diminished. Brush the meat with oil, butter or marinade while cooking to avoid drying out. The use of a fork to turn meat is not advised as the juices will be lost from the puncture marks. Tongs are suggested.

While it is imperative to "sear" red meats, the opposite is true for white meats. The heat should be medium. Hot enough to cook through and to give a golden color. Brushing with a liquid is advised for the same reason as given above. The juices should run clear when the meat is cooked.

Fish, large or small are grilled over a moderate heat; they should be brushed with butter or oil first and through the remainder of cooking. Cooked fish is flaky and pulls away from the bone easily.

Fish may be coated with flour, then brushed with butter before grilling. The result is a golden coating which prevents

Any steak cut desired (I prefer strip, T-Bone or porterhouse)
Lea and Perrins Worcestershire
1 ounce crushed pepper
1 ounce crushed whole allspice
garlic powder to taste

Brush on Worcestershire sauce. Coat steak with crushed pepper and allspice. Then sprinkle with garlic powder.

Broil to desired doneness. Allow to sit 5 minutes. Slice and serve with sautéed sliced red onions.

drying out and is more agreeable in appearance.

Vegetables grill marvelously. Simply brush with a light coating of oil and lay on the hot grids. A little salt and pepper are all that is needed to finish them off. Or, skewer and marinate before grilling. The vegetables can be used for pizza, pasta or as a side dish for entrees.

As a final note from Escoffier, "Cooking evolves — as society itself does... without ever ceasing to be an art." Go forth and be artists.

The "Frug" himself — Jeff Smith, star of TV's "The Frugal Gourmet" — visited Cargo Express in Farmington Hills one recent afternoon to sign copies of his books for customers at the cookware shop.

Smith was even more lively than he is on the popular PBS show, seen locally on WTVS, Channel 56. His cooking show chef, Craig Wollam, who also came along to sign books with Smith, was as laid-back as he is on the air.

TV star Smith greeted each customer or family effusively, as they approached him for the book-signing — after many of them waited for an hour or more in a long line that snaked through the store.

The Frugal Gourmet was especially cheery with the youngsters, many of whom watch his show along with their moms and/or dads. "How long have you been waiting?" he said loudly to one child. "That's dumb!" he joked, after the child told him.

niques because that's one of her specialties.

"I do canning classes where I teach people how to can and freeze," she said. "You wouldn't be buying products that are wasteful. You can even use the canning jars over. If your

grandmother has some, you can use them. You just buy new lids (available at many grocery, hardware and discount stores).

"When you're freezing fruits and vegetables, you don't need the packaging. You just use freezer containers and lids. That works really well."

The classes are offered once a summer by the Oakland County branch of the Cooperative Extension

Service.

● Don't buy products in aerosol cans, which can't be recycled. Seek out pump sprays instead.

● Don't buy products in plastic packaging when glass, paper, tin or aluminum are available. While plastic may not be the demon it was portrayed in recent years, there are few centers that recycle it. And curbside recyclers will not accept it.

If you do buy plastic and want to recycle it, call around to find places that will accept it. Call your appropriate county agency.

Other facts revealed by the study:

● Packaged food resulted in 2 to 5 percent waste, while fresh foods resulted in 40 to 50 percent waste, according to a study of Mexico City conducted by researcher W.L. Rathje, University of Arizona.

● Although food packaging is commonly per-

ceived as a leading contributor to solid waste, in 1988, about 60 percent of the paper in municipal solid waste came from non-packaging materials, such as newspaper, telephone books and office communications. (Paper packaging waste amounted to about 40 percent that year.)

● "Lightweighting" is a term used to mean use of less or lighter packaging materials at the plant before products ever reach the grocery shelves. This also saves enormous amounts of transporta-

tion fuel. Here area couple of "Lightweighting" examples:

Manufacturers used 26 percent less materials in aluminum cans in 1989 than in 1972.

Plastic 2-liter soft drink containers using PETE (polyethylene terephthalate) were 21 percent lighter in 1990 than they were 14 years before.

Glass 16-ounce beverage bottles became more than 30 percent lighter in packaging materials during the 10-year period from 1980-1990.

¼ cup small mint leaves
Chili flakes
Salt
Black pepper

Mix chicken with onions and vinegar. Marinate 15 minutes; drain. Add scallions, mint leaves, chili flakes, salt and black pepper to taste. Serve cold.

