Lights out for many in community; isolated property damage reported

Driving winds toppled trees and whipped electrical wires throughout Northville Sunday, causing power outages and damaging homes.

But community residents fared better than some in what utilities officials called the worst storm in modern state history.

City and township firefighters and rescue personnel handled almost 40 runs late Sunday and early Monday, ranging from downed wires and uprooted trees to battered homes.

No storm-related injuries were reported, although township rescue workers treated a woman for respiratory problems she said were instigated by fear of the storm.

Lightning and dark, rolling clouds marched across the state Sunday afternoon, finally hitting the Northville area shortly after 8 p.m.

Local attorney Phil Ogilvie and his wife, Ethel, hurried from an evening swim to their Cardene Way home just before the storm hit.

"I went out to the deck to tie chairs down," Ethel Ogilvie said. "I tied one and the other flipped right out of my hand."

Ogilvie retreated inside to help her husband down a flight of stairs when a violent gust of wind hit the house "and made just the awfulest noise."

Ethel Ogilvie ran to the garage in time to see dozens of strips of siding from the couple's home tumble into neighboring yards. A piece of siding still was lodged in a tree approximately 25 feet above ground late Monday.

"The trees were bending right over; there was tremendous wind force," she said.

Strong winds snapped limbs, trunks and uprooted trees along a

wooded incline in the Lakes of Northville subdivision. A pair of large trees — one uprooted, the other broken near its base — lay on the ground in back of Barbara Piner's Waterwheel Court residence.

Piner wondered if her back yard was touched by a tornado.

"This was a real healthy tree," she said. "It's hard to believe the wind alone could knock it down."

Flower and vegetable planters hanging from Piner's rear deck escaped undamaged from the wind blast.

The bulk of city residents regained power Sunday evening; the lights returned for many township residents Monday morning and afternoon.

Some residents were still without electrical power by press time Tuesday afternoon.

Detroit Edison spokesperson Scott Simons called the weekend storm front "the largest storm we've ever faced. We had more than 2,100 downed-line locations," he said.

Simons said most Detroit Edison customers should have their electricity restored by today, but some may not have service restored until Friday. "We're saying that 80 percent of our customers will be back on line by Wednesday," he said.

Detroit Edison's Oakland division, which includes Northville and Novi, was "by far" the hardest hit by the

storm, Simons said. Almost half the area's customers — 132,000 households and businesses — remained without power as of 6 p.m. Monday.

Throughout Detroit Edison's coverage area, more than 291,000 customers remained without power Monday evening.

Northville City police and firefighters responded to 16 reports of downed electrical lines between 8 p.m. Sunday and noon Monday. Reports came from Randolph, Fairbrook, Rayson, Rogers, East, Johnson, and Thayer streets, as well as the Northville Swim Club and Ford Field.

Twenty-two township firefighters responded to a total of 18 emergency calls between 8:30 p.m. Sunday and 8 a.m. Monday.

The storm cut power to a life-support system hooked to a young child at his parent's Park Place Apartments home. Township firefighters rigged a pair of emergency generators to the life-support system and monitored the generators until the complex's power was restored at 2 a.m.

The child was not injured during the power outage, township Fire Chief Rick Rosselle said.

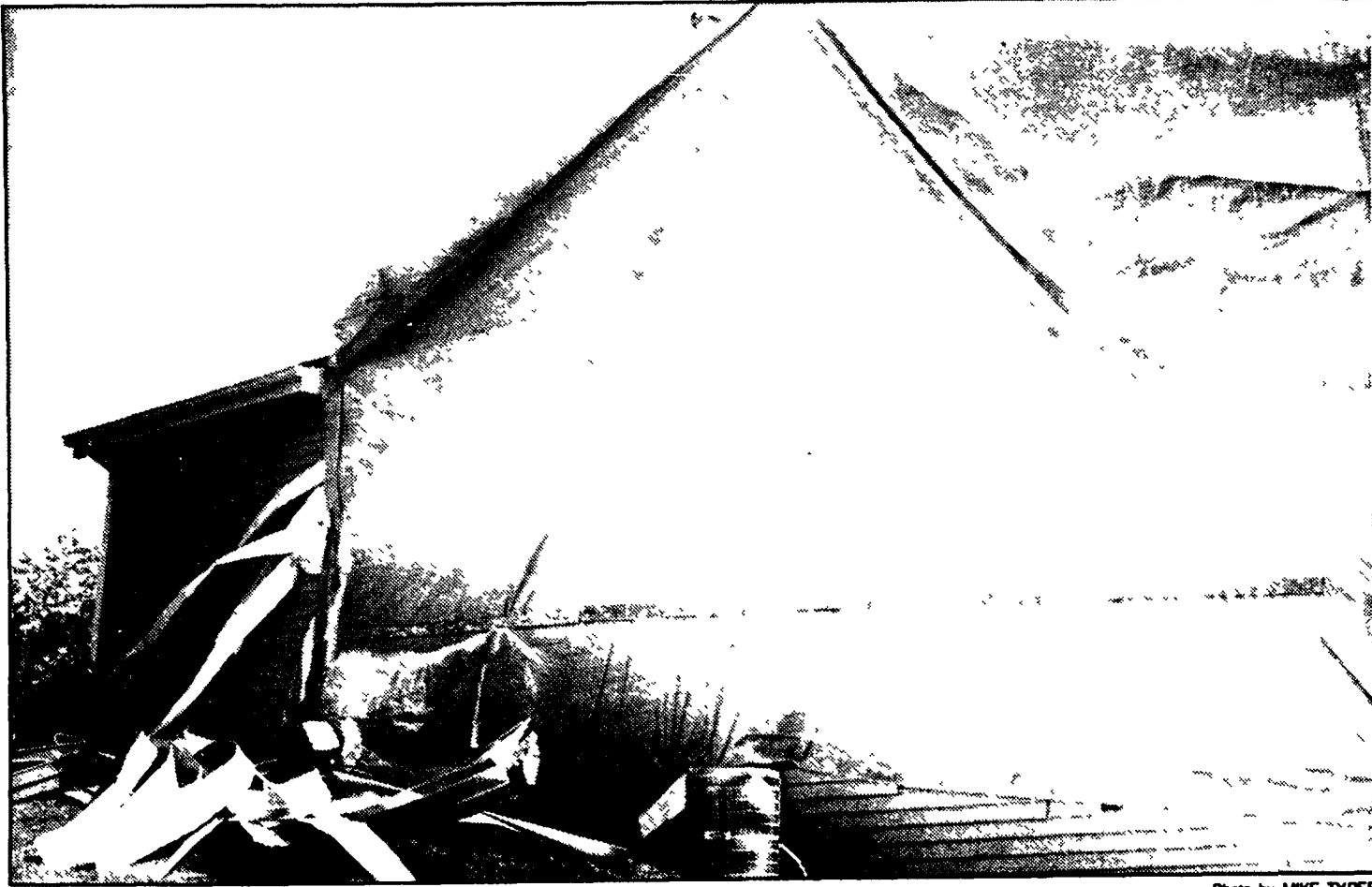
Township firefighters also climbed atop a Scenic Harbor home after

Attack victim faces aftermath

A cane helps Paul Diels compensate for the crippling effects of arthritis and deterioration of the spine.

But the 73-year-old Northville man always prided himself on his mobility and independence. He could run errands and fend for himself, despite mounting physical woes.

That was before an ill-fated trip to the Northville Plaza Mall in May, though. Today, Diels sits in his apartment alone and afraid, his left elbow shattered and swollen, his immaculate 1983 Ford Fairmont bruised and limping.

Without money and transportation, Diels, a retired Detroit Free Press truck driver, can only wonder why he had to cross paths with Terrance Jenkins.

Township police say Jenkins, 27, walked away from Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital May

9, yanked Diels from his car outside Perry Drugs in the Northville Plaza Mall, and tossed the elderly man to the asphalt pavement.

Jenkins then stole Diels' car and sped away as Diels lay bleeding, police said.

Jenkins, admitted to the hospital May 7 and characterized by security staff as "assaultive and combative," walked away from the state hospital during a security breach, NRH Director Walter Brown said.

"Standards we have for newly admitted patients were not observed," Brown said shortly after the incident. "He should not have been able to leave the grounds."

Jenkins found his way back to NRPH May 12 and today faces a scheduled preliminary hearing on strong-arm robbery charges at 35th District Court.

The court is expected to review findings of a competency hearing to determine if Jenkins is fit to face charges, township police Capt. Philip Pre-

snell said.

All of which is small consolation to Diels, who spent two weeks in Botsford General Hospital receiving treatment for elbow, hand and head injuries he suffered in his chance meeting with the state hospital walkaway.

"I wouldn't want to go back there," Diels said of the mall area, which lies just west of state hospital property. "Sure, I'm afraid to go."

Not that he could drive there anyway. Jenkins allegedly blew the engine in Diels' car before police recovered the vehicle in Highland Park on May 15.

Diels paid a Livonia automotive repair firm \$800 to replace the engine, but transmission, radiator and other problems essentially grounded the vehicle.

"Now I've got no transportation," Diels said. Diels shared his painful story from his dimly lit but tidy apartment. He remembered dropping

some mail off at a box outside Perry Drugs and noticed a "weird-looking guy with a funny look in his eye."

When Diels returned to his car and settled behind the wheel, his attacker "pulled me out of the car and threw me on the ground."

"It all happened so fast," Diels said. "It was a matter of maybe 10 seconds."

Diels still wonders why the suspect did not take the idling car "while I was out of it."

Diels said he has not been contacted by state or

hospital officials since the incident. But the state might hear from him soon.

His attorney, Allan Weiss, is researching a possible lawsuit against the state. Legal action would be based on "whether the state is immune from a suit or whether they can be held responsible in this type of circumstance," Weiss said.

Another outlet may afford Diels financial help. The state Crime Victimization Act provides some relief to those injured during a crime, and a report of the incident has been forwarded to Lansing, the township's Presnell said.

A state official would not say if Diels' case has

been received, but she did say review by the Victimization Act Board is likely to be a lengthy process.

"Right now the average (claim period) is 11 months," said Debbie Sanchez, claims secretary for the three-member board.

The act's funds cover only medical costs, Sanchez said. That means Diels is still out the cost of repairs, as well as his car.

"My main concern is not having a car available," Diels said. "I'm retired and don't have any money; I can't go out and buy another one."

winds blew shingles off a portion of the roof. The homeowner and neighbors rounded up plastic tarps and firefighters nailed the tarp across the damaged area.

A tree too large to be moved by a wrecker fell near the corner of Bloomcrest and Woodhill. Firefighters sawed the tree in half and towed it away in sections.

A downed high voltage line sparked a short-lived but furious fire in a wooded lot off Ridge Road just before midnight. No dwellings were damaged, Rosselle said.

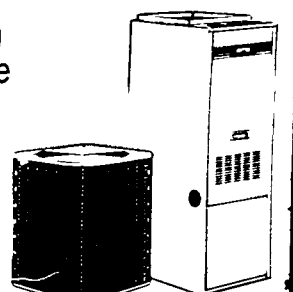

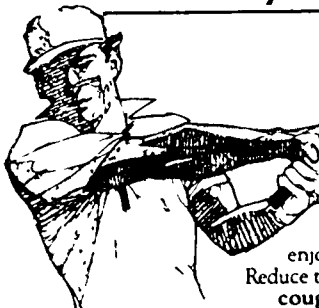

Teens bagged for sack full of illegal fireworks

City police arrested two 18-year-old men, one from Redford and the other from Detroit, for lighting off illegal fireworks July 4 on the hill at Northville High School.

One of the men was seen throwing a silver object into the air, which exploded. The men had a plastic garbage bag filled with various illegal fireworks. They were released on \$25 bond each after their arrest, and their fireworks were confiscated.

Youth faces hearing on assault and battery charge

A Northville teenager who last month reportedly waved a knife and lead pipe at another teen faces a July 17 hearing at 35th District Court. Township police charged the 17-year-old youth with assault and battery and possession of a dangerous weapon after a June 25 incident

about fighting him and using the stick. Police records indicate trouble began after the suspect allegedly spit on another 17-year-old youth's car. After the two exchanged words, the second youth told township police he grabbed a hockey stick from a garage "in self-defense."

The suspect then charged the youth and pulled a knife. A series of insults reportedly followed and the

Police investigated the incident a short time later. When an officer approached the residence, he reportedly saw the suspect holding a lead pipe in his left hand.

The suspect reportedly shouted: "Come on, let's get it on" to the second youth.

The officer then took the pipe from the suspect, and a pat-down revealed a three-and-a-half-inch, lock-blade knife.

Police said the suspect waived his Miranda rights and claimed that the second youth had called him names. After the youth brandished the hockey stick, the suspect left the scene and returned with the pipe to see if the other youth was "bluffing."

Hansen named as new head of school board

Experience was the key in Jean Hansen's election as Northville school board president at a Monday night organizational school board meeting.

Hansen, an 11-year board veteran, was unanimously voted in as the new board president. She replaces James Petrie, who left the board when his term expired June 30.

Board members and retiring Superintendent George Bell cited Hansen's experience on the board as the reason she was chosen.

Hansen was on the board when it hired Bell nine years ago. The board plans to hire a new superintendent some time this school year. Bell said his final goodbyes to school board meetings Monday at his last regular session of the board. Bell officially leaves the district July 31.

Board members said Hansen's experience will also be helpful in dealing with funding uncertainties at the state level although the president herself warned the year ahead will be difficult and uncertain financially.

Also on the board for a decade, Glenna Davis was elected to the position of school board vice president. Davis, who was not at Monday's meeting, chaired the board's person-

nel committee last year and is leading the board on its superintendent search. Davis, like Hansen, was on the school board that hired Bell.

Former board Treasurer Carol Rahimi and former board Secretary Robert McMahon traded positions.

Rahimi was elected to the position of secretary at Monday night's meeting. McMahon was elected to the position of treasurer after having been re-elected to the board on June 10.

McMahon and newcomer Richard Brown were sworn into office prior to Monday's meeting. Both were elected to serve four year terms on the board in the uncontested June election.

Brown's prior involvement in a district strategic planning committee will make the transition to board member easy, Hansen said.

"He hardly needs a welcome. He already seems like a board member to us," she said.

Joseph Dunkerley and Donald Klokenga will continue to serve as school board trustees.

The entire election of officers took about four minutes. Each candidate was given unanimous support following his or her nomination.

The board also voted to continue holding meetings on the second and fourth Monday night of every month during the next year.

