

Big Fourth on tap

It's finally here. The largest, longest, biggest, most extensive Fourth of July celebration in Northville's history is at hand.

"Operation Welcome Home" serves as the theme for this year's observances, following the presidential mandate to make the holiday a welcome back of troops who served in the Persian Gulf War.

Northville is going all out for the event, with special events planned all day. Highlights include the parade at 10 a.m. downtown, a rally and ceremony at Northville Downs at 3:30 p.m., and the traditional fireworks at dusk at the Northville High School hill. Other "Operation Welcome Home" events include the Satin Sheets Bed Race just before the parade, a fun fair downtown after the parade, and a dance-a-thon after the rally.

The Fourth of July also features the traditional Independence Day picnic at Mill Race Historical Village all afternoon, and the annual pancake breakfast at Masonic Temple all morning.

Planner leaves

Planning consultant Don Wortman has left the firm of Ayres, Lewis, Norris & May, and may leave the City of Northville with a new consultant.

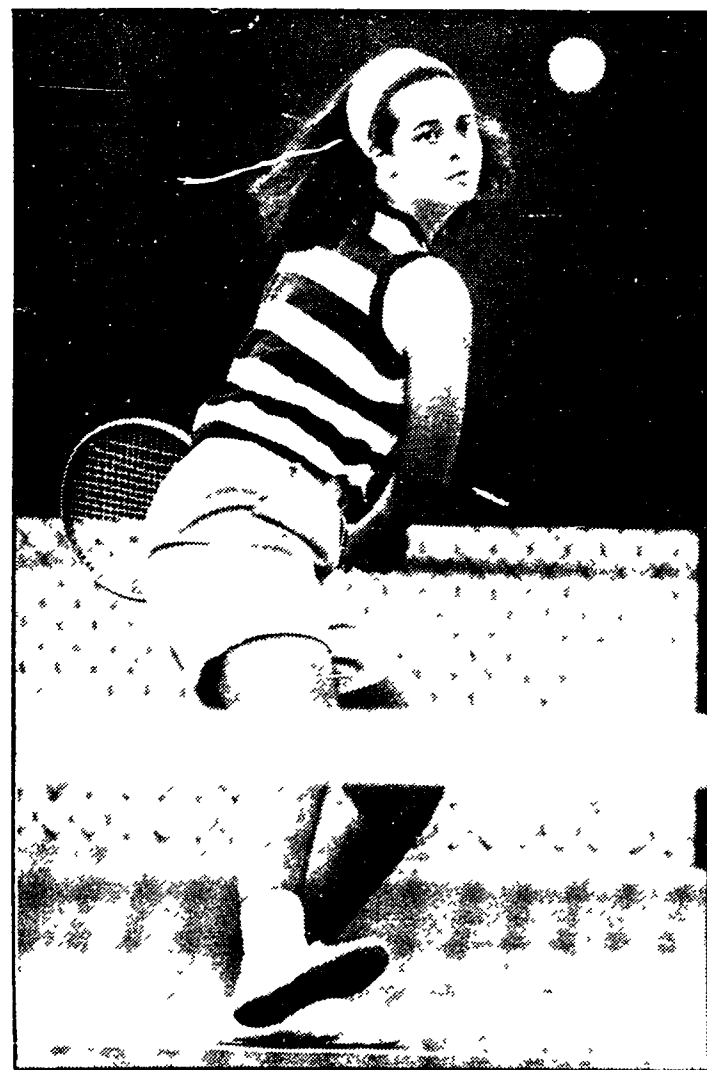
But Wortman said he would just as soon continue working as the city's consultant, and oversee the implementation of some of the changes recommended in the Master Plan he helped draft.

Wortman said he plans to remain available to the city as a consultant, if city officials so desire. He planned to attend Tuesday's planning commission public hearing on the proposed rezoning of the Bealtown neighborhood from R-2 to R-1B, which would prevent the conversion of single-family homes to duplexes.

"I wanted to continue on because of the Bealtown (controversy); I wanted to provide some continuity," he said. "I do sincerely feel that it's time to implement the Master Plan, and hope to see some of the changes implemented. . . I'd still like to continue on with the planning commission in Northville, but that will be up to the city to decide."

Wortman has worked with the city since 1988, and was instrumental in drafting the recently enacted City of Northville Master Plan. Glen Bowles, an ALNM planner who has researched city projects with Wortman

Jeep driver charged with manslaughter

The driver of the Jeep that struck and killed two joggers on Eight Mile Road last month was charged Tuesday with two counts of manslaughter.

Kenneth Loveday, 19, stood mute to the charges at his arraignment in Plymouth's 35th District Court. His lawyer, David Goldstein, requested a court examination. A date had not been set by press time.

Northville city police sought and obtained a \$100,000 cash bond

against Loveday after an impassioned plea from a lawyer representing the families of the joggers.

Police officer Glenn Stewart first asked for the large bond, saying, "I've spoken with the family members and relatives, and they're rather distraught. The severity of the crime speaks for itself."

Kathleen McCann, of the Birmingham firm Ribitwer & McCann, added, "It is our understanding that the defendant has eight current charges on his driving record, and there's evi-

School salaries up 8.5 percent

Teachers and administrators in the Northville school district will get at least a 7-percent pay raise next year.

Because some district employees are not yet at the top of the pay scale they get an incremental step change in their pay which eventually will bring them to the top of the scale. The changes upward in salary to newer employees bring the average pay increase in Northville Public Schools to 8.5 percent.

Teachers' salaries will cost the district over \$10 million next year. The total operating budget is \$23.8 million.

First-year teachers with a bachelor's degree working in the Northville Public School District will earn \$26,675.

The average teacher salary in the Northville Public School District is estimated to earn \$47,508 during the next school year.

The maximum teacher salary in

the Northville Public School District for teachers with a master's degree and 30 years' experience is \$54,973.

Administrators will receive the same 7-percent increase except for Superintendent George Bell, who is retiring, and Assistant Superintendent Burton Knighton, who will fill in for Bell until September.

Bell earned \$88,353 last year. Knighton will receive the same salary pro-rated to the two-month period he will serve as acting superintendent.

Former Northville High School principal David Bolitho will assume Knighton's position, earning \$84,715. Dolly McMaster, assistant superintendent for instructional services, earns the same amount.

Elementary school principals earn \$63,839, except for Moraine Principal Mary Najarian, who has not yet reached the top of the pay scale.

The middle school principals earn \$66,882.

Other budget expenditures increased between 5 and 7 percent, except benefits, which increased 10 percent.

New refuse collection rates approved

City property owners will see a new charge on their water and sewer bills after Monday's action by the Northville City Council.

The council approved new refuse collection rates as part of the city's continuing shift from a millage-based to a fee-based curbside collection service.

Single-family residences and residential condominiums, and commercial and industrial businesses with curbside services, will be billed \$16.30 a month under the new rates.

Commercial and industrial firms using rolloff containers will be billed \$35.06 to empty a two-yard container and \$57.46 to empty a six-yard container.

An additional \$3,447 in monthly refuse costs will be divided among the roughly 50 property owners in three blocks bounded by Dunlap, Cady, Hutton, Church, Center, Main and Wing streets,

based on the State Equalized Value of the properties.

The rates go into effect immediately, and will appear on Aug. 1 water and sewer bills.

The fees are intended to cover an estimated \$440,000 in contracted trash collection and disposal costs and \$55,000 in labor costs for collection and operation of the city's recycling center, and an additional 10 percent to, in the words of Acting City Manager Mark Christiansen, "maintain the integrity of the fund."

Christiansen predicted that because the fees will be collected through bi-monthly bills rather than taken out of tax payments, "we will experience greater cash flow problems." He recommended collecting the additional 10 percent to provide sufficient cash flow.

"On a user-based system, there is likely to be a higher delinquency rate, and the payments are spread out over time," he said.

Christiansen's report on the fees noted that they would erase a basic inequity in the previous

tax-based collection charge, by charging property owners at the same rate.

While collection of trash from the city's estimated 2,103 residential units accounts for about 57 percent of the city's trash collection costs, those units had been paying about 80 percent of the total cost under the previous millage-based system. The adopted rates shift about 20 percent of the inequity off the residential property owners and onto the commercial properties.

The council reluctantly gave unanimous approval to the new rates, with Council Member Dewey Gardner calling them "a necessary evil."

As Council Member Carolann Ayers said, "We do need to get started on this because we're going to be paying these collection costs starting today, and there's no more tax money to pay them."

The new rates are not permanent and will be adjusted when the city adds a curbside recycling program later this year, as mandated by the Wayne County Solid Waste Plan.

Driver suspected of drug use in joggers' death

dence that controlled substances were used. There had also been a practice, according to witnesses, of trying to run people off the road, and this time he went too far.

McCann also noted that Loveday's mother and stepfather, with whom he has been living, recently moved from Novi to a rented home in Garden City. "His ties to the community are rather slim," she said.

Judge John E. MacDonald granted the \$100,000 bond despite protests by Goldstein that his client had cooperated with police during the investigation, and had lived in the

community for years. Loveday turned himself in to city police for Tuesday's court date.

Police transported Loveday to the Oakland County Jail in Pontiac after the arraignment, where he will remain unless bail is posted.

Yusuf Hanania of Novi and brother-in-law Albert Abdelnour of Livonia were running east on the north shoulder of Eight Mile Road just east of Beck Road on the morning of June 5 when they were struck by Loveday's westbound Jeep Wrangler.

Hanania's wife, Angela, and Abdelnour's brother Basim sat in on Loveday's arraignment with

McCann. They would not say whether they plan to seek civil charges against Loveday.

"Right now, our primary concern is to see that the matter is brought to justice," McCann said.

Goldstein had no comment on the case.

Loveday originally faced charges of negligent homicide, a misdemeanor offense punishable by up to two years in prison per charge. But city police, in cooperation with the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office, investigated the incident further and found enough evidence to charge the teenager with manslaughter, a felony punishable by up to 15 years in prison.

Det. Sgt. David Fendeleit said the prosecutor's office asked for further information on a variety of topics, including whether the driver or passenger of the Jeep had any connection to the two joggers and whether the driver had a history of dangerous driving practices.

Police found no prior connection between the Jeep's occupants and the joggers, and nothing more than anecdotal reports that Loveday was a dangerous driver. But they did find evidence of drug use just prior to the accident.

Fendeleit said the key to the more serious charge was his discovery that the driver had smoked marijuana

that morning.

"I received information that marijuana was smoked before the accident, and I've been able to confirm that, and we do have evidence that was found in the vehicle," he said before the arraignment.

The evidence consisted of a "roach," the remains of a marijuana cigarette, found in the Jeep's ashtray after the incident.

Loveday originally claimed he hit the joggers after swerving to avoid a grey pickup truck heading east on Eight Mile. Police questioned that

claim after several witnesses to the accident could not recall seeing such a vehicle.

The teenager agreed to a Breathalyzer test after the incident and the test found no alcohol in his bloodstream. But he refused to submit to a blood test for drug use.

Loveday has a prior history of drug involvement. He was arraigned on a charge of marijuana possession at 35th District Court June 3, and is scheduled to be sentenced on that charge July 10.

Arson blamed in Sunday fire on county land

Township fire department officials blame arson for a blaze that roared through an abandoned building on Wayne County property late Sunday.

A dozen firefighters used an ample supply of firefighting equipment to quell the fire, which ignited some time late Sunday afternoon in a building on the old Wayne County Child Development Center east of Sheldon Road.

Flames erupted in the second floor of the two-story building, firefighters said. The entire building was engulfed in flames by the time the fire department was contacted, police said.

The exact cause of the fire had not

been determined by press time late Monday.

Witnesses attending a soccer match west of the site reported the blaze just before 8 p.m. The fire was under control a half-hour later, township Fire Chief Rick Rosselle said.

Rosselle said the fire was intentionally set, but said the matter would not be investigated further because the abandoned structure incurred no real damage.

Police searched the county land grounds for suspected firebugs, but came up empty-handed.