SHRIMP PATTIES


Serves 6

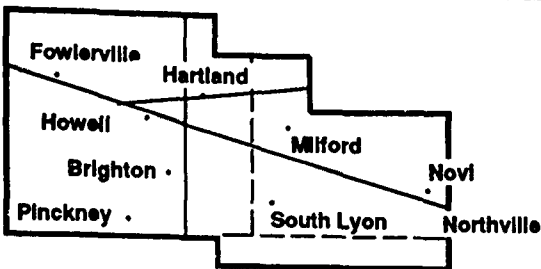

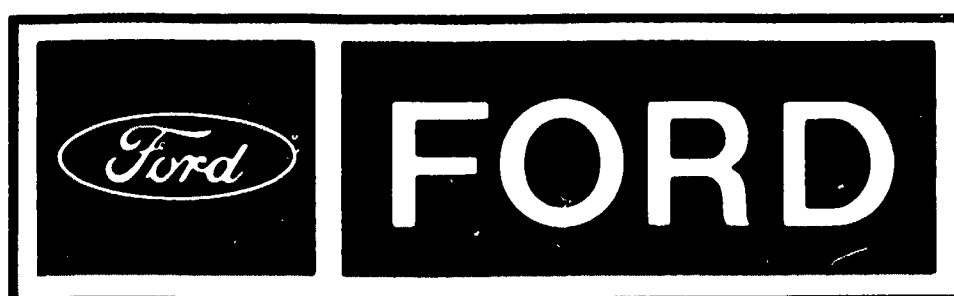

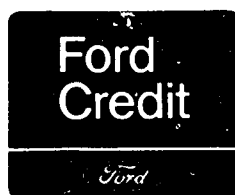

Northville goes all out for homecoming

The patriotic fervor will reach a fever pitch this Fourth of July as Northville gears up for the largest Independence Day celebration in its history.

But the community faced the possibility of a much subdued Independence Day, even no celebration at all, as few as several months ago.

The Northville Jaycees, traditional sponsors of the day's events, faced potential demise in April due to declining membership. That combined with severely reduced parade and fireworks grants from the city and township spelled the virtual end of the annual festivities.

Into the financial breach strode the members of the Michigan Military Family Support Group. The group, formed during the Persian Gulf conflict to provide support to the families of military personnel stationed overseas, turned its attention in May to providing the troops with a celebration which came to be known as "Operation Welcome Home."

Support group co-founder Ginny Hathhorn has spearheaded the drive for a celebration to end all celebrations since the end of the war in February. "The day the war ended, I said we're going to have an Operation Welcome Home," she said.

With the cooperation of the entire

Northville community, Hathhorn set up a committee composed of local business members and other community figures. She and the committee raised more than \$20,000 by the end of June and aim to raise a total of \$25,000 to fund the expanded festivities, with at least \$6,000 earmarked for the evening fireworks alone.

Hathhorn's group also instituted an "adopt a fireworks" program allowing businesses and residents to contribute toward their favorite fireworks. Zambelli Internationale of New Castle, Penn., an internationally-known fireworks firm, is providing the pyrotechnics at this year's festival.

A local chapter of the Okinawan Karate Clubs run by Northville resident Bob White donated more than \$2,000 for the festivities from a benefit karate tournament June 8 at the Community Recreation Center.

Northville and other area businesses donated additional thousands, and a door-to-door campaign raised even more.

Hathhorn sees this year's event as a family celebration. "To me, this is a day for family and we want to have a broad variety of entertainment for the families," she said.

The welcome is not restricted to members of "Operation Desert Storm," she added. "I don't think there's ever been the welcome home parties that there have been for Desert Storm, but I think everybody was trying to make up for Vietnam, I really do. And I think

it's important that everybody knows that we don't want to leave anybody out." Hathhorn predicted that Operation Welcome Home will attract about 15,000 veterans and residents from throughout the state. U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth) and State Sen. Robert Geake (R-Northville) plan to attend. Dignitaries including President George Bush and Gov. John Engler have been invited as well.

Hathhorn said she hopes the celebrations continue for troops returning from Operation Desert Storm. She recently spoke with a woman whose son is still stationed in the Persian Gulf, who summed up the fears of many military personnel that they would be forgotten on their return.

"He was so afraid that everything would be over by the time he came home, and that he wouldn't be welcomed home."

Three generations of vets are grand marshals

This year's Northville Fourth of July parade grand marshals are veterans of the Persian Gulf War, the Vietnam War and World War II.