District policies and bylaws were adopted, and Michigan National



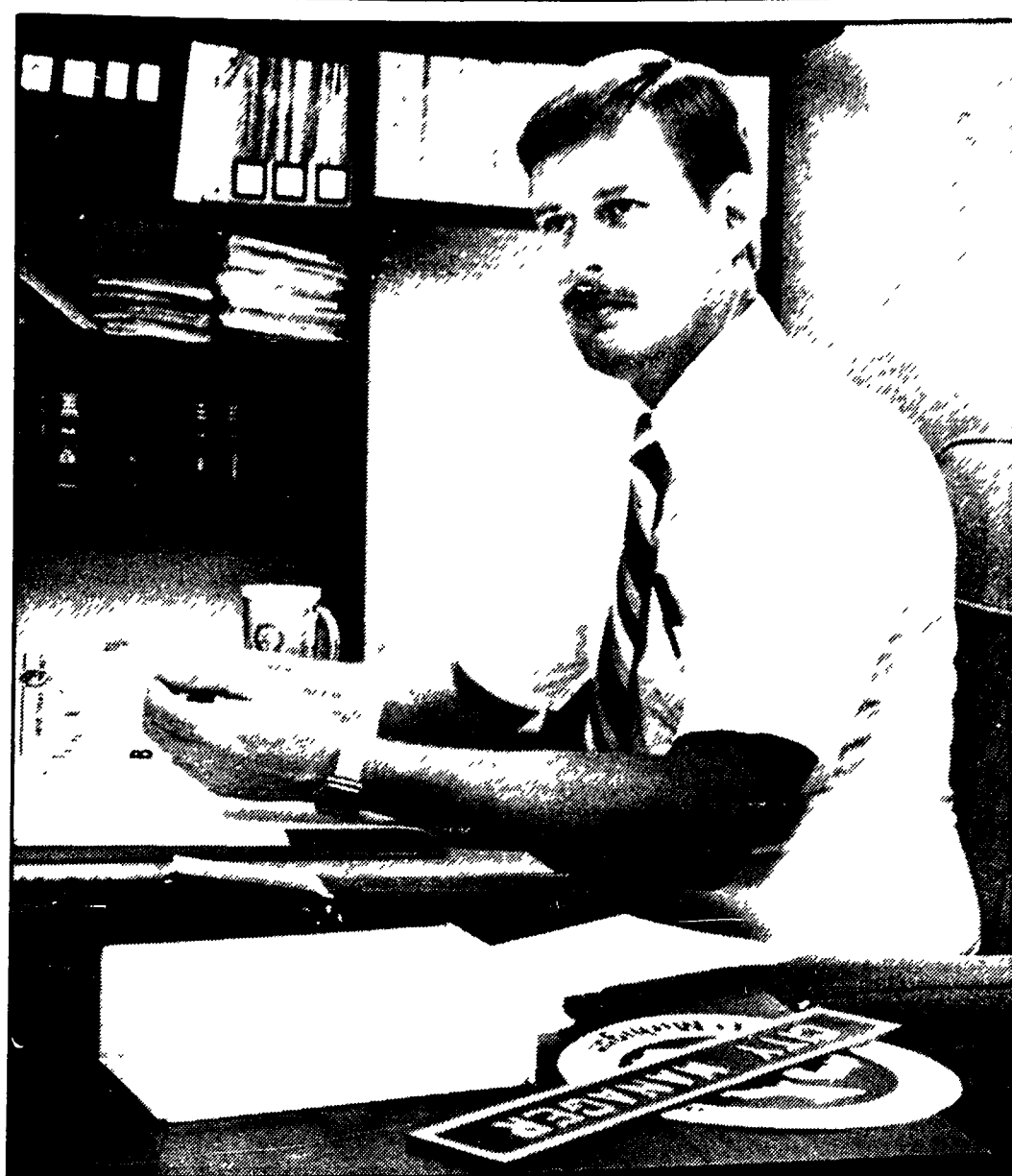

Cooke teacher works to save Thunder Bay shipwrecks and wildlife

A Northville teacher has worked to save seagulls in Alaska, monkeys in Africa and reefs around the Pacific islands of Fiji.

Now Cooke Middle School teacher Dwight Sieggreen will have an opportunity to help protect a natural area in his home state.

The 15 shipwrecks and 240 square miles of water that constitute Thunder Bay will soon be Michigan's first national marine sanctuary.

Sieggreen said using the word "marine" in the Thunder Bay site's new title could be considered something of a misnomer. The bay, found off the coast of Alpena in Lake Huron, will be the country's first marine sanctuary in fresh water.

Sieggreen, working as president of the Michigan School Teachers' Association, received a grant for \$45,000 from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation to form the sanctuary.

The federal government's National

Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration also is involved, which means the area will be protected from scavengers by the armed Coast Guard.

Sieggreen hopes that involvement on the part of the federal agency will encourage the government to protect the surrounding area from development. He said the government often forms sanctuaries in the area surrounding marine preserves.

Thunder Bay currently is patrolled by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources as one of Michigan's 10 bottomland preserves.

Designating the area as a marine sanctuary will prevent further scavenging of shipwrecks in the bay.

Brass portholes valued at \$3,000 will not be removed from the ships and novelty furniture dealers will have to look elsewhere for mahogany tables to dry and sell.

"Finally, there will be enforcement up there," Sieggreen said.

"This will extend an umbrella of protection over the area so it will be

preserved for people for time immemorial."

Thanks to the \$45,000 grant, science teachers will begin brainstorming ideas in late August on how to make the sanctuary usable as a teaching tool. Some of the ships are down so far under water as to make them nearly inaccessible to divers. In the long term, the science

teachers' group may conduct an environmental-impact study on the effects of recreation and teaching on the area.

Sieggreen, who considers himself an environmentalist, said forming the sanctuary will also help preserve some species of plant and animal life in Lake Huron. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is looking into pro-

tecting fish in Thunder Bay, he said. But the benefits to human divers are what helps an area become protected.

"The only way you can protect an area is if you allow people to use it," he said.

He hopes others will follow the example set at Thunder Bay and have more of Michigan's great shipwreck

sites preserved as sanctuaries.

Sieggreen's contribution to the Thunder Bay project is "kind of like leaving your mark for the good of humanity," he said.

But the science teacher already is thinking about his next move.

"I haven't been to Australia yet. There's got to be something down there," Sieggreen said.

Bealtown rezoning would ban new duplexes

The Northville City planning commission agreed to recommend a controversial rezoning of the Bealtown neighborhood despite protest from several audience members at a July 2 public hearing.

The commission's recommendation now goes to the city council, which will hold its own public hearing on the proposal.

Nearly 20 people turned out for the planning commission hearing in an audience divided between proponents and opponents of the rezoning. The issue was further clouded by two petitions, one in favor of the rezoning from R-2 to R-1B and one opposed to it, and the fact that several Bealtown residents had signed both petitions.

A June 19 neighborhood meeting by the Bealtown Residents Association, the group that originally pressed for the rezoning in 1989, resulted in two new petitions. Twenty-four people at that meeting signed in favor of the proposal, and 11 signed against it.

The rezoning would prohibit the conversion of single-family homes in the neighborhood to duplexes.

Planning Commissioner Mark Cryderman first raised the issue of duplicate signatures, saying, "Over one-fourth of the people whose names appear on the first (pro-rezoning) petition are on the second (anti-rezoning) petition." He asked whether people who had signed both had changed their minds or were simply confused about the rezoning.

Audience member Jan Smith, representing her mother, Virginia, responded. "She (Virginia) signed the first petition, but she didn't realize what she was saying at the time," Smith said. She said her elderly mother, who was unable to attend the hearing due to a medical problem, may have to rent out part of her house in the future to continue paying her bills.

Several audience members told the commission that they wanted to retain the choice to turn their homes into duplexes, while others said they wanted to retain the neighborhood's character and prevent further conversions.

"I'm single, with no children, and when I retire I may need to add an apartment to afford the taxes on my house," said Irene Bongiovanni.

Tom Ritter responded, "We just came from a place that

was very much like Bealtown, and absentee landlords bought a bunch of properties and it ruined the neighborhood. I don't want that to happen in Bealtown."

Ritter said he has no complaints about the way current owners of Bealtown duplexes maintain their properties.

Planning consultant Don Wortman told the audience that the rezoning, which would forbid the development of two-family homes, would not affect existing duplexes. "It would appear that the property has about five or six duplexes," he said. "Existing units would still be allowed, future conversion would be prohibited."

Commissioner David Totten tried to lay some of the concerns of would-be renters to rest by assuring them that a recent Supreme Court decision guaranteed homeowners the right to rent rooms in their houses. "You can't prevent a person from renting a room in a house, regardless of the zoning," he said.

Wortman added that the city's own ordinances do not directly forbid renting rooms in any residential area. "My feeling is right now that a simple room-renting arrangement, provided that it didn't conflict with other parts of the ordinance . . . would be allowed," he said.

Jan Smith also raised the concern that rezoning Beal-

town could be the first step toward classification of the neighborhood as part of the city's Historic District. "We already preserve our homes the best we can and we do not care to have people from the Historic District Commission telling us what we can or cannot do on our properties," she said.

But Commissioner Rolland Stapleton insisted that the two issues were unconnected. "This proposed change has absolutely nothing to do with dedicating anything in Bealtown as historic," he said.

Stapleton moved to recommend the rezoning to the city council, saying, "As a community, are we prepared to accept that someday, if the economics are right, it all becomes duplexes . . . I think a Bealtown composed even largely, if not entirely, of duplexes is not in the best interests of Bealtown, and is not in the best interests of the community as a whole."

Cryderman, adding the figures on the most recent petitions, noted that 26 residents appeared to favor rezoning while 17 appeared to oppose it. "There's a public opinion that way and I would also have to agree with Rolland's comments," he said.

The commission approved the rezoning by a 7-2 vote.

hunters. On Saturday, the streets will be closed and the stores along with non-profit groups and food vendors will be out on the road.

Three special areas will be set aside for up to 100 families to have their own garage sale on Saturday, August 3. Applications are on a first-come, first-served basis and are available at Traditions by Bartley & Boyd, Mountain Rags, and The Shipping Station, all located on Center Street. There is

a \$10 sign-up fee for the garage sale space.

During the day Saturday, there will be family-oriented activities and informational booths and fun for everyone. The finale will be an auction at 5 p.m. in the bandshell.

The Merchants' Association has designated Civic Concern, a local charity that helps Northville residents, to receive a portion of the proceeds from the Sidewalk Sale events.

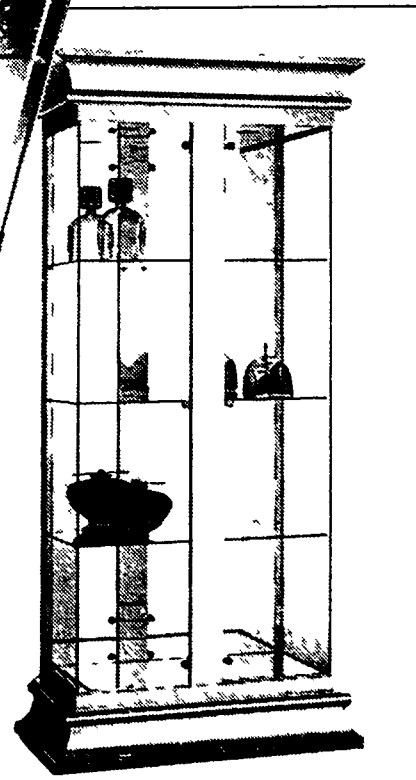
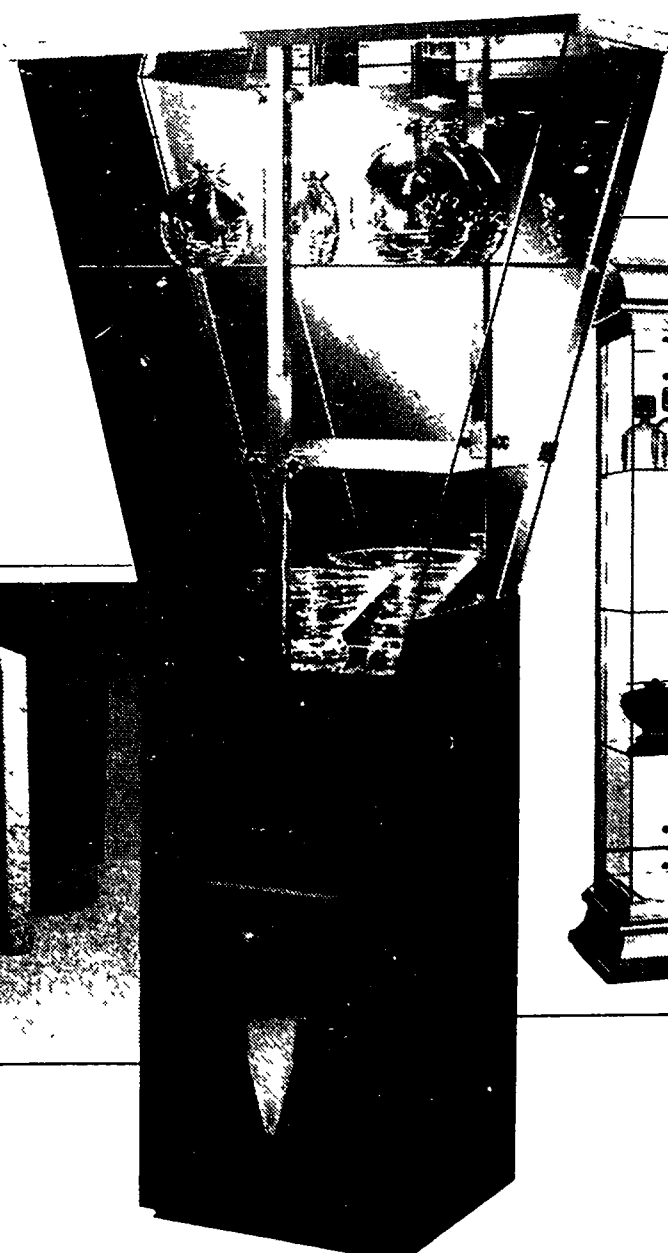
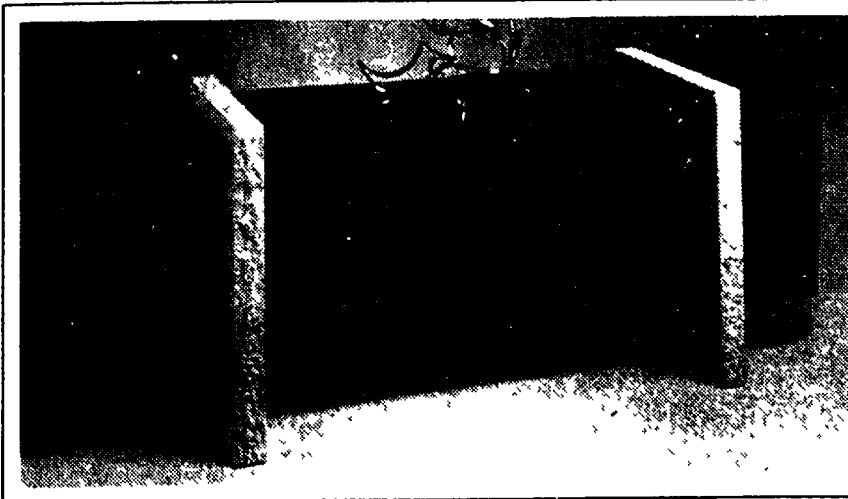

Program graded

A Northville school district program for emotionally impaired students was found to be 96 percent in compliance with state requirements.