The fire on county land was the "sixth or seventh" firefighters have responded to this year, Rosselle said. He estimated the cost of fighting the blaze at approximately \$1,500.

Voters fill three seats in election

City residents will cast their ballots for two city council members and the mayor this November.

Council members Carolann Ayers and Paul Folino, and Mayor Chris Johnson, are up for re-election in the Nov. 5 elections.

Ayers and Folino are nearing the end of their latest four-year terms and have not announced whether they will seek another term.

Ayers is serving his third term, having been first elected to the council in 1979. Folino is serving his second series of terms, having been elected to the council in 1981 after a four-year absence. He was first elected in 1969.

Mayor Chris Johnson is finishing his second two-year term.

Council members Dewey Gardner and Jerry Mittman have until 1993 to hit the campaign trail again, if they elect to run for another term.

Gardner resigned a council seat in 1987 to run for the mayorship being vacated by Paul Vernon, but lost to Johnson. He said that he has thought of running for mayor again,

but several factors weigh against such a decision. "I think about it all the time... (but) there's no great reward in being mayor, because you're just another vote on the council," he said.

Gardner added that he did not want to "dilute" the current city council by running against a fellow council member. "All it does is knock one good person out of the council," he said.

"If Chris (Johnson) decided not to run or something, then that's another story," he added.

Candidates for any of the three positions must file nominating petitions between Sept. 1 and Oct. 1. They can start circulating the petitions now, but they can't file until then," said City Clerk Cathy Konrad.

Candidates need the signatures of between 50-75 registered voters on the petitions, which may be obtained at the city clerk's office.

To run for a city office, a candidate must have been a Northville City resident for two years by the last day of filing, Oct. 1, and must be registered to vote in the city.

No petitions had been pulled by press time Monday.

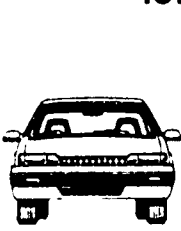

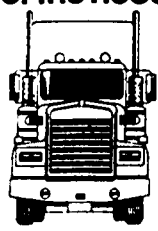

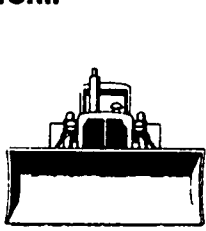

Men injured in fight with alleged shoplifter

Three men — including an off-duty township police officer — received treatment for minor injuries sustained in a brawl with a suspected shoplifter last week outside Meijer.

Officer Paul Sumner and a Meijer security employee each were bitten on the hand and another Meijer staffer was scratched by the suspect, a 35-year-old Detroit woman, during the June 25 scuffle.

The woman reportedly attempted to steal seven cartons of cigarettes from the 20401 Haggerty store prior to the altercation.

Her lengthy police record includes nine driver's license suspensions and at least six convictions on larceny and assault and battery charges, police said.

Police are seeking a felony warrant against the woman, said police Det. Michael Wildt. Wayne County prosecutors will determine specific charges, which could include retail fraud, assault and battery or resisting arrest, Wildt said.

The injuries occurred as Sumner and the security workers attempted to subdue the woman in the store's parking lot, police said.

According to store security and police records, the woman hid the cigarette cartons inside a purse and left the store just after 1 a.m. June 25. A 19-year-old Meijer security worker approached the woman in the parking lot and identified himself.

In his statement to police, the security staffer said he "requested and commanded her back to the store (and) she refused. I then attempted to physically restrain her and a fight ensued (sic)."

Police listed the woman at approximately 5'5" and 300 lbs.

The two security staffers wrestled with the woman and the trio fell on a customer's car, breaking an antenna, according to reports.

The woman then began "kicking and screaming and punching and biting," the security employee said.

Sumner, who was off-duty at the time of the incident, said he witnessed the security employee struggling with the suspect. He said he identified himself and joined the fray.

Minutes later, the woman was handcuffed and had to be dragged "to the loss prevention office because she refused to move," one security employee said.

The suspect "had to be pulled by the arms to the office," Sumner said in his report.

The woman refused to talk and became "unrespon-

sive" once in Meijer's loss prevention office, police said. Emergency crews transported her to St. Mary Hospital in Livonia, where she was treated for low potassium counts and was released "otherwise uninjured and in apparent good health," police said.

The woman then was shipped to township police headquarters where she became "hostile and very uncooperative," police said. Police said the woman carried no identification and gave them a name that actually belonged to her sister.

The woman later admitted that she had used her sister's name. She then was identified through a telephone call to her mother, police said.

The woman was released from police custody 21 hours after the incident, pending a warrant.

Sumner and the security employee were treated for hand bites at Botsford General Hospital.

Two men arrested, charged with taking empty bottles

A hundred bottles of beer on the wall, a hundred bottles of beer . . .

A pair of local men will have ample time to sing that tune if convicted of charges they stole five cases of empty beer bottles from a local club.

Township police last week ar-

rested a Northville resident and a Livonia resident after spotting the pair walking along a set of railroad tracks east of Northville Road.

The men were carrying five cases of empty beer bottles police allege were stolen from the Northville Moose lodge, 18418 Northville Road.

The men both pleaded not guilty in 35th District Court June 27 to

charges of larceny under \$100. The men were released on \$100 personal bond.

A witness told police she was working at the Moose when she heard noises near a shed area of the building. She then saw two men carrying the five cases and a basketball.

When the woman asked the men what they were doing, one reportedly

replied: "What do you think we're doing?"

The men continued to walk away and the woman called police.

Police saw the two and another Northville man — who was not charged — walking north along the railroad tracks, beer cases in tow. When the men saw police, they reportedly dropped the bottles and walked

east behind the Highland Lakes Shopping Center.

Police caught up with the men, who claimed they found the bottles along the railroad tracks. One also gave police a false name when asked for identification, according to reports.

He later admitted his real identity, police said.

Police recovered the discarded bottles and asked the witness to identify the contraband and the suspects. When she confirmed that the two men had carried the cases away, police arrested the men on larceny charges.

At 10 cents a bottle, the haul would have been \$12.

The suspects face an Aug. 12 court date in 35th District Court.

Traffic concerns slow Meijer gas station plan

Concerns about heightened traffic congestion near an already bustling intersection have township planners wary of a proposed gas station at Meijer's 20401 Haggerty site.

Meijer's plan to build a gas station and convenience store on 1.3 acres in its mammoth lot at the Haggerty/Eight Mile corner is not the major bone stuck in the commission's craw. Station access and an additional curb cut is the problem.

A lack of communication doomed Meijer's hopes for final site plan approval June 25.

Meijer spokesperson Chuck Payton said he did not realize the commission was so concerned about curb cuts, or entrances. Planners said he should have listened more closely.

Planners tabled their review until Meijer representatives alter their proposal to add a fourth curb cut

along the southbound Haggerty lane.

A fourth curb cut would lie approximately 200 feet north of an existing cut and could severely hamper traffic flow near the intersection, the commission agreed.

Planners feel northbound traffic attempting left turns into the proposed entrance would cause the bulk of potential problems, said Carol Maise, township planning and zoning administrator.

Some planners favored right-turn-only restrictions as a way of solving flow problems. Others rejected the curb-cut plan altogether.

Commission Chairperson Charles DeLand polled his fellow planners on their views of the proposed cut.

Three favored a right-turn-only strategy, but four other commissioners sided with police Chief Chip Snider and Fire Chief Rick Rosselle in opposing any new cuts.

Meijer is under no legal obligation to slash the curb cut from its site plan, Maise said.

"It depends on what they want to pursue," she said.

Township engineering consultant Donald Weaver also noted that Meijer failed to address several concerns he had expressed at a site review earlier this spring.

That fact angered commissioners Pat Wright and Karen Baja.

"I'm feeling angry about this site plan," Baja said. "After all the hours spent on this site plan (it is still) incomplete."

"At least six of Mr. Weaver's (comments) were not addressed," she said.

Wright voiced displeasure that the commission heard a Meijer plan that had so many perceived holes.

"I find it a little distressing," she said.

Meijer has not announced if it will submit a revised plan at the planning commission's July 30 session. Plan submittal deadline for this month's meeting is July 11, Maise said.

Schools to work with locals on new construction plans

Northville School Superintendent George Bell said the district will work with local municipalities when constructing new buildings, despite a law that says it may do otherwise.

A bill to overturn current law and require school districts to submit to local zoning ordinances passed the state House.

But if the bill becomes law, it will not change the district's plans in designing and building a new elementary school located off Nine Mile in the City of Novi, Bell said.

The district has been working with the city in designing the new school, and it plans to continue cooperating with Novi in constructing the build-

ing, Bell said.

The district has entered the construction stage of building a new elementary school on Nine Mile Road between Taft and Beck roads. An amendment to the School Code last year gave the state superintendent of public instruction exclusive jurisdiction over school site plans.

The amendment, sponsored by state Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills, was intended to make planning easier for school districts that span several municipalities.

This year, Rep. Gary Randall, R-Elwell, moved to strike Faxon's amendment to the school code.

Elwell's bill, which passed with one dissenting vote in the House, restores local control over school site

plans. The bill will be taken up again when the Senate goes back into session in the fall.

Bell said the school district had planned to work with Novi when building its new elementary school even before the bill was introduced.

"It only makes good sense," he said.

The new elementary school, which will be on Nine Mile Road between Taft and Beck roads, moved into the construction phase of development when the school board gave final approval to the design at a June 24 meeting.

Assistant Superintendent Burton Knighton said in previous school developments the district has had an unusually good relationship with the city and township of Northville.

Seniors prescription program set

The Michigan Emergency Pharmaceutical Program for Seniors (MEPPS) is now available for older adults who live in western Wayne County. Seniors 65 and older can qualify for this emergency program if they spend more than 10 percent of their monthly household income on prescriptions; and have an income of less than \$785 a month (\$1,052 a month for a couple).

Individuals will be required to fill out self-certification forms and should bring in their medication bottle(s) to verify that it is refillable. The intake worker will also enroll those individuals, who qualify, in the DSS Medical Assistance Program. Vouchers issued by the sites are good for up to a 30-day supply of medication. Seniors can apply for assistance only twice during a fiscal year which ends Sept. 30. Residents of

nursing homes or mental health facilities licensed by the state are ineligible. Older adults may apply for assistance at any area MEPPS intake site. SEMCOC eyes urban sprawl, government for the region

"Regional government" used to be a dirty phrase around the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

Recently it became a thinkable idea. To many at a SEMCOG workshop on urban sprawl, regional government became discussable — and even desirable.

"Start with a regional planning agency with mandatory participation," said spokespeople for eight groups of elected officials, planners, environmentalists and businesspeople.

"A metropolitan council for services of a regional nature could be workable," one group agreed at the end of the day.

"Regional government, with an elected governing body, is perhaps the end result, the ultimate," said another.

"Everyone agreed we need some kind of change — at a minimum, mandatory regional planning," said still another.

SEMCOC, founded in 1969, is a voluntary agency in the seven-county region. Some 130 of 230 units of government pay dues. In a deep economic recession, many quit.

For the last year, SEMCOG has been studying "urban sprawl" — the eating up of land by low-density uses unjustified by population growth. The region's population is expected to rise 6 percent in the next 20 years, but "business as usual" will require development of 40 percent more land.

Last week's SEMCOG-sponsored session broached the subject SEMCOG leaders had shunned for years. Before the 100 conferees were four options for change that proved almost universally popular:

- Mandatory regional planning.
- Mandatory regional authorities.
- A metropolitan council — appointed policy board.
- A metropolitan council — elected governing body.

"Everyone confronted with the reality of what we're doing found the possibilities eye-opening," said Mar-

lynn Gosling, an Oakland County commissioner from Bloomfield Hills.

"Metropolitan councils can accomplish things we've talked about," said Gosling, who co-chairs the year-long SEMCOG study.