And all from the same family.

Anthony Marschall was in the Seabees during World War II, based in Honolulu, Hawaii. From there, his outfit did construction of ramps for airplanes, roads, bridges, airstrips, Quonset huts — whatever was needed.

About 20 years later, Dennis Ehrhart, Marschall's son-in-law, began a 13-and-a-half-month tour of duty in Vietnam. His Marine Corps unit moved from Danang to Ch. Lai to Way City, clearing fire missions for howitzers and Navy ships off the coast.

And almost 30 years after that, on Dec. 8, 1990, Dennis' son Bill Ehrhart took off for the Persian Gulf. He returned to the family's Garden City home just about 10 days before the Fourth of July festivities designed to welcome him and the other troops back.

Bill's, of course, is freshest in his mind. Speaking shortly after his 29-day ship ride home, he explained a little of what the Persian Gulf War was like for him.

"I was with the unit that helped push through the mine fields," he said. His work included loading ammunition for ground troops, as well as extensive equipment

removal after the war ended.

He was there through the whole conflict — before, during and after — in both Saudi Arabia and later Kuwait. He was there through Christmas, which the troops couldn't observe in deference to the native Muslim population.

"The scariest part was the scuds. You didn't know what was coming," Bill recalled as he flipped through a stack of photos taken overseas. He was stationed right next to launching stations for the anti-scud Patriot missiles, and

every time a Patriot went up, they had to wonder if it was going after a Scud missile headed for them.

"When we went into Kuwait it was interesting. Saddam had really destroyed it," Bill said, with the oil wells on fire everywhere. "I'd never seen anything like it ... At noon, it looked like night was coming at you. Just a black cloud of smoke."

Throughout his stay, Bill learned to cope with temperatures of 114 degrees during

February and to communicate, somehow, with civilians who didn't share the same language. "We managed to get through," he said.

"It changed my views on a lot of things," he continued. Serving in such an atmosphere gives a person a new appreciation for conveniences like television, spices for food, and even clean socks. "A shower meant a lot when you got one," he said.

Knowing about his son's experiences, Dennis said, it's obvious that the Army and the Marine Corps have become a lot more sophisticated and modernized since Vietnam. Yet at the same time, "We used the same tents" that Bill used in the Gulf, he said.

Dennis gave Bill his Marine Corps ring to wear when he went overseas. "He carried it to Vietnam. I carried it to the Persian Gulf," Bill said.

Marschall's time in the service was spent in construction. "He did basically what we were doing," Bill Ehrhart said of his grandfather. "Sometimes we'd build roads and stuff like that, too."

When asked if he's proud of his grandson, Marschall smiles, nods, and then adds, "I'm proud that he's home now."

Bill is glad about that as well. And he's got a message for the country that's now welcoming him home: "From everybody that was over there, we'd like to thank everybody over here that gave us the support."