Wayne County Regional Educational Service Agency evaluated the district's program this year as required by federal law. The average program in the county received a 91-percent compliance rating.

Northville Executive Director of Special Education Leonard Rezmierski said he is "pleased" with the score at a Monday night school board meeting.

He offered explanations for the 4 percent noncompliance, saying it was mainly due to errors by parents in filling out permission forms for the district to evaluate an emotionally impaired child.

Parents not signing or dating the form and not checking a line to grant

permission caused the majority of the problems, Rezmierski said.

Rezmierski wrote a letter to the county special education consultant explaining the individual situations that resulted in noncompliance.

Monday, before the meeting, Rezmierski said he received a "green light from the county" recognizing the issues that resulted in the district's 4-percent noncompliance.

Rezmierski said he specifically asked evaluators if any substantive problems were visible in the district's program. They told him no such problems were apparent, he said.

Parent Mary Menghini was involved in the county's monitoring procedure. She said she wished more positive input would be provided to the district following the evaluation.

Board President Jean Hansen agreed.

"It's too bad that when they monitor they can't tell you how wonderful you are," Hansen said.

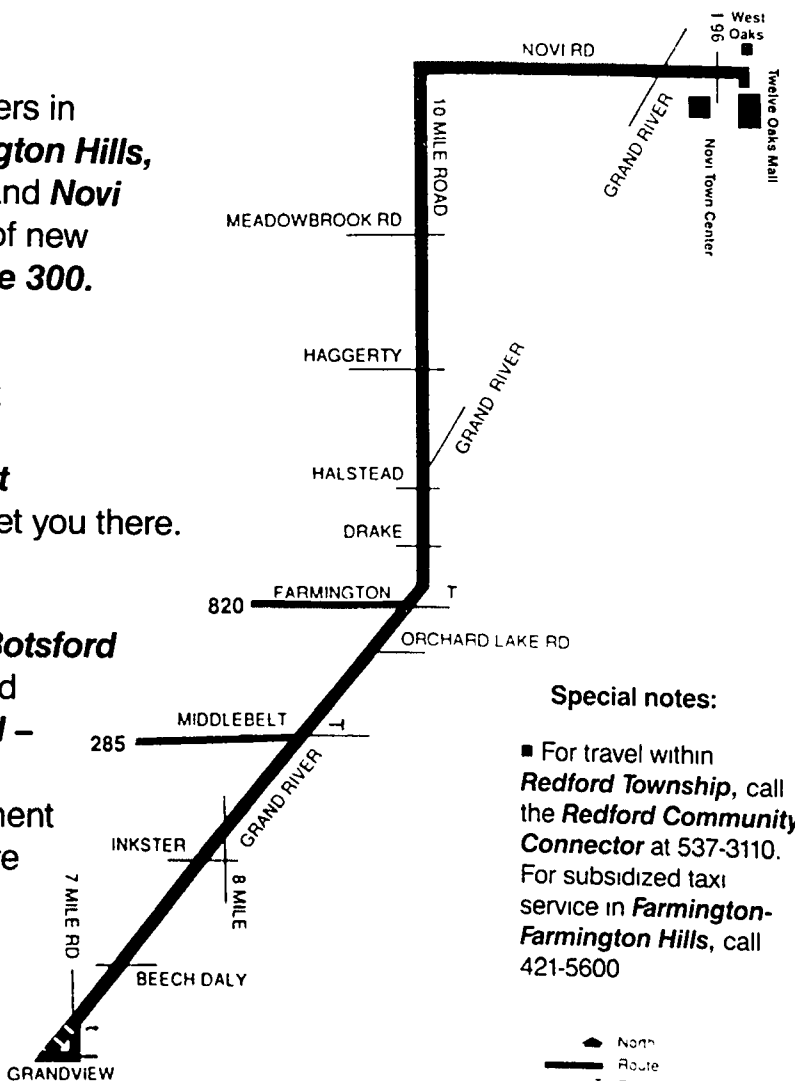

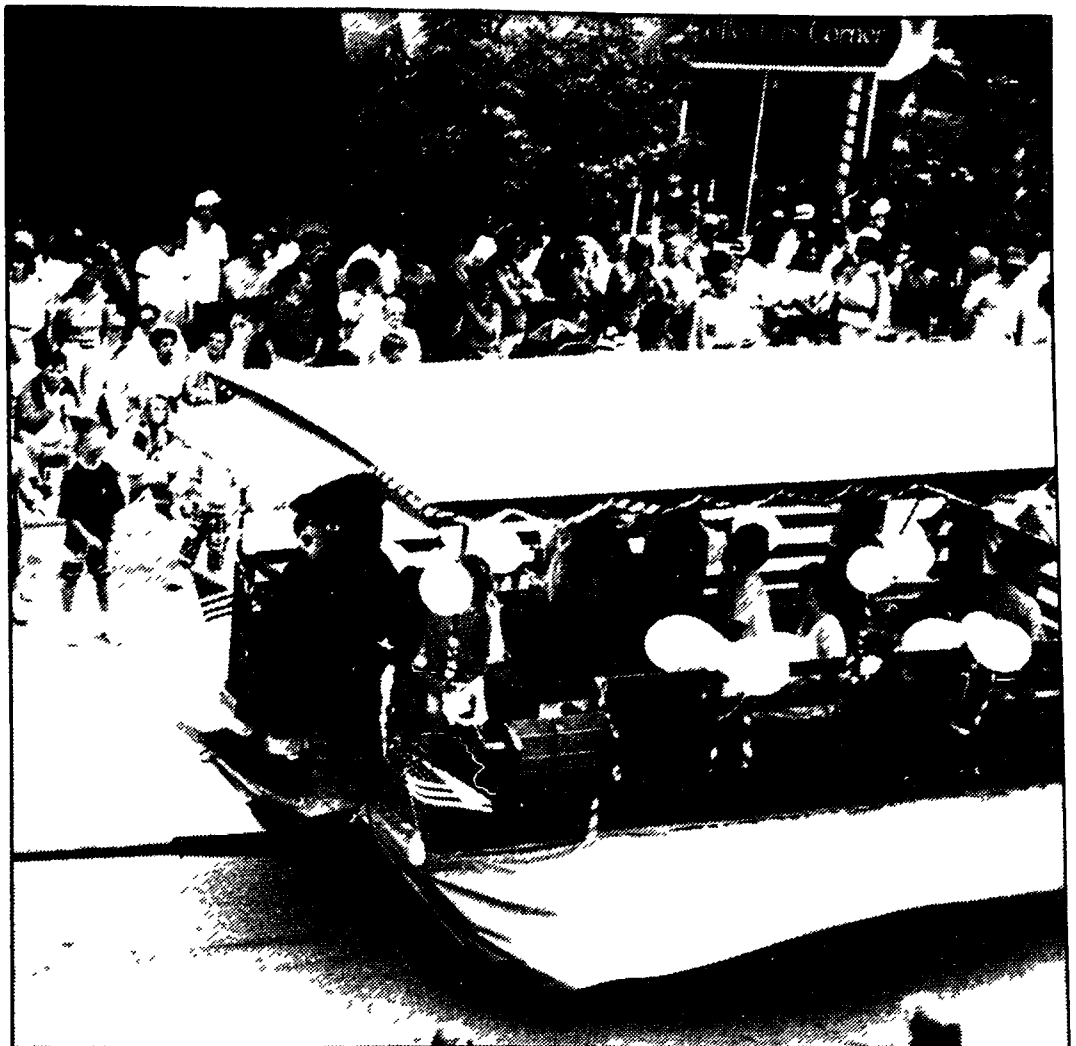

Researcher studies kids of alcoholic parents

Popular literature like newspapers and magazines would make a person think the effects of living in a home with an alcoholic parent would be negative on a child — case closed.

But research has shown more contradictory findings, said Northville Public School psychologist Jolene Anne Jacobs.

Jacobs, a 15-year district employee in the special education department, did her own study on the issue and earned a doctoral degree from the University of Michigan at the same time.

Jacobs' study of 32 children with alcoholic fathers and 32 children from non-alcoholic homes found popular literature may have been right in its conclusion that alcoholic fathers have a negative impact on their children.

"What you all probably believed before, I went out and found out through a very clean study," Jacobs told the Northville Action Council at a June meeting.

Jacobs' study found:

●Children of alcoholic fathers are as intelligent as other children, but are poorly motivated in school.

●Children of alcoholic fathers have low self-esteem at home, at school and in society.

●As a group, these children are poorly adjusted, hostile, dependent and have poor social skills.

●As a group, these children suffer from psychotic thoughts, depression, withdrawal and physical health complaints.

●Families with no alcohol problem and families with at least one alcoholic did not differ in their willingness to reveal information about their families.

Jacobs said this finding could have been biased by the fact that at least one person in the alcoholic's family must have sought help in order to be considered for the study. Those families who wanted to hide their problem with alcohol would have automatically excluded themselves from the study.

●There are no age or gender differences regarding the physical effects of paternal alcoholism. But there is some

evidence suggesting the effects of paternal alcoholism relating to interaction only. For example, children from families with alcohol problems lose their ability to trust their family environment and family members.

"That's a big problem in alcoholic families," Jacobs said.

●Children of alcoholics who are from a lower socioeconomic class either stayed the same or got better with age.

Children of alcoholics who are from a higher socioeconomic class got worse with age. The children were measured on impulse control, general adjustment, delinquency and hostility.

Socio-economic status was measured by the level of education attained for the purposes of the study. Jacobs said using education rather than wealth was necessary because alcoholics may have a doctoral degree but a zero income because they cannot maintain a job.

Jacobs studied children between the ages of 6 and 12. She studied only children from an urban community with two parents in the home.

At least one of the parents of children she studied must have sought help from a mental health agency.

The control group of kids had to come from families where neither parent had more than seven drinks a day.

One problem she encountered was finding enough kids for the control group that had married parents who did not drink too much for the study.

"There's a lot of what people consider social drinking that's really on the road to alcoholism," she said.

Statistics show one in 25 children have an alcoholic parent, Jacobs said. That is one student per classroom.

The problem is in treating the students.

"We need to do more work with 6- to 12-year-olds," said Northville Action Council President Roxanne Casterline.

But the issue may not be one the schools easily can handle, Jacobs said.

"You can't ask kids how much their parents drink. It's an invasion of privacy," she said. "You can't treat it like measles."

Future mapped out for district strategic planning

Northville school's strategic plan as revised in the recently completed First Annual Update is not yet in the mail, but talk of a Second Annual Update is under way.

The district's revised strategic plan, complete with updated goals

and action plans, should be mailed to district residents sometime in September. The plan as amended received final approval by board members at a Monday school board meeting.

Also presented to the board was a timeline leading to the Second Annual Update of the strategic plan, which should be complete by October

1993.

Under the new strategic plan, the school board will place an emphasis on improving four areas in the district.

The board will provide school finance information to the public and will restructure the high school day.

It also will attempt to meet the special needs of all students, something

that will be as difficult as it sounds, said Assistant Superintendent for Instructional Services Dolly McMaster.

"That's no easy task; we don't take those words lightly," she said.

The board also will work to increase community involvement.

McMaster said the district has a high level of community involvement

that could be reciprocated by providing programs for community members to use district technology and equipment.

Work toward achieving those goals officially will begin with the next school year.

The number of members on the Strategic Planning Team has been increased from 26 to 41. An orientation

for the new members will be held in September or October.

The committee will meet throughout the year, working toward established goals including passage of a millage election in the spring of 1992.

Second Annual Update meetings are scheduled for October and February 1992 and 1993.

Woman alleges assault by Lyon Township man

A Northville woman was treated at St. Mary Hospital late July 6 for injuries she said she received in a criminal sexual assault.

The 24-year-old woman told Northville Township police she was assaulted at a house party in Lyon Township by a 25-year-old man who hosted the party.

The Oakland County Sheriff's Department is investigating the incident, Sgt. Clay Jansson said. An investigator assigned to the case was unavailable for comment late Tuesday.

Township police interviewed the victim at her Northville apartment late July 6. Police said they found the

woman seated on a living room couch crying and holding herself.

A blood-soaked cloth reportedly was wrapped around the woman's right hand, and fresh and dried blood covered her face, chest, arms, hands and legs, police said.

None of the woman's clothing appeared to be ripped or torn, police said.

The woman told police she went to a party with friends earlier that evening. The party was held at a residence on Johns Road between Ten and Eleven Mile Roads in Lyon Township, she said.

After drinking an undetermined amount of beer, the woman said she went for a walk with the suspect. The man suddenly pushed her into a group of bushes and attempted to

pull off a tube top she was wearing, the woman said.

When she resisted, the man struck her, pulled down her shorts, and began fondling her. The woman said the man began to penetrate her but she was able to resist and fled on foot.

Two Novi residents found the woman wandering near the Johns Road and Ten Mile intersection at 10:45 p.m. The Novi residents drove the woman to Northville at her request, according to police reports.

Huron Valley Ambulance transported the woman to the hospital after she was interviewed by police. The emergency room physician was instructed to complete a sexual assault test kit, police said.