"Rena Cusma knocked everyone's socks off," said John Amberger, SEMCOG executive director. Cusma, the luncheon speaker, is executive officer of the Metropolitan Service District in Portland, Ore. "Rena Cusma got the plan through the Oregon Legislature. We've just introduced the idea here," said Amberger.

The Portland area "Metro" covers three counties. It does urban planning, transportation planning, solid waste disposal and recycling. It also operates the zoo, civic stadium, convention center and performing arts center.

Amberger said, "Local elected officials are in terrible binds. They must do what's best for their people and also look after the region."

Milton Mack, a Wayne County probate judge, issued an outright call for new regional governance powers.

"Southeast Michigan is now facing its biggest crisis — urban sprawl," said Mack. "Yet no local governmental mechanism is in place which could even remotely begin to address the problems caused by sprawl. Local home-rule powers relating to planning and zoning are irrelevant in the regional community known as southeast Michigan."

Before appointment to the bench, Mack was SEMCOG chair, a Wayne County commissioner and a City of Wayne council member.

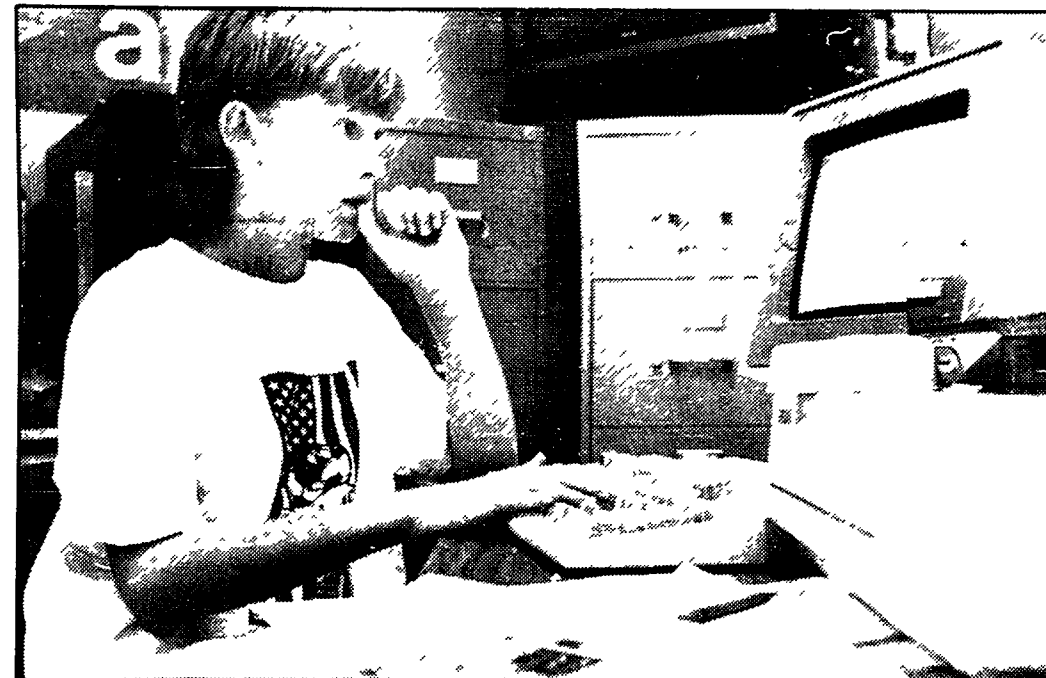
"I propose that some of the functions that local government now performs be shared with an agency with regional oversight," Mack said, adding he opposes replacing local government.

The regional agency, he said, should make decisions on land uses of regional impact: "location of major industries, airports, highway extensions, large commercial developments such as a shopping center or mega-mall, major sports facilities, large new subdivisions and the protection of wetlands."

and filled the consultant's seat at several planning commission meetings, has been tabbed by ALNM to take Wortman's spot as the city's consultant.

Bowles worked with Wortman in drafting the Master Plan, and on several ordinances including signage and woodland preservation. Though his face was much less familiar at planning commission meetings, Bowles' work was incorporated into many of the city's site plan reviews, planning ordinances and zoning ordinance revisions. Bowles also worked on a 1989 Community Questionnaire.

Wortman said his resignation from ALNM after 13 years with the firm was the result of an upward career move. "It was an opportunity for me to go with another firm in Ann Arbor, and I joined the firm as a vice-

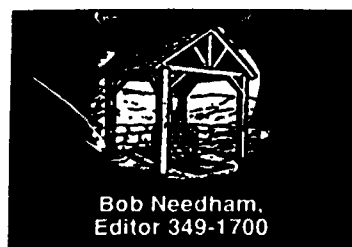

Cut in building height makes sense for city

The city planning commission is wrestling with a change to the city zoning code which would cut the allowed height for buildings in the downtown area from five stories to three. It's a sensible move which deserves adoption.

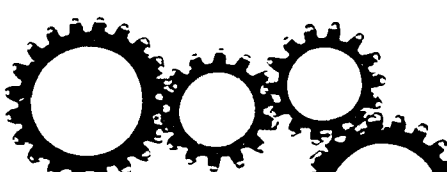
The planning commission has addressed this general topic before. In fact, it was almost exactly two years ago, during a brainstorming session on the city master plan, that Greg Presley first raised the idea of lowering the limit from five stories to three.

Presley no longer sits on the planning commission, but it's good to see that his suggestion remained in that body's draft of the Master Plan.

As currently drafted, the new limit would not even be a strict three stories; heights could increase on sloping land to allow for a situation similar to Main Centre along Center Street. Whether the exact Main Centre building would be allowable is another question; the most recent draft of the ordinance could put several downtown buildings out of compliance, including *The Northville Record's*. (!)

The commissioners discussed several differences of opinion on details arising from the three-story limit — where the height measurement must be taken, whether to allow a little "elbow room" — but none of these seem likely to threaten the ultimate passage of the amendment.

The key is getting the tighter limit in place. Five stories may not sound like too much for a downtown, but it is for Northville's. Five-story buildings on Main or Center would drastically change the

scale of the community, and change it for the worse.

Officials in other towns have received unpleasant surprises by the size of buildings their ordinances allowed. They may not have given much thought to height limits until someone showed up on the city hall doorstep with a building proposal much larger than anyone had ever expected. By that time, it's too late to change the rules.

Nobody's coming on the Northville City Hall doorstep with any five-story plans. We don't expect anyone to do so, not in the immediate future.

Someday, however, it could happen. If it does, without some lower height limits, a five-story building could be built. And that would change the character of downtown for the worse.

The action now under way at the planning commission level can head off such a mistake. We encourage a quick resolution to the debate and quick consideration of the ordinance by the city council. Once the new limit is in place the downtown will be able to rest a little easier, secure in the knowledge that it won't outgrow itself.

July 4, 1991 marks the 215th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence by delegates from the original thirteen colonies. That document, with its self-evident truths and its forceful blueprint for the new republic, in large part created the world in which we now live.

For this year, Operation Welcome Home will undoubtedly get the lion's share of the attention. The president, af-

ter all, asked that this day become a time for local communities to thank the U.S. military and welcome back its troops. It's a one-time event; thankfully, America does not get involved in a war every year.

But along with the excitement of Operation Welcome Home, let's be sure to remember it's also Independence Day. It's important not to forget the history which allowed this nation to grow into the role it now plays.

The Fourth of July organizers in Northville have done an incredible job planning our local observances. The day promises to be something like of which the town has never seen before.

Enjoy it. Have a happy Fourth of July — both parts of it.

Old record has a long reach



As boy and man, Ricky Smith has been a bad apple. He is spending six to 30 years in prison, courtesy of Oakland Circuit Judge Richard Kuhn and the Michigan Supreme Court.

Underline the word "boy." Smith is now past 40, but his youthful peccadilloes came back to haunt him.

The lawless under 17 are handled in the juvenile division of probate court. For legal reasons, newspapers don't print the results of probate court proceedings involving juveniles. And for years, the rule in Michigan was that one's juvenile record was "expunged" (erased or torn up) 10 years later, at age 27.

That's no longer true, as the Supreme Court decided recently. A kid's juvenile record can haunt him many, many years — the moral of this story.

In 1987 Smith was nailed in Pontiac for burglarizing a warehouse. Accepting his guilty plea, Judge Kuhn gave him 3 1/2 to 10 years.

Smith also pleaded guilty to being a habitual offender, fourth offense, and Kuhn gave him six to 10, using Smith's juvenile record to justify the stronger sentence.

Smith's record included: school truancy, driving a stolen vehicle while on probation, riding a bicycle under the influence of alcohol, stealing candy bars, larceny from a building, carrying a knife, violating a curfew, threatening a police officer with a knife, knocking down a woman to steal her purse and running away from reform school.

As an adult he was convicted in 1972 of attempted possession of heroin and placed on two years probation.

When the 1987 conviction occurred, Smith was serving still another sentence.

Smith appealed the six-to-10 Kuhn allotted him, saying the judge shouldn't have consulted his expunged juvenile record. A Court of Appeals panel agreed with Smith, but the Supreme Court upheld Kuhn.

Charles Levin, reputedly the most liberal justice, wrote the opinion. The court rule's purpose, said Levin, "is to prevent a juvenile record from becoming an obstacle to educational, social, or employment opportunities."

"When, however, a juvenile offender appears in court again as an adult, his juvenile offense record may be considered in imposing sentence. The law contemplates a differentiation in sentencing between first-time offenders and recidivists, juvenile or adult."

The caste system bothers me. A potential employer, college or father-in-law can't check up on a guy's juvenile record, but a court can.

The court's three toughest-on-crime justices — Patricia Boyle, Dorothy Riley and Robert Griffin — concurred but advocated a stiffer attitude toward keeping juvenile records.

They wanted the high court to "create a distinction that allows the probate court to expunge its 'files' and requires it to retain some 'record' of juvenile entries such as it would typically have for case control purposes." In other words, the bulky stuff may be dumped, but an outline record should be maintained.

Michigan law, conservative justices and the liberals all say we should save and use juvenile records to sentence adults. There will be no "kinder, gentler nation" for punks.

What the public doesn't usually see

The late afternoon sun shone brightly, its reflection glinting off a myriad of cars in the busy Meijer parking lot.

The store's sprawling lot was a beehive of activity, and the usual congestion was heightened by a broken circle of fire trucks, ambulances, and police cars.

A troop of rescue workers milled around a tiny, middle-age woman seated on a patch of grass just off one of the drives that leads to Meijer's northern exit.

The woman wore a confused look unpunctuated by pain.

Little wonder. A few minutes earlier, as she had tried to drive along the same exit, her car stalled, and she climbed from the vehicle, apparently with repair work in mind.

But the woman had neglected to put the car in gear and it rolled back over her.

Fortunately, the woman's injuries were limited to scratches and abrasions. Huron Valley Ambulance staffers attended to her scrapes, and a Record reporter and a couple of Northville Township firemen stood idly by, soaking up the warm day's end sun and trading good-natured barbs.

A long work day was nearly over; it was time

to cruise on home.

A little old man with a thick German accent dashed those plans.

His approach was tentative at first, but soon evolved into a more purposeful stride. He'd clearly reached a difficult but necessary decision.

"I have lost my mother and father," the elderly man said. "I do not know where they are."

The reporter and firemen — including Chief Rick Rosselle, Ron Lane and Carl Meck — exchanged quick glances and then turned back to the old man, who was neatly dressed in shorts and a button-down sport shirt.

A pair of light colored socks were pulled high up his thin, pale legs, and the man trembled slightly as he explained his plight.

In no specific order, he mentioned South Lyon, his parents, and finally his wife, and paused, shaking his head.

"I feel so sorry for her," he said. We knew the feeling.

With gentle prodding, the firemen were able to extract shards of information from the old man. It seems he had felt the urge to take a drive — against his wife's strict orders — and set a course from South Lyon down Eight Mile Road.

Sometime later he became entangled in the maze of traffic in the Meijer lot, the cumulative confusion effectively beaching his brave, independent voyage.

The old man blinked a couple times and looked at the landscaped trees and grassy hills

around him. "Is this a park?" he asked in broken English.