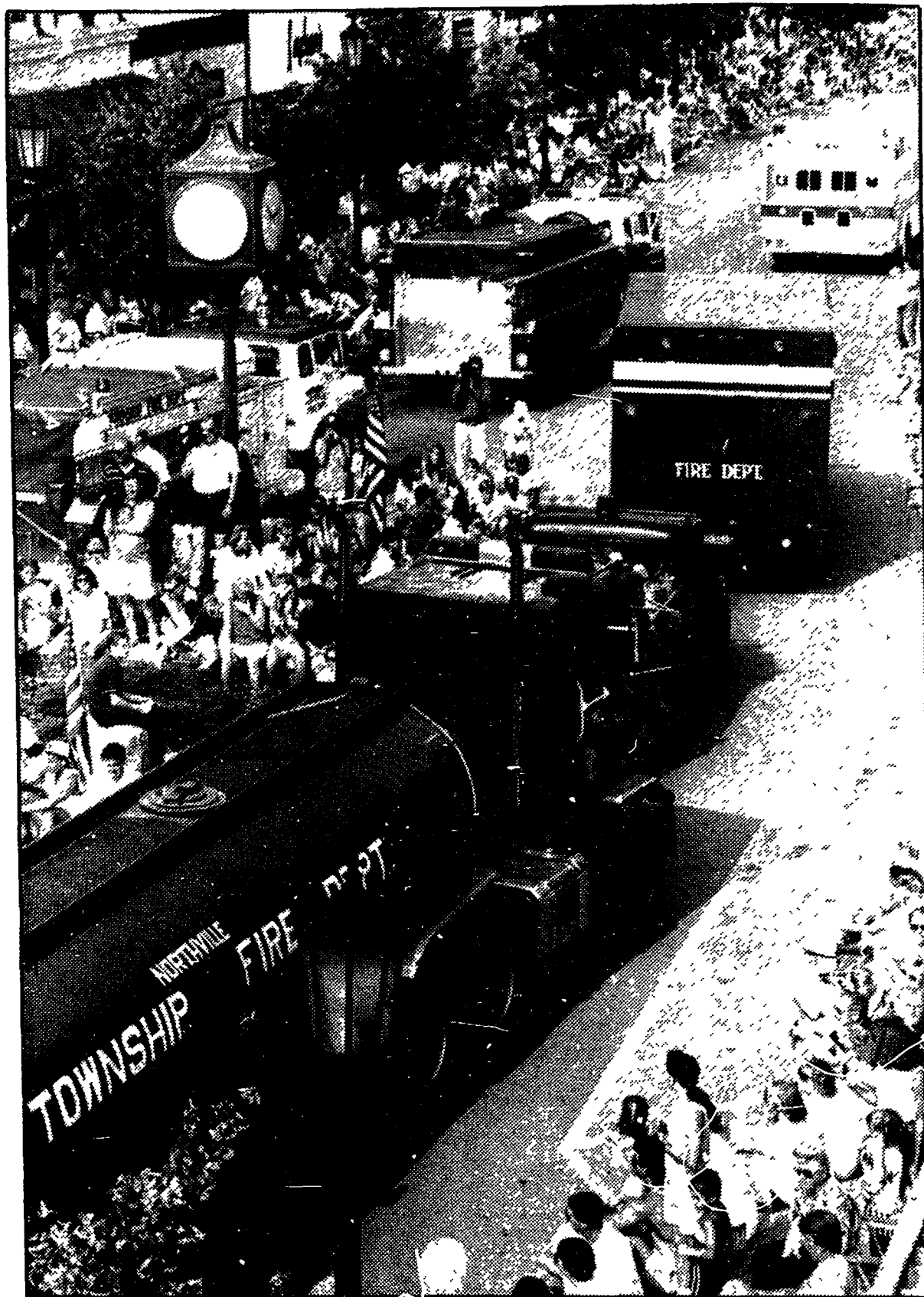

The first event on Northville's Fourth of July will be the annual pancake breakfast at the Northville Masonic Temple, 106 E. A ceremony and rally will be held inside