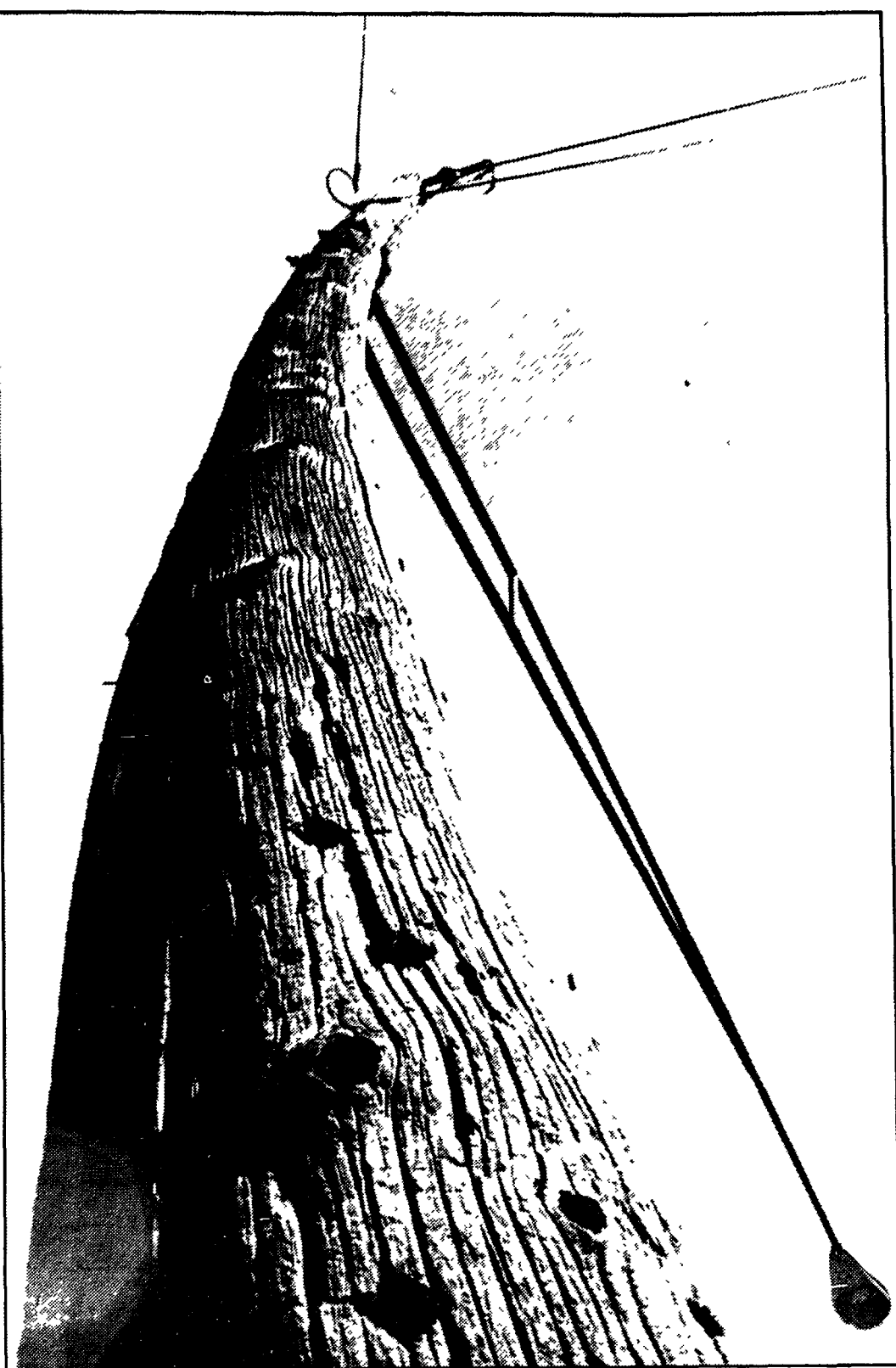

over by the weight of a tree limb which was weighing down the attached wires. The weight also caused the pole to partially split.

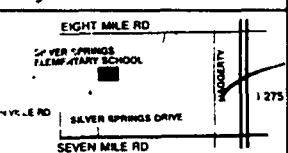

State police post readies regional dispatch system

Center will coordinate troopers in five counties

A five-county dispatching center at Northville's Michigan State Police post is nearly operational, according to Lt. Jim Hostutler.

The system, known as computer-aided dispatch (CAD), could be ready by September, he said. The post will dispatch troopers in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, Washtenaw and St. Clair counties.

"We were planning on Aug. 1 (to begin operation)," Hostutler said, "but it's going to be later than that."

Phone equipment must yet be installed before the system can go on line. Hostutler said the post is currently working to secure financing for the equipment.

Once in operation, the post will host the state police's first regional dispatch system. Hostutler added that other regional centers in the state will be developed after Northville's.

State police decided to put the dispatch at the Northville post because it's the only one of the district's nine that had room available. A former

storage area in the post's basement has been converted to house the dispatch.

State police explained how the system will work:

Calls from the public, emergency or service, will first be routed to computer operators. The operators will then send the message across the room by computer to the dispatcher handling the area from which the call came. Dispatchers then assign troopers from appropriate posts to handle the call.

Besides dispatching, the system will allow for computer information checks. Troopers on patrol will be able to get information from the checks directly from dispatchers.

Hostutler said a minimum of seven dispatchers would be operating the CAD system at all times. The new system will allow the post to begin closing its doors at 5 p.m., he said.

The lieutenant said the dispatch will also allow for better coverage of roadways.

"We will probably have better service because more people will be on the road," said Hostutler.

Troopers who were previously as-

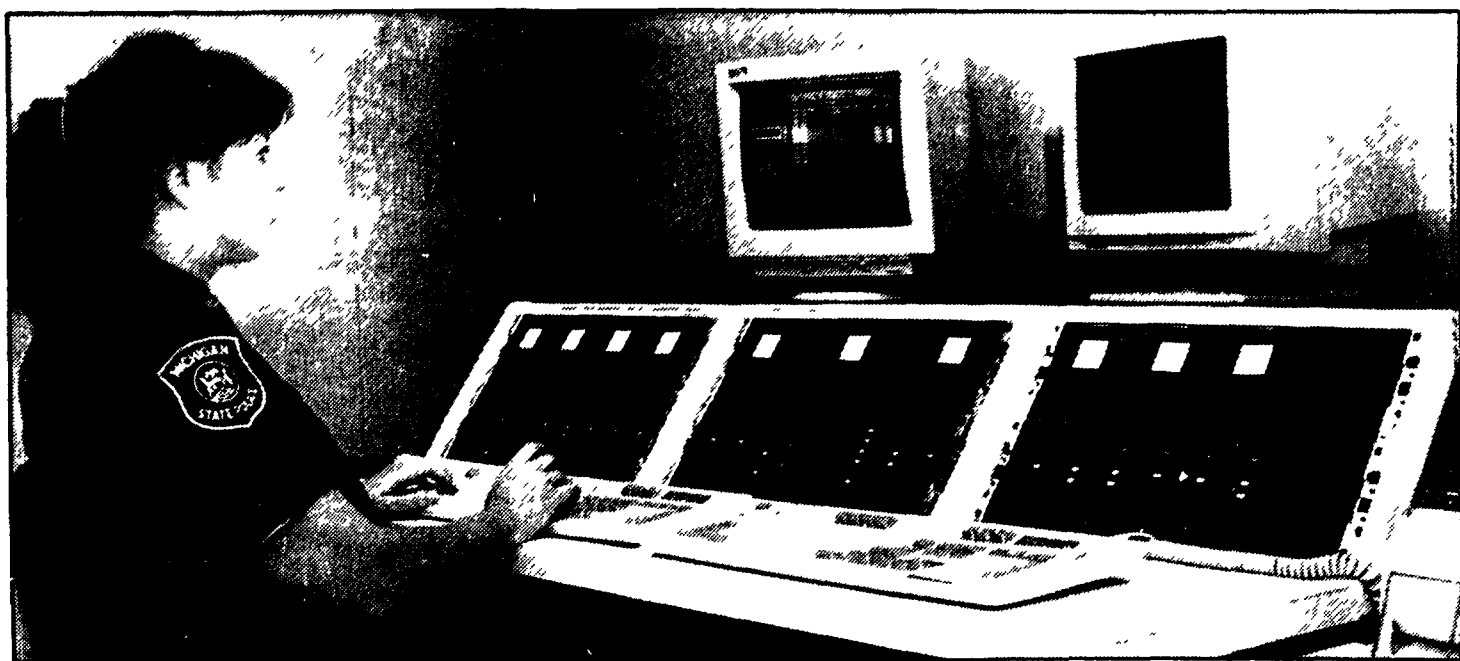

signed to operate dispatching and answering phones will be moved to patrol, he said. Some troopers will still help run the CAD system. Hostutler said, but a majority of the work will be done by full-time dispatchers.

Trooper Rita Murphy is one of

three officers at the post that have been trained extensively in how to operate the CAD system. She said for the past several weeks officers have been working to get the system ready.

That work has included entering data into the computer system for

important locations, such as hospitals and courts, for the dispatch's entire coverage area, Murphy said. The trooper added that the work is almost complete.

"We have to have all the information right here," Hostutler said.

Murphy said she worked on a system similar to CAD in Jackson, Mich. There, she said, the dispatch coordinated state, county and local police units.

"It worked well," Murphy said.

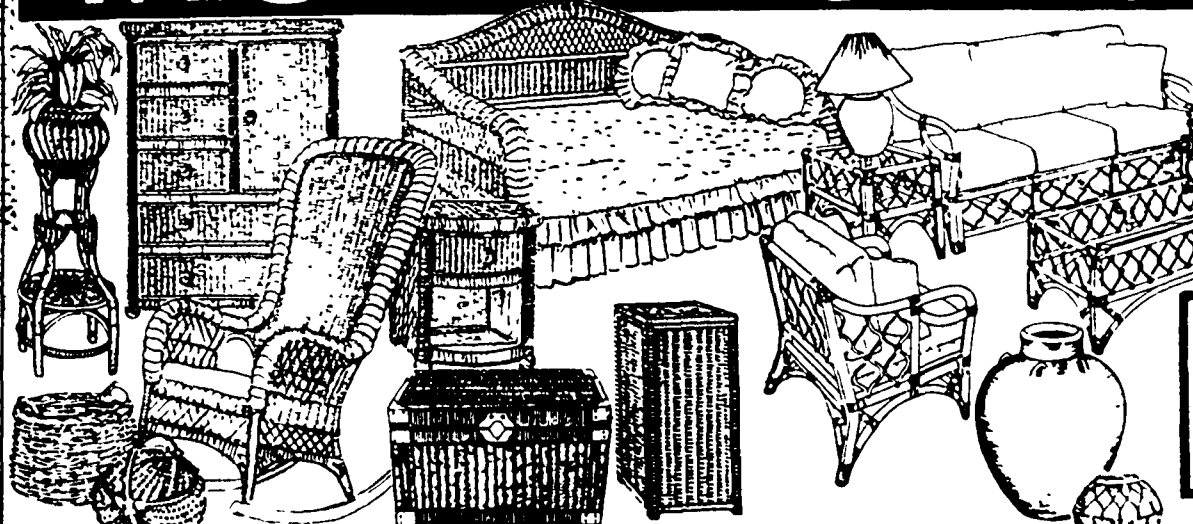

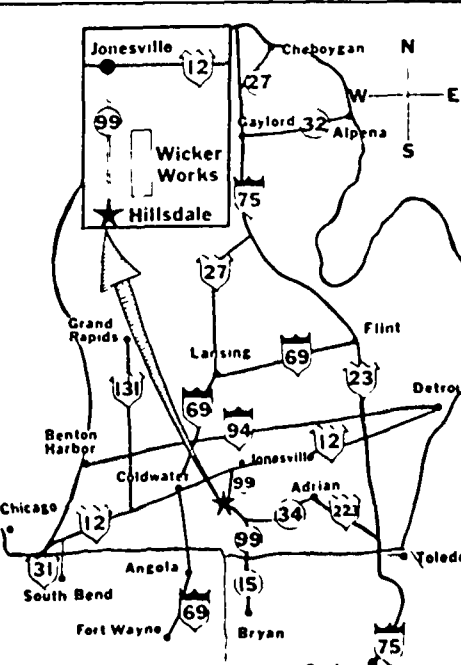

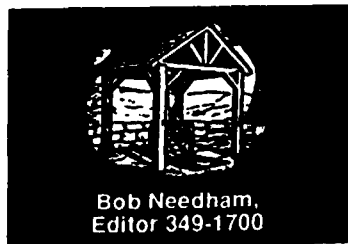

Garbage fee solution just temporary answer

Homeowners and businesses in the City of Northville will see an unpleasant new charge on their Aug. 1 water bill: an extra fee for trash collection.

Trash collection, of course, has long been one of the things covered by city taxes. It's not covered any more, and the city has not yet found a way to charge residents and commercial entities their fair share for trash pickup. One thing seems clear: The new charges are not the way to go.

Under the plan recently approved by the city council, the city will bill any homeowner or business with curbside trash pickup \$16.30 a month for trash collection. Businesses using Dumpster-type containers will pay per container.

Along with the new charges comes a reduction in the city tax rate, although the reduction does not completely make up (in total dollars) for the new charges.

The current resolution — of charges on the water bill — is far from ideal. It's only temporary; in fact, the system may only remain in its current form for a couple of months.

It's a good thing the per-household/business charge is temporary, because it is not the best solution.

Consider the overall impact on residents of this year's budget machinations over garbage disposal. It's a complicated thing to consider.

Imagine a fictitious city homeowner with a \$150,000 home assessed at \$75,000 last year. The homeowner paid about \$820 in taxes last year for general city operations, based on an operating millage rate of 10.93 mills. Those taxes included paying for trash disposal.

This year the homeowner's assessment rose 10 percent, let's say, to \$82,500. That puts our friend in the middle of the pack; city home assessments in Wayne County rose an average of 13 percent, while in Oakland County they rose 6 percent.

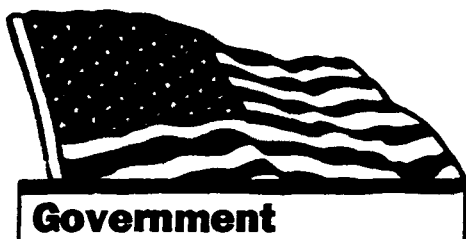
But along come the city budget discussions, in which the council drops the operating millage rate to 9.48 mills. Our citizen's taxes for city operations fall to about \$782. What a deal!

The catch, however, is that trash disposal costs won't be covered by taxes. Enter the \$16-a-month charge. If the new charge is levied only for a couple of months and then removed, our friend is still ahead of the game. Any longer than that and it's more money from the homeowner's pocket.

This is, naturally, an oversimplification. One key point in setting this year's millage rate was that the council chose a figure which would allow the establishment of a budget stabilization (rainy day) fund. This is a prudent move which requires tax money. Other city costs keep rising, and that also contributes to the millage rate.

In addition, our mythical citizen is just that. There may well be a homeowner in that exact situation, but others had smaller assessment increases, larger assessment increases, and even a few decreases.

The long and the short of it is that the impact of the new system will vary from homeowner to homeowner, from business to business. It might prove instructive to figure what an individual actually paid for trash disposal last year, based on the millage figure which went directly



to pay the city's total cost. But having that figure, there's really nothing to which it could be compared, since the current system is temporary and the future is unknown.

On the whole, our guess is that most residents and businesses will pay more money to the city now and in the future, but the change in garbage disposal will account for just part of that. Another part of the problem is that the disposal costs keep rising, which is what caused all this trouble in the first place.