Rosselle and Lane continued their calm questioning. Soon the man produced a wallet, and after fumbling with several plastic cards, he passed along his driver's license.

The firemen asked if the man knew his — or anyone's — telephone number. He recited seven numbers in rapid, almost automated succession.

Meck jotted down the numbers and retreated to Rosselle's car to use the chief's cellular phone.

Meck reached the old man's wife, and she galloped along an emotional plane that extended from fear and concern to anger and resignation. He had left the house without a word more than five hours earlier, and she likely had awaited such a stranger's call.

But the old man was okay — a bit rattled but ready to go home. His wife would just send someone out from South Lyon...

No need, Rosselle said. One of them would drive the old man's car and another would follow. That way the firefighters would know he'd make it back in one piece.

Rosselle shuffled duty rosters to protect against manpower shortages should tragedy strike the township while he was on the road. And then he and his crew set out, their day extended, and the old man thanking them and wondering where his parents were.

File your protest over tax sharing

Property tax reform and school financing have been issues of great debate and discussion in Lansing for more than 20 years.

Now, in little more than two weeks, state lawmakers are trying to push through what they are heralding as a major reform of the existing system — a plan known as "tax-base sharing." It is at least a substantial alteration of the present system, though we would hesitate to call it "reform."

Tax base sharing would require that out-of-formula school districts — and Northville is one — turn over 50 percent of tax revenue produced by future commercial and industrial development. That money would then be distributed to in-formula school districts on a regional basis. As presently

drafted, shared revenue from Wayne County would flow to in-formula districts in the southeastern half of the lower peninsula.

Two bills would make the change. HB 4572 would add the sharing concept to the 1992 state school aid bill, and has already received favorable votes from the House and Senate. A conference committee is scheduled to meet soon to iron out details. Representatives William Keith, D-Garden City; Donald Gilmer, R-Augusta; and James O'Neill, D-Saginaw, have been named to the committee from the House. The Senate has yet to name its conferees.

Additionally, Keith moved ahead last week with another bill, HB 4267, which would make tax-base sharing a permanent part of the

state school code.

But tax-base sharing, especially as implemented in these proposals, would do tremendous damage to Northville Schools. It is unlikely Northville Schools would see a significant impact from tax-base sharing in the first year or two, but the implications are clear that it could become expensive a few years down the road.

What that means to Northville residents is that there will be increasing pressure for property tax increases in the future just to maintain the school district's present level of programming.

All in all, it puts the responsibility for resolving the state's school funding crisis at the feet of growth communities like Northville — at a time when even the state govern-

ment does not seem willing to step up to its own responsibility.

Dear Governor/Senator/Representative:

I am strongly opposed to the tax base sharing proposals now pending before the Michigan Legislature: HB 4572, amended in the Senate to include the provision as a part of the 1992 State School Aid bill; and HB 4267, which would permanently add tax base sharing language to the state school code.

As written, these bills call for the distribution of 50 percent of school property tax revenue generated by future industrial and commercial development in out-of-formula districts to in-formula districts on a regional basis.

I object to the passage of these bills for the following reasons: (Check all that apply)

☐ Tax base sharing, as implemented in these proposals, would place an unfairly heavy burden on a few developing communities — including Northville.

☐ The state government, which itself has done little to restore its badly diminished support of K-12 education, is attempting to shift the burden of repairing Michigan's school financing system to a handful of local school districts.

☐ There has been no time for public input, discussion or debate on these proposals, which amount to a significant restructuring of the school financing and taxation system. I object to the Legislature's attempt to sneak such a major change by voters and taxpayers.

☐ There has been no analysis by any state agency to measure the true impact that tax base sharing would have on local school districts. I consider this an irresponsible way to make law.

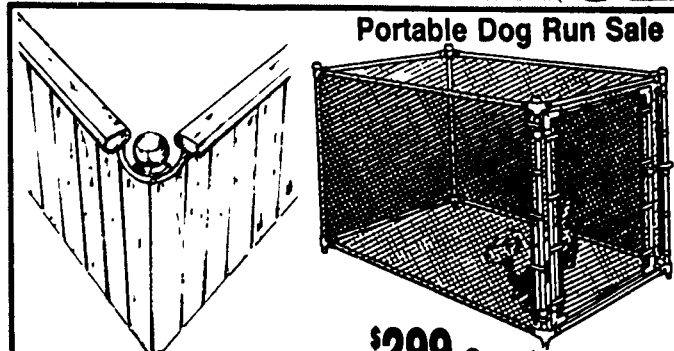
☐ The addition of the tax base sharing language to the 1992 School Aid bill by amendment in the Senate violates the Michigan Constitution (Article IV, Section 24), which states: "No bill shall be altered or amended on its passage through either house so as to change its original purpose..."

I would strongly urge the governor/legislators to veto/vote against tax base sharing as presently proposed, and to bring the issue back before the Legislature only in such a manner that would allow for public comment and input.

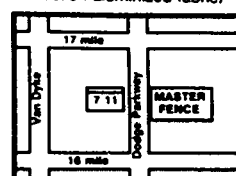

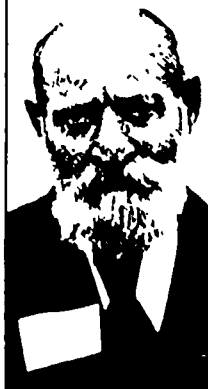

That candidate's name did not appear in *The Northville Record's* election summary, nor in the report filed by the NSB with Wayne County. It was only after I contacted the school administration with my concern, and my insistence on knowing where my vote was, that they discovered their error.

I took their word for it when they told me that the name appeared in the precinct ledger but was omitted from the master record. I also took their word that the changed results will be refiled with Wayne County. However, this highlights concerns about the way in which the NSB conducts its elections and raises some questions.

If it is so easy for one of only seven write-in candidates to be lost by the NSB between the precinct and election headquarters with only a 14-percent voter turnout, how many of the yes or no votes on the millage issue were also lost? With no way of knowing which vote was your own in the claimed 2-to-1 margin of victory, and with the schools doing their own counting, how can we be sure that the reported results are true? It has happened in cities like Chicago. Northville is not immune.

And what about the voter who chooses not to vote for any candidate on a specific ballot? Do you keep the blank ballot (thereby letting the precinct worker know that you did not vote)? Or do you count on the integrity of the system and turn in a blank ballot, hoping that it does not get marked during counting?

And finally, why not align the precincts for school elections with those in the City and Township? We were threatened with no school openings this September if the millage failed because there is a primary election scheduled for August, and there has to be at least 30 days between elections. Couldn't we have piggybacked the primary election with a school election? Voter turnout would probably also improve when you consider that people in areas such as King's Mill could walk to the polling place, rather than travel several miles to vote. But then, maybe that's why the NSB polls are where they are.

Sewer system differences pose questions

To the editor:

The sanitary sewer system (segment 1A) which is being built in Northville Township by the Western Townships Utilities Authority (WTUA) will serve all of the unsewered land in Northville Township which lies between Five Mile Road and Eight Mile Road, and west of Northville Road. Although the sewer is being built by and will be owned by WTUA, it will be paid for by the member communities of WTUA which it serves.

At the Board of Trustees meetings on August 9, 1990, Supervisor Georgina Goss stated that the Northville Township share of this system would not be assessed to the benefiting land (as was the case with the Haggerty Road Sanitary Sewer) but would be paid from the monies received from user (capital connection) fees. The Supervisor also stated that in the event user fees were not available, or did not provide the needed funds, payment would be made from Water and Sewer funds which are collected from the present customers of the Northville Township sewer system. This means, of course, that water and sewer bills will dramatically increase.

The Haggerty Road Sanitary Sewer System is roughly comparable to the WTUA system in length and pipe size. The land area served by the WTUA sewer is many times the size of the Haggerty Road Sewer System service area. The Board of Trustees assessed 100 percent of the cost of the recently constructed Haggerty Road Sanitary Sewer System (including the cost of the

portion which serves approximately 100 acres of land in Plymouth Township) to the benefiting land in Northville Township which is listed in the assessment roll as 743.33 acres. Typical assessments in the Haggerty Road System are: Gary & Alice Bohr, parcel 13C1, 1.47 acres, \$4,329.

Roy Mattison, parcel 13A6, A1, 2.3 acres, \$17,490.

Leonard Brooks, parcel O1, D1, etc., 38 acres, \$274,370.

Temple Baptist Church, 30.8 acres, \$90,511.

Ward Presbyterian Church, 12D, etc., 136.3 acres, \$457,352.

Haggerty Hills Ltd., 13B, 99.1 acres, \$607,110.

Typical assessments for benefiting land in the WTUA system are: Richard E. Allen, 04G17, 1.4 acres, \$0.

Robert H. Heintz, 10F2A, 2.88 acres, \$0.

D&T Construction, et. al. (Shores of Northville), 08H1B6, etc., 350 acres, \$0.

Huntington Falls (R.A. DeMattia Co.), County land, 930, \$0.

BFI Waste Systems, 18D1 and E, 230 acres, \$0.

Crestwood Manor (Biltmore Homes), 09P1, etc., 130 acres, \$0.

Hickory Creek and Ted Jacobson, 08 (?), 94 homes, \$0.

The WTUA sanitary sewer is to be constructed across a portion of the land which is to be developed as "Shores of Northville." This is the outlet for sanitary sewage from the "Shores" development. Using the assessment levied against the Haggerty Hills Ltd. development in the Haggerty Road Sanitary Sewer District as a guide, it appears that the saving to the Northville shores project would be on the order of \$2,000,000. Saving to other land owners in the western part of the Township would be equally impressive.

Several questions should be put to the individual members of the Northville Township Board of Trustees. 1) Who devised the method of paying Northville Township's share of the cost of the sanitary sewer? What are the details of the formula? Why should the Haggerty Road Sanitary Sewer be specially assessed and then additionally charged a "user" or capital connection fee if the beneficiaries of the WTUA sewer are assessed nothing? 2) Since the owners and developers of large parcels of land in western Northville Township will be the beneficiaries of the Board of Trustees' largess, is there any "quid pro quo" involved? 3) Did the individual members of the Board of Trustees understand the magnitude of the financial benefit which is about to be given to the owners of the land in the area served by the WTUA Sanitary Sewer Segment 1A? 4) How much of the Hampton Inn capital connection fee (on the order of \$550,000) did the Township waive in its settlement of the lawsuit brought by Hampton Inn? 5) Have any additional actions been brought against the Town-

ship because of its \$4,500 per service water and sewer capital connection fee?

Road crossing questions school system

To the editor:

What would you think as a parent if your honor roll student was suspended from school for not crossing a street at a crosswalk? What would you think when you found out that suspension, the most severe and damaging act that can be given to your child by the school system, is the decision of a single individual? What would you think when you talked with the individual to understand the reasoning, precedent and expected effects to the child, and were instructed that blind obedience by the parent would be the best course of action? What would you think after you read the school bylaws and found out that suspension is only authorized for a deliberate disregard for school policy? (The first time a child does not use a crosswalk should never be considered as a deliberate act!)

I too would question the system. Because it was my 10-year-old child who was suspended the last two days of school to prevent him from going on a roller skating field trip.

Great origination systems, I am aware, are designed with consultation, checks, and balances. Our federal and state governments are examples of some of these systems. Large and long-term successful small businesses are other examples. And I think that most families are organized with consultation and compromise as key ingredients for success.

Organizations destined to fail are dictatorships and business organizations which try to produce results by methods of fear and totalitarian authority. This is clearly demonstrated by history.

So why do our schools have such an archaic system? Where there is conciliation instead of counsel, where the policeman is the judge and jury, where the court of appeals is a supportive boss and the rules inhibit you from further appeal (Board of Education) unless the suspension is for greater than three days. Please note, as in my son's case, policies need not exist or be adhered to for any single-day suspensions in our current system.

I believe that the parents are the customers of the educational system. Yes, I do believe that education of our children will have a significant impact on the success of

our country, but those needs will be best served by listening to the people, the parents.