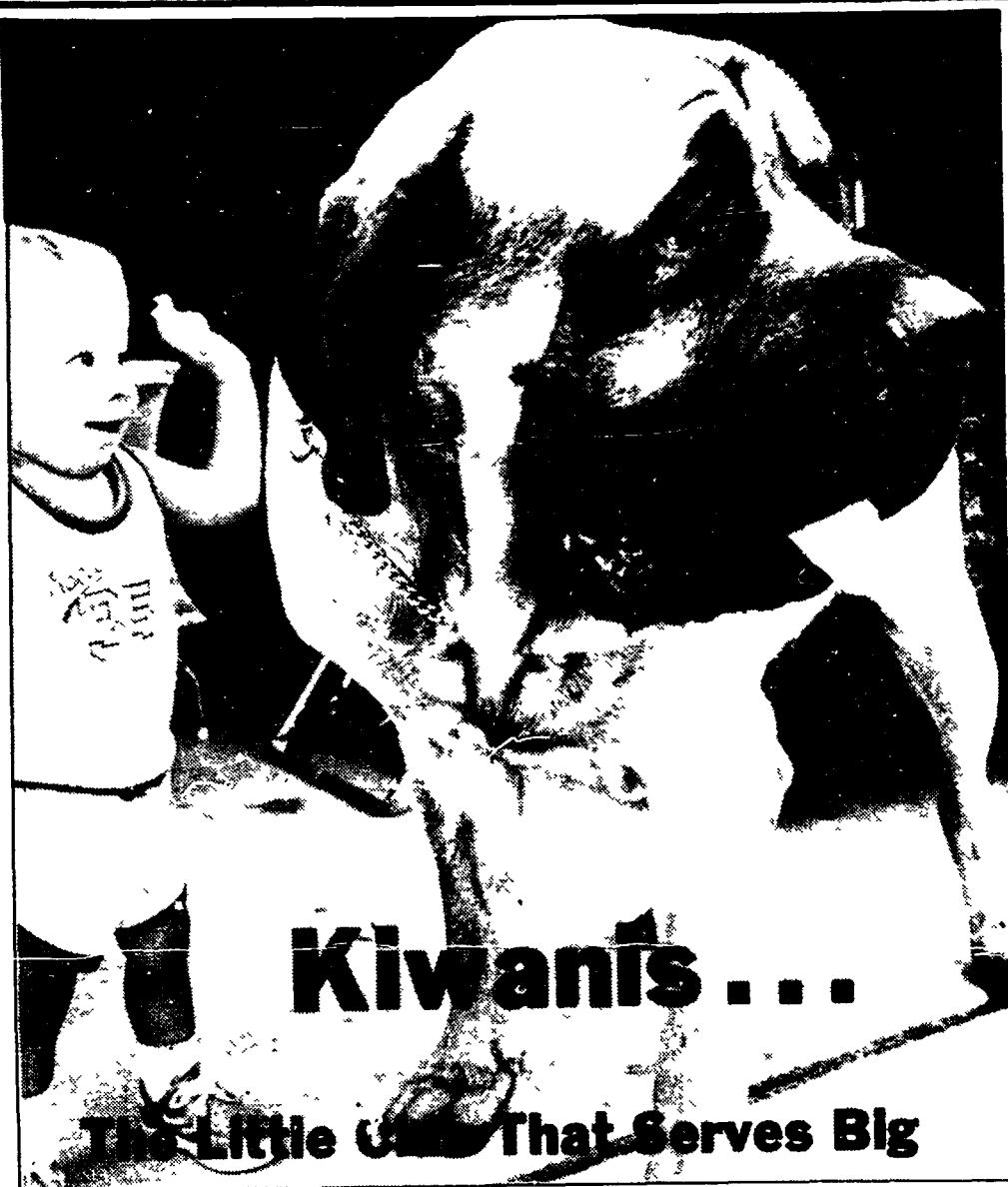

The overall theme is an afternoon picnic, including craft demonstrations and an annual handweaving sale by the Mill Race Weavers Guild, live music, a 50-50 raffle and refreshments.

Beginning at 5 p.m. will be a Downtown Dance-a-Thon featuring the music of Silver Sounds of Canton. The kids' dance will run until 7:30 p.m. From 7:30 to 9 p.m., adults are invited to dance to the hits of the '40s, '50s and '60s.

The day concludes with the fireworks at dusk on the hill near Northville High School.