Which, finally, brings us to the system itself. The city touts it as being, at its core, fairer to residents than including trash disposal in the millage. That's certainly true; including trash disposal in operating taxes means that residential properties pay for 80 percent of the total costs for the city, while they only comprise 57 percent of those costs.

The system isn't fair in that sense. But removing city services from the operating taxes in such a manner may set a strange precedent. If this is the way to go for trash disposal, why not charge fees for police services? For city administration? For all city services?

Even if you do believe that trash disposal is a special situation in which charges should be tied to actual use, charging per home/business isn't entirely "fair" either. Residents will still subsidize business to an extent; city officials have said as much.

In its budget discussions on all these issues, the city council members seemed to believe the fairest way to charge for trash collection would be per bag of trash. You pay for exactly what you throw out, no more and no less. Yet that's not the system they adopted, at least on this interim basis.

Trash disposal in the city will heat up as an issue even more in the coming months, as a curbside recycling program inches closer to reality. The city had hopes of combining with the township on curbside recycling, but had a nasty shock when township officials announced they had worked out a deal with Browning-Ferris Industries — for free — that did not include the city. Now the city needs another partner in its program.

The entire question of trash disposal is up in the air at this point. We don't know which governments will end up paired with which, and on what combinations of services; we certainly don't know what it all will cost. (More, however, is a safe bet.)

Regardless of how these questions work out, we hope the city abandons the per-user charge at its earliest opportunity. Trash collection should be treated either as a standard city service, like police or administration, which comes from tax money; or as an actual charge for actual cost, like water service, which would mean charging per bag. But this interim, middle-ground system is not in the best interests of anyone.

A few observations to share

To the editor:

Shared observations of recent events or news articles in the community:

1. The Northville community's support and interest in the July 4th celebration is truly commendable. However, would it not be more noteworthy and commendable to demonstrate our patriotism and conviction to a democracy by being concerned enough to vote when given the opportunity? The most recent turnout for the school millage represented approximately one of 10 eligible adult voters (i.e., not necessarily registered but actually eligible). Is this how we demonstrate a government by the people?

2. Your newspaper's recent editorial regarding the consultant hired to assist in securing support for the Northville Township's millage proposal in August was most encouraging. Informing residents of the inconsistent way that funding is provided to market and sell special projects and causes represents the only means most residents have to know what is going on behind the scenes.

3. A recent article indicated that 832.75 hours of time was devoted in the past year to providing support services to children in private or parochial schools in the Northville school district. Consider the following information when evaluating the extent of these services:

a. At a very generous \$50 per hour, those services would be valued at approximately \$40,000.

b. Of the five schools listed that had services rendered, total student population was 874. If only 50 percent of those 874 children lived in the Northville District (the actual number is undoubtedly higher), 437 additional students would have to be provided complete educational services for the year if those schools did not exist. The actual number would also need to be increased to recognize the high school students attending schools outside of the District.

c. With an average cost of education currently exceeding \$5,000 per student, the additional expense to the district of educating the 437 students would be in excess of \$2,000,000!

\$40,000 vs. \$2,000,000: Who do you think is really providing the support service here?

Warning signs may signal runaway

Since the inception of the Northville Youth Assistance Program, a significant number of youths have been referred to the program because they have run away from their homes in Northville.

Nationally, an estimated 1.4 million American youths run away from home each year. A recurring theme that is expressed by runaways is their inability to communicate with their parents and their feelings of anger over what they perceive to be gross injustices in their home.

The National Network of Runaway and Youth Services identifies 10 warning signs that indicate a youth may seriously be considering running away:

- Growing isolation: The young person is spending more and more time alone and is communicating less with the family.
- Excessive blow-ups: Even the smallest things seem to repeatedly trigger anger and an explosion of temper.
- Abrupt mood swings: Mood swings are occurring too frequently and too abruptly.

curing too frequently and too abruptly.

- Increased sleeping: Sleeping in excess indicating depression or problems the teen cannot easily manage.

- Diminished communications: The teen is unable to talk to the parents.

- School troubles: Falling grades, truancy and disciplinary problems.

- Parental stack-blowing: Parents who blow their stack over the smallest issues and have little patience with their children may cause a young person to leave the family.

- Family crisis: Death, divorce, illness, unemployment or a major move affecting the young person's security.

- Unexplained money or possessions: These indicate a change in lifestyle and may suggest that the teen is getting ready to leave.

By understanding that these signals are a warning of distress, parents can seek assistance before a runaway occurs. The most important things to be done to prevent a young

person from running away from home include strengthening the marriage of parents and improving the relationship between the parents and their teenager.

The most important ingredient in a good relationship is showing affection. Sometimes doing things for the children isn't enough. Hugging, kissing, and saying "I love you" is also needed. Another important part of forming a sound relationship is to spend large blocks of time with youngsters. But just spending time with a young person will not bring about more talking and open communication. The parent must learn how to listen to the child's feelings and attitude, without criticism, condemnation or lecturing.

Home at Last

Kitchen is enjoying his peace

Jeremy Kitchen does not believe in war.

After nearly five months in the Middle East on the front lines of Operation Desert Storm, followed by a bout with typhoid, that's the message he wants people to hear.

"I don't believe in war at all," he said. "I still think war is terribly wrong."

"I think it's great that everyone is so patriotic and everything, but war is wrong and we should never let it happen again."

Kitchen, whose letter from Iraq was printed in a Jan. 10 feature story in *The Northville Record*, received an outpouring of mail from local residents.

The letter, which described hot weather, desolation and frightening living conditions, probably inspired many people to write.

He estimated that 50 percent of the letters were from people he had never met, and a large portion of other letters were from people he had lost touch with and had not seen in years.

"I got a lot of letters," he said. "Probably more than anyone else. It was great."

The mail was a good distraction, because there were many times when Kitchen was very frightened.

His job as an artillery forward observer required him to "go out in front of everybody and scout out where the enemy and the targets are," he said. It's a dangerous job.

Kitchen joined the army two years ago because he wanted to see Europe and he wanted to earn money for college. He never believed he might actually go to war.

"All I kept thinking while I was there was, 'What am I doing here?'" he said.

His most frightening experience occurred one night when he was assigned to guard duty.

"I was sitting there, kind of half-asleep and bored. Then, all of a sudden, there was a fighting vehicle right in front of me and all of a sudden there was a battle, right there in front of me," he said.

Kitchen said many of his friends over there, like him, joined the army to earn money for college.

"Most of us were asking

ourselves, 'Why did we do this?'" he said.

While in Iraq, he and his friends took to wearing peace signs. That angered a few people, he said, who would tell them to take them off.

When he heard of war protests back home, he said, he didn't mind.

"I thought the protesting was OK, because they weren't protesting us," he said. "They weren't protesting the guys over there, they were protesting the war, and I thought that was totally cool."

In fact, Kitchen said, if he had been here during the war, he just might have been one of those protestors.

His unit was the first into Iraq, and one of the first into Kuwait. Then, his unit came back to deal with the refugees and prisoners of war.

Kitchen said he felt sorry for the Iraqi prisoners they picked up, who had gone too long without food and water. He gave his boots to one Iraqi who needed them.

"We would give them food and water, and they would get down and kiss our feet, which is the highest praise they give someone," he recalled.

Kitchen's unit left Iraq on April 24 and went to Germany. Everyone in his unit was given a 15-day vacation.

But instead of being able to enjoy the vacation, Kitchen spent it in the hospital with typhoid.

Then, shortly after he recovered, he went home to spend some time with his family.

"It's been great," he said. His family even put up a Christmas tree for him and they celebrated Christmas in June.

"That really made me feel good, because Christmas was a bummer over there," he said.

Kitchen has also received a great deal of attention while he has been home, he said. But he believes people who fought in previous wars, especially Vietnam, deserve the same welcome home he has received.

"There were a couple of guys in my unit who were in Vietnam, and this was nothing compared to that," he said. "I think Vietnam vets should have a welcome home, even though it's late."

Kitchen is returning to Germany this week for one more year of service. Then, he said, he's coming back again. He plans to use his very hard-earned money for tuition at Western Michigan University.

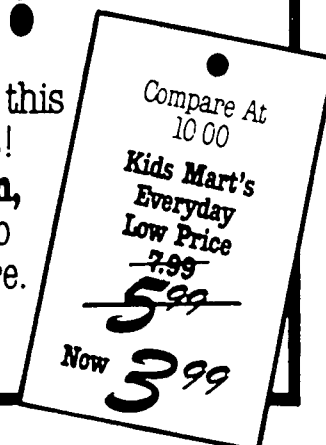

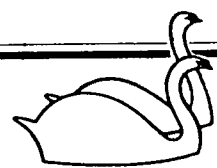

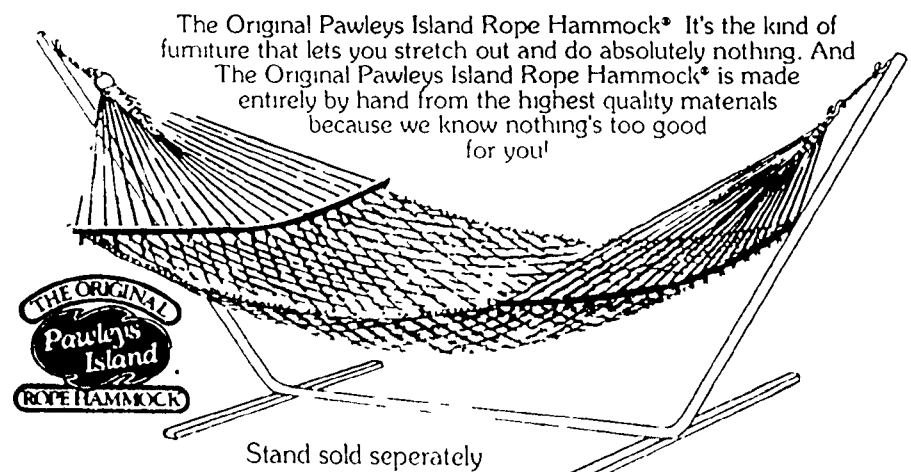

Baseball embraced in Canton shop

For many, summer wouldn't be summer without the crack of the bat, the pennant race or the All-Star game.

Millions of Americans have embraced the national pastime in recent years. Television beams games to every portion of the country, seven days a week. Baseball devotees scour newspapers daily for scores, statistics and tidbits of information about their favorite players.

card collecting isn't only fun, but profitable too.

"It has outperformed stocks, bonds and precious metals," he said.

The shop's card collection goes back to the days of Babe Ruth. A complete collection of hard-to-find Goudey Gum Co. cards, including the Bambino, are on hand.

Patrons can even have a baseball card of themselves made at the shop. A realistic card, with your picture and statistics of your choice on the back, can be purchased for \$7.50.

But, you Walter Mittys don't have to stop there. A genuine Louisville Slugger baseball bat, with your name engraved on the barrel, is available for \$39.50.

Yearbooks, autographed baseballs, caps and shirts are some of the

other sports items on sale at P.J.'s. Card supplies, such as plastic and cardboard holders are also in stock.

Slaga said protection for dealers' cards are important.

"The better the card, the more protection you want to give it," he said.

Most of the store's comics are from the "silver" age of the 1960s. Slaga said. Spider-Man and Captain America are two of the older comic-book series common at the Canton shop.

PJ's Cards & Comics is in the F & M shopping center. Store hours are 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturdays and from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sundays.

CROSSROADS

The trouble with art fairs is that there is too much art in one place. I love the Ann Arbor Art Fair, held this year July 24-27, but I lose my composure after I have walked through the first mile of booths.

My Ann Arbor friends don't have this problem, because they know where to take those refreshing breaks that make a day at the fair survivable. If you have Ann Arbor friends, let them take you to the fair. If you don't, plan a day with lots of breaks in it.

Don't drive into that midtown madhouse. Park your car free and take the shuttle (\$1 each way) from the southeast side of Briarwood Mall, off I-94 on State Street near Sears, or from Pioneer High School at the corner of Main and Stadium.

The shuttle circles all day and stops at a number of places so you can always get back to your car. Shuttle riders also ride free on the trolley that runs between the three fairs; others pay 50 cents for the trolley.

Start at the Ann Arbor Street Art Fair, the original juried art on South University. You will find Dee Segula of Millford selling her wonderful mixed-media puppets in one of the booths. You will also find Sharon Hubbard of Dexter creating ceramics at 10:30 a.m. and 5 p.m., part of the artist demonstrations held morning, afternoon and evening during the fair.

All the stores in town have sidewalk sales, so you can always duck into Middle Earth for an unusual gift or go to the Bagel Factory for breakfast.

As you continue down South University you will pass the President's House, home of the U of M president. Walk into the courtyard of the Cook Law Quadrangle across the street, patterned after old English university quads. Go to the original law library and then underground to the spectacular addition, with its skylight.

A diversion like that makes the fair more fun. You'll find another diversion at the U of M Art Museum at the corner of South University and State.

If you walk north on State Street from there you will be in one of two parts of the Michigan Guild of Artists and Artisans Summer Art Fair. Members sell from a gold mine of hand crafts, jewelry and paintings. Entertainment includes music, demonstrations and children's programs.

Keep going and you will be in the State Street Art Fair; the artists are on Thompson, Maynard, North University and Liberty Streets—only the merchants are on State Street. This fair is similar to the Ann Arbor Street Art Fair; artists apply for one or the other.

Ready for another break? Duck into Nickel's Arcade, built in 1917. It was patterned after European arcades: two storeys, glass ceilings. You will find one of the largest collections of antique jewelry you have ever seen in shop called The Arcadian. Book lovers know that the original Border's Book Store is also in this area.

When it's time for lunch, get away from the street hubbub. Go two blocks east to the Michigan League, a beautiful old 1920s building with cool marble floors and a nice relaxing cafeteria. Or go two blocks north to the Campus Inn, where the restaurant is run by the Macchus restaurant people.

The alternative is to head for Liberty Plaza, a small park on Liberty Street. Buy homemade soup, a special milkshake or a hot dog from a gourmet hot dog place called Le Dog and eat in the park.

Keep going west on Liberty and you'll find yourself in the non-profit area, where several dozen organizations sell their T-shirts and hand out leaflets. Continue west and you're in the second part of the Michigan Guild fair in the Main Street area.

The kids can do supervised art projects here or at a booth on Church Street near South University.

When you are ready for an afternoon break, try the frozen yogurt or a lemonade at Afternoon Delight, corner of Liberty and Fifth, or go another block to Hertler Brothers; you'll find all the gardeners and do-it-yourselfers there on Ashley Street, the first street west and parallel to Main.

Note the Bird of Paradise across the street from Hertler's, in case you want to come back for drinks and jazz later at night. For late afternoon, you'll find a hundred different beers at the sidewalk cafe or inside bar at The Full Moon Cafe on Main Street. Or a dark cool hole-in-the-wall welcome at Del Rio on Washington Street.