I don't believe that we are well served by a system which isolates us from our children by three layers of management and an election.

We should have school policies which require counsel and require joint agreement between the parent and teacher or administrator on methods used to educate and develop our children. Maybe there should be an independent party involved to help resolve differences in opinion, too.

But something should be done. Else we may find that we are only educating some of our children for the educators and not developing all of our children into sound, balanced, confident individuals who seek knowledge for the joy of learning for the rest of their lives.

The superintendent change at this time provides us an opportunity. I hope we find a superintendent from a system which has demonstrated success measured on its entire population base and not on individual academic success at the expense of the majority. Good systems continue to seek methods of reward for good work or social leadership and not develop barriers of fear for noncompliance or lower performance on a test. Good systems train us to seek opportunity with social responsibility, not just how to stay out of trouble.

Congress keeps raising spending

5. Congress destroyed the Gramm-Rudman Deficit Reduction Act and all other effective controls on future Congressional wasteful spending.

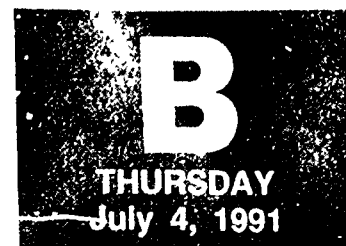

THE ROCKETS' RED GLARE

Thirty years of fireworks
just part of the long story

The fireworks display on the hill at Northville High School at dusk July 4 will certainly be bigger and better than ever this year, with world-famous Zambelli Internationale presenting the show.

The company put on the recent Freedom Festival fireworks on the Detroit River, not to mention the impressive displays in the film *Avator*. Northville Fourth of July organizers have raised enough money to cover the show — and even to increase its size a couple of times. "I want the grand finale to just be something like we've never seen around here," organizer Ginny Hathhorn said last week.

This year marks the 30th year of fireworks on the hill — with one brief interruption — attracting spectators from Northville, Novi and farther out. Up until this year, the Northville Jaycees sponsored the show.

But the 30-year tradition does not include the entire story of fireworks in Northville. What follows is a selective history of local fireworks displays, taken from the pages of *The Northville Record*. Some non-fireworks Independence Day tidbits are also included.

1903: Amateur fireworks were present in town: "Northville's record of serious holiday accidents seemed slightly out of proportion as at least four persons were very seriously injured in celebration of the glorious Fourth."

1905: Apparently with no official observances of their own, the Northville Maccabees club travels to Plymouth to march in that town's parade.

1908: "Long about midnight this third day of July A.D. 1908 . . . the Glorious Fourth will be ushered in with a salute of 46 cannon crackers, representing the 45 other states and Michigan." The salute was to be repeated every hour on the hour on the Fourth; the paper makes no mention of how well (or poorly) the populace slept that night.

Ball games — one of which resulted in a broken nose — and horse races were also planned. "They will be good ones and no one will be disappointed," the paper promises.

1937: Problems with amateur

pyrotechnics continue. "Misuse of fire crackers and other explosives will not be tolerated," warns Police Chief Loyle M. German.

1939: An estimated 8,000 people celebrate the Fourth at the fairgrounds (now Northville Downs), in spite of rain. The American Legion sponsors the festivities.

1942-43: Celebrations draw an estimated 2,500 people one year, but only 500 the next. The main attraction is a field day at Ford Field.

1944: At the corner of Main and Center streets in downtown Northville, a 12-foot by 32-foot honor roll is erected to honor local troops fighting World War II. A huge world map includes a flag at each of 32 sites where "local boys" are known to be fighting. Names of 400 local soldiers are on an accompanying plaque.

1947: "During the gala Fourth of July celebration in the village, a grass skirt was the only reported casualty." It was eaten by a goat who was part of a children's pet parade.

Baseball at Ford Field is a major attraction of the day.

1951: A pet and cycle parade start the day, which also includes races and a ball game.

1952: Fireworks! Sponsored by the Retail Merchants' Association, they cap off a full day which also includes a bike race and horsemanship exhibitions.

The display, at Ford Field, sends Fire Chief William McGee to the hospital with minor injuries. His biggest worry is the "razzing" he expects from the rest of the department upon his release.

1953: The Merchants' Association again sponsors fireworks.

1954: "For the first time in years, there will be no Fourth of July program in Northville," the paper reports. The reasoning was that with the holiday on a Monday, too many people would be going out of town.

1955: Again, no celebration in town. An editorial laments the fact that times apparently have changed: In the "old days," the Fourth was a time to come home; now it has become a vacation.

1957: The most ambitious local Fourth of July to date features a stock-car race, the "Northville 100," on the dirt track at Northville Downs. Fireworks are part of the program.

Schubring became active on solid-waste committee

"Notices went around in Novi," said Nancy Schubring, "that a citizens committee was being put together to gather information for the city on a citywide solid waste and recycling collection program."

"I answered it," she said, and soon after that she received a letter from the Director of Public Services, saying, "You have been selected by the Council as one of four single-family representatives to serve on the Citizens Committee."

Four others were also chosen to serve — one each for condominiums, apartments, mobile home parks, and commercial.

The committee met for the first time on March 11, and Nancy Schubring was elected chair.

Novi has no citywide trash collection, but it does have a recycling center at the Civic Center site which is available to all who want it.

"The city," Schubring said, "is requesting to get recycling mandatory

and asking whether one hauler would do the whole city."

Perhaps curbside recycling is the answer. It could work like this: Every homeowner has one container with two compartments in it — one for regular trash and one for recyclables.

If that idea is feasible, would one truck come to a site to pick up trash and another truck come for recyclable material? Or should there be a truck with two sections in it to accommodate both items?

Schubring said they hope to have their program recommendations for single-family residences in the hands of the City Council within months. And soon after that their recommendations for the other categories should be ready.

Why does she involve herself like this?

"Yes, it's extra work," she answered, "but it's something I'm interested in doing."

Thirty years of fireworks peaks this year

Rain forces a one-day postponement, but everything goes off as planned on July 5. The track is reported to be "fast, smooth and rutless to the end," and attendance is estimated at 4,000.

1959: Another slow period in local observances has local people driving to Walled Lake for fireworks and dancing at the Walled Lake Casino ballroom.

1960: Eight new 50-star flags, which become official this July 4, wave downtown thanks to the Merchants Association.

1961: The birth of a tradition. Northville's Junior Chamber of Commerce sponsors a program including the "longest parade ever" in town, games at Ford Field, helicopter rides, and — finally! — fireworks at Northville High School.

All the activity has its down side, as it forces the police department to double their usual patrols: "Two pat-

rol cars, rather than one, will be on the road throughout the entire weekend."

1962: The same basic program continues. This year's parade features gubernatorial candidate George Romney, as well as U.S. Reps. William Broomfield and Martha Griffiths.

1963: Skydivers add a new twist to the day. At 1 p.m. church bells ring for four minutes in a nationwide observance called "Let Freedom Ring."

1964-65: Fireworks at the hill continue, but no parade, with no explanation of the loss. The second parade-less year spurs an editorial encouraging its return.

1966-67: The parade returns, along with the chicken barbecue. Fireworks continue strong.

1968: The fireworks display brings some scary moments when two shells burst on the ground near spectators and one crashes onto the Eight Mile Road overpass. No one is injured.

1969: Rain forces postponement of the fireworks to July 6, but they do eventually go off.

1970-74: Fireworks, fireworks, and more fireworks, becoming firmly entrenched as a community tradition.

1975: The Jaycees apologize for a "less than satisfactory" display from a previously unknown company. "The grand finale fizzled," the paper reports.

1976-86: With a better fireworks company in place, the shows get back on track. Each succeeding year seems to boast the best-ever display and the biggest-ever crowd.

1983: Local cable television coverage of Northville's Fourth of July begins.

1987: Rising costs to insure the display threatens to put an end to Northville's fireworks. Eventually the city and township governments pledge the necessary funds.

1988: "There will be no official

Northville fireworks display this Fourth of July, thanks to the recent dry weather and cancellation of other nearby displays."

This is the only break in the 30-year string, with a terrible drought to blame. An extraordinarily dry summer turns the hill and all of Michigan into a tinderbox, forcing fireworks cancellations all over. Almost as big a worry as the fire danger is the crowd-control problems expected if Northville becomes the only local town not to cancel.

1989: The tradition returns.

1990: The display ends early. Shifting winds cause some fireworks debris to land in the crowd. At least two people seek treatment for minor injuries.

1991: Absent the usual Jaycees organization, the Michigan Military Family Support Group, West Side Chapter, steps into the breach and promises the best display ever. Early arrival is recommended.