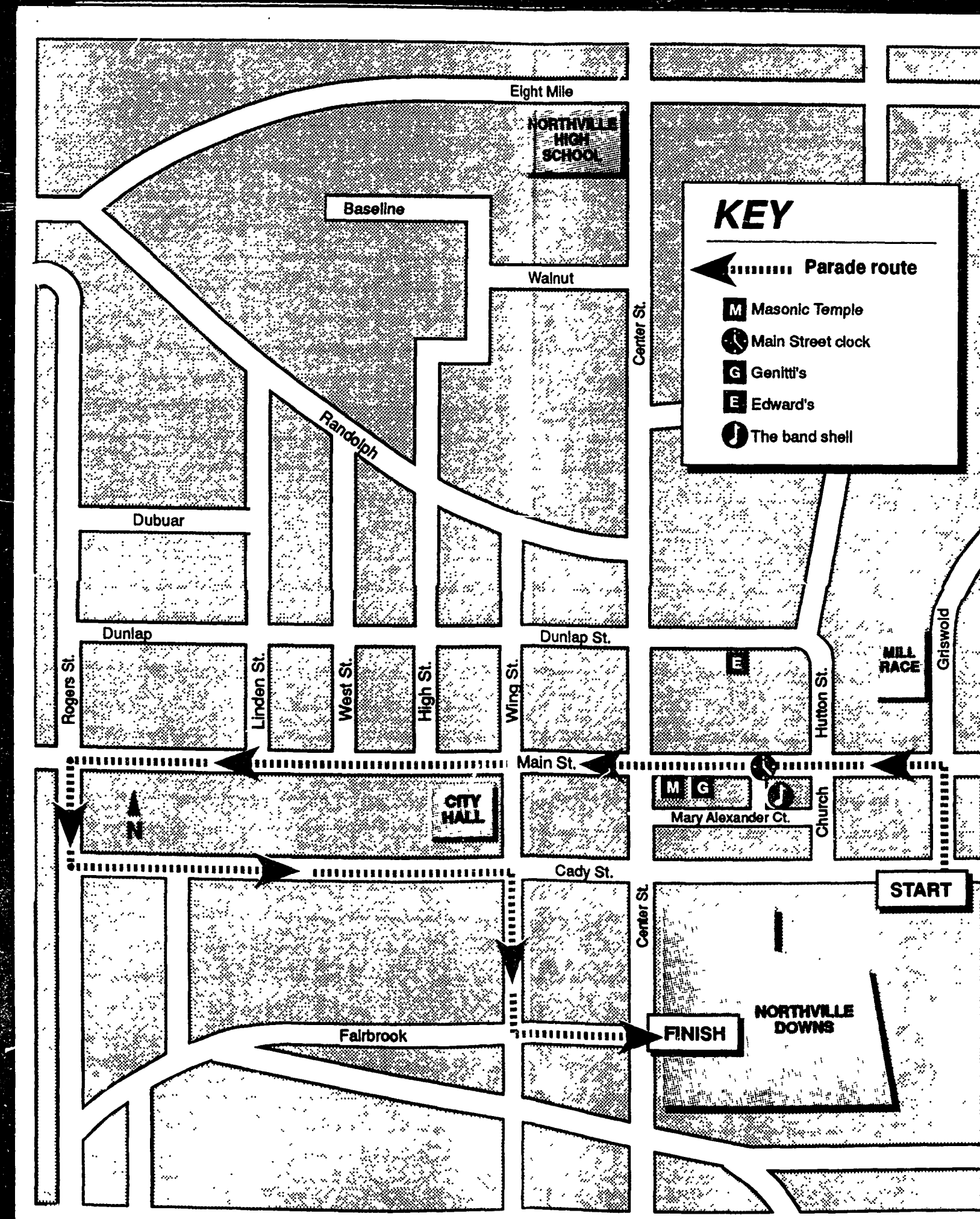

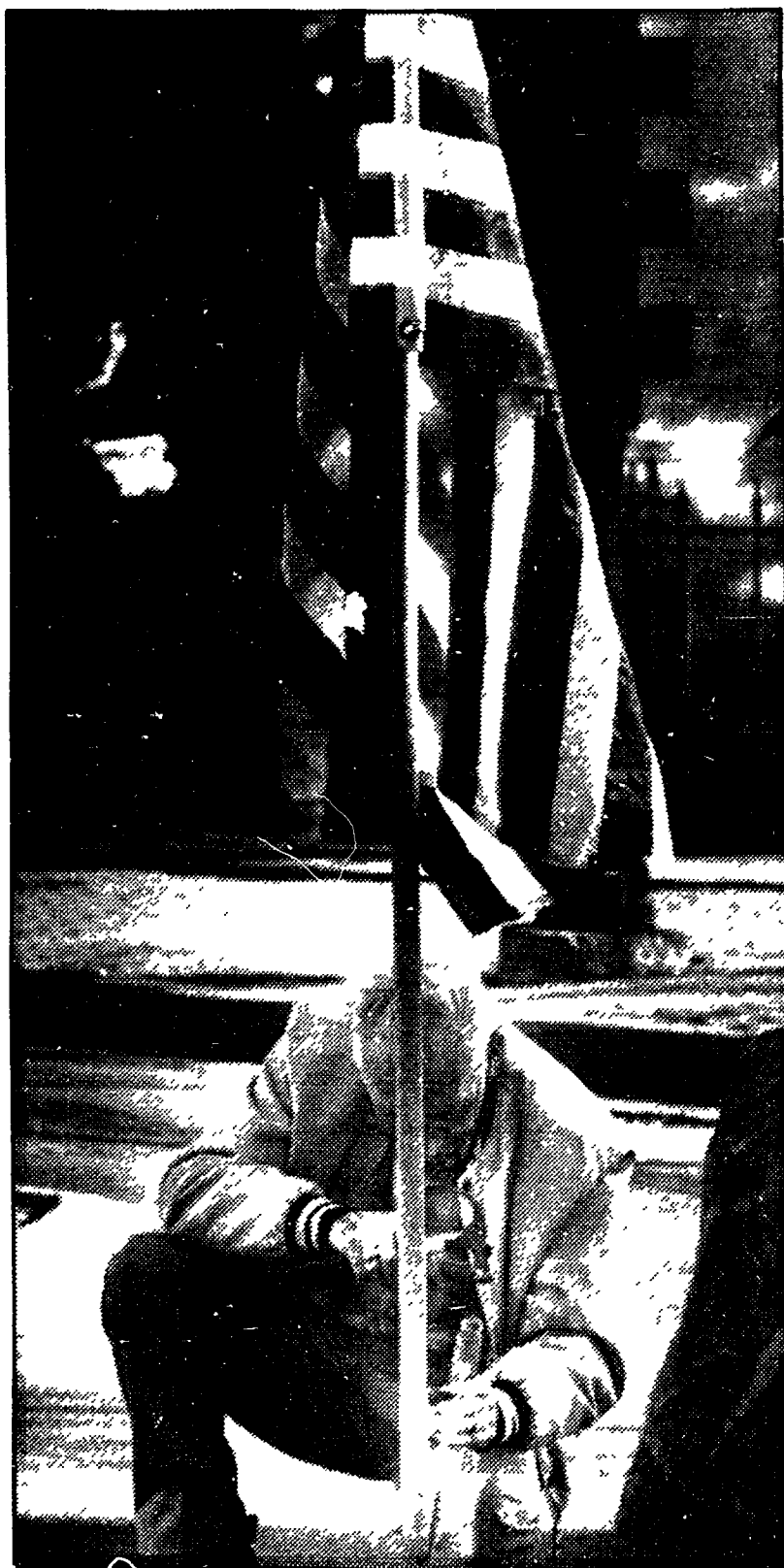

Colonel from Northville served under Schwarzkopf

Col. Richard Atchison's visit to Northville for the Fourth of July will be his first time home in two years.

Scheduled to deliver a speech during the 3:30 p.m. rally at Northville Downs, Atchison said last week that he's looking forward to seeing his family and participating in the patriotic ho'day spirit of his hometown.

Atchison recently returned from six months in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia working directly under Gen. Norman Schwarzkopf during the height of Operation Desert Storm. He was assigned to Schwarzkopf's staff in December and "we basically built up an organization there," Atchison said. "We started with 75 (people), then built up to 560, then were back down to about 80 by the end of March."

Atchison joined the Air Force in 1961 when he was 21. He was in Vietnam in 1971 and 1972. Afterward, he worked in Florida on the development of many techniques that were refined and developed into the "smart bomb" technology used in Desert Storm.

After Florida, Atchison spent time in Washington, Germany and New Mexico. His specialties have been electronic warfare to thwart enemy air-defense systems; weapons development and testing; and army intelligence. He currently works in Washington in intelligence.

Working with Schwarzkopf in Saudi Arabia was "a real pleasure," Atchison said. "He is a brilliant strategist and tactician."

During Operation Desert Storm, Atchison and his staff developed the procedure for stopping the flow of oil into the gulf.

The last two years have been the most challenging of Atchison's 30-year career, he said.

"Things are happening so fast," he said. "With the fall of the Berlin wall, there has been a total change in the way we approach Europe."