Across the street from Del Rio is the famous Earle, with its elegant wine list. Even if you don't want a special occasion dinner, you can go into the separate bar for a drink within the coolness of the brick and fieldstone walls.

The Ann Arbor Art Fair, which is really three concurrent fairs, is on from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Wednesday, Thursday, Friday July 24-26 and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, July 27.

You'll find 200 artists, 65 of them new this year, at the Ann Arbor Street Art Fair, and 1,000 artists represented in the three fairs.

Call the Washtenaw Council for the Arts at (313) 966-2777 for information on the performances planned for the Graceful Arch Stage, northwest corner of South University and East University avenues.

The stage is sponsored by MCI Telecommunications Corp., which will also allow you to make free long-distance telephone calls of up to three minutes from their calling center on Church and South University.

Tennessee boasts an 'island in the mainstream of America'

"Welcome to the Cumberland Plateau," said the Park Ranger. "I like to refer to it as 'An Island in the Mainstream of America.'"

We were in the nature center of Fall Creek Falls State Park near Pikeville, on the Cumberland Plateau, an elevated region that cuts a swath 50 miles wide through Tennessee, about 50 miles west of Interstate-75.

Outdoor activities and attractions make this a great place for a laid-back, non-city vacation. There's plenty to see and do, or you can relax and do nothing.

I picked up a bike at the modern 72-room Fall Creek Lodge and pedaled along the shore of Fall Creek Lake, past fishermen bait-casting from flat-bottomed boats, until I reached an unusual row of modern "fisherman" cabins. Guests fish from private porches that hang over the lake.

I rode past the golf course, tennis courts, two camping areas and a swimming pool before reaching spectacular Fall Creek Falls. At 256 feet, it is the highest waterfall east of the Rocky Mountains.

The Cumberland Plateau rises 1,000 feet to the Tennessee River Valley on the east and tapers to the Cumberland River, and several large TVA lakes, on the west. There are no cities on the plateau, just friendly villages and small towns such as McMinnville and its nearby Cumberland Caverns, second in size only to Kentucky's Mammoth Cave.

The Cavern has a one-ton crystal chandelier in the first of several large caves, including one called the "10-acre room." Saltpeter, used in gunpowder, was mined in these caves during the war of 1812 and during the Civil War.

CROSSVILLE AREA

About 30 miles north of Fall Creek, near Crossville, is a smaller state park called Cumberland Mountain. It has modern cottages, a lake, campground and restaurant but no lodge. A nearby alternative is Thunder Hollow, a time-share resort that offers motel-like rooms by the day or week, plus recreation facilities and golf course.

Four miles south of Crossville, at the junction of highways 68 and 127, is the wonderful Cumberland General Store with goods "in endless variety for man and beast." They stock everything from razor strops to copper bathtubs; great gifts and old-time candies.

Across the road is a massive octagonal 80-foot sandstone tower, a monumental museum to one of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's "New Deal" experiments of the early 1930s.

Eleanor Roosevelt twice visited this 10,000-acre "Cumberland Homesteads" project that provided each of 250 poor families with about 20 acres of cleared land and the means to build their own home. It was a successful attempt at cooperative living that faded with the end of the great depression of the 1930s.

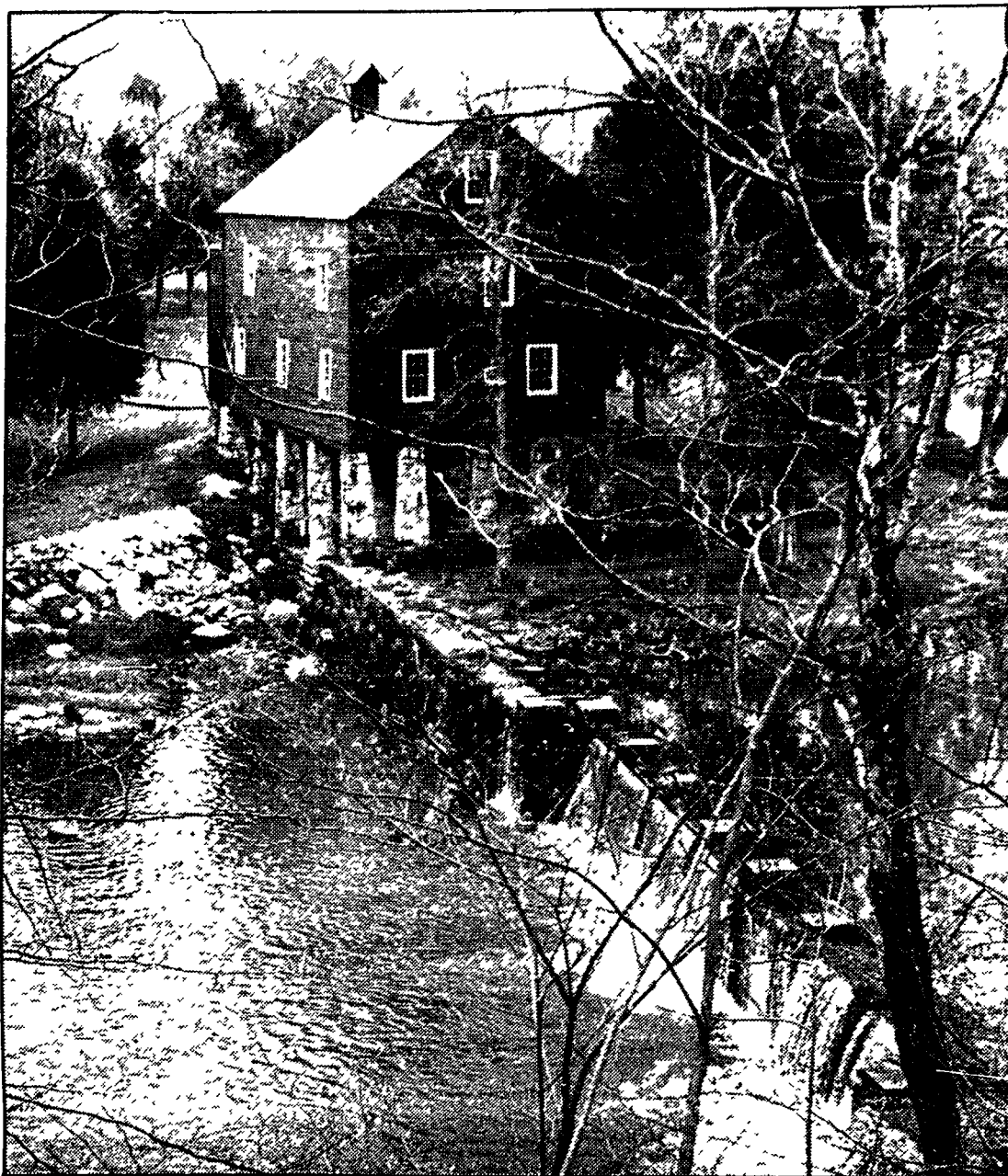
The 250 original stone cottages still line most of the roads within two or three miles of the tower which now houses a free museum on the ground floor. For 50 cents you can climb the 97-step circular stairway to the top for a view of the area.

RUGBY

The northern part of this plateau, some 40 miles north of Crossville, has another group of unique tourist attractions and small towns. Most unusual and picturesque is the "English Colony" town of Rugby. Founded in 1880 by famed English author Thomas Hughes, who wrote "Tom Brown's School Days," it was his intention to establish a "New Jerusalem" in the land of opportunity.

The settlement of English immigrants thrived for about 10 years and the population peaked at about 400 in 1884 but sickness, financial problems and cold winters almost wiped out the village. Today, only 17 of the original 70 buildings remain and the population is stable at about 75.

English home cooking is available at the Harrow Road Cafe, and overnight lodging, in Victorian bedrooms, is available at the Newbury House Inn and the Pioneer Cottage. Sunday services are still held in beautiful little

1887 Christ Episcopal with its 1849 rosewood organ.

About 35 miles north-west of Rugby, on highway 127 north of Jamestown, is the Alvin C. York grist mill. Now a state park and museum, the mill is a memorial to America's greatest World War I hero. The park ranger is his son Andrew Jackson York. Known here as Andy, his father Sgt. York died in 1964 and is buried nearby.

You can travel a little farther west to Byrdstown and visit the log cabin birthplace of Secretary of State Cordell Hull, known as the father of the United Nations and winner of the Nobel Peace Prize.

RAFTING

On Sunday morning we drove north on highway 27 to Oneida and then west into Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area. This 100,000-acre wilderness park, which extends into southern Kentucky, was established in 1974 and is aimed primarily at campers, backpackers and whitewater enthusiasts.

Bandy Creek Recreation Area in the southern part of the park has horse stables and a visitor center. There are no accommodations other than campgrounds.

As pre-arranged, a whitewater outfitter met us beside the river at noon, and about two dozen of us boarded his ancient bus that was pulling a trailer stacked high with

14-foot rubber rafts.

Several miles up-river we were unloaded and fitted with helmets, life jackets and paddles. We soon needed all of them as we bounced and splashed our way down five miles of class three and four rapids, six persons per raft including one skilled boatman who directed the operation.

Two of our people fell into the water and were retrieved—they were in no real danger. Three canoes traversing the same rapids were not so lucky; they all capsized, but the nine passengers soon recovered their canoes and their composure and were on their way again.

Even if you manage to stay within the raft, there is no way to keep dry on this trip. The waves sometimes splash right over your head so your feet are in a foot of water for most of the run, which takes about 30 minutes for five miles, one hour for 10 miles.

This kind of white-water rafting is a thrill ride that can be enjoyed by any physically-fit person over 12 years of age—even a couch potato like me.

Northville's Marcie Dart named All-State in soccer

All season, soccer circles considered Northville's Marcie Dart to be one of the top midfielders in the state. Now that standing has been confirmed with her selection as a first-team All-Stater by the state coaches' association.

"I was hoping for it. It was nice" to be honored, Dart said.

With a career like hers, the selection was no accident. Dart led the Mustangs in scoring with 10 goals and 17 assists this year. She was a unanimous all-conference pick and was named Player of the Year on the first-ever HomeTown Newspapers East All-Area girls soccer team.

Three local girls, two coaches travel to 11-under tournament

The Michigan champion 11-and-under girls basketball team placed ninth in the country at a recent tournament, and Northville helped it get there.

The Michigan champions played in a pool with New Jersey, Ohio, and Arkansas. The top 16 teams after pool play moved on to a standard double-elimination tournament.

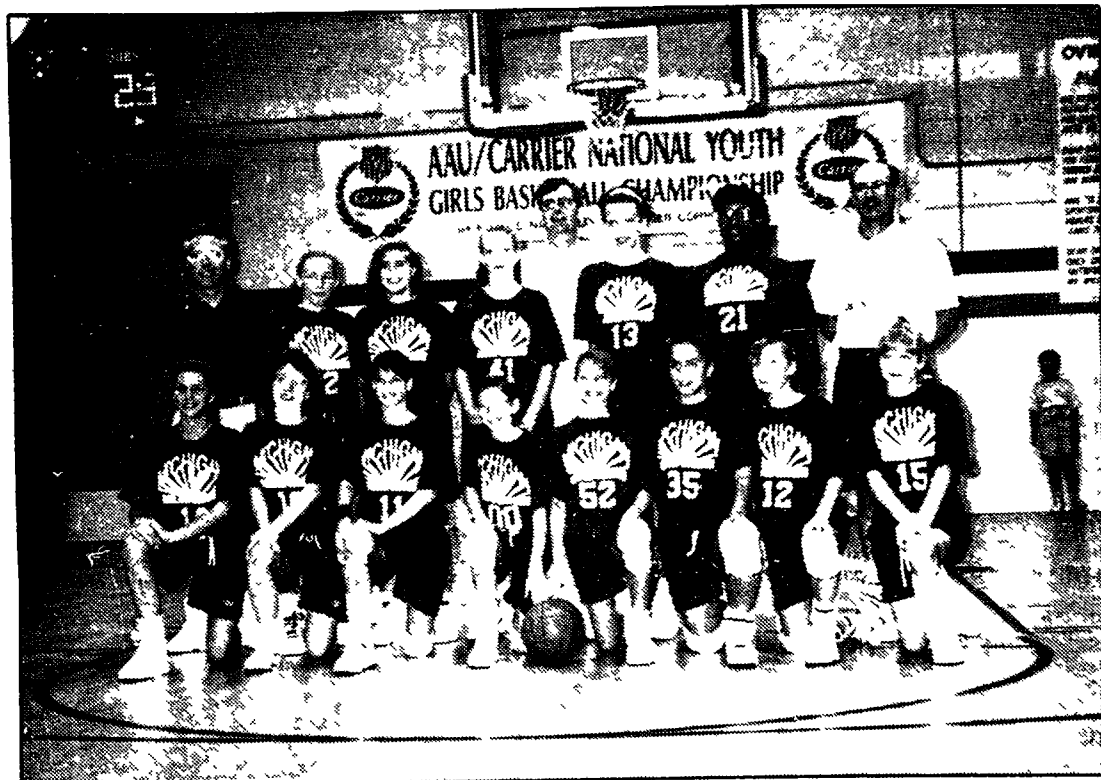
Michigan started out with a 38-32 win over Arkansas and another

Two Northville High School girls basketball players were part of a state championship team which competed against the country's best during a recent tournament in Tennessee.

The local team finished in the middle of the pack in the Amateur Athletic Union Junior Olympic competition for girls age 16 and under at Johnson City, Tenn. But Northville players Stacey Nyland and Karen Pump came back with some excellent experience behind them.

had to dig up scrimmages with an Ohio team and even college players.

Both Nyland and Pump plan to return to Northville in the fall for their senior seasons. The experience in Tennessee should prove valuable.

"We just thought it would be good for the community and important for the kids" to participate, Pat Nyland said. "It was a real interesting trip and a wonderful experience."

In addition to the Northville girls, other area players on the Michigan team included Dawn Warner, Livonia Franklin; Julie Nicastri, Plymouth Canton; Darcie Miller, Plymouth Salem; and Mary Bieniewicz, a Novi resident attending Farmington Mercy High School.

STEVE VENTURA, a former Northville track star, is now excelling at Ferris State University. Ventura received All-Conference honors in the open 400-meter dash and helped the Bulldogs win the GLIAC title for the second straight year.

He is the son of Northville resident Tony Ventura.

Northville native **MARK STEPHENS** earned his second varsity letter as a member of the Saginaw Valley State University golf team. Stephens, who attended Redford Catholic Central High School, reduced his stroke average from 80.8 to 79.2 this season and helped the Cardinals finish second in the GLIAC for the second straight year. Stephens is a 6-foot, 180-pound sophomore.