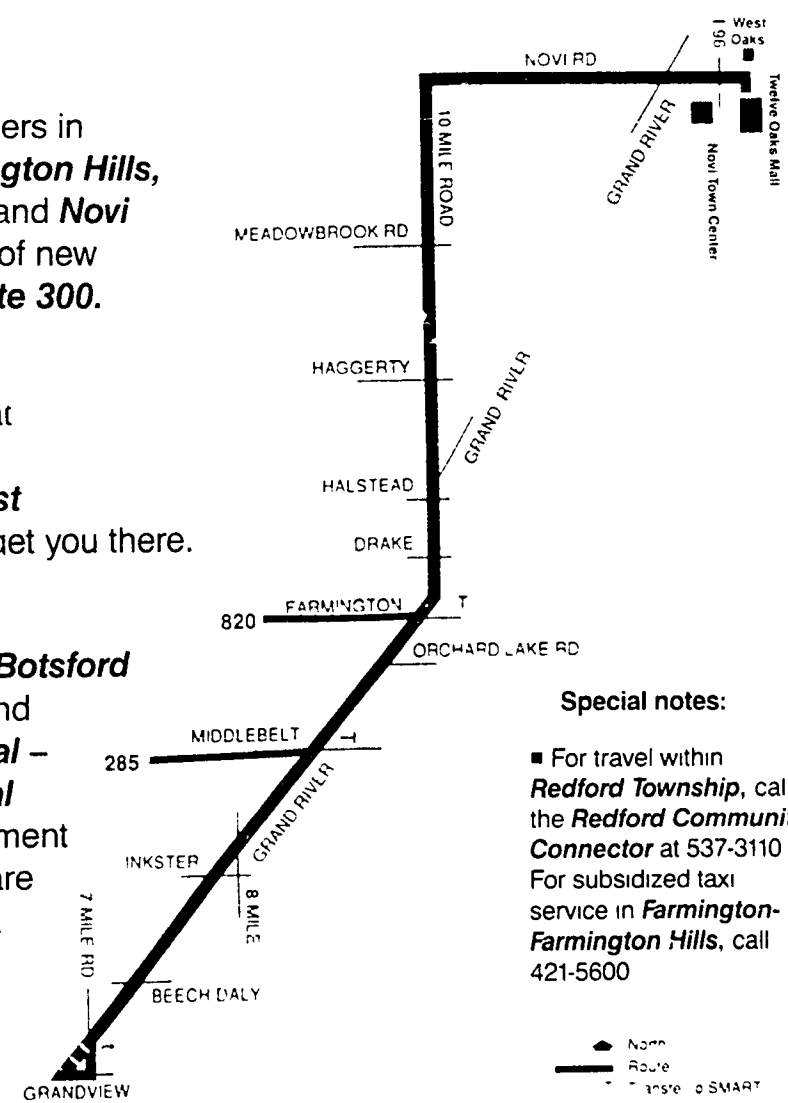

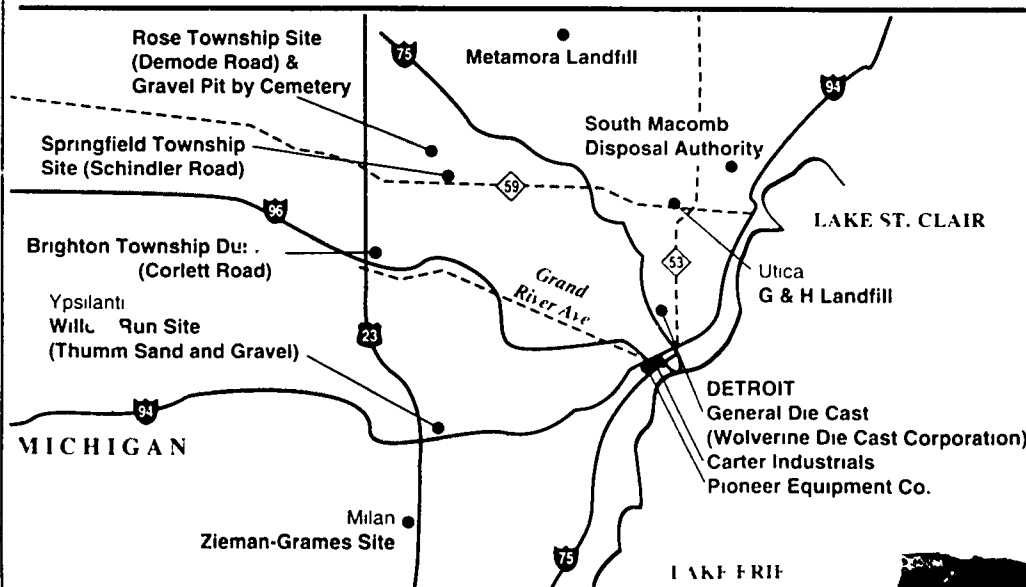

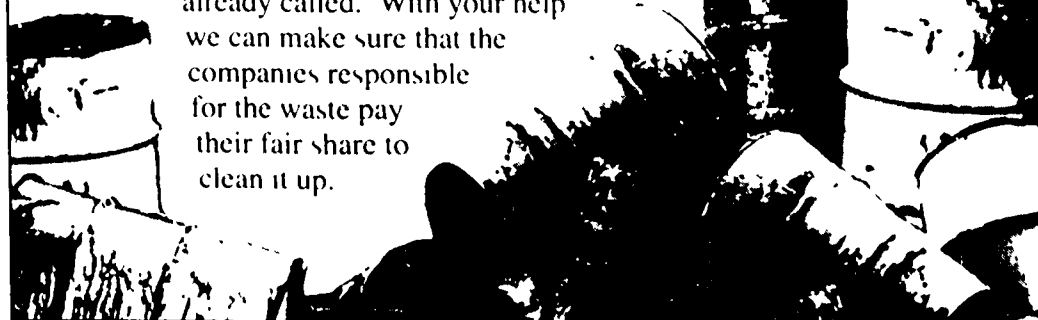

Tanner's work displayed at DIA

A century has passed since Henry Ossawa Tanner, a young black artist from Philadelphia, arrived in Paris to pursue his studies in art in 1881.

Recently, Tanner's work arrived in Michigan where an exhibit was opened for a private viewing to local art teachers with a speech by Novi school board trustee and Ford Motor Company contributions program manager Raymond Byers.

Byers speaks highly of Tanner's work and now that it's open to the public at the Detroit Institute of Art, anyone may see the display.

The exhibit, the first major showing of Tanner's work in this country in over two decades, will be on display until August 4 at the Detroit Institute of Art. The show is sponsored by Ford Motor Co. and the Philadelphia Museum of Art and will travel to Atlanta and San Francisco in the fall.

One of the best-known artists of his time, Tanner was made a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor by the French government in 1923.

A catalog made possible by Ford Motor Company provides information about Tanner's accomplishments that led to his recognition by the French government.

Eight divisions within Ford have worked together to support the exhibit. Besides the catalogue, their efforts have produced "Henry Ossawa Tanner — A Booklet for Children" and a Tanner teacher's kit.

The booklet is designed to inspire

creativity and to give young students a sense of life in Tanner's period.

Ford and the DIA are working with the Michigan Department of Education to distribute the teacher's kit. The kit is complete with color slides and background information on the exhibition to facilitate classroom

study.

Ford also has prepared a passenger van with Tanner exhibition signs on its side panels. The van can be used to transport school groups, senior citizens and other visitors to the exhibition and the accompanying performances of the Free Association

Theatre's "Appearing Light." The performance is based on Tanner's life.

The exhibition is at the DIA, but during its stay in Detroit special programs will be held at the Children's Museum, Your Heritage House, the Center for Creative Studies and the Museum of African American History.

Tom Kern came through the door in a tie patterned with red cherries. Sue Olson followed in a dress red with cherries. Then there was Sue Judson, wearing a cherry-covered blouse over a cherry-covered skirt.

"They must all shop at the same place," somebody said.

If you saw this sartorial splendor flitting around the metro Detroit area recently, you can blame it all on Sue Judson. Nobody told her when she graduated from high school that she would spend her adult days doing this.

Sue custom designs and sews clothes sold in Detroit, Chicago and West Michigan. She is also a volunteer for the National Cherry Festival, which launches its annual craziness Saturday, July 6, and ends with the world's only Milk Carton Regatta on Saturday, July 13.

Sue Judson grew up in Southfield but spent her summers with her parents and grandparents at Torch Lake, so she was already part of the northern Michigan scenery when her husband Charles accepted a job in the Traverse City area.

Sue has childhood memories of cherries, but even her creative mind could not have imagined the forms that cherries take in west Michigan these days.

At the "Taste of Cherries" noon to 4 p.m. this Saturday (July 6), the menu will include cherry mustard, cherry jam, cherry barbecue sauce, cherry pepper jelly and cherry salad dressings, just to name a few.

Cherries are serious business in the Midwest. Ask the folks at the Cherry Marketing Institute (CMI) in Okemos, who represent more than 1500 cherry growers in Michigan, Wisconsin and Utah.

Utah? Ask them what they do, and Jane Baker will tell you that CMI works with researchers and professors to create "new applications" for cherries to meet the changing demands of consumers and industry.

They are actively promoting sales in markets as far away as Japan and Taiwan, but anybody who attends the National Cherry Festival knows how far they will go to put cherries on the table: cherry cordials, cherry fudge, cherry butter, cherry pasta.

Serious business will take you through cherry orchards and industry products, but the festival is definitely aimed at those who like to have fun.

If you thought midwesterners only went crazy in the winter-time, you have never attended a Traverse City Bed Race, held this year on Tuesday, July 9, or eaten from one of the world's largest cherry pies. Wear your oldest T-shirt; cherry stains do not come out easily.

Beach Volleyball, the city's biggest beach party, starts at 9 a.m. July 6. The National Cherry Festival Bike Tour starts at 9 a.m. July 7. You can go fly a kite either day at Grand Traverse Resort.

Adult Fun Night begins at 6 p.m. July 8 with the pit-spitting contest. The big event for adults, however, is the Power Lounging, described as being "idle with vigor." You know the fruits have given way to the nuts when you read that "competition will include both individual and teams. Corporate teams are encouraged to register early for this hilarious event."

Everybody is cherished out by the final Saturday night, when the Milk Carton Regatta takes place on the beach in downtown Traverse City. Sailors in "creative" costumes sail wonderfully ridiculous boats made of milk cartons; they come around the point and usually sink slowly beneath the water to the cheers of the crowd.

Celebrating the Fourth — Danish style

Scandinavian country goes 'red, white and blue' on July Fourth

Raise the flag, sing the anthem, light the fireworks.

Hurray for the red, white and blue, independence and freedom. It's the Fourth of July—in Denmark!

For 79 years, except during two World Wars, this small Scandinavian country of five million has celebrated our national birthday at Rebild, the country's only national park, and in Aalborg, a lively city 15 miles from the park.

At Rebild, flags from the two nations are everywhere. Some Danes wear the Stars and Stripes like a cloak, draping it elegantly down their backs. Others blanket themselves in the red-white-and-blue.

Many sport hats decorated with American and Danish flags. State flags from across the U.S. line the walk leading down to the park's natural amphitheater.

Applause surges to the highest hilltop when the Danish ambassador to the U.S. and the American ambassador to Denmark deliver eloquent greetings from the Queen of Denmark and the President of the United States.

A U.S. Air Force band marches in dress whites, pom-pom girls lead a California high school band, Danes sing "Home on the Range." The square dancers in their western dress come from Aalborg, not Texas.

Visiting Americans look on amazed. This isn't their nation's capital or "our town." This is Denmark—land of Hans Christian Andersen, of Hamlet's castle, of a flag affection-

ately called "Dannebrog." So why all the hoopla over the Yankees' Fourth—4,000 miles across the Atlantic from the White House?

The story, which reads like a fairy tale, began 13 decades ago.

From the mid-1880s through the turn-of-the-century, one out of every 10 Danes left for America, "Land of Promise." They did not leave for political reasons, but to find fresh soil, a new economy and a chance to educate their children. Most came to the upper Midwest.

When the Danish-American Society was founded in Chicago in 1912, they bought 200 acres of land near Aalborg, an old port city on the sailboat-dotted Lim Fjord 160 miles northwest of Copenhagen. This was not just any land but Rebild. Centuries ago, wandering Visigoths revered this tranquil area of heather-laden hills and woods. By 1912, most of the heather had been sacrificed to the plow.

The society replanted the heather and honored the country of their birth by donating the treasured land to the Danish government, then under the rule of King Christian X. To honor the nation which had welcomed 500,000 Danish immigrants, they made one important stipulation—America's Fourth of July must be celebrated in Rebild every year.

King Christian X agreed. He opened the area as a national park that would stand as a lasting symbol of Danish-American friendship. "The Star-Spangled Banner" is sung only on the Fourth in Rebild, but visitors are reminded of this kinship all

through the year. A large Lincoln log cabin, constructed in 1934 as a memorial museum, symbolizes homes built by immigrants in the mid-1880s. Each of America's then 48 states contributed a log.

Rebild's annual gala has featured Americans Walter Cronkite, Earl Warren, Walt Disney, Hubert Humphrey, Raymond Burr, Richard Nixon, Jean Hersholt, Danny Kaye, Ronald Reagan and Dionne Warwick. One of this year's main speakers is Garrison Kellor.

As Old Glory is raised to fly beside the red and white Dannebrog, Danes stand and cheer their approval. Visitors from the U.S. beam like Olympic gold medal winners.

Munching foot-long hotdogs and licking ice cream cones wrapped in red, white and blue, the audience eagerly follows the festivities. When an afternoon shower saucily intrudes, the Danes are prepared. As square dancers do-si-do, their fuchsia skirts twirling, 30,000 umbrellas magically appear. Steep green slopes, tiered with rippling banners, bloom with shimmering awnings of red, yellow, blue, purple and orange.

Aalborg is on the same parallel as Juneau, Alaska, land of the midnight sun, so Fourth of July fireworks don't start until the sun goes down about midnight.

That leaves visitors time to explore this walkable city of 155,000 people who greet every stranger with a merry "God dag" (good day). This commercial community of half-timbered houses, 300 restaurants, acclaimed museums and amusement parks is the cultural center of northern Jut-

land and Denmark's fourth-largest city.

Some 12-hundred years ago it was a key Viking stronghold. The Norsemen's largest burial ground in all of Scandinavia is here—682 tombs beneath a broad greensward are marked with large rocks, many set in the shape of a ship.

Though Danes are fiercely proud of their fighting Viking heritage, they have, over the centuries, mellowed like good wine. Norwegians call them "sot" (sweet), just because they're so darn nice. They greet friends—even day-old friends—with affectionate hugs and smoother rosy-cheeked children with kisses.

Danes love bicycles and pedestrian shopping streets, both abundant in the old section of town. The best-loved and liveliest street, belying its saintly name, is Jomfru Ane Gade—"Virgin Ann" in English. Lined with discos, restaurants, jazz spots and pubs, Jomfru Ane behaves as if the sun never sets. And in summer, that's almost true.

Fourth of July celebrations start when a morning parade struts through old town. Marching bands blare out Sousa favorites as fervently as any VFW brass band.