Operation Desert Storm, he said, gives a glimpse of what such conflicts will be like in the future, if they are again necessary. Long, drawn-out wars are less likely, he said.

"In our country, we don't like war," he said. "And we absolutely have been against long, drawn-out conflicts."

"If (such a conflict is ever again necessary in the near future), it would be strike hard, fast and get the dickens out of there."

Atchison has had a long and successful career in the military and successful participation in Operation Desert Storm, but he doesn't consider himself a "patriot."

"I'm just another military officer," he said. "I don't think we did anything anyone else wouldn't or couldn't have done, given the same circumstances."

He added that a big factor in the success of Operation Desert Storm was the support from back home.

"The fact that we would work all day, then spend the evening answering letters and opening packages — people don't realize how much that helped, especially for some of the young kids out in the middle of nowhere. I don't think anyone went more than five days without some kind of contact from home."

"People in Northville sent me a T-shirt and photographs. In fact, I was out jogging one day in my T-shirt and a Kuwaiti stopped me and asked, 'Where did you get that shirt?' He really liked it."

Northville acted as center of support

The driving force behind this year's Fourth of July celebrations was a group formed out of concern.

Northville residents Ginny Hathorn and Sue Pittonet formed the West Side Chapter of the Michigan Military Family Support Group last September when they discovered a common bond: They each had a son aboard the USS Eisenhower. The aircraft carrier had been rushed to the Persian Gulf to increase the U.S. military presence there after Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein invaded Kuwait on Aug. 2.