Grand Valley State University's men's track team competed at the Great Lakes Conference Championships held on May 3 at Saginaw Valley State University. **DARREN JOHNSON** of Novi, a sophomore, placed first in the javelin event with an effort of 177'-6 1/2" for the Lakers. Grand Valley's team placed fourth overall.

Alma College softball player **LISA MCCARTHY**, a Novi High School graduate, was named to the first team of the 1991 All-Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association Softball Team. McCarthy, a junior, tied for fourth in the MIAA with a .421 batting average and ranked eighth in total bases with 16.

The University of Louisville bolstered its pitching staff with the signing of former Northville resident **AARON HODGIN**. Hodgins, a 6-foot-0 lefthander, posted a 6-2 record this spring — including a no-hitter — for the 29-10 St. Xavier Tigers in Kentucky. Hodgins earned All-District and All-Region honors and was named All-Region MVP following his senior season. An East-West All-Star, he also played in the Kentucky All-Star Game and was named Academic All-State Honorable Mention. Hodgins spent his freshman and sophomore years playing football and baseball at Northville High. "Louisville has what I need academically and athletically," Hodgins said. He plans to major in psychology.

Board designates cheerleading

Several significant steps toward creating additional winter season athletic opportunities for girls were taken by the Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) at its annual spring meeting in Gaylord.

Perhaps the most significant of the actions was a vote to accept cheerleading as a sport, and the directive to appoint a committee to define cheerleading and plan the structure and details for the first MHSAA Cheerleading Tournament during the 1993-94 school year subject to MHSAA approval.

The council also:

- Moved to appoint groups to explore during the coming school year the possibility of adding bowling, indoor track and field and/or other sports as winter tournaments for at least girls, with a final decision to be made at a future council meeting.
- To extend cooperative sports programs to all classes of schools in all sports which are sponsored by 250 or fewer schools, effective in 1992-93.
- To allow high school seniors of at least 17 years of age to officiate junior high school contests with an approved official in selected sports beginning in 1992-93.
- To submit to the MHSAA membership a propo-

sosal which would replace the two physical education seats on the Council with two at-large, statewide elected positions.

"These moves have short-term and long-range goals, especially for females, as they pertain to their involvement in interscholastic athletics," said John E. "Jack" Roberts, executive director of the MHSAA. "Schools have been asking for regulation of and a tournament in cheerleading for several years. The MHSAA cannot regulate what it does not sponsor. We can't control without providing competition. It is hoped the MHSAA's efforts will enhance and expand a highly athletic and competitive winter opportunity for at least our female student-athletes."

"Bowling and indoor track would provide new opportunities for boys and girls during the winter season, and both activities have had successful tournaments in the states that already sponsor them. Other options will also be studied in the effort to equalize girls' athletic opportunities in the winter compared to the fall and spring and compared to boys' winter offerings."

"Allowing cooperative programs for all classes of schools in those sports sponsored by 250 or fewer schools also could provide new options for girls in swimming, golf, soccer, gymnastics and skiing."

The door opening for high school seniors to officiate plants a seed for this avocation for boys and girls at an important time, and helps us look down the road at cultivating our officials of tomorrow. Finally, the idea of changing the physical education positions on the Representative Council to at-large positions may enable more women and minorities to be elected to positions on our legislative body."

The council formalized guidelines for the selections of sites and assignments of schools to basketball tournaments, and it also adopted guidelines for the placement of schools in tournament classifications, the first result of which would combine Class C and D Lower Peninsula wrestling in 1991-92.

The council also doubled the district and regional sites and shortened the length of the baseball and softball tournament beginning in 1993; conformed the starting date for football practice to that of all other fall sports in the future; expanded the Lower Peninsula golf finals to a two-day, 36-hole event in 1992-93; and provided limited approval for a coaching box during regular-season basketball play. The MHSAA transfer regulation was fine-tuned in some respects and scheduled for continuing review.

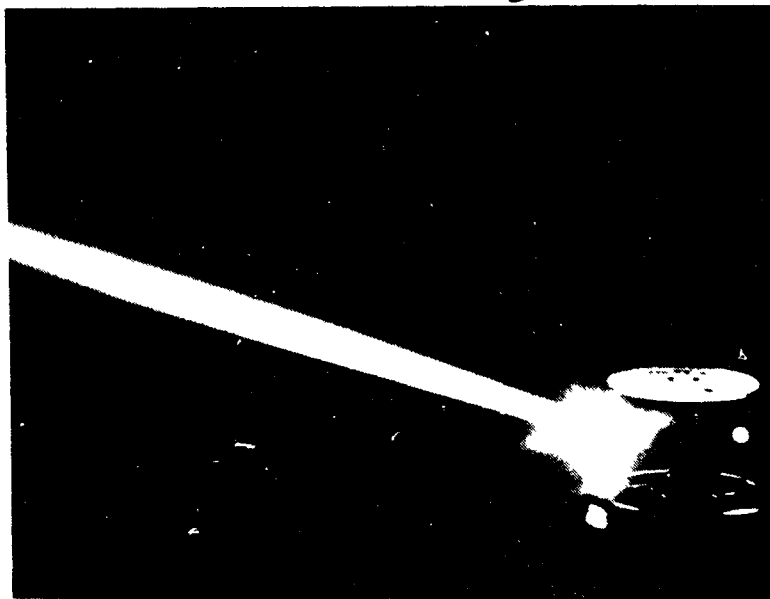

Summer colds can cause misery

Chilly winds bring with them the discomfort of colds, flu, strep throat, bronchitis and other nasty ailments. But colds and flus aren't restricted to cold-weather months — everyone has experienced the discomfort of a summer cold.

How much contact you have with other people partially determines how often you'll get sick. The average adult can expect to catch three to four colds every year. Children — who come into close contact with more cold sufferers, from doling relatives to sick classmates — get as many as seven. Retired from the workplace, the elderly get just one or two colds every year.

As with any illness, prevention is the best medicine when it comes to colds and flu. Make sure you get plenty of sleep, eat well and exercise regularly to keep your resistance up.

Restrict contact with illness-bearing germs. Don't share drinking glasses, eating utensils or bath towels. Don't shake hands or kiss someone who you know has a cold (if you do, avoid touching your eyes, mouth, or nose.) Wash your hands frequently. Opt for disposable tissues instead of handkerchiefs.

One reason colds and flu strike more often during cold-weather seasons is because the artificial heating in most offices, homes and schools makes the air very dry. A humidifier will help keep the protective mucus membrane of your respiratory tract from drying up.

Personal habits and environment are other factors contributing to colds and their severity. Smokers, for example, are more likely to have a chest cold blossom into bronchitis. So are people exposed to dust and fumes in the workplace.

COLD CUE

Once you catch a cold, antibiotics won't help. They only work on bacterial infections, and your cold is caused by one of 200 viruses.

Cold symptoms include a runny or stuffed nose, sore throat, coughing and low-grade fever. What should you do when you're under siege?

The editors of "Prevention" maga-

zine recommend tailoring home remedies to fit the symptoms. Stuffy noses are relieved by standing in a steamy shower or sipping chicken soup (which medical studies have shown to be particularly effective). Decongestant sprays stop a runny nose.

For headache, fever and general achiness, adults may take aspirin, acetaminophen or ibuprofen. This also helps if a head cold blooms into painful sinusitis. Gargling with salt water relieves sore throats; so does sucking on a lozenge.

Expectorants relieve a chest cold — especially the kind that includes coughing as a symptom. Drink a full glass of water with each dose for the best results. Avoid cough suppressants unless your doctor recommends them — coughing is one way your body expels the infection.

Drink plenty of water to prevent dehydration and hot fluids to relieve congestion. And get lots of rest while the cold runs its course of seven to 10 days.

FLU TIPS

The flu is a more serious matter. It strikes quickly, and its symptoms include a sudden fever, sore throat, hacking cough and, of course, chills and general achiness.

Bed rest and drinking lots of fluids are the best medicine. For aches and pains, take an aspirin substitute. Aspirin can cause Reye's syndrome, especially in teen-agers and children. If your temperature rises above 103 degrees, see a doctor.

Influenza is a respiratory illness; nausea and vomiting are common symptoms. If your symptoms include an upset stomach, the flu isn't the likely culprit. Mild cases of food poisoning are often mistaken for the flu.

Once you get the flu, a vaccination won't help. But at the start of the flu season, people over 65, those with chronic respiratory, heart or kidney diseases, as well as health workers, should see a doctor about flu vaccinations. Smart eating habits and exercise can reduce your chances of getting the flu by 70 percent.



OTHER AILMENTS

Strep throat comes hard and fast, but it doesn't have the stuffy nose or cough associated with colds (although small children with strep can have a persistent runny nose). Have a doctor take a throat culture if you think you have strep; treatment usually includes antibiotics.

Pneumonia can be caused by strep bacteria or a non-cold virus. Accord-

ing to "Prevention," its symptoms include sharp chest pains, vicious coughing, chills and fever as high as 105 degrees. Fluid gathering in the lungs' air sacs makes it difficult to breathe, so it's important to get medical treatment quickly. Bed rest helps, but if your symptoms worsen or you have diabetes, heart, kidney or lung disease, you'll probably have to go to the hospital to recover.

A fireplace lover's fantasy

A peekaboo gable with shutters brings plenty of light into the two-story vaulted entryway in the otherwise one-storied Dahlia 2. The home's cultured brick facade gives a feeling of permanence to this contemporary country home.

Families who enjoy watching fires will find plenty to please their eyes here, with fireplaces in both the living room and the family room. Wood stove fireplace inserts could easily fit into the spaces provided, if more heat production is desired.

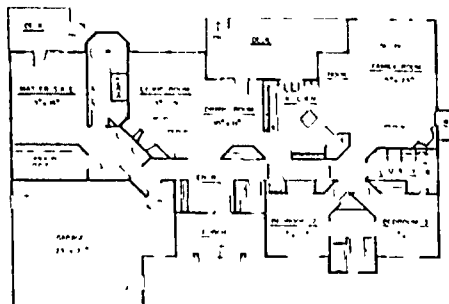

American Log Furniture Designs has introduced an entire line of furniture — from floor lamps to poster beds to dressers — made from lodgepole pine. Now before you go thinking that these are rustic trappings best suited for earth mothers and mountain men, think again. The versatile creations of American Log Furniture Designs are contemporary and comfortable.

"People hear log furniture, and they think log cabins," said Susan Norton, part owner of the company along with her brother John. "I really think it has an urban feel to it. It's just comfortable."

"I think people today want to get back to basics. People are trying to make their lives simpler in every aspect. It's nice to come home and be comfortable."

Indeed, simplicity is the byword for log furniture. Smooth-surfaced pine logs form the framing, which is all visible. Flat boards fill in the spaces. The look is sturdy, if somewhat bulky, kind of like Lincoln Logs with sophistication.

"It's going to be around for my lifetime and my kids' lifetimes," said Norton. "It's solid and heavy too. That's the way it's designed. There are no nails or screws. It's all lag-bolts together."

The assembly of some 40 different furniture pieces takes place at the American Log Furniture manufacturing facility in Novi. However, the company has all the equipment to build custom pieces. Norton, with a background in mechanical engineering, can provide the design knowhow to meet all requests.

Should you refinance your home mortgage?

To refinance or not to refinance. That is the question facing an increasing number of home owners.

Refinancing your own home should be a simple process. If you've lived in the house for years, have a large equity and a spotless credit record, it should be a cinch. Sign a few papers, pay the fees, and the job should be completed.

Unfortunately, the scenario isn't that simple in today's market. In fact, it can be a very complex and confusing process. Consider my recent experience.

I spotted an ad that stated a home refinance mortgage loan was available at an exceptionally low interest rate, no points and no appraisal fee. This sounded like my kind of loan—minimal costs and maximum advantages. Now is the time to refinance my adjustable rate mortgage loan with a solid, secure fixed rate loan, I reasoned.

I called the lender. I was informed the offered low rate applied only to an adjustable rate loan. If I insisted on a fixed rate loan the interest rate would be substantially higher and the points as well as processing fees would also increase.

I started shopping around. The scenario plot thickened with every phone call. The variations in loan types and related costs became mind-boggling. I was offered loans with terms of 10, 15, 20, 30 and 40 years. Some had adjustable interest rates. Others offered fixed rates. Still others were a hybrid of the two basic types.

One offering was a two-step loan, including only one interest rate adjustment during its 30-year term—after either five or seven years into the loan term.

Another loan had a fixed rate for five years, followed by an adjustable rate for the remaining 25 years of the loan term.

Still another had an adjustable rate for the first five years, followed by a fixed rate.

One offered loan had monthly payments based on a 30-year amortization period and a fixed interest rate for five or seven years, but then required a balloon payment (payoff).

Each of these loan options had its own schedule of costs, all of which were high in my conservative opinion.

Despite the complexities, many home owners are going for refinancing—particularly those (like myself) who want to

unload an existing variable rate mortgage loan for a favorable fixed rate loan.

"Our loan volume is now up by about a third over our volume a year ago, and about 75 percent of our current new loans are to refinance an existing loan," said the chief loan officer of a major bank.

He noted that the split between home purchase and refinance loans was about 50-50 a few months ago. The refinance business is growing. Most of those home owners want to take advantage of today's low rates and special tax benefits of a home mortgage loan— he said.

Another loan officer identified the lack of sufficient equity as a major problem for many people seeking a refinance loan. The current value of homes in many markets throughout the country is lower than it was a couple of years ago and that reduces the owner's equity. And many lenders now want to limit total loans to 75 percent of the property's market value.

Refinancing a home loan is often a very prudent move, particularly in a market as we are now experiencing. But it's not always easy. It takes a lot of study, comparing and decision making to be sure your new loan will effectively

questions," said Norton. "A woman came in who had arthritis. She was looking at beds, and was concerned about getting into the bed. The diameter of the log sides made it something of a leap for her. We told her it was no problem, that we could shorten the diameter."

The company also contracts with five major fabric manufacturers to create cushions and upholstery in any number of textures and patterns. American Log Furniture is also a distributor of Sealy mattresses, used on all of its beds.

American Log Furniture has been in business less than a month, but already a variety of customers has come through the door of the Royal Oak showroom.

"Most of the people have been 25- to 30-year-olds who have bought their first home or are decorating their own home for the first time," Norton said. "But we've also seen a lot of 50- to 60-year-olds who have second homes and are starting to furnish lake homes."

While the assembly of the pieces is completed in Novi, it actually begins in federal forest preserves in the Rockies and the Sierra Nevada Mountains.

"We have permission from the U.S. Forestry Service to go in and clear out standing dead wood," said Norton. "This is wood that's been standing dead for one to two years. It's nice and dry, and doesn't have to be kiln-dried."