Meanwhile, at the Duus Wine Cellar in the renaissance-era Jens Bang's House, revelers gather to "skol" each other with beer and aquavit. Visitors beware: Traditional aquavit is potatoes distilled to a fiery essence that could launch rockets to Mars. Norsemen down their venerated drink in one heroic swallow.

Scandinavians also love smorgasbords, those bountiful buffets of bread, salads, fish, meats, vegetables, fruits and desserts displayed with artistry befitting a Parisian chef.

For an elegant Fourth-of-July smorgasbord and after-dinner dance, attend the lavish Danish-American party held in the city's conference center, Aalborg Hall. Tables the length of a Viking ship gleam with the harvest of land and sea as white-gloved waiters pop champagne.

Across the street from Aalborg Hall, hundreds of lanterns light Kilde Park, where popcorn and ice cream, hotdogs and Danish beer are dished up to the beat of disco, big-band and country-western dancing. Suddenly, all the world's a stage.

With the sun finally retired, the night sky flames with a fresh incandescent light of spinning pinwheels, bursting rockets and shooting fountains. One firework follows another like barraging sequins fired from heavenly canons. "Sis, boom, and ah!"

"Til lykke paa dagen, Amerika! Congratulations, America on your birthday."

Aalborg is easily accessible by train, bus or air, with Scandinavian Airlines (SAS) providing excellent daily service from Copenhagen. 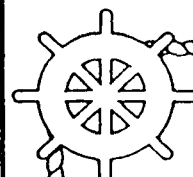

Mickey Mantle win streak ends at seven

Doubleheader split leaves squad at 9-4

A seven-game winning streak recently came to an end for the Northville Mickey Mantle squad, but the locals still managed to go 4-2 last week and increase the season mark to an impressive 9-4 record.

The most recent action was a doubleheader split against Garden City on June 29. Northville won the opener 10-6 but fell 22-7 in the nightcap.

In game one, Garden City jumped out to a 3-0 lead but Northville starter Steve Christenson settled down and eventually went the distance and notch the win.

"Steve had a rocky first but he showed great poise and mixed his pitches well," Northville Coach Chuck Apligian said.

The locals took the lead thanks to an eight-run rally in the second. Back-to-back doubles by Chuckie Apligian and Chris Sheppard keyed the offensive explosion.

The top finishers in each event and age group (except those age 7 and under) have now qualified to compete in one of several regional competitions later this summer.

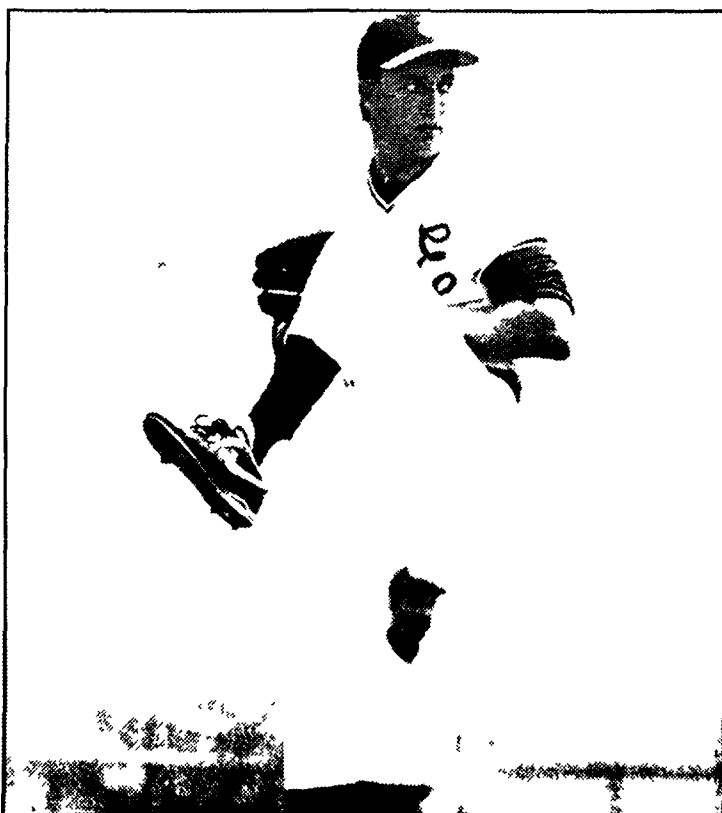

Northville hoop program developing potential stars

Developing future basketball players for Northville High School is the purpose behind the the Northville Basketball Association All-Stars and the efforts of Coach Rick Topous.

This program for middle-schoolers has the support of Northville Athletic Director Dennis Colligan and varsity basketball coach Omar Harrison. The program's current group includes, for the most part, incoming ninth-graders at Northville High School this fall.

Matt Topous is the top-notch shooter from his guard position and Crown is a center/forward who has improved tremendously and could be a future star. Doug Martin signs pro contract

Northville's Doug Martin is going to Niagara Falls, but it won't be for a slighting trip.

The 6-foot-3, 200-pound, right-handed pitcher, who played his high school baseball at Redford Catholic Central, is headed for assignment at one of the Detroit Tigers' minor league affiliates after being selected in the 44th round of the Major League's Amateur Draft.

"I talked to Greg Haeger (former Catholic Central teammate now in the Tiger chain) and he said it's a pretty nice place to play," Martin said. "I hear they get pretty good crowds."

Martin, who enjoyed an outstanding senior season at Eastern Michigan University where he was voted the Mid-American Conference's Pitcher of the Year, is just happy to get the opportunity.

"There's really not much to contemplate," said Martin, who is expected to sign with Tiger Scout Mark Monaghan. "He (Monaghan) said he would try to get me a little bit of money, but all I can expect to get is what's fair for the round."

Martin, who started playing the

game in the Northville Recreation Department's baseball program, got off to a slow start with the Hurons in 1991.

"I was 0-4, but I really had only one bad game," he said. "I didn't really change anything. Basically, I stayed being a control pitcher, throwing strikes and getting them to hit the ball."

Martin finished the season with a 10-5 record with a 2.99 earned run average (including 10 complete games) in 96 1/3 innings. His ERA in the MAC was 1.83 with a 7-1 record. It's been nearly a month since Martin's college career has ended. During the interim, he's been doing the customary running, biking and throwing every day.

"I hear they (the Tigers) are interested in me both as a starter and a reliever," Martin said. "It really doesn't matter, although I'm spoiled because I prefer to start."

Martin is EMU's all-time leader in career wins (33), innings pitched (337) and complete games (26). He was also voted to the All-Conference team for the second year in the row.

"The demand for pitchers and

plans for expansion teams in the next several seasons provide an excellent opportunity for a potential major league career," said David Martin, Doug's father. "It's just the beginning and there are no guarantees, but the chance he's dreamed for has arrived through lots of hard work and dedication."

Martin said he is pretty much the same pitcher who came out of Catholic Central, when the Shamrocks captured the state Class A championship in 1987.

"I have a little more velocity, a couple of miles per hour," he said. "I still have problems with the breaking ball, but I have a pretty consistent slider. I'm a little bigger and stronger and my endurance has been a plus."

The righthander plans to continue work toward his degree in business management during the fall at EMU. "Someday I'd like to own my own business," Martin said. "But right now I'm not thinking about that. I'm going to put all my energies into baseball."

Martin, however, will get plenty of opportunities to catch a glimpse of the famed Falls

Fitness is Teen Center's goal

Summertime. Freedom. Long days for teens to work off all that excess energy and revel in the active life. Or to sit in front of the television set and catch up on the soaps.

One of the goals of the Novi Youth/Teen Center is to help get — or keep — the younger generation physically fit. But it's never safe to generalize, cautions caseworker Karen Bartholomew.

"We have kids that will come to the center because they have a place to come to play, to use the gym. We have kids who need to be nudged into it. If there are no alternatives, they'll go into the vegetative state," she said.

"A lot of our kids are just sitting in front of the television all summer. We try to get them to move their blood around. We're in competition with 'General Hospital' and 'Days of Our Lives.'"

Still competition, indeed. But as an alternative, the center offers get-fit programs like weight training three times a week, aerobics twice a week and swimming twice a week. The gym is also open several times a week. These programs are free.

In addition, the center offers special events like bowling, the skatmobile, canoeing, horseback riding and a trip to the wave pool.

The competitive spirit is kept alive via volleyball, softball, basketball, bumper pool and ping pong tournaments.

Especially popular is the overnight camping excursion, back by popular demand this summer and extended to two nights, instead of one.

For \$10, a kid can play the video games at the center all summer. Field trips usually have a small fee to help finance the bus.

"We don't quite break even but we are usually not losing bucks on it,"

Bartholomew said.

The approximately 200 participants at the Novi Teen Center range in age from those who have graduated from fifth grade to 15- or 16-year-olds. Primarily young people too old for babysitters but too young to be into older teen stuff like cars and summer jobs, Bartholomew said.

Membership to the center, located at the Novi High School commons, is free. The program is funded by United Community Services, which is part of the United Way.

Besides sports-type programming, the center offers a career day, teen make-overs, T-shirt decorating and other fun things. On July 8 and

10, it will sponsor Wellness Days, when family physician Dr. David Schindler will offer frank answers to teen health questions.

There's proper technique to speed walking

Dear Myrna: Can you explain the technique of speed walking — if there is one? I'm new at exercise, and I've been told there is a technique to almost everything you do.

Well, you're not far off. Yes, there is a proper technique to "everything" we do in exercise. It's called "let's be smart and not get injured." Using proper technique certainly can make a difference in what you get out of exercise in general.

A racewalker's technique is actually a slightly modified style of walking fast. The modifications, mostly in the use of the hips and arms, help you walk more efficiently.

The International Athletic Federation's definition of racewalking is:

Walking is the progression by steps so taken that unbroken contact with the ground is maintained. At each step, the advancing foot of the walker must make contact with the ground before the rear foot leaves the ground.

During the period of each step when the foot is on the ground, the leg must be straightened at least for one moment and, in particular, the supporting leg must be straight in the vertical upright position.

Do you find the explanation confusing? I had to read it over twice to get it — no problem.

The main difference between running and racewalking is that in running, there are times when both feet

are elevated off the ground.

Now you can't racewalk as fast as you can run — don't even think it. World class racewalkers, however, can cover a mile in less than six minutes and the marathon in less than two hours and 45 minutes. Impressive, isn't it?

Proper technique allows the racewalker to use the entire body to maximum advantage. The stride looks swivel-hipped; this is how the walker takes the deeper steps. Your knee's driving force is important as it is fully extended at heel contact in front.

Your arms should remain bent, shortening the pendulum-like swing, allowing a quicker pace. They should act in the opposite rhythm of your

hips, helping balance the body. When walking, arms should cross your body at mid-chest and elbows are in toward the ribs.

If you are new at exercise, you might need a partner to enjoy it with. Partners give each other incentive to keep going. On the other hand, it's also a great time to think. A brisk walk can really air out the brain, as they say.

Compact country ranch is efficient

A railed and covered wrap-around porch adds charm to the country ranch style Dahlia 1, a home as compact and efficient as it is attractive.

Wide bay windows overarched by another window set high in the front wall, under the gabled arch outside, give a bright, open feel to the high vaulted living room—a lovely setting for a baby grand piano, but equally well-suited to simply entertaining good friends.