The Northville women started the group as a way to share their anxieties with other military families. The group also offered support to the families of the dozens of American hostages held hostage by the Iraqi government. Hathorn shared a bond with the hostages as well as the troops, living in the former home of Northville native Kevin

Bazner.

Bazner, his wife and two children were made unwilling "guests" of the Iraqi government on Aug. 2 when their London to Kuala Lumpur flight stopped to refuel in Kuwait. The plane's passengers, which included the Bazners and 3 other U.S. citizens, were detained by the Iraqi military and sent to hotels in Baghdad. The passengers later were shuttled around Iraq as part of Hussein's "human shield" against a military attack.

Bazner's wife and children were released Sept. 2, and he was released Dec. 8.

Bazner's sister, Pati Heath, spoke at the Northville support group's first meeting on

Northville soon became the focus of regional and national media attention when the community was declared the country's first "support city" for U.S. troops in the Middle East.

Sept. 10, asking that those present show their support for all Americans either held hostage or on military duty in the Persian Gulf region.

The Northville group met monthly at first, but went to weekly meetings when the multinational force led by the United States went to war with Iraq Jan. 16. Hundreds of people shared their fears and hopes with each other at the gatherings, held at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Northville.

Northville soon became the focus of regional and national media attention when the community was declared the country's first "support city" for U.S. troops in the Middle East. With Detroit

television news cameras rolling in the background, the city and township jointly passed a resolution in January praising the support group's efforts.

The Cable News Network sent a camera crew to town that month to film downtown buildings bedecked in red, white and blue ribbons, organized and donated by Roxanne and Ray Casterline, and placed by the support group. The city appeared on CNN broadcasts nationwide. President George Bush and Vice President Dan Quayle sent letters of support and thanks to Hathorn for her work with the group, and she and other supportgroup members from around the country were treated to a White House dinner in their honor in April.

Donations are still being accepted for Operation Welcome Home, the Fourth of July celebration in honor of returning troops and all military personnel and their families. HBO special looks at baseball's 'Golden Age'

Collector's-item footage is featured

Once there was a time when baseball was a game.

Before the days when multimillion-dollar player contracts and massive exposure were made possible by the emergence of television as a social phenomenon, the game of baseball and the men who played it captured the American imagination. While America stumbled through a major Depression and into the second global war in two decades, players like Dizzy Dean, Lou Gehrig and Ted Williams kept the American spirit alive simply by chasing a ball between two chalk lines. That time has come to be called "The Golden Age of Baseball."

Thanks to the discovery of more than 40 hours of film footage, including never-before-seen color footage of Babe Ruth and Jackie Robinson as well as Gehrig and Williams, HBO and Black Canyon productions have recaptured that time in "When It Was a Game," debuting Monday, July 8, on HBO.

The documentary takes fans back to the days when the Braves were in Boston, the A's were in Philadelphia and most games were played during the day on grass fields. It visits now-legendary ballparks like Ebbets Field, the Polo Grounds and Comiskey Park, and offers highlights of the 1938 World Series between the New York Yankees and Chicago Cubs, played before the ivy-covered walls of Wrigley Field.

More than 40 Hall of Famers are represented in this look at our national pastime. Producers found the footage in the basements, attics and trunks of fans, former players, coaches and equipment managers. In addition, actors James Earl Jones, Jason Robards and Roy Scheider contribute readings from historic baseball lore.

The show offers a historical perspective on the game, beginning with the hard-nosed, Depression-era play of the St. Louis Cardinals' Gas

House Gang, led by Dizzy Dean, Pepper Martin and Leo Durocher. It recalls the days when President Franklin Roosevelt declared baseball so important to American morale that "they shouldn't quit playing just because there's a war on," and goes through the post-War battles between the New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox.

However, the documentary spends far too little time chronicling the most important event in the history of American sports: integration. There is some footage of Robinson, Roy Campanella, Willie Mays and Satchel Paige, but

there is no film of the old Negro Leagues and only passing reference to the fact that the bold, although long overdue, move by Branch Rickey and the Brooklyn Dodgers in bringing Robinson into the Major Leagues was very unpopular with most players and owners. In fact, the 1951 dismissal of then-baseball commissioner A.B. "Happy" Chandler was prompted at least in part by his decision to override the owners' 15-1 vote against letting Robinson into the game.

These memories, too, belong to the "Golden Age."