Even trees killed by forest fires — whether accidental or "controlled burns" — can be used.

"It's still good for us to use," said Norton. "The branches and the bark may be burned off, but inside is still good wood."

And the forestry service is more than happy to let American Log Furniture clear out the trees. Standing dead wood is a detriment to new growth. Once it's cleared out, the forestry service can reforest the land. Both nature and the furniture company benefit.

"When I found out about the ecological aspects of this, I thought it was just great," said Norton.

She added that her venture into the business came from a personal desire to purchase log furniture.

"I was looking for this type of furniture for my home in Birmingham," she said. "Only nobody was doing this type of thing east of the Rocky Mountains. The desire for this furniture is very big, and the Southwest style is very big."

The prepared lumber is delivered in dedicated trucks to Novi, where lathes and routers turn the poles into parts for "kits." Parts for each of the 40 pieces are always in stock, allowing for quick delivery time.

Most pieces can be completed and delivered in two weeks. Those which require upholstery work, like sofas and chairs, take up to four or five weeks. Custom-designed work takes no more than eight weeks.

At present, two types of wood finishes are available: a natural lacquer and a whitewashed finish. Norton said a greater variety of stains and finishes is in the works.

"Out west, some of the Southwest-style furniture comes in these transparent turquoises and pinks that we'd like to get," she said. "People want a lot of choices, and we'll be able to offer them."

Q. Is the percentage of first-time home buyers declining?

A. No. First-time buyers have been a large and strong segment of the market for years—and still are today.

Last year, first-time buyers represented 38 percent of all residential transactions, according to a study by Century 21 Real Estate Corp. That's about the same proportion as was reported the previous year. The percentage has remained between 38 percent and 41 percent over the last six years, the Century 21 study revealed.

Q. Are more cities now using a "deed transfer tax" as a means of generating increased tax revenues?

A. Yes. The most recent major city to implement this tax is Los Angeles.

However, many cities study the pros and cons of a real estate deed transfer tax and decide against it. It places an unfair burden on home buyers and sellers and often results in negative political repercussions.

A. This porcelain bowl was made by the C. Tiesch Co. in Altwasser, Germany, during the late 1800s. It would probably sell for about \$100 to \$125 in an antique shop.

Q. Can you establish the vintage and value of my porcelain figurine of a nude girl marked "Goldscheider, Austria"? She is standing with her arms folded in front of her and she is 14 inches tall.

A. The Goldscheider family operated a factory in Vienna and ultimately established one in Trenton, N.J., at the beginning of World War II.

Your figurine was made in the early 1900s and would probably sell for \$700 to \$800.

Professionals can take bite out of termites.

Q. Please consider a column on carpenter ants and termites, the damage they might do to a dwelling and how to eliminate or control them.

Would a professional pest-control service be necessary or could a home owner effectively combat them?—J.H.

A. Both termites and carpenter ants can do extensive damage to any wood structure. This is rarely a do-it-yourself job for the home owner.

To protect your property you should contract with a qualified pest-control firm for a thorough inspection. A professional firm will be able to properly analyze the extent of the infestation and recommend appropriate methods of extermination, which usually requires fumigation with toxic chemicals.

However, you can try a suggestion that recently appeared in Popular Mechanics. They recommended that as soon as you see any evidence of carpenter ants, spray the area with pesticide. Once all the ants have died, immediately sprinkle diazinon around the perimeter of the area to help stop re-infestation. Ortho Hornet & Wasp spray was named as a product effective in getting rid of carpenter ants.

Be sure that the problem is carpenter ants, not termites, and the area of visible infestation is in an

exterior fence, deck or a structure that is not connected to the main house.

For your protection, I would certainly recommend contacting a professional if infestation appears in the main home structure.

Q. I have a copper covering at the top of my front door. It is about 20 years old and has turned green.

I would like to know how to clean it, to get it looking like copper again. Once I get it clean, how can I keep it that way?—C.W.

A. Unfortunately, the sheen on your copper trim cannot be restored to look like it was when it was new. The copper has gone through a natural weathering process called oxidation.

Actually, the corrosion-resistant process is the very thing that makes copper roofs and exterior trim so appealing and maintenance-free. Many people even work to speed up this process artificially with an acid-based solution, which induces the final green stage.

It would be impossible at this stage to restore shine to your copper trim.

Q. I would like to know if you have ever heard of a service that repaints kitchen appliances such as the stove, oven and dishwasher.

Our appliances are all avocado green (yuck!), but continue to

operate too well to consider replacement.

A. There is a relatively simple and effective way to change the color of your appliances. The procedure is a porcelain re-enameling (refinishing). This is a baked-on process and must be done by a professional porcelain enameling firm. The re-enameling is as durable and long-lasting as the original finish for refrigerators, oven doors, range tops, etc.

Look under Appliances — Refinishing in the yellow pages.

Q. I am having difficulty with the interior doors swelling and sticking. The problem is worse during high humidity.

I had the doors adjusted by a handyman, who shaved a small portion from the edges. Do you have any suggestion to correct this problem?

A. In addition to having the edges of the doors planed or sanded, you need to seal the raw wood on the edges to prevent future penetration of moisture.

Often the bare surfaces at the top and bottom of the doors do not get painted. Moisture is then allowed to penetrate and expand the wood. Once the doors fit and the wood is dry, seal the edges

with wood sealer or paint.

Q. I have tried to remove the finish from my dining room chairs without success. I've tried several brands of paint and varnish remover.

The chairs are approximately 50 years old. I am wondering if during that period some special finish was used that requires a different type of removal.

A. You have probably guessed the basic problem. The paint you are working with is most likely an old-fashioned milk paint.

Although impossible to remove with paint and varnish strippers, it is readily removed with ordinary ammonia.

However, you may want it. If the paint is still in good condition, your chairs are probably more valuable to collectors with the milk-based paint.

One of our readers writes:

I read your article regarding home remedies to cure a smoking fireplace. I agree with all the suggestions you offered.

However, based on our own experience there is one cause that was not mentioned. The use of a range hood fan, a bathroom exhaust fan, a dryer, or any other appliance that draws air while the fireplace is in operation can have a very negative effect.

We have an all-electric house

that is well insulated, and we discovered that the above-mentioned fans pulled the smoke right out of the fireplace —A.J.M.

Editors Note: Thank you, A.J.M., for pointing out this oversight.

It is very true that, in a tightly insulated home, fans can pull smoke right into the room from the fireplace, despite adjustments on the flue and fireplace damper.

However, some ventilation from the outside such as small opening in a window adjacent to the fireplace can help alleviate the problem.

Another reader writes:

I have a suggestion about deal-

ing with ink stains.

Our business is working with chemicals in the cleaning of industrial equipment. We have found a most unlikely cleaner for the removal of ballpoint pen ink stains: Soaking a stained item in milk can be very effective. It seems that there is an enzyme in milk that makes the ink turn into a liquid form that is easily washed away.

I would not have believed this if I had not tried it.

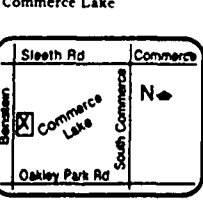

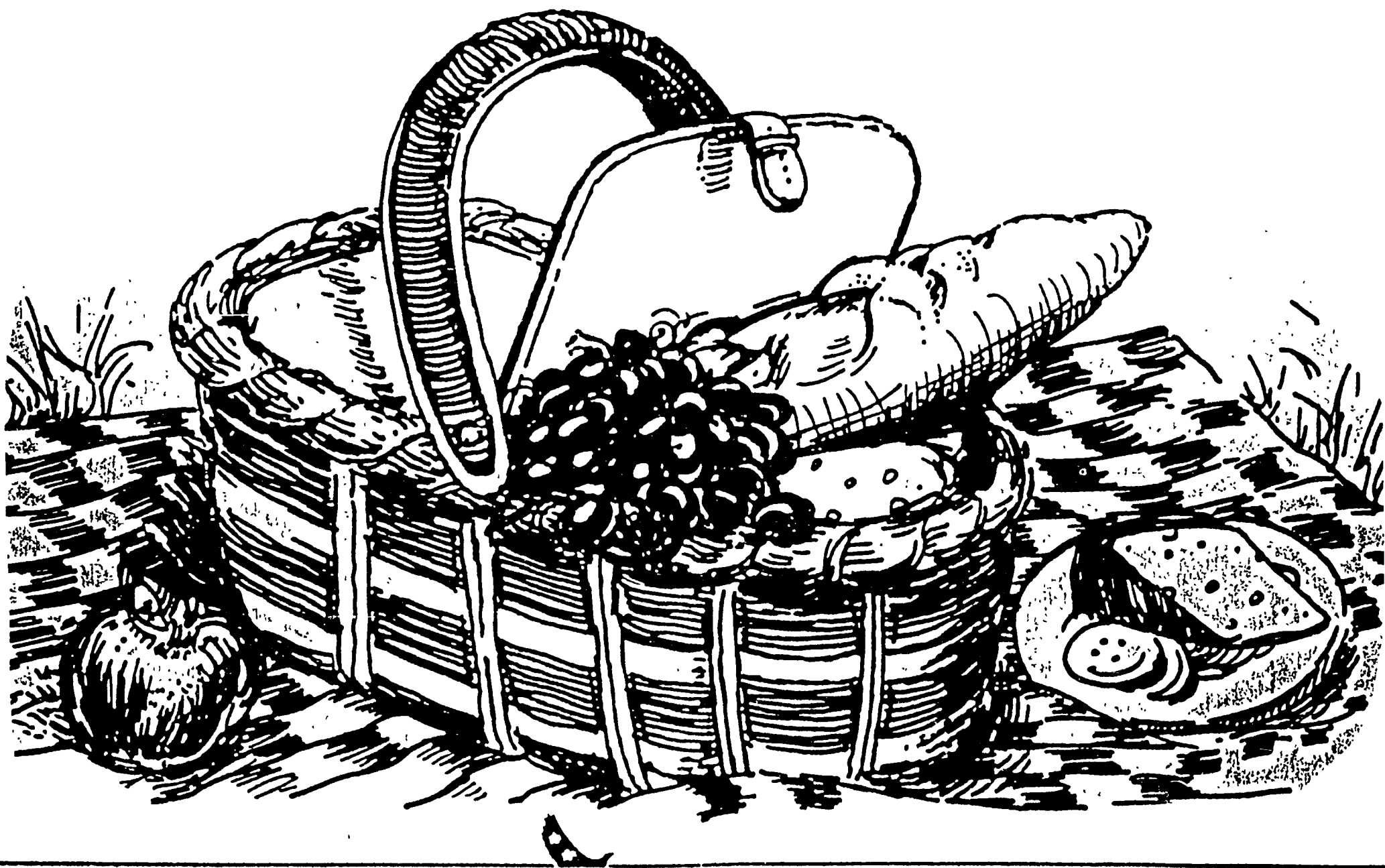

New store can rev up those old memories

Motor Memories, located at 112 E. Lake St. in South Lyon, is a business primarily catering to the car collector, although any old-time buffs will find items of interest.

"I'm trying to offer unique and special things to showcase your car," said owner Mark Bell. "There's also a spinoff into Michigan history a little, but that's because the automobile is such a part of Michigan's history."

Bell opened Motor Memories in May, and since then has been working to get the word out that there's a new place collectors can locate automotive memorabilia, products ranging from key rings and toys for just a few dollars to antique memorabilia worth considerably more.

If you approach Motor Memories from the rear, from behind Liberty Drugs instead of its front door off Lake Street, the first clue you have to what's inside is the drive-in speakers softly playing music, probably something from the 1950s or '60s. If that interests you, drive-in speakers engraved with the drive-in's name are

for sale inside.

To your right upon entering the store is a replica of a 1950s soda fountain, complete with a counter with stools and several small tables. This is the area of the store featuring '50s memorabilia, including some automotive-related items and some that aren't.

The stools are from LaRosa's, a former Dexter establishment and they are the same stools that Bell's parents and in-laws "used to sit on years ago," he said. "My grandma bought them and stuck them in her basement."

If you like the poodle skirt on the wall, you can get one custom-made for you at Motor Memories.

The front of the store will be a replica of a 1930s gas station, Bell said, and will include a gas pump from the '30s.

Classic cars are not a new passion for Bell. He said he's an old car fan "from years back. I was buying old cars before I was old enough to drive and then fixing them up."

He bought two classic cars when he was 13 and repaired them while working in a local store. As he got older, he worked in a variety of stores and found he enjoyed that, but it wasn't enough to help him support his family, so he took a "real job," Bell said. But his dream always was to own his own store.

Earlier this year, Bell was offered and accepted early retirement from his 16-year employer, an Ann Arbor-based medical research equipment manufacturer. This enabled him to realize his dream of owning his own store.

"I said I'm going to have a store with what I want — things related to old cars," Bell said. "What I sell is all the stuff that's available at the car shows all summer long, but I wanted to make it available for Father's Day, Christmas, birthdays, that sort of thing. This way, you don't have to wait for the car shows if you want something."

Motor Memories also is an authorized dealer for Ford, Chrysler and General Motors novelty items, including mementos and souvenirs such as T-shirts, hats, coffee mugs.

"It was a fight to get that," Bell said. "This is all stuff you can order from the Big Three but it can take six weeks to get it. I wanted to have it on the shelf for anyone who wants to buy it."

Bell and his wife Judy, Pinckney residents, have four boys. Classic cars are a hobby for the whole family. Their oldest, 16, is currently restoring a 1965 Dodge Dart convertible; their 14-year-old also has his classic Jeep picked out. Four years ago, Bell restored a 1931 Model A for his father.

Area residents may have seen Bell's 16-year-old drive a 1965 Thunderbird in South Lyon's July 4 parade last week.

Bell plans to participate in events with other downtown business owners. For Gala Days later this month, Motor Memories is sponsoring a "car smash" where anyone can vent their frustrations on an old car with a sledgehammer.

For those who admire old cars but can't afford the real thing, Motor Memories has many models available. In addition to what's on the shelves, Bell has between 200-300 catalogs so he can special order just about anything a customer wants.

Old-time advertising is another area in which Bell has begun collecting and offers to customers, along with old brochures from vacation spots, landmarks and other attractions. Bell also has advertisements from old-time cars as far back as the 1930s.

"People used to rent cabins or resorts instead of hotel rooms for vacations," Bell commented, looking over brochures for such places.

Bell has collected Life, Time, and Saturday Evening Post magazines from as far back as 1928. "This way, if a customer comes in and has a relative or someone that owns a particular car I can find the advertising to go along with that car and frame the original ad for them," Bell said.

Motor Memories offers a wide variety of items, ranging from antique advertising, signs, models and books to auto accessories and books and magazines.