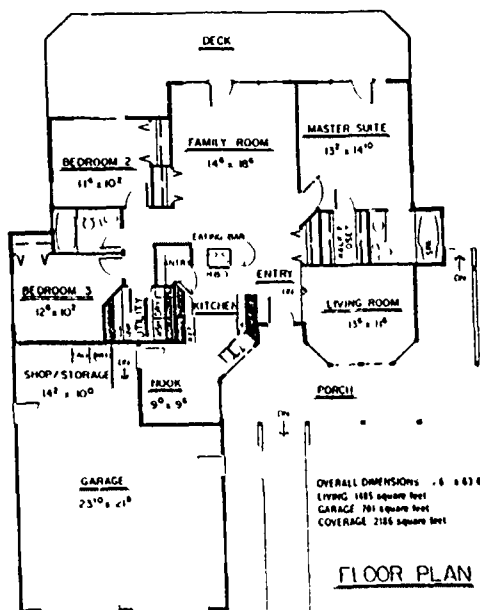
The eating bar also does double duty as a buffet. 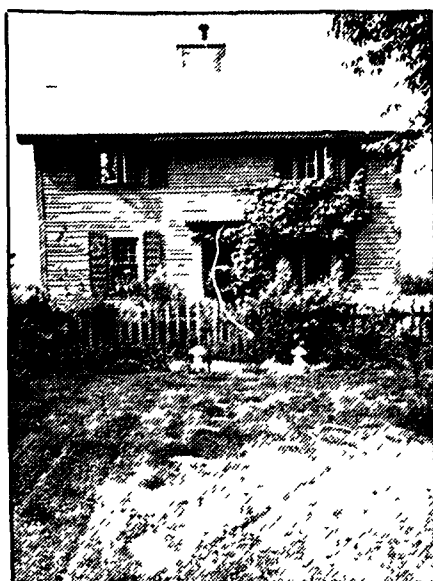
There is room for everything in the family room: a home entertainment center, desk, computer, couches and chairs, a table. Whatever suits your fancy.

A steppingstone path gently coaxes you toward the front door. As you pass through the gate of the small picket fence, the feeling is though you are being transported back in time.

Bill and Marcia Finks live on 6-1/2 acres in Tyrone Township, nestled in the rural setting of northeast Livingston County. Their saltbox house was built from plans originally used to construct a home in Connecticut during the 1750s.

Once inside the house, only the kitchen appliances and the occasional electric lamp intrude on the 18th century ambience. Throw rugs cover only carefully selected portions of the pine board floors. Filled with country primitive antiques and pieces of folk art, each room greets you with the warmth of a hug.

The basement houses a small workshop where Bill, an artist by profession, turns pieces of scrap metal into whimsical figures. Marcia spends the evening hours painting the pieces, resulting in folk art sculptures which have earned the couple national acclaim.

Stepping outside, your senses are immediately filled with the sights, sounds and aromas of the gardens. Flowering plants of seemingly innumerable variety have been artistically placed to give the appearance of a completely natural arrangement.

The soft, pastel hues look as if they dripped from the canvas of an Impressionist painting. Foliage bursts through the slats of the small picket fences that struggle to contain the gardens.

A primitive log gazebo and bent-twig furniture provide places to rest while you take in the beauty and daydream about life in an era long past.

Homeless youngsters dream about dream homes

The most detailed and poignant descriptions of personal "dream homes" are often expressed by homeless youngsters.

I recently asked Father Val Peter, executive director of Boys Town, Neb.—the famous community of homeless boys and girls from points throughout the country—to invite his young residents to candidly describe their dream home. A few weeks later, I received a pack of 28 thoughtfully and neatly prepared descriptions.

It was obvious that these youngsters had given a lot of thought to their future house—sparked, perhaps, by their own lack of a normal home life.

Here's how Christina, a Boys Town High School student, described her dream:

"I guess I've always been a coun-

try girl inside. I enjoy the scent of flowers and the sweet aroma of potpourri as it slowly permeates through a room. I would love to have a small, quaint little cottage in England with a powerful oak tree that has a living branch hanging from a strong swing. The yard has wildflowers of every color imaginable, and there's a small garden in the backyard.

"My house will be cozy. I would love a nice sized kitchen, with all the modern-day conveniences and cooking utensils a woman would ever need. I would want a breakfast nook and an enormous window with beautiful shades that accent the rising sun every morning. The kitchen would be decorated with lace and frills and you would always get the feeling of Mom's home cooking.

"The bedrooms would all be decorated with springy, soft sheets. There would be carved, wooden

toys sitting in the windowsill that would bring a smile to anyone's lips as they feel the toy's playful antics caught in neat little poses. Every bedroom would have a huge window that could be opened at the slightest nudge. There would be a bathroom connecting each room with an adjoining closet to keep supplies.

"The living room would be comfortably furnished with paisley printed furniture. There would be a fireplace to be used on cold winter days and nights. There would be little lace and country antiques all around to give the house a comfortable look. Throughout the house you would get the feeling of home and love."

Christina concluded her dream home description by saying, "I guess most people go for the rich and glamorous way of life. My dream house is probably not grand enough for some people, but it is the type of place I would love to call home."

Many of the home descriptions included a room that reflected the young person's special interests. An example is one paragraph from Rex's dream home description:

"One room in my house will be used for all my diving equipment, diving posters, dolphin sculpture collection, things from the sea like shells and stuff. The room will be painted to make it appear as if you were underwater. It will show a big coral reef with fish like grouper, sharks, eels, sponges, crabs and lobsters. When you shut off the light, the walls will glow and show the painting."

Christopher's dream home also

reflected his fondness for nature and water-oriented activities.

"From the time I was building sand castles to working in my school drafting class, I have dreamed of owning a particular house. Futuristic no. Rustic perhaps. Numerous trees and woods will surround the home of my musings. I will have space in my garage for my boat. And the house will have a port and a lake. The surrounding woods and lake will be filled with wildlife."

Christopher concluded on a philosophical note. "Imagination can lead a mind into unrealistic dreams that can crash and destroy a person's sense of hope. Yet, these dreams are not really dreams but plans. To me, life is but a constant to build as much and help as much as it will allow. When time runs out, one's buildings are left for another to enjoy and marvel at."

Fortunately, Boys Town provides a good substitute home and caring staff for youngsters who are thrust into a situation where they cannot live in a house with their families. Years ago, I worked at Boys Town as a counselor and experienced life in this unique community.

But there's no place like home—especially for a glowing youngster.

Q. This lamp is marked "Jefferson" and is on a very heavy base. It looks like a seashore scene.

A. A New York dealer offered me \$700 for it, but I think I should get more.

What do you think?

A. This reverse painted lamp was made by the Jefferson Co. in Chicago about 1920.

A dealer would probably sell this for about \$1,200; he would be willing to pay \$600 to \$700; dealers are in business to make a profit.

Q. What can you tell me about a two-handled chamber pot with some weird decoration?

It has a frog on the inner side

of the pot and a leering face in the bottom. It is also decorated with pink luster.

A. Your bawdy potty was probably made by Dixon, Austin & Co. in Sunderland, England, about 1850. These are extremely popular with collectors and frequently sell for over \$500.

Q. Please provide some information about my Royal Dux figurine of a peasant man and woman.

The mark is an acorn in a triangle. The height is about 22 inches.

A. This porcelain piece was made in a factory founded by E. Eichler in Dux, Bohemia, in 1860.

The mark you describe was used until 1900. The value would probably be in \$500 to \$600 range.

Q. The attached mark is on the bottom of an antique plate with rural scene in blue on white. It is 9 inches in diameter



and in very good condition.

Can you tell me anything about its vintage and value?

A. This mark was used by Minton & Hollings in Stoke, England, during the 1850s. The company was subsequently called just "Mintons."

Your plate would possibly sell for \$75 to \$85. **Q.** I would like to know what you can tell me about a Royal Doulton Character Jug depicting Mae West. It is numbered D-6888.

A. This Mae West jug was issued in 1983 and withdrawn in 1985. It is currently selling in the \$100 to

\$125 range.

Q. While cleaning out the attic we found an old tin sign with the picture of an Indian.

It appears to be an advertisement for None Such Mince Meat. The sign measures 28 by 20 inches.

Is this very valuable?

A. The sign you describe was issued in 1890 and depicts an Onandaga Indian chief.

In really good condition, it would probably sell for at least \$2,000.

Only worn sections of banisters may need refinishing

Q. The finish has worn off the mahogany banisters inside the house. I would like to refresh them without stripping them entirely, if that is possible.

This finish has worn smoothly down on the hand railings to bare wood, with all traces of dark stain gone. The sections below remain in fairly good condition.

Do you have any suggestions on how to restore the staircase without completely refinishing?

A. It may not be necessary to refinish the entire staircase, but to

restore any sections that have a worn finish and where the bare wood is exposed you will need to: strip away any existing finish; stain the wood to match the other staircase sections; apply a new protective coating of varnish, lacquer or shellac.

Interior refinishing will be difficult enough, as you will need to cover carpeting, the stair treads and any adjacent areas to protect them from the remover you will be using. In the case of spot finishing, you will need to mask off the other sections of the staircase.

Your best bet is to cover areas that need protection using masking tape and heavy-duty plastic

HOW TO

(strong enough to resist the removal chemicals, which will make holes in ordinary plastic sheeting).

Unfortunately, stripping wood is a very messy job. A regular paint and varnish remover will remove varnish, lacquer or shellac. Test an area with regular fingernail

polish remover saturated in a cotton ball. If the cotton sticks to the finish on touch, the existing finish will be one of those three.

If the cotton doesn't stick you are probably dealing with polyurethane which takes a special kind of remover.

Use fine- to medium-grain steel wool (400 is a good choice) saturated in paint or varnish remover to remove all traces of the old finish. Once you have stripped all of the finish down to bare wood, you will need to stain the wood to match the rest of the staircase.

First test the wood to see if a clear finish without staining will be appropriate. The look of the bare wood when wet with the refinishing product is the color it will appear with a clear varnish, shellac or lacquer finish.

If the other wood is darker, you will have to experiment with stains to match the color (try this in an inconspicuous area until you have

found the appropriate stain).

Whatever product you decide to use, be sure to follow manufacturer's directions carefully and make sure that the room is well-ventilated.

And an appeal does not become part of the permanent assessment. If you appeal once, you'll have to appeal every year thereafter until the house is reassessed.

Service appeals tax assessments

How much of a reduction he can get depends on a number of factors, but Ventura plays by the same rules as the assessors do.

"I know what they're supposed to be doing because I have their books," he said, pulling one of the huge, red assessor's manuals off a shelf in his basement office.

Assessment appeals, he said, can be based on three criteria: comparative sales, replacement cost and income (only in cases that owners can prove hardship).

Comparative sales — or the potential sale price of your home compared to sales of similar homes in your neighborhood — is the best way to document an appeal. Is your home assessed the same as homes of similar age, size, style and quality in your neighborhood? If not, it may be assessed too high.

By the same token, if your home is of lesser quality or value than the ones in your neighborhood, but the assessment is the same, an appeal may be warranted.

"The idea is that like houses have to be assessed alike," he said.

An improper figure could be the result of a home being assessed for a full basement, when in fact it has a partial basement. Quality of construction, measured on a graded scale, can also vary widely from reality.

Sometimes, an improper assessment is a simple matter of a computation error by the assessor. "They do make mistakes," Ventura says.

The work of Property Tax Service begins when Ventura comes to the home. He measures it, looks at its quality as measured by state guidelines and talks to the homeowner about the home.

Then he compares his data with that on file at the assessor's office. "I make a determination of whether they can get anything," he said. "All I request is a letter granting me the power to appeal it. And if we lose the appeal at the local level, I will appeal it to the tax tribunal."

Ventura subscribes to a real estate service that sends him regular updates of home sales in Oakland County on microfiche. It provides the documentation for the appeal process. He's also nearing completion of a computer data base that will allow him to evaluate virtually every home in the area.

Ventura thinks his service meets a big need in this area, where growth is nearly constant and homes are bought and sold frequently. And though the work he does is something any homeowner can do for himself, it's sometimes more legwork than people have time for.

"Everybody I talk to seems to think their home is assessed too high," he said.

Unfortunately, in some cases a high assessment is justified.

"Northville had a real problem recently," he said. "They went through the city and reassessed everything. Some people's property taxes doubled."

"That was justified, from what I understand, because they'd been underassessed for a long time."

There are also a number of people who just don't like to pay property taxes, whether the tax is fair or not.

"The one's I can't help are the people who say, 'My property tax is high, and I don't like it,'" he said. "You have to have documentation."

"I think everyone ought to pay their fair share in property taxes."
